TITLE I, CANON 1, § II.

OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election, in the following form:

[Name of the Church, the place and date.]

This certifies that at a meeting of the congregation of this Church for the purpose of electing Church Officers and Deputies to the Convention (or for the purpose of electing Deputies to the Convention, if the meeting be for that purpose alone,) A. B., C. D., and E. F., being members of the congregation and communicants of the Church, were duly chosen to represent the congregation in that body for the ensuing year. In testimony of which I have hereunto set my hand (or, if two Wardens subscribe, we have set our hands) the day and the year above written.

N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary sign, then the signatures of both Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-in-charge or Missionary cannot sign.

The Lay Representation is limited to three Deputies, whose names in full should be carefully and legibly written.

Three Alternate Deputies must also be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies. (See Title I, Canon 6, § II [2].)

This Certificate is to "be transmitted to the Secretary of the Convention at least ten days before the mreting of the Annual Convention." (See Title I, Canon 1, § II).

In order to secure this, the Secretary will forward a blank form to every parish, and he earnestly asks the PROMPT attention of the Clergy.

***By the terms of the Constitution and Canons, the Deputies must be communicants of the Church, and also qualified voters in the Parish which elects them. (See Title I, Canon 6, § II. [4], [5] and [6].)

In all elections, those persons only who shall have a majority of all the votes given, shall be deemed elected; but if in any case more than the required number of persons shall have a majority of votes, the required number of persons having the highest number of votes shall be deemed elected, and in case of a tie between two or more candidates, there shall be a new ballot.
- 16. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone it to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
- 17. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order, he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
- 18. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate, but any member may appeal from the decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention.
- All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.
- 20. The Convention shall meet the first day at 10 A. M., and on subsequent days at 9 A. M., with a recess of one hour on each day between 1 and 2 o'clock.
- 21. At the close of each Convention, the Minutes shall be corrected and approved.

JOURNAL.

TRINITY CHURCH, NEWARK, N. J., May 18, 1897.

In accordance with the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark, and the appointment of the Bishop, the Twenty-Third Annual Convention of said Church was held in Trinity Church, Newark, on Tuesday, May 18th, 1897, at 10 A. M.

The Right Reverend, the Bishop of the Diocese, celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by the Rector of the Parish, the Rev. L. S. OSBORNE, and by the Archdeacon of Newark, the Rev. ALEXANDER MANN. The Bishop then read his Annual Address.

The Convention was called to order, the Bishop in the chair.

The Secretary called the roll of the Clergy* and of the Lay Deputies,† and announced that there was present a constitutional quorum of both orders.

^{*}For the names of the Clergy present, see page 11. †For the names of the Lay Deputies present, see page 22.

The Bishop appointed as the Committee on Certificates of Lay Deputies, the Rev. Henry M. Ladd, Mr. Charles A. Norris and Mr. Charles A. Lighthipe.

The Rev. WILLIAM M. HUGHES, on behalf of the Committee on Rules of Order, moved that the Rules of last Convention be adopted; which was carried.

On motion of the Rev. Mr. Jenvey, the following were elected a Committee on the Rights of Clerical Members: the Rev. C. S. Abbott, the Rev. William M. Hughes, and Mr. Thomas M. Relyea.

On motion of the Rev. Mr. WHITAKER, the following were elected a Committee on the Rights of Lay Deputies: the Rev. Daniel F. Warren, D. D., Mr. WILLIAM J. HOLMES, and Mr. GEORGE H. WHITE.

The Rev. John P. Appleton, the ballot being dispensed with, was re-elected Secretary. He announced his appointment of the Rev. John Keller as Assistant Secretary.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The Standing Committee of the Diocese respectfully reports that *nine* meetings have been held during the pats Conventional year.

On May 20, 1896, the Committee organized by electing the Rev. Wm. Welles Holley, D. D., President, and the Rev. William R. Jenvey, Secretary.

On June 6, 1896, permission was given the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen of St. Luke's Church, Phillipsburgh, to mortgage a vacant lot owned by the church for the sum of \$400.

On November 2, 1896, a communication was received from the Rev. Charles Douglas, Rector of Trinity Church, Paterson, announcing that the mortgage upon the Church Property had been cancelled, and that the Church was entirely free of debt. Mr. William A. Long was recommended to the Bishop as a candidate for Holy Orders, and the proper testimonial signed.

Consent was given to the election of the Rt. Rev. Wm. DAVID WALKER, D.D., LL. D., as bishop of Western New York, and the proper testimonial signed by the President

and Secretary.

Permission was given the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen of the Church of the Holy Cross, Jersey City, to sell two lots owned by the Church for a sum not less than \$1,750; \$1,000 of this to be applied to the reduction of the mortgaged indebtedness of the parish; the balance to be used for the paying of street assessments and the repairing of the parish house.

The Committee sat as a board of advice to the Bishop in the matter of the differences between the Rector and the Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Matthew's Church,

Tersev City.

On November 30, 1896, the Rev. Charles Harris Hayes, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests, and the proper testimonial

signed.

Mr. Edward J. Cooper was recommended to the Bishop as a candidate for Holy Orders, and the proper testimonial signed. The Committee again sat as a board of advice

to the Bishop in the matter of the differences between the Rector and the Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Matthew's Church, Jersey City. After a thorough hearing of the case, on motion, the Bishop was advised to dissolve the pastoral relations existing between the Rev. Montgomery Hunt Throop, Rector of said St. Matthew's Church, and the said Church.

On the 2d of January, 1897, a request was read from the Rev. Mr. Throop, asking for a further hearing in the matter of the differences between himself and the Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Matthew's Church. After a very careful consideration of the request it was denied, no additional evidence being offered, or further light thrown upon the case.

The Committee advised the Bishop to terminate the pastoral relations between the Rev. Mr. Throop, Rector of St. Matthew's Church, and the said Church, on the 6th day of February, 1897.

On the 1st of February, 1897, the Secretary of the Standing Committee was instructed to obtain from the Secretary of the Vestry of St. Matthew's Church an itemized statement of the financial condition of said parish.

On the 26th of February, 1897, permission was given the corporate body of St. Matthew's Church, Jersey City, to borrow the sum of \$3,500, mortgaging the Church Property for the same, and to be used as follows:

FIRST. In the canceling of the existing mortgage of \$2,000,

SECOND. In payment of claims against the parish.

The Rev. Appleton Grannis, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests, and the proper testimonial signed.

On the 8th of May, 1897, Mr. ARCHIBALD RAVENSCROFT BALSLEY was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Deacons, and the proper testimonial signed.

Mr. FREDERICK S. PENFOLD was recommended to the Bishop as a candidate for Holy Orders, and the proper

testimonial signed.

On the 18th of May. 1897, Mr. Henry A. McNulty was recommended to the Bishop as a candidate for Holy Orders, and the proper testimonial signed. The Rev. George H. Hooper, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests, and the proper testimonial signed. The Rev. John Israel Yellott, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests, and the proper testimonial signed.

Permission was given the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen of St. Stephen's Church, Millburn, to mortgage a vacant lot owned by the Church for a sum not to exceed \$900. The report of the Secretary for the year was

adopted and ordered read to the Convention.

On the 19th of May, 1897, at an adjourned meeting, the following was passed in the matter of Mr. George H. Yarnell, deposed from the Holy Ministry by the Bishop

of the Diocese, on the 6th day of January, 1894:

"After full consideration, the Standing Committee have come to the following conclusion: They are satisfied that the deposition of Mr. YARNELL was not only made for sufficient causes, but was rightly and properly made. While they recognize and appreciate the deep expression of penitence made by Mr. YARNELL, they cannot give to the Bishop, at this time, the unanimous advice and consent that is required by the Canon to the remission and termination by him of the sentence of deposition."

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE EPISCOPAL RESIDENCE.

The Committee on the Episcopal Residence respectfully reports that two meetings have been held during the past Conventional Year. Both meetings were held at the

Episcopal Residence. At each meeting a careful inspection of the building was made. Many repairs were found to be imperatively necessary. A Special Committee, consisting of Archdeacon Mann, Mr. John S. Richards, and Archdeacon Jenvey, was appointed with power to make such repairs. This was done under authority given the Committee by the Convention of 1896.

Estimates were obtained from responsible persons for painting the exterior of the building and portions of the interior; repairing the slated roof, gutters, leaders, etc.; making changes in the plumbing, which were necessary for the preservation of health; furnishing a new range, etc. Contracts were awarded and the work thoroughly and well done. The total cost was \$509.56. This was paid by the Treasurer of the Convention, Mr. Henry Hayes, under the instructions of the above-mentioned resolution of the Convention.

The Committee further reports a mortgage of \$5,000 upon the Episcopal Residence, the balance of the purchase price. The interest upon this is \$250 a year. This interest money, and cost of previous repairs, have been paid by Mr. Henry Hayes, until there is now due him the sum of \$8,242.71.

The Committee, in consideration of the abovenamed facts, offers the following:

Resolved, That this matter, especially those portions of it which refer to the annual interest of \$250, and the sum of \$3,242.71, now owed Mr. Henry Haves, be referred to the Finance Committee, with power.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE, ON CHILDREN.

The Special Committee on Children desires to call attention to the circular recently issued by the State Charities Aid Association of New Jersey, on "Dependent and Neglected Children in the State." Of the 445 children in almshouses, to which the circular refers, it will be noticed that 313 are within the boundaries of this diocese.

At the National Conference of Charities and Corrections held in 1888, the presiding officer stated that "The placing of dependent children in almshouses is one of the greatest evils ever tolerated in the plan of public benevolence. "The method is pernicious in every respect, and ought at once to be abandoned. It is a relic of barbarism, and convicts the States where it still obtains as being behind the age and adhering to a system, in the long run both costly and inhuman."

Dr. Peabody of Harvard, says: "Our almshouses are no longer merely the refuges of those unfortunates who have suffered from the storm of life, and need a quiet harbor. Into these same harbors there now drifts a mass of social wreckage, dangerous fragments of abandoned lives, depraved in themselves and demoralizing in their influence." This is literally true of the Hudson County Almshouse. It is not only a home for the aged and infirm poor; it is also a winter resort for tramps, a lying-in hospital for unmarried mothers, and a general

receptacle for the waste specimens of humanity. Such are the men and women with whom the children are brought into constant contact—who form their only environment—and create for them their only ideals of family life. New Jersey, as a State, which boasts that it has some of the best prisons in the country, makes no provision for its destitute and innocent children. For juvenile criminals there are model reformatories; for the feeble minded, the blind, the dumb, the crippled, and for all the class of defectives, generous provision is made; but for the sound and innocent child, who is simply poor and neglected, and who has all the potentialities of useful citizenship, the State does nothing, and the County Freeholders provide only the Almshouse, save only in a few instances.

The whole system of dealing with dependent children in this State is defective in principle and lax in practice. Children are committed to the Almshouse by the Overseers of the Poor, upon their own judgment and responsibility entirely, without any judicial proceedings. The Board of Freeholders may subsequently, if they see fit, place the children out, either by indenture or for adoption, but they do so with little, if any, precaution, to safeguard the child's welfare. For obvious reasons no child should be placed in any home which has not been visited previously by an experienced agent. This should be followed up by efficient supervision thereafter, which means the securing at frequent intervals of reliable information on all matters of importance affecting the welfare of the child. No such care is exercised by our County officials.

The infant mortality in Almshouses is simply shocking. Practically all the babies die. The Hudson County Almshouse has not succeeded in raising a foundling in ten years. The most that can be said in favor of this Institution is that the children are fairly well fed and clothed,

and receive a moderately good schooling. With this the virtues of the system are exhausted.

Among the counts which are brought against the system are these: That there is little distinction made between dependent and defective children; and that feebleminded and vicious children are often found together.

It is an axiom that "The hope of the world lies in the children," and it follows that in the work of reform in society the good of the children must be the first consideration. There is no feature in the whole range of our charities that has more of promise than this. In all other reforms, much energy must first be spent in tearing down before the process of building up can begin. Child-saying work is constructive from the start. To take a merely material view of it, the work represents, in its preventive aspect, an insurance against future evils to the State; and in its constructive aspect, an investment for future good. It will be seen that the problem of child-saving is essentially a problem of the cities. In this connection we append a brief extract from the last census of the Social Statistics of Cities, showing the total population and its density and death rate in each of the cities of this diocese. From this it will be noticed that two-thirds of the population of this diocese live in cities, and that the density of population and the death rate in each city is considerably above the average of the class to which it belongs. a fact full of significance, and presents possibilities of social and humanitarian effort to which the Church should lend its best energy. If the heathen in savage lands, whom the Church has converted, knew how shamefully the Christian community is neglecting its own immediate wards at home, the parable of the mote and the beam might be made painfully personal to some of us.

It is hoped that the Commission which is to be appointed by the Governor to enquire into the condition of the neglected and dependent children in this State, will succeed in arousing the public conscience, and create a sentiment which will force New Jersey to follow the lead of other more advanced States in this connection. doubt our tardiness will enable us to profit by the mistakes which other States have made in this work. New York for instance would give much to-day to be able to undo the evils which have arisen from institutionizing her dependent wards. The ideal system for the care of dependent children is probably that which is in operation in Michigan, which maintains a sort of State Depository. at a central point, under the cottage plan, about twentyfive children to a cottage. Here they are kept for a short time, attending the State Public School, and being built up in every way until they can be placed in private fami-The system is under the direction of a State Board of Control, the members of which serve without payment. The direct management is entrusted to a Superintendent. and a State Agent is employed to visit the children who are placed out. It is of course non-sectarian.

To this system should be added a provision for boarding out" children in case of necessity. There are many children who are unattractive in appearance, or who have some slight defect or peculiarity, which makes it impossible to place them in private families, without compensation.

The success of the "boarding out" system has been tested in many European countries, in Australia, in Canada, and in many of the United States. The Children's Aid Societies of Pennsylvania and Boston, which receive, and care for, dependent children of all ages and conditions, have no institution for them whatever.

The problems of child-saving are so many and so great, that it is impossible to present more than the merest outline of them within the limits of this report. To the end that it may bear good fruit, we offer the following resolution:

"That we advocate the passage of a law prohibiting the commitment of children to Almshouses for over thirty days."

"That we urge the clergy and others of this Diocese to co-operate with the Commission in every way possible."

"That we advocate the passage of a law providing that the trials of young persons apparently under the age of sixteen years shall take place without publicity, separately and apart from the trials of other accused persons."

"That we recommend the enactment of a system of State control of dependent children, based upon the Michigan plan, with an unpaid Board of say nine Directors, whose terms shall vary, and who shall have authority to board out children when necessary."

"That we urge upon the clerical and lay delegates the necessity of informing themselves fully as to the problems presented here, in order that they may be able to act wisely in moulding public opinion upon this question,"

This sum, \$306.52, has since been provided by the gracious courtesy of the Right Reverend, the Bishop of the Diocese, from Missionary Funds at his disposal. But the Board sincerely hopes that we may not again need to receive such generous aid from our Diocesan rather than from the Parishes.

In view of the accumulated experience of the past, your Board urges a continuance of the apportionment plan, believing that there is a growing sentiment in its favor, and feeling confident that with the complete and cordial cooperation of all the clergy of the Diocese, it will not be difficult to raise all the money required for present use in the field of our Missions.

The Board respectfully suggests that every Rector should make an especial effort to preface his collections for Diocesan Missions with a detailed explanation of the work before us, and of the plan of apportionment.

It does this with the feeling that there is among the church people of this Diocese a sense of privilege and obligation which needs only to be excited by their clergy in order to bring out a splendid response to the master's call, to strengthen and to extend the Church at home as well as abroad.

The Board closes its report with the following resolution, viz.:

Resolved. That the Board be instructed to make appropriations for the coming year to an amount not exceeding five thousand dollars, and that such sum be raised by apportioning it among the Parishes of the Diocese according to the plan already adopted.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITU-TION AND CANONS

as follows:

The Committee on Constitution and Canons respectfully report that they have had under consideration the amendment to Canon 4 of Title II, of the Code of Canons, referred to them on the 18th inst.

The purport of the amendment is to repeal the entire Diocesan Canon on Communicants removing from one Parish to another.

Said Canon is composed of two sections. Section 1 is a re-enactment of Title II, Canon 12, of the Canons of the General Convention.

Your Committee can conceive of no decisive reason why it should ever have been deemed necessary to reenact a Canon of the General Convention, as a Canon of the Diocesan Convention, yet they deem its repeal at this time as inexpedient.

Section 2 of said Canon, makes it the duty of every Rector to furnish a certificate of transfer on application, and prohibits the Rector of a parish from receiving the name of any person as a Communicant without a certificate of transfer.

This section, your Committee believes to be in conflict with Canon 12, Title II, of the General Convention, and therefore, null and void,

Said Canon of the General Convention provides that the Rector of a parish, to which a Communicant removes, shall not be required to receive such person as a Communicant, without a letter of transfer. It does not forbid a Rector from receiving such person as a Communicant when he fails to produce a letter of transfer; it merely provides that the Rector shall not be required nor compelled to so receive such person. It leaves the question of the reception of such a person as a Communicant to the Rector of the parish to which such person removes. He may or may not receive such person as a Communicant, according as he may deem best.

Section 2 of Canon 4 of Title II of the Canons of the Diocese, forbids a Rector of a parish from receiving the name of a person as a Communicant, until a certificate of transfer be produced. It leaves to the Rector no discretion whatever in the matter.

The Canon of the General Convention permits the Rector of a parish to receive a person as a Communicant without a letter of transfer. The Diocesan Canon forbids him so to do, and thus would take from the Rector of a parish a right which the General Convention has given him, a right, therefore, which the Diocese cannot take from him.

Your Committee therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That Canon 4, of Title II, of the Canons, be amended, by striking out all of section 2, of said Canon.

WM. M. HUGHES, Chairman. EDWIN A. WHITE, Secretary. The Resolution appended to the Report was adopted. So the second section of Canon 4, of Title II, was stricken out.

The Rev. E. A. WHITE moved the adoption of the following amendments to Article 5 of the Constitution which were approved by the last Convention. (Page 57; Journal, 1896).

- 1. Amend section 1 so as to read: Satisfactory evidence of the consent of the Bishop, acting after consent of the Standing Committee, or, if there be no Bishop, of the Standing Committee, to their formation; and
- 2. Amend section 1 of the *proviso* so as to read: Satisfactory evidence of the consent of the Bishop, acting after consultation with the Standing Committee, or, if there be no Bishop, of the consent of the Standing Committee, to its formation as a Parish; and

A vote on these amendments was taken *seriatim* and by orders, and they were unanimously adopted.

Mr. RICHARD F. STEVENS moved that the Constitution and Carons of the Diocese be printed in connection with the Journal. Lost.

On motion, the vote of the Clergy for the Standing Committee was confirmed by the Laity, and the vote of the Laity by the Clergy.

The hour of 1 P. M., having arrived, the Convention took a recess until 2 P. M.

TRINITY CHURCH, NEWARK, May 19th, 2 P. M.

The Convention re-assembled, the Bishop in the chair.

On motion of the Rev. Mr. REAZOR, the sum of \$500 was appropriated to the Bishop's Chaplain and Secretary for the year.

The Trustees of the Episcopal Fund reported that they had temporarily filled the vacancy in their body, made by the resignation of Mr. BLAKE, by the appointment of Mr. JOHN R. EMERY.

On motion, the Convention elected Mr. EMERY a Trustee to fill the vacancy.

On motion, of Mr. Louis A. Noble, it was

Resolved, That it be referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, to consider the advisibility of amending the Constitution and Canons, so as to provide that a Parish, when duly organized and incorporated, shall be ipso facto entitled to representation in the Convention of the Diocese; and, if deemed advisable, to report to the next Convention such amendment or amendments to the Constitution, or Canons, or both, as may be necessary and proper for such purpose.

On motion of the Rev. Mr. GWYNNE, it was

Resolved, That Arthur's Home for Destitute Boys, at Summit, N. J., is hereby commended to the confidence and support of the clergy and people of the Diocese.

Mr. G. G. FRELINGHUYSEN presented the

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE.

The Finance Committee respectfully reports that they have had three meetings during the year, and have considered the various sources of income and expenses of the Diocese; and they recommend that an assessment be made for the current year of seven per cent. on the amount of the present salaries of the clergy for paying the Bishop's salary, upon all parishes which have not made the Contributions or given Bonds to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, as provided by Canon; and an assessment of three per cent. on the salaries of the clergy for the Convention expenses and other liabilities.

They also recommend that the arrears of the Church of the Holy Communion, Paterson, amounting to \$39.00, be remitted, as the parish is financially unable to meet that indebtedness.

They respectfully report that there is a Mortgage of \$5,000. on the Episcopal residence, on which there is now due one year's interest, amounting to \$250.

That the interest on this Bond and Mortgage and the repairs to the Episcopal residence have been paid for several years past with money advanced by the kindness of Mr. Henry Hayes, and that that sum so advanced amounts, as reported by the Committee on Episcopal residence, to \$3,242.71.

That in the opinion of the Committee the income for the support of the Episcopate is sufficient to pay the salary of the Bishop and the current interest on the Bond and Mortgage on the Episcopal Residence and that the payment of the interest on this Bond and Mortgage is within the purposes of the Trust created and held by the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, and that the income may be applied to that purpose by direction of the Convention. That in the opinion of this Committee the annual receipts from "assessments for Convention expenses" will be sufficient to pay Convention expenses, repairs to Episcopal Residence and Insurance; and to reduce the indebtedness for interest and repairs heretofore advanced.

They, therefore, recommend that the Treasurer be directed to pay from the money received for "Convention expenses," the expenses of the Convention and to pay the balance that may remain toward the liquidation of the present indebtedness of \$3,242.71 for past interest

and expenses.

This Committee also reports that in accordance with the instructions and authority given them to take measures to enable the Bishop to attend the Lambeth Conference, they issued circulars to the Clergy and Laity asking their aid in furtherance of that object, and have received favorable replies from many and hope to hear in a satisfactory manner from all before June first.

Resolved, That Canon 4, Title I, be referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, with directions to report to the next Convention what changes or amendments, if any, are needed to definitely place the responsibility of collecting the assessments for the Episcopal salary either on the Treasurer of the Convention, or on the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, as, in the judgment of said Committee on Constitution and Canons. may be most advisable.

EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

Rt. Rev. Thomas R. Starkey, D. D.

BISHOP OF THE DIOCESE.

BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND LAITY:

Allow me once more to extend to you my customary annual greeting, with the assurance of my personal and official regard.

The past year in its course has not been deficient in incidents of greater or less interest to all of us as individual Christians, or in our corporate character as members of the Body of Christ.

In our church life at home, the history of one year is very much like that of another. In the East, along the Atlantic border, where the Church is traditionally best known, her growth, at least through the middle portions, is steady and noteworthy. But of those among us who do not investigate such matters, few are aware of the dead-wall of opposition which encounters us in the South and West, where we are confronted by two diverse forces; one a religious system, which takes little account of the past eighteen centuries of Christian history, and the other, the out-

come of a continuous immigration, which has already left its deep impress upon our population. questions, which have never had the consideration they demand and deserve, arise out of these conditions. What proportion, for instance, shall Missionary Work at home bear to that which offers in the foreign field? Are not vast tracts of territory here as much missionary ground as India, and more so than Mexico? Is it not wiser to make the home field strong, that out of it the hosts of Christ may go to conquer the foreign? For one I am convinced that our first duty is in our own country. Not that we should neglect the foreign field, but that the other should claim our chief interest. Let us strengthen our stakes and lengthen our cords here, that we may be more able in the future to do successfully and on a larger scale the work of carrying the Church of Christ to the lands of the heathen peoples.

In the lamented death of Bishop Coxe, in July of last year, the American Church lost a prelate universally known and respected by all, and who was to many of us, besides, a dear friend. Probably no man in the generation to which he belonged, when in the prime and vigor of his youth, did more than Bishop Coxe to build up a taste for decorous and expressive ritual in the Church of which he was an ornament. This sentiment found expression in the "Ballads" which will most certainly preserve his memory and which owe their undoubted charm to a certain poetic fervor and chivalrous devotion to the Church, which together make up the ring and pathos of his verse.

In our own Diocese we have to record the death on

the fifth of last January, of the Rev. Henry V. Degen, Rector through a number of years of the Church of the Holy Communion, South Orange; a Priest respected by all who knew him, as he deserved to be. Few readers of the service excelled Mr. Degen in its simple and reverent rendition, so that it was always a pleasure to follow him in the Daily Offices.

Three Laymen have passed away since we last met in Convention who deserve mention here, and the tribute of my own especial and grateful remembrance. Mr. Marshall Shepard was for several years Warden of Grace Church, Orange. I have rarely met one whose character was more unselfish or distinguished by a greater simplicity. He gave to the Church and to charity up to the limit of his means until death came. His loss cannot be easily supplied.

Mr. ISRAEL D. CONDIT, of Millburn, passed away on the 29th of January last, after reaching the unusual age of ninety-five years. He had been the most generous of benefactors to the parish at Millburn, at a time when such benefactions were most needed, and he continued to be its constant friend and devoted servant to the end of his long life. I shall never, while I live, forget the man or his devotion as I used to see him in his later years, the aged face, the bent but quietly resolute figure, and the unfailing religious interest shown by him to the last. Such pictures make the sunny spots of memory, and teach one lessons of courage and endurance in the ruder experiences of life.

Another loss within the year is that of Mr. WILLIAM

E. CAMPBELL, Treasurer and Warden of St. Paul's Church, Hoboken, of which parish he was the generous and liberal friend. His devotion to the Church and her interests commands this loving tribute to his memory.

It has not been my custom in these addresses to notice the deaths which have occurred outside of our own land, but I cannot withhold my passing tribute to the late Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr. Benson, who had always shown himself to be a warm friend of the Church in America, and whom I deem it my great privilege to have known better than any other of the English Bishops with one exception. It is not often that dignity and grace, power and sweetness, are found blended as they were in the character and person of this great prelate and Christian gentleman. How much the Church owes to him for his moral courage and unyielding principles is already in part known, and will be even more fully appreciated in all the days to come.

At home and in our own Diocese, in despite of the financial distress which has made itself felt everywhere throughout the land, work has gone on with a good measure of success. New missions have been established at Essex Fells, Little Falls, and Ridgefield Park, with encouraging promise of future usefulness. At the first named place a neat frame structure, seating about 160 persons, has been erected at a cost of \$3,200. This Church, situated in a new neighborhood, which is rapidly growing, has so far asked no pecuniary aid from the Diocese. It is under the pastoral charge of the Rev. Appleton Grannis.

Another new Church building begun and completed this year for one of our missions is that of St. John the Divine, Hasbrouck Heights. This church is a frame building, originally destined for other purposes, but now removed to an excellent and central situation, and adapted by change and improvements to the needs of our Church service. I confirmed here in March last a class of nine persons.

Another new mission work entered upon this past year is that at Little Falls, where we have a congregation mainly composed of working people, with a regular attendance averaging, I am told, between fifty and seventy-five persons.

Still another work is that begun by a Priest of his own motion and then carried on by a Layman at Ridgefield Park. There is a little group of people here deeply interested in the success of the enterprise.

At Clifton, near Passaic, the new mission is under the supervising charge of the Rector of St. Mark's, Paterson.

Besides these, work is being done at other points of which I may have occasion to speak hereafter.

On May 21st of last year, Trinity Church, in Newark, celebrated by religious services the 150th anniversary of its existence as a Parish. These services were very largely attended; but the venerable Parish needed no such attestation of the respect which is felt for it by the community. Churchmen everywhere throughout the Diocese hold Trinity in high and reverent regard, not merely as an "ancient foundation," but as the generous helper, in old times, of every effort that was made to enlarge the circle of the Church's influence.

On the evening of St. Agnes' Day, January the 21st, I had the pleasure of being present at a service in the Church of the Holy Communion, South Orange, where, after a sermon by the Rev. Dr. Huntington, of Grace Church, New York, a prayer of benediction was offered for the new stone Parish Building, erected during the year at a cost of about \$13,000, and which is so judiciously placed that one can pass immediately from the Church to the Guild House under a continuous roof. This is really a most convenient as well as handsome structure and cannot fail to be highly beneficial to the life and work of the Parish in the years to come.

A curious instance of persistent purpose under discouraging conditions is seen in the building of a small but very good and convenient Rectory by the little Parish of St. Mary's, Haledon, whose congregation have lately secured for themselves the services of a resident Priest. Furnished now with a small but attractive Church, a Guild House and a Parsonage, you will all, I am sure, join with me in wishing our good friends of St. Mary's, "God Speed."

When to this recital of work accomplished, I add that St. Luke's Mission, in Paterson, has, within the past six months, doubled its capacity by enlargement of its Church building and that it now deems itself prepared to enter upon the responsibilities of independent Parish life, and requests consent to do so, and that the new St. Mark's Parish in the same city, has, within the year, enlarged its accommodations to the extent which the limited area of its ground permitted, it will be seen that the times with all their discour-

agements and burden of financial distress, though they have retarded, have not as yet seriously checked the Church's progress in the Diocese.

Our two hospitals, St. Barnabas in Newark, and Christ Hospital in Jersey City, have both strengthened themselves during the year, and are surely advancing, as I believe, to a position of permanent success. Christ Hospital, by a proposed enlargement, for which a large portion of the money needed is already subscribed, and the other, St. Barnabas, by the successful founding of its Training School for Nurses, to whose first graduating class I had the privilege of presenting diplomas this year, has made, each in its own way, a long step in this direction. The establishment of local hospitals in neighboring towns which appeal to and often win the exclusive support of Churchmen living near them, diverts much support from our religious institutions, but this cannot be helped, and in despite of it, our work, though its struggles are made the harder, succeeds.

The subject of Church and religious schools, not altogether overlooked in the past of the Diocese, but which from one cause or another had effected but slight lodgment in the interest of our people, is again beginning to demand attention. St. George's Hall in Summit, a school of high grade, designed to prepare boys for college or for an intelligent business life, has already received from me a commendatory notice which is now repeated with cordiality. St. Bartholomew's School for Boys, under the Rev. Mr. Edwards, and situated in Morristown, is also winning high repute. To both of these schools I gladly call

the attention of Church families, and also to the Dryad Hill School for young ladies, lately established in South Orange.

Let me add in this place my conviction that schools for girls, of high grade and aim, but not overburdened by too heavy charges, would find many good and attractive locations amid the large, intelligent population and the charming rural surroundings of Northern New Jersey. The very simplicity of the life, refined but not overstrained, would establish its own contrast with the artificial and ultra-conventional modes and manners induced by so many of our city schools for young ladies. Each true effort made to found a good and truly refined school of genuine Church character is deserving of your encouragement.

Allow me also to call your attention to St. Hilda's in Morristown, as lately reorganized, but still under the charge of the Sisters of St. John Baptist. Hilda's is now an industrial school, where young girls, generally the daughters of poor but not necessarily unrefined parents, are well instructed in the ordinary branches of a common English education, and where in individual cases, when unusual talent is developed. they may acquire at small cost the arts of embroidery and music. I am sure no one can withhold his sympathy and best wishes from a school like this where a young person destined to be left to her own resources in the future may do what is in her power to solve the hard problem for a young woman of selfsupport, and may at the same time lay the foundations of a true religious life.

St. Katharine's Home, in Jersey City, continues to

do its sound but too little appreciated work. There are friends of the institution who keenly watch the lives of those who were once its inmates for years after these last have left its sheltering roof, and the testimony of these friends is uniform as to its happy influences. I had the very great privilege of confirming this winter six of these young women.

It would be hardly possible for me, in addressing you this year, to avoid all reference to the muchtalked-of Encyclical which the Bishop of Rome has recently addressed to the Anglican Church, and in which, choosing to discuss, without being invited to do so, the value of the Episcopal and Priestly Orders conferred by her and the Churches in communion with her, on Sacramental grounds of form, matter and intention, rather than those usually called historical, he ends by pronouncing these orders invalid and The letter of His Holiness has been answered very courteously but incisively by the Archbishops of Canterbury and York in a circular letter addressed to all Christian Bishops throughout the world. in a way so conclusive as not only to completely establish the validity of Anglican orders, but also to lead many who had only considered the question of these orders hitherto from the historical standpoint, to find new grounds for congratulation in their complete and in every way satisfactory vindication, when viewed from the standpoint selected by their venerable assailant, viz: Their Sacramental character and authenticity.

While, therefore, we of the English and American Churches may, and doubtless do, deeply regret this new element of discord, needlessly introduced to dispel, as it would seem, the alluring but delusive dream of those who talked in their sleep of a fast coming Unity, we find some degree of compensation in the conviction that from this time forth our ecclesiastical and theological position is defined more clearly, and that it must be accepted by the more candid and thoughtful among those of various names with whom we have so much in common, but from whom we find ourselves unhappily separated.

The Lambeth Conference, which will meet this year in Canterbury and London, is designed to promote the feeling and sense of substantial unity among the members of those National and Colonial Churches, which, holding to a common Faith and Order, are in full agreement with each other in this regard.

The late Archbishop Benson anticipated the intended time for the meeting of the Conference by one year, in order that it might have the opportunity to commemorate in so striking a way the coming of Augustine to Britain 1300 years ago; and the founding by him of the Arch-Episcopal See of Canterbury, whose succession of Bishops, name by name, together with the length of each one's tenure of office, is preserved to this day. Of this long line the present Archbishop, Dr. Temple, is the 95th, making the average period of each Archbishop's occupancy of the See about thirteen and a half years. This average, which will not vary much from that of to-day, is remarkable, because it defines the links in a chain running through centuries of change; from the time

when the old Saxon Heathenism gave way to Christianity, down age after age through all the slow but sure and gradual processes which were making and fashioning modern culture and evolving little by little the principles of Constitutional Liberty and Law; creating in a word a people and an Empire. That strange outcome of the times of overthrow and change known as the Holy Roman Empire, which so dominated the Continent from the days of Charlemagne in the VIIIth Century to those of Charles the Vth in the XVIth, had no direct hold in England, and this of itself goes far to account for her religious position. It was her insularity which separated her from its influ-Accepting as she did with the rest of Europe the Patriarchal Primacy of the Bishop of Rome, she was always at heart Anglo-Saxon in mental fibre and in religious feeling. This will explain much that is characteristic in her history. "The Church of England." so the Archbishop and the Bishops and Barons of Magna Charta fame called her in that instrument, and "Church of England" the king acknowledged her to be as he signed the compact which guaranteed her national liberty and rights.

The planting of the Church in Britain dates five hundred years and more back from the days of Augustine, as the time of Augustine itself is six hundred years back of the days of Magna Charta, although no reliable records remain to tell us the story of its actual beginning. But what a thought of ancientness is, so to say, pressed down into our minds by the commemoration of the founding of this Kentish Church of Christ so many years ago! It makes a

really thinking man really think; think of the ancient Order and the ancient Faith taught by Him, "who is the same yesterday, to-day, and forever"; and as he thinks, he tells himself that in all essential ways the Faith and Order taught and revealed by Him, who "changeth not," must be themselves unchangeable. This is what the Church whose orders have been so nobly vindicated stands for to-day and in all days; neither mediaevalism nor modernism, but the old Church and the old Faith as they have come down together from the beginning.

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Reports.

I have received the following reports from the Reverend, the Archdeacons of the two Archdeaconries:

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF NEWARK.

To the Rt. Rev. Thomas A. Starkey, D. D., Bishop of Newark:

The writer of this Report feels that he must begin by craving the kindly indulgence of his Bishop and of this Convention.

You will miss in this Report, brethren of the Clergy and Laity, the note of experience and matured judgment that characterized the work of my predecessor. The Missionary work of this Diocese is the poorer for the loss of Archdeacon Walker. His zeal for the cause, his earnest convictions of its great importance, his practical common sense advice, are well known to you all, and need from me no words of emphasis.

One year's experience in a new field of work does not qualify a man to speak with much authority. But of one thing the past twelve months have convinced the writer, and that is that it is very difficult for the average clergyman in charge of a Parish to be much more than Archdeacon in name. Your Archdeacon comes before this Convention painfully conscious of his sins of omission. He has left undone many things that he ought to have done. A few hurried week-day visitations of mission stations at intervals snatched from the pressing demands of parochial work by no means realize his ideal of the office and work of an Archdeacon.

Here are a few of the things which the Archdeacon of Newark has not done, but which he would be glad to do if he could. He would like to spend at least one Sunday a year with each of the Missionaries of the Archdeaconry that he might attend the Sunday services and meet the people. He would like also to have the opportunity afforded him of preaching to the Sunday morning congregations of our principal Parishes upon the work and the needs of our Diocesan Missions; for he believes most firmly that the main difficulty in the way of larger offerings for the Diocesan Missions is to be found in the fact that our congregations, as a rule, know little and hear little about our Missions. May he be permitted to say to his brethren of the Clergy that the experience of the past year has deepened his own interest and faith in the work of Diocesan Missions?

The Missionaries of the Archdeaconry of Newark are as a body hard-working, devout, self-denying, men. They are of all shades and degrees of Churchmanship, advanced, conservative, evangelical. But all alike are loyal to the Church, and are laboring faithfully to advance her cause. They, therefore, ask for and deserve your confidence and your support.

There are a number of Mission Sations in the Arch-deaconry of Newark from which in the nature of things little in the way of growth can be expected. In small country villages like Mendham, Stanhope, Belvidere, Knowlton, Hamburg and Vernon, where the population is either stationary or decreasing, about all that can be done is to "strengthen the things that remain," to give to these small congregations the privilege of the worship and sacraments of the Church, which they highly value. This our Missions are doing. It is lonely, self-denying, and, from the worldly standpoint, disheartening, work. But surely, so long as men can be found who are willing to do it, this wealthy Diocese will never begrudge the few hundred dollars that it costs.

From the Mission at Hackettstown, which is under the supervision of the Rev. Mr. Pickslay, Rector of St. John's, Dover, with whose recent great sorrow this whole Con-

vention sympathizes, come most encouraging reports. Some two years ago the work of the Church was revived in that flourishing village, and good progress has been made. The Rev. W. M. Mitcham is now Priest in Charge under Mr. Pickslay. The congregation has steadily increased, and at the last visitation of the Bishop a class of six was confirmed.

One of our most important Mission Stations is St. Luke's, Phillipsburg. Here the Rev. Mr. Martin is doing most excellent work. Hearty services and large congregations characterize this Mission. At the time of the Archdeacon's visitation, which was on a cold week day evening, the church was filled, and the large number of men present was especially noticeable. Should the present rate of progress be kept up, this Mission ought to become self-supporting in two or three years.

At St. Peter's, Washington, the Rev. Mr. Fliedner is faithfully carrying on the work which Mr. McCleary left about a year ago. The Church in this place has to contend with strong prejudice and growth is slow. There has been, however, a gratifying increase in the Sunday School, and the Missionary reports a large attendance of children upon the services, especially during Lent.

The Archdeacon was able to secure a gift of fifty Prayer Books and Hymnals for this Mission. We have an excellent Church property in Washington, the Church building being especially attractive. The Mission House is large and well built, but is in need of some repairs and is scantily furnished.

The two Missions at Lake Hopatcong are still under the charge of the Rev. Mr. Pickslay, assisted by a Deacon and a Lay Reader. The Mission at Landing maintains a weekly service and a Sunday School, which has grown encouragingly during the past year. The Mission at the Lake itself, near the Hotel Breslin, has now reached a critical point in its career. We have, as you know, at this place, a very pretty and substantial stone Church, which was given to the Diocese a few years ago, and which has been largely supported by the offerings of the summer visitors. The hotel has recently been bought by a number of gentlemen, mostly residents of this State, with the purpose of making it a country club. The Archdeacon and the Missionary in charge hope to interest the members of this club in the work of the Church and to secure from them, if possible, some guarantee of substantial support.

Trinity Mission, Arlington, in charge of the Rev. Mr. Keller, reports increased attendance upon evening services during the year. The average attendance upon the week-day services during Lent was forty-four persons. On Easter Day there were ninety-five communicants. The Sunday School numbers 157. The property is in good condition, no encumbrance upon it. It is estimated that the ground is worth seven times what was paid for it.

At Butler, Church services have been maintained by the Rev. Mr. Kienzle, Rector of Christ Church, Pompton, and considerable interest has been shown by the people.

The past year has witnessed a marked growth in St. Alban's Mission, Newark, in charge of the Rev. Elliot White. That part of Newark in which the Mission is situated is rapidly filling up with English people who look to the Church for spiritual ministrations. The congregations have notably increased; the Sunday School already fills the building, while the communicant list is thirty per cent. larger than last year. As a result of the work of the women of the congregation, the city assessment for street paving has been paid. A friend of the Mission has purchased two more lots, in addition to the four already held, for the erection of a future Church. This will give the Mission, eventually, a fine property, 150 feet on the corner of South Eighth street and Thirteenth Ayenue.

St. George's Mission, Maplewood, under the Rev. Mr. Bicker, is steadily growing. During the past year \$500 of indebtedness has been paid, leaving an indebtedness of \$2,500 on a property worth \$9,000. A new reredos has been placed in its Church. The average congregation is about seventy. The communicants number fifty-four.

In addition to the Mission Stations already referred to. it is gratifying to be able to report to the Convention that a new Mission has been organized in the Archdeaconry of Newark during the past year. For some time church services have been held in Essex Fells, near Caldwell, by the clergy of St. Luke's Church, Montclair, but no permanent organization had been affected. In July of last year the Rev. Appleton Grannis, then a Deacon, began work at Essex Fells. Services were held in the waiting room of the Railroad Station, the only available place. Shortly afterwards an excellent piece of ground, with a frontage of 175 feet and a depth of 180 feet, was given by the Essex Fells Land Company, and subscriptions were secured for a building fund. On October 31st, ground for the church building was broken, on November 18th the corner stone was laid by the Bishop, and on Christmas Day the first service was held in the completed church. The cost of the building was \$3,200. In addition there have been presented chancel furniture, altar hangings, cross, vases, altar book and rest, communion linen, a silver communion service, and a font. The Mission has also the promise of a pipe organ valued at \$1,200. The total value of the property is about \$5,000 with an indebtedness of \$1,500. Mission has been self-supporting from the outset. the only church in the place; the people are all interested; the services are well attended, and the outlook is most promising. Too much praise cannot be given to the Rev. Mr. Grannis for the tact and ability with which he has carried through this important work, and he has been ably seconded and upheld by Mr. J. Brinton White, a most zealous and enterprising churchman, who is now the Warden of the Mission.

In December of last year, church services were begun by Mr. Grannis in Little Falls, a village of some 2,000 people, about eight miles from Essex Felis. The services are held Sunday afternoons in a private club house, belonging to the Beatty family, proprietors of the large

carpet mills in the village.

Two months ago a Sunday School was also started. The average attendance at the service has been about sixty, and there are twenty children in the Sunday School. The majority of the Congregation is made up of factory employes with their families, who have been brought up as members of the Church of England, and who show a hearty appreciation of the services. At present there are twenty-two communicants, and there is a confirmation class of ten adults, who will shortly be confirmed. Twenty-one persons, seven of them adults, have been baptized. It is hoped that a suitable lot for a church building will shortly be given, and when this is done, the work of raising money for a church building will be immediately begun. The Missionary has already been assured of money and gifts to the amount of \$400. By the generosity of the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary Church furniture to the amount of \$50 has been given to this work at Little Falls. Here then, in the judgment of your Archdeacon, is a most promising field for the organization of a new Mission. Little Falls is an old and well established village, and it is near enough to Essex Fells for one clergyman to serve both places.

It is aggressive work of this sort that kindles the flame of missionary enthusiasm in a Diocese, and vindicates to the world the Catholicity of the Church.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF JERSEY CITY.

To the Rt. Rev. Thomas A. Starkey, D. D., Bishop of Newark:

My Dear Bishop:—The Missions of this Archdeaconry are making most abundant returns for all that is being done for them. They are, in the main, new Missions, live Missions, vigorous Missions. They are acquiring land, erecting buildings, and laying solid foundations for the future. They are self-respecting Missions, asking as little as possible from others, and doing all they can for themselves.

Calvary Church, Bayonne, must enlarge its borders. Its congregations are often larger than its building can accommodate. Chairs are placed in the aisles, yet some are turned away. Its location is not the best. A better can be found. If some one of God's children to whom large means have been given would but give a lot, the earnest people of the church would soon erect a suitable building.

About seven hundred souls are connected with this church. There are one hundred and sixty communicants. Nineteen have been baptized. Fifteen have been confirmed. One hundred and ninety children are in the Sunday school. The contributions have been \$1,950. The stipend of \$250 which this Church has received from the Board of Missions will soon be voluntarily relinquished. The Rev. Horatio W. Maguire is still the Missionary Rector.

A ten days "Mission" was held in St. Agnes' Mission Jersey City, in February last. It was conducted by the Rev. E. L. Jenner of St. John's Church, Bayonne. It was eminently successful. The total attendance at the week day services was about three hundred, while that of

the two Sundays reached five hundred. Three hundred souls are connected with this Mission. There are sixty communicants. There have been fifty baptisms. Seven, have been confirmed. There are one hundred and twenty children in the Sunday School. The offerings have been \$359. This Mission receives nothing from the Board of Missions. It is supported entirely by St. Mark's Church, Jersey City, the Rev. Frederick E. Mortimer, Rector.

St. Thomas' Mission, Lyndhurst, is passing through a crisis. Many of the most active and liberal of the Church people have moved from the town. So many have moved away, the work is greatly crippled. Fortunately it is under no burden of debt. It owns its own lot and building, and can await the incoming of others to take the places of those who are gone. The Mission numbers one hundred and eighteen souls. There are twenty-three communicants. There have been five baptisms. Forty children are in the Sunday-school. The work has been under the immediate charge of Mr. Edward J. Cooper, a Candidate for Holy Orders in this Diocese.

It is now under the personal charge of the Rev Henry M. Ladd, Rector of Grace Church, Rutherford.

This Mission receives nothing from the Board of Missions. Its offerings have amounted to \$240.

The Mission of the Epiphany, Allendale, has now a Priest of its own, the Rev. Wm. Ernest Allen, appointed

by the Bishop in December last.

The wisdom of the venture is abundantly justified. Growth is seen in every direction. The Missionary reports one hundred and eighty souls, seventy-five communicants, three confirmations, eight baptisms, forty-five in the Sunday-school, and offerings amounting to \$1,176. A large class is now under instruction for confirmation. Nothing is received from the Board of Missions.

The Mission of St. John the Divine, Hasbrouck Heights, has accomplished wonders during the past year. When

the last report was made it was holding services in a public hall. It has now its own building, one of the most complete and attractive in the whole Diocese. The building had been used for other purposes. It was purchased and presented to the Diocese by Mr. E. W. Dunstan, a member of the Mission.

It was entirely renovated, and is now as though it was newly built. On the 2nd of December last, at the request of the Bishop, I laid the corner-stone. A formal opening service was held that evening. Eight Priests and as many students from the General Theological Seminary were present. With the noted choir, fully thirty were in the procession. The building was filled to its utmost capacity with a most interested congregation. Through the kindness and generosity of Mr. Richard Stevens, of Hoboken, and of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese, I was able to give to the Mission an altar, a Bishop's chair, Priests' sedilia, credence table, chancel rail, pulpit, lecturn and baptismal font, all of quartered oak, and made by Geissler, of New York. The value of the property is \$4,500. \$2,800 is still owed upon it, but provision has been made for the gradual reduction of this. The Mission reports 125 souls, forty communicants, twenty-seven baptisms, nine confirmed, and forty in the Sunday-school. Outside of individual gifts the offerings have been \$500. This Mission has received nothing from the Board of Missions. Mr. George S. Robinson is the Lay Reader.

Holy Trinity Mission, Hillsdale, is steadily advancing in strength and usefulness. Oak pews have taken the places of the chairs. A brass altar desk has been given as a memorial. The Rev. Arthur Whitaker, Priest in charge, reports fifty souls, twenty-three communicants, twenty-eight in the Sunday-school, and offerings amounting to \$800. This Mission voluntarily relinquished the stipend of \$100 it was receiving from the Board of Missions one year ago.

There is no debt of any kind upon the Mission property, which consists of a lot large enough for a Church building, a Parish house and a Rectory, and a very comfortable building.

St. Paul's Mission, Montvale, is also under the charge of the Rev. Arthur Whitaker. It has its own stone building, which I described in my report last year, and a large lot. Its year of work shows fifty souls; twenty communicants; six baptisms; thirty-five in the Sunday School and offerings amounting to \$400. This Mission is self supporting.

In addition to faithful work done in the two above named Missions, Mr. Whitaker has held as many services as possible at Oradell, Closter, Demarest and other adjacent villages. He receives \$100 for this from the Board.

The Mission at Nordhoff is supported entirely by St. Paul's Church, Englewood, and is under the care of the Rev. George F. Flichtner, Rector of the same. It receives no help from the Board of Missions. The Mission reports 105 souls, forty communicants, thirteen baptisms, seven confirmed, and forty-two in the Sunday School. The offerings for the year were \$201. Mr. W. A. Burdett is Lay Reader under the Rev. Mr. Flichtner.

The Mission of the Good Shepherd, Fort Lee, under the charge of the Rev. Walter M. Sherwood, continues to hold its own. There has not been the growth in population looked for. Even the trolley system is sometimes a disappointment and does not bring all the blessings of life. The trolley may, eventually, bring the increase looked for in vain until now. One hundred and seventy-eight souls are connected with this Mission. There are eighty-one communicants. There have been nine baptized and six confirmed. There are ninety-five in the Sunday School. This Mission receives \$125 from the Board of Missions.

All Saints' Mission, Leonia, is now ready to take a most decided step in advance. Services have been held in a public hall. This will soon soon cease, as plans are perfected for the erection of a church building. Building lots have been in the possession of the Mission for some time. The energies of the people have been directed towards the accumulating of a building fund. Enough is now in hand to justify them in building. By Christmas. at the latest, the building should be fully ready for use. The Rev. J. A. McCleary, of Edgewater, with great generosity and devotion, is giving his services as Priest. Mr. C. M. Douglas, a Candidate for Holy Orders in this Diocese, is Lay Reader. The Mission reports one hundred and six souls; fifty-five communicants; thirteen baptisms; four confirmed; fifty-six in the Sunday School; and offerings amounting to \$900. This Mission receives \$50 from the Board of Missions, paid to the Archdeacon. for the traveling expenses of the Lay Reader.

The very hard times still seriously affect the Mission Church of the Ascension, Jersey City Heights. Still, there is no abatement in the very faithful and successful work done. When I last visited the Mission I could hardly believe I was in the same building. The former worn out gas fixtures had been replaced by larger and better ones, until with other most seemly improvements. the building was brilliant as compared with its former gloom. Nothing has been done, nothing could have been done, in the way of reducing the heavy debt which came to the Rev. James Cameron, Priest-in-charge, as an inheritance. The Missionary reports six hundred souls. two hundred and twenty communicants, twenty-two baptisms, twenty-five confirmed, two hundred in the Sunday School, and offerings amounting to \$1,500. The Mission receives \$350 from the Board. This pays the interest on the indebtedness.

St. Clement's Mission, Hawthorne, is justifying the

wisdom of the Bishop in permitting and consenting to its formation. It has had a little over a year of life, yet it reports for the last year one hundred souls, thirty-one communicants, eight baptisms, one confirmed, thirty-four in the Sunday School, and offerings amounting to \$375. A solid silver paten and chalice have been presented to the Mission by a friend of the Priest-in-charge, the Rev. G. M. Dorwart, of the Church of the Holy Communion, Paterson. The fact that the giver is a Presbyterian makes the gift all the more appreciated. Mr. Wm. A. Long, a Candidate for Holy Orders in this Diocese, is the Lay Reader in charge. This Mission receives nothing from the Board of Missions.

St. Luke's Mission, Paterson, is fast nearing that condition when it will be justified in making application to be admitted into union with the Convention as a Parish. It has fairly earned for itself this higher degree. It has approved itself by its successful work. During the past year the Church building has been enlarged until its capacity is two-thirds greater than formerly. It has been transformed. No one would recognize it as the same building. On the evening of the Feast of the Purification the 2nd of February, it was formally opened. The service was of the most inspiriting value. The night was. stormy, but the Church was full. Six of the neighboring priests were present to thank God with the faithful Missionary, the Rev. Robert Perine, and his faithful congregation. The cost of the enlargement was \$2,200. Of this \$1,700 has been paid or provided for. Only \$500 remains. This will be promptly met. Friends of the Mission throughout the Diocese came generously to the aid of the Mission in this its great work. It had been my intention to give in this report the names of the contributors. But I cannot, the list is too long. In behalf of the Bishop, myself, the Missionary, and the Missions, I thank vou all.

The Mission reports five hundred souls, one hundred and eighty-two communicants, thirty-six baptisms, nineteen confirmed, and two hundred and thirty-five in the Sunday-school. The offerings within the mission have been \$1,250; from friends in the Diocese, and elsewhere, \$1,116; making a total of \$2,366. This Mission has received \$300 from the Board of Missions.

This Mission has in its turn a Mission at Lake View.

St. Matthew's Church, Jersey City, receives a stipend of \$800 from the Missionary Board, but being a parish its report will be made to the Bishop and found among the parish reports.

In the month of August, 1896, a few church people living in Clifton, whose children were too young to send to any of the neighboring parish Churches for Sunday School instruction, organized a Sunday School in a hall in that village. A few weeks later they applied to the Bishop for permission to hold lay services, and received his consent, being placed at the same time under the charge of the Rev. Wm. P. Evans, Rector of St. Mark's Church, Paterson. Mr. Geo. T. Anderson was licensed as lav reader, and has performed the duties of that office regularly since the 18th day of November, when the Priest in charge held the first service. The Bishop gave to the infant Congregation the name of St. Peter's Mission, and the work has been going on with the most promising indications of success. In the short space of six months, there has been developed the desire for the services of the Church, and the realization of that desire, in the present existence of a "Mission" having under its care 216 souls-There are thirty-four communicants, and the Sunday School numbers eight teachers and officers, and fifty-six scholars. The contributions have averaged more than \$50.00 per month, and the people are determined to persevere in the effort to build up a Parish. A site for a Chapel has already been purchased, and about one third of the purchase money paid. The hall in which services are now held has been leased for one year with privilege of renewal, but it is hoped that the proposed Church will be ready for occupancy before the expiration of the second

vear.

The Missions of this Archdeaconry have received from the Board of Missions the sum of \$1,175. In return for this it reports 3,112 souls, 1,010 communicants, 196 baptisms, 96 confirmations, 1,160 scholars and teachers in the Sunday-schools, and offerings of \$11,344. No more fruitful results can be found anywhere in the Lord's great field, which is the world, whether at home or abroad.

Reserving the details of the Annual Report for separate mention hereafter, the Board of Trustees, through its Committee, invites the attention of all church people in the Archdeaconry of Newark to the fact that the Hospital of Saint Barnabas, Newark, is, in its purpose and management, an institution of the Church in this Diocese; and that as such, it invites the interest and support of all who believe that the healing of human suffering must, to be in accordance with our Lord's example, include such opportunities for spiritual comfort and healing as only a Church Hospital can fully provide for.

Recognizing, with gratitude, the extension of philanthropic zeal which is manifesting itself in the rapid multiplication of local hospitals throughout this part of our State, the Board of Trustees feels that churchmen, while they should be locally interested in other institutions of healing, ought not to forget that the Hospital of Saint Barnabas should have at least an equal claim on their generosity and co-operation, partly because it was first in

the field, but chiefly for the reason that, being a religious institution, it is fully equipped to give all the ministrations of religion to those who come to it for healing and cure. And it is not an uncommon experience, especially with the clergy of the Church, to meet with people of all stations in life who prefer to seek the help they need in hospitals where the Word and Sacraments are administered, and where they are sure to be surrounded with every aid that may soothe their suffering and help them to look to the Cross and to Him who taught men how to bear the ills of life.

The Trustees take pleasure in announcing that a Training School for Nurses has been fully organized during the past year, and has recently given diplomas to nine graduate nurses. The initial steps were taken to form this valuable adjunct, or, rather, this necessary department of a first-rate Hospital, early in 1896. In the following September, through the hearty efforts of our faithful and efficient Medical Staff, a complete curriculum of study was provided and the necessary instructions were begun. On the Feast of the Annunciation, March 25, 1897, the first class was graduated. The Hospital Review of April gives in full the excellent address delivered to the graduates by the Hon. Cortlandt Parker, which is cordially commended to the reading of the churchmen of this Diocese.

The Treasurer reports that during the past year these legacies have been received and applied, where specified, to purposes in strict accordance with the donor's wishes:

From F. Herpers, \$200.

From Silas Merchant's estate (last payment on an old legacy), \$981.50.

From the late George B. Jenkinson, \$1,000. From the late Caroline M. Darcy, \$500.

From the late William Vanderpool, \$5,000, for the endowment of a bed.

A brass tablet in memory of the last named donor, who was a founder of the Hospital, has been placed in

the Hospital by his executors.

Much earnest thought has been given to the urgent need of a Private Surgical and Medical Building for pay patients, which will, it is claimed, increase very materially, the revenues of the Hospital, and secure to it, for the future, a large patronage which is otherwise likely to be bestowed on a rival institution soon to be completed in this city. A Committee of the Trustees was appointed during the past year which will soon be ready to submit plans for such a building. Liberal donations will be needed to enable the Trustees to erect and equip such a building. A new Morgue must shortly be erected to replace the present unsuitable and dilapidated structure which is entirely an obstacle to that reverent care of the dead which a Church Hospital is bound to provide for, and provision must be made for post mortem examinations and for a pathological museum. A subscription list for this purpose has been opened, and is hereby commended to the generosity of Churchmen and benefactors of the Hospital.

The Board of Trustees takes pleasure in announcing the placing in the Hospital Chapel of a beautiful window (the subject being Saint Elizabeth of Hungary). It is the gift of Mr. Guy J. Edwards and Mr. Washington B. Williams, of Newark, in memory of the late Mrs. Guy J. Edwards, an earnest and devoted member of Saint Catherine's Guild.

THE HOSPITAL OF SAINT BARNABAS is generously aided in the maintenance of its peculiar work by various agencies which deserve special mention here.

(1) THE MEDICAL AND SURGICAL STAFF, consisting of twenty-eight well known and able physicians and surgeons

to whom is due the cordial thanks and praise of the Board of Trustees and all other friends of the Hospital of Saint Barnabas for their devotion to the sick who come to it for treatment.

- (2) THE GUILD OF THE HOSPITAL OF SAINT BARNABAS. This is a society of women of Newark and its vicinity which fills an important and indispensible function in the raising of funds for the Hospital and without the cooperation of which the Trustees would be very seriously hindered in the management and the maintenance of the work. Its officers are: President, Mrs. Thomas A. Starkey; Vice-President, Mrs. Edward H. Wright; Treasurer, Mrs. Edward Q. Keasbey; Secretary, Miss Grace Trusdell.
- (3) St. Catherine's Guild carries on its work by ministering personally to the patients in the Hospital with entertaining amusements and dainties and visits, without which the routine of the patient's days would be much more tedious and depressing. The officers are as follows: First Directress, the Sister in charge, Sister Adeline; Second Directress, Miss Louisa E. Keasbey; Secretary, Mrs. J. Austin Williams; Treasurer, Mrs. John Howell.
- (4) THE SERVICES OF THE CHAPEL, where the Holy Eucharist is offered four times each week, and other offices of the church are afforded through the faithful work of the Chaplain and other clergymen.

(5) THE HOSPITAL REVIEW. This excellent monthly magazine fulfills a wide-reaching purpose in keeping the friends of the Hospital informed of the details of its work and of its daily growing needs and demands.

The Publishing Committee consists of Mrs. T. A. Starkey, Mrs. D. Smith Wood, Mrs. E. H. Wright, Mrs. Edward Q. Keasbey. The Treasurer is Miss L. E. Keasbey, of Morristown.

It is hoped that what has been said in this report will

go some way toward commending still more widely to the Diocese of Newark the great work we are endeavoring to carry on in obedience to our Lord's command to heal the sick in body and soul.

A glance at the Treasurer's Report in the Appendix will show that \$15,000 is a close general estimate of necessary annual current expenses, and that \$13,000 is a like

estimate of ordinary income.

We therefore appeal to the clergy for their aid in securing offerings and donations and bequests, and to the faithful laity for abundant and willing responses to such calls for aid as may come to them.

^{*}The Endowment Fund has recently been increased by a legacy of \$5,000, the bequest of the late William Vanderpool, making a total of \$28,100 now held on that account, which is variously invested and the income therefrom is applied to current expenses.

THE MORTGAGE upon the Hospital property continues at \$22,000, as named in the Annual Report of last year.

A Note for \$3,000, given for deficiency in current expenses account for year ending May, 1896, is yet carried at six per cent.

A deficiency of about \$2,000 on the same account appears again this year for which funds should be provided at once, as the ordinary income from usual sources during the Summer months is scarcely sufficient for current use and cannot be applied to arrearages.

WALLACE PROPERTY.

The remaining fourteen (14) building lots on South Tenth street are offered for sale, the proceeds therefrom to be added to the Endowment Fund.

A Summary of the financial condition of the Hospital shows:

THE LIABILITIES consist of the mortgage upon the property, and the debt for the past two years, deficiences on current expense account.

THE ASSETS are the Hospital grounds, buildings and equipments, with the unsold building lots on South Tenth street (both items being subject to estimate); also, the Endowment Fund and the cash on hand in the various accounts as herein reported.

Too much emphasis cannot be placed upon the importance of an increase of income for current living expenses—the only alternative being the accumulation of a floating debt, with all its embarrassment.

TRAINING SCHOOL FOR NURSES.

GOVERNMENT.

The Trustees of the Hospital of St. Barnabas have established a Training School for Nurses in order to give to women desirous of becoming professional nurses a systematic course of training and practice.

The Training School is controlled by the Trustees of the Hospital, like all other departments of the hospital service. A standing committee of the Board, called the Training School Committee, has especial charge of the affairs of the School.

The Sister in charge of the Hospital has the general supervision of all matters relating to the school.

The superintendent of nurses has the immediate charge of all the nursing in the Hospital, the instruction and the management of the nurses in the Training School, under the authority of the Sister in charge of the Hospital and of the Trustees, and the nurses are subject to the rules of the Hospital like any other service.

Applicants for admission must be between the ages of twenty-three and thirty-five and unmarried and must file the regular form of application, and if accepted serve one month on probation.

After this, if accepted, the applicant will be classed as a pupil nurse, having signed an agreement to remain in the Hospital in accordance with the terms of service and promising to obey the rules and regulations.

The term of service is two years exclusive of the month of probation.

The remuneration is \$9 per month for first year, and \$11 per month for second year, it being considered that the instruction given is some equivalent for their service.

The Superintendent hears recitations and gives instruction from text books, and the members of the Medical Board give lectures and demonstrations, and conduct the

examinations required for a diploma.

When the full term of service is completed the nurses are at liberty to choose their own field of labor, and on passing a satisfactory examination they will receive a diploma certifying to their proficiency, signed by the Training School Committee of the Medical Board, the Superintendent of the Hospital, the Superintendent of the Nurses, and the President of the Board of Trustees.

Charging the outlay for current expenses to those patients occupying beds, the cost per day for each patient has been 87 cents.

The exceeding care exercised by the management of Christ Hospital, to accomplish the greatest results with economy, is discovered by consulting the reports of other institutions.

The Laura Franklyn Hospital for Children, New York, expended eleven thousand dollars to care for 170 patients. Presbyterian Hospital, Phila., per patient, \$2.32 per day. St. Luke's Hospital, New York. 2.23 Presbyterian Hospital 2.24 New York Hospital. 66 1.88 Roosevelt Hospital, New York, 1.81 6.6 Methodist Hospital, Brooklyn, 6 6 1.78 University of Penn. This fact deserves attention, and when we consider that the quality of the food is the best, and all needful comforts are provided, surely the charitably disposed cannot better accomplish the greatest good than by giving liberally to Christ Hospital, and when we consider how large the charity work is-465 patients who have been treated free -it shows how our doors are always open for suffering humanity to the extent of our beds. We appeal to you. every one who hears or reads this report! 465 sick. wounded, and distressed, suffering men, women, and children, appeal to the well and better off in this world's goods, to give and give quickly for food, coal, lights, nursing, medicines, surgical supplies, ambulance service, and all that is required to care for and relieve the sick and suffering. Become an annual subscriber and send it in, "not grudgingly or of necessity, for God loveth a cheerful giver."

The report of the Treasurer shows that over \$19,000 has been received during the year. Of this \$1,000 for interest on bonded debt, \$2,000 contributed toward special settlement of floating debt of the building fund, and \$3,000 for the endowment of the "Ogden Bed." This

leaves our receipts through regular channels over \$13,000. It was \$14,500 the previous year. This shows the stringency of the times, and if the board of patients had not yielded a larger revenue than ever before, we should have presented even a greater falling off. The interest on endowments was about \$2,500.

St. Mary's Guild, auxiliary of the Finance Committee, has under its care the bonded debt of \$80,000, incurred in the building of Christ Hospital. It cares as far as possible for the interest on the bonded debt by collecting quarterly from 450 Mite Boxes scattered over this section. It has received through these and in other ways over \$1,100 during the year. It is also raising funds to reduce the principal, and has in hand over \$500.

The Abercrombie Guild is auxiliary to the Council, and works for the general good of the Hospital. They take charge of Thanksgiving Week, making it a time for donations for the Hospital. The response to their hungry bags sent out for money and provisions has been most gratifying, and the Council desires to thank all who have contributed through this means. The Abercrombie Guild, as their principal work, have in hand the endowment of beds to maintain the charity work. They have added nearly \$2,000 the past year, collected through the "Daisy," a little paper published monthly by the Guild. This makes the total endowment of beds through the Abercrombie Guild \$41,000.

The Medical Board have prosecuted their work with unfailing interest, and sought in every way to increase the efficiency of the Institution. The demand for operations of the first-class is continually increasing, and the desire of the Board to have enlarged quarters and better facilities for their work is to be crowned with success in the near future. Dr. Dickinson, the President of the Medical Board, has notified the Council that he has received from a patient

of his the sum of eight thousand dollars towards erecting an Operating Pavilion, the same to be known as St. John's Operating Pavilion, in memory of John Van Vorst, M. D., · late Surgeon of Christ Hospital.

The Superintendent who was with us at the beginning of the year resigned on account of illness in her family, and we regretted being obliged to part with one who had gained the esteem of us all. The present Superintendent entered upon her duties in May. She has proved to be most efficient in every way, and under her wise and careful management every department has been advanced and strengthened.

The Training School for Nurses is becoming recognized as one of high standard, and the number of applicants for admission is constantly increasing. The applications for nursing in private families has been more than we could meet, and the revenue derived from this source has been more than four times as much as last year. Rooms for more nurses are therefore one of the necessities to be provided for. There are seventeen graduates, ten pupils, and four probationers.

The Chaplain has held services in the Chapel on Sundays and Thursdays, and also in the Wards, as well as special services during Lent. He is always ready to minister to the sick at their bedsides and encourages the clergy of all religious bodies to visit their sick in Hospital. Daily prayers are held in the Wards by the Superintendent.

The Executive Committee meet on the second Thursday of the month, and audit the bills for current expenses, and have a general oversight of every detail of the work.

The Finance Committee are charged with the duty of augmenting the financial resources of the Institution, and directing and counseling the Treasurer in the investment of endowments. Among other modes adopted, is to ask for offerings from the Churches on Quinquagesima or some

other Sunday. The invested endowments are over \$14,000. This, added to those of the Abercrombie Guild, make the total endowment of beds in Christ Hospital, \$55,000. The cost of lands, buildings, and furnishings has been about \$65,000, on which there is a bonded debt of \$30,000. If this be deducted from our outlay and the value of our endowments added, we have a cash value at this date of \$90,000.

The need of the erection of the south wing becomes more and more pressing. Private rooms are wanted and the Hospital is unable to provide them. The income from these would greatly assist us with current expenses, and thus provide for the large charity work of the Institution. What a glorious memorial this would make for some family to undertake—about \$20,000 would be required—or we shall be glad to receive any amounts toward this object.

The erection of the Operating Pavilion to stand where it ought to, will necessitate the taking down of the old frame building known as St. Luke's House. This will require the erection of a new building devoted especially to the maternity work. To provide for this, and give us improved accommodations, is greatly to be desired, for the maternity work has been constantly increasing and is sought by the deserving poor more than may be realized; 35 children were born in Christ Hospital during the year. A patient of Dr. Dickinson has notified the Council that she will undertake the erection of a new Maternity Pavilion, which she will give as a thank-offering for successful surgical treatment.

The Council has discharged during the year the entire floating debt of the Building Fund for the new Hospital, of four thousand and two hundred dollars, and the subscriptions toward the new Operating Pavilion, the new Maternity Pavilion, and the new South Wing have now reached twenty-six thousand dollars.

We close this report, mindful of the loving care of Almighty God over this work of love and mercy, which is carried on in the name of "Christ" for His sick and suffering brethren. Close financial times require a greater exercise of faith, and more sacrifice for the Master's work, but it is His work who hath said: "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, my brethren, ye have done it unto me." We allow nothing to discourage us, appealing again to the people to rise up and help carry the burden, and we "thank God and take courage," as we see the endowments annually increasing, the work extending and strengthening, new friends being raised up and old friends devoted to this work, by a life of self-sacrifice, for the sick and suffering of every creed, nationality, and color.

May God continue His blessing upon it, and may the people consider it a privilege to maintain and extend the humane and benevolent work of Christ Hospital.

RULES.

- 1. St. Katharine's Home is intended to help unmarried girls who have been led astray for the first time, and to shelter them before and after motherhood.
- 2. Application must be made to the Chaplain, or to the Sister in charge, who will investigate each case.
- 3. Applicants must be recommended by trustworthy persons and must bring a certificate of good health from a physician in regular standing.
- 4. Each girl must sign a written promise to remain in the Home for a fixed length of time, to conform to the rules of the house, and to perform such a share of the house and other work as may be assigned her.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

For year ending October 13, 1896.

On the 13th of October, 1896, St. Katharine's Home closed its 7th year of work.

Miss Talcott, who so kindly took charge of the work in August, 1895, when Sister Cora resigned her position, has managed it with great judgment and success. It is the wish of those interested in the work that, in this report, we should express our approval of her faithfulness and capability, as well as our appreciation of the same.

Dr. Noble has attended to the physical needs of the patients during the past three years. The usual good appearance of the mothers and babies owes much to his excellent care, and to him the Board of Managers owe sincere gratitude.

Since last November the plumbing of the house, drains, etc., have been put in thorough order. This was a great expense, but one that was necessary, and it is a source of congratulation to the managers that the sanitary condition of the Home is now in a satisfactory condition.

The plan of holding quarterly meetings of the Executive Committee and Advisory Board has worked very well. At two of the Advisory Board meetings there was the largest attendance we have had for some years.

Financially, the Home has done better this year, but we regret to say our list of regular subscribers is no larger. A sale at Morristown in December, a hat sale at Castle Point in March, and a moonlight sail on the Hudson in May, increased the balance in our treasury. These three functions, with a generous gift of \$500, through Rev. Mr. Jenvey, aggregate \$2,300. All of these things involved a large amount of work for a few persons. If the same amount of money could be raised by regular subscription, much anxiety could be avoided, and we should feel that the money was given to the work for the work's sake, and not as a quid pro quo for an amusing evening or some fancy article. The good work within the Home goes on quietly and well, blessed by success and in many cases thoroughly appreciated by those for whom it is done.

We are sure that it will be of interest to everyone to know something of the ages of the girls who come into the shelter of the Home, many of them helpless, hopeless

and crushed with trouble and shame. We have had in our seven years of work, 87 girls. Of these 10 were from 23 to 27 years of age; 30 were from 19 to 22 years; 35 from 16 to 18 years: 12 from 14 to 16 years. While we deplore the fact that women of 27 should be obliged to come to St. Katharine's, the fact that the majority of these girls (47) are from 14 to 18 years of age is saddest of all. The pity of it must appeal to every woman's heart. Think of the helplessness of a little girl of fourteen years under such circumstances, and think what would be the outcome of her poor ruined young life if we refused her shelter; if no one helped her to better living. There certainly is no more Christ-like work than the sheltering of these children, for children they are, and trying to show them their past mistake in life which, if thoroughly repented of, shall be forgiven.

It is so well understood by all right-thinking people that the only reformatory power in the world is that of religion, that it seems almost unnecessary to speak of it here, but no one can come into St. Katharine's Home without feeling that the great lever with which these unfortunate souls are raised to something better is the love of Christ. It is with sincere regret that, the past few months, we have been obliged to refuse admission to three applicants. We have room for twelve girls only, and cannot receive any more. This is a source of sorrow to the management, as it is hard to think of any girl whom we might have helped and whom we have had to refuse, leaving her out in the storm and stress of life with, we fear, little hope of betterment. For the past four years the Home has been filled. While we are inclined to dwell upon the good work done in the Home, we must not lose sight of the fact that the influence does not end here. Each girl, as she goes out, must carry with her some influence for good. It may be that it will extend no further than the better living of her own

life and the better care of her child, but think what that means. It means a pure instead of a sinful life, with peace at the end, and not despair.

There was a young girl who came to the Home more than a year ago; a girl who was most unfortunate. As time went on, and her little child was born and died, the suffering she had endured matured her, and the spirit and the teaching of the Home softened and purified her sothat when she left she took with her a hope in life, and was a Christ-loving, self-respecting girl. It is too long a story to tell how she became ill with consumption, and how she was helped by the Sister in charge, who placed her in a comfortable hospital. Her family, who had thrown her off, now came back to her, as to one who had suffered, who had been sorely tried and was repentant, and she died with the consciousness that, by the mercy of God, her sins had been forgiven her. Her sister, who was with her, wrote a most touching letter to the Sister in charge of St. Katharine's, part of which I copy:

"Poor J. says how good it is of God to have sent her to the Home, and for you to send her to such a comfortable place to die. She told the Priest, 'Sister is so good, so good.' She said she was happy, but in such awful pain. She told me to write to you and send her love to one who had been so kind to her. All her love goes out to all who have been so good to her. So, thanking you, dear sister, for your many efforts, and I know I feel this way at least, that when poor J. closes her eyes in death, she will simply be asleep in Jesus." From J's Sister.

This letter seem to me a beautiful tribute to the work of St. Katharine's. That this poor girl was happy in spite of pain, in spite of past sin; that she had been taught to believe there was forgiveness, and she would enter into rest, ought to convince us that this work is worth striving

for, worth sacrificing for. God grant that it may go on, and that many may be helped as was this poor girl.

DIOCESAN MISSIONS.

It shall be the duty of every minister having charge of a Parish Mission within the Diocese to see that there be made and rerted at least two collection. For Diocesan Missions.— He I, Canon 5, § IV.

AGED AND INFIRM CLERGY FUND.

It shall be the duty of every minister having charge of a congregan in this Diocese to make at least one annual collection for the ref of Clergymen disabled by age or disease.—Title III. Canon.r. § r. Send all contributions to Mr. Henry Haves, Treasurer, Newark.

Episcopal Fund.

The interest on Parish bonds is payable semi-annually on the st days of April and October, to Mr. Edwin A. Stevens, Hoboken rish Treasurers should remit the interest promptly and not wall any further notice that the money is due.

CONVENTION ASSESSMENTS.

The assessment this year is at the rate of ten per cent, on the gregate of the salaries paid to their respective Rectors or Ministers d Assistant Ministers of the Parishes, viz.: seven per cent. (if no rish bond has been given) for the Bishop's salary, to be paid arterly to Mr. Henry Haves, Treasurer. Newark, on the first ye of January. The Following Resolutions were Unanimously
Passed, (Pages 57 and 73 of the
Journal of 1891.)

RESOLVED. That an offering be taken on Christmas Day in every Parish and Mission of the Diocese, the same to be applied to the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund. When the sum shall have reached the amount of \$30,000,* the interest on the same shall be paid to the "Regular Annuitants," as provided for in the Canon. FURTHER, that this offering shall be taken annually thereafter, the same going to the Capital Fund, the interest on the total fund going to the Annuitants, according to the provisions of the Canon.

RESOLVED, That on Quinquagesima Sunday each year, offerings be asked from all the Parishes and Missions of the Diocese for the Hospitals of their respective Archdeaconries.

"This aum has now been passed.
