CANON 1, § II.
OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

From a Parish.

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election, in the following form:

[Name of the Church, the Place, and Date]

This certifies that at a meeting of the congregation of this Church, held for the purpose of electing Church Officers, and Deputies, and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention (*or for the purpose of electing Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, if the meeting be for that object alone*), A. B., C. D., and E. F., being communicants of the Church in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Deputies; and B. C., D. E., and F. G., also being communicants in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Alternate Deputies to represent the Parish in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand (*or if two Wardens subscribe, we have set our hands*), the day and year above written.

N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary sign, then the signatures of *both* Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-in-charge, or Missionary, cannot sign.

From a Mission.

N. B.—Use the same form and substitute the word "Mission" for "Parish" in three places. The Minister-in-charge; or, the Clerk; or, the Warden may sign.

Memoranda:

Not more than three Deputies are allowed from each Parish, and Mission.

Three Alternate Deputies must be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies.

Write Christian names in FULL and LEGIBLY.

Blank forms will be sent by the Secretary of the Convention on or before Easter Monday in each year.

Return Certificates of Election at least ONE MONTH before Convention.

Deputies must be *Communicants of the Church, and also qualified voters in the Parish or Mission which elects them.* (See Canon 6, § II, [4], [5] and [6].)

Rules of Order

THE CONVENTION.

1. The Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. The Convention shall meet on the opening day at 9:30 a. m.; with a recess of one hour between 1 and 2 o'clock.
3. At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
4. At the close of each Convention, the Minutes shall be corrected and approved.
5. The doors of the Convention shall be open for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
6. All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convention shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall enter the same on the Minutes.
7. Clergymen of other Dioceses, and Candidates for Holy Orders, who may be present, shall be admitted to honorary seats in the Convention on the presentation of their names to the Secretary.
8. When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
9. When any member is about to speak he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
10. No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply), in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
11. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
12. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate, but any member may appeal from the decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention. The general procedure of the Convention shall be governed, unless otherwise provided for, by the rules of parliamentary practice as set forth in "Robert's Rules of Order."
13. A Committee consisting of the Bishops, ex-officio, five other clergymen and five laymen, to be known as the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, shall be appointed at each Convention to prepare the official Ballots and the Calendar of Business, for the next Annual Convention.

The mode of conducting the nominations and elections (annually or when such officers are to be elected) of the Standing Committee, of Deputies to the General Convention, of a Treasurer and Auditing Committee, of a Registrar, of the Board of Missions and Church Extension (for the retiring class and for vacancies), of members of the Board of Religious Education, Board of Christian Social Service, of six Clerical and six Lay Deputies to the Synod of the Province of New York and New Jersey, of a member of the Ecclesiastical Court, of a Lay Assessor and all other elective officers not otherwise provided for, shall be as follows:

Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations must place in the hands of the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, in writing, on or before noon of the Tuesday in the week preceding the opening day of the meeting thereof, nominations signed by himself for any or all officers mentioned in the above paragraph. Each nominator must certify to the Elections and Rules of Order Committee that the persons nominated by him have consented to the nomination. All names so sent in shall be reported to the Convention by the Committee, at the beginning of the opening session, in the form of a ballot, on which the names shall be arranged alphabetically in each class. After each list of nominations as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks may be filled by any voter. The voter shall mark with an X at the right of the name of each person for whom he votes. On the first ballot these ballots only shall be used, and also in all subsequent ballots, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. No ballot shall be counted in its class, on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled, and the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast.

The Secretary of the Convention shall call for nominations in his usual notice of the date and place of the Annual Convention, and shall, in the same notice, advertise the person or persons designated by said Committee, to whom such nominations shall be sent, with mailing addresses.

The members of Convention shall also be requested, in said call, to send to this Committee any canonical amendments or other important items of business that they may purpose to introduce at the next Convention, so that such matters may be assigned a place on the Calendar of Business. This call shall also be annually inserted in the April number of the official magazine of the Diocese, *THE NEWARK CHURCHMAN*.

Balloting shall take place in a separate room when practicable.

The clerical and lay voting lists shall be divided into two sections each.

Supplementary Deputies to the General Convention, and to the Provincial Synod shall be elected immediately after the completion of the election of Deputies thereto.

14. Four or more Election Tellers, clerical and lay, in equal numbers, not necessarily members of the Convention, shall be appointed by the President before an election. They shall receive and canvass all votes cast at any election which is required to be by ballot, and when such canvass is completed, shall immediately report its result to the Convention. The polls shall be open for such time as the Convention may, by resolution, direct.
15. All reports, (usually printed in the JOURNAL) of officers, committees, commissions, and boards of trustees under control of the Convention, shall be printed and distributed by the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order as far as practicable, at least two weeks before the meeting of Convention.

(Vide, Standing Resolution on the following page.)

Reports when read in Convention shall be read by title only, unless the reading be required for the better transaction of business.

NEW BUSINESS.

16. All new business introduced, except such as may accompany and form a part of a report of a committee, shall be in the form of a motion or resolution and shall be in writing.

COMMITTEES.

17. All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered. It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Diocese to promptly notify the members of all special committees of their appointment, and to call their attention to the rule requiring reports to be printed and sent to the Rectors and Missionaries two weeks before the meeting of Convention.
18. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.

MOTIONS AND THEIR ORDER.

19. No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
20. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it; or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
21. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.

VOTING PRIVILEGES.

22. All questions shall be decided *viva voce*, unless otherwise specially ordered.
23. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes the vote of the Convention shall be taken by Orders, voting separately, and the names shall be entered on the Minutes; and, when a vote is thus taken a concurrent majority in both Orders shall be necessary to carry any measure.
24. In all elections, those persons only who shall have a majority of the votes given shall be deemed elected; but if in any case more than the required number of persons shall have a majority of votes, the required number of persons having the highest number of votes shall be deemed elected, and in case of a tie between two or more candidates, there shall be a new ballot.

JOURNAL

The Forty-ninth Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark assembled in Trinity Cathedral, Newark, N. J., at 9:30 A. M., on the morning of May the 15th.

The Bishop Coadjutor celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by the Dean of the Cathedral, the Very Rev'd Arthur Dumper, D.D., who read the Epistle, and the Rt. Rev'd Edwin S. Lines, D.D., the Bishop of the Diocese, who read the Gospel. These with the Rev'd J. Fred Hamblin, Rector of St. John's Church, Newark, administered the Sacrament. The offering at this opening service was devoted to the work of the Eagle's Nest Farm, the Diocesan recreation center.

The Convention was called to order by the President at 10:45 A. M. He stated that he had asked the Bishop Coadjutor to preside at the Convention.

Bishop Stearly on taking the chair requested the Secretary of the Convention to ascertain whether or not there was present a constitutional quorum. The same having been found, the Convention was declared in order.

The Rev'd Dr. Joseph R. Lynes nominated the Rev'd W. O. Leslie, Jr., as Secretary of the Convention. The nomination was seconded. It was moved and seconded that the nominations be closed and that the Chair cast a ballot. The same having been done, the Rev'd W. O. Leslie, Jr., was declared elected as the Secretary of the Convention.

The Secretary appointed the Rev'd J. Fred Hamblin as Assistant Secretary.

To the Forty-ninth Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

WHEREAS, The Convention of the Diocese of Newark having heard of the approaching fiftieth anniversary of the Ordination of the Rev'd Frederick Bennett Carter, adopts the following:

The Rev'd Frederick Bennett Carter has since 1884 been one of the most active and honored Presbyters of the Diocese of Newark. As Rector of St. Luke's Church, Montclair, for many years, and as Secretary of the Standing Committee, Secretary of the Board of Missions, Registrar of the Cathedral Chapter, Secretary of the Board of Religious Education, as well as Archdeacon of Newark, he has served the Church with great skill and devotion and without ever counting the cost to himself. He is held in high esteem and warm affection by all his brethren of the clergy, and the representatives of the parishes in this Convention.

Be it therefore Resolved, That the Convention offers to the Rev'd Mr. Carter its hearty congratulation and sincere felicitations upon the rounding out of fifty years of service as a priest of the Church. We make grateful record of his great services to the Church, and invoke God's richest blessing upon him and his in the coming years.

This resolution was adopted by a rising vote.

The Rev'd Francis H. Richey presented the following resolution which was referred to the Committee on Miscellaneous resolutions:

Be it hereby Resolved, By the Diocese of Newark, in Convention assembled in the City of Newark, May 15, 1923, that it is the desire of this body to endorse the work of the DuBose Memorial Church Training School at Monteagle, Tenn., in its effort to train men for the Rural Ministry of the Church.

The Rev'd Dr. Gwynne presented the following resolutions which were referred to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions:

1. *Resolved*, That the function of the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions is only to give its judgment on the proper form and proper character of any resolution, or on its place in the calendar, and in no case on the merits of any resolution, unless specifically requested to do so.

2. The Diocesan Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark, New Jersey, representing 104 Congregations, 2 Bishops, and 172 other Clergy, respectfully petitions the Congress of the United States to adopt a joint Resolution proposing to the several States an amendment to the Constitution authorizing Congress "to establish and enforce uniform laws as to Marriage and Divorce. *Provided*, That every State may by law exclude, as to its citizens duly domiciled therein, any or all causes for absolute divorce in such laws mentioned."

3. The Diocesan Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark, New Jersey, representing 104 Congregations, 2 Bishops, and 172 other Clergy, respectfully petitions the President of the United States, that, in accordance with Article III, section 3, of the Constitution, he give to Congress such information as may

be necessary in regard to the disgraceful condition of our laws concerning Marriage and Divorce. "And to recommend to their consideration such measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient."

The Rev'd Robert W. Trenbath presented the following resolution, which on motion, was referred to the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order:

Resolved, That it is the sentiment of this Convention beginning with next year those whose terms of office expire should not be eligible to re-election to the same office for a period of at least one year.

Resolved, That a special Committee be appointed by the President of the Convention to arrange for the celebration of the 50th Anniversary of the Convention of the Diocese.

After the customary notices by the Bishop Coadjutor with regard to the luncheon arrangements, the Convention recessed until 2:15.

The Convention reconvened at 2:30 P. M.

Report, Committee on Constitution and Canons.

REPORT No. 1.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons, to which was referred the proposed amendment to Article 4, Section 3, of the Constitution, respectfully report as follows:

That the Committee has considered the same and recommends the adoption of the following:

Resolved, That Article 4, Section 3, of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

Section 3. The Laity shall be entitled to a representation of one or more Deputies, not exceeding three, from each Parish in union with this Convention, and from the Cathedral; each Mission shall be entitled to a representation of one or more Deputies, not exceeding three, as may be determined by Canon. Deputies shall be elected by each Congregation from the male communicants thereof.

When a vote is taken by Orders, each Parish in union with this Convention, and the Cathedral, shall have one vote, and each Mission shall have such a vote or part of a vote as may be determined by Canon.

The Rev'd Dr. White moved the adoption of the above resolution. The vote on the same being taken by orders, it was declared adopted.

Bishop Lines made the following nominations for the Board of Examining Chaplains: for reelection, term expiring 1926, Rev'd Dr. Robert F. Lau and Rev'd James A. McCleary. The Convention approved these nominations.

The Bishop Coadjutor read his Eighth Annual Address. (*Vide, Index.*)

Archdeacon Elmendorf presented the following

Report of the Finance and Advisory Board. 1923.

To the Members of the Convention:

The Finance and Advisory Board submits herewith its third Annual Report.

Meetings have been held monthly during the past year with the exception of the summer time.

The Board records with sorrow the death of Mr. H. St. John Webb. Mr. Webb had served as a member of the Board and of the Department of the Budget from its foundation by action of the Convention until last December when, on account of ill health, he resigned. He was deeply interested in the work of the Board and his sound and thoughtful advice will be missed. May God grant him Eternal Rest.

During the year the Department of Diocesan Properties sent to the Reverend Clergy and parish officers communications regarding the carrying of adequate fire insurance; also liability and compensation insurance on all Church employees as required by the law of 1922, and to urge the placing of Trust Funds with a Trust Company or the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund. We respectfully call your attention to the importance of these matters and express the hope that proper consideration has been given them.

In October last, we received from the James Barber Trust, the sum of \$23,390.77. The Diocese receives \$15,000 annually from the James Barber Trust Fund, which is divided among eleven Diocesan charities and activities designated by the donor as beneficiaries when the Fund was established. This \$23,000 + represented additional income on securities allowed to accumulate over a period of five years. By action of the Board this money was deposited with the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund to be invested by them and the beneficiaries named in the Trust to be paid each year their pro rata share of the interest.

Appended to this report is submitted for your approval the proposed assessment for 1924 and the Budget for the same year. The assessment represents a small amount levied on the parishes and missions and takes care of the items mentioned in the Canons; namely, the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Expenses, including under this last the expenses of the Convention. The Budget represents an ideal at which we aim. The actual receipts fall between these amounts with, we hope, a steady though slow approach to the ideal as the Diocese grows and our people learn more and more to appreciate the great opportunities that lie before us. We are obliged to have a working or minimum budget based upon the pledges actually received from the parishes at the time of the Annual Every-Member Canvass. This takes care of the work already established in the Diocese under the various items listed in the Budget and leaves us usually a small additional amount for supplementing clerical salaries and advance work. These facts should be borne in mind by those interested in various works that are not given full support in the Budget or do not appear there.

Every year, your Board receives urgent appeals for help from various agencies at work in the Diocese—all of them worthy of all that is asked—but we have no income except such as comes from the parishes. We could very advantageously spend twice what is appropriated for the Missions of the Diocese and for the work coming under the Board of Social Service, such as Bonnie Brae Farm and the Church Mission of Help. Much time and most careful thought is given by your Board to the just and fair distri-

bution of the money received. Those interested in increasing the amounts given to the splendid work carried on or to objects not included in the Budget, should realize that the best way to accomplish the object which we all have at heart is to work to make known the needs and the kind of work carried on to the people of the Diocese so that we may receive more generous support.

Another matter for which we shall ask your approval is the printing of a new edition of the Constitution and Canons. Many years have elapsed since the last edition was printed and many changes have been made so that it is not possible for the clergy or others interested to ascertain easily what the Canons and Constitution actually are. An edition of a thousand copies would cost approximately \$900.

An important part of the work of the Board has been carried on by the Department of Development and Revenue, and this will be submitted to you in a separate report.

Mr. Percy C. H. Papps presented the

Report of the Department of Development and Revenue.

Canon 4, Section 4, of the Diocese of Newark outlines the work of this Department as follows: "It * * * shall be charged with the duty of instructing the people of the Diocese in the Missionary, Social Service, and Religious Educational work, both of the Diocese and general Church, and shall plan for an annual Every Member Canvass in each Parish and Mission, and for the collection of money pledged for Diocesan and Extra-Diocesan work. It shall be the duty of each Parish and Mission to co-operate with this Department in this matter."

The work of the Department was carried on continuously during 1922 and largely centered around the Nation-Wide Campaign effort, culminating in the Every Member Canvass on November 26th. Its aim was to emphasize as strongly as possible personal responsibility; and to relate the individual communicant more closely to the work of the whole Church. The Department realizes that the success of its work is dependent almost entirely upon the co-operation of the Rector or Minister in charge. The Department desires to emphasize strongly the great change that has come into the Church due to the Nation-Wide Campaign. The growth of interest in the work of the Church is shown in every department, not alone in increased support, but particularly in the increased number of baptisms, communicants, and candidates for holy orders. It is now generally recognized by those who have studied the matter that those congregations which are most actively interested in activities outside of their own parishes, are most successful in their own parochial efforts.

VISITATIONS.

The Parishes and Missions of the Diocese were assigned to the members of the Department. Early in the Fall each member visited those assigned to him and while gathering certain necessary items of information emphasized the spirit of co-operation which ought to exist throughout the Diocese and laid strong foundations for the work of the Campaign.

DISTRICT MEETINGS.

In several sections the Parishes and Missions held very successful district meetings, at which plans for the Campaign and general matters were discussed.

BISHOPS' CONFERENCE.

Seventy-five Parishes and Missions were represented at this Conference, held at Trinity Cathedral, October 10th, when plans for the Nation-Wide Campaign were presented and strong emphasis laid on the spiritual foundation for the whole work. A plan of organization was presented as a means whereby the end should be accomplished.

TREASURERS' CONFERENCE.

On November 3rd sixty-three Treasurers representing 54 Parishes and Missions gathered at St. Barnabas' Parish House for consultation. Much good was accomplished by this conference, which emphasized the importance of the Treasurers in Parish life and organization.

LAY SPEAKERS.

Forty laymen of the Diocese served during the six weeks of preparation for the Every Member Canvass, speaking at archdeaconry meetings, district conferences, and very largely at the morning services throughout the whole Diocese. Most of these men spoke at least once on every Sunday during this period and their work contributed largely to the growth of interest in the Church's work.

PLEDGES FOR 1923.

The quota assigned to Parishes and Missions is the same as for 1922, namely, \$369,219.00; the reports to the Department of the pledges made in the Every Member Canvass show a total of \$203,530.46 pledged for 1923. This is a gain over 1922 pledges of about \$15,000. For the first time there is a complete record, for every Parish and Mission has made some report.

EVERY MEMBER CANVASS.

The Department wishes to again emphasize the importance of an annual Every Member Canvass, made personally. One or two Parishes have tried to make this Canvass by letter, following up the letters with personal visits only to those persons who did not reply to the letter. But three months after the Canvass, they have stated that the results are not as satisfactory as when a personal canvass is properly planned and carried out. Other Parishes have felt that it was better to allow the pledges to remain and simply send out the duplex envelopes. Here, too, the results are not as satisfactory as when the canvass is made annually. Some desire to increase their subscriptions; some find it necessary to decrease the amount subscribed. Both groups of contributors should be given opportunity to state annually what they desire to give. Furthermore, the Canvass is of distinct value to any Parish in the interest it arouses and the opportunity it affords for getting in touch with those who are not active in Church life, apart from its financial value.

DUPLEX ENVELOPES.

The Department strongly urges the use of the duplex envelopes. Some Parishes are still using the single envelope, and the Vestry sets aside each month a definite portion of the contributions for the Diocese and the Mission of the Church. The advantage of the duplex envelope is that it reminds every individual of his or her responsibility. It gives everyone the privilege of deciding for himself or herself what proportion shall go for work at home, and what proportion for work abroad.

Here it should be emphasized that the red side of the envelope is not all for Missions. Twelve per cent. of the amount pledged for 1923 is the amount of the Diocesan Assessment; the balance carries all the work of the Diocese, and its contribution to the work of the Church as a whole.

LITERATURE.

Four small leaflets issued by the National Council were received and distributed through Diocesan Headquarters; about 150,000 of them. The Diocese issued 30,000 copies of a small folder, the work of Mrs. Stephen S. Johnson.

MONTHLY REMITTANCES.

The Department has arranged to forward to the National Council fifty per cent. of the total receipts from the Parishes and Missions applicable to quota, and takes pride in having this check in the hands of the National Treasurer in New York City on the first day of the month. Therefore, it urges the Treasurer of every Parish and Mission to forward check for the month's contributions as soon after the last Sunday in the month as possible.

QUARTERLY STATEMENTS.

The Department has prepared a form of statement which has been sent out to every Rector and to every Treasurer in the Diocese. The Department recommends the use of this or a similar form in sending to every contributor every quarter a statement of account. It believes that such a businesslike method will appeal to the contributors and give them incentive to keep their pledges paid up to date.

CONTINUATION WORK.

The Department has recognized the weakness of any campaign which is conducted during six weeks of a year and allowed to lie idle the balance of the year. Therefore, it is now engaged in the task of issuing each month to the Clergy of this Diocese an Information Leaflet. This leaflet covers one field of the Mission work of the Church. It is prepared by the Department and sent with the request that it be used to bring information to the congregations of the Church. With it is being issued a small sheet of illustrations, which the Rector is asked to post.

Behind this EFFORT is the ideal which stands behind the Mission Study Classes. It is recognized that no present means of reaching the whole communicant body in the Diocese exists. Church papers reach a small proportion; Mission Study Classes, so ably conducted by members of the Woman's Auxiliary, reach only small groups. The only feasible means seems to be the use of some period in the regular Church services, and the Information Leaflet is this Department's attempt to solve the problem. Obviously, the success of this effort is in the hands of the Rectors and Ministers in charge.

Our experiment became known to the Diocese of Chicago, which has asked to share in our endeavor. Consequently the issue is doubled, and our own expense materially decreased through this co-operation.

CONCLUSION.

In conclusion, the Department wishes to acknowledge its gratitude to the Clergy and laity of the Diocese who have so loyally supported the plans that have been made. It feels that the increased pledges and payments for 1923 are an indication that sooner or later we will be able to do the work which lies before us in this Diocese and contribute the full amount of our share of the work of the general Church. The people of the Church are foremost in their contributions to general endowments funds, several drives having been carried through to successful completion for hospitals in our Diocese and

general educational institutions in the country. The Department looks forward to the time when the same generous spirit will characterize their giving to the regular work of the Church. This can only come in time and by a steady, persistent campaign of education. The Department has recognized this as its duty and opportunity.

Report, Canonical Committee of the Diocese of Newark on the Church Pension Fund.

SUBMITTED MAY 15, 1923.

THE CANONICAL COMMITTEE ON THE CHURCH PENSION FUND REPORTS AS FOLLOWS:

During the calendar year 1922, 119 Parishes and Missions and four other organizations in the Diocese paid regular assessments to the Church Pension Fund. Excluding the few Parishes which have never joined the Fund, and such as were vacant during the period, the arrears of assessments for the year amounted only to \$7.50, out of possible collections of \$25,892.54.

There are at present in force in this Diocese the following grants from the Church Pension Fund:

In addition to the foregoing, under the new ruling of the Church Pension Board, two awards were made during the year 1922, to widows of clergymen holding cures or offices, whereby they received \$1,000 each, immediately upon their husbands' deaths, which amounts were exclusive of the pension grants.

The Pension Fund has paid out to beneficiaries in the Church at large, between March, 1917, and the end of 1922, a total of \$1,870,230.36, of which \$904,876.69 has consisted of payments made under the Pension Fund proper, and \$965,353.67 has been paid through the General Clergy Relief Fund and other accounts which have been taken over and are managed by the Church Pension Fund, to clergy who retired before the Pension Fund started, or to widows of clergymen who had died previously.

At the present time, total annual payments under the Pension Fund proper amount to \$274,307.95, to a total of 737 beneficiaries, in addition to which \$194,221.16 is being annually paid through the General Clergy Relief Fund and similar accounts.

Mr. James R. Strong presented the following

Report of the Eagle's Nest Farm Committee.

As reported at the last Convention, the Diocese received early in 1922 from two devoted Church women of Delaware, N. J., a gift of the two adjoining farms on which they live and which had been in possession of their families for more than two hundred years, reserving only a life interest in their residences and a small annuity. Surely the names of Albertson and Cummins should stand out among the many benefactors of the Diocese.

The property covers 180 acres and stretches from a 600-foot frontage on the Delaware River more than a mile back on the hills and reaches an altitude of about 800 feet. Located as it is six miles below the Water Gap, the scenery is unsurpassed, the country is thinly settled and no more quiet, beautiful or suitable place could be selected as a Diocesan center for summer work and recreation.

The development of Eagle's Nest Farm has been on that part nearest the river, and the upper property is rented to the farmer who has occupied it for a number of years.

During 1922 your Committee received from the Diocese special gifts, rentals, etc., and expended about \$4,500, of which amount about \$3,500 represented permanent investments, such as a survey, a well, a pavilion, cook houses, tents, boats, bridges, etc.

During the season more than one hundred children in separate parties enjoyed the privileges of the camp.

For this season your Committee has undertaken to direct and operate the camp and commissary, and is prepared to care for and feed eighty people continuously during the camping season of two months and undertakes to provide suitable counsellors to assist the camp director in caring for the work and play of the children. We have erected and are equipping a kitchen, an infirmary building, 8 shacks presented by various Parishes, a tank, pump and piping to supply running water throughout the camp. Generous sums have been given for the above improvements, but further contributions are needed for kitchen and dining-room equipment, roller towels, dish towels, boats, a piano, etc. The program for this year is as follows:

CAMPS AND CONFERENCES.

June 26-29—Conference of Clergy.

For the presentation of the Diocesan program of next year.

June 29-July 2—Conference for Men.

A week-end gathering of Lay readers and church workers.

July 2-16—Camp for Boys.

Especially planned for Boy Scouts.

July 16-30—Camp for Boys.

Especially planned for Choir Boys.

July 30-August 13—Camp for Boys.

With program of interest to general groups.

August 13-25—Camp for Girls.

With special counsellors and facilities for girls.

August 25-31—Conference for Young People.

Especially planned for members of the Diocesan Y. P. F.

August 31-September 4—Conference for Men.

A week-end gathering of interested Church Men.

Through the courtesy of the Trunk Line Association, Eagle's Nest Farm has been placed on the "Fresh Air Fare" basis, which means that children may travel by rail to and from the Farm for one-quarter of the two-way rate and adults accompanying them for one-half the two-way rate. Application for such rates must be made through our Secretary, Rev'd W. O. Leslie, Jr., 21 Washington Street, Newark, to whom all other communications and inquiries should also be addressed. The expense at the camp, including everything, has been fixed at eleven dollars per capita per week, or \$2.00 per day for shorter periods.

We ask your support of this undertaking either in funds for equipment or in interesting others in making it possible for children to come to the camp and obtain the benefit of a summer outing within the influence of the Church.

On motion, this was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

Archdeacon Ladd presented the Report of the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions. With regard to the resolution concerning the function of the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions, the Committee moved that it be not adopted and that the Committee be discharged from any further consideration of the same. After considerable discussion, on motion the report of the Committee was adopted.

With respect to the resolution concerning the endorsement of the work of the Du Bose school, the Committee recommended its adoption, in which the Convention concurred.

The Committee recommended the adoption of the resolution concerning space in the *Newark Churchman* for the setting forth of the work of the Cathedral General Chapter, with the exception of the words "each month."

The Convention concurred in this motion.

In connection with the resolutions on the petition to the President of the United States and that to Congress concerning the matter of marriage and divorce, the Committee reported that it did not recommend the passage of the same.

It was moved and seconded that the report of the Committee on this resolution be adopted. After considerable discussion, the Rev'd Dr. Hamilton presented the following substitute which was adopted:

Resolved, That this Convention approve every effort being made for the reduction of divorce in our country and that we reaffirm the action of our General Convention to this effect.

The Report of the Secretary of the Convention was received. (*Vide, Index.*)

The Tellers reported the result of the Second Ballot as follows:

The Rev'd Dr. J. R. Lynes reporting for the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order in connection with the resolution concerning the election of officers of the Convention, reported that the Committee had secured from the mover of the resolution, the following amendment,

"This shall not apply to those whose expiring term of office shall have been for one year."

With regard to the resolution thus amended, the Committee made no recommendation.

After considerable discussion, a motion prevailed that the resolution be laid on the table until the following morning.

It was moved and seconded that the Convention adjourn to reconvene Wednesday morning after prayers at 9:30.

The Church Club of the Diocese entertained the Clerical and Lay Deputies to the Convention and other guests at dinner at the Robert Treat Hotel on the evening of the first day of the Convention. Mr. George W. Hulsart, the President, acted as Toast Master and in the course of the evening presented the following speakers: The Rt. Rev'd Edwin S. Lines, D.D., the Rt. Rev'd Wilson R. Stearly, D.D., the Rev'd W. Russell Bowie, D.D., the Rev'd S. Glover Dunseath, the Rev'd Louis W. Pitt, Mr. Frederick W. Hinrichs, Mr. H. Goddard Leach, Mr. James R. Strong and Mr. George W. Hulsart.

The gathering, one of the best given under the auspices of the Church Club in the Diocese was attended by about 420 guests.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons to which was referred the resolution of the Rev'd Dr. White, proposing to enact a new Canon, to provide for the representation of Missions in the Diocesan Convention, and also to provide what vote or fraction of a vote such Missions shall have on a vote by Orders, reports:

That it has considered the same and recommends the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That a new Canon be enacted to be numbered Canon 2, and to read as follows:

Canon 2.

SECTION 1. In each mission whose status as a Mission shall be recognized by the Bishop and the Board of Missions of the Diocese, the Laity shall be entitled to a representation in the Convention of the Diocese of one or more Deputies, not exceeding three.

SECTION 2. Whenever a vote is taken by Orders, each Mission shall have a one-half vote in the Lay Order.

Resolved, That the present Canons beginning with Canon 2, be renumbered accordingly.

The Rev'd Dr. White presented the following

Report, Special Committee on Legislation.

REPORT No. 1.

The Special Committee on Legislation to which was referred the proposed amendment to the statute law relating to the incorporation and government of the Episcopal Church in this State, with instructions to confer with a like Committee from the Diocese of New Jersey, and, with the consent of that Committee, to obtain the enactment of an amendment to said law providing for the election of twelve Vestrymen, as the maximum number, by a Parish when so desired, respectfully reports as follows:

That the proposed amendment was introduced in the legislature of this State at the beginning of its session last January and was enacted and received the signature of the Governor.

Section I, (3) of the law relating to the Incorporation and Government of Parishes, as found on page 78 of the Diocesan Manual, now reads as follows:

(3) The number of vestrymen, which shall be three, six, nine or twelve.

The Committee asks to be discharged from further consideration of this subject.

REPORT No. 2.

The Special Committee on Legislation to which was referred the proposed amendment to the statute law regarding the management and care of the Episcopal Fund, etc., with instructions to confer with the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties, also the proposal to provide by statutory enactment that Diocesan Institutions shall not alienate or incumber real property owned or held by such institutions without the written consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee, would respectfully report progress, and ask to be continued.

Both Reports were adopted.

Bishop Lines spoke briefly about the importance of the City Mission Work and also about the manner in which Deputies should report their travelling expenses.

Bishop Lines presented the following resolution on the approaching Conference on Faith and Order:

Resolved, That the Convention commends to the clergy and laity of the Diocese the subject of the Faith and Order Conference soon to be held. The Commission of the General Convention should have the sympathy and help of all of us in their work and the Convention asks that communications from the Commission have serious and respectful consideration.

This resolution was adopted.

Bishop Lines presented the following resolution on the Revision of the Prayer Book:

Resolved, That record be made in our minutes of the receipt by this Convention of the action of the General Convention upon the Revision of the Prayer Book.

This resolution was adopted.

Archdeacon Elmendorf moved that a Committee be appointed to consider the Revision of the Prayer Book and that the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order be requested to provide time on the Calendar for the discussion of this subject.

This motion was seconded and carried.

Bishop Lines presented the following resolution which on motion was adopted:

Resolved, To request the Secretary of the Convention to send to Rev'd Edwin E. Butler and Mr. John A. Gifford the assurance of our remembrance and of our regret at their inability to be present at the Convention.

Mr. John G. Crawford presented the Report on the *Newark Churchman*. (*Vide*, Index.)

The Rev'd Thomas A. Hyde, Chaplain-Superintendent of Christ Hospital, Jersey City, spoke at length on the work of the Institution.

Mr. James R. Strong presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That advertising of the proper kind is desirable in the *Newark Churchman*.

After considerable discussion the resolution was adopted.

Bishop Lines nominated Mr. John G. Crawford as Librarian. The Convention elected Mr. Crawford.

Bishop Lines moved the continuance of the present Committee on the Endowment of the Episcopate. The motion was adopted.

Bishop Lines moved the continuance of the Special Committee on Legislation. The motion was adopted.

Bishop Lines moved the continuance of the Committee on a Seal for the Diocese. The motion was adopted.

The Rev'd Charles L. Gomph spoke of the work of St. Barnabas' Hospital, Newark.

The Rev'd Dr. Edwin A. White spoke of the work of the Corporation for the Relief of Widows and Children.

Mr. James R. Strong presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to reprint for general distribution the Convention Addresses of our Bishops.

The resolution was adopted.

Mr. James R. Strong presented the following resolution:

WHEREAS, Our present method of elections is cumbersome, uneconomical and unbusinesslike and should be improved, be it

Resolved, That question of the method of elections by the Diocese be referred to the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order and the Committee on Constitution and Canons for joint report at the next Convention.

The resolution was adopted.

Mr. John G. Crawford presented some historical data in connection with the 50th Anniversary.

Reports by title were received from the Archdeacon of Hackensack, the Archdeacon of Morristown, the House of the Holy Comforter, the Alms House Missionary Society.

Rev'd Dr. Tinker moved that the thanks of the Convention be extended to the Very Rev'd Arthur Dumper, D.D., Dean, and the members of the Cathedral for their courtesy to the Convention, and that the customary honorarium be ordered paid to the Sexton of the Cathedral.

The motion was adopted.

Archdeacon Elmendorf moved that a special committee be appointed to read and approve the minutes. The motion was lost.

The motion prevailed that after the reading and approval of the minutes and the closing prayers, the Forty-Ninth Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark be adjourned *sine die*.

The Episcopal Address

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

With deep sense of the privilege of attendance at my twentieth Diocesan Convention, I bid you welcome as we meet together once more to counsel and advise concerning the interests of religion. While we have an immediate duty as regards the Diocese, the vision of the needs of the world, the country, the state, our communities, ought to open before us as we ask what part the Diocese of Newark is taking in the supreme business of bringing in the Kingdom of God. Our duty is to make the contribution of the Diocese to good religion as large as possible remembering alike the care of our own field and our world wide obligation.

Without taking time to discuss the conditions under which the Church must do its work today, let me urge you to keep your faces set toward the future with unwavering faith, courage and hope. It is a mistake to say that the time is unfavorable for the Church and for religion. Many of us are finding an excuse for slackened effort and small accomplishment in saying that the conditions are unfavorable for our work. We are told in many Parishes and Missions that there is a prejudice against the Church which is hard to overcome and from what I know of the way in which the Church is often presented and its work ordered, I do not wonder. The Parish which is not a great servant of the community does not deserve to prosper and must not expect to do so. I cannot name a Parish with good leadership, working in the Master's spirit of unselfish service which does not command respect, influence and support.

There is no use in spending time in complaint of the way the world is going, or in criticism of the interests which engross the lives of men and women. It is a time to throw ourselves into our work with all the zeal and resources that we can command and to commend the Church to the world as the one Institution and Fellowship which has solely a moral and spiritual purpose. We may assume that the religious instinct is ineradicable and that the fault is ours, if we cannot present the revelation given to us in our Lord Jesus Christ, so as to obtain a response.

The longing for a spiritual interpretation of life, for that which satisfies the deeper instincts, giving something upon which character and life may rest, throwing light upon the dark places in life, giving a living hope which

cannot fade away, was never more plainly in men and women than today. The serious question is whether the Church through us is presenting fairly and fully the religion of the Christ, in its gentleness and power, so as to help men and women in their needs and questionings, in their hopes and aspirations to find God.

Upon an unchanging faith in Jesus Christ, the Son of God, our Divine Lord and Saviour, we rest without doubt or question. Why should we be disturbed by the discussions and controversies which go on about us? Why should anyone be unsettled because strange voices, which are hard to reconcile with what the Church has accepted and confessed from the beginning, are heard? The days of persecution and suppression for us are happily ended. Our danger is from indifference, from being crowded out, not from opposition. It is hard to believe that any new enemies of the old faith are likely to appear, so thoroughly have the great truths about our Blessed Lord been tested in the generations that are gone. The Church has outlived an untold number of strange teachers and with the gentler, more intelligent, more merciful presentation of the religion of our Lord and His Apostles, it is better fitted to withstand attack and questioning than ever before. With its rich treasure of Christian lives and experience, of achievements in saving the old world out of its corruption and cruelty, with its contribution of about everything that makes human life endurable and nobler, it is fitted in a new way to go down into the battle in the name of Him who said that He had compassion on the multitude, and that if He was raised upon the Cross, He would draw all men unto Him.

My own feeling is that this Church, whose children we are and wherein especially we do our work, has a peculiar opportunity to bear witness for the unchanging truth about the Master and to make it a living power in the world. Amidst all the strange voices breaking with the past and seeming to leave us without chart or compass, the mother Church of English speaking people stands, confessing the faith of the ages, with a new manifestation of the desire in the spirit of the Christ, to minister to all men of every race or condition, in His name. It would be better for all of us, if we had with genuine respect for other churches, more honest pride in the story of the Church whose children we are, the Church which gave to English speaking people in their mother tongue, the Holy Scriptures, and the worship of the Christian centuries, the Church of Wyckliffe, Crammer, Latimer, Ridley, Tyndale and an innumerable company of saints and scholars. I know very well the pages of the record upon which there are blemishes, which record slackened zeal, but there is no Church with a history bringing less to be regretted than our own. The Episcopal Church has not recovered in our country from the disadvantages of its inheritance of suspicion and dislike, because its Bishops in the old country were civil officers in a State Church, and because of the great collapse which came

with the independence of the Colonies. The opposition of the established order in America to the coming of the missionaries of the English Church to look up its scattered and homesick children and the indifference of English politicians prevented the full organization of the Church, making the crossing of the ocean for Ordination when every sixth man lost his life, necessary until the very end of the 18th century. Few appreciate how weak this Church was for fifty years after the Independence of the Colonies, with prejudice, dislike and suspicion which seemed almost insurmountable. As is almost always the case, such a body of men, whether it be a Church or other organization lives within itself, becomes limited and timid in its spirit and plans, seems able to do little more than live, with its hostile surroundings. Half of the last century had gone before there was much of conscious strength, sense of large opportunity and responsibility in this Church. It is only within the memory of living men that there has been a large sense of power and of a calling to a great work in the name of religion for the country and for the world.

Give God thanks that it is coming now, that you and I have lived to see that larger vision, that new sense of calling and power, that larger opportunity to bear witness in the name of the Christ to what is old and unchanging and to welcome what is new with the determination to enthrone the Christ in a new world. As you think of the change which has come, of the fathers of the American Church who had to live through its days of great weakness, let the determination come to you to go back to your Parishes and give them a larger place in the ministry and service of the Christ.

The traditions of this Church in respect to training and work have long experience in their favor. They need intelligent adaptation alike in work and worship to the new time, while there is little hope in displacing them by sensational ways or by bringing into the service of religion the methods of modern business and advertising. A living Church cannot be bound minutely and rigidly to old methods. We live in a new world with changes so great as not to be yet appreciated by us, and the Church through its clergy and people must recognize that fact. No former age is to be made the standard for the new time. An order of life which is gone cannot be retailed. It is wasted effort to complain of the changes which have come and to endeavor to reestablish what has filled out its time.

Our clergy must study and observe and think, fearless not timid, using all their intellectual powers, to make their ministry stronger and to keep the Church in the moral leadership in the new age. They must bring out of their studies, like well instructed scribes "things new and old," and you will observe that the word new precedes the word old. They must regard science as the servant and friend of religion and rejoice in its contribution

to every department of human life. Its latest contributions have made the belief in the supernatural, in the miracles of our Blessed Lord, in a spiritual order easier to accept than ever before. The old misunderstanding or antagonism between religion and science has largely gone, and men of science and men of theology are happily more disposed to keep within their own fields and learn, one of the other. Some belated men of science are trying to ignore religion as an element in the world's progress and hope for the future, but they are fighting for a lost cause. Better that men should think and study and express the facts which come to them upon religion even if they get off the track now and then, than that they should stop thinking and try to live in the past. The Church has a long life and time works for the truth and in every generation it has been necessary to bear with strange teachers. Happily the days of suppression and timidity are ended and there is a strong sense of loyalty and faith which can be trusted. It is better to have life with irregularity than regularity without life. The Church is not a mechanism, but a living body and we must welcome life even if we regret some manifestations of it.

Let me plead with you to make large plans, whether for your own spiritual, moral and intellectual development, or for the ministry and life of the Diocese and the Parish. The clergy often act as if they were only to have thought for those in the community who count themselves as belonging to the Episcopal Church, to keep the Church open and receive those who come, and to do their parish work by telephone from the Parish House. The blight of a narrow sense of duty and of responsibility is upon too many of our Parishes, upon clergy and people alike. Every minister of this Church ought to be a good servant of the Community up to the limit of his strength, with an interest in all that makes for better community life, with a brotherly feeling towards all the people in the various experiences of life, as far as he can give it personal expression. The work of erasing names of those who have disappeared or are unknown from the communicant lists rather than spending time and effort in looking them up, goes on and under such process, Parish and Diocese appear often to be making little growth. The loss of Communicants through changes in residence and imperfect registration, makes one of the weakest parts of our Church life. New Rectors generally think that their predecessors left the Parish in a very depressed condition, and the officers of the Church think there is some connection between a large Communicant list and large apportionments. There are in our towns and cities hundreds of communicants not registered and not cared for.

We ought to do nothing to disturb the established Church relations of Christian people, but there are in every community persons who have elsewhere belonged to us, or have no Church relation, whom we ought diligently to seek out and if possible, bring home.

As one goes about the Diocese, he sees hundreds of new homes, small houses generally, making new communities and very unsatisfactory replies come when the clergy and officers of the Churches are asked who live in them. Every one of those homes ought to be visited by the nearest Rector or by someone going in his name, where the work is too great for him, to find out whether any of our people are living in them, to leave good wishes for every newcomer, and an invitation with information concerning the Church and its services, for those who have not a definite Church home. The pastoral work of the Church is not as well done as formerly and the strong Parishes were built up by it. The clergy in our cities and large towns cannot under the changed conditions do that work as well as those who lived in more quiet times, but agencies can be devised in living Parishes by thoughtful Rectors to do in the service of the Church and religion, what men in business have learned how to do in the discovery and keeping of their customers. We all need to do more work, to get other people to work, to give our people something to do, and the officers of the Churches ought to feel that personal service in drawing people to an interest in the Church is their duty as well as taking care of its business affairs. The relation of the Parish to the community ought to be made the subject of discussion in Vestry meetings and not alone the relation of the Parish to its pew holders.

It does not become us to be fearful as to the outcome of the new movements which are in the world. The stirring of the minds and hearts of people upon moral and spiritual subjects is to be welcomed rather than feared. A good sailor prefers a storm to a calm.

We trust the promise of the Holy Spirit to abide with the Church forever and to guide us into all truth, and why should we be disturbed by movements and utterances which are unlike those to which we are accustomed. A good many of these movements are simply upon the surface of the world's thinking and they will pass. Unwavering faith in the person and teaching of the Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of God, the Divine Head of the Church, becomes us. The world's history bears its testimony to Him in an ever stronger way. This foundation thought upon which our religion rests ought to permeate all utterances in His Name, but it is a mistake to be constantly making it the subject of argument. The lives of Christian people and so of the whole Church ought to proclaim the truth of the Gospel and it is the one effective argument.

In such a time as that through which we are passing, alarm and anxiety as to the outcome do but increase the sense of unsettlement. Formerly in a college chapel, the distinguished preachers in the pulpit uniformly brought elaborate discourses to prove the truth of the Christian religion and the effect was bad. The result of preaching which is continually

seeking to prove the truth of the great doctrines of our religion which center in the person and work of the Lord Jesus, leads persons to think that there must be weakness in a cause which needs so much in the way of argument. There is a reaction now from the presentation of religion in a hard way, the insistence upon the theological interpretations of mysterious doctrines, upon the suppression in the supposed interest of religion of natural desires and instincts.

The tide runs strongly towards larger, freer and more liberal interpretations and applications of the religion of the Christ in terms of our modern life, and it is to be welcomed rather than dreaded. There is more New Testament religion in the world than ever, but finding expression without the Church. There is no reason why definite Christian teaching should not go with the generous presentation of it which appeals to the consciences of men and makes religion attractive.

Faith in the Lord Jesus Christ as the world's true Master and Teacher is increasing and deepening and many of those who are expressing opinions which seem to some of us strange, are His loyal servants and not to be mistrusted. It is an evil time in the Church when suspicion and criticism, definitions and talk about the ages of faith which are gone, occupy the attention of Christian people. The Church, whose children, ministers and servants we are, holds the teaching about our Blessed Lord stated in the old Creeds. We must remember that those Creeds were formulated in the beginning, not as the outcome of the speculation of men, but as stating what had been held and believed concerning the Christ from the beginning. The language of the Creeds was that which was fitted for the time and to meet its needs. Without those Creeds religion could hardly have survived. They have rendered a blessed service in preserving the simplicity of the Christian faith, the unity of believers, an unchanging moral and spiritual foundation and they have not yet filled out their great office. Utterances concerning antiquated and outworn Creeds express ignorance and shallow thinking, with failure to appreciate the reason for the preservation and use of Creeds and of their service of the religion of the Christ. The talk about them as bonds and restrictions of Christian liberty is unworthy of respect. A sermon recently broadcasted, as it was said, to some hundreds of thousands of persons, spoke of "credal or real religion," as if religion which had a Creed could not be real religion. We are passing through a time when positive religious teaching and confession of the faith, upon which the Church has been built and religion established, are treated rather lightly, and we will rejoice that when we come together, we can declare our unwavering faith in words which have been used by the great multitude of the Disciples of Jesus Christ through all the ages.

We will remember also, that the truths concerning God, His Adorable Son and Sanctifying Spirit, do not come to all of us alike, and interpretations of the Creeds must not be regarded as parts of the Creeds. Our faith rests upon facts, not theories, upon our Lord's nature, life and teaching, not upon systems which have been formulated by theologians. We will keep our belief in and relation to the Christ simple and definite, a personal fellowship, communion and friendship, with good conscience, undisturbed by the strange voices which we hear about us. We believe in Him who is the Way, the Truth and the Life, and we know how to make the journey and what lies at its end.

The refuge in times of perplexity and anxiety is in action, in doing something for the Christ, which we know is pleasing to Him, to help save the world for which He died, through the service of those about us who need what we can do for them and what we in His name ought to do. The distinguished head of Mansfield College, Oxford, wisely says: "The weakest religions, and the weakest phases in the history of every religion, are those which spend most energy in defending themselves; the strongest are those which attack the oppositions, difficulties, disproportions, iniquities, perils and mysteries that beset the soul. Seen on the self-defensive, religion is apt to appear at its worst. It rises to its best in the moment of attack."

If we could in our own Diocese for example, set ourselves with renewed sense of consecration and devotion to the service of the Christ in the extension of His religion and of His ministry, questioning and anxiety would largely end, and to that solution of perplexities I call you today, bidding you go back to your Parishes with the determination that you will by your life as in your Creed confess your faith in the Christ.

There are great questions affecting the life of the country and the world which have alike a moral and political character concerning which the Clergy cannot be silent, and which religious people ought to decide. We hear frequently the warning that the Church must not touch political and industrial subjects, and the warning against what is called "political preaching" is constantly heard. Our people are very sensitive about utterances by the clergy on political subjects, but the silent acquiescence in the existing order, commendation of what has long been accepted, with something like worship of things as they are is preaching politics as definitely as saying that many things are not as they ought to be and that changes which express the principles and spirit of the Gospel of the Christ ought to be made.

There is a concerted effort of those who are satisfied with the present order to ridicule the name of "Reformer" and to discredit those who

are interested in one or another change. But the name of "Reformer" is one of the noblest titles that any man or woman has borne and the world owes about all that is good in it to those who have earned it. The world is waiting for men and women who, with sanity, courage and unselfishness, will take the leadership in making an end of wrong and in bringing in the reign of righteousness. In that group, the clergy and the officers of the Churches ought to be found.

For lack of time I can do little more than name some of those great causes which concern human welfare, and plead for your steadfast service of them. The war is ended but peace has not come and the world is in confusion because of national rivalries and selfishness, because of the spirit of revenge and distrust. Some thoughtful students of the world's recent history and present condition fear for the very existence of Christian civilization. Surely our attitude ought to be one of unwavering confidence in the principles of the Gospel for the guidance of nations as well as individuals. Whatever can be done to make an end of war, to displace preparations for war by preparations for peace, and to make unity among the nations, should have our support. As long as there are so many warlike nations and wicked people in the world, an army and a navy must be maintained, even as a police force must be maintained in our communities for the restraint of evil-doers and the preservation of order, but it does not seem necessary that in our own country generals and admirals and ambitious politicians should spend so much time in creating among our people a feeling of unrest, and urging the necessity of spending an immense amount of money in making ready for war. The note in much of their talk this winter has been very like that of the Kaiser and the German War Lords between 1870 and 1914, in telling their people that the security of Germany depended upon a great army and a great navy. The endeavor to maintain friendly relations with the other nations and to help them in their time of trouble and ours of prosperity, making an end of our isolation and aloofness, becomes us. All ought to help develop a public opinion in favor of every effort, whether by the President through an International Court, or by an adaptation of the League of Nations to make such a court strong, to put our country on the side of peace with the restriction of armaments in the unselfish service of humanity. The teaching that our best service to the world is taking good care of ourselves, watchful for our material prosperity, getting out of the rest of the world as much as we can for our own benefit and doing as little for it as we can, is pagan, not Christian and it ill becomes a great nation.

It is hard to understand why there should be so shameful a revival of national and race prejudices, and against them every good Christian will stand and fight hard. The slow and uncertain operation of law and

justice is made an excuse for violence and the remedy must come through publicity and an enlightened public opinion, which will hold officials to the performance of their duty. Our country is discredited before the world by lynchings and mob violence, by irresponsible and corrupt municipal government, by our quick forgetfulness of shameless official conduct, while we are busy in trying to make money. If the Church through its duly appointed teachers and officers is to be silent, while low standards of morals and conduct, public and private, are accepted, from whence shall help come? Christian prophets are needed to cry out against such things, with the spirit of God's ancient prophets, who saved the religion of the true God in their time.

There are signs of the coming into our industrial order of new ideals, the appearance of enlightened and generous men of business who believe in co-operation and the merciful conduct of trade, and in their appearance we will rejoice. Men and women to whom the power to organize and conduct business has come, and they are not very many in number, ought to feel that they are as truly ordained to serve God and their fellow-men as those of us who are ordained to the sacred Ministry. A man who has the gift to develop or order a business which makes for the world's well being, ought to feel a responsibility for those who work with and for him, and that it is a duty and privilege to show appreciation of their service, making their wages and the conditions under which they work and under which they live, humane, comfortable, favorable to their happiness and development. He ought especially to have a responsibility for those who are in the harder places in life. He ought to feel that surrounding himself with self-respecting employees, who are sharing his prosperity, is a much finer ideal in life than making a great fortune, living in a great house like Dives, faring sumptuously every day. Men especially in places of privilege and power are their brother's keepers and happily a good many men are recognizing the fact. Let the Church in Christ's name never cease to plead for the sense of responsibility, brotherhood, neighborliness, good will, co-operation especially on the part of those to whom much has been given.

As regards the subject of prohibition, I have only to repeat what I have said in former addresses. I think it the duty of all right-minded men and women to do all they can to maintain the Eighteenth Amendment to the Constitution and the laws which have been passed to make it operative. I do not see how the officials of any State, from the Governor to a member of the Legislature, can withhold his support from the fundamental law of the land to which he has sworn obedience, and from the laws which enforce the same. We had to expect that greed and an unwarranted idea of personal liberty rather than the common good, would

make the enforcement of these laws difficult. A self-respecting State will not indefinitely allow a fleet of ships loaded with strong drink, much of it poisonous, to treat our laws with contempt. When the authorities of the Nation and of the State determine to make an end of this defiance of the law, they will do so, even as they have made an end of smuggling of a less serious character.

The good already accomplished by prohibition is of immense value to the country. The restriction of personal liberty, which measures the progress of civilization, is not to be named in comparison with the homes which have been made more comfortable through the use of the money formerly spent on strong drink, with the burden lifted from mothers and children in those homes, the improvement in social customs, and the removal of political control from numberless degrading saloons. Prohibition stands close beside the entry of the United States into the war to save the world's civilization as a glorious part of the history of the country in this last decade. It is our great opportunity to remove a curse which has rested upon the world, to be named for its destruction and waste and debasement of what is noblest in human life, with war itself.

I shall say little upon the subject of greater unity among the Churches, while my interest in it and my desire to keep our own Church interested, are not diminished. Relatively more of our own people with the traditions of the corporate Christian life and the teaching of a definite faith and common worship, are interested in Church unity, than in the great Churches about us. I am concerned whether there be great or small accomplishment in our generation in making an end of divisions, controversies and discords, weakening the witness of Christian people for the Lord Jesus Christ, but especially that our own Church should not be put in the wrong in any way, open to criticism, for much talk and little action, for lack of charity and willingness to make sacrifices to bring Christian people closer together. Much is happening now in the controversies within Christian Churches to make disappointment, and every true Christian, whatever his own Church may be, will regret such controversies. We know that while uniformity and absorption in one great Church are not to be expected, a divided Church will never give Christ His true place in this world, and that it is within the power of Christian people, through closer affiliation and fellowship, to diminish if not to remove, the ills of a distracted Christendom. So I bid you say and do what makes for recognition of genuine and real religion, appreciation of goodness wherever you may find them and to keep in your own Church a spirit of charity and largeness of mind, which surely our Lord desires.

Did time permit, I would speak as strongly as I could of the sacredness of the home and the family and the obligation of doing all in our

power for their preservation. The statistics concerning divorce are appalling and the very foundation of our national life is threatened. The subject of proper legislation to limit the causes for which divorces are granted, is of the highest importance and beyond that we need to make our young people feel the seriousness of marriage and act in the whole matter from the highest principle. We need also to declare respect for womanhood, an essential part of character and to say without ceasing that it is a test, a standard by which to judge persons and nations alike.

I would also gladly make my plea for the restriction of child labor. It is a great disappointment that the Supreme Court has declared unconstitutional the law passed to bar the way against the destruction of childhood by greed. The thrusting of children out of school at the age of fourteen into factories and gainful occupations, oftentimes to support lazy fathers, is a blemish upon our national life. Every man or woman who has a sense of pity or mercy for childhood, should denounce much of our child labor and agitate without ceasing to give boys and girls a chance in life.

Let me plead with you also for prison reform, beginning with New Jersey, for intelligent treatment of those who have broken the laws and are being punished for it. The fault for the conduct of the majority of those whom we call criminals, is with the generation before them, with parents and persons who never taught them to do anything well, which the world needs to have done, who never gave them a chance in life, who let them without direction go wrong. A great many of them are defectives, who deserve pity and special treatment. The jails and prisons in this country are, with few exceptions, abominable, unfit for beasts to live in, not to say human beings. The Christian principle is the saving of all that is good in any one, no matter how bad he may be, not revenge or vindictiveness.

Why should not more of our young men and young women, college-bred or well educated, often with some leisure time, take these great causes into their lives and count for more in the world, instead of wasting their time at country clubs and places of amusement, talking over golf scores or the respective merits of automobiles. The Master's words ought to come to us with irresistible power from which there is no escape, "I was in prison, and ye came unto me." "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

Since the meeting of the General Convention in September, five of our Bishops have died, all of whom had been very active men in the service of the Church. The first named should be the Presiding Bishop, Rt. Rev'd Dr. Daniel S. Tuttle, a pioneer missionary Bishop in the far west

for twenty years before he became Bishop of Missouri in 1886. His record of service, his character, his devotion to his work, his helpfulness to all his brethren give him a great place, not only in the history of our own Church, but in the religious history of our country.

Bishop Whitehead of Pittsburgh was well known in our own Diocese because of the relation of himself and his family to northern New Jersey and his very real interest in us.

Rt. Rev'd Dr. Charles D. Williams of Michigan held a peculiar place in the Church, which can hardly be filled, because of his very deep interest in social and industrial questions and his courage in discussing them. He probably had a larger hearing and greater influence than any other member of the House of Bishops and his death is felt as a personal loss by a multitude of our people.

Rt. Rev'd G. Mott Williams, formerly Bishop of Marquette was a man of excellent gifts which he used in the service of the Church in a wise and unselfish way.

Rt. Rev'd Dr. Alfred Harding of Washington was a whole-hearted servant of the Church, giving himself without reserve to its ministry and commanding universal respect.

Two of our own Clergy have passed from this life, Rev'd John C. Fair, in his early ministry a missionary in the far west, in his last years disabled by broken health and obliged to give up the work of the ministry to which he was thoroughly devoted. Rev'd Henry B. Wilson had made for himself a large place in his Parish and community and quite beyond that through his intense interest in spiritual healing, which made for him a great company of friends, who had been helped by him and who will never cease to cherish his memory.

The list of laymen, officers of the Diocese and of their Parishes, who have died since the last Convention is a long one. Every name suggests special service of the Church, of which did time permit, I would gladly remind you: Mr. George R. Edgcumbe of St. John's, Jersey City; Mr. Arthur E. Butler of Wood Ridge; Mr. Julius Van Wagenen, formerly of St. Barnabas', Newark, later of Maplewood, living to nearly one hundred years of age; Mr. A. R. Conover of Coytesville; Mr. Stephen W. Williams of St. Mark's, West Orange; Mr. Andrew C. Worth of Englewood; Mr. Ransom H. Thomas of St. Peter's, Morristown; Mr. Charles Crane of St. Mark's, Paterson; Mr. Francis S. Hoyt of the Church of the Redeemer, Morristown; Mr. A. Livingston Kean, who established St. Peter's, Livingston; Mr. William Williamson of St. Stephen's, Jersey City; Mr. Gabriel L. Lawrence of Hamburg; Mr. George Biller of St.

John's, Newark; Mr. William E. Fenno of Edgewater; Mr. George W. Campbell and Mr. Joshua P. Benedict of Millburn; Mr. Joseph H. Strange of the Church of the Holy Communion, South Orange; Mr. Ezra C. Williams of Holy Trinity, West Orange; Mr. Henry Lansdell of Hackensack; Mr. H. St. John Webb of Montclair; Mr. Mahlon H. Kennard of St. Philip's, Newark.

Of many other fellow laborers who have been very faithful servants of the Church, I would gladly speak. It has been a year of very great losses among our most useful laymen. To those whose names have now been read, the Diocese owes more than any of us can well express.

The Bishop Coadjutor's Address

My Dear Brothers in Christ:

The work of the Church in the Diocese has gone on steadily during the past year, without any great sensations or untoward incidents. There were in 1922 2,353 Baptisms and 2,338 Confirmations, and the number of Communicants as reported is 48,824. Four have been ordained Deacons, and 2 have been Priested. We now have 138 Parishes and Missions in which 129 Clergymen are actively at work. When to this number is added those who are retired or engaged in other work, the so-called non-parochials, we have at present a total Clergy list of 171. We have at present 10 Postulants and 13 Candidates for Holy Orders. Five of these will enter the Seminary in the Autumn, and there are a few who are looking to the Ministry as their life-work whose names have not yet been formally entered upon the list. There is reason for congratulation in the personal qualities and good preparation of the young men coming up, but there should be more of them, and I would urge the Clergy and lay people alike to keep before the boys and young men in their Parishes the need of the Church for able and well-trained and devoted men in the Ministry. As a Diocese we do not produce enough Clergymen to meet our own needs, and our ambition should be to do much more than this. We have now a small group of workers, men and women, who represent us in the missionary field, but we ought to be sending choice persons from our strong and growing congregations to work for Christ and His Church in the great wide field of the world.

During the year the working Boards and Committees of the Diocese have given good and faithful attention to the matters committed to their charge. The work of Church Extension, of Religious Education, and Christian Social Service, has been well led by the Canons in charge of these departments of Diocesan activity. In June last the Rev'd Guy H. Madara of Trinity Church, Paterson, became Canon Missioner for Missions. In this position he has become the Executive Officer of the Department of Development and Revenue, whose duty it is to strengthen and increase in the Diocese the knowledge and support of the whole missionary work of the Church. Although we have had to face a small and gradual subsidence in gifts for Missions and Benevolences in the last

three years, it is a satisfaction to know, from present indications, that this decrease has reached its term, and it is expected that this year our record will be improved in this respect. The report of the Treasurer shows that in 1922 our Parishes and Missions gave for Missionary and Benevolent Work carried on by the Church a sum of \$214,986.47. This is somewhere about \$5.00 per communicant. It would seem as though we should do better than this.

Great praise is due to many in a large number of Parishes and Missions who have faithfully labored in the spirit of the Nation-Wide Campaign to lay before all the people their responsibility as Christians to share in the whole missionary work of the Church. What is greatly needed is that this spirit and devotion shall become general throughout the Diocese. We are not doing our full share, and there should be no cessation of effort until as a Diocese we take our place as gladly and completely meeting the expectation of us expressed in the Budget Quota of the whole Church.

In the report of the Finance and Advisory Board I would call attention to the item in the Treasurer's statement covering expenditures to supplement the stipends of the Clergy. In 1922 \$9,066.14 was paid to 29 Clergymen to bring up their stipends to the very modest established minimum. This amount is less than that paid in 1921, and less than the amounts paid previously. This indicates that the smaller Parishes and Missions whose Clergy have benefitted from this fund, have been growing stronger, and able to themselves pay a more suitable and adequate stipend. We must continue this work, and in connection with it do all possible to create better standards of living for the Clergy. I would earnestly urge upon all the lay people fair dealing with their Clergy in this regard. There are a number of parishes where very inadequate salaries are paid to the Clergy. Some, which, in spite of the great increase of costs, are content to let the parson do what he can to eke out a living on the basis of the pre-war stipend.

It is a pleasure to announce that the estate of the late Alfred G. Evans having been settled the Diocese is now in possession of the fine property at Madison, given by him, to be used as the Laura Augusta Home for Orphan Children. The Board of Managers desires to make this home a special means of ministering to the children of Clergymen, officers of the Army and Navy, and of professional people in general. It is expected that the home will be formally opened in the early Autumn, and the Managers will be glad at any time now to receive word of children who might fittingly and hopefully be received into the Home.

During the last year three congregations have erected buildings for use of the newly organized Missions. Through the generosity of the

Senior Warden and the devotion of the parishioners, St. Bartholomew's, Ho-Ho-Kus, has acquired land and built St. Elizabeth's Chapel in Upper Ridgewood. All Saints', Bergenfield, with the help of the Diocese and through the generous gift of land from Mr. Charles Sinkler of Philadelphia, has built St. Luke's Chapel in Gilpin Park. The congregation of the Church of the Epiphany, Orange, has acquired a fine piece of ground in the Elmwood section of East Orange and erected upon it a simple Parish Hall. St. Andrew's Church, Newark, has built a rectory during the year, and new parish houses have been put up by St. Luke's and St. John's, Montclair, and St. John's, West Hoboken. Additions and improvements to parish houses have been made by St. Peter's, Essex Fells, the Mission of the Annunciation, Oradell, and St. Stephen's, Millburn.

The considerable amount of new building and material improvements in the Diocese during the past year make it appropriate to say a few words at this time concerning certain aspects of the responsibility and duty of Wardens and Vestrymen. The province, the field of service of Wardens and Vestrymen, their obligations and authority, are pretty clearly defined by canonical and legal enactments and by tradition. In general it may be said that the Wardens and Vestrymen, with the rector, are the legal representatives of the parish, and have in their charge the temporal and material concerns of the congregation.

The number of Vestrymen is determined by the charter of the parish, and may now be as many as twelve, and parishes have the right to determine whether the whole number shall be elected each year for the ensuing twelve months, or whether they shall be elected in classes, one-third each year for terms of three years. A Warden must be a male communicant of the Church in good standing and a qualified voter in the parish in which he is elected. Vestrymen must be baptized men, who adhere to the Protestant Episcopal Church and no other religious body, and who are regular attendants upon the services of the Church and contributors to its support.

It is the prerogative and duty of the Wardens and Vestrymen to choose and elect the Rector and to move for the dissolution of pastoral relations should this become necessary or desirable. The State statute requires that two-thirds of the Vestrymen should concur in the election of a Rector, and the Canon prescribes that before an election the Vestry must notify the Bishop of its desire, and before taking further action, wait not more than thirty days, for his reply. The Wardens are bound to send to the Bishop a formal notice of an election of a Rector. In the absence of a Rector it is their duty to provide for the maintenance of the regular services of the Church; they become the custodians of the Parish Register and make the annual report to the Bishop of the condi-

tion of the parish. The Wardens are authorized also in the absence of a Minister to give a certificate of transfer, when desired, to a communicant removing to another parish, and with the Vestrymen they sign the testimonials of Candidates for Holy Orders from their parish.

The Wardens and Vestrymen are the legal custodians of the property of the Church, though they have no right, without the written consent of the Bishop and a majority of the Standing Committee, to sell or mortgage any real estate or to execute a lease for a longer term than one year.

The Rector presides at meetings of the Vestry. He is entitled to receive toward a parish fund for pious and charitable uses for the poor, the alms and contributions at a service of the Holy Communion on one Sunday in each month. The control of the worship and the spiritual jurisdiction of the parish are vested in the Rector. The Rector also is responsible for the music at the Church services. It is up to him to select the hymns and anthems, and to appoint such persons as he may see fit to assist in the singing. It is made his especial duty to suppress all light and unseemly music and all irreverence in the performance. "For the purposes of his office and for the full and free discharge of all functions and duties pertaining thereto, the Rector shall, at all times, be entitled to the use and control of the Church and parish buildings with the appurtenances and furniture thereof."

It should be noted that in Missions, which are not corporate bodies, the Wardens are appointed by the Bishop and the business affairs of the congregation are in the hands of an Executive Committee. The Priest in charge of a Mission has, subject to the authority of the Bishop, the same prerogatives and responsibilities toward his congregation as the Rector of a parish, and the members of the Executive Committee, who are elected by the parishioners in the same manner as Vestrymen, have in the main the same obligations and duties as Vestrymen in incorporated parishes.

There are in this Diocese about twelve hundred men serving the Church in this way as custodians of its property and trustees and leaders in the management of its material and temporal concerns. This is a fine body of men and they constitute a great asset alike to the Church and the communities in which they live. Not many of them are ciphers. Some of you will recall the genial play entitled "Thank You," which entertained a great many Church folk and others a year or so ago in New York. We all had some hearty laughs at the vestry meeting therein portrayed. It was the exaggeration of our defects which constituted its humour. All Vestrymen are human, and Vestry meetings reveal the play of preju-

dice and the strange expressions of idiosyncrasy, as well as other gatherings. There are among us still some Vestrymen who are holdovers from an earlier day, and some who apparently were chosen as ornaments, or for the supposed value of their names. There are some who take their duties lightly and who are never requested to do anything much because they have never so far done anything very well which they have been asked to do.

There are probably a few in some of our parishes and missions who by their carelessness and indifference make it more difficult for the Rector and his faithful helpers to carry on. By their frequent absence from Vestry meetings they hinder and delay the wise consideration of parish problems, and the consistent adoption and working out of a fine parish policy. They make it difficult at times to secure a quorum for the transaction of business; they lose touch with the aspirations and ideals of the best lovers of and most devoted workers in the parish; and are more or less efficient in dragging upon and delaying the progress of the chariot of the Lord. It must be said, however, that such are a very small minority and that for the most part those who are serving our parishes and missions in this capacity are rendering without money and without price a service which is of primary importance and fundamental value to the Church and society at large.

In connection with a Confirmation visitation, I had recently the pleasure of "sitting in" with a meeting of the Rector and Vestry of one of our older parishes. It was a delightful and heartening experience because it reflected from beginning to end the qualities which make good Vestrymen, able and wise and conscientious men intent upon rendering our Lord and His Church a worthy and acceptable service. From the reading of the minutes, through the Treasurer's statement and the reports of Standing and Special Committees, together with the consideration of present and future parish problems, everything was done not only "decently and in order," as the phrase goes, but with an evident intention and purpose on the part of all to care for the interest and well-being of the Church in a fine and devoted manner. It is a good custom in this parish, after the annual elections, to formally induct the Vestrymen into office at a regular service of the Church. This tends to dignify the office and to bring home to all an added sense of the responsibility and duties belonging to it.

The ideal of all Vestrymen should be a faithful trusteeship, and a conscious and avowed purpose to so faithfully serve, and so effectively during their terms of office to forward the interests of the Church, that they may have the satisfaction, when their terms expire, of passing the affairs of the parish into others' hands in a better condition than they received

them. Why not? Why should not a man be ashamed of letting any work for which he has taken responsibility, run down and suffer loss? And why should not any group of Vestrymen have the ambition year by year, in reporting to the congregation and the Bishop, to be able to point out how well and faithfully matters in their hands have been attended to, and how much progress under the special conditions of the parish has been made?

There is a Canon of the Church entitled, "Of business methods in Church affairs," the tenor of which is to lay it upon all who have responsibility in such matters to do their work in a skillful and wise and up-to-date manner. A good bit along this line has been said in recent years in regard to the way of securing the requisite financial support of the Church and its missionary work. The Canons prescribe as the Vestry's primary duty the adoption of proper modes for meeting the current expenses of the parish. This means in a modern-minded and alert and working Vestry the adoption of the Budget System, the sponsoring and leading of the annual Every-Member Canvass, the taking of proper measures to collect the amounts subscribed, the making of regular financial reports to the members of the congregation, the providing for the payment of salaries and bills when due, and the keeping good of the credit of the Church and its servants. Thank God for the passing of the old slipshod and careless ways of raising Church funds, of incurring obligations with no idea of how they would be met, of getting up entertainments and special benefits, of putting in a note at the bank with the expectation that it could be paid out of Christmas or Easter offerings, or even carried on from year to year in the hope that some lucky chance would some day enable its cancelling. It is a new day in this regard in most of our parishes. With the sense of trusteeship has come the consecration of talents to these business matters of the Church, to the joy of the Vestrymen themselves, the relief of the clergy, and the increased sense in the congregation and the community of the worth and dignity of the Church itself.

There are several matters connected with this side of the Church's life which need regular and careful consideration. One is the matter of repairs and improvements; another the payment of debts; a third, the wise providing for the future. It is of the greatest importance that the property of the Church be regularly and constantly taken care of. It happens all too frequently that long periods of time elapse during which nothing is done, and deterioration and decay go on apace. The roof begins to leak, the heating plant breaks down, the woodwork sloughs off all its paint, the organ is untouched for a score of years, and the carpet is in shreds. I know parishes where new Clergymen have inherited just such

a state of affairs, and it is a shame that able and devoted Priests and new Vestrymen should have to bear thus the short-comings and failures of the previous years. In England they have a system of inspection of Church property, and a certain part of the income of the Church is by law required to be set aside for "dilapidations," as it is called, and thus the property is kept up and in good condition. Such a method is probably not available with us, but it may be urged upon the Vestrymen that a carefully considered plan might be adopted which would provide for the keeping of all Church property in good condition all the time. This is cheaper in the long run and far more satisfactory.

And in the making of repairs, as well as additions and improvements, the aim ought to be to do all substantially, and with good taste, and in harmony with the surroundings and best traditions of the community. It is true that where resources are limited you must do not what you want, but what you can, but a little well done is better than a great deal that is gaudy and cheap, and an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. It is certain that there is satisfaction in the thought that the normal wear and tear and decay in the Church's buildings is provided against, and it is a great pleasure when work has been done to feel that it both fulfills the need practically and also looks well.

A progressive and alert Vestry will be concerned about the payment of debts. It will not tolerate the carrying over of a deficit into a new fiscal year, and it will regard a standing debt as a handicap, not to say a menace, to the life and work of the parish. It is sometimes remarked that it is a good thing for a Church to go into debt, for then the people have something to work for. The real reason for going into debt is not this of course. It is right to incur a debt for the sake of making better facilities for the work of the Church, or in providing for enlargements to meet expanding needs. The making of such a debt is often the greatest wisdom; it is an investment and frequently brings large returns. In the development of Missions in new communities it is almost always a necessity. What needs to be guarded against is the tendency to accept a debt as a natural and permanent thing, to pay the interest and leave the principal to be dealt with by later comers. This is a bad form of passing the buck. It not only holds back the work of the Church, it harms the congregation by inculcating a lethargic spirit, developing a mood of "let well enough alone."

There are in the Diocese, according to the parochial reports, 70 Parishes and Missions reporting funded or permanent indebtedness. The amounts range from \$319 to \$47,500, and the total for the Diocese is \$499,316.76. No one can judge for others, and what is the right course of action can only be determined by those who are conversant with facts and in touch

with material and spiritual conditions in the parish, but it can be said with entire truth that a wise and alert and progressive Vestry will never leave out of its mind for long the matter of the indebtedness, if such exists, and will be planning for well considered and timely action in regard to it.

The same may be said concerning parish endowments. A faithful trusteeship of parish affairs means keeping things up, clearing away old incumbrances, and preparing the Church for enlarging permanent usefulness. There are differences of opinion as to the advantages of parish endowments; but I think it can hardly be questioned that there are cases where if a parish had been at the right time adequately helped by stored up capital it might have been put in a position to serve the future day far more effectively than has been possible. The Church is a living and permanent institution, and it is fair to ask whether in days of great prosperity the members of a parish do enough if they provide generously for its support and missionary work, and look not ahead to what changes the coming years may bring. So many times Clergymen and Vestries have lived and rejoiced in an affluent present, when their larger sense of trusteeship might have led them to making more firm and splendid the foundations and outgoings of the parish in fruitful service during the leaner but not less opportune years ahead. One can think of parishes in the Diocese which apparently will in the course of years undergo great changes, and one could wish that now in the days of their prosperity those who love them well, and who have of this world's goods, might lay by for them something in store for the coming days of need.

Reports of the Archdeacons

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF NEWARK.

To the Rt. Rev'd Edwin S. Lines, D.D.

I beg to present the following report:

ST. AGNES', LITTLE FALLS. This year's work has been the best. The services have been well attended. The Church School has a staff of trained teachers. The Guilds have been active in local and missionary work. Saint Agnes' has got in touch with the foreign born and on the great feast days has had as its guests the Congregation and Choir of the Russian Orthodox Church. Twenty services were held at the Essex County Hospital. Baptized 16, Confirmed 11, Communicants 170.

ST. DAVID'S, CEDAR GROVE. Recently the mortgage on the adjoining lot was substantially reduced. There has been little growth in the Church or Community during the past two years, but with added transit facilities there seems to be a brighter outlook.

ST. MARY MAGDELENE, NEWARK. St. Mary's lost several devoted families and was vacant for five months, but the congregation held together remarkably well, and under the Rev'd Mr. Werlein the people are regaining confidence. Twenty-five families have been added in the past two months. The finances are in better condition and the indebtedness is being paid at the rate of \$1,000 per year. The section is rapidly building up and St. Mary's hopes before long to be an independent parish. Baptized, 3; Confirmed, 8; members of Church School, 80; Communicants, 138.

ST. ALBAN'S, NEWARK. There is increased attendance and more interest in the different Societies and the Church School is doing well. A Men's Club has been organized and is in a flourishing condition. The people are loyal and devoted. Repairs to the Church have been made and paid for. The quota for the Nation-Wide Campaign was over-subscribed. Baptized, 10; Confirmed, 9; average attendance, Holy Communion, 17; Morning Prayer, 43; Evening Prayer, 28.

ST. GEORGE'S, NEWARK. The Church School is growing and has a remarkable record for attendance. Excellent work is being done by the officers and teachers. The Societies are working well. A new heating system has been put in, the cost being reduced by some loyal men who installed it themselves. \$850 has been paid on the mortgage. Baptized, 4; average attendance, early Celebrations, 12; late Celebration, 40; Morning Prayer, 29; Evening Prayer, 30.

CHRIST CHURCH, NEWARK. With Diocesan help the Church was repaired at a cost of about \$850. The Church School is 60% larger than last year. A very successful vacation Bible School was held with a daily average attendance of 68, ten nationalities being represented. Baptized, 7; Confirmed, 5; Church School officers and teachers, 20;

Scholars, 60; Parish organizations, 7; membership, 147. The future for Christ Church is very promising, as it is strategically located to take part in the aggressive plan of the Diocese in regard to the foreign born. 56,000 people of foreign birth or parentage and one-fifth of all the foreign born Italians in Newark live within the Parish limits.

Two very successful Archdeaconry meetings were held during the year.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF JERSEY CITY.

To the Rt. Rev'd Edwin S. Lines, D.D., Bishop of Newark.

During the past year the Archdeaconry of Jersey City has held three meetings. The Spring meeting in Grace Church, Van Vorst, was held in conjunction with the celebration of the 75th Anniversary of that parish. The Fall meeting was held at our Mission of the Transfiguration, Woodcliffe, and the Winter Meeting in St. Mary's Church, Jersey City, in connection with the District Church School Union.

The Archdeaconry contains at the present time only two missions, the Transfiguration, Woodcliffe, and the Incarnation for colored people in Jersey City.

Both of these missions are forging ahead. The Mission of the Transfiguration, under the charge of the Rev'd Edgar W. Anderson, is in the midst of a growing community and the mission ought to be a self supporting parish within a few years.

The Incarnation is under the charge of the Rev'd Robert D. Brown, who also has charge of St. Philip's Church in Newark. His people are active and enthusiastic and the building they now occupy—a dwelling house with the first floor thrown into one room and fitted up for church purposes—will soon be too small to accommodate the congregations. The house stands on a fine large lot on Storms Avenue, in Jersey City, and is a fine site for their future church.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF PATERSON.

To the Rt. Rev'd Edwin S. Lines, D.D., Bishop of Newark.

The report for the past year is most encouraging. The number of pupils in the Sunday schools has increased, good classes have been presented for confirmation, the

attendance upon public worship shows, in some instances, marked advance, and, as might be expected, the finances of the missions are in a healthy condition.

THE CHURCH OF THE EPIPHANY, ALLENDALE, which is without a resident priest, is in charge of Canon Missioner Guy H. Madara, who is rallying the people around him, and the future is brightening. The need of a rectory is strongly felt and it will not be a great while before one is secured.

ST. JOHN'S, RAMSEY, Raymond W. Masters, D.C.L., priest in charge. The belfry which has been a source of anxiety for years has been repaired at the cost of \$400, and plans are on foot to improve the grounds of the rectory and the interior of the church during the coming year.

ALL SAINTS', GLEN ROCK, John E. Bailey, priest in charge. Three hundred dollars have been paid on the loan from the Diocese, and it is expected that a like payment will be made in the fall. In addition \$500 have been spent on improvements, and "The Nation-Wide and Diocesan askings were over pledged."

CHRIST CHAPEL, WORTENDYKE, Olof G. Olsen, priest in charge. The mortgage has been reduced, the church grounds improved, and \$260 raised toward the purchase price of a small pipe organ.

CHRIST CHURCH, POMPTON LAKES; ST. PAUL'S, BUTLER, and THE GOOD SHEPHERD and ST. LUKE'S, RINGWOOD MANOR, Rev'd J. Warren Albinson, in charge. A new heating plant for CHRIST CHURCH is under consideration. A parish hall, long needed, has been built under ST. PAUL'S, BUTLER. Services are held regularly at Ringwood Manor. Once a month a union service is held in one of the three churches, promoting unity, fellowship and strength.

ST. ADAM'S, PATERSON, Robert J. Johnson, priest in charge. Notwithstanding discouragements the mission has taken root and is growing. During the past year \$500 were paid on the rectory and the interest of \$240 was likewise met.

ST. CLEMENT'S, HAWTHORNE, William Mawhinney, priest in charge. The work goes forward quietly and cheerily. On Easter Day, when Bishop Lines confirmed a class of ten, the largest offering in the history of the mission was made—\$800, and 1,500 eggs were given by the children of the Sunday school for the sick.

ST. GEORGE'S, PASSAIC, Theodore Andrews, priest in charge. Interest has been quickened and plans are being made to enlarge the kitchen and vestry wing of the church and to go over the church building in making necessary repairs to walls and roof. A Vacation Bible School is to be held in July. A fund has been started to purchase an organ in memory of the late Hugh D. Wilson, who was greatly beloved by people of all the churches and of no church.

HOLY INNOCENTS', GARFIELD, Theodore Andrews, priest in charge. The Diocese is planning to start work in the Italian language. The Junior Choir has been reorganized, and a new Boy Scout Troop of Italian lads is being formed. Miss Lake, who is doing so much for the people by visiting and by organized work on week days, is to hold a Daily Vacation Bible School again this summer.

ST. STEPHEN'S, DELAWARE, has been placed under the charge of the Rev'd C. P. Tinker, D.D., Rector of Grace Church, Nutley. There has been a reorganization of societies under Dr. Tinker and the future is bright. During the past year, while Rev'd F. Vernon Loece was in charge, the Sunday school was graded and additional property purchased for \$790.

GRACE CHAPEL, EAST RUTHERFORD, and ST. PAUL'S, WOOD RIDGE, have been ministered unto by Mr. John Thomas, shortly to be ordained deacon, under the guidance of the

Canon Missioner. In East Rutherford the mortgage on the rectory was cancelled by the payment of \$500. The Church Building Fund has been increased to over \$1,000. There is a very active Girls' Friendly Society. The Sunday school has been reorganized, graded, and the Christian Nurture System adopted.

At St. PAUL's there is the fulness of vigorous life. The attendance on the services has so increased that some are talking of enlarging the church building. The membership of the Sunday school has grown 75 per cent. A Bible Class of 22 confirmed boys and girls is well established. Mr. C. W. Nussbaum, the superintendent, has worked hard and is to be congratulated. St. Martha's Guild paid off the Bishop's loan, which, with interest and principal, amounted to \$615. The regular mortgage was reduced by \$250.

St. THOMAS', LYNDHURST, Franklin G. Faber, priest in charge. During the past year attendance on church has improved and the Sunday school grown in strength. The mortgage of \$2,000 on the church building has been paid in full, and the subject of a new church building is being agitated.

St. PAUL's, NORTH ARLINGTON, Alden L. Bennett, priest in charge for the time being. While Rev'd F. Vernon Losee was in charge a steam heating plant was purchased for \$800 and was installed by a member of the mission; a new organ and organblow, costing \$500, acquired; the insurance gone over and the proper premium taken out; the Sunday school, enrolling 160, graded up to the high school, and the Church Building Fund increased by \$1,200, so that it amounts to about \$2,100.

The archdeaconry has met twice during the year.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF MORRISTOWN.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF NEWTON.

To the Rt. Rev'd Edwin S. Lines, D.D., Bishop of Newark.

In submitting this my last report as Archdeacon of Newton there is little to be reported which is new. In all the places in the two counties which comprise the archdeaconry where our church is at work the same men have been carrying on the work quietly but with devotion. The outstanding points of the last year have been the development of the diocesan property known as Eagle's Nest Farm and the project of the removal of the church in Phillipsburg to a more advantageous location in that growing town.

In giving up my jurisdiction there are two recommendations which I should like to submit. The first is that, as soon as the means can be found for doing it, the pastoral work which is done by the Western Counties Mission be extended by the placing of other workers in the field. The work already done, though limited, has shown that our church can minister successfully to the needs of people who live in out-of-the-way places, and that they respond to this ministry.

The second recommendation is that the work at Delaware be strengthened. With the development of Eagle's Nest Farm as a camp and conference centre it would seem desirable that there should be a clergyman stationed at Delaware who might act as chaplain and give pastoral oversight to the young people who will congregate there. My own feeling is that the present church property in the village of Delaware might well be sold and a smaller but more attractive chapel erected on the farm which would serve as the spiritual centre for the work.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

SUBMITTED IN PAROCHIAL REPORTS; NOT NOTED ON THE SCHEDULE SHEETS.

ARLINGTON, TRINITY.—\$2,500 of the floating debt is a loan to finance the purchase of our organ until the money could be raised by the congregation.

BLOOMFIELD AND GLEN RIDGE, CHRIST.—In 1920 this Parish had an accumulated operating deficit of \$3,559.44. In 1922 this Parish closed the year with an indicated operating surplus of \$556.23.

DOVER, ST. JOHN'S.—This Parish because of its paid up \$1,000 bond is exempted from assessment for the support of the Episcopate.

EAST ORANGE, ASCENSION.—On July 31, 1922, the cornerstone of the Chapel of the Ascension was laid by the Rev'd G. M. Plaskett. The property on the corner of Rhode Island Avenue and Amherst Street was purchased in 1921 by the Congregation of the Church of the Epiphany, Orange. The cost, exclusive of furnishings, was about \$2,200. The Diocese, through the Board of Missions, contributed \$300 for the services of a lay worker during 1922-23.

EAST ORANGE, INCARNATION.—A payment of \$1,462 by the St. Mary's Guild will pass through the Treasury about January 10, 1923, in payment into Chancery of a mortgage, the remainder being paid from Treasury.

EDGEWATER, MEDIATOR.—\$725 now in Savings Bank will be used to reduce the mortgage on the Rectory in April, 1923.

GARFIELD, HOLY INNOCENTS'.—Expenses for light and heat were borne by the Zion Slovak Lutheran congregation, who hold services in the Chapel. Hence the absence of Current Expense figures.

A Daily Vacation Bible School was held during July with three teachers and about thirty-five pupils.

GLEN ROCK, ALL SAINTS'.—The Financial Report for the month of December, 1921, was included in the report for the year 1922, so as to make the report follow, hereafter, the calendar year.

GRANDVIEW, GRACE.—\$1,000 was paid off on the mortgage.

HILLSDALE, HOLY TRINITY.—The Mission purchased an automobile for the use of the Rector at a cost of \$350.

HO-HO-KUS, ST. BARTHOLOMEW'S.—St. Elizabeth's Chapel, Upper Ridgewood, has been established by the Parish and a very attractive building is nearly completed.

The Rector held services at St. Andrew's Convalescent Hospital, Woodcliff Lake, N. J.

IRVINGTON, TRINITY.—During the year the remainder of the Rectory mortgage was cleared off, leaving the entire Church property free from debt. At the same time the tenth year of the present rectorship was celebrated.

JERSEY CITY, ASCENSION.—The mortgage of \$4,000 on the Rectory property was paid off on All Saints' Day.

The Parish plans to pay off the remaining mortgage on the Church property during 1923.

LEONIA, ALL SAINTS'.—The balance of \$1,500 mortgage due on the Church property was paid off by St. Catherine's Guild during the year, and the Church was Consecrated by the Rt. Rev'd Edwin S. Lines, D.D., Bishop of the Diocese, on Sunday, December 3rd, 1922.

The Rector's Aid Society has set aside \$500 to form the nucleus of a Building Site Fund, for the purchase of a new location for the future All Saints' Church.

LIVINGSTON, ST. PETER'S.—Owing to the death of Mr. Alexander Livingston Kean, it has been impossible to make up the financial report.

MENDHAM, ST. MARK'S.—The final payment of \$500 having been made on January 6, 1923, the mortgage on the Rectory was cancelled on January 9, 1923.

MILLBURN, ST. STEPHEN'S.—During the year the Parish House which was sold in 1921 was repurchased and moved from across the street where it was built, to the rear of the Church, and is being connected and remodelled. The contract price is \$8,500.

MILLINGTON, ALL SAINTS'.—By appointment of Bishop Stearly, the rector has rendered 43 weekly services at Bonnie Brae Farm. The boys are brought over to Church every Sunday morning.

MONTCLAIR, ST. LUKE'S.—An addition to the Parish House and Church School is now in course of construction to cost approximately \$100,000.

NEWARK, CHRIST.—The large number noted under "Removal Without Transfer" under the heading "Communicants," is due to a mistake made in computing the "Present Number" last year.

NEWARK, ST. ALBAN'S.—Following the payment of all indebtedness last year, the Mission began a systematic effort to raise money to make necessary repairs to the Church, Parish House and Rectory, the length of time these buildings have been built making extensive repairs necessary. The men themselves laid a new floor in the Parish House. A new electric organ blower has been installed. The current receipts from all sources are more than double what they were less than three years ago. The Mission sent to the Nation-Wide Campaign an offering which was approximately 101 percent greater than that for the year 1921.

NEWARK, ST. BARNABAS'.—\$4,299.01 of the balance reported was contributed as part of the Parish House Building Fund and \$236.21 of the remainder is due the treasurer of the Diocese.

NEWARK, ST. JOHN'S.—St. John's Guild pledges \$500 each year toward the payment of the mortgage on the Church.

NEWARK, ST. MARK'S.—The statistics of this report are estimated. We began on January 1, 1923, a census of the parish which, when completed, will enable us to give an accurate account of the situation in St. Mark's.

NEWARK, ST. MATTHEW'S.—A Polish congregation, in affiliation with our Church is established in St. Matthew's, which is under the care of the Rev'd W. O. Leslie, Jr., of the Foreign Born Department.

A school, meeting after Public School hours and on Saturday mornings, was started in August. The subjects taught are Christian Doctrine and Polish.

NEWARK, ST. THOMAS'.—A Rectory was bought in December with the bequest left to the Church by Mrs. William S. Dilworth and will be known as the Dilworth Memorial Rectory. The purchase price was \$20,000.

NORTH ARLINGTON, ST. PAUL'S.—A new steam heating plant has been installed. The Sunday School contributed \$125 toward the repair of the piano and the purchase of a pipe organ. The School made its annual contribution to Bonnie Brae Farm—\$15; to St. Marguerite's Home for Girls, at Ralston—\$15; and to the Passaic Home and Orphan Asylum—\$15.

Pledges aggregating \$1,300 were received for a new Church building, and the prospects look bright for raising this sum to \$1,500 or \$2,000. The Mission already has, outside of these pledges, \$1,200 toward this Fund.

PATERSON, TRINITY.—The basement in the Parish House has been excavated and extended making a full room where only half the space was used before.

PHILLIPSBURG, ST. LUKE'S.—The Young People's Fellowship paid \$300 which they raised, on the purchase of a new piano for Parish use.

RAMSEY, ST. JOHN'S.—The building and loan dues are \$42 per month and of this the Rector has paid (as rent) \$30. It is proposed to gradually reduce this contribution, beginning in January to take off \$10 of the \$30.

RIDGEWOOD, CHRIST.—The Free Pew System went into effect on January 1, 1923.

STANHOPE, CHRIST.—A new heating plant was installed by the efforts of the Woman's Guild.

WOOD RIDGE, ST. PAUL'S.—\$600 was paid by St. Martha's Guild on the Bishop's Loan.

FORTY-NINTH ANNUAL REPORT, COUNCIL OF CHRIST HOSPITAL.

To the Rt. Rev'd Edwin S. Lines, D.D.,

Bishop of the Diocese of Newark.

During the past year Christ Hospital has celebrated its Fiftieth Anniversary, and has literally ministered to hundreds of thousands of people. During those fifty years, the Hospital has grown steadily until today with 120 beds it is overcrowded, and pressed for room. The whole fabric of the hospital is kept in the very best repair and is thoroughly modern in its equipment and in the work that it does. It has been rated by the American College of Physicians and Surgeons with the highest rating as A-1. Today it requires \$140,000 a year to maintain it.

During the past year we have treated 2,378 patients in the beds and 2,675 persons in the outpatient department. One gratifying feature of our work is the employment of a nurse who visits the homes of the people who come to our outpatient department, ministers to them there, and is carrying the gracious influence of Christ Hospital into their very homes.

The Superintendent, the Rev'd Thomas A. Hyde, would be glad to mail a full report of the hospital to any one who might be interested enough to ask for it.

Widows' Home, Hoboken.

The Widows' Home is a Church Institution, in the city of Hoboken, providing a home for aged gentlewomen Communicants of the Church, having little or no resources of their own and no home. The Board of Trustees is composed of the Rectors of the three Parishes in Hoboken, one of the Wardens of each Parish, and the Canon Missioner of the Department of Social Service of the Diocese of Newark.

The Board of Trustees: Rev. G. E. Magill, Warden; Rev. Malcolm A. Shipley, Secretary; Rev. George F. Collard, Canon Dunseath, Mr. H. Otto Wittpeann, Mr. George E. Horwood, Mr. J. H. Cuntz.

The Board of Managers is composed of women, elected by the Board of Trustees from the membership of the three Hoboken Parishes.

The Home is a small dwelling house located at 815 Bloomfield Street, and at the present time six women are members of the Home.

St. Katharine's Home, Jersey City.

[Organized, 1890; incorporated, 1893.]

Again it is a great pleasure to record the interesting events which have occurred in St. Katharine's Home during the year 1922.

Four meetings were held, with an average attendance of fifteen.

Four new members have been elected on the Board, Mrs. Henry B. Bryan, Mrs. Alfred Benjamin, Mrs. Guthrie B. Plante, and Mrs. William J. A. McKim. Five resignations have been received, the Rev'd George P. Dougherty, Mrs. Dougherty, Mrs. George Fuller, Mrs. Chauncey Parker, and the Rev'd Henry Baldwin Todd. In a letter received from Mr. Todd, he writes that he had enjoyed his connection with St. Katharine's Home and his interest would always continue.

Over two hundred notices for meetings have been posted and about seventy-five letters written.

During the year sixteen girls have been admitted, and at present in the Home eleven girls and seven babies.

Many necessary improvements have been made, such as a flooring in the laundry, gutters repaired, roof mended, walls painted and woodwork as well. The dryer in the laundry, and chairs and furniture for various parts of the house, have been purchased.

A special party was given, as always, on St. Margaret's Day; and two outings planned by Mrs. Groesbeck, one in August and one in September. During the summer St. Katharine's was in charge of Sister Caroline, who made the Home life very pleasant for the girls; and to quote from the Sister's report, "It is interesting and encouraging to have visits from the girls who have gone out from the Home, for they seem to have valued their sojourn at St. Katharine's."

Much appreciation is extended by the Board to the Clergy who have administered in the Chapel and constantly remembered St. Katharine's during the year 1922.

In April Canon Bryan gave the Board a cordial invitation to be present at the seventy-fifth Anniversary services of Grace Church (Van Vorst), Jersey City. The Rev'd Mr. Hyde then announced that in 1923 Christ Hospital would be fifty years old and St. Katharine's would have covered more than thirty years of work.

On Ascension Day, May 25th, Bishop Stearly visited the Home and confirmed four candidates. That day was chosen as the one when the house would be open for its annual reception, and a tea was given which was well attended.

Thanksgiving Day and Christmas were most generously remembered by Mr. and Mrs. Williams, and the Christmas festival—a most enjoyable affair—was celebrated on Holy Innocents' Day; the tree given as usual by Mrs. Talmage, and the services attended by several members of the Board and other visitors.

Words seem inadequate to express to Mr. and Mrs. Williams the appreciation and thanks of the Board for their wonderful gift of an organ, which has been placed in the Chapel.

At the meeting of the Board held on October 16th, a committee was formed to enlist interest in the Endowment Fund, on the occasion of the Thirty-third Anniversary of St. Katharine's Home, and letters have been accordingly written to every member to solicit gifts from them and from their friends. Up to date several answers have been received, and the Treasurer, Mrs. Otto Wittpenn, has donated a \$1,000. Liberty Bond.

Let it be considered a privilege to be among those who have been asked to contribute to the Endowment Fund and remember the words of St. Paul, not to be "weary in well doing; for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not," and let us lay up for ourselves "a good foundation against the time to come."

During the year the City Mission has devoted itself to its appointed work of ministering to the inmates of public institutions located in Essex County. At present there are two chaplains who devote all their time to the public institutions. The Rev'd Dr. Cooder has served during the entire year, and the Rev'd James W. Van Ingen

began his term as chaplain in March. Up until March the Rev'd William O. Leslie, Jr., served as chaplain, in connection with his parish of Christ Church, Newark. There are thirty public institutions on the list visited by the chaplains, and regular visits are made at stated hours so as to cover the list at least once a week. Special calls and night calls are responded to promptly whenever a hospital reports that the chaplain is needed. The places visited include hospitals, penal institutions, consumption camps, isolation buildings, asylums and homes for the aged and infirm.

Several hospitals are enlarging their buildings, and two have plans to rebuild on a larger scale in the immediate future, thus accommodating a greater number of patients, which means for the City Mission a larger opportunity for its services among the sick. The bed population will then be about five thousand, but, with one exception, the inmates are changing every week, so that the total for twelve months will amount to many thousand. To meet this situation the City Mission has two chaplains.

About twenty parishes have been represented among the sick on the wards visited by the chaplains, and several parishes of the Diocese have been represented by more than one patient. There is always a demand for infant garments in cases where no provision has been made for the babies, and through the generosity of some parishes, and with donations from the Needlework Guild of America, the Red Cross Society and the Contemporary Club we have been abundantly able to meet every case of need in six hospitals. At Christmas time enough toys and games were contributed to supply the children of ten or more wards. The burials of the city poor and the unknown will average about one a day the year through, and a short service for each is conducted at the morgue.

During part of the year the City Mission financed the work among the foreign born, under the supervision of Chaplain Leslie. The work was centered at Christ Church and at St. Matthew's, and found its opportunity among the seventy-five thousand people of these neighborhoods. The Vacation Bible School was a great success, and the work is still reflected in the attendance at the Church School.

A daily record is made by the chaplains of their ministrations, and all baptisms, burials, and Communion services are recorded, together with the number of visits made and the institutions visited. This record indicates that during the year thirty institutions have been visited, the total number of visits to the institutions was 938, and 9,161 personal visits to patients made, there were 166 baptisms, the Holy Communion was given 318 times to the sick, there were 360 burials of public cases, 399 garments were distributed mostly among children, 52 letters were written for patients, and over a thousand magazines handed out.

Our incurable or permanent patients ranging in age from 22 to 92 years, numbered only 7 owing to the very limited capacity of the house. It is our earnest hope that this institution may soon be enlarged, so that many more may enjoy the privileges and blessings of this Diocesan Home.

During the year the services of the Church have been maintained and patients unable to attend Chapel, have been ministered to in their own rooms.

With a larger endowment the House could reduce the sums now asked in the way of board, and could more readily take in needy applicants whose churches or friends have but slight resources. This is worthy of attention from persons who think of making bequest by will for charitable purpose, or who will make such gifts now in their lifetime.

During the past year, the Girls' Friendly Society in the Diocese of Newark has increased its membership so that we now number 2,500, with a total representation of 47 branches, this being less than one-half of the parishes in the Diocese. Of this number, one colored branch, that of Epiphany, Orange, has been organized.

We have tried to do our bit in the Church Service League, the Woman's Auxiliary and other organizations, and are helping to bring to our Biennial Convention a delegate from Porto Rico.

We have had National representation in the Diocese in the work for the foreign-born, and have sent a delegate to the Princeton Summer School under the Caroline West Colton Scholarship.

The Holiday House at Miller Place, Long Island, under splendid management, was a great success, and will be opened again this season, with the goal before us of a Holiday House of our own in 1924. At our first banquet held at The Washington on May eighth, a gathering of five hundred, pledges for the Holiday House amounting to over \$1,500 were made.

It gives us great pleasure to report that the Committee on Development and Revenue has appropriated and PAID to the G. F. S., the sum of \$250 for the promotion of our work in the Diocese. We want to bring this money back two-fold, and the clergy can help. We want your point of view in our work for girls, not only in the religious problems of the adolescent girl, but in the study and play of all young women, so that our Society may be a force for good in the Diocese.

In a recent girls' recreational survey made by The Contemporary Club of Newark, it was found of the 179 churches in the City of Newark, 32 of which are colored, twenty-five are not definitely reaching girls. Let us hope that in this number our Church was not represented.

For some time we have had in the G. F. S. the vision of one large community center in the Diocese for all our members, but why not the greater vision of "every parish house a community center." The girls of our Church are potential leaders. They want to be of service and stand ready to help. Use them, so that this service may not be lost to the Church, and we, of the Girls' Friendly Society, the Church's recognised agency for work with girls, with our recreational, educational and spiritual program, believe we can serve you. We look to you who are *our* leaders, and many of you, have been our strength and inspiration. May we not all work together in the development of our girlhood, so that in this Diocese, if a survey were made, our Church would stand 100 per cent.

Assembly comprises 28 groups, 16 senior and 12 junior. Meetings are held four times a year, with many executive meetings held during the season.

Members are interested in the Brotherhood Camps, Washington's Birthday meeting, special Communion services, and convention conferences.

Four training classes or conferences were held at Trinity Cathedral on topics "Boys' Work, Lay Reading, Parish and Institutional Visiting, and Church Ushering and Hospitality."

A week-end conference for all churchmen was held at Asbury Park, September 9th and 10th.

Three new groups are being organized and it is the hope that a special effort will be made the coming year in organizing many other groups.

The object of the Brotherhood is the "Spread of Christ's Kingdom among Men and Young Men and in this way make our contribution to the Church as Laymen."

The Corporation for the Relief of Widows and Children of Clergymen of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the State of New Jersey.

The Corporation is independent of either of the Dioceses of New Jersey. It is not a pension plan, it does not pay pensions to the Clergy who are contributors; it is a kind of Life Insurance Company for the benefit of the Widows and Orphans of the Contributors. It was originally incorporated under a "royal charter" by George III on March 29, 1769, its territory being the Colonies of New York, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania. In 1806 a plan was adopted by which the original body was divided into three parts. In the division of funds, New Jersey received \$4,289.00. On December 2, 1807, it became a body corporate under its present title. Last year it distributed in annuities and dividends \$5,062.66; and transferred to principal \$3,613.34. The total principal was, on May 1, 1923 (at market value), \$176,562.13.

Clergymen of the Protestant Episcopal Church, not over 55 years of age, who have for the past two years been canonically connected with, and actually resident in either of the Dioceses in the State of New Jersey, are eligible for membership as "Contributors." Removal from the State after five annual contributions of eight dollars, does not forfeit membership. The "members of the Corporation" are those elected to manage its affairs; they are not necessarily contributors, and some of them are laymen. The annual meeting is held on the first Monday in June. Applications for membership should be in the hands of the Secretary before that date. The Secretary will be glad to furnish further information, and copies of application forms.

The Rev'd Winfield S. Baer of Elizabeth, on account of illness, resigned the office of Secretary. The Corporation accepted the resignation and elected Mr. Warren R. Dix, of Elizabeth, to fill the vacancy.

Report of the Trustees of St. Matthew's German Church.

This trust came into existence under a Deed of Trust dated March 4, 1863, between the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Grace Church, Newark, N. J., and Jeremiah C. Garthwaite, William Wright and Daniel Dodd, Trustees. The Deed of Trust provides that the Trustees are to be selected from time to time, by nomination and election by the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Grace Church in Newark, as vacancies may occur by reason of death, disability, etc. During the past year on account of removal of residence from Newark, two of the former Trustees became ineligible, viz., Messrs. W. Chauncey Coles and Frank A. B. Page. In accordance with the terms of the Deed of Trust their places as Trustees were filled by the election of Messrs. John W. Howell and Thomas L. Raymond. These persons and J. Lawrence Boggs are the present Trustees. Part of the principal of the fund is represented by the value of the land and Church building thereon, situated at the northwest corner of Avon and Chadwick Avenues, in the city of Newark, N. J. The title to this property is in the name of the "Trustees of St. Matthew's German Church."

The Trustees also hold in the principal account securities of the value of \$13,700. The amount of income received during the year ended December 31, 1922, was \$791.36. During the year 1922 there was paid out of the income \$629.00 for maintaining services in the Church.

ORGANIZATIONS: Woman's Auxiliary, Girls' Friendly Society, Daughters of the King, Church Periodical Club, Guild of St. Barnabas for Nurses, Church Mission of Help, Diocesan Altar Guild.

The Council of the Church Service League of the Diocese of Newark was organized in October, 1920, with Bishop Stearly as President.

The reports which have come in from the members of the Council representing the various Organizations and Institutions are full of interest, and show particularly that the spirit of cooperation, mutual understanding and helpfulness is growing throughout the Diocese. Also we are surely discovering that "the reward of a service rendered is the power to perform another!"

The Altar Guild of the Diocese reports a membership of 150 in 14 Parishes with 17 Life Members. It has supplied 18 Missions with linens, Altar hangings, Communion Vessels, and vestments, 2 choirs with cottas, 1 choir with a processional cross, 6 clergymen with vestments, the U. S. Cavalry Camp with a portable Altar and its furnishings, and the Orange City Home with a silver Chalice and Paten. In addition to its work within the Diocese it has sent to St. Mary the Virgin Mission at Sagada, Philippine Islands, Altar cloths and linens, surplices and cottas, and to Bishop Kinsolving in Brazil, White and Green Altar hangings.

The Daughters of the King, whose work is that of prayer and service of many kinds in the Parish, reports 292 calls made upon "shut ins" and the sick, and through their direct efforts 11 persons have been brought to confirmation and 13 for baptism. They anticipate the formation of three new chapters in this coming year. The Church Service League is the channel through which the Order is being made known throughout the Church.

The Girls' Friendly Society reports great progress during the past year—many new branches formed—one of colored girls, the first in our Diocese. Also that their "Holiday House" proved itself again a success and will be opened one month earlier this summer. (The report of the President of the G. F. S. will be found elsewhere in the JOURNAL.)

The Woman's Auxiliary reports a new department—that on Devotional Life, and the adoption of the plan of "Prayer Partnership" between women at home and in the Mission Field. One full allotment has been met, and some emergency work has also been done. In addition to a budget of \$4,700.00 we have assumed two special pledges, one of \$1,500.00 for the Hooker School, Mexico, the other of \$500.00 for the Kuling School, China. The Supply Department reports that the value in money of the work done, that is, boxes for institutions and missionaries, is about \$30,000 for the year. It reports cooperation with the Altar Guild and the G. F. S.

The Woman's Thank Offering is quietly becoming a part of the daily life of the women of the Diocese as they realize the blessing it brings to the giver as well as to those supported by the gift. The offering for the past year amounted to over \$9,000.

The Church Mission of Help reports 26 organized groups and many individuals giving time and effort to assist in its work. Many garments for girls and babies have been sent to us, and volunteers have supplied parties and other recreation most valuable in giving our wards a fresh start toward normal living. Fifty babies have come into

the world without the privilege of a normal home and a father's love, challenging us to give them what we can to make up for their handicap. Three study groups have been held for information and instruction in the work of the C. M. H. We have secured the cooperation of the League of Roman Catholic Women and the State Federation of Colored Women's Clubs, and have the interest, and a generous subscription from "an Interdenominational" group of women. We look forward to an extension of the work during the next year.

St. Katharine's Home sheltered sixteen girls during the year, four of whom were Confirmed on Ascension Day. The gift of an organ has added to the beauty of the Chapel, and the services, and some much needed repairs and improvements to the house have been made through the generosity of the members of the Board of Managers and their friends, who have also provided a happy Christmas and Thanksgiving by gifts of a tree and bountiful dinners. The work at the Home goes on quietly as it has done for many years past, and judging from results in those of its inmates who return to visit after they have been out from its shelter for some time, its work is well done!

BONNIE BRAE FARM.—The representative on the Council for the Farm reports that much of her work during the year has been "advertising" and that many individual contributions of money have been sent to the Managing Board for special purposes. In several Parishes, notably St. Peter's, Morristown; Grace, Madison; Christ Church, East Orange; and Grace, Orange, organized groups have been doing special constructive work for the boys. It is desired to find a way during the coming year to bring Bonnie Brae and its needs to the attention of the women of every Parish.

The Church Periodical Club has sent out over 15,000 books, magazines, pamphlets, etc., and is now at work to send a generous donation of books for the library of St. John's College, Shanghai. It reports an increase of interest in its work in many Parishes.

ST. BARNABAS' GUILD FOR NURSES.—Another organization working quietly and happily with those to whom many of us owe so much—the trained nurse. It looks forward to the formation of two new branches in the Diocese, and has in the past year been able to send in to the National Organization its apportionment of \$200 toward the salary of a Field Secretary.

HOUSE OF THE HOLY COMFORTER.—This past year two-thirds of its patients have been convalescents, one-third incurables, and since its opening one-third of its work has been done gratuitously. The porch at the rear of the house has been enlarged so that it may be of greater use to the patients, and the Board of Managers looks forward to enlarging the building, eventually, so as to meet more of the applications for entrance. There have been gifts in memoriam of a cross and candle sticks for the Altar in the Chapel.

The Church Service League has held three Diocesan meetings in Newark, and next year will alternate with the Woman's Auxiliary in holding meetings in Trinity House, Newark, on the first Wednesday in each month at ten A. M.

In this report, much which is of great interest has of necessity been omitted, but it is not too much to say that the women of the Diocese are trying faithfully to grasp a broad conception of the whole task of the Church, and both in and outside their organizations are endeavoring to perform their share of it.

The Reports of the Archdeacons contain in detail an account of the work done at these places.

The Board of Missions and Church Extension each year requests the Finance and Advisory Board to include in its budget a stated sum for the work of the Board, to be approved by the Convention. It has asked that the sum of \$30,000 be included for the work of next year.

The Board also administers the Church Extension Fund, which is made up of voluntary contributions by means of pledges ranging from one to five dollars or more, the number of calls being limited to five each year, and of \$2,500 received annually from the James Barber Trust Fund. This Fund is used to assist in building Churches, Rectories and Parish Houses and in acquiring land, and in the thirteen years of its existence it has rendered most timely and valuable aid, providing just the financial help to the Missions to carry out these enterprises. During the year May 1, 1922, to April 30, 1923, the Board has granted calls to the following places: St. Luke's, Phillipsburg, toward the purchase of land; St. Bartholomew's Church, Ho-Ho-Kus, toward building St. Elizabeth's Chapel at Upper Ridgewood; Christ Church, Morris Plains, toward purchasing site; for Parish House at Ridgefield Park.

There are some 415 subscribers to this Fund, but we feel that there must be many more people who would be glad to have a hand in helping to build these Churches, Rectories and Parish Houses, and all such are kindly asked to communicate with Mr. Francis Halpin, Treasurer, 21 Washington Street, Newark.

Report, Board of Christian Social Service, Diocese of Newark, 1922.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

During the past year the work of the Board of Social Service of the Diocese has been directed along several definite lines: (1) The care, support and supervision of our established agencies and institutions; (2) Propaganda in the field of legislation and public affairs; (3) A campaign of education in an effort to present the ideals and general field of Social Service to our people; (4) The work of the Secretary in these fields and in other lines.

THE CHURCH MISSION OF HELP.

Looking back over the last twelve months the development of interest in the girl by the Community as a whole is most encouraging. Remarkable response has come from the colored women since their State Federation became better acquainted with us. There is a determination on their part to give their disadvantaged girls the benefit of what their chairman termed "applied Christianity" and to do this they are seeking our counsel.

The National Council of Catholic Women are making every effort to arouse their Bishop and Priests to a realization of the claims of their unadjusted girls. They are

training women for social work in the Diocese generally, and have now two workers among girls and boys in the city. They are studying the problem of the unmarried mother with the intention of taking care of their own in the near future.

The Contemporary of Newark has made an extended survey of facilities for organized and supervised recreation for girls and a partial survey of the delinquency problem. They recommend a centralized group to direct city-wide recreation on a definite program under City Government.

The Welfare Federation has formed a Recreation Council for the purpose of furthering plans for the establishment of recreation centers.

Under the auspices of the Woman's City Club, a vigorous unit of the Big Sisters is working with the girl who has not as yet become an offender against society.

The Woman's Court Committee has determined to make a study of the probation systems and social service departments connected with similar courts in other cities. They hope in the near future to have a field worker connected with our Family Court. There exists a mutual confidence between Judge Boettner and this Committee.

Relationships between the Church Mission of Help and all Diocesan Organizations are mutually helpful and especially so to us are, St. Katherine's Home, St. Anna's, the House of the Holy Comforter and St. Barnabas' Hospital.

It is impossible to give on paper any adequate idea of the amount of time and help our Volunteers have given us. In our files we have a list of one hundred and sixty-two Volunteers. Twenty-six Parishes have contributed garments for girls and babies, loaned automobiles, made friendly visits, operated the telephone switchboard, for which we are responsible, two hours daily, assisted in making the office attractive, contributed refreshments for four girls' parties and three Volunteers' meetings. Five young women have given regular stenographic help.

Three groups have had discussion in methods of Case Work: Passaic, Paterson and Hackensack.

The members of the Hackensack group are calling upon some one influential member of each Church in the town with the idea of securing help and interest in our work. In the Autumn those Churches which wish to do so, will have a representative on the

Hackensack Case Committee.

One of the greatest sources of strength and inspiration to the Secretaries is the knowledge that our Priests and friends are using the weekly intercessions and thanksgivings.

The Publicity Committee has had articles in many issues of the Newark Churchman and has published a new leaflet for general distribution. Canon Dunseath has spoken many times in our behalf and fifteen addresses have been made by the Secretaries and members of this Board.

On April 1, 1922, the number of girls under care was 504. One hundred and twenty-three new girls have come through the year, so we have touched the lives of 627. On April 1, 1923, we had 294 girls. There have been 17 infant and 12 adult baptisms, 21 marriages and several confirmations.

As the secretaries go on from day to day their greatest regret is the necessity for turning away many who come in sore distress and this is because our people are not aware of the enormity of the problem which we are asked to solve.

Each year throughout its entire history the annual report of Bonnie Brae Farm has shown a steady increase in the number of boys in residence. Last year at this time

we reported 23, now we report the capacity number, 30. At one time during the year we had 31 boys and with the exception of but a few short periods the farm has been filled to capacity. With the increase in capacity the demand for admission of boys has grown so that at the present time we find ourselves with 20 applications and new ones always coming in. The problem facing the Committee on Admissions is obvious. Only the most urgent cases can be handled.

The Board has found it necessary during the past year to approve of and carry into execution a number of very necessary repairs and improvements. A partition was built, cutting off part of the dining room and making a room which could be used for dormitory purposes to house six boys. The two main living rooms have been improved. The walls have been done over and new floors are soon to be laid. New beds have been purchased, some of which have been delivered and others are on the way.

The worthiness of the work which is being carried on at Bonnie Brac Farm has continued to hold the interest and support of many of its old friends and to enlist the interest and support of many new ones. Such a report as this could not begin to enumerate all that has been done and all the help given. Individuals and groups in many of the Parishes throughout the Diocese are beginning to develop that same interest. In this connection it would seem proper to mention the fact that the Kiwanis Club of Newark has undertaken the task of raising sufficient funds to build the first cottage in the "Cottage Plan." Plans have been prepared and a campaign is being managed entirely by members of the Kiwanis Club to raise at least \$18,000.

During the past year the Board of Managers has found it necessary to carry on a financial campaign appealing especially to people outside of our own Church. The appropriation from the Nation-Wide Campaign continues at \$6,000. The Treasurer's report which is appended will show that last year, including many exceptional improvements, the total cost of operation amounted to almost \$20,000. An earnest effort is being made to work out a more economical budget for the current year. But even with the reduced budget the difference between the Diocesan appropriation of \$6,000 and the total cost of operation leaves about \$12,000 to be raised through special contributions. It is the desire of the Board of Managers of Bonnie Brac Farm to relieve the people of the Diocese of as much responsibility for this amount as possible, but from time to time appeals will be necessary.

LEGISLATION AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS.

The Board has taken an active interest in creating sentiment in behalf of a number of pieces of legislation which have been under consideration at Trenton. The Committee on Legislation, of which Mr. Robert L. Flemming is the Chairman, has kept the Board informed in this field. The Board recorded itself as being in favor of the bill which would prohibit night work for women in certain industries. This bill was finally passed, after considerable amendments, to take effect January 1st, 1925. We favored the passage of a bill to provide for a new system of Domestic Relations and Juvenile Courts, the bill to provide for the adequate support, over a period of five years by a small direct tax, of our State institutions and State dependents, and the bill to recodify and bring up to date the "Poor Laws" of the State. The Board has tried to impress upon public officials that it would stand behind them in behalf of all good laws and work in their departments and has received public commendation from the Department of Labor of the State and from private organizations with which it has co-operated.

EDUCATION.

The Board followed two methods for informing our people regarding the meaning of Christian Social Service. In the first place, the Secretary has considered this one of his first duties and has presented the subject in the Churches, Church Schools, to men's clubs, women's organizations, at meetings of the Clergy, and wherever an opportunity has offered itself. In the second place, by the action of the Board a "Correspondence Reading Course" was prepared and sent out to a list of almost 600 people whose names had been sent in by their Rectors, throughout the Diocese. Much has

been printed and written about this Course as a method for the distribution of information. It has brought many inquiries to the Secretary from other Dioceses and has been most highly approved of by the Department of Social Service of the Presiding Bishop and Council. Three Conferences have been held during the past year, the Secretary has visited 67 parishes and missions of the Diocese, in most cases to present the work of the Board or to administer the Holy Communion or to deliver the illustrated lecture which he has prepared dealing with our Diocesan institutions.

The Secretary attended the second Conference of Social Service Workers of the Church at Wickford, Conn., delivered a course of lectures at the Princeton Summer School, preached at the Naval Academy in Annapolis and has served as Secretary of the New Jersey Conference for Social Welfare, which brings the work of the Church into close touch with the general welfare work of the State. The close co-operation with and assistance received from such Diocesan organizations as the Girls' Friendly Society and the Woman's Auxiliary and our Church Club has been a matter of great encouragement.

There is still a shortage of accommodations for the aged and very small children. Many inquiries from the Clergy for help in placing old people and small children receive consideration—but action is impossible. The Secretary has received in accordance with the Canon the annual reports of Saint Katherine's Home, Jersey City, and the House of the Holy Comforter.

Report of the Board of Religious Education.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The Canon creating this Board requires it to report to the Convention (1) the condition of the work of the schools of the Diocese; (2) an account of its proceedings, and (3) a statement of all receipts and disbursements of moneys.

I. THE CONDITION OF THE SCHOOLS.

In order to ascertain the condition of the schools, reports covering the year's work have been requested. These have been received to date from 106 schools. Ten Standards of Excellence have been set by the Board to gauge the efficiency of the work being done. Information concerning these is asked for on the reports, together with other information.

The Ten Standards and the number of schools attaining each one are as follows:

The reports show that ten schools rate 100%; 15, 90%; 16, 80%; 17, 70%. Certificates designating schools as honor schools are awarded to those attaining seven of the ten standards. There are sixty-eight honor schools for this year.

The reports show that 66 schools are using the Christian Nurture Series of lessons, twenty-three the American Church Sunday School lessons, three the New York Sunday School Commission, and the remainder miscellaneous lessons. Twenty-seven schools have Bible classes and thirty-nine have some plan of adult instruction. All schools but eighteen report some form of weekday activities for boys and girls.

The Parochial reports for this year show that there are 18,222 members and 2,143 officers and teachers in the Church Schools. These totals are slightly below those of last year.

II. ITS PROCEEDINGS.

The Board has met monthly throughout the year. It plans its work through six Standing Committees and is assisted in the execution of its program by the Canon Missioner for Religious Education. A statement of the activities of these Committees is herewith given.

ADMINISTRATION AND ORGANIZATION.

The Annual Church School Convention was held on Thursday, October 19, 1922, at the Y. W. C. A., at Newark. Nine conferences were held, two of which were in the evening, a new feature this year. Nearly 600 teachers registered coming from seventy-five schools. The evening session was held in Trinity Cathedral, opening with a conference by Bishop Stearly and followed by a service with an address by the Rev'd Lester Bradner, Ph.D., from the National Department of Religious Education. The exhibition of the Church School and Church Service work was a feature of the afternoon session.

At the Convention, certificates were awarded to eighty-four schools which had attained seven of the ten standards. This was an increase of eighteen over last year. Certificates were also awarded to teachers who had done the required work in Teacher Training during the year—eighteen from the Normal School, forty-seven for half courses and ten for full training courses.

TEACHER TRAINING.

This Committee decided to make a drive for a teacher training class in every Parish. The plan proposed was to have a five-week session before Christmas on "Method" and a five-week course during Lent on "Content," the subject this year being the Prayer Book. The Normal School at Trinity House, Newark, has continued with an enrollment of sixty-one from fifteen schools. Several advanced courses in addition to the Grade Conferences were offered this year, but they were not largely attended.

RECRUITING THE MINISTRY.

Under the direction of this Committee, twenty-seven boys went to the Conference on the Ministry held at St. Paul's School, Concord, during June. Bishop Stearly invited these boys to an afternoon conference during the Christmas vacation at the Diocesan House. It was planned to have a Diocesan Conference at Eagle's Nest Farm this summer, but it was given up in order to co-operate with the conference to be held at Chestnut Hill Academy, Philadelphia, during June of this year.

Lists of students away at college were compiled and were helpful in sending out Christmas letters and in locating students for special work.

The Washington's Birthday conference was held at Trinity Cathedral. At the nine o'clock service, seventy were present. At the ten o'clock general meeting, 154, and at the eleven o'clock conference for men, there were sixty-three, and at the conference for boys there were sixty-five. At the general meeting, addresses were made by President Ogilby, of Trinity College, and Dr. William E. Sturgis, Ph.D., of the Department of Missions.

During last May, Life Work Dinners were held, one at Orange with an attendance of thirty-one and one at Jersey City with an attendance of thirty-nine. Dinners are planned for the latter part of this month at Paterson and at Newark.

CHURCH SCHOOL SERVICE LEAGUE.

This Committee has planned for the Service activities. Over 6,000 gifts were sent out to the Mission fields from forty-five schools. The Advent offering was designated for the Western Counties Mission. A series of lesson papers was prepared. The offering amounted to \$1,761.53 from eighty-five schools. For use during Lent, a pamphlet was prepared on the Philippine Islands. A Service for Week Day use and other literature was prepared and distributed. The Lenten Offering amounted to about \$19,500 from 123 schools. The Presentation Service was held at Grace Church, Newark, with an attendance of 1,500 and vested choir of 350. There were representatives from ninety-two schools present.

Four banners were awarded. One, for the largest offering, St. Luke's Church School, Montclair, \$2,010.08. Two, for the largest per capita offering, St. Agnes', Little Falls, \$6.00. Three, for the largest percentage of increase over the offering of last year, Hopewell Sunday School, Western Counties Mission, 306%. Four, for attendance at Lenten Week Day Services, St. Paul's, Woodridge, 49.33%.

The Little Helpers report thirty-five Branches. The Offering for the past year was \$277.02 and for the year previous to that \$316.02.

Several conferences for leaders were held in different parts of the Diocese.

PLAYS AND PAGEANTS.

A list of plays and pageants suitable for presentation during the Christmas season was issued. A large number of pageants have been held in the Diocese, notably those at The Church of the Good Shepherd, Fort Lee, Trinity, Montclair and Grace Church, Orange.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION OUTSIDE THE CHURCH SCHOOL.

The chief work under this Committee this year has been the distribution of the Bible Readings. Over 7,500 copies of these Readings issued by the National Council were sent out to 63 parishes.

YOUNG PEOPLE'S FELLOWSHIP.

Early in the year, this Committee was discharged because the Young People's Fellowship is now a recognized Diocesan organization. It was felt that having been guided and formulated by the Board, it is now able to assume its own direction.

SPECIAL COMMITTEES.

A Committee on Boy's Work was appointed to co-operate with the National Commission. This Committee has endorsed the Order of Sir Galahad. A Committee to consider the planning of Parish buildings for Church School purposes and to give suggestions regarding adequate equipment is working on a report along these lines. A Committee was appointed to consider the promotion of Daily Vacation Bible Schools. The Board had authorized the expenditure of a sum not to exceed \$400 for this purpose. Another Committee is working on the plan to secure school time for religious instruction.

THE CANON MISSIONER FOR RELIGIOUS EDUCATION.

The Canon Missioner for Religious Education has been engaged in carrying out the plans and program of the Board. I have been called upon to make 181 addresses; fifty-two to Sunday congregations, thirty-two of these being definitely on Religious Education, twenty-one to gatherings of Church School officers and teachers, forty-five to groups of young people and sixteen to week-day groups of children. I have visited in session fifty-nine Church Schools, at thirty-seven of which I spoke. I have attended nineteen special gatherings, at ten of which I spoke. I have sat in seventy-eight committee meetings, attended twenty-two Clerical gatherings and made sixty-four visits to individuals on matters pertaining to Religious Education. I have traveled throughout the Diocese and have visited eighty-eight of the Parishes and Missions.

During the year I have served as Chairman of the Provincial Committee of the Young People's Societies, as Chairman of the Provincial Committee on Home Nurture, Secretary of the Provincial Committee on Recruiting the Ministry, President of the Alumni of the Princeton Summer School, President Diocesan Council Young People's Fellowship and as a member of the following committees: Field Committee of the

National Department of Religious Education, Provincial Commission on Religious Education, Executive Committee of the New Jersey State Sunday School Association, the New Jersey Committee on Daily Vacation Bible Schools, Eagle's Nest Farm Committee and the Examining Chaplains.

At the Princeton Summer School, I conducted a course on the organization of Young People's Societies.

In April I attended the five-day conference for Educational Leaders at Omaha, Nebraska. I preached the Sunday sermon at the Eastern Conference for college girls at Silver Bay and the Baccalaureate Sermon of the New Jersey College of Pharmacy at Trinity Cathedral.

Through most of the year, I have had the noonday services at the Cathedral on Tuesdays. During Lent I had children's services at St. Andrew's, South Orange and St. Mark's, West Orange.

During the year, I have had thirty-four celebrations of the Holy Communion, sixteen Baptisms, one burial and one marriage.

Report of the Young People's Fellowship.

The Young People's Fellowship of the Diocese of Newark came into being at a meeting held in St. Thomas' Church, Newark, February 23, 1922. Articles of Federation were adopted binding together the several groups of young people which had been meeting up to that time. These provided for a Diocesan Council to be made up of the Bishops and Canon Missioner for Religious Education, five persons elected at the Convention of the Fellowship and five appointed by the Bishop.

The first convention was held in Christ Church, Bloomfield and Glen Ridge on May 24, 1922. Seventy-five persons representing twenty Parishes were present. Requirements for admission as chapters were adopted and a charter authorized.

The second convention was held in St. Mark's Church, West Orange, on May 9, 1923, with an attendance of one hundred. Between the first and second convention fifteen societies met the requirements set forth and were admitted as charter members of the Fellowship. At the second convention two new chapters were admitted making seventeen at this time.

During the year the Council prepared and published topic cards for Sundays throughout the year. Charters were printed and distributed. It is now working on a pin for the Fellowship.

The Fellowship contributed Christmas boxes to the Seaman's Church Institute, is building the kitchen at Eagle's Nest Farm for the Diocese, has made several pilgrimages to points of interest and has helped in the various Parishes in many ways.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The General Chapter met in the month of April.

The Treasurer was authorized to transfer from the Income Fund to the Principal Fund the accumulated income, reserving sufficient funds for the proposed running expenses.

The Bishop was requested to appoint two laymen to be a Committee on Investments on whom the Treasurer may call for advice as to investments of the principal funds of the Cathedral.

The Treasurer having reported that Mr. James Barber had recently transferred to him the balance of \$20,000 of the \$50,000 of securities it was resolved that the Chairman, Bishop Stearly and the Registrar be requested to write a letter of thanks to Mr. Barber.

The General Chapter confirmed the nomination of the Rev'd Guy H. Madara as Canon Missioner for Missionary Work in the Diocese; fixed his salary at \$3,500; and resolved to purchase a car for him and provide for its upkeep.

It resolved that a Committee be appointed by the Bishops to spend not more than \$1,200 each for a car for the Canon Missioner for Missionary Work and for one to replace Canon Farrell's car, and to arrange for the upkeep of the cars.

The stipend of the Canon Missioner for Religious Education was fixed at \$3,500.

Report, Canonical Committee of the Diocese of Newark on the Church Pension Fund.

SUBMITTED MAY 15, 1923.

The Canonical Committee on the Church Pension Fund reports as follows:

During the calendar year 1922, 119 Parishes and Missions and 4 other Organizations in the Diocese paid regular assessments to the Church Pension Fund. Excluding the few Parishes which have never joined the Fund, and such as were vacant during the period, the arrears of assessments for the year amounted only to \$7.50, out of possible collections of \$25,892.54.

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In addition to the foregoing, under the new ruling of the Church Pension Board, two awards were made during the year 1922, to widows of clergymen holding cures or offices, whereby they received \$1,000 each, immediately upon their husbands' deaths, which amounts were exclusive of the pension grants.

The Pension Fund has paid out to beneficiaries in the Church at large between March, 1917, and the end of 1922, a total of \$1,870,230.36, of which \$904,876.69 has consisted of payments made under the Pension Fund proper, and \$965,353.67 has been paid through the General Clergy Relief Fund and other accounts which have been taken over and are managed by the Church Pension Fund, to clergy who retired before the Pension Fund started, or to widows of clergymen who had died previously.

At the present time, total annual payments under the Pension Fund proper amount to \$274,307.95, to a total of 737 beneficiaries, in addition to which \$194,221.16 is being annually paid through the General Clergy Relief Fund and similar accounts.

The Committee on the NEWARK CHURCHMAN respectfully reports to the Convention that nine issues of the CHURCHMAN are printed each year, the circulation at the present time being a little over seven thousand. The experience of other Diocesan papers in this regard has been sought and the matter is now under consideration.

It is the belief of the Committee that the NEWARK CHURCHMAN is found interesting to a large number of people in the Diocese, and that in many parishes its coming month by month is looked for, and the papers distributed with care. If the rectors and vestrymen in all the parishes and missions would provide for a careful distribution of the paper in the best way, it would greatly increase its usefulness.

Report, Commission on Church Architecture.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

While conditions, due principally to high costs, have not been altogether favorable, there has been a large amount of construction work undertaken in the Diocese during the past year.

Plans were received and approved for the new Church building in Upper Ridgewood. St. Paul's Mission at Montvale sent in some preliminary drawings for the enlargement of the present Church.

A very valuable set of plans was submitted by Mr. Francis A. Nelson, Architect, and member of the Commission, for the new Church which is to be erected at Bogota. The Commission thought so highly of these plans and specifications that it decided to adopt them and to recommend them to those seeking information as very desirable and the standards to be followed.

Mention should here be made of the very fine Parish House erected by St. John's Church, Montclair. Also the Parish House at Essex Falls for St. Peter's Church. The Commission is now considering plans for a new Church building at Totowa, and is advising the Priest-in-charge of our Mission at Morris Plains in regard to their proposed new Church.

Hospital of St. Barnabas, Newark.

[Incorporated 13 February, 1867.]

January 1, 1921, to December 31, 1922.

The last Hospital Report published by the Trustees was for the year 1920. This report, therefore, covers the period of two years, 1921 and 1922.

The outstanding feature of the past two years has been the carrying out of the Trustees' plan for the enlargement and improvement of the Hospital. Three of the five parts of this plan have now been completed; a fireproof addition has been made to the private corridor; this includes a modern, fully equipped fireproof kitchen in the basement, twelve very fine private rooms and a fireproof stairway enclosed in a fireproof stair-well. Secondly, the Sinnott house to the south of the Nurses' Home on High Street has been rebuilt, and fully equipped as a maternity department, with very fine accommodations for sixteen patients. Thirdly, an entirely new, enlarged and properly equipped laundry has been provided in the basement of the servants' house. The building at the rear of the old Sinnott property is in process of remodeling, by which it will afford ample accommodation for the men employed by the hospital.

There still remains the rebuilding of the main stairs, enclosing them in a fireproof well, and also the rebuilding of the clinics, the installation of a new adequate elevator, the improvement of the operating suite, doctors' rooms, X-Ray Department, diet kitchen, dining rooms, pantries, refrigerators, store rooms, etc.

The work already completed, together with the purchase of the Sinnott property, etc., has cost \$140,500, and the money received from the campaign of December, 1919, has been entirely expended. There are no funds on hand for the further improvements, but the Trustees, realizing that it is absolutely essential to the operation of the institution that this work be carried out at the earliest possible moment, have authorized the building committee to proceed with it.

It is obvious that we must again appeal to the friends of the Hospital for money, in order to make St. Barnabas' Hospital an efficient, first-class, up-to-date hospital. In this connection the Trustees call the attention of the friends of the Hospital to another crying need, namely, additional accommodation for Nurses and the Training School for Nurses, and also the improvement of our present nurses' quarters. With the increased bed capacity of the Hospital, this is an imperative need, which should be met at once. A gift of \$50,000 would enable the Trustees to do so.

One of the most important things that has been accomplished of late is the reorganization of the Medical Staff by the adoption on the part of the Trustees of a new Constitution for the Medical Staff, and a set of By-Laws governing the Staff. The new Executive Committee of the Medical Staff is charged with large responsibilities, and forms an important connecting link between the Board of Trustees and the doctors.

The Trustees wish to put on record their gratitude to the many friends and benefactors of the Hospital for the interest and help, and also to express profound gratitude to the Sisters of St. Barnabas for their blessed ministrations in the Hospital, by their spirit of Christlike service.

The Trustees also wish to thank most heartily all who have given of their skill and labor and time to the Hospital, especially the physicians and surgeons, the nurses, the Chaplain and the Sisters, the Guild of St. Barnabas and the Junior Guild. Their co-operation and devotion have made possible in the past, as we trust will always be true in the years to come, the merciful service of healing, which St. Barnabas' Hospital renders in its community.

The Entertainment Committee and the Associates gave a supper to the nurses in Grace Church Parish House, on January 31st.

A Food Sale was given at the Clark School and \$103.76 was realized toward the salary of the Field Secretary. A Musicale was given at the residence of Mrs. Donald Green by Mrs. Everitt and Mrs. Hasler and \$106 was made for this fund. A Rummage Sale for the same benefit realized \$271, and St. Andrew's Guild donated ten dollars to it.

The Chaplain's letter, which is sent each month, is greatly appreciated, especially by members at a distance from home.

The Sick Relief Fund continues to be a source of comfort to many of the nurses, also the Emergency Fund is a great agency of substantial value. The offerings at all services have been for the Emergency Fund. The collection at the Annual Service was for the United Benevolent work.

Special thanks should be extended to the Priest-Associates, whose hospitality we have enjoyed at their different parishes, and their helpful addresses.

We are most fortunate in having Bishop Lines and Bishop Stearly among our Priest-Associates; they are fine leaders and wise counsellors. We cannot but express our appreciation of the splendid work of the Chaplain of the Branch. Unlimited praise is due Mrs. Howe, for it is owing to her work, enthusiasm and generosity that the Orange Branch is continuing its good work. In behalf of the Guild I would extend grateful thanks to all those who have co-operated with us in our work.

We are looking forward to even a more successful year next year.
