CANON 1, § II.

OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

From a Parish.

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election, in the following form:

[Name of the Church, the Place, and Date]

This certifies that at a meeting of the congregation of this Church, held for the purpose of electing Church Officers, and Deputies, and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention (or for the purpose of electing Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, if the meeting be for that object alone), A. B., C. D., and E. F., being communicants of the Church in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Deputies; and B. C., D. E., and F. G., also being communicants in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Alternate Deputies to represent the Parish in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand (or if two Wardens subscribe, we have set our hands), the day and year above written.

N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary sign, then the signatures of both Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-incharge, or Missionary, cannot sign.

From a Mission.

N. B.—Use the same form and substitute the word "Mission" for "Parish" in three places. The Minister-in-charge; or, the Clerk; or, the Warden may sign.

Memoranda:

Not more than three Deputies are allowed from each Parish, and Mission.

Three Alternate Deputies must be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies.

Write Christian names in FULL and LEGIBLY.

Blank forms will be sent by the Secretary of the Convention on or before Easter Monday in each year.

Return Certificates of Election at least one Month before Convention.

Deputies must be Communicants of the Church, and also qualified voters in the Parish or Mission which elects them. (See Canon 6, § II, [4], [5] and [6].)

Rules of Order

THE CONVENTION.

- 1. The Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- The Convention shall meet on the opening day at 9:30 a. m.; with a recess of one hour between 1 and 2 o'clock.
- At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
- 4. At the close of each Convention, the Minutes shall be corrected and approved.
- The doors of the Convention shall be open for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
- 6. All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convention shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall record their attendance.
- Clergymen of other Dioceses, and Candidates for Holy Orders, who may be present, shall be admitted to honorary seats in the Convention on the presentation of their names to the Secretary.
- 8. When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
- When any member is about to speak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
- 10. No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply), in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
- 11. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
- 12. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate, but any member may appeal from the decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention. The general procedure of the Convention shall be governed, unless otherwise provided for, by the rules of parliamentary practice as set forth in "Robert's Rules of Order."
- 13. A Committee consisting of the Bishops, ex-officio, five other clergymen and five laymen, to be known as the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, shall be appointed at each Convention to prepare the official Ballots and the Calendar of Business, for the next Annual Convention.

The mode of conducting the nominations and elections (annually or when such officers are to be elected), of the Standing Committee, of Deputies to the General Convention, of a Treasurer and Auditing Committee, of the Board of Missions and Church Extension (for the retiring class and for vacancies), of members of the Board of Religious Education, Board of Christian Social Service, of six Clerical and six Lay Deputies to the Synod of the Province of New York and New Jersey, of a member of the Ecclesiastical Court, of a Lay Assessor and all other elective officers not otherwise provided for, shall be as follows:

Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations must place in the hands of the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, in writing, on or before noon of the Tuesday in the week preceding the opening day of the meeting thereof, nominations signed by himself for any or all officers mentioned in the above paragraph. Each nominator must certify to the Elections and Rules of Order Committee that the persons nominated by him have consented to the nomination. All names so sent in shall be reported to the Convention by the Committee, at the beginning of the opening session, in the form of a ballot, on which the names shall be arranged alphabetically in each class. After each list of nominations as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks may be filled by any voter. The voter shall mark with an X at the right of the name of each person for whom he votes. On the first ballot these ballots only shall be used, and also in all subsequent ballots, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. No ballot shall be counted in its class, on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled, and the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast.

The Secretary of the Convention shall call for nominations in his usual notice of the date and place of the Annual Convention, and shall, in the same notice, advertise the person or persons designated by said Committee, to whom such nominations shall be sent, with mailing addresses.

The members of Convention shall also be requested, in said call, to send to this Committee any canonical amendments or other important items of business that they may purpose to introduce at the next Convention, so that such matters may be assigned a place on the Calendar of Business. This call shall also be annually inserted in the April number of the official magazine of the Diocese, The Newark Churchman.

Balloting shall take place in a separate room when practicable,

The clerical and lay voting lists shall be divided into two sections each.

Alternate Deputies to the General Convention, and Supplementary Deputies to the Provincial Synod shall be elected immediately after the completion of the election of Deputies thereto.

- 14. Four or more Election Tellers, clerical and lay, in equal numbers, not necessarily members of the Convention, shall be appointed by the President before an election. They shall receive and canvass all votes cast at any election which is required to be by ballot, and when such canvass is completed, shall immediately report its result to the Convention. The polls shall be open for such time as the Convention may, by resolution, direct.
- 15. All reports (usually printed in the JOURNAL), of officers, committees, commissions, and boards of trustees under control of the Convention, shall be printed and distributed by the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order as far as practicable, at least two weeks before the meeting of the Convention; provided that the subject of such printing and reports shall have been referred to the Finance and Advisory Board for consideration, which Board shall have power to supervise, regulate, or to condense the same, and to issue to the Committee or to the Secretary of the Convention such instructions as in the judgment of the said Board will promote greater economy and efficiency in respect to this work.

Reports when read in Convention shall be read by title only, unless the reading be for the better transaction of business.

NEW BUSINESS.

16. All new business introduced, except such as may accompany and form a part of a report of a committee, shall be in the form of a motion or resolution and shall be in writing.

COMMITTEES.

- 17. All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered. It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Diocese to promptly notify the members of all special committees of their appointment.
- 18. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.

MOTIONS AND THEIR ORDER.

- 19. No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
- 20. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it; or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
- 21. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.

VOTING PRIVILEGES.

- 22. All questions shall be decided vive voca, unless otherwise specially ordered.
- 23. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote of the Convention shall be taken by Orders, voting separately; and, when s vote is thus taken a concurrent majority in both Orders shall be necessary to carry any measure.

Mr. Burlingame moved that the two Deputies and the two Supplementary Deputies to the Provincial Synod first elected shall be declared elected for a term of three years; the two Deputies and two Supplementary Deputies second elected be declared elected for a term of two years, and the two Deputies and two Supplementary Deputies third elected be declared elected for a term of one year. The above motion was carried.

The Committee on the Certificates of Lay Deputies presented a report showing that several Parishes and Missions had not presented certificates, and two Mission Certificates were defective. It was stated that if there were present in the Convention Clergy or other authorized officers, they would be given an opportunity to present the certificates that were lacking. On motion the report of the Committee was adopted.

The Polls were declared open for the first ballot, time to be for one-half hour.

The Rt. Rev'd Manuel Ferrando, Suffragan Bishop of Porto Rico, was invited to address the Convention. Bishop Ferrando expressed his appreciation of this courtesy and spoke briefly about his work.

Mr. Howard I. Dohrman, President of the Church Club, gave notice of the dinner to be tendered the members of the Convention at the Robert Treat Hotel this evening.

Mr. James R. Strong, Chairman of the Eagle's Nest Farm Committee, announced that a model of the Camp was on display at Trinity House, where it might be seen during the noon recess.

The various announcements concerning transportation and arrangements for luncheon were made by Mr. Baldwin, the Treasurer.

The polls were ordered closed.

Bishop Lines presented a resolution of sympathy to be sent to the Bishop of Long Island, and also one instructing the Secretary of the Convention to send letters of sympathy to the Rev'd Edwin E. Butler, Mr. Francis Halpin and Mr. Edward Q. Keasbey. The above resolutions were referred to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Convention recess for luncheon, to reconvene at 2:15.

The Convention reconvened at 2:25.

The Committee on the Rights of Lay Deputies presented its report indicating that the House of Prayer, Newark, had not paid its Diocesan Assessment for the years 1923 and 1924.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the report of the Committee be accepted.

The Rev'd George P. Armstrong presented the following

Report of the Committee on New Parishes.

The Committee on New Parishes reports that it has received the application of St. Agnes', Little Falls, for admission into union with the Convention and has seen and examined the required Canonical documents, or certified copies thereof, and recommends that such church be admitted into union with the Convention.

GEORGE P. ARMSTRONG, JAMES T. LODGE, CHARLES R. WILMOT.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the report be accepted and that St. Agnes', Little Falls, be admitted.

The Bishop Coadjutor read his 10th Annual address (Vide, Index).

The Order of the Day being taken up, the Rev'd Edwin S. Carson presented the

Report of the Diocesan Committee on the Revision of the Prayer Book.

The Diocesan Committee on Revision of the Book of Common Prayer appointed at the Convention of the Diocese of Newark, 1924, respectfully submits its report. Three meetings of the Committee have been held during the year. At the first meeting held in the Diocesan House, on February 4th, 1925, the Chairman indicated the office and purpose of the Committee, vis.; to consider the changes made and proposed in the Book of Common Prayer by the Joint Commission on Revision and to report at this Convention their views and recommendations as to said revision.

The Committee took up first the consideration of the OFFICE OF HOLY COM-MUNION according to the 3rd Report of the Joint Commission. It was suggested that those of the clergy in this Committee that had not given the new Office a practical trial in their several parishes should do so, with the consent and approval of the Bishops of the Diocese, and report at the next meeting of the Committee. With regard to the SUMMARY OF THE LAW, as recommended by the Joint Commission, it was the opinion of those who had used the proposed office that there is an undesirable repetition in the additional words "Again he saith: "A new commandment I give unto you, that ye love one another: as I have loved you, that ye also love one another." It was voted that this Committee express its preference for the omission of this additional phrase as being unnecessary and causing an undesirable break in the order and continuity of the Communion Office. The other proposed changes and additions in the Office for Holy Communion were considered successively and approved, and finally the Committee voted approval of the entire Office for Holy Communion in its revised form with the single exception noted above. It was the unanimous opinion of the Committee that the "Prayer of Humble Access," beginning with the words "We do not presume to come to this thy Table, O merciful Lord," had been inserted by the Joint Commission in its rightful and logical place, immediately preceding the actual reception of the Sacred Elements. This arrangement of the prayer, in the opinion of your Committee, follows the best liturgical use and places the Prayer of Humble Access where it rightfully belongs. The Office for Holy Communion has been enriched even further by the Fourth Report of the Joint Commission, wherein certain changes have been made in the Collects, Epistles and Gospels to be used throughout the year, and it is recommended that the proposed alterations be made known to the several Dioceses in order that they may be adopted by the Convention in accordance with the provisions of Article X of the Constitution.

Lack of space prohibits your Committee from making a report in detail of these proposed changes and alterations which will make for the enrichment of the Book of Common Prayer on Special Occasions; such as the Feast of the Dedication of a Church, Independence Day, The Burial of the Dead, and other occasions for which no special service is provided in the present Book of Common Prayer.

In reference to the other offices of the Proposed Book of Common Prayer, your Committee voted approval of:

- 1. The Order for the Burial of the Dead
- 2. The Burial of a Child
- 3. The Ministration of Holy Baptism
- 4. The Form of Solemnization of Matrimony

and also Recommendation No. 5 in the Third Report of the Joint Commission on Revision regarding the Order of Confirmation; the same being the Exhortation of the Bishop to the Candidates.

In the opinion of your Committee, after due consideration of the importance and history of the 39 Articles as found in the back of the Book of Common Prayer, it was

recommended that these so-called Articles of Religion be omitted from the Proposed Book of Common Prayer, or printed separately in book form, and not be included in the future recommendations of the Joint Commission to the General Convention.

In submitting this report, your Committee desires to go on record as having examined carefully the several reports of the Joint Commission, as they have been printed from time to time, and would recommend to this Convention the adoption of the final report of the Joint Commission with very few changes or alterations. Your Committee begs, however, to offer the following resolutions:

1. Whereas, In the opinion of the Special Committee appointed by the Diocese of Newark to consider the Revision of the Prayer Book, the additional wording in the Summary of the Law on page 76 of the Proposed Revision of the Book of Common Prayer (2nd edition), beginning with the words "Again he saith, etc." is considered to be in the nature of an undesirable break in the continuity of the Communion Office; be it

Resolved, That this Convention petition the Joint Commission on Revision of the Book of Common Prayer to omit this additional phrase and permit the use of the Summary of the Law as it now stands in the Book of Common Prayer.

2. Whereas, The several reports of the Joint Commission on Revision of the Book of Common Prayer make no mention of the continuance or discontinuance of printing the 39 Articles in the Proposed Book of Common Prayer; be it

Resolved, That this Convention of the Diocese of Newark petition the next General Convention to omit the said 39 Articles of Religion in the proposed Book of Common Prayer or have the same printed separately in book form, and not be considered a part of the proposed Book of Common Prayer to be approved by the General Convention.

The report of the Standing Committee was presented by Title by the Rev'd Luke M. White. (Vide, Index.) On motion the report was accepted.

Mr. Frank L. Crawford presented the following

Report, Canonical Committee of the Diocese of Newark on the Church Pension Fund.

To the Diocesan Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The Canonical Committee on the Church Pension Fund respectfully reports as follows on its operations for the calendar year 1924:

Total assessments collected _______\$28,852.77

There are no parishes, missions or other ecclesiastical organizations in arrears for 1924, and all the parishes in the Diocese are reported as having come into the Pension System. The Secretary of the Church Pension Fund writes as follows, on May 6th, 1925:

"I find that the Diocese of Newark is, according to our records, 100% paid for the year 1924. In other words, according to our assessment books, every church in the Diocese and every other ecclesiastical organization in the Diocese, which should pay pension assessments in accordance with the Canons, has paid to us every cent of the pension assessments due for the entire year 1924."

The total annual grants of the Church Pension Fund throughout the Church and of the grants which the Fund is carrying on account of the General Clergy Relief Fund, with the other merged funds and the General Convention of 1907 Account, on January 1st last, amounted to a grand total of \$512,157 per annum, being an increase of \$25,443 over the total annual grants in force at the end of the year 1923.

The Trustees of the Fund have continued in force the immediate additional benefit of \$1,000 for the widows of elergymen dying in active service, whose assessments have been fully paid, and this provision has been extended to include widows of elergymen who die within six months after relinquishing their last cure, provided they are not already beneficiaries of the Fund.

In connection with the above report, the Rev'd Clarence M. Dunham requested information concerning the possible payment of the gift of \$1,000 to the dependents of single Clergy at their death, as well as to the widows of deceased Clergy. Other members of the Convention spoke on the same matter, following which the report of the Committee was received.

Following the above action, a resolution was presented along the lines indicated in the above discussion and was referred to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions.

Archdeacon Elmendorf presented the following

Report of the Finance and Advisory Board.

1925.

To the Members of the Convention:

The Finance and Advisory Board submits herewith its fifth Annual Report,

The Budget for the year 1926 is tentative only, as it is impossible to state at this time what the National Council will sak us to contribute as our share of the expense of the work of the General Church until after the meeting of the General Convention

in the Fall. We suggest that power be given to this Board to make whatever adjustment may be necessary when the apportionments on the various Dioceses are made known.

The budget for the Diocese which is annually presented is what we ought to have to adequately maintain the work already established and for such advanced work as the rapidly increasing population and new opportunities seem to require. It will be noted that the budget is divided into two parts. First, that part which is met by the assessment on Parishes, and second, the remainder, and by far the larger part, dependent upon the free will offerings of the people for non-parochial work over and above what is required to meet the assessment.

Each year there has been a wide gap between what is asked for and what is actually received and the Board has annually, after the pledges from the Every Member Canvass in the Fall have been received, made a minimum budget based upon what the offerings will permit us to do.

To ask for more money for Diocesan work has no great appeal stated merely as a financial problem. When it is known that the money is asked in order to carry on and increase the wonderful ministry of the institutions and agencies that we have; that it is needed if we are to pay the increase in the stipends of the clergy; that the population in some parts of the Diocese is increasing or rapidly that we must have new Missions established; that opportunities for increasing our work among the foreign are pressing—then it is that the asking for money assumes a spiritual note and it appeals to those who are interested in putting forward the work of Christ and His Church.

The Diocese is carrying on a great and fine work. It has an appeal to the hearts and consciences of people second to none. What can be finer than to have a good part in ministering to the poor and needy in alms houses and jails; to assist wayward girls to attain new ideals of womanhood; to minister to homeless boys; to shepherd our people who are coming in such large numbers to the towns and villages springing up in many parts of the Diocese, and to answer the appeals that come from the foreignborn who form so large a part of the population of the Diocese.

This work is preëminently the work of Christ. The opportunity is ours and we ought to meet it. To do so we must have more support. Your Board has again and again had to refuse help because of lack of funds. We ask you to make the work and opportunities of the Diocese known to the people. When they know what the Diocese is doing they will have a just pride in the Church and will give generously to its support.

In regard to the amounts contributed by the parishes and missions, the Finance and Advisory Board recommends the following principles of distribution:

That, until the Diocese and the National Council have each received \$146,100.00 Quota contributions will be divided equally between them.

That, after this, the entire amount received will be sent to the National Council, until it has received \$194,000.00.

That, after this, contributions for Priorities and Advance Work be divided equally between the National Council and the Diocese.

Norm.—In addition to the above, the tentative Quota of the National Council for the Diocese of Newark includes \$86,000.00 for Priorities and Advance Work in the Church at large. This amount is indicated and urged upon the attention of the parishes, but will not be included in the quotas apportioned to the parishes and missions.

We offer the following resolutions:

- 1-Resolved, That the Convention approves the Diocesan Assessment for 1926 as presented in the report of the Finance and Advisory Board.
- 2-Resolved, That the Finance and Advisory Board is herewith given authority to levy an assessment on parishes at such rate to cover the above amount,
- 3-Resolved, That the Convention approves of the tentative Budget for 1926 as presented in the report of the Finance and Advisory Board.
- 4—Resolved, That in case the General Convention shall lay upon the Diocese such an apportionment as shall make necessary a change in the Diocesan apportionment, that the Finance and Advisory Board be empowered to make such alterations as may be necessary or advisable.

Resolutions 1 and 2 contained in the above report were adopted as read.

Resolution 3 being presented, it was moved and seconded that the same be adopted. Considerable discussion on this Resolution then followed. A substitute resolution was proposed, setting the amount of the Tentative Budget for 1926 at \$225,000 instead of \$369,219. The substitute being lost, the original Resolution was subsequently adopted.

The 4th Resolution in the above report was adopted with the addition at the end of the words "or advisable."

The Rev'd Charles E. Hutchison spoke on the matter of the work of the Canons Missioner, pointing out the fact that even if it might be advisable to employ laymen for this work, it would be impossible to get them except at considerably higher salaries than are paid Clergymen for the same work.

The Rev'd Guy H. Madara presented the following

Report of the Department of Development and Revenue.

During the year 1924 the Department of Development and Revenue has functioned as provided by the Canons of the Diocese; having in mind always the fact that the service it rendered to the Diocese is largely contingent on the service rendered to the individual Parish or Mission. It has kept before itself the objective set for it by the Diocesan Convention, viz.; that in every Parish and Mission there should be an Every Member Canvass following an adequate preparation and promptly carried out. Through its constituent membership, and through letters, etc., it has sought to keep the Parishes and Missions in harmony with the plan of having a monthly remittance sent in to the Diocesan House.

Its members have given freely of their time in going to Parishes and Missions of the Diocese and consulting with the Rectors, Treasurers; Nation Wide Campaign Chairmen, and Vestries. Many of the men have also made long trips to address meetings of congregations where requested.

Contributions in 1924 amount to a total of \$206,000.65, which is the largest amount received in the Diocese of Newark since the year 1920. Fifty per cent of this, or \$103,000, was sent to the National Council in New York, and the other half used in the Diocese of Newark. Attention is again called to the fact which many of our people do not know, that the Red Side of the envelope does more than carry contributions to Missions. The support and maintenance of the Bishops and the staff at 21 Washington Street; the help given to the Missions of the Diocese; the supple-

mentary stipends to the clergy receiving less than the minimum; Religious Education work of the Diocese; and the Social ministries of the Diocese, including Bonnie Brae Farm, House of Good Shepherd, Home for Widows, Church Mission of Help and other fruitful ministries, are financed through one-half of the contents of the Red Side. The other half of the contents of the Red Side is our contribution to the upkeep of the National Council and the work of the Church wherever the Church has a Mission station, whether it be in the Missions in the Continental field in the United States, or in Foreign Countries, such as Japan, China, Liberia, Brazil, Mexico, Haiti, Philippine Islands, Alaska, Honolulu, Dominican Republic and Panama Canal Zone.

Special activities of the Department during this year were as follows:

BISHOP REMINGTON.

Arrangements were made for Bishop William P. Remington of Eastern Oregon to spend ten days in the Diocese. A rather heavy schedule was prepared for him and in spite of snow storms and bad weather the whole schedule was carried out. Bishop Remington's visit gave opportunity to many of our people to hear him and to attach personal interest to the missionary work in his district.

LENTEN LECTURE.

A set of lantern slides was procured from the National Council bearing on the Japan Reconstruction Fund; during Lent these slides were used in a large number of our Churches, the lecture being given by the faithful body of Information Men, assisted by members of the Young People's Fellowship of the Diocese.

EAGLE'S NEST FARM CLERGY CONFERENCE.

The Department co-operated in making this Clergy Conference at Eagle's Nest Farm a success. At one of the evening sessions the plans of the Department for the year were presented and received the hearty endorsement of the Clergy present.

BISHOPS' VISITATION.

The Department prepared the schedule for this Visitation and made all local arrangements for properly carrying it to completion.

INFORMATION MEN.

During the summer addresses were prepared for the use of the Information Men and the men were reorganized for service early in the fall. They spoke in many of the Churches, using the addresses on the Missionary Work of the Church in Foreign Fields and in the Diocese of Newark.

In this connection the Department again desires to call attention of the Rectors to the value of this work, not only for the information brought to the Parishes, but for the effect upon the men who give the addresses; and the Department requests that names of men who might suitably be asked to join this group be sent to headquarters at 21 Washington Street.

NEIGHBORHOOD DINNERS.

The Department made all arrangements for the Neighborhood Dinners which were held in eleven districts of the Diocese last year; secured speakers, and where necessary arranged for the dinner to be served. These dinners have aroused much friendly comment and their continuation next fall has been arged from many quarters.

MASS MEETING.

The Parishes in Warren and Sussex Counties joined in a large Mass Meeting at Christ Church, Hackettstown, which was addressed by Bishop Cross of Spokane, Bishop

Lines of our own Diocese, and Canon Madara. These mass meetings have taken a large part in the religious life of the western counties and have great value.

PARISH MEETINGS.

Requests were received by the Department for speakers for Parish Meetings, both Annual and Special; and in no case was there failure to supply a good speaker for these meetings. The objective always was to arouse the interest of the congregation in the Missionary life of the Church and in the method adopted in this Diocese through the Every Member Canvass to meet the needs that are so apparent.

PULPIT EXCHANGE.

On November 16th a general exchange of pulpits was arranged by the Department whereby the responsibility of the Parish for the work of the Church in the Diocese, the Nation and the World was presented by the clergy in Parishes other than their own.

PLEDGE CARDS.

The Department secured from the National Council an adequate number of pledge cards and supplied them to all churches throughout the Diocese desiring to use the general form.

CHURCH AT WORK.

The Department continues to care for the distribution of this paper, which is growing in influence throughout the Church. Every Parish and Mission has an adequate number of copies for distribution locally.

CHRISTMAS LETTERS.

Correspondence has been had with each one of the Missionaries in Foreign Fields who have gone out from this Diocese and the Christmas number of the Newark Churchman contained many interesting Christmas notes from these Missionaries who are representing our Diocese in the Foreign Fields.

NATION WIDE CAMPAIGN FOLDER.

The Department prepared and sent out on requisition the Nation Wide Campaign Folder, which has been distributed in every Parish and Mission of the Diocese,

PLEDGES FOR 1925 .

The total amount pledged for the Diocese for 1925 is about \$205,500, which is \$4,300. more than the amount pledged for 1924. However, when the complete report above that this pledge is only \$4.20 per communicant, which means \$2.10 for the Diocese and \$2.10 for all the work outside of the Diocese, each year, it can easily be seen how far we are from our real possibilities.

In closing the Department wishes to emphasize again the fact that the Cause of Christ in the World can progress only as the members of the Parishes and Missions become aware of its wide fluing influence in the moral and ethical life of the world as well as the ministry through social and educational agencies. It cannot emphasize too strongly the tremendous value of adequate preparation for an Every Member Canvass and of a prompt and efficient handling of the Canvass, which should be completed within two or three weeks and report thereon promptly made to Diocesan headquarters.

GUY H. MADARA, Secretary. Mr. P. C. H. Papps, Chairman of the above Department, spoke informally on the work of the Department and presented figures showing the per capita contributions for Mission Work of various classes of Parishes and Missions.

The Auditing Committee and the Committee on Securities respectfully report that the accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocese of Newark and those of the Department of Development and Revenue, for the year ended December 31, 1924, have been audited and the Diocesan Funds verified on behalf of the two committees by Frederick P. Schaefer & Company, Certified Public Accountants, whose reports on the audits are submitted herewith.

The report of the auditors on the Department of Development and Revenue contains the following summary of transactions for the year:

Receipts, \$226,411.68; Disbursements, \$230,158.51; Excess of Disbursements over Receipts, \$3,746.83; Unexpended Balances of January 1, 1924, \$11,622.56; Unexpended Balances as of December 31, 1924, \$7,875.73.

At the request of the Chairman, Canon Leslie spoke briefly about the work of the Foreign Born Department and the Rev'd William J. White of our great opportunities and responsibilities for increased Missionary Work in Bergen County.

Mrs. Stephen S. Johnson presented the work of the Woman's Auxiliary. The Rev'd Dr. Walkley presented the following

Report of Special Committee Appointed in Accordance of the Action of the Diocesan Convention of 1924 in the Matter of Assistance to Our Bishops.

The Bishops in conference with both Standing Committee and the Finance and Advisory Board appointed Rev'd C. T. Walkley, Rev'd D. S. Hamilton, Mr. James R.

Strong and Mr. E. O. Stanley to consult and discuss with the Diocesan and others, the matter of assistance to the Bishops. At a meeting at which the Committee and the Bishops frankly discussed this subject, it appears that two lines of action are open.

First—Episcopal assistance. The need in this direction is primarily to relieve in visitations. This the Bishops assure us it not urgent and the Committee is advised that no further discussion upon this phase of the subject is necessary.

Secondly—The real pressure upon our Bishops is "the serving of tables." The work of the Diocese has, through increase of parishes and missions, brought an immense amount of detail of administration which could be delegated to properly authorized persons who could relieve the Bishops of a number of legal and canonical details.

After one has sat upon the Standing Committee for a number of years, or served on the Board of Missions, one cannot help but realize that a modern hishopric involves the Diocesan in many routine duties that belong to a notary, an authorized scaretary or a special agent. Such a person could relieve our Bishops of many burdensome hours and leave them free to read and study the real problems of the Diocese and the Church.

In the next place, there ought to be some one skilled in the Nation Wide Campaign who would assume the responsibility for publicity, organization and parochial interest in missions.

The Roman Catholics have just completed a campaign for Missions. The Society for the Propagation of the Faith has by very skillful management presented their cause to the faithful. They have probably borrowed the scheme from the Nation Wide Campaign, but they have developed it in a way we have not been wise enough to do.

Our first campaign began with a fine program of publicity. There has been in some of the larger parishes at least a steady decline. The initial impetus of publicity, interest and propaganda was suddenly removed and public attention has since dwindled and faded away. We have lost power because we failed to follow up the first campaign. But it has been realized wonderfully as a parochial asset and the Nation Wide Campaign should be credited with the enormous increase in parochial giving. That is all very good, but the Church and Her Mission, as represented by the National Council, has been lost sight of. Her splendid program, her national and international ambitions are practically ignored in the parochial campaign.

The red side of the envelope is, for very many people, a negligible quantity. To remedy this altuation would free the minds of the Bishops and would assure the Church in this Diocese of an enlightened and awakened membership of the purposes of these annual campaigns: The confusion in the mind of the average layman about this is to be found in every Parish. The three-fold purpose—Parish, Diocese and National Church—is yet to be clearly apprehended.

It might be well to invent a new envelope by which—black would indicate Parish, purple the National Church and red the Diocese. Some parishes have abandoned the Duplex envelope and frankly devote a certain proportion of the single Parish offering to the Diocese and a certain proportion to the National Church. This seems ideal but is open to this serious objection: the giver loses sight of the object of his gift. He knows he gives a lump sum but—every Sunday he, by the Duplex system, must see red at least every Sunday. It would be greatly to the advantage of the Church if he could see the Purple of the Holy Catholic Church throughout the world every Sunday as well. To bring this or any other scheme to every member of the Church in this Diocese is one of the imperative needs of the hour and can only be done by one skilled in the art of publicity.

In the third place, Relief should be given to the Bishops in the economic administration of the Diocesan House. So much is done there that some executive head ought to supervise.

In the matter of establishing missions at strategic points, there should be some wise method devised whereby the Church could be planted in Missions and Sunday Schools established and contiguous parishes, which see only their own needs, he deprived of the right to impede the progress of the Diocese. As at present constituted, the system makes it possible for a priest or a vestry to deprive the Church of new missions and prospective parishes. This is a difficult subject.

But one of the heaviest burdens upon the shoulders of the Bishops today is their utter helplessness to establish missions in the face of parochial objections.

To render them assistance and relief we should do one of two things: (a) Establish a Council of Appeal. When a rector or a parish refuses to grant permission to establish a Mission, the Bishops or the Parish shall have recourse to a Council of Appeal, which shall determine for or against the parish.

Or (b), we should give power to the Board of Missions to establish missions upon the recommendation of the Bishop of the Diocese. This would remove from the Bishops a heavy burden and release the Church from a paralysing parochial veto and make it possible for the Church to take advantage of the opportunities here in the Diocese of Newark, that probably are unmatched in any other Diocese in the country.

Surely this Convention should enter into the spirit of progress—release our Bishops from the serving of tables,

"Wherefor look ye out among you one of good report, full of the Spirit and of wisdom, whom the Bishops may appoint over this business." The progress of the Church is more important than the rights of any parish.

The Committee on Legislation, to which was referred the matter of petitioning the Legislature of New Jersey for such legislation as might be necessary to carry out the intention of the resolutions adopted by the Convention of 1924 in reference to changes desired in the Statute Law regarding the personnel and number of Trustees of the General Chapter of the Cathedral of All Saints' in the City and Diocese of Newark, reports that it has had the matter under consideration, and an amendment of the statute law was prepared and submitted to the representatives of the General Chapter for their approval. No word having been received from the General Chapter regarding the proposed amendment, no further action was taken by the said Committee.

Your Committee, therefore, reports progress, and asks to be continued.

The Committee appointed consisted of the Rev'd E. S. Carson, Rev'd Allen Greene, and Mr. C. Alfred Burhorn.

Mr. John G. Crawford presented the report of the Registrar and made certain remarks concerning the work of this office. (Vide, Index.)

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions, reporting through the Rev'd Charles L. Gomph, moved that the Trustees of the Church Pension Fund be memorialized to place the dependents of single Clergymen on the same basis as that of married Clergymen.

Considerable discussion by various members of the Convention followed this motion.

The Rev'd F. S. Leach presented the following as a substitute resolution:

Resolved, That the Convention of the Diocese of Newark respectfully calls the attention of the Trustees of the Church Pension Fund to the fact that justice demands that the heirs of unmarried Clergy should be included among those to whom a grant is made at the time of death, and so recommends.

The substitute resolution was seconded and carried.

The Nominating Committee appointed above presented the following report:

To fill Clerical vacancies in list of Supplementary Deputies to the Provincial Synod for the term of one year, the Rev'd A. T. Doughty, and Rev'd A. R. McWilliams; for the term of two years, the Rev'd Allen Greene, and Rev'd Victor W. Mori; for the term of three years, the Rev'd Thomas A. Hyde. To fill the Lay vacancy, Mr. William Bal.

The report was adopted and the above were declared elected.

The Rev'd E. A. White gave an interesting account of the work and benefits of the Corporation for the Relief of Widows and Children.

The Rev'd Allen Greene gave an informal report on the work of the Board of Religious Education, and in the course of his remarks stated that the Mite Box Offering for this year would undoubtedly reach the total of that of 1924, i. e., about \$20,000. (Vide, Index.)

Bishop Lines reported that the total of the United Thank Offering this Triennium, as announced at the Woman's Auxiliary Presentation Service last week, amounted to \$33,259.56, which is about \$6,000 over the preceding Triennium.

Mr. John G. Crawford stated that he would present in due time the report of the Diocesan Altar Guild.

Mr. Arthur E. Barlow, President of the Newark Diocesan Assembly of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, reported on the work of that Order, stressing the work of the Camps, particularly Camp John Wood, which will be held again this year at Eagle's Nest Farm.

Mr. John G. Crawford presented the

Report, Committee on the Commemoration of the Tenth Anniversary of the Bishop Coadjutor.

The members of Convention of 1924 will recall that a resolution was then adopted calling for the appointment of a Committee "to prepare in the best possible way for an appropriate observance of the Tenth Anniversary of the Consecration of Rt. Rev'd Wilson R. Stearly, D.D., Bishop Coadjutor. The date of said Tenth Anniversary is October 21, 1925."

Pursuant to said resolution and before naming all the Committee, Bishop Lines' call was answered by four clergymen and four laymen, who met at the Diocesan House on May 11. Bishop Lines presided and after consultation appointed the following as the complete committee:

After voting that the Chairman and Secretary report to Convention the organization of the Anniversary Committee, adjournment took place, subject to the call of the Chairman.

After closing remarks by the Bishop Coadjutor and the reading of the Minutes, a hymn was sung. The Bishop Coadjutor read the closing prayers and the blessing was given by Bishop Lines.

The Convention adjourned sine die.

The Episcopal Address

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

Following the example of former years I read the names of officers of the Diocese and Parishes who have been taken from us within the year. Three of our Bishops have died, Rt. Rev'd Dr. Nichols, Dr. White and Dr. Bliss, the first two after long service, having been with me at the Berkelcy Divinity School. But one of our clergy has died, Rev'd Archdeacon Carter, and he was one of the most devoted of our number, great servant of the Diocese and lover of his Church. The list of laymen is long, S. Wood McClave, Senior Warden and one of the Founders of Trinity Church, Grantwood: Robert A. Laurie, Treasurer of St. Mark's, West Orange; William J. Fischer, Senior Warden of Christ Church, Hackensack; Leonard Pickaart of St. Clement's, Hawthorne; Fred P. Fairbanks, long an officer of St. John's, Passaic, and member of the Diocesan Convention; Joseph H. Harris, officer of Trinity, Paterson; William P. Elliot, long an officer of Grace Church, Rutherford, dying at the age of ninety-one, a devoted servant of the Church; Edwin A. Bradley, long a Warden of St. Luke's, Montclair, a delegate to the Convention and a very useful member of its Financial Board; Mr. Walter S. Jellerson of St. John's, Bayonne. I should surely record here the names of Mrs. William Read Howe, whose works of charity in the Diocese and in St. Barnabas' Guild for Nurses were numberless; Miss Anne Gilbert, of the Church Periodical Club; Miss Caroline West Colton, who, unhappily for us, did not live to see her great plans for the Girls' Friendly Society completed.

The Jubilee year of the Diocese has been kept since the last Convention. The Churches were visited in October by the Bishops and representative men and women of the Diocese, and everywhere parishioners received their messages and greetings. There were many large congregations and everywhere the expression of very real interest. Those who went on the visitation, and those who received them in the Churches, expressed satisfaction in the pilgrimage. The Diocesan relation was made more real and Diocesan feeling was deepened.

At the Thanksgiving Service on November 13th, Grace Church, Newark, was filled with the Clergy and representatives of the Parishes and our Organizations. The Presiding Bishop, the Right Rev'd Dr. Talbot, preached a very thoughtful sermon and many messengers and messages came to

mark the memorable Anniversary. The suggestion was made that every Parish mark the Jubilee year with some noteworthy act, first of all of a distinctly spiritual character in the building up of worshipping congregations, in the removal or decrease of Church debts, in the creation of special funds or in making special gifts. A summary of these undertakings, as far as reports have come in, show that many Parishes have heeded the requests of the Bishops to make the year for our Parishes also memorable.

The summary indicates \$162,826 given to remove or reduce Church debts; \$588,341 paid or pledged for new undertakings, acquisition of Church property, etc.; \$148,225 for the increase of Endowment Funds; \$303,429 in bequests for Parishes and Hospitals, a total of \$1,202,821—a very gratifying part of our Jubilee year observance in which about one hundred of our Churches have shared.

Our work has gone on with encouragement during the year, while the old saying has proved true that the more we do, the more we desire to do in the development of the Diocese and the increase of its usefulness. The return for growth comes in the sense of larger opportunity and a more insistent call to go forward, while we may all rejoice that we are called to work in so good a field, and that there are so many evidences of genuine interest in Religion and love for the Church, whose children and servants we are. "The lot is fallen unto me in a fair ground; yea, I have a goodly heritage." We have looked back over our half century as a Diocese, and further still as part of the Diocese of New Jersey, and we have called to mind the faithful services of a great company of devoted men and women who laid the foundations, often in weakness, upon which we build in strength and hope. If we compare our day with the day of small things in which those who went before us had to work, we have reason for abundant joy. If those who in great love for the Church in former days could have seen what our eyes see in the way of progress, their hearts would have been filled with gladness. We have done well to call to mind in all our Parishes those who went before us, and we shall be the poorer if we forget them.

Our faces are set forward and we march on, not content to tell the story of what lies behind. We are mindful of our difficulties and the hindrances to our work, while we plan large things for the future and meet together today to bid one another take heart and courage for the glorious task committed to us.

Some will make account of the unsettlement in every department of life and thought, of the changes which come to hinder the progress of good Religion and express discouragement, but we will say to them, in the words of Holy Scripture: "Yea, I know it, hold you your peace." It will never do for those who are enlisted in the service of a great cause to make account only of difficulties, forgetting Whom they serve and that there is

no discharge in the war in which we are engaged. No good man, as the Psalmist taught us, gets into the seat of the scornful and the cynical. Be not disturbed by the controversies and discussions which are going on about us concerning Religion. Although distracting to the unsettled, they are, in a way, evidences of life. Good Religion is not likely to suffer from reverent inquiry and questioning. We had to expect discord, violence and lowered standard of morals after the great war had let loose the passions of men and made the killing of those who speak a different language the world's chief business. Christianity had to be put to the test as the superficial character of the Religion commonly accepted was revealed. Nations, as well as individuals, must order their affairs by Christian principles before there can be peace and progress in the world. There will be questioning and controversy concerning Religion as long as the world shall stand. It may be more acute at one time than another, but Religion is the great concern of human life and cannot be crowded out.

I am not unmindful of what is being said and done in the world, of the neglect of the Church as organized Religion, the discordant voices which are heard, but it is all that those things which cannot be shaken may remain, and that we, having received a Kingdom which cannot be moved, may go on without fear of the outcome. There was never more interest in Religion, never more books written about it or more serious questions asked than today. The Church must answer those questions in a way which will satisfy the reason, and meet the needs and aspirations of thoughtful men and women. The Church must not be put on the defensive, but must be aggressive, with a sense of power and the joy of fighting for a great cause. While always ready to give a reason for the faith that is in us, the less time spent on side issues, inferior questions and definitions of what cannot be defined, the better. We are making the discovery concerning the spiritual world and Religion which was made four hundred years ago of the material universe, when the very foundations of thought and action were broken up by the discovery that the earth was not the center of the solar system with the sun moving around it. The Bible was quoted to prove that the sun did rise and set, and that the heavens above were but a roof over the earth, and there are persons in the world now taking that attitude concerning Religion not ready to believe the boundless nature of the spiritual order and that as regards the understanding and measuring of the Religion of the Christ, there is no finality.

Religion is more than all the systems which men have fashioned and tried to bind upon the consciences of men. There is finality in the revelation which has come through Jesus Christ to determine conduct, character, duty, destiny, but not to limit the knowledge and love of God or the way in which He reveals Himself to His children. Keep the larger thought about Religion

and the Spiritual Life and let the Spirit of God speak to you and guide you rather than contentious and timid men representing the authority of their sect or party.

Keep with this large thought of the Spiritual Order, the simplicity of your Religion. The great truths of Religion which are essential are simple, summed up in an unwavering faith in Jesus Christ, our Divine Lord and Master. The heart of Religion is a personal relation to Him which means obedience to His teaching, companionship, friendship, fellowship. Read the Gospels and you learn that His Religion is so simple that a child may be an ideal Christian. Verify your judgment concerning discipleship and membership in His Church by what He, Evangelists and Apostles taught, and be willing to go back of the systems and statements of doctrine and formulation of opinions and keep the entrance into the Kingdom of God as wide as it was made in the beginning. Our Blessed Lord did not give rules, but He taught principles, not many, not complicated, easily applied to life by those who accept Him as their Divine Lord and Saviour. Speak not lightly of creeds for they have been the protection of Christian liberty and freedom from the encroachments of systems of theology, which men have tried to bind upon the Church. Creeds are glorious landmarks which reveal how the truth, as it is in Jesus Christ, was stated and held in days long gone, and only thoughtless people will treat them lightly. The common talk about doing away with creeds is not worthy of respect. The representation of them as shackles upon the mind and conscience indicates ignorance as to their office and place in the Christian Church. They do not rigidly and literally mean in every word and phrase upon our lips today what they meant for those who first used them, but they are susceptible of an honest and reasonable interpretation for all the disciples of Jesus Christ.

I say to those who are disturbed by doubts and questionings that the holding of a suspended judgment with prayer for the light and guidance of the Holy Spirit given to lead us into all truth is an entirely honest position. But let due regard be paid to the testimony of the Christian Church through all the ages and especially from the ages close to Our Lord's time. A process of interpretation and understanding of the Christian faith is going on similar to that which has brought our present better understanding and interpretation of the Holy Scriptures. The Bible has become a richer storehouse of truth for life and conduct, for time and eternity, with the proper acceptance of the testimony of history and of the new learning.

This year brings the 1600th Anniversary of the formulation of the Nicene Creed and it may be fitly observed with suitable teaching in all our Parishes, but let those who speak about it remember how it came to be set forth, that in the Creed of Nicea at first, articles which are among those most discussed at the present time did not have place. Let it be said also that

creeds have their authority, not from the pronouncement of councils of the Church, but from the acceptance by the Church generally as expressing what was commonly believed. That is a truth not commonly understood but plainly stated by the greatest students of theology. Rigid, hard literalism is to be avoided in the presentation of whatever is intellectually to be received and held by the Disciples of Jesus Christ. Be thankful that you belong in a Church which has taught you to stand in its congregations and say, "I believe in God, the Father Almighty, and in Jesus Christ His only Son our Lord," and let no one ever say to you without protest that a definite faith is a restriction of liberty in Christ Jesus.

There are two subjects which I wish to commend to you. This Church has always put emphasis upon Public Worship and rightly so for it is at once the recognition of our relation to God our Heavenly Father, and so a vital part of our religion and it is also the expression of our fellowship with one another in Christ, and without it the Church as organized Religion could not survive. Many things have come in to make Christian people less mindful of the supreme importance of Public Worship which need not here be enumerated. My present purpose is not to discuss the nature or the reasonableness of Worship, but to plead with you for its maintenance by your own conduct and by your influence upon others. Against the tendency to forget the assemblying of ourselves together for the offering of prayer and praise, for the confession of our faith, for instruction in sacred things, for the commemoration of the sacrifice upon the cross, we ought to make a determined effort, appreciating the fact that the life and power of our Religion depend upon it. The common talk about finding other ways of maintaining spiritual life by meditation at home, the reading of what is edifying, communion with nature, will not stand the test of reason or experience. Our presence in the House of God is witnessing to our faith and love for Jesus Christ and our absence when not reasonably hindered means forgetfulness of our duty towards Him and of our duty to our brethren. The broadcasted sermon cannot take the place of common worship. Emerson is quoted in the biography of one of the greatest Scotch preachers of our time who was intensely interested in worship, as having said, "Public worship is the most important single function in the life of a nation." The quotation must be warranted from the place accorded it in the volume named. It expresses the great truth that the public recognition of Almighty God, our Heavenly Father, and the coming together in the House of God for such recognition makes the moral and spiritual basis upon which communities and nations must rest if they are truly to live and fill out the high purpose of their creation.

I know what distractions are in the world, how recreation and social life are crowding out the Church and worship, and I know that the work of men is so ordered with pressure upon mind and body and the need of recreation, that old ideas in which many of us were trained concerning the proper use of the Lord's Day must be modified. Those who spend a large part of their Sunday in reading the newspapers, filled with the record of the world's crimes and scandals and what is called sports, appear to me to be committing intellectual and spiritual suicide. The proper place for right minded men and women on the Lord's Day is in the Lord's House, and they are the poorer for not being there. If anyone is to grow upon the noblest side of his nature, he must worship. The soul must be fed and nourished in that way or it will be starved and leave one spiritually poverty stricken. One must be drawn Godwards by worship for his noblest development. You die on your noblest side as reverence ceases to express itself in worship.

The bond of fellowship in its highest and noblest form must be made and maintained through common worship. Those who try to get on without Religion and the open expression of it with their brethren have seemed to me, while not ceasing to be good neighbors and friends and in many ways worthy of high respect, to have grown cynical and hard, ceasing to believe in good, losing something of the gentleness and kindness of life which are its fairest flower and fruit. They may retain an interest in good causes and stand for honesty and justice and much that is noble in life, but there is with the loss of worship in the House of God a loss of reverence and a certain fineness and gentleness of character which means the loss of the beauty and glory of life. We owe a debt to other members of the community, to people of every sort and condition in life which can only be paid where the children of God come together as members of one family in their Father's House. Everyone who remains away from public worship mars the offering of praise and worship to the injury of all those who are bound with Him in one family of Christ. We ought to be able to say with the Psalmist: "I was glad when they said unto me, let us go into the House of the Lord." We do well to make the House of God beautiful and well equipped according to our ability. The Clergy must help us by reading the services intelligently and distinctly so that they can be understood by all the people and they must put their heart into it. Our people appreciate good reading, common worship and common praise and they are very One hears the service sometimes read in a reasonable demands. perfunctory way without heart and feeling and he is glad that it is not his Parish Church. The service ought not to be preached, but to be rendered with dignity and feeling by men who would lead their people into the presence of our God with the assurance that where even two or three are gathered together in His name, there our Lord and Saviour is in the midst, the Master of the Feast in the great central act of our worship. We need to get into our worship more of joy and gladness of heart, more variety and closer relation to human life today, that we may go to our work and bear our burdens and meet our responsibilities cheerfully with the companionship of our Risen Lord, all the way. We will not forget that He is a man of sorrows and that His sacrifice upon the cross has touched the world's heart and bound suffering men and women together as nothing else, but we will remember that He is the Risen and Ascended Lord, the giver of joy and hope to all who are ready to receive Him.

There is full enough in life to make anxiety and depression for us all. In the House of God, we need to have our hearts lifted up, the vision of eternal hope and peace opened to us. Men and women of many minds and tastes must come together if these Churches of ours are to live and grow and people must not demand that their own way and ideal shall be accepted. That means that as simplicity should be accepted in life for the common good, so simplicity should be accepted in Religion because it is stamped upon it by our Lord, so also in worship that it may be helpful to the majority of those who come together. Personal tastes and likings should not be pressed. Men should forget their positions in the world and the distinctions which have come to them when they enter the House of God. Women should leave their finery and jewelry at home that people who can have none of these things may feel at home in their Father's House. We must have our minds and hearts so set upon the Worship of Almighty God that the peculiarities among us, the distinctions which have come, personal tastes are not emphasized while the thought of all being children of one common Father, in His presence, dominates all our thoughts and words.

So I make most earnest appeal with you today to lift up this thought of public worship into its proper place, to do everything that you can by your own example and your influence, to build up worshipping congregations, to train up the children and young people to feel the greatness of worship that you may have successors in the places wherein your souls have been fed and nourished and the hope has come to you of life eternal. The children must be taught how to worship and how to use the Prayer Book. Some Parishes are not preparing a succession of worshippers and reverent communicants. Delay not the training of the children to worship.

The second subject which I wish to present to you is an endeavor to lift to a higher plane the support of the Parish, the Diocese and the National Church. The present financial system of the Church now completing its sixth year is generally felt to be the best that has been devised, associating through an annual Every Member Canvass and the use of the Duplex envelopes, the support of the Parish, the Diocese and the General Church. The results have been favorable where there has been a thorough canvass with the subject wisely presented by trained representatives of the Parish for it is laymen's work, to every family and everyone who may properly be asked to contribute. The system has educational value in reminding people of the larger responsibility for the work of the whole Church and in saving them from being parochially minded. The Parishes which limit

their interest and offerings to their own Parish and Community will not prosper. Selfishness kills what is best in Parishes and in men and women alike. The testimony is that the increase of giving through the red side of the Duplex envelope for other than parochial purposes increases always the amount given for the support of the Parish itself. The great majority of people can best give through the use of the generally accepted Duplex envelope, and it is to be commended while nothing disrespectful is said of local and personal ways of giving.

It is known to us that in many Parishes the Every Member Canvass was not made in a thorough and complete way by men of the Parish who had been trained and organized to do this work, and it needs repair now before the year 1925 is older. It must be confessed that a good deal of Church business in our Parishes does not command the respect of the business world to the great injury of the Church. The system of support which is here commended is bringing about better conditions. The officers and the laymen in our Vestries should do all in their power to remove criticism and make the conduct of its business worthy of universal respect. It is far better to get the support of Church work of every kind, back upon the great company of men and women giving from principle and love of the Church according to their ability as a well recognized religious duty and privilege, rather than depending upon a few generous givers and special appeals.

It is an injury to the Church to have so much begging for money at the time of public worship, so many desperate appeals, so many questionable devices to raise money pressed upon the attention of congregations. It is not necessary to represent the Church as a mendicant. It detracts from the worship of the Church and often the appeals and exhortations are more direct and impressive than the preaching. People of means are generally more willing to give when they feel that the people generally are giving according to their ability and not depending upon them. It is not necessary for so many Churches to depend upon Easter offerings to make up deficits which have been accepted without effort to avoid them during the year. We do well to remember that giving for the work of the Church according to our ability- from money which we have earned or acquired honestly to maintain the worship and work of the Church is distinctly a religious duty and privilege and a means of grace. So a plea is here made for a thorough Every Member Canvass and the maintenance of it through the year by reports at the monthly Vestry meeting, and sending forward to the Treasurer at the Diocesan House, what is given for the Diocese and the General Church. The Parish taking good care of its financial affairs is making the conditions favorable for its main business, a spiritual Ministry to the souls and bodies of men. It must be possible in every Parish and Vestry to find

some high minded men who will stand for good business methods persistently until they are accepted.

I commend to you as applicable to undertakings in the Church as in all good causes these words of John Morley, "The exploit in which no one will consent to go first remains unachieved." Only leadership is needed in the Parishes to bring out their resources and to provide for the reasonable needs of Parish, Diocese and General Church. Why allow such a desirable exploit as this to go unachieved because there is no one who will consent to go first?

There are other subjects to which reference has been made in other Convention addresses. The Church cannot afford to slacken effort to make war impossible. With the greatest of all wars which have devastated the world fresh in mind, with its untold loss and misery, all men and women should work for the settlement of disputes between nations and peoples in peaceful ways. Civilizations from the beginning of the world's history have been commonly destroyed by wars due to the ambition, envy and jealousy of nations and especially of rulers and those in high places of authority. The great question before the world is the making of war impossible. The talk about the preparation for war as in the interest of peace recalls what Germany and Great Britain were saying and doing in the years before 1914. In the disordered condition of the world, with so many war-like peoples left, an army and navy must be maintained by a nation which has worldwide relations, as a police force must be maintained in all of our states and cities because there are so many disposed to dishonesty and crime. I listen to the addresses made and broadcasted by army officers and some public men, pleading for enormous appropriations for military purposes and describing in lurid language our defenceless condition when great fleets of hostile nations shall line our coasts and destroy our cities, and I ask myself whence they are coming and if it be not possible to establish such friendly relations with the countries whence these fleets might come that our fears may be diminished. I read of the delegation from Congress under the instruction of naval officers, discovering the defenceless condition of the Panama Canal and I ask if there be not some way of removing the danger other than by an enormous expenditure in the way of military equipment. I read of the maneuvers in the Pacific ocean and the discovery that to make Hawaii a naval base will require the expenditure of untold millions, and I ask why it were not better for us to renew our gentlemen's agreement with Japan and undo as far as in our power the insult of the last Congress of a friendly nation which had kept its agreement, and let the Pacific ocean fill out its peaceful name, a highway for merchantmen rather than ships of war.

We seem settling back into the old and unworthy thought of war as a natural part of the world's life, the training of men to kill men of another

land and speech when we have a dispute with them, against civilization and the religion which we profess. The discoveries which have been made recently in the early homes of civilization, in the valley of the Tigris, and the Euphrates clear down to Ur of the Chaldees whence Abraham came, the Father, whether in race or faith of those who believe in one God our Heavenly Father; or in the valley of the Nile, show that in the beginning men were not warlike but peaceable, interested and proficient in the arts of peace rather than of war. In these days of what we call "advanced civilization" we have fallen behind those who first dwelt on the earth. War is unnatural, unChristian, unnecessary and in this generation, an anachronism. It would seem incredible that before the sense of desolation of fathers. mothers and widows for their dead in the world war is softened, before orphan children have come to youth, we should be talking about war to be expected and to be regarded as having a place in civilized life. I speak not as a pacifist. I believe that our country in entering the great war came to the rescue of civilization, fought what was really a defensive war, the only kind of war that can be approved and wrote one of the noblest parts of its glorious history. I yield to none in honoring our soldiers who risked or gave their lives in the service of their country, while I believe it true that it has been found that the wars which have brought so much misery in the world were unnecessary and might have been avoided. I would like to see this talk about preparedness restrained, this appeal for unmeasured appropriations for military purposes diminished, our country leading the way for arbitration and general disarmament. Our great heroes are not alone men of war, but those who have led the way in discovery and achievement of what makes for happiness and world brotherhood. Without extravagant language, I bid you to hate war and love peace as becomes the Disciples and the followers of the Prince of Peace.

My judgment concerning our duty in respect to the execution of the laws for the restraint of the abuse of strong drink is unchanged. Many officials are saying that the laws cannot be enforced while they are not trying to execute them. Those who make the plea that personal liberty is unduly restricted by these laws should remember that progress in civilization comes through the restriction of personal liberty. If we are to live together in peace and comfort, we must accept limitations of our liberty for the common good. It has been found necessary to forbid or restrict the sale of drugs which are harmful for many people and many occupations which are open to abuse must be closely controlled. The abuse of strong drink had become so destructive of manhood and womanhood, of homes, so injurious to our social and political life that measures as radical as those which go under the name of prohibition were taken. We are a free people and we imposed these laws upon ourselves. The restraint and restriction of a business which everyone recognized as an enemy of the country had been rejected with

contempt and trade in strong drink deserved what came to it. The Federal Government is apparently waking up to an appreciation of what a self-respecting government ought to do while we have to wait for the authorities of our own state and cities to realize what respect for law and self-respect demand. There is no need of stating here what the attitude of political leaders, police authorities very commonly is. The unwise conduct of many friends of prohibition and the difficulty of finding uncorrupt men who command confidence to execute the laws must be recognized, but the best way is straight ahead for those who wish an end to be made of the abuse of strong drink by the execution of the laws which fairly expressed the judgment of the people of the country in an entirely legal way.

As regards the outcome of the endeavor to protect childhood through more rigid laws, I confess to disappointment. That the proposed amendment to the Constitution was open to objection I grant, but many of the so-called arguments against it which appear to have influenced great companies of people were not worthy of respect. Greed, unnatural parents, prejudice, misunderstanding, in my judgment account for the result. There are few things in the state better worth fighting for than the protection of childhood against greed. For myself I wish that the age at which boys and girls might be taken from school and sent into factories was raised from fourteen years to sixteen. But no great cause is ever lost, although its progress may be delayed. We must now obtain the best laws we can through the force of public sentiment in our own state for the defence of the children and put New Jersey in the first rank among enlightened states which will in due time influence the whole country. I wish also we could move our selfish politicians out of the way and give our state a first place in prison reform.

I rejoice in the increase of the membership of the Young People's Fellowship and I am grateful to every rector and everyone who helps in its wise development. The young people in our Parishes need to be brought together and trained to serve the Church and to feel a responsibility for whatever makes for the good of the community. The future belongs to them and they will determine what that future shall be for Church and State alike. We cannot get on without the interest and definite leadership of the clergy, but we must try to raise up among the young people themselves leaders in the service of Religion in Parish and Community life and as champions of good causes. Too long our policy has been one of suppression rather than to encourage expression of the hopes and desires of the new generation. We have left our resources in the youth of the Church largely unused. Our young people have good purposes concerning their own development and usefulness in the world, and it is the time to cease criticism and to give them sympathy and friendship.

This address shall close with the plea for the increase of brotherly kind-

ness between those who bear the Christian name and especially between those who are in the membership of the Church whose children and servants we are. Concerning Church unity, I do not speak at length, having presented the subject to you many times. The lack of such unity hinders the progress of the Church and weakens the moral and spiritual forces upon which the world's better life depends. The hopes of a more marked approach to Church unity have not been fulfilled, largely because of the controversies which have come within nearly every Church and which are to be deplored by all who bear Christ's name. Let no one have other feeling than regret for the discussions which separate Christian brethren of every name. The prosperity of all who are striving for the progress of the Christian Religion will come with the prosperity of each. The preparation for Church unity will require long time for the cultivation of the Christian spirit, the removal of prejudices, for larger thoughts about Religion, the subordination of minor questions, the generous appreciation of the goodness of other Christian people. Its supreme importance if the world is to be won for Christ must never be forgotten and we must make sure that this Church does not hinder the coming of unity by unduly magnifying what is peculiar to itself and lack of appreciation of what other Churches have stood for.

But I have a special desire to plead for greater unity among ourselves, for the subordination of what is not essential to the great purpose of bearing witness for the Christ and bringing in His Kingdom. Religion, worship and teaching are of so great importance that men will naturally feel strongly concerning them and custom and traditional use determine their attitude and make change difficult. We need to have more respect for the opinions and feelings of those who differ from us and the peace and prosperity of the Church depend largely upon brotherly kindness, something beyond tolerance. The life of many Parishes is injured because of the insistence of people upon ways and practices which are not of the first importance. The people who move into our Missions and Parishes come from Churches with different uses and a generous attitude towards other Church ways than our own is required. One of the best forms of discipline and training comes through the ordering of the Church for the common good with differences within the Church not emphasized. We are growing larger minded.

Hardly anything would set this Church forward and increase its influence and usefulness more than the end of a good deal of talk that goes on among us concerning subordinate questions. Our minds must be set upon the great work of doing our Master's will. The Church must be made a Fellowship in which Christian love and good will dominate if it is to prosper. The desire in all of us should be to make the greatest possible contribution to good Religion in our Communities and in the world. The way out for many

a small, struggling Parish is a large and generous spirit and policy in the presentation of Religion, so that the small matters are submerged like obstructions at high tide or when the stream is full. For restraint in speech, for large charity in judgment, for a large and generous kind of Religion, for the keeping of the Church a large place, for the subordination of what is small for the sake of what is great, I make my earnest plea. Greater unity of feeling and action, less talk about different kinds of Churchmanship, the presentation of the idea of a great comprehensive Church and Fellowship are necessary for the progress of this Church. Make sure that your Church and your Parish are stronger for your life. The timid and reactionary lead us nowhere. It is the Master's voice which bids us "neither sit nor stand, but go."

The Bishop Coadjutor's Address

My Dear Brothers in Christ:

I hope you will forgive me if in making my annual report I forbear to give you the statistics of my work and service during the last twelve months. I suppose the summing up of things done:—Confirmations, Baptisms, meetings attended, services held, conferences engaged in, etc., does serve a useful purpose; but I think that at best its utility is in making it clear that one has not been idle, that one has been fairly or even excessively busy. But busyness in itself is of no great importance, the real question is to what end has one been at work, what good objects have been aimed at, what precious things uncovered and appropriated and made to function in the process?

When I look over my journal I am surprised at the number and variety of the contacts and interests which are there reflected. No life could be fuller or more exciting in its alluring combination of daily details and unfolding aims and ideals than that which I am permitted to follow as your friend and pastor.

But what chiefly comes into my consciousness as I review this past year's work is the sense of the beauty and the power of the Christian fellowship which we share together in the Diocese.

As I review the swift passing days there floats across my memory, like succeeding films in a moving picture, the images of the men and women with whom I have taken counsel in the work of Christ, with whom I have labored in planning and purposing, with whom mounting upon the steps of material and transitory business, we have entered together at times into the vision of the fair Kingdom of our Lord and the sense of His presence and power to bless and help His people. What we have conspired together to attempt and what we have accomplished is no great matter; but wonderful is the fellowship we have had in Christ; the consciousness that we were bound together in a heavenly enterprise; that the weapons of our warfare finally were spiritual; and that with limitations and defects enough in personality and character, we could yet each make his special contribution, by God's good grace, to the life and well being of that Church—that body of Christ—we were set to serve and love. When I think of all those, the

men and women, the boys and girls, with whom in these last ten years I have grown into an ever deepening and more precious comradeship in Christ, I find St. Paul's words to the Philippians coming unbidden into consciousness.

(Philippians 1:2-5.) "Grace be unto you, and peace, from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ. I thank my God upon every remembrance of you, always in every prayer of mine for you all making request with joy, for your fellowship in the gospel from the first day until now."

One thinks instinctively of those who have gone to be with Christ in Paradise. The names of many have been read by the Bishop, and others we commemorated in the Holy Sacrament in our opening service this morning.

These shall not be forgotten by us, and the memory of their devotion and love to Christ shall be a flame at once warming and illuminating our spirits.

One remembers in grateful appreciation some who have laid down their tasks among us to enter upon new endeavors; like the Rev'd Dr. Reazor, who after more than thirty years as rector of St. Mark's, West Orange, has given that charge into younger hands; like Dr. Lau, who has gone to the Department for Work among the Foreign Born under the National Council, and the Rev'd Dr. Wasson, who retires from St. Stephen's, Newark, after twenty-five years of valiant and faithful service there. As we follow with our prayers for God's blessing those who go out from us year by year, so also do we welcome with joy and great hope those who come to be our helpers in the common work of the Diocese. Of these there is a considerable number and in your name I bid them welcome to our fellowship in work and prayer.

I wish also in your name to welcome the young men who during the last twelve months have been ordained to the sacred ministry—the Rev'd Donald MacAdie, the Rev'd Karl E. Warmeling and the Rev'd J. Warren Albinson, advanced to the Priesthood, and the Rev'd Lewis R. Howell and the Rev'd William M. Bradner, made Deacons.

And once more let me give as an earnest of good service to come, the names and Parishes of the young men who in the last year have entered upon preparation for Holy Orders—Mr. A. F. Chillson, of St. James', Hackettstown; Mr. L. H. Hinrichs, Christ Church, Glen Ridge; Mr. John H. Keene, Trinity, Arlington; Mr. Harold R. Onderdonk, Atonement, Tenafly; and Raymond Black and Joseph Lewis, of St. Andrew's, Newark.

We have now in the Diocese eleven Postulants and twelve Candidates for Orders, for whom and for others who will soon be joining them let us pray God's blessing that they may learn to be faithful dispensers of the Word of God and of His Holy Sacraments.

I have often wished there could be some way of visualizing or bringing into consciousness the great company of those in our Diocesan fellowship who are helping to carry on the Church's work; the Vestrymen and ushers, the choir singers and the teachers in the Sunday Schools, the members of the many Parish organizations for work, and those who serve upon Boards and Committees of the Diocese or in connection with its Institutions of mercy. What a goodly fellowship all these make, and how inspiring it would be if the whole company could somehow be brought together for common worship and mutual encouragement.

We should not forget that this Convention is the symbol and representative of this goodly company. It is in their name we act; it is of their service we receive reports; it is for them we give thanks and pray the continuance of God's blessing upon their endeavors. Into this fellowship it is our joy year by year to welcome new groups. Gradually the number of our Parishes and Missions increases until now upon our list are 150 names each representing a company large or small of faithful members of the Church, working for the progress of Christ's Kingdom at home and abroad. Those added this year—the Mission of the Redeemer, Palisade Park, and St. Andrew's, Harrington Park, are mainly the result of the eager activity of our Missionary in Bergen County, the Rev'd William J. White, who has within a few months begun a work of laying foundations in that most rapidly growing section of the Diocese upon which we shall be building for many years to come.

I will not take time today to refer to the material accomplishments, nor to dwell upon the special enterprises which have had place in our Diocesan life during the past year.

We have tried to make a faithful record of these from month to month in the Newark Churchman, and most of the members of the Convention are familiar with them; as many have had part in them.

I would rather dwell for a moment longer upon what cannot be recorded and brought into statistical tables, but what is the Church's chief glory and central source of being. The gatherings of the faithful for worship, the instruction of the people in the word of truth, the loving pastoral oversight of true and faithful shepherds, the manifestation of tender sympathy among members of our congregations for each other in times of need and adversity; the careful and systematic seeking for the lapsed and wayward; the mutual encouragement of young and old to good works; I like to think of these things as going on throughout the whole round of the year. For these make the Church what it is; they are the signs and symbols of that which gives the Church its right to exist and its promise of blessing for men.

When we meet in Convention we have to hear reports and revise Canons, to hold elections, to deal with Committees and Institutions, to determine

plans and policies—these things are worthy of our best thought, they are elements making for the prosperity and health of the society as a whole; but it is allowable to suggest that we do well to remember that back of these things are the truths and ideals, the experiences and the hopes, the faith and the knowledge that make us Christians. And year by year we have to ask ourselves, clergy and laity alike, whether we have been faithful stewards in these greater things.

We have been reminded that we stand at the beginning of a new cycle of our Diocesan history; we have entered upon the second half century of Diocesan life. As we think of fifty years to come I wonder if we should not be most well pleasing to our Master and Lord, and at the same time most useful to our day and generation, if we wrote it down that we should try to keep first things first, that we should put our strength into teaching the truth of the Holy Gospels as we have received it, and leading men into the faithful use of the Christian's means of grace.

What men need is knowledge of the truth and a home of the soul. And these are the Church's gifts for men. Our task is to see that they are so presented that they will be laid hold of and cherished.

A beautiful worship participated in by all the faithful in spirit and in truth; a reverent teaching of God's Word to the young; and explanation of the implications of the Christian doctrine to young and old alike; a life of comradeship and helpfulness among those baptised into the name of Christ; the cherishing of a dream of the Reign of God in the hearts of men; and the submission of the wills of God's people to the leadership of the Holy Spirit in endeavoring to bring in that blessed Kingdom; these are worthy ends of our striving; they are the great matters without which everything else comes short. Let us give ourselves to these simple, yet definite and fundamental tasks; not more machinery or greater organization, or fresh definitions, or even better canons, is what we need chiefly to seek for; but a fuller and richer life in Christ, by the power of His Holy indwelling Spirit.

"In returning and rest shall ye be saved," said the prophet, "in quietness and confidence shall be your strength." Here is a true and timely admonition for us all. Almost unconsciously we are tempted to put our trust in things material and temporal, and we know they have and must have their place. But we must keep clear to our minds and hearts that only in fellowship and communion with Christ can our work be done. He is the source of our peace; and there is nothing else beside Him that we have to offer to the world.

There are two matters of a general nature to which I may briefly refer. There is a growing opinion that the whole question of the leading and

management of the missionary work of the Church should receive fresh and careful consideration at the meeting of the General Convention next autumn.

Apparently we are at a turn in the road. The present plan of an inclusive budget and a universal Every Member Canvass marked a step forward; it has produced an increased support of the Church's work all along the line, and permitted the inauguration of considerable new work in the home fields and abroad.

But after five years of trial it manifests weaknesses in its practical operation which cannot be ignored and which must be dealt with. The more important of these could be eliminated and strength be found for another step forward if the General Convention in its devisings could have in view:

- 1. A budget within reasonable reach of attainment by earnest and endeavoring Churchmen. At the present time, owing to the size of the quotas assigned, many Dioceses and Parishes are either entirely discouraged or impenitently hardened. They are either laboring in a defeatist spirit or have ceased to think about the Budget at all. The naming of an amount to be raised by the Church must bear some relationship to the present attainment and state of mind of those who will make the offering. And it must carry with it the possibility of its being raised. For five years conscientious but unavailing efforts have been made in all parts of the Church. A few Dioceses and a certain number of Parishes have met the quota assigned them, but the great majority have failed. This is not because those who have succeeded are either wiser, more diligent or more consecrated than their brethren. On the contrary some of the most efficient and self sacrificing endeavor has gone into this work in Parishes and Dioceses which have fallen far short. Probably the general state of wisdom, energy and devotion is about the same throughout the Church-what is wanting is the setting of a goal possible of attainment by a larger proportion of our people. If it be assumed that the last five years represent the Church's best attainment in missionary giving, why not average the contributions of these years in each Diocese, add ten per cent, and set that as the aim for the next triennium. This would provide a real spur to endeavor; it would be a joy to strive for such an increase; it would be within the bounds of possibility and put the emphasis upon success rather than failure.
- 2. An administration of the Church's missionary work which would avoid continual and increasing debt. An occasional deficit may be necessary; it may even be a good thing. But to have it an annual occurrence, and to provide no practical way to wipe out the accumulation of the years must raise questionings and doubts. It ought to be possible to foresee within reasonable limits what offerings will come in during a given period; and to keep appropriations within such bounds. It seems unfair to use legacies to

pay ordinary current expenses; and means should be devised for paying off without delay debts incurred under exceptional circumstances. There is an uneasy feeling when reserve funds are depleted with no effort to replace them, and the average giver does not rejoice in paying interest upon old debts. The mandate to the National Council should be—Take effective steps to clear off the present large debt; and hereafter see that no debt is incurred without a definite and effective plan for its removal.

3. An Educational Department which will deal adequately with the whole task of informing, training, enlarging the mind and heart of the Church. Along with the ordinary forms of publicity there must go the laying before the Church in systematic and considered order the challenges to new enterprises which confront us; and the formulating of wise, strategic plans for bringing the essential loyalty and devotion of the Church to large and noble expression. In spite of much admirable work done along this line, it is manifest that much remains to be accomplished. It is in this department that the most serious work must be done in the coming years and to its performing the Church should call its most able and experienced men. It is in this region that the leadership of the President of the Council should be felt, for this is the Council's most outstanding and fundamental task.

The Finance and Advisory Board will lay before you for consideration the tentative budget sent out to the Church by the National Couscil. It is worth considering, whether along with the Conventions of some of the other Dioceses recently held, we should not by some form of resolution draw the attention of the National Council to our feeling in the matter and perhaps urge upon them such suggestions as I have ventured to offer.

Permit me to say a few words concerning the relation at this time of our beloved country to the nations of the world. All Christian men and especially those who have reflected upon the dealing of God with his people in the ancient times will have had occasion to bethink themselves of the lessons of history concerning national prosperity and national responsibility.

It is true of nations as of individuals that to whom much is given of the same shall much be required. It is the tragedy of human progress that so many peoples have not known the day of their visitation. And there are some among us who cannot quite put by the thought that we are in the way of joining the company of those who have said 'no' to the God of Israel. Surely the lines have fallen to us in pleasant places and we have a goodly heritage. So great has been the bounty of heaven that for riches and power we stand unique among the commonwealths of the world. It would seem as though in the struggle for human liberty and justice and the mutual recognition of service as the law of international life, we had come to the Kingdom for such a time as this. Who of us does not recall

the thrill of our hearts so lately when in the world's bitter crisis our shibboleth was to make the world safe for democracy? And now after so short a space of time we seem callous and indifferent to the great call to forever banish war as a means of settling differences among the peoples of the earth.

We called our young men to the colors and we spent our treasure without stint in the day of battle; but now we hesitate to join in the one definite endeavor on foot to set up a parliament of mankind; and apparently the only word of our government to the stricken and needy peoples of Europe is 'pay us that thou owest.'

But in a nation so large a proportion of whose people acknowledge allegiance to Christ as Lord and Master thus it should not be. For He wills justice and brotherhood and all the things which make for peace. We ought to stand in the van of those who strive to make the divine laws the acknowledged rules of human intercourse. We ought to strike hands in comradeship with every group which aims to bring in God's reign of righteousness. For what is all our wealth beside the great enterprise of bringing in the Kingdom of Heaven and how can we acquit ourselves of recreancy to trust if our aim and purpose is limited to our own national well being? Surely America was born to be the friend and helper of mankind; and we shall fail of national destiny if in this hour we walk alone and refuse to join with the men of good will of all nations in endeavoring to attain a warless world.

I think as Christians and Churchmen we are bound to use our influence in all possible ways to actively further the movements and ideals and organizations which are striving toward this high and holy end. One thing it would seem we all might do, so small a thing, fraught with so infinitesimal a cost to ourselves and yet so big with potencies for good in future years. We could resolve that between now and next December 17th when in the U. S. Senate the great hearing takes place upon the question of our entrance into the World Court, we should not hold our peace, but do our utmost in such ways as we can to make stronger and stronger that high mood and noble purpose, which characterized our fathers in the early days of struggle, and of which we still are capable, by which America may once again take her place as the servant and helper of humanity, the comrade and brother of all those who strive to guide the feet of the world into the way of peace.

Reports of the Archdeacons

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF NEWARK.

To the Rt. Rev'd Edwin S. Lines, D.D.

ST. AGNES', LITTLE FALLS. The services at St. Agnes', Little Falls, and St. David's are as follows: 162 celebrations of the Holy Communion; 135 daily offices; 14 were baptized and 7 confirmed.

The Church overpaid its apportionment for the Nation Wide Campaign and will seek admission as a parish at the Convention that meets in May, 1925. There are at present 181 Communicants. St. David's, a chapel of St. Agnes', Little Falls, paid over \$150 on its indebtedness, reducing the mortgage to \$1,400. In addition to the above report, 14 celebrations of the Holy Communion were held at the Essex County Hospital at Overbrook, Cedar Grove.

St. Alban's, Neware. St. Alban's has had a fine year. The attendance at the services has increased and a splendid spirit is manifested by the devoted people of the Mission. The Church School has been more thoroughly systematized and is doing very efficient work. The enrollment has greatly increased and the School is not only self-supporting, but has been able to help financially in different things that have been done during the year. All the Organizations have done good work. The Rectory has been re-decorated and electric lights with appropriate fixtures have been installed. All this work has been paid for by the Woman's Guild. Some of the faithful men have painted the outside of the Rectory and made many needed repairs to the buildings. A number of Memorials have been blessed during the year: a set of Alms Basins, a Fair Linen Cloth and Credence Table Cover, a white silk Chalice Veil and Burse, and Book Markers. A supply of Wine and Wafers has also been given as a thank offering. The Mission has paid in full its Quota for the Nation Wide Campaign and the people show no disposition to be self-centered. Baptized 10, Confirmed 16, Burials 11.

St. George's, Neware. The work at St. George's has gone along about as usual during the past year. A number of those deeply interested in the Mission have moved away from the section and their loss has been keenly felt. The exterior of the Church building has been painted and other needed repairs made, all of which have been paid for. The Church School is well organized and doing very efficient work. The Officers and Teachers have shown a splendid spirit of loyalty and devotion. The School is self-supporting in every way. The St. Elizabeth's Guild and the vigorous Branch of the Girls' Friendly Society have worked splendidly during the year and accomplished a great deal. An effort is being made to get a Men's Club started. A good amount of money has been given for work outside the Parish during the year. Some Church people are coming into the Vailsburg section of Newark, but not in large numbers. Baptized 3, Confirmed 6.

CERRET CHURCH, NEWARK. During the year 1924 the work at Christ Church was carried on with a strengthening along different lines.

The attendance at the Church School has fallen off considerably, but that of the Church services has averaged about the same, with a somewhat higher average at the early Eucharist.

The Italian work has had its ups and downs, which have been brought about because of rather severe trials through which the Italians have had to go because of their adherence to our Church.

In September the Rectory was redecorated; electric lights and a new heating plant were installed, and on October 1st the Italian Missionary, the Rev'd Joseph Anastasl, moved into the building. His residence here has been of great assistance to the work.

During this year the amount of money credited to the Parish on account of the Nation Wide Campaign was greater than in any other year in its history.

The immediate future of this Parish along the lines of work with the English speaking peoples seems quite bright, as several new families have been added to our lists within the last few months. The Italian work, while necessarily alow, gives promise of being permanent. The method here, as in the English work, depends upon personal visits and the strengthening of the people in the FAITH.

There were 8 Baptisms, 7 Confirmations, 4 Marriages, and 3 burials.

St. Mary Magdalene, Newark. The past year has seen a steady growth in Church membership, and in the enrollment of the Church School.

The number of families increased from 97 to about 146 and the Church School enrollment from 117 to 160.

The Every Member Canvass, December, 1924, was a great improvement. The Parish almost doubled both the number of contributors and the amount subscribed over the preceding year. Even so, it is not yet possible, owing to the present indebtedness of over \$10,000 on the Church and Rectory, to meet expenses through the envelope system. Great efforts were made by the organizations to reduce this indebtedness. The Ladies' Guild made \$1,740.52 from September, 1923, to December, 1924, and the Men's Rectory Club and the Girls' Club combined to give a minstrel show, held in January, 1925, which netted \$600.00. There were 24 baptisms and 10 confirmations.

ASCENSION, EAST ORANGE. The work at Ascension, East Orange, which is done more or less among the children of the neighborhood, is thriving.

There is a Sunday School with an enrollment of forty children, which meets regularly every Sunday afternoon at 3:15 o'clock; at 4:15 each Sunday, Evening Prayer is said, all the children remaining for the same. We have an average attendance of thirty.

With regard to the parents and other adults of the neighborhood, we are endeavoring to create an interest, though it is very slow work, as the majority of these are members in good standing in Baptist or Methodist churches in the district.

Last year the chapel paid its quota of the Nation Wide Campaign.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF JERSEY CITY.

To the Rt. Rev'd Edwin S. Lines, D.D., Bishop of Newark.

The Archdeaconry of Jersey City lies within the boundary of Hudson County and embraces 19 parishes and 2 missions. One meeting of the Archdeaconry was held at St. John's Church in Jersey City. The Mission of the Transfiguration, which is now under the care of the Rev'd E. A. Lemoine, has been making a steady progress. The second floor of the Parish House has been added, thus completing the building. The worship of the Parish will be carried on in the upper floor and the Parochial activities in the basement. The Mission of the Incarnation for colored people has been fortunate

in having the Rev'd William N. Harper as the priest in charge. This is the first time that this Mission has had a priest to give his full time to it and as a consequence the Mission is doing better than ever before. The people in the Mission are now talking about securing their own Church building, and no doubt plans will be perfected whereby they can secure more adequate accommodations for the increasing congregation.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF PATERSON.

To the Rt. Rev'd Edwin S. Lines, D.D., Bishop of Newark.

The year has been marked by increased attendance upon divine services and at Church School, by a good spiritual tone and an encouraging outlook in practically all the missions.

ALLENDALE, EFIFHANY. Karl E. Warmeling, Deacon in charge. New life came with the coming of Mr. Warmeling, and the future is full of promise. The Rectory Fund grows. A well-located lot, 100 x 215, has been purchased for the Rectory.

BUTLER, St. PAUL'S. J. Warren Albinson, Priest in charge, Ground is not being lost, but it is a time of holdfast and patient work. The little Church in New City is still being carried on by Mrs. Speaker.

DELAWANNA, St. Stephen's. Charles P. Tinker, D.D., Rector of Grace, Nutley, Priest in charge. The year has been marked by progress along all lines. Having paid all indebtedness, the building was raised to provide a parish room with concrete and wooden floors and kitchen, a steam heating plant was installed, ground graded and concrete steps laid to front entrance. These much-needed improvements cost \$3,000.00, which the congregation is confident will be liquidated within three years.

EAST RUTHERFORD, GRACE CHAPEL. John Thomas, Deacon in charge. A well-appointed Parish House, 86 x 36, erected and equipped for \$17,000,00, of which \$8,000 is a mortgage. The cellar under the chapel cemented and pipeless furnace installed. Expense borne by Ladies' Aid.

Garrield, Holy Innocents'. W. O. Leslie, Jr., Canon Missioner for Foreign Born Work, in charge. The Canon took charge last summer when Rev'd Theodore Andrews, of St. George's, Passaic, who had been rendering efficient service since 1920, resigned because of pressure of percehal duties. Regular service at 11:15, preceded by Church School, is carried on with an increased congregation. Valuable assistance is rendered by Miss Lake, Mr. E. L. Blakeslee, of Passaic High School, and his wife. The Slovak congregation continues to use the chapel on Sunday and week days and contributes liberally to the operating expenses. Plans are made for a service in Italian, and, when matured, the chapel will have services in three languages—Slovak, Italian and English.

GLEN ROCK, ALL SAINTS'. John E. Bailey, Priest in charge. The good record of the past is maintained; Rectory purchased for \$10,500.00; new reed organ (\$480.00) installed and paid for by subscriptions; Quota over-subscribed nearly 100%, asked \$321.00, gave \$628.75; a debt of \$412.00 of 1920 reduced by \$200.00; assembly room painted and several hundred loads of earth spread by the men of the chapel.

HAWTHORNE, ST. CLEMENT'S. William B. Mawhinney, Priest in charge. Church School and congregation growing rapidly and taxing capacity of building. Mortgage of \$3,000.00 cancelled. Parish never in better financial condition.

LYNDRURST, St. Thomas'. Franklin G. Faber, Priest in charge. An earnest effort is being made to raise funds for a new church, which is needed, and for which there is plenty of room on the property.

NORTH ARLINGTON, St. PAUL'S. John O. Ferris, Priest in charge. Contract awarded to move present building to new foundations on rear of the property and to extend it twenty-five feet. Cost, \$12,000.00. There is a flourishing Men's Club of one hundred members and an active Church School, "zealous of good works."

PASSAIC, St. George's. Theodore Andrews, Priest in charge. Needed repairs and improvements made and expensed by a mortgage of \$2,000. Title to property transferred to Board of Missions and Church Extension of the Diocese. Attendance on the second year of the Vacation School 20% in excess of last year.

PATERSON, Sr. AIDAN'S. Maxwell J. Williams, Priest in charge. A vigorous life is stirring. The Jubilee Year of the Diocese was observed by the payment of an old debt of \$264.00, installing electric lights at \$195.00 and paying for the same, and by surrendering Diocesan Missionary Support of \$300.00.

POMPTON LARES, CHRIST CHURCH. J. Warren Albinson, Priest in charge. Number of known communicants grows from 143 to 180; attendance at services increased 79%, and enrollment in Church School almost tripled. Young People's Society organized. New floor laid in Church with the help of the men of the Parish.

RAMSEY, Sr. John's. Raymond W. Masters, Priest in charge. A Men's League and a Young People's Fellowship have been organized, and, most encouraging, the Diocesan Missionary Support voluntarily surrendered, and the desire to become a parish expressed.

RINGWOOD MANOR, GOOD SHEPHERD. J. Warren Albinson, Priest in charge. An encouraging Church School of 48 with a weekly session and bi-monthly services, well attended, are maintained.

Woon RINGE, St. PAUL's. John Thomas, Deacon in charge. Property curbed and cement walks laid; screens and choir stalls purchased, and plans afoot to properly finish interior of building.

WORTERDYKE, CHRIST CHURCH. Olof G. Olsen, Priest in charge. The work goes on quietly and steadily with growing interest while waiting for the coming of new families. A strip of land along the rear of the Church property and a forty-foot piece on the front have been purchased.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF MORRISTOWN.

To the Rt. Rev'd Edwin S. Lines, D.D., Bishop of Newark.

Such a plan would do

much to break down all feeling on their part of isolation and would serve to bring them into closer and more intimate relationship with the rest of their fellow-members in the Church.

As time has permitted I have made several visits and preached on occasions at the invitation of those in charge of our Parishes and Missions.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF HACKENSACK.

To the Rt. Rev'd Edwin S. Lines, D.D., Bishop of Newark.

The clergy of the Archdeaconry of Hackensack have held five meetings this past year. A thorough study of the needs of the Archdeaconry was made and a plan presented to the Board of Missions for the carrying on of the work by the appointment of a Diocesan Missionsry who should work, for the present at least, in Bergen County. The Board approved of this plan and the Rev'd W. J. White was appointed and undertook the work beginning February 1st, 1925. Since then new Missions have been started in Morsemere and Harrington Park, and plans are under way for work to be started in two other places.

The new Missionary also took over the Ascension Mission in Bogota and so great progress has been made there that it seems likely that within a year they will be able to furnish at least half the salary of a Priest.

Altogether we feel that the suggestion made by this Archdeaconry of having a Missionary work intensively in a small section of the Diocese has been justified.

Elppendix 1

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION.

Submitted in Parochial Reports; Not Noted on the Schedule Sheets.

ALLENDALE, EPIPHANY.—The James William Jackson Memorial Fund, \$218.90. Income for Altar use. Rectory Fund, \$521.85.

BAYONNE, CALVARY.—Total receipts in 1923 were \$4,891.45, as compared with \$7,311.40 in 1924, this increase being due entirely to that of new and increased pledges through the "Nation-Wide Campaign."

DOVER, Sr. JOHN'S.—This parish, because of its paid-up \$1,000 bond, is exempt from assessment for the support of the Episcopate.

EAST ORANGE, CHAPEL OF THE ASCENSION.—The Diocese pays \$400 toward the stipend of the Missionary, and the congregation of the "Church of the Epiphany" carries all other charges against the "Chapel," and during 1924 paid \$850 on same.

East Orange, Incarnation.—During the year a new Church building was begun and approached completion at end of year. Services were held in new Church beginning November 30, 1924; \$24,269.52 was paid off on the various building costs, including \$4,000 for Chancel finishing and furnishing, and \$1,875 for pews, together with other equipment. There is still to be paid about \$5,000 for final payment on building and furniture, and \$2,000 for Chancel. All this money is on hand and pledged toward repayment of mortgage, approximately \$3,000. The Chancel furnishings (total cost \$6,000) is paid entirely by a "Memorial Fund," the entire amount being on hand.

FAIRVIEW, NATIVITY.—Insurance expires May 24, 1924. The "Chapel of the Nativity" was erected in 1912, at cost of \$3,800. Exclusive of pews and furnishing, with advanced cost, building worth today \$10,000. The Chapel is now free and clear of debt, the mortgage having been cleared November 28, 1924, by maturity of 10 shares of stock, held with the Hoboken Building and Loan Association.

HALEDON, St. Mary's.—No record of services held during vacancy of Rectorate, from February 17, 1924, to June, 1924. The Floating Debt, amounting to \$1,755.67, has been paid in full since the preparing of this report.

Hoboxen, Trimity.—Securities and savings bank pass books are kept in a safe deposit box of the Hudson Trust Company, Hoboken, N. J., access to which is had by the Treasurer and a member of the Finance Committee by resolution of the Vestry.

IRVINGTOM, TRIMITY.—During the year the Church, Parish House and Rectory have been rebuilt and enlarged and painted. About \$5,000 has been raised to date for this purpose. The balance has been borrowed from the local bank. At the time of submitting this report \$7,000 has been obtained by mortgage on the Rectory property and \$6,000 more is about to be realized from a mortgage on the Church property—thus taking up all bank loans, and paying all outstanding indebtedness. Efforts will be made to reduce the entire mortgage debt as rapidly as possible. In fact, a substantial sum will be in hand to make one payment immediately.

JERSEY CITY, St. Mary's.—The "Fall of 1926" will mark the 75th Anniversary of the organizations of the Parish and the 25th Anniversary of the present Church Building, when it is hoped to pay off the mortgage and to have the Church consecrated.

MILLINGTON, ALL SAINTS'.—Boys of Bonnie Brae Farm attended 48 Sunday services. Weekly services at the Farm, 48.

NEWARE, St. Alean's Mission.—The Mission made large progress during 1924. The men connected with it with their own hands repaired the woodwork and then painted the outside of the Rectory two coats and the members of the Women's Guild renovated the interior and had a modern system of electric lighting installed. A number of memorial gifts were received. The final payment, due in 1924, upon a pledge made for Saint Alban's" share of the cost of the houses for Bishop Lines and Bishop Stearly and the Diocesan House, was paid. The "Nation Wide Campaign" quota of \$401 was exceeded. The amount collected and contributed by the Parochial Organizations calls for special mention, totaling the very large sum for the Mission of \$2,866.95.

NEWARK, Sr. JOHN'S.—Rectory mortgage stands same as for a number of years back. A small amount has been placed in savings bank toward the reduction of this mortgage. It amounts to \$166.90. The mortgage on the Church was taken out in 1920 to complete payments on the improvements to the Church, and was for \$5,000. St. John's Guild undertook to reduce this at the rate of \$500 a year and the amount now standing is \$2,500, or a reduction of \$2,500, by the Guild in the past four years. This is a splendid achievement. During the year \$150 was paid on outstanding notes, and at the time of making this report all but \$300 of the above mentioned \$900 has been paid off. This amount will be included in 1925 report. The Young People's Fellowship laid a new oak floor in the Parish Hall costing \$338 during the past year. A new memorial pulpit, reading lamps at pulpit and lectern, new rubber aisle runners for Church, and new velvet rugs for Sanctuary were given last Easter Day.

Orange, EFIPHANY.—This congregation, though listed as a Parochial Mission of Grace Church, Orange, is a self-supporting group. In addition to supporting itself, the congregation of the Church of the Epiphany has built and carries on the work of the Chapel of the Ascension in East Orange. The Diocese has helped in the furthering of the work of the Chapel of the Ascension by being responsible for the stipend of the Missionary in charge of the Chapel of the Ascension, while the congregation of Epiphany assumes the bonded, mortgage and other indebtedness of the Chapel. During 1924 the congregation of Epiphany has paid \$850 on the Chapel's indebtedness.

PASSAIC, ST. JOHN'S.—A special fund for Church debt has been started, to which subscriptions of \$2,509 have been pledged, and of which \$1,709.00 has been paid in, and \$500 has been paid out on account of new heating plant. This fund is only to be applied to indebtedness.

PATERBON, St. Luke's.—During 1924 a used two manual Odell pipe organ was purchased and installed for about \$2,000. From a legacy of \$10,000 from the late Susan Knapp Thorn the Vestry set aside \$9,000 as a parish endowment fund.

PATERSON, St. Mark's .- \$5,000 paid on mortgage, reducing it to \$6,000.

PATERSON, TRINITY.—We have, with the proceeds of our Annual Bazaar, bought a Ford Sedan for our Rector's use. Will use the balance of Bazaar funds for its upkeep. RIDGEFIELD PARE, St. Mary THE VIRGIN.—Mortgage on Parish House Building \$9,000 with American Church Building Fund Commission.

RIDGEWOOD, CHRIST CHURCH.—During the past year a new Parish House has been completed and furnished at a cost of approximately \$110,000, and the old Parish House has been moved to the rear of the Church property.

ROCHELLE PARK, St. Peter's Mission.—We now carry \$3,000 mortgage on our Chapel, which we intend to reduce to \$2,000 during year of 1925.

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SUMMIT, CALVARY.-The "additions and betterments to real property" include the installation of a memorial window and a memorial credence table, and the rebuilding of the organ. The invested funds "for other purposes" include a Mission Chapel Fund and a legacy designated as a Mission Fund.

WEST ENGLEWOOD, CHRIST.-A special building fund which was started in 1923 has now to its credit, December 31st, 1924, \$342.00.

REPORTS OF HOSPITALS, HOMES, ETC.

Hospital of St. Barnabas, Newark.

[Incorporated 13 February, 1867.]

During the past year the work of the Hospital has steadily advanced, both as to quantity and quality under the wise and able superintendency of the Rev'd John G. Martin. The Hospital has again received its former rating as a "first class hospital" from the American College of Surgeons.

The medical, surgical and clinical work of the Hospital has maintained its customary efficiency, and great service has been rendered to this community, irrespective of nationality, creed or color. The amount of free service given during the year amounts in value to over \$39,000.00.

There have been many improvements of a material kind, notably the equipment of the second operating room, the installation of a set of new sterilizers, the establishment of the new maternity building, the purchase of the dwelling at 695 High Street, adjoining the Hospital property on the south, as a Superintendent's residence, and the great improvement of the Hospital grounds, (for which we are indebted to two of the trustees, Mr. G. Wisner Thorne and Mr. Halsey T. Tichenor).

As a result of the operation of the Community Chest and the Hospital's participation in it, we finished the year 1924 without a deficit in the running expense account, but with a small balance; (this in spite of our voluntarily relinquishing the December allotment of the Chest at the suggestion of the Chest officials).

Last year the total receipts were \$169,271.31 of which \$110,810.99 came from the board of patients, fees, and other receipts at the Hospital, making the largest amount ever received in a single year. The disbursements however amounted to \$168,548.31 leaving a balance for the year 1924 of \$723.00.

It should be remembered however that we have a large debt of about \$100,000 the interest on which is a heavy financial drain. While large gifts to pay the debts of an institution are not exciting to the imagination of possible donors, they are a most gracious and encouraging thing to the Hospital. Our need along this line is commended to the thoughtful consideration and generosity of our friends.

The loyal, unstinted service has made possible the great ministry of healing which for more than fifty years the Hospital of St. Barnabas has rendered to this community.

FIFTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT, COUNCIL OF CHRIST HOSPITAL.

We started the year in the sincere hope that by this time, a new section (the first of an entirely new hospital plant) would be well under way. That this has not been accomplished is a disappointment to the Council and the Medical Board. But this is not to say that much has not been accomplished. We were faced by conditions over which we had no control; mainly by the conditions in the financial world and especially of conditions in Jersey City itself.

A Committee of the Council has been quietly and persistently at work interviewing a large number of people interested in the welfare of Christ Hospital and has secured from them such assurances and encouragements as to warrant us in persisting in our plans. An additional house and lot were bought adjoining the old Home for the Nurses, which will house in the neighborhood of 60 to 80 nurses. The Rev'd Thomas A. Hyde has continued as Chaplain and Superintendent of the Hospital and the work has gone on under his care with good success.

The operating expenses of the Hospital for 1924 were \$181,089.24. The legacies received through the past year amounted to \$8,000. There were 2,260 patients treated in the Hospital of which 1,610 were ward patients and there were 3,633 free days which means \$16,387.08 in absolutely free work.

Classifying the religious affiliations we find that there were 156 Episcopalians, 978 Roman Catholics, 940 Protestants, and 210 Hebrews.

Our Clinic has been increasing in the line of Service, which is given absolutely free. There were over 6,000 treatments given. The demand made upon this department has caused us to open a Clinic at night which has grown very popular.

The Hospital buildings and our finances are in good shape. Our only handicap is the lack of sufficient beds to meet the demand made and it is hoped that by another year the capacity of the Hospital will be enlarged either by a new building or wing added to it.

Widows' Home, Hoboken.

[Organized, 1860.]

The Widows' Home is a Church Institution, in the City of Hoboken, providing a home for aged gentlewomen Communicants of the Church, having little or no resources of their own and no home. The Board of Trustees is composed of the Rectors of the three Parishes in Hoboken, one of the Wardens of each Parish, and the Canon Missioner of the Department of Social Service of the Diocese of Newark.

The Board of Trustees: Rev'd G. E. Magill, Warden; Rev'd Malcolm A. Shipley, Secretary; Rev'd Frank Armstrong, Canon Dunseath, Mr. H. Otto Wittpenn, Treasurer; Mr. George E. Horwood, Mr. J. H. Cuntz.

The Board of Managers is composed of women, elected by the Board of Trustees from the membership of the three Parishes in Hoboken.

The House in which the Home is now located is in bad condition through the gradual sinking of the wall on the north side of the building and some steps will have to be taken either to repair the present building or to secure adequate quarters in some other location. A Committee from the Archdeaconry of Jersey City has been appointed to consult with the Bishops and the Trustees of the Homs in order to work out some plan for the securing of a good building and the developing of this greatly needed work.

St. Katharine's Home, Jersey City.

[Organized, 1890; incorporated, 1893.]

The past year of St. Katharine's Home has been greatly blessed in the spiritual help given through the prayers offered, and the Sacraments administered by the staff of priests especially devoted to the work of the Home. Grace has come to the Sisters for their teaching; to the girls for repentance and change of purpose, and to each infant in baptism,

There was no confirmation this year as most of the girls were already confirmed. Others belonged to different denominations and wished to remain in them,

There has been one death, that of a baby who was to be discharged with her mother in a few days to a good situation. She was an unusually lovely child and her death was a great grief. She died in Christ Hospital after two days' illness of pneumonia. The burial was from the Home Chapel, with a service as beautiful as possible.

In place of the so-called "enjoyment" which ends in sin and suffering for the girls who come into this Home, St. Katharine's makes a point of providing enjoyment through the Festival Days of the Church and the Nation,

This is made possible through special arrangements and gifts from the Board and other friends so that all these days may be looked forward to and remembered with pure happiness.

The summer recreation fund provided fruit, ice cream and an abundance of cooling drinks through the hot weather. It paid for two garden swings which were a great comfort and joy; for a trip to Staten Island and a final outing in a bus for all the girls and bables, spending an afternoon "in the open."

On the Church Festivals, as many girls as possible were taken to services, at which they heard fine music and preaching, and could feel themselves a part of the great congregation. Independence Day and Thanksgiving Day were kept appropriately and with very good dinners. Christmas Day crowned the year with the gathering on the eve for the giving out of the many presents; with the early morning service, joyfully rendered; with the babies' manger service in the Chapel at 4 o'clock, and later in the week "Tree Day," when the girls and the members of the Board had a social gathering around the "Tree."

On January 17th, 1924, there were seven girls in the Home, and since then twelve have been admitted; the total number discharged has been eleven. During the year there have been 10 Baptisms, 3 Marriages and one Burial.

We are again indebted to the Nation-Wide Campaign for the ability to carry on this uplifting work, but it must not be forgotten that in addition to the Campaign much thought and labor are required on the part of the members of the Board to carry it on. Therefore, "whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might."

During the year the City Mission has ministered to thirty municipal and county institutions, some of them being hospitals, and others penal institutions. Other hospitals, incorporated or private, are also visited by request or to meet emergency cases. The total population of the institutions averages daily about five thousand. There are two chaplains who give all their time to the visiting of the patients, or inmates, the Rev'd Dr. Charles L. Cooder and the Rev'd James W. Van Ingen. Their telephone numbers are at all the hospitals, and they can be reached by the institutions at any time, day or night.

Religious services, either on weekdays or Sunday, are conducted for the walking patients where such services are practicable, and the attendance is good, though it varies with the number able to leave the wards. Such services are maintained at the Alms House, Orange City Home, Essex County Isolation, Essex County Sanitorium, the County Institutions at Laurel Hill, St. Barnabas' Hospital, Home for Incurables, House of Detention, Overbrook Hospital, and with little groups of patients who gather in the ward dining rooms for an informal service. The attendance is from half dozen in the dining rooms to fifty in the chapels, according to place and nature of the institution.

A daily record is kept of all baptisms, burials, private communions of the sick, donations to the work by interested parishes and individuals, and other items connected with the work on the wards. From this record the statistical report of the two chaplains working in the public hospitals indicates 44 institutions visited, 18,698 patients and inmates visited, 228 baptisms, 403 ministrations of communion to sick in the hospitals, 63 celebrations of holy communion in public, 415 burials of city and county cases, 136 Sunday services, 109 weekday services, 123 addresses, 53 Bible class meetings, 3 marriages, 525 garments given out from donations received, 3,825 magazines distributed, and about 1,000 packages of toys, candy and other gifts sent by parlahes for Christmas distribution on the wards, together with garments enough to meet immediate needs.

The number of our own communicants on the wards is never large, but there will always be found some in each of the institutions visited, and during the course of the year every parish in the cities and larger towns will have some representative in the hospital somewhere on the route.

· Practically all the hospitals are increasing their bed capacity, and seven in the Newark section are either adding new buildings or have plans for new buildings of larger capacity, and with better equipment. Within a year the hospital population will be increased by more than a thousand, and with it an increased opportunity for the activities of the City Mission. The total number of patients in all the hospitals for the past twelve months is about thirty thousand.

The many expressions of thanks from patients, and letters of appreciation from the families of patients who have passed away, and letters from those in authority at the various institutions, would all seem to indicate that the City Mission meets a public need by its ministrations.

The Board of Management and Control meets monthly from October to June.

The current expenses of the House are met partly by the moderate sums paid for the board of inmates, partly by voluntary contributions from the various parishes and from friends of the institution, and partly from the interest on its endowment.

With a larger endowment the House could reduce the sums now asked in the way of board, and could more readily take in needy applicants whose churches or friends have but elight resources. This is worthy of attention from persons who think of making bequest by will for charitable purpose, or who will make such gifts now in their lifetime.

Guild of St. Barnabas for Nurses-Orange Branch.

We report again a steady growth in the Orange Branch of the Guild. Our meetings have been held regularly and have been well attended.

During the year several entertainments were given, in January a Musicale for the Executive Secretary's Fund. This not only afforded entertainment and a social time together, but \$117.25 was realized.

In March a Food Sale was held and \$70.00 was raised for the Treasury.

The Work Committee has been making garments for the Fresh Air Work at Bradley Beach, and has been assisted by the Evening Mission Workers of Grace Church.

At Christmas time several families were again provided for.

On Sunday, May 11th, the eve of Florence Nightingale's 104th birthday, an impressive and inspiring service was held in Grace Church. Two hundred and sixty-five nurses in uniform attended and about fifty other nurses were present. Graduates of various hospitals led the nurses' procession, followed by the student body. Several physicians were present and six acted as ushers and took up the offering. The full choir sang. The service was beautiful and praise is due our Chaplain for giving us the great privilege of this service. We had the pleasure of having our Vice-Chaplain General, the Very Rev'd Carroll M. Davis, preach the sermon. The spirit of co-operation was wonderful. Seven schools were represented: Orange Memorial, Newark City, St. Barnabas', St. Mary's, Orange, Mountainside, Montclair, Newark Memorial, and the Visiting Nurses' Supervised Nursing Schools.

In August came a great sorrow. We have lost a very dear friend, a wise counselor and a strong tower of help, in the death of Mrs. William Read Howe, our beloved secretary for thirty-two years. It was one of the unusual privileges that came through the Guild—the privilege of knowing Mrs. Howe and shering in the unfalling goodness of her heart. In a measure she was the Orange Branch, for she demonstrated to us all the very spirit of the Guild. Her piety, her definite faith, her unflagging zeal, her indomitable enthusiasm and her great faithfulness mark her for one of the splendid women of her generation.

In November, delegates were sent to the Annual Council in Buffalo, N. Y. At the opening service held at the Cathedral, a very impressive procession of the Clergy and choir was followed by about 525 nurses in uniform. Blahop Walter H. Overs, of Liberia, preached the sermon, a truly appropriate one, he told of his work, how he had to be Priest, Doctor and Nurse, speaking of the opportunity for missionary nurse work to be done.

This Guild consists of 43 branches, with a membership of 3,396, including 7 membersat-large. Three new branches have been formed during the year, Baltimore, Wilkes-Barre and Fitchburg.

Miss Ellen Hicks, of Porto Rico, is our Missionary Nurse, and we have increased her salary this year. We are most fortunate in having Bishop Stearly as our Chaplain-General.

It was Mrs. Howe's dream to create the office of Executive Secretary and each branch pledged various amounts toward the salary. We have now secured Miss Nellie Oxley, and her headquarters will be in Cleveland.

The Guild has been represented at the Church Conferences at Princeton, Wellesley, and two of our nurses had been the resident nurses during the Princeton and Geneva Conferences, also have been represented at the Diocesan Convention.

The Orange Branch has an Emergency and also a Sick Relief Fund. The Sick Relief Association is a very important organization for nurses, and we ought to have a great many new members among the nurses.

Those who have the work most at heart are convinced of steady growth and are greatly encouraged in the bright outlook of the future.

The Assembly is composed of twenty-six Senior and Junior Chapters. It has held eight Executive Committee meetings, and five special meetings. A Week-end Conference for Men was held at Ragle's Nest Farm from July 26-28, 1924, having as its purpose, Conference, Inspiration, and Relaxation. Several boys from the Newark Diocese have also attended the Vacation Camp Conference for older boys known as Camp John Wood, held at Ragle's Nest Farm, July 14 to July 26, 1924. About thirty-five Brotherhood members from the Newark Diocese attended the Annual Convention held at Albany, N. Y., October 8-12th, and several of the officers reported at a Post Convention Meeting held at St. Mark's Church, Paterson, on October 20, 1924.

This year the Brotherhood is giving especial attention to the boys and young men of the Church. The boy will be the man of tomorrow and it is up to the men of today to help the boy to become the right kind of man tomorrow.

During the past year the Council of the Church Service League has held its regular quarterly meetings for conference and discussion of matters pertaining to the various organizations and institutions represented in the Council, and also has held four open meetings to which all women of the Diocese have been invited. The first on "Churchwomen and War," the second the annual "Thank Offering Presentation Service," the third an "Historical Meeting," held at the time of the Diocesan Anniversary Celebration, and the fourth, the annual "Day of Devotion," held the first Wednesday in Advent.

Also during the past year representatives from the Diocesan Organizations of Men have joined the Council, thereby giving promise of better understanding and closer co-operation between the Men's and Women's Organizations.

The Corporation is independent of either of the Dioceses of New Jersey. It is not a pension plan, it does not pay pensions to the Clergy who are contributors; it is a kind of Life Insurance Company for the benefit of the Widows and Orphans of the Contributors. It was originally incorporated under a "royal charter" by George III on March 29, 1769, its territory being the Colonies of New York, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania. In 1806 a plan was adopted by which the original body was divided into three parts. In the division of funds, New Jersey received \$4,289.00. On December 3, 1807, it became a body corporate under its present title. Last year it distributed in annuities and dividends \$5,988.30, and transferred to principal \$4,465.83. The total principal was, on May 1, 1925 (at market value), \$185,659.75.

Clergymen of the Protestant Episcopal Church, not over 55 years of age, who have for the past two years been canonically connected with, and actually resident in either of the Dioceses in the State of New Jersey, are eligible for membership as "Contributors." Removal from the State after five annual contributions of eight dollars, does not forfeit membership; in case of removal before five payments have been made, the amount paid will be returned. The "members of the Corporation" are those elected to manage its affairs; they are not necessarily contributors, and some of them are laymen. The annual meeting is held on the first Monday in June. Applications for membership should be in the hands of the Secretary before that date. The Secretary will be glad to furnish further information, and copies of application forms.

Report, Board of Social Service, Diocese of Newark, 1924.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newgek:

This, the Annual Report of the Board of Social Service to the Convention of the Diocese of Newark, is supposed to cover the calendar year 1924. But, in as much as the report, submitted at the last Diocesan Convention, covered the period from January to April, inclusive, this report will omit that period and will necessarily be brief.

At the first meeting of the Board held after the Diocesan Convention, Mr. Frederic A. Burlingame was unanimously elected Chairman, Mr. Lewis R. Conklin was re-elected Treasurer, and Canon Dunseath was re-elected Recording Secretary. The usual Committees were reappointed and it was decided that the work of the Board should, as in other years, be carried on through these Committees which included "Bonnie Brac Farm," "Church Mission of Help," "Legislation and Public Affairs," "Parochial Social Service" and "Literature and Conferences."

LEGISLATION AND FUBLIC AFFAIRS.

The Board has attempted to keep abreast of the most recent developments in Legislation and Public Affairs and has, through its Chairman of this Committee, Mr. Robert L. Flemming, and the action of the Board, taken a definite stand in several important pleces of Legislation. The Board expressed sincere regret at the action of the Governor in failing to renominate for appointment, to succeed himself, the Hon. Harry V. Osborne, as Public Utilities Commissioner for the State of New Jersey.

LITERATURE AND CONFERENCES.

This Committee has held several meetings in regard to preparing for a Reading Course for 1925, following the plans for the last two years. The lists will include such subjects as "The Relation of The Church to Social Welfare," "Personal Religion Expressed Through Social Service," "Parochial Social Service," "Some Effects of the Case Method as Applied to Divorce," and "Family Welfare."

PAROCHIAL SOCIAL SERVICE.

The Committee has continued its interest in, and its effort to build up active Committees in the Parishes. The Pamphlet which is to be included in the Reading Course under this heading, being the work of this Committee.

PERSONAL REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

The Secretary has continued his efforts to bring the idea of Social Service as vividiy as possible, to the attention of the people in the Diocese. He has preached and made addresses in many of the parishes and missions in the Diocese, to women's clubs and organizations, and men's clubs, Girls' Friendly Societies, Sunday Schools, and young people's societies, and has administered the Holy Communion in many of the parishes and missions in the Diocese. He attended the Fourth National Conference of the Social Service Workers of the Church, which was held in Toronto and delivered an address on the Social Service Reading Course of the Diocese. He has continued as the Secretary of the New Jersey Conference for Social Welfare and organized and carried through to a successful conclusion, his Fifth Annual Conference for Social Welfare, which was held in New Brunswick. He was invited again to deliver the address of the Annual Patriotic Service of the League of Women Voters. He has been active in the movement in preparing the Campaign for the building of the Girls' Friendly Society's Holiday House at Eagle's Nest Farm, and has attended the meetings of the Board of Trustees of the House of the Holy Comforter, The Widows' Home in Hoboken, The Church Mission of Help, Bonnie Brae Farm, Department of Development and Revenue, Eagle's Nest Farm, the various Archdeaconries and meetings of the Clergy.

BONNIE BRAE PARM FOR BOYS.

The past year has been marked by a continued growth at Bonnie Brae Farm, and a new departure in financing that work. In October the Kiwanis Cottage was completed and turned over by the Kiwanis Club of Newark to the Board of Managers of the Farm. It will house fourteen boys. A new water supply system was authorized and

the work was started. A severe winter has made it impossible to complete the well and the installation of the necessary equipment. The Committee on Admissions has just acted on the admission of eight new boys to the family at the Farm. Bonnie Brae has received two noteworthy financial gifts during the year. One was a bequest by the late Exra C. Williams of West Orange, of securities and cash amounting to \$7,651.96, to the Board of Social Service to be used for Bonnie Brae. The Board has set this amount aside as the beginning of an endowment fund. The other was a gift of \$1,000 from Christ Church, Short Hills, which will be used for the reduction of the mortgage. In April last year, Miss Georgia Sprague was engaged to conduct a Campaign for the financing of Bonnie Brae, and her work was met with signal success as the Financial Report will show. The House Committee has been obliged to handle the problem of a change in personnel in the management at the Farm. Mrs. Stone, who had served so faithfully and so long as Housemother, was obliged to present her resignation to the Board.

THE CHURCH MISSION OF HELP.

A review of the year's work shows a most notable and continued co-operation between our churches and societies—Diocesan and parochial—and the Church Mission of Help. The sustained and strengthened interest of the Church Service League has made the burden of the newer constituent member easier to carry. Some of the Men's Diocesan Societies, too, have indicated interest in our work. There is a place for their good offices.

We have added to our staff a colored worker for half-time service. This enables us to better respond to the ever increasing number of calls and at the same time makes it possible for the colored girls to be guided by one of their own race.

We have covered more territory in the Diocese than ever before and this in response to calls from within and without the Church.

Our volunteers increase in number every year rendering most unselfish service. Our weekly intercession sheet is ever more widely used. We have groups and representatives in thirty Parishes, an increase of eight over 1923. \$967.22 passed through our "Special Fund" being used for such things as Christmas and birthday gifts, hoard, milk, burial, shoes, treats for girls, and cheer to those shut away from the world by illness and wrong doing. Of the \$81.90 loaned, \$61.90 has been returned.

Secretaries and Board Members have spoken to 46 groups, and are always ready to speak on behalf of our girls.

Since 1919 we have carried 1,025 girls, 286 of whom we cared for this past year. Of the 107 new girls who came to us this year, 59 were unmarried mothers, and 48 "unadjusted" to the problems of life's circumstances. Twenty-two were Episcopalians, 30 Roman Catholics, and the remainder from other denominations. Under the head of "what is done" we find medical care has been secured for 245 mothers and children, employment for 95, court action for 54, recreational privileges for 90, vocational guidance for 19, family relationship has been strengthened in 41 cases, and friendly visitors secured for 63 girls, while church relationship has been strengthened for 73. Twelve girls were confirmed, 3 baptized and 32 married. Twenty-six babies were baptized and 4 were buried. Statistics are apt to be boring, but work with

human beings can never be. It is the Secretaries' privilege to help, and to be helped by girls with indomitable courage and determination. Often, in their thanks, they add, "And I want you to take care of my little sister, that she may not suffer as I have." God grant we may be prepared to do so.

Report of the Board of Religious Education.

FOR THE YEAR 1924.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The work of the Board of Religious Education has been greatly handicapped by the fact that during the year it lost the services of its efficient leader, Canon Gabriel Farrell, Jr., who resigned his position to accept the Rectorship of a Parish in the Diocese of New York. As yet his position has not been filled, but if the work of Religious Education in the Diocese is not to suffer some plan should be devised to provide for a properly conducted office force for the work of the Board. Some of the members of the Board have during the year given liberally of their time to help bridge the situation, but much of the work that the Board should be doing has had to be given up. Most notably in this connection is the Normal School for 1924-5.

We give here but a brief summary of some of the activities that the Board has undertaken during the year.

Life Work Dinners were held at St. John's Church, West Hoboken, at Grace Church, Westwood and at Trinity Church, Paterson, with a total of 78 at the three dinners.

A group of 14 boys attended the conference on the Ministry held at Concord, New Hampshire, last June.

The Board encouraged as far as it could the holding of Vacation Schools in the Parishes of the Diocese. We feel that these schools are well worth being undertaken by a greater number of our Parishes.

On October 17, 1924, the 15th Annual Convention was held with a very creditable attendance from the schools of the Diocese,

Certificates for completion of Courses in the Normal School were awarded to 7 persons.

Certificates for standards attained were awarded to 11 schools for 100%, 23 schools for 90%, 18 schools for 80% and 24 schools for 70%, a total of 76 Honor Schools.

Certificates for completion of courses in Parish Training Classes were awarded to 18 persons,

The Schools of the Diocese provided Christmas boxes containing joyful and useful gifts for 2,500 Boys and Girls of Mission Schools.

The Advent Offering was by request of the Bishops given for a Rectory at Pompton Lakes.

The Daily Bible Readings were again distributed during Advent.

The report of the Treasurer is herewith appended.

The Diocesan Council of the Young People's Fellowship has carried on its activities in the past year with a larger sense of responsibility than ever before, due to the resignation of Canon Farrell, on whose shoulders had previously rested the burden of the Fellowship work.

At the Annual Diocesan Convention of the Fellowship held in St. Barnabas' Church, Newark, on May 17, 1924, the Diocesan Council was instructed to prepare a Fellowship Handbook. This Year Book was published in the early fall, and although the Council members helped to compile the material contained in the book, we are indebted to Canon Farrell for editing and publishing it. The Book contains such information as would be valuable to leaders in the Fellowship work, and also a Directory of the names and addresses of all the officers of the Fellowship chapters.

The first Diocesan Fellowship paper, "The Fellowship News," was published during the past year, the result of the earnest work of one of the Council members, Mr. Wilfred Skeats. Although the results of the first publication were not as successful as we anticipated, we feel hopeful about having started the paper on its way, and have a second issue in the hands of the publisher now.

The Diocesan Council has set definite service objectives for the Fellowship Chapters to work for during the year, and has allotted each chapter in the Diocese a proportionate amount to raise for a Ford touring car to be used for missionary purposes in the Diocese.

During the past year the Council has tried in many ways to stimulate interest in and growth of the Fellowship Chapters. One new Chapter has been affiliated to the Diocesan Fellowship in the past year—All Saints' Chapter at Leonia—and two other chapters are forming and will soon be ready to join the Diocesan Organization.

The Council has encouraged the strengthening of the District Organizations, hoping to branch out and form new Fellowships through the districts rather than through the Central Diocesan Body.

The recent activities of the Diocesan Fellowship have been chiefly concerned with stimulating interest in the Provincial Convention of Young People to be held in Buffalo over Washington's Birthday. We hope the Diocese of Newark will be able to send a large delegation to this Convention.

Report of the Eagle's Nest Farm Committee.

Your Committee is glad to report that the use of the Camp during 1924 showed a considerable increase over the previous year. Over 230 campers were cared for, not including the Staff, which number represented an increase of about 60% over 1923. While this growth is satisfactory, it is well to note that we are still far below the capacity of our equipment.

We wish to express at the outset our indebtedness to the Rev'd W. O. Leslie, Jr., for his able and tactful leadership as Camp Director, and to the Rev'd George H. Young, a member of the Executive Committee, for his careful and economical supervision of the construction and repair work incident to the preparation of the camp.

The improvements to the plant this year consisted of a house for the Camp Director, the extension of the water system, the staining of the buildings to harmonize with the surrounding verdure and the building of two tennis courts, the gift of an interested friend.

A brief summary of our financial statement follows:

The commissary served 9,588 meals. The cost of Camp operation including food, wages, transportation, counsellors, etc., was approximately \$5,000.00, which was covered by the fees received from campers.

For 1925 the fees will be the same as last year; viz., \$9.50 per week, or \$1.75 per day for a shorter period, and it must be borne in mind that this fee covers not only food, but the cost of camp operation, counsellors, use of boats, etc.

Arrangements have again been made with the railroads for "Fresh Air Rate" for those attending the Camp between the ages of five and sixteen years, which rate is one-quarter of the round trip fare from points within a radius of 500 miles. Applications for such reduced rate must be made through the Rev'd W. O. Leslie, Jr., Secretary, 21 Washington Street.

Funds are now being raised for building the Holiday House for the Girls' Friendly Society, which is to be located at Eagle's Nest Farm, and it is fully expected that this will be completed for the season of 1926.

Our Schedule for camps and conferences for this summer is as follows:

June 22-25. Conference of Clergy.

June 26-29. Conference for Young Men.

June 29-July 6. Camp for Boys, Order of Sir Galahad.

July 6-Aug. 3. Camp for Boys.

Aug. 3-Aug. 15. Camp John W. Wood, Brotherhood of St. Andrew.

Aug. 15-Aug. 17. Camp for Men, Brotherhood of St. Andrew.

Aug. 17-Sept. 7. Camp for Girls.

We submit that this is a comprehensive program covering the variety of subjects and classes, and that this activity under religious control and giving religious instruction—giving a healthy outdoor life and regulated sports—is worthy of the enthusiastic support of the clergy and laity of the Diocese.

Will you not see to it that the Camp is filled to capacity this year? Nineteen Dollars, plus transportation, will care for a boy or girl in Camp for two weeks, and you surely know of many good people glad to contribute so small an amount and many children needing such training and recreation. Will you not be the means of bringing together the willing contributor and the needy child?

We have many requests from the clergy for small shacks with or without cooking facilities to which they may take their families for all or part of the season at a moderate cost, and so take part in our camp life. We believe that six such buildings would be a fine addition to our plant, and a boon to many of our clergy. They would cost approximately \$1,000 each, complete. We have the building sites, but not the building funds. Perhaps you will help us secure these funds for the season of 1926.

Report, Cathedral of All Saints.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The General Cathedral Chapter of All Saints', since it made its last report, has held two meetings during the remaining months of the calendar year of 1924.

At the meeting held October 15, 1924, a committee of three was appointed to investigate the source of the funds of the Cathedral Chapter.

Dr. Archibald Mercer was appointed as a representative of this Chapter to the Diocesan Council, Church Service League. Chancellor Parker was appointed as a committee to draft a suitable Statute to the State Legislature looking to a revision of Article 1 of the Constitution of this Chapter.

On November 25, 1924, the committee appointed to inquire into the source of the funds of this Chapter made its report, and the same was ordered spread in full on the minutes. It then resolved that the Treasurer be instructed to open THREE accounts, they to be known as follows:

(1) The Construction Fund.

In which is to be credited the payments regularly received from the James Barber Trust, amounting to \$5,000.00 per annum, it being the desire of the donor that these amounts shall accumulate to increase the Building or Permanant Fund.

(2) The Permanent Site Fund.

This being a gift of \$50,000.00 made by James Barber for the purchase of a building site. The principal sum to be kept intact, the income, however, to be available for such work and ministries as the Cathedral Chapter may determine.

(3) The Endowment Fund.

To be made up of funds now invested and cash in the bank to the amount of \$40,000.00. This sum to be the nucleus of a Permanent Endowment Fund. The income from this principal is to be divided into two equal parts. One part to be added to the principal and one part to be used at the disposal of the Chapter for current work and ministries.

A request was received from the Board of Missions and Church Extension, asking that the General Chapter purchase two automobiles, one for the use of Canon Madara, at a cost of \$513.12 with the old car, and one for the use of Canon Leslie at a cost of \$849.25. On resolution the request was granted.

The Commission on Church Architecture has had before it this year for consideration the plans for several Church buildings and Parish Houses. The Chairman has travelled to various centres of the Diocese, conferring with Parish representatives in regard to plans for new buildings or proposed improvements to old ones.

The completion of the new Church for the Parish of the Incarnation, East Orange, is worthy of notice in this report. This building has been erected at a very moderate cost but it is unusually satisfactory, especially in its chancel arrangements. A visit to this new structure is recommended to all who are contemplating construction work at reasonable cost.

For the future, the larger undertakings that have come to the notice of the Commission are the plans for St. Peter's Parish, Mountain Lakes, and Christ Mission, Morris Plains. Work on the latter is expected to begin very shortly.

Report, Board of Missions and Church Extension.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The Board of Missions and Church Extension, since it made its last report, has held five meetings during the remaining months of the calendar year of 1924.

At the meeting of June 4, 1924, report was made that on August 1, 1924, Miss Mary Louise Rowland would take up work in the Western Counties Missions, and it was also voted that a Ford automobile be provided for her use in this field.

Appropriations were also made for additional work in the following places:

On September 17, 1924, consideration was given to the need of a Parish House for Grace Chapel, East Rutherford. It was shown that a very satisfactory type of building could be erected for the sum of \$15,950.00. It was voted that we approve the awarding of a contract on this basis.

GRACE MISSION, GRANDVIEW.—Report was made that the old hot air heating plant had completely broken down. The committee having the matter in charge advised that a steam heating system be installed at a cost of \$1,231.00, this sum to be borrowed from this Board on agreement to repay it in periodic installments. It was so ordered.

On October 15, 1924, plans, specifications and estimates were presented for the completion of the Church building of the Church of the Transfiguration, Woodcliffe, at a cost of \$17,400,00, excluding the heating plant. At the same time a plan to finance the project was submitted. After thorough consideration, the whole matter received the unanimous approval of the members present.

At the meeting of November 25, 1924, announcement was made to the Board of the death of Archdeacon Carter, who for many years was Secretary of this Board. On motion it was resolved that a committee of three be appointed to draft suitable resolutions, the same to be spread in full on the minutes and that a copy of the same be forwarded to the family of the decedent.

At this meeting a communication was received from the Archdeacoury of Hackensack, calling attention of the Board to the remarkable growth of population in Bergen County and asking the consideration of the appointment of a Missioner for this district, the cost to be assumed by the Churches in the Archdeacoury. The members present did not approve the plan of financing nor the limitation of the work to Bergen County, but instead recommended to the Bishops the appointment of a Diocesan Missionary to take up work for the present in Bergen County, the expense to be met by the Board of Missions. On motion, carried, that a request be made to the Finance and Advisory Board for an appropriation of \$3,500.00 for this new work.

Meeting of December 17, 1924. Consideration was given to the imperative needs of St. Paul's, North Arlington. It was proposed to remove the present Church building to a new and more favorable location and at the same time it was desired to enlarge the whole structure. Plans and estimates were presented, the cost for the whole work being about \$11,000.00. The method of financing being sound and feasible, it was unanimously voted to approve the whole project.

The Department of Foreign Born Work presented its budget for the year 1925 in the sum of \$10,200,00. To meet this the Finance and Advisory Board has made an appropriation of \$9,000,00 and there being available the income from the St. Matthew's Trust amounting to \$1,200,00 which could be used for this work, these two sums added together made it possible to meet the budget as made up.




