PUBLISHED BY THE CONVENTION.

TITLE I., CANON 1, § II.

OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present certificates of their election in the following form:

[Name of the Church, the place and date.]

This certifies that at a meeting of the congregation of this Church, for the purpose of electing Church Officers and Deputies to the Convention (or for the purpose of electing Deputies to the Convention, if the meeting be for that purpose alone), A. B., C. D. and E. F., being members of the congregation and communicants of the Church, were duly chosen to represent the congregation in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand (or, if two Wardens subscribe, we have set our hands), the day and year above written.

N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary signs, then the signatures of both Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-in-charge or Missionary cannot sign.

The Lay Representation is limited to three Deputies, whose names in full should be carefully and legibly written.

This certificate is to "be transmitted to the Secretary of the Convention at least ten days before the meeting of the Annual Convention." (See Title I., Canon 1, § II.

In order to secure this, the Secretary will forward a blank form to every Parish, and earnestly asks the PROMPT attention of the Clergy.

*** By the terms of the Constitution and Canons, the Deputies must be members of the congregation and communicants of the Church; also contributors to its support, and worshipers in the Church of the Parish which elects them for six calendar months next before the election; and in Free Churches must also have handed in their names as such to the Rector or Minister, in writing, six months before the election. (See Title I., Canon 6, § II, [2].)

- No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply), in the same debate, without leave of the Convention.
- 10. At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
- All questions shall be decided viva voss, unless otherwise especially ordered.
- 12. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote of the Convention may be taken by orders voting separately, and the names shall be entered on the Minutes.

FOURNAL.

CHRIST CHURCH, EAST ORANGE, N. J., May 18, 1886.

This being the time appointed by the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Northern New Jersey for the meeting of the Annual Convention of said Church, a number of the Clergy and Lay Deputies assembled for Divine Service in Christ Church, East Orange, at 10 o'clock, A. M.

The Bishop celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by the Revs. W. W. Holley, D. D., J. Rockstroh and H. S. Bishop.

The Bishop delivered such portions of his Annual Address as did not refer to the Missions of the Diocese.

After Divine Service, the Bishop took the chair, and the Convention came to order.

The Secretary then called the names of the Clergy* entitled to seats in the Convention, and the names of the Lay Deputies† from Parishes which had sent in the Certificates of Election in accordance with the requirements of the Canon, and announced that there was present a constitutional quorum, both of the Clergy and of the Laity.

The income from which amount, besides such assessments as may be collected from Parishes not having given bonds, comprises the annual receipts of the Trustees.

The Trustees have recently received from M. L. Ward, executor of Miss Sarah M. Carman, an old and highly esteemed communicant of Trinity Church, Newark, a legacy of Two Thousand Dollars to be held "in trust for Missions in the Diocese of Northern New Jersey, to be expended under the direction of the Bishop and Standing Committee of said Diocese."

The Trustees urge upon the Parishes above named, who are in arrears and who do not pay their interest regularly, that they shall make some arrangement as to their arrears, and also for the payment semi-annually hereafter, if not of the whole, at least of such part of their interest as they may be able to pay.

The Trustees hold the Missionary Fund of \$2,000, known as the Hanford-Smith legacy.

The Trustees have the sad duty of announcing a vacancy in their number, caused by the death of the late William Vanderpool, one of the original and most useful members of the Board. According to law, the Trustees have filled said vacancy by the election of Mr. Edwin A. Stevens, of Hoboken, to serve until the next regular meeting of the Convention. It will be the duty of this Convention, therefore, to fill said vacancy permanently.

The report of the Standing Committee was then presented and read by its Secretary, the Rev. Dr. Farrington, as follows:

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The Standing Committee respectfully reports that it has held eleven meetings during the past Conventional year.

May 20, 1885.—At this meeting the Committee organized by the election of the Rev. Dr. Frenando C. Putnam as President, and the Rev. Dr. William G. Farrington as Secretary.

July 7, 1885.—At a meeting held this day permission was given to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. John's Church, Passaic, to mortgage their Rectory property.

Mr. HENRY KIERSTED BICKER was recommended for ordination to the

Diaconate.

September 22, 1885.—At a meeting held this day Mr. JOHN C. LORD was recommended for admission as a candidate for Holy Orders.

October 12, 1885.—The Rev. T. G. HARPER, Deacon, was recommended for ordination to the Priesthood.

Mr. WILLIAM PRAIL was recommended for admission as a candidate for Holy Orders.

The Rt. Rev., the Bishop of the Diocese, being present and uniting with the Committee in its action, the boundaries of the two Parishes of St. Mark's Church, Orange, and All Saints' Church, Orange, in so far as they do or can adjoin, were defined and established.

November 9, 1885.—At a meeting held this day permission was given to the Vestry of the Church of the Holy Trinity, Jersey City, to sell the lots on which their Church buildings had been formerly located.

December 7, 1885.—At a meeting held this day the Rt. Rev., the Bishop of the Diocese, being present and uniting with the Committee in its action, all further proceedings in the matter of assigning boundaries to the two adjoining Parishes of St. Peter's Church and the Church of the Redeemer, Morristown, were postponed.

Permission was given to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of the Church of the Redeemer, Morristown, to place a mortgage on the lot selected on South street as the new location of their Church.

Mr. WALTER HUGHSON was recommended for ordination to the Disconsite.

March 8, 1886.—At a meeting held this day the Rev. Edward Riggs, B. A., Deacon, was recommended for ordination to the Priesthood.

March 80, 1886.—At a meeting held this day permission was given to

the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Grace Church, Orange, to mortgage the land on which the Rectory and school building stand.

April 28, 1886.—At a meeting held this day Mr. JOHN KELLER was recommended for ordination to the Diaconate.

May 18, 1886.—At a meeting held this day Mr. Perox John Robotrom was recommended for ordination to the Diaconate.

The Standing Committee would further report to the Convention that in accordance with its instructions as contained in a resolution passed at the Annual Convention of 1884, the Bishop of the Diocese for the time being, and the members of the Standing Committee for the time being, have been duly incorporated as "Trustees of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen."

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON NEW PARISHES.

The Committee on the Admission of New Parishes respectfully report that they have examined the papers referred to them relating to the organization of Christ Church, Short Hills, N. J., and find them to be correct, as follows:

- 1. The authenticated copy of Proceedings of Organization.
- 2. The certified copy of the assent of the Bishop on advice of the Standing Committee to the formation of the parish.
- 3. A certified copy of the Certificate of Incorporation, signed by the Clerk of the County of Essex, and of the Court of Common Pleas.

- 4. An authenticated copy of the Resolution of the Wardens and Vestrymen of said church, promising conformity, etc.
 - 5. Application for admission into union with this Convention.

We, therefore, recommend that Christ Church, Short Hills, be admitted into union with this Convention.

On motion of the Rev. Frederic E. Mortimer, CHRIST CHURCH, SHORT HILLS, was admitted into union with this Convention.

The Rev. T. I. Holcombe presented and read the report of the Special Committee appointed at the last Convention on "Clergy Relief."

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON CLERGY RELIEF.

The Committee appointed to consider the subject of Clergy Relief in this Diocese, have concluded to present to the Convention an amended Canon as a substitute for Canon 1., of Title III., of the Code of Canons.

They desire, also, to submit some of the reasons which they feel should influence the Clergy and Laity to act with decision and energy in placing this matter upon the foundation which its importance demands.

The Canon herewith submitted, while it does not materially change the present status of the "Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen," proposes to secure, in addition, annuities to those of the Clergy who may be entitled to them, under the conditions imposed. It is not intended, however, that this arrangement shall go into effect at once; but it is believed that when the capital fund shall have reached the minimum sum of \$30,000 it will be safe for the Diocese to guarantee an annuity to every clergyman who has attained the age of sixty-five years, and is otherwise eligible.

The justice of making such provision for the Clergy must be apparent to every impartial mind. On general principles of self-interest, to say nothing of moral obligation, it is safe to affirm that no society, civil or religious, can demand or accept from its officers a life surrender, unless it is able and willing to guarantee them a life support. The Church summons men to such services in her armies, and, neglecting their support in old age, she overlooks this vital principle, and exposes herself to the reproach of the world, which is in its generation "wiser than the children of light." And, further, this obligation for the support of the ministry

does not involve the question of ability, inasmuch as this principle is inherent in the very Church idea. For without a ministry there is no Church, and without support there is no ministry. "They who wait at the altar are partakers with the altar."

Your Committee are persuaded that it is entirely practicable to secure the sum desired within the next five years. It is confidently believed that a new impulse will be imparted to the whole subject of "Clergy Relief" in this Diocese by the recent incorporation of a Board of Trustees for the "Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen," and by the passage of a Canon which shall assure annuities to elergymen who have faithfully served in the sacred ministry.

If this substitute for the existing Canon shall be adopted by the Convention, it is suggested that a Special Committee be appointed, whose duty it shall be to solicit and secure contributions to the fund until the desired sum of \$80,000 is realized.

Trusting that this report may commend itself to the judgment of the members of the Convention and may receive their favorable consideration, your Committee propose the following Canon as a substitute for Canon 1., of Title III., of the Code of Canons.

OF THE FUND FOR AGED AND INFIRM CLERGYMEN,

- § I. It shall be the duty of every Minister having charge of a congregation in this Diocese, to make at least one annual collection for the relief of clergymen disabled by age or disease.
- § II. All contributions and donations for this object shall be transmitted to the Treasurer of the Fund, and shall be applied as hereinafter provided.
- § III. All collections and donations received during the Conventional year, shall be subject to the order of "The Trustees of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen," and may be appropriated by said Trustees for the relief of clergymen disabled by age, accident or disease, who, if Rectors of Parishes, have, after the enactment of this Canon, made an annual collection for this Fund, and have been canonically connected with the Diocese for the two years immediately preceding their application for relief, and have spent at least two successive years within the limits of the Diocese in the active discharge of the duties of the Ministry, or in the work of Christian Education. Clergymen to whom appropriations are made under this Section shall be known as "Special Annuitants," and shall not receive more than three hundred dollars in any one year.
 - § IV. The Trustees shall have power to appropriate from the collections

and donations received during the year, a sum not exceeding seventy-five dollars towards defraying the funeral expenses of any elergyman of the Church.

§ V. All appropriations (unless otherwise ordered), shall be payable semi-annually, on the first days of May and November; and all moneys unappropriated at the end of each Conventional year shall be added to the principal of the Fund, which shall be known as the "Permanent Fund," and shall be kept safely invested.

§ VI. All legacies paid to the Trustees shall be used and applied by them agreeably to the terms and provisions of the will under which the money is received; and when not otherwise directed by the donor, the legacy shall be added to the "Permanent Fund," and the income thereof alone used.

As soon as the "Permanent Fund" shall reach the sum of thirty thousand dollars, the Trustees shall grant an annuity to every elergyman who (i) has reached the age of sixty-five years, and (2) has been canonically connected with the Diocese for the five years immediately preceding his application for an annuity, and (8) has been for at least five years of his last term of canonical residence a settled Minister of the Diocese, or a Missionary duly appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority, and (4) has, while thus in charge of a Parish or Mission, made an annual collection for the Fund.

The interest received from the "Permanent Fund" shall be divided equally among the clergymen entitled to receive an annuity under the terms and provisions of the previous paragraph of this Section, and if this interest shall not be sufficient to give to each clergyman the sum of three hundred dollars, then the balance of collections and donations remaining after the "Special Annuitants" are provided for, shall be used to increase the annuity to said sum.

Olergymen receiving an annuity under this Section, which shall in no case exceed one thousand dollars, shall be known as "Regular Annuitants."

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

That they recommend that an assessment be made the current year of seven (7) per cent. on salaries, for paying the Bishop's salary, upon all Parishes which have not given their bonds to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund; and one and one-half (1½) per cent. on the present salaries of the Clergy for Convention expenses, and for other liabilities.

Resolved, That the above recommendation of the Committee on Finance be adopted.

The Rev. H. Goodwin offered the following:

Resolved, That so much of the Bishop's address as relates to the deposition during the last year of Priests and Deacons from the Sacred Ministry of the Church in these United States, be referred to a Special Committee, appointed by the Bishop, to investigate, and to report at the next Diocesan Convention how such depositions compare in per centage with depositions in former years; and whether there be any faulty methods as to the Church's several preliminary steps or conditions of admission to Holy Orders, and if such faulty measures exist, what they are.

It was so ordered, and the Bishop appointed, as such Special Committee, the Rev. H. Goodwin, Rev. C. S. Abbott and Mr. James G. Osborne.

On motion of the Rev. Wm. G. Farrington, D. D., so much of the Bishop's address as referred to Canon 8 of Title I., on Parish Boundaries, was referred to the Committee on the Constitution and Canons.

The Rev. E. L. Stoddard offered an amendment to Article 4 of the Constitution, by which the right of full membership would be given to any Presbyter canonically resident in the Diocese without charge and temporarily waiting employment.

And, on motion of the same, this was referred to the Committee on the Constitution and Canons.

The Committee on a Church Charity Foundation presented the following report:

REPORT.

The Committee on a Church Charity Foundation respectfully report that they find that the charter of incorporation of the Hospital of St. Barnabas, Newark, is, in fact, a Church Charity Foundation; that it is doubtful if a similar act of incorporation could now be obtained; and, further, they are not informed that, with a single exception, any institution in the Diocese desires the benefit of such an arrangement at this time. If any do, it is perfectly possible to consider their connection with that corporation.

The Rev. A. Schuyler, D. D., read the report of the Committee on Alterations of the Prayer-book. (See page 46.)

On motion of the Rev. Mr. Goodwin, it was ordered that the above report be printed for the use of the members of the Convention, and that it be made the special order of the day for to-morrow immediately after the election of the Missionary Committee.

Mr. Charles A. Lighthipe offered the following:

Resolved, That the expenses and board of the Clerical Deputies to the General Convention be paid by the Treasurer of the Diocese.

After various amendments had been made and withdrawn, Mr. N. Niles moved that the above be laid on the table; which was negatived.

Rev. Wm. A. Holbrook moved as a substitute for the resolution of Mr. Lighthipe, that the whole matter of the payment of the expenses of the Bishop and the Deputies to the General Convention be referred to a special committee to report to this Convention after the election of the Deputies.

And the question being put on this substitute it was adopted.

A motion to reconsider was made by the Rev. C. W. Ward, and carried.

The substitute offered by the Rev. Mr. Holbrook was again voted upon, and lost.

The original resolution of Mr. Lighthipe being before the house, the Rev. G. F. Flichtner moved to amend by striking out the word "Clerical" and inserting in its place "Bishop and," which was adopted.

Mr. Edward Todd moved to lay the whole subject on the table, which was not carried.

The amendment of Rev. Mr. Flichtner was then agreed to.

And the resolution as thus amended was adopted, as follows.

Resolved, That the expenses and board of the Bishop and of the Deputies to the General Convention be paid by the Treasurer of the Diocese.

On motion of the Rev. F. B. Carter, it was ordered that the amount to be paid to the Bishop and Deputies under the above resolution shall be limited to \$75 each.

On motion, the Convention adjourned until 9 A. M., to-

By request of the Bishop the Rev. J. F. Butterworth, Diocesan Secretary for the General Board of Missions, then addressed the Convention on the General Missions of the Church.

The Committee on the Rights of Clerical Members reported by their Chairman as follows:

REPORT.

The Committee on Clerical Rights respectfully report that having fully considered the case of the Rev. W. T. Webbe, they are of the opinion that he is not entitled to a vote in the Convention, except under the clause of Article 4, of the Constitution, which provides that a Presbyter shall not forfeit his vote in the Convention when by reason of age or infirmity he is disabled from the active duties of the ministry after having been for five years connected with the Diocese. The Committee find that Mr. Webbe is frequently engaged in clerical duty, but is unable, by reason of age and infirmity, to take full charge of a Parish or Mission, and the Committee, therefore, recommend that, under the clause mentioned, he be recognized as a member of this Convention with the full right of voting.

The Convention then proceeded to the order for the day, being the report of the Committee on Alteration of the Prayer Book, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ALTERATION OF PRAYER BOOK.

The Committee, continued from the last Convention, on alterations in the Book of Common Prayer, deem it unnecessary to report in further detail on the proposed amendments to the "Book Annexed." In their last report they expressed their conviction that, "The changes proposed were too many and too great to be voted into the Prayer Book at any one or two General Conventions of the Church," and they have the satisfaction to believe that this feeling is now largely shared by the whole Church. There is evidently a general drawing back from the position of the last General Convention in respect of the mass of the proposed amendments to the Book of Common Prayer.

And yet the desire still exists for some changes and against a further postponement of them. The demand for shortened services still exists, and there prevails a laxness and irregularity in the services of the Church which can now only be helped by yielding to that demand. The morals

of the Clergy requires it no less than the well-being of the whole body as a Church of law and order.

We, therefore, favor the following changes proposed in the "Book Annexed," and urge their adoption by the next General Convention, to wit:

- 1. That the Minister may omit in the Morning and Evening Prayer, any or all of what precedes the Lord's Prayer and all that follows the Third Collect, except on Sunday mornings when there is no Communion.
 - 2. That Venite (Ps. 95) and Benedictue, may be said or sung entire.
- 3. Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis may be used as alternates for the Canticles at Evening Prayer.
- 4. The Communion Service may begin (except on Sundays when there is one celebration only) with the Collect for the Day.
- 5. The longer Exhortation at the Communion may be omitted, except once a month.
- 6. The Litany may be omitted on Christmas Day, Easter Day and Whit-Sunday.

These changes will not prevent the use of the present edition of the Prayer Book, and can be inserted on a fly leaf in the existing copies.

The Committee recommend the adoption of the resolution appended to this report, which is respectfully submitted.

Resolved, That the report and recommendations of the Committee on Alterations in the Prayer Book be approved by this Convention, and that a certified copy of the same be furnished to the Secretary of the House of Deputies of the General Convention, and to each clerical and lay deputy of the Diocese.

On motion of the Rev. G. M. Christian, the changes recommended by the Committee were taken up separately.

The Rev. Mr. Christian moved that the first proposition be approved.

On motion of Rev. H. S. Bishop it was ordered that speeches on this report be limited to three minutes. The First recommendation of the Committee was then considered and approved.

The Second recommendation was then considered and approved.

The Third recommendation was considered and approved.

The Fourth recommendation was considered and approved.

The Fifth recommendation was then considered and approved.

The Sixth recommendation was then considered and approved.

The report and recommendations of the Committee were then adopted as a whole.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Schuyler, the resolution appended to the report was then passed. (See p. 47.)

The Convention then proceeded with the regular order of business, being the election of a Standing Committee.

The Chair appointed as Tellers for the Clerical vote the Rev. J. H. Smith and Mr. J. D. Toppin, and for the Lay vote Rev. F. Greaves and Mr. John B. Van Wagenen.

The ballots were cast and the Tellers retired to count the votes.

The Secretary of the Committee on the Constitution and Canons, the Rev. Dr. Schuyler read the following:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE CONSTITUTION AND CANONS.

1. On the proposed amendment to the Constitution as to the qualifications of Clergy entitled to vote in Convention, offered by the Rev. E. L. Stoddard:

The proposition is to extend that right to a Presbyter canonically resident without charge, and "temporarily" waiting employment. The Committee deem the proposed change unwise, if not impracticable, on account of the indefiniteness of the meaning of the word temporarily, or of any word that would cover the case.

2. As respects that part of the Bishop's address referred to your Committee, on "Parish Boundaries," and the meaning of the word "Parish" as used in the Canon, your Committee need more time than the Convention in session to examine the question raised, and ask that the same may go over to the next Convention.

3. We recommend the proposed Canon on Clergy Relief as amended in this Committee, in place of Canon 1, Title III., of the Code of Canons.

4. The proposed amendment of Cannon 5, Title I., submitted to the Committee on the Constitution and Canons of 1881 to report thereon, was reported on accordingly in 1882 (see Journal of 1882, p. 49); and the following resolution reported by the Committee was passed:

Resolved, That the proposed amendments of Canon 5, Title I, be referred to the next Convention.

Your Committee are of the opinion that this action of the Convention ended their responsibility in the matter.

The Tellers of the Clerical vote for a Standing Committee reported that the following having received a majority of the votes cast had been elected, viz.: The Rev. Fernando C. Putnam, D. D., the Rev. Wm. G. Farrington, D. D., the Rev. W. W. Holley, D. D., and the Rev. E. B. Russell.

On motion, the order of the Laity confirmed the above election by the Clergy.

The Tellers of the Lay vote for the Standing Committee reported the following as elected: Messrs. Edward A. Walton, Henry Hayes, James G. Osborne and F. W. Stevens.

On motion, the Clergy approved of the election by the Laity. So the following constitute

The report of the Committee on the Constitution and Canons, recommending certain changes in Canon 1., Title III., was then taken up for consideration and its adoption moved by the Rev. Dr. Farrington.

The Rev. John P. Appleton moved to amend by striking out these words in Section III., "if Rectors of Parishes have after the enactment of this Canon, made an annual collection for the Fund;" and also, in clause four of Section VI., the words "and has, while thus in charge of a Parish or Mission, made an annual collection for the Fund."

Which amendments were carried.

The Canon, as so amended, was then adopted as a substitute for Canon 1., Title III., of the Code, as follows:

OF THE FUND FOR AGED AND INFIRM CLEEGYMEN.

- § I. It shall be the duty of every Minister having charge of a congregation in this Diocese, to make at least one annual collection for the relief of clergymen disabled by age or disease.
- § II. All contributions and donations for this object shall be transmitted to the Treasurer of the Trustees of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen.
- § III. All collections, and all donations not limited by the donor, received during the Conventional year, shall be subject to the order of "The Trustees of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen," and may be appropriated by said Trustees for the relief of clergymen disabled by age, accident or disease, who have been canonically connected with the Diocese for the two years immediately preceding their application for relief, and have spent at least two successive years within the limits of the Diocese in the active discharge of the duties of the Ministry, or in the work of Christian Education. Clergymen to whom appropriations are made under this Section shall be known as "Special Annuitants," and shall not receive more than three hundred dollars in any one year.
- § IV. The Trustees shall have power to appropriate from the collections received during the year, a sum not exceeding seventy-five dollars towards defraying the funeral expenses of any clergyman of the Church.
- § V. All appropriations (unless otherwise ordered) shall be payable semiannually, on the first days of May and November; and all moneys unappropriated at the end of each Conventional year shall be paid into a Fund, which shall be known as the "Permanent Fund," and shall be kept safely invested. The interest accruing on the existing capital fund now in the hands of the Treasurer of the Convention shall be permitted to accumulate. All accumulations shall be safely invested by the Trustees of

the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen, and added to the permanent fund until the same shall, with the existing capital fund, reach the sum of thirty thousand dollars.

§ VI. All legacies, and all donations limited by the donor, paid to the Trustees shall be used and applied by them agreeably to the terms and provisions under which the money is received; and when not otherwise directed by the donor, the legacy or donation shall be added to the "Permanent Fund," and the income thereof alone used.

As soon as said Funds shall together reach the sum of thirty thousand dollars, the Trustees shall grant an annuity to every clergyman who (1) has reached the age of sixty-five years, and (2) has been canonically connected with the Diocese for the five years immediately preceding his application for an annuity, and (8) has been for at least five years of his last term of canonical residence a settled Minister of the Diocese, or a Missionary duly appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

The interest received from said Funds shall be divided equally among the clergymen entitled to receive an annuity under the terms and provisions of the previous paragraph of this Section, and if this interest shall not be sufficient to give to each clergyman the sum of three hundred dollars, then the balance of collections and donations remaining after the "Special Annuitants" are provided for, shall be used to increase the annuity to said sum.

Clergymen receiving an annuity under this Section, which shall in no case exceed one thousand dollars, shall be known as "Regular Annuitants."

The Rev. A. Schuyler, D. D., offered the following:

Resolved, That this Convention strongly commends the work already inaugurated for the increase of the General Missionary Funds of the Church to a million dollars, by the enrollment of five dollar subscribers thereto, and that the Bishop be requested to appoint a Treasurer of the Fund for this Diocese.

Which resolution was adopted.

The next business in order being the election of Deputics to the General Convention, the Chair appointed as Tellers for the Clerical vote the Rev. N. Barrows and Mr. P. E. Johnson, and for the Lay vote the Rev. John P. Appleton and Mr. John Stevens.

The ballots were cast and the Tellers retired to count the votes.

On motion the report of the Committee on the Constitution and Canons was next taken up, and the *first*, *second*, and *fourth* of the recommendations of the Committee were agreed to; the Canon proposed by the *third* recommendation having already been adopted (*see pp.* 49 and 50).

The Rev. T. I. Holcombe offered the following:

Resolved, That a special Committee of three Clergymen and two Laymen be appointed to solicit subscriptions for the "Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund," as suggested in the report of the Committee on Clergy Relief.

The Rev. Dr. Spalding moved as a substitute that a special agent be appointed to solicit funds for Diocesan Church work; which was lost.

The original resolution of the Rev. Mr. Holcombe was then passed.

The Chair appointed as such Committee, the Rev. T. I. Holcombe, the Rev. E. L. Stoddard, the Rev. Wm. J. Roberts, Mr. John S. Richards and Mr. H. D. King.

The Tellers of the Clerical vote for Deputies to the General Convention, reported that the Rev. A. Schuyler, D. D., and the Rev. J. N. Stansbury, B. D., were elected and the Clergy had failed to elect two other deputies.

The Tellers of the Lay vote for Deputies to the General Convention reported that Messrs. Cortlandt Parker, Alfred Mills, Henry Hayes, and D. Smith Wood having received a majority of the votes cast were duly elected by the Laity.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Boggs the order of the Clergy approved of this election by the Luity.

The Clergy then proceeded to vote for two Clerical Deputies to the General Convention.

The ballots were cast and the Tellers retired.

Mr. Edward Todd offered the following:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Convention be offered to the Treasurer of the Convention, Mr. Henry Hayes, for his faithful services in the past years, and that he is hereby re-elected Treasurer of the Convention for the ensuing year.

Which was unanimously adopted.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Boggs, Mr. D. Smith Wood was re-elected Registrar.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Farrington, Messrs. Edward Todd and John I. Young, were re-elected the Auditing Committee.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Holley, it was

Resolved, That the Treasurer pay to the Sexton the usual sum for services.

Resolved, That the Secretary be authorized to print 750 copies of the Journal of this Convention.

Resolved, That the thanks of the Convention are hereby tendered to the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen of Christ Church, East Orange, for the use of the church and the conveniences afforded for the transaction of business.

Resolved, That the thanks of the Convention are hereby tendered to the Churchmen of East Orange for their hospitality to the members of this Convention.

Mr. E. S. Munroe moved that an additional assessment of one-half of one per cent. be added to the assessments on the Parishes for Conventional expenses, to enable the Treasurer to pay the expenses of the delegates to the General Convention as ordered by a vote of this Convention (page 43), making the assessment for the year two per cent. for Convention expenses.

It was so ordered.

The Committee appointed at the last Convention to report on a Change of the name of the Diocese (See Journal, 1885, page 44), reported verbally by their Chairman, Rev. G. M. Christian:

First, That a change of name is desirable.

Second, That they propose the name of Newark, instead of that of Northern New Jersey; and offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Deputies to the General Convention are hereby directed to obtain the consent of the General Convention to such change of name.

The Tellers of the Clerical vote for two Deputies to the General Convention reported that no one having received a majority of votes cast, there was no election.

Whereupon the Clergy again voted for two Deputies to the General Convention.

After which the report of the Committee on Change of Name being under consideration, on motion of the Rev. F. B. Carter, the question was divided, and the first suggestion of the Committee was presented as a resolution:

Resolved, That a change of the name of this Diocese is desirable.

The Rev. Dr. Weston moved that the question be postponed to the next Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Cameron moved to lay the whole subject on the table; which motion was not carried.

The Tellers of the Clerical vote for Deputies to the General Convention reported that the Rev. Wm. G. Farrington, D. D., was elected, and that there was still one vacancy to fill.

Whereupon the Clergy cast their votes for one Deputy to the General Convention.

The debate on the question before the house was resumed.

The Tellers of the Clerical vote for one Deputy to the General Convention reported that there was no election.

The Clergy again voted for one Deputy.

The question was taken on the motion of Dr. Weston to postpone; which was lost.

The Tellers of the Clerical vote announced that the Rev. E. L. Stoddard was duly elected.

Mr. Alfred Mills moved that the election of Deputies to the General Convention by the order of the Clergy be approved by the order of the Laity. Carried.

The next business in order being the election of Supplementary Deputies to the General Convention, the Chair appointed as Tellers for the Clerical vote the Rev. F. B. Carter and Mr. J. S. Richards; and for the Lay vote, the Rev. S. H. Granberry and Mr. E. C. Drake.

The ballots were cast, and the Tellers retired to count the votes.

The consideration of the first resolution on the change of name was then resumed.

The Tellers of the Clerical vote for Supplementary Deputies reported that only one had been elected, the Rev. T. I. Holcombe.

The Tellers of the Lay vote for Supplementary Deputies reported the election of Mr. Edwin A. Stevens and Mr. John B. Van Wagenen.

The Convention proceeded to vote for three Clerical and two Lay Supplementary Deputies.

The ballots were cast, and the Tellers retired.

The debate on the change of name was resumed.

The Tellers of the Clerical vote reported that the Rev. Wm. R. Jenvey, the Rev. Wm. J. Roberts and the Rev. Geo. C. Houghton had been elected Supplementary Deputies.

On motion, the order of the Laity approved of this election by the Clergy.

The Tellers for the Lay vote reported that Mr. John I. Young and Mr. George Wurts were elected Supplementary Deputies.

On motion, the order of the Clergy approved of this election by the Laity.

The Deputies and Supplementary Deputies to the General Convention were thus elected as follows:

The Committee on Unfinished Business reported by their Chairman, the Rev. Mr. Jenvey:

That they find that the resolution offered last year by the Rev. Dr Farrington, proposing an additional Section to Canon 7, Title I., to be numbered \$III., as follows:

§ III. When consent to the formation of a new parish has been refused, no second application shall be made until one year after the date of such refusal.

Was not reported on favorably by the Committee on the Constitution and Canons, but was referred for further consideration to the Convention of this year.

On motion the subject was laid on the table.

On motion.

Resolved, That after the reading of the minutes and the usual devotions, the Convention adjourn sine die.

The minutes of this day's proceedings were read, corrected and approved.


After Prayer, the singing of "Praise God from whom all blessings flow," and the Benediction, pronounced by the Bishop, the Convention stood adjourned sine die.

SEVENTH ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

Rt. Rev. Thomas A. Stankey, H. A.,

BISHOP OF THE DIOCESE.

BEETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND LAITY:

Allow me to extend to you my cordial greetings, as we meet again in annual council, and to invoke in behalf of our work the presence and blessing of Almighty God.

Since our meeting one year ago, it has pleased our Heavenly Father to call to the rest of Paradise three of the Bishops of this Church, known and honored by all for personal piety, excellent learning and conscientious devotion to the duties of their sacred office.

The Right Rev. Henry Champlin Lay, D.D., Bishop of Easton, entered into rest September 17, 1885. Distinguished by great genuineness and simplicity of natural character, as well as by devoutness of life, Bishop Lay will be also especially remembered by Northern Churchmen for the manly and independent part he took in aiding to restore relations between the severed portions of the Church at the close of the late war. His death is a loss, not to his Diocese only, but to the whole Church, in whose triennial council he was wont to exert a great and always wholesome influence.

The Right Rev. John Freeman Young, D.D., Bishop of Florida, closed his earthly stewardship on the morning of November 15, 1885, in the city of New York. His field,

which was and is a difficult one, had been worked with the uncomplaining patience, and gentle faith which characterized him. In addition to the possession of these traits, too often, alas, recognized and honored only after their possessor has passed away, Bishop Young had the reputation of being more than usually well informed in the departments of Liturgics and Hymnology. At this time, therefore, we may be permitted to especially mourn his loss.

On the first day of May in the present year, the Right Rev. Charles Franklin Robertson, D.D., Bishop of Missouri, was called to his rest. Dr. Robertson had the reputation deservedly of being industrious, zealous and painstaking as a Bishop, and kindly and sensitive as a man; and the memory of his sad death will be cherished with a certain grave tenderness not only by the people of his Diocese, but by thoughtful Churchmen everywhere.

Of our Diocesan Clergy two have passed away within the year.

The Rev. Henry F. Hartman, Ph.D., died in Cologne, Germany, on the fourth day of November, 1885. It had never fallen to my lot, if memory serves me, to meet personally with Dr. Hartman; although from time to time there had been some brief correspondence between us. Our brother died while in the regular discharge of the duties of his holy office, he having with my consent, and by appointment of the Bishop of London, assumed, some years ago, the duties of Chaplain to the English Church and congregation at Cologne.

The Rev. Thomas G. Carver, D.D., for some years in charge of Christ Church, Harrison, under the Rector of Trinty Church, Newark, passed to his reward on the morning of Septuagesima Sunday, February 28, 1886. To Dr. Carver's courtesy and general culture, to his faithful labors, to the silent uncomplaining way in which he bore long-continued weakness, and finally the more acute suffering which was the

prelude to his death, I wish to bear my loving and grateful testimony.

During the past year the Diocese has been called upon to mourn the loss of several Laymen, more or less influential in its councils.

On the morning of Monday, October 19, 1885, after protracted illness and suffering borne throughout with rare fortitude, and illustrated by exemplary faith, William C. Hicks, of Calvary Church, Summit, was called away to his rest. With what reason the Diocese at large has cause to mourn the loss of one whose voice was ever heard in outspoken earnestness, in behalf of every generous and Christian work, and whose personal gifts and labors kept even pace with his words, you who were his associates for many years, have no need that I should remind you. How serious the loss to me, so often encouraged by his sanguine views of missionary work, and aided by his personal participation in it, no one but myself can know. May he rest in peace.

Another laymen lost to the Diocese this year was Mr. Love, of Rutherford. He lived long enough to see the long struggling Parish, of which he was a zealous vestryman, enter

upon a new and unlooked-for career of prosperity.

Another death we have been called upon to mourn was that of Mr. Ellis Potter, of Madison. For thirty years Mr. Potter had served faithfully as a vestryman of Grace Church in that town; and for the last two years of his life he had held my license as a lay-reader.

Finally, on Easter-day, after a long life of unobtrusive piety, my venerable friend, Wm. F. Albertson, Senior Warden of St. James' Church, Knowlton, fell asleep. In the modest farm house high up on the mountain side, where a narrow ravine begins its abrupt descent to the Delaware river, this fine specimen of a man, country-bred, but with more of true refinement than many another bred in cities, passed the busy years of a life extended to the unusual age of 82 years. "Eagle's Nest," as I had named the place, was the family home, and St. James' Church the spiritual home of his father and grandfather before him. The Church stands on the narrow strip of bottom land that stretches between the foot of the hill and the river bank. It was to him a source of comfort such as few can understand who know only the engrossing interests of city life; and its sacred services brought to him all the Sunday pleasure and relief he asked for. Few of you probably knew him even by sight, but the Church and the dear country-folk at Knowlton will miss my venerable friend.

These, all died in faith. They rest from their labors and their works do follow them.

The growth and prosperity of Parishes within the Diocese have been very marked during the past twelvementh, as is testified to, in part, not only by the large numbers confirmed, but also by the general character and seriousness of the candidates themselves.

Allow me here to address a word of counsel to the Clergy in charge of Parishes with regard to this very important and delicate part of their duty. I mean the accepting and presenting of persons to receive the sacred rite of Confirmation. No doubt it was too much the custom, in the old days, say twenty-five or thirty years ago, to confine the selection to adults, and, as a rule, to those only who had passed through a certain and marked stage of religious experience. That such restriction of the benefits of Confirmation was foreign to the Church's mind and intention is now sufficiently evident to the most casual reader of the Baptismal and Confirmation offices, which present the Apostolic Rite, not as an isolated act of faith on the part of the person receiving it, but as one, in a series of covenant means of grace, which together make up the Church's system of spiritual growth and training. While, however, it is so clear that one wonders how so plain a fact could ever have been overlooked, that children were chiefly in view in the construction of the office as we now have it, the fact remains that in our day, owing to home

neglect or wilfulness on one side and to a disrupted Christianity on the other, a large proportion of our candidates for Confirmation are of mature age, and are drawn from other religious bodies. It is in no spirit of fault-finding that I say that perhaps, as a natural revulsion from the old way, but oftener through carelessness, these have been sometimes received too readily and presented with too little care in preparation. My familiar acquaintance with most of the Clergy in the Diocese enables me to say that I know of few if any among them who have not greatly improved upon the methods of some of an earlier generation, who were careless almost beyond belief in this regard. Indeed it is one of the more encouraging signs which greet us that as a rule so much time and labor are given by our Clergy to proper instruction, both before and after Confirmation. I believe this to be markedly true, speaking generally, of the classes that have been presented during the past year in this Diocese. The interest in the subject is of a purely practical kind, and in saying what I have said it has been in my mind rather to emphasize and deepen an impression, gratefully recognized by me as already existing, than to suggest anything new. These persons presented for Confirmation are the Church's new spiritual growth, the outcropping of the generation which is to take our place before many years have passed away. They should be prepared with scrupulous fidelity for the position which they are to occupy. Instruction of the most careful and conscientious kind should follow as well as precede Confirmation; instruction which embraces sound Church doctrine as well as practical Christian living; for let it never be forgotten that doctrine is the root out of which practice grows. With these two, doctrine and practice, conjoined, never to be separated except with deadly loss to both, do not fail to teach also that systematic and self-denying giving for the promotion of every good work, is at once the evidence and the fruit of the Divine life working in the soul of the Christian disciple.

I have referred to general signs of prosperity in the various Parishes of the Diocese during the year. It is difficult and invidious to particularize. Let a few instances suffice. The congregation at Summit has already outgrown the capacity of its Church building, which needs enlargement. The same thing is true of Christ Church, Short Hills; of St. Luke's Church, Montclair; of Christ Church, East Orange; of St. Peter's Church, Morristown; of St. John's Free Church, Jersey City Heights; of Christ Church, Hackensack, and of Grace Church, Rutherford. Trinity Church, Hoboken, has added Parish buildings to its foundation, and St. Paul's Church, in the same city, has the funds ready to build a Rectory. St. John's Church, Dover, has already secured one. A remarkable instance of liberality is that of a vestryman of the Church in Montclair, who has presented St. Luke's Church with lots valued at \$20,000. In a word, God has been pleased to bless us in many ways of late, for which gratitude is due not in words alone but in that higher expression of thankfulness which takes form in more earnest prayers and labors; in a greater spirit of self-denial; in the consecration of our worldly wealth to His service, and the glory of His name.

It would be less than just not to notice here that several of our Parishes have paid off their indebtedness during the past year and now possess their property unencumbered. Among these I especially mention as worthy of such public recognition the small Parish at Edgewater, which by a great and zealous effort has discharged a debt of \$1,400. All honor to the Rector and his liberal people.

On the 21st Sunday after Trinity of last year it was my privilege to consecrate St. Paul's Church, in Jersey City, after a quarter of a century's unconsecrated use, if that may be indeed said truly of a building which had been so long devoted exclusively to the celebration of Eucharists and the worship of the Triune God. By a supreme effort the Rector had raised the entire sum of nearly \$4,500 which was needed

in order to free the sacred edifice from debt. The venerable Pastor was alone with his Bishop in the chancel, on an occasion so profoundly interesting to him and his people, for the day was Sunday and all his brethren of the Clergy were occupied with their own Parish duties; but he knew that they all rejoiced with him and was content.

St. Paul's Church, in Paterson, has accomplished recently what cannot fail under God to help onward the work of this important Parish in the future. Not only has a long-standing debt of \$8,500 been cancelled, but possession has been secured of the entire plot of ground, on one part of which the existing structure stands. The Parish had previously only a claim upon the actual ground covered by the present moderately sized building. It was thus debarred by the very generosity which first conferred the gift from any future enlargement and consequent increase in strength and usefulness. Happily the Chinese restriction is now removed; and free from debt, and with room to provide for the new demands already pressing upon it, the Parish will become, I trust, a powerful living centre for Church extension in the rapidly growing city, of which it is the mother Church of our Communion.

The Parish at Montclair on Easter morning entirely cancelled its remaining indebtedness of \$6,000. When one recalls the financial condition of St. Luke's Church five years ago this is certainly a remarkable result. The Parish is prosperous in all respects.

Soon after the close of last year's Convention a request for the defining of boundary lines between the two Parishes in Morristown occupied for some time the attention of the Bishop and Standing Committee. The necessity for defining such boundaries at present, and perhaps in the long future also, was obviated by an arrangement satisfactory to both Parishes, by which the Parish of the Redeemer changes the location of its building and secures a new and fine lot of ground n a more central position. There is now ample scope for work in the outskirts of the growing and pleasant city for either Parish that will undertake it.

The case of the Morristown Parishes, together with another which has come up for settlement in the past year, both involving the question of Parish limits, leads me to suggest a review of our Diocesan Canon 8. Title I, with a view to the removal of a certain ambiguity in the wording, that it may be brought into a more clear conformity with the verbal usage of the general Church. I suppose that no doubt really exists in any one's mind as to the meaning of the word Parish as contradistinguished from Congregation. In ecclesiastical terminology as well as historical usage it is, like the correlative terms Diocese and Province, expressive of territorial "A Parish," says Bailev, is a "territory which in ecclesiastical matters is under the charge of a particular Priest." Indeed the derivative meaning of Parishioner as "a sojourner," suggests what may probably be true, viz.; that the primary idea of the Parish was rather of the souls included within, than of the territory bounded by Parochial limits, although always of necessity including the last. However that may be, the word Parish has had its present technical meaning in England for twelve hundred years, and on the Continent of Europe for a much longer time; and this, as I suppose, on the principles of common law fixes the meaning of the word with us.

The Diocesan Canon provides for defining the boundaries of two or more adjoining Parishes or Parochial cures. This use of terms seems to involve one of two meanings; either the word Parish is employed here in lieu of congregation, which would certainly be a misuse of the word, as understood technically and traditionally; or else it is employed to designate a certain local and territorial, but undefined district, of which, in a general way, the Parish Church might be assumed to be the pastoral seat, if not the geographical centre. To speak of establishing boundaries suggests the creation of something, viz., Parishes, which did not exist before, or,

which existed only in name; but the "ascertainment and defining" of boundaries (and the general Canon employs both expressions) signifies to discover and to make distinct by demarkation things already existing in contact with each other, and which are in danger, without such demarkation, of being confused together, because the boundaries between them are not defined.

The uncertainty in the language of the Diocesan Canon consists in the doubt raised as to whether an undefined Parish embraces all the Churches in a particular town or city, sharing the Parochial character among them, and forming together one Parish; or whether each Church in the city has its own actual but undefined territory about it; territory which only waits on circumstances (which are anticipated and provided for by the Canon itself), to be defined. This uncertainty has led and may lead again to misconceptions and embarrassments which a little more clearness and precision in the language of the Canon might avoid.

I beg to commend to your consideration the report of the Committee on Ulcrical Relief. It is a carefully prepared

paper, the result of much and studious thought.

Certainly there is everything in the temporal circumstances which environ the life of the Clergy to call for some action on the part of our Dioceses. In the nature of things it is simply impossible for a clergyman to lay up any thing for old age. An average Living less than that of skilled mechanics, with the social position that forbids economies of a certain kind, leaves a dreary outlook for the majority of the Clergy when age shall overtake them. But this is not all. A clergyman whose life has reached to fifty years, finds it difficult, almost impossible to secure a Parish which will afford him a support. Let me quote the words of an honored layman on this subject: "No matter (writes my friend) if a clergymen has the vigor, endurance, love of work, habits of industry and physical and intellectual force of thirty-five, it is enough that the man is fifty." He is not wanted. How is an evil like this to be

reached ? What knife shall out out this cancer-that threatens the very life of the Church? Threatens its life in that it substitutes an unreal and dreamy, if not utterly selfish fancy, for the sound principle that ought to rule in the selection and placing of Pastors over Parishes. The reform in this matter must originate with the Laity themselves; they must relearn the old lesson, received and acted on in the old time, that the Clergy of the Church are or should be the spiritual fathers of their people; admired, if you will, in their early days; respected and loved, as the family goes on, pari passu, towards middle age; honored and supported with tender veneration in the time of gathering shadows. things the Laity must themselves consider and lay to heart. Meanwhile, some such relief for present troubles, as this report proposes is well worthy of your consideration.

I should altogether fail in duty did I not again urge the interest of all the members of the Church in our two Hospitals and the Home for boys in Summit. The effort to raise funds for the erection of a new Hospital building, or the purchase of the present one in Jersey City, is being prosecuted, and the Hospital itself is conducted in an admirable way, as many will testify.

If God should spare me, I hope in another year to present a systematized plan for the support and endowment of both Christ and St. Barnabas Hospitals; the initial idea being the endowment of a bed by each Parish of the two Convocations; such bed being called after the name of the Parish, which can always claim its use; a bed in Christ Hospital for each Parish in the Convocation of Jersey City, and a bed in the Hospital of St. Barnabas for each Parish in the Convocation of Newark. These endowments could be gradual or not, as the means or inclinations of each Parish decided; and the carrying on of the work of endowment could be entrusted to a Guild under the Rector, in each Parish, whose object should be to interest the members of the congregation in the work. This central idea is thrown out, and commended to your

thoughtfulness; because, even from this time forward, steps could be taken by Rectors towards its carrying out. In doing so they will help their own work, by calling out and fostering the *spirit of work* among their people; besides building bulwarks—each Parish Hospital Guild a bulwark—about our Diocesan Zion.

After the hospitals let me say a word, and a very earnest one, in behalf of the Boys' Home or Orphanage in Summit. I have lately called the Clergy and Laity together in convocation to consider anew our methods for the Christian instruction of the young. The whole subject of Home, Sundayschool and Bible class instruction has been gone over carefully, and the addresses will be found in a pamphlet, which is hereby commended to you for your careful reading. This action grew out of a wish on my part to call the two Convocations together, once or twice a year, to discuss and give effect to such matters of every-day practical importance, as the business character of our Annual Conventions does not give them time or inclination to consider. The first of these matters was the one referred to above, viz., The Christian Instruction of the Young.

The Home at Summit for boys is the living appeal, not the appeal on paper, for the Christian training of the young and the destitute. It is still small, and struggling very hard; still dependent in the main on Summit churchly feeling and kindheartedness. I suppose that this is the history of all things that grow from seed. How long shall we withhold our love from these destitute little children of Christ's Church, who have none but God's people to care for them? I trust not so long that Summit folks will at last grow weary and their hearts faint.

The General Convention, which is to meet in Chicago next October, will have before it one and probably two subjects of more than ordinary importance. Of course I refer to what has been called the enrichment of the Prayer Book, and to the question of the establishment of a court of

appeals for the rehearing of cases where clergymen have been adjudged guilty on ecclesiastical trial. There is no doubt whatever in my mind as to the propriety of a Bishop and his Convention considering together the former of these subjects, that of enrichment. The language of the Constitution of the National Church is as follows: "No alteration or addition shall be made in the Book of Common Prayer, or other offices of the Church, or the articles of religion, unless the same shall be proposed in one General Convention and by a resolve thereof made known to the Convention of every Diocese, and adopted at the subsequent General Convention." As in the language of our own Diocesan Constitution, "the Bishop of the Diocese shall have a seat and vote in the Convention, and shall preside at its meetings," it would seem that no doubt can be entertained as to the propriety and even duty of our considering as a Convention these proposed amendments. The only question that could arise is, "Have these alterations and additions," which were proposed in the last General Convention, been "by a resolve thereof made known to" the Convention of this Diocese. Assuming that this has been done, I venture on one or two suggestions.

It is not enough to say in this connection that the liturgical worship which the Church of God has inherited from the past, is very dear to all of us; that it is enriched already by the most sacred associations, and therefore is not to be lightly altered or disturbed. This popular sentiment is no doubt a very true and a very just one, and is entitled, considered alone, to all fair and even grave consideration. Indeed, few of us perhaps weigh as it deserves to be weighed, the spiritual value of liturgical worship, as that worship affects ourselves and others through associations which traditionally link generation with generation, and age with age; and which personally are bound up with the most sacred memories of vanished years, and departed Christian friends and counsellors.

But beyond this, and may I not say above this, such inheritance of holy worship, is also a trust; a trust received by us

from those who have gone before us; and to be transmitted by us to those who shall come after us. It is indeed a trust which has been added to from time to time, out of the spiritual riches which God conferred; but we may not forget, a trust also which, from time to time, has suffered from the addition of something which could not be counted as enrich-In all this there is no bar or hindrance proposed to the efforts from time to time for real improvement; but only a suggestion of caution and much prudence, and some better assurance than the crude knowledge, and hurried discussions of a brief convention can supply, that the revision when finally accepted, shall be a real enrichment of the Prayer Book. For we may not forget that what is done in this direction must be worthy of being handed down to those who shall succeed us. That these holy offices will be the heritage of the Church in the days to come; that they must meet and satisfy the deepest spiritual needs and express in direct and simple terms, the most sacred aspirations of God's people; and that any and every feature which does but reflect the religious fashion or feeling of the day, and nothing better or more permanent, is an intrusion and a blemish; nay, worse than this, the introduction into worship of some of the very things which the liturgical forms and spirit are designed to guard against and exclude.

It is, I think, to be regretted that in view of this obvious truth so much in the way of change was undertaken at one time; and this more especially when the only instrument for finally perfecting so delicate a work was a body as cumbrous in numbers and complex and variant in its personnel as our General Convention. It would have been better in my humble judgment to take up one portion of the task at a time; let us say for instance the office for the Holy Communion, or the service for Matins and Even Song. Surely for a work so important from every point of view, the time expended for its perfecting would not have been thought too long had it extended to ten or even fifteen or twenty years.

Nevertheless when all has been said that may be said in the way of friendly criticism, it can scarcely be doubted that a revision begun with such general consent and under the pressure of needs induced by the growing density of populations and consequent multiplication of services, will not end fruit-lessly, however checked for a time, or curtailed from its original proportions.

There is unquestionably at this time a generally acknowledged call for shortened forms of Matins and Even Song, to be used on week days; and there is also a very general feeling that the restoration of the last named office to something like its old form in the English Prayer Book would be a real enrichment. Few of us probably approve the latitude of choice allowed in the use of Canticles, but with this exception and perhaps one or two others, the changes proposed in the offices for morning and evening prayer might be accepted with something like unanimity were it not for the opinion entertained by many that each office can only be adopted or rejected as a whole.

I am free to say that it is my hope that the General Convention will not go much beyond this first step at their coming session in Chicago. The assignment of the other portions of the amended book to carefully selected committees, with the right to call in experts as assessors, to further consider them and report at the end of three years, would ensure deliberation and greater attention to the several parts. Surely we can afford to be deliberate. There are some of us who would be glad to see a few restorations made in the Liturgy proper or Holy Communion office; such as would serve to make it in accord in these respects with all other Catholic Liturgies, from the most ancient times of the Christian Church. But it is doubtful whether the times are propitious for such restorations. The hands should be very reverent indeed that touch this great office; and it is a question worth asking, whether in our restlessness we do not forget how wonderfully satisfying these services are to us now, just as we

have them; what fullness of comfort and joy of holy reverence there is in our early and plain Eucharists, and in the same holy service celebrated later in the day and with more accessories of ceremonial rendering and of sacred pomp. Certainly we can afford to wait, and be none the less happy or spiritually lifted up and helped because of the waiting.

The question of a Court of Appeal will probably be a prominent one before the Convention. It is a subject beset with difficulties. The 6th Article of the Constitution of the Church in the United States gives over the mode of trying Presbyters and Deacons to the Convention of each Diocese. Under this provision it might be competent for two or more Dioceses to arrange for the establishment of such a court: but whatever experience the Church has had of such an arrangement is not encouraging. Besides it would seem that for many sound reasons one general system should prevail over the entire country. It has been supposed that the establishment of ecclesiastical provinces would furnish a solution of the difficulty; but any system like the provincial, in order to satisfy a real need, should be the outgrowth of circumstances gradually shaping towards that end, not a merely artificial creation. The question, however, is not one to be discussed here, even if I had the ability. It is only introduced for the purpose of urging the exercise of a calm judgment in a matter so serious. Recent events, too painful to be more than referred to, have awakened an almost morbid feeling in some quarters. Let us make sure that nothing shall betray us into doing anything that may tend to lower the high standard of Clerical character which the Church has alwavs striven to maintain. That must be preserved at any cost save that of justice.

The Convention at Chicago will greatly need the Spirit of Counsel in view of the questions that are to come before it, and the drift and temper of the times. It may need courage also. Let us think of it in this way, and by our prayers and wise and grave action do our share in ensuring that its results may be to the glory of God and the benefit of His Church.

DIOCESAN MISSIONS.

The missionary work of the Diocese during the past year has been carried on with as good results as could be reasonably expected in a field as comparatively narrow as ours is, and which contains so large a proportion of foreign population. By modifying somewhat our methods in Warren county we have secured already a considerable decrease of expenditures; and this year the income has been sufficient to meet all demands made upon the Treasurer, including the payment of the May stipends of the missionaries.

In Phillipsburg the Church is in better condition than for some years past, and the congregation have shewn their zeal and encouragement by supplying at their own expence a new furnace under the building, besides renovating the interior, so that it is now comfortable in Winter and altogether Churchly and attractive.

At Washington the attendance on the services is slowly increasing, and there is a probability that several families will be added as soon as a proper Church building shall be erected. This town, unlike Hackettstown, is a manufacturing centre, and the outlook for the Church is more assuring than at the last named place. It has been thought wise to rent the house until such time as we can provide regular Clerical services in a Church building of our own, for which funds are already provided by the people at Washington and its vicinity, assisted by friends of the work elsewhere. The building will be on our own ground and is not expected to cost more than the Church at Stanhope. It is to be erected this summer.

Hackettstown is given up as a mission station for the present, and until some signs of encouragement invite us, better than any that have met our eyes during the past thirty years.

The Church at Stanhope has now a resident Pastor in the

Rev. Mr. Joralemon, who will celebrate the Holy Communion monthly in Washington, which is served for the present on ordinary Sundays by a Lay reader. The attendance on the services at Stanhope continues to be good, and the people are full of spirit. They have within a year added a lot for a Parsonage to the ground occupied by the Church, for which they themselves furnished the purchase money.

At Bayonne the attendance on the services, already good, is steadily increasing. The people have this year erected a very convenient Sunday School building in the rear of the Church and made other improvements at a cost of \$1,700.

Pamrapo has been served faithfully and self-denyingly through the year by the Rev. Mr. Allan, a Deacon of Long Island, residing in this place. There have been good congregations (by good I mean an attendance of about seventy persons). I confirmed here, at a visitation made in October last, fourteen adults.

The condition of the Church of the Ascension in Jersey City, is about as it has been for a number of years. The Pastor is most faithful; but the field is difficult and the undue size of the building discouraging.

St. John's Church, West Hoboken, for many years a Parish receiving missionary aid from the Diocese, has recently chosen for its Rector the Rev. Mr. Houghton, of Trinity Church, Hoboken. I confirmed nine persons in this Church two weeks ago. The interest here seems very much on the increase, and the people are seriously considering the question of church enlargement, and the erection of a building for the Sunday-school. If this Church can be made a fairly strong centre, it will be a great thing for our work on the hill.

The Church at Pompton, which has had a Parish organization and a vestry for many years, continues necessarily feeble, for lack of surrounding population.

At Mendham, where we have a small but neat Church building, the services are in the main attended and supported by the summer visitors who are coming each year in increas ing numbers, attracted, naturally, by fine scenery and air almost unequalled for salubrity. The Rev. Mr. Johnston has recently secured a house and lot adjoining the Church for a parsonage, at a cost of \$3,500, on which a first payment of \$1,000 has been made.

The remaining Parishes and stations sustained in part by our Board, are Belvidere and Knowlton, under the charge of the Rev. Mr. Douglas; and Hamburgh and Vernon, under that of the Rev. Joseph H. Smith; also Fort Lee Mission, so zealously cared for by Mr. H. F. Ahrens. Most of these stations have small but intelligent congregations, who are devoted in their attachment to the Church, self-denying in labor and devout in life. Indeed there are churchmen and churchwomen in all these places whom I feel a pride in reckoning among my most cherished friends.

Besides these Parishes and stations which have been referred to with more or less particularity, because dependent in a measure upon the Board of Missions for support, there are others in the Diocese not so dependent, to which I must briefly refer, in order to present a full view of the missionary side of our Diocesan activity.

The Chapel at Totowa is prosperous, and pays its way even through these times, although I wish sincerely that the zealous and successful Pastor had a more generous support. The congregation here numbers about 250; the Sunday-school more than 300. The people in this Mission all belong to what is called the working class, and have been from the first liberal and devoted.

Some months ago, the Rev. Joseph C. Hall took charge by my direction, of St. Mary's Church, Halcdon, and reports to me directly. He is doing as well as may be done in a difficult field.

The Rector of Calvary Church, Summit, has within the year commenced to hold services in the small village lying at the foot of the hill below Summit. An attendance of sixty or seventy has encouraged him to make the work permanent; and I am informed that a small chapel is soon to be erected.

At Weehawken, the Rector of Trinity Church, Hoboken, has been holding a service once on a Sunday for nearly two years, besides establishing a Sunday-school which is already quite large. I administered Confirmation in this place two weeks ago to twelve persons, and addressed a congregation of nearly two hundred people. The regular attendance is from sixty to seventy.

I do not refer to the missionary work of Trinity Church, Newark, with particularity, as you are all informed with reference to it.

At Arlington, before my Episcopate began, a Mission had been carried on which was subsequently abandoned. The place was dead. Since then a change has taken place. The village has doubled in population and is growing rapidly. The Rev. Mr. Clayton, of Rutherford, has, by my direction, canvassed the place, where he found from twenty-five to thirty Church families. A subscription of four hundred dollars a year has been made, and more is promised. Services will be carried on here for six months in a room which is being fitted up properly, and the prospects of planting the Church permanently tested.

In Newark, on the west side, somewhere in the neighborhood of Seventh street and South Orange avenue, a Mission should be established without delay. Here is a dense and rapidly increasing population and no Episcopal Church within three-quarters of a mile in any direction.

The German Mission of St. Matthew's is revived under the Rev. Mr. Rockstroh; and I have great hopes of its gradual success at last, under his able and zealous administration.

The more I consider the character of our Eastern field in this Diocese, the more clearly I am of the opinion that missions will be carried on to the best advantage in many cases by the large Parishes in their neighborhood. When such an opening presents itself let some Parish, able and willing to undertake the work, at once occupy the ground, establishing religious services and organizing a Sunday-school. At the proper time a suitable Church building may be erected, generally one portion only of a design, to be added to and completed as need arises. When the work is all accomplished the perfected mission may well continue as a Chapel of the Mother Church. Of course this applies, as has been said, to some, not to all cases. The Church, as it advances away from the larger towns, throws out its skirmishers or occupies advanced positions as it can. This general work must be done by the Diocese, and in doing it the Deans are of the greatest advantage to the Bishop. They can see after and do many things which he cannot or which he should not do, in person. I do not know what I could have accomplished in the West had it not been for the devoted and wise co-operation of the Dean of Newark. His knowledge of the country and people has been simply invaluable. The Dean of Jersey City has also been most helpful, and it gives me pleasure to make this public acknowledgment.

GENERAL CHURCH WORK.

Before concluding let me say an earnest word in behalf of two of our general charities which claim and merit your support. One of these is the American Church Building Fund Commission, which in a quiet way and under conservative management is doing excellent work, and has a claim upon the Church for far more consideration and aid than it receives. The other is our General Missionary Work, Domestic and Foreign. The Domestic field, especially, calls loudly for renewed interest in its behalf. Unhappily a deficiency of means to meet greatly increased demands has lately suggested the possible necessity of measures of curtailment, both of work and expenditure, on the part of the Board. Let the sense of duty to Christ and the Church find an added motive to more

earnest endeavors in behalf of these missions in the recent exhibitions of what Godlessness and unbelief unchecked are capable of doing; and let Christian and patriotic sentiment combine to arouse us to new zeal and liberality in the GREAT CAUSE.

NOTE TO EPISCOPAL ADDRESS.

WILLIAM CLEVELAND HICKS.

At a meeting held at Calvary Church, Summit, N. J., October 22, 1885, the Bishop of the Diocese presiding, the undersigned were appointed a committee to prepare for publication a minute commemorative of the late William C. Hicks. The minute is as follows:

A Deputy to the General Convention, a member of the Board of Missions of the Diocese, a Deputy to its annual Conventions, a Warden for many years of his Parish, he met every duty with the zeal and devotion of a consecrated spirit.

The son of a venerated and honored Presbyter of the Church, a graduate of Trinity College, he was a Churchman by birth and education, and through life the claims of the Church upon his time and talents and means were cheerfully and thankfully recognized.

We recall his stirring missionary addresses, his active and intelligent interest in the welfare of the Diocese since its formation, his generous liberality, his ready sympathy and personal co-operation with his Bishop in the work of the Church, and feel that death has removed one from our midst whose place will not soon be filled.

The presence of two Bishops at his funeral, and the large attendance of Clergy and Laity testified to the hold which he had upon the affections of those who knew him best and sincerely mourn his loss. "Not slothful in business, fervent in spirit, serving the Lord," his life and example, entitle him to an honorable place on the roll of the Church's faithful Laymen.

Reports.

I have received the following reports from the Reverends the Deans of the two Convocations:

CONVOCATION OF NEWARK.

To the Right Reverend the Bishop of the Diocese:

Under the provision of the Canon, I would respectfully report that under your direction I have visited all the mission stations with one exception; some of them have been visited several times.

Hackettstown and Hope have had only occasional services. At Phillipsburgh, Washington, Stanhope, Mendham and St. Phillip's, Newark, the work looks unusually bright. Congregations have been good; offerings improving, and an earnest spirit prevails.

At Stanhope a lot for a Rectory has been purchased. At Mendham a Rectory has been secured; one thousand dollars paid upon it, and it is now being repaired. The efforts of our little flock in Washington have induced the Board of Missions to take a step forward in this Mission, and it is believed that the congregation will be able to worship in their own Church next Advent. The Mission to the Newark Alms House has pursued its blessed work more earnestly than ever before. A Sunday-school was begun last Autumn, and there is every reason to maintain it. Surely these things show a life and devotion, for which we have every reason to thank God.

CONVOCATION OF JERSEY CITY.

To the Right Reverend the Bishop:

In the Convocation of Jersey City four stations have been aided by appropriations from the Board of Missions.

At Christ Church, Pompton, daily services were held as long as the weather was warm enough, with weekly and Holy Day celebrations of the Holy Communion. There have been seven baptisms. The Sunday-school numbers forty, with seven teachers. The Missionary has resigned, and says it it is doubtful whether a resident clergyman can ever again be supported. Pompton is a very small place, and has long suffered from a depression of its businesses interests (iron), from which there appears no prospect of release.

At St. John's, Bayonne, a substantial gain has been made in the erection of a parish building for Sunday-school and like purposes. The services have been well maintained.

The Church of the Ascension, Jersey City, has expended \$5 0 in exterior and interior renovation. The attendance averages about sixty-five, and there is a Sunday-school of 210 scholars with thirteen teachers. There have been nineteen baptisms, and there are thirty communicants. But the Church of the Ascension problem is no nearer solution than ever.

The Mission of the Good Shepherd, at Fort Lee, has been very faithfully served by the Lay-reader, with monthly visits from a Priest to celebrate the Sacraments. Six have been baptized; there are twenty communicants. The offerings have amounted to \$481.89. There is also a building fund of \$173.20 on hand, with an additional subscription of \$140.00 "to be paid when needed." The Sunday-school has fifty scholars and five teachers. It is greatly to be regretted that the Lay-reader asks to be relieved on account of over-work. His hours in New York are very long, and he feels that "the work is too much for him."

A most encouraging outlook is opening just at this time at Arlington, which was one of our mission stations seven years ago. It is on the New York and Greenwood Lake Railroad and is now growing rapidly, It seems very desirable that the services should be reestablished there.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

To the Convention of Northern New Jersey:

Since the last annual meeting of the Diocesan Convention, the Church and Missions have sustained a great loss in the death of one of the most useful members of the Board of Missions, Mr. William C. Hicks. It is a loss deeply felt by us, his associates. Mr. Hicks was very regular in his attendance on our meetings, and took an active part in our proceedings. Full of zeal in the cause of Diocesan Missions, he stimulated by word and example the other members of the Board. Liberal to the full extent of his means, he stirred up others to give liberally. His strong faith in the mission of the Church led him to make light of obstacles that to others might seem almost insurmountable; and, perhaps, made him sometimes over-sanguine of success. If this were a fault it was a fault on the right side, for the Church is more apt to fail for want of faith in the promises of her Lord than from too great trust in His help. It will be difficult to fill his vacant place. He rests from his labors in Paradise, waiting, we may well believe, to hear the words, "Well done good and faithful servant."

The difficulty of finding a clergyman to carry on the work at Washington, in conjunction with other distant points on the line of the railroad, seeming to be insurmountable, the plan of a central home at Washington has been temporarily suspended. The stations at Stanhope, Washington and Phillipsburgh are served by a clergyman and two Lay-readers, candidates for orders, each directly responsible to the Bishop of the Diocese. The plan has been found to work very satisfactorily and with decreased expenditures.

Your Board has deemed it best for the present to rent the Mission house at Washington, with a portion of the land attached, reserving a room to store the furniture belonging to the Mission. This has been done to a reliable tenant for nearly sufficient to pay the interest on the mortgage. This leaves us two building lots on the south side of the property which it is proposed to sell, and apply the proceeds toward paying the mortgage. There will be left a piece of land amply sufficient for building a church. Convinced that no progress can be made in this place without a suitable Church building, your Board has appointed a committee with power to proceed to the erection of a frame chapel. Sufficient money has been paid and promised by the people at Washington and other friends of the work to build an attractive yet inexpensive chapel, after plans approved by the Bishop and the Board, without incurring any debt. When this is accomplished, we shall have at Washington a suitable church with a commodious clergy house, all which when the above mentioned lots are sold, will be nearly free of encumbrance.

The attendance on the services in Washington has improved during the past year under its present Lay-reader, and it is understood that several families are ready to attend the services so soon as a church shall be finished,

At Phillipsburgh, several hundred dollars raised by the people themselves, have been expended in providing a new heater, and in repairs and improvements of the Church building. The Lay-reader in charge has worked efficiently, and the attendance and spirit of the congregation were never better.

The services at Hackettstown have been for the present discontinued, the experience of twenty-five years not seeming to justify, at this time, any further expenditure on that Mission.

At Stanhope, in charge of the Rev. J. C. Joralemon, we have a neat church building free of debt, with an earnest congregation and good attendance on the services, a part of the results of our Associate Mission work. This congregation has lately bought, for a future parsonage, a lot adjoining the church grounds, giving us a frontage of considerably more than one hundred feet.

The Mission at Bayonne, under the Rev. W. M. Pickslay, has increased in numbers, and has within the last year erected at a cost of \$900, raised among themselves, a school building in the rear of the church.

There is nothing calling for special notice in the other Missions aided by the Board. The Missionaries are doing faithful work, and there is a gradual but steady improvement perceptible.

The great cities which contain so large a majority of the entire population of the Diocese, claim more of our attention as missionary ground than they have yet received. The work in them is, indeed, made difficult by the large foreign element. There is, however, a field which would seem to invite our efforts. In the western part of Newark, there is a large and rapidly growing section of the city, quite distant from the existing pariahes, where a Mission of the Church ought to be established, which if aided temporarily by the Board of Missions, would in due time become self-supporting and more than repay to the Diocese whatever might have been expended upon it. The Churchmen of Newark have their hands full in the work already going on, and unaided cannot support such mission. If this important city missionary effort is to be undertaken, the Diocese must largely increase its contributions to the cause.

The financial system of the parish makes strict classification impracticable. The income is derived entirely from the offerings laid upon the altar from day to day (except a trifle for rental, not included in the above report, and during the past year about \$20 from friends outside the Diocese). The people being taught to give always to the utmost of their ability, are not called upon for special offerings, except for the new church building. The items given above (except current expenses, land, building and assessment) are therefore, mainly appropriations actually made by the Rector from the general offerings at the early celebrations; the amount reported as "Communion Aims" being the balance on hand, and therefore, incapable of classification as not yet appropriated. There is also, a large balance in the parish treasury. The cash offerings laid upon the

altar by the congregation during the thirteen months of the existence of the parish have amounted to \$22,784.81. The pressing need of increased church and Sunday-school accommodations has necessitated the concentration of the offerings mostly on parish purposes. During the year, repairs and improvements have been made to the rectory at an expense of \$685. A parish hall for Sunday-school and other purposes, has been built and furnished at a cost of \$1,610. A building site for a new church has been acquired (price, \$4,000), and a substantial stone church is well undarway. The present small church was built some years ago almost entirely at the expense of persons now members of the parish, but on land given by one of them for the purpose of a mission to St. Mark's, the corporation of which parish has not as yet (May 15), so far as the Rector of All Saints' is aware, transferred the property.

The Church population is very small, and the existence of a so-called union service under the suspices of another body of Christians, checks the growth of our service. The attendance has widely fluctuated, from eight or nine to seventy and more worshippers. The Holy Eucharist has been celebrated once a month, and received by from six to twelve communicants. I have gratefully to acknowledge the ready liberality of friends, mostly parishioners of St, Paul's, which has enabled me to defray all the expense connected with this venture. Amount subscribed, \$417.00; amount paid, \$387.00; offertory, \$61.18, amount expended, \$266.64. The remainder has been applied to my services.

RIGHT REVEREND AND DEAR SIR—During the past conventional year I have continued the work at the Newark City Alms House. I enclose à

printed report of the work done during the year 1885. I would suggest that the work could be more efficiently done by one of the resident Clergy of the city of Newark. I am ready to step aside at any time. I have given my services during the year to St. Peter's Church, Morristown.

Having been invited by the sister in charge of St. Hilda's School, Morristown, to give lectures on Church history to the young ladies of the school, I consented to do so and began a course of instruction last Fall and have continued it until the present time. I have been very much pleased with the attention and interest manifested by the young ladies. This school, I believe, may now be considered as firmly established and fast growing in importance and influence, and it must become a power for good in the training of the daughters of the Church. A new and beautiful situation, with a large building in every way well fitted for the purpose, has recently been purchased for about twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000). This furnishes the school with accommodation for sixty (60) boarders. At the present time there are thirty-three (88) boarders and ten (10) day scholars. The school is intended to give a thorough Christian education at a moderate cost. The sisters who have charge of the school do not aim at money making. A child may be educated here (board, laundry and tuition included) for \$250.00 a year. I take the liberty of calling the attention of the Bishop more particularly to this work, because I believe that there are few works in the Diocese more worthy of his care and encouragement.
