TITLE I., CANON 1, § II.

OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present certificates of their election in the following form:

[Name of the Church, the place and date.]

This certifies that at a meeting of the congregation of this Church, for the purpose of electing Church Officers and Deputies to the Convention (or for the purpose of electing Deputies to the Convention, if the meeting be for that purpose alone) A. B., C. D. and E. F., being members of the congregation and communicants of the Church, were duly chosen to represent the congregation in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand (or, if two Wardens subscribe, we have set our hands) the day and year above written.

N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary signs, then the signatures of both Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-in-charge or Missionary cannot sign.

The Lay Representation is limited to three Deputies, whose names in full should be carefully and legibly written.

This Certificate is to "be transmitted to the Secretary of the Convention at least ten days before the meeting of the Annual Convention." (See Title I., Canon 1, § II.)

In order to secure this, the Secretary will forward a blank form to every Parish, and earnestly asks the PROMPT attention of the Clergy.

*** By the terms of the Constitution and Canons, the Deputies must be members of the congregation and communicants of the Church; also contributors to its support, and worshippers in the Church of the Parish which elects them for six calendar months next before the election, and in Free Churches must also have handed in their names as such to the Bector or Minister, in writing, six months before the election. (See Title I., Canon 6, § II., [2].)

 motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose
 name shall be entered on the Journal.
- When any member is about to speak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking, confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
- No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply) in the same debate, without leave of the Convention.
- 10. At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
- All questions shall be decided viva voce, unless otherwise especially ordered.
- 12. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote of the Convention may be taken by orders voting separately, and the names shall be entered on the Minutes.

- 18. The doors of the Convention shall be open for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
- 14. No member shall leave the Convention without permission.
- 15. In all elections, those persons only who shall have a majority of all the votes given shall be deemed elected; but if in any case more than the required number of persons shall have a majority of votes, the required number of persons having the highest number of votes shall be deemed elected, and in case of a tie between two or more candidates there shall be a new ballot.
- 16. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone it to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it, or to divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
- 17. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order, he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
- 18. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate; but any member may appeal from the decision, and, on such appeal, no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention.
- 19. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.

JOURNAL.

TRINITY CHURCH, NEWARK, N. J., May 19, 1891.

This being the time appointed by the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark for the meeting of the annual Convention of said Church, a number of the Clergy and Lay Deputies assembled for Divine Service in Trinity Church, Newark, at 10 o'clock A. M.

The Bishop celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by the Rector of the parish the Rev. L. S. Osborne, the Revs. Archdeacon Abbott and Dr. Schuyler.

The Bishop delivered a charge to the clergy on "moral responsibility," etc.

After Divine Service the Bishop took the chair, and the Convention came to order.

The Secretary then called the names of the Clergy* entitled to seats in the Convention, and the names of the Lay Deputies† from Parishes which had sent in

the Certificates of Election in accordance with the requirements of the Canon, and announced that there was present a constitutional quorum, both of the Clergy and of the Laity.

The Bishop appointed as the Committee on the Certificates of Lay Deputies, the Rev. RICHARD HAYWARD and Messrs. Charles A. LIGHTHIPE and EUGENE V. CONNETT.

The Committee on Rules of Order by the Rev. Dr. Boggs, reported the Rules of the last Convention.

And the Rules of Order as thus reported were adopted.

On motion of Dr. Schuyler, the following were appointed the Committee on the Rights of Clerical Members: The Rev. Stephen H. Granberry, the Rev. Wm. R. Jenvey and Mr. J. B. Van Wagenen.

On motion of Rev. H. S. Bishop, the following were appointed the Committee on the Rights of Lay Deputies: The Rev. A. L. Wood, Mr. I. D. Condit and Mr. Charles A. Norris.

The election of a Secretary being in order, on motion of the Rev. A. Schuyler, D. D., the ballot was dispensed with, and the Rev. E. B. Boggs, D. D., was unanimously re-elected Secretary.

The report of the Registrar was then read.

REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR.

NEWARK, N. J., May 19th, 1891.

The Registrar respectfully reports that he has files of the Journals and Canons of this Diocese and of the Diocese of New Jersey, the Journals of the General Conventions, and Journals of the Dioceses of New York and Pennsylvania, and some other books and pamphlets of more or less interest to the Diocese. All the above are now kept in a book-case on the ground floor of the Insurance building, at the corner of Broad and Mechanic streets, this city, and may be seen there at any time, upon application to the Registrar, whose office is in the same building.

The Secretary read a remonstrance addressed to the Convention from certain parties purporting to be Wardens and Vestrymen of Grace Church, Greenville, Jersey City, protesting against the admission of Lay Deputies from that Parish, on the ground that the legality of the election had been contested and referred for decision to the Bishop, which on his motion was referred to the Committee on the Rights of Lay Deputies.

The Rev. Dr. Holley offered an amendment to Canon 1, Title III. Of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen, which on his motion was referred to the Committee on the Constitution and Canons.

The report of the Standing Committee was read by the Secretary, the Rev. W. R. Jenvey.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The Standing Committee respectfully reports that it has held six meetings during the past Conventional year.

On June 23d, 1890, the Committee organized by electing the Rev. Robert Norris Merritt, D. D., President, and the Rev. W. R. Jenvey, Secretary. A communication was received from the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese, constituting the Committee the ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese from the 4th of June, 1890, to the 3d of October, 1890, the time he was contemplating being absent from the country. An application was received from certain communicants of the church living in East Orange praying for the formation of a new parish in East Orange, to be known as the Church of the Epiphany.

On July 14th, 1890, Mr. Hamilton Schuyler was received

as a candidate for Holy Orders. Permission to form a new parish in East Orange, to be known as the Church of the Epiphany, was denied. The Rev. George Clarke Cox, priest, was received from the Diocese of New York.

On Sept. 8th, 1890, consent was given to the consecration of the Rev. Edward R. Atwill, D. D., Bishop-elect of West Missouri. A letter dimissory was given the Rev. C. M. Conant, Deacon, transferring him to the Diocese of Vermont.

On Dec. 8th, 1890, consent was given to the consecration of the Rev. Henry Melville Jackson, Assistant Bishop-elect of Alabama. Messrs. Frederick Augustine Fothergill and W. H. A. Hall were received as candidates for Holy Orders. Consent to the consecration of the Rev. John W. Chapman, Missionary Bishop-elect of Alaska, was withheld until further information was received. Permission was given the Rev. O. Valentine of St. John's, Bayonne, to sell a portion (50x90 feet) of the lot owned by that Mission.

On February 8th, 1891, the hour of holding the meetings of the Committee was changed from 9.15 A. M. to 9.40 A. M.

On May 19th, 1891, Messrs. C. S. Abbott, Jr., David T. Howell and Wm. C. Hicks, Jr., were recommended to the Bishop as candidates for Holy Orders, and the Rev. Elmer Severance Forbes, Deacon, for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests. Consent was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestry of Christ Church, Bloomfield, to sell a certain portion of their church property. Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev. David Sessums, Assistant Bishopelect of Louisiana. Consent to the consecration of the Rev. Phillips Brooks, D. D., Bishop-elect of Massachusetts, was unanimously refused.

the Convention, and it now devolves upon the Convention to fill the vacancy permanently.

On motion of Rev. Dr. Boggs, Mr. J. L. Blake was elected a Trustee of the Episcopal Fund to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Edward S. Renwick.

Rev. Dr. Boggs, as Chairman, read the report of the Special Committee appointed last year on the arrearages of Parishes in the payment of interest and assessments for the Episcopal Fund.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON THE ARREARAGES OF PAYMENTS FOR THE EPISCOPAL FUND.

The Special Committee appointed by the last Diocesan Convention at the request of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund "to inquire into the condition of Parishes which are delinquent in the payment of interest on their bonds, or assessments, for the Episcopal Fund," and to report to this Convention "with a recommendation of such action as should in their judgment be taken by the Convention thereupon," respectfully report.

The attention of the Committee is called only to those Parishes which by action of the Conventions of 1877 and 1878 were placed on the "suspense" list, and to those which the Trustees of the Fund have reported as in arrears. The suspense list can be found in the Journals of the Conventions of 1877, page 32; and 1878, page 70; and a complete list of Parishes which had given bonds and their respective amounts will be found in the Journal of 1882, pages 32 and 33. It is unnecessary to report them here.

Your Committee have obtained from the Treasurer of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund a list of those Parishes which are in "suspense," and also of those which are in arrears for the payment of interest on their bonds; have consulted with the respective Rectors or Treasurers of such

Parishes, and offer the following recommendations:

First. We do not recommend the cancelling of any of the bonds as worthless, not believing that there are any such.

Second. We do not recommend any reductions in the amount of the bonds, believing that the time will come when nearly if not quite all these Parishes will be able to pay the interest in full on the present amounts.

Third. We think on investigation that as a rule no Parish should be allowed to pay less than seven per cent. on the \$800, that having been the minimum established when the Fund was first created, though since then increased to \$1,000.

Fourth. We recommend that the suspense list be no longer

continued.

Fifth. We recommend the following action in regard to those Parishes which were placed on the suspense list, and which are reported by the Trustees as being in arrears.

SUSPENSE.

BAYONNE, St. John's: Has given a bond for \$800; no interest has been paid on this since the formation of the present Diocese. Your Committee recommend, that the arrearages be remitted and this Parish be required to pay to the Trustees the interest on the bond (\$56) from April 1, 1891.

JERSEY CITY, St. Mark's: The Treasurer of the Fund

holds the bond of this Parish for \$1,500; no interest has been paid on this bond. But \$49 has been paid to Mr. H. Hayes, Treasurer of the Diocese, as an assessment on the Rector's salary, thus ignoring the obligation of the bond. We recommend that all arrearages be remitted and this Parish be required to pay to the Treasurer of the Fund Mr. D. Dodd the interest on \$1,000, at seven per cent. from April 1, 1891.

JERSEY CITY, CHRIST CHURCH: Bond for \$800; no interest has been paid; but last year \$25 was paid to the Treasurer of the Diocese as an assessment, thus ignoring their bond. We recommend that all arrearages of this Parish be remitted, and they be required to pay to the Treasurer of the Fund from April 1, 1891, the annual interest on the bond, viz: \$56.

NEWARK, CHRIST CHURCH: Has given a bond for \$1,200; no interest has been paid since 1876. In consideration of the unsettled condition of this Parish, owing to the debility of its Rector, we recommend that all arrearages be remitted to April 1, 1891, and that further action be deferred for the present.

NEWARK, St. Paul's: Amount of bond \$1,200. We recommend that all arreareges be remitted and the Parish be required to pay the interest on \$800, at seven per cent. from April 1, 1891, viz: \$56.

NEWARK, St. Philip's: The bond of this Parish was reduced by the Convention of 1878 to \$300. No interest has been paid on this. The Parish hopes and expects to be able to pay their interest very soon—probably this year. We recommend that all arrearages be remitted and further action be postponed for the present.

NEWARK, St. Stephen's: We recommend that this Parish be allowed to pay the interest on \$1,000, or on one-half the amount of its bond, up to April 1, 1891, and after that be required to pay seven per cent. on \$1,500—\$105.

PASSAIC, St. John's: Bonded for \$900; no interest has been paid. In consideration of statements that have been made to us by the Rector, we recommend that all arrearages

be remitted to April 1, 1891 and action deferred for the present.

The following Parishes were not placed on the suspense

list, but are in arrears for interest on their bonds:

PATERSON, HOLY COMMUNION: Bonded for \$1,000; no interest paid since April 1, 1882. In view of the present financial condition of this Parish we recommend that arrearages be remitted and further action be deferred until the next annual Convention.

JERSEY CITY, St. MATTHEWS: Amount of bond \$2,500; no interest has been paid on this amount since April 1, 1883. Soon after that, on a statement made to the Trustees of the Fund of the inability of the Parish to pay the full interest, the Trustees consented to accept the interest on \$1,200 until further action. Upon this amount the Parish has paid interest up to April 1, 1887. We recommend that in this case all arrearage be remitted up to April 1, 1891, and the Parish be required to pay from that date the interest on \$1,000 at seven per cent., viz.: \$70, until further action be taken by the Convention.

Newark, St. John's (Woodside): Bond for \$1,000. Has paid no regular interest on the bond since April 1, 1879, but has paid to the Treasurer of the Convention and to the Trustees various sums, as assessments, thus ignoring their bond. We recommend that all arrearages be remitted to this Parish, and it be required to pay to the Fund the interest of seven per cent. on their bond from April 1, 1891—\$70.

NEWTON. CHRIST CHURCH: Bonded for \$1,000. The interest was paid in full up to April 1, 1880, less \$40 remitted then by the Trustees. Since then, by consent of the Trustees, they have been paying at the rate of \$50 a year, and have so paid up to April 1, 1889. We recommend that arrearages be remitted to said last date, and that the Parish be allowed to pay \$50 per year up to April 1, 1892, and after that be expected to pay the regular interest on the bond of \$70.

JERSEY CITY, HOLY TRINITY: This Parish has given a bond for \$1,000 and paid nothing since April 1, 1887. The

Committee know no reason for making any recommendation in regard to this Parish.

It will be noticed that several of the above Parishes which have given bonds, have paid to the Treasurer of the Diocese certain sums as assessments which ought to have been paid as on account of interest on their bonds to the Treasurer of the Fund. This ought to be avoided in the future. Under the Canon the Treasurer of the Diocese has no right to receive moneys for interest for the Episcopal Fund, and the Convention should insist upon obedience to the Canon.

The bonds given for the Episcopal Fund are binding on the Parishes, and the regular payment of the interest is just as much a debt as the payment for the salaries, for fuel, or any other expense, and should be so regarded. We are happy to be able to say that most of the Parishes do so regard them and pay their interest with commendable regularity.

ASSESSMENTS.

A list of the Parishes which have not given bonds for the Episcopal Fund, and are therefore liable to be assessed at seven per cent. on the salaries of their ministers, will be found under the proper heading in the "Schedule" of the Treasurer of the Convention appended to the Journal; with the amounts of assessments and payments of each one. We do not deem it necessary to make any recommendation in regard to these, as there appear to be no arrearages. In explanation of two we would state, that Trinity, Bayonne, and Christ, Belleville, long since paid in full the principal of their bonds; and at the time of the formation of the Diocese voluntarily agreed to be assessed the amounts opposite their names as additional towards the Bishop's salary.

Your Committee, considering this Report as not final, ask to be continued for another year.

We offer the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the recommendations of the Committee on the con-

dition of the Episcopal Fund as regards arrearages on bonds and amount of interest and the Suspense list be hereby approved; and the Trustees of said Fund be authorized to act upon them as set forth in the above report.

Resolved, That the Committee be continued, to report to the next

annual Convention.

EDWARD B. BOGGS, WM. G. FARRINGTON, HENRY HAYES.

The resolutions appended to the above report were adopted.

The Convention took a recess for one hour.

2 P. M.

The Bishop called the Convention to order.

The Committee on New Parishes reported that they had examined the papers of St. James' Church, Newark, found them correct and recommend that the Parish be admitted into union with the Convention.

On motion of the Rev. T. N. Nickerson, Jr.:

ST. JAMES' CHURCH, NEWARK, was admitted into union with the Convention, and the Deputies from that Parish took their seats.

The Rev. Francis J. Clayton offered the following:

Resolved, That the Convention do hereby thank the Bishop for the able and timely charge which he delivered this morn-

ing, and that he be requested to provide a copy for publication; of which at least five hundred (500) copies shall be printed for distribution among the members of this Convention.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Committee on the Rights of Lay Deputies reported.

REPORT.

The Committee on the Rights of Lay Deputies having received the protest of Wardens and Vestrymen of Grace Church, Greenville, Jersey City, against the admission of Messrs. G. A. DeForest, A. Penniston and James Chapman, individually and collectively, as delegates to this Convention, respectfully recommend that no action be taken, inasmuch as the facts are before the Bishop, and to decide upon them now would be to prejudge the case.

The same Committee presented the following

REPORT.

The Committee on the Rights of Lay Deputies, report in the case of St. Mary's Church, Jersey City Heights; that they have examined the papers and find them regular and in due form, showing that the name of the Parish has been changed according to the statute law, from HOLY TRINITY, Jersey City, to St. Mary's, Jersey City. They recommend

the Deputies from said Parish be admitted to seats in this Convention.

A. L. WOOD, CHAS. A. NORRIS.

The recommendation of the Committee was adopted and the Deputies from St. Mary's, Jersey City, took their seats.

The Committee on the Constitution and Canons, to whom was referred by the last Convention an amendment to Canon 4, of Title II, Of communicants removing from one Parish to another, offered by the Rev. Wm. Richmond, with orders to report thereon to this Convention, reported the following with recommendation that it be adopted:

Resolved, That Canon 4, of Title II, be amended by striking out \S II and inserting as follows:

- § II. [1.] It shall be the duty of a Rector to furnish the required certificate, together with a Letter of Transfer, on application, and to make known the requirement thereof to communicants removing either to or from his Parish.
- [2.] In § 1, the phrase "In good standing" shall be interpreted to mean "Not under suspension;" and in the case of a communicant under suspension removing, a Letter of Transfer shall be given stating that such communicant is under suspension; and the Rector of the Parish to which such communicant removes shall be notified of the issuance of such letter.
- [3.] It shall be the duty of the Rector to whom a Letter of Transfer is presented to enter in his Parish Register the name of the communicant presenting such letter with a note of his or her status if under suspension, and to notify the

Rector of the Parish from which such letter shall have been issued of his acceptance thereof.

[4.] The name of a communicant shall be stricken from a Register only on receipt of such notification of acceptance in another Parish or in case of death; and the name of a communicant removing from a Parish shall not be entered as a communicant in the Register of the Parish to which he or she shall have removed until a Letter of Transfer shall have been presented.

It was ordered that the proposed Canons be considered by sub-sections.

- [1.] Was considered and not concurred in.
- [2.] Was next considered and a motion to refer the whole matter back to the Committee on Constitution and Canons for further consideration, was lost.

On motion of the Rev. Mr. Bennitt, the whole subject was laid on the table.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons also reported favorably on the amendment offered at the Jast Convention by the Rev. Wm. Richmond, to Canon 2, § II, of Title I, Of elections, and offered the following:

Resolved, That Canon 2 of Title I, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

In all elections for which provision is not otherwise specifically made in the Constitution or Canons, the vote shall be by ballot; the Clergy voting individually and the Lay Deputies by Parishes; and a majority of all the votes cast by both

orders collectively shall be necessary to an election; provided, however, that by unanimous consent the ballot may be dispensed with, and an election may be made by viva voce vote of a majority of all the individual members of the Convention present and entitled to vote.

Which was adopted, and Canon 2 of Title I is so altered.

The Secretary on behalf of the Special Committee appointed by the last Convention on amendments of § II of Canon 6 of Title I, Of the Election of Church Officers, read their report, together with further suggestions offered by one of their number, who concurred in the report itself.

REPORT.

The Special Committee appointed at the last Annual Convention to prepare an amendment to §II. of Canon 6, of Title I. of the Code, respectfully report the following substitute for §II. of said Canon:

CANON 6.

SEC. II. In every church there shall be divine service on the day of the election of Church Officers, immediately before the election is held.

SEC. III. At the annual Parish meeting on the day fixed by the Charter or Act of Incorporation (of which due notice shall be given) the parishoners who are qualified and entitled to vote as prescribed in this canon, shall elect, by a majority of votes cast, three deputies and three alternates to the Diocesan Convention, and a Vestry, to consist of two wardens, one to be called the Senior, the other the Junior warden, who shall be communicants not under suspension; and of not more than ten nor less than five vestrymen. When the

rector by the Church Charter has the right to appoint one warden, he shall be called the Senior warden and only one warden shall be elected.

SEC. IV. Those who shall be entitled to vote at any Parish meeting, or be eligible to any office of the Parish, shall be baptized male persons, of full age, accustomed to attend divine worship in the Parish church, who belong to one of the following classes, and have been so connected with the Parish for at least six calendar months immediately preceding the meeting or election:

Class 1. All who hold a sitting in the Parish church and have paid the rent due thereon to the beginning of the quarter in which the meeting or election is held, or,

Class 2. In a church where the seats are not rented, all who have by subscription or other written contract agreed to contribute to the current expenses of said Parish in the mode for raising the same adopted therein and have paid the amount of their said agreed-upon contribution due at the beginning of the quarter in which the meeting or election is held. The names of the persons agreeing as aforesaid and the date of their contract shall be duly recorded by the Secretary or Clerk of the Vestry in a book to be provided for that purpose.

SEC. V. A list of such persons as are entitled to vote at any meeting or election in any Parish shall be made and signed by its treasurer, rector or minister in charge if any, and the wardens, or by a majority of such persons, at least ten days before such meeting or election, and shall be open to inspection in the vestry room of said church until the same. It shall be prima facis evidence of the right to vote of persons whose names are thereon, subject, however, to challenge thereof, or to addition at the time of such meeting or election; in which cases the rector or president of the Parish meeting shall decide in the first instance, but, on appeal from such decision, the majority of legal voters present, named on said list, shall finally determine.

If no such list of voters shall have been made as above required, the election shall nevertheless proceed, unless ten persons having the qualifications aforesaid then and there present shall demand such list, in which case another meeting shall be had to fill the vacancies created by such default to elect, under the statute of New Jersey supplemental to the act to incorporate trustees of religious societies, approved March 22, 1883.

SEC. VI. No one shall have the right to vote in more than one Parish in this Diocese.

SEC. VII. No provision of this canon shall apply to any Parish with whose Charter or Act of Incorporation such provision shall conflict.

The subscriber, acting for himself alone, suggests two additions to the amendment proposed, too important not to be mentioned, and yet too novel for the Committee to recommend.

First—In Section IV. add: "Class 3. All communicants not under suspension, who have been admitted as such by confirmation in that Parish, or received by the minister on a regular certificate from another Parish, or on their own written request."

This is Class No. 1, in the canon regulating election of Church Officers in the Diocese of New Jersey.

Second—Add as Section VII., making Section VII. as reported Section VIII., the following:

SEC. VII. The manner of voting at such election shall be as follows: The president of such meeting shall first call for

nominations, and as each thereof shall be made, tellers by him appointed shall write the names of those nominated one under the other upon a sheet of paper, which shall be provided by the secretary or clerk and lie on his table; said names to be written nearest to the left hand side of said paper, leaving a sufficient margin at the right of the name of each candidate, or below, and between his name and that next in order, for voters to designate their choice as hereinafter directed. After five minutes, nominations shall be closed. and so declared by the president, whereupon each voter shall vote by making a cross + upon said list opposite each name he may select, till he has voted for as many of such persons nominated as are to be chosen for the offices to be filled. Twenty minutes or more, if the president or meeting shall direct, shall be given wherein to vote. At the expiration of such time the tellers shall proceed to count the crosses made beside each name placed on nomination, and the person or persons having a majority of all such shall be reported by said tellers and declared by said president to be elected.

It is suggested that this system, adopted heretofore in some parishes, involving less trouble than the ballot, and free from the objections to a secret vote, which are peculiarly applicable, to meetings for election by religious bodies, may tend to check the occurrence of contested elections, events so detrimental to religion, to the repute of churches, and to that of the Church at large. The scheme resembles the system of Australia, lately adopted in Massachusetts, Great Britain, and partially in New Jersey.

CORTLANDT PARKER.

On motion it was ordered that the proposed substitute be considered by sections.

SEC. II was adopted as above.

Sec. III being under consideration, the Rev. Dr. Boggs moved the following amendments:

In Section III, second line, strike out the word "due," and in third line after the word "given," insert "ten days previously by an advertisement set up in open view, on the door of their usual place of worship."

In Section IV, Class 1, at the end strike out "or," and insert instead the words "and also."

In Class 2, first line, change "In a Church," to "in Churches," and after the word "seats," insert "are either entirely free, or partly rented and partly free; all those who hold and have paid for a sitting as provided for in Class 1, and all others," etc.

In third line from bottom, after "persons," insert "hold-ing sittings or."

Also in [IV] third line after the words "Parish Church," insert "who profess to belong to the Protestant Episcopal Church and to no other religious body."

The Rev. Mr. Richmond offered the following amendment, in [IV] line 4: after the word Parish Church add, "or in one of the Churches of the Parish."

The Rev. Dr. Boggs moved to amend by substituting for the amendment proposed by the Special Committee the Canon reported by a Special Committee to the Convention of last year (see Journal 1890, p. 43), omitting the words in [2] 4th line who "has been confirmed or."

The Rev. G. S. Bennitt moved that there be added to [H] as follows: "The meeting shall be called to order by the Rector, if there be one, who shall preside over the meeting. In case there be no Rector, or if he be absent, a President shall be elected."

The Rev. H. S. Bishop moved to strike out the last clause in [V] all that follows the word "decide."

The Rev. Dr. Stoddard offered the following as a substitute for Sec. IV., Class 2.

Class 2. In a church where the seats are not rented, all who have contributed up to one quarter before the election to the current expenses of said Parish in the mode for raising the same adopted therein. The names of the persons so contributing shall be duly recorded by the Secretary or Clerk of the Vestry, and the date of their contributions.

The report of the Special Committee with the above proposed amendments was then referred to the Committee on the Constitution and Canons, to report tomorrow.

The Rev. Mr. Bennitt moved that the Committee on Rules of Order shall provide in the order of business a time for presenting reports of the Hospitals of the Diocese.

Rev. A. Schuyler, D. D., read the report of the Diocesan Commissioners of the Church Building Fund.

REPORT OF THE AMERICAN CHURCH BUILDING FUND.

The Commissioners of the above fund in this Diocese are charged with the duty of keeping the clergy in mind of its importance and the duty of annual offerings to it. We have hitherto issued a circular on the subject. But since a blank for offerings to this fund has made its appearance in the Parochial reports, the annual reminder has seemed unnecessary. We hope that the blank thus provided for will have proved notice sufficient to the clergy that the fund is a regular and stated one, and that more than ten or a dozen parishes hitherto reporting annual offerings will have filled up that blank till the whole diocese is enlisted in the work.

We are glad to be able to announce that the Building Fund has now reached the sum of \$200,000. The Special Secretary reports that every available dollar is now in use and that recent applications for loans have had to be postponed until new funds come in or loans already out are returned.

The Secretary adds, and we agree with him in view of the unanimous opinion of the Missionary Bishops, that no money given to church objects accomplishes so much as this.

We strongly commend the object and urge the extension and increase of offerings to it till every parish shall bear a substantial part in it.

Resolved, That a Committee of seven be appointed by the chair, to consider the present Missionary Canon, and report to the next Convention any amendment or substitute thereto which in its opinion is needed.

Which was adopted, and the Chair appointed as such Committee:

The Revs. E. B. Boggs, D.D., Archdeacon C. S. Abbott; A. Schuyler, D.D.; Mr. Geo. Frelinghuysen, of the Archdeaconry of Newark.

The election of a Standing Committee being in order the Chair appointed as Tellers of the Clerical

vote the Rev. Wm. P. Brush and Mr. C. A. Lighthipe, for the Lay vote the Rev. M. M. Fothergill and Mr. J. B. Van Wagenen.

The ballots were cast and the Tellers retired to count the votes.

Messrs. John E. TAYLOR and John I. Young, were elected the Auditing Committee.

The Rev. George S. Bennitt presented and read the following report:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PROPOSED CHANGES IN THE PRAYER BOOK.

The Committee appointed at the last Convention to consider and report on the notification to this Diocese of the proposed changes in the Prayer Book by the General Convention, respectfully report:

That they have carefully considered the proposed changes and are in favor of their adoption with one exception—Resolution XLII.

In the Table of Proper Psalms on certain days, as modified by the action of this General Convention, for Good Friday evening, instead of LXIX insert LXIV.

Psalm LXIX is that used by the Church of England and is especially suited for Good Friday, and the objections urged in order to remove the LXIX Psalm and insert the LXIV is not considered sufficient to warrant the proposed change.

The Committee on the Constitution and Canons reported, recommending the adoption of the Amendment to Canon 1, of Title III., which had been referred to them yesterday.

The Tellers of the clerical vote for a Standing Committee reported that 57 ballots had been cast, necessary to a choice, 29.

The Rev. R. N. Merritt had received 37 votes, Rev. W. W. Holley 37, Rev. Wm. R. Jenvey 37, Rev. N. Barrows 35, Rev. A. Schuyler, D.D., 21, Rev. Wm. G. Farrington, D.D., 10, Rev. F. B. Carter 19, Rev. Geo. F. Flichtner 19, Rev. T. W. Nickerson, Jr., 1, Rev. J. S. Miller 9, Rev. L. S. Osborne 1, Rev. E. L. Stoddard 1, and that the following were elected:

The consideration of the report of the Committee on the Constitution and Canons, on Section III. of Canon 1 of Title III., was then resumed.

The Rev. Mr. Richmond moved to strike out in Sec. III. of the proposed Amendment, after "Christian Education," the words, "but such appropriations shall cease on the Canonical transfer of the Clergyman to another Diocese."

Which Amendment was carried.

The whole Canon as so amended was then adopted, by the following resolution:

Resolved, That Section III. of Canon 1, Of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Strike out the words that follow "Special Annuitants" and add: "And divided into these four classes:"

Class First. Those who have served as aforesaid, within the limits of what is now the Diocese, for twenty consecutive years. To each clergyman of this class there may be appropriated during the pleasure of the Trustees not more than six hundred dollars in any one year.

Class Second. Those who have served as aforesaid within

the limits of the Diocese for fifteen consecutive years. To each clergyman of this class there may be appropriated as aforesaid not more than five hundred dollars in any one year.

Class Third. Those who have served as aforesaid within the limits of the Diocese for ten consecutive years. To each clergyman of this class there may be appropriated as aforesaid not more than four hundred dollars in any one year.

Class Fourth. Those who have served as aforesaid within the limits of the Diocese for five consecutive years. To each clergyman of this class there may be appropriated as aforesaid not more than three hundred dollars in any one year. This Amendment shall not apply to present annuitants.

The rest of the Canon remaining unchanged as now printed in the "Code."

The Rev. Dr. Farrington, as Chairman of the Committee on the Constitution and Canons, to which was referred the report of the Special Committee on Amendments to Canon 6., Title I., (see page 54), presented and read the following report:

The Committee recommend for adoption the proposed substitute for § II. of Canon 6, of Title I. of the Code, as hereby reported:

SEC. II. In every church there shall be divine service on the day of the election of Church Officers, immediately before the election is held.

SEC. III. At the annual Parish meeting on the day fixed by the Charter or Act of Incorporation (of which notice shall be given "ten days previously by an advertisement set up in open view, on the door of their usual place of worship,") the parishioners who are qualified and entitled to vote as prescribed in this Canon, shall elect, by a majority of votes cast, three deputies and three alternates to the Dioce-

san Convention, and a Vestry, to consist of two wardens, one to be called the Senior, the other the Junior warden, who shall be communicants not under suspension; and of not more than ten nor less than five vestrymen. When the rector by the Church Charter has the right to appoint one warden, he shall be called the Senior warden and only one warden shall be elected. The meeting shall be called to order by the rector, if there be one, who shall preside over the meeting. In case there be no rector, or if he be absent, a president shall be elected.

SEC. IV. Those who shall be entitled to vote at any Parish meeting, or be eligible to any office of the Parish, shall be baptized male persons, of full age, accustomed to attend divine worship in the Parish church, who profess to adhere to the Protestant Episcopal Church, and to no other religious body, and who belong to one of the following classes, and have been so connected with the Parish for at least six calendar months immediately preceding the meeting or election:

· Class 1. All who hold a sitting in the Parish church and have paid the rent due thereon to the beginning of the quarter in which the meeting or election is held, or,

Class 2. In churches where the seats are either entirely free, or partly rented and partly free; all those who hold and have paid for a sitting as provided for in Class 1, and all others who have otherwise agreed to contribute to the current expenses of said Parish in the mode for raising the same adopted therein and have paid the amount of their contribution due at the beginning of the quarter in which the meeting or election is held. The names of all such persons shall be duly recorded by the Secretary or Clerk of the Vestry in a book to be provided for that purpose.

SEC. V. A list of such persons as are entitled to vote at any meeting or election in any Parish shall be made and signed by its treasurer, rector or minister in charge, if any, and the wardens, or by a majority of such persons, at least ten days before such meeting or election, and shall be open to inspection in the vestry room of said church until the

same. It shall be prima facie evidence of the right to vote of persons whose names are thereon, subject, however, to challenge thereof, or to addition at the time of such meeting or election; in which cases the rector or president of the Parish meeting shall decide in the first instance, but, on appeal from such decision, the majority of legal voters present, named on said list, shall finally determine.

If no such list of voters shall have been made as above required, the election shall nevertheless proceed, unless ten persons having the qualifications aforesaid then and there present shall demand such list, in which case another meeting shall be had to fill the vacancies created by such default to elect, under the statute of New Jersey supplemental to the act to incorporate trustees of religious societies, approved March 22, 1883.

SEC. VI. No one shall have the right to vote in more than one Parish in this Diocese.

SEC. VII. No provision of this Canon shall apply to any Parish with whose Charter or Act of Incorporation such provision shall conflict.

Present Section III. to be numbered VIII.

It was resolved that the above amendments be considered by Sections.

On motion Section II. was adopted.

Section III. being under consideration the Rev. Mr. Richmond moved to strike out the words, "and three alternates," which was lost.

Rev. Mr. Richmond also moved to strike out the last clause of Section III., giving the Rector the right to preside in Parish meeting, which motion was not adopted.

The Rev. Richard Hayward offered the following:

Resolved, That all previous action on the Report of the Committee on Constitution and Canon, on Canon 6, be reconsidered and the whole subject be referred back to the Committee to report next year.

Which was lost.

Section III. as reported by the Committee was then adopted.

The Convention took a recess for one hour.

2 P. M.

The Bishop called the Convention to order.

The consideration of the amendments to Canon 6, Title I., was resumed.

Mr. L. B. Henry moved a re-consideration of Section III., which was adopted in the morning session.

It was so ordered.

Mr. Henry then moved to introduce in said Section, after the word "vestrymen," as follows, "all of whom shall be communicants not under suspension."

The Rev. Mr. Richmond raised the point of order that the amendment, under the provision of Section I., of Canon 3, Title III., could not be considered by this. Convention, one day's previous notice not having been given, nor reference made to the Committee on the Constitution and Canons.

The Chair ruled that the point was not well taken, that the proposed amendment was in order.

An appeal being made to the house the decision of the chair was sustained.

The vote being then taken on the amendment offered by Mr. Henry, it was lost.

Section IV. as a whole was adopted.

Section V. was taken up for consideration.

The Rev. Mr. Bishop moved to strike out all after the word "decide," at the end of the section, which was not approved.

Mr. F. C. Cantine moved, in line 5, for "Vestry-room" to substitute "in the vestibule or door of the church inside," which was lost.

The Rev. Mr. Granberry moved to strike out the words "and the Wardens, or by a majority of such persons."

The Rev. Mr. Houghton moved as an amendment to the above, "and if there be no Rector or Minister in charge, by the Wardens."

The Rev. Mr. Bishop moved that the whole Canon,

with the proposed alterations and suggestions, be recommitted to the Committee on the Constitution and Canons, to report thereon next year; and that their report be printed and copies sent to the members of the Convention one month before the next annual meeting.

Mr. Lathrop moved as a substitute that the whole matter be laid on the table. This was lost.

The motion of the Rev. Mr. Bishop to recommit was then adopted.

On motion of the Rev. Mr. Richmond it was

Resolved, That the Committee on State Legislation is hereby requested to procure such legislation as may be necessary to provide that at all Parish meetings the Rector of the Parish, when present, shall preside.

Mr. Cortlandt Parker offered the following:

Resolved, That it be recommended to each Parish in this Diocese, that when a new Rector shall be chosen, and accepts its charge, a policy of insurance upon his life for at least \$10,000, in some responsible Life Insurance Co., shall be obtained for him, by the Church; the premium for which shall be paid during the incumbency of the person insured, in addition to the salary.

Which was adopted.

The Bishop appointed as the Committee "On State Legislation," the Rev. George C. Houghton, Messrs. Cortland Parker and F. W. Stevens.

On motion of the Rev. Wm. T. Webbe it was

Resolved, That the Treasurer of the Convention pay to the Bishop's Secretary and Chaplain \$500, for the Convention year 1891 and 1892.

Mr. L. B. Haff presented the report of the Finance Committee.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

That they recommend that an assessment be made the current year of seven (?) per cent. on salaries, for paying the Bishop's salary, upon all Parishes which have not given their bonds to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund; and two per cent. on the present salaries of the Clergy for Convention expenses, and for other liabilities.

The recommendation of the Committee was adopted.

The Rev. George S. Bennitt offered this amendment to the Canon on "Communicants removing:"

Resolved, That Section II. of Canon 4, Title II., be stricken out, and that the amendment be referred to the Committee on the Constitution and Canons to report next year.

It was so ordered.

On motion of the Rev. Mr. Bennitt it was

Resolved, That on Quinquagesima Sunday each year, offerings be asked from all the Parishes and Missions of the Diocese for the Hospitals of their respective Archdeaconries. On motion of the Rev. N. Barrows it was

Resolved, That the thanks of the Convention are hereby tendered to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Trinity Church, Newark, for the use of the Church and the conveniences afforded for the transaction of business.

Resolved, That the Treasurer pay to the Sexton of Trinity Church the usual sum for services.

On motion of the Rev. Wm. T. Webbe, the Secretary was ordered to print 750 copies of the Journal of this Convention.

On motion the reading of the minutes was dispensed with.

On motion of the Rev. N. Barrows

Resolved, That after the usual devotions the Convention adjourn sine die.

After prayer, the singing of the 315th hymn, and the benediction pronounced by the Bishop, the Convention stood adjourned sine die.

MISSIONARY ADDRESS.

BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND LAITY:

For the details of work done in Mission Stations which are supported wholly or in part by the Diocese at large, I must refer you to the reports of the Archdeacons.

Washington is supplied permanently by the appointment of the Rev. James A. McCleary as Missionary, and the Rev. Fred'k Greaves officiates for the summer—or longer, if he will—at Phillipsburgh. The congregations at both places are good and increasing in numbers.

The older Missions on the Delaware River and at Vernon, some of which are a half century or century old, must in all probability continue for some time perhaps for a long time—to be in part supported by the kindly aid of their stronger and more prosperous brethren in the rest of the Diocese. I hope the Church will do this in a generous and brotherly spirit, and not consign these faithful hearts to the world's *Limbus* of poor relationship.

These Missions are generally doing well. Those which may be called self-supporting are, as a rule, prosperous. When I tell you that one hundred and seventy-five persons have been confirmed this year in the Missions of the Diocese—a number exceeded by only two of the fourteen Missionary Jurisdictions of the country, including in the case of these both Parishes and Missions—the information may supply wholesome food for reflection to some who are not in the habit of studying the subject of church growth carefully.

I have received the following reports from the Reverends the Archdeacons of the two Archdeaconries:

ARCHDEACONRY OF NEWARK.

To the Right Reverend T. A. Starkey, D.D., Bishop of Newark:

There is nothing particularly new, neither is there anything particularly encouraging or discouraging, to report concerning the Mission work in the Archdeaconry of Newark. The Missionaries are doing their duty faithfully and well, with as good results as can be expected.

Rev. Mr. Hall resigned Washington last Fall, and a new Missionary has just taken charge, entering upon his duties the first Sunday in May. During the interregnum the services were maintained by a Lay Reader, with visits from a neighboring Priest for the celebration of the Holy Communion.

At Phillipsburgh matters have improved, and all that is needed now is a resident Missionary. The services have been maintained regularly, mainly by the Rev. Dr. Boggs. I regard this as the most important of our stations, for the reason that it is a city of nearly ten thousand inhabitants and is growing. In spite of some drawbacks, especially the unfortunate location of the church, the proper man can do efficient work here, and eventually make of it a self-supporting Parish. There ought to be a guaranteed salary of not less than one thousand dollars, which by a very little addition to the

amount already appropriated can easily be accomplished, and I have good reason to suppose it may be done, and with this salary I think we ought to secure the proper man. The population will always be largely of the working class, and consequently prudent and judicious management is called for, and the man who goes there must be one who will regard himself as established until God's Providence calls him elsewhere. It is not the place for the one who regards it simply as a convenient opportunity to fill the gap while seeking something more desirable.

The other places in this western section of our State do not offer much encouragement for the reason that there is no growth in population. I am very positive in my opinion that, whether gaining or losing, it is the bounden duty of the church to sustain the services at all these points in the manner we are now doing. We would be disgraced in the eyes of the Christian community at large, and I believe we would forfeit God's blessing, if we should cease to care for these brethren of our own household, simply because there is no prospect of their ever being able to take care of themselves.

With the exception of the city of Newark, and the idea does not seem to meet with favor here, I do not see any encouragement for the enlargement of our work, and it seems to me unwise to think of starting any new enterprises in the present condition of the Missionary treasury. We must take care of what we have, and however desirous of gratifying members of the church scattered here and there, it is not wise to start weak and unpromising missions.

There are many little details that might be mentioned in connection with the work of our Missionaries, the Revs. Messrs. Douglass, Smith, Keller, of a pleasing nature, which their own reports to you doubtless will mention. All of these brethren deserve our active sympathy.

ARCHDEACONRY OF JERSEY CITY.

To the Right Reverend T. A. Starkey, D.D., Bishop of Newark:

The Missions of the Archdesconry have never been in a condition so thoroughly satisfactory since I have had any knowledge of them as at this present time. They have never given such promise of soon becoming self-supporting as now.

The stone church building at Fort Lee is at last the property of the church. It has ceased to be the "hired house" of the Mission. The Missionary in charge has purchased it and paid for it. This was done partly by the people themselves and partly by money advanced by the Missionary. The building has been beautified without and within. Many memorials have been given. At an expenditure of \$2,000 the church has come into possession of a property worth fully \$9,000. The congregation and Sunday-school have steadily increased in size and character. A class of twenty-seven presented to the Bishop for confirmation is but one of the many evidences of the faithful work done by the Rev. Walter M. Sherwood, Deacon in charge.

Grace Church, Union Hill, has added to its equipment, already so complete, for increased work, by building a room for Guild and other purposes. This mission is now entirely free of debt. On Easter Sunday the offerings were for the extinguishment of that which was remaining. These were ample. It now owes nothing. It has a property which has cost \$9,000, all of which has been given by the faithful people themselves and their friends. It has never received financial support from either Archdeaconry or Diocese. It has always been a model of sturdy independence in the best sense of the word. The Rev. Joseph Sherlock is still the Priest in charge.

The Church of the Ascension is not only continuing the good work it has ever done since the Rev. James Cameron became its Missionary Rector; it is increasing it. At the be-

ginning of this Conventional year the Archdeaconry felt itself unable to continue paying the interest on the mortgage which is on this church property. The Mission itself had never paid this interest. It was formerly paid by the Board of Missions and latterly by the Archdeaconry. This additional burden has been placed upon the Mission in consequence. It is more than it can bear. The interest, amounting to nearly \$300, has been paid, but it has been largely at the expense of the Missionary himself, as the Mission has been unable to pay him his usual stipend by about that much. This is none the less hard upon him because it has been uncomplainingly borne. A great gain to the Mission has been made by the purchase of a Rectory. This will have cost \$4,500 when ready for occupancy; \$1,500 has been paid upon it, \$3,000 remains to be paid. The Missionary pledges himself to pay the interest upon this for two years. On the evening of Ascension Day the Bishop made his visitation to the Mission and confirmed a class of twenty-four. The church, although it was a week day evening, was packed from chancel to vestibule. The interior walls of the church have been very tastefully decorated, and many gifts made for the more perfect furnishing of the building.

The Rev. Dr. Warren, at St. Mary's Mission, has given further substantial evidence of his faith and generosity. Last year he improved the church property at his own expense and risk to the extent of about \$10,000. This year he has built and furnished a Rectory, has further improved the church, and has added to the efficiency of the Mission in a marked manner. This has all been done at his own personal expense. He naturally looks to be repaid when the Mission shall have become strong enough to repay him. He doubtless will be. Yet his faith and generosity are none the less commendable for all that.

St. John's, Bayonne, has at last realized the dreams, and prayers, and hopes, and labors of the past few years. It is now in its own new, and bright, and attractive church building. The difficulties, and perplexities, and obstacles en-

countered in the prosecution of this work would have discouraged a less earnest and zealous man than the Rev. O. Valentine, Priest in charge. One of these difficulties was of such a stubborn nature that it was found necessary to revive the old Parish organization before it could be removed. St. John's was formerly a Parish. It had never been dissolved legally. In the eyes of the law it was a Parish, while practically it was a Mission. The Parish has, in consequence, been revived. It now has a Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen. The church building, with its furniture and all, has cost \$10,000. Of this amount \$3,000 has been paid. The remaining \$7,000 is provided for. The requisite number of shares in the Building Loan Association have been secured, and in this way the indebtedness is provided for. The sound business methods pursued in this work is commendable to all concerned.

The Mission at Lyndhurst has added to its property by purchasing an adjoining lot. It is now ready for whatever God may have in store for it in the future. It has ground for church building, which is already on it and entirely paid for, Rectory and Guild room. This work is under the personal lead and direction of the Rev. Mr. Clayton, Rector of Grace Church, Rutherford. It is entirely self-supporting.

The Mission of the Epiphany, Allendale, is still ministered to by Mr. Daniel A. Smith, the faithful Lay Reader in charge. It is self-supporting, owing no man anything but to love one another.

The Mission of the Holy Trinity, Hillsdale, has done a quiet yet earnest work during the past year. A building has been erected in which services are held. The Bishop visited the Mission for confirmation about a month ago. A class of seven, which had been prepared by the Lay Reader in charge, was presented by the Archdeacon. This was the first confirmation ever held in the village. If an earnest Priest could be found who would take this work in connection with that in Allendale it would be to the advantage of both.

The Rev. Mr. Flichtner, Rector of St. Paul's Church, Englewood, still gives personal services to the Mission at Nordhoff. This work is entirely supported by the mother

church at Englewood.

A new Mission, St. Luke's, has been started in Paterson. The need of such a Mission has been long felt, but heretofore it has been impossible to obtain a suitable building in which to hold services. This difficulty has been overcome, and services are conducted by Mr. Henry A. Howland, the present Treasurer of the Archdeaconry, as Lay Reader. Whatever of financial support has been given up to this present time, has been given by St. Paul's Church, Paterson, through the efforts of the Rev. Mr. Nickerson, Rector.

While the Missionary work of the Archdeaconry is in a condition most satisfactory, the finances are in a condition most unsatisfactory. The Archdeacon thanks God, with a fervor which is beyond the power of words to adequately express, that he is in no way responsible for this. He has absolutely nothing to do with the finances. That is the province of the Archdeaconry itself. It raises all the money and spends it. He merely has the supervision of the Missionary work under the direction of the Bishop. Yet he has gone out of his way to better the financial condition as much as possible. He has issued circular appeals. He has written personal letters. He has talked and expostulated. Yet having no power or authority he has been able to do but little.

There are at least two reasons for this condition of affairs. The one is the seeming indifference on the part of some to Missions at all; the other lies in the peculiar condition of the Archdeaconry itself. A careful examination and comparison of the reports of the two Archdeaconries as made to the Convention one year ago, will reveal a very suggestive condition of things. It will be found that while the Archdeaconry of Jersey City has fewer clergymen, fewer parishes, fewer communicants, and raises less money, by far, than the Archdeaconry of Newark, still it baptizes many more, presents more for confirmation, marries more, buries more, and has more Sunday-school teachers and scholars than its larger and wealthier sister. This is very suggestive. The character of

church work in this portion of the Diocese is changing very rapidly. It is becoming more and more a distinctively missionary work. This is especially so of Jersey City and Hoboken. The well-to-do are moving to the Oranges, to Summit, to Morristown, and to other places; those who come to take their places are people of far more limited means. This Archdeaconry has the work; the other has the wealth. In consideration of these facts, a reconsideration of the Missionary Canon is becoming more and more a necessity.

The property of the Mission has been deeded to the Diocese, to be held in trust for the Mission. For enlargement of building and other improvement of property the Mission has in fund the sum of \$648.07. By removals the Mission has suffered loss, but also has gained by accessions, so that the Mission holds its own.

The congregation went from the Parish room into the new Church the afternoon of Good Friday, with a balance of \$900 for current expenses to its credit in the bank. It begins the third quarter of the year with a pew rental of more than eight thousand dollars, and an average Sunday offering for current expenses of more than fifty dollars. Its financial success is assured. We have abundant evidence, thank God, of its spiritual life.

From a state of depression and financial weakness in 1877, when the present rector took charge, its bond suspended, no vote in the Convention, unable to pay but \$700 salary, and with a debt of nearly \$7,000, it has steadily grown in all departments, and now has a good standing in the Diocese and a recognized place in the community; its bond is good, it has a vote, it pays its Rector \$1,000, it has covered the old debt, and has one of the most attractive little Church edifices in the Diocese, for which we are thankful and go forward, trusting in the Lord whose presence has been with us through these years of toil and travail.

The Parish has had a painful struggle during the year, from which it has with difficulty survived. No decision has been reached in its suit against the New York, Susquehanna & Western Railway Company for damages; and the burdens imposed upon the Parish, the losses it has suffered and the demands it has been compelled to meet have orippled its energies and seriously interfered with its work. The Parish could not make its accustomed contributions to Diocesan and general Church objects; and under all the circumstances of the case it is a marvel that it has been able even to maintain an existence. It is hoped that a brighter day is dawning. The suit is being pressed against the Railway Company; arrangements are being made for lightening the financial pressure; the spiritual work in all departments is being vigorously pushed; and the hope is that are long the Parish will be relieved of its embarrassment, and be able not only to meet all its obligations, but also to contribute liberally to all the funds of the Church, and to regain a position of great prosperity and power.

Our chancel is enriched by an elegant brass lectern, a thank-offering to Almighty God from Mrs. Emilie E. Deen, on Whitsunday last; also by a dossel of green silk, embroidered with triangle and dove, from Miss Josephine B. Hull; also by two chancel windows, in memoriam of the Rev. Julius David Rosé, Ph.D., deceased, from his family. The figures in these windows represent the Church militant and the Church triumphant. The Rev. Dr. Rosé, residing here in the scene of his former work as teacher, for several years past disabled by disease and infirmities, entered into rest on the 11th of September last, soon after receiving the Holy Eucharist, his victioum. The burial service was at the Church. The Bishop, being absent from the country, was represented by Rev. Dr. Merritt, and other members of the Standing Committee. Other clergymen were present, and the Church was filled with friends of the deceased. The burial office was rendered chorally, with an anthem also, by the vested choir of St. Peter's Church, Morristown. By request of the clergy present the address delivered by the Rector on the occasion was published. Appropriate resolutions were adopted by the Vestry of this Church.

The Baquet Institute here, a Church boarding and day school for girls, has had a successful year. Boys for a choir have been under training of the organist, Mr. A. W. Griffin, of the G. T. S., during the year, and now render our choral even-song quite satisfactorily. The Parish Guild, of ladies, has accomplished a very successful work during the year, sending away three boxes of clothing to Missionaries, in all valued at about \$500, besides clearing about \$887 by a fair. In pursuance of the generous proposition of Mr. James R. Pitcher to give one thousand dollars towards the westward extension of our Church edifice, with a choir room, the Vestry have adopted designs prepared by Mr. Wm. During the year a Parish room, at an expense of about \$2,600, has been furnished and paid for. The mortgage debt on the Rectory has been reduced \$1,025, and an offering of \$2,521.82 has been made toward the Missionary work of the Church.

The Rector has again to report the very satisfactory condition of the Sunday-school, which is steadily increasing in members. Mr. J. A Chapter of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew has been formed and is doing excellent work in maintaining a Mission service at West Tenafly, the congregation being composed in great part of colored people. During the past year this Mission has met with a very serious check to its prosperity through the utter collapse of the Orange Mountain Land Company, whose President was the largest contributor to the support of the services of the Church. More than one-half of the previous subscribers to the Mission have been lost to it for the same and for similar reasons. The Priest in charge was dangerously ill for three months, and the services were necessarily suspended from Christmas until Good Friday. As a natural consequence, this report is far from satisfactory. But the Church is now well filled at nearly all the services, and there appears to be a commendable disposition "to strengthen the things that remain," and to wait for better days.

REPORTS OF HOSPITALS, HOMES, AND WOMEN'S AUXILIARY.

HOSPITAL OF ST. BARNABAS.

The Hospital of St. Barnabas has been in existence for a quarter of a century. The twenty-fifth anniversary service was held on St. Barnabas Day, the eleventh of June, and the reports of the Trustees and the Treasurer read on that occasion show clearly what has been accomplished in that time and what must be done to carry on the work.

Begun in a modest way, but with clear foresight of the great work to be done in the future, the Hospital has grown with the increasing need for its ministrations, and the result has justified the erection of the large building where the work is now carried on. The beds are filled with sick and wounded who need the shelter and care a hospital alone can give. large hospital has been built and furnished. The constant attendance of a well organized staff of physicians has been secured and continued through all these years, and the management of the internal affairs is in the charge of devoted women, well trained for the work of administration and of nursing. The land and buildings have cost about \$84,000 and are fully worth that sum. The mortgage debt is only The work is necessary and must be continued. The annual expenses are increased by the increase of work and it only remains to increase the annual income in proportion. The very fact that so much has been done and that

the Hospital is here doing the work, makes it plain that the work cannot and will not now be allowed to decline for want of support. Those who took part in the founding of the Hospital and all who have helped to bring it to its present state, may rest assured that what they have done the people of the city and of the whole Diocese of Newark will carry on for many generations.

No addition to, or extraordinary expenditures for repairs about the Hospital buildings have been made during the past year, and no change in insurance.

REVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL WORK OF THE YEAR.

A review of the financial work of the Hospital for the past year shows that the household expenses have been increased by some \$3,000 over the preceding year, which is mainly accounted for by the care of a much larger number of patients, especially during the past six months. To offset that there is an increase of receipts from the board of patients, for whom there are larger accommodations since the completion of the extension recently built in connection with the chapel. Income from the Wallace property has decreased some \$1,500 from last year, from the fact that nothing has this year been received from original sales but only from the payment of small installments, and the current interest. But little difference appears in the amount of donations from individuals and corporations, or contributions from churches.

A comparison of the amounts received from the board of patients and that paid for wages, shows that nearly enough has been received from this source to pay the wages—a notable gain that can be, in a great measure, fairly credited to the management of the household.

It is almost impossible to give the exact figures for the household expenses for each year separately, as the bills of one year are frequently paid with those of the next on the same account. An average, however, based upon the aggregate expenditure upon this account for the past four years

shows a yearly average of about \$12,000 (\$11,685.19). Calculating receipts from what may be called regular, or ordinary sources in the same way, the annual average is about \$10,000, divided as follows:

leaving an annual average of \$2,000 to be cared for as a defiency. This year, as heretofore, this deficiency has been temporarily provided for by discount notes, and the household bills have been paid to close of year, making it now possible to concisely state the financial condition of the Hospital, to wit:

LIABILITIES.

\$20,500 (reduced from \$22,000) on bond and mortgage, and \$8,000 on discount notes that represent the deficiency in current expenses for the past four years. Total, \$28,500.

THE ASSETS.

Being the Hospital property, of course subject to estimate, but which has cost, per vouchers, to date, \$83,916.19.

In accordance with a resolution of the Board, adopted October 4, 1888, ten per cent. of moneys received from board of patients is set apart for the payment of interest upon the \$7,000 mortgage. Two payments of \$175 each have already been made from this fund and the balance now on hand in this account (\$182.69) is sufficient to pay the interest falling due July 9th, next.

A resolution of the Board, adopted October 2, 1890, directed the Treasurer to place all moneys received from the sale of the lots of the Wallace property into a temporary sinking fund to be applied to the payment of outstanding

discount notes; this has been done and there is now in that account, \$326.10.

CHRIST HOSPITAL, JERSEY CITY.

In the month of January, 1873, the Rev. Dr. Abercrombie, Rector of St. Matthew's Church, Jersey City, assembled a few of the clergy and friends at St. Matthew's Rectory, to confer upon the expediency of establishing in Jersey City a church hospital. These pioneers adjourned to meet at St. Mark's Chapel, on Grove street, when it was decided to hold a public meeting to create interest in this object. The public meeting was held in Grace Church, February 1, 1873. Addresses were made to a large congregation, who were deeply interested in the subject, and afterwards the Council of Christ Hospital was organized. Rev. R. M. Abercrombie, D. D., was elected the first President, and the Rev. Fernando C. Putnam, D. D., Vice-President.

Their first intention was to hire a house and begin the work; but it was afterwards learned that the Hudson County Hospital, on Magnolia avenue, was about to be closed for want of funds. The Council, therefore, made arrangements with the Board of Regents of that institution to lease from them their hospital. They then adopted the name of "The Hudson County Church Hospital and Home," and were incorporated by the Legislature, March 21, 1874. On December 2, 1880, the name was changed to "Christ Hospital."

From May 1, 1873, this work went steadily on, until in the Spring of 1887 it was found that extensive repairs were needed to continue the work in the building they had leased for fifteen years. Besides, the demands of the Hospital had outgrown the house.

A Site Committee was therefore appointed to select a site on which to erect Christ Hospital, and in 1888 the Council

purchased twenty-one city lots on Palisade avenue for \$15,000. Plans were then drawn for buildings by Mr. L. C. Holden, to cost about \$40,000, and two buildings on the property, to be put in order, making a total cost for land.

buildings, sewer and furnishing, of about \$61,000.

On St. Luke's Day, October 18, 1888, ground was broken for the new hospital, the earth being removed in the form of a cross, and each member of the Council, Abercrombie Guild and other friends of the hospital, taking out a shovel full of earth. The work of laying the foundation immediately followed, and the corner-stone was laid by the President, Rt. Rev. Thomas A. Starkey, D. D., and the Vice Presidents, Rev. George S. Bennitt and Mr. J. Hull Browning, on January 31, 1889.

On St. Luke's Day, October 18, 1889, St. Luke's House, a building on the rear of the hospital property, was opened with a celebration of the Holy Communion by the clerical Vice-President, and on November 13, 1889, the benediction of Christ Hospital by the Bishop of the Diocese, in the presence of the Governor of the State, the Mayor of Jersey

City and a large gathering of clergy and people.

In the early days of the hospital several ladies connected with the various Parishes of Jersey City and vicinity began to work for its welfare. They formed a society called "The Ladies' Guild," which, after the death of the Rev. Dr. Abercrombie in December, 1884, changed its name to "The Abercrombie Guild," and became an incorporated body. They are recognized by the Council as an auxiliary in the benevolent and charitable work of Christ Hospital.

They have been a very active and helpful guild, raising every year large funds for the current expenses, and inaugu-

rating and pushing forward the endowment of beds.

In April, 1878, they began the issuing of a monthly paper called "The Daisy," which has continued its work, resulting in raising endowments, mostly in "The Daisy Ward" for children, of over \$22,000, which is invested. They have collected, also, over \$8,000 towards the Building Fund.

The work connected with the care and management of "mite chests" had increased and prospered under the ladies who had been especially charged with this work, so that in October, 1889, it was organized into "St. Mary's Guild," who not only had this work committed to them by the Finance-Committee, but it was voted by the Council, in May, 1890, that the Mite Chest Fund be applied to the Building Fund for the payment of interest, etc. The guild has done a good work, and collected during the year over \$1,000. Besides, they have undertaken other work for the Hospital.

The Sisterhood of St. Margaret entered upon their work as superintendents of the Hospital on St. Luke's Day, October 18, 1889. They have brought the institution to a high degree of excellence, and the Council desire to put on record

their appreciation of their self-sacrificing labors.

The Medical Board are undertaking new work, that of establishing a Training School for Nurses, and the Dispensary is rapidly increasing its usefulness.

The Medical and Surgical Divisions are doing faithful work, and the usefulness of the institution being every way increased.

The Rev. B. R. Phelps resigned the office of Chaplain in October, and the Rev. D. F. Warren, D.D., was appointed.

The Council feel very grateful for the cooperation of all the friends of the Hospital, and the occupying of the new buildings make us devoutly thankful to almighty God for His continual blessing upon the work of Christ Hospital.

HOUSE OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD.

On June 22, 1882, a meeting was held in Orange to organize the work of the "House of the Good Shepherd." From the acceptance of the resolution to "open a church home for aged and infirm men and women, convalescents from the Orange Memorial Hospital, and a temporary home for sick children not proper subjects for hospital treatment," our work has gone steadily on.

In August of the same year our first inmates were received at a rented house situated on Scotland street. Since that time we have had many ups and downs, but the belief that we were doing a much needed work has kept us from losing heart. During our nearly nine years of existence we have had thirty-nine inmates—thirty women and nine men. Besides these, we have had, from time to time, convalescents from the hospital, whom we have taken free of charge for two weeks. Out of our number, death has taken eleven women and five men.

The institution is supported partly by free will offerings, and partly by moderate charges for board, paid by the inmates, their friends or by the Parishes to which they belong. Having outgrown the old rented house, on the 17th of the present month of June we moved into the large and commodious house on Henry street, which we have built.

We have at present in the house three men and six women. Many of the rooms have been furnished by kind friends, and we are ready to take in all who are in need of such a home. Let it be remembered that this is not a Parochial, but a Diocesan work.

Chairman Committee on Admissions.

Address Mrs. J. Walter Wood, South Orange, N. J. The new house built for this charity was completed on the 18th of June, 1891, and opened and dedicated on that day by the Bishop of the Diocese. The care of its "aged and infirm" inmates had been carried on for the nine years of its existence in a rented house. The new house will have cost \$13,000. It is spacious, airy and commodious, and easy of access from the Orange station of the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western Railroad, and is situated at the corner of Cone and Henry streets.

The Chaplain reports that he has held a weekly service at the Home throughout the year, and a monthly communion for the inmates.

OBJECT OF THE HOME.

St. Katharine's Home is intended to help unmarried girls who have been led astray for the first time, and to shelter them before and after motherhood.

Application must be made to the Chaplain, or to the Sister in Charge, who will investigate each case.

Applicants must be recommended by trustworthy persons, and must bring a certificate of good health from a physician in regular standing.

Each girl must sign a written promise to remain in the Home for a fixed length of time, to conform to the rules of the house, and to perform such a share of the house and other work as may be assigned her.

The object is to endeavor by religious influence and by kindly discipline to strengthen in the girls a love of virtue and goodness, and, by training, to prepare them for earning an honorable living after leaving the Home.

The work of St. Katharine's Home is begun with the hope that even a few may, through its influence, be rescued from a life of shame and from becoming a danger and charge to the community.

The question "How much is it needed?" is fully answered by the fact that even before any preliminary organization was effected, seven applications for admission were made to those known to be interested; and it is the testimony of persons engaged in work among the fallen, that many might have been kept from complete ruin, if cared for and influenced for good at the time of their first shame.

Heretofore the Church in this country, as far as can be learned, has made no special provision for the exclusive care of this class; it now seems a proper time for the Church to make a beginning in this work.

ORIGIN OF THE MOVEMENT.

The need for making some provision for girls at the time of their first confinement being brought to the attention of the Bishop of Newark, he at once expressed his warm approval of the plan.

A few persons who, it was thought, would become interested, were asked to meet the Bishop on the 18th of November.

The object and needs of such a home as St. Katharine's were informally discussed, and of those present, all were agreed upon the necessity of caring for young girls at what may be the turning point of their lives.

A committee was appointed to draft a plan of organization.

This committee presented their report at a meeting held in Trinity Hall, Hoboken, on November 25th, 1889.

Their report was substantially adopted, and the Executive Committee, elected by those present at this meeting, was requested to publish a pamphlet setting forth the objects of St. Katharine's Home, and to secure and furnish a suitable house.

The movement was greatly aided by the promise of the Mother Superior of St. Margaret's Sisterhood to take charge of the Home, and also by the endowment of "St. Katharine's Bed" in the maternity ward of Christ Hospital, for the use of the girls from the Home.

It was found that a small house, situated in the vicinity of Christ Hospital, Jersey City Heights, and suitable for the purpose, could be rented at once. The need was felt to be so pressing that the Executive Committee decided to rent the house and open the Home as soon as possible in an inexpensive way, even though they could only receive, for the present, those who are waiting and anxious to come.

NEEDS.

The immediate and pressing needs are payment of the house rent, the cost of furnishing the different rooms, fuel, light, supplies and other expenses incident to the opening and support of the Home.

Money is needed. Yearly subscriptions are specially desired as furnishing a guarantee for the future support of the Home, but any sum of money will be most thankfully.

OPENING OF THE NEW HOUSE.

The new house was formally opened on Monday, the 27th of October. In the absence of the Bishop of our Diocese, the Bishop of Delaware presided, assisted by the Warden, the Rev. G. C. Houghton.

After prayers and the reading of the Scriptures, a service of blessing was conducted by Bishop Coleman, who at its close made an admirable address appropriate to the occasion.

ANNUAL REPORT.

In presenting this report, attention is called to the fact that the opening of St. Katharine's Home took place the 13th of January, 1890, consequently this report is not that of a full year, but only of nine months.

In these nine months we have met with great encouragement, our principal problems being financial ones. All interested in the work must agree with that which the Warden said in opening the last meeting of the Advisory Board, when he expressed his gratitude as well as his surprise at the phenomenal success of the Home, the excellent

situation of the present house, with its close proximity to Christ Hospital, and the liberality of those out of as well as in the Diocese.

The Sisters of St. Margaret have been in charge of the Home, and have most wisely managed it since the day its doors were first opened. The success of the Home in the care of the house and the inmates is due to their untiring work and unceasing thought.

Thirty applications for admission have been received by the Chaplain and the Sister in Charge. At present there are in the Home eight girls and four infants; two of the girls have left and are married. In the excellent report of the Sister in Charge will be found a detailed account of the work and management of the Home.

REPORT OF THE SISTER IN CHARGE.

The formal opening and blessing of St. Katharine's Home on Palisade avenue took place January 13, 1890, but the Sister in Charge did not arrive in Jersey City until the following day. Although there had already been many applications for admission into the Home, there were as yet no inmates, and the Sister remained at Christ Hospital until February 6th, when a girl was brought from the House of Mercy, New York, and the house was opened. On the following day another girl arrived, and on the next day still another, and in a little more than a fornight five girls were in the Home. On May 1st, the Home was removed to its present abode on Reservoir avenue, where we have a more retired situation and more ample accommodations.

The Sister in Charge was assisted in her duties until July 1st by a lady who kindly gave her services; since then there have been two Sisters engaged in the work. The girls have from the beginning done all the work of the house except the cooking, and are now about to begin that. They have also been employed in sewing, and in the evening classes were given in reading, writing and spelling, as well as religious instruction.

During the Summer two of our bottle-fed babies died from the effects of the heat, and another a few days after birth.

The remaining three are in good health.

Since opening there have been thirty applicants for admission—some ineligible under the rules, and some unwilling to stay the required length of time—so the record stands: Admitted, 11; discharged, 2; left, 2; births, 6; deaths, 8;

girls, 7; infants, 3.

Two of our girls who have left the house are now married. We are now beginning to need work for the girls, both in order to teach them nice work and for the interest of doing it. This we have already begun by laundry work in the shape of surplices for the choir and clergy of Trinity Parish, Hoboken. We should be very glad also for orders for fine sewing—ladies' and children's underclothing, aprons, etc. This would also be a source of income for the house—small at first, but increasing with our numbers.

Besides this, any donations in the way of nice religious pictures; something for the chapel, which should be the bright centre of the house, would be most acceptable, as

would a small organ or melodeon.
