BIDDING OF DIOCESAN HISTORY

Bishop Let us hear the witness of those who have gone before us in this place, how God has worked through our diocese and continues to call us into mission.

Reader Our story begins on November 12, 1874, at Grace Church in Newark, at our first Convention, when 64 northern New Jersey congregations from the Diocese of New Jersey joined together to form a new diocese.

Our story is one of mission, of reaching out to new communities, of beginning new ministries and churches. Over the years, more than 70 congregations began as the result of another church planting them. Our work in mission continues, seeking new collaborations among our parishes to serve their neighbors in towns and cities across the diocese. And we reach beyond our own region, seeking to make a difference in faith communities and dioceses in other parts of the world, through opportunities like the Alleluia Fund, created in 2010.

Our story is one of compassion and service. In the early decades, when virtually no social safety nets existed, our churches stepped in to meet the needs of the world. We established homes for young people, opened schools, and created shelters and permanent housing. We created feeding ministries that continue to grow to meet the hardships of our present moment. We have responded in faith to serve our people and our communities, as a witness to the love and compassion of Christ. We continue to extend our hands in love, offering food and shelter to those in need, solace to those in prison, and community for those who are isolated or alone.

Reader Our story is one of advocacy and seeking justice. Following Jesus calls us to stand up to power for the rights of those who are marginalized. In recent decades, we have sought solidarity with those who the world tries to silence. In the 1960s, we welcomed the Black Power Conference, and we continue to wrestle with our racial history in our own parishes, communities, and beyond. We advocated for the full inclusion of women in holy orders and remain committed to dismantling the patriarchy. We have worked in support of disability rights and access, seeking to ensure that everyone belongs and has a place in our communities. We have borne witness, before the whole church, to the fullness of God's grace to all people by affirming the inclusion of LGBTQIA+ people in our churches, in our sacraments, and in our leadership. We continue to stand in solidarity alongside people all across the broad spectrum of human identity and experience and to understand one another better.

From the beginning, generation after generation has stepped forward in faith, reached out with compassion, and stood up with courage to meet the challenges of their time. Each time, our diocese has been defined by Bold Faith in Action. We have never been content merely to observe; we've always responded to the call to act. We are still learning, still opening our eyes, still welcoming the stranger. The Episcopal Diocese of Newark: 150 years of faith, compassion and courage. Together, we invite all to join us in following Jesus Christ with bold acts of justice, peace, and love, so that we may, in God's time, see a world transformed, where all creation knows God's life-changing love.

Bishop We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in Jesus Christ, the Word made flesh. For in these last days you sent Jesus to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In Christ, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In Christ, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Savior Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper Jesus took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Savior of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant. Unite us in the sacrifice of Jesus Christ, through whom we are acceptable to you, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your children; through Jesus Christ our Savior, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.
