#### TITLE I, CANON 1, § IL

#### OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election, in the following form:

[Name of the Church, the Place, and Date.]

This certifies that at a meeting of the congregation of this Church, held for the purpose of electing Church Officers, and Deputies, and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, (or for the purpose of electing Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, if the meeting be for that object alone), A. B., C. D., and E. F., being communicants of the Church in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Deputies; and B. C., D. E., and F. G., also being communicants in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Alternate Deputies to represent the Parish in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand, (or if two Wardens subscribe, we have set our hands), the day and year above written.

N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary sign, then the signatures of both Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-in-charge or Missionary, cannot sign.

The Lay Representation is limited to three Deputies, whose names in full should be carefully and legibly written.

Three Alternate Deputies must also be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies. (See Title I, Canon 6, § II, [2].)

This Certificate is to "be transmitted to the Secretary of the Convention at least ten days before the meeting of the Annual Convention." (See Title I, Canon 1, § II.)

In order to secure this, the Secretary will forward a blank form to every Parish, and he earnestly asks the FROMPT attention of the Clergy.

\*\*\*By the terms of the Constitution and Canons, the Deputies must be communicants of the Church, and also qualified voters in the Parish which elects them. [See Title I, Canon 6, § II, [4], [5] and [6].

- VII. Motions, Resolutions and Miscellaneous Business.
  - All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered.
- 6. The Reports of Committees shall be in writing, and, when made, shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.
- No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.

- 8. When any member is about to speak he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
- No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply,) in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
- At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
- All questions shall be decided viva voce, unless otherwise specially ordered.
- 12. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote of the Convention may be taken by Orders, voting separately, and the names shall be entered on the Minutes.
- 13. The doors of the Convention shall be opened for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
- 14. No member shall leave the Convention without permission.
- 15. In all elections, those persons only who shall have a majority of all the votes given, shall be deemed elected; but if in any case more than the required number of persons shall have a majority of votes, the required number of persons having the highest number of votes shall be deemed elected, and in case of a tie between two or more candidates, there shall be a new ballot.
- 16. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone it to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.

- 17. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
- 18. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate, but any member may appeal from the decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention.
- All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.
- 20. The Convention shall meet the first day at 10 A. M., and on subsequent days at 9.30 A. M., with a recess of one hour on each day between 1 and 2 o'clock.
- At the close of each Convention, the Minutes shall be corrected and approved.

## Report of the Secretary.

To the 31st Convention, Diocese of Newark:

The Secretary has the honor to report that he attended to the routine work of his office during the past Conventional year, and in addition to this he prepared the Triennial Report of the Diocese of Newark to the 1904 General Convention, and furnished copies in triplicate.

In this connection the Secretary would state that a considerable number of parochial and other reports, due on May 17th of last year, were not sent in for several months after the adjournment of the last Convention, and the publication of the Journal could not be begun until August 15th, and the preparation of the Triennial report until September 25th. These conditions involve much inconvenience and extra correspondence. A suggestion that some relief be afforded his office by adopting regulations similar to those in force in other jurisdictions may not be out of place in this report.

A communication from the Secretary of the House of Deputies of the General Convention making known the changes in the Constitution and Canons, already communicated to the Diocese in the Appendix to the Journal of the 1904 General Convention, recently distributed, is herewith presented.

Application for admission into union with this Convention is made by St. George's Parish, Maplewood; also, by the new Parish styled, The Church of the Ascension, Jersey City; and the papers in these cases are in the possession of the Secretary.

## The General Convention.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

In compliance with the requirements of Article XI. of the Constitution, I hereby make known that the following alteration of the

Constitution of the Church is proposed: to wit, that comprised in the resolution printed herewith, said resolution having been constitutionally adopted by a General Convention held in the city of Boston, in October, A. D. 1904.

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted at the next General Convention, in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution, as follows:

That Article I, Section 6, of the Constitution, be amended by adding after the words "of the United States" the words "and one Clerical and one Lay Deputy chosen by the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe."

# Treasurer's Report,

The Treasurer of Convention presented his Report, (Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, Widows' and Orphans' Fund, Episcopal Fund, Convention Expenses, and Diocesan Missions Account), and a report of the condition of the Funds under the care of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, and the Treasurer of the Convention. Copies were distributed to the members of Convention. (Vide, inserts facing this page.)

## Retirement of Parish Bonds.

The Treasurer also made a verbal statement explanatory of the following resolution, proposed by the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, de the retirement of parish bonds.

WHEREAS, Many Parishes of the Diocese of Newark have contributed to the Episcopal Fund parish bonds or money under the provisions of Title I, Canon 4, of the Code of Canons of the Diocese, and have thereby secured exemption from any assessment levied, or to be levied, by the Finance Committee of the Diocese for the support of the Episcopate, and

Whereas, The Trustees of the Episcopal Fund of the Diocese, to whom the aforesaid bonds and money have been given, or who hold the same, have agreed to cancel and return the said parish bonds to the Parishes that have contributed parish bonds to the Episcopal Fund, and have agreed to credit annually the Parishes that have contributed money to the Episcopal Fund with a certain sum of money upon any assessment that may hereafter be levied for the support of the Episcopate of the Diocese, provided that said Parishes give up all rights of exemption from assessment for the support of the Episcopate of the Diocese which they now have under the provisions of the above mentioned Canon, the form of such agreements being set out in Schedules A. and B. hereto annexed, and the list of the Parishes that have entered into such agreements being set out in Schedule C. hereto annexed, and

WHEREAS, In the opinion of this Convention it is very necessary that the exemptions secured by the Parishes of the Diocese be given up in order that the burden of the support of the Episcopate may be equalized among all the Parishes of the Diocese; now therefore, be it

Resolved, That the action of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund in agreeing as aforesaid with the Parishes of the Diocese who have signed such agreements is hereby ratified and approved, and be it further

Resolved, That said Trustees are hereby authorized and empowered to make and carry out similar agreements with any other Parishes of the Diocese holding exemption from assessment for the support of the Episcopate as aforesaid, and be it further

Resolved, That said Trustees are hereby authorized and empowered to cancel and return the parish bonds in their possession, provided the Parishes to whom said bonds are returned agree to give up all rights of exemption from assessment for the support of the Episcopate, and said Trustees are further authorized and empowered to credit the Parishes that have contributed money to the

Episcopal Fund upon any assessment that may hereafter be levied for the support of the Episcopate, with such sum of money annually by way of interest upon the money contributed as may be agreed upon by said Trustees and said Parishes respectively, provided that said Parishes agree to give up all rights of exemption from assessment for the support of the Episcopate.

The Trustees of the Episcopal Fund recommend the adoption of the above resolution.

The Rev'd Dr. Jenvey, for the Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, offered the following proposed Canons:

## TITLE III.

## MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

## CANON 1.

OF THE FUND FOR AGED OR INFIRM CLERGYMEN.

Sec. I. It shall be the duty of every Minister, having charge of a congregation of this Diocese, to make at least one annual collection for the relief of Clergymen disabled by age or accident or disease.

Sec. II. All collections received for this object shall be transmitted to the Treasurer of the Convention, and paid out by him on the order and in the manner directed by the "Trustees of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen."

Sec. III. The said Trustees shall have power to order paid out of the collections received during the year, or out of the income of the Permanent Fund, a sum not exceeding seventy-five dollars, towards defraying the funeral expenses of any Clergyman of the Church, canonically connected with this Diocese.

Sec. IV. The said Trustees shall have power to order paid out of the collections received during the year, and out of the income of the Permanent Fund, such sum as they may in their discretion deem proper for the relief of Clergymen disabled by age, or accident, or disease, who have been canonically connected with this Diocese for the two years immediately preceding their application for relief, and have spent at least two successive years within the limits of this Diocese in the active discharge of the duties of the Ministry, or in the work of Christian Education.

Sec, V. All collections received during the Conventional year and unappropriated at the end of the same shall be paid into a fund, which shall be known as the "Permanent Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund," and which shall be kept safely invested by the Treasurer of the Convention, and the income thereof alone used.

Sec. VI. All legacies and all donations limited by the donor shall be used and applied agreeably to the terms and provisions under which the money is received, and when not otherwise directed by the donor, the legacy or donation shall be added to the permanent fund.

#### CANON 2

OF THE FUND FOR WIDOWS OR ORPHANS OF CLERGYMEN.

Sec. I. It shall be the duty of every Minister, having charge of a congregation in this Diocese, to make at least one annual collection or donation for the relief of widows and orphans of Clergymen.

Sec. II. All contributions and donations for this object shall be transmitted to the Treasurer of the Convention, and in transmitting the same to him it shall be distinctly stated that such contributions or donations are designed for the Fund for Widows and Orphans of Clergymen.

Sec. III. All collections and donations received during the Conventional year, shall be subject to the order of the "Trustees of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen," and may be appropriated for the relief of widows and orphans of Clergymen, who have been canonically connected with the Diocese for the two years immediately preceding their death, and have spent at least two successive years within the limits of this Diocese in the active discharge of the duties of the Ministry, or in the work of Christian Education.

Sec. IV. All collections received during the Conventional year and unappropriated at the end of the same shall be paid into a fund which shall be known as the "Permanent Widows and Orphans Fund," and which shall be kept safely invested by the Treasurer of the Convention. The income of the Permanent Fund may be appropriated by the said Trustees for the relief of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen, who are by the preceding sections entitled to the benefits conferred by this Canon.

Sec.V. All legacies, devises and gifts limited by the donor shall be used and applied agreeably to the terms and provisions under which the money or property is received, and when not otherwise directed by the donor, the legacy, devise or donation shall be added to the Permanent Fund and the income thereof alone used.

On motion, these propositions were referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons for consideration and report.

The Rev'd Walker Gwynne read the

Report, Committee on Certificates of Lay Deputies.

The Committee on Certificates of Lay Deputies begs leave to report that sixty-nine Parishes are in union with the Convention, of which sixty-five have presented Certificates in due form as prescribed by the Canon.

Mr. William M. Franklin, Chairman, presented the Report of the Finance Committee, which on being read, the recommendations of the Committee were moved for adoption.

# Report of Finance Committee.

NEWARK, N. J., May 12, 1905.

The Finance Committee respectfully submits its report to the Convention as follows:

Under the amendments to the Canons adopted by the last Convention, held on May 17th and 18th, 1904, the Finance Committee promptly organized for the performance of its duties, and with very few exceptions has met regularly each Friday morning since the Convention, in the parlor of the Security Savings Bank, No. 742 Broad Street, Newark, where every convenience and courtesy for the agreeable conduct of business has been afforded to the Committee, for which facilities and courtesy we respectfully recommend that appropriate action be taken by the Convention.

The Committee received from the Secretary of the Convention certified copies of all resolutions passed by the Convention and referred to the Committee for consideration.

The Canons and resolutions passed by the Convention have constituted the foundation on which the past year's work has been built, even though no action can be reported respecting some of the latter.

The Committee first turned its attention to a revision of the Diocesan accounts; and, with the efficient co-operation of the Treasurer, a form of statement was introduced which afforded to the Committee full information each month of the status of each fund in the custody of the Convention. A suitable warrant, approved by the Committee, is now lodged with the Treasurer for each payment made, whatever its character.

The establishment of such a system of accounts has enabled the Treasurer to prepare and lay before the Convention with this report a complete statement of the financial affairs of the Diocese, so that revenue and expenditures of each fund as well as the total amount of money employed in the conduct of the affairs of the Diocese are now displayed upon a single sheet; although for the details of the operations of the respective funds reference should be made to the reports of the respective Trustees and Boards.

The best method of securing adequate revenue for the Diocese has received most careful consideration. The objection to assessments, the difficulty of determining a fair basis for assessment and the inequality of contributions existing between Parishes, created by the outstanding parish bonds, proved a most preplexing problem. The basis of assessment is always a vexed one, and the existence of the parish bonds with all the equities and obligations involved in them, not only between the Parishes and the Diocese, but between the Parishes and each other, presented a problem requiring very careful consideration.

A serious question was constantly before the Committee from the fact that a large number of church organizations, both Parishes and Missions, were making no contributions whatever for the support of the Espiscopate or the Diocese. This was a condition which seemed wholly foreign to the very life of our Church; and a determined effort has been made to correct it.

After exhaustive consideration of the whole subject of revenue and in the face of the urgent necessity of securing adequate means for the requirements of the Diocese, it was decided to appeal to all Parishes which had contributed in a generous way in the past year to continue or increase their offerings, to all Parishes which had

contributed less in proportion to their ability to increase their offerings, while to those which had failed wholly, to call for a moderate contribution in order that all might share in the maintenance of the Diocese as well as enjoy its benefits. Under such a plan, if generally responded to, it was believed that the necessary revenue would be procured; and in that case it would be for the Convention to dispose of the same, the Finance Committee exercising no jurisdiction in this respect.

Concurrently with this effort to determine the capacity of the Parishes for adequate support of the Diocese, has gone the united effort by the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, and this Committee to retire the parish bonds; and this effort has met with measurable success.

In the letter of February 24, 1905, the Committee provided \$3,000 for Convention expenses and \$3,500 for contingencies. In this last named sum was included \$2,500, to enable the Convention to liquidate the outstanding mortgage on the property known as the Bishop's residence in East Orange, as to which a recommendation is made in this report; and there is a further recommendation reducing the assessment for Convention expenses to three (3) per cent. for the current year.

It should also be understood fully that all offerings made and all contributions received from Parishes are to be applied to the funds for which they are contributed, and will be so accounted for by the Treasurer.

The Finance Committee finds much difficulty in differentiating between the importance attaching to the support of one branch of the Diocesan work over another whether measured by the practical standard of discharge of obligation or the much higher ideal of the divine purpose and commission of the Church to men.

Yet it is known, and the fact must be welcomed by all of our Churchmen, that there is a peculiarly responsive sentiment throughout our Diocese toward the work of missions, and in view of the canonical provisions that two collections be taken each year in every Parish for this purpose, and with due regard to the work now carried on by the Board of Missions, the Finance Committee heartily commends the support of our missions to the Convention; and urgently recommends that the apportionment for this purpose for the coming year be fixed at \$6,000, and that it be collected through the channels provided in the Canons.

For all details of the work of this Committee reference may be had by any member of the Convention to the minutes of the Committee, in the hands of its clerk, who is prepared to afford all desired information.

But while this Committee has thus briefly reviewed its work for the past year, it cannot seal the record, and submit it to this Convention, without appealing to the laymen to consider most carefully the individual duty of each to the Diocese.

The financial conduct of the Diocese belongs to the laymen. The work the Committee has done has been laymen's work, wisely influenced by our Bishop, and always subject to the endorsement or revision of the President of the Standing Committee.

No novelty has been introduced into Diocesan affairs. With the wider powers given to the same Finance Committee, which has served the Convention for many years past, the opportunity for wider service has been presented and developed, and the result is before you. But the Finance Committee can do very little in the coming year unless the machinery which has been prepared for the work is supplied with material through the earnest effort of every clergyman and layman in this Convention.

Above all let every Churchman in this Convention and in this Diocese accept his responsibility and go about in his Parish working to procure the means the Diocese requires, and the interest which will promote the giving of these means.

Only along these lines can our Diocese win the position it is entitled to hold in the Church we all love and in the community in which we live. And we appeal to all to endeavor to increase as far as possible the revenues of the Diocese, even beyond the amounts now asked for. Let all give as liberally as possible and not be bound solely by the amounts specified.

The Finance Committee respectfully submits the following recommendations to the Convention:

I. That in order to comply with the requirements of the Canons and meet the financial necessities of the Diocese, the Convention approves the apportionment set forth in the letter from the Finance Committee of February 24, 1905, to each Parish and Mission, as the appropriate amount to be sought to be raised by each congregation for Diocesan requirements for the present financial year from May

1st, 1905, to April 30th, 1906, subject to the revision provided in the eighth paragraph on second page of that letter, in those cases where inequality appears to exist.

II. That the Convention affirms that, in taking action in conformity with the previous recommendation, it in no way is to be construed as compelling any Parish or Mission to do more for the support of the Diocese than is now enforced under the existing Canons, or has been repeatedly enforced by the resolution of this Convention; but that pending a final adjustment of the outstanding parish bonds and the determination of an equitable and stable basis for the support of the Diocese, the Convention expresses its opinion that said apportionment is the nearest to an equitable arrangement for all that can now be presented.

III. That in order to comply with the terms of existing Canons and to follow action taken at previous sessions of this Convention, the schedule of salaries of the clergy, aggregating the sum of \$115,910, adopted by the Convention at its session on June 16, 1903, be the basis of assessment and apportionment for the present year.

IV. That an assessment be made for the current year of seven (7) per cent. on the amount of the present salaries of the clergy, as above established, towards paying the Bishop's salary, upon all Parishes, irrespective of any contributions they may have made or parish bonds they may have given to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund; provided, that the assessment on those Parishes which have made such contributions shall be credited with seven (7) per cent. on the amount thereof, and provided also that Parishes which have given bonds, which have not or shall not during the year consent to the cancelation of the same, may pay the interest determined thereby, instead of the above named assessment.

V. That while recognizing the terms of Section IV of Canon 5, that at least two offerings be made each year for Diocesan Missions, which may or may not meet the requirements of that Board, we avail of the proviso in said Canon that the necessary apportionment may be provided in some other way, to secure the necessary revenues for this purpose; and therefore endorse the method of apportionment heretofore used by that Board, but should it be found that that method is inadequate for current requirements, it is the opinion of this Convention that at least an average of five and one-quarter (54) per cent. be the apportionment made for the current year on

the amount of the present salaries of the clergy as above established, for the uses and purposes of the Board of Missions, provided that during the current year the expenses of the Board do not exceed \$6,000.

VI. That an assessment be made for the current year of three (3) per cent. on the amount of the present salaries of the clergy as above established, for Convention Expenses and to provide for the

obligations of the Convention which are now outstanding.

VII. That the rent received during the current year by the Convention from the lease of the property known as the Bishop's residence in East Orange, be turned over as received, to the Bishop of the Diocese, or his designated representative, to be applied in lieu of rent for his occupation of the residence No. 21 Washington Street, Newark, in such manner and upon such terms as he may arrange with the owners thereof.

VIII. That out of the balance of funds remaining on May 1st, 1905, in the hands of the Treasurer, to the credit of Convention Expenses, a payment of \$1,000 be forthwith made on the mortgage debt of \$2,500, now resting upon the property known as the Bishop's

residence in East Orange.

IX. That the Finance Committee be authorized, at its discretion, to direct the Treasurer of the Convention to transfer any unused balance in his hands, accrued for Convention Expenses, to such fund or funds of the Convention as may require temporary replenishment, and to recover the same as and when circumstances permit, with interest adjustment thereon.

Resolved. That this Convention appreciate the facilities and courtesy extended to the Finance Committee by the Security Savings Bank of Newark, and the thanks of the Convention is extended therefor.

# The Rev'd Lewis Cameron presented the Report, Committee on New Parishes.

The Committee on New Parishes respectfully report that they have received applications for admission into union with the Convention from St. George's Church, Maplewood, and the Church of the Ascension, Jersey City; that they have examined the petitions and articles of incorporation, and have found that all the requirements for the admission of new parishes have been satisfied. They, therefore, respectfully recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the parishes of St. George's Church, Maplewood, and the Church of the Ascension, Jersey City, be admitted into union with the Convention.

The appended resolution having been adopted, the Church of the Ascension, Jersey City, and St. George's Church, Maplewood, were formally admitted into union with the Convention.

The Secretary announced that he had added the new parishes to the List of Parishes, and enrolled the names of their respective Lay Deputies. The names being called, they appeared and took seats in Convention.

The Right Reverend President announced the presence of George Wharton Pepper, Esq., of St. Mark's Church, Philadelphia, Diocese of Pennsylvania; who, on being presented to the House, spoke on the Men's Thank-offering for Missions which is to be made at the 1907 General Convention, in Richmond, Va.

## Report of the Standing Committee.

The Standing Committee respectfully reports that nine meetings have been held during the past Conventional year:

On the 18th of May, 1904, the Committee organized by electing the Rev'd Wm. Welles Holley, D. D., President, and the Rev'd W. R. Jenvey, D. D., Secretary.

On the 12th of September, 1904, Mr. Julius C. H. Sauerbier was recommended to the Bishop as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

The Rev'd Romeo Gould, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests.

Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd Robert Strange, D. D., Coadjutor Bishop-elect for the Diocese of East Carolina.

Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Luke's Free Church, Phillipsburgh, to borrow the sum of \$1,000, and to mortgage a vacant church lot for the same, and the sum of \$3,000 for the purchase of the house and lot used for rectory purposes, and to mortgage them for the same.

On the 31st of October, 1904, Mr. Jacob Arthur Glasier was recommended to the Bishop as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

Mr. Morgan Ashley was recommended to the Bishop as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

The Bishop was advised, that in the judgment of the Standing Committee, it would be unwise to grant the application of St. Mark's Church, Jersey City, to remove St. Matthew's Church, Jersey City, from its present locality, and establish it as a mission or otherwise, on the Heights, on the Boulevard and Lexington Avenue, at this present time.

The application of the Mission Church of the Ascension, Jersey City Heights, to be recognized and received as a Parish was approved, and the Bishop was advised to grant the same.

On the 5th of December, 1904, the President of the Committee was authorized to arrange with the Finance Committee for a joint meeting for the consideration of the financial condition of the Diocese.

Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. John's Church, Passaic, to borrow a sum not to exceed \$1,800 for the purpose of erecting a mission hall in Delawanna, and to mortgage said property for the same.

The Committee sat at the request of the Bishop, in accordance with the terms of the Canon, to advise him in regard to the differences existing in Trinity Church, Paterson. After hearing the evidence, the Committee gave its advice to the Bishop, as required by the Canon.

On the 6th of February, 1905, a joint meeting was held with the Finance Committee to consider the financial conditions of the Diocese. After discussion the Committee approved the plan submitted by the Finance Committee for the bettering of the finances of the Diocese.

Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd Charles E. Woodcock, D. D., Bishop-elect for the Diocese of Kentucky.

On the 6th of March, 1905, the Rev'd Edward Prescott Hooper, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests.

The Rev'd Wallace M. Gordon, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests.

The Rev'd Henry B. Wilson, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests.

Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd James Henry Darlington, D. D., Bishop-elect for the Diocese of Harrisburg.

Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Mark's Church, Orange, to sell a lot 50 ft. x 100 ft., on Columbia

Street, between Alden and Washington Streets, West Orange, for a sum not less than \$500; reserving the right to remove the building or chapel thereon.

Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Mark's Church, Orange, to borrow a sum, not to exceed \$10,000, at 5 per cent., and to mortgage a lot 77 ft. x 190 ft., on Main street, between High and Cleveland Streets, Orange, for the same.

On the 3rd of April, 1905, a petition, signed by every member of the Vestry of St. Matthew's Church, Jersey City, was received, asking for the consolidation of said church with St. Mark's Church, Jersey City. A petition from the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Mark's Church, signed by every member, was received, also asking for the same consolidation.

After consideration of these, consent was given to such consolidation, under such corporate title, and under such terms, as the congregations of each parish should determine.

Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Mark's Church, Jersey City, to sell the present church property of St. Matthew's Church, Jersey City, to the Roman Catholic Church of St. Anthony of Padua, or to the Bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Newark, for a sum not less than \$15,000; the proceeds of such sale to be used in such a way as to perpetuate the name of "St. Matthew's."

On the 11th of April, 1905, permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Grace Church, Greenville, to borrow the sum of \$4,000, at 5 per cent., for the purchase of rectory property, and to mortgage the same for that amount.

The Bishop was advised to give consent to the application of St. George's Mission, Maplewood, to be received and recognized as a parish, to be known as St. George's Parish, Maplewood, N. J.

On the 16th of May, 1905, Mr. Joseph Peck Robinson was recommended to the Bishop as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

Mr. Thomas Alfred Hyde was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Deacons.

Mr. Irving A. McGrew was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Deacons.

The Rev'd Henry Augustus McNulty, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests.

The Rev'd Aubrey H. Derby, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests.

Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Mark's Church, Paterson, to place an additional mortgage of \$3,000 on their church property, making a total of \$15,000, at 5 per cent., and the proper form signed and acknowledged.

The report of the Secretary for the year was read, approved, and ordered read to the Convention.

On motion, the Registrar's recommendation was referred to the Finance Committee, with power.

The Report of the Hospital of St. Barnabas, Newark, was read by the Rev'd Charles C. Edmunds.

By unanimous consent, the Rev'd John S. Miller at this time offered two amendments to Canons, and moved their reference to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

Resolved, That Title I, Canon 5, section V, sub-section [1], be amended so as to read as follows:

"At each Annual Convention there shall be elected one or more Archdeacons, as the Bishop may determine, and in the following manner: After the Bishop shall have placed in nomination, for the office of Archdeacon, the names of three or more clergymen, the Convention shall proceed to elect from the persons so nominated, one or more Archdeacons as the case may be, who, under the direction of the Bishop, shall have supervision of the missions in such district or districts as shall have been alloted to him or them by the Bishop.

Resolved, That Title I, Canon 5, section II, sub-section [1], be amended as follows: Strike out the words "if appointed" in the seventh and eighth lines of said sub-section, and insert in place thereof, the words "if elected," making the clause to read as follows: "And provided further, that one or more Archdeacons if elected as hereinafter provided for, shall be, ex-officio, members of the Board, (if not elected members), with right to speak but not to vote."

The propositions were so referred.

The Report of Christ Hospital, Jersey City, was read by title, and a copy handed to the Secretary.

The Reports of St. Katharine's Home, Jersey City; Widows' Home, Hoboken; and House of the Good Shepherd, Orange; were called for.

The Report of The Arthur Home, Summit, was read by the Rev'd Dr. Mann.

The Rev'd Edwin A. White offered the following amendment to the Diocesan Code of Canons:

Resolved, That Title II be amended by the addition of a new Canon thereto, to be numbered Canon 3, and to read as follows:

## TITLE II, CANON 3.

OF PENALTIES FOR REFUSING TO ABIDE BY THE JUDGMENT OF THE BISHOP IN THE DISSOLUTION OF THE PASTORAL RELATION.

Sec. I. [1]. If any Rector or Minister of a parish refuse to abide by the judgment of the Bishop as given under Canon 37 of the Canons of the General Convention, being the Canon "Of the Dissolution of the Pastoral Relation," within ten days after such judgment

shall have been made known to him, the Bishop may proceed to declare the canonical dissolution of all connection between such Rector, or Minister, and the parish or congregation of which he is in charge, and may suspend such Rector or Minister from the exercise of all ministerial functions until he submit to said judgment.

[2]. And if the Parish shall refuse or neglect to comply on its part with the judgment aforesaid, such refusal or neglect shall disqualify it from representation in the Convention of the Diocese, until it shall have been declared by the Ecclesiastical Authority to have given satisfactory guaranties for the acceptance of and compliance with the judgment aforesaid.

On motion, the above proposition was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons for consideration and report.

The Rev'd Charles C. Edmunds offered the following amendment to the Diocesan Code:

Title I. Canon 4, section I, is hereby amended by striking out the first four lines of said section and inserting in place thereof the following:

"Section I. At every Annual Convention there shall be elected a Finance Committee, consisting of the Bishop, ex-officio, and two clergymen and five laymen, for the following purposes," viz.

The above was also referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

On motion of the Rev'd George S. Bennitt, it was

Resolved, That that portion of the Bishop's Address which relates to a Sunday School Institute, or Commission, being formed by the Convention of the Diocese, be referred to a special committee of three clergymen and two laymen, to consider and report to this Convention, to-morrow, what action, if any, ought to be taken by this Convention.

The President appointed as such Committee: The Rev'd George S. Bennitt, the Rev'd D. Stuart Hamilton, the Rev'd

Romeo Gould, Mr. John B. Van Wagenen and Mr. Francis H. Holmes.

The Rev'd Archibald M. Judd offered the following amendments to the Code:

Title I. Canon 5, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. I. For its missionary work the Diocese shall be divided into two districts, as follows:

First—The part of Hudson County lying west of the Hackensack River, the Counties of Warren, Sussex, Morris and Essex, and the township of Summit; to be known as the "Archdeaconry of Newark."

Second—The part of Hudson County lying east of the Hackensack River, and the Counties of Passaic and Bergen, to be known as the "Archdeaconry of Jersey City."

Sec. II. Each Archdeaconry shall be composed of the clergy resident within its limits, together with three laymen from each Parish, appointed annually by the Rector, or Minister-in-charge, to serve until the sitting of the next Convention, and one lay delegate from each Chapel or Mission station not represented in the Convention, and having fifteen or more regular communicants, to be appointed by the Minister of said Chapel or Mission station from among its laity.

For the purposes of this Canon, clergymen shall be considered to be resident in that Archdeaconry in which their work is located.

At its first regular meeting, and every third year thereafter each Archdeaconry, as constituted above, shall elect a Priest who, with the consent of the Bishop, shall fill the office of Archdeacon, whose duty shall be, in the absence of the Bishop, to preside at all meetings, and to perform the other functions of the office, as hereinafter provided. His term of office shall be for three years from the time of his election, and until his successor is elected. In case the office should become vacant by death or resignation, a special meeting of the Archdeaconry shall be convened by the Bishop, and the vacancy filled as before provided.

Sec. III. (1). The Archdeacons so elected, together with a lay delegate to be chosen by each Archdeaconry, and two clergymen, and

two laymen, elected at each Diocesan Convention, shall constitute the Board of Missions of the Diocese, of which Board, the Bishop shall be ex-officio the head.

(2). The Board of Missions thus constituted, and created, shall have the management of missionary operations, and the ultimate control of all funds raised for the support of missionaries, or the building of mission churches.

It shall elect annually, a Chairman, to preside in the absence of the Bishop; a Treasurer, who shall receive, disburse, and account for all moneys raised in the Archdeaconries, and remitted for work

in the same; and a Secretary.

It shall receive annually from the Archdeaconries, full reports of their work; and with the aid of the said reports, it shall make a full annual report to the Diocesan Convention, giving an account of all the work done, and money raised and expended within the limits of the Diocese. It shall meet as soon as convenient after the adjournment of the Diocesan Convention; at which meeting, after completing its organization, it shall allot the amount to be expended in each Archdeaconry, and shall at once notify the Secretaries of the Archdeaconries of its action; such allotment to be based upon the reports of the previous year. Its fiscal year shall end at the meeting next preceding the Diocesan Convention; said meeting to be not less than five days before such Convention.

Sec. IV. It shall be the duty of the Archdeacon to have oversight of the Missionary work in the Archdeaconry, with the exception of Parochial Chapels. He shall confer with the Bishop as to plans and details, and with the clergy, within the limits of whose parishes missionary work may be proposed, or is being conducted. He shall survey the ground, and propose, as occasion offers, plans of operation, and in case such plans be adopted by the Archdeaconry, awaken, as far as opportunity can be found, an interest therein on the part of the congregations. Each Archdeaconry shall annually present a report of the condition and progress of the missionary work within its limits to the Board of Missions of the Diocese, in time for said Board to make its report to the Convention, as herein provided for. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer of each Archdeaconry to receive contributions from the Parishes, and to forward the same to the Treasurer of the Board of Missions of the Diocese, and to keep, and account for the money of the Archdeacoury, paying out such sums as he shall be duly authorized to pay.

Sec. V. Each Archdeaconry shall, in open meeting, under the advice of the Bishop, and with the consent of the clergy, within the limit of whose Parishes missionary work may be proposed, conduct the missionary work within its own limits; shall have control and distribution of the money allotted to it by the Board of Missions, in aid of Mission stations, and feeble Parishes; shall apportion for collection among its several Parishes and Missions, the sums from time to time suggested by said Board; and may at its discretion, with the approval of the Bishop, undertake special missionary work within its limits, and raise funds for such purposes; provided it shall have complied with the requirements of the Board of Missions of the Diocese.

Sec. VI. Each Archdeaconry shall hold, at least twice annually, stated meetings for the transaction of its business, and no apportionments, or appropriations shall be made, except at those meetings. The time and place of such meetings shall be fixed by the vote or by-laws of each Archdeaconry.

It shall be the duty of each clergyman, unless prevented by grave and reasonable cause, to attend the regular meetings, and to report all missionary work done in his cure. It shall be competent for each Archdeaconry to arrange, by by-laws, or otherwise, such a programme for meetings, as shall in their judgment tend to the profit of the meetings.

Sec. VII. No missionary station shall be established, or missionary appointed, except with the concurrence of the Bishop. The Bishop, together with the Archdeacon, shall have power to remove missionaries for any cause touching their moral character. No appropriation shall be made by any Archdeaconry in aid of any organized Parish, except on application of the Wardens and Vestrymen of said Parish, with the written consent and approval of the Minister-in-charge, if there be one.

Sec. VIII. The necessary expenses of the Archdeacons in the performance of their duties, shall, on order of the Board of Missions of the Diocese, be paid by the Treasurer thereof.

The above propositions were referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Rev'd Charles L. Pardee presented the following Report, Committee on Unfinished Business.

The Committee on Unfinished Business reports as unfinished, action on amendment to Article 2 of the Constitution. This amendment was approved by a majority in the Convention of 1904; to become law it must come up for final action at this Convention.

CHARLES I. PARDER, AUGUSTINE ELMENDORS, W. FELLOWES MORGAN, Committee.

The Rev'd Charles C. Edmunds, for the Committee on the Propriety of holding the Business Sessions in a Hall, reported progress, and asked that the Committee be continued.

On motion, the Committee was continued.

At 5:00 o'clock P. M. the Convention adjourned on motion, to meet Wednesday, at 9:30 A. M.

# JOURNAL, 2ND DAY

GRACE CHURCH, ORANGE, N. J.,

17 May, 1905.

Morning Prayer and Litany were read at half-past nine o'clock by the Rt. Rev'd the Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by the Rev'd Dr. Mann and the Rev'd Samuel A. Weikert.

The President took the chair at ten o'clock, and called the Convention to order.

The Minutes of the first day's proceedings were read and approved.

Rising to a question of privilege, the Rev'd Samuel A. Weikert withdrew his name from the list of nominations for Standing Committee.

The Convention proceeded to the elections; Tellers were appointed: Clerical vote—the Rev'd Leonard W. S. Stryker, the Rev'd George M. Dorwart, Mr. John Farr. Lay vote—the Rev'd Louis B. Howell, Mr. Philip H. Patriarche, Mr. E. A. S. Brown.

When the ballots of the Clerical and Lay voters had been deposited, the polls were declared closed.

The Tellers retired to count the votes.

The Archdeacon of Jersey City read his Report. (See Appendix to Episcopal Address.)

The Archdeacon of Newark read his Report. (See Appendix to Episcopal Address.)

On motion, the recommendations were referred to the Board of Missions.

On motion of the Rev'd George S. Bennitt, the Clergy approved the choice of the Lay members of the Standing Committee; on motion of Mr. William R. Howe, the Laity approved the choice of the Clerical members of the same body; the Chair declared the election of the Standing Committee, and other officers, complete.

The Rev'd George S. Bennitt presented the following Report of the Board of Missions.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The Board of Missions respectfully reports that it has held ten meetings during the past year, and that it has aided or maintained mission work at the following places: In the Archdeaconry of Newark—St. Paul's, Butler; Zion, Belvidere; St. James', Hackettstown; Good Shepherd, Hamburgh; St. Thomas', Vernon; St. Luke's, Phillipsburgh; St. Peter's, Washington; Christ, Stanhope; St. Mark's, Mendham; Trinity, Arlington; Christ Church, Pompton; St. Phillip's Church, Newark; St. Paul's, Chatham.

In the Archdeaconry of Jersey City—St. Matthew's, Jersey City; Good Shepherd, Fort Lee; Epiphany, Allendale; St. Mary's, Ridge-field Park; St. Peter's, Clifton; The Annunciation, Oradell; All Saints', Leonia; St. Stephen's, Coytesville; Trinity, Grantwood; and Woodcliffe.

The reports of the Archdeacons contain an account in detail of the work which has been done at these places. The duties of the Board are most closely connected with questions of financial support, and owing to the promptness with which the parishes have met their apportionments, there has been no difficulty in meeting the obligations incurred by the grants. But the opportunities for work which grow with the increasing number of settlements in the suburbs of the cities and in the vicinity of the Palisades, present new problems. Such opportunities ought not to be lost; yet, the Board has not sufficient funds to meet additional obligations. Two methods of increasing its resources are evident-by a reduction of the grants to existing stations, and by an increase in the amount of the general appropriation. The first method has already been adopted and several missions have promised to relinquish a part of their stipends. The Board now asks the help of the Convention in making the other method effective, and with its grateful thanks to the Clergy and Laity for their help in the past, respectfully offers the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Convention authorize the Board of Missions to appropriate the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00), for its work during the coming year.

Resolved, That the plan of apportionment be that adopted by the Finance Committee.

# Report, Committee on Apportionment Plan.

The Committee on the Apportionment Plan for General Missions would respectfully report that the General Board of Missions asked from this Diocese the sum of \$22,900.00 for the year ending September 1, 1904. There was received from Parishes and individuals, \$8,251.77, being an increase of \$1,246.00 over the previous year. The total number of Parishes and Missions in the Diocese was 103. Of these, 70 gave towards their apportionment, which was an increase of 25 over the previous year. This increase of 25 Parishes giving, and of \$1,246.00 over the previous year, is encouraging at all events, and shows that the interest is surely deepening, and we look for a still further increase this year when the reports are all in. We may be reminded, however, that we gave only a little over one-third of what was asked from this Diocese. Surely we are not satisfied with such a result. Let us then make, this year, a greater effort than before to reach nearer to what is considered as our portion to bear in the general missionary work of the Church.

So Article 2 of the Constitution of the Church in the Diocese of Newark now reads as follows:

There shall be a Convention of the Church in this Diocese on the third Tuesday in May in each year, or on such other day in May as may be specially appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority; provided, one month's notice shall be given of such special day appointed; and provided further, that the Convention shall not meet in Rogation or Ember Week. The Convention shall be held where the Ecclesiastical Authority appoints.

On motion of the Rev'd D. Stuart Hamilton, it was

Resolved, That the thanks of the Convention are hereby tendered to the authorities of Grace Church, Orange, for generous accommodations furnished, and especially to the ladies of the Parish for their courteous attention to the members of the Convention.

Mr. Charles Elkin offered the following preamble and resolutions:

WHEREAS, It behooves every representative to the Diocesan Convention to reach a fair understanding concerning all the various questions which touch or involve the welfare of the Diocese,

AND WHEREAS, The limited time during which the Convention is in session does not afford sufficient opportunity, first for the presentation, and subsequently for that thorough consideration necessary to a full comprehension of the many questions at issue,

AND WHEREAS, It is important both as concerns justice to individual representatives, and the good of the Diocese in general, that all the clergy and the lay delegates to the Convention should have full opportunity not only for the careful perusal of all such questions, but should also have time and opportunity to seek through the proper channels, by correspondence, or otherwise, any particulars or information necessary to more complete elucidation; now, therefore be it

Resolved, That hereafter the annual reports, complete with suggestions and recommendations, of each and every committee or official of the Convention, and of each and every institution (usually making an annual report to the Convention) be prepared so that they may be in the hands of the clergy and of the lay delegates to Convention not more than thirty days and not less than fifteen days prior to the opening of the Convention next ensuing; and be it further

Resolved, That all such reports shall be prepared in form and distributed in manner determined by the Bishop; and be it further

Resolved, That all such reports shall be received by the clergy and lay delegates to the Convention alike in strict confidence, not for publication or outside discussion in any way whatsoever, except as may be determined afterwards by the Convention.

On motion of Mr. John R. Emery, the following was adopted as a substitute for the foregoing resolutions:

Resolved, That the Bishop be requested to confer with the several officers and committees of this body with a view to carrying out the intention of the resolutions proposed, and to propose a definite plan to the next Convention

The Rev'd Charles C. Edmunds offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Convention tender their hearty thanks to the Rector of Grace Church, Orange, for his courteous hospitality, and express their high appreciation of his services to the Diocese in the past, their profound regret for his approaching departure to a new field of work, and their best wishes for his future.

It was unanimously adopted by rising vote.

An invitation to the annual meeting of the State Board of Charities, to be held at Trenton, on February 15 and 16, 1906, was extended to the members of Convention by Mr. Richard Stevens.

On motion, the invitation was accepted with the thanks of the Convention.

On motion of the Rev'd Dr. Jenvey, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Convention be, and hereby is authorized to prepare and have printed in sufficient quantities all such blanks as are needed by the Diocese, and that the Treasurer of the Convention be authorized to pay for the same out of such funds as he may have at his control.

The Rt. Rev'd the Bishop presented the Rev'd Joseph H. Smith, Senior Presbyter of the Diocese, to the House; the venerable member made a brief address.

On motion of Mr. Edwin A. Stevens, it was

Resolved, That the Finance Committee be authorized to make the usual payment to the Sexton of Grace Church, Orange.

The President appointed Mr. Philip H. Patriarche on the Committee on Rules of Order vice Mr. Arthur E. Barlow, transferred to the Sunday School Commission; the members of the Finance Committee were re-appointed.

On motion of the Rev'd Frederick B. Carter, it was Resolved, That the number of copies of the Journal be referred to the Finance Committee with authority to pay for the printing of the same.

The Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons requested that amendments be sent in at least two days before the next Convention.

# The Episcopal Address

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

Meeting again in our Annual Convention we call first to mind those who have been associated with us as officers in the Church and Diocese and Parishes departed this life, not unmindful of the greater company of our brethren who have passed into the rest of Paradise. We think of the Bishops of the Church as belonging to us, whatever their Diocese may be, and we recall the deaths within the year of:

The Right Reverend Frederick Dan Huntington, D. D., first Bishop of Central New York;

The Right Reverend William E. McLaren, D. D., Bishop of Chicago;

The Right Reverend Alfred A. Watson, D. D., Bishop of East Carolina.

From among our own number in the Diocese of Newark, death has taken:

The Rev'd George H. Walsh, D. D., deceased, June 18, 1904.

The Rev'd Cyrus B. Durand, deceased, August 14, 1904. The Rev'd Sylvester D. Boorom, deceased, September 20, 1904.

The Rev'd William T. Webbe, D. D., deceased, December 14, 1904.

Parishes mourn the loss of many men who have, in official place, served well the Church. These names come to mind: Mr. Philip H. Albertson, for more than fifty years a Vestryman of St. James', Delaware, and for twelve years, Senior Warden; Mr. Edward Butler, Warden of St. Paul's, Jersey City; Mr. Robert Weir, of St. Luke's, Montclair; Mr. Sylvester S. Battin, of Trinity Church, Newark; Mr. Julius A. Boylan, of Grace Church, Orange; Mr. Charles A. Lighthipe,

Warden of St. Mark's, West Orange; Mr. William Boardman, Warden of Zion Church, Belvidere. There are many others no less faithful. I name two women who were closely associated with good works in the Diocese and are greatly missed: Mrs. William M. Hughes, of Morristown, and Mrs. Mary H. Benson, of Millington.\*

One of the most important parts of the work of this Convention will be the consideration of the report of the Finance Committee and action thereon. The Diocese owes to the members of the Finance Committee and to the Treasurer a debt of gratitude which few appreciate, for the time and labour given this last year to the endeavour to order the finances wisely. All men who have considered the subject feel the necessity of retiring the Parish bonds which were given in order to form the Diocese. Changes in the conditions of parishes have made the payment of interest on bonds, of the amount of rectors' salaries more than a quarter of a century ago, an unreasonable way of support-Parishes which have paid money should ing the Bishop. be allowed credit on the same at the rate which trust funds safely earn, but the parish bonds should be retired and an apportionment to the parishes of the amount needed, according to their ability, be made. Then an effort should be made to increase the Episcopal Fund, which now amounts to \$18,500, so that the Parishes may be apportioned less each year, and have more freedom for the development of their own work.

The Finance Committee will present their estimates of amounts needed to meet all Diocesan obligations for the

coming year, and I hope they will be authorized to apportion the same under the Canons, as equitably as possible, among the Parishes and Missions. These obligations fall into three parts: the Diocesan Missions; the salary of the Bishop. which properly includes certain expenses of administration; and Convention and contingent expenses. Misunderstanding will be removed, and unity maintained, if every Parish is informed what amount is needed for each object, and if the three accounts are kept separately, and the expenditure of each fund is left in the Board, duly appointed for that purpose by the Convention. The parishes will contribute their apportionments in their own way as heretofore, whether by offerings or appropriations from the treasury. Canon providing for the appointment of two days in the year for offerings for Diocesan Missions would remain unchanged.

It would be well if early in the year every Parish were informed what its portion of the Diocesan obligations in the three forms is thought to be, with the request that payments be not delayed to the end of the year. When the first of March last was reached, five-sixths of the conventional year had passed and hardly one-third of the amounts needed for the Diocesan obligations had been received. The parishes were waiting to use Easter to meet their obligations. This is not good for the churches. It is using Easter as some tradesmen use Christmas, to bring out accounts on the right side. The Easter offerings ought not to be required to meet deficiencies, to pay current debts, but to be thank offerings for aggressive work, to set forward new plans which express new life and activity.

It is my hope that the effort to bring order into Diocesan affairs may be duplicated in every parish. The officers of every Parish ought, at the beginning of every year, to make out careful estimates of receipts and expenditures, and to

take measures to keep the business affairs well ordered. In many parishes lack of method is responsible for bad conditions, rather than lack of means. The Church cannot command respect where some current parochial business methods prevail. Let me plead with the laymen who hear me to go back to their parishes and plead for good business methods which will not trust to Easter offerings to make up for a year's slackness and neglect.

The clergy ought not to bear the burden of parochial finance, but few parishes thrive where the clergy are not watchful and interested. Instead of carrying this burden with anxiety through the year, spending much time in appeals, devising schemes to pay expenses and meet obligations, let them take the officers of the Church and other laymen into their confidence at the beginning of the year and see if measures cannot be taken to make receipts, month by month, equal to necessary expenditures. Dependence upon the Easter offerings to pay the accumulated debts of the year has become a great abuse. I am sure that the laity will respond generously to wise leadership in the effort to bring good business methods into Diocesan and Parochial administration.

Let me ask the laymen to have generous thought for the support of the clergy. No minister of the Church ought to live other than modestly and simply, whatever his means may be. He accepts such an ordering of life in entering the ministry. But the clergy must be above anxiety as regards their living and the support of those dependent upon them, if they are to do good work. It is the duty of the clergy, turning from the search for wealth or material success, to give themselves, by the complete consecration of all their powers, to the service of the Church. It is the duty of the people to see that they are properly supported, so that without anxiety they can give themselves to their work.

A rector's salary ought to represent fairly the ability of his people, and parishes with many prosperous parishioners ought not to be poor. As the cost of living increases, let the officers of the parishes ask what it means in the homes of the clergy. The salaries of the clergy of the Episcopal Church average small, and it is creditable to the Church that so many of her sons, in love for their work, accept them without complaint.

More clergymen ought to be at work in our large parishes and men in Holy Orders are needed in charge of our mission work, if it is to be developed. I think I can name a score of places where another priest or deacon could find all the work that a man could do. It would develop our resources, and bring back large part of the increased expenditure, and it would greatly extend the ministry of the Church. For Church growth, the best use of money is in the support of trained men and women. In some churches services and instructions ought to be increased in number. The small use of churches and groups of church buildings is in many communities a reproach, and more men are needed in reaching out and finding and ministering to the overlooked people. The new conditions of living, with all their changes. make a larger staff of clergy in a city or town parish necessarv.

I welcome the suggestion of a larger appropriation for Diocesan Missions during the coming year. The Board has met of late each month, and through committees has endeavoured to have closer knowledge of the work. There are very hopeful fields for the Church to occupy and a hearty welcome of her services. The Board of Missions will spend whatever money is given them with wisdom and care. The Archdeacons' reports will show progress in many places. The departure of Archdeacon Mann will take from us a faithful servant of the Diocese in its mission work. He has

given of his time and labour without grudging and has been the good friend of many an undertaking to set forward the Church. We let him go to his great opportunity for service with regret, but with the good wishes of a Diocese, which will not forget him.

With the subject of Church extension in mind, let me ask my brethren of the clergy, who must be leaders in this work, to be watchful for opportunities for new work, to be generous and large-minded in occupying new places, to be willing to part with a few parishioners here and there to make the useful parish of the future. We do not want to make feeble parishes, but we must make ventures of faith by putting Sunday Schools and Mission services where there is hope of support or of future growth. Many opportunities to establish the Church have been lost. Let us lose no more.

One of the older members of this Convention, after looking over a rapidly growing community, with Church extension in mind, asked me if ever I knew of a place, where there were many people, in which an Espicopal Church conducted with zeal, discretion, and faithful work, had failed. I could not remember one.

The population of the Diocese is increasing rapidly, and it is a time to lay foundations wisely. To some places we must go because they want the Church and ask us to come. To other places we must go because they need the Church, although without special desire for her coming. It is a great field in which to work, with a multitude of right-minded, generous men and women, and great resources, spiritual and material, to be developed and used for Christ and His Church. And the Church-people of the Diocese of Newark wish to march, not to "mark time." Brethren of the clergy, we must give them strong leadership and plan large things.

On the subject of Diocesan support let this be said: The

determination of the fairest basis of the apportionment to parishes of their parts of Diocesan obligations is most difficult. My own experience and study have led me to think current expenses, rather than the salaries of the clergy, the best basis on the whole. But then there must be a fair understanding of what should be counted as current expenses and what should be excluded. We shall have to go so far back as to ask for uniformity in the ways in which parochial treasurers make up their accounts. I do not think the discussion of a change of Canons on the subject wise at this time. It is my purpose to advise with the Standing Committee and Finance Committee before another parochial report is required, to consider whether what parishes spend upon themselves can be determined and made to measure, in a proper way, their ability.

It is impossible to determine what shall seem to all just. The changing circumstances of parishes must also be considered. The strong must of their own free-will take the larger part of the support of the Diocese, while all the missions are asked to do what they can. I think the time will come, if we are patient and wise, when the parishes will cheerfully accept Diocesan obligations and provide what an economical administration requires.

Eight of our clergy have been transferred and four have died. Ten have been received and four persons have been ordained. There are now canonically connected with the Diocese: one Bishop, one hundred and thirteen priests, and six deacons. Some twelve or fifteen other clergy are living and working in the Diocese.

There have been four ordinations to the Priesthood and

five to the Diaconate.

Thirty-seven Lay Readers have been licensed.

Three churches have been consecrated: St. Peter's, Essex Fells, June 26, 1904; Holy Cross, Jersey City, September 14, 1904; Calvary, Summit, October 29, 1904.

The corner-stone of St. Mark's, Paterson, was laid September 17, 1904, and it was opened for service May 8, 1905. Christ Church, Pompton, was opened for service September 20, 1004.

Ordinations leave our list of candidates for Priests' Orders. ten: for Deacons' Orders, one; Postulants, six.

Sixteen hundred and eighty-five persons were confirmed

in the year ending April 30th.

The chief facts about the life of the Diocese cannot be presented in tables of statistics, nor indeed in any way. We can sum up our offerings, and we can count our communicants, but we cannot as definitely express the religious condition of our parishes. Sometimes when material prosperity is greatest, the spiritual condition is least satisfactory.

The reports from many parishes of well attended Lenten services, of large communions at Easter, of good numbers confirmed, are encouraging, and signs of spiritual health. Generous offerings at Easter have put treasuries in good condition, have paid some debts, have set forward good

undertakings of many kinds.

It is pleasant to hear of new churches, as at Ramsey, where a memorial church is given our Mission by Mr. George Crocker, or at Millington, where it is hoped a little country church will stand this summer. It is of interest to all of us that it is proposed to build the tower of St. Peter's. Morristown. The building of a mission hall, which can be used for Church services, at Delawanna, shows what may be wisely done in many communities.

The new St. Mark's Church, Paterson, is a noteworthy church building added to our number of churches this year. It is a beautiful church and the people of St. Mark's are worthy of all praise for what they have done. Improvement of Church properties is to be recorded as planned or accomplished at St. Stephen's and St. Andrew's, Newark: and St. Stephen's, Coytesville. St. Paul's, Chatham, has been fitted for Church services at considerable cost, provided for

by the people themselves and good neighbours.

New rectories are being built or planned at Christ Church, Bloomfield, and St. Alban's, Newark. A most generous subscription by parishioners and friends, of some \$9,000, will relieve St. James' Church, Newark, from a burdensome debt, and provide a much needed rectory.

Rectories have been purchased at St. Luke's, Phillipsburgh, and Grace Church, (Greenville), Jersey City, which

will greatly strengthen these parishes.

The new church and rectory at Pompton had been hardly opened when, on Christmas Day, they were destroyed by fire. The insurance companies have been very fair in the settlement of the claims for loss, and the money received will restore the buildings. St. Agnes' Chapel, Little Falls, was partly destroyed by fire in January, but the insurance will restore the church. I wish that I might know that every church and rectory in the Diocese is as amply protected by insurance as were those at Pompton and Little Falls.

The Church of the Ascension, Jersey City, and St. George's, Maplewood, have come to self-support, and ask for full recognition as parishes in this Convention. They are notable examples of what zeal and devotion will accomplish. Let the faithful and loving care of St. George's, Maplewood, by the Rev'd Henry K. Bicker for ten years, be remembered today.

Memorial gifts which should be recorded have been made or promised at St. Paul's and the House of Prayer, Newark; St. Mark's, Paterson; Christ Church, Ridgewood; Ascension Chapel, Bloomfield.

The first new work in which I became interested on coming to the Diocese, St. Agnes' Chapel, Hyde Park, East

Orange, has found shelter and gives good promise of usefulness. You will hear from the Archdeacons of services begun in a simple way at Woodcliffe and Westwood and Ramsey. I record with satisfaction new work begun by Holy Cross Church, Jersey City, and the purpose of St. John's, Jersey City, to extend its work, as also the holding of services at Vailsburgh by Rev'd Mr. Cameron and Rev'd Mr. Pardee.

There are many places where beginnings should be made. It is good for a parish to have a mission, where services and Sunday School are held, where a company of people far from the parish church are to be reached. It is like having a child in the family to draw out interest and affection. But let parishes remember that as a man needs for his own good, after youth, to go out and take care of himself, so it is with parochial missions. They need to be allowed freedom and independence, and to be encouraged to take it, if they are to have vigorous life.

With regret one sees the name of St. Matthew's, mother parish of Jersey City, pass from the roll of our churches. The changes of population left the church where its ministry was no longer to be largely exercised, and the agreement made by the Standing Committee, some three years ago, was faithfully observed. A favorable opportunity to sell the church for \$15,000, to be still used for religious worship, was taken. The union of St. Matthew's and St. Mark's has been made and the work of the Church in that part of Jersey City will be well cared for by Grace Church and St. Mark's.

But let the fate of St. Matthew's teach a lesson. In the days of its prosperity the provision of an endowment of \$100,000 had not been difficult, if clergy and laymen had been foreseeing and interested. So endowed, St. Matthew's would, by new methods under the new conditions of life,

have had a large and continuing ministry. Let clergy and laymen in parishes which are being left in the crowded parts of our cities, with the old parishioners moving away, prepare for the future by building up endowment funds. Let not the churches be moved away, but let them be endowed, and left where they are needed, with a staff of trained men and women to fight out the battle for the Church. Many persons could put their parish church or the Diocese among their beneficiaries in the disposition of their property, without harm to those dependent upon them, and so strengthen the Church to face the future. Let men and women provide for the endowment of their parish churches before they move away from them!

Our Church hospitals of St. Barnabas, at Newark, and Christ Hospital, at Jersey City, are institutions in which we can have an honest pride, and for which we must feel a responsibility. If the question were open today as to whether we would establish Church Hospitals, we would hesitate, because we have so many claims upon us, and because of the possibility of providing for the sick and wounded by general institutions. But these Hospitals led the way in this gracious work, and in the character of their work, they lead the way still. The story of our hospitals is one of the most honorable parts of our Diocesan history, one of the ways in which this Church has kept close to the Master, who said: "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto me."

Christ Hospital has gone on steadily, decreasing its debt yearly, increasing its endowment by wisely saving bequests until it amounts to about \$75,000, improving its position, enlarging its work. There has not been such division of interest in hospitals in Hudson County as in Newark.

St. Barnabas's has had some hard experiences, but the year past has been a good year. Much has been gained in the equipment and ordering of the Hospital. A bequest of \$20,000 (beside other small bequests) from the estate of the late Henry Congar has been received and saved. The funds of the Hospital are now \$65,000, with liabilities, not increased this year, of \$27,000, in a mortgage debt, and \$11,000 in notes. If only we can keep the interest and zeal of our friends for a few years, we feel that we can reach the time when there will be less anxiety and pressure, although a hospital is not likely to reach the time when appeals for its support need not be made. This year has doubtless put us in a better position to present our case to the people and to ask their aid.

A new building for administration, for the Sisters and Nurses, has become necessary, and two-thirds of the (possibly) \$22,000 needed, have been paid or subscribed. It is hoped that this building may be built in the coming year. It will stand in its place, when built, as the result of the labour of Dr. Archibald Mercer.

The expectation of having this greatly needed building has made a change in the Memorial of Bishop Starkey in connection with St. Barnabas. Provision will probably be made for a suitable mortuary chapel without the erection of a separate building. The memorial will take the form of the endowment of a room or bed in the hospital or be connected with the new building, as the Guild of St. Barnabas may determine. I commend the memorial under the new form to the men and women confirmed by Bishop Starkey, and I am desirous that it should be worthy of him and of the Diocese.

Not much time shall be taken in commending to you the general missionary work of the Church, for you all know how strongly I feel upon the subject. It was a disappointment to me last year that our missionary offerings were not larger. Upon the apportionment asked, parishes and in-

dividuals gave \$8,252, an increase of \$1,246 from the preceding year. The Woman's Auxiliary gave \$1,318, and the Sunday Schools, \$3,546, making \$13,116, which could be applied on the appropriations. Special offerings of \$4,116 were also reported and they were but a part of special offerings sent directly from the Diocese.

No good comes from comparisons or reproachful words. I have the feeling that the blessing of the Church is measured, and the vigor of her life tested, by interest in mission work. I shall be glad if parishes and individuals before the current year closes, September 1st, make further offerings for the work of the Board of Missions, that our record may be a better one. Let me ask my brethren not to allow special objects to displace the regular work of the Church undertaken by her official representatives.

By the action of the General Convention the plan for a missionary thank offering of the men of the Church at the next meeting of the Convention, in Richmond, in 1907, has been presented to the Church. Through a committee appointed by the Board of Missions the subject is brought before us more definitely still. I have appointed a committee, consisting of the Deputies and Alternates elected to the last General Convention, and other clergymen and laymen, to have charge of this work. The Committee have organized with the Bishop as Chairman; Rev'd George S. Bennitt, Vice-chairman; Rev'd Edwin A. White, Secretary; Mr. Decatur M. Sawyer, Treasurer. The clergy have been asked to appoint in every congregation one person as Parochial Secretary and Treasurer, and they are asked also to appoint a Parochial Committee of two or more men, and to make "a muster roll," as it has been called, of the men of the Church, that the subject may be presented to them personally.

If the clergy are unwilling to give such lists of men to

the Diocesan Committee, they will, I hope, be willing to make such list for the use of their own Parochial Secretary and Treasurer and Committee, so that communications from the General and Diocesan Committees may go to every Churchman in the Diocese. It is not intended to press this thank offering so as to displace or overshadow regular missionary offerings, or other offerings, but to bring the Diocese into line with the other Dioceses in a common undertaking for the Glory of God. Once a year I would like to have the subject presented, in the next three years, to the men of the Church, with an opportunity made for them to give as they may feel able. Then, in 1907, the men whom the Diocese sends to the Convention at Richmond shall take the offering which we make.

It is a good way in which to express our gratitude for our inheritance and blessings in this mother Church of men of English speech. The commemoration of the founding of the first permanent settlement at Jamestown ought to be made the occasion for the special remembrance of the past, which men of the mother Church of England, and of this Church, have had in the settlement of the Country, the formation of the Government, and the shaping of the national life. Her own sons have little knowledge of what Churchmen have done and the time is favorable for recalling the honourable story. There is an honest Church pride which is worthy of respect and which makes not for narrowness and exclusiveness, but for good citizenship and and good religion.

I wish that on the fifth Sunday after Easter, Rogation Sunday, with its memories, as the homily for Rogation Sunday recalls them, of the tracing of ancient landmarks, the clergy would begin to remind their people of the place of this Church in our national life. We know not the story of our own Church, and we have not the pride in it which

becomes us. And now as the commemoration of the completion of three centuries of Anglo-American civilization comes, let us keep it with wise words in the remembrance of our worthies, and let us keep it also with the gathering of a thank offering to express our gratitude for our own inheritance, and to extend our blessings to others.

Five Sunday School Conferences have been held in the Diocese during the year, with the purpose of emphasizing the importance of the religious instruction of the young and of imparting information concerning good methods of teaching and organization. This Church ought, by her traditions and system of Christian nature, to have very large place in the religious training of the children. We ought to apply the old ideas under the new conditions of life, making our instruction orderly and substantial and definite. It is work in which the service of laymen and Christian women must be used, but the clergy ought to have deepest interest in it, and feel that no part of their work is more important. The strategic point in Church work is in the training of the children.

The Church is showing an appreciation of that fact, as indicated by the appointment by the General Convention of a Commission to study the subject and to report the results. In about forty of the Dioceses there are Sunday School Commissions or Institutes which are bringing officers and teachers of the Sunday Schools together with profit. This is work in which one can learn from the experience of another. Much can be done to magnify the office of the teacher and give it its proper dignity. It would please me if at this time, with the approval of this Convention, a Sunday School Commission might be appointed, to be in communication with the Commission appointed by the general Convention and of service to it, and with power to hold Conferences and make our people feel

the great importance of the definite instruction of the chil-

dren in sacred things.

Our Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, while not over large (about \$42,000), is one of the best of our Diocesan Funds. My own feeling is that the Diocese should, out of its own Fund, assist the clergy of the Diocese who have grown old or have become disabled in the service of the Church. But there is no Widows' Fund yielding an appreciable income, and as the need of appropriations from that Fund has appeared, the parishes must be asked for offerings which will put a few hundreds of dollars each year at the disposal of the Trustees.

Of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary, let me speak with the greatest respect and appreciation. I make bold to take upon my lips the words of St. Paul, and changing the tense of the verb, say to my brethren of the clergy, "Help these women, for they labour with me in the Gospel." My commendation of the women of the Diocese extends to the Girls' Friendly Society and the Daughters of the King. In the work of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew I have the greatest interest. I learn constantly also of the usefulness of parochial guilds and societies of many kinds.

I cannot present from the Committee on Arthur Home a report which may guide the Convention in action in reference to the Home, and I ask for the continuance of the Committee. The Diocese assumed responsibility for the Home, but it is difficult to induce parishes to make offerings for it. I think the proper course will be determined in due time, and meanwhile I will ask parishes and individuals to make

offerings for the Home.

St. Katherine's Home continues to do its gracious work as a true home, and every one who knows the conditions of life among us, must feel the blessedness of the work. The death of Mrs. Hughes has been a great loss to the Home, but the benediction of her life is upon it still for good.

It is difficult for me to find words in which to express my gratitude to the men who have made it possible for me to have my home in the center of Newark, the place, as I believe, most favorable for the doing of my work and most convenient for the people to find me. Only the most generous spirit would have led men to assume the large financial responsibility which the purchase of the house made necessary. Much thought has led me to conclude that I am living where I can do my work best, and the feeling grc ws stronger as the months go by. With the expression of my sense of gratitude to the Churchmen who bought the house, I would like in this place to thank also Mr. John F. Shanley, of Newark, whose generous act made it possible for this house to become my home.

A Diocesan House, or at least suitable rooms, in Newark for our archives and libraries and the use of Diocesan committees, should some day be part of the equipment of the Church. I should like it to be in the minds of our Church people. I do not think I am warranted in pressing it when so many forms of our Church work make imperative demands for generous gifts.

Last year I spoke of a Diocesan Paper, such as that published in Massachusetts, as likely to be of service in the Diocese in giving information concerning Diocesan work, in preserving our Church history, in stimulating Church life and making more of common interest and unity among us. My investigation led me to think it necessary to command more capital than I could properly ask for to assure its success. So I have not pressed the project, but my belief in the usefulness of a Diocesan Paper, of a high order, is unchanged.

I wish that I might say something to make the clergy and people think more of reverent and hearty common worship. It has been a glory and strength of this Church, and while

other Christian people about us are trying to cultivate it, we are not maintaining it as becomes us. Worshipping, not listening congregations, are needed in our churches. The people need more instruction concerning the history and contents of the Book of Common Prayer, and more exhortations concerning its use. When feeble and listless responses come back from our congregations, it is a sign of lost power, and of lack of appreciation of their inheritance. Devout people will be drawn to churches where reverence and devotional feeling mark the services. We sacrifice a great source of power in the loss of spirited common worship.

As we turn now to the transaction of the business of the Convention, let the one ruling purpose in every mind and heart be, to do that which is best for the Church, personal feeling and wishes subordinated to the one great end for which we are met together. So we may believe that the

Holy Spirit will guide us in all our deliberations.

# Reports of the Archdeacons

## THE ARCHDEACONRY OF JERSEY CITY.

My Dear Bishop:

I am thankful to report that the missions in this Archdeaconry are making, in the main, substantial and encouraging progress.

The Mission Church of the Ascension, Jersey City, under the wise and energetic leadership of the Rev'd D. M. Genns, has reached that condition which is the end and aim of all work in a mission. It has become entirely self-supporting; it has been received and recognized as a parish; it is now asking to be received into union with the Convention of the Diocese; this will be my last report of it as a mission. During the year now ending there have been 39 baptisms; 18 have been confirmed; there are 265 communicants; there are 325 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$4,496. All praise to the priest and people.

Trinity Mission, Bayonne, has met with two serious losses. The Curate in charge resigned on the 1st of January, and the Rector on the 1st of March. The work, however, has gone steadily and successfully on under the leadership of Mr. Chas. K. Hitchcock, Warden of the Parish. There have been 21 baptisms; 9 were confirmed; there are 159 communicants; there are 180 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$1,850. The mother church gave \$1,200 of

this.

It is with the deepest regret I report a cessation of work in St. Matthew's Church, Jersey City, the mother church organization in this portion of the Diocese. It was useless to continue work in that locality any longer. A foreign population had driven the Church population away. The authorities of the Roman Catholic Church offered \$15,000 for the property, this was accepted, and the property sold. During the year there were 15 baptisms; 8 were confirmed; there were 120 communicants; there were 60 in the Sunday School; the offerings were \$788.

St. Agnes' Chapel, Jersey City, has had one of the best years of its existence. The attendance has almost doubled in the past six months. There have been 16 haptisms; 16 were confirmed; there are 90 communicants; 100 are in the Sunday School; the offerings have

been \$550.

The conditions at St. Thomas', Lyndhurst, are as they have been for the past few years. All things are ready for a growth in population, which is certainly coming, but which is delayed. There are 8 communicants; there are 33 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$133.

Epiphany Mission, Allendale, has shown that it has real strength. A Mission has been started at Ramsey, but a short distance away. This caused somewhat of a loss in membership, yet the loss has been made good. Ten have been baptized; a class is awaiting the coming of the Bishop for confirmation; there are 78 communicants; there are 70 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$1,601.

St. John's Mission, Ramsey, was started less than a year ago. Its success has been remarkable. A lot has been purchased at a cost of \$500; subscriptions amounting to \$605 have been secured for a parish house; and \$10,000 has been given by Mr. George Crocker for the building of a church as a memorial to his wife. There have been 2 baptisms; there are 33 communicants; there are 55 in the Sunday School; the cash offerings have been \$631.

The Mission of the Annunciation, Oradell, is doing well. It has been a year of strengthening the stakes which had already been driven. I have been able to raise \$525 for the extinguishment of a troublesome floating debt, and to make the Mission a present of it. There have been 4 baptisms; 11 have been confirmed; there are 51 communicants; there are 55 in the Sunday School; the offerings are \$1,828.

St. Paul's, Montvale, is doing all that can be expected of it under existing conditions. The population is growing out to it, all will reach it in due season. There have been 6 baptisms; 4 have been confirmed; there are 35 communicants; the offerings have been \$300.

The same is true of Holy Trinity Mission, Hillsdale. The removal of the R. R. shops gave it a blow it has not yet recovered from. It will recover however. We have excellent property there.

St. John's, Nordhoff, is doing well notwithstanding the resignation of the Rev'd Mr. Flichtner, the Rector, and the continued vacancy in the parish. There have been 6 baptisms; 4 have been confirmed; there are 38 communicants; there are 54 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$138.

All Saints', Leonia, is pressing steadily on. The year has been a year of quiet, healthy work, which will ultimately tell. There have been 7 baptisms; 9 have been confirmed; there are 79 commu-

nicants; there are 63 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$104.

The work at St. Stephen's Mission, Coytesville, has gone faithfully on. The severe winter of two years ago caused the frost line to go deeper than the builders counted on when the foundations of the building were laid. When the spring came the building sank to a dangerous degree. It is necessary to relay the foundation; while this is being done, excavation will be made for a larger basement room, and a furnace will be placed; the cost will be \$800. I have raised \$600 towards this; the Mission will raise the remaining \$200. The population is steadily increasing. Eight have been confirmed; there are 33 communicants; there are 36 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$386.

The Mission of the Good Shepherd, Fort Lee, continues to prosper. The congregations are larger than ever before. There are four lots adjoining the present property, which ought to be secured now. They can be purchased for our purposes for \$800; the present market value is \$1,200. There have been 17 baptisms; there are 108 communicants; there are 120 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$442. A class is ready for the Bishop, who will visit the Mission in June.

Trinity Mission, Grantwood, has had a prosperous year. The people are raising \$400 to purchase two additional lots in the rear of the church building. There have been 8 baptisms; there are 82 communicants; there are 86 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$865. A class will be ready for the Bishop's visitation in the Fall.

The work at St. Peter's, Clifton, goes steadily on. The mortgage on the building is being reduced at the rate of \$10 a month; it is now about \$500. The Easter offering amounted to \$100. There are 35 communicants; there are 35 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$751.

The growth of St. Clement's Mission, Hawthorne, has been quite remarkable during the past year. The presence of large numbers of men at the services is one of the most gratifying features. The evening congregations usually crowd the building. There have been 28 baptisms; 31 have been confirmed; there are 139 in the Sunday School; there are 79 communicants; the offerings have been \$563.

The Mission of St. John the Divine, Hasbrouck Heights, is pressing on to that condition when it will owe no man anything but to love one another. The debt on the property has been reduced one

half during the past year. I look for the total extinguishment of it in the near future. There have been 7 baptisms; 12 have been confirmed; there are 100 communicants; there are 75 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$992.

Steady work is being done at St. Mary's Mission, Ridgefield Park. The building is the property of the Mission; the land on which it stands is only rented land; it is most desirable that a plot of ground shall be secured as soon as possible. There have been 4 baptisms; 7 have been confirmed; there are 45 communicants; there are 75 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$540.

New mission work has been started at Woodcliffe. This is about two miles north of the Town of Union, and the center of a rapidly growing population. We ought to have a strong mission here. Enough financial support should be given it at the outset to enable it to get on its feet and then support itself. I have unbounded faith in the success of all work begun and carried on on the line of the Palisades. There is no portion of the State which is growing so rapidly, and with a population which so needs the ministrations of the Church.

A mission should be started at some point which would reach both Fairview and Grandview on the Palisades. It is estimated that the population numbers quite ten thousand souls in that locality. This is virgin soil so far as Church work is concerned; the people are almost entirely without religious ministrations of any kind. I have the promise of the money for the rent of a suitable building; the crying need is for money for the support of a suitable man.

New mission work has recently been begun at Westwood, the largest and most promising town on the line of the New Jersey and New York R. R., north of Hackensack. It is full of promise. It will need the fostering care of the Diocese until it has strength enough to care for itself. I especially commend this place and work to the thoughtful consideration of all. I am quite sure it will bring fruit to the thirty, sixty, yes, hundred fold in due time.

To sum up, the Board of Missions gave to this Archdeaconry, \$2,130 for its mission work. In return for this it reports: 190 baptisms; 137 have been confirmed; there are 1,438 communicants; there are 1,561 in the Sunday Schools; the offerings have been \$17,368. We thank God and take courage.

#### THE ARCHDEACONRY OF NEWARK.

To the Right Reverend Edwin S. Lines, D. D., Bishop of Newark:

I do not propose to take up the time of the Convention with a long report of the Missions of this Archdeaconry. I wish only by way of preface to acknowledge the kindness of the Bishop and the forbearance of the missionaries towards my own shortcoming in the matter of visitations.

It is not easy for the Rector of a parish of more than 1,000 communicants to give the time that ought to be given to the missionary work of this Archdeaconry.

Much has to be done by letters which would be far better done by personal interviews, and I cannot lay down the office without this public expression of my gratitude to the Bishop, the Board of Missions, and the missionaries for their constant and generous consideration.

Thirteen missions and parishes in the Archdeaconry of Newark have been aided during the past year by appropriation from the Diocesan Board. The total amount of these appropriations is \$2,850. Of these missions ten are in small country towns and villages.

The question is often asked, why spend so large a proportion of our missionary funds in keeping alive these struggling churches in country places, would it not be better to concentrate our forces and to spend our money in establishing new mission stations in our large and growing cities? And I must confess that the returns, if estimated solely by the number of baptisms and confirmations, do not seem to justify the outlay. But to my mind there is more involved than this. It is not a mere question of figures. Some of these country missions were in their day self-supporting parishes, and did their share in aiding the general work of the Diocese, and for their honorable record and their good work in the past we give them kindly consideration and help in this, their day of feebleness. Others again are in places small and weak to-day, but which may become strong and flourishing to-morow. With the tremendous population that is pouring into Northern New Jersey and with the increasing facilities for rapid transit to New York, it is rash to say that these country villages have no future. No one of us, I think, would willingly see the doors of these little churches closed, so long as men can be found who, aided by the small apropriations we are able to make, are willing to work cheerfully and uncomplainingly in these small and remote places.

But I do think that, so far as possible, a policy of consolidation should be carried out in these country missions. They should be grouped in twos or threes, where practicable, and one active man should be placed in charge. What we need in our country missions is something like the old Methodist "circuit riding," by which one man cared for four or five different mission stations. This would be better for the man and better, I believe, for the missions. It would give the man plenty to do, and save him from rusting, and it would stimulate the mission that desired a resident priest to greater activity and self-support.

We need more missions in our cities and our suburbs, but the money required to establish them should not be secured by withdrawing the grants made to our country missions, but rather by calling upon the Diocese to increase its offerings for missionary work.

Some of these country missions are showing a most commendable spirit by voluntarily relinquishing a part of these appropriations. Thus, St. James', Hackettstown, which has received \$300, asks this year for only \$250. Let every mission set this ideal before it, and try each year to do a little more for itself, and to relinquish something of its appropriation, and the very effort will bring with it an increasing self-respect and a deepening interest in the work of the Church.

I shall not weary you with a long list of statistics. Of several of these mission stations, St. Paul's, Butler; Zion, Belvidere; St. James', Knowlton; St. Thomas', Vernon; Good Shepherd, Hamburgh; Christ Chapel, Stanhope; St. Mark's, Mendham; St. Peter's, Washington; it is enough to say that the missionaries in charge have done faithful work, and report their condition to be much the same as in the previous year.

St. James', Hackettstown, to which reference has already been made, reports through its missionary, the Rev'd W. M. Mitcham, a most encouraging year. Not only has it released \$50 of its appropriation, but the debt upon the rectory has been reduced by \$130, and it has even begun an endowment fund with a nest egg of \$70. The debt upon the organ has also been reduced to \$60. The offerings for all purposes have amounted to \$784. Eight have been confirmed and another class awaits the Bishop's visitation.

St. Luke's Church, Phillipsburg, in charge of the Rev'd N. H. Martin, reports 54 baptisms, six of whom were adults; and 35 confirmed; \$1,200 have been raised for parish purposes, and \$1,100 for

the rectory debt. This effort has strained the resources of the parish this year, but next year it expects to reduce the amount asked for from the Board of Missions.

The Mission at Chatham, in charge of the Rector of St. Stephen's, Millburn, the Rev'd J. W. Van Ingen, reports 35 communicants, and offerings and subscriptions amounting to \$498. The ladies also raised \$150 by a fair. The mission property is now clear of debt, except a note of \$615. This is one of our new missions and its future is most promising, for Chatham in a few years is certain to have a large increase of population.

Trinity Mission, Arlington, in charge of the Rev'd John Keller, reports a year of good work. Ten were confirmed, and the Communicants number 160. The excellent Sunday School, always a feature of this Mission, continues to grow, and the congregation is most loyal and devoted. Perhaps the best proof of the growth and earnestness of this Mission is the fact that the Missionary has relinguished the appropriation from the Diocesan Board for the coming year.

St. Peter's Mission, Essex Fells, continues to prosper. This Mission has been self-supporting from the start, and its future is secure.

St. Agnes' Church, Little Falls, as you know, was practically destroyed by fire this Winter, but its loss was amply covered by its insurance. This Mission is self-supporting.

St. Agnes' Mission, Hyde Park, East Orange, has rented a very comfortable and accessible building on Central Avenue and under the zealous leadership of the Rev'd Mr. Gordon, is steadily gaining in numbers, and in interest. A Sunday School in the afternoon, and a service at night, have been well attended and on Easter Day there was a morning service for the first time. In connection with this Mission the efficient services of Mr. Edward O. Stanley deserve honorable mention. The trolley on Central Avenue is increasing the already rapid growth of that part of East Orange, and St. Agnes' Mission will have ample room for growth without drawing upon the resources of the neighboring parishes.

In conclusion let me say that there are many places in the Archdeaconry which have already attracted the attention of our vigilant and missionary Bishop where missionary work ought to be begun, at any rate in a tentative way. At Montclair Heights, Forest Hill, Ampere, to mention only a few, some missionary effort should be made.

If the Archdeacon was able to give his whole time and thought to the missionary work, in other words, if the Diocese could afford the services of a paid man, call him Archdeacon, General Missionary, what you will, I believe that the missionary work could be greatly increased, and the additional expenditure for salary and travelling expenses amply justified.






