- No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the Journal.
- When any member is about to speak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
- 10. No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply) in the same debate, without leave of the Convention.
- 11. At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
- All questions shall be decided viva voce, unless otherwise specially ordered.
- 13. When required by two clerical and two lay deputies, the vote of the Convention may be taken by orders voting separately, and the names shall be entered on the minutes.
- 14. The doors of the Convention shall be open for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
- 15. No member shall leave the Convention without permission.
- 16. In all elections, those persons only, who shall have a majority of allthe votes given, shall be deemed elected; but if in any case more than the required number of persons shall have a majority of votes, the required number of persons having the highest number of votes

shall be deemed elected, and in case of a tile between two or more candidates there shall be a new ballot,

- 17. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone it to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it, or to divide; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
- 18. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgresses the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order, he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
- 19. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate, but any member may appeal from the decision, and on such appeal, no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention.
- 20. All motions to reconsider, or notices, shall be made on the day the vote is taken.
- 21. The Convention shall meet the first day at 10 A. M., and on subsequent days at 9 A. M. On the first day the Morning Session shall continue until 4.30 P. M., with a recess of half an hour immediately after Divine Service. The Evening Session shall begin at 7.80.
- 22. At the close of each Convention, the minutes shall be corrected and approved.

JOURNAL.

TRINITY CHURCH, NEWARK, N. J. May 20, 1879.

This being the time appointed by the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Northern New Jersey for the meeting of the Annual Convention of said Church, a number of the Clergy and of the Lay Deputies assembled for Divine Service in Trinity Church, Newark, at 10 o'clock A. M.

Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. L. P. Clover, D. D., and the Rev. F. C. Putnam. The Rev. Thomas A. Starkey, D. D., said the Ante-Communion Service, the Gospel being read by the Rev. J. N. Stansbury.

The Sermon was preached by the Rev. A. Schuyler, D. D., from the words "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation, to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek."

—ROMANS I, 16.

The Rev. J. N. Stansbury then proceeded with the celebration of the Holy Communion, being assisted by the Rev. Dr. Starkey.

At 1.30 P. M., in the absence of the Bishop, the Secretary called the Convention to order, and proceeded to call the names of the clergy* entitled to seats in the Convention, and the

names of the Lay Deputies* from Parishes which had sent in the Certificates of Election in accordance with the requirements of the Canon, and announced that there was present a Constitutional Quorum, both of the Clergy and of the Laity.

The Bishop being absent, the first business in order was the election of a President; on nomination of the Rev. R. N. Merritt, the Rev. James A. Williams, D. D., was unanimously elected President *pro tempore*, and thereupon took the chair.

The Rev. J. N. Stansbury offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the President be requested to inform our Rt. Rev. Father of the organization of the Convention, express our deep pain at his absence, and assure him of our sympathy and prayers for him in his affliction.

A motion was made by the Rev. Mr. Stansbury to fix the time of adjournment of the Convention at 3.30 P. M., which was referred to the Committee on Rules of Order.

The Rev. H. S. Bishop moved that a committee be appointed to examine and report on the Certificates of Lay Deputies which had not been sent to the Secretary, which was carried, and the Chair appointed the Rev. Dr. Walsh and Messrs. Paul Babcock and Henry W. Miller such committee.

The Rev. Dr. Farrington, Chairman of the Committee on Rules of Order, reported, recommending that the 21st Rule be amended, so as to read, "to adjourn at 3.30 P. M.," instead of "the order of business shall be taken up at 1.30 P. M."

A motion was made to amend by striking out 3.30 and inserting 5 P. M.

An amendment to this amendment was offered, substituting 4 P. M. for 5 P. M, which was lost.

The motion to amend by substituting 5 P. M. was then put and lost.

The original recommendation of the Committee was then adopted.

On motion of the Rev. Mr. Flichtner, the following were appointed a Committee on the Rights of Clerical Members: the Rev. R. N. Merritt, the Rev. Horace S. Bishop and Mr. Charles Colyer.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Walsh, it was

Resolved, That Clergymen of other Dioceses, Clergymen of this Diocese not otherwise entitled to seats, and Candidates for Holy Orders, who may be present, be admitted to honorary seats in this Convention, and that they be requested to hand their names to the Secretary.

Under this resolution the following were present: the Rev. Walter A. Stirling, of the Diocese of New York; the Rev. William R. Earle, of the Diocese of New Jersey; and Mr. J. Hervey Appleton, a candidate for orders from the Diocese of New York.

The election of a Secretary being next in order, the Rev. Dr. Schuyler nominated the Rev. E. B. Boggs, D. D.; the Rev. W. T. Webbe nominated the Rev. W. G. Farrington, D. D.

The Chair appointed as tellers for the *Clerical Vote* the Rev. Mr. Butterworth and Mr. J. V. Cox, and for the *Lay Vote* the Rev. Dr. Starkey and Mr. Paul Babcock.

The name of the Rev. E. E. Butler not being called among the voters, on motion of the Secretary his case was referred to the Committee on the Rights of Clerical Members. The said Committee reporting that Mr. Butler was entitled to vote, it was so ordered by the Convention, and his name was placed on the list of voters.

The polls being closed, and the tellers having retired to count the votes, the Secretary was called upon to read the list of parishes which, under Article 4 of the Constitution, were not entitled to vote, and the names of the following parishes were read: Calvary, Bayonne; St. John's, Dover; Grace, Greenville; St. Mark's, Newark; Atonement, Tenafly; St. John's, West Hoboken.

The tellers for the Lay Vote for a Secretary reported that the whole number of votes cast was 36, of which Dr. Boggs had received 22, and Dr. Farrington 14.

The tellers for the Clerical Vote for a Secretary reported that 45 votes were east, of which Dr. Farrington had received 23, and Dr. Boggs 22; there was therefore no election.

The Rev. Dr. Boggs begged leave to withdraw his name as a candidate for Secretary.

The Rev. Dr. Farrington also withdrew his name as a candidate for the Secretaryship.

The Rev. Mr. Stansbury moved that the rule of order requiring the election of a Secretary be suspended, and the election of a Secretary be postponed until 6 o'clock to-morrow evening.

The Rev. Dr. Starkey offered the following as a substitute:

Resolved, That the Rule of order requiring a ballot for the election of a Secretary be dispensed with, and that Dr. Boggs be elected viva voce Secretary of this Convention.

Which substitute was accepted by the original mover, and on the question being put, was adopted.

The Rev. Dr. Boggs moved that it be referred to the Committee on the Constitution and Canons to amend Canon 1, Title I, so as to enable the Secretary to keep a correct record of the Clergy of the Diocese, in accordance with Title I, Canon 14 of the General Convention; and it was so ordered.

The Secretary announced that he appointed the Rev. James Cameron, Assistant Secretary.

REPORT OF THE JOINT COMMITTEE ON A DIVISION OF THE EPISCOPAL FUND.

REPORT.

The Joint Committee consisting of one clergyman and two laymen from each of the Dioceses of New Jersey and Northern New Jersey, appointed by the respective Conventions of those Dioceses held in May last, with full power to arrange, carry out and complete a division of the Episcopal Fund, upon the basis set forth in the report dated May 18, 1878, made by a Joint Committee of the two Dioceses and reported to, and approved and adopted by each of said Conventions in May, 1878:

Would respectfully report, that on the Ninth day of September last, they made the division of the said fund as set forth in the annexed statement in schedules, and signed the same in triplicate—one copy thereof for "The Convention of the Diocese of New Jersey," one copy for "The Convention of the Diocese of Northern New Jersey," and one copy for "The Trustees of the Episcopal Fund,"

DIVISION OF THE EPISCOPAL FUND.

A Convention of the Diocese of Northern New Jersey was held at Orange in Essex County, New Jersey, on the Mst day of May, 1978.

A Convention of the Diocese of New Jersey was held at Camden in the County of Camden, in said State, on the 28th day of May, 1878.

To each of these Conventions a written report dated May 18th, 1878, was made by a Joint Committee (which had been appointed by previous Conventions of said Dioceses), recommending among other things, that the Episcopal Fund be at once divided between the two Dioceses, upon the following basis:

"Parish Bonds and Assessments of Parishes marked good on the tabular statement prepared by the Joint Committee, shall be apportioned to the respective Dioceses to which the Parishes belong,"

[For this tabular statement see Schedule No. 1, hereto annexed].

"Bonds which are specifically donated to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, and are still in their hands unchanged, shall be apportioned to the respective Dioceses to which the Donors belonged."

"The other securities in the Episcopal Fund shall then be divided so as to make the two new funds equal. The accrued interest upon the Fariah Bonds so marked good, up to April 1st, 1878 and upon the Bonds and Mortgages and the Coupon Bonds (except the Tennessee Bond), up to May 21, 1878, shall be treated as each and be divided equally between the Dioceses."

[For statement of this accrued interest, see Schedule No. 2, hereto annexed,]

"All the Parish Bonds which have been placed by the Joint Committee in the Suspense List shall be handed over to and become the property of the respective Dioceses to which the Parish giving these bonds belongs; and neither they nor the assessed parishes which have been placed by the Joint Committee on the Suspense List shall be taken into account in making the division."

"Any deficiency of salary now due to either Bishop shall be assumed by his Diocese,"

Each of the said Conventions at their said respective sessions adopted the following resolutions:

Resolved. That the Convention of this Diocese approve the report made by the Joint Committee in respect to the division of the Episcopal Fund between the Dioceses of New Jersey and Northern New Jersey, agree to the division proposed, and adopt the basis of division recommended by that Committee in their report dated the 18th day of May, 1878.

Resolved, That a Committee of three be appointed, which, in concert with a similar Committee from the other Diocese, shall have full power to arrange, carry out and complete such division upon the said basis. And that such Committee are authorized to procure all legislation necessary to legalize and perfect such division.

The undersigned E. M. Rodman, George C. Hance and F. S. Conover were by the said Convention of the Diocese of New Jersey appointed upon the Joint Committee provided for by the last of the resolutions above recited and the undersigned R. M. Abercrombie; J. C. Garthwaite and Alfred Mills were by the said Convention of the Diocese of Northern New Jersey appointed upon the said Joint Committee provided for by the same resolution.

The said Joint Committee, thus constituted and appointed, have in pursuance of the powers reposed in them arranged, carried out and completed and now arrange, carry out and complete the said

The Committee on Finance respectfully recommend:

- 2. That an assessment of two per cent. for Convention expenses and other liabilities be made upon the present salaries of the clergy.

Pending the consideration of these recommendations, the Convention adjourned until 7.30 P. M.

TRINITY CHURCH, NEWARK, 7.30 P. M.

Evening Prayer was said by the Rev. R. M. Abercrombie, D. D. and the Rev. Thomas A. Starkey, D. D.

This being the day recommended by the "Lambeth Conference," to be observed as a "Day of Intercession for Missions," a special form of prayer provided by the Bishop was used, and a Missionary Sermon suited to the occasion was preached by the Rev. Henry C. Potter, D. D., Rector of Grace Church, New York, from the words, "For the things which are seen are temporal; but the things which are not seen are eternal.—II Cor., IV, 18.

The President then took the chair, and called the Convention to order.

The Deans of the Convocations of Newark and Jersey City read their Reports to the Bishop for the last year. (See Appendix to the Episcopal Address.)

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Abercrombie, it was

Resolved, That the thanks of this Convention be and are hereby presented to the Rev. Dr. H. C. Potter for his able and eloquent sermon.

On motion of the Rev. J. H. Hobart De Mille, the following proposed alteration in Title I, Canon 6, §I, [1], was referred to the Committee on the Constitution and Canons, viz.: after the words "for Church purposes in general," insert "also the number of free sittings in each Church, with the method of its support."

The Rev. William Richmond moved that the following be referred for consideration to the same Committee: to amend Section 1 of Article 7 of the Constitution so as to read, with one Deputy from each of ten Parishes; also to amend Section 2 of Article 7 to read, or of a majority of the Deputies present from each of two Parishes, which was so ordered.

On motion the Convention then adjourned to meet at 9 o'clock to-morrow morning.

TRINITY CHURCH, NEWARK, May 21, 1879.

Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. F. C. Putnam, the Rev. T. J. Danner, the Rev. W. H. Moffett and the Rev. D. C. Weston, D. D.

The minutes of yesterday's meetings were read, amended and approved.

The Secretary then called the names of the Clergy and Laity who had not answered to their names at the roll-call yesterday.

The consideration of the report and recommendations of the Finance Committee offered yesterday was resumed.

Mr. D. Dodd, on behalf of the Finance Committee offered the following:

Resolved, That an assessment of seven per cent. on the salaries be made for paying the Bishop's salary upon all Parishes which have not given their bonds to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund; and two per cent. on the present salaries of the Clergy, for Convention expenses and other liabilities; and that the Treasurer of the Convention be authorized to appropriate out of the assessment for Convention expenses such sum that may not be necessary for that purpose, if any such there be, as will enable him and the Treasurer of the Episcopal Fund to make up the Bishop's salary of \$5,000.

Which resolution was adopted.

The Secretary then read, by request of the Bishop, his Fifth Annual Address.*

The Treasurer, on behalf of the Finance Committee, recommended that the arrears of assessments for Convention expenses due from the following Parishes be remitted, viz.: Calvary, Bayonne, \$26.00; St. John's, Boonton, \$19.50; St. John's, Dover, \$38.00; Christ, Jersey city, \$26; and Atonement, Tenafly, \$34.00.

And on motion it was so ordered.

On motion, the ballot was dispensed with, and Mr. Henry Hayes was unanimously re-elected Treasurer of the Convention.

The Rev. Dr. Boggs was re-elected Registrar.

The Rev. J. H. Smith and William T. Mercer, M. D., were appointed a Committee to audit the Treasurer's account.

The tellers for the Clerical Vote for the Standing Committee reported that the Rev. James A. Williams, D. D., the Rev. R. N. Merritt, the Rev. F. C. Putnam, and the Rev. J. H. Eccleston, D. D., had received a majority of votes; and, on motion, their election was approved by the Laity.

The tellers for the Lay Vote for the Standing Committee reported that the following had been elected, viz.: Messrs. D. Dodd, J. C. Garthwaite, A. Mills and Jonathan Edgar; and, on motion, their election was approved by the Clergy.

The Chair then announced that the following Clergymen and Laymen had been re-elected:

The Rev. Dr. Schuyler, Chairman of the Committee, presented and read the following:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE CONSTITUTION AND CANONS.

The Committee on the Constitution and Canons respectfully report as follows:

1. Upon the proposed amendment of Sections 1 and 2, of Article 1 of the Constitution, offered for the purpose of interpreting the same beyond dispute, that in their judgment the meaning is sufficiently plain and that the proposed amendments are inexpedient.

- 2. Upon the proposed amendment of Section I [1], Canon 6, Title I, they report their approval, so that after the words "Church purposes in general," near the end of Section I, Subsection 1, these words shall be added, "and also the number, if any, of free sittings in each Church, with the method of its support."
- 8. The Committee also report favorably upon the proposed amendment of Title I, Canon 1, §I. [1], by striking out the words "on or" in the fifth line, and inserting these words, "one week," so as to read that the Bishop or Standing Committee shall, one week before the day of meeting of Convention, deliver, etc.
- 4. Upon the proposition to strike out Subsection 2, of Section I, Canon 1, and insert three different subsections having in view the keeping of a Book of Records by the Secretary of the Convention in which letters dimissory, etc., are to be recorded, the Committee are not prepared, for want of time, to report upon the same, and ask that the proposed amendments may go over to the next Convention.
- 5. In accordance with the resolution found on page 29, of the Journal of 1878, the Committee report the following amendment, by way of additional subsection to Section II, Canon 1, Title I, as follows:

From the said cartificates of Lay Deputies, the Secretary of the Convention shall prepare a roll of the Lay Deputies who appear to be entitled to seats and votes in the Convention.

The roll thus prepared shall be prima face evidence of the rights of the Lay Deputies. But should any dispute arise, it shall be referred to a Committee of one Clergyman and two Laymen appointed by the Convention, who shall decide and report on each case as early as may be; and the decisions thus made, if accepted by the Convention, shall not be called in question again during the same session.

6. It appearing, on page 84, of the Journal of 1878, that the Committee was directed to report upon the proposed Canon on "Convocations and Missions," the Committee report, that in view of the present disability of the Bishop of the Diocese they do not deem it advisable or expedient to make any present change in the missionary organization of the Diocese, and they ask to be discharged from further consideration of the same.

The Committee desire it to be said, as their unanimous opinion, that the fault, or lack of success, is not so much in the missionary machinery of the Diocese as in the Rectors and people of its parishes, either through failure earnestly to present the subject and give the people the needed opportunity, or in the want of interest in the parish which no possible organization can supply.

The above recommendations of the Committee adverse to change marked 1, 4 and 6, being considered, one by one, were adopted; and the proposed alterations of the Canons, marked 2, 3 and 5, and reported upon favorably by the Committee, on motion were agreed to and the said Canons ordered to be thus amended.

On motion of the Rev. H. S. Bishop, the Rev. J. F. Butterworth, Mr. E. S. Renwick and Mr. F. Cantine were appointed the Committee on the rights of Lay members, for this session of the Convention.

The Rev. Dr. Farrington offered the following:

BEPORT.

The Committee on Rules of Order ask the privilege of reporting the following substitute for the present Rule 21:

21. The Convention shall meet the first day at 10 A. M., and on subsequent days at 9 A. M. On the first day the Morning Session shall continue until 4:80 P. M., with a recess of half an hour immediately after Divine service. The Evening Session shall begin at 7:80.

Which substitute was on motion adopted.

Mr. J. C. Garthwaite moved the following, which was carried:

Resolved, That a Committee, consisting of Alfred Mills, Cortlandt Parker and Daniel Dodd, be appointed and authorized to procure Acts of Incorporation of this Convention, and of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund.

On motion of Mr. J. C. Garthwaite, the following Preamble and Resolution were adopted:

WHEREAS, The late Miss Charlotte S. Harrison, of Orange, by her will dated March 30, 1870, constituted the Convention of the Diocese of New Jersey a residuary legatee for its Missionary Work; therefore,

Resolved, That a Committee of three be appointed to confer with the Committee of the other Diocese, and to take such steps as may be necessary to secure the equal division of the legacy.

Under the above resolution the Chair appointed as such Committee the Rev. H. S. Bishop, Mr. J. C. Garthwaite and Mr. C. A. Lighthipe.

The Rev. R. N. Merritt, Chairman of the Committee on Blank Forms, reported progress. The Rev. Dr. Farrington, a member of the same Committee, asked to be discharged from further acting on said Committee.

On motion it was ordered that the request of Dr. Farrington be granted, that the Committee be continued, and that the Rev. G. C. Pennell, S. T. D., and the Secretary be substituted for the Rev. J. Bloomfield Wetherill, absent from the Diocese, and the Rev. W. G. Farrington, D. D., resigned.

The Rev. W. W. Wilson offered the following:

Resolved, That the Committee on Blank Forms be directed to prepare a brief statement of the meaning of the different items in the Blanks for Parochial Reports, and that the same be printed and distributed by the Secretary along with the Blanks for Parochial Reports for the next Convention, and that thereafter a copy of said statement be sent to each new clergyman who may enter this Diocese, on the occasion of his first parochial report.

After some debate, on motion, the above resolution was laid on the table.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Schuyler, the Secretary was authorized to print 600 copies of the Journal of this Convention.

The following motion was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Convention are hereby offered to the Rev. A. Schuyler, D. D., for the sermon preached by him at the opening services of this session of the Convention.

On motion,

Resolved, That the Treasurer pay to the Sexton the usual sum for services rendered.

On motion of the Rev. R. M. Abercrombie, D. D.,

Resolved, That the Secretary be authorized to print a new edition of 500 copies of the Constitution and Canons.

The Rev. J. I. Mombert, D. D., offered the following:

Resolved, That the Committee to procure Acts of Incorporation of the Convention and of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, be also authorized to procure, if they shall think it necessary, an Act of Incorporation of Trustees of the "Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen."

Which was so ordered.

On motion of the Rev. R. B. Hoyt,

Resolved, That this Convention returns its thanks to the citizens of Newark for the abundant hospitality shown its members during the present session.

On motion of the same,

Resolved, That the thanks of the Convention are hereby tendered to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Trinity Church, Newark, for the use of the church, and the conveniences afforded for the transaction of business.

Mr. J. V. Cox offered the following:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Convention are hereby tendered to the Rev. James A. Williams, D. D., for his acceptable services as Chairman of this Convention.

Which was unanimously adopted.

On motion,

Resolved, That after the reading of the minutes, and the usual devotions, the Convention adjourn sine die.

The minutes of this day's proceedings were read, corrected and approved.

After the singing of "Praise God from whom all blessings flow," prayers and the benediction pronounced by the President, the Convention stood adjourned sine die.



THE FIFTH ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

Rt. Rev. William Henry Odenheimer. B. D.,

BISHOP OF THE DIOCESE.

To the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of Northern New Jersey,

Assembled in the Fifth Annual Convention:

BRETHREN BELOVED IN THE LORD:

You well know that I am not, of my own choice, absent from you at this Diocesan Convention, but that the hand of our dear Lord restrains my going out and coming in amongst you, as for almost twenty years it has been my pleasure and privilege to do. You all know how, at the beginning of my severe illness, I came to Burlington for a temporary sojourn, and have been detained from month to month, abiding my Master's will as to the result. But from within these walls my heart has gone forth to every part of my beloved Diocese, with interest strong as ever in its progress and prosperity. And I thank God that He has enabled me to continue its supervision and care, in all but the Spring visitations, which required bodily strength that was not mine to give. For the good work done amongst you this Spring I have to thank my Brother Bishops of New Jersey and Springfield, for the fraternal readiness with which they came to my aid in this

hour of need, and for the efficient services so graciously rendered. There are others of the Bishops who, during my sickness, have kindly given a service on special occasions, to parishes desiring it of them, whose names will appear in my record, and to whom I return sincere thanks. I shall give you a brief summary of the general condition of Diocesan affairs, and of the work that I have been able to accomplish in my own person, with a record of what has been done for me—embodying in all the statistics of the year.

But before proceeding to details of Diocesan work, I ask you to join me in a tribute to the memory of some no longer here, beloved and honored by us all, and for whose good examples we bless God's Holy Name.

The sudden death of my beloved Brother, the Bishop of Louisiana, was a bereavement to me personally, and a great loss to the whole Church. When I saw him in August, just after his return from England, in robust health and full of loving and tender sympathy for me, I little thought that he would be withdrawn before me, from the Church on earth, to the Church triumphant.

And from the Church's Priesthood on earth has gone that great and good and strong man, Reverend James De Koven, "speedily taken away" from the midst of consecrated labors such as few men are able to achieve in a lifetime twice as long, honored and mourned by young and old of all degree.

From our own Diocese we miss the beloved and faithful Priest, Reverend C. M. A. Hewes, of the Church of the Holy Communion, Paterson. An earnest, self-denying and tender pastor, he was precious to the hearts of his flock; to me, he was a loving and beloved son in Christ, growing closer to my heart with every year of intercourse.

From our diocese went forth upon the martyr's path, the noble-hearted, self-sacrificing Reverend L. S. Schuyler, to lay down his life for the sufferers from yellow fever in the South, and to receive from his Lord the greeting "Well done, thou good and faithful servant."

Also the Reverend Ralph Hoyt, Rector of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Fort Lee, a veteran in the Church's service, and an earnest worker in our Diocese, (though not canonically resident) has been called to his reward, and has entered into the rest of Paradise.

I must limit my notice to the clergy who have been taken from us, though we have lost from amongst the laity of our Diocese true and good men, and faithful women, whose record is on high, and in the hearts of those who mourn their departure hence.

I cannot proceed further, my beloved brethren and friends, without saying that while I have lingered here in sickness and suffering, my heart has been cheered and my spirit refreshed and strengthened by the tokens of loving sympathy coming to me from every portion of the Diocese, from my dear children in the Lord, Clerical and Lay; comforting me with the assurance that the heart of my beloved flock still turned warmly towards me through absence and enforced separation. And from both Convocations of my former Diocese of New Jersey have come touching messages of sympathy and love; as well as from my dear old Parish of St. Peter's, Philadelphia, whose affection has outlasted twenty years of separation. All this I acknowledge most gratefully, and heartily thank God who has thus made His face to shine upon me and bring me peace.

Commending you, the Clerical and Lay representatives of the Diocese to the guidance of the Holy Ghost in your deliberations and discussions, I invoke God's blessing upon you all.

Before closing this address I give a detailed statement of such official acts as I have been able to perform. Those by my brethren who have so kindly assisted me are also appended.

CONVOCATION OF NEWARK.

The DEAN of the Convocation of Newark respectfully reports that the Treasurer has received during the past year the following amounts:

It will be seen by these figures that the offerings for the General Fund have fallen off, and that after our Missionaries were paid we were \$74.95 in debt to our Treasurer. This will involve a slight reduction in the stipends of the missionaries, which are already small enough. (Canon 5, \$IV. [1].)

It was feared from the general depression in business, and the great difficulty that many parishes hereabouts find, not merely to pay their pastor's salary, but to give to them the barest maintenance that the mission fund would suffer more than it has. It is a fact that should be placed upon record that parishes which have within the past ten years been among the largest contributors to the mission fund cannot to-day pay much more than one-half of the pastor's salary. Of course, then, our fund suffers from the times.

For the past twenty-five years the Church in New Jersey has been deeply interested in the missions of Warren county. The appeals which Bishop Doane made for his "mountain flock" were both touching and eloquent. During the latter part of his episcopate it is safe to say that nearly two-thirds of all that was raised for missions in the Diocese of New Jersey was spent in this one county. The interest of Bishop Odenheimer in this field was not less than that of his predecessor,

As there had been expressions of dissatisfaction in regard to this work, both in Convocation and Convention, it was thought best to have a Committee of Convocation visit the principal stations of missionaries. The Committee was composed of the following clargymen: The Reverend Messars. Abbott, Smith and Butterworth visited the points under the charge of the Rev. Chas. Douglass. The Rev. Drs. Clover, Boggs and the Rev. S. P. Simpson visited those under charge of the Rev. L. Johnston. The Rev. Dr. Pennell also visited missions in the county of Sussex.

I have only to add that every member of the Committee expressed the opinion that for the honor of the Church and the glory of the Master all the work in this county should be warmly sustained. It may seem hard that one Convocation should sustain what absorbed most of the mission fund of the whole undivided Diocese of New Jersey a few years ago, and do other work besides. Yet we have never found the man who, after having visited the field and given it his study, would think of withdrawing from it our help. Still there are those who cannot be made to feel the interest they should in work that lies along the border of the Delaware river, and our general fund suffers from this cause too.

Again, a large amount is contributed by parishes for the support of special mission work. Four different points are receiving material aid from Trinity Church, Newark. Two are helped by St. Mark's Church, Orange. One by St. Barnabas' Church, Newark. Eighteen months ago a resolution was passed by the Convention urging the Church in this Diocese to devote herself to mission work in the public charitable institutions. Since this time a mission has been established in the Newark City Alms House by the clergy of Grace Church, and in the Soldiers' Home by the clergy of the House of Prayer, where there are not only public services held, but earnest and self-denying ministrations are performed among those upon whom God has laid His afflicting hand. The Rev. Samuel Hall holds stated services in the Morristown Asylum.

We report this work not only to show what is being done within the limits of this Convocation at an outlay of not less than \$8,500,* but also that we may say that while every parish should contribute for the general fund, we cannot expect their offerings to be as large as they were before they engaged in these special works near home,

Of course we have missed the voice of the chief missionary of this Diocese very much in his counsels and appeals this year. How much the influence and the aid of a Bishop are felt in missions it is hard to determine,

But while the hard times, the distance of most of our parishes from the mission field, the opening of local mission work near home, and the disability of our beloved Bishop have operated against our collections for the general fund, we can rejoice that the gifts to this fund alone in these four

counties are as much as the whole State gave thirteen years ago, and are about two-fifths of what this fund of all New Jersey was under the management of the Board of Missions in 1870, '71, '72.

Still, it is important that the out-posts of the Church should be maintained, and that the faithful missionaries, far off, who are doing battle for the Master, should feel that we at home do not forget that they represent us in the contest. While we are giving our thousands for the work of the Lord Jesus in our cities, let us not be contented with giving our hundreds for the country.

CONVOCATION OF JERSEY CITY.

Report of the Draw of the Convocation of Jersey City for the year ending, in May, 1879.

To the Rt, Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese.

SIR:—I beg leave to submit to you my report of the Missionary work of Convocation during the past year. It has been marked by few notes, as you will see, of either improvement or decadence.

The work at Arlington has suffered somewhat by change of missionaries, but is now going on with good promise of success, under the Rev. E. H. Van Winkle. There is a congregation here of fifty or sixty very intelli-

gent people.

The Mission at Fort Lee, which has been discontinued except for a few weeks—since the death of its faithful and zealous founder, the late Rev. Ralph Hoyt—is only awaiting the action of a Special Committee of Convocation preparatory to its resumption. The circumstances of this Mission are peculiar. It is made up of a little flock of poor but faithful souls, owning no building and tantalized by the sight of a closed church in which they had worshipped for twenty-five years, but over which they have now no control. We wish to present them with the building in which they have received their baptism and eucharists during the life-time of a generation. But who will give \$2,500 for a people so poor that they must still depend for the continuance of their spiritual privileges on the love and support of their more favored brethren?

The other Missions continue as before—needing no special mention, unless it be to call attention to the patient zeal of those who labor in them. Besides these Missions there are Parishes within our bounds which need help, but do not receive it; and which may, perhaps, in time cease to exist if left without it. There are also points which might be occupied by a zealous church, and are not occupied; but which soon will be, by others than ourselves, and then by and by we may try to drive the strange birds out of their nests that we may occupy them. It is the old story, but I may be

permitted, I trust, to add a few words.

Two views are entertained of the work of Missions. One is that none should be begun where there is not the prospect of establishing a Parish promising at the outset, speedy permanence. The other view accepts—for Christ's and His poor people's sake—the burden of a long continued care. Which is to prevail? On the answer depends largely our support of Missions. If the former, then in Northern New Jersey we may as well contract our circle of effort at once. If the latter, we must learn, as those who fish for men, to cast our bread upon the waters. There is ample room

for the labor that works on in faith and love; there is little for the outlay that demands an immediate return of interest.

One word more, Rev. Father: It is one which will be just as sure to come from a Missionary Committee as from a Dean of Convocation.

If the clargy and laity establish missionary work by legislation, they are all together, and each one by himself, under the highest moral obligation to support it.

Let this rule obtain among us, and whatever system we adopt we may be sure of one thing—our Missions will not languish.



General—Yellow fever (in the South), \$80.28; total, \$1,841.

I have had the temporary charge of St. John's Church, Bayonne, since March 1, and have held a service there every Sunday afternoon at four o'clock, in addition to the regular morning and evening services at Calvary Church. On the third Sunday in the month morning services, with the administration of the Holy Communion, is held in St John's Church. I cannot give particulars of the condition of St. John's Parish, parochially, as I have not had sufficient opportunity for doing so.

BERGEN POINT, BAYONNE, TRINITY CHURCH.

No. III.

Marriage, Birth and Death returns.

Copy of sections of the law defining the duties of Clergymen, etc.

- BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That every minister of the gospel,. justice of the peace and other persons having authority to solemnize marriages, and the clerk or keeper of the minutes of every religious society in this State, before which any marriage shall be solemnized, shall transmit to the proper officer, as hereinafter designated, a certificate of every particular marriage solemnized before him, within thirty days thereafter, which certificate shall show the name, age, parentage, birthplace, occupation and residence of the parties married, the time and place of the marriage, the condition of each of the parties, whether single or widowed, the name of the clergyman or magistrate officiating, and the names and residences of the witnesses; any clergyman or magistrate neglecting to send such certificate shall be liable to a penalty of ten dollars.
- ***Neglect on the part of those solemnizing marriage to report the same, not only incurs the penalty, but often causes great inconvenience in securing evidence as to questions of legal validity. It is the right of each married person to have this recorded evidence, besides the needs of these returns in the study of social conditions and of the moral as well as the

civic welfare of society. Those in charge of the various religious bodies at their annual, semi-annual or quarterly meetings should not fail to call attention to this duty of monthly report, and to the breach of law and ethics which the oversight involves.



THE Interest on Parish Bonds is payable semi-annually, on the first days of April and October, to Mr. DANIEL DODD, Newark. Parish Treasurers should remit the interest promptly, and not wait for any notice that the money is due.

CONVENTION ASSESSMENTS.

THE assessment, this year, is at the rate of eight and a half per cent. on the Rector's salary, viz: seven per cent. (if no Parish Bond has been given) for the Bishop's salary, to be paid quarterly on the first days of January, April, July and October, and one and a half per cent. for the expenses of Convention, etc., to be paid on or before the first day of February.
