## CANON, 1, § II.

## OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES.

*From a Parish.*

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election, in the following form :

[*Name of the Church, the Place, and Date.*]

This certifies that a meeting of the congregation of this Church, held for the purpose of electing Church Officers, and Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention (*or for the purpose of electing Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, if the meeting be for that object alone*), A. B., C. D., and E. F., being **male communicants** of the Church in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Deputies; and B. C., D. E., and F. G., also being **male communicants** in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Alternate Deputies to represent the Parish in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand (*or if two Wardens subscribed, we have set our hands*), the day and year above written.

*N. B.*—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary sign, then the signatures of *both* Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-in-charge, *or* Missionary, may not sign.

*From a Mission.*

*N. B.*—Use the same form and substitute the word "Mission" for "Parish" in three places. The Minister-in-charge; or, the Clerk; or, the Warden may sign.

**Memoranda :**

Not more than three Deputies are allowed from each Parish, and Mission.

Three Alternate Deputies must be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies.

Write Christian names in **FULL** and **LEGIBLY**.

Blank forms will be sent by the Secretary of the Convention on or before Easter Monday in each year.

**Return Certificates of Election at least ONE MONTH before Convention.**

Deputies must be *male Communicants of the Church, and also qualified voters in the Parish or Mission which elects them.* (See Canon 10- § II, [4], [5] and [6] and Canon 16 § VIII.)

# Rules of Order

## THE CONVENTION.

1. The Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. The Convention shall meet on the opening day for the Business Sessions at 9:45 A. M.; with a recess of one hour between 1 and 2 o'clock.
3. At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
4. At the close of each Convention, the Minutes shall be corrected and approved.
5. The doors of the Convention shall be open for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
6. All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convention shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall record their attendance.
7. Clergymen of other Dioceses, and Candidates for Holy Orders, who may be present, shall be admitted to honorary seats in the Convention on the presentation of their names to the Secretary.
8. When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
9. When any member is about to speak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
10. No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply), in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
11. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
12. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate, but any member may appeal from the decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention. The general procedure of the Convention shall be governed, unless otherwise provided for, by the rules of parliamentary practice as set forth in "Roberts' Rules of Order."
13. A Committee consisting of the Bishop, ex-officio, five other clergymen and five laymen, to be known as the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, shall be appointed at each Convention to prepare the official Ballots and the Calendar of Business, for the next Annual Convention.

The mode of conducting the nominations and elections of all Committees, Commissions and Boards and all other elective officers not otherwise provided for, shall be as follows:

The Secretary of the Convention shall send out with the notice of the time and place of the Diocesan Convention, a list of the offices to be filled by election thereat, and the names of the incumbents of these offices, whose terms expire thereat, together with an official nomination blank. Such notice shall be sent out at least one month before the date appointed for the Convention, to the Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and to each lay delegate whose name and address has been transmitted to the Secretary, as provided in Canon I.

Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations for any office or offices to be filled at such Convention, shall at least fifteen days before the date appointed for the Convention, submit the same in writing to the Secretary thereof, together with his certificate that he has secured the consent of such person or persons to such nomination.

The Committee on Elections, from the list of nominations as furnished to it by the Secretary of the Convention, shall prepare sufficient ballots marked "Sample" for each clerical and lay delegate, as certified by such Secretary, as entitled to a seat in the Convention; such ballot to be mailed by such Secretary to each such delegate at least five days before the Convention.

At the beginning of the opening session the committee shall report to the Convention in the form of an official ballot the names of nominees; the arrangement of such names shall be determined by lot in each order.

If there be any office for which no nomination has been made on the sample ballot any delegate may file with the Secretary of the Convention the name of one candidate for any such office, together with his certificate, that he has secured the consent

of the person so nominated. Such nominations may be filed up to the hour of voting, and the committee of Elections shall announce the names of such nominees at the time of the distribution of the first ballot.

The number of consecutive terms any nominee has held the office for which he is again nominated shall be noted on the ballot, in parentheses, after his or her name. After each list of nominations as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks may be filled by any voter. On the first ballot these ballots only shall be used, and also in subsequent ballots, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. No ballot shall be counted in its class, on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled, and the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast.

The members of the Convention shall also be requested, in said call, to send to this Committee any canonical amendments or other important items of business that they may propose to introduce at the next Convention, so that such matters may be assigned a place on the Calendar of Business. This call shall also be annually inserted in the official Magazine of the Diocese, *THE NEWARK CHURCHMAN*.

Balloting shall take place in a separate room when practicable.

The clerical and lay voting lists shall be divided into two sections each.

14. Four or more Election Tellers, clerical and lay, in equal numbers, not necessarily members of the Convention, shall be appointed by the President before an election. They shall receive and canvass all votes cast at any election which is required to be by ballot, and when such canvass is completed, shall immediately report its result to the Convention. The polls shall be open for such time as the Convention may, by resolution, direct.
15. The President shall appoint in advance of each Convention a Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions, to whom shall be submitted by the Secretary of Conventions all resolutions to be considered by the Convention not less than two weeks in advance.
16. All reports (usually printed in the *JOURNAL*) of officers, committees, commissions, and boards of trustees under control of the Convention, shall be printed and distributed by the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order as far as practicable, at least two weeks before the meeting of the Convention; provided that the subject of such printing and reports shall have been referred to the Finance and Advisory Board for consideration, which Board shall have power to supervise, regulate, or to condense the same, and to issue to the Committee or to the Secretary of the Convention such instructions as in the judgment of the said Board will promote greater economy and efficiency in respect to this work.

Reports when read in Convention shall be read by title only, unless the reading be for the better transaction of business.

#### NEW BUSINESS.

17. All new business introduced, except such as may accompany and form a part of a report of a committee, shall be in the form of a motion or resolution and shall be in writing.

#### COMMITTEES.

18. All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered. It shall be the duty of the Secretary promptly to notify the members of all special committees of their appointment.
19. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.

#### MOTIONS AND THEIR ORDER.

20. No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the *JOURNAL*.
21. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it; or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
22. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.

#### VOTING PRIVILEGES.

23. All questions shall be decided *à la voce*, unless otherwise specially ordered.
24. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote of the Convention shall be taken by Orders, voting separately; and, when a vote is thus taken a concurrent majority in both Orders shall be necessary to carry any measure.

# JOURNAL

The Seventy-sixth Annual Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark was held on Tuesday, May 9, Nineteen Hundred and Fifty, in Trinity Cathedral, Newark.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at nine o'clock by the Bishop of the Diocese, the Right Reverend Benjamin M. Washburn, D.D., assisted by the Suffragan Bishop, the Right Reverend Theodore R. Ludlow, D.D., and the Dean of the Cathedral, the Very Reverend Frederick J. Warnecke.

The morning session of the Convention was called to order at nine-fifty o'clock, with the Right Reverend, The Bishop of Newark, in the Chair.

A quorum being present the Convention was declared ready for business.

### **EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE BISHOP OF NEWARK.**

To my Brethren of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of Newark,  
Greeting.

#### **I.**

In accordance with time honored custom throughout the Church we remember each year at our Convention faithful soldiers of the Captain of our salvation who during the preceding year have become members of the Church Expectant.

Five of our bishops are among the number—Edward Huntington Coley, retired Bishop of Central New York; Elwood Lindsay Haines, Bishop of Iowa; William Thomas Manning, retired Bishop of New York; Bartel Hilen Reinheimer, retired Bishop of Rochester; Daniel Trumbull Huntington, retired Bishop of Anking.

In point of canonical residence, the first and the third of the clergy of our own Diocese are also in our minds and prayers:

Horatio Watts Maguire, canonically resident in our Diocese for fifty-five years, though he had retired from the active ministry in 1910 after a sixteen year rectorship of Calvary Church, Bayonne; Edmund Atwill Wasson, forty-nine years a priest of this Diocese, was rector of the now extinct St. Stephen's Parish, Newark, from 1900 to 1925, the date of his retirement from the active ministry.

We remember laymen who have served faithfully in Diocesan offices:

Austin S. Murray, of Trinity Cathedral, was treasurer of the Finance and Advisory Board, and a deputy to three General Conventions; Charles Hooker Baldwin, treasurer of the City Mission of Newark and a vestryman and treasurer of old St. Paul's Church, Newark; Wilson J. Lamb, of the Church of the Epiphany, Orange, and a member of the Board of Missions.

May they rest in peace and may light perpetual shine upon them. Amen.

## II.

The Canons of the Church provide that at every Annual Convention the Bishop shall make a statement of the affairs of the Diocese since the last meeting of the Convention, including specified statistical information concerning his official acts. Fortunately the practice of reading to the Convention long and barren lists of names and figures involved in such official acts ceased many years ago. The information is of course to be found by those who seek it in the printed Journal of the Convention.

It is well for us, however, to give our attention to some matters of wide interest in the life of the Diocese and the whole Church during the past year. I mention first the creation of the Diocesan Investment Trust in accordance with the Canon which you adopted at our last Convention. The Bishop and Standing Committee elected as the eight trustees men whose high competence in large business and financial affairs and thoroughgoing personal integrity is widely recognized. They have given their careful thought and attention to the many problems incident to the establishment of the Trust. I desire to pay my special tribute to the Chancellor of the Diocese and to the treasurer of the Diocese for their willingness to spend long hours of toil and for their ability to enlist the interest of others, who, though not themselves trustees, were willing to give helpful counsel. As of April 30th the market value of the investments in the Trust amounted to \$1,025,539., almost all of which represents transfers from funds previously held by the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund for diocesan purposes—or institutions. Of these investments United States Government bonds constitute 36%, other high grade bonds 22%, preferred and common stocks 21% each. The consolidation of nearly one hundred separate funds has made possible greater diversification of investments, with due regard to the safety of principal. It results also in the earning of a higher rate of interest.

My chief reason for bringing the Trust to your attention today is to urge every clergyman and every vestryman whose parish has capital funds to consider the desirability of taking advantage of the opportunity offered by the Trust.

Mr. Lewis B. Franklin, former treasurer of The National Council, has written the following:

"The most important factor in any business enterprise is management. In the realm of investments adequate management of an endowment fund is not often to be found in the membership of a parish

vestry. On the other hand a large diocese can command the voluntary services of men of wisdom and long experience in this field. Decisions as to investments should be objective and impersonal. This is not often possible when the fund is managed by those most nearly concerned. A desire for a high annual return because of the needs of the parish budget is apt to lead to unwise investments. Then too many parish funds are not large enough to make possible a proper diversification which can be easily provided if the small fund is merged into a Diocesan Trust."

An illustration may be useful. Perhaps your parish receives a \$20,000. bequest as an endowment fund, the income to be used for the support of the parish. You could invest it in United States Savings Bonds or deposit it in Savings Banks. Your endowment would be safely invested, but it would not yield more than 2½%. You might decide to invest it in other securities with a higher rate of interest, which of course means increased risk of principal. If one of the four different securities chosen were to go wrong, one-fourth of the entire fund would be affected. This concrete illustration indicates the advantages of investing in a large Trust over the independent handling of a small fund by a committee of a Vestry. Therefore I urge your earnest consideration of investment in the Trust as an excellent way to fulfill your moral responsibility as stewards. Mr. Wiedenmayer will be glad to discuss the matter with any of you who have responsibilities for the investment of capital funds of Parishes or Church Institutions.

At our Convention a year ago we elected deputies to the General Convention, which took certain significant action of interest to us all. The Presiding Bishop in his Sermon at the opening of the Convention summoned the Church to greater awareness of the needs and opportunities of the Church in this critical time in which we live. In response to his appeal, a greatly increased Budget for the Program of the Church was adopted. We do not yet have complete figures of the result of the offering which was asked on March twelfth, but according to our best estimate, it seems certain that the Every Member Canvass of last fall and the special offering in March for One World in Christ will amount to something over \$127,000. from our Diocese for The Program of the National Church. This will be the largest contribution from this Diocese since 1930, when a small number of individuals responded directly to a request from Bishop Stearly for large individual gifts for missions, independently of their gifts through their own parishes. With only two or three exceptions, it will be the largest sum the Diocese has ever given in a single year.

Although we are far from reaching our \$197,000. quota, we have taken a forward step, and I give my gratitude to those of you, clergy and lay, who worked steadily towards the great objective. The quota for 1951 assigned

us by the National Council will be substantially the same as in 1950. It is too early to know what the Presiding Bishop will recommend as to methods, not only of sustaining, but also of increasing, the giving of the Church for 1951. Special offerings in Lent for such purposes as British Missions in the war years, The Fund for World Relief, and for One World in Christ, have yielded good results. They by no means express the financial potentiality of the Church if each and every member of the Church can be brought to do his share. We should strive to meet through The Every Member Canvass itself the financial requirements of the Diocese and the Church at large. When a parish does not succeed, through the Every Member Canvass, in securing the money necessary for its own maintenance, it finds ways and means to secure the money through supplemental efforts.

The work of the Diocese and of the Church at large is surely just as necessary as the work of the parish. Its support is a responsibility of equal weight. Why, therefore, should a parish not seek in similar fashion to supplement the pledges received through the Every Member Canvass, if such pledges are inadequate to meet the parish quota?

Our Convention in 1949 memorialized General Convention to take such action as might be necessary to increase the amount of the minimum pension paid to present and future beneficiaries by The Church Pension Fund. Action was urged by many others throughout the Church. As a result the rate of assessment on clerical salaries was increased from ten to fifteen per cent. This has permitted the establishment in normal cases of a minimum pension of \$1,500. to clergy who have retired because of age or total disability, and of \$750. to the widow of a clergyman. A substantial increase is also made to minor orphans of deceased clergymen in the several age groups. Our pensions are now very much higher than those paid by other Churches. A comparison with those of one leading Church may be of interest. I use the average allowance now paid by The Church Pension Fund to beneficiaries in our own Diocese. Our age allowance is \$1,560. as compared with \$492. to similar beneficiaries of the Church mentioned. Our clergy retired because of total disability receive an average of \$1,500. as compared with the receipt by theirs of \$572. Our widows receive an average of \$720.; theirs receive \$275. Our orphans receive an average of \$407.; theirs receive \$95. Furthermore, in the case of the Church mentioned, the clergy themselves pay a portion of the assessment, while in our case the Church bears the entire cost. I am sure that I speak for all our clergy when I express gratitude for the action of General Convention in increasing the pension to be received by those clergy, and their dependents, who have had the least adequate salaries during their active ministry. Several years ago action was taken by General Convention which made retirement of Bishops compulsory at the age of seventy-two. The last Convention enacted legislation which as of 1957 requires the retirement of other clergy

also at the age of seventy-two. It is to be noted, however, that in the case of both Bishops and other Clergy, sixty-eight is still the age of retirement with eligibility for a pension from the Fund.

I could wish that the outlook for the inclusion of lay employees of the Church under the Old Age and Survivors' Insurance provisions of the Federal Social Act were brighter than it seems. You will remember that our last Convention reaffirmed its support of such inclusion. An Act looking to the inclusion of employees of all non-profit organizations has been introduced in the United States Senate. Through the powerful influence of one of the Protestant Churches it is understood that the Senate Committee to which the act was referred will recommend the exclusion of the Church from the non-profit organizations to receive the benefit of the proposed extended coverage. I trust that our own Board of Christian Social Relations will continue its interest in the matter and take appropriate action at the proper time.

I wish to refer briefly to the report to General Convention made by the Joint Commission on Approaches to Unity. The resolution providing for the continuance of negotiations with the Presbyterian Church was adopted. The Commission was also directed to further or initiate such conversations with representatives of other Christian bodies as may lead to our closer fellowship with them. Though I am no longer a member of the Commission, I may say that such conversations have recently been initiated. In its report, however, the Commission recognized the fact that no plan of union can offer hope for success until mutual understanding has become general among the communions involved. It therefore recommended to the Clergy and laity of our Church that they take every opportunity to initiate common projects of study, conferences, and other activities, particularly with members of the Presbyterian Church. It made specific suggestions, among which is the following: "that, except when the Holy Communion be celebrated, congregations of the two Churches from time to time worship together". It added as its judgment that "it is appropriate that when such services are held in Episcopal churches, the Prayer Book be used, and when in Presbyterian churches, the Presbyterian form of service be followed". The Commission represented every group of Churchmanship within the Church, and the suggestion quoted was unanimously supported by its members.

In accordance with this suggestion, the Dean at my request arranged with the Reverend Dr. Foster to hold joint services of his congregation and that of Trinity Cathedral at eleven o'clock on the two Sundays following Easter. On the first Sunday the Dean preached at the Cathedral; on the following Sunday the Reverend Dr. Foster preached in Old First Presbyterian Church. Both clergymen participated in each service, and each was attended by an extraordinarily large congregation. We have since had abun-

dant testimony to the fruitfulness of the experiment, many expressing a hope that there may be repetitions of the experience of fellowship. I hope that in other communities of our Diocese this example of two communions engaging in joint worship will be followed. By such projects mutual understanding is furthered, and through them the desire for a closer unity may be stimulated.

Last year I spoke of the importance of recruiting qualified men for the Sacred Ministry. Today I wish to report that we now have forty-three men definitely enrolled as Postulants and Candidates for Holy Orders, or whose formal applications are now in process of preparation. So far as I can discover this is nearly twice as many as the Diocese has had before at any time in its history. During the past five months I have had long, and, in some cases, repeated, conferences with fifteen others who were interested to secure definite information about the ministry as a vocation and the nature of the preparation required. A few of these men may later be added to our rolls. Others I felt could better serve the Church as laymen than in Holy Orders. Both the Bishop and the Standing Committee take with proper seriousness their responsibility in the recommendation and admission of men as Candidates for Holy Orders. Integrity of character and depth of spiritual consecration are of course prime requisites, but there must also be the capacity of normal and wholesome, consistent and understanding, interpersonal relationships. Nervous stability and emotional maturity are no less important than physical health and intellectual capacity. I ask you to continue to be alert in discovering and encouraging men who may have a vocation for the Sacred Ministry.

Time is not sufficient for me to recount at length varied projects accomplished, or begun, during the past year which on the physical side are evidence of the vitality of the Church. Notable projects in a number of our parishes could be cited, but I shall confine my remarks to some of the missions of the Diocese. St. Anthony's, Hackensack, and St. Peter's, Rochelle Park, have liquidated their mortgage indebtedness. The former has been consecrated, the latter has taken steps towards incorporation as a Parish. Montvale and Lincoln Park have acquired vicarages. Secaucus also has raised funds towards the erection of a vicarage. Allendale has plans under way to the same end, and Wortendyke for the enlargement of its Parish House. St. Andrew's, Passaic, now occupies the former St. George's Church, thus possessing the finest Church of any Negro congregation in Passaic. Lincoln Park, with Towaco, will on July first, have its first resident clergyman, and we believe that in the autumn Dumont will have the same good fortune. Another clergyman will be added to the staff of our growing Warren County Mission.

The strengthening of existing work has seemed to me to be our first responsibility. What we do ought to be done well, and there are crying

needs to be met. For example, Livingston is one of the most rapidly growing communities in the Diocese, and our mission has of late made great strides. Its little Church was first intended as the private chapel of a family living in the neighborhood. This was years ago. Its Church School enrollment is now one hundred and eighty-six. It receives no diocesan aid towards the salary of its vicar, nor for its maintenance. Proper facilities for its work and worship, probably in a new site, will require a sum of money far beyond the capacity of its own people to provide. The need at St. Paul's, Chatham, is no less acute. Fair Lawn, Sparta, and Wood Ridge, each in its own degree, present like problems. The people of these missions will do their part, but they need, and they deserve, our generous aid.

Although the strengthening of our existing work may be our first responsibility, we must have also as our concern work in new areas wherever the ministrations of our Church are clearly needed. When the shortage of clergy was acute, we could not undertake expansion. Fortunately the shortage seems to be passing, and we may hope that men will be increasingly available. Money will be needed, both for intensive and for extensive work. How shall it be secured?

In days when building costs were less, the Bishops' Church Extension Fund was a fairly adequate source of help. Through the Fund aid has been available in building thirty-seven churches, forty-six rectories or vicarages, and twenty-five parish houses. Each of its five Calls a year yields from the subscribers only one thousand dollars, and with present costs one thousand dollars does not go far. Ten times as many subscribers would be a possible answer to our need.

There is another answer. There has been no carefully planned, widespread appeal for a diocesan project of any magnitude since the Bishop Lines Memorial Fund of more than \$300,000. was raised in 1928. A grave economic depression soon followed; then came the World War, and afterwards urgent appeals for increased giving from the Presiding Bishop and the National Council. These were factors with which we had to reckon, but I am of the opinion that we cannot indefinitely postpone the strengthening of our stakes and the lengthening of our cords. We have a Diocese in which there is little tension springing from the varied emphases in the expression of our common faith, which rightfully exist within our fellowship. We have a group of consecrated clergy, few of whom I believe are complacent as to the sufficiency of our present efforts. We have a host of lay people who love their Church, and who together, if awakened to the need, could respond adequately to an ambitious Advance Program. Such a project would require careful study and thoughtful planning. It would need to be more than a bishop's dream, a scheme of the Board of Missions, or a plan of the Finance and Advisory Board. It would demand the expenditure of unstinted time and enthusiastic effort by all the clergy and by

hundreds of the laity. Its success would require generous, even lavish gifts from men, women and children throughout the Diocese. At the present time I direct your attention to the existence of needs and opportunities. I ask that you have these needs and opportunities upon your conscience. We must have them in our prayers. We must expect to receive God's guidance as to how He would have us meet them. We must expect to receive also the Spirit of power that we may act.

As I report to you concerning the state of the Church I am quite aware that I have spoken chiefly of material needs. I make no apology, for money has a sacramental character. How a man earns it and how he uses it reveal the sort of man he is. It is because we have lost the radiance of the Christian Gospel that its proclamation is hindered.

From the Book of Acts, and the Epistles which follow it, we learn much of the spirit of the early Church. It is true that the social, political, and economic character of society in the first century was totally unlike our own, yet that first century has its lessons for us. No funds were raised for the building of churches, but when the time came for their building, a richness of spiritual experience sanctified them. Then, as now, there were differences of emphasis within the fellowship. Apollos, Cephas, and Paul each had his followers, but in the face of the common danger from a secular foe they knew a fellowship in Christ which made them one. Varied schools of Churchmanship exist among us but Christ is not divided. It is Christ Whom all of us serve and adore, and in Him we are one.

Pentecost had a meaning for the early Christians. God had made Himself available to the company of believers. They were one in Him. Their oneness in Him made them members of one another. The gift which He had given them was a gift they were to share. It was a gift which brought to them newness of life. They also knew that Christ in them and Christ through them could make all things new. Therefore whatever the cost might be they would be His faithful soldiers and servants unto their life's end.

Our greatest need and opportunity is closer fellowship with Him in work and worship. We have been unprofitable servants, for ours have been unyielded lives. We must give to Him the directing of our steps. Thoughts and actions both must be brought captive to His sway. With the yielded lives of us its members, the Church will rediscover the Pentecostal power. It will actively express the dynamic of community. By its profession and by its activity it will do its part to bring all things in subjection unto Him Who would be all in all. Brethren, it is love of God, the love of God in Christ, love of one another in the household of faith, love for those who know Him not in all His fullness—it is love which is our greatest need.

The Chair reported that Certificates of Audit by the firm of Peat, Marwick, Mitchell & Co. have been received, and are on file at the Cathedral House.

Mr. Wiedenmayer also made a report for The Diocesan Investment Trust of the Diocese of Newark.

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions, Reverend Harold R. Onderdonk, Chairman, reported the following resolution:

#### DEVELOPMENT OF NEW WEAPONS.

**WHEREAS**, The development of new weapons of warfare has greatly increased both the peril and the fear of our people, we believe that international agreements for the limitation and supervision of these weapons are necessary; and

**WHEREAS**, The same increasing scientific knowledge and technical skill have opened the way to a vast increase in human welfare when this knowledge and skill are devoted to the arts of peace;

*Therefore, Be It Resolved*, That the 76th Annual Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark respectfully urges the President of the United States, our delegates to the United Nations and other political leaders to continue to seek international agreements for the limitation and supervision of weapons and armed forces, and for the peaceful uses of this scientific knowledge and technical skill to advance human welfare.

The Committee places this resolution before the Convention without recommendation.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the above resolution be and is hereby adopted.

Mr. Capron, Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, presented the following reports:

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND CANONS TO THE SEVENTY-SIXTH DIOCESAN CONVENTION OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons submits herewith the following report:

#### A.

*Concerning the amendment to Article 1, Section 2 of the Constitution of the General Convention:*

Advice has been received from the Secretary of the House of Deputies of the General Convention of the proposal submitted to amend Article 1, Section 2 of the Constitution which was presented to the General Convention of 1949 and which is to be finally acted upon at the Convention of 1952 so that the said Section will read as follows:

*"Every Bishop of this Church having jurisdiction, every Bishop Coadjutor, every Suffragan Bishop, and every Bishop [who by reason of advanced age or bodily infirmity, or] who under an election to an office created by the General Convention, has resigned his jurisdiction [position], shall have a seat and a vote in the House of Bishops. Every other Bishop who has resigned his position shall have a seat without vote in the House of Bishops. A majority of all Bishops entitled to vote, exclusive of Foreign Missionary Bishops, [and Bishops who*

have resigned their jurisdiction] shall be necessary to constitute a quorum for the transaction of business."

(The matter to be omitted is included in brackets; new matter is italicized.)

The effect of this proposed amendment would be:

- (1) To omit from those granted a right to vote in the House of Bishops a Bishop who by reason of advanced age or bodily infirmity has resigned his jurisdiction, and
- (2) In determining the number necessary to constitute a quorum, to eliminate those Bishops who have resigned their jurisdiction.

Your Committee sees no objection to the proposed amendment and therefore offers the following resolution:

*"Resolved, that the Convention of the Diocese of Newark approves the proposal submitted to the General Convention of 1949 to amend Article 1, Section 2 of the Constitution."*

It was moved, seconded and carried that the above resolution be and hereby is adopted.

## B.

*Concerning proposal to amend Article 4, Section 3 of the Constitution of the Diocese of Newark:*

Article 4, Section 3 of the Constitution of the Diocese defines the representation to which the laity are entitled in the Diocesan Convention. The last sentence of the first paragraph of this section now reads: "Deputies shall be elected by each congregation from the male communicants thereof". Pursuant to a resolution adopted at the annual meeting of All Saints' Mission, Bergenfield, The Rev. Guy H. Madara, the Vicar of such Mission, has presented a resolution that this provision of the Constitution shall be amended by striking out the word "male" and adding the requirement that at least fifty (50) percentum of the lay delegates from any Parish or Mission shall be male communicants.

The Committee reports as the proper form to express this proposal a resolution reading as follows:

*"Resolved, that this Convention approves the amendment of Article 4, Section 3 of the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark by changing the sentence, 'Deputies shall be elected by each congregation from the male communicants thereof' so that such sentence will read: 'Deputies shall be elected by each congregation from the communicants thereof, provided that at least fifty (50) percentum of the lay delegates from any Parish or Mission shall be male communicants'."*

*"Be It Further Resolved, that this proposed amendment shall lie over to the next Convention."*

For the information of this Convention your Committee would briefly review the recent history of the efforts which have been made in this Diocese to accord to women the right to serve as vestrymen, wardens, and deputies to the Diocesan Convention. The subject was dealt with in a report to the Diocesan Convention of 1945 (1945 Diocesan Journal 78). The Diocesan Convention in 1946 amended Canon 10, Section II, Clause (6), last sentence, so as to provide that women should be eligible for the office of Vestrymen. (1946 Diocesan Journal 59.) At the 1946 Convention the proposal to give women the right to serve as wardens and deputies to the Diocesan Convention was rejected. At the Diocesan Convention of 1948 a resolution was submitted by St. Paul's Church in Paterson to the effect that the canons should be amended to seat female delegates in the Convention when elected. Such resolution was referred to this Committee which, in its report to the

Convention of 1949, submitted without recommendation for or against the adoption thereof, the form of a resolution to provide for the amendment of the Constitution so as to remove the word "male" from the last sentence of Section 3 of Article 4 of the Constitution and thus to permit the election of women to serve as deputies to the Convention.

Upon a motion being made to adopt such resolution, a vote by orders was called for, and the motion was defeated in the clerical order. (1949 Journal 70-71.)

If this Convention is desirous of considering this subject, we would report to you that a majority of this Committee would favor the proposal to amend the Constitution in such a manner as to permit women to serve as lay deputies to the Convention.

It was moved and seconded that the resolution submitted by All Saints' Church, Bergenfield, be adopted.

Mr. Capron offered an amendment to above motion that sentence be amended to read "Deputies shall be elected by each congregation from the communicants thereof", as proposed in 1949.

Amendment was lost 155 to 178.

Vote was called on original motion which was carried and adopted—Clergy for 74, opposed 47; Lay for 68, opposed 49.

"The amendment cannot become effective unless it again receives affirmative action at the Convention in 1951."

Mr. Donald W. Campbell for the Committee appointed by the 1949 Convention presented the following report, and also reported on the distribution of the printed report.

#### THE RELATION OF CHRISTIANITY TO COMMUNISM.

The resolution printed below explains the nature and object of this report. It is prepared by a Committee appointed by the Bishop of Newark, consisting of five clergymen and five laymen.

WHEREAS, The Lambeth Conference of 1948 has caused to be printed in its report, statements concerning the relation of Christianity to Communism, and has urged all Christians to study and take action concerning this report,

*Therefore, Be It Resolved* by the 75th Convention of the Diocese of Newark

1. That the Bishop of the Diocese appoint a Committee of clergy and laity to study the Lambeth Resolutions and the Committee Report of the Lambeth Conference pertaining to Communism, and,
2. That this Committee cause to be printed and distributed to the clergy and laity of the Diocese 90 days after this Diocesan Convention, the results of the Committee's study, together with proposals the Committee desires to set forth which will guide Christians in their understanding of the relation of Christianity to Communism, and in personal and corporate action in applying Christian Principles to social issues.

#### PREAMBLE.

A prerequisite to the reconciliation of two opposing forces is the careful evaluation of the quality and the measure of the differences that divide them. If we are to understand the contrasting tenets of Communism and Christianity we must first study their teachings and thoroughly comprehend their significance. We must, moreover, calculate the area of their diversity before we can enter upon a course of action. Eventually, we shall arrive at

one of these three alternatives: Christianity will yield to Communism; Communism will be overcome by Christianity, or we shall come to a deadlock.

Since a deadlock now exists between these two ways of life we ought, as Christians, to establish standards for common action. We must be certain that our zeal shall steadfastly uphold corporate action on Pariah, Diocesan, and National Church levels.

We, the undersigned—a committee of Clergy and Laity—faithful to God and the charge laid upon us by Bishop Washburn, in respect to the Resolution proposed by Christ Church, West Englewood, and duly passed by the 75th Diocesan Convention (Diocese of Newark) and acutely aware of the conflict between Christianity and Communism, and the attending ideological and social problems that flow therefrom, and disturbed by the corroding influence of Communism upon the Church and society, transcribe these, our findings, and have caused them to be published and distributed. They are then,

- a) The results of our studies of the Lambeth Conference Resolutions and Committee Reports of 1948.
- b) The proposals for the guidance of Christians in understanding the relation of Christianity to Communism, and in personal and corporate action in applying Christian principles to social issues.

Lest our findings here be set down without due regard for the various types of Communism, propriety demands that we state them and, for the sake of clarity, mark their several differences.

There is the Communism that means communal ownership and stewardship of possessions. Another type "Marxian Communism" atheistically interprets history, while advocating a communal form of economics. A third type being worked out in present day economic practice, is inimical to our Christian Faith. This type, neither purely communal nor Marxian, but a despotic outgrowth of both, needs to be understood. For our purpose and for what follows in these statements, this latter type of Communism is defined thus:

"The ideology that denies the Deity, regards man as a creature of, and subject to the State, and appropriates all civil, economic and political power to the State. The result is that Communism as practiced suppresses freedom of speech, assembly and religion; regards the moral law not as absolute, but relative to the needs of the State; whose leaders require absolute obedience of its adherents and the peoples it has subjugated; and which spreads its gospel by brute force, and with militant enthusiasm expects to conquer the world."

#### THEOLOGICAL AND SOCIAL IMPLICATIONS OF CHRISTIANITY AND COMMUNISM.

What a man believes about himself and the nature of his world reflects itself directly in his daily living. If a false doctrine of man were to sweep the world society would be in danger of destruction.

The basic element in any discussion of social questions is, then, the answer man makes to his own question, "Who and what am I, and in what kind of a world do I live?" In short, the basic problem is a theological one. While men may not ordinarily express themselves in theological language they do act upon their belief, or absence of belief, in the existence of God.

Christianity asserts a belief in an eternal God of all creation; a God who cares for his creation, including man; a God who participates daily in our life here, and who wishes to be united completely with man in the spirit; a God who desires man to know and love Him, and who acts to reveal Himself to man in many ways—notably in the person of Jesus Christ. From this primary belief, and its corollary, that all men are therefore brethren, have sprung profound social convictions and actions. In the person and teachings of Jesus Christ certain divine-human needs have been brought into sharp focus, and the power for meeting these needs has been given. For nineteen hundred years Christianity has continued to insist upon social righteousness based upon this theological foundation. Although the end of man is eternity the Church rightfully seeks to establish

among men now a social order which will reflect, so far as this earth can do so, the mind of Christ.

Communism, whether it be of Karl Marx or any later development, has for its primary tenet a complete denial of the existence of God. History is regarded as a logical process in which events and ideas are determined solely by economic forces. There is no place for the divine element, or for Revelation. There can be no room for a morality higher than that of the State. Man is the creature of the State. His whole destiny is to serve so as to implement the power of the State over the entire world eventually. He is to live by bread alone, and the State is to own all the bread. Expediency and not truth is the guide for the State; the end always justifies the means. It is entirely consistent, then, that this kind of thinking should express itself in a certain kind of social action. It is not strange that where this philosophy has gained political control it has been completely ruthless in social action, opposed violently to freedom of thought, and careless and callous of human integrity and life itself. The proponents of Communism declare that political equality is an illusion so long as economic inequality exists, and that only with State ownership of all property and the liquidation of all classes, except one, can freedom be assured. This, Communism claims, is the fulfillment of democracy in its completest form.

Christianity regards history as a process in which economic forces are ever-present along with many other forces of a divine-human origin. With some justification it has been said that Communism enters fields from which the Church has frequently recoiled. Lambeth reminds us that the needs that have given birth to Communism are needs with which Christianity must concern itself more and more, and from which it has been distant too many times in history. The Church must not be content with argument to combat Communism. This cannot succeed. She must be faithful to the Word of God. The Church must find a means to bring all peoples everywhere into the Kingdom of God. We must make it clear that the Church, as the instrument of God, includes all groups and classes of people. Christians must practice corporately what they preach, and so clean the Household of Faith that the Spirit of God is able to work through it with power.

#### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

The members of this Committee are aware that in view of the irreconcilable conflict between Christianity and Communism, a long term policy of Christian education must be embarked upon and include every Christian person of every age and interest. To accomplish this, the concern of every parish and missionary priest must be enlisted; parish study groups formed, Diocesan groups for study and action enlisted, and the best talents of the National Church employed to organize and publish courses of Christian education. We believe this to be one of the most effective methods the Church can use in teaching the basic principles of Christianity which are in opposition to the tenets of Communism.

Further, we believe that the greatest emphasis today in education is intentionally designed solely to train young people to make a living, without going into the spiritual purposes of life. Some liberal arts colleges and universities provide courses which place emphasis on "good citizenship", but religious instruction, which we believe to be of utmost importance in providing a basis for good citizenship, is generally not included. In fact, in most educational programs in high schools and universities, it is expressly excluded.

We recommend, therefore, that Churchmen everywhere concern themselves with this problem, and use their influence to further the efforts of educators in all fields to provide the richest experience intellectually, socially and spiritually to every individual student. We urge the Church to continue and enlarge its efforts with students attending our colleges and universities, in order to assure a growing and maturing knowledge of Christian worship, doctrine and action.

Our immediate aim for our parishes and missions is to take definite steps to further

education concerning Christianity and Communism. We quote a highly significant statement of the Lambeth Resolutions (page 33, Part I, paragraph 26) in regard to this:

"The Conference believes that Communism is presenting a challenge to Christian people to study and understand its theory and practice, so that they may be well instructed as to which elements in it are in conflict with the Christian view of man and must therefore be resisted, and which elements are a true judgment on the existing social and economic order."

The Lambeth Report also states in its section "The Church and the Modern World", (page 20, Part II):

"It is important that Christians should make sure that they understand the nature of Communism and the different senses in which the word is used."

In order to take this action called for by the Lambeth Conference, we hereby include in our report the following petition to the General Convention of the Episcopal Church which is to meet in San Francisco in September and October of this year:

"We, members of the Diocesan Committee appointed by the Bishop of the Diocese of Newark, in accordance with a resolution adopted by the Seventy-fifth Convention of the Diocese of Newark, held on May 10, 1949, to study the 1948 Lambeth Resolutions and the Committee Report of the Lambeth Conference pertaining to the relation of Christianity to Communism, hereby petition both Houses of the 1949 General Convention of the Episcopal Church to instruct the proper authorities to prepare a study course for parish groups concerning the relation of Christianity to Communism, based on the 1948 Lambeth Report and Resolutions, dealing particularly with the Lambeth statements entitled "The Christian Doctrine of Man", and "The Church and the Modern World", contained in Part II of the Lambeth Conference Report, and the Resolutions pertaining to Communism in paragraphs 25 and 26 of Part I of the Report."

We request the Delegates of the Diocese of Newark to the 1949 General Convention of the Episcopal Church to take the action necessary to have the above petition introduced for appropriate action by the General Convention.

#### CONCLUSION.

We are aware that due to the nature of this report, those who read it may feel we have not sufficiently indicated courses of action which Christians should pursue in relation to their stand in regard to Communism, or in making proposals which will guide Christians in applying Christian principles to social issues. After long and careful deliberations, we have concluded that our primary purpose is not to offer a pattern of action for our fellow Christians but to work for a long term policy of Christian education among our people concerning their full and mature understanding of Christian teachings as to the nature of God's creation and provisions for our corporate welfare, of the Christian teachings concerning the nature of man and his spiritual and physical welfare, and of the Church as the instrument of God in furthering His Kingdom in our corporate life.

Out of this study ought to come a course of action which Christian groups, and the Church at large, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, desire to follow, and will follow. We do not minimize the danger we and all of civilization face in the threat of many Communist doctrines, should they be accepted and acted upon by an aggressive group. We warn our fellow Christians that we are living in a time of crisis, and while the surface issues take form in political and economic theories and action, the basic issue and struggle is for the soul of man. Is man to be allowed to live in the freedom and fulfillment of the Christian religion, with its glories and responsibilities for the corporate welfare of all, or is he to be denied the freedom God has given him in Christ, and be made a servant of despotic men, who neither know Christ nor seek the will and purpose of God?

It is because we fully believe that God is now and always working in and through the total affairs of mankind, that we confidently urge our fellow Christians to unite in furthering the total impact of Christian faith and belief upon our personal and corporate Christian living, knowing that in Christ we shall be empowered to fulfill God's will for His people.

Mr. Capron moved, seconded and carried, "that copies of our printed report be sent to all Episcopal Theological Seminaries, to all Episcopal Church Colleges, to each parish Keyman in the Diocese, and to each parochial President of a Woman's Auxiliary unit, urging their consideration of it, and its possible use for adult study groups."

It was moved and carried that the Committee to Study the Relation of Christianity to Communism be discharged with thanks.

Dr. Spencer Miller, Jr., presented the following resolution:—

WHEREAS, The General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America has on repeated occasions over the past decade supported in principle the extension of the Social Security Act to provide for the coverage of lay employees of the Churches on a voluntary basis, and

WHEREAS, The Diocese of Newark has similarly given its complete support to such an extension of the Act on a voluntary basis, and

WHEREAS, The House of Representatives passed during the first session of the 81st Congress, by an overwhelming vote, the extension of the coverage of the Act to provide among other things for the coverage of lay employees on a voluntary basis, and

WHEREAS, The Senate Committee on Social Security in its initial report deleted the provision for the inclusion of the Church, or its lay employees from the coverage of the Act under any basis, and

WHEREAS, Amendments have now been submitted in the Senate to provide for the inclusion of lay employees but excluding the Clergy, and

WHEREAS, The Senate has not yet voted on this extender of the Act as presently amended to include lay employees of the Church

*Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved*, That the delegates to the 76th Annual Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark do hereby record again its unequivocal support of the extension of the Social Security Act to include lay employees of the Church as consonant with the ideals of social justice, and our affirmatives of the Christian ethic, and

*Be It Further Resolved*, That we urge upon our Senators and Representatives in the 81st Congress of the United States their unremitting efforts to secure the enactment of this long delayed extension of the Act so amended, and that a copy of this resolution be sent to each member of the Congress from New Jersey, and to the National Council of the Episcopal Church.

It was moved and seconded that the above resolution be and is hereby adopted. Unanimously carried.

Mr. Capron requested unanimous consent to present the following resolution:—

*The following resolution was offered and adopted at the 76th Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark, held in Trinity Cathedral in Newark on Tuesday, May 9, 1950:*

The Honorable Dr. Spencer Miller, Jr., one of the most distinguished laymen of the Diocese of Newark, has recently been elected President of the American International College of Springfield, Massachusetts.

Dr. Miller has not only served his home community as President of the Village of South Orange and the State of New Jersey as Commissioner of Highways, but has served our Church in many capacities. He has served the Church of the Holy Communion, South Orange, his own parish, as Vestryman and Senior Warden and many times as deputy to this Diocesan Convention. He served this Diocese as a Deputy to two General Conventions, and served those Conventions as Secretary of the Committee on National and International Relations. He is now a member of the Board of Christian Social Relations. He has served five General Conventions as a technical adviser; the National Council as adviser on international relations. He has served on the National Joint Commission on Christian Social Relations. He has been a communicant of this Church forty-four years and canonically resident in this Diocese for fifty-eight years.

*Therefore, Be It Resolved:*

1. That we express to Dr. Miller our esteem and best wishes in the new work which he is about to undertake.
2. That we express the hope that he may continue his association with this Diocese.
3. That, if he should become canonically resident in the Diocese of Massachusetts, we extend to him a hearty welcome to the Conventions of this Diocese with a right to a seat on the floor of the Convention and the right to speak.

Kilmer Myers, Priest-in-Charge of Grace Church (Van Vorst), Jersey City; the Rev'd Revere Beasley for the Warren County Mission; the Rev'd Benjamin F. The Convention stood in silent prayer in memory of Mr. Murray.

It was moved and seconded that resolution 3 of the report be adopted.

Debate followed on the question of including the sum of \$197,272.00, the quota assigned the Diocese by National Council. The Rev'd Mr. Trowbridge, Dean Warnecke, Mr. Capron, Mr. Ernest May and the Rev'd Karl Kumm spoke.

Question being called the resolution was adopted.

It was moved and seconded, in order, that resolutions 4, 1, and 2 be adopted. Carried.

Mr. Stuart reported as follows on supplementing pensions:—

The Convention of 1949 adopted a resolution that the matter of supplementing the pensions of retired or disabled clergy so as to provide a minimum of \$1,200 for the fiscal year until the next meeting of Convention be referred to the Finance and Advisory Board to provide such assistance as may be possible. Several of the beneficiaries of The Church Pension Fund who were receiving less than \$1,200 were receiving also grants from our diocesan Automatic Pension Fund or other diocesan sources. Others were fortunately still physically able to supplement their pensions by considerable supply work. In the case of one clergyman, a grant of \$600 was made in accordance with the resolution of the Convention. This amount was taken from the Contingent Fund of the 1949 Budget toward Administrative Expense.

The Fifteenth Annual Address of the Suffragan Bishop, the Right Reverend Theodore R. Ludlow, D.D., LL.D., was delivered at this time:

### THE FIFTEENTH ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE SUFFRAGAN BISHOP.

The United States presents a sorry spectacle to a puzzled world. The most powerful nation in the world is busy throwing mud at its own citizens and acting as if it was still an adolescent. Public opinion is dulled and rendered impotent from sheer weariness at the constant barrage of claim and counterclaim. The public will is paralyzed by fear of smear by association. It makes one uneasy to realize that Facism came into power in Germany in just such an atmosphere as we are living in today. Men were afraid then to speak their minds for fear of being smeared as disloyal by reason of their associations. Any comment which seemed to be a bit out of line was liable to lead to a threat of ostracism by a charge of disloyalty without any attempt at proof.

The signs of this Fascist spirit are not wanting among us today. Sugar-coated racketeers move in and out among us waving the American flag and pointing with alarm at Jews, or at Roman Catholics, or at some other group that brings a quick and thoughtless reaction. The most profitable object of attack at the present time is the Communist because everyone is opposed to him, and there is no danger of a libel suit. These schemers delude otherwise intelligent people into banding themselves together, for a consideration of course, against the "secret foe" and add still more division and confusion to our troubled national life.

Inveighing against this foolishness does not help. We must seek the cause. The primary cause is that we have lost any sense of divine direction or purpose in life. Last year, we graduated from our colleges more persons than existed as college graduates in the whole country in the year 1900. During the last fifty years, there has been an ever-increasing supply of college graduates, and yet those years have been described by the Dean of the Harvard Graduate School as "a period of deepening horror". In that period of time, we killed forty per cent more people than had been killed by all the wars in the world over the preceding 800 years. Our educational system

teaches no moral imperative and provides no significance for human life. This compels man to live on the basis of competition, and, in a time of crisis, lacking any standard but his own strength, he gives way to hysteria, because in the field of human relations all of his material and scientific knowledge gained in school is of no avail. This situation is primarily due to the insistence of some of our citizens that the constitutional guarantee of freedom of religion must be interpreted in practice as freedom *from* religion in any tax-supported institution. This throws a tremendous burden on the Church school, but we must accept the challenge and do what we can to save our country from self-destruction. At all costs, we must restore the sense of divine purpose to life.

This divisiveness has not only affected our public and political life, but it has also invaded the religious sphere. At a time when we sorely need demonstrations of cooperation and unity, such an example has been rendered impossible in one instance by the decision of Judge Steinbrink in Brooklyn in denying the desire of the Congregational Christian Church to unite with the Evangelical and Reformed Church, even although representative bodies of both Churches had voted for such union. The ground for his opinion is that "The association of Churches through voluntary, independent organizations devised for fellowship and cooperation, is without ecclesiastical authority". Presumably, the Judge rests his decision upon the term "ecclesiastical authority". By exact, technical legalism, that may be correct, but what about the thinking and practices of the Churches involved? Who is the better judge of an institution,—one who is on the inside living its life, or one who is on the outside looking at it as a stranger? Dr. Albert W. Palmer, a former Moderator of the Congregational Christian Church, says of the decision: "Today, and for many years past, our Ecclesiastical Councils and Associations have exercised ecclesiastical authority by ordaining ministers and by recognizing and dismissing churches." He then goes on to ask: "How is Congregational Christian polity to be defined,—by the obiter dicta of a secular court or by the actual on-going life and practice of the denomination concerned?" That is a valid and pertinent question, for the Congregational Christian Churches had elected representatives for the very purpose of acting for them in this matter of union. But the judge said they had no "ecclesiastical authority", even although they were elected for that very purpose.

And yet, the same judge said that the former Vestry of Holy Trinity Church, Brooklyn, was the legal representative of that parish and could act in the name of that parish, even when such action was not only not expressly authorized by the parish, but was contrary to the wishes of that parish. The fact that the civil action to maintain their positions was brought by the accusing vestrymen under a special New York statute does not change the fundamental thinking. When our canons were turned to for



some basis on which the New York statute might operate, the language of the canon was taken literally, namely, that the vestry was the legal representative of the parish, if it had been legally elected, and that it could act without the knowledge or even in opposition to the wishes of the parish. On the question as to what that canon means to us within the Church and our ideas and practices based upon it, no evidence was permitted save that of the Bishop concerned.

Here is the anomalous situation created by these two decisions if they are finally upheld. We in a parish in the Episcopal Church may find ourselves with a legally-elected body which can act contrary to our wishes as a parish; but a Congregational Christian Church parish cannot have a legal representative, even although it has used an orderly and democratic process for creating one and has authorized it to act in a definite way. What makes the difference between two decisions? Is it the written constitution of our Church as compared to the Congregational polity of the other Church? If so, that constitution in our Church binds all of us together,—bishops, priests, vestrymen and laity—and no section of our fellowship may act contrary to the purpose and spirit of that constitution. When we think in terms of the purpose and spirit of the framers of our constitution, many of them the same men who drew up the national constitution, can we imagine any one of them saying it was quite all right for a vestry to act in opposition to the wishes of the parish which it claimed to represent? The chief concern of the framers of our Church constitution was to preserve and to continue the life and work of the Anglican Church, but at the same time to give it a method of expression suitable to the form of democracy which our new country had determined upon for its life. They took the democratic process to be an integral part of our thinking, and in framing our canons they never dreamed that an authorization to act as legal representative would be interpreted as authority to act against the wishes of the principal.

The Preface to the Prayer Book says, quite rightly, "that this Church is far from intending to depart from the Church of England in any essential point of doctrine, discipline or worship, or further than local circumstances required." The early fathers of our Church in this country realized that local circumstances did require a change, so as to bring the procedure of the Church within the thinking and the practice of the life around it. They, therefore, provided a constitution for the government of the whole body as well as for each and every component part of the Church, so that it would no longer be dependent upon a long series of laws or a mass of tradition built up through years of experience in a country accustomed to a different method of procedure. The aim of the writers of the constitution was to see to it that the rights of all parties were established and related and governed by democratic processes. This is indicated by the

end of the fifth paragraph of the Preface where it is stated that the conduct of affairs in our Church was subject to "the constitution and laws of their country".

In spite of the existence of such a constitution, attempts have been made to drag into our American Church life the whole mass of customs and traditions from the English Church. The latest attempt was at the last General Convention in San Francisco when one of the prime movers in the Melish Case tried to persuade the House of Deputies to adopt an indefinite mass of English laws and traditions as binding upon this Church. What was the motive behind this effort? This move was properly rejected by the House of Deputies, and we can be grateful that they stood up for our American rights. It has been urged in this case that the Episcopal prerogative must not be infringed. I do not like the word, prerogative, because it smacks of the monarchic Episcopate which has no place in our Church, but, of course, it is true that Episcopal authority, when democratically and properly exercised, should be obeyed. That means that that authority must be exercised in accordance with the constitutional rights which we all have in a constitutional Church. It is the godly admonition of the bishop which the priest promises to obey, not just any admonition.

The real issue and only charge in this matter is dissension in the parish. That is a matter of fact and not of law. If thirty per cent of a parish disapprove of a given action and seventy per cent approve, is that dissension? If so, what parish in our Church escapes that technical situation at some time or other? And if that constitutes dissension which may be disposed of by a majority of the vestry without the knowledge or against the wishes of the parish, what priest is safe in his cure? Over 1,000 priests in our Church are enough concerned about their status under the present ruling in the civil action to join as friends of the court in the briefs submitted to the Appellate Court. Such concern is not a matter to be left to a civil court. If the primary ruling was upheld and our Church did nothing about the matter, what chance would we have of being able to draw consecrated men into the priesthood as long as their status was open to such uncertainty? Even although the accusing Vestrymen have been repudiated by the parish and the make-up of the vestry of Holy Trinity Church has been changed by subsequent parish meetings so that it now stands 8 to 2 in favor of the Melishes, still that is not the kind of a settlement which this matter should have, because the uncertainty would still remain. This is a matter which the whole Church itself must face frankly and honestly without any more motions to table and other pleas in avoidance. There is no use crying: "Peace! Peace!" when there is no peace.

The current hysteria has been created by our own lack of divine purpose in life and by the war of nerves which the Communists are waging against us, and in which we fulfill their desire for division when we start smearing

and suspecting one another. The present popular interest in being "against" Communism will not solve the difficulty. Such an effort allows the Communists to define the problems for us and gives them the initiative in the war of nerves. We must actually *do* in the way of justice to *all* what the Communists *say* they will do. We have seen that what they say they will do is accomplished only at the cost of repression and at the loss of liberty. If we are the champions of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, we must prove it by enlarging those resources for *all* of our citizens.

In view of our present mood of dull apathy, can we discipline ourselves to self-restraint in the face of increasing provocation? That will depend upon whether we have faith in a divine purpose and show our faith by our deeds. Many are speculating on how soon Russia will have the atom bomb in sufficient quantity to justify our attacking her first as an act of prevention. Such language is itself provocative, and will spur Russia to greater efforts and furnish a basis for her charge that we are war mongering. Our greatest defense against the propaganda of the word is the propaganda of the deed. We started out well in this respect by inaugurating the Marshall Plan, but we are in danger of losing faith in our own effort. This Plan gave the lie to the Communists who charged that we were rotten and on the point of collapse. Let's face facts and say that Russia is out to dominate the world. The decision we have to make is as to whether our strategy shall be one of tremendous armament with the consequent impairment of our economic life or whether we shall take the initiative in serving the economic needs of other nations and depend upon a reasonable police force armament for our protection.

The tragic fact is that Soviet propaganda depends for its success largely upon our own actions. The Communists conquer by division and the more McCarthys we have, the greater our danger. They succeed by reason of our fear and failure, rather than by their own worth. They seek out the points of friction and aggravate them. Economic insecurity, discrimination, injustice, hopelessness,—these are the things that Communists thrive on. Instead of trying to hide behind some Maginot Line of armament, let us offer China a Five-Year Plan for the rehabilitation of the Yangtze Valley and actually do it without attaching any political or economic strings. Such a deed accomplished in the face of threats will do more to confound Communism than all the guns in the world.

We have mentioned China as a possible proving ground in the struggle between Christianity and Communism. On the surface, the triumph of Communism in that country seems to be complete. Even so, it will pay us from every standpoint to keep ourselves as much informed about the situation in China as is possible. Let us do away with wishful thinking and realize that in all probability, the People's Government has come to stay. Past history indicates that whatever government it is, it will eventually be

Chinese and not a counterpart of the government in any other country. Therein lies our margin of hope. The new government is moving with considerable shrewdness. The Peoples' Political Consultative Conference, which drew up the new constitution, specifically invited seven persons who were to represent the religious life of China in this Conference. Five of these were Christians—three from the Y.M.C.A. and the Y.W.C.A. and two from Protestant bodies. The remaining two religious representatives were Buddhist and Mohammedan. It is interesting to note that no Roman Catholic representative was invited or present because that Church is regarded as representing a government,—that of Vatican City. The seven religious leaders took part in the discussions and had a vote like any other delegate. The theory behind the action of the government is that religion of all kinds, will die a natural death as soon as the social order advances and that, therefore, persecution of any religion is unnecessary.

Tomorrow it will be my privilege to sit in as a trustee of the United Board of Christian Colleges in China to consider how we may best maintain the Christian character of these colleges, because, so far, the colleges have not been restricted in the matter of religious freedom. Middle schools and preparatory schools have been. Strong city churches have been able to maintain themselves, but eighty per cent of the rural churches in North China have been closed. In Manchuria, only 47 out of 291 churches remain open, and these are all self-supporting parishes. One of the chief problems confronted in maintaining Christian institutions is found in the unexpected taxes which are spasmodically levied on these institutions on the plea of aid to needy people which the Christians ought to be glad to give!

All of these conditions challenge the Christians of China to harder thinking and to deeper faith, and will inevitably bring about definite changes as well as hasten native autonomy and Church unity. The churches are under suspicion by the government because of their "foreign connections"; and, to avoid this, my former Diocese of Hankow has gone on its own as the Diocese of Ngo-Siang in the Holy Catholic Church in China. You will no longer find it listed in the "Living Church Annual" as a part of the American Church.

My object in detailing this situation here is two-fold. The first is to challenge our own thinking. What would we in this country do under similar circumstances? How deep and true is our theology and how much does our practice conform to it? My other purpose is to check any idea that might arise in your minds that because Communism has taken over the government of China that, therefore, our responsibility,—financial, and otherwise—has ceased. On the contrary, our responsibilities have been increased by the very uncertainty as to how and where we can help. The need of help is very definite and must be continued in increasing measure because of pyramiding costs in China.

A report from the Board of Christian Social Relations has been (or will be) presented to this body on the matter of the proposal for establishing a basic salary for all the clergy of the diocese, with certain supplementary amounts. That report speaks for itself and I trust will be given a thoughtful and careful consideration. I believe it should be given sincere study because, at the present time in the matter of income, we have two kinds of priests in the Church—mission field priests and diocesan priests. I do not believe that that is a healthy situation. Nor do I believe, as the report states, that we have to wait for the whole Church to act before attempting to face the problem as a diocese. Two weeks ago, I was happy to accept an invitation from the Diocese of Montreal to share in the celebration of their One Hundredth Anniversary and to address a laymen's luncheon on this subject. The luncheon was attended by approximately one thousand people, and their reaction was very interesting. The experience shows that we are not the only ones who have become conscious of a problem. I hope a committee representative of both the clergy and the laity of this diocese may be asked to assist the Board of Christian Social Relations in a further study of this matter.

There is another matter which stems from the work of the Board of Christian Social Relations. Our country was founded for the express purpose of enlarging life, expanding liberty and permitting the individual to secure as much happiness as was consistent with the general welfare. Those are still our responsibilities and because we have claimed them as basic, the world looks wistfully in our direction for an increasing expression of them. With an opportunity for leadership presented to us, we hesitate, wondering whether we are heading toward too much welfare for the individual citizen and may thereby find ourselves so deeply involved that liberty may be impaired. Christian people need to do some thinking about this, otherwise it will become a political football. Under the plea of providing for the general welfare, selfish politicians have not hesitated to promise everybody everything they ask and, as Al Smith said several years ago, it is hard to beat Santa Claus.

Let's try to face ourselves realistically. We had to have everybody for the war effort; therefore, we catered to everybody. Now everybody feels his importance and wants life managed his way. Under the pressure of wartime need, we made economic changes that should have been made some time before and not left to pressure. For those who sense their new importance, we have gone too slow; for those who prefer the old ways, we have gone too fast.

In facing this problem, we must remember this fact, that Socialism and Communism come into power only where men fail in their responsibilities to their fellow men. Are we prepared to say that democracy has done all that it can or should do for the individual citizen? Some would say "yes"

and, therefore, believe that we must seek some different form of government. Others would say that the task in a democracy is always to enlarge liberty for others. This thereby releases new potentialities of service to society but, at the same time, creates additional problems of supplying the new human needs which arise out of the giving of that service. During the time of growth and the resulting tension, some body or institution must stand between the individual and possible disaster, so that the change can be reasonably controlled for the common good. Usually, that somebody is some branch of the government. That is not an unnatural function for a government founded on the principle of providing for the general welfare. Since that is its basic principle, the government should not be simply an ambulance state for the wounded, but by this very principle is charged with the responsibility of advancing progressively the welfare of the citizens.

Some say regretfully that we are at the end of an era. Others say that we are at the beginning of new and larger possibilities which have, it is true, added to our responsibilities. We must create the situation for the expression of those larger potentialities by: putting a floor under life, equalizing opportunities, acting as guardian of common resources and drawing all humanity into a family relationship. The cost of such effort staggers some people, but that is because they consider only the total cost of government. In all fairness, we must point out that three-quarters of our national income goes for war service, past and present, the public debt, veteran care, and other war-occasioned expenditures. Only one-quarter of all income is spent on ordinary government, law, order, education, health and welfare. Our real anxiety should be the cost of armament and not with that of welfare. While it is charged that this concern for welfare is paternalistic, we as Christians must recognize that we are our brothers' keepers and must discharge that responsibility in spite of the names it may be called. When a concern for others' welfare is called materialistic, we must remember that God's word says to each one of us, "If a brother or sister be naked and destitute of daily food and one of you say unto them, 'Depart in peace, be ye warmed and filled'; notwithstanding, ye give them not these things which are needful to the body, what doth it profit?"

And there would seem to exist a serious need which is not always realized. The Federal Reserve Board has recently completed a study of the families of the United States particularly with regard to income and savings. Their findings show that fifty-three per cent of all the families in the United States earn less than \$3,000 per year; that nearly half of them have no savings or other resources, and that the savings of the other half average less than \$500. Let us ask ourselves an honest question or two. How much rent, food and clothing does \$3,000 buy for a family today? In the event of an emergency like sickness, old age or unemployment, how far would \$500 go in the care of a family? Insurance is a much more demo-

cratic and Christian word than relief.

Much of the impatience and misunderstanding about this topic would be removed if we would honestly admit that the necessity for the government's taking over this responsibility has arisen out of our neglect of our fellow men, both as businessmen and as Christians. There is a proper concern about the political use of the welfare principle and about the danger of bureaucracy, but much of this can be avoided by seeing to it that local needs, so far as possible, are met on the local level and not passed along to a distant national government. It is the lack of local concern and responsibility which is the danger spot in the application of the welfare principle.

Whatever individual businessmen may say, the National Association of Manufacturers realizes the need of growth of welfare security for employees, and in its "Industry Believes" urges: more opportunity for handicapped workers, employment stabilization, protection of health and safety on the job, promotion of voluntary plans of medical care and a sound program of federal old-age insurance.

We are the people who, for the most part, turned loose on the world the ideas of national welfare and democracy, and now they have returned to catch us unprepared, because we talked about these things rather than executed them for our own people. We must see that our social lives enforce what our lips have uttered or we will enlarge those social irritations upon which Communism feeds. There are certain things which we can do in the present situation. We must try to change the attitude of mind of our people. We can teach them to shun the present hysteria which calls every demand for change and growth subversive. We must quit trying to defeat Communism by continually looking under our beds and give ourselves to continually looking into our Bibles and living by what we find there. We can help to lower the man-made barriers of prejudice between people, and thereby release ever-increasing potential for the welfare of the whole of society. The Essex County Intergroup Council is striving to do this very thing, and I am happy to be able to share in the work of that group. It is made up of representatives of fifteen different organizations and is concerned with integrating all human relations into a real community. Finally, we can prevent socialization by helping the needy locally, by sharing the fruits of industry equitably with others who help us produce them, and particularly by providing for future security in a society which is steadily increasing in age.

We must meet these increasing obligations both at home and abroad with a humble prayer for guidance and with a sacrificial effort which shall include all that we have and are. The primary response must be personal, right where we are, in our homes and in our parishes, but the problems extend beyond our localities. We must face them as a whole if we are to bring them to a Christian solution.

This necessarily involves sacrificial giving. I am aware of the danger of resistance or indifference arising out of constant calls for sacrifice, and yet, sacrifice is the very foundation stone of our religion. Genuine sacrifice depends upon knowledge and a devoted will, and it is our primary concern to establish this knowledge and to inspire this will. For this reason, under the guidance of the Presiding Bishop, we asked a group of laymen to meet here in the Cathedral House last January for a whole day of training in the work of the Church. Forty-six of our laymen responded to that invitation, and we are deeply grateful for their personal sacrifice and for the results in the way of knowledge and increased giving which came out of that effort. Under the March 12th appeal of our Presiding Bishop, our diocese gave \$45,000 in addition to its regular pledge. That was not all that was asked of us, but it does represent real sacrificial giving on the part of those who did give, and we are grateful to them.

Our next effort must be to arouse those people who were not reached by this plan and strive to spread more widely the knowledge of the whole work of the Church. To this end, we have appointed Sunday, September 24, as a day of training in this Diocese in the whole work of the Church. This last February, we made our approach to the vestries. This Fall, we propose to make our approach to the congregations as a whole. On September 24, we will gather together in this House a selected group of laymen who will spend the whole day in being trained to speak to your congregation in parish meeting, preferably a supper meeting, and who will, after the close of the parish meeting, go on to assist your canvassers in the task of spreading the word to every one of your people. Presently, you will be asked to designate three evenings between September 25 and November 11 when it will be convenient for you to hold such a meeting in your parish so that the bishops may select one of those evenings for the visit of a trained layman to your congregation. It is an essential part of the plan that every one of your canvassers should be present at this parish meeting. Our hope and belief is that the knowledge given to your vestrymen this Spring, plus the knowledge imparted to your people in this meeting in the Fall, plus the techniques given to your individual canvassers at this meeting, will enable you to do an intelligent and consecrated task in your parish. The point that must be kept clearly in mind by all is that our giving next Fall for 1951 must equal what we gave this year, plus what we gave on March 12th, if we are to maintain our present position. But with increased and more widespread knowledge, we ought to give more. The need is much more.

In the accomplishment of this task, we count heavily not only upon the devoted laymen, but upon the leadership and cooperation of the clergy. We live in a day of extremes: violent indignation and fatalistic resignation. Neither one is Christian. In between, there is a realm of moral responsibility which must be rationally and fearlessly followed by those who claim



the name of Christ. That leadership must be given by our clergy. We of the clergy must recognize that our job is dangerous. We are called upon to set men free, to enlarge life for all. To do so may cause us to tread on some conservative toes. Let us courteously urge such people to join the forward march of humanity. If they are unwilling to do so, we dare not pussyfoot, lest the rest of our people be without leadership in a time of decision. If they fail to make that decision in accordance with the plea of Christ, He will, as always, look to another people to carry on His purpose. That truth has been well expressed by one who knows the course of history as an expert. I refer to Arnold Toynbee, who says :

"Looking back over the 21 civilizations I have studied, I am not sanguine about man's ability to make a good moral decision if he aims only at a worldly goal. Love of mankind has been a force in history—but only when it was a by-product of an intense love of God.

"The great need of the modern world is a rebirth of supernatural belief. Without it, man—unregenerate man—is hardly to be trusted with the dangerous toys his laboratories have hatched.

"Such a rebirth of Christian values is quite possible. It may come from some of the 'backward' peoples who have not let had their moment in the limelight of history and have not, therefore, fallen victims to the pride and self-idolatry which may blind the great powers.

"There is great, unreleased energy in some of the peoples who have only lately caught the spiritual meaning of the Christian Church: the American Negro, the inmates of the displaced persons camps, the peoples of the underprivileged countries of Asia. Perhaps these people are to be our saviours. It is an historical as well as Biblical truth that 'the meek shall inherit the earth'."

It is our duty to set an example of meekness. It is a mistake to think of meekness as supineness. Moses was a meek man, but he was certainly not supine. His meekness consisted in his faith in a God of purpose who would not and could not be turned aside from the accomplishment of that purpose. Because of his faith in that purpose, Moses submitted himself meekly to God to be used by Him as He saw it. That is the meekness that must possess every one of us so that the present cynicism and confusion may be banished and human fellowship, growth and decency again be accepted as the guiding principles of life. Only so shall we know the power of God in our lives.

## STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT.

### For the Year 1949.

Seven meetings of the Standing Committee were held during 1949.

*February 28, 1949:*

Consent given to the consecration of the Rev'd Robert Fisher Gibson, Jr., to be Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia.

Consent given to the Diocese of Alabama to elect a Suffragan Bishop, to the Diocese of Pennsylvania to elect a Suffragan Bishop, and to the Diocese of Ohio to elect a Coadjutor Bishop, because of the extent of Diocesan work.

The Secretary reported the following consent by circularization:

"February 4, 1949—Consent given by circularization to the Church of the Attonement, Tenafly, to sell certain property to Gilbert H. Mudge for the sum of \$22,000 cash."

Consent given to the Church of St. Mary Magdalene, Newark, to sign papers relinquishing title to certain property when a proper petition was filed.

The Rev'd James Bennett Edwards was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the priesthood and consent was also given to the Bishop to receive into the ministry of this Church, Michael Lynch, formerly a priest of the Roman Catholic Church.

*March 21, 1949:*

A motion was adopted that the Standing Committee recommend to the Bishop that he approve the application of All Saints' Mission, Millington, to be incorporated as a parish.

Consent was given to St. Luke's Church, Hope, to sell the vicarage property to Charles Green for the sum of \$2,500.

Mr. Mills Schenck, Jr., was recommended to the Bishop for admission as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

Approval was given to certain expenditures from the following funds, namely the Jesse Williams Fund, the Hannibal Goodwin Fund and the Church Aid Society.

*May 16, 1949:*

The Rev'd L. Harold Hinrichs was elected President of the Standing Committee and the Rev'd W. O. Lealie, Jr., Secretary.

The Messrs. Edward Wilbur Conklin and Donald Thomas Oakes were recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate.

Consent was given to the Church of St. Mary Magdalene, Newark, to transfer certain property in Rahway to James A. Mintel and Freda Mintel.

Consent was given to the Diocese of Alabama for the consecration of the Rev'd Randolph R. Claiborne, Jr., as Suffragan Bishop and to the Diocese of Minnesota to elect a Suffragan Bishop.

*June 14, 1949:*

Consent was given to the Diocese of Chicago to elect a Suffragan Bishop and to the

Diocese of Pennsylvania for the consecration of the Rev'd Joseph Gillespie Armstrong, 3rd, as Suffragan Bishop.

Mr. Franklyn Y. Weiler was recommended to the Bishop for admission as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

The Standing Committee, the Bishop also voting approval, elected as Trustees of the Diocesan Investment Trust Fund the following persons:

*October 24, 1949:*

Dr. John van Dyk was recommended to the Bishop for admission as a Candidate for Holy Orders and the Rev'd Edward Wilbur Conklin for ordination to the priesthood.

Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev'd Allen Jerome Miller as Bishop of the Diocese of Easton and of the Rev'd Nelson Marigold Burroughs as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Ohio.

It was moved, seconded and carried, the Bishop concurring, that St. George's Church, Passaic, be declared extinct in accordance with Canon 16, Section 6 of the Canons of the Diocese of Newark.

Consent was given to the Board of Missions to sell the chapel and house on Tulip and Sherman Streets, Passaic, for the sum of \$6,000.

The Bishop having nominated the Rev'd Welles Bliss as a member of the Board of Examining Chaplains, the Standing Committee confirmed this appointment.

*November 28, 1949:*

Consent was given to the Board of Missions to mortgage the vicarage property of St. Andrew's Church, Lincoln Park, for the sum of not more than \$7,000.

Consent was given to the Board of Missions to transfer title of certain property to the corporation of All Saints', Millington.

Mr. John Patterson was recommended to the Bishop for admission as a Candidate for Holy Orders, the Rev'd Donald T. Oakes and Paul Moore, Jr., for ordination to the Priesthood.

*December 29, 1949:*

Consent was granted to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund to convey to All Saints' Parish, Millington, that portion of their property where title rests with the Trustees.

Consent was given to the election of the Rt. Rev'd Horace William Baden Donegan, D.D., as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of New York and consent was also given to the Diocese of New York to elect a Suffragan Bishop.

Consent was given to the Church of the Holy Communion, South Orange, to mortgage its church and parish house property for not more than \$30,000.

Messrs. Arthur John Ehlenberger, William Wesley Konrad, Benjamin Pierson Ford and Worthington Campbell, Jr., were recommended to the Bishop for admission as Candidates for Holy Orders.

The following report of The Board of Missions and Church Extension was presented by title:—

Newark, N. J.  
May 9th, 1950.

*To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark, N. J.*

The Board of Missions and Church Extension held SEVEN regular meetings during the calendar year 1949.

The Board has given much time and consideration to the state of our Mission Stations, to the matter of repairs and improvements to the buildings, the acquisition and sale of properties and the pressing needs for financial assistance, have all received careful attention and consideration. Committees for counsel and advice to Mission Committees and Congregations have been appointed. The Board also advises the Bishop in regard to requests for loans or grants from the Bishop's Church Extension Fund.

*Meeting, February 18th:*

*Maywood, St. Martin's.*—Report was received, that beginning March 1st, this Mission will assume and pay the entire stipend of its Vicar.

*Lincoln Park, St. Andrew's.*—Consent was given to the part time leasing of Thorpe Hall, to the Board of Education for week day school purposes.

*Meeting, March 16th:*

The Committee on Budget made a detailed report, showing that the Board of Missions would need the sum of \$76,832.00 for its work during the coming year. The proposed Budget was approved and a resolution was passed that it be recommended to the Finance and Advisory Board for its favorable consideration and approval.

*Millington, All Saints.*—A communication was received from this Mission that it was planning to apply to the next Diocesan Convention for admission as a Parish.

*Passaic, St. George's.*—A resolution was passed that work at this station be discontinued as of Easter Day. It was then resolved that the property be turned over for use by St. Andrew's Mission, a colored congregation. It was also resolved that the present property of St. Andrew's be sold and that the proceeds of the sale be used to repair and recondition the St. George's Church building, and also that we guarantee a sum up to \$1500.00 per year for the next THREE years to apply toward the operating expenses of St. Andrew's congregation in the old St. George's Church building.

*Meeting, May 18th:*

The whole of this day was given over to visitation to the following places: St. Peter's, Livingston; St. Joseph's, Lake Lackawanna; St. Mary's, Sparta. Luncheon at Sparta Inn, and from there to St. Jude's, Branchville; Christ Church, Newton; St. Luke's, Hope; St. James', Hackettstown, and St. Peter's, Washington, arriving at this last place at 5:15 P.M. All of the places visited showed well kept properties.

The regular Board meeting was called to order in St. Peter's Parish House at 5:30 P.M. The following Officers were elected to serve for the ensuing year:

The Rt. Rev'd Theodore R. Ludlow, D.D. .... *Vice-President*  
Mr. Gustave E. Wiedenmayer ..... *Treasurer*  
Mr. Henry J. Russell ..... *Secretary*

*Montvale, St. Paul's.*—Approval was given to erect a Vicarage at a cost of \$14,397.00.

*Passaic, St. George's and St. Andrew's.*—A committee with power was appointed to have oversight to the repairs to the old St. George's Church building and also to sell the St. Andrew's property on Tulip Street in Passaic.

*Bloomfield, Church of the Advent.*—Record was made of aid and assistance in the sum of \$3500.00 from this Board, to help pay part of the cost of the new Vicarage for this place.

*Jersey City, Grace Church, Van Vorst.*—Report was made that on and after June 30th,

1949, services will be in charge of 2 Priests and 1 Deacon, who will endeavor to do intensive missionary work in the lower section of Jersey City.

TWO interesting addresses were given to the Board by the Rev'd Messrs. Ford and Beasley. Both of them laid particular stress on the wide area of their individual fields of responsibility and emphasized the urgent need of additional workers in the northwestern part of our State.

*Meeting, September 21st:*

Messrs. Fred Stuart (Chairman), Cecil Tate and John C. Garde were appointed to serve as Mortgage Committees for the ensuing year.

Report was made that the property of the Church of St. Anthony of Padua, Hackensack, is now entirely clear of debt.

*Harrington Park, St. Andrew's.*—This congregation is planning an enlargement to the Church Building and Parish House. A committee of this Board was appointed for counsel and advice to the congregation.

*Meeting, October 19th:*

*Passaic, St. Andrew's.*—A resolution was passed authorizing repairs and renovation to the Church building, formerly St. George's, at a cost amounting to about \$4000.00.

*Harrington Park, St. Andrew's.*—Estimates were shown that the cost of an enlargement to the Parish House would cost about \$8,500.00. It was ordered that the work proceed, but only provided that the congregation first raise \$4,000.00 in cash to apply to the cost, the balance remaining to be by mortgage.

*Lincoln Park, St. Andrew's.*—It was ordered that a private house adjoining the Church property be purchased at a cost of \$10,000.00 for use as a Vicarage. The matter being financed in the following manner: Congregation \$1000.00; Gift from the Board \$1000.00; Call from the Bishop's Church Extension Fund \$1000.00; balance \$7000.00 on mortgage.

*Ringwood, Good Shepherd.*—It was ordered that a new heating unit be installed at a cost of \$400.00. The congregation to pay one-half of the cost, the balance needed to be a gift from the Board.

*Meeting, November 16th:*

*Rockelle Park, St. Peter's.*—An announcement was made that this Mission was anxious to make application for admission to the Convention as a Parish. The Board voted approval, but that St. Peter's must first liquidate and pay the mortgage indebtedness now standing on its land and premises.

*Millington, All Saints.*—This station now being that of a Parish, it was ordered that the proper Officers of this Board convey all lands and premises which it held for All Saints Mission, over to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of All Saints Church in Millington, Morris County, N. J.

A resolution was passed directing that all funds under the control of this Board be reinvested in the Diocesan Investment Trust.

*Meeting, December 14th:*

*Woodridge, St. Paul's.*—A committee of the Board was appointed for counsel and advice to the congregation of St. Paul's in relation to the needs for enlarged facilities to their church plant.

*Livingston, St. Peter's.*—A splendid report was made about this place by Bishop Washburn. He stated that he had confirmed a class of 30 people. That the Church School has an enrollment of 182. A Men's Club, a Mr. & Mrs. Club and a School for Religion have been organized, also that the attendance at Church services is increasing in a very hopeful manner.

*Hackensack, St. Cyprian's.*—This congregation has long felt the need of an organ.

A suitable one will cost \$2000.00. They have \$1000.00 on hand and a plan to raise the balance needed. The congregation was told that as soon as they have \$1500.00 in cash, to then go ahead and make the purchase.

### CHURCH PENSION FUND COMMITTEE.

*To the 1950 Convention of the Diocese of Newark:*

Your Diocesan Church Pension Fund Committee respectfully reports as follows for the calendar year 1949:

Under the plan of increased pensions, effective January 1, 1950, the Fund, as of April 4, 1950, had 2,670 beneficiaries with pensions of \$2,465,411.00 as compared with the previous figure for these beneficiaries of \$1,478,279.00, or an increase of 67%.

"Nineteen out of every twenty pensions have been increased. Every clergyman's pension is now \$1,500 a year or more and the widow's pension \$750 or more, except in cases of late ordination (reception), unpaid assessments, and average salaries of under \$1,500 a year. And the allowances for minor orphans are higher."

This forward step, authorized by the General Convention and made possible by the increase in the pension assessment rate from 10 to 15 per cent of clergy stipends, is reflected realistically in the following table:

This shows a total payment by the Church Pension Fund proper to 56 beneficiaries in the Diocese in the sum of \$58,458.96. This is an increase over the amount reported in the Convention in 1949 of over \$25,500.

It seems wise to call the attention of the members of our Diocesan Convention to the affiliated companies of the Church Pension Fund, namely the Church Life Insurance Corporation, the Church Fire Insurance Corporation, and the Church Hymnal Corporation. With respect to the condition of pension assessments in our own Diocese, your committee is glad to report that there are no unpaid assessments due in the Diocese for the year 1949 and that there are only three clergymen in our Diocese whose entire assessment schedules are not complete up to December 31, 1949. Your Diocesan Committee is appreciative of the cooperation of the persons responsible for making possible this good report.

### BOARD OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION. REPORT FOR 1949-1950.

The School Year of 1949-1950 is the basis for this report. The last word mentioned in the previous 1948-1949 summary was the National Council's study under Dr. John Huess of the educational situation in our Episcopal Church. In the Diocese of Newark, we have seen that Dr. Huess and his program has been given a wide hearing. Besides opportunity of speaking at intimate gatherings of clergy under the auspices of the two clerici of the Diocese, Dr. John Huess was the dinner speaker, and main attraction at one of the best attended Church School Conventions that have been held in recent years. There, the teachers of the Diocese who bear the brunt of the burden Sunday by Sunday, heard his challenge to better teaching, and his plans to help them through the National Department of Christian Education.

Other happenings have developed out of the renewed emphasis of the Episcopal Church in Christian Education. Several clergy of the Diocese have gone to the College of Preachers at Washington, D. C., for one week Workshop Conferences under the direction of the National Department of Christian Education.

There have been published during the year, "Bridging Some Gaps in our Present Programs of Christian Education", "The Church Looks Ahead to the New Curriculum" (Specifications), "The Holy Scriptures" and the kit "Consider the Bible". These are all related to one another. Although they all deal with the needs of adults as to fact and orientation in the Christian religion, and are not texts for children, they mark a step forward. For it is on the approach of the adult, parent, or other relative, that makes up the immediate environment of the growing child day by day, that real results will depend. Capture them if they have been indifferent to the Christian cause, and a whole household is directed in a religious way. Or, if they are already committed parents, supplying fact and information improves their influence on growing children.

Several steps have been taken to make these new tools available. During Lent 1950, there was a quite general use of "The Holy Scriptures" as the basis for adult discussion

groups, lecture courses, or teaching sermons. As the pamphlets "Consider the Bible" were not ready until mid-Lent, and the first edition of "The Holy Scriptures" was soon exhausted, many churches in the Diocese have yet to make this study available to their membership.

The Field Secretary has been called upon to interpret to individual parish groups the new program. He has emphasized the use of "Bridging Some Gaps in Our Present Programs of Christian Education". In this study any church will be able to evaluate its educational program and start the process of informing both teachers and parents of their task.

The Board of Religious Education has further implemented the effort of broadening the educational interest in the Diocese by authorizing the publication five times a year of "POMPKAS". This is for the rank and file of lay teachers and superintendents as well as clergy to keep them informed of developments. A Lenten issue and a post-Easter issue has already been published.

Another means of publicizing has been the holding of two "Parish Leaders' Conferences", one at Jersey City, and the other at Hackensack. Both were well attended as to numbers and wide participation by parishes. Here the story of the National effort of the Episcopal Church, was given and over seventy dollars worth of the new publications of the church were sold. Other centers will probably be offered a similar presentation in the fall.

The Board of Religious Education itself had some searchings of heart as to its own effectiveness. After a study by a committee that used the National Council Handbook for "Diocesan Departments of Christian Education" a Report and Recommendation was brought to the Board. The latter were adopted, reorganizing the function of the Board. Henceforth, it will work through three main committees—Church School, Youth, and Adult Education. Each of these major committees will have sub-committees. For subdivisions of the Church School Committee there will be—Standards, Church School Convention, Guild of the Christ Child, Missionary Education, Visual Education; for Youth, the High School Conference Committee; for Adult Education, Eagle's Nest Summer Conference Committee and College Work. For continuity it is recommended that chairman be appointed for three years and then rotate.

The recommendations also envisage the meeting of the whole Board of Religious Education three times a year with an executive committee made up of officers, Field Secretary and committee chairmen, meeting monthly. The various committees would meet as often as necessary to carry out their tasks. This whole new set up is to be put into practice in the school year 1950-1951.

Other activities of the year which should be mentioned are the following: The 1950 Eagle's Nest Summer Conference is being planned around the theme "Christian Answers to Life's Problems". It will have courses interpreting the Church's Teaching Series, namely "The Holy Scriptures" and "Chapters in Church History". The Rev'd Charles Stires is Dean.

The 1950 High School Conference is concentrating on an intensive effort with fifty young people for a five day period with the Rev'd Charles Mosby, Director.

The Guild of the Christ Child revised and republished under "Prayers for the Nursery", the old prayer booklet for the parents of very young children which had formerly appeared under the title of "Prayers for Very Little Folk".

The Christmas Box Work, under the direction of Mrs. Oliver Lee, made an outstanding record sending more than 2500 individual gifts to the Philippines; cash gifts of \$100.00 to Puerto Rico; \$150.00 to the Dominican Republic; and \$50.00 to the Seaman's Church Institute as well as supplying local needs at Ringwood Manor and for Chaplains of Institutions.

The various offerings and their participation by parishes were as follows:—



1949 Lenten Offering: 128 Church Schools contributed \$17,505.48.

1949 Advent Offering: 98 Church Schools contributed \$2,315.52.

1948-1949 Birthday Thank Offering for the Church at Roanridge, Missouri, amounted to \$281.99 from 22 Church Schools.

The 1949 Youth Sunday Offering for St. Francis Boys' Home in Kansas, received from 8 parish youth groups of the Diocese, the sum of \$140.89. The total national sum for this object is currently reported at \$20,243.70.

The Field Secretary, the Rev'd A. Stewart Hogenauer, has maintained his contact with many educational agencies such as Department of Education and Evangelism, N. J. Council of Churches, The Newark Film Council, The Newark Council—Boy Scouts of America, as well as preaching at various churches, and filling appointments with parish educational groups. He looks forward to increasing calls upon his time to implement the increasing surge of interest in the educational task of the Episcopal Church.

Mrs. Olive C. Sanford, Chairman of The Board of Christian Social Relations, made the following report:—

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS.

May 1950.

The Board of Christian Social Relations has carried on through this year, following the very excellent direction of its program as presented to the Convention of 1949 by its outgoing Chairman. We note some progress, some disappointments.

It has been mainly a matter of continuing efforts already begun, through the existing Committees of Institutions and Agencies, Housing, Basic Salary and the new Committee on Displaced Persons.

Completion of the handbook of Social Agencies has been delayed because new lists of the State-directed welfare institutions have not been available, although they are now expected shortly. Support of the \$25,000,000 Bond Issue for additions and improvements to the welfare institutions of the State, endorsed by the Diocesan Convention last year, was earnestly followed up. We rejoice to note that following the successful passage of the referendum, the necessary appropriation has just been made available.

Following approval by the Diocesan Convention of extension of low-rent housing units, the Board felt obligated to do all in its power to implement passage of the referendum on Housing Legislation last November. Financial assistance was given to the New Jersey Housing Council and information about the proposals sent to all the clergy, asking for their cooperation in furthering understanding of and action upon the measure in their respective parishes. Although the referendum was lost, the Committee is being continued to watch new developments which may arise and be ready for action.

In the field of World Relationships, much time and thought have been given to the problem of resettlement of Displaced Persons and a special committee appointed. The Committee has devoted its energy to circularizing the clergy twice, offering help in completing assurances, and requesting cooperation in reaching the desired quota for our Diocese of 15 to 25. To date, we have heard of 14 assurances being given. We appreciate the assistance given by the Woman's Auxiliary, through its Department of Social Action.

The Committee on the Study of the Basic Salary Plan has continued its study and has sent out an interim report to the clergy, vestries, and executive committees of parishes and missions for study and criticism. The Board asks continuation of the study and that the committee be enlarged by Convention action.

There have been monthly Board meetings and one special meeting. Two members of the

Board attended the Church and Economic Life Conference in Detroit, and copies of the Conference report have been distributed to the members for study.

In cooperating with the Department of Christian Social Relations of the Diocese of New Jersey, our Board was again host to the Church Social Workers who met at Atlantic City at the National Conference of Social Workers, and was represented there by the Chairman and several members. Much to our regret, we heard there that the provision for lay persons in the Old Age Security Bill had been elided in Committee and a call for action indicated. If not too late, this will be followed up by Board action.

There is no lack of problems facing us in this troublous world of today. Our problem is to study them carefully, face them honestly and to find means of presenting our findings to our Church people at large, so that they may be effective.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Rules of Order be suspended, and that unanimous consent in the Clerical Order be given to the election of the Rev'd Leonard F. Nichols as Deputy to The Provincial Synod, Class of 1953, and the Ven. John A. Frampton as Supplementary Deputy, Class of 1953.

The same motion was made and carried by the Lay Order.

Dean Frederick J. Warnecke presented the following report of Trinity Cathedral:—

This has been a year of progress in the life of our Cathedral, building upon the good foundations laid in years past. There has been increased understanding of the place of a Cathedral in the life of our Diocese, and therefore, increased usefulness by the Cathedral.

We have begun a daily Cycle of Prayer for the clergy and congregations. Every Church has been included in this cycle. We have also remembered in prayer all special occasions, such as anniversaries, ordinations, and special events in the life of the parishes. On Rogation Sunday we pray by name for all the Churches and clergy ministering in the rural areas of the Diocese.

Nearly 1,200 people from thirty Churches have come on Pilgrimages to the Cathedral. They have joined in worship in their Cathedral, and been guided through the Cathedral and Cathedral House. Each was given a leaflet telling of our Cathedral, and a golden "Souvenir of Pilgrimage".

The clergy of the Diocese have been magnificently cooperative in all our work. Many of them have conducted services here. Over fifty clergymen have ministered in the Cathedral since January 1st, 1950!

A series of "Missionary Services" brought distinguished leaders of our Church to the Diocese: Bishop Bentley; the Bishop of Wyoming; the Bishop of Liberia; Dr. Tollie Caution; a Japanese priest, etc. Next Sunday at 4:30 P.M., the Rev'd Canon Hayden, vicar of St. Nicholas' Church, Warwick, England, will be the guest preacher. Attendance at Evensong on Sundays has more than doubled.

The week-day services were newly planned last fall. A celebration of the Holy Communion has been held each Holy Day at 8:15 A.M. to permit office workers to attend before going to work. There has been a weekly Service of Spiritual Healing at noon on Tuesdays conducted by the Rev'd Mr. Axleroad, which has met a great need. Instruction, counseling, prayer, the laying on of hands and unction are used. Intercessory prayer groups have been formed to aid this ministry.

A weekly Bible Class on Wednesdays at noon has been taught by the Dean. The Holy Communion is celebrated each Thursday. On Fridays, clergy of the Diocese preach at a brief noon-time service. Attendance at these services has more than tripled over last year.

During Lent, we had the cooperation of the clergy and of a committee of laymen in

planning our services. There was a new daily celebration of the Holy Communion. Six distinguished clergymen, five of them Bishops, preached at the noon-day services. Ushers volunteered from twenty parishes. Five faithful, but lonely men, bravely sang in a Lenten Choir! However, total attendance was not much larger than other years. We need deeper interest in these Lenten services if they are to have a real impact upon the life of our city.

Diocesan services of many kinds were held in the Cathedral: The United Thank Offering Service of the women; the Mite Box Presentation of the children; Diocesan Ordinations; the graduation service of St. Barnabas' Hospital; Youth Rallies; Laymen's Services.

Certain great civic services were also held in the Cathedral, including a Service of Brotherhood on Lincoln's Birthday which included representatives of the Jewish faith.

The Cathedral has attempted to be of constant service in the Diocese. The Cathedral clergy have spoken, upon invitation, in nearly forty Churches. They have gladly volunteered for service in many parish emergencies. The Cathedral film has been shown to thousands of people. Our new magazine, "Vision", edited by two laymen, goes not only throughout the Diocese, but to more than sixty other Cathedrals around the world who have requested it. You can be placed upon the mailing list for "Vision" by sending your name and address to me.

An article, "What Is A Cathedral?", describing our work was printed in a national Church magazine. A thousand copies of it in reprint form have been requested throughout the Church. Requests for it in quantities have come this past week from Cathedrals in Los Angeles and Fresno, California; Houston, Texas; and Montreal, Canada.

As a congregation, there has been growth in communicant numbers during the year as we have tried to minister to the unchurched in the heart of Newark. There was an increase in the amount pledged for 1950 in our Every Member Canvass. The Church School, under the leadership of the Rev'd Mr. Conklin, has tripled in size. The congregation, of 500 communicants, has pledged its enlarged 1950 quota of \$10,000.00. It should be noted that there is no appropriation to the Cathedral in the Diocesan budget.

In addition to the interest and aid of the Bishops, the Chapter, and the clergy and laity of the Diocese, one must mention the untiring efforts of the Cathedral clergy. Yet their fields of work should be understood lest the Cathedral seem to be overstuffed. Canon Aselford is rector of St. James' Church, Newark. He gives a small amount of his time to the Cathedral to conduct a weekly service, and for pastoral visiting. The Rev'd Mr. Conklin is the only full time associate on our staff. But all have given more than generously in thought and effort to make Trinity truly the Cathedral of the Diocese.

We know that this report represents but beginnings of a Cathedral ministry that is even now but six years old. We ask your prayers, your continued interest in your Cathedral, and your help in our common task.
