CANON 1, § II.
OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

From a Parish.

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election, in the following form:

[Name of the Church, the Place, and Date.]

This certifies that at a meeting of the congregation of this Church, held for the purpose of electing Church Officers, and Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention (*or for the purpose of electing Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, if the meeting be for that object alone*), A. B., C. D., and E. F., being communicants of the Church in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Deputies; and B. C., D. E., and F. G., also being communicants in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Alternate Deputies to represent the Parish in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand (*or if two Wardens subscribed, we have set our hands*), the day and year above written.

N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary sign, then the signatures of *both* Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-in-charge, or Missionary, may not sign.

From a Mission.

N. B.—Use the same form and substitute the word "Mission" for "Parish" in three places. The Minister-in charge; or, the Clerk; or, the Warden may sign.

Memoranda:

Not more than three Deputies are allowed from each Parish, and Mission.

Three Alternate Deputies must be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies.

Write Christian names in **FULL** and **LEGIBLY**.

Blank forms will be sent by the Secretary of the Convention on or before Easter Monday in each year.

Return Certificates of Election at least **ONE MONTH** before Convention.

Deputies must be *Communicants of the Church, and also qualified voters in the Parish or Mission which elects them.* (See Canon 6, § II, [4], [5] and [6].)

Rules of Order

THE CONVENTION.

1. The Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. The Convention shall meet on the opening day at 9:30 a. m.; with a recess of one hour between 1 and 2 o'clock.
3. At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
4. At the close of each Convention, the Minutes shall be corrected and approved.
5. The doors of the Convention shall be open for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
6. All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convention shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall record their attendance.
7. Clergymen of other Dioceses, and Candidates for Holy Orders, who may be present, shall be admitted to honorary seats in the Convention on the presentation of their names to the Secretary.
8. When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
9. When any member is about to speak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
10. No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply), in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
11. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
12. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate, but any member may appeal from the decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention. The general procedure of the Convention shall be governed, unless otherwise provided for, by the rules of parliamentary practice as set forth in "Roberts' Rules of Order."
13. A Committee consisting of the Bishop, ex-officio, five other clergymen and five laymen, to be known as the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, shall be appointed at each Convention to prepare the official Ballots and the Calendar of Business, for the next Annual Convention.

The mode of conducting the nominations and elections of all Committees, Commissions and Boards and all other elective officers not otherwise provided for, shall be as follows:

Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations must place in the hands of the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, in writing, on or before noon of the Tuesday in the week preceding the opening day of the meeting thereof, nominations signed by himself for any or all officers mentioned in the above paragraph. Each nominator must certify to the Elections and Rules of Order Committee that the persons nominated by him have consented to the nomination. All names so

sent in shall be reported to the Convention by the Committee, at the beginning of the opening session, in the form of a ballot, on which the names shall be arranged alphabetically in each class. After each list of nominations as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks may be filled by any voter. The voter shall mark with an X at the right of the name of each person for whom he votes. On the first ballot these ballots only shall be used, and also in all subsequent ballots, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. No ballot shall be counted in its class, on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled, and the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast.

The Secretary of the Convention shall call for nominations in his usual notice of the date and place of the Annual Convention, and shall, in the same notice, advertise the person or persons designated by said Committee, to whom such nominations shall be sent, with mailing addresses.

The members of the Convention shall also be requested, in said call, to send to this Committee any canonical amendments or other important items of business that they may purpose to introduce at the next Convention, so that such matters may be assigned a place on the Calendar of Business. This call shall also be annually inserted in the April number of the official Magazine of the Diocese, *THE NEWARK CHURCHMAN*.

Balloting shall take place in a separate room when practicable.

The clerical and lay voting lists shall be divided into two sections each.

14. Four or more Election Tellers, clerical and lay, in equal numbers, not necessarily members of the Convention, shall be appointed by the President before an election. They shall receive and canvass all votes cast at any election which is required to be by ballot, and when such canvass is completed, shall immediately report its result to the Convention. The polls shall be open for such time as the Convention may, by resolution, direct.
15. All reports (usually printed in the *JOURNAL*), of officers, committees, commissions, and boards of trustees under control of the Convention, shall be printed and distributed by the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order as far as practicable, at least two weeks before the meeting of the Convention; provided that the subject of such printing and reports shall have been referred to the Finance and Advisory Board for consideration, which Board shall have power to supervise, regulate, or to condense the same, and to issue to the Committee or to the Secretary of the Convention such instructions as in the judgment of the said Board will promote greater economy and efficiency in respect to this work.

Reports when read in Convention shall be read by title only, unless the reading be for the better transaction of business.

NEW BUSINESS.

16. All new business introduced, except such as may accompany and form a part of a report of a committee, shall be in the form of a motion or resolution and shall be in writing.

COMMITTEES.

17. All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered. It shall be the duty of the Secretary promptly to notify the members of all special committees of their appointment.
18. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.

MOTIONS AND THEIR ORDER.

19. No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
20. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it; or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
21. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.

VOTING PRIVILEGES.

22. All questions shall be decided *viva voce*, unless otherwise specially ordered.
 23. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote of the Convention shall be taken by Orders, voting separately; and, when a vote is thus taken a concurrent majority in both Orders shall be necessary to carry any measure.

JOURNAL

The Fifty-seventh Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark was held in Grace Church, Orange, New Jersey, on Tuesday, May 12th, 1931. The Convention was opened with a celebration of the Holy Communion at 9:30 o'clock, the Bishop of the Diocese, the Rt. Rev'd Wilson R. Stearly, D.D., being the celebrant, assisted by the Rev'd Charles T. Walkley, D.D., who read the Epistle; and the Very Rev'd Arthur Dumper, D.D., who read the Gospel, and the Ven. W. O. Leslie, Jr., who read the bidding prayer. The choir composed of the Reverend Clergy rendered the musical parts of the service.

The Bishop of the Diocese read his sixteenth Annual Address at the close of the Communion Service. *Vide, Index.*

The Convention was called to order at 11:45 o'clock in Grace Church Parish House by the Bishop, who presided at all sessions of the Convention.

The Chairman requested the Secretary to ascertain whether a constitutional quorum was present. The same having been ascertained the Fifty-seventh Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Newark was declared in order.

The Ven. W. O. Leslie, Jr., nominated the Rev'd J. Fred Hamblin for Secretary of the Convention. It was moved and carried that nominations be closed and one ballot cast for election. The Chair declared Mr. Hamblin elected.

The Secretary appointed the Rev'd Peter R. Deckenbach as Assistant Secretary.

The Chairman of the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, the Rev'd David N. Kirkby, presented the following report of that Committee:

REPORT, COMMITTEE ON ELECTIONS AND RULES OF ORDER.

To the Fifty-seventh Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

Your Committee, appointed by the authority of the Fifty-sixth Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark, submits herewith its Report, together with a Calendar of Business, and Rules of Order for the government of this Convention.

Tuesday, May 12th, in the year of our Lord 1931, was appointed by the Bishop of the Diocese as the opening day of the Convention.

The Committee's recommendations are—

- (1) That the service of The Holy Communion commencing at 9:30 A. M., which opens the Convention, be attended by all of the clergy vested, and by all of the lay representatives of the Convention; and that the Address of the Bishop be made to the Convention in the Church, at the close of this Service.
- (2) That, with the consent of the Rector of the Parish, the business sessions of the Convention be held in the Parish Hall of Grace Church.

- (3) That, with the purpose in view of giving opportunity to call the attention of the Convention to any special activity of the Diocese, the time and length of Reports submitted by various Diocesan Boards be left to the direction of the Bishop.
- (4) That, Mr. John Fletcher be authorized to receive nominations, and to prepare ballots for the various officers and Committees to be elected by the Convention.
- (5) That, the Convention and the Elections be governed by the Rules of Order authorized by the Diocese.
- (6) That, a communication from the Diocese of Chicago to this Convention, dated February 6th, 1931, be read to the Convention by the Secretary.
- (7) That, a communication from the Diocese of Tennessee to this Convention, dated April 28th, 1931, be read to this Convention by the Secretary.

The Secretary of the Convention presented the following report by title:

To the Fifty-seventh Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The Secretary begs to report that he has attended to the various duties of the office during the Convention year past.

The gathering in of the Annual Parochial Reports of the various parishes and missions is still of great concern to the Secretary. The accurate report of the state of the Church in the Diocese of Newark depends upon the prompt forwarding of all reports, and complete information from both the Rectors and Treasurers.

The Secretary again invites your co-operation in the duties of that office.

To the Members of the Convention:

The following Resolution was passed at the last Diocesan Convention:

Resolved, That the Committee on Constitution and Canons be asked to take under advisement the system of balloting used in the Convention and that a report of their conclusions and suggestions for simplification be submitted at the next Convention.

Your Committee has given the matter careful consideration and recommends the following change in Canon 3 of Elections:

Line 5, omit word "majority" and insert word "plurality," so that the Canon shall read as follows:

CANON 3

Of Elections.

In all elections for which provision is not otherwise specifically made in the Constitution or Canons, the vote shall be by ballot; the Clergy voting individually, and the Lay Deputies by Parishes; and a majority of all the votes cast by both orders collectively shall be necessary to an election; unless provision is otherwise specifically ordered in the Constitution or Canons; *provided, however*, that by unanimous consent the ballot may be dispensed with, and an election may be made by viva voce vote.

The effect of this is to substitute a plurality for a majority vote.

The following Communication from the Diocese of Tennessee was read by the Secretary:

To the Secretary of the Convention of the Diocese of Newark.

Reverend and Dear Sir:

The resolution quoted below was unanimously adopted by the Ninety-eighth Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Tennessee, and the Secretary was directed to send copies of the same to the Conventions of other Dioceses in the United States, inviting them to take similar action.

Resolved, That this Convention memorialize the General Convention to amend Canon 44, Section I, in such wise as to extend the application thereof to baptized members of this Church other than Communicants.

Will you, accordingly, kindly present this communication to the 1931 Convention of your Diocese for its information, and for such consideration and action as it may deem expedient?

The intention in proposing such alteration in the Canon is primarily to provide a proper record of children, not yet of an age to be confirmed, who are now frequently lost sight of in the removal of their families from one place to another.

The following communication from the Diocese of Chicago was read by the Secretary:

*The Rev'd J. Fred Hamblin,
Secretary of the Diocese of Newark.*

My dear Sir:

I enclose a copy of the Resolution concerning Deaconesses, which was passed unanimously by the Annual Convention of the Diocese of Chicago on February 3rd.

There are 223 Deaconesses in the Church, and the Church is asking these faithful women to serve in many of the hard places, and yet the Church makes no provision for them in case of disability and old age.

The present effort on the part of the Deaconesses themselves to raise a Deaconess Retiring Fund of \$50,000, will, even when completed, be utterly insufficient to provide proper pension or disability allowance.

It seems a matter of simple justice that the Church make some proper provision for disability and old age. We have no right to ask women to devote their lives to good works, and then to cast them out when they are no longer able to be of service.

The Convention authorized me to send this resolution to the Conventions of the Dioceses, and ask that it receive affirmative action.

It was moved and carried that the Chair appoint such a Committee. The Chair appointed the Rev'd D. Stuart Hamilton and the Hon. Charles W. Parker.

The Rev'd A. Stewart Hogenauer presented the following resolution on Placement of Clergy:

WHEREAS, The clergy of the Diocese of Newark have been interested in widely discussing the report of the Commission on the Ministry in regard to the "Placement of the Clergy" at several meetings; and

WHEREAS, A general sentiment was expressed that a more systematic and equitable method for placing clergy in parishes and missions be worked out in the Church; therefore, be it

Resolved, By this Convention of the Diocese of Newark that it is favorably disposed to have the resolutions, suggestions, recommendations, and proposed Canons of the Committee on the Ministry contained in their report on the "Placement of the Clergy" presented to the 1931 General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church for earnest consideration and adoption.

It was moved and carried that the above resolution be referred to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions for report.

The Rev'd John N. Borton spoke on the Bishop's Annual Address and moved

that this Convention order the printing and distribution of same. It was carried.

Mr. C. D. M. Cole presented the following report of the Canonical Committee of the Diocese of Newark on the Church Pension Fund:

The total expenditures from the Church Pension Fund under all heads on December 31, 1930, amounted to \$986,049.36 for the year. That is, our Church is paying out over \$82,000 a month in pensions, or over \$2,600 a day.

The Church Pension Fund has been in existence 14 years. When the Fund was organized, its promises were that it would pay a pension of \$600 until such time as the amount promised under the rules in each individual case would amount to more.

During the past year, the trustees of the fund found that they could increase the amount from \$600 to \$1,000 for all of the clergy who were in receipt of the age allowances, except in the few cases where the pension assessments had not been completely paid. Twelve of our Clergy are now receiving \$1,000 a year.

The trustees do not guarantee a \$1,000 minimum for the future, but they fully expect to keep upon this basis, and hope to improve it. This very substantial increase in pensions has been possible without disturbing in any degree the promises to the Clergy in active service.

\$23,000,000 of its assets are reserves to carry the present pensions and to guarantee the present value of the promises to the clergy now in active service. The increase in pensions has been made by the trustees out of assets above this \$23,000,000.

The officers of the Church Pension Fund tell us that, notwithstanding the public depression, payment of pension assessments for the year 1930, and so far during the year 1931, has amounted to the same as during the preceding period of prosperity, both in the actual amount of money received and in the practically unanimous adherence of the ecclesiastical organizations of our Church.

This is most gratifying, for while our Pension System is set up on scientific principles and is admirably administered to fulfill its promises, it must have the prompt cooperation of all the Parishes and Missions of the Church. Our Diocese has had a fine record in this respect for the past 14 years.

It was moved and carried that the Resolutions contained in the above report be adopted by this Convention.

The Bishop stated that opportunity would now be given to the Field Department to tell of its plans and work in connection with the budget of the Diocese.

Mr. Walter Kidde, as Chairman of the Field Department, spoke very earnestly and effectively on the missionary responsibility of the Diocese and of the Parishes and Missions.

The Rev'd W. O. Kinsolving presented the following report of the Committee on the Proposed Alterations of Diocesan Boundaries between the Diocese of Newark and the Diocese of New Jersey, and recommended that the Resolution be adopted:

Committee on the Proposed Alterations of Diocesan Boundaries Between the Diocese of Newark and the Diocese of New Jersey.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

Your special Committee on Proposed Alteration of Diocesan Boundary between the Dioceses of Newark and New Jersey reports as follows:—

At the Convention of this Diocese held in May, 1928, in view of the facts that the present boundary line between the Diocese of Newark and the Diocese of New Jersey is in part the line between the Counties of Morris and Somerset, and that Bonnie Brae Farm, an institution of this Diocese, is in Somerset County and within the bounds of the Diocese of New Jersey, and that a portion of the property of St. Bernard's School at Gladstone, an institution of the Diocese of New Jersey, is in Morris County and within the bounds of the Diocese of Newark, it was resolved that a committee of

two members from this Diocese be appointed to consider the matter of rearranging the boundary line between the two dioceses, to the end that each of said properties may be included within the limits of its own diocese. The undersigned were appointed members of this committee.

Said Committee conferred with a similar committee from the Diocese of New Jersey, and reported to the Convention of this Diocese held in May, 1929, that the two committees had reached an agreement regarding the rearrangement of diocesan boundary, and said Convention adopted this report.

Your Committee reported to the Convention of this Diocese held on May 20, 1930, that the Bishop of New Jersey disapproved the recommendation of the two committees so far as it related to the territory to be ceded to the Diocese of New Jersey, and that the two committees after conference had not reached a satisfactory agreement, but that the matter was still in negotiation. By resolution of said Convention, your Committee was instructed to continue negotiations with the Diocese of New Jersey, and to report to this Convention such basis of exchange of territory as shall be satisfactory to said Committee and the Bishop of Newark, and as shall have been ratified by the Convention of the Diocese of New Jersey.

On March 11, 1931, a joint meeting of the two committees, which was attended by the Bishops of Newark and New Jersey, was held, and at said meeting the cessions described in Schedules A and B hereto annexed were agreed upon, and each committee undertook to report to its own diocese the adoption of said cessions.

Your Committee therefore recommends the passage of the following resolution:—

WHEREAS, The special Committee on Alteration of the Diocesan Boundary of the Diocese of Newark was authorized by the Annual Convention of this Diocese held in 1930 to continue negotiations with the Diocese of New Jersey and to report to the next Convention of the Diocese of Newark such basis of exchange of territory as shall be satisfactory to said Committee and the Bishop of Newark, and as shall have been ratified by the Convention of the Diocese of New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, The Committee appointed for this Diocese, a similar committee appointed for the Diocese of New Jersey, and the Bishops of the two Dioceses have agreed in recommending that a tract of territory now situate in this Diocese in the County of Morris, and described in Schedule A hereto annexed, be ceded to the Diocese of New Jersey in exchange for a similar tract in the County of Somerset in the Diocese of New Jersey, and described in Schedule B hereto annexed: Be it therefore

Resolved, That the recommendations of the said committees be, and the same are hereby approved, and that the General Convention be memorialized to ratify and approve such exchange of territory, if and when similarly memorialized by the Diocese of New Jersey.

SCHEDULE A.

Description of territory proposed to be ceded by the Diocese of Newark to the Diocese of New Jersey, situate in the Township of Chester in the County of Morris.

Beginning at a point in the boundary line between Morris and Somerset Counties where the same is intersected by the boundary line between the townships of Mendham and Chester;

Thence running (1) westerly along said boundary line between the said counties and crossing the road leading from Gladstone to Ralston and the road leading from Gladstone to Chester a distance of about 8,400 feet to the easterly line of State Highway No. 31;

Thence (2) northerly along said State Highway 6,000 feet more or less to its intersection with a road crossing the same and leading westerly to Hacklebarney State Forest Park;


Thence (3) generally northeasterly along said last road the various courses thereof crossing Peapack brook and running to the westward of an old graphite mine a distance of about two miles and a half to the end of another road about 2,000 feet in length which leads northerly into the main highway from Mendham to Chester;

Thence (4) deflecting to the right and following the courses of another road leading between Mount Paul on the east and another hill on the west, southerly and southeasterly about one and three-quarters miles crossing a brook between said two hills to the aforesaid line between the townships of Mendham and Chester;

Thence (5) due south along said boundary line between Mendham and Chester townships about 6,000 feet to its intersection with the line between Morris and Somerset Counties, the place of beginning.

Including part of the tract of land on which is situated the institution known as St. Bernard's School belonging to the Diocese of New Jersey.

All as shown on the official State map scaled at 2,000 feet to an inch and published by the Geographical Survey of New Jersey and called "Chester Sheet".



SCHEDULE B.

Description of land proposed to be ceded by the Diocese of New Jersey to the Diocese of Newark, situate in the County of Somerset.

Beginning in the middle of Passaic River at the mouth of Dead River and adjoining the old road known as King George's Road;

Thence running (1) in a general northerly direction following the courses of the said Passaic River about one mile measured in a direct line to a road called Valley Road near a bend in the same;

Thence (2) southwesterly along the middle of said Valley Road 1,300 feet more or less to its intersection with King George's Road near an angle in the same;

Thence (3) northwesterly along King George's Road the several courses thereof 2,500 feet more or less to a corner at Stone House of the road leading to Liberty Corner;

Thence (4) westerly along the road leading from Stone House to Liberty Corner 2,200 feet more or less to a bend in the same;

Thence (5) southwesterly along the middle of said road 1,100 feet more or less to another bend in the same;


Thence (6) still along said road in a general westerly direction the several courses thereof about a mile and a half to its intersection with the road from Martinsville and Mt. Horeb to Liberty Corner;

Thence (7) along said last road southwesterly, southerly and southeasterly about 3,500 feet to a point where the same crosses a brook running easterly into Dead River;

Thence (8) following said brook in an easterly direction to Dead River;

Thence (9) southeasterly and easterly along said Dead River the various courses of the same crossing a road called Dead River Road a distance of three miles more or less to the place of beginning. Including the tract of land on which is situated the institution known as Bonnie Brae Farm belonging to the Diocese of Newark.

All as shown on two sections of the official State map scaled at 2,000 feet to an inch and published by the Geographical Survey of New Jersey and called "Plainfield Sheet" and "Pluckamin Sheet".

It was moved and carried that the above stated resolution be adopted.

The Hon. Charles W. Parker presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Chair be requested to appoint a suitable committee to draft on behalf of this Diocese a memorial to the General Convention, praying approval of the exchange of territory with the Diocese of New Jersey, either separately or in conjunction with representatives of the Diocese of New Jersey.

It was moved and carried that the above Resolution be adopted.

The Chair appointed the Hon. Charles W. Parker, a Committee of one on the above resolution.

Judge Parker read the telegram to be sent to Bishop Manning and the Diocese of New York.

Mr. Charles B. Johnes was called on to speak to the Convention on the plans for the Every Member Canvass and the Advance Work Program.

The Rev'd George W. Dawson, the newly appointed Executive Secretary of the Department of Social Service and Field Department, was presented to the Convention by the Bishop and responded with a short speech.

Col. Allan B. Wallace, Treasurer of the Bishop Lines Memorial Endowment Fund; gave a detailed report of the present status of the fund: Pledged, \$419,128.80; Cancelled by withdrawal, \$2,931.60; Balance Pledged, \$416,197.20; Collected, \$372,406.40; Uncollected, \$43,790.80.

The Bishop announced the resignation of Col. Wallace as Treasurer of the Finance and Advisory Board, who has filled that office since the inception of the Finance and Advisory Board in 1919. The Bishop expressed his gratitude for the services of Col. Wallace.

The Rev'd D. Stuart Hamilton presented the following resolution, and moved it be adopted by rising vote:

Resolved, That a rising vote of thanks be tendered by the Convention to Col. Wallace, Treasurer of the Finance and Advisory Board, as a mark of our high esteem and affectionate regards on his retirement as Treasurer at this time.

The Bishop invited Mrs. H. S. Baker of the Church Periodical Club to speak to the Convention on that work.

The Rev'd W. O. Kinsolving presented the following report as Librarian of the Diocesan Library:

THE DIOCESAN LIBRARY.

For many years the Diocese of Newark has possessed a library. Considerable additions have been made to it from time to time. After Bishop Lines, the Reverend J. F. Butterworth, and the Reverend C. H. Wells were taken from us, hundreds of their books were donated. Mr. James R. Strong has embellished our shelves with some handsomely bound works. About 8,000 books were accumulated before the Diocesan House was transferred from Newark to Orange.

Although Mr. John G. Crawford, who was long our Registrar, devoted much thought and time to these books, he never attempted to classify them. This task was assigned to me by Bishop Stearly several years ago, with authority to dispose of duplicates and of worthless material. I adopted the Dewey Decimal System, which is used in most public libraries, as the basis of classification. With the assistance of the Reverend M. R. F. Barton of Livingston, who has cataloged several important libraries; Mr. George I. Wichman of Montclair, our present Registrar, and several other persons who have helped at various times, I have sorted, shelved, classified, numbered, lettered, and had cataloged almost 5,000 volumes. Almost 2,000 books have been discarded, most of these having been sold to second-hand dealers. About 1,000 books await such attention as I am able to give them.

The library consists for the most part of religious books which are old, but which are by no means "worthless junk" on that account. Many of them are standard works which remain useful. Some are valuable for reference. Others might be read with interest and to advantage, even though they are unfamiliar. Scattered among these older writings are some distinctly modern and even recent volumes. There is a considerable collection of works of literature, of biographies, of histories, and of studies in the sciences and the social sciences. The reverend clergy and the interested laity are invited to inspect the shelves in the back and front rooms of the Diocesan House. Anyone who wishes to take a volume away is asked to have the withdrawal recorded by one of the secretaries for entry.

To give this library a wider circulation, we must acquaint those of you who are disposed to use it with its present contents, must find out what would make it more useful to you, and must add whatever books are most wanted or needed. We cannot add to it without money wherewith to buy a certain number of books each year. Contributions for this purpose would be welcomed.

The Rev'd C. W. Popham spoke to the Convention on the Bishop's Church Extension Fund and pleaded for additional subscribers from the parishes and missions of the Diocese.

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions, the Rev'd Charles L. Gomph, Chairman, presented the following reports:

"The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions, to which was referred a Resolution concerning the Placement of the Clergy, reports that in so far as the resolution looks to having this Convention go on record as regards the Report of the Commission on the Ministry annexed to this resolution, it makes no recommendation for the reason that said Report of the Commission on the Ministry is entitled to more study and consideration than is possible for your Committee or for this Convention. Your committee feels that it may fairly be assumed that said Report will be presented at the Triennial Convention and will receive due consideration there."

It was moved and carried that the report be accepted.

"The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions, to which was referred the Resolution of the Diocese of Tennessee as to a proposed amendment to Canon 44, Section 1, reports in favor of the adoption of a resolution similar to that adopted by the Diocese of Tennessee, to wit:

"*Resolved*, That this Convention memorialize the General Convention to amend Canon 44, Section 1, in such wise as to extend the application thereof to baptized members of this Church other than Communicants."

It was moved and carried that the resolution be adopted.

"The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions, to which was referred a resolution providing that a place be given on the Calendar of this Convention for consideration of the proposed new Canon 43 'Of Matrimony,' recommends the adoption of such a resolution, so as to enable the Canon to be presented and discussed for the information of the Convention and of its delegates to the General Convention.

"It further recommends that the place upon the calendar be left to the Chair and that the time devoted thereon be limited to 40 minutes unless extended by the Convention."

It was moved by Father Gomph that the Resolution be adopted.

After discussion from the floor the Resolution was adopted.

The Rev'd D. Stuart Hamilton in the absence of the Ven. H. M. Ladd due to illness, read the report of the Standing Committee. (*Vide*, Index.)

Dr. Hamilton also presented the report of the Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund for 1930. (*Vide*, Index.)

The Secretary read the names of parishes and missions which had failed to send in Parochial Reports for 1930 and asked that attention be given to forwarding the same promptly.

Mr. George W. Hulsart, President of the Church Club, gave information concerning the dinner arrangements.

REPORT OF AUDITING COMMITTEE.

Your Committee begs to report that the accounts of Mr. A. H. Baldwin, Treasurer of the Convention, and Col. Allan B. Wallace, Treasurer of the Finance and Advisory Board, have been audited in detail by Messrs. W. J. Forster & Company, Certified Public Accountants, who report as follows:

Messrs. Arthur Stonham and I. F. Livingston, Committee on Audit, Diocese of Newark, 99 Main Street, Orange, New Jersey.

DEAR SIRS:

In accordance with your instructions we have made an audit of the accounts of Mr. Albert H. Baldwin, Treasurer of the Convention, and of Colonel Allan B. Wallace, Treasurer, Finance and Advisory Board, for the year ended December 31, 1930.

We found that all income received from the investments deposited with the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties, and with the Trustees of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen was accounted for. The amount of income in arrears at the close of the year was limited to \$810.00, being six months interest due on one mortgage, collections on account of which have been made during 1931.

The receipts of the Treasurer, Finance and Advisory Board, from parishes and missions for the 1930 quota, have been reconciled with the report published in the February, 1931, issue of THE NEWARK CHURCHMAN and are correct.

The disbursements of both Treasurers were found to be properly authorized and supported with vouchers.

The transactions of the Treasurer of the Convention, Mr. Albert H. Baldwin, are set forth in detail in Exhibit B, Schedules Nos. 1, 2 and 3; Statement of Income and Disbursements, James Barber Trust, and the Financial Statement, Laura Augusta Home for Orphan Children, which have been printed for inclusion in the JOURNAL OF 1931.

We also made a physical examination of the securities and mortgages deposited for safe-keeping with the National Newark and Essex Banking Company, and found them to be in agreement with the printed lists furnished by the Treasurer of the Convention.

These investments are entered in the accounts at par, or, when acquired by purchase at less than par, at cost only. The investments are summarized as follows:

It was moved and carried that the reading of the minutes be dispensed and a Committee appointed by the Chair to review same.

After the singing of the hymn "O God Our Help in Ages Past" and prayer and benediction by the Bishop, the Convention was duly adjourned at 6:00 P.M.

Following the adjournment of the Convention a dinner under the auspices of the Church Club of the Diocese was held in the Hotel Suburban, East Orange, at seven o'clock.

About seven hundred men and women were present.

The speakers were, the Most Reverend James DeWolf Perry, D.D., S.T.D., Presiding Bishop of the Church and President of the National Council; the Rt. Rev'd Wilson R. Stearly, D.D., Bishop of the Diocese of Newark, and Dr. Lewis B. Franklin, Treasurer of the National Council; Mr. George W. Hulsart, Presiding.

The Episcopal Address

I must begin by calling you to grateful remembrance and earnest thanks for the good examples of those of our fellowship who have departed this life since last we met. I will mention at this time the Rt. Rev'd Sidney C. Partridge, Bishop of West Missouri since 1911. Before that he had served in the mission field, first in China and later as Bishop of Kyoto from 1900-11.

The Rt. Rev'd James H. Darlington had been Bishop of Harrisburg since 1905. With an active spirit and an energetic temperament the whole of Bishop Darlington's life had been characterized by affiliations with good and useful movements in the State as well as in the Church, and by a continual devotion to his work as a minister of Christ; he found time to write poetry of a high order, and to keep in friendly contact with his brethren in the Episcopate in all good ways of service.

The Rt. Rev'd William Andrew Leonard was at the time of his death the Senior Bishop of the Church in point of service, he having been consecrated Bishop of Ohio in 1889, in his forty-second year. He was a fine gentleman of the old school and a leader and shepherd of his flock, taking thought both for the welfare of individuals and the concerns of the Church as a whole.

The Diocese of Pennsylvania lost an able administrator and a wise leader in the death in March of the Rt. Rev'd Thomas J. Garland. Bishop Garland was consecrated Bishop Suffragan in 1911 on the same day that Bishop Rhinelander was made Coadjutor. In 1924, at Bishop Rhinelander's resignation, he was elected Diocesan. He served the Church with great fidelity and distinction. He had a clear mind with a strong sense of the practical. He won men to himself by his spirit of fairness and friendliness toward those with whom he had to deal.

The Rt. Rev'd Richard Henry Nelson, who died but the other day, served in the Episcopate twenty-five years, first as Coadjutor to Bishop Doane, and afterwards as Bishop of Albany. He carried on in his long ministry the Connecticut tradition of conservative and sound Churchmanship in which he was trained, and was a true pastor and faithful leader to the flock of Christ.

Of members of our own Diocese we must record the passing, at the great age of eighty-seven, of the Rev'd Walker Gwynne, D.D., Rector of Calvary Church, Summit, from 1893 to 1914, and Rector Emeritus since the latter date. The period of his Rectorship was notable for the erection of the handsome Church at Summit and for the publication of a number of books bearing upon the practical and devotional aspects of the Christian life. In later years he was the moving spirit in the Sanctity of Marriage Association, whose object was to develop a higher conception of marriage as a permanent and

unique relationship. He will be remembered with great affection by many members of the Convention who will recall his many contributions in past years to discussions incident to movements and proposals of various kinds.

The Rev'd Parker C. Manzer came to us from the Diocese of Vermont in 1919 to become Rector of St. Mary's Church, Jersey City. He had within the last year become Chaplain of the City Mission in succession to the Rev'd Dr. Cooder. In a short space of time he greatly endeared himself to the ailing and needy people in the many institutions visited by him. He was an ideal man for such work, having the great gift of a warm heart and a wise and loving spirit. His death occurred on Palm Sunday morning without premonition, and he fell like a soldier at his post of duty. He will be greatly missed by a large company of friends among the poor and lowly.

Of Laymen and Laywomen of the Diocese I make record here of the following: Mr. Frederick W. Winterburn, benefactor of the Churches upon the Palisades; Mr. DeKay Winans of the family which for years has been a mainstay of the work of St. Thomas', Vernon; Mr. Howard Marshall, a most useful and active Layman of Grace Church, Orange. Mr. Philip H. Patriarche had been for many years a Vestryman, and part of the time, Warden of Grace Church, Orange. He also gave service to the Diocese as a member of the Board of Missions; he was generous in his giving and always ready to carry out any task assigned him. Miss Anne K. Hayes of Grace Church, Newark, died at a great age. She was one of the remaining members of a family which in a former time had a great place in the activities of the Diocese. Mr. Decatur M. Sawyer, for many years a member of St. Luke's Church, Montclair, had also given constant and unstinted service to the Diocese in various capacities. He had been for years a member of the Board of Missions and for some time President of the Church Club. His personal influence was exercised in many directions and in helpful and inspiring ways.

Charles H. Bassford had been Treasurer of Grace Church, Nutley, for several years. Mr. Henry Peck of Summit had been sexton and assistant sexton of Calvary Church, Summit, for thirty-nine years. His service had been characterized by devotion and joy. It was said of him that he was a natural born door keeper in the House of the Lord. His service was a fine and useful one. Mr. John Osborne Baker of St. James', Newark, who died in his eighty-eighth year, was one of the founders and through all the years until his death, a Vestryman. It is not often that one individual thus serves the Church continuously through so long a period of time. The death of Mr. Alexander Luchars removes from the Diocese not only a faithful member and wise officer of St. James' Church, Upper Montclair, but a layman with intelligent understanding and fine interest in the work of the Church in the Diocese and in the world at large. His death and the death of his wife fell upon the same day.

Mr. Wallace M. Scudder was for many years a Vestryman of St. James' Parish, Newark. An outstanding man of business he manifested a great interest and took a large part in the movements and enterprises making for the higher life of the growing City of Newark. Through his newspaper, *The Newark Evening News*, he exercised a wide influence for good upon a large territory in northern New Jersey. He will be greatly missed both in the Church and the State.

St. Paul's Church, Jersey City, has in the last year lost two notable and valued laymen, Mr. H. Dean Beery at the beginning of the year, and Mr. Stewart A. Trench at its close. Both of these men, finely gifted and with a great spirit of devotion and love for the Church, gave fine service in their Parish and beyond. They are greatly mourned and missed by their friends.

Mr. John L. Thompson, a Vestryman of long standing in St. Mark's Parish, Newark, gave unstintingly of time and thought to the work of the Church. He impressed upon the congregation something of his own deep spirit of friendliness and was never behindhand in participating in Parish activities and undertakings.

Mr. Harvey D. Post, for a long time Warden of Trinity Church, Irvington, gave a good example of stewardship, both as regards his time and his possessions. He was always ready to do a personal service for the Church, and he was a generous giver to good causes in the Parish and beyond.

Mr. Frank Ford of Essex Fells was a steadfast friend and supporter of St. Peter's Parish.

During the past year the handsome and commodious new Parish House of Grace Church, Orange, has been dedicated and started upon its course of useful service. Modern in all its planning and equipment it provides facilities for varied and numerous activities. It is a wonderful contribution toward meeting the social needs both of the present large constituency of this popular parish, and of those who in future years will come within the circle of its beneficent influence.

A beautiful Church School Building was given to the Church of the Holy Communion, Norwood, by Mrs. E. Coleman Savidge, the mother of the Rector, the Rev'd J. Foster Savidge. It is built of stone corresponding to the Church, with which it is connected by a graceful cloister. It is a great addition to the equipment of the Parish and an aid in establishing a fine standard in building for the Parishes which will develop in this part of the Diocese in the coming days. Great thanks are due to Mrs. Savidge for her generous and wise gift.

A fine and modern rectory has been built this winter for Grace Church, Madison. It is planned, when this is occupied, to make such alterations and additions to the old rectory as will provide useful and commodious quarters for the growing social activities of the Parish.

Several of the Mission Churches have secured new buildings this year. The Church of the Ascension, Bogota, built upon the foundations laid a few years ago, with additions, is a fine stone structure which will serve the faithful of the Church in that growing community for many years to come.

At Towaco the old frame building in use for so many years has been replaced by a most attractive combined Chapel and Parish House. This was put up at a very small expense and its acquisition will be a constant help in developing the work in that place.

The people of St. Martin's, Maywood, have during the past year taken possession of their first building. It sets upon a hill in a commanding position, is beautiful to the eye both without and within, and is quite well adapted both for the social activities and the religious Services of the growing congregation.

After many years' delay, St. Bartholomew's, Ho-Ho-Kus, only a few weeks ago dedicated its new Parish House. St. Bartholomew's has shared for a long time in the handicap which is felt by every congregation which has no provision for the social activities of the people. The new building, erected at a cost of about \$14,000, is in very good taste architecturally, and provides abundant facilities for the growth of the Church's work under the leadership of its active and devoted Rector, the Rev'd Albert F. Chillson.

The Priest-in-charge of St. Mark's, Mendham, with commendable foresight, has recently secured funds with the assistance of the Bishop's Church Extension Fund, sufficient for the purchase of a building next to the Church property in that place, heretofore used to house the village library. There has been no provision in the community for meetings of boys and girls and young people under good auspices. The Rev'd E. C. Boggess has made such repairs and improvements as adapt the new building to its new purposes and St. Mark's takes another step forward in its work of ministry.

A handsome new Altar at Trinity Church, Grantwood, was dedicated on November 23rd in memory of Mr. Stephen McClave, for so many years an outstanding and loyal helper of the Church's work in that part of the Diocese. This Altar, which is of marble, is the gift of Mr. McClave's children, and is a worthy addition to the beautiful Church recently erected to take the place of the old building which was destroyed by fire.

I think I should make mention of the building of the Chapel at the Tuberculosis Sanitarium in Verona. Although this Chapel has been built for the use of religious Services of all kinds, it is in a very particular way of interest to us because of the work which has for so long been done in this important Institution by the Chaplains of the City Mission. With great friendliness and unity of spirit the Chaplain of the Roman Catholic Church and our own Chaplain have carried on the work of ministry to the people in the Sanitarium, and I take this occasion of publicly thanking the members of the Board of

Chosen Freeholders for the recognition of the need of religion in such a great Institution and for providing for its Services and ministry in so seemly a manner.

The Church of the Epiphany, Orange, celebrated the Twenty-fifth Anniversary of its organization by a dinner at Grace Church, attended by a large company, representing many Parishes in the Diocese. The meeting was a tribute to the great activity and fine leadership through all these years of the Rev'd George M. Plaskett, the only minister connected with this work. The Church of the Epiphany, as is known, has become a Parish, and looks forward to a continually enlarging influence of its ministry to the colored people of the Oranges.

Christ Church, Hackensack, devoted a week of Services to the marking of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the erection of the present Church building.

In a number of places gatherings were held during the year to felicitate both the Clergy and the congregation upon the accomplishment of good terms of service. The Vestry and people of Grace Church, Orange, marked the Twenty-fifth Anniversary of the Rectorship of the Rev'd Charles T. Walkley, and the large part played in it by the graciousness and activity of Mrs. Walkley.

The fifteen years of notable service by the Rev'd Luke M. White, at St. Luke's, Montclair, was marked during the winter.

The people of Christ Church, Bloomfield and Glen Ridge, marked with a joyful Parish Reception the completion of ten years of service there of the Rev'd George P. Dougherty.

The Rev'd and Mrs. Percy T. Olton were remembered in a practical fashion by the congregation of St. James', Newark, on the occasion of their Tenth Anniversary; and the Rev'd Allen Greene was the recipient of many congratulations upon the part of his people and the brethren of the Clergy upon the rounding out of twenty-five years in the ministry, for twelve of which he had been in his present Parish.

On the first of May the Rev'd Charles E. Hutchison completed twenty-five years of service at Christ Church, East Orange, an Anniversary which was marked quietly but with warm sincerity and affection by the members of that Parish in whose hearts the Rector and Mrs. Hutchison have so large a place.

Along with these Anniversaries must be mentioned the observance at St. Stephen's, Jersey City, of the ten notable years of the Rectorship of the Rev'd A. R. McWilliams. During these ten years 570 persons have been presented for Confirmation, a fine record of parish activity hardly exceeded by the most well developed parishes of the Church.

I would like to say a word in appreciation of the help in the work of the Diocese of many visiting Clergymen and others during the year. First among

these is, of course, the Bishop of Easton, the Rt. Rev'd Dr. George W. Davenport, who for the third successive year has generously given us a month of his time for ministry in our Diocese. Bishop Davenport made twenty-three Visitations for Confirmation during the month of March. He was warmly welcomed in every place to which he went and brought a fine message of good cheer and inspiration to our people.

The Girls' Friendly Society was greatly benefited by the presence in the Diocese for six weeks of Miss Frances Arnold, a member of the National Staff of that Organization, who during her stay with us visited a large number of Branches, creating everywhere new understanding of the work of the Society and new interest and zeal on the part of its members and leaders.

Miss Hill of the Alaska Mission was with us for two weeks carrying a characteristically modest but heroic message to her hearers in many places.

Another visitor telling us of the Church's work abroad was Bishop Hulse of Cuba.

The publication of the tabulations of the recent Census is of interest to us as Churchmen for the indications it gives in the trend of the population in the State and especially in our Diocese. The present population of the State is 4,041,342. Of this the seven northern counties which comprise the Diocese of Newark have a population of 2,378,943, which is about 59% of the total. Hudson and Warren Counties appear not to be growing at a very great rate. The rate of increase in the decade, 1920-30, for Essex is 27.8%; for Morris 33.6%; and for Bergen 73.2%. In all of these Counties we have now ninety-four Parishes and sixty-four Missions, and it will be interesting to know that one-half of these Missions, or thirty-two, are in Bergen County, which in the last decade so far outstripped all other Counties of the State in its rate of growth. Looking over the present population of the various towns and incorporated places in the Diocese we may note that the Church is represented in each of these places with a population of 5,000 or over, with the exception of Guttenburg, Kearny, Lodi, and West New York, but in each of these cases the Church is established in other townships right nearby and easily accessible. The most interesting of the facts brought out by the Census concerns the indications of the trend of population in the new and smaller communities. In many places there is rapid growth, although it has not yet attained great dimensions. The problem of our missionary administration is both difficult and fascinating, for we have to determine when to refrain from planting the Church because of the presence in the community of so many religious organizations among so limited a number of people, and when the indications of growth are to be taken as a call for us to lay the foundations upon which may be built an Episcopal Church in future years.

In connection with the statistics of population I have been interested recently in some figures drawn from the annual reports of the Parishes. First, as to

Confirmations. During the fifteen years that I have worked as Bishop in the Diocese, there have been 35,337 Confirmations. In 1915 the number of communicants indicated in the Parochial Reports totalled 39,000. If we had had no losses in all these years we should have 74,000 communicants at the present date, but the figures of the Reports show a total of only 53,000. It is hard to account for this leakage of more than 20,000 in fifteen years. Whether it be due most largely to removal or to carelessness or indifference, it is hard to say, but there can be no doubt that the existence of such figures is a challenge to all who are responsible in Parish activities to exercise the utmost care and devotion in the pastoral side of the Church's life.

Last year's Parochial Reports indicate that we have in the Diocese one hundred and forty-six Churches and Chapels; one hundred and five Rectories; and eighty-nine Parish Houses. In addition to these there are thirty-two Churches so built that the basement is available for week day and social activities. Altogether we have in the Diocese three hundred and forty Church buildings of one sort or another. It is hard to secure definite and accurate figures concerning the valuation of the Church property in the Diocese. Incidentally about thirty of the Parochial Reports failed to give information in this regard. And of course it goes without saying that in making reports of property valuations the personal element enters in; in some cases the replacement cost being given as the value of the property and in other cases the contract cost. But making allowance for all this, and with some reservation, it appears that the total valuation of the property of the Church in the Diocese is \$17,692,984.53. Apparently the total indebtedness upon these buildings amounts to \$1,177,096.68, and the insurance coverage to \$8,682,185.00. It would require much more carefulness in reporting on the part of the Treasurers and Vestrymen to get absolutely definite figures, but of course it is not necessary to have the exact amounts of dollars and cents to adequately picture this aspect of the Church's life. I present the figures to you mainly because of the thoughts which they may suggest to you as those holding positions of responsibility in the Church.

I gather from looking over the Parochial Reports that the matter of insurance is pretty well cared for. It is of the utmost importance, of course, that the Parishes should have adequate protection against the hazard of fire, and we have been fortunate in that for a long time we have had no great disaster of this sort. But no one knows when the untoward thing will happen, and although Vestries are tempted sometimes to run the risk it is a sound policy to carry an adequate amount of insurance even though it be not altogether easy to pay the premiums as they come due. I urge the Clergy, as well as the Vestrymen, to give this matter careful attention and to see that the buildings and contents are adequately insured.

In this connection something may be said concerning the importance of Liability and Compensation Insurance. These two kinds of insurance, one

protecting the Parish against suits for damage on account of injuries to outsiders, and the other having to do with accidents to the employees of the Church; are both now required in this State by law. The Board of Missions has taken steps to secure insurance of both kinds in the sixty-four Missions of the Diocese, and it would be well if all the Parishes followed that good example.

The Board of Missions has devoted some time this winter to a discussion of a plan for the creation in the Diocese of a Committee upon the upkeep and repair of Parish buildings. It is suggested that all the buildings in the Diocese might profitably be inspected by a qualified and interested Committee, say once in three years; the findings and recommendations of the Committee being transmitted to the Bishop as well as to the authorities of the Parishes visited. It was felt that some such plan might help to keep the Church's property in the several Parishes and Missions in better condition, and prevent the accumulation of decay and disrepair that sometimes goes on. After considerable discussion the plan was laid aside because of the difficulties involved, but it would seem as though some method might be devised which would help to keep up the standard in regard to the care of our Parish buildings in a good way. It may be that members of the Convention may be able to make practical suggestions along this line.

The figures just given of the total indebtedness upon our Parish buildings, namely \$1,177,096.68, may not be exact, the tabulation being rather difficult in view of variations in the lists of the Parochial Reports. Apparently out of the one hundred and fifty-five Parishes eighty-two have debts upon which interest is being paid. The largest amount reported is \$139,500. Other large amounts are \$84,900; \$81,235; and \$65,000. These are in Parishes of outstanding size and abilities. For the most part the debts are quite low in proportion to the total value of the properties involved. It is an interesting question as to how far a Parish at any moment should let itself into debt. Before the great financial catastrophe from which we have not yet recovered, the atmosphere was favorable to the creation of obligations far beyond what had been customary in more stable times. Some of our smaller Churches accumulated debts of large proportions during these years and are finding it difficult at the present time to bear the interest charges and to make the required payments upon principal.

Some people used to be fond of saying that one of the best things a Church could have was a debt. But although the existence of a debt makes a definite object for good endeavor and hard work in a Parish, it may also, if it is too large, lay such a burden upon the minds and hearts of the people as to be discouraging and depressing. I think we should aim for a good conservatism in these matters. It is just as bad for a Parish to live beyond its income as for an individual. The old fashioned way of waiting for the erection of new

buildings until a fair proportion of the cost was in hand is without question the line best to be followed. For the most part the reports from year to year show decreases in the amount of funded debts, and this is very desirable since it is poor policy to go on paying interest indefinitely. This is no time probably to inaugurate a debt paying campaign, but it is to be hoped that there will be wise planning and earnest work on the part of the people in the Parishes and Missions to keep steadily reducing the debts and thereby setting free the large amount paid for interest to be used in active service in the ministry.

Members of the Convention will be interested in the record of missionary giving for 1930. It is a striking fact that what a Church gives away is a very sure index to its internal state. Let a congregation get its mind set upon the world wide field with registered purpose to aid in carrying the light of the Gospel to all peoples, and the immediate problems concerning its growth and prosperity are easily solved; on the other hand the congregation that minimizes its ministry outwards in the supposed interests of its own needs in cultivating a principle which leads to loss of vitality and zest in home undertakings. There is, says the ancient sage, that scattereth and yet increaseth; and there is that withholdeth more than is meat, but it tends only to poverty.

It is not surprising in view of the trying financial and employment situations that we have to record for the year 1930 a falling off in congregational offerings. The total gifts of the Parishes and Missions for 1930 were \$245,708.24, a falling off from the preceding year of \$6,398.94.

Fortunately through the organization christened The Bishop's 1930 Club, a few devoted and generous Churchmen and women united in creating a fund to be used by the Bishop in meeting such missionary and charitable needs as seemed to him most pressing. This fund, amounting to about \$10,000, was added to the amount appropriated for the work of the National Council making our gifts to that work for the year \$136,338. This is the largest amount the Diocese has so far given in any one year, and puts us in fourth place among the dioceses, New York, Pennsylvania, and Massachusetts alone exceeding us in the amount of their gifts for 1930. The amount spent within the Diocese for missionary and charitable work was \$119,127.94, making of our total missionary gifts 47% for diocesan work and 53% for the support of the Church in all the world.

I feel great concern as regards our missionary giving this year. The pledges for the red side of the envelopes made in the Church Loyalty Festival last autumn totalled \$230,590.62, a falling off from the total of the preceding year of about \$14,000.

Those who give the matter even cursory thought will at once perceive how grave a situation confronts us. If we suppose the total gifts sent in to the treasurer check with the pledged amount, i. e., \$230,590.62, and if we adhere to our rule of many years to apportion these gifts share and share alike to the

diocesan needs and the work of the National Council, we shall have \$115,295.32 for each side, but to meet the diocesan appropriations for the year we need \$10,000 more, and to attain last year's level of giving to the National Council we should have about \$21,000 more, a total of \$31,000. This amount we must plan to raise by special efforts this year. I believe it can be done if the clergy and the laity present in this Convention, together with the many capable and gifted leaders in parishes, will set themselves to the task with right good will and a sense of personal obligation for the progress and prosperity of the Church whose lovers and true servants we feel ourselves to be.

I am not unmindful of the added difficulties due to the trying economic situation experienced by many parishes this year. What with unemployment and loss of income some of the most loyal Churchmen are unable to continue their accustomed gifts to the Church; and the problem of parish maintenance presses hard upon some of our congregations. It is a time when we must all stand by and do what we can. All who are able must continue their support of the Church, and those who can must carry a little more of the load. It is probable that there are sufficient resources available for the carrying on of our parish activities if with prayer and wisdom we seek them out. I want to express here my heart felt appreciation to the great company throughout the Diocese, who in a spirit of loyalty and confidence are carrying the Church and its work upon their hearts through trying times.

A part of the Church's work which has pressed more heavily upon clergy and lay people alike during these past months is the ministry to the poor and needy. In many places the accustomed charitable funds have proven painfully inadequate; the pressure of want has brought many new applicants for aid, and the need for assistance has been larger and more continuing than ever. The task of securing needed funds and of wisely administering them has been a considerable problem especially in the larger communities where the population is mixed and the volume of poverty large. It is a satisfaction to know that in almost all our parishes provision has been made for ministering to those of our immediate household of faith, and opportunities given to our people to share in the measures taken in the community for the alleviation of suffering.

The Church in its corporate capacity and especially through its individual members should take a foremost part in such movements. The grace of charity in all its divine loveliness is a high gift of the spirit, and one which it behooves those who are Christ's disciples to cherish and to manifest in human relations to the honor of their Lord and especially to those times like the present when needs are great.

I often wonder whether as Churchmen we do enough to justify our profession as Christians and the position of respect and consideration accorded us in our modern society. When one considers our goodly numbers, the value of our properties and the amounts we spend yearly for the upkeep of our Church

activities, some \$1,140,134.68 according to the statistics, it may fairly be asked whether we do as much for people and society as might justly be expected of us.

I am one of those who believe that the intangibles are among the most precious of our possessions, and the thoughts and dreams of eager hearts the most valuable social assets. And as to these, their production and development, you can pass no judgment upon the Church. There is no standard by which you can surely estimate their worth. No one can tell in whose bosom the divine fire will be kindled nor when or how it will burst into flame; nor can you isolate the gifts of the spirit and place graduated values upon them. What the Church is doing in the souls of men no one can tell; we only know that for some she has been and is the ministrant of spiritual gifts and graces, and that by these things men live.

But we may reasonably ask whether the Church is worthy of her trusteeship; whether the oracles of God and the Holy Sacraments in her care are administered to edification, and whether as an organization she plays as she might the great role set before her in human society. There is no department of life, nor aspect of human endeavor, which the Church may not and should not helpfully touch. Whether by teaching, or by setting up of ideals or the evoking of a good conscience, in one way or another the Church ought to be shedding light and imparting new life to all human activities and relationships. And I ask myself whether we of this Church, crowned with so many blessings of God's favor, are measuring up, as we could desire, to what is at once our opportunity and responsibility. Take for instance the movement this year to bring forward the subject of Child Welfare. Why should not every congregation have a real and definite part in so good an undertaking? The declaration of the rights of children as set forth at the White House Conference last year proposes an ideal and goal for endeavor which patriot and Christian alike might heartily embrace, and which is full of potential goods. Here is a cause in which all people of good will can unite; and how pleasant and satisfying a thought that in all our communities Christian people were taking a leading part in it.

Or consider the bad practices which find their way into industrial life. I have lately been told of the custom of some of the smaller dye houses in Paterson and Passaic of operating on Saturday afternoons and all day Sundays, employing women and children in many cases. Such a practice is not necessitated by economic causes, the plants not infrequently being closed some days during the week, and it is not followed by the larger and better organized concerns. Here is a bad custom, illegal and uneconomic is allowed to develop because it is overlooked, and ignored by those, part of whose duty it is to watch over and to have a concern for the conditions under which so many of our fellowmen must earn their daily bread. It cannot be doubted that Christian people by appeals in such matters to constituted authorities, like the State

Department of Labor, and by the creation of a sound public opinion, can help to maintain decent and fair standards of employment.

In no place is the need greater for fine ideals of personal integrity and high standards of public action than in the political area. There are apparently large numbers of people who think that money gotten from the public treasury is honest graft, and that presents for presumed protection are a natural form of recognition of favors received from those in authority. There are others besides policemen whose bank accounts have been unduly swelled during their occupancy of public office, and of some persons prominent in political life it would seem that their chief activity has been in seeing to their own and their friends' re-election so that fruitful sources of money grabbing might not be taken from their itching hands. Jobs, racketeering, graft large and small, holdups, shakedowns, how many words of sinister connotation are part of the common vocabulary these days. The presence of these things is an evil omen; for they do not remain stationary in form or amount, nor can they be confined to one department of life. It is one of the great failures in duty in our times that as many of our best men and women absolve themselves from political responsibility and take the easy road of paying what toll is necessary rather than helping by personal service, to secure honest dealing and capable administration in the governmental affairs of the municipalities, the counties, and the State.

Look where one will, in almost every direction one is met by crying needs for the services of Christian people. Some one must show us how to deal with law breaking and dishonesty, some one must protect our children and young people from the vulgar and lascivious moving pictures created to make money without concern for their influence upon personality and character; some one must take the lead in pointing out the highways to international amity and peace; some one must teach us the steps to be taken toward the securing of a more just and humane economic order, where the gain or loss of one shall be the concern of all, and where the down most shall have the solicitous care of the whole body; some one must indicate what is to be done with the new and growing leisure which a mechanical age is bestowing upon us; some one must tell us what are to be the new laws of distribution in a modern and moving world.

It is hard to imagine a time when there were so many needs for the labor and service of people of noble ideals and fine purposes as exist today. There is no lack of occupation for those who would serve their fellow men. It is only the lazy and the selfish who can complain of ennui and jaded appetites. For those who would share in the establishment of God's rule in the hearts of men there are opportunities on every side; challenges of infinite variety and thrilling beyond words. It is to the facing of this great realm of service that we must constantly strive to bring all our people, young and old, gifted and ordinary, we must face them with the great personal and social needs all about

us and bid them in Christ's name to take a share and lend a hand in some chosen concern of the world's great harvest field. This is what the Church is for, to recruit the company of those who will to live under Christ's law of service and help them by divine grace to do a mighty labor for God and man in the time before sundown.

There are one or two matters concerning the Christian ordering of life about which I feel I should say a few words. The first has to do with what is popularly spoken of as birth control. This subject was one of those considered at the Lambeth Conference under the heading "The Life and Witness of the Christian Community." It had for its background certain well known facts, such as the prevalence of abortion and the general decline of the birth rate in all western countries. It recognized the difficulty of dealing with a subject so intimate in character and so involved with many traditions and taboos. Nevertheless it endeavored to face the situation as it exists with an open mind and a clear conscience. It affirmed the need for better education in sex matters; it emphasized the truth that the sexual instinct is a holy thing implanted by God in human nature; it proclaimed the duty of parenthood as the glory of married life, the benefit of a family as a joy in itself, as a vital contribution to the nation's welfare and as a means of character building for both parents and children, and the privilege of discipline and sacrifice to this end.

Seeing that there are circumstances, in which it is agreed by all, measures may lawfully be taken for the limitation of offspring, and that such measures in themselves vary in character, the Conference referred the decision in such conditions to the conscience of the individuals concerned, with urgency to judge in the light of Christian principles, and with condemnation of the use of any means of conception control from motives of selfishness, luxury, or more convenience.

The publication of these views has done much to clarify a beclouded region of experience, it has at once affirmed in many minds the sense of solemn responsibility for human life, and the acceptance and using of modern knowledge in meeting it. Practically it has done something to fortify the position and to enhance the usefulness of those Birth Control Clinics, which mostly under the sponsorship and direction of good and noble minded women, have gradually come to be established in many of our cities and which have proven a godsend and blessing to many harassed and troubled souls.

One of the most noteworthy discussions in the Lambeth Conference was that dealing with the important and difficult subject of Church Unity. It is fair to say that the Anglican Church feels itself called to a mediatory position among the Communions of the Christian world. It has been called the Bridge Church; and since 1920, when it issued a call to all Christian people to consider the need for a reunion of the separated groups in the body of Christ, it has made many attempts in various directions to further this great cause. Chief among the

fruits of this endeavor was the presentation to the Conference for consideration and advice of the proposals for unity of the United Church of South India, the southern diocese of the Church of India, Burma and Ceylon, and the South India Province of the Wesleyan Methodist Church; and the similar though not yet so developed plans of the Anglican and Presbyterian Churches in Persia. Along with these in importance was the visitation of the delegation from the Eastern Orthodox Church, consisting of high ecclesiastical personages from the Churches in Eastern and Southeastern Europe, the Church of Alexandria, the great Church of Constantinople, from the Patriarchates of Roumania, Jugoslavia, Antioch, Jerusalem, Greece, Cyprus, Poland. That the Conference found itself able to view favorably the proposed plans for the building of a National Church in South India and to wish its proponents God's blessing, is a sign of promise and a ground of hope. And that the Eastern Prelates, after the most careful and discriminating conversations, could declare themselves satisfied as to the orthodoxy of the Anglican Church and convinced of its historic and apostolic character, and ready to recommend to their synods steps looking toward inter-communion with the Anglican Churches, is an event of much significance.

That not more attention was given to the question of reunion at home was due, I think, to the fact that for the moment we have come to a stage in which the next steps seem dubious and uncertain. There has been in recent years much discussion as to the evils of disunion in the Church and the causes of it. The desirability of uniting the whole company of the faithful in one Communion and fellowship in the Mystical Body of Christ is recognized on all sides. We know how greatly our witness is lamed and our effective service for the upbuilding of the Kingdom of Christ let and hindered by our separations. We feel them to be a scandal and a shame, and we acknowledge the power over our minds and hearts of the dream of unity. But despite all our prayers and our conferrings with one another the way is not clear before us. Perhaps it may never be. Perhaps in this matter will be fulfilled the words of our Lord about the Kingdom of Heaven suffering violence and the violent taking it by storm. It would seem that we have come pretty near to the limit of useful discussion of the matter. As regards the conditions of reunion between ourselves and the non-Roman Communions, not much more is to be said. We understand each other's positions fairly well, and we stand pretty close in purpose and feeling. What we can most profitably do is to cultivate the acquaintance of our fellow Christians, and to win toward friendship and unity of spirit by coöperation in good works and by fellowship in prayer and aspiration.

It is doubtful whether the Christian world will ever think alike; it is not so hard to think that it may come in some fine degree to aspire and to work together. At any rate for us in this Diocese this would seem to be our reasonable attitude and our steadfast endeavor. We should count the members

of all Christian Churches our brothers in Christ and we should fellowship with them as far and as much as we can. We should endeavor to work with them in good ways of Christian service, and we should worship with them when we can in fitting times and in an humble spirit. This need not involve us in disloyalty to cherished opinions, nor carry us into transgressions of the canonical rules of our Church. But undoubtedly such intercourse with our brothers will react upon our convictions and judgments. When we have prayed and worked with a fellow Christian and have found him a true yoke fellow and a bearer of the spirit of Christ, we cannot deny him his place in the Kingdom, nor think so lightly of the concepts of Christian truth and ordering of the Christian society which he holds dear. The way a man's heart is inclined makes all the difference in the world in his judgments and actions. There are not a few who feel that the great work for Christian Unity now before us is heart work; that what we most need and must ardently seek is an atmosphere of brotherly love and mutual good will; that if we can learn to rejoice in each other's company, and to profit by each other's gifts, it will not be so hard to solve the problems which former generations have bequeathed to us, and which modern sectarianism keeps on creating.

It is well to remember that the Church is essentially a spiritual fellowship; and that in the things of the spirit there is in the Christian society already an immeasurable unity. A sin against charity is worse than the breaking of a canon, and to walk in love is the highest and most beautiful expression of the spirit of Christ. I think we shall get unity when we deserve it, and meanwhile we shall be helping it nearer if we live in amity and good will with our fellow Christians, sharing with them in the common blessings of divine grace, and joining hands with them in all wise and well considered endeavors for bringing in the reign of our Sovereign Lord and Master.

Reports of the Archdeacons

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF NEWARK.

To the Rt. Rev'd Wilson R. Stearly, D.D., Bishop of Newark:

At the present time there are in the Archdeaconry of Newark six diocesan missions, two parochial missions and two assisted parishes. Of the diocesan missions, four are receiving diocesan aid, which is also the case with respect to the assisted parishes. The report on the condition of certain of these places is given below.

St. Alban's, Newark: The attendance at the services of the Church have greatly improved. The Church School has maintained itself in a good way. The financial situation is at present better than it has been in years. The pledges for Parish support for the coming year are greater in amount than for any other year past. During the year past, the Mission received great financial help from the organizations, which not only made special gifts of substantial amounts, but contributed in a regular manner to the Church. The organizations are doing as well as may be expected. The year past witnessed the organization of a Young People's Society which is a great help to the Mission. Their attendance at the services of the Church, the assistance they give the Vicar and their co-operation in his work of the City Mission are all worthy of note. The G. F. S. and the Guild have also assisted him in the work of the City Mission—giving supplies, baskets, Bibles, and helping in every way. In a material way much has been done. The Rectory has been partially redecorated, numerous repairs have been made on both the Church and the Rectory. In every way we have tried to keep our property in the best condition we can. Most of this work is done by the men of the Mission. The new heating plant which gives such excellent service in the Rectory is now nearly paid for, only \$74.00 being now owing. As far as the Vicar knows, this is the only obligation outstanding. Our Mission is now able to pay for the coal being used before it is burned!

St. Mary Magdalene's, Newark: Everything looks very encouraging for the coming year, as it has been during 1930. Services have been very well attended, and at the Wednesday evening services during Lent the congregations were exceptionally good. In spite of the cutting down, by several people, of their pledge for 1931, on account of the "depression," the total pledged exceeded that of a year ago. There have been 20 Baptisms, 12 Confirmations, 6 Marriages and 4 Funerals. The Church School is flourishing and the average attendance is better than a year ago. The parish suffered a great loss in the death of Mrs. S. Swartout, a devout communicant and faithful parishioner. The Church building has been greatly improved by various memorials and gifts. A beautiful new Altar given by the members of the congregation in memory of the Rev'd H. Brueninghausen; a stained glass window to his memory, given by his mother; candelabra given by Mrs. Swartout in memory of her mother and brother; Altar Linen by the G. F. S.; Altar Service Book and Chancel Prayer Book, by Mr. and Mrs. Clements in memory of Mrs. Clements' parents; Priest's chair by the members of the Church School; purple Hangings by the Altar Guild; white Hangings, Burse and Veil by the G. F. S.; Credence Table by members of the congregation; a portable Altar for communicating the sick, in memory of Robert Lewis, by the members of his family; an electric clock was given by Mrs. Mountford for the Parish Hall. The old Altar, linen and hangings were given to the Mission of the Advent, Brookdale. During this year we hope it will be possible to redecorate the Church, and get some other new, much needed furniture.

Christ Church, Newark: The year 1930 saw no apparent decline in the vitality of this parish. So far as statistics reveal anything there was numerical growth, an increase of communicants and an added number of baptized and confirmed persons. More persons

looked to the parish for material assistance and spiritual ministrations. The Church School, as in the past two years, continued through the summer as a single class with an attendance generally better than in previous summers. It resumed sessions according to the winter schedule on the second Sunday in September with a greatly increased enrollment over the year previous. The Women's Auxillary continues to meet monthly and supports varied interests both within the parish and in the mission fields of the general church. The Young People's Fellowship, begun mid winter of last year, resumed weekly activity in the fall and shows new real and life in larger attendances, more varied activities and more strenuous undertakings. The Parish House is giving greater service to the community. The activities within it deal mostly with the child life of the neighborhood and conducted toward the needs of wholesome leisure time activities for school children. The parish has contributed an increased number of services of all kinds and all services have for the most part been better attended than for some years previous. In general, the spiritual life of Christ Church today would seem to be deepening. The Vestry has been composed of a devoted group of nine men interested in the material welfare of the parish but not greatly lacking in their interests in spiritual things as well. The fabric of the plant today is in rather good condition and is being slightly bettered month by month as time goes by. The Church Loyalty Festival of 1930 resulted in no increase in monetary income; on the other hand, a rather distressing decline is seen. General economic conditions attending account largely for this but the zeal is present to make things better as time goes on and there is reason to hope that the people will be roused in time to greater generosity.

St. Peter's, Livingston: St. Peter's Chapel, Livingston, reports a deficit for 1930 of around \$400.00. This is the second year the Mission has had to face without the valuable financial aid given for nearly ten years by a Sister of the Founder. It was hoped at the beginning of the year that this loss occasioned by Miss Kean's death might be made up by a drive for increased pledges. The canvass was successful in this respect, but the annual amount received remains fairly constant, and only by the most rigid economy, and the neglect of much needed repairs, has the Mission been able to carry on. There is a slow but healthy growth in membership. Communicants number some sixty adults and forty children, and represent sixty-five families. The Sunday School numbers about sixty children and the Boy and Girl Scout Troops each take care of about thirty non-Church children. Mount Pleasant Avenue, on which the Church stands, has been taken over by the State for Route 10. This will mean some structural alterations this spring, since the road line runs within three feet of the north side of the Church and cuts through the house at present occupied by the janitor. Title to all property is still vested in the Alex. Kean Estate.

Holy Innocents', West Orange: Services have been held on every Sunday and the greater Holy Days. The Sunday School meets every Sunday from October until the middle of June. There have been 3 Baptisms, 3 Confirmations, 1 Marriage and 2 Funerals. The subscriptions and offerings have been sufficient to meet all the expenses and pay the pledge to the diocese.

Mission of the Advent, Bloomfield: A very definite advance step in the life of this Mission has been made during the past year, with the organization of an executive committee. Likewise there has been a considerable increase in the attendance at the Sunday evening services, as well as the sessions of the Church School. The Women's Guild has given fine co-operation during the year and has contributed about \$300.00 for the work of the Mission.

The future of this Mission appears to be most promising. The Bishop has designated the Advent Offering to be used toward the construction of a new building. We hope to have this erected in 1931. In addition, unbiased opinions indicate that there are more Episcopalians in this section of Bloomfield than that of any other religious body. This presents a challenge, as well as an opportunity.

Holy Spirit, Verona: The Mission of the Holy Spirit at Verona has made large advances during the year 1930. The Sunday morning congregations are good, while the Church

School has an enrollment of over fifty. The attendance at the school taxes the capacity of the store room which is fitted up as a chapel. Steps must be taken as soon as possible to provide a suitable Church building with facilities for social purposes. The Mission has a most energetic Women's Guild, as well as a very efficient Altar Guild. The Executive Committee of the Mission is functioning one hundred per cent. In a few years at least, this work will require the entire attention of the clergyman.

St. David's, Cedar Grove: This Mission is one of the few in this part of the Diocese which seems to be having difficulty in going ahead. It is quite possible that the time will come soon when it may be advantageous to sell the present property for business purposes and relocate on some street in the residential section.

Any advance work in this Archdeaconry at the present time seems to be well nigh impossible, due to the limited means of the Board of Missions.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF PATERSON.

Christ Mission, Passaic, has been heartened by removing into new and better quarters, but a church building and not rooms on the second floor of an office building is needed, if good progress is being made under the leadership of the Rev'd Newton Penberthy. The services, it has small financial resources, and, if the needed building comes, it must come as a gift. What a splendid, useful Memorial it would be!

During the year three Archdeaconry Meetings have been held.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF JERSEY CITY.

To the Rt. Rev'd Wilson R. Stearly, D.D., Bishop of Newark:

The Archdeaconry of Jersey City lies within the boundaries of Hudson County exclusive of the Parishes in Arlington and Harrison. We have three Missions in the Archdeaconry. At the Northern end of the County is the Mission of the Transfiguration, Woodcliff, where good progress is being made under the leadership of the Rev'd Newton Penberthy. The Mission of Our Saviour, Secaucus, has a small but a steady growth under the direction of Canon W. J. White, with the help of lay-readers. In October this little mission entertained a meeting of the Jersey City District of the Woman's Auxilliary and the Clergy of the Archdeaconry. The Mission of the Incarnation for colored people in Jersey City continues to grow under the direction of Rev'd W. M. Harper, M.D.

The clergy of the Archdeaconry have had two meetings during the year and have led in providing for several United Services known as "The Way of Renewal" in different parts of the Archdeaconry. These services have been most successful and have met with enthusiastic response on the part of the lay people. This follow up work of "The Way of Renewal" is still being carried on in the Archdeaconry and is the means of stirring up of the Church life in our district.

HOSPITAL OF ST. BARNABAS, NEWARK.

[Incorporated February 13, 1867.]

To the Convention of Diocese of Newark:

Hospital Annual Report.

The year 1930 was the healthiest year on record. It is gratifying to realize that efforts to improve health conditions have met with such success that the average life span has increased a decade during the last generation. Hospitals have had a definite part in producing this result.

The year was one of financial difficulties for hospitals throughout the nation. Some had to close their doors and others were forced to shut down sections and floors. Bed occupancy was generally lower while the percentage of indigency increased. Thus the income from operation was, in many cases, greatly lower than the needs, necessitating appeals for additional financial assistance from philanthropic sources.

Notwithstanding these general conditions, St. Barnabas Hospital did well. Early in the year it was seen that readjustments would be necessary and we began a program of stringent economy. Only the most essential expenditures were permitted. Charges and Allowances were scrutinized so as to ensure fairness with regard to all classes of patients. The result was that although the total allowances for free and part free service were greater than ever before and the total days treatment decreased by 2.66% we reduced our deficit by about 50%.

During the year just passed 2,930 patients were treated in the hospital. The daily average was 104 patients and the average length of stay, 12 (plus) days. The maximum number was 133 and the minimum was 68.

There were 1,476 surgical operations and 355 babies were born in the hospital. Patients from 42 different nations and 34 religious affiliations were cared for.

In the out-Patient Department there were 22,543 patient visits, an increase of 29% over the previous year and 140% over 1926. This work has been done under the trying conditions of crowded quarters. We are anxious to give this service, however, to the thousands of poor sick who come to us for advice, treatment and medicine.

The cash receipts from patients were \$163,211.83. Other receipts were, from the Welfare Federation, \$27,000.00; Income from Endowments, \$27,088.50; City of Newark, \$2,500.00; Interest on Bank Balances, \$188.05; Donations, \$1,069.95; other receipts, \$3,680.90. Total receipts \$224,739.23.

We began the year with a deficit of \$8,061.96. Hospital expenditures during the year were \$220,953.83. This leaves us with a deficit of \$4,276.56. The free and part free services rendered cost \$65,421.70.

The Trustees make grateful acknowledgment of the gifts and other assistance of our friends throughout the year. We are thankful to the members of the Guild of the Hospital for their zealous support and personal services, to the Junior Guild for their valued interest, to the doctors and nurses for their loyal and unselfish service for our many poor patients and to all our friends and benefactors for their time and means, given for the loving work of mercy as expressed in the service of the Hospital.

FIFTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT, COUNCIL OF CHRIST HOSPITAL.

Christ Hospital has had a good year during 1930. In August we had a survey made by the Commissioner for the Department of Hospitals for the State of New Jersey which says: "We have occasion to visit many like institutions in this and other states. It is especially gratifying in a field which calls forth so uniformly for devoted and capable persons to find in this hospital people who stand out as unusual in their work and personal abilities."

In 1930 we treated 2,985 patients which was an increase of 749 over the previous year. In different clinic and out-patient departments where we have thirteen clinics in operation our books show that we treated nearly 15,000 cases in 1930, as compared with 3,838 in 1925, which shows a remarkable growth of the work the hospital is doing among the poor and needy.

The Treasurer's report for the year shows a total income of \$266,752.40 and against \$179,507.87 last year. The total cost of operation of the hospital exclusive of free service, was \$242,295.08. The amount of free-service given which includes the gifts of work done by our Guilds, gifts from the public, and that donated by the hospital itself, amounted to \$51,171.45. We are carrying a debt of \$225,000.00 for new buildings which we hope we will be able gradually to reduce from time to time now that our hospital is able to function at full capacity.

We have 68 pupil nurses in our Training School.

A unique piece of work that Christ Hospital is doing is in its Convalescent Home which is a separate building situated on Palisade Avenue but supplied from the hospital, in which we gave 3,000 Patient days service last year, and that was double for that of the year previous. This work ought to grow and we hope that there will be some generous souls who will look upon it with such favor as to endow it in their wills.

The Medical Library of the hospital has been increased by two valuable libraries of deceased physicians, formerly members of the staff, Dr. Gordon K. Dickison and Dr. Theodore Meury.

We received during the year 10 legacies, the smallest one amounting to \$9.03 and the largest over \$45,000. The total sum of all these legacies was \$118,712.40.

The material and financial conditions of Christ Hospital are in excellent shape and the Council is looking forward to the future with confidence.

cause of his resignation. With great regret the Board accepted the resignation and moved a vote of sincere appreciation to Dr. Cooder for his many years of faithful and outstanding work.

Mr. Percy S. Young announced his resignation as secretary, and the Board elected the Rev'd Donald MacAdie to the newly created office of Executive Secretary.

The Rev'd Harold N. Cutler became a part time Chaplain in conjunction with his duties as Vicar of St. Alban's Mission, Newark. The Rev'd William H. Watts, formerly Rector of St. Peter's Church, Clifton, assumed his duties as a full time City Mission Chaplain during this year.

A central supply room for the City Mission was fitted up at the Diocesan House and placed in charge of Mrs. Chester Lee Colton of the Comfort Club of the Diocese.

The daily work of the Chaplains has gone on in its usual regular and effective manner. This work represents the Church's opportunity to reach the forgotten and neglected ones of our public institutions.

HOUSE OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD, ORANGE.

[Organized, 1882.]

The House of the Good Shepherd, Orange, was organized in the spring of 1882. The purpose was to provide a home for aged dependent women, especially such as were members of the Episcopal Churches in the Oranges. There were a few then dependent upon their parishes for support, and it seemed advantageous to create a home for these needy ones. By the combined efforts of these churches in Orange a start was made in August of that year, in a rented dwelling. Subsequently, a house was built, at 280 Henry Street, Orange, of sufficient size to accommodate eighteen people. Through the generosity of Mrs. William Barr of Grace Church, Orange, this house was enlarged in 1904 to accommodate a few men also. The capacity of the house is now thirty-six.

While intended originally for persons connected with the Episcopal Churches in the Oranges, there has usually been room for others of many religious creeds and localities. The sole restriction in the charter is that applicants must be residents of the State of New Jersey. Thus the management is free to treat every application on its own merits. The house is intended to be a permanent home for the last years of aged people who have no other suitable place to live.

In early years the expense was borne by voluntary contributions of parishes, individuals, and some regular payment on the part of inmates. Since then a small endowment has been created by gifts and bequests. The income from this endowment fund carries part of the expenses of the present plant. If the cost of living remains fairly stationary, and generous people continue to contribute to the endowment fund, it is hoped some day to admit applicants by the payment of a lump sum. The long lists of applications to this and similar institutions make evident the great need for such institutions beyond the present provision of the community.

The physical aspects of the present plant seem adequate to the needs of the present population of the house. The house physician, Dr. John H. Thomas, succeeds in keeping the members of the family in good health, in spite of their advanced years. The need to provide facilities for more applicants is, however, becoming imperative.

The life of the house is brightened by socials and entertainments. The Auxiliary, composed of young ladies, makes provision for such functions from time to time.

Lyman-Wheaton, the Church of the Ascension; the Rev'd H. I. Johnson, Holy Cross; the Rev'd Wm. C. Wilkins, St. Mary's; and Mrs. Charles E. Graff, all of Jersey City. There has been one resignation, Miss Garretson of Morristown.

During the year eight girls have been admitted to the Home and nine discharged. At present there are in the Home eight girls and seven infants. In all, 34 girls and 34 babies have been cared for during the year.

On February 6th a service was held at St. Katharine's to commemorate the completion of forty years of its existence. Canon Bryan officiated, assisted by Archdeacon Shipley and the Rev'd E. L. Cook.

The Bishop visited the Home on Ascension Day and two girls were confirmed.

Doctor Herbert McLean accepted the responsibility of visiting the Home every two weeks.

At the April meeting the Sister indicated the need of an Annex or Daughter House, where old girls could come when out of work. The Home has sheltered many girls during the past year and for six weeks the infirmary was used for that purpose and could have been used for a longer period, had it been possible.

On May 5th a benefit performance was given in East Orange to help meet the deficit, and \$400 was sent to the Treasurer for the Hospital fund as the result.

Certain necessary repairs were effected at a cost of about \$500.00.

A new rug for the Chapel, mattresses for the Girls' beds and several other things needed were procured with a gift of \$100.

A radio was given to the Home and installed by the courtesy of Mr. Morrill of Englewood. The new General Electric icebox has proved a great comfort.

The Christmas season was very much enjoyed and the Festival held as usual on Holy Innocent's Day. A Nativity play was given in the refectory by the girls.

At the meeting in October a letter was read from Mrs. Pope, tendering her resignation as Secretary of the Board, in which she wrote that very many pleasant memories were associated with her long term of office and that the work of St. Katharine's would ever be of great interest to her.

Many thanks are extended to the clergy and to all who have contributed to the welfare of the Home, and special thanks to Doctor Benjamin for his kind care of one of the patients.

Thus four decades have come and gone and the work of St. Katharine's is still needed. Loving care has been bestowed upon those who have found shelter in the Home. May it continue as in the past, and may the words of the Saviour ever be remembered, that it is more blessed to give than to receive.

WOMAN'S AUXILIARY, NEWARK BRANCH.

The year 1930 has been marked by few outstanding events but, perhaps a healthier condition, shows a steady, though in most instances small, increase in usefulness and accomplishment.

The Auxiliary has borne its full share in the activities of Parish, Community, Diocese, Nation and World and functioned constructively in the Departments of Missions, Education, and Social Service.

Financially, \$9,468.44 has been disbursed, \$2,275.00 of this counting on the Parish Quotas, something over \$600 for Administration (this includes the publication of the Blue Book) \$475.00 for special missionary objects; some \$3,500.00 for Supplies divided about equally between Diocese and Nation-World work, of the remaining \$2,505.32 the division is about 60% for Nation and World objectives and 40% within the Diocese. Of the balance on hand of \$4,428.50, about \$2,000 is for the Advance Work Projects.

Educationally, a constructive program for adult education has been carried out in so far as a limited number of leaders could do this and a real contribution was made in the publicity provided for the Advance Work Program by the little dramatic skit "Tools". Scholarships amounting to \$245.00 were provided for the Summer Schools and the School for Rural Workers.

The Supply department outfitted one hospital, ten schools and missions and 42 personal boxes outside the Diocese and supplied the needs of all diocesan institutions and helped the City Mission, Rural work and many special cases within the Diocese.

Monthly meetings are held at Trinity House, Newark, the first Wednesday in each month from October to May inclusive except the first Wednesday in December when the Diocesan Quiet Morning is held in Trinity Cathedral; the attendance at these meetings is from one to three hundred.

The summer recreational work of the Social Service Department has increased and much has been done to aid the unemployed. A program for Parish study and work was prepared and disseminated.

At the Annual Meeting in January the following officers were elected: *President*, Mrs. Charles E. Hutchison of Christ Church, East Orange; *Corresponding Secretary*, Mrs. Guy V. Shipler, St. Paul's, Chatham; *Treasurer*, Mrs. K. A. Southworth, Christ Church, East Orange. All but Mrs. Hutchison, who takes office May 6th, 1931, assumed the duties of their office at once.

Finally our organization is justified by increasing interest and accomplishment; may it grow and prosper, ever hoping and praying that the best is yet to be.

Rt. Rev'd J. Blair Larned—"The Church's Need for Men".

Plans are now under way to bring out at least 500 men and boys, possibly 1,000, next year, to commemorate the 200th Anniversary of George Washington's Birthday, on February 22, 1932.

The Newark Diocesan Assembly consists of 12 Senior Chapters, 8 Junior Chapters, active and in good standing with National headquarters.

The Brotherhood of St. Andrew is a layman's organization for the spread of Christ's Kingdom among men, especially young men. REPORT OF THE YOUNG PEOPLE'S FELLOWSHIP.

Annual Report for the Year 1930.

The purpose of the Young People's Fellowship is to provide young people with an effective organization for mutual helpfulness and cooperation in the service of Christ and His Church through its four-fold program of Devotion, Education, Service, and Recreation.

The governing body of the Y. P. F., or Diocesan Council, is made up of the Bishop, as Honorary President, president, secretary, five members of Council, one advisor and one provincial delegate, elected by the members themselves at the annual convention; the six district presidents, and five members appointed by the Bishop to serve on the Council. The districts are represented by: Edward J. Relly, Jr., Englewood; Allan Doty, Jersey City; William J. Laiviere, Morristown; James T. Heath, Jr., Newark; Charles Wells, Orange-Montclair; Charles W. Palmer, Paterson.

The Presidents' Dinner and Conference, called by the Bishop was held in January, 1930, at Grace Church parish house, Orange. There were three conferences during the afternoon, Duty and Right of Property, lead by Rev'd A. J. M. Wilson; Evangelistic Responsibility of the Y. P. F., lead by Mr. Cook; and Right Use of Charity, lead by Rev'd Donald MacAdie.

As usual the Provincial Conference was held in February, over the week-end of Washington's birthday, at St. Mark's Church, Mount Kisco, New York. Each Diocese of the Province is permitted to send seven delegates.

The National Commission for Young People's work set aside Whitsunday for the National Corporate Communion for the Young People's Fellowship.

May 10th the Annual Diocesan Convention was held in St. Paul's, Paterson. The various committees gave their reports. The treasurer reported funds available; May 1930, \$294.02. Fellowship News had been distributed monthly with seven thousand six hundred copies, in all being issued. During the Church service, the annual pledge of the Y. P. F. of five hundred dollars was given to the Bishop. The Cup won by St. Paul's, Paterson, in the basketball tournament was presented by Miss Mathilda Mayer, at the dinner. St. Luke's chapter of Paterson, won the cup for the best all-around chapter and Orange-Montclair District received the Cup for being the outstanding district.

A Boat-ride for the Diocese up the Hudson, was held on June 28th.

June 20th, 21st, 22nd, the Y. P. F. was included in the Summer Conference held at Delaware, New Jersey, under the direction of the Board of Religious Education of the Diocese. This was the first of its kind and the Fellowship felt spiritually benefited, along with a splendid opportunity to become acquainted with other young people outside the Fellowship.

November 1st found the Y. P. F. again holding its Laura Augusta Conference at the Laura Augusta Home in Madison, New Jersey. The conference was divided into three groups: 1. Rev'd Victor Mori of Grace Church, Madison, "Worship in the Y. P. F. Service"; 2. Rev'd J. Thurston Travis, "The Attitude of the Clergy to the Y. P. F."; 3. Mr. Alfred Voegeli, "Has the Y. P. F. a Place in the Church To-day?"

The Y. P. F. in the Diocese of Newark has with the close of the year, one thousand members who have paid dues in forty-two active chapters. New Territory to be developed is always under consideration. There are seven prospective chapters which will probably be admitted before the end of the year.

On November 16, 1929, the Church Club had a luncheon at the Newark Athletic Club in honor of the Bishop of the Diocese, the Dean of Trinity Cathedral, and the five Arch-

deacons of the Diocese. About 30 members were present in addition to the guests. The purpose of this meeting was to develop ideas so that the Club could function in the best possible way, during the coming year, to promote the interest of the Church in this Diocese, and some valuable suggestions were made by the Bishop, the Dean, and the Archdeacons, which were subsequently acted upon.

On January 23, 1930, a dinner was held at the Robert Treat Hotel, and the attendance was about 300. The speakers were Dean Fosbrooke, of the General Theological Seminary, New York City, the Reverend Percy Silver, Rector of the Church of the Incarnation, New York City, and Bishop Stearly. The purpose of this meeting was to arouse interest in the Diocese in the General Theological Seminary.

On May 19, 1930, at the time of the Diocesan Convention, held at Grace Church, Orange, the Club gave a dinner to the Clerical and Lay Deputies at the Y. M. C. A., Orange, and over 300 were present. Addresses were made by the late Mr. G. C. Ford, Director of the Regional Plan in New York, and the Reverend Luke M. White, Rector of St. Luke's, Montclair. Mr. Ford's address developed the idea of the possible changes in the population in New Jersey, and spoke of the possibility of the location for a Cathedral in this Diocese. Mr. White's address was devoted to the question of Church attendance.

On May 26, 1930, the Church Club invited the five Archdeacons, also a number of active laymen, to a dinner and conference at the Newark Athletic Club to discuss the possibility of having a dinner or mass meeting in each of the five Archdeaconries during the month of October, 1930, such meetings to be held under the auspices of the Church Club, and at which eminent speakers should be secured to arouse a keener interest in the religious life in the communities. About twenty attended, and unanimously agreed that such meetings would reach large numbers of people, and promised to co-operate in the plan. The President appointed five committees to undertake these meetings in each Archdeaconry, each committee to consist of three members of the Church Club, one of whom to be chairman, and three clergy in each Archdeaconry to be named by the Archdeacon, one of whom should be preferably the Archdeacon himself.

On September 4, 1930, the Council of the Church Club invited the Archdeaconry Committees to a dinner for conference and reports. Twenty-one attended this conference and every one of the Committees was represented and reported progress.

September 15, 1930, another meeting of the Committees was held, which was attended by the Bishop, and it was planned to hold five Mass Meetings and one dinner. At the suggestion of the Bishop he recommended that the subject and theme of these meetings should be "The Way of Renewal," which was the subject of a recent series of meetings held in England, which had been very successful.

On October 9, 1930, the first of the Archdeaconry Meetings was held at St. Paul's, Paterson. A combined choir of 250 led the singing, and the attendance numbered more than one thousand people. The address was made by the Hon. Ira W. Stratton, of Reading, Pa., which was followed by an address by Bishop Stearly. This meeting took the form of a special service, which had been prepared by the Archdeacons and there were about twenty-five clergy of the Archdeaconry of Paterson, in the Chancel.

On October 12, the second Mass Meeting was held in the Archdeaconry of Newark at Grace Church, Orange. The co-operation of all the parishes in the Archdeaconry was very helpful, as all agreed to abandon their Sunday evening services on that day and attend this service. The attendance was over 1,200. The combined choirs of all the Oranges led the singing. The Bishop presided and introduced Captain B. Frank Mountford, Secretary of the Church Army in the United States, who made a very powerful address. This address was published and a copy forwarded to each member.

On October 16, 1930, a dinner was held in the Archdeaconry of Morristown at Calvary Church Parish House, Summit. About 125 laymen were present and the address was made by the Hon. H. V. Osborne.

On Sunday evening, October 19th, a Mass Meeting was held at St. John's Church, Jersey City. The music was rendered by a choir of about 150 voices and the principal speaker was the Reverend Percy Silver, Rector of the Church of the Incarnation, New York City. The Church was filled completely, there being over 1,300 present, and an overflow meeting was held in the Parish House, which was also filled, and a large number of people were not able to gain admission.

Another Mass Meeting was held October 19th, at Christ Church, Hackensack, at which Archdeacon Elmendorf presided, assisted by a large number of Clergy of the Archdeaconry. The Bishop was present and the principal speaker was the Reverend Granville F. Williams, S. S. J. E., Rector of the Church of St. Mary the Virgin, New York City. The Church was completely filled, and it was estimated there were over 900 people present. The music was led by a large choir from the local parishes.

On October 26, the final Mass Meeting of the series was held at Trinity Church, Grantwood, at which the principal address was made by the Reverend Bernard Iddings Bell, D.D., warden of St. Stephen's College, Annandale, New York. The attendance was over 850, including a large choir of 120 voices. There was a large number of Clergy present.

It is estimated that the total attendance at these meetings was approximately 6,000 people, and that a great amount of enthusiasm and interest in the Church has been aroused.

On October 22, 1930, the Church Club held a reception for Bishop and Mrs. Stearly, commemorating the 15th anniversary of the Bishop's consecration to the Episcopate. This Reception was held at the Young Women's Christian Association Building in Newark, and was attended by over 600 people. Among the principal guests were Bishop Knight of the Diocese of New Jersey, Rabbi Solomon Foster, the Reverend William H. Foulkes, D.D., and Mayor Congleton, all of whom made addresses. Dr. Hamilton, Rector of St. Paul's, Paterson, was Chairman of the Speaker's Committee. The guests were received in the Reception Room by Bishop and Mrs. Stearly, and thereafter the committees and guests proceeded to the Hall in the same building where Mr. Hulsart, the President, turned over the gavel to Dr. Hamilton. After the speeches, which included an address by Bishop Stearly, refreshments were served.

The Church Club sent Mr. E. A. Chastaney as representative to the National Conference Clubs held in Boston October 16-18, 1930.

The Corporation, which is independent of the Dioceses, was created by "royal charter" March 29, 1769, in the Colonies of New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania. In 1806 a plan was adopted for a division into three separate bodies, the New Jersey branch being incorporated in this State December 3, 1807, under its present title. It does not pay pensions to the clergy, but it provides insurance for the widows and orphans of contributors. Last year it distributed in annuities and dividends \$5,435.00. The invested funds, May 1, 1930, amounted at market value to \$215,291.76.

Clergymen of the Protestant Episcopal Church, not over 55 years of age, who have for the past two years been canonically connected with, and actually resident in either of the Dioceses in the State of New Jersey, are eligible for membership as "Contributors." Removal from the State after five annual contributions of eight dollars, does not forfeit membership; in case of removal before five payments have been made, the amount paid will be returned. The "Members of the Corporation" are those elected to manage its affairs, the clerical members being chosen from the contributors. The laymen must be communicants of the Church and residents of New Jersey. The annual meeting is held on the first Monday in June. Applications for membership should be in the hands of the Secretary before that date. The Secretary will be glad to furnish further information and copies of application forms.

The return to the widows and orphans of contributors is so large for the small annual payment of Eight Dollars made during the life-time of the contributor that every clergyman in the Diocese who is eligible should avail himself of its benefits. The income of the Fund would appear to be ample to meet all demands.

Recommended for Ordination to the Priesthood, John Thurston Travis and Albert F. Chilson, and for Ordination to the Diaconate, Charles Abele and Charles H. Cadigan; for admission as Candidates for Holy Orders, John Chandler Moore, James Wilson, Nelson W. MacKie, Raymond P. Black, John R. Ramsey, Jr., and Beverley Tucker White.

Rev'd John E. Bailey, being nominated by the Bishop, was elected to fill the unexpired term of the late Robert J. Thomson, on the Board of Examining Chaplains.

Bishop Stearly reported various payments from the Jesse Williams' Fund. They were approved.

The name of Charles D. M. Cole was suggested to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Judge Alfred Elmer Mills, and the secretary requested to communicate with Mr. Cole.

May 30, 1930:

Concurred in the election of the Rt. Rev'd Sheldon Manson Griswold, D.D., to be Bishop of Chicago.

Consent given to the Ordination and Consecration of:

The Rev'd Henry Knox Sherrill, D.D., as Bishop of Massachusetts;

Of the Rev'd Henry Wise Hobson, as Bishop Coadjutor of Southern Ohio;

Of the Very Rev'd William Scarlett, LL.D., as Bishop Coadjutor of Missouri;

Of the Rev'd George Craig Stewart, D.D., L.H.D., as Bishop Coadjutor of Chicago; and

Of the Rev'd Robert Burton Gooden, D.D., as Bishop Suffragan of Los Angeles.

Consent given to the Diocese of Duluth to elect a Bishop Coadjutor because of the extent of work.

June 19, 1930:

The Standing Committee organized by the election of Dr. David S. Hamilton, chairman for the ensuing year, and Archdeacon Ladd as secretary.

Consent given to the Ordination and Consecration of the Rev'd Robert Nelson Spencer as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Western Missouri; and

Of the Rt. Rev'd James Craik Morris, D.D., Bishop of Panama Zone, as the Bishop of the Diocese of Louisiana.

Consent given the Board of Missions to mortgage two pieces of property; one piece in Towaco for \$4,000.00 for the building of a new chapel; and the other piece in Bogota for \$23,000.00 for the erection of a Church Building;

To the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of All Saints', Leonia, to sell their property on Broad Avenue for \$18,000.00, and to use the money to pay the debts of the Parish.

Informal approval given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Holy Innocents' Church, West Orange, to use part of their property as a Burial Ground.

Recommended John Henry Keene to the Bishop for Ordination to the Diaconate.

The Bishop's reports of the expenditure of \$5,344.80 from the Jesse Williams Fund and of \$700.00 from the Hannibal Goodwin Fund were approved.

September 22, 1930:

Consent given to the Board of Trustees of All Saints' Mission, in the Borough of Leonia, to transfer all records, papers and properties to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of All Saints' Church in the Borough of Leonia.

Consent given to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of All Saints', Leonia, to sell four certain lots of land on Broad Avenue for \$18,000.00 and to apply the same to the payment of some debts of the Parish. The property to be sold being a financial burden and not used by the Parish.

Recommended as Candidates for the Ministry, Grant Bunnell, Jr., and Robert Olton, and for Ordination to the Priesthood, as soon as the Bishop receives the proper testimonials, the Rev'd Charles H. Cadigan.

Consent given to the Ordination and Consecration of the Rev'd Charles Kendall Gilbert, D.D., to be Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of New York;

Of Rev'd Benjamin Tibbitts Kemerer to be Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Duluth; and

Of Rev'd Frederick Deane Goodwin, D.D., to be Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Virginia.

Consent given to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. George's Church, Maplewood, to mortgage their property at Ridgewood and Durand Roads for \$65,000.00 for ten years, to pay for a church—the second unit of a proposed group of three buildings.

The Standing Committee recommended that the Bishop suggest to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of the Church of the Holy Cross, Jersey City, that they should transfer the title to the property to the Board of Missions, to be administered by it until such time as the property can be liquidated.

November 3, 1930:

Consent given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Bartholomew's Church, Hoboken, to mortgage property on the Franklin Turnpike for \$16,000.00 for one year, in order to retire a mortgage of \$2,500.00 and to finance in part the erection of a Parish House.

Consent given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of the Church of the Epiphany, Orange, to mortgage their Rectory for \$4,000.00. The consent granted June 19, 1930, for a mortgage of \$3,000.00 was rescinded.

Consent given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Luke's Free Church in Phillipsburg to sell property on South Main Street for \$18,000.00, and to use the same in the erection of a new building on a new site.

Recommended Messrs. E. Marsden Chapman and Harper R. Dowell for admission as Candidates for Holy Orders.

The Bishop recommending, the Committee appropriated \$600.00 from the Hannibal Goodwin Fund to be used toward the stipend of the Registrar.

The Committee on the option on St. Stephens' Church, Newark, reported unfavorably. Mr. G. Wisner Thorne was added to the committee, which was authorized to act for the Standing Committee in the sale of St. Stephens' property.

Filled vacancy on the Standing Committee by the election of D. M. Cole, confirmed the Bishop's nomination of Rev'd John E. Bailey to fill the vacancy on the Board of Examining Chaplains.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION, 1930.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The Board of Religious Education has continued to meet regularly during the past year and has endeavored to hold before the Parishes of the Diocese a high ideal of Religious Education.

June 20, 21, and 22, the Board fostered and supervised a week-end conference for young people at the Girls' Friendly House and Eagle's Nest Farm Camp in Delaware. This conference was attended by eighty-two young men and women and resulted in much good. It seems to be but the forerunner of many more to come. At any rate plans are under way for one this coming June.

The Board has continued to support the work of the Correspondence Church School which is under the direction of Miss Mary Danforth Dodge, a member of the Board. The School continues to grow and we feel that it is meeting a great need among the isolated of the Diocese.

A Spring meeting for officers and teachers was held at the Laura Augusta Home in Madison and was well attended.

The Lenten and Advent Offerings of the Schools were fostered. Three Presentation Services were held for the Lenten Offering in various parts of the Diocese. The Lenten Offering amounted to \$22,915.47. The Advent Offering was for the Mission of the Advent, Bloomfield (Brookdale), and amounted to \$2,289.41.

The Board furnished Service Leaflets and Attendance Cards for use of the Schools during Lent.

The Church School Convention was held in Grace Church, Orange, on October 18th, and proved to be a well attended and helpful gathering of the teachers and officers of the Schools of the Diocese.

Christmas Boxes were again provided by many of the Schools.

Plans are under way to hold training courses for teachers next fall in different sections of the Diocese. The Board asks the co-operation of Rectors and Superintendents in their efforts to increase the efficiency of our teachers.

The Board would express its appreciation of the continued devoted service of the Field Secretary, the Rev'd A. S. Hogenauer.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SOCIAL SERVICE FOR THE YEAR 1930.

Seven meetings of the Board were held with an average attendance of eleven.

The Board spent considerable time and study on the work of preparing and adopting a definite program. The program finally adopted, and which has guided the work of the Board throughout the year, is as follows:

- A. "to stimulate the minds and hearts of Church people along the line of the Church's social obligations."
 1. Sermons and talks by the Executive Secretary throughout the Diocese.
 2. Talks by Board members when asked to come to parishes. The formation of a corps of such speakers from the Board membership.
 3. Continued and careful placement of the booklet "Institutions and Social Agencies" and other appropriate literature from the National Department of Social Service, our own Department and the secular social agencies.
 4. (a) The use of the Newark Churchman.
(b) The publication by the Department of a mimeographed news sheet occasionally with items of social significance that might be used in parish leaflets.
 5. Continuation of one or two sectional conferences or institutes.
 6. The Board to hold itself ready to co-operate in planning and publicity for any parochial social service project.
 7. The development and circulation of a Lending Library of books and periodicals that would be of value to the clergy and laity.
- B. "to co-operate in the maintenance and improvement of the diocesan institutions and agencies for social welfare."
 1. To have the Diocesan Institutions and social agencies represented on the Board.
 2. Studies to ascertain the degree to which the Institutions and social welfare organizations of the Diocese attain to accepted standards.
 3. Encourage the visiting of our institutions by groups from parishes and get special people in the parishes to be committees to various institutions.
 4. The Board of Social Service to hold one or more of its meetings at the Diocesan Institutions.
- C. "to initiate and promote undertakings having as their aim the betterment of social conditions."
 1. Work of friendship to the paroled.
 2. Work of institutional ministrations by volunteer chaplains.
 3. Formation of parochial social service committees.
 4. Project with the Diocese of New York and Long Island on the unemployment problem.
 5. To ascertain the welfare needs of the counties in the Diocese and then to present these specific needs to the people gathered at the conferences mentioned above in Article A, 5. This would be done a county at a time.

Of these projects the following accomplishments may be noted: Under the first division "A" all but the second and fourth have been carried out, and these two have been partially completed. The two sectional Conferences were on the subjects "Peace" and "Old Age Pension."

Of Section "B" all four projects have been carried out to some extent. In Section "C" the work of the volunteer Chaplains now covers about twenty public institutions, and work for the paroled has been done as the State Board has sent names of paroled persons to us.

The projects on the Unemployment situation consisted of the sending of a letter to all the Churches in the Diocese urging them to assist in relief work. This letter was printed in the New York Churchman. The Conference of Employers, held with the Dioceses of New York and Long Island, was very successful.

ANNUAL REPORT.

January 1, 1930—December 31, 1930.

With the close of the year 1930 Church Mission of Help in the Diocese of Newark completes twelve years of work, which show a growth from one to sixteen workers. The past year has been a critical one for the clients because of unemployment, and the staff members have in consequence had a much heavier load to carry than in normal times.

In February, 1930, Dr. Levy, as representing the State Department of Health, requested that C. M. H. should handle all Protestant Unmarried Mother cases of the age group which come within our jurisdiction throughout the seven Counties of the Diocese. This request was made because of the high regard for the work which Church Mission of Help is doing. At the same time the Conference of Jewish Charities asked C. M. H. to work with all Jewish Unmarried Mothers in the seven Counties outside of the city of Newark. Both of these requests have been granted and C. M. H. has lived up to its agreement in serving all these unfortunate girls and their children.

It is a source of great satisfaction that Miss Sprague has been able to raise the entire amount which she set as her goal for 1930.

C. M. H. is still a member of the Newark Welfare Federation and the Community Chest paid the full \$5,500.00 which it agreed to give, but even so the Newark office was run again at a considerable deficit. This deficit had to be met, as it has been before, by the General Fund.

During the year many Conferences were attended by Staff members.

C. M. H. is especially indebted to Mr. Reginald Parnell, who has acted as our attorney and whose help has been of inestimable value.

On January 10th the Annual Meeting was held at Trinity Parish House, Newark. On March 25th the Annual Day of Devotion took place at Grace Church, Newark. The Rev'd McVeigh Harrison, Order of the Holy Cross, was the Conductor. On May 13th the Annual Service was held in Trinity Cathedral, Newark. The Rev'd M. Bowyer Stewart, D.D., of the General Theological Seminary, was the preacher. The Eighth Annual Volunteers' Conference was held in St. Paul's Parish House, Newark, on November 2nd.

During the summer 246 days of outing were given by C. M. H. to girls and their children. 10 girls went to the C. M. H. McLean Farm in the Catskills. Through the kindness of the Ven. W. O. Leslie, Eagle's Nest Farm extended its hospitality to a C. M. H. girl and other vacation places were used.

At Christmas two parties were held—one for little Negro Children in St. Paul's Parish House, Newark, and the other for girls in St. Paul's Parish House, Paterson. Both of these parties were made possible by Volunteer Groups.

In the Northwestern District Miss Judson has been instrumental in bringing about a Presentment of the Grand Jury of Sussex County to the Board of Freeholders requesting a Family Case Worker for that County. She has also been asked to set up and start a County Social Service Exchange.

In May a Musicales was held in Calvary Parish House, Summit, and from the proceeds of this affair and through the generosity of the Rev'd Donald Brookman, D.D., of Morristown, Mrs. W. F. Russell of Millington and Miss Ida Rosenquest of Summit a new car was purchased for the Northwestern District.

In the Passaic County District Mrs. McGregor has continued her efforts in trying to bring about interest in legislation to establish a Wayward Minor Act for New Jersey's Statute Books. Tribute must be paid to Miss Ellen Barnes for her loyal and devoted service in the Paterson office for so many years.

The Bergen County District has at last realized its dream and become organized. In October the Organization meeting was held in Christ Church Parish House, Hackensack. Thanks to the Ven. Augustine Elmendorf C. M. H. now has an attractive office in that parish house. On September first Miss Geraldine Page resigned as Bergen County District Secretary after four years of loyal service to C. M. H. and Miss Helen K. James took her place. Miss James had been the Newark District Secretary before being given her new position in Bergen County.

In the Hudson County District the work has continued to grow and Mrs. Bovic has found that both Jersey City and Hoboken are most difficult centers in which to work, as so little effort is made by both cities to support or interest themselves in organized social work.

The Essex County District work suffered this past year because of the long illness of Miss Day, but the girls were cared for without interruption. Miss Day has established a valuable volunteer motor corps service for her county.

In the Newark District over 70% of the case load is colored and of this number at least 95% of the Negro girls are Unmarried Mothers. Unemployment is even more desperate among this group of girls and their families than in some other districts.

In September Mrs. Griffith came to C. M. H. as Newark District Secretary when Miss James took over the Bergen County work.

The Executive Secretary would like to express C. M. H.'s gratitude to this devoted staff, which with the backing of the Board of Managers and Volunteers, have made this year's accomplishments possible.

During 1930 C. M. H. helped 930 girls, which represents an increase of 266 over 1929. 373 children were aided. Of the total number of girls: 255 were Negroes; 20 were Roman Catholics; 2 were Jewesses and only 87 were Episcopalians; 464 were Unmarried Mothers; 124 were Wayward girls and 151 were Preventive cases. The Staff made 9,591 visits during the year.

The year 1930 has brought to a close the fourteenth year of the Bonnie Brae Farm work for boys at Millington, N. J. From a small family of two, Bonnie Brae has grown to a recognized state-wide institution where last year an average number of 75 boys were cared for, as well as 90 camp boys for the midsummer months.

Review of the Bonnie Brae work for 1930 is an encouraging one in spite of the many financial difficulties which beset the path as a result of the general economic depression. While there were many moments of apprehension during the year yet the year finally closed with the budget secured. The Bonnie Brae Board of Managers welcomes this opportunity to express gratitude to all those who so splendidly made this achievement possible.

The Board of Managers is equally pleased to report a successful year in relation to the Bonnie Brae work itself and to recount progress in the direction of both the education and general development of the boys.

Through the generosity of Mrs. Fredrik Fischer Meyer of South Orange, a new memorial school building was given to Bonnie Brae which was completed and occupied last September. Not only does the building provide for academic work but it also contains two large manual training rooms and a splendid gymnasium completely equipped. The gymnasium contains a stage and provides adequate space for dramatics; it is used, also, for assembly of the boys for entertainment of various kinds.

With increasing recognition of the need for constructive use of the leisure time of the Bonnie Brae boys, organized recreation was included in the daily program and a trained

recreation director was engaged. Not only have constructive games of all kinds been introduced and supervised, creating, thereby, an active and wholesome leisure, but as a result the boys have discovered that athletics and play have rules and standards of sportsmanship which form an integral part of the games themselves and that personal disputes, for example, must be submitted to the umpire and settled in accordance with accepted rules. They have learned that a victory is not desirable unless merited by honesty and fair play and so earnest have the athletic groups become over their new vision of sportsmanship that in football alone they played 22 games against other teams this past year, won 17, and were scored but once. They have become proud of their record and mean to sustain it.

In addition to athletics, group games, masquerades, dramatics, etc., are engaged in and a remarkable interest, also, has been developed in the Boy Scout work through the effort of Mr. Herbert M. Wilson, Jr., of St. Andrew's Church, South Orange, who has organized two Bonnie Brae troops consisting of 44 boys and has continued to supervise these activities at the Farm.

In addition to the academic study in the classrooms and the organized recreation, still another development marks an advantage provided for the Bonnie Brae boys this past year. Manual training, woodworking, mechanics, etc., are now a part of the school curriculum which aim to test the boys' abilities and to establish them in the rudiments, at least, of a practical trade.

Perhaps the most important development of the year has been the careful analysis and study of each individual boy under the direction of a psychiatrist who has been able to classify his mental level and ability and to formulate a plan of procedure designed for his best development. To make the psychiatrist's work of practical import, weekly classification meetings have been established, conducted by the Superintendent and aided by the Social Service Case Worker and other members of the Bonnie Brae staff. The specific purpose of these meetings is to periodically sum up each boy's progress and to determine how each recommended change in the boy's routine has reacted to his advantage or otherwise, and to correct any difficulties from which the boy may be suffering. Among other good results from this and other efforts to help the boy individually, interest has been stimulated or revived among the relatives or guardians of these boys and the fact stressed that home-ties must be preserved where possible for the children's own good.

Admissions to Bonnie Brae are made only after careful investigation of the case of each applicant. The Case Worker's report is submitted to the Admissions Committee and a study of the boy's needs from every angle is made. If Bonnie Brae can particularly meet these needs, the boy is admitted to the Farm after passing through the Edwin Gould Clearing Bureau for a period of quarantine.

The Bonnie Brae Case Committee includes, besides Judge Osborne, President of Bonnie Brae Farm, and other members of the Board, Miss Jessie Condit, Executive Secretary of the Children's Aid Society; Miss Gertrude Scott, Chief of Social Service of the Essex County Juvenile Clinic; Miss Odessa Gibson, Supervisor of the Family Case Work of the Social Service Bureau; and Mrs. Edythe J. Michell, Case Worker.

THE BONNIE BRAE CAMP.

Since 1928 Bonnie Brae has set aside a particular piece of the Bonnie Brae property for Camp purposes and here last year 90 additional boys were received for the months of July and August, 30 boys in periods of three weeks each. These boys are accepted on the basis of their need for care during the summer months. With four experienced camp councillors in charge and captains for each tent excellent supervision was provided. A splendid program of games, nature study, campfire songs, swimming, hiking, etc., made the boys very happy, and good food, with special attention to those physically undernourished, brought a splendid result.

REPORT OF THE EAGLE'S NEST FARM COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR 1930.

The attendance at Eagle's Nest Farm during the camping season of 1930 was the best in the history of the camp. This was particularly encouraging, in view of the general economic depression existing throughout the country.

Two extremely important additions were made to the equipment last year through the erection of a very fine nature building, the gift of Mr. and Mrs. David Oakes of Bloomfield, and an extremely useful addition to the infirmary, the gift of Grace Church, Madison, the donor of the original infirmary. Plans for the year 1931 contemplate the erection of a recreation building for the members of the staff, as well as an addition to the office building and possibly to the infirmary.

An extremely worth while Camp Reunion was held in Christmas week. Through the courtesy of the Rector, this gathering was again held at Christ Church, Bloomfield and Glen Ridge, with a total attendance of about 150. These annual reunions have become a fixed part of the program of Eagle's Nest Farm.

Another piece of advance work in connection with the farm for 1931 will be the planting of approximately 6,000 evergreen seedlings. This will be the third planting made within the last few years and will bring the total number of seedlings up to about 15,000. These seedlings are obtained at very low cost through the co-operation of the State Department of Conservation.

An examination of the financial statement covering the actual camp operations shows that with the weekly fee placed at \$11.00, the total amount received in fees for the summer amounted to \$12,594.25, with total receipts from all sources reaching the sum total of \$15,318.53. Under disbursements, the largest item covered the commissary department, with the total expenditure of \$6,609.70. The total of all other disbursements brought the sum total of expenditures up to \$15,239.16.

In going over the statistics of the camp, we find that during the two summer months when the camp was in operation, the commissary department served a total of 30,512 meals. This means the daily average of staff and campers is between 150 and 175 people. When we remember that the camp was first organized in 1923 and that during this first year there were only about 55 campers during the whole summer, one may easily see what a tremendous growth the camp has had during the comparatively few years of its history.

The Committee desires to express its appreciation of the fine work which has been given to the camp by Mr. James R. Strong, who served as Chairman of the Camp Committee from the inception of the camp up to 1930. A great deal of our success in securing our fine group of buildings is due to the leadership and hard work of Mr. Strong.

There are still different things which are necessary for the efficient operation of Eagle's Nest Farm. We hope that many people who read this report will desire to learn more about these needs, as well as the camp in general and will communicate with the Camp Director.

REPORT, COMMISSION ON CHURCH ARCHITECTURE.

The past year has seen a number of new buildings either completed or in course of construction in the parishes and missions of the Diocese.

The new Church of St. Martin's at Maywood was completed and dedicated in September. This building will have a seating capacity of one hundred and sixty.

Attention should be directed to several new rectories that have been erected. For the Church of The Redeemer, Morristown, a fine home of stone construction has been added to the equipment of that important Parish. While the cost of this Rectory has been high the house has been well planned and is worthy both of the Parish and the Diocese.

For Grace Church, Madison, a Rectory has been built costing thirty-five thousand dollars. The problem here was to secure a type of architecture that would harmonize with the stone of the Old Church. Both of these buildings are well worth a visit for committees that are planning rectories of the more costly type.

REPORT OF BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The Board of Missions and Church Extension has held 9 monthly meetings during the calendar year 1930. In addition the activities of the Board have continued between meetings. Committees have been busy in many ways on appointments by the Bishop or the Board. They have been assigned to searching out and surveying for Church sites and negotiating the purchase of the same; sitting in conference for counsel and advice to many Missions and assisted Parishes; supervising the repairing or construction of Churches and other buildings under our control. Record must be made here of the willing service rendered by the members of this Board, holding themselves ready to respond to calls by the Bishop to any point in the Diocese.

The Board advises in the administration of the Bishop's Church Extension Fund.

This Fund has made possible several notable outstanding pieces of work which might well be pointed out. It has helped us to acquire within the past year some fine Church

sites for several organized Missions. Another piece of land with a good building thereon suitable for social purposes has been bought and also three fine church buildings have been erected.

Space cannot be taken here to recount the details of subjects considered at each monthly meeting. A summary of some of the important actions may, however, be recited.

Meeting, January 21st. It was ordered that two tracts of land aggregating an area of about two acres be purchased for All Saints', Millington, at a cost of \$3,150. This purchase price was loaned by us from the Loaning Fund to the Mission in order that the land might be acquired.

Action was also taken approving the officers in contracting to purchase an attractive piece of land in the Civic Centre of Verona for the Church of the Holy Spirit, for the sum of \$10,000. The purchase being financed in part by a "Call" for \$1,000, and also using the F. B. Carter Memorial Fund of \$2,000 to this new Church site.

Meeting, February 19th. Consideration was given to the Plans and Estimates for a new church building for the Mission of the Transfiguration at Towaco. They were accepted and referred to a Committee with full power to proceed with the construction work.

Meeting, April 2nd. Report was made that rapid progress was being made in the construction of the new Church building for St. Martin's Church at Maywood.

Meeting, May 8th. The Committee appointed to consider Compensation Insurance made report that it had been able to secure very favorable rates for Blanket Insurance to cover all of our Mission Stations. Such a policy was ordered and is now in force.

Meeting, June 18th. The following officers for the ensuing year were elected:

Approval was given to make and enter into a contract for the erection of a Church building for Ascension Church at Bogota in the sum of \$31,000.

Meeting, September 17th. Announcement was made that the building for the Church of the Transfiguration at Towaco was about complete and that the formal opening day would be on October 11th, 1930.

Meeting, October 15th. On this day the Board members met in the Diocesan House at 9:30 A. M. and from there started on a journey to visit the following Mission Stations:

Livingston, Morris Plains, Stanhope, Hackettstown, Hope, Belvidere, Phillipsburg, Washington, Mendham, Millington and Chatham, arriving at the latter place at about 6:30 P. M. The meeting of the Board was held in the Parish House of St. Paul's at Chatham, being called to order at about 7:45 o'clock P. M. for the transaction of our usual business. After the adjournment we were the guests of the Men's Club of this active mission.

The subject of liability insurance and uniformity of Fire Insurance forms brought out considerable discussion of interest. A Committee was thereupon appointed for study and report.

St. Luke's Church, Paterson, was granted a loan of \$3,000 to assist in its new church building program.

Meeting, November 19th. Report was made that St. Mark's Church at Mendham had opportunity to purchase at a fair price an admirable piece of land adjacent to the Church property on the east and upon which was a good substantial building suitable for social purposes. Hearty encouragement was given to acquire this piece of property.

The Committee on Insurance made its report. The Board thereupon passed the following: That all Fire Insurance be placed in sound Stock Companies; that all policies or certificates of the same covering property to which this Board holds title be on file in the

office of the Board; that standard forms as adopted by the Board be attached to all such policies; that all policies be issued without any Co-Insurance clauses.

A proposal was submitted by the Travelers' Insurance Company to issue a Blanket Liability policy covering all of our Mission Stations at a reduced rate of premium. The Committee was ordered to effect such insurance.

Meeting, December 17th. Report was made that through the generosity of Mrs. Eugene Coleman Savidge a stone church school building had been erected for the Church of the Holy Communion at Norwood.

Approval was given to the adoption of a Diocesan Missionary Budget for the year 1931 in the sum of \$34,551.00.

REPORT OF THE TREASURER OF THE BISHOP'S CHURCH EXTENSION FUND.

The Bishop's Church Extension Fund, which is used for the purpose of assisting Missions to purchase land, erect Parish Houses, Chapels, Rectories and other demands of a like nature, has reached its twenty-first year of usefulness in the Diocese.

The first call upon its members was made on June 15, 1910, and since that time 108 calls have been made, totalling \$112,000. There is now loaned to various missions to assist them in acquiring land and buildings \$50,000, a small rate of interest is charged upon the same until final repayment has been made.

The accounts for the year ended December 31, 1930, have been audited by Messrs. E. A. S. Brown and A. Pope and show that during the year the income amounted to \$19,337.95. Disbursements direct to Missions amounted to \$5,773.15 and loans to Missions \$19,080.38. Expenses for printing, postage, etc., were \$250.65.

Three years ago subscriptions were asked for the Bishop Lines Memorial Endowment Fund, at which time it was stated a portion of the income of this Fund would be devoted to Extension of Diocesan Missions. During the year 1930 one-half of the income of this Fund was \$6,736.75. This income will gradually increase as subscriptions to the Fund are paid and invested.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FIELD DEPARTMENT.

1930.

The Field Department of the Diocese respectfully reports to the Convention that it met four times in the course of the year in the months of January, April, June and September. The Department was organized with Mr. Walter Kidde, Chairman; Mr. Charles B. Johnes, Director, and Rev'd Donald MacAdie, Executive Secretary, and had a membership of 45 men.

ACTIVITIES.

The activities of the Department were briefly as follows:

Assignment of Parishes: Each member of the Department was assigned from one to four parishes in which he was to assist with the Church Loyalty Festival as requested.

Laymen's Conference: The Annual Laymen's Conference was held at the Girls' Friendly Society Holiday House, Delaware, N. J., on September 6th and 7th. The conference was attended by 63 men representing 32 Parishes and Missions. Conferences were led by Bishop Stearly on "The Religious Outlook"; by Mr. Johnes on "The Layman's Opportunity for Service in a Material Way"; by Mr. Leon Palmer, General Secretary of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew in the United States, on "The Layman's Opportunity for Service in a Spiritual Way," and by the Rev'd R. W. Andrews, Missionary from Tochigi, Japan. The Rev'd Donald MacAdie led the discussion on topics suggested by the Question Box. Holy Communion was celebrated at St. James' Church, Delaware, on Sunday morning by Bishop Stearly, who also led the Devotions of the Conference.

Clergy Conference: The Annual Clergy Conference was held at the Girls' Friendly Society Holiday House, Delaware, N. J., on September 8th, 9th and 10th. Sixty-five Clergy representing eighty Parishes and Missions were present. The faculty consisted of the Rev'd Lyford P. Edwards, Ph.D., of St. Stephen's College, Annandale, N. Y., whose course was on "The Church and Social Problems"; the Rev'd J. Newton Davies, S.T.D., of Drew University, Madison, N. J., who gave a course on "The Art of Expository Preaching"; and the Rev'd R. W. Andrews, Missionary from Tochigi, Japan. Bishop Stearly led the Devotions and Mr. Charles B. Johnes presented the plans of the Church Loyalty Festival.

The Church Loyalty Festival: The Field Department in 1930 recommended a change from the customary form of the Every Member Canvass. It involved the setting aside of the period from October 26th to November 16th, and was known as the Church Loyalty Festival. The plan consisted of four Loyalty Sundays known as (1) Loyalty Sunday, (2) Community Sunday, (3) Symposium Sunday, (4) Presentation Sunday; a Friendly Visitation during the week of October 26th, the object not being money; a Loyalty Dinner for the entire parish, and Canvassers Supper. The Festival culminated on November 16th with Presentation Sunday when pledges were received and dedicated at the Altar. From reports received from some of the parishes the new idea was a welcome change.

Church Loyalty Festival Conference: As part of the Diocesan Plan of Preparation a Conference was held in the afternoon and evening of Saturday, October 4th, at St. Luke's Church, Montclair. Dinner was served by the ladies of St. Luke's, Montclair. Fifty-four Clergy and one hundred and nine Laymen were present representing eighty-four parishes and missions. In the afternoon the entire plan for the Church Loyalty Festival was presented in detail by Mr. Johnes and Bishop Stearly and Mr. MacAdie; and after dinner the Rev'd Joseph R. Lynes and Mr. Dean Emery made addresses.

Literature: The literature used in connection with the Church Loyalty Festival was as follows: 24,220 copies of the "Church Loyalty Festival Folder" which gave the plans in detail; 26,185 copies of the leaflet "The Diocesan Budget"; 15,438 "Bishop's Letters", a personal letter to Communicants; 28,000 copies "Our New Day" and 11,175 copies of "Gleams", both National Council leaflets; and 40,995 Pledge Cards; making a total of

146,013 pieces of literature requisitioned by the parishes. In addition to this numerous form letters were sent to Clergy and Parish Chairmen, and a number of parishes used the playlet recommended by the Department called "The Budget Come to Life".

Parish Chairmen: 128 Parish Chairmen were appointed in the Parishes and Missions for the purpose of connecting the Church Loyalty Festival.

To the Fifty-seventh Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The Registrar begs leave to report that during the year twenty-threes Journals have been received from the other Dioceses and are on file in the Diocesan House.
