OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

From a Parish.

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election, in the following form :

[Name of the Church, the Place, and Date.]

This certifies that a meeting of the congregation of this Church, held for the purpose of electing Church Officers, and Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention (*or for the purpose of electing Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, if the meeting be for that object alone*), A. B., C. D., and E. F., being male communicants of the Church in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Deputies ; and B. C., D. E., and F. G., also being male communicants in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Alternate Deputies to represent the Parish in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand (*or if two Wardens subscribed, we have set our hands*), the day and year above written.

N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient ; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary sign, then the signatures of *both* Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-in-charge, *or* Missionary, may not sign.

From a Mission.

N. B.—Use the same form and substitute the word "Mission" for "Parish" in three places. The Minister-in-charge ; or, the Clerk ; or, the Warden may sign.

Memoranda :

Not more than three Deputies are allowed from each Parish, and Mission.

Three Alternate Deputies must be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies.

Write Christian names in **FULL** and **LEGIBLY**.

Blank forms will be sent by the Secretary of the Convention on or before Easter Monday in each year.

Return Certificates of Election at least ONE MONTH before Convention.

Deputies must be male Communicants of the Church, and also qualified voters in the Parish or Mission which elects them. (See Canon 10- § II, [4], [5] and [6] and Canon 16 § VIII.)

Rules of Order

THE CONVENTION.

1. The Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. The Convention shall meet on the opening day for the Business Sessions at 9:45 A. M.; with a recess of one hour between 1 and 2 o'clock.
3. At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
4. At the close of each Convention, the Minutes shall be corrected and approved.
5. The doors of the Convention shall be open for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
6. All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convention shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall record their attendance.
7. Clergymen of other Dioceses, and Candidates for Holy Orders, who may be present, shall be admitted to honorary seats in the Convention on the presentation of their names to the Secretary.
8. When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
9. When any member is about to speak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
10. No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply), in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
11. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
12. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate, but any member may appeal from the decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention. The general procedure of the Convention shall be governed, unless otherwise provided for, by the rules of parliamentary practice as set forth in "Roberts' Rules of Order."
13. A Committee consisting of the Bishop, ex-officio, five other clergymen and five laymen, to be known as the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, shall be appointed at each Convention to prepare the official Ballots and the Calendar of Business, for the next Annual Convention.

The mode of conducting the nominations and elections of all Committees, Commissions and Boards and all other elective officers not otherwise provided for, shall be as follows:

The Secretary of the Convention shall send out with the notice of the time and place of the Diocesan Convention, a list of the offices to be filled by election thereat, and the names of the incumbents of these offices, whose terms expire thereat, together with an official nomination blank. Such notice shall be sent out at least one month before the date appointed for the Convention, to the Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and to each lay delegate whose name and address has been transmitted to the Secretary, as provided in Canon I.

Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations for any office or offices to be filled at such Convention, shall at least fifteen days before the date appointed for the Convention, submit the same in writing to the Secretary thereof, together with his certificate that he has secured the consent of such person or persons to such nomination.

The Committee on Elections, from the list of nominations as furnished to it by the Secretary of the Convention, shall prepare sufficient ballots marked "Sample" for each clerical and lay delegate, as certified by such Secretary, as entitled to a seat in the Convention; such ballot to be mailed by such Secretary to each such delegate at least five days before the Convention.

At the beginning of the opening session the committee shall report to the Convention in the form of an official ballot the names of nominees; the arrangement of such names shall be determined by lot in each order.

If there be any office for which no nomination has been made on the sample ballot any delegate may file with the Secretary of the Convention the name of one candidate for any such office, together with his certificate, that he has secured the consent of the person so nominated. Such nominations may be filed up to the hour of voting, and the committee of Elections shall announce the names of such nominees at the time of the distribution of the first ballot.

The number of consecutive terms any nominee has held the office for which he is again nominated shall be noted on the ballot, in parentheses, after his or her name. After each list of nominations as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks may be filled by any voter. On the first ballot these ballots only shall be used, and also in subsequent ballots, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. No ballot shall be counted in its class, on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled, and the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast.

The members of the Convention shall also be requested, in said call, to send to this Committee any canonical amendments or other important items of business that they may propose to introduce at the next Convention, so that such matters may be assigned a place on the Calendar of Business. This call shall also be annually inserted in the official Magazine of the Diocese, *THE NEWARK CHURCHMAN*.

Balloting shall take place in a separate room when practicable.

The clerical and lay voting lists shall be divided into two sections each.

14. Four or more Election Tellers, clerical and lay, in equal numbers, not necessarily members of the Convention, shall be appointed by the President before an election. They shall receive and canvass all votes cast at any election which is required to be by ballot, and when such canvass is completed, shall immediately report its result to the Convention. The polls shall be open for such time as the Convention may, by resolution, direct.
15. All reports (usually printed in the *JOURNAL*) of officers, committees, commissions, and boards of trustees under control of the Convention, shall be printed and distributed by the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order as far as practicable, at least two weeks before the meeting of the Convention; provided that the subject of such printing and reports shall have been referred to the Finance and Advisory Board for consideration, which Board shall have power to supervise, regulate, or to condense the same, and to issue to the Committee or to the Secretary of the Convention such instructions as in the judgment of the said Board will promote greater economy and efficiency in respect to this work.

Reports when read in Convention shall be read by title only, unless the reading be for the better transaction of business.

NEW BUSINESS.

16. All new business introduced, except such as may accompany and form a part of a report of a committee, shall be in the form of a motion or resolution and shall be in writing.

COMMITTEES.

17. All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered. It shall be the duty of the Secretary promptly to notify the members of all special committees of their appointment.
18. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.

MOTIONS AND THEIR ORDER.

19. No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the *JOURNAL*.
20. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it; or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment has been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
21. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.

VOTING PRIVILEGES.

22. All questions shall be decided *visu voce*, unless otherwise specially ordered.
23. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote of the Convention shall be taken by Orders, voting separately; and, when a vote is thus taken a concurrent majority in both Orders shall be necessary to carry any measure.

A quorum being present the Convention was declared ready for business.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ELECTIONS AND RULES OF ORDER.

Your Committee appointed by the authority of the Seventy-second Convention of the Diocese of Newark, met at the Diocesan House, Tuesday, January 21st, together with Bishop Washburn, and herewith submits its report.

The Bishop of the Diocese, having appointed Tuesday, May 13th, as the day for the Seventy-third Annual Diocesan Convention.

It was resolved that a service of Holy Communion be held in Trinity Cathedral on the morning of Tuesday, May 13th, at 9 a.m. and that the business session of the Convention also be held in the Cathedral beginning at 9:45 a.m.

Other recommendations by your Committee as follows:

The Bishop of Newark, the Right Reverend Benjamin M. Washburn, D.D., S.T.D., delivered his Fifteenth Annual Address at this time.

FIFTEENTH ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE BISHOP OF NEWARK.

We are assembled as the Seventy-third Annual Convention, empowered by Constitution and Canons to act in our representative capacity for the more than fifty thousand Communicants of the Diocese. At past Conventions the addresses of the Bishops have covered wide areas of our responsibilities and privileges in both Church and State. This year since each of us will speak more briefly, I am precluded from the rehearsal of advances during the past year, spiritual and material, on both the parochial and the diocesan level. I cannot forbear, however, a word of appreciation, as sincere as it is brief, of the loyal comradeship with me in our common task of Bishop Ludlow; my other associates, both men and women at the Diocesan

House; and the clergy and laity throughout the Diocese. You have been patient, kind, and charitable and I give you thanks.

In this address I propose to discuss the major responsibility which rests upon the Church as the Body of Christ, the Body of which we are members in particular. Through its Secretary, your Finance and Advisory Board will present a Program Budget proposed for the year 1948. Each of the recognized Boards, Institutions, and Agencies of the Diocese has informed the Finance and Advisory Board of the amount which it deems necessary for its work in 1948. The Budget Committee of the Board, after consideration of the real need for the sums respectively asked, has incorporated them, together with an amount for the Church at large, in a Budget. This Budget will be presented for your consideration and action.

The Budget is rooted and grounded in the faith of the Church. In the words of the Book of Common Prayer we are taught to believe in God the Father, who hath made us, and all the world; in God the Son, who hath redeemed us, and all mankind; in God the Holy Ghost, who sanctifieth us, and all the people of God. We are members of the Church described in the Creeds as Catholic because it is universal, holding earnestly the faith for all time, in all countries, and for all people; and is sent to preach the Gospel to the whole world. Early in its history the Church cast aside for all time the notion that to its responsibility and its saving power there were limitations of class, race, or nationality. Thus only could the Church be loyal to its Lord who being lifted up would draw all men unto Him. Its inner life has been strongest in those very centuries when it has sought most zealously to expand the sphere of its activities. The life of a parish is itself strengthened and made more wholesome when as its first duty it responds to the missionary imperative. How could it be otherwise in a society of those called to follow Him who said that they who would lose their lives for His sake should find them?

If a Program Budget is rooted and grounded in the faith of the Church, it is of significance in every age. In our own day its urgency is more than ever evident. Do you remember the words of Wendell Willkie on his return from foreign lands in which he had witnessed the contribution made by Christian missionaries? "We are beginning to realize that we can make no plans, we can have no personal lives if the world around us is not at peace. But how can we make peace real and enduring? If we are intent on establishing in this world a future where men can live in peace and enjoy the benefits of modern civilizations, if we wish once more to be able to plan our lives without an overhanging burden of fear, we cannot rely merely upon governmental forms or world councils or the intricacies of diplomacy. A world of peace and well-being, to survive, must rest upon and be suffused with those age-old principles which the churches have been teaching throughout the centuries. It must find its inspiration in the leadership of a multitude of people who to Cain's ancient question: 'Am I my brother's

keeper' have the courage to answer, 'Yes'." Unless there is a fundamental conversion of our inner attitudes, the seeds of pride and selfishness will continue to produce chaos in all spheres of human relationships. We must preach and practice the brotherhood of man in the light of the Fatherhood of God.

Let me now speak more directly of the Budget for 1948 which you will shortly consider. For the work of diocesan Boards, Agencies, and Institutions \$123,700.00 is asked. For the work of our National Council \$95,000.00 was added, making the total Budget \$218,700.00. \$95,000.00 for the National Council was the amount which its treasurer informed us would probably be our quota, though the Council had not yet fixed diocesan objectives. At the recent meeting of the National Council we were assigned a larger quota, a quota of \$118,072.00 which with our diocesan askings makes a total of \$241,772.00.

A study of the Budget shows increases in many of the items for our diocesan work. The total of these increases over our 1947 working Budget is \$30,525.00. For 1948 the National Council asks us for \$48,072.00 more than we have promised it for 1947. At the proper time others will be ready to explain the reason for increases in the specific items of the Budget. At this time I will say only that all of them arise from one or both of two causes. One of these causes is our inflated economy. It is obvious that the Church and its workers are not exempt from the operation of economic laws. In order to buy the same goods and the same services as were required a year or two ago more dollars are needed. The other cause is the presence of new opportunities for service in a changing world, which the Church should not neglect. We must not be content either at home or abroad merely to hold the line. Ours is a time for a new and vigorous offensive.

We must face clearly the implications of the Budget which is proposed. The Finance and Advisory Board is the agency through which the askings of various diocesan Boards, Agencies, and Institutions, and of the National Council are presented to the Convention. Any Budget which is adopted is the Budget of the Diocesan Convention, and by virtue of the representative capacity of the Convention, the Budget which every communicant of every parish and mission is bound to attempt to meet. With this fact in mind, you will be asking this question: Does the proposed Budget require a sum of money which it is within the capacity of the Church to give? Some one may say that if each communicant of the Church were to give ten cents a week the Budget would be more than met. This is a specious answer. It is always misleading to break down the sum required by dividing the total amount by the number of communicants. Statistics of communicant membership for one reason or another are unreliable guides in estimating the financial or spiritual strength of a Parish or a Diocese. There are, however, certain considerations which to some extent have a bearing upon our capacity to give. What, for example, is the record of our giving in former

years for the Program of the Church? In each of the years between 1927 and 1930, our four best years, we raised in pledges about \$225,000. Then came the depths of the depression during which in 1938 we fell to a low of \$108,820. By slow degrees we have advanced from that low to a total of \$157,559. pledged for 1947. The advance from 1946 to 1947 is the largest advance made in any one year. These figures may be said certainly to represent under existing conditions our *willingness* to give, but it must be added that *willingness* and *capacity* do not always coincide. There is among us a faithful and generous minority who because they are informed are consecrated to their missionary privilege. The capacity of the Church to give must take into account not only this blessed minority, but the unknown potential of an inert majority whose imagination should be enkindled and their loyalty secured.

There are other factual considerations with respect to the potential resources of the Church and its capacity to give. First we remember that in the dark days of the depression many of our congregations were burdened with substantial mortgage indebtedness, requiring heavy interest and amortization payments. By sheer determination, these congregations working with courage and zeal have in these past eight years paid off some \$600,000. of their mortgage indebtedness. In addition to the sums raised to be paid upon the principal sum, such congregations, in the aggregate, raised and paid thousands of dollars in interest requirements. I cite these figures not as an indication that it is only from such formerly burdened congregations that increased giving for missions should be expected. It is rather to indicate that when a congregation really is aroused to achieve a worthwhile goal, unsuspected resources are revealed. The miracle of the loaves and fishes is repeated. Mortgages have to be paid, and there is indeed a true satisfaction in their final liquidation; yet the payment of them holds little of romance or adventure. Where the story of Christian Missions is told, men are brought face to face with Christian heroism. They become aware of the redemptive power of Christ in the lives of men and peoples. Perhaps we who are chiefly responsible for the presentation of the missionary challenge have failed to present the cause to our people in such a fashion as to arouse their minds and hearts to the beauty and the duty of sharing Christ with the world whose only Light He is.

We should remember also the results achieved last year in support of the Reconstruction and Advance Fund. The total of our gifts was in excess of \$200,000. Certain Dioceses which contributed larger sums than Newark, did so because of large individual gifts, sometimes in five figures. Newark has few if any persons of really great wealth. The sum we gave is impressive because it was the aggregate of the relatively small gifts of a great company of men and women. It is true that the purpose of the Fund was chiefly the restoration of our war-destroyed mission property. Our people looked upon it as a non-recurring enterprise, yet the point I make is valid.

We had the money and we gave it; our gifts are in some measure an indication of our capacity.

On the other hand it is urged that money is less freely spent and given this year than last. Some add that an economic recession of greater or less degree awaits us. I have little knowledge of such matters, and I doubt the ability of any man to prophesy with certainty of their likelihood. Some congregations are conscious of the importance, perhaps the necessity, of securing larger sums for the maintenance of their local work. They are fearful lest money needed by themselves will be diverted into missionary channels. There is abundant evidence to prove that the call to sacrifice for distant causes deepens the spirit of sacrifice for nearby needs. Timid souls win few victories because they take too great counsel of their fears. Braver souls may sometimes lose a battle but they have their satisfaction. When much is at stake, though they may fail, at least they dare to make the effort. There is no area of the Christian life in which to be complacent with present attainment. We find ourselves fighting all our lives to win the victory over a besetting sin. It may be that we are destined never here to win a decisive victory. Our responsibility is but to press forward unremittingly to the mark which is set before us, distant though it be. So in our corporate life, the goals towards which we strive must always exceed our present accomplishment. Without a vision, Parishes and Dioceses, no less than peoples, perish.

The report of the Finance and Advisory Board will soon be before you. Any Budget which is adopted must be truly yours, yours because with God's help you intend to try to meet it. This is no time for perfunctory action. We must and we shall find time for careful consideration of the report before action is taken. Your approach to your responsibility must be both realistic and courageous.

As realists you must understand that the proposed Budget calls for a greater sum than in any year we have ever raised through pledges. It involves the designation of increased quotas or objectives to every parish and mission, which in turn means that in every congregation we should need both more givers, and larger gifts from each giver, for the furtherance of the Church's program. The realistic approach is the courageous approach. We are aware of difficulties which we always face—the unconverted Christians who with lack of vision have no concern save for their own souls' good, whose apathy seems so ingrained that no appeal arouses them to sensitivity to the wide world's need of Christ. The more fully aware we are of the difficulty of a task the more likely we are to accomplish it, provided we use the strength God so freely gives to those who will use it for His ends. The degree of our zeal for the missionary cause is the true index to our own spiritual health. If we ourselves have truly discovered the unsearchable riches of Christ we cannot rest until we have done all that

lies within our power to share with others the hidden treasures we have found.

The Budget before us calls for a large sum of money. It is well that emphasis should thus be placed upon the primary duty of professing Christians. It is to further an enterprise which is God's idea not ours. In a certain sense the size of the Budget we adopt is of little consequence. Whether it be large or small, the obligation still remains to consecrate ourselves to an honest effort to mobilize all the resources of the Church as fellow workers with a missionary God, a God of compassionate love for this sinful suffering world. Here and there among us are congregations which seem never to have regarded quotas as the measure of their responsibility for the missionary cause. They have found it possible year after year to increase their gifts for missions. There is no one explanation for their success, but it is always the result of consecrated effort.

To such consecrated effort every congregation and every Diocese is called whether quotas and budgets are large or small. Not in this Convention but in your respective congregations is the issue really decided. Consecrated effort is honest effort. Every rector and every vestry is in all honesty bound to inform the Parish the amount of the quota which by authority of the Convention has been designated as the quota for their Parish. To place a lesser objective before the Parish is a violation of the fair play which members of the Diocesan family have a right to expect of one another. Consecrated effort is thorough-going effort. It implies a carefully planned Every Member Canvass which brings home their individual responsibility to every adherent of the congregation. Consecrated effort is united effort. There is no valid reason for the failure of a parish or mission to send its Every Member Canvass chairman to our September conference, for the inspiration and information which the conference through the pooling of experience affords. If further help is needed the Field Department will be of every possible assistance to any congregation where its members may be useful.

Perhaps we have failed in two respects. First we may have substituted concentrated for consecrated effort. No parish will be missionary minded if except for a few weeks in the autumn its work and worship is congregationally centered. It must be more and other than a social club of people who find their association congenial and unexacting. The Church exists for another purpose than the satisfaction of the aesthetic or intellectual appetite of its members. Its ministry of grace is more than a convenient device for the saving of one's own soul. Its gospel is not confined to the proclamation of a code of ethics hardly to be distinguished from the dictates of good breeding. It is locally a fellowship, conscious of its integration in a larger fellowship under a divine imperative to make that fellowship ever more extensive. The consciousness of such a mission ought to color every aspect of parochial life throughout the year. Every sermon will have its implicit

missionary background. The social character of sacramental doctrine must be stressed. Baptism is admission to the covenant of Grace by incorporation into the Body of Christ, every member of which must relate himself to the purpose of its Head which is the establishment of the Kingdom of Heaven in the hearts of men. Confirmation will be urged as the admission of recruits into the fighting ranks of the army of the Lord of Hosts which seeks to extend the territory over which the Lord God reigns. Through the Holy Communion we are united with Christ in sacrifice for the fulfillment of His redemptive work to the uttermost ends of the world. The activities of guilds and clubs must be so planned as to lift their members out of provincial parochialism. Rectors should urge the participation of their people, men, women and children, in diocesan activities, that their horizons may be widened. Not only in polity and doctrine but also in the implications of our faith we must be Catholics, not congregationalists.

Secondly it may be that we have failed to seek God's help in the fulfillment of our responsibility. There is an abundance of promotional material on the essentials of a good Every Member Canvass, the technique of training canvassers, and the like. Such material is valuable. I would be the last to discount the importance of careful preparation for a Canvass. The task is so important that careful human effort is essential for its success. It may be that we have relied upon that effort to the exclusion of a needful corporate supplication for the blessing of God upon our efforts. This autumn I propose that in every parish and mission there shall be prayerful, as well as careful, preparation for our Every Member Canvass. On two successive Sundays previous to the Canvass at the celebration of the Holy Communion let us make an effort to secure Corporate Communion at which there shall be special intercession that we may lift up our eyes and look upon the fields that are white unto harvest. The women of the parish might be urged to attend on the first, the men on the second, of these two Sundays. Let plans be made for the last meeting of every parish organization prior to the Canvass at which, preferably in the Church itself, the privilege of stewardship shall be stressed, followed by a period of devotion. Special Collects, Epistles, and Gospels will be authorized for use at the Holy Communion. Suggestions for addresses at the meetings of parish organizations and for accompanying devotions will be furnished. If desired, we will provide for use by individuals a card bearing a prayer for their daily use during this Week of Devotion. In due time I shall send you further suggestions for its observance; meanwhile I ask you to be thinking of the ways and means by which in our next Canvass we may recognize the fact that it is through and of God's grace alone that we know what things we ought to do and receive the strength for their performance.

The Report of the Program and Budget Committee to our General Convention last year contained these stirring words: "We live in one world—make no mistake about it. Global war has vindicated beyond any peradven-

ture the central emphasis of Jesus, "The field is the world." The missionary program which some in the past have relegated to the realm of the sentimental is, under the pressure of contemporary events and competing ideologies, revealed as utter realism. The brave new world we promised to those who offered their vivid young lives on the altar of sacrifice awaits a greater world evangelization." It is this duty which has prompted the National Council to announce its intention to embark upon a new program which will utilize modern promotional devices to win men to the Church of Christ. If you have read either the secular or the Church press, you have as full knowledge of this program as I possess. There is, however, one observation which I would make in concluding my address. Skillful promotion of a product by insistence upon its worth will ensure initial sales. Men will not continue its use unless its claims to merit are proven true. We may attract men to the Church through promotional devices. We shall not hold them unless they discover that the Church as they know it in their own community possesses vital significance both for them and for society. We are challenged to give proof that as for us and our parishes the Church is not a little group preoccupied with petty and trifling interests but a serious band concerned with the travail of a world and its redemption through the grace and power of our Lord and Master Jesus Christ.

3. *Resolved*, That the Convention approves of the Proposed Budget for 1948 as presented in the report of the Finance and Advisory Board.

4. *Resolved*, That the Finance and Advisory Board be authorized to designate the quota or objective to be asked of each Parish and Mission; said quota to be based upon the average amount of its current expenses for the past six years, modified by its record of missionary giving during the past six years, and other local factors, including the endowments and the indebtedness of the parish.

When the books closed for last year 85 parishes and missions—out of 145—had either met their quotas or exceeded them. From 65 parishes and missions we received \$6,747. more than they had pledged. 11 churches failed by \$568. to meet their pledges, but this figure has since been reduced to 5 with a total of \$123 unpaid. The final figures are very gratifying and show continued progress as total pledges for 1946 were \$138,454. against \$134,213. for 1945.

Pledges for 1947 from 126 churches amount to \$149,600., a splendid showing; with—we regret to say—19 pledges which should have reached us by January 1st still to be received.

The Reverend William L. Griffin, Jr., raised a question in regard to item in Administrative Expense for Chauffeur, and asked if this might not be omitted.

The Chair, as a personal privilege, replied that when notified of his election as Bishop Coadjutor, he was informed that at Bishop Stearly's suggestion provision had been made to furnish him with a chauffeur. Except for a brief period a few years ago he had not availed himself of the provision made, and that the inclusion of the item in the Budget for 1948 had not been suggested by him. He further stated that he had no desire for a chauffeur unless the Diocese wished him to have one, and that he would entertain a motion that the item be stricken from the Budget.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the 1948 Budget toward Administrative Expense be approved.

It was moved, seconded and carried that resolution 2 of the report be approved.

The Proposed Budget for 1948 for the Program of the Diocese and the General Convention was next considered in detail.

The Chairman introduced Mr. Robert D. Jordan, Executive Secretary of the Department of Promotion of the National Council, who spoke on the world-wide picture of the work of the Church, touching upon the various missionary fields with their challenge and opportunities.

He also spoke on the program of evangelism approved by the National Council utilizing the radio, the printed word and advertising medium to reach the unchurched, and those on the fringe of the Church.

The Reverend Gordon T. Jones was then called upon to present the report of The Board of Missions with respect to its budget.

REPORT TO CONVENTION FOR THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

Right Reverend Chairman and Gentlemen of Convention:

With your permission, I would like to speak about that section of the Budget which concerns Missions. Since I was the chairman of the committee to prepare the Asking Budget for the Board of Missions, it is possible that I might be able to give a bit more information than is contained in the cold figures.

It is proper that such information come before Convention because "Convention assembled" is designated by Canon 13 section 1 to be "the Missionary Council of the Diocese". The Board of Missions is the agent of Convention. Convention controls the Board in two ways, first by the choice of its members to serve on the Board, and secondly, by its control of the purse strings. The Board is composed of: The Bishops, the Archdeacons, 12 clergymen, and 12 laymen to a total of 30 members.

Certain powers rest in jurisdiction of the Bishop. These are: (1) To designate the Missions within the Diocese; (2) to appoint Missionaries; and (3) the Bishop is empowered to fix the salary paid to each Vicar.

Some observations may well be made concerning the work being done in the Missionary field of the Diocese.

(1) With respect to communicant strength it is in order to point out that whereas since 1940, *the communicant strength* of the Diocese as a whole has increased by 2%, in that same period the communicant strength of the Missions has increased by 9-7/10%.

(2) Concerning *Mortgage Indebtedness* on Missions of the Diocese in 1939 the mortgage indebtedness amounted to \$314,000.00; by November 1944 this was reduced to \$205,000.00; today (May 1947) the mortgage indebtedness stands at the figure of \$95,000.00. Some of this figure of indebtedness is due to debt on some properties purchased since 1944. There is a gain, therefore, of at least \$219,000.00.

(3) As regards *the jurisdiction* of the Board: there are now under the jurisdiction of the Board of Missions:

52 Missions of which 43 are receiving aid ;

There are 33 Priests ministering to these, and of this number 27 of these Priests are stipendiaries ;

Also, there are six (6) Aided Parishes, having five (5) Priests to minister to them.

In all, there are 58 Missions and Aided Parishes ministered to by 38 Priests.

(4) *Re: attaining self-support.*

Nine of these stations mentioned are expecting to become self-sustaining in the near future. Alphabetically arranged, these are: Bergenfield, Chatham, Fort Lee, Ho-Ho-Kus, Pompton Lakes, Ramsey, Ridgefield Park, Teaneck (St. Mark's), and Woodridge.

In the somewhat less near future, two more are expected to become independent. These are: Verona and Washington.

It is probable that some of our Missions would more quickly become independent were it possible for a clergyman to devote his entire time to one Mission rather than to share his time between two or three stations. Remarkable results are in evidence in certain instances where the full time of a priest has been made available to a particular Mission. Chatham, under the Rev. Mr. Kumm, is one illustration of this.

As concerns some of the Missions within the Board's jurisdiction, let it be said openly that it is unlikely that they will be able to attain independence and self-support in the foreseeable future. This is not in itself cause for discouragement. We may, rather, rejoice that we are fulfilling our Lord's desire that "the poor still have the Gospel preached to them", cost what it may.

(5) *Re: Spread of salaries of stipendiaries.*

The Board's Budget for 1947, approved by last year's Convention, appropriated \$62,300, of which sum \$43,500 is now being devoted to salaries. The spread of salaries of stipendiaries is given in three categories:

(a) From \$2,100. to \$3,300. plus living quarters ;

(b) From \$2,100. to \$4,080. where no living quarters are provided ;

(c) In Aided Parishes, from \$2,000. to \$2,700.

It is the desire of the Board to establish a minimum stipend for married Priests of \$2,700. plus suitable living quarters. When the local congregations shall have assumed as much of this increased stipend as they possibly can, it is expected that the Board will need an additional \$5,000. to make effective in 1948 this minimum stipend. Twenty-nine Priests (29) now serving in our mission work will thereby receive a much-needed and well-deserved increase in stipend.

Under the item of stipends, the budget before you includes a sum of \$5,000. for two additional clergymen in 1948. More men are needed to take advantage of some of the opportunities confronting us.

We suggest that Convention make provision, under the sum asked for stipends, for these two items: A minimum salary of \$2,700. plus living quarters for a married Priest, and also for two (2) additional clergymen. Hence the item for stipend appears as \$53,500.00 for 1948.

To examine the Asking Budget further,

Item 2, Rents, etc. The Board is paying this year the sum of \$5,800. An additional sum of \$700. is being asked to provide rentals for the two additional Priests hoped for. Hence that item comes to \$6,500.

Item 3 of the Budget—Taxes now being paid on property in Vailsburg and Ridgewood amount to \$325. Provision in the sum of \$75.00 is being made for increased taxes on these properties. Hence, the figure of \$400.

Item 4 of the Budget—Motor Allowances. In the present operating budget, the sum of \$5,000. is now provided to cover the cost of insuring, operating, and maintaining a fleet of 21 cars that have been in use for seven or more years.

Where a Priest serves one Mission, no car is provided nor is an allowance for a car made, regardless of how much driving he may do in his work for the Mission. However, where a Priest ministers to *more than one* Mission, a car is provided and an allowance (based upon the distance between the Missions) is provided. There are inequities here. The hope is that provision will be made to correct the most noticeable of these inequities. The spread of these allowances is from \$3.00 per month up to a maximum of \$30.00 per month. The Asking Budget requests an increase of \$3,300. to permit a minimum operating allowance of \$25.00 per month per car.

Furthermore, it is the hope of the Board that Convention will see the necessity of replacing this fleet which is rapidly wearing out. We are asking that 1/5 of the fleet be replaced in 1948 at a cost of \$4,000.00.

These figures under Motor Allowance total the sum of \$12,300.00.

Items 5 & 6 of the Budget—For Insurance and Contingencies, respectively, are the same amounts as appear in the Budget approved by the Convention last year.

Total: \$74,000.00.

If this Asking Budget is approved by the Convention, which is after all "the Missionary Council of the Diocese" some forward steps may be taken in 1948.

(1) Surveys are now in progress at Dumont looking toward a possible re-location and strengthening of our work in Dumont; and

(2) At New Milford and River Edge where more than one thousand substantial homes have been constructed recently and where no work is being done by any church within the knowledge of the Board. (These three locations are in Bergen County.)

(3) Another forward step might well be taken by responding to a request that our church send in a clergyman to do the highly specialized type of ministry that needs to be done at the state institution, Greystone Park, in Morris Plains. One skilled in this type of ministry could be placed in charge of our Mission and work out of Morris Plains. (This is Morris County.)

(4) In the northern section of Passaic County, at Stonetown, our church alone is ministering to the spiritual needs of the people in the mountains by services held by one of our Priests in the homes of the people. There is no church building there. At Lakes Erskine and Cupsaw, there are all-year-round communities without benefit of the church.

The Board of Missions may well be expected to seize some or all of these opportunities, or perhaps other opportunities, if the Convention wills it.

It is inconceivable that Convention will be content to "hold the line" when there is so much to be done.

To prepare an Asking Budget twelve months in advance is a difficult undertaking. It is impossible to make mention of every last detail that goes into making that budget. But this one thing is certain—so far as the members of the committee that prepared this Asking Budget are concerned, this Budget is a fair, honest, and very-much-needed Budget. It is our hope that the Budget for the Board of Missions will meet with the approval of Convention.

Dean Lichtenberger, speaking as the President of the Youth Consultation Service, explained the reasons for the increased budget of this agency of the Diocese. He emphasized that the ever-increasing demands on the Y.C.S. makes the increased budget necessary, and he also explained that there is an increase in the number of members of the Episcopal Church being served each year.

The Reverend George E. Rath, Chairman of the Board of Religious Education, spoke on the asking budget for this Department, and stated that part of the increase is due to the increase in the stipend of the Executive Secretary now paid by the Board which was formerly paid by the Cathedral Chapter for part-time work as Rector of St. Paul's Church of Newark. Also that a Committee of the Finance and Advisory Board had recommended that the Newark Churchman be increased in size and in number of issues, thus increasing the amount needed for its publication.

Mr. Capron asked if the budget for the Promotional Department of the National Council as outlined earlier by Mr. Jordan is in excess of the sum listed in the Budget now under consideration.

Mr. Jordan replied that the money to finance the proposed campaign of Evangelism is not included in the Budget, but that each parish may be asked to make a 3% additional payment for this program.

It was moved and seconded that Resolution 3 of the Report—"Resolved, That the Convention approves of the Proposed Budget of \$241,772 for 1948 as presented in the report of the Finance and Advisory Board." be adopted.

Mr. William J. Parker, for St. Clement's Church, Hawthorne, offered the following amendment:—

"Resolved, That the Convention instruct the Finance and Advisory Board to add the item of \$55,000.00 to the Proposed Budget for 1948 for the purpose of making the contribution of The Diocese of Newark to the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief, and that the share of each Parish and Mission in this item becomes a part of its regular Quota."

The Chair ruled that the amendment thus offered would be placed on the Calendar.

The Reverend James A. Mitchell spoke saying that he has listened with sympathy to all of the appeals made for the various increases in the Budgets, but called attention to the fact that it means a 34% increase on Quotas, and also an increase in Diocesan Assessment, and he asked that the Convention be realistic in its approach to the increases to be asked of each congregation of the Diocese for 1948.

The Reverend Richard Aselford, speaking from the standpoint of a small Parish, asked why the Board of Missions should request a larger appropriation for Missionaries' stipends of \$2,700. minimum when some of the smaller and assisted Parishes will be unable to bring the Priests' minimum up to that level.

The Chairman thereupon explained that the resolution of the Board of Missions is an effort to bring all stipends for married Priests up to \$2,700. and should the resolution be acted upon favorably by the Convention it would become a moral responsibility for every Parish to meet the minimum standard.

Noon having arrived the debate was interrupted, and noon-day prayers were said by the Suffragan Bishop.

The Bishop now asked that a time be placed for voting on the Budget.

It was moved and carried that time be set at 12.35 o'clock.

The Reverend Richard Hatch spoke in support of the amendment on World Relief.

The Reverend Elmer Francis stated that it seems doubtful if he and his delegates can return to their Parish and ask for an increase of \$3,000. in their quota.

The Reverend Messrs. Hubbs and Nye also spoke on the difficulty confronting their Parishes in accepting the minimum stipend proposal.

It was moved, seconded and carried that vote on the Budget be postponed, and that recess for luncheon be taken.

The Chair announced that the Convention would reassemble at one-fifty o'clock.

The Convention reassembled at the prescribed hour with the Bishop of the Diocese in the Chair.

Dean Lichtenberger, Chairman of the Committee on Certificates of Lay Deputies, presented the following report:—

**REPORT OF COMMITTEE APPOINTED BY THE BISHOP TO CONSIDER
THE CERTIFICATES OF ELECTION OF LAY DEPUTIES ABOUT
WHICH QUESTION HAD ARISEN.**

Your Committee has been asked about the legality of the election of women from certain Parishes of the Diocese as Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention.

We call your attention to the following provisions in the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese:

Article 4, Section 1. "The Convention shall be composed of both clergymen and laymen."

Section 3, Canon 10. "Deputies shall be elected by each congregation from the male communicants thereof."

Canon 10, Section 6. "No person shall be eligible for Deputy or Alternate Deputy to the Diocesan Convention who is not a male communicant in good standing and a qualified voter in the Parish holding the election."

Canon 16, Section 8. "No person shall be eligible for the office of Deputy or Alternate Deputy to the Diocesan Convention who is not a male communicant in good standing and a qualified voter in the mission holding the election."

In the opinion of your Committee, therefore, the women who have been chosen as Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention are not qualified.

The Chair ruled that in accordance with the Committee's report women so elected are not competent to sit as delegates to this Convention.

Debate on the Budget resumed.

The Reverend Mr. Mitchell offered the following amendment, which was duly seconded:—

"Be It Resolved, that the increase in the proposed Budget for 1948 be no greater than 25% over the 1947 Budget, and that the Finance and Advisory Board is instructed and empowered to make the necessary adjustments."

The Reverend Elwood Boggess asked what is the return as a result of our contribution for the New Jersey Council of Churches.

The Suffragan Bishop answered, and called attention to report of the Council as printed and distributed at this Convention.

Mr. Capron spoke against the Mitchell amendment, stating there is no magic in either a 25% or a 34% increase, and that this is not the proper approach to a serious problem. The National Council has made an effort to let us know what is required to maintain the work of the Church under its jurisdiction, and the Finance and Advisory Board has made known the

The Reverend Mr. Weber moved, seconded and carried that the nomination of the Reverend L. A. C. Pitcaithly for Board of Social Service be changed to the Class of 1948 to fill a vacancy.

The Reverend Mr. Boggess nominated Mr. Albert W. Bayard, All Saints, Orange, for the Standing Committee, Class of 1951.

The Reverend Herbert H. Cooper asked permission to withdraw as a nominee for Finance and Advisory Board, Class of 1950.

Mr. Worfolk offered the following resolution, seconded and unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That unanimous consent be given by this Convention to the suspension of the rules of elections, and the casting by the Secretary of one ballot for each of the following nominees on the Ballot, where there is no contest; namely: For Standing Committee—Mr. Henry T. Stetson; for Finance and Advisory Board—Mr. Wilson W. Stearly, and Ven. Leonard F. Nichols; for Board of Missions and Church Extension—Messrs. C. Alfred Burhorn, Henry J. Russell, Herbert M. Wilson and Fleetwood Lanneau; for Treasurer of Convention—Mr. Albert H. Baldwin; for Ecclesiastical Court—Rev'd James N. MacKenzie and Rev'd J. Fred Hamblin; for Provincial Synod, Class 1948—Rev'd Albert F. Chillson; for Provincial Commission on Religious Education—Rev'd A. Stewart Hogenauer; for Board of Social Service—Rev'd Richard Aselford, Rev'd Charles A. Mosby and Rev'd Andrew McC. Van Dyke, Class of 1950; and Rev'd L. A. C. Pitcaithly, Class 1948; for Trinity Cathedral Chapter—Rev'd John E. Bailey and Mr. Louis A. Douglass.

The Polls were opened at 2:42 o'clock and closed at 2:50 o'clock.

The Twelfth Annual Convention Address of the Suffragan Bishop, the Right Reverend Theodore R. Ludlow, D.D., LL.D., was made at this time.

THE TWELFTH ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE SUFFRAGAN BISHOP.

Last year our great effort was to do our share for the Reconstruction and Advance Fund and at the time of our last Convention we had received \$169,000. I am happy to be able to report that this sum has since grown to approximately \$206,000., if the remaining pledges are paid. This sum was raised last year, in addition to our quota of \$60,000. for the work of the National Council, at a cost of only \$577.00. This splendid result was made possible because the staff at the Diocesan House gave themselves unstintingly through many extra hours of work, and thereby made it unnecessary to employ outside help. We are grateful for their sacrificial offering for

this purpose. Now we must face our responsibility for the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief.

In our effort to meet this need and to provide for the work of the Church, we must remember that the real blessing will come to us out of our own sacrifice and not from preying upon the cupidity of others through games of chance or schemes by which people hope to get something for almost nothing. It has come to my attention that some Parishes are growing careless and have forgotten the action of this Convention in 1936 when it passed a resolution disapproving of games or schemes of chance and pointing out to us our responsibility for maintaining a strictly Christian standard of giving. That resolution is binding upon the conscience of every one of us. We are delighted that St. Thomas' Church, Lyndhurst, by the unanimous action of its Vestry, has resolved that it will not raise any of its monies by games of chance of any kind. It is an example which every Parish and Mission could follow to great advantage, not only in word but in deed.

Bishop Washburn has outlined for us the desperate need of the world and has called us to the duty of meeting that need. As proven by our response to the Reconstruction and Advance Fund, his call will not fall upon indifferent ears. It may, however, fall upon ears that are distracted by uncertainty and irritation. Until we can face that distraction and irritation rationally, we will not give as we should. It is because of this distraction that I mention two problems which bother us. We Americans are sorely irritated at the present time because we have two adolescents on our hands—Labor and Russia. We have moods when we would like to thrash them both because they throw their weight around without regard for others. We must restrain ourselves, however, and remember that adolescence is an opportunity as well as an irritation.

In spite of certain surface appearances, we are making some progress with our own adolescent, Labor. Considering the high-handed ways in which corporations have acted in the past and of the way in which some few powerful corporations still act today, it is not surprising that Labor has reacted with equal wilfulness and with little regard for the public convenience. Labor is now anxiously trying to avoid a visit to the legislative woodshed because of its wilfulness. It is one thing to be impatient with Labor. It is a much more important thing to face the problem with quiet sanity and to ask how Labor came to act as it does and how it can be given a sense of security in a day of kaleidoscopic change. Labor sees its security and its social customs radically changed by world developments and strenuously objects. That is a natural human reaction.

All men crave fellowship and Labor is no exception. Industrial machinery tends to disrupt human fellowship and make men impersonal and, therefore, Labor instinctively reacts for its own protection. It is not simply the money

involved that causes Labor unrest, in spite of what some people would have us think. Men do not work just for wages, but they work for a sense of worth and of belonging. Big business is economically efficient today because profit is at stake, but it is not socially efficient, because it does not yet see that there, too, a profit is at stake. It does not ask what kind of social life its industrial efficiency produces. When we progress technically, we do so at the expense of other values, and one of these values is the sense of social fellowship, of belonging. When that is threatened, the instinct for fellowship seeks to maintain itself through unionism.

As Christians, we must be just as efficient socially as we are industrially. God is interested in men and not in industrial efficiency, except as that ministers to the needs of men. Paternalism on the part of either management or government is not a satisfactory substitute for a sense of common responsibility. The trouble with us is that we have disintegrated the atom before we have integrated humanity. Our technical efficiency is greater than our social interest or skill. We have tried to make men adjuncts of our technical skill instead of realizing that our technical skill is a God-given attribute for helping men to live together with one another in real fellowship.

Labor is slowly growing up and is becoming increasingly conscious of the duty of giving to the labor movement a responsible leadership. In his Presidential Report of 1945, Dr. Conant of Harvard stated that 11 unions had sent 38 officers to Harvard in the preceding four years for training in executive capacity. This particular effort does not solve the immediate difficulty, but it does give evidence of a developing sense of responsibility and justifies patience with this adolescent. Unionism is a socially necessary and legal part of our everyday living, and the sooner some management and some Church people recognize that fact, the sooner we will be able to rob the labor racketeer of his power, and be able to discipline all parties who try to profit by industrial warfare.

At the present time, it does not look as if our other adolescent, Russia, was making progress in the right direction, but that is no reason why we should join the hue and cry of certain interested parties who find Russia a stumbling block in the way of their military, economic and ecclesiastical designs and are all out to "stop Russia".

I hold no brief for Russia, but I do believe that history can teach us many things if we will substitute thought for irritation. Recently, in commenting upon the world situation, Mr. Baruch said, "Let us never forget this: our unrest is the heart of their success." Communism thrives upon discontent arising out of injustices and the attempt to compel compliance with a policy which has little regard for those who do not profit by or share in the policy. The fact that Russia herself is guilty of using the same method does not alter the result wherein the little man confronted by two

power policies complies with the one which seems to be controlled by little men rather than by big interests or by force.

President Roosevelt was a known friend of the military, but he had the good judgment to keep foreign policy under civilian control. Today we have as President a former captain of artillery who is deeply influenced by the military mind. He has replaced a civilian Secretary of State with a general, the Under-Secretary will be replaced in July by a former War Department official, and there will be others. With the age-old technique of crisis pressure, the President is calling for the use of military force in the Near East.

This Truman policy is called an effort to help democracy among the Greeks, but it smells of oil and is acknowledged as a deliberate effort to stop Russia. Such a policy will inevitably stiffen Russian determination to instigate further Communistic activities in all lands so as to combat our unilateral action.

The next step will be a concerted and determined drive in this country to put over universal military conscription in peace time. It will be urged as necessary to meet the crisis, even though the deadline put before Congress has already passed without the world falling apart. Conscription in peace time will be sprinkled with rose water and called education, but the principle once admitted to practice, the succeeding steps are matters of history in other countries. This is the kind of practice we once loudly denounced in Germany and Japan.

If we plunge into this policy, we will not only reverse our own way of life, but we will render ourselves untrustworthy in building the one world for which men have died. It will not only fly in the face of man's experience in human history, but it will undermine the whole purpose and effort of the United Nations.

Why should we expect this new cordon sanitaire which the United States now proposes to build around Russia to be any more successful in 1947 than was the one built by the Allies in 1919? Any attempt to build a Chinese wall around ideas only renders them more explosive and destructive.

What then should we do? I believe that we should support all-out aid for Greece and for any country similarly situated, but under civilian auspices. I believe that we should refuse to take any unilateral action without the previous knowledge and consent of the United Nations. I believe that our primary responsibility is the moral leadership of the world and not the military. To that end, we should make a serious effort to enlist our young people in the definite task of going to the ends of the earth as Christian businessmen, educators, doctors, nurses and missionaries. If we give our sons and daughters for this purpose, we will not have much difficulty in raising our missionary quota. We have got to show our good intentions by sharing and by serving and not by compulsion. "Be not overcome of evil but overcome evil with good," so said a wise Christian strategist who faced a world very similar to our own.

Such a policy bears fruit in world cooperation. The aid given to our troops in the South Pacific by missionary-trained natives is now an old story. But the fruits are appearing also in peacetime. For example, China has 86 secretaries working with the United Nations Organization. Approximately one-third of them, or 29 to be exact, are graduates of 13 Christian colleges in China. Six of these 29 are from our own St. John's University in Shanghai and 2 are from Hua Chung University in Wuchang. So, of the one-third of the total number of secretaries who are Chinese Christian graduates carrying on the work of the United Nations, approximately one-third of these are from our own two missionary colleges. These men and women are helping to shape the future of the whole world. Here is where our opportunity and our responsibility lie rather than in the use of force.

A final reason for facing the Russians with a policy of world service is the realization that their own Church failed them in their time of need, because it remained silent in the face of injustice and inequality. There is a warning for us there. Under the circumstances, it is not to be wondered at that the Government in power in Russia has little use for the Church or for Christian principles. Without the influence of those Christian principles, Russia has no interest in persons, except as they minister to material ends. The only way she will be convinced of any other way of life will be by a demonstration of service and not by a threat of force.

The problems confronting the Church at this time require much more common prayer and thought than we devote to them. When we meet together as a body, too much of our time is taken up with legislation and organization. We do not have time to think together before we act. Last month, I attended a meeting of the House of Bishops of the Province of New York and New Jersey which was called to consider the report of a committee appointed at the last Synod to study the structure and function of the Synod. This is not the place to anticipate the details of that report, but the reaction of the Bishops to it can be summarized by saying that our conclusion was that the Synod in its present set-up is merely one more manifestation of the current introversion of the Episcopal Church and its preoccupation with its own organization. In the face of the desperate need of the world for spiritual guidance, we spend too much time with details of organization and with tinkering with Canons. The primary task of the Church is to win men to Christ and not to weary them with the maintenance of mere mechanism.

Potentially, the Synod is a conference for considering problems and tasks which affect our common life or are too large to be faced by single Dioceses. It is the hope of the Synod committee that the next Synod, which will be held in Syracuse on October 21 and 22, will seriously face its evangelistic responsibility and will resolve itself into a kind of conference body that can really grapple with spiritual and moral problems, and not spend its energy on machinery.

I have heard it cynically said that the Synod deputies are those who are not General Convention timber. That is not only unkind, but it is also untrue. Any man who thinks or votes on that basis is doing his Church a rank injustice. There is no clergyman and no layman in this Diocese who is too big to be elected a deputy to the Synod. I believe that Synod experience should be a pre-requisite to election as a deputy to the General Convention. I believe in this so sincerely that I am prepared to recommend the passing of a Canon by this Convention establishing that requirement, if it is necessary. But I am sure that the Convention of this Diocese will need no such legal prod but will, of its own accord both now and in the future, by nomination from the floor if necessary, see to it that our ablest men are sent to represent us at the Synod.

For 18 years, the General Convention has struggled with the problem of strengthening and safe-guarding Christian marriage. The problem is to give pastoral care to our people and not simply to provide some way of punishing them if they go wrong. The real effort of the Church must be centered upon discharging its responsibility for maintaining Christian marriage and not upon passing rules which will allow this or that person to marry. The real attack upon the problem must be launched in the parish, and not at the top ecclesiastical level. Three or four years of energetic and persistent teaching and scrupulous application of Christian teaching on the parish level would do more to solve this problem than many General Conventions. Over and over again, we must instruct our people as to what the Church means by the solemnization of matrimony. That is the duty of every parish priest.

Our task is to prevent the problem rather than to solve it. A thorough job of prevention will do much to solve it. As an aid in the accomplishment of this task, I believe it would be timely for this Convention to authorize the creation of a suitable committee to work in conference with the Bishop in the preparation of a manual, briefly setting forth the teachings of the Church on this subject, and the Canonical provisions pertaining thereto, as well as furnishing suitable forms to be filled out by applicants for the Solemnization of Holy Matrimony, and a suitable declaration of intention to be signed by such applicants.

It has been proposed that we should have a minimum salary for the clergy of this Diocese, and that is a step in the right direction, but I believe that the time has come when we should go beyond a minimum salary and consider a basic salary for all clergy. The voice of the Church will be heard with much more authority if its own affairs are conducted upon a more equitable basis. At the present time, clerical salaries are on a competitive basis rather than on the Christian basis of providing each worker with what is necessary for reasonable living. This competitive basis drains financially weaker parishes and fields that are, nevertheless, real opportunities for service and may offer even more strategic opportunities for leadership than the

financially competent parish has to offer. So-called strong parishes, because of their financial condition, command what services they wish and pay what salaries they desire to secure what they wish. They do not always take into consideration their responsibility toward the weaker parishes or the effect of their own policy upon the leadership of the whole Church. Much-needed missionary work is afflicted with a psychological discount because it does not show up well on this competitive basis.

Why should two clergymen in approximately the same area draw different salaries? Is it because of larger numerical responsibility? If so, the solution of that problem is to provide more clergymen so as to take care of the larger number, rather than a bigger salary for the man who theoretically covers a larger number. There is a physical limit to the capacity of the individual priest, even if sometimes there may not seem to be a limit to his financial receptivity. We are not in the ministry for the money that we get out of it. It was because the husbandman in the parable of our Lord recognized the necessity of a living wage for all workers, irrespective of the number of hours of work that they had done, that he paid the same wage to all of his workers. I believe that there should be a basic salary for all men in a given area to be augmented on the basis of the number of years of service given, plus his financial responsibility for dependents. This is the basis on which all of our missionary work is done.

Our present competitive system creates inequities during the active ministry of a man, and continues them after retirement. The man who gets a good salary during his active ministry is able to retire with a larger pension than the man who has received a smaller salary, and yet the latter may have given every bit as much service in just as strategic a field as the former. The man who conscientiously sticks to a poorly-paid job gets a poor pension in return. This has come very close home to me personally this year in the retirement of my brother-in-law. We were classmates in the seminary; we went to the foreign mission field together. By his own choice, he spent most of his life in the foreign mission field, while I, through no choice of my own, was only able to spend five years of my ministry in the foreign field. This February, he and my sister were retired on the munificent pension of \$845 per year after 35 years of faithful service in the mission field.

Such a method may be actuarially sound, but it is not Christian. I have been told that the Pension Fund cannot do anything about it because it started the Pension Fund on the pledge of an actuarial system and with the understanding that, if the original sum was subscribed, it would not appeal for any more money. If this alleged promise exists, I do not believe that it would or should stand in the way of the Church adding to the Pension Fund whatever might be necessary to see that each man retired with a reasonable living competence if the proper request was made. The Church must shoulder the blame, because it is content to go along with this com-

petitive system. It is bad for the Church because it compels men to keep on working after the time when their physical and mental powers have ceased to be at their best. It is bad for the Church because it prevents the younger men from growing up into responsibilities which should be theirs, but which are held on to by men who are obliged to do so in order to meet the expense of living.

I believe that we should adopt for the whole Church the method of salary payment which now prevails in the mission field, whereby all men start at a basic salary which is augmented by the number of years of service and the number of dependents. On some such basis, a man is not continually looking for something better, because he knows that he is in the same situation as every other fellow worker and that he and his loved-ones will be taken care of properly after his years of active service are over. It will prevent that spiritual death which too frequently overtakes a young man who enters the ministry with unselfish ideals, but finds that he must compete if his family is to live.

A scheme of basic salaries would do away with the ability of some vestries to get the man they want by paying a high price for him, even if they did so at the cost of contributing less to the missionary work of the Church. I do not mean to imply that they would deliberately do this, but such an arrangement does inevitably cut into the giving capacity of the congregation. But supremely, it would demonstrate to the world that we believe what we say when we speak of sharing. One cannot imagine that either St. Paul or St. Peter received more financial return than the other apostles. Their strength was gladly given to a common enterprise commonly shared in.

In spite of whatever inequities exist, it is a testimony to the good character of our clergy that they carry on with loyalty and sacrifice. Many of them are willing to take on extra burdens which are not a real part of their immediate task. Space does not permit of enumerating what I have in mind, but I can give one instance by way of illustration. We have in our Diocese the Bergen Pines Sanatorium. For well over two years, the Rector of the Church of the Annunciation in Oradell has been carrying on weekly ministrations at the Sanatorium with the help of two of the neighboring clergy. I mention it not simply to commend it as an example of faithful service, but also to point out the imperative need of recruiting more men for the ministry in order that our men may not have to take on double responsibilities.

When I speak of recruiting for the ministry, I mean drawing from our own people and not from other Dioceses by offering higher pay. This Diocese should be producing the major part of its own clergy and not be dependent upon those produced by other Dioceses or other Christian communions. At the present time, there is an absolute need of 660 new priests for work already started in the foreign mission field and for 1,450 priests

to carry on work already started in the home field. This need is something that should challenge every one of us here. The world's need is only going to be met by a vigorous and deliberate outthrust of Christian effort, and not by a fearful fortifying of the boundaries of our material well-being. When we pray "Thy Kingdom come", we must mean it in the sense that it is to come through us and our efforts, and not that it is something that is to happen in spite of us or because we are desperately afraid.

What about your son? What about the boy in your Church School class? Have you challenged him with the need of the world and the opportunity of the ministry? It comes right home to each one of us. The Kingdom of God will come not through the clever schemes of men, but through the surrender of men to God's purpose. If the Church is alive and on fire with that purpose, the gates of hell shall not prevail against it.

The Chair commended the good work of the Committee on Laymen's Work, and since the practice of rotation is used the following members whose terms expire in June were called forward, and were presented with a volume, "The Christian Answer". Messrs. J. M. Arnold, Merritt F. Farren, Fleetwood Lanneau, Austin S. Murray, J. Clarke Onderdonk and Morris Sayre.

The following report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons was presented:—

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND CANONS.

To the Reverend Clergy and Lay Deputies to the Convention:

I.

Concerning the Amendment of Canon 6

At the last Diocesan Convention the following resolution, offered by the Reverend Andrew Van Dyke, was adopted (Journal of 1946, page 74):

"WHEREAS, the Suffragan Bishop has suggested that there should be wider representation on the Finance and Advisory Board,

Therefore Be It Resolved, that the Finance and Advisory Board invite the President of the Woman's Auxiliary and the Chairman of the Youth Commission to sit with the Board during the coming year.

And Be It Further Resolved, that the Committee on Constitution and Canons prepare for presentation to the Convention of 1947 amendments to Canon 6 which will give the said President of the Woman's Auxiliary and Chairman of the Youth Commission ex-officio standing on the Board."

Pursuant to said resolution, your Committee has framed and presents herewith form of a resolution to amend Canon 6 as provided in said resolution. It has also been recommended, as hereinafter mentioned, that the term "Board of Christian Social Service" should be changed to "Board of Christian Social Relations" so as to conform to the nomenclature now in use by The National Council. The form of resolution which follows also makes this change.

"Resolved, That Canon 6, §I, the first paragraph of subdivision (1), is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

'(1.) There shall be a Finance and Advisory Board consisting of the Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor, the Suffragan Bishop, if there be one, the President of the Standing Committee, the Vice President of the Board of Missions and Church Extension, the Chairman of the Board of Religious Education, the Chairman of the Board of Christian Social [Service] Relations, the President of the Newark Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to The National Council, the Chairman of the Youth Commission, and the Treasurer of the Convention, ex-officio; also twelve other persons, who shall represent as far as possible the recognized organizations of the Diocese, one-half of whom shall be elected by the Convention and one-half appointed by the Bishop.'"

Your Committee is of the opinion that it is appropriate and desirable that the President of the Woman's Auxiliary should become a member of the Finance and Advisory Board. It would recommend, however, that for the time being the Chairman of the Youth Commission should be invited to sit with that Board, but that pending experience in the development of work among the young people of the Church, he should not be made a member of that Board. Attention is called to the fact that there is a Youth Committee of the Board of Religious Education in addition to the Youth Commission. The latter commission was created only a year or two ago and has no canonical standing. Your Committee is informed that sufficient time has not yet elapsed to determine the scope of the work which should be undertaken by that Commission. Accordingly, your Committee recommends the adoption of a resolution reading as follows:

"Resolved, That Canon 6, §I, the first paragraph of subdivision (1), is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

NOTE: All matter to be omitted is included in brackets; all new matter being added is underscored.

'(1.) There shall be a Finance and Advisory Board consisting of the Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor, the Suffragan Bishop, if there be one, the President of the Standing Committee, the Vice President of the Board of Missions and Church Extension, the Chairman of the Board of Religious Education, the Chairman of the Board of Christian Social [Service] Relations, the President of the Newark Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to The National Council, and the Treasurer of the Convention, ex-officio; also twelve other persons, who shall represent as far as possible the recognized organizations of the Diocese, one-half of whom shall be elected by the Convention and one-half appointed by the Bishop.'"

If the foregoing resolution is adopted, subdivision (2) of §I of Canon 6 should also be amended so as to change the reference to "the Board of Christian Social Service" to "the Board of Christian Social Relations" and to make provision for the submission of regular reports not only by the other ex-officio members of the Board, but by the President of the Newark Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to The National Council. Your Committee, therefore, submits the following resolution:

"Resolved, That Canon 6, §I, subdivision (2), is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

'(2.) This Board shall be the agent of the Convention for the unification, simplification, and development of the work of the Church through the various organizations and institutions now existing or which may hereafter be created. To this end, each of the following ex-officio members of the Board, namely, the Vice President of the Board of Missions and Church Extension, the Chairman of the Board of Religious Education, [and] the Chairman of the Board of Christian

Social [Service] Relations, and the President of the Newark Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to The National Council, shall report regularly at such times as the Finance and Advisory Board may determine on the work of his own Board. This Board shall also act as adviser to the Bishop in financial and other matters, and upon request, to individual Parishes within the Diocese.'"

It was moved, seconded and carried that the recommendation of the Committee on Constitution and Canons amending Canon 6 as aforementioned be adopted.

II.

Concerning the Amendment of Canon 18

Your Committee has been advised by the Secretary of the Board of Christian Social Service of the Diocese of Newark that at a meeting held on February 17, 1947 the following resolution was adopted:

"Be It Resolved, that the Board of Christian Social Service recommend to the Convention of the Diocese of Newark the following changes in Canon 18:

1. The title of the Canon shall read, instead of 'Of the Board of Christian Social Service', 'Of the Board of Christian Social Relations'. And, wherever in the Canon the term 'Christian Social Service', is used, it be changed to 'Christian Social Relations'; and where the term 'Social Service' is used, it shall be changed to 'Social Relations'.

2. Paragraph II shall be changed to read, "The duty of the Diocesan Board of Christian Social Relations shall be the study of Social and Industrial conditions, and the initiation, unification and development of the social work of the Church."

Our attention has also been called to the fact that in order to bring Canon 18 into conformity with the nomenclature used by the National Council and the Ordinances of the Province (Ordinance 6) where reference is made to "the Department of Christian Social Service of the Presiding Bishop and Council" there should be substituted "the Division of Christian Social Relations of the National Council", and that the term "Provincial Board of Christian Social Relations" should be substituted for "Provincial Commission on Social Service".

To carry out these changes and those recommended by the Diocesan Board of Christian Social Service, we have framed the following resolution:

"Resolved, (1) Canon 18, the title, is hereby amended to read 'Of the Board of Christian Social [Service] Relations'.

(2) Canon 18, §I, the first paragraph, is hereby amended so as to read:

'§I. The Diocesan Board of Christian Social [Service] Relations shall consist of the Bishop of the Diocese, who shall be, ex-officio the President; the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, who shall be, ex-officio, the Vice-President; the Suffragan Bishop, if there be one, and the Canon Missioner for Christian Social [Service] Relations, if there be one, who shall be ex-officio members of the Board, together with not more than twenty-six other members, to be elected or appointed as follows:'

(3) Canon 18, §II, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

'§II. The duty of the Diocesan Board of Christian Social [Service] Relations shall be the study of Social and Industrial conditions, and the initiation, unification and development of [the Social Service work of the Church therein] *the work of the Church pertaining to Social Relations.*

The Board shall cooperate with the [Department of Christian Social Service of the Presiding Bishop and Council] *Division of Christian Social Relations of the National Council*, and the Provincial [Commission on Social Service] *Board of Christian Social Relations*. It shall annually submit its budget to the Finance and Advisory Board, and shall report at every annual Diocesan Convention as to its work and the disposition of all funds.'

It was moved, seconded and carried that the words "within the Diocese" be omitted from §II.

(4) Canon 18, §III, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

'§III. The Board shall have power to nominate to the Bishop some Clergyman to be appointed by him the Executive Secretary of Christian Social [Service] *Relations* for the Diocese. He shall hold office during the pleasure of the Board, and his salary be paid by the Board. He shall be, ex-officio, a member of the Board and shall have a seat in the Convention of the Diocese.'

Your Committee recommends the adoption of the foregoing resolution.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the recommendation of the Committee on Constitution and Canons amending Canon 18 as aforementioned be adopted.

III.

Concerning Amendments to the Constitution of the General Convention, which Amendments were proposed at the General Convention of 1946 and which are to be finally acted upon at the Convention of 1949

There has been referred to your Committee the communication received from the Secretary of the House of Deputies, concerning the amendments to the Constitution which were proposed to the General Convention of 1946 and which, by resolve thereof, were directed to be sent to the Ecclesiastical Authorities of every Diocese and to the Secretary of the Convention of every Diocese. The amendments proposed were as follows:

ARTICLE I, Sec. 4, fourth paragraph, was proposed to be amended to read as follows:

"On any question the vote of a majority of the Deputies present shall suffice, unless otherwise ordered by this Constitution, or, in cases not specifically provided for by the Constitution, by Canons requiring more than a majority, or unless the Clerical or the Lay representation from any Diocese require that the vote be taken by orders. In all cases of a vote by orders, the two orders shall vote separately, each Diocese having one vote in the Clerical order and one in the Lay order, and each Missionary District having a one-fourth vote in the Clerical order and a one-fourth vote in the Lay order; and the concurrence of the votes of the two orders shall be necessary to constitute a vote of the House. No action of either order shall pass in the affirmative unless it receives the majority of all votes cast, and unless the sum of all the affirmative votes shall exceed the sum of [other] all of the negative votes by at least one whole vote. *Where the vote of a Diocese in either order is equally divided, one-half of such vote shall be recorded as cast in the affirmative and one-half in the negative.*"

ARTICLE II. (a) It is proposed that this be amended by the addition of a new section to read as follows:

"Sec. 7. It shall be lawful for the House of Bishops to elect a Suffragan Bishop who, under the direction of the Presiding Bishop, shall be in charge of the work of those chaplains in the Armed Forces of the United States who are

ordained ministers of this Church. The Suffragan Bishop so elected shall be consecrated and hold office under such conditions and limitations other than those provided in this article as may be provided by Canons of the General Convention. He shall be eligible as Bishop or Bishop Coadjutor or Suffragan Bishop of a Diocese or he may be elected by the House of Bishops as a Missionary Bishop."

(b) It is further proposed to renumber the present Sec. 7 of ARTICLE II as Sec. 8.

IV.

Concerning the Publicizing of Proposed Amendments

Your Committee has taken cognizance of the following resolution offered by the Rev. John E. Bailey at the Convention of 1946, which resolution was referred to your Committee:

"THAT WHEREAS, some years ago a resolution was adopted by the Convention authorizing the Committee on Constitution and Canons to publicize to the delegates of the Convention thirty days before Convention regarding proposed amendments, when it is called to act upon the same.

It Is Hereby Resolved, that this proposal be reaffirmed by this Convention."

Your Committee approves of the giving of advance notice to the delegates of the Convention of any amendments to the Constitution or Canons which are to be acted upon at the Convention, and, accordingly, has requested the Secretary of the Convention to send appropriate notice of the proposed amendments set forth above to the delegates at the same time as sample ballots are sent by him to such delegates.

Your Committee further reports that the proposals to amend Canon 18 of the Diocese of Newark were placed in the hands of your Committee at least one month before the meeting of this Convention, with the approval of the Finance and Advisory Board, so that pursuant to the provisions of Canon 28, this Convention may now act upon these proposals.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT.

Seven meetings of the Standing Committee were held during 1946.

January 14, 1946:

Consent was given to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Christ Church, Short Hills, to sell property fronting on Forest Drive and Highland Avenue between the Church and Short Hills Country Day School said to contain .241 acres in accordance with a survey made by Charles W. Boesch, Surveyor, dated November 27, 1945, to Short Hills Country Day School for the sum of \$1150.

Motion was made, seconded and carried that the petition of the Board of Missions and Church Extension to sell property known as lots numbers 18, 20, 22, 24, and 26 on map entitled "Hillview Avenue, Morris Plains, New Jersey, Barkman Land Company Lots" to Gertrude E. Green for the sum of \$2500 be granted with recommendation to the Board to endeavor to impose restrictions on the property to be sold so that its use may not be detrimental to the mission property.

February 11, 1946:

On motion seconded and carried, confirmation was given by the Committee to the Bishop's nomination of the Rev'd Robert J. Clarke to fill an unexpired term on the Board of Examining Chaplains.

On motion seconded and carried, approval was given to expenditures from the Jesse Williams Fund in the amount of \$2,357.50, none of the Parishes or Missions aided having rented pews; the Hannibal Goodwin Fund in the amount of \$711.49, the objects being considered pious and charitable works; and the Church Aid Society in the amount of \$145.23 for assisting students for the Ministry.

On motion seconded and carried the following resolution was adopted by a majority vote of the Standing Committee:

That, as recommended by the Bishop, the Standing Committee as a body shall interview Postulants before they enter a theological school, when such an interview seems to be practicable.

BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION.

May 13, 1947.

To the Diocesan Convention:

The Board of Missions and Church Extension held eight meetings during the calendar year 1946.

The following is a brief report of matters considered by the Board during these meetings.

Meeting, January 17th:

Report was made that certain mortgages held by the American Church Building Fund against properties, St. Paul's, North Arlington, Transfiguration, Woodcliff, and St. Martin's, Maywood, a total approximating \$5383. Available funds on hand, it was ordered that the said mortgages be paid off.

Bishop Washburn reported that the following places would relinquish all assistance from the Board, St. Mark's, Teaneck, and Annunciation, Oradell; and that All Saints, Millington, hoped to do likewise, and also that Missions at Towaco, Bergenfield, and Fort Lee were arranging to assume a larger part of the Clergy stipends than heretofore.

Church of the Annunciation, Oradell.—A resolution was passed ordering conveyance of all real estate (held on trust by the Board for this Mission) over to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of the Church of the Annunciation, Oradell, N. J.

St. Paul's, Chatham.—A special committee, appointed with full power, reported that it had agreed to purchase a fine piece of property located at No. 393 Main St., Chatham, approximately 126 feet front by 392 feet deep for \$9500.00 on terms, cash \$4000.00 and mortgage \$5500.00 at 4½%. Action was unanimously approved.

A resolution was passed ordering the sale of premises No. 353 Main St., Chatham, N. J., to Guy Emery Shieler and Rebeka S. Shieler, his wife, consideration \$9500.00, on terms, cash \$3500.00, mortgage \$6000.00 at 5%, payable \$50.00 monthly, to apply on principal and interest.

Meeting, February 20th:

The greater part of the time of this meeting was taken up with consideration of a report from the Committee on Survey of Diocesan Missions and designated as a study of "A Group" of Missions located at the following places: Bergenfield, Bogota, Chatham, Fort Lee, Livingston, Maywood, Mendham, Millington, North Arlington, Teaneck, Ridgefield Park, Verona, Woodridge and Wortendyke. The report was in detail and as a whole, a very encouraging report. Many of the recommendations of the Committee were adopted.

Meeting, April 11th:

Ridgefield Park, St. Mary the Virgin.—A Committee of this Board reported the need of extensive repairs and, as an encouragement to the congregation, had offered help to finance the cost to the extent of us giving One dollar for every Two dollars raised by them. Our total giving for this purpose to be limited to Six hundred dollars. The Committee action was approved and recommendation made that this payment be made from the Bishop's Church Extension Fund.

Report was received that under the will of Frederick Scriven, St. Paul's Church, Woodridge, was to receive the sum of \$1978.75.

Paterson, St. Aidan's.—Acting on the recommendation of a Special Committee of this Board, it was ordered that we purchase premises, a two family house next door to the Church, for use as a Vicarage and Church uses for the sum of \$4500.00 cash.

An offer of \$3750.00 was received for our property No. 267 Governor Street, Paterson, N. J. This price seemed fair and equitable. A resolution was offered that we accept this

price and sell the premises to Mamie Edith Williams (wife of the Rev. Maxwell J. Williams).

Meeting, May 22nd:

The following Officers were elected:

Bogota, Ascension.—A Committee with power, subject to the approval of the Bishop, consisting of Messrs. Fred J. Stuart and Henry J. Russell, was appointed for survey and purchase of a house for the Vicar's use, but limited, however, not to pay more than \$9000.00 or \$9500.00 for such a house.

Meeting, June 6th:

Pompton Section.—A Committee appointed to survey this field advised that as soon as possible a new Cure be set up, embracing all of Ringwood Borough. This Cure would center in Ringwood, Stonetown and possibly in Lake Erskine. The Board strongly endorsed this recommendation and urged that steps to this end be taken as soon as possible.

Meeting, October 16th:

Bogota, Ascension.—The Committee for a Vicarage reported the purchase of No. 286 Elm Street, a very fine piece of property for the sum of \$9750.00. The action was approved unanimously.

Totowa, Christ Church.—Report was received that this station had paid off its mortgage in full.

Reduction of Interest.—It was moved and seconded that recommendation be made to the Bishop that the interest rate on all existing loans from the Bishop's Church Extension Fund be reduced to 3½%. Carried.

A report was received from the Committee appointed to consider the Financial Structure of the Board of Missions and Church Extension. Consideration was then given to parts of Canon 13-14 & 16. In the interest of clarification, several suggestions were proposed and adopted.

Woodridge, St. Paul's.—At the request of the congregation, consent was given that the legacy in the sum of \$1978.75, received from the Estate of Frederick Scriven, deceased, be used as follows,—\$1500.00 be paid on account of principal sum of mortgage now on the Vicarage and the remainder be used to purchase prayer books and hymnals as a Memorial to the decedent.

Tsonech, St. Mark's.—Consent was given to this Mission to purchase land adjacent to the Church building. St. Mark's had the money in hand to pay in full for the land.

The Mortgage Committee recommended that application for loans be made to the American Church Building Fund Commission on Direct Reduction Mortgage plan for the following places:

Verona—Holy Spirit,
Paterson—St. Aidan's,
Bogota—Ascension.

Dumont, St. Luke's.—A Committee was appointed for survey of this territory and possible new site for this Church in a more central location.

Hackettstown, St. James.—A committee was appointed for counsel with the Executive Committee on matters concerning much needed repairs.

Washington, St. Peter's.—Report was made about the celebration of the 60th anniversary of this Church and the burning of the cancelled mortgage covering the Church.

Meeting, November 20th:

Teaneck, St. Mark's.—A request was received that application be made to the Church Building Fund Commission for a loan on the Direct Mortgage plan to refinance their present mortgage debt. Consent was given.

A vote of thanks was given to the Mortgage Committee for its splendid work over the past years.

A vote of thanks was given to Mr. Cecil Tate for his time and interest in visiting our Mission Stations for the purpose of appraising the buildings at present day valuations and his recommendation of proper fire insurance coverage.

The meeting was then given over to consideration of further reports from the Committee on Survey of Mission Status. After discussion in relation to recommendation made at meeting held Feb. 10, 1946, and in view of the fact full time Vicars are now in charge, it was resolved that Vicars at the following places be urged to make prompt surveys of their Cures and be prepared to make a detailed report to this Board when so invited by the Bishop:

All Saints—Bergenfield,
Ascension—Bogota,
St. Paul's—Chatham,
St. Mary the Virgin—Ridgefield Park,
St. Stephen's—Coytesville,
St. Peter's—Rochelle Park,
St. Mary's—Sparta,
St. Anthony—Hackensack.

Meeting, Dec. 16th:

The Committee for Dumont was authorized to purchase land on Washington Avenue, as a site for St. Luke's Church, at a cost not to exceed \$3000.00.

The following gentlemen were appointed to serve as the Budget Committee,—Rev'd Messrs. Gordon Jones, John A. Frampton, and Elwood C. Boggess, and Messrs. Cecil Tate and Herbert M. Wilson, Jr.

St. James, Hackettstown.—A committee with power was appointed to attend to the installation of a heating system in the Vicarage at a cost of about \$1300.00.

Committees were appointed to give attention to needed heating systems in St. Cyprian's, Hackensack, and also in St. Andrew's, Lincoln Park, and report.

BOARD OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION DIOCESE OF NEWARK.

REPORT OF THE FIELD SECRETARY FOR 1946.

The Field Secretary did not cease to be Rector of St. Paul's Church, Newark, until November 26, 1946, at which time the papers incorporating the merged parishes of St. Paul's and St. Philip's were filed with the Clerk of Essex County under the title of St. Philip's Church, Newark. However, as the position as Rector of St. Paul's, Newark was

merely technical he could devote practically all of his time and attention to activities for the Diocese of Newark.

Two added responsibilities consumed more time than heretofore. These were, first, membership on the professional staff of the New Jersey Council of Churches with editorship of "The N. J. Council of Churches' Bulletin", and attendance at Executive Committee meetings of the same organization. Secondly, Chairmanship of the Commission on Christian Education of the Essex County Council of Churches. As the latter Council lost its Executive Secretary by death in September the work of ten active committees of the Commission became the responsibility of the Chairman.

Under the Rev. George Rath, new President of the Board of Religious Education, the policy of Standing Committees was changed to that of special committees for the various program plans with the whole Board advising.

Changes resulting were as follows: Discontinuance of "Guideposts" and initiating request for an enlarged Newark Churchman with more space for education. Training of Teachers was put in the hands of a special committee. The Adult Institute was evaluated and a different type of program was recommended. The Youth Committee called a convention that elected on a basis of Arch-deaconry caucuses. The recommendation of a Youth Division which will include more than Board members to guide the Youth Commission was recommended. The other activities of the Board were along the lines of the previous year and are reported statistically herewith.

CHURCH PENSION FUND COMMITTEE.

To the 1947 Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

Your Diocesan Church Pension Fund Committee respectfully reports as follows for the calendar year 1946:

The present pension roll of the Fund is \$1,400,000 a year and this figure is increasing steadily. Since the beginning of the Fund in 1917 there has been paid out a total of \$27,800,000 in pension benefits. The current value of the pension promises held forth to the clergy as a result of their services in the Church up to the present time is somewhat over \$37,000,000. The Fund has balancing resources in hand which puts the Fund in apparently a far better position than the Federal Social Security System.

The wholly owned subsidiaries of the Fund, namely The Church Hymnal Corporation, the Church Life Insurance Corporation and The Church Properties Fire Insurance Corporation are doing the work for which they were started. Their respective services are offered to the Church at a lower cost than that at which such services are ordinarily available. At the same time, these subsidiaries represent sound investments of the parent fund.

Beginning as of January 1, 1947, pension assessments are payable at the rate of 10% of the compensation received by the clergymen, the basis from the beginning of the Fund having been 7½%. This increase has been made necessary because of the continued low interest earnings of high grade investments. Interest yields are at an all-time low and the outlook for improvement in this respect is not promising. Therefore, only the higher assessment rate can compensate for the depressed investment interest rate.

The record of assessment payments by the congregations of the Church has in the past been very close to 100%. The total amount of payments in 1946 was \$1,300,000.

As of March 28, 1947, there was in force in our Diocese, paid by the Church Pension Fund proper:

There were also in force on account of the "General Convention of 1907" account pensions to 4 widows amounting to \$1,200 a year.

The grand total, therefore, of all grants from all accounts to the 52 beneficiaries of the Diocese of Newark, as of March 28th last, amounted to..... 31,973.04

This is an increase of about \$1,400 over 1945 and about \$3,650 over 1944.

As stated above, there are at the present time 52 beneficiaries of the Church Pension Fund and allied Funds in our Diocese. This total is 5 more than in 1945 and is made up as follows: Clergy receiving age benefits, 11; Clergy receiving total and permanent disability benefits, 4; widows, 35; orphans, 2.

As far as the Diocese of Newark is concerned, the Executive Vice President of the Fund, Mr. Robert Worthington, writes, under date of April 16th last, that "All assessments due in 1946 have been completely paid. This is an excellent record for a large Diocese such as Newark." He also writes that "There is not a single parish throughout the entire Church which has failed to pay at least six months pension assessment for 1946. This means that the Trustees' Resolutions with regard to increases and the immediate \$1,000 grant are in force in every Diocese and District."

Your Diocesan Committee is indeed happy to be able to give such a good account of the Pension Fund situation in this Diocese, as well as throughout the entire Church. We wish to thank those faithful parish and mission officers who have been responsible for prompt attention to this important matter.

The Committee on Approaches to Unity, through its Chairman, Dean Lichtenberger, made a verbal report of its activities during the year, and stated that a series of meetings is now being held for presentation of papers, with discussions on the various movements toward Christian Unity. A group of about forty-five of the Clergy are participating in this study.

The Reverend Walter N. Welsh presented a written report of the work being done by the Church at Bergen Pines Hospital. Volunteer Chaplains from our Parishes and Missions in Bergen County share in giving spiritual ministrations to the patients at Bergen Pines and the County Home. He pleaded for a part-time Chaplain to care for this work, and the County jail and other hospitals and institutions in Bergen County.

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions reported favorably on the following resolution submitted by the Board of Christian Social Relations, and recommended adoption:—

No. 1

WHEREAS, a Conference on the Church and Economic Life was held in Pittsburgh on February 19-21, 1947, under the auspices of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America, at which the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States was fully represented by a duly accredited delegation, and

WHEREAS, the Conference submitted a final report containing a statement of the Responsibility of the Church in the economic sphere and a program of action that was both specific and challenging, and

WHEREAS, the seven Christian affirmations that have been incorporated in the report are among the most searching expositions of the Christian ethic which have been stated in recent years, as are also the six general principles dealing with such basic economic factors as work, production, property, wages, profit, prices and industrial organization, and

WHEREAS, Church membership involves a deep concern for the economic welfare of mankind and a sacrificial dedication of time, talents and energies in the daily service of Christ through the extension of social justice in the economic field, now therefore be it

Resolved, that the 73rd Convention of the Diocese of Newark does hereby approve of these Christian affirmations and principles and commends the report to the Diocese for systematic study by the members of the parishes during the next year.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the above resolution be adopted.

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions reported favorably on the following resolution submitted by the Board of Christian Social Relations, and recommended adoption:—

WHEREAS, millions of displaced persons still remain in Europe without homes and without asylum nearly two years after the end of the Great War, and

WHEREAS, the last General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church meeting in Philadelphia has made a most eloquent plea that the United States set the example to the rest of Christendom by admitting our full share under the quota, and, if need be, a larger share by special legislation, now therefore be it

Resolved, that we, the delegates to the 73rd Convention of the Diocese of Newark, do hereby record our unqualified approval of the United States assuming leadership in ministering to these peoples and in providing such asylum as will guide the rest of the nations in manifesting a measure of justice and mercy to these our brethren, and request the Secretary of this Convention to communicate our endorsement of this request to the President of the United States.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the above resolution be adopted.

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions reported the following resolution submitted by the Board of Christian Social Relations, and recommended a substitute for the resolution offered:—

WHEREAS, nearly two years has elapsed after the Great War, and there still remain in our prisons Conscientious Objectors and other political prisoners, and

WHEREAS, the Federal Council of Churches, General Convention and other religious bodies have petitioned the President of the United States for a general amnesty of Political Prisoners, now therefore be it

Resolved, that we, the delegates to the 73rd Convention of the Diocese of Newark, do hereby associate ourselves with the above-mentioned organizations in urging prompt and general amnesty of all political prisoners, and request the Secretary of this Convention to communicate our endorsement of this request to the President of the United States.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the substitute as follows be adopted:—

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions cannot recommend the resolution in its present form and recommends a substitute resolution as follows:

"Resolved, that we, the delegates to the 73rd Convention of the Diocese of Newark, urge the prompt and general amnesty of all Conscientious Objectors, and request the Secretary of this Convention to communicate our endorsement of this request to the President of the United States."

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions reported the following resolution submitted by the Board of Christian Social Relations, and recommended adoption:—

WHEREAS, the Conference on the Church and Economic Life, convened by the Federal Council of Churches at Pittsburgh, has declared that "it is essential . . . that the Church conform to the highest ethical standards for the sake of its own integrity as well as to set an example to others in the economic sphere", and

WHEREAS, the Basic Clergy Stipend is an example of what the Church as employer can exemplify in one area of economic life, and

WHEREAS, the Basic Clergy Stipend has been adopted and applied by the Anglican Diocese of Johannesburg, and has been studied and considered by the Diocese of Michigan at their Conventions of 1945 and 1946,

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, that this Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark give to the Diocesan Board of Christian Social Relations approval and authority to study and prepare a report on the Basic Clergy Stipend for consideration by this Diocese.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the above resolution be adopted.

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions reported the following resolution submitted by the Board of Missions and Church Extension:—

"Resolved, that the minimum stipend for married priests in this Diocese be \$2,700. annually together with the use of living quarters."

This resolution has been approved by the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions and it recommends its immediate adoption pending further study by the Board of Christian Social Relations, of the Diocese of Newark, and final recommendation not later than the 1948 Diocesan Convention.

There was considerable discussion on the resolution, and on motion made, seconded and carried the appended recommendation concerning reference to study by the Board of Christian Social Relations was laid on the table.

It was then moved, seconded and carried that the resolution setting the minimum stipend for married priests at \$2,700., together with use of living quarters, be adopted.

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions presented the following resolution:—

In view of the large amount of legislative attention being given to the policy of tax support to non-public educational institutions and the necessity of assisting our people, who are asking for guidance in this matter, therefore be it

Resolved, that the 73rd Convention of the Diocese of Newark adopt and affirm the resolution passed by the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church as follows:

"Resolved, that the National Council reaffirms the position of our Church in support of the American principle of the separation of Church and State, and opposes the use of public funds for sectarian educational purposes, and, therefore, the National Council disapproves of such items as have recently appeared in State and Federal legislation providing for bus travel and text books for non-public schools and other provisions undermining the principles of separation. And we further recommend that this resolution be circulated among all the clergy and other Church leaders of the Diocese of Newark, and that copies be sent to our State and Federal Legislators."

It was moved, seconded and carried that the above resolution be adopted.

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions presented the following:—

We have the following recommendation from The Rev'd William L. Griffin, Rector, St. Paul's Church, Paterson, New Jersey, and we present it without recommendation in its present form.

"The Secretary of Convention is hereby directed to publish annually in the Journal of the Convention a list of all the clergy of the Diocese, giving in two columns their salaries and their total remunerations. This second figure shall include their salaries and all other income and perquisites from ecclesiastical sources such as car allowances, traveling allowances, fees for lecturing, supply work, etc., except fees received from individuals for weddings, baptisms and funerals and the rectory or cash equivalent thereof."

However, we present the following resolution as a substitute:

"Be It Resolved, that the Secretary of the Convention be directed to publish annually in the Journal of the Convention, a list of all the active clergy of the Diocese with a statement of the total amount of salary received from Parish, Mission, or Diocese, by the incumbent of each and every cure and office within the Diocese, with the addition of car or traveling allowance and rectory, and heating, light, gas and telephone, if such are furnished.

"And Be It Further Resolved, that such information be furnished the Secretary of the Convention by the Rector and Treasurer of every Parish and Mission, and also the Treasurer of the Board of Missions of the Diocese of Newark."

There was debate on this resolution, and the mover was asked what purpose is to be served by publishing the salaries.

The Reverend Mr. Griffin replied that there are two reasons behind the resolution. (1) Uneasiness about the salaries now paid in many instances, and that there is widespread feeling that many of our clergy are unfairly treated in the matter of adequate stipend. Also that some feel that there should be a basic salary for all clergy as recommended in the Address of

the Suffragan Bishop. (2) It has been felt that we could not have detailed information about salaries on the theory it might violate secrecy as to salaries.

A motion was made and seconded that the matter be laid on the table, and vote be taken by Orders.

The motion was lost in the Clerical Order—and declared defeated.

It was moved and seconded that the resolution be adopted.

Resolved, that this Convention hereby approves a change of name in accordance with the recommendation of the Cathedral Chapter.

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions presented the following resolution offered by the Reverend John E. Bailey and moved its adoption. Seconded and carried.

Because the amplifying equipment furnished through the courtesy of Arthur K. Brown, Inc., has been furnished without cost for this Convention,

Be It Therefore Resolved, that the Secretary of the Convention send a letter of thanks to Arthur K. Brown, Inc., for their courtesy in providing both the equipment and the services of the operator, Mr. A. V. Manning.

Consent was asked for permission to present certain resolutions which follow.

Dr. Spencer Miller, Jr., presented the following and moved its adoption, seconded and carried:—

WHEREAS, responsive to the recommendation of the Honorable Alfred E. Driscoll, Governor of New Jersey, the Legislature has, by concurrent action, approved the calling of a Constitutional Convention in this State on June 10th, and

WHEREAS, the law, if approved by a vote of the people on June 3rd, next, will mark the first Constitutional Convention to be held in this State in 103 years, and

WHEREAS, the drafting of a new constitution for our Sovereign State in these critical days is an act which should be approached both thoughtfully and prayerfully by all those who are called upon to serve as delegates, and

WHEREAS, Churchmen, by virtue of their obligation to apply the Christian ethic to every area of our life, should be in the forefront in any effort to elevate political morality and improve the constitutional framework of our State government,

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, that we, the Delegates to the Seventy-Third Diocesan Convention of the Diocese of Newark, do hereby record our wholehearted approval of the calling of such a Constitutional Convention at this time and we urge upon the delegates the inclusion in the "Bill of Rights" of the New Constitution of a statement affirming our belief in God as the Supreme source of law and justice and an affirmative declaration in behalf of the full civil and religious liberties of all men, irrespective of race, creed and religion, and

Be It Further Resolved, that appropriate prayers be recommended for all the churches in our Diocese during the sessions of this Constitutional Convention for the wisdom and guidance of the delegates.

The Reverend Andrew M. Van Dyke presented the following and moved its adoption, seconded and carried :—

Be It Resolved, that this 73rd Convention of the Diocese of Newark does commend the Board of Managers of Bonnie Brae Farm for their statement of policy of non-discrimination in admitting boys to the Farm.

Mr. A. P. Green presented the following resolution, and on motion by the Reverend A. S. Hogenauer of reference to the Board of Religious Education was seconded and carried :—

WHEREAS, the need of increasing the membership of our Parish Church Schools is admitted, and

WHEREAS, the need of giving a greater number of children of our generation the opportunity of securing a religious education is also admitted,

Be It Resolved, that the Bishop appoint a Committee to study the possibility of increasing the growth of our Parish Church Schools, and of giving the Gospel of Christ and our Church teaching to more children.

This Committee to report its findings to the Bishop.

The Reverend Ross Flanagan for the Committee on Conscientious Objectors presented the following :—

We recommend that, inasmuch as it seems there is no further need for this particular committee, it be discharged. And we further recommend that if any question or problem arises in any parish or mission relating to a conscientious objector or his dependents, such question or problem be referred to the Episcopal Pacifist Fellowship for consideration and adjustment.

It was moved and carried that the Committee be discharged with thanks and its recommendation concurred in.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the above appointments be approved.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Committee on Reconstruction and Advance Fund be discharged with thanks.

The Reverend Elwood Boggess made an appeal for altar furniture and furnishings for our Missionary District of Puerto Rico and Virgin Islands, and requested that donations be sent to the Cathedral House.

Mr. T. McCurdy Marsh was nominated for Lay Assessor, term expiring 1950.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Secretary cast one ballot for the election of Mr. Marsh.

The Reverend William M. Weber presented the following resolution, and on motion seconded and carried it was ordered referred to Committee on Elections and Rules of Order:—

Resolved, that the first recommendation of the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order be amended

by striking out Rule 15, of the Rules of Order as printed in the 1946 JOURNAL, on page 36,

and inserting in its place the following paragraphs:

"15. All reports (usually printed in the JOURNAL) of officers, committees, commissions, and boards of trustees under the control of the Convention, shall be distributed to the Deputies by the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order at least two weeks before the meeting of Convention; provided that the reports shall have been submitted to the Finance and Advisory Board for consideration.

"Reports when read in Convention shall be read by title only, unless the reading be for the better transaction of business."

The Reverend James A. Mitchell presented the following resolution, which was seconded and carried; resolution signed by forty-five Clerical Deputies.

WHEREAS, there is a consensus that a more enthusiastic and loyal support of the Diocesan Program might be secured if more complete financial information were given to the Delegates of the Convention and to their Vestries for advance study;

Now, Therefore, we, the undersigned Clergy of the Diocese of Newark, request that the Secretary of the Convention be provided with a detailed Budget from the Finance and Advisory Board of the Diocese of Newark, so that said Secretary may mail copies to the Delegates at least 15 days prior to the date of the Convention.

The following was submitted by title:—

A Committee of the Finance and Advisory Board was appointed to suggest rules and regulations with respect to the deposit of trust funds and the management thereof, pursuant to Section Two of Canon Seven which provides that "The Finance and Advisory Board shall from time to time, make such rules and regulations with respect to the deposit of such trust funds, and the management thereof, as shall be proper, and shall submit such rules and regulations, so adopted by it, annually to the Convention."

The Committee presented the following rules and regulations which were adopted by the Finance and Advisory Board on February 3, 1947.

1. All funds of a permanent kind and all securities of whatever kind, belonging to this Diocese or to any parish thereof, when they aggregate the sum of \$5,000. or more, shall be deposited with either

A. A Federal or State bank or a Trust Company, or

B. With the Corporation known as "The Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties of the Diocese of Newark, N. J."

2. Where the amount of such permanent funds and securities of whatever kind belonging to any parish of this Diocese remains under \$5,000., the Treasurer of the parish may then be designated as the agent.

A. In all such cases, the securities of such funds shall be lodged in a safe deposit box held in the name of the Church; access to which shall be by the Treasurer and a member of the Vestry or by two members of the Vestry.

B. All such securities, excepting bearer or non-registered bonds or debentures, shall be registered in the corporate name of the parish in the following form, viz: "Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of _____ Church in the City of _____ etc." or in the proper name or title of said corporation, or unincorporated body.

3. Where the funds or securities of a permanent kind have been left to a parish by will or trust instrument in trust for any religious, charitable or benevolent purpose whatsoever and said parish in its corporate capacity has accepted said trusteeship and is required under the provisions of the laws of this State to make and render an accounting of its trusteeship to any of the probate courts of this State at certain designated intervals, then in all such cases the provisions of Canon Seven, Section Two shall not be applicable to such funds, but however

A. In all such cases, the Treasurer shall make a report of all such trusted funds, annually, to the Finance and Advisory Board showing the following information:

1. The name in which said securities are held and the purpose of the Fund.
2. The amounts thereof and how invested.
3. The name of the Bank in which the safe deposit box is maintained which contains the said securities and how access thereto is available.

4. The name of the Court where its accountings are rendered and how often such accountings are required.

5. A copy be furnished of the last accounting and a copy of each succeeding accounting thereafter to be made.

B. All such trust funds shall be invested only in such securities as are legal for trust investments under the laws of this State.

C. It is, however, left open to trustees of such funds that at their discretion, such funds can be deposited with a custodian as provided by Canon Seven, Section Two, but the responsibility for the proper stewardship of the trust funds still remains the same.

The Bishop expressed his appreciation for the large attendance at this Convention and that so many have remained until the close.

The Reverend Knud A. Larsen asked to be permitted to speak in behalf of the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief, and earnestly pleaded for full support of the Field Department's effort to complete the campaign for our allotted share of \$53,000. by Whitsunday.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Convention adjourn sine die after Prayer and Benediction by the Bishop.
