CANON 1, § II.
OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

From a Parish.

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election, in the following form:

[Name of the Church, the Place, and Date]

This certifies that at a meeting of the congregation of this Church, held for the purpose of electing Church Officers, and Deputies, and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention (*or for the purpose of electing Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, if the meeting be for that object alone*), A. B., C. D., and E. F., being communicants of the Church in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Deputies; and B. C., D. E., and F. G., also being communicants in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Alternate Deputies to represent the Parish in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand (*or if two Wardens subscribe, we have set our hands*), the day and year above written.

N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary sign, then the signatures of *both* Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-in-charge, *or* Missionary, cannot sign.

From a Mission.

N. B.—Use the same form and substitute the word "Mission" for "Parish" in three places. The Minister-in-charge; or, the Clerk; or, the Warden may sign.

Memoranda:

Not more than three Deputies are allowed from each Parish, and Mission.

Three Alternate Deputies must be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies.

Write Christian names in **FULL** and **LEGIBLY**.

Blank forms will be sent by the Secretary of the Convention on or before Easter Monday in each year.

Return Certificates of Election at least **ONE MONTH** before Convention.

Deputies must be *Communicants of the Church, and also qualified voters in the Parish or Mission which elects them.* (See Canon 6, § II, [4], [5] and [6].)

Rules of Order

THE CONVENTION.

1. The Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. The Convention shall meet on the opening day at 9:30 a. m.; with a recess of one hour between 1 and 2 o'clock.
3. At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
4. At the close of each Convention, the Minutes shall be corrected and approved.
5. The doors of the Convention shall be open for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
6. All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convention shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall record their attendance.
7. Clergymen of other Dioceses, and Candidates for Holy Orders, who may be present, shall be admitted to honorary seats in the Convention on the presentation of their names to the Secretary.
8. When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
9. When any member is about to speak he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
10. No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply), in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
11. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
12. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate, but any member may appeal from the decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention. The general procedure of the Convention shall be governed, unless otherwise provided for, by the rules of parliamentary practice as set forth in "Robert's Rules of Order."
13. A Committee consisting of the Bishops, ex-officio, five other clergymen and five laymen, to be known as the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, shall be appointed at each Convention to prepare the official Ballots and the Calendar of Business, for the next Annual Convention.

The mode of conducting the nominations and elections (annually or when such officers are to be elected), of the Standing Committee, of Deputies to the General Convention, of a Treasurer and Auditing Committee, of the Board of Missions and Church Extension (for the retiring class and for vacancies), of members of the Board of Religious Education, Board of Christian Social Service, of six Clerical and six Lay Deputies to the Synod of the Province of New York and New Jersey, of a member of the Ecclesiastical Court, of a Lay Assessor and all other elective officers not otherwise provided for, shall be as follows:

Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations must place in the hands of the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, in writing, on or before noon of the Tuesday in the week preceding the opening day of the meeting thereof, nominations signed by himself for any or all officers mentioned in the above paragraph. Each nominator must certify to the Elections and Rules of Order Committee that the persons nominated by him have consented to the nomination. All names so sent in shall be reported to the Convention by the Committee, at the beginning of the opening session, in the form of a ballot, on which the names shall be arranged alphabetically in each class. After each list of nominations as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks may be filled by any voter. The voter shall mark with an X at the right of the name of each person for whom he votes. On the first ballot these ballots only shall be used, and also in all subsequent ballots, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. No ballot shall be counted in its class, on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled, and the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast.

The Secretary of the Convention shall call for nominations in his usual notice of the date and place of the Annual Convention, and shall, in the same notice, advertise the person or persons designated by said Committee, to whom such nominations shall be sent, with mailing addresses.

The members of Convention shall also be requested, in said call, to send to this Committee any canonical amendments or other important items of business that they may propose to introduce at the next Convention, so that such matters may be assigned a place on the Calendar of Business. This call shall also be annually inserted in the April number of the official magazine of the Diocese, *THE NEWARK CHURCHMAN*.

Balloting shall take place in a separate room when practicable.

The clerical and lay voting lists shall be divided into two sections each.

Alternate Deputies to the General Convention, and Supplementary Deputies to the Provincial Synod shall be elected immediately after the completion of the election of Deputies thereto.

14. Four or more Election Tellers, clerical and lay, in equal numbers, not necessarily members of the Convention, shall be appointed by the President before an election. They shall receive and canvass all votes cast at any election which is required to be by ballot, and when such canvass is completed, shall immediately report its result to the Convention. The polls shall be open for such time as the Convention may, by resolution, direct.
15. All reports (usually printed in the *JOURNAL*), of officers, committees, commissions, and boards of trustees under control of the Convention, shall be printed and distributed by the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order as far as practicable, at least two weeks before the meeting of the Convention; provided that the subject of such printing and reports shall have been referred to the Finance and Advisory Board for consideration, which Board shall have power to supervise, regulate, or to condense the same, and to issue to the Committee or to the Secretary of the Convention such instructions as in the judgment of the said Board will promote greater economy and efficiency in respect to this work.

Reports when read in Convention shall be read by title only, unless the reading be for the better transaction of business.

NEW BUSINESS.

16. All new business introduced, except such as may accompany and form a part of a report of a committee, shall be in the form of a motion or resolution and shall be in writing.

COMMITTEES.

17. All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered. It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Diocese to promptly notify the members of all special committees of their appointment.
18. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.

MOTIONS AND THEIR ORDER.

19. No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
20. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it; or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
21. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.

VOTING PRIVILEGES.

22. All questions shall be decided *viva voce*, unless otherwise specially ordered.
23. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes the vote of the Convention shall be taken by Orders, voting separately; and, when a vote is thus taken a concurrent majority in both Orders shall be necessary to carry any measure.
24. In all elections, those persons only who shall have a majority of the votes given shall be deemed elected; but if in any case more than the required number of persons shall have a majority of votes, the required number of persons having the highest number of votes shall be deemed elected, and in case of a tie between two or more candidates, there shall be a new ballot.

JOURNAL

The Fiftieth Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark assembled in Trinity Cathedral, Newark, New Jersey, at 9:40 A. M., on the morning of May the 20th.

The Bishop Coadjutor celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by the Dean of the Cathedral, the Very Rev'd Arthur Dumper, D.D., who read the Epistle, and the Rt. Rev'd Edwin S. Lines, D.D., the Bishop of the Diocese, who read the Gospel. These with the Rev'd Charles H. Wells, the Rector of St. Andrew's Church, Newark, and the Rev'd John G. Martin, Superintendent of St. Barnabas' Hospital, assisted in the administration of the Sacrament. The offering at this opening service was devoted to the work of the Rev'd J. Archibald McNulty, a former member of All Saints' Church, Orange, who is now a Missionary in the Alamosa Valley in the Diocese of Colorado.

The Convention was called to order by the President at 10:40 A. M. He stated that he had asked the Bishop Coadjutor to preside at the Convention.

Bishop Stearly on taking the chair requested the Secretary of the Convention to ascertain whether or not there was present a constitutional quorum. The same having been found, the Convention was declared in order.

The Rev'd W. O. Leslie, Jr., was nominated as Secretary of the Convention. The nomination was seconded. There being no further nominations, it was moved, seconded and carried that the nominations be closed and that the Chair cast a ballot. The same having been done, the Rev'd W. O. Leslie, Jr., was declared elected as the Secretary of the Convention.

The Secretary appointed the Rev'd J. Fred Hamblin as Assistant Secretary.

Resolved, By the Fiftieth Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Newark, that: It is the clear duty of every member of the Church to observe these laws, whether approving them or not, and to support the effort of all those in authority who are responsible for their enforcement.

To the members of the Annual Convention for the year 1924, of the Diocese of Newark:

WHEREAS, The Right Rev'd Wilson R. Stearly, D.D., first Bishop-Suffragan and later Bishop-Coadjutor, of the Diocese of Newark, having been consecrated on October 21, 1915, will next year in October have completed ten years of service, and as the Annual Convention of 1925 meets in May of that year, too late to prepare in the best possible way for an appropriate observance of that anniversary, therefore

Be It Resolved, That the Right Rev'd the Bishop of the Diocese of Newark appoint at the Annual Convention for the year 1924 a committee to arrange for the observance of the tenth anniversary of the consecration of the Right Rev'd Wilson R. Stearly, D.D.

Bishop Lines took the Chair.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the above resolution be adopted and that it be referred to a special committee to be appointed by Bishop Lines.

The Bishop Coadjutor resumed the Chair.

Mr. Henry J. Russell, the Registrar, presented the following

**Report of the General Chapter of the Cathedral of All Saints, for the
Year 1923.**

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The General Chapter of the Cathedral of All Saints reports that it held two meetings during the year 1923 and two meetings to April 30th in the year 1924.

At the meeting held March 21st, 1923, the following gentlemen were elected as members of the Chapter: The Rev'd Messrs. Frederick B. Carter, G. Ernest Magill, Henry M. Ladd, C. Malcolm Douglas and Arthur Dumper, and Messrs. William Read Howe, C. Alfred Burhorn, James Barber, G. Wisner Thorne, C. B. Johns, and Dr. Archibald Mercer.

The Rev'd Frederick B. Carter was elected Registrar and Mr. William Read Howe was elected Treasurer.

It was recommended and adopted that the monthly Automobile allowance for the Canons, be made equal to the running expense as reported by the Canons, and that the flat allowance of Thirty Dollars per month be discontinued.

The action of the Treasurer in paying the usual allowance to Trinity Cathedral was approved, and it was ordered that the custom be continued during the next year.

It was moved and carried: That all monies now in the Principal Fund of the General Chapter of the Cathedral of All Saints, and all donations subsequently received be held intact as the nucleus of an Endowment Fund.

It was also moved and carried: That each year such sums of the unused Income as may be deemed wise be added to the Principal.

At the meeting of December 19th, Mr. Henry J. Russell was elected Registrar, succeeding the Rev'd Frederick B. Carter who had resigned.

The General Chapter upon announcement of the death of its Treasurer, the late William Read Howe, appointed a Committee to draw up a resolution of sympathy to be sent to the family of the decedent, and also directed that a copy of it be spread in full on the minutes of the General Chapter.

It was resolved that a Finance Committee be appointed, to consist of the Treasurer and three other members, to have custody of the Permanent Funds and with authority to invest and reinvest sums of this Fund. Messrs. A. H. Baldwin, E. O. Stanley and C. B. Johns were so appointed.

The National Newark and Essex Banking Company was designated as the depository of the Permanent Funds.

It was resolved that the bonds of the Treasurer be fixed in the sum of Five thousand dollars.

Mr. C. Alfred Burhorn was elected Treasurer to succeed the late William Read Howe.

The stipend of the Canons, the Rev'd Gabriel Farrell and the Rev'd Guy H. Madara, was fixed at \$4,000.00 per annum commencing January 1st, 1924.

The Rev'd W. O. Leslie, Jr., was appointed as a Canon Missioner for work among the foreign born.

At the meeting of April 6th, 1924, a Committee on Propaganda, appointed at a previous meeting, made its report, and on motion it was resolved, "That the Cathedral Chapter in making its report to the coming Diocesan Convention, recom-

mend that the Convention endorse the idea of a Cathedral Sunday, and that the Bishops be requested to designate All Saints' Day, or the Sunday nearest the same, as the time when offerings would be taken in the Parishes and Missions, the same to be added to the Endowment Fund of the Cathedral."

The Committee on revision of Article 1 of the Constitution presented the following:

ARTICLE 1, OF THE GENERAL CHAPTER.

1. The persons holding the following offices shall, by virtue of their office, be the body corporate known as the Cathedral of All Saints in the Diocese of Newark, and shall constitute the General Chapter, to wit:

The Bishop of the Diocese.

The Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one.

The Bishop Suffragan, if there be one.

The Dean of the Cathedral.

The Rector of such Church as the Bishop may choose as his Cathedral, pending the erection of the Cathedral of All Saints.

The Archdeacons of the Diocese.

The Canons Missioner.

The President of the Standing Committee.

The Chancellor of the Diocese.

One clerical and one lay member of each of the following Diocesan Boards (said members to be elected annually by their respective Boards) viz.:

Finance and Advisory, Missions and Church Extension, Religious Education, Social Service, and twelve other persons being communicants of the Church in good standing in the Diocese of Newark, of whom six (6) shall be elected for the term of three years, by the General Chapter on nomination of the Diocesan or (in case of a vacancy in that office) by the ranking Bishop in the Diocese, and six (6) shall be elected by the Diocesan Convention, of whom there shall be three clerical and three lay persons, one in each order to be elected respectively for the term of one, two and three years, and thereafter one in each order shall be elected annually by the Diocesan Convention for the term of three years.

On motion, seconded and carried, THAT this Chapter approve the same and that it recommend the revision of said Article 1, to the Diocesan Convention for its consideration and adoption, and also that authority be given to the Corporation of the Cathedral of All Saints in the Diocese of Newark, to make and file an amended certificate of Incorporation to conform to such amendment of Article 1 of the Constitution.

The Report of the Treasurer of the Cathedral General Chapter was presented by Mr. C. Alfred Burhorn. (*Vide*; Index.)

In connection with the recommendation of the Chapter looking toward the revision of Article I of the Incorporation of the Cathedral Chapter, Mr. Edward O. Stanley moved, and it was seconded, that the matter be referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

At this point it was made known that the Chapter had prepared the following resolutions, carefully drawn to cover the legal requirements:

WHEREAS, The Cathedral of All Saints in the City and Diocese of Newark, was incorporated on the 11th day of July, 1908, by the filing in the Office of the Secretary of State, at Trenton, on that day, a certificate of incorporation dated May 19, 1908, and acknowledged June 24, 1908, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 132 of the Laws of 1908, and the resolutions adopted at the Diocesan Convention held on the 19th day of May, 1908, and

WHEREAS, The present composition of the Trustees of such corporation constituting the General Chapter of the Cathedral of All Saints involves many changes in personnel, due largely to the number of ex-officio members, and

WHEREAS, By reason of the growth of the Diocese, and the organization of the various boards, the General Chapter of the Cathedral has recommended to this Convention that the Canons Missioner, the Finance and Advisory Board, the Board of Religious Education, and the Board of Social Service, should have representation in the General Chapter,

Be it therefore RESOLVED, By the Diocesan Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Newark, in the State of New Jersey, at the regularly convened meeting thereof, held at the City of Newark, in the County of Essex, in said State, on Tuesday, the 20th day of May A. D., 1924, that the names of the trustees elected or appointed as trustees of the General Chapter of the Cathedral of All Saints in the City and Diocese of Newark, and the terms for which they are respectively chosen or will hold office as trustees, are

The Bishop of the Diocese.

The Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one.

The Bishop Suffragan, if there be one.

The Dean of the Cathedral.

The Rector of such Church as the Bishop may choose as his Cathedral, pending the erection of the Cathedral of All Saints.

The Archdeacons of the Diocese.

The Canons Missioner.

The President of the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

One clerical and one lay member of each of the following Diocesan Boards (said members to be elected annually by their respective boards) viz.: Finance and Advisory, Missions and Church Extension, Religious Education, Social Service, and

Twelve other persons being communicants of the Church in good standing in the Diocese of Newark, of whom six (6) shall be elected for the term of three years, by the General Chapter on nomination of the Diocesan or (in case of a vacancy in that office) by the ranking Bishop in the Diocese, and six (6) shall be elected by the Diocesan Convention, of whom there shall be three clerical and three lay persons, one in each order to be elected respectively for the term of one, two and three years, and thereafter one in each order shall be elected annually by the Diocesan Convention for the term of three years.

The Chancellor of the Diocese.

who shall severally and each for himself hold office as trustee of the said General Chapter during the respective terms of the certain designated officers of the Church or Convention, or as above specified, and

Be it further RESOLVED, That all action by the officers of this Convention necessary to effect the amendment of the Certificate of Incorporation heretofore filed herein be taken, including the preparation and presenting to the Legislature such petition, if any, as may be necessary, for the purpose of obtaining legislative authority as may be necessary in the opinion of the Chancellor of the Diocese, for the purpose of carrying out the intention of these resolutions and the filing of an amended certificate of incorporation, and that the Bishop and the Secretary of this Convention be and the same hereby are authorized to prepare and file any and all certificates in writing, under their hands and seals, for the purpose of carrying the same into effect, and

Be it Further RESOLVED, That the General Chapter be and it hereby is authorized to adopt an amended constitution and statutes or by-laws for the management of its affairs, and

Be it Further RESOLVED, That the costs and disbursements incurred by the Chapter in carrying out these resolutions be paid by the Treasurer of the Diocese.

The above having been presented, Mr. Edward O. Stanley accepted the Chapter's resolutions and the same were adopted by the Convention.

It was moved and seconded that the recommendation of the Chapter looking toward the setting aside of a Sunday for the presentation of the matter of the Cathedral to the various Parishes of the Diocese be adopted, and that the Convention recommend to the Bishops that the Sunday nearest All Saints' Day be designated as Cathedral Sunday.

Mr. James R. Strong presented an amendment that the date be left to the Bishops. The motion so amended was adopted.

In the absence of the Secretary, due to illness, the report of the Standing Committee was presented by the Rev'd Charles T. Walkley, D.D. (*Vide*, Index.)

Dr. Walkley also presented the report of the Trustees of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen. (*Vide*, Index.)

The Treasurer of the Diocese, Mr. Albert H. Baldwin, gave directions concerning the payment of transportation expenses of the Deputies, and also directed that those desiring hospitality over night should give their names to the Secretary of the Convention.

Mr. George W. Hulsart, the President of the Church Club of the Diocese, extended a cordial invitation to all the Deputies to attend the Church Club dinner to be given at the Robert Treat Hotel the first evening.

Mr. Ernest Pulsford presented the following resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions:

WHEREAS, The cumulative evidence of the ages indicates that war does not remedy the difficulties which arise between nation and nation, but rather that it increases hatred among men, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Convention of the Diocese of Newark in the year of our Lord 1924, does hereby place itself on record as being opposed to war as a means of settling disputes and calls upon all men and women to practice in their lives the principles of Jesus Christ, founded on love.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Convention recess for luncheon, to reconvene at 2:15.

The Convention reconvened at 2:20.

To the Diocesan Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The Canonical Committee on the Church Pension Fund respectfully reports as follows on its operations for the calendar year 1923:

The annual grants of the Church Pension Fund throughout the Church up to January 1st, last, totalled \$299,000 per annum, which was an increase of \$30,000 per annum over the same date last year.

The grants which the Fund is carrying on account of the General Clergy Relief Fund, with the other merged funds and the General Convention of 1907 Account, bring the total grants throughout the Church, including those from the Church Pension Fund proper, to \$486,000 per annum.

The Trustees of the Fund at their meeting held December 18th, 1923, renewed for the year 1924 the provisions of their resolution of December 20th, 1921, authorizing the immediate additional benefit of \$1,000 for the widows of clergymen dying in active service, whose pension assessments have been fully paid. It has also been found possible to extend the provisions of these resolutions to include the widows of clergymen who die within six months after relinquishing their last cure, provided they are not beneficiaries of the Fund at the time of their death. The pension assessment payments from all sources throughout the Church during the year 1923 are in excess of those of the previous year, thus showing that the general support of the pension system is being satisfactorily continued.

The report was received and the Committee continued.

Mr. Crawford moved the adoption of the following amendment to the Canon on the Church Pension Fund:

The Canonical Committee on the Church Pension Fund moves to amend Canon 22 of this Diocese relating to that Fund as follows and ask that the proposed amendment be referred to the Committee on Constitutions and Canons, with the request that they present a report on the same tomorrow:

"Canon 22, Section II, clause 4, is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof the following:

"Provided that, at its option, the Committee may permit the Treasurer of the Church Pension Fund to receive all such premiums directly from the parishes, missions and other organizations paying the same, in which case the election of a Treasurer as directed by this clause shall be dispensed with."

So that the entire clause shall read as follows:

4. To elect a Treasurer who may or may not be a member of the said Committee, who shall be required to give a bond satisfactory to the Committee, and whose duty it shall be to receive from all of the said parishes, missions, and other organizations, the aforesaid premiums and to transmit the same to the Treasurer of the Church Pension Fund; provided that, at its option, the Committee may permit the Treasurer of the Church Pension Fund to receive all such premiums directly from the parishes, missions and other organizations paying the same, in which case the election of a Treasurer as directed by this clause shall be dispensed with.

The same was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons for report on Wednesday.

Due to the illness of the Chairman, Rev'd Dr. D. S. Hamilton, Mr. James R. Strong presented the following

Report of the Special Committee on the 50th Anniversary of the Diocese.

Pursuant to a resolution adopted at the last Convention, a committee whose names are attached hereto was appointed to prepare and carry out a suitable celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the organization of the Diocese, which Committee begs to submit herewith the following report:

On November 12th, 1874, the Primary Convention of the Diocese was held in Grace Church, Newark, at which Convention were present representatives of 43 parishes and missions, 65 being entitled to representation, from which small beginning there has developed the Diocese of Newark, representing today one hundred and forty parishes and missions, and one hundred and eighty clergy. Surely such a growth should be a cause of thankfulness and of renewed interest in the work of the Church, and the proposed Jubilee Anniversary Celebration should be furthered and supported by our entire Diocese. Your Committee has prepared the following plan:

1. On Thursday, November 13th, in the morning, there is to be held in Grace Church, Newark, a service of thanksgiving to be participated in by the clergy and representatives of the Diocesan Boards, as well as delegations from the parishes, the details of which will be published at a later date.

2. During the month of October a "pilgrimage" and visitation will be made to each parish and mission of the Diocese by the Bishops and a group of clerical and lay officials of the Diocese in order that there may be communicated to the members of our Church in their own parishes information as to the Diocese and its work. Following this "pilgrimage" in each district of the Diocese there will be a dinner in co-operation with the Department of Development and Revenue, to which will be invited the vestries of all the parishes within that district. It is hoped that, with the hearty co-operation of the Rectors, this "pilgrimage" may be made of inestimable benefit in stirring up throughout the Diocese an interest in the work of the Church.

3. On Sunday evening, November 16th, there will be held a special service of praise and thanksgiving, which will be broadcasted, and it is hoped that each parish in the Diocese will arrange for a radio receiving apparatus so that the members of the parish may join in this service in their own parish Churches.

4. The Committee requests that in every parish and mission of the Diocese a historical sketch be prepared, giving the story of their organization and growth. It is hoped that the outlines of these stories may be presented in all of the parishes on a Sunday immediately preceding the Anniversary, and it is desired that copies of the same be furnished to the Registrar of the Diocese for preservation in the Diocesan archives.

5. It is thought fitting that the observance of the Anniversary should be marked by definite efforts in the parishes and missions for the strengthening of the Church and its work in material ways. The Committee suggests that in every congregation a thank offering be made for the growth and prosperity of the Diocese through its first half century, and with this in view the Committee recommends the following financial objective:

TO REMOVE DEBT FROM PARISH AND DIOCESAN PROPERTIES.

Realizing that because of varying conditions in the parishes one object would be felt to be more practical and appropriate than others and that the presentation of an object

should be left to the parishes and missions, your Committee recommends the following sub-division of the financial objective from which choices may be made:

(a) That in parishes and missions having permanent debt, determined efforts should be made to remove or materially reduce these debts. From the annual reports it appears that seventy-seven parishes and missions owe sums of money secured by notes and mortgages. These run in amounts from \$250 to \$32,000, the total of all being over \$470,000. What better celebration of the Jubilee Anniversary could be had than the removal or a material reduction of these debts?

(b) That in parishes and missions without debt determined effort should be made to aid in removing Diocesan debt or assisting the Diocese in one of the following objectives:

1. The removal of the mortgage now standing on Diocesan house and Bishops' residences. During the past two years, sixty-one parishes have given \$32,848 toward this object, and it is thought that the parishes which have not had a part in this would be glad to contribute toward the removal of the remaining debt.

2. Strengthening the Diocesan institutions, such as Bonnie Brae Farm, whose debt incurred in purchasing of property is \$14,500; the Girls' Friendly Society, who will need for the construction of their Holiday House at Eagle's Nest Farm \$35,000, or other deserving Diocesan institutions.

3. To increase the endowment of the Episcopate, which endowment fund now stands at \$103,850. This fund should be increased by at least \$100,000 and thus reduce the annual assessment now levied on the parishes for the balance of the Bishops' salaries which the fund does not supply.

It is hoped that the clergy and vestries will give careful consideration to these plans and co-operate to the fullest extent and make some special effort along the lines indicated, making this Jubilee Anniversary Celebration a fine step forward in the way of the better equipping of the Church for its ministry and service for the next fifty years.

Your Committee asks that it be continued to complete the celebration as outlined, with power to make such modifications as may be deemed wise.

Archdeacon Elmendorf, the Secretary, presented the following

Report of the Finance and Advisory Board.

1924.

To the Members of the Convention:

The Finance and Advisory Board submits herewith its fourth Annual Report.

The Board has met monthly with the exception of the summer time.

In accordance with the resolution passed at the meeting of the Convention last year, we have had prepared and printed a thousand copies of the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese, together with certain portions of the state laws governing religious corporations and the special laws relating to the Episcopal Church. The task of preparing this important volume was done by the Committee on Constitution and Canons. We owe to this Committee our thanks for the painstaking excellent piece of work accomplished under the leadership of the Chairman, the Rev. Dr. E. A. White.

In presenting for your approval the proposed Diocesan Assessment for 1925 and the Budget for the same year, we call your attention to the fact that the Budget represents the ideal at which we aim. In calling this an ideal, we do not mean to imply or suggest that it calls for an amount of money in excess of what it is possible to raise, or for work for which there is no great need. It means simply that we have not yet succeeded in reaching all the members of the Diocese or in awakening them to the grave necessity

for pushing forward the work of the Christ and His Church in these growing communities about us.

Your Board has exercised great care in making appropriations of money. There are new works that ought to be undertaken and many of those already established need increases if they are to meet the opportunities confronting them.

The difference between the Budget as voted and the actual working budget, which has to be adopted, is the difference between what we ought reasonably to be expected to do as a Diocese and what we are able to do with the amounts sent in from the parishes and missions. While it is true that increasing amounts are necessary to meet the expanding work of parishes, fair consideration should be given to the expanding diocesan work. The two should go together. There has been little or no increase in the receipts of the Diocese for two years past. This should be a matter of serious concern to us all. The Department of Development and Revenue, which has these matters in hand, will present a report at this Convention.

That, until the Diocese and the National Council have each received \$136,600.00, all Quota contributions will be divided equally between them.

That, after this, the entire amount received will be sent to the National Council, until it has received \$190,320.00.

That, after this, contributions for Priorities and Advance Work be divided equally between the National Council and the Diocese.

NOTE.—In addition to the above, the Quota of the National Council for the Diocese of Newark includes \$154,530.50 for Priorities and Advance Work in the Church at large. This amount is indicated and urged upon the attention of the parishes, but will not be included in the quotas apportioned to the parishes and missions.

Rev'd Guy H. Madara, the Executive Secretary, presented the following

Report of the Department of Development and Revenue.

During the past year the Department of Development and Revenue has endeavored to carry out the work prescribed by the Canons of this Diocese. It has realized the necessity of bringing to every Church member knowledge of the activities of the Church in every Department and in every land; it has tried to fill this need.

LENTEN EFFORT.

During the season of Lent the illustrated lecture on "The Ungathered Harvest" was secured from the National Council, and the lecture was given almost daily throughout the Diocese by members of the group of Information Men.

INFORMATION SHEETS

During the year five issues of Information Sheets were sent to the clergy with the request that they use the material contained therein in speaking to their congregations, or in such other manner as seemed best to them. These Information Sheets were made up of new and striking facts in relation to the work of the Church in five different districts, and each Sheet was accompanied by a page of illustrations.

The Diocese of Chicago becoming cognizant of our undertaking, asked leave to share in the issue and was furnished with a supply of each of these sheets.

EAGLES' NEST FARM CONFERENCE.

At the end of June between 35 and 40 of the Clergy of the Diocese met for a three days' conference at Eagles' Nest Farm. The outline of plans of the Nation Wide Campaign was presented by Bishop Darst of East Carolina and Rev. R. Bland Mitchell of National headquarters, representing the National Council. Conferences on parochial activities of the Diocese were led by Rev. Percy T. Olton, Rev. Parker C. Manzer, and Rev. Edwin S. Carson. One of the finest results of this conference was the increase in the esprit de corps of the clergy present, as it gave them an opportunity to know each other better through the close and friendly contact of these three days.

CONTRIBUTIONS.

During 1923 contributions to apply on the quotas were received at Diocesan headquarters amounting to \$202,226.14, which was \$4,646.13 in excess of the amount contributed in 1922. This, it is hoped, marks the end of the downward swing which came in 1920, and the beginning of the upward swing which should characterize the support of the work of the Church by every Parish and Mission.

QUARTERLY STATEMENTS.

The Department has developed a form of Quarterly Statement which it submitted to the rectors and treasurers of the Diocese, suggesting the use of this or a similar form in every Parish and Mission. It has arranged with its printer to supply these at the

rate of 40c per hundred with the name of the Parish or Mission printed thereon. About 15,000 of these forms have already been supplied in this manner. Those Parishes and Missions which have used them have found them of great value in keeping their contributors informed of contributions and in avoiding large arrearages. Several Parishes have sent in for a second supply of these Quarterly Statements.

NATION WIDE CAMPAIGN.

Two distinct features marked the seasonal effort of stirring-up interest in the Fall; namely, Mass Meetings and Parish Conferences.

MASS MEETINGS.

A series of thirteen Mass Meetings were held in different sections of the Diocese. These meetings were generally well attended and marked by enthusiasm. The massed choirs of each district participated and added a note of inspiration and beauty. Bishops Cook of Delaware, Johnson of Colorado, Darst of East Carolina, Lloyd of New York and Dr. John W. Wood of the National Council were the visiting speakers. Bishop Stearly, Canon Madara and Mr. James R. Strong spoke at these meetings on behalf of the Diocese. A careful check shows that 103 of the clergy of the Diocese were present; 1,122 choristers and 4,032 people in the congregation, a total of 5,257.

PARISH CONFERENCES.

In Bayonne and Hoboken the Parishes of each city joined in three day sessions of parish conferences, afternoons and evenings. The conferences in Bayonne were led by Canon Dunseath and those in Hoboken by Rev. E. P. Hooper. Both of these conferences helped to stir up the interest of those who attended and were of great value.

EVERY MEMBER CANVASS.

The Every Member Canvass was held generally on November 25th and the reports have brought assurance that there will be no let down in the contributions by the Parishes and Missions in 1924. The total amount pledged is \$200,752.42, and once more it gives us pleasure to state that from every Parish and Mission in the Diocese a report has been received.

VESTRY CONFERENCES.

The Department is charged with the duty of aiding every Parish and Mission which calls on it for help in carrying on its work at home. It is always ready to respond to calls for conferences with vestry or mission committees, and to carefully go over conditions in the Parish or Mission and discuss the proper methods to be pursued to arouse enthusiasm for the whole work. A number of such conferences were held during 1923, resulting in a better understanding all around and a finer spirit of co-operation.

An encouraging result of these conferences is seen in the increased number of Parishes and Missions which have adopted the methods suggested by the Diocese. Mission Treasurers have been appointed and monthly contributions ordered sent to Diocesan headquarters. Every year sees more Parishes and Missions adopting the general plan; and this, not primarily because the Diocese suggests it, but because experience proves this general plan to be best for all concerned.

OBJECTIVE.

The General Church and the Diocese are dependent upon the plan of the Nation Wide Campaign for their support. It is essential that there should be the fullest co-operation between the Department and the Parishes and Missions. Each Parish and Mission should conduct an adequate Every Member Canvass and use the Duplex Envelopes. A report as to the results of the canvass should be made to the Diocese without delay. The amounts collected in the red ink side of the envelopes should be forwarded promptly each month to the Diocesan Treasurer of the Nation Wide Campaign. Quarterly Statements should be sent to each contributor showing his or her standing as to the payment of pledges. If each Church member can be brought to realize the magnitude of the Church as a whole, its opportunities and responsibilities, and the place which each member occupies in the Parish, the Diocese and the General Church, the question of financial support will be solved.

The Department looks with confidence for the support of the delegates to this convention in carrying forward its plans for education and for the more intensive activities towards the close of the Church year.

Rev'd Dr. Walkley, stressing the importance of proper care of the Missionary work of the Diocese, as well as the developing of a closer co-ordination between the Diocese and the National Council, advocated an additional Bishop who might give his entire time to this work.

Bishop Lines spoke briefly about the object of the offering at the opening service and stated that if there were any members of the Convention who had not had an opportunity to contribute, he would be glad to receive their gifts to be added to the sum which would be turned over to Rev'd J. A. McNulty for his work in Colorado.

Rev'd Dr. Walkley presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That the matter of Episcopal assistance to our Bishops be referred to a joint committee consisting of the Standing Committee and the Finance and Advisory Board.

An amendment was offered eliminating the word "Episcopal."

The resolution was amended, directing that the matter be referred to a joint committee consisting of the Standing Committee and the Finance and Advisory Board to report at the next Diocesan Convention.

The motion so amended was adopted.

The Convention proceeded to the Third Ballot.

The Committee on New Parishes presented the following

Report of the Committee on New Parishes.

The Committee on New Parishes reports that it has received the applications of the Church of the Incarnation, East Orange, and of St. Peter's Church, Mountain Lakes, for admission into union with the Convention and has seen and examined the required canonical documents, or certified copies thereof, and recommends that such churches be admitted into union with the Convention.

After considerable discussion, the Committee's report was adopted.

Report of the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions.

Your Committee to which was referred the resolution calling upon the Diocese to place itself on record as opposed to war, recommends the passage of the same, regretting, however, that the government as well as the individual is not called upon by this resolution to practice the principles of Jesus Christ in matters of peace.

It was moved that the report be adopted.

After considerable discussion, Mr. James R. Strong moved that the resolution be recommitted to the Committee in order that with the maker of the resolution, they might give the matter further consideration.

The motion was adopted.

Report of the Auditing Committee and the Committee on Securities.

The Auditing Committee and the Committee on Securities respectfully report that the accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocese of Newark and those of the Department of Development and Revenue, and of the Nation-Wide Campaign for the year ended December 31, 1923, have been audited and the Diocesan Funds verified on behalf of the two committees by Frederick P. Schaefer & Company, Certified Public Accountants, whose reports on the audits are submitted herewith.

A summary of the Financial Transactions of the Department of Development and Revenue as shown by the report of the auditors is:

Morning Prayer was read by the Rev'd A. T. Doughty and the Rev'd Joseph Anastasi.

The Bishop Coadjutor called the Convention to order at ten o'clock.

The minutes of the preceding day were read and approved.

The tellers reported the results of the Fourth Ballot:

Deputies to Provincial Synod, Clerical—Rev'd Robert F. Lau, D.D.

It was moved, seconded and carried that a Committee consisting of three in each order be appointed to canvass the ballots and present nominations for the six clerical and six lay Supplementary Deputies to the Provincial Synod.

The Chair appointed Rev'd Messrs. George P. Armstrong, Edgar L. Cook, James T. Lodge and Messrs. Lewis R. Conklin, Philip H. Patriarche, and Horace C. Grice.

The report of the Secretary of the Convention was presented by title. (*Vide, Index.*)

The report of the Board of Missions and Church Extension was presented by the Secretary, Mr. Henry J. Russell. (*Vide, Index.*)

The report of the Board of Social Service was presented by Mr. F. A. Burlingame, the Chairman, who spoke at length on the work of the Board. (*Vide, Index.*)

The report of the Board of Examining Chaplains was presented by the Ven. Henry M. Ladd. (*Vide, Index.*)

Bishop Lines made the following nominations for the Board of Examining Chaplains: term expiring 1927, Rev'd Messrs. Henry M. Ladd, Gabriel Farrell, W. O. Kinsolving.

The Convention approved these nominations.

Bishop Lines appointed the Rev'd Allen Greene and the Hon. J. W. Rufus Besson as members of the Board of Adjustment.

The Secretary of the Convention read the following

Report of the Committee on the Revision of the Prayer Book.

The Committee on Prayer Book Revision begs leave to say that while there is no doubt that many members of the Convention would welcome the opportunity to discuss revision and express their opinions on the changes to be made in the Book of Common Prayer, that such discussion to be satisfactory would require a great deal of time, and in our judgment more time than the business of this Convention would permit.

We recognize, however, that it is well within the right of any member of this Convention to offer a resolution on any subject connected with Revision that may be sent to the General Convention as a Memorial, but we suggest that if this is done, that the mover of the resolution confine himself to one particular phase of the question so that the debate may have some semblance of unity and not be unduly prolonged.

It was moved and seconded that the report be received.

After considerable discussion, the motion was adopted.

Dean Dumper moved that a new Committee be appointed to consider the matter of Prayer Book revision and to report to the next Convention.

The motion was adopted.

The Rev'd Guy H. Madara moved that this committee be instructed to send a copy of its report to the Deputies of the Convention before the meeting of the next Convention.

After considerable discussion, the motion was adopted.

The Committee on the nomination of Supplementary Deputies to the Provincial Synod made the following nominations through the Chairman: Rev'd Messrs. F. A. Coleman, Edgar L. Cook, Allen Greene, Walter E. Howe, A. R. McWilliams, Victor W. Mori, and Messrs. J. R. Brinley, F. E. Chamberlin, John T. Coit, F. E. Lawrence, F. W. Lobdell and Stewart A. Trench.

By vote, the above were elected as Supplementary Deputies.

The Rev'd Dr. White presented the following

Report, Committee on Constitution and Canons.

REPORT No. 1.

Resolved, That Article 10, Section 1 of the Constitution be amended so that the first paragraph thereof shall read as follows:

Section 1. The Standing Committee shall consist of four Presbyters and four Laymen to be elected as follows: The Annual Diocesan Convention of 1925 shall elect two qualified Presbyters and two qualified Laymen to serve as members of said Com-

mittee for the term of one year, or until their successors are elected. The Annual Diocesan Convention of 1926 shall elect one qualified Presbyter and one qualified Layman to serve for a term of one year, or until their successors are elected; one qualified Presbyter and one qualified Layman to serve for a term of two years, or until their successors are elected; one qualified Presbyter and one qualified Layman to serve for a term of three years, or until their successors are elected, and one qualified Presbyter and one qualified Layman to serve for a term of four years, or until their successors are elected. At each Annual Diocesan Convention thereafter, one qualified Presbyter and one qualified Layman shall be elected to serve for a term of four years, or until their successors are elected.

At the Annual Convention of the Diocese in 1925, there shall be elected to represent this Diocese in the Provincial Synod, two Clerical and two Lay Deputies, to serve for a term of one year, or until their successors are elected; two Clerical and two Lay Deputies to serve for a term of two years, or until their successors are elected, and two Clerical and two Lay Deputies to serve for a term of three years, or until their successors are elected. At each annual convention of the Diocese thereafter, two Clerical and two Lay Deputies shall be elected to serve for a term of three years, or until their successors are elected. The voting shall be by ballot, the Clergy and Laity voting by Orders, and a concurrent vote of both Orders shall be necessary to constitute an election.

Resolved, That Canon 3, Section II, be amended by the insertion of the words "unless provision is otherwise specifically ordered in the Constitution or Canons," before the word "*Provided*" in the sixth line.

Report, Committee on Constitution and Canons.

REPORT No. 7.

Resolved, That Canon 20, Section I, be amended by striking out the word "twenty-four" in the eighth line, and the insertion in place thereof the word "twenty-six."

Resolved, That Canon 20, Section I, be further amended by striking out the second and third paragraphs, and inserting in place thereof the following:

The Annual Convention of the Diocese at its meeting in 1925 shall elect by a plurality of votes five members to serve for a term of one year, or until their successors are elected. The Convention of the Diocese at its annual meeting in 1926 shall elect, by a plurality of votes, three members to serve for a term of one year, or until their successors are elected; three members to serve for a term of two years, or until their successors are elected, and three members to serve for a term of three years, or until their successors are elected. At each Annual Convention thereafter, three members shall be elected by a plurality of votes for a term of three years, or until their successors are elected.

At the Annual Diocesan Convention in 1925, the Bishop shall appoint five members to serve for a term of one year, or until their successors are appointed. At the Annual Convention in 1926, the Bishop shall appoint three members to serve for a term of one year, or until their successors are appointed; three members to serve for a term of two years, or until their successors are appointed, and three members to serve for a term of three years, or until their successors are appointed. At each Annual Convention thereafter, the Bishop shall appoint three members to serve for a term of three years, or until their successors are appointed.

Resolved, That Canon 21, Section I, be amended by striking out the second and third paragraphs, and inserting in place thereof the following:

The Annual Convention of the Diocese, at its meeting in 1925, shall elect by a plurality of votes five members to serve for a term of one year, or until their successors are elected. The Convention of the Diocese, at its annual meeting in 1926, shall elect,

by a plurality of votes, three members to serve for a term of one year, or until their successors are elected; three members to serve for a term of two years, or until their successors are elected, and three members to serve for a term of three years, or until their successors are elected. At each Annual Convention thereafter, three members shall be elected, by a plurality of votes, for a term of three years, or until their successors are elected.

At the Annual Convention in 1925, the Bishop shall appoint five members to serve for a term of one year, or until their successors are appointed. At the Annual Convention in 1926, the Bishop shall appoint three members to serve for a term of one year, or until their successors are appointed; three members to serve for a term of two years, or until their successors are appointed, and three members to serve for a term of three years, or until their successors are appointed. At each Annual Convention thereafter, the Bishop shall appoint three members to serve for a term of three years, or until their successors are appointed.

REPORT No. 9.

The Committee on Canons, to which the resolution of the Pension Committee of the Diocese, proposing to amend Canon 22, Section II, paragraph 4 was referred, respectfully reports that it has considered the same, and recommends the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That Canon 22, Section II, paragraph 4, be amended by the following proviso at the end of said paragraph:

"Provided, that, at its option, the Committee may permit the Treasurer of the Church Pension Fund to receive all such premiums directly from the parishes, missions, and other organizations paying the same, in which case the election of a Treasurer as directed by this paragraph shall be dispensed with."

So that the entire paragraph shall read as follows:

4. To elect a Treasurer who may or may not be a member of the said Committee, who shall be required to give a bond satisfactory to the Committee, and whose duty it shall be to receive from all of the said parishes, missions, and other organizations, the aforesaid premiums and to transmit the same to the Treasurer of the Church Pension Fund; *provided*, that, at its option, the Committee may permit the Treasurer of the Church Pension Fund to receive all such premiums directly from the parishes, missions, and other organizations paying the same, in which case the election of a Treasurer as directed by this paragraph shall be dispensed with.

The Rev'd Dr. White moved the adoption of the above resolution. The motion was carried.

The Rev'd Dr. White presented the following

Report, Committee on Constitution and Canons.

REPORT No. 10.

The Committee on Canons, to which was referred the recommendations and resolutions of the General Chapter of the Cathedral of All Saints' proposing changes in the Constitution, statutes, by-laws, and Certificate of Incorporation of said Cathedral, respectfully reports, that it has considered the same, and recommends the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That this Convention approves of the recommendation of said General Chapter, that the Canons Missioner, the Finance and Advisory Board, the Board of Religious Education, and the Board of Social Service have representation in the said General Chapter.

Resolved, That this Convention adopts in principle the recommendations of said General Chapter set forth in the first resolution thereof; as to the personnel and number of the Trustees of the General Chapter of the Cathedral of All Saints' in the City and Diocese of Newark.

Resolved, That all action by the officers of this Convention necessary to effect the amendment of the Certificate of Incorporation heretofore filed herein be taken at the proper time, and that the Bishop and Secretary of the Convention of the Diocese of Newark be and the same are hereby authorized to prepare and file any and all necessary certificates in writing, under their hands and seals, for the purpose of carrying the same into effect.

Resolved, That the preparation and presentation to the Legislature of this State such petition, as may be necessary for the carrying out the intention of these resolutions, together with the preparation and filing of an amended Certificate of Incorporation be referred to the Special Committee on Legislation with power to confer with the Bishop of the Diocese of New Jersey, or such Committee as he may appoint in the matter, if the same be necessary, and with their consent, if the same be necessary, to endeavor to obtain from the Legislature of this State such legislation as may be necessary to effect the changes in the statute law, and the Certificate of Incorporation as set forth in the resolutions of the said General Chapter.

Resolved, That the costs and disbursements incurred by the General Chapter in carrying out these resolutions be paid by the Treasurer of the Diocese on certification of the same by the Chairman of the Special Committee on Legislation.

By order of the Committee,

The Rev'd Dr. White moved the adoption of each of the above resolutions. Each of the resolutions was adopted separately.

The Report of the Registrar of the Diocese was presented by Mr. John G. Crawford. (*Vide*, Index.)

On motion, Mr. John G. Crawford was unanimously re-elected as Librarian.

The report of the Board of Religious Education was presented by the Rev'd Gabriel Farrell. (*Vide*, Index.)

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions, acting through the Chairman, Dean Dumper, presented a report on the resolution offered the previous day by Mr. Ernest Pulsford, said resolution having been recommitted to it for further consideration. The report follows:

WHEREAS, The cumulative evidence of the ages indicates that war does not remedy the difficulties which arise between nation and nation, but rather that it increases hatred among men, therefore be it

Resolved, That this Convention of the Diocese of Newark, in the year of our Lord 1924, does hereby place itself on record as being opposed to war as a means of settling disputes and urges the Government of the United States to a larger co-operation with the other nations of the world in organized efforts to promote peace and to avoid war; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be sent to the Department of State of the Federal Government and to the Committee on Foreign Relations of the Senate of the United States.

Dean Dumper then moved the adoption of the above report, which the Convention concurred in after considerable discussion.

The Report of the Committee on Church Architecture was presented by title. (*Vide*, Index.)

The Rev'd Dr. White, speaking for the Special Committee on Legislation, reported progress and moved that the Committee be continued.

The motion was carried.

Bishop Lines moved the continuance of the Committee on the Seal for the Diocese. The motion was adopted.

Bishop Lines also moved the continuance of the Commission on the Increase of the Endowment of the Fund for the Support of the Episcopate. The motion was adopted.

Rev'd Dr. Brookman, rising to a point of order, desired to know why the printing of reports of Boards, etc., as specified in number 15 of the Rules of Order had not been complied with.

Considerable discussion resulted, following which Dr. Brookman moved that the carrying out of the provisions of Rule 15 be left to the Finance and Advisory Board.

On motion, the same was adopted.

An interesting report on the work of Christ Hospital was presented by

the Chaplain-Superintendent, the Rev'd Thomas A. Hyde, who pointed out the fact that new buildings were needed because of the increasing work and that it was hoped that work on the same might be begun within the near future. (*Vide, Index.*)

The Chairman of the Executive Committee, Rev'd Charles L. Gomph, presented the report of the work of St. Barnabas' Hospital, Newark. (*Vide, Index.*)

The Report on the work of the House of the Holy Comforter was also presented by Rev'd Charles L. Gomph. (*Vide, Index.*)

Bishop Stearly spoke briefly concerning the work of the Laura Augusta Home. (*Vide, Index.*)

The Committee on Unfinished Business, presenting its report through the Chairman, the Rev'd A. T. Doughty, announced that the only item to be considered was the resolution made last year by the Rev'd Robert W. Trenbath, concerning the terms of various officers and members of committees, etc.

Bishop Stearly, speaking on this report, said that he felt that the Committee on Constitution and Canons had adequately covered this matter in its reports.

Rev'd Dr. Brooklyn presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That, at the Convention of 1925, the report of the Committee on the Revision of the Prayer Book shall be in order immediately after the address of the Bishop Coadjutor.

The resolution was adopted.

The Rev'd David N. Kirkby spoke about the work of the Corporation for the Relief of Widows and Orphans.

The Rev'd F. A. Coleman questioned how greater interest in the missionary activities of the Diocese might be obtained. Different members of the Convention spoke on the matter, but no resolution was adopted.

Bishop Lines moved that the Secretary of the Convention be instructed to write letters of remembrance to Rev'd Dr. Hamilton, Rev'd Luke White, Rev'd E. E. Butler and Mr. Francis Halpin, Mrs. William Read Howe and Mrs. Van Wagenen.

The motion was adopted.

Mr. F. A. Burlingame moved that a sufficient number of copies of the Bishop's addresses be printed for general distribution. The motion was carried.

Col. Wallace moved the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of the Convention be extended to the Very Rev'd Arthur Dumper, D.D., Dean, and the members of the Cathedral for their courtesy to the Convention, and that the customary honorarium be ordered paid to the Sexton of the Cathedral.

Rev'd W. O. Leslie, Jr., presented the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That all reports, usually printed in the Diocesan Journal, shall cover the calendar year and shall be sent to the Secretary of the Convention not later than February 1st.

Mr. A. E. Barlow, the President of the Diocesan Assembly of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, spoke about the boys' camp, Camp John Wood, which this year will be held at Eagle's Nest Farm, July 14th to 26th, and also about the laymen's conference, which will cover the week end from July 26th to 28th.

The report of the Archdeaconry of Newark was presented by the Ven. F. B. Carter. (*Vide*, Index.)

After closing remarks by the Bishop Coadjutor and the reading of the Minutes, a hymn was sung and the Bishop Coadjutor read the closing prayer, the blessing being given by Bishop Lines.

The Convention adjourned *Sine Die*.

The Episcopal Address

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

Following my usual custom, I recall the names of some persons who have stood in an official relation to the National Church, the Diocese or our Parishes, who have died within the year. Seven of our Bishops have died. Three of them had been long in service. Bishop Garrett of Dallas, the Presiding Bishop; Bishop Weed of Florida, and Bishop Olmstead of Central New York. The others were taken in middle life and in full strength from their work: Bishop Temple of Northern Texas, Bishop Sherwood of Springfield, Bishop Keator of Olympia and Bishop Hunting of Nevada.

Two of our own Clergy have died, Rev'd William G. Webb, for some years in charge of St. Stephen's, Coytesville; and Rev'd Dr. William R. Jenvey, for thirty-six years Rector of St. Paul's Church, Hoboken. As Archdeacon, he rendered notable service in fostering Mission Churches in the Counties of Hudson, Bergen and Passaic. He was long a member of the Standing Committee and its Secretary. He had made for himself a large place in the affection of his brethren of the Clergy and of the laity, and he will be remembered as a great servant of the Church and of the Diocese. In the last years of his life, spent in California, he was constantly in the service of the Church. Few men have given themselves to the Ministry with more zeal and devotion.

Rev'd William H. Stark, a retired Clergyman, was greatly interested in St. Agnes', East Orange, in its early years.

The list of our laymen to whom the Diocese and the Parishes owe a great debt of gratitude is a long one. Gladly, did time permit, would I speak of their services. It would be hard for anyone to find words to express the gratitude which we owe to Mr. William Read Howe, Chancellor of the Diocese, member of the Standing Committee, moving spirit in our Cathedral undertaking, in unnumbered ways helpful to the Diocese, his community and his Parish. His name will keep a high place among those who have with great devotion served the Church. Mr. John A. Gifford, dying at the age of 92 years, Chairman of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties, a very useful member of the Commission which organized our Diocesan finances, sometime member of the Standing Committee, Senior

Warden of the Mother Parish of the Diocese, held a place of peculiar regard in the Diocese and in the community. For a half century Mr. Jay C. Young was an active member of Grace Church, Orange, a long time Vestryman, Warden and Treasurer, leaving a remarkable example of devotion and generous service. Mr. Robert Y. Hebden, at his death Senior Warden of St. Andrew's Church, South Orange, had been a deeply interested and faithful officer of his Parish from its beginning, giving stability to the work, which he lived to see reach a large measure of prosperity, leaving us all with a deep sense of gratitude for his useful life. Hon. R. Wayne Parker with his long public service in the National Congress was our outstanding public man, with a life long interest and love for the Church. The names of many more whose lives were shorter than those just named, come to mind, each one in his death bringing a real sense of loss and sorrow. Mr. Clayton Platt of St. Andrew's, South Orange; Mr. George R. Pinkham, head of one of our great public schools, of Trinity, Newark; Mr. Stephen Wood McClave, Senior Warden of Trinity Church, Grantwood, whose close relation and service to his Parish makes a very remarkable record. Mr. Henry Dimse was for many years a Trustee and honored officer of St. John's, Jersey City. The name of Mr. David E. King will always be associated with the early history of St. Stephen's, Coytesville, because of his zeal for its interests; and that of Mr. Thomas C. Robert of Trinity, Hoboken, dying at the age of 82 years, for thirty-five years a member of the Church choir, with an unusual record of steadiness and generous interest in everything relating to his Church, may fitly here be named. St. John's Church, Jersey City, mourns in the death of Mrs. Harriet S. Young, a benefactress of the Parish and of many good causes; and the group of women to whom the Diocese owes great gratitude for useful service has been broken by the death of Mrs. William D. Kearfott.

With no desire to be in the number of those who bring a message of anxiety concerning the movements in our religious life, it is fitting that a Convention address should make note of them. There is so much of movement now that, from year to year, there are changes deserving consideration. No one could have anticipated the discussions which have marked the life of the Church since we were last together. A change has long been in progress in the attitude of the world towards religion, and in the attitude of Christian people towards the Holy Scriptures and the Creeds. The discussion at times has become acute and conservative. People have been disturbed or alarmed. The conflict between the old and the new has gone on from the beginning of man's life on the earth. It has been such a common experience that the world ought to have become used to it and to have welcomed it as meaning good rather than ill. Those who undertake to guide the world's thinking and action ought to have learned caution as regards the

announcement of crises in the Church's life, telling us that it is a time of transition and that the Church is at the cross-roads.

The year has been fruitful in religious discussions and the signals of alarm and danger have been so many that Church people generally have become wearied and settled down to worship and pray in the House of God, using with rather new spirit the Creeds in which they have long confessed their faith, and listening with interest, when fortunate enough to hear them, to sermons which bring out the meaning and application of Holy Scripture and are assuring as regards the great truths of the Christian religion. The reporters are showing less interest in doctrinal controversy and editors are giving less space to our discussions. Newspapers on the whole find the Church more interesting when theologians are belligerent than when the real work of the Church is going quietly forward. High value is given now in religion as in business to publicity, and I think as regards the Church and religion, it is over valued.

It is generally found when wars are over, that they are quite unnecessary and that, with patience and intelligence, their horrors and miseries might have been avoided. It is true also of religious controversies and heresy trials, that with more patience, real Christian feeling and wisdom, there might have been a peaceful solution. Conferences are more hopeful than controversies, and when Christian people get together they find that their differences are by no means as great as their agreements, and the thought comes to them that, if they are going to live together through eternity, they might as well begin now, magnifying what they have in common. While not unmindful of the serious nature of our differences of opinion and practice, and while not finding the remedy in good-natured indifference and soft words of scant meaning, we must recognize that we are not made to think and worship alike, and that we must keep a sense of proportion as regards the great things and the lesser things in religion. One of the best parts of our training in life is to try to see the other man's point of view and be just and kind in our judgment. Most of the differences in religion for those who have the Spirit of the Christ in them are unimportant. It must be a grief to our Blessed Lord to know how those who bear His name and for whom he earnestly prayed, treat one another, and think that by their unchristian zeal they honor Him.

The mediaeval Church by its loss of the spirit of religion made a movement in Europe like the Reformation necessary, if the Spirit of the Gospel and the freedom with which Christ made men free, were to be maintained. I do not see how anyone can speak with other than respect for the Reformation, while we deplore the divisions and discords born of it and feel a deep sense of responsibility for not making an end of them. Those who speak

other than with respect of Cranmer, Ridley, Latimer and their companions in martyrdom appear to me unworthy of their glorious inheritance in the mother Church of English speaking people. Some things were lost then which many of us regret and would bring back, like prayers for the dead and remembrance of the larger part of God's great family in Paradise, or again the association of joy with religious service.

It was a misfortune that refuge from a supreme ecclesiastical authority in the Church was sought in giving an unnatural place to the Holy Scriptures and interpreting them in a rigid and unwarranted way. That meant an endless struggle for authority between different interpretations of and different attitudes towards the Sacred Writings, out of which came many of the grievous divisions in modern Christianity. The time was sure to come when the literal, verbal theory of inspiration would be questioned, the manner in which the Sacred Books were written and their purposes better understood. The movement of the Christian world toward a more reasonable understanding and use of the Sacred Writings would be beset with controversy. Within the lifetime of some of us that process has gone on and commonly received views concerning the Scriptures today, would, two or three generations ago, have caused the exclusion of Ministers from the Churches. The change has been so slow and gradual that thoughtful Christian people generally are no longer disturbed. We can interpret the earlier books of the Bible, discuss their authorship, make their application to our own times with reverence and helpfulness. We can say that St. Paul's position as regards women, while warranted for his own time, was not the final word and is not binding upon Christian people today. We can find in the books of Jonah and Job wonderful meaning, without interpreting them literally. Our fathers and mothers thought that all within the covers of the Bible was of equal authority and application. John Wesley said, "the giving up of witchcraft is in effect giving up the Bible." The changed attitude towards the Bible, while regretted still by some, has given the Sacred Books new meaning. They are a richer storehouse since the war than ever before, while the change has made the use of proof texts often questionable and has destroyed the value of old sermons.

In doctrinal questions and standards we are passing through an experience like that which has been referred to in connection with the Holy Scriptures. There is naturally much anxiety concerning the outcome of the movement, for the confession of our Christian faith in the words of the ancient Creeds has been regarded by us as of the highest value in making steadiness and continuity in the life of the Church. There has been among us no appreciable disposition to deny the articles of the Christian religion, while some have questioned whether they were all of equal importance and there have been differences of interpretation. The Church declined to accept the declara-

tion of a committee of the House of Bishops that fixity of interpretation is of the essence of the Creeds. Our people are sensitive, and rightly, concerning references to the Creeds which indicate departure from old and generally accepted views. We have all counted it one of the glories of this Church that it has a definite Creed constantly used. There is no reason why we should not among ourselves discuss the subjects which have been raised without questioning the loyalty of our brethren.

My ideal is the preservation of definite Christian faith and teaching, with a generous attitude and the endeavor in all utterances to have regard for the Spirit of Christ, as plainly revealed in the Gospel. The common mistake of regarding Christian faith and the expression of it in the Creeds as identical, is to be avoided. Uniformity in intellectual agreement as regards interpretations is not to be expected. The great central truth of our religion, concerning which there cannot be question, is faith in our Lord Jesus Christ as the Incarnate Son of God and our Divine Lord and Master. Personal relation to and fellowship with Him is the heart of our religion, and the greater simplicity and directness with which that thought is maintained and expressed, the better. Life will not be long enough for us, whether as teachers or learners, to bring out the full meaning of that declaration. It is to be remembered, however, that this great truth does not come to all of us for application and expression in exactly the same way. I have no right to insist that the truth concerning our Blessed Lord's nature and authority shall come to you exactly as it comes to me. Neither are you warranted in holding me exactly to your own thought and feeling. Assuming that we are both honest in the confession of such faith in Christ, no man is to be our judge.

Much that has been said in the course of the discussions, to which some of our Clergy and people have given themselves, is unwise, and on the whole has been more for unsettlement than for stability. People become rather suspicious of the champion of the Christian religion, who is keen and constant in argument in defense of his cause. It is felt that the cause which needs much in the way of defense has some weakness in it, and gentle words indicating conscious strength of position are more effective. Disputants with a temperature are never convincing. It is late in the world's history for the Church to be in an apologetic attitude and on the defensive. The formation of organizations and appeals for funds for the defense of the Church and the Christian religion have a wrong note in them. The Church, filling out its Master's commission concerning winning the world to His obedience, needs no defense. Its own life and consecration make the only argument required.

Our Lord rebuked unwarranted zeal for His honor, when two of His Dis-

ciples proposed that fire should be called down from heaven to destroy the inhospitable Samaritan village. The Guild or Order of the Sons of Thunder was not perpetuated in the Church beyond its first two members, although when controversies are on, I think that there are those who might seek admission thereto. It ought to moderate our zeal in so great a cause as that of the Christian faith, to call to mind that articles in the Creeds which we constantly use do not have exactly the meaning for us which they had for those who formulated the Creeds, although with new meaning they may have reality for us and may be honestly used. A thoughtful study of the way the Creeds came into existence and their purpose would make us all much more reasonable and calm as the discussions go on about us. It was natural and necessary that there should have been in the beginning brief statements of Christian truth for use in admission to Baptism and to bind together Christian people. Their brevity and simplicity as you find them in the early history of the Church are to be remembered. It may be added that the door of entrance into the Church, associated with Baptism, should not be narrowed beyond the teaching of Christ and His apostles. You will find it difficult to make a case against those who stand for the first terms of admission into the family of Christ and the hope of salvation in Him.

You will say that the Church had a right to formulate its Creeds and make its terms of admission at a later time, having consideration for the questions which arose as the years went by, but you will find it difficult to answer the appeal to the simplicity of the beginning as recorded in the New Testament. You will find also that while the Creeds were the enlargement of the requirement for Baptism in the beginning, that they were formulated as statements and standards of what had been confessed by Christian disciples and was commonly held in the Church, rather than for use in public worship as we are accustomed to use them now. They are great doctrinal statements of profound meaning and value. They bind us to the Christian generations gone and their preservation bears upon the vital subject of Church Unity. The failure so to regard them shows thoughtlessness or ignorance. I think we might all wish that the first word of the Nicene Creed had remained "We," associating it with the first word of the Lord's Prayer, and making its confession a corporate act. The failure on the part of many champions of the ancient Creeds to have in mind the way in which they were formulated and accepted, the changes in form and in meaning, weakens the cause of the preservation of standards of definite Christian teaching which I am sure we all have much at heart.

I am speaking to you as one who has through a long life constantly used the Creeds, accepting their statements, believing that they may be interpreted reasonably, having no desire to displace them, and I am sure that this is the attitude of our Church people generally. I recognize and I commend to

you consideration for the facts concerning the Creeds to which I have referred. Let not the presentation of the religion of the Christ be hard, rigid or unchristian.

The interest of the Christian world has moved from regard for doctrine and dogma to interest in life and conduct. Those of us who remember the way Christian doctrine was presented in large portions of the Church, in the last century, must rejoice in the changing attitude, while regretting laxity in good doctrinal teaching. You do not need to be told that our Lord Himself put the emphasis upon conduct and character rather than upon dogmatic teaching, upon the revelation which had come through Him, of our Heavenly Father and of our duty towards our fellow men. There is a Christian conscience which rejects the hard and narrow presentation of the Christian religion and it must be respected. That conscience appeals to men whose relation to the Church is not close while reverent towards Christ Jesus. If we would enthrone the Christ in human hearts and in the world, we must have deference for that conscience and witness to the largeness and gentleness of the Christ and His religion. "The Church exists to promote brotherhood and discipleship." There are hard and severe presentations of the Creeds and the Christian teaching, which only do harm. The indifference of many to religion is due to the hard way in which it has been presented. There are honest questionings which must be respected. There are men and women holding suspended judgments on some articles of the Creed, and they are persons not far from the Kingdom of God, if not already within it in the Master's gentle judgment.

I would say to some whom I know, to many more whom I do not know, rather than cease using the Creed in the congregation, use all that you can with complete honesty and pray to be guided into the truth. We have all been long accustomed to say to persons who told us that they could not accept all that was required by the Christian Church, to accept all they can, and live up to their light. It would be fair to say something of the kind to those who are holding a suspended judgment as regards any articles of the Creed. Let them go as far as they can honestly and reverently with the rest of God's people and pray for further guidance. Let them recognize the force of the testimony of the Church from the beginning to truths declared in the Creeds.

Those who in the Church Councils in the old time formulated the Creeds as bearing witness to what was commonly held and believed from the beginning might be thought of as modernists today. Their desire was to exclude from the confession of faith unwarranted doctrines and opinions, keeping that which was accepted in the Church. The Creeds did not represent speculation, but historical testimony in the interest of simplicity. Let it never be forgotten that the real authority of the Creeds comes not from the

action of Councils, but from general acceptance in the whole Church. "It is recognized by all theologians that the decisions of a General Council can not obtain full authority by the action of the Council alone. They must be accepted by the Church. In fact, it is only acceptance by the Church which makes a Council general." Without disturbing the ancient Creeds, recognizing their great place in the history of the Church, their testimony to what has been the profession of the Christian faith by many generations of Christian people, it is a very reasonable desire that the requirement in Baptism, and so for membership of the Church, should have the character of the early professions of faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, as recorded in Holy Scripture. The simple terms of admission by our Blessed Lord and His apostles into the Church and fellowship of Christ should be retained.

Let a serious plea be made for the exclusion of partisanship from our Church life. Differences of opinion there must be, but suppression and enforced uniformity of belief and practice have brought unmeasured ill. The restoration of discipline through the exercise of external authority is hopeless. The discipline which gives hope is that which comes from within through the conscientious recognition of what is right and fitting by right-minded men and women, moved by charity and brotherly love. The Church must be comprehensive and we must all recognize the place of teachings and practices which we do not approve, and live in peace and good will with those whose attitude in religion is unlike our own. Many disrespectful words concerning those whose opinions and practices are unlike our own have no place in a Christian man's vocabulary. The Church is weakened by exploitation of these differences of opinion in our periodicals and publications. Partisanship is inconsistent with Christian fellowship and we have far too much of it. Societies within the Church for the propagation of opinions which are not vital for the Church and religion are mischievous. They weaken our forces and divide Christians who ought to be concentrating their attention altogether upon winning the world for Christ. We greatly need to learn how we can keep closer together in work and witness for Christ, rather than how far we can stand apart and stay in. We must put the emphasis upon the main things and not make doctrines of authority out of opinions. When the authority of the Church is claimed for unusual teaching and practices, references are to be asked. Until we can teach and act more closely together, our ability to give this Church a larger place of influence in the world is restricted. The labor spent upon building up a party within the Church and expecting to win control of it is vain, for partisanship has always provoked a reaction and a lifetime is quite long enough to learn that. It would do all of us good to cultivate friendship and interchange of opinions with those with whom we do not agree. Breeding in is productive of ill in every department of life, including religious opinions.

Religion is a much larger word than it ever was before, and the service of it is a much larger undertaking than most of us appreciate. It is bringing every department of life within its domain and it is calling to its service all human activities and discoveries. The Church as organized religion is in the world to give spiritual and moral leadership and to bring into the service of religion all the agencies and powers of men. It is a task and privilege so great that the Church is bewildered and alarmed. A good many are disposed timidly to accept for the Church and religion a subordinate place and avoid responsibility. Timidity leads many to suspect those who have the larger vision and who are accepting the Lord's declaration: "Ye shall see larger things than these." To change the figure, when the storm comes the master of the ship may like to keep near land or find a port of safety, when what he needs is seamanship and the open sea.

The position of the Christian world in our generation may be likened to that of the world when the largeness of the universe was recognized and the truth that the earth is not stationary and not the center of the universe was made known. Church authorities denounced the new teaching as contrary to Holy Scripture, which surely spoke of the rising of the sun and the stability of the earth. The great man of science to perceive and make known the new view of the universe was Galileo, and the authorities of the Church not only silenced him, but compelled him with great cruelty to retract or be thrown into prison miserably to die, like other witnesses for the new truth in God's world. In our own generation the Church has been alarmed by the new learning and by what science has revealed concerning the universe, the world, and human life, and we seem to have done little better than those who stood for a literal interpretation of Holy Scripture and inherited beliefs three hundred years ago. We are ashamed of many of the books which were written by our theologians against the teaching of scientific men a generation or two ago. Now the thought of the greatness of religion, of its reign in every department of life comes to us, and the question is whether the Church holding fast to the revelation given in Jesus Christ and to the spiritual truths of eternal significance can give the world and the communities the leadership which is needed and avoid old mistakes. That question must be answered in every place where we put down a Church and set a man to teach religion. It needs larger vision, larger conception of religion and the dealings of God with men, and the mission of His Blessed Son, than have come to most of us. We must confess that it is a timid inadequate message lacking appreciation of the world's need and our opportunity which we are delivering. Dean Inge is right in saying that "the Christian Creed is for heroes and we are little men who want everybody to have a good time." We are thinking more of making ourselves comfort-

able and bringing conveniences into life, as meaning the progress of civilization, than of bringing in the Kingdom of God.

If clergy and laity could have the larger thought about religion and its outstanding place, its power to make over this world, there would be more young men to give gladly their lives to its service in the Ministry. We need to have a larger thought about religion and about the Church of God and their true place in the world, and the years are getting away and we are not making that great contribution to the world's life of which we are capable, because we lack vision and adequate conception of the greatness of the cause of Christ and a sense of consecration. We are spending time in putting labels upon one another and accepting them for ourselves and talking about different kinds of Churchmanship and what kind of services we like and it is all unworthy of us. Dean Inge well says: "In our dealings with others we cannot be too careful in resisting the tendency to label people as if they were the concrete embodiments of some quality or opinion which we dislike. * * * There is no greater injustice than to label a man and classify him—labels are libels." Many are giving themselves to controversies about definitions in religion upon subjects which nobody ever understood nor shall understand. Whenever the Church gives itself up to definitions, it is a time of spiritual deadness. The result is dust and chaff, not flour and bread. As I have said to you many times, the heart of religion is a personal relation to Jesus Christ and it defies definition. You do not try to define the love of your mother or your friend, or the gratitude due to some one who has been a blessing to you. You do not argue about these supreme things in life, but in them rest and thank God.

One weakness of the Church and of those of us who speak for it, is that religion is so much larger than our presentation of it. The world is intensely interested in religion, but our message concerning it is not adequate and satisfying. We present the religion of the Christ oftentimes as if its inheritance was limited to the old dispensation and the Jewish tradition, whereas all the revelations and civilizations of the past make its background. The culmination of revelation was in Him Who came in the fullness of time for the salvation of the world and that revelation of the Divine Will and purpose in Christ has been going on through all the Christian centuries, with the richest but not its final manifestation in our own generation. We deliver our message too often with thought for the dead Christ rather than the living Christ, forgetting that the day of Pentecost marked a new and continuing manifestation of the Spirit of God, in the power of which we must live. We are in a much better position for the knowledge of the religion of the Christ and for its proclamation than were the first Disciples. That new knowledge of God's universe which men of science gave to us four hundred years ago, and which the Church reluctantly received, should have

its counterpart today in our larger conception of the religion of the Christ, with the end of prejudices, narrowness and limitations, which bind many of us even unto this day. The background of the religion of the Christ is larger even than the Old Testament, larger even than the Christian theologians ever understood, and this is what our Blessed Lord Himself led us to expect. It will never do for the Church or for those who speak for it to remain in ignorance of what science is telling us concerning the history and progress of the human race, and the Church can only keep its place by welcoming all learning and discovery and recognizing truth as the gift of the Spirit of God. Let the Clergy be encouraged to think and to bring to their people knowledge concerning God's dealings with the world, and let the world know that the Church welcomes all good learning. The laity are not to think they have made a bargain with the Clergy to preach exactly as their predecessors did, but to welcome the fresh, reverent presentation of Christian truth in terms of modern life, not alarmed by an occasional, unusual utterance. The voice of the Church is always heard in our worship, making for steadiness and continuity. The Clergy speaking for Him Who is making all things new, are to be considerate of the feelings of those who find a change in attitude difficult.

We are keeping in the Diocese our Jubilee Year, with the half century of its work coming to an end. A great anniversary is at hand, in which every man, woman or child in the Diocese ought to have a lively interest. While the best part of the life of a Diocese or of a Parish in its service of our Lord and His brethren cannot be told, we make a great mistake if we do not now gather up the lessons of the years which measure our corporate life. It is a great and noble procession of servants of Christ in the Diocese which passes before us and none of us is so poor as not to count among them friends whose lives and examples have been a great blessing to the Church and have made our own lives richer. I make a most earnest plea with you, for a memorable year in every Parish and Mission Church, doing something large and fine in its commemoration. Why should we not have enthusiasm in keeping this notable anniversary, with worthy remembrance of those who have gone before us, with the determination to give the Diocese a place of new power and influence in the service of our Lord? We have much to be thankful for, a great opportunity to use, and it is the year to call to mind these things. Spiritual undertakings should have the first place in an effort to stir up our people to increased devotion, to recall our Communicants who have become careless to regard the Master's command to remember Him in His appointed way at the Lord's Table, to build up our congregations to new regard for the Lord's Day, the Lord's House, to arouse the indifferent, to extend the Ministry of the Church, to bring all our people to definite service of some kind. Those appointed to suggest

Diocesan and Parochial action greatly desire that every Parish or Mission Church in debt should mark the year by cutting down or removing such debt, so setting itself free for the better support and prosecution of its own work. Parishes not so encumbered may well give a helping hand to some of the Mission Churches which are burdened with debt, on condition that they should help themselves. Several Diocesan institutions need increased means to do their work. The fact that we are not meeting our obligations to the General Church for its mission work, and the great appeal for reconstruction in Japan, and to give the Japanese Church freedom to go on to independent development, should be remembered. In this way we can make some reparation to Japan for its unworthy treatment by our Government. There is a fair appeal to every Church in the Diocese to mark this year of jubilee in some definite way and it can be done so as to bring a notable and fine result if only the Clergy and right-minded men and women in the Parish will act. Why should not all in this Diocesan Convention go home and preach the observance of the Jubilee Year to the officers of their Churches and to all the men and women? Why not observe a memorable year in a remarkable way and do something in which we can all have honest pride?

There are other subjects to which I have asked your attention in other years of great importance, and I must not quite pass them by. I implore you to use all the influence you have on the side of peace as against war or the preparation for war, and in favor of Christian relations with all the nations of the world. Let prejudice and selfishness pass and let the call of humanity and of a stricken world rise above nationalism. Few of our public men have the larger vision concerning the duty and privilege of our country. The revelations which have been made fill right-minded men and women with shame. We were told that idealism in the direction of our affairs must give place to practical business management and we appear to have done so. Rarely has the country been so poverty-stricken as regards worthy leadership. The old cry which wrecked the world, that preparedness for war is a security against war, is heard again, as if we had not learned what it meant. War is unchristian, an anachronism, inexcusable except in self-defense. Every Christian ought to stand for a policy of peace, to be attained through friendly relations between the nations.

I exhort you to stand for the application of Christian principles to industrial relations, welcoming every approach to a better understanding, more of justice and good will in the treatment by employers of those who work for them, and by workmen of those for whom they have agreed to work. Fairness, honesty, straight dealing should be required on both sides.

I bid you to work for the execution of the laws to make an end of the

abuse of strong drink. When the national, state, and city authorities set about seriously the execution of existing laws, they will be obeyed. Public men and officials who do not try to execute the laws tell us that they cannot be executed. The unwisdom and worse of many officials and others who have been set or who have undertaken to execute the laws must be recognized. No self-respecting nation will indefinitely allow ships loaded with strong drink, much of which is poisonous, to lie off our coast, using every opportunity to break our laws, nor allow great fortunes to be built up by flagrant and open violation of the law. Greed rather than regard for personal liberty tries to break down prohibition. It is beyond belief that the country should be moved back to the time of degradation when saloons filled our towns and cities, and tempted men on their way home from work to spend their wages, taking bread, clothes and respect out of their homes. A multitude of people have been blessed by prohibition. Millions of men for their own good and for the good of a new generation in the land are learning that they can get on without the use of strong drink. The amendment to the Constitution was passed in a legal way, expressing the will of the country. In the same way, not by lawlessness, a repeal must be sought and our men and women determine whether the country shall go forward and fight out this hard battle for sobriety and decency to the end, or turn its face backward.

Most gladly would I have all our people interested in the endeavor to save through Child Labor Legislation millions of our boys and girls from being robbed of their childhood. It was pitiful that the great cause of childhood should be set back by one vote in a decision of the Supreme Court, but we must fight on until the legislation is obtained which will be regarded as legal and which will withstand the exploitation by greed of helpless children and give them a chance in life. Forget not the cause of prison reform, which has been held back because positions in our prisons have been given as political rewards, rather than to intelligent and right-minded men, who would make an end of disgraceful conditions. Remember that most of the so-called criminals are young and in prison largely because of the fault and neglect of the generation before them, and that society has largely bred its own enemies through lack of intelligent care and treatment of those in danger of becoming criminals. Be thankful that in our Diocese the homeless boy and the unprotected girl are finding friends.

The cause of unity among Christian people suffers because of our miserable internal controversies. But prepare the way by emphasizing the truths of religion which we hold in common, and by making subordinate denominational opinions and practices. Begin by an appreciation of the goodness of Christian people of every name and by avoiding all words concerning those who differ from you which are ungracious and uncharitable.

For such good causes of the Lord Jesus Christ as I have named, for the unprivileged and "him that hath no helper"; against discord and prejudice, selfish nationalism and pride in prosperity, I bid you stand without wavering. Remember that those who have stood for what is large and generous in the world's life, for liberty and the cause of humanity, with large outlook and vision, forgetful of their own comfort and advantage, are those whose names live in honor and will so live; not those who are timid, endeavoring to keep things as they are, reactionary, trying to bring back and keep the old order, as if anything living could be stationary and unchanging. The Church that is not aggressive, the Church given to self-introspection, to meticulous definitions of orthodoxy, seeking to live on the past, is dying and you must in your Diocese and communities save it from that fate, while you let your thoughts and service, like those of the Master, reach out to the ends of the earth and all humanity.

The Bishop Coadjutor's Address

My Dear Brothers in Christ:

It is a pleasure to say a word of welcome and greeting concerning the two parishes which will ask this year to be admitted into union with the Convention. The Church of the Incarnation, East Orange, was organized as a Mission in the year 1911. During most of its short history it has been under the leadership of the Rev'd Carolus R. Webb, and it has made steady and rapid progress. It has grown in numbers, in missionary gifts, and in parish activity and devotion, and is now capable of entire self support, and it is engaged this summer in erecting the first part of a fine Church building. Those who follow the missionary work of the Church in the Diocese will take much satisfaction in the numbering of this thriving work among the parishes. Not less remarkable is the case of St. Peter's, Mountain Lakes. The growth of this attractive suburban community has been very rapid; but until the lamented death of the Rev'd Henry B. Wilson, rector at Boonton, the Church people moving into Mountain Lakes cast in their lot with that parish. It was realized however that the time had come for the establishing of our Church in Mountain Lakes itself, and after full and free discussion it was agreed by a largely attended parish gathering that the Mountain Lakes people should withdraw from St. John's, Boonton, and organize their own parish. This they have done, and they have called the Rev'd Guy H. Madara as rector. The services so far have been held in the assembly room of St. John's School, but plans are already under way for the erection of suitable permanent buildings for what will in a few years, it is confidently expected, be one of our strongest parishes.

One new organized Mission has been added during the past year. The Rev'd William J. White of Bergenfield with characteristic missionary zeal gathered together the members of our Church living in the town of Haworth, and with the approval of the Bishops organized them as a Diocesan Mission. A portable chapel was purchased by the Board of Missions, and the first services were held on Easter Day when more than forty people received the Holy Communion and offerings for the work of the Church were given amounting to more than a hundred dollars.

It is right that mention should be made of special gifts made during the year to parishes and institutions in the Diocese. Under the will of Miss

Selina Williams of St. Mark's Church, West Orange, \$950 was added to the Fund for the Relief of Aged and Infirm Clergy and the Widows and Orphans of Clergy. Mr. Hugh Hartshorne of St. John's, Jersey City, included in his will a legacy of \$1,000 for the missionary work of the Diocese. \$50,000 was received from the estate of Mr. A. Livingston Kean for the support of St. Peter's Mission, Livingston. Miss Elizabeth L. Howell in her will left \$5,000 for Zion Church, Belvidere. Mr. Frederick W. Winterburne of New York gave \$500 for St. Stephen's Church, Coytesville, in memory of his mother who was the first Public School teacher in that village. Grace Church, Van Vorst, and Christ Hospital, Jersey City, each received \$16,000 under the will of Mr. T. King. St. Barnabas' Hospital received \$15,000 from Mrs. Charlotte R. Butterworth in memory of her husband the Rev'd John F. Butterworth, affectionately remembered by many of the older members of the Diocese. St. Thomas' Church, Newark, came into \$20,000 from the estate of Mr. William S. Dilworth, a former member of that parish.

In the Office for the Visitation of the Sick (at page 285 in the Prayer Book) the rubric directs that the minister "shall not omit earnestly to move such sick persons as are of the ability to be liberal to the poor." In the same service as revised by the last General Convention the phraseology is modernized and made perhaps more practical. The words run, "The minister is ordered from time to time to advise the people whilst they are in health to make wills arranging for the disposal of their temporal goods, and when of ability to leave bequests for religious and charitable uses."

We have in recent years begun the custom of calling to remembrance in the opening service of the Convention all those who in former times have been great servants of the Church and helpers in this Diocese in establishing the Kingdom of God. It is right that we should commemorate both gifts of outstanding personal devotion and gifts of money for the support and furthering of good causes. It is to be hoped that in both respects the coming years will mark faithful and generous giving on the part of the people of the Diocese.

In connection with gifts of money, and funds left either for endowment or for specific purposes, it is incumbent upon Vestries of parishes and other responsible workers of the Church to have in mind their obligation to see that all such funds are rightly administered and carefully safeguarded. The Finance and Advisory Board has devoted considerable attention in recent months to this subject. The law of the State gives the Convention, through the Bishop and Standing Committee, control over the disposition of the real property of the parishes and missions. No real estate of the Church in the Diocese can be alienated or encumbered without the written formal

consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee. It would seem to be desirable that some similar oversight or control should be in effect in regard to endowments and trust funds. The Canon law of the Diocese does prescribe that all trust and permanent funds shall be placed for safe keeping in the care of Trust Companies or banks, or with the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Other Diocesan Properties, and directs that a full and detailed statement of all such trusts or permanent funds shall be presented annually to the Convention. It is the intention of the Finance and Advisory Board to place in the hands of the Vestries having such funds a proper form for the making of such reports. It is desired that the condition of such funds should be made known from year to year both as to their amounts and the method of their keeping. It cannot be doubted that the making of such reports will be of use in safeguarding funds which have been given in trust and for the right using of which the Church has a solemn obligation.

I wish especially today to ask your careful and earnest consideration of the situation we are in as a Diocese as regards our support of the Church's Missionary and Benevolent Work. It is now almost five years since the Church inaugurated the Nation Wide Campaign, which brought with it a fresh conception of the task of the Church and a new organization of the Church's forces. In the year 1919, under very skillful and devoted leadership, the new plan for supporting the Missionary and Benevolent Work of the Church was presented in all our parishes and mission in so fine a way that in many places was registered a wider vision of and a deeper sense of responsibility toward the great mission of the Church. As a result of the Every Member Canvass inaugurated in that year the offerings both of service and of money were largely increased in many parishes. The total amounts pledged in the Diocese both for Parish Support and Missionary Undertaking marked a very great advance over previous years.

We have just completed the fourth year under this new system, and although we ought to be grateful for the progress which has been made, it is only just to recognize that our record is not as good as it should be.

Let me put before you the amounts given in the Diocese in the last four years. In 1920 for Missionary and Benevolent Work within the Diocese and in all the world beyond we gave \$247,867.99, in 1921 \$242,796.15, in 1922 \$218,141.56, and in 1923 \$231,888.99. Why is it, we ought to ask ourselves, that our giving has remained practically stationary for these four years? During all this time there has been patient and devoted work both on the part of the members of the Department of Development and Revenue in endeavor to promote missionary education, and sound financial methods; and in many of the parishes the lay people have cooperated faithfully with the clergy in the endeavor to bring the parish gifts for Missions and Benevo-

lence up to the amount expected of it. But at the end of four years of such endeavor we find ourselves as a Diocese in the debtor class. In the list of 91 Dioceses and Missionary Districts we stand number seventy in proportionate giving to the support of the General Missionary Work of the Church; and we are credited with giving but fifty-nine percent of the amount asked of us by the National Council. In 1923 our share of the Budget for Missionary Work was \$171,191, but all we gave was \$101,113. In a recent interesting table showing the per capita gifts for Missions and Benevolences of the people of the various non Roman Churches in this country the Protestant Episcopal Church stands seventh, with an average gift per communicant of \$5.19 per year. But the giving of the people of the Diocese of Newark is less than this, for when figured out it amounts to but \$4.95. We have to admit therefore with some chagrin that apparently as a Diocese we are lagging behind many of the other Dioceses of our Church. It is fair to remember the amounts which are given by the people for the support of their Parish Work. In 1923 for instance the amount given for Current Expenses was \$720,747.56 and for other Parish Purposes \$170,454.69. If these two items were put together the amount would be \$891,202.25 and the average per capita given for the support of the parishes in our Diocese would be \$19.00.

It is to be remembered that the Diocese of Newark has still a large missionary work to do. The population is shifting and changing, and there is constant need not only for the establishing of new congregations, but also on the part of those which have been established, for paying off debts and making additions or improvements to their buildings. During the past year, for instance, debt paying campaigns have been on in Christ Church, Belleville; St. Philip's and St. James' Church in Newark; the Ascension, Jersey City; Christ Church, Bloomfield and Glen Ridge, and St. Clement's, Hawthorne. St. Barnabas' Church, Newark, has put up a new parish house; Grace Church, Nutley, has added a massive and capacious tower for parish uses, and Christ Church, Ridgewood, is now in the midst of erecting a beautiful and capacious parish house. St. John's, Jersey City, has increased its permanent endowment fund by about \$20,000, St. Peter's, Morristown, has installed a beautiful and costly carillon of bells in its fine tower, and many other Churches have been or are engaged in building operations. Let me name St. Elizabeth's, Upper Ridgewood; St. John's, West Hoboken; Grace Church, Van Vorst, Jersey City; Holy Trinity, West Orange; St. Mary the Virgin, Ridgefield Park; Holy Trinity, Hillsdale; Grace Church, Westwood, and St. Mark's, Newark. All these undertakings, and they are constantly going forward year by year, cost money, which is given by the people of the Church generously and joyfully. But living as we do in a Christian land we can by no means on the ground of need at home excuse

ourselves from doing our full share toward making the Gospel of Redemption known in all parts of the world. What it comes to expressed in figures is this, that taking the contributions of last year as a basis, as a Diocese we gave \$891,202.25 for our work at home, and \$231,888.99 for others; on a per capita basis, \$19 per person for ourselves, \$4.95 for others.

When one thinks of the parishes separately and considers their record of giving in these last four years he is filled with a sense of glad thanksgiving for the fine accomplishments of a certain number. It would hardly be fair to give names, but it is right to draw attention to the fact that in some of our parishes there has been from the beginning a sense of responsibility, and a glad bringing into the missionary endeavor of the best wisdom and the finest devotion of faithful people in the parish in so placing the whole matter of missionary support before the congregation that the result has been one to rejoice in. There are a few of our parishes which have consistently met their full quotas in these four years. There are others which have not been able to meet the quotas assigned them, but of whom it is known that with outstanding fidelity and earnest zeal the people have given up to the full measure of their ability. Let words of praise and gratitude be expressed for all of these.

On the other hand, when one considers the records of some parishes and notes the great disproportion between the apparent financial ability of the people in them, and the small sums which they are credited with giving, one cannot help asking the question as to whether those responsible for leadership in such parishes have not in some way failed either in seeing the great vision or in working toward its realization in wise and zealous fashion. It is perhaps true that there are in a number of parishes special circumstances which make missionary education and giving more difficult, but it is not to be credited that these conditions are so overwhelming and permanent as to explain or excuse the meagre accomplishment in missionary giving year by year which characterizes them.

The sources of our failure are apparently in two directions. First in the teaching of the Church. Some of the clergy it would seem have been recreant in inculcating in the minds of the people the consciousness of their relationship to the corporate life of the Church as a whole. There are parishes where for weeks at a time no mention is made of the interests of the Kingdom of Heaven beyond the parish boundaries. There are people who do not know the meaning of the term Diocese, who never heard of the National Council of the Church, and who are unaware of the institutions and agencies for unselfish ministry, which are being carried on for their fellow Christians in other places in the name of the Church. You can hardly expect people to give for what they do not know about, nor to

sympathetically share in the fortunes of enterprises with which in their minds they have no real connection.

Along with this goes also the failure to teach simply but insistently the responsibility of people for their possessions. It is to be feared that in many parishes little is heard of the doctrine of trusteeship. The recognition of the fact that all that we have comes from God, and that He will require at our hands a just account of our use of what we have received, makes for strength of character and for faithfulness in giving to the support of good works. Too often the people of the congregations are asked to give liberally to a collection for this or that good purpose, and not sufficiently perhaps do the clergy press home upon the minds and hearts of their people the meaning of stewardship and its outcome in systematic and proportionate giving.

I do not believe that the blame for the failure of our Diocese in Missionary giving is to be laid entirely upon the clergy, but I think we of the clergy should not seek to excuse ourselves from our responsibility, nor be blind to our failure. It would probably be fair to say that if the clergy in charge of the parishes and missions of this Diocese should each resolve that his parish should this year and next year give the full amount asked of them toward the Budget of the Church, it could and would be done. In many respects it is true that the clergy are the key to the solution of this problem. As things are practically, people will not do more than they are asked to do, nor express themselves beyond the measure of knowledge and conviction, of ideal and aspiration, within them. Here is the task of the pastor and teacher. He has got to make it clear to people that they are members not of a parish only, but of the whole Catholic Church, and that their responsibility to give is one that they must reckon with seriously in the sight of God.

The other source of our failure is the carelessness and indifference and looseness of much of our parish organization and administration; and in this respect the laity are the great sinners. I do not suppose that there are many laymen in the Church who definitely set themselves to oppose the rector's missionary ideals and ambitions. There are those who would not deny all that can be said theoretically about the Church's call and mission to the world, but who practically, by narrow minded parochialism, by conservatism, or by shiftlessness and carelessness in duty, do hold back the parish in its good accomplishment for the whole work of Christ and the Church. It is with amazement that every now and then one comes upon instances of men who in their business are exact, energetic and progressive, and who exhibit just the opposite qualities to these in their relationship to the Church. It ought to be possible in every parish to have able men take charge of and engineer the annual Every Member Canvass, and to do it so

efficiently and thoroughly and beautifully that it would be a blessing to the parish. But how hard many of the clergy find it to get the men who will give of their talents in this way, and give them in full and unstinted measure. It should not be impossible for Vestries to have right systems of accounting for, and of gathering in and disbursing of monies; but there are some of our parishes in which it is to be feared these things are done in a very slipshod manner. Think of borrowing the Missionary and Benevolent contributions to pay bills for Current Expenses. Think of receiving pledges from people at the beginning of the year and never sending them a statement about their payments during the whole twelve months. Think of taking people's offerings Sunday by Sunday for Missions and Benevolences and holding them up instead of forwarding them promptly month by month. Some one has suggested that the Diocese should have a travelling auditor who would go about from parish to parish making periodical inspections and examinations of the account books of the Parish Treasurers. The reports of such an officer, if it was thought good to have him doing such work, would reveal it is to be feared some strange and astonishing things. I heard recently of the Treasurer of one parish who had no account book at all, only a bank book and a check book, and this in a community of intelligent and self-respecting people.

Think of the way in which laymen could help in the whole matter of publicity, seeing that information was disseminated in the right ways, and that the parish was so organized that it could feel in all its parts the impact of such knowledge, informing and inspiring, as helps to kindle and to keep alive the spirit of devotion to a great cause.

I do not mean to enter at this time into any general discussion of the Vestry conditions in parishes, but I think it may be said without contradiction that there is a great need for the development of a better and finer spirit of intelligent and wise and devoted leadership in the whole work of the Church on the part of the official lay representatives of the parishes and congregations.

The Department of Development and Revenue has well considered plans calculated to deal with both of the difficulties which I have been referring to. They hope to stimulate in the clergy the spirit of ambition and of strong purpose, and to create among the Vestrymen of the Diocese a finer conception of the Church's task and a better spirit of efficiency and thoroughness in the organization of the parishes. If we can work along these two lines in the coming year we may be able to make progress toward doing more nearly what we ought to do in the great Missionary and Benevolent work of the Church.

In connection with what has been said regarding the keeping of the

Fiftieth Anniversary of the organization of the Diocese let me draw your attention to one aspect of our growth and progress. In the first Convention there were 64 parishes entitled to representation. We now have on our list the names of 147 places where the services of the Church are regularly held. Of this number forty-three have been added in the last twenty years; of which eight have come to full self-dependence and have acquired the status of parishes. It might be said that our normal rate of progress is the adding of two new missions a year. It is likely that this will continue to be so. There seems no sign of a slackening in the growth of population in the great centres of industry and commerce, and as part of the great metropolitan district of New York we shall probably witness in the next twenty years a growth in our Diocese equal to or exceeding that of the last score of years.

This means that we must be prepared to go on with the policy of sending the services of the Church into every community where our people are found in numbers sufficient to warrant and require a beginning. We must keep up with the inflowing tides of population both of the old stock and of the new Americans whose roots have in the nearer past been in foreign lands. We have this year organized our work among the foreign born as a special department of Diocesan activity, and under the able leadership of Canon Leslie we shall probably see it expand and enlarge in its ministry in the next few years.

There is but one limitation to the increase of our missionary work in the Diocese, and that is financial. In 1874 the amount spent for missionary work in the Diocese was as far as records show \$4,868.38, and last year we gave for the same purpose \$43,095.57. But this sum is not enough; it does not permit us to launch out into the new undertakings which beckon to us; and one of the most pressing reasons for a better meeting of the Missionary Budget by the parishes is that we may thus be enabled to steadily press forward as we should our ministry in our own Diocese.

It has been, or will be suggested, that as part of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Diocese every parish and mission should do something in a tangible and material way to mark the year, and the Committee has ventured to indicate certain good objects which might be adopted here and there according to circumstances. We must all have sympathy with all these objects. It is cheering to hear that some debt raising campaigns will be inaugurated or are already under way; and doubtless the other objectives will find favor in one and another parish. I would like to put in a special plea for one of them. It seems to me that this year the Girls' Friendly Society has a special claim upon our interest and help. No fellowship for service in the Church is doing a more beautiful and useful work than this Society. It is

said to be the largest women's organization in the world. In our own Diocese there are 37 Branches with 1950 members. And these Branches are centres of interest and enthusiasm whence flows a most beneficent stream of influence for good into the lives of girls and young women. They will this year to build at our Eagle's Nest Farm a Holiday House in which to carry forward their summer work, one of their fruitful and blessed ministries. They have in hand, contributions for the most part from their members, about \$3,000, and they will need about \$40,000. They ought to have the whole-hearted and enthusiastic support of the Diocese in carrying out their project. Christ Church, Short Hills, with prompt and characteristic generosity, gave to this object from their Easter Offering about \$800. And I make a plea to other parishes and to individuals to stand back of these girls and the noble and devoted women who are leading this work. Plan to give them encouragement by good and generous gifts, so that the House they build in the first year of the Diocese's second half century may be a witness to the far-seeing wisdom and generous devotion to good works of the people of this generation.

Reports of the Archdeacons

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF NEWARK.

To the Rt. Rev'd Edwin S. Lines, D.D.

I beg to present the following report:

Two very successful meetings of the Archdeaconry were held during the past year, one in the winter, the other this spring, the latter reaching high-water mark in attendance and interest.

ST. AGNES', LITTLE FALLS. On Easter Sunday, 169 received Communion, and on Easter Monday, 3, making a total of 172 receiving out of a communicant list of 176, establishing a record not only for St. Agnes' individually, but one which was equalled by few Parishes in the Diocese. The Easter offering was also the largest in its history. The Lenten offering of the Sunday School was also noteworthy, 68 teachers and scholars contributing over \$450. For the last three years, this small Sunday School has won the Diocesan Banner for the largest per capita offering. The Church is free from debt, and, beginning September 1st, it will relinquish its appropriation from the Board of Missions. Nineteen services were held at the Essex County Hospital, 14 being Celebrations of the Holy Communion. (Including Cedar Grove and the Hospital), Baptisms 22, marriages 6, burials 8, confirmed 11, communicants 176.

ST. DAVID'S, CEDAR GROVE. The small debt of \$1,700 on building and lot is being reduced at the rate of \$100 a year. The Mission has been hard hit by withdrawals, few new families moving in to take their place, but those that remain are loyal and faithful.

ST. MARY MAGDALENE, NEWARK. This section of Newark has been growing rapidly, and considerable improvements have been made in the streets and surrounding properties, including the paving of Pomona and Weequahic Avenues, upon which the Church property faces. As a result, the street assessment of almost \$2,000 makes the indebtedness greater, although \$900 of it was paid off in 1923. On the whole, however, there is great reason for encouragement, the members of the Church School having increased from 68 to 112, the Communicants from 138 to 200, and the number of baptized members from 214 to 404. Baptized 17, confirmed 9.

ST. ALBAN'S, NEWARK. This mission is in a remarkably flourishing condition. The year closed with every bill paid and with the entire Church property free from indebtedness. Over \$5,000 was raised as against \$1,388 for the year 1919. The heating system of the Church has been improved and made entirely satisfactory, the exterior of the Church and parish house and the interior of the Church have been painted by the men of St. Alban's, working with their own hands after business hours, thus

saving the Church at least \$800, the interior of the parish house has been decorated and furnished with new curtains, and electric lights have been placed throughout the Rectory; and yet, in spite of all this expenditure for the needs of the Mission, the quota for the Nation-Wide Campaign was again overpaid, the large amount for the Mission of \$406 having been subscribed, and *every organisation*, the Church Treasury, the Church School, the Women's Guild, the Men's Club, the St. Agnes' Society and the Altar Guild closed the year with a *Balance on Hand!* The attendance at the services has increased, the Church School enrollment is much larger and the standard of work much higher. Baptized 13, confirmed 18, burials 11, marriages 5.

ST. GEORGE'S, NEWARK. This Mission, which is also under the charge of the Rev'd A. T. Doughty, has had a very successful year. All the Societies have worked well. The work in the Church School has been of a high standard, the officers and teachers having been faithful and efficient. A Second Class for confirmation will be presented this year. The amount pledged for the Nation-Wide Campaign was paid in full. Baptized 8, confirmed 6, burials 2, marriages 1.

CHRIST CHURCH, NEWARK. The most important work undertaken in 1923 was that of ministering in their own language to the large Italian population, the Rev'd Joseph Anastasi giving particular attention to the development of this work. Within a few months from its commencement, last October, a good nucleus of faithful people was attached to the Parish. Services in English as well as Italian are maintained every Sunday, both congregations giving promise of growth. The finances are in better shape than for some years. The future of this Parish is very promising, since the Diocese has adopted this as an experimental centre for work among the Italians.

THE CHURCH OF THE INCARNATION, EAST ORANGE. This Mission has made remarkably rapid progress during the past year. Not only was it self-supporting, but last month it organized as a Parish and decided to ask to be admitted into union with this Diocesan Convention. It has a large piece of property running right through from Maple Avenue to Grove Street, on which there are the present Church building and a Rectory, and plans have been made for a new Church to cost in its first state, \$25,000, the ground for which was broken on Sunday, May 11th. The Campaign for this new Church building is now being carried on successfully. The Rev'd Mr. Webb and his people deserve high commendation for the fine work of the past ten years, and especially this culmination which makes the record of the Incarnation one of the best among all the Missions in the Diocese.

All of which is very gratifying, of course; but there is another side to the matter, for this makes the fourth mission in the Archdeaconry of Newark which has become self-supporting in the last four years. First, St. Philip's, Newark, gave up its appropriation, and shortly after, St. John's, Newark, and then last year, the Incarnation, East Orange; and now St. Agnes', Little Falls, follows their example. That is fine for them, and fine for the Diocese, but, at this rate, unless some new missions are started to take their place, the Archdeacon will soon have none to care for and nothing to report.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF JERSEY CITY.

To the Rt. Rev'd Edwin S. Limes, D.D., Bishop of Newark.

The Archdeaconry of Jersey City lies within the boundary of Hudson County. It embraces nineteen parishes and two missions. Three meetings of the Archdeaconry were held during the year, the Winter Meeting at St. Mary's Church, Jersey City; the Spring Meeting at Calvary, Bayonne; and the Fall Meeting at Trinity Church, Arlington.

The Mission of the Transfiguration at Woodcliff has lost its energetic and capable Missionary, the Rev'd Edgar Anderson, who had charge of the Mission before it was located at the present site, or had any property of its own. It is now in charge of the Rev'd E. A. Lemoine. It has an average attendance at its Church Services of fifty-five; has 160 total enrollment in its Church School; 24 infants or adults were baptized and 12 persons were confirmed during the past year. It has in its Building Fund for the completion of the Parish House, in which its worships, \$4,614.79.

The Mission of the Incarnation for Colored People, in Jersey City, was also unfortunate in losing its Pastor, who had been with them for over twelve years, the Rev'd Robert D. Brown. The Mission is in splendid condition and is under the temporary charge of the Rev'd Parker C. Manzer, Rector of St. Mary's Church, Jersey City. The average attendance at the Sunday services is 45; 10 persons were confirmed, 6 baptized; 84 are enrolled in the Church School and \$325 was raised for the National and Diocesan Program.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF PATERSON.

To the Rt. Rev'd Edwin S. Limes, D.D., Bishop of Newark.

It is difficult, on account of space, to make a report which will adequately convey to you the spirit, growth, and work of the missions in the Archdeaconry of Paterson during the past year, and that because they are so uniformly excellent. I am, therefore, sending a brief and suggestive summary.

At St. JOHN'S, RAMSEY, the year saw the completion of the filling in of the church grounds, the decoration of the interior of the whole church building, and an accession in membership.

THE CHURCH OF THE EPIPHANY, ALLENDALE, is still without a clergyman and doing just a little more than marking time. A rectory is the outstanding need, and a fund for that purpose has been started.

ST. CLEMENT'S, HAWTHORNE. The growth of the church school has been so great that the recently enlarged building can no longer comfortably contain it and measures are being taken to still further add to the church building.

ALL SAINTS', GLEN ROCK. There has been a reorganization of the societies, clubs started, financial obligations met, \$800.00, the balance of a Diocesan loan, liquidated, \$321.00, pledged to Diocesan and Church Extension, exceeded and \$533.70 actually paid.

CHRIST CHAPEL, WORTENDYKE. While naturally the pace has not been as fast as at Glen Rock, nevertheless it has been steadily progressive. Since January the parish house has served the community in caring for some of the children of the public school in Midland Park, destroyed by fire and now being rebuilt. A fund for a pipe organ has been started.

CHRIST CHURCH, POMPTON LAKES. The church school of Christ Church numbers 120 and the attendance on Sunday services is excellent. A new furnace has been installed, and "the prospects are very bright."

ST. PAUL'S, BUTLER, holds its own, though feeling the change of the hour of service from the morning to the evening, necessitated by Mr. Albinson moving to Pompton. It is something to be able to say that the finances of the past year are the best in twenty-five years. An interesting note is found in the organization of a small Sunday school in New City by Mrs. Speaker.

RINGWOOD MANOR. The shutting down of the mines and the consequent removal of families have stopped the increase in membership, but please note that, though probably the smallest, if not the poorest, mission in the Diocese, it paid its Diocesan Quota in full.

ST. GEORGE'S, PASSAIC, is feeling the effects of the new homes being erected in its neighborhood and of the closing of a nearby Protestant church. Two thousand dollars have been spent on the exterior of the church building and in placing a much needed fence around the property. A successful Vacation Bible School was conducted during the summer and reached about seventy children, and plans are afoot for another this summer. A woman to do community work in connection with St. George's is much to be desired, but the expense would have to be borne by the Diocese.

HOLY INNOCENTS', GARFIELD. The community work being done by Miss Grace E. Lake has increased. The Vacation Bible School of last summer was a success, and another, the third, will be held this year. Campfire and Girl Scouts' work is being carried on by her in the Belmont section of Garfield. The Slovak Lutheran congregation, "Zion," use the chapel at 10 a. m., and our church school occupies the building at the close of the service. A street assessment of \$105.60 was shared by the Chapel and "Zion."

CHURCH OF SS. CINO AND ROCCO, GARFIELD. Two or three years ago a number of Italian families separated from the parish of Monte Vergine (R. C.) and formed this Parish under Rev'd. Attilio Bocache, curate of the other church. As the Roman Catholic authorities would not recognize them as a parish, they allied themselves with the National Catholic movement under Bishop Hodur, being under the care of his Italian "Vicar-General," Mgr. Lenza. This arrangement proved unsatisfactory in many ways, and no Episcopal visitation was made. Last summer Father Bocache applied to our Church for Episcopal care; the negotiations were helped by our Italian priest, Rev'd J. Anastasi, and as a result, Bishop Stearly came to the Parish on January 27 last, blessed the church and furnishings, and confirmed about 138 children. There are some 300 families connected with the parish. Rev'd J. Anastasi preached

a mission there this Lent, which was largely attended. Though the parish is still using the Roman service, it is only a question of time when they will seek services in their own tongue. Application has been made for admission as a congregation of this Church, and, when certain financial involvements are settled, it is very likely this will be done. They have a debt of about \$9,000.00. Mr. Andrews has assisted at two services, and will probably be able to do more in the future.

ST. STEPHEN'S, DELAWARE. Under the wise and faithful oversight and guidance of the rector of Nutley the mission has been reborn. The building has been painted and redecorated, organist and sexton salaried, clubs and societies organized, the church school has grown, and, best of all, an "air of confidence, hope, and harmony prevails."

ST. PAUL'S, NORTH ARLINGTON. Under the leadership of Mr. Ferris, St. Paul's has shown more spiritual life and progress than ever before, and the realization of a new church building seems more promising than at other times. There is for this purpose \$2,000.00 in cash and \$1,200.00 in pledges. A confirmation class of 5 adults and 10 grown children establishes a record, and the men's organization is the largest in the Mission.

GRACE CHAPEL, EAST RUTHERFORD. A strong movement is on foot to secure a parish house which shall be large enough to meet the requirements of a community the size of East Rutherford, which is without a suitable and sizeable hall for social gatherings. A fund of \$2,000.00 in cash, and pledges amounting to another thousand, exists. Such a building is making a strong appeal to people other than our own, and it is believed by those who are most interested in the Chapel to be the solution of future growth and support.

ST. PAUL'S, WOOD RIDGE, goes quietly and persistently on its way, rejoicing always in its attractive little church, and ever ready to second the minister-in-charge.

LYNNBURST. The work at St. Thomas' is faithfully and zealously carried on in a community with an ever growing foreign population, and necessarily grows slowly. Each year sees a little gain, and so it must be for the present.

BELLEVILLE, CHRIST.—The mortgages on the Rectory and Parish House amounting to \$8,500, were paid off on February 1st, 1924.

BELVIDERE, ZION.—An increased endowment of \$5,000 becomes effective this year.

BLOOMFIELD AND GLEN RIDGE, CHRIST.—A net loss will be noted in Congregation and Communicants. This is due to a careful, but I think not too careful, pruning of the lists. All who have been dropped for removal without transfer will be carefully checked up and added to next year's report if by any means they can be located.

BOONTON, ST. JOHN'S.—The Sunday School paid over to Col. Wallace, Treasurer Department Development and Revenue, \$177.71, making the total paid for Diocesan purposes \$733.96.

CLIFTON, ST. PETER'S.—Report as to number of communicants, families, confirmed and baptized persons, is approximate, as the present Rector having been in charge since February 1, 1924, has not had an opportunity to get positive information with regard to that particular part of this report.

COYTESVILLE, ST. STEPHEN'S.—The increase in number of baptized persons and Communicants reported is due to the extra efforts made during the year 1923 to "line up" the people of the Parish, and to compile a more accurate Parish list.

EAST ORANGE, ASCENSION.—The Diocesan subsidy of \$420 in 1923, is the salary of the lay worker. All other expenses of the Chapel—largely bond and mortgage indebtednesses—are financed by the Congregation of the Church of the Epiphany, Orange, and are incorporated in that Church's financial report.

EAST RUTHERFORD, GRACE.—The G. F. S. received during the year \$195.27 and expended \$259.60. There was in hand at the beginning of 1923 a balance of \$91.55. The Ladies' Aid raised \$1,170.03 during 1923 and disbursed \$1,359.36. There was at the beginning of 1923 a balance.

EDGEWATER, MEDIATOR.—The increase in number of Baptized persons and Communicants over the last report is due to earnest efforts made to bring the Parish lists up to a more nearly correct figure.

GARFIELD, HOLY INNOCENTS.—Zion (Slovak) Evangelical Lutheran Church, with about 30 families, worships in the Chapel and provides sexton service, also shares cost of light and fuel.

HAWTHORNE, ST. CLEMENT'S.—\$500 was paid on the principal of the mortgage on January 2, 1924.

HOBOKEN, TRINITY.—The Securities of the Parish covering the Endowment Fund and all other Securities are kept in a Safety Deposit Box in the Hudson Trust Company, of Hoboken. By Resolution of the Vestry, which resolution is filed with the above named Trust Company, access to this box can be had only by two authorized members of the Vestry.

JERSEY CITY, ASCENSION.—The Funded Debt of \$3,000 was liquidated on January 22, 1924. The Rector's salary was made \$1,800 on January 1, 1924.

JERSEY CITY, ST. MARY'S.—The "Fall of '1926'" will mark the seventy-fifth anniversary of the organization of the Parish, and the twenty-fifth anniversary of the present building, when it is expected the mortgage will be paid and the Church Consecrated.

JERSEY CITY, ST. MATTHEW'S.—During the year 1923 \$1,100 was paid on the mortgage, which makes a total of \$2,900 paid off in the past two years.

LITTLE FALLS, ST. AGNES'.—In addition to the regular report, twenty Services were held at the Essex County Hospital, 14 being Celebrations of the Holy Communion. \$1,904.52 was given toward the Endowment Fund at the 25th Anniversary.

MILLINGTON, ALL SAINTS'.—The Rector, who is in charge of services at Bonnie Brae Farm, held 52 weekday services at the Farm. The boys were brought over to Church every Sunday morning.

MOUNTAIN LAKES, ST. PETER'S.—The Parish was organized August 1, 1923. Since then we have held services every Sunday (Holy Communion at 7:30, and Morning Prayer and sermon at 11), in St. John's School, the building, light and heat generously donated by Mrs. H. B. Wilson. The ladies of the Parish organized the Guild for Service of St. Peter's Church, in January, 1924, having a membership of about 70.

NEWARK, CHRIST.—Italian services were begun in October, in charge of the Rev'd Joseph Anastasi, who came to the Diocese September 1, 1923.

NEWARK, ST. ALBAN'S.—The Mission has made great progress during the year 1923, the steam heating plant in the Church and Parish House was enlarged. Twenty-six men of the Church worked for six weeks during the summer, after business hours, and painted the exterior of the Church and Parish House, and decorated both interiors. The Parochial Organizations raised over \$1,800, an exceptional record. New electric lamps were placed inside and outside the Church. The Mission is now free from debt and owns its valuable property. In addition to raising all current expenses, the Mission again exceeded its quota, this year by \$406.60. A number of memorial gifts were made during the year.

NEWARK, ST. JOHN'S.—The mortgage on the Church is being reduced each year \$500. \$2,000 has now been paid off, leaving a balance of \$3,000.

NEWARK, ST. MATTHEW'S.—The property of St. Matthew's was sold in December, 1923, the proceeds to be added to the "St. Matthew's Trust Fund." The Rev'd Adalbert Olaszewski, Priest-in-charge, removed to Pennsylvania; the spiritual oversight of the congregation passed to the Canon Missioner for Foreign Born Work.

NORTH ARLINGTON, ST. PAUL'S.—A tower 34 feet high has been erected at the entrance of the building, and in it has been placed a large bell weighing approximately 1,000 lbs. The bell was purchased from St. Paul's Church, Newark. Both the bell and tower are the gift of the Rev'd William B. Mawhinney, in memory of the late William E. Whittle, son of the warden, and the first scholar of St. Paul's Church School, as well as the first Crucifer. Members of the Church School provided funds for the erection of a large electric Cross at the top of the tower, and this Cross, when lighted, may be seen for many miles.

ORANGE, EPIPHANY.—This Congregation, though listed as a Parochial Mission of Grace Church, Orange, is a self-supporting group. In addition to supporting itself, the Congregation of the Church of the Epiphany has built and carries on the work of the

Chapel of the Ascension in East Orange. The Diocese helped in the furtherance of the work of the Ascension by a grant of \$420 during 1923.

PATERSON, ST. LUKE'S.—During the year 1923 \$400 was paid on the Rectory mortgage reducing it to \$1,300.

PHILLIPSBURG, ST. LUKE'S.—Authority voted by the Parish to the Rector and Vestry to sell the present parish property, and purchase a new site in the rapidly growing hill section of the city. A splendid new site has been purchased, and every effort is being made to dispose of the present property and erect buildings on the new site this year.

UPPER RIDGEWOOD, ST. ELIZABETH'S.—The Chapel was opened for services by Bishop Lines on June 24, 1923. The first Celebration of the Holy Communion was held on July 1, 1923. The first session of the Church School was held on September 16, 1923. The first Confirmation was administered by Bishop Stearly on November 4, 1923; the first baptism on December 2, 1923.

Hospital of St. Barnabas, Newark.

[Incorporated 13 February, 1867.]

President, (ex-officio), the Rt. Rev'd Edwin S. Lines, D.D.; *Vice-President,* the Rt. Rev'd Wilson R. Stearly, D.D.; *Chairman of the Executive Committee,* the Rev'd Charles L. Gomph; *Secretary,* the Rev'd J. Fred. Hamblin, 28 Carteret St., Newark; *Treasurer,* Mr. J. Lawrence Boggs, 750 Broad St., Newark; *Superintendent of the Hospital,* the Rev'd John G. During the past year the Sisters of St. Margaret were obliged to withdraw from the management of the Hospital on account of the illness of both Sister Caroline and Sister Emma. Their withdrawal is a grievous loss to the Hospital. We thank GOD for their many long years of devoted service, however, and wish to put on record the deep appreciation of the Trustees and friends of the Hospital to the Sisterhood of St. Margaret for this service.

On September 1st the Rev. John G. Martin became Superintendent of the Hospital, and by his intelligent, industrious application to the duties of his office, as well as by his pleasing personality, has already shown his fitness for the post. In November the Trustees purchased the property, 695 High Street, immediately adjacent to the Hospital property on the south, for the Superintendent's residence.

In September, 1923, Miss Eva Caddy, R. N., succeeded Miss Brown as Superintendent of the School of Nurses. There has been an increase in the past year in the number of pupil nurses in the School, but still more are needed in order to utilize the Hospital to its full capacity.

The material improvements as planned and begun three years ago have been practically completed (with the exception of certain parts of "Item Five," notably the second operating room, and the new elevator in the main building, which proposed improvements have been impossible to carry out on account of lack of funds). The Hospital now has a capacity of 135 beds, and on the whole is excellently equipped for its great work, but generous gifts of money are sorely needed to supply the remaining needs.

This brings us to the matter of Hospital finance. Last year the total receipts were \$121,614.93, of which over \$87,000 came from board of patients, fees, and other receipts at the Hospital, making the largest amount ever received in a single year. The disbursements, however, amounted to \$134,997.69, leaving a deficit for the year 1923 of \$13,382.76. This situation constitutes a very serious problem for the Trustees and friends of the Hospital, especially as we are debarred from making general appeals for contributions for current expenses by our participation in the "Com-

munity Chest" which, it should be remembered, failed to reach its goal, so that the participating agencies do not receive the full amount of their askings approved by the Budget Committee of the "Community Chest." It should also be remembered that St. Barnabas' Hospital does a very large amount of free work among the poor of this community. Last year we gave away \$25,439.39 worth of free treatment, and that figure is based not on the actual cost of patient per day of \$5.67, but on the nominal cost of \$3.00 per day. This tremendous free service to the community constitutes a weighty claim upon the generous support of our citizens generally; for we minister neither exclusively nor chiefly to our own Church people, but to all creeds, nationalities and races. A few figures will illustrate this: of the more than \$25,000 worth of free service given away last year, Roman Catholic patients received the largest amount, \$4,954.55; Episcopalians came next, receiving \$4,890.98; Hebrews next, receiving \$3,966; and members of 10 other religious bodies received the rest. One hundred and fifty-nine nationalities were ministered to, in a total of over 10,000 patients in the course of the year.

During the last year the number of Adjunct Physicians and Surgeons has been considerably increased, so that many more doctors may now send their patients to St. Barnabas' than in former years. At present the total number of physicians and surgeons connected with the Hospital is 69.

The Trustees wish to put on record their gratitude to the many friends and benefactors of the Hospital for their interest, help and gifts; and to thank most heartily all who have given of their skill, labor and devotion to the Hospital, especially the physicians, surgeons, nurses, the Chaplain, the Social Service worker, the members of the Guild of the Hospital of St. Barnabas and the Junior Guild. Their loyal, unstinted service has made possible the great ministry of healing which for more than fifty years the Hospital of St. Barnabas has rendered to this community.

FIFTIETH ANNUAL REPORT, COUNCIL OF CHRIST HOSPITAL.

To the Rt. Rev'd Edwin S. Lines, D.D.,

Bishop of the Diocese of Newark.

Christ Hospital has reached the limit of its capacity. The population of Hudson County and especially of Jersey City is multiplying rapidly and the demands made upon our Hospital are beyond our ability to minister to. A committee consisting of members of the Council and the Medical Board has been appointed as a ways and means committee to canvass the whole situation, and suggest some plan for adding to our present equipment, and the building of a new addition, which will form the first unit of an entirely new hospital. This undertaking will involve the raising of several hundred thousand dollars, which we believe is entirely possible.

Our Finances are in good condition. It cost us nearly \$166,000 to maintain the Hospital last year. We have a Trust Account (which is separate from our Endowment) upon which we can draw by vote of the Council, to make up any deficit in our current expenses. We drew on this account to the sum of \$8,000 this last year and yet this fund stands at \$3,000 more than it did at this time last year. This Special Account amounts to over \$23,000. Last year we treated 2,627 Patients of which 197 were Episcopalians, 1,025 Roman Catholics, 1,169 Protestants and 236 Hebrews.

One of the interesting and important features of the work is the Social Service work done by a nurse who visits in the homes of certain people who have received treatment in the Clinic.

St. Katharine's Home, Jersey City.

[Organized, 1890; incorporated, 1893.]

From January 15, 1923, to January 21, 1924, four meetings were held with an average attendance of twelve members. During the year there have been two resignations and nine new members have been elected.

The year 1923 being the Thirty-third Anniversary of St. Katharine's Home, special services were held on February the eighth and the house was open to guests. Father Manser and Canon Bryan reported a large number present at Evensong. On the occasion of this anniversary an appeal was made for the Endowment Fund and the sum of \$1,620 was given.

During the year there were in the Home twelve girls and eight have been admitted; eight births in Christ Hospital and one in Hackensack Hospital. Nine girls were discharged with their children and three without. Eight baptisms, three confirmations, and one marriage have taken place.

St. Margaret's Day was celebrated with ice cream and cake, and two automobile drives have been given for the enjoyment of those in the Home. Special note was made of several occasions, and on the whole the summer was spent in a very satisfactory manner.

Much appreciation is extended by the Board to the Clergy who have administered in the Chapel and constantly remembered St. Katharine's in the year 1923, and also to Mr. Henry J. Russell for his able assistance at the organ.

During the year necessary repairs have been made where required. The Park Commission has replaced two dead trees with others, plants have been received from Mrs. Russell and Mrs. Williams, clothing and knitted garments from Philadelphia and the Needlework Guild. Thanks are extended from the Board to all who have so graciously remembered the Home.

On Ascension Day, Bishop Stearly visited the Home and confirmed three candidates. The service was attended by many members of the Board.

Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day were again remembered most generously by Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Williams. The Christmas Festival was held on Holy Innocents' Day, the tree given, as always, by Mrs. Talmage and the services attended by several members of the Board and other visitors.

To the Nation-Wide Campaign we are largely indebted for the ability to carry on this uplifting work, guided by the Sisters of St. Margaret, who are ever most untiring in their devotion. Truly "The King shall answer and say unto them, Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

During the year, the City Mission has regularly ministered to the patients and inmates of thirty city and county institutions, and to several other hospitals as occasion and opportunity have presented themselves. There are two chaplains who devote all their time to the work, the Rev'd Charles L. Cooder, D.D., and the Rev'd James W. Van Ingen. The institution population with whom the chaplains come in contact averages between three and four thousand at any one time, and is constantly changing from week to week. This affords the opportunity for the City Mission. In addition to their regular visits at stated times, the chaplains are on call for any cases demanding immediate attention.

A daily record is kept of all baptisms, communions, burials, services and other items connected with the regular work. From this record the statistics of the year indicate, as the work of both chaplains, 13,951 patients and inmates visited, 1,286 visits to institutions, 172 baptisms, 364 ministrations of the communion to the sick on the wards, 81 celebrations of the Holy Communion in public, 374 burials of city and county cases, 100 services and addresses, 1 marriage service, 29 Bible class meetings, 363 garments distributed, over 2,000 magazines given out on the wards, and hundreds of packages of Christmas presents sent in by various parishes for use among the children. In the

daily round among the sick and unfortunate, there remains much that cannot be tabulated or formally reported, but which, probably, constitutes the more essential part of the work.

Services, conducted to meet the local conditions, are maintained at the Alms House, Orange City Home, Essex County Sanatorium, St. Barnabas' Hospital, Soho Isolation, and a Bible class at the House of Detention. Every facility is granted the chaplains by the officers in charge of the public institutions to conduct their work among the patients.

There is a higher percentage of our own communicants among the hospital patients than at first might appear, due to the fact that they do not generally report themselves as such at the time of admission to the hospital. One has to discover them, as a rule. But during the course of the year practically every parish in Newark and vicinity will be represented, and many also from dioceses in Canada and in England.

The many expressions of thanks from the patients, the frequent letters from discharged patients, letters from the families of patients who have passed away, and the kindly attitude of the doctors and nurses, together with the results attained, would all seem to indicate that the City Mission meets a public need by its ministrations. The total number of persons admitted to all the institutions visited by the chaplains during the year is about thirty thousand, and among these the City Mission finds its opportunity.

Guild of St. Barnabas for Nurses—Orange Branch.

The object of the Guild is two-fold:

1. *Religious.* To assist its members in realizing the dignity of their calling and in maintaining a high standard of Christian life and work in connection therewith.
2. *Social.* To provide for nurses some of the comforts and influences resulting from more intimate intercourse with each other and with associate members.

The Guild of St. Barnabas holds out to all nurses the love of God in Christ Jesus that with all her training she might have that wondrous strength and power to keep herself lovely and minister with all Christian grace.

The second object is social by associating nurses together, and with them other women as friends, to provide some of the comforts and power gained by such an association.

ORANGE, N. J.—Services have been held once a month in the different parishes, addresses by the Chaplain or a Priest-Associate, followed by a social hour. At Christmas the sum of \$111.25 was received from members of the Branch and three families were provided with a dinner of chicken, vegetables, fruit and a generous supply of groceries, besides toys, books, candy and clothing. To these gifts were added a pair of eye-glasses for a little motherless American girl and a pair was given to a colored child. Fifteen dollars was paid to the Orange School Nurse to provide milk for these children for three months.

The Entertainment Committee gave a supper to the nurses in Grace Church Parish House, about 75 were present, besides several of the pupil nurses from the hospital.

A Food Sale was given, at which \$103.76 was realized toward the salary of the Field Secretary, and at a musical \$106.00 was raised, and \$100.00 by a Rummage Sale.

The Chaplain's letter, sent out each month, is greatly appreciated, especially by members at a distance from home.

The Sick Relief Fund continues to be a source of comfort to many of the nurses, also the Emergency Fund is a great agency of substantial value.

The collection at the Annual Service was for the United Benevolent Work, which supports a nurse in the Mission Field. We are most fortunate in having Bishop Lines and Bishop Stearly among our Priest-Associates; they are fine leaders and wise counsellors. It is with deep sorrow we report the death of Mr. William Read Howe, the treasurer of our Sick Relief Fund. He so faithfully and generously, through many years, even after physical suffering had overtaken him, rendered help to our Guild in the administration of the financial affairs.

The 36th Annual Council of the National Guild was held at Cleveland, Ohio, November 8 and 9. Three hundred and seventy-three student nurses from the many hospitals, all in uniform, attended the opening service at Trinity Cathedral, and it was a most impressive sight.

Much work is being accomplished in the Mission fields; twelve nurses are in foreign fields and twenty in home fields.

Special tribute was given to the heroic work of the nurses of St. Luke's Hospital, Tokio, Japan, where they succeeded in rescuing all of the patients and much of their library.

One of our nurses in China is spreading the missionary spirit in the Training School.

The Guild works in connection with the Church Mission of Help, the cases come to them from the courts and the Travellers' Aid Society.

Never before in the history of nursing have there been such rare opportunities for service as are now offered in this work.

It has nearly thirty distinct lines of activity.

From the more simple duties heretofore, we now find her work has developed so that it includes duties of a public, social, educational and administrative character.

The possibilities of the Guild are large, for it is an organization of power, but it needs a Field Secretary to get in personal touch with the nurses, entering into other territories, to make it count in the work of the world.

The Guild is suffering from the lack of a definite person to act in this capacity. The Executive Committee was authorized to prepare plans for the employing of such an officer.

Pledges amounting to \$3,500.00 have already been subscribed and \$1,148.00 of this amount has been paid in.

In behalf of the Guild, I would extend grateful thanks to all those who have co-operated with us in our work.

May the Guild's prayers be ever answered and our nurses blessed with God's many favors and their friends and associates share with them the "comfort and joy" of a year spent in loving service and helpful devotion.

Report of the Trustees of St. Matthew's German Church.

Since our last report the Trustees, with the written consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee, have sold the Church property situated at the corner of Avon and Chadwick Avenues, in the City of Newark, N. J. The sum realized from the sale, after deducting the agent's commission, was \$19,300.00 The principal of the fund now held by the Trustees is \$33,000.00.

The amount of income received during the year ended December 31, 1923, was \$839.67, and during the same period there was paid out of the income the sum of \$624.00 for maintaining services in the Church and for missionary work within the City of Newark. There was also expended from the income account the sum of \$127.50 for legal and administration expenses.

During the past year the Council of the Church Service League for the Diocese of Newark has gone quietly on its way. Besides the usual meetings of the Council for conference there have been held five monthly meetings under its direction for all women's organizations of the Diocese. These meetings are open to all Church women. At each meeting there have been interesting speakers on Missions and present day problems, besides reports from the various organizations of women's work and from the Institutes of the Diocese.

The Council is endeavoring to make two of the monthly meetings of special spiritual value to the Diocese, viz.: That of the Quiet Day early in Advent which is held in Newark, the centre of the Diocese and that of the United Thank Offering, which is held each year in a different part of the Diocese, that in turn each District may gain the inspiration of that day when the women bring their prayers and gifts gathered from the "Little Blue Boxes." This meeting also has a very practical side to it, for the number of "Blue Boxes" being used is raised after each Thank Offering Service, one Rector reporting that the number has increased from a very small number to two hundred.

The great spirit of co-operation which has grown up between organizations in the Diocese is very noticeable—the Woman's Auxiliary for instance, is being greatly helped in filling out its quota by the Girls' Friendly Society—its Devotional Department is strengthened and aided by the Daughters of the King—while the Altar Guild has come to its aid in emergency calls for Church books and hangings—calls from Porto Rico—Pacific Islands and Japan having been answered directly—in fact, when emergency calls come to 281 Fourth Avenue they are in the habit of saying: "Call Newark and it will be done."

The Church Mission of Help, The Girls' Friendly and St. Barnabas Guild are continuing their co-operative work among women and girls.

By advice of Bishop Stearly we have added to the Council as Supply Head Mrs. Chester Lee Colton, who may now go to our Institutions and find out at first hand their needs and then with authority turn to the Council organizations and ask that their needs be filled.

Our Parish units are slowly increasing in number. This growth necessarily must be slow as they can only be formed in the Parishes at the wish of the Rectors. Many Rectors do not care to change their plan of work and so do not invite us to form units. Slow growth makes for strength and we therefore feel that when the work is completed the Diocese will be wonderfully strengthened. When the units are working reports are always to the effect that interest both practical and spiritual are the results of the increased sympathy with the work which the Church is undertaking.

The Corporation for the Relief of Widows and Children of Clergymen of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the State of New Jersey.

The Corporation is independent of either of the Dioceses of New Jersey. It is not a pension plan, it does not pay pensions to the Clergy who are contributors; it is a kind of Life Insurance Company for the benefit of the Widows and Orphans of the Contributors. It was originally incorporated under a "royal charter" by George III on March 29, 1769, its territory being the Colonies of New York, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania. In 1806 a plan was adopted by which the original body was divided into three parts. In the division of funds, New Jersey received \$4,289.00. On December 3, 1807, it became a body corporate under its present title. Last year it distributed in annuities and dividends \$5,036.75, and transferred to principal \$3,490.84. The total principal was, on May 1, 1924 (at market value), \$174,600.75.

Clergymen of the Protestant Episcopal Church, not over 55 years of age, who have for the past two years been canonically connected with, and actually resident in either of the Dioceses in the State of New Jersey, are eligible for membership as "Contributors." Removal from the State after five annual contributions of eight dollars, does not forfeit membership; in case of removal before five payments have been made, the amount paid will be returned. The "members of the Corporation" are those elected to manage its affairs; they are not necessarily contributors, and some of them are laymen. The annual meeting is held on the first Monday in June. Applications for membership should be in the hands of the Secretary before that date. The Secretary will be glad to furnish further information, and copies of application forms.

Report, Board of Missions and Church Extension.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The Board of Missions and Church Extension reports that during the year 1923 it has held nine meetings and also four meetings to April 30th of the year 1924.

At the meeting of January, 1923, it made a grant of \$700.00 to enable Christ Mission, Morris Plains, to complete the purchase of a splendid tract of land.

It also increased its appropriation to Christ Church, Newark, with the understanding that the Rector assume superintendence of the Foreign-born Work.

A Committee was appointed at the February, 1923, meeting to confer with the Vestry of St. Luke's, Phillipsburg, relative to changing the Church to a new site. This Committee at a subsequent meeting in March, 1923, made report that the Church property is located in the old section of the town, and the character of the neighborhood has completely changed. The section is more and more being given over to business and in addition the Church is adjacent to the railroad freight terminal. The larger number of the people of St. Luke's now reside on the "Hill" section. The Vestry had an opportunity to acquire a large tract of land on the "Hill," in a restricted residential neighborhood. The people of the Church felt that the land should be purchased, with a view to eventually erect buildings on it for Parish Work. After conference and survey, the Committee recommended the purchase to the Board, whereupon the Board voted its approval and so advised St. Luke's.

At this meeting it appointed the Rev'd W. O. Leslie, Jr., to take up work at Eagle's Nest Farm for the summer.

On April 18, 1923, a resolution was passed requesting the Finance and Advisory Board for an increased allowance to carry out plans for additional work in the Western Counties Mission.

At the meeting in June, 1923, a communication was received from Archdeacon Carter conveying his resignation as Secretary of the Board. On motion of Bishop Lines it was duly carried, that Bishop Stearly be asked to write to Archdeacon Carter and express the Board's regret over his resignation. The sum of \$225.00 was appropriated for summer work at Mount Arlington.

On September 27, 1923, a grant of \$500.00 was made to All Saints' of Bergenfield on condition that it raise in addition the sum of \$4,160.00 and so liquidate its mortgage indebtedness.

At the meeting of October, 1923, a grant of \$500.00 was made towards the Parish House of Saint Mary the Virgin, Ridgefield Park.

An appropriation of \$1,000.00 was on November 21st, 1923, made to Christ Church, Belleville, for the Church Building Fund.

At the December meeting, announcement was made, that under the Last Will and Testament of Hugh Hartshorne, deceased, the sum of \$1,000.00 had been bequeathed to the Board, the said sum to be used at the discretion of the Bishops.

On January 16, 1924, the Board received a petition that a new work, St. Luke's Mission, be started at Haworth, N. J. A committee of investigation was appointed and at a subsequent meeting of the Board, February 20, 1924, made a favorable report. It also recommended that the Board purchase a small "Portable Constructed Church" building at a cost of about \$2,500.00 and that it be used temporarily by St. Luke's Mission on a rental basis. The recommendation met with the Board's approval and it was so ordered.

At this meeting it was also decided to create a new committee, to be known as a Standing Committee for Counsel and Advice on the Foreign Born Work and by appointment of the Chair is at present constituted as follows: The Rev'd Messrs. Edwin S. Carson, Charles P. Tinker, George E. Magill and Messrs. Wm. A. Merchant, T. McCurdy Marsh and C. B. Johns.

Report, Board of Social Service, Diocese of Newark, 1923.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The first meeting of the Board of Social Service following the last Diocesan Convention was held on May 31, 1923, when Mr. Frederic A. Burlingame was unanimously elected Chairman. Mr. Lewis R. Conklin was re-elected as treasurer and Canon Dunseath as Secretary. A new committee was created to be known as a Committee on Program, which was to plan the work of the Board and to study the problems of Social Service. As a result of the work of this Committee, the Board has followed as nearly as possible the program which it suggested and has studied each month the activities of one of its committees, while reports have been received as usual from all the committees of the Board. These reports have included "Literature and Conferences," "Bonnie Brae Farm," "Church Mission of Help," "Legislation and Public Affairs," "State Institutions" and "Parochial Social Service."

The most satisfactory report which this Board could make to the Convention would be a compilation of the reports of these committees, but that would require too much time and space. A mere summary of the work and interest of most of these committees must suffice.

LITERATURE AND CONFERENCES.

It was decided to continue and develop the plan which the Board carried out last year for the distribution of Social Service information to the people of the Diocese. The Rectors of the parishes were again asked; as well as those who had been members of last year's "Reading Course," to send in the names of others who would be interested, and as a result a list of about fifteen hundred names was built up. Brief pamphlets were sent out, dealing with such subjects as (1) "A Digest of the Proposed Poor Law Relating to the Settlement and Relief of the Poor," (2) "The Influence of the Church in Legislation and Public Affairs," by Canon Dunseath, (3) "Industrial Work and Training in State Institutions," (4) the annual reports of "Bonnie Brae Farm" and the "Church Mission of Help," (5) "Thoughts on Our Present Discontents," by Professor William Starr Myers. A conference was held in St. James' Church, Upper Montclair, and two conferences have been held at Trinity Cathedral, the first one of which was addressed by Mr. Owen R. Lovejoy of the Child Labor Committee and Bishop Lines, and the second, by Dr. James M. Plant, the Director of the Essex County Juvenile Clinic, and Canon Dunseath.

LEGISLATION AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS.

Under the leadership of Mr. Robert L. Flemming the Committee on Legislation and Public Affairs has pursued its usual interest in this field of activity. Its interest centered very largely in two pieces of legislation which promised much for the advance of social welfare in the State of New Jersey. One was the bill to re-codify the "Poor Laws" of the State and the other was the bill to provide a half-mill direct tax for a period of four years, the proceeds of which were to go to the enlarging and reconstruction of State Institutions and for caring for the wards of the State. Both of these bills were passed, though considerably amended. According to experts, the new law which will result in the recodification of the "Poor Laws" and a more up-to-date handling of the problems involved, will place the State of New Jersey in the forefront in this respect.

STATE INSTITUTIONS.

The Board has attempted to inform itself and the Diocese regarding the State Institutions. Mrs. Cornelia B. Meytrott, Assistant Director of the Department of Institutions and Agencies of the State presented to the Board the work of that Department and asked for the support of the Board of Social Service in the creation of public opinion in behalf of the State Institutions, and urged the Board to make an effort to get desirable and competent people in our churches to take up this kind of work. The Committee on State Institutions has co-operated with the National Department of Social Service in gathering information regarding our State Institutions. Two pamphlets dealing with the laws mentioned above as they affect our State Institutions were sent out as a part of the "Reading Course."

PAROCHIAL SOCIAL SERVICE.

During the past two years an effort has been made to build up a list of the parishes in which Parochial Social Service Committees have been definitely organized, or to get the names of persons in the Diocese who were interested in or working in the field of Social Service. The result reveals the fact that thirty-eight parishes have organized Social Service Committees. About 178 names are on the list which represents interested communicants. During Lent the Committee on Parochial Social Service invited

these people to attend a conference, at which there was a most profitable discussion and presentation of the various types of work being carried out in the parishes. Ten parishes were represented at this conference. The Committee has prepared a definite program to be sent out as a suggestion to all the parishes of the Diocese.

PERSONAL REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

During the past year the Secretary has administered the Holy Communion, preached or made addresses in many of the parishes and missions of the Diocese and to Men's Clubs, Women's Organizations, Young People's Societies, Girls' Friendly Societies and Sunday Schools. He has attended and addressed the meetings of the Archdeacons, he delivered two addresses at the conference for the clergy and laymen of the Diocese of Connecticut, and one address at a dinner of clergy and laymen of the Diocese of New Jersey. He delivered a course of nine lectures on "The Church and Legislation" and five lectures on "Parochial Social Service" at the Princeton Summer School. He attended the National Prison Conference in Boston as a delegate to represent the State of New Jersey, appointed by Governor Silzer. In addition to his duties in connection with the Board of Social Service, as Secretary of the New Jersey Conference for Social Welfare he organized and carried through to a successful conclusion the annual New Jersey Conference for Social Welfare held in Newark in November. He delivered the address at the annual patriotic service of the League of Women Voters and delivered the invocation at the opening of the Fourth Annual Convention of the New Jersey League of Women Voters and delivered an address on "Peace" at Miss Beard's School.

The Board desires at this time to express to the various Diocesan organizations, including the Church Club of the Diocese, the Woman's Auxiliary and the Girls' Friendly Society; its appreciation for their very gracious co-operation and help, as well as to all those who by their interest and work have helped to further the cause of Social Service.

Report of the Board of Religious Education.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

In compliance with the request from the Committee in charge of the Convention that all reports cover the calendar year, this report tells of the activities of the Board of Religious Education from the time of the last Convention to the end of the year. An account of matters which occurred before May, 1923, will be found in the JOURNAL for 1923.

At the May meeting, a Committee was appointed to re-organize the Board. This Committee reported at the September meeting a plan calling for five Commissions as follows: 1. Promotion and Extension; 2. Church Schools; 3. Church School Service League; 4. Youth; 5. Adult Education. Under the direction of these Commissions, the activities of the Board were planned.

On May 21st, a Life Work Dinner was held at St. Paul's Church, Paterson, at which ninety-two boys of high school age were present from fourteen Parishes.

During the spring efforts were made to have people attend the Summer Schools. Three scholarships were offered by the Board.

A group of fourteen boys attended the Conference on the Ministry at Chestnut Hill Academy, Philadelphia, during the week of June 20th.

Assistance was given the Eagle's Nest Farm Committee in planning and conducting the Camps during the summer months.

Four Parishes conducted Vacation Schools with success through financial aid from the Board.

On Friday, October 19th, the fourteenth Annual Church School Convention was held. Despite a rainy day, approximately five hundred persons were present. A plan, described in *The Leader* as "the most unique and interesting one that has come to our desk" was carried out. Ten schools demonstrated noteworthy achievements in Church School work.

Certificates for standards attained were awarded to ten schools for one hundred per cent.; seventeen schools for ninety per cent.; nineteen schools for eighty per cent., and seventeen schools for seventy per cent., a total of sixty-three Honor schools.

During the autumn months, mission boxes containing joyful and useful gifts were sent to over three thousand boys and girls. A Conference for Leaders was held in November.

Miss Evelyn Withers was employed by the Board two days a week to promote Week Day activities. Reports received by Miss Withers from thirteen Parish branches of the Church School Service League show that gifts to the Five Fields valued at \$5,195.44 were made in 1923.

The Newark Church Normal School was continued at Trinity House, Newark, and began the year with an enrollment of forty-five. The Teacher Training Committee recommended the continuance of the plan of Parish classes. The subjects for this year were Course 1, the Pupil and Course 2, the Bible. Reports indicate that a large number of Parish classes were held during the year.

The Daily Bible Readings beginning at Advent were distributed and 5,000 copies were ordered from fifty-six parishes. Our Diocese leads all other Dioceses in the use of the Bible Readings.

The usual Advent Offering of the Church Schools was planned, but instead of being used for Diocesan missions as has been the custom, it was decided to donate the money for a special item in the Japanese Reconstruction program. Posters describing the needs of Tokyo were printed and distributed to all schools. The offering was far larger than ever before, totalling \$2,747.83 from ninety-one schools.

Lists of the young men and women in the Diocese away from home at Schools and Colleges were gathered and Bishop Lines sent a Christmas letter to over five hundred young men and young women on these lists. This practice was commended by the National Department of Religious Education and the letter printed.

A new venture this year was a conference of Choirmasters and Organists. This was held in conjunction with the Newark Clericus at Grace Church, Orange, on Monday, November 26th. It proved to be a great success and led to the creation of a Commission on Church Music. This Commission has been appointed by the Bishops and is now working out an effective program to improve music within the Church and especially to assist the small choirs.

The usual list of Christmas plays and pageants was distributed to the Church Schools. An increasing number of schools are using this profitable means of telling the Christmas story.

The Young People's Fellowship began in the fall with an active program. The District Councils outlined under the Articles of Federation were organized. Several District gatherings have been held. A pin has been adopted and distributed among the societies. There are now twenty-six chartered chapters with several others ready to be admitted. The Fellowship is to entertain over the week-end of February 22nd representatives from all of the societies in the Province.

The report of the Treasurer is herewith appended.

Report of the Young People's Fellowship.

The Diocesan Council of the Y. P. F. has carried on its activities in the past year along the general lines of duty as specified in the Constitution.

Early in the year the Council adopted a design for a Fellowship pin, and had the pins made and distributed among the Parish chapters. A Service of Instruction used in connection with the pin design was published by the Board of Religious Education and copies of it were sent to the Parish Chapters. A number of the chapters have used this service in installing new members.

The Council sent out letters and in every way encouraged interest in the Conference for Young People to be held at Eagles' Nest Farm, but there were not sufficient enrollments to hold the Conference.

The Council has put into effect the plan of forming the chapters into district groups, to hold district meetings, socials, rallies, etc., to visit one chapter with another, and to exchange speakers, thereby promoting closer fellowship among the young people.

During the past year the Council has granted a number of charters, first considering the constitution of the chapter and suggesting any such changes as might be necessary to meet the requirements of the Diocesan Organization. Charters have been granted to the following chapters: Trinity, Hoboken; Calvary, Bayonne; Grace, Orange; St. John's, West Hoboken; St. Barnabas, Newark; Christ, Harrison; St. James, Newark; St. Agnes, East Orange, and Ascension, Jersey City.

At the first meeting of the Council, held in May, 1923, it was voted to invite the Provincial Conference of Young People to the Diocese of Newark, and the invitation was accepted. A committee was appointed in the Council to suggest objectives for the Young People's organizations of the Province, and this committee reported at the Provincial Conference. The objectives they set forth—raising money for the Porto Rican Priorities and the Japanese Restoration Fund—were accepted as Provincial Objectives. The Council also gave its support to the Conference and assumed the full responsibility of the dinner held on Washington's Birthday.

In the Council there have been formed departments on the four departments of Devotion, Service, Education and Fellowship. These committees have been preparing programs and suggestions for the coming year. The Council also has a committee working on a Handbook for advisors and members of the Y. P. F. of the Diocese, and hopes to have the Handbook ready for distribution in the fall.

The most recent activities of the Council concerned the plans and program for the Annual Convention for 1924.

Report of the Eagle's Nest Farm Committee.

Your Committee is glad to report that the season of 1923 showed a continuing development and greater usefulness at Eagle's Nest Farm.

As reported last year we established a camp commissary, which has proven a tremendous improvement.

The average attendance at camp during the season was about fifty, and under the active and devoted leadership of the Rev'd Canon Leslie and the Rev'd Canon Farrell, the camp has been of inestimable benefit to those in attendance. Your Committee wishes to express its indebtedness to Canon Leslie and Canon Farrell for their assistance in the operation of the camp.

For the benefit of those who have not visited the camp a brief description may be of interest.

The property covers 180 acres and stretches from a 600 ft. frontage on the Delaware River, more than a mile back on the hills, and reaches an altitude of about 800 ft. Located as it is six miles below the Delaware Water Gap, the scenery is unsurpassed. The country is thinly settled and no more quiet, beautiful or suitable place could be selected as a Diocesan centre for summer work and recreation.

Our experience in operating the camp makes it possible to establish a rate this year of \$9.50 per week or \$1.75 per day for those staying less than a week, which is a considerable reduction from rates of last year.

Up to this year the development of the property has been near the river, but since the beginning of the year we have arranged with the Girls' Friendly Society of the Diocese to build at Eagle's Nest their Holiday House, and a portion of the Cummins farm on the high ground has been set apart for their use.

This plan involves the development of further water supply from the spring on our property, some road improvements and a swimming pool for their use, and it is expected that their building will be completed and ready for occupancy for the season of 1925.

The plans for this year insure a greater use of our camp, and the following groups have been provided for:

June 23rd to 27th—Conference of the Clergy.

June 30th to July 12th—Camp for Girls.

July 14th to 26th—Camp John W. Wood, conducted by the National Council of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew.

July 26th to 28th—Special conference for men under the auspices of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew.

July 28th to August 30th—Camp for Boys.

Arrangements have been made with the railroad to grant "Fresh Air fares" for those attending the camp between the ages of five and sixteen years, which rate is one-quarter of the round-trip fare to the camp from points within the radius of five hundred miles. Application for such reduction of fare can be made only through our Secretary, Rev'd W. O. Leslie, Jr., 21 Washington Street, Newark, N. J.

The Committee wishes to express to the Trunk Line Association its appreciation for its concession.

As Eagle's Nest Farm has no endowment which would enable it to give free service to campers, it is necessary that we collect fees sufficient to carry the cost of operation and it is suggested that our work could be much benefited if those who feel able to do so, would contribute so as to provide a week at the camp for the children of our cities who are unable to pay the camp costs. \$9.50 plus transportation keeps a child at the camp for one week.

Your Committee is not carrying on any expensive construction this year, its aim being to fill the present camp to capacity throughout the season, and we ask your assistance in accomplishing this result.

The future development of Eagle's Nest Farm is unlimited and we believe that in the course of time the entire property will be occupied with various diocesan activities, but it is our aim that this development should be gradual and well considered.

Report of the Registrar.

To the Convention:

The Registrar has the honor to report exchange of Diocesan Journals of 1923 with other jurisdictions to the number of seventy-five.

To the Diocesan Library the gifts by the Bishops have been continued to the extent of 25 volumes of recent issue. The titles are announced in the "Newark Churchman" and all have had good circulation.

For other additions we are indebted to Rev'd Charles L. Report, Commission on Church Architecture.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

Several meetings of the Commission have been held during the past year and consideration given to the plans submitted.

The Chairman addressed the congregation of the Incarnation Mission, Ampere, on the evening of October 3rd, 1923, discussing the proposed plans for the new Church building before a large meeting of the parishioners.

In the following month, the Rector of Grace Church, Nutley, having explained the nature of the improvements to be made, and the Commission believing that the work was in competent hands, gave its approval of the proposed changes.

At the meeting, held on December 26th, 1923, a committee from the Parish of St. Mark's, Newark, appeared before it, and submitted the sketches showing the way it was proposed to enlarge the present edifice. This was considered a difficult undertaking, but the Commission felt that the architect had overcome what seemed at first insurmountable obstacles and gladly gave its consent to the alterations.

The Minister-in-charge of Grace Chapel, East Rutherford, with members of the building committee attended the meeting of the Commission on March 18th, 1924. While the work there is growing, demanding larger quarters, the Commission did not feel it could approve of the plan that was presented.

Report of the Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, for 1923.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

During the year 1923 the Trustees of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen directed the distribution of income of the Automatic Pension Fund among ten beneficiaries, each receiving \$259.71.

The income from the Rebecca Goodwin Pension Fund was distributed among ten beneficiaries, the amount distributed being \$1,440.

The income of the Fund for the Relief of Clergymen and their Dependents was distributed as follows: To two clergymen \$800, to the widows of six clergymen \$1,300, to the families of three deceased clergymen \$100 each.

The details regarding the condition and investment of the Funds will be found in the report of the Treasurer of the Trustees.
