CANON 1, § II.
OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

(From a Parish.)

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election, in the following form:

[*Name of the Church, the Place, and Date.*]

This certifies that at a meeting of the congregation of this Church, held for the purpose of electing Church Officers, and Deputies, and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, (*or for the purpose of electing Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, if the meeting be for that object alone*), A. B., C. D., and E. F., being communicants of the Church in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Deputies; and B. C., D. E., and F. G., also being communicants in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Alternate Deputies to represent the Parish in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand, (*or if two Wardens subscribe, we have set our hands*), the day and year above written.

N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary sign, then the signatures of *both* Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-in-charge, *or* Missionary, cannot sign.

(From an Organized Mission.)

N. B.—Use the same form and substitute the word "Mission" for "Parish" in three places. The Minister-in-charge; or, the Clerk; or, the Warden may sign.

Memoranda:

Not more than three Deputies are allowed from each Parish, and Mission, not parochial.

Three Alternate Deputies must be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies.

Write Christian names in FULL, and LEGIBLY.

Blank forms will be sent by the Secretary of Convention on or before May first in each year.

Return Certificates of Election at least TEN DAYS before Convention.

Deputies must be *Communicants of the Church, and also qualified voters in the Parish or Mission which elects them.* (See Canon 6, §II. [4], [5] and [6].)

Rules of Order

THE CONVENTION.

1. The Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. The Convention shall meet on the opening day at 10 A. M.; with a recess of one hour between 1 and 2 o'clock.
3. At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
4. At the close of each Convention, the Minutes shall be corrected and approved.
5. The doors of the Convention shall be opened for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
6. All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convention shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall enter the same on the Minutes.
7. Clergymen of other Dioceses, and Candidates for Holy Orders, who may be present, shall be admitted to honorary seats in the Convention on the presentation of their names to the Secretary.
8. When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
9. When any member is about to speak he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
10. No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply,) in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
11. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
12. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate, but any member may appeal from the decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention. The general procedure of the Convention shall be governed, unless otherwise provided for, by the rules of parliamentary practice as set forth in "Robert's Rules of Order."

ELECTIONS.

13. A Committee, consisting of the Bishop, *ex-officio*, one other clergyman and two laymen, to be known as the Committee on Elections and Calendar of Business, shall be appointed at each Convention to prepare the official Ballots, and the Calendar of Business for the next Annual Convention.

The mode of conducting the nominations and elections (annually or when such officers are to be elected) of the Standing Committee, of Deputies to the General Convention, of a Treasurer and Auditing Committee, of a Registrar, of

the Board of Missions and Church Extension (for the retiring class and for vacancies), of four Clerical and four Lay Deputies to the Provincial Synod of the 2d Province, of a member of the Ecclesiastical Court, and of a Lay Assessor and all other elective officers not otherwise provided for, shall be as follows:

Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations must place in the hands of the Committee on Elections and Calendar of Business, in writing, on or before noon of this Tuesday in the week preceding the opening day of the meeting thereof, nominations signed by himself for any or all officers mentioned in the above paragraph. Each nominator must certify to the Elections Committee that the persons nominated by him have consented to the nomination. All names so sent in shall be reported to the Convention by the above mentioned Committee, at the beginning of the opening session, in the form of a ballot, on which the names shall be arranged alphabetically in each class. After each list of nominations as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks may be filled by any voter. The voter shall mark with an X at the right of the name of each person for whom he votes. On the first ballot these ballots only shall be used, and also in all subsequent ballots, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. No ballot shall be counted in its class, on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled, and the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast. The Committee shall also provide a list of the retiring officers above mentioned, and these names shall be printed on the back of the ballots provided by said Committee.

The Secretary of the Convention shall call for nominations in his usual notice of the date and place of the Annual Convention, and shall, in the same notice, advertise the person or persons designated by said Committee, to whom such nominations shall be sent, with mailing addresses.

The members of Convention shall also be requested, in said call, to send to this Committee any canonical amendments or other important items of business that they may purpose to introduce at the next Convention, so that such matters may be assigned a place on the Calendar of Business. This call shall also be annually inserted in the April number of the official magazine of the Diocese, *THE NEWARK CHURCHMAN*.

Balloting shall take place in a separate room when practicable.

The clerical and lay voting lists shall be divided into two sections each.

Supplementary Deputies to the General Convention, and to the Provincial Synod shall be elected immediately after the completion of the election of Deputies thereto.

14. Four or more Election Tellers, clerical and lay, in equal numbers, not necessarily members of the Convention, shall be appointed by the President before an election. They shall receive and canvass all votes cast at any election which is required to be by ballot, and, when such canvass is completed, shall immediately report its result to the Convention. The polls shall be open from eleven o'clock to two o'clock on the opening day.
15. All reports (usually printed in the *JOURNAL*) of officers, committees, commissions, and boards of trustees under control of the Convention, shall be printed and distributed by the Committee on Rules of Order as far as practicable, at least two weeks before the meeting of Convention.

(*Vide*, Standing Resolution on page 27.)

Reports when presented in Convention shall be read by title only, unless reading be required for the better transaction of business.

NEW BUSINESS.

16. All new business introduced, except such as may accompany and form a part of a report of a committee, shall be in the form of a motion or resolution and shall be in writing.

COMMITTEES.

17. All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered. It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Diocese to promptly notify the members of all special committees of their appointment, and to call their attention to the rule requiring reports to be printed and sent to the Rectors and Missionaries two weeks before the meeting of Convention.
18. The Reports of Committees shall be in writing, and when made, shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.

MOTIONS AND THEIR ORDER.

19. No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
20. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone it to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
21. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.

VOTING PRIVILEGES.

22. All questions shall be decided *viva voce*, unless otherwise specially ordered.
23. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote of the Convention shall be taken by Orders, voting separately, and the names shall be entered on the Minutes; and, when a vote is thus taken, a concurrent majority in both Orders shall be necessary to carry any measure.
24. In all elections, those persons only who shall have a majority of the votes given, shall be deemed elected; but if in any case more than the required number of persons shall have a majority of votes, the required number of persons having the highest number of votes shall be deemed elected, and in case of a tie between two or more candidates, there shall be a new ballot.

STANDING RESOLUTION.

Resolved, That the subject of printing and the issuance of reports, pursuant to Rule 15 of the Rules of Order, and the publication of the JOURNAL, and such other printing or publication as may be incident thereto, be referred to the Finance Committee for consideration; with power to supervise, regulate, or to condense the same; and to issue to your Committee or to the Secretary of the Convention such instructions as in the judgment of the Finance Committee will promote greater economy and efficiency in respect to this work.

Tuesday, 18th May, 1915.

9:15 A. M.

The Forty-first Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Newark met at this time and place.

The Right Reverend the Bishop of the Diocese celebrated the Holy Communion; being assisted by the Archdeacons.

At 10:30 o'clock, the President took the chair and proceeded to organize the Convention.

The Secretary reported a constitutional quorum in both Orders.

On motion, the Assistant Secretary was empowered to cast the ballot of Convention for the Rev'd John Keller as Secretary. The election was declared.

The Secretary appointed the Rev'd William T. Lipton as Assistant Secretary.

On motion of the Rev'd John S. Miller, of Committee, the Rules of Order adopted at the last Annual Convention were adopted for this Convention. (*Vide*, page 25.)

It having been reported in the March number of the official magazine of the Diocese, *The Newark Churchman*, that the Rev'd Alexander Mann, D.D., Rector of Trinity Church, Boston, Mass., "in very kindly words wrote of his inability to accept the election," as Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Newark, on motion of the Rev'd John S. Miller, the Special Rules of Order, adopted 26 January, 1915, were adopted for this Convention. (*Vide*, page v.)

The Committee on Elections and Calendar of Business reported a proposed Calendar, which, on motion, was adopted. (*Vide*, page 28.)

The Bishop reappointed the members of the Committee on Rules of Order; and of the Committee on Elections and Calendar of Business. (*Vide*, page 3, *seq.*)

Committees were appointed by the President:

As required by Canon 4, § II, (4.), the Treasurer of the Convention reported "the names of all Parishes and Diocesan Missions that have failed for two successive years to pay the interest due on the Parish bonds, or the sum assessed against such Parish, or Diocesan Mission for Diocesan purposes."

On motion of Mr. Arthur E. Barlow, the Treasurer's communication was referred to the Committee on Rights of Lay Deputies.

The Bishop read his Twelfth Annual Address.

On motion of the Rev'd Otho F. Humphreys, it was

Resolved, That the Convention proceed at twelve o'clock to the election of a Suffragan Bishop.

The Right Reverend the Bishop of the Diocese addressed the Convention on the subject of Episcopal assistance.

On motion, the Convention was bidden to prayer. The Bishop read appropriate prayers.

Mr. William M. Franklin, Chairman, presented the Report of the Finance Committee, which was read by Mr. Jas. Stuart MacKie, Secretary of the Committee. (*Vide*, Appendix III.)

On motion of Mr. Howard Marshall, the first recommendation of the Finance Committee (*Vide*, Appendix III) was adopted.

On motion of the same member, the second recommendation of the Finance Committee (*Vide*, Appendix III) was adopted.

The Bishop reappointed the members of the Committee on Finance. (*Vide*, page 3, *seq.*)

The Rev'd F. Creswick Todd presented the following:

The Committee on the Rights of Lay Deputies reports as follows:

The Committee finds that Article 4, Section 4, subdivision 2, of the Constitution of the Diocese reads as follows:

"In case the Parish or Mission sending such Deputies shall for two successive years have failed to pay to the proper officer its proportion for the support of the Episcopate, either as interest on bonds, or as assessments for the same, together with such sum or sums as may have been assessed or levied upon such Parish or Mission for Diocesan expenses, unless any or all of such interest or assessment shall have been remitted by action of the Convention."

The Committee find that the Parishes and Missions reported by the Treasurer must be debarred from voting in this Convention until "any or all of such interest or assessment shall have been remitted by action of the Convention."

Resolved, That the Finance Committee be asked to consider the question of increasing the bond of the Treasurer of Convention, and the question of obtaining such bond.

Mr. Wm. Read Howe presented and read the Report of the Committee on the Church Pension Fund. (*Vide*, Appendix III.)

The first and second resolutions appended to this Report were moved for adoption, as follows:

Resolved, That in conformity with the legislation adopted by the General Convention of 1913, setting forth the principles upon which pension provision for the clergy of the Church and their dependents should be constructed, pursuant to which the corporation "The Church Pension Fund" has been created to carry these principles into effect, the Diocese of Newark adopts and enters into the system of the Church Pension Fund.

Resolved, That the Committee on the Church Pension Fund be continued, with instructions to report to the next Diocesan Convention a canon to put into operation in the Diocese of Newark the system of the Church Pension Fund simultaneously with its operation in a sufficient number of other Dioceses.

During the discussion, Mr. Monell Sayre, Secretary of the Church Pension Fund, addressed the Convention.

The two resolutions appended to the Report of the Diocesan Committee on the Church Pension Fund were severally adopted; the Committee was continued. (*Vide*, page 3, *seq.*)

On motion of the Rev'd Edmund J. Cleveland, it was

Resolved, That the Committee on the Church Pension Fund be authorized to ascertain by referendum vote, the attitude of each Parish and Mission in the Diocese toward the Church Pension Fund, and to report the tabulated result at the next Convention.

Nominations were made under the Rules for a Committee on Constitution and Canons: The Rev'd Dr. Edwin A. White, the Rev'd Dr. Walker Gwynne, the Rev'd Charles T. Walkley, Mr. Wm. Read Howe, Mr. Charles W. Parker.

On motion, the Secretary was empowered to cast the ballot of the Convention. The election of the Committee on Constitution and Canons was declared.

Mr. Albert G. Hulett presented the Report of the Committee on Luncheons. (*Vide*, Appendix III.)

On motion of the Rev'd Mercer G. Johnston, it was

Resolved, That the subject of providing luncheons at future Conventions be referred to the Finance Committee.

The Rev'd Dr. White, of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, announced that this Committee had nothing to report.

The same member gave notice of a proposed amendment to Article 13 of the Constitution, providing for the election of "such number of Clerical and Lay Deputies as the Diocese shall be entitled to elect under the Ordinances of the Synod," and "a like number of Supplementary Deputies of each Order."

The same member gave notice of a proposed amendment to Article 6 of the Constitution, giving a seat and vote in Convention to "the Bishop Suffragan, when there is one," and the right to preside, etc.

The amendment to Article 4, Section 2, (i) and (ii), of the Constitution, which was approved by the last Convention, (*Vide*, page xvii), was now moved by the Rev'd Dr. White for final adoption.

There being no dissenting votes in either Order, the President declared that the amendment was adopted.

The said Section of the Article now reads as follows:

Sec. 2, (i). Every Presbyter, six months canonically resident in the Diocese, and who, for the same period immediately preceding the meeting of the Convention, has been regularly engaged in parochial work in some Church or Parish in union with this Convention, under the authority of either the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen; or who, for a like period, has been regularly engaged in missionary work in the Diocese under the appointment of the Ecclesiastical Authority; or who, for a like period, has been regularly engaged in work as a Rector, Principal, or Professor in any incorporated literary or theological institution of the Church, or as Chaplain in the Army or Navy of the United States, shall have a seat and vote in the Convention. Other Presbyters, and Deacons, canonically resident in this Diocese, shall be admitted to seats with the right to take part in debates, but shall not have the right to vote nor shall they be eligible to any office in the gift of the Convention.

(ii.) The right to a seat and vote in the Convention shall not be forfeited by any Presbyter canonically resident in the Diocese who, for at least fifteen consecutive years, shall have possessed such right under the provisions of Clause (i) of this Section, or who, after having had such right for five consecutive years, shall, by reason of age or infirmity, be disabled from the performance of the active duties of his ministry.

The Diocese of Newark, in Convention assembled, having acceded to the Bishop's request that a Bishop Suffragan should be elected, desires to renew its pledge of loyalty and affection made at the Convention of last year, and to offer him its congratulations on the Bishop Suffragan elected.

By request, the Secretary put the question. It was adopted by rising vote.

The Bishop acknowledged action of the Convention in a brief address.

The Rev'd Frederick B. Carter presented the Report of the Board of Missions and Church Extension. (*Vide*, Appendix III.)

The Rev'd Albert L. Longley presented the Report of the Committee on the Apportionment for General Missions. (*Vide*, Appendix III.)

The Rev'd Frederick B. Carter presented the Report of the Standing Committee. (*Vide*, Appendix III.)

The same member gave notice that the Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund had "amended the Certificate of Incorporation of the Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, so as to give increased power to the Trustees so as to deal with the Automatic Pension Fund."

The Rev'd Dr. White presented the following:

Resolved, That the Constitution be amended by the addition of a new Article, to be numbered Article 13, and to read as follows:

ARTICLE 13.

Sec. 1. At each Annual Convention immediately preceding a meeting of the Provincial Synod, there shall be elected to represent this Diocese in the Synod, such number of Clerical and Lay Deputies as the Diocese shall be entitled to elect under the Ordinances of the Synod. The voting shall be by ballot, the Clergy and Laity voting by Orders, and a concurrent vote of both Orders shall be necessary to constitute an election. Deputies so chosen shall hold office for one year or until their successors be chosen.

Sec. 2. The Convention at the same time and in the same manner, shall elect a like number of Supplementary Deputies of each Order. It shall be the duty of the Deputies-elect to signify to the Bishop, at least thirty days before the meeting of the Provincial Synod, their acceptance of the appointment and their intention to perform its duties; in default of which, the Bishop shall designate so many of the Supplementary Deputies having the greatest number of votes as shall be necessary, to insure a full representation of the Diocese; and the persons so designated shall have all the power and authority of Deputies duly elected by this Convention. In case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, the power hereby conferred on the Bishop shall be exercised by the Standing Committee.

On motion, the resolution was adopted, and the two sections of the new Article were severally approved; the proposed legislation was approved as a whole by a majority of the Convention.

The same member presented the following:

Resolved, That Article 6 of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

ARTICLE 6.

The Bishop of the Diocese shall have a seat and vote in the Convention, and shall preside at all its meetings. The Bishop Coadjutor, when there is one, shall have a seat and a vote; and in the absence of the Bishop shall preside. The Bishop Suffragan, when there is one, shall have a seat and a vote; and in the absence of the Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor shall preside. In case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, or of the absence of the Bishop, of the Bishop Coadjutor, and of the Bishop Suffragan, the members shall elect a President *pro tempore* from among the Presbyters entitled to vote.

On motion, the resolution was adopted, and this proposed legislation was approved by a majority of the Convention.

To the 41st Annual Convention:

The Secretary respectfully reports that he has attended to the routine duties during the past year, and has given attention to requests for assistance by persons and bodies within and without the Diocese.

On notice from the Bishop of the Diocese the Secretary issued the Call for the adjourned meeting of the Fortieth Annual Convention which was held in Trinity Church, Newark, N. J., on Tuesday, 26 January, 1915, and made the necessary preparations for the special business of that session.

Resolved, That in every case where the plans for Mission buildings offered to the Commission on Church Architecture are considered wholly unfit or incapable of adaptation, the Board of Church Extension is hereby authorized, on the recommendation of the Commission, to pay the sum of \$25 to some competent architect approved

by the Commission, for such preliminary sketches and suggestions as may suffice to enable a local contractor or builder to carry them out in detail; such amount to be deducted from the Board's appropriation.

On motion of the Rev'd Stephen H. Granberry, the appended resolution to the Report of the Commission on Church Architecture was adopted.

The Bishop reappointed the members of the Commission on Church Architecture. (*Vide*, page 3, *seq.*)

The President appointed the Rev'd Edmund J. Cleveland, the Rev'd James A. McCleary, the Rev'd James W. Van Ingen, the Rev'd George D. Hadley, as a Committee to nominate four Clerical Supplementary Deputies to the Provincial Synod; and the Rev'd Henry H. Hadley, Mr. Wm. Fellowes Morgan, Mr. Jas. Steuart MacKie, Mr. Decatur M. Sawyer, as a Committee to nominate four Lay Supplementary Deputies to the Provincial Synod.

The Report of the Board of Religious Education was presented. (*Vide*, Appendix III.)

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Board of Religious Education be authorized to apportion among the several Parishes and Missions of the Diocese, on the basis of current expenses, the sum of \$1,000; (1) to meet the obligations laid upon the Diocese by the enactment of Canon 55 of the General Canons of the Church; and (2) to support the Diocesan Board of Religious Education.

Mr. James E. Bathgate, jr., for the Committee on *The Newark Churchman*, made a report. (*Vide*, Appendix II.)

On motion, the Committee was continued. (*Vide*, page 3, *seq.*)

The Rev'd James W. Van Ingen, for the Committee on Diocesan Library, made a report. (*Vide*, Appendix III.)

On motion, the Committee on Diocesan Library was continued. (*Vide*, page 3, *seq.*)

On motion, the Committee on a Seal for the Diocese was continued. (*Vide*, page 3, *seq.*)

The two Committees appointed to nominate four Clerical and four Lay Supplementary Deputies to the Provincial Synod having reported, the Convention took action, and the President declared the election of the following: The Rev'd Frank B. Reazor, D.D., the Rev'd James W. Van Ingen, the Rev'd Henry B. Todd, the Rev'd Samuel A. Weikert, Mr. Francis H. Holmes, Mr. Theodore D. Gottlieb, Mr. Albert H. Baldwin, Mr. Alexander Luchars.

The President declared that the elections for all offices to be filled by this Convention were completed.

The Rev'd Philemon F. Sturges presented the Report of the Commission on Social Service. (*Vide*, Appendix III.)

The Rev'd Dr. White, for the Committee on a Social Service Canon reported progress, and asked that the subject matter be continued.

The Convention so ordered; the Committee was continued. (*Vide*, page 3, *seq.*)

On motion, the Commission on the Subject of Temperance was continued. (*Vide*, page 3, *seq.*)

On motion, the Committee on Legislation (See Journal, 1914, pages 50, 51) was continued. (*Vide*, page 3, *seq.*)

The Rev'd James A. McCleary presented the Report of the Committee on the One Hundredth Anniversary of the Consecration of the First Bishop of New Jersey. (*Vide*, Appendix III.)

On motion of the same member, it was

Resolved, That this Convention authorizes the expenditure of a sum not exceeding \$50, to be used for publicity and invitations, as requested in the Report of this Committee.

On motion, the Convention ordered that a message of greeting, expressing regret at his absence, be sent to the Rev'd William W. Holley, D.D. (*Vide*, Appendix III.)

On motion, the Convention ordered that a message of sympathy be sent to the family of the late George Stephen Bennett, D.D., and to the family of the late Charles Douglas.

The Assistant Secretary presented the Report of the Committee on the Fortieth Anniversary of the Erection of this Diocese. (*Vide*, Appendix III.)

The Rev'd Philip C. Pearson, for the Committee on Unfinished Business, reported that all matters of business requiring attention at this session had been attended to, except the consideration of the subject of Proportionate Representation, etc., which was postponed at the January meeting.

The Episcopal Address

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

There are many names of brethren in the Ministry, of laymen who have been officers of our Parishes, and of faithful women, which may fittingly be read at the beginning of the Convention.

In the death of the Rev'd George S. Bennitt, D.D., Rector of Grace Church, Jersey City, one of our Clergy holding a peculiar relation to the Diocese, has gone from us. When one speaks of him as a Deputy to the General Convention, President of the Board of Diocesan Missions, and of the Board of Trustees of Christ Hospital, through many years, he has named a few of the services Dr. Bennitt has rendered to the Church and the Diocese. We shall all remember him as one of the most faithful servants the Diocese has had, and his death brings a sense of personal loss to us all. Two of the oldest of our Clergy, well remembered by most of us, have been removed by death: the Rev'd Napoleon Barrows, D.D., for many years Rector of Christ Church, Short Hills; and the Rev'd Charles Douglas, sometime Rector of Zion Church, Belvidere, and of Trinity Church, Paterson. Let these names of former Rectors in the Diocese, who have died within the year, be also spoken: the Rev'd J. S. B. Hodges, a former Rector of Grace Church, Newark; the Rev'd Frank A. Sanborn, a former Rector of St. John's, Boonton, and also of St. John's, Newark; the Rev'd Dr. Clinton H. Weaver, sometime Rector of Christ Church, Pompton; the Rev'd Joseph Peck Robinson, sometime in charge of St. George's, Passaic.

Among the laymen who have gone from us these men will be especially missed: Mr. Richard F. Stevens, Warden of St. George's, Vailsburgh, and a member of the Board of Missions; Mr. Joseph L. Somers, Warden of St. Mark's, Mendham; Mr. J. Hull Browning, for twenty-eight years an officer and great benefactor of Christ Hospital, Jersey City, and many good causes; Mr. William H. Power, one of the founders of St. James' Church, Upper Montclair; Mr. John Edward Taylor, for fifty years an officer of the Church of the Redeemer, Morristown; Mr. John S. Sands of Trinity Church, Arlington; Mr. Alfred Ely of St. Thomas', Vernon; Mr. William L. Anderson, senior Warden of Zion Church, Belvidere; Mr. Thomas H. Johnson, of the Church of the Epiphany, Orange; Mr. William J. Rogers, great benefactor of St. Andrew's, South Orange;

Mr. George W. Staniar, an officer of Christ Church, Belleville; Mr. Henry C. Vance of St. Mark's, Newark; Mr. Arthur Sandys of St. Peter's, Washington; Mr. W. J. Hardy of St. John's, Bayonne.

Let me name also these faithful women: Mrs. Hannibal Goodwin, whose husband was the well remembered Rector of the House of Prayer, Newark, a benefactor of St. Barnabas' Hospital, and many other good causes; Mrs. Wm. Welles Holley of Christ Church, Hackensack; Mrs. Hester L. Graham, for nearly half a century a member of the Church of the Ascension, Jersey City, and a benefactor of the same; Mrs. George Biller, mother of the Bishop of South Dakota.*

We have never met in Convention with the world so full of sorrow and anxiety as today. A great catastrophe in the world's life has come and civilization itself seems breaking down, with all the great nations at war or in danger of being drawn into it. We had proved to our selves, as we thought conclusively, that widespread war could never come again, and there are few more horrible pages in the world's history than the record of the story of the passing year. We can now see that the preparation for this most terrible of wars has been going on for seventy years at least, and we wonder that men who have had the direction of the affairs of great nations could have had so little foresight. It would seem to be as plainly written as anything could be, that national selfishness and greed, disregard of Christian principles in the conduct of national affairs, have brought the war with its unutterable sufferings.

The acceptance of a different moral standard in the relation of Nations, in the affairs of States, from that which is accepted between individuals, will account for what has happened. Deceit, treachery, dishonesty, injustice, have been counted by so-called Christian Nations and their Rulers as proper means of advancing national interests, and the principles of the Christian Religion have not been regarded by Christian men as fitted for the government of States. Patriotism or love of Country has been counted as one of the first of virtues, while consistent with robbing other nations, killing if necessary those who speak a different language, or dwell over on the other side of the border line. Men who have had the destinies of nations in their keeping have sacrificed great principles for immediate advantage, with little thought of the consequences. And now, national disregard of Christian principles has brought retribution. Much that is cheap has passed for love of Country or patriotism which has often been made, as Dr. Johnson said: "the refuge of scoundrels." Christianity has not broken down, but the world's civilization

has broken down, from neglect of Christian teaching, because men who have had regard for it in private life have not had regard for it in public affairs.

The war will run its awful course and end from exhaustion if from no other cause. War means insanity. It has no place in the civilized world, save in self-defence; no virtue nor good can be reached through war which might not be gained in another way. We say now of nearly all wars, that they were not necessary, that wisdom and patience would have prevented them. They have been precipitated by rulers and war lords, and the people who have had to suffer and die have not been consulted. The world will readjust itself and go on, it may be, with a horror of war which will keep the peace for generations to come. This great war will make a dividing line in the world's history, such as our Civil War made in our national history; with a new world to be ordered, with new ideals. All who have glorified war or found in military men their great heroes, the greater the more men they have killed, the more widows and orphans they have made, are responsible for this catastrophe. In our own peace-loving Country, military titles have been a choice possession, greatly desired in candidates for office from the Presidency down, and the children have been brought up to find in military men their great heroes. It may be that when this war ends, with its awful destruction, we shall begin to find our heroes among those who help to save life rather than destroy it, among those who help to make the conditions more favorable for those in hard places; among those who fight unselfishly to correct political, social and industrial abuses, to lighten, if not remove, the inequalities in life, to make the streets and houses where the poor live clean and wholesome, to restrict, if not destroy, the curse of strong drink, to give more people a chance in life and to bring in the Kingdom of God.

The endeavor to apportion the blame for the war, where all have been in some measure responsible, is not the chief duty now. Shame, rather than recrimination, becomes all who have contributed to the forces or influences which have destroyed the world's peace. The final judgment will be made when you and I are gone. The pressing question is the attitude of the Church, and for us, the attitude of this Church, towards that world which is being made through all this contention and suffering. I think we are called to bear witness, whether as Ministers or laymen, alike in teaching and conduct, to the truth, that nations as well as individuals must be guided by Christian principles, by righteousness, mercy and justice; that the thought of the brotherhood of all men of every race or language must transcend narrow nationalism, that national and race hatreds, jealousies and prejudices are not worthy of respect; that men must be honest and just, and merciful in directing the

affairs of the Nation or State, as members of Congress, of State Legislatures, of Municipal Councils, of Corporations; that they must not thrive by the dishonesty or hardness of their agents, that they must feel a new responsibility for what they are and what they have, and that the enemies which they must kill are corruption, and dishonesty, and injustice. This Church through its members, should first give a good example, and then call all right-minded men and women down to the battle. That is the demand of the new time, in a new world, and we may count it a privilege to live and work and contend, about as near to the centre of the world's life, where the currents of life run strongly, where the world's life is influenced, as any place that can be named. That is the great question before this Church,—the Mother-Church of English-speaking people,—and every man and every woman must answer that question and determine what the Church shall stand for and shall do.

It is to be a larger world, with larger outlook and responsibility than ever before, and the Church that is to have influence in it must have a larger vision and purpose than ever before. The Church which is lingering among old controversies, which is discussing small questions, which is breeding men great in small things, which is chiefly concerned in denunciation of the way the world is going, which is out of relation to human life and especially to the great company of the heavily burdened who are doing the world's hard work, has no future. Intelligent and wise leadership, with an understanding of the time, with an appreciation of what is coming, the ability to think in a larger than parochial fashion, are required. The world will never accept the leadership of the Church which is thinking about itself; sensitive about its position, lacking in courage. We are thinking too much about unimportant things and spending our lives upon petty undertakings. We are content to be on the defensive, and a defensive campaign is almost always a failure. We hear a good deal about the need of Church defense. The Church which is alive to its duty and doing with zeal and enthusiasm the work which God gave it, needs no defense! The small talk about Church affairs and the small plans to keep the Church alive, are depressing. We need to be stirred up by the call of the new time to the Church to show what it can do to shape and direct the world's new life. If this Church of ours is to have a great place and mission in the world it must be thinking and planning in a larger way than ever before. Most of us should be ashamed of what we have been doing, and contend as we have never done before for the principles of the Gospel of Jesus Christ in their simplicity and fullness, as an obligation which must be met in every relation in life into which man or woman comes.

This Church has made a larger contribution to the religious life of the Country than is commonly recognized, larger than its membership

would indicate. There is a tendency among us now to take an attitude of protest against the way in which the religious life of the Country is manifesting itself. There is no hope in an attitude like that. A position of protest and criticism is always weak. Timidity never goes with leadership. The Church thinking overmuch of itself, making claims and reminding the world of its ancestry is no more likely to command respect than a man doing the same things. The ability to serve, to make a great contribution to the religious life of the Country, to have large and generous part in shaping the world's life provides the test by which the Church must stand. The religious forces in the world were never stronger than to-day, but they manifest themselves in new ways, and in new ways they must be directed.

Sometimes, perplexed and wearied by what is going on in the world, hardly knowing whither the currents of life are carrying us, we are disposed to turn aside, find a safe anchorage and let the stream run by. Such a course does not become Christian people who believe that the Spirit of God is as mighty in operation to-day as in the beginning. Bringing out of the past that which has abiding authority and value, we must try to get into the guidance of the spiritual forces of the time, not over particular whether they are moving in strict accordance with our ideas or not. There were never more men and women ready to contend for the correction of ancient abuses and wrongs and for the bringing in of the Kingdom of God than to-day. We ought to be wise enough to put this Church into a leading place in that great movement. The Church must be wise and large enough to find expression for the new hopes and the aspirations and desires which are in the hearts of men. The Church which can do that will have a large place in the world. "Men who have understanding of their times to know what Israel ought to do," are greatly needed. Very few of us meet that requirement, and judgment ought to begin at the House of God. The Church is in the world, like its Master, not to condemn the world but to save the world! He could not save Himself, neither can the Church of God. He must lose His life if He would be the world's Saviour, and so must His Church.

Now the way to fill out this vision is in bringing into every parish and congregation, into the life and work of the clergy and people more of the Spirit of God, facing the future with a great spirit and hope, with zeal and courage. The life of each parish ought to be quickened by giving larger place to spiritual forces, putting the emphasis upon the things which are spiritually discerned, making our people know where the real strength of the Church is to be found. We are using expedients to keep the Church alive and forgetting whence its power must come. Some of those expedients and practises to attract attention to the Church in communities are pitiful and unnecessary. Many a church struggling to

live must throw itself back upon the hearts and consciences of its people by definite presentation of its need, by the personal appeal through right-minded men and women who have done their part and so may properly ask others. It is not necessary that so many of our churches should be in their communities objects of pity, beggars and mendicants, using unworthy methods to obtain money from unwilling givers. The remedy lies in making the Church in the community a spiritual power, an institution of so great service that people feel it alike a privilege and a duty to support it. The Clergy have the determination of the place of the Church in the community in their hands; they must lead their people to feel the high privilege of making the Church an influence for good, with larger thought of the opportunities for service in the new time. In too many places the Church is asleep or half-alive, from our own fault, and the condition is only what we deserve. Prejudice against the Church is often named as the reason for its feeble life, and no one who understands the situation can wonder that such prejudice exists. The Church is not presented fairly in many a community and it has no chance to show what it can do. There is no hope for it save through a larger and more generous policy. Life with irregularity is better than death with the utmost regard to good form. There is scriptural authority for saying, that "a living dog is better than a dead lion."

We fail to make the conditions favorable for the Spirit of God to come and do His work in us, and then we wonder that the spiritual life is so unreal, that our religion is without life and power. The same is true about our churches and congregations: we must try to get a new spirit into them, turning away from small expedients to live, and bringing them into closer relation with the sources of spiritual power. If we are to do much as a Church, we must have more of the spirit of unity among ourselves, giving up the small controversies and the magnifying of unimportant matters. The emphasis must be put upon the great truths of the gospel of Jesus Christ, which find a response in the hearts of men whenever they are rightly presented. Religion must become more real to all of us who profess to have entered into its fellowship. The world will have more regard for religion when it finds that the members of the Church have more regard for it. Why should we not all, with full appreciation of the new age upon which the world is entering, determine that we will give the religion of the Christ and His Church a fairer opportunity to show what they can do in our lives and through us in the world? Why not acknowledge, that we have not given our religion and the Church opportunity to show their power, that we have brought ourselves in between Christ and His Church, and the world about us, so that men, seeing what we are, how we live, how poorly we represent the Church, have not been drawn toward it. Why not

cease making claims and arguments and make our lives and the life of the Church give the one argument which is effective? Is it fair to let the life of the Church be so marred by our unspiritual lives as not to command the respect which it deserves?

It is a satisfaction, that in our own Diocese there is greater interest in forms of activity and service which express the true spirit of our religion, and meet the need of the time. There is a new feeling about the place of Missions Work in the effort to win the world for Christ, which is the main business of the Church. Our parishes make the base of supplies for that great Missionary campaign. Our people at home need the inspiration and knowledge of the missionary work, as truly as the people who are ministered to in far away Asia and Africa. The parish or mission church without an interest in this world-wide obligation is not likely to prosper. Mission work is to have new place and importance in that new world of which I am speaking to-day. It is the expression of the sense of brotherhood among all nations and races; it stands against that hard national prejudice and antagonism which has brought on this fearful war. Mission work expresses the large and universal thought of brotherhood which our blessed Lord came to reveal. It will not do for us to think in a parochial or diocesan way alone. We must have world-wide conceptions of the mission of the Church of Christ and of our obligation thereto. This is a part of that new vision which is being realized in the Diocese. Let thanks be given to every man, woman, or child who is helping to lift us out of our narrowness into obedience to the Master's command and true thought of His mission and the mission of His Church to the world.

There is also coming to the Diocese a new thought of the place of Religious Education, through the faithful work of many men and women. Our Church Schools and Sunday Schools, for the instruction of our young people and children, are gaining in definite and orderly instruction and equipment. No part of Church work can be more important than the religious instruction of the young. Strong and busy men who have appreciation of the world's need ought to have part in this work, and ways can surely be found in all our Parishes for those who will help. There is no need that this great work should be restricted after the old manner, to one hour on the Lord's day in the church or parish house. The services of the best men and women we have, on other days, in their own homes, might well be used to try to send into the world a new generation who feel religious and moral obligations, who know that they must not live selfishly trying to get ahead of somebody else in life, taking more of the good things of life for themselves than their fair share, and who know that the life without religion and spiritual development is a barren and hard life. Let there be larger recognition of this en-

deavor, whether in the Diocese or in the whole Church, to put under education, due regard for the religion of the Christ and all that it requires.

The Diocese may have an honest pride in the place which it is taking in the Church in the recognition of Social Service. We are not following others, but are helping to bring into the Church a new spirit of helpfulness and the recognition of the neighbor, which our Lord proclaimed. There will be anxiety lest undue emphasis be placed upon the second part of the summary of the Law, and lest unwise things may be said and unwise things attempted. It is better to hear words not quite warranted and to have mistakes made, than to settle down with the acceptance of wrongs and abuses which the Prophets of God in the old time would not have accepted, neither, I think, our Lord and His Apostles. We must keep the Church out of relation to political movements, which involve the political fortunes of men or economic policies, but we cannot keep the Church out of public questions. Whether by corporate action or through the influence of members of the Church, an interest must be shown and influence exerted upon such questions as: temperance, prison reform, the work of women and children, municipal corruption, tenement houses, the care of dependents in our public institutions—an increasing number—and many like questions. There must be in a well-ordered Diocese some means by which all may be kept in knowledge of these subjects and learn what our duty is, that abuses may be ended. The Church must not take an attitude of indifference to the industrial and social questions of the time. It must stand for justice as well as mercy, and for giving all men and women and children the largest opportunity and the best chance for the development of their lives, as God's children redeemed by one Saviour. "Children have ye any meat?" was the Risen Master's question to the Disciples by the lake. And His question to the Church to-day is like it: "Have you food for the souls of men and women who are hungering and thirsting for the bread and water of life? Have you a message for those who are in hard places in life,—whether through misfortune or sin? Are you finding the Master in the persons of the overlooked and the outcast and the prisoner, and are you ministering to Him?" It is the Master's question to His Church to-day, and woe is to the Christian Church or disciple not trying to give the answer which the Master expects.

Under conditions which never existed in the world before, I make my plea with you to give to the Church a new mission, outlook and vision, in the service of that new world which is coming in the midst of unmeasured anxiety and sorrow; a new world for which the only hope is, that as Prince of Peace and Lord of Love the Christ may reign.

Reports of the Archdeacons

REPORT OF THE ARCHDEACON OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK AND DIOCESAN MISSIONARY.

To the Right Reverend Edwin S. Lines, D.D., Bishop of Newark.

MY DEAR BISHOP:

There are 58 places in the Diocese where mission work is being done, of which, 6 are Parochial Missions, and 4 have only occasional services. In 14 of these places we have not any church building or parish house; this, and the need of Missions in 3 places in our cities, and several in villages, make a large increase in the subscriptions for the Bishop's Church Extension Fund most desirable.

The Board of Missions makes grants of money to assist 10 Parishes, in addition to the sum given for the Missions; but Parochial Missions have not had grants toward their support.

The \$12,000 for which the Convention is asked, this year, is at least 25 per cent. less than what could be easily used for the church extension work of the Diocese; without this additional sum the foreign born population must remain unministered to.

The great and pressing need of this work among thousands of people, from several lands, is conceded, but the demand this year, is somewhat lessened by the great numbers of Italians being recalled, by their government, because of the European War.

The public institutions, our diocesan hospitals included, are being placed in a position of greater usefulness and efficiency, and the inmates and patients are receiving greater care from our Church clergymen. The City Missionary has a wide field of labor in some of these places.

The Missionaries are all devoted to their work, and where several Missions are combined better support can be given and the congregations may be brought together in a helpful way. If the Priest in charge could have an automobile families living at great distances would readily be ministered to. It would seem that the whole Diocese could be wisely covered and cared for in this way; while we could thus enlarge the ministrations it would be quite possible, at the same time, to consolidate the church extension work.

The Diocesan Guild of Lay Readers has rendered some excellent service; the members of this Guild could try out new fields of work until such places could be served by one fully ordained. The Lay Readers give their time and service as a work of love, asking only for their travelling expenses.

The meetings of the four Archdeaconries of the Diocese have been interesting and helpful, and the reports of the Archdeacons will show improvement in their districts.

At West Englewood, Woodridge, and Hawthorne, land has been purchased. In the first two places it is hoped buildings may be erected during the coming year. At Dumont, Glen Rock, Cragmere, and Towaco, buildings are needed. The parish house at North Arlington is almost completed and services are being held in the

building. At East Rutherford an attractive house has been erected for the clergyman. Hasbrouck Heights is planning to move the church building and place it on the rectory lot, that the building may be elevated and the lower story used for parish house purposes. The parish house at Allendale has been enlarged. The congregation of St. David's Mission at Cedar Grove is hoping to erect a building at an early date; the men of this congregation will do a large part of the work. Christ Church, Pro-Cathedral, has received a gift of \$5,000.00 toward a memorial house. A much needed and substantial rectory has been acquired by St. Philip's, Newark. It is hoped we may soon have buildings for the congregations of the Mission of the Incarnation and St. Matthew's, both in Jersey City, and doing unusually good work. A plot of ground has been promised for the church which we contemplate building at Mountain Lakes, near Boonton.

It will be seen by this report that there is a present need for about 12 new buildings, and several more could be used, hence an increase of funds for all Diocesan Missionary purposes would greatly facilitate and extend the work of the Church. Your Archdeacon has attended more than 200 services and has made nearly that many addresses; he has been at 111 meetings, and has kept his 115 special engagements.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF NEWARK.

To the Right Reverend Edwin S. Lines, D.D.

MY DEAR BISHOP:

The report for the year is favorable. The work has been faithfully done; in certain quarters there has been notable progress; and the outlook is bright and encouraging.

ST. AGNES', LITTLE FALLS. Here we have a substantial stone church, on a fine lot, and the property is free and clear. Moreover, the plans are ready for a parish house. Meanwhile, the people have rented a large house, for a nominal sum, which has been entirely renovated, and is used for Sunday School and Guild purposes. Including the work at Cedar Grove, 8 have been baptised and 16 confirmed. The Rev'd Mr. McKay has also ministered to the doctors, nurses, and patients, at the Essex County Hospital. There were 19 services held during the year, 12 of which were celebrations of the Holy Communion. On the Sunday after Christmas, and after Easter Day, the combined choirs of St. Mark's, Paterson, and St. Agnes', Little Falls, numbering over 70 voices, sang special Cantatas at the Hospital. The services there have been remarkably well attended.

ST. DAVID'S, CEDAR GROVE. This deserves special mention because of the progress that has been made. The Rev'd Mr. McKay, who is in charge, says in a recent letter: "The people have raised enough to pay for one lot and are ready to go ahead as soon as the 'Call' is granted. The men will do much of the work themselves and are anxious to get started. We will build the guild hall of concrete, and will have the cellar only two feet in the ground, so we will have two floors. Choir-room, kitchen, and heating plant will be placed here, and the main floor will have a sanctuary at one end which can be closed off by sliding doors. The gabled roof will give a Churchly appearance to the building." The enthusiasm of the people is shown by the fact that they attend in all kinds of weather. Recently I visited the Mission one Sunday evening and, although the service was held right

after a very heavy thunder storm with drenching rain, there was a very good congregation. Ground was broken for the guild hall on Saturday afternoon, May 1st.

ST. JOHN'S, (WOODSIDE), NEWARK. The work here is growing, as indicated by the increased attendance since the last report, at the Morning Service—from 50 to 90; at the Evening Service—from 45 to 60; and at the Sunday School—from 36 to 63. There is a good spirit among the people, owing to the attention paid to the social side of the work, and a desire to help beyond their own borders, St. John's having given, during the past year, some \$70 to General Missions and \$168 to Diocesan Objects. There are 270 communicants; 16 have been baptized and 13 confirmed since last May.

ST. PHILIP'S, NEWARK. St. Philip's has a fine situation on High St., and a property, including church and lot, which is valued at over \$11,000, and a remarkably good rectory, in another excellent location on Orleans Street, which is valued at \$6,300, making a total of \$17,500. The worth of the rectory, moreover, is greater than can be estimated in dollars and cents, for, by providing for the Rector a comfortable and commodious residence, within easy access of the church, it has greatly aided him in his work. The average attendance at the Morning Service has been 115, and good at the Evening Service, considering the fact that it is hard for the people to get to Church twice a day. The average attendance at the Sunday School has been 60. At a recent visit I was impressed by the orderly and reverent character of the School. The number of baptisms has been 31, and 14 were confirmed during the year.

PRO-CATHEDRAL, NEWARK. This yields us one of the most encouraging things that we have to report in the whole Archdeaconry. The crying need here has been for a parish house, for the nature of the work calls loudly for a place in which social activities can be carried on. Two years ago we wrote "As we have said before, all the Pro-Cathedral needs is a parish house to give a chance to take advantage of a singular opportunity. The Vicar has made an earnest plea for that building, and we have heartily seconded it in our previous reports, but it has met with no response, although the situation is such that it would seem as if it must appeal to all who have the missionary interest at heart." Now, however, we are delighted to be able to say that the response has come. From Mrs. Charles H. Skinner, the generous gift of \$5,000 has been received for a parish house and it is expected that the Pro-Cathedral will have this much-needed addition in the near future. There were 14 baptisms during the year and 12 were confirmed. There are about 275 communicants.

ST. ALBAN'S, NEWARK. There are difficulties in the work here, owing to the fact that the neighborhood has so many people who either belong to other Churches or are disinclined to attend any Church. Moreover, the Missionary says that they have been put to great expense in the matter of repairs, and that during the coming Summer more must be done, the Hall being sadly in need of a new roof, and the fire ordinance requiring slate. And, to add to their troubles, many of the people have been out of work practically all Winter. Considering the circumstances, therefore, the Mission makes a very good showing, for the average attendance at the Morning Service has been 90; at the Evening Service 75, and at the Sunday School 120; 19 have been baptized and 26 confirmed; and, notwithstanding the great financial drain upon the Mission, it gave \$60 for Diocesan Objects and \$10 to General Missions.

ST. GEORGE'S, (VAILSBURGH), NEWARK. This is the Mission which was started by Archdeacon Cameron when he was Rector of the Church of the Holy Communion, South Orange, and which was very dear to him. The church-building is small and very inadequate, but the purchase of an extra lot sometime ago, through

the efforts of Mr. Richard F. Stevens, who was then the Warden of the Mission, has given room for a building better suited to the needs, when they can afford it. The Rev'd Charles B. Scovill recently took charge of the work, and he is very enthusiastic about the opportunity afforded by the growing neighborhood, and we expect to see the Mission making decided progress under his zealous efforts. The number of communicants is not large, only about 70, and it is no easy task to meet all the expenses, but the people are interested and ready to do all they can.

THE INCARNATION, AMFERS. The Rev'd Floyd W. Tomkins, jr., resigned last May to take up work in North Carolina. Since then the Rev'd Carolus R. Webb has been in charge. The Mission is in a growing neighborhood and has a fine prospect. It has a very commodious building, which is used both as a church and a parish house, and which, with the plot of ground on which it stands, is valued at \$9,000. The Mission is well organized, having various guilds, and the people are greatly interested. During the past year a vested choir has been introduced with marked good effect. There is an excellent Sunday School with an average attendance of 61 scholars. The attendance at the Morning Service has been 56; at the Evening Service 23. The duplex envelope system was adopted about a year ago, and it has increased the contributions. There were 6 baptized, and there are 90 communicants.

THE CHURCH OF ST. MARY MAGDALENE, WESQUANIC, NEWARK. This assisted Parish is situated in a neighborhood which is one of the very best in the City, and it is rapidly growing. Many houses of a substantial and attractive character having been built during the past year. It has a well-lighted and well-ventilated church of good size, with a large room in the basement which is used for the Sunday School and for the various guilds. The church stands on a large piece of ground and together they are valued at \$15,000. The average attendance at the Morning Service has been 75; at the Sunday School, 60. As the Rev'd Mr. Bissell has charge also of a Mission in Jersey City, it has been impossible for him to hold an Evening Service; but, by the aid of outside help, an Evening Service was begun on Easter night. There were 9 baptized and 9 confirmed during the past year, and the number of communicants is 115. St. Mary Magdalene has one of the best opportunities, not only in this Archdeaconry, but in the whole Diocese.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF JERSEY CITY.

To the Right Reverend Edwin S. Lines, D.D., Bishop of Newark:—

In this my annual report of the work in the Archdeaconry of Jersey City, we feel that there has been a marked progress in the forward movement of the Church's work, which is most encouraging.

Plans for two new buildings have been submitted to the Commission on Church Architecture, and it is intended in both instances to start building soon. One building is for St. Matthew's Mission, Jersey City, situated in a rapidly growing section of the city. We feel certain that this Mission will soon show the wisdom of its founders in grasping the opportunity of seizing and utilizing a strong and strategic position. The plans call for a well-appointed room for Church services; with a large basement which will serve as a centre for meetings of a social character. This Mission promises to grow as did St. Stephen's, which is now a strong city Parish. During the year there have been 7 baptisms; a confirmation class is

waiting the visitation of the Bishop; there are 85 communicants; the offerings have been \$522.39. The Mission is served by the Rev'd P. C. Bissell from St. Mary Magdalene, Newark.

The other building, for which plans have been drawn, is in West Englewood, where a company of faithful laymen, under the energetic and devoted leadership of the Rev'd Carl A. H. Stridsberg, are doing a good work for the Church. At present cottage services are held and the nucleus of a good Sunday School has been started.

St. John's, Nordhoff, the Parochial Mission of St. James', Englewood, is also under the care of the Rev'd Mr. Stridsberg. Here there are 50 communicants; and a Sunday School of 68. A full report is given along with the Parish Church.

As we said last year, St. John's Bergenfield is in need of a Parish Hall, where the people may assemble for social purposes. We believe it would prove to be a great benefit to the community. During the year the people coming from Dumont, a few miles north, have started a Mission in their own village; without in any way hurting the work here. In fact, there has been a noted increase of interest and membership during the past year. There have been 12 baptisms; 13 have been confirmed; there are 135 communicants; there are 90 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$751.37.

The Mission at Dumont is under the pastoral care of the Rev'd J. C. Goodman, the Missionary at Bergenfield. We shall have to erect a building here in the near future, which may serve as a place for worship and social gatherings. At present services are held in the Masonic Hall. There is every prospect of this soon becoming one of our strongest Missions. There have been 3 baptisms; there are 60 communicants; there is a Sunday School of 30; and the offerings have been \$410.70.

THE GOOD SHEPHERD, FORT LEE, has found its new parish hall of the greatest benefit. The church grounds have been greatly improved, and many improvements made to the interior of the building, adding greatly to its usefulness. During the year \$550 has been paid on the parish house indebtedness. There have been 3 baptisms; there are 66 in the Sunday School; there are 119 communicants; the offerings have been \$485.03. A confirmation class of 10 is to be presented this month.

THE NATIVITY, FAIRVIEW, has during the past year been under the care of the Rev'd F. A. Sisco, a post-graduate student at the General Seminary. There have been 8 baptisms; there are 30 communicants; there are 53 in the Sunday School.

St. JAMES', RIDGEFIELD, is also under the spiritual care of the Rev'd Mr. Sisco. There has been one baptism; there are 56 communicants; there are 41 in the Sunday School.

TRINITY, GRANTWOOD, is going ahead, even with the financial burden it has to bear. The people are most loyal and deeply interested. The Rev'd M. F. Montgomery reports excellent attendance at all of the services; especially during the season of Lent. There have been 10 baptisms; there are 160 communicants; there are 40 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$1,260.00.

GRACE, GRANDVIEW, is doing all that can be expected. If the mortgages on the property here and at Grantwood could be liquidated, or even lessened, it would be a great encouragement to both Rector and people. There have been 4 baptisms; 12 have been confirmed; there are 50 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$227.77.

THE INCARNATION, JERSEY CITY, is still holding services in a dwelling house. A most desirable property has been offered to this congregation; and it is earnestly hoped that some way will present itself whereby it may be procured. This is one of the Missions that has paid its Apportionment for General Missions in full. The people have also contributed toward Diocesan Missions and Christ Hospital. Their Easter Offering was \$170.19. If they could have a permanent building this would soon be one of the strongest congregations in the State. The attendance at the services are large and the people most devoted and interested. There have been 7 baptisms; 18 have been confirmed; there are 45 communicants; there are 35 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$843.73.

ST. AGNES', JERSEY CITY, a Parochial Mission, of St. Mark's, is under the pastoral care of the Rev'd F. E. Mortimer. It reports a decided improvement during the year in the Sunday School. There are nearly 100 children on the roll. The Mission is located in the midst of factories. A large foreign population is moving in about the Mission, many of them being Pollocks.

ALL SAINTS', LYONIA, has had a very prosperous year. Our Missionary here, the Rev'd A. H. Derby, is not only doing an excellent work among his own people, but is held in the highest esteem in the community. This is shown by his having been made the executor and trustee for three different estates during the past year. One of the members of the Mission has recently made the Executive Board custodians of a Trust Fund of \$500.00; the interest to be paid to her during her life time; the principal at her death to revert to the Mission. There have been 6 baptisms; 10 have been confirmed; there are 167 communicants; there are 94 in the Sunday School; the offerings have been \$1,010.28.

ST. STEPHEN'S, COYTESVILLE, the work here has been under the disadvantage of having to change Rectors; but under the present leadership of the Rev'd R. C. Masterton, the outlook for the future is most promising. There are 34 communicants; there are 48 in the Sunday School, with an average attendance of 22. At present there is no Morning Service; with the exception of two monthly celebrations of the Holy Communion. The offerings have been \$503.08.

ST. MARY THE VIRGIN, RIDGEFIELD PARK, has had a most successful year. The work here is also under the leadership of the Rev'd Mr. Masterton. There are 125 communicants; there is a Sunday School of 100; the offerings have been \$1,230.00. The average attendance at Morning Service is 41; and at the Evening 55; while that of the Sunday School has been 87.

There are 15 Missions in the Archdeaconry. These minister to 1,107 communicants; and there are 820 children in their Sunday Schools.

The meetings of the Archdeaconry during the year have been well attended, and a deep interest has been taken in all our work. The Fall meeting was in the Church of the Atonement, Tenafly, the Rev'd A. E. Montgomery, Rector, where we were most cordially and bountifully entertained by the ladies of that Parish. The Winter meeting was in Grace Church, Town of Union, the Rev'd G. P. Armstrong, Rector. Here again the members of the Parish made us feel most welcome. Our Spring meeting was at St. James', Englewood, Rev'd Fleming James, Ph.D., Rector, where most interesting and instructive papers were read, and discussed. The generous hospitality extended to the members of the Archdeaconry was deeply appreciated.

Our meeting this coming Fall will be in St. John's Church, West Hoboken, Rev'd E. J. Cleveland, Rector. A change will be made as to the time and kind of meeting. The business session, with reports and special subjects for discussion will be held in the afternoon. After supper, there will be a conference for the consider-

ation of General and Diocesan subjects. It is hoped that the laymen from parishes throughout the Archdeaconry will make a special effort to attend these meetings, and take an active part in the discussions.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF PATERSON.

To the Right Reverend Edwin S. Lines, D.D.

In spite of the financial depression of the year past I bring you encouraging reports from the nineteen Missions in the Archdeaconry of Paterson.

CLIFTON, ST. PETER'S. John G. Martin, Priest in charge. A large and strong Men's Club, organized in September, has enlarged the parish house and equipped it with plumbing, so that now there are several large meeting rooms and an enlarged kitchen. The church and parish hall have been equipped with an excellent steam heating system. The cost of these improvements, \$1,200, has been reduced to \$700.

DELAWANNA, ST. STEPHEN'S. John G. Martin, Priest in charge. The Mission is clear of debt, having paid in full for its building. A fund will shortly be started for a new church building, so that the present structure may be used for a parish hall.

PASSAIC, ST. GEORGE'S. Hugh D. Wilson, Priest in charge. There is steady growth. A men's organization has been formed; the Junior Brotherhood of St. Andrew conducts the parish paper; "Our Girls" have paid the interest on a note; the women will shortly complete the payment, by installments, of the organ. During Lent the church building was completed by finishing and furnishing the sacristy and completing some details of choir and Sunday School room. These were made possible by special gifts. St. George's is now a complete working plant, with growing resources for organization and community service. "Our Missionary requirements and appropriations have been steadily maintained, and interest has been manifested in the Emergency Fund both on the part of individuals and organized activities." The mortgage is being reduced by monthly payments.

POMPTON, CHRIST CHURCH, is without a rector as the vacancy created by the resignation of the Rev'd Edward P. Hooper, to become the rector of the Church of the Ascension, Jersey City, has not been filled. It is much to be wished that Pompton could be combined with Butler, and so a living salary and a generous field of work be provided for an active man.

MONTVALLE, ST. PAUL'S. John A. McNulty, Priest in charge. Some few families, (3) including active church-workers have moved away, but there is a good body of people interested in the Church and a fine company of men. The outlook is encouraging.

HILLSDALE, HOLY TRINITY. Meade B. MacBryde, Priest in charge. The Summer and Fall brought an accession of interest which is full of promise. The Sunday School has been reorganized with a superintendent, treasurer, and a staff of teachers to care for a school almost double the numbers of a year ago. By means of an entertainment sufficient money was raised to pay all outstanding indebtedness, so that the Mission is now free of debt. The financial outlook is better than in years. The Guild House Fund, started some years ago, grows slowly but steadily.

WYBROWD, GRACE CHURCH. Meade B. MacBryde, Priest in charge. A Reserve Fund has been started looking to the reduction of the mortgage, the interest on which has been paid. Plans are being made, and work begun, to enlarge the guild room by opening and finishing the other half of the basement. It is estimated that \$200 would see the work completed by Fall. The Mission would then have a room of sufficient size for social gatherings of the young people.

ORADELL, ANNUNCIATION. William K. Berry, D.D., Priest in charge. Oradell has felt the effects of the European War. There have been removals and curtailments of subscriptions, which, while depressing, do not cripple the work. The Spring weather means not only better congregations than even the good ones of the past Lent, but, also new families moving into the Borough. The consideration of purchasing or building a parish house has been wisely postponed for the present.

WOODBIDGE, ST. PAUL'S. August Ahrens, Priest in charge. They are worshipping still in the little square room, but patient working brings its own reward. Title to a plot of ground 100x100, well located, has been taken and some \$800 paid on the purchase price of \$1,000. The Fall should see the final payment and the title, which now stands in the names of Rev'd August Ahrens and the Archdeacon of Paterson, transferred to the Diocese.

EAST RUTHERFORD, GRACE. August Ahrens, Priest in charge. A most comfortable and attractive rectory has been built and is now occupied. It cost, complete, over \$4,400 and carries a mortgage of \$3,000 at 5 per cent., the interest on which Mr. Ahrens pays. The mortgage has already been reduced by \$100. The grounds have been graded and cement walks laid.

LYNDHURST, ST. THOMAS'. August Ahrens, Priest in charge. The Mission has been reorganized and is going forward. In addition to meeting all expenses, the final payment has been made on a piano, and plans formed to reduce the mortgage. The priest who has charge of these three Missions ought to be relieved of St. Thomas', and permitted to give all his time and strength to Woodridge and East Rutherford. It seems a great pity that ways and means can not be found whereby his salary from the above two Missions could be so increased as to enable him to ask for this relief.

HASBROUCK HEIGHTS, ST. JOHN THE DIVINE. Thomas Davies, Priest in charge. A new steam heating system has been installed in the church at a cost of \$523, a much needed improvement, and one that has been greatly appreciated during the Winter. An oak-finished rood screen was presented by a member of the congregation. Very shortly it is hoped to remove the church building to the large plot on which the rectory stands, and to carry up the foundation walls sufficiently high to make the basement serviceable for a parish hall. The people are raising money, which, with the Call from the Church Extension Fund, and the proceeds of the sale of the property on which the church stands, should cover all expenses.

ALLENDALE, THE EPIPHANY. James W. Jackson, Priest in charge. The parish house has been enlarged by the addition of another kitchen room, and municipal water brought into the building. A new altar, silver, and linen, were received on Easter.

RAMSEY, ST. JOHN'S. James W. Jackson, Priest in charge. The church, which is located on a corner, will complete its sidewalk and curb this year at a total cost of over a thousand dollars. The Easter offering at both Missions averaged three dollars per communicant.

MAHWAY, (CRAGMERE). James W. Jackson, Priest in charge. A Sunday School of over thirty meets in the public library, a remodelled house. It is expected shortly to remodel a local building for a public hall, in which services will be held, more frequently. At present there is a monthly service.

NORRIS ARLINGTON, ST. PAUL'S. William Martin, Minister in charge. This Mission has grown rapidly. A building 32x54 has been erected. The basement, which is unfinished, is above ground and has a ceiling height of 10 feet. The main room with chancel and vesting rooms has a height of 14 feet. The foundation walls are hollow tile blocks, upper floor frame. Its valuation, exclusive of the land, is \$3,500. The mortgage is \$1,000. The coming year will see the grounds graded and basement finished. There is a Men's Club of 48 members; Young Girls' Society of ten; Parish Aid of 22; Sunday School of 34 pupils, four officers and teachers; and a confirmation class of seven adults and three boys.

HAWTHORNE, ST. CLEMENT'S. William B. Mawhinney, Minister in charge. This work is carried on among mill operators, among whom there has been much suffering during the past Winter. A piece of property, 100x200, on the north side of the church and running along its line, has been purchased for \$750, which was raised by a mortgage. Through the generosity of a member of the congregation the interior of the building was recently decorated; and the floor recarpeted by the Woman's Aid Society. The congregations are frequently so large that all who would like to attend can not.

WORTENDYKE, CHRIST CHAPEL. The Bishop. There has been a revival of interest in the Sunday School which has been reorganized. Mr. Collard, a student at the General Theological Seminary, who had charge during the Winter, has withdrawn, so that at present a vacancy exists. The Archdeacon conducted services four Thursday nights in Lent with congregations averaging over thirty. This Mission should have a priest. One man could satisfactorily care for Wortendyke and Glen Rock.

GLEN ROCK, ALL SAINTS' CHAPEL. The Bishop. During the past year the Rector of Christ Church, Ridgewood, transferred the Mission to the Diocese. Services have been maintained by a Lay Reader appointed by the Bishop.

Three meetings of the Archdeaconry have been held. The Lay Conference in the evening has proved successful, being attended in some instances by 75 men. Christ Church, Ridgewood, Grace Church, Rutherford, and The Epiphany, Allendale, entertained the Archdeaconry.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF MORRISTOWN.

To the Right Reverend Edwin S. Lines, D.D.:

The parochial reports of the Missions in Morris County, for the year, furnish sufficiently the statistics of the Archdeaconry, and I confine myself to noting such changes as have occurred during the year.

On February 1, 1915, the Rev'd Norman T. Boggs resigned the charge of St. Paul's Mission at Chatham, and the services there have been carried on since that date by the Rev'd William C. Patterson, Assistant at St. Peter's Church, Morristown. Mr. Patterson's services have proved most acceptable, but the arrangement can only be provisional, and I feel it essential that next year St. Paul's should have again a more permanent form of ministry. With some help from the Diocesan Board I know that the Mission could be made, within a very few years, a self-supporting parish.

The Rev'd Charles B. Scovill has taken charge of All Saints' Mission at Millington, and is in residence there, dividing his time between Millington and Vailsburgh, and doing a splendid work.

The Rev'd Mr. Lan continues his ministry at St. Mark's, Mendham.

Services have been maintained throughout the year at the State Hospital for the Insane at Morris Plains, with a celebration of the Holy Communion on the first Thursday of each month. Through the interest of a number of communicants in Morristown, an altar and complete communion service have been presented to the Archdeaconsry for use at the Asylum. The services are largely attended and very evidently appreciated.

Owing to the removal of Archdeacon Tuthill from Newton you have asked me to serve as Archdeacon of Sussex and Warren Counties; I shall endeavor during the Fall months to visit the Missions in these counties and come in touch with the conditions there.

FORTY-NINTH ANNUAL REPORT (CONDENSED)

TRUSTEES OF THE HOSPITAL OF ST. BARNABAS.

May 1, 1915.

The splendid report which follows will show how large a place St. Barnabas Hospital has in the good works and the good will of this community.

Total number of patients admitted from May 1, 1914, to May 1, 1915, 1,371; total number of patients treated from May 1, 1914, to May 1, 1915, 1,453; total number of patients remaining May 1, 1914, 82; total number of patients remaining May 1, 1915, 77; total number of patients discharged from May 1, 1914, to May 1, 1915, 1,376; total number of deaths May 1, 1914, to May 1, 1915, 73; total number of free patients from May 1, 1914, to May 1, 1915, 702; total number of pay patients from May 1, 1914, to May 1, 1915, 669; total number of partial pay patients from May 1, 1914, to May 1, 1915, 66; total number of out-door clinic patients treated from May 1, 1914, to May 1, 1915, 6,281; total number of operations, 819; total number of patients in the private corridor, 184.

In the above record, 19 different religious beliefs are represented, and 31 nationalities, and 110 occupations.

The graduates of the Training School for Nurses now number 140. There are 27 pupils in the school at present; and 6 probationers. There have been during the year 31 applications, and 116 inquiries. Eight nurses graduated this year. The Alumnae Association has given awnings for the roof of the Nurses' Home, which shows a fine spirit amongst our graduates.

The Service of Dedication of the new story to the Nurses' Home was held on December 1, 1914. This generous gift of the late Mrs. Hannibal Goodwin has supplied a real need and is greatly appreciated.

The Treasurer reports that the expenses of the Hospital last year were about \$42,000, including the interest on mortgages and loans, amounting to \$1,536. The

Hospital earned through the board of patients \$23,931. The Guild of St. Barnabas gave \$2,510 for current expenses, and \$20 for the Children's Ward. The donations for current expenses were \$2,533.91; Sunday Schools and Churches contributed \$2,402.51; and the interest on our Endowment Fund was \$8,402.25.

Our Endowment Fund was increased by \$250.00 through a legacy from the late Hon. Michael T. Barrett. The total Endowment is now \$171,500. The Hospital mortgage is \$27,000 and there is also a note for \$9,000.

The Ways and Means Committee, under the active leadership of Mr. Frank E. Davenport, Chairman, is endeavoring to raise \$4,500 for a new elevator, which is the most pressing need at this time. An X-Ray machine is also needed. This Committee is trying to have each parish in the community appoint a sub-committee, of two persons, to have the Hospital in mind and to collect small amounts from parishioners. It is understood that no amount is so small that it would be unwelcome. A great number of interested friends, all helping a little, would mean much to the Hospital. It is in this way that it is made possible for us to minister to the sick poor.

The Board of Trustees desire to express their appreciation of the long-continued and faithful services of Mr. Thomas W. Jackson, Treasurer. This work takes a great deal of time and thought, which are cheerfully given by Mr. Jackson. Also do we express our gratitude to the Sisters, the Medical and Surgical Staff, the Chaplain, the Officers of the Training School for Nurses, The Guild of the Hospital of St. Barnabas, The St. Barnabas Junior Guild, St. Catherine's Guild, and to all who by their contributions of money and other services have shown their friendship for the Hospital.

FORTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT
(CONDENSED)

COUNCIL OF CHRIST HOSPITAL.

For the Year Ending December 31, 1914.

We have to note the completion of another cycle of the earth—we call it a year. We note also that over nineteen hundred years ago a voice was heard by men in Judea, proclaiming "Peace and Good Will to Men on Earth." That under the inspiration of that message with its subsequent practical application, men have been moved all over the earth to repeat and to perpetuate that Good Will. Even on the

battlefields of Europe today, close behind the men who are fighting in the trenches, in a spirit of ill-will, there follow the men and women of Good Will to bind up the wounds, to heal the injured, to comfort the dying, to bury the dead, all because of the impulse imparted to the human soul by that wonderful message and the life that followed it.

Many men are saying today that this impulse has failed—that the spirit of ill-will—the spirit of war, has conquered. As one writer puts it, that “Corsica has conquered Judea,” that Mars has conquered Eros. Not so! A thousand times No. Love has survived many a battlefield. Love is stronger today than ever. It will survive the passions of today as of all other days. War is a passion and will wear off. Love never dies.

Our Hospitals, our Homes for the Young and for the Aged, our Sanatoriums, our Churches, our Settlement Houses, our Agencies of all kinds for the relief of man's necessities, are the evidences that Good Will is not dead. It is well to remind ourselves of these things to clarify our vision, to connect ourselves with the past, to identify ourselves with this ever-growing current of “Good Will to Men.” Like the Hertzian waves of electricity used by men to send wireless messages which spread in ever-widening circles, so this impulse given by God on the hills of Judea, has spread around the earth. Men of every nation unite in saying “Good Will” and in manifesting “Good Will” to each other.

It is this impulse given so many years ago that has brought together this company, this goodly company of people, consisting of members of the Council, of the various Guilds, of the Medical Board, the Superintendents, the House Staff and Nurses, all are concerned and unite in emphasizing this service of “Good Will to Men.” The more clearly we—each and every one—keep this vision before us, the more blessed will be the service.

The past year has been noted chiefly for service rendered, no material additions to the buildings have been made. The chief addition to the equipment is the X-Ray Department.

The report of the Superintendent shows: Number of patients admitted, 2,048; discharged, 2,029. Total days treatment in Hospital proper, 33,419. Total number of cases treated in Dispensary, 4,550. Total number of cases treated in the Hospital proper, 2,164. Total in all departments, 6,714. Number of cases operated upon in the General Surgical Division, 945, and for Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat, 308. Total, 1,253.

Training School Department: Number of pupils admitted, 18; graduated, 6; present number, 30; probationers, 7; total, 37.

X-Ray Department: Total number of cases from June to end of year, 258.

The Abercrombie Guild has contributed towards the expenses of the Hospital, \$4,486.68. Its Endowment Fund has increased to \$86,401.08. The same unflagging interest in the Hospital is maintained by all its members.

St. Mary's Guild contributed \$1,500 as further payment for construction of sun parlors, and \$633 for other purposes, a total of \$2,133. Untiring zeal and energy is manifested by the members of St. Mary's Guild in providing so generously for the needs of the Hospital every year.

Christ Hospital Guild of Hoboken continues its very useful and valuable work of supplying many of the necessary household materials needed in the work of the Hospital, all of which are gratefully appreciated. Their disbursements for such purposes were this year \$411.10.

The annual report of the Treasurer, Mr. Richard Stevens, shows receipts from all sources of \$73,088.39, including special bequests of C. H. Matilage, \$5,000; Elizabeth J. Cassidy, \$500; Mary A. Bliven, \$4,944.56; and Lyle Reid, \$2,000. Total expenditures were \$71,825.20.

Abercrombie Memorial Fund, through Miss C. Barry, Treasurer, contributed \$494 towards reduction of bonded debt.

Endowment Funds have now reached, through the Council, \$93,712.00, and through Abercrombie Guild, \$86,401.08. Total, \$180,113.08.

It is only an act of justice to refer to the fact, not only of the constant generosity, but the great and continuous service rendered to the Hospital year after year by its Treasurer, Mr. Richard Stevens. It is a service of very careful and exacting labor not only in recording but in acknowledging to each and every individual donor, the amount contributed by him or her, thus doubling the labor. I would express on behalf of the Council its grateful appreciation of this valuable service.

Christ Hospital has reached a position in the city and county of which it may be justly proud. "Second to none," as was recently stated by a prominent surgeon. It must now live up to its reputation, which means constant and untiring service on the part of all its Workers and Supporters.

Services are held on Sundays and Fridays and the Priest is assisted in maintaining them by a choir of boys. Members of the Society also visit the inmates, and show their sympathetic interest in the care of the poor and the aged and infirm. They provide many articles of diet, magazines and other reading matter.

There are 265 inmates in this asylum. The average attendance of inmates at the services is 125.

For thirty-six years this Society has provided a Christmas feast for all the inmates of the Newark Alms House, following the usual Christmas service, conducted by the Rev'd Wynant Vanderpool, in the Chapel, at which carols are sung by the choir-boys of Grace Church, Newark.

At the service on Christmas Day, 1914, the Rev'd Charles L. Gomph, Rector of Grace Church, Newark, was present, and made an address.

This is the only organized society of Christians regularly engaged in religious and philanthropic work at the Alms House. Its annual meeting is held in the first week in Advent.

No appropriations are received from the Diocese for this Mission.

The Rev'd Wynant Vanderpool held the first service and continues to minister gratuitously and faithfully.

Churchwomen of the City of Newark and vicinity are invited to correspond with the officers of the Society; to contribute money and materials for its work; and to become active or associate members.

REPORT TO CONVENTION.
MAY 18, 1915.

EXTRACT FROM THE CHARTER.

"The purpose for which this corporation is formed is to provide the ministrations of religion for inmates of the public institutions of Newark and its vicinity, and to undertake such other religious and charitable work as may be properly done by a City Missionary Society."

As the population has become more congested, and home life has been to a great degree displaced by tenement house and boarding house life, the necessity has arisen of providing increased hospital facilities for the sick. Great companies of the poor find refuge in the public hospitals and thousands of accident cases find treatment in these places of refuge, where skilled physicians and trained nurses minister to human ills. It is to minister to the religious and spiritual needs of the great population that the City Mission of Newark, N. J., directs its energies.

THE FIELD OF LABOR.

Properly speaking, the field is Essex County, and not the City of Newark only. The Chaplain of the City Mission is in readiness to visit any institution, day or night, anywhere in the County, or outside if need be, where the services of a Minister are required. The daily population of the institutions reached by the Mission is, by the latest printed reports, about three thousand five hundred. The annual population is about twenty four thousand. About seven twentieths of the total population are classed as Protestants. The opportunity of the Church to minister to the devout, and to carry the message of the Gospel to the indifferent, cannot be over-estimated.

STATISTICS THAT ARE NOT DRY.

The Chaplain of the City Mission devotes all his time to the work in hospitals and prisons, with some necessary Social Service work growing out of the institution work. During the Diocesan year the Chaplain has made 845 visits to public institutions, and has made personal calls on 10,650 inmates. There were 114 baptisms; 412 burials; and the Holy Communion was celebrated 161 times for the sick or dying. Social Service visits, numbering 66, have been made where there was immediate need. Effort has been made to co-operate with existing organizations of which there are about seventy, carried on at an expense of about \$900,000 a year, and in no instance have they refused immediate response. The request for magazines made through the NEWARK CHURCHMAN met with very gracious response, and 663 copies of current publications have been distributed.

Through the courtesy of the Clergy the Chaplain has made 38 addresses in the various parishes, celebrated the Holy Communion in public 20 times, at which there were 926 persons to receive, and has attended 8 week-day services or club meetings and presented the subject of the Mission.

HOW THE CLERGY CAN HELP.

It would help very much, and the courtesy would be greatly appreciated, if each rector in Essex County were to invite the Chaplain, the Rev'd Charles L. Cooder, to visit his parish and tell about this hospital and prison work. In this way all our Church people can come to a knowledge of this department of the great mission work of the Diocese. Then too, it would greatly help to put this City Mission work on the parish budget for a definite amount for the year. Again, the Clergy can remember the prisoners, the sick on the lonely cots in the hospitals, the afflicted in the isolation wards and the dying, in the prayers which are offered in the Church and especially at the Holy Communion.

HOW EVERY ONE CAN HELP.

It costs very little to carry on the City Mission work, especially as there are no over-head charges, but it does cost something. Twenty-five hundred dollars a year will amply provide for everything at this present time. There ought to be no great difficulty in raising this sum in Essex County for this work. Here is where the men and women of the Diocese can render necessary assistance. Subscriptions, sent individually or through the rector should be addressed to Mr. Morrison C. Coyer, Treasurer, Firemen's Insurance Building, Newark, N. J. Pledges of definite amounts to be paid at stated intervals, are requested. And it might be that some persons would care to remember the City Mission, which is incorporated under the laws of the State, in their wills.

REPORT TO CONVENTION

(RECEIVED, JUNE 15, 1915.)

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Newark has held its regular monthly meetings in Trinity Parish House, Newark, with an average attendance of 135.

An Institute was held on November 9th and 10th, and an Anniversary meeting, November 11th, at Grace Church, Orange. The morning and afternoon sessions were largely attended. Dr. Jefferys, who gave an address, wrote to the Secretary, stating that he had never attended such an interesting and well planned Institute, and congratulated the Auxiliary on the work being done in the Diocese. An all day Conference was held in November at Paterson, also a three day's Conference at Jersey City, taking in Bayonne, Hoboken and adjacent towns. In May, an all day Conference was held in Orange, of all the Orange Parishes.

Numerous letters have been received from various Parishes telling of the inspiration and help gained at these gatherings. Our Educational Secretary Miss Bertha Richards resigned, to go into training at Philadelphia, and has since gone to Miss Hunter's School to teach among the colored people. Miss Richards did much to bring the educational work to its present degree of efficiency and her resignation was deeply regretted by all. Mrs. Sloane has taken up the work most ably, and is planning important things for the coming year. Mrs. Sloane reports: 39 classes conducted during Lent, by 23 leaders, with a total membership of 483; Miss Holmes reports: 18 classes in the Junior Department, by 15 leaders, membership 303; total number of classes 57; 37 leaders; with a membership of 786. Miss Holmes urged Auxiliary members to attend one or more of the Summer Conferences to be held at Gladstone, Geneva, Cambridge, and Silver Bay, as these Conferences are important factors in training for Christ's work.

Miss Wight, Librarian, has actively pushed the work during the past year; 88 books have been circulated, being more than twice the number of last year; and she is endeavoring to get a complete file of the *SPRINT OF MISSIONS*, and has, up to date, about 20 years on file.

Mrs. Gomers has done most efficient work, and reports up to date, June 12th, \$3,050.52 have been collected for the United Offering. Our President, Mrs. Danforth, and Mrs. Gomers have each made more than 35 visits to Parishes, and by addresses before the women's societies have greatly increased the interest and work in missionary activities.

More duplex envelopes have been reported as given out at the parishes, and this means more systematic and intelligent giving, but less through the Diocesan Treasurer.

The Box Directors' have done splendid work with better results than even last year. The Auxiliary last Fall decided not to put as much effort as formerly on diocesan work, but to particularly stress the Emergency Fund, to which the various parish auxiliaries have nobly responded.

We have now 73 Auxiliary Branches, a gain of 6 during the past year. For the Annual Meeting, in May, an all day session was held beginning with the administration of the Holy Communion. At the morning session the questions which had been sent out to each parish were answered by the various Secretaries, thus giving many new suggestions to Auxiliary workers, as well as bringing the various Branches into closer touch with each other. About 250 sat down to luncheon which was served by the young ladies of Trinity Parish.

At the last regular meeting Bishop Lloyd's remarks were so stimulating and helpful that we give them in closing, as they stand as the keynote of our work and aims. "Keep your hands, lips and thoughts busy. It is our business to know how the Father's children live; and the King's business demands organization. It must tempt people to give a helping hand and we must tempt people to pass it on. Above all get the vision of what Christ is seeing and asking for."

The Guild of St. Barnabas for Nurses celebrated its twenty-sixth anniversary in 1912. There are thirty Branches of the Guild in as many cities of the United States, and one of them is in this Diocese, at Orange, with a membership of 246, of which the Rev'd Charles T. Walkley is Chaplain.

The Guild has for some years supported, through the Board of Missions, a nurse in the mission field; Miss Bolster is at work in Alaska.

The Corporation for the Relief of Widows and Children of Clergymen of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the State of New Jersey.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The undersigned begs leave to offer to the Convention of the Diocese of Newark, the following report of "The Corporation for the Relief of Widows and Children of Clergymen of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the State of New Jersey." In this, the 109th year of its corporate existence, the Corporation has an invested fund of about \$167,000. Half of the interest of this Fund together with half of the annual contributions of its "Contributors" is each year added to the principal of the Fund. The other half, after deducting expenses, is divided in the form of annuities and dividends among the widows and children of deceased contributors. The amount of the annuities and dividends paid during the past year was \$4,238.38. The number of contributing members at the present time is 60. Three have died during the past year.

Clergymen of the Protestant Episcopal Church, not over 55 years of age, who have, for at least two years, been canonically connected with and actually resident in either of the Dioceses of the State of New Jersey are eligible for membership as "Contributors." Removal from the State, after five annual contributions have been made, does not forfeit membership. The "Members of the Corporation" are those who have been elected to manage its affairs. They are not necessarily "Contributors," and some of them are laymen. Their annual meeting is held on the first Monday in June. The undersigned will be glad to furnish further information, if desired, also, blank forms of application.

Report, Clergymen's Retiring Fund Society.

The Clergymen's Retiring Fund Society respectfully reports that its blessed work for such of the old clergy as have chosen to connect themselves with it is flourishing and effective. It is worthy of note that its inception and early development was due to clergymen of New Jersey, who, in 1874 devised the plan of creating a fund, out of whose income annuity should be provided for such as qualified themselves to receive it by having made payments thereto, on the principle of doing something to help themselves before expecting others to do something for them. Its first President was Dr. James Abercrombie of Jersey City, and clergymen resident in Northern New Jersey, or what is now the Diocese of Newark, were among its chief supporters. The late Bishop of New Jersey was its enthusiastic second President for a long period. In recent years the Fund has grown at a more rapid rate, until it has now reached nearly \$400,000. Annuities begin at 60 years of age, and 307 annuitants are now upon the list. At the last regular distribution, \$22,797.55 was disbursed. Many of the annuities are indeed small, but they are large in proportion to the amount of contributions to the Fund by the members who receive them. Some of the annuitants, however, draw over \$300 annually and a few over \$400. The stability of the Society is guaranteed by the conservative character of its management, and the fact that not a dollar of its funds has ever been lost.

Report of the Finance Committee of the Diocese of Newark.

Newark, N. J., May 6, 1915.

The Finance Committee submits the following budget of estimated expenses for the current year:

BUDGET.

For the support of the Episcopate	\$ 6,000
For the Board of Diocesan Missions and Church Extension	12,000
For Diocesan Expenses under Canon and for the Social Service Commission	5,000

The foregoing includes the support of a Suffragan Bishop for this fiscal year, as fixed by vote at the session of the Convention held in January last. The provision for the work of the Board of Diocesan Missions has been somewhat increased, including the salary and expenses of the Archdeacon and Diocesan Missionary, and with the understanding that the amount so included for such salary and support shall apply on the salary of the Suffragan Bishop from the date of his consecration.

Inasmuch as the Convention has for two years past ordered the item of \$1,200 to be added to the Budget for the use of the Social Service Commission, and in view of the expressions which have been heard of increased interest in this work, the Committee has provided a corresponding amount for this year, subject to its withdrawal, if so ordered by the Convention.

From the income from the increased Episcopal Fund, recommended and raised by the Bishop, and because of the responses of the Parishes and Missions to the urgent appeals of the Finance Committee for more prompt payment of assessments, together with the fact that the expenses of the Suffragan Bishop will be only for a part of the year, the Finance Committee is enabled to recommend an assessment of 6 per cent.—the same as that of last year, notwithstanding that expenditures planned are largely increased.

We are entering the new Convention year in better financial condition than since the organization of this Diocese. The practical effect of your efforts in maintaining economy in expenses, and in settlement of assessments, is thus manifest to all. This condition should afford gratification alike to our Clergy and Laymen.

Knowing what has been accomplished, will not Rectors and Delegates alike make a renewed effort to provide for prompt settlement of all obligations to the Diocese, so that we will not again fall into the embarrassments from which we have now emerged; and will not Committees and Commissions of this Convention be slow in forcing increased burdens upon the Parishes and Missions for any purpose, beyond those provided for above, however worthy they may be?

The Finance Committee submits the following recommendations to the Convention:

- (1) That the Budget now submitted be adopted.
- (2) That the Finance Committee be authorized, at its discretion, to direct the Treasurer of the Convention to borrow such sum or sums for the purpose of the Convention as may from time to time be necessary.

Report of "The Committee on the Church Pension Fund" appointed to take into consideration the relation that the Diocese of Newark should bear to The Church Pension Fund.

Your Committee respectfully report that pursuant to the resolution passed at the Convention of 1914 (see Journal page 55) this Committee has met several times and, after consultation with members of the Joint Commission on Church Pension Fund, prepared and issued a circular letter, addressed to every parish and mission in the Diocese, explaining, in a concise way, the purposes and methods of the scheme proposed by the Pension Fund Commission and also advising each parish and mission of the probable cost to them of joining the general scheme based on the present stipend paid the clergy.

Your Committee hoped by this means to obtain an expression of opinion from the various parishes to assist your Committee in formulating their report. Replies have been received from some of the parishes and missions and the majority of those received indicate that the individual parishes are willing to assume the cost should the Diocese enter the system.

Your Committee have given the matter their best consideration and are of the opinion that it would be well for the Diocese of Newark to join with the other Dioceses and, therefore, recommend the following resolutions:

"Resolved, That in conformity with the legislation adopted by the General Convention of 1913, setting forth the principles upon which pension provision for the clergy of the Church and their dependents should be constructed, pursuant to which the corporation 'The Church Pension Fund' has been created to carry these principles into effect, the Diocese of Newark adopts and enters into the system of the Church Pension Fund."

"Resolved, That the Committee on the Church Pension Fund be continued, with instructions to report to the next Diocesan Convention a canon to put into operation in the Diocese of Newark the system of the Church Pension Fund simultaneously with its operation in a sufficient number of other Dioceses."

Report of Luncheon Committee.

The Finance Committee having omitted from the Budget of 1915 any provision for defraying the expense of the Convention luncheons, and the perpetuation of this pleasing feature of the sessions being desired by the delegates in attendance, this Committee was appointed to devise ways and means for the continuation of the same.

In order to prevent the recurrence of the condition obtaining this year, your Committee recommends that a permanent provision be made for this feature of the Conventions, and will offer a motion to this effect at the proper time during this session.

A statement of the expenses incurred is referred to the Finance Committee.

The Board of Missions and Church Extension respectfully reports that it has held ten meetings during the past year, and that it has aided or maintained work at the following places:

In the Archdeaconry of Newark:—

The Reports of the Archdeacons contain in detail an account of the work done at these places. The duty of the Board of Missions and Church Extension in regard to them is limited to the measures authorized by the Convention, for providing and applying the funds necessary for the support of the Missionaries. The Board each year requests the Finance Committee to include in its Budget a stated sum for the work of the Board to be approved by the Convention. It has asked for \$12,000 for the work of next year.

The Board also administers the Church Extension Fund which is made up of voluntary contributions by means of pledges ranging from one to five dollars, the number of Calls being limited to five each year. There are now 399 subscribers to the Fund, and the value of a Call is \$1,063.75.

Since our last report, this Fund has enabled the Board to render assistance as follows:

To All Saints', Millington, toward the building of a rectory; to Grace Church, East Rutherford, toward the building of a rectory; to Trinity Church, Grantwood, on the Palisades, to extend the church building so as to provide parish rooms; to Hasbrouck Heights, to help move the church building so as to stand upon the same plot of ground as the rectory, and also provide greatly needed rooms for parish work; and to the Missions at West Englewood, North Arlington, and Ridgefield Park, toward meeting various obligations.

The Report of the Treasurer of the Church Extension Fund, Mr. Francis Halpin, is as follows:

Report, Committee on Apportionment for General Missions.

The Committee on Apportionment for General Missions would respectfully report that they have held 8 meetings during the year. Much detail work has been done which cannot be embodied in this report.

We have introduced the new Apportionment, as directed by the Convention of 1914, and are able to report that very few Parishes requested a change in the amount asked. Many Parishes and Missions have already met their Apportionment in full, while others assure us they will do so before the close of the fiscal year, August 31st.

Two mass meetings were held during the year, one in Grace Church, Newark, on Wednesday, December 9th; the other in St. Paul's, Jersey City, on Wednesday, April 14th, both of which were well attended and much interest manifested.

We have endeavored to co-operate with the "Emergency Committee" of the General Board, and all the Parishes and Missions have promised to do all in their power towards the accomplishment of this object. The letter of Bishop Lines, sent to the Rectors and Vestries, was followed by one from the Committee, and the answers came with the assurance that the appeal for the "Fund" would be made on Rogation Sunday, followed by a collection on Whitsunday, throughout the entire Diocese.

Report of the Standing Committee.

The Standing Committee respectfully reports that six meetings have been held in the past Convention year.

On the twenty-ninth of May, 1914, the Convention organized by electing the Rev'd D. Stuart Hamilton, President, and the Rev'd Frederick B. Carter, Secretary.

The Rev'd Norman Towar Boggs, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Priesthood, and the proper testimonial signed.

Permission was given to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Christ Church, Belleville, to mortgage their property for \$15,000.

Permission was given to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Grace Church, Rutherford, to mortgage the property occupied by Grace Chapel, East Rutherford, for \$3,000.

Permission was given to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. John's Church, Passaic, to mortgage their property for \$2,000.

On the first of July, 1914, consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd William Cabell Brown, D.D., Coadjutor Bishop-elect for the Diocese of Virginia, and the proper testimonial signed.

Permission was given to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of the Church of the Redeemer, Morristown, to sell a portion of the property in the rear of the rectory to the Town of Morristown for \$250.

Permission was given to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Trinity Church, Arlington, to mortgage their property for \$3,000.

By and with the consent of the Standing Committee, the Bishop was advised to grant permission for the organization of the Parish of St. Bartholomew's, Hoboken.

On the twenty-eighth of September, 1914, consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd Frederic William Faber, D.D., Coadjutor Bishop-elect for the Diocese of Montana, and the proper testimonials signed.

Messrs. Alfred Newbery and Charles Steele Armstrong were recommended to the Bishop as Candidates for Holy Orders, and the proper testimonials signed.

The Bishop having asked for advice concerning the calling of an adjourned meeting of the Diocesan Convention in the latter part of the year, for the election of a Suffragan Bishop, on motion, it was *Resolved*, That it is the sentiment of the Standing Committee that an adjourned meeting of the Diocesan Convention should be called, for the election of an Assistant to the Bishop, in November or December.

On motion, the Chairman of the Standing Committee was requested to communicate the resolution to the Chairman of the Finance Committee and the Bishop, and to arrange with them for the calling of a conference of the two Committees, as according to the resolution of Mr. Morgan, p. 49, Journal, 1914.

The subject of a second mortgage on the Young Estate having been considered, it was the judgment of the Standing Committee that the Fidelity Trust Company should protect the interests of the Diocese, using their own best judgment as to the use of assets or resources of the Estate for such purpose.

Mr. William Martin was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate, and the proper testimonial signed.

On the sixteenth of October, 1914, permission was given to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Mary Magdalene, Newark, to mortgage their property for \$3,800.

Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd Walter Taylor Sumner, D.D., as Bishop-elect of Oregon, and the proper testimonial signed.

On motion, the Executors and Trustees of the Young property were requested to sell the old homestead for the purpose of removal; or, failing to effect such sale, to have the building destroyed.

On the twenty-third of November, 1914, consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd Paul Matthews, Bishop-elect for the Diocese of New Jersey, and the proper testimonial signed.

Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd Thomas Campbell Darst, Bishop-elect for the Diocese of East Carolina, and the proper testimonial signed.

Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd Paul Jones, Bishop-elect for the Missionary District of Utah, and the proper testimonial signed.

Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd Herman Page, D.D., Bishop-elect for the Missionary District of Spokane, and the proper testimonial signed.

Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd George Coolidge Hunting, Bishop-elect for the Missionary District of Nevada, and the proper testimonial signed.

Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd Hiram Richard Hulce, Bishop-elect for the Missionary District of Cuba, and the proper testimonial signed.

The Rev'd George Colby DeMott, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Priesthood, and the proper testimonial signed.

On motion, it was *Resolved*, That the provision of a building of moderate cost at the place proposed, or near thereto, in Jersey City, for St. Matthew's Mission, under direction of the Bishop and the Board of Missions, is warranted.

On the twelfth of April, 1915, consent was given to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Christ Church, Ridgewood, to transfer to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Bartholomew's Church, Hohokus, the land and buildings located in Hohokus, formerly known as the Valley School House and used as a Mission of Christ Church, Ridgewood.

The Rev'd Messrs. J. Archibald McNulty, James H. Stone Fair, John Goodrich Martin, Elwyn Henry Spear, and Vedder Van Dyck, Deacons, were recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Priesthood, and the proper testimonials signed.

Messrs. Henry A. Post, Walter Handley, Edgar Leon Cook, and Frederick John Buttery, were recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate, and the proper testimonials signed.

Mr. George Whitfield Mead was recommended to the Bishop as a candidate for Holy Orders, and the proper testimonial signed.

The preparation of the annual report for Convention was referred to the President and Secretary.

SUMMARY.

Consent was given to the consecration of nine Bishops.

Three Postulants were recommended to the Bishop as candidates for Holy Orders.

Five Candidates for Holy Orders were recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate.

Permission was given to five Parishes to mortgage to the amount of \$26,800.

Permission to sell was given to one Parish.

Report, Board of Adjustment.

The Board held three meetings during the year. On June 19, 1914, three applications for remission were granted, and two for corrections granted, and four refused. On January 26, 1915, one application for remission and one for reduction were granted. On May 18, 1915, the day of the Convention, it was reported to the

Convention that sixteen parishes or missions were two years in arrears for their assessments, and the matter was referred to this Board for action. In six cases, the remission was granted; and in one, payment was reported to have been made, or to be shortly forthcoming; in three, action was deferred; and in six, no application was made, and, accordingly no action taken.

With full opportunity offered for the proper adjustment of all claims for reduction or remission of arrears, it seems a pity that claims should be made thus at the very last moment.

Report of the Commission on Church Architecture, 1915.

The Commission on Church Architecture herewith present their eighth annual report. During the year, ending May 1, they have had under consideration the following plans: A new church for St. Luke's Parish, Paterson; a mission chapel for St. Matthew's, Jersey City; five parish houses for, respectively, Little Falls, Cedar Grove, Bergenfield, North Arlington, and Edgewater; and a rectory for East Rutherford. Of this number the plans for St. Luke's Church, Paterson, and the parish house at Edgewater, were continued from the previous year. The original plans for St. Luke's were disapproved. New plans by a competent architect were presented later, and approved with a few changes. Ten somewhat radical changes were suggested in the plans for the parish house at Little Falls, and these were accepted. Changes were suggested also for the plans for North Arlington and Edgewater, and were adopted. The plans for Cedar Grove and Bergenfield were approved without change. The plans for a rectory at East Rutherford were returned without comment as having no special ecclesiastical character. The original plans for a mission chapel for St. Matthew's, Jersey City, were disapproved as incapable of adaptation or improvement. New plans for a combination parish house and chapel were prepared by Messrs. Stephenson & Wheeler, and these, with some slight changes to fit them to local conditions, may be adopted. These plans providing a chapel with accommodation for over 200 persons, a chancel which may be shut off from the rest of the building when used as a parish house, a sacristy, kitchen, furnace-room, and coal-bin in cellar, are estimated to cost not over \$3,000, and can be adapted to almost any site.

In view of much misunderstanding and misinformed criticism of the work and the methods of the Commission, we deem it necessary to repeat here part of a statement which we made in April to the Board of Church Extension, as follows:

"During the eight years which have elapsed since the establishment of the Commission it has had under advisement plans for forty buildings, as follows: 5 parish churches, 14 mission churches, 2 enlargements of mission churches, 17 parish houses, 2 rectories.

"To the consideration of all these buildings the Commission, and especially its professional member, Mr. R. S. Stephenson, together with his partner, Mr. E. H. Wheeler, have given unstinted time and thought gratuitously. For four of these buildings the firm of Stephenson & Wheeler have received as follows: March 27, 1909, for chapel at Westwood, \$25; 1910, for St. George's, Passaic, \$25; September 29, 1911, for chapel at Fairview, \$25; October 9, 1911, for St. Mark's Church, Newark, \$289.56; total, for the four buildings, \$364.56. St. Mark's cost \$10,000.00, so that the fee for this was less than 3 per cent., the standard fee for such work being 10 per cent. The other three buildings cost in the aggregate about \$14,000.00. The firm

received for these the sum of \$75 in all. For their services on the remaining 36 buildings the firm has not only received nothing, but has been at considerable expense for office work to draughtsmen.

"Measured by any ordinary business standard the professional services of this firm would be worth a sum much exceeding \$2,000.00, yet their sole remuneration has been the above sum of \$364.56, while the Diocese has been benefited by much more than the difference between these amounts, not only by the gratuitous labors of the Commission as a whole, but by saving it from most extraordinary, and frequently most fantastic structures, as well as from material loss through errors in construction.

"It would be an object lesson of much interest and value to the Diocese if we could present copies of the plans which we have been compelled to condemn wholly, and others which it has been only with the greatest difficulty that we have been able to make even tolerable, in spite of our recognition of the fact that no very high standard with such limited resources was possible."

We must repeat here, though it may seem *ad nauseam*, that the root difficulty which the Commission has had to contend against from the beginning is the most unpractical and unbusinesslike notion that plans made by some local well-meaning but wholly incompetent person, which are offered for nothing, are going to save expense. Experience shows that the result is always disappointing, a loss of time, and an occasion of trouble to both the Mission and the Commission. It is beginning at the wrong end. The purpose and desire of the Commission is not to dictate to the clergy or committees, whose earnestness and energy we fully recognize, but to save them from their own lack of experience. It is for this reason we would impress upon them the elementary truth that the necessary expenditure for professional advice at the very outset is in every case an economy, and not an extravagance, and as essential to the completed edifice as the stone or lumber.

In accordance with a recommendation made in our report of last year we offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That in every case where the plans for Mission buildings offered to the Commission on Church Architecture are considered wholly unfit or incapable of adaptation, the Board of Church Extension is hereby authorized, on the recommendation of the Commission, to pay the sum of \$25 to some competent architect approved by the Commission, for such preliminary sketches and suggestions as may suffice to enable a local contractor or builder to carry them out in detail; such amount to be deducted from the Board's appropriation.

Annual Report to the Diocesan Convention, Board of Religious Education, Diocese of Newark.

Under the auspices of the Board of Religious Education, a joint meeting was held in the parish house of St. Paul's Church, Newark, with the *Social Service Commission* and the *Committee on the Apportionment Plan for General Missions*, on Monday, September 28, 1914. The general topic under consideration was: "Coordinating

the Church's Interests", and was discussed from the standpoint of Education by Rev'd Wm. E. Gardner, D.D., Secretary of the General Board of Religious Education; from the standpoint of Social Service, by Mr. John M. Glynn of the joint commission on Social Service, and from the standpoint of Missions by Mr. John W. Wood, Secretary, General Board of Missions. This is the first time, it is believed, that a meeting has been formally held for such a purpose as the topic implies. The addresses were most interesting, especially as the meeting preceded by only a few weeks, the Primary Synod of the Province of New York and New Jersey.

In the latter gathering members of the Board had a share, as well as in the meetings of the Provincial Board of Religious Education, which were then, and, subsequently held.

TEACHER TRAINING.

The Standard Course in the Training of Sunday School Teachers, as set forth by the General Board of Religious Education, covers three years, and includes eleven subjects, four of which (namely, Religious Pedagogy, Gospels and Life of Christ, Christian Year, and Missions and Social Service) are assigned to the First Year's Work. When our Diocesan Training School was started last year, these were all that were given. This year, however, we have been able to include both the First and Second Year's Work. Courses have been offered, in addition to those already mentioned, on The Apostolic Church (Acts and Epistles), Catechism and Christian Doctrine, Prayer Book and Church Worship, Organization and History of the Sunday School, and Biblical Geography. And already arrangements have been made whereby we shall be able to offer, next year, the Third Year's Work as well, consisting of Courses on The Old Testament, and on Church History. Thus our Training School will be complete, covering the whole curriculum required by the General Board of Religious Education, and it is to us a cause of great satisfaction and gratitude that we have been able to accomplish this result in so short a time.

This work only began about a year ago, in January, 1914, and already we have provided for our Diocese a Training School fully equipped, in which any teacher can receive instruction in all the eleven courses required by the General Board, in three years or less, and, on passing examination in those courses, obtain a Diocesan diploma from our own Board of Religious Education, signed by the Bishop of the Diocese.

That we have so quickly attained our purpose is due to the willingness with which the instructors have responded to our call and accepted their duties, and we desire to thank them publicly, here and now, for the assistance they have rendered. The whole Diocese of Newark is indebted to them, for thus it has been placed in the first rank in the matter of religious education, very few of the Dioceses having established complete training schools earlier than our own.

The school year began on Saturday, October 3, 1914, and the sessions have been held regularly every Saturday since, two courses being given each Saturday morning of one hour each, from 10—12 o'clock. On March 27th, a third course was added, the school opening at 9:30 and closing at 12:30. The members of the classes have been very regular and the interest has been marked; and as the school becomes better known, and its advantages are more widely appreciated, we expect to see more and more of our teachers availing themselves of the helps thus offered to them in their Sunday School work.

The Board desires to record with appreciation both those who have already served as teachers in the Training School, and also those who have consented to do so this coming year. The former are: Miss Ethelwyn N. Curry, Rev'd Augustine Elmerdorf,

Rev'd Frederick B. Carter, Rev'd Walker Gwynne, D.D., Rev'd Charles Malcolm Douglas, Rev'd Douglas Matthews, Rev'd Carl A. H. Stridsberg, Rev'd Charles T. Walkley; the latter, Rev'd Philemon F. Sturges, Rev'd Fleming James, Ph.D., Rev'd Charles E. Hutchison, Rev'd F. Creswick Todd.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL INSTITUTES.

On the 13th, 14th and 16th of January, three one-day institutes were held at the Church of the Holy Communion, South Orange; St. Paul's, Paterson; and St. Stephen's, Jersey City. This was a new venture for the Board, and the excellent results justified the institutes in every way. The effort was made to concentrate on the elementary grades. Miss Frances H. Withers conducted the conference on "The Beginner and Primary Pupil"; Mrs. Lester Bradner, on "The Junior and Intermediate Pupil"; and Drs. Boynton, Bradner, and Mr. Hyde on "Problems of the Teacher". The aim was to enable the teacher to go back to her work with such information as would help her in the following Sunday's work.

The attendance was good. About four hundred teachers being reached by the three institutes.

It was well demonstrated by the institutes, that in them the Board has a powerful agency whereby a reasonable amount of teacher training can be given at accessible points in the Diocese; the teachers of adjacent parishes being given the chance to come together for the discussion of their problems, and to feel the corporate Sunday School life of the Diocese.

Requests have already been made for further conferences of this kind. There ought to be five or six of them held during the coming Winter, special thought being had for the schools in the outlying districts.

The Board would be glad to receive suggestions and such assistance as would improve the usefulness of these institutes.

MISSIONS AND SOCIAL SERVICE.

The success of the service for the Presentation of the Sunday School Lenten Offerings last year has led the committee to arrange for another to be held on Saturday, May 8th, in Grace Church, Newark. We hope that this will continue as an annual custom, as is the case in the neighboring Dioceses of New York and New Jersey.

The Sixth Annual Sunday School Convention was held in Trinity Church, Newark, on Wednesday, April 21st. Officers and a Delegate to the Provincial Board of Education were elected, and certificates presented by the Bishop to a number who have completed courses in the Diocesan Training School. The topics and speakers were as follows:

"Cooperation in Education," Calvin W. Kendall, Ph.D., Commissioner of Education of New Jersey.

"How May the Sunday School be made to Issue in Christian Service," Abby Porter Leland, Ph.D., New York City.

"The Sunday School Festival," Rev'd Frederick Edwards, New York City.

The Bishop of the Diocese presided.

Report of the Social Service Commission, Diocese of Newark, 1915.

FOREWORD.

There is no end to what the Church can do in such a region as the northern part of New Jersey. Its crowded counties are full of institutions which house the sick, the destitute, the aged and neglected, just the people we are specially commended to serve in the name of Our Lord. The Social Service Commission is prepared at all times to furnish information to parishes concerning the institutions nearest their own doors. The enclosed report shows that we have done a good deal of this during the past year. We are eager to do more. Call upon us.

We find that when this work is made known to parishes of our Diocese it always meets with approval. Just as people like to belong to a "live" parish, so are they interested in their Diocese if they feel that that too, is alive. If they find that it has agencies for the promotion of actual good works, they will increase their devotion to it. At the same time they will be moved to give and do more for their respective parishes, because they have acquired a deeper interest in the whole Church and in what she stands for.

Thus we perceive many ways in which the work of this Commission is of value to the Church, and we ask a careful reading of our report.

LEGISLATIVE WORK.

The bill for the establishment of Free Labor Bureaus in the State, which was introduced at Trenton last year and failed of passage, was again introduced this year, was passed and has been signed by the Governor. This result was accomplished after a year's campaign and presentation of the importance of this matter by speeches and lectures in many cities and towns throughout the state, and by letters and literature sent to all the clergy. The establishment of such Bureaus is regarded by all economists as the first necessary step in any solution of the problem of unemployment. The *Newark Evening News* in commenting on this bill said in an editorial: "Underlying the measure is the conviction that bread-winners who are idle through no fault of their own, are entitled to the energetic solicitude of the state, which depends in the last resort on the productive labor of its citizens. The Commission in this campaign has done a useful piece of work for Newark and the state."

It will be a year or more before the active work can be begun in any large way, as the state finances are in such shape that there is little money to devote to such work. At the request of the Department of Labor the Commission has appointed a sub-committee to work out with the Commissioner of Labor the plan of operation and the relation of voluntary agents to the Department.

Another important bill, known as the "Child Welfare Bill," was written, introduced and passed by the efforts of Mr. Robert L. Flemming, of the Commission.

This bill removes certain bad features of the children's laws and completes a series relating to child labor and the care of children in the state, all of which have been undertaken by Mr. Flemming. There was no more important piece of social legislation accomplished than this.

CO-OPERATION.

The Commission has co-operated with the Consumers' League by sending notices to our clergy throughout the state of important matters undertaken by them; with the N. J. Child Labor Committee, having representation on the Executive Committee, through the Secretary who, at the request of the Committee, made an investigation of the Cranberry Bogs; with the State Charities Aid Association; co-operating with Mr. C. L. Stonaker, the Secretary, we arranged, in one of the counties, a conference with the Sheriff and a representative of the Board of Freeholders to discuss certain reforms in the County Jail; with the N. J. Housing Association, preparing the outline of a sermon on the "Relation of Housing Conditions to Religion," to be sent to all ministers in the state; with the N. J. Conference of Charities and Corrections, the Secretary being on the Executive Committee and the Program Committee; with The People's Legislative Bureau, the Secretary being on the Executive Committee.

THE CHURCH AND STATE AND COUNTY INSTITUTIONS.

The increasing humanitarian interests of the state and county present a grave problem to the Church. We cannot be indifferent to the care of prisoners, sick, feeble minded, insane, dependent children, and the aged. The lack of knowledge on the part of busy people regarding what the state and counties are doing, suggested to us that one thing that ought to be done was co-operation with the state by giving information and arousing interest in such problems as state and county care of dependent people. With this end in view the Commission prepared an illustrated lecture entitled "What Every Man should Know About His State." The enthusiastic reception of this lecture wherever it has been delivered has more than repaid us for the time and expense of getting it up.

Acknowledgement should here be made for the valuable assistance given by Mr. C. L. Stonaker, of the State Charities Aid Association, who has given unsparingly of his time and knowledge to the work of the Commission. The State Charities Aid is doing a most valuable piece of work and should have the interest and support it deserves.

ASSOCIATED COMMITTEES.

The work of the Commission has grown so much this past year that it has been deemed advisable to form Associate Committees in various parts of the Diocese to have charge of work which is county or local in its scope. Such committees will be composed not only of members of the Commission, but largely of other men and women who are willing and able to carry on the work of the Commission as associate members. A very important beginning has been made in Essex County, where we have an active committee, representing a number of men's clubs in the county, and undertaking a work in connection with discharged prisoners from the county penitentiary. A brief report of this committee which has just begun its work is appended. This plan opens up a great field of usefulness for the men's clubs of the Diocese, in particular for those connected with parishes where there are few local problems. A committee of a similar nature is being formed in Bergen County.

INVESTIGATION OF THE CRANBERRY BOGS.

As noted above, the Secretary was asked by the N. J. Child Labor Committee to investigate and report on conditions in the Cranberry Bogs. The investigation was made of the bogs in Burlington County and was afterwards accepted and published in pamphlet form by the two Social Service Commissions in the state. The N. J. Diocesan Commission joining with ours. This report was sent throughout the state in order to counteract certain misleading statements which had been made regarding child labor in the bogs. The Cranberry Growers' Association, impressed with the fairness of the report, consented to hold a conference on the subject of conditions on the bogs, and the result of the conference was the appointment of a committee to draw up a standard of housing conditions and inspection which, it is hoped, will be accepted by the Grange as well as the Cranberry Growers.

SUNDAY SCHOOL SESSIONS.

The Commission has under preparation a brief series of Sunday School Lessons, intending to train the children in good citizenship and to awaken an interest in social problems as found in New Jersey. These lessons are extremely difficult to prepare and every effort is being made to make them inspiring and attractive.

SUMMER SCHOOLS.

The Summer School for Clergy was again held last Summer at Morristown, where there were many inspiring and instructive courses of lectures given.

It has been deemed advisable not to have the Summer School this year because of the expense of carrying it on.

The Commission, through its Secretary, is now co-operating with other provincial and general Church Boards in promoting the Conference of the Second Province. This will be held at Geneva, New York, July third to tenth, and a valuable programme of lectures and discussions is offered to both clergy and lay people.

ADDRESSES, ETC., BY THE SECRETARY.

The Secretary delivered 180 lectures and addresses and in addition has attended and spoken at 215 other meetings and conferences. He has made addresses or attended meetings in 91 cities and municipalities in the state, and attended meetings and made addresses in 10 Dioceses other than Newark, namely: New York, Long Island, Connecticut, Western Massachusetts, Western New York, Tennessee, North Carolina, Maryland, Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

The Secretary also acted as the Secretary of the Provincial Commission on Social Service, and also is Secretary of the Provincial Conference of Church Workers which this year will be held at Geneva, New York, in July. He has delivered a course of lectures at the Diocesan Training School and also a course at the Summer School of the Diocese of North Carolina.

Our report, on account of the limited space of the *JOURNAL*, is necessarily brief and is concerned only with the principal features of the work of the Commission. There are many other sides of the work of the Commission not here presented, such as the growing use of the Commission as a bureau of information on law and social problems, the requests for services that come from bodies outside the Church, and the assistance rendered to rectors of parishes and others in procuring speakers for courses of addresses.

This Commission, in closing, desires to express its thanks to the rectors and the laymen and women throughout the Diocese who have given us such cordial and

hearty support. The interest that is manifested throughout the Diocese in social work, and the relating of the Church to it as the work of Applied Christianity is so large and general that we believe that our Diocese is, in this, second to none in the Country.

REPORT OF THE ESSEX COUNTY COMMITTEE.

The deplorable situation of prisoners discharged from the penal institutions of Essex County, is receiving the earnest consideration of this Commission.

Investigation shows that about 25 per cent. of the number of prisoners discharged from these institutions have neither homes nor friends to receive them afterwards. They get from the County ten cents for carfare, to return them to the place where the offense was committed, and thereafter are left to their own devices, naturally questionable.

A "Prisoners' Aid Committee" has been appointed by this Commission, representing several parishes in the Diocese, with the object of temporarily housing these unfortunates pending employment; and endeavoring by personal intercourse as far as possible to encourage them to better ways.

This plan was worked out largely by Mr. Hosp, the Superintendent who has done such admirable work at Caldwell, and the Committee is co-operating with him in putting it into effect.

The Committee at present consists of five members, but as its work progresses, this number must be largely increased, and it is hoped that when the appeal is made, hearty support will be extended.

2. And it is recommended that every Parish and Mission, in the two Dioceses, make some recognition of the event, with the approval of the Bishops of the two Dioceses, on the Sunday following the anniversary.

3. The Bishops of the two Dioceses are to arrange the service, and are to select the speaker.

4. Archdeacons Bowden Shepherd, and James A. McCleary, were appointed as Publicity and Invitation Committee.

5. The Rev'd Dr. Frank B. Reazor and Dr. Alfred B. Baker, and Mr. Nicholas G. Rutgers were appointed a Committee on a Memorial.

6. The Rev'd Dr. Baker and Archdeacon McCleary were appointed to offer a resolution asking the Conventions for such a sum as may be required, not exceeding \$50 for each Diocese, for the expenses of invitations and publicity.

It was suggested that invitations be extended to Bishops of the Church, to the Clergy and Officers of the two Dioceses, and to the Delegates to our Diocesan Conventions, and to the Governor of the State.

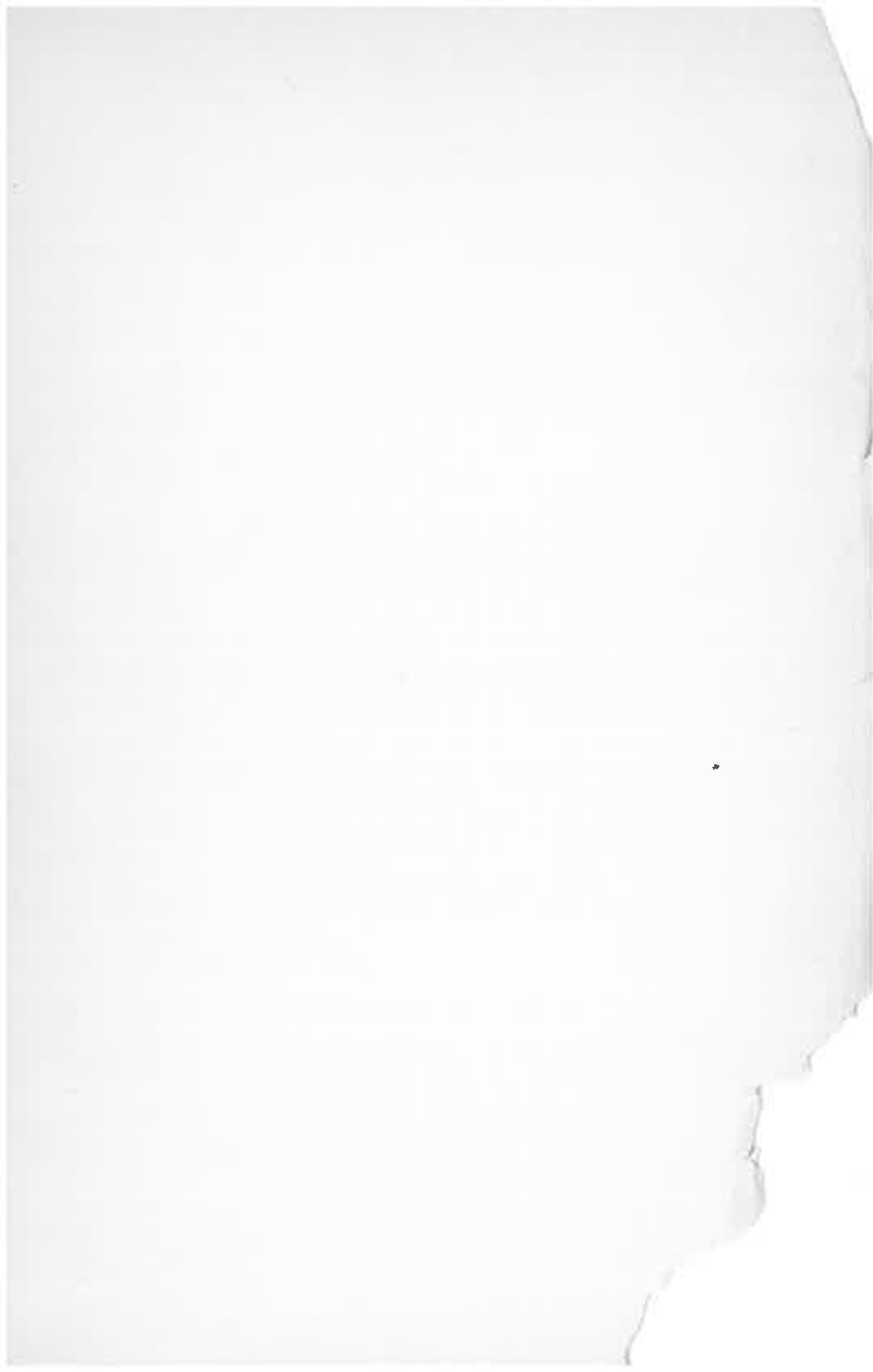
