CANON 1, § II.

OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

From a Parish.

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election, in the following form:

[Name of the Church, the Place, and Date.]

This certifies that at a meeting of the congregation of this Church, held for the purpose of electing Church Officers, and Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention (or for the purpose of electing Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, if the meeting be for that object alone), A. B., C. D., and E. F., being communicants of the Church in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Deputies; and B. C., D. E., and F. G., also being communicants in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Alternate Deputies to represent the Parish in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand (or if two Wordens subscribed, we have set our hands), the day and year above written.

N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary sign, then the signatures of both Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-incharge, or Missionary, may not sign.

From a Mission.

N. B.—Use the same form and substitute the word "Mission" for "Parish" in three places. The Minister-in-charge; or, the Clerk; or, the Warden may sign.

Memoranda:

Not more than three Deputies are allowed from each Parish, and Mission.

Three Alternate Deputies must be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies.

Write Christian names in FULL and LEGIBLY.

Blank forms will be sent by the Secretary of the Convention on or before Easter Monday in each year.

Return Certificates of Election at least one Month before Convention.

Deputies must be Communicants of the Church, and also qualified voters in the Parish or Mission which elects them. (See Canon 6, § II, [4], [5] and [6].)

Rules of Order

THE CONVENTION.

- 1. The Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- The Convention shall meet on the opening day at 9:30 a. m.; with a recess of one hour between 1 and 2 o'clock.
- At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
- 4. At the close of each Convention, the Minutes shall be corrected and approved.
- The doors of the Convention shall be open for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
- All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convention shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall record their attendance.
- Clergymen of other Dioceses, and Candidates for Holy Orders, who may be present, shall be admitted to honorary seats in the Convention on the presentation of their names to the Secretary.
- 8. When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
- When any member is about to apeak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
- No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply), in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
- 11. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgresses the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
- 12. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate, but any member may appeal from the decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention. The general procedure of the Convention shall be governed, unless otherwise provided for, by the rules of parliamentary practice as set forth in "Roberts' Rules of Order."
- 13. A Committee consisting of the Bishop, ex-officio, five other clergymen and five laymen, to be known as the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, shall be appointed at each Convention to prepare the official Ballots and the Calendar of Business, for the next Annual Convention.

The mode of conducting the nominations and elections of all Committees, Commissions and Boards and all other elective officers not otherwise provided for, shall be as follows:

Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations must place in the hands of the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, in writing, on or before noon of the Tuesday in the week preceding the opening day of the meeting thereof, nominations signed by himself for any or all officers mentioned in the above paragraph. Each nominator must certify to the Elections and Rules of Order Committee that the persons nominated by him have consented to the nomination. All names so

sent in shall be reported to the Convention by the Committee, at the beginning of the opening session, in the form of a ballot, on which the names shall be arranged alphabetically in each class. After each list of nominations as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks may be filled by any voter. The voter shall mark with an X at the right of the name of each person for whom he votes. On the first ballot these ballots only shall be used, and also in all subsequent ballots, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. No ballot shall be counted in its class, on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled, and the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast.

The Secretary of the Convention shall call for nominations in his usual notice of the date and place of the Annual Convention, and shall, in the same notice, advertise the person or persons designated by said Committee, to whom such nominations shall be sent, with mailing addresses.

The members of the Convention shall also be requested, in said call, to send to this Committee any canonical amendments or other important items of business that they may purpose to introduce at the next Convention, so that such matters may be assigned a place on the Calendar of Business. This call shall also be annually inserted in the April number of the official Magazine of the Diocese, The Neware Churchman.

Balloting shall take place in a separate room when practicable.

The clerical and lay voting lists shall be divided into two sections each.

- 14. Four or more Election Tellers, clerical and lay, in equal numbers, not necessarily members of the Convention, shall be appointed by the President before an election. They shall receive and canvass all votes cast at any election which is required to be by ballot, and when such canvass is completed, shall immediately report its result to the Convention. The polls shall be open for such time as the Convention may, by resolution, direct.
- 15. All reports (usually printed in the JOURNAL), of officers, committees, commissions, and boards of trustees under control of the Convention, shall be printed and distributed by the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order as far as practicable, at least two weeks before the meeting of the Convention; provided that the subject of such printing and reports shall have been referred to the Finance and Advisory Board for consideration, which Board shall have power to supervise, regulate, or to condense the same, and to issue to the Committee or to the Secretary of the Convention such instructions as in the judgment of the said Board will promote greater economy and efficiency in respect to this work.

Reports when read in Convention shall be read by title only, unless the reading be for the better transaction of business.

NEW BUSINESS.

16. All new business introduced, except such as may accompany and form a part of a report of a committee, shall be in the form of a motion or resolution and shall be in writing.

COMMITTEES.

- 17. All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered. It shall be the duty of the Secretary promptly to notify the members of all special committees of their appointment.
- 18. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.

MOTIONS AND THEIR ORDER.

- No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
- 20. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it; or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
- 21. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.

VOTING PRIVILEGES.

- 22. All questions shall be decided vivo voce, unless otherwise specially ordered.
- 23. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote of the Convention shall be taken by Orders, voting separately; and, when a vota is thus taken a concurrent majority in both Orders shall be necessary to carry any measure.

 - (e) The vote shall be by ballot, the Clergy voting individually, the Lay Deputies by Parishes. The Clerical and Lay orders shall vote separately until some fit and qualified Presbyter shall receive a majority, in each order, of those present

and voting; a blank ballot shall be considered a vote. And the Presbyter receiving such a concurrent majority in both orders shall be declared duly elected; provided, that if there should not be present two-thirds of the Clergy entitled to vote, and Deputies from two-thirds of the congregations entitled to representation, then a concurrent majority of two-thirds of those present and voting in each order shall be necessary to determine a choice.

- (f) Ballots may be east for a Presbyter of the Church who has not been placed in nomination.
- (g) After the result of a ballot has been announced (there being no election) and before another ballot is ordered by the Chair, additional nominations may be made.
- (h) When the tellers shall report an election then the President shall officially declare the name of the Bishop Coadjutor-elect and give direction for the signing by the Clerical and Lay Deputies of the Canonical Testimonial of the Bishop Coadjutor-elect.
- (i) A Motion shall then be made that the President appoint a Committee of Clergymen and Laymen to notify the Bishop Coadjutor-elect of his election.

The Fifty-eighth Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark was held in Grace Church, Orange, New Jersey, on Tuesday, May 10th, 1932. The Convention was opened with the Celebration of the Holy Communion at nine o'clock, the Bishop of the Diocese, the Rt. Rev'd Wilson R. Stearly, D.D., being the celebrant, assisted by the Rev'd Charles T. Walkley, D.D., who read the Epistle and the Ven. W. O. Leslie, Jr., who read the Gospel, and the Bidding Prayer. A choir of Clergy rendered the music of the service. The offering at the service was designated for the deficit,

The Convention was called to order at 10:15 o'clock by the President, the Bishop, who presided at all sessions of the Convention.

The Secretary having found a constitutional quorum in both orders present the Fifty-eighth Annual Convention was declared in order.

Archdeacon Henry M. Ladd, Secretary of the Standing Committee, read the following report of the Standing Committee on the matter of the election of a Bishop Coadjutor:

Report of the Secretary of the Standing Committee to the Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark, May 10, 1932:

At a Special Meeting of the Standing Committee, held on Monday, November 30, 1931, in the Diocesan House, 99 Main Street, Orange, a majority of the members being present, Bishop Stearly, having asked for a Bishop Coadjutor on account of the extent of Diocesan work, the following Resolution was immediately and unanimously adopted:

Be it Resolved, That this Committee give authorization for the sending out of a letter to the Blahops and the Standing Committees of the Church, asking consent to the Election of a Bishop Coadjutor on account of the extent of Diocesan work, said letter to be signed by the Bishop and the Secretary of the Standing Committee.

On December 22, 1931, a letter to the Bishops and one to the Standing Committees, asking for consent to the Election of a Bishop Coadjutor on account of the extent of Diocesan work were signed by the Bishop of the Diocese and the Secretary of the Standing Committee and mailed to 105 Bishops and to 72 Standing Committees.

On December 28, 1931, the consent of a majority of the Bishops (53) was received; and on January 21, 1932, the consent of a majority of the Standing Committees (37) was received.

March 15, 1932—Number of Bishops giving consent, 102. Number of Standing Committees giving consent, 52.

Col. Allan B. Wallace reported that the Finance and Advisory Board have given consideration to the question of increasing the amount of salary suggested for the Bishop Coadjutor.

Rev'd Joseph R. Lynes asked for information in regard to the present status of the Endowment Fund for the support of the Episcopate.

The Chairman, the Bishop, answered the request by giving the amounts in the funds for use in the support of the Episcopate.

Col. Allan B. Wallace offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the matter of stipend of the Bishop Coadjutor be referred to the Finance and Advisory Board with power.

Seconded by Rev'd H. G. Willis.

Col. L. K. Lydecker offered the following amendment:

Resolved, That the stipend be fixed at \$6,000, with power to the Finance and Advisory Board to increase the amount if found possible.

Amendment seconded, and accepted by Col. Wallace.

The Amendment was adopted.

Notice of the dinner arrangements under the auspices of the Church Club was read by the Secretary.

The following nominations for Bishop Coadjutor were presented:

The Rev'd L. A. C. Pitcaithly nominated the Rev'd Benjamin M. Washburn, D.D., Rector of Emmanuel Church, Boston, Mass. Seconded by the Rev'd Charles L. Gomph.

The Rev'd Allen Greene nominated the Rev'd Theodore R. Ludlow, D.D., Rector of the Church of the Holy Communion, South Orange, N. J. Seconded by the Rev'd Malcolm A. Shipley.

The Rev'd David S. Hamilton, D.D., nominated the Rev'd William Appleton Lawrence, D.D., Rector of Grace Church, Providence, R. I. Seconded by the Rev'd Luke M. White, D.D.

Mr. Walter Kidde of Montclair requested consent of the Convention to read a letter addressed to him from the Rev'd William Appleton Lawrence. Consent granted.

It was moved and carried that the nominations be closed, and the Convention proceed to the taking of a ballot.

The Bishop read noon-day prayers, and prayer for guidance of the Holy Spirit in the election.

The polls were ordered closed at 12:40 o'clock.

The Treasurer of the Convention presented his reports. (Vide, opposite.)

It was moved and carried that the Treasurer's reports be received and made part of the Convention Journal,

The Treasurer presented the following report of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties, and title papers held by same.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE EPISCOPAL FUND AND DIOCESAN PROPERTIES, DECEMBER 31, 1931.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

At the close of the year 1931 the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties held invested Diocesan and Trust Funds amounting to \$1,644,463.61 and Equity in Real Estate, less note payable of \$100,000—\$143,000, the note being given to help finance the purchase of the Cathedral site in Cedar Grove.

Notwithstanding the unfavorable conditions prevailing in business and financial circles

during the past year, only one mortgage was in default to such an extent as to make foreclosure necessary, and none of the investments in bonds or stocks were in default, with the exception of \$200 of Building Corporation bonds, which were received as part of an Endowment Fund turned over to the Trustees to hold.

The details of the financial work of the Trustees and the condition of the Funds under their care, are in the reports of the Treasurer and of the Auditors.

The Bishop urged that all permanent funds held by parishes, etc., be placed in a proper Trust Company, or in the hands of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties.

It was moved and carried that the above reports be received.

The Hon. Charles W. Parker presented the following report:

To the Members of the Convention:

Your committee on Constitution and Canons, to which was recommitted at the last regular Convention the matter of recommending suitable changes in Canon 3 relating to elections, respectfully reports that it has given such further consideration to the question and respectfully repeats the recommendation made in its original report which will be found printed on page 39 of the Journal of 1931.

The matter was recommitted without any expression of views on the part of the Convention and without any suggestion of the lines on which modification of the canon was desired. As a result of such further consideration, your Committee are unanimously confirmed in the view that the best practical solution of the difficulty is, the recommendation rejected by the Convention in 1931. An examination of national and state constitutions and statutes shows that with the exception of he election of a President of the United States, the plurality rule is almost universally in force. In New Jersey every officer elected by popular vote from the Governor down is elected by a plurality vote. The State Treasurer and State Comptroller, by Article 7, Section II, paragraph 3, of the Constitution of New Jersey, are "appointed by the Sanate and General Assembly in joint meeting", but it is not clear whether a majority of the joint meeting is necessary. The election of a President of the United States requires a majority vote of the presidential electors; if there is no majority, the election is thrown into the House of Representatives which votes by states, each state having one vote and a majority of all the states being necessary.

With regard to the Vice-President, if there is no majority in the electoral college, the twelfth amendment to the national Constitution provides that the Senate shall choose the Vice-President from the candidates having the two highest numbers on the list.

With respect to United States Senators and members of the House of Representatives, the Senators, by the seventeenth amendment, are to be elected by the people as the legislature may direct. They, therefore, seem to come under our general state law as well as members of the House of Representatives.

The Governor is to be elected by a plurality of votes. State Constitution, Art. V, paragraph 2.

As to all other elective offices, the act of 1797, referring to elections, contains this language: "and shall thereby ascertain, who are duly elected, by plurality of votes, to the several offices for which an election shall have taken place." This remained in force until 1847 when the language of the statute was changed, but not its purport, to read as follows: "That at every such election the persons or persons, to the number to be elected therein, who shall by law be qualified for the office or offices to be filled at such election, and for whom the greatest number of votes shall have been given therein for such office or offices, shall be deemed and taken to be elected to such office or offices; " " ".". There is a provision that in case of a tie the office shall be taken to be vacant.

The foregoing language is in force at the present day, P. L. 1930, p. 675, and, as has been noted, applies to the election of United States Senators and Representatives to Congress.

The fact that the plurality rule has been in force in New Jersey for over a century and a quarter seems to indicate that it is a practical working rule with regard to popular elections. It may be claimed that an election by a Diocesan Convention is not a popular election, but, like the former election of United States Senators by the State legislators, is an election by a legislative body and for that reason should require a majority vote.

If the point be theoretically sound, we think it is incapable of practicable application, because the ordinary legislative body is continuous during its term of office, whereas the Convention meets for a single day, or possibly two days, and during that time has to finish its business, read and approve its own minutes, and adjourn for the year unless recalled.

In Vol. 20 of Corpus Juris, page 205, the text states that in the absence of a statute requiring more, a plurality of votes is sufficient to elect: and in the footnote, citing McCray on Elections, "the reason for the rule is that where, as in the United States, the candidates may be numerous and the votes distributed among many candidates, to require a majority to elect would frequently be to prevent a choice."

Your Committee therefore repeats the recommendation contained in its former report and respectfully requests to be relieved from further consideration of the subject.

The President called on the Rev'd David N. Kirkby to read the report of the Committee on Rules of Order and Calendar of Business as follows:

RULES OF ORDER AND SPECIAL CALENDAR OF BUSINESS FOR THE SESSION OF THE SPECIAL CONVENTION OF MARCH 15, 1932.

Rules of Order.

The Rules of Order as adopted by the Convention of May 12, 1931, shall be in force so far as applicable to the business of this session.

Calendar of Business.

- 1. Announcement as to presence of quorum in both Orders.
- 2. Report of the Committee on Rules of Order and Calendar of Business.
- 3. The appointment by the Chair of a Committee on Certificates of Lay Delegates.
- The appointment by the Convention of a Committee on Rights of Clerical Members (Canon 1, Section 1, Paragraph 2).
- The appointment by the Convention of a Committee on Rights of Lay Deputies (Canon 1, Section 2, Paragraph 3).
- 6. Reading by the Secretary of the call for this special session of the Convention.
- 7. The Bishop's Communication.
- 8. Statement by the Standing Committee.
- Consideration by the Convention of the Bishop's request for the election of a Bishop Coadjutor.
- 10. Fixing of and provision for the salary of the Bishop Coadjutor.
- 11. Nominations. Nominations for the office of Bishop Coadjutor shall be made without discussion any further than will suffice to designate a Presbyter of the Church, the fields and character of his labors, his worthiness of character and his fitness for the office in this Diocese. Nomination speeches shall not exceed five minutes.
- 12. The election shall be conducted as follows:
 - (a) The vote shall be by ballot.
 - (b) The President shall appoint a sufficient number of Clerical and Lay Tellers to receive and count the votes of the Clergy and the votes of the Laity.
 - (c) The Secretary shall give directions to the Deputies as to voting places.
 - (d) In the event of a majority of the Deputies present from a parish or mission failing to agree upon a candidate, such parish or mission shall then cast a blank ballot. A blank ballot shall be considered a vote.
 - (e) The vote shall be by ballot, the Clergy voting individually, the Lay Deputies by Parishes. The Clerical and Lay orders shall vote separately until some fit and qualified Presbyter shall receive a majority, in each order, of those present and voting; a blank ballot shall be considered a vote. And the Presbyter receiving such a concurrent majority in both orders shall be declared duly elected; provided, that if there should not be present two-thirds of the Clergy entitled to vote, and Deputies from two-thirds of the congregations entitled to representation, then a concurrent majority of two-thirds of those present and voting in each order shall be necessary to determine a choice.
 - (f) Ballots may be cast for a Presbyter of the Church who has not been placed in nomination,
 - (g) After the result of a ballot has been announced (there being no election) and before another ballot is ordered by the Chair, additional nominations may be made.
 - (h) When the tellers shall report an election then the President shall officially declare the name of the Bishop Coadjutor-elect and give direction for the signing by the Clerical and Lay Deputies of the Canonical Testimonial of the Bishop Coadjutor-elect.
 - (i) A Motion shall then be made that the President appoint a Committee of Clergymen and Laymen to notify the Bishop Coadjutor-elect of his election.

- 13. All expenses of this session shall be referred, on motion, to the Finance and Advisory Board of the Diocese for consideration and with power to make suitable provision.
- 14. The Convention shall close with prayer.

It was moved and seconded that the report of the Committee on Rules of Order and Special Calendar of Business be adopted as presented.

Discussion followed on the Committee's report. Archdeacon Elmendorf objected to there being no provision in the Calendar of Business for remarks or rebuttals on nominations. The Chair ruled that opportunity would be offered under the rule of Committee of the Whole for any discussion in this regard.

The question on the motion being called, the motion to adopt the Rules of Order and Calendar of Business was carried.

The Chair appointed the following Committee on Certificates of Lay Deputies: Rev'd James T. Lodge, Mr. E. H. Bostock of Nutley, Mr. I. B. Whiting of Passaic.

On motion made, seconded and carried the following Committee on Rights of Clerical Members was appointed: Rev'd C. E. Hutchison, Rev'd George P. Armstrong, Mr. John Fletcher of Paterson.

On motion made, second and carried the following Committee on Rights of Lay Deputies was appointed: Rev'd Donald MacAdie, Mr. Coit Ladd of Rutherford, Mr. Philetus H. Holt of Summit.

The Secretary was ordered to read the Call for this Special session of the Convention. (Vide, foregoing.)

The Bishop's Communication was read by the Bishop of the Diocese, the Right Rev'd Wilson R. Stearly, D.D., as follows:

Dear Brothers in Christ:

I have ventured, with the concurrence of the Standing Committee, to call you together in this Special Convention to consider the provision of Episcopal assistance in the work of the Diocese, by the election of a Bishop Coadjutor. Since the decease of Bishop Lines, four years ago, I have attempted to administer the general affairs of the Diocese by myself, with the help of the Bishop of Easton, who most generously during these years has given us his time and strength for Confirmations in a number of Parishes and Missions. Before that, for twelve years, I worked by the side of the Diocesan, caring for the concerns especially committed to me, and following up the common tasks which arose in increasing volume. In that time both Bishop Lines and I had much to do; and I found the judgment more than confirmed that there was need, for the proper prosecution of its work, of more than one Bishop in this Diocese. That feeling has grown during these last years. Although I have had the able and loyal assistance of my colleagues in the Diocesan House, and the kindliest consideration and cooperation on the part of the Clergy and Laity throughout the Diocese, I have been burdened with the remembrance of tasks uncompleted, responsibilities only partially met, and opportunities ungrasped. Everyone who considers it but for a little must be aware of the greatness of the work already in process, and conscious of the multiplicity and insistence of calls for service which arise on all sides. It is to face this demanding situation, and in a better degree to measure up to its challengings, that it seems to me we should have another helper and leader in the great work.

I make request for the election of a Bishop Coadjutor, rather than a Suffragan,

because I think the former office provides a larger and more fruitful field of activity, and calls out more fully the capacities of a man for service. When I look back over my work for the Diocese and ask myself whether I could have accomplished more for the Church had I remained a Suffragan, I receive a negative answer. Doubtless there would always have been plenty to do, and the given tasks worthy of a whole souled devotion; but it seems to me there would have been wanting certain compulsions and incentives of larger moment in every positive and upbuilding endeavor. The sense of responsibility, the necessary balance in judgment, the freedom from too personal considerations, the planning for the long time ahead, concern for the well-being of every group, these are some of the elements of a good leadership which, if I mistake not, are naturally associated with one office rather than the other.

Personally I have come to the time when I feel the need not only of a helper, but of an associate; and after long pondering of the matter and connsel with many friends, I am clear that in asking for the election of a Coadjutor I am pointing the right way to an increased measure of strength and growth for the Diocese. Canon 13 of the General Convention provides "Before any election of a Bishop Coadjutor, the Bishop of the Diocese shall read, or cause to be read, to the Convention thereof, his written consent to such election, and in such consent he shall state the duties which he thereby assigns to the Bishop Coadjutor, when duly ordained and consecrated, and such consent shall form part of the proceedings of the Convention".

In accordance with this direction I hereby give my consent to the election of a Bishop Cosdjutor for the Diocese of Newark, by reason of the extent of Diocesan work; and I hereby assign to such Bishop Cosdjutor if and when elected and consecrated; the general oversight of the Missions and Assisted Parishes, retaining the Bishop's canonical right to the appointment of Missionaries; the responsibility for the work of the Boards of Social Service and Religious Education, with especial concern for the charitable and other agencies and institutions of the Church in the Diocese; the sharing in full measure in the Confirmation Visitations to the Parishes and Missions.

And now, Brethren, I commend you to God, and to the guidance and direction of His good Spirit. Let us consider these matters with full consciousness of our responsibility toward Him and with humble and sincere desires for His gifts of wisdom and gentleness and love.

Statement by the Standing Committee was read by the Secretary of the Standing Committee, the Ven. Henry M. Ladd, as follows:

Report of the Secretary of the Standing Committee to the Special Convention of the Diocese of Newark, March 15, 1932.

At a Special Meeting of the Standing Committee, held on Monday, November 30, 1931, in the Diocesan House, 99 Main Street, Orange, a majority of the members being present, Bishop Stearly, having asked for a Bishop Coadjutor on account of the extent of Diocesan work, the following Resolution was immediately and unanimously adopted:

Be it Resolved, That this Committee give authorization for the sending out of a letter to the Bishops and the Standing Committees of the Church, asking consent to the Election of a Bishop Coadjutor on account of the extent of Diocesan work, said letter to be signed by the Bishop and the Secretary of the Standing Committee.

On December 22, 1931, a letter to the Bishops and one to the Standing Committees, asking for consent to the Election of a Bishop Coadjutor on account of the extent of Diocesan work were signed by the Bishop of the Diocese and the Secretary of the Standing Committee and mailed to 105 Bishops and to 72 Standing Committees.

On December 28, 1931, the consent of a majority of the Bishops (53) was received; and on January 21, 1932, the consent of a majority of the Standing Committees (37) was received.

It was moved by Mr. Edward O. Stanley, seconded and carried, that the Convention proceed to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor in accordance with the request of the Diocesan.

Under Item 10 of the Calendar Archdeacon Elmendorf read a statement as follows by the Finance and Advisory Board:

At a meeting of the Finance and Advisory Board held at Diocesan House on February 1, 1932, at 3:30 o'clock.

It was the judgment of the Finance and Advisory Board that \$6,000.00 a year and a house would be a suitable stipend to be suggested for the new Bishop Coadjutor.

. It was moved and seconded that the report of the Finance and Advisory Board be accepted, and the salary of the Bishop Coadjutor, if elected, be \$6.000 and allowance for house.

Discussion followed as to the inadequacy of the proposed salary.

Amendment was offered by Rev'd C. R. Carrie to add the words after house "and allowance for travelling expenses".

Discussion on this amendment brought out the fact that the Finance and Advisory Board in the past has made provision for the travelling expenses of the Bishops. On vote the amendment was lost.

Mr. Henry J. Russell offered the following amendment, that the salary of the Bishop Coadjutor be \$8,000 and allowance for house. This amendment was lost.

Question being called on the original motion it was adopted.

The Secretary reported that no credentials have been received from St. Paul's Church, Hoboken. This was referred to the Committee on Certificates of Lay Deputies.

The Rey'd E. P. Hooper offered the following resolution:

WHEREAS, Our beloved Bishop has felt obliged to request this Convention for the election of a Bishop Coadjutor; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Convention orders spread upon the minutes its regret, no matter how necessary that our Bishop feels obliged to relinquish even part of his duties; and it further

Resolves, That this Convention orders spread upon its minutes its expression of love and veneration for the Bishop, its pledge of loyalty in his support and the fervent wish that he may be spared for many years to continue his work in this Diocese.

Prolonged applause greeted the Bishop as he received the resolution.

The Rev'd Harold G. Willis was requested to put the resolution, and it was carried unanimously.

The Bishop read noon-day Prayers.

Under Item 11 of the Calendar the Bishop made the statement that he has expressed no opinion on any candidate who may receive the nomination of this Convention.

The following nominations for Bishop Coadjutor were presented.

The Rev. Thomas A. Hyde nominated the Right Rev'd Charles K. Gilbert, D.D., Bishop Suffragan of the Diocese of New York. Rev'd A. E. Lyman Wheaton seconded the nomination,

The Rev'd David S. Hamilton nominated the Rev'd William Appleton Lawrence, D.D., Rector of Grace Church, Providence, R. I. Mr. Walter Kidde of Montclair seconded the nomination.

Col. Alfred T. Holley of Hackensack nominated the Rev'd Charles L. Gomph, Rector of Grace Church, Newark, N. J. Mr. Harold G. Green of West Orange seconded the nomination.

The Rev'd Luke M. White, D.D., Rector of St. Luke's Church, Montclair, N. J., was nominated, but requested his name be withdrawn.

Mr. Girard S. Ferguson nominated the Ven. William O. Leslie, Jr., Archdeacon of Newark. Mr. A. G. Wiegand of Newark second the nomination.

It was moved and carried that the nominations be closed.

Archdeacon Elmendorf moved that the Convention go into session as if in Committee of the whole. Carried,

It was moved that each speaker be allotted five minutes.

Amendment was offered to limit each speaker to three minutes.

The amendment was carried. The motion as amended was carried.

It was moved and carried that the Committee of the Whole rise at one o'clock.

Amendment was offered to rise at 12:50 o'clock. The amendment was lost. The original motion was carried.

The Rev. Francis H. Richey moved that only those be allowed to remain in the session of the Committee of the Whole who are voting members, and that reporters and others be excluded.

This motion was lost.

Archdeacon Elmendorf spoke in reference to the danger of partisanship of one extreme or the other entering into the election of a Bishop Coadjutor. Others who expressed their views were the Rev'd William K. Russell, Rev'd Henry B. Bryan, Rev'd Oscar Meyer and the Rev'd Carolus R. Webb.

It was moved, and carried, that the Committee of the Whole rise, and the Convention proceed to the taking of the ballot.

The President appointed the following as Tellers for the Election:

Chairman, Rev'd Allen Greene; Rev'd Messrs. Karl G. Kumm, Willis G. Parker, J. Thurston Travis, Allan Whatley, Gordon T. Jones, William L. Griffin, Jr., John H. Keene, and Messrs. Arthur H. Whitefield, W. M. Aikman, Kenneth Reidy, James T. Carr, Stuart B. O'Reilly, W. G. Schimer and H. Ray deMund.

It was moved and carried that the first ballot be taken.

The President offered appropriate prayers for guidance in the election.

The Secretary was directed to read the roll of the Clergy entitled to vote in this election, and the roll of the Parishes and Missions entitled to vote in this election.

It was moved and carried that the polls be opened for fifteen minutes.

On motion made and carried the polls were ordered closed, and recess for luncheon be taken to 2:15 o'clock.

The Convention was reconvened at 2:20 o'clock, the President in the Chair.

The Episcopal Eddress

Of the Bishops of the Church three during the past year have died; the Rt. Rev'd Theodore Irving Reese, Bishop of Southern Ohio; the Rt. Rev'd Cameron Mann, Missionary Bishop of South Florida; and the Rt. Rev'd Anson Rogers Graves, retired Bishop of La Platte. All of these men have left a record of indefatigable service and of unquestioning devotion in the work of the Church. They were great missionaries, who with large wisdom and zeal wrought out their life and gave their strength in the service of their fellow men.

Of the Clergy of our own Diocese I record here the passing during the last year of the Rev'd Dr. Charles L. Cooder, for many years the greatly beloved Chief Chaplain of the City Mission. He ministered without surcease among the great company of Christ's poor, making a place for himself in the hearts of the sick and afflicted. He impressed upon this great work a character which it will long bear of gracious charity and merciful ministry.

The Rev'd Jesse C. Joralemon was one of the oldest of the Presbyters of the Diocese, which he had served in various places. His chief work was done at Grace Church, Greenville, Jersey City, where through long years he had watched over a large company of people as a true pastor and teacher and friend. His was a spirit of buoyant eagerness and courage, of devotion to old and tried ways, of fidelity in ministering the word of truth.

The Rev'd Albert M. Farr had for the last few years lived in retirement, giving service from time to time as he was invited to minister in various Parishes in the Diocese. With a clear mind and sensitive spirit he loved to dwell upon the mystical aspects of religion. His memory will long be cherished by a large circle of friends who valued him for the quickening and enlarging influence of his spirit.

The Rev'd Melvin Honeyman, although a life long resident of Newark, was known to but a small company in the Diocese. He was of a retiring disposition and for a number of years before his death had worked out his ministry as locum tenens or supply in Parishes where there were vacancies in the Rectorship, or other needs for clerical service. The Diocese had a large place in his affections and he remembered it in the disposition of his worldly goods.

The Rev'd Henry P. Lyman-Wheaton was the father of the much beloved Rector of the Church of the Ascension, Jersey City. Although not canonically a member of the Diocese of Newark, he had lived among us for some years toward the end of his life and had ministered in a large number of our Parishes and Missions. He was well equipped intellectually, a good student, and a firm believer in the Church's customs and traditions.

I record here the names of notable women not a few. Outstanding among them was Mrs. Stephen H. Johnson, for a number of years President of the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary. Her leadership in the missionary work of the Diocese made for wider vision and larger strength continually. She had great gifts for management, and rare receptivity to spiritual impulses. She was one in a long line of noble women who have led in this most important part of the Diocesan life.

Mrs. J. Hull Browning of Tenafly had a long and splendid record of interest in the missionary activities of the Church. Her benefactions were many and various. Probably no Missionary Bishop coming to see her ever went away empty handed. She gave generously within the Diocese also and was especially a strong backer of the United Thank Offering, helping through her gifts to put the Diocese in its enviable position in this respect.

Mrs. Emil Diebitsch of Nutley was a member of the Board of Social Service and a devoted worker for the Church Mission of Help. She served with great quietness but with high distinction in whatever office she filled.

Miss Ellen M. Cummins will be remembered as the donor of part of the great tract of land upon which the summer work of the Diocese goes so steadily forward. It is upon the domain given by her and her cousin, Miss Sarah Albertson, that the Eagle's Nest Farm Camp has been established and also the Girls' Friendly Holiday House. She lost her life in a fire which destroyed the house in which she had lived for many years; a tragic ending to a long life time of interest in many undertakings.

Other noble women whose names must be mentioned here are Mrs. William M. Mitcham, the wife of the former Rector of St. James', Hackettstown; Mrs. Richard Walford, a keen supporter of the work of the Diocesan Altar Guild; Mrs. Louise R. Kimball of St. George's, Maplewood; Mrs. Ten Broeck, a faithful communicant and worker in Trinity Church, Bayonne, for more than half a century; Mrs. Ella Marshall was a zealous worker in the Mission of the Incarnation, Jersey City, to which she willed all of her estate, after the payment of a few small bequests, to be used as an Endowment for the support of that Church; and Mrs. Ellen MacAdie, the mother of the Rev'd Donald MacAdie of Passaic, a life long member and faithful communicant of Calvary Church, Bayonne, Mention should also be made of Mrs. Mary Leonhard of St. John's Parish, Passaic, which she had supported with time, thought, and means through many years; and of the mother of the Rev'd Allen Greene of St. John's, Union City, who presided with such grace in the rectory, and the influence of whose ministry and kindly spirit was widely felt in the Parish. Mrs. Alfred C. Harvey, a charter member of the Church of the Incarnation, East Orange, in whose house the first service was held, and who was the first President of the Woman's Guild.

Of laymen who have died during the past year I mention Mr. Herbert W. Taylor, Vestryman of St. Mark's, Newark; Mr. Herbert Coppell for many

years Warden of the Church of the Atonement, Tenafly; Dr. Archibald Mercer, a great friend of St. Barnabas' Hospital in Newark and a proponent from the beginning of the Cathedral Foundation; Mr. Frank P. Woomer, a long time and most acceptable Lay Reader.

I mention here as an event of significance in the life of the Diocese the purchase during the last year of a site for the establishment of a Diocesan and Cathedral Centre. The origin of our Cathedral Foundation goes back to the Convention of 1906 at which meeting a Resolution was adopted calling for the appointment of a Special Committee to consider such an organization. The Committee, of which the moving spirits were the Rev'd F. B. Reazor and Mr. William Read Howe of St. Mark's Church, West Orange, presented a report at the 1907 Convention recommending the establishment of the Corporation of All Saints' Cathedral and suggesting certain plans for the taking up of Cathedral work in the Diocese. From the begining the Cathedral movement has been conceived not in terms of the erection of a magnificent building, but as providing the right means through which a Centre will be created for the ever growing and increasing work and ministry of the Diocese. It has always been felt that the Cathedral form of organization was well adapted to the many missionary and benevolent projects within the purview of an active and enterprising Diocesan organization. Although twenty-five years have now passed the members of the Cathedral Chapter have never before been able to find and approve a suitable site for such a Diocesan Centre. From time to time various suggestions were made but always objections and drawbacks were such as to prevent action. Meanwhile, because of the growth of population in this part of the State the number of eligible sites was constantly diminishing, and it came to be felt by the members of the Chapter that it was time, if the right location could be secured, to obtain such a piece of ground as would lend itself to our present and future needs. This has been found in a property situated in the township of Cedar Grove, and overlooking the northernmost section of Upper Montclair. Those who drive west in front of the State Normal College along Normal Avenue pass this property when they come to the top of the road crossing the Orange Mountain and going westward to the Newark City Reservoir. There we have purchased thirty-eight acres of land, and have options on an additional piece of thirfeen acres. It is entirely undeveloped but is a site of great natural beauty and advantage. If, as doubtless will be the case, room shall be reserved there for the building of a Cathedral Church it will look out to the eastward across the meadows teeming with industry and population, in plain view of the tall buildings in New York City, and running back to the west the land will provide sites for such Diocesan buildings as should be properly located in a Cathedral Close. It is proposed to go forward slowly in the development of the property; clearing out the underbrush and building such temporary roads as will give access to the land and permit the use of some natural outdoor amphitheatre for meetings and

Services during the summer season. The adoption of a general plan for the development of the property will doubtless contemplate the erection from time to time of such buildings and houses as can advantageously be located there and become part of a vital and growing Church settlement. A Committee is in process of formation to study out proper plans and a right order of development, and doubtless through this Committee the members of the Church in the Diocese will from time to time receive information as to what steps forward are being taken. Meanwhile it is a great satisfaction to feel that the Church has thus acquired an eligible and attractive location for such a Diocesan Centre. The ground in question is about eight miles from the centre of Newark; not more than five miles from Paterson; and only a little bit further than that from Hudson County. In the other direction the great new highways that are being constructed through the State provide easy access for those who come from the west.

The Regional Commission of New York has studied the development of these parts for some years, has indicated the very spot we have acquired as designed theoretically for use as a public park or some such structure as a great Cathedral. It is the confident judgment of all those who have taken part in the consideration of these questions that we have done well in making so fortunate a beginning.

The year thru which we are passing will be memorable for the impact upon our Church life and its financial support of the industrial and commercial depression through which the world has been passing. The effects of this period of difficulty were slow in manifesting themselves in the finances of the Church. It is true that in the year 1931 the gifts of the Diocese for missions which amounted to \$235,141.71 showed a falling off of about \$20,000 from the gifts of the preceding year. This was not unexpected because on all hands stories were current of unemployment and need produced by the general situation. Neither was the amount of the falling off such as to cause alarm. But with the Every Member Canvass last autumn came the realization of the fact that the people who make up the rank and file of the Church had been harder hit than was surmised. All through 1931 there was the brave meeting of pledges to Church support on the part of all the people. It was only when Committees representing the Every Member Canvass called upon their friends for pledges for 1932 that it became apparent that we could by no means count upon the same amount of contributions as in former years, but must be prepared for a still further decline. The total amount of pledges for 1932 indicated in the Every Member Canvass reports was \$194,931.60, an amount less than the pledges of the preceding year of \$34,436.52. This with the falling off of the year before meant a lessening of the Diocesan gifts for missions of about \$55,000, a serious sum both in its effect upon our own Diocesan missionary work and as regards our support of the world wide missionary enterprise for which the whole Church is responsible.

There are only two ways of meeting such a situation; one is by cutting down the appropriations, and the other by seeking for new sources of supply. It may fairly be said, I think, that good and wise procedure has been adopted in both regards. The reports of the Every Member Canvasses, which indicating a withdrawal entirely, or the great lessening, of considerable numbers of subscriptions, indicated also that in a number of Parishes more persons had been found to make pledges for the support of the Church than had previously been the case. It is a well known fact that the burden of the support of the Church is carried by a minority of the Church's members. For one reason or another there is always a considerable company of our Church people who evade registration as regular givers for the support of the Church and its missions. Some think this number is as much as two-thirds of the normal communicant list. Whatever the number the studying out of wise and fresh approaches to them is one which the Church in all the Parishes must face.

In regard to the cutting down of appropriations it is to be said that both in the National Council and on the part of our own Finance and Advisory Board there has been careful study of our missionary activities to the end that such cuts as were inevitable should be made with as little detriment to the work as possible. The National Council has reduced its proposed expenditures for 1932 by approximately \$600,000, and in our own Diocese the amount of reduction in the appropriations for missionary and benevolent work amounts to about \$14,000. It is felt by some that we must contemplate the possibility of still further cuts in missionary appropriations. Whether the present stagnation in industry and commerce will hold on for a long time, or begin before a great while to show a real if but a slow progress to better things, we must be prepared to get along for a while with lesser amounts than were formerly at our disposition. This means that everyone must cooperate in meeting the situation. The Clergy in many instances have given a good lead in their Parishes by voluntarily returning to the Parish treasury a given percentage of their stipends; and lay people not a few have found it possible to increase their contributions over what they previously paid. There is no question about carrying on the work of the Church although the economic conditions may enforce upon us radical changes of organization and method such perhaps as we had not in former days thought feasible. It is not our religion that is any less valuable nor the Church that is any less worth supporting for the sake of its ministry to the spiritual needs of men, but we have got to be alert in devising good ways and means for maintaining the Church and its ministry.

Through the National Council the call has gone forth to the Church for a Special Offering at Whitsunday toward meeting the deficit in the pledges for missionary support for the current year. The total amount which is required for this purpose is \$400,000, not a large sum when one considers the

whole body of Christian people which is asked to give it. The securing of this amount is urgent because without it drastic curtailments and obliterations of good ministries of the Church will be inevitable enforcing thereby a set back to the endeavors of many years. The amount of shortage in our Diocesan pledges for Missions for this year is as has been said about \$35,000 and this is the amount which it is hoped the Special Offerings in our own Parishes may produce. The gathering in of such a sum would enable us to keep up our standard of giving on the basis of 1931; would permit the maintenance of the work in the Diocese without great loss, and enable us to make a good Offering for the whole work under the care of the National Council. I beg all of my brethren in the Convention, both the Clergy and Lay Delegates, to make earnest effort to secure good will offerings made out of free and loving hearts for the safeguarding of this work which is the Church's pride and crown of rejoicing.

As bearing upon the general condition as to the life and work of the Church, it is planned early in the autumn to call the people in all our Parishes and Missions to a short but intensive period of study of the meaning and significance of religion and the Church for the well being of the world. It is proposed to hold in mid October a Teaching Mission in every one of our 155 congregations. This Mission, which will last from Saturday afternoon until Tuesday night, will it is felt bring home to all our people who will be gathered to participate in it a fresh vision and a new understanding of the relationship of the Church to the need of the world, and the manner and method in which the Church's ministry may be carried on to the blessing of men. Preparations for this Teaching Mission are already well under way and the experience of other Dioceses where the plan has been adopted has been so favorable that we are justified in thinking that nothing could be of greater help in strengthening the morale and lifting up the ideals and purposes of our people for good religious living than such a call and conference as is contemplated. I call upon the Clergy and the Lay Deputies in all the Parishes to do their utmost to cooperate with full interest and devotion in this enterprise. It is not a money raising scheme and I suspect in the conferences which will be held money will seldom, if ever, be mentioned.

The financial needs of the coming year will be faced in the usual way by the Every Member Canvass method. This Teaching Mission is intended to bring all of our people in a real way face to face with the needs of the world, the power of the Gospel to meet those needs, and our responsibility in bringing them together.

I think I hardly need urge upon the Lay Deputies the need for devotion at the present time in carrying on the Church and its Services. I know that in almost all of our Parishes the Parish budget has been affected by the economic conditions. In a number of congregations deficits have been accumulating during the year, and in others drastic reductions have been necessi-

tated in the process of simplifying Parish organizations and lessening financial outlay. In the facing of these difficulties I hope there will be generous and hearty cooperation on the part of all our people. The Clergy, the Vestrymen, the Officers of the various Parish organizations, might profitably be brought together to consider the situation, which involves, as we must perceive, the carrying on of the Church's work, and providing for the financial outlay entailed therein. There are those who feel that the experience through which we are passing will result, and has already to some degree resulted, in the turning of men's thoughts afresh and with eager desire to the life of religion. The limitations to enduring satisfaction procured by the material and temporary aspects of life are in process of being realized by many persons. They are asking for something better than they have known; and it is a great day of opportunity for the Church to offer to such individuals the knowledge and faith and devotion which is its peculiar heritage. If we could get ourselves adjusted to the financial exigencies of the next months and years, and give ourselves unremittingly and conscientiously to our service of Christ in the Church the hard times through which we are passing will be remembered also as times of benefit and blessing,

I think I cannot forego a word or two concerning the unsatisfactory and threatening situation among us as regards crime and vice and lawlessness. There is not time today to enter into any general discussion of the situation. but I must make appeal to you who are here present, and through you to all the members of the Church in this Diocese, to lay seriously to heart the great danger we are in by these tendencies. It is of comparatively little satisfaction to trace their origin or to discuss the heartbreaking sorrow and pain characteristic of them. It is hardly possible to think of ourselves as civilized when such crimes as the kidnapping of little children and the constant robbing of great financial institutions goes on without let or hindrance. One of the most discouraging aspects of the situation is the comparative indifference and listlessness in regard to the existence and development of these nefarious practices. Everyone during these last months must have experienced a sinking of heart in the evident lack of any public conscience in the great City of New York expressing itself in indignation and condemnation at the graft and political jobbery uncovered by Judge Seabury and his assistants. It is probable the same sort of secret and illicit relationship between law and crime exists throughout our country, and we are paying a heavy price for our indifference by the notable development of wickedness of one sort or another as part of our common life. It is extremely discouraging and difficult to know what one as an individual may do about it. One hardly knows where to take hold of the movement for betterment, and everyone is conscious that in putting forth effort to combat the evil elements of our social life he is laying up in store for himself the doing of many thankless tasks; the facing of many dangers to himself and his loved ones, and the possibilities of loss. Nevertheless it must be said that our problems will

never be solved except by the interest and effort of individuals. We must find in all our communities the way to bring together the people of good will. who if they can be united and rightly led, have it in their power to establish such influences and opinions and convictions as will help to keep the life of society sound and sweet and free it from the growth of those evil and poisonous influences and businesses which at present are so generally permitted to go on without anything being said or done to combat and destroy them. I have a feeling that in all the communities where the Church is represented there is opportunity for fine ministry on the part of laymen and laywomen in various fields, social, political, economic and charitable, which shape themselves up in every community in their own special way. It should be a source of pride to us that in all our Parishes there should be found those who inspired by the teaching and ideals of our religion give themselves up to definite endeavors for the establishment of righteousness and peace and joy as the characteristics of the new kingdom to be worked for and set up in all the world. I long to see an increasing number, particularly of young men and women, responding to the calls for such services to the community. It is to the oncoming generation, I dare say, we must look for the creation of a new and better world. I hope that part of the teaching given to all our boys and girls will be concerned with their obligations as citizens and members of social groups; that they will be taught to see clearly the faults and the lacks and limitations of the present social and economic order, and that with the recognition of these there shall go a determination and purpose to help as may be possible in the bringing in of the good time of which man keeps dreaming.

It is not necessary, I think, to repeat what I said at the Special Convention held in March on the subject of the need for Episcopal assistance in the Diocese. The reasons for the election of a Bishop Coadjutor seem to me as cogent now as then. I have been impressed in the constant round of duties and responsibilities during the last few weeks with the imperative need for additional help in carrying on the work of the Diocese. I therefore renew my request for the election of a Bishop Coadjutor, and in accordance with Canon 13 of the General Convention, I hereby give my consent to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor for the Diocese of Newark by reason of extent of Diocesan work, and I hereby assign to such Coadjutor, if and when elected, and consecrated, the general oversight of the Missions and Assisted Parishes, retaining the Bishop's canonical right to the appointment of Missionaries; the responsibility for the work of the Boards of Social Service and Religious Education, with especial concern for the charitable and other agencies and institutions of the Church in the Diocese; the sharing in full measure in the Confirmation Visitations to the Parishes and Missions.

And now, Brethren, I commend you to God, and to the guidance and direction of His good Spirit. Let us consider the matters which come before us with full consciousness of our responsibility toward Him and with humble and sincere desires for His gifts of wisdom and gentleness and love.

Reports of the Archdeacons

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF NEWARK.

To the Rt. Rev'd Wilson R. Stearly, D. D., Bishop of Newark:

At the end of 1931 there were in the Archdesconry of Newark six diocesan missions, two parochial missions and two assisted parishes. Of the diocesan missions, four are receiving aid from the Board of Missions, the same being true of the two assisted parishes. A brief report covering the work of these places follows:

St. Mary Magdalene, Newark: The "Depression" hit this parish as it did many others, and being a congregation composed entirely of salaried people, the Church suffered through many "cuta" in salaries; the Church being the first consideration when people find they must economize; so we report "Numerically, Good; Financially, Poor." Fourteen were baptized during the year, including three adults. Thirteen were confirmed, and one received from the Roman Church. The Church School is in good condition, as are the various organizations. A new organization has just started, composed of young women of the parish, and known as St. Elizabeth's Guild. Gifts to the Church include a new Credence Table, and a set of Red Hangings, Burse and Veil. During the Summer the Church was redecorated inside and outside, and new cement steps were built; the cost of this was mostly provided by the Women's Guild, from a fund which had been set apart for that purpose in a Building and Loan Society, the balance being given by the G. F. S. and two or three friends. Several shrubs were also given for the front of the Church. All of this has greatly improved the appearance of the property.

St. Alban's, Newark: The Archdeacon is informed that last year was the best St. Alban's ever had from a financial point of view. The Church is free from debt of any kind, and is operating on its budget. The subscriptions for next year show a decided increase in number. The attendances at the Church services have increased materially. The Sunday School has increased both in average attendance and enrollment. The work of the societies is as strong as may be expected.

Christ Church, Newark: The work in this old Parish still continues strong along social service lines, in which way a real contribution is being made to the Ironbound section of Newark. A well organized and successful work is being carried on through a Boy Scout Troop which has been in existence for several years, and during the present year a vigorous Girl Scout Troop has been established. In addition, the Stansbury Memorial Children's Guild has increased in membership and usefulness, with an enrollment at the end of the year of well over one hundred. All three of these organizations are carried on without respect to religion or race. As a matter of fact, there are from eight to ten different nationalities touched by one or more of these organizations.

The Rev'd Robert C. Hubbs, who had served as Priest in Charge for a year, resigned as of December 1st, 1931, to take up a larger work at St. Ambrose's Mission, Philadelphia. The work is temporarily under the care of the Archdeacon. The organized work of the Parish is being maintained and set forward as much as possible. There is no doubt but that there is still a demand and a vital need for the carrying on of the work of this old Parish in the east side of Newark.

St. Peter's, Livingston: St. Peter's, Livingston, is doing its best to adjust itself to the financial loss occasioned by the death of the Sister of the Founder two years ago. This is a hard business at this present time. Organizations show a healthy growth, and there are signs that the next few years will see a gradual influx of new members from outside. The children's work still remains the most important, and we are hoping to present to the Bishop in the near future the largest class so far for Livingston. The

number of Communions made Sunday by Sunday is increasing steadily, and the Vicar feels, despite the hardship of the present time, that here is evidence of healthy growth, and great hope for the future.

St. David's, Ceder Grove: The work here has been carried on during the last year with a brighter outlook. A Women's Guild has been formed and meets regularly. The Young People's Fellowship of Little Falls combines the young people of the two Churches. The small group at Cedar Grove attended Church with the greatest regularity. They are one faithful body of people.

Mission of the Advent, Brookdale: The Vicar reports as follows: "With the erection of a new building, the interest and attendance in our Church has increased. The new building, together with the creation of a morning service, has done much for our Church in Brookdale. However, the fact that I am not able to be present every Sunday has not worked out so well. With only part time work, there is no opportunity to check up on new people; and I am not able to do as much as I might wish to do. I feel that the continuance of this method will be detrimental to the congregation. During the year an Executive Committee of six men has been formed; this, I feel, is a step in the right direction. The Women's Guild has shown progress. Although it has not increased materially in membership, it has accomplished much in the support of the Church. We are endeavoring to advance the spiritual life of the Guild this year. I feel that too much emphasis has been placed on the material side during the year past. An Altar Guild has been formed consisting of five members. This Guild has functioned very well and is caring for the things pertaining to the Altar in a fine way. The Servers' Guild has done very well. The Church School attendance has increased about 80% over last year. I would suggest and recommend, if it is possible, a more intensive work in Brookdale. There are three other Protestant Churches here, each having a resident pastor, and our work, at best, presents only a feeble attempt at what we can do. I feel that our efforts in Brookdale have not as yet 'clicked,' e. g., the response has not been all that it might have been."

Church of the Holy Spirit, Verona: The Rev'd J. Thurston Travis is in charge of this Mission, as well as the Mission of the Advent, Brookdale. He reports as follows for Verona: "With the establishment of a morning service in Brookdale, I feel that the effectiveness of the Church in Verona has been impaired. Much that I have said in connection with the work at Brookdale applies to Verona as well. In Verona we have five other Churches, each with a resident pastor, and our work here as well as in Brookdale is only a feeble attempt at what we can do. The new building this year has created much interest and enthusiasm. It has increased our attendance both in the Church services and the Church School; the school has increased about 90%.

"A note on the finances-We have paid \$930.00 on principal of loans, and \$411.92 on interest of loans. At Christmas we put in \$926.00 worth of Church furniture, which was given by friends and members of the congregation. The congregation has been able to effect a Building and Loan Plan which has netted since the first of June \$770.00 in payments on pledges. The building of the new Church has brought the idea of perma nence to our work in Verona. There is apparent now a better feeling from the other Churches of the community. The Women's Guild has done a fine piece of work this year. There has been a feeling of exultation among the ladies, and each has seemed to have the vision that the Church must be considered first in their work. This feeling was much in evidence at the annual bazaar. Although the bazzar was a great financial success I feel that the spirit of the enterprise was even greater. The Altar Guild has accomplished a great deal this past year. It has been busy making things for our Church and has been interested in the work of the Diocesan Altar Guild. I would suggest and recommend here in Verona, as I did in Brookdals, a more intensive work. I feel that about all that we can do under the present regime is to 'hold our own.' This, of course will be a great deal, but we must forge ahead."

Holy Innocents', West Orange: The Vicar reports as follows: "The year at Holy Innocents', West Orange, has been marked chiefly by the enclosing of a portion of the property by a brick wall, the clearing out of some of the trees and the pruning and feeding of the others, and the making of a good turf on the ground. This has all been very successfully done. At the same time the drive around the Church was widened and the parking space enlarged. Altogether we have expended about \$8,000.00 on these improvements. We propose to use this ground as a parish burial ground. The Diocesan authorities have given their consent and the Zoning Board of the Town of West Orange has approved. We hope to have the ground dedicated in the spring.

"Apart from this, the year has gone along well. The congregations have increased and twelve new families have been added to the list. The Sunday School has grown also Services have been held on Sundays and the greater Holy Days."

The progress of the work at Brookdale and Verona shows the wisdom of the Bishop and Board of Missions in starting this work three years ago. Both communities, but particularly Brookdale, are growing rapidly. Our great need is for more intensive work which calls for the addition of another Clergyman to this field.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF PATERSON.

To the Rt. Rev'd Wilson R. Stearly, D. D., Bishop of Newark:

All the seventeen Missions in the Archdeaconry of Paterson are carrying on well and bravely in this time of financial depression. Under the care of the new incumbent at Christ Church, Pompton, the Rev'd Kenneth O. Miller, the Mission at Ringwood has taken on new life. St. Stephen's, Delawanna, under the oversight of Rev'd J. Fred Hamblin, Rector St. John's, Newark, has at last found itself and is doing well.

The Italian work in Passaic and Garfield has been hard hit by unemployment but meets the challenge with astonishing sacrifices, which enables it to more than meet Diocesan pledges.

The colored work at St. Andrew's, Passaic, has been helped by a reduction in rent and the active interest in it by the Rector of St. John's and the Men's Guild of his Parish.

During the year two Archdeaconry meetings have been held and the Archdeacon has visited most of the Missions.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF MORRISTOWN.

To the Rt. Rev'd Wilson R. Stearly, D. D., Bishop of Nework:

The Rector of Christ Church, Newton, writes: The 100th anniversary of the laying of the cornerstone of St. Luke's Church at Riope will be observed on Sunday, June 5th. This will include a pilgrimage to Johnsonburg. The old Church erected in 1781 is still

standing there and is now used as a dwelling. It is said that George Washington came through Johnsonburg, then known as Log Gaol, on Sunday, July 28th, 1782, just 150 years ago, and as he was known for his regular attendance at a Church service on Sunday, it is believed that he attended service there.

Grace Church, Madison, on Whitsunday, will keep the 75th anniversary of its consecration. The one meeting of the Archdeaconry that was held was largely attended and was given over to a conference on "The Church and the Problem of Unemployment."

While the actual transfer of the Rev'd Mr. Ford's property at Sparta has not been made, we have every reason to believe that it will be done shortly, thus giving to the Diocese the possession of this valuable and interesting Rural Work centre and assuring its permanence.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF JERSEY CITY.

To the Rt. Rev'd Wilson R. Stearly, D.D., Bishop of Newark:

The Archdeaconry of Jersey City lies within the boundaries of Hudson County exclusive of the parishes in Arlington and Harrison. We have three Missions in the Archdeaconry. At the Northern end of the County is the Mission of the Transfiguration, Woodcliff, under the charge of the Rev'd Arthur Moffatt, Descon. Under the leadership of Mr. Moffatt the Mission is making a steady progress and growth. The people are happy and he is rendering good service. The Mission of Our Saviour, Secaucus, has a small but a steady growth under the direction of Canon W. J. White, with the help of lay-readers. The Mission of the Incarnation for colored people in Jersey City continues to grow under the direction of Rev'd W. N. Harper, M. D.

The Archdeaconry held two meetings during the past year, the last one being in St. Paul's, Jersey City, largely attended by lay folk to consider the question of the assistance that could be rendered by the Church toward unemployment relief.

Many of our parishes and missions in Hudson County are having a difficult time in facing the changed conditions caused by the removal of parishioners to other parts of the Diocese and it may be that the Diocese will have to come to the rescue of some of our parishes in the future to maintain the work which has been carried on by them so galantly for many years.

BLOOMFIELD, ADVEST.—The first service of this Mission was held in a store building on Broad Street on December 16, 1928; the first service in the new church building on August 30, 1931.

NEWARK, St. Alban's.—The 40th Anniversary of the Mission will be celebrated April 17, 1932. The Mission is free from any indebtedness, with property valued at over \$50,000.

NEWARK, St. Mark's.—The enlargement of the Church building was completed in 1925. For this we borrowed \$40,000 from a B. & L. Association, also \$18,500 in bank notes. Altogether we are carrying 505 shares of B. & L. stock which has from 2½ to 3 years to reach maturity.

NEWARE, St. Mary's.—Church was redecorated within and without during summer. Following memorials and gifts received: Altar and Reredos, Candelebra, Missal, Chancel Prayer Books, Stained Glass Window, Pew Prayer Books, new Choir Vestments.

NEWARK, St. Petilip's.—At the end of 1931 after expending \$3,643.10 for the improvement of our Church building, we had \$900 in cash balance in our building fund. We reopened 25 shares in the South Broad B. & L. and 10 shares in the Armstrong B. & L.

Appendix 11

ANNUAL REPORT, HOSPITAL OF ST. BARNABAS.

The report of the year 1931 presents some maximum figures in our record of service. Perhaps the most interesting feature is the unprecedentedly large amount of free and part free service rendered. The cost of this service amounted to \$69,278.20. This included \$16,935.45 which was the cost of service to City Dispensary patients for whom the City of Newark paid \$2,500.00 This constitutes a considerable portion of the free work in our wards and clinics. Thus the hospital has generously shared in alleviating conditions of indigency among our sick poor.

This over-generosity, coupled with the necessity of expenditures for repairs and improvements in our buildings, resulted in a deficit December 31, 1931, of \$12,804.32. (The deficit January 1, 1931, was \$4,276.56.)

During the year just passed, 2,968 patients were treated in hospital beds with a total of 38,282 days' treatment and 6,569 patients were treated in the clinic with a total number of 23,823 clinic visits. Thus, a total of 9,537 patients received our ministrations in both departments.

There were 1,434 operations performed; 397 babies were born, of whom 204 were girls and 187 boys. There were 40 nationalities and 31 religious affiliations represented among the patients admitted.

Expenditures during the year amounted to \$229,589.18. Cash receipts from patients were \$162,242.09. Other receipts were: Welfare Federation of Newark, \$23,355.00: income from endowments, \$27,051.28; City of Newark, \$2,500.00; interest on bank balances, \$130.55; donations, \$2,383.69; other receipts, \$3,398.81. Total receipts, \$221,061.42.

It is interesting to trace the growth of service in the Out-Patient Department. The number of visits during the last five years is as follows: 1927, 9,983; 1928, 12,916; 1929, 17,477; 1930, 22,543; 1931, 23,823. The increase of 139 per cent. since 1926 has been handled in crowded quarters but the need is so urgent that we are glad to give help under any conditions.

The Trustees gratefully acknowledge the gifts and other assistance of our many friends throughout the year. We are especially grateful to the members of the Guild of the Hospital for their continued support and personal service, to the Junior Guild for their interest, to the Doctors and Nurses for their loyal and unselfish service rendered to our poor patients, and to all the many friends and benefactors of the Hospital for their interest and gifts in behalf of the work of mercy rendered by the Hospital.

FIFTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT, COUNCIL OF CHRIST HOSPITAL

In the last ten years Christ Hospital has emerged from a comparatively small institution into one of the larger hospitals of the State. As a consequence of this there has been a large increase in the number of patients and the confidence of our friends is shown in the legacies that are beginning to come to the hospital and the income of the hospital exceeded expenses by \$5,717.45. The hospital still owes \$175,000, contracted in the erection of new buildings. This debt is in the shape of notes held by the First National Bank of Jersey City but is largely secured by securities that have come to us from legacies.

Seventy-one young women are in the Nurses Training School, 3148 patients were treated in the hospital in 1931. The Clinics of the hospital are doing a great work in ministering to the poor and 15,617 treatments were given.

The total income for the year 1931 was \$258,214.82. This was \$8,537.58 less than the previous year. The free work amounted to \$46,577.87, an increase of nearly \$23,000 over the year before.

The hospital maintains a Convalescent Home which is doing a unique piece of work in caring for patients whose convalescence is protracted, and for permanent invalids for whom there is small hope of recovery.

We have six Guilds connected with the hospital which are giving fine service in the way of raising money, social service, and caring for different branches of the hospital work.

Legacies amounting to \$38,500 came to the hospital and a trust fund of \$100,000, set up some years ago by Mrs. Transylvania King, became available to the hospital in the early part of 1932. A Hall has been set apart in the hospital to be known as the "Thomas Bedford King Hall" in memory of her husband.

The hospital met with a great loss in the death of its Vice-President, Mr. H. Otto Wittpenn, in July of 1931. He had been a member of the Council of the hospital for ten years and gave liberally both of his money and time and thought.

The hospital is in excellent condition both as regards to its material fabric and its finances.

During the past year the City Mission of Newark, N. J., has undergone the following changes: On March 29th, to the great sorrow of all concerned, the Rev'd Parker C. Manzer died. The vacant chaplaincy was filled on July 1st by the appointment of the Rev'd Addison T. Doughty. This entailed the resignation of Dr. Doughty from the Board of Trustees and his place was filled by the election of the Rev'd Donald MacAddie, who had resigned earlier in the year as Executive Secretary. At the meeting of the Board of April 28th Rev'd George W. Dawson was elected Executive Secretary. To fill a vacancy on the Board of Trustees the name of Mr. G. J. Oltmanns was added to the list.

At the October meeting of the Board sincere appreciation of the services of the Rev'd Parker C. Manzer and the Rev'd Charles L. Cooder, who died on July 7th, was placed on record.

The daily work of the Chaplains has been maintained with regularity and effectiveness. The following statistics will give some indication of the scope of the work:

Besides the above a great number of pieces of clothing, baby layettes, religious books, magazines, etc., were distributed by our Chaplains and it is impossible to estimate the number of Christmas gifts and baskets given out.

In addition to their week-day work the Chaplains made many addresses in Churches throughout the Diocese concerning their work and made numerous visits to families of patients, prisoners and inmates of institutions.

HOUSE OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD, ORANGE.

[Organized, 1882.]

. The House of the Good Shepherd, Orange, was organized in the Spring of 1832 for the purpose of providing a home for aged dependent women, especially such as were members of Episcopal Churches in the Oranges. There were a few then dependent on their parishes for support, and it seemed as if it would be advantageous to have a pleasant and well-managed home in which they could live. By combined efforts of these Orange Churches a start was made in August of that year in a rented house. Subsequently a house was built at the present location, 280 Henry Street, Orange, sufficient to accommodate eighteen people. This house was enlarged in 1904 through the generosity of Mrs. William Barr of Grace Church, Orange, and was arranged to accommodate a few men as well as women. The entire capacity of the house is now thirty-six.

While intended primarily for persons connected with the Episcopal Churches of the Oranges, there has usually been room for others, and the house has harbored in the course of years many aged people, both from the Oranges and from other parts of the State of New Jersey, of all variety of religious creeds and Church connection. The sole restriction in the charter of the house is that applicants must be residents of the State of New Jersey. The management has never added any other rules concerning age or connection, and is free to treat every application on its own merits. The house is intended to be a permanent home for the last years of people having no other suitable place to live.

In the early years, the expenses of the house were borne partly by contributions from the interested parishes and partly by regular payments made on behalf of each of the old people by their particular Churches, relatives or friends. As time has gone on, the house has received a number of gifts and bequests which now constitute an endowment fund. The income from this fund carries part of the expenses of the present large building, but it is also necessary to ask a regular monthly payment for each of the family. At the present time this is about their dollars a month, and represents approximately a half of what it costs to take care of each person.

If the cost of living were no greater today than it was when the house was started, of course the endowment would take care of it entirely. Something of the sort appears to have been the expectation of its founders. While the endowment has been growing, however, the cost of everything has been rising, and thus the situation which we have described. If generous people continue to contribute to the endowment, and we have an era of stationary prices, it would be possible to reduce the amount asked, and it might some day become merely a lump sum paid on admission.

Even with the fact that we have asked these payments, we are faced with a steady stream of applicants, and we know that homes which are less expensive than ours have long waiting lists. It is quite evident that there is a need of many such quiet harbors for old age, far beyond what our communities provide.

The house is a long three-story frame building with large porches on every story, and sufficient stairways inside and out to make a variety of exits in case of fire. Since our last annual report further fire protection has been provided throughout the building of metal fire escapes, upon which exits open from each floor. The entire house has been protected by the installation of automatic fire extinguisher bulbs placed on the walls. The temperature of the house is easily maintained at a uniform point through recent installation of oil burning equipment. At one end of the ground floor is the dining room, cheerful and well lighted. At the opposite end is the men's smoking room. Attached to one corner of the building is a very pleasant chapel in which services are held every Sunday and once during the week as well as on Church festivals or special occasions. On the second floor in the center is the women's sitting room. There is also a small infirmary in which special care can be given anyone who is sick. Our house physician, Dr. John Thomas, Jr., and his associates keep a good watch upon all the members of

the family and succeed in keeping most of them in pretty good health in spite of their years.

The life of the house is brightened by many entertainments. The Auxiliary composed of ladies makes a specialty of this and holds some kind of party from time to time. There are always special celebrations of all important festivals and holidays and frequently a birthday or other anniversary in the life of some one of those in the house.

THE ALMS HOUSE MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

Officers: President, Rev'd Charles L. Gomph; Vice-President, Rev'd Charles P. Tinker, D.D.; Secretary, Mrs. W. F. Greenley; Treasurer, Rev'd W. O. Leslie, Jr.

During the year 1931 the Society has provided a celebration of the Holy Communion in the Chapel of the Alms House each month at 10 A. M. on the Thursday following the third Sunday. The average attendance has been about 30 and the average number of Communicants about 15.

The Society has also provided a service every Sunday afternoon during the year, conducted by groups of interested lay people under the direction of the Rectors of Grace Church, Newark, Trinity Church, Irvington, St. Agnes' Church, East Orange, St. Andrew's Church, Newark, and Grace Church, Nutley.

The annual Easter service was held in Easter week, Bishop Stearly making the address. This was followed by the annual Easter Feast, at which the Society provided a hearty supper for all the inmates of the Alms House, over 500 in number.

A group of interested women from the Oranges under the leadership of Mrs. Laurance Tweedy of the Church of the Holy Communion, South Orange, furnished a delightful Christmas entertainment which was followed by abundant refreshments.

The Rev. A. T. Doughty of the staff of the City Mission is regularly carrying on pastoral and priestly ministration among the inmates of the Alms House.

The Society earnestly appeals to the clergy and lay people of the Diocese for their interest and support. We need many more annual contributors. The annual dues are \$1.00 and may be sent to the Rev. W. O. Leslie, Jr., Treasurer, 99 Main Street, Orange.

WOMAN'S AUXILIARY, NEWARK BRANCH.

The Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese is an auxiliary to the National Council in all its departments; hence to the Social Service and Religious Education Departments as well as to the Missionary. The Auxiliary conceives of church life as expressing itself through united action with others to better social conditions, and to carry out our Lord's command to preach the gospel to all nations.

The policy of the Auxiliary in this Diocese for a number of years back has been, not to start new groups or organizations in a parish for Auxiliary work, but to work with any existing guild or organization, and to ask such a guild to join its work, thus preserving the unity of parish life. This policy has proved highly successful. Out of 158 parishes and missions which the Diocese reports, the Auxiliary now has work in, or some kind of connection with 153.

As I have watched the life of the Diocese and Church for many years, it has seemed to me that the contribution the Auxiliary is making is far more than is represented by

its gifts of money and work. That contribution is in the education of the women of the Diocese to a better understanding of the church's life, and that better understanding has great stimulating powers in the life of the individual, arousing her to a deeper enthusiasm and a greater devotion.

The figures I am giving are for the year ending last January. During that year the Auxiliary treasurer had handled \$14,724. Out of this \$1,500 was sent through the Diocesan treasurer, Mr. Baldwin, to the National Council and counted on the Parish quotas. Gifts to missions and church work outside of the Diocese were over \$4,000. Gifts to institutions and objects within the Diocese were \$3,400, including \$331 to the Bishop's Fund. \$4,178 was given to the Advance Work Program of the Diocese.

The work of supplying the needs of missions was participated in by 101 parish branches. We outfitted: 1: Mission Hospitals: Wusih, China, and St. Andrew's at Zamboanga, Philippine Islands, (linen hospital and surgeons' gowns and general supplies). 2: Mission Stations: St. Cyprian's Mission, New Bern, North Carolina; Quebrade Limons, Ponce, Porto Ricc; Pine Ridge Indian Mission, South Dakota. 3: Schools: Hooker School, Mexico City; St. Elizabeth's School, Wakpala, South Dakota; Okalona Industrial School, Okalona, Mississippi, for colored people; St. Mary's on the Mountain, (mountain white), Sewance, Tennessee.

We sent 20 personal boxes for Missionaries' families. 38 Girls' Friendly branches contributed to this Department of the work. For the Diocese, besides the \$3,400 in money gifts, there were articles sent to the various institutions amounting to over \$3,000, and we know of large amounts which have been sent and not reported through the Auxiliary.

We presented to the United Thank Offering at the convention in Denver \$45,000 as the glit of the women of this Diocese.

The Social Service Department:

Fifty-one parishes and missions have reported social service work through the Social Service Department. In the Montclair District every parish had some social service work to report. This includes work done in co-operation with local institutions and agencies. 1,067 children were taken on picnics and a number were given a week at camp.

The work of the Educational Department has been most important this year. The delegates to Denver had a most interesting and stimulating experience in the discussions held by the Woman's Auxiliary, and have gone all over the Diocese since, speaking on the "Findings" on those large and important subjects: Family Life, Interracial Relations, International Relations, Economic Conditions and Religious Thinking Today. We hope to do deeper study on them next year. 25 classes studied the book "Building a Christian Nation." There were 3 large and enthusiastic Bible classes held under the Department.

The speakers at the monthly Diocesan meetings in Newark have been most inspiring and the meetings are growing in numbers—often taxing the capacity of Trinity House.

A Quiet Day conducted by the Rev. Donald Aldrich in December was largely attended and most deeply appreciated.

In closing may I thank the many Rectors whose hearty co-operation with the Auxiliary has made this work possible?

REPORT OF THE YOUNG PEOPLE'S FELLOWSHIP.

Annual Report for the Year 1931.

The Y. P. F. in the Diocese is striving to do "Even Greater Things" each year.

At the last Annual Convention 44 chapters with 958 members were reported, and in the course of the year ten new chapters have been admitted, Christ Church, Ridgewood; St. Peter's, Clifton; St. Paul's, Morris Plains; St. Alban's, Newark; St. Mary's, Haledon; Church of the Advent, Brookdale; St. James', Upper Montelair; Grace Church, East Rutherford; and Grace Church, Greenville, Jersey City.

The Annual President's Dinner was held on January 24th, 1931. A list of the Responsibilities and Opportunities of each of the officers of the Y. P. F. was lined up, and three short talks were given on Good Habits of Reading led by Rev'd W. O. Kinsolving, Civic and Social Responsibilities in the Y. P. F. led by Mr. Frederick Burlingame, and The Vocation of Youth, as it respects the Church by Rev'd F. C. Todd.

Newark Diocese entertained members of our Province at the Provincial Conference at which there were representatives from six Dioceses. The Conference was held at Calvary Church, Summit, the week-end of February 13-14-15th. The theme of the Conference was "Even Greater Things" which has proven a real challenge to our Diocese.

The Annual Convention was held on May 9th, 1931, at St. Barnabas' Church, Newark, at which 200 members were present. At this time the District Cup was presented to Jeracy City and the Chapter Cup was presented to St. Barnabas' Chapter. The Bishop's Pledge of \$500 was presented.

Four issues of the "Excursion News" were published, which provided so much interest that we were able to charter the "Chauncey M. Depew" for May 23rd, 1931, for our Annual Trip Up the Hudson. 595 adult tickets were sold and one child's ticket, and \$133.94 was cleared after paying all expenses.

The following day, May 24th, which was Whitsunday, the National Corporate Communion for Y. P. F.ers was held. Every Y. P. F. in the United States joined together in this great Sacrament.

The June Conference was held the week end of June 19 to 21, the theme of the Conference being "Leading Leaders." There were four conferences: A Discussion Program for Young People led by Rev'd A. Stewart Hogenauer; A Service Program for Young People led by Rev'd Allen Greene, The Piace of Devotion in the Group Life of Young People led by Rev'd L. Harold Hinrichs, and A Well Rounded Christian Program for Young People led by Miss Marion MacDonald. Friday evening was opened with dinner and Sunset Service. Saturday Evening there was a Dance and Preparation Service, and Sunday Morning, Holy Communion was celebrated with the Bishop as Celebrant.

During the course of the summer and early fall Mr. J. Henry Wendt raised \$142.27 to send our President as Delegate to the National Conference in Faribault, Minn. The Conference has been temporarily held over for 1932.

Budget for 1931-32 was submitted in September of 1931 and copy is attached as well as copy of Treasurer's Report that was submitted at the Annual Convention held in May, 1931.

On October 31, 1931, the Laura Augusta Conference was held in Madison at which 60% of the Young People's Fellowship chapters in the Diocese were represented.

The Flying Squadron consisting of members of the Diocesan Council have visited about thirty chapters to date at the request of the chapter. This has helped considerably

to bring the individual chapters to a better realization of their place in the Diocese and their association with other chapters.

Five issues of the "Fellowship News" were printed in 1931.

During the course of the year the Clergy of the Diocese held two conferences regarding Y. P. F. chapters and their work, and a vote of confidence was received assuring the Young People's Fellowship of their good wishes and willingness to co-operate in every way possible.

There were thirteen teams in the Diocese playing Basketball and the final Tournament was won by St. John's, Jersey City. They received the Cup by one point.

The Young People of the Diocese send their greetings, and are glad to undertake any large or small job that will help to keep the Church alive.

SECRETARY'S REPORT PRESENTED AT THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CHURCH CLUB OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK.

November 5, 1931.

The officers of the Church Club are as follows: President, Mr. George W. Hulsart; Pirst Vice-President, Mr. F. W. Thorne; Second Vice-President, Hon. Newton H. Porter;

Secretary, Mr. Arthur P. Green, Treasurer, Mr. E. A. Chasteney. Executive Committee, Mr. Jenner R. Fast, Mr. John Fletcher, Mr. Albert J. Perry, Mr. Henry J. Russell, Mr. Vreeland Tompkins, Mr. Henry Young.

On December 8, 1930, the Church Club gave a dinner at Grace Church Parish House, Newark, at which the Bishop and Archdeacons Shipley and Leslie were present.

At this meeting the plans for the ensuing year were outlined and it was decided that the Club should hold meetings in certain Archdeaconries to develop a better knowledge of the opportunities and responsibilities in the Diocese. It was decided to hold the first meeting at Paterson and accordingly a meeting was arranged for February 10th, 1931, at which there was an attendance of about 200 laymen. Addresses were made by Bishop Stearly, Canon Leslie, Canon White, Rev'd G. W. Dawson and Mr. James Nolan, president of Paterson Chamber of Commerce. Subsequently plans were also made to cooperate with the Board of Missions in developing the Church Extension Fund.

Following the Diocesan Convention the Church Club gave a dinner at the Hotel Suburban, East Orange, at which the attendance was 664, this being the largest dinner ever given by the Church Club. The speakers were the Most Rev'd James DeWolf Perry, Presiding Bishop and President of the National Council; the Rt. Rev'd Wilson R. Stearly, and Mr. Lewis B. Franklin; Mr. Hulsart presiding.

On October 23rd the Club gave a post General Convention dinner to hear the reports of the Clerical and lay deputies to General Convention at which the guest speaker was the Rt. Rev'd Michael Bolton Furse, Lord Bishop of St. Albans, England; Mr. Hulsart presiding. This dinner was held at the Hotel Suburban, East Orange, and the attendance was about 200. Addresses were also made by Rt. Rev'd Wilson R. Stearly, Miss Charlotte Sawyer, Dean Dumper, Dr. Walkley, Rev'd Charles L. Gomph, and Mr. Dean Emery.

The Club records with deep regret the death of Mr. Stewart A. Trench of St. Paul's, Jersey City, who had served the Club faithfully for some years as member and Vice-President.

The membership of the Club increased during the year by 22 members.

The Treasurer's Report for the year ending October 31, 1931, shows amount on hand \$1,147.67. Expenses for the year \$2,470.81.

The Club was represented at the National Federation of Church Clubs at its Annual Meeting in Philadelphia, November 20th and 21st, by Mr. Jenner R. Fast, a member of the Executive Committee, and Mr. Hulsart.

THE ARTHUR FUND, INC.

In February, 1928, two associations, the Arthur Home and the Walker Gwynne Fund, Inc., were merged in the Arthur Fund, Inc. The purpose for which this Fund was founded is "to aid in the care, cure, nurture, and maintenance of poor and needy children and their education and religious training according to the doctrine, discipline, and worship" of the Episcopal Church.

There are six Trustees, the Bishop, Archdescon Augustine Elmendorf, the Rev'd Charles E. Hutchison, the Rev'd W. O. Kinsolving, Mr. F. A. Burlingame, and Mr. Lewis R. Conklin.

The membership of the Corporation consists of the Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor, if any, the several Archdencons of the Diocese, the Rector of Calvary Church, Summit, the incorporators (the former Trustees), and "all persons who at the date of the incorporation of this corporation were members in good standing of either or both of the two constituent corporations".

The income from the invested capital of the Fund is available for the purposes for which the association was organized.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

JANUARY 1, 1931, TO DECEMBER 31, 1931.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark.

April 13, 1931:

Consent given to the Diocese of Minnesota to elect a Bishop Coadjutor on account of the extent of Diocesan work.

To the election and consecration of Rev'd Wyatt Brown, D. D., as Bishop of the Diocese of Harrisburg.

Recommended for admission as Candidates for Holy Orders, Arthur H. Moffatt, Charles Alfred Voegeli, and George D. Hardman; Ordination to the Disconate, Robert J. Clarke, and John C. Moore; and for Ordination to the Priesthood, Charles A. Abele, and John H. Keene.

The matter of Episcopal assistance in the Diocese being introduced by the Bishop was favorably received and informally discussed.

June 15, 1931:

Consent given to the election and consecration of Rev'd Stephen Edwards Keeler, D. D., to be Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Minnesota;

To the election of a Bishop Coadjutor for the Diocese of Connecticut on the grounds of extent of work.

To the Board of Missions to transfer to the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen, of Christ Church. West Englewood, the title to their property.

The subject of an assistant to the Bishop was discussed informally,—the general feeling being that a Suffragan would meet the need at the present time.

October 26, 1931:

Consent given to the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen of the Church of the Atonement, Tenafiy, to mortgage the Rectory property for \$7,800.00 at 6%, to pay off certain notes and to fund the entire indebtedness in the mortgage.

Conditional consent given the Congregation of Holy Innocents' Mission, West Orange, to use part of its property as a Burial Ground.

The Resignation of Frank L. Crawford was accepted with regrets.

Consent given to the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen of Holy Trinity of West Orange, to mortgage Rectory property for \$15,000.00 for one year at 6% to pay off a note, and to cover taxes and expenses.

Consent given to the Board of Missions to mortgage property at Lincoln Park, Verona, and Brookdale, and to sell at Towaco:

At Lincoln Park for \$4,000.00, 3 years at 6%;

At Verona for \$17,000.00 for 3 years to finance the building of the church;

At Brookdale for \$9,000.00 for 3 years at 6% to finance the building of the church of the Advent;

At Towaco to sell for \$1,500.00 the property formerly used by the Mission.

Recommended as Candidates for Holy Orders, Revere Beasley, Morgan Tabb, and Wilson L. Pitcaithly.

Recommended for to the Diaconate, Arthur H. Moffatt.

Permission refused to change the title of St. Peter's Protestant Church of Essex Fells, N. J., to St. Peter's Protestant Episcopal Church of Caldwell and Essex Fells, N. J.

Various sums from the Hannibal Goodwin Fund, amounting to \$2,090.19, and from the Jesse Williams' Fund, to \$14,325.37, were reported by the Bishop and approved as in accordance with the bequests.

The treasurer was ordered to pay the sum of \$100.00 to the order of Rev'd William P. Taylor, from the Rebecca Goodwin Pension Fund, to be applied toward the \$1,000.00 which St. Paul's Church, East Orange, owe him as rector.

The Bishop making known his desire to secure a Bishop Coadjutor, it was resolved that steps be taken at once toward providing for permanent episcopal assistance.

November 30, 1931:

Consent was given to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties to the use of part of the property of Holy Innocents' Mission, West Orange, as a cometery.

In the matter of securing a Bishop Coadjutor the following preamble and resolution were passed:

The Rt. Rev'd Wilson R. Stearly, D. D., having made known his desire for Episcopal assistance on account of the extent of Diocesan work,

Be It Resolved, That this Committee give authorization for the sending out of a letter to the Bishops and Standing Committees of the Church asking for consent to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor on account of extent of Diocesan work, said letter to be signed by the Bishop and Secretary of the Standing Committee.

It was decided to postpone the consideration of establishing an Ecclesiastical Court in connection with the new Canon on Matrimony until after January 1.

REPORT FOR 1931 OF THE BOARD OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The Board of Religious Education has met regularly during the past year and has endeavored to provide inspiration and aids for the work of Religious Education in the Parisbes.

In Lent 1931 lectionary cards on the Gospel of St. John were provided to parishes on requisition; Lenten attendance cards were provided for the use of Schools, and service leaflets were prepared for some Schools requesting them.

The annual Lenten offerings of the Schools of the Diocese were presented at service held in Orange, Englewood, and Passaic. The amount was \$18,387.81.

A Spring meeting of the Officers and Teachers of the Schools of the Diocese was held at the Laura Augusta Home on the subject "Living Our Religion with our Pupils."

The Board supervised and fostered a week end conference for young people at the Girls' Friendly Holiday House and Eagle's Nest Farm in June.

. A Church School Convention at Grace Church, Orange, on October 17th, was well attended.

Teacher Training Courses on "Creative Teaching" were given in October and November in three centers—Jersey City, Newark and Ridgewood.

Christmas boxes were given by many of the Schools for Porto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

The annual Advent Offering was taken in most of the Schools and was given this year for the Rural Field of the Diocese.

The work of the Church Correspondence School among children and adults, in the outlying and isolated districts, has been continued under the direction of Miss Mary D. Dodge, and is doing an excellent and ever-growing work

The Board would express its appreciation of the continued devoted service of the Field Secretary, the Rev'd A. S. Hogenauer.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SOCIAL SERVICE FOR THE YEAR 1931

Seven meetings of the Board of Social Service were held during the year with an average attendance of ten.

The Board devoted the greater part of its time to the consideration of the part which the Church should play during the present social crisis. With the idea of being of assistance a list of suggestions, drawn up by the Executive Secretary and approved by the Program Committee, was sent to all Clergy within the Diocese.

Desiring to promote a better understanding of, and a greater cooperation with the local welfare agencies, the Board arranged a meeting at Grace Church Parish House, Orange, to which were invited Clergy and Ministers of all denominations together with Welfare Workers of the Oranges and Maplewood. Speeches were made by representatives of the State Emergency Relief Administration; the Essex County Welfare Director and officers of the local Welfare Agencies.

Another meeting was arranged at Grace Church Pariah House, Newark, when the city Clergy were invited to meet representatives of the State and County Boards and of the Newark Welfare agencies. In order to carry accurate information of State and County plans and to present the challenge of the community to the Church throughout the Diocese, the cooperation of the Archdeacons was sought. Thanks to their fine and ready response, four large meetings were held, with a goodly attendance of both clergy and laity.

During the year the Board has been interested in the social service opportunities presented by the work of Christ Church, Newark, and the Essex County Sanitorium at Verona. Through publicity and the cooperation of the Woman's Auxiliary, five new helpers were found for the Stansbury Memorial Guild at Christ Church, and fifteen volunteers for social service activities at the Verona Sanitorium.

In order to promote a greater interest in the work of the Institutions and Agencies of the Diocese the Board has authorized the preparing of an illustrated lecture which will be available for use in our parishes and missions. Further, in order that the members of the Board and others may have first hand knowledge of these institutions, it has been decided to make a pilgrimage to these places, similar to the visitation of the Mission Churches made by the Board of Missions and Church Extension.

A Social Service Index is being compiled at the Diocesan House so that Clergy and others interested may find information concerning Institutions and Agencies.

Through the columns of the Newark Churchman and by appeals at Archdesconry meetings and in Parishes, the Board has endeavored to assist Welfare Agencies in the city of Newark in procuring volunteer workers.

Three meetings were called by Commissioner Ellis for the purpose of improving the care by the Clergy of the several Churches of persons paroled from State Institutions. On each occasion our representatives played an active part.

Two members of the Board are serving on the Inter-Racial Commission of the Provincial Synod and have been active in its work,

During the year the Executive Secretary was authorized to attend the National Social Service Conference at Minneapolis, and the New Jersey State Conference at Trenton.

Part of the Board's Program is the consideration of the welfare needs of definite localities within the Diocese and the planning of ways by which those needs may be brought home to the communities concerned.

It was decided that no Institutes should be held during the year, but that the advisability of forming study classes should be put before the Clergy. It was thought that the subject matter for such classes might well be in a general way such as would lead the thought of our people towards better social justice.

Finding that the Church Mission of Help was in a serious financial predicament, the Board of Social Service voted to contribute the sum of \$1,000 from its reserve fund to this organization. During the year assistance has been given also, in the way of placing girls for summer vacations and in the procuring of admission into homes.

Guidance has been given to a number of clergy and other persons in such matters as homes for the aged; orphanages; hospitalization and legal difficulties.

ANNUAL REPORT.

January 1, 1931-December 31, 1931.

The year 1931 has been the busiest year in the history of C. M. H., Diocese of Newark. Unemployment has been largely responsible for the heavier responsibilities, which have been a great challenge to each member of the Staff.

The financial secretary, Miss Sprague, was successful in her campaign for raising money, but in spite of that fact a deficit was averted only by a most generous emergency gift by the Board of Social Service of the Diocese.

The Newark Welfare Federation paid only 86 1/2% of what it promised C. M. H. for the year 1931. This caused a greater deficit for the Newark work than is usual and this deficit had to be taken care of by the C. M. H. General Fund.

The Annual Meeting was held at a luncheon at the Robert Treat Hotel, Newark, on January 6th. Mrs. John M. Glenn, the President of our C. M. H. National Council, and Blahop Stearly were the speakers. On March 8th the C. M. H. Annual Service was held at Trinity Cathedral, Newark, when the Rev'd J. Gregory Mabry of St. Paul's Church, Brooklyn, was the preacher. The organist and choir of St. James' Church, Newark, most generously furnished the music. On March 22nd C. M. H. Staff members attended the Annual Diocese of New Jersey C. M. H. Retreat at St. Bernard's Church, Bernardsville, when the Rev'd and Mrs. T. A. Conover were the hosts. The Rev'd Leonard Hogdson of the General Theological Seminary was the Conductor. On March 26th C. M. H. of this Diocese had its Day of Devotion in Grace Church, Newark. The Rev'd J. O. S. Huntington, O. H. C., gave the meditations. On November 20th the Annual Volunteers' meeting took place at a luncheon at the Y. W. C. A., Newark. The guest

speakers were Mrs. John M. Glenn, Bishop Stearly and Mrs. Walter V. White, Chairman of Volunteers. This meeting was held in conjunction with the C. M. H. National Council meeting.

During the year many conferences have been attended in which Staff and Board members have participated.

Forty-six talks were given during the year by members of the Staff and Board members.

Mr. Reginald Parnell has again rendered invaluable service as our legal advisor.

During the summer 220 days of outing were given to girls and 28 days to children. Many different vacation places were used as the C. M. H. McLean Farm was not open this year for financial reasons.

On September 7th C. M. H. suffered an irreparable loss in the death of its beloved Board Member, Mrs. Emil Diebitsch. She was one of the founders of this Diocesan society and had served as a loyal and devoted member of the Board since 1918 and she was Chairman of the Case Conference Committee from 1926 until her death.

In October Mrs. George H. Danforth was elected Chairman of the Case Conference Committee.

At Christmas 960 girls and 325 children were remembered with gifts, and in some instances other members of their families received presents "in order not to make wrong-doing attractive". Volunteers generously supplied these gifts, wrapped and delivered them. One Christmas party was held in the Newark office. It was for little colored children. This party is made possible each year by the Volunteers in Christ Church, Glenridge and Bloomfield.

C. M. H. is glad to be able to report that quite a number of girls were helped spiritually during the past year.

At the close of the year 104 C. M. H. girls are unemployed. A large percentage of them have dependents,

5849 new garments and 3800 used ones were given to C. M. H. during 1931. Practically every one has been distributed,

In the Northwestern District, through the kindness of the Rev'd Donald Brookman of St. Peter's Church, Morristown, a Publicity Luncheon was held in Hackettatown in the interest of C. M. H. in Morris, Sussex and Warren Counties. 125 people attended and the guest speakers were Miss Mary Brisley of the C. M. H. National Council and Mr. Reginald Parnell, the C. M. H. attorney. In spite of the enthusiasm shown at the luncheon it became necessary to withdraw the services of C. M. H. from Warren County on November 1st, because it was impossible for Miss Olive S. Judson to carry the work there as well as in Sussex County, and the people of Warren County seemed to be unable to guarantee support for the work.

The work in Sussex County has increased enormously and now at the end of the year it is faced with the problem of obtaining a new worker as Miss Judson has resigned to become the Executive Secretary of the Central Bureau of Social Service in Morristown. Miss Judson has done an outstanding piece of work and C. M. H. can ill afford to lose her.

The Morris County work of the Northwestern District has been successfully handled by Miss Edith Moran and she has had splendid motor service from the dependable Junior Aid League of Morristown. Mrs. H. H. Rooney, who has been the office secretary in Morristown, has also resigned after 4½ years loyal service to go to the Central Bureau of Social Service in Morristown.

In Newark a special study of conditions among Negroes has been carried on by Mrs. E. R. Griffith, Social Agencies of the city are doing a shamefully small amount of work to assist that race. The C. M. H. Newark case load is 70% Negro.

The Newark office had a student from the N. Y. School of Social Work for one school term for training in field work.

Miss Margaret Stevenson and Miss Effie Richards have labored unceasingly to better conditions in Newark,

In Essex County Miss M. Lilian Day has had most excellent help from volunteers who have given motor service. The volunteers of this county gave 475 Christmas gifts, as well as money for the use of C. M. H. in Newark and in Essex County outside of Newark.

The name of the Paterson District has been changed to that of the Passaic County District.

On October first Mrs. O. T. McGregor resigned from her position as District Secretary in Passaic County to take up Red Cross work. She had been with C. M. H. for more than three years and had made a real contribution to the work. Mrs. M. R. Boynton, who for many years has been in charge of the Family Welfare Bureau, Ann Arbor, Michigan, has taken her place. Miss Ellen Barnes has been an invaluable assistant in the Paterson office.

In September the Hudson County District had a change of District Secretaries. Mrs. G. C. Bovie left to join the Department of Public Welfare in Newark and Miss Georgina R. Kinnie has taken her place. Miss Kinnie is a graduate of Syracuse University and the Smith College School of Social Work and she has had wide experience.

Bergen County work has shown real growth in the past year under the direction of the District Secretary, Miss Helen K. James, who is doing a great deal of rural as well as urban work.

Through the kindness of Mrs. Frank Enos of Englewood Mr. Daniel Pomeroy most generously gave C. M. H. \$576.00 for a new Ford car. This has been of inestimable assistance to Miss James.

During 1931 C. M. H. helped 1035 girls and 425 children. Of these girls only 136 were Episcopalians.

In closing the secretary would like to thank the Staff members, the members of the Board of Managers and of the District Committees, as well as all volunteers without whose help the work of C. M. H. could not have gone forward.

December 31, 1931, closed the fifteenth year of the Bonnie Brae Farm work for boys. The year marked a period of progress both for the boys themselves and for the administration.

The largest number of boys ever accommodated at Bonnie Brae was cared for. With an average population of 77 during the winter months and with 200 in the Bonnie Brae camp during the summer months, Bonnie Brae was able to meet, in some measure, thomany demands for admission. Careful investigation of each applicant to the permanent group gave assurance that each boy would be prepared to make an easy adjustment and would benefit by the Bonnie Brae program.

The year-round boys, in contradistinction to the summer camp group, followed a full program of work, study and recreation throughout the year. In June, nine graduated from the elementary school on the Bonnie Brae premises and entered High School in Bernardsville. Of the remaining number attending the grammar and high schools for the year, 47 were promoted to higher grades. Of those engaged in the manual training work, also in the school on the premises, special mention was given to several and credit for special effort was accorded to all. The manual training work consisting of woodworking, carpentry, sheet iron work and mechanics, was under the direction of a trained manual training teacher provided by the Bernards Township Board of Education.

The farm work was also important to the development of the boys and was participated in by all. To some the barn chores were assigned, to others care of the poultry and to still others duties in the field, care of the lawns, etc.

Besides the splendid work done by the boys in athletics, including baseball, football, basketball, etc., many other activities were entered into such as boy scout and club work, nature hikes, group games, etc. The recreation and welfare work was under the direction of a trained worker.

The camp boys, like the year-round boys, came from all parts of the state. These children were admitted for three-week periods when their places were vacated for a new in-coming group. These boys were of all denominations and came from the needlest homes. Many were neglected and undernourished. Their applications for admission were referred by churches, schools, social service agencies, probation departments, etc., throughout New Jersey.

The camp maintained four new cabins (a gift of Mr. Edwin Gould) besides eight tents. A recreation hall and a nature museum were erected on the camp premises at the beginning of the season and a group of able counsellors (all college men and experienced in boy camp work) supervised the care and activities of the boys. The season proved to be the most successful one Bonnie Brae has experienced. The undernourished children were given special attention and camp activities of all kinds were in constant operation. Each group of children spent three weeks of solid happiness under excellent training. Every child increased in weight and everyone as he left entered his plea to return next year.

As the year comes to a close, we are glad to have this opportunity to thank the many

friends who have financially helped Bonnie Brae through this difficult year. By their interest in and their cooperation with this work for the boy in want and distress, Bonnie Brae has been able to provide a year of genuine service.

REPORT OF THE EAGLE'S NEST FARM COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR 1931.

The attendance at Eagle's Nest Farm during the season of 1931 was the best in the history of the camp. This was particularly encouraging in view of the general economic condition throughout the country.

Two important additions were made to the building equipment through the erection of a very fine recreation building for the members of the staff, and a very necessary addition to the administration building. The addition made to the infirmary in 1930 was most timely, due to the increased use of the infirmary through the larger camp enrollment. Since the close of the 1931 season an addition has been made to the camp kitchen and plans are now being developed for a further addition to the infirmary.

Mention should also be made of the new state highway which was started during the past season. This road leaves the present Route No. 6 at the southern boundary of the camp, and proceeds diagonally across the eastern portion of our camp property, and thence over the property to the north of it until it finally underpasses the present toll bridge and railroad bridge over the river, and proceeds thence up the Jersey side of the river to Columbia. The purchase by the state of part of our property for this road has made necessary a readjustment of our athletic field.

Again our interesting Camp Reunion was held in Christmas week, this time at St. Andrew's, South Orange, with an attendance of over one hundred and sixty. There is no doubt that the Christmas week Reunion is an established institution in the life of Eagle's Nest Farm.

We record with sorrow the death in November of Miss Ellen Cummins, one of the donors of the property at Eagle's Nest Farm. The farm property was the joint gift of Miss Cummins and her cousin, Miss Albertson, but to date most of the activities of the camp, as well as the Holiday House, have been centered on the property given by Miss Cummins.

An examination of the financial statement covering the actual camp operations shows that with the fee on the basis of \$11 per week, the total receipts in fees for both boys' and girls' camps amounted to \$13,475.80, with total receipts from all other sources, including transfers, amounting to over \$19,000. Under disbursements, the largest item has to do with the commissary department, with a total expenditure of \$6,790.44. The total disbursements for all purposes amounted to over \$18,000.

There are still various items of equipment which would be helpful in making the operations of the camp more efficient, as well as more helpful, to the boys and girls who come to us as campers. Nevertheless, judging by the season of 1931, it would seem that the Diocesan camp is doing a real piece of work in providing a fine vacation for many of the boys and girls in northern New Jersey.

REPORT OF BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The Board of Missions has held nine meetings during the calendar year 1931.

During the meeting of January 21st, plans and specifications were presented for a Church building for the Mission of the Advent at Brookdale; after consideration it was ordered that the same be sent out for estimate.

Report was also made that the new Church building for St. Martin's at Maywood, a heautiful structure, has been turned over by the contractors as complete, at a cost of about \$24,000.

Meeting, February 25th—Estimates for the Church building for the Church of the Advent at Brookdale were considered, the prices in general were approved and the Committee was ordered continued with "power" to place the contract.

Application was made by the congregation of Mission of the Holy Spirit at Verona for a church to be erected upon land recently purchased. General approval was given and the Committee having the matter in charge was instructed to have in mind that the building should be of brick and the type of architecture to be in harmony with the public buildings near by, in what is known as the Civic Centre of Verona.

The following resolution on the death of Decatur M. Sawyer was unanimously adopted and ordered spread in full upon the Minutes:

"The death of Decatur M. Sawyer has taken from this Board one of its most faithful members and in his passing this Board desires to record its appreciation of his long and earnest services in the Missionary work and extension of the Kingdom of God in the Diocess of Newark. Of a gentle, yet foreful nature, he placed at the disposal of this Board his extensive business experience and knowledge of men, particularly the under privileged and those in the hard places of life. His broad vision was always an encouragement to those starting new undertakings, and his counsel and advice was ever sought after and followed. His passing has left a vacancy in this Board that will be hard to fill."

In the matter of Blanket Public Liability insurance report was made that the Rating Bureau had fixed a minimum rate of \$4.16 for Rectories and \$16.66 for Church buildings. It was ordered that all of the Board's properties be so insured.

March 18th-At this meeting report was made by the Building Committee for Mission of the Advent stating that the Banks did not care to entertain any "Construction Loans" but would make a mortgage loan after the building was completed.

It was felt by all the members present that the need of a Church building was most targent.

It was therefore moved and carried that this Board finance the whole building to completion and afterward negotiate a reasonable mortgage.

April 22nd—At this meeting the officers were authorized to execute a Petition asking for consent from the Standing Committee to transfer two titles to property in West Englewood held for Christ Mission to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Christ Church, West Englewood, N. J.

May 20th—On this day the members of the Board visited the following stations in Bergen County:

Lyndhurst, Secaucus, Fairview, Ridgefield, Grandview, Edgewater, Fort Lee, South Englewood, Cedar Park, Phelps Manor, Bogota and Maywood. At this latter place, through the courtesy of the Vicar and the Executive Committee, arrangements had been made for us to hold our regular monthly meeting, after which we sat down to a delightful supper served by the ladies of this Church.

June 24th—The Building Committee for Verona made report that the lowest estimates for the new Pariah house amounted to \$21,500. The plan to finance being a mortgage in the sum of \$17,000 and a loan of \$4,500 from this Board. Much thought and time had been given to this project; all details were well planned out so that the Board heartily approved and ordered the work of construction to be started.

At this time St. Andrew's, Lincoln Park, presented its plans and estimates for a new Parish house. It was ordered that a Committee be appointed to study and arrange the matter of finances for this project.

October 21st—At this meeting the officers were ordered to make the following mortgages:

\$9,000.—In the interest of the Church of the Advent, Brookdale, to the Watchung Title and Mortgage Guaranty Co. with an amortization agreement to pay \$500.00 on principal each year. Interest at rate of six per cent.

\$4,000.—In the interest of Church of St. Andrews, Lincoln Park, to Maud Ranges. Interest at rate of six per cent.

An offer was received from Howard Beckman to buy the old Mission property at Towaco. He offered \$1,500 for it. The place being of no further use to us, it was felt best to sell at this price to him. The proper officers were thereupon ordered to make and execute the deed as soon as approved by the Bishop and Standing Committee.

November 18th—Report was made that the new buildings for Church of the Advent, Brookdale, and Church of the Holy Spirit, Verona, were finished and in use.

December 16th—Bishop Stearly brought up for discussion the need of enlarging the purpose of the Bishop's Church Extension Fund. He called attention to the fact that the original purpose of this Fund was very limited but as the years rolled on, its use and benefits had been widened and changed until now it aids in the acquisition of land, parish houses, rectories and church buildings—that there will be less need to establish as many new places in the Diocese in the future as in the past, but there is, however, an increasing need for financial assistance to weak Missions to pay debts on land and premises.

All of the members were in hearty agreement that the scope and purpose of the Extension Fund be so enlarged that help might be extended to Missions to pay such debts. It was thereupon moved and carried that recommendation be made to the Bishop to extend the purpose of the Church Extension Fund so as to include payment of debts on land and premises, for capital purposes, but not to pay for repairs or current expenses,

REPORT OF THE TREASURER OF THE BISHOP'S CHURCH EXTENSION FUND.

The Bishop's Church Extension Fund has been in active operation during the year 1931 and has assisted in the purchase of ground, in the building and enlargement of churches, parish houses and in the reduction of debts of missions.

The accounts for the year ended December 31, 1931, were audited by Messrs. E. A. S. Brown and Stuart B. O'Reilley. The income during the year was \$21,352.30 and the disbursements being calls \$5,500.00 and expenses of stationery, printing, etc., \$177.26.

Loans made to missions amounted to \$21,500.00.

The Bishop's Church Extension Fund has now been in existence since the first call of \$500.00, which was made on behalf of St. George's Church, Passaic, on June 15, 1910. To December 31, 1931, 111 calls have been made representing \$117,825.00 given to various churches and missions in the Diocese. It is enteresting to note that out of a total of 160 parishes and missions, 76 of them have during this period been assisted either by loans or gifts in calls.

The first loan made by the Bishop's Church Extension Fund was that of \$500 on March 5, 1914, and was for the purchase of land at North Arlington. Since then loans to the amount of \$102,921.52 have been made, of which \$35,494.13 have been returned, leaving outstanding as at December 31, 1931, \$67,427.39.

I regret to say that during the year 1931, the number of subscribers of this Fund have decreased by 26, the value of such subscribers being \$144.50 a call.

By invitation of the Bishop, the members of the Finance and Advisory Board sat in at this meeting.

Report was made of the death of Dr. Archibald Mercer, a charter member of this General Chapter. Mr. Henry J. Russell was elected to fill his unexpired term on the Chapter.

The Chair stated that the purpose of this meeting was to give consideration and action to the report of the Committee appointed to obtain options to purchase lands for the Cathedral site. He then called upon the Committee for report.

Mr. John Fletcher in making his report called attention to certain maps, provided at hand for the members present and therefrom traced the location of the whole property under consideration and mentioned in detail the area of each separate parcel. Mr. Henry J. Russell spoke in detail about the terms and conditions of each option to purchase in the hands of the Committee.

Free and open discussion then followed, the subject being considered from all angles, character of the ground, accessibility, general use and fitness as a location for a Diocesan Centre and cost.

The Chair then stated that the proposition before the meeting was whether or not we should exercise our rights to purchase the various tracts as stipulated in the several "options" in hand, and if ready for a vote, would ask that a separate vote be taken by the members of the Finance and Advisory Board present and also one by the General Cathedral Chapter members.

On call by the Chair, the members of the Finance and Advisory Board voted unanimously in favor of purchasing all of the tracts on the proposed site. The members of the Cathedral General Chapter then also voted unanimously to acquire the said site as shown on the Maps.

The following resolution was then offered, seconded and carried:

Resolved, That the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties are hereby requested to purchase and take title to the property in Cedar Grove, N. J., as shown and described by Maps and options presented today to the General Cathedral Chapter, for the use as a Cathedral site and other Diocesan institutions, at an approximate cost of \$58,000.00, and to make payments for this property from the "Diocesan House Fund."

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FIELD DEPARTMENT. 1931.

The Field Department of the Diocese respectfully reports to the Convention that it met three times during 1931 on January 20th, May 7th and June 9th. The Department was organized with Mr. Walter Kidde as Chairman; Mr. Charles B. Johnes, Vice-Chairman; and the Rev'd George W. Dawson as Executive Secretary; and had a memberahip of forty-six men.

ACTIVITIES.

The activities of the Department were as follows:

Assignment of Parishes: Each member of the Department was assigned from one to four parishes in which he was to assist with the Loyalty Month Campaign as requested.

Treasurer's Dimer: The Department invited the Treasurers of all Parishes and Missions to attend a dinner in Grace Church Parish House, Orange, on June 2nd, 1931. Some sixty Treasurers were present. A silver loving cup was presented to Col. Allan B. Wallace, retiring Treasurer of the Finance and Advisory Board of the Diocese. The speech of presentation was made by Col. Leigh K. Lydecker. The new Treasurer, Mr. Edward C. Stanley, Jr., was introduced by Bishop Stearly. Mr. Charles H. Baldwin responded to a call for a speech as coming from one of the Treasurers present. The Executive Secretary of the Department spoke on, "The Qualities of a Good Treasurer," and the Bishop in his concluding remarks stressed the importance of good cooperation.

Laymen's Conference: The Annual Laymen's Conference was held at the Girls' Friendly Society Holiday House, Delaware, N. J., on September 12th and 13th. The conference was attended by ninety-three men representing thirty-three parishes and missions. The faculty consisted of the Ven. W. O. Leslie, Jr., Archdeacon of Newark; Rev'd Allen Evans, Jr., Rector of Trinity Church, Hewlett, Long Island, and Chairman of the Field Department, Diocese of Long Island; the Rev'd W. J. White; the Rev'd George W. Dawson, and Mr. Walter Kidde. Archdeacon Leslie acted as Chaplain, conducting the Devotional periods and celebrated the Holy Communion. The Rev'd Allen Evans, Jr., spoke on the Meaning and Need of Domestic Missions, and the Meaning and Need of Missions Abroad. Archdeacon Leslie and Canon White gave an illustrated lecture on the Missions of the Diocese. The Rev'd G. W. Dawson, Executive Secretary of the Field Department of the Diocese, delivered a lecture on "Guiding Principles for Lay Readers and Speakers", and also spoke on the nature and origin of the Church's Program.

Loyalty Month: The Field Department in 1931 adopted the plan of observing a "Loyalty Month". This involved the setting aside of the period from October 11th to November 1st. The four Sundays included were known as "Parlah Sunday", Diocesan Sunday", "General Church Sunday", and "Presentation Sunday".

Literature: For use during Loyalty Month the Field Department prepared a sixteen page booklet under three main divisions, namely "A Churchman's Loyalty to His Parish", "A Churchman's Loyalty to His Diocese", and "A Churchman's Loyalty to His Church as a Whole". The booklet carried a foreword written by Bishop Stearly and was illustrated by eighteen pictures. Thirty-one thousand copies were distributed among the parishes and missions. The following National Council literature was also used: 27,000 copies "Along God's Highway"; 23,500 copies "Couriers"; 1,000 "Churchman Goes Canvassing"; and 39,000 Pledge Cards.

Parish Chairmen: The Department was notified of the appointment of Parish Chairmen by one hundred and twenty-eight Parishes and Missions.

Speakers: In cooperation with the National Speaker's Bureau, the Field Department made speaking engagements in the Diocese for the following persons: Bishop Huntington of Anking; Bishop Nichols of Kyoto; Bishop Schmuck of Wyoming; Bishop McKim of Tokyo; Bishop Colmore of Porto Rico; Rev'd R. W. Trapnell of the National Council; Rev'd C. H. Collett of the National Council; Rev'd John W. Chapman, D.D., formerly of Anvik, Alaska; Rev'd Franklin J. Clark, Secretary of National Council. These speakers took care of fifteen speaking engagements. The following men of the Field Department and Diocese also took speaking engagements: Col. L. K. Lydecker, Mr. Charles B. Johnes, Mr. Henry J. Russell, Mr. Dean Emery, Mr. A. P. Green, Mr. John O. Muller, Mr. Sidney T. Baker, Mr. T. F. Tunsted, and the Rev'd A. T. Doughty.

Activities of Executive Secretary covering period from June to December, 1931.

Your Secretary begs to report that he made appeals for the support of the Diocese and General Church in twenty-six Parishes and Missions on Sundays. On week days he spoke on behalf of the Department's work at four Archdeaconry meetings and preached at one service in connection with the District meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary. He made appeals for support of the work in seventeen parishes and missions and gave advice as to methods. He was one of the speakers at the Regional Dinners in Sussex and Warren Counties and also at the Laymen's Conference.

Twelve visits were made on week days to individual clergymen for the purpose of advising them as to their observance of Loyalty Month and methods of canvass. Eleven other Clergy were advised along these lines through office conferences.

Your Secretary also delivered the illustrated lecture on the Missions of the Diocess on four occasions.

During the summer the Loyalty Month booklet was prepared and sent to the printer with the result that they began to make delivery of 30,000 copies on the first day of September.

A plea for greater cooperation: It has been a matter of great difficulty for this Department to make an intelligent and useful report to the Bishop and Finance and Advisory Board at the end of the year by reason of the fact that a comparatively small number of the parishes and missions had sent in reports of what they expected to contribute for the support of the Diocese and General Church. In each parish the Rector and Vestry know how difficult it is to plan a budget for the ensuing year if the pledges for support from their parishloners have not been made. This Department would respectfully and very earnestly ask that all clergy and parish officials would give serious thought to the difficulty in which the Diocese finds itself when, at the end of the year, reports have been received from only a small number of parishes and missions.

REPORT OF DIOCESAN LIBRARIAN.

1931.

The Librarian made a report to the Diocesan Convention on May 12th, 1931, which described the condition of the Diocesan Library at that time. Since the Convention was held, Mr. George I. Wichman, Registrar of the Diocese, has done much fine work in the Library. He has catalogued 6,798 volumes, making three cards for each volume, and has arranged these cards in cabinets for ready reference. He has also rebound or repaired 300 books which were in bad condition, thus making them more attractive in appearance and more usable. A collection of about 1,500 sermons by Bishop Lines has been made available. Many interesting pamphlets, Journals, and old papers have been made accessible in cabinets. The clergy and laity of the Diocese have not taken advantage of the Library to any large extent this year. But it is hoped that a wider acquaintance with its contents will lead more men to resort to it for research and reading. Gifts of money for the purchase of new books would be much appreciated.

REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR. 1931.

The Registrar begs leave to report that during the past year an effort has been made to secure a fuller collection of the Journals of the various dioceses and missionary districts. As a result, there are now on file eighty-seven, of which seventy-two are for the year 1931. These are at the disposal of those who may wish to refer to them.

Our chaplain writes a letter each month to every member of our Branch.

The nurses are Chairmen of all the committees and the co-operation in every thing we undertake is most gratifying.

The fine attendance each time at our meetings proves their interest in the Guild.

GERTRUDE BUTTS MEMORIAL HOME ASSOCIATION.

This Association was incorporated under the laws of the State of New Jersey in 1929 for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the will of the late George W. Butts of the City of Hoboken. This will provided among other things for the creation of a charitable corporation in New Jersey for the purpose of acquiring and erecting a permanent home in the Diocese of Newark for the care, support and education, including healthful and social pleasures, of orphan, half orphan and destitute children.

In due course, the Association became the owners of securities comprising the residuary estate of George W. Butts, which at the time of its incorporation were said to have a market value of approximately \$1,000,000.

The Trustees of the Association under the terms of the will shall be vestrymen in Protestant Episcopal churches in the Diocese of Newark, and each church may be represented by one of its vestrymen. The by-laws provide that the Honorary President of the Association shall be the Bishop of the Diocese of Newark.

The Trustees found that the securities which it received under the terms of the will were all of one kind, namely the stock of a well known and highly regarded Trust Company in New Jersey. In common with the securities of similar institutions, the market value of this stock has fallen materially, and this fact together with the difficulty which would naturally attend the selling of so large a block of stock, has in the judgment of the Trustees precluded a diversification of the Association's holdings up to the present time. The dividends on this stock have, however, been maintained and from the reports of the Trust Company the book value has been estimated by our Treasurer at over \$600,000. The dividends, now slightly exceeding \$30,000 a year, have been accumulating, until our assets as of April 10, 1932, were \$90,678.92, and are held in the form of guaranteed and high grade mortgage bonds, municipal short term securities and cash, and the annual income from all these sources, including the inheritance, exceeds \$35,000 a year.

The Trustees, while desirous of promptly carrying out the provisions of the will, have felt that until such time as its capital account can be invested in a diversified list of securities which can be counted upon with reasonable certainty to produce an assured income, it would be unwise to embark upon the establishment of a permanent home with the attendant obligations of operation and maintenance. However, the Board has been diligent in making studies as to the needs for a home and proposes to exercise its trusteeship as soon as favorable opportunity arises.

In the meantime, the Board has felt that without endangering its ability to carry out the terms of the will and in view of the clear intention of the donor that provision should be made for the care, support and education of needy and destitute children, it has taken steps to use some of its income for these purposes. To this end, the Trustees have appropriated \$20,000 for use during 1932 to assist various children's agencies which have been thoroughly investigated and recommended by the Social Service Department of the Diocese. This fund of \$20,000 is being dishursed through the agency of a committee of your association with Mr. Charles B. Johnes as Chairman. Mr. Johnes has been assisted by a number of trustees who as a Work Committee are investigating with great thoroughness all cases brought to their attention.

The Trustees are pleased to report that even though the establishment of a permanent home has not been accomplished, it is possible for them to in some measure assist in the alleviation of distress and suffering which are so prevalent at the present time.

It is to be regretted that this report could not be presented to you by our President, the Hon. J. W. Rufus Besson, whose health unfortunately does not permit him to prepare it.
