CANON, 1, § II.

OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

From a Parish.

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election, in the following form:

[Name of the Church, the Place, and Date.]

This certifies that a meeting of the congregation of this Church, held for the purpose of electing Church Officers, and Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention (*or for the purpose of electing Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, if the meeting be for that object alone*), A. B., C. D., and E. F., being communicants of the Church in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Deputies; and B. C., D. E., and F. G., also being communicants in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Alternate Deputies to represent the Parish in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand (*or if two Wardens subscribed, we have set our hands*), the day and year above written.

N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary sign, then the signatures of *both* Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-in-charge, *or* Missionary, may not sign.

From a Mission.

N. B.—Use the same form and substitute the word "Mission" for "Parish" in three places. The Minister-in-charge; or, the Clerk; or, the Warden may sign.

Memoranda:

Not more than three Deputies are allowed from each Parish, and Mission.

Three Alternate Deputies must be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies.

Write Christian names in **FULL** and **LEGIBLY**.

Blank forms will be sent by the Secretary of the Convention on or before Easter Monday in each year.

Return Certificates of Election at least **ONE MONTH** before Convention.

Deputies must be *Communicants of the Church, and also qualified voters in the Parish or Mission which elects them*. (See Canon 10- § II, [4,] [5] and [6] and Canon 16 § VIII.)

Rules of Order

THE CONVENTION.

1. The Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. The Convention shall meet on the opening day for the Business Sessions at 9:45 A. M.; with a recess of one hour between 1 and 2 o'clock.
3. At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
4. At the close of each Convention, the Minutes shall be corrected and approved.
5. The doors of the Convention shall be open for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
6. All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convention shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall record their attendance.
7. Clergymen of other Dioceses, and Candidates for Holy Orders, who may be present, shall be admitted to honorary seats in the Convention on the presentation of their names to the Secretary.
8. When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
9. When any member is about to speak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
10. No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply), in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
11. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
12. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate, but any member may appeal from the decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention. The general procedure of the Convention shall be governed, unless otherwise provided for, by the rules of parliamentary practice as set forth in "Roberts' Rules of Order."
13. A Committee consisting of the Bishop, ex-officio, five other clergymen and five laymen, to be known as the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, shall be appointed at each Convention to prepare the official Ballots and the Calendar of Business, for the next Annual Convention.

The mode of conducting the nominations and elections of all Committees, Commissions and Boards and all other elective officers not otherwise provided for, shall be as follows:

The Secretary of the Convention shall send out with the notice of the time and place of the Diocesan Convention, a list of the offices to be filled by election thereat, and the names of the incumbents of these offices, whose terms expire thereat, together with an official nomination blank. Such notice shall be sent out at least one month before the date appointed for the Convention, to the Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and to each lay delegate whose name and address has been transmitted to the Secretary, as provided in Canon I.

Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations for any office or offices to be filled at such Convention, shall at least fifteen days before the date appointed for the Convention, submit the same in writing to the Secretary thereof, together with his certificate that he has secured the consent of such person or persons to such nomination.

The Committee on Elections, from the list of nominations as furnished to it by the Secretary of the Convention, shall prepare sufficient ballots marked "Sample" for each clerical and lay delegate, as certified by such Secretary, as entitled to a seat in the Convention; such ballot to be mailed by such Secretary to each such delegate at least five days before the Convention.

At the beginning of the opening session the committee shall report to the Convention in the form of an official ballot the names of nominees; the arrangement of such names shall be determined by lot in each order.

If there be any office for which no nomination has been made on the sample ballot any delegate may file with the Secretary of the Convention the name of one candidate for any such office, together with his certificate, that he has secured the consent of the person so nominated. Such nominations may be filed up to the hour of voting, and the committee of Elections shall announce the names of such nominees at the time of the distribution of the first ballot.

The number of consecutive terms any nominee has held the office for which he is again nominated shall be noted on the ballot, in parentheses, after his or her name. After each list of nominations as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks may be filled by any voter. On the first ballot these ballots only shall be used, and also in subsequent ballots, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. No ballot shall be counted in its class, on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled, and the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast.

The members of the Convention shall also be requested, in said call, to send to this Committee any canonical amendments or other important items of business that they may propose to introduce at the next Convention, so that such matters may be assigned a place on the Calendar of Business. This call shall also be annually inserted in the April number of the official Magazine of the Diocese, *THE NEWARK CHURCHMAN*.

Balloting shall take place in a separate room when practicable.

The clerical and lay voting lists shall be divided into two sections each.

14. Four or more Election Tellers, clerical and lay, in equal numbers, not necessarily members of the Convention, shall be appointed by the President before an election. They shall receive and canvass all votes cast at any election which is required to be by ballot, and when such canvass is completed, shall immediately report its result to the Convention. The polls shall be open for such time as the Convention may, by resolution, direct.
15. All reports (usually printed in the *JOURNAL*), of officers, committees, commissions, and boards of trustees under control of the Convention, shall be printed and distributed by the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order as far as practicable, at least two weeks before the meeting of the Convention; provided that the subject of such printing and reports shall have been referred to the Finance and Advisory Board for consideration, which Board shall have power to supervise, regulate, or to condense the same, and to issue to the Committee or to the Secretary of the Convention such instructions as in the judgment of the said Board will promote greater economy and efficiency in respect to this work.

Reports when read in Convention shall be read by title only, unless the reading be for the better transaction of business.

NEW BUSINESS.

- 16 All new business introduced, except such as may accompany and form a part of a report of a committee, shall be in the form of a motion or resolution and shall be in writing.

COMMITTEES.

17. All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered. It shall be the duty of the Secretary promptly to notify the members of all special committees of their appointment.
18. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.

MOTIONS AND THEIR ORDER.

19. No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
20. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it; or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment has been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
21. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.

VOTING PRIVILEGES.

22. All questions shall be decided *viva voce*, unless otherwise specially ordered.
23. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote of the Convention shall be taken by Orders, voting separately; and, when a vote is thus taken a concurrent majority in both Orders shall be necessary to carry any measure.

JOURNAL

The Sixty-eighth Annual Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark, was held on Tuesday, May twelfth, Nineteen Hundred and Forty-two in the Diocesan House, Newark, New Jersey.

There was a Celebration of the Holy Communion in All Saints' Chapel of the Diocesan House at eight thirty o'clock, the Bishop, the Right Reverend Benjamin M. Washburn, D.D., being the celebrant, assisted by the Suffragan Bishop, the Right Reverend Theodore R. Ludlow, D.D.

The business session of the Convention was called to order at nine forty-five o'clock with the Right Reverend the Bishop of Newark in the Chair, who offered prayer for guidance in the deliberations of the Convention.

The Chairman directed the Secretary to ascertain whether a constitutional quorum was present in each order.

A constitutional quorum being present the Convention was declared ready for business.

The Venerable William O. Leslie, Jr. renominated the Reverend J. Fred Hamblin, Rector of St. John's Church, Newark, as Secretary of the Convention, which nomination was duly seconded.

It was moved and seconded that the nominations be closed, and the Chair directed to cast one ballot for the election. The Reverend Mr. Hamblin was declared duly elected.

The Secretary thereupon nominated for approval by the Convention as Assistant Secretaries—the Reverend Peter R. Deckenbach, Rector of Christ Church, Belleville, and the Reverend George S. Bowden, Vicar of Christ Church, Wortendyke.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the above appointments be confirmed.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ELECTIONS AND RULES OF ORDER.

To the Sixty-eighth Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

Your Committee appointed by the authority of the Sixty-seventh Convention, met at the Diocesan House, on Thursday, January 29th, 1942.

The Committee herewith submits its report, together with a Calendar of Business and Rules of Order for the governance of the Convention now assembled.

Resolved, That Tuesday, May 12th, 1942, having been appointed by the Bishop of the Diocese as the day of the Convention, the recommendations of your Committee are:

- (1) That there be held a service in Trinity Cathedral on Monday evening, May 11th, 1942, at eight o'clock, at which service the annual Episcopal Address of the Diocesan shall be presented.
This recommendation was later rescinded owing to the prevailing automobile tire and gas situation.
- (2) That there be held a service of the Holy Communion in All Saints' Chapel of the Diocesan House on Tuesday morning, May 12th, 1942 at eight-thirty o'clock.
- (3) That the business sessions of the Convention be held in the Auditorium of the Diocesan House, and that the Convention be called to order at nine forty-five o'clock.
- (4) That time be allotted by the Chairman during the afternoon for the presentation of the work of the Board of Christian Social Service with special emphasis on the social service agencies of the Diocese.
- (5) That the Convention be governed by the Rules of Order and Calendar of Business as adopted by the Convention of 1941.
- (6) That the Secretary of the Convention arrange the Ballot, and provide for drawing of lots for all nominees placed thereon.
- (7) That the Secretary of the Convention arrange for the usual luncheon on May 12th, 1942.

The Committee at this time desires to call attention to the making of nominations for the annual elections. This is a matter resting with the members of the Convention, and serious thought should be paid to seeking out qualified persons to serve in the offices and

on the committees and boards within the gift of the Convention. The Committee charged with the preparation of the annual ballot has found great difficulty in filling out the required number of candidates due to the lack of nominations being sent in by the members of the Convention.

The Chair appointed the Reverend Eric M. Tasman and Mr. Frederic .Worfolk on the Board of Adjustment for a term of three years.

The Bishop nominated the following to serve as Examining Chaplains in the Class of 1945, and requested the approval by the Convention. The Reverend Messrs. William L. Griffin, Jr., Walter Ovid Kinsolving, and Paul van K. Thomson. It was moved, seconded and carried that the above nominations be and are hereby approved.

It was moved, seconded and carried the Secretary of the Convention send greetings to the Reverend Messrs. Maxwell J. Williams, W. N. Harper, Richard A. Hatch, and Edgar L. Cook, absent from the Convention because of illness.

The Bishop of the Diocese presented his tenth Annual Episcopal Address to the Convention.

The Ven. Malcolm A. Shipley offered the following memorial resolution on the death of the late Right Reverend Wilson Reiff Stearly.

The Convention desires to place on record an expression of its deep sorrow in the death of its friend and former leader, the Right Reverend Wilson Reiff Stearly, D.D., retired Bishop of Newark, who entered into Life Eternal on November 8, 1941.

Bishop Stearly's Episcopate covering twenty years, was marked by steady advance in the work of the Diocese of Newark, in all of which he gave far-sighted, wise and loving leadership.

His life was illuminated by the inner light of his deep spiritual experience. His work bore the stamp of his character, which was utterly consecrated to the service of the Lord and Master whom he loved. His relations with the Clergy and people of the Diocese were characterized by his unfailing friendliness, gentleness, and patience. High office never displaced his Christ-like humility. He was a builder of the things of the spirit. In this realm lay his greatest interest.

Faithful unto death, his is assuredly the crown of life. As we mourn the loss of his presence among us, and his cheery friendship, we thank God for his good example and for the abiding influence of his noble Christian life.

May he rest in peace.

The above resolution was adopted by a rising vote, and prayer for the departed was said by the Bishop.

The Reverend William L. Griffin offered the following resolution:—

Resolved, That a Committee consisting of three whites and three negroes be appointed by the Bishop to investigate the charges made against the Hospital of St. Barnabas' and for Women and Children, wherein it is alleged that that Institution has a settled policy of racial discrimination contrary to the Christian faith and if the charges are found to be true, to recommend to the next Diocesan Convention proper steps to end this condition or to terminate all relationship between the said Hospital and the Episcopal Church.

This was referred to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions.

The Reverend Lane W. Barton offered the following resolution:—

Resolved, That the Bishop be authorized to appoint a representative Committee of Clergy and Laymen to study the proposals and recommendations of the Commission on Approaches to Unity, to stimulate interest throughout the Diocese in these proposals, and to take such steps as may be deemed necessary to create an informed and intelligent opinion in the Diocese with regard to these proposals, prior to action on these proposals at General Convention at Cleveland, Ohio, in October 1943.

This resolution was referred to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions.

The Reverend Charles L. Gomp called attention to the fact that the Bishop of the Diocese will have completed ten years of effective service in the Diocese on October 14, 1942, and that the Convention should take some action toward a fitting observance of this anniversary.

It was thereupon moved, seconded and carried that the Suffragan Bishop be empowered to appoint a Committee of three clergy, three laymen and three lay-women to arrange for this celebration.

The Reverend Walter O. Kinsolving, Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons had no formal matters to bring before the Convention. However, he called attention to the revision of the digest of the Constitution and Canons authorized by the Convention of 1939, and that copies are available at the nominal cost of printing, namely, two dollars a volume.

Consent given to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties to sell property at 106 Orchard Road, Maplewood, to Stephen VanNess for \$5,900.00, the Resolution and Petition having been circularized to the members of the Standing Committee.

This being the Annual Meeting the Rev'd Arthur Dumper, D.D., was nominated and unanimously elected President; and the Rev'd Harold G. Willis was nominated and unanimously elected Secretary for the ensuing year.

The following report of the Board of Missions and Church Extension was presented by title:—

Newark, New Jersey, May 12, 1941.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The Board of Missions and Church Extension held 10 meetings during the calendar year 1941.

It has given much time and consideration to the state of our Mission Stations, the matters of repairs and improvements to the buildings, the acquisition or sale of lands, pressing needs for financial assistance, have all received faithful attention. Many committees for conference and counsel to Mission Committees and congregations have been appointed. The Board also advises the Bishop in regard to requests for grants or loans from the Bishop's Church Extension Fund.

One of the most important Committees of the Board is known as the Mortgage and Real Estate Committee. Its work has been invaluable, especially in regard to help in refinancing existing mortgage indebtedness. Not only has it been able to effect reduction in interest charges, but in some instances has succeeded in having the principal sum reduced.

A report was received from the Treasurer showing the Endowment Fund in the Bishop's Church Extension Fund standing as follows:

Consideration was given to the subject of Accounts Receivable. Sums loaned over the years, by the Extension Fund, overdue and unpaid. The matter was referred to a Committee for study and report.

Colored Work—Passaic—St. Andrew's.

A report was received from the Rev'd Maxwell Williams relative to his survey in Passaic, N. J., and in which he showed that there is a possibility and challenge for the ministrations of our Church among the colored people in this City and that this work should not be abandoned, but continued. It was ordered that Mr. Williams' interest be encouraged.

Ascension, East Orange.

Tax arrears and assessments.

The Committee for this place reported that it had had conferences with the Town authorities relative to its claims, with the result that the Town agreed to accept conveyance of title to them of land, 100 feet on Amherst Street and in return would cancel all its liens against the remaining property. It was moved and carried that recommendation be made to Epiphany, Orange, the title holder, to accept and make conveyance as above set forth.

Recommendation was made to the Bishop for his consent to the joint use of the Church building located at Abbott Ave., north of Edgewater Ave., Ridgefield, N. J., by the congre-

gation of St. James', Ridgefield and the congregation of Nativity of Fairview, N. J., but it being agreed and understood that this is not to be a merger of the said Missions. Such consent was given by the Bishop.
St. Mary's Haledon.

This parish in the year 1933 borrowed from Loaning Fund the principal sum of \$1,282.90 and over years had paid interest thereon totalling \$391.41. It now felt able to liquidate the debt. The Board by resolution ordered that the interest paid be credited to the principal and then accepted the sum of \$891.49 in full payment of its claim.

The Reverend Donald MacAdie made a verbal report of the present status of the Bishops' Church Extension Fund—

At the Convention of 1941 there were 339 subscribers. Since then, new subscribers numbering 41 have been added, 19 have been cancelled due to death or other causes, the present subscribers being 361 for an amount of \$868.00 per call.

Mr. MacAdie stated that the aim of the Committee is to restore the Fund to where it was formerly when the full subscription netted \$1,000 a call.

The Reverend Walter N. Welsh spoke on the work of the Board of Religious Education with particular reference to the various conferences to be held within the Diocese under the auspices of the Board.

The following report of the Field Department was presented by the Chairman, the Reverend John T. Ledger.

REPORT OF THE FIELD DEPARTMENT TO THE DIOCESAN CONVENTION,
MAY, 1942.

To the Members of the Convention:

The work of the Field Department remains much the same from year to year, though the members are always seeking suggestions whereby the same tasks may be done differently and more effectively.

Modifications in the Laymen's Conference last June proved to be very acceptable. There was a great increase in attendance, Holiday House was filled to overflowing and the comments were favorable almost without exception. A similar conference is planned for this year on June 27th and 28th, with such subjects as "The Christian in a World at War", "The Christian in a World of Change", "The Layman Works for a Just Peace", "Working for Peace on a Racial Frontier in Hawaii. The leadership includes Professor Clyde Eagleton, Professor of Political Science, New York University, Dr. Joseph Fletcher, Dean of the Graduate School of Applied Religion, Dr. Kenneth C. M. Sills, President of Bowdoin College. While we are conscious of the fact that attendance at this conference is going to be fraught with many difficulties, we are also aware that, more than ever, every effort must be made by the Church for the raising of the morale and intelligent outlook of our people and to offer every opportunity for the increase of christian fellowship. The Church is striving to have Her voice heard in the present crisis and to make Herself articulate in the formulation of a permanent peace. We sincerely hope that sufficient effort will be made by both Clergy and laity to make this conference as well attended as the one held last June despite the difficulties to be encountered.

Due to the fact that no mention is made of the Every Member Canvass at the June conference, it is imperative that a conference on technique and materials be held in the early fall. Here again, because it is going to be more difficult not only to raise the necessary amount of money for the operation of the General Church and the Diocese, but also of the individual parishes, it is important that every door be opened for a successful financial campaign and every member visitation. The need for what the Church has to give is going to be increasingly felt as the days go by and the casualty lists grow and inconveniences increase. Efforts should be made to increase attendance at the fall conference.

In addition to the formal conferences many smaller meetings are held and the loyalty of the members should here be noted. Some come from considerable distances and do not get back to their homes until the early morning hours. They are most industrious in their efforts on behalf of every parish and mission in the Diocese and seek only to serve you. Members have always been available to speak at the various churches or to confer with vestries or clergymen on invitation.

The second responsibility of the Department is the preparation of promotional material for the fall canvass. Last year the fourth Handbook was issued together with a pictorial folder. Both were well received. This year the Handbook will be smaller, certain suggestions which have been standard in the past will be omitted; anyone feeling their need may refer to last year's Handbook. A diocesan folder will again be issued this year. We hope that both of these aids will be used this year more widely than ever before. We have need of opening as many doors and using as many aids as are available.

The Department of Promotion of the National Council has presented an interesting suggestion, especially for the smaller communities of our Nation. That is, that there be a community-wide effort to hold the Every Member Canvasses of all churches in the community during the same period and thus keep that time free of all other financial drives in the community. This is not without precedent for it has been tried successfully in Newton, Mass., Medina, Ohio, and Council Bluffs, Iowa. Our Parishes would in no sense combine their budgets with those of other churches—would retain full responsibility for training canvassers and approaching their own members—plans and literature to be used in the canvass would also be determined by the individual parishes." Such concerted action would give tremendous impetus to the work of the church in many communities. Note the

dates set by the National Council for our Canvass: November 15 to December 6th. If there are any present to whom this suggestion appeals it might be well for them to mark these dates on their calendars as there will undoubtedly be some further suggestions coming from the National Council and the Presiding Bishop.

While 51 of our Parishes and missions showed an increase in their missionary appropriations, some 34 others showed a decrease. Unfortunately, the decrease in dollars and cents was greater than the increase and it was found necessary to reduce appropriations in some Departments of the Diocese. While the world is spending so much for armament and slaughter it does not seem reasonable that the Church which seeks to bring light and life to the world should retreat. The increase in 51 Parishes and missions as over against a decrease in the part of 34 is a real advance which must not be minimized, but we dare not become complacent in the face of a decrease in actual income. We know that everyone in the Diocese would like very much to see an increase rather than a decrease in the financial column. If we were to really like enough to have this happen and would really translate that "like" into action, it will take place. The work of the Field Department is merely supplementary, but we do feel that with the proper use of the materials and suggestions offered by the Department that a reasonably good Every Member Canvass can be had which will assure the proper financial functioning of the Parishes, Missions, Diocese and General Church. There are no easy roads to this end. There is no substitute for conscientious labor, careful planning and the utilization of every available aid.

Regarding the days which lie ahead, this report has already indicated that we do not believe the road to be smooth. It is going to be beset with many obstacles requiring all of our faith and ingenuity. We cannot prophesy the exigencies nor prepare for each one in advance, but we can and must lay our plans so as to cover as much ground as possible. The need for democratizing all effort and sharing has always been with the Church. That need is becoming more pressing with every passing day. Indeed, we must seek out every member of the Church for sharing in Her worship, fellowship and financial responsibility if we hope to survive. Not only must this be done because the leveling off of income has already begun and there is an ever increasing need of the smaller contributions of our people, but because there is a proportionate increase in the need of everyone for the fellowship, faith and ideals which the Church has to contribute to the life of the world. We must be on the alert for every opportunity the times present to us for the assumption of leadership. More than ever we must press the Church's Mission to "preach the Gospel to every creature", to teach understanding and love to them "that are far off and to them that are nigh", to urge sacrifice, to take the hope of the Gospel to those who are bereaved, and the great affirmations of the Christian Church to the confused and to keep our Blessed Mother Church with our boys who are serving in our Nation's armed forces. So, this coming year will find us urging the support not only of our parishes but also of the missionary efforts of the Church at home and abroad, of British Missions and of the Army and Navy Commission. To this end the Field Department is anxious to serve you in all of its efforts. There will be another "Handbook" and pictorial leaflet, there will be conferences, members are available to you whenever you want them for special meetings and whatever else is within the capacity and ability of the Department will be at your disposal. The Department asks only for your prayers and cooperation in these matters. Thus, by the Grace of God we shall go "Forward" in the year 1943 and hasten His Kingdom.

We would indeed be very remiss if at this time we did not recall the devoted and effective service of the Rev'd Frederick J. Warnecke, the former Chairman of the Diocesan Field Department who last fall accepted a call to St. Mark's Church, Richmond, Virginia. We miss his genial fellowship and efficient direction. Our only consolation is that he is not lost to the whole Church, and where he once served the Diocese of Newark he now serves the Diocese of Virginia.

Mr. Morris Sayre of St. Luke's Church, Montclair, spoke on the plans for the Laymen's Conference to be held June 27th and 28th, at the Girls' Friendly Holiday House, Delaware, N. J.

Bishop Ludlow asked that advance registrations for this conference be given in sometime during the Convention.

The Report of the Board of Examining Chaplains was presented by title, which is as follows:—

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE BOARD OF EXAMINING CHAPLAINS, JANUARY 1st, 1941 to JANUARY 1st, 1942.

The Board held two special and two regular meetings during the year.

A special meeting was held Tuesday and Wednesday, February 18th and 19th, at St. Paul's Parish House, Englewood, for the purpose of examining the Rev'd Frederick E. Thalmann, Deacon, in the subjects required for the Priesthood.

On Thursday and Friday of Easter Week, April 17th and 18th, the Board held its regular meeting, at which time the following candidates were examined for the Priesthood:—Robert Stockton Trenbath, Wilbur Cleon Leach, Charles Albert Mosby, Earnest Dell Richards, Frederick L. Lattimore, and the Rev'd Frederick E. Thalmann.

On June 9th, 1941, the Secretary received a communication from the President of the Board, the Rev'd Mr. Kinsolving, stating that the consents of all the members of the Board had been received for the dispensation of Mr. Knud Anthony Larsen, 3rd, who had applied for admission as a candidate under Canon 2, section 5, sub-section 6, from further examination as a candidate; he having previously submitted to the Bishop of the Diocese and to the President of the Board reports of the work he had done in the University of Illinois and the Presbyterian Theological Seminary of Chicago.

The Secretary received word on September 25th from the President of the Board that the Bishop and himself had given approval to the application of Jules Moreau and William Macheth for admission as candidates.

A special meeting of the Board was held at the Diocesan House Tuesday and Wednesday, November 17th and 18th, for the following purposes: To examine Mr. Knud A. Larsen, 3rd, in the subjects listed in Canon 5, section 4; to examine the Rev'd Daniel Boone in the subjects required for the Priesthood; to re-examine the Rev'd Frederick E. Thalmann in certain of the subjects required for the Priesthood.

A regular meeting of the Board was held Monday and Tuesday, December 29th and 30th, to examine in the subjects required for the Diaconate. The candidates were Mr. Elmer Fauquier Francis and Mr. Paul Abry.

Report of the Forward in Service Committee of the Diocese of Newark was presented by Lane W. Barton, Chairman.

It is hardly necessary for the Chairman of the Forward in Service Committee to render a report. The activities of the Committee are already well known to the clergy of the Diocese. Three series of Archdeaconry conferences have been held since the last Convention. One series was held in June of last year, one in late November and early December, and the third just before Lent of this year. These conferences, conducted by our two bishops, stimulated interest in the Forward in Service program and made it possible to work out in small clergy groups ways and means for developing this program in the parishes and missions of the Diocese. A by-product of these conferences which must not be overlooked was the deepening of the fellowship among the clergy by sharing experiences. The members of the committee cannot give adequate expression of their appreciation for the kindly and wholehearted cooperation of our bishops.

The Forward in Service Program offers to the church at large a notable opportunity for adventure in the business of being Christians and Churchmen in this momentous day. It is a matter of regret,—and this report is perhaps more a confession of sins of omission rather than an accounting of accomplishments,—that aside from the conferences conducted by our bishops,—which I may say again was a contribution of striking uniqueness as well as of spiritual value,—little has been done by our committee of an adventurous and pioneering nature in forwarding this program of the Presiding Bishop.

We have, I fear, in a very real sense committed the sin which explains the weakness of the democratic process in Church as well as in State. We have leaned too heavily upon those in authority. The Forward in Service Program has been very careful not to regiment the Church into participation by exacting or even expecting meticulous observance of and adherence to a plan handed down from headquarters. Great motives and objectives have been suggested to the church,—such as "Prayer and Worship" in 1941-42, and "Freedom through Christ" in 1942-43,—in the hope not only that we would all join together in realizing these objectives, but exercise the while our precious privilege of freedom in working out new and effective means of achieving these objectives.

Bishop Washburn has in his address stressed the need for ingenuity. There is no question among us as to the survival value of the Christian Church: there is some question among us as to how effective the Church shall be in the days to come. The answer to this question is to be found in the extent to which we of the church,—clergy and laity alike,—accept this challenge to the resourceful, imaginative and ingenious discharge of our Christian trust as extended to us by Forward in Service.

We are a great church. As a communion, we have resources and endowments of manpower of impressive proportions. Too often we expend these resources and energies running our ecclesiastical machinery and in pulling against one another within the church. Tug-of-War is grand sport; but it is a poor means of ecclesiastical locomotion. In rendering this report, I want for the committee not only to thank again the bishops of the Diocese for their leadership and cooperation, but to express the hope that we in this Diocese may rise to the spirit of Forward in Service, pool our resources of imagination and ingenuity, and in the fashion of true pioneers move forward to new effectiveness and fresh consecration to prosper the Kingdom of God in our midst.

Your Committee begs to be discharged from further consideration of the subject, and respectfully to suggest to the Secretary of the Convention that the name of "the Hospital of St. Barnabas and for Women and Children" be dropped from all lists of Diocesan Institutions in the future.

Concerning the Resolution offered by the Reverend Lane Barton, your Committee begs leave to report favorably on the resolution and recommends its adoption with slight amendments.

The Amended Resolution is as follows:

"Resolved, That the Bishop be authorized to appoint a representative committee of clergy and laymen to study the proposals and recommendations of the Commission on Approaches to Unity, to stimulate interest throughout the Diocese in these proposals, and to take such steps as may be deemed *useful* to create an informed, and intelligent opinion in the Diocese with regard to these proposals prior to action *thereon*, at the General Convention at Cleveland, Ohio, in October 1943.

NOTES ON THE 1943 BUDGETS.

II.

BUDGET OF ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSES.

1. Convention luncheon; printing, including Convention Journal and Convention ballots.
2. Janitor services, fuel, water, light, insurance, telephone, repairs, printing and stationery, etc.
3. Nominal salary of Secretary of Convention, and stipends of workers at the Diocesan House.
4. The Treasurer of the Convention receives no salary. This item is for charges of the bank as custodian of trust funds.

5. Salaries of Bishop and Suffragan Bishop; pension premiums, motor allowances, insurance, taxes on Bishops' houses; office secretarial assistance, stationery.
6. Salary of bookkeeper, printing, postage, stationery for the office of the Treasurer of the Finance and Advisory Board.
7. Newark's share, based on number of clergy, for expense of office of Presiding Bishop.
8. It has been the custom to defray in part expenses of deputies to General Convention. If an appropriation is made each year, a sufficient amount will accumulate during the three year period between Conventions.
9. The Provincial Synod levies on each Diocese an annual assessment based on the number of clergymen canonically resident therein.

* * * *

Until all parochial reports are in, the exact percentage of the assessment cannot be determined, but it will be less than in 1942. Only three Dioceses in the entire Church have a lower rate of assessment than ours.

IV.

BUDGET FOR THE PROGRAM OF THE DIOCESE AND NATIONAL COUNCIL.

(A) MISSIONARY WORK.

1. The following 60 parishes and missions are at the present time aided from this appropriation in varied ways. Grants on account of salary are in some cases nominal. Where a vicar has charge of more than one mission station there is an allowance for automobile maintenance. At some stations where there are no rectories, houses are rented for the vicars.

The salary of the Ven. W. O. Leslie, Jr., Canon Missioner of the Diocese, and about \$350. per year for taxes on property owned by the Board of Missions which is not occupied or used for Church purposes, are also included in this item.

The item for insurance includes public liability and compensation insurance, also insurance on automobiles owned by the Diocese and used in missionary work.

The total amount \$62,600. is an increase of \$3,950. over our working budget for 1942. This will provide more nearly adequate stipends and motor allowances for some of the missionaries.

2. Salaries of three Chaplains of the Newark City Mission; pension premiums and small expense funds for the Chaplains, to assist in upkeep of their automobiles, etc.
3. Some years ago the Convention adopted as a proper minimum stipend for unmarried clergy \$1,800. and for married clergy \$2,000. and house. To help in meeting this minimum salary grants have in 1942 been made to nine clergy. An increase of \$500. is asked for 1943. Although in most cases the responsibility to meet the minimum must rest with the local congregation; certain urgent situations cannot be met without diocesan aid. It is for these that the increase of \$500. is asked.

(B) BENEVOLENT AND CHARITABLE WORK.

1. Bonnie Brae Farm received \$6,000. in 1931. In 1942 the grant from the Diocesan Budget is \$750. The title to the Farm is in the Board of Social Service of the Diocese of Newark and this outstanding piece of diocesan work deserves much greater support from the Diocese than it receives. The year round population is about 85 and in addition over 600 boys were given summer vacations at the Bonnie Brae Camp during the summer.
2. The Church Mission of Help in 1931 received \$6,000. In 1942 the appropriation is \$3,300. The future development of C. M. H. is dependent upon the work receiving proper financial support.
3. A home for unmarried mothers in Jersey City which cares annually for about 12 girls and their babies. The Diocesan appropriation is supplemented by income from a small endowment and gifts of interested friends.
4. A home for aged and convalescent women. Repairs, insurance and overhead expenses are cared for by this appropriation.

(C) EDUCATIONAL AND WELFARE WORK.

1. This covers salary of caretaker, taxes, insurance, repairs, replacements.
2. Stipend of Field Secretary for Religious Education. Expenses of promoting summer and Young People's Conferences; teacher's meetings, office supplies, etc.
3. An adequate diocesan paper requires a larger appropriation than the present one of \$500.
4. This sum is far less than is actually needed for promotional work.

(D) FOR THE CHURCH AT LARGE.

In 1942 we have pledged to the National Council the sum of \$37,500. We ought to be giving at least \$45,000. and it is hoped that we may do so in 1943.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE APPOINTED BY THE FINANCE AND ADVISORY BOARD OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK TO CARRY OUT THE PROVISIONS OF CANON 7 OF THE CANONS OF THE DIOCESE WHICH REQUIRE ACTION ON THE PART OF THIS BOARD AND OF THE PARISHES AND MISSIONS AND INSTITUTIONS OF THE DIOCESE.

To the members of the Sixty-eighth Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

This Committee, appointed by the Finance and Advisory Board in June, 1941, respectfully presents the following report:

1. Section II of Canon 7 provides that "trust and permanent funds, and all securities of whatsoever kind, belonging to this Diocese or to any Parish thereof, if the same can lawfully be done, shall be deposited and thereafter left with a Federal or State Bank, or a Trust Company, or with the Corporation known as 'The Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties of the Diocese of Newark,' or with some other agency approved in writing by the Finance and Advisory Board of this Diocese; such deposit to be made either under a Deed of Trust or an Agency Agreement;" that "a full and detailed statement of all such trusts or permanent funds shall be presented annually to the Convention upon a form to be prescribed by the Finance and Advisory Board;" and that "the Finance and Advisory Board shall, from time to time, make such rules and regulations with respect to the deposit of such trust funds, and the management thereof, as shall be proper, and shall submit such rules and regulations, so adopted by it, annually to the Convention."

The Finance and Advisory Board has prescribed a form for the presentation of a full and detailed statement of trusts and permanent funds, and has sent the same to all Diocesan organizations and all Parishes and Missions of the Diocese. About 87% of these forms have been returned. It appears that the majority of trust and permanent funds and securities are deposited with Federal or State Banks, or Trust Companies, or with the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties, or with agencies approved by the Finance and Advisory Board; but it is not evident that such deposits are all made under Deeds of Trust or Agency Agreements. In some instances, Savings Accounts and Safe Deposit Boxes are employed. The Committee begs more time in which to study the reports and to make recommendations, and respectfully requests that the 13% of reports not yet returned be sent in as soon as possible. The Finance and Advisory Board has prepared no rules and regulations with respect to the deposit of trust funds, other than the requirements of the Canon, to submit to this Convention.

2. Section III of Canon 7 provides that "Treasurers and Custodians other than banking institutions, of this Diocese, and of each Parish, Mission and Institution thereof, shall be bonded with one or more sureties," and that "the Finance and Advisory Board of this Diocese shall have power to review the sufficiency of sureties, and by rule prescribe the amount and custody of such bonds, and dispense with a bond where the maximum risk is \$500. or less."

The Finance and Advisory Board has requested all Parishes and Missions and Diocesan institutions to report the amounts in which their Treasurers and Custodians are bonded, and the sureties with which such bonds are placed. Of these reports about 87% have been received. These show that 24 Parishes and Missions and Institutions have bonded their Treasurers and Custodians, in the number of 68, to an aggregate amount of \$170,000. There are 32 Parishes and Missions and Institutions of those which have reported which have not bonded their 35 Treasurers and Custodians, and which control maximum bal-

ances aggregating \$60,000. Of these, some are awaiting a decision as to whether a Diocesan bond will be available under which they can be covered. The Committee wishes to give further consideration to the sufficiency of existing bonds and sureties, and to proper recommendations in regard to Treasurers and Custodians not yet bonded. We recommend that this Convention authorize the purchase of a Diocesan bond to cover all Treasurers and Custodians, at the discretion of the Finance and Advisory Board. We urge all Parishes and Missions which have not reported to do so as soon as possible.

3. Section IV of Canon 7 provides that books of accounts shall be kept by all treasurers and custodians, and shall be available to auditors and to the Finance and Advisory Board at reasonable hours.

The Finance and Advisory Board, through this Committee, has asked our Parishes and Missions to report as to their observance of this provision, and finds that a majority have books of account which are open to inspection.

4. Section V of Canon 7 provides that "all accounts having to do with the receipt and expenditure, or investment, of moneys of all church organizations shall be audited at the close of each year by a Certified Public Accountant, or by such an accounting agency or agent as shall be approved by the Finance and Advisory Board of the Diocese."

The Finance and Advisory Board, through this Committee, has asked our church organizations to report to the Finance and Advisory Board in regard to the auditing of their accounts, and finds that audits by Certified Public accountants are the exceptions rather than the rule. The Finance and Advisory Board has confirmed a number of requests for approval of auditors named by Vestries when qualifications are given and responsibility is assumed by the Vestry. We are prepared to recommend the employment of Certified Public Accountants by more of our Parishes, particularly by those which have sizable incomes.

5. Section VI of Canon 7 provides that annual reports of all accounts shall be made, and that such reports shall be referred to the Finance and Advisory Board for study and recommendations.

This Committee recommends that such reports be sent in nearer to the date set in Canon 10, Section 1 (2), i.e. February 1st.

6. Section VII, of Canon 7 provides that all buildings, and the contents thereof, belonging to the Diocese and to its Parishes, Missions, and Institutions, shall be kept adequately insured, and that the Finance and Advisory Board shall approve the amounts of such insurance, may recommend more adequate insurance, and may make proper rules and regulations with respect to such insurance.

The Finance and Advisory Board, through this Committee, has asked our Parishes and Missions and Institutions to report the amounts of such insurance on their buildings. Statements have been received from only 66%. We are awaiting reports from the remaining 34%. The Finance and Advisory Board has no recommendations to make at this time, and has formulated no rules.

In order to bring before this Convention the possibility of securing a Diocesan Bond to cover all Treasurers and Custodians of the Diocese, this Committee offers the following resolution:

WHEREAS, It is required by Canon 7 of the Canons of this Diocese that the Treasurers and other Custodians of the funds of every Diocesan Institution, Parish and Mission in this Diocese be bonded for the purpose of safeguarding said funds; and

WHEREAS, A uniform system of bonding such Treasurers and Custodians is desirable, primarily for the saving of expenses;

Now, Therefore, Be it Resolved, That the Finance and Advisory Board of this Diocese be authorized to arrange for and purchase, at its discretion, a fidelity

schedule bond covering Treasurers and Custodians of the funds of Institutions, Parishes and Missions of this Diocese, the same to be furnished to each Institution, Parish and Mission at a cost based upon the amount of each bond required.

It was moved and seconded that the above resolution be adopted. Before the motion was put to a vote the Chair introduced Mr. James E. Whitney, Assistant Treasurer of the National Council, who spoke on "Better Business Methods and Financial Safeguards", and also explained in detail the question of obtaining a blanket fidelity schedule bond for Treasurers.

The question being called on the aforesaid resolution it was unanimously adopted.

The Chair introduced the Rev'd Clifford L. Samuelson, Assistant Secretary, Department of Domestic Missions, who spoke very effectively on the topic "The Church's work in Industrial Defense Areas", with special reference to the Diocese of Newark.

The report of the Treasurer of the Convention was presented by title, having been distributed earlier in the day to the delegates.

This shows a total payment by the Church Pension Fund proper to 46 beneficiaries in the Diocese of the sum of..... \$28,024.11

(This is a decrease of over \$875.00 from the year 1940)

There were also in force on account of the "General Convention of 1907 Account" pensions to 7 widows amounting to \$2,100 per year.

The grand total of all grants from all accounts to the Diocese of Newark, as of April 14, 1942, amounted to..... \$30,124.11

(This shows a decrease of about \$1,180.00 from the year 1940)

It may be of interest to the members of this Convention to know that at the present time there are 53 beneficiaries of the Church Pension and allied Funds in this Diocese. This number is 2 less than the number reported to the 1941 Convention. This total is made up as follows: Clergy receiving age benefits, 12; Clergy receiving total and permanent disability benefits, 1; widows, 36; orphans, 4.

Under date of April 22, 1942, the Executive Vice President of the Church Pension Fund, Mr. Bradford B. Locke, sent the Chairman of your Diocesan Pension Fund Committee certain interesting data. We quote certain extracts from his letter as follows:

"The pension benefits which the Fund is now paying amount to about \$1,390,000 a year. Ten years ago the total was \$970,000. Since the Fund first started on March 1, 1917, the total benefits paid out have amounted to over \$21,000,000. The average Age Allowance at present is about \$945.00."

"Since the Fund started, the total pension assessments paid into the Fund have amounted to about \$24,000,000. The pension assessments still due for all previous years, throughout the whole Church, now amount to less than \$50,000 or about one-fifth of one per cent of the total paid."

"The present assets of the Fund amount to \$35,650,000. They exceed the total liabilities by a reasonable margin, although, in this connection, it should be pointed out that the liabilities are calculated on a basis which assumes the earning of 3½% interest whereas the Fund is not at present fulfilling that assumption."

As far as our own Diocese of Newark is concerned, the members of your Committee are indeed happy that our record of payments is such a good one. We feel sure that we express the wish of this Convention in urging all parochial authorities and others responsible for the remitting of pension payments in this Diocese to see that this matter is cared for promptly in order that all the clergy may obtain as full protection as possible under the rules of the Pension Fund.

The following report was presented by title by the Chairman, the Reverend Ross H. Flanagan:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSCIENTIOUS OBJECTORS.

The Committee on Conscientious Objectors held one meeting on June 6th, 1941 at the parish house of the Church of the Holy Communion, South Orange. The Rev'd Eric Tasman was chosen Secretary. We discussed our aims and objectives as outlined in the resolution. A representative of the Metropolitan Board for Conscientious Objectors (of New York City) gave us an informative talk on the work of that Committee and suggested ways in which we could help any registrants referred to our Committee.

So far, three names have been sent to our Committee, of conscientious objectors of the Diocese of Newark. Two required no action. The third man has indicated his need for financial assistance and we shall have to take up that matter at a meeting to be called soon. The chairman has given advice to two young men who visited him. One of these was referred to the Metropolitan Board for further advice.

Other than this, we have had no calls requiring action. We feel, however, that the need for this Committee still exists and we ask its continuance.

The Rev'd John T. Ledger requested that it be stated in the minutes that the name of the Hospital of St. Barnabas and For Women and Children is removed from the Journal not because of any resolution concerning racial prejudice, but because it is no longer a diocesan institution.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Chair appoint a Committee to certify to the correctness of the minutes of the Convention.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Convention adjourn sine die after prayer and Benediction by the Bishop.

The Episcopal Addresses

TENTH ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE BISHOP OF NEWARK

My Brethren of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of Newark:

This is the first Convention since 1916 that you have no written message from Wilson Reiff Stearly, Doctor in Divinity, fourth Bishop of Newark, who entered into rest November 8, 1941. He was elected Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese in 1915 and became its Coadjutor two years later. In that office he continued until the death of Bishop Lines in 1927. As Diocesan, his episcopate was terminated by his resignation in 1935. At the Memorial Service held in Trinity Cathedral in January, Dr. Dumper and Father Gomph paid in our behalf their tribute to his memory. It was my privilege to write at some length in the *Newark Churchman* of his effective labor of love among us. Today we join in giving God thanks for his noble, self-effacing ministry of abounding fruitfulness and worth. You will allow me to add here a personal word of gratitude and affection. I had never met him until after my election in 1932 as his Coadjutor. His cordial welcome and the evidence of his warm friendliness must have been in no small degree the reason for the kind reception which you also tendered to me. Two months after my coming, illness compelled him to request me to serve for some months as Ecclesiastical Authority. My first busy year in the strange new Diocese, bereft of his wise guidance, revealed to me the nature of the overwhelming task which could break his body, though never his spirit. His rest from work seemed for a time to result in partial restoration of his strength. Some of his duties he resumed including a few Confirmation Visitations in 1933 and in 1934. It must often have been difficult for him to watch another attempting to solve problems for the solution of which his expert experience suggested quite other lines of approach. Few men could have exercised the kindly patience and restraint which he practised during our comradely relationship. After his resignation in 1935 it was my privilege to see him often and to tell him what was happening in the Diocese so dear to him. During those months of enforced inactivity, his serene courage was a benediction to us who came into his presence. Because of his considerate affection never once was my relationship with him marred by the slightest discord. It is my privilege to pay this personal tribute to the considerateness of a great and good Bishop who was my counsellor and friend. God grant him rest!

Nine other Bishops of the Church, since last we met, have entered Paradise:

William Lawrence, retired Bishop of Massachusetts, to whose sympathetic imagination, wise statesmanship, and arduous labor the Church owes its Pension Fund for the benefit of the clergy and their families.

Herman Page, retired Bishop of Michigan, always the kindly pastor, thoughtful student, and skillful administrator.

Frederick Bethune Bartlett, Bishop of Idaho, aflame with missionary zeal.

Henry Judah Mikell, Bishop of Atlanta, a cultured gentlemen, gifted in the art of preaching.

Paul Jones, resigned Bishop of Utah, a fearless advocate of peace on earth, who counted not the cost of his lone stand.

Charles Fiske, retired Bishop of Central New York, with manifold gifts both as author and as preacher.

James Ridout Winchester, retired Bishop of Arkansas, faithful worker in a difficult field.

William Loyall Gravatt, retired Bishop of West Virginia, who brought fresh distinction to his honored lineage.

Gouverneur Frank Mosher, retired Bishop of the Philippine Islands, of true missionary spirit both there and earlier in China.

We remember affectionately three Presbyters of our Diocese:

Karl Ernest Warmeling served successively as Minister-in-charge of the Church of the Epiphany, Allendale; Rector of St. Matthew's, Jersey City, and Curate first at Trinity Cathedral and later at Grace Church, Orange. He then became Rector of Grace Church, Union City, from which parish a painful illness forced him to retire. The courage with which he awaited release from his suffering bore witness to his Christian faith.

Charles Malcolm Douglas was for thirty-six years Rector of Christ Church, Short Hills, until protracted illness made his resignation inevitable. He was a man whose rare gifts as preacher, pastor, and administrator were recognized by the entire community, of which he was a leading citizen.

Charles Perley Tinker served Grace Church, Nutley, as its Rector seventeen years. His capacity for friendliness, his unfailing courtesy, his love of souls were an expression of his sense of the values in human brotherhood.

I mention with sincere appreciation two laymen to whom were entrusted diocesan offices. Bancroft Gherardi was the treasurer of the Finance and Advisory Board. Bernard J. Harrison was a trustee of the Laura Augusta. Members of Christ Church, Short Hills, each had attained distinction in his chosen vocation; both loved the Church and served it well.

Other faithful Churchmen who had held office as wardens or vestrymen were Theodore S. Fettinger, St. Andrew's, Newark; Henry Y. Blakiston, Grace, Rutherford; William T. Baird, Grace, Orange; Irving W. Bonbright, Thomas G. Haight, and Charles H. Van Buren, St. Paul's, Englewood; Louis C. Geils and Robert M. Harvey, Incarnation, East Orange; Richard L. Riker, St. Paul's, Newark; Arthur H. Pratt, Holy Communion, South Orange; E. Forrest Fettinger, Grace, Newark; Edward E. Soutar, Christ, Bloomfield-Glen Ridge; Charles Z. Gerhardt, Grace, Orange; Charles T.

Shepard, St. George's, Maplewood; George J. Abbott, Trinity, Paterson; Jacob G. Gerve, Christ, Wortendyke; E. D. Every, St. Peter's, Rochelle Park; Samuel VerPlanck Hoffman, St. Peter's, Morristown; Robert L. Flemming, St. Paul's, Jersey City; William Ritchie, St. Mary's, Jersey City; Earle Whitehorn, St. Peter's, Essex Fells.

We commemorate the wives of four of our clergy: Florence Borton, St. Mark's, Newark; Mary Bragaw Tinker, Grace, Nutley; Lydia Shipley, Trinity, Hoboken; Ruth A. Buttery, All Saints', Bergenfield.

Other faithful Churchwomen of whose passing I have known are Mrs. C. Alfred Burhorn, Trinity, Hoboken; Mrs. Carleton Greene, Holy Communion, South Orange; Mrs. Charles Stout, Christ, Short Hills; Mrs. Anna Alling, Trinity, Newark; Mrs. Franklin Van Winkle, St. Paul's, Paterson; Miss Jeanie E. Aitken, St. Paul's, North Arlington; Mrs. Charles Riggs, St. Andrew's, South Orange; Deaconess Edith C. Smith, formerly of St. Peter's Morristown.

To these and to His other faithful departed may God give entrance into the land of light and life!

Since last we met as a Convention, our own country has become an active participant in the titanic struggle between two philosophies of life which permit no reconciliation. No necessity exists for an elaboration of these philosophies, nor for the justification of our own, which rests upon the inherent worth and dignity of every human soul. Some of us have been called to the colors to defend it by force of arms. All of us are called in one way or another both to defend and to express its validity. There can be neither deferment nor exemption from this obligation. Where it involves sacrifice, let us count sacrifice to be high privilege.

Although the arms of the United Nations have sustained wide-spread reverses, victory, though delayed, is bound to crown our effort. Of this I am confident. The morale of our nation is an important factor, springing from a sense of the justice of our cause. The existence of a just and righteous God does not in itself guarantee our victory. God allowed His people Israel to be carried into bondage, and His only-begotten Son to die upon the Cross. My confidence is largely based upon the vastness of our resources both in men and natural resources. In the fact that wealth of men and munitions will win the war lies a subtle danger. It involves the possibility of our capitulation to Hitler's own heresy that might makes right. This heresy in turn may lead to usurpation of the throne of God by men who, fresh from their kinship with suffering, cry out at the table of peace-makers for a vengeance upon the vanquished going beyond security from the repetition of their aggression. Both now and when the war is ended, it cannot be too often emphasized that God has not suspended His law of love. The recently enthroned Archbishop of Canterbury has called for relentless energy in the prosecution of the war, accompanied by entire

freedom from hatred; for heroic self-sacrifice, with brotherly love even for our enemy. He has declared that the Church should use no prayers that conscientious German Christians cannot also use, none which do not fall within the framework of the prayer which our Lord himself taught us to use. These are hard sayings, but the Christian life was never intended to be an easy way. If its end is fraught with enduring satisfactions, we must pay the cost of travel.

From time to time we hear demands for the statement of peace aims. The Lord Privy Seal speaking in the House of Commons has said: "It is comparatively easy to lay down your peace aims in almost a sentence. Then you come to an intermediate stage when perhaps you can put down general principles. If you stop there the complaint will be that you are very vague. If you go beyond that you will find that you are getting into details which you cannot have at this time, because you are trying to jug your hare before you have caught it."

How for example can the knotty problems of Asia and the Pacific be thus early solved? It seems fairly evident that we are well on the way to an Asia for the Asiatics, though not, as the Japanese think, for their own nation. It is not too early to enunciate such general principles as our will to establish everywhere the four freedoms of Mr. Roosevelt—freedom of speech and of worship, freedom from want and fear. Let us also hold firmly in mind the Atlantic Charter, signed for their nations by Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Churchill. It embodies the Christian principle of fellowship among the nations, a brotherhood of weak and strong in which the natural resources of each member are used for the benefit of all. It cannot rest only upon treaties. Treaties are of fragile stuff; moreover, situations not fore-seen develop making their revision both necessary and wise. There must therefore be some continuing agency, some form of union to which each nation with due self-restraint and trust delegates a measure of its sovereignty. God gives men a second chance. We shall have an opportunity to atone for our earlier tragic blunder of refusing to play our part in the creation of such a fellowship of nations.

Through our Presiding Bishop all our parishes will shortly be asked to enroll in a spiritual offensive toward a Christian victory and a Christian peace. Among their other efforts parishes which enroll will be expected to form groups to study and deal with problems growing out of the war. I commend to your earnest and favorable consideration the request of the Presiding Bishop when you shall receive it.

I pass on to other aspects of our immediate concern—the opportunity and the responsibility of the Church in this time of war. The practise of the Christian faith is not a harmless avocation to be pursued only when no other occupation suggests itself. Its ministries of service are not an extra-curricular activity in which men and women may indulge in the absence of

more important pursuits. The State itself in many ways, notably by its exemption of the clergy from the provisions of the Selective Service Act, gives recognition to the value of the service which may be rendered by that Army in which at Baptism we were enlisted as soldiers of Christ. It should be quite clear that in its own appointed sphere that Army should press onward with renewed vigour and with ample resources both of recruits and of supplies. As citizens we are privileged in countless ways to give time and money to war-time activities. Such sacrifice and service must be an addition to our normal obligations as citizens of heaven, not a substitution for them.

We cannot afford to ask a dispensation for the time-being from the duty of participation in the work and more particularly the worship of the Church—Whence, save from the Sanctuary of God, shall we derive light in our perplexity, solace from anxiety, and courage to endure? Worship finds its supreme expression in the offering of oneself that through union with Christ's perfect offering, one may become an agent in the accomplishment of God's purpose, the winning of freedom for the human spirit.

Our gifts are the acid test of the sincerity of our discipleship. Each day brings its appeals for contributions to succor the needy and distressed. We must open both our hearts and our purses. If at the same time we reduce our gifts to the missions of the Church, it is they not we who have responded. This is a time not for ordinary, but for extraordinary acts of devotion and of sacrifice.

In some areas new housing projects present new opportunities for the Church. Families must be sought out, welcomed to our parish life of work and worship. This can be done most effectively by a survey of such new districts initiated by joint action of the several Communions represented. Laymen and women are canvassing neighborhoods in their capacity as air-wardens; why can we not marshal them for visitations on behalf of the Church? It is a natural expression of the cordial interest with which newcomers should be welcomed by our congregations.

Yes! The Services and the service of the Church must continue with increased effectiveness. Imagination and strategy will be required if we are to surmount inevitable difficulties, some of which already present will no doubt become yet more formidable.

There are serious problems of transportation and of heating to tax our resourcefulness. The schedule of Confirmation Visitations must be so arranged as to require a minimum of travel. I ask your sympathetic understanding if to that end it should be necessary to request you to arrange a Service at an unaccustomed hour, or on some day other than that of long-standing custom in your parish. Only if it is inevitable shall I ask, where confirmation candidates are few, that a visitation be postponed.

As we find the free movement of our people impaired, the increased

danger of parochialism gives me great concern. Because it is always present, I had hoped during the coming year to initiate a project to which, though it must probably be postponed, I shall refer. Under the auspices of the Forward-in-Service Committee, two or three times during the past year the clergy of each of the several Archdeaconries have met to discuss their common problems as priests of the Church. Vestries also have their common problems as have leaders of men's clubs. As a smaller unit than the Diocese, the Archdeaconry lends itself more easily to the holding of informal discussion groups in which laymen may profit through the pooling of experience. Such meetings as I have in mind would have a further value in promoting acquaintanceship of our laymen with one another. The reviving of our archdiaconal system, though with changed emphasis and purpose, is involved. Through it we could conserve the fine purposes of the Church Club which by due process has this past year been dissolved due to the recognition by its members that changing social conditions require adaptability in organization and administration.

Many of you will already have given much thought to the effect upon your parish life of our war-time economy. It is for the sake of society itself, not only for their own souls' sake, that in such times as these our people must understand the importance of Public Worship. It is right that some portion of what gasoline we have should be used to bring us to His house to give Him thanks who gave it to us. As we in turn ration our own ration the Church must stand high in our priority list. In many parishes definite arrangements can be made by those in authority for the use week by week each in turn of the automobiles in a given neighborhood. Where parish house facilities allow, the Church School and a Service in the Church at the same hour might provide opportunity for the worship by families at a minimum of travel. Week day Services at early hours for those who pass the Church on their way to work might also result in economies in transportation. If parishioners cannot reach the Church, the Church must reach out to them. Services might be arranged in some home in a section of one's parish from which the Church is not readily accessible, thus involving the travel only of a clergyman, whose priority in gasoline is for his people's sake. In rural areas a mimeographed order of service for the following Sunday might be mailed to the people's homes, together with one of the excellent Forward Movement tracts to be read aloud as a sermon or instruction. We can enroll subscribers to *Forth* and to a weekly Church paper, or through the bundle plan make single copies available. If rigid economy in heating must be practised, parish halls may be converted into decent places of worship. There will be some to whose convenience is added the desire, existent or potential, to make use of the Church for their private devotions. To facilitate such use, I now affectionately and definitely request that every Church in the Diocese be open daily for private prayer. It is unthinkable that access to God in his Church should be less free than

to the rector in his office. Readily available in vestibule or pew should be those aids and suggestions for use in private devotion which can be purchased or locally prepared.

What substitutes can be found if necessary for the usual house-to-house visits of the Rector to homes where no special need exists? It may be possible for him to arrange from time to time for some parishioner to open his house to the people of a neighborhood where he and they may meet one another in a friendly group. The values of such gatherings in the promotion of parochial fellowship are readily apparent to us all.

I ask you not to believe that I give you no credit for imagination. I mention these possible adaptations to our confused times only in order to emphasize the need for the exercise of ingenuity in finding ways and means of making our ministry effective, thus proving our faith in its divine necessity.

Other adjustments than those I have already mentioned may be found needful. There is, for example a serious shortage of clergy throughout the Church, which will no doubt become still more acute. If it should become necessary to combine parishes and missions, I shall look to clergy and laity for willingness to make the sacrifice entailed—though sacrifice is hardly the proper word to use in days like these. We are fortunate in possessing a number of devoted Layreaders. In the days before us, they may be called upon to exercise their office even more frequently where priests are unavailable.

The shortage of clergy is due only in part to demands for chaplains in our armed forces. Concern is frequently expressed at the decline of the birth-rate in certain social groups. They do not reproduce themselves. There are all too many parishes which seem to have no consciousness of their responsibility to produce men for the Sacred Ministry. In effect they live only upon the bounty of the Church at large. I must not now trespass upon your time by entering into a discussion of the selection, recruiting, and use of our clergy. I shall however refer to two specific matters of grave importance. No man in possession of his senses enters the ministry for financial gain; yet it is common justice that he should receive a salary commensurate with his need and with the ability of his people. I need not remind you of the sharp increase in costs of living, nor of the increased income, even after the payment of taxes, among some groups of people. Too many of our clergy are receiving less than the standard which some years ago this Convention declared to be a minimum. This standard was for a single man \$1800, and for a married man \$2100 with the free use of a house. I ask each congregation which now falls short of this minimum to seek in some way to meet it. Of course this must not be at the expense of your contributions to the missionary cause, of which almost every dollar is itself a salary item.

The other matter to which I refer is the desperate need of our Seminaries for funds with which to provide for the more adequate training of men for the ministry. I do not know how many of our parishes gave heed to the request of the Presiding Bishop for the observance of the Second Sunday after Easter as Theological Education Sunday. This was in accordance with the resolution of General Convention adopted, so far as I know, by the affirmative vote of the deputies of every diocese. It was suggested that sermons be preached on the importance of Theological Education for the well being of the Church, and that an offering of the people be sent to one of the recognized Seminaries of the Church. The resources of each of them are insufficient for the proper performance of their task. They deserve, and must have, increased financial support from the Church they serve. Every parish must ask what it has done, and is doing both to provide men for the ministry and to afford facilities for the training of those whom others provide.

I have been speaking of the difficulties which we face in this day of crisis. Problems are indeed presented, but opportunities accompany them. Among them is the privilege of extending the fostering care of the Church to the men in our armed forces. We should have on offering, as generous as possible, from every congregation for the Army and Navy Commission Fund. Participation in this endeavor enables the Chaplains to discharge their duty, but it is not the full measure of our own. Among the men who have gone from our parishes are some who for one reason or another may not have been intimately associated with our parochial life. As they face temptation, loneliness, and danger, they need the constant assurance of our remembrance of them. Their need of cheer may make them the more receptive to the implications of our messages of affection. The Chairman of our Diocesan Commission will refer in his report to ways in which certain of our parishes have notably succeeded in giving them proof of the reality of the bond which unites the members of Christ's family as they have succeeded in maintaining not a perfunctory but a deeply personal contact with our absent sons and brothers.

Perhaps the multiplicity of demands upon the clergy is such that the clergy can never make full proof of their ministry. If visiting must be curtailed, time may be found for certain duties which have been postponed. Parish lists and records may be made more accurate. The canonical regularization of the communicant status of some of our people may be achieved through letters of transfer sent and received. There will be time for greater diligence "in Prayers and in reading the Holy Scriptures, and in such studies as help to the knowledge of the same," duties set before us at our ordination to the Priesthood. We may have the opportunity for greater care in our preparation for the weighty task of preaching, with the inevitable result that more than before our people will find in the time of Public Worship light and inspiration for their daily living.

Never before in my ten Convention addresses to you have I dwelt at such length on plain and homely matters. Some of you may feel a measure of disappointment at the comparative absence from my message of a discussion of great principles of righteousness and truth upon the preservation of which civilization may itself depend. I am mindful of them, but I am also mindful of the nature of the occasion which brings us together. This is a convention of clergy and laity, duly called to set forward the work of the Church in and through the Diocese of Newark. It is sometimes said that the existence of the Christian Church is in peril. I am not concerned for the security of the Church. God will look to its preservation. I am concerned that the Church shall fulfill its own peculiar function for Christ's sake and for man's; that each of us shall do his bounden duty in the office or function which he holds. If at any time there be justification for the existence of the Church with her ordered life of sacrament and prayer, now is the appointed time for its maintenance with the utmost effectiveness which we can marshal.

The Church has commissioned me to serve as an officer in Christ's army, and by virtue of that commission I give you this charge who have also chosen to serve in that army. It is timely because it is also timeless.

"Take unto you the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand.

"Stand therefore, having your loins girt about with truth, and having on the breastplate of righteousness;

"And your feet shod with the preparation of the gospel of peace;

"Above all, taking the shield of faith, wherewith ye shall be able to quench all the fiery darts of the wicked.

"And take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God:

"Praying always with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit, and watching thereunto with all perseverance and supplication." . . .

And may you continue Christ's faithful soldiers and servants unto your life's end.

THE SEVENTH ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE SUFFRAGAN BISHOP

Fellow Workers in Christ:—

We of today share the mood of the first century Christians when we read in the twenty-first chapter of St. Luke's Gospel: "There shall be signs in the sun, and in the moon, and in the stars; and upon the earth distress of nations, with perplexity; the sea and the waves roaring; men's hearts failing them for fear, and for looking after those things which are coming on earth: for the powers of heaven shall be shaken. And then they shall see the Son of Man coming in a cloud with power and great glory. And

when these things begin to come to pass, then look up, and lift up your heads; for your redemption draweth nigh."

While we may share the mood of the early Christians, we must not interpret the passage in the same way. The early readers of the message took it to mean that man was hopelessly sinful and that God alone could step into the current of human life through the Second Coming of the Son of Man in the lifetime of those then living. We of a later generation have learned that these words give the description of a continuing process, as well as the promise of an ultimate event. The message is a message of hope and not of doom. Its teaching is that every period in the world's history in which man recognizes his own sinful helplessness is an opportunity for bringing nearer a more complete realization of the meaning of redemption because it is a time when great decisions can and should be made which will advance the Kingdom of God.

These decisions are to be made not simply by individual effort but by corporate effort inspired by a spirit of togetherness, particularly on the part of "them that are of the household of faith." It is good to be alive in a day of change, for we then have the opportunity of helping to shape the world that is going to be. Our task in these days of opportunity is to work together in such a spirit of "togetherness" that we may demonstrate to the world the power of a fellowship to change human relations. The first step in discharging this responsibility is to make it our business to know the task of the whole Church and to work for it as a whole even although the scene of our activity may be the comparatively small unit of our own parish. As illustrations of the kind of effort required, we refer you to the exhibits in the rear corners of the auditorium placed there by St. Andrew's Church, South Orange, and we mention the educational project which was carried on by St. Peter's Church, Essex Fells, during this past Lent. On successive evenings representatives of the Church Army, of the Chaplains with our armed forces, of the Order of Deaconesses, of one of the monastic orders, and of the Seaman's Church Institute laid before the people of that parish the work which they were carrying on in their respective spheres of duty. It is good for us to have our vision stretched in some such manner. Undoubtedly similar projects were carried on in other parishes and their numbers should be multiplied.

It is particularly necessary for us to see our task as a whole during these days because the threatening shortages of rubber and gasoline may reduce the number of diocesan meetings and tend to create in parishes a feeling of being merely isolated units in a great whirlpool of struggle. It is going to be physically difficult to maintain interparochial and diocesan contacts, to say nothing of contacts with the larger units of the whole Church, but that is no reason why we should retreat within ourselves and become self-centered fellowships. On the contrary, it is all the more reason why we should make an effort to increase our intellectual and spiritual

fellowship with the whole Church. Your bishops are determined to maintain every diocesan contact that is reasonably possible. However, there is nothing to be gained by belittling the difficulties that may confront us or by indulging in wishful thinking. The time may come when neighboring parishes will have to work together because of the shortage of fuel or of some other essential commodity or because of the shortage of clergymen. The possibility that such circumstances may arise is all the more reason for emphasizing in our parish life the maintenance of faithful fellowship.

Particularly we must emphasize the vital necessity of fostering sound family life. Those of us who remember the last war and its aftermath remember with regret the girls who became flappers and the boys who became bootleggers. We can also remember that the reason why these young people discarded restraint, and with it a sense of responsibility, was because their elders did just that thing themselves. We want no repetition of that situation, and yet that situation will be repeated unless we remind ourselves constantly that the young people are a responsibility even more urgent than the war. Recently a clergyman said in my presence that he could not get any of his women to take charge of a Girl Scout Troop because they were too busy changing their war uniforms. We must not only set an example for these young people but also help them to share in a sense of responsibility for the new world that is emerging from the present chaos. We must set them an example by the breadth of our service to human fellowship and by the depth of our devotion to God's purpose. As a helpful step in discharging this responsibility, we suggest the presenting of parochial opportunities wherein parents and young people together may make a detailed study of the creeds and their meaning for our day. Only as we are sound in the faith can we face the future fearlessly and effectively.

Each parish must see to it that all of its activities are demonstrations to the local community of a fellowship wherein the people live and work together irrespective of family background, education, race, or social position. Ranks must be closed. This is no time for individualists, whether those individualists are rectors, vestries, or organization leaders. No rector can expect to have the hearty cooperation of his fellow workers unless he engages with them in a common enterprise and shows it by his cooperation with them. In the same way, no vestry is either wise or within its legal rights if it attempts to sit in private judgment upon the rector or to act as if he were a mere employee instead of being an integral part of their common fellowship. Also, no leader of a parish organization has the right to treat that organization as if it were a personal possession even although long and faithful service has been given. Such attitudes as we have mentioned make for divisiveness and not for fellowship and must be scrupulously avoided.

Not only must we be particularly careful to maintain fellowship and common effort in every enterprise of the parish, but we must be alert for enlisting new leadership from young and older people who have not hitherto exercised leadership in our parish life. Because of the preoccupation of many men and women with national service today, the temptation will confront older and more experienced people to hold on to elective parochial offices and to justify it on the ground that there is nobody else to take over. No parish is in a healthy position that always maintains the same elected people in office term after term no matter what the crisis or seeming justification may be. The usual justification presented by and for repeaters is that there are no other people in the parish or else that the younger people cannot be persuaded to serve. The answer to that is that young and inexperienced people will not serve in a situation which they feel is dominated by older and more experienced personnel. They are fearful of mistakes and resulting criticisms. One remedy for this situation is to maintain the principle of rotation in elective offices. The only difficulty connected with the enunciating of such a principle is that it brings too prompt action from sensitive people and justification for continuance from those we most need to accept it on the ground that their position is peculiar or different. The present world crisis, far from being a justification for the retention of older leaderships, is all the more reason why we should turn to younger and even inexperienced leadership. Those who seem very young now and who may seem too young to take upon their shoulders responsibility for the church's work are nevertheless the very ones who will have to face the responsibility of building a new world and they need to have that responsibility bed-rocked in the experience of planning and carrying on the life and work of the Church.

While I am speaking of parish life, I should like to pay a tribute of respect to our clergy. As some of you know, I have been privileged to see quite a bit of our Church, and even since becoming one of your bishops, I have been invited to speak and to teach in various dioceses. Out of that experience I would like to say that I believe we are blessed with the kind of clergymen we have in Newark. In faithfulness and unselfish devotion they measure up along side of any diocese with which I am acquainted. I believe that you laymen share this judgment. I am sure you will prove your loyalty to them in the trying days to come. And in mentioning the clergy, I would not for a minute overlook the wives of the clergymen. The husbands are concerned with the discharge of their various responsibilities and the wives encourage them by their self-forgetful and often times unseen service to the same cause. In addition, they keep themselves and their families clothed, fed and publicly presentable on a fixed and none too large income in the face of rising costs. Better a spoken tribute in the presence of the faithful living than a regretful silence as a postlude for the faithful dead!

Turning now from the intimate life of the parish to the larger life of the

diocese, there are several matters which should be reported upon. During the past year, the officers of the Church Club of the Diocese voted to disband the Club as a diocesan organization because they felt that its functions of fellowship and information could be carried on by other means. In disbanding the organization, provision was made for maintaining a system of communication between such parochial men's clubs as now exist or may hereafter be created. A news bulletin has been created which is to serve as a means of intercommunication and exchange of ideas. To be effective, this agency should have the regular and faithful cooperation of every single men's organization throughout the diocese. If your men's group is not already in contact with this agency, we would appreciate it if you would have them communicate with us so that we may do our part in maintaining an active sense of fellowship in the various parts of the diocese.

Our plans for the Annual Diocesan Institute are under way and it will be held at the Diocesan House on Monday evenings in October. At the request of some who attended last year, the Institute Committee has thought it best to confine these meetings to the Monday evenings in October instead of allowing them to continue into the middle of November. The committee is preparing just such an outstanding faculty as we had last year. We do not believe that the crisis in transportation is any reason for abandoning this project. On the contrary we feel that it is all the more reason why we need to make the necessary sacrificial effort so that we may come together to consider the things of God. We ask that you plan now so that when the time comes you may be able to share with others in this common experience of our family life.

As a part of its Diocesan responsibility and recognizing the changes that are occurring in our communities, the Board of Christian Social Service recently had an interesting and striking experience which I would share with you. For some time, the newspapers of this area were filled with reports of very unhealthy social conditions in Dover. There were reports of overcrowded housing conditions, neglected children wandering the streets and a general lack of proper amusement for the greatly increased population. Because of this situation, the Board quietly raised some funds and sent a trained social worker into the area. Those who gave the necessary funds have made a very real contribution not only to their Church but to our whole war effort, because after a faithful and conscientious effort to learn the truth, this trained worker reported back that the rumors and reports were groundless and without foundation. This, too, in spite of the fact that some of the rumors and reports were quite circumstantial in their allegation.

This does not mean that Dover does not have problems or that we do not have responsibility for them. It means that Dover has the usual problems of a growing community and that we shall be glad to help, but it

also means that in all fairness we must report that Dover and the appropriate agencies are coping with them. The result of this investigation on behalf of the Board is cited here as evidence of the harm that can be done through the thoughtless transmission of gossip and rumor. This experience should put us all on our guard against repeating what we hear without taking the pains to ascertain the facts.

In the year 1941, the Diocese of Newark contributed for British Missions the sum of \$14,300 through the giving of one hundred and twenty-three parishes and missions. This year we have given to date \$1,388 through the giving of twelve parishes and missions. It is true that fifty-five other parishes and missions have advised us that special offerings will be taken during the year. The situation makes us a bit anxious. The National Council has promised the British Church the same amount as last year, \$300,000. Surely we do not want to neglect our Mother Church in the day of her necessity. It is greatly hoped that other parishes which have not taken up an offering for this purpose will do so as soon as possible.

Two years ago I ventured to say to this Convention, "The world's next big problem lies in Asia, not Europe. We of the United States will awaken to that fact * * * when the trade treaty between the Netherlands and Japan expires." I refer to this statement because the mental attitude which existed then still persists. Today we are repeating the mental attitude which made Pearl Harbor possible. It is the attitude of mind which says, "It cannot happen to us." We did not think that Pearl Harbor could happen, but it did. So, today, we still think we are living in a white man's world, but we are not. From now on, we shall be living in a colored world, and we must face that fact.

Until December 7, 1941, the terrible war that is now raging was between white people and involved a conflict of two philosophies of life—compulsion and cooperation. When on December seventh, Japan hurled herself into the conflict there was added a further issue to complicate our problems; the race issue. Japan started her war with the announced intention of driving the white man out of Asia and the surrounding countries. She gave as her reason for doing this the charge that the white man had always discriminated against colored people and should not therefore be allowed to govern them.

Much has been made of Winston Churchill's splendid speech before the United States Congress. It was a splendid speech, but it revealed an angle of thought which played into the hands of our enemies. Our own enthusiastic reception of it has resulted in our being classified along with the British as prejudiced. In that speech he drew a dramatic picture of all the English-speaking white people organizing and policing the world. The unconscious inclusion of the adjective, white, gave a picture of what was really going on in his mind. He said nothing about the Chinese who were then and are now our allies, nor did he mention the dark-skinned people of

Latin America whom we are very anxious to have coöperate with us. This revelation of the British mind explains in a large measure what took place at Hong Kong, Singapore, Batavia, and Burma. The native peoples in those localities learned to have great respect for British law and power, but they also learned that their own place was to be permanently inferior to that of the British. When, therefore, there seemed to be a chance to change that situation by coöperating with the Japanese they did so with disastrous results not only for the British Empire, but for all white people.

It is not necessary for me to dwell upon the dangerous amount of race prejudice which exists in this country. The problem comes pretty close home to each one of us here in New Jersey. The National Bureau of the Census reported in April, 1942, that in cities of 50,000 population or more in the state of New Jersey, it was a fact that seven out of every one hundred of the population are Negroes. An editorial in the *Afro-American* of March 21, 1942, put the problem in a nutshell—"The white population can afford to sacrifice race prejudice because they can't keep it and win."

There is one bright spot in the present situation. We are all proud of the magnificent spirit shown by those Filipinos who stood so staunchly with General MacArthur and General Wainwright. We can be thankful that our treatment of the Filipinos has been such that they have been willing to throw their lot in with us and to suffer hardship along with our American soldiers. In the tragic news which has come to us in the loss of the Philippines, there have been two grains of comfort. The first is that the Filipinos fought to the end with us and the second is that the Army communique announcing the disaster rightly referred to all of the participants as Amercian soldiers.

A short time ago, I had the privilege of attending a meeting which was addressed by Dr. Malcolm MacLean, Chairman of the Fair Employment Practice Committee of the W.P.B. and the President of Hampton Institute. He referred to the present struggle "as a cosmic hurricane caused by high and low pressures of discrimination." He warned us of the impossibility of continuing to discriminate against certain groups within our national boundaries and throughout the world. He reminded us that all the white people on the face of the earth only totalled 700,000,000 to the 1,300,000,000 of colored people. Referring to the foolishness of discrimination here in this country he went on to show that inside of the next two years every man and woman in this country will be needed in some form of war work in order to carry on our task. The Navy plans to have 1,500,000 men by January 1, 1944, and the Army plans to have 10,000,000 men by the same date. When one realizes that it takes from ten to eighteen persons behind the lines to maintain every person at the front, it can be clearly seen that there will be no possible chance for discrimination against some person since every person will be absolutely needed if we are to win the war. It is

well for us to look these cold facts in the face and begin now the necessary process of mental readjustment that we must all make.

As Christians we must face facts which we have almost forgotten. Christ died for all men and told His disciples to carry that message to all men. We have been too prone to accept the message for ourselves but to shrink from the cost of passing it on. We must realize afresh that material loss and even death itself are incidents in the accomplishment of God's purpose. There are worse things than material loss and physical death. Moral obtuseness is one of them and spiritual indifference is another, because they lead to that eternal death which comes from turning away from God's purpose for life. We must be deeply concerned about human rights and must fight against the denial of them to others by discrimination or other methods. In our care for human rights we have the very heart of our religion. To be concerned about them will not only mean much change in our own thinking but much sacrificial effort to secure and to preserve those rights for others.

We must ask ourselves some honest questions. Are we worthy of the sacrifices being made by our kin and comrades under fire and by the doctors, nurses and others who minister to them? Are we worthy of the self-forgetful devotion of our missionaries in occupied China? Are we worthy of the heroism of the men and women in drab corners of our own communities who are carrying on without applause and without thought of self? Do we intend to allow all of these warrior souls to make these sacrifices for us and then expect the kind of a world we have always known? God forbid! The soul of America is still a pioneer soul. We can and must build a new and better world of human relationships. We are living in great days of opportunity. It is good to be alive and to have the chance of making amends for our selfish mistakes.
