CANON 1, § II.

OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES

From a Parish.

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election, in the following form:

[*Name of the Church, the Place, and Date.*]

This certifies that at a meeting of the congregation of this Church, held for the purpose of electing Church Officers, and Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention (*or for the purpose of electing Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, if the meeting be for that object alone*), A. B., C. D., and E. F., being communicants of the Church in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Deputies; and B. C., D. E., and F. G., also being communicants in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Alternate Deputies to represent the Parish in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand (*or if two Wardens subscribed, we have set our hands*), the day and year above written.

N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary sign, then the signatures of *both* Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-in-charge, *or* Missionary, may not sign.

From a Mission.

N. B.—Use the same form and substitute the word "Mission" for "Parish" in three places. The Minister-in-charge; or, the Clerk; or, the Warden may sign.

Memoranda:

Not more than three Deputies are allowed from each Parish, and Mission.

Three Alternate Deputies must be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies.

Write Christian names in FULL and LEGIBLY.

Blank forms will be sent by the Secretary of the Convention on or before Easter Monday in each year.

Return Certificates of Election at least ONE MONTH before Convention.

Deputies must be *Communicants of the Church, and also qualified voters in the Parish or Mission which elects them.* (See Canon 6, § II, [4], [5] and [6].)

Rules of Order

THE CONVENTION.

1. The Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. The Convention shall meet on the opening day at 9:30 a. m.; with a recess of one hour between 1 and 2 o'clock.
3. At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
4. At the close of each Convention, the Minutes shall be corrected and approved.
5. The doors of the Convention shall be open for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
6. All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convention shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall record their attendance.
7. Clergymen of other Dioceses, and Candidates for Holy Orders, who may be present, shall be admitted to honorary seats in the Convention on the presentation of their names to the Secretary.
8. When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
9. When any member is about to speak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
10. No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply), in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
11. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
12. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate, but any member may appeal from the decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention. The general procedure of the Convention shall be governed, unless otherwise provided for, by the rules of parliamentary practice as set forth in "Roberts' Rules of Order."
13. A Committee consisting of the Bishop, ex-officio, five other clergymen and five laymen, to be known as the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, shall be appointed at each Convention to prepare the official Ballots and the Calendar of Business, for the next Annual Convention.

The mode of conducting the nominations and elections of all Committees, Commissions and Boards and all other elective officers not otherwise provided for, shall be as follows:

Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations must place in the hands of the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, in writing, on or before noon of the Tuesday in the week preceding the opening day of the meeting thereof, nominations signed by himself for any or all officers mentioned in the above paragraph. Each nominator must certify to the Elections and Rules of Order Committee that the persons nominated by him have consented to the nomination. All names so sent in shall be reported to the Convention by the Committee, at the beginning of the opening session, in the form of a ballot, on which the names shall be arranged alpha-

betically in each class. After each list of nominations as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks may be filled by any voter. The voter shall mark with an X at the right of the name of each person for whom he votes. On the first ballot these ballots only shall be used, and also in all subsequent ballots, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. No ballot shall be counted in its class, on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled, and the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast.

The Secretary of the Convention shall call for nominations in his usual notice of the date and place of the Annual Convention, and shall, in the same notice, advertise the person or persons designated by said Committee, to whom such nominations shall be sent, with mailing addresses.

The members of the Convention shall also be requested, in said call, to send to this Committee any canonical amendments or other important items of business that they may propose to introduce at the next Convention, so that such matters may be assigned a place on the Calendar of Business. This call shall also be annually inserted in the April number of the official Magazine of the Diocese, *THE NEWARK CHURCHMAN*.

Balloting shall take place in a separate room when practicable.

The clerical and lay voting lists shall be divided into two sections each.

14. Four or more Election Tellers, clerical and lay, in equal numbers, not necessarily members of the Convention, shall be appointed by the President before an election. They shall receive and canvass all votes cast at any election which is required to be by ballot, and when such canvass is completed, shall immediately report its result to the Convention. The polls shall be open for such time as the Convention may, by resolution, direct.
15. All reports (usually printed in the *JOURNAL*), of officers, committees, commissions, and boards of trustees under control of the Convention, shall be printed and distributed by the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order as far as practicable, at least two weeks before the meeting of the Convention; provided that the subject of such printing and reports shall have been referred to the Finance and Advisory Board for consideration, which Board shall have power to supervise, regulate, or to condense the same, and to issue to the Committee or to the Secretary of the Convention such instructions as in the judgment of the said Board will promote greater economy and efficiency in respect to this work.

Reports when read in Convention shall be read by title only, unless the reading be for the better transaction of business.

NEW BUSINESS.

16. All new business introduced, except such as may accompany and form a part of a report of a committee, shall be in the form of a motion or resolution and shall be in writing.

COMMITTEES.

17. All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered. It shall be the duty of the Secretary promptly to notify the members of all special committees of their appointment.
18. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.

MOTIONS AND THEIR ORDER.

19. No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the *JOURNAL*.

20. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it; or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
21. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.

VOTING PRIVILEGES.

22. All questions shall be decided *viva voce*, unless otherwise specially ordered.
23. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote of the Convention shall be taken by Orders, voting separately; and, when a vote is thus taken a concurrent majority in both Orders shall be necessary to carry any measure.

JOURNAL

The Sixty-first Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark, New Jersey, following the custom instituted two years ago was opened with a Pre-Convention service in Grace Church, Orange, New Jersey, on the evening of Monday, May twentieth, in the year of Our Lord Nineteen Hundred and Thirty-five at eight-fifteen o'clock.

The Choir of Grace Church led the procession of the Clergy of the Diocese, the Delegates to the Convention and the representatives of the various Boards, Commissions and Organizations of the Diocese.

The Rector of Grace Church, Orange, the Reverend Charles T. Walkley, D.D., read the opening sentences and the Psalm; the Lesson was read by the Very Reverend Arthur Dumper, D.D., Dean of Trinity Cathedral, Newark; the Bishop Coadjutor led in the recitation of the Creed; the Prayers were said by the Venerable Malcolm A. Shipley, Archdeacon of Jersey City and a member of the Standing Committee. The Bishop Coadjutor, the Right Reverend Benjamin M. Washburn, D.D., read his third annual Episcopal Address to the Convention in which he drew attention to the resignation of the Diocesan, the Right Reverend Wilson R. Stearly, D.D., as having been presented to the Presiding Bishop to be acted upon at the next meeting of the House of Bishops, to the desire of the Bishops for episcopal assistance by the election of a Suffragan Bishop in the near future, and to the qualifications necessary for the post of Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Newark; he also stressed the pressing problems in world affairs as now confronting the Christian brotherhood throughout the world; and finally the setting up of the Forward Movement within the Church as a means of bringing the fellowship into closer harmony and unity for the realization of Christ's Kingdom in the world.

The Bishop of the Diocese said the final prayers, and pronounced the Benediction.

On the morning of Tuesday, May twenty-first, nineteen hundred and thirty-five, the Convention was opened with the Celebration of the Holy Communion at nine-thirty o'clock; the Bishop Coadjutor being the Celebrant, assisted by the Reverend Charles T. Walkley, D.D., Rector of Grace Church, Orange; the Venerable William O. Leslie, Jr., Archdeacon of Newark; the Reverend Canon George W. Dawson and the Reverend A. Stewart Hogenauer. The Bishop of the Diocese, the Right Reverend Wilson R. Stearly, D. D., pronounced the Benediction.

The business session of the Convention was called to order at ten-thirty o'clock with the Right Reverend Benjamin M. Washburn, D.D., Bishop Coadjutor in the Chair.

The Chairman directed the Secretary of the Convention to ascertain if a

constitutional quorum was present in each order. The same being ascertained the Sixty-first Convention was declared in order to transact business.

The first order of business being the election of a Secretary of the Convention the Ven. William O. Leslie, Jr. renominated the Reverend J. Fred Hamblin, which was duly seconded.

It was moved and carried that the nominations be closed, and that the Chair cast one ballot for the election, and the Reverend J. Fred Hamblin was declared duly elected Secretary of the Convention.

The Secretary appointed the Reverend Peter R. Deckenbach as Assistant Secretary, and the appointment was approved by the Convention.

The Chairman of the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, the Reverend Harold G. Willis, presented the following report of that Committee and recommended its adoption by this Convention:

REPORT: COMMITTEE ON ELECTIONS AND RULES OF ORDER.

To the Sixty-first Annual Convention, Diocese of Newark:

Your Committee, appointed by the authority of the Sixtieth Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark, met at the Diocesan House on January 22, 1935, and herewith submits its report, together with a calendar of business and rules of order for the governance of the Convention.

That Tuesday, May 21st, in the year of our Lord 1935, having been appointed by the Bishops of the Diocese as the opening day of the Convention, the recommendations of your committee are:

1. That a Pre-Convention Service be held the evening before the assembling of the Convention and that the arrangements for such service be left with the Bishops of the Diocese.
2. That the invitation of the Rector, Wardens and Vestry of Grace Church, Orange, to hold the sessions of the Convention at Grace Church be accepted; that with the consent of the Rector of Grace Church the service of Holy Communion be held in the Church at 9:30 o'clock on the morning of the first day and that all business sessions be held in the Church.
3. That the Convention be governed by the rules of order and calendar of business adopted by the Convention of 1934, with the following exceptions:
 - (1) That the Bishops' addresses be made at the convenience of the Bishops
 - (2) That the report of the Finance and Advisory Board be made the order of business immediately following luncheon recess; and that the report be distributed to the members of the Convention at the morning session.

4. That Mr. John Fletcher, and if unable to act, Mr. David Valentine, Alternate, be authorized to receive nominations and to prepare ballots for the various officers and committees to be elected by the Convention.
5. That the Secretary of the Convention be directed to publish the Convention Call in the February issue of the *Newark Churchman* and to mail the same to the parishes and missions the latter part of March; that he also be authorized to arrange with the Rector of Grace Church, Orange, the luncheon on the day of the Convention.

At this time the Chairman announced his gratification in the presence at the Convention of the Bishop of Diocese, and that the Bishop has appointed the Venerable Victor W. Mori to read the Episcopal Address of the diocesan. (The address is printed elsewhere in this Journal.)

The Reverend Doctor Gomph was recognized by the Chair, and he presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Chairman of the Convention be requested to appoint a Committee to draw up a suitable minute on the prospective retirement of Bishop Stearly, to be presented to the Convention later in the day, and to propose a resolution instructing the Standing Committee promptly to petition the Bishops and the Standing Committees of the various Dioceses for consent to elect a Suffragan Bishop as required by the Canons of the Church.

Doctor Gomph moved the adoption of the above resolution. The same was unanimously adopted by the Convention.

The Chairman appointed the following Committee to draw up the minute, and resolutions:

The Reverend Dr. Charles L. Gomph, the Reverend Robert W. Trenbath and Mr. Henry Young.

The question of the rights of delegates of several parishes and missions which have not filed Certificates of Lay Deputies, and also parishes and missions which have not met the Diocesan Assessments for the past two years was ordered referred to the Committee on Certificates of Lay Deputies for report early in the Convention.

The following Committee on the Rights of Clerical Members was nominated:

On motion the nominations were ordered closed and the Secretary directed to cast one ballot. The Chair declared them duly elected.

On motion the nominations were ordered closed and the Secretary directed to cast one ballot. The Chair declared them duly elected.

The following Committee on Constitution and Canons was nominated by the Reverend Doctor Gomph:

It was moved and carried that the nominations be closed, and the Secretary directed to cast one ballot for their election. The Chair declared them duly elected.

It was moved and carried that the first ballot on the Annual Elections be taken. The polls were opened at 10:50 o'clock and closed at 11:05 o'clock.

The following letter from the House of Bishops was read by the Secretary of the Convention:

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY

In accordance with the action of the House of Bishops in General Convention at Atlantic City, New Jersey, in October, 1934, notice is hereby given to the Bishops of all Dioceses and Missionary Districts and to all Secretaries of Dioceses and Convocations of the reaffirmation by the House of Bishops of the action of the General Convention of 1913, upon the definition of the word "Communicant", as hereinafter follows; and of the request that this action be made known to their next Diocesan Convention or Missionary Convocation:

"The Joint Committee appointed in 1907, and continued in 1910, to report a plan for the uniform registration of 'Communicants,' respectfully reports that it has given the matter careful consideration, and is of the opinion that the different aspects of the ques-

tion are admirably covered by the report made in 1907 by a similar Committee of the House of Deputies, to which they beg leave to refer. It will be found on pages 231 to 233 of the Journal of that year. We agree with all that is there said defining a 'Communicant' as one who has received Baptism and Confirmation, or has been formally admitted to the Holy Communion as being 'ready and desirous to be confirmed.' We reiterate that all such should be enrolled and kept upon the Parish Register until death, transfer or discipline removes the name."

"Neglect of the privilege of receiving the Sacrament, long absence, or even departure without a letter is not sufficient reason for erasing a name, as the person may reappear or ask for transfer after many years. His *rights* as a potential Communicant should be scrupulously conserved. On the other hand, parochial reports should not be padded with misleading statistics. To *enumerate* all these non-effective members is to exaggerate the real strength of the Parish. Communicants known to have neglected for three years the reception of the Holy Communion, in spite of due and sufficient opportunity therefor, should not be reported for statistical purposes. But, as above suggested, nothing but death, transfer or discipline should justify the removal of a name from the Register."

The above report was adopted by the concurrent action of both Houses of the General Convention of 1913.

Report No. 2 of the Committee on Evangelism of the General Convention with certain resolutions attached thereto was read to the Convention as directed by the Secretary of General Convention. The Chair referred this matter to the Committee on Forward Movement to be appointed later in the day.

The following communication from the General Convention was presented:-

To the Ecclesiastical Authorities of the Church and to the Diocesan Secretaries:

In compliance with the requirements of Canon 49, Section 1 (iv) notice is hereby given to the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Church in every Diocese and Missionary District, as well as to the Secretary of the Convention of every Diocese, that the following alterations of the Constitution, proposed in the Convention of 1934, are to be finally acted upon in the General Convention of 1937, in accordance with Article XI of the Constitution.

Furthermore, each Diocesan Secretary is hereby notified that it is his duty to make known such proposed alterations of the Constitution to the Convention of his Diocese at its next meeting, and to certify to the Secretary of the House of Deputies that such action has been taken by him.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION PROPOSED AT THE GENERAL CONVENTION OF 1934, AND TO BE FINALLY ACTED UPON AT THE CONVENTION OF 1937.

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted by the next General Convention in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution:

Amend Article I., Section 3, of the Constitution by striking out from the sixth line thereof the word "the", and in the seventh line thereof the words "entitled to vote in the House of Bishops"; and by inserting after the word "Bishops" the words "excluding retired Bishops not present"; so that said sentence shall read as follows:

"The House of Bishops shall choose one of the Bishops of this Church to be the Presiding Bishop of the Church by a vote of a majority of all Bishops, excluding retired Bishops not present, except that whenever two-thirds of the House of Bishops are present a majority vote shall suffice, such choice to be subject to confirmation by the House of Deputies."

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted by the next General Convention in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution:

Amend Article II., Section 4, so that the first sentence thereof shall read as follows:

"It shall be lawful for a Diocese, with consent of the Bishop of that Diocese, to elect one or more Suffragan Bishops, without right of succession, and with seat and vote in the House of Bishops, except as otherwise provided in the Constitution."

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted by the next General Convention in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution:

Amend Article VI., Section 2, so that the second paragraph thereof shall read as follows:

"Any territorial jurisdiction or any part of the same, which may have been accepted from a Diocese by the General Convention under the foregoing provision, may be retroceded to the said Diocese by such joint action of all the several parties as is herein required for its cession, save that in the case of retrocession of territory the consent of parishes within the territory retroceded shall not be necessary; provided that such action of the General Convention, whether of cession or retrocession, shall be by a vote of two-thirds of all the Bishops present and voting and by a vote of two-thirds of the House of Deputies voting by orders."

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted by the next General Convention in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution:

Amend Article X. so that the second sentence thereof shall read as follows:

"No alteration thereof or addition thereto shall be made unless the same shall be first proposed in one triennial meeting of the General Convention and by a resolve thereof be sent within six months to the Secretary of the Convention of every Diocese and of the Convocation of every Missionary District within the boundaries of the United States of America, to be made known to the Diocesan Convention or Missionary District Convocation at its next meeting, and be adopted by the General Convention at its next succeeding triennial meeting by a majority of all Bishops, excluding retired Bishops not present, of the whole number of Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies and all the Missionary Districts within the boundaries of the United States, voting by orders, each Diocese having one vote in the Clerical order and one vote in the Lay order, and each Missionary District having a one-fourth vote in the Clerical order and a one-fourth vote in the Lay order."

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted by the next General Convention in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution:

Amend Article XI. to read as follows:

"No alteration or amendment of this Constitution shall be made unless the same shall be first proposed at one triennial meeting of the General Convention and by a resolve thereof be sent to the Secretary of the Convention of every Diocese, to be made known to the Diocesan Convention at its next meeting, and be adopted by the General Convention at its next succeeding triennial meeting by a majority of all Bishops, excluding retired Bishops

not present, of the whole number of Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies voting by orders."

The Chair referred the above communication to the Committee on Constitution and Canons for their consideration and report at the next Convention.

The following resolution was offered by the Reverend Theodore R. Ludlow, D.D.

Resolved, That in response to the address of the Bishop Coadjutor suggesting that the Diocese of Newark should make provision for carrying on The Forward Movement the Convention hereby requests the Bishop Coadjutor to appoint a suitable committee for the accomplishment of this purpose, and, at his discretion, to draw upon the membership of the Woman's Auxiliary and other Diocesan organizations.

It was moved and carried that the above resolution be and hereby is adopted.

The following resolutions were offered by the Ven Victor W. Mori :

1. That the opening session of the Convention be held at five o'clock on the Monday evening preceding the second Tuesday of May.
2. That the organization of the Convention, appointment of special Committees be the first order of business.
3. That at this session there shall be nominations from the floor of the Convention for the various elective offices and committees and boards.
 - (a) That the nominations thus made be incorporated on a Ballot to be printed and distributed on the morning of the second day; and that the elections be part of the order of business on the second day.
4. That the Bishops be requested to arrange for a Convention service on Monday evening at 8:15 o'clock which shall be inspirational
 - (a) That the Annual Address of the Bishop be made at the opening business session on Monday.
5. That the Committee on Rules of Order shall prepare the printed ballot in the following manner:

All names shall appear alphabetically in each class. After each list of nominations as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks may be filled by any voter. The voter shall mark with an X at the right of the name of each person for whom he votes. On the first ballot these ballots only shall be used, and also in all subsequent ballots, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. No ballot shall be counted in its class, on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled, and the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast.

The Secretary of the Convention shall advertise in his usual notice of the date and place of the Annual Convention the vacancies for which nominations may be made on the floor of the Convention.

Balloting shall take place in a separate room when practicable.

The Clerical and Lay voting lists shall be divided into two sections each.

The members of the Convention shall also be requested, in said call, to send to this Committee any canonical amendments or other important items of business that they may purpose to introduce at the next Convention, so

that such matters may be assigned a place on the Calendar of Business. This call shall also be annually inserted in the number of the official Magazine of the Diocese, *The Newark Churchman*, next preceding the date of the Convention, unless the Magazine be issued monthly when it shall be inserted in the April issue.

The above matter was referred to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions.

The Reverend Robert W. Trenbath, Chairman of the Committee appointed at the last Convention presented the following report and recommendations of that Committee:

The committee appointed by Bishop Washburn to consider the resolutions pertaining to eligibility for offices, offered at the Convention last May presents herewith its report.

The committee has held two general meetings and individual members have frequently conferred upon the many questions which the five resolutions naturally raised. The opinions of many of the clergy and lay folk throughout the Diocese have also been sought by the chairman.

The resolutions were not offered hastily but in order to try and correct a condition which has prevailed for many years, that certain offices were held by the same individuals more or less "in perpetuity". A very complete survey of the journals of the Diocese for the past thirty years has more than confirmed the above statement and offers interesting perusal.

Every member of the committee shared in a desire to do something to try and correct this condition. A detailed consideration of the resolutions led the committee to eliminate two of the five as not essentially contributing to the desired objective. Another was found to be already in existence in the Constitution (Art. 4, Sec. 2, Sub-Section (i) and (ii)) but apparently lost sight of for sometime past. The committee has called the attention of the presiding officer of the Convention to this specific Article in the Constitution.

The two remaining resolutions the committee endeavored to amend somewhat in detail, with the hope that the Convention might be permitted to try these out for a period and if they proved workable and helpful, later, to propose their incorporation in the Canons. This seemed a far wiser plan, than to go through the difficult process of changing the Canons now, and later perhaps having to change back again, or effect further amendments. This appeared to be a reasonable plan. But it is due the members of the committee and those sympathetic souls who were hoping for a better day, to say, that the official ultra conservative legal opinion of the Diocese has embarrassed our procedure.

In the face of this condition the committee has with reluctance come to the conclusion that the only thing it can do, is to offer the two following resolutions as its report. It is quite evident that the teeth have been removed from the original resolutions, and these sound quite harmless. They compel nothing, but a sort of moral suggestion to "repeaters" on the ballot, that there are in the Diocese of Newark, nearly 200 clergy and 157 churches!

Resolution No. 1. "That the Diocese of Newark in Convention assembled approves the general principle of rotation in office, as creating larger interest, bringing in new view points and the sharing of responsibility."

Resolution No. 2. "That the number of consecutive terms any nominee has held the office for which he is again nominated, be noted on the ballot, in parentheses, after his or her name."

It was moved and carried that Resolution No. 1 in the above report be adopted.

It was moved and seconded that Resolution No. 2 in the above report be adopted.

The Reverend Theodore R. Ludlow, D.D., offered the following substitute resolution, and moved its adoption:

Resolved, That the Committee on Constitution and Canons be requested to prepare a proper amendment to the Canons which will accomplish the following purpose, viz., no person shall be elected to the same office for more than two consecutive terms; and report the same to the next Diocesan Convention.

Several members of the Convention raised questions and objections to the adoption of such a resolution. The question being called on the substitute resolution it was declared lost.

Question being called on the adoption of the original Resolution No. 2 it was adopted.

It was moved and carried that the report as a whole be adopted.

The Reverend Doctor Gomph presented the following Resolution on the Retirement of Bishop Stearly.

The Deputies to the sixty-first Convention of the Diocese of Newark have learned with deep sorrow that their beloved Bishop, the Right Reverend Wilson Reiff Stearly, D.D., intends to submit to the House of Bishops his resignation as Bishop of the Diocese.

They recognize that the impairment of his health has made it necessary that he cease from the arduous activities of his office, and seek the rest which they earnestly hope may bring to him a large measure of restored health and strength.

For nearly a quarter of a century Bishop Stearly has been active in this Diocese. For three years as the Rector of St. Luke's Church, Montclair, he developed that parish, deepening its spiritual life and enlarging its usefulness. In 1915 he was elected Bishop Suffragan of the Diocese, and in 1917 Bishop Coadjutor. On the death of Bishop Lines in 1927 he became Bishop.

In close and harmonious association with Bishop Lines, first as Suffragan and then as Bishop Coadjutor, he gave himself to the Diocese, pouring out his strength and abilities with lavish prodigality,—he neither spared nor saved himself, but gave his best and his all to the work which he loved. On the death of Bishop Lines he brought to the office of Bishop of the Diocese a great experience of its life, a ripe knowledge of its problems, a keen sense of its opportunities, together with a gracious courtesy, a sweet reasonableness, a sound practical judgment, a gentle and understanding humanity, a deep piety, a vital and compelling spiritual power and a vast store of wisdom, all of which have made his Episcopate notable in the history of the Diocese and the Church at large. In the twenty years of his service as Bishop he has made a great contribution to the life of the Diocese and of the general Church which is of lasting value and significance.

His personality has from the first won him the respect, affection and support of every member of the Diocese. Simple in habit, direct in thought, utterly self-effacing and modest, with a remarkable capacity for friendship, and with great abilities and broad knowledge, his Episcopate has been a blessing to all those with whom he has been brought in contact. In him the teachings of the Master

have found constant exemplification. His life has been a living plea to follow in the steps of our Lord and Saviour. He has been a true Father in God to his people.

For the achievements of his Episcopate,—for the blessing of his life and for the inspiration of his example the whole Diocese is profoundly grateful to Almighty God. The enduring benefits of such a life cannot be severed by his resignation. We all owe Bishop Stearly a debt of permanent gratitude, and we have the duty which is at the same time a privilege of solicitous care for his well being during the years of his retirement. Be it therefore

Resolved, That the Deputies to this Convention reluctantly and with deep regret accept the announcement of Bishop Stearly's intention to resign his office, and that they extend to him the assurance of their great esteem, their sincere friendship, and their deep and abiding affection. Be it further

Resolved, That a copy of the above resolution be engrossed and presented to the Bishop.

It was moved and carried that the above resolutions be adopted by a rising vote of the Convention. The Chair declared the same unanimously adopted.

The Reverend Doctor Gomph presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Standing Committee of this Diocese is hereby directed to obtain without delay the consents of the Bishops and of the Standing Committees of the various Dioceses of the Church for the election of a Suffragan Bishop.

It was moved and carried that the above resolution be and is hereby adopted unanimously by this Convention.

Noon-day prayers were offered by the Bishop Coadjutor.

The Chairman welcomed and introduced to the members of the Convention the two visiting members of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, The Reverend Canon Percival Stacy Waddy and Sir Edward Midwinter.

Sir Edward Midwinter spoke on the history of Newark and the vicinity as revealed in the letters which were sent back from America to the Society by missionaries appointed to serve in this part of the Colonies. He gave several sidelights on the perseverance and hardships endured by the several missionaries.

Canon Waddy, Secretary of the Society, spoke on the present and the forward looking work of the Church through the S. P. G. He also made several very helpful suggestions out of the experience of the S. P. G. in prosecuting the missionary program of the Church.

The Chairman expressed the thanks and appreciation of the Convention of the Diocese of Newark to the S. P. G. and the two speakers who brought their greeting and message to our Convention.

The Bishop Coadjutor nominated Mr. Franklin D'Olier, of St. Peter's Church, Morristown, as a Trustee of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties, and requested the approval of the Convention.

It was moved and carried that the above nomination be and is hereby approved.

The Convention reassembled and was called to order at 2:45 o'clock.

The Tellers of the Elections reported the elections on the Second Ballot as follows: No election for Standing Committee in the Clerical Order, and no election for Deputies to Provincial Synod in either order.

The polls were declared open for the Third Ballot at 2:50 o'clock and ordered closed at 3 o'clock.

The Reverend Doctor Gomph presented the following report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND CANONS.

To the Convention:

Your committee on Constitution and Canons respectfully report as annexed, certain proposed amendments to Canon 10, Canon 13-A and Canon 13-B.

The general scheme of the amendments is to segregate missionary funds from current funds, both in parishes and missions, by entrusting the former to a missionary treasurer distinct from the general treasurer. The plan would be compulsory in a parish, and optional with the Bishop in case of a mission.

The amendments generally were approved by the Finance and Advisory Board and referred to the committee within the time limited by the proviso to Section I of Canon 25. The committee recommended to the Board certain modifications in language to carry out the spirit of the amendments, and is authorized by the Board to say that it approves of the same.

The amendments as annexed are in their final form.

AMENDMENT TO CANON 10 OF THE PARISH.

SECTION 2. SUB-SECTION 5.

shall be amended to read as follows:

Every Parish in the Diocese shall elect annually a Parish Treasurer and a Missionary Treasurer.

These two offices may not be held by one and the same person.

It shall be the duty of the Parish Treasurer to receive and disburse all such monies as may be contributed to the Parish, or may accrue to the Church from endowment, investment, bequest, rental, or otherwise, for Parish use.

It shall be the duty of the Missionary Treasurer to receive and disburse all such monies as may be contributed to the Church for Missionary or other charitable purposes.

The monies and accounts of the two treasurers shall be held separately, and the accounts of each shall be annually audited by competent auditors who are not members of the Vestry.

Each Treasurer shall keep an accurate account of all monies received and disbursed, and shall render to the Bishop of the Diocese not later than March 1st of each year a complete account, duly audited, of all such monies received and disbursed by him during the preceding calendar year.

It shall be the duty of the Missionary Treasurer to forward to the Treasurer of the Finance and Advisory Board, not later than the tenth of each month, the amount received for Missionary purposes during the preceding calendar month.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer of the Parish to record the names of such regular contributors to the support of the Parish, with the date of their contributions, in a book provided for that purpose, and such record shall be sufficient evidence as to this particular qualification of voters.

AMENDMENT TO CANON 13-A. ORGANIZATION OF MISSIONS.

SECTION 3. PARAGRAPH 4. TREASURER.

Amend this to read:

"The Bishop shall appoint an adult communicant as Treasurer of the Mission, and may also appoint another adult communicant as Missionary Treasurer for the Mission. Each shall hold office at the discretion of the Bishop and shall give bond for the faithful execution of his trust."

AMENDMENT TO CANON 13-B.

SECTION V.

Omit the present paragraph 1 which is already covered by paragraph 4 of Section 111 of Canon 13-A.

Re-number paragraph 2 of Section V as now existing as paragraph 1.

Insert a new paragraph 2 to read as follows:

(2) "In cases where a Missionary Treasurer is appointed as provided in Canon 13-A, the respective duties and powers of the two treasurers as to custody and disposition of money, bookkeeping and accounting, shall be the same as in the case of Parish and Missionary Treasurers in Parishes. Auditing of accounts shall be by auditors appointed by the Bishop."

Add a new paragraph 4 as follows:

(4) "The Missionary Treasurer shall receive and forward to the Treasurer of the Finance and Advisory Board, not later than the tenth day of each month, the money received for Missionary purposes during the preceding month by check signed by him as Missionary Treasurer and countersigned by the Vicar or Warden."

Re-number paragraph 4 so that it shall be paragraph 5.

Doctor Gomph moved the adoption of the Amendment to Canon 10, Section 3, Sub-section 5.

Several members of the Convention raised certain objections to the adoption of this amendment, and after much debate Mr. Johnes moved, and it was seconded and carried that the whole matter be recommitted to the Committee on Constitution and Canons for further study and report at the next Convention.

Doctor Gomph presented the amendments to Canon 13-A and B, by title.

It was moved and carried that these amendments be recommitted to the Committee on Constitution and Canons for report at the next Convention.

It was moved and carried that the Secretary be directed to cast one ballot for the Clerical vote for Alternate Deputies to the Provincial Synod as follows: Reverend Addison T. Doughty, Reverend Charles E. Hutchison, Mr. Charles B. Johnes and Mr. E. E. Poor. The Chair declared them elected by the Clerical vote; and declared them duly elected by both orders.

Mr. Baldwin, Treasurer of the Convention, presented the following report of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties; and the Title Papers held by the Trustees.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE EPISCOPAL FUND AND DIOCESAN PROPERTIES OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK, DECEMBER 31, 1934.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

At the close of the year 1934, the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties held invested Diocesan and Trust Funds amounting to \$1,582,912.03 and equity in Real Estate \$354,000. New Trusts received during the year 1934 were:

St. James' Church, Delaware, Endowment Fund.....	\$2,500.00
St. Paul's Church, Newark, Margaretta L. Freeman Endowment.....	250.00

The Trustees held investments in mortgages of \$934,636.00 upon well located properties

Up to December 31, 1934 they have acquired four properties with an asset value of \$80,000. These properties are leased to satisfactory tenants. Investigation of the acquired real estate has been made and little, if any, ultimate loss is anticipated on these holdings. In addition, three mortgages, owned by the Trustees, amounting to \$20,450.00, have been foreclosed during the year by the Jersey Mortgage & Title Guaranty Co. and one mortgage of \$11,500 by the Trustees of the Fidelity Union Title & Mortgage Guaranty Co. The Trustees feel justified in holding the acquired properties for fair prices, as real estate is worth more than it can be sold for today. Interest is in default on several mortgages. Every effort is being made to collect these arrears. In many cases payments are being made in installments. Several of the owners of these properties have applied to the U. S. Government for Home Owners' Loan Corporation bonds.

Two issues of railroad bonds, amounting to \$6,000, are in default of interest payments, of a total of \$277,573.31 of this character of investment. However, progress is being made toward a solution of the financial problems of these roads.

There has been a decided improvement in municipal bonds during the year. Only one default has occurred in the payment of interest, an issue of \$5,000 in a total of \$146,583.47 of this class of investment. Part of the interest unpaid in 1934 has been paid in 1935.

With one exception, a bond of \$1,000, Public Utility bonds have maintained their record of no default in the payment of interest. The interest on this bond unpaid in 1934, was paid in February 1935.

Of the \$50,214.53 of miscellaneous bonds, \$8,200 were in default of interest during the year. These bonds were not purchased by the Trustees, but were received when two trust funds were created and at no time since their receipt have they been saleable. The present market value of the bonds held by the Trustees is fully \$25,000 more than the values at which they are carried on the books.

Of the stocks held, all of which were received as part of trust funds deposited with the Trustees, one issue of bank stock of \$1,000 is in default of interest. Steps are now being taken by that bank to correct its difficulties.

The report of the Treasurer of the Convention having been distributed early in the day it was presented by title, and on motion was received.

The Chairman expressed his thanks to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties for the painstaking work and care they have given to the several funds of the Diocese.

The report of the Standing Committee was presented by the Ven. Henry M. Ladd, and read by the Secretary of the Convention.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

JANUARY 1, 1934 TO DECEMBER 31, 1934.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

February 19, 1934.

Consent given the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen of St. John's, Newark, to increase the mortgage of \$3,500 on the Rectory to \$5,000 to meet debts and make repairs.

Consent given the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties to transfer, for the sum of One Dollar, certain land in the Borough of Allendale to the Board of Missions and Church Extension of the Diocese of Newark, and to transfer to the Borough of Allendale a three foot strip of land.

Approval given to the request of Samuel McKibbin for deposition from the Ministry after fifteen years in business upon the expiration of the time prescribed in the Canons.

The Report of the spending of the income of the Jesse Williams and the Hannibal Goodwin Funds was approved, being in accord with the Trust.

April 9, 1934.

Consent given the Board of Missions and Church Extension to mortgage the property of St. Andrew's, Harrington Park, for \$3,800 to finance the building of a Parish Hall.

Recommended Revere Beasley for ordination to the Diaconate and the Rev'd George D. Hardman and the Rev'd Eugene Marsden Chapman for ordination to the Priesthood.

Bishop Stearly asked for counsel and advice in re the Deposition from the Ministry of the Rev'd Samuel McKibbin as the divorced husband is living. It was decided to accept Mr. McKibbin's renunciation of the Ministry with the statement that his deposition was performed "for causes not affecting his moral character."

May 8, 1934.

Rev'd David S. Hamilton, D.D., was elected President of the Standing Committee, and Archdeacon Henry M. Ladd, Secretary.

Rev'd Richard Asclford was recommended for Ordination to the Priesthood.
June 20, 1934.

Consent given the Board of Missions and Church Extension to mortgage property in Palisades Park to the Trustees in Liquidation of the Assets of the Palisades Park National Bank and Trust Co. for \$850 for one year, interest not exceeding 6%; and to the National Bank of Palisades Park for \$5,000 for one year, interest not to exceed 6%. These two mortgages to take the place of the former mortgage of \$5,850.

Consent given the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund to lease their property in Butler to the Butler Library Association, Inc. for the sum of One Dollar for a period of five years.

Conditional consent given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Agnes' Church, East Orange, to mortgage the property on which the Parish House and Rectory stand, to the Mutual Benefit Life Insurance Co. for the sum of \$3,000 for three years, interest 5¼ % to pay municipal liens, notes, and unpaid bills.
September 24, 1934.

Consent given the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen of St. Mary's Church, Haledon, to increase the mortgage on the church property from \$5,000 to \$10,000 for three years, at 5%, without increasing the amount of land given as collateral, to the Prospect Park National Bank; to refund present indebtedness, to obtain a more favorable rate of interest, to relieve the burden of paying quarterly \$100 on unsecured notes, and to pay off floating indebtedness.

Consent given the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties to sell the property at No. 844 South Eleventh Street, Newark, N. J., for the sum of \$12,500 to Philip Grubin.

Consent given the Board of Missions and Church Extension to mortgage church property at Harrington Park for \$3,800 for five years at 6% to Maude Ranges, with privilege to pay installments or the principal on any interest day after the first year of the term of the mortgage, to finance and pay in part the cost of building an extension to the present church building.

Consent given the Board of Missions and Church Extension (if and when the proper papers are presented and signed by the members of the Standing Committee present at this meeting) to transfer the mortgage of \$5,500 on the property of Grace Chapel, East Rutherford, held by the Carlstadt National Bank, to some other mortgagee who might be secured by the Board of Missions and Church Extension.

The report of the Diocesan Church Pension Fund Committee was presented by title by the Chairman, Ven. W. O. Leslie, Jr.

The following report was made by the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions:

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions having considered the resolutions presented by the Ven. Victor W. Mori, respectfully recommends for favorable consideration that portion of section five (paragraph 1) which is already the usual proceeding of the Convention; but we are unable to recommend the first four resolutions for the following reasons:

It seems to us that it would be very difficult to get a sufficiently large attendance of the laity at five P. M. when they are expected also to be present the entire next day.

The provision of a dinner in addition to the usual luncheon would be a considerable added expense to the Diocese.

There is a provision in the Canons of the Diocese that the Convention shall be opened with a service of the Holy Communion. This would require a celebration in the evening which is contrary to general feeling of the Church.

It was moved and carried that the report be received and the Committee discharged with thanks.

The Reverend Mr. Hutchison moved that a special committee be appointed by the Chair to consider the matter of making nominations, and that their findings be reported to the next Convention. Carried.

The Episcopal Addresses

By The Right Rev'd WILSON R. STEARLY, D. D., Bishop

My dear Brethren of the Clergy and Laity, Grace to you and peace from God, our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. It is with mingled feelings of regret and thanksgiving that I give you greeting today. For almost a score of years, it has been my privilege to share with you in the leadership of Christ's work in this well favored and great obligated Diocese of Newark. Now by signs not to be mistaken, it is indicated that I should give into other hands the measure of responsibility and obligation which came to me on the day of my ordination and consecration as a Bishop nearly twenty years ago. In the same spirit of service and goodwill in which I entered upon the great work, I have sought relief from burdens and tasks, impossible to be adequately dwelt with in failing strength and growing infirmity. By my resignation at this time, which as is known, has been sent to the Presiding Bishop for presentation to the House of Bishops, I give over into younger and abler hands the conduct of the work, and the administration of the affairs of the Diocese. When the House of Bishops, probably at its next meeting in November, votes to approve my resignation, I shall be relieved of my jurisdiction, and Bishop Washburn will automatically become the Bishop of Newark.

I could leave the charge of the Diocese in no more capable hands, nor with a more devoted spirit than his. Unsparing he has been in the use of time and strength, and his considerateness to me has been beyond bounds. I thank him for all he has done and been, and I felicitate the Diocese in the coming to its leadership of so able a mind and consecrated a spirit.

As I think of the crowded years and the memories that spring from them, I find in my heart three chief causes of thanksgiving which I must ask your indulgence to briefly mention.

I am grateful for the many precious fellowships which have grown out of common work and worship. When in quiet moments of recollection my mind conjures up the picture of the Parishes and Missions of the Diocese, there passes before me a great company of faithful and true friends who have been my loyal and zealous yoke-fellows in the work of the Church. As Vestrymen and officers of Parish Guilds, as choristers and teachers in the Church Schools, as leaders and helpers in kindly ministries and organizations for unselfish service, they make a great company of faithful soldiers and servants of Christ, to whom is owing the peace and prosperity of the Church, through whom the light and life of the Christian religion is made

known to the world. They are witnesses to the truth of the saying that Christ is fulfilled in the life of the Saints. They are not perfect people, but the Grace of God is at work in their souls, and I rejoice when I think of them, and all they do; and I am proud to have been counted worthy of their friendship and comradeship through the years.

I rejoice in the work which has engaged our interest and claimed the efforts of our minds and hearts. I do not think so much of accomplishments, for these must be gauged by standards beyond our present ability; but I am grateful for high aims, large undertakings, loyal devotion, and generous output of energy and skill in the service of the Kingdom. It is true to say that the Church's task is always beyond its accomplishment. There is always more to be done than can be completed in one generation. The most that can be expected is that undertakings shall be faithfully worked at, that the laborer shall do his best. Of such service there has been no dearth in our Diocese, and the witness to its steadfast endeavor may be seen on every side. In every Parish and Mission the work of building up the Kingdom is being forwarded, and in the Diocese as a whole, efforts are unceasing to minister to current social needs, and to engage in the movements which make for a social order more worthy of the name of Christian.

Very precious has been to me the loyalty toward Christian teaching, and faithfulness in the use of sacraments, which has characterized the life of the Church in these years. In an age of restlessness and doubt, our clergy have proclaimed the eternal truth of the Gospel of Christ, and by precept and example have inculcated habits of worship and devotion, in the minds and hearts of the people. Words can hardly express the blessings thus brought to men, but those who in difficult days have been supported by great words of truth and refreshed by the Grace of the Mercy seat, will understand and give thanks for the divine society we call the Church. Never perhaps has the organization of religion been more effectually planned and developed. Never were there more causes calling for assistance, more movements seeking proponents.

It is good to feel that with all the various and multitudinous activities of a modern Parish, the greatest aim and purpose of the Church is not diverted or forgotten. Our Churches, thank God, are places where the truth of the Gospel is taught, and the power of the divine life vouchsafed by the sacraments of God's grace.

And now Brethren, I commend you to God, and to the word of his Grace, which is able to build you up and to give you an inheritance among all them which are sanctified.

I do not say farewell, for I hope, if God wills, to see you now and again, whether it be in connection with undertakings of the Church, or in the course of ordinary daily occupations. Always will I feel in my heart a

sacred bond uniting me in fellowship with the people of the Diocese of Newark, and never will I forget to pray God's blessing upon all your work and worship in the Lord.

Of immediate concern at this time is the subject of Episcopal assistance in carrying on the work of the Diocese. With all that the Bishop Coadjutor said upon this matter in his address last evening, I heartily concur, and I wish to wholly associate myself with him in the recognition of the need for an additional Bishop.

In accordance, therefore, with the Canonical provision, I hereby request such Episcopal assistance, and ask the Convention to take the necessary steps for the election in the immediate future of a Bishop Suffragan.

By the Right Reverend BENJAMIN M. WASHBURN, D.D.

May 20, 1935.

To the clergy and laity of the Church which is in the Diocese of Newark, fellow laborers in the cause of the Lord Christ, I give my appreciative greetings on the eve of the Sixty-first Annual Convention of the Church.

The year which has passed has witnessed the entrance into the Church Expectant of five of the chief pastors of the flock of Christ. Walter Henry Overs, sent by the Church to become Bishop of the Missionary District of Liberia, after nine years of faithful and of fruitful toil in that deadly climate, forced by broken health to return home, had literally laid down his life for the Master. His forceful presentation of the missionary cause will long be remembered, but the best apologetic of the faith is always the life of the faithful.

William Frederic Faber was a Bishop in Montana for twenty years. His heart was as great as his frame was slight. Gentle and unassuming he had a rare capacity for friendship, and a courage which surmounted every obstacle. Manuel Ferrando had a varied career. Born in Spain, a Roman Catholic, and having served in that Priesthood, he came to find a truer Catholicity in our own Communion. He had served as Suffragan Bishop of Porto Rico for several years, before, on his retirement, he came to make his home in our own Diocese where at Mountain Lakes, he frequently assisted the rector of St. Peter's Church. Boyd Vincent, the retired Bishop of Southern Ohio, was in point of consecration the senior member of the House of Bishops. For forty years he guided the destiny of the Church in Southern Ohio, revealing the quality of his statesmanship and

the constancy of his devotion as the Church went on from strength to strength. His influence passed far beyond the borders of his own Diocese and in the councils of the Church he had great weight. He was kind and wise and just,—a Christian gentleman and saint.

Ralph Ernest Urban entered into Paradise only yesterday. He was a kind friend and a good neighbor to us both before and after his election three years ago as Suffragan Bishop of New Jersey.

Within a few days of one another three of our own clergy, all on our retired list, entered into rest. August Ahrens had served both at East Rutherford and at Millington before his long illness so patiently borne. William S. Neill, long in Deacon's Orders, was late in life ordained in this Diocese to the Priesthood. He had no active charge among us but he was greatly helpful in many places, and especially at St. George's Church, Maplewood, where he made his home. James William Van Ingen was the faithful and untiring rector of St. Stephen's Church, Millburn, for eighteen years. Afterward he served effectively as a Chaplain of the City Mission Society. Following his retirement he continued to minister in various parishes and missions and was a friend to all who knew him. Jane H. Hall, a Deaconess on our Diocesan list who made a great contribution to the life of the Church beyond the Diocese through the establishment of the Three Arts Club.

We give God thanks for the sacrificing love of many of our laity also whose works do follow them though they have been called hence. Though I name only a few, I am mindful that they are many who have enriched the life of the Church—Arthur J. Grymes, Warden of Grace Church, Orange; Horace C. Grice, Vestryman of Trinity Cathedral, Newark, and a valued member of diocesan committees; William E. Stewart, Church of the Holy Communion, South Orange, and a Trustee of the Episcopal Fund; Simeon H. Rollinson, a Warden of St. Mark's, West Orange; Jay G. Weiss, Vestryman, St. Luke's, Montclair; David Wesson, Holy Trinity, West Orange; Charles J. DeGavre, thirty years a vestryman at Grace Church, Newark; J. Blake Hutchings, serving for some twenty-five years on the vestry of St. John's, Newark; Herbert S. Baker, Hugh Edmiston, Henry A. Howe, and Wilfred S. Skeats, all of St. Andrew's, South Orange; Herbert S. Geddes, of the Church of the Ascension, Bloomfield; Dr. Herman Dressel, Warden of Trinity Church, Arlington, and a member of the Board of Trustees of the Hospital of St. Barnabas and for Women and Children; Thomas G. Ellis, a faithful Lay Reader of St. Stephen's Church, Coytesville; Mrs. S. V. B. Brewster, devoted member of Christ Church, East Orange, and a trustee of Bonnie Brae Farm; Mrs. Frederick Carter, whose husband was Archdeacon of Newark and rector of St. Luke's, Montclair; Mrs. Eleanor Plotz Foster, of St. Mary's, Haledon; Mrs. Philip Hook, of

the Church of the Good Shepherd, Fort Lee; Mrs. Elizabeth Albright Spurr and Mrs. Harriette Elizabeth Marks, of Trinity Cathedral, Newark.

May they one and all, being born to the new life, serve God with the clearer vision and the greater joy.

Some weeks ago the Bishop informed the Standing Committee of his decision to place his resignation in the hands of the Presiding Bishop to be acted upon by the House of Bishops at its next meeting, which will probably be held next November in Houston, Texas. This is in accordance with the procedure laid down in the Canons of General Convention. The sad consideration leading to his action is too well known to require any statement in my own address. The Bishop having requested their approval of his contemplated action, the Standing Committee adopted the following resolution which I am privileged to share with you.

"Resolved, That the Standing Committee feels that it must accept, despite its profound regret, the determination of Bishop Stearly that his resignation as Bishop of the Diocese of Newark, should be presented to the House of Bishops at its next meeting, and it therefore complies with his request by expressing its approval of his contemplated action, in the belief and expectation that relief from the Episcopal responsibility which he has discharged with such ability and fidelity will minister to his continued well being."

A message from the Bishop to the Convention will be read tomorrow. This evening I desire to record my own deep sympathy for the Bishop and his family as he has with unflagging courage and with high serenity met a trial so severe. He has found in your affection strength and cheer. Most of you have known him far longer than I, but I yield to none of you in the quality of my affection. He has given me without stint his confidence and trust. His maturity of judgment and his deep Christian faith have daily taught me lessons of a value which I cannot over-estimate. Whatever the future may hold, I shall continue to turn to him for the advice and counsel which he alone can give.

Naturally we find ourselves facing the need of sufficient episcopal care in the days to come. The Bishop of Easton graciously consented this year to assist us in our Confirmation visitations. A similar course might be followed in future years, or the number of such visitations could be lessened either by grouping parishes for a single visitation at some convenient center or by holding confirmations in most parishes only in alternate years. Such a course of action does not commend itself to me nor, I think, to the Diocese generally. Furthermore, it would in no sense be a solution of our problem. Confirmations constitute a high privilege of the Bishop's office, but they are by no means his chief responsibility. The Diocese has grown greatly since 1915 when for the first time its work was divided between two Bishops.

There were then 137 parishes and missions. Today we have 157. To the organizations and institutions then in existence have been added Laura Augusta Home, House of the Holy Comforter, Diocesan Altar Guild, Girls' Friendly Society Holiday House, Eagle's Nest Farm Camp, Gertrude Butts Memorial Home Association, Young People's Fellowship, Church Mission of Help, and Bonnie Brae Farm for Boys. For all of them the Bishop of the Diocese has, and desires to have, a definite responsibility. If Bishop Stearly's resignation be accepted by the House of Bishops, I might conceivably seek to guide the affairs of the Diocese unaided, but the work would be only half done and that half but poorly done. For the sake of the Diocese itself and of its clergy and laity alike, we should at an early date elect a Suffragan Bishop. In this judgment the Bishop of the Diocese concurs.

Under the existing circumstances we agree that a Suffragan rather than a Coadjutor is to be desired. A division of jurisdiction, which the Canons require when a coadjutor is elected, is unsatisfactory if the time before he shall become Diocesan is likely to be a long one. The Suffragan Episcopate also gives a flexibility of relationship which changing needs may require. The assistance which is needed is more and other than aid in a limited sphere, for example the supervision of our missions. I should wish to turn to a Suffragan for counsel on wide problems of diocesan policy, and in the varied fields of the Church's responsibility. With mutual consideration for one another, united by the common desire to plan and to execute plans which shall be for the extension of the glory of Christ through His Church, a Bishop and his Suffragan may each use his office in a relationship which is truly beautiful in its harmony.

When the time comes for an election, the Diocese will consider with great care the qualities which such a Suffragan should possess. That he must have strength and vigor of body hardly need be said. If his highest usefulness is to extend over a long period of years, he should be still fairly young in the ministry. When a Suffragan is appreciably older than his Diocesan their relationship is also less easy because less natural. We must choose a priest who is of wide Christian charity with strength of character and of conviction, whose judgments are made with calmness and clarity, a priest whose record in his own parish and community shows him to possess qualities of leadership, who will command respect and win affection because his sense of fairness is so apparent that all our parishes will gladly give him their loyalty and their support. We ought, I think, to be able to find such an one among the clergy of our own Diocese. With such a Suffragan actively at work among us, the Diocese could count upon that full measure of leadership and pastoral care to which our clergy and our congregations are entitled.

In the upper room on the night before He was crucified, our Lord inter-

ceding in behalf of generations yet unborn, prayed "That they all may be one; as thou Father art in me, and I in Thee, that they also may be one in us: that the world may believe that Thou hast sent me". It is the task of the Church to be the instrument of God in the fulfillment of that prayer, to promote by its agency harmony and peace. The words are not synonymous: Harmony implies the existence of diversity in native disposition, temperament, and function, a diversity capable of maintenance in such neat adjustment and such perfect tension that peace is a natural consequence. Mutual consideration, more intent upon responsibilities than rights, flows from a disposition to place the emphasis upon the common good. Social benefits transcend loss to the individual, as one conceives the march of civilization to be a movement onward to the Kingdom of God. This is the heart of the doctrine of the Incarnation, the compelling power of the Crucified and of His Cross. It must be brought into the life both of the Church and of the State.

Yet while with the Psalmist we continually sing how good and joyful a thing it is for brethren to dwell together in unity, we sometimes seek to secure it by methods which either defeat the end sought or rob it of its beauty. There is the way of authority, embodied in the political sphere in the opposite social orders which we call fascism and communism. Both in greater or in less degree ultimately violate the principles of man's choicest possession—his individuality, which is to say his right to possess a soul. Souls can be developed to maturity only through the right and the power of a virtually unhampered choice. With freedom men make mistakes; without it they will make not even those. I question whether the apparent unity either in Italy or in Russia will by its permanency convince the world that either land has found the way to that adjustment of personal relationships which shall ensure the greatest development of each unit of society and hence of society itself.

In the quest for unity there is a second way—the way of exclusion. This has been the way of Adolf Hitler. Any fair appraisal of the German situation resolves itself into the effort to weigh relative values. One notes both gain and loss. Adolf Hitler's calm announcement of his country's determination to increase her own armed forces is the inevitable result of the policy of her own virtual exclusion from the family of nations which the rest of Europe has more or less consistently followed. To a world, already shaken by a fear lest some tiny spark should cause a conflagration which would burn Europe into a heap of ashes and of dead men's bones, Hitler's announcement brought consternation. He had, however, only made definite that which already men in their hearts knew—that the way to harmony and peace had not been found in the Treaty of Versailles. As to the internal relationships of the nation, Hitler himself had, in his search for unity, followed the way of exclusion. Doubtless the Jewish race by their numbers

had willingly or unwillingly proven difficult of assimilation into a unified culture. Wholesale exclusion from that culture inevitably means, to say the least, the loss of individual contributions of which no nation can afford to be deprived. The way of exclusion he has also tried in the attempt to reduce the Church to a position which Christian pastors have been forced to face the issue as to whether man must be obeyed, or God. Whoever knows the capacity of the Christian Church to embrace martyrdom is well assured that of the blood of the martyrs is the very seed of the Church. Persecution may for a season silence the faith, it can never kill it. Neither the way of authority nor the way of exclusion, nor both combined, can be the way to that unity which results in harmony and peace.

Nor will that unity proceed from pacts or compacts cunningly contrived. The treaty of Versailles, the Locarno and the Kellogg pacts, the Franco-Russian understanding, the League of Nations—none of them of itself, nor all of them together, can bring the nations of the world into that realm of friendliness where the well-being of each is seen to be the well-being of all, where flourishes a mutual understanding with comprehension of the degree to which variety rather than identity both in function and its expression contributes to a truly satisfying unity. I do not under-estimate the value of attempts to crystallize public opinion in official documents and treaties. My point is that this corporate recognition of their worth and sanctity never really gives them life. They are inert,—still-born unless men and women everywhere are already keenly conscious of the fact—I quote from the resolution adopted by our General Convention—"that war as a method of settling international disputes is incompatible with the teaching and example of our Lord Jesus Christ,—that the Christian Church in every nation should refuse to countenance any war in regard to which the government of its own country has not declared its willingness to submit the matter in dispute to arbitration or conciliation, and that—the Church must wage unremitting war against war." Each of us has his share in forming public opinion. He has disobeyed God by simply standing still unless he tries to be a channel for the Father as the Father seeks to answer the Son's prayer that they all may be one in God.

Nor is a democracy free from unfortunate attempts to secure harmony by the exercise of authority. There are always conflicting ideas, conflicting interests, conflicting groups which must find reconciliation. The pressure which blocs seek to exert upon the Congress for the promotion of the apparent interest of one or another class or section of society is hard to resist. I suspect that many a conscience has been treated with slight respect by congressmen who, facing the issue raised by the soldiers' bonus have sought to win favor with one group, whatever the cost to the country as a whole. Farmers march upon Washington to secure the attention of the administration as they seek for their own group special favors. They are

but following the example again and again set for them by industrial lobbies. We ought to have a group consciousness, but the circumference of the circle which we draw is too near its center which is one's self. I am not rash enough in the short space of this address to seek impartially to appraise what we have come vaguely to call the New Deal. In so far as it seeks to lead men to the consciousness that we are indeed members one of another we may rejoice. It is true that if one member suffer, all suffer with him. These are the principles which underly the program of the President to promote social security through legislation. The responsibility of the community to the aged, to the unemployed, and to the sick, has always been recognized by the Christian Church. There is not entire agreement as to the definite methods by which such responsibility can most adequately be met, nor is there unanimity as to the wisdom of attempting at this time to enact a complete program of social insurance against varied hazards. There is a kind of haste which makes for waste. Society if it is to be not merely in name a brotherhood must conserve in the brothers such spiritual values as self-reliance and individual responsibility. We run the danger of disintegration of character through the loss of self-mastery and a complete dependence upon assistance from without. Men are robbed of courage, confidence, and initiative which are distinctly Christian virtues.

Though the Townsend plan, the fulminations of Huey Long, or the vagaries of Upton Sinclair may to the superficial seem to be in accord with a democracy which would reduce barriers against a perfect unity, they reveal equalitarianism as an impossible ideal, weakening the moral sense by attributing all the ills of life to society and none to the individual sufferer. Justice demands an equal balance between rights and personal obligation. We are all frankly troubled by the revelation of the willingness of some to receive relief to which no need entitles them. It is the duty of every Christian citizen to see that in the Master's name, the hungry are fed, the naked clothed, and the sick visited. It is equally his duty to see that our citizenry is not robbed of manhood, of honesty and of decency by advantage taken of our Christian recognition of our membership one of another.

Against this background of the world's need is set the Church of the living God. How mighty is its foe—the indifference and the lack of faith of this mechanistic humanistic age! Out of the need springs the opportunity. If God be indeed the loving Father, if His dear Son be sent indeed to show to us the Way, the Truth, and the Life, must not we through the Church and the Church through us make some truly spiritual impact upon the materialism of a Christless age? Does not the life of Him the Incarnate Son of God furnish the clue to a unity which is both harmony and peace—where individuality remains a precious thing, all the more precious indeed because not as under authority but of its own free will, it empties itself of selfish-

ness and greed to bring about though in diversity a unity which scorns the way of exclusion as it demonstrates its comprehensiveness? Does not that Life reveal the battleground to be always in men's hearts and wills, whereon the fight cannot be won save as men's purposes, their motives and their ends, be purified and raised even to the level of God's own?

Out of these convictions has risen the Forward Movement in the Church. Conceived at Atlantic City in our General Convention, born from a sense of the Church's poverty in financial gifts preventing not alone the expansion, but even the maintenance of its present work, the Forward Movement sees in that stringency only one expression of the need of reinvigorating the life of the Church. It rests in the conviction that God's power is freely given to those who will receive and use it, that faith will still move mountains. It sees in the Church of God a divine institution, with a corporate life of power to which too few of us have laid our hold. Therefore at the outset the Forward Movement called us to face frankly the implications of our discipleship. The fellowship of Christ's religion is a privilege into which we enter, but the act of entrance is the assumption of obligations. Thus through Lent we had from the Commission on the Movement the devotional pamphlet with its bidding us to turn, to follow, to learn, to pray, to serve, to worship, and to share—that the Church might find itself indeed a corporate body of men and women fitted to be God's agent in the work of world redemption. During this post-Easter season a second pamphlet has bidden us as disciples of the living Christ, to examine our attitudes in various spheres of personal relationships in home, friendship, business, nation and the wide world itself.

The Presiding Bishop has summoned the Church throughout the land on Whitsunday to a great Corporate Communion with a renewal of our obligations as disciples of the living Christ. Let us go forth from this Convention determined that we will not rest in these remaining weeks until we have done our utmost to make of this a memorable day. Let every rector with his vestry and other leaders in his parish at once formulate plans to this end. Let the implications of discipleship be stressed from every pulpit. The Office of Instruction in the Prayer Book defines it as the duty of a member of the Church to follow Christ, to worship God every Sunday in his Church; and to work and pray and give for the spread of His Kingdom. A short form of Service will be authorized for use that day that together we may once more pledge our allegiance to Christ in His Church. The Bishops ask that it be used in every congregation of the Diocese.

The resolution of General Convention creating for this triennium the Forward Movement Commission set, as the second goal of the Movement, the rehabilitation of our parochial, diocesan, and general work. We shall have throughout the Church this common aim, though there will be great variety of method in its fulfillment. Here too there will be unanimity of

purpose, and unity of aim, but in that unity there will be harmony in diversity. In each diocese certain objectives will be included in its program for the Movement. The Convention will tomorrow no doubt by resolution authorize the appointment of a Committee to set forth our own diocesan program. The program must grow from our own needs as they are sensed by representative men and women who are conscious of those needs. The Committee will doubtless consider the possibility of enriching the quality of our discipleship by diocesanwide preaching missions. They will perhaps set before us ways and means by which we may win back to their loyalty the lapsed communicants whose need of us is quite as great as is our need of them. The Boards of Religious Education and of Social Service as they formulate their programs for the coming year will align themselves definitely with the Forward Movement of the Church. Conferences between rector, vestry and other leaders should in every parish set before the parish certain definite objectives which it will seek to meet in the months ahead. The Bishops and the Diocesan Committee will make suggestions, remembering that unity in purpose does not entail uniformity in method or in action.

One principle must be borne in mind. It may be stated in the words of Eugene O'Neill, "Contentment is a warm sty for eaters and sleepers". Discontent, however, without high purpose and a definite plan, makes for a crippled impotence. Complacent lethargy must be shaken off. The Forward Movement is a call to re-consecration. It bids us work with new earnestness, with higher fervour for the building of the Kingdom. Dr. Alexander Whyte used to say that the perseverance of the saints consists in new beginnings. Let us in our personal lives, our parishes, our diocese pray for God's blessing as we make once more such a beginning. Each of us must squarely face the responsibility. Christ has called me to serve Him and His Church. In that state to which He has called me have I done my best? May God forgive us everyone for our lukewarmness, our neglect of opportunities, our contentment with the mediocre. May He give to us purpose of amendment, that through the failure of no one of us may the Church be hampered in its mission.

In the Great War it is said that a difficult service needed to be performed, and a call for volunteers had come. The company was drawn up at attention and the Captain addressed his men. Those who volunteered were to step one pace forward from the line. He turned his back while each man made his decision. When he faced about again the line, to his dismay, was apparently unbroken. The fact was that every man in the company had moved forward.

God give us grace that in this day, as to us comes the call, the line may be unbroken in its strength as every man in this our company takes his step forward.
