TITLE I, CANON 1, § II.

OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election, in the following form:

[Name of the Church, the place and date.]

This certifies that at a meeting of the congregation of this Church for the purpose of electing Church Officers and Deputies to the Convention (or for the purpose of electing Deputies to the Convention, if the meeting be for that purpose alone,) A. B., C. D. and E. F., being members of the congregation and communicants of the Church, were duly chosen to represent the congregation in that body for the ensuing year. In testimony of which I have hereunto set my hand (or, if two Wardens subscribe, we have set our hands) the day and the year above written.

. N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary sign, then the signatures of both Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-in-charge or Missionary cannot sign.

The Lay Representation is limited to three Deputies, whose names in full should be carefully and legibly written.

Three Alternate Deputies must also be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies. (See Title I, Canon 6, § II [2].)

This Certificate is to "be transmitted to the Secretary of the Convention at least ten days before the meeting of the Annual Convention," (See Title I, Canon 1, § II.)

In order to secure this, the Secretary will forward a blank form to every parish, and he earnestly asks the PROMPT attention of the Clergy.

*** By the terms of the Constitution and Canons, the Deputies must be communicants of the Church, and also qualified voters in the Parish which elects them. (See Title I, Canon 6, § II. [4], [5] and [6].)

- When any member is about to speak, he shall with due respect.
 address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
- No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply), in the same debate, without leaveof the Convention.
- 10. At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
- All questions shall be decided viva voce, unless otherwisespecially ordered.
- 12. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote of the Convention may be taken by orders voting separately, and the names shall be entered on the Minutes.
- 13. The doors of the Convention shall be opened for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
- 14. No member shall leave the Convention without permission.

- 15. In all elections, those persons only who shall have a majority of all the votes given, shall be deemed elected; but if in any case more than the required number of persons shall have a majority of votes, the required number of persons having the highest number of votes shall be deemed elected, and in case of a tie between two or more candidates, there shall be a new ballot.
- 16. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone it to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
- 17. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order, he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.

JOURNAL.

CHRIST CHURCH, EAST ORANGE, N. J. May 19, 1896.

In accordance with the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church, in the Diocese of Newark, and the appointment of the Bishop, the Twenty-Second Annual Convention of said Church, was held in Christ Church, East Orange, on Tuesday, May 19th, 1896, at 10 A. M.

The Right Reverend, the Bishop of the Diocese, celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by the Rector of the Parish, the Rev. WILLIAM W. DAVIS, the Rev. George W. Shinn, D.D., of the Diocese of Massachusetts, the Rev. Joseph H. Smith, and the Rev. John Keller. The Bishop read a portion of his Annual Address.

The Convention was then called to order, the Bishop in the chair.

The Secretary called the roll of the Clergy* and of the Lay Deputies,† and announced that there was present a constitutional quorum of both orders.

The Trustees of the Episcopal Fund stated, that, owing to the illness of their Secretary and Treasurer, they were unable at this time to make a full report, and asked permission to report progress, and to have their full report printed in the Journal. On motion of the Secretary, their request was granted. (See appendix III.)

The Secretary presented an application of St. Mark's Church, Paterson, to be received into union with the Convention, and moved that it be referred to the Committee on New Parishes. It was so referred.

Mr. Alfred Mills, for the Committee appointed at the last Convention, to revise Appendix II, to the Constitution and Code of Canons, reported progress, and on his motion, the Committee was continued. The hour of I P. M. having arrived, the Convention took a recess.

Resolved, That Clergymen of other Dioceses, and Candidates for Orders, who may be present, be admitted to honorary seats in this Convention, and that they be requested to hand their names to the Secretary.

Under this resolution, the REV. GEORGE W. SHINN, D.D., of the Diocese of Massachusetts, and the REV. WILLIAM STANLEY BARROWS, of the Diocese of North Carolina, took their seats.

On motion of the Rev. Mr. Keller, the Bishop was requested to appoint a Committee of three, on the New Legislation of the General Convention, mentioned in his address.

The Bishop appointed as such Committee, the Rev. George M. Christian, D.D., Mr. Alfred Mills, and Mr. Cortlandt Parker.

The Report of the Corporation for the Relief of Widows and Children of Clergymen of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the State of New Jersey, being in order, no formal report was made, but brief statements in regard to the subject were made by the Rev. Messrs. Gwynne and Douglas.

On motion of the Rev. Mr. Keller, the Bishop was requested to appoint a Committee of three on that part of his address referring to the death of the Rev. Robert N. Merritt, D.D. The Bishop appointed the Rev. Dr. Holley, the Rev. Dr. Hughes, and Mr. William M. Franklin.

D. C. WIGHTMAN, JOHN J. S. RUTAN. Auditing Committee.

The Rev. Charles Douglas presented the Report of the Committee on New Parishes, as follows:

The Committee beg to report that the papers accompanying the application of St. Mark's Church, Paterson, N. J., are correct, and would recommend the admission of the parish into union with the Convention.

On motion, the Parish of St. Mark, Paterson, was admitted into union with the Convention.

The REV. WILLIAM R. JENVEY presented the Report of the Standing Committee.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The Standing Committee respectfully reports seven meetings held during the past Conventional year.

On the 29th of May, 1895, the Committee organized by electing the Rev. Robert Norris Merritt, D.D., President, and the Rev. William R. Jenvey, Secretary. Permission was given the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen of St. Matthew's Church, Jersey City, to sell their Rectory and Rectory lot for the sum of \$4,500, providing the proceeds of said sale were so applied as to leave the mortgage on the Church property not greater then \$2,000, and the remaining \$1,000 used as the Special Committee should approve.

On the 26th of June, 1895, consent was given to the consecration of the Rev. Frank Rosebrook Millspaugh, B. D., Bishop-elect of Kansas, and the proper testimonial signed. Permission was given the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen, of St. Paul's Church, East Orange, to mortgage their Church properties, old and new, for the sum of \$7,500.

On the 26th of September, 1895, Mr. George Biller, Jr. was recommended to the Bishop as a candidate for Holy Orders, and the proper testimonial signed. Permission was given the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen, of Calvary Church, Summit, to sell their former Church property for a sum not less than \$20,000, or to mortgage the same for a sum not greater than \$10,000, and to mortgage the ... First Tract" of their new property, known as the Parish

house property, and the "Second Tract," known as the Parsonage property, for the sum of \$15,000.

On the 19th of December, 1895, the Secretary officially announced the death of the Rev. Robert Norris Merritt, D.D., so long the honored President of the Committee. The Rev. William Welles Holley, D.D., was unanimously elected President of the Committee.

The following minute was unanimously adopted, and ordered spread upon the minutes:

"We meet to-day without our President, a member of this Committee since the formation of the Diocese, and and for many years before of the Committee of the undivided Diocese, and for almost the whole of that long period serving either as its Secretary or its President. The death of Dr. Merritt has made a vacancy hard to be filled. and, from our human point of view, greatly to be lament. Faithful and conscientious in his office; painstaking and accurate in the discharge of duty; frank and clear in expressing his views; just and generous in his judgment: kind and courteous in manner; we who were his coworkers, desire in this brief minute, to express our estimate of his worth. Our master is taken from our head today, and we feel that we have lost a wise counsellor from our Committee, and the Diocese a true and loyal priest. We bless God for the good example of His servant now numbered with His Saints in glory everlasting; and, in the midst of our human sorrow, we joy with joy unspeakable and full of glory, as we think of God's most precious gift to His servant, our President's first Christmas in Paradise.

Permission was given the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen, of the Church of the Holy Communion, Paterson, to rearrange their mortgage indebtedness by cancelling existing mortgages amounting to \$26,000, and executing new ones for a sum not to exceed \$24,000.

Mr. CALEB B. K. WEED, was recommended to the Bishop

as a candidate for Holy Orders, and the proper testimonial signed. The Rev. Robert Perine, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests, and the proper testimonial signed. Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev. Gersham Mott Williams, M.A., Bishop-elect of Marquette, and the proper testimonial signed. Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev. William Lewis Burton, M.A., Bishop-elect of Lexington, and the proper testimonial signed. The Rev. Frank B. Reazor, Rector of St. Mark's Church, West Orange, was unanimously elected to fill the vacancy in the Committee caused by the death of the Rev. Dr. Merritt.

The Rev. William Malvon Mitcham, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests, and the proper testimonial signed. Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev. Henry Yates Satterlee, D.D., Bishop-elect of Washington, and the proper testimonial signed. Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev. Joseph Horsfall Johnson, D.D., Bishop-elect of Los Angeles, and the proper testimonial signed. Consent and concurrence were given to the election of the Rt. Rev. Alex. Charles Garrett, D.D., L.L.D., as Bishop of Dallas, and the proper testimonial signed.

On the 16th of March, 1896, permission was given the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen of St. Paul's Church, East Orange, to sell their former Church property on Dodd and Meadow streets, and the unconsecrated building thereon which was to be torn down, for the sum of \$2.600.

Permission was given the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen, of Christ Church, Jersey City, to mortgage their new church property, and certain other landed properties controlled by them, for the sum of \$32,000. Permission was also given them to sell the old church landed property, consisting of three lots on the corner of Claremont Avenue and Clerk Street, for a sum not less than \$1,200 a lot.

Mr. Appleton Grannis was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Deacons, and the proper testimonial signed.

On the 19th of May, 1896, Mr. ARTHUR WILSON WILDE, a candidate for Holy Orders, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Deacons, and the proper testimonial signed. Permission was given the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen of St. John's Church, Bayonne, to cancel an existing mortgage of \$5,000 held by the Building Loan Association of Bayonne, and to execute a new one for \$4,500 to be held by the Mutual Life Insurance Co., of New York.

The Secretary read his report for the year, which was adopted and ordered read to the Convention.

The REV. GEORGE S. BENNITT read the Report of Christ Hospital, Jersey City. (See appendix II.)

The Report of the Committee on the Episcopal Residence, was made verbally by the Rev. Dr. Holley.

The Committee on the Increase of the Episcopal Fund reported progress.

On motion of the REV. MR. RICHMOND:

Resolved. That the Committee on the Episcopal Residence, be, and is hereby, directed to have made necessary repairs to the Episcopal Residence, and to draw on the Treasurer for the necessary funds.

The REV. EDWIN A. WHITE offered the following amendment to the Canons, which, on his motion,

was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons:

Resolved, That Title I is hereby amended by the addition of a new canon, numbered Canon X, to read as follows:

Title I, Canon X. Of Vacant Parishes.

Sec. 1. On the organization of any new Parish, or whenever a vacancy in the Rectorship of any existing Parish in this Diocese may occur, it shall be the duty of the Wardens or other officers of such Parish to give immediate notice of the same to the Bishop.

SEC. 2. From the time of the receipt of said notice until a Rector shall have been duly elected and have accepted such election, the Bishop may perform any duty pertaining to the office of Rector of the Parish, and no clergymen shall be secured for any but occasional service without the consent of the Bishop.

Sec. 3. Within one month from the receipt of such notice, the Bishop may nominate in writing to such Parish, as fit persons to fill the Rectorship thereof, not less than three nor more than five clergymen, and the Parish may elect as its Rector one of the clergymen so nominated. Should the Parish not elect any one of the clergymen so nominated, or should the one elected not accept the election, then the Bishop shall at once furnish other names in like manner until a Rector shall have been elected and have accepted the election.

SEC. 4. In case the Bishop shall decline in writing to make the nominations provided for in Section 3, or shall fail to so nominate within the time therein specified, then the Parish may proceed to fill the said vacancy, provided however, that before the election of a Rector shall become effective, the written consent of the Bishop to such election shall first be obtained.

The Rev. EDWIN A. WHITE offered the following amendment to the Constitution:

Resolved, That article 5, section r, of the Constitution be amended so as to read as follows:

r. Satisfactory evidence of the consent of the Bishop, acting after consultation with the standing committee, or, if there be no Bishop, of the consent of the Standing Committee, to their formation; and

Resolved, That article 5, section 4, sub-section 1, be amended so as to read:

Satisfactory evidence of the consent of the Bishop, acting after consultation with the Standing Committee, or, if there be no Bishop, of the consent of the Standing Committee, to its formation as a parish; and

On motion of Mr. H. F. Fox, the following resolution was adopted.

WHEREAS: The Commitment of Children to almshouses is thoroughly undesirable, therefore, be it

Resolved, That a Committee of five be appointed to consider the advisability of presenting to the next convention some plan of cooperative work in the care of destitute children.

The chair appointed the following as such Committee. The Rev. John P. Appleton, the Rev. Alexander Mann, the Rev. William M. Hughes, D.D., Mr. Richard Stevens and Mr. H. F. Fox.

On motion the Convention adjourned,

The Archdeacon of Newark read his Report. (See appendix to Episcopal address.)

The Archdeacon of Jersey City read his Report-(See appendix to Episcopal address.) The Rev. Mr. Mann read the Report of the Board of Missions.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

The Board of Missions of the Diocese, reports to the Convention as follows:

Six meetings of the Board have been held during the past Diocesan year.

In accordance with a resolution passed by the last Diocesan Convention, (see page 57, Convention Journal, 1895), the Board of Missions adopted the same plan of apportionment which has been in operation for the past three years, viz:

Four per cent on Rector's salaries of \$1,000 and under. Five per cent on Rector's salaries of more than \$1,000 and less than \$2.000.

Six per cent on Rector's salaries of \$2,000 and over.

We regret to state that this plan for raising the money needed for the Missionary work of the Diocese has not been so successful this year. Last year, it will be remembered, the Board had the pleasure of reporting to the Convention that all debts had been paid and that there was a balance remaining in the Mission treasury of \$136.93.

This year we come before you with a deficiency. This deficit is due to two causes: (1) a falling off in the amount of receipts. A year ago the Treasurer reported receipts from parishes and individuals amouning to \$4,036.25. This year it has received from

parishes and individuals, \$3,404.02, a falling off in receipts of \$632.23. (2) An increase in the amount of appropriations. Last year the Board appropriated for Missionary work \$3,437.50. This year the Board appropriated the sum of \$3,975, an increase of \$537.50. This increase of appropriation was due to the enlarged demands of the Missionary work, and was made in reliance upon what was understood to be the sentiment of the last Convention, that at least \$4,000 should be expended upon the Missionary work of the The Board does not feel that it has been Diocese. unduly extravagant, when the needs of the work are considered, and especially when it is remembered that the last Convention authorized the appointment of a General Missionary at an expense of \$1,800, (see page 70, Convention Journal of 1895.)

At no time during the past Diocesan year has the condition of the Missionary treasury been such as to warrant the Board in venturing upon the experiment of a General Missionary, and until the Missionary offerings of the Diocese are largely increased, all our recommendations would seem to be premature.

In spite of the present deficiency, your Board still has faith in the apportionment idea. It believes the plan to be businesslike and fair. But no scheme, however wise and equitable, will work of itself. What we need as a Diocese is not so much an improved method of raising money for Missions as more Missionary spirit in clergymen and laymen. There are a few parishes, undoubtedly, which are not able to pay the amount asked from them under our present system of Apportionment, and for which

allowance must be made. But there are many others whose ability to pay this apportionment is unquestionable. and whose failure to do so must be attributed to some other cause than poverty.

A general lack of interest in the cause of Diocesan Missions appears to be the trouble. If there are any good and sufficient reasons for this lack of interest, they ought to be frankly stated, but if not, then we ought certainly to shake off our apathy and rouse ourselves to more earnest working and more generous giving.

By motion of the Board of Missions, the Secretary was instructed to obtain from the Treasurer, a statement of the Apportionments and Receipts of the Diocesan Missions, and to make such statement a part of the Report of the Board to the Convention.

The statement is as follows:

In conclusion, the Board would call attention to the fact that the quarterly stipends of our Missionaries, due May 1st, have not been paid. For this, the Treasurer needs \$926.25, of which he has only \$224.84 on hand. We do not believe that this Convention is willing to adjourn without taking some action that will insure the prompt payment of these stipends. We therefore recommend that the amount of the deficiency, \$721,41, be made up now by pledges from the parishes represented in this Convention.

The REV. E. A. WHITE offered an amendment that an assessment of twenty-five cents be made by the Convention upon each communicant. The amendment was lost and the original Resolution of Mr. WALKER was also lost.

Mr. RICHARD F. STEVENS offered the following:

Resolved, That the Rectors of the Parishes be requested to obtain from their communicants a sum of not less than twenty-five cents each for Diocesan Missions.

Mr. HENRY J. WINSER offered the following as an amendment:

Resolved, That the Rector of every Parish in the Diocese pledge himself to preach a sermon in behalf of Diocesan Missions every year, setting forth the necessities of this object, and to ask for an offering which shall not fall below twenty-five cents for each communicant on the Parish list.

The amendment was lost, and the resolution of Mr. STEVENS was also lost.

The REV. WM. W. DAVIS moved the following:

Resolved, That the Convention authorizes the Board of Diocesan Missions to expend \$5,000 during the coming year for the support of Missions, and that the Parishes be assessed so as to raise the amount as proposed by the Board of Missions, and that the assessment be a claim upon the Parish the same as the assessment for Convention expenses.

The REV. MR. HODGSON offered the following amendment:

Resolved, That the Board of Missions be directed to consult with the Rectors of the several parishes in connection with determining the amount of offering which should be expected from their parishes for such missions.

The amendment was lost.

The REV. DR. HUGHES moved that the consideration of the subject be postponed until 3 o'clock. Lost.

The REV. MR. Davis moved to amend his own resolution so that it should read as follows:

Resolved, That the Board of Missions be instructed to expend the sum of \$5,000 for the coming year, and to apportion the same among the Parishes of the Diocese according to the plan already adopted by the Board.

Which was adopted.

On motion of Mr. RICHARD F. STEVENS,

Resolved, That the rate of the apportionment be left to the Board of Missions with power.

The election of a Board of Missions being in order, the Chair appointed as Teller for the Clerical vote, the Rev. W. W. Davis and Mr. Richard F. Stevens, and for the Lay vote, the Rev. George F. Dorwart and Mr. James M. Erskine. The rolls were called and the Tellers retired to count the votes.

On motion of the REV. MR. RICHMOND,

Resolved, That the members of the Convention of the Diocese of Newark regret the enforced absence of the Rev. Anthony Schuyler, D.D., and the Rev. Horace S. Bishor, D.D., and extend to them their profound sympathy in their affliction;

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution be conveyed to Dr. Schuyler and Dr. Bishop by two Priests appointed by the Chair.

The Chair appointed the REV. MR. RICHMOND to convey the message to DR. BISHOP and the REV. MR. DAVIS to convey it to DR. SCHUYLER.

The Convention took a recess to 2 P. M.

Report of the Committee on the death of the Rev, ROBERT N. MERRITT, D.D.,

The Committee, to which was referred so much of the Bishop's Address as related to the death of the Rev. Dr. ROBERT N. MERRITT, respectfully submit the following:

Although a native of the Province of New Brunswick, and until the time of his lamented death, a Canadian subject, nearly the whole of Dr. Merritt's clerical life was spent in the service of the Church of the United States, and as Rector of St. Peter's Parish in Morristown. From small beginnings he lived to see the Church grow strong and prosperous, and in his latter years, when most men begin to feel that their work is nearly over, and that a time has come for a folding of the hands in rest, Dr. Merritt, with all the zeal and enthusiasm of youth, conceived and carried almost to completion, the building of the noble

church which stands as his memorial in the place he lovedso well and in the shadow of whose sanctuary he sleeps, close by the altar where he served so faithfully. the unobtrusive presence there was borne a steadfastness of purpose chiefly observable in its results, and in the unassuming and retiring manner those who did not know him well, would never have recognized the extent and accuracy of his scholarship, nor the solidity and exactness of his knowledge. He had been active, prominent, and honoured by the Diocese from its organization, and for yearsbefore, while it was a part of the undivided Diocese of New Jersey. As Secretary and President of the Standing Committee, Dean of the Convocation of Newark, when it. embraced the whole of the present Diocese, and afterwards in its narrower territory of to-day; Trustee of the General Theological Seminary, and frequently an Examiner there, as also an Examining Chaplain to the Bishopof Newark, Treasurer of the corporation for the relief of Widows and Orphans of the two Dioceses in New Jerseyin these and other positions the Diocese honoured itself and him. Firm in his convictions of duty, settled in hischurch principles, a thoroughly loyal Priest, we desire torecord our testimony to his work, and pay this tribute tohis memory.

The Rev. Mr. Mann declined the election, and asked unanimous consent to the election in his place of the Rev. Walker Gwynne, by directing the Secretary to cast one ballot for him. The consent was granted, the Secretary cast the ballot, and so the Rev. Walker Gwynne was made a member of the Committee in place of Mr. Mann.

The Rev. Dr. Hughes read the report of the Committee appointed at the last Convention to consider the petition of St. Barnabas' Church, Newark.

The special committee appointed at the last annual Diocesan Convention to inquire into the facts alleged in the petition presented to that Convention on behalf of the Parish of St. Barnabas. Newark, and to report thereon to the present Convention, respectfully present the following report:

The petition presented on behalf of the Parish of St. Barnabas was as follows:

"Whereas, The Parish of St. Barnabas, Newark, a member of this Union, and therefore under and claiming its protection, thinks it has been and is being injured by the action of the authorities of St. Thomas' Church, in locating their building so near to that of St. Barnabas, directly contrary to their representations to the Bishop when making their application for organization and incorporation.

"WHEREAS, The failure of St. Thomas' Church to apply for admission into the Union, though a parish of two years' standing, prevents the matter being brought before the Convention to decide upon its merits; therefore,

"The Parish of St. Barnabas prays that this Convention take the matter into consideration and afford such relief to them as they in their judgment deem advisable."

Upon this petition the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That a special committee of three Clergymen and two Laymen be appointed to inquire into the facts alleged in the petition just presented by the Deputy from the Parish of St. Barnabas, Newark, and report thereon to the next Diocesan Convention."

Your Committee have held meetings at which representatives from both the Parishes of St. Barnabas and St. Thomas were present and presented their written statements of their respective claims. A letter from the Rt. Rev. Bishop of the Diocese, relating to the location of St. Thomas' Church, was also received by your Committee and communicated to the representatives of the respective parishes at the first meeting. Additional inquiries, so far as they seemed necessary, were also made by your Committee in the presence of these representatives, and upon the whole case thus before the Committee, arguments on behalf of the two parishes have been heard. As the re-

sult of their examination your Committee report that the facts relating to the location of St. Thomas' Church are as follows:

On December 17, 1802, the Bishop received a written application, signed by forty persons, communicants and members of the Church, applying for his consent to the formation of a new parish, to be located in that part of the city of Newark, known as Roseville, and north of the Morris and Essex Railroad, to be known as St. Thomas' Church (Journal, 1893, p. 102.) The petition was dated November 28, 1892, and contained the following clause: "Should the application receive favorable consideration, we agree that the proposed church building to be erected shall not be located within two-thirds of a mile from St. Barnabas' Church." On December 24, 1892, the Bishop sent written formal notice to the Rectors of St. Barnabas' Church, Newark, and of St. James' Church, Newark, of this application (Journal, 1893, p. 102.) The Bishop's letter to the Rev. S. H. GRANBERRY, Rector of St. Barnabas, stated that the notice to him was given in compliance with the provisions of the Diocesan Canon, and that the parties applying for the consent of the Bishop, "agree that they will not erect a church building within a less distance than two-thirds of a mile from St. Barnabas' Church," and also that under the Canon thirty days' notice of the application was given in order that objections, if any, might be presented in writing to the Bishop before that time. On January 5th, 1893, the Bishop received the formal acquiescence of the Rector and Vestry of St. James' Parish, Newark, to the formation and organization of the proposed new parish in Roseville (Journal, 1803, p. 103), and on January 9th, 1893, directed the Secretary of the Standing Committee to call together the Standing Committee about February 1st, to advise with him in the matter of the application.

(Ibid. p. 104.) On February 13th, 1893, the Bishop, meeting with the Standing Committee, heard representatives of the petitioners for the new parish, and the Rector and others of St. Barnabas Church in opposition. (Ibid. p. 106.) It does not appear that any objections in writing had been made on behalf of St. Barnabas to the Bishop before this time, as directed by the Bishop's notice and contemplated by Canon 7, Section 1, sub-section 1, which provides that the Bishop shall give thirty days' notice to the parishes affected by the establishment of a new parish within the limits of any existing parish or parishes, and that objections to the formation will be duly considered if submitted to the Bishop in writing. On February 21st, 1893, the Bishop met with a sub-committee of the Standing Committee and several of the petitioners to consider the location of the proposed new church (Ibid. 107), and on April 1st 1893, the canonical consent of the Bishop. attested by the Secretary of the Standing Committee, was given "to the formation of a new parish in that part of the city of Newark which lies north of the Morris and Essex Railroad and within what is usually known as Roseville, in the county of Essex and Diocese of Newark, to be known as St. Thomas' Church." No conditions as to the location of the building or other limitations were embodied in this formal canonical consent, nor had the location of the building at this time been decided upon. After the receipt of this consent a meeting of the petitioners was called for organization into a parish under the law of the State, and this meeting was held and the certificate of organization required by law was filed in the County Clerk's office on May 12th, 1803.

Upon the publication of the call for the meeting, and on April 14th, 1893, the Rev. Mr. Granderry wrote to the Bishop, inquiring whether his consent had been given to the formation of the Parish, and to the holding of temporary

services, to which letter the Bishop, on April 17th, replied that he had given his consent to the formation of a new parish, and that he had no reason to believe that it would be nearer to St. Barnabas' Church than St. James' is to the House of Prayer, or the House of Prayer to Trinity, or Trinity to Grace Church, or Grace Church to Christ Church. On the next day, April 18th, 1893, the Rev. Mr. Granberry wrote to the Bishop notifying him, that in the name of St. Barnabas' Church, he objected to the establishment of services of the Church, temporarily or permanently, within a distance of less than two-thirds of a mile of St. Barnabas' Church. This letter appears to have been the only written objection of any kind on the the part of of St. Barnabas', relating to the location of the Church or the formation of the parish.

After the organization of the parish, and early in June, 1803, representatives of St. Thomas' communicated orally with the Bishop in relation to lots to be procured for the the location of the Church, and on June 4th, 1803, the Bishop wrote to Mr. Dawson, a Warden in the Parish of St. Thomas', in reference to this subject, stating that all he insisted upon was a distance of at least "3,000 feet from St. Barnabas', and 3,500 if possible." The Bishop's letter referred to a lot on Ninth street, near William, as one of the lots proposed, being a lot which he had examined before writing a letter to Mr. Dawson. On June #2th, 1803, David Young & Co., Surveyors of the City of Newark, and a firm of established reputation, sent to Mr. JOHN J. TOPPIN, for St. Thomas', a certificate relating to the distance between St. Barnabas' Church, and this proposed lot on Ninth street, showing that beginning at the centre of St. Barnabas' Church property, and following the lines of certain streets to the center of Ninth street, (the St. Thomas' lot), the distance was 3,040 %00. the measurements being computed, not by actual survey.

but by computation from the official map of the City of Newark. Young & Co. stated that an actual survey would not show a variation of 12 inches. A copy of this letter is appended to our report.

This letter of Young & Co. was received after the Bishop's departure for Europe in the summer of 1893, and a copy of it was forwarded to him in Europe, but was returned, with the statement, that during his absence, he would do nothing relating to the matter. On his return in the fall of 1893, interviews were held with the Bishop by representatives of St. Thomas' Parish, with reference to the location of the Church on this Ninth street lot. The Bishop, sometime in October or November, 1893, gave his oral consent to the location of the Church on this lot. Before doing so, he had visited the locality and had himself, considered the location and its relation to St. Barnabas'. His letter to the Chairman of the Committee gives the statement of the reasons for the final location as follows:

East Orange, January 7th, 1896.

DEAR DR. SCHUYLER:

The history of St. Thomas' Parish is about as follows: The matter of a new parish when suggested, or rather when the request was addressed to me, remained a good while under consideration, and when finally, after a lapse of a good many weeks, I gave verbal and conditional consent, but not a formal one. I stipulated that the new Church when built, should not be less than 3,500 feet from St. Barnabas', measured by the lines of streets, and that it should be 3,900 if possible. The first lot proposed was about 3,600 or possibly 3,700 feet, but for some reason the parties representing the proposed parish could not get title.

Meanwhile, services were being held, and I gave my

consent to the formation of a new parish, acting by advice of the Standing Committee. Subsequently, the present location was fixed upon, provided my approval could be obtained. The distance from St. Barnabas' was measured in several ways and I found it was 3,050 feet (about) from that church. On this fact being represented to the St. Thomas' people, they expressed their willingness to return me the consent given for the formation of the new parish, if, upon further consideration, I did not accept the lot as a suitable one.

After this I counselled with several friends and finding as I believed that the distance of the proposed lot from St. Barnabas' did not materially differ from the average distance of parishes one from another in Newark, I made, though with some reluctance, an abatement of the original condition and allowed them to secure the location,

This is, I believe, my dear Doctor, in brief, the history of the case. The correspondence would not throw much additional light on the subject, for the letters are removed from each other by considerable intervals of time and give no sequence of incidents. The consent is dated April 1, 1893.

The distance between the churches of St. Barnabas and St. Thomas, measured on the lines of the sidewalks on Warren street, Humboldt street, Orange street, Bathgate place, and North Ninth avenue, and measured from the entrance of the buildings is, as appears from a subsequent survey of David Young & Co., made at the request of Mr. Stevens for St. Barnabas', 2,911 feet. This survey follows somewhat different lines from those shown on their former certificate and was sent to the Committee after the hearings. We did not consider it necessary to verify either of

the measurements presented, because we thought that after making fair allowances for proper points of beginning and ending, in the measurements of June 12, 1893, the distance between the churches may be fairly taken as about 2,950 feet, measured along the lines of the streets.

After receiving the Bishop's oral consent in the fall of 1893 to the location of the church on this lot, the Parish of St. Thomas purchased the lot in December, 1893, for \$2,375, and at once commenced the erection of a church building thereon, which was completed about Easter, 1894, at a cost of \$3,500 to \$4,000. Services have been held in the church since about that time.

From the above statement it appears that the present location of St. Thomas' Church is nearer to St. Barnabas' by about 500 feet, than the distance fixed in the original application to the Bishop, but it also appears that the reduction of the distance to less than two-thirds of a mile, was made with the consent of the Bishop and the particular lot or location was expressly approved by the Bishop for the purpose of erecting their church. St. Barnabas' Parish, which had originally received notice that the church would be located at least two-thirds of a mile distant, and had presented objections to the Bishop and Standing Committee orally before any change in distance was approved by the Bishop, were not notified of the change in distance required having been made by the Bishop, either before it was made or afterwards. first official information of this change was received after the presentation of this petition to the Convention, and not until the Bishop's letter to the Committee. This statement should be made, as probably explaining the form of the petition to the Convention.

Whether the facts above stated call for any action by the Convention, your Committee have not considered, inasmuch as they understand the scope of their powers under their appointment to be limited to a report of the facts relating to the location of St. Thomas' Church within the limits of the distance mentioned in the application to the Bishop for formation.

Both parishes insist that under the facts they have rights which are entitled to protection, and St. Thomas' Parish, which has not yet been admitted into the Convention, in appearing before your Committee and submitting the facts on their side relating to the location, did so with an express denial of any jurisdiction to affect their rights in the premises, either on the part of your Committee, or of this Convention, from which it derives its powers. We therefore, as directed by this Convention, simply submit to the Convention our report of the facts.

The Rev. Mr. OSBORNE moved the following:

Resolved, That the Convention expresses its sympathy with St. Barnabas' Parish in the trying circumstances in which it finds itself placed.

Mr. A. A. Van Hovenberg moved as an substitute,

Resolved, That the Committe in re St. Barnabas' and St. Thomas' Parishes be discharged with the thanks of the Convention.

The substitute, by vote of the Convention, was put in place of the original motion and was adopted.

The Rev. WILLIAM RICHMOND moved the following:

Resolved, That a Special Committee of three priests and two laymen be appointed by the Convention to report

to the next Convention, whether St. Thomas' Parish has been formed in accordance with the Constitution and Canons in such case made and provided, and what relief, if any, should be given in the matter of St. Barnabas' and St. Thomas' Parishes.

WILLIAM RICHMOND.

The Rev. D. STUART HAMILTON moved that the whole matter be indefinitely postponed. Lost.

Mr. RICHMOND'S resolution was then adopted.

On motion of Mr. RICHARD F. STEVENS of St. Barnabas' Parish, seconded by the Rev. WILLIAM RICHMOND, the vote by which the resolution was passed was reconsidered, and the resolution was then withdrawn by the mover.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That after the reading of the minutes and the usual devotions, the Convention adjourn sine die.

The minutes of the day's session were then read and approved.

Prayers were said by the Bishop, a hymn was sung, the Bishop delivered the benediction.

The Convention adjourned sine die.

SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

Rt. Rev. Thomas A. Starkey, P. P.,

BISHOP OF THE DIOCESE.

BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND LAITY:

It is with sincere pleasure that I greet you on this occasion of our annual meeting and extend to you my affectionate welcome.

In the brief retrospect usual at this time, it is my custom, as you know, to refer first to those of the Bishops of the Church, or of the Clergy of this Diocese, who have died within the year. Of the Bishops only one has passed away. The Right Reverend Mark Anthony DeWolfe Howe, D. D., first Bishop of Central Pennsylvania, died at his old paternal home in Bristol, Rhode Island, on the 31st of July, 1895. I regard it as my good fortune to have been well acquainted with Dr. Howe many years ago, while he was still Rector of St. Luke's Church in Philadelphia. He was a true-hearted man, the marked character of whose moral make-up may be said to have been genuineness. In all his dealings with others, Dr. Howe

was direct to the verge of simplicity, and it was due to this marked and charming trait, combined with pulpit ability and general culture, that he commanded the respect and esteem of all who knew him intimately.

Within the Diocese we have been called upon to mourn the loss by death, after some weeks' severe illness, of the Rev. ROBERT N. MERRITT, D. D., our oldest resident Presbyter, who had been for several years the President of the Standing Committee. Merritt was a native of Canada, and became Rector of St. Peter's Church in Morristown forty-three years He was a good classical scholar, and being at the same time a man of sincere religious convictions, was esteemed and respected by all, serving the parish faithfully during his long pastorate. The name of Dr. Merritt will always be associated with the noble Church building which he lived to see practically completed. He was buried on the 16th of December, 1805, in St. Peter's Churchyard, where, as was becoming, his body lies under the chancel window. Many of both clergy and laity were present at the funeral service, and there are few, I imagine, of those whom love and respect brought together on that occasion, who were not deeply impressed and moved by its quiet and touching solemnity.

The most noteworthy occurrence of the year for Churchmen was the Triennial Convention which met at Minneapolis in October last. Two or three measures of some importance were to come before it, of which perhaps the most prominent was the proposed change in the Constitution and Canons of the general Church. This was evidently doomed to failure from the first; and the entire subject of revision was re-

ferred to a new committee who are to report to the Convention at Washington two years hence. It was curious to observe the strong jealousies entertained by many of the word "Constitution," when applied to the Church's fundamental law. It is no doubt well and wise to guard in Church nomenclature the use of words whose original meaning modern usage has changed or modified; and I suppose that in our own case, when the word "Constitution" is employed in connection with the fundamental law of the Diocese of Newark, we all understand that what is meant is simply the pre-determined outline and expression of certain general and accepted principles by which all the legislation of the Diocese is to be guided and controlled.

An important act by the Bishops at this Convention and one to which I feel in duty bound to call your attention, was a reaffirmation by them as the collective Episcopate of the American Church of the Pastoral of the preceding year; for by so doing the authentic character and therefore value of the letter is placed beyond the possibility of cavil. It may very well be that some of our Laity misconceived the intention and significance of the Pastoral referred to. Should such be the case I may say here very properly that its purpose was simply to set forth what the whole Church throughout the world had believed and taught from the beginning in regard to the particular truths under review; and that, as this branch of the Church had always received and enforced this belief, so it must always continue to do so as a part of the deposit of revealed truth entrusted to the whole body for its faithful keeping and transmission.

Certain changes proposed by the General Convention and subsequently sent to the Dioceses for their affirmative or negative action will be laid before you. These relate to changes in the Constitution already passed by the General Convention, and the placing of the Golden Numbers on and after January 1st, 1900 A. D. These are not inserted in my address. Their length would make the reading tedious. You will, no doubt, provide by resolution for their reference to a committee for consideration and report. They must be acted on finally before the next General Convention, which meets in Washington two years hence.

This casual reference to the Capital of the country leads me to say with what pleasure I received the information that by the recent action of Maryland the city of Washington, with the parts adjacent, were set off and made an independent Diocese. Washington is not and probably never will be a business place; it is neither a commercial nor a manufacturing centre. It derives its importance wholly from its character and position as the seat of government of a great country. This character and this position suffice of themselves to insure its power and importance in the future. What Paris is to France, Washington should, and in all probability will be, to the United Statesthe centre ultimately not only of its political but its literary, scientific, and social life. If such a forecast be sound and true, the Church is none too early in entering upon its new position, and a large and perhaps the chief part of its work there for some time to come must be that of laying foundations. Have our people faith enough for such a venture as that of laying religious foundations? Will they act, or will they demand to see before they believe and act upon their belief? The problem is one which presses upon us everywhere, and which touches many and various interests with its periphery, as the wheel of future time goes on and round.

Within our Diocese the money needed for our Home Mission work comes in slowly. I hope this is due to the times and not to lack of interest. In other respects the growth goes on.

One of our missions, which, like a good many others, has been self-supporting from the first. I refer to St. Mark's, Paterson, was organized as a parish in January last, after a brief missionary life of little more than a year. It is fully self-supporting and numbers more than two hundred and fifty actual communicants. The present building is to be enlarged to provide for the constantly increasing congregation, and also for the needs of the Sunday School, which has a membership of more than three hundred.

Two new missions have been established within the year, one at Hasbrouck Heights, between Hackensack and Rutherford, and another of a semi-parochial character by the Rector of the Church of the Holy Communion in Paterson. The first named is already in possession of a well-situated lot in the centre of the town, on which is now placed a building purchased for the purpose and large enough for all present needs. This mission is served as yet by a Lay Reader. The Archdeacon of Jersey City speaks very favorably of its prospects.

On the 11th of May, 1895, I had the pleasure of

laying the corner-stone of the new St. Paul's Church in Paterson. The building when completed will be large and imposing. It is hoped that it may be ready for occupancy some time during the autumn of this year.

In December last the new Mission Church of St. George, in Maplewood, was opened for the first time. The building is of stone, and, though small, (only accommodating about one hundred and fifty people), is very substantial and agreeable in architectural effect. The congregation is a growing and intelligent one, and has been well-cared for religiously. It is only right that my acknowledgments should be made to the reverend Deacon in charge, who, occupied all the week with other things, has not begrudged his Sunday work to a congregation of his own gathering, which is the best tribute after all to his faithful service.

On St. Paul's Day, January 25th of the present year, the new and attractive St. Paul's Church, East. Orange, was opened. I am told that the congregation has nearly doubled in the present building on the new and better site.

Another recently completed building, one of the finest in the Diocese, is Calvary Church, Summit, which was opened with simple ceremony by its Rector on Easter Day of this year. The building accommodates nearly seven hundred worshippers. It is of granite and is nobly placed on a rising ground in the centre of the village. The design is thoroughly ecclesiastical architecturally, and every line and subordinate feature indicates and promotes its sacred purpose. The completion of this large-

Church, which in doubling the numbers of the former congregation has justified the scale on which it has been erected, gives promise of the future of the Church in Summit and its neighborhood.

In addition to these Churches, a pretty little Mission chapel of stone has been built and paid for at Montvale, about two miles beyond Hillsdale. Both of these places are served by Lay Readers, but Priestly offices are rendered at regular seasons at Hillsdale on each Sunday by the Rector of Norwood.

New Parish buildings have been erected at Englewood and Phillipsburgh. The former of these is of stone, a model of good taste and economical expenditure. The latter, more simple and inexpensive, is of great value to the Mission work in that place.

An interesting occasion and one which deserves mention, was the re-opening after enlargement at an expense of \$30,000, on Holy Innocents' Day of last year, of the Church of that name in Hoboken. It is not easy for one who is unfamiliar with the early history of this Church to realize how great the original cost was of the portion, which in its unfinished state had yet served for years the purpose of the Parish, and which accommodated less than three hundred worshippers. The capacity is now doubled: a new fine and central tower has been erected, and the entire building, within and without. is not only architecturally impressive, but suggests even what one could hardly look for, an apparent unity of design and harmony in feature, which are most pleasing and satisfactory.

On Wednesday, April 15th, returning from a visitation to Missions at Montvale and Hillsdale, I

stopped over at Hoboken to dedicate a new Baptistery, which had been recently completed in Trinity Church, of that city, as a memorial of the late John Stevens, who had been for several years a Warden of the Church, and who, before his greatly lamented death, had made provision by will for the liquidation of a large parish indebtedness. The Baptistery, though not of great size, is striking and beautiful, and the large attendance of Clergy and Laity at the services, testified to the profound respect entertained for the memory of my honored friend and the Parish Church's benefactor.

It is with a feeling of greatly relieved anxiety, that I allude here to the arrangements which have been made in the matter of the Christ Church, Jersey City, mortgages, which threatened at one time the extinction of the entire parish property. All is now placed on such a basis that the future financial conditions are assured. I hope that it may not be a breach of delicate consideration to say here, that this settlement was made possible by the devotion to the Church and its prosperity of a lady who was more than willing to forget her own pecuniary interests in order to liberate, if not actually, save, the parish. The name of the Church has since then been changed legally, and it will be henceforth known as the Church of the Holy Cross, Jersey City.

THE TWO HOSPITALS

of the Diocese continue to do their work with increasing usefulness and success. The distinguished physician, to whom reference has been made on a

previous occasion, informs me that no similar institution in the State, its size and means considered, is better equipped for its work or more satisfactorily conducted than St. Barnabas in Newark. This hospital has within the year established in connection with its other work a Training School for Nurses, which seemed not only an excellent thing in itself to accomplish, but one which the character and position of this charity instinctively demanded.

It must not and will not, I hope, be thought tedious if in these Annual Addresses reference is made from time to time to those charitable institutions of the Diocese which depend upon our people mainly for encouragement and support. It has been sometimes said that our Church population in this part of the State is not homogeneous; that a large proportion of it comes from another State, with which its business. financial and social interests are more closely allied than with those of the Diocese of Newark, and that it cannot therefore be depended upon to take a deep and living interest in the growth and success of the I am unwilling to believe that this is more than partially true, or that an intelligent and conscientious Laity could not easily, and would not determinately, draw the line that divides duty from sentiment; or that they would fail in that sacred obligation which to the sound and thoughtful man has an economic as well as a spiritual value—the obligation. viz., of doing our duty in that sphere and place in life to which it has pleased God to call us.' So believing and happy in the expression of my belief, I return to Diocesan Institutions.

ST. KATHARINE'S HOME,

In Jersey City, is one of them, and there are few public charities, I suppose, which appeal with less of cheery hopefulness to the common sentiment of charity and pity than this one. Its short history is one which cannot be written, but if it could be, refined ladies and devoted priests who know about it tell me that the pathos of its story and the benediction of its work would call out a profound and general interest.

GENERAL CHURCH WORK.

On May the first, St. Philip and St. James' Day, it was my pleasure to preside at and to address a meeting held in the House of Prayer, Newark, and composed of the different branches of the "Girls' Friendly," so called. This meeting represented seven or eight parishes, the largest group coming from Trinity Parish, Newark, which has the credit of originating the work in this Diocese. I may confess that in past years this society had not strongly impressed me. had seemed to me that the conditions which had aided its success in England did not exist in an equal degree in our country, and that consequently conclusions of similar success could not be reached where the conditions were dissimilar. My feelings and convictions were greatly modified, however, by the experience of this meeting. A work in behalf of unprotected working girls appeals to every one, and I became satisfied that it only needed wisdom and sympathy combined to do a large amount of good in the way attempted by this excellent and well-managed association.

More than two weeks before this I had presided at a meeting of what is called the Junior Auxiliary, held in St. Mark's Church, Orange. This is an association of young girls and women who are under process of education, if I may so express it, for future missionary work in the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese. The meeting was fully attended and many parishes were represented. These young people belong to our missions as well as to our established parishes and do a good deal of excellent work in the way of such handicraft as young girls can do for the missionary boxes. It is an education for girls in the missionary spirit as the older society has been for women, their mothers and elder sisters.

The Woman's Auxiliary has done and is doing an excellent work. Besides the thousands of gifts in the way of homely and needed comforts which they send out to our mission workers every year, the General Auxiliary contributed in the last three years \$56,000, which was handed over to the Board of Missions and by it invested for General Domestic Missions. Yet not alone in our Diocese but in these General Missions of the whole Church there is a serious falling off in contributions, and consequently grave questions are being considered as to existing obligations contracted by the Board, as well as the ever-growing demands and responsibilities. The time has come. brethren of the Clergy and Laity, when every Bishop in the Church must bring this matter of missionary responsibility to the fore front, and ask others to suggest, if he cannot himself suggest, the remedy. It is a curious as well as an anxious problem for those of us who believe assuredly that Christianity is a revelation and message from God to man; a problem which may well tax curiosity even when it does not suggest a rebuke to conscience.

Recurring to the Diocese, you will see by its records when printed, that the increase in numbers goes on and that new centres of Church influence are being established as good opportunity serves us in our comparatively narrow field. For such tokens of God's favor, my thanks go up to our Heavenly Father, and for the good help and sympathy of friends and fellow-workers throughout the Diocese, both Clerical and Lay, I tender my sincere acknowledgements.

THE MISSIONS OF THE DIOCESE

are twenty-three in number. This does not include St. Agnes', Lafayette, Christ Church, Harrison, St. Thomas', Lyndhurst, the Nordhoff Mission near Englewood, or one or two points at Orange and Montclair, where services are held; for these are, strictly speaking, Parochial Missions. Of the twenty-three which are really Diocesan, six are and have been from the first self-supporting, and the seventh has just asked and received admission as a parish. The total number of communicants belonging to these twenty-three which continue to be Missions of the Diocese is about 1,600, or an average of nearly 70 to each.

To pass each one of these under review would be tedious. I will, therefore, satisfy myself by saying that with the exception of one or two old established stations, which perhaps should never have been begun,

all are more or less promising; in some instances maintaining, and in others creating, a Church interest in the community in whose midst they are placed. These stations are cared for by fifteen Clergymen, of whom five are at the same time Rectors of Parishes. who take this other duty besides, leaving ten whose work is exclusively missionary. All of these Clergy as I believe, and the far greater part as I know, are devoted to their work, an interest which their people fully share with them. Besides the Clergy, nine Lay Readers render conscientious and generally efficient service. Of the more recent Missions, I have spoken more or less in detail in the former portion of this address; for what was lacking in their case and for general information respecting the old Missions, I refer you to the reports of the Archdeacons. To feel called upon to urge, much more to defend, Missionary or Church extension work would seem like an affront to the conscience of Churchmen. I will rather ask you to believe in our zealous and wise conduct of this responsible work and to aid us to the full extent of your ability.

Reports.

I have received the following reports from the Reverend, the Archdeacons of the two Archdeaconries:

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF NEWARK.

To the Rt. Rev. Thomas A. Starkey, D.D., Bishop of Newark:

A review of the missionary work of the Archdeaconry of Newark during the past year presents many encouraging features. A decided growth is evident in several places, I may safely say, in all the places where growth could reasonably be expected.

It is gratifying to report that there have been no changes in our missionary forces. The same tried and faithful priests have gone steadily on in their devoted labors, and there has been no break in the work at any point. This in itself is a most important factor in the successful prosecution of Church extension, and a reasonable ground for congratulation and encouragement.

Through the zeal and energy of the Rector of Pompton, a new and most promising field has been occupied in the thriving town of Butler, Morris county. For the past nine months the Rev. Mr. Kienzle has conducted a regular Sunday service at this point with gratifying results. A considerable nucleus of Church people were found there, and a regular and steadfast congregation has been organized, people who are anxious for the services of the Church and willing to do their utmost in order to secure them. The immediate erection of a Chapel in Butler is a pressing necessity. The people will do what they can.

and they can do a great deal, but some help and encouragement must come from outside. The Archdeacon visited this new mission during Lent and was much impressed by what he saw and heard. A fair-sized congregation assembled on a week night, a hearty service was held, the musical portions of which were rendered in a manner that many an organized Church need not beashamed of. An enthusiastic meeting of the people was held after the service and a committee appointed to take such action as was possible towards selecting and securing It is to be hoped that the new Board may see its way clear to give some substantial assistance to this promising mission. The help it needs is towards securing a Church building; it need never become a serious burden in the matter of support, for it should properly beserved by the Rector of Pompton.

At Phillipsburg a neat and commodious parish building has been erected, which is proving to be an important adjunct to the working forces of the parish. Equally gratifying it is to report that the building is almost entirely paid for. It is confidently expected that this vigorous parish will, in a year or two, become entirely

self-supporting.

At Washington a seeming disaster has resulted in a considerable benefit to the mission. One Sunday morning last winter the Church was badly damaged by fire, but the prompt and equitable manner in which the insurance company fulfilled its obligations, together with the energy and devotion of the people, have been the means of restoring the building to a far better condition than it was before, besides developing the confidence and self-help of the congregation.

The vigorous life of the revised mission at Hackettstown continues to justify the re-establishment of Church services in that place. The Rector of Dover, with the assistance of a Lay Reader, has charge of the work, and a considerable congregation has been gathered. Twenty-six (26) persons have been baptized, nine (9) confirmed, and twenty-four (24) regular communicants are ministered to. The offerings of these people for all purposes during the past year amounted to \$650, and all this in a place which for ten or twelve years had been hopelessly abandoned to the enemy.

Church work in the region of Lake Hopatcong continues to thrive. St. Peter's, Mt. Arlington, is self-supporting, having raised over one thousand dollars for all purposes during the year, the greater part of which was for improvements of the Church property. It ministers not only to summer visitors but to a permanent congregation and Sunday School. St. Andrew's Mission at Landing provides Church services and Sunday School in a community where no other form of Christian worship can be found, and is gradually reaching the people. A modest chapel is a crying need at this point, as there is no suitable building to be had in the place. Services are now held in a small cottage, which is also used as a reading and Guild room.

Of the other missions of the Archdeaconry, I need only say that they are being faithfully conducted by the priests in charge, prospering more or less according to the circumstances of their surroundings.

Besides the work that comes under the supervision of the Board, two successful missions have completed substantial Church buildings during the past year, viz.: St. Alban's, Newark, and St. George's, Maplewood. Both are situated in growing residence districts, and are making rapid strides towards self-support and independence.

.THE ARCHDEACONRY OF JERSEY CITY.

To the Rt. Rev. Thomas A. Starkey, D.D., Bishop of Newark:

My Dear Bishop:—The Missions of this Archdeaconry are in a most encouraging condition. They are making most satisfactory returns. But few receive assistance from our missionary treasury. The most, with commendable spirit, support themselves. Those receiving assistance will relinquish their stipends as soon as they possibly can.

Calvary Church, Bayonne, is no longer a source of anxiety. The new birth in the parish reported a year ago is becoming a vigorous life. Signs of material progress are abundant. But better than all, the signs of spiritual progress are more evident even than those of material progress. Six hundred souls are connected with this work. There have been twenty-four baptisms in the past year. Twenty-five were confirmed. There are one hundred and forty communicants. There are one hundred and eighty-six children and teachers in the Sunday School. The offerings amount to \$1350. The Rev. Horatio W. Maguire continues in charge of this work. He receives \$200 from the missionary treasury.

St. Agnes' Mission, Jersey City, has entered upon a larger life. Since my report a year ago a chapel, with chancel and vestry, has been built. This connects with the building which was formerly used. There are now a chapel, small hall, upstairs guild room, choir room and vestry. The guild for boys, the guild for women and the sewing school are well attended. There are three hundred souls connected with this Mission. Sixteen have been baptized. Six have been confirmed. There are

sixty communicants, all of whom have made their communion during the year past. The offerings amount to \$400. This Mission receives no stipend from the Board. It is supported entirely by the parish of St. Mark's. The work is done by the Clergy of St. Mark's.

The good work goes on in a most encouraging manner in the Mission Church of the Ascension, Jersey City Heights. Nothing has been done in the past year in the way of reducing the heavy indebtedness which has burdened this Mission for so many years. Nothing could have been. Yet the church building has been so improved that those who have not seen it in the past few years would fail to recognize it. It is now in a most seemly condition. It is now evidencing the beauty of holiness. In all true ways the past year has been one of the best it has ever had. Five hundred souls are under the spiritual care of the Missionary, the Rev. James Cameron, There have been twenty-three baptisms, Twenty-two have been confirmed. There are two hundred and ten communicants. Two hundred and fifty teachers and scholars are in the Sunday School. The offerings have been \$1612. The Mission receives \$350 from the Board of Missions, just enough to pay the interest on the heavy debt which came to the present Missionary as an inheritance.

It has become a habit with those of us who keep in close touch with the Missions of this Archdeaconry to look for larger returns from St. Luke's Mission, Paterson. We never look in vain. The work done would do credit to a parish. The Mission has entirely outgrown the capacity of the chapel. An enlargement will be made at once. The plans are ready and the work will be begun soon. This will give a chancel, a vestry, a choir room, and will double the seating capacity of the chapel. It seats one hundred and twenty-five now; when the enlarge-

ment is made it will seat two hundred and fifty. The cost of this enlargement will be \$1000. Three hundred dollars of this is in hand. The Missionary, the Rev. Robert Perine, will be glad to hear from any of God's servants who want to lay up treasures in heaven in this direct and tangible way. He has the care of five hundred souls. Forty-eight have been baptized. Twenty-six have been confirmed. There are one hundred and sixty-five communicants. The Sunday School numbers one hundred and ninety. The offerings have been \$1200. An appropriation of \$300 is made to this Mission.

A year ago the Rev. Walter M. Sherwood, in charge of the Mission Church of the Good Shepherd, Fort Lee, reported the work as "holding its own." This year he reports "progress." That modern advance guard of civilization and evangelization, the trolley, has reached this secluded place. Quick and cheap transportation is thereby furnished. Growth in population is looked for. Renewed encouragement is the result. There are one hundred and eighty souls in this Mission. There have been seventeen baptisms. Four have been confirmed. The list of communicants numbers eighty-six. There are one hundred and thirty-four in the Sunday School. The offerings have been \$383.

St. Thomas' Mission, Lyndhurst, after many vicissitudes, sees better days before it. The Rev. Henry M. Ladd, Rector of Grace Church, Rutherford, has it in personal charge. A handsome altar, in memory of the Rev. Mr. Clayton, the former Rector, has recently been placed. A large window, the work of Le Farge, in memory of Mr. W. G. Ogden, has been placed in the north end of the Church, while another window replaces the one which had been in the south end. These, and other changes, have greatly improved the appearance of the building. One hundred and forty-eight souls are connected with

this Mission. There have been nine baptisms. Four have been confirmed. There are thirty-two communicants. The Sunday School numbers sixty. The offerings have been \$323. This Mission is self-supporting.

All Saints' Mission, Leonia, has been, for nearly a year, under the personal care of the Archdeacon. almost all this time, Mr. Arthur F. Lewis, a member of the graduating class in the General Theological Seminary. has officiated as Lay Reader. He is a Missionary, and the son of a Missionary, his father being one of Bishop Brewer's most faithful priests. Owing to his near graduation, he has been compelled to give up this work. Mr. Frank N. Cockcroft, also a member of the Seminary, a Candidate for Holy Orders under Bishop Talbot, one who has had experience as a Missionary in that jurisdiction, is now the Lay Reader. I am under the deepest obligations to the Rev. J. A. McCleary, Rector of the Church of the Mediator, Edgewater, for celebrations of the Holy Communion and other priestly offices. He has been most kind in this. There are one hundred and fifteen souls in this Mission. There has been one baptism. There are several waiting to be prepared for confirmation. are fifty-three communicants. There are sixty-two in the Sunday School. The offerings amount to \$692. It is greatly hoped that a Church building will soon be erected on the two lots now owned by the Mission. This Mission receives nothing from the Board of Missions. It pays its own way. The Archdeacon receives \$50, which goes towards defraying the traveling expenses of the Lay Reader. Through the generosity of the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary I have presented to the Mission a very complete communion service.

Mission services are being held in Ridgefield Park. The Bishop of the Diocese has temporarily licensed Mr. James Barber as Lay Reader. The Rev. W. F. Capel is most helpful in this work. He freely gives his services. In consequence of this there is a celebration of the Holy Communion at least once a month. A large room is rented, which is used for religious purposes alone. With a generous sum given by the Woman's Auxiliary, I am hoping to furnish this Mission with a communion service and altar linen. Nearly one hundred souls are connected with it. There have been five baptisms. One has been confirmed. There are twenty-five communicants. There are forty-five in the Sunday School. From twelve to fifteen are ready for preparation for confirmation. The promise of a vigorous Mission is very bright. This Mission receives nothing from the Missionary Board.

In my last report I recommended the formation of a Mission at Hasbrouck Heights. This has been done, The Mission is known as that of St. John the Divine. Two lots have been secured. One was a gift, the other has been purchased, one payment having been made on it. A very suitable building which had been used as a public school building has been purchased by one of the gentleman of the Mission and given to the Mission. This has been moved to the lots owned. It will be put in seemly condition and used for Church purposes until the proper time comes, when it will be placed on the rear of the lot. used as a parish house, and a Church building erected. The Archdeacon is in personal charge of this work, having the efficient services of Mr. Caleb B. K. Weed, a Candidate for Holy Orders in this Diocese, as Lay Reader. He is again under the deepest obligations to the Rev. W. F. Capel, who gives a monthly celebration to this Mission, and who gladly goes at all times when priestly ministrations are needed. Through the kindness of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese, he has been able to present to this Mission also a complete communion service. There are one hundred and fifteen souls connected with this work. There have been ten baptisms, Fourteen

were confirmed. There are fifty-three communicants. The Sunday School numbers thirty-six. The offerings have been \$724. This Mission receives nothing from the Board of Missions.

The Mission of the Holy Trinity, Hillsdale, under the -direct care of the Rev. Arthur Whitaker, Rector of Norwood, has had one of the very best years in its history. A handsome and costly altar of oak was used for the first time on Easter Sunday. A cross, vases, and altar linen were also given and first used then. Funds are partly in hand for the building of a chancel to the present building. This will be added this summer. Arrangements have been made for the running of a stage from Westwood, a village about one mile away, to the Mission, in order that Church people living in that place might attend Church services. This Mission, in the truest spirit of independence, relinquishes the stipend of \$100 it has been receiving in the past few years. It is able to meet its own expenses, and, at the earliest possible opportunity, offers to relieve the Missionary Board. I would strongly advise the continuance of this stipend, however, to the Rev. Mr. Whitaker. Not only are there Church people in Westwood, there are Church people in Haworth, Closter, and Alpine also. These are neighboring villages, and if a stage were provided which could carry these people to the Church at Norwood or at Hillsdale, a good work would be done at comparatively little expense. One hundred and twenty-five souls are connected with this Mis-There have been twelve baptisms. Two have been confirmed. There are thirty-two communicants. There are eighty-one in the Sunday School. The offerings have been \$1000. This Mission has heretofore received \$100 from the Board. It now relinquishes it. I ask, however, that it may be continued to the Rev. Mr. Whitaker for reasons stated above.

On the 2d of August of last year I laid the corner stone

of the Mission Church of St. Paul, Montvale. I described this unique and very attractive little church in my report a year ago. There is nothing like it in the Diocese, Quite a large congregation was present at this service. held service again in the evening. The building was packed. I baptized fourteen children at this service. This Mission had the services of a priest for some months in connection with Hasbrouck Heights. Other arrangements were deemed necessary, however. Mr. C. F. Swart, a most devoted member of the Mission, is Lay Reader for One hundred souls are connected with this Mission. Fifteen were baptized. Ten were confirmed. There are thirty-five communicants. There are fifty in the Sunday School. The offerings have been \$750. No aid is given this Mission from the Board of Missions' treasury.

Mission work has been begun, with the consent of the Bishop, by the Rev. Mr. Dorwart, of the Church of the Holy Communion, Paterson, at Hawthorne. The first services at this Mission, St. Clement's, were held in a hall on the eighth of February of this present year. five persons were present. Since then services have been held regularly on Sundays and Thursdays, with an average attendance of thirty-three. Mr. William A. Long, a Lay Reader, most faithfully labors, without compensation, in this new field. This Mission receives nothing from the Board. There are eighty souls. One has been baptized. Seven have been confirmed. There are thirty communicants. Twenty-six are in the Sunday School. The offerings have been \$96.07. The Rev. Mr. Dorwart gives the Mission all priestly offices,

St. Mark's Mission, Paterson, remained a Mission about one year. It is now a strong and promising parish. It is in union with the Convention, and its report will be made to the Bishop.

The Mission at Allendale continues its faithful work under the wise guidance of its Lay Reader and Warden, Mr. Daniel A. Smith.

The same is to be said of the Mission at Nordhoff. This is supported entirely by the mother parish at Englewood, the Rector, the Rev. Mr. Flichtner, giving all priestly services.

St. Matthew's Church, Jersey City, is receiving a stipend of \$300 a year from the Board. It is a parish and its report will be made to the Bishop.

Nothing can be found in the entire missionary field. whether foreign or domestic, which shows such abundant returns as the returns of this Archdeaconry of Jersey City. The Missions have received \$1175 from the Board of Mis-This does not include the \$300 given to St. Matthew's Church, Jersey City. In return for this there are two thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight souls: there have been one hundred and eighty-one baptisms: one hundred and twenty-one have been confirmed: there are nine hundred and forty-one communicants: there are one thousand two hundred and twenty in the Sunday Schools, and the offerings have been \$8534. Had St. Mark's, Paterson, remained a Mission, and had its report been as it was last year, the Missions of this Archdeaconry would have shown an increase during the year of seven hundred and eighty-four souls, thirty-one baptisms, fifty confirmed, seventy-nine communicants, one hundred and thirty-six Sunday School scholars, and \$2904 in offerings. Am I not justified in saying that no portion of the great Mission field of the Church, whether in this land or in foreign lands, furnishes evidence of so abundant a return as this Archdeaconry of Jersey City? Have we not every reason to thank God, take courage, and press on?

March 1st, 1896, an afternoon service was begun in a building on Walnut street, the use of which was given us, rent free, until further notice. This has been fitted up for Church service, and is the chapel referred to in the report. The service is in charge of the Rev. Claudius M. Roome, and the average attendance is about forty. A Sunday-school has also been started, with an average attendance of about twenty-five.

HOSPITAL OF ST. BARNABAS.

THIRTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT, 1896.

The Committee appointed by the Board of Trustees to prepare the Annual Report, respectfully submit the following:

The work of the hospital has been carried on faithfully and efficiently during the past year. The Sisters of St. Margaret in charge of the internal affairs of the hospital, have managed them prudently and skillfully, and the physicians and surgeons have continued to give their time and professional skill to this work of mercy.

From the report of the Sister in charge, it appears that the number of patients treated during the year in the wards, is six hundred and sixty-one, and the number treated in the dispensary is sixteen hundred and sixty-one. The number of clinical visits has been five thousand and twenty-eight. The average number of patients remaining in the wards is nearly sixty, and nearly this number are admitted and discharged during every month.

The individual patients come and go; the sick are cured and the injured are relieved; these are sent away and others take their places, so that more than a hundred separate cases are treated during each month, and more than six hundred in the course of the year. The average has been steadily increasing, and it has now nearly reached the full capacity of the present buildings.

There has been a great increase within the last year of the patients in the private wards, and the small sum charged for nursing and attendance in these wards, has added much to the income of the institution. It is because of the excellence of the appliances of the hospital, the skillfulness of the nurses, and the ability of the medical and surgical staff, that the hospital has acquired a wide reputation, and its private wards are used by those who know the advantages which a hospital affords.

There is not room enough in the buildings for the private patients who seek admission, and it would be very desirable to have a new building devoted entirely to

that purpose.

The report of the Treasurer shows a further reduction of the mortgage debt by three thousand dollars, and an increase of the same amount in the endowment fund. The mortgage is now twenty-two thousand dollars, and the endowment fund twenty-three thousand, one hundred dollars, and the income from the one is nearly enough to pay the interest on the other. No change has been made in the buildings except by way of painting and repair. The cost of the land and buildings has been about ninety thousand dollars.

The cost of the maintenance of the hospital has been somewhat greater than last year. This is due to the increase in the number of patients, and is offset to some extent by the increase in the receipts from the board of patients in private wards. There has been a decrease in

the receipts from occasional contributions and from the churches, and there would be a deficiency in moneys applicable to current expenses, if it were not for legacies that have been paid, and these ought to be applied to the mortgage debt and not to current expenses. Your committee are satisfied that the annual expenses cannot be cut down without crippling the usefulness of the hospital, and they recommend that measures be taken to obtain regular contributions from a larger number of persons, and that the needs of the hospital be presented clearly to the public, and especially to the people of the Church on whom the responsibility for the support of this hospital, managed by the Bishop and representatives of the various parishes, must ultimately rest.

The ladies of the Guild of the Hospital of St. Barnabas, have continued the efforts they have been making for so many years to raise money for the support of the hospital.

and it is to them we are indebted for a large part of the voluntary contributions to the hospital and for much of the public interest in its affairs.

The Guild of St. Catharine has gone on with its ministrations to the sick, and has done much to help the Sisters

in giving comfort and pleasure to the patients.

The present chaplain, the Rev. Elliot White, was appointed about two years ago, and is doing faithful service, visiting the sick and holding services in the chapel. The Holy Communion is celebrated on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, and there is evening prayer on Sunday, Wednesday and Friday.

An important event of the past year was the establishment of a training school for nurses in the hospital. Modern surgery requires the services of more nurses than were formerly needed, and greater skill and experience. It was only because some of the Sisters in charge had remarkable knowledge and skill as nurses that the hospital was able to gain the reputation which it acquired, and to secure the confidence of the surgeons, and it was necessary for the continued success of the hospital and only fair to the nurses employed there, that a training school for nurses should be established. The Board has, therefore, authorized the appointment of a graduate of a training school as superintendent of nurses, who, under the Sister in charge, has the supervision of the nursing and gives instruction to the nurses. The medical staff are about to give courses of lectures, and diplomas will be given at the end of a certain time to nurses who pass the required examination.

The appearance of the interior of the hospital building has been greatly improved by the painting of the walls with oil paint. The buildings are now in thoroughly good condition and can be kept in order without much expense.

A new stained glass window is about to be placed in the chapel, a gift by way of memorial to Mrs. Guy J. Edwords, who was a devoted member of the Guild of St. Catharine.

ENDOWMENT FUND.

To this account \$3,000 has been added during the year, making the total amount \$23,100, which is invested at an average of about five per cent.; the interest only being used on account of current expenses.

THE HOSPITAL PROPERTY.

No important change has been made during the past year upon the grounds or buildings, except painting of the interior of the Hospital building, which made a very satisfactory improvement.

Payment on the mortgage upon the property has reduced the amount now due to \$22,000.

HOUSEHOLD ACCOUNT.

A small increase in monthly average of expenditure on this account is shown, but readily accounted for by the increased number of patients and necessary additional cost of supplies, with more nurses and servants. Household bills are all paid to January 1st, 1896, but subsequent supplies to date have yet to be provided for. The balance yet to be received during this month, from the work of the Guild of St. Barnabas and other usual sources, may, however, be counted upon materially to reduce the deficit.

GENERAL CONDITION.

Comparing with the average of the past three or four years, there has been a considerable falling off in contributions from nearly all of the usual sources. Although this may probably be accounted for by the splendid result of the extraordinary work of last year and the very natural reaction or temporary cessation of interest in the continued needs of the Hospital, yet it is certain that unless current receipts are increased, another burden of floating debt is inevitable. To pay the cost of living is our first obligation, and the necessity—as well as advantage—of caring for it cannot be too strongly urged.

In the early portion of the year the failure of the water supply, on the part of the city, caused the Hospital work to be curtailed and the receiving of patients to be suspended. This fact accounts for the number of patients occupying beds appearing less than the year previous, and the expenses per patient being larger, because during this misfortune the greater part of the Hospital expenses were continued.

Charging the outlay for current expenses to those patients occupying beds, the cost per day for each patient. has been 87 cents.

Leaving out the interruption of the work by the failure of the water supply, the Hospital has been taxed to its utmost to provide for those applying to be received. It is now of frequent occurrence that every bed and extracot is filled, and patients are unable to gain admission, while the demand for private rooms by persons desirous of operations, cries out to us to arise and do something more for the sick and suffering. The speedy erection of the south wing, therefore, becomes an absolute necessity, and the Council asks all its friends and a charitable public to come to its relief. We shall inaugurate plans and devise ways and means at the earliest possible moment, and, as we put our hand to the spade in faith when we began this work, so we will continue it, the Lord being our helper.

Of the 610 patients this last year, 458 were treated free, so that more than three-quarters were charity. The great charity work the Hospital so freely gives, cannot be carried on without liberal donations and subscriptions from those who have their health and who have means to be-

stow. The falling off of many subscriptions, on account of the depressed financial times, seriously endangers the work, but we have never yet appealed to the public, but they have come to our relief. Attention is called to this, and subscribers should not forget the Charity Fund of Christ Hospital.

The reports of the Treasurer and Special Treasurer of the Building Fund present a very good showing, and yet, the close financial times in all things manifest themselves. Over \$20,000 have been received. Of this, \$3,000 for an endowed bed, and \$2,500 balance in the Building Fund, were a part of a legacy. This leaves our receipts through regular channels over \$14,500.

St. Mary's Guild is an auxiliary of the Finance Committee, and is charged with the special work of trying to raise annually the interest of the debt incurred in building the Hospital, and of reducing the principal. For this end it has scattered all over this section 414 Mite Boxes, from which quarterly collections are made. It has received through these and in other ways about \$1,200.

The Abercrombie Guild is an auxiliary to the Council, and works for the general good of the Hospital. Thanksgiving Week they took charge of making this a Donation Week. They send out hungry bags for gifts of money and provisions, and the response from all sections of the city was most gratifying. The Abercrombie Guild have in charge, as their principal work, the endowment of beds to maintain and extend the charity work of the institution. They have increased the endowment over \$1,000 the past year, so that their endowment is now over \$39,000. This has been collected through "The Daisy," a little paper issued monthly by the Guild.

The Medical Board have shown themselves most devoted to their work, and they have brought the reputation of the Hospital for efficiency to a high standard. The great increase in the number of capital operations, over thirty more than the year previous, shows their professional skill is being recognized and in increasing demand by our citizens. Their urgent need is more private rooms for patients, and it is this side of our work that is most pressing, and must be provided for in the building of a south wing of the Hospital as speedily as it may be accomplished.

The Training School for Nurses now numbers thirteen Graduates who have received the Diploma and the Medal of Christ Hospital, and nine Pupil Nurses and two Probationers. It cares for the sick in the Wards and Private Rooms of the Hospital and in private families so far as it is able to do.

It has been greatly assisted by the presentation to the Hospital of a lot with dwelling house thereon, by Mr. and Mrs. Browning, which has been fitted up as a temporary home, whereon it is proposed to erect later St. Elizabeth's Home for Nurses, in memory of Mrs. Elizabeth S. Wilkinson.

The Chaplain has continued his spiritual ministrations among the sick, and kept up the services in the Chapel and in the Wards. The clergymen of various patients have also visited them and are always welcome.

The Collector has given such time to his work as he could spare from other duties and has solicited subscriptions of over a thousand dollars.

The Executive Committee have met monthly, to audit the bills for current expenses, and to consider and decide upon all kinds of questions which have arisen in connection with the management of the Institution. The value of their services cannot be estimated, and the Council desire to place on record their appreciation of their faithful aervices.

The Endowment of Beds through the Council, added to those endowed through the Abercrombie Guild, makes the total endowment over \$50,000.

The cost of our present land, buildings and furnishings has been about \$65,000, on which there is a bonded debt of \$30,000. If this be deducted from our outlay, and the value of our endowments added, we have a cash value at this date of \$85,000.

We recognize the great blessings God has given us in this work for Him and suffering humanity. We thank all our kind friends who have nobly aided, and by their own hands and prayers have helped us to carry on this work. But we have now reached a point where the present work must not only be sustained, but we must devise more liberal things. The Council then sets its face towards the south wing to be erected, and invites all our friends and workers in the cause to enter into this needed and pressing want. How long it will take to accomplish this will depend upon our own faith and zeal and upon our friends and a charitable public, who are now well aware that Christ Hospital stands for the sick and suffering of every creed, color, and nationality, and is limited only by its capacity, but hopes speedily to extend its accommodations, that it may be more far-reaching in its efforts to care for and relieve human suffering.

May God bless our efforts in future as He has in the past, and may Christ "lift up the light of His countenance" upon His namesake, and grant us our heart's desire.

RULES.

1. St. Katharine's Home is intended to help unmarried girls who have been led astray for the first time, and to shelter them before and after motherhood.

2. Applications must be made to the Chaplain, or to the Sister in charge, who will investigate each case.

3. Applicants must be recommended by trusty-worthy persons and must bring a certificate of good health from a physician in regular standing.

4. Each girl must sign a written promise to remain in the Home for a fixed length of time, to conform to the rules of the house, and to perform such a share of the house and other work as may be assigned her.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

For the Year ending November 1, 1895.

There have been several changes in the Executive Committee and Advisory Board of the Home during the past year. Many of the good workers have resigned their place on the Board, owing to change of residence or other causes, and we begin this year's work with regret for the loss of the old faces and hope that we may become familiar with the new ones very soon.

In order to have the meetings of the Advisory Board better attended, it has been decided to hold four stated meetings each year. For the coming year, that of 1896, these meetings will be held the third Mondays of January, April, July and October, which will be January 20, April 20, July 20, and October 19.

During the past year, the Home has sheltered and cared for 29 girls and 14 babies. At the present time there are 10 girls in the Home and eight babies. Of these 29 girls, one has married, ten remain in the Home. Of the others some have gone out to service, two have been sent to other institutions and others have gone to their own homes, or been dismissed by the Sister in charge.

Through the Sister's personal effort last spring a porch was built, which proved a great benefit to the Home. During the hot weather, the babies spent all the hours of daylight there, and as a result, are unusually strong and well now.

In the spring, the resignation of the Chaplain, Rev. George H. Moffett, was most reluctantly accepted. Mr. Moffett was one of the founders of St. Katharine's, and has devoted much time and care to this work, and it was with sincere regret that, on account of removal from the Diocese, he was obliged to resign his position. Rev. F. E. Mortimer, who has kindly accepted the position of Chaplain, very much to the satisfaction of the Board, reports that he has held one or two services each week, and, excepting during the summer, the girls have had weekly instructions from him. In holy week two of the girls were confirmed after careful preparation, and were admitted to Holy Communion. Five baptisms, five funerals and one marriage have taken place. Dr. Noble,

who has taken Dr. Loomis' place as our physician, is most conscientious and efficient in his work, and deserves the sincere gratitude which we all feel towards him for his most excellent care of the family at the Home.

In August, much to the sorrow of every one connected with the Home, Sister Cora was withdrawn from the work. As the Secretary was in Europe and there was no way of finding her books, the vacancy was filled as quickly as possible without calling a meeting of the Board, which was impossible, as no list of members and addresses was attainable. Miss Talcott, who has been familiar with work like ours for some time, took up the threads dropped by Sister Cora, and has carried on the work since with excellent results, and we esteem ourselves most fortunate to have found some one who understood and had been successful in this peculiar work.

Our treasurer's report is not encouraging, and the members of the Advisory Board are asked to give the financial part of our work their grave consideration. It is a work so blessed, so far reaching, and so important in its results, that no question of being hampered by an empty treasury should be allowed to impede it. At the last meeting of the Board, each member was asked to contribute \$25 before February 1, 1896. To those members who were not present, this appeal is now made with the hope that they will respond to it.

In a sermon preached in behalf of St. Katharine's Home, the clergyman gave this thought to his people. We should like to give it to all who read this report. He said to them: "If, for any reason, some of you have great cause to be thankful this past year, if you have been saved from any sin or sorrow, if any of you have had some one dear to you brought back from the edge of the grave and restored to health; if any of you have seen your own little children suffer and have rejoiced when they were

made well, then show your thankfulness to God by doing something for the unfortunate ones, and in that way lift the burden of those who struggle and suffer in the shadowy pathway of life. Do it with the thought that it was our blessed Lord who said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, My brethren, ye have done it unto Me."

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE EPISCOPAL FUND.

The Trustees of the Episcopal Fund of the Diocese of Newark, beg leave to submit the enclosed report of their Secretary and Treasurer as their report for the fiscal year, ending May 1, 1896.

EDW. Q. KEASBEY, by E. A. S. E. A. STEVENS, EDW. H. WRIGHT.

To The Trustees of the Episcopal Fund of the Diocese of Newark.

GENTLEMEN. I beg leave to herewith submit:-

I. My report of the transactions for the year May 1st, 1895 to May 1st, 1896.

II. List of Parish Bonds, and statement of the interest paid and due thereon to May, 1896.

It will be noticed that the amount of the parish bonds in the statement is \$51,780 instead of \$52,280 as reported by the Trustees to the Convention of last year.

This difference of \$500. arises from an error in addition in last year's report of \$1,000., the figures as given adding up to \$51,780., and of a further error

of \$500. in the amount of the bonds of St. Stephen's parish of Newark, which is stated in the report as \$1,000. while the bond is \$1,500.

I would call the attention of the Trustees to the statement of overdue interest, which has reached a total of over \$4,400. The recommendation of the Trustees to the Convention that the Convention should appoint a committee to inquire into this subject and report thereon, has resulted in a report recommending that the Convention take no action, but leave the matter where it legally rests, i. e., with the Trustees.

III. A List of the Securities belonging to the different Funds under the charge of the Trustees.

As to the securities mentioned therein, I would report:

- (1) On the Parker mortgage, interest is unpaid since December, 1894. Mr. Parker has promised to attend to the matter at an early day.
- (2) The policy of insurance, deposited as further security for the Keasbey loan, has expired. I have written Mr. Keasbey, requesting him to forward a new one.

(This has been done since date of report.)

- (3) Theodore Curran. This bond and mortgage was not turned over to me; papers and letters referring to this loan were among Mr. Dodd's papers, also an endorsement, in pencil upon the wrapper, stating that this bond and mortgage had been turned over to counsel for foreclosure and collection. There appears to be two and one-half years interest due on this loan to May 30th, 1896.
 - (4) The interest on the J. N. Akarman mortgage is unpaid since November, 1894. Mr. Akarman prom-

ised to settle up the interest in full in June last, but has failed to do so. The policy of insurance has also expired. I have again written to Mr. Akarman, requesting him to remit.

I would call the attention of the Board to the fact that, included in the cash balances shown in the various Funds, there are \$200. on account of principal of Missionary Fund, and \$101.08 on account of principal of the Hamburg Organ Fund. The latter amount is drawing interest in the Howard Savings Institution.

I have received no assessments during the year from the Treasurer of the Diocese, nor has he made any drafts on me on account of the income of the Missionary Fund.

THE CONSTITUTION*

of the Protestant Episcopal Church, in the Diocese of Newark.†

ARTICLE 1.

The Church in the Diocese of Newark, as a constituent part of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, accedes to the Constitution and Canons of that Church, and acknowledges their authority.

ARTICLE 2.

There shall be a Convention of the Church in this Diocese, on the third Tuesday in May, in each year, to be held where the Ecclesiastical Authority appoints; provided, that whenever such day falls in Rogation Week, the Convention shall be on the fourth Tuesday in May.

ARTICLE 3.

The Bishop, or, if the Episcopate be vacant, or the Bishop be incapacitated from acting, the Standing Committee shall have power, when it appears requisite for the good of the Church, to call a Special Convention. Every Clergyman, entitled to a seat, and every Parish in union

with this Convention, shall be notified by a circular letter, at least four weeks previous to the time appointed; which letter shall specify the purpose for which said Special Convention is called, and no business shall be transacted at any such meeting other than that stated in the notice.

ARTICLE 4.

- SEC. 1. The Convention shall be composed, of both Clergymen and Laymen.
- SEC. 2. Every Presbyter, six months canonically resident in the Diocese, who is regularly elected and settled by the corporate authorities of the Parish as Rector or Assistant Minister in some Church or Parish in union with this Convention, or who is a Missionary duly appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority, or who is engaged as a Rector, Principal or Professor in any incorporated literary or theological institution of the Church, or as a Chaplain in the Army or Navy of the United States, shall be a member ex-officio; nor shall this right be forfeited when any such Presbyter, after having been for five years connected with the Diocese, shall, by reason of age or infirmity, be disabled from the performance of the active duties of his ministry. Other Presbyters and Deacons, who belong to this Diocese, shall also be admitted to seats, with the right to take part in the debates, but shall not vote, nor be eligible to any office in the gift of the Convention.
- SEC. 3. The Laity shall be entitled to a representation of one or more Deputies, not exceeding three, from each Parish in union with the Convention. Deputies shall be elected by each Congregation, from the male Communicants thereof.
- SEC. 4. Lay Deputies shall not be allowed or entitled to vote at any session of the Convention of this Diocese in any of the following cases:

- 1. In case the Parish sending such Deputies shall for two successive years have failed to report to the Bishop in accordance with Sec. I. of Canon 6, of Title I, of the Code.
- 2. In case the Parish sending such Deputies shall for two successive years have failed to pay to the proper officer the interest on the Parish bonds given for the support of the Episcopate, or assessments for the same, and such sum or sums as may have been assessed or levied upon such Parish for Diocesan or Convention expenses, unless the same shall have been remitted by action of the Convention.
- 3. In case the Parish sending such Deputies, having been for two successive years without a Parish Minister, and not having provided for regular services, shall have failed to notify the Bishop thereof, and to request that a Missionary be assigned to it.

Lay Deputies from such Parishes shall, however, be allowed to vote at any session of the Convention, when it shall appear that at least six months prior to such session, the report, payment and notification mentioned in the subdivisions 1, 2, and 3, of this Section, respectively, have, and each of them has, been given or made.

ARTICLE 5.

New Parishes may be admitted into union with this Convention by a majority of votes; *provided* they shall produce to the Convention.

- 1. Satisfactory evidence of the assent of the Bishop, on advice of the Standing Committee, or if there be no Bishop, of the assent of the Standing Committee, to their formation; and
- 2. Shall lay before the Convention duly authenticated copies of the minutes, resolutions and other proceedings of organization, and

3. Of their act or certificate of incorporation, proving that they have been duly organized, by the election of two Wardens, and, at least, five Vestrymen, and incorporated

according to law; and shall, also,

4. By an authenticated copy of a resolution of their Wardens and Vestrymen, promise conformity and obedience to the doctrine, discipline and worship of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, and to the Constitution and Canons of this Church.

And provided further, That any congregation organized under Trustees duly incorporated by Act of the Legislature of the State of New Jersey, may be admitted as a Parish, with all the rights thereof, into union with this Convention when such Trustees shall produce to the Convention.

r. Satisfactory evidence of the assent of the Bishop, on advice of the Standing Committee, or, if there be no Bishop, of the assent of the Standing Committee, to its

formation as a Parish; and

2. Shall furnish an authenticated copy of a resolution promising conformity and obedience to the doctrine, discipline, and worship of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, and to the Constitution and Canons of this Church.

But Deputies from New Parishes, though entitled to a seat, shall not be allowed to vote at the Convention in which their Parishes are admitted.

ARTICLE 6.

The Bishop of the Diocese shall have a seat and a vote in the Convention, and shall preside at all its meetings. The Assistant Bishop, when there is one, shall have a seat and a vote; and in the absence of the Bishop shall preside. In case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, or of the absence of the Bishop, and of the Assistant Bishop, the members shall elect a President pro tempore from among the Presbyters entitled to vote.

ARTICLE 7.

- SEC. 1. The Presbyters entitled to vote, who may be present at the time of meeting, with the Deputies from ten Parishes shall constitute a quorum.
- SEC. 2. On the demand of two Presbyters entitled to vote, or of the Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote upon any question shall be by orders, the Clergy voting individually and the Laity by Parishes; and, when a vote is thus taken, a concurrent majority in both orders shall be neccessary to carry any measure.

ARTICLE 8.

- SEC. I. At each Annual Convention a Secretary shall be chosen, from among its members, who shall continue in office till a successor be appointed. His duty shall be to take minutes of the proceedings, to preserve the journals and records, to attest the public acts of the body, and to deliver to his successor all books and papers relating to the concerns of the Convention which may be in his possession.
- SEC. 2. The Secretary shall appoint an Assistant Secretary, and whenever there shall be a vacancy in the office of Secretary, the duties thereof shall devolve upon the Assistant Secretary, if there be one; if not, upon the Secretary of the Standing Committee.

ARTICLE 9.

SEC. 1. A Treasurer of this Convention shall be elected, who shall continue in office during its pleasure. He shall give satisfactory security for the faithful discharge of the duties of his office, and shall present a statement of his accounts to each Annual Convention, of which he shall be,

ex-officio, a member, with a right to speak, but not to vote.

SEC. 2. In case the Treasurer die, resign, remove from the Diocese, or be incapable of acting, the Standing Committee shall have power to appoint a Treasurer to act until the next succeeding Convention, with authority to receive any money, bonds, mortgages, notes or other property and papers belonging to the Convention; and the Treasurer thus appointed shall enter into the same securities, and be responsible in the same manner, as if regularly elected by the Convention.

ARTICLE 10.

- SEC. I. The Standing Committee shall consist of four Clergymen and four Laymen, to be chosen annually; each order choosing its own members by ballot, subject to the approval of the other order. The Clerical members must be of those entitled to vote in this Convention, and the Lay members must be Communicants of some Parish in union with the Convention of the Diocese. As soon as convenient after their election, they shall choose a President from among the Clerical members, and a Secretary. The proceedings shall be recorded by the Secretary, and open to the inspection of the Convention.
- SEC. 2. A majority of the members of the Standing Committee, the whole having been duly cited to meet, shall be a quorum.
- SEC. 3. The Standing Committee shall have power to fill vacancies which may occur in their own body during the recess of the Convention.

ARTICLE 11.

SEC. 1. At the Annual Convention next before the meeting of the regular General Convention, four Clerical

and four Lay Deputies shall be elected to represent this Diocese in the General Convention; each order choosing its own representatives by ballot, subject to the approval of the other order; and the Deputies so chosen shall hold office for three years.

SEC. 2. The Convention at the same time and in the same manner, shall elect a like number of supplementary Deputies of each order. It shall be the duty of the Deputies-elect to signify to the Bishop, at least thirty days before the meeting of the General Convention, their acceptance of the appointment and intention to perform its duties; in default of which, the Bishop shall designate so many of the supplementary deputies having the greatest number of votes as shall be necessary to insure a full representation of the Diocese; and the persons so designated shall have all the power and authority of Deputies duly elected by this Convention. In case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, the power hereby conferred on the Bishop shall be exercised by the Standing Committee.

ARTICLE 12.

- SEC. 1. The election of a Bishop shall be at the regular Annual Convention, or at a Special Convention duly summoned according to the provisions of Article 3 of this Constitution.
- SEC. 2. The vote shall be by ballot, the Clergy voting individually, the Lay Deputies by Parishes. The Clerical and Lay orders shall vote separately until some fit and qualified Presbyter shall receive a majority, in each order, of those present and voting; a blank ballot shall be considered a vote. And the Presbyter receiving such a concurrent majority in both orders shall be declared duly elected; provided, that if there should not be present two-thirds of the clergy entitled to vote, and Deputies from

two-thirds of the congregations entitled to representation, then a concurrent majority of two-thirds of those present and voting in each order shall be necessary to determine a choice.

ARTICLE 13.

This Constitution shall not be altered but in the following manner: The proposed alteration, or the modification of it deemed advisable, having been submitted to the Convention in which it originated, and been approved by a majority, shall lie over to the next Convention; and if then adopted by a majority of the members, voting by orders, shall become valid and obligatory.

CODE OF CANONS

ADOPTED AT THE

Annual Convention, November 22, 1876.

AMENDED AT SUBSEQUENT CONVENTIONS.

1898.

TITLE I.

OF ORGANIZED BODIES AND OFFICERS OF THE DIOCESE.

CANON 1.

Of the Convention.

§ I. [1.] The Secretary of the Convention shall keep a register of all the Clergy in the Diocese entitled to seats or votes in this Convention, in the following manner: The Bishop, or when there is no Bishop, the Standing Committee, shall, one week before the day of meeting of the Convention, deliver, or cause to be delivered, to said Secretary, a certified list of all the Ministers of this Church canonically resident in the Diocese, annexing the names of their respective cures or other stations or engagements; also, in respect of those who have been ordained or received into the Diocese within the year immediately preceding, the dates of their ordination or reception; from which list, thus furnished by the Bishop or Standing Committee, said Secretary shall prepare, in conformity with Article 4, Section 2, of the Constitution, a roll or register of all the Clergy entitled to votes or seats in this Convention.

- [2.] The roll thus prepared shall be prima facie evidence of the rights of Clerical members. Should any dispute arise, it shall be referred to a Committee appointed by the Convention, who shall decide and report on each case as early as may be; and the decisions thus made, if accepted by the Convention, shall not be called in question again during the same session.
- § II. [1.] Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present certificates of their election in the following form:

[Name of the Church, the Place, and Date.]

This certifies that a meeting of the congregation of this Church, for the purpose of electing Church Officers and Deputies to the Convention (or. for the purpose of electing: Deputies to the Convention, if the meeting be for that object alone), A. B., C. D. and E. F., being members of the congregation and Communicants of the Church, were duly chosen to represent the congregation in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand (or if two Wardens subscribe, we have set our hands), the day and year above written.

Which certificate shall be signed by the Rector, the Secretary of the Vestry, or by two Wardens, and transmitted by the Secretary of the Vestry to the Secretary of the Convention, at least ten days before the meeting of the Annual Convention; and the above form shall be annually inserted in the printed Journal of the Convention. *Provided*, That where a congregation shall have been organized under Trustees, the certificate above described shall be signed by two Trustees in lieu of the Wardens.

[2.] From the said certificates of Lay Deputies the Secretary of the Convention shall prepare a roll of the Lay Deputies who appear to be entitled to seats and votes in the Convention.

The roll thus prepared shall be prima facie evidence of

the rights of the Lay Deputies. But should any dispute arise, it shall be referred to a Committee of one Clergyman and two Laymen appointed by the Convention, who shall decide and report on each case as early as may be; and the decisions thus made, if accepted by the Convention, shall not be called in question again during the same session.

- § III. It is declared to be the duty of every Clergyman and Layman having a seat in Convention, to attend every meeting thereof, or send a reasonable excuse for absence.
- § IV. Every Convention shall be opened with the celebration of the Lord's Supper, followed by the Bishop's charge, or such portions of the Bishop's Address as he may think best then to read. Episcopal Charges shall be published by the Convention, without any motion to that effect. The services at the opening of the Convention shall commence at 10 o'clock A. M., and the business of each day shall be preceded by prayer, the Bishop, or a minister of his appointment, officiating.

CANON 2.*

Of Elections.

- § I. In all elections, those persons only who shall have a majority of all the votes cast shall be deemed elected.
- § II. In all elections for which provision is not otherwise specifically made in the Constitution or Canons, the vote shall be by ballot; the Clergy voting individually and the Lay Deputies by Parishes; and a majority of all the votes cast by both orders collectively shall be necessary to an election; provided, however, that by unanimous.

consent the ballot may be dispensed with, and an election may be made by viva voce vote of a majority of all the individual members of the Convention present and entitled to vote.

CANON 3.

Of the Office of Registrar.

- § I. There shall be appointed by the Convention a Registrar of the Diocese, to hold office until he shall resign, or until a successor be appointed, whose duty it shall be to collect and preserve papers, files, reports, journals, records and other documents relative to the history of the Church, the same to be the property of the Convention, and to be kept in some safe and accessible place, where the members of the Convention can inspect them.
- § II. He shall report annually to the Convention upon the conditions of the various books and documents in his keeping, and what additions have been made.

CANON 4.

Of the Bishop's Salary, Expenses of the Convention, and of the Episcopal and Missionary Funds.

§ I. At every Annual Convention there shall be appointed a Finance Committee, consisting of five Laymen, whose duty it shall be to make assessments on the Parishes: First, in aid of the Episcopal Fund, which shall be of the rate of seven per cent. on the aggregate of the salaries paid to their respective Rectors or Ministers and Assistant Ministers: and secondly, for printing the Journal, the expenses of the Standing Committee, for the quota towards the expenses of the General Convention,

and other expenses of this Convention, which shall be in the ratio of said salaries. They shall report to the Convention during the session at which such assessments are made; on which report the Convention may take action at pleasure. Provided, That no assessment shall be made for the Bishop's salary on any Parish which shall have contributed to the Episcopal Fund an amount equal to the annual salary of its Rector or Minister, at the time of making such contribution, which may be either in money or else in securities bearing interest equivalent to seven per cent. of that amount, and a credit shall be given to any Parish which shall have contributed a part only of such amount Provided further. That no new Parish shall hereafter be relieved from assessments for the Bishop's salary until it has a settled Rector, and has paid to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund a sum not less than the salary paid or to be paid to its Rector. Provided further. That no Parish shall be relieved from assessments for the Bishop's salary, unless a sum not less than one thousand dollars has been contributed to the Episcopal Fund.

- § II. The assessment for the Bishop's salary shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund of the Diocese of Newark, quarterly, on the first day of January, April, July and October. And the assessment for the expenses of the Convention shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Convention before the first day of July, which assessments and payments together with all arrears, shall be published in the Journal, in a separate schedule prepared by the Treasurer.
- § III. The salary to be paid to the Bishop, until otherwise ordered by the Convention, is hereby fixed at six thousand dollars per annum.*

- § IV. It shall be the duty of the Rectors and Ministers of the several congregations of the Diocese to lay this Canon before their Vestries, and urge their co-operation in carrying out its provisions.
- § V. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer of the Convention, at each of its annual meetings, to make a separate report of the amounts of money received from each Parish assessed in aid of the Episcopal Fund, and the assessments provided for by Section I of this Canon, specifying the Parishes (if any) which have made no contributions. And this report shall be entered on the minutes of the Convention, and as much of said report shall be published in each year as the Convention may from time to time direct.
- § VI. The Trustees of the Episcopal Fund of the Diocese of Newark shall have power to remit such portions of the annual assessments on Parishes for the Bishop's salary, and of the annual interest which may at any time be due on Parish bonds in the hands of said Trustees, as they may under the circumstances of each case deem expedient, making an annual report of the names of the Parishes and of amounts remitted to them respectively.

CANON 5.*

Of Diocesan Missions.

§ I. The Bishop, Clergy and Laity in Convention assembled shall be the Missionary Council of the Diocese, and shall take up the consideration of all matters connected with the Missions of the Diocese on the second day of the Annual Convention immediately after the reading of the Bishop's Address.

- § II [r]. At the annual meeting of the Missionary Council a Board of Missions shall be elected, consisting of six Clergymen and six Laymen; *Provided*, however, that the Bishop shall be, ex-officio, a member of the Board, and when present shall preside at the meetings thereof; and provided, further, that the two Archdeacons hereinafter named shall be, ex-officio, members of the Board, (if not elected members) with right to speak but not to vote.
- [2]. The Board shall hold its first meeting immediately after the adjournment of the Convention, on call of the Bishop, and shall hold subsequent meetings at its own discretion or at the call of the Bishop through its Secretary; shall elect its own President, Secretary and Treasurer; make by-laws for its own guidance; designate, with the concurrence of the Bishop, its Mission Stations throughout the Diocese; and take proper measures to provide and apply the funds necessary for their support; and may receive specific donations from any Parish or individual for any particular Mission, which shall be applied as designated by the donor and shall so be reported by the Treasurer.
 - [3]. The Bishop shall appoint all Missionaries.
- § III. The Board of Missions shall make a report of its proceedings to the Annual Missionary Council, stating the names of all Stations and their Missionaries; the annual receipts and expenditures; the specific donations and their object; and the names of the Parishes and Missions contributing and not contributing; and giving such other information and suggestions as they may deem desirable.
- § IV. It shall be the duty of every Minister having charge of a Parish or Mission within the Diocese to see that there be made at least two offerings each year for

Diocesan Missions, on days appointed by the Bishop or on such other days near the same as the Minister may deem most suitable, and to forward such offerings without delay to the Treasurer of the Board of Missions.

§ V. [1] The Diocese shall be divided into two districts as follows:

First, The part of Hudson County lying west of the Hackensack River, the counties of Warren, Sussex, Morris and Essex, and the township of Summit; to be known as the "Archdeaconry of Newark."

Second, The part of Hudson County lying east of the Hackensack River, and the counties of Passaic and Bergen; to be known as the "Archdeaconry of Jersey City."

- [2] Each of these districts shall have an Archdeacon appointed annually by the Bishop, who, under the direction of the Bishop, shall have supervision of the Missions in his district, and when required shall report to the Board, the condition of such Missions, with suggestions.
- [3] The necessary expenses of the Archdeacons in the performance of their duties shall, on order of the Board, be paid by the Treasurer thereof.
- § VI. The interest of the Permanent Missionary Fundshall be applied to the Missions of the Diocese in such way as the Bishop, by written order to the Treasurer of the Diocese, may direct.

CANON 6.

Of the Parish.

§ I. [1.] In every congregation the Church Wardens shall provide a proper book, in which the Minister, or if the Parish be vacant, one of the Wardens, shall record the name and date of the birth of the child baptized, with the

names of the parents and sponsors, the name of the adult baptized, the names of all persons married and buried, together with a list of all the Communicants in the Parish, and also a list of the persons confirmed, with the date of every event recorded; all of which shall be under the signature of the person recording. From this register there shall annually be presented to the Bishop, on or before the first day of the Convention, by the Minister, or if there be no Minister, by one of the Wardens, an accurate statement of the number of baptisms, marriages, funerals, and persons confirmed and admitted to the Holy Communion since the last like report. He shall also report the condition of the Sunday-schools in his Parish; and the amount contributed for the poor; for Missions, Diocesan, Domestic and Foreign; for Parochial Schools; for the support and current expenses of the Parish; and for Church purposes in general; and also the number, if any, of free sittings in each Church, with the method of its support; together with such other particulars as may throw light on the condition of the Parish. And this statement, or such parts thereof as shall be approved by the Bishop, shall be entered and published in the Journal of the Convention.

- [2.] In order to secure a full and accurate view of the state of the Church, in case a proper report be not made according to the Canons of the General Convention on this subject by the Minister or other proper authority of any Parish, it shall be the duty of the Convention to cause inquiry to be made into the condition of such Parish.
- *§ II. [1.] In every Church which is supplied by a Clergyman there shall be Divine Service on the day of the election of Church officers, and immediately before the election is held.
- [2.] On the day fixed by the Charter or certificate of Incorporation, there shall be held annually a Parish meet-

ing of which notice shall be given ten days previously by an advertisement set up in open view on the door of the Church or usual place of worship. At such meeting the qualified voters of the Parish shall elect by a majority of votes cast, three Deputies and three alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, two Wardens, one of whom shall be called the Senior Warden, and the other the Junior Warden, and such number of Vestrymen as the Parish may be legally entitled to elect. When the Rector by the Church Charter has the right to appoint one Warden he shall be called the Senior Warden and only one Warden shall be elected.

- [3.] At such annual meeting, the Rector, or if there be no Rector, or if he be absent, the Senior Warden, or in his absence, the Junior Warden, or if no Warden be present, a Vestryman, or if no Vestryman be present, then a qualified voter elected for that purpose, shall preside and receive the votes of the electors.
- [4.] The persons entitled to vote at such meeting shall be (1) baptized, (2) males, (3) of full age and (4) of good moral character, who (5) profess to adhere to the Protestant Episcopal Church, and to no other religious body, and who (6) for six calendar months next before said meeting have been regular attendants at the services of the Church of said Parish, and who (7) for the said six months have been regular contributors to the current expenses of said Parish according to the mode or modes adopted therein by its Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen. No one shall be deemed a regular contributor for the purposes of this section who is in arrears in the payment of any portion of his contribution that may be due and payable on or before the first day of that month in which said meeting is held.
- [5.] It shall be the duty of the Treasurer of the Parish to record the names of such regular contributors to the

support of the Parish, with the date of their contributions, in a book provided for that purpose, and such record shall be sufficient evidence as to this particular qualification of voters.

- [6.] No person shall be eligible for the office of Deputy or Alternate Deputy to the Diocesan Convention, nor for the office of Warden who is not a communicant in good standing, and a qualified voter in the Parish holding the election. Nor shall any person be eligible for the office of Vestryman who is not a qualified voter in the Parish holding the election.
- [7.] In Parishes which have Charters wherein the qualifications of voters are prescribed, no provisions of this section that may conflict with such Charter shall apply.
- § III. On the organization of any new Parish in this Diocese, or on the occurrence of a vacancy in any existing Parish, it shall be the duty of the Wardens, or other officers of such Parish, to give immediate notice of the same to the Bishop; and until provision be made for the supply of the same, the Bishop may cause it to be supplied at his discretion, by Missionary services or otherwise.

Section II of Canon 6 was amended, 1895.

CANON 7. *

Of the Formation of New Parishes.

§ I. [1.] No new Parish shall be formed in this Diocese without the consent of the Bishop acting after consultation with the Standing Committee. When the new Parish is to be established within the limits of any existing Parish or Parishes, the Bishop shall give thirty days' notice to the Parishes affected thereby, that such a new Parish is proposed, and that any objection to the

formation thereof, will be duly considered, if submitted

to the Bishop in writing.

[2.] The parties desiring to establish a Parish shall, in the application for the consent of the Bishop, lay before him a statement of their condition and prospect of maintaining such organization, and the name by which it is to be designated; which shall be signed by fifteen communicants, of whom five at least, shall be male adults.

[3.] The consent of the Bishop for the formation of a

new Parish shall be given in the following form:

DIOCESE OF NEWARK.

The formation of a new Parish in ——, County of ——, Diocese of Newark, to be known as —— Church, having been duly considered, I do hereby give my Canonical consent to the formation of said Parish. Given under my hand this —— day of ——, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ——.

Attest: —— Bishop of the Diocese.

Secretary of Standing Committee.

§ II. [1.] The consent of the Bishop having been thus given, the parties who have signed the application shall adopt articles of association in the following form:

We, the undersigned, assembled for the purpose of organizing a Congregation and Parish of the Protestant Episcopal Church at ——, in the County of ——, and State of New Jersey, in the Diocese of Newark, the consent of the Ecclesiastical authority having been obtained, and due notice given of such intention ten days previously by an advertisement set up in open view at or near the place where such congregation assemble usually for Divine worship, designating the day and place aforesaid when and where they designed to meet for that purpose, do hereby agree to organize a Congregation and Parish to be known as the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of the Church of ——, of ——, County of——, and as such we do hereby acknowledge, accede to and adopt the doctrine, discipline and worship, and also the Constitution and Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America and the Constitution and Canons of

the same Church in the Diocese of Newark, and we certify the proceedings aforesaid, and further that we the said congregation did at such meeting at such time and place choose two Wardens, viz.: ——, and (not less than five nor more than ten) Vestrymen, and the names of said Vestrymen are as follows: ——, ——, ——, ——, and also by a majority of votes fixed and determined on —— annually as the day on which new elections of officers shall be held.

Witness the hands and seals of the President and Secretary of said meeting, being members of said congregation; and the hands of other members thereof this —— day of ———, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ———.

[2.] A certified copy of their Articles of Association shall be laid before the Ecclesiastical authority of this Diocese by every congregation desiring to be recognized as a part of the Church in this Diocese and subject to the Ecclesiastical jurisdiction thereof, and any church so organized and recognized shall be an integral part of the Church in the Diocese, as soon as incorporated, whether admitted into union with the Convention or not. But no Church incorporated without the consent of the Bishop shall be or form any such integral part of the said Church of this Diocese.

CANON 8.*

Of Parish Boundaries.

- §I[r.] It shall be lawful for the Ministers of any two or more Parishes or Parochial Cures, or duly incorporated Congregations, to agree upon boundaries for their respective Parishes without regard to existing civil divisions; but the Parish boundaries thus agreed upon shall not be definitely settled until approved by the Bishop of the Diocese, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee.
 - [2.] In cases where the Ministers of any Parishes.

Parochial Cures, or duly incorporated Congregations, howsoever situate with respect to each other, are unable or
unwilling to agree upon boundaries for their respective
Parishes, Cures, or Congregations, the Bishop and Standing Committee may, without regard to existing civil
divisions, upon application of one of the Ministers, and
upon proof or statement satisfactory to the Bishop and
Standing Committee that such Minister has requested any
other Minister or Ministers to join with him in assigning
such boundaries, and that such other Minister or Ministers
has or have refused or neglected for the space of sixty
days to comply with his request, upon due notice to all
the Ministers interested in the application, and after giving them an opportunity to be heard, proceed to define
the boundaries of the Parishes involved in the application.

- [3.] The Rector of a Parish may at any time apply to the Bishop and Standing Committee to have boundaries assigned to his own Parish, provided that such boundaries do not affect any other Parish.
- § II. The Parish boundaries thus constituted shall be valid for all canonical purposes, and also for fixing the Parochial connection of all persons desiring, or entitled to, the ministrations of this Church, who have not by some act of their own become attached to a Parish, and for defining for each Rector the extent of his responsibility for the cure of souls. But nothing in this Canon shall be construed to prevent any Clergyman of this Church from ministering privately to persons belonging to his own Parish in any occassional office of the Church, or from officiating publicly in any Cemetery or other place of burial.
- § III. Parish boundaries established under the provisions of this Canon may be changed from time to time by the joint action of the Bishop and Standing Committee,

but no such change shall be made until all the Ministers whose Parishes are effected by it shall have had the opportunity of being heard in relation thereto.

CANON 9.*

Of the Organization of Missions.

- § I. The Bishop, being the chief officer and head of the Church in his Diocese, to whom belongs, by virtue of his office, the duty of originating new Missions, appointing Ministers to carry them on, and giving them all encouragement in his power, may, at his discretion, establish Missions or Organized Missions at any point in this Diocese, thirty days' notice of his intention being given to the Parishes affected thereby, that their objections if any be made, may be duly considered; and if objections be made, the Bishop shall not act finally until after consultation with the Standing Committee.
- § II. If it be deemed desirable to form an Organized Mission, the mode of doing so shall be as follows:
- [1.] The following application shall be sent to the Bishop:

To the Right Reverend --- , Bishop of the Diocese of Newark:

We, the undersigned, residents in or near the —— of ——, county of ——, in the Diocese of Newark, being desirous of obtaining the ministrations of the Protestant Episcopal Church, do hereby unite in the organization of a "Mission" of the said Church. We hereby place ourselves under the jurisdiction of the Ecclesiastical authority of this Diocese, promising obedience to the Constitution and Canons thereof, and to those of the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church, and ask to be received as an "Organized Mission," under the name of "The Mission of ——." Furthermore, we agree to pay from this Mission and for its support, to the Treasurer of the Mission, for this year \$______, and thereafter a sum to be stated to the Bishop at each Convention.

This application must be signed by those who propose to be the members of the "Mission," of whom not less than three shall be male adults, and at least five shall be confirmed and actually communicants of this Church.

- [2.] If the Bishop give his consent, he shall indorse it upon this "application," and the original application thus indorsed, or a certified copy thereof, shall be sent to the Secretary of the Diocese, who shall file the same among the records of the Diocese, and record the fact of such organization in a proper book.
- [3.] The Bishop shall appoint some male adult communicant who shall have signed the application, to be the Warden of the Mission, to hold office at the discretion of the Bishop.
- [4.] The Warden shall immediately call a meeting of all those adults who may have signed the "application" aforesaid, to elect (to serve until their successors be chosen) a Clerk and a Treasurer; and an election for such officers shall be held annually thereafter, on each Easter Monday; those baptized male adults who have given in their names to the Warden, as members of the Mission, and have also contributed to its support, being entitled to vote. Notice of the election shall be given at least ten days previous thereto, by affixing the same on the door of the place of worship.
- § III. The Warden, or if he be unable to attend, the Treasurer, or Clerk, being communicants, shall have a seat and voice in the Diocesan Convention, but not a right to vote.
- § IV. The Bishop after consultation with the officers, may appoint some Minister of this Church as "Missionary," who shall have the same charge and control of the "Mission" as a Rector has of a Parish; but the Bishop shall have power to withdraw such appointment, three months' previous notice being given.

- § V. The title of all real estate given to or purchased by such "Organized Mission," shall be vested in the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, to be held in trust by them until the Mission become a duly incorporated Parish, as provided for in the Canon 7, on the Formation of New Parishes.
- § VI. The Bishop acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, may at any time assign the Boundaries of such Mission or Organized Mission, thirty days' notice of his intention being given to the Parish or Parishes within which it is proposed to assign such boundary, that the objections, if any, may be duly considered.

TITLE II.

OF DISCIPLINE.

CANON 1.

- Of Proceedings in the Case of a Minister Accused by Public Rumor of offences for which he may be Tried.
- § I. When a Minister is accused by public rumor of an offence or offences for which he may be tried and punished, according to Canon 2, of Title II, of the Digest, it shall be the duty of the Bishop, or if there be no Bishop, of the Clerical members of the Standing Committee, to appoint not less than three or more than five Presbyters, who, or a majority of whom, shall make such inquiries as may satisfy them of the innocency of the accused, or of the sufficiency of ground for presentment and trial. If satisfied of his innocency, they shall make

report accordingly; if of the sufficiency of ground for presentment and trial, two of them shall present the accused for trial, according to the Canon in such case made and provided.

§ II. Any Minister of this Diocese may, for himself, request of the Bishop, or if there be no Bishop, of the Clerical members of the Standing Committee, the inquiry provided for in this Canon, in which case it shall be instituted, and shall proceed according to its provisions.

CANON 2.

Of the Presentment and Trial of Clergymen.

Whenever any Minister of this Diocese shall become "liable to presentment and trial," the mode of proceeding shall be as follows:

- § I. The trial shall be on a presentment, in writing, addressed to the Bishop of the Diocese, specifying the offence or offences of which the accused is alleged to be guilty, with reasonable certainity as to time, place and circumstances. Such presentment may be made by the major part in number of the members of the Vestry of any Church of which the accused is, or has been a Minister, or by any two Presbyters of this Diocese, or by the Convention of the Diocese, or in case of alleged misconduct in another Diocese, by the Ecclesiastical Authority of that Diocese, but no presentment shall be entertained, in any case, for an offence alleged to have been committed more than three years before the date of the presentment.
- § II. [1.] A presentment being made by any one of the modes above prescribed, the Bishop, if the facts charged shall not appear to him to be such as to constitute an offence; may dismiss it; or if it allege facts, some

of which do, and some of which do not, constitute an offence, he may allow it in part, and dismiss the residue, or he may permit it to be amended, When it shall beallowed, in whole or in part, the Bishop shall cause a copy of it to be served on the accused; and shall alsonominate eight Presbyters of this Diocese, entitled toseats in the Convention, and not being parties to the presentment, and cause a list of their names to be served. on the accused, who shall, within thirty days after such service, select five of them, and notify their names in writing, to the Bishop; and if he shall not give such notification to the Bishop within the said thirty days, the Bishop shall select five, and the Presbyters so selected. shall form a Board for the trial of the accused, and shall meet at such time and place as the Bishop shall direct,. and shall have power to adjourn from time to time, and from place to place (but always within this Diocese), asthey shall think necessary, and no other proceedings shall be had without the presence of the whole Board.

- [2.] A written notice of the time and place of their first meeting shall be served, at least thirty days before such meeting, on the accused, and also one of the personsmaking the presentment.
- [3.] If a Clergyman presented, after having had due notice, shall not appear before the Board of Presbyters, appointed for his trial, the Board may nevertheless proceed as if he were present, unless for good cause they shall see fit to adjourn till another day.
- § III. When the Board proceed to the trial, the evidence shall be produced in writing, and signed by the witnesses respectively. If on or during the trial, the accused shall confess the truth of the charges as stated in the presentment, the Board may dispense with hearing further evidence, and may proceed at once to state their

opinion to the Bishop as to the sentence that ought to be pronounced.

- § IV. Upon the application of either party to the Bishop, and it being made satisfactorily to appear to him that any material witness cannot be procured upon the trial, the Bishop may appoint a Commissary to take the testimony of such witness. Such Commissary may be either a Clergyman or a Layman, and the party so applying shall give to the other at least six days' notice of the time and place of taking the testimony. And if the person on whom the notice shall be served, shall reside more than forty miles from the place of examination, an additional day's notice shall be given for every additional twenty miles of the said distance. And both parties may attend and examine the witnesses; and the questions and answers shall be reduced to writing, and signed by the witness, and shall be certified by the Commissary, and inclosed under his seal and transmitted to the Board, and if competent, shall be received by them as evidence.
- V. The Board having deliberately considered the evidence, shall declare in a writing, signed by all of them, their decision on the charges contained in the presentment, distinctly stating whether the accused is guilty or not guilty of such charges respectfully, and also stating the sentence which, in their opinion, should be pronounced; and a copy of such decision shall without delay be communicated to the accused; and the original decision, together with the evidence, shall be delivered to the Bishop, who shall pronounce such canonical sentence as shall appear to him to be proper, provided the same shall not exceed in severity the sentence recommended by the Board; and such sentence shall be final. Before pronouncing any sentence, the Bishop shall summon the accused, and any three or more of the Clergy, to meet

him at such time as may, in his opinion, be most convenient, in some Church to be designated by him, which shall for that purpose be open at the time to all persons who may choose to attend, and the sentence shall then and there be publicly pronounced by the Bishop. But the Bishop, if he shall be satisfied that justice requires it, may grant a new trial to the accused, in which case a new Board of Presbyters shall be appointed, and the proceedings shall be conducted as before mentioned.

- § VI. [1.] All notices and papers contemplated in this Canon may be served by a summoner or summoners, to be appointed for the purpose by the Bishop, and whose certificate of such service shall be evidence thereof. In case of service by any other person, the fact shall be proved by the affidavit of such person. A written notice or paper delivered to a party, or left at his last place of residence, shall be deemed a sufficient service of such notice or paper.
- [2.] Counsels shall be allowed on both sides, not exceeding two to either, at the pleasure of the parties, provided they be Communicants in this Church.
- [3.] The Bishop shall appoint some person to act as clerk, and carefully to record the proceedings.

CANON 3.

When a person who has been repelled from the Holy Communion appeals to the Bishop, and is not restored by by him, the Bishop may, and if the person repelled demands it, shall appoint one Presbyter and two Laymen, who shall make inquiry into the truth of the facts alleged, and shall report thereof, with their opinion thereon, to the Bishop, who may restore the individual, or otherwise, as he may deem proper.

CANON 4.

§ 1. Communicants removing from one Parish to another shall procure from the Rector of the Parish of their last

residence, or, if there be no Rector, from one of the Wardens, a certificate stating that he or she is a Communicant in good standing. And the Rector of the Parish to which he or she removes shall not be required to receive him or her as a Communicant until such letter be produced.

§ II. It shall be the duty of every Rector to furnish the required certificate on application, and to make known its requirement to Communicants removing either to or from his Parish. And no name of a Communicant shall be transferred from one Parish to another until such certificate be produced.

TITLE III.

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS,

CANON 1.*

Of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen.

- § I. It shall be the duty of every Minister having charge of a congregation of this Diocese to make at least one annual collection for the relief of clergymen disabled by age or disease.
- § II. All contributions and donations for this object shall be transmitted to the Treasurer of "The Trustees of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen."

tIn 1885 the Standing Committee reports to the Convention, "That in accordance with its instructions as contained in a resolution passed at the Annual Convention of 1884, the Bishop of the Diocese, for the time being, and the members of the Standing Committee, for the time being, have been duly incorporated as "Trustees of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen." (Journal 1886, p. 25.)

§ III. All collections and all donations not limited by the donor, received during the Conventional year, shall be subject to the order of "The Trustees of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen," and may be appropriated by said Trustees for the relief of Clergymen disabled by age, accident or disease, who have been canonically connected with the Diocese for the two years immediately preceding their application for relief and have spent at least two successive years within the limits of the Diocese in the active discharge of the duties of the ministry, or in the work of Christian Education. Clergymen to whom appropriations are made under this Section shall be known as "Special Annuitants," and divided into these four classes:

Class First. Those who have served as aforesaid, within the limits of what is now the Diocese, for twenty consecutive years. To each clergyman of this class there may be appropriated during the pleasure of the Trustees not more than six hundred dollars in any one year.

Class Second. Those who have served as aforesaid, within the limits of the Diocese, for fifteen consecutive years. To each clergyman of this class there may be appropriated as aforesaid not more than five hundred dollars in any one year.

Class Third. Those who have served as aforesaid, within the limits of the Diocese, for ten consecutive years. To each clergyman of this class there may be appropriated as aforesaid not more than four hundred dollars in any one year.

Class Fourth. Those who have served as aforesaid, within the limits of the Diocese, for five consecutive years. To each clergyman of this class there may be appropriated as aforesaid not more than three hundred dollars in any one year. This amendment shall not apply to present annuitants.

§ IV. The Trustees shall have power to appropriate from the collections received during the year, a sum not exceeding seventy-five dollars towards defraying the funeral expenses of any Clergyman of the Church.

§ V. All appropriations (unless otherwise ordered) shall be payable semi-annually, on the first day of May and November; and all moneys unappropriated at the end of each Conventional year shall be paid into a Fund, which shall be known as the "Permanent Fund," and shall be kept safely invested. The interest accruing on the existing capital fund now in the hands of the Treasurer of the Convention shall be permitted to accumulate. All accumulations shall be safely invested by the Trustees of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen, and added to the permanent fund until the same shall, with the existing capital fund, reach the sum of thirty thousand dollars.

§ VI. All legacies, and all donations limited by the donor, paid to the Trustees shall be used and applied by them agreeably to the terms and provisions under which the money is received; and when not otherwise directed by the donor, the legacy or donation shall be added to the "Permanent Fund," and the income thereof alone used.

As soon as said funds shall together reach the sum of thirty thousand dollars, the Trustees shall grant an annuity to every Clergyman who (1) has reached the age of sixty-five years, and (2) has been canonically connected with the Diocese for the five years immediately preceding his application for an annuity, and (3) has been for at least five years of his last term of canonical residence a settled Minister of the Diocese, or a Missionary duly appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

The interest received from said Funds shall be divided equally among the Clergymen entitled to receive an annuity under the terms and provisions of the previous paragraph of this Section, and if this interest shall not be sufficient to give to each Clergyman the sum of three hundred dollars, then the balance of collections and donations remaining after the "Special Annuitants" are provided for, shall be used to increase the annuity to said sum.

Clergymen receiving an annuity under this Section, which shall in no case exceed one thousand dollars, shall be known as "Regular Annuitants."

CANON, 2,*

Of the Fund for Widows and Orphans of Clergymen.

- § I. It shall be the duty of every minister having charge of a congregation in this Diocese to make at least one annual collection or donation for the relief of widows and orphans of clergymen.
- § II. All contributions and donations for this object shall be transmitted to the Treasurer of the Trustees of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen, which Trustees shall be the Trustees of this Fund. In transmitting the same, it shall be distinctly stated that such contributions or donations are designed for the Fund for Widows and Orphans of Clergymen.
- § III. All collections and donations received during the conventional year, shall be subject to the order of said Trustees, and may be appropriated for the relief of widows and orphans of clergymen who have been canonically connected with this Diocese for the two years immediately preceding their death and have spent at least two successive years within the limits of this Diocese in the active discharge of the duties of the ministry or in the work of Christian Education.
- § IV. All appropriations (unless otherwise ordered) shall be payable semi-annually on the first days of May and November, and all moneys unappropriated at the end of each conventional year, shall go to form a principal sum or fund which shall be safely invested by said Trustees, and held by them in trust to pay so much of the net

income thereof, as they may think advisable, for the relief of the widows and orphans of deceased clergymen, who are by the next preceding section, entitled to the benefits conferred by this Canon, and add the residue, if any, to said principal.

- § V. All legacies, devises and gifts limited by the donor, paid or made to said Trustees or their Treasurer, shall be used and applied by them agreeably to the terms and provisions under which the money or property is received, and when not otherwise directed by the donor, the legacy, devise or donation shall be added to said principal, and the income thereof alone used.
- § VI. The Trustees for the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen, may take any steps that may be necessary to enable themselves to receive, hold and apply the said money and property to the use mentioned in this Canon, if they are not now legally competent to do so.

CANON 3.

Of Scholarships in the General Theological Seminary.

The Bishop of the Diocese, or, in case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, the Standing Committee shall have the power of nominating a candidate for Holy Orders on any scholarship or scholarships which are or may hereafter be founded by this Convention in the General Theological Seminary of the Protestant Episcopal Church,

CANON 4.

Of Alterations in the Canons and Additions thereto.

§ I. No proposed alterations of, or additions to the Canons, shall hereafter be considered by the Convention, unless at least one day's previous notice thereof be given in open Convention, and until such alteration or addition

shall have been referred to and reported upon by a Standing Committee on Constitution and Canons, which Committee shall consist of five persons, and shall be appointed by election, as early as may be, in each session of the Convention.

- § II. In all cases of future enactment, the same, if by way of amendment of an existing provision, shall be in the following form: "Canon (or Section of Canon —, or Clause of Section of Canon —) of Title —, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:" And if the enactment is of an additional Clause, Section or Canon, it shall be designated as the next Canon, or next Section, or next clause of a Canon or Section, in the order of numbering, of the Title to which the subject properly belongs; and if a Canon or Section or Clause be stricken out, the existing numbering shall be retained until a new edition of the Canons be directed.
- *§ III. All new Canons and Amendments to Canons shall take effect on the first day of September following the adoption thereof, unless it be otherwise ordered by the Convention.

CANON 5.

Repealing Former Canons.

All former Canons of this Convention are hereby repealed.
