TITLE I, CANON I, § II.

OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election in the following form:

[Name of the Church, the place and date.]

This certifies that at a meeting of the congregation of this Church for the purpose of electing Church Officers and Deputies to the Convention (or for the purpose of electing Deputies to the Convention, if the meeting be for that purpose alone) A. B., C. D. and E. F., being members of the congregation and communicants of the Church, were duly chosen to represent the congregation in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which I have hereunto set my hand (or, if two Wardens subscribe, we have set our hands) the day and year above written.

N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary sign, then the signatures of both Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-in-charge or Missionary cannot sign.

The Lay Representation is limited to three Deputies, whose names in full should be carefully and legibly written.

Three Alternate Deputies must also be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies. (See Title I, Canon 6, § II [2].)

This Certificate is to "be transmitted to the Secretary of the Convention at least ten days before the meeting of the Annual Convention." (See Title I, Canon I, § II.)

In order to secure this, the Secretary will forward a blank form to every Parish, and he earnestly asks the PROMPT attention of the Clergy.

***By the terms of the Constitution and Canons, the Deputies must be communicants of the Church, and also qualified voters in the Parish which elects them. (See Title I, Canon 6, § II. [4], [5] and [6].)

- When the President takes the chair, each member shall be seated.
- 3. THE ORDER OF BUSINESS SHALL BE AS FOLLOWS :
 - The calling over by the Secretary of the names of the members, Clerical and Lay, and entering the names of those present on the Minutes.
 - II. The appointment of a Committee on the Certificates of Lay Deputies, .
 - III. The Report of the existing Committee on Rules of Order.
 - IV. The appointment by the Convention of a Committee on the Rights of Clerical Members (Title I, Canon 1, §I, [2].)
 - v. The appointment by the Convention of a Committee on the Rights of Lay Deputies. (Title I, Canon 1, §II, [3].)
 - vr. The election of a Secretary.
 - vii. The appointment of a Committee on New Parishes.
 - viii. The appointment of a Committee on Finance.
 - IX. The appointment of a Committee on Rules of Order.

- 4. THE ORDER OF BUSINESS AFTER THE FIRST DAY SHALL BE AS FOLLOWS:
 - 1. Reading, correcting and approving the Minutes.
 - II. Order for the day at ro'clock shall be the reading of the Bishop's Address.
 - III. Missionary business.
 - IV. The election of Standing Committee, of Deputies to the General Convention, of one Clerical and one Lay Member of the General Missionary Council, of a Treasurer and an Auditing Committee, and of a Registrar; such election to be simultaneous and in accordance with Section xv of Rule 3.
 - v. Reports of Committees.
 - VI. Unfinished Business.
 - VII. Motions, Resolutions, and Miscellaneous Business.

- 5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered.
- 6. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, and, when made, shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.
- 7. No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
- When any member is about to speak, he shall with due respect address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
- No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who
 is entitled to reply) in the same debate, without leave of
 the Convention.
- 10. At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
- All questions shall be decided viva voce, unless otherwise specially ordered.
- 12. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote of the Convention may be taken by orders voting separately, and the names shall be entered on the Minutes.
- 13. The doors of the Convention shall be opened for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
- 14. No member shall leave the Convention without permission.
- 15. In all elections, those persons only who shall have a majority of all the votes given shall be deemed elected; but if in any case more than the required number of persons shall have a majority of votes, the required number of persons having the highest number of votes shall be deemed elected, and in case of a tie between two or more candidates there shall be a new ballot.

- 16. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone it to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it or to divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
- 17. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order, he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
- 18. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate; but any member may appeal from the decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention.
- 19. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.
- 20. The Convention shall meet the first day at 10 A. M., and on subsequent days at 9 A. M.; with a recess of one hour on each day between 1 and 2 o'clock.

JOURNAL.

TRINITY CHURCH, NEWARK, N. J., May 28, 1895.

In accordance with the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark and the appointment of the Bishop, the twenty-first Annual Convention of said church was held in Trinity Church, Newark, on Tuesday, May 28, 1895, at 10 A. M.

The Bishop celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by the Rector of the Parish, the Rev. L. S. Osborne, and the Rev. Anthony Schuyler, D.D.

After Divine Service the Bishop read a portion of his Annual Address.

The Bishop then took the chair, and called the Convention to order for business.

The Secretary called the names of the Clergy* of the Diocese, and the names of the Lay Deputies† of such parishes as had sent in Certificates of Election, and announced that there was present a constitutional quorum of both orders.

The Bishop appointed as the Committee on the Certificates of the Lay Deputies, the Rev. F. B. CARTER and Messrs. CHARLES A. LIGHTHIPE and ROBERT WEIR.

The Rev. Dr. Hughes presented the Report of the Committee on Rules of Order, as follows:

The Committee on Rules beg leave to report and to recommend the adoption of the Rules of Order of the last Convention: Which was adopted.

On motion of the Rev. W. R. Jenvey, the Rev. C. S. Abbott, the Rev. John Keller and Mr. C. G. Kidder, were appointed the Committee on the Rights of Clerical Members.

On motion of the Rev. GEORGE S. BENNITT, the Rev. DANIEL F. WARREN, D.D., Mr. WILLIAM A. HOLMES, and Mr. GEORGE H. WHITE, were appointed the Committee on the Rights of Lay Deputies.

The Rev. John P. Appleton was re-elected Secretary. He announced his appointment of the Rev. John Keller as Assistant Secretary.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Hughes, the Rules of Order were suspended, and the following resolutions, presented by Mr. Alfred Mills, were adopted:

Resolved, That the Committee on State Legislation be requested and instructed to coöperate with a similar Committee appointed by the Diocese of New Jersey in looking after State legislation relative to the interests of our church in the State of New Jersey.

Resolved, That this Convention expresses its approval of the policy and law that require the consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee for either the conveyance or mortgage of real estate belonging to parish corporations.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. SCHUYLER, it was

Resolved, That the portion of the Bishop's address announcing the decease of the Rev. Dr. Boges be referred to a Committee, to report a proper minute for the adoption of this Convention.

The Chair appointed as such committee the Rev. Dr. Schuyler and the Rev. C. S. Abbott.

The Secretary presented the application of Grace Church, Town of Union, for admission to the Convention, which was referred to the Committee on New Parishes.

The regular order of business being resumed, the Chair announced these appointments of Committees:

ON UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

The Rev. WILLIAM RICHMOND, Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, presented the following Report:

The Committee on Constitution and Canons respectfully report that they have had under consideration the matter referred to them by the resolution of the Convention of 1894 (Journal, page 72), as follows:

"Resolved, That the portion of the Bishop's address relating to the matter of ex officio members of the Convention be referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, that they may report to the next Convention whether any changes are needed in regard to the same."

It is clear to the Committee that, by Article 4 of the Constitution,

r. A Presbyter six months canonically resident in the Diocese and engaged in the active performance of certain specified duties has the rights of a member ex officio.

- 2. That when such Presbyter, after having been for five years connected with the Diocese, retires from the active performance of such duties by reason of disability from age or infirmity, such rights are not forfeited.
- 3. That when such Presbyter retires from the active performance of such duties for any reason other than disability from age or infirmity, such rights are forfeited.
- 4. That such rights, having been thus forfeited, have ceased to exist and can not be revived or conferred by the supervention of disability from age or infirmity.

The policy of this Diocese appears to be clearly expressed by Article 4 of the Constitution; and, so long as such policy shall obtain, the Committee are of opinion that no changes are necessary in the premises.

All which is respectfully submitted.

Mr. Daniel Dodd has resigned the position of Secretary and Treasurer, and Mr. Edwin A. Stevens has been appointed to fill his place.

In reporting the resignation of Mr. Dodd, the Trustees desire to express their high appreciation of the services that he has rendered for so many years in the care of the Episcopal Fund, and their sincere regret that he feels unable to continue to act as Secretary and Treasurer.

Mr. Dodd has had charge of the fund from the beginning. In 1860, when the Trustees were incorporated, and the small sum of money which had been collected for an Episcopal fund was placed in their hands, Mr. Dodd was made Secretary and Treasurer, and after the fund had increased and the Diocese had been divided in two, he still continued to take charge of it for both Dioceses until 1882, when a new Board of Trustees for Northern New Jersey was incorporated and he became Secretary and Treasurer of this Board.

As Secretary. he has kept a careful and interesting record of the proceedings of the Trustees from the beginning, and his books contain a valuable history of the growth of the fund and the division of it between the two Dioceses.

As Treasurer he has given careful attention to the various and often irksome duties connected with the investment and management of the fund and has handled the business of his office with fidelity and good judgment.

The other Trustees realizing the great value of Mr Dodd's services respectfully suggest their formal recognition by the convention.

Resolved, That Clergymen of other dioceses and candidates for Holy Orders, who may be present, be admitted to honorary seats in this Convention, and that they be requested to hand their names to the Secretary.

Under this resolution, the Rev. W.H. VAN ANTWERP, D. D., of the Diocese of Western Michigan, and the Rev. Wm. Stanley Barrows, of the Diocese of North Carolina, took their seats in Convention.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The Standing Committee respectfully reports that it has held six meetings during the past Conventional year.

On the 16th of May, 1894, the Committee organized by electing the Rev. ROBERT NORRIS MERRITT, D.D., President, and the Rev. WILLIAM R. JENVEY, Secretary. Permission was given the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen of Grace Church, Town of Union, to mortgage their church property for the sum of \$9,000.

On the 19th of June, 1894, permission was given the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen of St. Luke's Church, Montclair, to mortgage a newly acquired piece of property adjoining the church property for the sum of \$4,000. Permission was given the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen of Grace Church, Greenville, to mortgage their church property for the sum of \$3,500.

On the 10th of December, 1894, permission was given the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen of St. Philip's Church, Newark, to mortgage their church property for an amount not to exceed \$1,500. Mr. George H. Hooper, Candidate for Holy Orders, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Deacons,

and the proper testimonial signed. The Rev. W. C. HICKS, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests, and the proper testimonial signed. For good and sufficient reasons, all other canonical requirements having been fully complied with, a dispensation of five months' time was granted Mr. Hicks. Consent was given to the election of a Coadjutor Bishop of Iowa by reason of extent of territory.

On the 8th of January, 1895, the Rev. Horatio Watts MAGUIRE, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests, and the proper testimonial signed. For good and sufficient reasons, all other canonical requirements having been fully complied with, a dispensation of four months' time was granted

Mr. MAGUIRE.

On the 25th of February, 1895, Mr. Charles Malcolm DougLAS, B.A., was recommended to the Bishop as a candidate for Holy Orders, and the proper testimonial signed. Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev. JOHN HAZEN WHITE, Bishop-elect of Indiana.

Permission was given the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen of St. John's Free Church, Jersey City Heights, to place an additional mortgage of \$5,000 upon the church

property upon which the church edifice stands.

On the 28th of May, 1895, conditional consent was given the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen of St. Matthew's Church, Jersey City, to sell their rectory and rectory lot for the sum of \$4,500. Consent was given the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen of the Church of the Holy Communion, Paterson, to readjust the mortgages now existing upon their church property, and amounting to \$26,400, and to execute new ones to the amount of \$24,000. Advice, direction and consent were given to the change of location of the Mission Chapel of the Epiphany, Allendale.

The Rev. JOHN KELLER offered the following resolutions, which, after discussion, were withdrawn:

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to have printed a new edition of the Constitution and Code of Canons of the Diocese, and to draw on the Treasurer for the same.

Resolved, That the Committee on State Legislation be requested to revise Appendix II, on Legislative Acts.

Mr. HENRY HAVES presented the following report of the Finance Committee:

The Finance Committee recommend that an assessment be made for the current year of seven (7) per cent. on the present salaries of the Clergy for paying the Bishop's salary, upon all parishes which have not given bonds to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund; and of three (3) per cent. on the salaries of the Clergy, for the Convention expenses and other liabilities.

The Finance Committee recommend that the arrears of St. John's Church, Newark, of \$40.00, be remitted.

On motion this recommendation was adopted.

The report of the Registrar was read by the Secretary.

REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR.

Resolved, That the Corporation for the Relief of the Widows and Children of Clergymen of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the State of New Jersey, be respectfully requested, as a matter of information and courtesy, to make an annual report to the Convention. Also that the report be given a place on the order of business of the Convention immediately after the report of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund; and that the legal title of the Corporation, with the name and address of the Treasurer, be printed in the Convention Journal immediately after the names of the Committee on State Legislation.

The Rev. WILLIAM P. BRUSH, for the Committee on New Parishes, reported that the papers from Grace Church, Town of Union, accompanying its application for admission to the Convention were correct, with the exception that there was no proper evidence that its certificate of incorporation had been filed in the office of the County Clerk.

After discussion, on motion of Mr. A. A. VAN HOVENBERG, it was

Resolved, That Grace Church, Town of Union, Hudson County, be admitted into union with this Convention, and that a certified copy of the articles of incorporation of said parish be filed with the Secretary of this Convention as soon as possible hereafter, nunc pro tune.

The Secretary presented the application of Trinity

Church for admission into union with the Convention. which was referred to the Committee on New Parishes.

The Rev. George S. Bennitt presented a Resolution of the Rev. E. A. White (temporarily absent) providing for certain changes in Section II of Canon VI, Title I, which, on his motion, was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons. (See report of Committee, p. 64)

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Hughes, the Convention adjourned.

Trinity Church, Newark, May 29, 1895—9 A. M.

Morning prayer was said by the Rev. G. D. SPARKS and the Rev. JOHN P. APPLETON.

The Bishop took the Chair, and read the portion of his address relating to Diocesan Missions.

The minutes of yesterday's session was read and approved.

On motion of the Rev. W. P. Brush, the Rules of Order were suspended, and Mr. Brush, in behalf of the Committee on New Parishes, reported that the papers accompanying the application of Trinity Church, Paterson, were correct, and on his motion the said parish was admitted into union with the Convention.

The Rev. MILLIDGE WALKER read his report as Archdeacon of Newark (see Appendix to the Episcopal Address).

The Rev. WILLIAM R. JENVEY read his report as Archdeacon of Jersey City (see Appendix to Episcopal Address).

The Report of the Board of Missions was read by the Rev. ALEXANDER MANN, its Secretary.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

The Board of Missions of the Diocese reports to the Convention as follows:

In accordance with resolutions passed by the last Convention (page 64, Convention Journal '94), the Board adopted a plan of apportionment by which the amount of \$4,000, which was voted for the missionary work of the Diocese, might be equitably divided among the parishes.

The following system of apportionment was adopted.

The salary of the Rector was made the basis of the apportionment, and the Parishes were divided as follows:

Class I, including all parishes which pay their Rector \$1,000 and under; Class II, including all parishes which pay their Rector more than \$1,000 and less than \$2,000; Class III, including all parishes which pay their Rector \$2,000 and over.

On Class I the apportionment was made 4 per cent. on the Rector's salary; on Class II, 5 per cent.; on Class III, 6 per cent.

Circulars stating the above action of the Board were sent in June of last year to the Rectors and the Lay Deputies of each parish in union with the Convention.

The plan adopted may be open to criticism in some of its details, but the apportionment idea, in the judgment of your Board, has been amply vindicated by its results. Two years ago, you will remember, there was a deficiency of \$450, which was made good by personal pledges on the floor of the Convention. Next year there was a deficiency of \$330, which was met in the same way. This year, for

the first time since its creation in 1892, the Board of Missions comes before the Convention with all its debts paid, and with a balance of \$136.93 in the missionary treasury.

The Treasurer's report for the Diocesan year shows receipts of \$4,128.83 and disbursements of \$3,949.90. In the face of the severe financial depression of the past twelve months, this result is most gratifying. It proves to the mind of your Board the value of a system which makes each parish morally responsible for a certain definite portion of the total amount of money to be raised for the missionary work of the Diocese, in place of relying upon the uncertain results of Canonical offerings. The present system of apportionment can doubtless be improved. We feel confident that the Convention will endorse the apportionment idea as being both businesslike and just.

By resolution of the Board, the Secretary was directed to obtain from the Treasurer a statement of the apportionment of each parish, together with the amount paid, and the amount, if any, still due, and to make such statement a part of the Report of the Board to the Convention.

It will be seen from the Treasurer's report that the Board has practically expended the amount, \$4,000, which was voted by the last Convention.

Much more money could be used with great benefit to the Missionary work of the Diocese. Two thousand dollars additional would pay the salary and the traveling expenses of a general missionary, who could do a noble work for the Church, especially in the northern part of the State.

This matter of employing a general missionary was referred to the Board of Missions by the Convention of last year, and in this connection we call your attention to a portion of the Report of the Archdeacon of Newark for last year:

"A live man who would go throughout the length and breadth of our northern counties, spend a Sunday now and then with our lonely and sometimes discouraged missionaries, then come to some of our highly respectable but not over-generous wealthy parishes and tell them about the work, its needs and its results, would do more for the cause of missions in this Diocese than we have any idea of."

The Board of Missions would gladly try the experiment, but we do not propose to do so without strong and satisfactory assurance that the Diocese will furnish the necessary amount of money. It rests with the Convention to say whether this shall be done.

The election of the Officers and Committees of the Convention, nominations for which were made yesterday, being in order, the Chairman appointed the Rev. H. M. LADD and Mr. WM. M. FRANKLIN Tellers for the clerical vote, and the Rev. F. B. REAZOR and Mr. P. E. JOHNSON Tellers for the lay vote.

The ballots having been cast and the Tellers having retired to count them, the Rev. Mr. PERKINS, Corresponding Secretary of the American Church Building Tana, was introduced as, the pishop, and additionate the Convention.

The Rev. Dr. Schuyler presented the following report:

The Committee appointed to prepare a minute on occasion of the decease of the Rev. Dr. Boggs, respectfully submit the following:

This Convention desires to place on record its appreciation of the life and labors of the Rev. Edward Brenton

Boggs, D. D., who departed this life on the 8th day of May instant.

Born seventy five years ago in the State of New Jersey, he never removed from it except for a brief pastorate in the Diocese of New York. Early admitted to Holy Orders in this Church, he became well and favorably known throughout his native State. Successively occupying to entire acceptance parishes in various parts of the State, he was designated nearly thirty years ago by Bishop Odenheimer in his then growing disability, a Missionary-at-Large in the undivided Diocese. Here he was conspicuously successful. Though a high churchman of the old school, his persuasive and conciliatory course attracted outsiders to the Church, and he succeeded in opening new places for its services and rebuilding old wastes.

In the course of this work he became one of the best known and highly esteemed among the clergy. With a winning manner and ready speech, and never without something worthy of being said, he was in regular demand at Church conferences and missionary gatherings. After the division of the Diocese he was elected Secretary of the new Diocese and held the office for fifteen years, being annually and unanimously re-elected till his failing strength unfitted him for active duty. He retired at the Session of 1893 with the regrets of the Convention.

Unable to resume a parochial charge he was still able to render occasional assistance to his clerical brethren, which he continued to do as long as his strength permitted. One of the last, if not the very last, of his labors was the revising, enlarging, and publishing a tractate in two parts on Christian Unity. The tract was originally written by him for parochial use in the year 1849, and quite in advance of the serious thought that has since been given to that important subject. The author of this tract may thus be regarded as a pioneer in the discussion which has since

been rising and spreading throughout the various Christian bodies among us. So essential to the cause of Christianity was it regarded by our departed brother that his youthful solicitude remained with him to the last respecting "our unhappy divisions."

The closing words of the latest product of his pen are well worth recording here, and this completed tract, bringing the history of the movement to date, may be regarded as the dying gift of our departed triend to his

surviving brethren. The words are as follows:

"May we not come nearer together on points in which we agree, and as far as possible work together, speaking the truth in love, trusting the solution of our difficulties to Him who holds in His hands the hearts of men? Let us thank God for what has been done and take courage. For with God all things are possible.

Even so come, Lord Jesus."

The Rev. WILLIAM RICHMOND, Chairman, presented the following report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, and moved the Resolution thereto appended, as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITU-TION AND CANONS.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons respectfully report that they have had under consideration the amendment to Canon 6 of Title I proposed and referred to them on the 28th inst.

The Canon is of great importance and of extreme difficulty. The Committee therefore regret that there has been no opportunity of giving the proposed amendment the careful consideration in full committee that its importance demands.

From such consideration as opportunity has allowed,

however, it appears to commend itself as practically a well ordered, symmetrical, revision of the canon at present in force, which is the somewhat heterogeneous residium of various amendments made and unmade during many years past, and as practically embracing all effective provisions of the present canon and adding no new provisions, while it interprets some that are at present ambiguous and provides for making them more effective.

The Committee therefore reccommend the acceptance of the amendment as proposed by the adoption of the

following resolutions.

All which is respectfully submitted.

NEWARK, N. J., May 29, 1895.

Resolved, That Section II, of Canon 6, of Title I, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

- [1] In every Church which is supplied by a clergyman there shall be Divine service on the day of the election of Church officers, and immediately before the election is held.
- [2] On the day fixed by the Charter or Certificate of Incorporation, there shall be held annually a Parish meeting, of which notice shall be given ten days previously by an advertisement set up in open view on the door of the church or usual place of worship. At such meeting the qualified voters of the Parish shall elect, by a majority of votes cast, three Deputies and three Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, two Wardens, one of whom shall be called the Senior Warden, and the other the Junior

Warden, and such number of vestrymen as the Parish may be legally entitled to elect. When the Rector by the Church Charter has the right to appoint one Warden, he shall be called the Senior Warden and only one Warden shall be elected.

- [3] At such annual meeting, the Rector, or if there be no Rector, or if he be absent, the Senior Warden, or in his absence, the Junior Warden, or if no Warden be present, a Vestryman, or if no Vestryman be present, then a qualified voter elected for that purpose, shall preside and receive the votes of the electors.
- [4] The persons entitled to vote at such meeting shall be (1) baptized, (2) males, (3) of full age and (4) of good moral character, who (5) profess to adhere to the Protestant Episcopal Church, and to no other religious body, and who (6) for six calendar months next before said meeting have been regular attendants at the services of the church of said Parish, and who (7) for the said six months have been regular contributors to the current expenses of said Parish according to the mode or modes adopted therein by its Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen. No one shall be deemed a regular contributor for the purposes of this section, who is in arrears in the payment of any portion of his contribution that may be due and payable on or before the first day of that month in which said meeting is held.
- [5] It shall be the duty of the Treasurer of the Parish to record the names of such regular contributors to the support of the Parish, with the date of their contributions in a book provided for that purpose, and such record shall be sufficient evidence as to this particular qualification of voters.
- [6] No person shall be eligible for the office of Deputy or Alternate Deputy to the Diocesan Convention, nor for

the office of Warden, who is not a communicant in good standing and a qualified voter in the Parish holding the election. Nor shall any person be eligible for the office of Vestryman who is not a qualified voter in the Parish holding the election.

[7] In Parishes which have charters wherein the qualifications of voters are prescribed, no provisions of this section that may conflict with such Charters shall apply.

After discussion and adoption of the sub-sections seriatim the resolution was adopted.

The Rev. M. H. THROOP moved the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to insert in the Convention Journal as an appendix, Article 5, of the Constitution, On the Admission of New Parishes to the Convention; Title I, Canon 5, Of Diocesan Missions; Title I, Canon 6, Of the Parish; Title I, Canon 7, Of the Formation of New Parishes; Title I, Canon 8, Of Parish Boundaries; and Title I, Canon 9, Of the Organization of Missions; also the matter relating to marriages on pages 75, 76, 77 and 78 of the pamphlet published in 1888 and entitled "Constitution and Code of Canons for the Government of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark.

The Rev. Mr. WALKER moved as an amendment, That the Secretary cause to be printed one thousand copies of the Constitution and Code of Canons and the Appendix thereto.

The Rev. Dr. Hughes moved as a substitute:

Resolved, That the Secretary cause to be printed one

thousand copies of the Constitution and Code of Canons, now in force, and that Mr. Alfred Mills, Mr. John R. Emery, and Mr. F. W. Stevens, and the Secretary, exofficio, be appointed a Committee to revise Appendix II. which together with the other appendices shall be also thus printed.

Resolved, That the Secretary be authorized to draw on the Treasurer for the payment of the same.

Which was adopted.

Mr. RICHARD F. STEVENS, a Deputy from St. Barnabas' Church, Newark, presented the following petition:

Whereas, The Parish of St. Barnabas, Newark, a member of this Union, and therefore under and claiming its protection, thinks it has been and is being injured by the action of the authorities of St. Thomas' Church in locating their building so near to that of St. Barnabas, directly contrary to their representations to the Bishop when making their application for organization and incorporation; and,

Whereas, The failure of St. Thomas' Church to apply for admission into the Union, though a parish of two years' standing, prevents the matter being brought before the Convention to decide upon its merits; therefore,

The Parish of St. Barnabas prays that this Convention take the matter into consideration and afford such relief to them as they in their judgment deem advisable

The Rev. E. A. WHITE, offered the following:

Resolved, That a special Committee of three Clergymen and two Laymen be appointed to inquire into the facts calleged in the petition just presented by the Deputy from

the Parish of St. Barnabas, Newark, and report thereon to the next Diocesan Convention.

The Rev. Mr. OSBORNE moved, as an amendment, that the Rev. Drs. Schuyler, Hughes, and Christian, and Mr. R. Wayne Parker and Mr. John R. Emery, be appointed such Committee: which amendment being accepted by Mr. White the resolution as amended was adopted.

On motion of Mr. KIDDER,

Resolved, That the Treasurer of the Diocese be directed to pay to the Bishop's Secretary and Chaplain the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) for the Convention year, 1895-6.

On motion of Mr. HAYES,

Resolved, That the Treasurer of the Convention be authorized to pay to the Bishop and to the Deputies to the General Convention the sum of seventy-five dollars (\$75) each for traveling expenses.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. SCHUYLER, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be authorized to cause 800 copies of the Journal to be printed.

The Rev. Mr. BENNITT offered the following Report of the Board of Missions on the resolution of the Rev. Dr. Hughes referred to it, and moved the resolution contained therein:

The Board of Missions report that they have considered the resolution referred to them, and respectfully report that they approve the appointment of a General Missionary, and for that purpose ask the following authority "Resolved, That the Missionary Board, by and with the consent of the Bishop of the Diocese, be and is hereby recommended and authorized to appoint a General Missionary and to pay his salary and expenses from the treasury of the Board, not in excess of eighteen hundred dollars (\$1,800)."

The resolution was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. WALKER offered again the resolution, withdrawn in the morning session (see p. 57), relating to a Missionary meeting. And it was adopted.

On motion,

Resolved, That the thanks of the Convention are hereby tendered to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Trinity Church, Newark, and especially to the ladies of the parish, for their courteous hospitality during the session of the Convention.

Resolved, That the usual sum of fifteen dollars (\$15) be paid the Sexton for his services.

On motion of the Rev. Mr. BENNITT.

Resolved, That after the reading of the minutes and the usual devotions, the Convention adjourn sine die.

The minutes of this day's session were read and approved.

The Convention engaged in singing a hymn and in prayer, and, after the benediction by the Bishop, adjourned sine die.

SIXTEENTH ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

At. Rev. Thomas A. Starkey, P.P.,

BISHOP OF THE DIOCESE.

BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND LAITY:

Allow me to extend to you the customary greeting on this occasion when we meet to review together the work of a twelve-month, its incidents and lessons, its failures and successes, and to consider with a sense of responsibility, than which none can be higher, what is demanded of us as Priests and Laymen to advance the interests and influence of Christ's Kingdom here in our own Diocese, and, so far as in us lies, in the great world which lies outside of it.

For myself, I do not separate in a view or retrospect like this, my own personality from that of the great Body, to which is due whatever of influence or importance may attach to me or to my action as an individual. Although living in the present, we are all continually looking forward to the future and back into the past; and, as we look back, near or far away, the generations, or each one of them, seem like a vision of things dissolving one after another as clouds when we look up at

them floating by against the blue. But the great Church for which we work, like the Master whose Body she is, lives on as fresh in breath and vigor as if there were no death. This was in St. Paul's mind when he said, "I lay the foundation and another buildeth thereon." "Take heed how ve build." Take heed, indeed. That is once for all our lesson; and for you and me, dear Brethren, if we are alive with the love of Christ and of His deathless Kingdom, the work. the breath and spirit of its atmosphere, will transform us; our personality will be lifted up into that higher Personality with which through mystical union it is made one. "We are no more strangers and foreigners but fellow-citizens with the Saints and of the Household of God." Men die or remove: but the Church remains and lives on. The retrospect is of life, not death. The plans and aims and hopes before us are of a Body that is crowned with immortality.

Two of our Bishops have died within the year, the Bishops of Indiana and of Kansas. The first, Dr. KNICKERBACKER, was a man singularly fitted for his place. He came of old Dutch stock, slow as men of that blood are, but devoted and keen and possessed of a persistency of purpose that could work and wait unwearied and undiscouraged, where others might despair. Such a man Indiana especially needed. Bishop KNICKERBACKER toiled on, never disheartened, and at last God called him. So viewed and understood, a life like this becomes a golden lesson for us all.

Bishop THOMAS, of Kansas, was scarcely known to me personally, and therefore I can only accept the general estimate which those who knew him intimately put upon his character and life; and I believe that they who knew him best honor his memory most highly.

Of our own Clergy, two have passed away. The Rev. Francis J. Clayton, Rector of Grace Church, Rutherford, after a lingering illness, followed by a painful surgical operation, died on the 27th day of December, 1894. His church career began as a choir boy in New York and he always retained his passionate love for church music. Devoted to his work, faithful to his convictions of duty, and loyal to those to whom he felt that loyalty was due, he passed away in pain but with the expression of Christian faith and trust, when his sun of life had barely reached its zenith.

The Rev. EDWARD B. BOGGS, D. D., who died on the 8th day of May in the present year, was a familiar figure in our Diocese, with which he had been connected during the past twenty-four years of his life, as Rector of a Parish, Secretary of the Convention and in other honorable and responsible capacities. There are few among our older Clergy and Laity who will not cherish a gentle and tender memory of one who was by birth and in every instinct of his heart a Jerseyman; and of whom we love to recall in death the memory of his quick capacity and his always genial and kindly nature.

The year viewed financially has been for our American people generally a trying one; and no doubt the prevailing stress has made itself felt to a greater or less extent in all our Parishes. In such circumstances, it is matter for grateful recognition that the work and progress of the Diocese have gone on almost as before with little abatement of their activity. Among other

indications of this, I may mention the erection of the small but attractive frame church for the St. Alban's Mission in Newark, which has been completed and occupied within the present month, a reference to which I may say in passing, belongs rather to the new year upon which we have entered than to the one just closed. I am also happy in being able to record that the new and noble stone church in Summit is begun, and that we may hope to see it finished if not occupied within the year. This when completed will be (if the architect's plans are carried out) one of the largest, most substantial, and architecturally correct buildings of which the Diocese can boast. A little church for the new Mission at Maplewood is picturesque in design and well placed for the convenience of the congregation, and will, it is hoped, be ready for use sometime during the Summer.

The new St. Paul's in Paterson is now in process of erection on a fine lot of ground situated in the most rapidly improving section of this fast-growing city, and although the pleasure felt by me in this new venture is marred by the departure of my friend, its honored Rector, for another field, I cannot but anticipate the happiest results for the Church's influence from this new centre where the Church's presence is so greatly needed if its work is to be thoroughly done.

On last Christmas Day, the new Church in Passaic was opened for worship by its late Rector. St. John's is a moderately large and very picturesque building, and I may add that although a heavy debt has been incurred in its erection, Passaic grows so rapidly in wealth and population that with unity and wise management there should be a hopeful future for this Par-

ish. There is at some distance from the location of the church a large population of working people resident near the river in the neighborhood of the mills. Some services have been already carried on there by a Lay Reader. My own experience with this class of our people is that they are quite accessible to the Church's influence if they are not left too long uncared for.

There have been two consecrations of Churches this year. The first was that of the stone building at Mt. Arlington, on Lake Hopatcong. This was intended at first to be what it is, I believe, popularly known as, a Union Chapel; but it was finally given to the Diocese in fee simple, which is the only tenure by which the Church should hold any of her real property. I must here publicly express my thanks to those gentlemen of the Park Association at Mt. Arlington who so generously made over the property to the Diocese in the first instance, and have since expressed their intention to contribute annually to the support of the services there.

On All Saints' Day, St. Mark's Church, Jersey City, was consecrated by me, the Bishop of Delaware preaching the sermon. Fourteen years ago the present Rector commenced mission services in a hired building which had been at one time occupied by the former St. Mark's Church in Jersey City, but which when that Parish ceased to exist had passed into the possession or occupancy of a Reformed Episcopal congregation, which in turn also passed into decay. After a few years the substantial stone church known as St. Mark's was built and occupied. A rectory and parish building both adjoining the church were also built or purchased.

Of course a considerable although manageable debt was incurred in securing all these. I should like to tell of the kindly and generous Layman, who, by his gift of \$15,000, made the consecration possible; it is his delicacy, not mine, which forbids.

To this record I must add the enlargement of St. Philip's Church in Newark, by which its capacity is doubled and its convenience and appearance greatly improved. It is pleasant to be able to say that these additions and improvements are all paid for.

Another enlarged church, St. John's, Jersey City Heights, which, first effecting a change in its charter by which it is enabled to hold its real estate in fee simple, has added largely by lengthening its nave not only to the capacity of the building, which was the first object sought after, but incidentally to its beauty also, the additional length securing a harmony of interior proportions which did not exist before, but which now justifies what it must be supposed was the original design of the architect.

St. Andrew's Parish, in South Orange; St. James' Church, Upper Montclair; Grace Church, Town of Union, known formerly as Union Hill; all of which were missions three or four years ago, are now successful Parishes. The last under its first Rector already numbers more than two hundred and twenty communicants and has secured possession within the year of a rectory adjoining the church. The attractive stone church at Upper Montclair is more than filled and must soon be enlarged. I regret deeply that its Rector, who has done so much for the parish, is about to leave for

Europe to take a charge in one of the cities on the Continent.

CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS,

The two Hospitals of the Diocese are doing well. St. Barnabas' in Newark passed through a financial crisis last Winter by reason of accumulated indebtedness, causing sudden and sharp anxiety to its many friends. The deep human interest in the good which such institutions accomplish and which fails to show itself at ordinary times until we begin to doubt even its existence, after all frequently is only latent, and so this occasion proved. Nearly twenty thousand dollars were given and the stress of anxiety was relieved. I must acknowledge once more a debt of gratitude to Dr. ARCHIBALD MERCER, by whose exertions several thousands of dollars were raised at a critical time; also to the late Mr. JOHN BALLANTINE for his generous and timely gift of \$5,000; and to the anonymous donor of \$10,000, contributed through the President of the Ladies' Guild of St. Barnabas, a contribution whose timely munificence put heart into the friends of the Hospital and gave them courage to go on.

Christ Hospital, Jersey City, as I am informed by directly concerned in its management, has suffered from no special embarrassment this year. Its especial friends stand by it and its management loyally. St. Katharine's Home in Jersey City continues quietly to do its work so like that of the Master who came to call not the righteous but sinners to repentance. Three of the poor girls (almost children) were confirmed by me this present year; and it may not be amiss if I say now

that frequent enquiries made by me of those who, following up the careers of the inmates after they had left the Home, were able to supply the information asked for, have left me no reason to regret my ministrations to the beneficiaries of St. Katharine's in this or in past years, but on the contrary justify the feeling of thankfulness that opportunity has been afforded me through the existence of this Home to discharge at least a few such ministrations.

The other institutions, mainly Homes for the Aged, and in the case of the House of the Good Shepherd, Orange, a temporary provision for convalescents, have been so often recommended that I pass them over with this brief notice. It is a high honor to say of these institutions that in all of them the religion together with the love of Christ as taught by the Church are of the daily atmosphere, so to say, which the beneficiaries breathe. Yet no questions are asked, no distinctions made, when they apply and are received. They are more than welcome to come and touch the sacred garment for their healing, if they will; or they may refuse. But that the Presence is there makes and marks their character, as Church and not simply Humanitarian Institutions.

I beg also to ask you and the other readers the Convention Journal not to overlook the Report of the Woman's Auxiliary. It does a work that reflects honor on the Diocese.

You will have an opportunity to hear a brief address before our Council closes from the Rev. Mr. PERKINS, Secretary of the Church Building Fund Commission, who will be able to explain one feature of the Commission which has called out some criticism; and also, as I sincerely trust, to remove the feeling of indifference which is, I fear, too prevalent among our people.

The close of the fifteenth year of my Episcopate invites one or two reflections which I trust may not be deemed inappropriate. Looking back over this stretch of time, we find that in regard to material growth there is very much to inspire courage and to be grateful for. In these fifteen years the number of our Clergy has increased from seventy-six to one hundred and eleven; of actually existing Parishes and Missions from sixty-four to ninety-two; the parochial contributions as published in our annual reports have much more than doubled. Sixteen of our Church buildings have been onlarged, beautified and otherwise improved. Twentynine new Churches, large and small, have been erected, and of these twenty-one are occupied by newly gathered congregations. Meanwhile during the decade and a-half the increase of communicants has been from less than eight to more than nineteen thousand. Statistics like these are of course simple facts which may not be contravened, but which nevertheless derive, as others do. much of their evidential value from their relation to others with which they are associated. Out of such relations frequently arise questions of much interest, and one or two such I have now to propose to you. Is our Diocese spiritually stronger from its material increase in these years, and if so, does the measure of material growth indicate that of the spiritual? why then this languid interest in our Diocesan Missions? and why do the nineteen thousand communicants of to-day do comparatively so little more for the cause of

Church extension within our own Diocesan borders than did the less than eight thousand of fifteen years ago? Is it that the clergy and people are selfishly taken up with their own local interests without care or solicitude for others who are placed religiously in less favored circumstances than they? I, who know you, Brethren, would repel and resent such an imputation if made by one who, not knowing, affected to judge you. Is it then that the work is not well planned, wisely organized, or effectively conducted? The very terms of the problem negative the suggestion. zeal in doing the work which is set us to do by Him whom we serve, is, let us remember, not merely the test, it is the mainspring of our devotion. The question which I have propounded, then, is one than which no other can concern us more nearly. I who am in closer relations with the Clergy than is possible with many Bishops whose jurisdictions cover far larger areas of territory, can testify, as I have always done, to the spirit of self-sacrifice and zeal which, with few exceptions, is characteristic of their life and work. I have full and substantial faith in our people also, and to both I present the case as one that calls for all serious consideration. Let me conclude this particular part of my address by expressing my own conviction that whenever in any one year, next year for instance, our people shall open their eyes to the truth, that this work of building up Christ's Kingdom at Home is a special one, involving a special obligation: whenever ceasing to regard the appeal that comes to them from the Chancel for Diocesan Missions as only one of many others, possessing like them a real but ordinary and transient importance; whenever they shall say to themselves, "This is different; The Diocese is my Ecclesiastical Home, if I do not my duty by it, no one else can—what can I do? What can I give for this? What fixed sum can I set apart out of my income for this cause?" Whenever our people reach this estimate of Christ's great work and their duty to it—I who have never doubted for a moment the generosity of our people or their devotion to the Church, whatever their ideal may be, am confident that their contributions will be doubled and their own satisfaction in making them doubled likewise, and that instead of the present sum, eight or ten thousand dollars will be annually given for the Work of Christ.

There will come up before you at this Convention a review of the Canon which sets forth the qualifications of voters and of parish officers. Let me as one who has had practical and sometimes disagreeable experience through certain ambiguities found in the present Canon, call your attention to two requirements, which I think are the only ones that need to be made clear and definite; one is involved in the question, What constitutes a "Worshipper" in the sense intended by the Canon?

The other and more difficult question is, What constitutes "a regular contributor?" especially in churches which are partly free and which in part have rented pews. Do plate collections alone satisfy the requirement? If so, how can a requirement be properly imposed, (the non-fulfilment of which involves penalty) when proof of the fulfilment is often of necessity impossible?

The following communication was sent by the Secretary of the House of Clerical and Lay Deputies of the General Convention for your final action. I think its terms should be considered carefully:

The General Convention

OF

THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH.

Right Reverend Sir:

In compliance with the requirements of Title III., Canon I, Section iii., of the Digest, I would hereby give particular notice that the following alteration of the Constitution of the Church is proposed; said alteration having been adopted by the House of Bishops and the House of Deputies of the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church, held in the city of Baltimore, Maryland, in October, A. D. 1892, to wit:

That to the 5th Article of the Constitution be added a clause in these words:

The General Convention may accept a cession of a part of the Territorial Jurisdiction of a Diocese, when the Bishop and Convention of such Diocese shall propose such cession, and threefourths of the parishes in the ceded territory, and also the same proportion of the parishes within the remaining territory, shall consent thereto.

In Testimony Thereof, I have this day hereunto affixed my name.

MISSIONS OF THE DIOCESE.

It is matter for sincere thankfulness on the part of those who have worked on steadily, acting under the impulse and control of a simple sense of duty, that of the missions referred to yesterday as of comparatively recent origin, either Diocesan or Parochial, nine are now successful and self-sustaining parishes; and five more, though they continue to be missions still, have never asked or received anything from the general missionary funds known as Diocesan, but depend, under God, upon their own efforts only for support. Passing from these to some of the others, Belvidere and Knowlton are old parishes; for they constituted parishes and not missions in former days, and these continue feeble, as they must always be until the industrial conditions change by which they are surrounded. But the few who are attached to them are devoted Christian folk. Phillipsburg, a growing industrial town below these on the river, has put on a new life within the year. Under its new Rector, Mr. MARTIN, the church is filled, and I confirmed twenty-seven persons there on my recent visitation of the place. Another year or two, as we may reasonably hope, will find this missionary parish placed at last on a comparatively strong and independent foundation.

Washington, also, is growing into strength. Here we have more than eighty communicants all sincerely and actively interested in the success of their mission.

The new church at Mount Arlington on Lake Hopatcong has a small Winter and large Summer congregation. Together with the embryo St. Andrew's at

the foot of the Lake and Stanhope, four miles distant, it makes up the group which has been so long hoped for in order to justify the efforts and true ambitions of a missionary in that special portion of the field. Thus slowly, but surely, the lines extend themselves towards the western border of the Diocese.

The mission of Saint Luke in Paterson is growing, and now numbers more than one hundred communicants, almost as many as the little church will accommodate. It is to be supplied after June by the services of a Deacon, who will be in charge. St. Mark's mission, Paterson, in the section of the city once occupied by St. Paul's, was begun on the 17th of June last, and was recognized as an "organized mission" on the 10th of the month following. In November the Rev. Mr. Evans became Missionary in charge. It has been successful from the first, asking no financial aid from the Diocese, and has at this time more than two hundred communicants on its Register. The services are held in the brick chapel built originally for Saint Paul's Sunday School, which seats three hundred and fifty people. This chapel by the sympathetic action of the Vestry of the old parish will in all probability ultimately become the property of St. Mark's.

I shall refer but briefly to other missions or Missionary Parishes. All Saints, Leonia, was begun last year by the Rector of St. James's Church, Ridgefield, and although a number of families are connected with and interested in it, no lot has as yet been secured or building erected. The people worship in a hired room. The church at Pamrapo is now remarkably well attended, and its prospects are excellent. St.

Alban's in Newark has completed its pretty church building and those interested are rejoicing in the accomplishment of this second and difficult stage of the enterprise. Here let me acknowledge the great debt of gratitude I owe to two gentlemen for aid most kindly and lovingly rendered; to Mr. D. Smith Wood for an interest which from the beginning has never flagged, and to Mr. William M. Franklin for sympathy with the work and large pecuniary aid, without which our efforts could hardly have been brought to so successful an issue.

Two missions have been carried on by parishes and deserve on this account more public recognition than they have received. Each of these is doing very successful work. I refer to Christ Church, Harrison, largely sustained and made possible by the assistance of Trinity Church, Newark, and St. Agnes, Lafayette, originated and carried on by St. Mark's Church, Jersey City.

Passing from these back again to the work which is specifically and responsibly Diocesan, I may say that Trinity Mission, Arlington, and the Church of the Ascension in Jersey City, are in numbers, attendance and interests, parishes, although in reality missions by reason of the comparatively small means of their people. The mission at Maplewood as yet asks no aid from the Diocese, but supports itself.

I will not, however, try your patience further, but, will refer you for particulars in these and other instances to the reports of the Archdeacons.

I conclude by a brief allusion to two new fields which can only be occupied successfully through the larger

gifts and contributions from the Diocese. One of these is in the new and growing village of Hasbrouck Heights, distant about three and a half miles from Hackensack, where about thirty-five or forty of the people resident are already communicants of the church. The other is in new territory opened by the New York and New Jersey Railroad running Northwest out of Jersey City. Here the Hillsdale Mission is already in existence, and here, also at Montvale, about two miles from Hillsdale and to the north of it. the people have already built at their own expense a small chapel, in which lay services are held. Small, but growing villages dot the line of the Road at short. intervals between where it leaves the meadows and the New York line, and a Missionary in Priest's Orders with a lay assistant should be placed there. It is for our people to say, whether this call and other calls besides this shall be answered or refused.

Reports.

I have received the following reports from the Reverend, the Archdeacons of the two Archdeaconries:

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF NEWARK.

To the Right Reverend Thomas A. Starkey, D.D., Bishop of Newark:

The past year has been a most comfortable one in regard to the oversight of the Mission work in the Archdeaconry of Newark, for the reason that there have been but few changes in our working forces, and those made without delay or interruption of the work. The past year has also been a satisfactory one in view of the faithful work done by our Missionaries and the gratifying results secured. Not by any means the least satisfactory feature in our review, is the fact that our Missionaries have received their stipends (such as they are) in full when due, and have not, as in former years, been obliged to bear the added burden of worry through failure of receiving their meagre support.

For the first time in its history your Board of Missions has received sufficient contributions to meet all appropriations. It is to be hoped that this will mark a new era in our Mission work, and that now, having reached the point of raising the minimum of missionary support, the Board may be encouraged to go on and appropriate to our faithful workers, living stipends, which as yet, they have never received.

I take it that this question of adequate support is the most important question that at present occupies our attention. It cannot be expected that we can long retain satisfactory men in our mission field, unless we can provide a decent living for them, and I unhesitatingly main-

tain that six or seven hundred dollars a year for a man who has a wife and family to support is not a decent living; and we ought to be relieved from the humiliation of being obliged to ask any one to try to live on such a pittance. I sincerely hope that the present Convention will enable their Board of Missions to make a larger appropriation

for the coming year.

The Missionary Work of the Archieaconry has been carried on during the past year by eight Priests and one Lay-Reader, with an appropriation by the Board of \$2,250, being an average of \$250 to each worker. By these, services have been maintained at thirteen different points, parishes or mission stations, besides much pastoral work done in outlying regions, especially in the upper part of Warren county, by our Missionary at Belvidere and Knowlton. In all these places there have been 54 baptisms, 55 confirmations and nearly 500 communicants reported, not including a large number of Summer residents ministered to in the Lake region.

If time and space permitted I would gladly incorporate in full in this report the interesting letters I have recently received from our Missionaries respecting their work, and from which these few statistics have been

compiled.

Much valuable work is being done which cannot be represented by figures and of which, perhaps, little will be known until the great day of final rewards. Some few

particulars I feel bound to mention:

In Phillipsburg, which for years has been a source of anxiety to those most interested, there has been decided growth. Shortly after the meeting of the last Convention, the Rev. N. H. Martin, from the Diocese of Northern Michigan, took charge of St. Luke's Parish, and has been enabled to awaken an interest among the people such as had not been experienced before. The congregation fills the church, and the Vestry are considering the question

of enlargement. A Parish House has been begun, which when completed will provide sorely needed accommodations for a live force of Parish workers. Twenty-seven persons were confirmed at the last visitation of the Bishop, and the communicant list has been increased from 72 to 112.

The work at Lake Hopatcong and vicinity under the general direction of the Rev. Wm. M. Pickslay, assisted by the Rev. W. S. Barrows and a Lay-Reader, is also an encouraging feature.

The Stone Chapel at Mt. Arlington has been given to the Diocese and was consecrated by the Bishop in August last. Services have been maintained regularly there throughout the year, and also at Hopatcong Landing with satisfactory results. The Summer residents at the Lake have contributed most generously to the support of this work, and there is every reason to believe that it will continue to be self-supporting. It has never received aid from the Board.

Once upon a time, how long ago I cannot tell, there were a Church Building and a congregation in Hackettstown; unfortunately, such has not been the case for several years. The Mission failed, died, and, so far as known, there was no post mortem to account for the decease. Probably it was the result of that common disease known as heart-failure. I am glad to say that there is good hope of its resurrection.

Mr. Pickslay reports that he has found in Hackettstown at least fifteen communicants, and they are most anxious to have church services re-established. For the past few months he has been giving them a weekly service on a week day, held in the houses of these church people, which seems to be much appreciated. They have raised a fund for renting the old chapel that once belonged to the Mission, and hope to be able to provide for the services of a Lay Reader during the Summer months.

It is but fair to state that most of these apparently live Church people are new comers to the town and not of those who were lost sight of some years ago. This evidence of renewed life in such a place as Hackettstown, where a forlorn hope had gradually been considered a lost cause, and finally a dead issue, is certainly most gratifying—and it is much to be desired that the Board of Missions may be enabled to provide for the permanent re-estabment of clerical services at that place.

Here is a striking instance of the need and value of the services of a general Missionary or *real* Archdeacon if we only had one. Such an official could immediately seize upon the opportunity opening in Hackettstown and for a time devote himself entirely to that work, pushing it for all it was worth. After it was once fairly reestablished it would only require a smaller portion of his time.

I referred to this subject of a General Missionary in my last Annual Report. I shall take pleasure in continuing to refer to it annually, so long as I have the honor of occupying my present position. That portion of my Report was referred by the last Convention to the Board of Missions for their consideration. As we have not heard from them in that regard it is to be taken for granted that they found it too weighty a matter for them to handle. Still it is a living question and a crying need in our Mission Work.

It may be interesting in this connection to know what other Dioceses are doing in this regard. In a neighboring Diocese at its Convention recently held, a report was received from a committee appointed a year ago to consider "a plan for the more efficient carrying on of Diocesan Missions."

I quote a portion of that report as follows: "The Bishop shall, with the concurrence of the Board of Missions, appoint a Presbyter, who shall not while in office hold a parochial charge, to be the Archdeacon of the Diocese, to serve until the consecration of a new Bishop, provided that the Bishop at any time, for reasons satisfactory to himself, may remove the Archdeacon, and shall remove him upon the request of two-thirds of the Board. The Archdeacon shall be the representative of the Bishop as Chief Missionary of the Diocese. He shall have the direction of all missions without a missionary and shall provide for their temporary supply; and he shall generally supervise and actively promote the cause of Missions in the Diocese."

While the wording of this Report is not particularly felicitous, yet it expresses the idea fully. It provides for an officer which every Diocese needs, who can relieve the Bishop from many cares, fill in any gap that may occur in the working force, seize and make the most of any opportunity for new work, and last, but not least, make known the needs and progress of the work to the Diocese at large.

I know full well that such an official would be an added expense to the Diocese; but I know also of no legitimate undertaking in which we may expect to get something for nothing.

It has been my privilege during the past year to be able to respond to several invitations from rectors of parishes to address their congregations on the subject of our Diocesan Missionary work.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF JERSEY CITY.

To the Right Reverend Thomas A. Starkey, D. D., Bishop of Newark:

My Dear Bishop: The mission work in the Archdeaconry of Jersey City is full of encouragement and cheer. Its prospects were never so bright; its work was never better done. On Thursday evening, May 7th, in company with Rev. John Keller, the Bishop's Chaplain, I visited Hasbrouck Heights.

This is a borough on the line of the New York and New Jersey Railroad, about midway between Jersey City and Hackensack. It has the estimated population of 1,200. It is situated on high ground with beautiful views in all directions. The streets are admirably laid out and macadamized. The water supply is excellent. The place is well lighted with electric lights. The people, with but very few exceptions, are owners of their own property. The land is sold under rigid restrictions.

We met between fifty and sixty of the citizens in the parlors of the borough Inn. After a devotional service the question of organizing a mission of the church was freely discussed. As a result, all who were present, the great majority being confirmed members of the church, pledged themselves to the hearty support of the Mission if consent were given to its formation.

Over \$500 was subscribed there and then for the support of services for the first year. That sum can be increased to \$600 with ease. I strongly advise the formation of the Mission and recommend a vigorous prosecution of the work.

The next morning we visited the established Mission of

the Holy Trinity, Hillsdale, on the same Railroad. This Mission has met with a great loss in the removal of the Rev. Henry M. Ladd, who has lately accepted a call to Grace Church, Rutherford. No discouragement exists in the Mission, however. Quite recently a large and valuable lot, measuring 150 feet by 150 feet, has been given it. The chapel building has been moved to it and placed on one corner of it. Ample room is left for a Rectory and a Church building. A Rectory will probably next be built. The property is free of debt, a balance of \$150 being on hand for building purposes. There are thirty-three families and parts of families connected with the Mission. There are thirty-five communicants. The Sunday School numbers sixty five; four have been baptized, three have been confirmed. The offerings have been \$1,007.04.

I have been able to secure for its use fifty Revised

Prayer Books and fifty Revised Hymnals.

That same evening we visited Montvale and Park Ridge. These are continuous boroughs, a country road only dividing them, with a population of 600. In Montvale a most picturesque chapel is in process of erection, The walls are of stone taken from the adjoining fields. The roof and gables are of frame with rustic finish. It is a marvel of cheapness. The stone walls cost only 8:40. The total cost of all will be only \$1.500. We held service in the building, the first ever held in it. Sixty-five were in the congregation. All pledged themselves to the support of the work. This, too, should be vigorously pressed. This portion of the Diocese differs greatly from certain other portions. It is alive with a young and vigorous life It is filling up with marvelous rapidity with a most excellent population. It is but a portion of the Greater New York. There is now an almost continuous line of habitation from Jersey City to the northern boundary of the State. We shall make a grievous mistake if we do not improve our present opportunity.

This is equally true of the line of the Northern Railroad of New Jersey. One of the most promising points on this road is Leonia, a borough but a short distance out from Jersey City. Many of its property owners are artists of national fame. There is here the organized Mission of All Saints, under the charge of the Rev. Walter M. Sherwood, Rector of St. James' Church, Ridgefield.

There are twenty-seven families numbering ninetyeight souls in the Mission. There have been four baptized in the past year; ten have been confirmed; there are forty communicants; sixty services have been held; the Holy Communion has been celebrated fourteen times;

there are fifty scholars in the Sunday-school.

A corner lot, measuring 100 feet by 200 feet in a central situation has been purchased at a cost of \$500. Plans have been drawn for a church building to cost \$5,000. An effort is now being made to raise \$1,000 for the beginning of the church building. When this is in hand, and when active agencies are at work for the raising of more,

the work may be begun,

The Mission of the Good Shepherd at Fort Lee continues under the charge of Rev. Mr. Sherwood. The growth of this place is merely delayed. At the present time the rates of travel are too high. A change in this will soon come. The growth then will be rapid. The mission is doing well. There are 46 families connected with it, numbering 176 souls; 19 have been baptized. There are 85 communicants; 70 services have been held. The Holy Communion has been celebrated 16 times. There are 140 scholars, with 8 teachers, in the Sunday-school. The offerings have been \$391.45.

The good work goes encouragingly on at the Mission Church of the Ascension, Jersey City Heights, under the lead of the Rev. James Cameron. Notwithstanding the distressingly hard times, times which have affected the people of this locality as seriously as those of any locality in this portion of the State, much has been done. As reported last year, the mortgage indebtedness on the church has been reduced from \$5,000 to \$4,000, and that on the Rectory from \$2,900 to \$2,400.

There have been 23 baptized in the past year; 22 have been confirmed; there have been 28 burials; there are nearly 200 communicants; the offerings amount to \$2,064.50. This is the best showing in the history of the Mission.

The Board of Missions made no mistake when a small stipend was voted by it to Calvary Church, Bayonne. This work had been in a moribund condition for a number of years. One year ago, upon my nomination, the Bishop of the Diocese appointed the Rev. Horatio W. Maguire, then a Deacon, to the charge of the work. Wonders have been done in this one year. This can be seen as comparison is made between the reports of last year and this year. Then there were 75 families connected with the work; now there are 160, numbering 530 souls; then 7 had been baptized, now 36; then 8 were reported confirmed, now 17; then there were 75 communicants, now there are 120; then 107 public services had been held, this year there have been 160; there had been 12 public celebrations of the Holy Communion; there have been 31 this year; there were 125 scholars, with 15 teachers in the Sunday-school, now there are 180 scholars, with 15 teachers.

The condition of the property has been greatly improved. The oil lamps have given way to gas fixtures. A new carpet is expected in the very near future. Through the kindness and generosity of the Newark Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary I have been able to replace the former windows of most unseemly kind with exceedingly pretty windows of cathedral glass. The offerings have amounted to \$1,112. This work has been born again.

The work at St. Agnes' Mission, Lafayette, has made decided progress since the last report. A sewing school, with an attendance of roo has been maintained. Mothers' meetings have been held. There is a boys' club, with a membership of 40. There have been 30 baptisms; ro have been confirmed; there are 50 communicants. This mission continues to be supported entirely by St. Mark's Church, Jersey City. The Rev. P. C. Pyle, Curate of St. Mark's, is in immediate charge.

The vigorous work heretofore done in St. Luke's Mission, Paterson, is faithfully continued. The average attendance at the Sunday services is 100; there have been 28 baptisms; 18 have been confirmed; there are 130 communicants; 185 children are in the Sunday-school; \$500 has been paid on the mission indebtedness; only \$75 remains unpaid; this will be paid in the very near future. The Sunday-school of St. Paul's Church, Paterson, is paying for the lot. Mr. Robert Perine, the very efficient Lay Reader for the past two years, will be ordained to the Diaconate in June. He will then be appointed Minister in charge of this work by the Bishop. The mission is to be congratulated upon this.

The new Mission of St. Mark's, Paterson, has fully made good the bright promises of one year ago. The first services were held on the 17th day of June, 1894. In November, 1894, the Bishop appointed the Rev. William P. Evans priest in charge. Since then the increase has been rapid and substantial. There are 900 souls connected with the mission; there are 220 communicants; 21 have been baptized, 42 have been confirmed; the Sunday School numbers 300; the offerings have been \$3,211.50. This mission has been entirely self supporting. It has all the elements of a substantial parish, and will soon ask to be received as such.

The work at St. Thomas' Mission, Lyndhurst, has been much hampered owing to the sickness and death of the Rev. F. J. Clayton, who was in direct charge of it. The Rev. Mr. Ladd is now in charge, and under his energetic management a good report will be heard next year. The offerings of the mission have been \$154.24. There are 24 families; there have been 6 baptisms; I has been confirmed; there are 22 communicants; there are 64 scholars in the Sunday-school.

The mission of the Epiphany, Allendale, has secured a very good lot in a more central location, and has removed the chapel building to it. This will be to the great advantage of the work. The faithful band of church workers will do in the future as they have done in the past, pay their own way and maintain their own services.

The mission at Nordhoff continues under the protecting care of the Rev. Mr. Flichtner, rector of St. Paul's Church, Englewood. The report of its work will be found in the report of the mother parish.

This Archdeaconry is full of mission work of the most fruitful kind. The great and pressing need is for an old time pentecostal outpouring of the Spirit of the living God, that the heart of this Convention might be touched, and the heart of the Diocese might be touched, and that means in abundance might be furnished for the prosecution of work which is lying at our very doors.

In brief, ten missions are mentioned in this report. The statistics of two of these are not given here; they are incorporated in the reports of the mother parishes. The remaining eight report—2,974 souls; 1,284 Sunday-school scholars; 171 baptisms; 113 confirmations; 862 communicants; and \$8,840.73 in offerings. And all this at a cost to the Diocese of but a little upwards of \$1,200 for the past year.

On the 17th day of June, 1894, the first service of St. Mark's Mission was held in the old Sunday-school building of St. Paul's Parish, now known as St. Mark's Chapel, and for more than four months services were maintained with the assistance of various clergymen who were engaged from week to week. The Mission was organized under Title I, Can. 9, § II of the Code of Canons of the Diocese, on July 21, 1894, the Bishop's letter stating that "the said Mission is for the spiritual benefit of people resident in that portion of Paterson in which the old St. Paul's Church was established for many years." The minister in charge was appointed November 13, 1894. Until December 1st there was no resident clergyman, and while previous to that time the progress was such as to justify the most sanguine hopes for the future, the greater part of the growth indicated in the above report was accomplished within the last six months, and the larger proportion of the expenditures belongs to the same period.

I have assisted from time to time, as far as my health has permitted; have solemnized one marriage, and officiated at two funerals.

To the Right Rev. Thomas A. Starkey, D.D.:

I have the honor of submitting to you the following report of my acts as Chaplain of St. Barnabas' Hospital. Since August 1, 1894, the date of my appointment, Divine Service has been held every Sunday afternoon in the Hospital Chapel, in all, 46 times. Beginning with Septuagesima, February 10th, I have preached a brief sermon at each of these services.

Services have been held during the week on Wednesdays and Fridays at 4 p.m., in all, 92 times. ENDOWMENT FUND.

This account continues as reported last year—the total amount of \$20,100 being variously invested at an average of about five per cent., and the interest being used on account of current expenses.

HOUSEHOLD ACCOUNT.

The by-laws provide for an annual report showing the actual receipts and expenditures made upon this account; always a difficult thing to do, it is this year simply impossible, for the reason that in the payment of the entire

"floating debt" many accounts of a former year were included. It is fair to estimate, however, that \$12,000 will be very near the figures for the household expenses of a single year, with average annual receipts from ordinary or regular sources about the same amount; leaving nothing, however, for the payment of extraordinary expenses, repairs and the like, which from time to time occur and have to be paid in some way.

THE HOSPITAL PROPERTY.

No important change has been made during the past year upon the grounds or buildings of the hospital, and the property is fully insured. The cost of the entire property and buildings, furniture, etc., to date, is a little over \$90,000. Twenty-one building lots on South Tenth street remain unsold, but from their very desirable location must increase in value.

THE FLOATING DEBT.

The "floating debt" is a thing of the past. It is not necessary here to re-present the details of the work with which you are already familiar. The earnest efforts of the Board, the Guild, and the Medical Staff, so nobly responded to by generous contributors, made its extinguishment possible, and the figures of this report tell the result—simply this, that with the single exception of the \$25,000 mortgage upon its property, the Hospital of St. Barnabas is, at the close of this fiscal year, free from debt. Hereafter, therefore, the ordinary income of the hospital goes directly for the payment of current expenses, and it is estimated that future deficiencies need not occur if such income is kept up to the present average, while legacies or other extraordinary donations may be added to the Endowment Fund, or, as its equivalent,

applied to the reduction of the mortgage, and thus strengthen and continue the present most satisfactory financial standing of the Hospital of St. Barnabas.

Charging the outlay for current expenses to those patients occupying beds, the cost per day for each patient has been only 71 cents, as against 92 cents the previous year, thereby showing that a larger number of patients can be cared for, at a less expense for each person.

These statistics present some facts to which especial attention should be called. Christ Hospital has reached the point where it is being pressed to about the full ex-

tent of its capacity.

The demands upon the Institution have been steadily increasing, as the following exhibits:

Of the 741 patients this last year, 604 were treated free. Not only, therefore, have we provided three-quarters charity but nearly seven-eighths the past year. These facts challenge attention: First—The bonded debt of Christ Hospital of thirty thousand dollars must be vigorously taken hold of and its payment begun, lest the enlargement of the work, which will soon be demanded, be seriously injured and delayed. Second—The public should be duly impressed with the great charity work Christ Hospital is doing, and sustain it liberally, that it may be fully up to and prepared to meet the increasing demands which are being made upon it.

The reports of the Treasurer and Special Treasurer of the Building Fund present a remarkable showing, especially for a year of continued financial depression in the business world. Over twenty three thousand dollars have been received. Of this a little over six thousand and six hundred dollars were from legacies; the remaining eighteen thousand and over being through regular channels. We have thus been enabled to pay off some

of the pressing floating debt of the Building Fund, and to meet the current expenses and interest for the past year.

St. Luke's Guild carries on the work of gaining subscriptions for the Charity Fund. Any person who subscribes five dollars or more annually is a member of this Guild. It has received over two thousand dollars the past year.

St. Mary's Guild is an auxiliary of the Finance Committee, and is charged with the special work of trying to raise annually the interest on the debt incurred in building the Hospital and in reducing the principal. It has in circulation 442 Mite Boxes, which are collected from quarterly, and in other ways it has received fifteen hundred dollars the past year. This amount, which covers the interest, they have been steadily working for, and now they open a subscription for special gifts to be applied to the principal of the bonded debt. Every dollar so given will reduce the debt one dollar and the interest on the same. The Council commend this work and hopes this year to see the first payment made on the mortgage debt.

The Abercrombie Guild is an auxiliary to the Council and works for the general good of Christ Hospital. They have in charge all that relates to Donation Week, which They send out Hungry is now Thanksgiving Week. Bags for gifts of money and provisions, and the increase of interest in the Institution is most touchingly manifested in the opening of these bags, which come from all sorts and conditions of men. The gifts far outnumbered any previous year, and the Council desire to thank all who sent donations, and especially the Public Schools, Firemen and other organizations who so nobly remembered our work. The principal w k, however, to which the Abercrombie Guild is commit 1 is the endowment of beds. In April, 1878, they began i uing a monthly paper called "The Daisy." Ten cents sound in the Hospital grounds were put at interest toward the endowment of a Daisy Bed for children, and through the efforts of that paper the endowment funds of the Abercrombie Guild have reached the extraordinary sum of thirty-eight thousand dollars. The Council desire to put on record the appreciation of the work of the Abercrombie Guild, and especially the work of Miss Mary C. Barry, through whose letters in "The Daisy" these endowments have been largely gathered.

The Medical Board presents in the records of work accomplished, a showing which gains for them, what they are surely establishing, a reputation second to none other in the State. The average stay of patients has been only a little over three weeks, while the cures effected, and difficult operations successful, commend them to the confidence of the public, and the Council congratulate them on the high standing to which they have attained.

The Training School for Nurses now numbers nine graduates who have received the Diploma and the Medal of Christ Hospital, and eight Pupil Nurses. It cares for the sick in the wards and private rooms of the Hospital, and in private families so far as it is able to do. This branch of the work needs to be extended, and the property south of the Hospital has been purchased and presented to the Council, whereon will soon be erected St. Elizabeth's Memorial Home for Nurses.

The Chaplain has maintained the services in the Chapel and in the wards and in private ministrations to the sick, and we are indebted to him for the spiritual life among all the inmates of the Institution.

The Collector has been engaged most of the year in other duties, and yet he has been able to solicit subscriptions of over twelve hundred dollars.

A new Ambulance and Harness have been presented to the Hospital from citizens of the Town of Union, and a Horse from the North Hudson County Railroad Company, which is greatly appreciated by the Council, and we desire to make public acknowledgment and return our sincere thanks to every one who contributed towards these, as well as the money which was left over and paid to the Treasurer of the Hospital.

We desire also to thank those kind friends who have given so liberally towards having the entire interior of the Hospital painted, including all the walls, and put in order throughout, during the past Summer.

The Endowment of Beds through the Council, added to those endowed through the Abercrombie Guild, makes the total endowment of forty-nine thousand dollars.

We close our year devoutly thankful to Almighty God for his never failing blessings to us, even through a year of continued financial depression in the business world; for while our work is continually growing, the friends of the Institution are increasing, and their gifts are sustaining us to do this work. The condition of Christ Hospital is far in advance of anything previously reported, and the demands made upon it, and the gifts sent us from all classes of persons, show an appreciation of the work which speaks for itself. May Christ help us to continue and extend this charity to His glory and the relief of sick and suffering humanity of every name.

r. St. Katharine's Home is intended to help unmarried girls who have been led astray for the first time, and to shelter them before and after motherhood.

11. Application must be made to the Chaplain, or to the Sister in charge, who will investigate each case.

111. Applicants must be recommended by trustworthy persons and must bring a certificate of good health from a physician in regular standing.

IV. Each girl must sign a written promise to remain in the Home for a fixed length of time, to conform to the Rules of the house, and to perform such a share of the house and other work as may be assigned her.

REPORT

For the Year ending November 1st, 1894.

Since the last annual report the good work of the Home has gone on smoothly and helpfully. 25 girls have been in the Home during the year, and at the present date there are 13 girls and 7 babies.

The new floors in the nursery and the girls' sitting room are a great improvement. The "Sister in charge" bought the flooring and had it put down, the girls doing

all the finishing themselves, which was a great saving of money. They have painted several rooms, thus making the Home much more attractive.

In one report made during the winter the Sister says that she has been greatly encouraged in her work by the fact that the girls have shown more appreciation of the help they were receiving at the Home than ever before. The interest they have shown in helping to improve the Home and in their work certainly proves this.

It is an unusual fact that in an institution like this, during an excessively hot summer, not one baby has died. The Sister attributes the general good health of the children to the fact that they have been kept out of doors so much. This probably was a great factor, but a still greater one was the excellent care the babies and the babies' mothers received in the Home.

It is with great regret that the Sister speaks of the resignation of Dr. Loomis. Since the establishment of the Home until last winter, when his health positively forbade his doing the work, Dr. Loomis has been most faithful in his attendance upon the sick at the Home. No one knowing his work can help feeling sincere sorrow that he has been obliged to lay it down.

To Dr. Noble we all feel greatly indebted for what he has done since Dr. Loomis left. We feel confident that the inmates of the Home will be as well cared for in the future as they have been in the past.

The lack of work for the girls is a great drawback. They can be so much better instructed in all the departments if the work is in the Home for them to do. We would ask all the members of the Advisory Board to take this matter of providing work into serious consideration. Those who have had sewing done speak in unqualified praise of it. This is true of the embroidery, both ecclesiastical and of the ordinary kind. It may not be inappropriate to enumerate the kinds of work that can be done

at the Home. All kinds of laundry work, plain sewing, children's dresses, underclothing, vestments and ecclesiastical embroidery, lettering and other kinds of fancy embroidery. The Sister would be glad if some one would volunteer to give lessons in cooking or would send some one to teach the girls in that department. Knowing as we all do, the sufferings we endure from ill equipped cooks, it seems to me that teaching any of the girls to cook properly would be real Missionary work. I suggest this matter, also, to the serious consideration of the Advisory Board. The Secretary is often asked why the reports of the reforming work of the Home are so meagre, why we do not in our yearly report tell of individual cases that have been helped and strengthened and sent out of the Home fitted for the battle of life by the help they have received in this shelter. It would seem a very simple matter for the Secretary or the Sister in Charge in their reports to tell you the stories of these lives, and I am sure the pitifulness of some of them would nearly break your hearts, but we have no possible right to do it.

In his annual address to the Churchmen of Maryland, in speaking of the House of Mercy at Washington, which is a Home for unfortunate women, Bp. Paret says: "I am sure this work has Christ's sympathy, because it seeks to help that class of sinners out of whom one poor sinful woman came to Him, and while Pharisees despised her and felt insulted by her presence, He permitted her to approach Him and win from Him His words of forgiveness and blessing: words which many profess to admire sentimentally while in their hearts they side with the Pharisees." * * * Of the inmates of the House of Mercy the Bishop says: "Their histories are such as hide from publication. We cannot reveal them. They would tell indeed of failures and return to sin, but they would tell of lives forced into sin not of their own choice, and of lives renewed, reformed, blessed,"

Much that Bishop Paret says of the House of Mercy is true of St. Katharine's. Of most that come to us no one but the Sister and Chaplain know what their lives have been. That all have suffered we feel quite certain; that many of them are repentant we firmly believe; and that the influence of this Home has helped to restore them to self-respecting lives while giving them the blessed hope of an eternal home, we are quite assured.

HOUSE OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD, ORANGE.

The past year of this Home for the Aged closed in June with twenty permanent inmates, three having been received during the year, and in addition eight convalescents and one friendless girl being temporarily housed.

The Treasurer reported the receipts during the year for current expenses at \$3,995.99, and the expenditures at \$3,882.86, leaving a balance in the treasury of \$113.09.

A Young Ladies' Auxiliary of the Home was organized in December last, composed of representatives of the various Parishes constituting the Home, whose object is the providing of delicacies for the inmates, a suitable observance of the festivals of the Church and occasional entertainments, which have since been furnished accordingly, to the delight and comfort of all concerned.

A regular week-day service, with a monthly communion and a regular Sunday evening service and sermon, are reported by the Chaplain, with one inmate confirmed during the year. A majority of the inmates are regular communicants of the Church.

The Parishes represented on the Board of Managers are the same as last reported, with the exception of St. Mark's, Orange, withdrawn.
