TITLE I, CANON 1, 📜 II.

OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election, in the following form:

[Name of the Church, the Place, and Date.]

This certifies that at a unceting of the congregation of this Church, held for the purpose of electing Church Officers, and Deputies, and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, for the purpose of electing Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Convention, if the parting before that object alone), A. B., C. D., and E. F., being communicants of the Church in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Deputies; and B. C., D. E., and F. G., also being communicants in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Alternate Deputies to represent the Parish, were duly chosen as Alternate Deputies to represent the Parish in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have bergunto set my hand, for if two Wardens subscribe, we have set our hands, the day and year above written.

N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient: if neither the Rector nor the Secretary sign, then the signatures of both Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-in-charge or Missionary, cannot sign.

The Lay Representation is limited to three Deputies, whose names in full should be carefully and legibly written.

Three Alternate Deputies must also be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies. (See Title I, Canon 6, § II, [2].)

This Certificate is to "be transmitted to the Secretary of the Convention at least ten days before the Meeting of the Annual Convention." (See Title I, Canon 1, § II.)

In order to secure this, the Secretary will forward a blank form to every Parish, and he carnestly asks the PRONET attention of the Clergy.

***By the terms of the Constitution and Canons, the Deputies must be communicants of the Church, and also qualified voters in the Parish which elects them. [See Title I, Canon 6, § II, [4], [5] and [6].

- Each meeting of the Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
- 3. THE ORDER OF BUSINESS SHALL BE AS FOLLOWS:
- Li. The calling over by the Secretary of the names of the Clerical members and Lay Deputies, until ten Clerical members shall have been found to be present, and ten Parishes shall have been found to be represented.
- ii. All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convention shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall enter the same on the Minutes.
- II. The appointment of a Committee on the Certificates of Lay Deputies.
- III. The Report of the existing Committee on Rules of Order.
- IV. The appointment by the Convention of a Committee on the Rights of Clerical Members. (Title I, Canon 1, § I, [2].)

- v. The election of Supplementary Deputies to the General Convention.
- VI. Reports of Committees.
- VII. Unfinished Business.
- VIII. Motions, Resolutions and Miscellaneous Business.
 - All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered.
 - The Reports of Committees shall be in writing, and, when
 made, shall be the property of the Convention without
 any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending
 action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.
 - No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
 - When any member is about to speak he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
 - No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply,) in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
 - At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
 - 11. All questions shall be decided viva voce, unless otherwise specially ordered.

- 12. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote of the Convention may be taken by orders, voting separately, and the names shall be entered on the Minutes.
- The doors of the Convention shall be opened for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
- 14. No member shall leave the Convention without permission.
- 15. In all elections, those persons only who shall have a majority of all the votes given, shall be deemed elected; but if in any case more than the required number of persons shall have a majority of votes, the required number of persons having the highest number of votes shall be deemed elected, and in case of a tie between two or more candidates, there shall be a new ballot.
- 16. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone it to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
- 17. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
- 18. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate, but any member may appeal from the decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention.

- All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.
- 20. The Convention shall meet the first day at 10 A. M., and on subsequent days at 9.30 A. M., with a recess of one hour on each day between 1 and 2 o'clock.
- At the close of each Convention, the Minutes shall be corrected and approved.

JOURNAL

Grace Church, Orange, N. J., 20 May, 1902.

The Twenty-eighth Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Newark met in Grace Church, Orange, on Tuesday, 20th May, 1902, at 10 A. M.

The Right Rev'd the Bishop of the Diocese celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by the Rev'd Alexander Mann, Rector of the Parish, and the Rev'd George S. Bennitt.

The Bishop read his Annual Address.

The President called the Convention to order; the Secretary called the rolls, and announced a constitutional quorum present.*

The Bishop appointed the Committee on Certificates of Lay Deputies: The Rev'd WALKER GWYNNE, Mr. Louis A. Noble and Mr. E. A. S. Lewis.

On motion of the Rev'd FREDERICK B. CARTER, on behalf of the Committee on Rules of Order, the

rules of the last Convention were adopted, as were also the following amendments:

Amend Clause ii, of Section xv, of Rule 3, by adding after the words "thus nominated," the words, "except that of nominations for the Board of Missions, which shall be printed on a single ticket."

Amend Section xvi, of Rule 3, by adding, as Clause xiv, the following:

Clergymen of other Dioceses and Candidates for Holy Orders, who may be present, shall be admitted to honorary seats in the Convention on the presentation of their names to the Secretary.

Amend Section III, of Rule 4, by adding the words, "including the election of the Board of Missions."

The Rev'd L. H. LIGHTHIPE, of the Diocese of New Jersey, and the Rev'd Francis J. CLAY MORAN, of the Diocese of Maryland, appeared and took seats in the Convention.

The Standing Committee respectfully reports that six meetings have been held during the past Conventional year.

On May 22nd, 1901, the Committee organized by electing the Rev'd WILLIAM W. HOLLEY, D. D., President, and the Rev'd WILLIAM R. JENVEY, Secretary.

Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. John's Church, West Hoboken, to borrow a sum not to

exceed \$7,500 and to mortgage their new church property for the same. The proper form of consent was signed and acknowledged. Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Christ Church, Newark, to borrow the sum of \$500 and to mortgage their rectory property for the same. The proper form of consent was signed and acknowledged.

On September 16th, 1901, permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Grace Church, Greenville, to cancel an existing mortgage of \$3,500 on their church property and to execute a new mortgage of \$3,500 at 5 per cent. The proper form of consent was signed and acknowledged. Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd Frederick W. Taylor, D. D., Coadjutor Bishop-elect for the Diocese of Quincy, and the proper testimonial signed. The election of the Rt. Rev'd Samuel Cook Edsall, D. D., as Coadjutor Bishop-elect for the Diocese of Minnesota, was concurred in, and the proper testimonial signed.

On December 9th, 1901, consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd FREDERICK BURGESS, D. D., Bishop-elect for the Diocese of Long Island, and the proper testimonial signed. Mr. WILLIAM MAWHINNEY was recommended to the Bishop as a Candidate for Holy Orders, and the proper testimonial signed. Mr. Wallace M. Gordon was recommended to the Bishop as a Candidate for Holy Orders, and the proper testimonial signed. The Rev'd EDWARD J. COOPER was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests, and the proper testimonial signed. mission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. John's Church, Passaic, to borrow the sum of \$4,000 and to mortgage two unencumbered lots held by them. proper form of consent was signed and acknowledged. Rev'd ARTHUR WHITAKER, Rector of the Church of the Holy Communion. Norwood, appeared before the Committee and made a verbal statement of conditions as they existed in the said Parish concerning the title of the property. Messrs.

ALFRED MILLS and E. A. S. Lewis were appointed a committee of two to confer with the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of said Church and the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, and to report back to the Committee the results of such conferences. Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Mary's Church, Jersey City, to correct a slight error made by the surveyor when making the boundary lines of the church property. The proper form of consent was signed and acknowledged. Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. John's Church, West Hoboken, to sell their former church property, situated on Clinton Avenue and Warren Street, West Hoboken, for the sum of \$2,500. The proper form of consent was signed and acknowledged.

On February 10th, 1902, permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of the Church of the Holy Communion, Norwood, to transfer to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund three lots held by them, and for which there were clear titles. The proper form of consent was signed and acknowledged. Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Matthew's Church, Jersey City, to convey their church property to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund. The Rev'd WILLIAM R. JENVEY and Mr. E. A. S. LEWIS WERE appointed a committee of two to meet with the Vestry of said St. Matthew's Church to see that a proper conveyance of their church property was made to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and executed, and to see that proper action was taken to have the Parish become extinct. Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd Charles S. Olmsted, D. D., Coadjutor Bishop-elect for the Diocese of Colorado, and the proper testimonial signed. Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd ALEXANDER H. VINTON D. D., Bishopelect for the Diocese of Western Massachusetts, and the proper testimonial signed.

On March 10th, 1902, the Bishop of the Diocese was advised

to give consent to the application of St. John's Mission, Montclair, to be erected into a parish. Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Mark's Church, Paterson, to sell their church lot, situated on Ellison and Church Streets, for the sum of \$14,500. The proper form of consent was signed and acknowledged. Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd Alexander Mackay-Smith. D. D., Coadjutor Bishop-elect for the Diocese of Pennsylvania, and the proper testimonial signed. Consent was given to the transfer of a church lot, 45x140 feet, situated on Washington Street. Hackettstown, to the Rev'd WILLIAM M. MITCHAM, Missionary in charge of St. James' Church, the title of this property being held by the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund. This consent was given with the understanding that the Rev'd Mr. MIT-CHAM should execute a deed of trust, should erect a rectory on said lot, mortgage the same for a sum not to exceed \$2,500. and then should transfer the property back to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, subject to said mortgage.

On May 20th, 1902, the Rev'd OSCAR F. MOORE, Deacon. was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests, and the proper testimonial signed. CHARLES SILAS CHAMPLIN was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Deacons, and the proper testimonial signed. Mr. Christian Andrew Roth was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Deacons, and the proper testimonial signed. Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd HENRY BOND RESTA-RICK, Bishop-elect for the Missionary District of Honolulu. Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Mary's Church, Jersey City, to borrow the sum of \$5,000 to execute a second mortgage on the church property for the same. The proper form of consent was signed and acknowledged Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Grace Church, Rutherford, to borrow a sum not to exceed \$5,000 at 5 per cent., and to mortgage the church rectory lot and the rectory to be erected thereon for the same; the rectory is to cost not less than \$8,000. The proper form of consent was signed and acknowledged. Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Christ Church, Bloomfield and Glen Ridge, to borrow a sum not to exceed \$2,500, and to mortgage the mission church property, situated on Montgomery and Berkeley Avenues, Bloomfield, for the same. The proper form of consent was signed and acknowledged. The report of the Secretary was read, approved and ordered read to the Convention.

The Finance Committee respectfully reports, that after considering the various sources of income of the Diocese, it recommends that an assessment of seven per cent. be made for the current year on the amount of the present salaries of the Clergy in all Parishes which have not made contributions or given bonds to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, as provided by Canon, for the support of the Episcopate; and an assessment of four per cent. on the salaries of the Clergy for Convention and current expenses, and to pay one thousand dollars on the mortgage of \$2,500 now resting on the Episcopal Residence.

The Committee recommends the adoption of the following

Resolved, That an assessment be made for the current year, of seven per cent. on the amount of the present salaries of the Clergy towards paying the Bishop's salary, upon all Parishes which have not made contributions or given bonds to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, as provided by the Canon; and an assessment of four per cent. on the amount of the salaries of the Clergy, for Convention and current liabilities; and to pay one thousand dollars on the mortgage of \$2,500 now resting on the Episcopal Residence.

Report of the Committee on the Increase of the Episcopal Fund.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The Committee on the Increase of the Episcopal Fund presents the following report:

It has been found that the condition of the Episcopal Fund has not been clearly understood in the Diocese generally, and therefore that the necessity for increasing it is not fully appreciated. The Treasurer of the Fund, Mr. Stevens, was accordingly invited to present a statement showing the exact status of the Fund, and also explain why in his judgment an increase is desirable. In response to this request, the following letter was received:

REV'D AND DEAR SIR:

The Episcopal Fund of the Diocese of Newark at the time of my last report was made up of the following:

Since that report the contributions for the increase of the Fund have amounted to \$163.44 (making a total to date of \$316.56); otherwise there has been no change.

The condition of the Episcopal Fund is unsatisfactory for the following reasons:

1. The income is in danger of constant decrease from the fact that any parish that has given its bond (on which it is now paying seven per cent. interest) may at any time pay it off and is then, by right, exempt from any further payment on account of the Bishop's salary. Parishes contributing by way of assessment may at any time secure the same exemption by paying in to the Trustees a sum equal to the Rector's yearly salary.

These assessments are based on seven per cent. on such salary. Even if four and one-half per cent. interest could be secured on the amounts that might thus be paid in by the

parishes that are now counted on, the loss in income would be about \$2,400 (or $\frac{3800}{7}$ x $4\frac{7}{2}$ $\frac{3}{2}$,457.)

2. The income is uncertain, depending on the ability, and to a certain extent the willingness, of the parishes to meet their obligations.

The only feasible method of enforcing collection is the exclusion of lay delegates from the right to vote in Convention, and this penalty can be enforced only when the parish is two years in arrears.

3. The Fund itself is in danger of a practical decrease without a corresponding chance of increase. Many of the Parish Bonds have become valueless through changes in the financial prosperity of the parishes. This is shown by the fact that about \$2,600 can be collected yearly for interest instead of seven per cent. on \$51,780 or \$3,624.

If a bonded parish prospers the Episcopal Fund does not gain thereby; if it decays, the fund must suffer.

The chance of increase in returns from the parishes paying by assessments is small. Of fifty-six parishes liable for payment of either interest or assessments, eighteen only are assessed.

I would draw attention to the fact that the total returns from parishes to-day (\$3,800) is about the same as the yearly sum that the Parish Bonds would yield at seven per cent. if all interest charges were met.

In other words, the assessments on new parishes seem to have offset the losses in income from bonded parishes, but no more.

- 4. The salary of the Bishop is inadequate to the dignity of the office and to the demands incident to his position. The salary was fixed at \$5,000, but has been reduced to \$4,000.
- 5. Parish bonds as the main investment of a fund for the Bishop's support are unsatisfactory, and give no assurance of the safety and permanency that should characterize an invest-

ment for that purpose. I am informed that originally they were a device to get around the provisions of a canon of the General Convention requiring an endowment. Without any comment on the moral or business defensibility of their issue I submit they have outlived their usefulness. Any security yielding seven per cent. interest would to-day not be accepted by business men without some inquiry, and when besides the high rate of interest such security is found to be overdue and payable at the option of the debtor, the conclusion is inevitable that the debtor is either very complacent or unable to meet his obligation.

To sum up: The salary of the Bishop is inadequate, its collection is uncertain and cannot be enforced, and the fund on which it depends and the returns therefrom are in danger of decrease.

While these matters have never been hidden or kept back, their importance has not been realized by the Diocese.

There can be no question as to the ability of the Diocese to raise a proper fund, nor have I the slightest doubt of its willingness to do so, when the subject is once brought to its attention.

I can recall no systematic effort to do this before the appointment of the present Committee. In more than two years its work has yielded a net return of about \$300, which it is hoped will be increased by a substantial amount before the meeting of the Convention. I do not believe, however, that in this manner we can ever expect to average more than \$1,000 a year.

I submit that plans should be made to provide an Episcopal Fund yielding an income of not less than \$6,000 a year, or, say, \$150,000.

If we capitalize the amount received yearly from parishes for interest and assessments (\$3,800 at seven per cent.) we would have, say, \$54,000.

The capital of the fund outside of Parish Bonds is \$17,953.10.

We can take the fund as having assets equal in value to the following:

Until some progress has been made toward raising this balance, I believe it unwise to decide on any definite recommendation as to Parish Bonds beyond the keeping in mind of a general policy looking to their retirement.

I would suggest two means of getting the necessary balance:

- 1. Continuance of appeals to the parishes to take up collections for the increase of the Episcopal Fund.
- 2. Availing ourselves of the services of The Church Endowment Society as proposed by Mr. WHITTIER.

Mr. WHITTIER has excellent facilities for handling the problem and is very confident of success. He comes to us well recommended. He is willing to undertake to raise \$15,000 within thirty days after he gets his reading in print, and believes that he can get \$100,000 in a year.

His plan is to get people to insure their own or other lives for the benefit of The Church Endowment Society in trust for the Episcopal Fund.

I am willing to arrange all matters as to the style of policies, etc., with Mr. WHITTER, and to undertake to oversee his work if the Committee will approve of the plan of thus raising the money.

From the above statement it appears that the assets of the Episcopal Fund consist of about \$18,000 in cash and negotiable securities, \$51,780 in parish bonds which have abso-

lutely no market value, and the privilege of assessing parishes which may be worth anywhere from practically nothing to \$1,200 per year, according as times are hard or easy. Clearly the condition of the Fund is highly unsatisfactory, and unworthy of any Diocese of the wealth and strength of Newark. Common business prudence, the respect due to the Episcopate. and conformity to the spirit of the law of the Church suggest that the Fund should be put on a sound footing as soon as possible. In the opinion of your Committee it should have a cash value of not less than \$150,000. An increase can be effected in four ways: By direct gifts, bequests, parish offerings, and life insurance for the benefit of the Fund. While direct gifts would be most satisfactory, no very large sum can be expected either from gifts or bequests, because in most cases they can be secured only by rectors of parishes, and naturally they would prefer to cover them into the endowment funds of their own churches. Parish offerings, however, are an immediate and constant source of increase. In the year ending April 30th, 1900, five parishes contributed \$41.30, the next year thirteen parishes gave \$111.82, and in the year ending April 30th, 1902, the offerings from sixteen parishes amounted to \$279.42, making a total of \$432.54, as shown by the following table:

Endowment life insurance is a method of increasing the Fund which promises considerable success. It is attractive because it enables those who cannot or do not wish to make large contributions directly to the Fund to accomplish the same end in another way. Small annual payments extending, say, over a period of ten years, will at the end of that time secure a large addition to the Fund. In this connection your Committee has availed itself of the offices of the Church Endowment Society. Since the 15th of March the special agent of the Society, Mr. E. A. WHITTIER, has written \$15,000.00 in ten year endowment policies for the benefit of the Fund, and is negotiating for \$10,000.00 more; of these policies, seven for \$1,000 each have been placed in the hands of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, as appears in their report.

In view, therefore, of the regular increase from parish offerings, and of the future maturing of these and other endowment policies of insurance, your Committee feels that there is a better prospect than ever before of putting the Episcopal Fund, in time, on a sound financial basis.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The Special Committee on Civil Legislation, instructed by the Convention of roor "to have printed nine hundred copies of the Constitution, Canons and Civil Laws, together with the necessary forms to be used under these laws," respectfully reports:

That in accordance with these instructions, they have carefully prepared, and now have ready for the printer, a copy of the Constitution and Canons of this Diocese, a copy of all the Statute Laws of this State relating to and affecting the Church, and also some of the forms necessary to be used under these laws, but have deferred the printing of the same for the following reasons:

During the past year (1901) the Governor of this State has appointed a Commission to revise and codify the public laws of the State, including all the Statute law relating to, and governing religious societies.

Members of this Commission have informed your Committee, that, while the Supplement to the Religious Societies' Act, prepared by the Joint Committee of the two Dioceses in this State and enacted by the Legislature of 1901, providing for the incorporation and management of Parishes of this Church, will probably not be altered or amended, many and important changes will probably be made in the general statute law relating to religious societies, some portions of which still affect our Church.

This revision and codification of the laws relating to religious societies, it is confidently expected, will be completed during the coming year, and when completed will probably continue without material alteration for many years.

In view of this probable action on the part of said Commission, and deeming it to be the desire of this Convention

that the new edition of the Constitution and Canons and Statute Laws should be up to date, and so preclude, as far as possible, the necessity of another edition for some years to come, your Committee thought it most unwise to have the same printed until after the said Commission had made its report, and the proposed changes in the law relating to religious societies had been completed.

Your Committee, therefore, respectfully recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Special Committee on Civil Legislation be continued.

In form, the Trustees of the Fund are plaintiffs, and the Diocese of Newark, your Bishop, and other individual clergymen, are defendants.

After consultation with the Trustees and their Counsel, I have determined to ask Mr. Cortlandt Parker to also act as our Counsel.

The questions raised in the suit are numerous, and some of them are important.

In their examination and in their presentation to the Court, the great legal ability of Mr. PARKER, and his wide experience in Church matters, will, I think, be of service.

In this opinion I feel sure you will agree with me.

The Archdeacon of Jersey City read his report. (See Appendix to the Episcopal Address.)

The Archdeacon of Newark read his report. (See Appendix to the Episcopal Address.)

For the work done in these Missions we refer you to the reports of the Archdeacons. We are concerned simply with the financial side of the matter, which is most encouraging, as the plan of apportionment has more than enabled us to meet all our obligations. As this is the fifth year it has been in

operation it may safely be said that it has passed beyond the stage of experiment and approved itself to the Diocese, the various parishes of which have shown the same commendable zeal during the past year in raising the amounts respectively assigned to them, while to the Board it has been the means of materially lightening the burden which rests upon it of providing for all the above named Mission Stations; instead of wondering whether it will be able to make both ends meet, by this method it is assured of a regular income which is adequate to its needs, and the relief afforded by that fact can only be known by those who have been placed in a like situation.

Your Board, therefore, desires not only to congratulate the Diocese on its record, but to thank the Clergy and Laity warmly on its own account for the support they have given to this work, and to offer the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Convention authorize the Board of Missions to appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for its work during the coming year.

Resolved, That the plan of apportionment already in use be re-endorsed by this Convention.

THE TWENTY-THIRD ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

IRt. IRev'd Thomas A. Starkey, D. D.

BISHOP OF THE DIOCESE.

DEAR BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND LAITY

I beg to extend to you, on this occasion of our annual meeting, my usual cordial greetings, and with these, the expression of my earnest hope that God's grace and favor may rest upon us in all the efforts which we make to promote the highest interests of His Church and people in this our beloved Diocese of Newark.

As my custom in the past has been, I first make brief but reverent note of those among our American Bishops who have been called away from their labors by our side, during the past year.

Bishop LITTLEJOHN of Long Island died suddenly on the third day of last August. He was an old friend of forty years' standing; a man of fine intellectual endowments, and one who commanded the respect of all who were brought into relations with him throughout his long and honorable career.

On September 16, 1901, Bishop WHIPPLE of Minnesota died at the age of 79 years. His earlier Episcopate was devoted largely to mission work among the Indians of the North-west, and it was largely through his interest and success in that work, and the happy faculty he had of picturing it to his hearers, that he became so well known in England as well as in our own Country.

The Rt. Rev'd ALEXANDER BURGESS, D. D., Bishop of Quincy, in the State of Illinois, died October 8, 1901, at an old home of his in St. Albans, Vermont, after a protracted sickness, and at the age of 82 years. He was greatly respected, as he well deserved to be, by all who knew and could appreciate the story of his earnest life.

The Rt. Rev'd Dr. Spalding, first Bishop of the Diocese of Colorado, died on March the ninth of this present year. The Church had few more earnest workers than he proved himself to be in his withdrawn and arduous field of duty.

Of the Clergy connected with this Diocese, three have died since our last meeting.

The Rev'd Newland Maynard, D. D., came to us some years ago from New York, and was but

a short time identified with this Diocese. Dr. MAYNARD was a public lecturer by choice and through the force of natural gifts. He died suddenly in New York City on July 2, 1901.

The Rev'd James Cameron, who passed away on the twenty-sixth day of last December, was one of our older Clergy—his name standing fourth on the Diocesan List at the time of his death. He was a man of simple and earnest life, and his memory must always hold a warm place in the mind and heart of his Bishop and old-time friend.

On November twenty-fourth of last year, the Rev'd Edward Fuller Bates died. He was a young Priest, who had resided in the Diocese for a year only, and was much liked by all who knew him.

To this brief record might well be added the names of Lay-workers by the Clergy's side, men and women who have been called away from us during the past twelve-month, whom we miss and mourn sincerely. Like those ancient worthies of whom Paul writes to the Hebrews, they are with us still, but unseen by natural sight, hidden amid "the cloud of witnesses." To God's dear love we commit them as we ever did in the days of their co-working with us. May they rest in peace!

Although it is foreign to my custom to make any but the briefest reference to those purely

secular events which have no necessary connection with the Church's life and work, I nevertheless fully recognize the fact that all such reserve has its limitations, and that in being by nature and office an ecclesiastic. I do not cease to be, at the same time, an American citizen, and that it would be forced and unnatural did I fail, in a year's review like this, to notice in however brief a way, the base and cruel assassination of the President of the United States, in September of last year. Such an event as this gives cause for thought to men who are capable of persistent and regulated thoughtful-A Republic professes to represent, in the person of its Executive, the absolute will of its people, deliberately and from time to time expressed in the most open and unquestioned way. It matters not, so far as lurking danger is concerned. whether this will is thwarted, as in the South American Republics so often, by open revolt, overthrow, or as with us during our first Century of national life, more than once, by private assault and violence. In either case, the infringement of the popular will suggests, if it does not disclose, a hidden malady in the body politic that needs a better and more careful diagnosis than our people seem disposed to give it. Let me add, in a different vein, that it is a thought of pleasant entertainment by Christian people, how after all the luxury of these modern days with its contaminations, the death-bed at Buffalo, which a nation was watching

from afar, presented as its crowning lesson, a survival of old days among us, in the picture which it gave of Christian and absolute simplicity in the person of the dying Ruler, surrounded by no ceremonials of State, yet calm and dignified in his Christian confidence, even to the last.

The triennial Convention of the entire Church in the United States (a Convention which I found myself, for various reasons, unable to attend), was held in San Francisco last October. Little was accomplished in the direction of general legislation, although something was attempted in the way of a larger and more liberal effort, on the part of the Dioceses, towards the increase of Missionary enterprise and labor at home and abroad. It is hardly worth our while to discuss here and now the various reasons assigned for the acknowledged decline in Missionary contributions, and the coldness and hostility which have been often expressed, especially in the columns of the public press, in relation to Missionary work, within the last three or four This passing reference, however, makes it eminently proper for me to say, that in the exercise of my best judgment, such criticisms of Missionaries and their work are in the main unjust and injurious, and should find no serious entertainment in the minds of right-judging and fair-minded people.

Aroused and stimulated, nevertheless, by the conditions just referred to, the Convention and Board of Missions together have devised a plan for increasing missionary receipts by apportionment of the sum needed on the several Dioceses, the outcome of which (so far as our own Diocese is concerned), has been laid before the congregations of our several Parishes in the Missionary appeal which I had the honor to send out to you on Ash Wednesday of this year. It is my earnest wish that the Diocese of Newark should discharge her full share of the duty imposed upon all parts of the home Church by the stress referred to, and that she should do this in the full spirit of a zeal and interest which are not merely the outcome of an emergency, but the natural fruit of an ever-present zeal and devotion to the great cause.

Turning from these general topics and conditions to the affairs of our own Diocese, I am happy in being able to report a general advance in the external expression, at least, of growth and prosperity. The corner-stones of four new churches have been laid during the year, and all but one of these buildings are now open for Divine Service. I give but passing notice to another, the new Church at Belvidere, which, superior to its predecessor in convenience and neatness, was consecrated on June 13th last; and to St. Agnes' Church at Little Falls (one of the most pleasing of the smaller churches

in the Diocese), which, being freed from debt, was properly consecrated on October 27th of last year.

The corner-stone of St. Clement's Church, Hawthorne, was laid by the Rev'd George M. Dorwart in the early summer of 1901, and the completed church was opened by me on the fifth of November. Hawthorne is a growing suburb of Paterson, and the new Mission has already forty-five actual communicants.

On the afternoon of October the sixth, I laid the corner-stone of the new St. John's Church, West Hoboken, in the midst of a large number of interested on-lookers. The new church is now open for services. St. John's has had, from the first, a few ardent and devoted Church-lovers among its small congregation; but I chanced to know its narrow conditions some thirty years ago, since which time there had been but small advancement. Under the present vigorous and enterprising Rector such conditions could not continue permanently, and the new and attractive stone church has already, in its better location, trebled the number of its interested congregation.

Three weeks later, viz.: on October 29, the corner-stone of St. John's Church, Montclair, was laid, and the building, now nearly completed in detail, is open for its sacred uses. This Mission is

destined soon to be a Parish under its Pastor, the Rev'd CLAUDIUS M. ROOME.

St. Mary's Parish Church, in Jersey City, has for years occupied a site directly over the Erie Railroad tunnel. Dr. Warren, the Rector, has in process of erection a new brick structure in a better, because a more central, location. He expects to open it for service sometime during the summer. It will be a great improvement over the old and gloomy frame building which it supersedes.

Another new church, in the same Eastern border of the Diocese with that last referred to, is about being commenced at the new village of Grantwood, on the summit of the Palisades, almost directly overlooking Edgewater. A fine lot of ground worth three thousand dollars has been presented to us here, where the Rev'd Mr. McCleary, Rector of Edgewater, had already for some time past maintained a Sunday School for the children of the new and growing settlement.

In the same general strip of territory which embraces Grantwood, Edgewater and Fort Lee, lies, a mile or two to the North of the last-named place, the village of Coytesville, where an entire congregation of Christian people made application to me in the early spring of the present year to be received into the Church. The overture, after due

enquiry, was cordially received, and since then, through the wise and judicious course of the Rector of Edgewater, selected by me for the delicate duty, the union has been practically consummated. We shall need about fifteen hundred dollars, from sources outside the congregation, to put the church building in condition, after effecting its purchase; a contribution, which in the circumstances, needs no advocacy from me, pleading its own cause, as it does, with a more than ordinary eloquence.

In the two cases last referred to, viz.: Grantwood and Coytesville, where churches are about to be secured by erection or purchase, both constitute new Missions of the Diocese. Besides these, two others should be referred to, in order that you may have a general view of the new work which the last year has inaugurated.

A parochial mission, near the extreme and farther edge of his jurisdiction, has been carried on, through the agency of two Lay Readers, by the Rev'd Mr. White, Rector at Bloomfield. This work known as the Mission of the Ascension is (as I am advised) more than usually full of promise. Ground has been already purchased for a church building, and the attendance on the services is very encouraging, fully justifying the venture and enterprise of the Rector.

Another new work recently begun is at the growing village of Oradell, situated on the New Jersey and New York Railroad, six miles beyond Hackensack. This Mission owes its existence mainly to Archdeacon Jenvey. Ground has been purchased, and paid for, in a central location, on which a church will be erected as soon as prudence and good judgment indicate that the time to do so has arrived.

It is one of the lessons of human experience that, with much in life to call out gratitude and awaken courage, there must always be, in a measure, some countervailing source of regret, to give its touch of shade to the picture, whose stimulating influence might otherwise over-ride the restraints of caution and a sound judgment. Such a case is that of St. Matthew's Church in Jersey City, once so strong in influence and numbers, now weak and decaying in the midst of a population alien in sympathy yet not hostile or unfriendly. Such as survive of the old attendants at her services are still cared for, and will be for a time longer, inside the old familiar walls. But the time must soon come, I fear, when we shall have to accept the inevitable, and leave the comparatively few who still remain residents in the immediate neighborhood to the faithful care of the not distant Parish Churches and Clergy of the town.

One of our churches, St. Mark's in Paterson, was, as you know, destroyed last winter in the great fire which caused such destruction and distress in my old home, the City of Paterson. Perhaps in the end, and so far as the Church is concerned, this catastrophe may prove a blessing in disguise, as the initiation of better things. A slight change of location, away from the very edge of business, with a more ample site and a larger building, would make great changes for the better in the case of St. Mark's Church, and her future progression. I may add, that all the conditions are being carefully considered by those who are in immediate and responsible charge.

It was in the early summer of last year that a well-known and honored Vestryman of Grace Church, Orange, commenced the construction of a large Parish building, to be erected in stone, as the memorial of a beloved daughter who had been called away from his side, and from the scene of many Christian labors, by the Supreme Will which none can gainsay.

Following almost immediately upon this, and in the same Parish, came the construction of a large and noble chancel as a memorial to Dr. Schuyler, recently deceased, and who for more than thirty years was the greatly honored Rector of Grace Church. Both of these structures are now completed and occupied, having been set apart by services of benediction.

On Holy Innocents' Day, 1901, the new and great west window of the Church of that name in Hoboken, erected and dedicated to the memory of Mrs. Martha B. Stevens, founder of the Parish, was blessed by Bishop Coleman in my enforced absence. No words of mine, or monument, however noble and elaborated, can tell the story adequately of her simple-hearted devotion to the Church of God.

Other matters of Parochial interest must be briefly alluded to. Such are, the contribution of seven thousand and five hundred dollars to remove the indebtedness from the property and real estate of Grace Church in Jersey City; the growing endowment fund of St. Mark's Parish in the same place, whose Rector has already done so large a work and done it so successfully; the gifts of very considerable sums to reduce the indebtedness of more than one of our other Parish Churches; and last, not least, the bequest of eleven thousand dollars as the beginning of an endowment for the support of the rectors of Christ Church, Belleville, where, as in so many other growing and changing localities, population increases, but wealth yields the place to poverty or narrow means. Laus Deo! May our people elsewhere catch the

inspiration of these examples, and learn to provide in our changing towns and cities, while opportunity still permits them to do so, the nucleus of future maintenance when pecuniary conditions shall have changed, but where human souls still remain to challenge duty.

INSTITUTIONS.

Our Hospitals, Homes and the new Orphanage at Summit, maintain themselves successfully as in the past, and are one and all commended to the interest and care of all Christian people, especially of our own Household of Faith, who are directly responsible for their conduct and maintenance. Such works of Christian love and duty are not the outcome of mere sentiment. They are opportunities afforded, through God's persuasive grace, that His people may by practice learn this needed lesson, that if Faith be the germ of spiritual life, works are its fruitage; and that if we are to be justified at last, it must be through these conjunctly, "and not by Faith only," which alone, and without fruits, is a sentiment, nothing more.

It remains for me to make grateful acknowledgment to my honored friend, the Bishop of Delaware, for the pains-taking and self-denying work done by him for me when I was recovering from an attack of illness. His loving way of doing the

kindness added the charm of gracefulness to the obligation conferred.

For more complete details of Mission work in the Diocese, I refer you to the reports of the Archdeacons.

Reports

I have received the following reports from the Reverend the Archdescens:

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF JERSEY CITY.

To the Right Rev'd Thomas A. Starkey, D. D., Bishop of Newark:

Roughly speaking, the Missions in the Archdeaconry of Jersey City may be divided into two classes.

In the one class, there are those which were begun in faith, and which are abundantly justifying the early promise they gave of success.

In the other class, there are those which were begun in the same faith, but which are not as yet so abundantly realizing the first hopes. The delay in the development of this latter class is not because of any error in judgment on the part of those who begun them. There is not a superfluous mission in the Archdeaconry. Every mission ought to be where it is. Every one will be successful in due time. The delay in development is because of imperfect train service; the failure of the trolley to reach the places where they are; or some such cause as these. In the meantime, however, we are acquiring property, paying for it, occupying the ground, and fully equipping ourselves for the good work which will be certainly done in the very near future. There are only two or three of these, and these receive nothing from the Diocese.

St. Thomas' Mission, Lyndhurst, is one of them. It is

supported by its own offerings, and by Grace Church, Rutherford. Sunday services are held; the Holy Communion celebrated; a Sunday School maintained; and the mission property kept in good repair. The mission building and lot are entirely free from debt. It is a time of waiting. The Rev'd H. M. LADD, Rector of Rutherford, is in charge.

Holy Trinity Mission, Hillsdale, is another of these. When the Mission was started the carshops of the New Jersey and New York R. R. were located in the little town. These have been removed to another place, and the growth of the town has been checked in consequence. But it is only checked. The increase will certainly come. This Mission owns a very nice piece of property, consisting of a building and very large lot, entirely paid for. Services are maintained regularly by the Rev'd ARTHUR WHITAKER, Rector of Norwood.

The Mission of the Epiphany, Allendale, has been of this class, but is leaving it. The past year has been a most encouraging one. There has been a decided growth in interest and in strength There are sixty-seven communicants, and forty-five children in the Sunday School. The offerings have been \$943. A silver Communion flagon was presented by an old friend, and a complete set of Communion linen by the Ladies' Guild, on Easter Sunday. A Seminarian, Mr. J. W. Jackson, has been in charge under my personal direction. He is to be ordered Deacon on Trinity Sunday, and will continue in charge of the Mission.

St. John's Mission, Nordhoff, is supported entirely by St. Paul's Church, Englewood. It also is waiting a growth which is slow in coming, but which will certainly come. There are forty communicants; there are seventy-four teachers and scholars in the Sunday School. The offerings have been \$146. Mr. W. A. BURDETTE is in charge as Lay Reader, working under the Rev'd George F. FLICHTNER, Rector of St. Paul's, Englewood.

St. Agnes' Mission, Jersey City, is a Mission of St. Mark's Church, Jersey City, and is supported by its own offerings, and by the mother parish. There are nearly seventy-five communicants. Twelve have been confirmed. The contributions have been better than for several years. The Sunday School is growing in a very satisfactory manner. A Woman's Guild is doing excellent work. The Rev'd Frederic E. Mortimer gives all clerical service.

One of the most interesting and promising portions of this Archdeaconry is that portion of the Palisades which lies about Fort Lee. There have been two bodies of Christian people in this town, the Romanists and the Congregationalists. The latter body has had its eyes turned toward the Church for several years.

Four years ago the Rev'd Mr. McCleary, Rector at Edgewater, received Mr. Walter D. Brown into the Church. This gentleman had been ministering to this congregation. He had been using portions of the Prayer Book service in his services. More recently Mr. George H. Doggart, a Churchman, became the organist of the congregation. He pressed the use of the Prayer Book more energetically. This led to definite action on the part of the congregation, and to their appeal to the Bishop to be received into the Church.

The Rev'd Mr. McCleary met this congregation, at a meeting over which he presided, and received their unanimous decision to become a congregation of the Church. He has given them careful instruction in the history, position, government, and doctrines of the Church. He has received their individual pledges that they will be loyal to the Church; will be instructed for Confirmation; and when ready, will offer themselves for Confirmation. Nothing more unique or interesting has ever taken place in the Diocese. It is not the impulsive action of a moment, it is the result of four years of thought and preparation. The church property is worthfully \$3,000. An organ costing \$1,000 was recently pur-

chased. The title is held by the Congregational Building Society of New York City. Mr. McCleary has offered this society \$1,200 for the entire property. The offer has been accepted. It will require \$800 more to make such alterations as will be necessary to put it in condition for our uses. He is diligently at work raising this money.

The town of Grantwood is as far south of Fort Lee as Coytesville is north. It is growing rapidly and solidly. Major McClave, a Churchman, has given the Rev'd Mr. McCleary, for the church, a fine large corner lot, nearly two hundred feet square, in the very heart of the town. Plans are ready for the erecting of a church building. Work will be begun at once. A larger portion of the money (\$2,000) is already in sight. It is hoped that there will be but little debt when the building is complete. The outlook in this mission is most promising. It is all due, under God, to Mr. McCleary.

The good work not only continues in the Mission of the Good Shepherd, Fort Lee, it increases constantly. The Mission was cleared of debt a few years ago. Since then more land has been purchased, and \$1,000 has been raised towards a parish house.

Four places are under the charge of the Rev'd James A. McCleary: the Parish at Edgewater, and the Missions at Fort Lee, Grantwood, and Coytesville. No harder, better, more successful work is being done in the Diocese than is being done by this truly consecrated man of God.

The new Mission of the Annunciation, Oradell, is more than realizing all that was expected of it. It has done more in the past year than seemed possible. It has paid its own way. It has acquired valuable mission furniture. It has purchased a lot 115x150 feet in the very best portion of the town. This will be entirely paid for in a few weeks. The hope is to build a mission building and a rectory, to cost not less than \$6,000, in the present year. This work is under the charge of Mr. Chas. S. Champlin, a Seminarian. Mr. Champlin is one

of our own Candidates, a member of my own Parish, and will be ordered Deacon by our Bishop, on the First Sunday after Trinity. He will continue in charge of the Mission. He is heartily commended to all to whom he may come in the interests of the Mission.

The Mission Church of the Ascension, Jersey City, has passed safely through an experience which often sets back a long while the progress and success of a mission. The Rev'd TAMES CAMERON, who had been in charge of it for fourteen years, died quite unexpectedly to us all on the 26th of December last. He was second in the list of clergy still in active service, in canonical residence in the Diocese. He had filled an honored place in the Diocese. He was the valued friend of many of us. His sudden death shocked us greatly. There was not a break in the services however. The Mission was put into the hands of Mr. Duncan M. Genns, a Seminarian, who is to be ordered Deacon at once. He is doing astonishingly well. A remaining balance of \$250, on the second mortgage of \$3,000 on the mission property, had been paid before Mr. CAMERON'S death. A vested choir of men and boys was introduced on Palm Sunday. A class of twenty-six was confirmed on the 14th of this month. There have been forty-one baptisms. There are two hundred and thirteen teachers and scholars in the Sunday School. There are two hundred communicants who have received during the past few months. The offerings have been \$1,822. There remains now a first mortgage of \$3,000. This will be paid in due time. Great things may be looked for from this Mission in the near future.

An atmosphere of uncertainty has hung over St. Matthew's Church, Jersey City, for the past few months. The members of the Vestry have thought it was useless to attempt to support the Church and services any longer. They have made formal application to the Bishop and Standing Committee to be permitted to sell the church property, to

turn the proceeds over, after paying all debts, to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, and to take such steps as might be necessary for the extinction of the Parish. They are hopeless of the future of the Parish, not because of any lack on the part of the Rev'd W. G. WEBB, Priest in charge, for they are unanimous in praise of his fidelity and worth, but because of the constant changes in the neighborhood. The American population is leaving constantly, and Russians, Hungarians, and Poles are taking their places. This feeling of hopelessness is not shared by the members of the congregation. They believe there is still a need of the Church where it is, and that there is much good work for it still to do. They are resisting the abandoning of the work, and the extinction of the Parish. They are making a vigorous house-to-house visitation, and are doing all they can to bring to the aid of the Church the full strength of the Parish, and so save the old historic Church, which is the mother Church of all in the eastern portion of the Diocese. With 194 communicants: with 29 baptisms and 15 confirmed during the year; with offerings amounting to \$1,711, they feel they are warranted in their efforts to save the Parish.

The Mission of St. John the Divine, Hasbrouck Heights, is making steady and substantial progress. The property is almost entirely free of debt. It will soon be entirely free. It is thought to be the strongest religious body in the town. Almost all the young men in the place are connected with it in one way or another, whatever may have been their earlier religious affiliations. This is the special feature in the work of this Mission, and is as commendable as it is special. There are 100 communicants; 8 have been confirmed in the past year; 8 were baptized; there are seventy-five in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$866. Appreciation of the faithful work of the Rev'd J. M. Rich, Priest in charge, was shown by a substantial increase in his stipend, by the people of the Mission.

St. Paul's Mission, Montvale, is waiting. It is the furthest north of all our parishes or missions on the line of the New Jersey and New York R. R. The inflow of population from New York City is nearing it, but has not yet quite reached it. It is ministering to the population now there. It has an excellent property with scarcely any debt. It pays its own way with commendable independence. It is under the immediate care of Mr. Chas. S. Champlin, who is soon to be ordered Deacon, and who will continue in charge of it.

No better or more substantial work has been done in any of our missions than has been done in St. Clement's Mission. Hawthorne, during the past year. The faithful people have been worshipping for the past six years in a hired hall. A mission building was an imperative necessity. All had a mind to work, and this necessity has been met. They have now a most attractive and suitable building. The ground for the new building was broken on May 21st of last year. The corner-stone was laid on the 1st of June. Services were held in the basement, beginning with August 1st. On the Twentysecond Sunday after Trinity the building was formally opened by the Bishop of the Diocese. Two hundred and fifteen services have been held during the past year. There have been 9 baptisms; 7 have been confirmed; there are 52 communicants; there are 60 in the Sunday School; the receipts have been \$820. The Mission is indebted to the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese for generous aid in furnishing seats in the building. The Rev'd GEORGE M. DORWART is the Priest in charge. Mr. Wm. MAWHINNEY is the faithful and hardworking and self denying Lay Reader in immediate charge of the work. He freely gives his services, receiving no remuneration.

Steady and substantial improvement has been made in all lines of work in All Saints' Mission, Leonia. Much good has been done in bringing back to the Mission many communicants who had strayed away from it in former years. The Priest in

charge, the Rev'd ARTHUR F. LEWIS, is learning how to endure hardness as a good soldier of Jesus Christ. He has personal charge of St. James', Ridgefield, and Palisades Park, as well as All Saints', Leonia. He is at present giving six services every Sunday, covering several miles to do it. He is most faithful to his trust. The mission building is kept in excellent condition, and will soon be free of debt. There are 84 communicants; 4 have been confirmed; 9 baptized; the offerings have been \$1,221.

Trinity Chapel, Bayonne, is one of the busiest and most hopeful spots in the Archdeaconry. Under the Rev'd W. S. DANKER's supervision substantial progress has been made during the past year. The various organizations of the Chapel are reaching, and influencing for good, people who could hardly be reached in any other way. The work is distinctly a missionary work. The Girls' Friendly; the Women's Guild: the Young Men's Club; the Temperance Cadets are keenly alive to their opportunities, and are working most effectively. There have been 33 baptisms; 19 were confirmed; there are 130 communicants; there are 150 in the Sunday School. The cost of maintaining this work has been \$1,800. The people of the Mission contributed \$550 of this. The balance \$1,250 was given by the mother parish, Trinity Church, Bergen Point. The Rector of Trinity Church, the Rev'd F. M. Kirkus, is unceasing in his labors for the success of this work.

The Mission of St. Mary, Ridgefield Park, is not only continuing the good work it has done in the past few years, it is extending and strengthening it. The present property is leased property. There is great doubt about our being able to even acquire title to it. Those in charge are looking about for desirable property that can be purchased. When this is found and acquired the present chapel building will be moved to it, a parish house built, and provision made for permanent work. The people of the Mission are very faithful and

responsive. The Rev'd E. J. Cooper is Priest in charge. There have been 4 baptisms; 12 have been confirmed; there are 33 communicants; there are 68 in the Sunday School;

the offerings have been \$913.

Services are held twice each Sunday in St. Peter's Mission, Clifton. The outlook is very encouraging. The lots about the mission building have been filled in, and grass seed sown. The appearance of the property is improved greatly in consequence. The Rev'd E. J. Balsley of St. Luke's, Paterson, is Priest in charge. The Rev'd Wm. A. Long is conducting the services. There are 30 children in the Sunday School; there are 30 communicants; the offerings have been \$546. The property is valued at \$3,041. At the beginning of this year it had a debt of \$1,280. That has been reduced by \$300. It is now only \$980. The Mission people are bravely facing this, and will soon entirely liquidate it.

I have not given the statistics of all the Missions. I have given samples here and there. I have given enough to show most plainly that good seed is being planted in good soil in these Missions, and that an abundant harvest is being reaped. This Archdeaconry has received \$1,725 from the Board of Missions. In return for it there have been 150 baptisms; 78 have been confirmed; there are 1,134 communicants; there are 965 children under instruction in the Sunday Schools; and the people of the Missions have themselves made offerings amounting to \$11,050. Surely we may all thank God, and take abundant courage.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF NEWARK.

To the Right Rev'd Thomas A. Starkey, D. D., Bishop of Newark:

The Missionaries in charge of the various Mission stations of the Archdeaconry of Newark report a year of quiet, uneventful, but faithful work.

At Trinity Mission, Arlington, in charge of the Rev'd Mr. KELLER, services have been regularly maintained during the past year. The Holy Communion has been celebrated by the Rev'd Mr. FLIEDNER, who resides at Arlington, and by other clergymen; Mr. John M. Moore, a Lay Reader, has also rendered most faithful and valuable services. During all the long sad time of Mr. KELLER's illness and gradual recovery, it is a pleasure to record that he has been cheered and comforted by the steady loyalty and devoted affection of his people. Never in the history of the Mission have the congregations been so large, or the Sunday School so flourishing, as in the past twelve months. In every way, the people of Trinity Mission have shown their confidence in their Missionary, and it was a great joy to all when, on Easter Sunday, Mr. Keller's sight was sufficiently restored to enable him to read a portion of the service. Twenty-four have been baptized, and twenty-one confirmed in this Mission during the year. The Sunday School numbers one hundred and sixty. A society of young men, known as the Trinity Club, has been organized during the year, and now numbers thirty-five active members.

The Church of the Good Shepherd, Hamburgh, and St. Thomas' Church, Vernon, continue in the charge of the Rev'd JOSEPH H. SMITH, whose zeal and activity, despite his ad-

vanced years, nobly merit the tribute of respect and admiration which his brethren gladly accord. There is little growth in population at either Hamburgh or Vernon, but the Church people of both villages are earnest and devoted, and their offerings for Diocesan and General Missions show a generous interest, worthy of special mention. If all our people gave to Missions as regularly and as liberally, in proportion to their means, as do the eighty communicants of these two country Missions, the problem of Missionary Apportionment would be easily solved.

In addition to the regular work at Hamburgh and Vernon, services were held during the summer in the mountain region about Vernon. This work was undertaken and efficiently carried on by a Lay Reader, Mr. Robert F. Kellemen, a student of the General Seminary, under the direction and supervision of the Rev'd Mr. Smith. The money for this work was contributed in part by the Church people of New York, and in part by an appropriation from our Diocesan Board. Services were held at different places in the mountains, and over 170 calls were made upon the people. Mr. Kellemen reports a generally good attendance at the services, and considerable interest shown in the Church. Nineteen persons were baptized, three of whom were adults, and eight were prepared for confirmation.

On June 13th of last year, the new church of Zion, Belvidere, was consecrated by the Bishop. It will be remembered, that on May 8th, 1900, the old church was burned and, with its contents, completely destroyed. The new building is smaller, but it is much more churchly and attractive in its appearance, and large enough for the needs of the congregation for years to come. It seats about 125. In addition to the insurance of \$2,200, some \$1,000 was required to build the church. This amount was raised by the Church people of Belvidere, with some aid from their friends, and the fact is a credit to them and their Missionary, the Rev'd George H.

Young. An organ, an altar, lectern, a silver Communion service, alms basin, and clergy vestments were also given, and the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese furnished \$50 towards the purchase of pews. The offerings for all purposes during the year were \$730.

St. James' Church, Knowlton, also in charge of Mr. Young, reports little of change from year to year. We have here some thirty-nine communicants. The church building is kept in good repair, and the services are valued by the people. The offerings for the year were \$309.

The Rev'd Nicholas H. Martin, in charge of St. Luke's Church, Phillipsburgh, reports nineteen baptized, and twenty-one confirmed during the past year. All the people of this Mission are poor, but their offerings for the year amounted to \$1,096, and in addition, they have raised some \$200 to apply upon a debt of \$400, occasioned by some recent improvements to the property. The Parish now owes only \$200, and Mr. Martin expresses the belief that when this is paid, the appropriation from the Board of Missions can be materially reduced, and before long can be entirely relinquished.

St. James' Church, Hackettstown, in charge of the Rev'd WILLIAM M. MITCHAM, has passed through a most trying and disheartening year. The business interests of Hackettstown suffered greatly from the burning of the large Methodist school, some two years ago, and this year, as matters were picking up, came a fearful epidemic of small pox. There were in all, one hundred and thirty cases in the village, and seven deaths. The town was partially in a state of quarantine, all business came to a stand-still. Churches and schools were closed for seven weeks. Throughout this trying time Mr. MITCHAM remained faithfully at his post; extending to all who desired, the ministrations of the Church, visiting the sick, and burying the dead. Considering the unfavorable conditions, the report of the Mission is most encouraging. The offerings for the year were \$584. Five hundred dollars in ad-

dition have been subscribed in the village towards the building of a rectory, on ground already owned by the Mission, adjoining the church. Five hundred dollars more have been subscribed by friends, mostly in the Diocese. A house to cost \$3,500 is now in process of building, \$2,300 has been obtained on mortgage, and \$200 are still needed to complete the necessary amount. There is no other debt on the church property. Four have been baptized, and nine confirmed during the year.

Christ Church, Stanhope, also in charge of Mr. MITCHAM, suffered from the small pox epidemic at Hackettstown, as the local Board of Health closed all the churches, for several weeks, for fear of contagion from Hackettstown. With this exception however, an afternoon Sunday service and Sunday school have been maintained, with a morning service once a month. The Missionary reports a better attendance than during the previous year. A new hot-air furnace has been placed in the church, and paid for. The offerings amounted to \$282. Five were baptized, and twelve confirmed in the year. The communicants now number sixty-seven.

The Rev'd Levi Johnston, in charge of St. Mark's Mission, Mendham, reports little or no change in the condition of the Mission. This Mission receives only \$100 from the Diocesan Board, and has raised, in the past year, for all purposes, \$1,230. There have been four baptized, and the communicants number thirty.

St. Peter's Mission, Washington, in charge of the Rev'd GEORGE P. ARMSTRONG, reports three baptized, and five confirmed during the year. Four families of earnest Churchworkers have moved away from the town, and their loss is severely felt. The communicants number sixty, and the offerings for the year are about \$700. The Mission receives \$400 from the Diocesan Board. The Missionary reports that he has visited Oxford, but finds few Church people there, and little interest shown in the Church.

St. Paul's Mission, Butler, has been, since February, 1901. in charge of the Rev'd CLINTON H. WEAVER, M. D., Rector of Christ Church, Pompton, whose work at Pompton has been most remarkably successful; congregations have doubled, a most desirable piece of ground has been bought, and plans have been adopted for a new church and rectory in the most desirable part of the Borough. Dr. WEAVER reports that there has been an improvement in the Sunday School at Butler, which now numbers thirty, and the financial obligations of the Mission have been fully and promptly met. Seven children have been baptized, and a small class is being prepared for Confirmation. The congregations, however, are not large, and it is hoped there may be an improvement another year in this respect. The church, as was reported last year, has been consecrated, and the Mission is clear of debt. It receives \$200 from the Diocesan Board. The offerings last year were **\$**343.

St. Peter's Mission, Essex Fells, and St. Agnes', Little Falls, in charge of the Rev'd Appleton Grannis, report a year of quiet, steady growth, and progress. Essex Fells has grown considerably during the past year, and the Church is reaping the benefit. The number of communicants has increased from 40 to 60, and the offerings for the year were \$1,200. At Little Falls, the Mission is out of debt, and the church was consecrated October 27th. The offerings have been about \$800. Both these Missions are now entirely self-supporting. There have been four baptisms, three have been confirmed, and a class of ten awaits the Bishop's visitation in June.

St. Peter's Mission, Mt. Arlington, was again in charge of the Rev'd Dr. STOCKING, for the summer, and during the winter. Mr. SUTTON, a student from the General Seminary, acted as Lay Reader. At Christmas and Easter there were celebrations of the Holy Communion. Five persons have been baptized during the year. Several communicants have moved away, and the stormy weather in February and March still further reduced the number of the winter congregation. Dr. STOCKING has recently written that he does not expect to take charge of the Mission this summer, and some other arrangement must therefore be made. This Mission does not receive aid from the Diocesan Board, the offerings of the summer congregation having been sufficient, until last year, to meet the expenses of the winter services.

St. John's Mission, Montclair, in charge of the Rev'd CLAUDIUS M. ROOME, held its first service in the new church on Easter Day. This Mission, self-supporting from the outset, has grown most rapidly, and its future is full of promise. It now numbers 104 communicants. Its total receipts, for all purposes, were \$12,409. Fifteen have been baptized, and a class for Confirmation is in preparation. The beautiful little church, built of stone, seats 182, and is enriched by many costly and beautiful gifts. The Mission has the hearty good will and interest of the neighboring Parishes, and has received the canonical consent of the Bishop to become incorporated as a Parish.

During the past year a parochial Mission of Christ Church, Bloomfield, the Rev'd Edwin A. White, Rector, was begun in the south-east part of the town. A store building was rented and fitted up as a chapel, and regular services have been held. The growth of this missionary effort has been most encouraging, and the Rector reports that the Sunday congregations average nearly one hundred. The Vestry of Christ Church have purchased a most desirable lot, on the corner of Montgomery and Berkeley Avenues, in Bloomfield, worth \$1,200, and a chapel is now being built, capable of seating two hundred, to be known as Ascension Chapel. This Mission has been supported, from the first, by the Parish of Christ Church, and receives no aid from the Diocesan Board.

St. Alban's Mission, Newark, in charge of the Rev'd Elliot White, reports a prosperous year. The neighborhood

is growing rapidly, and the outlook for the Mission is most hopeful. A class of eighteen, the largest in the history of the Mission, was presented for Confirmation in December. Last fall the Mission purchased, under mortgage, four lots adjacent to the church, and on this ground, the congregation has built a parish building and Sunday School room, which can be thrown into the church, thus increasing its seating capacity. The building cost \$1,400, and by the earnest efforts of the people, aided by some generous friends, is nearly paid for.

Several conferences have been held between the Archdeacon and the Rector of Calvary Church, Summit, looking
towards the re-establishing of services at Chatham. A piece of
ground was offered for the site of a church, but, after careful
consideration, it was decided that the location was not favorable for the growth of a Mission. The matter is at present in
abeyance, but is by no means given up. The growth of
Chatham, if slow, is sure, and the Church must be planted
there in the near future.

Taking advantage of this unwelcome opportunity, the Vestry have decided to make some small addition to the building at a cost of about \$2,500. Work is now actively under way, and will be completed about the middle of September. The parish united with St. Peter's for a number of Sundays; but we have recently been enabled to make use of our chapel.

REPORTS OF HOSPITALS, HOMES AND WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

HOSPITAL OF ST. BARNABAS, NEWARK.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

The statistics furnished by those who are engaged in the work of the Hospital of St. Barnabas exhibit a condition of great activity and of far-reaching usefulness, during the past year. This period covers the first entire year during which the new wing has been in use, and the reports of the number of patients treated and the cost of maintenance, may be taken to represent fairly the conditions which are likely to prevail in consequence of that addition to the Hospital Building.

A close inspection of the above-mentioned statistics will show that the Hospital is doing greater work than in former years, and that there has been gratifying increase, where such increase was anticipated.

In the in-door department 991 patients have been treated, of whom 64 remained over from the preceding year, and 927 were new cases; 853 have been discharged, 83 have died, and 53 remained at the end of the year. In the number thus reported, there is an excess of 78 patients above the number treated in the year ending April 1, 1901.

The number of private patients in the rooms who have paid for their accommodations was 157, and the number of those paying in the wards was 244. The City of Newark paid, as usual, \$2,500 into the treasury of the Hospital, and 120 patients, at an average of \$10 a month, have been cared for on the City's account. The remainder, 470, were cared for free of charge.

These patients represent many nationalities, chief among which are: The United States, 596; Germany, 122; Russia, 49; Ireland, 40; England, 40; Italy, 20; Austria, 19.

There were in all 395 operations. In the out-door department there were 1,261 new and 2,397 old cases, a total of 3,658; and 386 clinical visits. The increase in this department over the previous year was 451. Of this large number of out-door patients (new cases), 728 were natives of the United States, 183 of Russia, 99 of Germany, 75 of Austria, 34 of England, 23 of Ireland, 10 of Italy, 10 of Hungary, and the rest, in smaller numbers, of nine different countries.

The reports of the medical and surgical staffs show in great detail the wide scope of the Hospital's work in relieving suffering, without regard to the nationality, condition or religious affiliation of the patients. Those in charge of the departments, a summary of whose reports has been given above, have, under the direction of the Medical Board, done faithful service and their work has been most efficient.

The Training School for Nurses, which has much to do with the efficiency of the Hospital, continues under the superintendence of Miss Forbes. Since its inauguration, seven years ago, fifty-three nurses have graduated and their services have been in great demand. The class which graduated on the 8th inst., numbered 8 pupils. The number in the school throughout the year was 20.

The continued oversight of the Sisters of St. Margaret, with Sister Adeline as Hospital Superintendent, has secured for the Hospital able and faithful management. The cares of the Sisters are very many, and they deserve, and we believe will continue to receive, the help and encouragement of the

Trustees and of all others who are interested in their work, and in the welfare of the Hospital.

Chapel services and ministrations in the wards and private rooms are still maintained by the faithful chaplain who has served in recent years; and for those who desire other ministrations than those which the Hospital provides, care is taken that they have such ministrations as they desire.

We turn to the report of the Treasurer in order to see how all this work has been maintained. It shows: Receipts. \$28,530,85; expenditures, \$28,395.89; balance on hand, \$134.96. In last year's report the corresponding amounts were: Receipts, \$27.050.51; expenditures, \$26,461.10; balance on hand, \$598.32. There has been an increase of receipts (including balance on hand of previous year) of \$1,471.34, and of expenditures, \$1,934.70. The report shows that we have fallen short this year, to the amount of \$2,500, balance on discount note made during the year (less the balance of \$134.96), and that "about \$3,000 is owing for current household bills of last year." A year ago the amount of unpaid household bills was (about) \$1,700; there is therefore an increase of \$1,300 on that account. We regret to say that the floating debt has been thus increased to \$14,500 in discount notes, and (about) \$3,000 is in unpaid bills, making in all \$17.500.

This is explained by the fact that a discount note for \$3,000 appears among the receipts of last year. There was no such item in the report of the previous year's receipts. There was, however, in the report of that year's receipts an aggregate sum of \$5,644.00, from sources which are but temporary, and occasional in the history of the Hospital, viz.: Legacies, \$5,125; sale of Wallace property, \$400; Hospital Saturday and Sunday collection, 1899, \$119. No such items appear in the report of this year and hence the deficiencies which we have noted. Notwithstanding the abovementioned deficiencies there was last year a gross increase of

\$4,000.17 from the following sources, over contributions of the previous year: The Guild of St. Barnabas, \$400; the Soliciting Committee, \$65; the HOSPITAL REVIEW, including receipts from appeal, \$116,60; board of patients, \$2,166.67; interest on endowment. \$418.62: churches and Sunday schools, \$228.54; circular appeal, \$220; annual support of beds, \$150; individual and annual subscriptions, \$234.75. Increases of expenditures have amounted to the gross sum of \$2.732.22. distributed as follows: Wages and salaries, \$259.90; coal, \$181.96; gas, \$161.89; ice, \$111.38; groceries and provisions, \$1,072,05; interest account, \$444.14; payment on discount note, \$500. In some items there has been saving in expense to the amount of \$686.30; that is to say, in repairs, \$37.34; telephone, printing and stationery, plumbing, etc., \$83.91; city assessments, \$68.52; medical and surgical supplies, \$487.78; treasurer's office, \$8.75. The net increase in expenditures on the foregoing items is therefore \$2,045.92, and the net excess of receipts over expenditures is \$1,954.23.

We have been at pains to give these details in order to show that in the actual working of the Hospital through the occupancy of the new wing, especially, its usefulness has been notably increased, and that there has been in certain financial items satisfactory improvement.

We have also tried to show that there still remains need for special efforts on the part of the friends of the Hospital to make its work known and to interest others in it. It is not to be expected that legacies and donations of a special character will come in to swell our accounts and to enable us to balance them, every year. It is to be desired that when they do come, they should not go to the meeting of current expenses. It does seem that what is most needed is to create and develope among our people generally that sense of responsibility for this most worthy institution which will lead to regular and systematic effort to secure increased contributions for its support. If the different parishes and congrega-

tions in the Archdeaconry of Newark could be induced to make the Hospital one of the objects to which they will pledge themselves to contribute stated sums every year; or if a system of regular collections among them by soliciting committees, under the authority of Rectors and Vestrymen, could be inaugurated, no doubt much could be done in securing additional funds. Either of these plans might be adopted, without interfering in any way, with the soliciting committees of the Guild of St. Barnabas.

The mortgage indebtedness is still \$27,000; and the endowment fund remains, as last year, \$42,000.

We venture again to urge the importance of increasing this fund; and to express our hope that legacies and other contributions may be set apart by friends of the Hospital for this specific purpose—to remain forever among our sources of revenue.

We have given much space to the Treasurer's report, as showing the sources from which supplies have come for the support of the great work of the Hospital. We cannot dismiss the subject without calling attention to the fact that these various sums received have not come without much faithful and persistent work on the part of many people. But for their devotion we would have little to report.

To mention the Guild of the Hospital of St. Barnabas is but to remind every one of the most active agency which has been enlisted on behalf of the Hospital, for securing funds for its support. Year by year, with unflagging zeal does its work go on, and this year it has exceeded by \$400 its contributions of last year. In a few days the sum of \$500 will be received from this source.

St. Katharine's Guild, ministering as it does to the comfort of the patients,—while it does not find place in the financial report,—has helped greatly in our work. There is in addition a large number of societies in different parishes, and congregations (some not of our communion) whose kindly help

has swelled the stream of benefactions which has flowed in during the year, sending money and donations for the patients' use. Besides, the soliciting committees, by their collections, and business men throughout the city, by their regular contributions, have added much to our strength. Where money has not been given, often provisions and delicacies have been contributed.

Mention of all our benefactors in detail cannot be made here, but The Hospital Review publishes all particulars in regard to these sources of supply; and reference must be made to that able and useful Magazine for specific information concerning them.

We thank all benefactors for their help and service; and bespeak their continued and increasing interest.

This report, while it represents difficulties, very plainly, is written in no spirit of discouragement. Brave and earnest men ever find in conditions such as now confront us a call to strenuous effort to better them. This we call upon the friends of the Hospital and the public generally to help us do.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1901.

On behalf of the Council we beg to submit the following report:

WORK OF THE YEAR.

During the year 1901 four thousand four hundred and eighty-one patients received medical and surgical treatment in all the departments of the Hospital, 827 in the public wards, 252 in the private rooms, 1,012 in the Eye and Ear Department and 2,390 in the Dispensary. Details of the work will be found in the report of the Superintendent and in the Medical and Surgical reports.

BENEVOLENT WORK.

Of the 827 patients cared for in the wards 625, or 75 1/2 per cent. were treated free of all cost to themselves, and 131 or nearly 16 per cent., made only partial payment for their board. But 71 patients, less than 9 per cent., paid full board. This record emphasizes the fact that Christ Hospital is not a sanitarium—not an institution for making money; and while we believe it is right for those who are able, to pay for their maintenance, no one is ever turned from its doors, nor ever will be, simply because of inability to pay for treatment and care.

FINANCES.

As will be seen by the Treasurer's report the receipts for the year, including balances brought forward, available for current expenses and the payment of the floating debt, have been \$32,304.98. The current expenses have been \$30,704.71. The net floating debt is \$9,056.69, a reduction of \$1,600.27 since January 1st. Of the total receipts over \$10,000 have been contributed by friends of the Hospital. Without their constant assistance the Hospital could not do its work, and we take this opportunity of thanking them publicly on behalf of the Council for their great kindness and generosity.

It has long been desired to add to the list of benefactors a large number of persons subscribing from fifty cents to five dollars each. With this object in view two young women have been equipped with uniforms by the kindness of a friend of the Hospital, and they are now engaged in going from house to house soliciting and collecting subscriptions. It is too early yet to pass judgment on the value of the plan, but the results so far seem to have justified the experiment.

- INTERNAL ADMINISTRATION.

In November, Miss KATHARINE JOHNSTON, for five and one-half years the faithful and efficient Superintendent of the Hospital, resigned, and her successor has not yet been appointed.

Within the year several important changes have been made in the department of accounts which it is believed will make for safety and accuracy in transacting the business of the institution. The Treasurer's office has been established at the Hospital, and the clerk, who is under bonds, has been placed in charge. Henceforth all accounts of whatever nature will be kept in this office.

More than one-half of the yearly income is received from the Hospital itself, from the board of patients and other sources. A system has been devised for the handling of these funds which keeps track of them from the time they are received until they are finally expended, thus securing the publicity which is the greatest element of safety in transactions of this kind. Improved methods have also been introduced in the ordering and purchasing of household supplies which make it much easier to keep the run of monthly consumption of all kinds. The effect of these changes will be to put the Executive Committee in closer touch with the internal working of the institution, to give it fuller information respecting details, and thus to promote economy in administration.

REPAIRS AND IMPROVEMENTS.

The \$500 received from the estate of Mrs. DOROTHEA OCK have been devoted to the erection of a fire escape on the north wing. It is a commodious structure, which in summer can be used by convalescent patients as a veranda, and will no doubt be greatly appreciated. No other important improvements have been made within the last year.

THE TRAINING SCHOOL.

The Training School has been entirely reorganized and its educational value much increased. It has been made an independent department of the Hospital and placed under the control of the Training School Committee, which has been constituted one of the standing committees of the Council. The immediate direction of the School and of all matters connected with nursing has been vested in an official whose title is Superintendent of the Training School. The course of instruction has been thoroughly revised, extended, and brought up to date, and the period of training has been lengthened from two years to three. Of the third year nurses, those who show special aptitude for institutional work will be kept in the Hospital in charge of wards and in other positions of responsibility, and the remainder will do outside nursing, under supervision, for the benefit of the Hospital. The good effects of this change will begin to be felt in 1904, when first a class of nurses will be available for outside work.

Last year ten nurses were graduated. There are now twenty-seven pupil nurses and five probationers in the School.

THE GUILDS.

For many years the Guilds of ladies connected with the Hospital have been of the very greatest assistance in the work. They bear constantly a large part of the burden of maintenance, and there have been times when but for their interest and help it is difficult to see how the Council could have met the demands made upon it. The last year has been in some respects exceptional for the value and extent of the assistance given, and the Council gladly acknowledges its great indebtedness to all the Guilds for their kindly interest and unfailing generosity.

The Abercrombie Guild was organized for two purposes: to hold endowment funds for the benefit of the Hospital, and to provide funds for current expenses. In the last twelve months it has added \$6,000 to its permanent fund, and has also remitted to the Treasurer \$3,004.66 for the maintenance of the Hospital, an amount for this purpose which has never been exceeded but once and then by less than five dollars. Besides its regular work the Guild is raising money for a new Daisy ward, and now has over \$4,000 in hand for such a building.

The Abercrombie Memorial Fund has paid to the Treasurer of the Hospital \$500 for the reduction of the mortgage debt, and a friend of the institution has paid a like amount through the Rev'd WILLIAM R. JENVEY. The principal of the mortgage has therefore been reduced to \$1,000.

It is impossible to speak of the Abercrombie Guild and not mention its paper, "The Daisy." To no other single agency, unless perhaps its founder, does Christ Hospital owe so much. The 24th birthday of this little paper will come in April, 1902. For almost a quarter of a century it has been telling the story of the needs and hopes of the Hospital, and within this period it has collected upwards of \$65,000 for endowment funds and permanent improvement. It is not the custom to mention in our annual reports the names of living benefactors; but we feel privileged to make an exception in

the case of Miss Mary C. Barry, the editor of "The Daisy" and the Treasurer of the Abercrombie Guild, for to her more than to anyone else connected with the Hospital are due thanks and praise for unflagging interest and untiring effort.

St. Mary's Guild raises money to meet the regular interest charge. It has placed some 400 mite boxes in stores and families, and other localities, and through them it collected last year \$1,085, or nearly two-thirds of the amount required for the annual interest on the mortgage debt.

Christ Hospital Guild, of Hoboken, is an especially valuable auxiliary in that it is not pledged to any specific work. If urgent needs arise it is in a position to take care of them, and this it does do constantly, providing household supplies of all kinds and also money in certain emergencies. It numbers nearly if not quite 300 members, and has expended during the year \$571 for the benefit of the Hospital.

RELIGIOUS SERVICES.

Services have been held regularly in the Chapel and wards on Sundays and the Holy Communion has been celebrated on Thursdays by the Chaplain, and prayers have been said in the wards as usual every evening. The Holy Communion has been celebrated on the great festivals, and special services have been held as occasion required.

THE MEDICAL STAFF.

Within the last year Dr. Henry Spence has been appointed Attending Surgeon, succeeding Dr. Conrad Wienges, deceased. In the Out Patient Department Dr. Bowyer has been succeeded by Dr. Enright. The Council also created the position of Dermatologist and Dr. Charles H. Purdy was appointed as the first incumbent.

The reputation of any hospital is largely due to its medical staff, and in this respect Christ Hospital presents no exception to the general rule. It gives the Council, therefore, great pleasure to record its hearty appreciation of the faithful and efficient services of the attending physicians and surgeons.

LEGACIES.

During the year \$5,000 have been received from the estate of Mr. Louis M. Vogel, of Hoboken, and \$500 from the estate of Mrs. Dorothea Och. Notice has also been received of the following bequests: \$50,000 by Mrs. John R. McPherson, \$5,000 by Mr. John W. Harrison, and \$2,000 by Mrs. Harriet Welsh.

NECROLOGY.

On May 23d Dr. Conrad Wienges entered into rest after a long and painful illness. For eleven years he had been connected with the Medical Staff as Attending Physician and Surgeon, and in this time had won the confidence and respect of all his associates. On December 26th he was followed by the Rev'd James Cameron, a valued member of this Council. In the ten years of his membership no one has shown greater interest in the welfare of the Hospital, or has been more ready to spend and be spent in its service.

Kind and courteous Christian gentlemen were both of these who have left us, and their names will ever be held in honored remembrance.

We close this report with a grateful sense of the goodness of God as shown in the history of Christ Hospital from the day of its opening until now. Without Him our labor is but lost, but with Him we go forward, confident that if we do our duty our necessities will be supplied, and that under His blessing our efforts will be brought to a successful issue.

ST. KATHARINE'S HOME.

TWELFTH ANNUAL REPORT.

The work of St. Katharine's Home during the past year has been most satisfactory. We have had our full quota of girls, and they, with their babies, have kept unusually well, even during the extreme heat. They have accomplished a large amount of work and have added to our income \$195.65 this past year.

The work has been preserving and canning fruits, making jellies of all kinds, laundry work and sewing, all of which has been done with excellent judgment and neatness.

In our twelve years of work, there has been no one year which has been more satisfactory, in every respect, than the one which closed in November. This is also the first year when we could write a balance instead of deficit. Through the liberality of our subscribers we have had unusually large donations, and through the earnest work of members of the Executive Committee and Advisory Board we had an entertainment which increased our funds most satisfactorily. Each member of the Committee feels this good financial state to be a cause of congratulation and thankfulness.

I include in this annual report, the reports of the Sisterin-charge and the Chaplain, because they express so strongly and so pertinently the spirit of St. Katharine's Home. The helpful part of the work is the religious influence, the protecting home feeling the girls have and the strength gained from the training they receive to do some one kind of work well. In her annual report the Sister-in-charge says:

"Since the last annual report, ten girls have been received at St. Katharine's Home. In two instances the cases were found undesirable. One was returned to her mother; the other placed in another Institution. Two of our old girls are still with us, making our present number ten girls, and nine babies. All our girls are American born, though one is of French Canadian parentage, and one of German. Six are Church girls, one Roman Catholic, one Presbyterian (who wishes to be confirmed), one Baptist, one unbaptized. The ages are from seventeen to twenty-one years. Our girls worked steadily and well through the hot summer. There has been little opportunity for outings, though a few trolley rides were enjoyed, through the kindness of a friend who gave us money for that purpose. Our chief resource for pleasure and fresh air has been the garden, which is at once our pleasure and our pride. Although our nursery has been full all through the heat, the babies have kept well. Of the seven girls who have gone out from us this year, two returned to their homes, and five have been placed at service. All have been heard from within the last few months. Our girls placed at service have done so well that the demand has exceeded the supply twice over.

Our girls, for the most part, retain an affection for the Home after they leave us, returning when possible to see the Sisters, and for services in Chapel. One girl telling about 'going out,' as they call it, said: 'When Sister left me on the train, I just cried, and cried, and an old lady came and sat by me, and said, "what is the matter with you, my girl?" and I said, 'Nothing.' She said, "It must be something to make you cry like that." So I just said, 'well, I am leaving my home, if

you must know!' Her friends will be glad to hear that she has left off crying, and that her Mistress finds her 'very satisfactory.' Another girl, who has given trouble and anxiety, but is now doing well, wrote, "I learned to value two things when I was at St. Katharine's, one is purity of soul, and the other cleanliness." We feel that if the girls learn these two lessons, the labor has not been in vain."

The Chaplain reports that "during the past year one hundred and fifty-three services have been held in the Chapel at St. Katharine's. Four of the inmates have been confirmed, and nine babies baptized.

Besides the instructions given in the Chapel, the Sisters have held classes for the girls, and it is gratifying to notice how much interest is taken, and how much the girls learn in the year they are with us.

From time to time we are encouraged by the visits of young women, who were at the Home nine years ago, and who have made an effort to come and see us and show that they have not forgot all they were taught."

These reports are very satisfactory, not only in regard to the good health of the girls and the babies, but in regard to the improvement of the girls and their affection for St. Katharine's.

They have tried to live better lives, to do a good, faithful work, to respond to the care of the Home, and to carry away with them when they have gone out into the world, a feeling that St. Katharine's has indeed been a Home to which they can always turn.

In modern philanthropy, religious influence is regarded as of little practical value. In our twelve years at St. Katharine's with its numerous problems and success in solving many of them, we find, on looking back, that without this one lever, our work would have been of little worth.

WIDOWS' HOME, HOBOKEN.

The Widows' Home, in Hoboken, is for the reception and care of widows who are communicants of the Church; who have reached the age of sixty, and who come recommended as women worthy to be received into such a Home. It has a small endowment. The house is very comfortable, and everything is done to make the life of the inmates a truly home life. The charges are ten dollars a month, which cover all expenses. The capacity of the Home is limited; only eight or nine can be cared for at one time. There are now only five inmates. Special arrangements can be made for the reception of a worthy person when the conditions are exceptional. Applications can be addressed either to the Secretary of the Board of Trustees or to the Chaplain.

HOUSE OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD, ORANGE.

The House of the Good Shepherd has continued during the past year its customary care of aged and infirm men and women and of convalescents. During the year ending June 1st, 1902, four new inmates have been received. Six convalescents have been given a temporary home, most of them free of charge, and remaining from two weeks to two months, according to their needs. One inmate has died during the year. There are at present nineteen men and women who make up the household under care. Of this number eleven are communicants of the Church.

Regular services are held at the Home on Wednesday mornings and on Sunday afternoons. The Holy Communion is celebrated monthly and on the great festivals.

The report of the Treasurer for the year is summarized as follows:

During the year the entire mortgage indebtedness amounting to \$4,000 has been paid through the generosity of a friend. The Endowment Fund amounts to \$11,900.

The House is under charge of the Parishes of Grace Church, Orange; St. Mark's, West Orange; Holy Communion and St. Andrew's, South Orange; and St. Paul's, East Orange, and is supported by the board paid by its inmates, by the offerings of the Parishes, and by the donations of individuals.

THE ARTHUR HOME.

The Board of Governors of the Arthur Home respectfully presents its annual report.

With much gratitude and pleasure we are able to announce the fact that after many years of anticipation the Home is now established in the new and commodious building on Pine Grove avenue.

The formal opening, consisting of a service of benediction, was held on Tuesday, October 12th. The Bishop of the Diocese officiated, and interesting addresses were made by Archdeacons Mann, of Newark, and Jenvey, of Jersey City, and the Rev'd Walker Gwynne, of Summit. It was a day long to be remembered by all who had worked hard and faithfully in raising the money necessary to erect such a building. Many clergy and other friends of the institution were present, and all expressed satisfaction with the general arrangement and plan of the structure. The bright and cheerful dormitories impressed every one.

Many kind friends have helped thus far in furnishing the various rooms. One donation of \$100 enabled us to fully equip the infirmary, a most necessary feature in such a home. The "Busy Bee Club," of Orange, composed of young girls, furnished one of the dormitories, and others have contributed towards fitting up the hall, school room and dining room. There is still much needed in the way of furniture, but we feel sure that others will be moved to contribute toward the purchasing of such articles as are required.

As announced in our last report, the amount pledged to the building fund was not sufficient to cover the entire cost. Over \$10,000 was raised but it has been necessary to place a

mortgage for \$5,000 on the Home. While we do not consider this a great burden, yet it is the earnest desire of the President and every member of the Board to reduce this indebtedness each year, and a fund for this purpose has already been started.

We have now 27 boys at the Home. Fourteen have been admitted during the year, and 5 returned to parents or guardians.

The health of the children, with but few exceptions, has been excellent. The new infirmary affords opportunity for immediate isolation, and has already proved of great value. Dr. J. Boyd Risk still continues his watchful care and is ever ready to respond whenever called upon for treatment. For these services we are truly grateful.

The matron has always the interests of the boys in mind, and they well repay her for the care bestowed upon them.

The boys give evidence of the training received in the common school branches—the teacher endeavoring to train their minds and hearts in the right direction. Through the generosity of a member of the Board we shall be able to introduce a system of manual training as soon as a suitable teacher can be found. This has long been the wish of the Board, but until the completion of the new building we had no room for such work.

The interest shown in the Home by the Diocese generally has been greatly increased this year, and we are glad to report the addition of several parishes in the list of regular contributors. The source of income, it is hoped, will grow from year to year as the various parishes appreciate the benefit of such a home for the many destitute and homeless boys, who need such care and protection.

The efforts of the Board have been chiefly directed this year toward enlarging the list of regular subscribers for current expenses, as we hope eventually to raise in this way an income sufficient for the yearly support of the Home.

Meantime the Ways and Means Committee have found it necessary to resort to various methods of obtaining funds, and the annual fair in June, and a rummage sale in November helped materially to replenish our treasury.

We earnestly desire to express our heartfelt thanks to all who have in any way contributed to the welfare of the Home, and the happiness of the little inmates. And we most cordially invite our friends to visit the Home and see for themselves the work that we are doing in trying to care for some of the helpless and otherwise homeless little ones.

Appendix 111.

THE GENERAL CONVENTION

To the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese of Newark:

In compliance with the requirements of Title III., Canon I., § iii. of the Digest, I would hereby give particular notice that the following alterations of the Constitution of the Church are proposed: to wit, those comprised in the resolutions printed herewith, said resolutions having been constitutionally adopted by a General Convention held in the city of San Francisco, in October, A. D. 1901.

CONCORD, MASSACHUSETTS, March 1, A. D. 1902.

RESOLUTIONS.

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted at the next General Convention, in accordance with Article XI, of the Constitution, as follows:

Amend Article I., Section 2, of the Constitution by striking out the word "and" at the end of the second line and inserting in place thereof the word "or," and also by striking

out the words "arising therefrom" in the third line, so that the section shall read as follows:

SECTION 2. Every Bishop of this Church having jurisdiction, every Bishop Coadjutor, and every Bishop who by reason of advanced age or bodily infirmity has resigned his jurisdiction, shall have a seat and a vote in the House of Bishops. A majority of all Bishops entitled to vote, exclusive of Foreign Missionary Bishops and of Bishops who have resigned their jurisdictions, shall be necessary to constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted at the next General Convention, in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution, as follows:

Substitute for Article I., Section 3, of the Constitution, as finally agreed to and ratified at this Convention, the following:

SECTION 3. The House of Bishops, by vote of a majority of all the Bishops entitled to a seat in the said House, shall elect one of the Bishops having jurisdiction within the United States to be nominated for confirmation by the House of Deputies to be the Presiding Bishop of the Church. The Presiding Bishop shall hold office for three years. He shall discharge such duties as may be prescribed by the Constitution and the Canons of the General Convention. But if the Presiding Bishop shall resign his office as such, or if he shall resign his episcopal jurisdiction, or if in the judgment of the House he shall become disabled by reason of infirmity, or if for any other reason a vacancy in the office shall occur, the senior Bishop by consecration having jurisdiction within the United States shall thereupon become the Presiding Bishop until the House of Bishops shall elect an acting Presiding Bishop, who shall hold office until the next meeting of the General Convention, at which the Presiding Bishop shall be elected.

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted at the next General Convention, in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution, as follows:

That Article I. of the Constitution be amended by adding thereto the following as Section 6, and changing the number of the present Section 6 to Section 7.

SECTION 6. One Clerical and one Lay Deputy chosen by each Missionary District of the Church within the boundaries of the United States shall have seats in the House of Deputies, subject to all the qualifications and with all the rights of Deputies except the right to vote when the vote shall be taken by orders.

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted at the next General Convention, in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution, as follows:

Add to the first sentence of Article II., Section 1, after the words "Convention of the Diocese" the words:

Provided, however, that when a Diocese shall be formed out of a Missionary District, the Missionary Bishop in charge of said District shall become the Bishop of said Diocese, if he shall so elect.

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted at the next General Convention, in accordance with Article XI, of the Constitution, as follows:

Strike out Article 5 of the Constitution and insert the following as Article V. of the Constitution, viz.:

ARTICLE V.

SECTION 1. A new Diocese may be formed, with the consent of the General Convention and under such conditions as the

General Convention shall prescribe by general Canon or Canons, (x) by the erection into a Diocese of the whole or of any part of one or more Missionary Districts; (2) by the division of an existing Diocese; (3) by the junction of two or more Dioceses or of parts of two or more Dioceses; or (4) by the junction of the whole or part of a Missionary District with a Diocese, or with any part of one or more Dioceses. The proceedings shall originate in a Convocation of the Clergy and Laity of the Missionary District called by the Bishop for that purpose; or, with the approval of the Bishop, in the Convention of the Diocese to be divided; or (when it is proposed to form a new Diocese by the junction of two or more Dioceses or of parts of two or more Dioceses) by mutual agreement of the Conventions of the Dioceses concerned, with the approval of the Bishop or the Ecclesiastical Authority of each Diocese. In case the Episcopate of a Diocese be vacant, no proceedings toward its division shall be taken until the vacancy is filled. During a vacancy in a Missionary District, the consent of the Presiding Bishop must be had before proceedings to erect it into a Diocese are taken. When it shall appear to the satisfaction of the General Convention, by a certified copy of the proceedings and other documents and papers laid before it, that all the conditions for the formation of the new Diocese have been complied with and that it has acceded to the Constitution and Canons of this Church, such new Diocese shall thereupon be admitted to union with the General Convention.

SECTION 2. In case one Diocese shall be divided into two or more Dioceses, the Bishop of the Diocese divided may elect the one to which he will be attached, and he shall thereupon become the Bishop thereof; and the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, may elect the one to which he will be attached, and (if it be not the one elected by the Bishop) he shall be the Bishop thereof.

SECTION 3. In case a Diocese shall be formed out of

parts of two or more Dioceses, each of the Bishops and Bishops Coadjutor of the several Dioceses out of which the new Diocese has been formed shall be entitled, in order of seniority of consecration, to the choice between his own Diocese and the new Diocese so formed. In case the new Diocese shall not be so chosen, it shall have the right to choose its own Bishop.

SECTION 4. Whenever a new Diocese is formed and erected out of an existing Diocese, it shall be subject to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese, out of which it was formed, except as local circumstances may prevent, until the same be altered in accordance with such Constitution and Canons by the Convention of the new Diocese. Whenever a Diocese is formed out of two or more existing Dioceses, it shall be subject to the Constitution and Canons of that one of the said existing Dioceses to which the greater number of clergymen shall have belonged prior to the erection of such new Diocese, except as local circumstances may prevent, until the same be altered in accordance with such Constitution and Canons by the Convention of the new Diocese.

SECTION 5. A Diocese formed out of a Missionary District shall be subject to the Constitution and Canons to which such Missionary District was subject, until the same be altered in accordance with such Constitution and Canons by the Convention of the new Diocese.

SECTION 6. No new Diocese shall he formed which shall contain fewer than six Parishes, or fewer than six Presbyters who have been for at least one year canonically resident within the bounds of such new Diocese, regularly settled in a Parish or Congregation and qualified to vote for a Bishop. Nor shall such new Diocese be formed if thereby any existing Diocese shall be so reduced as to contain fewer than twelve Parishes and twelve Presbyters who have been residing therein and settled and qualified as above provided.

SECTION 7. The consent of the General Convention to

the erection of a new Diocese shall not be given until it has satisfactory assurance of a suitable provision for the support of the episcopate.

Resolved, that the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed addition be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted at the next General Convention, in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution, as follows:

Add to Article X, of the Constitution the following:

And provided, further, that nothing in this Article shall be construed as restricting the authority of the Bishops of this Church to take such order as may be permitted by the Rubrics of the Book of Common Prayer or by the Canons of the General Convention for the use of special forms of worship.
