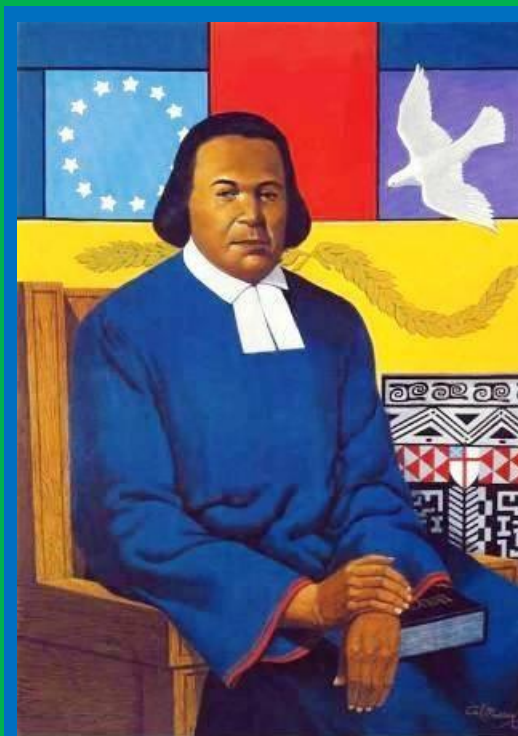

Absalom Jones

1746 – February 13, 1818

Absalom Jones was born into slavery in 1746 in Sussex County, Delaware. He taught himself to read using the New Testament, among other books. At 16, he was sold to a store owner in Philadelphia. There, he attended a night school for Blacks, operated by Quakers. At 20, he married another slave and bought her freedom with his earnings.

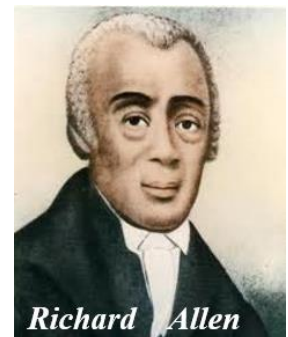


Jones bought his own freedom in 1784. At St. George's Methodist



Episcopal Church, he served as a lay minister for its Black membership, which greatly increased thanks to the active evangelism of Jones and his friend, Richard Allen. The alarmed White leadership decided to segregate Blacks into an upstairs gallery, without notifying them. When ushers tried to move them in the middle of opening prayers the next Sunday, the Black members walked out.

In 1787, Black Christians organized the Free African Society, the first organized Afro-American society. Jones and Allen were elected overseers. Members paid monthly dues to help those in need. The society established communications with similar Black groups in other cities and built a church that was dedicated on July 17, 1794.



The African Church applied for membership in the Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania on condition that: 1) they be received as an organized body; 2) they have control over their local affairs; and 3) Absalom Jones be licensed as lay reader, and, if qualified, be ordained as minister. In October 1794, the church was admitted as St. Thomas African Episcopal Church. Bishop William White ordained Jones as the Episcopal Church's first deacon of African descent in 1795 and as priest in 1804.



Allen, who wished the group to remain Methodist, left the society in 1793 and later founded the African Methodist Episcopal Church.

Jones was an earnest preacher. He denounced slavery and warned the oppressors to “clean their hands of slaves.” To him, God was the Father, who always acted on “behalf of the oppressed and distressed.” But it was his constant visiting and mild manner that made him beloved by his own flock and the community. St. Thomas Church grew to more than 500 members during its first year. Known as “the Black bishop of the Episcopal Church,” Jones was an example of persistent faith in God and in the church as God’s instrument.

Raphaëlle Peale, the oldest surviving child of prominent Philadelphia portraitist Charles Willson Peale, completed the portrait of Absalom Jones, on previous page, before the winter of 1810. It displays a dignity rarely accorded to African-American subjects in 19th-century art. Its style is simple and reminiscent of formal paintings of European clergy. INVOCATION OF OUR ANCESTORS IN THE FAITH

Deacon We gather today from the four corners of our diocese, people united in faith from the four corners of the earth. What we do this day we do not do alone, nor is it done by ourselves alone, or for ourselves alone.

We are united with our ancestors in the faith, that great long line of women and men on whose shoulders we stand, whose memory still inspires us to be a people of faith, hope and love. So let us now call upon them, known and unknown, named and unnamed, as we, with them, worship in the presence of the living God.

- Leader 1 Let us turn to the North, source of the great North Wind, and invoke the faithful who went before us: from Margaret of Scotland, Hilda of Whitby, Elizabeth of Hungary, Julian of Norwich and Patrick of Ireland, to Fredrick Douglas, W. E. B. DuBois, Marcus Garvey, Charles Houston, Thurgood Marshall, and Pauli Murray.
- Respondent Holy Spirit, mighty wind, gentle breeze, breath of God: Inspire our minds with the wisdom of our ancestors, crowd our imaginations with the vision of your coming reign, and empower our hope that we may build upon the foundation of the prophets and apostles, with Jesus Christ the chief cornerstone. Amen.
- Leader 2 Let us turn to the West, place of the setting sun, and invoke the faithful who went before us: from Kamehameha and Emma, King and Queen of Hawaii, the Martyrs of Japan, David Pendleton Oakerhater, missionary of the Cheyenne, to Absalom Jones and Richard Allen, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Amelia Bloomer, and Alexander Crummell.
- Respondent Gracious and loving God, you support us throughout the long day until the shadows lengthen and the evening comes: be our light in the darkness that, with the faithful ones who have gone before us, we, too, may find safe lodging and holy rest, and peace at the last. Amen.
- Leader 3 Let us turn to the South, home of the sun, and invoke the faithful who went before us: from John Coleridge Patteson and his companion Martyrs of Melanesia, the Martyrs of New Guinea, Bernard Mizeki, Martyr of Rhodesia and George Augustus Selwyn, Bishop of New Zealand, to Sojourner Truth, Harriet Tubman and Rosa Parks, Jonathan Daniels martyred in Hayneville, Alabama, Medgar Evers, martyred in Jackson, Mississippi, Martin Luther King, Jr., martyred in Memphis, Tennessee, and Malcolm X, martyred in Harlem, and Oscar Romero, martyred in San Salvador.
- Respondent Almighty God, by your grace you surround us with so great a cloud of witnesses; may we, encouraged by their example, persevere and run the race you have set before us, until at last, through your mercy, we with them attain to your eternal joy, through Jesus Christ our savior. Amen.
- Leader 4 Let us turn to the East, from whence comes the light of day and the place of our ancient birth, and invoke the faithful who went before us, from the shores of Africa to the coasts of China: from Athanasius, Monica and Augustine of Hippo, to Sergius of Moscow, Channing Moore Williams of China and Japan, Henry Martyn of India and Persia, and the Martyrs of Uganda.
- Respondent O God, you cause light to rise up in darkness for the godly: Hold us steadfast in the faith of our ancestors who witnessed to your light in days past, that

encouraged by their example we may boldly proclaim your presence in our lives as light to the world. Amen.

Bishop We believe that Jesus died and rose again, and so we believe that God will bring with Jesus those who have fallen asleep in him.

Respondent Jesus Christ, Lord of the living and the dead: With each generation your body of believers grows. Thank you for all who have gone before us, for what they achieved and what they learned. Give us strength to do your will, to be your body now. Amen.

Bishop We acclaim you, holy Lord, glorious in power. Your mighty works reveal your wisdom and love. When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we might find you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation.

Holy God, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose Jesus gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

All members of God's household are welcome to receive Communion. Communion during the pandemic is primarily in one kind, the Bread. All benefits of the Sacrament are available in receiving the Bread alone or the Cup alone.

Communion will be offered at two standing stations. Six feet of distance and face coverings must be maintained while waiting to receive. After the person in front of you has completely moved away from the Communion station, step forward to receive the Bread. After you are more than six feet away from the Communion station, you may remove your face covering briefly to consume the Bread. Replace your face covering and return to your seat, being careful to avoid proximity to other worshippers.

If you do not wish to receive the Sacrament and would like to receive a blessing, please signal that to the Eucharistic Minister by crossing your hands over your chest when you approach them. You do not need to step close to the Communion station for a blessing.

If you do not wish to receive Communion or a blessing, remaining in place and offering prayer is very appropriate during this time. No one is required to come forward at Communion.

Please let one of the ushers or one of the clergy present know if you would like the Sacrament brought to you.

About Rev. Wilson:

The Rev. Melvin E. Wilson was born in Cape Charles, Virginia. He is the youngest of two sons. He grew up in Norwalk, Connecticut, and received his early childhood and high school education there. His interests were music and academics.

Rev. Wilson received a Bachelor of Science degree in Accounting from Central Connecticut State University, New Britain, Connecticut, in 1984. He answered God's call to Christian ministry on May 15, 1981, while in college. After graduation from college, he entered Boston University School of Theology, Boston, Massachusetts, and graduated with a Master of Divinity (M.Div.) degree in May 1987, majoring in New Testament and Pastoral Counseling. Rev. Wilson is presently a candidate in the Doctor of Ministry degree program at New York Theological Seminary, New York, N.Y., and has done post-graduate work at Regent's Park College, Oxford University in Oxford, England. Wilson is regularly consulted on issues related to church growth and evangelism and is often invited by churches of all denominations to preach revivals and lead workshops on various topics. His preaching and teaching assignments have taken him across the United States, Europe, the Caribbean and South America and to South and West Africa.

Rev. Wilson is an ordained Itinerant Elder in the African Methodist Episcopal Church and has served as Pastor of five churches in the First Episcopal District of the African Methodist Episcopal Church; Bethel A.M.E. Church, Carlisle, Pa.; Allen A.M.E. Church, Atlantic City, N.J.; People's Institutional A.M.E. Church, Brooklyn, N.Y.; St. Luke A.M.E. Church, New York, N.Y.; and St. Paul A.M.E. Church, Cambridge, Mass. He has held financial, executive leadership, and educational positions in the corporate and non-profit world.

Rev. Wilson serves as one of the National Co-Chairs of the African American Ministers Leadership Council for People for the American Way (501©3), a social justice advocacy organization based in Washington, D.C. He also represents the A.M.E. Church on the Pan-Methodist Commission, was a member of the Mayor's Clergy Advisory Council of New York City and Mount Vernon, N.Y., and is Chairman of the Ministry of Evangelism of the New Jersey Annual Conference, A.M.E. Church. From November 2013 until June 2018, Wilson served as the Presiding Elder of the Brooklyn-Westchester District of the New York Annual Conference AME Church. On June 16, 2018, he was appointed as the 11th Pastor of St. Matthew A.M.E. Church in Orange, N.J., by Bishop Gregory G.M. Ingram. In the Orange community, Wilson serves as a Chaplain for both the City of Orange Police Department and Fire Department. He is also a Chaplain for the Essex County Sheriff's Office and the New Jersey State Police.

Rev. Wilson is married to the former Rev. Leslie Watson Malachi, National Director of African American Religious Affairs for People for the American Way Foundation. They share three adult daughters: Lauren Alexandra, Adrienne Patryce and Olivia Symone; and are grandparents to Grayson and Gabriella Woodson, Lexington Wilson-Woods and Gwendolyn Wilson. He cherishes being a spiritual father/mentor to many others across all denominations. In his leisure time, Rev. Wilson enjoys buying books, traveling, listening to smooth jazz and gospel music, and spending time with close friends. He loves to teach and believes strongly in the words of the Old Testament minor prophet Hosea, who wrote in Hosea 4:6a, "my people are destroyed from lack of knowledge..."

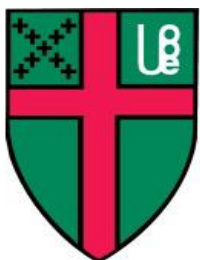
