CANON 1, § II.

OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

From a Parish.

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election, in the following form:

[Name of the Church, the Place, and Date].

This certifies that at a meeting of the congregation of this Church, held for the purpose of electing Church Officers, and Deputies, and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention (or for the purpose of electing Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, if the meeting be for that object alone), A. B., C. D., and E. F., being communicants of the Church in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Deputies; and B. C., D. E., and F. G., also being communicants in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Alternate Deputies to represent the Parish in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand (or if two Wardens subscribe, we have set our hands), the day and year above written.

N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary sign, then the signatures of both Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-incharge, or Missionary, cannot sign.

From a Mission.

N. B.—Use the same form and substitute the word "Mission" for "Parish" in three places. The Minister-in-charge; or, the Clerk; or, the Warden may sign.

Memoranda:

Not more than three Deputies are allowed from each Parish, and Mission.

Three Alternate Deputies must be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies.

Write Christian names in FULL and LEGIBLY.

Blank forms will be sent by the Secretary of the Convention on or before Easter Monday in each year.

Return Certificates of Election at least one Month before Convention.

Deputies must be Communicants of the Church, and also qualified voters in the Parish or Mission which elects them. (See Canon 6, § II, [4], [5] and [6].)

Rules of Order

THE CONVENTION.

- 1. The Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- The Convention shall meet on the opening day at 9:30 a. m.; with a recess of one hour between 1 and 2 o'clock.
- At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
- 4. At the close of each Convention, the Minutes shall be corrected and approved.
- The doors of the Convention shall be open for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
- All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convention shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall record their attendance.
- Clergymen of other Dioceses, and Candidates for Holy Orders, who may be present, shall be admitted to honorary seats in the Convention on the presentation of their names to the Secretary.
- 8. When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
- When any member is about to speak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
- 10. No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply), in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
- 11. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
- 12. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate, but any member may appeal from the decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention. The general procedure of the Convention shall be governed, unless otherwise provided for, by the rules of parliamentary practice as set forth in "Robert's Rules of Order."
- 13. A Committee consisting of the Bishops, ex-officio, five other clergymen and five laymen, to be known as the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, shall be appointed at each Convention to prepare the official Ballots and the Calendar of Business, for the next Annual Convention.

The mode of conducting the nominations and elections of all Committees, Commissions and Boards and all other elective officers not otherwise provided for, shall be as follows:

Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations must place in the hands of the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, in writing, on or before noon of the Tuesday in the week preceding the opening day of the meeting thereof, nominations signed by himself for any or all officers mentioned in the above paragraph. Each nominator must certify to the Elections and Rules of Order Committee that the persons nominated by him have consented to the nomination. All names so sent in shall be reported to the Convention by the Committee, at the beginning of the opening session, in the form of a ballot, on which the names shall be arranged alphabetically in each class. After each list of nominations as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks may be filled by any voter. The voter shall mark with an X at the right of the name of each person for whom he votes. On the first ballot these ballots only shall be used, and also in all subsequent ballots, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. No ballot shall be counted in its class, on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled, and the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast.

The Secretary of the Convention shall call for nominations in his usual notice of the date and place of the Annual Convention, and shall, in the same notice, advertise the person or persons designated by said Committee, to whom such nomination shall be sent, with mailing addresses.

The members of Convention shall also be requested, in said call, to send to this Committee any canonical amendments or other important items of business that they may purpose to introduce at the next Convention, so that such matters may be assigned a place on the Calendar of Business. This call shall also be annually inserted in the April number of the official Magazine of the Diocese, The Newark Churchman.

Balloting shall take place in a separate room when practicable.

The clerical and lay voting lists shall be divided into two sections each.

- 14. Four or more Election Tellers, clerical and lay, in equal numbers, not necessarily members of the Convention, shall be appointed by the President before an election. They shall receive and canvass all votes cast at any election which is required to be by ballot, and when such canvass is completed, shall immediately report its result to the Convention. The polls shall be open for such time as the Convention may, by resolution, direct.
- 15. All reports (usually printed in the JOURNAL), of officers, committees, commissions, and boards of trustees under control of the Convention, shall be printed and distributed by the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order as far as practicable, at least two weeks before the meeting of the Convention; provided that the subject of such printing and reports shall have been referred to the Finance and Advisory Board for consideration, which Board shall have power to supervise, regulate, or to condense the same, and to issue to the Committee or to the Secretary of the Convention such intructions as in the judgment of the said Board will promote greater economy and efficiency in respect to this work.

Reports when read in Convention shall be read by title only, unless the reading be for the better transaction of business.

NEW BUSINESS.

16. All new business introduced, except such as may accompany and form a part of a report of a committee, shall be in the form of a motion or resolution and shall be in writing.

COMMITTEES.

17. All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered. It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Diocese to promptly notify the members of all special committees of their appointment. 18. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.

MOTIONS AND THEIR ORDER.

- 19. No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
- 20. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it; or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
- 21. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.

VOTING PRIVILEGES.

- 22. All questions shall be decided vive voce, unless otherwise specially ordered.
- 23. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote of the Convention shall be taken by Orders, voting separately; and, when a vote is thus taken a concurrent majority in both Orders shall be necessary to carry any measure.

The Fifty-third Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark assembled in Trinity Cathedral, Newark, N. J., at 9:30 on the morning of Tuesday, May 17th.

The Very Reverend Arthur Dumper, D. D., Dean of the Cathedral, celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by the Bishop and Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese. The offering at this opening Service was devoted to the work of the House of the Holy Comforter, West Orange.

The Convention was called to order by the Bishop Coadjutor at 10:40 A. M. Bishop Stearly presided and Bishop Lines was present at all sessions of the Convention.

The Chairman requested the Secretary of the Convention to ascertain whether or not there was present a constitutional quorum. The same having been found, the Fifty-third Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark was declared in order.

The Rev'd W. O. Leslie, Jr., was nominated as Secretary of the Convention. It was moved that the nominations be closed and that one ballot be cast for Canon Leslie as Secretary. The Chair declared Canon Leslie elected. The Secretary appointed the Rev'd J. Fred Hamblin as his assistant.

"Our books now show that all of the pension assessments due in the Diocese of Newark for the year 1926 have been paid to us, including interest. Once more this brings the payment of pension assessments in the Diocese up to 100 per cent. " " "

"I want to express to you again our deep appreciation of your constant co-operation, which has resulted in this record in the Diocese of Newark, and which has so effectively protected the interests of the clergy in the Diocese."

The total expenditures for pensions under all these heads on March 31st, 1927, amounted to \$624,232.76 a year. That is, the Episcopal Church is paying out over

\$6,450.00

\$52,000 a month in pensions. The increase in the reserve fund of the organization has made it possible to increase in part the outstanding age allowances and widows' pensions, and it is hoped that within a short time it will be possible to make a uniform increase in all pensions, so that the age allowances shall reach \$1,000 per year, and the widows' pensions be increased accordingly.

The resources of the Church Pension Fund have, by careful financial management, heen increased to a point where it seems safe to predict that the Fund is beyond the possibility of failure through disaster, so that this provision for the future of all the clergy now in orders, or who shall hereafter entry the ministry of our Church, is secure.

Bishop Stearly took occasion to extend the thanks of the Convention to the Committee for their very careful work.

Mr. George W. Hulsart presented the following resolution:

Insurance Endowment for Parishes.

WHEREAS all parish Churches are enabled to better pursue the many demands for the various works devolving upon them by the possession of funds available therefor and the lack of such financial means hampers their efforts; and

Whereas many parish Churches are under the necessity of using a large part of their available funds to meet the interest payments accruing on their funded debts, and are thus hampered in their activities; and

Whereas many parishioners have a keen love and desire to aid their individual Church and are unable through lack of financial resources to give such sums in their lifetime or to leave on their decease any sum which would equal their desires to bestow, and yet are and would be willing annually to contribute a comparatively small sum which eventually would be available to the individual Church of their choice, and which plan of contribution could be utilized by the individual by his procuring insurance on his life, paying the annual premiums thereon during his life and thus procuring on his death, or at the end of an endowment period, a sum for the benefit of his Church; and

WHEREAS publicity and consideration of the plan seems desirable, therefore be it

RESOLVED that it is the opinion of this Convention that an insurance endowment for every parish would be desirable and helpful for the Church and that the Secretary of this Convention communicate with the Vestries of the Diocese advising them of this opinion and respectfully suggesting that they consider the matter at one of their regular meetings, requesting each member to give the idea their thoughtful consideration.

The resolution was referred to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions.

Bishop Stearly, in behalf of Bishop Lines, announced the reappointment as Chancellor of the Hon. Charles W. Parker, and on behalf of the Bishop of the Diocese, nominated the Rev'd J. W. Van Ingen as Registrar. On motion, the Rev'd J. W. Van Ingen was elected as Registrar.

The Chair also presented, in behalf of Bishop Lines, the nomination of the Rev'd Messrs. Ladd, Kinsolving and Popham to serve as Examining Chaplains in the Class of 1930. On motion, the Secretary of the Convention was instructed to cast one ballot for the nominees following which they were declared elected.

The Chair appointed the Rev'd Allen Green and the Hon. J. W. Rufus Besson as members of the Board of Adjustment in the Class of 1930.

To the Fifty-third Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The Secretary of the Convention begs to report that he has attended to the various

duties of his office during the past year.

An increase is noted this year in the promptness with which the majority of Parochial Reports have been sent in as well as those of the various Committees and Commissions. However, many Parishes and Missions should be more careful in this matter. It is important to get the Diocesan Journal out within a reasonable time after the Convention. Unless more wholehearted cooperation is given on the part of those who are responsible for the various reports this cannot be done.

Your Secretary would especially recommend that all Parish Treasurers use the "Standard Cash Book" which may be obtained from the Church Finance Corporation, 289 Fourth Avenue, New York City. The use of this book will greatly aid

the Treasurers in making up the annual report to the Diocese.

Bishop Stearly made sundry announcements following which adjournment for luncheon was had at 1 P. M.

When the Convention reassembled after the luncheon recess at 2:20 P. M., the Rev'd C. T. Walkley presented the Report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons:

Report No. 1. To Canon 13, Paragraph 5, add, "Should it in the judgment of the Standing Committee be deemed necessary or expedient, the Bishop may assume entire charge and control of auch mission or organized mission, administering its affairs and conducting its worship and work as he may think best for it, until such time as in the opinion of the Standing Committee, the form and manner for the government of missions described in this Canon may be restored to it."

Certain discussion followed, during which an amendment was proposed which would omit all reference to the Standing Committee in the proposed addition to the Canon. The report, after amendment, was adopted and stands as follows:

"He may also, should he deem it necessary or expedient, assume entire charge and control of such mission or organized mission, administering its affairs and conducting its worship and work as he may think best for it, until such time as in his opinion, the form and manner for the government of missions described in this Canon may be restored to it."

Report No. 2. To Canon 6, Paragraph 1, Section 8.

The Committee recommended the adoption of the following amendment to Canon 6, Paragraph 1, Section 8, to read as follows: "For the carrying out of the above purposes it shall have power, with the approval of the Bishop, to appoint an Executive Secretary, who shall be a member of the Board, and who shall work under the direction of the Bishop. The Board shall make rules for its own guidance and provide such office space and employ such clerical help as it may deem advisable."

On motion, the amendment was adopted.

The Twelfth Annual Address of the Bishop Coadjutor was read at his request by Archdeacon Mori. (Vide, Index.)

Dr. Tinker moved the adoption of the following Resolution:

"I desire to move, if it be in order, that the order of the day at the close of the address of the Bishop Coadjutor, next year (for about fifteen minutes) be a human-interest survey by our Executive Secretary concerning the work of our foreign missionaries from this Diocese, and calling the roll of these absent members whom we should ever keep in mind,"

On motion, the resolution was adopted.

Archdeacon Elmendorf presented the following

Report of the Finance and Advisory Board.

1927.

To the Members of the Convention:

The Finance and Advisory Board herewith submits its Seventh Annual Report:

In presenting for your consideration the Budget for 1928, we call your attention to the fact that it is a tentative one. Each year it is necessary in January to make a working Budget based upon the pledges made for Diocesan and general work by the various Parishes and Missions. The offerings for these purposes have never reached the amount of the Budget presented at the Convention and each year your Board has been faced with the inability to meet the appropriations authorized by the Convention. The expenses of the Diocese increase yearly and it is right that they should. The population of the Diocese is increasing enormously and never in its history has there been such a time of opportunity as now. Every item of expense is carefully gone over by the Board and rigid economy observed. The Diocese has a right to expect this. There can be no question, however, in the mind of anyone who knows the condition of the Diocese, that we ought to have larger offerings for Diocesan support if we are to keep pace with the growth in population. Such work as the Church Mission of Help with its fine and splendid, and withal greatly needed, ministry ought not to be handicapped because we cannot increase the six thousand appropriated for its work. The Board of Missions with its responsibility to plan Mission Stations in the new communities growing up in all parts of the Diocese is unable to meet the reasonable demands for assistance in places where the opportunity is beyond question. Moreover, it has been demonstrated again and again that the policy of the Board is wise and the results justify the expenditure of its money in all the new places that have recently been established under the Diocesan Missionary, and yet we cannot go ahead as we ought because your Board cannot appropriate more to this work. We believe that education of our people in the opportunities that we have will bring larger gifts.

The step which has been taken this past year in securing an Executive Secretary whose first task is to organize a campaign of education concerning these needs, as well as those of the General Church, has, we believe, fully justified itself. While a good share of the increase in the budget is due to the establishment of this office, the very large increase in the offerings for work, both Diocesan and General, more than justifies adding the necessary overhead to Diocesan expenses.

Another matter of great importance to the Diocese has been the purchasing of the house next to the Diocesan House, No. 19 Washington Street. This has been necessary, not only because the increasing work of the Diocese required larger quarters for the offices of the Bishops and the staff, but it was wise because it was the only way to secure unfettered control over a right of way upon the rear of No. 21 Washington Street. This, too, has necessitated an increase in the budget, but your Board feels that the future will show that the move was a wise one.

In regard to the amounts contributed by the parishes and missions, the Finance and Advisory Board recommends the following principles of distribution:

That the Treasurer of the Finance and Advisory Board he instructed that up to a total of receipts upon Pariah quotas of \$270,000 at least one-half be sent to the National Council, and the remainder retained for the Diocesan Budget; that all receipts upon Pariah Quotas in excess of the said \$270,000 be sent to the National Council, until the total payments to the National Council aggregate \$174,600.

We offer the following resolutions:

- 1.—Resolved, That the Convention approves the Diocesan Assessment for 1928 as presented in the report of the Finance and Advisory Board.
- 2.—Resolved, That the Finance and Advisory Board is herewith given authority to levy an assessment on parishes at such rate to cover the above amount of \$35,700.00.
- 3.—Resolved, That the Convention approves of the tentative Budget for 1928 as presented in the report of the Finance and Advisory Board.

It was noved and seconded that the first resolution appended to the above report be adopted. Before the vote was taken, the Chair called upon the Rev'd Charles E. McAllister, the Executive Secretary of the Diocese, who gave an extensive report of his work and the activities of the Diocese since the time that he assumed his official connection with the Diocese.

The Chair also called upon Col. Wallace, the Treasurer of the Diocese, who urged the Deputies to use their influence in their respective Parishes and Missions to see that the individual pledges for the Church's Quota were kept paid to date.

Mr. Walter Kidde, Chairman of the Department of Development and Revenue, also spoke briefly about the work of this Department. The Rev'd Donald M. Brookman and the Rev'd Francis H. Richey, speaking on the motion, desired information concerning certain items in the Diocesan Assessment for 1928.

The original motion having been put, the first resolution in the Report of the Finance and Advisory Board was adopted. The second and third resolutions, then being put before the house, were likewise adopted.

Mr. F. A. Burlingame took occasion to speak briefly about the Bishops' Church Extension Fund and of the assistance which the Church Club of the Diocese was giving in trying to increase the membership in the Fund and the income per call.

Attention is called to the following report:

Report of the Department of Development and Revenue.

1927.

During the year ten meetings of the Department of Development and Revenue were held and the attendance of the members was as follows: No one member attended every meeting; one member attended nine meetings; one member attended eight meetings; three attended seven meetings; three attended six meetings; three attended five meetings; seven attended four meetings; three attended three meetings; eight attended two meetings, and three attended one meetings.

In January the Rev'd Guy H. Madara resigned as Secretary of the Department and his resignation was accepted with deep regret and appreciation of the work he had rendered the Department. The resignation of Canon Madara left the Department without an Executive until the Rev'd Charles E. McAllister was elected Executive Secretary of the Diocese with special attention to this Department. Mr. Charles H. VanNostrand was elected Recording Secretary.

In May the Department suffered another loss in the death of Mr. P. C. H. Papps, who was for many years Chairman of the Department of Development and Revenue. A minute on the death of Mr. Papps was adopted by the Department.

In the course of the year Mr. P. H. Patriarche and Mr. Thomas Thach resigned as members of the Department.

In February the Rev'd Charles E. McAllister came to the Diocese in the capacity of General Secretary of the Field Department of the National Council and conducted a survey of the work of the Department and the Diocese and the objectives determined on by the Department for the year were as follows: First, a Vestry Approach in each Parish and Mission; second, an effort to raise the remaining \$30,000 still unpledged on the National Deficit; third, an effort to persuade the Vestries to adopt the Quotas as a moral obligation. The Department also recommended to the Finance and Advisory Board that the budget for 1927 be reduced to \$300,000 from the 1926 Budget of \$350,000.

At the June Meeting Mr. Walter Kidde was elected Chairman of the Department and Mr. Charles H. VanNostrand and Col. Allan B. Wallace were elected Secretary and Treasurer, respectively.

Early in September plans for the Nation Wide Campaign and Every Member Canvass were prepared and presented. The plans adopted and carried out by the Department included:

A large Mass Meeting for Clergy, Parish Chairmen and three Lay Representatives from each Parish, which was held at St. Luke's Church, Montclair, on October 9th;

The organization of a Quota Committee consisting of fifty men, each member of this Committee being assigned from three to five Parishes or Missions, whose duty it was to see that the Every Member Canvass was thoroughly organized and conducted and the Time Schedule carried out in each of his Parishes;

The Time Schedule was a prepared list of the dates on which the different kinds of literature were to be mailed and different meetings held.

The Quota Committee met seven times during the fall, separately and in conjunction with the Department of Development and Revenue.

The Literature for the Campaign included a series of three pamphlets called: (1) "The Presiding Bishop's Parish," (2) "The Bishop's Parish," and (3) "The Rector's Parish"; and Publicity Item Sheets which were mailed to each Parish and Mission each week for six weeks previous to the Canvass. Pledge cards were also sent on request.

Special Speakers during the fall were: The Rt. Rev'd William P. Remington, D.D., Missionary Bishop of Eastern Oregon, who visited in the Diocese for a week and spoke in ten Parishes; the Rt. Rev'd Philip Cook of Delaware, who also visited the Diocese for a week and spoke in ten Parishes. Other speakers who came to the Diocese in the interests of the Church's Missionary Program were: Rev'd R. Bland Mitchell, Executive Secretary of the Field Department of the National Council; Mr. Lewis B. Franklin, Treasurer of the National Council; Rev'd Elmer N. Schmuck, General Secretary of the Field Department of the National Council; Dr. John W. Wood of the Department of Missions of the National Council, and Dr. Sturgis of the National Council. Members of the Quota Committee also took speaking engagements in the Diocese.

During the period of the Nation Wide Campaign sixty Parishes were visited. To these sixty Parishes 97 visits were made, of which 38 were taken by the Executive Secretary of the Diocese; 37 by Special Speakers and 22 by members of the Quota Committee. These appointments included Vestry Approaches, addresses at Sunday morning services; meetings for the training of Canvassers and addresses at Parish Dinners, etc.

It was the aim of the Department to have a Parish Chairman appointed in every Parish and Mission. One hundred and thirty-eight Parishes and Missions reported the appointment of a Parish Chairman.

The Every Member Canvass resulted in total pledges for the Diocese and General Church amounting to \$248,588.81, with eighty-seven Parishes and Missions pledging their total Quota or over. This is the largest number of Parishes and Missions pledging their Quota since the beginning of the Nation Wide Campaign.

The pledges for the Program showed an increase of approximately \$38,000 over last year, which is the largest increase of any Diocese in the American Church, with the exception of one, and that one Diocese made its increase on the 25th Anniversary of the consecration of its Bishop. The Department sets as its goal for the coming year an increase of about \$50,000, which would enable us to meet our entire obligations.

The Department also took part in the preparations and planning for the Bishops' Crusade.

Ballots were distributed and the polls were opened and closed.

The Rev'd Dr. Joseph R. Lynes reported as Chairman of the Diocesan Committee appointed to help clear off the share of the Diocese of Newark in the deficit of the National Council. The report stated that to date \$60,409.67 had been received in cash and \$16,162.84 in pledges, leaving a balance of approximately \$3,000 to be raised. The Bishop Coadjutor urged that steps be taken to clear off this balance.

In behalf of the Convention, the Chair called upon Mrs. George W. Bond, Chairman of the Board of Managers of the House of the Holy Comforter, to present the work of this Institution. Mrs. Bond gave a most appealing account of the work and asked the interest and cooperation of the members of the Convention.

The Tellers reported the result of the Second Ballot as follows:

Deputies to the Provincial Synod—Ven. Henry M. Ladd, Ven. Malcolm A. Shipley, Mr. Edward O. Stanley, Mr. J. Clifford Woodhull.

On motion, the Rev'd Warren Van H. Filkins was elected to fill the vacancy in the list of Supplementary Deputies in the Class of 1928.

The Rev'd Allen Greene, Chairman of the Tellers, having canvassed the vote, announced that the Rev'd G. P. Armstrong and Archdeacon Mori were elected as Clerical Supplementary Deputies in the Class of 1930, and Mr. James Keeley as Lay Supplementary Deputy, but that there was a tie to fill the second vacanacy between Mr. F. W. Lobdell and Mr. A. P. Green. On motion of Bishop Lines, the Secretary of the Convention was instructed

to draw lots to fill this vacancy, as a result of which Mr. Lobdell was declared elected. This completed the elections.

Mrs. Arthur D. Story having been given the courtesy of the floor, presented an interesting account of the proposed work of the new Holiday House at Eagle's Nest Farm, Delaware.

The Rev'd Dr. Cooder being called upon by the Chair, gave one of his exceedingly interesting accounts of the work of the City Mission.

The Rev'd W. W. S. Hohenschild, presenting the Report of the Committee on the Reception of New Parishes, reported favorably on the application of St. Elizabeth's, Ridgewood, and moved that the same be admitted into union with the Convention. On motion, this resolution was adopted.

We desire to convey to you our deep gratitude which can only be expressed in the continued affection of the men, women, and children of the Diocese--your own people-and by our prayers that as your years, so shall your strength be, and that they may be blessed with further assurances of the love and loyalty of the clergy and laity of this Diocese. May grace, mercy, and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ abide with you and yours and rest with you always.

Support us all the day, O Lord, of this troublous life until the shadows lengthen and the fever of life is over and our work is done. Then of thy great mercy grant us aske lodging and a holy rest and peace at the last through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

The same was adopted by a rising vote, following which Bishop Lines spoke a few words of appreciation.

Moved, seconded and carried that the thanks of the Convention be extended to the Dean and members of the Cathedral for their courtesy in entertaining the Convention, and that the customary honorarium be paid to the Sexton of the Church.

Mr. James R. Strong moved that the reading and approval of the Minutes be left to a Committee consisting of Bishop Stearly and the Secretary of the Convention. The motion was adopted.

Following the singing of a hymn, the Bishop Coadjutor read the closing prayer and the blessing was given by Bishop Lines.

The Fifty-third Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark adjourned at 6:04 P. M., sine die.

A very interesting dinner meeting to the Deputies of the Convention and other interested persons was tendered by the Church Club of the Diocese following the adjournment of the Convention.

The speakers were the Bishop and Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese, Dr. John W. Wood, Executive Secretary of the Department of Missions of the National Council, and Dr. Joseph R. Lynes, Rector of St. Paul's Church, Englewood.

The Episcopal Address

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

Two of our Clergy have died since the last Convention: Rev'd John D. Kennedy, sometime in charge of the Church of the Epiphany, Allendale, and for the last four years of his life in charge of St. Paul's, Montvale. Under him the Church prospered and a large addition was made for the care of the Sunday School and Church work, looking also to the needed enlargement of the Church in the future. He was held in high regard by his brethren of the Clergy and Laity and his death is a great loss to us.

What can one say which expresses in any fitting way our grief in the death of Rev'd Charles H. Wells, Rector of St. Andrew's Church, Newark, whose life went out with Easter Day? He had built up a strong, vigorous parish from a small mission and had gathered about him one of the most vigorous of our congregations. The fine Church with the Rectory beside it, with plans for the much needed Parish House, will stand on Clinton Hill as a visible memorial of his zeal and devotion. He had given fifteen years to the work to which we have reason to believe he had consecrated his life. He was a man of peculiar gifts and with a deep sense of personal loss and the grief of a great company of our people in Newark and the Diocese, I make record of the closing of his life here.

While Rev'd Gouverneur Morris Wilkins had not been transferred to the Diocese, he had worked with us for many years, especially at Phillipsburg, and had made for himself a large company of friends such as comes to a friendly man. He had a long ministry in colonial parishes in Connecticut, and he had a place in a distinguished family from colonial days; he was a very devoted servant of the Church in which he had filled out a ministry of fifty-five years. Let me name three men who were formerly rectors in this Diocese although for many years working elsewhere—Rev'd Philo W. Sprague, ordained here by the first Bishop Doane and Bishop Odenheimer, was from 1874-1878 in his earliest ministry rector of Calvary Church, Bayonne. He filled out a ministry of peculiar devotion of about forty years in Charlestown, Massachusetts. Few men have had a greater genius for friendship in the service of the Church with peculiar interest in community and social welfare.

We counted Rev'd Elliot White as one of our number, although after having been in charge of St. Alban's, Newark, from 1894-1903, and later Rector of Grace Church, Newark, he went from us in 1913 to St. Mark's, Philadelphia. For most of his ministry of about forty years he was in

the service of the Church in the State of New Jersey and very closely associated through all those years of hard and faithful work with the Clergy and people of our own Diocese. Rev'd Cornelius W. Twing, sometime Rector of St. Mary's, Haledon, went from us to the Diocese of New Jersey and filled out a very remarkable ministry in a ceaseless round among a large number of missions in the thinly settled Pine and Cranberry Country. His life was an inspiration to all who knew of his goodness and devotion.

Rev'd Dr. William D. P. Bliss, some years in charge of Holy Innocents' Church, Orange Mountain, was a pioneer in Christian Socialism and in the service of many social reforms—a man of kind and gentle spirit whose work was of great value in the preparation of movements which have larger recognition now in our Church life because of his service of them.

Every year sees many officers of the Diocese and parishes who have been of great help pass from us, outstanding men and women upon whom the work of the Church has much depended. One cannot name them all because there are so many, and some whose names were least known to the public have been really the greatest servants of the Church. These come to my mind as I look back over the year:

Mr. Francis S. Holmes, who was long connected with St. Mark's, West Orange, an officer of the Parish, interested in a great many Diocesan activities, one of the foremost men in the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, had taken a large place among us and kept close relation to us with great affection after he had found a home and Church duty in the Diocese of Long Island, Mr. William Perkins was one of the original members of St. Alban's. Newark, and an officer for more than a quarter of a century. Mr. Edwin M. Southard was a very useful member of the same Church. Mr. Frederick M. Hoffman, Treasurer of St. Peter's, Livingston, had been associated with the Church from its beginning. Mr. George G. Kipp was one of the older members of St. Peter's, Morristown, and Rear-Admiral Elijah Lawes was for some years an officer of the Church of the Redeemer. Mr. Alexander S. Jordan was an officer of Grace Church, Rutherford, and a most helpful member of it for more than twenty-five years. Mr. Robert W. McChesney was the Treasurer of St. George's, Newark. Mr. William A. Drabble of Calvary Church, Summit, lost two sons, his only children, in the World War. Mr. William Gaskell has gone from St. Luke's, Paterson. Mr. Talbot Root was one of the most active and valuable members of Christ Church, Bloomfield and Glen Ridge, Mr. Joseph Jackson, Treasurer, was a very useful officer of Grace Chapel, East Rutherford.

Let these good women be also named: Mrs. Joseph N. Blanchard, greatly interested in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary and especially in our work in Brazil, widow of one of our Clergy who will always be remembered for his service of the Diocese and the whole Church; Mrs. Alice C. Sander-

son, one of the oldest members of the House of Prayer, Newark; Mrs. Samuel Lord of Grace Church, Orange. Mrs. John Earle of Trinity Church, Bayonne, died at the age of ninety years.

THE BISHOPS' CRUSADE

The note-worthy undertaking of the year in the Diocese and in the whole Church has been what we have called The Bishops' Crusade. The whole Church has felt for many years that there ought to be a concerted effort to awaken spiritual interest in all of our parishes and people. There always have been, and probably always will be, times of depression in religion followed by times of revival. Every movement runs its course, in some measure exhausts itself and calls for renewed effort. One form of activity marks a generation and a sense of proportion may be lost, calling for renewed emphasis upon some part of the Church's life. Such movements have marked the history of religion from the beginning and have been regarded by some students as the distinctive feature of Church history.

I commend earnestly here today this effort in which our Diocese has taken its part with all the rest, to stir up a distinctly spiritual movement which shall put the emphasis upon genuine religion and which shall reach into every parish, mission church and home in the Diocese. It expresses a great truth, as I have said, concerning the Church and the progress of religion. Accept the word "revival" as a permanent part of the Church's vocabulary and put meaning into it. Let that movement which we have begun be permanent, that whatever gains have been made may be sayed. with the vision of revived spiritual interest preserved. It is of vital importance and you and I in our places must fight hard to have it recognized, or the Church will lose its place and power. There is a deeply seated feeling which is wholesome, that the Church is not doing its appointed work in the world. When preachers cast about for subjects for interesting sermons they are apt to discuss the shortcomings of the Church and generally when they are addressing faithful and devoted people who are doing about all that is done to give the Church life and power in the community. We are not warranted in saying that all is well with the Church and that it is standing for what it ought in our communities. The trouble, however, is not with the Church as a divinely founded society, but with us to whom its care and work are committed. Every member of the Church, whether Clergyman or layman, should begin by asking whether he, in his place, is so living and working as to commend the Church to the confidence and love of the people, and to make for it, influence in the service of the greatest cause which was ever given to men or women,—the cause of Jesus Christ.

A PERMANENT MOVEMENT

What we have done through the Bishops' Crusade was only a beginning. There have been results in which we may all rejoice, a distinct progress

wherever clergy and right minded people have heeded the call which went out with the authority of the whole Church to take part in a movement of spiritual revival. It is difficult to measure spiritual results. They cannot be tabulated like offerings, building operations, material undertakings, but none of them are lost; they bear fruit, somewhere, some time. Let me plead with you who hear me today to look upon this revival of spiritual interest as a permanent undertaking. Our people have been called to special services with Prayer and intercession and conference, which make religion more real and personal. These undertakings ought to be maintained with our experience in mind. They ought not to be given up even if we have to say that not many persons came. There always have been and always will be in every parish a little group at least, of spiritually minded people who will come together for conference with their clergyman concerning spiritual things and for intercession, and they have always been the hope of the Church. That is the doctrine of the Remnant which shall be left even in the most depressing times, and it is one of the most comfortable doctrines of the Bible. It comes out of the Old Testament but it has that wonderful declaration of Our Blessed Lord to depend upon-"Where two or three are gathered together in My Name, there am I in the midst of them."

The Bishops' Crusade has given us our opportunity to emphasize the personal character of religion and this is of the utmost importance. There must be organization and the Church is to be thought of as the religion of Christ, organized in order that it may be maintained and made effective. Those who are speaking lightly of the Church are unmindful of the necessity of organization and at a time when it is recognized in every department of human life and activity, while it is to be said that organization must never displace spiritual inc. the minimum of our personal ministry in the choice and training of the first apostles and disciples and the binding of them together in a family and fellowship. That personal character of religion must be maintained. The Christian minister must be a pastor and Christian people must recognize their relation as members of one family if our religion is to keep its vitality. There have been new expressions of this personal feeling and relation in the Bishops' Crusade and for their maintenance and development an earnest plea is here made.

Receive the exhortation to keep all that has been gained in the last year through this endeavor to set forward a distinctly spiritual movement and so to emphasize what is essential in religion. Regard what has been done as simply a beginning, with the determination to emphasize anew the distinctive principles of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The Church and the parish must have in them the spirit of Christ, the spirit of fellowship and charity and good will if it is to live and serve the world. A beginning has

been made and we must go forward. A vision has been opened before us which must not be obscured.

GENEROUS SUPPORT OF THE CHURCH

While I have put first in my address the spiritual nature of our religion and the spiritual obligation, let me plead with you to remember your duty towards the Church in the generous support of its work. In the development of our civilization and in our thought about life, material progress has gone before regard for what is spiritual. We are more conscious of belonging to an order which is concerned with this world than to an order which is distinctly spiritual and deals with what is of eternal significance. It is the work of the Christian Church to keep men and women in mind of the fact that their membership in this spiritual order is supremely important and to let it dominate conduct. There is a response to that sense of our spiritual nature and destiny when it is fairly presented.

I have no thought of a special appeal to you for generous giving of your means for the service of the Church, but when one sees an endless amount of money given for all kinds of purposes, and sees the need of support of what is distinctly religious, he feels it to be fair to ask men and women to be thoughtful of the maintenance of the work given to the Church to do. There never was a more generous time in giving than our own; never a more generous people responding to appeals for good objects than our own, but the Church is not getting its fair share in the gifts of its own people. It is not necessary that the Church should be in possession of great means; riches have been a greater danger than poverty. Largely endowed Churches have been less useful to the Church and religion than those supported by the free-will offerings of the people. The situation of a Church in respect to the population and the character of its work determines this question. It may be said of parishes as of persons, that neither poverty nor riches is best; neither depressing poverty nor freedom from the necessity of exertion. We do need a people trained to generous and intelligent giving and it is to be presented as definitely a religious duty as Prayer, Honesty or any other Christian virtue. We cannot say that we give so that giving means self-sacrifice. Most of us give what we can spare, without feeling it very keenly, and we give in answer to appeals under pressure, while I am not unmindful of the number of those who do give, up to the full measure of their ability and thoughtfully. The Diocese and the Churches do not need to be mendicants, begging for a meagre and grudgingly given support, The appeals in our Churches, often more earnestly made than the preaching, are not creditable to us. Nearly every Church appears to be on the verge of bankruptcy. The methods resorted to to obtain money for Church purposes often lack dignity. It is thought necessary to make a return in the way of amusement for a meagre sum for the support and equipment of the Church. We ought to lift this matter of giving to a higher plane,

and for education as regards the fair support of Diocese and parish I plead here today. Our Mother, the Church, ought not to present Herself to the world as a beggar while so many of Her children live in luxury and have lack of nothing. Education and information, the presentation of giving according to ability as a religious duty and a privilege are the remedy. The beginning must be made in a well trained parish.

The parish should be a far more dignified and efficient organization in the community than it is in many places. It ought to have more selfrespect, and to command respect rather than pity. Much depends upon the rector, for the Church has given him a place of leadership and by his pastoral work and service he ought to be so great a servant of the community that it feels the necessity and privilege of his generous support. The old thought of the value of pastoral work which has been characteristic of this Church is not well maintained. The Divinity Schools do not impress it upon the new men as they ought. It is harder to do it well, with the coming in of the apartment houses and unsettlement of home life, but it is absolutely necessary for a strong and vigorous parish. The demands upon the rector have greatly increased and he must have more help than before and more helpful parishioners to do his work. But he is the leader, and as in every other department of human life and activity, he must do the work committed to him and accepted by him without complaint. He must train the officers of his Church, willing to learn from them as well as to ask their help.

THE WELL ORDERED PARISH

The officers of a Church ought to regard their office as one of great dignity, usefulness and opportunity for service. They are more than a business corporation. They ought to keep close watch of the business of the parish, endeavoring to bring everyone into its support, patient and considerate of all the people, hospitable to new-comers, looking upon them all as friends, neighbors, and fellow laborers and not simply as what are called "prospects". Parishioners are not to be judged according to their subscriptions, whether by the Clergy or their fellow parishioners. The very questionable phrase "our best people" needs much qualification, if not disuse. There are more than one thousand officers of our Church vestries and when interested in the parish they are a great source of strength, Some of them are old in the service and deserve consideration, but opportunities come to bring young men who have shown their interest into places of responsibility. A Vestry meeting ought to be more than a business meeting-more than a meeting to which financial reports and plans are to be made; it ought to be that, and bring into its service the best financial skill to be found, if combined with patience, discretion and kindness. But the question ought to be asked whether the parish is doing its work in the community so as to deserve support, so as to be standing in a large and

fine way for the service of religion. The question ought to be asked whether the parish, through its various agencies and through its membership is a great servant of the community, standing for good causes, standing against the various influences which come into a community to degrade it, to lower its standard of morals, to make it a harder place to bring up the children; whether in the changes of population there is not something to be done to prepare the Church for the future. A Vestry meeting may also well be from time to time a class upon the subject for which I am especially here pleading—education as regards the support of the Parish, the Diocese and the General Church.

We might well look to the officers of our parishes for leadership in such an educational movement in the Diocese. If our people can be well informed and the proper spirit of giving be cultivated our needs will be met.

THE DIOCESAN OBLIGATION

Those of us who are in the direction of the affairs of the Diocese. whether as regards Diocesan support or the Diocesan Missions and Church Extension, the care of our institutions, feel keenly the inability to meet the demands made upon us and wish that some of the great gifts of our people might be turned in our direction. It would be hard to name any part of the country where there is today greater opportunity for laying foundations, for beginning and fostering work which will mean much for religion in the future. Those who make the budget and watch over the Diocesan interests do the best they can for Diocesan Missions and our various activities. The Church Club has taken up the work of increasing the number of subscribers to the Church Extension Fund, to which the Diocese is greatly indebted for its progress. Too much time would be required to name all of our undertakings. We desire to have them all such as will commend themselves to the intelligent support of our people. Coordination and good understanding among all our Boards which have care of our finances are desirable. The relation of them all to the Every Member Canvass, for the support of the Diocese and the work of the General Church should be better known. There is in no Diocese better care of financial interests, with its annual statement of receipts and expenditures, information as to where all our money comes from and whither it goes, than our own. It would be hard to name a Diocese in which there is more unpaid service by more capable men and women than in our own. These facts, however, as presented in our Diocesan Journal, only come to the knowledge of a few persons, as the edition of the Journal is of less than one thousand copies. My thought in what I have here said to you, concerning the support of our work, goes quite beyond an appeal for money to an appeal for the education of our people to know and appreciate the work and obligations of the Diocese and the development, as a part of their

religion, of a sense of personal responsibility. We need more than fitful appeals and what are called financial campaigns; we need education and knowledge and in a well ordered parish the people will know what the Diocesan and General Church obligations are. There are parishes in which there is hardly any missionary instruction. Appeals are made now and then but they do not take the place of orderly, intelligent education upon this subject of the proper support of the Church's work. If our people knew how little groups of Church folk in many mission churches are trying to obtain a foothold for the Church in the service of religion, they would gladly heed the call of the Diocese for Church Extension. We only undertake new work where there is a considerable number of our Church people whom we are bound to follow, or where there is plainly a dearth of religious services and ministration. We are not establishing new churches where they are not needed, and we are respectful of undertakings other than our own. This Church stands for so much in the way of a definite Christian faith generously presented, reverent Christian worship, the ministry of the Word and Sacraments, for the Church as a divinely ordered society, that it ought to have the support of its members as a primary obligation. This is the time, when representatives of all of our churches are present, to plead with them to go home to their parishes and begin a campaign of education which shall reach into every family, until our people are thoroughly informed and interested in what we are called upon and are trying, in Christ's name, to do.

THE TEACHING CHURCH

Our people ought not to be disturbed by the controversies and discussions which are going on in the name of religion. Those discussions were never more keen than today and they are a sign of life. They reveal the fact that religion cannot be crowded out of human life; that it demands and will have a hearing. More books are published upon the subject of religion than ever before; more people are thinking about it, asking questions, seeking and desiring leadership. The questions asked and demanding an answer are deeper and more compelling than ever before. They relate, not to the external things of religion which have had over much attention but they concern the deepest things of religion—the existence of God, our true relation to Him, the place which Jesus Christ holds permanently in revealing the character and will of the Heavenly Father. His claim upon all men as their Saviour, Teacher, the Master of their lives. It is no time for those who are sent to teach religion and to be the guides of men in the deepest things of life, to be working on the surface or in the shallows, to be thinking about small and incidental things, to be giving themselves to the adornment and meticulous equipment of their churches. What they have in their heads and hearts counts. It is not the time to fight for the preservation of what is old in the ordering of religion and the life of the Church because it is old, but keeping fast hold of what has been approved by experience and what concerns the eternal principles of justice, righteousness and the Gospel of Jesus Christ, to have knowledge of the movements which are in the world and to preach a living Gospel. The world will give little heed to those who give themselves to the reproach of the way it is going, to the denunciation of what is wrong with it, to criticism of the way in which unprivileged men and women and people in hard places are trying to better themselves in irregular and unusual ways. but the world will hear its true teachers who are accredited by genuine knowledge, character and experience, and who are in thorough sympathy with the efforts to make it a better world. The men and women whom we need in the service of the Church and religion do not think over much of soldiers who sing warlike hymns and are giving undue attention to their uniforms and things external, but to those who have the sense of leadership in a large way and are fighting for great moral principles and the good of their fellow men. They ask for a parish church which is a moral, spiritual and brotherly asset in the community, not for one which is satisfied with the ordering of a beautiful service which pleases a small company of respectable and particular people. The Church which is to be a power must have genuine, Christ-like people in its pulpits and in its pews.

SIMPLICITY IN LIFE AND RELIGION

Keep the simplicity of your life, and keep simplicity in your religion. Keep the remembrance of the home and family in Nazareth as you make and order your own home. If riches increase set not your heart upon them. It is a fine thing for a man or woman who has come to place or position in life to remember the old friends and the day of small things, We start life and we end life pretty much alike, and in between we do well to keep as close together in friendship and fellowship, sympathy and good will as possible. Distinctions and differences will come but we can soften them and make more comfortable those who fall behind in the race, but who will catch up in the end, if only we put into practice the brotherly teaching of Our Blessed Lord. Luxury, waste, pride are the enemies of peace and good will in the world, and they make as much unhappiness for their possessors as for those who must go without them. That was a wise answer of a wise woman of Shunem to the prophet Elisha. when he asked her if he should speak for her to the king, or the captain of the host, she said: "I dwell among mine own people." Whatever your condition or possessions may be, cease not in fellowship, good will and sympathy to dwell among your own people. The display and extravagance which mark much of our social life today are not Christian and they are inviting unhappiness and disaster in the next generation,

Keep simplicity in your religion. We must have reverence in the House of God and such beautiful surroundings as our means permit, but the

great adornment of the House of God is in the holy men and women and children gathered there for worship. A good deal is being crowded into the Churches which has not much to commend it in the way of dignity. The Church is a place for those who desire to come into the presence of Almighty God and worship as members of Christ's family, while not expert in symbolism. There is no hope for the Church of the future if it is not kept the home of men and women who earn their bread by their daily work and who feel therein at home. Thank God for the women who come plainly dressed to the worship of Almighty God, leaving their finery home, so as not to distract the attention of their fellow sinners, and so as to leave all who come without the sense of distinction which these things make. The differences in circumstances and conditions ought to be left outside the Church door. Thank God for the women who are never thinking of the insecurity of their social position if they are friendly with the genuine people who are doing the world's hard work.

COMMUNITY RESPONSIBILITY

I wish I might send you back to your parishes with a larger thought about religion and everything pertaining to it in the way of worship, service or organization. We accept narrow thoughts about it and associate with it much that is petty and unworthy, as if they belonged in religion, and they do not. We live within the range of prejudices and small controversies, often concerning things which nobody ever understood nor shall understand, and we ought to part company with all these low conceptions of religion. We are dealing with many more kinds of people with different traditions, interested in new movements and undertakings of all kinds, and our presentation of religion must be larger than ever before. Sermons preached before the War, although they may be re-fitted, have little value as messages to people who are doing the world's work today. It is a new world and it must be treated with respect by those who would receive respect from it. It is for you to have a definite part in lifting up the life, service and purposes of every Church in this Diocese to a higher plane. You must not live within the range of your likes and opinions or you will live within prison walls. With large plans and purposes you must make your parish a source of spiritual power and Christ-like service. Remember also that good citizenship must rest upon religion, with its recognition of the common good and service of the community. Some people appear to feel that the old foundations are broken up, the old land marks gone-; they lack the courage and will to make the community life what it ought to be. Of course the home is of vital importance and it has many new enemies. Community life cannot be a substitute for home life, but it must help as the life of the home is weakened. Christian men and women ought to feel keenly the duty of fighting against the evil things which degrade and corrupt our public and community life. When good people cease to buy and

read books which are bad they will cease to be written and the battle against vicious literature will be largely won. When they cease to patronize moving picture shows and theatres where corrupt, degrading, vulgar shows are staged there will be a better chance for what is clean and wholesome in the way of recreation and amusement. It has been a great mistake that wholesome places of resort have not been provided to satisfy the social instinct to which the saloon appealed. Suppression has had undue place in religious teaching and this is one reason for suspicion of us by the new generation,

As I speak of the home and family, let me urge you to treat them with the greatest reverence. We are shocked by the way homes are broken up by divorce, sought and granted for unworthy causes. The position of our Church in recognizing the innocent party in a broken marriage appears to me scriptural and right. The remedy lies in the bringing up of young people to regard marriage as a sacred relation, not to be entered into lightly, and to be treated with reverence. The remedy for our deplorable situation as regards divorce lies that way rather than by more rigid Church legislation.

OLD VIRTUES AND A NEW TIME

When the strain upon life is so great and the pace so fast there must be more regard for recreation, but it need not be destructive of what is serious and reasonable. In their desire to get away from themselves and to stop thinking, amusement, not always of a commendable kind, is sought which is distracting, while what they need is to find themselves and to respect their endowment as thinking men and women. The commercial instinct often dominates the moral instinct and decency itself is sacrificed for the making of money. There is a plain connection between the amusements and the degradation of social life and the prevalence of crime. The children are trained to familiarity with what is criminal, vulgar and harrowing, to their life long injury. You and I appear able to do little to withstand the evil influences which greed for gain develops to lower the whole moral and intellectual tone of the community, but we can at least keep away from the places where the evil is done.

We need not keep silent when men and women who have violated the decencies of life draw crowds because they can act or sing. We need not keep silent when governors and public men throng prize fights and make those who beat and bruise one another heroes in the sight of a new generation. Much can be done to prevent vulgarity from being profitable in the community. It is a part of the duty of a Christian man or woman to keep the life of the community wholesome and respectable, and for that the Church should stand and the Churches stand together in every town and city.

There are many other things for which one would gladly plead at this

time in this place. Public opinion determines the policy of the state and the country as well as the community. We are spending over much time in telling a distressed and anxious world how prosperous we are. I would rather have the love and respect of the world because of our generosity and friendship than its envy and hatred because of our pride and selfishness. Isolation will not be a permanent refuge for us, for in this world where all nations have become neighbors selfishness is a blight upon the life of a nation as of an individual. The two most worthy actions of our country in my time have been the throwing of all resources into the Great War to save civilization, and the adoption of Prohibition as a bar against the degradation of the life of the land through strong drink and the corruption of our political life. The true course for a great people as regards these moral questions is to go straight on to end the horrors of war and the degradation of strong drink. They are both the enemies of religion and of civilization.

Great movements are in the world and it is a great time in which to live and set them forward. Let the Church and every parish and member therein covet the place of leadership in the conflict for righteousness, mercy and good will. Industrial controversies are to be brought to an end by the application of the principles of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and the responsibility for a peaceful solution of troubles belongs with the privileged party. We have brought millions of people across the sea, many of them because we wanted cheap labor to build up this industrial structure in which we have so much pride. Behave as Christian people towards those who were strangers within our gates but now are of our own people. Let prejudices and the use of disrespectful names pass and remember that if this Church is to have any large place in the country in the future it must be because it has won the love, through service, of those of foreign birth or parentage

Let not our negro people lack sympathy and help as they make their way in a wonderful manner out of old time slavery and its influences to the high position which they are taking among us. Every act of kindness or service is an act of reparation for ancient wrong on the part of a dominant race. No part of the work of this Diocese has given me more satisfaction than the prosperity of our work among the colored people. It is a perplexing time in which to live and think and work, but have great courage and large hope. The world has come through harder experiences and never had such treasures of good accomplishment, of noble lives, of devotion and sacrifice for worthy causes as it has back of it today. The cause of the Christ for which a multitude of holy men and women have labored and suffered cannot fail. Let not the calamity which has fallen upon the missionary work in the East, as China stumbles forward towards its great future, depress you. It goes along the way which all great nations have traversed. China will wish the missionaries back if only they will

come in the spirit of Jesus of Nazareth; China will take back the business men out of the west if only they be more enlightened and unselfish; China will learn that there has been undue haste in parting company with western education, medicine and religion. If only there had been one generation more of the work of men and women out of the west the new China might have come in peace. There may be a halt in the progress of our religion in the continent whence it came, but it will come to its own and you and I must have our part in winning the victory for our crucified and risen Lord in that continent where the Cross and Joseph's tomb stood.

LOOKING FORWARD

When Bishop Stearly became Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese there was an assignment and division of duties between us as the Canon requires. It has not been a very rigid division and has taken neither one of us away from the oversight of parishes, visitations for Confirmation, Ordinations and like duties. I would like to speak in the strongest way, and with the greatest gratitude of the consideration and kindness which he has shown me, and without which I could not have continued into the 24th year of my service in the Diocese. I have in mind at this time a transfer of authority in the administration of the affairs of the Diocese quite beyond that made at the election of the Bishop Coadjutor, so that Bishop Stearly have freedom of action as regards Episcopal direction and initiative. This is not a resignation of office by me, which requires the action of the House of Bishops and which cannot, of course, be long delayed. It is a proper recognition of what is due to Bishop Stearly who now carries the larger responsibility and burden of our common work. I would like, if health and strength permit, to go on for a time taking part in the work of the Diocese. The subject has had careful consideration by Bishop Stearly and myself, and no action of the convention is required. I have a deep sense of gratitude for the kindness which has come to me from him, and from the Diocese as we have worked together.

May the blessing of our Heavenly Father rest ever more abundantly upon the Diocese of Newark, its clergy and people.

The Bishop Coadjutor's Address

My Dear Brothers in Christ:

It is right first of all to give thanks to our Heavenly Father for His many blessings to us as individuals, and to the Church in the diocese, during the past year. It is of His loving kindness that we have been kept in the fellowship of His Spirit, and enabled to go forward in His service.

What has been done by our great company of faithful people, in our 153 parishes and missions, we lay as an offering today at the feet of our Gracious Lord. We ask His pardon for its imperfections; His acceptance of it for its aim and purpose; and His blessing upon it to the good of our fellowmen. And we pray for His grace and sustaining power that we may go on to do His will and to accomplish the work He sets before us.

It is a pleasure to give a word of greeting and godspeed to St. Mark's Parish, West Orange, in the recent celebration of its one hundredth anniversary. With a century-long tradition of devotion behind it, with provision for its support made by those who in past years have loved it well, and with the eager cooperation of pastor and people in an ever enlarging ministry, it stands, with youth renewed and great promise, before a new period in its history. The best wishes of us all go out to its rector and people for a constantly broadening and deepening ministry. A word of welcome should be said to St. Elizabeth's Parish, Upper Ridgewood, which asks today to be received into our diocesan family. St. Elizabeth's is the offshoot of St. Bartholomew's, Ho-Ho-Kus; itself organized and received into the diocese in 1909. The Rev'd R. J. Thomson, the first and only rector of St. Bartholomew's, encouraged the new organization in this growing section of Ridgewood, and the task of leadership in both places becoming too great for one man, led in the plans for the making of the new parish, choosing himself to remain with the older organization, and facing the difficult problems of its development. The establishment of two self-supporting parishes in so short a time is a fine accomplishment and praise is due to all those who have had part in it. The new parish starts with a beautiful Church building almost entirely paid for and a company of people whose love for the Church is both wise and eager.

I.

One of the interesting aspects characteristic of the life of the Church in the Diocese of Newark is the constant marked activity of the parishes in regard to material equipment.

We have now 153 parishes and missions in the cities, towns and villages

of our seven counties. All these places are near enough to New York to be affected by its life and spirit; and many of them reflect in their own transformation and growth the movement of thought and population in the metropolis. New centres of population are constantly developing; new towns are being established; and old settlements finding themselves strangely altered and enlarged by the incoming tides of population.

Everywhere the Church people are interested in keeping touch with the new situations. A new mission is formed, and a site for it is searched out, and upon it a new and inexpensive building erected. Or the old buildings are found inadequate to the new and larger demands, and either they must be altered and enlarged, or new structures erected to take their place. So the diocese, while in one of the oldest and most well settled parts of our country, is the scene of a Church building activity not surpassed, I suppose, in any other State. During the present year undertakings of this nature have been or are under way in 16 places. New Churches, large and small, have been or are being built in Maplewood, Morris Plains, Mountain Lakes, Totowa Borough, and Secaucus. New parish houses and rectories are planned or are under way at Redeemer, Morristown; Summit; Harrison; Grace, Newark; West Englewood; and Sparta, Extensive repairs and improvements have taken place in St. Barnabas' and Trinity, Newark; and at St. John's, Passaic; Grace, Nutley; and St. Mary's, Ridgefield Park.

Thus about one-tenth of the parishes are dealing this year, and the proportion is a normal one, with the material equipment necessary for the good prosecution of their work. This is a missionary service which cannot be readily tabulated in reports, but which is of the highest importance in helping to strengthen and establish our Church's life and influence in the bounds of the diocese in the future years; and appreciation is due to those, clergy and laymen alike, who with good foresight and courageous devotion are providing so well against the fast pressing and increasing needs of our wonderful part of the State.

The members of the Convention should realize how largely missionary in character our diocese is. Of the 153 places in which our Church has set itself to work, 76 or just one-half, receive help from the funds of the diocese. The total appropriations for 1927 for diocesan purposes amount to \$132,640, and of this \$58,740, or almost one-half, is for definitely missionary work. I think you ought to know, and you may be interested in learning, how this money is used. It is used to support work of six analogous but somewhat distinctive types. Most Christlike, and a work in which every member of the diocese may take great satisfaction, is our ministry to the poor and unfortunate, the sick and ailing in the great charitable and disciplinary institutions. In Hudson and Essex Counties our Chaplains have made for themselves a warm place in the hearts of the great population in hospitals and jails and sanitaria and other institutions. Their ministry is primarily religious court of the great population in the primarily religious courts.

ious; they carry Christ's message of hope to discouraged and bewildered folk, and give to those who are ready to receive them the Church's sacraments and ministry. Their work is one of our best diocesan contributions to the social body of which we are a part.

Most purely missionary in character is the rural work. Here we have five places, and it costs \$8,599.84 per year. Next the work among the people of foreign speech. Here are three congregations maintained with other work under the direction of Canon Leslie, at an annual charge of \$10,500. A very encouraging part of our diocesan missionary activity is our work among the colored people. We expend \$3,557.28 per annum for this, which helps to maintain the Church's ministry in five places, East Orange, Hackensack, Jersey City, Passaic, and Paterson. Out of the diocesan missionary budget we assist 15 parishes. Some are old and depleted in numbers; some are young but passing through temporary stress and need; some are in a transition state due to unforeseen and unavoidable changes in population. We have appropriated for these 15 parishes for 1927, \$8,905.12.

There are five places which might without much loss be closed out. They are missions which never flourished, or which have not fulfilled expectations. They cost us this year \$1,649.32.

There is left the group of growing and going missions. I put 43 in this group. They are in various states of development; some are more prosperous than others; some are just starting, and others are ready at almost any time now to assume the status of parishes and become self dependent. The amount of diocesan funds needed to supplement what their own members give is \$20,601.32. In almost every one of these missions the Church has a growing asset for the future; and of all the money given through the red side of the duplex envelopes none is more wisely and advantageously used.

It will be appreciated that the wise administering of this work of diocesan missions is a noble service to the Church. And I must take occasion here to do what has often been in my heart, to express publicly for Bishop Lines and myself our gratitude and thanks to the members of the Diocesan Board of Missions for their constant and faithful devotion to this work.

The Board of Missions is the oldest of our diocesan Boards and it is one of our most live and energetic. Nothing could exceed the interest with which its members follow its business nor the assiduity with which they give themselves to its tasks. To some among them, for their generous and costly services, the diocese owes a debt it can never repay.

And with these members of the Board may I link the group of clergy who carry on this missionary work. They are a wonderful band; laboring with great devotion and with unselfish sacrifice for our dear Lord and His Church. There is not one dud among them; some of them are heroic in spirit and in deed.

What makes significant such a little survey of our missionary work as I have put before you is the fact that this work will be characteristic of our diocesan life for many years to come. This northern New Jersey territory in which we live is just beginning to come into its growth and development. Its population, the experts tell us, will be increasing with leaps and bounds; and with all the other problems and responsibilities following upon this, will come those having to do with religion and the good life, for the dealing with which the Church is in the world. So we must as a diocese gird ourselves for new and enlarging missionary endeavor. We must be on the alert in every part of our domain to enter upon fresh ministries as opportunity and need arise; and we must secure the funds which will permit us to establish and equip and maintain new missions year by year.

I have with me here the names of eight places where, had we the means, we should establish missions of the Church this very year. There are other places known to the Archdeacons and to our indefatigable diocesan missionary, the Rev'd W. J. White, which could be added to this list, and every year will develop new calls and claims upon us.

Here seems to me our greatest responsibility just now; and I beg the best thought of the Reverend Clergy and the Laity as to ways of meeting it, and going forward with it.

II.

What I have been setting before you as to the work in the diocese may with equal cogency be urged in regard to the whole missionary work of the Church as led and directed by the National Council. We have our own small field, seven counties, cities large and small, two million population, many foreign speaking groups, many isolated folk on farmsteads and hill-sides, many needy and suffering classes to be ministered to in Christ's Name,

All this the National Council has to face with a national and world wide inclusiveness. It is chosen to guide and develop the missionary work and spirit of the Church; to secure funds for maintaining Christian teaching and ministry wherever it is needed; to look out in our own and foreign lands for dark places whither it may send as Missionaries of light those of our young men and women whose hearts God has touched with desire and purpose to be the messengers and ministers of Christ to men. Its duty is to maintain the work begun in former days, to enlarge and add to it new undertakings, to cherish for our Church the ambitions to do a great and mighty service for our Lord in helping to establish his reign in the hearts of all mankind. And what is felt as to the work in the diocese is manifest in the whole missionary work of the Church. There is equal need for Christian effort, a similar opportunity and urgency, a like harvest field ready and ripe for the harvest.

Behind this work we must stand with faithful hearts and willing minds.

We must conceive our missionary work at home and abroad, in the south and west, in Asia and Africa, in Alaska and the Islands of the Sea, among peoples of all colors and in all stages of culture, we must think of it all as our part of the advancing army of Christ bent upon the peaceful conquest of the world, intent upon bringing all men into that fellowship and brotherhood in Him which is the only hope of civilization. And we must continually resolve and deeply purpose to stand back of this work with undivided spirit and unflagging energy.

Among the 450 missionaries in foreign lands we have 20 of our fellow workers from the Diocese of Newark; and in every one of the missionaries of the National Council at home or abroad we should see a brother beloved whom we mean to do our part in supporting by gifts and prayers.

The financial support of our missionary work, diocesan and national, is now provided for through the budget submitted each year to the Convention by the Finance and Advisory Board.

It is now seven years since the Church through the Nation Wide Campaign inaugurated the inclusive budget and the every member canvass. From the beginning in this diocese we have placed the missionary work in the diocese and that beyond it upon a parity. Of every dollar contributed we have sent one-half to the National Council and retained the other half for diocesan running expenses and missions. We have never succeeded in reaching the budget the Convention has adopted. The National Church has named a larger sum than we were able or willing to give and it has been the same as regards the diocesan part of the budget.

Nevertheless we have striven to get forward in giving and we have made some progress.

Our low water mark was in 1922 when we gave \$197,580. Since then each year has marked a small but steady advance averaging about \$5,000 per year until this year, when, if the pledges are redeemed, we should receive for the missionary budget \$250,000 or more. And this will be an increase of more than \$30,000 over the gifts in 1926.

For this splendid accomplishment we are indebted most of all to the unmitigating labor and unflagging zeal of Mr. McAllister, who, with the loyal help of the members of the Department of Development and Revenue, under the Chairmanship of Mr. Walter Kidde, set up a campaign of education; and uttered so stirring a challenge to the consciences of our people that everywhere a fresh spirit of endeavor was aroused and new life given to this so primary and important a part of our diocesan activity.

From the beginning of the Nation Wide Campaign a small group of parishes, about twenty, have been what business men and orators call one hundred per cent. They have steadily and consistently year by year met the quotas assigned them. Last year they gave \$59,607.03.

This year forty-four other parishes have for the first time pledged their quotas. The increases in some of these parishes have been notable; let me instance St. Peter's, Morristown, \$2,963; Trinity, Newark, \$2,938; St. Paul's, Englewood, \$3,360; Grace, Nutley, \$1,124; St. John's, Montclair, \$907; St. John's, Passaic, \$969; and Atonement, Tenafly, \$781. I cannot read the entire list, but the total advance in giving in these 44 is \$18,150.86.

There have also been notable advances in the amounts pledged on the part of parishes which so far have not been able to come up to the quotas assigned them. Over the amount given in 1926, East Orange, Christ, increased its pledge \$1,051; St. Barnabas', Newark, \$761; Christ, Ridgewood, \$696; St. Mark's, West Orange, \$697; Christ, Bloomfield and Glen Ridge, \$526. Other and varying amounts are equal evidences of the faith and devotion of the people in smaller parishes.

For the first time we have the majority of the parishes and missions behind the payment of the full quota. Of our 153 parishes and missions, 83 have pledged to pay the full quota this year. This is fine, and gives great encouragement for our further progress in giving. Of the 70 parishes which so far have not been able to pledge the full quota assigned them, 13 have increases to make of more than a thousand dollars each, a total of \$30,695.43, 57 of the 70 have smaller amounts to make up, ranging up to about \$300, and the total of these increases is \$10,815.44.

It does not seem beyond the bounds of practicality to hope and pray and labor that this year, with God's good blessing and Mr. McAllister's continued leadership, we shall make another great step forward, and find ourselves as a diocese in the happy state of having done what we were asked to do.

I make an earnest plea with the clergy and lay delegates for loyalty to the quota plan. It is not a perfect plan and there are elements in it which one has to take on faith; but I submit that the only way of progressing in any common endeavor is to give a full and hearty allegiance to a method once considered, debated and adopted. The plan may be faulty in some particulars, it may be unjust to certain parties, it may be lacking in adaptability, but these are matters to be brought to light in the working of the plan, criticisms to be made and justified if possible; but they are secondary and incidental, and the great matter is for all to give to the common endeavor their just measure of support and devotion. I urge the lay deputies especially to interest themselves in this matter as it shapes itself in their own parishes. Find out what your parish status is; work to cooperate with the Department of Development and Revenue in its formulation of plans for the campaign next autumn; seek out new helpers in the parish canvass; and strive in all good ways to keep alive and develop in the parish a fine sense of obligation

toward the world wide work of the Church and a noble ambition to excel in laying a costly and beautiful offering upon the Altar of Christ and for the blessing of men.

III.

The endeavor after a more spiritual Christian life, known as the Bishops' Crusade, which came to the Church during the past year, was inaugurated in this diocese in January by group meetings of parishes held in Jersey City, Hackensack, Paterson, Newark, Orange, and Morristown. We were fortunate in having as speakers at these meetings men who brought a message characterized by reality and great spiritual earnestness; and we owe them a debt of gratitude for coming to us.

The object of the Crusade is to set before the people of the Church the supreme glory and blessing of our religion, which is the life of communion and fellowship with God through Christ by the power of the Holy Ghost. The routine of life, the attrition of secular affairs, the absorption in the material aspects of the Church's life, impart to our religion all too much a formal and commonplace and worldly coloring. But the word of the prophet is abidingly true, Not by might nor by power, but by my spirit, saith the Lord. The source and center of the Church's life and service is in spiritual things. It is not in beautiful Churches and immense parish houses, nor in guilds and societies, nor even in many useful and good works, to kindle and keep burning in human hearts the fires of the Spirit. Every now and again the Church has to learn afresh this truth, to recall herself to her great task, to seek by prayer and intercession the renewal of her consciousness of and dependence upon the indwelling Spirit of life and love whom the Father has sent forth in His Son's Name. The response of the people of the Church to this call has been impressive and illuminating. The week-long group meetings were all characterized by large and deeply earnest congregations; and in the months since January in a majority of the parishes and missions, meetings and services, adapted to particular situations and special conditions, have been held with marked interest and success.

No one can doubt the existence in the minds and hearts of a great company of people of a strong interest in true and good religion, and an eager desire to know more by personal experience of the life of the Spirit.

The manifestation of this attitude of mind and heart is a great challenge to the Clergy. It is a direct reminder to them of the spiritual character of their office, and the opening of a wide door of opportunity in spiritual service for those who are willing to enter therein. The demands upon the time and strength, the thought and sympathy of a clergyman in these swiftly moving days are insatiable; when one contemplates how many are the interests, how widespread and insistent the responsibilities of the ordinary rector of a parish, he wonders how any man can keep up with them all. There is prob-

ably no escape from most of these obligations; but as they value their own souls and as they care for permanent results from their ministry, the Clergy are bound to set things in right proportion and balance; to establish a hierarchy of values; and to put first things first. And first can never be the serving of tables, however excellent a gift it may be to do this well, first for those who are called and ordained to be messengers, watchmen and stewards of the Lord, must ever be the continuing steadfastly in prayer and in the ministry of the Word. Brethren, we are ministers of the Spirit; bearers of the sacred fire of a divine life; teachers and examples, bestowers of that life hid with Christ in God which is man's only hope for eternal peace and joy. Let us not be recreant to our trust. Let us cherish it as our highest aim to live ourselves day by day in close and abiding fellowship with our Lord; and may our constant endeavor be to carry to men in their need the things that are of Christ, His matchless words, His perfect being, His divine compass, His loving grace, the promise and power of His Spirit!

The message of the Bishops' Crusade as formulated by the Commission of the General Convention dwelt upon the outstanding and plain elements of a vital and growing Christian life and experience. We may be grateful that there has been thus set before us definite and simple objectives in our discipleship to Christ and membership in His Church. I think that in every parish these seven aims should be kept in the minds of the people and plans made for the continuing and consistent endeavor to bring the entire congregation into individual and united effort to get them embodied in daily living.

- 1. Confession of Christ openly before men as Lord and Saviour.
- 2. Regular daily individual and family prayer.
- 3. Understanding better the mind of Christ through daily Bible reading.
- 4. Seeking strength for service through worship and sacrament.
- 5. Active service by every member of the Church.
- Developing a deeper sense of individual responsibility for bringing others to Christ.
- Earnest effort to combat worldliness by more consistent practice of the Christian life.

When you reflect upon it you must see how fundamental all these things are to good Christian discipleship. And I wish to ask the laity to give their active support and personal cooperation in observing and cultivating them.

After all, if the Clergy must lead in the endeavor after spiritual religion, the laity must follow. And a true following must mean the acceptance of such ideals, and the faithful observance of such rules and customs as we know make for the strengthening of faith and the beautifying of personal character. The cultivating of the devotional life by daily prayer and medi-

tation; the observance of the forms, and the invoking of the power of religion in our home life; the loving teaching of the truth in Christ to our children; the personal witness bearing for Christ in our social and business relationships, and the desire to lead others into discipleship to our Master, these are such things as we ought all, clergy and lay alike, set before us as practical endeavors.

The movement so auspiciously begun under the name of the Bishops' Crusade ought to be cherished by us all, and we should keep before us as a definite purpose for the coming year, the following along upon the lines already laid down, of the seeking for richer, more beautiful, more fruitful and happy Christian living in the Church. There is no limit to the joy and blessing and intrinsic worth of the life Christ waits to bestow upon us. May we this coming year, with all else we may have to do, keep this at the forefront of our thought and activity, that we shall in all things seek Him whom our souls desire; rejoice in His company; listen to His voice; obey His will, do His work, strive for the bringing in of His Kingdom.

Reports of the Erchdeacons

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF NEWARK.

To the Right Rev'd Edwin S. Lines, D.D.

This Archdeaconry contains very few missions and all of them are either directly in the care of the Bishop or some parish.

St. Peter's, Livingston, is in a situation which used to be quite rural, but lately real estate in its vicinity has been developed by the building of houses of the suburban type and if this continues, as is likely, St. Peter's should benefit by the increase of population.

St. Alban's, Newark; has had a very prosperous and successful year. It has overpaid its quota for Nation Wide Campaign purposes. It has established the Elliot White Memorial Endowment Fund in memory of Archdeacon Elliot White who for so many years did so much for this mission in the early period of its growth. This fund has been started with a few gifts, and is expected to offer a constant opportunity for the reception of gifts and legacles, and provide a growing endowment for the mission. The mission closed the year with no indebtedness and they have property valued at more than \$50,000 in land and buildings. Insurance of \$27,800 is carried on the buildings. The Minister and people of St. Alban's are certainly to be congratulated.

Holy Innocents', West Orange, although technically a mission, is actually self-supporting with its own resident minister and is in a very prosperous condition.

Epiphany, Orange, is a perochial mission of Grace Church, Orange, and Ascension, East Orange, is an off-shoot of Epiphany.

Trinity, Montclair, is a parochial mission of St. Luke's, Montclair.

Recently a survey of the district known as Hilton has been made by Mr. White and consideration is being given to the starting of some work there.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF PATERSON.

To the Rt. Rev'd Edwin S. Lines, D.D., Bishop of Newark.

The growth and development of the Missions of the Archdeaconry of Paterson for the past year fall under the following heads:

- 1. Missions which have kept up the steady advance of last year.—Allendale, Delawanna, Glen Rock, Hawthorne, St. Aidan's (Paterson), Lyndhurst, Pompton Lakes, Butler, Ringwood, and Totowa Borough.
- 2. Missions which have limped because of an interval without a Minister-in-charge or because of the unsettling knowledge of a pending clerical change—East Rutherford, Wood Ridge, Ramsey, St. George's (Passaic), and Wortendyke.

- A most striking and interesting instance of a mission leaping forward, with large promise, under new leadership—North Arlington.
- 4. A new mission, St. Andrew's (colored), was started on June 24th, in the office of Dr. L. J. Davenport, 895 Main Street, Passaic, and the first service, the Holy Communion, was celebrated on July 4th by the Rev. George M. Plaskett. The small group of about twenty have added ten to their number and met all financial obligations under the leadership of the Rev. Henry Edwards, a deacon. A class of eight adults awaits confirmation. The outlook is most encouraging.
- 5. The Mission in Garfield is among our foreign-born neighbors and deserves an extended note. The congregation numbers 55 families and 242 baptized persons. During the year there were 7 baptisms, 7 confirmations, 3 marriages, and 4 burials. Total enrollment of the Church School is 87, and the membership of five Parish Organizations, 112.

On July 1st the Rev'd Louis Lops came from the Diocese of Central New York to be in direct charge of the Mission. Through diligent pastoral work and the use of considerable patience and kindness, he has put the Mission in very good shape, as is evidenced by the fact that Christmas Day 120 persons made their communions.

The Textile Strike seriously affected the Mission, and as a result of it considerable hardship and even suffering exist among the people. In spite of all this, the offerings are greater than those in most of our Italian Missions and there is an excellent spirit of loyalty and interest.

The Archdescoury has met four times during the year.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF MORRISTOWN.

To the Rt. Rev'd E. S. Lines, D.D.

The Archdeaconry of Morristown comprises the three counties of Morris, Warren and Sussex. They form the western boundary of the Diocese and are largely rural in character. Parishes and Missions are established in the more populated towns and villages, but there are vast stretches of countryside where permanent Church buildings are not possible. To minister to these scattered families in the smaller hamlets the Diocese has established the Western Counties' Mission with headquarters at Sparta. The work is under the direction of the Rev'd E. S. Ford. There is need at Sparta to provide a chapel for an increasing congregation. Help to secure this must come from the Diocese and the pian is commended to all our people.

The Rev'd Albert Farr is conducting a service on Sunday evenings in his home to provide the service of the Church for several of our Church families who are not near to either Madison or Morristown.

Several splendid meetings of the members of the Archdeaconry have been held in connection with the Bishops' Crusade.

As time has permitted I have made visits and preached at the invitation of those it charge of our parishes and missions.

ARCHDEACONRY OF JERSEY CITY.

To the Rt. Rev'd E. S. Lines, D.D., Bishop of Newark.

The Archdeaconry of Jersey City lies within the boundary of Hudson County, and embraces nineteen parishes and three missions. Four meetings of the Archdeaconry were held during the past year.

The Mission of the Transfiguration is, at the present time, without any Missioner in charge, owing to the fact that its priest in charge resigned to remove to another Diocese. It has reported twelve baptisms and twenty-three confirmations during the past year. The mission is located in a neighborhood which, within the past ten years, has been built up with a large number of apartment houses and has developed into a thickly populated neighborhood, and ought to become one of our strong self-supporting parishes within the next decade.

The Mission of the Incarnation for colored people in Jersey City has been marking time during the past year owing to the fact that it has reached the limit of the capacity of their present quarters to hold their congregations. They have plans under way for erecting a more adequate edifice, which is hoped may see its fulfillment within a short time.

The Mission of the Church of Our Saviour in Secaucus has made a great stride during the past year. Aided by the Board of Missions a lot was purchased and a small church erected, total cost of ground and church being a little over eight thousand (\$8,000). The time has now come for some arrangement to be made whereby a priest can give part of his time to shepherding this mission, and relieve the Rev. Mr. White, our General Missioner, for other pioneer work.

EAST ORANGE, ASCENSION, .-- Other figures combined with those of Epiphany, Orange, of which this is a Chapel.

HACKETTSTOWN, St. James'.—The Endowment Fund now amounts to \$6,205.

Hoboxen, Trinity Church.—In December Mrs. James Clayton Mitchell made a gift of a house and lot, situated at 711 Washington Street, Hoboken, and adjoining our Church property, in memory of her husband, the Rev'd James Clayton Mitchell, a former rector of Trinity Church. The property is valued at \$25,000, which ought to be included in our endowment.

JERSEY CITY, GRACE CHURCH.—On Whitsunday, June 5th, 1927, the Parish will celebrate the eightleth Anniversary of its founding in 1847, with appropriate ceremonies.

JERSEY CITY, St. MARY'S CHURCE.—October 10, 1926, Church consecrated by Rt. Rev'd Edwin S. Lines, D.D., Bishop of Newark.

MONTVALE, St. Paul's.—Too much praise cannot be given to the Ladies' Guild for all that they accomplish and the faith that they inspire as to the possibilities of the Church in our neighborhood,

NEWARK, Sr. Alban's.—The Mission made large progress during 1926. The "Elliot White Memorial Endowment Fund" was established, this being in memory of the Rev'd Elliot White, B.D., who for many years, at much personal sacrifice, did so much for Saint Alban's Mission in the early years of its existence.

NEWARE, Sr. JOHN'S.—During 1926 a new steam heating plant has been installed in the Rectory to replace hot air plant; the cost of same \$665.00, of which \$615.00 was paid in 1926, and the balance in January, 1927. A new asphalt shingle roof has been placed on the Parish House at a cost of \$261.90, which has been paid in full. The Altar Guild presented a new set of Green Vestments and hangings costing \$118.00. A memorial, consisting of six Altar Candle Sticks and three Cruets, was presented as a memorial to a former Vestryman and son.

Passaic, St. Andrew's.—This is a new work begun on July 4th, 1926. As yet there has been no Confirmation Service but a class of eight persons is in preparation.

PATERSON, HOLY COMMUNION.—The bequest of \$2,000 will reduce our mortgage to \$3,650.

SOUTH ORANGE, St. Andrew's.—During the year 1926 a new Parish House was built, dedicated and fully paid for. A wall decoration behind the Altar was put in place in memory of Miss Mary N. Shepard; and a new East window, in four large lights, depicting the Sermon on the Mount, was placed in the Church in memory of Robert Y. Hebden, late Senior Warden for seventeen years.

Torowa Borouge, Cerist.—Building Fund to date, \$5,898.87; Building Lot, \$4,000.00.

UNION CITY, GRACE.—A Building Fund started thirteen years ago has reached the amount of \$11,710.61 deposited in the Hudson Trust Co. Deposit Dept. at 4%.

WEST ENGLEWOOD, CEMIST.—The indebtedness to the Diocese originally standing at \$4,000 was reduced to \$2,500 in December, 1926, by a payment of \$1,500 by the Women's Guild direct to the Board of Missions.

Appendix 11

Hospital of St. Barnabas, Newark.

[Incorporated February 13, 1867.]

The annual report of the hospital for the year 1926 shows further increases in service to the community. 2,633 patients were received within our doors, an increase of 5% over the previous year. Over 96% of these were cured or treated sufficiently to enable them to return to their homes. The number of deaths, including those past help on arrival, was 100, or 3.79%. There were 1,296 operations performed.

In the Out-Patient Department 10,586 treatments were given, an increase of 10.6% over the previous year.

The average length of the patients' stay was 13 days. The average number of patients each day was 97, with a maximum of 132 and minimum of 72. The cost of operating the hospital is computed to have been \$4.74 per patient per day. The number of employees per patient, 1.20.

Of the total expenditures of \$197,180.74 allowances were made to patients the cost of which amounted to \$55,233.78. This large free service was possible because of the income from our Endowment Funds, \$23,542.78; Community Chest Fund, \$29,940.48. and donations from friends of \$3,165.45.

The number of obstetrical cases increased 27% over 1925. Births were 285 in 1925 and 357 in 1926. The significance of a rapidly growing demand upon us for maternity department service should encourage us to provide more accommodations for it in a possible new hospital. The physician in charge of this department believes that our present 17 beds and 18 cribs should be increased to 50 beds and 50 cribs. The demand upon us exceeds our capacity now. Furthermore, the hospital can better afford provision for this work than that of other departments because, while the rates are exceedingly reasonable, there is less demand for free work here than in other parts of the hospital. Free allowances and unpaid bills in this department amounted to 2.38% of services rendered.

The entrance and waiting room were refurnished and a new rubber flooring laid, A much appreciated lunch room has been provided in the nurses' home. An Alpine Sun Lamp was purchased. Four improved bed-pan cleaners were installed. Improvements were made in the hoiler room and other equipment and supplies were secured for the more efficient performance of our work.

The School of Nursing is continuing to enjoy its good name. But it is well for us to face frankly the disadvantages of our position. If it were not for the excellence of our instruction and splendid loyalty of our graduates, faculty and students, it would be difficult to compete with schools of nursing in other hospitals equipped with modern nurses' homes with attractive and sometimes luxurious appurtenances.

With our students housed in three separate buildings it is difficult to effect a desired control by the director of the school.

A new nurses' home, adequate in size and attractive in its modern features, would prove a distinct help in providing for the professional care of patients.

FIFTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT, COUNCIL OF CHRIST HOSPITAL.

As a result of the Financial Campaign held over a year ago Christ Hospital secured not only the total amount asked for in dollars but also we were fortunate in enlisting the interest of a number of business and professional men who were willing to accept membership in the Council of the Hospital. These gentlemen have brought to us a new impetus, and have given most valuable service to the hospital.

The Council has moved with the utmost care and deliberation in the matter of erecting two new buildings, namely the Nurses' Home and the New Hospital Unit. At the present time plans for the Nurses' Home are complete and ground will be broken for its erection within a short time. The Building Committee is now at work on the plans for the remodeling of the hospital building and with plans for the building of the New Hospital Unit.

The hospital has been gradually enlarging the size of its Training School to provide for the enlarged hospital so that at the present time we have fifty-three undergraduate nurses enrolled and undergoing training. During the past year we treated in the hospital over 21,000 patients, and about fifteen per cent of our hospital work is absolutely free. Our clinics have grown with an unprecedented rapidity, 10,500 patients being treated during the year 1926.

The endowment of the hospital is meagre, amounting to \$87,685. In addition to this the Abercrombic Guild of the hospital has an endowment. The income from these

two endowments net the total sum of \$13,773.90. The total cost of maintaining the hospital during the year was \$188,938.88, the income from all sources falling short this year by nearly \$20,000.

The hospital has a Sustaining Membership Committee now at work which is collecting funds to make up the annual deficit, and from the success with which they have already met, we have good hopes that this object will be attained.

During the year five small legacies were received, the total amounting to \$1,887.64.

The Rev. Thomas A. Hyde is Chaplain and Superintendent and under his able leadership the work is going on in a good way.

During the year of 1927 we hope to see the Nurses' Home and the New Hospital Unit complete.

Widows' Home, Hoboken.

The Widows' Home is a Church Institution providing a home for aged gentlewomen Communicants of the Church, having little or no resources of their own and no home. The Board of Trustees is composed of the Bishop of the Diocese as President, and the Rectors of the three Parishes in Hoboken, one of the Wardens in each Parish, and the Canon Missioner of the Department of Social Service of the Diocese of Newark.

The Board of Managers is composed of women, elected by the Board of Trustees, from the membership of the three Parishes in Hoboken.

The Board of Trustees, with the permission of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, and under the provision of a Special Act of the State Legislature, sold the property of the Home at 815 Bloomfield Street, on account of its unsafe condition, for the sum of \$7,950, the proceeds of which have been placed in the Endowment Fund of the Home.

The beneficiaries of this trust are now being cared for in the House of the Holy Comforter, West Orange, which arrangement seems to work out most satisfactory, the Trustees turning over to the Managers of the House of the Holy Comforter the cost of the maintenance of the widows under their care.

There are thirty hospitals and penal institutions on the list regularly visited by the chaplains of the City Mission of Newark, and, in addition, a few institutions, private or incorporated, which have been visited in response to calls to minister to some patient or to meet some emergency. The daily bed population is never less than about three thousand, and the annual list of patients in all the institutions will average about thirty thousand. There are two chaplains who give all their time to the public institutions, the Rev. Dr. Charles L. Cooder, and the Rev. James W. Van Ingen. These chaplains are registered at the institutions and may be called by telephone at any time, day or night.

A daily record is kept by the chaplains, and monthly reports in writing are sent to the Secretary of the City Mission of the activities of the chaplains during the month, such as baptisms, the administration of the holy communion, burials, services held on the wards or elsewhere, donations received and distributed among the patients, and the names of the institutions visited during the month. The following is the combined report of the two chaplains: There were 38 institutions visited, 30 regularly every week unless temporary illness prevented; 753 visits were made to these institutions; 18,758 people were called on and ministered to in one way or another; there were 220 baptisms of persons on the wards; the holy communion was given to the sick on the wards 749 times; there were 766 services for persons buried at public expense from one or the other morgues of city or county; there were 101 services for the walking patients of the several institutions; 1 marriage service; hundreds of packages were distributed at Christmas and Easter time; and an ample donation of clothing sufficient for all needs was received and distributed. In former years there were no paid hospital Social Service workers who could follow up the institution cases, but now, as far as one can ascertain, there are not less than 20, and they are a wonderful help to the chaplains; they are paid by either city or county and always most willing and ready to render every aid possible.

The field for work has materially enlarged during the past year. Practically every hospital in the city has increased its bed capacity. A new seven-story hospital recently opened its doors; a new twelve-story hospital is in process of erection; yet another hospital, with one unit now in operation, has an extensive plan for an institution which will accommodate a thousand patients; and a new home for nurses is in process of building and contemplates an increase of bed capacity for patients; and one of the county hospitals is planning to double its capacity. All this is a challenge to the Church to do its part in the way of ministering to the religious needs of the increasing hospital population. The City Mission is welcomed in all the public institutions, and the chaplains have the freedom of the wards and the gracious co-operation of the institution authorities, so that it only remains for the Church at large to measure its meets and bounds of responsibility toward the poor, the overlooked and the unfortunate.

The City Mission is not something apart from the Church or the parish. The Chaplain is practically an assistant to every rector in the Diocese. The parish is the dynamic centre of all the energy expended, and the City Mission goes down among the unfortunate in the jails, alms houses, reformatories, hospitals, refuge homes and retreats and offers its ministrations every day in the year to the thousands for whom, at present, there is no other established and recognized ministration devoting all its time to this institutional work.

On Sunday, April 11, 1926, at 4 P. M., a service was held in Trinity Cathedral, under the auspices of the Church Club, in honor of the Lay Readers of the Diocese. The speaker was Mr. James Falconer, a prominent Lay Reader in New York City.

On May 18, 1926, the annual dinner of the Church Club was held at the Robert Treat Hotel to which all Clerical and Lay Deputies to the Diocesan Convention were invited. The speakers were: The Rt. Rev'd Edwin S. Lines, D.D., Bishop of Newark; The Rt. Rev'd Wilson R. Stearly, D.D., Bishop Coadjutor of Newark; The Rt. Rev'd H. St. George Tucker, D.D., Bishop Coadjutor of Virginia; and Mr. George Zahriskie, a prominent Layman and Churchman of New York City.

During June, 1926, the Club inaugurated a campaign to materially increase the Bishop's Church Extension Fund. The campaign was most successful. The number of contributors was increased from 392 to 853 and the amount pledged per year was increased to \$11,457, which more than doubled the amount that was being received by the Treasurer of this Fund.

The Annual Meeting of the Club for 1926 was held on the evening of Thursday, November 4. The annual election of officers and Executive Committee was held and the annual reports made.

On Wednesday evening, November 10, 1926, a dinner was held at the Robert Treat Hotel, under the auspices of the Church Club in honor of the delegates to the Provincial Synod. The speakers were the Rt. Rev'd Wilson R. Stearly, D.D., Bishop Coadjutor of Newark; the Rev'd Paul B. Bull of the Community of the Resurrection, Mirfield, Yorks, England, and the Hon. Joseph Buffington of the United States Circuit Court of Appeals of Pennsylvania. The President of the Club presided.

During 1926 The National Federation of Church Clubs of the United States was revived. No meeting of the Federation has been held since 1917, although, previous to that date meetings had been held annually for twenty-five years. The Church Club renewed its membership in the Federation, and will send delegates to the next annual meeting of the Federation to be held in May, 1927.

Many branches are doing local work both in charities and Guild administration.

Some sent articles to the Mission Field, also to Miss Ellen Hicks, our Guild nurse at St. Luke's in Ponce, Porto Rico.

Membership of the Guild is greatly increased. The Guild was represented at the Synod held in Newark.

This year has been a very successful one and with co-operation and interest in our work there are many possibilities and opportunities of service.

During the past year we have held three meetings—January 15th, April 16th and October 1st, when reports from the Organizations, which are members of our League, were received.

At the October meeting, plans were made in conjunction with the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese, for the meetings of the Provincial Synod on November 9th, 10th and 11th. These plans resulted in our doing our share towards making these meetings a success. We gave at this time an enjoyable Tea for the delegates and others attending the Synod.

On February 3rd we held our conference which was devoted to Church Work and presided over by Bishop Stearly. In the evening we had a dinner when the Rev'd John W. Suter, Jr., was the speaker. Our program concluded with a very interesting Pageant in which all of our Organizations presented their own special work.

On April 7th Father S. C. Hughson, O.H.C., gave a lecture on Symbolism. The Altar Guild had a large share in securing the speaker and in arranging for this interesting meeting.

On May 14th the Women's United Thank Offering Presentation Service was held at Christ Church, East Orange.

On December 1st a Quiet Day was given jointly by the Woman's Auxiliary, the Altar Guild and the Church Service League at Grace Church, Orange. The conductor was the Rev'd Paul B. Bull, C.R.

We regret to report the resignation as corresponding secretary of Mrs. Van Nostrand, for many years our valuable and efficient secretary. Her successor is Mrs. W. E. Stewart.

During the past year we lost one of our valuable members, Miss Lucy Shaw, whose place has been taken by Mrs. Herbert S. Baker.

Woman's Auxiliary, Newark Branch.

During the year 1926 the Woman's Auxiliary has functioned through 160 Women's Guilds and Auxiliary Branches in 138 parishes and missions in this Diocese.

At the bi-monthly diocesan meetings speakers have presented the work of the Church in China, Japan, Africa, and the Philippine Islands; the needs of the Diocesan Institutions and the great spiritual appeal of the "Message" and the Bishops' Crusade,

The Supply Department has furnished the desired supplies for 1 Hospital, 8 Schools, 13 Missions and has sent 21 Personal Boxes and 20 Christmas Gift Boxes for women missionaries; the total value of the work being \$16,404.00.

The Social Service Department financed a course of lectures on Child Psychology by Dr. Plant of Newark and besides caring for many cases of family adjustments provided summer outings for over one thousand children from Jersey City and Newark.

Three Normal Classes, 12 Mission Study Classes, 9 Institutes or Intensive Days were conducted by the Educational Department, the attendance being from 38 parishes. This Department, assisted by the Church Periodical Club, prepared a travelling library for the District of Englewood and has furnished literature, programs and books for many individuals and parishes.

On October 15th the National Day of Intercession was observed by the women of the Diocese and on St. Andrew's Day, in almost every parish, women of the Auxiliary acted as intercessors for the Bishops' Crusade throughout the day.

During the year \$11,358.92 has been received, of this \$2,191.00 goes to objects which count on Diocesan and Parish Quotas; \$225.00 to Special Scholarships, \$609.89 to Kuling School and \$1,049.69 to the Corporate Gift, a Triennium pledge of the Woman's Auxiliary which will care for six of the pieces of Advance Work under the National Council; of the remainder, \$5,273.99 carries the operating expenses of the Auxiliary (Supply, Social Service, Comfort Club, Education and Administration), leaving a balance January 1st, 1927, of \$2,019.45.

With the assistance of the Girl's Friendly Society, several Church women and nearly every parish branch it was possible for the Auxiliary to entirely finance the women's meetings and entertainment of the Synod of the Province.

Two new Parish Branches have been added during the year.

The following report covers the work of St. Katharine's Home from January 18th, 1926, to January 19th, 1927.

On the former date there were six girls in the Home. Nine were admitted during the year and thirteen discharged, leaving the present number at nine. There were eight infants in the Home at the beginning of the year. One was admitted with the mother and eight were born in Christ Hospital. Seven were discharged and one died, leaving the present number 17.

At the present time there are nine girls at St. Katharine's Home. A homelike and happy family, and not too many, so that individual attention can be given each girl. Each girl has her little duties in the Home which she fulfills and in which she puts pride. Throughout the hot weather everyone kept well. Only once did we call on Christ Hospital and they responded with their usual promptness. One of the girls scalded her foot.

Through the kindness of visiting Priests, services in the Chapel go on as usual.

Everyone has been most kind to St. Katharine's. Through the generosity of friends, the young nursing mothers who are not able to go to the late Mass have been enabled to go over to the 3:30 Service at Trinity Church on Sunday. Fares do amount up so that unless money has been given, the Sisters could not have sent them. They enjoy the music and singing.

In June, Sister Lucilla, who for seven years has so capably managed the Home, left for Camp, after which she was sent to Philadelphia. Sister Marguerite was placed in charge of St. Katharine's. We all feel very grateful to the Mother in sending Sister Marguerite to us.

The Corporation for the Relief of Widows and Children of Clergymen of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the State of New Jersey.

The Corporation is independent of either of the Dioceses of New Jersey. It is not a pension plan, it does not pay pensions to the Clergy who are contributors; it is a kind of Life Insurance Plan for the benefit of the Widows and Orphans of the Contributors. It was originally incorporated under a "royal charter" by George III on March 29, 1769, its territory being the Colonies of New York, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania. In 1806 a plan was adopted by which the original body was divided into three parts. In the division of funds, New Jersey received \$4,289.00. On December 3, 1807, it became a body corporate under its present title. Last year it distributed in annuities and dividends \$6,160.40 and transferred to principal \$4,630.40. The total principal was, on June 6, 1927 (at market value), \$207,292.47. In addition, an emergency fund has been created, the present amount being \$937.50.

Clergymen of the Protestant Episcopal Church, not over 55 years of age, who have for the past two years been canonically connected with, and actually resident in either of the Dioceses in the State of New Jersey, are eligible for membership as "Contributors," Removal from the State after five annual contributions of eight dollars, does not forfeit membership; in case of removal before five payments have been made, the amount paid will be returned. The "members of the Corporation" are those elected to manage its affairs; the clerical members being chosen from the contributors. The lay members must be communicants of the Church and residents of New Jersey. The annual meeting is held on the first Monday in June. Applications for membership should be in the hands of the Secretary before that date. The Secretary will be glad to furnish further information, and copies of application forms.

The return to the widows and orphans of contributors is so large for the small annual payment made during the lifetime of the contributor that every Clergyman in the Diocese who is eligible should avail himself of its benefits. The income of the Fund would appear to be ample to meet all demands.

Report, Board of Missions and Church Extension.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The Board of Missions and Church Extension held ten meetings during the calendar year 1926.

Meeting of January 20th. Report was made that Grace Mission, Westwood, had agreed to purchase a new rectory at a cost of \$11,000.00. It was shown that the house was well laid out, of good design, in a good neighborhood and well worth the purchase price. The project received the hearty approval of the Board.

Report was also received that the work of St. Anthony's of Padua, Hackensack, an Italian congregation, had been transferred to the oversight of the Department of the Foreign Born.

Meeting of February 17th. The Committee for St. Mark's, Phelps Manor, reported the completion of the Church building.

Grace Mission, Westwood, reported the sale of its old rectory at a price of \$15,500.00. Notice was also given that it had completed plans for its organization to that of a regularly incorporated Parish.

At a previous meeting of this Board a communication was received from St. Paul's Mission stating that a splendid tract of land in a good central location of Haworth was for sale at a price of \$3,200.00 and which it desired to secure for its Church

site. A committee from this Board was appointed to investigate. This Committee reported to this meeting of February 17th that the tract was about 29,000 square feet in area, in a good location, and recommended that the property be purchased. The Board approved the proposition. It was financed by the Board loaning \$2,000.00 to the Mission of St. Paul's. They agreed to pay the balance of the purchase price themselves.

Meeting of March 17th. It was ordered that two lots of land located on First Street, Hackensack, N. J., be purchased for St. Cyprian's Mission at a cost of \$1,350.00.

Application was made by the Vestries of Ascension, Bogota, St. Mark's, Phelps Manor, and Epiphany, Cedar Park, for a resident Clergyman to minister to them. They agreed jointly to contribute the sum of \$2,200.00 towards his support.

Meeting of April 21st. The Department of Foreign Born made a strong plea for an additional Italian Priest. It was ordered that such a man be secured but at a stipend not to exceed \$1,100.00 for the balance of the year.

A Committee with power was appointed to consider plans and arrange contracts to erect a building suitable for the needs of St. Cyprian's Mission in Hackensack.

Meeting of May 26th. The following officers were elected to serve for the ensuing year:

The Rt. Rev'd Wilson R. Stearly, President.

Mr. C. Alfred Burhorn, Vice-President.

Mr. Albert H. Baldwin, Treasurer.

Mr. Henry J. Russell, Secretary.

Announcement was made that a new work among colored people had been started in Passaic, N. J.

The Committee for St. Cyprian's, Hackensack, reported that the new Church building would cost about \$5,500.00.

Additional appropriations from this Board were made to the following Missions:

St. Mark's, Phelps Manor, in the sum of \$300.00.

Ascension, Bogota, in the sum of \$300.00.

Epiphany, Cedar Park, in the sum of \$200.00.

Meeting of June 16th. An appropriation of \$200:00 and traveling expenses was made for the services of a Priest in the interest of work among the colored people of Passaic.

Meeting of September 15th. The Committee for the Mission of Our Saviour, Secaucus, made report that a tract of land in a good location could be bought for a fair price and that plans and estimates for a Church building were in hand. The Board ordered that the land, 78 feet by 100, on the corner of First and Possehl Streets, Secaucus, be bought at a price of \$2,500.00, and that contracts be entered into to erect a Church building according to plans submitted at a cost not to exceed \$6,728.00.

St. George's of Passaic reported need of repairs necessary to preserve the building at a cost of about \$2,000.00. It was ordered that the work be done and that the money to pay for it be raised by mortgage on the premises.

Approval was given to the fixing of the stipend of Miss Rowland, Western Counties Missions, at the sum of \$1,720.00 per annum.

Report was made that the building for St. Cyprian's, Hackensack, was finished and the formal opening services would be held on September 26, 1926. The Committee in charge of the erection also reported that the building had cost \$524.00 more than originally calculated, but that this shortage had been taken care of by a temporary loan of \$500.00 to run for one year. Action of Committee was fully approved.

Meeting of October 28th. Attention was called to the rapid development of the heights to the west of Glen Rock station and that thought should be given to a start of new work. It was stated that now is the opportune time for us to acquire land, when choice locations could be considered and before the prices advance to be almost prohibitive. A Committee was thereupon appointed with instructions to survey the whole territory between Ridgewood, Hawthorne and to the west of Glen Rock station and report back to the Board.

Report was made that St. James' Parish of Ridgefield, had transferred its holdings to this Board and that it desired its status to be that of a Diocesan Mission. It was also shown that certain pressing debts were owing. On motion that the Board loan St. James' the sum of \$500.00 to be applied to pay the most pressing claims.

Report was also made that a new mission, St. Martin's, in Maywood, had been started, services being held in the municipal building.

St. Stephen's of Coytesville reported that it was about ready to start building its new Parish House at a cost of about \$8,000.00.

Meeting of November 17th. St. Paul's Mission, Morris Plains, announced that it was about ready to start its new building project.

Meeting of December 15th. Christ Mission, Totowa, presented its plans for a much needed building of its own. The Mission has a well thought out plan to finance, and the Board looked with favor upon the enterprise. It was ordered that a Committee of three be appointed from this Board for conference and advice to the Mission.

Report was made that the Officers of this Board had contracted to buy a lot in Sparta, N. J., but on which purchase this Board is only to be obligated to the extent of executing a purchase money mortgage for \$500.00 at 6% to run for one year to Mary G. Kays. Action of the Officers was approved.

This Board has, during the year, made mortgages in the interest of Mission Stations, as follows:

St. Cyprian's, Hackensack, \$4,000.00, to the People's Guaranty & Trust Company, Hackensack.

Our Saviour, Secaucus, \$4,500.00, to the First National Bank, Secaucus.

St. George's, Passaic, to increase its mortgage in the sum of \$2,000.00 to the People's Bank & Trust Company, Passaic.

The Board also administers the Bishop's Church Extension Fund. It from time to time recommends to the Bishop the making of a "Call" upon the members of this Fund. The said "Calls" are limited to Five in any one year.

The Board designates generally that the sum of One thousand dollars, from the receipt of a "Call," he given to a Mission to assist in the purchase of land, or the erection or acquisition of a Church, Parish House or Rectory. The Extension Fund has also set up a "Loaning Fund" from which money is lent to Missions at a low rate of interest.

During the last year, as a result of a campaign undertaken by the Church Club of the Diocese, the membership of the Bishop's Church Extension Fund has been more than doubled, with a corresponding increase in its annual income.

In May, 1926, the Fund had a membership of 392 with an annual income from that membership of about \$5,000; or \$1,000 for each of the five calls made in the year. In May, 1927, its membership is 813 with an annual income from that membership of \$11,500, or \$2,300 for each call.

In addition to this increase in its regular membership, the Parish of St. Luke's, Montelair, has included in its budget for next year an appropriation of \$2,000 as a contribution to The Bishop's Church Extension Fund in memory of Archdeacon Carter, and it is the intention of that Parish to make an annual contribution of that amount to the Fund. No action could more appropriately commemorate Archdeacon Carter's long service as Rector of St. Luke's Church and his deep interest and devoted labor in the missionary work of the Diocese. His work as Secretary of the Diocesan Board of Missions for many years and as Archdeacon of Newark has formed an outstanding service to the Church deserving long to be commemorated and held in honor.

The success of the Church Club's effort, the first of its kind ever made on behalf of this Fund, furnishes convincing proof of the great potential value of this resource for Church advancement within the Diocese. The project was undertaken at the beginning of the summer, and the Club had had no previous experience in such work. Despite these handicaps, an effective working organization was created which carried on the work throughout the summer and early fall. In October came the preparation for the Every Member Canvass for the 1927 Quota, and the work for the Bishop's Church Extension Fund had, of necessity, to yield to that more immediately important business.

The officers and members of the Church Club who took an active part in this work report a very general lack of information among the Church people of the Diocese as to purposes of the Fund, and in some parishes an ignorance even of its existence. In the few months allowed to them, these workers were not able to reach all of the parishes and missions of the Diocese, but they report a quick and gratifying response to the appeal in those which they were able to reach. It was necessary only to make plain the purpose of this Diocesan agency to awaken an interest in it. The difficulty was to spread the information necessary to enlist interest. Much was accomplished in these few months, but much still remains to be done, as a study of the distribution of the Fund's membership will show. The Church Club intends to continue its interest in the Fund, and to do what it can still further to increase its membership, particularly in those parishes and missions where the Fund is still comparatively unknown.

The Diocese is grateful for the sid which this Club has given to one of its most useful agencies, and will welcome a continuance of that sid. At the same time it must be remembered that the support of the work of building up the Church in the many growing places and new communities in this Northern part of New Jersey is, and always must be, the individual responsibility of the Church members of the Diocese.

Report of the Board of Religious Education.

For the year 1926.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The Board has continued its usual work during the last year, fostering and encouraging the activities of the various schools of the Diocese.

Much attention has been given to fostering Teacher Training Classes in certain localities, notably at Trinity Church, Grantwood, and Christ Church, Ridgewood. We shall be glad to help in the establishing of classes in any locality which may desire to have them.

A largely attended service for officers and teachers was held on Quinquagesima in Trinity Cathedral, Newark.

In April a conference for Church School Officers was held at St. Barnabas' Church, Newark.

In June a meeting for officers and teachers was held at Madison. Though the day was stormy, the capacity of the grounds and home were severely taxed.

The convention held in St. Barnabas' Church, Newark, on October 23rd was largely attended and we feel it was one of the most profitable in many years.

The Board as usual provided leaflets and attendance cards for use of the schools during Lent, thus encouraging the holding of week-day services for the children as well as their attendance at Sunday Services. The Presentation Service of the Lenten Offering was held in Grace Church on Sunday, May 2nd. It amounted this year to \$22,364.94 and was contributed by 142 schools.

The Advent Offering should be contributed to by more schools than do. While a few more contributed this year than in 1925, yet the number is not large and the offering is far from what it should be. Ninety-one schools contributed \$1,702,97.

As in previous years, Daily Bible readings were distributed during Advent.

Christmas boxes were sent out by the various schools for 952 children and 358 adults. The total value of gifts including money contributed by some schools was \$1,500.

Miss Cora Gray has continued her efficient work at the Board's Room in the Diocesan House and will be glad to advise with any seeking information in regard to curriculum and service activities of the Church Schools.

The report of the Treasurer is herewith appended.

Report of the Board of Social Service for the Year 1926.

Meetings of the Board of Social Service for the year 1926 were held in January, February, April, May, June, October, November and December, and the attendance of the members was as follows: No one member attended every meeting; three members attended seven meetings; one member attended six meetings; two members attended five meetings; one member attended four meetings; two members attended three meetings; eight members attended two meetings, and four members attended one meeting.

During the year contracts were authorized for the building of Osborne Hall and the New Administration Building at Bonnie Brae Farm.

At different intervals during the year the Board voted to appropriate from its funds the sums of \$300, \$500 and \$1,000, the last sum to be paid in installments of \$250 per month for four months, to the work of the Church Mission of Help. The Board also approved an arrangement whereby the Church Mission of Help would receive \$1,800 for the support of a colored worker from the City of Newark. The Church Mission of Help was given permission by the Board to undertake an appeal for funds for the support of its work. Mrs. William Voorhees and Mrs. E. H. Cook were elected to the Board of Managers of the Church Mission of Help.

One of the most important discussions of the Board during the year was the Strike Problem in Passaic. A most interesting report was presented by the Rev'd Theodore Andrews.

Mrs. John W. Howell represented the Department at the Convention for Social Service in Cleveland and also represented the Board at the New Jersey Conference for Social Welfare at Asbury Park, November 28th, 29th and 30th, 1926.

A dinner was given by the Department at Trinity Parish House, Newark, to the Young People's Fellowship of the Diocese, at which the speakers were Bishop Stearly, Judge Harry V. Osborne, and the Rev'd Charles E. McAllister, Executive Secretary of the Diocese.

Plans and Program were prepared for the Annual Conference of the Provincial Commission on Social Service held in Newark on November 9th.

The Treasurer was authorized to invest \$1,500 in Legal Securities for the Permanent Fund of the Board and also instructed to devote the Hervey Legacy to the Permanent Fund.

Bishop Lines, Bishop Stearly, Archdeacons Hutchison and Elmendorf and Mr. Hardin were elected Trustees to hold property for the Board.

During the year the following changes took place on the Board: Judge Porter resigned and his resignation was accepted with regret. The Rev'd A. J. M. Wilson and Mrs.

A. D. Story were elected to membership on the Board and the Rev'd Charles E. McAllister, Executive Secretary of the Diocese, was elected Excutive Secretary of the Board of Social Service.

The following Committees were appointed for the year 1927: Diocesan Institutions; Other Welfare in the State; Legislation; Program and Conference, and Industrial Relations.

ANNUAL REPORT.

Jan. 1st, 1926-Jan. 1st, 1927.

If we are to measure up to our full responsibility and usefulness as an organization, we may ask ourselves two questions at the start of the new year.

- 1. Have we given our best to each individual girl?
- 2. Have we studied thoughtfully and thoroughly the community problems, opened up by her problem, which belong to her community and to us?

We cannot attempt to right the wrongs for individuals without coming up against injustices that affect the many, and it is here the Church Mission of Help may, with its strength and force, bring about great changes for good.

We opened the year with 188 girls under care; we closed the year with 230 girls and 95 babies, all of whom need us sorely. During the year, 413 girls were helped by the secretaries, who made 2,667 visits in their interest and the volunteers 1,169 more. We find in figures that each girl has cost us, on the average, \$35.00 in money. That does not seem exorbitant to give a delinquent girl opportunity for re-education and re-direction in the art of living! We have given great thought to the leisure time of our girls, few of whom have wholesome ideas of fun. We hope to be able to do more for the colored girls in this way in the year to come. Our volunteers are a strong body of faithful women, many of whom are acting as friendly visitors to girls. Two study classes afforded training, one in Newark and the other in the Paterson district. Under the direction of Mrs. White, Chairman of our Parish Groups, 13 new Groups have been formed and 6 new parish representatives appointed. These Parish Groups keep our closet filled with baby clothes and second-hand clothing for girls; supply all the Christmas gifts; contribute money for the emergency fund, special cases and the general fund as well. They use the Intercessions and many are individually spreading knowledge of the work. The annual volunteers' meeting in Newark each fall is a rally to which 60 women came this year and took back to their parishes incentive for wider interest in their work,

The Morris & Sussex District Committee, organized in November under the Chairmanship of the Rev'd Donald Brookman, is meeting monthly. The members of this Committee are helping us with the campaign to raise sufficient funds to start a District worker there, if possible, by April, 1927.

The Staff has experienced an unusual number of changes. Miss Judson came February first. Miss Hodson resigned November first and Mrs. Milly W. Spooner took her place. Miss Page has assisted in Newark during November and December.

The Emergency Fund has received \$2,311.73. Of the amount loaned, \$169.34 was refunded; \$33.32 remains unpaid. The balance December 31, 1926, was \$498.35, of which \$322.64 will be held as a Contingent Fund, leaving a working balance of \$175.71. This money has been used often to loan a sum for a winter coat, the girl repaying in weekly amounts. It has paid board of babies, bought false teeth, shoes, confirmation gifts and paid for one outing at McLean farm and for innumerable treats. We could not work satisfactorily without such a fund to depend upon.

Our workers are endeavoring to play their part with the other Social Workers. Our Executive Secretary is a member of the National Association of Social Workers and of its New Jersey Chapter. We attend the Social Workers' meetings in Newark, Paterson and Jersey City. We were represented at the National Conference of Social Work at Cleveland, at the New Jersey State Conference at Asbury Park and the Wellesley Summer Conference. Invitations are coming more frequently to speak to clubs and church societies outside our own. Gratifying is the cooperation with other organizations. The Associated Catholic Charities since May, 1926, has relieved us of all Roman Catholic girls coming for help and a most happy relationship exists between the

individual workers of the two organizations. The Department of Parole of the State Institutions and Agencies has, since February, placed directly on parole to us more than twenty girls. Only two of these have had to be returned to the State Home for Girls. For Hackensack, we are happy to report that a Detention Home for Girls and Boys is under consideration. This will relieve the condition of the present, when the girls and boys are held in the Bergen County Jail. During the year, also, has come about our participation in the Community Chest of Newark for the salary and expenses of a worker for the unmarried mother. This work has been carried on since October 1st.

Emphasis on the social aspect of our work must not crowd out the spiritual. After all, the relationship between the girl and her visitor,—call it friendship, influence or what you will,—is essentially one of spirit with spirit. Even though it may not at once be mentioned, the girl and the worker are conscious that their relationship is not wholly in the interest of physical well-being and development. The Annual Service is our opportunity to spread knowledge of the work and its spiritual value to the community. The Quiet Day for the workers gives them much needed refreshment and inspiration, and we hope may attract members of the church, who are workers of other organizations. Our Intercessions go out weekly to churches and individuals who are praying for the girls. We have changed the form, somewhat, to more nearly meet the suggestions of those who use them. Individual girls have requested that we pray for them and frequently those seriously ill in hospitals have been comforted with the knowledge that prayers were being offered for their recovery. The Sunbeam Club is bringing in to its life a spiritual influence, too. The girls are reverent during grace before they sit down to dinner together and during the brief service at the close of the evening. Gratifying was the plan of four girls to meet and go to their Christmas communion together. We are happy to report during the year the baptism of six girls and thirty-five babies and the confirmation of five girls.

The campaign which is under way should bring in to our treasurer the funds we so greatly need to care for those who are literally at our door. If the work can be so strengthened with just the necessary help, we will be able to carry the influence of the Church Mission of Help to the remotest part of the Diocese.

BOWNIE BRAE FARM FOR BOYS.

Bonnie Brae Farm has been richly blessed this year despite an unusual number of disastrous experiences.

During the summer it was struck by lightning, which damaged Kiwanis Cottage and completely demolished a barn and the Main Farm House and Dormitory. Bonnie Brae was called upon to act quickly to readjust 25 boys in new living quarters. Fortunately the New Dormitory (Osborne Cottage), nearing completion, which was originally erected to accommodate 18 waiting applicants, was quickly commandeered into service, beds and bedding secured, and the 25 homeless boys at once ably cared for. An appeal for clothing was quickly sent through the Churches of the Diocese, which met with a generous response and the boys were soon looking hopefully ahead again.

Bonnie Brae was forced to continue building operations to offset these losses, and by a most generous gift of an individual donor, together with the Insurance refund, a new dormitory has already been made possible and the building contracted for. A new barn will be built also with Insurance funds to take the place of the one destroyed, and through another exceedingly liberal individual gift a new Administration Building, which will also accommodate a number of boys, has already been started.

There are at present at Bonnie Brae Farm 39 boys, and with the completion of the new Dormitory there will be accommodations for an additional 20, possibly more.

While Bonnie Brae physically has had many vicissitudes to meet during this past: year, yet it has made rapid strides in the development of the boys themselves, unusual improvement being evident in the high average of their school reports and their school and home deportment,

Under the able direction of the Administrative staff, the boys are now better cared for than they have ever been, supplied with better and more adequate food, and better directed and supervised, all of which is proven by their health, happiness and general progress.

This is a small increase over the total of the previous season.

The total Camp disbursement for the season amounted to \$6,984.52, as against receipts of \$7,047.76, leaving a balance on hand at the end of the year of \$63.24, which showed the average cost per week per camper slightly over the weekly charge of \$9.50.

The spirit of the Camp was fine, and the Camp Reunion held in Newark in December was a great success. There is no question but that the Camp is well established, and the amount of work is limited only by its capacity.

We must again refer to the wonderful work done for the Camp by the Rev'd W. O. Leslie, Jr., as Camp Director, and the Rev'd George H. Young, whose untiring work in connection with the preparation of the Camp has brought about the success made. We are glad to announce that Canon Leslie has agreed to act as Camp Director for the season of 1927.

The Camp Committee has decided that the weekly charge for the Camp for this season will be \$10.00, and \$2.00 per day for less than a week's stay. Through gifts of friends of the Camp, we will this year install a shack for the Camp Director and turn over the present Director's shack for the use of the Camp counsellors, and we will install electric lights for the kitchen, dining hall and infirmary.

A wonderful improvement in Eagle's Nest Farm has been made during the past year by the building of the Holiday House of the Girls' Friendly Society on the hill, and a lease for a nominal sum has been made to the Girls' Friendly Society covering about five acres on which the Holiday House has been erected.

The Clergy Conference and Men's Week End Conference will be held this year in the Holiday House, and the entire season at the Camp devoted to camps for boys and girls.

We need very much to build an extension to the dining hall, but at present funds are not available.

We ask for your co-operation in increasing the Camp attendance so that it can be operated during the entire season at capacity, and that you urge contributions so that boys and girls may be sent to the Camp to receive the unquestionable benefits which Camp life brings. Twenty Dollars, plus transportation, will provide a two weeks' vacation and training for a child which he or she may obtain in no other way.
