CANON, 1, § II.

OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

From a Parish.

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election, in the following form:

[Name of the Church, the Place, and Date.]

This certifies that a meeting of the congregation of this Church, held for the purpose of electing Church Officers, and Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention (*or for the purpose of electing Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, if the meeting be for that object alone*), A. B., C. D., and E. F., being communicants of the Church in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Deputies; and B. C., D. E., and F. G., also being communicants in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Alternate Deputies to represent the Parish in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand (*or if two Wardens subscribed, we have set our hands*), the day and year above written.

N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary sign, then the signatures of *both* Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-in-charge, *or* Missionary, may not sign.

From a Mission.

N. B.—Use the same form and substitute the word "Mission" for "Parish" in three places. The Minister-in-charge; or, the Clerk; or, the Warden may sign.

Memoranda:

Not more than three Deputies are allowed from each Parish, and Mission.

Three Alternate Deputies must be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies.

Write Christian names in **FULL** and **LEGIBLY**.

Blank forms will be sent by the Secretary of the Convention on or before Easter Monday in each year.

Return Certificates of Election at least **ONE MONTH** before Convention.

Deputies must be *Communicants of the Church, and also qualified voters in the Parish or Mission which elects them.* (See Canon 10- § II, [4,] [5] and [6] and Canon 16 § VIII.)

Rules of Order

THE CONVENTION.

1. The Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. The Convention shall meet on the opening day for the Business Sessions at 9:45 A. M.; with a recess of one hour between 1 and 2 o'clock.
3. At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
4. At the close of each Convention, the Minutes shall be corrected and approved.
5. The doors of the Convention shall be open for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
6. All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convention shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall record their attendance.
7. Clergymen of other Dioceses, and Candidates for Holy Orders, who may be present, shall be admitted to honorary seats in the Convention on the presentation of their names to the Secretary.
8. When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
9. When any member is about to speak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
10. No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply), in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
11. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
12. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate, but any member may appeal from the decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention. The general procedure of the Convention shall be governed, unless otherwise provided for, by the rules of parliamentary practice as set forth in "Roberts' Rules of Order."
13. A Committee consisting of the Bishop, ex-officio, five other clergymen and five laymen, to be known as the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, shall be appointed at each Convention to prepare the official Ballots and the Calendar of Business, for the next Annual Convention.

The mode of conducting the nominations and elections of all Committees, Commissions and Boards and all other elective officers not otherwise provided for, shall be as follows:

The Secretary of the Convention shall send out with the notice of the time and place of the Diocesan Convention, a list of the offices to be filled by election thereat, and the names of the incumbents of these offices, whose terms expire thereat, together with an official nomination blank. Such notice shall be sent out at least one month before the date appointed for the Convention, to the Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and to each lay delegate whose name and address has been transmitted to the Secretary, as provided in Canon I.

Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations for any office or offices to be filled at such Convention, shall at least fifteen days before the date appointed for the Convention, submit the same in writing to the Secretary thereof, together with his certificate that he has secured the consent of such person or persons to such nomination.

The Committee on Elections, from the list of nominations as furnished to it by the Secretary of the Convention, shall prepare sufficient ballots marked "Sample" for each clerical and lay delegate, as certified by such Secretary, as entitled to a seat in the Convention; such ballot to be mailed by such Secretary to each such delegate at least five days before the Convention.

At the beginning of the opening session the committee shall report to the Convention in the form of an official ballot the names of nominees; the arrangement of such names shall be determined by lot in each order.

If there be any office for which no nomination has been made on the sample ballot any delegate may file with the Secretary of the Convention the name of one candi-

date for any such office, together with his certificate, that he has secured the consent of the person so nominated. Such nominations may be filed up to the hour of voting, and the committee of Elections shall announce the names of such nominees at the time of the distribution of the first ballot.

The number of consecutive terms any nominee has held the office for which he is again nominated shall be noted on the ballot, in parentheses, after his or her name. After each list of nominations as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks may be filled by any voter. On the first ballot these ballots only shall be used, and also in subsequent ballots, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. No ballot shall be counted in its class, on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled, and the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast.

The members of the Convention shall also be requested, in said call, to send to this Committee any canonical amendments or other important items of business that they may propose to introduce at the next Convention, so that such matters may be assigned a place on the Calendar of Business. This call shall also be annually inserted in the April number of the official Magazine of the Diocese, THE NEWARK CHURCHMAN.

Balloting shall take place in a separate room when practicable.

The clerical and lay voting lists shall be divided into two sections each.

14. Four or more Election Tellers, clerical and lay, in equal numbers, not necessarily members of the Convention, shall be appointed by the President before an election. They shall receive and canvass all votes cast at any election which is required to be by ballot, and when such canvass is completed, shall immediately report its result to the Convention. The polls shall be open for such time as the Convention may, by resolution, direct.
15. All reports (usually printed in the JOURNAL) of officers, committees, commissions, and boards of trustees under control of the Convention, shall be printed and distributed by the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order as far as practicable, at least two weeks before the meeting of the Convention; provided that the subject of such printing and reports shall have been referred to the Finance and Advisory Board for consideration, which Board shall have power to supervise, regulate, or to condense the same, and to issue to the Committee or to the Secretary of the Convention such instructions as in the judgment of the said Board will promote greater economy and efficiency in respect to this work.

Reports when read in Convention shall be read by title only, unless the reading be for the better transaction of business.

NEW BUSINESS.

16. All new business introduced, except such as may accompany and form a part of a report of a committee, shall be in the form of a motion or resolution and shall be in writing.

COMMITTEES.

17. All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered. It shall be the duty of the Secretary promptly to notify the members of all special committees of their appointment.
18. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.

MOTIONS AND THEIR ORDER.

19. No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
20. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it; or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment has been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
21. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.

VOTING PRIVILEGES.

22. All questions shall be decided *viva voce*, unless otherwise specially ordered.
23. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote of the Convention shall be taken by Orders voting separately; and, when a vote is thus taken a concurrent majority in both Orders shall be necessary to carry any measure.

The Sixty-ninth Annual Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark, was held on Tuesday, May eleventh, Nineteen Hundred and Forty-three in Trinity Cathedral, Newark, N. J.

There was a Celebration of the Holy Communion in All Saints' Chapel of the Diocesan House at eight thirty o'clock, the Bishop, the Right Reverend Benjamin M. Washburn, D.D., being the celebrant, assisted by the Suffragan Bishop, the Right Reverend Theodore R. Ludlow, D.D.

The business sessions of the Convention were held in Trinity Cathedral being called to order at nine-fifty o'clock, with the Right Reverend the Bishop of Newark in the Chair. Prayers for guidance of the Holy Spirit in the deliberations of the Convention were offered by the Bishop.

The Chairman directed the Secretary to ascertain whether a constitutional quorum was present in each order.

A quorum being present the Convention was declared ready for business.

The Venerable William O. Leslie, Jr., renominated the Reverend J. Fred Hamblin, Rector of St. John's Church, Newark, as Secretary of the Convention, which nomination was duly seconded from the floor.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the nominations be closed, and that the Chair be requested to cast one ballot for the election. The Reverend Mr. Hamblin was declared duly elected.

The Secretary thereupon nominated for approval by the Convention as Assistant Secretaries—the Reverend Peter R. Deckenbach, Rector of Christ Church, Belleville, and the Reverend George S. Bowden, Vicar of Christ Church, Wortendyke.

Stetson; For Board of Religious Education—Reverend Messrs. Herman J. Smith, Charles R. Stires and Frederick J. Buttery; For Board of Missions and Church Extension—Reverend Messrs. Gordon T. Jones, L. Harold Hinrichs, John A. Frampton and A. E. Lyman-Wheaton, and Messrs. William F. Russell, Edward A. Chastaney, C. W. Tate and Gustave E. Wiedenmayer; For Deputies to the Provincial Synod—Reverend Messrs. Addison T. Doughty and John A. Frampton and Messrs. Wilton M. Lockwood and Frederick G. Stuart; For Provincial Commission on Religious Education—Reverend A. Stewart Hogensauer; For Finance and Advisory Board—Reverend Walter O. Kinsolving and Mr. Andrew F. Monroe; For Treasurer of the Convention—Mr. Albert H. Baldwin; For Ecclesiastical Court—Reverend David K. Montgomery.

The polls were opened for balloting at 11:20 o'clock, and on motion were to remain open for a period of ten minutes.

The Reverend Charles L. Gomph, S.T.D., presented the following resolution, and moved that it be given unanimous approval by this Convention, seconded from the floor:—

"In grateful recognition of the Episcopate of Wilson Reiff Stearly, fourth Bishop of Newark,

Be It Resolved, That the members of the annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark, meeting in Trinity Cathedral, Newark, on May 11, 1943, approve the establishment of a suitable memorial to Bishop Stearly as Chief Pastor of this Diocese, and

Be It Resolved, That this Convention request the Bishop to appoint a Committee of clergy, laymen and lay women to formulate plans for such a memorial and upon approval of such plans by the Bishop,

Be It Further Resolved, That this Committee be authorized and instructed to proceed with the raising of funds for this purpose."

Resolution unanimously adopted.

Col. Leigh K. Lydecker presented the following resolution, seconded by Mr. F. W. Thorne, and carried unanimously:—

"The 69th Annual Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church, in the Diocese of Newark, by this minute express their approval of the wider use of Trinity Cathedral for Diocesan activities and for Christian service, as set forth in Bishop Washburn's address. The Delegates, recognizing that for the effective achievement of such aims, some agreement between the Diocese, Trinity Church and the Chapter of All Saints' Cathedral is necessary, looking to an amalgamation of Trinity Cathedral Church and the Cathedral of All Saints, direct that a Committee of nine be appointed, three members by the Bishop to represent the Diocese, three by Trinity Church to represent their parish, and three by the Chapter of All Saints' Cathedral; and that such committee consider the method of organization best suited to fulfill these aims and report its conclusions and recommendations to the next Convention."

Mr. C. Alexander Capron offered the following resolution in reference to the conveyance of title of properties vested in the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties:—

"WHEREAS:

(a) Section VI of Canon 16 of the Diocese of Newark, New Jersey, provides that title to all real and personal property given, bequeathed or devised to, purchased or otherwise acquired by a Mission, excepting only contributions for the current expenses of such Mission, referred to in Section V of said Canon, shall be vested in the 'Board of Missions and Church Extension of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark, New Jersey', (sometimes hereafter referred to as the Board of Missions) a New Jersey corporation, in trust for said Mission.

(b) Prior to the incorporation of said Board of Missions, the title to properties acquired by or for a Mission or for its use or for the purpose of establishing a mission or carrying on missionary work in the diocese was vested in the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties of the Diocese of Newark, sometimes hereafter referred to as the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund.

(c) Some of the missions for which properties were held by the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund have since become parishes.

(d) It is desirable and appropriate that authority be given to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund to convey any property held for a mission or missions or church extension to said Board of Missions and, in the case of any property held or which may hereafter be held for a mission which has or may hereafter become a parish, that said Trustees or said Board of Missions be authorized to convey said property to such parish; Now, therefore, it is

Resolved:

(1) Upon the consent of the Bishop and a majority of the Standing Committee of this Diocese, that the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties of the Diocese of Newark be and they hereby are authorized

(a) To convey to the Board of Missions and Church Extension of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark, New Jersey, any property held by said Trustees for or for the use of a mission, or which was acquired for the purpose of establishing a mission or for church extension, and

(b) With respect to any such property which was held for or for the use of a mission or for the purpose of establishing a mission which has or may hereafter become a parish, to convey the same directly to said parish.

(2) Upon the consent of the Bishop and a majority of the Standing Committee of this Diocese, that the Board of Missions and Church Extension of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark, New Jersey, be and it hereby is authorized to convey to the parish any property now or hereafter held for or for the use of a mission which has or may hereafter become such parish.

(3) The Bishop and each member of the Standing Committee be and he hereby is authorized to consent to any conveyance of property hereinabove authorized whenever he deems such transfer desirable and appropriate.

(4) All such conveyances heretofore made by the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties of the Diocese of Newark, or by the Board of Missions and Church Extension of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark, New Jersey, with the consent of the Bishop and a majority of the Standing Committee, are hereby ratified and confirmed.

It was moved, seconded and unanimously carried that the above resolution be and is hereby adopted.

The Reverend Arthur Dumper, D.D., offered the following resolution, and moved its unanimous adoption, seconded and carried by a rising vote:—

"WHEREAS, Mr. Albert H. Baldwin has completed twenty-five years of service as Treasurer of the Convention, be it hereby

Resolved, That this Convention record its consciousness of our good fortune in having had so able and devoted a treasurer and its great gratitude to him for the faithfulness with which he has discharged the heavy responsibilities of his office."

The Chairman of the Committee on Constitutions and Canons reported that his Committee had no report to the Convention.

The Secretary of the Standing Committee, the Reverend Harold G. Willis, presented the following report of the Standing Committee by title:—

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR 1942.

Seven meetings of the Standing Committee were held during 1942:

February 2, 1942:

For purposes of record the Secretary reported the following:

January 9, 1942—Consent given to the Board of Missions and Church Extension to mortgage property of the Church of the Advent, Bloomfield to August Van Dessel for the sum of \$1,250. for a period of five years with interest not exceeding 5%.

January 27, 1942—Consent given the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties to convey to the Board of Missions and Church Extension property of St. Alban's Mission, Newark for no money consideration.

January 30, 1942—Consent given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of All Saints' Church, Orange to execute and deliver a corrective deed to Mary Arnott in the conveyance of certain premises deeded to her by said Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen on October 1, 1920.

Marvin Hess Kelley was recommended to the Bishop for Admission as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

Consent given the Board of Missions and Church Extension to sell property known as St. Alban's Church, Newark to Polish Evangelical Church, Incorporated.

Consent given the Board of Missions and Church Extension, to sell a portion of the property known as St. John's Church, Englewood to Ercole Tambarelli for the sum of \$1,700.

Approval was given to expenditures from the Jesse Williams Fund in the amount of \$4,833.32, none of the parishes or missions having rented pews; the Hannibal Goodwin Fund in the amount of \$1,378.43 the objects being considered pious and charitable works; and the Church Aid Society in the amount of \$167.92 for assisting students.

March 23, 1942:

For purposes of record the Secretary reported the following:

March 12, 1942—Consent given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Matthew's Protestant Episcopal Church in Jersey City to mortgage a portion of the property known as St. Matthew's Church, Jersey City to The Bayview Cemetery Association for the sum of \$8,000. for a period of five years with interest at not exceeding 4% payable quarterly together with an installment of at least \$125. on account of principal.

Consent given to the Ordination and Consecration of the Very Rev'd James Pernette DeWolfe, D.D. to be Bishop of the Diocese of Long Island.

Consent given to the Ordination and Consecration of the Rev'd James Moss Stoney to be Bishop of the Missionary District of New Mexico.

Consent given to the Election of the Rt. Rev'd Norman Spencer Binsted, D.D. to be Bishop of the Missionary District of the Philippine Islands.

Consent given to the Ordination and Consecration of the Rev'd William Fisher Lewis to be Bishop of the Missionary District of Nevada.

Consent given to the Ordination and Consecration of the Very Rev'd Frank Archibald Rhea to be Bishop of the Missionary District of Idaho.

The Committee recommended to the vestry of St. Agnes' Church, East Orange that it consolidate its existing indebtedness by giving a note in the amount of \$3,800 to Robert W. Thompson, said note to become payable in not less than ninety days after demand and to be non-transferable except with the consent of the Standing Committee.

John Bowen Coburn was recommended to the Bishop for Admission as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

Consent rescinded which was given by the Standing Committee at its meeting on February 2, 1942 to the Board of Missions and Church Extension to sell property known as St. Alban's Church, Newark to the Polish Evangelical Church, Incorporated.

Consent given the Board of Missions and Church Extension to sell property known as St. Alban's Church and rectory, Newark to the Polish Full Gospel Church of Newark, New Jersey.

Consent given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. John's, Passaic to convey certain property thus confirming the Consent previously given by the Standing Committee at its meeting on July 2, 1906 to St. John's Church.

May 18, 1942:

For purposes of record the Secretary reported the following:

April 13, 1942—The Standing Committee ratified, approved, and confirmed a certain deed dated September 5, 1906 from the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. John's Church in Passaic to Thomas C. Prehn and further, authorized the conveyance by the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen to Reuben E. Kipp and Bessie Bogart Kipp of the right to extend their existing dwelling house.

April 20, 1942—Consent given the Board of Missions and Church Extension to mortgage certain property occupied by the Church of the Redeemer, Palisades Park to the American Church Building Fund Commission for the sum of \$3,650 for ten years with interest at 4%.

This being the annual meeting the Rev'd Arthur Dumper, D.D., and the Rev'd Harold G. Willis were nominated and on motion, seconded and carried, unanimously elected President and Secretary respectively for the ensuing year.

The Rev'd Knud A. Larsen was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Priesthood, the term of his diaconate being shortened to six months.

Paul Leon Abry was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate.

Elmer DeWitt Fauquier Francis was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate.

Consent given to the Council of the Diocese of Virginia to proceed with the election of a suffragan bishop.

Consent given the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties to sell property known as No. 378 Fifteenth Avenue and 272 Camden Street, Newark for \$8,000. to Antonia Porreca.

Consent given the Board of Missions and Church Extension to mortgage property on Park Avenue, Verona to The American Church Building Fund Commission for a sum not to exceed \$2,645. for the term of ten years with interest at not exceeding 4%.

Consent given the Board of Missions and Church Extension to mortgage property known as 403-79th Street, North Bergen to The American Church Building Fund Commission for \$3,750. for the term of ten years with interest at not exceeding 4%.

Consent given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Peter's Church, Essex Falls to mortgage the property it proposes to purchase known as the Sylvester property together with property now occupied by the parish house and rectory to the Montclair Savings Bank for the sum of \$14,600. for the term of twenty years with interest at not exceeding 4½%, with the understanding that the church and the property immediately surrounding are excluded.

Approval was given to expenditures from the Jesse Williams Fund in the amount of \$2,562.17, none of the parishes or missions aided having rented pews; the Hannibal Goodwin Fund in the amount of \$810.00, the objects being considered pious and charitable works; and the Church Aid Society in the amount of \$68.80 for assisting students.

June 1, 1942:

Leonard Frend Thornton, Jr. was recommended to the Bishop for Admission as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

Consent given to the Ordination and Consecration of the Rev'd John Moore Walker, D.D. to be Bishop of Atlanta.

Consent given to the Ordination and Consecration of the Rev'd Oliver James Hart, D.D. to be Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Pennsylvania.

Consent given the Board of Missions and Church Extension to mortgage certain property on Hillview Avenue, Morris Plains to The American Church Building Fund Commission for the sum of \$18,000 for ten years with interest at not exceeding 4%.

Consent given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Grace Church, Orange to mortgage property at 82 Woodland Avenue, East Orange to the Half Dime Savings Bank, Orange for \$6,000. for one year at 4%, with the understanding that the mortgage may be continued from year to year as long as amortization payments of \$500 a year are carried on.

The matter was brought up of the proposed lease between Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Christ Church, Newark and Mr. Imposimato owning the property adjacent on the north on Prospect Street. A proposed lease will be submitted to Christ Church and Mr. Imposimato, which if satisfactory will then be submitted to the Standing Committee.

June 22, 1942:

Consent given to the Ordination and Consecration of the Rev'd Herman R. Page to be Bishop of Northern Michigan.

Consent given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Paul's Church, Paterson to sell property at 171 Fair Street, Paterson to Ernest Walther for the sum of \$2,500. The Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Paul's Church have a five-sixths interest in the property.

Consent given the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Calvary Church, Summit to convey property on Pine Grove Avenue, Summit to Russell Silvers for the sum of \$1.00 and other valuable considerations.

Consent given the Board of Missions and Church Extension to mortgage the Church property on East Orchard Street, Allendale to the First National Bank of Allendale, for the sum of \$1,800. for the term of ten years with interest at not exceeding 4½%.

September 10, 1942:

Consent given the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties to convey property on Maple Avenue, Madison to F. Taylor Jones and Florence H. Jones, his wife, for the sum of \$7,500.

Mr. Henry J. Russell, Secretary of the Board of Missions and Church Extension, read the following report of this Board:—

May 11, 1943.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark, N. J.:

The Board of Missions and Church Extension held eight meetings during the calendar year, 1942. Between meetings many committees gave time and service to various needs. Due to their invaluable interest we have been able to sell certain properties at fair prices, likewise we have acquired needed properties at decided bargain prices.

One of our most important committees is the one known as the Mortgage and Real Estate Committee. This Committee has had conferences with Executive Committees of many Missions. By counsel and advice has encouraged the congregation to greater effort, especially in the matter of meeting and paying debts. With the result that now a large number of our Missions are repaying, by installments, loans borrowed from the Extension Fund. One of the Outstanding accomplishments of this Committee had to do with the problems of certain very burdensome mortgages. Through negotiations they have been able to effect very substantial reductions from the principal sums due. These old mortgages were then satisfied and paid off. In re-financing the new mortgages made, run ten years at 4% interest. The principal sum to be amortised by equal quarters annual installments.

Meeting, January 15, 1942:

Report was received that we had entered into a contract to purchase for St. Andrew's Mission the property on the corner of Sherman and Tulip Streets, Passaic, New Jersey, for \$3,800.00, on terms, cash \$800, mortgage \$3,000.00 @ 5%.

St. John's, South Englewood.

It was ordered that we sell an irregular piece of ground next to the Church to Ercole Tamburelli for \$1,700.00.

Ascension, Bogota.

This place in the past borrowed from the Loaning Fund \$2,000.00 and also \$4,000.00 to help finance their extension building project. In view of the splendid record of this congregation in meeting its responsibilities during this extended depression period, it was voted that we cancel the \$4,000.00 debt. The Congregation has agreed to repay the \$2,000.00 debt by \$25.00 or \$50.00 installments annually.

Transfiguration, Woodcliff.

The Mortgage and Real Estate Committee reported that after much negotiation it had been able to compromise the mortgage indebtedness on the Church property. The total amount due was \$15,200.00. By paying \$8,200.00 in cash the whole claim was canceled. The matter was financed by a gift of \$1,200.00 from the Extension Fund and a loan of \$7,000.00 on mortgage from The American Church Building Fund Commission.

*Meeting, March 18, 1942:**St. Alban's, Newark.*

Contract to sell this property was entered into with the Polish Full Gospel Church of Newark, N. J. on the following terms, Sale Price \$16,000.00, Cash \$5,000.00, balance \$11,000.00, ten year mortgage at 4%. Principal to be amortized at the rate of \$150.00 quarterly.

St. Aidan's, Paterson.

The mortgage \$2,000.00 was overdue and payment demanded. It was paid off, being financed by a gift of \$1,000.00 from the Church Extension Fund and a loan of \$1,000.00 at 4% from the Loaning Fund.

Redeemer, Palisades Park.

The mortgage of \$3,850.00 was called for payment. It was paid off. The financing was on the following plan:

Holy Spirit, Verona.

The mortgage on the Vicarage was in the sum of \$3,645.00 at 5%. It was deemed wise to pay off the mortgage and refinance in the following manner:

Advent, Brookdale.

Recommendation was made by our Committee that certain outstanding debts and also costs of needed repairs be consolidated. A sum totalling \$1,800.00, and that we borrow this sum from the First National Bank of Allendale, N. J., on mortgage at 4½%, time ten years. It was so ordered.

St. Bartholomew's, Ho-Ho-Kus.

A committee was appointed with power to aid and assist this Parish in acquiring a Rectory.

Meeting, September 17, 1942:

A report was made by the special Committee appointed for St. Bartholomew's that they had found splendid dwelling convenient to the Church, in every way suitable for use as a Rectory and acceptable to the Parish at a cost of \$6,250.00. To help this Parish finance the purchase, the Board recommended to the Bishop that a loan of \$1,000.00 be made from the Lending Fund at 5% interest for five years.

On the afternoon of October 8th, the members met at St. Peter's Church, Rochelle Park. From there they proceeded on a trip to view and survey a section known as Warren Point, a territory which lies between Rochelle Park and Paterson, for the purpose of determining our responsibility to this fast growing community. Afterward the members returned to St. Peter's for its Board meeting, during which considerable discussion was given to the aforesaid survey. It was the unanimous feeling that we develop a more intensive work in this neighborhood than heretofore.

A committee was then appointed with full power to either rent or purchase a suitable place in which to hold Church Services.

*Meeting, November 12, 1942:**Warren Point.*

Report was made by the Church Building Committee appointed at the previous meeting, that there were no buildings available for our needs. It was then moved and carried that we purchase some land and erect thereon a portable Chapel, at a total cost of not to exceed \$5,000.00. The Committee was continued with power.

At the hour of noon prayers were said by the Bishop.

The following report of the Special Committee to consider recruiting for the ministry was presented by the Chairman, and upon presentation was ordered received and incorporated in the Convention Journal:—

REPORT OF A SPECIAL COMMITTEE TO CONSIDER RECRUITING FOR THE MINISTRY.

Your committee finds two aspects of the problem presented in the resolution calling for the appointment of a committee to consider recruiting for the ministry.

First, we are to ascertain and report on the status of pre-theological students. The government authorities have ruled as follows:

"A registrant who is pursuing a course of academic study in a recognized university or college as a prerequisite to entering a recognized theological or divinity school cannot be easily distinguished from other students pursuing academic studies. For this reason, it is advisable in considering the occupational classification of such a registrant that there should be required two certificates, one certificate from a recognized theological or divinity school to the effect that upon the registrant's successful completion of his prerequisite academic studies he will be accepted and enrolled in the theological or divinity school, and the other from a recognized church, religious sect, or religious organization to the effect that the registrant is pursuing his prerequisite academic studies in a recognized university or college under the direction and supervision of such recognized church, religious sect, or religious organization."

It would appear that nothing further need or can be said on this aspect. Each case will be adjudicated by the local draft board. We recommend, however, a wise and restrained approach to any draft board at which the parish priest might well be present. It is the consensus of your committee that a warrantable case may apply for classification under this regulation, but that we should also be aware of an apparent tendency in some quarters for young men to cloak conscientious objection under a theological education. We express no opinion about conscientious objection but we feel that such objectors

should make a straight forward avowal of their principles. It appeared to be the opinion of some of your committee that the boy who eventually goes into the ministry might make a better pastor if he has not been deprived of the experience and test of character to which others of his generation have been subjected. He will then speak the language of his contemporaries who have had the war experience, and so be better equipped to be friend, counselor, and guide to those who return from the war. It is also likely that many young men would refuse deferment on the ground of desiring to take part in the struggles which in our times have come upon us. We hope that the war will not be so prolonged as to cause irreparable injury to our Seminaries and to a constant supply of suitable candidates for Holy Orders. One of our members expressed the opinion that the end of the war will produce a goodly number of men who, having seen the worst, will wish to dedicate their lives to the best as that is taught by and enforced in the Christian Church.

The second aspect, implied at least in the resolution, is that of interesting young men in aspiring toward Holy Orders. This becomes increasingly difficult with the drafting of 18 year olds. We recommend that when it is feasible, the Diocese sponsor a quiet day for High School students who seem to be interested. This might well be integrated into their vocational guidance as already projected in their High Schools. Several of our parishes combined about a year ago in an area meeting of this kind with much profit. We recommend it to parish priests. It might be well also to have representatives speak to our Sunday Schools on the Church Army, the Order of Deaconesses, and on the Religious Orders of our Church in order to open other spheres of vocation as a possibility. It would appear that Parish Priests might find now and then some older men, in business or professional life, who, by example and service, have shown vocation and who might after special training, be presented for Holy Orders. This, wisely handled and under the direction of the Ordinary, would assist in reducing the shortage of clergy now threatened.

Your committee feels that plans for interesting candidates for the ministry amongst High School students might well be referred to the Department of Religious Education.

The Reverend Lane Barton, Chairman of the Special Committee on Approaches to Unity, made a verbal report stating that two meetings of this Committee had been held during the Convention year, and the Committee contacted by mail on two occasions, and that a conference of the Clergy of the Diocese had been held at which time the Very Reverend Alexander C. Zabriskie, Dean of Virginia Theological Seminary led a discussion on 'Basic Principles proposed for the union of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. and the Protestant Episcopal Church in the U. S. A. together with suggested cooperative arrangements.'

The Reverend Ross H. Flanagan, Chairman of the Special Committee for Conscientious Objectors, presented the following report:—

"Inasmuch as there has been no call upon this Committee for its services during the past year, the Chairman did not deem it necessary to call any meetings. He further asks that because there does not seem to be any need for such a committee at present, this Committee be discharged."

Members of the Convention speaking to the question of discharging this Committee expressed the opinion that the Committee should be continued in case their good offices should be needed. It was thereupon moved, seconded and carried that the Committee be continued.

At this time the Suffragan Bishop was called upon to state the plans made for the annual Laymen's Conference of the Diocese. He reported that this year the Conference would be held in Newark, and would be for one day. The time set being Trinity Sunday, June 20th, when a service at eleven o'clock will be held in Trinity Cathedral, the preacher being the Presiding Bishop, the Right Reverend Henry St. George Tucker, D.D., followed by luncheon, afternoon session, supper and evening session in the Diocesan House.

The Chair appointed the following to serve on the Board of Religious Education: Class of 1944, The Reverend Charles R. Allen and the Reverend Bernis D. Brien; Class of 1946, The Reverend John C. Moore, the Reverend George E. Rath and the Reverend Allan Whatley.

The Reverend William L. Griffin presented the following resolution, seconded and carried:—

"Resolved, That the Secretary of the Convention be authorized and hereby instructed to make known to any member of the Convention upon request at any time the nominations already made for place on the ballot of the Convention."

Before the vote was taken the Reverend Louis H. Berry requested that his name be withdrawn. The same was agreed to by the nominator.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Secretary cast one ballot in the Clerical Order for the election of the above named as Supplementary Deputies to the Provincial Synod.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Secretary cast one ballot in the Lay Order for the election of the above named as Supplementary Deputies to the Provincial Synod.

There were no nominations offered for Supplementary Deputies in the Lay Order.

The Chairman of the Diocesan Army and Navy Commission having distributed a printed report of the Commission made verbal comments on the report, and called on the Lieutenant Reverend Revere Beasley, Chaplain U. S. Army, to speak to the Convention. Report follows:—

THE REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN ARMY AND NAVY COMMISSION TO THE 69TH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK.

The Army and Navy Commission began its work as the Defense Service Committee under the Board of Christian Social Service. As soon as our country began its Defense Program the Board realized that the Church would face a definite problem of bringing its ministrations to newly created and concentrated areas of population, civilian and military. Immediately following the declaration of war, the Committee's main concern became the maintaining of a good contact with our men and women in the service. The Defense Committee was then appointed the Diocesan Army and Navy Commission.

Our first task was to compile as complete and accurate a list as possible of all the men and women of our Diocese who were in the armed forces. Letters have been sent at regular intervals to our parishes and missions to establish and maintain two master lists. One of these is kept at the Diocesan House and the other at the office of the Chairman of the Commission, St. Peter's Church, Essex Fells. Both of these lists are available to any of the clergy in the Diocese at any time. This was used by the Bishop to send Christmas Greetings to our service men.

The Commission has assisted many parishes in locating boys who for one reason or another failed to keep their parents or relatives informed of their whereabouts. It has also been able to relieve the mental strain of relatives of servicemen who have been hospitalized, by getting direct reports from Chaplains and doctors. Rather interestingly this service has extended beyond the borders of our country as we have been fortunate in getting information through from some of our outlying posts.

The Commission has been able to work with the Chaplains or in some instances with the Commanding Officers, to have maladjusted men receive special attention. A number of servicemen, particularly those who were drafted, find it difficult to adjust themselves to military life. Some of these men become dangerously melancholy or defiantly insubordinate. Many of these cases have been cleared satisfactorily through the Commission.

The Commission receives "contact cards" from the clergy and commissions of other dioceses. These are turned over to the clergymen in charge of the parishes or missions situated nearest to the locations of these men and their reports are made to the inquiring parties. Later on the Commission may be called upon to establish civilian chaplains to serve units in which a large number of Episcopalians are billeted.

Reply cards have been mailed to all the clergy to be used by them in reporting casualties. As soon as these are received by the Commission, they are turned over to Bishop Washburn so that he may write to the nearest relative, and then suitable notations are made on the two master lists. This service has been tremendously helpful to our families who are called upon to bear the real sufferings of war.

It is recognized that as the war progresses the clergy will be called upon more and more to guide and direct parents and other relatives in arranging military funerals, obtaining government compensation, grave markers, etc. The Commission has made a request for copies of an official bulletin published by the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars which gives complete and detailed information about these matters. As soon as these are received they will be mailed to the clergy.

The Commission now plans to extend its work to conform to the standard set by the National Army and Navy Commission. We have set up and will place in operation very shortly a system of informing the Chaplains of all those from our Diocese who are

located at their ships or stations. This of course will require us to call upon the clergy for additional information from the people of their parishes and the more rapid transmission of the same. (The reason this phase of the work has not been carried on extensively, and may prove difficult to accomplish, is that the location of Chaplains is a military secret and direct communication, in most cases, is next to impossible.)

It has been suggested by many of the clergy that it would be very helpful if we should set up a center of information to which they might turn for ideas and suggestions in assisting them with their parish servicemen's program. It was decided that the best way to do this was to make use of the Women's Auxiliary District system. Clergymen in each district will be responsible for gathering and transmitting this information to the Commission. As soon as sufficient material is on hand, an exhibit will be maintained in the Diocesan House or elsewhere of prayer leaflets, books for the men in the service, pictures of prayer corners and shrines, samples of service flags, honor rolls, etc. together with the information as to where they may be purchased and at what cost.

The Commission supplies free of charge to all parishes and missions within the Diocese:

1. War Crosses (which are authorized to be worn along with the government Identification Tag.)
2. Identification cards
3. Army and Navy Prayer Books
4. Casualty cards.

There still seems to be confusion in the minds of some of the clergy regarding these supplies. Please note that they may be obtained without charge by sending a written request for them to the Chairman of the Diocesan Commission.

We shall continue as in the past to supply Chaplains as speakers when possible. It is more difficult now than before to obtain speakers from the Army and Navy because there has been a definite change in policy regarding Chaplains making public appearances. Before the declaration of war and just immediately after the Chaplains were encouraged to go out among the public as much as possible and by these speaking tours familiarize our people with life in the military and naval forces. Apparently to safeguard military information, the Chaplains Corps has discouraged this and it is not easy any longer to get a Chaplain as a speaker. However, we suggest that you still continue making your requests as heretofore, giving us if possible a little longer advanced notice and we shall continue to provide Chaplains whenever possible.

The Commission's task is only to supplement the work of the individual parish and cannot maintain a personal contact with everyone in the service. Nothing the Commission does can take the place of the personal relationship that each clergyman and his parish should make and maintain with its own parishioners. It is earnestly urged that every parish and mission do its utmost to have a most energetic and helpful War Service Program. The Commission is ready to assist and advise in the establishment of these programs whenever called upon to do so.

Finally, the effectiveness of the work of the Commission depends upon the willing and continuing support of the clergy and the Commission wishes to express to the Rectors and Vicars its sincere thanks and appreciation for their ready and loyal cooperation in the past and to assure them that it is confident of even greater interest and assistance in the future.

NOTES ON THE 1944 BUDGETS.

II.

BUDGET OF ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSES.

1. Convention luncheon; printing, including Convention Journal and Convention ballots.
2. Janitor services, fuel, water, light, insurance, telephone, repairs, printing and stationery, etc.
3. Nominal salary of Secretary of Convention, and stipends of workers at the Diocesan House.
4. The Treasurer of the Convention receives no salary. This item is for charges of the bank as custodian of trust funds.
5. Salaries of Bishop and Suffragan Bishop; pension premiums, motor allowances, insurance, taxes on Bishops' houses; office secretarial assistance, stationery.
6. Salary of bookkeeper, printing, postage, stationery for the office of the Treasurer of the Finance and Advisory Board.
7. Newark's share, based on number of clergy, for expense of office of Presiding Bishop.
8. It has been the custom to defray in part expenses of deputies to General Convention. If an appropriation is made each year, a sufficient amount will accumulate during the three year period between Conventions.
9. The Provincial Synod levies on each Diocese an annual assessment based on the number of clergymen canonically resident therein.

IV.

BUDGET FOR THE PROGRAM OF THE DIOCESE AND NATIONAL COUNCIL.
(A) MISSIONARY WORK.

1. The following 58 parishes and missions are at the present time aided from this appropriation in varied ways. Grants on account of salary are in some cases nominal. Where a vicar has charge of more than one mission station there is an allowance for automobile maintenance. At some stations where there are no rectories, houses are rented for the vicars.

The salary of the Ven. W. O. Leslie, Jr., Canon Missioner of the Diocese, and about \$350. per year for taxes on property owned by the Board of Missions which is not occupied or used for Church purposes, are also included in this item. The item for insurance includes public liability and compensation insurance, also insurance on automobiles owned by the Diocese and used in missionary work. The total amount \$62,300. is an increase of \$4,650. over our working budget for 1943. This will provide more nearly adequate stipends and motor allowances for some of the missionaries.

2. Salaries of three Chaplains of the Newark City Mission; pension premiums and small expense funds for the Chaplains, to assist in upkeep of their automobiles, etc.
3. Some years ago the Convention adopted as a proper minimum stipend for unmarried clergy \$1,800. and for married clergy \$2,100. and house. To help in meeting this minimum salary grants have in 1943 been made to nine clergy. An increase of \$800. is asked for 1944. Although in most cases the responsibility to meet the minimum must rest with the local congregation; certain urgent situations cannot be met without diocesan aid. It is for these that the increase of \$800. is asked.

(B) BENEVOLENT AND CHARITABLE WORK.

1. Bonnie Brae Farm received \$6,000. in 1931. In 1943 the grant from the Diocesan Budget is \$750. The title to the Farm is in the Board of Social Service of the Diocese of Newark and this outstanding piece of diocesan work deserves much greater support from the Diocese than it receives. The year round population is about 85 and in addition over 600 boys were given summer vacations at the Bonnie Brae Camp during the summer.
2. The Church Mission of Help in 1931 received \$6,000. In 1943 the appropriation is \$3,300. The future development of C. M. H. is dependent upon the work receiving proper financial support.
3. A home for unmarried mothers in Jersey City which cares annually for about 12 girls and their babies. The Diocesan appropriation is supplemented by income from a small endowment and gifts of interested friends.
4. A home for aged and convalescent women. Repairs, insurance and overhead expenses are cared for by this appropriation.

(C) EDUCATIONAL AND WELFARE WORK.

1. This covers salary of caretaker, taxes, insurance, repairs, replacements.
2. Stipend of Field Secretary for Religious Education. Expenses of promoting summer and Young People's Conferences; teacher's meetings, office supplies, etc.
3. An adequate diocesan paper requires a larger appropriation than the present one of \$750.
4. This sum is far less than is actually needed for promotional work.

(D) FOR THE CHURCH AT LARGE.

In 1943 we have pledged to the National Council the sum of \$37,500. We ought to be giving at least \$45,000. and it is hoped that we may do so in 1944.

The following report of the Field Department was presented by the Secretary the Reverend Robert J. Sudlow:—

**REPORT OF THE FIELD DEPARTMENT TO DIOCESAN CONVENTION,
MAY, 1943.**

Compulsions of the times may change our manner of doing things, but, so far as the Church is concerned, the things themselves must be done whatever method we may use to bring them about. The pastoral work, healing, evangelism and sacraments of the Church must go on, the more difficult the times the more imperative are the needs. Last year we had a two day conference for the laymen at Holiday House. It was most successful and well attended. We would like again this year to do the same thing, but find that we must change our method.

There will be a laymen's conference this year, but it will be held for one day only, and instead of being held at Holiday House it will be held at the Diocesan House in Newark on Trinity Sunday, June 20th. It will open with a service in the Cathedral at 11 o'clock

and our Presiding Bishop will be the preacher. The service will be followed by lunch after which there will be a series of talks and discussions on "The Layman's Responsibility for a New World", "Christian Principles for Today", "The World-Wide Responsibility of the Christian Layman" and "The Layman Serves His Community". This will be followed by supper, a talk by Bishop Ludlow on the "Organization and Work of General Convention," remarks by Bishop Washburn and adjournment at 9:00 P. M. This will make a full day, but the recesses and discussion periods will afford opportunity for sociability and fellowship. This is not the way the Field Department preferred to have the Conference, but the difficulties of transportation and the long work-week made the shortened programme advisable.

No mention of the Every Member Canvass and the financial needs of the Church will be brought before the June Laymen's Conference. It will therefore be not only advisable but imperative that we have a conference in the Fall on the technique and materials for the Every Member Canvass. Information is already available that there will be a National Drive for \$125,000,000 between October 1st. and November 20th., this in addition to Community Chest Drives. Add this fact to the increased taxes and we have all the argument we need for a thorough Every Member Canvass in every Parish and Mission in the Diocese. Having this in mind, the last meeting of the Field Department recommended that, inasmuch as every Mission and Aided Parish in the Diocese believes in the necessity for and value of the Every Member Canvass, preparations be made early in the summer for a thorough canvass in the fall, and that such Missions and Aided Parishes, especially those who feel that previous canvasses were not what they should have been, make use of the members and materials of the Field Department. It cannot be too often repeated that the Field Department wants to help wherever it can not only to raise Diocesan Quotas but also Parish Budgets.

Members of the Department are working on a pictorial folder and the Handbook. We also hope to have some slides available for your use before you begin your canvass. Every member of the Department is a faithful and loyal worker, regular in attendance on meetings and assiduous in labor. The aids that are gotten to you are the result of sacrificial work and time, done with the hope and prayer that it might extend the Kingdom and make your task easier.

During the past year the Department sent out a questionnaire to all of the Parishes and Missions. There was a return of about 50%. We wish to thank those who made reply. The analysis of these questionnaires was very interesting. It showed that, with the exception of a few cases, a better result was had in those parishes and missions which had an Every Member Canvass and that the results were best in those places where Diocesan and General Church Field Department materials were used. In the exceptions there were contributing causes militating against better results. We say that the analysis of the questionnaires was interesting. Anything that confirms the opinion of the one holding it is always interesting. On the other hand, we might say that the results were so prosaic as to be almost painful.

Just a word about the efforts of the Promotion Department of the National Church: Materials similar to those of last year will be available to you. Plans are being made to provide speakers for District meetings in the Diocese where Ambassadors of the Presiding Bishop will bring a report of the General Convention shortly after the closing of the Sessions. Helps will be available in the event that you will want to have a Community Every Member Canvass, with the churches of your community united in the effort. The Department has tried to keep all channels open for the Church's financial drives following the date of November 20th.

What does this all add up to for the Fall? You will be short handed because of men in the Nation's Services and long working hours. You will be handicapped by lack of gasoline. There will be less money available than you will wish because of increased cost of living and heavier taxes. There will be the additional hurdle of the \$125,000,000 drive, plus the Community Chest. The cost of repairs and upkeep to your own Parish

will be higher. The National Church and Diocese will require more. In addition to this there will be British Missions and Army and Navy Commission. The Clergy will have greater demands upon their time by reason of increased casualty lists and more of their boys and girls in the service and additional community tasks. This list is almost appalling, yet any intelligent approach to the work of the coming year must take it into consideration. They are not there to fill us with a sense of futility and rob us of our energy. They are there to challenge us, and once the Church has recognised a challenge it has never failed to meet it in the power of Christ.

The Field Department recommends, first, an adequate year's programme for your Church; it goes without saying that without this a good every member canvass cannot be had. Secondly, send your men to the laymen's conference on June 20th. even if it is Trinity Sunday and you would like to have them at service in their own Church. Thirdly, start making your preparations for the Fall Canvass now. Fourth, make sure that your canvass Chairman, Treasurer and perhaps one or two others attend the Fall Conference. Fifth, plan your canvass so as to make full use of all of the helps available, the evidence is overwhelming that this pays dividends. Sixth, make sure that the Every Member Canvass is thorough however simple you choose to make it. Seventh, reach every member of the Parish with your programme and appeal. Finally pray; this is a job which is going to take our hearts as well as our hands.

There is a Man on the Cross and it is going to take every black, brown, yellow, red and white hand in the world to get Him down.

It may be of interest to the members of this Convention to know that at the present time there are 55 beneficiaries of the Church Pension and allied Funds in this Diocese. This number is 2 more than the number reported to the 1942 Convention. This total is made up as follows: Clergy receiving age benefits, 13; Clergy receiving total and permanent disability benefits, 1; widows, 38; orphans, 3.

Under date of April 15, 1943, Mr. Bradford B. Locke, the Executive Vice-President of the Church Pension Fund, sent your Diocesan Chairman certain interesting data. We quote certain extracts from his letter as follows:

"The present total of the roll of beneficiaries amounts to almost \$1,400,000. a year, which is about 35 per cent in excess of what the total would have been if the Trustees had not been able to expand the benefits beyond the original promises of the plan." "The present market value of its investments is substantially in excess of their cost and their book value."

"So far as the pension assessments are concerned, the record continues to be extraordinary. They are running at the rate of over \$1,000,000 a year and the current arrears are lower than they have ever been in the history of the Fund." "The present assets of the Church Pension Fund amount to approximately \$36,000,000. They exceed the total liabilities by what is considered to be a safe margin."

"The Church Pension Fund has three wholly-owned subsidiaries, namely The Church Hymnal Corporation, the Church Life Insurance Corporation and the Church Properties Fire Insurance Corporation, all of which are in excellent financial condition and performing a useful function for the Church, as well as being profitable investments for the Church Pension Fund."

As far as our own Diocese of Newark is concerned, the Convention may indeed be happy that our record of payments is such a good one. Your Committee would urge all members of the Convention who may be in positions of responsibility in our parishes and missions to see that the matter of remitting pension payments is cared for promptly in order that all of our clergy may obtain as full protection as possible under the rules of the Pension Fund.

ELEVENTH ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE BISHOP OF NEWARK.

My Brethren of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of Newark:

In accordance with long custom we remember at our Diocesan Convention certain loyal servants of Christ and His Church who in the past year have entered into Paradise. Among them are five Bishops of the Church:

Peter Trimble Rowe, D.D., forty-six years the heroic Bishop of Alaska, unsparing of himself in his truly apostolic care of his scattered flock;

Samuel Gavitt Babcock, D.D., a faithful suffragan to three successive Bishops of Massachusetts;

William Mercer Green, D.D., Bishop of Mississippi, a careful student of the problems of the rural Church;

William Theodotus Capers, D.D., Bishop of West Texas, a Christian gentleman whose family has given distinguished service to Church and state;

Frederick Foote Johnson, retired Bishop of Missouri, previously the Bishop of South Dakota, a humble, courageous, and conscientious servant of God and man.

Of our own diocesan clergy three have finished their course in faith:

Edgar Leon Cook had served his entire ministry among us. Previously in our mission stations at Hamburg, Vernon, and Bergenfield, he was rector of St. Paul's Church, Jersey City before becoming rector of Christ Church, Hackensack, which post he held at the time of his death. His ministry will be gratefully remembered among us.

William N. Harper, for seventeen years vicar of the Church of the Incarnation, Jersey City was a devoted pastor outstanding for his Christ-like courage and humility.

John Oliver Ferris had retired from the active ministry some years before his death. Among his cures were Christ Church, St. Paul's Church, and the now extinct St. Matthew's German Church, all in Newark, and the Church of the Good Shepherd, Ringwood. After his retirement, he graciously responded to many calls for occasional ministrations in our vacant parishes.

It is never possible to include in my address the names of all our devoted lay people by whose lives of service the Church has been blessed. Some few may be mentioned who held conspicuous official position in their several parishes and missions.

One of these is Walter Kidde, warden of St. Luke's Church, Montclair. He had held numerous positions of honor and trust in community and state. Few laymen of large business responsibilities have so generously given of

their time to the Church's work, sometimes in quiet ways known only to their bishops. He had been a deputy to General Convention, Vice-President of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, a member of the National Council. The Church has reason to be grateful for his life of service.

Others who held diocesan office are J. Lawrence Boggs, Grace Church, Newark; Ernest H. Bickell, Grace Church, Nutley; Charles D. M. Cole, Church of the Redeemer, Morristown; Carleton Greene, Church of the Holy Communion, South Orange; Burton LeR. Hare, St. James' Church, Newark; G. J. Oltmanns, Holy Trinity, West Orange; G. Tracy Vought, St. Luke's Church, Montclair; and J. Clifford Woodhull, Calvary Church, Summit.

The following were vestrymen or wardens of their respective parishes: Theodore Aldendorff, Trinity, Irvington; Eugene A. Carrell, St. Peter's, Morristown; Eugene E. Cook, Holy Trinity, West Orange; C. Frank Cowley, Holy Spirit, Verona; George Haring, Christ, Hackensack; William E. Hayward, Grace, Newark; Harry S. Hoag, St. Mary Magdalene's, Newark; Charles T. Johnson, St. Peter's, Rochelle Park; Howe S. Landers, Christ, Bloomfield and Glen Ridge; Harry Stockton, St. Thomas', Lyndhurst; George O. Thomas, All Saints', Glen Rock; Irving B. Whiting, St. George's, Passaic.

Two organists and choir-masters of uncommon ability are remembered: James E. Corneille of St. Paul's, Englewood and Paul W. Sclorff of Trinity, Hoboken.

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese was saddened by the death of Mrs. Louise E. Kendall Hutchison, its able president from 1931 to 1937, who not only maintained but advanced the tradition of high accomplishment by those holding that important office.

Miss Minnie Molloy served for many years as the gracious hostess at the Girls' Friendly Holiday House in Delaware.

Other Church-women for whom we give thanks are Mrs. Aubrey H. Derby, the wife of one of our clergymen; Mrs. T. P. Prout, Calvary, Summit; Miss Mary Lillian Day, All Saints', Orange, a former staff-member of the Church Mission of Help; Miss Helen L. Tenney, St. Luke's, Montclair, superintendent of nurses at Christ Hospital, Jersey City; Mrs. Walter Brooks, St. James', Ridgefield; Mrs. Dwight Beebe, St. Paul's, Englewood, a trustee of St. Katharine's Home; and Mrs. William R. Crosson, Trinity Cathedral, treasurer of the Diocesan Girls' Friendly Society.

May God give them eternal rest, and let light perpetual shine upon them!

The tenth anniversary of my consecration occurred last October. In accordance with the action of the last Diocesan Convention it was commemorated by a Service of Holy Communion here in the Cathedral fol-

lowed by a luncheon of the clergy. I mention it this morning in order to voice my appreciation of the all too generous expressions of loyalty in the letters from you and others which were given me in a richly bound volume. From you came also a gift of somewhat more than two thousand dollars which it will give me pleasure to use for some diocesan project or projects. Newark has a fine tradition of loyalty to its bishops which I could wish that I might merit as completely as did my predecessors.

We have made progress in many directions during the past year. New rectories have been acquired at Woodcliff, Ho-Ho-Kus and Maywood, and at Grace, Orange and St. Andrew's, South Orange. St. Peter's, Essex Fells has purchased a commodious house adjoining its Church property for the use of its large Church School. St. Andrew's, our Negro mission in Passaic, has at last a Church building of its own. The Board of Missions has purchased ground in Warren Point, just East of Paterson, upon which will be placed a portable chapel to provide religious ministrations for a new housing area. One mission, Grace Chapel, Fairview, has been closed and its building sold, its small congregation finding it entirely convenient to attend one of our other Churches in the neighborhood. Among our missions which have relieved the diocese of a part of their former appropriation are Fort Lee, Lyndhurst, Verona, and St. Mark's, Teaneck. They have also made reductions in their indebtedness, as have many others including Secaucus, Ridgefield Park, and St. George's, Passaic, three missions which now are without debt on their Churches and Parish Halls. One of our Newark parishes, St. John's, has also succeeded in freeing itself of debt. Year by year we are gradually reducing the heavy burden of funded indebtedness on our mission buildings. I am glad to report that a number of our congregations have also found it possible to increase the inadequate salaries which their rectors or vicars had been receiving. There are others which in these days of increased living costs should be increased at least to the standard several years ago declared by this Convention to be a minimum—for a single man \$1800, and for a married man \$2100 with the free use of a house. Many adjustments of our ordered ways have been found necessary as the effect of war-time economy has been felt. We have found that Parish halls could be temporarily converted into decent places of worship, and important parish activities maintained. The rector of St. Clement's, Hawthorne announced his readiness to arrange for Services of Holy Communion at any hour desired by those whose working hours prevented their attendance at the customary times. Others have doubtless been equally ready. One layman told me, however, that he had been unable to make his Easter Communion because none of the several parishes in his community had a Service at an hour sufficiently early to enable him to be at his work that day in a war industry. We must be alert to see that our people really have an opportunity to perform what the Prayer Book declares to be their bounden duty—to worship God every Sunday in his

Church. I am constantly aware of the increased tasks which both clergy and laity are cheerfully and effectively performing. It is abundantly clear to me that few who are called to serve the Church in this Diocese have failed to keep their lamps lit and their loins girded in these dark days. Men who are in the armed services of our country have written me gratefully of the evident interest in them which their parishes are taking by a constant flow of gifts and letters. For the most part the ministry of the Church to them must be by their Chaplains, whose work we at home must strengthen. I do not yet have the final figures of the amount given by our Diocese to the work of the Army and Navy Commission. We ought to give somewhere in the neighborhood of ten thousand dollars, which would be an average of perhaps two dollars for each of the names on our honor rolls. I hope that most of our parishes will be seen to have given that average when the list is finally compiled.

I wish that it were possible in my address to mention all the goals which parishes and missions have during the past year set for themselves and successfully met. There are few of our congregations which would be omitted from such a recital of good accomplishment, and I am ever mindful of your labors of love and faith. I must not however dwell longer on the record of the past year.

Civilization is a contract between the noble dead and the yet unborn. For a few brief years each of us is privileged to enjoy the heritage which we have received from the past. We must then pass it on to the next generation, not only unimpaired but also increased. Our great Diocese owes no little portion of its strength to the prayers and work of many who have served in humble posts and quiet ways. There are others who both by virtue of their office and by their fidelity in fulfilling their responsibility have made outstanding contributions. Some of them have their memorials in funds which not only perpetuate their honored names but also continue their labor of love. Thus the Diocese gave recognition to the honor and affection in which it held Bishop Lines. His successor was held in no less honor and affection. Our own generation could not forget Wilson Reiff Stearly, but I believe that it will wish to preserve a record of its affection for all time by some memorial to his fine leadership, which will inspire and enable those who come after him to continue his ministry of love and service. I suggest that this Convention consider the appointment of a Committee to weigh the matter. Some may question the wisdom of such an undertaking at this time. The Committee if one be appointed will give due thought to its present propriety, not forgetting however that though his death occurred less than two years ago, he resigned as our bishop six years earlier. Our burden of taxation is a heavy one, but this very fact makes to an individual the actual cost of a gift for which a deduction may be claimed, much less than its value to the institution to which it is given. As to the form which the memorial might take, I make at this time no

specific recommendation. Should a Committee be appointed, it will have from which to choose, a number of projects any of which would strengthen the Diocese which is so heavily in Bishop Stearly's debt.

Five years ago this Convention adopted a resolution recommending to the Bishop and to the Finance and Advisory Board that our diocesan headquarters be established in the City of Newark. Two years later our offices were moved from their temporary location in Orange to our handsome new building in Rector Street. Each succeeding month has demonstrated the wisdom of the action of the Convention. Not only has the House provided ample opportunities for conferences, institutes and meetings connected with our own work. It has also enabled us to serve clubs, institutions, social agencies, and community interests in a manner which has demonstrated the desire of the Church to be the servant of the larger community.

The time has come for us to consider ways and means of fulfilling in added measure the performance of this responsibility from a center of diocesan life and work. We meet today in a sacred building which is the mother of Churches in far more than a sentimental sense. Two hundred years ago it was a center from which missionary activity extended into the western counties of the state. With its close proximity to the Diocesan House it may in our own day become more and more a missionary center in the widest sense of that term. To that end the Finance and Advisory Board has tentatively explored the possibility of some form of consolidation of Trinity Cathedral Parish and the foundation known as the Cathedral of All Saints. Massachusetts furnishes perhaps the best example of the possibilities of such an undertaking. Here as there stands on an important street in its great see city an historic Church which is capable of a wide and varied ministry as a house of prayer for all peoples. Such work as our City Mission performs might be centered here, with the chaplains officially recognized as members of its staff. Supplementing the faithful ministry of our parish clergy, it might offer specialized types of service in the fields of psychiatry, vocational guidance, or personal counselling. Deacons might be given a year of supervised direction with opportunity to officiate for limited periods at points wherever they would be most useful. These illustrations are sufficient to convey to you an idea of the sort of Cathedral I would have. Its beauty would lie in its emphasis upon the transcendent beauty of service to the need of men. Its dignity could safely rest upon its testimony to the dignity of human personality as revealed in the Incarnation of the Son of God. The development of such plans would be contingent upon our financial resources, and hence might come slowly. For their full realization we should be dependent upon gifts and bequests both large and small, from those who believe in its possibilities. I could wish to see in my own day at least their beginning. To a consolidation with Trinity Cathedral Parish, All Saints' Cathedral foundation would bring invested funds amounting to more than one hundred and fifty thousand

dollars. The assent of the Chapter of All Saints' Cathedral and of the corporation of Trinity Parish would need to be secured. Further study might also reveal the need of legislative and canonical steps to accomplish our purpose. Should the Convention approve in principle the plan of consolidation, the various bodies concerned can proceed to perfect its details.

Among the most important matters to come before General Convention in October is the report of the Joint Commission on Approaches to Unity, particularly as it concerns conversations with the Presbyterian Church. During the past six years various plans for union with that body have been suggested. The Commission has in each case asked for discussion and criticism. As a result earlier plans have been withdrawn. The plan now before the Church is set forth in a document known as Basic Principles. The Chairman of the Joint Commission states that the discussion of this plan, both in our own Church and among the Presbyterians, has brought out valuable suggestions which will be considered at the meeting of the Commission next month. Not until after that meeting, when the final report of the Commission will be published, shall we have before us in definite form the action to be recommended to General Convention by the Commission.

There are certain principles which are still more basic than those explicitly set forth in the document to which I have referred. The first of these is the importance of fellowship. God's desire for unbroken fellowship with man is at the heart of the doctrines of the Incarnation and the Atonement. The Church is the Body through which men enter into the richness of that fellowship. Thus we have no more urgent task than the fulfillment of our missionary responsibility, which is to bring men through the Church to God. Lukewarmness in the cause of missions is refined selfishness, whether in an individual or in a congregation. Zeal for the growth of the Church is motivated however by our conviction that the Church is a fellowship not only of God with man but also of man with man. In the Church we are members of Christ, and also members one of another. Hence the Church becomes an agent directly or indirectly in the eradication of hatred, greed, prejudice, and whatsoever else divides men. Its gospel is the beauty and the duty of fellowship in every human relationship. No one can doubt that in the promotion of this divine purpose the witness of the Church is lessened by the failure of Christians to find fellowship in a united Church. We are therefore bound in penitence to examine with hopefulness every plan advanced by sincere men toward its gradual achievement. Some progress toward that end has been made by our Joint Commission in its conversations with the Presbyterians. The Commission ought therefore to be continued, because we believe in the basic principle of the importance of fellowship.

A second basic principle is the fact that the Church is more and other than a human society free to determine the essential form and nature of

that association. When men enter its fold, they are asked: Do you believe all the articles of the Christian faith as contained in the Apostles' Creed? Its ministers are required at the time of their ordination to promise conformity to the Doctrine, Discipline, and Worship of the Protestant Episcopal Church. Within our Church there are divergencies of emphasis in faith and practise. A wide latitude is so consistent with loyalty to its standards that comprehensiveness is said to be of the genius of Anglicanism. We agree however that since the Christian religion is based upon the revelation of God in Christ through the Church, there must be certain articles of faith which are of absolute, not of relative, validity. General Convention could never release us from the duty of affirming them. In the determination of which articles of faith are of absolute validity, we need to weigh the results of the careful study of men versed in theology. The Commission numbers some such men among its own membership. It has also asked the assistance of an Advisory Committee composed of other scholars. To this advisory committee have already been submitted two questions: the Diaconate and its place in the historic ministry, and the Meaning of the Priesthood in Anglicanism. The wide discussion of these and other questions indicates that final intelligent action on any proposals for unity with the Presbyterians must wait upon a clear understanding of what is involved in the ordination promise of a Priest "to minister the Doctrine and Sacraments, and the Discipline of Christ, as the Lord hath commanded, and as this Church hath received the same." I am confident that the Commission will be continued. As it proceeds, it must undertake and encourage among us all the study of the Church's faith, order, and worship so that any scheme for reunion will be seen to safeguard those fundamental doctrines which are essential in our loyalty to a trust.

I pass on to my third basic principle. Unity can never be achieved merely by a carefully devised formula. In essence it is of the spirit. This is a principle which applies in every human relationship. We know that it is true of the state of matrimony. We shall find it to be true when at the conclusion of the war we attempt to establish an enduring peace. Two families related by ties of blood may decide to reduce their overhead expense by living together under one roof. They may decide to build a new house, skillfully combining the types of architecture which each prefers. Each family may have plenty of room in which to move about, but unless there is mutual understanding and sympathy, it is a house and not a home. No plan of union can succeed in its own purpose, nor accord with God's purpose, unless it is the expression of a mutual respect and appreciation which has grown out of good understanding. We have not yet acquired a good understanding of the Presbyterians nor they of us. We have much in common, but there are respects in which we differ. We must therefore seek to become better acquainted with one another. With this in mind we have invited a distinguished Presbyterian clergyman to give three

addresses at our Clergy Conference in June on what Presbyterians believe and practise. In one of our parishes, Christ Church, East Orange, conferences were led by two Presbyterians and two of our own clergy on four successive evenings in Lent. Such attempts at a better understanding of one another are admirable. We must discover or create a spiritual partnership, in which tolerance and condescension have been replaced by a glad awareness of common responsibility based upon loyal acceptance of the essentials of Christian faith and living.

I have stated three basic principles of my own. There is not time for me to discuss in detail those of the Commission. Personally I should be unable to vote for their immediate adoption by General Convention this October. My fundamental reason is their lack of clarity, which would make it difficult for me to know for what my vote was being cast. Such recurring phrases as "unless and until otherwise ordered by the United Church" suggest that significant alterations in things which have seemed important might be made by a united body of which we would be in the minority. As a matter of fact the Commission will hardly ask for their immediate adoption this autumn. They will doubtless undergo revision by the Commission itself in June. Its Chairman has further said that no final legislation is contemplated until we can secure the counsel of the Lambeth Conference of Anglican bishops throughout the world.

It is frequently urged that in its impact upon contemporary life the Christian Church will be of little weight until its unity has been restored. The possession of power is a dangerous thing. God may withhold His answer to our prayers for unity until it is safe to endow the Church with the resultant power. If the greatest of Christian virtues is love, we must within our own Communion seek its exercise. Intolerance of other points of view than our own, suspicion of hidden motives, charges of unfair play—all these are unworthy of our Christian heritage at any time, but most of all in discussions on such a subject as the restoration to the Church of unity.

Our Canon On the Duties of Bishops requires the Bishop of a diocese at its annual Convention "to make a statement of the affairs of the Diocese since the last meeting of the Convention." This I have tried to do, as well as to indicate certain forward steps which we should consider. I have also given you three basic principles which must underlie our plans for reunion of the Churches: the importance of fellowship, loyal adherence to the essentials of the Christian faith, and the primacy of the spirit. They may well serve as basic principles in the determination of the right Christian attitude in this second year of war.

First of all the war must be won. I am not thinking of national honor and prestige nor of our own prosperity and safety. It must be won because the nations against whom we fight base their philosophy upon the negation of my three basic principles. Their creed is restriction of fellowship, the denial of the dignity of man, the primacy of material force. To win the

war at least cost we must ourselves be a fellowship. We were dismayed by the recent strike of the United Mine Workers. It is doubtless true that their hard tasks have in the past received insufficient rewards. In this time of war, however, we found it hard to understand their failure to recognize the identity of their own interest with that of the fighting forces. Some felt them to be intent chiefly upon their own well being. The strikers' attitude is not an isolated illustration of the loss of a sense of community. A sailor from one of our parishes now lies in a nearby hospital, severely wounded. Still earlier the ship on which he sailed had been bombed from under him. Now he lies disabled, yet longing to return again to the Navy, chiefly because he finds worse than any wounds, the pettiness of us at home who querulously complain because beef is hard to find, and gas difficult to secure. St. Paul was eager to fill up the sufferings of Christ. It is our privilege to recognize our oneness with our fighting men and thus to fill up their sufferings. This we fail to do when we seek for preferential release from small restrictions, resentful at our failure, or boastful at success. The Christian attitude in war is willingness to sacrifice without a whimper. The Church has opportunities and obligations to render increased service to its people. Much, though not all, of our ministry requires the use of gasoline. What we of the clergy really need, we ought to have. None of us I trust will desire more. Neither we nor our people will wish to use any influence we may have to get the largest possible ration. Nor shall we feel it incumbent upon us to use to the last drop all that we secure for any given period. This is a homely, perhaps a trivial illustration. He who would make a conspicuous contribution to a great cause must first make lesser ones.

The Christian attitude in war demands a refusal to become the slave of hatred. Propaganda is a useful weapon. It cleverness makes very urgent our clear thinking upon the essentials of the Christian way of life to which we have pledged our loyalty. The strained relations between Russia and Poland are an example of the skillful use of propaganda. There are obvious impossibilities in the story of Russia's wholesale execution three years ago of ten or twelve thousand Polish officers, and their recent discovery still capable of identification. We shall doubtless have other striking examples of cruelty. Some will be untrue, yet Pearl Harbor proved once and for all that our enemies are capable of dishonor and deceit, of cruelty and treachery. This is one reason why war, though always evil, may be a lesser evil. We cannot make peace with intolerance and oppression. Loyalty to the essentials of the Christian faith demands hatred of sin, both in ourselves and in others. Those who most hate it in themselves have the best right to hate it in others. Those who succeed in vanquishing it within will vanquish it without.

We must hate with all our hearts the blackness of men's sin, yet by the grace of God regard without hate those who sin. Such an attitude is of the essence of the Christian faith. I have heard vitriolic expressions of

hatred for our enemy, but they have come from those who have suffered little if at all. For one hundred years we have sent Christian missionaries to China. Now she repays her debt by sending to us that great-hearted Christian woman Mme. Chiang-Kai-Shek. Seven long years her country has been ravaged by a merciless foe. Her people have starved and bled almost beyond human endurance. "There must be no bitterness," she says, "No matter what we have undergone and suffered, we must try to forgive those who injured us. Recrimination and hatred will lead us nowhere."

Hatred is worse than futile. It is destructive of the best we know and are. It robs us of the power to reason clearly. A momentary stimulus to physical strength, it generates a poison which later brings exhaustion to its victim. It is said that for a time "hate classes" were held in British Army training schools. A year ago when they were abolished Lieut. Gen. Paget pointed out in a letter to all army commands the difference between "artificial hate and the true offensive spirit combined with will power, which will not recognize defeat."

The spirit of retaliation, which is the child of hatred, has its tragic consequences. The peace to which we look will provide for the preservation of order, the re-education of a deluded Germany, the trial by due process of offenders and their just punishment. The end which is sought and the punishment inflicted must be remedial not retributive. To pursue a different course is to breed resentment and despair. Its victims will only bide their time watching for the opportunity to have their turn in the cycle of recurring desolation.

The year before us will require hard work, unlimited patience, and unflinching courage. Throughout its course, beginning with our words and acts in this Convention, let us hold steadily before our minds the three basic principles:

the importance of fellowship

Jesus said: A new commandment I give unto you, that ye love one another; as I have loved you, that ye also love one another.

loyalty to the essentials of the Christian faith

Jesus said: If ye continue in my word, then are ye my disciples indeed; and ye shall know the truth.

the primacy of the spirit

Jesus said: God is a spirit and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and in truth.

We commit ourselves to Him that we may be His ready agents in a time of crisis and of opportunity.

THE EIGHTH ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE SUFFRAGAN BISHOP.*Fellow Workers in Christ:*

Whatever may be the outcome of the effort to enact a tax bill in Washington we can be certain of one thing, taxes will be higher. This fact, plus reduced production of consumer goods, means that the cost of living is also going to be higher as people compete for the smaller quantity available. This situation increases in two directions the responsibilities of vestrymen and of members of executive committees.

Clergymen have no collective bargaining agency upon which they can rely for seeing to it that income keeps reasonable pace with expenditure. It would be repugnant to think of such a thing. They are proud of the privilege of service. That is all the more reason why their generally self-forgetful service needs to be reconsidered from time to time with a spirit of generous reality upon the part of all those who have the responsibility for their maintenance.

As I browse over annual parochial reports and meet vestrymen in various parts of the diocese, I do not take very much pride in the fact that the assessments in this diocese are low as compared to that of dioceses similarly situated. I am afraid that this is due in too large a part to the fact that too many parishes and missions are anxious to secure clergymen as cheaply as possible. Those who desire to secure cheap clergymen are pretty apt to get just what they want. Then, later, they repent of what they thought of as "shrewd business" and complain to the bishop of lack of progress or else ask for aid from the diocese. A voluntary recognition of self-sacrificing service will pay dividends in the grateful and creative effort of a mind and heart released from economic strain.

In spite of high taxes and living costs, money is now more plentiful than it has been in years. Evidence of that is to be found in the recent raising of a huge sum of money in the Second War Loan. But its success is tempered with this realization,—only seven per cent of the total was taken by the small individual investor. That means that there is still a lot of money in the hands of the people. It would seem an act of sound business sense, therefore, to re-examine the financial position of each parish and mission in the light of this fact with a view to securing worthier support from the people. We believe that there are some aided parishes and missions which could at this time with a little extra effort, shoulder a greater responsibility in this regard. It is hard to forego the fruits of paternalism, but it is the only way in which character is built.

We have mentioned the higher motive for facing the situation. We will also include a practical motive. The war has drawn off many men from parochial service and others will be called later. The war has also brought

our seminaries almost to a standstill. We are faced with a shortage of men for a number of years. Inevitably, therefore, those who manifest a sound and generous attitude toward their clergy will reap the benefit in both leadership and character. Those who do not adopt such a policy will find their rectors or vicars drawn off to other parishes and to other dioceses where their best efforts will not be discounted by economic strain.

There is another increased financial responsibility confronting vestrymen and trustees. It relates to the amount of indebtedness in the parish. Now is the time to wipe out indebtedness of all kinds. At the present time there is a wider distribution of money than has existed for many years. The objects for which that money can be expended are limited. In spite of increasing taxes, the Government still makes a generous allowance for religious and charitable contributions. After the war is over, there will be a scramble to purchase those goods which are not now available. Inevitably, the income of the Church will be affected thereby. Now is the time for the Church to clear the decks for action. The parish which is out of debt when the war ends will have a great advantage over the one that neglects the present opportunity. Those parishes which are free from hampering debt will be in a position to throw all of their resources and strength into the task of building a new world. And that new world will challenge us with problems that will tax all of our material and spiritual resources.

As long as we are speaking of financial matters, it may be well for us to try to clarify the confusion which seems to exist in some minds concerning those items which are officially called "assessment", "pledge" and "quota". The diocesan assessment is the amount of money asked from each parish and mission to cover the administrative expense of the diocese. It does not cover the whole amount necessary for this purpose because nearly one half of that amount is derived from endowment. It does, however, cover the maintenance of the Diocesan House, the staff, the Diocesan Journal and our share of the expenses of General Convention. That is the reason why our Diocesan Convention of 1939, following the action of the General Convention of 1937, voted to have the assessment placed on the black side of each parochial budget.

We are an Episcopal Church. The parish cannot exist without the diocese, and the diocese cannot exist without the parish. Therefore, the sum necessary to maintain diocesan administrative expense cannot be properly taken from what is sometimes designated as "for others" or "for missionary purposes." The parish is really paying a part of its own expenses when it contributes to the diocesan administrative expense. Rectors and vestrymen should make this clear to their fellow workers because there are some people in our diocese who do not seem to understand this fact. The payment of the assessment is obligatory to enable a parish to vote in this Convention.

Having included the diocesan assessment on the black side of the parochial budget along with the rector's salary and other items, the red side of the envelope is then free to be devoted to the support of the Church's work as it is carried on outside of the parish,—in the diocese, in the nation and in the world. The money received on the red side is a trust fund for these purposes and is not available for any parochial purpose such as interest, repairs, or maintenance. This fact should be clearly indicated on the envelopes used to collect the people's money. The trustee or trustees who handle the money received on the red side of the envelope are merely the agents of the donors and of the extra-parochial work of the church. It is not for them to determine how much the people should give, nor how much of what is given should be paid over to the diocese or to the national work.

The only time these trustees are entitled to exercise any degree of discretionary power over this particular money is in the Fall of the year after the Every Member Canvass has been completed when, on the basis of past experience, they are to decide how much of the money promised for these purposes is likely to be paid and on that basis they are to make a written pledge to our office of the amount which we can expect to receive from that parish during the following year. The amount so stated is what is called the pledge. Pledge and quota are not always identical, as will be shown later. It is necessary to have this pledge reported to us before the beginning of the year because the bulk of the money given for extra-parochial purposes goes for salaries. It is not possible, therefore, to wait until the expiration of the year to ascertain how much can be paid to our workers for their year's work. Like all human beings, they are entitled to reasonable certainty of income.

In December of each year it is my official duty to communicate with the rector and financial representative of every parish and mission asking them how much the diocese may expect from that particular parish for the support of extra-parochial work during the succeeding year. Along with this inquiry goes a statement of that parish's assessment and also of its quota for the following year. It would greatly facilitate the efficiency of our diocesan administration if this communication, and others, were answered promptly and completely. When the diocesan office writes, once concerning a routine matter required by canon that should be sufficient. I regret to have to report that in too many instances it does not seem to be sufficient.

For example, on December 1, 1942, I wrote to the rectors and officers above mentioned enclosing the customary canonical blank and requesting an early reply so that we might enter the year with a full knowledge of our resources and responsibilities. On January 1, 1943, it was again necessary for me to write to nearly half of the parishes and missions urging them to make their return before January 22 so that the material might be organized before the meeting of the Finance and Advisory Board on

February 1st. At the time of this meeting of the Finance and Advisory Board in February, there were still fifty-two parishes and missions that had not yet replied,—almost one-third of the total number of parishes and missions in the diocese! It is to be remembered that this pledge is also required from those few parishes that have a Spring canvass as well as from those who follow the usual custom.

The prompt return of these pledges is not only a matter of sound internal business practice, but is also absolutely necessary to enable our diocese to report to the National Council how much money will be forthcoming from the diocese during the succeeding year for the work of the whole Church.

The National Council acting under orders from our supreme governing body, the General Convention, annually indicates to each diocese its share of the amount of money necessary to discharge the work ordered done by the General Convention. Then, under the canons of the general church and of our own diocese, the Finance and Advisory Board takes this diocesan share and combines it with the sum determined by our Diocesan Convention as necessary to maintain the work of the diocese. It does not include in this sum the money assessed for administrative expenses. Following the direction of the Diocesan Convention and considering the resources, expenses and particular local problems of each parish and mission, it then mathematically determines the share of each parish and mission in the whole responsibility. This is the parish quota and is announced to the parish in the communication referred to above which states the amount of the assessment. Each parish and mission thereupon takes stock of its resources, as shown by the Every Member Canvass, and states to the diocese how much it will contribute toward its combined responsibility to the diocese and to the general church during the succeeding year. As has been indicated, this is the pledge and, on the basis of it, the diocese carries on its responsibilities. If the pledge does not equal the quota, the diocese then has the task of cutting the work or of trying to make up the difference through the generosity of other parishes or from other sources.

Two things need to be said over and over again concerning this matter of quota. The first is that payment of present pledges maintains only the actual work of the church as it now exists. Parishes must pay their quota in full if the work of the church is to go forward. The other thing that needs to be said is that this quota should in all fairness be presented to all of the people of a given parish for their prayerful consideration and action. The giving responsibility of a parish should not be determined by the vestry or by any other body until and unless it has first been brought fully to the knowledge of all the members of the parish.

Neither the rector, nor the vestry, nor any other body has a right to pre-determine for the people how much of said quota the parishioners should meet or be asked to meet. We too frequently have the experience of

meeting people who feel that their parish has done its full share if it has raised the sum asked of it by the vestry. They are surprised when they sometimes learn that their real share of responsibility for the whole work, that is, their quota as apportioned to them by the proper canonical body in the diocese, is larger than the sum presented to them by their own parish authorities. This is not to criticize those who, after making an honest effort to meet a fully known quota are unable to do so, but simply to call attention to the fact that it is a part of a trustee's duty to disclose the whole amount of an obligation to the people concerned. This is in addition to his duty to account for and to pay over meticulously and promptly every dollar that is given for the purpose of meeting that obligation. The Church as a Christian body must set a scrupulous example to the community.

May I again call attention to the fact that the Field Department exists to help the people of our parishes and missions to meet their quota obligation. This group of your fellow workers is distinctly a service organization. They speak out of common experience with you. They are not an outside group of high-pressure salesmen. I wish to pay my tribute of respect to these faithful clergymen and laymen for the many hours of work they give to our common task in addition to all that they do for their own parishes. Given sufficient notice, they are willing to come to your parish to help you with the missionary education of your people and with your preparation for the Every Member Canvass. They will not come unless they are invited. I wish that more of our parishes and missions would avail themselves of this generously offered help.

Our parishes are facing great social changes which we must be prepared to meet if we are to be able to give the service which we *should* render to our respective communities. The Government has announced its imperative need of three million additional women workers in 1943. Because the existing industries have pretty well absorbed the supply of labor in their immediate neighborhoods, the chances are that these women will be required to move to new areas. Some of these women may be your parishioners. It is just as important for you to keep in touch with them as it is to maintain contacts with the men in the armed forces.

This need for women workers is creating a serious problem of child care. To help solve this problem, the government is trying to recruit fifteen thousand additional social workers. The places of these social workers must be taken by volunteers and here is a field of community service for which our people should be quick to offer themselves. The Government is planning an eighty-hour course for the training of such volunteers wherever centers are provided by the local community. These centers must have the approval of the local fire, health and building departments. It may be that your parish house is suitable for this purpose. It is interesting to know that Emmanuel Church in Cleveland, Ohio, where our

beloved Bishop Stearly was once rector, started this particular kind of service in the present emergency by offering the use of its parish house to the community. The State of New Jersey has asked all of the public schools to survey their respective communities to see what their needs and resources are for meeting this situation. Therefore, it will not be wise for any parish to set up its own program until it knows what the community can and will do. Of course, it will not only be wise but good Christian fellowship to co-operate with other religious bodies in the care of these children. Young adolescents are restless and wandering because their own homes have been disrupted by the enlistment of fathers and by the employment of their mothers. They need to be made to feel that they belong near home and that is a co-operative job for the churches and the community agencies together.

There is another field of service which our churches should be quick to enter and that is to offer the worship opportunities of the church at such hours as are convenient for those who labor at unusual hours. If it is at all possible, the church should be kept open for prayer, and the Holy Communion should be celebrated at any and all hours that will meet the working conditions of the people.

Parish houses in strategic localities should be kept open for rest and recreation on the part of workers and those in uniform and welcoming committees of men and of women should be on hand for friendly contact and consultation, too, if that is desired. We are prone to talk and to act as if men were the only ones who are in need of recreation and consultation. We must remember the constantly increasing number of women in uniform. They too need counselling and friendly shelter. They too need home hospitality and repeated personal contacts. In all of these activities, we must beware lest we engage in them as if we were engaging in a temporary job "for the duration." We are going to have men and women in uniform for years to come even when the fighting has stopped. We must face that fact and make our plans accordingly.

Two years ago, and before Pearl Harbor, I said to this Convention, "If we of the United States are to be called upon now to make sacrifices, let us be told what those sacrifices will create in the way of a better world. We are not interested in a world which is merely restored to the status quo. Let it be proclaimed clearly just what the new world order is to be and let it be not merely an American order for the new world, but an economic and social order based upon the Christian principle of the value of man as a child of God. Such a proclamation would send a thrill of hope and new purpose through the oppressed of all nations and would rob Hitler of his ability to conquer by dividing." It is a painful fact that such a declaration is still lacking and consequently our Government has been and

is hindered in its efforts to prosecute the war by factional strife among our allies. The Atlantic Charter is just what its name implies, an Atlantic Charter. It blissfully leaves out the peoples of the Pacific.

There is still a crying need for the enunciation of principles around which all the people of all the earth can be rallied. They must be principles of human right and welfare stated with convincing frankness and backed up with a pledge of continuing support. They must not be vague generalities ambiguously stated so as to leave room for later considerations of national, economic or racial self-interest. It is our duty as Christian men and women to move the powers that be to the proclaiming and to the maintaining of such principles. Then we must be prepared to pay the price of their maintenance by foregoing privilege and by abolishing discrimination at home as well as abroad. We are going to pay anyhow. Let us therefore pay for something that enlarges life for all by removing barriers rather than by trying to create a so-called security based upon new barriers erected by sheer power of arms.

There seems to be only one figure in our public life who senses the true character of the present struggle as a world uprising of people against social, economic and racial injustice of long standing. He has reached his convictions from the standpoint of personal observation, and not from that of political expediency. He is bold and impolitic enough to say that our nation must serve its own people and the world without thought of social, economic or racial self-interest or advantage. I shall probably be accused of dabbling in politics by mentioning Mr. Willkie's convictions, but I feel free to do so for two reasons. The first is that I do not think much of his political chances with either of the old parties. The Democratic party is too dominated and the Republican party is too dumb to nominate him. The second and more important reason is that without cant he applies the Christian ideal of one family to all mankind.

The territory lost by white men to white men in Europe may be regained and controlled by white men. The territory lost by white men to colored men in Asia may be regained physically by white men, but will not be controlled by them because they cannot regain it without the help of colored men, both yellow and brown. That help being given, it cannot be later pushed aside as unnecessary or unworthy. We would do well to face the real issue in the words of Jawaharlal Nehru, "This is a vast revolution ending an epoch of history and ushering in an order that will be entirely different."

Being confronted with these revolutionary changes, the world's greatest need is for faith in the possibility of human fellowship among those who differ from one another. Upon such a faith depend democracy and a world commonwealth of nations. The totalitarian states say it cannot be done, that human beings must be made to conform to a pattern. No amount of

argument will convince such people that it can be done. They must be shown. The present efforts of the United Nations are not very convincing. There is more than a suspicion abroad that the chief tie at the present time is the tenuous one of common danger. What is needed is a demonstration of such fellowship and it is most fitting that the demonstration should be given by Christian people.

We believe that the substance of Basic Principles, set forth by the Commissions of the Episcopal and Presbyterian Churches charged with the duty of achieving organic unity between the two Churches, constitutes a wise first step in preparing the way for such a demonstration to the world. We base our personal decision not upon expediency alone but upon the deep conviction that disunity is sin, that the Holy Spirit will guard us against the loss of any treasures which may be imperiled by our lack of wisdom, if, after prayerful consideration, we make an honest effort to obey our Lord's prayer that 'we all may be one', and because we believe that these Basic Principles represent such honest and prayerful effort. Our *primary* duty is to obey His prayer. Our *secondary* duty is to make every reasonable effort to conserve those values which we believe have come to us under the guidance of the Holy Spirit out of our own experience of the Christian Church. In this matter we must be prepared in heart and will to believe that God has new and greater revelations ahead for those who dare to go forward with Him in answer to Christ's prayer.

Those who approve and those who disapprove the Basic Principles submitted by the Commission on Approaches to Unity feel strongly about the matter. Some believe that precious heritages are being sacrificed and a few individuals in prominent positions have even gone so far as to take an extreme protestant position by asserting the superiority of their individual judgments over that of General Convention by saying that they will not accept its decision if it supports the Commission. They talk in childish terms of breaking the fellowship. On the other hand, there are some who advocate unity so strongly that they are eager to begin practicing it tomorrow without thinking through all of the implications of Basic Principles and are impatient with those who oppose. We admit that to us some of the current pleas for delaying action in this matter are not very convincing and that they sound more like pleas in avoidance. We are led to this feeling because so many of the objections are negative,—to the effect that Basic Principles are nebulous and vague or that they need clarifying. Such objections are themselves vague. In what way do the Principles need clarifying and what more definite plan do the objectors offer? Let them state frankly what they do want and not muddy the whole situation by implying that the scholars who have labored on this problem for years are not quite sure of what they are doing. Fellowship is important. It is the heart of Christianity. The question still remains,—fellowship with whom? If ye salute your brethren only, what do ye more than others?

Fortunately there is plenty of time for further consideration of the matter. By its very nature, General Convention cannot move precipitately. It is the genius of our Church that it maintains the catholic principle of the many sidedness of truth and has worked out a type of government which allows each and all to express themselves in differing but orderly ways. In General Convention, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, we shall work out our problem of fellowship in view of the world's need and of God's purpose and then take the next step forward. Even if these Basic Principles were accepted in substance at the coming Convention, the agreed reference to the Lambeth Conference would mean probably another ten years before final action could be taken. As a Church we do not move as swiftly as we would individually like to move, but we do move together as a result of our common action. That is as it should be. There seems to be a feeling on the part of some that the coming General Convention may somehow take the bit in its teeth, jam through Basic Principles and we will all wake up some morning and find ourselves Presbyter-Episcopalians. Certainly nothing in the work or words of the Commission can justify such a belief. We have no right to speak for the Commission, but we do not believe they want such a result. We who support Basic Principles do not either. We are catholics and intend to abide by the decision of General Convention, even though its decision may bring us pain and disappointment. We expect and believe that a great majority of our brethren will do the same.

In this connection, there are two responsibilities which rest upon us as a matter of Christian integrity and honor. The first is to prove to the Presbyterians the sincerity of our motives by the wholeheartedness with which we adopt a resolution of continuance at the coming Convention and as a demonstration of our confidence in the scholarly competency and good faith of the men to whom we have entrusted this task. The second obligation is to really educate our people concerning the problems involved. We must do this without appealing to their prejudices through our own, but by giving them an honest opportunity to form their own individual opinions from complete historical, theological and commission data representing the various points of view involved in the problem. This latter obligation is the responsibility of every clergyman and layman in this Convention.

In these trying days we must do everything we can to emphasize the worth of man at a time when the world is belittling him and slaughtering him. We must demonstrate our belief that God made him and that Christ died for him for the accomplishment of God's purpose and not man's. We must bring home to every individual within our reach the truth that there is a divine purpose for his or her life and that the whole power of the Church and of its Sacraments are at the disposal of that person for the

accomplishment of that purpose if he so chooses. We must particularly demonstrate that great truth in the celebration and in the expression of the Holy Communion which is the very heart of our religion.

The Holy Communion is the model for democracy, for rank does not matter at the Holy Table. It is the model for our economic life because it uses both spiritual and material elements as being equally instruments of God's will. We believe that disaster follows when man tries to separate them and tries to treat spiritual and material elements as if they belonged in different realms. Because of their God-established relationship, religion must always be interested in the economic and social welfare of man and in the freeing of man's spirit from bondage of any kind. There is unreality and unworthiness in partaking of the Feast of Fellowship and then in being careless or indifferent to the social or economic lot of men all around us, as if that belonged to a different sphere.

The Holy Communion is the model for society in that it is an experience of God which we share with one another. It is not a complete Holy Communion if any neighbor, through any pride or neglect of mine, is missing from that Feast. This fact has its implications for a commonwealth of nations, the missionary work of the Church and for Church unity. It is not an individual feast with God. It is a social privilege and a social obligation. "Here we offer and present unto thee, O Lord, ourselves, our souls and bodies to be a reasonable, holy and living sacrifice unto thee." For what purpose? Personal security or peace of mind? No. It is both a personal and a corporate dedication to the accomplishment of God's social purpose of making into one family all the people of the earth.

No matter how many bishops or priests are present at a Celebration or how they have been ordained, there is no valid Holy Communion unless officiants and communicants alike are there for the purpose of communing with Christ and with one another so that in His company they may go forth together to spend themselves in bringing to realization God's purpose of one family for all mankind. Our tendency has been to overemphasize the ecclesiastical qualifications of the celebrant and the communicant and to neglect the heart of the Sacrament which is the pledge of allegiance on the part of all participants to sacrifice themselves to enlarge the fellowship of God's family.

It is in the Feast of Fellowship that we find the justification for and the means of fostering the four freedoms concerning which there has been so much talk and so little action. These freedoms spring out of God's purpose for the whole family of mankind. They are not the creatures of any human brain, nor of any process of history. They exist potentially because God has made man a social being. They are not something inherent but they are something potential. They become real to us only as we make them real to others. We can only give others such measure as we ourselves

possess, but in giving them that we enlarge our own. No group of peace makers is going to establish the four freedoms for us in the world. We are establishing them now by the way we sacrifice to enlarge freedom for our own immediate neighbors here at home.

We need to ask ourselves an honest question. How much freedom have we to give to the rest of the world? We struggle with nationalism when the world is crying for international fellowship. We have to resort to collective bargaining because some are not faithful stewards of the power in their hands. Selfish interests oppose our efforts to exalt persons above profits when we try to provide against sickness, old age and unemployment. We are having a discouraging time trying to abolish child labor and racial discrimination. In the midst of these struggles the Feast of Fellowship is the source of our inspiration and of our power, when we participate in it for the sake of widening the freedom of others and then actually make the effort to do so.

Let us turn to our altars in humble repentance for past neglects and with a new determination to make the Feast of Fellowship the model, the inspiration and the power for a new world. Then let us go forth in self-forgetful sacrifice to every phase of human life and to every kind of person with the determination, with Christ's help, to change them into what God intended them to be. "Do this in remembrance of me." The obedient doing of it is not just the observance of a memory. We may reverently interpret our Lord's words as meaning, "Do this in the way in which I am doing it,—giving myself for you and for all mankind that they all may be one as thou, Father art in Me and I Thee, that they also may be one in us."
