#### TITLE I, CANON 1, § II.

#### OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election, in the following form:

#### [Name of the Church, the place and date.]

This certifies that at a meeting of the congregation of this Church for the purpose of electing Church Officers and Deputies to the Convention (or for the purpose of electing Deputies to the Convention, if the meeting be for that purpose alone), A. B., C. D., and E. F., being members of the congregation and communicants of the Church, were duly chosen to represent the congregation in that body for the ensuing year. In testimony of which I have hereunto set my hand (or, if two Wardens subscribe, we have set our hands) the day and the year above written.

N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary sign, then the signatures of both Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-in-charge or Missionary cannot sign.

The Lay Representation is limited to three Deputies, whose names in full should be carefully and legibly written.

Three Alternate Deputies must also be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies. (See Title I, Canon 6, § II. [2].)

This Certificate is to "be transmitted to the Secretary of the Convention at least ten days before the meeting of the Annual Convention." (See Title I, Canon 1, §II.)

In order to secure this, the Secretary will forward a blank form to every parish, and he earnestly asks the PROMPT attention of the Clergy.

\*\*\*By the terms of the Constitution and Canons, the Deputies must be communicants of the Church, and also qualified voters in the Parish which elects them. (See Title I, Canon 6, § II. [4], [5] and [6].)

- Each meeting of the Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- When the President takes the chair, each member shall be seated.
- 8. THE ORDER OF BUSINESS SHALL BE FOLLOWS:
- The calling over by the Secretary of the names of the members, Clerical and Lay, and entering the names of those present on the Minutes.
- The appointment of a Committee on the Certificates of Lay Deputies.
- III. The Report of the existing Committee on Rules of Order.
- IV. The appointment by the Convention of a Committee on the Rights of Clerical Members, (Title I, Canon 1, § I, [2].)
- v. The appointment by the Convention of a Committee on the Rights of Lay Deputies. (Title I, Canon 1, § II, [2].)
- vi. The election of a Secretary.
- vii. The appointment of a Committee on New Parishes.
- VIII. The appointment of a Committee on Finance.

- IX. The appointment of a Committee on Rules of Order.
  - x. The appointment of a Committee on Securities.
  - xI. The appointment of a Committee on State Legislation.

- No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every
  motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover,
  whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
- When any member is about to speak, he shall with due to sect address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
- No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who
  is entitled to reply), in the same debate, without leave of the
  Convention.
- At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
- All questions shall be decided viva voce, unless otherwise specially ordered.
- 12. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote of the Convention may be taken by orders voting separately, and the names shall be entered on the Minutes.
- 13. The doors of the Convention shall be opened for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
- 14. No member shall leave the Convention without permission.

- 16. In all elections, those persons only who shall have a majority of all the votes given, shall be deemed elected; but if in any case more than the required number of persons shall have a majority of votes, the required number of persons having the highest number of votes shall be deemed elected, and in case of a tie between two or more candidates, there shall be a new ballot.
- 16. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone it to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
- 17. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order, he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
- 18. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate, but any member may appeal from the decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention.
- All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.
- 20. The Convention shall meet the first day at 10 A. M., and on subsequent days at 9.30 A. M., with a recess of one hour on each day between 1 and 2 o'clock.
- At the close of each Convention, the minutes shall be corrected and approved.

# JOURNAL.

CHRIST CHURCH, EAST ORANGE, N. J., May 24, 1898.

The Twenty-fourth Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Newark met in Christ Church, East Orange, on Tuesday, May 24th, 1898, at 10 A. M.

The Right Rev'd, the Bishop of the Diocese, celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by the Rev'd D. S. Hamilton, Rev'd Alexander Mann, Archdeacon of Newark, and the Rev'd William M. Pickslav.

The Bishop read his Annual Address.

The Convention was called to order by the President.

The Assistant Secretary read a letter from the Secretary explaining his absence, called the roll of the Clergy\* and of the Lay Deputies,† and announced that a constitutional quorum was present.

The Bishop appointed the Committee on Certificates of Lay Deputies: The Rev'd Lewis Cameron, Mr. Henry Hales and Mr. Charles G. Hanks.

On motion of the Rev'd WILLIAM M. HUGHES, D. D., on behalf of the Committee on Rules of Order, the rules of the last Convention were adopted.

On nomination by the Rev'd WILLIAM R. JENVEY, the Committee on the Rights of Clerical Members were elected: The Rev'd C. S. ABBOTT, the Rev'd WILLIAM M. HUGHES, D. D., and Mr. FLORENCE M. RELYEA.

On nomination by the Rev'd ARTHUR WHITAKER, the Committee on the Rights of Lay Deputies were elected: The Rev'd Daniel F. Warren, D.D., Mr. WILLIAM J. HOLMES and Mr. GEO. H. WHITE.

On nomination by the Rev'd ALEXANDER MANN, the Rev'd John P. Appleton was re-elected Secretary of the Convention and the Rev'd John Keller was elected Secretary pro tempore.

The Rev'd R. M. SHERMAN, JR., was appointed Assistant Secretary.

On motion of the Rev'd ALEXANDER MANN, the Convention ordered that a resolution of sympathy be sent to the Secretary in his illness expressing the hope for his speedy recovery.

The Rev'd WILLIAM M. HUGHES, D. D., read reports No. 1 and 2 of the Committee on Constitution and Canons:

REPORT No. 1.—The Committee on Constitution and Canons respectfully report that they have had under consideration the resolution found on page 74, Journal 1897, offered by Mr. E. A. Stevens, relative to fixing "the responsibility of collecting the assessments for the Episcopal salary," and in connection with Canon 4, Title I.

It appears from the reading of the Canon that it is the intent of the same to create a special Finance Committee to have in charge an assessment upon the various parishes of the diocese, (1) for the Bishop's salary and (2) for the expenses of the Convention. This, in short, creates a board of taxation subject to control of the Con-It further provides for the payment of t e assessments to two separate treasurers. That for the Bishop's salary is ordered to be paid to "the Treasurer of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund," and that for the expenses of the Convention, to the "Treasurer of the Convention." It is quite obvious that it is the purpose of this Canon to provide in a special manner for the collection of the assessments for the Bishop's salary, and the inference is that the responsibility for the efficient performance of this duty lies upon the Treasurer of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund. It would plainly involve an unnecessary and probably harmful confusion if the Treasurer of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund were obligated to report to the Treasurer of the Convention all delinquent parishes and then in return receive from him a report of his efforts to secure payment. It can scarcely be supposed that such a cumbersome procedure were intended by the Canon. A divided responsibility like this is always a source of uncertainty and therefore of indecision as to authority. In order, however, to remove all doubt upon this subject, your committee beg to offer the accompanying resolution:

Resolved, That Section II of Canon 4 of Title I is hereby amended, so as to read as follows: § II. The assessment for the Bishop's salary shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund of the Diocese of Newark, quarterly, on the first day of January, April, July and October, and it shall be the duty of said treasurer to attend to the collection of the same. And the assessment for the expenses of the Convention shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Convention before the first day of July, and it shall be the duty of said treasurer to attend to the collection of the same, which assessments and payments, together with all arrears, shall be published in the Journal, in a separate schedule prepared by the Treasurer.

REPORT No. 2.—The Committee on Constitution and Canons respectfully report that they have had under consideration the resolution offered by Mr. Louis A. Noble (see page 71, Journal 1897), relative to the admission of parishes into the Convention. This resolution contemplates such admission as a necessary consequence of the formal incorporation of any parish.

Article 5 of the Constitution provides for the form of admission, and safe-guards the rights both of the parish and the Convention. The adoption of Mr. Noble's resolution would entirely deprive the Convention of any voice as to its own membership and would thus traverse the almost universal principles of a legislative body's power over such membership. Experience goes to show that a legislative body, thus deprived of all voice as to its makeup, sooner or later lapses into feeble uselessness. Your committee, therefore, recommends the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Committee be discharged from further consideration of this subject.

#### CHRIST CHURCH, EAST ORANGE, May 24, 2.30 P. M.

The Convention re-assembled; the Bishop in the chair.

The Treasurer of the Corporation for the Relief of the Widows and Children of Clergymen of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the State of New Jersey declined to report; and on motion of the Rev'd JOHN KELLER the question of such report was indefinately postponed.

The report of the Standing Committee was read by the Rev'd WILLIAM R. JENVEY, the Secretary of the Committee:

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The Standing Committee respectfully report to the Convention that it has held six meetings during the past Conventional year.

On May 19th, 1897, the Committee organized by electing the Rev'd Wm. Welles Holley, D. D., President, and the Rev'd William R. Jenvey, Secretary.

On May 31st, 1897, the Bishop was advised to give consent to the application of St. Luke's Mission, Paterson, to be erected into a parish. Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. John's Church, Newark, to increase an existing mortgage of \$1,600 on the rectory property to \$2,200.

On November 8th, 1897, Mr. WILLIAM A. Long was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Deacons, and the proper testimonial signed. Mr.

EDWARD J. COOPER was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Deacons, and the proper testimonial signed. The Rev'd Archibald R. Balsley. Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests, and the proper testimonial signed. The Rev'd Albert Edward Bentley, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests, and the proper testimonial signed. Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd CHAUNCEY BUNCE BREWSTER, D. D., Bishop Coadjutor-Elect for the Diocese of Connecticut, and the proper testimonial signed. Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd Robert Atkinson Gibson, Bishop Coadjutor-Elect for the Diocese of Virginia, and the proper testimonial signed. The Committee gave it unanimous advice and consent to the Bishop of the Diocese to the remission and termination of the sentence of deposition of Mr. GEORGE H. YARNALL, in the manner provided by the Canons of the Church.

On December 9th, 1897, permission was given to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Calvary Church, Summit, to borrow the sum of \$14,000, and to mortgage the unencumbered church property for the same.

Permission was also given the said church corporation to sell the vacant lot on which the former church building stood for a sum not less than \$14,000. Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd William Neilson McVickar, D.D., Coadjutor Bishop-Elect for the Diocese of Rhode Island, and the proper testimonial signed. Consent was given to the election of the Right Rev'd ETHELBERT Talbot, D. D., LL. D., Bishop-Elect for the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania.

On Febrary 21st, 1898, permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Calvary Church, Bayonne, to place a mortgage of not more than \$900 upon property to be acquired by them. Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Luke's, Phillipsburg, to sell a one-third interest in the Public Cemetery for a sum not less than \$100. Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd William Montgomery Brown, Coadjutor Bishop-Elect for the Diocese of Arkansas, and the proper testimonial signed.

On May 24th, 1898, Mr. CHARLES MALCOLM DOUGLAS was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Deacons, and the proper testimonial signed. Mr. CALEB B. K. WEED was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Deacons, and the proper testimonal signed. Mr. George Biller, Jr., was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Deacons, and the proper testimonial signed. Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Paul's Church, Paterson, to mortgage their church property for the sum of \$37,500. Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Paul's Church, Paterson, to alienate and grant to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Mark's Church, Paterson, all that real church property situated on the southwest corner of Church and Ellison Streets, in the City of Paterson, now owned and formerly occupied by the said grantors. The report of the Secretary for the year was approved and ordered read to the Convention.

On motion of the Rev'd WILLIAM M. HUGHES, D. D., it was

Resolved, That the Bishop of this Diocese be respectfully requested to set forth a form of prayer, to be used in the parishes thereof, appropriate to the present war between the United States and Spain.

The report of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes was presented by the Rev'd Daniel F. Warren, D. D., and the recommendation of the Committee that St. Andrew's parish in South Orange be admitted into union with the Convention was adopted, and the Lay Delegates from St. Andrew's Church, South Orange, appeared and took seats in the Convention.

The report of the Committee on the Episcopal Residence was read by the the Rev'd WILLIAM R. JENVEY:

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE EPIS-COPAL RESIDENCE.

The Commtttee on the Episcopal Residence respectfully report to the Convention that repairs have been made to the residence during the year amounting to \$291.48. These were necessary and imperative. They have been paid for by the Treasurer of the Diocese.

The house is now in thorough repair and nothing will need to be done of an expensive nature for some time to come.

The total of indebtedness to Mr. Henry Haves for sums advanced by him in the past, for interest, repairs, etc., is \$3,242.71.

By resolution of the Convention of last year he was authorized to apply towards payment of this any balance remaining in his hands. There remained a balance of \$460.31 from the year last past. This has been applied.

The amount now owed Mr. Haves is \$2,782.40. This will soon disappear under the existing arrangement, the continuance of which the Committee recommend.

The mortgage indebtedness on the residence is \$5,000. The offerings at the Bishop's Jubilee Service, held on the 21st of May, will be applied to this.

The Committee on Finance reported progress and asked leave to report further on the second day of this session. The request was granted.

The Rev'd WILLIAM M. HUGHES, D. D., moved to amend Section VII. of the 20th Rule of Order by substituting 9.80 A. M. for 9 A. M. The amendment was adopted.

On motion of the Rev'd George S. Bennitt the Committee on Rules of Order was requested to arrange a place on the first day of the session for reports from the Charitable Homes of the Diocese.

The Rev'd GEORGE M. CHRISTIAN, D. D., presented the report of the Committee on the Arthur Home at Summit:

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

At the last meeting of the Convention the following resolution was unanimously adopted: "Resolved, That Arthur's Home for Destitute Boys at Summit, N. J., is heartily commended to the confidence and support of the clergy and people of this Diocese." At that time the institution was not formally and legally a Church Home, though it was so potentially. Since then the promised change has been effected. Retaining substantially the same personnel a new corporation has been formed with a slightly different title, and the Home is now reorganized as a Church institution. The certificate or permanent charter makes

the following declaration: "That the purposes for which this Association is formed are the care, cure, nurture and maintenance of orphans, half-orphans or destitute children, and their education according to the Doctrine, Discipline and Worship of the Protestant Episcopal Church."

The incorporators have further adopted a constitution in which it is provided that the Bishop of the Diocese, the Archdeacons and the Rector of Calvary Church, Summit, shall be ex officio members of the Association and also of the Advisory Board. Also that at least two-thirds of the Board of Governors shall be members of the Protestant Episcopal Church.

Since this change of incorporation was effected the new site has been finally conveyed to the Home in fee simple, without any conditions whatever. This property consists of four and a half acres of woodland with garden and orchard, admirably situated within one mile of the centre of Summit, and valued at \$1,000 an acre. Here it is proposed to erect, as soon as funds are secured, a house adapted to the needs of the work. For this purpose at least \$6,000 are required.

The Board has been lately much gratified and encouraged by the offer of \$1,000 for the new building on condition that \$2,000 more be raised before the first of July. They trust that the hearts of the faithful people of this Diocese, especially those blessed with abundant means, may be moved, not only to give this sum, but also to double and treble the amount.

How great the need is may be learnt from this one fact that, at last report (Feb., 1897), there were in the almshouses of New Jersey no less than 445 children, being "educated," to quote the words of the "State Charities Aid Association," "as professional paupers," and for "filling our jails, reformatories, penitentiaries and State prison."

Something may be done, certainly something ought to be

done by the State to remedy this terrible condition of things. But one thing the State is powerless to do. It cannot provide a religious home, and without such a home it is hopeless to think of making these or any children into God-fearing and good citizens.

Here then is a great opportunity, as well as a great duty, for the Church in this Diocese. Shall it stand idly by and see this only work for children, now long past the experimental stage, and situated among such wholesome surroundings, fall to the ground only for lack of material means to carry it on?

The parish in which the Home is placed cannot do this work single-handed. Many of the Christian people of Summit generally, as well as many members of Calvary Church, are giving money and material, while the Board is bearing gladly the oftentimes heavy load of management with imperfect means. They alone, however, cannot put the work on such a basis as it needs. the Churchmen and Churchwomen of this Diocese come to their help? What work can appeal more practically or more strongly to Christian people than this of caring for the bodies and souls of Christ's "little ones" left destitute and homeless? While we pray constantly that our Lord Himself would "defend and provide for the fatherless children," surely it is mere mockery in us to offer such a prayer, unless as a Church we are doing something to bring about its fullfilment.

The Board feels that, by the past record of its work (300 children cared for in 15 years), and by its present permanent position as a distinctly Church institution, the Arthur Home has the strongest possible claim upon the hearts and purses of the people of this Diocese.

They plead, 1st, for a liberal and prompt response to the appeal for the Building Fund, and 2d, for an annual offering from every parish for the support of the work. An average yearly offering of \$10 to \$50 from each of a hundred parishes would secure this latter object. The Board trusts that, in spite of the manifold calls upon the clergy and their flocks, this work will be given, as it deserves, a foremost place among the objects of their charity. To this end they would respectfully ask that a resolution be adopted by this Convention, requesting the clergy to do their utmost to give one gift or offering each year to this only Church institution within the Diocese for the care and training of children.

Following is a summary of the work done during the past year. It was found necessary in the autumn to abandon the old property in New Providence, chiefly because of its unsuitableness. The mortgage of \$6,000 upon it represented its full value, accordingly the house and farm were deeded back to their original donor, Colonel E. H. Ropes, who, in past years, had been a good friend of the Home.

The work is now carried on in a hired house for which we have only a short lease. If required to change our present location we should find it extremely difficult to rent another building adapted to our needs. The number of children cared for at present is 21, which taxes the capacity of the building to its utmost. The Home is in charge of a matron and a teacher, both of whom are admirably fitted for their work. The health of the children has been excellent.

Receipts from all sources from May 1, 1897, to May 1, 1898, have been \$2,174.93. This sum is insufficient for the current expenses. A floating debt of about \$800 is being carried, which represents partly the outlay for refurnishing and partly the accumulation of arrears during two years.

Special attention is called to the fact that many of the contributions received from the Diocese have come from struggling missionary parishes. In one of these a guild of girls was formed for the purpose of working for the Home, and in others the children in the Sunday Schools gave their offerings. A few parishes sent gifts of books, toys, clothing, etc., at Christmas.

In the near future the Board of Governors hope to add to its membership representatives from the faithful laity of neighboring parishes, who would be willing to aid in the management. With this end in view they have arranged for a reception at the Home on Thursday, June 2d, to which they cordially invite the clergy and those members of their parishes who can and will aid the progress of this work. Carriages will take the visitors to the present Home and to the new site. The Board feels assured that a personal examination will do much to create or stimulate an interest in this most important work.

Resolved, That Paragraph II., Section xvi. of Rule of Order 3 be amended so as to read: "Of Hospitals and other charitable institutions of the Diocese."

Mr. Francis C. Bowen offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That any member of the Convention may be permitted to hand to the Secretary of the Convention, the name of any person to be voted for as a member of the Standing Committee, and as a Delegate to the General Convention, on the day previous to the election.

The resolution was not adopted.

On motion of Mr. R. F. STEVENS, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to print five hundred (500) copies of the Constitution and Canons for distribution.

The Convention adjourned at 4.85 P. M.

By unanimous consent of the house, the Rev'd W. W. Holley, D. D., offered the following alteration in the Constitution:

"There shall be a Convention of the Church in this Diocese on the first Tuesday in May in each year, to be held where the Ecclesiastical Authority appoints."

The amendment was approved by a majority of the Convention.

The minutes of the first day of the session were read and approved.

The Archdeacon of Jersey City read his report. (See Appendix to the Episcopal Address.)

The Archdeacon of Newark read his report. (See Appendix to the Episcopal Address.)

#### The Rev'd F. B. REAZOR read the

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark, May 25th, 1898.

Your Board respectfully report as follows:

That it has held eight meetings during the past Conventional year. That twenty-three missions have been, in some measure, maintained by the appropriations from the Missionary funds of the Diocese made pursuant to the resolution of the last Convention, which authorized the raising and the disbursement of a sum not exceeding five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars, which sum was to be raised by what is now well known as the apportionment plan.

While the reports of the two Archdeacons notice great faithfulness and persistent activity in their mission districts there seems to be no call for especial mention except in the two following instances, viz., the work of Rev'd Appleton Granniss at Little Falls (where a lot has been given, on which a church is soon to be erected by funds raised within the Archdeaconry of Newark), and the work of the Rev'd James A. McCleary, at Leonia, where, with the faithful coöperation of Mr. Charles Malcolm Douglas, a lay reader, the work of the Church has been greatly advanced by the building and the dedication of a house of worship.

A list of the several missions and the clergy in charge is appended, together with the annual statement of the Treasurer.

This latter subject, as usual, calls for chief notice and attention.

It will be seen that \$4,525.00 have been appropriated to the entire work, and that \$4,687.61 have been actually contributed, out of which about \$750 have been paid on last year's deficiency.

It is time that the Convention should be brought to face squarely the following facts:

- 1. The last Convention elected a Board of six clergymen and six laymen to cooperate with the Bishop in the conduct of the Mission-work of the Diocese.
- 2. It empowered this Board to raise and to appropriate a sum for this purpose not exceeding \$5,000.00.
- 3. It endorsed and ordered, very specifically, the apportionment-plan for raising this amount.

On the strength of these facts the Board met in June, 1897, and, with every assurance of a general, if not a unanimous support of the Diocese's own plan, it appropriated \$4,525.00 among the several stations, i. e. \$475.00 less than the allowed maximum.

Now, at the end of the Conventional year, it is obliged to report back to the body which created and empowered it, that it lacks \$1,027.32 of the amount it was fully authorized to appropriate for this purpose, and \$552.32 less than the amount actually appropriated. In full view of these facts, and in the face of these unhappy conditions, your Board is compelled to call your attention to the fact that it has not received the full support and cooperation of your body; that the promises made have not been wholly kept; that the money voted has not been wholly forthcoming. Therefore, your Board reluctantly concludes that in justice to the faithful and self-sacrificing clergy who are serving their stations, and in simple loyalty to honest business ethics, it cannot undertake to engage enough men to carry on the great work of extending the Church's influence throughout the Diocese, nor yet to maintain work already begun, or that which is of long standing in its claims on Diocesan support.

Your Board begs leave, therefore, to submit the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the present deficiency, \$552.32 be raised on the floor of this Convention by calling for pledges from the parishes herein represented.

Resolved, That this Diocese in Convention assembled, recognizing the paramount obligation and the absolute necessity of maintaining existing work, and of inaugurating new work where it is most needed or asked for, does hereby pledge its unqualified support to its Board of Missions in the prosecution of its labors, and

Resolved, That it gives authority to the same to appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for this purpose for the year now beginning.

Resolved, That the plan of apportionment already in use be re-endorsed, and urged with all insistence, upon all the Churchmen of the Diocese, on whom rests the ultimate responsibility of securing the funds that are needed to uphold and to extend the work of God's Church in this part of it, known as the Diocese of Newark.

### REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE.

The Finance Committee respectfully report that they have considered the various sources of income of the Diocese, and they recommend that an assessment be made for the current year of seven per cent. on the amount of the present salaries of the Clergy, for paying the Bishop's salary, upon all parishes which have not made contributions or given bonds to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, as provided by Canon; and an assessment of three and one-half per cent. on the salaries of the Clergy for the Convention expenses and other liabilities. The expenses of the Convention will necessarily be somewhat greater this year. Among other items, the expenses attending the meeting of the General Convention, which meets in October, must be provided for.

The Committee find that many parishes are in arrears for Convention expenses, and as many of them find it almost if not quite impossible to meet this obligation, it is recommended that the Treasurer be authorized and empowered to adjust and compromise with such parishes as appear on Treasurer's schedule to be in arrears for Convention expenses.

They also report that there is a mortgage of \$5,000 on the Episcopal residence, which will this year be materially reduced, but from present indications not entirely satisfied.

They further report that but \$400 has been paid to Mr. HRNRY HAVES on account of the indebtedness to him of \$3,242.71, reported last year, and which amount had been

advanced for payment of interest on the mortgage of \$5,000 on the Episcopal residence and for repairs, and as the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund were by last Convention directed to pay the interest on the mortgage of the Episcopal residence which was then due or that hereafter may become due, this Committee suggests that they now be requested to pay Mr. Henry Haves from the accrued income, the interest that was advanced and paid by him, amounting to about \$1,600.

The Committee recommend the adoption of the follow-

ing resolutions:

Resolved, That an assessment be made for the current year of seven per cent. on the amount of the present salaries of the Clergy, for paying the Bishop's salary, upon all parishes which have not made contributions or given bonds to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, as provided by the Canon; and an assessment of three and one-half per cent. on the amount of the salaries of the Clergy for the Convention expenses and other liabilities.

Resolved, That the Treasurer of the Diocese be authorized to adjust and compromise with such parishes as appear on the Treasurer's schedule to be in arrears for Conven-

tion expenses.

Resolved, That the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund be requested to pay to Mr. Henry Haves, from the accrued income, the interest that was advanced and paid by him on the mortgage on the Episcopal residence, amounting to about sixteen hundred (\$1,600) dollars.

The Tellers reported, and the Rev'd WILLIAM W. DAVIS was declared elected a Clerical Deputy to the General Convention. A ballot was taken to elect the fourth Clerical Deputy to the General Convention and the Tellers retired to count the votes.

Mr. ALFRED MILLS, for the Committee on State Legislation, reported progress in conjunction with the Committee on Civil Legislation, and asked that the Committee be continued.

The Committee was continued.

The Rev'd WILLIAM A. WASSON moved the following preamble and resolutions:

WHEREAS, The Kingdom of Spain, by the long record of barbarity and injustice that has characterized her government of the island of Cuba, has proved herself morally unfit to administer the affairs of that colony,

Resolved, That we, the delegates of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark, in Convention assembled, express our deep sympathy with the liberty-loving people of Cuba in their patient and heroic efforts to throw off the oppressive yoke of Spanish misrule, and to establish a free and independent government of their own.

Resolved, Further, that we heartily commend the President and Congress of the United States in intervening by force after having failed by peaceful negotiations to secure to the people of Cuba a government consistent with Christian civilization and the fundamental rights of man.

On motion of the Rev'd John G. Ewens, the preamble and resolutions were laid on the table.

On motion of Mr. HENRY HAYES, it was

Resolved, That the thanks of the Convention are hereby tendered to the authorities of Christ Church, East Orange, for generous accommodation furnished, and especially to the Ladies' Aid Association for their courteous attention to the members of the Convention.

The Tellers reported, and the Rev'd Wm. W. Holley, D. D., was declared elected as the fourth Clerical Deputy to the General Convention.

Dr. HOLLEY declined the previous election as a Supplementary Clerical Deputy.

A ballot was taken to elect the fourth Supplementary Clerical Deputy to the General Convention and the Tellers retired to count the votes.

On motion of the Rev'd GEORGE S. BENNITT it was

Resolved, That the Board of Missions be hereby authorized to reduce the amount apportioned by the present system of percentages upon such parishes as in their judgment are unable to meet the full amount required.

On the motion of the Rev'd Mr. BENNITT it was

Resolved, That the Treasurer of the Diocese be instructed to pay out of the Convention Fund the usual amount to the Bishop's Chaplain.

The Rev. WM. M. HUGHES, D. D., moved that all reference to the motion concerning the war with Spain be expunged from the minutes, and offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That this Convention hereby expresses its deep and profound confidence in the present Administration of the United States in both the motives and methods which have marked the present conflict with Spain, and that the Convention expresses its gratification at the remarks of the Bishop in the opening parts of his Episcopal Address.

After discussion Dr. HUGHES withdrew his motions, and on motion of the Rev. W. W. HOLLEY, D. D., it was unanimously

Resolved, That this Convention adopts as its own, the the language of the Bishop as expressed in his Address on the subject of the present war.

The Tellers reported, and the Rev'd F. B. CARTER was declared elected a Supplementary Clerical Deputy to the General Convention.

On motion of Mr. ALFRED MILLS the elections of

the Clerical members of the Standing Committee and of the Clerical Deputies and Supplementary Deputies to the General Convention were approved by the Laity, and on motion of the Rev'd George S. Bennitt the elections of the Lay members of the Standing Committee and of the Lay Deputies and Supplementary Deputies to the General Convention were approved by the Clergy.

On motion of the Rev'd ALEXANDER MANN the Convention proceeded to the election of the Board of Missions.

The Bishop announced the reappointment of the Rev'd WILLIAM P. JENVEY, Rector of St. Paul's Church, Hoboken, as Archdeacon of Jersey City, and of the Rev'd ALEXANDER MANN, Associate Rector of Grace Church, Orange, as Archdeacon of Newark,

The minutes of the second day of the session were

read and approved.

After the singing of Hymn 32, followed by prayers and the benediction of the Bishop, the Convention, at 4.45 P. M., adjourned sine die.

### THE NINETEENTH ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

# Rt. Rev. Thomax A. Starkey, D. D.

#### BISHOP OF THE DIOCESE.

## BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND LAITY:

By God's blessing we meet once more in our Diocesan Convention; let me extend to you the affectionate greetings which are none the less real and genuine because repeated year by year.

We meet to-day, not as in the past with the silence of peace over and around us, but amid the clamors of war forced upon us, as we believe, not by the promptings of ambition or the heats of a passionate resentment, but by the all-compelling obligations of humanity. Let us hope that these high thoughts and conceptions of duty may animate and control the minds and hearts of our people to the end; for so will they secure, as they would deserve to do, the respect and admiration of mankind. It is not possible for the Church to evade or ignore conditions like

these which confront us to-day, however small her responsibility may be for their existence. Patriotism and the duty which every man owes to his country are not obligations confined merely to the domain of secular affairs; they are moral duties also, which need and should have in alliance with them the purifying and refining influences of religion. Let it be then our daily prayer to God that His grace may keep alive in the minds and hearts of our people and of their rulers the restraining instincts of humanity and justice, War is at best a fiery ordeal, to be justified at last by its results. Let us hope that in the present instance these may prove to be a lasting and effectual rebuke to oppression everywhere; and, in the end, the lifting up of at least one debased and unhappy people to a higher ideal of Christian citizenship, its blessings and its responsibilities.

Turning aside from this engrossing theme to the ordinary routine of Diocesan life, let me pay my annual tribute in passing to the memory to those whom God, in the past year, has called to His rest.

Since we last met together three of our American bishops have passed away. Bishop NEWTON, Coadjutor of Virginia, was scarcely known to me, so that I cannot speak of him (as I always wish to do) from personal knowledge. He died on the 28th of May, 1897.

Bishop RULISON, of Central Pennsylvania, was a friend greatly valued by me. He was a man whose scholarly tastes and thoughtful habit of mind in no degree lessened or interfered with the practical activity which marked his administration of a populous,

widespread and difficult Diocese. He died in Germany (whither he had gone seeking relief, scarcely restoration), on the 31st day of August, of the last year.

The Right Rev'd CHARLES TODD QUINTARD, D. D., was an old friend of mine of many years standing. In the War of Secession he had served as a chaplain in the Southern Army; and one of the first co-joint acts of the reunited branches of the Church in the United States after the close of the war, was his consecration to the Bishopric of Tennessee, where he did his work to the end. Bishop QUINTARD will always be remembered, in the South especially, as the one, who, by the contributions he was enabled to secure, revived and made permanent the University at Sewanee, where so many of our Southern clergy have been educated.

Among serious losses sustained during the year must be mentioned, as calling for special regret, that of Dr. Langford, late Secretary of the General Board of Missions. He was a good administrator, a man of sweet temper and most gentle courtesy and was liked, as he well deserved to be, by all.

Only one of our Diocesan clergy died in the course of the past year. The Rev'd Horace S. Bishop, D. D., passed away very suddenly in Lakewood, New Jersey, on the first day of April. He was a man of considerable mental endowments, of decided character, and had many devoted friends. Dr. Bishop will always be remembered as virtually the founder and as actually the Rector for more than a quarter of a century of Christ Church in East Orange.

Of our Missions, one, viz., St. Luke's, Paterson, was erected into a parish on the 24th day of last June. Its former Priest in charge, who had done so much to gather in and organize the people, removed to the West last Winter, and the young parish is now in charge of a new Rector, the Rev'd Mr. Balsley, who has come to us from the adjoining Diocese of Central Pennsylvania.

On the 25th of May, 1897, in company with many of our clergy and in the presence of a congregation which filled the building, I opened the new Church of St. Paul in the city of Paterson. This is one of the larger churches of the Diocese and has accommodation for eight hundred people. The structure is of a dark grey granite, laid in regular courses of rubble masonry. This material, together with the peculiar architectural design, gives a massive and striking effect to the exterior, while the interior possesses the rare advantage (obtained through sacrifice of the nave and aisle arrangement) of affording an uninterrupted view of sanctuary, altar and pulpit for every one in the congregation. Heavy liabilities have been incurred in the erection of this great Church, with its Guild House, but the income of the parish meets all its expenditures, and (as I have reason to hope), gives fair promise of a gradual release from the burden of indebtedness.

Another new church—this one, however, on a very modest scale—was opened by me on April 21st of the present year. I refer to All Saints' Mission Church, Leonia, situated on the line of the Northern New Jersey Railroad, distant about twelve miles from Jersey

City. This mission was begun by the Rev'd Mr, Sherwood, three or four years ago, and is successful. The building and land together cost less than five thousand dollars, and the former, with its stone tower and basement, is more than usually pleasing and Church-like. I owe a great deal in the way of grateful recognition of the results accomplished here to the sagacity and devotion of the Rector of Edgewater, who, for some time past, has had general oversight of the work in Leonia.

St. Thomas' Mission, at Lyndhurst, distant about a mile and a quarter from parish church of Rutherford, was originated and the small chapel erected by the late Rector of that town. The growth of the immediate neighborhood is slow, and at his own suggestion, I have made over the Mission to the present Rector, to whose charge and oversight it naturally and properly belongs.

The Missions carried on by the Rev'd APPLETON GRANNIS at Essex Fells and Little Falls are both very promising. In the first named, which was originally looked upon as the place of a summer congregation only or chiefly, there is already a small but steadily increasing attendance of persons residing in the neighborhood all the year round, The conditions at Little Falls are different. Here the congregation is composed mainly of persons who work in the mills. These have shown themselves, under the Missionary's wise and prudent management, both interested and, for the means at their command, liberal. A family in the place has kindly given a lot of ground of good dimensions and well situated, on which a church build-

ing is to be erected in the early part of the summer. The Rev'd Mr. Grannis has already secured nearly all the financial means required for the accomplishment of this desirable end.

The subject of Diocesan and Domestic Missions has always been (as those who hear me know) one which lies near my heart, and has from the first demanded and secured much of my thought and attention. To plant a new Mission where none existed before is to establish a new centre of religious and therefore refining influence, and one which (if the site of the new church or chapel be judiciously chosen) will add new strength to the Body from and by whose Divine Life all such efforts are continually generated. of the utmost importance that every church should be easily accessible to those whom it seeks to influence. There are occasionally communities so placed and conditions so peculiar that we can afford to wait patiently for the slowly growing strength and the hoped for outcome of our efforts; but as a rule all the conditions should be weighed carefully before the venture is made.

In the year just passed, one hundred and seventytwo persons were confirmed in the different Missions of the Diocese. I do not include in this summary those who were confirmed in Mission Churches or Chapels which are under the care of parishes and are virtually chapels of ease.

The Charitable Institutions of our Diocese are steadily growing in scope and influence, especially the two hospitals. St. Barnabas is increasing its work and reputation year by year and has granted diplomas to a

class of thirteen trained nurses graduated a fortnight ago. Christ Hospital, Jersey City, is about to enlarge its accommodations and income together by erecting in the course of the summer a new wing which will be largely used for the accommodation of pay patients. This addition will cost twenty-five thousand dollars, which is already secured.

I may remind the members of the Convention here that at the session one year ago, Arthur's Home in Summit, which is mainly an orphanage in its character and purpose, was accepted as having Diocesan standing and endorsement. Since then a lot of 4 or 5 acres near Summit has been given to the Trustees, and on this piece of ground—which is very favorably situated for health, and has beautiful surroundings—it is proposed, as soon as funds are in hand, to begin the partial erection of a permanent building for the Home.

To meet the expenditures which these various instrumentalities (Missions and Charities) involve, constant efforts are needed. Our Diocese, as must be borne in mind, although comparatively strong in the number of its churches, its clergy and communicants, is territorily small, and could not, as a whole, be considered wealthy. In our three more considerable cities there are comparatively few persons belonging to the Church who are the possessors of large wealth. Those of our parishes which may be considered as favored in this respect are, as a rule, suburban or parishes whose limits are outside of cities. We have numbers certainly, and our contributions to various Church objects, as the aggregate appears in the Jour-

nals of Convention, are large. But in this aggregate are included year after year not only the current outlay for parish expenses, together with many contributions to charities which make their annual appeal to us, but large sums which have been made in recent years for the erection of many large and some costly churches and other buildings, for part of which some of our parishes are more or less in debt. It must be said, however, that after all allowance has been made for occasional errors in judgment, there is, on the whole, very substantial gain and the Church has been made immensely stronger. This strength is permanent and its influence will be felt in all the future, long after the occasional and temporary inconveniences and anxieties of the present are passed away and forgotten.

As, by the thoughtful kindness of my brethern of the laity (for which I take this opportunity to offer my sincere and loving thanks) I was enabled last year to attend the meetings of the Lambeth Conference, it may be proper for me to say a few words on the subject of that body, its aims and what it succeeded in accomplishing. A feeling of suspicion was awakened in this country (by whom I know not) during the session of the Conference that a purpose existed on the part of some its members to bring about the corporate unity or solidarity of the entire Anglican Communion under the Patriarchal authority of the Archbishop of Canterbury. If any such visionary thought was present, it never took tangible shape, nor could it have found a respectable number of supporters in any of the different branches of the Church

represented in the Conference. The very principle upon which the Reformation in England based and justified its action was the independence of all National Churches. There was nothing in the spirit of those who came together at Lambeth antagonistic to or inconsistent with this principle. The Conference accepted for its head without demur the one who represented its most ancient and honored See; just as the earlier councils did when they chose as the one to preside over their deliberations the head of the Church's most ancient and venerated Patriarchate.

The work of the Conference, because it represented Churches living under differing relations to the civil law in their respective nationalities and because it was not a Council (and therefore, had no canonical authority), could only minister to the sense of unity and provide for its maintenance." It did this effectually and proved to all who were present, if any among them needed such proof, that all the branches of this ancient Church in Kingdom or Republic, State or Colony, are in substantial unity, and devoted to one single work. It may seem to some persons that a result of this kind only was reached at the cost of a large and disproportionate expenditure. not think so. Any step taken in these days of selfwill and of ever increasing divisions threatening the very existence of the Faith, which tends to bring together those who are of one mind and yet are separated by thousands of leagues of sea and land, and so helps to remind them and us of Christ's prayer and of His reason for the prayer, "That the world may know that thou hast sent Me," increasing our courage

and giving tone to our faith, in my humble judgment justifies itself.

There is more that I would like to say, dear brethren, but let this suffice. And so commending you as I do from my heart to the love of our Gracious Father in Heaven, and of our Lord Jesus Christ,

# Reports.

I have received the following reports from the Reverend, the Archdeacons of the two Archdeaconries:

THE ARCHDEACON OF JERSEY CITY.

To the Right Rev'd Thomas A. Starkey, D. D., Bishop of Newark:

My Dear Bishop:—The Missions of this Archdeaconry have been instant in season and out of season in all good works during the past Convention year. Steady and substantial progress has marked the year. All are stronger than when my last report was made.

St. Luke's, Paterson, has ceased to be a Mission. It is now a Parish. It has ceased to receive support from

the Missionary Board. It is self-supporting.

Calvary Church, Bayonne, will also cease to receive aid from the Board. One year ago it relinquished \$100 of the stipend of \$250 it had been receiving. From this time on it relinquishes all. It has been going on from strength unto strength. During the past year it has acquired a building lot 100 ft by 105 ft, valued at \$3,500, but which it secured for \$2,400; \$1,650 of this is in hand and will shortly be paid on the lot. In due time a suitable building will be erected. A Parish House and Rectory will follow. Wonders are being done in this missionary parish. A few years ago it was considered almost hopeless, but under the wise, patient, vigorous leadership of the Rev'd HORATIO W. MAGUIRE, it has become one of the most promising points in this portion of the Diocese. There are 220 Communicants. There have been 23 baptisms; 14 have been confirmed. There are 203 in the Sunday School. The offerings have been over \$8,000.

St. Agnes' Mission, Jersey City, has been kept in closer touch with the Parish Church, St. Mark's, than in past

years. The report of its work is blended with that of St. Mark's. Twenty have been prepared for confirmation. The Communicants number 100. This Mission receives no support from the Diocese; it is supported entirely by St. Mark's, Jersey City; the Clergy of that Parish supplying all the services.

The Mission Church of the Epiphany, Allendale, has made substantial progress since the last report. It is much nearer a self-supporting condition than ever before. A number of improvements of a minor nature have been made. The last remaining indebtedness, amounting to only \$350, will soon be met. It will then be entirely free of debt. The Rev'd WILLIAM ERNEST ALLEN, Priest in charge, reports 75 Communicants; 7 baptisms; 13 confirmed; 45 in the Sunday School; and offerings amounting to \$1,330.

Holy Trinity Mission, Hillsdale, is making secure provision for the increase of population which must certainly soon come to the village. Its really fine property is nearly paid for. During the past year a chancel and vestry room have been added to the chapel building; a furnace placed in the basement; an organ purchased; and additions made to the furnishings. These improvements have cost \$537, and are all provided for. There are 21 Communicants; there has been 1 baptism; 2 were confirmed; there are 25 in the Sunday School. The offerings at the services have been \$307, making a total of \$844. The Rev'd Arthur Whitaker freely gives his very efficient services.

The same report must be made substantially of the neighboring Mission of St. Paul, at Montvale. It is also ready for the coming population. It has acquired property when property could be had. This is nearly paid for. Only \$450 remains unpaid. The Rev'd ARTHUR WHITAKER, with his patient energy, will soon cancel that. There are 14 Communicants; there have been 3 baptisms;

the offerings and donations have amounted to \$380; there are 35 in the Sunday School. This Mission receives nothing from the Missionary Board.

The Rev'd Mr. WHITAKER gives spiritual ministrations to a number of other villages inthis locality. For this he receives a stipend of \$100 from the Board of Missions.

St. John's Mission, Nordhoff, continues under the maternal care of the Parish Church of St. Paul's, Englewood; the Rev'd George F. Flichtner, Rector. It is doing that which so many of our Missions are doing, holding the ground for the day of larger things. There are 55 Communicants; 2 have been baptized; 1 confirmed; there are 56 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$204.

All Saints' Mission, Leonia, has done all I expressed the hope it would do a year ago, and much more. last report a chapel building, one of the most beautiful and complete in the Diocese, has been erected and occupied. It was formally opened by the Bishop on the evening of the 21st of April. Congratulatory addresses were made by the Bishop, the Rev'd Mr. FLICHTNER and the Archdeacon. A class of 13 was confirmed. Three of these were from Fort Lee. The service, conducted by the Rev'd Mr. Douglas, his son, Mr. Chas. M. Douglas, Lay Reader for the Mission, and the Rev'd I. A. McCleary, of Edgewater, Priest in charge, was most reverent and fitting. A congregation was present which filled pews, aisles and vestibule. The Church property is worth fully \$5,000. On this there is an indebtedness of \$1,500. This is so held that it will not burden the Mission. Indeed, the interest upon it is less than the rent the Mission has paid for the public hall in which past services had been held. much praise cannot be given the faithful people of the Mission, the Lay Reader and the Priest in charge. extend their profound thanks to their friends throughout

the Diocese for most substantial help. The Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary enabled them to purchase a Bishop's chair, Clergy stalls, pulpit and prayer desk, St. John's Church, Boonton, gave a suitable altar. Others have given lectern, litany desk, altar cross and altar hang-The hope is that the services of Mr. Douglas, who is soon to be ordered Deacon, may be continued. will be possible if the Board of Missions can appropriate \$200 towards his support. The Mission now receives \$50. If the \$150 which Calvary Church, Bayonne, will relinquish from this time on, could be given to this Mission. the desired end would be reached and no additional burden be placed on the Diocese. It would be a calamity if Mr. Douglas should be compelled to leave because of lack of support. There are 64 Communicants: there have been 19 baptisms; 10 have been confirmed; there are 67 in the Sunday School, and the offerings have been \$2,564. In addition to this, various ones of the Clergy and the Laity have given \$530 and the Woman's Auxiliary, \$112.

The Mission of the Good Shepherd, Fort Lee, is also under the priestly charge of the Rev'd J. A. McCleary. A day of much better things is near at hand. A mortgage amounting to \$800, is on the Church property. The holder of this, very generously offers to take \$500 in satisfaction of it. Mr. McCleary has \$150 of this in hand. He will, doubtless, honor many of you with a call and give you another opportunity to lay up treasure in the Kingdom of Heaven. I bespeak for him a generous response. He receives absolutely nothing for all this hard work. It is a free-will offering of work to the God he loves so well and serves so faithfully. There are 90 Communicants: 14 have been baptized: 7 have been confirmed; there are 67 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$511. Mr. WM. J. BRIDGES is the Lay Reader under the Rev'd Mr. McCleary. This Mission receives \$125 from the Board of Missions.

The Mission of St. John the Divine, Hasbrouck Heights. is having a hard struggle, but it will win in the end. Such generous gifts of property were made it in the very beginning of its existence that it was compelled to enter into obligations which were really heavier than it could carry. But these are being discharged and its burdens are becoming A few years will see them all removed. Seventynine Communicants are on the roll of the Mission: 8 have been baptized; there has been no confirmation, as the last took place near the last Convention; there are 45 in the Sunday School: the offerings have been \$417. Mr.F. DuM. DEVALL, of the General Theological Seminary, is the very efficient Lay Reader, under the immediate direction This Mission receives \$200 from the of the Archdeacon. Board of Missions.

St. Peter's Mission, Clifton, has made most substantial advance in the one year of its existence. Under the leadership of the Rev'd Wm. P. Evans, of St. Mark's Church, Paterson, and Mr. George T. Anderson, as Lay Reader, the lot has been nearly paid for and enough done to warrant the prediction that a chapel building will be erected before the meeting of another Convention. There are 16 Communicants; 3 have been baptized; 9 confirmed; there are 42 in the Sunday School; the offerings and donations have been \$710. No stipend is received from the Board of Missions.

St. Clement's Mission, Hawthorne, is doing well. The Lay Reader, Mr. Wm. A. Long has been advanced to the Diaconate by the Bishop of the Diocese. This has been greatly to the advantage of the Mission. There are 37 Communicants; 10 have been baptized; 3 confirmed; there are 35 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$356. This Mission is under the priestly charge of the Rev'd G. M. Dorwart, Rector of the Church of the Holy Communion, Paterson, and is self supporting.

St. Thomas' Mission, Lyndhurst, is now under the sole charge of the Rev'd Mr. Ladd, of Grace Church, Rutherford. The trolley makes communication so easy between the Mission and the mother Parish that much of ministration which was formerly done in the Mission is now done in the Parish. There are 20 Communicants; 1 has been baptized; 7 have been confirmed; there are 45 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$193.

The Mission Church of the Ascension, Jersey City, is still making its brave and successful fight against many adverse conditions. No Mission in the Diocese has felt the hard times more severely than has it. The members of the Mission are all working people. Nearly everyone earns his daily bread by daily toil for daily wages. Yet it has more than held its own. In addition to meeting its own current expenses with the help of the Board of Missions, \$300 have been laid aside, the result of very hard work, towards the payment of a second \$1,000 on the heavy indebtedness. There are 220 Communicants; 11 were confirmed; 20 were baptized; 221 are in the Sunday School. The offerings have been \$1,512. The Rev'd James Cameron is the Priest in charge; \$350 is appropriated to this Mission.

St. Matthew's Church, Jersey City, is as truly missionary ground as any Mission in the Diocese. The faithful Priest in charge, the Rev'd WILLIAM C. MAGUIRE, is doing patient work which is bearing encouraging fruit. The future of this mother Parish of the city can never bring back what has been lost. The surrounding conditions will not admit of it. Yet much good can be done, and the work should receive the cordial support of the Diocese; \$300 is appropriated for this work.

The Mission at Centerville, Bergen Point, is under the direct charge of the Rev'd Mr. Kirkus of Trinity Church, Bayonne. Its report will be embodied in the report of the mother Parish. This Mission receives \$75.

The Mission at Lakeview, near Paterson, is ministered to by the Rector of St. Luke's, Paterson. It is still in its day of small things, but the Missions which have heretofore been organized in and about that bustling city of manufactories have been so successful, and have so soon become self-supporting, that larger things may be looked for in this Mission in the near future. It receives \$150 from the Board.

These statements of work and progress in the various missions give but the outward and naked facts. They say nothing of the hard work faithfully done; of the discouragements bravely borne; of the loneliness and isolation manfully endured. The missionaries themselves would be the last to want these spoken of. Their work is for the Lord their God. He knows of these even if men do not. Yet, when such work is done, and is done so bravely and so well, the Diocese should be eagerly willing to give sympathy and support; and never, never for a day should the missionaries be compelled to wait for stipends which, at the best, are far too small—which, at the best, but barely meet their needs.

In the Missions above named there are 1,011 Communicents; 106 have been baptized during the year; 79 have been confirmed; there are 1,006 children under instruction in the Sunday-schools; the contributions have been \$12.021.

Surely, we all have cause to thank God and take courage.

### THE ARCHDEACONRY OF NEWARK.

To the Rt. Rev'd Thomas A. Starkey, D. D., Bishop of Newark:

The record of the past year in the Archdeaconry of Newark is one of quiet, but faithful, and, on the whole, progressive work.

Trinity Mission, Arlington, where the Rev'd John Keller has now been in charge for some years, is in excellent condition. We have here a most attractive church The well-kept grounds, worth to-day many times their original cost, and the neat church building, kept in excellent repair and freshly painted, testify to the pride which the Missionary and the people alike take in the Mission. Hearty services and large congregations characterize this Mission. In spite of the fact that Arlington is sect ridden to an unusual degree, there being twelve places of worship for its population of 5,000, our Mission is steadily gaining in strength. The interior of the Church has been recently and tastefully decorated by the loving labors of the Missionary and two of his people. During the past year 13 have been baptized and 10 confirmed. There is no debt upon the Mission.

St. Mark's, Mendham, in charge of the Rev'd Levi Johnston, is in much the same condition as in former years. There is little or no growth in Mendham, and aside from ministering to the spiritual needs of the summer visitors, about all that our Missionary can do is to strengthen the throngs that remain. A new church has been built at Bernardsville, some five miles away, in the Diocese of New Jersey. How much, if any, support this

will draw away from our Mission at Mendham remains to be determined.

The Mission of the Good Shepherd, Hamburgh, and St. Thomas', Vernon, still rejoice in the pastoral care of the Rev'd Joseph H. Smith. Sunday after Sunday, in heat and cold, in rain or snow, our Missionary drives the six miles of rough road between these two little villages in the Sussex hills. In places like these, little growth would naturally be expected, and when we recall that in these two missions, during the past year, 20 persons have been confirmed, the fact speaks more eloquently than words for the zeal and energy of the Priest in charge. At both Hamburgh and Vernon the church buildings are in good repair and the grounds are well kept.

The interior of the very attractive Mission Church of St. Peter, Washington, has been further beautified during the past year by a new altar, pulpit and sedilia. The Missionary in charge, the Rev'd A. C. FLIEDNER, reports 46 families and parts of families connected with this Mission, and \$605 contributed by the people for the support of the work. One of the most encouraging features of this Mission is the Sunday School of 80 children.

The Woman's Auxiliary of this Mission has, since June 1st, expended \$39 in gifts to St. Barnabas Hospital and the Comfort Club of the Diocese of Newark.

St. Luke's, Phillipsburg, under the efficient rectorship of the Rev'd N. H. Martin, continues to grow and strengthen. Thirty-five baptisms and twenty-four confirmed during the past year attest the vigorous work that is being done here.

The Church in Phillipsburg is, as some of you know, unfortunately situated, at one end of the valley. The place is growing rapidly on the hill, and there is now a population of about five thousand on the hill and some two miles distant from the church. As a result of this, families and especially children, drift away from the Church when

they remove from the valley to the hill. To stop this drift effectually we need a Mission Chapel on the hill. During the past Lent, services were held in that quarter of the town on Friday evenings, with an average attendance of eighty. It is hoped that a lot may be secured in a central location on the hill, and a Mission Chapel built there in the near future. The Missionary assures me that a good lot could be purchased for \$600, and if the lot were once secured he would have little difficulty in obtaining money enough to build the Chapel.

At Christ Mission, Stanhope, we have a Deacon, the Rev'd George P. Armstrong, who is doing faithful work there, and has recently taken charge of St. Andrew's Mission, Hopatcong, which has been served hitherto by a Lay Reader. The people at Stanhope are earnest and devoted and do what they can, but they are a feeble folk

and the place grows slowly.

St. Peter's, Mt. Arlington, is at present without regular services. A Sunday School is maintained there, and until recently there was a Sunday service by a Lay Reader, but he has resigned and is about to remove from the vicinity. It is hoped that satisfactory arrangements can be made with the aid of Churchmen who are members of the Mt. Arlington Club, so that Church services may be maintained during the summer months by a resident clergyman.

In January of this year the Rev'd Geo. C. Graham, Jr., took charge of St. Paul's Mission, Butler, in connection with the work at Pompton. When Mr. Graham began his work the few Church people at Butler were thoroughly discouraged. For several months there had been no regular Sunday services, and the Mission was practically defunct. Now, as a result of five months' labors, Mr. Graham reports a membership of 65, 20 of whom are communicants; an average attendance of 35 at the Sunday services and a Sunday School of 25 children. The Mission has also

pledged \$100 towards the support of the Missionary and nearly \$310 towards a Church building. The outlook for Butler is more promising than it has ever been. The Missionary tells me that, through the kindness of a friend of the Mission, a good lot of ground, 100x150 feet, located in the central portion of the town, can be bought for the nominal price of \$200. Here is an excellent opportunity for some generous Churchman to give most timely and effectual aid to the cause of Diocesan Missions by purchasing this lot for the Mission at Butler.

St. James' Mission, Hackettstown, which was formerly served by the Lay Reader, has been, during the past year in charge of the Rev'd W. M. MITCHAM. It has been a hard struggle for this Mission to support a resident Priest, but it has been done. There are only 31 communicants in the Mission, but all are earnest and devoted. During the past year the people have given a little over \$1,000 for the support of the Church. The Sunday School has doubled since Mr. MITCHAM took charge.

St. George's Mission, Maplewood, in charge of the Rev'd H. K. Bicker, has grown steadily during the past year. This Mission receives no aid from the Diocese. It reports: St. George's Maplewood.—Stone church, fully equipped; value, \$9,000; bonded debt of \$2,500; paid balance of floating debt, past year, \$1,000; baptism of adults, 6; children, 6; confirmations, 9; Communicants, 75.

St. James', Knowlton, and Zion, Belvidere, continue in charge of the Rev'd Geo. H. Young. The Church at Knowlton reports 37 Communicants and a Sunday School of 33. The receipts for the year, exclusive of aid from the Board of Missions, were \$337.60.

At Zion, Belvidere, there are 81 Communicants and the offerings for the year amounted to \$285.76. There is little or no growth in these old villages, but there is, as the figures quoted show, a faithful remnant of Church people to whom the Missionary ministers. It should also be stated

that, in addition to the regular services held at Belvidere and Knowlton, the Missionary ministers to the Church people scattered throughout the northern part of Warren county, visiting the sick, giving the sacraments and burying the dead.

St. Alban's, Newark, in charge of the Rev'd Elliot White, is to-day one of the strongest Missions of the Archdeaconry of Newark. During the past year 23 Communicants have been added, and the Communicant list is now 118, as against 29 four years ago. The number of baptisms (42) is extraordinarily large considering the size of Parish, showing the great need of Mission work in this part of Newark. Five hundred dollars have been paid on the Church debt, and it is hoped by the Priest in charge that at the next Convention of the Diocese he may be able to report the church and lot entirely paid for.

At St. Peter's Mission, Essex Falls, services have been regularly maintained throughout the year by the Rev'd Appleton Grannis, Priest in charge. This Mission, which has been from its origin self-supporting, continues to flourish. Six have been confirmed during the year. The receipts from all sources have amounted to \$1,660, of which \$800 has been applied to the reduction of the mortgage indebtedness.

In my report of last year I mentioned that Mr. Grannis was conducting Thursday afternoon services in the village of Little Falls, some eight miles from Essex Fells. These services, together with a Sunday School, have been regularly maintained, and the Missionary reports an average attendance of sixty persons. Eight have been confirmed during the year, and the Sunday School numbers 20.

As a result of Mr. Grannis' faithful and efficient work the hopes expressed last year have been more than fulfilled. A handsome lot of ground, 75x185 ft. on one of the best streets of the village has been given to the Mission by the Beattie Manufacturing Co., of Little Falls, and \$2,100 have been subscribed towards a church building, of which \$1,500 has been already paid. Plans have been approved and contracts signed for an attractive church to be built of field stone and to cost, exclusive of furniture, \$2,700. Ground was broken on May 11th, and it is hoped to have the building completed in August. Pews have been given by St. Luke's Church, Montclair, and the Chancel furniture is the gift of the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Results like this are most encouraging, and ought, it seems to me, to rouse us all to more earnest working and more generous giving for the cause of Diocesan Missions.

The interior has been re-decorated in a Churchly manner by a friend of the Mission; the Sanctuary has been remodelled for a reverent service; an exceptionally handsome altar, for a mission, is the gift of Dr. A. E. Martin; a small room for vesting has been built partly by the male communicants themselves, and paid for by voluntary subscription,

A fund, known as the "Future Fund," has been started with a view to building a church in the near future.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

In making this, their thirty-second annual report, the Trustees of the Hospital of St. Barnabas are happy to state that during the last year the Hospital has fulfilled every just expectation of those who are responsible for its management.

The various reports that are submitted herewith are conclusive on that point. The Hospital wards and rooms, with the exception of some beds in the children's ward, have been well filled most of the time, the average number of patients being fifty-eight, with a total of seven hundred and eighty-nine during the year. In the out-patient department eighteen hundred and forty-two patients have been treated, and five thousand and eight clinical visits have been made to the Hospital. Of the large number who have availed themselves of the advantages which the Hospital offers, by far the greater number have been free patients. Of the average of fifty-eight who have, as stated above, occupied the wards and rooms, not more than ten have been pay patients.

The Medical Board, the Sisters of St. Margaret and the Superintendent of Nurses, with her band of nurses, have continued their labors with all their accustomed zeal and fidelity; and to them the efficiency of the Hospital is largely due. They have left nothing to be desired, which it has been in their power to contribute to the comfort and well-being of patients and the general excellence of the institution which they manage so well, in its various departments.

While the physical welfare of the patients has been so efficiently looked after, their spiritual needs have not been forgotten. The Chapel services, and the personal ministrations which have been possible, have been faithfully maintained by the excellent Chaplain who serves the Hospital

under the appointment of the Bishop of the Diocese. To the Guilds of St. Barnabas and St. Catherine, and to the different parishes and individuals who have in various ways contributed to the expenses of the Hospital and to the comfort of the patients, we extend our heartiest thanks. Their work and labor of love have extended over many years, and we feel sure that they can be depended on to continue their active interest in the future.

The Hospital of St. Barnabas, as has been intimated above, and as its title shows, is a *free* hospital. Pay patients are indeed received, and encouraged to avail themselves of its ministrations; and in the course of a few years their number has increased to such a degree that we can ordinarily depend upon the moneys received from them to pay all salaries and wages that have to be paid.

Without an increase in the number of rooms available for the purpose, however, it is not to be expected that a larger income from this source than that which we now receive can be realized. The limit has been reached; and the number of pay patients is and must necessarily be as small as it is at present, in comparison with that of those who are received without cost to themselves or their friends.

After making allowance for the sums received from patients, from the city of Newark, and from interest on the endowment fund, it appears that about one-half of the money required to meet expenses must come from the voluntary contributions of those interested in the work in which we are engaged.

The sources to which we have mainly looked in the past, and to which we must still look for these contributions, are offerings in the churches, the efforts of the Guild and the collections made by its soliciting committee.

Unfortunately, every year, thus far, there has remained a deficit of about \$3,000 which has had to be provided for. This year the Treasurer is able, for the first time in some years, to report that all house bills have been paid to April 1st; but the deficit remains in the form of a note which has been given in order to secure that result.

To meet this emergency, appeals must be made to the charitable for increased contributions for current expenses and for the endowment fund. The latter fund now amounts to \$31,100, an addition of \$3,000 having been made to it during the last year. A bequest of \$3,000 for this fund has been made recently, and when paid in will further increase it. We are convinced that one of the best ways of providing for the needs of the Hospital is to endeavor to increase the endowment to such an amount that the income from it will suffice to cover any such deficiency as that which we now report. The Board of Trustees, therefore, ventures to ask for gifts and bequests to be set apart for this special purpose. It is the intention of the Board to send out a regularly appointed collector, who shall be responsible to the Board and act upon its authority, to solicit contributions for current expenses from the business community and from persons not reached by the soliciting committee of the Guild, the purpose being in no way to interfere with the work of that committee, but to supplement it. By this means it is hoped that the character of the Hospital and its needs will be more widely known in the community, and increased interest awakened in its noble work.

While mentioning the needs of the Hospital, we call attention to the urgent demand which has, for a long time, pressed upon us, for a properly constructed mortuary chapel. The subject has, from time to time, occupied the attention of the Board; and some time ago plans were devised for such a building, intended also to include

a room for *post mortem* examinations, and a pathological laboratory. It has been impossible to carry it out, on account of lack of funds. Surely the friends of the Hospital of St. Barnabas will not suffer it to be much longer without this most necessary building.

We call attention to the commencement of the Training School for Nurses, which will take place on May 12th, at eight P. M. The exercises will be conducted in Hospital Chapel. Thirteen graduates will receive their diplomas, eight of whom were trained by the Sisters before the establishment of the Training School, and have now returned and passed with credit the necessary examinations.

We desire to acknowledge here our indebtedness for long continued services to Dr. Lott Southard, who has been for many years president of the Medical Board. He is now, to our great regret, seriously ill. We ask for him the sympathy and prayers of all friends of the Hospital.\*

During the past year two benefactors of the Hospital have been called to their rest.

Mr. William C. Wallace passed away on the nineteenth of March, at the advanced age of ninety-four. Some years ago, he gave to the Board of Trustees for the use of the Hospital a large tract of land in what was then a suburb of Newark; and his benefaction has been, and is still, of great assistance.

The Rev'd Dr. Horace S. Bishop, who died recently, was a member of the building committee when the Hospital building was erected, and never lost his interest in the institution. We have learned that in his will, recently recorded, the sum of \$3,000 was bequeathed to the Hospital to endow a bed to be called the "Mary Harrison Condit Bishop bed."

"They rest from their labors, and their works do follow them."

The bed may be named by the donor, and will be suitably designated, if desired, and the donor may have a patient constantly in the Hospital, subject to the approval of the Medical Staff, with the privilege of directing, by last will or other declaration properly attested, in whom the right of nominating such patient shall continue. Such endowments shall be properly invested, and the interest only applied to the support of beds, unless the donor shall otherwise direct, in which case these privileges shall not be affected thereby.

Name or designation of bed at the option of contributor who is entitled to have a patient in the Hospital as aforesaid, during continuance of contribution.

Contributions thus made go into the general "Sustentation Fund," which is expended wholly for the care and comfort of the patients.

#### FORMS OF DEVISE AND BEQUEST.

I give and bequeath to The Hospital of St. Barnabas, in Newark, New Jersey, the sum of......dollars, (for the Endowment Fund) or (to be applied to the uses of the Hospital).

## ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

Patients are admitted between 9 A. M. and 5 o'clock P. M. They must apply in person at the office of the Hospital, when they will be examined by the House Physician and Surgeon on duty, and admitted by the Superintendent. If unable to apply in person they are required to present a written diagnosis from a physician in good standing. In case of emergency, patients may be admitted at any hour of the day or night.

No patient suffering under any infectious or contagious disease or delirium tremens will be admitted, nor any whose case does not require the special benefits of the Hospital. Only a very limited number of incurable patients can be admitted.

Out-patients treated on week days, excepting holidays, at 12 o'clock.

Gynæcological out-patients on Mondays only, at 11 o'clock. These clinics are for the poor only.

#### RATES OF BOARD.

Board of patients in general wards for those who are able to pay is \$6.00 per week for adults, and \$2.00 per week for children.

The board in the private rooms is from \$12.00 to \$25.00 a week, which does not include the surgeon's fees.

#### VISITING DAYS.

The Sisters in charge of the Hospital desire to say that they will be happy to see as many as wish to visit the institution every Thursday, between 10 and 11 A. M. and 2 and 5 P. M.

Charging the outlay for current expenses to those patients occupying beds, the cost per day for each patient has been 93 cents.

Christ Hospital, in 1898, commemorates the Twenty-fifth Anniversary of its founding. It therefore recalls the way in which its work has progressed during the years of a quarter of a century. Giving the statistics of every third year to the year just ended, we have:

The annual expenses in the Old Hospital were about six thousand dollars.

The annual expenses in the New Hospital are about fifteen thousand dollars.

It will thus appear that the work has gone steadily onward, extending its benefits to greater numbers, and when to this we add that three-quarters of the patients are treated free, and this ratio has been maintained for many years, all will recognize the increasing need for donations and subscriptions to maintain and continue so large and liberal a work. Last year the free patients were 465, this year 526.

The Treasurer's reports show that over \$16,000 has been received. Of this, over \$1,200 was for interest on the bonded debt, and \$2,000 being a subscription for the Hospital extension, leaving our receipts through regular channels over \$13,000. The interest from endowments has been about \$3,000. Our outstanding indebtedness for current expenses was found in October last to be about six thousand dollars. This had been accumulating for about three years, or about two thousand dollars a year, A determined effort was made to raise this amount, and the friends of the Hospital came most generously to its relief, so that all indebtedness for current expenses, up to the celebration of the Twenty-fifth Anniversary of the Hospital, February 1st, 1898, have been discharged in full.

St. Mary's Guild is an auxiliary of the Finance Committee. Thirty thousand dollars debt was incurred upon the building of Christ Hospital, and this Guild provides as far as possible for the interest, and are laboring for the reduction of the principal. Four hundred and sixty Mite Boxes collected from by this Guild have yielded during the year \$1,082.51, and they have added to this by entertainment \$169.69, making in all \$1,252.20. They have also in hand

towards reducing the principal over \$800.

The Abercrombie Guild is an auxiliary to the Council, and assist in every possible way to carry on and strengthen the institution. Thanksgiving week they send out Hungry Bags, and receive them filled with donations of food and money. The response made the past year was especially gratifying, and the Council desire to express their thanks to all who took part in this enterprise. The Guild, however, seek to place on a sure basis the charity work of the Hospital by the endowment of beds. One thousand six hundred dollars has been added this year through the efforts of the "Daisy," which monthly tells its story to hundreds of readers. The total endowment of beds in the Abercrombie Guild is \$42,600.

The Medical Board have been unwearied in their attendance upon their duties. No pains have been spared to make more and more efficient their work, and every means employed to promote and extend it. The Council desire to express the great satisfaction they have in the efforts of the physicians and surgeons to bring to a high standard every department of their work in the insti-

tution.

The Superintendent has continued her oversight of the work during the year. This has enabled her to render more effective every department under her supervision, and to her executive ability we are indebted for most careful management and the advancement of every interest under her care.

The Training School for Nurses is now well established, and the work accomplished is most gratifying to all. Four have graduated during the year, which makes the number of graduates 24. Eleven probationers have been admitted, and there are now 14 pupils.

A new department has been added to the work of the Hospital by Mr. William A. Beardmore, Ph. G., who daily devotes an amply liberal time as Apothecary to Christ Hospital without fee or compensation. His report annexed shows nearly 7,000 prescriptions dispensed by him, and the Council here records grateful appreciation of his valued service.

The Chaplain has visited the sick and dying, and held services in the Chapel and Wards on Sunday afternoons. He has celebrated the Holy Communion on Thursdays and all the chief Festivals of the year, officiated at baptisms and funerals, and held himself ready to minister at any hour of the day or night.

The Executive Committee have been faithful in the general oversight of the institution—meeting monthly, auditing the bills for current expenses, and advising the Superintendent in all matters placed before them.

The Finance Committee have given direction and counsel to the Treasurer in the investment of endowments, and assisted in raising funds for the current expenses. They have supervised the work of Hospital Sunday, which is Quinquagesima, asking offerings from the Churches, which have amounted to \$1,063.52. The endowments are over \$14,000; this, added to those of the Abercrombie Guild, makes the total endowment of beds in Christ Hospital, \$56,600. A legacy of \$5,000, recently left us, and about to be paid in, will place the endowment at \$61,600. The cost of land, buildings and furnishing has been about \$65,000, on which there is the bonded debt of \$30,000. Deduct this from the value of our outlay, and add the value of our endowments, money

in hand towards bonded debt, and subscriptions paid in toward Hospital extension, and we have a cash value at this date of about \$100,000.

The growth of the work of the institution now taxes all our buildings to their fullest capacity. We must enlarge and extend Christ Hospital if it is to meet the demands upon it. Private rooms must be had, adequate quarters for the nurses, and for every department of work increased accommodation. To effect this, the new south wing must be erected. Plans have been prepared for this, and the work is to be immediately entered upon. The subscriptions for Hospital extension last year reported as \$25,000 are to be available for this by permission of the donors, provided we undertake the erection later of the Operating Pavilion and Maternity Wing. We need subscriptions, therefore, to enable us to carry out all our plans; and we ask families to build a Memorial Room or Rooms, and individuals to add to our subscriptions, so that Christ Hospital amply provided for, may go on doing its blessed work for generations to come.

In concluding our report, we are reminded of how God has led us from the first until now. The work was begun, and has been carried on, in faith and prayer, and these have never failed us. We have planned largely, and provided for the care of those of every religion, color and nationality. Our opportunities to-day are greater than ever before, but the work is hindered by its limitations. We, therefore, in faith turn anew to God, and ask Him to pour into the hearts of the people "that most excellent gift of charity," that by faith, prayer and love, Christ Hospital may be able to do its work for the glory of Christ and the benefit of suffering humanity.

#### ENDOWMENT OF BEDS.

- 1. A gift of \$5,000 shall entitle the donor and his successors to nominate a patient to a free bed in perpetuity.
- 2. A gift of \$4,000 shall entitle the donor and one individual successor to nominate a patient to a free bed. When a corporation is the donor, the privilege shall expire in twenty years.
- 8. A gift of \$3,000 shall entitle the donor during life to nominate patients to a free bed. In the case of a corporation the privilege shall expire in fifteen years, except the corporation be a Church, when the privilege shall continue so long as the corporation exists.
- 4. Any person or corporation, being the owner of a \$8,000 bed, may increase their donation to \$4,000 or \$5,000, in which case they shall become thenceforth entitled to the privileges that attach to original donations of those amounts.
- 5. Contributions to the endowment fund of free beds, as above provided for, may be made by installments when the donor shall, in writing, so notify the Treasurer at the time of each payment. So long as the installments so paid in shall not equal the sums required under the preceding sections, the amounts received shall constitute a portion of the general endowment fund, the income of which shall be used for the payment of the current expenses of the Hospital, and no privilege shall accrue to the donor.
- 6. Certificates of the right to nominate patients to use and occupy beds free of charge shall be issued in such form as the Council may prescribe, and shall be signed by the President or Vice-President, and Secretary, who shall also affix the seal of the Corporation.

#### ANNUAL SUPPORT OF BEDS.

The annual charge for the support of an adult bed is three hundred dollars, and for a child's bed, two hundred dollars.

#### ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

- 1. Patients shall be admitted between 9 o'clock A. M. and 5 o'clock P. M. They must apply in person at the office of the Hospital, when they will be examined by the House Physician and Surgeon on duty, and admitted by the Superintendent. If unable to apply in person they shall be visited and examined by the House Physician and Surgeon or a member of the Medical Board. In case of emergency, patients may be admitted at any hour of the day or night.
- 2. Patients may be admitted by the Superintendent after examination as to suitableness by the House Physician and Surgeon, or on the recommendation of any Physician or Surgeon of the Hospital.
- 8. No patient suffering under any infectious or contagious disease shall be admitted, nor any whose case does not require the special benefits of the Hospital; nor shall any patient be admitted whose case is judged to be incurable, unless there be urgent symptoms, which, in the opinion of the attending Physician or Surgeon, are capable of being relieved.

#### RULES.

- 1. St. Katharine's Home is intended to help unmarried girls who have been led astray for the first time, and to shelter them before and after motherhood.
- 2. Application must be made to the Chaplain, or to the Sister in charge, who will investigate each case.
- 3. Applicants must be recommended by trustworthy persons and must bring a certificate of good health from a physician in regular standing.
- 4. Each girl must sign a written promise to remain in the Home for a fixed length of time, to conform to the rules of the house, and to perform such a share of the house and other work as may be assigned her.

#### SECRETARY'S REPORT.

For the year ending October 19th, 1897.

On October 14, 1897, St. Katharine's Home closed its eighth year of work, having been established in 1889. In looking back over the history of the past eight years we find that in no one of them has the work been more encouraging than in the one just past. Encouraging

because the Home has been doing the good work to its utmost capacity, having been filled the entire year, and because the Sister-in-charge reports that the girls who have gone out the past eighteen months, 1? in number, are doing well, with the exception of two, about whom we do not know. Many of them come back to St. Katharine's frequently, and when they go out, carry its influence with them as a better factor in their lives.

One girl who is employed in the Day Nursery in New York is well spoken of, showing how her life at St. Katharine's has fitted her for the work she is now doing. homeless girl came for her week's holiday as she would have gone to her own home, and many come as often as their duties permit. I have dwelt upon this hold the Home has upon the girls and want to emphasise it as it is the answer to many questions, the solution of a great problem. Of course, with the absence of temptation, the good influence of the Home and the comfortable surroundings, it is comparatively easy for these girls to lead good When they go out the real test comes. can speak with knowledge and say that during the past eighteen months 17 girls have gone out and we know positively that 15 of them are doing well, that we know where they are, that the majority came back to the Home, we are giving the practical results of the work. There is no theorising, no sentimentality, it is an accurate statement of cause and effect.

One thing I wish to bring to the notice of the Board, and that is, the fact that those in charge of the work find that the girls who get places and begin life over again are more sure of doing well than those who go back to their own homes and parents, and are exposed to the same old temptations. In view of this fact, it seems to rest upon our consciences that we should exert ourselves to find places for those who go out.

There have been several applications this past year which we have had to refuse, because the Home is so full. It was with sincere regret that some were refused, as it is not a comfortable thought to contrast the life of a girl shut out from the Home, either for this world or the next, with that which it might have been if taken in and cared for.

The Treasurer's account is worthy of great attention from us. This year we have had no entertainments, so it seems incumbent on us all to exert ourselves and get more subscriptions. Will not each member of the Board pledge herself to send the Treasurer by November 1st, the names of two new subscribers? There is more money needed for our ordinary running expenses, there are some necessary repairs for the house and grounds, and our only dependence is upon subscriptions and donations.

In looking over the report of the Sister-in-charge, you will notice that the girls, many of them, I might truly say all of them, are very young, twenty-one being the oldest, two fifteen, and two sixteen years old. One of these little girls of fifteen was a mother when she came to the Home. Truly, St. Katharine's is a mother in her shelter of lives so young and so broken. God grant that the blessing which has come to the Home in the past eight years may rest upon it in the years to come and that it may continue in the good work which has been so judiciously and so faithfully carried on.

#### CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

October, 1896 to 1897.

The Chaplain reports that during the past year there have been two or three services a week in the Chapel at St. Katharine's. On Thursday afternoon there is a service with address.

Six of the girls during this period have been prepared for confirmation and presented to the Bishop.

Several of the girls who have gone out still make an effort to get to the Home on days when there is a service, and one or two come regularly to St. Katharine's for their Communion.

About three-fourths of the girls who enter the Home do not belong to the Church, and in some cases have no religious belief; but the statistics show that they seldom leave without taking some definite step in the way of penitence and faith.

#### WIDOWS' HOME, HOBOKEN.

The Widows' Home, in Hoboken, is for the reception and care of widows who are Communicants of the Church; who have reached the age of sixty-five and who come recommended as women worthy to be received into such a Home. It has a small endowment. The house is very comfortable, and everything is done to make the life of the inmates a truly home life. The charges are ten dollars a month which cover all expenses. The capacity of the Home is limited; only eight or nine can be cared for at one time. There are now only five inmates. Special arrangements can be made for the reception of a worthy person when the conditions are exceptional. Applications can be addressed either to the Secretary of the Board of Trustees or to the Chaplain.

## HOUSE OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD, ORANGE.

The House of the Good Shepherd is a home for aged and infirm men and women, a temporary home for convalescents, and for sick and needy children. During the year ending June 1st, 1898, eleven new inmates have been received, of whom four have left to go to their homes or to the Hospital. Sixteen convalescents, or friendless persons have been given a temporary home, free of charge, each remaining from one to three weeks. One man has been discharged and five inmates have died during the year, of whom one was a Communicant of this Church. There are at present twenty inmates, fourteen of whom are Communicants.



The offerings at this service with the Bishop's approval were applied to the reduction of the mortgage on the Episcopal Residence; Communicants in the several parishes and missions of the Diocese united in this object.

The retrocessional was Hymn 874.

In order that the lay people who were unable to gain admission to the service on Saturday morning might also participate in the observance of the Jubilee, a second and supplemental service was held in Christ Church on Tuesday, 24th of May at 8 P. M.

The following programme of music was rendered: Processional, Hymn 374; Anthem, "Ascribe unto the Lord," Blair; Psalms 24 and 27, Crotch and Tomlinson; Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis, Brewer in E flat; Anthem, "Hail gladdening Light," Martin; Offertory Anthem, "Rejoice in the Lord," Purcell; Retrocessional, Hymn 18.

This report should make due acknowledgment to the Rev'd WILLIAM W. DAVIS, Rector of Christ Church, and to his people, for valued courtesies extended, nor would it be complete if it failed to record the faithful and scholarly performance of the parish organist and choir-master, MR. GEORGE J. BREWER. The well-trained choir in the rendering of the music of these services plainly showed the painstaking and conscientious interest of its master in the aim of the Churchmen of the Diocese of Newark to fittingly observe the notable event in the life of their Bishop.

### Congrafulatory Addresses.

FROM THE STANDING COMMITTEE AND THE CLERGY OF THE DIOCESE.

### Right Reverend Father in God:

In the House of God we do not seek to exalt man. For we remember that in His sight "with Whom we have to do," we are but dust and ashes, and that before Him the Angels veil their faces. We remember too, that we gather together here, to worship God. The world tends always to distract our thoughts, and to reduce them to its own level, and the mind finds not only relief, but a reactionary impulse against the power of the world in the associations, the objects, and the atmosphere itself of the House of God. We need

more of God and less of the world, more of eternity and less of time in our deepest hearts, and to supply this need, to give nutriment to the heart, and to strengthen the spirit, the doors of the Church stand open. We cannot forget that the churches are for the praise and glory of God and not for the glorification of men. Nevertheless, the Church has a share in the worth of all her children, as the State has an interest in the well-being of all her citizens. For unless good examples speak to us, unless we can prize noble character and high purpose, we are fallen upon an evil day and belong to a perverse generation. In the House of God then, when we speak of men, we so speak according to our conception of their character, and of the graces and gifts with which they seem to us to have been endowed. We do not prize and commemorate them here on account of the honors with which they may have been crowned, nor because they may have filled a large place in public estimation, nor for the brilliancy of a career. These are often, indeed, noble evidences of worth, of genius, of true power, but they may also indicate a false standard of merit on the part of a community. the honors it grants, a country may even proclaim its own disgrace, and therefore the mere fact that a man had been honored in his life, presents no reason in itself, why we should speak of him in the House of God, for here, if any where, we seek to judge according to realities and not to appearances. We consider a man for what he is, for his properties and endowments, and for what God has been pleased to do for him through grace and mercy. And so I think

myself happy, Bishop Starkey, that I am permitted to speak to you this day, in which you have reached a period in your sacred calling, not often given to men in any sphere of life. And I speak not alone for myself, but for the Standing Committee and Clergy of your Diocese, and for them, not as to our respected and beloved Bishop, but as to our brother in the Priesthood, who in God's good providence has rounded out a full half century of Priestly life. offer to you to-day, here in God's House, and surrounded by your brother Priests, our sincere congratulations upon this most happy anniversary, and to the good God who has permitted it, our heartfelt thanks for all the blessings He has granted to His Faithful, through your Priestly ministrations during fifty years. Memory will be busy with you to-day. A large portion—the better portion of our life is retrospective. Memory, after all, is the grand treasure house of man, whence he draws his certain veritable pleasures; when he has garnered up all that he can call his own. That which glides unheeded by to-day, in memory becomes a fact pleasurable and important, and it is only in the light of memory that such hours as these gain their true proportion and their full significance. The Bishop of Southern Virginia has lately said: "What are your sweetest memories? The memories of duty. When your successes and your achievements in knowledge have faded away, the memory of your duty done will abide forever." The Priestly life is very little known even by Church people. As for the world it knows nothing, and commonly misjudges it. It is a lonely life.

More and more the Priest finds himself mingling in all and yet belonging to none of the groups of his Parish. All may use but none possess him. and more it is a lonely life. Its milestones are the white monuments which cluster in the church-yard. Its hidden way marks the story of sin and sorrow to which his ear must be ever open, and on which his lips must be ever closed. If any man needs love and grace it is he who is truest to his ministerial work. And so, to-day, as not unknowing the joy of the Priesthood, as well as its trials, once more for your brothers who are associated with you in this sacred avocation, I tender to you our fraternal love and service, and our prayers that the God Who has been with you through all these years may sustain and lead you still as the shadows lengthen, until the morning breaks and the darkness forever flees away, in the green pastures and beside the still waters, where the great High Priest feedeth His beloved amongst the lilies.

FROM THE DIOCESAN BOARD OF MISSIONS, AND THE NEWARK BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

Right Reverend Father in God:

The Missions of the Diocese, and the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, send you their greetings and their congratulations. The Missions are your special work. They are under your immediate care. You are the chief missionary. They have claims upon you such as no organized parish can

have. These claims are many and varied. The best of all you are and have, is necessary to meet and satisfy them.

The great Church at large is now keenly alive to their importance. It remembers that the great commission was to go into all the world and teach, and preach, and baptise in the Name of the Triune God. It realises that that Church is living the nearest to the Divine ideal which is the most full of the missionary spirit.

When you were made a Priest in the Church of God fifty years ago, our branch of the great Church Catholic was but beginning to put forth missionary efforts. It had been impossible before.

The intense passions and prejudices of the Revolutionary War had not passed away. Notwithstanding the sublime loyalty of many of her priests and people to the cause of Independence, because of her position as the Daughter of the Church of England, she was in many quarters most bitterly spoken against.

She had not much more than a name to live, until the period when you were ordained a Priest, to serve at her altars and to preach in her pulpits the everlasting Word which was to make men wise unto salvation. During these fifty years the development of the missionary spirit has been continuous. She is becoming more and more a missionary church. Steadily and surely she has enlarged her borders. With Bible and Prayer Book, Sacraments, an Apostolic ministry, and ways most decent and orderly, she has commended herself to the devout and reverent everywhere.

Not in the great cities only; not where culture and learning are, only; but on the frontiers, in the advance line, where brave men and noble women are battling desperately as they lead in the way of order, of civilisation, of the religion of our Lord Jesus Christ.

You received her missionary spirit when you received her Orders. You have been a missionary in spirit and in truth all the years of your priesthood. You were Dean of a Missionary Convocation before you were a Bishop. The missionaries knew you to be their friend. They went to you in their times of need. They never went in vain. They were among your most earnest supporters when you were elected a Bishop in the Church of God.

The missionary work of your Diocese has special difficulties. This is so in a marked degree in the eastern portion. It is receiving the overflow of pop-

ulation from the great metropolis of our land.

In some of the smallest and feeblest of our Missions all grades and shades of Churchmanship are to be found. To reconcile such divergent elements; to counsel where there is such a confusion of tongues; to encourage in the day of small things; to sow in faith though the seed is often watered with the tears of disappointment, these are some of the things you are called upon to do. These are but a chapter out of the story which tells of what you have upon you as you take upon you the care of all the churches.

The future of these Missions is radiant with promise. One by one they relinquish the missionary aid

of the Diocese, and become self-supporting. One by one they leave the advance line of missions and enter the army of parishes. They are increasing in number. There are thirty-one in all. They are doing the bravest, the most self-denying, the most faithful work in the Diocese. The present is the period of stress and strain. Land is being acquired, buildings erected, children taught and adults trained in the fear and admonition of the Lord. The future will reap the harvest.

The valleys of the eastern portion are filling with a population which soon will be dense. The hills and mountains of the western portion in due time will be covered with the summer residences of the wealthy. The Church must be ready to receive them. She must not wait until her children are lost to her. The parishes which are rich and strong must give of their abundance. The Church must not be the last to enter these new and promising fields. She must be the first. Freely she has received and freely she must give. These are the Missions which now send you their greetings and their congratulations.

No address like this would be complete, could be complete, without loving, earnest, grateful mention of the noble work done by the women of the Church.

The suggestion which resulted in the formation of the Woman's Auxiliary was born of God. It banded together in earnest work, women who, like those holy women of old, followed their Lord and ministered to Him of their substance. No one but the all-seeing and all-knowing God knows, as you know, what these women, and their work, have been to you in the upbuilding of the Church in this great Diocese. They are always loyal; they are always responsive; they are always ready; they never weary in well-doing. Their prayers are for you and your work. Their labors are at your service. Their treasury is ever open to your call. They are instant in season and out of season to do God's will and yours. These servants of God Most High also send you their greetings and their congratulations.

FROM THE CHURCH HOSPITALS, AND OTHER CHARITIES IN THE DIOCESE.

I wish to convey to you, Rt. Rev'd Father in God, the congratulations of the charitable and benevolent institutions of the Diocese.

When you entered upon your duties as a Priest in this Diocese, you found our benovelent institutions to be few in number, and in their sphere of usefulness, only in the day of small things.

The steady advancement of the Charities, and the spirit which is continually deepening among the people, must certainly be to you a source of great

pleasure.

The Hospital of St. Barnabas in the city of Newark was then situated in a dwelling house which it had recently purchased, and the number of its patients was necessarily limited by its capacity; but to-day you behold it in possession of fine buildings, thoroughly equipped, caring annually for hundreds of

patients, in its wards and private rooms, and thousands in its dispensary work among the out-door poor.

The endowment of the institution is annually increasing and the efficient work of its Training School for Nurses, not only brings to a high standard the Hospital nursing, but its graduates go out into the homes of Christian people, and thus their blessed work is extended to more and more of the sick and suffering. The physicians and surgeons are men of standing and experience and are bringing to the institution a reputation for most faithful and efficient work, while the loving and consecrated services of the Sisters of St. Margaret continued through many years, make the institution complete in all its operations, and it stands to-day a faithful witness of the charity, labors and prayers of the Clergy and Laity of the Archdeaconry of Newark.

Christ Hospital in Jersey City, extending its work into Hoboken and neighboring cities, had no habitation of its own, but occupied a rented house. Here its work was likewise restricted by its limitations, but to-day you behold it, with its own land and buildings, its endowments fast increasing, its work extending until its capacity is so taxed, that it will enter at once upon the erection of extended enlargement. Here too, is a well established Training School for Nurses. Its physicians and surgeons of unusual standing and success, and its wards, private rooms and dispensary treat continually, increasing numbers of the sick and distressed. Into this work has entered the charity, labors and prayers of the Clergy and Laity of the Archdeaconry of Jersey City. The Widows' Home in Hoboken has a commodious dwelling and a sufficient endowment to care for eight widows who are Communicants of the Church, and have reached the age of sixty-five years. This work has gone on quietly and effectively for many years, and is a great blessing to those who have been its inmates.

The House of the Good Shepherd in Orange is a home for aged and infirm men and women, and a temporary home for convalescents, friendless girls, and children. In its fine building and grounds, twenty-one inmates are cared for annually, beside many convalescents for a few weeks each. This work is most wisely and faithfully carried on, under the immediate care and liberality of the Parishes in the Oranges.

St. Katharine's Home in Jersey City is for young girls led astray, whose previous character has been good. They are kept for about a year, and taught to work, so that they can earn their own living. They are kept under the best religious influences, and the great good accomplished cannot be estimated, but is most gratifying to those whose untiring labors have carried it on for seven years.

The Arthur Home for Destitute Children at Summit, which has now become one of the charitable Institutions of the Church, was, by the last Convention, commended to the support of the Clergy and people in the Diocese. This Home has done a good work in the past, but with a new situation, and an extended field of usefulness, it fills a want which the Diocese has long felt, and it must become a great work for

good as its opportunities are embraced, and its operations extended.

These Institutions of mercy in their corporate capacity, the inmates also, of these several Hospitals and Homes, not only who are now, but all who have been cared for during the years of your connection with this Diocese, more especially since you became the chief Pastor, under whose loving care, oversight, and prayers, these works of charity have increased and multiplied, extend to you their hearty congratulations.

May the Good Shepherd and our great High Priest, Jesus Christ, grant you and yours, peace and happiness in this world, and in the world to come, life everlasting.

May we long have the grace of such a noble example.

### The Bishop's Reply.

Dear Brethren and Friends of the Diocese of Newark:

It was my thought when word first came to me that the Clergy of our Diocese were contemplating the commemoration which brings us together in God's House to-day, to express without premeditation, and on the simple inspiration of the moment, the thoughts and feelings which would inevitably crowd into mind and heart at such a time and in the warm and gracious atmosphere of these personal surroundings. It did not need, however, much reflection to satisfy me that it might not be in my power to curb effectually, under the pressure of strong feelings, their natural expression or to repress the undue affluence of words.

Then again, the glance back over fifty years is (to one who has lived a busy life among busy people) a long and intense one. The recalling of many a living figure now gone, but once conspicuous in Church or State, with which most people to-day owe their familiarity to the pictured features that adorn the walls at home or in the books on their library shelves, but with many of whom I had personal acquaintance—this, in connection with thoughts compelled to turn suddenly from the living friendships, and interests of the present, to the dreamy yet only too real processions of the past, forced upon me the question: Who could trust himself to speak with entire control

on such an occasion as the present one, before eyes which looked into his own so calmly, when memories like these were uppermost and dominant?

It seemed better to invoke a more quiet mood, even at the cost of the seeming premeditation.

Were I to follow, selfishly perhaps, the natural bent of inclination, the past of my own life would be dropped quite out of view and my speech would be of the present only; at all events, of that comparatively brief stretch of time which covers my Episcopate. But to do this would harmonise indifferently with the occasion and hardly meet the expectations which it inevitably awakens. My own people, the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese, have come together to do me an especial and signal honour. To emphasise their purpose, they have given voice to different members of the corporate life of the Diocese, so that not clergy and laity alone, but institutions and missions, have for this day, as it were, become animate and spoken their congratulations. Nay, more than this: by the will of my people it is the beginning of a priestly life extending through half a century, which furnishes the reason for the unusual tribute, and which calls us together to-day. I cannot ignore this; the attempt to do so on the plea of modesty or self-forgetfulness, would, I fear, be misunderstood. I must then look back, even if it is over my own life, that I may acknowledge fitly the honour that is done me, and express in this indirect and yet natural way, the deep gratitude I feel for the affection which, as I am sure, prompted this anniversary. Fifty years ago! Has the world before in all its

history witnessed changes so many and so great as those which this period, with the ten antecedent years added to it, chronicles? In my boyhood the Delaware river at Philadelphia was crossed over on boats propelled by horse power; and I remember well one day, when looking at certain great heaps of red and yellow earth which were thrown up on the green slopes of the Schuylkill, I asked my elderly companion what it meant, being told by him that the men were making a new kind of road where (people said) one could write a letter in the carriage, it would ride so smoothly. Steamships, telegraphs, the wonders of mechanical art, the miracles that annihilate space; all, indeed, that makes up the conveniences merely of our ordinary life to-day, were then undreamed of.

In my native city, during my childhood, Bishops WHITE and KEMPER and DE LANCEY were familiar figures in pulpit and street, and let me mention here, (en parenthese) that the first-named always wore the usual daily dress of an English bishop, with the exception of the apron or short cassock. I knew them all as a youth or boy might know his elders, and have been catechised by them more than once in the central aisle of old St. Peter's Church. Sunday-schools were few and far between in those days. But the light of modern life, or civilisation as we should call it now, advanced with strange and sudden bounds in this part of the century, and not as the day advances when the sun slowly travels towards its In later years when the fury of the Civil zenith. War had spent its force, and I had gone to Washing-R

ton as rector of a Church there, many a one whose name is only remembered now as of one formerly renowned on the field of arms or in the Senate chamber, was familiar to me then as that of friend, or

acquaintance, or parishioner.

Within the Church the changes in the fifty or sixty years last past are almost equally marked. From Sunday to Sunday, God's House, half a century or more ago, save for one service on the greater Holy days, was usually closed, and perhaps, in Lent it was opened on a Wednesday and a Friday morning. The Holy Communion was celebrated once a month when convenient. Sermons of an hour's length were listened to with a becoming reverence, and as a solemn duty; in a word, a frigid formality ruled over all.

The contrast which I have hurriedly pictured is not altogether, either in Church or State, that which one would draw between simplicity and culture, or between unmixed good and unqualified evil. some respects it is a contrast between measurable contentment then, and unmeasured greed now; between pinched and humble means, and despairing poverty. But with every such qualification, Church and world have nevertheless advanced immeasurably, and in no respect more, so far as the Church is concerned, than between the cold and formal or else the fervid but irreverent religious services that marked the customs prevailing fifty years ago, and the deeper spiritual character and tone, and higher ideal of public worship with its reverential rendering, even when in our Churches worship is offered up in its simpler forms, in the public services of to-day.

So much for my necessarily brief retrospect of the half century which, however, inclination or garrulousness may urge me to dwell upon, time and prudence forbid me the indulgence. Pardon then the sentimentality, if you please to call it so, if, as I proceed to drop the curtain on my stage of memory, and the dim procession disappears, the past seems loaded down with persons and things that speak. But you do not hear the voices. It is only I. Let me turn away then from the long dim retrospect to fix thought upon another that is far more brief, and glance at years and experiences which are common to us all, and which are still alive in the conditions which confront us, and look back upon the past eighteen years of our own Diocesan life and work.

For after all, dear friends, you will agree with me that we may not well refuse place to-day to a review which naturally finds its interest in that which is rather Diocesan than personal.

The President of the Standing Committee evidently thought so when he spoke for that honoured body as well as for the Clergy generally. He did not tell you however, how from my first introduction into the Diocese as Rector of St. Paul's Church in Paterson, twenty-one years and more ago, down to the present time, it has been my cherished privilege to enjoy his friendship, and profit by his counsel. Perhaps no better occasion than the present could offer for me to say in this public way, that during the entire term of my Episcopate, the Standing Committee of the Diocese has been at all times, not only my official and formal, but my proved and valued advisers. As men and friends they are very near to me; as my constitu-

tionally provided counsellors, the intelligent and never failing devotion they have shown to the best interests of the Diocese, deserves the grateful recognition of us all.

My friend has spoken for the Clergy also. Perhaps in this connection some who hear me will be interested to learn, that while the list of seventy-four whose names were on the roll eighteen years ago is now increased to one hundred and twenty-three, yet of that original number, only twenty are on the register to-day. With each passing year, however, the motive for change on the part of the Clergy, as a rule diminishes, and in the increasing strength and permanency of parish and missionary interests and work, the conservative feeling grows stronger.

If any Bishop can speak for his Clergy, I should be able to do so, for I have from the first interpreted the Episcopal office largely by its patriarchal side, and while the Clergy have been especially my sons, the whole Diocese at large has been my family. I thank the Clergy then for their loyal and cordial greeting. As fellow-workers they are very close to me. Their self-sacrificing spirit and services demand, and have always had, my loving appreciation.

When I turn to my friend who has, in the arranged order of the day, consented to act as the mouth-piece of our Charitable Institutions, (and who can have a better right to speak for them than he who has done so much for them), it is a provocative to gratitude and a stimulus to effort to know that we have such voices among us. The two great Hospitals and the three Homes are the standing evidences in stone before God and man that we of this Church are or try

to be the propagators of an unselfish religion, of a religion which would follow its dear Head and Master, and would heal the sick if it might, as He healed them; and would cast out the evil spirits in His Name and comfort the broken-hearted. The voice you have uttered sounds pleasant in my ears, dear brother of Grace Church; it is fragrant in my nostrils with the Divine breath of Judea and of Galilee.

Of Missions, I need scarcely speak to my friend who represents them to-day so worthily. They beyond all else speak to human hearts of Christ's work and mission. "Right Onward" was the motto of New Jersey's second and greatest Bishop. May the motto engraven on the seal be our watchword in all time. It has been written on fleshly tablets of the heart in all those who have gone before us, to whose faith and self-sacrificing labors we owe under God our transmitted privileges. The Mission work and workers in our Diocese, men and women together, honour me with an especial honour.

This Anniversary Commemoration, spontaneous and gracious as it is, would have failed in symmetry and significance had the Laity not taken their part in it, and certainly it would have been far less of a tribute to me.

It may not be forgotten that we are looking back to-day, young and old, men and women, priests and people; we are thinking of the eighteen years of Diocesan life that are past, and of the fruitage of our labor. What do we see? Thirty-five new churches builded, fourteen other churches enlarged, twenty-eight guild or parish houses, sixteen rectories, two hospitals and two homes and all erected within

these years. It is not a meagre accomplishment; and those of us who are looking back can see something more and something else than these material results. We can see groups of quiet men and of devoted women, meeting, counselling, working through the years, setting self and selfish and unlovely thoughts aside, only seeking patiently, persistently and lovingly to bring about God's glory and the Church's good.

Dear brother and friend, who to-day spoke for the Laymen and the women of the Diocese, tell them from me, that the Bishop knows and fully appreciates all that they have done. How they have worked by his side, giving strength to his hands and courage to his heart. In your kind words to-day, he finds the spring of a new ardor and a better realisation than ever before, how we all, Bishop, Priests, and People are one in the Lord Jesus Christ.

But time presses and I must close. I cannot do so without, even at the cost of calling a passing cloud shadow over the face of this bright day, I cannot close without recalling for a moment, the memory of many a noble man and woman, priest and layman who once worked by our side in these years, but are now passed away.

Requiescant in pace!

We see their faces as in vision and recognise them by the Christ-likeness. All the dross seems gone—only that look remains. How real they seem! We will remember them again, shall we not, as we kneel down before God's Altar.



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### Diocese of Rewark.
