TITLE 1., CANON I., § II.

OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present certificates of their election, in the following form:

[Name of the Church, the place, and date.]

This certifies that, at a meeting of the congregation of this Church, for the purpose of electing Church Officers and Deputies to the Convention (or for the purpose of electing Deputies to the Convention, if the meeting be for that purpose alone), A. B., C. D., and E. F., being members of the congregation and communicants of the Church, were duly chosen to represent the congregation in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand (or, if two of the Wardens subscribe, we have set our hands), the day and year above written.

N. B.—The alguature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary signs, then the signatures of both Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-in-Charge, or Missionary, cannot sign.—(See Canon.)

The Lay Bepresentation is limited to three Deputies, whose names should be carefully and legibly written.

This Certificate is to "be transmitted to the Secretary of the Convention AT LEAST TEN DAYS REFORE THE MEETING OF THE ANNUAL CONVENTION."—(See Canon.)

In order to secure this, the Secretary will forward a blank form to every Parish, and earnestly asks the PROMPT attention of the Clergy.

** By the terms of the Constitution, the Deputies must be "members of the congregation and communicants of the Church."

Mr. Edmund S. Munroe presented and read the following as the Report of the Committee on Finance:

The Committee on Finance respectfully recommend

That an assessment of two per cent., for Convention expenses and liabilities, be made upon the present salaries of the Clergy.

Also, that the usual assessment of seven per cent. on the salaries be made for the Bishop's salary, upon all Parishes that have not given their Bonds to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund.

The Committee also recommend relief from the Convention expenses, now in arrears, by the Parish of St. John's Church, Newark, provided they promptly pay the amount now due on assessments for Bishop's salary.

Also, in the case of Calvary Church, Bayonne, now greatly in arrears, a full remission of all past dues, provided they pay up for Bishop's salary, \$56, and for Convention expenses, \$12, being the dues for last fiscal year.

On motion, the recommendations of the Committee as to assessments for the next Conventional year, and remission of assessments in the case of two Parishes in arrears, were adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Hewes reported that the Rev. James A. Williams, D.D., the Rev. Robert N. Merritt, the Rev. Spencer M. Rice, D.D., and the Rev. Fernando C. Putnam, had received a majority of all the votes cast for Clerical members of the Standing Committee; and, on motion, their election was approved by the Laity.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom were referred the "Proposed Constitution and Code of Canons, for the government of the Diocese of Northern New Jersey," respectfully report:

That they have carefully examined and considered the proposed alterations in the Constitution and Canons of the Diocess. They submit, herewith, amendments to the same which they have prepared. As thus amended, they recommend to the approval of the Convention the proposed Constitution, and the adoption of the Code of Canons.

The Rev. Dr. Clover reported that the Rev. Joseph H. Smith, the Rev. J. Bloomfield Wetherill, the Rev. Wm. Welles Holley, and the Rev. C. M. A. Hewes, had received a majority of all the votes cast for Supplementary Clerical Deputies to the General Convention; and, on motion, their election was approved by the Laity.

The Rev. Mr. Stuart-Martin having reported that, in the first ballot for Supplementary Lay Deputies, no person had received a majority of the votes, the Convention proceeded to a second ballot.

The Rev. Mr. Hodgson reported that the Rev. R. M. Abercrombie, D.D., the Rev. W. G. Farrington, D.D., the Rev. J. N. Stansbury, B.D., and the Rev. W. H. Harison, D.D., had received a majority of all the votes cast for Clerical Deputies to the General Convention; and, on motion, their election was approved by the Laity.

The Rev. Mr. Holley reported that Mr. J. C. Garthwaite, Mr. Henry Meigs, Mr. Cortlandt Parker, and Mr. Alfred Mills had

received a majority of all the votes cast for Lay Deputies to the General Convention; and, on motion, their election was approved by the Clergy.

The Rev. Mr. Stuart-Martin reported that in the second ballot Mr. C. H. Voorhis, Mr. F. B. Ogden, Mr. Charles Hayes, and Mr. David Folsom had received a majority of all the votes cast for Supplementary Lay Deputies to the General Convention; and, on motion, their election was approved by the Clergy.

The Chair announced that the following Clergymen and Laymen had been elected Deputies and Supplementary Deputies:

The Convention then took up and considered the proposed Constitution, section by section, and the following changes were agreed to:

In Art. 4, § 2, the words, "and officiate statedly within it," were omitted, and the words, nor be eligible to any office in the gift of the Convention, were added.

In Art. 10, § I, l. 5, the word "seats" was changed to vote.

In the third section of same Article, all after the word "Convention" in the third line was stricken out.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Schuyler, the Constitution, as thus amended, was approved.

The Convention then proceeded to consider the proposed Code of Canons, and the following changes were agreed to in Title I.:

In Canon 2, § II., the words "appear to" were omitted.

In Canon 8, § I., the word "become" was changed to be.

In Canon 6, § II. [2], the word "pew" was changed to sitting.

In Canon 7, § II., in the Form of Consent, to be known as — — Church, was inserted after "County of ——."

In Canon 8, § I. [1], boundaries for their respective parishes was substituted for "lines dividing them from one another;" and in [2] such boundaries was substituted for "lines of division."

The following sub-Section 3 was also added:

The Rector of a Parish may at any time apply to the Bishop and Standing Committee to have boundaries assigned to his own Parish, provided such boundaries do not affect any other Parish.

In § II., of same Canon, after the word Parish in line 6, add, also for the defining for each Rector the extent of his responsibility for the care of souls.

In § III., of same Canon, change "opposition" to relation.

In Canon 9, § II., in the Form of Application, strike out "neighbors of" and insert in after "resident."

In the same Section, in the paragraph following the Form of Application, omit "communicants" in line 3, and "others" in line 4, and change "adult" to adults.

In the last paragraph of the same Section, line 6, insert mals before "adults."

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Schuyler, Title I., as thus amended, was adopted.

On motion of Mr. James E. Learned,

Ordered. That the Convention continue in session until the business before it shall be finished.

In Title II., Canon 2, § 2 [1], line 18, strike out "or any number of them, not less than three"—and insert at the end of the sentence, and no other proceedings shall be had without the presence of the whole Board.

In same § II., strike out [3], and change numbering.

In § V. of same Canon, line 2, insert all before "them," and strike out

Insert the following Canon 3 at the end of Title II.

Of Persons Repelled from the Holy Communion.

When a person, who has been repelled from the Holy Communion, appeals to the Bishop, and is not restored by him, the Bishop may, and if the person repelled demands it, shall appoint one Presbyter and two laymen, who shall make inquiry into the truth of the facts alleged, and shall report thereof, with their opinion thereon, to the Bishop, who may restore the individual, or otherwise, as he may deem proper.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Schuyler, Title II., as thus amended, was adopted.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Schuyler, Title III., as reported by the Committee, was adopted.

On motion of the same, the Code of Canons, as a whole, was adopted.

Mr. Alfred Mills presented and read the following

REPORT.

The Special Committee, appointed by the Convention of 1873 (and subsequently continued by the Conventions of both Dioceses), upon additional Episcopal support, to secure means for the maintenance of another Bishop, and to consult with Parishes which had already contributed to the Episcopal Fund, in relation to a more equitable adjustment of their contributions, did, on the 20th day of May last, make the following report to the present Diocese of New Jersey, then holding its Convention at Burlington.

The Special Committee, appointed by the Convention of 1878 (and subsequently continued by the Conventions of both Dioceses), upon additional Episcopal support, to secure means for the maintenance of another Bishop, and to consule with Parishes which had already contributed to the Episcopal Fund, in relation to a more equitable adjustment of their contributions, beg leave to report to the Diocese of New Jersey:

That, on the 16th November, 1875, they made a report to the Convention of Northern New Jersey, showing the amount and character of the Episcopal Fund; of which report, and also of a schedule bearing date September 24, 1875, they herewith present to your Convention printed copies.

No increase has since that time been made to the Fund, though we have reason to hope that, during the coming year, increase may be made by those Parishes which are in that Report

termed "other Parishes exempt under Canon X," and in the schedule are termed "not yet assenting to contribute additionally,"

By Reference to the Report of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, and to that portion of the Reports of the Tressurers of both Diocess to the respective Conventions of the same, relating to the Bishops' salaries, it will appear as follows, that

At a meeting of your Committee, composed of members from both Dioceses, hald on the 15th inst., the delinquencies referred to and other questions concerning the Fund and the support of the Episcopate were considered. Your Committee recommend the passage by the Convention of both Dioceses of resolutions carrying out the following suggestions:

1. That one-half of any deficiency found in making up the salaries of the two Bishops, during the Episoopate of the Rr. Revo. William H. Odenhermen, be assessed upon all the Parishes of the two Dioceses.

2. That a Joint Committee of six members, consisting of one Clergyman and two Laymen from each Diocese, be appointed; and that each Diocese, at its annual Convention, appoint its three members of this Committee.

S. That this Joint Committee have power to adjust, compromise, or remit such arrearages of interest on bonds or assessments as may now be, or may hereafter become due from Farishes which are unable to pay; and in case, in their judgment, any Parish bond has become worthless, and should be cancelled, to recommend to the two Conventions the cancellation thereof.

4. That inasmuch as the last Convention, held before the division of the original Diocese, made no provision for the filling of vacancies in the Board of Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, and, as by the recent death of the Hon. Thomas P. Carpenter and of the Hon. Charles S. Cluben, both residents of the Diocese of New Jersey in vacancies have occurred in that Board, the Convention of the Diocese of New Jersey be requested to name two persons to fit hose vacancies, and the Convention of the other Diocese be requested to approve such selections; and that the Joint Committee above named be instructed to produce such further legislation from the Legislature of New Jersey as may be necessary in the premises.

5. That the Joint Committee have power to procure additions to the Episcopal Fund,

That your Committee be discharged. All of which is respectfully submitted.

The undersigned members of that Committee, residing in the Diocese of Northern New Jersey, respectfully report to the Convention of that Diocese now in session:

That at their session, in May last, the Convention of the Diocese of New Jersey, on consideration of said Report, adopted, in lieu of the first resolution recommended therein, the following:

Resolved, "That the Treasurer of the Episcopal Fund be requested to collect from the Treasurer of each of the Dioceses of New Jersey and Northern New Jersey, one-half of any deficiency necessary to meet the present salaries of their Bishops, that there may be in the income of the Episcopal Fund, on the 15th day of May of each year." (See Journal Diocese N. J., p. 65.)

They also adopted the 2d, 8d, 5th, and 6th Resolutions recommended in said Report,

They appointed as three members of the Joint Committee called for in Resolution 2, Rev. E. M. Rodman, and Messrs. George C. Hance and F. S. Conover.

They did not adopt the 4th Resolution recommended in the Report, and selected Abraham Browning and Benjamin Williamson as Trustees, to fill the vacancies caused in the Board of Trustees of the Episcopal Fund by the death of Charles S. Olden and Thomas P. Carpenter—Mesers, Browning and Williamson being the same gentlemen selected by this Convention yesterday to fill said vacancies.

,We respectfully recommend the passage by this Convention of the following Resolutions:

- 1. Resolved, That one-half of any annual deficiency in the present salaries of the present Bishops of the two Dioceses is hereby authorized to be paid by the Treasurer of this Diocese.
- 2. Resolved, That the appointment of a Joint Committee of six members, consisting of one Clergyman and two Laymen from each Diocese, be approved, and that this Convention now appoint its three members of that Committee.
- 8. Resolved, That this Joint Committee have power to adjust, compromise, or remit such arrearages of interest on bonds or assessments as may now be, or may hereafter become due from Parishes that are unable to pay; and in case, in their judgment, any Parish bond has become worthless, and should be cancelled, to recommend to the two Conventions the cancellation thereof.
- 4. Resolved, That this Joint Committee have power to procure such further legislation from the Legislature of the State of New Jersey as may be necessary for filling vacancies in the Board of Trustees of the Episcopal Fund.

- Resolved. That this Joint Committee have power to procure additions to the Episcopal Fund.
 - 6. Resolved, That the Special Committee, appointed in 1878, be discharged.

That the number of Clergymen canonically resident in the Diocese is aixty-eight, entitling us to a representation of eight Trustees, besides the one to which every Diocese is entitled, making nine in all.

We recommend the adoption of the following:

Resolved, That this Convention nominate to the General Convention as the Trustees of the General Theological Seminary from the Diocese of Northern New Jersey, five Clargymen of the present delegation, taking the names in the order of the date of their election, viz.:

"B. M. ABERGROMBIE, D.D., "JOSEPH H. SMITH,

The Rev. WM. G. FARRINGTON, D.D.

Furthermore, If during the eleven months between this date and the time of the meeting of the General Convention the Diocese receive the accession of four Clergymen, we will be entitled to an additional representative; we therefore recommend the adoption of the following:

Resolved, That in case the Diocese become entitled to another Trustee, we nominate the Rev. E. B. Boggs, D.D., to complete the Delegation.

On motion, the Resolutions contained in this Report were adopted.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. William H. Carter,

Resolved, That a Committee of Three be appointed to ascertain what changes in the statute law of the State may be advisable or necessary to carry out the provisions of the Constitution and Canons of this Diocese, and to report at the next meeting of the Convention.

The Chair appointed as such Committee, the Rev. Wm. H. Carter, D.D., Ph.D., the Rev. H. B. STUART-MARTIN, and Mr. WILLIAM A. WHITEHEAD.

On motion of the Secretary, the following Clergymen and Laymen were appointed the Committee on Episcopal Residence: the Rev. Telfair Hodgson, the Rev. R. M. Abercrombie, D.D., the Rev. John M. Heffernan, and Messrs. J. C. Garthwaite, A. Mills, and H. R. Clarke.

On motion of the Rev. Philo W. Sprague,

Resolved, That the Chairman of this Convention appoint a Committee of two Clergy and two Laymen to suggest measures for an organized effort, on the part of the Diocese, to check the spread of intemperance.

The Chair appointed, as such Committee, the Rev. P. W. Sprague, the Rev. Dr. Cartee, and Messrs. H. Meigs, and G. W. Nicholas.

On motion of the Secretary, the testimonial of Lay Deputies from St. Matthew's Church, Newark, reported as imperfect by the Committee, was passed by the Convention.

The Rev. James Cameron called up the following proposed substitute for § 4, of Art. IV., of the Constitution, approved last year, and the same was adopted by a majority of each order:

SEC. 4. Lay Deputies shall not be allowed or entitled to vote at any Session of the Convention of this Diocese in any of the following cases:

[1.] In case the Parish sending such Deputy shall for two successive years have failed to report to the Bishop, in accordance with Canon V.

[2.] In case the Parish sending such Deputies shall for two successive years have failed to pay to the proper officer the interest on the Parish bonds, given for the support of the Episcopate and assessments for the same, and such sum or sums as may have been assessed or levied upon such Parish for Diocesan or Convention expenses, unless the same shall have been remitted by action of the Convention.

[8.] In case the Parish sending such Deputy, having been for two successive years without a Parish Minister, and not having provided for regular services, shall have failed to notify the Bishop thereof, and to request that a Missionary be assigned to it.

Lay Deputies of, or from, such Parishes shall, however, be allowed to vote at any Session of the Convention, when it shall appear that at least six months prior to such Session, the report, payment and notifications mentioned in the Subdivisions 1, 2, and 8, of this Section, respectively, have, and each of them has, been given or made.

The following amendment to the Constitution, approved last year, was also called up and adopted by a majority of each order:

Insert in Article V., after the words "this Church," in line 14, the fol-

lowing:

And provided further, That any congregation organized under Trustees, duly incorporated by Act of the Legislature of the State of New Jersey, may be admitted into union with this Convention when such Trustees shall have furnished an authenticated copy of a resolution promising conformity and obedience to the doctrine, discipline, and worship of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, and to the Constitution and Canons of the Church.

On motion of the Rev. James Cameron, the following Standing Resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That it shall be the duty of the Treasurer of the Episoopal Fund, and of the Treasurer of this Convention, to furnish to the Secretary thereof, on or before the meeting of Convention, a list of such Parishes as may be disfranchised by sub-Section 2, of Section 4, of Art. IV., of the Constitution; and the Secretary shall add thereto the names of such Parishes as may be disfranchised by the aforesaid Section 4, of Art. IV., and, if called for, he shall read such list at the opening of the Convention, and the Parishes named therein shall not vote in the Convention.

The Rev. EDWARD B. Boogs, D.D., was then re-elected Registrar of the Diocese.

Mr. HENRY HAYES Was re-elected Treasurer of the Convention.

The Rev. Joseph H. Smith and Dr. William T. Mercer, were elected Auditing Committee.

On motion,

Resolved, That the Registrar of the Diocese be authorized to draw upon the Treasurer for the actual expense incurred in the discharge of the duties of his office. On motion of the Secretary,

Resolved, That 500 copies of the amended Constitution, and of the Code of Canons, be printed for the use of the Convention.

On motion of Mr. James E. Learned,

Resolved, That the Secretary be authorized to print 750 copies of the Journal of this Convention.

On motion of the same,

Resolved, That this Convention returns its thanks to the citizens of Jersey City for the abundant hospitality shown its members during the present session.

On motion of the same,

Resolved, That the thanks of the Convention are hereby tendered to the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen of Grace Church, Jersey City, for the use of the church, and the conveniences afforded for the transaction of business.

On motion,

Resolved, That the Treasurer pay to the Sexton the usual sum for services rendered.

On motion,

Resolved, That after the reading of the Minutes and the usual devotions, the Convention adjourn sine die.

The Minutes of this day's proceedings were read and approved,

After an address from the Bishop, the singing of "Praise God from whom all blessings flow," prayers, and the benediction pronounced by the Bishop, the Convention stood adjourned sine die.



THE SECOND ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

Kight Zev. William Henry Odenheimer, D.D.,

BISHOP OF THE DIOCESE

To the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of Northern New Jersey,

Assembled in the Second Annual Convention:

BRETHREN BELOVED IN THE LORD:

I WELCOME you, with loving greetings, to this the Second Annual Meeting of the Council of the Church in this goodly jurisdiction. For seventeen years, counting back to my entrance on the Episcopal charge of the entire State and Diocese of New Jersey, I have aimed to fulfil the work for Christ and His Church which belongs to these upper seven counties, in common with the other portions of the So that, although the division of the old Diocese gives us in name a new jurisdiction, and makes me report to you in this Address only the second year of work within its limits, nevertheless it is, in point of fact, my seventeenth year of observation, based upon a careful and conscientious visitation of every section of the jurisdiction. I am prepared to welcome you to this authoritative Convention of the representatives of the Diocese, with words of encouragement; and amid all the evident deficiencies of the year's work, and the manifest necessity of greater zeal on the part of us all in the discharge of our respective and most responsible duties, I can use the words of truth and soberness, and say that GoD's blessing has rested upon the Diocese of Northern New Jersey

during the past year, and made the faithful labors of the Clergy and Laity to abound in practical results to the glory of His great name.

In the single item of Confirmations, there has never been such a gratifying success as the past year has witnessed. In the seven counties which, with the township of Summit, now form our Diocese, there have been 961 persons confirmed.

But it is not only the large number that makes the real point of satisfaction in the record, for there might be no true gain to the Faith and Kingdom of our Divine Lord in mere number of persons confirmed; but when I recall the earnest, prayerful, and most searching efforts on the part of the Pastors, aided by the loving assistance of Sunday-school Teachers and others of the Laity, which have been given to the godly training of the candidates for the Apostolic Ordinance, I feel that this department of church work, in the past year, is worthy of mutual and honest congratulations.

I have also to record, as the result of my year's observations, the work of God's Holy Spirit on the hearts of the members of the Diocese, in every part, in increasing the wholesome spirit of Christian love and genuine fraternal harmony. Without this, I should not venture to claim success in our year's work. The Angel's words, at the birth in the flesh of the Son of God our Saviour, were "Peace on earth;" and the unalterable law of the Church's life is given by our Divine Master in the words, "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another;" therefore, when there is no increase of Christian peace and love, there is, in my judgment; no real gain for the glorious Gospel of our gracious LORD.

I shall never cease to press this thought upon you, my brethren, so long as I have a heart to feel and a tongue to speak. It is no failure on my part to appreciate all the other departments of church work, that I make honest Christian love the essential test of church success; but because with every year's increase of experience in the work of the Christian ministry, I am more and more impressed with the words of the incarnate Son of God, in the Book of the Revelation, addressed to the Church of Ephesus:

[&]quot;I know thy works, and thy labour, and thy patience, and how

thou canst not bear them which are evil: and thou hast tried them which say they are apostles, and are not, and hast found them liars; and hast borne, and hast patience, and for my name's sake hast laboured, and hast not fainted."

"Nevertheless I have somewhat against thee, because thou hast left thy first love."

No amount of other work; no amount of zeal; of care for the purity of the Apostolic Ministry; of patient, unfainting labor, will avail if there be not the pure, changeless, spiritual power of love, "the first love." Let us never forget this teaching of Christ, when he spake to St. John the Divine, in the last utterance of His will, amid the mysterious visions of Patmos.

There is another fact that my last year's Episcopal observation has impressed on my mind, as indicative of a healthy tone in the general working of the Diocese, affording real occasion for grateful I need not dwell on the financial troubles of the past They still continue, and to many of the hard-working and meritorious poor of my Diocese they are oppressive almost beyond expression. They have interfered with almost every department of work. We have all suffered; most of us do still suffer. And yet the faith and hope and charity of the members of my Diocese have not failed. The Pastors have worked on; the Missionaries have worked on; the people have worked on; -so that, with all the deficiency of financial ability, there has been a real increase, in most parts of the Diocese, of a calm, fervent, loving faith in Christ and His Church. Services have been better attended than ever; there has been deeper attention to pastoral instructions; and a revival, in many cases, of church life and activity. Such is the testimony of the Clergy, as I have gone in and out among them in my visitations: and such is the personal experience that has come home to me, as I have noticed the character of the congregations in my Episcopal intercourse with them. As I have seen both Clergy and Laity suffering, yet heroically and unobtrusively discharging their duties, I have been reminded of St. Paul's description of his personal experience:

"We are troubled on every side, Yet not distressed; We are perplexed, But not in despair; Persecuted, but not forsaken; Cast down, but not destroyed."

I have thus, beloved, ventured to give you a brief sketch of some of the grounds on which I opened my Annual Address with words of congratulation, in view of the past year's work in the Diocese. The details in full, on which a just judgment may be formed, will be given in the Parochial Reports of the Clergy, which will be printed, and in the particulars which I proceed to notice in my Address.

BISHOP DECEASED.

I notice the death of the Right Rev. Dr. John Johns, Bishop of Virginia, which took place on the 5th of last April, at the venerable age of eighty years. He was a dear friend of mine, and a Prelate who was beloved of all for his singular purity of character, consistent yet charitable adherence to his theological opinions, and large-hearted interest in all matters connected with Christian progress, both in his Diocese and in the general Church. In the House of Bishops his influence was marked, and his words of wisdom were always effective. He had few equals in the pulpit, and as a fine specimen of his ability as a thinker and writer, his admirable discourse at the General Convention of 1871 will remain to his praise.

BISHOPS CONSECRATED.

Since November last, I have given my consent to the consecration of the Rev. Dr. Wm. Stevens Perry, to be Bishop of Iowa. He, together with the Bishops elect of Illinois and Fond du Lac, have been consecrated, and have entered on the vigorous discharge of their Episcopal duties in their respective jurisdictions.

At a Special Meeting of the House of Bishops, in Philadelphia, October 13th and 14th, the Rev. Dr. Schereschewsky was elected to be Bishop of China, and has accepted; and the Rev. C. Clifton Penick to be Bishop of Cape Palmas, and the parts adjacent, in Africa.

THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

The Annual Meeting of the Board of Missions was held in Philadelphia on the 10th, 11th, and 12th of October last. I was able to attend and take part in the opening services, and to be present, on several occasions, at the business sessions.

From the conclusion of the Eleventh Annual Report of the Commission on Home Missions to colored people, which was presented to the Board of Missions, I make the following extract:

"The past eleven years have shown conclusively, again and again, what can be accomplished by earnest, faithful work in behalf of the Colored people of the South. There is only one real solution of the whole African question. Human legislation has attempted it, but in many important particulars it has failed. No section of our country has as yet apprehended the true condition and destiny of the Colored man, or been successful in his general elevation. It is not in the mere counsels of men that this is to be accomplished. All plans must fail, and treasure be expended in vain, until we seek his true elevation as an immortal being, through the medium of the Gospel of Grace. The only true civilizer is the Christian teacher; and the only elevation worthy of the name, must be based on an intelligent Christianity. Here, in this great work of instructing and stimulating him in Christian duty, is a plane on which we all may meet. Here we develop, as nowhere else, his true manhood. Here we dissolve those mists by which his intellect has been clouded, through the long years and generations of his thraldom. Here we discharge the debt we owe him, so long over-due. Here we prepare him, without divesting him of his gentle and affectionate manners, to perform his daily duty in that state of life to which he may be called. To his Christian culture, all else is to be subordinated; and our obligations can only be met and discharged by the prompt and unremitted performance of this duty. In this alone is the solution of the problem.

"It is not the highest destiny of the Black man, to merge his individuality in that of the Caucasian race, and be no more seen; he has duties that are eminently his, reaching in their results far beyond the present, just as he has idiosyncrasies and impulses of his own. His future is not simply our

future, but the future of the millions who are occupying his ancestral home. His destiny is to still further develop under Christian teaching in our own land, and then to bring beneath the shadow of the Cross the waste places of the earth, now given over to superstition.

"Even those whose opportunities have been best for acquiring information in regard to his true character, are beginning to feel they had much to learn

in regard to him.
"His accumulations, as given by published statistics, show conclusively that he is not all unthrift; his success in study, that he has intellect; and

his kind-heartedness still remains, undoubted.

"Let it not be forgotten, that the majority of the people of this earth, now wring and existing on its surface, are Colored. God has uses for the African race, and for all these races, that we in our short-sightedness never thought of. As they develop and are prepared for it, they will go forth through the channels of commerce, and a hundred other ways, to carry our civilization to distant lands, and mould them to whatever shape we now give them in this generation.

"It is God's purpose, as we may believe, to reach Africa through her own descendants. May we not then ask in this centennial year—a year of such general thanksgiving—that Missions already begun, be strengthened, and that other Missions may be planted in localities heretofore neglected. The work is growing on our hands. The Church has yet a great work to do, and we have faith to hope, during the coming year, for enlarged support

from all our congregations.

I trust that the Diocese of Northern New Jersey will not fail to make regular and liberal contributions, as to all the departments of the Board, so also to the Treasury of the Home Missions to Colored people. The Rev. Wellington E. Webb, 40 Bible House, New York, is the Secretary of the Executive Committee.

I mention the death of the Rev. Dr. Richard B. Duane, the faithful Secretary of the Foreign Committee of the Board of Missions, after two years and six months of entire devotion to the duties of his office. He was in past years one of my Presbyters. and I have followed his course with deep personal interest, and feel that the Church has lost a most efficient laborer in this difficult department of work.

PRESBYTER DECEASED.

I record, with deep feeling, the death of the second oldest Clergyman on our list, the Reverend Jacob D. Moore. I had not been informed of his sickness, and a passing but kindly notice of his funeral in New York, which I chanced to see in a public newspaper, was the first intimation I had of his departure out of this life. Mr. Moore resided on his own property at Belleville, but was engaged in regular Missionary duty at Tenasty. He was a man of individuality of character, but thoroughly devoted to the Mission work, in which, long before I was elected Bishop of New Jersey, and under my predecessor, Bishop Doane, he had labored with great success and with unselfish and generous zeal.

I had seen more of him during the last summer than usual, and from his expressions and personal appearance, I had thought him in better health than usual. But it has pleased the Divine Master to take him from our midst, and thus to enforce the warning to us who remain—"Watch, for ye know not at what hour the Master of the house cometh."

Mr. Moore had often spoken to me of his sincere desire, and determination, to set apart a portion of his property at Belleville for the pious uses of the Church; and within the last few months I had urged him to complete his godly intentions, and secure, by a duly executed legal paper, in charge of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund of the Diocese, his intended gift. I have no information that his purpose was consummated.

THE MISSIONARY WORK OF THE DIOCESE.

During the past year I have visited, with great satisfaction, the Missions of the Diocese, and bear witness to the unflagging zeal of the Deans, with the Clergy and Laity of the two Convocations, and also to the successful work of the devoted Missionaries who are actually in charge. The Report of the Rev. Dr. Merritt, Dean of the Convocation of Newark, and the Report of the Rev. Dr. Abercrombie, Dean of the Convocation of Jersey City, will give the details of the Mission work in their respective departments. I urge upon the Parochial Clergy the necessity of regular and systematic attention to the appeals of the Deans in the contribution of funds to our Diocesan Missions. And I also urge upon the Laity the absolute importance of laying aside, without fail, a fixed sum for their gifts to the Treasury of the LORD, to be used in the Church work of this jurisdiction. Our Diocese is, comparatively, small; we can have ample information concerning the Missions within its limits; and I trust that with the knowledge of our necessities duly made known by the Pastors, our Christian men, women, and children will not suffer the good work to be crippled. But to succeed, I repeat it, there must be a thoroughly conscientious and business-like system adopted in the setting apart of a definite sum, and its regularcontribution at the appointed time. Not only in the department of Diocesan Missions, but in all departments, Foreign and Domestic, of Church work,—in our contributions to Indians and Freedmen, let there be adopted a deliberate and systematic plan of giving, and be the amount great or small, it will be regular, and, what is more, it will increase year after year.

PAROCHIAL WORK IN THE SEVERAL PARISHES AND MISSIONS.

In addition to my inquiries and observations at my visitations of the Parishes and Missions, I have received information of interest from the Parochial Reports, which have been sent to me, in many cases, before the meeting of the Convention. I shall be much pleased if the Reverend Clergy will endeavor to place their Reports in my hands, "before" the actual meeting of our Annual Council, in accordance with the suggestions of the Canons of both the General and our own Diocesan Conventions.

St. Paul's Church, Hoboken.—Under the faithful work of the Rector and his people, this Parish has raised \$20,000 for the reduction of the bonded debt, in addition to \$4,800 extra for other parochial purposes. When I recall the almost desperate condition of this Parish, at the time the present Rector took charge, I must express thus publicly my appreciation of the faithful and most liberal spirit that has succeeded, with God's blessing, in placing the Church on its present firm foundation.

St. Paul's Church, Englewood.—Notwithstanding my apprehensions, lest the schismatical action of some of the former officers and members of this Parish should embarrass, for a time, the efforts of the Rector and his Congregation, I found, on my visitation, the largest attendance of earnest-hearted people I have ever met there, and held the largest confirmation (21 persons), I think, ever held in the Parish. The total amount of Offerings during the year has been \$7,605.37. I trust that the success thus exhibited may be helpful to us all in our different departments of work, especially in view of the efforts to continue the schism begun under the name of a "Reform" in the Church. If we will work on cautiously,

earnestly, in faith and love, avoiding controversy whilst teaching our people, and especially the children, the scriptural and catholic truth as to the history and authority of the Church, we may leave results where they properly belong, in the hands of God, and possess our souls in peace.

MISSION AT SCHOOLEY'S MOUNTAIN.—We have no place of worship of our own on the Mountain; but I have generally held a service in the summer, and have often provided for a few other services during the season. This last year I requested the Rev. Dr. Clerc to act during a month; and his Report, which will be published among the Parochial Reports, will be found to be full of interest. The time must come when a small building of our own will be necessary, if our Mission is to have more than a name to mark it.

THE GERMAN MISSION OF ST. MATTHEW'S CHURCH, NEWARK.—I was much pleased with my annual visitation to this Mission Parish. It had almost ceased to exist; but the labors of the Missionary, the Rev. C. F. W. Treptow, who has been appointed within the last year, have been successful in reviving it. Everything seemed to indicate a real revival in the work; and I trust that the liberality of churchmen will not be wanting to sustain the Missionary and his faithful co-workers in this important mission. I confirmed 8 persons.

St. Stephen's Church, Newark.—The Rector, the Rev. Dr. Boggs, has begun the erection of a temporary church building on the foundations laid some time ago for a permanent stone edifice. The money has been raised to cover the expected outlay, and the frame building will be ready for occupation in the spring. Its completion will be a great gain to the Parish.

CHRIST CHURCH, NEWARK.—By the indefatigable exertions of the Rector, the Rev. J. N. Stansbury, a portion of the enlargement made to the stone church has been finished in the interior, and is now occupied. It affords much needed rooms for Parish purposes.

MISSION CHAPEL, ALLENDALE.—The Rev. L. R. Dickinson, Rector of the Parish at Ridgewood, has been successful in com-

pleting the Chapel of the Epiphany. The cost has been \$2,000, of which over \$1,600 have been already secured.

GRACE CHURCH, JERSEY CITY.—While commending the congregation of this Parish for the large amount contributed for Parochial and Diocesan objects, I desire to notice the admirable arrangements which have been made for the comfort and convenience of the members of the present Convention. The music and all the preparations made for the services have given me great satisfaction.

GRACE CHURCH, ORANGE.—I note with much pleasure the large offerings of this Parish—of which the Rev. Dr. Schuyler is Rector—for Domestic and Foreign Missionary work, and trust the example thus set will be followed by all the Parishes of the Diocese.

St. Matthew's Church, Jersey City.—In this Parish, under the leadership of the Rev. Dr. Abercrombie, the goodly sum of \$12,000 has been raised for Church purposes in general.

THE CHURCH OF THE HOLY COMMUNION, SOUTH ORANGE, the Rev. Henry V. Degen, Rector.—I am gratified to find that this Parish has reduced its debt by \$1,000.

CALVARY CHURCH, SUMMIT, the Rev. John F. Butterworth, Rector, has also been successful in materially reducing its indebtedness. The men, who in times like these, undertake and successfully carry through the work of relieving Church property from encursbrances of this nature are deserving of all honor.

Christ Church, Belleville, the Rev. C. S. Abbott, Rector.—. The Church has been refurnished, the Sunday-school rooms decorated, and other needed improvements made.

THE HOUSE OF PRAYER, NEWARK, the Rev. Hannibal Goodwin, Rector.—This Parish has celebrated its Quarto-centennial Anniversary during the past year. The Parish is prosperous, and its Sisterhood shows a remarkable degree of trained intelligence and devotion in the prosecution of its all-important work.

St. John's, Woodside, Newark.—Under its new Rector, the Rev. J. Bloomfield Wetherill, I have much confidence that this Parish will be speedily relieved from its embarrassments, and enter upon a new era of prosperity.

TRINITY CHURCH, BERGEN POINT, the Rev. G. H. Walsh, D.D., Rector.—The great need of this important Parish is a new church edifice. If this could be provided, the present Church, with some slight alterations, would be admirably adapted to Sunday-school purposes and other Church work. Without the proper machinery, it is impossible that the Parish work can be carried on effectively; and I earnestly hope that, with the anticipated improvement of the financial times, some steps may be taken to erect such a Church at Bergen Point as shall be worthy of the Parish, and shall fully develop its strength and influence.

ENGLISH CHAPEL AT COLOGNE, GERMANY.—This Mission, since the first of last May, has been in full charge of one of our Presbyters, the Rev. Dr. Henry F. Hartman, by the special license of the Lord Bishop of London, and with my own permission. He writes to me of his success, and especially in connection with the care of children, who have been sent without sufficient inquiry to improper schools in Cologne. I commend Dr. Hartman to the attention of those who may need Clerical advice for themselves and their children during their travels abroad. His Chapel is "Temple House in the Rheingasse, No. 8."

THE OLERGYMEN'S MUTUAL INSURANCE LEAGUE.

In regard to this most excellent Institution, whose President, the Rev. F. C. Putnam, is a Presbyter of my Diocese, and whose Treasurer, the Rev. Wm. N. Dunnell, was so at the time of its organization under an Act of Incorporation of the Legislature of this State, I have much gratification in being able to report that its benevolent work continues unabated; that during the past year it has distributed \$45,000 to the families of 24 deceased Clergymen, and during the past 8 years not less than \$195,000 to the families of 102 deceased members. I heartly commend this Institution to the confidence of the Clergy of my Diocese.

THE NEW TRANSLATION OF THE GERMAN PRAYER BOOK.

As one of the Committee of the General Convention on the Translation of the Prayer-book into German, it may be well to state that the work is progressing, under the direction, chiefly, of the learned Mr. Siegmund, and at the expense, I think, of the New York Bible and Common Prayer Book Society. I have introduced the Rev. Dr. Rosé, of this Diocese, to Mr. Siegmund; and the following note will show that Dr. Rosé is rendering acceptable assistance.

NEW YORK, Aug. 7, 1876.

RT. REV. AND DEAR SIR :-- I beg leave to send you, with to-day's mail, another portion of the new version of the German Prayer Book. It is my translation of the Family Prayers. You are respectfully requested to return the same with your corrections to my address.

ST. BARNABAS' HOSPITAL, NEWARK.

St. Barnabas' Hospital has continued with increasing energy its unselfish work of medical benevolence. The past year's Report of the Medical Staff states that "never before have their efforts been more successful or their work equalled." They also add, and I direct most affectionately the attention of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese to the suggestion, that "we feel constrained to speak of the daily increasing necessity of making a renewed and greater effort to provide a more suitable building for our work. No one can appreciate the wants of those working in the Hospital, without a personal and minute inspection. And while to any one visiting the Hospital all may appear clean, neat, well-regulated, and perhaps easily managed, they cannot realize the many hours of work, and the great task it is to do this.

"We end our Report by congratulating the gentlemen of the Board of Trustees upon the step taken in placing the management of the Hospital in the hands of Sisters. During the last few

months the Medical Staff have been witnesses many times of the wisdom of this step. And here we take occasion to speak of our appreciation of the work of the Sisters, and to pay a tribute to the zeal, efficiency, and untiring energy with which they have performed their duties, and most gladly share with them our success."

There is also a most interesting and very pressing want, which I commend earnestly to the generous hearts of our people, viz., a children's Ward. The Rev. Joseph H. Smith, the devoted Chaplain of St. Barnabas, says on this point:

"It is hard to refuse admission to diseased and needy children; and yet it is harder still to be compelled to take tender and impressible childhood into common wards, crowded with various forms of adult suffering and dissolution, to expose the little ones to the terror and apprehension of such somes.

"We have absolutely no proper place in which to treat wisely and judiciously the peculiar ailments of children; and yet the need of such a place,

in a city with the population of Newark, cannot be questioned.

"The expenditure of a few hundred dollars will afford us this much needed accommodation. Who will begin a fund for this purpose? Who will make generous contributions towards it?"

The ladies of Newark, and the Church in its vicinity, have been most zealous in their work for the Hospital, and have collected nearly sixteen hundred dollars for the current expenses of the Institution. May God's blessing rest upon them and their co-workers in the Diocese in all departments of Church effort. The practical result of woman's work in Missionary, Educational, and Hospital efforts, must win the grateful acknowledgments of all. I notice in the Report of Mrs. E. L. Keasbey, First Directress of the Ladies' Co-operative Society, the statement, most encouraging:

"We have been able, with the timely help of St. Barnabas' Guild, to meet all the internal expenses of the Hospital, and to hold a balance of three hundred dollars towards our summer expenses. If, in making these suggestions, we seem to forget the modesty which should always rule all woman's work, we can only plead our seal for the Hospital as our excuse."

During the past year, after matured deliberation and consultation with judicious advisers, I established the "COMMUNITY OF ST. BARNABAS," and the Board has placed the internal administration of the Institution under the care of this community of pious women, organized into a religious society for pious and charitable purposes. The efficiency and economy with which these sisters of St. Barna-

bas have performed their duties, deserve the thanks of the Church, as they have secured the comfort of the patients of the Hospital.

THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY LEAGUE OF NORTHERN NEW JERSEY

Was first formed last fall, with the Bishop's approval, as an Indian Aid Association, and extended itself later in the season to a General Missionary Society, embracing all departments of work. The Treasurer reports the sum of \$2,262.58 contributed in money and boxes during the year; and its members trust that their modest beginning will steadily develop into a vigorous association, extending a ready hand wherever there is a call for help. In many Parishes the good work has long been going on, and this organization of a Diocesan Association need make no change in these earlier established agencies. The hope is, that by systematizing the work, and uniting many in the good cause, sympathy and good will may be increased and the bond of fellowship be strengthened among the Christian women of the Diocese.

THE EXAMINING CHAPLAINS AND CANDIDATES FOR HOLY ORDERS.

I am happy to know that the three Ordinations that have been held, one to the Diaconate and two to the Priesthood, have been marked by the excellent attainments of the candidates. In one of these cases, a letter from the newly-ordained Priest contains the following passage: "Let me thank the Bishop for the kind encouragement to prove myself superior to 'dispensations.'" It is not often that such an acknowledgment as this is made, and it leads one to express the conviction that dispensations of time or studies. should be granted to persons preparing for Holy Orders in very rare cases, and only for imperative reasons. In these days, when the Laity are, in many cases, remarkable for their literary, scientific, and even theological attainments, it is undignified, to say the least, for a Christian student, looking forward to leadership in the Church's hosts, to talk about "dispensations." And the Examining Chaplains of this Diocese, with no disposition to be unjust, are of one mind with the other ecclesiastical authorities of the Diocese. in endeavoring to exalt the general tone of scholarship in the candidates.

The following letter is an evidence of their desire:

We may thus help to defend the Church from a loose and incompetent Ministry.

I heartily concur with the Chaplains, and shall be glad to second, in every way in my power, their efforts to fulfil the arduous duties of their canonically regulated office, to the edification of the Church, in the due preparation of candidates for the Holy Ministry.

I have no intemperate views on this subject of Christian Union, nor do I undertake to embarrass the progress of Gon's work, waiting in faith His time and will; but when men of profound learning, of acknowledged gravity of character, and mature judgment, devote themselves to the preliminaries of the great work, for which the Divine Master prayed, they deserve our hearty sympathy.

The Public Letter is as follows:

The undersigned, Bishops of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, desire to convey to the Rev. Dr. von Döllinger

our loving greetings :-

We have read, with the most intense interest, the proceedings of the Second Conference at Bonn, and have watched, with increasing confidence, the progress of the great movement, which combines in its purpose the Reformation, from within, of the Latin Communion, and a real and recognized Inter-communion among parted portions of the Holy Catholic and Apostolical Church of our Lord Jesus Christ.

And we bless God for the manifest guidance of His HOLY SPIRIT, which has led the Old Catholics, by careful and well-considered steps, towards a return to the primitive purity of discipline and doctrine: and for the manifest outpouring of His Holy Spirit, which made of one mind, as dwellers together in unity, the representatives gathered together at Bonn, from the

distant and divided portions of the Church.

Whatever action may be deemed wise and best in the future, in dealing with the difficult question of the altered Creed of Nice and Constantinople, at the present it is a great advance and gain to have now, from East and West, in the persons of truly representative men, an agreement as to the Faith, and a mutual understanding as to the force of language in the great Theological Statement of the Procession of the HOLY GHOST.

To you, Reverend and Beloved Brother, called as Moses was, in the fullness and ripeness of your age, to be a leader in the Israel of God, we are glad to convey, not our empty congratulations merely, but the assurance of our grateful sympathy and affection, and the promise of our prayers.

THE CHURCH SOCIETIES:

I assume that contributions have been made, under Pastoral direction, for the various Church Societies that help the Parishes of the Diocese; but I take occasion to urge the importance of aiding liberally these valuable institutions, and especially those whose appeals are urgent,

THE NEW YORK BIBLE AND COMMON PRAYER BOOK SOCIETY has especial claims on us. We have received their gifts; let us not fail to return our contributions. I make the following extract from their appeal:

"Since the year 1806 the New York Bible and Common Prayer Book Society has been engaged in the work of distributing Bibles, Prayer Books,

and Testaments. During the year just past, it has distributed 1,670 Bibles, 1,168 Testaments, and 31,882 Prayer Books, making a total of 84,170 yellows.

"In common with all other institutions, we have experienced a falling off in our receipts, compelling us to curtail our benefactions. Having no special agents to present our claims, we rely upon a simple statement of our work from year to year, and upon the recognition of its importance, in order to secure for it the needed sympathy and support.

"We trust that this year may prove no exception to those which are passed, but that willing friends will be found ready to supply our needs."

THE MEXICAN CHURCH work deserves especial notice, as a subject of charity and church interest.

The following appeal from our Bishops, representing the entire House of Bishops, is here presented:

The undersigned members of the "Mexican Commission," appointed by the Bishops of the Protestant Episoopal Church, cordially approve the formation, by the women of the Church, of a Mexican League, for the purpose of obtaining the means required for carrying forward the work of "The Mexican Branch of the Catholic Church of our Lord Jesus Christ militant upon earth;" and otherwise aiding the same.

The Rev. Dr. Henry Chauncey Riley, who has the especial charge of the Mexican Church Work, says:

"This Church of Jesus in Mexico, in seeking to follow the model of the primitive Church, has naturally drawn very near to the Church of England,

and to the Protestant Episcopal Church.

"From personal observation, I can state that this "Old Catholic" movement in Mexico deserves earnest attention. It is rapidly developing into a very influential organization. Congregations connected with it have for years regularly met in the Church of San José de Gracia, and in the Chapel of St. Francis in the City of Mexico. The great Church of St. Francis in that capital—a building two hundred and fifty feet in length, with a most beautiful and noble interior—is expected to be opened as the Metropolitan Cathedral of the Church of Jesus, in Mexico, in the course of the next few months. A former Roman Catholic Presbyter, named José M. Gonzalez, a man of great power and learning, who has joined this "Old Catholio" movement, now preaches to large congregations, and is exerting a great influence in Mexico. Many among the Roman Catholic Clergy are watching this Church of Jesus with deepest interest and sympathy. The laws of

Mexico offer entire liberty of worship. The fact that the fine old Church of San José de Gracia, in the City of Mexico, was bought directly from the Mexican Government for this "Old Catholic" movement, as well as many other facts, some of which I cannot yet publish, show what sympathy it already has."

THE BOARD OF MISSIONS has issued the following appeal, which I earnestly commend to the consideration and generous contributions of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese.

Resolved, That it is the bounden duty (a duty formally recognized by this Church) of every one "baptized in the Name of the LORD JESUS," systematically to give a due portion of the substance which a gracious Providence intrusts to his keeping, for the spread of the Gospel, and the salvation **of men**.

2. Resolved, That it is incumbent on those who are ordained to preach the Gospel, to practise, and in their public and private teachings to insist on this, as on other duties of a Christian life, "whether men will hear or

whether they will forbear."

3. Resolved, That while it may not be practicable to introduce the "Pledge and Envelope system" into all the Parishes of the land, as the one method of drawing forth the periodical contributions of the people for the Domestic and Foreign Missions of the Church, yet the efficiency of that system is so apparent, in the localities where it has been faithfully tried, that its adoption is earnestly recommended in every place where it can be employed without conflict with the same system in use for other objects of local and paramount importance, and that in such cases, the device and immediate use of some other harmonious system adapted to engage the people of every age and condition in the support of the General Missions of the Church, is urgently demanded by the wants of this Board, and by the word of Him Who is Head over all things to His Church.

4. Resolved, That on the Clergy who are engaged in the cure of souls, is devolved, by Divine appointment, the duty of stirring up those who are committed to them for guidance, to the acceptance of some systematic plan of making offerings for the LORD's work in all the world; and of taking the lead in the introduction, and subsequent operation, of some local agency by which Missionary interest shall be kept alive; and regular contri-

butions for Missions shall be made by all their Parishioners.

THE INDIAN COMMISSION, through the Bishop of Niobrara and his devoted fellow workers, asks for, and deserves a most liberal addition to the means now at their disposal. I urge you to make this appeal the subject of your especial influence. The Committee tells us that:

"All of the Schools are full—some of them overcrowded—and the Chapel Services are well attended. At the Spotted Tail Agency, where work has been but recently commenced, the School already numbers 170, and everything is most encouraging. From every part of the field the Reports indicate an unwonted interest and an increasing degree of temporal and spiritual prosperity.

"Our Missions among the Indians, we are very confident, have been conducted with great economy and good judgment, and the undersigned feel that but for the breaking down of Bishop Hare's health, chiefly by his many labors, this appeal would have been unnecessary. Under the circumstances, therefore, we submit it to all classes of our Church, believing that

in this way the desired relief may be made ample and easy.

"The laborers now carrying on the work have already made great selfsacrifices, but they are ready to make still greater, rather than have the work diminished or broken up. One hard working Missionary writes requesting the Committee to diminish his moderate stipend one half if necessary. Surely the friends of Indian Missions will not allow the men and women now in the field to make all the sacrifices which the nacessities of the case may require; nor will they compel the Executive Committee to withdraw their Missionaries and laborers from a field so inviting. We cannot but believe that there will be a ready and cordial response; and with this feeling and hope the Committee submit the case to their brothren. "Contributions may be sent to the Secretary of the Indian Commission,

COMMISSION OF HOME MISSIONS TO COLORED PEOPLE.—Another unobtrusive but most important agency of the Church for extending the Faith and Kingdom of Christ is Home Missions to our Southern colored brethren. From a Report, issued by the Commission, I make the following extract.

"For the last ten years it has been generally admitted that the colored people of the Southern States have presented a field for educational and missionary labor of surpassing interest. Love of our common country, philanthropy, religion, all conspire to awaken the energy and solicitt de of

the public mind. Our Commission is at this time sadly in need of money. Will not our friends, therefore, who have hitherto not forgotten us in their annual offerings, remember us this year, and that speedily? Grant all that may be urged in deprediation of the work, and more; that these people are among the least of those for whom the Saviour died, then, all effort in their behalf must be deemed the offspring of truest love and purest faith. All Christians may well covet the opportunity of giving to a cause in which it is so improbable that selfishness can prevail.

"'Inasmuch as ye have done it unto the least of these, my brethren, ye

have done it unto me."

THE FOREIGN COMMITTEE, having in charge the conduct of the Foreign Missions of the Church, are in serious distress for the want of funds, and I trust that every Parish in the Diocese will make its collection for both Foreign and Domestic departments of the Church's work.

I commend this subject to the especial attention of you, my Brethren, Clerical and Lay, who represent our Diocese in this our Annual Convention.

I extract the following passage from the Report of the Committee:

"The Committee to whom it was referred to consider and report upon the condition and work of the Foreign Committee, beg leave to present the

result of their deliberations under the following heads:

the year closing with September—were \$89,724.74, while the cash disbursements were \$106,198.76, showing an excess of payments over receipts of \$16,474.02. This excess, added to \$16,281.46—the excess of payments over receipts for the preceding year, makes an aggregate of indebtedness at the commencement of the present financial year of \$32,705.48. Ordinarily a moderate arrearage on the first of January has occasioned no anxiety, as the receipts by the first of June have removed it, leaving a balance in the Treasury. But when for two years and more the expenses of the Committee have exceeded its income at the rate of over \$16,000 per annum, it is made painfully evident that the financial condition of the Committee claims special attention. The Church has devolved upon the Foreign Committee the responsibility of administering the affairs of its Foreign Missions. But in the discharge of this responsibility, we think the Foreign Committee should not, as a rule, embarrass itself, or those whom they represent, by debt. The Committee are but Trustees, to use, to the best of their ability, such funds as may be intrusted to them. We therefore recommend that it be made a special and primary object with the Committee to free itself at the earliest practical moment of its pecuniary indebtedness."

CHRISTIAN WORK ON THE ISLAND OF CUBA.

It is a special work for Christ, commended by the House of Bishops, which the Rev. Edward Kenney has charge of in the Island of Cuba. Bishop Whipple has visited the place and seen the details of the work, and, in common with the Bishop of Huron, Canada, has made a statement, of which the following is an extract.

Bishop Whipple sent cut the Rev. Edward Konney in 1871. He is a devout, earnest, and prudent man. Under great difficulties and some opposition, he has gone on quietly with his work. He has been at death's door by the yellow fever. His work has been confined to the foreign population. Public services are held every Sunday in the saloon of one of the hotels. One of the largest hospitals is under his spiritual care. He has baptized thirty persons, buried one hundred and twenty-five persons, and made over four thousand visits to the sick and dying. The time has come when this work tought to be placed upon a more secure foundation. We must rent a suitable building, and provide for the support of the Pastor. We must soon provide for similar services in other cities. The Consul-General of Great Britain, Mr. Dunlop, the Consul-General of the Garman Empire, Mr. Zach, the Consul-General of the United States, Mr. Hale, and Mr. Beck and Mr. Lawton, have consented to act as a committee to receive and expend contributions.

THE "OLD CHURCH" OF ST. MARY IN BURLINGTON.

On the Feast of the Purification, February 2d, I assisted in the benedictory services at the restoration and re-opening of the Old Church of St. Mary, in Burlington, founded in 1703, disused in 1854.

When I recall the Holy Services that have been held in this Old Church, many of which the former Bishops of New Jersey conducted, and in which all the members of the Dioceses of the State of New Jersey have assisted, we may all rejoice in the restoration of the Old Church, and adopt with hearty reality the prayer used on the occasion of the re-opening:

O most glorious Lord, we acknowledge that we are not worthy to offer unto Thee anything belonging unto us; yet we beseech Thee, in Thy great goodness, graciously to accept the renewed Dedication of this place to Thy service; receive the preyers and intercessions of all who shall call upon Thee in this house; that coming before Thee with clean thoughts and pure hearts, with bodies undefiled, and minds sanctified, they may always perform a service acceptable to Thee; through Jesus Christ, our LORD. Amen.

In connection with this reference to the Old Church at Burlington, allow me to commend to you, as a valuable collection of important historical facts in the history of New Jersey, the work of the Rev. Dr. George Morgan Hills, Rector of St. Mary's Church,

entitled "History of the Church in Burlington." The scholarly manner in which all the facts embodied have been grouped, gives the book a prominent historic value, which the general student of American ecclesiastical history, as well as the Burlington churchman, will appreciate. The book is worthy of a place in the public Libraries, as it is essential to the private libraries of all New Jersey churchmen.

JOINT LETTER IN BEHALF OF ST. MARY'S HALL.

On the 25th of last January, I united with the Bishop of New Jersey in issuing a letter to the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese, touching the interests of St Mary's Hall. The entire renovation of the building in every department, at great pecuniary outlay, and the perfect character of the Institution, both in material and spiritual agency, to preserve and improve the physical, intellectual, and spiritual health of its pupils, compel me to present the matter to your conscientious attention as representatives of the Church in this jurisdiction.

. I append the Pastoral Letter in this my Annual Address, as giving, I trust, increased circulation and efficiency to the appeal:

Dear Brethren of the Clergy of the Dioceses of New Jersey and Northern New

We ask your earnest and thoughtful attention to the following considera-

tions, touching the present position and work of St. Mary's Hall.

It is now completing its thirty-ninth year. It has graduated 571 pupils, and probably not less than 3.500 have received instruction within its walls, Not a few of these have been called to occupy places of influence and importance. in the work of the Church; and all, it is confidently believed, were the better fitted for their place and duty in life, by the nurture and training here received. St. Mary's Hall has fully done-and is now doing

—all that its devoted and sanguine Founder predicted for it.

But this very success, which has prompted the establishment of many similar schools, far and near, may work harm to it, by diminishing its sources of patronage and support. Indeed, the circle from which the larger number of pupils formerly came, has been gradually contracting, till the conviction forces itself upon us that every year St. Mary's must become more and more exclusively A NEW JERSEY SCHOOL, depending mainly on home patronage.

It is for this reason that we would now formally lay its claims before you, and state a few of the many advantages it has, to commend it spe-

cially to the Clergy.

I.—Its position is central, and easily accessible from all parts of the State; while in healthfulness it fearlessly challenges comparison with any other similar Institution.

II —It is not too much to say that it is now more thoroughly prepared and equipped for doing its work than ever before. In the past year, a large outlay of money has put its buildings in complete repair, supplying to the inmates the comforts of a ratined home. None of the modern appliances of education are wanting. The teachers, most of them tested by long and successful service in their several departments, are fully competent, and, we believe, at least the equal of those who gave St. Mary's its early fame.

III.—For the advantages offered, and as compared with the rates of other schools, the charges for tuition are very moderate. There are literally no "extras," to swell the school bill. The single charge of \$450 a year covers everything: board, washing, and the whole curriculum of study—music, instrumental and vocal—painting and drawing—ancient and modern languages: all are included. Even the use of text-books and pianos is free. Any parent who has educated a daughter at a fashionable boarding-school, knows what an item of cost are the "extras," every term. This feature of St. Mary's is one that should strongly commend it. Every branch of learning taught in the best schools, is here afforded, at one uniform rate; and the course of instruction is most thorough and complete.

IV.—A large deduction is made, in favor of the daughters of the Clergy, reducing the charge to the bare cost of maintenance, or less; while the orphans or half-orphans of Clergymen have always been admitted at nominal rates, and often as free pupils. None but those intimately acquainted with the past or present working of the School, can know how large and frequent

its benefactions are, in this direction.

And these benefactions will be gladly increased, as there is ability. It is earnestly wished by the Bishops, as well as by the authorities of the School, that parochial scholarships should be founded, in every Parish in New Jersey, for the education of girls as Parish school-teachers. Pupils might be nominated to such foundations by Rectors, Parish Guilds, or Sunday-schools. They would be received into the Hall on very liberal terms, and educated with special reference to their intended vocation as Parish school-teachers.

V.—The School is in no sense a money-making Institution. Its affairs are managed by those who labor without compensation, who give both time

and money for the privilege of thus serving the Church.

VI.—St. Mary's is thoroughly a Church School; and, although others have availed themselves of its privileges, it looks to the Church mainly for its patronage and support.

The Chapel is—as it ought to be—the centre of household life; and its bright morning, evening, and noon-day services have stamped indelibly, on

many a soul, the beauty of holiness.

By all these considerations, and many that we cannot here enumerate, we beg leave most earnestly to urge upon the Olergy the claim of our home School for girls—a school whose past history has done much to make the name of New Jersey honored among her sister Diocese.

We ask them, as Pastors, to turn the thoughts of their people who have daughters to educate, to the advantages here offered. And we ask their confidence and support, not for a vague experiment, but, for an Institution which is their own, and which has fairly earned its right to all we ask for it. HUDSON COUNTY CHURCH HOSPITAL AND HOME.

This institution, which I visited, and in which I held a Confirmation, is doing a good work under peculiar difficulties. The ladies here, as at St. Barnabas, Newark, have been untiring in their efforts, and have raised money, and given their personal influence to maintain the efficiency of its benevolent work. God bless all who have here, and elsewhere, in the Diocese, remembered the Master's words, "Whatsoever ye have done unto the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

The Rev. Dr. Abercrombie is President, and the Rev. F. C. Putnam is Chaplain, and Mr. John M. Welsh, 19 Sussex Row, Jersey City, is Treasurer.

I make the following extract from the Report for 1875:

The council of the Hudson County Church Hospital and Home present their Annual Report with the Treasurer's account of income and expenditure, and congratulate the friends of this Institution upon its prosperity.

Nothing has disturbed the harmony of its proceedings, while an increased interest on the part of the Public has been manifested in the welfare of our enterprise, and we have reason to believe that this interest will continue.

The Hudson County Hospital has been leased for another year. The alterations and repairs made last year have proved eminently serviceable, and no more are required.

The number of patients during the year has been 118, of whom 96 have

been discharged, and 14 died.

The expenses of the Institution have increased in proportion to the number of patients, but have been met by a correspondent liberality on the part of the humane.

Over \$7,000 has been raised and expended during the past year. A fair was held in April, and the receipts amounted to \$1,900 plus.

We desire to express our indebtedness to the Medical Staff, not only for faithful attendance;—but also for their kind and skilful ministrations. The same Staff has been reappointed by the Board of Regents for the ensuing year.

It was found necessary to have a Home Physician, and under the advice of the Staff, Dr. Crocker was appointed to this office, and has been assidu-

ous in the performance of his duties.

Under the care and economical management of the Superintendent, the Institution has been preserved from any embarrassment, while her courteous and praiseworthy attentions have raised up many friends to the cause.

The Chapel services have been regularly conducted under the efficient Chaplain, aided by several of the Clergy of Jersey City; and full provision made for the spiritual interests of the patients, who constantly testify their gratitude. This is one of the most holy and attractive features of our Institution, bringing down a blessing upon our endeavors.

THE CLERGYMEN'S RETIRING FUND SOCIETY, AND OTHER CORPORATIONS.

This is an institution, unobtrusive, but working on in faith, established by the loving and generous agency of members of the Diocese. It does not intend to interfere with the established and most important corporation for the "Relief of Aged and Inform Clergy," which I trust will annually receive from the Clergy and Laity the canonically appointed collection. Neither is it possible that the Clergymen's Retiring Fund Society can interfere with the venerable corporation for the "Relief of the Widows and Children of Deceased Clergymen," of the Diocese, the Treasurer of which is the Rev. Dr. Williams, of Orange. But it is intended to help now, in the hour of pressing need, overworked and necessitous cases among the Clergy. The following extract from the Report of the President, Rev. Dr. Abercrombie, of Jersey City, will give information of its objects:

"All praise to the Relief Funds already in existence; but not one has yet been organized to satisfy the consciences of many, respecting the self-sacrificing veterans in the ministry of the Church. Until the Church at large shall rouse up to this duty, we see no other way of accomplishing the object than by mutual benefit association. This mode has been tried for many years, in different corporate bodies, with great success. Let the Clergy who shall contribute monthly to the fund of this association from the altar offerings of the church where they serve, claim and receive, at sixty years of age, a quota of the interest of the fund, which interest may be equally divided among the members who have reached or exceeded that age. This quota could be returned by those who have sufficient private means of support, and be added to the general fund for the benefit of those less favored. Thus, by proportionate distribution among the claimants, no liabilities would be incurred which could not be met by immediate pay-

"The interest of the Fund, after the accumulation of the contributions for five years, shall be equally divided among those members who shall have ' reached the age of sixty years; and the amount of succeeding annual interest shall be divided in like manner.

"As a safe, fessible, and equitable scheme, we commend it to the sympathies and co-operation of the Bishops, Clergy, and Laity of our Church, who, we trust, will give practical effect to these fundamental principles and conditions."

QUARTO-CENTENNIAL OF THE HOUSE OF PRAYER, NEWARK.

On November 26, A. D. 1875, the twenty-fifth anniversary of the House of Prayer was held, and a full and most interesting statement of the event and of all the important facts connected with this Church has been carefully prepared and published.

Referring you to that pamphlet for information on many important points, I take occasion to extract a passage which records without name the noble gifts of the generous but retiring Layman well known to us all, and the hard-working friend of the Church in this and the other Diocese of the State of New Jersey, for many long years.

The House of Prayer pamphlet, alluding to the founding of the Parish, uses these words:

"A large part of the material of this portion of the work has been kindly furnished by a distinguished Layman, whose prominent connection with the origin of the enterprise, and whose intimate acquaintance with all those who took any part or interest therein, will be a sufficient guarantee for the accuracy of his statements.

"Were one to attempt to write a history of the United States without referring, even incidentally, to George Washington, he would be considered a venturesome man; and the usefulness of his history as a book of reference would be materially impaired by the omission. And yet we have ventured to record the history of the House of Prayer without alluding by name to the distinguished Layman above referred to, who was no doubt the chief instrument in the establishment of the Parish, and was by far the largest contributor to the enterprise, of his time, his counsel, and his money. Of him we think it may be truly said, that without him the House of Prayer would not have existed. And yet this gentleman, whose public benefactions are equalled only by his innate modesty and his love of doing good in secret, positively declines to allow his name to appear in this sketch.

"Under the careful, able, and zealous administration of the Rev. Mr. Goodwin, the present incumbent, the Parish has made rapid progress, and is now in an unprecedentedly excellent condition, financially and otherwise.

"That its progress in spiritual things has been great, we think may be truly affirmed, presumptuous though it may be to boast of what can be known to One alone. The might of the sea is not to be sought in the tempest that overwhelms the ship, and piles the angry billows 'mountain-high,' and, passing by, leaves no trace of its power; but in the unseen currents in the great depths below, which mingle the icy waters of the pole with the sun-warmed waters of the line, thus keeping up a never-ending motion in the vast chambers of the ocean, preserving its purity and making it a living thing.

thing.

"Just so it is with the spiritual life of a Parish. As it was written by the inspired Apostle: "We look not at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen: for the things which are seen are temporal,

but the things which are not seen are eternal.'—2d Cor. iv. 18."

THE EPISCOPAL RESIDENCE.

During the past year I have occupied the residence of the late Mr. Faitoute, No. 37 Washington Street, Newark, the rent having been secured by the liberality of those who contributed to the appeal of the Committee appointed at the last Annual Convention. My lease expires on the 1st of April next; but I hope that it may be renewed.

THE CENTENNIAL YEAR OF OUR COUNTRY.

I have neither the heart nor the wish to omit an emphatic allusion to the great event that marks out upon the calendar of time the year 1876 as the Centennial Anniversary of our country. In every way the Church and the State have done justice to the event, and from the 10th of May to the 10th of November the grand celebration has taken place in the City of Philadelphia—the place of all others, in our vast country, for recalling the especial event of the century. The wonderful success-financial, mechanical, intellectual, and moral-of the Philadelphia Exhibition is an honorable testimonial to the attainments of our country, as represented in the unselfish and unfaltering efforts of the leaders and assistants of the grand agency for the civilization and Christianization of the world. May God grant His blessings on the work so happily accomplished, and on those, of all degrees, from the highest to the humblest, who have had a share in the Centennial observances of our beloved country. It becomes the Church of Christ to enter upon the new period with the determination to fulfil to the uttermost, if possible, the Master's words, her law of work-"Go preach the Gospel to every creature; and lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world. Amen."

REPLY TO THE ARCHBISHOP OF CANTERBURY'S LETTER ON SUBJECT OF A SECOND LAMBETH CONFERENCE.

I received, in common with the other Bishops, a letter from His Grace, the Primate of all England, dated Lambeth Palace, 28th of March, 1876, asking an opinion upon the expediency of convening a second Conference at Lambeth, about the month of July, 1878. To which, after due reflection, I made the following reply:

MY LORD ARCHBISHOF:—In reply to your letter of March 28th, I beg

most respectfully to say that it does not seem to me to be expedient to assemble a second Conference at Lambeth in A.D. 1878.

THE ARCHBISHOP OF CANTERBURY'S LETTER ON DAY OF INTERCESSION FOR MISSIONS.

I have received, in common with all the Bishops, a letter, asking us to join in the Day of Intercession for Missions, which for the last four years has been annually observed. I will only say that my personal preference is for a different day from that appointed, the Feast of St. Andrew, November 30, and while I ask that all who can will unite this year in the observance of the day named, by using one or more of the prayers appointed last year, I trust that in the future one of the Ember seasons of the year may be selected.

LAMBETH PALACE, LONDON, S.E., 24th April, 1876.

My Dear Lord:—A desire has been generally expressed that the observance of a Day of Intercession for Missions, which has been maintained for the last four years, should not be discontinued. It is felt almost everywhere that a blessing from God has followed our prayers. The general opinion appears to be that, for the present, as was suggested by the Convocation of the Province of Canterbury, St. Andrew's Day is the most suitable day to set apart. It has been recommended, accordingly, that Thursday, 30th November, 1876, St. Andrew's Day, be kept for that purpose; or if, for local reasons, that day be inconvenient in some districts, then any of the following seven days.

I have reason to hope that the day will be generally observed in England; and it will greatly add to the solemnity of the occasion, as well as strengthen our unity in Christ, if our brethren throughout the world will unite in

prayer with us.

I beg leave to assure you that, with respect to the Day of Intercession in future years, the fullest consideration will be given to the suggestion recently offered by the Protestant Episcopel Church of the United States.

I have also to acknowledge, with heartfelt gratitude, my appreciation of the unceasing attentions of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese to my personal comfort, assisting me in every way, and making the most generous arrangements for my locomotion in the various visitations. I especially thank my Reverend Brother, the Rev. J. Bloomfield Wetherill, who has acted, with untiring fidelity and generous devotion, as my Chaplain during the past year, in addition to his other important duties.

The changes and chances of this mortal life, which have pressed heavily upon my heart and home, make me conscious of the necessity of "working while it is day." The night cometh when no man can work, and then shall we rest. Oh, brothers of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of Northern New Jersey, let us be more determined than ever to devote ourselves, body, soul, and spirit, to the gracious work of our Ministry, as God hath assigned it to us, that we may meet in peace and hope the Divine Head of the Church, when He cometh, with His holy angels, to take account of our doings, and to judge the quick and the dead.

The income of the Convocation of Newark, for the year just ended, amounts for general purposes to \$1,710.21, a decrease from the preceding year of \$389.48.

The treasurer's account shows a deficit on the 15th inst, of \$70.65 in the funds for the payment of salaries to missionaries.

The great falling off in the receipts will compel the new Executive Board to reduce the missionary appropriations for the coming year at least ten per cent. on \$1,950, the amount now expended, in accordance with Section 5 of Can. XI.

CONVOCATION OF JERSKY CITY.

In accordance with the Canon, I beg leave to present the following Report:

Convocation, having experienced the benefit of more frequent meetings for communion, discussion on Church work, and social greeting, has met every month since the last Diocesan Convention, except during August.

The attendance and active interest of the members have increased. Between 30 and 40 of the Clergy were present at the last meeting, including some of our beloved brethren of the Newark Convocation. Two joint meetings of the Convocations were held, pursuant to resolution of the last Diocesan Convention, alternately in Jersey City and Newark, and were ani-

mated with the same seprit du corps which had existed when we formed one Convocation.

Our financial status and prospects are as encouraging as we could expect in view of the general depression in business circles. Many of the Parishes are embarrassed by the stringency of the times, and yet we cannot deny that more exertion might have been made by some delinquents in behalf of the sacred cause of Diocesan Missions.

If the Parishes would fulfil the recommendation of the Convocation and pay one dollar for each communicant, which can certainly be done by forcible appeal to the consciences of the laity, we would receive ample funds to support our present Missions and enter upon new fields. Often where the ability is greatest the contributions are the smallest,

All moneys for Diocesan Missions are appropriated under direction of Convocation, on the basis of the money contributed and in hand for the preceding year.

For efficient and aggressive work we would heartily recommend the Associate Mission plan which has been before the mind of the Church so long.

What a glorious benevolence it would be if some one would give \$2,000 to secure the purchase of a Clergy house, where three or four Clergymen could live on small stipends, and go forth two by two, as Christ sent his disciples.

We will never succeed as we ought till some such plan is adopted. One or two of our best men are ready to engage in this enterprise when the Clergy house can be secured. God speed the day when it may be done. Who will immortalize themselves by the offer of means to accomplish the proposed plan?

Services are supplied at Fort Lee, St. Luke's, Jersey City Heights, Pompton, Allendale, Franklin, Little Falls, Marion, and West Hoboken, and progress is reported.

Some of the heavy liabilities on the Church of the Ascension have been paid off, and under the ministry of the Rev. Mr. Denniston the congregation and Sunday-school have increased.

The Chapel of St. Justin Martyr, under the care of the Church of the Holy Innocents, is supplied with services.

The Rev. Mr Van Winkle has suspended services in Norwood, and has been placed by the Bishop in charge of the Church of the Atonement, Tenafly. Proper accommodations for Divine Service could not be had at Norwood for the present. Additional contributions have been made to the Building Fund of \$2,500, reported at last Convention, and it is expected that a suitable Church will be begun next spring. Mr. Van Winkle expects to hold services at Closter during the ensuing season.

A new Missionary station has been served at Kingsland. A Committee appointed by Convocation have visited the place and guaranteed to supply services on every Lord's day in the afternoon, the members of the congregation pledging themselves to pay the expenses of rent of hall, and furnishing the same. We have thus precocupied the ground, and intend, with God's help, to hold it.

Owing to the peculiarly unsettled and unsatisfactory condition of Parochial affairs, but a general report is here given. A number of the Communicants above reported are only nominally such. The "Chapel," hitherto constituting a part of the Parish, has been set apart as an independent organization, the building having been removed to a more eligible site in E. Orango. I have transferred to it forty communicants. Of the sum above reported, \$1,156.38 were raised and used for "Chapel" purposes.

It is also in a bad condition financially, its income being about \$200 a year, while the current expenses exceed \$500. The difference up to this time has been made good by Mr. Dimook, but he is now unable to continue his assistance. If necessary, I shall relinquish my allowance, and give my services without compensation. We are also crippled in the Sunday School for want of means. A determined and systematic attempt is being made to build up a Methodist Mission in Haledon by a body of men and women sent out from a very active Methodist Society of Paterson, and this is also discouraging to us, as the neighborhood is not large enough for both. But, on the other hand, the results of my work

among the younger people and children have been most encouraging, and I feel confident that if we can only hold our ground for a while longer, a strong parish can eventually be built up, and to effect this, and as speedily as possible, I shall work to the utmost of my powers.

In recording his tenth Parochial Report, the Rector thankfully acknowledges the marked tokens of Divine favor which, notwithstanding its financial straitness, have crowned it with a larger ingathering of souls than any preceding. We have lost some valued communicants by death and removal, but the number is now over one hundred, an increase of tenfold since Nov., 1866. The contributions reported for these ten years are nearly \$40,000.

The Chapel of our Mission at Allendale was opened for Divine Service on Trinity Sunday, the 10th of June, the Rector officiating. On the second Sunday after Trinity, June 25th, the Bishop, at his visitation, laid the corner-stone and administered confirmation. The first Sunday School services in the village were those of this Mission, begun in the Epiphany season of 1872, and the first religious worship was that of the Protestant Episopeal Church, on the 14th Sunday after Trinity, September 14th, 1873. Fifteen have been baptized, two of whom have already entered the fold above.

CLERICAL REPORTS.

The Rev. Dr. FRANCIS J. CLERC reports as follows in relation to services held at Schooley's Mountain:

By direction of the Bishop, services have been held at Schooley's Mountain during the Sundays in August. The very neat chapel, built there by the contributions of visitors and residents, is at the disposal of the Bishop on alternate Sunday mornings and evenings. It is mostly used, however, by the Presbyterian local organization at all other seasons of the year. The number of Church people resorting thither in the summer is ordinarily large, and their interest has been manifested by liberal offerings these many years. The Prayer-books are still in good condition, which were donated long ago by Mrs. Jacob Le Roy of N. Y., for the free but careful use of the guests at the "Heath House." Occasionally large offerings have been made for Mission work in the neighborhood, and doubtless this will continue to be a favorite resort of Church people. Possibly some arrangements will be made for more frequent services of the Church there in the future.

On the first three Sundays of this month the Rev. Dr. Clerc, of Burlington College, officiated, administering the Holy Communion once. The musical portions of the service were neatly rendered by guests, aiding Mrs. Coleman and her daughter, of the Heath House. A large attendance welcomed the infrequent ministrations of one of our Clergy, and about twenty availed themselves of the opportunity to commune. A parlor service was held also on one Sunday morning and one Sunday evening at Belmont Hall. The pure mountain air and the cooling breeze made even the heated term tolerable there, and some who were present will not soon forget the pleasure of their visit. The Rev. Dr. Boggs officiated, etc., August 27th, the 11th Sunday after Trinity, in the afternoon. The congregation was very small, as most of the visitors had left the mountain.

The Rev. ORLANDO HARRIMAN reports as follows:

My health has been so uncertain during the past year that I have performed comparatively but little clerical work. I have at most only been able to assist occasionally in the offices of Prayer and Holy Communion. I have, of course, no statistics to report.

The Rev. HENRY F. HARTMAN, Ph.D., reports as follows:

I beg leave to report to you as my Bishop that I am in full charge of the English Chapel at Cologne, by the special license of the Lord Bishop of London, in connection with your own, and that the services of the Church are held regularly on every Lord's and festival day, with a weekly celebration of the Holy Communion, all of which have been well attended since I took full charge of the chapel on the first of May last.

The Rev. Julius D. Ross, Ph.D., reports as follows:

I beg leave to be permitted to report to you that since the meeting of last Convention I resigned the position of "Curate" in St. Stephen's Church, Millburn. I continue, however, in the duties of my office, as Principal of St. Stephen's Incorporated School.

I preached during the conventional year in Morristown, Madison, Summit, Newark, and Millburn, altogether 29 times; celebrated the Holy Eucharist in public 5 times; in private, with the sick, twice; married one couple; baptized two infants, and officiated at 8 funerals. I assisted the Rev. Dr. Olover in the services at St. Stephen's Church whenever health and circumstances permitted.

The Rev. G. VAN HORN reports as follows for Sussex Co. Mission:

Families, 12; individuals, 42; communicants, 29; death, 1; burial, 1; confirmed, 4; Holy Communican, administered by the Rev. Levi Johnston, 1; No. of pastoral visits, 85; services, every Sunday once; congregations good. Offerings from all sources, \$145.

There is a prospect of gathering many worthy persons into the Churck on this Mission, although wholly composed of a rural district.

The Rev. Edward H. Van Winkle, Assistant of St. Matthew's Church, Jersey City, reports as follows:

That since his transfer from the Diocese of New York, May 18, 1876, he has performed the following services: He has celebrated the Holy Communion 4 times, and assisted thereat 17 times; has read service 80 times, and assisted thereat 48 times; has preached 26 times; has baptized 1 infant, and married 1 couple.

The Mission of the Holy Communion, Norwood, was in his charge from May 21st to Oct. 1st, inclusive, after which time the services of the Church were discontinued, owing to the want of proper accommodations during cold weather. It is hoped that services will be resumed in the spring, when the Church building will probably be completed.

LEGISLATIVE ACTS.

AN ACT

To Incorporate Trustees of Religious Societies. Approved April 17, 1846. (R. S. 153.)

[The Sections omitted do not apply to the P. E. Church.]

- § 1. Every religious society or congregation of Christians, entitled to protection in the free exercise of their religion by the Constitution and laws of this State, are hereby authorized to assemble at their usual place of meeting for public worship, at any time by them to be agreed upon, giving at least ten days' notice of the time and purpose of assembling, by an advertisement set up in open view at or near such place of meeting, and, when so assembled, may, by plurality of voices of such of the said society or congregation as are present, elect any number, not exceeding seven, of the said society or congregation, to be Trustees of the same; which said Trustees and their successors in office, are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate in law, by whatever name they shall assume, agreeably to the directions of this act.
- § 2. The said Trustees, when they take upon themselves a name, shall certify such name under their hands and seals, and transmit such certificate to the Clerk of the Court of Common Pleas of the County, whose duty it shall be instantly to record the same, for

which he shall be entitled to receive one dollar; and thereupon the said Trustees shall be known and distinguished in law by the name of incorporation so taken, certified and recorded.

§ 3. The said Trustees and their successors shall, by such name of incorporation, be able and capable to acquire, purchase, receive, have and hold any lands, tenements, hereditaments, legacies, donations, moneys, goods and chattels, in trust for the use of the said society or congregation, to an amount in value not exceeding two thousand dollars a year, and the same, or any part thereof, to sell, grant, assign, demise, alien and dispose of; to sue or be sued, implead or be impleaded, in any court of law or equity; to make and use a common seal, and the same to alter and renew at their pleasure.

§ 4. For perpetuating a line of succession in the Trustees of every religious society or congregation, it shall and may be lawful for the members of the said society or congregation to assemble at any time they may think proper, giving notice thereof as hereinbefore is directed for the election of the first Trustees, or for the election of any other Trustee or Trustees, in the stead of those or any of those before elected, in case they see cause for the removal of any of the said Trustees, provided such removal shall not be in less than one year after his or their election into office; and also to fill up the vacancy which may be occasioned by the death or resig-

nation of any Trustee, or his moving out of the limits of the said

society or congregation.

§ 5. Such corporation may elect, annually, or oftener if necessary or expedient, one of their own members to be their president, who shall keep the minutes, and enter the orders, acts and proceedings of the corporation, in a book to be kept for that purpose; who shall have the custody of the common seal, and the papers, deeds, writings, documents and books of or relating to the said corporation; and who is hereby empowered to convene the said corporation, as occasion may require; and in case of his absence, sickness, death, resignation, refusal to act, or moving out of the limits of the said religious society or congregation, then the said office of president shall devolve on the senior Trustee, for the time being, who shall occupy the same until the return or recovery of the President, or the election of another.

§ 6. Upon application to the president, any member of the said religious society or congregation shall have free access to all the papers, deeds, writings, minutes, documents and books of or belonging to the said corporation.

§ 7. Upon the death, resignation, removal or expiration of the office of president, or election of a new one, the common seal, and all the minutes, papers, deeds, writings, documents and books of or belonging to such corporation, shall be delivered to the successor in office, on the oath of the preceding president, or in case of his death, on the oath of his executors or administrators under such pecuniary penalty as the said corporation shall have previously fixed and ordained; to be recovered, with costs, by action of debt, in the name and for the use of the said corporation.

§ 8. The proceedings, orders and acts of a majority of all the members of the said corporation, but not of a less number, shall be

valid and effectual in law.

§ 10. Whereas, some religious societies have held property under charters of incorporation granted by the Government of Great Britain, previous to the Revolution, and doubts may arise whether such estate, so held, will descend and vest in the corporation created under the laws of this State, therefore, be it enacted, that all the estate, real and personal, held in fee or otherwise, in consequence of any charter granted as aforesaid, shall be vested in and held by the corporation that may have been created in the place thereof, in consequence of the act passed the sixth day of March, in the year of our Lord seventeen hundred and eighty six, or the supplement thereto, passed the twenty-fifth day of November, in the year seventeen hundred and eighty-nine, although no transfer of such property shall have been made by the Trustees incorporated by such charter, to the Trustees of the corporation created under the said laws, any thing in such charter or in any law to the contrary notwithstanding.

§ 24. The wardens and vestrymen, for the time being, of every Protestant Episcopal Church, not especially incorporated, shall be Trustees of the same, and a body corporate and politic in law, by such name as the said Trustees shall assume, in manner mentioned

in the second section of this act.

§ 25. It shall and may be lawful for the said Protestant Episco-

pal Churches incorporated under this act, or any of them, to avail themselves of the provisions of the next preceding section of this act, on the certifying their intention so to do, to the clerk of the Court of Common Pleas of the county in which said church or churches may be situate; and it shall be the duty of said clerk instantly to record the same.

§ 26. When any congregation of the Protestant Episcopal Church in this State, duly organized according to the Constitution, and usages of said Church, desire to form themselves into a body corporate, notice shall be given of such intention ten days previously, by an advertisement set up in open view at or near the place where such congregation usually assemble for divine service, designating the day when and the place where they design to meet for

that purpose.

§ 27. The congregation having met at the time and place appointed, the rector or minister, or if there be no rector or minister, or he be necessarily absent, one of the church wardens or vestrymen shall preside at the meeting, and the secretary of the vestry shall record the proceedings of the meeting. The congregation shall then proceed, by a vote of the majority of those present, to designate the corporate name or title by which the church shall be known, which shall be in the manner and form as follows: - "The Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of — Church in — ." The congregation shall then choose two wardens, and not more than ten or less than five vestrymen; and also fix and determine the day, annually, on which new elections of officers shall take place. A certificate of these proceedings, under the hands and seals of the president and secretary of the meeting, shall be transmitted to the clerk of the Court of Common Pleas of the county, whose duty it shall be to record the same, for which he shall be entitled to receive the usual compensation for similar service.

§ 28. The rector, wardens and vestrymen, appointed as aforesaid, shall be a body corporate and politic, in law and in fact, to have continuance for ever, under the same restrictions, and with the same rights, powers and privileges, as are granted to and imposed on trustees in and by the first eight sections and the tenth section of this act; provided nevertheless, if at any time the church be without a minister or rector, the same rights and privileges shall be

vested in the wardens and vestrymen.

§ 29. The rector, wardens and vestrymen, and their successors, or a majority of them, may make such rules, by-laws and ordinances, and do everything needful and requisite for the good government and support of the church; all of which shall be entered in a book to be provided and kept for that purpose; provided, that the said rules, by-laws and ordinances shall not be repugnant to the Constitution and laws of this State or of the United States.

§ 30. The qualification of voters at the annual elections shall be conformable to the Constitution and principles of the Protestant

Episcopal Church in New Jersey.

§ 31. The rector, wardens and vestrymen shall choose a treasurer, who, when called upon for that purpose, shall render a true and just account to the corporation, of all moneys by him received and expended, and pay over the balance which may remain in his hands at the time of settlement, to his successor in office.

§ 32. When a vacancy shall occur in the office of minister or rector, by death, removal, or otherwise, the said wardens and vestrymen (two-thirds of them concurring in the choice) may choose some fit person, duly qualified, to act as minister or rector of said church, agreeably to the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America; and the minister or rector so chosen, shall preside at all meetings of the wardens and vestrymen, and have a casting vote, except the business or question to be decided has relation to personal interest of said minister or rector; provided, in the absence of the president, the wardens and vestrymen may choose a president pro tempore.

§ 33. It shall and may be lawful for any Protestant Episcopal Church in this State, heretofore incorporated, to embrace the privileges of this act, by compliance with and adopting its provisions.

§ 35. It shall be lawful for every religious corporation, which has been created by act of the legislature, or by letters patent, to acquire, purchase, receive, have and hold, any lands, tenements, hereditaments, legacies, donations, moneys, goods and chattels, of the yearly value of two thousand dollars, although such act or letters patent contain a restrictive clause, limiting the annual revenue and income of the said corporation to a less sum.

AN ACT

To incorporate the Trustees for the management and care of the Fund for the support of the Episcopate of the Diocese of New Jersey.

- 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That Charles S. Olden, of Princeton, Mercer county; Daniel Dodd, of Newark, Essex county; Denning Duer, of Weehawken, Hudson county; Thomas P. Carpenter, of Camden, Camden county; John Kean, of Union township, Union county; William N. Wood, of Morristown, Morris county; Anthony Q. Keasbey, of Newark, Essex county, and their successors, being members of the Protestant Episcopal Church, be, and they hereby are, constituted a body corporate, by the name of "The Trustees of the Episcopal Fund of the Diocese of New Jersey," and by that name shall have perpetual succession, and exercise and be clothed with the powers and privileges enumerated in the first section of the act concerning corporations, approved February fourteenth, eighteen hundred and forty-six; and shall be capable of taking and holding by gift, grant or bequest, such property as may be necessary for the purposes of the corporation: Provided, the yearly value thereof shall not exceed the sum of eight thousand dollars.
- 2. And be it enacted, That the object of said corporation shall be the management and care of the fund already provided, together with that which may be hereafter contributed or acquired, and any accumulation accruing thereon, for the support of the Episcopate of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of New Jersey, and the appropriation of the income of the fund for that purpose, according to the directions to be from time to time given by the Convention of the said Church in the said Diocese.
- 3. And be it enacted, That the management of the affairs and concerns of the said corporation shall be, and hereby is, vested in seven trustees, who shall be citizens of the State, and members of the Protestant Episcopal Church; the persons named in the first section of this act to be the first trustees, a majority of whom shall constitute the necessary quorum for the transaction of business;

they shall hold their first meeting at the call of the trustee first named in this act, and shall appoint a president, secretary, and such other officer and officers as they may deem necessary, and no act of the trustees shall be valid unless authorized by a resolution adopted at a regular meeting by the concurring vote of a majority of the whole number, and entered by the secretary in a book of minutes to be kept as a record of their proceedings, which book shall be open to the inspection of the members, for the time being, of the Convention of said Church in the Diocese.

- 4. And be it enacted, That the trustees shall conform to such instructions as may be given to them by the Convention, not inconsistent with the purpose and design of the contributors to the fund touching the disposition of the income of the fund: Provided, such instructions be entered on the Journals of the Convention, and a certified copy of the resolution or resolutions containing the same, be furnished to the trustees.
- 5. And be it enacted, That a statement of the proceedings of the trustees, exhibiting the condition of the funds entrusted to their charge, together with an account of the receipts and disbursements signed by the trustees or by a majority of them, shall be made to each Annual Diocesan Convention, immediately after the organization thereof.
- 6. And be it enacted, That the Trustees may provide By-Laws for the removal of a trustee for good cause; and on such removal may, by a resolution, declare the place vacant.
- 7. And be it enacted, That all vacancies occurring in the Board of Trustees shall be filled by the Diocesan Convention at their next annual meeting thereafter.

Approved February 14, 1860.

A SUPPLEMENT

- To the act entitled "An Act to incorporate the Trustees for the management and care of the fund for the support of the Episcopate of the Diocese of New Jersey," approved February 14th, 1860.
- . 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That the corporation created by the Act to which

this is a Supplement, shall be capable of taking and holding, by gift, grant, devise, bequest, or otherwise, any property in trust for ecclesiastical, charitable or educational objects, appertaining to, or under the control of the Convention, or other ecclesiastical authority of the Protestant Episcopal Church, in the Diocese of New Jersey; and of executing the trust specified by the grantor or donor thereof: *Provided*, The same be not inconsistent with, or contrary to the Constitution, Canons or Laws of said Church.

2. And be it enacted, That this act shall take effect immediately.

Approved March 17, 1862.

A FURTHER SUPPLEMENT


To the act entitled "An Act to incorporate the Trustees for the management and care of the fund for the support of the Episcopate of the Diocese of New Jersey," approved February 14th, 1860.

Whereas, by reason of the increase of Parishes of the Protestant Episcopal Church of this State, it has been deemed necessary by the representatives of that Church in Convention assembled to take steps towards the division of the Diocese of New Jersey; and whereas, in event of division additional Episcopal support will be required, and the fund now held by "The Trustees of the Episcopal Fund of the Diocese of New Jersey," for the support of the Episcopate in the State of New Jersey should continue to be equitably applied for that purpose,

1. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That "The Trustees of the Episcopal Fund of the Diocese of New Jersey," in event of the division of the present diocese of New Jersey into two or more dioceses, shall hold, manage, dispose of and divide the property and funds which may be in their hands and custody for the support of the Episcopate of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the diocese of New Jersey, among the different dioceses of said church, into which this State may be divided, in such manner as the Convention of the present diocese of New Jersey shall in contemplation of division direct for

the support of the Episcopate, in the various parts of the territory now included in the diocese of New Jersey, and the said Convention may also direct the manner in which the reports of said trustees shall be made, and how vacancies occurring in said board of trustees shall be filled.

- 2. And be it enacted, That "The Trustees of the Episcopal Fund of the Diocese of New Jersey," shall have power to receive, hold, manage, disburse and dispose of all contributions, funds and property which may be given them by grant or otherwise, for the support of the Episcopate in any part of the State of New Jersey.
- 3. And be it enacted, That the proviso in the first section of the act to which this is a supplement is hereby repealed.
 - 4. And be it enacted, That this act shall take effect immediately.



CONVENTION ASSESSMENTS.


