OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

From a Parish.

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election, in the following form:

[Name of the Church, the Place, and Date.]

This certifies that a meeting of the congregation of this Church, held for the purpose of electing Church Officers, and Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention (or for the purpose of electing Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, if the meeting be for that object alone), A. B., C. D., and E. F., being communicants of the Church in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Deputies; and B. C., D. E., and F. G., also being communicants in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Alternate Deputies to represent the Parish in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand (or if two Wardens subscribed, we have set our hands), the day and year above written.

N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary sign, then the signatures of both Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-incharge, or Missionary, may not sign.

From a Mission.

N. B.—Use the same form and substitute the word "Mission" for "Parish" in three places. The Minister-in-charge; or, the Clerk; or, the Warden may sign.

Memoranda:

Not more than three Deputies are allowed from each Parish, and Mission.

Three Alternate Deputies must be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies.

Write Christian names in FULL and LEGIBLY.

Blank forms will be sent by the Secretary of the Convention on or before Easter Monday in each year.

Return Certificates of Election at least ONE MONTH before Convention.

Deputies must be Communicants of the Church, and also qualified voters in the Parish or Mission which elects them. (See Canon 6, § II, [4,] [5] and [6].)

Rules of Order

- 1. The Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- The Convention shall meet on the opening day at 9:00 a. m.; with a recess of one hour between 1 and 2 o'clock.
- At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
- 4. At the close of each Convention, the Minutes shall be corrected and approved.
- The doors of the Convention shall be open for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
- All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convention shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall record their attendance.
- Clergymen of other Dioceses, and Candidates for Holy Orders, who may be present, shall be admitted to honorary seats in the Convention on the presentation of their names to the Secretary.
- 8. When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
- When any member is about to speak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
- 10. No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply), in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
- 11. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
- 12. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate, but any member may appeal from the decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention. The general procedure of the Convention shall be governed, unless otherwise provided for, by the rules of parliamentary practice as set forth in "Roberts' Rules of Order."
- 13. A Committee consisting of the Bishop, ex-officio, five other clergymen and five laymen, to be known as the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, shall be appointed at each Convention to prepare the official Ballots and the Calendar of Business, for the next Annual Convention.

The mode of conducting the nominations and elections of all Committees, Commissions and Boards and all other elective officers not otherwise provided for, shall be as follows:

The Secretary of the Convention shall send out with the notice of the time and place of the Diocesan Convention, a list of the offices to be filled by election thereat, and the names of the incumbents of these offices, whose terms expire thereat, together with an official nomination blank. Such notice shall be sent out at least one month before the date appointed for the Convention, to the Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and to each lay delegate whose name and address has been transmitted to the Secretary, as provided in Canon I.

Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations for any office or offices to be filled at such Convention, shall at least fifteen days before the data appointed for the Convention, submit the same in writing to the Secretary thereof, together with his certificate that he has secured the consent of such person or persons to such nomination.

The Committee on Elections, from the list of nominations as furnished to it by the Secretary of the Convention, shall prepare sufficient ballots marked "Sample" for each clerical and lay delegate, as certified by such Secretary, as entitled to a seat in the Convention; such ballot to be mailed by such Secretary to each such delegate at least five days before the Convention.

At the beginning of the opening session the committee shall report to the Convention in the form of an official ballot the names of nominees; the arrangement of such names shall be determined by lot in each order.

If there be any office for which no nomination has been made on the sample ballot any delegate may file with the Secretary of the Convention the name of one candidate for any such office, together with his certificate, that he has secured the consent of the person so nominated. Such nominations may be filed up to the hour of voting, and the committee of Elections shall announce the names of such nominates at the time of the distribution of the first ballot.

The number of consecutive terms any nominee has held the office for which he is again nominated shall be noted on the ballot, in parentheses, after his or her name. After each list of nominations as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks may be filled by any voter. On the first hallot these ballots only shall be used, and also in subsequent ballots, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. No ballot shall be counted in its class, on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled, and the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast.

The members of the Convention shall also be requested, in said call, to send to this Committee any canonical amendments or other important items of business that they may propose to introduce at the next Convention, so that such matters may be assigned a place on the Calendar of Business. This call shall also be annually inserted in the April number of the official Magazine of the Diocese, The Newar Churchman.

Balloting shall take place in a separate room when practicable. The clerical and lay voting lists shall be divided into two sections each.

- 14. Four or more Election Tellers, clerical and lay, in equal numbers, not necessarily members of the Convention, shall be appointed by the President before an election. They shall receive and canvass all votes cast at any election which is required to be by ballot, and when such canvass is completed, shall immediately report its result to the Convention. The polls shall be open for such time as the Convention may, by resolution, direct.
- 15. All reports (usually printed in the JOURNAL), of officers, committees, commissions, and boards of trustees under control of the Convention, shall be printed and distributed by the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order as far as practicable, at least two weeks before the meeting of the Convention; provided that the subject of such printing and reports shall have been referred to the Finance and Advisory Board for consideration, which Board shall have power to supervise, regulate, or to condense the same, and to issue to the Committee or to the Secretary of the Convention such instructions as in the judgment of the said Board will promote greater economy and efficiency in respect to this work.

Reports when read in Convention shall be read by title only, unless the reading be for the better transaction of business.

NEW BUSINESS.

16. All new business introduced, except such as may accompany and form a part of a report of a committee, shall be in the form of a motion or resolution and shall be in writing.

COMMITTEES.

- 17. All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered. It shall be the duty of the Secretary promptly to notify the members of all special committees of their appointment.
- 18. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.

MOTIONS AND THEIR ORDER.

- 19. No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
- 20. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it; or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment has been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
- 21. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken,

VOTING PRIVILEGES.

- 22. All questions shall be decided viva voce, unless otherwise specially ordered.
- 23. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote of the Convention shall be taken by Orders, voting separately; and, when a vote is thus taken a concurrent majority in both Orders shall be necessary to carry any measure.

JOURNAL

The Sixty-sixth Annual Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark, was held on Tuesday, May fourteenth, Nineteen Hundred and Forty in Trinity Cathedral, Newark, New Jersey.

A Convention Service was held in Trinity Cathedral on Monday evening preceding the Convention, May thirteenth at eight o'clock. The Bishop read the following message from the Right Reverend Wilson R. Stearly, D.D., retired Bishop: "I rejoice greatly in the witness to the blessings bestowed upon this Diocese. The Lord watches over His own, and calls to unceasing labor and joy in His service. With affectionate greetings and the blessing of our Lord upon you all," Faithfully, WILSON R. STEARLY.

At this service the Eighth Annual Address of the Bishop of Newark was read by the Right Reverend Benjamin M. Washburn, D.D., and those assisting the Bishop in the service were the Right Reverend Theodore R. Ludlow, D.D., Suffragan Bishop, the Very Reverend Arthur Dumper, D.D., Dean of Trinity Cathedral, and the Reverend J. Fred Hamblin, Secretary of the Convention.

On Tuesday morning the Convention was opened with a Celebration of the Holy Communion at nine o'clock. The Bishop of the Diocese, the Right Reverend Benjamin M. Washburn, D.D., was the celebrant; the Dean the Very Reverend Arthur Dumper, D.D., being the Epistler; the Suffragan Bishop the Right Reverend Theodore R. Ludlow, D.D., being the Gospeler; and the Reverend Isaac N. Northup, Curate of Trinity Cathedral assisting.

The business session of the Convention was called to order at ten-ten o'clock with the Right Reverend, the Bishop of Newark in the Chair.

The Chair directed the Secretary of the Convention to ascertain whether a constitutional quorum of the Clerical members, and Lay Deputies, was present.

A constitutional quorum was present in each order, and the Convention was declared ready for business.

The Chair appointed the following committee on Certificates of Lay Deputies: The Reverend Harold R. Onderdonk, Mr. Frederick Worfolk and Mr. A. T. Riedel.

The next order of business being the election of a Secretary, the Ven. William O. Leslie Jr., renominated the Reverend J. Fred Hamblin, which nomination was duly seconded from the floor.

It was moved and carried that the nominations be closed, and that the Suffragan Bishop be requested to cast one ballot for the election. The same being done, the Reverend J. Fred Hamblin was declared duly elected.

The Secretary of the Convention requested the approval by the Convention of the appointment of the Reverend Peter R. Deckenbach, Rector of Christ Church, Belleville, as Assistant Secretary. On motion duly made and carried the appointment was confirmed.

The following Committee on the Rights of Clerical Members was nominated: the Reverend Messrs. Harry L. Hadley and George L. Grambs, and Mr. Alson Brandes.

On motion the nominations were closed, and the Secretary ordered to cast one ballot for their election.

The following Committee on the Rights of Lay Deputies was nominated: Messrs. A. Lawrence Pierson and Henry W. Miller, and the Reverend Herbert Lewis-Jones.

On motion the nominations were closed, and the Secretary ordered to cast one ballot for their election.

The following Committee on Constitution and Canons was renominated: The Reverend Messrs. W. O. Kinsovling, Francis H. Richey and Charles E. Hutchison, and Mr. C. Alexander Capron and Col. Leigh K. Lydecker.

On motion the nominations were closed, and the Secretary ordered to cast one ballot for their election.

The Chairman of the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, the Reverend John J. Kirkpatrick, presented the following report of that committee, and recommended its adoption by this Convention:

A REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ELECTIONS AND RULES OF ORDER.

To the Sixty-sixth Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

Your Committee, appointed by the authority of the Sixty-fifth Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark, met at the Diocesan House on Wednesday, January 31st, 1940, at four-thirty o'clock. The Chairman, the Reverend John J. Kirkpatrick, presided. The Committee herewith submits its report, together with a Calendar of Business and Rules of Order for the government of the Convention now assembled.

Resolved, That Tuesday, May 14th, 1940, having been appointed by the Bishop of the Diocese as the opening day of the Convention, the recommendations of your Committee are:

 That the invitation of the Dean, Wardens and Vestrymen of Trinity Cathedral, Newark, New Jersey, to hold the Convention in Trinity Cathedral, he accepted and that, with the consent of the Dean of Trinity Cathedral the service of the Holy Communion be held in the Cathedral at nine o'clock on the morning of the first day of the Convention, May 14th, and that all business sessions be held in the Cathedral Church.

- That the Convention be governed by the Rules of Order and Calendar of Business as adopted by the Convention of 1939 with however the following amendments and suggestions.
 - a. As suggested by the Bishop be it amended that Rule 13, paragraph six, shall read:
 - "At the beginning of the opening session the committee shall report to the Convention in the form of an official ballot the names of nominees; the arrangement of such names shall be determined by lot in each order."
 - b. Further, the Secretary of the Convention shall be appointed as the Committee to arrange the Ballot, and to provide for the drawing of lots for all nominees placed on the ballot. He shall also provide a blank form to be mailed for the making of nominations.
- That the Secretary of the Convention shall send out the usual Convention notice, not later than one month in advance of the Convention, and also he shall be empowered to arrange for a luncheon on the day of the Convention, Tuesday, May 14th, 1940.
- 4. That as suggested by the Bishop a service shall be arranged by him for the evening of Monday, May 13th, 1940 at Trinity Cathedral, Newark, at which service the annual Episcopal Address of the Diocesan shall be read; and further that the annual Address of the Suffragan Bishop be made following luncbeon on the day of the Convention, May 14th, 1940.
- 5. That if in his judgment it seems advisable the Bishop shall appoint a Committee to study the recommendations contained in the Episcopal Address such Committee to be empowered to bring in to the Convention such recommendations as may be necessary for official action by the Convention.
- That the afternoon session, at the discretion of the Bishop, be given up as far as
 possible to the consideration of the responsibilities and work of the Board of Religious
 Education of the Diocese.

The following resolution was introduced by the Reverend William L. Griffin, Jr., Rector of St. Paul's Church, Paterson:

Resolved, That the delegates sent from this Diocese to the General Convention are hereby instructed:

One, to give clear expression to the will of this Diocese that sacrificial effort be devoted to the work of achieving organic unity with the Presbyterians and with all other followers of Christ.

Two, to vote for the continuance of the Joint Commission on Approaches to Unity which is working for the reunion of the Episcopal and Presbyterian Churches with commendation for its effort and fine progress.

Three, to use their best brains and earnestly seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit to ensure that in our approach to the Presbyterians we neither abandon lightly any part of our heritage, nor try to enforce upon them anything which is not clearly necessary to salvation.

Four, to report to the Diocesan Convention in 1941 their performance of these instructions.

The Chair ordered this resolution referred to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions.

The following resolution was introduced by the Reverend Charles L. Gomph, S.T.D., Rector of Grace Church, Newark:

WHEREAS, The corporate reunion of all Christians in the one, hely, Catholic and apostolic Church is most certainly the will of God and is the prayer of all faithful Christians; and

WHEREAS, The proposed Concordat between the Protestant Episcopal Church and the Presbyterian Church is intended as a step towards that reunion; but

WHEREAS, The proposed Concordat by its provision for the "extension of Ordination" at the hands of a presbytery appears to confuse and possibly to jeopardize the Church's Doctrine and practice as to the Apostolic Ministry of Biahops, Priests and Deacons; and

WHEREAS, The proposed Concordat does not clearly and unmistakably safeguard the continuation of ministerial Priesthood at the hands of Bishops, in accordance with the most ancient traditions of the Universal Church and in accordance with the constant canonical requirements of the Anglican Churches; and

Whereas, The proposed Concordat has not, as yet, been submitted to the scrutiny of the other branches of the Anglican Communion of which the Protestant Episcopal Church is only a part, nor has it been presented to the Lambeth Conference;

Be It Therefore Resolved;

First, That the members of this Convention, as clergymen and laymen, testify their faith that the corporate reunion of all Christians in the one, holy, Catholic and apostolic Church is the will of God:

Second, That this Convention express to the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America its conviction that the proposed Concordat in its present form is inadequate and at variance with the teaching and continuous practice of the Church at large and of our own Church as set forth and prescribed in the Prayer Book and Canons;

Third, That this Convention petition the General Convention to continue the study of the question of the reunion of Christians, taking more careful account of matters which have been insufficiently considered in the proposed Concordat-especially the doctrine of the Church and its ministry.

The Chair ordered this resolution referred to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions.

The Tellers of the Elections were summoned, and directed by the Chair to distribute the printed ballot which was as follows:

The polls were thereupon opened, and were closed at eleven o'clock.

The Reverend W. O. Kinsolving, Chairman, presented the following report:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND CANONS OF THE SIXTY-SIXTH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK, 1940.

Your Committee submits the following report,

The Sixty-fifth Annual Convention of the Diocese, held in 1939, adopted an amendment to Article 12, Section 2, of the Constitution of the Diocese, and recommended it to the Sixty-sixth Annual Convention, to meet in 1940, for final adoption. This amendment is as follows:

Article 12, Section 2 of the Constitution of the Diocese of Newark is hereby amended by placing a period instead of a semicolon after the words "a full representation of the Diocess" in the eleventh line thereof, by omitting the word "and" in the same line, and by inserting after the words "a full representation of the Diocese" the following sentence: But if a full representation cannot be obtained from the list of Deputies and Supplementary Deputies, the Bishop, subject to confirmation by a majority of the members of the Standing Committee, shall have power to appoint a sufficient number in either order to insure such full representation.

Article 12, Section 2 of the Constitution of the Diocese of Newark as hereby amended shall read as follows:—The Convention at the same time and in the same manner, shall elect a like number of supplementary Deputies of each order. It shall be the duty of the Deputies-elect to signify to the Bishop, at least thirty days before the meeting of a General Convention, their acceptance of the appointment and intention to perform its duties; in default of which, the Bishop shall designate so many of the supplementary Deputies having the greatest number of votes as shall be necessary to insure a full representation of the Diocese. But if a full representation cannot be obtained from the list of Deputies and Supplementary Deputies, the Bishop, subject to confirmation by a majority of the members of the Standing Committee, shall have power to appoint a sufficient number in either order to insure such full representation. The persons so designated shall have all the power and authority of Deputies duly elected by their Convention. In case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, the power hereby conferred on the Bishop shall be exercised by the Standing Committee.

I move the adoption of this amendment; seconded by Mr. C. A. Capron. The vote being called in the Clerical Order the amendment was adopted. The vote being called in the Lay Order the amendment was adopted.

The Reverenti W. O. Kinsolving, Chairman, presented the following report:

Your Committee proposes for adoption the following amendment to Canon 13 B, Section VI, said amendment having been placed in the hands of the Committee with the approval of the Finance and Advisory Board at least one month prior to the Convention; as required by Canon 25.

Canon 13 B, Section VI, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Title to all real and personal property given, bequeathed or devised to, purchased, or otherwise acquired by a Mission, excepting only contributions for the current expenses of such Mission referred to in Section V hereof, shall be vested in the "Board of Missions and Church Extension of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark, New Jersey," a New Jersey corporation, in trust for said Mission.

Upon the Missloh becoming a duly incorporated parish as provided for in Canon 11 'Qn the Formation of New Parishes', the Board of Missions and Church Extension as aforesaid may transfer such real or personal property to such corporation.

In the event that the Bishop and the Standing Committee shall determine that regular church services are no longer maintained by or for such Mission, the Bishop and the Standing Committee may declare that such Mission has become extinct, and thereupon all real and personal property held by said Board of Missions and Church Extension, in trust for said Mission, shall vest free from such trust in said Board of Missions and Church Extension, and may be used by it for its general uses and purposes.

If any real or personal property is given, devised, or bequeathed to said Board of Missions and Church Extension, in trust for a Mission, in the absence of any direction to the contrary contained in a will or other insument transferring such property to the Board for such purpose, such property shall be deemed to be given to the Board to be held upon the trusts, terms, and conditions hereinabove set forth. If any property be given, devised, or bequeathed for any use or purpose connected with a Mission, and if such Mission shall

become a duly incorporated parish, and said Board of Missions shall transfer such property to such incorporated parish, it shall be the duty of said incorporated parish to devote the property so received to the particular uses and purposes specified in such will or other instrument.

I move the adoption of this Amendment. Seconded by Mr. Capron.

Question was raised as to why the word 'may' is used in paragraph three of the above report.

It was stated by the Chair that this is done in order to protect the Diocese in such cases where the Board of Missions and Church Extension is named on the Bond and Mortgage of any Mission, and where such indebtedness remains.

. The amendment was adopted.

The Reverend W. O. Kinsolving, Chairman, presented the following resolution:

"Resolved, That this Convention join with the Diocesan Convention of the Diocese of New Jersey in applying to the legislature of the State of New Jersey to amend Section 14 of the Religious Corporation Act Concerning Protestant Episcopal Churches (R. S. 16:12-16) to read as follows:—

"If and when the Convention of said Church which has ecclesiastical jurisdiction over a parish, shall determine that regular church services are no longer maintained by such parish, said Convention may declare such parish extinct, and thereupon the corporation having title to the property of said parish shall be thereby dissolved and the property of said parish and all rights and interest of said parish pertaining to property shall vest in the corporation organized to hold in trust property under the control of said Convention, in trust, for the same religious purposes and with the power of disposition and sale to the same extent as the same vested or would have vested in the corporation having title to the property of said parish before it became extinct; provided, however, that this act shall not affect the reversionary interest of any person or persons in such property. Said property and the income therefrom and the proceeds of sale thereof shall be applied to religious and charitable uses connected with the Church, and the Convention may direct the use to which the same or any part thereof shall be applied, and may direct the transfer thereof or any part thereof to any incorporated parish or other corporation, the funds of which are devoted to carrying on any of the objects or purposes of said Church in said Diocese. If and when the Convention of said Church shall make such determination and declare a parish extinct, a certificate of such action by the Convention under the seal of the Convention, signed by the Bishop or other officer who presided at the meeting of the Convention at which such action was taken and attested by the secretary of said Convention and duly acknowledged shall be filed and recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county where the Certificate of Incorporation of said parish has been filed, or where such extinct parish is located."

"Further Resolved, That a committee of one be appointed to confer with the Chancellor of the Diocese of New Jersey to present the proposed amendment to the Legislature of the State of New Jersey."

I move the adoption of this resolution; seconded by Mr. C. A. Capron. The resolution was adopted.

The Ven. William O. Leslie, Jr., Chairman, presented the following report of the Diocesan Canonical Committee on the Church Pension Fund: To the 1940 Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

Your Diocesan Church Pension Fund Committee respectfully reports as follows for the calendar year 1939:

It may be of interest to the members of the Convention to know that at the present time there are 55 beneficiaries of the Church Pension Fund and allied Funds in this Diocese. This number is made up as follows: Clergy receiving age benefits, 14; widows, 36; orphans, 5.

Quoting from a letter from the Executive Vice-President, Mr. Bradford B. Locke, under date of April 23, 1940, we learn that—

"The most important function of the Fund is the payment of pensions. All of its other activities are subsidiary to this. It is therefore of first interest that the total pension roll is at present \$1,350,000. a year. This compares with \$811,000. ten years ago and \$325,000. twenty years ago. A total of over eighteen million dollars has been paid out in pensions since the beginning of the Fund in 1917. The present pension roll includes the names of about 2,500 individuals."

Continuing to quote from Mr. Locke's letter we learn that-

"Pension assessments, which make the payment of pensions possible, are received by the Fund at the rate of about one million dollars a year. The record of assessment payments by the Church is remarkable. Since the beginning of the Fund, the Church has paid over twenty-two million dollars in assessments as against an unpaid balance, through the end of 1938, of only \$48,000. Less than one-fourth of one percent of all assessments payable are therefore outstanding. It is this practically perfect fulfillment of the responsibility of the parishes and other organizations of the Church that has assured the success of its pension system and has made it possible for the Fund to grant pensions in amounts substantially in excess of the original promises or expectations.

"The two most serious problems with which the Trustees of The Church Pension Fund are faced are the question of what average rate of interest the Fund may be expected to earn in the future and the question of whether or not the Social Security Act may be amended so as to bring Churches within its scope, including the requirement to pay taxes."

In closing this report, the Chairman of your Committee would again express appreciation for the excellent cooperation given by the Diocese as a whole in seeing that pension

premiums are paid promptly. However, we would like to call the attention of the various parochial and mission authorities, especially the treasurers, to the importance of seeing that pension premiums are paid promptly in order that the clergy may obtain as full protection as possible under the rules of the Pension Fund.

The Reverend Frederick J. Warnecke, Chairman, presented the following report of the Field Department:

REPORT OF THE FIELD DEPARTMENT TO THE DIOCESAN CONVENTION, 1940.

Rt. Rev'd Sir, and Members of the Convention:

I am privileged to report for the Field Department of the Diocese, now completing the second year of its work. I should like to acknowledge as chairman the fine spirit of cooperation rendered by all the members of the department.

During the past year we have tried to continue the work inaugurated in the previous year which seemed to be valuable. We have held two conferences for laymen. We again issued our Handbook for use in the Every Member Canvass. We arranged for Bishop Remington of Eastern Oregon to spend a month in our diocese, speaking in many of the parishes. Upon invitation we visited many Churches to aid them in their plans and work. We have continued to base our work upon two premises: first, that the work of the Church is one wherever it is being done, in local community, in diocese, in the nation and world. Secondly, we are a service agency. We do not make budgets nor spend them. Our only justification for existence is to be of help to the Churches of the Diocese.

In an attempt to be of greater service this past year, we found ourselves faced by many honest differences of opinion in regard to the work of the Every Member Canvass. We began therefore to wonder whether our own work was being based upon reality, or upon what we thought was the situation in the Churches of the Diocese.

So during the past six months, we tried two new things. First, we used our own parishes and missions as experimental stations. Voluntarily the members of the department answered a detailed questionnaire as to the methods used in the Every Member Canvass in their own parishes. This miniature poll gave us a basis of fact to use in our work. Further, we invited the clergy and leaders in the work of the Every Member Canvass to meet with us in the various districts of the Diocese to review the work they and we had done, and to offer us the benefit of their experience. These meetings were held during January in seven of the eight districts of the Diocese. The Bishops were kind enough to be present at all of them. Seventy-seven parishes and missions were represented at these meetings, and well over two hundred men attended them. We think they were very valuable. Out of them came many fine ideas which we will share with you in our new Handbook. For us there came a better knowledge of the methods being used and the problems being faced plus constructive criticism of our work.

One fact was emphasized again and again in these meetings, and was confirmed also by the questionnaire. A layman, vestryman in his own parish, arose in one of the meetings to phrase it tersely. Said he, "Why don't our people give? They don't care. Why don't they care? They don't know. Why don't they know? We haven't told them."

The closest correlation in our questionnaire was that between good financial results and the factor of year-round education not in finances, but in the work and life of the Church. If you would have a successful Every Member Canvass next fall, begin this spring without any reference to money, to tell your people what your parish is doing, what their Diocese is doing, what our national Church is doing. I know you will work out good plans to present the parish work. As regards the Diocese, we suggest the value of personal contacts, either by visits to our institutions and Churches, or by a visit to you by a speaker now doing this work. There will be no appeals for money.

I am sure that all of you are quite familiar with the "Today" series of the National Church, which has been completely revised since last September. Perhaps, however, you did not know that eight new pamphlets in this series have been issued since January. All sixteen leaflets are available free in any quantity for general distribution. A number of parishes in our Diocese have used successfully the group subscription plan to "Forth", our national Episcopal magazine, which brings the cost down to 50¢ per year per subscriber.

Next fall is going to be a critical time. Our work will be done against a background of war abroad, elections in this country, and much consequent uncertainty in the hearts of many. Nor is it belaboring the point to emphasize that it will be a critical year in the life of the Church. Faced by tremendous problems, and also by equally great opportunities, the Church limps along on meager support. The parishes of the Diocess suffered a decrease of \$100,000 in income for local support in 1939 as compared with 1932. The Diocesan budget is just about one-half what it was in 1929. The budget of the National Church for 1940 is the lowest in our recent history.

In a Diocesan Convention the altuation in the Diocese especially calls for our attention. Last fall 149 pledges were made to the Diocese. 52 were the same as in the past. 59 showed increases. But 38 decreases overbalanced the increases, and the total result showed a decrease in pledged income for 1940 of about \$7,000. Our Bishop called the clergy together and asked them to decide what should be done. Should we cut work to the extent of \$7,000? Or should we by a supplementary effort try to raise the money? The clergy decided unanimously to try to raise the money, and it has been raised. But are we going to face the same problem next spring? Must we have a financial crisis each spring? If we can raise the money needed in the spring, why can't we do it all in the fall and eliminate these special drives and emergency appeals?

I know that some will speak of depression and lessened resources these days. This is undoubtedly true in many a particular family, but it is not true as it affects the problem before us. The very facts when analysed deny this excusse. The average weekly gift which was received last year for the local support of the parishes in this Diocese was 32¢. That is less than 5¢ a day. The average gift which the Diocese received for the work of the Diocese and the national Church per communicant per week was 4¢.

Our Diocessan Assessment in this Diocese is the third lowest in the entire Church. Only two Dioceses have a lower percentage of assessment than we have in Newark. Our rate is 3%. It is as high as 24% in some Dioceses.

If our people were to give to their parish Church a penny more a day, over the Diocese the average increase would be nearly 25% in giving for local support. If we were to give our Diocese and national Church a dime a week, Diocesan income would be increased 150%. It isn't a question of what is in a man's pockethook, but of what is in his heart and mind. It isn't how much he has, but how much he cares!

To help men to know more and therefore to care more, the Field Department this spring is holding a week-end conference at Holday House, Delaware, N. J., on June 22nd and 23rd. It will not be an Every Member Canvass conference. There will be no financial appeal made at it. It will be on the faith and practise of our Episcopal Church, and what

the Church means for a man in the chaotic world of today. The registration fee will be a modest two dollars. We especially ask for the cooperation of the clergy in sending to this conference representatives of their parish who are potential leaders.

In the fall, in mid-September, we will hold a Saturday afternoon and evening conference directly related to the work of the Every Member Canvass. This will probably be held in Newark. We also plan to issue a completely new Handbook, better planned to meet your needs as the district meetings have revealed them. We are already working on pictorial folders for free general distribution in the Diocese next fall. These will also be keyed in to the plans of the national Church.

We are ever conscious, however, that nothing we can do is a substitute for careful planning and conscientious work in the parishes. We are supplementary, but your efforts are fundamental. We hope you will plan with vision for next fall. The Every Member Canvass is not a fool-proof panacea, but for those who follow the essentials of the plan, working out the details to fit their own local situation, it does provide a dignified, work-able, Christian way to finance the work of the Church of Christ. The Field Department remains ever at your service in this task.

The Reverend Percy T. Olton, Secretary, presented the following report of the Board of Examining Chaplains:

REPORT OF SECRETARY OF BOARD OF EXAMINING CHAPLAINS FOR 1939.

During the year there occurred the death of the Dean of the Board of Examining Chaplains, the Venerable Henry M. Ladd, and the appointment by the Bishop of his successor to the Presidency of the Board, the Rev'd Walter Ovid Kinsolving.

Archdeacon Ladd had served for many years on the Board and had given most faithful and efficient service.

To the vacancy caused by Archdeacon Ladd's death the Bishop appointed the Rev'd William L. Griffin, Jr.

The Board was also greatly saddened by the death of another of its members, the Rev'd Charles S. Armstrong.

Mr. Armstrong was in the full tide of his ministry when he was taken by our Lord for some higher service. We shall miss his wise counsel and outstanding ability as an examiner.

The Bishop appointed the Rev'd John H. Rosebaugh to the vacancy.

The Board has held its regular meetings for examination of candidates at Easter and Christmastide.

At the Easter examination four candidates appeared for examination in the subjects pertaining to the Priesthood: Messrs. Sydney E. Grant, Walter E. Welsh, Marland W. Zimmerman and the Rev'd Edward H. Van Houten. At the Christmas examination Messrs. Frederick E. Thalmann and Paul vanKuykendall Thomson were examined for the Diaconate. The candidates for both Orders passed satisfactorily and were recommended to the Bishop and Standing Committee for ordination.

A special meeting of the Board was called by its new President on Thursday, December 7th, at which time he appointed his committees and also suggested for adoption by this Board of the "Rules for Boards of Examining Chaplains" recommended by the Commission on the Ministry. These Rules, with some amendments, were accepted at the regular meeting on December 28th.

"The Rt. Reverend Benjamin M. Washburn, D.D., Bishop of Newarh, Trinity Cathedral, Newarh, N. J.:

"Through Your Diocesan Convention, may I express to you and your people my sincere best wishes and a call to go forward in the important year ahead. The last decade has been one of darkness in the world. We must now set our faces to the new decade before us determined to turn to victory what now seems defeat. Christ came at a time when the world seemed doomed. God chose that as the fullness of time for Jesus to come and through His Life and Work and Sacrifice on the Cross he reversed what seemed to be a current of defeat moving in human society. The Church can do the same today if she but wills it. I know we can count on the Diocese of Newark doing her share,

The Reverend Harold G. Willis moved, seconded from the floor, that a special committee be appointed to prepare an appropriate reply to the message of the Presiding Bishop.

Committee appointed: Reverend George W. Dawson and Mr. Walter Kidde.

The Chair at this point called on Col. Leigh K. Lydecker, a member of the National Council from the Second Province, to speak on the work of the Council. Col. Lydecker stated that with the fine spiritual and statemanlike leadership of the Presiding Bishop the watch-word of the Council is "Going Forward". He enumerated some of the difficulties of the mission field due to the havoc of war, and of the courage in the face of grave dangers of our missionary workers in the field. He also stated that he is happy to represent the Second Province as a member from the Diocese of Newark, and felt confident that the Convention would set the goal "Advance" for the Diocese of Newark.

Noon having arrived the Suffragan Bishop led in noon-day prayers and intercessions,

NOTES ON THE 1941 BUDGETS.

II.

BUDGET OF ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSES.

- 1. Convention luncheon; printing, including Convention Journal and Convention Ballots.
- 2. Janitor services, fuel, water, light, insurance, telephone, repairs, printing, stationery.
- Nominal salary of Secretary of Convention, and stipends of four workers at the Diocesan House.
- The Treasurer of the Convention receives no salary. This item is for charges of the bank as custodian of trust funds.
- Retiring allowance to Bishop Stearly, salaries of Bishop and Suffragan Bishop; pension premiums, motor allowances, insurance, taxes on Bishops' houses; office secretarial assistance, stationery.
- Salary of bookkeeper, printing, postage, stationery for the office of the Tressurer of the Finance and Advisory Board.
- 7. Newark's share, based on number of clergy, for expense of office of Presiding Bishop.
- It has been the custom to defray in part expenses of deputies to General Convention.
 If an appropriation is made each year, a sufficient amount will accumulate during the three year period between Conventions.

IV.

BUDGET FOR THE PROGRAM OF THE DIOCESE AND NATIONAL COUNCIL. (A) MISSIONARY WORK,

1. The following 60 parishes and missions are at the present time aided from this appropriation in varied ways. 52 receive grants on account of salary, though some are nominal. Where a vicer has charge of more than one mission station there is an allowance for automobile maintenance. At some stations where there are no rectories, houses are rented for the vicers.

The salary of the Ven. W. O. Leslie, Jr., Canon Missioner of the Diocese, and about \$400. per year for taxes on property owned by the Board of Missions which is not occupied or used for Church purposes, are included in this item.

The item for insurance is chiefly the insurance on automobiles owned by the Diocese and used in missionary work. The total amount \$51,875. is an increase of \$2,850. over our working budget for 1940. This will provide more nearly adequate stipends and motor allowances for some of the missionaries.

- Maintenance of work among the Italian speaking people in Hackensack, Garfield and Passaic.
- Salaries of three Chaplains of the Newark City Mission; pension premiums and small expense funds for the Chaplains, to assist in upkeep of their automobiles, etc.
- 4. Some years ago the Convention adopted as a proper minimum stipend for unmarried clergy \$1,800. and for married clergy \$2,000. and house. To help in meeting this minimum salary grants have in 1940 been made to the clergy of 12 parishes and missions. An increase of \$500. is asked for 1941. The total will still be inadequate to provide these minimum salaries.

(B) BENEVOLENT AND CHARITABLE WORK.

- 1. Bonnie Brae Farm received \$6,000. in 1931. In 1940 the grant from the Diocesan Budget is \$750. The title to the Farm is in the Board of Social Service of the Diocese of Newark and this outstanding piece of diocesan work deserves much greater support from the Diocese than it receives. The year round population is about 85 and in addition over 600 boys were given summer vacations at the Bonnie Brae Camp during the summer.
- The Church Mission of Help in 1931 received \$6,000. In 1940 the appropriation is \$3,500. The future development of C. M. H. is dependent upon the work receiving proper financial support.
- 3. A home for unmarried mothers in Jersey City which cares annually for about 15 girls and their babies. The Diocesan appropriation is supplemented by income from a small endowment and gifts of interested friends.
- A home for aged and convalescent women. Repairs, insurance and overhead expenses are cared for by this appropriation.

(C) EDUCATIONAL AND WELFARE WORK.

- The Board of Social Service receives annually from the James Barber Trust about \$500. This will be sufficient to care for the incidental expenses incurred by the Board in its work.
- Stipend of Field Secretary for Religious Education. Expenses of promoting summer and Young People's Conferences; teachers' meetings, office supplies, etc.

- 3. This covers salary of caretaker, taxes, insurance, repairs, replacements.
- The new format of the NEWARK CHURCHMAN requires a slightly larger appropriation than the present one of \$500.
- 5. This sum is asked for promotional work.

(D) FOR THE CHURCH AT LARGE.

In 1940 we have pledged to the National Council the sum of \$40,000. We ought to be giving at least \$45,000. and it is hoped that we may do so in 1941.

Mr. Henry J. Russell, Secretary of the Board of Missions and Church Extension, presented the following report:

Newark, New Jersey, May 14, 1940.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The Board of Missions and Church Extension has held nine meetings during the calendar year 1939.

Meeting-January 25th.

Committee reports were received and considered concerning acquisition of a house for Christ Church, Totowa, of land for Advent, Brookdale, and St. Peter's, Rochelle Park. No decision, but committees continued.

All Saints', Glen Rock—It was resolved, that notwithstanding this station is about to become an independent parish, the titles to the lands and premises of this place, now held in the name of this Board, be not transferred to the new Parish until the Board of Missions is released from all liability under bonds and mortgage now against said lands and premises.

St. James', Hackettstown—This preaching station has now been formally organized as a Mission of this Diocese.

Good Shepherd, Ringwood—A larger house has been rented. Four of the rooms will be occupied by Miss Bogert, the remainder of the house, four rooms, will be used for Mission purposes.

Christ, Passaic.—This Italian work is progressing in a fine way. Larger quarters needed. A committee for study and survey was appointed.

Meeting-February 19th.

St. Thomas', Lyndhurst—A committee for survey of needed repairs and renovations to the Church building was appointed. A unanimous recommendation was made to the Bishop that the "First Call" of the 1939 Extension Fund be for the needs of this station.

St. Luke's, Hope—Report was made that interior renovations and repairs to the heating are completed.

Re: Estate George Hulsart, deceased—A report was received showing that the estate is not sufficiently liquid to pay beneficiaries their bequests in cash, under the will of the decedent. By advice of counsel, it was decided to accept in lieu of cash, a mortgage on the premises No. 147 Ridgewood Ave., Glen Ridge, in the sum of \$5,000.00 at 3% interest to be made by the Executrix of the said estate to the Bishop of Newark and to become due on the day of expiration of a lease on the said premises made by the testator, or at the time of passing of title if the said premises are sold prior to the expiration of said lease.

At this meeting a resolution was offered, carried, that a Standing Committee to be known as the Trust and Finance Committee be appointed, whose duty will be to

watch the trend of the market securities and investments belonging to this Board and report quarterly.

Meeting-March 15th.

St. Luke's, Dumont—Consideration was given to the question of whether or not to continue work at this place, it was finally moved that a committee for further survey be appointed.

Meeting-April 19th.

Christ, Passaic—The committee on addition to the Church Building reported the cost as approximately \$2,061.00, present mortgage \$1,150.00, total \$3,211.00. It was ordered that the work proceed. The plan of financing being \$1,000.00 from the Bishop's Church Extension Fund and a recast mortgage in the sum of \$2,200.00 at 5% interest.

Bishop Washburn reported that he had initiated a new division of missionary work having to do with urban problems and that Canon Dawson as of April 15th would have charge of St. Luke's, and St. Mark's in Paterson, St. George's in Passaic, St. Stephen's in Delawanna, and Christ in Totowa. Provision is being made to provide him with an assistant as of June 1st.

Meeting-June 1st.

On this day the Board, in a body, visited stations in Vernon, Hamburg, Sparta, Lake Lackawanna, Hope, Washington and Belvidere. Luncheon was served at Sparta Inn and dinner was served by the ladies of Zion Church in Belvidere, after which the Board held its meeting. The Rev'd Mr. Popham was elected to serve the unexpired term of the late Rev'd Oscar Meyer.

St. Stephen's, Delawanna—Report was received that a new roof was needed to the Church building. The men of the Church will do the work if the Board will pay the material. The approximate cost of which is \$175.00.

St. Thomas', Lyndhurst—The committee on repairs to this place reports that the cost will be about \$4,100.00. The Mission has certain invested funds given by donors toward the erection of a new church building. They may, however, consent to the use of this fund to pay for the aforesaid repairs. It was moved and carried that the Committee be empowered to proceed with the work to the extent of funds available and provided without any additional expense to the Board.

Publicity—Consent was given to the Committee on Highway Publicity to install Church signs on the highways at an expense not to exceed \$300,00.

Good Shepherd, Ringwood—Report was made that Mr. Green of the Ringwood Company had offered to give us the frame church building in which we now hold services, and also will deed us a fine piece of land on the roadway across from the present location. To move and re-set the building on the new site and some necessary alterations and repairs will cost about \$1,400.00. It was moved that we accept the deed and that the Committee be given power to see the necessary work of moving, etc., through to completion. It was also recommended to the Bishop that he issue the Third Call on the Extension Fund for this purpose.

Meeting-September 14th.

Grace, Westwood.—This parish has paid all of its mortgage obligations. It was therefore moved and carried that this Board now transfer property held for Grace Church, Westwood, to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of the said Grace Church.

All Saints', Millington—It became necessary to install a new heating plant at a cost of \$1,100.00 and about \$500.00 had been raised by the Mission toward this cost. It was moved and carried that recommendation be made to the Bishop to make a gift in the sum of \$100.00 from the Extension Fund and also a loan of \$500.00 from the Loaning Fund at 4% interest in order to finance the said installation.

St. Paul's, Haworth—It was moved and carried that we sell our vacant land at this place to Sydney W. Wheeler for \$1,500.00 cash.

St. George's, Passaic—Certain repairs to cost \$500.00 are necessary to the Church building. It was on motion carried that the proper officers of this Board borrow the aforementioned sum from the Passaic National Bank and Trust Company.

Meeting-October 19th.

A special committee (Re: Clarke Mortgage, Old Rectory, St. John's, Bayonne) reported and advised that we accept an extension of three years' time on the mortgage at 5% interest and the principal sum to be amortized at the rate of \$20.00 each month beginning June 1940.

Meeting-November 15th.

St. James', Delaware—Repairs to the roof and other parts of the Church building had been made at a cost of \$374.34, part of which cost has been paid from interest from a small trust fund and the balance from the Church Extension Fund.

Mr. William F. Russell of Millington was then called on by the Chair to speak on the work of the Bishops' Church Extension Fund. A pamphlet illustrating the work of the Fund was distributed, and Mr. Russell explained the urgent need for increasing the number of subscribing members of the Fund in order to provide ample means for carrying forward the work so necessary in many quarters of the Diocese.

The Bishop announced that it was with great regret that he was compelled to report the resignation of Miss Minnie Malloy as Housemother at the Holiday House at Delaware. She has been the efficient and kind hostess to many gatherings of the Clergy and Laymen of the Diocese throughout the years since the Holiday House came into being, and she will be keenly missed.

It was moved and carried that the Secretary be directed to send a message to Miss Malloy expressing our gratefulness for her many years of service in the work of the Holiday House.

The Reverend Charles L. Gomph, Chairman of the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions, presented the following substitute resolution to take the place of the two resolutions introduced earlier in the day:

Resolved, that the Convention of the Diocese of Newark places itself on record as believing that the visible unity of all Christians is the will of our Lord, and that therefore sacrificial effort should be devoted to the work of achieving organic unity with the Presbyterians and with all other followers-of Christ, and

Resolved, that this Convention begs the General Convention to continue the joint Commission on Approaches to Unity, with the hope of fruitful results.

Whereupon after considerable discussion it was moved by Father Gomph, seconded by the Reverend W. L. Griffin, Jr., that the resolution be and is hereby adopted by this Convention. Carried.

The Chair announced that in accordance with the rule established the last few years opportunity is now offered the Board of Religious Education to present some phase of the work of the Board; he thereupon introduced as the speaker on Religious Education the Reverend C. Melville Wright, a Presbyterian Minister, Secretary, Essex County Council of Religious Education; Executive Secretary, New Jersey Christian Layman's Commission; N. J. Representative, International Council of Religious Education, who took as his main topic "Responsibility of the Church for released Public School time in the matter of religious education." He outlined the whole field of week-day religious education, and certain bills pending before the New Jersey Legislature.

It was moved and carried that the Convention extend to the Reverend Mr. Wright our appreciation for his splendid discourse on so important a subject.

The following report of the Board of Christian Social Service was read by the Reverend William K. Russell, and ordered placed on file.

The Board of Christian Social Service of the Diocese of Newark would like to share with the Convention some of the matters which it sees as challenging the Christian conscience and calling for Christian planning and activity in these days. Your Board, through its Committees, has made many studies.

One of these has had to do with the parish and its relations to community agencies both public and private. In some instances it is discovered that the rector and his parishioners set the standard of constructive social work in the community. In other instances it is discovered that there is little or no relationship between the parish and community agencies. In between these two extremes varying relationships exist. To overcome this condition what apparently is required is definite leadership for the clergy to aid them to understand and grasp the point of view of the community social worker. This is not simply learning to know where the agencies exist. It is to comprehend the philosophy and principles of modern social work.

One of our Committees has given time and study to the question of the refuges. Religious and racial persecution abroad has resulted in bringing to our shores some of its victims. We cannot but recognize in them the counterparts of our own ancestors who came to America because they, too, were denied freedom in Europe.

Christian charity, as well as loyalty to the democratic tradition, requires that we welcome these refugees and help them to find happiness in the land which has offered to us an asylum from persecution. In the most real possible sense our attitude towards the refugees of this day determines both the degree to which we are ready to exemplify Christian morality, and the extent to which we are determined to apply the principles of democracy.

To do this work well we must be organized in its interests. Parish committees should be set up to handle local refugee needs. Information about the truth of the refugee situation should be disseminated. Every effort should be made to incorporate individual refugees and refugee families into the social and economic life of our communities; and, too, the requirements of American citisenship must not be overlooked. All of this demands more than local activity. It demands the assistance and direction that only the Diocese can give.

The Diocesan Convention a year ago was strongly reminded of some of the facts concerning the status of the negro in New Jersey as brought out by the survey authorized by our State Legislature. The implications of these facts are far reaching and distressing as one comes to appreciate them. It is the business of the Christian Church to know them, and, beginning with her own life, her agencies and institutions, and her attitudes, see to it that in them above all else we reflect the mind of Christ.

Our Committee on Pending Legislation has had before it two matters primarily: (1) the Wages and Hours Bill and the Child Labor Bill which would limit the working hours of women and children and which attempt to meet certain distressing conditions as regards child labor in the State of New Jersey; (2) the pennicious Alien Bills Senate 3 and 5 which would register all allens and on the surface are reasonable legislation but actually could become instruments of racial and minority persecution.

It has been suggested more than once that the real touchstone of the Christian religion may well be its effective action on such matters as the above.

The Board of Social Service has attempted during the past year or more to carry on an educational and constructive program on these and related subjects without the assistance of an executive secretary. It wishes to report to the Diocesan Convention its conviction that it is impossible for any really wide-spread, continuing activity along these lines, important to the whole Church, to be carried on the amount of time which the members can spare from already overcrowded days. The years when the Diocese of Newark had this full time leadership were years of great advance in Christian Social thinking and action in the State of New Jersey.

It would therefore recommend most heartily to the Convention the restoration of the appropriation to provide for a well qualified executive with experience in the Church, community organization, and social legislation. The Board believes that this is one of the pressing and challenging obligations of the Diocese.

The Fifth Annual Convention Address of the Suffragan Bishop, the Right Reverend Theodore R. Ludlow, D.D. was then read to the Convention.

The Reverend W. O. Kinsolving, Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons submitted the following proposed canon, and moved its adoption, seconded by Mr. Capron:

The Finance and Advisory Board submitted to this Committee on Constitutional Canons for study, a new canon on Church Debts, proposed by the Province of Washington, and afterwards commended by the Synod of the Second Province for study by each Diocese. The proposed canon is as follows:

- I. No indebtedness shall be incurred by a parish, mission, or congregation without the approval of (a) both the Bishop and Standing Committee, or (b) the Bishop and Finance Committee, except:
 - (a) Indebtedness for permanent improvements, replacements, or additions to real estate or equipment, where the amount of such indebtedness, plus indebtedness of every kind already existing, shall not exceed 150% of the average annual receipts of such parish, mission, or congregation during the past three years;
 - (b) Indebtedness for current expenses where the amount of such indebtedness, plus all indebtedness heretofore incurred for current expenses and still existing, shall not exceed 20% of the total current receipts of such parish, mission, or congregation during the preceding fiscal year; and the payment of all such indebtedness shall be provided for in the budget of the next ensuing fiscal year, with reasonable expectation of its payment out of the receipts of the next two years.
- II. Provided that in computing receipts under paragraph (a) and (b) hereof, amounts from or for endowments or from or by bequests, except income therefrom not specially designated, and receipts for expenditures other than parochial shall not be included.

III. Provided that under any circumstances under which approval is required, it shall be granted only when the payment of all indebtedness shall be provided for in a plan of amortization or other method of payment to be submitted to and approved by the same authority.

IV. This canon shall not apply to the re-financing of existing loans.

Your Committee submits as a substitute for the proposed canon the following:

- I. It shall be the policy of the church in this diocese that no indebtedness shall be incurred by a parish, mission, or congregation without consultation with either (a) the Bishop and Standing Committee, or (b) the Bishop and Finance and Advisory Board, except:
 - (a) Indebtedness for permanent improvements, replacements or additions to real estate or equipment, where the amount of such indebtedness, plus indebtedness of every kind already existing, shall not exceed 150% of the average annual receipts of such parish, mission, or congregation during the past three years;
 - (b) Indebtedness for current expenses where the amount of such indebtedness, plus all indebtedness heretofore incurred for current expenses and still existing, shall not exceed 20% of the total current receipts of such parish, mission, or congregation during the preceding fiscal year; and the payment of all such indebtedness shall be provided for in the budget of the next ensuing fiscal year with reasonable expectation of its payment out of the receipts of the next two years.

Provided that in computing receipts under paragraph (a) and (b) hereof, amounts from or for endowments or from or by bequests, except income therefrom not specially designated, and receipts for expenditures other than parochial shall not be included.

Provided also that under any circumstances under which consultation is required, the payment of all indebtedness should be provided for in a plan of amortization or other method of payment to be submitted to and approved by the same authority.

II. The Rector, Vicar or Minister who shall have charge of any parish or mission within the diocese shall not join in or give his consent to the incurring of indebtedness in violation of this canon; and if the Parish or Mission over which he has jurisdiction shall, without his consent, incur any indebtedness in violation of this canon, said Rector, Vicar or Minister shall make a prompt report thereof to the ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese.

III. This canon shall not apply to the re-financing of existing indebtedness at the time of the adoption of this canon.

After considerable discussion it was moved and carried that the proposed canon be referred back to the Committee on Constitution and Canons for further study and report at the next Annual Convention,

The Chairman of the Tellers of the elections reported the following result of the fourth ballot:

For Deputies to General Convention—Number of votes cast: Clergy, 97; Lay, 91. Necessary for choice: Clergy, 49; Lay, 46. Rev'd James A. Mitchell: Clergy, 51; Lay, 48.

Mr. Henry Young thereupon moved, seconded by Reverend L. H. Hinrichs that the four highest nominees on the first ballot be selected and elected as Alternate Deputies to the General Convention. The Reverend David K. Montgomery requested that his name be withdrawn from the list of nominees. Motion carried,

The Reverend L. H. Hinrichs moved, seconded by the Reverend W. L. Griffin, Jr., that the following nominees in the Clerical Order be elected as Alternates Deputies to the General Convention by vote of the Clergy:

Carried.

Mr. Henry Young moved, seconded by Mr. Henry J. Russell that the same nominees in the Lay vote be selected and elected as Alternate Deputies to the General Convention. Carried.

The Chair declared them duly elected by both the Clergy and Lay.

The same motion was made, seconded and adopted that the following nominees in the Lay Order be duly elected Alternate Deputies to the General Convention:

Mr. Warren H. Turner: Clergy, 40; Lay, 20; Total, 60. Mr. Edward E. Poor, Jr.: Clergy, 33; Lay, 25; Total, 58. Mr. Charles B. Johnes: Clergy, 23; Lay, 27; Total, 50. Mr. William T. Kirk, III: Clergy, 27; Lay, 20; Total, 47.

Carried in each order.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the two highest in each order as nominees as Deputies to the Provincial Synod on the first ballot be elected as Alternate Deputies.

Rev'd John A. Frampton: Clergy, 48; Lay, 31½; Total, 79½. Rev'd Joseph Anastasi: Clergy, 50; Lay, 29; Total, 79. Mr. Rudolph J. Mayer: Clergy, 60; Lay, 31; Total, 91. Mr. Frederick G. Stuart: Clergy, 36; Lay, 32½; Total, 68½.

The vote being taken in each order the Chair declared the above duly elected Alternate Deputies to the Provincial Synod.

The Chair expressed the thanks and appreciation of the Convention to Dean, Curate and Wardens and Vestrymen of Trinity Cathedral for their kind hospitality to the Convention; and also the Chair expressed his gratitude to the members of the Convention for their kindly assistance in making the Convention so expeditious and helpful.

It was moved and carried that this Convention adjourn sine die after prayers and Benediction by the Bishop.

The Episcopal Addresses

EIGHTH ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE BISHOP OF NEWARK

My Brethren of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of Newark:

Each year it is our privilege to remember with gratitude those who have joined the ranks of the Church Expectant. We commemorate this year these servants of Christ who served him as Bishops of the Church:

Robert Lewis Paddock, retired Bishop of Eastern Oregon—a friend of the needy and the oppressed.

Philip Mercer Rhinelander, retired Bishop of Pennsylvania—a scholar of deep spiritual intuition.

James Wise, Bishop of Kansas—an inspiring preacher of righteousness. John Newton McCormick, retired Bishop of Western Michigan—a faithful soldier and servant of the Church.

Charles Edward Woodcock, retired Bishop of Kentucky—a wise and faithful administrator.

George Craig Stewart—Bishop of Chicago—an eloquent and militant preacher of great spiritual vision.

The ranks of the clergy of our own Diocese have also sustained losses. Henry Manchester Ladd came to the Church of the Holy Communion, Norwood, in 1891. After a four year's ministry there he served as rector of Grace Church, Rutherford, for twenty-five years. The Diocese gave him every honor which it is within the province of the Diocesan Convention to give. By the integrity of his character, his good learning, and his faithfulness, he made and held friends.

Henry B. Bryan for sixteen years rector of Grace Church, VanVorst, Jersey City, greatly loved the poor.

Charles Steele Armstrong was for twelve years the greatly loved rector of St. Elizabeth's Church, Ridgewood. He had previously served as Priest-in-charge of All Saints' Church, Glen Rock, and as an assistant in St. Paul's Church, Paterson. After leaving Paterson he was for six years rector of St. Matthew's Church, Jersey City.

Everard P. Miller resigned as rector of St. Thomas' Church, Newark, thirty years ago and at that time retired from the active Ministry.

For these faithful servants of our Lord and His Church and for others, no less faithful though not here named, we ask God's continued blessing and tender care.

In my address to the Convention a year ago I expressed the hope that in contrast to the seven lean years through which we had passed, the succeeding seven should be like the fat kine in Pharaoh's dream. Tonight we may take courage in the consciousness that my hope has had some degree of fulfillment. It is difficult to chart the spiritual advance of the Church, but from more than one source I hear of larger congregations and a growing willingness to work, as well as to pray and to give for the spread of Christ's Kingdom. Although we may not fully cite the varied evidences of the Church's advance, we may pause to record with gratitude the fact that in the year 1939 our parishes and missions gave for extra-parochial purposes the largest sum since 1933. At the same time many of our congregations have been able to make delayed and much needed improvements in their physical properties. A little progress seems to have been made in the reduction of the all too heavy load of indebtedness which retards the work of the Church.

of a civil ceremony in every instance. Subsequently the Church might offer a religious ceremony to those, and those only, who hold to the ideal of Christian marriage as the life-long union of man and wife, wherein each seeks unselfishly the highest good of the other in humble dependence upon God's grace for the performance of the obligation of each in the new relationship. I deplore suggestions that the Canon should be so amended as to give to the Bishop of a diocese well-nigh unlimited discretionary power to determine under what conditions he will grant a dispensation to a divorced person to be remarried by a minister of the Church. Practical no less than doctrinal considerations make such a course of action unthinkable. Legislation of itself cures few ills. We have been called a teaching Church, but I sometimes doubt our right to such distinction. Too frequently we allow our children to grow to maturity with little if any understanding of the true nature and obligations of Christian marriage. In Church Schools, Confirmation classes, Young People's Fellowships we have not only abundant opportunity-but also, I say with emphasis, the responsibility. The alert, intelligent, and sympathetic pastoral care by shepherds of their flocks will again and again prevent the wreckage of families and homes. We who have the cure and care of human souls should be able to avert a disaster which threatens the foundations of a home within our cure. It is part of the pastor's task to win the confidence of his people in his discretion, his sympathy, and his understanding. If he has succeeded in winning it, he can do far more than canons to safeguard and purify our family life.

I mention only one other matter which will receive attention at General Convention-the question of Social Security for lay employees of the Church. Provision is made by the Church for widows and orphans of its clergy and for those clergy who by reason of age or physical disability retire from active service. Although the nature of the relationship to the Church of its lay employees is quite different from that of the clergy, the Church should recognize its responsibility for them also. General Convention of 1937 provided for the appointment of a Joint Commission to study the nature of this responsibility and varied ways of its fulfillment. Although this Commission will report its findings to General Convention this autumn, at its meeting last December the National Council curiously enough exposed itself to the criticism of acting ultra vires by adopting resolutions on the subject which have been sent to the several Dioceses, together with majority and minority reports of the Committee of the Council, from which the resolutions came—a document of nearly fifty pages. It is obviously impossible for me even to summarize the lengthy report, still less for it to be read, digested, and fairly considered by us tomorrow. The majority report expressed the opinion that our lay employees should be brought within the coverage of the pension provisions of the Federal Social Security Act. The minority registered their dissent from this opinion, though fully concurring in the judgment that the Church has a moral responsibility for the old age

security of its lay employees. The separation of Church and State is a principle in our national life which must not be endangered. To bring lay employees within the coverage of Act means taxation of the Church by the State, and faxation involves the power to regulate and in some degree to control. This basic argument of the minority seems to me sane and sound. Others may disagree. A lengthy debate by thoroughly informed persons who had made a careful study of the rather technical questions involved would be of great interest. Except after study or discussion, most of us would doubt the value or the wisdom of action by our Convention in its business session. The Joint Commission next October will suggest ways for the discharge of the responsibility which the Church must recognize. When General Convention has heard the report of the Commission, it will doubtless take appropriate action. Our own Convention meets for but one day, while General Convention meets for more than two weeks. We may safely trust to the wisdom of the latter, with its ampler opportunity for deliberation.

We are meeting at a time of crisis, when men's hearts and minds even in this land at peace are sorely troubled. The swift march of events leaves us appalled at the tide of human misery which has engulfed our brethren across the sea. Over the face of Europe again ride the four horsemen of the Apocalypse; death, plague, famine, and the sword leave in their wake destruction too abhorrent to contemplate without an indignation for which the strongest words are quite inadequate. There is no need for me tonight to denounce the evils which every one of us deplores with all our heart. Platitudes are as valueless as invectives, and I have no desire to utter truisms nor by the use of rhetoric to play upon your emotions. It is a time for clear, calm, constructive, and conscientious thinking. Rival ideologies are contending for the mastery of men's minds. America long since made her choice between them. In the face of this conflict, we must reaffirm our stout conviction that the infinite worth of human personality is of the very essence of the Christian faith. Freedom to enjoy what we term man's natural rights-life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness-is God's will for every man, without distinction of race, class, or creed.

Wherever and whenever this freedom is imperilled, then and there, the Christian religion is attacked. No honest servant of the Master can regard without alarm the danger not to the Church alone; for civilization itself, with all those values which make life worth the living, is involved.

It is true that this freedom which is the birthright of us all has never in its fulness been the happy lot of any land. The motives of those who in the present struggle resist the spread of totalitarianism are doubtless not unmixed. Of course they seek to maintain that balance of power in Europe which existed in the last decade. They have perhaps failed to grant in some of their far-flung possessions that liberty for which they have said

that they have taken up their arms. Their record is not unblemished but in the main they are on the side of honor, truth, and liberty. Leaders among them are by no means blind to the occasional partial discrepancy between their ideals and their practices. It cannot, for example, be denied, that it is only among them that protests against governmental policies can be freely raised. The events of last week are sufficient evidence for this statement. I quote from a recent issue of the News Letter, published in England by the Council on the Christian Faith and the Common Life. "It is entirely unchristian and dangerously misleading to dramatise the present conflict as a crusade or holy war. A sufficient case can be made for resisting the immoral doctrines of Nazism and the tyranny which threatens to engulf the world, without falling into the unchristian error of regarding evil as something that exists only, or chiefly, in our opponents. That is pure selfdeception. It blinds us to the existence of faults in ourselves and of radical evils in our own society which must be remedied if it is to survive. An attitude of self-righteousness and complacency is thus the chief hindrance to that fundamental repentance and penitence out of which alone a genuinely new order can be born." We in America also have no cause for smug complacency as though we had succeeded in building a perfect society where without fear or favor, every citizen could enter into the rightful inheritance of the sons of God. There is no open persecution of minorities in our country, but one is blind who fails to recognize both the limitations to the freedom of our Negro brothers and the social ostracism of Jewish comrades. Unscrupulous politicians here and elsewhere find it quite possible to hush the voice of the opposition and nullify reforms. We too have our shame and sorrow.

Perhaps there are a few among us who have the conviction that the United States ought immediately to come actively to the assistance of those whom they believe to be fighting for those ideals which all of us hold dear. At this moment, however, the vast majority of Americans are definitely opposed to any alteration of our present foreign policy. No one can predict the events of the next few months. As new situations develop, I plead for calm and Christian thinking. We must not allow ourselves to be led blindly into the horrors of war by the insidious and subtle propaganda of any industrial or financial interests whose personal profits might lead them to sacrifice the flower of our youth upon the altar of the god of War. Another motive may be urged for our participation in the struggle. The God of Christian altars has Himself implanted within us the instinct of self-preservation. It is the instinct of the nation no less than of the individual. It is, however, not yet clear to me that our existence as a free nation would be definitely endangered by the defeat of Britain and of France. When by force of arms, a conqueror extends his unwelcome sway over great areas of unwilling peoples, history reveals the instability of his empire. There is a definite limit to the extent of territory which having

won, he can still securely hold. There is a third motive, higher than self-preservation, which might lead our people to clamor for an entrance into the present strife—the preservation of those ideals of humanity which both as Americans and as Christians we deem priceless. Such motives when they are held in sincerity and truth, rising above the plane of self-interest soar to noble heights of sacrificial love. If in the days which lie before us they be urged with importunity, we must still ask if there is not yet a more excellent way. If thick darkness threatens to engulf the old world, may it not be that our own brightly burning light will prove to be the salvation of men's hopes and dreams of happiness, security, and peace? May it not be the mission of this free land, unhindered by war's sad travail, to demonstrate beyond the shadow of a doubt that democracy is no idle dream? If from that motive, aware of evils among ourselves still to be mended, and aloof from the present struggle, we labor towards that end, we shall best serve God and His mad, troubled world.

I speak of a further reason which whatever comes, will inevitably lead some among us to protest against our entrance into war. The Oxford Conference in 1937 among three main positions sincerely and conscientiously held by Christians set forth the position of one group as follows: "Some believe that war, especially in its modern form, is always sin, being a denial of the nature of God as love, of the redemptive way of the Cross, and of the community of the Holy Spirit; that war is always ultimately destructive in its effects, and ends in futility by corrupting even the noblest purpose for which it is waged; and that the Church will become a creative, regenerating, and reconciling instrument for the healing of the nations only as it renounces war absolutely." One of the American delegates to the Peace Conference at Versailles, General Tasker Bliss, said at that time, "We are in for a low period, then a high period, then the devil will be to pay all over the world." Without the implementing League of Nations and an effective Permanent Court of International Justice, the treaty of Versailles provided for a dangerous peace. In that treaty were sown the seeds of the present warfare. Germany bided her time to regain her prestige, then struck her swift blows. England retaliates by the imposition of a blockade. Germany fearing starvation, invades the low countries. General Bliss' prophecy is fulfilled. War leads to further wars. A generation ago the world was made dangerous, not safe, for democracy. Experience frequently brings disillusionment, and though I cannot yet bring myself to renounce war absolutely, I honor the courage of many of those who declare that they can never again countenance resort to armed force. Even democratic states tend to become totalitarian in time of war, therefore the Church must stand firmly for every man's freedom to obey the inner light. One must not render unto Caesar the things that are God's, and to God belong one's conscience. The National Council has issued the following statement: "Both by official resolution and by statement in Pastoral Letters, our Church has recognized the right of freedom of conscience for those who, though willing to risk their lives in non-combatant service, are unwilling, for conscience sake, to take human life in war. The National Council has set up a register under the care of the executive secretary of the Department of Christian Social Relations, wherein all those who supply evidence of being baptized or confirmed members of the Protestant Episcopal Church, may record their convictions as conscientious objectors.

"It should be clearly understood by anyone registering as a conscientious objector, that the mere registration of this fact carries with it no assurance that he will not be subject for conscription for military service or some form of non-combatant military service." However misguided he may seem to some of us, the conscientious objector has his rights and if need arise they must be defended in the name of freedom.

"Bear ye one another's burdens" is a Christian summons. We must give our generous support to every effort to minister to those who suffer in the face of cruel warfare. Already we have been called upon to send succour to the people of China, Poland, Finland, and others of our neighbors. Calls will continue, and we must respond as generously as we are able. There are few parishes, I trust, in which the women both individually and as members of guilds and auxiliaries, have not already sent many a warm garment to clothe the needy, and surgical dressings in abundance to relieve the wounded. We must not fail also to remember the suffering in our intercessions. It is hardly necessary for me to remind the clergy that no Sunday, perhaps no Service, should pass without the earnest prayer in all our Churches for God's tender mercies upon stricken peoples.

We must pray also for the establishment of peace as early as is consistent with justice and righteousness. In the making of that peace, the world will sorely need the guidance of the Holy Spirit, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of redeeming love. We in America are not anxiously scanning day by day lists of the missing, wounded, dead. If, however, we too were paying a heavy price. I trust that I should still have grace to speak as a Christian minister, required at his consecration to "maintain and set forward quietness, love, and peace among all men." Among the worthwhile Headline Books of the Foreign Policy Association is one called "The Peace that Failed" by Varian Fry, a former editor of "The Living Age." The series to which it belongs aims to provide sufficient unbiased background information to enable readers to reach intelligent and independent conclusions in international problems. Mr. Fry's book ends as follows: "One thing at least seems clear. That is that either in collective security or in union lies Europe's only hope of lasting peace. The only other choice is more power politics. If the side which wins the war imposes its own kind of peace on the defeated enemy the enemy will grit his teeth and prepare for the day when he can throw off the shackles of that peace and

impose his terms instead. In other words, it will be the story of Germany and the 'Versailles Diktat' all over again. And the continued story of balance-of-power wars will probably go on and on as long as there is anyone left to fight them." It is difficult to rise above past wrong, to forego bitterness, but a Christian peace is one which seeks to be not vindictive but redemptive. Forgiveness is not the remission of punishment, but its chief objective is the restoration to the offender of his self-respect, that they who forgive and they who are forgiven may find a basis for a new relationship in which each may make his contribution for the sake of all.

Viewing the present misery of the old world we cannot, like the Pharisee in the Temple, thank God that we are not as other men. We have our measure of guilt for the pitiful plight of Europe. We shared in the shaping of the Treaty of Versailles, but we withdrew from further responsibility for its terms. It had been hoped that through the Covenant of the League of Nations and the Permanent Court of International Justice, opportunity would be afforded for the peaceful settlement of disputes between the nations of a Europe where boundaries were so hastily established as to preclude absolute justice. We need not review the causes which led to the dissociation of our nation from the problems of the new Europe. We had our responsibility and we failed to fulfill it, but God gives to men and nations a second chance. For the maintenance of an enduring peace, please God, the nations will still find a way to achieve through association some form of collective security. America must not then seek a magnificently selfish isolation from the problems of a world in which distance has been annihilated. The family of nations, now rent asunder by a cruel feud, must one day find again a way to harmony and concord. Peace is won and maintained within a family only through the sacrifice of self-interest, the willingness to accept responsibility, and the surrender of privilege. God give us grace to do our part in the final establishment of an enduring peace.

This is Whitsuntide, the blessed season in which we commemorate the fulfillment of Christ's promise to His Church. "I will not leave you comfortless." "Ye shall receive power," He had said, "after that the Holy Spirit is come upon you." That promise is the ground of the world's hope in its night of doubt and sorrow. By their faithfulness even in captivity a remnant of the nation saved God's people Israel. Not in force, nor in might, but in the aid and comfort of His Holy Spirit is a people's strength. Though the foundations of the earth be shaken, yet we may safely trust in God. Man's blind folly may for a hundred years impede the achievement of His purpose, but a thousand ages in His sight are like an evening gone. His arm is not shortened, nor His mercy clean gone forever. Though we be perplexed, He shall save us from despair.

Never more sorely than at this time has the world needed the staunch faith of thorough going Christian men and women. First each of us must rekindle at the altar the flame of his own devotion to the saving Christ. We are summoned to a more true loyalty to the Church which bears His name, to the consecration of our time, our talents,—what we have and what we are—in His service whom we profess to call our Lord and Master. Let each of us take upon his lips the Chinese convert's prayer, "Lord, revive Thy Church, beginning with me". By our witness to the transforming power of the Holy Spirit, we must then bring others within the sphere of His redeeming grace. As one man, we must advance together with a burning passion for the world around us. It is the Presiding Bishop of the Church who writes, "Only a Church which is on fire with desire can save the world." God bless us one and all and may He use us for the healing of the nations and the glory of His name. Amen.

FIFTH ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE SUFFRAGAN BISHOP

Fellow workers in Christ:

Isaiah said, "When thy judgments are in the earth, the inhabitants of the world will learn righteousness". There are two ways in which people learn righteousness under such circumstances. They may learn it by the destructive power of catastrophe. On the other hand, being warned by the evidence of unrighteousness in their midst, they may learn righteousness by studying and striving to remove the causes of unrighteousness. Let us labor that our nation may learn righteousness in this latter way.

The choice before the American people lies between assuming, and paying the price for, a firm moral leadership in the world by making a responsible effort to build up a cooperative internationalism or facing a devastating war directed at us from both Europe and Asia later on when the spirit of isolationism has sapped our own confidence and turned away the confidence of other nations. At present we turn anxious eyes upon Europe, but we must not think that the present warfare in that area comprises the whole theatre of conflict. The world's next big problem lies in Asia and not in Europe. We of the United States will awaken to that fact on or about August 22nd, when the trade treaty between the Netherlands and Japan expires.

A step in assuming a position of moral leadership would be the with-drawal of trade with Japan, particularly in potential war material, as a mark of our disapproval of her aggression upon China. Such a step would materially shorten the period of aggression all round. Japan has nowhere else to buy her materials during the conflict in Europe in spite of her boasts. A cessation of the conflict in China would materially ease the situation for the Allies in Europe. The talk of a possible combination between Japan and Russia is Japanese propaganda issued to prevent the United States from taking such a step. If such a union should be formed, it would be temporary because the interests and ideologies of the two countries are diametrically opposite. The real danger in the East lies in a China turning to Russia in desperation as the only source of help. If one fourth of the human race comes under the control of Soviet Russia, we will then have a real problem on our hands.

The fundamental question before the world today is: Shall man be free to work out a greater and richer life by self-imposed obligations in cooperation with his fellow men looking toward a common enrichment, or must he live the kind of life that may be dictated to him by those who have the power to do so? Striving to bury ourselves in isolation, shuddering, wringing our hands, or passing resolutions will not answer that question. We will never find the answer until we learn to face facts unflinchingly and recognize our Christian responsibility for the whole world.

The present world situation is not merely an international problem. The problem has its roots in national life. The reason why Hitler has been able to strike almost at will is due not only to the efficiency of his military arm, but to intranational injustices and maladjustments in the countries where he has struck. Our wisest preparation against international military involvement is to set our own house in order. So much emphasis is being put upon the international situation that we are in danger of overlooking the threats to the democratic system which exist in this country. Pressure groups of all kinds are demanding that their particular way be followed to the exclusion of all others in order that we may be strengthened against alleged or potential enemies. These pressure groups appeal to patriotism for the cloaking of self-interest. Playing upon the fears of insecure people, they urge that their point of view shall be forced upon everybody else as the only safe and patriotic way of life. Some may be sincere, but they need to study the Englishman's faith in democracy in a time of national crisis.

When men feel insecure, as they do at the present time in this country, they look very readily for a scapegoat in some group, idea or principle, upon which they can heap the blame for all of their ills. Out of such a situation come economic discrimination, class consciousness, race prejudice and religious intolerance. We are stewards of democracy for the world and we must maintain the democratic process even through national and international crises at any cost consistent with democracy itself. In the securing of such a process we must frankly face the fact that every single individual is invaluable to democracy, but that no one individual is indispensable to it.

Democracy more than any other form of government requires responsible leadership and a responsible citizenry. Both leadership and citizenry must be willing to serve the minority as well as the majority. The all too prevalent tendency in both leadership and citizenry today is to follow the crowd. There is all too little of the kind of leadership that will stand on principle and take the political consequences. Similarly, there is all too much of the kind of citizenship which is indifferent to political responsibility and thereby makes it possible for the political boss and the professional politician to thrive. Counting upon the indifference of those who should be responsible citizens, the political boss is able to gain control by the use of respectable names, bi-partisan tools and the contributions of wealthy and ambitious men. When these devices seem insufficient, it is always possible to put forward so-called independent candidates.

There probably never was a time when it was more urgent for all citizens of this country to exercise their suffrage and to exercise it with moral discernment. And that discernment must be applied to the local office seeker just as truly as to the national. We do not get good government simply by putting a good man at the top. We can expect nothing but professional politicians and the wastage of public funds as long as those who

should exercise their suffrage intelligently do not do so and excuse themselves by saying that they are busy or that politics is a dirty business. Many years ago Rousseau said, "As soon as any man says of the affairs of state What does it matter to me?", the state may be given up as lost".

The starting point for securing the right men in office and for securing national cooperation in the face of world danger is in our own personal point of view. We must see to it that we honestly look for the good of the whole rather than to the profit of our part. We must build up in our minds and in the minds of those with whom we come into contact the inclusive idea of our common family relationship and then see to it that our every day practices express that relationship. To overcome the totalitarian idea, we must not only insist upon the worth of the individual, but we must put all of the resources of society, of the government and of the Church at the service of every individual that he may feel and learn to practice the responsibilities of his family relationship. We must invent and learn how to use instruments of cooperative enterprise in order that we may effectively combat the ruthless efficiency of totalitarianism.

Whenever men and women and children are compelled by economic competition, poverty, discrimination or injustice, to live in circumstances which prevent human development and growth, there the Church has a responsibility which it must meet not only by way of protest but more particularly by way of creating a sense of responsibility in the community for the removal of that condition. This is not only a Christian responsibility, but also a practical necessity. For example, the present economic and social maladjustments are reflected in a reduction in our financial return and in lessened Church attendance and activity. The lessened financial return is undoubtedly due to reduced incomes on the part of many of our people, but the lessened personal activity is due to a feeling that the membership of the Church as a whole is not interested in the social and economic problems which press upon many of the members of our respective communitties. In all candor one will have to admit that there seems to be some basis for this feeling. In the face of threatened world chaos, in the presence of hopeless and exploited adolescents, in the presence of wretched housing conditions, in the presence of injustice and of discrimination, the all too recurrent ecclesiastical reactions are the passing of resolutions or the wringing of our hands in dismay that such things should be. There are too many complacent communicants among us today who are averse to facing reality and who think of the Church as some kind of a religious bomb shelter in which they can hide from the unpleasantness of life. We must arouse our own people to the realization that it is hypocrisy to claim to be Christian and yet to seek to avoid the social implications of that Christianity.

We will avoid discouragement and confusion if we first try to get the

right perspective on our present social and economic problems. We must recognize as an historic fact that man has always struggled to make his toil easier. It is only right and sensible that he should do so, but every time he invents a new implement by which he can make that toil easier, he finds himself face to face with the necessity of readjusting his social life to the competition aroused by the use of this new implement on the part of others.

This process of economic invention and social readjustment has been intensified in the last 150 years by the application of power to production. This application has necessitated sweeping social readjustments which we are still experiencing. As Christian men and women, we need to realize that the real test of man's progress lies not in the eleverness of his machines, but in the effectiveness of his social readjustment to the use of those machines. At the present stage of his development we know that man has learned to produce. He has proved that to his own sorrow. His skill in production has left him in want in the midst of plenty. He has not yet learned to distribute his products. That is primarily a social problem and not an economic one. It is a problem of human relationship and not of mechanical skill. Being a problem in human relationship, the Church has a vital interest in it.

While it is true that the power period of production has complicated our social relationships, still it has also widened man's horizons and broadened the field of his activities. Thanks to his power of production, man can now live anywhere in the world and he is able to feed himself in any part of the world. The fact of that accomplishment should give us the courage to work on toward the necessary social readjustments involved. If man has the ability to make the world a physical neighborhood, he also has the skill and ingenuity to make it a human brotherhood if he will apply himself intelligently to the task. Our social problems in this country are not the problems of disease, but of immaturity and we should take courage from that fact. We are slowly learning that health lies in cooperative effort toward a common goal rather than in compulsion to a pre-determined end. When a boy breaks street lamps and milk bottles today, we do not call in the police,—we call in the social worker to help us find some proper outlet for his energies. The nurturing of character based on the idea of God's Fatherhood and man's brotherhood is still basic to the solution of our problems. Given good will, the solution of them will not clude us if we will face facts honestly, will call upon science to help us, and will have the courage, the patience and the unselfishness to serve personally in securing a Christian solution. Because of the size of the problem created by man's amazing mechanical skill, no one individual or agency is sufficient for the task. We must have cooperative effort and social planning for our day which shall be broad enough to cover all life and not merely the lives of the handicapped or unfortunate. We must realize that social planning is

not the clever device of any political party but the inevitable and necessary method of human readjustment to our greatly developed mechanical skill. As Christians we must keep the task of readjustment from being claimed as the patent of any political party. The Christian basis of readjustment is the frank recognition of our common family relationship and efforts to that end should have the inspiration and support of the Church.

Because of the size of the problem and its ramifications, the government must inevitably take a very active part and it has done so. The Social Security Act as passed in 1935 and amended in 1939 provides for old age and survivors insurance administered by the Federal government and offers Federal cooperation and financial assistance to the several States in nine Federal-State programs: unemployment insurance, aid to the needy aged, the needy blind and dependent children, national service on behalf of maternal and child health, child welfare, crippled children, public health and vocational rehabilitation.

In spite of Federal aid in facing the problem of unemployment, we still have approximately nine million unemployed. We have this army of unemployed people in the face of the fact that our business index is today about twenty points higher than it was in 1929. This does not necessarily mean that the national scheme of assistance has failed. It does indicate that unemployment insurance is not the answer to our problem except in the case of certain seasonal workers, and it also indicates that the Works Progress Administration does not furnish a final solution although it has provided material help. The number is as large as it is partly by reason of the fact that 500,000 young people come out of school each year and try for employment. That fact gives us a partial clew to the strange anomaly of a business index that has increased while the number of unemployed has remained approximately the same.

An unhappy feature of the situation is that the school graduates tend to displace older workers. This displacement of older workers adds to a growing problem in our country. As a nation our population is growing steadily older. In 1910 there were about six million in this country who reached the age of 65. In 1940, the number has doubled and we now have twelve million people of the age of 65. It is estimated that in 1960 we shall have sixteen million people of the age of 65. This fact explains the eagerness of so many politicians for old age pensions. We must be on our guard against these politicians. We face an unusual combination of circumstances. Older persons continue to vote even if they are no longer able to earn a living and their children who should feel some moral responsibility for their financial support also vote. The combination creates a great quantity of voting power which it is hard for the office seeking politicians to resist, and they engage in competitive and fantastic bids for the support of this vote. Old age benefits have already been increased so that provision is

made for dependent survivors of pensioned workers and the citizenship requirement for old age benefits has been done away. This is of particular importance to us here in New Jersey which is now the second most densely populated State in the union and has a large foreign born population.

In facing these problems the Church has a particular responsibility for stimulating and sustaining a community spirit which will see to it that these necessary social readjustments are made in the interests of humanity as a whole and not on behalf of any one class. Neither a man nor a group of men motivated by self-interest can build up a worthier national life. The Church must emphasize the fact that we are all one family. It must teach people to put the family relationship first rather than profit, capital interest or union membership. It must stand firmly for the principle that economic warfare jeopardizes democracy because it divides citizens into competitive groups without regard to the welfare of the whole public. It must teach men that collective bargaining is a natural and rightful part of social readjustment, but must see to it that the government takes the position of being truly an impartial umpire. The Church has a stake in anything that threatens or ignores the family relationship of mankind and must proclaim that fact without fear or favor. That does not mean taking sides except in cases of glaring injustice where no other agency is available, but it does mean using every effort to promote impartial discussion of these knotty problems. It should demand from all parties honest statement of the facts, fairness to the other side in the controversy and a regard for the public welfare as being of supreme importance. In facing these problems in our own communities, it is a wasteful diffusion of effort for each parish to try to solve them in its own way. It is our hope that these problems may be integrated and coordinated through cooperation with community agencies and that the clergy and lay members of our Diocese will make use of the advice and counsel of Miss Mary S. Brisley and her associates in these matters.

Let it not be thought that these social readjustments are merely matters affecting community life. They will inevitably affect Church life profoundly. Because in the future we are going to have a preponderance of older people in this nation, we will feel the same change in our Church membership. This will greatly complicate the problem of keeping the Church young in its point of view. That is already a serious problem now. That is one reason why we have emphasized education in this address. We must turn our minds seriously to a continuous adult educational effort in all of our parishes.

Because of these social readjustments, the system of giving in our parishes will be changed. By reason of greater security, older people will be able to continue to give some financial support, but the younger people who will be paying the taxes for these readjustments may not be able to

give as much. The day of large gifts has probably gone. We must strive to broaden the base of givers and plan our enterprises on the foundation of more but smaller gifts.

These trends will affect our institutions for the unfortunate, handicapped and aged. More and more as government takes over this responsibility, we will have need to shift our emphasis to those fields which the government overlooks or cannot supply. The need for sacrifice and personal service will not end, but the field of effort will undoubtedly change. We must think straight and think together about these matters because uncoordinated efforts will only result in waste and ineffectiveness.

We believe it would greatly help in the solution of these problems if the men of our several parishes felt more personally and actively their responsibility in this matter. The Christian Church began its task in a chaotic world under the leadership of men. The world we live in today is occupied by men as well as by women and much of the social difficulty we face today has been caused by men. It is only fair and sensible that men should honestly strive personally to solve the problems they create and not feel they have done their whole duty by contributing to the community chest. If the men of our churches would take this personal interest and would make this personal effort, they would do much to strengthen their community, their country and their Church. We feel the need of an organization of men in this Diocese which shall constantly work for building up human fellowship. When we first took over this office we attempted to organize such a laymen's association. We are willing to take the blame for its inadequacy, but the fact of the need remains and the hope is expressed that the men of the Diocese will so seriously feel the need of building up human fellowship in the face of a disintegrating world that they will be willing to initiate and to maintain some kind of an organization which will go from man to man to every man with the challenge of work to be done and with the promise of God's power in the doing of it.

While we are on the subject of fellowship, we must pay tribute to the fellowship being built up in our Diocese through the faithful work of the members of our Field Department. All of the clerical members are rectors of parishes. All of the lay members are active in their own parishes. We have no theorists in our membership. All of its members realize that the good of every part is dependent upon the good of the whole. Therefore, the principle of their work is not to build up the Diocese at the expense of the parish, but to see to it that a sound parochial life furnishes a local base for discharging the responsibilities of the Diocese.

Because of its work on behalf of the Every Member Canvass, the Field Department is sometimes thought of as a group of magicians who can come into a parish and by the employment of clever schemes, win greater financial support in that parish. That cannot be done and it is not the principle upon which the Field Department works. It recognizes that its task is an educational one and, therefore, it hopes that its services will be availed of throughout the year and not merely at one particular time. The work of the Field Department has already been presented by the Chairman, but I could not forebear this word on their behalf.

Out of the work done by the Field Department has come a request for a laymen's conference which should not be simply a preparation for the Every Member Canvass. May I give a most cordial and earnest invitation to every layman here to be with us at Holiday House in Delaware on Saturday, June 22nd, and Sunday, June 23rd? As requested, this is not to be a Conference for the consideration of plans of the Every Member Canvass. On the contrary it is to consider such topics as Church History, the work of the Diocese, Church Unity, the World Situation and other topics which have a religious significance for Christian men today. The Conference will meet at 2:00 P. M. on Saturday and will close at 4:00 P. M. on Sunday. The usual fee of Two Dollars will cover board and lodging. Here is a chance for you to do some missionary work among your friends and neighbors. Invite them to come with you, to share in our fellowship and to join in the consideration of these interesting topics. This Conference is not a substitute for the usual one on the Every Member Canvass. We plan to hold that Conference in our new Diocesan House in the Fall.

Throughout the Church, there is a growing realization of the need of education concerning the stewardship of money. There has been an increasing awareness of the price we have been paying for the expansion in building and Church enterprise which was undertaken in the boom days before the depression. The problem has become so serious that an investigation is being made of the whole situation. It is estimated by those who have examined the facts that the Dioceses and parishes of our Church throughout the nation owe approximately thirty-five million dollars.

By national canon, mortgage indebtedness cannot be incurred except with diocesan approval, but in 1936 the Diocese of West Virginia adopted a Diocesan Canon which, in principle, provided that no non-mortgage indebtedness should be incurred by a parish, mission or congregation without the approval of the Bishop and Standing Committee unless the proposed indebtedness was less than a fixed ratio based on the average annual income for the three years immediately preceding. The purpose of the Canon was not to limit the amount of money which a parish or congregation could borrow, but to modify the way in which it could borrow beyond a certain amount. Feeling that the diocese had a real stake in the financial health of every unit, it provided that beyond a certain amount permission should be asked of the Bishop and Standing Committee. The Canon did not forbid the parish or congregation to borrow beyond the ratio set, even if per-

mission was withheld, so neither liberty nor right was interferred with. It did, however, put that parish or mission on moral notice that if it ignored this provision it was preceeding without due regard for the welfare of the diocesan family.

Other Dioceses have adopted this principle,—Virginia in 1937, Southern Virginia and Alabama in 1938, Atlanta in January 1940, and Georgia in April, 1940.

The whole matter came before the Provincial Synod of our own Province at its meeting in Albany on October 18, 1939 which body passed the following resolutions:—

Resolved: First, that this Synod receive with deep gratitude the report of the Committee on Church Debt of the Third Province, and approve and make its own the first, second, third and fourth of the findings of said report: (1) that a serious debt situation exists such as imperils the Missionary work of the Church; (2) that a consciousness of this condition is increasing but should still further be aroused; (3) that the prevailing interest rates should be lowered; (4) that as a preliminary step toward the lowering of these rates, restrictive legislation according to the suggested canon presented, (page five of printed report of the Committee of the Third Province) should be recommended to our several diocesan conventions, and that the seven other Synods should be informed of our action.

Second, that these findings be recommended to the Dioceses of the Province for consideration and action:

Third, that a committee of five be appointed by the Chair to cooperate with the Committee on Church Debt of the Third Province in furthering the aims of the Committee.

The Committee referred to in the Resolutions met in New York City on February 12, 1940 and there voted to bring the matter before the Diocesan Conventions of the Dioceses within the Province. In order that this Convention might have the facts before it, the Suffragan Bishop has made a survey of the situation in this Diocese, and is very grateful for the patient and detailed cooperation of clergymen, treasurers and others who made these facts available. This seems to be the debt situation in our Diocese so far as parishes and missions are concerned. The 137 parishes and missions reporting, excluding all institutions, show a mortgage indebtedness of \$756,902.58 and a total of other indebtedness of \$217,622.54. This makes a grand total of indebtedness of \$974,525.12. Taking 41/2% as the average rate of interest paid, it means that the Church members of the 137 parishes reporting are paying annually \$43,853.63 as a carrying charge on present indebtedness. Not a cent of this has any creative value. This amount is more than the whole Diocese gives to the National Council each year for the spread of Christ's Kingdom throughout this country and the world. It hardly seems necessary to argue that this is a very unhealthy state of affairs.

The problem divides itself into two portions,—first, the evident need of an effort to wipe out the outstanding indebtedness so that our Church may

be free to go forward, and second, some kind of a self-denying ordinance which will prevent the recurrence of a similar unhealthy situation. The present financial condition in this country does not seem at first glance to offer any immediate threat of the recurrence of a boom situation, but those of us who remember the days which followed the close of the world war know that the threat is real. When war restrictions are released, there is an inevitable reaction and a tendency to overreach one's resources.

We therefore put the facts before you. We believe that the principle of full knowledge by all the parties in interest and a self-denying ordinance which calls for permission in unusual cases is sound although we have no desire to stand upon the details of the proposed Canon which will be reported by the Committee on Constitution and Canons at the proper time.

Two points may be raised with regard to the proposed Canon. One is that it cannot be enforced. If by that one means that it cannot be legally enforced, that is true of other Canons which we already have. For example the use of the Prayer Book and the use of a letter of transfer cannot be enforced. They are matters of loyalty. The Canons set them up as a common standard of action which it expects every priest and every layman to comply with. It does not furnish any penalty if they do not. The second point raised may be that it does not affect the present debt situation. That is true. That is a problem in itself which ought to be faced, and something practical done to remove this load from the resources of our people. God gave us a commission to make disciples of all nations and not to house ourselves comfortably. The passing of some provision of this kind will at least deter the ambition to build a Cathedral at every cross road when the post war reaction sets in. For the good of the whole Diocese and of the whole Church, I commend the problem to your honest and thoughtful consideration.

While we are speaking of financial health, I would call your attention to another matter which demands our faithful and constant consideration. During recent years the Church in various parts of our country has had some unfortunate experiences in the betrayal of financial trust. A particularly flagrant case which occurred within one of our Dioceses in recent years led the House of Bishops at its meeting on November 8, 1939 to adopt the following resolution:

"Resolved, That a Committee of three he appointed to prepare a communication from this House to the Church on the proper care of trust funds. In addition to calling the attention of responsible leaders of the Church to Canon 51 of the General Church Canons, it shall make such other recommendations as the experience of the Church has shown to be advisable".

The Committee so appointed has issued a statement concerning proper procedure in financial matters which it asks be called to the attention of every Diocese and Missionary District.

In the first place it urges a careful reading of Canon 51 of the General Canons on "Business Methods and Church Affairs". The second section of that Canon says it is the duty of the custodians of all trust and permanent funds for Church purposes to deposit the same in trust with some trust company or bank organized under the laws of the United States or of a State, or with a corporation of the Diocese chartered for the purpose and to make a full and detailed annual statement of such fund to the Diocesan Convention. The Committee calls attention to the fact that the Canon forbids the depositing of securities in personal accounts, in desk drawers, or in individual deposit boxes. It urges that no one person should be allowed sole access to property so held. Plural control removes any temptation on the part of any one individual to use Church securities as collateral for personal loans or to substitute false securities for genuine properties. Section three of this Canon provides "All accounts, having to do with the receipt and expenditure or investments of money of all Church organizations shall be audited at the close of each year by a Certified Public Accountant: provided, however, that if the amount of income for the year, as shown by the account, shall be less than \$3,000.00 or if a Certified Public Accountant is not available, the audit may be made by an accountant bookkeeper in no way connected with the subject matter of the account". The Committee calls attention to the fact that the wording of the Canon is general and that its provisions apply to parishes and missions as well as to Dioceses and Districts in that it says, "It shall be the duty of the custodians of all trust and permanent funds for Church purposes" and "Money of all Church organizations shall be audited if the total is greater than \$3,000.00". Those responsible for diocesan and parochial funds should administer and audit them in accordance with the general principles here laid down.

The report of this Committee does not call for any new legislation. It calls for a thorough knowledge of and a faithful obedience to existing laws. In Canon 51 we have a standard of action for the common good set before every one of us. We feel quite sure that no responsible person in the Diocese or in any one of our parishes and missions will want to be guided by any other standard of action than that which promotes and secures our common good and is in accordance with the most sensitive dictates of Christian stewardship.

The need for educational work along the various lines we have indicated is only one part of the great educational task which lies before each one of us in his own parish. The task is aggravated by the uncertainty of educational theory and practice at this time and this uncertainty has been the subject of sharp criticism by educators. President Hutchins of Chicago University said at Teachers' College on April 25th of this year, "College students cannot read, write, speak or think because they are products of a higher education beset by triviality, mediocrity, vocationalism, progressivism,

diffusion, inertia and indolence. The educators act as if they believed that the aim of general education is to teach students to make money; that the educational system should mirror the chaos of the world; that we have nothing to learn from the past; that the way to prepare students for life is to put them through little fake experiences inside or outside the classroom; that education is information; that the whims of the students should determine what they should study".

If this indictment or any part of it is reasonably true, we need to look to our educational methods. Totalitarian governments know the value of inculcating ideas in the young and they have made it their business to lay hold upon the youth of the lands which they control. The truth which we must face is that they have aroused enthusiasm in youth and willingness to sacrific by giving life a meaning greater than self. We cannot be content today with continuing what has been if it produces a citizenship which has lost its enthusiasm for life. And we fear that that is just what has taken place. We believe it is fair to say that secular education has sought competent citizenship, intellectual curiosity, disciplined concentration and a healthy body. The actual results would seem to be in inverse order, and we say this without any criticism of the devotion of the individual teachers involved. Our educational system seems to achieve a healthy body, but it produces a lack of intellectual curiosity which makes the product a fertile field for propaganda and an indifferent citizen.

We believe that the basic reason for this is that the student is given no conception of a Reality behind the universe or of his own relationship to that Reality. Therefore, life to him is materialistic and competitive. The student must be led to know that the universe is his home, that it is friendly to him and that fullness of life comes from working out a Divine purpose. He must know that he has value as a part of that purpose and that, therefore, every other human being has a similar value. Herein lies the need and the opportunity of a sound and effective Religious Education. The United States has thirty million school children between the ages of seven and eighteen. On February 5th, 1940, the International Council of Religious Education reported that there were in this country fifteen million children under eighteen years of age who receive no religious instruction whatever, and that a great number of others receive only a little of very dubious value. One fruit of this kind of education is seen in the fact that fear of propaganda has become an obsession in the United States. We have reached a point where we do not believe anything we hear. The fundamental reason for this mental attitude is that we do not believe in any Reality behind the universe which is related to us or concerned with our human activities.

Such a situation throws the responsibility upon every one of us here, clergyman and layman alike, to re-examine his own Church School and the

quality of the Religious Education which it is giving. Such an examination will repay any cost of effort. I particularly appeal to the laymen present to offer their services in connection with the religious educational work of their own parishes. If you say to me that you are too busy or do not know enough, then I would ask you a question. Are you willing to make an effort to save the children of our land from frustration, cynicism and despair? Remember that your own child as well as your neighbor's child is caught in this mesh. It is a personal responsibility resting upon each one of us. We cannot hire somebody else to do it for us. We must either make the sacrifice of time and effort required or see our boys march off to kill and be killed.

There is corporate educational opportunity open to us in this Diocese. A study of the Diocesan Journals of the last few years shows a constantly reiterated desire on the part of many deputies to have consideration by this Convention of general subjects affected with a religious interest. This is a sound desire because this Convention is the one meeting we have each year of our whole family, and what we do here ought to give point to our activities during the following year. Our present practice is to have the Bishops try to present such matters of general interest. Discussion may or may not then be possible or desirable. Rather hastily considered resolutions are presented and acted upon or else action is postponed until another year. Could we not have some kind of a continuing committee which throughout the year would receive subjects for discussion possessing religious value, outline both sides of moot questions and have that outline circulated prior to the meeting of the Convention? Such outlines might well be formulated from discussions held in parish groups. In this way we might build up a more informed body of Churchmen and bring to our deliberations here sufficient information and attitude of mind to produce wholesome corporate action.

As a further aid to spiritual growth through education, we confess we have often dreamed of a conference center somewhere near the center of the Diocese which could be readily reached by highway or railway. Such a center ought to be secluded enough to provide concentration and yet accessible enough to be capable of use all year round. In the summer time it might well be used for underprivileged women and children but during the rest of the year it should be equipped for and used by conferences and committees where time for deliberation is of the very essence of the work. Bordering a lake or other body of water with a Chapel and two dormitories capable of housing 100 people each, I can visualize a new impulse given to the corporate life of the Diocese. Of course, this is only a dream and it should never be made the object of a financial campaign, but if some individual or family, as a memorial or a thank offering, should be moved to provide such a place, together with sufficient endowment to maintain it,

such a gift would do much to build up the life of the Church in this Diocese.

Let us not be discouraged by the dangers around us nor by the magnitude of the task that confronts us. We can learn righteousness if we will. We can take courage from the fact that we have not exhausted the power of God nor attained our own full spiritual growth. We will grow by recognizing what others have to contribute to our common enrichment. To secure that enrichment we must seek the potentiality of one another and not merely point out defects. We shall never know God in his fullness until we know Him as all of His other children know Him. This is the practical necessity underlying missionary effort. As we sacrifice personal time, strength and substance to win others to cooperative family living, we shall learn righteousness and be unafraid when God's judgments are in the world.
