## TITLE I, CANON I, § II.

## OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election in the following form:

## [Name of the Church, the place and date.]

This certifies that at a meeting of the congregation of this Church for the purpose of electing Church Officers and Deputies to the Convention (or for the purpose of electing Deputies to the Convention, if the meeting be for that purpose alone) A. B., C. D. and E. F., being members of the congregation and communicants of the Church, were duly chosen to represent the congregation in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand (or, if two Wardens subscribe, we have set our hands) the day and year above written.

N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary signs, then the signatures of both Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-in-charge or Missionary cannot sign.

The Lay Representation is limited to three Deputies, whose names in full should be carefully and legibly written.

Three Alternate Deputies must also be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies. (See Title I, Canon 6, § II, [2].)

This Certificate is to "be transmitted to the Secretary of the Convention at least ten days before the meeting of the Annual Convention." (See Title I, Canon I, § II.)

In order to secure this, the Secretary will forward a blank form to every Parish, and earnestly asks the FROMPT attention of the Clergy.

"a" By the terms of the Constitution and Canons, the Deputies must be members of the congregation and communicants of the Church; also contributors to its support, and worshippers in the Church of the Parish which elects them for six calendar months next before the election, and in Free Churches must have handed in their names as such to the Rector or Minister, in writing, six months before the election. (See Title I, Canon 6, § II, [3] and [4].)

- 6. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, and, when made, shall be the property of the Convention, without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.
- 7. No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the Journal.
- When any member is about to speak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking, confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
- No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply) in the same debate, without leave of the Convention.
- 10. At the request of the President or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
- All questions shall be decided viva voce, unless otherwise specially ordered.
- 12. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote of the Convention may be taken by orders voting separately, and the names shall be entered on the Minutes.

- 13. The doors of the Convention shall be open for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
- 14. No member shall leave the Convention without permission.
- 15. In all elections, those persons only who shall have a majority of all the votes given shall be deemed elected; but if in any case more than the required number of persons shall have a majority of votes, the required number of persons having the highest number of votes shall be deemed elected, and in case of a tie between two or more candidates there shall be a new ballot.
- 16. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone it to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it, or to divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
- 17. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order, he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
- 18. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate; but any member may appeal from the decision, and, on such appeal, no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention.
- 19. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.
- 20. The Convention shall meet the first day at 10 A. M., and on subsequent days at 9 A. M.; with a recess of one hour on each day, between 1 and 2 o'clock.
- At the close of each Convention, the Minutes shall be corrected and approved.

# JOURNAL.

TRINITY CHURCH,
NEWARK, N. J., May 16, 1893,

This being the time appointed by the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark for the meeting of the Annual Convention of said Church, a number of the Clergy and Lay Deputies assembled for Divine Service in Trinity Church, Newark, at 10 o'clock A. M.

The Bishop celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by the Rector of the Parish, the Rev. L. S. Osborne, the Rev. Dr. Schuyler and the Rev. John Keller.

The Bishop delivered such portions of his Annual Address as did not refer to the Missions of the Diocese.

After Divine Service the Convention assembled in the Church, the Bishop took the chair and the Convention came to order.

The Secretary then called the names of the Clergy\*

entitled to seats in the Convention, and the names of the Lay Deputies\* from Parishes which had sent in the Certificates of Election in accordance with the requirements of the Canon, and announced that there was present a constitutional quorum, both of the Clergy and of the Laity.

The Bishop appointed as the Committee on the Certificates of Lay Deputies, the Rev. John F. Butterworth, and Messrs. Charles A. Lighthipe and Robert Weir.

No Certificate having reached the Secretary of Lay Deputies from Trinity Church, Hoboken, and Lay Deputies being present from that Parish, the question of receiving them was referred to the Committee on the Certificates of Lay Deputies.

The Committee on Rules of Order reported the Rules of the last Convention with the following proposed amendment:

Insert as XIII of Rule 3 (with corresponding changes of following sections):

XIII. Report of Committee on Constitution and Canons; the recommendations of which shall be deemed to be adopted unless objection be made—in which case the consideration thereof shall be postponed and be the order of business immediately before XVII (Miscellaneous Business).

And the Rules of Order of last Convention, thus amended, were adopted.

The election of a Secretary being in order, the Rev. Anthony Schuyler, D.D., nominated the Rev. Edward B. Boggs, D.D. Dr. Boggs declining a reelection, the Rev. Robert N. Merritt, D.D., moved the following resolution:

WHEREAS, The Rev. EDWARD B. Boggs, D.D., after a continuous service of fifteen years as Secretary of this body, declines a reelection to that office,

Resolved, That the late Secretary has richly earned the hearty thanks of the Diocese, which are hereby tended to him, for his long and arduous services in its behalf, and that our best wishes accompany him in his retirement from his laborious office.

This resolution was seconded by Mr. Henry Haves, who asked for its adoption by a rising vote, and it was in this manner unanimously adopted. The Bishop then expressed his high appreciation of Dr. Boggs' faithful services, and the latter in a few words thanked the Convention for its kindly action.

The Rev. John P. Appleton, the Assistant Secretary, being nominated for the office of Secretary by

the Rev. H. S. BISHOP, D.D., Mr. HENRY HAVES moved that the retiring Secretary be instructed to cast the vote of the Convention for the nominee, which motion was carried unanimously, and the Rev. JOHN P. APPLETON was declared to be the Secretary of the Convention.

The Rev. STEPHEN H. GRANBERRY read the following letter from the Rev. THEODORE I. HOLCOMBE, and moved that its suggestions be referred to the Trustees of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergy, and it was so referred.

MAY 15, 1893.

#### My Dear Mr. Granberry:

I think before your new arrangement goes into practice (I mean at the present Convention) there should be added some further conditions of receiving an annuity besides what the Canon already has; something like the following:

Note that the above Canon does not apply.

I. To Rectors continuing to hold Rectorships where the salary exceeds \$1,000 per year.

II. To Rectors Emeriti who draw from a Parish \$1,000 or more per annum.

III. To Clergymen engaged in secular work or other Church work, who continue to receive for such labor \$1,000 per annum. As it now stands anybody can apply and be put on the list of regular annuitants who has

fulfilled the conditions of age and time. The Canon was intended to meet the case of men who have served the Church up to sixty-five years of age, and are out of regular work, or who are getting a precarious livelihood, or men who, for reasons known to themselves, desire to resign a Parish. A missionary who continues to work, who has lived on a small salary, of less than \$1,000, ought certainly to be eligible. But there must be further safeguards or you will have trouble in the future. But with what I have suggested I think all will work smoothly. Move a committee to report to the present Convention. I thought of these conditions at first. But their importance did not appear so great then as now that I have thought more about it. \* \* I congratulate the Diocese heartily upon the success of the effort to realize the \$30,000. which they are able to report at the present Convention.

The Committee on New Parishes reported that no new Parishes had applied to be admitted to union with the Convention.

The report of the Standing Committee was read by its Secretary, the Rev. WILLIAM R. JENVEY.

#### REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The Standing Committee respectfully reports that it has held five meetings during the past Conventional year.

On the 18th of May, 1892, the Committee organized by electing the Rev. ROBERT NORRIS MERRITT, D.D., President, and the Rev. WILLIAM R. JENVEY, Secretary.

On the 12th of September, 1892, a communication was received from the Right Reverend, the Bishop of the

Diocese, constituting the Committee the ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese, by reason of his absence from the country, from June 11th to September 28th, 1892.

The President reported having received the Rev. HENRY P. SCRATCHLEY, A.M., by letter dimissory on the

14th of June, 1892, from the Diocese of Quincy.

Consent was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. John's Church, Boonton, to mortgage their Church property on Cedar and Cornelia streets to the amount of \$3,000.

Consent was given to the formation of a new Parish in South Orange to be known as St. Andrew's Church, South Orange. Permission was given said Parish of St. Andrew's to mortgage its property for the sum of \$5,000.

Mr. Solomon Stoddard, of Jersey City, was received

as a Postulant.

Mr. James Mason Raker was received as a candidate for Holy Orders.

The Rev. Walter Maynew Sherwood, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Priesthood.

For exceptional and satisfactory reasons a dispensation of eight months' time was granted Mr. Sherwood. Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev. George HERBERT KINSOLVING, Assistant Bishop-elect of Texas. Consent was given to the election of an Assistant Bishop of Oregon, by reason of extent of territory,

On the 5th of December, 1892, Mr. HARRY LEOPOLD Teffreys, of Philadelphia, was recommended to the Bishop as a candidate for Holy Orders. Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Calvary Church, Bayonne, to mortgage their Church property to the

amount of \$1,500.

On the 18th of February, 1893, Mr. James Mason RAKER was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate. Permission was given St. Andrew's Parish, South Orange, to mortgage their property for \$7,500

instead of \$5,000 as before permitted. The Bishop was advised to consent to the formation of a new Parish in the Roseville district, the location to be afterwards determined. The Bishop was advised not to consent to the formation of an organized mission in the town of Rutherford. The Bishop was advised to consent to the formation of Grace Mission into a Parish to be known as Grace

Church, Town of Union.

On the 16th of May, 1893, Mr. Thurston Walker Challen was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Deacons. Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev. Frederick R. Graves, Missionary Bishop-elect of Shanghai, China, and of the Rev. John McKim, Missionary Bishop-elect of Jeddo, Japan. Consent was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Grace Church, Town of Union, to mortgage their

vacant lot for a sum not to exceed \$3,000.

Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of the Church of the Mediator, Edgewater, to mortgage their Rectory property for the sum of \$4,000. Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of the Church of the Holy Communion, Paterson, to readjust the mortgages on their Church property, giving new ones in place of the old, for a sum not to exceed \$26,-400, in the forms following: To the Paterson Mutual Building and Loan Association, \$12,000; to the Union Mutual Building and Loan Association, \$9,000; to Mr. Sydney Farrar, \$5,400. Consent was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Stephen's Church, Millburn, to sell a small portion of their Cemetery, as described in their petition, dated May 16th, 1893. Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Christ Church, Bloomfield, to sell their property as described in their written petition.

The Rev. JOHN KELLER moved that the Secretary be instructed to prepare new blanks for Parochial Reports for this new year, dated from May 16th, 1893, to April 30th, 1894, inclusive; and for each succeeding year, dated from May 1st to April 30th, inclusive.

Which was adopted.

The Rev. WILLIAM RICHMOND moved the adoption of the resolution appended to the Report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, viz.:

Resolved, That the amendment of Canon 6, of Title I, by the addition of a Section to be numbered V, as proposed in the Convention of 1892 (JOURNAL, p. 72), is un-

desirable and that the Committee be discharged from further consideration of the subject.

Mr. VAN HOVENBERG moved, as an amendment, that the vote be taken to-morrow morning.

Which amendment was lost.

Rev. Mr. RICHMOND's resolution was then adopted.

The Rev. Mr. BUTTERWORTH presented the following Report of the Committee on the Certificates of Lay Deputies:

The Committee on the Certificates of Lay Deputies report: That the Lay Deputies from Trinity Church, Hoboken, having been duly elected to represent the Parish in this Convention, the Certificate, through oversight, not having reached the Secretary, your Committee recommends that the Deputies so elected be admitted to all the privileges of Lay Deputies.

The report was adopted, and the Lay Deputies from Trinity Church, Hoboken, were received.

The Rev. GEORGE S. BENNITT moved the following:

Resolved, That the Secretaries of the Convention be empowered to consider and make such changes in the form of Parochial Reports as may be in conformity with the Canons, and may be approved by the Bishop.

The Rev. Dr. Webbe moved as an amendment that the words "A committee of three" be substituted for "the Secretaries of Convention." Which amendment was not adopted.

The resolution of Mr. BENNITT was then adopted.

On motion of the Rev. F. J. CLAYTON, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to prepare the blanks for Certificates of Lay Deputies so as to include space for Alternate Deputies.

Resolved, That subsection (5) of § II of Canon 6, Title I, be amended so as to read: It shall be the duty of the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of each Parish to prescribe a mode in which regular contributions may be made.

Which, on motion, was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

On motion of the Rev. Elmer S. Forbes:

Resolved, That a committee of five be appointed, which shall prepare and present to the next Convention a plan for the increase of the Episcopal Fund.

The Chair appointed the Committee as follows:

The Rev. L. S. Osborne, the Rev. F. B. Carter, Mr. Alfred Mills, Mr. Edwin A. Stevens, Mr. William M. Franklin.

The Rev. George S. Bennitt read the report of Christ Hospital, Jersey City. (See Appendix II.)

On motion of Mr. ALFRED A. VAN HOVENBERG, the following resolution was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons:

Resolved, That (2) § II of Canon 6, of Title I, of the Parish, be amended by striking out after the words "two Wardens" the words "who shall be communicants not under suspension," and by inserting after the words "as the Parish may be legally entitled to elect," the words "all of whom shall be male communicants of the Parish not under suspension."

The Rev. WILLIAM M. HUGHES, D.D., moved a reconsideration of the vote on the resolution of the report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons. (See p. 43), but afterwards withdrew his motion.

Mr. CORTLANDT PARKER then moved the following resolution:

Resolved, That it is hereby recommended to the Parishes connected with this Convention, to adopt at their next annual election the following manner of voting, viz.:

"The President of the meeting convened for such election shall first call for nominations, and as each thereof shall be made, tellers by him appointed shall write the names of those nominated, one under the other upon a sheet of paper which shall be provided by the Secretary or Clerk and lie on his table; said names to be written nearest to the lefthand side of said paper, leaving a sufficient margin at the right of the name of each candidate, or below, and between his name and that next in order, for voters to designate their choice as hereinafter directed. After five minutes, nominations shall be closed and so declared by the President, whereupon each voter shall vote by making a cross (x) upon said list opposite each name he may select, till he has voted for as many of such persons nominated as are to be chosen for the offices to be filled. Twenty minutes or more, if the President or. meeting shall direct, shall be given wherein to vote. At the expiration of such time the tellers shall proceed to count the crosses made beside each name placed on nomination, and the person or persons having a majority of all such shall be reported by said tellers and declared by said President to be elected."

Which was not adopted.

The Rev. John F. Butterworth for the Committee on Certificates of Lay Deputies reported as follows:

The Committee on Certificates of Lay Deputies report: That one of the Lay Deputies of Christ Church, Ridgewood, Mr. John A. Whittaker, being necessarily absent, we recommend that the name of Mr. James Alexander, the duly elected Alternate, be substituted for the same.

Which was adopted.

The Rev. John Keller moved that the Committee on State Legislation be requested to report on the propriety of omitting the names of certain defunct Parishes from the list of Parishes in union with the Convention.

Which was adopted.

On motion of the Rev. F. J. CLAYTON, the Convention adjourned until to-morrow at 9 A. M.

# Trinity Church, Newark, 9 A. M., May 17, 1893.

Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. L. S. OSBORNE and the Rev. F. A. SANBORN.

The Bishop took the chair and called the Convention to order.

The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

The Bishop then read the portion of his address relating to Diocesan Missions.

The Missionary business of the Diocese being the order of the day:

The Rev. WILLIAM R. JENVEY, Archdeacon of Jersey City, read his report to the Bishop, of the Missionary work in his Archdeaconry. (See Appendix to the Episcopal Address).

The Rev. MILLIDGE WALKER, Archdeacon of Newark, read his report to the Bishop of the Missionary work in his Archdeaconry. (See Appendix to the Episcopal Address).

The report of the Board of Missions was then read by its Secretary, the Rev. ALEXANDER MANN.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

The Board of Missions of the Diocese appointed by the Convention of last year reports as follows:

Five meetings of the Board have been held during the past Diocesan year.

Eleven Mission stations have been maintained.

Hamburgh and Vernon, in charge of the Rev. JOSEPH H. SMITH.

Belvidere and Knowlton, in charge of the Rev. Chas. Douglas.

Mendham, in charge of the Rev. Levi Johnston.

Arlington, in charge of the Rev. John Keller.

Washington and Oxford, in charge of the Rev. J. A. McCleary.

Ascension Parish, Jersey City, in charge of the Rev. JAMES CAMERON.

St. John's, Bayonne, in charge of the Rev. O. VALENTINE.

St. John's, West Hoboken, in charge of the Rev. George N. Mead.

St. Luke's, Paterson, in charge of the Rev. Thomas W. Nickerson, Jr.

St. Luke's, Phillipsburg, in charge of the Rev. CLAR-ENCE H. BEERS.

Stanhope, in charge of the Lay Reader, Mr. C. H. HAYES.

The following is the Treasurer's Report.

The amount which each Parish has contributed may be seen from the printed schedule which is in the hands of the Convention.

In accordance with the provisions of the Canon, the Board reports that the following Parishes and Missions have failed to contribute anything to the Missionary work of the Diocese during the past year.

The Treasurer has also informed the Board that, in order to pay the quarterly stipends, which are now due the missionaries, he needs \$450, and the Board recommends that this amount be raised now by personal pledges from the members of this Convention, so that we may begin the new Diocesan year free from debt.

And the Board would further recommend that the Convention should mark its sense of the importance of the Missionary work of the Diocese by devoting hereafter the whole of the second morning of the Convention to a consideration of that work as it may be set forth in the reports of the Bishop, the Archdeacons, the Treasurer, and the Missionaries themselves, who would thus have an opportunity of presenting their work and its needs to their brethren of the Clergy and Laity. Theoretically, we will all agree that the most important subject that comes before this Diocesan Convention is its missionary work. Let us, then, give some practical expression and form to that belief.

It is estimated that to carry on the missionary work of the Diocese even on its present limited lines, for the coming year, requires an appropriation of \$3,500. It is a mere pittance for this wealthy Diocese to raise. But the mortifying experience of the past warns us that to secure even this pittance will demand a more vigorous effort on the part of Clergy and Laity. A comparison of the amount raised during the past year for Diocesan Missions with

that of the year previous, shows a falling off of about \$450. That fact is its own best comment. It is plain that our people need to be roused to a livelier interest in Diocesan Missions, and to a deeper sense of their obligations to that work. And as one means towards securing that result, the Board would suggest to the Convention that the incoming Board of Missions be requested to print and issue to all the Parishes one or two weeks before the Sundays appointed for the Canonical Offerings for Missions, a Missionary leaflet, stating the amount of money necessary to be raised, the names of the Mission stations, and such other information regarding the Missionary work of the Diocese, as shall tend to promote among our people an intelligent interest in this most important work.

The Hon. Bradford L. Prince, Governor of New Mexico, the Secretary of the American Church Building Fund Commission, was introduced to the Convention by the Bishop, and addressed it on the subject of the Commission's work.

# On motion of the Rev. MILLIDGE WALKER, it was:

Resolved: That it is the sense of this Missionary Council that at least four thousand dollars (\$4,000) are needed for the sustentation of our Diocesan Missions for the current year, and that the Board of Missions is hereby authorized to base its appropriations on the expectation of receiving that sum; and furthermore, that the members of this Council pledge themselves to assist heartily in accomplishing this object.

The Rev. T. W. NICKERSON, Jr., moved the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Rules of Order be so amended that the whole of the morning of the second day of the session of the Convention be devoted to the consideration of Diocesan Missionary business.

The Rev. Benjamin Brewster offered the following amendment which was accepted by the mover of the resolution as a substitute:

Resolved, That Section III, of the fourth Rule of Order be amended so as to read: "Missionary Business and Addresses as arranged by the Board of Missions, to occupy the remainder of the morning session."

Which was not adopted.

The Rev. REEVE HOBBIE, by permission, addressed the Convention on the subject of his work among the colored people of Newark.

The election of a Board of Missions being in order, the Rev. Dr. BISHOP moved that the old Board be reelected *viva voce*, which was unanimously carried.

So the following constitute : Board of Missions for the ensuing year:

The election of the Standing Committee being in order, the Chair appointed as tellers for the Clerical vote the Rev. F. E. MORTIMER and Mr. WILLIAM M. FRANKLIN, and as tellers for the Lay vote the Rev. Edwin E. Butler and Mr. A. A. Van Hovenberg.

While the tellers were counting the vote, Mr. Al-FRED MILLS made a report of the Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund on the letter of the Rev. T. I. HOLCOMBE, which was referred to them, as follows:

The Trustees of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen, to whom was referred the communication addressed by the Rev. Theodore I. Holcombe to the Rev. Mr. Granberry, report that, in their opinion, it would be inexpedient to make any change in Title III, Canon 1.

This Canon deals with two separate funds.

First. Collections and donations not limited by the donor, received during the Conventional year—these are disposed of according to the directions of Section 3, as amended. The beneficiaries of this fund are called "special annuitants."

Second. The \$30,000 fund mentioned in Section 6, the interest of which is divided among a class of Clergymen known as "regular annuitants."

The Trustees are at liberty to appropriate the *first* of these funds to the relief of such clergymen disabled by age, accident or disease, as they may think proper, provided those clergymen are canonically connected with the Diocese and are otherwise qualified; the maximum sum which it may be lawful to pay them being determined by reference to their term of service. Whether any, and if any, what sum shall be so paid to any particular clergyman, rests in the discretion of the Trustees.

The \$30,000 fund stands on a different basis. The annuities payable out of this fund do not, in any degree, depend upon the discretion of the Trustees. Every Clergyman possessing the canonical qualifications, is entitled to share equally in the interest accruing therefrom. These qualifications are, in the words of the Canon, the following:

First. The clergyman must have reached the age of sixty-five years.

Second. He must have been canonically connected with the Diocese for the five years immediately preced-

ing his application for an annuity.

Third. He must have been, for at least five years of his last term of canonical residence, a settled minister of the Diocese, or a missionary duly appointed by the ecclesiastical authority.

This \$30,000 fund is held by the Trustees as a trust. and that trust is declared by the Canon. Contributions to this fund have been made, on the assumption that it would be devoted to the object specified, and there has been no reservation of a right to devote it to other objects. The right of the Convention to divert the income to a use differing from that to which it has already been devoted is open to very serious legal difficulties. If the use may be changed at all, it may be changed to any extent, and a fund contributed for one object may be devoted to an entirely different one. This is unjust to the contributors and impolitic. If it be within the power of the Convention to say that a clergyman with a salary of \$1,000 shall not share in the fund, it is equally within its power to say that a clergyman with a salary of \$500. shall not share in it. The age at which it shall be received may be changed indefinitely, and so one class of beneficiaries may participate in its benefits at one time, and another at another time. All certainty as to its destination is thus at an end.

It seems to the Trustees that every clergyman should be able to look forward with absolute confidence to a participation in the fund when he shall have brought himself within the terms of the trust. He will then look upon a participation in it as a matter of right; as a reward of faithful service, and not as a matter of charity. Legal complications will be avoided, and contributors to the increase of the fund will feel that their bounty will go in the channel marked out for it.

The Convention has unlimited control over the other fund, made up of collections and donations, and the disposition of that fund can be changed with the changing circumstances. This will give sufficient elasticity to the general scheme.

#### On motion it was

Resolved, That the Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund be discharged from the further consideration of the subject.

The tellers for the Clerical vote for the Standing Committee reported that the following were elected, viz.: The Rev. R. N. MERRITT, D.D., the Rev. WILLIAM WELLES HOLLEY, D.D., the Rev. WILLIAM R. JENVEY, the Rev. N. BARROWS.

The tellers for the Lay vote for the Standing Committee reported that the following were elected: Mr. Alfred Mills, Mr. Henry Hayes, Mr. Frederick W. Stevens, Mr. Edwin A. Stevens.

On motion, the election by the order of the Clergy was confirmed by the Laity.

On motion, the election by the order of the Laity was confirmed by the Clergy.

So the following constitute the Standing Committee of the Diocese:

The hour of I P. M. having arrived, the Convention took a recess of one hour.

#### TRINITY CHURCH, Newark, 2 P. M.

The Bishop called the Convention to order.

The Rev. James Cameron moved the following:

Resolved, That the present Board of Missions of this Convention is not responsible for the arrearages of salaries owing to the Missionaries by the convocations as organized under the former Canons of this Convention.

Mr. LIGHTHIPE moved as an amendment that the word "not" be stricken out,

The Rev. F. B. CARTER offered the following substitute:

Resolved, That the Treasurer of the Board of Missions ascertain the amounts, if any, due the Missionaries of this Diocese prior to the enactment of the present Missionary Canon, and that the amount subscribed this morning in excess of the deficiency of the Board be applied to the payment of such indebtedness.

Which was adopted.

The election of a Treasurer of the Diocese being in order, on motion, the ballot was dispensed with and Mr. Henry Hayes was elected by acclamation.

The Chair appointed as Auditing Committee, Mr. John I. Young and Mr. D. C. Wightman.

The election of a Registrar being in order, the

ballot was dispensed with, and Mr. D. SMITH WOOD was elected Registrar.

The Rev. WILLIAM RICHMOND, of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, made the following report:

#### REPORT No. 1.

#### COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND CANONS.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons respectfully report that they have had under consideration the amendment to sub-section [2] of § II of Canon 6, of Title I (printed slip belonging to page 21 of the Code) proposed and referred to them on the 16th inst.

The proposition is to amend by striking out the words "who shall be Communicants not under suspension" after the words "Two Wardens" (line 8 of [2]) and by inserting after the words "Entitled to elect" (line 11) the words "All of whom shall be male communicants of the Parish not under suspension," making the whole sentence read, "At such meeting the qualified voters of the Parish shall elect by a majority of votes cast, three Deputies and three Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, two Wardens, one of whom shall be called the Senior Warden and the other the Junior Warden, and such number of Vestrymen as the Parish may be legally entitled to elect, all of whom shall be male communicants of the Parish not under suspension."

The Canon, as at present in force, requires that the three Deputies and the three Alternate Deputies (Constitution, Art. 4, Sec. 4) and the Wardens shall be communicants. The amendment proposed requires that the Vestrymen also shall be communicants.

While the Committee recognize the principle expressed in the proposed amendment as right in itself and a prin-

ciple that it is desirable to follow when practicable, it is not thought that it is a moral principle in such sense that its infringement is morally wrong. In many cases, in weak rural Parishes, the number of communicants otherwise competent may be too small to allow the restriction proposed; and such Parishes, should the amendment be adopted, would be forced to relinquish their parochial organization and become missions—a result likely to be attended with disaster. This, among other considerations, is sufficient, in the opinion of the Committee, to make the proposed amendment, at the present time, inexpedient. Accordingly they recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the adoption of the proposed amendment to sub-section [2] of § II, of Canon 6, Title I, is undesirable, and that the Committee be discharged from further consideration of the subject.

A vote being taken on the resolution contained in this report, it was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. RICHMOND then presented the following:

#### REPORT No. 2.

#### COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND CANONS.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons respectfully report that they have had under consideration the amendment to Canon 6 of Title I (printed slip belonging to page 21 of the Code) referred to them on the 16th inst. as proposed by the Reverend, the Rector of Grace Church, Jersey City:

Resolved, That sub-section [5] of § II, of Canon 6, of Title I, be amended so as to read: "It shall be the duty of the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of each Parish to prescribe a mode in which regular contributions may be made."

It is understood that this amendment, striking out all but the last sentence of the sub-section, was proposed on the ground that the sub-section as it stands is nugatory, not giving to communicants any privilege that they do not already possess as baptized persons under the two preceding sub-sections.

A careful examination of the Canon as now in force shows that by sub-section [3] in Parishes in the Church of which pews are rented, any baptized male with certain specified qualifications shall be eligible to office or entitled to vote who is the holder of a sitting and has paid the rent thereon. Under this sub-section no one but a pewholder can vote or hold office.

By sub-section [4], in Free Churches, any baptized male with certain specified qualifications, who is a regular contributor to the current expenses of the Parish and has registered at least six months before the election, may vote and hold office.

Should the proposed amendment be adopted, striking out all but the last sentence of sub-section [5] eligibility to office and the privilege of voting will be restricted to baptized persons (including, of course, communicants), fulfilling the requirements of sub-sections [3] and [4].

Sub-section [5], as at present in force, however, extends the franchise and eligibility to office, under certain specified conditions, to a certain class of communicants who would not have such rights under sub-sections [3] and [4]. It affects communicants who are not pew-

holders in Churches in which all or some of the pews are rented.

While it provides against the importation of voters who are not bona fide communicants of the Parish, it likewise provides that bona fide communicants of the Parish having certain other specified qualifications shall be eligible to office and entitled to vote if they be regular contributors to the current expenses of the Parish, according to a mode adopted therein, and makes it the duty of the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of each Parish to prescribe such mode.

It will be seen that under this sub-section the corporation of a Parish in which some or all of the pews are rented may prescribe a mode of regular contributions, by which certain communicants shall be eligible to office and entitled to vote who could not have such privileges under sub-sections [3] and [4]. They may, e.g., prescribe as such mode, (a) the payments of pew rents, or (b) what is known as the envelope system, at the option of Parishioners.

The sub-section, therefore, provides, at the discretion of the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen, an undoubted extension of privilege to certain communicants in Parishes in which the pews are rented and in Parishes in which a combination of the pew-rent system and the free-church system prevails.

Other objections may, perhaps, be found to the subsection now under consideration; but so far as concerns the objection that it is nugatory, it is thought that such objection has been met, and that it is undesirable to disfranchise those communicants to whom the franchise has been extended by striking out the words by which it is extended.

The Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the amendment to sub-section [5] of § II.

of Canon 6, of Title I, referred on the 16th inst. to the Committee on Constitution and Canons is undesirable, and that the committee be discharged from further consideration of the subject.

By order of the Committee,

The Rev. Edwin A. White presented a Minority Report, as follows:

The undersigned, member of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, is unable to unite in the Report of the majority of the Committee on the Resolution referred to them amending sub-section [5] of § II of Canon 6, of Title I, Of the Parish.

While concurring in the opinion of the majority that certain communicants, not pewholders, should be eligible to vote at Parish elections, I do not concur with them in believing that said sub-section is best adapted to accomplish such purpose. On the contrary, I believe that this subsection is impracticable and calculated to defeat the very purpose it seems to desire by means of its varied and numerous restrictive clauses, which are confusing and unintelligible to the average mind and incapable of exact and certain interpretation. For these reasons and because I am convinced that Parish elections held under this Canon as it now stands may, many of them, be declared illegal, therefore, I recommend the adoption of the following resolution introduced by the Rev. Mr. Bennitt and referred to this Committee:

Resolved, That sub-section [5] § II of Canon 6, of Title I, Of the Parish be amended so as to read, "It shall be the duty of the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of each Parish to prescribe a mode in which regular contributions may be made."

EDWIN A. WHITE.

The Rev. GEORGE S. BENNITT moved that the Minority Report be substituted for the Majority Report.

Which was carried.

The vote was then taken on the resolution of the Minority Report, and it was adopted.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. SCHUYLER, it was

Resolved, That the Treasurer be authorized and directed to pay to the Secretary of the Convention the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) annually for his services.

The Rev. E. A. WHITE offered the following as an amendment to § II, Canon 6, Title I.

In all churches male communicants, of full age, not under suspension, shall be eligible to office and entitled to vote at any election, provided they (1) have been for at least six calendar months next before said election regular contributors to the current expenses of the Parish holding the election, and (2) have been worshippers therein for at least the same period.

Which, on motion, was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Rev. John S. Miller moved the following:

Resolved, That the Committee on Rules of Order be instructed to report to the next Convention such changes in the Rules of Order as may be necessary to provide:

(1) That nominations of Standing Committee, of Deputies to the General Convention and of such officers of the Convention as are to be elected on the second day

of the session of the Convention, be made on the first day. (2) That the election of the same be held simultaneously on the second day immediately after the transaction of the Missionary business of the Convention. And (3) That the voting shall be by the use of one ballot printed by authority of the Convention, containing the names of all persons nominated, with the office for which they may be nominated clearly indicated; each voter to indicate his choice by a mark placed over against the names of those persons for whom he wishes to vote (or by erasing the names of those for whom he does not vote), or by writing the names of any persons not thus nominated under such head as he desires.

Which was adopted.

On motion of the Rev. W. R. JENVEY, it was

Resolved, That the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund be instructed to remit the interest on the Bond of St. John's Church, Bayonne, up to April 1, 1893.

The Secretary read the report of the Committee on Finance.

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

They recommend that an assessment be made for the current year of seven (7) per cent. on the present salaries of the Clergy for paying the Bishop's salary, upon all Parishes which have not given bonds to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund; and of two and one half (2½) per cent. on the salaries for Convention expenses and other liabilities.

P. EDWARDS JOHNSON, GEORGE S. WYLIE, HENRY HAYES. Which was adopted.

On motion of Mr. HENRY HAYES the amount due the Episcopal Fund from the Parish of the Holy Communion, Paterson, to April 1, 1893, was remitted.

The Rev. F. B. REAZOR presented the report of the Committee appointed at the last Convention to consider that part of the Bishop's address which related to the Hospital of St. Barnabas. (See Appendix.)

On motion of the Rev. F. J. CLAYTON, it was

Resolved, That the Treasurer of the Diocese be authorized and directed to pay to the Bishop's Secretary and Chaplain the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) for the Convention year 1893-4.

The Rev. WILLIAM RICHMOND offered the following and moved that it be referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons:

Proposed amendment of Canon 3, of Title III, (Code, p. 36).

Resolved, That Canon 3, of Title III, be amended by adding:

§ III. All new Canons and amendments to Canons shall take effect on the first day of September following the adoption thereof, unless it be otherwise ordered by the Convention.

If the above be accepted by the Committee its favorable report should be accompanied by the following resolution:

Resolved, That § III, of Canon 3, of Title III, take effect immediately.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. WEBBE, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary have printed 700 copies of the JOURNAL of Convention.

On motion of the Rev. GEORGE M. CHRISTIAN, it was

Resolved, That this Convention elect two members, a Clergyman and a Layman, of the Missionary Council, to be held in San Francisco.

The Chair appointed as tellers for the Clerical vote the Rev. Edwin E. Butler and Mr. P. E. Johnson, and as tellers for the Lay vote the Rev. T. W. Nickerson, Jr., and Mr. William M. Franklin.

Nominations were made as follows:

The Rev. L. S. OSBORNE and the Rev. F. B. REAZOR, Mr. HENRY HAVES and Mr. ALFRED A. VAN HOVENBERG.

The ballots were cast and the tellers retired to count the votes.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. HUGHES, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be authorized to have printed a new edition of the Constitution and Code of Canons of the Diocese, and to draw on the Treasurer for the same.

### On motion of Mr. ALFRED MILLS, it was

Resolved, That the same, if published, be interleaved with blank pages.

## On motion of Mr. A. A. VAN HOVENBERG, it was

Resolved, That the thanks of the Convention are hereby tendered to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Trinity Church, Newark, for the use of the Church and for coveniences afforded for the transaction of business; and also to the Woman's Auxiliary Society of Trinity Parish and to the Daughters of the Church.

#### On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Treasurer of the Convention be ordered to pay the Sexton of this Church the usual sum for his services.

## On motion of the Rev. MILLIDGE WALKER, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to print sufficient copies of the report of the Committee on the Hospital of St. Barnabas, and that it be distributed to the Rectors of Parishes in the Archdeaconry of Newark.

# The Rev. John Keller made the following report:

The Committee on Unfinished Business report that upon a review of the Journals of 1892 and of this Convention, they find that reports may be expected from Committees appointed or continued by the last Convention, upon the following subjects: "Episcopal Residence," and "State Legislation."

The tellers on the vote for Members of the Missionary Council reported that the Rev. L. S. OSBORNE and Mr. HENRY HAYES had each received a majority of the votes cast and were elected.

The Rev. George S. Bennitt moved the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Rev. Spencer M. Rice, D.D., is entitled, according to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese, to a seat and vote in this Convention.

The Rev. Mr. RICHMOND proposed as an amendment, which was accepted by Mr. BENNITT:

That the right of the Rev. Dr. Rick to a seat and vote in this Convention be referred to the Committee on the Rights of Clerical Members with instructions to report immediately.

Which was adopted.

The Committee on the Rights of Clerical Members reported through the Rev. Mr. JENVEY the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Rev. Spencer M. Rice, D.D., is entitled to a seat and vote in this Convention.

Which report was adopted.

On motion of the Rev. Mr. JENVEY, it was

Resolved, That after the reading of the minutes and the usual devotions, the Convention adjourn sine die.

#### 74 JOURNAL OF THE NINETEENTH CONVENTION.

The minutes of this day's session were read and approved.

After the singing of a hymn and prayer, and the benediction by the Bishop, the Convention adjourned sine die.

## FOURTEENTH ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

# Rt. Rev. Thomas A. Starkey, D.D.

BISHOP OF THE DIOGESE.

#### BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND LAITY:

I greet you once more at the annual meeting of our Diocesan Council with my best wishes for your individual prosperity and happiness, and invoke in your behalf the grace and benediction of our LORD JESUS CHRIST.

The past year has been, so far as our Diocesan affairs are concerned, a quiet but progressive one, with satisfactory indications in most of the Parishes and Missions of external, and, let us hope, spiritual prosperity.

With all the growth in wealth, industry and population, that characterizes this Northern portion of our State, it is not without significance that our communicants increase in a ratio much larger than that of the general population. It is, of course, to be expected that as the intelligence which is born of settled and

conservative habits and general culture increases, the subjects of it will be more or less attracted to the Church. To a certain extent, this moulding and recasting of ideas is going on everywhere in the country, but the process is inevitably a slow one. It is well, perhaps, for us all to remember that the battle for Divinely revealed truth is being always fought on a field where generalship counts for more than numbers, and where the contestants are not personal enemies, but are often very warm and attached friends.

Three of our Bishops have passed away from us quite recently. The Right Reverend Dr. KIP, for so many years the Bishop of California, a man of high culture and of dignified and courtly bearing, was a valued friend of mine in days long gone by. He was better fitted by nature and training for the life of an old than for the crude and changing ways of a new Those who knew him well always recommunity. cognized the high and conscientious sense of duty and the warm and even tender sympathy for all who needed it, which were far more a part of himself than the conventionalism of manner which was more apparent to people generally. Some of Bishop Kip's works, notably his "Double Witness of the Church," have been and are still of great value to those whose duty or taste inclines them to a study of the Church and her doctrines.

On the 23d of January, 1893, the Right Reverend Dr. Brooks, Bishop of Massachusetts, died suddenly and unexpectedly after a brief Episcopate of less than sixteen months. The history of these months and of the few immediately preceding them give a pathetic interest to this sudden ending of a life both strong and tender, which had attracted irresistibly the public attention and regard; a feeling and interest which I am sure are shared by every manly and generous heart and which are by no means confined to those who yielded more than others did to the indefinable charm of a personality, which not only vitalized every thing he said or did, but imparted its peculiar grace and power especially to his rare gift of eloquence.

The Right Reverend Dr. BISSELL, Bishop of Vermont, passed away on the 14th of May, 1893, at the advanced age of seventy-nine years. He was a man of singularly quiet and unobtrusive manners, and was honored and respected by all who knew him. Those Northern Dioceses present a hard field for the Church to sow her seed in. Dr. BISSELL'S life there illustrated, perhaps better than that of most men, the strength that may often be found in quietness.

No less than four of our Diocesan Clergy have died since our last meeting. On the 28th of May, 1892, the Reverend J. N. Stansbury, B.D., for so many years Rector of Christ Church in Newark, and Dean of the Convocation, died after a lingering illness borne with the singular and trustful patience which was a part of himself. No other Clergyman in the Diocese besides myself knew its affairs so intimately as Dean Stansbury; no other shared my work, its hopes and anxieties, with so unselfish a devotion as he. The Church of Christ, for which alone he seemed at times to think and work and live, had little to give him in the way of temporal rewards, unless indeed it were the high esteem and honor in which men universally held

him. But for much beyond this our friend cared little in his unselfish faith.

On January 23d of this present year the Reverend WILLIAM HALL, a young Priest of the Diocese, who had for a year or more been engaged in work at St. Augustine's Chapel in New York, passed away after a short illness. He was a true and faithful Clergyman.

On the 22d of the following month, viz.: February, the Reverend STEPHEN H. BATTIN, who was, I believe, at three several times Rector of Christ Church, in Jersey City, died at the age of seventy-eight or seventy-nine years. He had resigned the Parish a year or two before and at the time of his death had still a quasi connection with it. Mr. Battin had purchased a lot in the near neighborhood of the Church a year before and erected on it a brick building of considerable size and some architectural merit, which he presented to the Parish. It is understood that his will provided for the ultimate liquidation of all unsettled claims against the building, and also for some partial endowment. It was a well considered and generous gift, and I think it is only right to say that the honor and credit of making it are shared with her father by the only remaining member of his family, who has entered heartily and religiously into the spirit which first devised and then carried out so beneficent a purpose.

On Easter Even of this year, the Reverend JOHN F. POTTER, M. D., died suddenly at Pompton, to which place he had removed only three weeks before to become Rector of the Parish. It was a strange and sad ending of a lonely life that his grave should be in a

place which he had never visited until he went to die there.

An event in our Church history, too notable to be left untouched in an address like this, is the completion of the revised Prayer Book and Book of Offices by the General Convention which met in Baltimore last October. The original aim of the revision, as expressed by the clergyman who introduced the subject to the attention of the Church, was "enrichment and flexibility." The last has been thoroughly accomplished; and in the accomplishment of flexibility consists most of the enrichment. In a word, added or changed rubrics have imparted a new vitality to what before was bound down and tied into comparative lifelessness. The division of services, now legal and general, brings out in each the life and charm which are its own, and offends no reasonable prejudice. It is surprising, when one puts it to the test of experiment, what electric bells these rubrics sometimes are, opening that which was shut before and effecting by a single touch what years of effort would not have been able to secure in the way of changed language and arrangement. Thus a single rubric permits the omission of the Decalogue in the Communion Office on occasion, and this with the saying or singing of the Kyries at the end of the Summary of the Law, goes far to restore for those who wish it, the earlier portion of the Office as it is found in the First Book of Edward. It is something to be grateful for that in all this no one is offended, but that all are content and happy in the possession and use of the common heritage.

The General Convention, as most of you will remember, established five new Missionary Jurisdictions in what is often called the Home Field. Of these, four are now set apart, and Bishops have been consecrated for them who are now engaged in discharging to the best of their ability the difficult and responsible duties which have been laid upon them.

When a meeting of the house of Bishops, which had been especially called for March 1st, assembled in New York, its members, for reasons which they regarded as controlling, unanimously deferred the selection of a Missionary Bishop for the Peninsula of Northern Michigan until the next meeting of the General Convention. The house at the same time nominated Missionary Bishops for Shanghai in China, and Yeddo in Japan. The foreign field presents no new claim upon us except as it calls for a larger liberality and a warmer interest.

But in the four new Missionary Jurisdictions at Home there is much to induce thought and awaken the sense of responsibility.

I have said awaken the sense; for the responsibility itself, whether for the present or the future, can hardly be magnified. It is a peculiarity of our position among Christian and civilized nations, that almost our entire country is, in a sense, missionary ground. Is this fact lost sight of by Christian Churchmen in the splendor of our success as a Nation and the boundless increase of that material wealth, in the possession and increase of which we already outstrip all other Peoples? One could not, if he would, refuse all allusion to that great celebration in Chicago which commemorates the four

hundredth anniversary of the discovery of this Western Continent; nor in alluding to it would it be in good taste, even were it possible, by any ill-timed suggestion to dim the brightness of so grand an occasion. Nevertheless, to the mind of the earnest believer, the very picture of the greatness and the growth suggests a responsibility commensurate with the greatness; and one can scarcely refrain from asking himself at times. whether the Home Field, so wide-spread and filling up so rapidly with uncongenial and heterogeneous populations, does not, at least for the present, and will not for some time to come, far over-tax the Christian ability of Churchmen to meet and supply its religious needs. Certainly, the greatness of the future of this people (pictured so vividly at Chicago), a picture which with all its high coloring is so likely to be realized, suggests a moral as well as a political power growing up between these oceans, which must make itself felt in the future for good or for evil over the whole world and throughout, who can tell, how many generations. In view of such a future, and the preparing religiously to meet it, the gifts of our optimistic and self-indulgent people are painfully small in behalf of Church extension at Home. It is a comfort to know that our own are at least increasing. The contributions of this Diocese to Domestic and Foreign Missions are really very much better now than they have been in past times. Certain Parishes are conspicuously faithful in this direction, and I cannot urge with too entire and serious an earnestness the other Parishes of the Diocese to emulate their example in this regard.

As a department of this work, acknowledged and accepted by the Board of Missions as such, and in close alliance with it, I commend once more to you the American Church Building Fund Commission. Its greater usefulness in the future must depend largely upon what our people now allow it to become. With larger means will result a lower rate of interest and even grants of money where such are really needed and will not be abused by those who receive them.

#### THE DIOCESE.

Within our own limits the signs of healthy growth have been encouraging during the year. Corner-stones of two churches have been laid, that of St. Luke's, Paterson, by Archdeacon Jenvey, on June 18th, 1802, and that of St. Andrew's, in South Orange, by myself, on St. Andrew's Day of the same year. Two churches have been consecrated. Two new churches have been built and opened for public worship; another is in process of construction; and two others have been greatly enlarged and beautified. Four new Parishes have been erected, three of them from Missions already existing, whose condition seemed to justify what I am always slow to encourage or consent to. where there is not good reason to believe that a Mission in becoming independent will be also self-supporting in the future.

St. Luke's Church, in Montclair, was consecrated on December 20th, 1892. Thirteen years before, the Parish had been threatened with extinction in consequence of a very heavy debt. It possesses now one of the largest and best stone churches in the Diocese, and is preparing to put up on the church grounds a Parish building equally substantial. This Parish is free from all indebtedness.

On the 25th of April, 1893, I had the pleasure of consecrating Trinity Church, Totowa, Paterson. This Church was established as a Mission about thirteen years ago. Its congregation is composed entirely of the working class, yet it has always maintained and supported its own services. There is no debt.

St. Luke's Mission Church, Paterson, whose cornerstone was laid in the early summer, has since been finished and opened for services. It is served by a Lay Reader under the direction of the Rector of St. Paul's Church, Paterson, and the attendance at the services is said to be encouraging.

On November 15th, 1892, I held an opening service in the new Christ Church, Jersey City, built for the use of that Parish by the late Reverend S. H. BATTIN, formerly its Rector. The lot and building have cost together between forty and fifty thousand dollars. The Church will seat about five hundred persons. It is substantially constructed and fully and handsomely furnished. The arrangements for the rendering of the service by a vested choir are ample and very appropriate in character.

On November 22d, the Church of the Holy Communion, South Orange, was reopened after enlargement by the addition of aisles to the original nave. This has nearly or quite doubled its former seating capacity. I may add that, contrary to fears entertained

by some that such an enlargement might destroy the harmony of its proportions, the church building is really improved in appearance by the change. Of course its prospective usefulness is doubled to the great happiness of the earnest Rector. I cannot express too strongly my sense of the good work accomplished by Mr. Brewster during his brief Rectorship of this Parish.

On April 2d, 1893, in my visitation of Christ Church, Hackensack, I found there an enlarged and completed Church with a handsome façade and a fine tower containing a chime of fifteen bells. The Church now accommodates five hundred people and is one of the most completely supplied Parishes in the Diocese. This is the more remarkable as the original and much of the present population of the place, as of the Passaic and Hackensack valleys generally, however intelligent, had no inclination toward the Church or her services, but rather the contrary.

Another new Church now in process of construction and to be finished in the course of the summer is St. Andrew's in South Orange. The nave, which it is believed will suffice for present needs, is designed to accommodate about three hundred persons and is built of stone in good architectural style. The new Parish which has resulted so speedily in the securing of a large and valuable lot of ground and the partial crection of what will be a really good building was begun a little more than a year ago as a Mission by the Reverend ALEXANDER MANN. To his unwearied exertions and the zeal of a few others, especially of two ladies who gave up their drawing room for the Mission

services—for months continuously—the success under GoD of this venture of faith is due. These, one and all, command and receive my heartfelt gratitude.

### NEW PARISHES.

Grace Church Mission, Union Hill, and Trinity Church Mission, Totowa, Paterson, have within a few weeks become organized Parishes; the former with about one hundred and fifty, and the latter with more than two hundred communicants. The Union Hill Church, or Grace Church, Town of Union, as its legal title runs, owns a neat and churchly frame building placed in the midst of a populous and rapidly growing district, occupied chiefly by the families of working people. The Vestry and congregation have already in hand a portion of a fund for the erection of a Rectory.

The third Parish created this year from a Mission is St. Andrew's, South Orange, above referred to, whose organization was necessary in order to secure possession in fee simple of the very valuable lot of ground upon which the new Church stands.

The fourth Parish organized is St. Thomas', north of the railroad crossing in the Roseville district of Newark.

I do not think it would be quite gracious if I did not in this place express my warm sense of the liberality which has led a layman of large means to improve and adorn with costly furnishings the interior of the church at Madison; and which has led another layman, as a sacred memorial to one loved and taken away, to do a similar office with like liberality for the little Mission Church at Mendham.

There are other indications of new life and interest. which I might refer to in detail were there time to doso, and as it is, there are two or three which I may not. wholly pass by. In Franklin, or Nutley as it is now called, a large lot in a commanding position has been. presented to the Parish and a fine rectory built upon. it. The new church must follow before long. Passaic, for years so sluggish and inert, they are already preparing to erect a new and fine church, tobe finished, I hope, this Summer; and I may add that. the congregation there has more than doubled in numbers. At Upper Montclair, interior changes have been made in their church building at no little cost and with singularly good taste, so as to render its small stone church one of the most attractive in the Diocese. For such signs of life, reviving or constant, we offer to God the tribute of our gratitude.

This hurried review of Diocesan growth and interest by no means exhausts the material in my possession. But I must not weary you. I should be glad to tell you not so much of great as of small things; of little pains or losses; of brave strugglings for a life in the Church that is painfully and hardly maintained; of the consultings together of little groups at work here and there in the corners of this, as indeed of every Diocese, who are glad and thankful for the occasional bits of good fortune, which are to them so great, and would be to most of you so small. Perhaps the Archdeacons will tell you of these things. For myself, I confess that in things ecclesiastical and spiritual, while by no means under-valuing, but on the contrary esteeming most highly, external things which are intrinsically good, Life

has always seemed so much more than meat, and the Body than raiment. The Divine Master's word to His church, Lo, I am with you always, ever suggests to my mind a presence not only of blessing but of inspection and judgment; and I think of these blended things in thinking of His presence which I never doubt-Love and Judgment. The Great Physician with that unbroken Presence testing to His people the healthy circulation of His own Life of unselfish Love; laying His Head, as it were upon the breasts of those who call themselves His: hearing how the heart beats and judging according to His own proclaimed rule of spiritual life, namely, That as we are all baptized into One Body so we are all members one with another; and whether one member suffers all the members suffer with it: for that we are made in Holy Baptism by the Spirit the Body of Christ and members in particular.

The segregation of Christians into Parish organizations no doubt promotes a tendency to Parochial selfishness and individualism; but it obtained so early in the history of the Church that it may be accepted, as so many other things of which complaint is made may well be accepted, as the necessary outcome of a long experience where benefits are greater and more valuable than its defaults are injurious. Nevertheless the tendency just alluded to is present and should be understood and opposed and controlled by all of us. We should never forget that the Diocese is the Unit in Church life.

Another danger which I refer to because it is special rather than general and of more interest to us than to some others, is the occasional tendency in well-to-do

and isolated suburban Parishes and congregations to become unconsciously mere religious coteries, and so to lapse into a condition of spiritual apathy and torpor. Of course the cause of this is originally the spirit of worldliness, which, in this day, allies itself so easily with a religious profession. The evil would be largely remedied if congregations would select not merely nominal communicants but men of earnest religious convictions for the Wardens and Vestrymen of their Parishes; for although to these bodies is given the charge of the temporalities only, no one needs to be told how paralyzing an influence a body of worldly Vestrymen can exert over the spiritual life and interests of a congregation. On the other hand the aid extended to a Rector by a body of religious, Churchly, and intelligent Vestrymen cannot be overstated. His personal power for good is enhanced and made more effectual. The entire Diocese feels the happy and helpful influence, and the only surprising thing is, that public sentiment within the Church does not compel such a result, the need of which is recognized by every thoughtful person whose attention has been at any time directed to the subject.

Let me, before concluding this address, once more endeavor to emphasize the importance of a united interest on the part of all in the work of those Diocesan charities which are at once the signs and the promoters of our religious and organic life. I refer to the hospitals and other agencies which exert so beneficent an influence not only upon their immediate beneficiaries, but indirectly and in a compensative way upon the Church; enhancing the respect which men always feel

for power, and so for the Church which has and exerts the power to do what she professes to believe in. These hospitals need and should receive benefactions in the way of endowment in sums small or large from those who have the ability to make them. To the Guild of St. Barnabas and the other associations in Diocese or Parish which have done so much to make the work of the hospitals effective, I give my thanks and benediction. And I again appeal to all good people who love their Church and its work in behalf of the House of the Good Shepherd and of St. Katharine's Home. These charities have no doubt a number of influential friends and supporters. I would, however, by referring to them, in this place and at this time, seek to keep the knowledge of them before the entire people of this Church; that their good work may speak for the Church's life, and not merely represent the generosity and devotion of a few of its members.

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese has attained such strength that it scarcely needs any appeal from me. The work has grown into the annual value of thousands of dollars, and its interest reaches into the remote Parishes and even Missions of the Diocese. What factors in our life of spiritual growth such things are or might be! Not only do they provide lessons and exercises in the religious activity without which men's life of faith must weaken and die, but they are besides influential promoters of unity and a kindly judgment of each other, among those who enter heartily into their work and associate lovingly together in the efforts to make it successful.

#### MISSIONS.

As my custom has been in recent years, I shall detain you but a few minutes with the missionary portion of the address as the subject will be treated in detail by the Archdeacons. As you have already been informed, three of our Missions, viz.: Trinity, Paterson; Grace, Union; and St. Andrew's South Orange; have become Parishes within the year. They are self-sustaining and have indeed never asked anything in the way of support from the Diocese.

Within a month or two, Trinity Church, Arlington, has removed the debt on its Church lot amounting to eight hundred dollars. The congregations are good, averaging fifty or sixty at a service, and the communicants number about one hundred. These are generally in very moderate circumstances, but they work and give freely as their means permit. The grounds around the Church are being now graded and beautified.

St. Albans' Mission, Newark, is without a minister in charge at present. Services have been kept up during the interregnum, and the small but earnest body of worshippers keep well and heartily together. I owe very much to Archdeacon Walker for his unwearied interest in this Mission, especially since the resignation of the Missionary on Ash Wednesday last added so seriously to our anxiety on its behalf.

Epiphany Mission, Allendale, pays for its own clerical services. This Mission (originated and carried on for years by a layman) was for most of that time a very small speck indeed on our ecclesiastical map; but it has

cost the Diocese nothing and bids fair to become in time a self-supporting Parish.

The Mission at Hillsdale, now under the charge of Rev. Mr. Ladd, Rector at Norwood, was also self-originated. It is weak as yet in numbers, but the people are zealous. It has just succeeded in clearing off the remainder of debt from its very modest property.

The other Missions of the Diocese you are more familiar with. I leave the presentation of their interests and an account of them generally to the Archdeacons, for whose unselfish devotion to the interests committed to them I cannot speak in words of too high praise.

# Reports

I have received the following reports from the Reverend, the Archdeacons of the two Archdeaconries:

# ARCHDEACONRY OF NEWARK.

To the Right Reverend Thomas A. Starkey, D.D., Bishop of Newark:

Owing to the fact that for the most part the Missions of this Archdeaconry are situated in small country towns where there is little or no increase of population, we cannot reasonably expect any rapid growth; nevertheless a careful survey of the field shows much to encourage us in the prosecution of the work.

In spite of all discouragements there is considerable growth in our Missions.

Looking at the work from the barest utilitarian point of view, the Church in this Archdeaconry is receiving a large return for all that she gives for the sustentation of her Missions. In no Parishes of the Diocese is more work done and more souls ministered unto at so small an expenditure of money. This is the fact, but we find in it nothing to be proud of. That we have devoted self-denying Missionaries who are doing a grand work on semistarvation salaries is no ground for self-congratulation on our part as the result of an economical administration.

In the nine aided Parishes and Missions of this Archdeaconry there is church property to the value of fortyfive thousand dollars. Connected with these there are about nine hundred and fifty-three individuals—three hundred and seventy-two communicants; five hundred and forty-eight Sunday-school teachers and scholars. By these statistics we observe that the united strength of these Missions is fully equal to that of the average strong self-supporting Parish. The cost to the Diocese of carrying on this important work is only about two thousand dollars a year, an almost insignificant sum compared with the amount of work accomplished. This meagre appropriation enables the six priests engaged to keep body and soul together; I would not venture to say that it furnishes them a living. Thanks are due to our energetic branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in helping to alleviate some of the burdens of this strained situation.

In viewing the various stations in detail we find many points of encouragement. It is exceedingly gratifying to report a decided growth in Trinity Mission, Arlington. Through the persevering efforts of the faithful Missionary the entire indebtedness (\$800) of that promising Mission has been removed.

At Belvidere and Knowlton faithful work is being done, though, of course, the gain in numbers is small. Through the energy of the Missionary the Rectory at Belvidere has been put in thorough repair, a new roof having been laid on and the exterior of the house painted. For some time past two young ladies, communicants of St. James' Church, Knowlton, have conducted a very successful Sunday-school at the Delaware Water Gap, New Jersey side. It is the earnest wish of the Missionary to secure means to provide a Lay Reader for morning services at Knowlton during the summer months. Any contributions for that object will be gladly received.

Patient continuance in well doing best characterizes the work in the Missions at Hamburgh and Vernon. Many a city Parish fails to show such a record of frequent services as that of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Hamburgh. Here the daily offices of the Prayer Book are always said to the untold blessing of its faithful members.

At Mendham, the entire interior of the Church is being restored as a memorial.

At Phillipsburgh, notwithstanding the great discouragement of the first half of the year, owing to the failure to secure a Rector, yet since January, when the Rev. C. H. Beers took charge, the progress has well nigh compensated for the delay. Here, perhaps, is the most important work in this Archdeaconry—a Parish, which, without doubt, under its present management will soon become self-supporting.

Considerable increase is noted in St. Peters' Mission, Washington. Situated in a thriving town, this work has evidently taken root and grows with the place. Proof of this may be seen in the Parochial report of the Missionary, viz.: fourteen baptisms, twelve confirmations, and a total gain of fourteen communicants. Our active Missionary here also ministers every Sunday, to a congregation in the neighboring town of Oxford, four miles distant.

The Lay Reader at Christ Church, Stanhope, reports two hundred and seven individuals connected with that Mission, twenty-six baptisms, three of which were of adults, and a Sunday-school of seventy scholars. Through the kindness of the Rector of St. John's Church, Dover, the Mission enjoys a celebration of the Holy Communion at least once a month, and as often in addition as opportunity permits, in all twenty-three times during the past year.

I wish particularly to mention that we are also indebted to the Rector of St. John's Church, Dover, for the main tenance of services during the summer months of last year, in the Chapel on the grounds of Hotel Breslin, Lake Hopatcong. Provision should be made for the renewal of these services during the coming season without adding to our earnest brother's already burdensome duties.

With an active Priest in charge at Stanhope, assisted by a Lay Reader, services could be maintained there, at Landing and at Breslin, with great benefit to our work in that region.

St. Alban's Mission, Newark, while not one of our Diocesan Missions in the technical sense of the word, has been placed by the Bishop in the charge of the Archdeacon. This Mission, organized and maintained by the Bishop with the assistance of the Laymen's Association, has prospered during the eighteen months of its existence.

Notwithstanding the discouraging fact that for nearly three months past it has not had the ministrations of a Priest-in-charge, yet through the faithful efforts of a Lay Reader and the kind assistance of several of our city Clergy, services have been regularly maintained and no loss incurred. A prosperous Sunday-school of seventy scholars is in successful operation and a well-trained choir of men and boys is doing good work.

The Laymen's Association has secured as a site for a proposed chapel, five city lots on the corner of Thirteenth Avenue and Eighth Street, a most central and eligible situation and it is most earnestly hoped that means may be forthcoming, in the near future, to erect thereon a suitable and attractive Chapel.

# THE ARCHDEACONRY OF JERSEY CITY.

To the Right Reverend T. A. Starkey, D.D., Bishop of Newark:

The Mission work in this Archdeaconry continues to be of the most encouraging character.

Grace Mission, Town of Union, after its year of independent and sturdy work, has earned for itself a higher degree, and is now a Parish. It will not be mentioned hereafter in these reports.

Trinity Mission, Hillsdale, is now entirely out of debt. It began the year with a mortgaged indebtedness of \$400. The faithful people of the Mission, following the lead of the Rev. Mr. Ladd, did what they could, and it was a great deal. Friends on the outside came to their help; the entire amount has been raised and the Mission stands free. The Archdeacon is greatly indebted to Drs. Holley, Merritt, Hughes and Stoddard, and to Messrs. Reazor, Christian and Osborne for generous contributions. The time has come when the Mission must go forward, purchase a better site and build a better building. This Mission has always been self-supporting. Nearly \$1,200, all told, has been raised in the past year.

The Church of the Ascension, Jersey City, continues its progressive and remarkable work.

Since my last report an old street assessment of \$342, which came to the present Missionary as a legacy from the past, has been paid, the interest on the \$5,000 mortgage met, a beautiful brass lectern received as a memorial, a brass cover placed upon the font, and many other things have been given and done. The offerings of the Mission

have amounted to \$1,758.16. There have been fifteen baptisms, ten marriages, sixteen burials and twenty confirmed. The communicant list now numbers 185. Of these, 134 made their communion on Easter. The one thing needful for the complete success of this work is the payment of the \$5,000 mortgage. With this paid the Mission could be self-supporting. The Archdeacon has offered to try to raise \$500 from friends in the Diocese if the people of the Mission will raise another \$500. This they doubtless will do during the coming Conventional year. Such an effort several times repeated will easily accomplish the desired end. The Rev. Mr. Cameron, fighting as he is one of the very hardest fields in the Diocese, is deserving the generous

support of all who are in a condition to aid.

On the 16th of June, 1892, the Archdeacon, the Bishop being in Europe, laid the corner-stone of St. Luke's Chapel, South Paterson. The Rev. Messrs. Nickerson. Dorwart and Joralemon were present, together with a large gathering of the Laity. The work of construction was so vigorously pressed that the building was ready for use early in the fall. Considering the sum expended it is a remarkably seemly and convenient building. work is under the immediate supervision of the Rev. Mr. Nickerson, of St. Paul's Church. Mr. Perrine, a student in the General Theological Seminary, being the Lay Reader in charge. The future is bright with promise. Great thanks are due the Sunday-school and members of St. Paul's Church for very substantial aid in money and moral support. There have been three baptisms. A class is now being prepared for confirmation. The offerings have amounted to \$355.14. The Sunday-school numbers seventy-five. The Building Fund amounted to \$1,784. Furnace and furniture cost over \$200 in addition.

The Mission of the Good Shepherd, Fort Lee, continues

its successful work under the leadership of the Rev. Mr. Sherwood. Not as much has been done as would have been done if Mr. Sherwood had been able to be in two places at one time. An appropriation ought to be made by the Board of Missions, if possible, to enable him to secure the assistance of a Lay Reader. The Missionary's report shows a very encouraging and healthy condition. There have been nine baptisms, two confirmed, five marriages, and eleven burials. The Sunday-school numbers 125. The offerings have amounted to \$496.44.

Mr. D. A. Smith, Warden of the Mission of the Epiphany, Allendale, reports the Mission as being "in a moderately prosperous condition, holding its own well under many adverse circumstances."

The Rev. Mr. Hartman, with the approval of the Bishop, has given regular Sunday services, and such other services as have been required.

St. Thomas' Mission, Lyndhurst, is feeling the need of a resident Priest. The Rev. Mr. Clayton is doing all he can, but the work needs the presence of one living in the town. The property, which is worth \$3,200, will be absolutely free of debt on the 1st of June. The town will be visited to see what can be done for a resident clergyman. If the Board could help somewhat, the people of the Mission might be able to do the rest. Five have been confirmed, six buried, one baptized and one couple married. There have been one hundred and fifteen public services with twelve celebrations of the Holy Communion.

The first year's work in St. Agnes' Mission, Lafayette, shows substantial progress. The building has been beautified by the erection of a reredos and by the tasteful decoration of the interior. Forty baptisms, fourteen persons confirmed, eight burials, and regular Sunday and week-day services show what is being done on the line of spiritual work. The work of the Mission is carried on

by St. Mark's Church, Jersey City, under the direction of the Rev. Mr. Mortimer.

The Rev. Mr. Flichtner, of St. Paul's, Englewood, still directs and maintains the Mission at Nordhoff.

The present Rector took charge of the Parish on December 1, 1892. These items in the Parochial statistics are therefore incomplete in some particulars, as to the number of public services, number of celebrations of the Holy Communion, for example. The other items are reckoned (from the Parish register) from May 15, the date of the last report. I have celebrated the Holy Communion 12 times in the Chapel of the St. Barnabas' Hospital, said Evensong at same place 12 times, burled 1 person there and baptized 1 child. The financial exhibit is from May 1, 1892, to May 1, 1893. The apparent discrepency in receipts and expenditures is owing to gifts to the Parish not recorded. In addition to money contributions to the St. Barnabas Hospital, provisions to the value of \$60 were sent to that institution on Thanksgiving Day. The pew rents are for eleven months only. We have lately paid off a mortgage of \$800, which has for more than twelve years been upon our Church organ. The Sunday-school is more than self-supporting. This department sent \$75 to Domestic Missions at Easter, and supports a scholarship in the Hope School for Indians in Springfield, South Dakota.

It is quite impossible to present an absolutely accurate report as to the number of families and individuals, and those items have been omitted. The report as to communicants is as nearly complete as it has been possible to make it; but it is not entirely satisfactory. The method of book-keeping which our work requires does not lend itself to a complete and accurate compliance with the requirements of the blank form of Parochial report furnished by the Secretary of the Convention. There is, therefore, a discrepancy between the total of receipts and that of expenditures. It is only apparent, however.

The summing up of all the various items of work as we have tried to give them, imperfect as it is, indicates a marked increase in our labors during the past year. The addition of two assistants to our working force—a Priest and a Deacon—has helped greatly to this result; and the continuance of the steady and faithful work of the

Sisters of St. Margaret has made many things possible which could not have been accomplished so satisfactorily in any other way. The Sunday-school, the Guilds, the Sewing School, the Girls' Friendly Society and the constant work among the poor have been influenced and largely controlled and furthered by the Sisters; and to them is due the large increase in the amount received and disbursed for charitable objects.

In the early spring an artesian well was sunk in the Rectory grounds at the cost of about \$500.00, the gift of a lady in the Parish. In the summer, blinds were placed in the windows on the second floor and in the fall, the parlor, dining-room and halls were covered with a serviceable wood carpet.

In November rooms were rented and opened as Parish Rooms. They were provided with games, periodicals, weekly illustrated papers and a small library. Six months' experience has justified the venture.

# ENDOWMENT FUND.

This account has been increased during the year, by the receipt of the Lord legacy of \$6,000, making the total amount now on hand \$17,100; all of which is invested in proper securities, mostly at five per cent.

The twenty-one building lois of the Wallace property on South Tenth Street, are yet unsold and consequently non-productive of income.

#### THE HOSPITAL PROPERTY.

No important changes or additions have been made during the year; the cost of land, buildings and furnishing, to date, being \$85,288.44, and all is properly insured.

#### LIABILITIES.

\$20,000 on bond and mortgage, and \$10,000 on discount notes—an increase of \$2,500 during the year on this account—representing the accumulated deficiency in current expenses for the past six years.

An extraordinary addition of some \$8,000 to this account has come during the year by the adverse decision of the United States Supreme Court in the Hayes' will case, by which the Hospital is required to surrender the \$5,000 received in 1884, paying interest thereupon, and cost of litigation—making the total of liabilities about \$38,000.

# REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE

ON THE

# HOSPITAL OF ST. BARNABAS

Appointed May 17, 1892.

Report Made and Adopted in Convention, May 17, 1893.

The Special Committee to whom was referred that part of the Bishop's Address delivered at the Diocesan Convention of 1892, which referred to St. Barnabas' Hospital, Newark, beg leave respectfully to submit the following report:

The members of this special committee have held a number of meetings during the past conventional year, and have seriously endeavored to secure such information as would enable the committee to perform the specific duties entrusted to it with some degree of efficiency. These specific functions contemplate only the report to this Convention of the best means, in the judgment of the committee, to secure the financial aid adequate to the present need and the growing demand of the Hospital, and particularly of such action as may be advisable to carry out the suggestions made by the Bishop in the annual address above mentioned.

Your committee has taken it for granted that the administration and management of St. Barnabas' Hospital are in themselves fully worthy of support; but it is glad to state that this assumption is based upon its own knowl-

edge of such worthiness. Without it, all methods and efforts to enlist financial support would be useless.

St. Barnabas' Hospital, in Newark, both in the spirit. and letter of its operation, may confidently base an appeal for sustentation upon the evidence it now presents of noble work nobly done.

Your committee does not feel willing, however, to approach its duties without expressly recognizing the thoughtful methods and unselfish zeal which characterize the efforts of those who are now, and for some years past have been, making its work and its wants known to the Diocese and the public.

Each month in the St. Barnabas' Hospital Review, the attention of hundreds is called in a very attractive manner to the affairs of the Hospital. It is indeed in keeping with the duties of this special committee, to take this method to secure, if possible, an added interest in this excellent publication.

The purpose of the Bishop's address and the animus of this committee are one in seeking supplementary sources of financial aid to this Hospital.

Before proceeding to the more definite recommendations, your committee, while acknowledging the triteness of the following suggestions, nevertheless ventures to call the attention of this Convention to them in hope that they may bear some fruit. Recently a very large gift was made to a certain enterprise. It came from an unusual source. The one to whose efforts it was due that the gift was made, was asked: "How did you get this gift?" The answer is instructive: "I ventured to ask for it." It was really in accordance with the Master's direction, "Ask and ye shall receive." Your committee is therefore bold to ask, and to advise others to ask for legacies in behalf of St. Barnabas' Hos-

pital. There are members of the Church in this Diocese, as in all Dioceses, who, upon approach of death, or in providing for the disposition of their property by devise, are really and conscientiously desirous to leave a portion of their worldly goods to perpetuate the loving work of Christ, but who, for one cause or another, never bring their desires to fruition.

Your committee feels confident that legacies in behalf of St. Barnabas' Hospital will be wisely devised, and asks most serious attention to this source of beneficence.

In this connection it is gratifying to announce that by the will of the late Mrs. Emily M. Lord, of Morristown, St. Barnabas' recently received the sum of \$3,000 to endow the "Edward Crary Lord Bed," and \$3,000 to endow the "Nina Bed," so named in beloved memory of a husband and child now in paradise.

Your committee begs leave to report as the result of its meetings, that while its members are conscious of the demands of local institutions in various parts of the Diocese which hinder the growth of a wide spread interest in the Hospital of St. Barnabas at Newark, they nevertheless wish to urge very strongly the general adoption of the admirable plan of the Right Reverend the Bishop of the Diocese, viz.: the formation of local guilds in every Parish, whose purpose shall be to contribute to both the current expenses and the endowment fund of the Hospital. It is their belief that this plan is decidedly the most practicable for the purpose in view.

The committee would also suggest the desirableness of the observance of a "Hospital Sunday" throughout that part of the Diocese which ought to be mainly interested in the Hospital of St. Barnabas; and that St. Katharine's Guild be requested to assume the work of distributing throughout this Archdeaconry, envelopes for collections and mite-chests for the same purpose, looking after the receipts of the latter. It is believed that the organization of such a society as the Bishop suggests will be best secured by the appointment in each Parish in this Archdeaconry of at least one representative of said Guild.

# CHRIST HOSPITAL, JERSEY CITY.

The Council herewith submits to the Diocese, the friends of the Institution, and the public, the record of another year's work in maintaining and extending the usefulness of Christ Hospital, whose doors are open for every creed, nationality, and color:

There have been, however, 3,775 treatments in the Dispensary and Eye and Ear Departments.

The expense incurred is about one thousand dollars a month, to maintain the Institution, and of this amount only one-quarter is received from patients, etc., and three-quarters represent the charity work.

To provide this, is a constant care to the Council and Hospital Guilds, and the increasing interest on the part of the charitably disposed is greatly appreciated, but we need to extend and strengthen this interest in every possible way. St. Luke's Guild, organized in 1892, seeks to obtain annual subscriptions for the charity work, and every person who subscribes five dollars or more, yearly, is a member. This ought to meet with a large number of subscribers, and subscribers may extend their interest by becoming themselves solicitors. This Guild has raised

nearly one thousand dollars in its first year, and every one should consider it a privilege to annually subscribe to maintain the charity work of Christ Hospital.

The Executive Committee have had under their oversight the monthly expenditures, and they have met monthly and acted promptly on all matters demanding their attention; and they are happy to find that nearly one hundred patients have been cared for this year more than last, at a somewhat less expenditure. This speaks well for the economy of the Institution, and the Council desire to express their appreciation of the interest taken and efficiency manifested by the Superintendent, under whose management this has been effected.

The Abercrombie Guild has seventy-one members, and the Guild has continued its work with zeal and faithfulness, conducting a Fair in the Spring, and Donation Days in the Autumn, which filled our store-room with all kinds of supplies. They have raised, together with the interest on their Endowments, over two thousand dollars, which has been paid to the Treasurers, while their Endowment Fund has increased over five thousand dollars during 1892; so that their Endowment of twenty-five thousand dollars a year ago is now a little more than thirty thousand dollars.

St. Mary's Guild has seventy-two members, and its chief work is to pay the interest and reduce the principal on the bonded debt incurred in the building of the new Christ Hospital. This is accomplished largely through the system of Mite Boxes, scattered all over our cities, which are collected from quarterly by the active members of the Guild. The increase in this work during the past few years is very interesting, as shown in the following comparison:

while during this time the number of boxes has increased from 135 to 424.

The Chaplain has continued his work during the year, assisted by such of the Clergy as could be obtained on Sunday afternoons, which is a very difficult thing, as they have their own parish duties to attend to. He has visited the sick, buried the dead, and rendered willing services at all times.

The Collector has been able to devote more of his time to this work, and has received for the Hospital nearly fifteen hundred dollars in money and donations

The Medical Board has rendered the Hospital a service, which is bringing it into great favor with those who have been its patients; and the Council desire to express their gratification at the interest taken and the efficiency manifested in the medical and surgical work of the Institution.

The Training School is now in successful operation. It has graduated three Trained Nurses during the year, and has now eight pupils. The personal interest taken in this work by our Vice-President, the Superintendent, Committee, and Medical Board, is appreciated by the Council, and the influence this work is giving our Hospital, and the demand for the services of our Trained Nurses, on the part of the public, has already placed it among the successes of our Hospital undertakings.

The members of the Council, Medical Board, Abercrombie Guild, and St. Mary's Guild, now constitute a band of nearly two hundred voluntary workers, each one in their own department of work striving to maintain and render successful the efficiency of the Institution.

Christ Hospital has gathered strength in the past year, even beyond our expectation. Its friends have increased; its domestic arrangements have been well conducted; its care and healing of the sick, vigilant and efficient; its building fund indebtedness cared for and reduced; its endowments increased; its contributions, subscriptions and donations enlarged; and the usefulness of the Hospital extended to a greater number of patients. With this record of the work, we thank all who have aided in any way to sustain and promote it; and we commend the work to a charitable public, who already know that Christ Hospital stands for the sick and suffering of every name—and may all deem it a privilege to help maintain and strengthen it, for Christ's sake, and for the sick and suffering in the time of their necessity.

In reading over the reports of the Home for the last three years and comparing them with the one which is to be read today, one might be struck with the thought that less has been done since our last report than in any previous year.

We cannot report as we did in the first year of the inception of the work, of the largely extended efforts to make known the needs of the Home, nor of the preparation of the first house, nor of the plans for purchasing the one in which we now are. We cannot report, as we did in the two following years, the accomplishment of these plans and the addition of the much needed chapel and laundry, nor the encouraging financial results following upon the ways and means employed to pay for them.

But a closer study of the work will reveal the fact that we may with every reason claim for this year's work the greatest results of all, for we can report the greatest results, not in brick and mortar, not in dollars and cents, not in great gifts and offerings, but in that for which all these were but preparatory—in living souls. If we have been preparing the ground and sowing the seed heretofore, this year we are reaping the greatest harvest, and those most interested in the work can tell us how hopeful it is. Never before in any one year have so many been cared for.

Since November 1st, 1891, thirty girls have applied for admission to the home, of whom fifteen have been admitted. Twenty-six in all have been in the Home during the year. As you will see by Sister Cora's report, two of these girls were only fourteen years of age when they were admitted, three were fifteen, one sixteen and two eighteen.

Does not this fact alone indicate that St. Katharine's Home, the only one of its kind in America, is not only greatly needed but most helpful? Those who come to it for shelter are girls, not hardened women, not despairing, but those, who, without this Christ-like house of mercy and help, would become worse than lost.

I wish that all women would stop and think of these girls of fourteen and fifteen, think what all this means to them. There is no report that can be written and read at a public meeting which can do justice to the misery of such cases or can express all the good that this Home does. Think of the life into which most of these girls. would have drifted if no one had offered them this shelter. Think of the misery staring them in the face. Many of them would be sent from their own homes. Where?-Here they are brought under the influence of the Sisters. whose example of self-sacrifice and holy living alone must help to make them good. They have a year before them in which they can learn the better part of life and are taught to be self-helpful. Of all the institutions for protecting girls unfortunate as these, this is the only one of which I know that cares for them in this truly motherly way. St. Katharine's Home shelters them, cares for them and their babies and teaches them not only to help themselves, but also that Christ, in His Infinite Mercy helps and cares for them.

We ask you to give the report of this year's work your earnest consideration. The support of twelve girls and their babies, even with the most economical management, necessitates large expenses. The Treasurer's report will show how unusually economical the management is.

It has been found necessary that the house should be painted and repaired. This, of course, involves an outlay of a large sum of money and it is the hope of those in charge of the finances of the Home that the donations and subscriptions will be unusually generous this year.

In this place we cannot forbear speaking of the gratuitous and most acceptable services of Dr. Loomis. Since the Home was started he has attended all of the cases of illness with greatest care and success. This report would be most incomplete if it did not recognize his generosity and faithfulness.

If our annual subscriptions could be increased this coming year, and if the friends of the Home would make an effort to secure these, the work would be greatly facilitated. Part of the money the past year has come from entertainments and this source cannot be regularly relied upon. People grow tired of being entertained, even for the most worthy charity, while the same amount of money paid individually for tickets would help us much more as an annual subscription. Certainly no one of us can afford to have it upon our conscience that any poor soul has been refused admittance to this Home because we lack the means of support, and we ask you to do all in your power to help us in this merciful work, done in the

name of the Master. "Forasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, ye have done it unto me."

# HOUSE OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD, ORANGE.

The Sunday services and week-day prayers, together with a monthly communion, have been regulary kept up by the Chaplain assisted by the Clergy of the Parishes constituting the management.
