TITLE I, CANON 1, 4 II.

OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election, in the following form:

[Name of the Church, the Place, and Date.]

This certifies that at a meeting of the congregation of this Church, held for the purpose of electing Church Officers, and Deputies, and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, (or for the purpose of electing Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Convention, if the meeting be for that object alone), A. B., C. D., and E. F., being communicants of the Church in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Deputies; and B. C., D. E., and F. G., also being communicants in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Alternate Deputies to represent the Parish in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand, (or if two Wardens subscribe, we have set our hands), the day and year above written.

N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary sign, then the signatures of both Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-in-charge or Missionary, cannot sign.

The Lay Representation is limited to three Deputies, whose names in full should be carefully and legibly written.

Three Alternate Deputies must also be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies. (See Title I, Canon 6, \S II, [2].)

This Certificate is to "be transmitted to the Secretary of the Convention at least ten days before the Meeting of the Annual Convention." (See Title I, Canon 1, § II.)

In order to secure this, the Secretary will forward a blank form to every Parish, and he earnestly asks the PROMPT attention of the Clergy.

***By the terms of the Constitution and Canons, the Deputies must be communicants of the Church, and also qualified voters in the Parish which elects them. [See Title I, Canon 6, § II, [4], [5] and [6].

 - iij. Of the Treasurer.
 - iv. Of the Auditing Committee.

- v. On Securities.
- vi. On Finance.
- vij. On New Parishes.
- viij. Of the Registrar.
- ix. Of the Hospitals, and other Charitable Institutions of the Diocese.
 - x. Presentation of Parochial Reports.
- xi. Miscellaneous Business.
- xij. Clergymen of other Dioceses, and Candidates for Holy Orders, who may be present, shall be admitted to honorary seats in the Convention on the presentation of their names to the Secretary.
 - All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered.
 - The Reports of Committees shall be in writing, and, when
 made, shall be the property of the Convention without
 any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending
 action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.
 - No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
 - When any member is about to speak he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking coufine himself strictly to the point in debate.
- No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply,) in the same debate without leave of the Convention.

- At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
- All questions shall be decided viva vocs, unless otherwise specially ordered.
- 12. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote of the Convention may be taken by Orders, voting separately, and the names shall be entered on the Minutes.
- The doors of the Convention shall be opened for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
- 14. No member shall leave the Convention without permission.
- 15. In all elections, those persons only who shall have a majority of all the votes given, shall be deemed elected; but if in any case more than the required number of persons shall have a majority of votes, the required number of persons having the highest number of votes shall be deemed elected, and in case of a tie between two or more candidates, there shall be a new ballot.
- 16. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone it to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
- 17. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order

he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.

- 18. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate, but any member may appeal from the decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention.
- All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.
- At the close of each Convention, the Minutes shall be corrected and approved.

ADDENDUM.

Adopted, June 16, 1903.

- A. Fixing the salary of a Bishop.
- B. Nominations for the office of a Bishop shall be made without discussion any further than will suffice to designate the localities of the candidate, the fields of his labor in the Church, and the periods thereof, to be made by the nominator. Ballots may be cast for a person who has not been placed in nomination. After the result of a ballot has been announced, (there being no election), and before another ballot has been ordered, additional nominations may be made.
- C. The election shall be conducted as follows:
 - (a) The vote shall be by ballot. One Clergyman and one Layman shall be appointed by the Chair, as Tellers, to receive and count the votes of the Clergy; and one Layman and one Clergyman to receive and count the votes of the Laity.
 - (b) The Clergy and the Deputies of the several Parishes, shall, as called respectively, deposit their votes in the ballot boxes, the name of each Clergyman and of each

Parish being distinctly announced at the time of giving the vote. In case the majority of the Deputies present from a Parish shall fail to agree upon a candidate, such Parish shall cast a blank ballot.

(c) "The Clerical and Lay orders shall vote separately until some fit and qualified Presbyter shall receive a majority, in each order, of those present and voting; a blank ballot shall be considered a vote. And the Presbyter receiving such a concurrent majority in both orders shall be declared duly elected; provided, That if there should not be present two-thirds of the Clergy entitled to vote, and Deputies from two-thirds of the congregations entitled to representation, then a concurrent majority of two-thirds of those present and voting in each order shall be necessary to determine a choice." (Section 2, Article 12, of the Constitution of the Diocese of Newark.)

JOURNAL

St. Mark's Church, West Orange, N. J., 26 May, 1903.

The Twenty-ninth Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Newark met in St. Mark's Church, West Orange, on Tuesday, 26th May, 1903, at 10 A. M.

The Rev'd WILLIAM W. HOLLEY, D. D., celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by the Rev'd Joseph H. Smith, and the Rev'd Frank B. Reazor, Rector of the Parish.

The Secretary called the Convention to order.

The Rev'd Joseph H. Smith, senior Presbyter of the Diocese, took the chair; the Secretary called the rolls until ten Clerical members were found to be present, and ten Parishes represented, and announced a constitutional quorum present.*†

The Rev'd WILLIAM W. HOLLEY, D. D., was nominated, and unanimously elected President protempore.

Dr. Holley took the chair, and briefly addressed the Convention.

On motion of the Rev'd GEO. S. BENNITT, it was

Resolved, That the Committee on Rules of Order be requested to report such rules as may enable the Convention to attend to such necessary business as should be transacted, so that the Convention, if it so decides, may continue in session only one day, and then take a recess.

The Rev'd JOHN S. MILLER presented the report of the Committee on Rules of Order, and moved its adoption.

The Rules as proposed were adopted without alteration. (Vide page 29.)

The President appointed the Committee on Certificates of Lay Deputies: The Rev'd WALKER GWYNNE, Mr. LOUIS A. NOBLE and Mr. E. A. S. LEWIS.

Committees were elected:

On the Rights of Clerical Members—The Rev'd Cornelius S. Abbott, the Rev'd William M. Hughes, D. D., and Mr. Smith D. Mackey.

On the Rights of Lay Deputies—The Rev'd Daniel F. Warren, D. D., Mr. William K. Newton and Mr. John G. Crawford.

The Rev'd John Keller presented the following Report of the Secretary.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The Secretary of the Convention begs leave to report that he has discharged the duties of his office during the year last past in connection with the Twenty-eighth Annual Meeting, and the publication and the distribution of the Journal of its proceedings.

Upon receiving a brief from the Diocesan, your Secretary prepared proper notices in re the Special Convention of January 20, 1903, and caused them to be sent to all concerned.

The Minutes of this special meeting were not read and approved before an adjournment was taken. They were, however, read and revised by the two presiding officers and the two secretaries, within a few days after the Convention rose.

The Secretary of Convention has received the accompanying communication from a Committee of the General Convention seeking to discover the mind of the Church regarding the change of name project.

A communication has also come from the Council of the Diocese of Milwaukee, addressed to this body.

St. John's Parish, Montclair, has submitted an application for admission into union with the Convention of the Diocese of Newark, together with certain testimonials.

On motion, the reading of the Minutes of the Special Convention was postponed.

On motion of the Rev'd GEO. S. BENNITT, it was

Resolved, That the communication of the Committee on "The Change of Name of the Church," and that from the Diocese of Milwaukee, be placed on the calendar, and taken up under Miscellaneous Business.

Application was made by St. John's Church, Montclair, to be admitted into union with the Convention.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the application be referred to the Committee on New Parishes.

The Rev'd John Keller was elected Secretary of the Convention, and announced the appointment of the Rev'd Henry Willmann as Assistant Secretary.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons

reported that no matters had been referred to it for consideration and report.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons was elected; the Secretary, on motion, casting the ballot of the Convention for the Rev'd William M. Hughes, D. D., the Rev'd Edwin A. White, the Rev'd Walker Gwynne, Mr. John B. Van Wagenen and Mr. John R. Emery.

The Rev'd Wm. R. Jenvey read the following Report of the Standing Committee.

The Standing Committee respectfully reports that seven meetings have been held during the past Conventional year.

On May 21st, 1902, the Committee organized by electing the Rev'd Wm. Welles Holley, D. D., President, and the Rev'd William R. Jenvey, Secretary.

On October 13, 1902, permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Paul's Church, East Orange, to borrow the sum of \$3,200 at five per cent., and to mortgage the rectory property for the same. The proper form of consent was signed and acknowledged. Permission was given the Rector. Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Matthew's Church, Tersey City, to transfer all their church property to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Mark's Church, Jersey City, under the condition that the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of said St. Mark's Church, assume all debts of the said St. Matthew's Church, excepting the mortgage of \$2,500 on the church property, and continue services in the present St. Matthew's Church building for a period of at least three years. In the event of a cessation of Church services in the present church building at the expiration of three or more years, the church property may be sold, subject to the consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee, and the proceeds applied to the continuation of Church work in Jersey City in such a way as to perpetuate the name of St. Matthew's Church. Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of the Church of the Holy Cross, Jersey City, to sell all their real estate, excepting the church property, at such times, and in such lots as may be deemed best by them: the members of the Standing Committee agreeing to consent to such sale, and to sign such consent, when assured that the sales were approved by a sub-committee consisting of the Rev'd WM. R. JENVEY and E. A. S. LEWIS, Esq. Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St Paul's Church, Englewood, to purchase a certain piece of property, about 150 feet front on Engle Street, and about 275 feet deep, adjoining the church property on the north, for rectory purposes, for the sum of \$12,000, and to mortgage the same for \$11,000 at four percent. In anticipation of this purchase 22 bonds of \$500 each, to be paid for within ten years, were subscribed for by members of the congregation. The proper form was signed and acknowledged. Permission was given the Rector. Wardens and Vestrymen of Christ Church, Bloomfield, to execute an additional mortgage of \$750 at five per cent., upon the property of the Mission Chapel of the Ascension, Bloomfield, there being now a mortgage of \$2,500 on the same at five per cent. The proper form of consent was signed and acknowledged. Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd CHARLES TYLER OLMSTED, S. T. D., Coadjutor Bishop-elect for the Diocese of Central New York, and the proper testimonial signed. Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd James H. Van Buren, Bishop-elect for the Missionary District of Porto Rico, and the proper testimonial signed. The papers of the Rev'd HENRY N. DIKEMAN, Deacon, asking to be recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests, being found in due form, on motion, the recommendation was made, and the proper testimonial signed. The papers of Mr. IRVING ANGELL McGREW, asking to be recommended to the Bishop as a Candidate for Holy Orders, being found in due form, on motion, the recommendation was made, and the proper testimonial signed. The papers of Mr. Duncan O'Hanlon, asking to be recommended to the Bishop as a Candidate for Holy Orders, being found in due form, on motion, the recommendation was made, and the proper testimonial signed. The papers of Mr. Thomas Alfred Hyde, asking to be recommended to the Bishop as a Candidate for Holy Orders, being found in due form, on motion, the recommendation was made, and the proper testimonial signed.

On November 10, 1902, consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd C. M. BECKWITH, D. D., Bishop-elect for the Diocese of Alabama, and the proper testimonial signed. The consent of the Committee to the transfer of St. Matthew's church property, Jersey City, to St. Mark's Church, Jersey City, having been given at the meeting held on October 13, 1902, but the proper form not having been signed, the proper form was now signed and acknowledged. The President of the Committee having submitted letters from the Bishop of the Diocese, bearing dates of October 27, 1902, and October 30, 1902, in reference to the election of a Coadjutor Bishop for the Diocese, after discussion, the Secretary was instructed to acknowledge to the Bishop the receipt of said letters, and to notify him that action had been taken to carry out the wishes contained therein. On motion, the Rev'd Dr. Holley. the Rev'd Louis S. Osborne and Mr. Henry Hayes were appointed a Committee with power to take such action as might be necessary to provide for the support of a Coadjutor Bishop.

On December 8, 1902, consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd Sheldon Munson Griswold, D. D., Bishopelect for the Missionary District of Salina, and the proper testimonial signed. The Committee advised the Bishop, in response to his inquiry as to the support of a Coadjutor Bishop, that in its judgment the money necessary for such support could be

raised. The Bishop was advised to call a Special Convention for the election of such a Coadjutor in the following form:

WHEREAS, Our venerable and beloved Bishop, the Rt. Rev'd THOMAS ALFRED STARKEY, D. D., after fifty-five years of faithful service in the Sacred Ministry of the Church, during twenty-two of which he has administered the Episcopal functions in this Diocese wisely and lovingly, and,

WHEREAS, He having asked the Standing Committee concerning the advisability of summoning a Special Convention, for the election of a Coadjutor, to share with him the burden of administering the affairs of this rapidly growing Diocese, be it,

Resolved, That we, the Standing Committee, regretting the necessity, do hereby, as requested by our Bishop and beloved Father in GOD, advise him to call said Special Convention, for the purpose above designated, on the twentieth day of January, in the year of our Lord 1903, at such place as he shall name.

On February 24, 1903, the Rev'd Dr. Holley made sorrowful announcement of the death of Mr. Henry Haves, for so many years an honored member of this Committee. The following was unanimously adopted by a rising vote:

"On the second day of February, the Feast of the Purification, 1903, Mr. Henry Haves, an honored member of this Committee, passed from the labors of this present world to that rest which remaineth unto the people of GOD. Mr. Haves had been so long, and so efficiently, engaged in the work of the Church in the undivided Diocese of New Jersey, and in the Diocese of Newark, that it is but fitting and right that special mention should be made of the offices he has filled so faithfully and well.

"He was for more than twenty-five years Treasurer of the undivided Diocese of New Jersey. When the Diocese of Northern New Jersey, now Newark, was formed in 1874, he was elected its Treasurer, and remained such Treasurer up to the time of his death. "He was also for a long time Treasurer of

z. Our Diocesan Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergy.

2. The Corporation for the Relief of the Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen.

3. Our Diocesan Board of Missions.

"He was for a long time a member of the Vestry, and a Warden of Grace Church, Newark, and as Diocesan Treasurer

represented that Parish in our Diocesan Conventions.

"In the year 1886 he was first elected a Deputy to the General Convention of the Church, and through subsequent elections served as such Deputy up to the time of his death. He attended the General Convention which was held in San Francisco in the autumn of 1901.

"He was a valuable and faithful member of our Standing

Committee for nineteen years.

"Fitted for these various positions by natural ability and business training, he did all the work which they entailed, diligently, earnestly, and with tact.

"These valuable services are now ended, and we grieve at

the great loss which the Church has sustained.

"As a man, Mr. HAVES had many qualities that endeared him to us, and to his many other personal friends. Earnest and positive in his own convictions in regard to the Church and its teachings, he yet held and expressed them in the spirit and with the grace of a Christian gentleman.

"His own integrity and rectitude of purpose enabled him

to appreciate those qualities when seen in others.

"Generous and Catholic in his own instincts, and feelings, he freely gave his money, his time and labor for the benefit of others.

"We, his associates, in the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Newark, adopt this testimonial, by unanimous vote, and direct that it be entered in full in our Minutes, and that a copy of it be sent to the widow and son of Mr. HAYES."

Col. EDWIN A. STEVENS of Hoboken was elected to fill the

vacancy caused by the death of Mr. HAYES. Col. E. A. STEVENS was elected Treasurer of the Convention. The Secretary was instructed to notify the Secretary of the Convention of this election and to request him to send out the necessary notices to the Diocese. The action of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, in agreeing to pay for such Episcopal assistance as the Bishop of the Diocese might need was endorsed by the Committee. The papers of the Rev'd Duncan M. GENNS, Deacon, asking to be recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests, being found in due form, on motion, the recommendation was made, and the proper testimonial signed. The papers of the Rev'd CHARLES SILAS CHAMPLIN, Deacon, asking to be recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests, being found in due form, on motion, the recommendation was made, and the proper testimonial signed. For good and sufficient reasons a slight dispensation of time was recommended in both cases. The application of the Rev'd ERNEST W. WOOD, Deacon, asking to be recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests, was not granted; he having been a Deacon but two months, and having been received into the Diocese but a few days.

On May 18, 1903, a special meeting, called by the President, was held in Hoboken. The President made sorrowful announcement of the death of the venerable and revered Bishop of the Diocese, the Rt. Rev'd Thomas Alfred Starkey, D. D., who was called to the presence of the Great Shepherd and Bishop of our souls, on Sunday afternoon, the 17th of May.

The Committee unanimously agreed to recommend to the Diocesan Convention, that the salary, heretofore paid to the Bishop, be paid to Mrs. STARKEY until the consecration of his successor.

It was also agreed to recommend to the Convention, that Mrs. STARKEY be permitted to remain in the Episcopal Residence at her pleasure.

It was further agreed to recommend, that the funeral expenses of the Bishop be paid by the Treasurer of the Convention.

The Bishop's Chaplain reported that arrangements had been made for all Episcopal Visitations until the Fall with the exception of three. The Bishop's Chaplain was authorized to make arrangements for these three.

The Rev'd Dr. Holley and Mr. Alfred Mills were appointed to draft suitable resolutions, and to report to the Committee at its next meeting.

On May 26, 1903, the Committee adopted the following

report by a unanimous and rising vote:

"The Standing Committee desiring to place on record a testimonial of the loss which has come to the Diocese of Newark, and to the Church, through the passing away of our late well-loved and honored Bishop, adopts the following Minute.

"The death of Bishop STARKEY while owing to his advanced age was not wholly unlooked for, yet comes to us with a sense of personal grief as well as official bereavement and loss.

"Dr. STARKEY was a man of marked characteristics and of varied gifts. He was a successful Pastor through a ministry of more than half a century, twenty-three years of which were as chief Pastor of this Diocese of Newark; a preacher of excellent abilities; a wise administrator; a counsellor of natural and calm judgment; sagacious, conservative and devout.

"The aim which he set before him at the very beginning of his work as Bishop, as expressed in his own words was, "If in the brief Episcopate which must necessarily be mine, I can, at its close, leave the Diocese at peace, I shall feel that I have not labored in vain." This did he. He studied the things which made for peace, and we cannot doubt that he has entered into the Beatitude of the Peace-makers. Never very robust, and for the past few years afflicted with a difficulty in hearing, yet he did his appointed work with a zeal

and fidelity and love which marked him as a true Priest of GOD. To those who were privileged to know him in his home life, the gentleness, kindness, geniality and courtesy which marked the Christian gentleman, will be memories which we shall not willingly allow to pass away. A loyal friend, a true Priest, a faithful Christian; we pray that his soul may rest in the peace he loved and sought to promote on earth, and that light perpetual may shine upon him.

"With hearts full of sympathy for the bereaved family, we commend them to the Great Bishop of souls; and pray, that in the approaching Whitsuntide He will send to them the grace of the Holy Ghost the Comforter; and we direct our Secretary

to send them a copy of this Minute."

The papers of Mr. Lawrence St. John Hobbie, asking to be recommended as a Candidate for Holy Orders, being found in due form, on motion, the recommendation was made and the proper testimonial signed. The papers of Mr. Henry Lowndes Drew, asking to be recommended for ordination to the Sacred Order of Deacons, being found in due form, on motion, the recommendation was made and the proper testimonial signed. The President of the Committee was authorized to give to the Rev'd Arthur F. Lewis, Priest, a letter dimissory to the Diocese of Connecticut. On motion it was

Resolved, That the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund are hereby authorized, and requested, to convey by deed a certain tract in Allendale, in the Township of Orvil, County of Bergen, and State of New Jersey, to Mr. E. G. WASHBURNE, and receive from him and his wife the declaration of trust in the form presented at this meeting.

On motion it was

Resolved, That the action of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund in making a conveyance of certain property in the City of Newark, in the County of Essex, and State of New Jersey, known as St. Andrew's Mission, to EDWIN A. KIRSH, be and is hereby approved.

A communication from the Senior Warden of St. Mary's Church, Jersey City, was referred to the Rev'd Wm. R. Jenvey and Mr. E. A. S. Lewis, with power. Consent was given to the sale of a certain piece of property situated in the City of Hoboken, County of Hudson, State of New Jersey, by the Trustees of the Church of the Holy Innocents, and the proper form of consent signed and acknowledged. This report was read, approved, and ordered read by the Secretary to the Convention.

On motion of Mr. WILLIAM PATTERSON, it was

The Convention proceeded to the election of a Standing Committee.

The Chair appointed as Tellers of the Clerical vote, the Rev'd Henry M. Ladd and Mr. Charles Crane; for the Lay vote, the Rev'd J. Clayton Mitchell and Mr. Charles E. Foster.

The names of the Clergy were called by the Secretary; those of the Parishes by the Assistant Secretary.

The ballots having been deposited, and the polls declared closed, the Tellers retired to count the votes.

On motion of the Rev'd WILLIAM M. HUGHES, D. D., it was

Resolved, That the Chairman be authorized to appoint a committee to draw up, and to report to this Convention, a series of resolutions in memoriam of the Right Reverend THOMAS A. STARKEY, Doctor of Divinity, late Bishop of this Diocese.

The Chairman appointed as such Committee: the Rev'd William M. Hughes, D. D., the Rev'd William T. Webbe, D. D., and Mr. Cortlandt Parker.

On motion, the Convention took a recess from one to two P. M.

Upon reassembling, the Tellers of the Clerical vote for Standing Committee reported the following named gentlemen chosen by that Order: The Rev'd William W. Holley, D. D., the Rev'd Charles C. Edmunds, and the Rev'd William R. Jenvey; leaving one vacancy to be filled.

The Tellers of the Lay vote for Standing Committee reported the following named gentlemen chosen by that Order: Mr. Alfred Mills, Mr. Edwin A. Stevens, Mr. Edwin A. S. Lewis, and Mr. D. Smith Wood.

The Chair appointed Mr. John B. Van Wagenen as Teller vice Mr. Charles Crane, retired.

A second ballot was taken to fill the vacancy in the Standing Committee.

The right of the Rev'd CHARLES H. MEAD to a vote being disputed, the case was referred to the Committee on the Rights of Clerical Members.

The Rev'd Lewis Cameron read the following

Report of the Committee on New Parishes.

The Committee on admission of new Parishes respectfully report: that they have received the application of St. John's Church, Montclair, for admission into union with the Convention.

They find that all the papers required by Article 5 of the Constitution have been laid before the Committee, and are found to be correct, and the Committee would recommend the adopting by the Convention of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Parish of St. John, in Montclair, be and is hereby admitted into union with this Convention.

The Rev'd Edwin A. White read, by title, the Report of the Committee on Civil Legislation.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The Special Committee on Civil Legislation, instructed by the Convention of 1901, "to have printed nine hundred copies of the Constitution, Canons and Civil Laws, together with the necessary forms to be used under these laws," and continued by the Convention of 1902, respectfully reports:

That in accordance with these instructions, they have carefully prepared and placed in the hands of the printer, a true copy of the Constitution and Canons of this Diocese, a true copy of the Constitution and certain Canons of the General Convention, a true copy of the Statute Laws of this State relating to and affecting the Church, a true copy of the Marriage Law of this State, together with some of the necessary forms to be used under these laws.

That all this matter, with the exception of some of the forms, is now in type, ready to be printed, but your Committee have thought it wise to defer the actual printing of the same until after the adjournment of this Convention, in order that certain amendments to the Canons, which your Committee has been advised will be offered thereto at this Convention, if adopted, may be incorporated therein.

Your Committee would further state that the new edition of Constitution, Canons, and the Statute Laws relating to and affecting the Church, together with the other matter to be contained therein, will be ready for distribution within a few weeks after the adjournment of this Convention, and therefore

for the completion of this work would recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Special Committee on Civil Legislation be continued.

The Rev'd George S. Bennitt read the following Report of the Committee on the Apportionment Plan for General Missions.

The Committee on the Apportionment Plan for General Missions would respectfully report that in accordance with the Resolutions of the Convention, your Committee proceeded to make the Apportionment for the \$19,800, asked for by the General Board of Missions, and sent it out in June, 1902. During September the General Board sent out a new Apportionment whereby the amount asked from this Diocese was increased to \$24,100. During October, your Committee sent out a new Apportionment to cover this amount. The result of this will not be known until September 1st, the end of the Fiscal Year of the General Board, but its effect has already begun to increase the offerings from this Diocese, nothing near what is expected of us, but surely gaining. Many have increased their amounts, and some non-contributing have begun to send offerings. We hope every Parish and Mission will be vet recorded as enlisted in the glorious work of extending the kingdom of Christ. We, therefore, present the following resolution:

Mr. E. A. Stevens read, by title, the following Report of the Treasurer of Convention.

1 NEWARK STREET, HOBOKEN, N. J., May 26th, 1903.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

I have the honor to submit herewith my financial report as Treasurer of the Convention.

In addition to this office the late HENRY HAYES was Treasurer of the following bodies connected with the Convention.

- 1. Board of Diocesan Missions.
- 2. Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund.
- 3. Church Aid Society.

In addition to the above Mr. HAVES kept separate accounts as the Treasurer of Convention against the Income of the Permanent Missionary Fund, and the Fund for the Church at Hope, and as Treasurer of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund against the Fund for Widows and Orphans of Clergymen.

Mr. HAVES was succeeded by Mr. Wm. M. Franklin as Treasurer of the Board of Missions, by myself as Treasurer of Convention, and as Treasurer of the Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund.

The accounts of Mr. HAYES were not fully posted up to the date of his death. A cursory examination satisfied me that the services of an expert bookkeeper were necessary and I

employed Mr. E. C. ROBERTS to act in connection with the accountant retained by Mr. HAYES' executors. Their joint report is given in Mr. ROBERTS' letter to your Auditing Committee.

Subsequent information led Mr. ROBERTS to make some minor corrections in the balances shown in the joint report.

I report elsewhere a surplus balance which I am unable now to properly distribute of \$906.93—of this \$382.50 is a note hereinafter mentioned; \$65.98 is in cash and \$458.45 is an apparent overdraft by the Board of Missions. From what fund this was drawn, I have not been able to determine.

The examination necessary to satisfactorily settle these questions would be a long and difficult one.

The permanent Missionary Fund is held by the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, and its income has been heretofore paid over to the Treasurer of the Convention, and by him disbursed as directed by the Bishop as provided by canon. This is an unnecessary and cumbersome arrangement. The interest should be disbursed either by the Trustees or by the Treasurer of the Board of Missions.

The Fund for the Church at Hope, is, I am informed, the proceeds of the sale of Church property*, held by the Convention in trust to apply the income. I have no information as to the exact terms of this trust. Its being held by the Treasurer of the Convention seems inexpedient in view of the fact that the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund exist for the very purpose of carrying out such trusts.

The title to the Episcopal Residence is vested, I am informed, in individual trustees. There is a mortgage on the property, interest on which, and other expenses are paid by Convention. There seems to be no reason why this property should not be held by the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, of which fund it is in fact an important part.

^{*} This sale included only a portion of the realty. The church itself still exists.

The Fund for Widows and Orphans of Clergymen is not to be confused with the Corporation for the Relief of the Widows and Children of Clergy. The former is a fund held by the Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, that is to say, the members of the Standing Committee; the latter is a very old corporation, organized under a charter anti-dating the formation of this Diocese. The object of the two seems the same, but the field of the Fund is limited to this Diocese, while the Corporation takes in the whole State.

As far as I have yet been able to discover the Diocesan Fund has done nothing for some time.

The Church Aid Society funds were turned over to me by the executors of Mr. HAYES' Estate. He was Treasurer of the Society. Its income, as far as I can find out, must be paid out on order of the bishop, and this has lately been done to help a candidate for Holy Orders in carrying on his studies.

I have in vain tried to get information as to the composition of the Society, its officers and its exact object. I am holding these funds until their proper disposition is determined.

I would draw attention to the note hereinbefore mentioned of the House of Prayer, Newark, one of the assets carried in convention expense account. This note was apparently taken by Mr. Haves in payment for arrears of Convention Expenses. The amount of arrears to May 1st, is \$345.00—the amount of the note is \$382.50. Mr. Haves, however, did not credit the parish with anything on account of the note, possibly because of this obvious error. I have carried the note in the surplus above mentioned and have not credited the parish. The parish asks for the return of the note. I have not felt authorized to comply with this request nor to credit the parish with the note without instructions from the Convention.

All of the above matters raise questions as to the settlement of which I am not ready to make separate recommendations. From the knowledge I have acquired as Treasurer of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, and during my short ex-

perience as Treasurer of the Convention, I am convinced that the business of the Diocese, the methods of raising and disbursing money, the keeping of accounts, the care and investment of trust funds need a thorough revision and the introduction of a definite system of administration.

For this purpose, I recommend the reference of the matters hereinbefore mentioned, and of the general financial organization of the Diocese to the Finance Committee, with instructions to prepare a general plan for carrying on the business of the Diocese.

Trustees of the Episcopal Fund of the Diocese of Newark: DEAR SIRS:

I submit herewith my report as Treasurer for the year ending May 1st, 1903.

I respectfully ask the Trustees to recommend to the Convention:

- 1. The retirement of the parish bonds now held by the Trustees.
- 2. The raising by assessment on the parishes of such portion of the amount necessary for the proper support of the bishop as is not yielded by the income of investments now held by the Trustees.
- 3. A change in the basis of assessment from the clerical salaries to the general current expenses of the parish.
- 4. The approval and ratification of my action in disbursing a portion of the surplus income of the Episcopal Fund for the expenses and services of bishops who have been taking visitations for Bishop STARKEY.
- 5. The amendment of the canon regarding the disbursement of the Income of the Permanent Missionary Fund. This income must be collected by the Trustees and paid over to the Treasurer of Convention for disbursement.

To accomplish the first of the above, I suggest that the Trustees ask for power.

- 1. To cancel and return parish bonds to such parishes as surrender their right of exemption from assessment for the Episcopal salary;
- 2. To enter into contracts with parishes which have paid their bonds to surrender their exemptions on consideration of their being credited with annual interest on the amount the said parishes have paid to the Trustees or their predecessors at 4 %, which credits are to be annually deducted from any assessment for the support of the Episcopate.

It is needless to point out to the Trustees that the exercise of the rights affected by the above suggestions has become grossly inequitable, and that such exercise results in an inadequate support of the Episcopate, to the great hindrance of the work of the Church in the Diocese.

I also suggest that the Trustees ask of the Convention the reference to some proper body of the question of business organization and methods.

There is now an almost entire absence of such system and safeguards as should prevail.

DEAR SIR:

I hereby certify that in connection with Mr. H. L. MERRY, representing the Estate of Henry Haves, deceased, I examined the accounts of the late Henry Haves, as Treasurer of the Convention of the Diocese of Newark, and as Treasurer of the following bodies connected with said Convention: the Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund; the Trustees of the Widows and Orphans of Clergy Fund; the Board of Diocesan Missions; the Hope Church Fund; the Church Aid Society.

The accounts were compared with the vouchers, several of the latter were missing, but in every such case we were able to get satisfactory evidence that the payments charged had been actually made.

We found that the total balances in Mr. HAYES' hand amounted to \$44,518.39. Against which we had assets as follows:

Since making this report I have found a disbursement of \$10.00 to Mt. Arlington Mission and a receipt of \$3.00 from G. P. Armstrong, which together will increase balance against Board of Missions to \$458.45.

The difference in surplus is due to these items and to similar changes in the accounts to which other items were charged, which changes were made on information received since the date of my first examination.

There was nothing to show how the balances of the Funds were invested, so that the matter had to be treated as a whole, which fact accounts for the overdraft by Diocesan Missions, only one bank account has been kept for all funds.

I have posted the book of account up to the 30th of April, and the balance submitted as per schedule attached are, to the best of my knowledge and belief, correct.

The payments have been checked against the vouchers and receipts against the deposit books. The result is shown in statement of May 22, hereto annexed.

Mr. WILLIAM M. FRANKLIN read the following Report of the Committee on Finance.

The Finance Committee respectfully reports that, after considering the various sources of income of the Diocese, it has directed the Treasurer of the Convention to pay out of the funds in his hands one thousand (\$1,000.) dollars on the existing mortgage upon the Episcopal Residence, for which provision was made in the assessment authorized at the last Convention.

Your Committee recommends that an assessment of seven per cent. (7%) be made for the current year on the amount of the present salaries of the Clergy in all Parishes which have not made contributions or given bonds to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, as provided by Canon, for the support of the Episcopate, and for the expenses authorized by this Convention; and an assessment of four per cent. (4%) on the salaries of the Clergy for Convention and current expenses, and to make a final payment of the fifteen hundred (\$1,500.) dollars now outstanding on the mortgage resting on the Episcopal Residence.

The Committee therefore recommends the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That an assessment be made for the current year of seven per cent. on the amount of the present salaries of the Clergy towards paying the Bishop's salary, and the expenses authorized by this Convention, upon all Parishes which have not made contributions or given bonds to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, as provided by the Canon; and an assessment of four per cent. on the amount of the salaries of the Clergy, for Convention and current liabilities, and to make a final payment of the \$1,500. now outstanding on the mortgage resting on the Episcopal Residence.

In Memoriam.

The Right Reverend Thomas Alfred Starkey, D. D., Bishop of Newark.

"To make an estimate of the life and labors of Bishop STARKEY, and to express the sense of bereavement felt by Clergy and Laity at his death, is no common task; because it deals with no common subject of eulogy, and with no common bereavement.

"In the truest sense the death of the beloved Bishop is to all a personal loss. This assumes, without a rival, the first place in our thoughts at this time. We have lost a great and good man; a man great by reason of his goodness. We have lost a friend most gentle, kind, sweet and affectionate. We have lost a true Father in GOD; a Bishop who for years has helped, comforted and encouraged us all, both publicly and privately, by his saintly wisdom and unfailing sympathy.

"We are not unmindful of his noble record as the head of this Diocese for twenty-three years, nor of his previous notable successes as a parish priest. We do not forget his solid and classical learning, his personal charm and finished attainments, his inspiring and persuasive eloquence, his genial humor and alertness of perception. For these things, all who knew him will fondly remember him. But no estimate which deals solely with these things can properly set forth our most precious remembrances of the beloved Bishop. We appreciate most keenly the loss which Church and Diocese have suffered by the removal of his fine example of courtliness and scholarly ability. We submit with sorrow to the departure from our midst of a living and saintly presence. But, more than all else

we feel that we have lost a dear, dear friend, whose constant gentleness and gracious affection we shall sorely miss.

"To the Church at large, to the Diocese, to all his Clergy and People, we extend our sympathy. Especially do we offer our heartfelt condolence to his afflicted family.

"We thank GOD for the priceless memory of his long life, his honorable career, and his noble Christian character."

Resolved, That this Convention hereby orders placed on record the following Minutes indicative of its affectionate respect and regard for the late Bishop of this Diocese:

The Right Reverend THOMAS ALFRED STARKEY, Doctor of Divinity, was consecrated to his holy office, January 8, 1880. For nearly twenty-four years he had presided over the numerous interests, material and spiritual, of the Diocese of Newark.

During these many years he steadfastly fulfilled the duties connected therewith in a spirit of unfailing courtesy and loyalty.

The results are shown, not only in the extraordinary growth of the external institutions of the Diocese, but even more in the spirit of kindliness and mutual regard which he has left to it as a priceless heritage.

In his personal character he was winsome, unselfish and of the most delicate sense of honor,—always creating the impression of gentleness, strength and intelligence.

In his ripened age these traits became blended into saintliness of life; and his death was a translation.

While the Convention somowfully deplores his departure from its midst, it also praises GOD for the good example of this His faithful servant.

Fuller delineation of his official career and personal character appears in the report of the Standing Committee, recently presented to this body, with which this Committee cordially concurs.

The ballots of the Clergy and Laity were duly received; the Tellers retired.

On motion of the Rev'd E. A. WHITE, it was

Resolved, That the expenses for to-day's luncheon be ordered paid by the Treasurer of the Convention; and that for future Conventions, the Secretary be directed, with the Rector of the Parish wherein the Convention is to hold its session, to arrange for the entertainment of the members of Convention.

The Rev'd Mr. WHITE presented the following:

WHEREAS, The Parish of St. Matthew's, Newark, has become extinct; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Convention hereby declares that said Parish of St. Matthew's, Newark, is extinct.

The resolution was adopted.

On motion of the same gentleman, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of the Convention are hereby tendered to the authorities of St. Mark's Church, West Orange, for generous accommodations furnished, and especially to the ladies of the Parish for their courteous attention to the members of the Convention.

Resolved, That the Treasurer be authorized to pay to the sexton of St. Mark's Church, West Orange, the usual sum for his services.

On motion of the Rev'd Wm. R. Jenvey, it was Resolved, That the reports of the Archdeacons be referred to the Secretary, and be printed in the Convention Journal.

The Tellers of the votes for the Board of Missions reported the election of the following gentlemen: The Rev'd George S. Bennitt, the Rev'd Frederick B. Carter, the Rev'd Walker Gwynne, the Rev'd William M. Hughes, D. D., the Rev'd Lewis Cameron, the Rev'd D. Stuart Hamilton, Mr. William M. Franklin, Mr. Richard F. Stevens, Mr. James Hodge, Mr. William K. Newton, and Mr. C. Alfred Burhorn.

There being one vacancy in the Lay member-

ship of the Board, on motion, the Secretary was directed to cast the ballot of the Convention for the layman reported as having the highest number of votes cast for him.

Mr. Ernest L. Prior was so elected to fill the existing vacancy; the Chair declared the election of the Board of Missions.

The Tellers of the vote for Delegates to the Missionary Council reported, and the Chair declared the election of the Rev'd ALEXANDER MANN, D. D., and Mr. RICHARD STEVENS.

At 6.20 P. M. the Convention adjourned to meet on Tuesday, June 16, 1903, at 10 A. M., in St. Mark's Church, West Orange.

St. Mark's Church, West Orange, N. J., 16 June, 1903.

The Convention of the Diocese of Newark met pursuant to the resolution adopted on Tuesday, May 26th, 1903, fixing the time and place of this adjourned meeting.

Morning Prayer and a celebration of the Holy Communion preceded the business session; the Rev'd Clergy of the Parish being the officiants.

At 10 o'clock the President took the chair and called the Convention to order.

The Minutes of the first day's proceedings were read and approved.

Mr. WILLIAM M. FRANKLIN read the following supplementary

Report of the Committee on Finance.

At a meeting of the Finance Committee, held subsequent to the last meeting of this Convention, the Treasurer presented a report of his efforts to obtain accurate data on which to base assessments for meeting Convention expenses; it was

Resolved, That we accept, as a basis for assessments of the Parishes for Convention expenses, the list of salaries prepared by the Treasurer of the Convention and now submitted to this Committee; and in those cases where no data have been

so established, he is directed to approximate at his best judgment a fair figure therefor.

The Finance Committee presents to the Convention for approval the following preamble and resolutions:

WHEREAS, The Finance Committee realizes the immediate necessity of a revision of the business methods of the Convention and of the different commissions and boards of the Diocese, the Committee recommends the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Finance Committee be directed to report at a special meeting of the Convention to be called by the proper authority, a system under which the general business shall be conducted, after the same shall be submitted to and

approved by the Standing Committee.

Resolved, That the Resolution of the Special Convention of 1879, page 32, reducing the Bishop's salary from six thousand (\$6,000) dollars, as fixed by the canon, to four thousand (\$4,000) dollars, be and the same is hereby repealed, and that the said repeal shall take effect upon the consecration of a new bishop.

For the Committee,

WM. M. FRANKLIN, Chairman.

On motion of Mr. Franklin, the resolution of the Committee was ratified by the Convention.

On motion, the preamble and following resolution were adopted; the final resolution was adopted; the resolutions were adopted as a whole.

By request, the Rev'd John S. Miller, for the Committee on Rules of Order, reported on a mode of procedure to be followed in the election of a Bishop, recommending the adoption of the several

paragraphs of Section vi, of Rule 3, adopted January 20, 1903, after striking out all references to a Coadjutor. (*Vide Addendum*, page 33.)

The Rules as proposed were adopted as a whole.

On motion of the Rev'd Wm. M. Hughes, D. D., it was

Resolved, That the election of a Bishop be the Special Order of the Day at 11.30 o'clock this morning.

The Rev'd Joseph H. Smith moved the adoption of the following:

Resolved, That the residence of the Bishop to be consecrated be in the City of Newark.

Mr. Wm. M. Franklin moved as a substitute, "that the subject of the Bishop's residence be referred to the Finance Committee."

The substitute was adopted.

The Rev'd WILLIAM RICHMOND, having voted in the affirmative, moved a reconsideration of the vote just taken; it was so ordered.

On motion of the same gentleman, the resolution introduced by the Rev'd JOSEPH H. SMITH was referred to the Committee on Finance.

The Rev'd E. A. WHITE offered the following:

Resolved, That in place of viva voce nominations for the office of Bishop of this Diocese, an informal ballot be taken, and every Presbyter, receiving one or more votes on such

ballot, shall be considered as placed in nomination for the said office of Bishop.

The Rev'd WILLIAM RICHMOND moved the adoption of the following amendment: "That the names only be read, without the number of votes for each name, in the informal ballot."

The amendment was laid on the table.

The principal motion was adopted.

At eleven-thirty o'clock the business named in the Special Order of the Day was begun.

By adopting the final resolution of the report of the Committee on Finance, the Convention had fixed the salary of the Bishop. (*Vide* page 95.)

Under Rule C, the Chair appointed the Rev'd Henry M. Ladd and Mr. Charles Elkin as Tellers to receive the Clerical vote; the Rev'd Elmer S. Forbes and Mr. John S. Richards to receive the Lay vote.

The Rev'd ALEXANDER MANN, D. D., rising to a question of privilege, requested that his name be not placed in nomination.

At the suggestion of the Rev'd CHARLES C. EDMUNDS, the members of Convention were bidden to prayer.

Appropriate collects were read by the President and the "Veni, Creator Spiritus" was recited.

Under resolution so ordering, the informal ballot was taken.

The Secretary called the names of the Clerical voters; the Assistant Secretary called the names of the Parishes.

When the ballots had been deposited the polls were declared closed, and the Tellers retired to count the votes.

On motion of the Rev'd Wm. R. Jenvey, it was

Resolved, That the Standing Committee, now the Ecclesiastical Authority for the Diocese, be permitted to expend the income of the Permanent Missionary Fund until the consecration of a Bishop for the Diocese.

The Rev'd ARTHUR WHITAKER offered the following:

Resolved, That Title I, Canon 5, Section v, referring to Archdeacons, be repealed.

On motion of the Rev'd Edwin A. White, the proposition was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Rev'd WALKER GWYNNE moved the adoption of the following:

Resolved, That the Arthur Home, in Summit, be again cordially commended to the sympathy and support of the Diocese, and that every clergyman be most earnestly requested to appoint a day in each year for an annual offering.

Report of the Committee on the Increase of the Episcopal Fund.

The Committee on the Increase of the Episcopal Fund presents the following report:

During the last year very little work has been done looking to the increase of the Fund. The anticipated election of a Bishop Coadjutor, and the extraordinary effort which was made to provide for his salary, seemed to make any special action on the part of your Committee unadvisable. Accordingly, nothing was done beyond sending out an appeal to the Parishes for the offering provided for by resolution of the last Convention. In response to this appeal the following Parishes contributed:

The condition of the Episcopal Fund remains unchanged. It still consists of about \$18,000 in cash and negotiable securities, \$51,780 in Parish bonds which have no market value whatever, the privilege of assessing a certain number of parishes which may be worth anywhere from little or nothing to

\$1,200 per year, according as times are hard or easy, and \$15,000.00 in endowment insurance policies, taken out for the benefit of the Fund, maturing in from ten to fifteen years from date of issue. A more unbusiness-like, unsatisfactory, and generally deplorable condition can scarcely be imagined.

We are now face to face with a situation which has been threatening for some years. A Bishop is to be chosen, and the means are not at hand for providing him with a salary equal to the demands of his office, to say nothing of its being proportionate to the wealth and dignity of the Diocese. Immediate action is necessary, and we believe the Convention should give the matter its serious consideration.

. Your Committee makes the following recommendations:

1st. That parishes which have given parish bonds be asked to waive their privilege of exemption from further taxation, and permit themselves to be assessed together with the other parishes of the Diocese for the purpose of providing an adequate salary for the Bishop. Parishes which have paid their bonds in full or in part to be credited on their assessment with a sum equal to four per centum of the amount which they have paid.

and. That a new Committee on the Increase of the Episcopal Fund be appointed to consist of three clergymen and nine laymen to devise ways and means for an improvement in

the condition of the Fund.

3rd. That a general offering be taken for the increase of the Episcopal Fund on or before April 30th, 1904.





Reports of the Archdeacons

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF JERSEY CITY.

We have every reason to thank GOD and take courage in this Archdeaconry. There are a few Missions at a standstill. They were placed where they are at a time when it was thought wise to begin Mission work. But the early promises have not been fulfilled. Various causes have retarded the growth of the villages and towns. These causes will be removed in time. Growth will surely come. The Missions will then grow, and like the other Missions, the ones which are growing, they will be important factors in the spiritual life of the communities in which they are.

St. Thomas' Mission, Lyndhurst, the Rev'd Henry M. LADD, Rector, is one of these. It is waiting. The property is kept in good order. A Sunday School is maintained. The Holy Communion is celebrated. The lamps are kept trimmed and ready. Its day will surely come.

Regular services have been held in Holy Trinity Mission, Hillsdale, by the Rev'd ARTHUR WHITAKER, largely at his own expense. This Mission has been greatly injured by changing conditions in the village. Time will correct this. There will yet be a vigorous Mission there.

A work which is truly remarkable has been done in the Mission of the Annunciation, Oradell. Services were first held in a private house; then in a public hall. But so much interest was manifested, and genuine strength became so apparent, that a church building was early determined upon.

Note.—The reports of the Archdeacons have been referred, and are printed in compliance with the resolution on page 92.

A lot, in the most desirable part of the village, 113 ft. front, by 150 ft. deep, was purchased and paid for. The cornerstone of the new church building was laid by me on the 6th of December, 1902. Several of the clergy, and a large number of the laity, were present. The building was completed. and used for the first time for religious service, on the evening of March 11th, 1903, when the Bishop of Easton, acting for the Bishop of the Diocese, confirmed a class of eleven. It is an excellent building, and a credit to the Diocese. total cost will be \$6,000. There is a mortgage of \$3,000, bearing 5 per cent, interest. This will be met in due time. There have been twenty-one baptisms; eleven have been confirmed; there are forty-five in the Sunday School; there are fifty-four. communicants: the offerings have been \$2.182. This is due. under GOD, to the wise and faithful ministrations of the Rev'd CHAS, S. CHAMPLIN, Priest in charge. Mr. CHAMPLIN began this work as a Lay Reader. He was ordained Deacon on the 1st of June, 1002, and was advanced to the Priesthood on the 25th of March, 1903.

St. Paul's Mission, Montvale, is also under the charge of the Rev'd Mr. Champlin. It is one of the Missions which are biding their time. The tide of population has not yet reached it, but it is coming. There is a mission building in excellent condition. We are ready for the growth when it comes. There are thirty-one communicants. The offerings have been about \$350.

Epiphany Mission, Allendale, has had the most prosperous year in its history. Extensive improvements on the line of the Erie Railroad have given an impetus to the growth of the village. The erection of a parish house, to cost \$3,500, has been just begun. This will contain Sunday School rooms; rooms for guild chapters; club rooms for men and boys. It will be lighted by electricity and heated by steam. There have been five baptisms; thirteen have been confirmed; there are seventy-six in the Sunday School; there are eighty com-

municants. The offerings have been \$1,559. The Rev'd JAMES WILLIAM JACKSON, Deacon in charge, will soon be advanced to the Priesthood. He has done a wise, faithful, and fruitful work, and has earned this higher degree.

The Mission has lost by death Mr. Daniel A. Smith, one of the most devoted laymen the Diocese ever had. He began the work as a summer resident more than twenty-five years ago. He became so much interested in it that he moved his family and became a permanent resident. It was because of his fidelity and generosity the Mission has become what it is.

On the 13th of October, 1902, St. Matthew's Church property, Jersey City, was transferred to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Mark's Church, Jersey City. St. Mark's Church assumed all debts owed by St. Matthew's, excepting the mortgage of \$2,500, and agreed to continue services in the present church building for at least three years. Since then the church building has been put in thorough repair. New furnaces have been placed; the organ rebuilt; a fence put in front, and the roof made weather tight. Some necessary changes have been made in the interior. All floating debts have been paid, and it is confidently expected that the mortgage of \$2,500 will be paid off this year. Thorough house to house visiting has been done, and a careful canvass of the neighborhood made. The Rev'd FREDERIC E. MORTIMER, Priest in charge, is ably seconded by his Curate, the Rev'd Mr. WILL-MANN, and a Sister from St. Margaret's. There have been twenty-two baptisms; thirteen have been confirmed; there are one hundred and twenty communicants; the offerings have been \$1,200. If anything will save this old historic Parish this present effort will.

Conditions at St. Agnes' Mission, Jersey City, are about as they were last year. It is a Mission of St. Mark's Church; is supported by it and receives nothing from the Diocese.

The Mission Church of the Ascension, Jersey City, has been born again. More has been done in the past year than even

the most sanguine of us deemed possible. The church building has been raised three feet from the ground. A large, light, dry, most attractive basement room has been placed under the entire building. This is being used for Sunday School and parish purposes. A steam plant has been put in. A concrete side walk and an iron fence have been put around the two sides of the building. The entire structure has been renovated and made as nearly as good as new as such a building can be made. The improvement is remarkable. The wise and energetic work of the Rev'd Duncan M. Genns, Priest in charge, cannot be too highly commended. He was ordered Deacon soon after the report of last year was made. He was advanced to the Priesthood on the 25th of March, 1903. Under GOD, he has solved the problem at this Mission where there has been such discouragement for so many years. It will soon become a self-supporting parish. There have been twentyeight baptisms; twenty-six have been confirmed; there are two hundred and twenty-seven in the Sunday School: there are two hundred and twenty communicants; the offerings have been \$5,400. A year ago this would have been said to be impossible. The improvements have cost \$6,300. The church current expenses have been \$2,110. This has all been raised excepting about \$300. This will be raised in a short time. There will not be a dollar of debt for current expenses or improvements. I was able to raise \$3,265 by my own personal efforts for the furtherance of this good work. The Mission is indeed born again.

Trinity Mission, Centreville, met with a serious loss when the Rev'd Mr. Danker left it on the 1st of February. No higher praise could be given his work than to say, as I do say, that his departure has worked no harm to the Mission. The Rev'd Charles Douglas did faithful and efficient service until the 1st of May, when the Rev'd James H. Fielding, formerly of Saratoga Springs, N. Y., became Curate in charge. The work has been somewhat hampered owing to serious illness

in the family of the Rector, the Rev'd Mr. Kirkus. It was in consequence of this that there was no confirmation. A large class is in preparation, however. Excellent work is being done through the Girls' Friendly Society, which is one of the largest branches in the State. There have been eighteen baptisms; there are one hundred and thirty-one communicants; there are one hundred and eighty in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$593. The mother Parish, Trinity Church, Bergen Point, gave \$1,195 towards the support of the services. No Mission in the Diocese is more needed than this.

St. John's Mission, Nordhoff, continues doing the faithful, though limited, work it has done during the years of its existence. It is self-supporting. There have been two baptisms; there are forty-two communicants; there are seventy two in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$167. Mr. W. A. Burdette, the faithful Lay Reader, continues giving his valuable services. The Rev'd Geo. F. Flichtner, of St. Paul's, Englewood, giving such priestly services as are necessary.

Earnest and faithful work is being done at St. Peter's Mission, Clifton, under the Rev'd E. J. Balsley as Priest, and Mr. A. H. W. Anderson of the General Theological Seminary as Lay Reader. The growth of this Mission, while not large, is encouraging. New industries are in contemplation for the town which will bring an increase in population, and we hope also, in strength to the Mission. The debt on the mission property is now but \$740. This is being reduced at the rate of \$20 a month. It will soon be extinguished. Seven have been baptized; four have been confirmed; the offerings have been \$662.

St. Clement's Mission, Hawthorne, under the charge of the Rev'd George M. Dorwart, with Mr. Wm. Mawhinney, a candidate for Holy Orders, as Lay Reader, continues to do exceedingly well. The Lay Reader is faithful and untiring, and the Mission healthy and flourishing. There have been eleven baptisms; eight have been confirmed; there are fifty-

nine communicants; there are ninety-five in the Sunday School; two hundred and twenty-two services have been held.

St. Mary's Mission, Ridgefield Park, is doing all that could be expected probably under the circumstances. The growth and development of the place have not been what they were expected to be. But they are only delayed. They will certainly come. Five have been baptized; three have been confirmed; there are thirty-six communicants; there are sixty-eight in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$700.

All Saints' Mission, Leonia, has met with a serious loss in losing the Rev'd Arthur F. Lewis, who has accepted a call to Connecticut. Very marked improvement has been made during the past year. The debt upon the mission property was \$650 one year ago. That has been reduced to \$150. Before the end of this year that will be entirely extinguished. There will be no break in the services owing to the resignation of Mr. Lewis. The Rev'd Mr. Goodman will be in charge until further arrangements. There have been six baptisms; two have been confirmed; there are seventy-six communicants; there are forty five in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$1,175.

The new Mission of St. Stephen's, Coytesville, is doing all that could be expected of it. The progress is solid and will be lasting. The bulk of the congregation had been members of another communion. They had been Congregationalists. But they receive Church teaching most gladly, and will become intelligent Church people. There have been three baptisms; twenty-two were confirmed; there are thirty-five communicants; the offerings have been \$2,052. The Rev'd J. A. McCleary, Priest in charge, is ready to pay to the Congregational Society of New York City the sum of \$1,260 for the mission building, land, and furniture. The property will be deeded to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund.

The new stone church building for Trinity Mission, Grantwood, is completed, the opening service having been held on the first Sunday in February of this year. The building, which cost about \$8,000, is on a corner plot comprising six city lots. This lot is valued at \$4,000. The property is worth \$12,000. There has been no confirmation in the Mission as yet. The offerings and subscriptions have been \$3,724. The Mission is indebted to Mrs. J. Hull Browning for new and beautiful windows; to Col. and Mrs. E. A. Stevens for a processional cross; and to the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese for substantial aid. This Mission is also under the charge of the Rev'd J. A. McCleary.

The Mission of the Good Shepherd, Fort Lee, once so perplexing, is now full of encouragement. The attendance at the services increases steadily. The sum of \$1,000 is in hand for the erection of a parish house. Mr. W. O. Ross, of the Edgewater Church, has given \$300 towards the purchase of four additional lots. There have been twenty-three baptisms; there are one hundred and forty in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$963. The Rev'd James A. McCleary is

in charge of this Mission also.

I can make no report of St. John's Mission, Hasbrouck Heights, as I have received none.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF NEWARK.

To the Clerical and Lay Deputies of the Convention of the Diocese of Newark.

Dear Brethren:

Meeting as we do under the shadow of our common sorrow, mourning as we do to-day the loss of him who for so many years has been the chief Missionary of the Diocese, I would at the beginning of this report bear my tribute of respect and affection to our late honored and beloved Bishop. and I am sure that in so doing I speak for every Missionary in the Archdeaconry of Newark. No Archdeacon ever worked under a Bishop who was more kindly and sympathetic, ever ready and glad to praise, very slow indeed to criticize or to blame. Full of interest in the missionary work of the Diocese. never sparing himself when he could by his presence and his words help on the cause, he is to-day lovingly and reverently remembered by both priests and people in the Missions of the Archdeaconry. To him the work of missions was a labor of love, and he was never happier than when he learned of some new missionary work within the Diocese, some first effort for the spread of the Church of his faith and love.

He rests now from his labors and his works do follow him. There is not much of change to report concerning the Missions of the Archdeaconry. Trinity Mission, Arlington, in charge of the Rev'd JOHN KELLER, reports a year of quiet steady work. The congregations have been very good, and the Sunday School, always a feature of this Mission, reports an attendance of 165. Water has been piped into the building, and a water motor installed for the organ at a cost of \$175, all of which has been paid. The church has also been lighted with electric lights, a gift of one of the parishoners. Fourteen have been baptized, and six confirmed during the year. The communicants now number one hundred and fifty.

St. James' Mission, Hackettstown, rejoices in the possession of a rectory which has been erected during the past year. is a substantial building of brick and stone, and was finished last October. The ground upon which it stands already belonged to the Mission, and we have now in Hackettstown a church, guild hall and rectory situated on one of the best streets of the village. The cost of the Rectory was \$3.841, of which \$600 was raised in Hackettstown, and about \$600 more in the Diocese. There is a mortgage debt of \$2,300 and a floating indebtedness of \$300, which it is hoped may be soon paid off. One of the sacristies of the church has been enlarged and converted into a chapel for daily services. The cost of this enlargement, about \$200, has been met by friends outside the Mission. A handsome altar of quartered oak has been given to the Church by friends, and was first used on Easter Day. A kitchen has been added to the Guild Hall, and the building has been wired for electric lights. This has been the work of the women of the Mission, who have also paid off the debt on the guild hall piano. The Missionary reports a fair attendance upon the Church services. Three have been baptized and four confirmed during the year. There are now forty-nine communicants. The offerings amounted to \$447.

At Christ Church, Stanhope, of which Mr. MITCHAM is also in charge, services have been held every Sunday afternoon, with Morning Prayer and the Holy Communion on one Sunday morning of the month. There has also been a celebration of the Holy Communion on one week-day each month and on the principal Holy Days. There is little or no Church growth in Stanhope. The Missionary reports seven baptisms during the year, and there are sixty communicants. The offerings for the year have been \$236. The church is in great need of a new roof, the cost of which is estimated at \$200.

The Missionary in charge of St. Paul's Mission, Butler, the Rev'd C. H. Weaver, Rector of Christ Church, Pompton, reports a rather discouraging condition of affairs. The ser-

vices during the past year have been poorly attended, and the people seem indifferent to the welfare of the Church. There are only twenty-one communicants in this little Mission, and it needs the hearty united efforts of all its members. This it has not had. The Archdeacon in a recent visit endeavored to bring the people together and to arouse fresh interest in the work, but the effort thus far has not been successful. It is difficult to say just what can be done to remedy the present condition of affairs. The Mission is only three and a half miles from Pompton. It ought to be carried on in connection with the Pompton Parish, and yet the Butler people would prefer to have a Missionary of their own. The Rev'd Dr. Weaver has done what he could and some of the Pompton people also have shown a kindly interest. The offerings for the year were \$166, and the expenditures were \$250; the deficit of \$84 has been paid by the Warden of the Mission, Mr. R. F. TREWEKE. There has been one baptism and one confirmation during the year.

Zion Church, Belvidere, and St. James' Church, Knowlton, in charge of the Rev'd Geo. H. Young, report little, if any change in their condition. There are some seventy-four communicants in these two old parishes on the bank of the Delaware, who prize the ministrations of the Church and do what they can for its support. The total receipts for the year from the two parishes were \$662. Two have been baptized. There has been no Episcopal visitation this year, and a class for con-

firmation awaits such visitation.

St. Luke's Church, Phillipsburgh, in charge of the Rev'd N. H. MARTIN, reports as usual a year of earnest and successful work. Twenty have been confirmed during the year and fifty-one have been baptized, the largest number of baptisms recorded in the history of the Parish The congregation is composed almost entirely of working people. They have no money, but they are faithful in their attendance upon Church service and most loyal and devoted to their Rector, whose

zeal, energy and common sense richly merit their confidence. The receipts for the year, exclusive of the Missionary grant, were \$1,213.33.

Our faithful Missionary, the Rev'd Joseph H. Smith, continues in charge of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Hamburgh, and of St. Thomas' Church, Vernon. The Diocesan Board of Missions has stood ready to afford our Missionary the assistance which his advanced years and most faithful service richly deserve, but thus far he has not felt obliged to avail himself of it. The Sunday services in these Missions have been regularly maintained, and twice a day on week-days the church bell at Hamburgh rings out its notice of Morning and Evening Prayer. There is little or no growth in these villages. Two have been baptized and two confirmed during the year. To their great credit be it said that the Church people of Hamburgh have more than met the appropriation asked of them for the General Missionary work of the Church and gave \$103.54. The offerings at both Missions for all purposes amounted to \$876.69. A most interesting service on the night of Thanksgiving Day was held in the Church at Hamburgh, at which addresses were made by our Missionary and others to a congregation that filled the church.

It has been a bad year for St. Peter's Mission, Washington. The removal of Church families has sadly crippled this Mission. Our Missionary, the Rev'd Geo. P. Armstrong, has done his work faithfully under discouraging conditions. The Woman's Guild has raised and expended some \$90 for a new church carpet, and for repapering the walls. Two have been baptized and two confirmed during the year. The total offerings of the Mission have been \$670.46. The whole number of communicants is 56.

St. Mark's Mission, Mendham, has gone on its quiet way. Our Missionary, the Rev'd Levi Johnston, reports forty communicants and six confirmed during the year. The offerings from all sources have been \$1,348. The Church at Mendham

ministers during the summer months to quite a large congregation of cottagers and summer visitors, many of whom are interested in the Church and contribute toward its support.

St. Peter's Mission, Essex Fells, and St. Agnes', Little Falls, record the loss of their most faithful and efficient Missionary, the Rev'd Appleton Grannis. By the departure of Mr. Grannis to New York, the Diocese loses one of the best Missionary men that it ever had. St. Agnes', Little Falls, is now in the care of the Rector of St. Paul's, Paterson, and St. Peter's, Essex Fells, together with Ascension Chapel, Bloomfield, is in charge of the Rev'd Lewis R. Levering. The Missionary reports eight persons confirmed at Essex Fells during the past year, and four baptized and two confirmed at Ascension

Chapel, Bloomfield.

At Chatham services have been maintained by the Rev'd J. W. VAN INGEN, Rector of St. Stephen's Church, Millburn. The number of Church people in Chatham is small, but the village undoubtedly has a future. It is bound to become a growing and thriving suburban town. It is gratifying to report a generous gift of land from Mr. and Mrs. Gould of Chatham. upon which it was at first intended to build a church. Later, however, the Presbyterians of Chatham offered their chapel and ground at a moderate price, and with the consent and approval of Mr. Gould, the ground given by himself and wife has been sold, and with the funds the Presbyterian Chapel has been bought. One of our resident Churchmen has also bought the house adjoining. It is believed that the chapel can be made over for our use at comparatively small expense, and the Mission at Chatham will then have a local habitation and a home. Great credit is due to the Rector of St. Stephen's. Millburn, and to several gentlemen of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, for their faithfulness in carrying on the services, often under discouraging circumstances, and for their wise counsel and efficient help in the business interests of the Mission.

St. Alban's Mission, Newark, has lost its Missionary, the

Rev'd Elliot White, to whom it is indebted for many years of devoted service. This Mission, situated as it is, in a growing neighborhood ought before long to become a self-supporting parish. Certainly it owes much to Mr. White and will stand as a monument to his earnest work and sound business judgment.

At St. Peter's Mission, Mt. Arlington, services have been maintained throughout the year. During the summer months the services were in charge of the Rector of Grace Church, Newark, and the Rector of St. Mark's Church, Paterson, and during winter and spring they have been carried on by a Lay Reader, one of our candidates for Orders. At Christmas and Easter there were celebrations of the Holy Communion. The offerings of the summer congregations are expended in maintaining the services during the rest of the year.

And now in closing this report and in laying down the office and work of Archdeacon, I am keenly conscious of the many defects and shortcomings which have marked my service. For two years past I have become increasingly convinced that it is impossible for the Rector of a large parish to do the work of an Archdeacon as it should be done. He cannot make the frequent visitations which are necessary. He may do what he can by correspondence, but letters cannot take the place of personal intercourse.

What is needed is an Archdeacon who can, if necessary, spend several days in a new Mission, hold Sunday services, meet the people, and so make himself thoroughly familiar with all the conditions of the Mission.

This the Rector of a large parish cannot do, and so I leave the work, to be carried on, I trust, by some one wiser and stronger, and who will be able to give to this most important office the time and the attention which it rightfully demands.

Extensive improvements under way along the line of the Erie R. R. have given a slight impetus to the growth of Allendale and that growth gives promise of decided permanency.

During the year the Mission has lost, in Mr. D. A. SMITH, a most remarkable layman, who for twenty-five years, was the sole inspiration of the work here, and who, for the sake of it, moved his family to this place.

Ascension Chapel, a parochial mission, was started in 1901, the first service being held on the Sunday after Ascension, May 19 in that year. In 1902 a lot was purchased, corner of Montgomery and Berkeley Avenues, Bloomfield, and the erection of a chapel begun in May, 1902, and completed in December, 1902. The building is a substantial frame structure, ceiled with pine, with a seating capacity of 200, and has a basement for Sunday-school and other Parish purposes. The appointments of the building are Churchly in every particular. Services are held regularly on Sundays at 8.30 A. M., and 7.45 P. M. Sunday-school at 3.30 P. M.

On April 30, 1902, the church building was damaged to the extent of about \$6,000.00, fully recovered by insurance. Advantage was taken of this to make some advisable enlargement and improvements. The congregation resumed its use of the main building towards the end of September.

Owing to continued physical disability I have not performed any clerical acts during the last Conventional year.

The Rev'd S. D. BOOROM reports:

From the date of my last report, I continued on duty on board the U. S. Receiving Ship "Columbia," at the Navy Yard, New York, to the date of retirement, Nov. 14th last. During these months, I held Divine Service every Sunday morning at Library Hall, on Cob Dock, Navy Yard, New York. I also offered prayers on board the Receiving Ship "Columbia" every morning. I visited the prisoners every morning in the Brig—i. e. ship's prison on Cob Dock. I also paid regular visits to the sick at the Navy Hospital, and very frequently buried the dead from the Hospital and from ships lying at the Navy Yard. I frequently visited the Courts in New York and looked after the interests of prisoners arraigned by the orders of the Department. Since my retirement, I have only two Sundays in civil life officiated at Divine Service—Palm Sunday and Easter Day. I have also officiated at one funeral in civil life.

The Rev'd CHARLES DOUGLAS reports:

For seven months I took charge of St. Thomas' Church, Amenia, New York, and have taken occasional services, at All Saints' Church, and at the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, New York City; and for two months assisted the Rev'd F. M. KIRKUS, of Trinity Church, Bayonne, N. J. All my official acts will be found in the reports of those Parishes.

The Rev'd WILLIAM JOSETIN EHRHARD reports:

All my official acts are included in the Parish register of Trinity Church, Hoboken, where I have been Curate since Dec. 1, 1902.

The Rev'd WILLIAM A. LONG reports:

I conducted the services at St. Peter's, Clifton, N. J., from May 1st, till the end of October. I took my turn at the Sunday evening services at Paesaic Bridge, till they were discontinued. I had charge of All Saints', Leonia, during the absence of the Rector, in June, July, August and September, and attended to calls from Passaic and Rutherford during the vacations of the Rectors. I took the services at St. John the Divine, Hasbrouck Heights, during January and since then have been assisting, at that place and at Ridgefield Park. I have also assisted the Rector of Christ Church, Hackensack, and taken duty for other clergy of the Diocese, when called upon, and able to do so.

The Rev'd W. H. C. LYLBURN reports:

I have celebrated the Holy Communion in the Chapel of Trinity School, Morristown, every Sunday, and on Saints' Days; also have assisted in other services in this and other Dioceses; held afternoon services in the State Asylum at Morris Plains. During the week my time has been taken up in the work of Trinity School.

The Rev'd WM. C. MAGUIRE reports:

I have been unable to do any mental work for the past year. My physical health also has been very poor; accompanied with much pain and suffering. I attend Divine service whenever I am in a condition to do so. I am still an inmate of "The Home for Incurables," Manhattan, New York.

The Rev'd GUSTAVUS WM. MAYER reports:

In complying with the requirements of the Canon, I would state that from May 1st to November 1st, 1902, I officiated in the Diocese of Pennsylvania, as minister-in-charge of Christ Church, Franklinville, Philadelphia; and that since November 1st, 1902, and up to this date, I have officiated in the same capacity in St. John's Church, Vinita, Indian Territory, at the special and urgent request of the Bishop, the Rt. Rev'd F. K. BROOKE, D. D.

The Rev'd CHARLES HENRY MEAD reports:

During the Convention year, I have served as a Chaplain of the Sisterhood of St. Mary, at St. Gabriel's School, Peekskill, New York. Through the scholastic year I have, on Sundays as a rule, had three services, including two celebrations of the Holy Communion; preached once, and instructed two classes in the Bible or the catechism; during the week celebrated the Holy Communion daily, and given an instruction to the school on Fridays. In the school vacation, I have, for the more part, celebrated the Holy Eucharist daily, and preached and catechised each Sunday. I have baptized six persons and presented fifteen to the Bishop for Confirmation, and buried four.

The Rev'd OSCAR FITZLAND MOORE reports:

During the past year I have remained as assistant at Grace Church, Orange. All my official acts will be found in the report of the Parish, made by the Rector.

The Rev'd B. Wellington Paxton reports:

Since November 1, 1902, I have been acting as Curate at St. Philip's Church, Newark. Since the resignation of the Rev'd REEVE HOBBIE, the Rector, and the Rev'd HENRY P. SCRATCHLEY, Curate, I have been in charge of the Parish.

The Rev'd HERBERT B. PULSIFER reports:

Since January 1st, 1903, I have been engaged in the duties of my office as Curate at Grace Church, Newark. My official acts are included in the report of the Rector of the Parish.

The Rev'd SPENCER M. RICE, D. D., reports:

I have continued to assist my reverend brethren during the year just closing, doing such clerical work as they have requested me to perform, celebrating the Holy Communion, baptizing, burying the dead, marrying, visiting the sick, etc.

The Rev'd H. P. SCRATCHLEY reports:

I respectfully state that my clerical work is included in the report of St. Philip's Church, Newark. During July and August I assisted the Rector of Grace Church, Cherry Valley, in the Diocese of Albany. From September, I have done those duties which have been assigned me by the Rector of St. Philip's, and I have helped in the services of other parishes in the Diocese.

The Rev'd E. BOUDINOT STOCKTON, S. T. B., reports:

I have the honor to report that during the time specified above I have performed the duties assigned to me as Assistant Minister of All Saints' Parish, Orange, N. J.

Since my election as Assistant at St. Mark's Church, Jersey City, I have done such work as has been assigned to me by the Rector of the Parish.

REPORTS OF HOSPITALS, HOMES AND WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

HOSPITAL OF ST. BARNABAS, NEWARK.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

The Trustees of the Hospital of St. Barnabas are happy to report a distinct improvement in the conditions under which the work of the Hospital has been conducted during the last twelve months.

The whole number of patients within the Hospital was 863, of which number 808 were admitted since the date of our last Report. The numbers treated in the out-patient department were: of old cases 2,227 and of new cases 1,448—in all 3,675.

The benevolent work of the institution has been, therefore, as usual, of steady helpfulness to a great many people both within and without its walls. There has been but little variation from the work of the preceding year. For the details of the work, which it is not necessary to mention here, we must refer to the very complete reports furnished by the Medical Board.

FINANCES.

The financial condition of the Hospital has improved to a very satisfactory degree. The total amount of money received from all sources was \$35,012.46. This sum includes a balance on

hand, May 1, 1902, in all the accounts, of \$1,094.54, \$1,500 received upon a mortgage and re-invested, and \$7,000 in legacies. Disbursements amounted to \$33,114.74, but this sum includes \$1,500 of the endowment fund re-invested, and \$3,000 paid upon the notes in the bank. There is no deficiency, this year, in current expenses. The amount of discount notes has been reduced to \$11.500. The mortgage indebtedness remains at \$27,000; and the endowment fund is still \$42,000, taking at their par value securities that are now worth about \$44,500.

The treasury has been greatly helped by a legacy of \$1,000 from the estate of James D. Orton and \$6,000 received from

the estate of F. C. HAINES.

Several extraordinary expenses, however, have been unavoidably incurred for repairs and improvements, amounting to \$1,754.66. These repairs and improvements include the almost entire renovation of the plumbing work, a new laundry machine, repairs on the elevator and a large amount of painting and other repairs. The increased cost of coal has also added materially to the expense account. The disbursements for wages and supplies were very nearly the same as last year, although the prices of the supplies have somewhat reduced by purchasing of wholesale houses.

On the basis of the whole amount disbursed, the average monthly expense would appear to be \$2,760; but the amount expended for actual necessities in the working of the Hospital was \$24,745.84, or \$2,062 monthly; while expenses on account of the property of the Hospital, including interest and repairs, etc., amounted to \$3,869.00, or \$322.42 monthly, and of the remaining \$4,500, \$3,000 was applied in payment of old debts

and \$1,500 was a re-investment.

Contributions for maintenance have come from many sources. The income from the board of patients, from invested funds and legacies and from appropriations from the City of Newark (\$2,500) and the Town of Harrison amounted to \$23,231.54. We are indebted to the Guild of the Hospital

of \$3,403.03; to the Hospital Review for \$350; to a large number of special contributors \$3,600, and to churches and Sunday-schools for \$1,638.35. Among the last named the First Presbyterian congregation of this city contributed \$105. This is, so far as it is known, the first contribution from any congregation other than those from our own Church, which has been directly made to the Hospital. From these sources we must confidently expect continued help in the future.

Contributing to the comfort of the patients, as it does most faithfully, the Guild of St. Catharine is always one of our sources of supply. Although the result of its work does not figure in the Treasurer's Report, it is none the less helpful and necessary.

In this connection we are glad to note the formation recently of a Guild of young women, belonging to different congregations, under the name of St. Elizabeth. Its special object is to aid the Hospital by distributing mite-boxes and making collections through them for the general funds. The Guild has begun its work auspiciously and much is expected of it.

ADMINISTRATION.

The faithful and efficient management under the direction of the Sister ADELINE continues, as in the past. The Executive Committee has been able to adopt new methods of purchasing supplies. These have been of great advantage in securing provisions of excellent quality and in reducing the cost of the same.

Religious services have been conducted under the direction of the Chaplain, appointed by the Bishop. Some months ago the Rev'd Elliot White, who served faithfully in that capacity for some years, resigned. He was followed by the Rev'd JOSEPH N. STARR. The present Chaplain is the Rev'd JAMES W. SMITH.

THE TRAINING SCHOOL FOR NURSES.

The school for nurses has proved a great success, and its high reputation is well sustained under the direction of the Sister Alexia, who is now Superintendent of Nurses. Already many graduates have been sent out, who have taken the first rank in the great army of trained nurses who work among the people of our land. The graduating class, this year, numbers eight persons. They have earned their diplomas by diligent study, and hard and exacting labors. Their work in the Hospital during the period of training has been done efficiently, and they go forth well fitted to enter on their work under other conditions with every prospect of increasing usefulness to suffering humanity.

SPECIAL NEEDS.

It is of the greatest importance that we have a new home for the nurses. The old frame building which has been in use for a long time is in such condition that it cannot be made equal to our requirements. Steps ought to be taken without much delay to provide a suitable new building.

There is also urgent need for a new Mortuary Chapel. The condition and the location of the old brick building used for the temporary repose of the dead—called by some "the dead house"—is such that it ought to be removed without delay; and a suitable chapel ought to be provided somewhere on the premises.

We know of no more proper object for which to ask contributions. Might not some person or persons provide the Mortuary Chapel as a memorial to deceased friends?

During the last year a goodly sum was expended for necessary repairs. Additional work of the kind is still needed; especially should the halls and the walls of the Children's and Maternity Wards be painted.

THE HOSPITAL REVIEW.

The Treasurer's Report shows that the sum of \$350.00 was

received from the Hospital Review, and \$100 more was received after the report was made up. The Review makes known, month by month, the conditions at the Hospital. It contains the monthly reports and devotes one number in the year to the Annual Report, giving in full all details of the Hospital work. It also, from time to time, makes known our special needs, and publishes articles of general interest. Its circulation might be extended; and we close our report with the express hope that, during the next year, it may be much more widely read by the people interested in the Hospital of St. Barnabas, and by the community at large.

In the early part of the year two outbreaks of contagious disease occurred which in a measure put the Hospital under quarantine, and accounts for the decrease in the number of patients as compared with last year. Further details of the work will be found in the pages of statistics, and in the med; cal and surgical reports.

FINANCES.

The current receipts of the Hospital from all sources have been \$26.806.44, and the expenses have been \$33,222.32. The deficit therefore is \$6,415.88. We have been able to meet this deficiency from legacies received within the year which have been applicable to current expenses, and have even been able to reduce the floating indebtedness, \$544.56, so that the net debt to-day is \$8,512.13, as against \$9,056.69 a year ago. Special receipts of this kind, however, cannot be considered a part of our regular income, and every effort should be made to provide a revenue sufficient to meet the current liabilities without resorting to them. We have had extraordinary expenses this year, but the cost of fuel, provisions, and labor has been steadily rising for several years, and for some time to come, even under the most favorable conditions, the annual expenses cannot be expected to fall below \$32,000, and they may easily run a thousand dollars higher. The regular receipts of every kind, including the average amount of cash donations, are about \$27,500.00. This leaves \$4,500 to \$5,500 more to be raised every year, either by subscription or otherwise, if the Hospital is to close its accounts without a deficiency. We beg the Council and friends to give this matter their most earnest consideration.

It is neither good morals nor good business to continue spending several thousand dollars per year more than is received. If some means cannot be devised to increase the income to a point where it will equal the expenses, then the expenses ought to be radically reduced. This would mean such a curtailment of the work as would be seriously felt by the community. We cannot believe that this is desired by anyone, and now that its necessities are known we hope most sincerely that the friends of the Hospital will do their utmost to meet them.

Just here we cannot refrain from noting the comparatively slender hold which hospitals and similar institutions seem to have upon the sympathies of the generous and wealthy public. Large sums are given every year to libraries and museums and colleges, either for immediate use or as endowments, but it is rare that like amounts are given to hospitals; yet what institutions do more for the physical comfort and welfare of the community, and what can be more worthy of general support? We may hope that by-and-by the current of benefactions will be broadened, and then that hospitals may receive oftener from the living what now comes but seldom, and then usually as a bequest from the departed.

THE TRAINING SCHOOL.

The work of the Training School has gone on very smoothly through the past year. Seventeen nurses were graduated in June last. Seventy-five applications for entrance to the school have been received, and there are now on the rolls twenty-eight pupil nurses and three probationers.

Quarters for the school have been secured in an apartment house at some distance from the Hospital, and although it is a great improvement over old St. Luke's House, the accommodations are not yet such as the nurses ought to have. One of our most pressing needs is for a Nurses' Home, either on the Hospital grounds or close at hand. Such a building would contain a lecture room, reception rooms, a library, an infirmary, and the necessary living apartments. A nurse's life is hard enough at the best, and during her period of education and training she should be made as comfortable as possible. We hope some kind friend of the Hospital will be inspired in the near future to provide the school with the home which it so urgently requires.

THE GUILDS.

The three Guilds of ladies who make Christ Hospital the object of their kind attention and care have been this year, as always, of invaluable assistance in the work.

The Abercrombie Guild, which was incorporated to hold

endowments for the benefit of the Hospital, now has over \$57,000 safely invested. Besides steadily adding to its permanent funds, the members also collect money for current expenses, and last year the Treasurer of the Guild remitted, including income from endowments, the sum of \$2,467 for this purpose.

The Abercrombie Memorial Fund, established in memory of the Rev'd RICHARD M. ABERCROMBIE, D. D., founder and first President of the Hospital, has collected and paid \$500 towards the extinguishment of the bonded debt. Through the Rev'd WILLIAM R. JENVEY, a friend of the Hospital has contributed a like sum for the same object, and the debt has accordingly been reduced \$1,000.

To speak of the Abercrombie Guild at once suggests its paper, The Daisy. The first issue of this bulletin of Abercrombie's work was in April, 1878. From the very first it has been devoted to the interests of the Daisy Ward for children, and through its agency over \$70,000 have been collected for endowments and the erection of buildings. Its history is a record of the boundless faith, the unwavering interest, and the persevering energy of its editor, Miss Mary C. Barry, and in the name of the Council, on this the twenty-fifth anniversary of The Daisy we wish to express our profound appreciation of the love and service which she has so unselfishly given to the Hospital through the whole period of its history.

St. Mary's Guild has for its special work the raising of money to meet the annual interest charge.

In the year just closed it collected, through its four hundred mite boxes, \$1,131, as against \$1,085 last year, or about 65% of the whole amount of interest on the bonded debt.

Christ Hospital Guild, of Hoboken, is a most active and energetic organization, differing in some respects from any other auxiliary. It not only collects funds but disburses them itself as occasion arises, and every superintendent has appreciated the privilege of having its treasury to turn to in special emergencies. It was organized in 1898 with seventy-five members. Its membership is now over two hundred, and it expended last year \$587 for the benefit of the Hospital.

REPAIRS AND IMPROVEMENTS.

Old St. Luke's House, which for several years has been in a state of decay, beyond the possibility of repair, has at last been torn down, thus removing a menace to health and a serious danger from fire. Also within the year the south wing has been painted and thoroughly repaired, to its very great improvement in cheerfulness and appearance.

LEGACIES.

Two legacies have been received, one of \$5,000 from the estate of Mr. John W. Harrison, and one of \$2,000 from the estate of Mrs. Harriet Welsh. Notice has also been received of a bequest of \$1,000 by the late Mr. George Stratford.

NEEDS OF THE HOSPITAL.

Besides an addition of \$5,000 to the annual income to meet the current expenses of maintenance, the Hospital has other urgent and pressing needs.

A Nurse's Home, of which the cost will be about \$25,000.

A Daisy Ward for children and Maternity Pavilion combined, which will cost about \$30,000.

A building which will bring under one roof the boiler house, laundry, and servants' quarters, and which, properly equipped, will cost from \$15,000 to \$20,000.

Will not some of the friends of the Hospital or the generous public give us these buildings, either as thank offerings or memorials, or simply because they are so very much needed? Surely there is nothing which can appeal more strongly to our sympathies, or which is more worthy of support, than the Hospital in its need.

NECROLOGY.

In September the Council lost by death one of its most valued members, Mr. WILLIAM H. WILLY. His sympathics

were unusually broad and generous, and he was deeply interested in benevolent work in New York as well as Jersey City. In the ten years that he was a member of the Council he did much by advice, financial assistance, and personal service to bring the Hospital to the high state of efficiency in which it stands to-day.

Dr. ARTHUR T. MUZZY, one of the attending Opthalmologists to the Hospital, passed away after a short illness. Dr. Muzzy had been a member of the Medical Staff for thirteen years, and in that time had won the respect and cordial esteem of all his associates.

Death has also invaded the Hospital household. Mrs. Rosalie Masson entered into rest after an illness of great suffering, contracted in the course of duty. She was loyal to the institution, faithful in her work, and had a promising future before her in her chosen profession.

It is such as these who have made Christ Hospital, and although no longer with us their works do follow them.

In closing this report we wish to thank all who have assisted us in any way in caring for the sick and suffering, and then to invoke the blessing of GOD upon all our endeavors for the coming year. May He stir up the wills of His faithful people, that they may be moved to provide liberally, not only for our daily necessities, but for the steady upbuilding of this work which is all done in His Name and for His Glory.

ST. KATHARINE'S HOME.

ANNUAL REPORT.

The best way for the Secretary of St. Katharine's to write a report is simply to quote from the report of the Sister in charge, and then give a few necessary facts concerning improvements and the "ever vexed question" of finance.

The Sister tells in her report that we have had twelve girls and eight babies this past year, and best of all, that all are doing well. The babies always seem in the best of health, and the mothers show the good care they have had. The garden was a great help to the girls during the summer, and they showed their appreciation of it by keeping it in good condition. The girls who have gone out return frequently and are glad to come back to the Home, which for some of them is the only one they know.

The house has been painted outside, a necessary improvement, as it was in bad condition. The tournament and games at Morristown netted \$500, through the kindness of Morristown and Bernardsville people, and this has been the only entertainment given for St. Katharine's during the past year.

Our deficit November 1st, 1902, is \$888.33, which is very depressing. This means that we must combine each year and furnish some sort of an entertainment, trying, if possible, to have a better showing financially. In all this work this problem of finance is unsolved; it has been for the last ten years, and unless we make a great effort it will be for all the years to come.

With the condition of the Home, the good management of the place, the helping and betterment of the girls spiritually, mentally and physically, we have much to be thankful for in our work at St. Katharine's. Only that the relationship between the girls and those in charge is confidential, and therefore no stories can be repeated, a report of our work would be not only interesting, but so full of appealing sorrow that one could not think of it without a pang of sympathy, and a strong desire to help in some way.

As ever, the girls come from all denominations and all attend the services at the Home, which is the greatest factor of help to them, uplifting and carrying them on to that which brings "peace at the last."

WIDOWS' HOME, HOBOKEN.

The Widows' Home, in Hoboken, is for the reception and care of widows who are communicants of the Church; who have reached the age of sixty, and who come recommended as women worthy to be received into such a Home. It has a small endowment. The house is very comfortable, and everything is done to make the life of the inmates a truly home life. The charges are ten dollars a month, which cover all expenses. The capacity of the Home is limited; only eight or nine can be cared for at one time. There are now only five inmates. Special arrangements can be made for the reception of a worthy person when the conditions are exceptional. Applications can be addressed either to the Secretary of the Board of Trustees or to the Chaplain.

HOUSE OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD, ORANGE.

The House of the Good Shepherd has continued during the past year its customary care of aged and infirm men and women and of convalescents. During the year ending June 1st, 1903, four new inmates have been received and one convalescent has been given a temporary home. There are at present nineteen men and women who make up the household under care. Of this number twelve are communicants of the Church.

Regular services are held at the Home on Wednesday mornings and on Sunday afternoons. The Holy Communion is celebrated monthly and on the great festivals.

THE ARTHUR HOME.

ANNUAL REPORT.

The past year has been one of encouragement in many ways. After a twelve months' test our new building has proved its adaptability to our wants in almost every particular. There has been no serious illness in the household, though the Home has been filled to its capacity. Seven boys have been admitted and six withdrawn during the year. The last report of the Committee on Admissions showed twenty on the waiting list, many very urgent cases, proving the need for such an institution to care for destitute boys. It would be possible to accommodate more than twenty-seven, our present limit, but, under existing circumstances, we do not feel justified in increasing that number.

While the interest shown by the Diocese increases each year, the amount received from this source has not yet reached the sum hoped for, and the Board feels very strongly the expediency of asking each rector to urge his people to give more liberally.

Owing to the advance in the cost of living generally, and especially the price of coal, the Board found itself faced by an unusual deficit at the close of the year. However, thanks to the individual efforts of each member of the Board, with the addition of a memorial gift of \$500, sufficient money has been raised to cancel this indebtedness and we begin the new year free from debt, except a \$5,000 mortgage on the property.

The boys under Mrs. Mayo's instruction are making excellent progress in the school and are also being instructed in manual training and farming as well; a piece of farm land having been loaned to the Home for the purpose of raising vegetables.

ALMS HOUSE MISSIONARY SOCIETY, NEWARK.

Immediately upon the raising of the small-pox quarantine, last October, the services at the Newark City Alms House were resumed.

On March 29, 1878, the services of the Episcopal Church were conducted for the first time in this institution, and for twenty-five years these services have now been regularly carried on.

In the Alms House we come in contact with the world's poorest—those who possess nothing. We strive to reach these people by going to them, by showing our interest in them, and by doing what we can to cheer their lives. In our intercourse with them we have found that they appreciate our sympathy and are touched by our acts of kindness.

This work among the inmates would not have been possible but for the unfailing support of the ladies connected with the Alms House Missionary Society, under the direction of its President, Miss Emma V. Gordon.
