### Rules of Order

#### THE CONVENTION.

- Each meeting of the Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. The Convention shall meet the first day at 10 A. M., and on subsequent days at 9.30 A. M., with a recess of one hour on each day between 1 and 2 o'clock. (See foot note.)
- 3. At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
- At the close of each Convention, the Minutes shall be corrected and approved.
- 5. The doors of the Convention shall be opened for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
- When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
- 7. When any member is about to speak he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
- 8. No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply,) in the same debate without leave of the Convention.

<sup>\*</sup>By resolution of the 1910 Convention, motions and resolutions, requiring reference to Committees, may be introduced immediately after recess on the first day.

- 9. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
- 10. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate, but any member may appeal from the decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention.
- 11. No member shall leave the Convention without permission.

#### The Order of Business on the First Day shall be as Follows:

- 12. The calling over by the Secretary of the names of the Clerical members and the Lay Deputies, until ten Clerical members shall have been found to be present, and ten Parishes shall have been found to be represented.
- 13. All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convention shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall enter the same on the Minutes.
- 14. Clergymen of other Dioceses, and Candidates for Holy Orders, who may be present, shall be admitted to honorary seats in the Convention on the presentation of their names to the Secretary.
- 15. The appointment of a Committee on the Certificates of Lay Deputies.
- 16. The report of the existing Committee on Rules of Order.
- 17. The appointment by the Convention of a Committee on the Rights of Clerical Members. (Title I, Canon 1, § I, [2].)

- 18. The appointment by the Convention of a Committee on the Rights of Lay Deputies. (Title I, Canon 1, § II, [2].)
- 19. The election of a Secretary.
- 20. The appointment of a Committee on New Parishes.

- 32. The Missionary Business, including the election of the Board of Missions, and of representatives to the Missionary Council.
- 33. The nomination and election of Supplementary Deputies to the General Convention, when such are to be elected.
- 34. Reports of Committees.
- 35. Unfinished Business.
- 36. Motions, Resolutions and Miscellaneous Business. (See Rule 25.)

#### Committees.

- 37. All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered.
- 38. The Reports of Committees shall be in writing, and when made, shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect. (See Rule 25, Committee on Constitution and Canons.)

#### Motions and their Order.

- 39. No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
- 40. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone it to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be

carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.

 All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.

#### Voting Privileges.

- **42.** All questions shall be decided viva voce, unless otherwise specially ordered.
- 43. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote of the Convention may be taken by Orders, voting separately, and the names shall be entered on the Minutes.
- 44. In all elections, those persons only who shall have a majority of all the votes given, shall be deemed elected; but if in any case more than the required number of persons shall have a majority of votes, the required number of persons having the highest number of votes shall be deemed elected, and in case of a tie between two or more candidates, there shall be a new ballot.

## Report, Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, etc.

May 19th, 1910.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties herewith submit their report for the year ending April 30th, 1910:

The Trustees held four (4) meetings during the year. At the meeting held in January, they revised the By-Laws, and by reason of the burdens placed on the Treasurer in looking after the investment of funds, an Executive Committee was appointed to take charge of all investments and other cares of a similar nature. This Committee has arranged to invest \$4,500. of the Permanent Missionary Fund.

The By-Laws, as adopted, separated the offices of Secretary and Treasurer, making it necessary to have a separate officer for each office. They appointed Edwin A. S. Brown as Secretary, thus relieving Colonel Stevens of that work.

The details of the financial work of the Trustees and the condition of the Funds under their care, are shown in the report of the Treasurer.

During the year, the Mission at Arlington, having become a Parish, made request that a deed be made to them from the Trustees

for the property at Arlington; which deed was delivered to them after proper authority was granted by the Bishop and the Standing Committee.

The Trustees have collected the \$2,000 advanced three (3) years ago to the Board of Missions, together with interest on same.

A list of the deeds held by the Trustees for the purpose of Missions is also submitted.

Report of the Finance Committee of the Diocese of Newark.

MAY 23, 1910.

The Finance Committee reports that:

The Diocesan Offices at 49 Halsey Street have proved of great benefit to all the work of the Diocese and the lease thereof has been extended for the next two years,

In pursuance of the requirements of Title I, Canon 4, Sec. 2, this Committee determined the rate of assessment for the current year for Diocesan purposes to be seven per cent. of the current expenses of each Parish and Diocesan Mission as shown by its Parochial Report, and thereupon notified the Bishop so that he could call on the Board of Adjustment to proceed with its duties under the Canon.

The efficient service rendered by the Board of Adjustment has enabled the Treasurer to collect the assessments upon the Parishes and Missions in a most satisfactory manner, and the cooperation that its efforts have secured has resulted in the happy settlement of a large amount of past dues.

The Finance Committee is, therefore, enabled to congratulate the Convention on its excellent financial condition. At no time since the organization of the Diocese has the Treasurer or Treasurers of the different Boards and Committees been able to make such an excellent showing.

Under these encouraging conditions, the Finance Committee expresses the hope that those Parishes which still retain exemption under their Bonds, will be moved to consent to the cancellation of their bonds, and assume their fair proportion of the necessary expenses for the support of the Episcopate.

It is with great pleasure that we report that the loan for \$2,000 heretofore made from the funds of the Diocese to the Board of Missions was paid during the current year with interest, having been largely accomplished through a donation of \$500 for the purpose from Grace Church, Orange.

The Committee learns with pleasure that the report of the Committee on Increase of Clerical Salaries shows a generous response from several sources for this important purpose; but again urges that those Parishes and Missions whose Rectors receive inadequate support bestir themselves to secure the benefits of the movement and also urges more general offerings and contributions towards this fund.

The Bishop is meeting with gratifying success in his efforts to establish a permanent endowment for the Episcopal Fund, and we unite with him in the hope that in the near future the fund will reach such a sum that the assessment for Episcopal Support will be reduced to a minimum, a beginning toward this end being shown in the budget herewith submitted for the coming year, which is as follows:

#### BUDGET.

For the Support of the Episcopate\$

This Budget shows; 1st a decrease of \$1,800 in the assessment for the support of the Episcopate. 2nd an increase of \$1,500 in the assessment for the Board of Missions, made at its request for the extension of its work; and 3rd a decrease of \$700. for the Convention Expenses, notwithstanding the fact that \$1,600 will be required to meet our proportionate expenses of the General Convention, and it is hoped that the rate of assessment which last year was 7 per cent., will this year not exceed 6½ per cent. upon the current expenses of the Parishes and Missions.

The Finance Committee respectfully submits the following recommendations to the Convention:

- 1. That the Budget now submitted to the Convention be adopted.
- 2. That inasmuch as the Convention receives the rent of the property known as the Bishop's residence in East Orange, the

Treasurer be instructed to pay the sum of \$1,800 per annum to the Bishop or his designated representative, for the rent of his residence in the City of Newark.

3. That the Finance Committee be authorized, at its discretion to direct the Treasurer of the Convention to transfer any unused balance in his hands, accrued for Convention and Diocesan Expenses, to such fund or funds of the Convention as may require temporary replenishment, and to recover the same as and when circumstances permit, with interest adjustment thereon.

## Report, Board of Adjustment.

The Board of Adjustment, created by the Canon on Finance enacted at the last Convention, met and organized June 18th, 1909, electing the Reverend George M. Dorwart, President, and the Reverend Gilbert M. Foxwell, Secretary. During the year seven meetings were held. It is gratifying to report that only nine requests were made for reductions in the assessments of parishes and missions on the ground that it was beyond their power to pay. Nearly every one of these requests came from a Mission which had not before been assessed but had only been requested to make a nominal payment annually towards Diocesan Expenses.

Several parishes asked for adjustments because of errors made by including, under the head of "Current Expenses," items which should not have been so included; or, because, in parishes without rectories, allowance had not been made for house rent. All these cases, we believe, were adjusted to the entire satisfaction of the parishes in question. Two parishes paid their arrears in full. Others made settlement by paying, according to their ability, 25% to 75% of the full amounts. In a few instances arrears were remitted, but whenever this was done it was on condition that the assessments for the present year should be paid in full.

We would respectfully direct the attention of the Convention to the report of its Treasurer which shows that 95% of the present year's assessments were paid, being an increase of about \$5,000, or 25%, over the best previous record, and enabling the Board of Missions to pay off an advance of \$2,000, with interest, and to increase their balance by nearly \$600.

With these things in mind we believe the new financial system has worked well and the Board of Adjustment has already justified its existence.

## Report of the Standing Committee.

The Standing Committee respectfully reports that nine meetings have been held in the past year.

On the 28th of May, 1909, the Committee organized by electing the Rev'd Wm. Welles Holley, D. D., President, and the Rev'd William R. Jenvey, D. D., Secretary.

The Rev'd Ezra F. Ferris, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests, and the

proper testimonial signed.

On the 14th of June, 1909, the Rev'd George P. Armstrong, Rector of Trinity Church, Paterson, consulted with the Committee in the matter of building a parish house; no action was taken.

Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. John's Church, Jersey City, to borrow a sum, not to exceed \$9,000, and to mortgage St. Stephen's Chapel property for the same. The proper testimonial was signed and acknowledged.

On the 12th of July, 1909, a communication was received from the Rev'd Geo. P. Armstrong, Rector of Trinity Church, Paterson, saying that they were not ready to proceed in the matter of a new parish house.

Mr. Charles J. Mecklem was recommended to the Bishop as a Candidate for Holy Orders, and the proper testimonial signed.

On the 11th of October, 1909, Mr. Seth C. Hawley was recommended to the Bishop as a Candidate for Holy Orders, and the proper testimonial signed.

The Rev'd Hugh D. Wilson, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests, and the proper testimonial signed.

The Rev'd Glenn W. White, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests, and the proper testimonial signed.

By a rising vote, the Committee extended to the Rev'd Dr. Holley, its honored President, its congratulations and felicitations upon

his having completed thirty-nine years of rectorship of his present Parish.

On the 13th of December, 1909, the permission which had been given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of All Saints' Church, Orange, on the 12th day of July, 1908, to sell the property known as the Hillside property, and other church property, was, upon the request of the said Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen, rescinded.

Mr. Henry Baldwin Todd was recommended to the Bishop as a Candidate for Holy Orders, and the proper testimonial signed.

Mr. Aika Peter Tulp was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Deacons, and the proper testimonial signed.

The Rev'd Warren Van Houten Filkins, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of

Priests, and the proper testimonial signed.

The Rev'd Waldo Adams Amos, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests, and the

proper testimonial signed.

Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Trinity Church, Arlington, to borrow a sum, not to exceed \$6,000, and to mortgage the church property for the same. The proper form was signed and acknowledged.

On the 20th of December, 1909, Henry K. Denlinger, D. D., was recommended to the Bishop as a Candidate for Holy Orders, and the

proper testimonial signed.

The Rt. Rev'd, the Bishop of the Diocese, reported that the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund had voted to transfer the property of Trinity Mission, Arlington, to the corporation of Trinity Parish, Arlington.

On the 7th of February, 1910, only business of a routine nature was transacted.

On the 18th of April, 1910, the Rev'd E. Ashley Gerhard, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests, and the proper testimonial signed.

Mr. Gordon D. Hoxsey was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Deacons, and the proper testi-

monial signed.

Mr. Carolus Roe Webb was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Deacons, and the proper testimonial signed.

The Rev'd Joseph Russell Lynes, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests, and the

proper testimonial signed,

The application of the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Trinity Parish, Arlington, that their church property, now held in trust by the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, be transferred to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of said Trinity Parish, was approved and granted, and the proper form signed and acknowledged.

On the 24th of May, 1910, the Committee gave its approval of a plan proposed by the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Calvary Church, Bayonne, for the borrowing of a sum, not to exceed \$8,000; three thousand of this to be used in satisfaction of an existing mortgage of the same amount, and \$5,000 to be used in the erection of a rectory.

Permission was given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. James' Parish, Newark, to borrow the sum of \$6,500; two thousand three hundred dollars of this to be used in satisfying an existing mortgage of \$2,300; the remaining \$4,200 to be used in payment of certain enlargements and improvements to the church property, which had been made. The proper form was signed and acknowledged.

Henry K. Denlinger, D. D., was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Deacons, and the proper testimonial signed.

The Report of the Secretary was read, approved, and ordered read to the Convention,

## Report, Commission on Church Architecture.

The Commission on Church Architecture respectfully presents its third annual report. During the past year the Commission has been consulted in regard to the erection of two churches and two parish houses. The churches were for St. Stephen's, Jersey City, and St. George's, Passaic. The parish houses were for Grace Mission at Grandview, and the Church of the Annunciation, Oradell.

The suggestions of the Commission in regard to St. Stephen's were adopted, and the design, together with the plans of the parish house at Grandview, was approved. A new design, with complete working drawings and specifications, was supplied for St. George's, by a member of the Commission, at less than half the actual cost of office work, and this also was approved.

The Commission would once more urge the necessity of an early application for "counsel and advice." Such a course will always save time and avoid trouble to applicant and Commission alike. They would especially appeal to the clergy and to parish authorities not to yield to the temptation of accepting plans by local architects merely because they are offered gratis, or at a nominal price. In practice this is invariably found to be a mistake both on the score of taste and economy.

Report, Committee on Increase of Clerical Salaries.

May 14, 1910.

During the year a number of Parishes contributed to the fund for the relief of underpaid members of the Clergy in the Diocese, and upon the recommendation of the Bishop, \$840. has been distributed among them.

The information placed before the Committee respecting the relief that this modest distribution afforded to the recipients justifies in the fullest degree the wisdom of this provision, and it is doubtful whether any money given by the donors for any purpose during the year has been more productive of good results.

Your Committee once again urges that in the coming year at least \$1,000. be raised from the parishes that can give, as well as upon individuals who will contribute, to the good work.

#### We recommend:

- (a) That the subject of Increase of Clerical Salaries be made a part of the regular relief work of the Diocese, and be commmitted to the Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund.
- (b) That all Parishes and Missions be urged to devote the offerings taken at the principal service on some one Sunday in Advent to the increase of inadequate salaries of Clergy in charge of Parishes and Missions.
- (c) That the Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund be authorized to adopt rules for the distribution of the fund, but that all payments shall be subject to the approval of the Bishop.
- (d) That efforts be renewed among the churches paying small salaries to increase them wherever possible.

## Report, Committee on Apportionment Plan, General Missons.

In its report a year ago, your Committee said they "would like to arrange for meetings of laymen in different centres of the Diocese, to be addressed by those who would present the missionary needs of the Church." During the past year the Bishop, at the request of the Newark Clericus, appointed a Committee to carry out that purpose. These meetings have been held from the 11th of February to the 22nd of May. They have been informal in their character and they have sought to present the facts as to Diocesan, Domestic and Foreign Missions by those who were acquainted with the facts. Opportunity has been given after the addresses for questions by the men present, and for discussion of the points made by the speakers. In a number of cases these open discussions have been a striking and most helpful feature of these meetings. The attendance has been (except in a few instances) limited to men, because women are, as a rule, better informed through their Auxiliaries and Guilds as to missionary work. It was not intended to give these meetings the character of the ordinary missionary service; they were designed to be educational rather than devotional; for study rather than for worship.

Thirty-seven places have been visited with the intent of covering 115 parishes and missions. It is too soon to make any exact statement as to the result achieved. There was an aggregate attendance of 1,545; an average of over 41 at each meeting. It is surely something that 1,545 men, scattered throughout our Diocese, have listened to a careful presentation of what is being done, and left undone, in our mission fields—in this Diocese, in America and in non-Christian lands; and that they have been able to think over why and how such work is carried on. If we get the right motive for giving, the giving will come. What we all need is the inspiration and the interest which knowledge gives.

It may not be the direct result of our effort, but it must be an indirect result of it, that the men of one parish, in response to the earnest appeal of their Rector, have assumed the support of a missionary in Japan, at a charge of \$1,650 a year. The apportionment of this parish is \$1,000. All cannot do this, but all can do something.

One of the results of what we have tried to do will, we trust, be the appointment in every parish and mission of a Committee to make a personal canvass of the men to secure pledges for the support of our missionary work each year. There is no reason why this should not include all the charities of a Parish. System in giving means conscience in giving.

We share the hope, also, that you will think it worth while to repeat these meetings in the coming year; covering the places omitted the past year, as well as many of those already visited; and avoiding the mistakes inseparable from a first attempt.

Too much cannot be said in acknowledgment of the hearty cooperation of the clergy in this movement; of the pains they have taken in preparing for the meetings; and of the patience and kindness with which they have met, what must have at times seemed, an interference with their parochial plans.

From the published report of the General Board of Missions for the year from September, 1908, to September, 1909, this Diocese gave \$14,305.11 toward its apportionment of \$21,400.—an increase of \$2,844.80 over the previous year; 75 parishes and missions gave to the apportionment, an increase of 8 over the previous year; 101 parishes and missions gave through parochial offerings, the Sunday School, and the Woman's Auxiliary, to meet the appropriations.

The following parishes and missions, 24 in all, met and more than met their apportionment: Trinity, Arlington; St. John's, Bergenfield; St. John's, Boonton; Epiphany, Orange; St. Paul's, East Orange; St. Paul's, Englewood; St. John's, Nordhoff; Trinity, Grantwood; St. John the Divine, Hasbrouck Heights; Trinity, Irvington; Grace, Madison; St. George's, Maplewood; St. John's, Montclair; St. Luke's, Montclair; St. James', Upper Mont-

clair; St. Paul's, Montvale; St. Peter's, Morristown; Trinity, Newark; Grace, Orange; St. Mark's, Orange; St. John's, Ramsey; Christ Church, Ridgewood; Christ Church, Short Hills; Calvary, Summit.

Since September, 1909, and up to the present date, May 20, 1910, the following additional parishes have met their apportionment: St. Peter's, Essex Fells; Good Shepherd, Hamburgh; St. Luke's, Hope; St. Stephen's Chapel, Jersey City; St. Barnabas', Newark; St. John's, Nordhoff; St. Mary's, Ridgefield Park; St. Thomas', Vernon; St. John's, West Hoboken; Holy Trinity, West Orange.

This is a better showing than ever before. It is surely possible for this great Diocese to give not only a part, but all its apportionment. But even that will simply enable the Church to hold its own; it will not be able to provide for any increased work, any forward movement.

But the motive which should lead us to do our whole duty is our interest in the work GOD has given us to do. If our Lord has said, "Go work today in my vineyard," He has as plainly shown us what He means by that vineyard—"The field," He says, "is the world."

## Report on Sunday School and Religious Instruction.

The Committee on Sunday School and Religious Instruction respectfully report as follows:

The chief result of the Commission's work in the past year was the Diocesan Sunday School Convention, held in Trinity Church, Newark, in the afternoon and evening of April 20th, with an attendance of 600 of the clergy and other Sunday School workers.

Papers by Mr. Henry E. Rees, of Hartford, Conn., and the Rev'd George D. Hadley, of Jersey City, were read; and addresses were made by the Rev'd C. P. Mills, Educational Secretary of the Diocese of Massachusetts, and the Rev'd Herman L. Duhring, D. D., of Philadelphia.

The Committee anticipated a possible result of the Convention by appointing a sub-committee to submit a preliminary plan for a Diocesan Sunday School Union; and this plan was endorsed by the unanimous vote of the representatives of the Sunday Schools present,

The full report of the Committee was as follows:

"The Sub-Committee appointed by the Sunday School Commission would suggest a preliminary plan of a Diocesan Sunday School Union as follows:

1. The Diocese to be divided into seven sections as follows:
(1) Newark; (2) Orange; (3) Jersey City; (4) Englewood; (5) Paterson; (6) Morristown; (7) Dover.

The parishes and missions to be included in each section as follows:

NEWARK.—All the parishes and missions in Newark, Bloom-field and Montclair; also, Trinity, Arlington; Christ Church, Belleville; St. Peter's, Essex Fells; Christ Church, Harrison; Trinity, Irvington; Grace, Nutley.

ORANGE.—All the parishes and missions in the Oranges; also, St. George's, Maplewood; St. Stephen's, Millburn.

JERSEY CITY.—All the parishes and missions in Jersey City, Hoboken and Bayonne; also, Grace, Greenville; Grace, Town of Union; St. John's, West Hoboken.

ENGLEWOOD.—St. John's, Bergenfield; St. Paul's, Englewood; Mediator, Edgewater; Nativity, Fairview; Good Shepherd, Fort. Lee; Grace, Grandview; Trinity, Grantwood; Christ Church, Hackensack; Trinity, Hillsdale; All Saints', Leonia; St. Paul's, Montvale; St. John's, Nordhoff; Holy Communion, Norwood; Annunciation, Oradell; St. James', Ridgefield; St. Mary's, Ridgefield Park; Atonement, Tenafly; Grace, Westwood; Trinity, Wortendyke.

- 2. That the Bishop be requested to appoint over each district a local chairman. The local chairman to organize the work by calling one or more meetings of the Sunday School workers in his district.
- 3. At one of such meetings a delegate to be elected from each section to serve on a committee to draw up a formal and complete plan of a Diocesan Sunday School Union. This plan to be presented at a Sunday School Convention to be held one year from this time.

- 4. We would suggest that at the next Sunday School Convention all Sunday School workers be invited, but that two delegates from each school be designated to act upon the adoption of the plan submitted for a Diocesan Sunday School Union.
- 5. We would suggest that the Bishop appoint a Diocesan Sunday School Treasurer, whose duties shall be to receive and pay over to the Bishop the Sunday School Advent offerings, and also to tabulate this, and the Lenten Sunday School offerings for missions. It shall also be his duty to receive and disburse all other sums that may come into his hands from time to time as such Treasurer.
- 6. The officers and members of the Sunday School Commission shall have charge of all other matters connected with the organization of the proposed Sunday School Union."

Mr. Arthur E. Barlow was appointed Diocesan Sunday School Treasurer.

The local chairmen have already ascertained that schools would be willing to enter such a Union as is proposed. It is altogether probable that a year from this time the Sunday School Union will be fully organized.

The aims of the Union are:

- 1. To stimulate interest and strengthen the efforts of Sunday School workers by conference and co-operation.
  - 2. To establish training classes for Sunday School teachers.
- 3. To suggest courses of instruction as aids to the systematic training of the children, according to methods recognized and accepted in general educational work, and graded up to some well defined standard of accomplishment.

It was noticeable that no one at the Convention spoke of the Sunday School as a necessary evil, or bewailed the difficulties of the situation. We all know the difficulties and appreciate the dangers, but the Sunday School offers a great opportunity for lasting work among those who should, and must, be the main stay and strength of the Church in this Diocese during the next generation.

Other Christian bodies are showing themselves wisely appreciative of the infinite possibilities of this work, and our own Sunday School workers in many Dioceses have already made substantial advance in united efforts in this direction. The Diocese of Newark, with its splendid examples of efficient work in individual schools, may well add to this parochial excellence, the benefits which may be derived from Diocesan organization and co-operation.

The Committee feels that the organizing of the Union would be only the first step toward a broad and strong movement for Religious Education.

And the phrase, "Religious Education," means something more than "Sunday School."

"Sunday School" we think of as a department of parish work, but "Religious Education" is a cause which demands serious consideration and thorough discussion in Diocesan councils. Religious Education, we are sure, is to be more and more the subject on which the greatest emphasis will be put by the Church as time goes on, for this means the training of young and old to a right understanding of at least the fundamental truths which a Christian ought to know and believe to his soul's health. It looks to such a regular and systematic teaching of all our people as shall lead them to see the necessity of the Church of Jesus Christ, not simply for their own present and eternal welfare, but more, for the present and eternal welfare of all mankind.

We therefore urge that this Diocese, as a Diocese, commit itself in a real and positive way to the cause of Religious Education as other Dioceses have done, especially the Diocese of Massachusetts. We recognize the importance of other matters brought to your consideration, and their possible priority of claim for legislative action; but we earnestly plead that this too may have canonical recognition, and we beg leave to move the following resolutions:

- 1. Resolved, That this Convention approves the report of the Committee on Sunday School and Religious Instruction, and recommends the formation of a Sunday School Union for the purposes and upon the general lines suggested in said report.
- 2. Resolved, That a Committee of three be appointed, one of whom shall be a member of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, and one a member of the Committee on Sunday School and Religious Instruction, to consider the subject of canonical legislation on this subject, and report to the next Convention.

All of which is respectfully submitted,

The recommendations of the Commission were severally adopted.

On motion, the Commission on Sunday School and Religious Instruction was continued.

On motion of Mr. Charles W. Parker, the following preamble and resolution were adopted. WHEREAS, The year 1911 will be the three hundredth anniversary of the completion and publication of the English translation of the Bible which has been, and still is, known as the "Authorized Version:"

AND WHEREAS, The Church Club of this Diocese has taken the initiative in securing a suitable commemoration of an event so important to the Christian Church throughout the world;

Resolved, That this Convention heartily approves of such action, and authorizes its Deputies to present the matter of such commemoration to the General Convention.

The following propositions, offered by the Treasurer of the Convention, were referred to the appropriate Committee.

Resolved, That so much of the report of the Committee on the Underpaid Clergy Fund as refers to making that work a part of the general clergy relief work of the Diocese, be referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, with instructions to draft, and present at the Convention of 1911, such legislation as may be necessary to carry the recommendations of the Committee into effect.

Resolved, also, That the said Committee be instructed to prepare, and submit at the same time, such legislation, as in their judgment, may be needed to systematize and render more effective the general work of the relief of ciergy and their dependents; and that said Committee be given power for this purpose to call before them the officers of the Convention and to confer with any Committee or body subsidiary to this Convention.

The Rev'd Edwin A. White offered several canonical amendments, which, on motion, were referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons for consideration and report to-morrow. (*Vide*, Reports 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, and 14 of the Committee on Constitution and Canons.)

On motion of the Rev'd Dr. Reazor, a proposition favoring the election of a Library Committee to consist of two clergymen and one layman, to serve three years, was referred to the Special Committee on that portion of the Bishop's Address, etc.

On motion of the Rev'd Edwin A. White, Article 4, section four, sub-section two, (page 105, 1909 Journal), was finally adopted by concurrent unanimous vote of both Orders, to read as follows:

"In case the Parish or Mission sending such Deputies shall for two successive years have failed to pay to the proper officer its proportion for the support of the Episcopate, either as interest on bonds or as assessment for the same, together with such sum or sums as may have been assessed or levied upon such Parish or Mission for Diocesan expenses unless any or all of such interest or assessment shall have been remitted by action of the Convention."

On motion of the Rev'd Harold S. Brewster, it was

Resolved, That the Bishop be requested to appoint three clergymen and three laymen to serve with him as a committee to take into consideration the relations of the Diocese to the new social conditions arising out of modern living; the Committee to have power to add to their number.

Mr. James E. Bathgate, jr., presented the following

Report, Committee on Diocesan Paper.

The Committee on the Diocesan Paper respectfully report: That they have published seven numbers of The Newark Churchman, and that they purpose to issue a Convention Number containing the Bishop's Address and a Summary of the Proceedings, as soon after the conclusion of the present session as possible.

The wider interest in the Paper and the larger support given to it may be fairly considered as evidence that The Newark Churchman meets a Diocesan need. The Committee respectfully ask to be continued, with power to add to their number.

## Cathedral General Chapter.

The Rev'd Dr. Reazor, Registrar of the Cathedral, made a statement of the proceedings of the General Chapter, which is summarized as follows:

Since the last meeting of the Convention, eight meetings of the General Chapter have been held.

After the decease of Archdeacon Cameron, the Rev'd George S. Bennitt, D. D., was elected to fill the vacancy in the Chapter.

The question of a site for the future Cathedral in relation to the increased land valuations; the needs and convenience of the Diocese; the special functions of a Cathedral Church and its relation to adjacent congregations, were amply discussed at these meetings.

Reports of a Special Commission on Cathedral Site have been made from time to time to the General Chapter. The reports have been received, and the Commission continued.

The matter of special work at the Pro-Cathedral among Italians has received careful consideration, as has also the project of erecting a parish house on the Cathedral grounds for the better development of that work. The plans for such a building and a descriptive account of the territory adjacent to the Pro-Cathedral have been prepared, and copies printed for the use of members of the Convention.

The Rev'd Stephen H. Granberry read the following

## Report, Commission on Church Extension.

The Committee on Church Extension begs to report: That meetings have been held regularly during the past year; that the attendance has been good, and a live interest has been taken by the members in the proceedings.

A letter from the Bishop, to a member of the Commission, contains a concise statement of what is being done. He says, "I hope you will put in a report on Church Extension work that will state that we have had a hand during the year in the construction of the churches at Ridgefield Park, Wortendyke, Westwood and Grandview; and that we are working away at plans for St. George's, Passaic, and several other places; that we have tried to gather information about several points; and that there are many things for us to try to do.

Mr. James Barber, of Englewood, presented a plan for raising money to aid in the work of Church Extension, which was adopted by the Commission with warm approval. The scheme, as published in the April number of the Newarh Churchman, with the appended statement and appeal is as follows:

"The laymen forming the Committee for the Bishop's Church Extension Fund are sending out a circular letter which reads as follows:

It is desired to effect an organization throughout the Diocese whereby funds may be provided from time to time for assistance in the erection of Mission Churches, Parish Houses and Rectories, in needy and newly settled districts, both City and Rural, which at present have to be neglected for lack of means.

The following plan has been approved by the Diocesan Commission and is submitted to the members of all the Parishes for their consideration and co-operation. There are, besides some forty missions, about eighty parishes in the Diocese, and it is assumed that in each of these there are from one to twenty persons, not only able, but gladly willing, to contribute at intervals of two or



three months, sums of from one to five dollars, for so worthy an object as the building of a Church or similar work, without diminishing their ordinary contributions to the needs of their own parishes. If, therefore, an average of ten persons from each parish will undertake to contribute each an average of \$2.50, this will provide a fund of about \$2,000 available automatically whenever a call is issued by the Bishop (such calls, however, not to exceed five in any one year).

To accomplish so desirable a result, with so little individual effort, will commend itself to all who sympathize with the desire to extend the Church's work, and your prompt co-operation is earnestly desired. The calls when made will indicate the location and needs of the district to be assisted, accompanied by a printed blank and an addressed envelope so that the calls may be readily responded fo with the least possible trouble."

This plan is commended to the active interest of the members of the Convention. When the plan is made known throughout the Diocese, and earnestly taken up, it is believed that enough money will be forthcoming to amply meet the present promising and urgent demand for Church Extension.

## JOURNAL, SECOND DAY.

Grace Church, Orange, N. J., Wednesday, 25th May, 1910. 9:30 A. M.

Morning Prayer and Litany were read by the Bishop assisted by the Rev'd Charles T. Walkley, Rector of the parish, and the Rev'd George M. Dorwart.

The Minutes of yesterday's proceedings were read and approved.

On motion of the Rev'd Albert L. Longley, the Missionary Council for the Department of New York and New Jersey was invited to meet in the City of Newark in 1911.

Archdeacon Jenvey presented the Report of the Archdeaconry of Jersey City. (See Appendix to Episcopal Address.)

Mr. William M. Franklin, from the Committee on Finance, to which was referred the resolution of the Rev'd Walker Gwynne concerning the salary of the Secretary, reported as follows:

The Finance Committee recommends that the compensation of the Secretary of the Convention be \$350, for the current year, and that the Finance Committee be authorized to make such further arrangements with the Secretary for additional services to the Diocese at such compensation as may be mutually agreed upon, and for that purpose the Finance Committee be authorized to add \$500. to the budget as voted.

On motion, the first recommendation, fixing the salary of the Secretary, was adopted.

On motion, the second recommendation was adopted.

Archdeacon McCleary read the Report of the Archdeaconry of Morristown. (See Appendix to Episcopal Address.)

Archdeacon Carter read the Report of the Archdeaconry of Newark. (See Appendix to Episcopal Address.)

The Convention proceeded to elections; Tellers were appointed: Standing Committee, etc.,—Clerical vote—The Rev'd Samuel A. Weikert, the Rev'd Wm. Bernard Gilpin, Mr. Philip H. Patriarche. Lay vote—The Rev'd R. W. E. Merington, Mr. C. Alfred Burhorn, Mr. Charles E. Foster. Deputies to General Convention—Clerical vote—The Rev'd William P. Taylor, the Rev'd Edmund J. Cleveland, Mr. Edward B. Camp. Lay vote—The Rev'd Everard P. Miller, Mr. Anton G. Christensen, Mr. Stephen W. Williams. Board of Missions—Clerical vote—The Rev'd George H. Young, the Rev'd Arthur W. Shaw, Mr. Horace C. Grice. Lay vote—The Rev'd Robert J. Thomson, Mr. Frank L. Crawford, Mr. W. A. Meikleham.

When the ballots of the Clerical and Lay voters for Standing Committee, Deputies to General Convention and other officers (except the Board of Missions) had been deposited, the polls were declared closed. The Tellers retired to count the votes.

REPORT No. 1.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom was referred the resolution offered by the Rev'd Walker Gwynne in 1908, (see Journal of 1908, page 98), and continued by the Convention of 1909, (see Journal of 1909, page 40), respectfully report as follows:

The Committee has considered the resolution, which proposed to give to the Bishop a veto power over all future amendments to the Constitution. In the judgment of the Committee the resolution, as proposed, is inexpedient, and should not be adopted.

"This certificate in the case of a Parish shall be signed by the Rector, or the Secretary of the Vestry, or by the Wardens; and in the case of an Organized Mission by the Minister in charge, or by the Clerk, or by the Warden, and transmitted."

The Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom was referred the following resolution, etc., respectfully report as follows:

Your Committee recommends the passage of the following:

Resolved, That Title I, Canon 5, be amended to read as follows:

## CANON 5.

#### OF DIOCESAN MISSIONS.

- § I. The Bishop, or Bishops as the case may be, Clergy and Laity, in Convention assembled shall be the Missionary Council of the Diocese, and shall take up the consideration of all matters connected with the Missions of the Diocese immediately after the reading of the Minutes on the morning of the second day of the annual Convention.
- § II. (1) There shall be a Board of Missions and Church Extension which shall consist of the Bishop, or Bishops, as the case may be; the Archdeacon or Archdeacons, if any be appointed as hereinafter provided for; all of whom shall be members, exofficio; together with twelve Presbyters canonically resident in

the Diocese, and twelve Laymen, communicants of the Church, elected as follows: The Convention, upon the adoption of this Canon, shall elect twelve qualified Presbyters and twelve qualified Laymen to serve as members of said Board, who shall hold office respectively for one, two, and three years, the assignment of term of office being made by lot in each Order respectively, and thereafter four Presbyters and four Laymen shall be elected each year for a term of three years.

All vacancies occurring in the Board shall be filled by the Convention for the unexpired term.

- (2) The Bishop, when present, shall preside at all meetings of the Board, and shall have the sole power of appointing Missionaries in the Diocese. During any vacancy in the Episcopate, or inability of the Bishop to act, the Board shall have power to appoint Missionaries.
- § III. The Board shall hold its first meeting as soon as may be possible after the adjournment of the Convention, on call of the Bishop, and shall hold subsequent meetings at its own discretion, or at the call of the Bishop through its Secretary; shall elect its own President, Secretary, and Treasurer; and make by-laws for its own guidance.
- § IV. (1) The Board, with the concurrence of the Bishop, shall designate its Mission Stations throughout the Diocese, and take proper measures to provide and apply the funds necessary for their support; shall have general jurisdiction in all financial and secular interests pertaining to the Missionary work of the Diocese, subject to such civil and ecclesiastical provisions as may otherwise be made and applicable thereto; shall have the sole power to draw warrants on the Missionary funds of the Diocese, and may adopt measures for the increase of those Funds; may, with the approval of the Bishop, appropriate money for purposes other than Missionaries salaries in aid of the Missionary work of the Diocese, and shall perform such other duties as may be required by Canon or by resolution of the Convention.
- (2) The Board, with the concurrence of the Bishop, shall have power to purchase ground and erect Mission buildings thereon,

and to assist Organized Missions in purchasing ground and in erecting such buildings;

Provided, That the Board shall not incur any indebtedness for the foregoing purpose, and that the title to the real estate shall be vested in the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties.

- (3) The Board shall have power to receive and collect money for the purposes herein specified.
- § V. (1) A Diocesan Archdeacon may be appointed by the Bishop, subject to confirmation by the Board. His salary shall be fixed by the Board, to be paid out of the Missionary funds of the Diocese.

He may be removed by the Bishop, at any time on three months notice previously given.

- (2) The duties of the Diocesan Archdeacon shall be those of a General Missionary in the Diocese under the direction of the Bishop. He shall receive for travelling and other necessary expenses such sum per annum as the Board shall determine.
- (3) The Bishop may also appoint annually, one of more District Archdeacons who, under his discretion, shall have supervision of the Missions in such district or districts as shall be allotted to him or them, by the Bishop. Such Archdeacon or Archdeacons shall, when required, report to the Board the condition of the Missions under his or their charge, together with such suggestions as he or they may desire to offer.
- § VI. The Board shall make a report of its proceedings to the Annual Missionary Council, such report to contain the names of all Mission Stations in the Diocese, together with such other information and suggestions as it may deem desirable, or the Council may request.
- § VII. Every Minister having charge of a Parish or Mission within the Diocese shall, on at least one Sunday in each year, hold a service in which the subject of Missions and Church Extension in the Diocese shall be distinctly set forth, and such information be given as may quicken interest in this work.

§ VIII. It shall be the duty of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and other Diocesan Properties, to pay over to the Treasurer of the Convention the interest of the Permanent Missionary Fund, and said interest shall be applied to Missionary work in the Diocese as the Bishop by written order to said Treasurer may direct.

On motion of the Rev'd John S. Miller, the Clergy approved the choice of the Lay Members of the Standing Committee.

On motion, Section three, of the proposed Canon on Diocesan Missions, was adopted.

The Tellers of the Lay vote for Deputies to General Convention reported the following named gentlemen chosen by that Order: Mr. Edwin A. Stevens, Mr. William M. Franklin, Mr. Hamilton W. Mabie. (One vacancy.)

The consideration of the proposed Canon on Diocesan Missions was resumed.

On motion, Sections, four, five, six, seven and eight were severally adopted. The Canon as amended was adopted as a whole.

Tellers of the Clerical vote for the Standing Committee reported the following named gentlemen chosen by that Order: Standing Committee—The Rev'd William W. Holley, D. D., the Rev'd Frank B. Reazor, D. D., the Rev'd William R. Jenvey, D. D., the Rev'd Louis S. Osborne.

On motion of Mr. Charles W. Parker and Mr. Wm. Fellowes Morgan, the Laity approved the choice of the Clerical members of the Standing Committee. The President declared the election of the Standing Committee to be complete.

The Tellers reported the election of the following officers:

Treasurer-Mr. Edwin A. Stevens.

Auditing Committee—Mr. Richard F. Stevens, Mr. Thomas G. Conway.

Registrar-Mr. Frederick E. Hodge.

Ecclesiastical Court (one member to serve until 1916)—The Rev'd Henry H. Hadley.

The President declared these elections.

The Tellers of the Clerical vote for Deputies to General Convention reported the following named gentlemen chosen by that Order: The Rev'd George S. Bennitt, D. D., the Rev'd Edwin A. White, the Rev'd Charles C. Edmunds. (One vacancy.)

A ballot was duly taken for one Clerical and one Lay Deputy to General Convention.

The Tellers of the Lay vote reported that Mr. Alfred Mills was elected a Lay Deputy to General Convention.

On motion of Archdeacon Jenvey, the Clergy approved the choice of the Lay Deputies to General Convention. As a special mark of respect to Mr. Mills, a rising vote was taken.

The Convention proceeded to the election of a Board of Missions and Church Extension under the provisions of the new Canon 5, Title I, adopted this morning; said Board to consist of twelve members in each Order. When the ballots of the Clerical and Lay voters had been deposited, the polls were declared closed. The Tellers retired to count the votes.

The Convention reassembled at 2.30 p. m.

# Report, Board of Missions.

To the Convention of the Diocesc of Newark:

The Board of Missions respectfully reports that it has held six meetings during the past year, and that it has aided or maintained mission work at the following places:

In the Archdeaconry of Newark-

St. Paul's, Butler; Zion, Belvidere; St. James', Delaware; St. James', Hackettstown; Good Shepherd, Hamburgh; St. Peter's, Washington; Christ Mission, Stanhope; St. Mark's, Mendham; St. Peter's, Mt. Arlington; Christ Church, Pompton; St. Philip's Church, Newark; St. George's, Vailsburgh; St. Luke's, Phillipsburgh; St. Thomas', Vernon; Ascension, Bloomfield; Pro-Cathedral, Newark; St. Agnes', Little Falls.

In the Archdeaconry of Jersey City-

Good Shepherd, Fort Lee; Epiphany, Allendale; St. Mary's, Ridgefield Park; St. Peter's, Clifton; The Annunciation, Oradell; All Saints', Leonia; St. Stephen's, Coytesville; Trinity, Grantwood; St. John the Divine, Hasbrouck Heights; Holy Trinity, Hillsdale; St. George's, Passaic; St. John's, Ramsey; St. Luke's, Paterson; Grace, Westwood; St. Paul's, Montvale; Nativity, Fairview; Grace, Grandview; Grace, East Rutherford; St. Thomas', Lyndhurst; St. Stephen's, Delawanna.

The reports of the Archdeacons contain in detail an account of the work done at these places. The duty of the Board of Missions is limited to the measures authorized by the Convention for providing and applying the funds necessary for the support of the Missionaries. This has been done through the plan of apportionment which has been adopted by successive Conventions.

The past year has been one of noted progress in our Missionary work. The forward movement began with the granting by the Convention of an increase of appropriation for the use of the Board from \$7,500 to \$8,000, and it was greatly stimulated by the Missionary Meetings for Laymen which were held at various centres all over the Diocese during the past Winter and Spring. And as a result we are able to report a remarkable increase in the offerings for Diocesan Missions. So much money indeed has lately been received that the Board of Missions has been able to cancel its old indebtedness of \$2,000 to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund with interest thereon for two and a half years of \$250, and to begin the new year with a balance of nearly \$1,500 on hand after having paid all the Missionaries up to the In this connection grateful mention is made of first of May. the generous offering of Grace Church, Orange, which contributed \$500 toward the wiping out of the debt of \$2,000, and of other voluntary offerings which, with the above \$500, amounted to \$1,649.75.

For several years the matter of the appointment of a General Missionary for the Diocese has been under discussion. During the past year it was taken up seriously by a joint commission, representing the Board of Missions and the Cathedral Chapter, with the result that the Commission resolved to request the Board of Missions to ask this Convention for not less than \$9,500 in order to provide, beyond present appropriations, for the salary and travelling expenses of a Diocesan Archdeacon or General Missionary. This resolution was carried at a meeting of the Board of Missions, with the proviso that the Finance Committee be notified of the proposed increase, and the same has been done. Other resolutions affecting the scope of the Board were passed at that meeting, which will also now be presented.

We beg therefore to offer the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That the Convention authorize the Board of Missions to appropriate the sum of not less than \$9,500 in order to

provide, if deemed best, beyond present appropriations for the salary and travelling expenses of a Diocesan Archdeacon.

- 2. Resolved, That the plan of apportionment be that adopted by the Finance Committee.
- 3. Resolved, That a financial policy be inaugurated which shall provide for the application of a fair proportion of the Missionary funds to the extension of the Church in our large centres of population.

Your Committee recommends the passage of the following:

Resolved, That Title I, Canon 7, Section 2, be amended to read as follows:

Section II. (1). The written consent of the Bishop having been thus given to the proposed organization, further proceedings shall be had as follows:

Notice shall be given during public service at the usual place of worship on two successive Sundays next preceding the time of meeting, that all persons belonging to the Protestant Episcopal Church, or desirous of uniting with the same, will meet at a time and place specified, for the purpose of organizing a parish, by the election of two Wardens, and such number of Vestrymen as may at that time be determined upon, by fixing upon a date for the annual meeting, and by the adoption of Articles of Association.

This notice shall be given by the Minister in charge, if there be one, and if not, by some Minister appointed by the Bishop to hold service and give the notice, and also to preside on the occasion of the meeting for organization.

- (2) At the time of the meeting, the Minister, as aforesaid, shall preside, a Secretary shall be appointed, a book provided for the Minutes, in which shall be first entered in full the notice to the Bishop, with the names attached to the same, the Bishop's approval of the organization, and a record of any other papers and action previously had, important in reference to the history of the organization. Entry shall also be made of the persons present and qualified to vote.
- (3) Every baptized male of full age, attached to the doctrine, discipline and worship of the Protestant Episcopal Church and a regular attendant at the services of said Church for three calendar months next before said meeting, shall be deemed a qualified voter for the purposes of this Canon.
- (4) The qualified voters present shall first decide by a majority vote the question of organization.

If the vote be in favor of organization, they shall next determine the name by which the proposed parish shall be known, then they shall decide the date of the annual meeting of the parish for the election of officers, and then proceed to elect two Wardens and either three, six or nine Vestrymen, to serve until the next Annual Meeting or until their successors are elected.

The meeting shall then adopt Articles of Association in the following words:

We, the undersigned, assembled for the purpose of organizing a Congregation and Parish of the Protestant Episcopal Church at , in the County of , and State of New Jersey, in the Diocese of Newark, the consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority having been obtained, as provided by Canon, and due notice given of such intention by a notice given during public service at the usual place of worship on the two successive Sundays next preceding the time of meeting, designating the day and place aforesaid when and where they proposed to meet for

that purpose, do hereby agree to organize a congregation and parish to be known as the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Church in County of

, and as such we do hereby acknowledge, accede to and adopt the Doctrine, Discipline, and Worship and also the Constitution and Canons of the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, and the Constitution and Canons of the said Church in the Diocese of Newark; and we further certify that at said meeting we did choose two Wardens, viz:

and , to serve until the next Annual Meeting, or until their successors be chosen; and (three. six or nine) Vestrymen, viz:

to serve until the next Annual Meeting, or until their successors be chosen, and also did fix and determine upon

in the week following the First Sunday in Advent, as the day on which the Annual Meeting of the parish for the election of officers shall be held.

Witness the hands of the Chairman and Secretary of said meeting, and the hands of members of said Congregation, qualified voters at said meeting, this day of in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and

# Report, Committee on Diocesan Library.

The Committee appointed to consider that part of the Bishop's Address which refers to the establishment of a Committee on the Diocesan Library, and to which was referred Resolutions of the Rev'd Dr Reazor concerning a Diocesan Library, would respectfully report, that:

Whereas, The Diocese owns a valuable collection of books bequeathed to it by the late Bishop Starkey, and is in possession of and has the use of, a large and valuable collection of books from the library of the late Archdeacon Cameron, in addition to which the Registrar of the Diocese has in his care, a large collection of Journals and Reports from this and other Dioceses, and these ought to be brought together, for the use of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese, therefore

# The Episcopal Address

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

The first words of this Address shall be concerning those associated with us in the work of the Church, removed by death: One Bishop has gone from us, Right Rev'd William H. Hare, D. D., Apostle to the Indians; consecrated, January 9th, 1893; died, October 23rd, 1909; one of the noblest and most devoted of our Missionary Bishops. Let the death of Rev'd William R. Huntington, D. D., one of the men of largest out-look in the Church, July 26th, 1909, be recorded.

We all feel, that the Diocese has this year been greatly bereaved. The death of Rev'd Dr. Spencer M. Rice, one of the oldest of our Clergy, was not un-expected. But how shall I express the feeling of sorrow for the removal from us of Rev'd Lewis Cameron, Archdeacon of Newark, Rector of the Church of the Holy Communion, South Orange, closely associated with many forms of Diocesan work, an out-standing man among us whose fellowship and service we expected to have for many years! His death left upon the whole Diocese, not alone upon his Parish and closest friends, a sense of bereavement.

"Some pass and perish with their breath;
He liveth yet and quickeneth,
As scent of roses on the wind
Recalls the bygone summer's day;
He leaves this side the seas of death,
The fragrance of a noble mind:
He dies, but passes not away."

The names of Laymen, many of them officers of Parishes, taken from us make a long list. I know that there are many more of our departed fellow labourers who deserve remembrance to-day; but let these names be called to mind: From the Parish of Grace Church, Orange, Mr. Frank Q. Barstow, and Dr. Thomas S. P. Fitch; from the Vestry of the Church of the Redeemer, Morristown, four: Mr. Alfred R. Whitney, Mr. Albert H. Vernam, Mr. John H. Lidgerwood, Mr. Augustus L. Revere; from St. James', Newark, Mr. Alfred Benjamin; from Grace, Madison, Mr. Charles Hayes, and Mr. Hamilton K. Twombly; from Trinity, Hoboken, Mr. William Plumer; from St. Paul's, Hoboken, Mr. Henry Maxwell, Senior Warden, and for forty years a member of the Vestry; from St. Paul's. Paterson, Dr. William K. Newton, Senior Warden, a former Deputy to the General Convention; from Calvary, Bayonne, Mr. Kenneth McKenzie; from Grace, Jersey City, Mr. William C. Post; from St. Paul's, Newark, Walton S. Howarth. Mr. George Crocker, who gave to the Diocese the beautiful Church at Ramsey.\*

Let me speak briefly of movements in the religious life of the Country. The hearts of men are plainly stirred in a new way by the desire to remove hindrances to unity of action and worship among Christian people. The coming in of more charity and toleration has brought new hopes to those who feel the waste and loss which come through division and discord. The great interest in missionary work is an expression of that feeling, for which we may all be thankful.

<sup>\*</sup> At this point the Convention was bidden to prayer, and appropriate Collects commemorative of the departed were read.

How that greater unity is to be brought about no one may say, but that it is being prepared for, and that it will come by the operation of the Spirit of God we may not doubt. The Church which has not an intelligent and genuine interest in the subject, will be left out of sympathy with one of the great religious movements of the time. The immediate duty is the development of Christian feeling, of charity in judgment, of generous recognition of goodness wherever found.

We must recognize the fact that many things which we greatly value in our Church life are not so regarded by other Christian people, and we must not be over anxious to press our gifts upon them. We are preserving some things, the value of which will appear in the future, more distinctly than to-day. If this Church stands for something positive in the way of definite faith; historic order; reverent worship; serious teaching and discipline, it will be likely to come under suspicion of aloofness and exclusiveness. That is the penalty which must be paid where toleration has run into indifference.

As one looks out upon the world the first impression is, that most people are trying selfishly to get all they can out of this life, making themselves comfortable, thinking too little of those in hard places in life, and not thinking much of things which are eternal and of the life to come. Closer observation and increased knowledge, however, make us know that the longing for the sight of the things which are spiritually discerned, the desire for a hold upon the truth which is unchanging, the love of what is genuine, real and eternally true have not gone out of human life. There were never more than to-day, searching for the deep things of God and desiring to come into a right relation to Him.

We have covered up religion with what is artificial and un-real, obscuring the personal relation to God, which is the heart of religion. There were never more, ready to hear the Church and those who speak for the Church, if men may feel that they who speak have been in the presence of God and have a commission from Him. The world is waiting for the message in the name of Christ and His Church from men whose lips God has touched.

The last year, as regards public affairs, has been one of great discouragement; lightened somewhat by the discovery of the power of public-opinion to reach and expose evil doers. We have been in the midst of investigations and exposures of unfaithful public servants for a long time. Any foreigner reading our news papers, even the least sensational of them, would conclude that our National Congress, our State Legislatures, our Municipal Councils are filled with men who have gained their positions by purchase—or something nearly as bad—in order to use them for selfish purposes. That is the impression which we give to the world through our own publications and not a hostile criticism from without. That is the conclusion that might fairly be drawn from what we say about ourselves.

It is not a true representation of our men in public life, for many of them are thoroughly honest with full appreciation of their responsibility. Unqualified and sweeping condemnation is unwarranted, while there is full enough to make us ashamed and anxious about the future. Too many men are in high places simply because they have had the money to reach those places; with no other apparent qualifications. Too many men are in control of public affairs for a selfish end, having schemed and planned to

win their places, not waiting to be called into the service of the people.

The out-come is a general feeling of suspicion and distrust as regards many, if not most, of our public men. It is not true that "every man has his price," but it is true that improper influences shape the making and the execution of the laws. A great number of our public men have not the respect of their fellow-citizens because they are not believed unselfish and thoroughly honest. There is a kind of hopeless feeling as to the ability to discover and put into office strong and true men, who will perform their duties with the sense of public responsibility. There is a feeling that representative government, which lifted the great nations out of the power of a few privileged people, corrected great abuses, and gave us personal, civil and religious liberty, is failing to meet the conditions of the new time. Distrust of representative government because of the inability to find faithful public servants to administer it is a very serious matter. Municipal administration has been our greatest failure in this Country, and through commissions and other experiments men are trying to guard our cities from being looted under the form of law by men who care more for themselves than for the public good. We draw near that dangerous point, where men accept dishonest administration as the rule and cease trying to discover and punish ill-doers; where in our easy-going way we make a jest of political trading and distribution of patronage, and admire shrewdness and do not let men suffer for betraying their trusts.

Meanwhile, men go on making money, or trying to make money, building and adorning great houses, living in luxury, glad of the ability to make display above their neighbors and paying little attention to the public interests. Many of our prosperous men are among the worst citizens we have, because content in their selfish ease and prosperity they do not use their means and their influence to correct the abuses which disgrace the Country and eat out its life. In political influence a saloon-keeper goes far beyond many a business or professional man of the highest position.

Not long ago we had very bitter political contests with great excitement of feeling, but there were real issues and great questions involved. Some have been disposed to congratulation because of late there has been less of the old excitement and hard feeling, but I discover that the men who manage our politics have great business and commercial interests in common which quite over-shadow political considerations, and election contests. The old political contests in an election which involved certain principles of government or administration were better than the manipulation and scheming of these later days, in which it is hard for us, who simply wish economical and good government, to find out whether the candidates presented to us stand for anything except their own selfish ends.

It is not for the Church, nor those set to teach in her name, to discuss political questions, to bring the Church into relation with any political party or movement, to be indiscriminate in denunciation of our public men. But, we ought not quietly to accept this present drift in public life, and let the standard of public duty be lowered, without an appeal to our laymen to remember their public duty and not to become engrossed in business or selfish ease, while things go wrong in the State. Good men will be ashamed to prosper while the tone of public life in State or City is lowered and selfish scheming men take possession. There

are two hopeful weapons in this warfare to which all good men are called: publicity and political independence.

I observe that many of our public men dislike the news papers and the publicity which they give. They are doubtless irritating at times and their inaccuracy often offends us; but how abuses would be exposed and a good many men kept honest without the news papers. I do not know. The safe course for all, whether in the Church or in public affairs, is to do nothing which we would not like to have found out. Publicity might go even further than it does with advantage, and let us know the names of the officers and managers of companies who abuse us, and purchase legislation and municipal councils, that public opinion might get at them and force them to be honest or to hide them-Political independence also is to be desired, the despair of the political machine, giving us men upon whom the party obligations rest so lightly that they can afford to antagonize corrupt men and to throw their influence for the best men attainable.

The old political issues are largely dead, even those about which there was the most intense feeling. It is largely a scramble for office now, but good men must work together to call the best men into the service of the City and the State. Our duty as ministers in the Church of God is to try to make good Christians of all our people, for the good Christian cannot be a bad citizen, and good men who love righteousness, and truth, and justice must fight to establish the great Christian principles; although, it may mean the sacrifice of their ease and the doing of that which is unpleasant. And let no one say, that because the Apostles and the first Christian Disciples did not agitate against Herod and Pilate in Jerusalem, or against Nero in Rome,

that the Church should not have part in agitation for a higher political life to-day, for there is no possible resemblance between the times and the Countries.

The financial record of the Diocese as it will be presented to you by the Treasurer is favorable; the new Financial Plans adopted a year ago have worked well. The Board of Adjustment has fitted into the needs of the Diocese, removing misunderstandings, making opportunity to hear appeals from parishes for relief or revision of assessments. Many arrears have been settled and the parishes have shown very good feeling concerning their diocesan assessments. Our affairs are managed in a very business-like way, and the thanks of the Diocese are due, first of all to the Treasurer, Col. Edwin A. Stevens; to the members of the Committee on Finance, and the Board of Adjustment.

Many of us who have been greatly interested in Diocesan Missions and Church Extension have the feeling that a paid Archdeacon or Diocesan Missionary, with closer oversight of the Missions than the Bishop can give; watching for opportunities for Church Extension and guiding new undertakings wisely, would be of great service to the Diocese. Many of us also feel that it will be wise to enlarge the work of the Board of Diocesan Missions; calling it the "Board of Missions and Church Extension," and increasing the number of its members that it may be representative of all parts of the Diocese; giving to it authority to buy land for church purposes and to assist in the building of churches, rectories and parish houses, as well as making the appropriations for the salaries of our missionaries.

We have made gains during the year in the extension of our work, in the opening of St. Mary's Church, Ridgefield Park; Grace Church, Westwood; Grace Church, Wortendyke; St. Stephen's, Jersey City; in the re-opening of Holy Innocents' Church on Orange Mountain, after it had been closed for fourteen years and had fallen into ruin; in the new church building at Grandview, nearly completed, the memorial of Arthur S. Mann our missionary in China, who lost his life in trying to save the life of his friend and fellow-missionary. The great tower of St. Peter's, Morristown, is finished.

New rectories have been built for St. John's, West Hoboken; St. John's, Bayonne; and for the Church of the Holy Cross, Jersey City. New rectories have been purchased for Grace, Orange; and for St. John's, Jersey City. Land has been given for a rectory at Grantwood which will probably soon be built; other parishes are taking similar work in hand.

Land has been bought for the new Church of the Epiphany, Orange; at Upper Montclair for the enlargement of the parish house. Church debts have been paid, at Bloomfield making the consecration of the church on the 50th anniversary of the organization of the parish possible in the present month; and at Christ Church, Short Hills. The Easter offerings at St. Paul's, Englewood, provided for a large part of the debt upon the Parish and give good hope of the removal of the whole debt within the coming year. Other parishes are planning in a definite way for the removal of debts contracted in building their churches. A parish house at Holy Cross Church, Jersey City, has been provided; St. Paul's, East Orange, has been enlarged to provide for its Sunday school and its work. The Trinity, Newark, parish house is begun. In several

of the parishes, notably Belleville, Arlington, Rutherford, the Pro-Cathedral, Tenafly, Maplewood, and Leonia, the work of providing much needed parish buildings is being pressed. One may gladly record, that all over the Diocese, parishes and missions are planning to free themselves from burdensome debts and to enlarge and strengthen their work. St. Andrew's, Newark, will doubtless soon have a new church on Clinton Hill; and a new church will probably soon stand on land acquired within the limits of St. John's Parish on Forest Hill; plans for St. George's, Maplewood, are being worked out, and there are several other places where new undertakings are under careful consideration. A service has been established at Rochelle Park.

While we ought not to think of building churches for uncertain congregations, and great wisdom is required in spending money and occupying new places, there are several communities in which a church building of very moderate cost ought to be put at once if the Church is not to lose her. opportunity for leadership and service. There are now in the Diocese one hundred and twenty-two (122) churches in which services are regularly maintained, as well as five (5) chapels of institutions; four (4) congregations meet regularly in other buildings, to be soon we hope, established in their own churches. There are fifty-eight (58) rectories. and forty-nine (49) parish buildings built apart from the churches by which they stand. Several other churches provide for their Sunday schools and work in rooms under The number of rectories ought to be the church roof. largely increased by diocesan assistance as well as parochial activity. The possession of a church home for the minister is often the assurance of the permanence of the services and the stability of the work, for house-rent is nearly everywhere in the Diocese a large part of the minister's support.

It is plain that the Diocese must come into closer relation with the parishes in new work within parish boundaries, unless we are to lose opportunities for church extension which can never be regained. Parishes are naturally indisposed to allow a diocesan mission to come within their recognized boundaries, but it will not do to allow communities remote from parish churches to be lost to the Church, and we must find some way of reaching an understanding.

During the year 1926 persons were confirmed; twelve Priests and six Deacons were ordained; our clergy list May 1st bore one hundred and forty-four names.

The undertaking to raise One Hundred Thousand Dollars as an additional endowment for the support of the Episcopate has been rather left to myself, although, I have to thank a good many of our busiest laymen, not only for their approval of the plan, but for their personal help. It has the approval of as thoughtful laymen and good business-men as there are in the Diocese. I have not this Spring been able to push the work as I desired and purposed, on account of the pressure of other duties. The subscription has reached \$53,000, of which amount about \$26,000, have been paid and safely invested with the approval of the Finance Committee. This amount has been built up mainly by subscriptions in hundreds or thousands of dollars, and there are only about one hundred and fifty (150) subscribers. The subject must be presented to some thousands of our people who can give moderate, if not large subscriptions, without withdrawing support from their parishes. It will be remembered that three years are allowed every subscriber for the payment of his pledge. A large part of the subscription became binding when \$50,000. were

subscribed, but the whole subscription of \$100,000. must be covered to make all the pledges binding. I am told repeatedly, that the laymen of the Diocese will gladly take hold of the raising of the last half of this subscription, but they do not seem to find time to carry out their good pur-It will be a real relief to parishes and set them free to do many things which they ought to do if the large annual taxation for the support of the Episcopate is greatly diminished, or removed, by the building up of the Endowment Find. It is the established order in the Church of England and in our own Church, to provide for the support of the Episcopate through diocesan funds; not leaving this to be added to the assessment upon parishes for many other diocesan obligations. We have been quite behind the old dioceses and many of the new ones, in not having such diocesan funds, and so leaving the parishes free to pay proper salaries to their clergy, to have more clergy at work, and to enlarge their work in one or another way. I have reason to be thankful for the way in which so many of our laymen and church-women have responded to my letters upon this subject. I have good hope to hear from many more of them. I am sure that the completion of the present undertaking will strengthen the Diocese and be felt for good in many ways. The Diocese is the unit of our Church life and the strengthening of the whole means vigor for every part.

In the great need of funds for the purchase of land for future churches, for assistance in building mission churches, parish houses and rectories which have been approved by the diocesan authorities and the Commission on Architecture, there was associated with the plan for the Endowment Fund of the Episcopate, as an alternate choice for

subscribers, the request for the establishment of a Diocesan Fund from which in a business-like way, as in other dioceses, loans could be made at a moderate rate of interest for such forms of church extension as I have named. few of the subscriptions will go this way, but the general feeling has been, that to avoid misunderstanding and complications we should concentrate our attention upon the raising of the \$100,000. Endowment Fund named. lowing out the suggestion of laymen to meet the present needs, "The Bishop's Church Extension Fund" has been established, with the purpose of getting as many persons in the Diocese as possible to promise to give one, two, three, four, or five dollars, or more, when a call is made to build a mission church, parish house, or rectory, the place and cost, etc., of which have been properly approved; no more than five calls to be made in any one year. This is a very simple and practical plan and allows a great many people to have part in it if they are so disposed. A committee has been formed to have charge of it: Mr. Tames Barber of Englewood, Chairman; Mr. Francis Halpin of Montclair, Treasurer; Mr. Henry K. Morgan, Jr., of Morristown. Mr. Richard Stevens of Hoboken, Mr. W. J. Lockwood of Paterson, Mr. Edward O. Stanley of East Orange and Mr. Hugh Hartshorne of Jersey City, serving on the Committee, and other representative men from various parts of the Diocese to be added. This undertaking has grown out of our Church Extension Commission and details will appear in their report. The old way, when such work was to be undertaken, was for the Bishop to give a letter of commendation to be presented all about the Diocese and to busy men in their offices, asking for help. It is much better to build up this Church Extension Fund and to have every

proposed undertaking carefully considered and the work which is most important and pressing done. It ought not to be difficult to build this fund up so that a call for an approved building may be a very substantial sum to be put with the local subscription, and sometimes to be made conditional upon the local subscription. This should not stand in the way of the building up of the Diocesan Fund from which loans may be made as suggested. Such a fund in California, of no great amount, has been loaned and returned several times.

It is a great pleasure to record with the financial prosperity of the Diocese, its best year in this particular, an increase of some \$2,200 above last year at this date, in offerings for the Missions of the Church. The general desire among the parishes to raise their apportionment, or to do the best they can, speaks well for the Diocese, and I think is the assurance of Divine Blessing upon all our undertakings. In sharing with our neighbors our blessings, although they may be in Asia or Africa, we may be more sure of a blessing ourselves. Last year we were asked to give \$21,400, on the general apportionment of the whole Church. The basis upon which the apportionment is made is the average contributions of dioceses for five years. The dioceses are put in groups and the per cent. varies somewhat according to their apparent resources: New York and Pennsylvania making one group with the highest per cent; Newark being classed with Massachusetts, Connecticut, Long Island, and Chicago in the second group. means for us only \$.65 per communicant, not a large request.

The coming year, on account of the enlargement of the Mission work of the Church, requiring about \$1,235,000., the apportionment all about will be increased. We could

well meet what is asked of us without limiting our parochial undertakings and good would come to us from this larger vision and interest in the Kingdom of Christ. Some of the parishes assuming responsibility for the salaries of designated missionaries bring home to their people in a personal way the privilege and responsibility for missionary work. The Diocese has a large number of representatives in the mission field of the Church, for which we ought to be thankful. The Church needs something large to call out her enthusiasm and her strength, to make a sense of unity and high purpose worthy of her, and there is nothing to be named like the preaching of the Gospel and the establishment of the Church in all parts of the world. For ourselves, we need to have large and generous part in this great undertaking.

The series of missionary meetings for men, which have been held about the Diocese during the Winter and Spring. of which a report will be made by the Commission on the Apportionment Plan for General Missions, have accomplished much in giving information and awakening interest. There need be no fear of lack of interest in offerings if only people know the facts about Mission work and are brought to feel that the Extension of the Kingdom of God is the main business of the Church in the world. is no story more interesting than that of Missions or Church Extension. The great movements for the civilization of the nations and the preaching of the Gospel in the last two thousand years, might be told with profit in our churches and to companies of men and women wherever they might be gathered. The evidence of the power of the Religion of the Christ and of the presence of the Spirit of the Christ, is in the story of this work, and in the story of the

lives of men and women connected with it, and much more plainly told, than in many of the elaborate arguments which men put in sermons and books and call evidences of Christianity. We allow people to feel that the Book of the Acts of the Apostles was closed with St. Paul's imprisonment at Rome, but it is being written all the time for those who are willing to read it. We allow people to think that the Day of Pentecost was simply the 50th day after the Resurrection, and the 10th after the Ascension, whereas, it was the opening of the new dispensation of the grace of God in which we are living. Too many of us are with eyes and ears too dull to see and hear how the Spirit of God is fulfilling the promises of the Christ. I think you will find that the prosperity of a Diocese or Parish goes along with its interest in this great Mission work for which the blessed Lord put His Church in the world. The best preaching for a depressed parish which has little more than a name, is preaching upon Foreign Missions.

It is my earnest hope, that the rectors of parishes and the interested laymen, will use the experience and interest which have been gained in a definite way and that another year a similar series of meetings may be arranged, taking advantage of all that we have learned. If our people become tired of appeals, and admonitions and reproaches, they do not become tired of good instruction. It is wise also to put a good foundation of instruction and knowledge under all appeals.

It is a pleasure to record the tendency among the parishes to increase the salaries of the clergy, to meet the increased cost in living. The officers of all the parishes ought to take this subject into consideration. While salaries will be moderate and the clergy everywhere are accepting what is

paid without complaint, freedom from anxiety as regards living expenses is the condition of doing the best work. Many parishes ought to pay their clergy more than they do, and the agitation should go on until our clergy are properly supported. While the offering from the "Under-paid Clergy Fund" voted by the Diocesan Convention was largely overlooked in the parishes, the division of the small amount received gave a little help. I hope that the request will be again made by the Convention, and that it will be more generally heeded.

Our Diocesan Hospitals: St. Barnabas', Newark; and Christ Hospital, Jersey City, do more every year for the relief of the sick and suffering. Their equipment for good work is constantly improved and the Diocese ought to have honest pride in it. They stand in the great centres of the life of the Diocese where great public responsibility for the homeless and the stranger comes to them; a responsibility to be cheerfully accepted. Great anxiety comes every year to those who must provide the means for the support of the hospitals, and it ought to be shared much more widely than it is. We ought to be able in our parishes to gather a large number of moderate or small annual contributions as a regular part of the charitable work of our people. The establishment of many hospitals of a generalcharacter throughout the Diocese, claiming and deserving local support, and the increasing number of charitable undertakings with-draw from the support of our hospitals, which to the honour of the Church have led the way in an uncalculating ministry to those in need. It means much also to have the work of the hospital closely associated with the service of religion.

The family of Archdeacon Cameron have placed in the

care of the Diocese his large and valuable library, as a Memorial of him. It is a gracious act and the books may be made of great service. We all hope that it will find its place in the Diocesan House of the future. It means the establishment of a Diocesan Library, at present in our Diocesan Rooms. I will ask the Convention to appoint a Committee to have charge of the Library, with authority to organize it; to receive gifts of books and care for the same.

There are various organizations in the Diocese so generally accepted and so useful, as to deserve thankful recognition in this Address. "The Woman's Auxiliary" and the Junior Auxiliary have gone on in a vigorous way; the "Girls' Friendly Society," and the "Daughters of the King" are also to be commended for their faithful work; the "Diocesan Men's Club" has had another useful year; the "Brotherhood of St. Andrew" has an established place in the Diocese. I wish that in all our Parishes there might be remembrance each year, in a small if not in a large way, of St. Katharine's Home, Jersey City. Of the work of the Sisters of St. Margaret in St. Barnabas' Hospital, in St. Katharine's Home, and in the Parishes, I would speak of them with the greatest respect, as also the work of the Sisters of St. John Baptist within the Diocese at Ralston.

"The Newark Churchman," our Diocesan paper, has been published regularly, and has continued I think to be a very useful part of our equipment. An agency like this to give information, to keep the record of our Diocesan life, seems necessary.

In many of the Dioceses there is a Commission on the subject of the Social Duty of the Church under the new

conditions made by immigration and the changes in population and new ways of living. While there is often disappointment because of the difficulty in reaching practical results, I think it would be well for us to fall in line and emphasize the new obligation in this particular. It would be a response to the action of the Lambeth Conference of 1908, which declared:

"The social mission and social principles of Christianity should be given a more prominent place in the study and teaching of the Church, both for the clergy and the laity." "The ministry of the laity requires to be more widely recognized, side by side with the ministry of the clergy, in the work, the administration, and the discipline of the Church." "A Committee or organization for social service should be part of the equipment of every diocese, and, as far as practicable, of every parish."

The report from the Cathedral Chapter will be made to you. I have the feeling, that one of the most practical ways in which to lead the Diocese to appreciate the value of the Cathedral idea is to care for the work at the Pro-Cathedral, where there is pressing need of a parish house. The great field in which Christ Church stands is one which the Diocese might properly regard as having a peculiar claim upon it. The Church needs to-day to show its power to minister in and care for the crowded part of our greatest city.

As regards our own Diocese, I hope that it may be true that we have made some gains in respect to Diocesan feeling and interest. It is not easy to make people of the Diocese feel that Diocesan undertakings deserve their support as well as Parochial undertakings. A process of edu-

cation is needed, and they must be made to see the value of organized Diocesan life and work. A few persons give a great deal of time and labor to the Diocese, and it must be our policy to draw more into this service without taking them from the work of their Parishes.

With the field which the Diocese has and the resources, especially in men to be drawn out, we ought to make the Diocese one of the most useful in the Church. Beyond caring for our own field, we ought to do larger things than ever before for general Church work and make the influence of the Diocese greater. Such a well organized, vigorous Diocese is our best contribution to the life of the Church in this Country.

Reports which will be of great interest to those who desire the development of the Diocese, will be made through the Archdeacons and the Chairmen of the Commissions on: Our relation to the Board of Missions; On Religious Education; On Church Extension. The subjects presented in these reports touch the life of the Diocese in the most definite way. So I commend them to your thoughtful consideration. In all discussions and in all elections, the dominant motive should be the good of the Church and the honour of its glorified Head.

# Reports of the Archdeacons

# THE ARCHDEACONRY OF JERSEY CITY.

#### MY DEAR BISHOP:

Conditions are more unsettled in several of the missions than they have been in recent years. This is because of the removal of the faithful men who have been in charge of them. They have been called to other fields of labor, and they have felt constrained to accept the calls. The work in these missions has halted, but only halted. On the other hand, there are other missions which have had resident clergy for the first time. The beneficial results have been immediate and great.

This is eminently true of Grace Chapel, East Rutherford. The Rev'd August Ahrens is the Minister in charge, under the wise direction of the Rev'd Henry M. Ladd, Rector of Rutherford, who has had personal charge since the beginning of the work in 1903. Mr. Ahrens became responsible for the work in Advent of last year. He is doing very faithful and successful work. There have been 14 baptisms; 31 have been confirmed; there are 126 communicants; there are 139 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$550. A very valuable lot, which was purchased for \$2,500, is paid for excepting \$1,000. It is expected that this will be cancelled by December of this present year.

St. Thomas', Lyndhurst, is under the same energetic Minister in charge, and under the same wise leadership. The results have been all that could have been looked for. The Guilds are doing excellent work; a choir has been organized; all are working well for the upbuilding of God's Kingdom. There have been 8 baptisms; 15 were confirmed; there are 64 communicants; there are 63 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$509. There is no debt upon the mission property.

St. Bartholomew's Mission, Hohokus, is under the personal charge of the Rev'd P. C. Pearson, Rector of Christ Church, Ridgewood, and is a Mission of that Parish. Its influence is now beginning to be felt. It is taking firm hold on life, and will be heard from. It is in its day of small things, but the day of larger things is at hand. As it is, there have been 9 baptisms; 3 were confirmed; there are 57 who ought to be communicants; there are 36 in the Sunday School; and the offerings have been \$390.

The good work at the Mission of the Epiphany, Allendale, goes steadily on under the leadership of the Rev'd J. W. Jackson. There is no Mission in the Diocese under more practical and safe management. Very substantial advance has been made the past year. New choir stalls were given at Easter; a payment of \$400 was made on the new organ; the mission property has been kept in excellent repair. The property has increased fully fifty per cent. in value. There have been 8 baptisms; Confirmation will be in June; there are 95 communicants; there are 97 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$1,132.

St. John's Mission, Ramsey, is under the same able and successful leadership. The beautiful mission property is kept in excellent repair. Some of the most substantial men in the town are represented on its Board of Trustees. There have been 5 baptisms; 7 have been confirmed; there are 70 communicants; there are 72 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$630.

The good work which was being done at Grace Mission, Westwood, by the Rev'd Glenn W. White, Priest in charge, has been halted by the removal of Mr. White. He felt compelled to accept a call elsewhere, and the Mission is without a leader. The very attractive new church building has been in use for more than a year. Only \$1,500 remains unpaid on it. Everything is ready for the coming of a new leader when he is found. Four have been confirmed; there are 50 who ought to be communicants; there are 37 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$420.

All Saints' Mission, Leonia, is feeling the great necessity of enlarging its borders. The imperative need of a suitable parish house is being felt more and more. It has the land, and plenty of it; it needs only the money with which to build. This Mission has done

much in the past upon ventures of faith, backed by good hard work, and it is ready to make another such venture. It is considering raising all the money it can, and borrowing the rest, and building this much needed house; \$1,300 is even now on hand for this purpose. Great good must result from such an addition to the Mission's equipment. The Rev'd Mr. Derby ought to begin at once. There have been 7 baptisms; 3 have been confirmed; there are 116 communicants; there are 69 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$1,507.

St. John's Mission, Nordhoff, is doing its usual steady, reliable, and consistent work. There is nothing of an unusual nature to report. There has been one baptism; 4 were confirmed; there are 63 communicants; there are 69 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$318.

The Mission of the Nativity, Fairview, has barely held its own. The need of a suitable building is greater than ever. The Mission has a lot which is nearly paid for, but the putting up of a building seems more than can be done at present. There have been 2 baptisms; there are 12 communicants; there are 6 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$184.

St. Stephen's Mission, Coytesville, has made some progress in the past year. It has had some losses because of removals; but it has had also some gains. It has good property which is kept in good repair, and on which there is no debt. There have been 5 baptisms; there are 37 communicants; there are 30 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$500.

There has been improvement in the conditions facing St. Agnes' Mission, Lafayette, since the report of last year. The services have been steadily and consistently maintained. That is about all that can be done under the present circumstances. There have been 3 baptisms; 6 were confirmed; there are 90 communicants; there are 75 in the Sunday School.

St. John's Mission, Bergenfield, received a most serious blow when the Rev'd Mr. Henshaw, Rector of Norwood, and Priest in charge, resigned just after Easter. No man in the Diocese did better work in the mission field than Mr. Henshaw. But he re-

ceived a call to larger things and felt it his duty to accept. There have been 19 baptisms; 11 were confirmed; three are 79 communicants; there are 90 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been about \$400.

Holy Innocents' Mission, Garfield, lost its active working head when the Rev'd Mr. Filkins resigned, and became Rector of Calvary Church, Bayonne. The Rev'd Mr. Bentley, Rector of St. John's, Passaic, Priest in charge, has steadily maintained the services, and minimized the loss as much as possible. There have been 5 baptisms; 2 have been confirmed; there are 63 communicants; there are 44 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$580.

St. George's Mission, Passaic, is making ready for a new beginning. It has been accumulating funds for a church building. It has enough on hand to warrant a beginning, and it is hoped that ground for the new building will be broken in the near future. When suitable accommodations are furnished, the Mission will show a vigorous growth. Even as it is, there have been 15 baptisms; 6 have been confirmed; there are 127 communicants; there are 110 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$832. The Rev'd Hugh D. Wilson is the Priest in charge.

St. Peter's Mission, Clifton, is doing well. Nothing unusual transpired during the year. It is steadily laying stronger foundations, and is preparing for the larger work it will soon do. It also is under the personal care of the Rev'd Hugh D. Wilson. There have been 7 baptisms; 4 were confirmed; there are 45 communicants; there are 73 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$760.

The new mission building for Christ Mission, Wortendyke, was formally opened by the Bishop of the Diocese, on the second Sunday in October last. The congregation was so large that many could not even get inside the building. The music was furnished by the choir of St. Paul's Church, Paterson. The Rev'd D. S. Hamilton of St. Paul's, Paterson and the Rev'd P. C. Pearson, of Christ Church, Ridgewood, were present, and took part in the service. Evening services have been maintained by Lay Readers from St. Paul's, Paterson, with an average of 40 in attendance. A suitable building has been given which will be used for guild and

parish purposes. There have been 5 baptisms; there are 30 communicants; there are 40 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$708.

Trinity Mission, Grantwood, has had the best and most promising year in its history. A building lot, 50 ft. by 147 ft., has been given, as a memorial to Mr. John Winterburn, who was everything to the work of the Church in all that section for many years. A rectory will be built on this immediately. Plans are ready, and the work will be begun at once. It will be a building which will be a credit to the Mission and the neighborhood. It will cost \$7,000. This will give the Mission an excellent stone church and a most comfortable rectory. The Diocese is to be congratulated in having a man in the Rev'd Edwin T. Lewis, who can resist flattering calls elsewhere, and who is willing to remain where he is, at least, until the good work he has planned has been accomplished. There have been 9 baptisms; 18 have been confirmed; there are 143 communicants; there are 105 in the Sunday School; the offerings, from all sources, bave been \$3,887. This does not include the value of the lot.

Grace Mission, Grandview, has made distinct progress in the past year. On Sunday, January 2nd, together with the Rev'd Mr. Lewis, Priest in charge, I laid the corner-stone of the Parish House. This is to be known as the Arthur S. Mann House. The building is nearing completion, and is most creditable in every respect. Mr. Lewis has had great trouble in financiering the building. He is compelled to depend upon the generosity of friends who are not of the Mission for the necessary funds. The very best the few Church people of the Mission can do is to help meet current expenses. There is no place in the Diocese where a Mission is needed more. The coming years will repay all that is put into it The stigma of its nick-name, Little Coney Island, will be wiped away and the Church will be strong there. In the meantime the friends of the Church must rally to its support. There have been 7 baptisms; a class is awaiting the coming of the Bishop for Confirmation; there are 31 communicants; there are 48 in the Sunday School; the offerings of the Mission have been \$177; the ladies have raised \$155 more; and I had the great pleasure of securing \$450, making a total of \$782.

Every hope we have had for the success of the good work at the Mission of St. John the Divine, Hasbrouck Heights, is being abundantly realized. The best of feeling prevails. The Mission people are thoroughly united. The Mission has the good will of all. The sum of seven hundred dollars is in hand towards a site for a rectory and parish building. When this becomes one thousand dollars the work of building will begin. The outlook is most encouraging, thanks to the devoted work of the Rev'd Mr. Reddish, Priest in charge. There have been 7 baptisms; 9 have been confirmed; there are 170 communicants; there are 80 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$1,808.

St. Clement's Mission, Hawthorne, is continuing the good work it has been doing ever since Mr. Mawhinney, the very faithful lay reader, took charge under the Rev'd Mr. Dorwart. There is no Mission in the Diocese which is more productive of good results. There have been 14 baptisms; 11 have been confirmed; there are 104 communicants; there are 234 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$725. The Sunday School is the largest of any in the Missions in the Archdeaconry, with but one exception.

The Mission of the Annunciation, Oradell, has had its very best year. The faithful work of the Rev'd Mr. Fair, during the year, resulted in a congregation on Easter-day which crowded the church to its fullest capacity. The offering of the Sunday School, (which numbers only forty-nine scholars, and five officers and teachers) for missions, was \$80.75. This is both remarkable and most commendable. The church property is increasing in value constantly. A fine large lot which was purchased for \$900 a few years ago, is now worth \$3,000. Plans are being perfected for the building of a rectory and parish house. When these are built the plant will be a most valuable one. The spritual work keeps pace with the material gains. There have been 5 baptisms; 10 will be confirmed; there are 100 communicants; there are 54 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$1,700.

There has been no halting in the excellent work done in the Mission of the Good Shepherd, Fort Lee. The Rev'd Mr. McCleary has gone; but the Rev'd Mr. Kirwan has come. He is pressing vigorously on in all good works. A branch of the Woman's Auxil-

iary and a Junior branch of the same, have been organized. They have done substantial work. The church building has been renovated at a cost of \$247; a debt of \$400 has been paid; six memorials were dedicated on Easter-day. The choir was vested for the first time on that day. The apportionment of \$25 has been fully paid; \$20 has been given for Diocesan purposes. A fund is being accumulated for the building of a parish house. The Mission was never in a better condition. There have been 9 baptisms; 10 have been confirmed; there are 163 communicants; there are 97 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$837.

St. Stephen's Mission, Jersey City, is now to be numbered among the solidly established missions of the Diocese. It will soon be applying for admission as a parish if the good work continues as it has begun. I had the great honor of laying the corner-stone of the new chapel building on Sunday, the 26th of September, 1909. The Mission is situated in a rapidly growing portion of the city, and is precisely where it is needed. This is bound to be a strong parish. It is under the fostering care of St. John's Church, Jersey City, yet is in a condition of healthy independence. The Rev'd Mr. Sweet is the Priest in charge. There have been 40 baptisms; 26 have been confirmed; there are 341 communicants; there are 310 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$4,015.

The progress at the Mission of St. Mary the Virgin, Ridgefield Park, has been most substantial and gratifying. The new church building was formally opened by the Bishop on Sunday, July 11th, 1909. It was not wholly finished, but the faithful people were eager to worship in the building they had worked so hard and waited so long for. Since the formal opening the grounds have been graded and walks laid out; new pews and choir stalls placed; and electric lights installed. A handsome altar, of oak, in thorough keeping with the furnishings, has been given by Mr. James Barber, now of Morristown, one of the founders of the Mission, and the first lay reader. All of this interior work has been paid for through the untiring efforts of the devoted congregation, ably led by the Rev'd G. M. Wilkins, Priest in charge. There have been 21 baptisms; 8 have been confirmed; there are 260 communicants; there are 117 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$2,184. Although the Mission has done so much for itself, it has given \$63 to causes, such as missions and Diocesan requirements, outside itself.

St. Paul's Mission, Montvale, has been improved in a very material and substantial manner. It has been presented with complete chancel furniture. This consists of altar, Bishop's chair, credence, and chancel rail with brass standards; it is all in oak and of excellent workmanship. The very best this Mission can do is to keep a firm hold on what it has until the tide of growth in population reaches it. There has been one baptism; there are 20 communicants; there are 31 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$725. The Rev'd H. K. Garnier is Priest in charge.

St. Stephen's Mission, Delawanna, is laying good foundations for future strength. This is its day of small things. The day of larger things is bound to come. It is worked in conjunction with St. George's, Passaic. There have been 3 baptisms; there are 20 communicants; there are 50 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$582.

Although conditions are very unsettled in several of the important missions, the past year has been far and away the best and most fruitful year in the history of the Archdeaconry. There have been 229 baptisms; 188 have been confirmed; there are 2,476 communicants; there are 2,196 in the Sunday Schools; the offerings have been \$26,665.

The Board of Missions appropriated \$4,110 for the work in this Archdeaconry. The above are the returns.

#### THE ARCHDEACONRY OF NEWARK.

To the Right Reverend Edwin S. Lines, D. D.:

Owing to the division of the former Archdeaconry of Newark, this report must necessarily be brief. For, of the eighteen missions formerly included, all but six are now under the charge of the Archdeacon of Morristown, and even of these one is not connected with the Board of Missions, while another is so organized

that it reports directly to you. There are, therefore, but three missions and one parish receiving missionary aid, which call for any detailed comments from me, namely: Ascension, Bloomfield; St. Agnes', Little Falls; St. George's, Vailsburgh, and St. Philip's, Newark.

Ascension, Bloomfield.—There are about eighty families and parts of families associated with this Mission, though several of them have only a nominal connection. During the past year there has been a steady growth in things spiritual and temporal, and the outlook is hopeful. Last January they bought a lot adjoining the church which, added to the original property, gave them a plot 106 x 156 feet. On this property there is a mortgage of \$3,350 at 5 per cent. There are 70 children in the Sunday School, with 9 officers and teachers. During the past year 6 were baptized, and 6 confirmed. The receipts for the year amounted to \$2,068, and the Mission has met all Diocesan obligations as well as its own, and also paid \$15 on the general apportionment. This Mission will soon become self-supporting.

St. George's, Vailsburgh.—This is the last Mission that was started in the Archdeacoury. It was only in January, 1909, that the barn on the church lot was made available for Church use. In fact it was not opened until February. Yet at the Convention a year ago the Missionary reported that there were 55 families and parts of families in connection with the Mission; 37 communicants; and 59 Sunday School scholars, with 6 officers and teachers. The Mission has one of the best locations in the Diocese for work, for it is in a rapidly growing section of Newark. The present quarters, however, are too small to admit of much increase in attendance, and the lot adjoining should be secured to meet the further need. Just to the North of the Mission there is a huge section which is being boomed by two land companies, and a few years will show great improvement in that neighborhood.

St. Agnes', Little Falls.—This is a large and flourishing Mission. There are 87 families and parts of families, with a total of 246 persons connected with it. There have been 7 baptisms; 17 have been confirmed; and the present number of communicants is 93. There are 75 pupils in the Sunday School, with 10 officers and teachers;

and the total of offerings during the past year was \$1,790.15. The Mission has a substantial stone church and contributes to General as well as Diocesan Missions, and is in a fair way to become self-supporting at an early date.

St. Philip's, Newark.—The report for the year is very favorable. Twelve have been baptized, and 11 confirmed, and there are 300 communicants. There are 104 pupils in the Sunday School, with 10 officers and teachers. St. Philip's gave \$30 to General Missions, and \$45 to Diocesan objects, and the total of its offerings was \$1,300.

This is a brief report, but its very brevity serves to illustrate strikingly the inadequacy of our missionary work. For here in this huge County of Essex, including the great City of Newark and the populous towns of the Oranges, Montclair, Bloomfield and Glen Ridge, and in this whole section there are only nine missions, even counting two that are parochial, and two more that are practically parishes, and one that is independent of the Board, though not parochial; and the only mission which has been started in this whole section by the Board in years is St. George's, Vailsburgh. We ought to be doing far more in Essex County and especially in the great centres, and we have an excellent opportunity right at the present time in connection with the Pro-Cathedral which is ready to lend itself to such work. It is seeking to accumulate funds for the erection of a much needed parish house for this purpose, and plans to have ready for distribution at this Convention copies of a folder descriptive of the conditions and needs of the locality. It is also considering the possibility of undertaking work among the Italians, and hopes that the Pro-Cathedral may become the centre of some of the missionary work of the Diocese. I sincerely trust that it may, and feel that the Pro-Cathedral Mission makes a strong appeal to the Diocese because it means that we are attacking the missionary problem in the City; and I hope that, during the coming year, we may see work started, not only there, but in other of our rapidly growing centres. For this, of course, we shall need greater offerings, but the success of the missionary meetings for laymen leads me to believe that, if we plan wisely and tell our people plainly of the opportunities and needs, the money will be forthcoming.

In conclusion it is gratifying to be able to record the re-opening of Holy Innocents', at St. Cloud, on Sunday last, May 22d, as a Diocesan Mission.

#### THE ARCHDEACONRY OF MORRISTOWN.

To the Right Reverend Edwin S. Lines, D. D.:

The influence of the late Archdeacon Cameron in the missions of Morris, Warren, and Sussex Counties, now comprising the Archdeaconry of Morristown, has enhanced the value and power of our missions in Diocesan life. An indication of this has come to us in the Archdeaconry meetings which have been held.

Our report must necessarily deal with statistics, and yet, these are not a full indication of much of the good work being done. Ministrations to the sick and dying, and to those into whose homes the troubles of life come, and even to many whose ways of life lie apart from the Church, demand time and thought and consecrated service on the part of those who, in charge of the missions, in a true self-sacrificing way discharge the duties devolving upon them. Many a consecrated life strong in spiritual grace is carrying the heart-breaking burdens which come through the missions of the Church, and the value of such isolated and noble service cannot be counted in dollars or by numbers.

The lonely Priest, or Deacon, or layman, standing loyally at the outposts and far away stations of the Diocese deserves and should have the support and sympathy and prayers of every member of this Convention and of the Diocese. This in itself would be a worthy memorial of the love and earnestness bestowed upon our missions by our late beloved Archdeacon Cameron, whose beautiful life, consecrated to the work of God's Church, has been taken from us: but his spiritual presence is still with the saintly souls who are perpetuating the work of the missions that he loved so well.

Some of the modern methods of living, and the way in which many children are educated and brought up, become a defence against the faith and practice of the Christian religion. On the other hand, new conceptions of life have brought the Church before the world in a stronger light. This is true in our mission congregations. The business interests of great centres are reaching farther out into suburban life, and the example of great leaders in the Church is being studied and followed more than ever in far distant communities. The district composing the Archdeaconry of Morristown a few years ago was wholly rural, now it is suburban, and the missions now established and those which are to be, will find in years to come larger communities in which to minister, and a greater self-reliance and self-support. We as a Diocese need but be patient and continue to be helpful until these children of the Church become strong enough to walk alone.

In the meantime we are bearing witness in many communities, and ministering to numbers of souls who need, and should have the true and complete faith that the Church is commissioned to give. Every mission, in the Archdeaconry, whether strong or weak, is a standing witness for this very important testimony in our modern life of today.

St. Peter's, at Mt. Arlington, in Morris County, has been ministered to by Mr. Harry Watson, a lay reader, who has done faithful and devotional work. The population here is increasing and the Church will be stronger.

There should be another mission on the opposite side of Lake Hopatcong.

St. Paul's, Butler, has continued its work and services; lay readers saying the services. Here there are a number of excellent Church workers who are deeply interested; and it is hoped that in a short time one who has recently been ordained will be in charge of the Mission.

The Rev'd Levi Johnston continues the charge of St. Mark's, Mendham, and the services and other ministrations are carried on without intermission

The Rev'd George H. Young is doing faithful, earnest work

in the Parish, Zion, Belvidere; at St. Luke's, Hope; and St. James', (Knowlton), Delaware.

Lay Readers from the General Theological Seminary have been reading services at St. Peter's, Washington, and the Reverend Dr. Darnell of Easton, Pa., has celebrated the Holy Eucharist as often as could be. The end of September, this mission will have a Deacon in charge.

St. Luke's, Phillipsburgh, which is a Parish, in charge of the Rev'd Arthur W. Shaw, has a large and expensive property to maintain, and the proximity of the City of Easton is some hindrance to the work here.

The Rev'd Wm. M. Mitcham, ministers to the Missions, St. James', Hackettstown, and Christ Church, Stanhope, in both of which places there is little in the way of change of population, and the work is continued with encouraging success. The private demands are many.

The Rev'd J. W. Van Ingen has continued the services and work at St. Paul's Mission, Chatham; good work is being done here, and the church building has been consecrated, the property having been freed from all incumbrance.

The Mission at Millington has been cared for largely by the services being read by lay readers. The Rev'd Edgar Eugene Brooks has celebrated the Holy Eucharist.

The Rev'd J. Arthur Glasier, who has charge of St. Thomas', Vernon, and The Good Shepherd, Hamburgh, is meeting with success in these places. The women at Vernon have had special interest in the Sunday School and Church; and the men of the congregation have had the Church re-decorated and painted. The people are loyal and enthusiastic, and an increase in population would make the mission at Vernon a very useful one.

It is proposed to build a memorial parish house at Hamburgh as a thank-offering for the work of the Rev'd Joseph H. Smith, Priestin-charge for a score of years.

This Mission has been visited by a number of prominent speakers during the year, and the addresses have created new interest in the Church. If our City Rectors could and would visit the mission congregations from time to time, it would create a wider interest, and add greatly to the effectiveness of Church extension work in the whole Diocese.

### GENERAL STATEMENT.

The Archdeaconry of Morristown has fourteen mission stations, and four or five more are needed.

There are in these Missions 725 communicants; 68 persons have been baptized; 21 persons have been confirmed; 35 persons have been buried; 33 marriages solemnized; 43 sick communions have been given. The average attendance at services has been about 400. Total offerings, \$7,742.38.

The rectory is now completed, at a cost of \$8,500, the balance being secured by mortgage. This year the mortgage on the church has been reduced \$700.

#### FORTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

#### OF THE

### TRUSTEES OF THE HOSPITAL OF ST. BARNABAS.

The Trustees of the Hospital of St. Barnabas report that at the end of the year, May 1, 1910, through the efficient and helpful cooperation of many workers and friends of the Hospital, they find conditions very satisfactory and encouraging.

The Endowment Fund now amounts to \$146,977, as against \$130,000 reported last year. Of this amount \$139,430 has been invested. The increase in the Endowment is mainly due to legacies received from various sources.

The Treasurer's accounts show that he received from all sources, including last year's balance of \$4,525.68, the sum of \$40,603.27. The expenditures have amounted to \$39,278.89, leaving a balance on hand of \$1,323.38. The accounts show that, financially,

the year has been a prosperous one, in that, but for a large expenditure which was necessary for repairs and improvements, all the outstanding bills amounting to about \$5,000, would have been paid and a good balance left over. Repairs and improvements have amounted to \$6,698.12. In our last Report we called attention to the need of certain specified improvements requiring the outlay of "several thousand dollars." The more urgent of these have been attended to, namely: New plumbing and tiled floors and walls in the bath rooms of the three wards; balconies for the comfort of the ward patients; enlargement of the dumb waiter connected with the wards; and the installation of electric wires and fixtures throughout the Hospital building. Other repairs and improvements, some of which were mentioned in our last Report, are urgently needed and should be made during the coming twelve months. These will necessarily occasion large expenditure, but they are needed for the due care of buildings and grounds, and for proper equipment. Already, greatly increased efficiency, and comfort to the patients have amply justified the labor and expense which these improvements have entailed. We hope that our friends will show their appreciation of what has been done by carnest co-operation with us in the accomplishment of the things that remain.

The Sisters, to whom the Trustees are grateful for their long-continued and unremitting labors, report, that during the year 1,049 patients have been admitted, of whom 615 were free and 434 pay patients. This is a larger number of indoor patients than were treated in any former year, and this is the more notable from the fact that both the men's and women's wards had to be closed for a few weeks while the alterations in the toilet rooms were being made. The number of patients treated in private rooms was 174. The number of patients remaining under treatment on April 1st, the date to which the statistics were made up, was 51. The number discharged was 893, and of those who died 103. The total number of patients in the out-door clinic was 5,925, which is 551 more than last year.

The Superintendent of the Training School for Nurses has sent to the Board of Trustees her report of the fourteenth year of the School, which shows it to be in good condition. The total number of pupil nurses during the year was 19 and of probationers 4. The number in the Class which will graduate on Tuesday, the seventeenth instant, is 5.

We are happy to report that the Bishop Starkey Fund has been completed. An endowed bed in memory of the late Bishop has been set apart next to that in memory of Bishop Odenheimer, and the Trustees will shortly place over it a suitable tablet.

As in past years, the Guild of the Hospital of St. Barnabas and St. Catherine's Guild have labored faithfully and successfully in furtherance of the well-being of the Hospital. The Hospital Review has gone and still goes out on its errand every month, spreading abroad the good name of this Institution, and helping it financially. To the Sisters, the Medical Staff, the Nurses, and all others who have in any way contributed to the well-being of the Hospital of St. Barnabas, we extend our sincere thanks.

#### THIRTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT

## COUNCIL OF CHRIST HOSPITAL

JERSEY CITY, N. J.

For the year ending December 31st, 1909.

The Thirty-sixth Annual Report of the Council of Christ Hospital is herewith respectfully submitted.

The past year has been one of mingled anxiety and encouragement.

The expenditures have been unusually large. The receipts have not met them by \$12,000. The greatest care has been taken in the management of the Hospital. Repeated and persistent efforts have been made to reduce expenses. Close examination has shown that there is no leakage, yet the expenditures have been very large.

There are reasons for this. Every householder and housewife knows that there come times when everything seems to be going to pieces. Repairs and improvements are necessary. Delay in making them would be much more expensive in the end. That has been ture with the Hospital. It is especially true of the Nurses' Home. It was sadly in need of many repairs.

The hard working nurses were entitled to at least a comfortable home.

The building is now in excellent condition. A good friend of the Hospital is contemplating putting a complete heating and electric lighting plant in the Home. May his generous heart never grow less. The Hospital building is also in excellent repair.

The cost of living has increased greatly. Prices of all kinds are far and away beyond what they were five years ago. It is next to impossible to economize here. Patients must have the best of everything. They must have the best food; the best care; the best medical and surgical supplies. To cheapen expenditures here would be to endanger the lives of the patients and to cripple the purposes for which the Hospital is.

The enlargement of the Daisy Ward, involving the care of many more children, has been the cause of much of the increase in ex-

penditure. As a rule it costs more to care for a baby than to care for an adult, yet there is not one of us who would reduce the number of children admitted in the slightest degree.

These, and many other things, have been sources of great anxiety.

On the other hand, there has been much to encourage us. Friends are being made constantly. The Hospital has an increasing reputation for careful and skillful work. The people of this portion of the State seldom go to New York City for operations. They come here. Substantial recognition of this is being made. Since the last report Mrs. Fannie Mogg, of West Hoboken, has died and has left a legacy to the Hospital which will net us about \$10,000. Mrs. K. Lawson, of Jersey City, has left us about \$5,000. Our honored associate in the Council, Mr. Harry Louderbough, so recently taken from us, has left us \$1,000. Miss Switzer, a parishioner of the Church of the Transfiguration, New York City, through her rector, the Rev'd Dr. George C. Houghton, has given \$3,000 for the endowment of a bed as a loving memorial to a deceased sister. These, and many other substantial recognitions of the good work done here, are being made.

The greatest encouragement, however, is found in the amount and character of the work done. The past year has been far and away the greatest in the history of the Hospital.

#### THE HOSPITAL WORK FOR THE YEAR.

There have been 6,949 patients treated in all departments, as against 6,432 for the year of 1908, a gain of 517.

There have been 2,218 patients in the Hospital proper, as against 1,873 last year.

There have been 1,924 in the eye, ear, nose and throat department, as against 1,704 in 1908.

There have been 2,807 in other dispensary departments, as against 2,855 in 1908.

This very large increase in the amount of work done is one of the chief causes of the large increase of expenditures. One of the most zealous workers for the Hospital, realizing how much greater the expenditures were than the receipts, moved in one of the meetings of the Executive Committee, that the amount of work done in the Hospital should be cut down, that fewer patients should be received. It was refreshing to know that it was laid upon the table by a strong vote.

The solution of our difficulty is not to be found in reducing the amount of work done in the Hospital; it is to be found in increasing the income until receipts and expenditures at least equal each other.

Mr. Hugh Roberts, Chairman of the Finance Committee, has found the true solution. He is raising a large sum in annual subscriptions. He is doing this unceasingly. He carries the welfare of this Hospital in his heart constantly. At the last meeting of the Finance Committee he reported that the sum so raised and pledged was \$6,925. He has only made a good beginning; he is going right on with it until he bridges the difference between expenditures and receipts. This course is strongly and warmly commended to every other member of this Council; especially to those who are alarmed by the growing deficiency in the current expense account. If half a dozen other men would go into this matter in the same way there would be no deficiency. The ordinary receipts of the Hospital never can meet the expenditures. They never ought to. When fully sixty per cent. of the work is free work; when only a small per cent. is full pay work, it is easily to be seen that there must be a deficiency. Mr. Roberts is leading the way in meeting the deficiency.

#### THE FINANCES.

The receipts have been \$51,850, as against \$49,709 in 1908. This is all the more gratifying, as none of this is because of some special effort. There was no Carnival, no Tag Day, as in 1908.

The receipts have come in a straightforward way. A few items in the total of receipts are of especial interest. Donations were \$11,731, as against \$4,621 in the preceding year, of this, \$5,000 came as a donation from Mrs. Robert L. Stevens. From private patients in private rooms, \$18,421. From patients in the public wards,

\$9,737. The Superintendent is extremely tactful and successful in this.

The expenditures have been, in round figures, \$12,000 more than the receipts. Nearly \$6,000 has been expended in necessary repairs and improvements.

This, with a deficiency carried over from the preceding year, makes the current expense deficiency about \$26,000. This sobering fact should not discourage us. It sould only stimulate us to renewed and increased effort.

#### THE TRAINING SCHOOL.

The connection between the efficiency of the Training School for Nurses and the work of the Hospital is close and vital.

The best work cannot be done unless we have the best nurses. The day of large doses of medicine is passing; the day of the trained nurse is at hand.

It is much to be regretted that the Superintendent of Nurses is so pressed with work in operating room and wards that she cannot give the time she would like to give to the scientific training of the nurses, to lectures, etc. An assistant in this department is needed to relieve the Superintendent of the one branch of work that she may give more time to the other.

Grateful thanks are extended to the Medical and Surgical Staff for their care of sick nurses, and for instructive and helpful lectures to the nurses; to Mr. J. Hull Browning for his generous gift of medals to the graduating class; to Dr. Chambers for much instructive reading matter, and to Dr. Charles De Merritt for valuable courses in Anatomy and Physiology.

There are 28 pupil nurses in the school and 6 probationers; a total of 34. Ten nurses were graduated. The need for a larger, better Nurses' Home is as great as ever.

#### THE GUILDS.

The interest of the Guilds remains unabated. The work done by them is an inspiration to us all. The value of their work to the Hospital is not in money only, although that is great, it is in the good will shown. They make friends for the Hospital and keep them.

The Abercrombie Guild is steadily at work increasing the Endowment Fund. It is adding to it year by year. This fund must be increased until its income is sufficient to meet all deficiences. It has paid to the Treasurer for current expenses, \$3,231, as against \$3,045 in 1908.

The chief agency is still that remarkable little sheet. "The Daisy." No other person could have made it as increasingly interesting and successful as Miss Mary C. Barry.

St Mary's Guild has had the very best year in its existence. It has given \$2,500 towards the reduction of the mortgage indebtedness; it has given \$1,000 on interest account; it has given \$250 towards current expenses; \$125 for paint and linen; these, with smaller items, make a total of \$4,000, as against \$3,500 in 1908. In the past eight years it has given \$20,000 to the Hospital.

Christ Hospital Guild of Hoboken is still the steadfast friend of the Hospital. It has an eye single to but one end: that is to help the Superintendent in such details as are constantly arising. No other agency gives such immediate comfort to the Superintendent as this. It has given \$610 in the past year for such necessary articles as sheets, pillow cases, bed spreads, towels, etc., etc.

As Treasurer of the Abercrombie Memorial Fund, Miss Cornelia Barry has been very successful in the past year. She has reduced the mortgage indebtedness by \$3,000, as against \$2,000 in 1908. This debt stands now at \$21,000, as against \$40,000 a few years ago.

#### THE BENEVOLENCE COMMITTEE.

There is a Benevolence Committee, consisting of Mr. Wm. G. Bumsted and Mr. J. W. Rufus Besson, two eminent lawyers and members of the Council of the Hospital.

The purpose of this Committee is to put themselves in touch with all lawyers and friends and urge them to remember the Hospital when wills are being made. This can be a fruitful agency if pressed constantly and energetically.

#### A COMMITTEE ON ENDOWMENT.

There is no such committee now. One is much needed. Great results are possible. A great venture of faith should be made. There should be an endowment of at least \$500,000. This is not impossible. Some of us know now where \$100,000 will come from for this fund in process of time. Vigorous prosecution of this will produce undreamed of results. This is offered as a recommendation.

#### THE WORKING FORCES.

The Council, with its working sub-Committees, such as the Executive, the Finance and the Training School, has been faithful to its purpose. The meetings have been well attended, the work has been well done. With such men, and animated with such zeal, there can be no failure. There may be perplexing problems, but they will be inspirations and not discouragements.

The old year ends with a record of the largest and best ever done. The new year opens with glowing possibilities for even larger and better work.

The Medical and Surgical Staff have met all demands upon them with fidelity and great skill. Grateful thanks are given them.

No Hospital is more fortunate in its Superintendents than this. They are women of great ability and efficiency, and make their work a work of love as well as of skill and science.

There is much more which could be said, but which cannot be said here and now; you are referred to the other reports which will accompany this.

Only that great Physician of Souls, in whose name this Hospital stands, knows the untold good which has been done within these walls. Lives, precious to many, have been saved; sufferings which have agonized the fleshly body have been relieved and dispelled; cures have been wrought which seemed impossible, and all has been done in His dear name who "went about doing good."

#### REPORT TO CONVENTION.

This institution is a home for aged men and women and dependent children. At present there are 28 inmates who are supported therein by friends or parishes. There is an endowment fund of nearly \$40,000. The income of the institution is supple-

mented by gifts from the parishes in and about the Oranges. The cost of maintaining an inmate is \$20.00 a month. At present there are vacancies for six men. The institution closes the year without debt. A mortgage of \$1,500, rests upon an adjoining lot which was bought to protect the present plant.

First service held in the City Alms House, March 29, 1878.

Services are held on Sundays and Fridays and the Priest is assisted in maintaining them by a choir of boys. Members of the Society also visit the inmates, and show their sympathetic interest in the care of the poor and the aged and infirm. They provide articles of diet, magazines, and other reading matter.

There are 265 inmates in this asylum. The average attendance of inmates at the services is 125.

This is the only society of Christians regularly engaged in religious and philanthropic work at the Alms House. Its annual meeting is held in the first week in Advent.

The Guild of St. Barnabas for Nurses, now about twenty-five years old, with a membership of about two thousand, is an organization under the control of the Church. It is patterned after an English organization of the same name. The objects of the Guild as stated in its constitution are—
