OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES

From a Parish

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election, in the following form:

[Name of the Church, the Place, and Date.]

This certifies that a meeting of the congregation of this Church, held for the purpose of electing Church Officers, and Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention (or for the purpose of electing Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, if the meeting be for that object alone), A. B., C. D., and E. F., being communicants of the Church in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Deputies; and B. C., D. E., and F. G., also being communicants in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish, were duly chosen as Alternate Deputies to represent the Parish in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand (or if two Wardens subscribed, we have set our hands), the day and year above written.

N. B.—The signature of either the Rector or the Secretary of the Vestry is sufficient; if neither the Rector nor the Secretary sign, then the signatures of both Wardens are necessary. A Clergyman who is simply Minister-incharge, or Missionary, may not sign.

From a Mission

N. B.—Use the same form and substitute the word "Mission" for "Parish" in three places: The Minister-in-charge; or, the Clerk; or, the Warden may sign.

Memoranda:

Not more than three Deputies are allowed from each Parish, and Mission.

Three Alternate Deputies must be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies.

Write Christian names in full and legibly.

Blank forms will be sent by the Secretary of the Convention on or before Easter Monday in each year.

Return Certificates of Election at least ONE MONTH before Convention.

Deputies must be at least 50 percentum male Communicants of the Church, and also qualified voters in the Parish or Mission which elects them. (See Article 4, Sec. 3 of Constitution as amended 1951.)

Rules of Order

THE CONVENTION

1. The Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.

- The Convention shall meet on the opening day for the Business Sessions at 9:45
 A. M.; with a recess of one hour between 1 and 2 o'clock.
- At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
- 4. At the close of each Convention, the Minutes shall be corrected and approved.
- The doors of the Convention shall be open for the admission of such persons as may wish to know its proceedings.
- All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convention shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall record their attendance.
- Clergymen of other Dioceses, and Candidates for Holy Orders, who may be present, shall be admitted to honorary seats in the Convention on the presentation of their names to the Secretary.
- 8. When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
- When any member is about to speak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
- 10. No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply), in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
- 11. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
- 12. All questions of order shall be determined by the President, without debate, but any member may appeal from the decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the Convention. The general procedure of the Convention shall be governed, unless otherwise provided for, by the rules of parliamentary practice as set forth in "Roberts' Rules of Order."
- 13. A Committee consisting of the Bishop, ex-officio, five other clergymen and five laymen, to be known as the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, shall be appointed at each Convention to prepare the official Ballots and the Calendar of Business, for the next Annual Convention.

The mode of conducting the nominations and elections of all Committees, Commissions and Boards and all other elective officers not otherwise provided for, shall be as follows:

The Secretary of the Convention shall send out with the notice of the time and place of the Diocean Convention, a list of the offices to be filled by election thereat, and the names of the incumbents of these offices, whose terms expire thereat, together with an official nomination blank. Such notice shall be sent out at least one month before the date appointed for the Convention, to the Clergy canonically resident in the Dioceae, and to each lay delegate whose name and address has been transmitted to the Secretary, as provided in Canon I.

Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations for any office or offices to be filled at such Convention, shall at least fifteen days before the date appointed for the Convention, submit the same in writing to the Secretary thereof, together with his certificate that he has secured the consent of such person or persons to such nomination.

The Committee on Elections, from the list of nominations as furnished to it by the Secretary of the Convention, shall prepare sufficient hallots marked "Sample" for each clerical and lay delegate, as certified by such Secretary, as entitled to a seat in the Convention; such hallot to be mailed by such Secretary to each such delegate at least five days before the Convention.

At the beginning of the opening session the committee shall report to the Convention in the form of an official ballot the names of nominees; the arrangement of such names shall be determined by lot in each order.

If there be any office for which no nomination has been made on the sample ballot any delegate may file with the Secretary of the Convention the name of one candidate for any such office, together with his certificate, that he has secured the consent of the person so nominated. Such nominations may be filed up to the hour of voting, and the committee of Elections shall announce the names of such nominees at the time of the distribution of the first ballot.

The number of consecutive terms any nominee has held the office for which he is again nominated shall be noted on the ballot, in parentheses, after his or her name. After each list of nominations as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks may be filled by any voter. On the first ballot these ballots only shall be used, and also in subsequent ballots, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. No ballot shall be counted in its class, on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled, and the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast.

The members of the Convention shall also be requested, in said call, to send to this Committee any canonical amendments or other important items of business that they may propose to introduce at the next Convention, so that such matters may be assigned a place on the Calendar of Business. This call shall also be annually inserted in the official Magazine of the Diocese, The Newark Churchman.

Balloting shall take place in a separate room when practicable.

The clerical and lay voting lists shall be divided into two sections each.

- 14. Four or more Election Tellers, clerical and lay, in equal numbers, not necessarily members of the Convention, shall be appointed by the President before an election. They shall receive and canvass all votes cast at any election which is required to be by ballot, and when such canvass is completed, shall immediately report its result to the Convention. The polls shall be open for such time as the Convention may, by resolution, direct.
- 15. The President shall appoint in advance of each Convention a Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions, to whom shall be submitted by the Secretary of Convention all resolutions to be considered by the Convention not less than two weeks in advance.
- 16. All reports (usually printed in the Journal) of officers, committees, commissions, and boards of trustees under control of the Convention, shall be printed and distributed by the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order as far as practicable, at least two weeks before the meeting of the Convention; provided that the subject of such printing and reports shall have been referred to the Finance and Advisory Board for consideration, which Board shall have power to supervise, regulate, or to condense the same, and to issue to the Committee or to the Secretary of the Convention such instructions as in the judgement of the said Board will promote greater economy and efficiency in respect to this work.

Reports when read in Convention shall be read by title only, unless the reading be for the better transaction of business.

NEW BUSINESS.

17. All new business introduced, except such as may accompany and form a part of a report of a committee, shall be in the form of a motion or resolution and shall be in writing.

COMMITTEES.

- 18. All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered. It shall be the duty of the Secretary promptly to notify the members of all special committees of their appointment.
- 19. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.

MOTIONS AND THEIR ORDER.

- 20. No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
- 21. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it; or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment has been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
- 22. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.

VOTING PRIVILEGES.

- 23. All questions shall be decided viva voce, unless otherwise specially ordered.
- 24. When required by two Clergymen or two Lay Deputies from two Parishes, the vote of the Convention shall be taken by Orders, voting separately; and, when a vote is thus taken a concurrent majority in both Orders shall be necessary to carry any measure.

JOURNAL

The Seventy-ninth Annual Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark was held on Tuesday, May 12th, Nineteen Hundred and Fifty-three in Trinity Cathedral, Newark, New Jersey.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at nine o'clock by the Bishop of the Diocese, the Right Reverend Benjamin M. Washburn, D.D., assisted by the Suffragan Bishop, the Right Reverend Theodore R. Ludlow, D.D., and the Ven. Gordon T. Jones, President of the Standing Committee, and the Reverend J. Fred Hamblin, Secretary of the Convention.

The Bishop read the names of the Bishops of the Church, the Clergy of the Diocese and Laity of our Parishes and Missions, who departed this life to become members of the Church Expectant during the past Convention year, and commended them to the prayers of the congregation during the Communion service.

The morning session of the Convention was called to order at ten o'clock, with the Right Reverend, the Bishop of Newark, in the Chair.

A quorum being present the Convention was declared ready for business: Attendance Cards indicated the following were present:

TWENTY-FIRST ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE BISHOP OF NEWARK

My brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

At the opening Service of the Convention this morning we remembered before the Altar these bishops of the Church who during the past year have entered Paradise:

Cameron Josiah Davis, retired Bishop of Western New York, and President of The Church Pension Fund.

John Buckman Walthour, Bishop of Atlanta.

Three clergymen of our own diocese have also joined the ranks of the Church Expectant:

Richard Waverly Baxter, Rector of Trinity, Bayonne, from 1919 to 1926, and Vicar of the Church of the Ascension, Bogota, 1926 to 1931 and of St. Mark's, Teaneck, 1926 to 1934, after which he retired from the active ministry to live in Connecticut.

Percy Trafford Olton, Rector of St. James', Newark, from 1920 to 1946, Secretary of The Board of Examining Chaplains, at the time of his death Rector of St. John's, Chester, Virginia.

William Franklin Venables, Rector of The House of Prayer, Newark, from 1920 to 1953.

Osborne, continuously a member of The Board of Social Service since its founding in 1915, President of Bonnie Brae Farm for Boys, a member of St. Andrew's, South Orange; John R. Montgomery of the Vestry of Christ Church, Short Hills, a Trustee of Youth Consultation Service, long Treasurer of The Board of Social Service; Charles M. Ford of Grace Church, Orange, a lay reader who for many years conducted on Sunday afternoons a Service at The House of the Good Shepherd, Orange; W. Reginald Baker, formerly Warden of Grace Church, Madison, a Trustee of the Laura Augusta Home; Morris Sayre, Warden of St. Luke's, Montclair, member of The Finance and Advisory Board and a Trustee of The Diocesan Investment Trust, and Ludolph Conklin of Trinity Cathedral, member of its Chapter and a member of The Finance and Advisory Board.

Other faithful laymen served on Parish Vestries or Executive Committees of Missions: George W. Griffithes, Redeemer, Palisades Park; J. R. R. McEwen, St. Peter's, Mountain Lakes; John E. T. May they rest in peace and may light perpetual shine upon them. Amen.

The Seventy-ninth Annual Convention returns this year to the Cathedral, its accustomed place of meeting, from which we were last year driven by the extensive renovation project authorized by The Cathedral Chapter. Due to the tireless energy of the Dean, the work proceeded according to our schedule. We were able to dedicate the Stearly Memorial Chapel and to bless the Sanctuary in October as we had planned. It is true that to complete the task there are some things yet to be done. The Sanctuary furnishings, which have been designed by Leslie Nobbes, are yet to be installed. The total cost has been kept within the sum allotted. The gifts of the Cathedral congregation, with its usual generosity, approximately equalled the amount given by all the other congregations of the diocese. It is worthy of note that the considerable sum given by the Cathedral congregation resulted in no decrease in their gifts for missions. Once more they paid in full their quota, representing the largest per capita missionary giving of any Church in the diocese.

The resignation of Dean Warnecke upon his acceptance of his election as Bishop Coadjutor of Bethlehem, means that there can be no formal report of the Dean to this Convention. In its absence, I may call attention to the steady growth in the communicant strength of the Cathedral during his four years as Dean; and to a striking increase in Church School enrollment, both of which are remarkable in a down town location such as ours. It is not surprising that the Dean's outstanding ability should have been recognized by the Diocese of Bethlehem. Since his departure, the work and worship of the Cathedral has been in the excellent hands of the Rev'd Edward W. Conklim.

On June 23rd the Rev. John Bowen Coburn, now Rector of Grace Church, Amherst, and Chaplain of Amherst College, will enter upon his responsibilities as our new Dean. He was a candidate for Holy Orders from the Cathedral, and it was here that I ordained him both to the Diaconate and to the Priesthood.

Let me report to you briefly some of the forward steps in the diocese during the past year.

Many of our parishes and missions have been busily engaged in planning better facilities for the work before them. The commodious new Christ Church, West Englewood, Teaneck, is almost completed. The Mission Church of Our Saviour, Secaucus, has been moved to a new location and new rooms added to it. A fine new Parish Hall has been dedicated across the street from All Saints', Millington. Two friends of Grace Church, Van Vorst, Jersey City, have given and thoroughly remodeled a house a few doors away which provides apartments for the Sisters and others working in the Parish as well as quarters for parish work. There is a new Vicarage at Epiphany, Allendale, and new Rectories at Trinity, Paterson; Holy Communion, South Orange; and St. Luke's, Paterson. St. Thomas'. Newark, will soon be added to this list. Campaigns for funds for new Parish Houses or old ones enlarged have been completed or are in progress at St. George's, Maplewood; Grace, Rutherford; St. Paul's, Chatham; St. Andrew's Harrington Park; and St. Bartholomew's, Hohokus. St. Peter's, Essex Fells, is seeking funds for a much needed new and larger Church. In the planning stage are projects at St. Elizabeth's, Ridgewood; St. Paul's, Phillipsburg; St. John's, Ramsey; and St. Clement's, Hawthorne. Doubtless there are omissions from this list.

For our newest Mission, The Church of the Incarnation, West Milford, we have received a gift of a finely located plot upon which The Board of Missions plans to build when funds are available.

Studies must be continued or initiated by The Board at other points where growth will seem to justify, and even demand, expansion of our work. Here I must anticipate the presentation of the Report of The Finance and Advisory Board with its proposed budget for 1954. This includes a substantial increase in the amount asked by The Board of Missions, \$25,000 of which is to be used for new buildings. Clergy and laity are continually calling our attention to fields where the Church is needed. To occupy them will take money. Money can be secured only through sacrificial giving. The time is at hand when we must choose between two ways of financing advance work. One way is by a great campaign to raise at one time several hundred thousand dollars. The other way is to include in the budget annually some such sum as the \$25,000 now asked, and having included it, to pay the consequently increased quotas assigned to parishes and missions.

It is not money alone which is needed for growth in our mission stations. Unremitting pastoral care on the part of truly consecrated priests always yields results. I am glad to say that with but few exceptions the missions of the diocese have made progress during the past year. I am grateful to those who have been responsible for this growth.

Two or three major matters deserve at least brief mention in this annual report to the Convention. They include an increase in the missionary giving of our parishes and missions and greater promptness in their payments of their pledges. There is also the action of the Finance and Advisory Board looking toward better integration of the work of our various boards, agencies and institutions. Record should be made also of a gift of securities approximating \$40,000 in value from Mrs. Bertram Cutler of Grace Church, Madison, to establish a fund in memory of her husband. The income is to be used at the sole discretion of the Bishop to aid students for the ministry. With the rising cost of higher education and our increased number of postulants, this Fund will be of untold value. It must, however, be supplemented by other offerings and gifts throughout the year to enable the Bishop to extend aid where needed and deserved.

At our Diocesan Convention in the year following a meeting of General Convention, there are sometimes many matters for me to report. When General Convention adjourned its meeting in Boston last September, it seemed to many deputies that little had been accomplished at the Convention. However that may be, one resolution was adopted to which I wish to call your attention. Its text is as follows: "Bishops and Parish Vestries should give constant and earnest attention to clerical salaries for which they are responsible, reviewing them frequently and taking all factors, particularly full automobile allowance, into consideration." Probably the majority of lay deputies here present are members of Vestries or Executive Committees. The substance of this resolution therefore concerns almost all of us.

Over the last several years salaries throughout the Church have in general increased. At the end of 1952 the average salary from reports to the Church Pension Fund is found to have been \$4,391. This, however, includes as the value of rectory or other living quarters an amount equal to one-sixth of the cash salary. We may therefore say that roughly the average salary paid was \$3,764, plus house. We do not have comparative figures as of the end of 1952 for our own diocese alone.

Two years ago the Convention adopted unanimously a resolution establishing as the minimum stipend for married priests in this diocese, the sum of

\$3,300. annually together with the use of living quarters. The adoption of this resolution resulted in an increase in the salaries of a number of our priests, but there are some places where the minimum is not yet being met. It should also be noted that our minimum is below that established by at least three dioceses in our vicinity: New York, Maryland and Delaware. Furthermore, there is frequently a tendency to regard a minimum either as unalterably fixed or indeed as a maximum.

No man believing himself called to the Ministry responds to the call with any thought of receiving large financial rewards. He holds intangible rewards to be of greater value than material goods. He expects to make sacrifices and frequently counts them joy. At the same time, and quite rightly, he wants some degree of security for his family and educational opportunities for his children such as he himself has had. The laborer is worthy of his hire, and I ask you to see that he does not become a forgotten man.

Like other men he looks ahead to the day when he will have to retire from the active ministry. He remembers that even before that time arrives, his wife may be widowed and his children orphans. As he faces these contingencies, he is aware that his pension or theirs will be related to the average salary which he has received during his active ministry. The beneficiaries of our Church Pension Fund receive pensions far in excess of those paid the ministers of any other Church, in fact, two or three times as much as in most. The Trustees of the Fund have recently taken two forward steps. One was to eliminate the disadvantage under which present and future beneficiaries were laboring, if they had been ordained before the Fund was established in 1917. This provided increases in the pensions of 213 present beneficiaries, and higher eventual pensions for a group of 221 clergymen who have not yet retired. The second step was to provide for the payment of the immediate grant of \$1,000, to the widows of retired clergymen who had formerly received only half that amount. In spite of the favorable position of the beneficiaries of our Fund as compared with those of other Funds, the pensions are still inadequate, as pensions are normally bound to be. It is, however, well to remember that the more adequate a present salary may be, the less inadequate will be a future pension.

The remainder of my address this morning I propose to devote to bishops.

This is a significant year for us. On the pinth of June in the Cathedral the Rev. Leland W. F. Stark will be consecrated Bishop Coadjutor of the diocese. In the successive posts which he has held he has demonstrated his possession of excellent gifts as pastor, preacher, and administrator. He will speedily make a great place for himself in the diocese. The Special Convention, at which he was elected on the third ballot, seemed to be marked by a solemn and sincere desire on the part of each deputy, clerical and lay, to speak and to act as God would have him speak and act. We assembled and we adjourned as Christian brethren, disagreements among whom were insignificant in comparison with our bond in the one Communion and fellowship which we share. I trust that this will always be true of every meeting of the Convention.

You will remember that at the Special Convention I stated the following as the duties which I should assign to him when duly ordained and consecrated:—

"In addition to a just and full share in Confirmation Visitations, I assign him oversight and promotion of the activities of the Field Department, of the Committee on Laymen's Work, and of the Board of Religious Education and its several Committees. He shall be responsible also for the work

of the Board of Christian Social Relations and for our diocesan institutions and agencies, so far as their certificates of incorporation permit. He shall further have, in conference with the Bishop, the initiative and supervision in establishing such new Missions as opportunity seems to make expedient, the Bishop retaining his Canonical right to the appointment of Missionaries,

"It is to be noted that Canon 39 provides that the duties now assigned may be enlarged by mutual consent whenever the Bishop of the Diocese may desire to assign such additional duties to the Bishop Coadjutor."

Since his election, we have had the opportunity to discuss the work of the diocese at length and by mutual consent I am now giving notice of the assignment of some additional duties. With the exception of Grace Church, Van Vorst, Jersey City, I am asking the parishes and missions of Hudson County, together with all parishes and missions in Bergen Couny lying east of the Hackensack River, to look to him for ordinary Episcopal oversight and counsel, myself retaining throughout the diocese the Canonical responsibility as to the appointment of Vicars, the approval of the calls of Rectors, and the acceptance of postulants. This area over which he will assume special responsibility contains a larger number of communicants than there are in 36 of the 74 dioceses of the Church.

We are agreed that in so compact a diocese as this it would be unnecessary and unwise to create East and West Zones with access to either Zone denied the inhabitants of the other. We are therefore agreed that any of the clergy, as well as any Vestry of a Parish shall always be free to turn to either one of us for advice and counsel. All of us will always be mindful of the fact that he will be our next diocesan.

I have said that 1953 is a significant year in the history of the diocese. It marks the coming of a new bishop, and the retirement of another bishop to whom we shall find pleasure in paying richly deserved honor at a great Service in the Cathedral on Sunday afternoon, June fourteenth. The expression of our gratitude to him must not wait until that date. The remainder of my address I wish to devote to a feeble attempt to summarize, at least in part, the nature of his contribution to our common cause.

First of all, I record my personal appreciation of his unfailing loyalty to me personally and, what is more important, to the Christian Gospel as expressed in the life of work and worship of the Church. From the date of his ordination as a deacon he has consistently regarded himself as a man sent of God to share in the ministry of reconciliation.

There is no more important area in the Church's total responsibility than the awakening of its youth to a mature understanding of the implications of their discipleship. He has had Episcopal oversight of the Diocesan Young Peoples' Fellowship. Last Saturday evening, following its Annual Meeting, the Fellowship gave him a testimonial dinner to which came young men and women who have served as officers during the seventeen years as bishop. The chief speaker at the dinner, now the Rector of one of our largest parishes, was among their number. Bishop Ludlow has given unsparingly of his time and thought to give to youth through the Fellowship some apprehension of the worth of God and man.

From 1927 to 1931 he was Secretary for Adult Education under the Department of Religious Education of the National Council. Both by interest and by study he was therefore well equipped to play the large part he has had in the development of our diocesan Conference program. From its beginning Eagle's Nest Conference, now the New Jersey Episcopal Church Conference, meeting its second year at Drew University, has counted heavily upon him,

sometimes as an instructor, sometimes as Chaplain, always as an authority in program building. The Laymen's Conference, held annually, might well have been called Bishop Ludlow's Conference. The committee of laymen appointed by him to plan its program has always recognized the timeliness of the themes proposed by him. He has secured outstanding speakers. His spirit of comradeship has been infectious, thus ensuring warmth of fellowship among the men attending. Youth week-ends, the Cathedral School of Religion, Woman's Auxiliary programs and the like have all known the value of his suggestions and direction.

The first years of his ministry were given to the Church in China. He has never ceased to be a missionary. To parishes which he served he communicated his own enthusiasm for the Mission of the Church. As bishop, he has guided the Field Department, always stressing the one-ness of the Church, citing telling examples of the truth that no parish can itself prosper unless it recognizes its extra-parochial responsibilities. Probably there is no deputy present who cannot clearly recall moving addresses, yet not based on an emotional appeal, which he has heard from Bishop Ludlow.

He has occupied a position of leadership beyond the diocese itself which we shall not soon forget. He was a member of the Commission appointed by the Governor to prepare a new and greatly needed Constitution for the State of New Jersey. He served as President of the State Council of Churches during its formative years. He has been in demand as a preacher far and wide, giving one summer vacation as an Exchange Preacher in England.

There are a few dioceses in which it has never been the custom for the Suffragan Bishop to give an Address at the Annual Diocesan Convention. How incomplete our own Conventions would have been had we not had the privilege of hearing from him at each Convention quite as a matter of course I Many of the topics upon which he has spoken have reflected his willing acceptance of his assignment to the oversight of our Board of Christian Social Relations. He has spoken courageously and convincingly against such social evils as race track gambling, prejudice towards minority groups, and the suppression of the liberties guaranteed by our Constitutional Bill of Rights. Again and again he has emphasized our obligation to strive for the elimination of barriers to a wider community of spirit and in action, both in State and Church.

Such is an altogether inadequate summary of what his leadership has meant. I need not mention the personal qualities which throughout the diocese have won for him affection and esteem. For what he has been and has done we give him our gratitude. We pray for him in the years which lie ahead God's every blessing. Trusting that he will not forget us in his prayers, we can assure him that in ours he will constantly be remembered with appreciation for his faithful service as a Bishop in the Church of God.

BENJAMIN M. WASHBURN

Mr. Henry T. Stetson presented the following resolution:—

"We, the Clerical and Lay Deputies of the parishes and missions of the Diocese of Newark, here assembled in Trinity Cathedral for the Seventy-ninth Annual Convention on this twelfth day of May in the year of our Lord Nineteen Hundred and Rifty-three, are moved to offer our thanksgiving to Almighty God for the fruitful ministry of the Right Reverend Theodore Russell Ludlow, our Suffragan-Bishop these past seventeen years, and soon to retire from this high office.

We shall long remember Bishop Ludlow for his forthright and eloquent preaching of the Gospel of Christ in contemporary terms. Unceasingly he has held before us the demands of the Christian Faith as it pertains to our common life in the political and economic realms. He has never hesitated to take a stand for righteousness' sake in Church or State. Out of his rich background of experience in the Church at home and

abroad, he has brought to us a missionary seal as well as an ecumenical fervor. Impatient of excuses, he has ever spoken of new opportunities of Christian service and evangelism. He has loved his brethren of other Christian bodies, and has been in the forefront of inter-church cooperation throughout his ministry in this Diocese. We are proud of his wide influence for good here in the See-City as well as in the State, his leadership on many boards and committees of social service, for the honour this has brought to our Church.

Bishop Ludlow is a doer, a crusader for social justice, a man of action, one of many talents. He has always remained youthful in his vigor and adventurous spirit. We have never seen him east down or fatigued, but rather always alert and optimistic. Our prayers and affections go with him in his retirement which we are assured will be an active one.

For his ministry among us, for all that he has meant to us and contributed to the life of the Diocese, be it here RESOLVED that we praise and thank God, and extend to Bishop Ludlow our greetings, our gratitude, and this expression of continued devotion.'

It was moved, seconded and adopted by a rising vote that this resolution be spread at length on the records of this Convention, and a suitable copy of the same be sent to Bishop Ludlow.

The following resolution sent to the Secretary of Convention was read:

RESOLVED that this Convention petitions the Bishop and the Dean and Chapter of Trinity Cathedral to abolish the strange usages recently introduced into the Cathedral of placing the Bishop's Chair where the Holy Table always stood and having the celebrant face west when he is speaking to God for the people, and to restore the reverent customs which obtain generally in this Diocese.

WHEREAS, The Church of the Good Shepherd, Fort Lee, County of Bergen, and The Church of the Holy Innocents', West Orange, County of Essex, have applied to be admitted into union with this Convention; and

WHEREAS, the papers submitted by the aforementioned congregations have been found to comply with the requirements of the Constitution and Canons of this Diocese, be it

Resolved, that this Convention approve the applications of The Church of the Good Shepherd, Fort Lee, County of Bergen, and The Church of the Holy Innocents', West Orange, County of Essex, and receive them into union.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the above named parishes be and hereby are admitted into union with this Convention. Adopted by a rising vote.

The Chair presented to the Convention the Reverend Robert J. Clarke, Rector of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Fort Lee, and his Deputies Mr. John A. Dupuis and Mr. Julius Carell and the Reverend Trevor E. G. Thomas, Rector of the Church of the Holy Innocents', West Orange, and his Deputies Mr. Farnham Yardley and Mrs. J. Y. G. Walker.

The following report of the Committee on Constitutions and Canons was presented by Col. Leigh K. Lydecker, for the Chairman C. Alexander Capron:

To the 79th Diocesan Convention of The Diocese of Newark

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND CANONS

There has been referred to this Committee the recommendation of the Reverend Montgomery H. Throop for the deletion of Sections II and III of Canon 22, relating to the relief of clergymen and their dependents, and Canon 23, relating to the fund for the relief of underpaid clergymen. In support of his proposal, Mr. Throop has urged that the provisions set forth in Section II of Canon 22 and Section I of Canon 23, requiring that an offering or donation should be made at least once a year by every parish or mission in the Diocese for the purposes to which these Canons refer, should be eliminated since neither of these requirements is any longer observed in the Diocese. He states:

"It seems to me undesirable to have Canons unrepealed to which no one pays attention; such an example of lawlessness which the church can ill afford to present."

Section II of Canon 22 provides as follows:

"II. An offering shall be taken at least once a year on Christmas Day or on a Sunday in every Parish and Mission in the Diocese for the Relief of Clergymen and Their Dependents."

We are of the opinion that this section should be repealed.

Section III of Canon 22 gives authority to "The Trustees of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen" to direct the disposition of any offering, contribution or donation which may be received for such purpose. We see no objection, therefore, to the retention of Section III. The Trustees of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen still have under their control certain capital funds, the income of which is disbursed for the purposes mentioned in the Canon. It is our opinion, therefore, that the Canon should be preserved and it seems desirable that provision should be made for the disposition of any other funds which may be made to the Diocese for the purposes mentioned in the Canon.

Section VIII of Canon 22, merely provides that it shall take effect immediately. This may also properly be eliminated.

We would therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution;

"BE IT RESOLVED, that Section II and Section VIII of Canon 22 of the Diocese of Newark be repealed and that Sections III, IV, V and VI and VII should be renumbered respectively 'II, III, IV, V, and VI.'"

We are informed that there are no funds now held for the relief of underpaid clergy-men and that no offerings or donations are now being made by any parish or mission in the Diocese for such purpose as is required by Section I of Canon 23. We would therefore, report that, in our opinion, it is appropriate that all of Canon 23, entitled

"Of the fund for the relief of underpaid clergymen" should be repealed and would recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

"BE IT RESOLVED that Canon 23 of the Diocese of Newark be repealed."

The Bishop of the Diocese, has also informed us that there are other portions of the Canons which have become obsolete and that for this reason, at some convenient date, a revision of the Canons should be undertaken. We therefore recommend that a Committee should be appointed to study this subject and make recommendations to the next Convention of the Diocese and would therefore propose the adoption of the following preamble and resolution:

"WHEREAS, it appears that some of the provisions of the present Canons of this Diocese of Newark have become obsolete and that the Canons should be accordingly revised in various particulars,

"BE IT RESOLVED, that a Committee on the Revision of the Canons, to consist of three Presbyters and three laymen as may be named by the Bishop, shall be appointed for the purpose of studying what revisions should be made to the Canons of this Diocess and to report their recommendations with respect thereto to the next Diocessan Convention."

The Convention was called to order at noon, and noon-day Prayers were said by the Suffragan Bishop, the Right Reverend Theodore R. Ludlow, and the singing of two hymns.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT

For the Year 1952

Eight meetings of the Standing Committee were held during 1952,

January 7, 1952

It was recommended to the Bishop that Mr. Kenneth Whitney be ordained to the Diaconate with consent to the shortening of his term of Candidateship to seven months.

March 3, 1952

On request of the Bishop for advice, it was recommended that the petition of St. Paul's, Wood Ridge, for permission to become a parish, be granted.

Messrs. William C. Harvey and Ivan H. Partridge were recommended for admission as Candidates for Holy Orders.

Mr. William J. Dougherty was recommended for ordination to the Diaconate with consent to the shortening of his term of Candidateship to six months.

The Board of Missions was granted permission to transfer title to property in Ramsey to the newly incorporated parish of St. John's.

The Board of Missions was granted permission to mortgage the church property of the Church of the Ascension, Bogota, in an amount not to exceed \$7,000.

In accordance with Canon 16, Section 3, Paragraph 3, the Mission of the Epiphany, Teaneck, was declared extinct.

The Diocese of Louisiana was granted consent to elect a Suffragan Bishop.

April 28, 1952

The Board of Missions was granted consent to transfer church and rectory property in Wood Ridge to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Paul's Church.

The Board of Missions was granted consent to convey the rectory property of St. Paul's, Chatham, to the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Paul's Church.

Christ Church, Teaneck, was granted consent to mortgage their property in the amount of \$75,000 to assist in building a new church.

Christ Church, Short Hills, was granted consent to sell their present rectory property and to mortgage new rectory property.

The Board of Missions was granted consent to mortgage the church building of St. Paul's, North Arlington, in order to help finance the building of an addition.

The Committee recommended to the Bishop that he give favorable consideration to the request of Holy Innocents', West Orange, to become a parish.

May 19, 1952

The Standing Committee organized for the new year with the election of the Ven. Gordon T. Jones as President and the Ven. W. O. Leslie, Jr. as Secretary.

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Very Rev'd Hamilton Hyde Kellogg, D.D. to be Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Minnesota.

Consent was given to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund to sell the Cathedral Site property in Cedar Grove to the Dayella Mills Foundation.

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Ven. William Crittenden to be Bishop of the Diocese of Erie.

Messrs. Bayard Hancock, Harry W. Hansen, William N. Penfield, John E. Soleau, Charles Donald Beisheim, James E. Hulbert, Charles D. Laufer, and William A. Van Croft were recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate.

The Committee took action to send to the Rev'd Harold Onderdonk a resolution as to the appreciation of his service as a member of the Standing Committee.

June 16, 1952

Consent was granted to Trinity Church, Paterson, to mortgage the rectory property.

Messrs. Charles B. Bradley and Paul B. Sommers were elected as Trustees of the Diocesan Investment Trust.

Mr. Gerald M. Cover was recommended to the Bishop for admission as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

The Rev'd Benjamin Pierson Ford and the Rev'd Kenneth Whitney were recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Priesthood.

September 29, 1952

Consent was given to St. Andrew's Church, South Orange, to sell certain property which had been received by bequest to the parish.

Consent was given to the Board of Missions to mortgage property of St. Peter's Church, Livingston.

The Committee adopted a resolution relative to Bishop Ludlow's approaching retirement, including steps for a fitting recognition of his services as Suffragan Bishop.

Consent was given to the Board of Missions to sell property of Our Saviour, Secaucus,

Consent was given to St. Matthew's Church, Jersey City, to mortgage certain property.

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Rev'd Iveson Batchelor Noland to be Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Louisiana.

Mr. Warren Lewis Howell was recommended to the Bishop for admission as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

The Rev'd William J. Dougherty was recommended for ordination to the Priesthood.

The Committee recorded the formal statement of Bishop Washburn relative to Episcopal assistance in the Diocese;

"In view of Bishop Ludlow's resignation to become effective July 14, 1953, I hereby give notice of my intention to ask the Convention of the Diocese to elect a Bishop Coadjutor by reason of the extent of Diocesan work, provided the consents necessary to proceed to such election are received from a majority of the Bishops and of the several Standing Committees."

It was moved, seconded and carried that the following resolution be adopted by the Committee:

BE IT RESOLVED that this Committee give authorization for the sending out of a letter to the Bishops and Standing Committees of the Church, asking consent to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor on account of the extent of Diocean work, said letter to be signed by the Bishop and the Secretary of the Standing Committee.

November 24, 1952

The appointment by the Bishop of the Rev'd Montgomery H. Throop, S.T.D. as a member of the Board of Examining Chaplains was confirmed.

The Rev'd Messrs. Charles Donald Beisheim, Bayard Hancock, Harry W. Hansen, James E. Hulbert, Mark M. McCullough, William N. Penfield and John E. Soleau were recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Priesthood.

Mr. Gerald M. Cover, Jr. was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate.

The Secretary of the Committee reported that consent to elect a Bishop Coadjutor had been received from a majority of the Bishops and Standing Committees. Bishop Washburn then requested the advice of the Committee as to the propriety of calling a Special Convention on or about January 27th. The following resolution was then adopted:

"The Bishop, having asked the advice of the Standing Committee, the Standing Committee approves the Bishop's plan to call a special Convention on or about January 27th."

Approval was given to the expenditure of certain sums from the income of the Jesse Williams Fund, the Hannibal Goodwin Fund and the Church Aid Society Fund.

December 29, 1952

Consent was granted to St. Thomas' Church, Newark, to sell the rectory property to the Garden State Parkway Authority.

Consent was granted to the Board of Missions to mortgage the property of the Church of Our Saviour, Secaucus.

Consent was granted to the Church of the Holy Communion, South Orange, to sell a portion of their rectory property to the Village of South Orange.

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Rev'd William Hampton Brady as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Fond du Lac.

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Rev'd Frederick John Warnecke as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Bethlehem.

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Rev'd John Seville Higgins as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Rhode Island.

Messrs. Donald Douglas Gardner, Paul Conover Deckenbach, James Lawrence Gill, Lathrop Palmer Utley, Donald William Beers, Charles Gomph Newberry, and Edgar Alan Nutt were recommended to the Bishop for admission as Candidates for Holy Orders.

The President of the Standing Committee was requested to prepare a resolution of appreciation of the work of Dean Warnecke in the Diocese of Newark.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

The Board of Christian Social Relations of the Diocese of Newark reports another active year. Regular monthly meetings have been held, reports of the various committees have been considered and acted upon and all possible steps have been taken to further the causes which have become the concern of the Board.

The individual members, as well as the Board as a whole, have made a detailed study of the extensive Survey entitled "Episcopalians at Work in the World," issued by National Council at the time of General Convention. Comments and suggestions of the members have been submitted to the National Committee which is working to put the combined results in final form for presentation to the entire Church.

Through the Committee on Housing, the Board has kept in touch with housing conditions in the area and is deeply concerned in stressing the vital need of developing more adequate housing facilities for the aged within this State.

The Board appealed to the Governor and members of the State Legislature in respect to the proposed New Jersey School of Social Work and requested that a stated amount of money be made available for such school to be established in connection with Rutgers University. The sum of \$50,000. was approved and put in the State Budget, allocated for this purpose, and it is hoped that plans for establishment of the school will be consumated in the near future. The present lack of such training in New Jersey creates a serious problem in obtaining qualified and adequate social workers to operate within the State.

The Board is also concerned with the importance of more adequate and efficient training for psychiatrists, etc. in the State Mental Hospitals and will bring before members of the State governing bodies the urgency of broadening out a program for making such training available.

The Board plans to have representatives attend the Institute sponsored by the Interdenominational Committee on Cooperative Work in Race Relations to be held this summer.

The Board of Christian Social Relations of the Diocese of Newark is pleased to submit the foregoing report of its activities during the past months while anticipating a full and useful year sheed.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark, N. J.

Meeting held January 9, 1952.

Fairlown, Atonoment

On motion it was carried that the loan of \$400, granted to this Mission be without interest.

Budget Committee

On motion it was carried that the Budget Committee be asked to increase Vicars' selaries up to the minimum stipend of \$3,300. and house for married priests contingent upon two things (except where in the judgment of the Budget Committee other factors would seem to make it unfair).

- 1. That the Mission has held a thorough Every Member Canvass.
- 2. That there are evidences of vitality in that Mission.

Meeting held February 20, 1952.

Coytesville, St. Stephen's

The Committee appointed to meet with the people of Coytesville, relative to the possible addition to their parish house for kitchen purposes, reported that they were very impressed by the strength and activities of this Mission.

An estimate has been secured showing the total cost of this addition to be approximately \$3,990. Against this amount the Auxiliary has on hand approximately \$3,000. The Mission desires to borrow \$1,500, to cover the balance of the cost of the building and to

allow for the purchase of stove, cabinets, etc.

On motion it was carried that a loan of \$1,500, at 4% per annum be granted this Mission. This loan to be paid off in 10 years with quarterly amortization payments.

Bogota, Ascension

The Committee met with the Vicar and Executive Committee, and as a result moved that the Mission borrow not more than \$8,000. to complete the necessary repairs to the exterior of the Church building.

It was then moved and carried that Petition be made to the Bishop and Standing Committee for consent to borrow as aforesaid, and that when such Consent is given that the proper Officers of this Board be authorized to make and execute a proper Bond and Mortsage.

Ramsey, St. John's

Bishop Washburn then informed the Board that St. John's, Ramsey had incorporated as a Parish and at the May Convention would be taken into union with the Convention.

On motion it was carried that Petition be made to the Bishop and Standing Committee for consent to transfer title of this property from the Board of Missions to St. John's Church, Ramsey.

Teaneck, Epiphany

Mr. Stuart spoke on Epiphany, Teaneck which had been combined with St. Mark's. Teaneck. St. Mark's carried on the work at Epiphany through January, 1952 at which time Epiphany was closed and the organ given to Paramus. Mr. Stuart felt that the property abould be sold as soon as possible as it was subject to considerable vandalism. He felt that the property might be worth about \$5,500.

On motion it was carried that the property be offered for sale at an asking price of \$6,000. but that it be sold at any price offered that was acceptable to the Bishop, and that the proper Officers of this Board be authorized to Petition the Bishop and Standing Committee for Consent to the sale of the property.

Meeting held April 3, 1952

North Arlington, St. Paul's

A delegation from this Mission, consisting of the Vicar and some of the members of the Executive Committee were present. When called upon to speak, the Vicar, the Rev'd Mr. Sansom, stated that they were present in order to plea for the need of an enlargement of church building facilities, the building of an extension to the basement to accommodate a fast growing church school. He presented plans of the proposed addition, the estimated cost of which is \$13,500. The congregation have on hand \$4,500 in cash and pledges to apply toward the cost and they ask assistance of this Board to finance the balance of the cost. The proposition was looked upon with favor by the Board members present.

It was then moved and carried that the Bishop be requested to issue a "Call" on the Bishops' Church Extension Fund in the sum of \$1,000., this sum to be used toward the cost of this construction work.

It was then moved and carried that a committee be appointed to negotiate a loan in the sum of \$8,000. on a 10 year amortization plan and at the lowest rate of interest possible. This Committee to have full power but subject to the Bishop's approval. The Mission is to carry interest and amortization charges.

It was also moved and carried that a Petition be made to the Bishop and Standing Committee for Consent to Mortgage and that when such Consent is given the Officers of this Board are authorized to make and execute a proper Bond and Mortgage.

Wood Ridge, St. Paul's

Bishop Washburn announced that this church is now a fully incorporated Parish and would apply for admission as a Parish and union with the Diocesan Convention to be held May 13th.

It was moved and carried that Petition be made to the Bishop and Standing Committee for Consent for this Board to transfer title to all properties that it holds for the benefit of St. Paul's Church over to the newly formed Parish. When such Consent is obtained the proper Officers of this Board are authorized to make and execute proper deeds of conveyance to St. Paul's Parish.

Meeting held May 21, 1952.

Montvale, St. Paul's

Plans and specifications to build an extension for kitchen purposes and general use were presented to the Board. The cost of this addition will be about \$3,000. The project was considered and approved. The proper Officers of this Board were authorized to execute the contract.

Maywood, St. Martin's

Report was received about a legacy in the sum of \$1,000. for this Mission. This bequest was made directly to St. Martin's and is unrestricted in any way.

After discussion it was moved and carried that this money Be Not Placed in the general funds of the Mission but he set aside for future consideration.

Ridgefield Park, St. Mary the Virgin

Report was received about two legacies, each in the sum of \$1,000. bequeathed directly to St. Mary's, unrestricted in any way. The Executive Committee of the Mission requested consent to use this bequest to pay for betterments and improvements to the Church property. The request was approved and consent given.

Meeting held September 24, 1952.

Livingston, St. Peter's

The Rev'd Mr. Mariter and Mr. Hedley from this Mission visited the Board to tell of their urgent need of a new heating system in the parish house. They would like permission to borrow on mortgage the cost which is approximately \$1,615.

On motion it was carried that a Petition be made to the Bishop and Standing Committee for Consent to Mortgage and that when such Consent is given the Officers of this Board are authorized to make and execute a proper Bond and Mortgage.

Meeting Held December 10, 1952.

Seconcus, Our Saviour

The plan which seems to be the best solution at this Mission is to move the Church across the road to the new location, jack it up, and build a basement under it. The cost of this would be about \$27,000. The Mission has a profit of \$5,500. from the sale and purchase of land, \$5,000; from a drive for the purpose, \$1,000; from a Call of the Bishops' Church Extension Fund, which would leave about \$16,000. to be raised by a mortager.

The Mission feels that they can carry the charges on \$16,000, for ten years at 4%-

On motion it was carried that a Petition be made to the Bishop and Standing Committee for Consent to borrow not more than \$16,000. on mortgage from the Corporation for Relief of Widows and Children of Clergymen and that when such Consent is given the Officers of this Board are authorised to make and execute a proper Bond and Mortgage.

West Milford, Incornation

The Ringwood Company has given the Diocese a very desirable piece of land about 200 feet by 600 feet.

Bayonne, St. John's-Clark Mortgage

On motion it was carried that this mortgage which will be due on March 1, 1953 in the sum of \$1,129, be extended for a period of time with interest at 5% payable \$30, a month for interest and amortisation until the mortgage on this basis is entirely paid, but in no event longer than five years.

of the subjects required for Holy Orders; and the Rev. James F. Martin of the Diocese of British Columbia for examination in the subjects required under Canon 37, Section I (b).

On Monday, June 2, 1952, Mr. William A. Van Croft appeared before the Board for special re-examinations for the Diaconate, as prescribed by Canon 29, Section II, and successfully concluded them.

On Wednesday, November 5, 1952, the Rev. James E. Hulbert appeared before the Board and successfully concluded his re-examination in Church History for Ordination to the Priesthood. The Rev. William James Dougherty successfully concluded his examinations, as prescribed by Canon 29, for Holy Orders.

On Monday, December 29, and Wednesday, December 31, 1952, the Board met to examine in some of the subjects required for Holy Orders Messrs. Richard N. Bolles, Robert C. Hamlyn, William C. Harvey, Field H. Hobbs, Edgar A. Nutt, Ivan H. Partridge, Richard C. Williams, and at the request of the Bishop of Missouri, John B. Kelley.

At the business meeting on Wednesday, December 31, Bishop Washburn announced the addition of two examining chaplains since the last business meeting: Rev. Albert O. Judd and Rev. Dr. Montgomery H. Throop. The Chairman of the Committee on the subject involved was instructed to send a complaint to the Seminaries about the inadequacy of instruction in Christian Ethics and Moral Theology.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN CHURCH PENSION FUND COMMITTEE

To the 1953 Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

Your Diocesan Church Pension Fund Committee respectfully reports as follows for the calendar year 1952:

As of April 6th the number of pensions in force throughout the Church and the amounts were as follows:

According to word from the Church Pension Fund office in New York, it is expected that the pension disbursements by the Fund will increase steadily year by year for a long time. The financial position of the Fund continues to be thoroughly sound with assets of approximately \$51,000,000. and a satisfactory margin over its guarantees.

As of March 30th, there were in force in the Diocese of Newark, paid by the Church Pension Fund proper, 23 age benefits totaling \$38,848.56 per year; 2 total and permanent disability benefits amounting to \$3,000. per year, payments to widows of clergymen, 34 in number, aggregating \$25,796.40, payment to one orphan of \$500.04, or a grand total of 60 beneficiaries receiving, on a yearly basis, the sum total of \$68,145. This is an increase over the amount reported to the Convention of 1952 of approximately \$9,000.

With respect to the condition of pension assessments in the Diocese of Newark, your committee is glad to report that there are no unpaid assessments due in the Diocese for the calendar year 1932 and only three clergy now in the Diocese whose assessments payments were not complete up to December 31, 1952, and for these the Diocese of Newark had no responsibility. It is a pleasure to your committee to be able to report such a fine condition in our Diocese. This is made possible by the unfailing cooperation of our parish and mission treasurers.

REPORT OF THE FIELD DEPARTMENT

The Field Department has had some seven meetings since the last Diocesan Convention. The most important work of the Department has had to do with the Every Member Canvass. We are greatly indebted to the Rev. Richard Pease for his conscientions work in this area. Mr. Pease presented the materials available from the National Council at the Clergy Conference last June. Bishop Ludlow arranged for Area Meetings for Canvassers on September 28 in Englewood, Newark, and Orange. The Field Department is indebted to Messrs. Kappes, Kirk and Pickering for their presentation of materials at these meetings.

Plans for the Canvass this coming Fall are underway. Canvass Chairmen are to attend a dinner tonight to hear Bishop-Elect Stark, and to get a preview of materials that will be available from the National Conference.

Arrangements have been made to hold five area meetings in the Fall on the evening of Sunday, September 27. These are to be attended by all canvassers. The meetings will be held at:

St. John's, Dover Christ Church, Hackensack Grace Church, Newark St. Paul's, Paterson

Bishop Ludlow arranged for the Laymen's Conference held last year at Holiday House and plans are completed for the Laymen's Conference to be held this year, Saturday, June 20 and Sunday, June 21.

Bishop Ludlow also arranged for a Publicity Institute under the direction of the Rev. John Irwin. These meetings were well attended by the clergy and laity.

As one reviews the activities of the Fleid Department, one realizes more than ever the great load of the work has been carried by Bishop Ludlow. It is with a sense of great indebtedness to him that we look to the past, realizing that we can look confidently ahead because of the strong program he has established.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

1952-1953

Diocese of Newark

A conference with the leaders of the National Department of Christian Education held at West Point in May, 1952 brought together members of diocesan departments of Long Island, Newark, New York, and New Jersey. One suggestion from an exchange of ideas there was a planned all day meeting for the Newark Board. This was held in October at the Convent of St. John Baptist, at Mendham with Mrs. Harold Kelleran, Director of Christian Education, Diocese of Washington as observer and consultant with the Board. Several new approaches were explored, and a few implemented during the year. The importance of the Board members coming together to get to know one snother, and hammer out a unified outlook so that they can be a more effective instrument in the diocese was recognized. Very early they set the date of Saturday, June 20, 1953 for a similar meeting.

One of the efforts to carry out national policy was to engage Dr. John S. Whale. Visiting Professor from England at Drew University, to present to adults at the 1952 Cathedral School of Religion "The Drama of the Bible." Evaluating this approach, the Adult Committee, felt that though Dr. Whale was exceptionally able, this kind of program attracted only a selected few individuals, and a limited number of parishes. The Adult Committee recommended more planning of regional endeavors on a less crudite level.

The Youth Committee gave much time and thought to a diocesan wide program for all youth. They offered a complete new organization plan for youth. They centered on four things to be done together, A Fall GET TOGETHER—FEAST OF LIGHTS—CORPORATE COMMUNION OF YOUTH—THE BISHOPS' PRELENTEN RALLY. They persuaded the Young Peoples' Fellowship to make THE BISHOPS' PLEDGE diocesan wide for all youth and be received at the Fall Get Together at two large regional services at Morristown and Hackensack. This committee also supervised a successful 1952 High School Conference, and have good plans for 1953 for the same teen-age group.

POINTERS, a mimeographed information and inspiration pamphlet of several pages four times a year sent to parishes on a bundle plan, was changed to a one sheet mailing place sent directly to church school teachers. A mailing list of almost 800 was soon built up with the helpful response of parishes. The direct approach is expected to be helpful.

The adult summer conference was shifted from Holiday House, Delaware, N. J. For the first time it became a joint effort on the part of the dioceses of New Jersey and Newark. It was held on the spacious campus of Drew University. It was called—The New Jersey Episcopal Church Conference. It was considered successful enough to repeat and a similar adult program jointly with New Jersey takes place June 14-19, 1953 at Drew. Statistics below for the above 1952 conferences.

Mrs. Oliver V. Lee had a difficult assignment as Christmas Box Secretary for Newark Diocese. She had to get people enthusiastic about Christmas in September to get gifts sent to the Philippines by October 1st. Her report of both money and gifts sent are impressive in view of the difficulties. (See statistics below).

All the offerings from church schools—Advent—Lent—Birthday Thank Offering—showed increased parish participation, and additional money gifts. (See below). The Service of the Presentation of the Lenten Offering took a little different form, based on the General Convention Service for Children's Offerings. It included an element of pageantry. Because it was different it got both good and bad criticism, but most people thought that, with improvements it should be tried again.

April 1953 brought delegations from Long Island, Newark, and New York dioceses to West Point to meet with the Rev. Dr. David L. Hunter, the new Secretary for the National Department of Christian Education, and members of his staff. He gave an outline of curriculum development indicating the need for patience but definitely announcing a publication schedule for new printed material two and a half years hence, and then continuing annually until a full range of new material will be available to the whole church.

Dr. Hunter's main program and task in the meantime is concentrated on the development of the kind of church leaders that can adequately handle the new material. He is offering definite help to dioceses to make such training possible. We shall be hearing more about these plans, and shall apply some of them in our diocese.

Mr. Stanley appointed Mr. Kappes a committee of one to draw up a Resolution to the late Mr. Edward A. Chasteney who was for many years associated with the work of the Butts Fund and was, at the time of his death, Chairman of the Work Committee.

As there has been no Chairman of the Work Committee since the death of Mr. Chasteney, an informal report of disbursements since January 1, 1953 was presented and read by Mr. Stanley. Certificates representing payments during the current year and lacking the signature of a Chairman, were ratified by the Board.

A request from the Reverend Welles Bliss for a grant of \$400. to Nutley Family Bureau, Inc. was read. A like amount has been paid for the past two years toward tuition at Darrow School for a very worthy boy whose case has been reported upon in detail and approved by the Board. It was moved, seconded and carried that the sum of \$400. be paid again this year.

Bishop Washburn suggested authorizing \$500. more to the Work Committee for 1953; this in addition to the \$1,000. designated for this Committee at the previous meeting and thereby giving the Committee a surplus upon which to draw if and when a case arises and is approved. This was moved, seconded and carried.

Mr. Stanley spoke of the grant of \$10,000, which the Fund made to Youth Consultation Service for 1953. This is being paid in equal quarterly installments. It was hoped that Miss Daphne Hughes, Executive Director of Youth Consultation Service, and a member of this Board, would be present at the meeting to give a talk about the work of the Group Residence which benefits by this grant. Illness prevented Miss Hughes from being present. However, Mr. Stanley gave a brief but very thorough outline of the work of the Residence and read a recent letter from Youth Consultation Service expressing some most interesting and gratifying reactions from various sources in respect to results of Youth Consultation Service work with individual children in orienting them for placement or for return to their homes.

The Nominating Committee presented its slate and a motion was made that nominations be declared closed. This was seconded and carried and the Secretary authorized to cast the ballot. Elections were as follows:

Column A shows the intraceived for 1952, the last entire year. Under Column B we have shown what is required in addition at which was received in 1952. The Budget which we present for 1954 is under Column C.

Canon 4 Section 6 (d) of General Convention provides that in each Diocese a definite financial objective shall be allotted to each Parish and Mission as its share of the Program of the Church.

We, therefore, recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

4. Resolved, That the Finance and Advisory Board he authorized to designate the quota for each Parish and Mission; said quota to be based upon the average amount of its current expenses for the past six years.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Convention approves the Budget for Administrative Expenses for 1954.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Convention approves the second resolution on assessments for 1954,

Mr. Stuart made the following comments on the proposed budget for 1954:

This budget is set up in six columns and shows the Working Budget for 1952, the Convention Budget for 1953, the Working Budget for 1953 and the Proposed Budget for 1954 in three parts. Column A shows the amount received for the last entire year, Under Column B we have shown what is required in addition to that which was received in 1952. The Budget which we present for 1954 is under column C.

We have arranged for members of the Boards making the request to tell you about the increases.

Call for approval of Budget as shown in column C.

Rt. Rev'd Chairman, we are in entire sympathy with the aims of the resolution which was passed at the last Convention but feel that in some respects it is lacking. For instance—to approve of the amount received in 1952 is making a backward step, since our people have signified their willingness to have spent in 1953 \$114,650. as shown in the Working Budget for this year as against \$110,300. in 1952.

We point out that the difference between the Diocesan Budget for 1953 as adopted by the Convention in the amount of \$127,010. and the Working Budget for 1953 in the amount of \$114,650, is only \$12,360, or less than 10%, and our experience is that the pledges each year total an amount nearer to the quotas. It is the figure for the Church at Large in the amount of \$174,455. which makes the total of over \$300,000, appear large, but I submit that this will always be the case, since we are required to put into our Convention Budget the exact amount of the quota assigned to us by the National Council. For these reasons we ask for the appointment of a committee to study the procedure to be followed in presenting the Budget and to report to the Convention of 1954.

The Venerable Gordon T. Jones, Chairman of the Budget Committee of the Board of Missions presented the following written comments on the proposed budget:

Right Reverend Chairman and Members of Convention:

It is a privilege to address your attention to that portion of the Proposed Budget that has to do with the Support of Mission Stations and Aided Parishes. In the interest of saving your time, I present my remarks in written form.

Canon 13. Section I reads,

"The Bishop or Bishops, as the case may be, Clergy and Laity, in Convention assembled, shall be the Missionary Council of the Diocese." We here assembled are, therefore, the Missionary Council of this Diocese. The Agent to carry out the results of your deliberations is THE BOARD OF MISSIONS and CHURCH EXTENSION. This Board is composed of:

"The Bishops, five Archdeacons, twelve Presbyters (who are elected by Convention) and twelve Laymen (who also are elected by Convention)." Thirty-one members of the Convention serve on this Board. I could tell you of many instances where members of the Board have served the Church time after time at their own expense to be helpful to Vicars and to the various Missions, but time precludes my doing so.

Let me anticipate four questions which you may wish to ask.

Question: How many Missions are there? The Answer is FORTY-THREE.

Question: How many of these are aided? Answer: THIRTY-FIVE.

Quartien: How many Aided Parishes are there? Answer: ELEVEN, of this number, EIGHT receive a Diocesan Grant,

Question: How many cars are in the Diocesan Fleet? Answer: TWELVE,

Now for this Asking Budget of the Board of Missions and Church Extension for the Year 1954. The total asking is for \$108,275.00. It is made up of six items.

The first item is for Salary Grants to supplement local support, \$61,300.00 will be needed for this purpose. This sum is larger by \$3,800.00 than the last budget. This

increase will enable the Board to provide supplementary salary for a Vicar at West Milford, another Vicar at Coytesville, and a third Vicar at St. Luke's, Paterson.

The second item is \$11,000.00 for Housing of Vicars at those Missions where no housing is provided. The sum asked for in this budget is \$1,000.00 more than last year. The increase will care for housing at Coytesville and at West Milford.

Item three is for taxes on the property of the Diocese in the Vailsburg section of Newark. That figure is set at \$300.00.

The fourth item of \$13,300.00 is for the fleet of cars operated by Vicars who minister in more than one Mission. This large sum is composed of three costs, namely, (a) lnsurance—\$1,750.00, (b) operating, maintaining, repairing—\$7,550.00, and (c) replacement of over age cars in the fleet—\$4,000.00. Total \$13,300.00.

The fifth item is \$1,000.00 for Insurance other than motor coverage. This sum is used to carry supplementary insurance for fire and public liability on Mission properties.

The sixth item is for "Advance Work" and calls for \$25,000.00. Some members of the committee on the Budget thought this ought to be a much larger figure than the \$25,000.00. Truly a much larger sum could be put to work advantageously in the Diocese at once. If this sum of \$25,000.00 is made available to the Bishop and the Board of Missions "a down payment" can be made to start work in areas of the Diocese where there is now no Episcopal Church. Or, it may be that the work of the Church could be done more adequately in certain areas.

Let me tell you of one or two places:

A recent survey was conducted in River Edge in Bergen County. Twelve hundred door bells were rung and answered, 150 families were discovered who claimed membership in the Protestant Episcopal Church. Yet here is the startling fact, of those 150 families only TWENTY (20) acknowledged that they were presently connected with an Episcopal Church in this Diocese. Think of it, 130 Episcopal families are not being ministered to. Their need cries out to the Board of Missions.

Again, consider this: Through the kindness of the Ringwood Company a tract of land containing two and one half acres has been given to the Bishop for our work at West Milford. A congregation meets regularly in a small store near Greenwood Lake. That congregation deserves assistance from all of us. Some of the money could, doubtless, be used to assist in making a start on adequate housing of a congregation in West Milford.

Extensive survey work could be carried on in various promising areas for the future development of the Church such as in Franklin Lakes and the Whippany-Troy Hills regions.

At Dumont our Church is literally located on dead end streets. There is concurrence of opinion among the neighboring Rectors that this Church should be re-located. There is need to purchase land at approximately the junction of the line of Dumont, Haworth, and Cresskill. Then a building should be built for Church and Parish House purposes.

Your own knowledge of the housing developments in areas that are familiar to you will suggest further need of the Church and uses to which larger sums than the \$25,000.00 being asked for could be put. But we ask that a sincere effort be made to place at least this sum of \$25,000.00 in the hands of the Bishop and the Board of Missions for the year 1954.

When these Six Items in our budget are totalled up they amount to \$112,800.00. It is expected that there will be credits of \$1,275.00 from endowments and \$3,250.00 from the Bishop Lines' Memorial Fund. These credits total \$4,525.00 and bring the Asking Budget of the Board of Missions and Church Extension down to the total figure of \$108,275.00.

The members of the Budget committee are quite sincere in the belief that every dollar being asked for in this budget is urgently needed. We, therefore, respectfully request that our budget receive your approving vote and your hearty support.

Right Reverend Chairman, I shall count it a privilege to move the adoption of this portion of the Finance and Advisory Board's Budget for the year 1954 at the proper time.

Also speaking for other items in the proposed budget for 1954 were: the Reverend George E. Rath for the Board of Religious Education; Miss Scott for Youth Consultation Service; the Reverend Mr. (Hemsley on youth conferences; Mr. William T. Kirk on the need for more adequate salaries for the Clergy, and our past inability to meet the quota assigned the Diocese by the National Council.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Convention approves the proposed budget for 1954 as presented in the report of the Finance and Advisory Board.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Finance and Advisory Board be authorized to assign quotas to each Parish and Mission.

Mr. Stuart expressed his thanks and appreciation of the assistance to him by the members of the Cathedral House staff.

The Tellers reported that there was no election on the second ballot for Deputies to the Provincial Synod.

It was moved, seconded that the Reverend Leonard F. Nichols having received the most votes on the last ballot be elected by the Convention.

It was moved, and seconded that the rules of election be suspended, and that the Clergy and Lay Deputies, voting separately, cast their votes. Mr. Nichols was declared elected by both orders.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the two receiving the highest number of votes on the last ballot, not already elected, be elected as Supplementary Deputies to the Provincial Synod. The Reverend Messrs. Hall and Camon were declared elected.

· The Reverend Robert B. Pegram requested permission to offer the following resolution:

Whereas the situation at the Seminary of the University of the South with reference to the refusal of the Board of Trustees at its last meeting to admit qualified Negro students has attracted national attention;

AND WHEREAS this refusal has theological implications of importance to the whole Church;

Be it Resolved that this Convention express the sincere hope that the Board of Trustees of the University of the South at its meeting on June 5, 1953 will reverse their former decision.

And Be it Further Resolved that a copy of this resolution be sent to each member of the said board.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the rules be suspended for consideration of the above resolution.

The Reverend Albert W. Eastburn moved that the resolution be laid on the table. Seconded. On vote the motion was lost.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the resolution be adopted.

The Reverend Alexander M. Rodger, Chairman of the Committee on arrangements for the consecration of the Bishop Coadjutor-elect told of the plans being set up for the seating of members of the Diocese, and luncheon provision.

The Eighteenth Annual Address of the Suffragan Bishop, the Right Reverend Theodore R. Ludlow, D.D., LL.D., was delivered at this time.

THE EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE SUFFRAGAN BISHOP

In the preface to his translation to the Bible, John Wycliffe wrote in 1383, "This Bible is for the government of the people, by the people and for the people." He desired to put into the hands of the people a Bible in their own language, feeling sure that a reading knowledge of it would control their conduct by moral and spiritual principles. He accomplished that task

but people have fallen upon careless ways through failure to know the Bible today. This is shown by figures gathered by the British Weekly last Fall. The figures represent the results of a questionaire sent to 700 Protestant Churches in England, exclusive of the Anglican Church, and to 700 Protestant Churches in the United States. No statement is made as to whether Episcopal Churches were excluded in this country or not. The same questions were sent to both groups and almost the same answers were returned in both countries.

Ninety percent of the British Protestant Christians believed in the Trinity and eighty percent of the Americans. Approximately nintey-two percent of both groups believed that Jesus is divine. About thirty-five percent thought that being a Christian meant living by the Golden Rule. About forty-eight percent of both groups made the appalling statement that they did not believe that they were under any obligation to share with others their unique revelation of Christ. Seventy percent of British and seventy-two percent of Americans admitted that they prayed daily. Eighty-four percent said that they believed in immortality but only a fraction over thirty-one percent believed in Christian immortality. Eighty-four percent believed that the body died and that the soul just lived on forever. Twenty-two percent stated that they did not believe that it made any difference what a person believed,-"it is what you are that counts." In view of these figures, it was very revealing to find that sixty-eight percent of the British admitted reading the Bible more than once a week while only forty-eight percent of the Americans made the same admission. It is to be noted that the people answering the questions were confessedly members of some Church and not just unattached pagans. If the Anglican Church in England and our Church here were actually excluded from this survey, that is no reason for patting ourselves on the back or preening ourselves that we are different from our neighbors. The chances are that we are no more faithful than our fellow Christians. We live in the same environment and we are influenced by the same forces. If we not a Bible reading people, as these statistics would seem to indicate, that explains many of the strange religious ideas that people hold to-day and also explains the difficulty we have in building international or ecclesiastical community. In the midst of a disintegrating world, attacked by a false claim of universalism, we are unable to build the kind of co-ordinated community which we know we ought to have. The conclusion is obvious that we fail in community because we lack a sense of divine, common purpose in life. We get such a sense of eternal purpose only from a thorough working knowledge of the Bible. With our inadequate Biblical background and knowledge it is hard for us to build the kind of co-ordinated community that the world needs. It is hard for us to build a unified society with a community of purpose because we have little faith in a divine eternal purpose which includes us all.

Because we do not really know God's plan for men, there is a strange kind of religion being preached in some quarters to-day. It is a mixture of psychiatry and psychology with enough religious terminology thrown in to make it look like religion. Its main concern is to make the individual happy. It makes no outcry about social justice, it rebukes no social wrongs, it lifts no burdens from weary backs. It strives to draw the hearers' attention from the woes of others by a method of self-hypnosis, it seeks to shut out the thought of all unpleasant, pressing problems. God is in His Heaven, the Republican party has returned to power and if we only retain our composure, everything will soon be sweetness and light.

We find evidence of this kind of thinking even in our more thoughtful literature. Books written to-day and dealing with man and his problems seem to show little influence from classical theology. On the other hand, official

theological writings are coming nearer to the classical theological point of view as compared with the humanistic or so called liberalism of the last generation. To-day's thinking stresses the brotherhood of man but neglects the Fatherhood of God. Because of its emphasis upon human fellowship as an end in itself, it neglects or has a very small place for the Church.

One reason why it is hard for us of the West to understand the East to-day is due to the difference in our religious emphasis. The East thinks of religion as relating man to God, to the universe and to eternity. Our American religion on the whole is one which stresses good works, service, duty here and now. This accounts in a large part for the difficulties that rise between even careful thinkers in the East and in the West. Because of our religious emphasis upon action the East is inclined to look upon us as Godless or at least as indifferent to God. On the other hand we are inclined to regard Easterners as callous toward the needs of their fellow men.

There are two ways of living which divide us in our efforts to create a wholesome community. One is secularism which takes the attitude that Sunday is for religion and Monday is for business and there is no necessary relationship between the two. The other force which divides us is the drive for parochial schools. A commonly shared education is essential for a cooperative society. The danger of this divided education is that those who sense the danger of it drive all the harder for their particular idea of education. This can develop into a battle for one kind of education and only one,—come what may. This is not only regrettable because of its divisiveness but because it leads to the impoverishment of society. Where either a party in such a contest is completely successful society is confronted with the presentation of only one aspect of the truth.

To complicate our already difficult task of building up community there has been an attack upon public education arising primarily out of an outcry against high taxes. Every item in the community budget has voluble defenders except public education, so, tax conscious people charge gleefully into the fray against the schools. They charge that the schools have wandered far from the fundamentals of education and that the curriculum has been loaded win "unnecessary and expensive frills." They charge that the schools have pushed parents out of control and have taken entire charge of pupils. Too few people know the truth which is that more and more parents dump their children upon the care of the educational system so that they themselves can work or play or at least not bother with the immediate responsibility for their children. They charge that the schools have taught subversive principles but precious little evidence is produced. These tax conscious parents wave the flag and quote the Constitution, if they know it, instead of judging achievement reports and other facts concerning the real operation and teaching of the Public Schools. These charges, plus the divisive influence of the parochial schools, plus low salaries, discourage many men and women of principle from entering the teaching profession in the Public School System. As a product of the Public School system myself and as one who has maintained contemporary contact with it, I want to pay my tribute of respect to the men and women of that system. I am proud to admit their contribution to my personal, social and moral education. I would add that they have also made their spiritual contribution to my life by their unselfish demonstration of service to the public good. I call upon fair minded citizens to honestly study their work and then to do their utmost to help and to support this bulwark of our democracy,—the public school,

Some self-appointed saviours of the country find it personally profitable or satisfying to their ego to stir up a great hue and cry against the public schools and then to pass the hat among gullible people who are frightened by

the outcry. These self-appointed saviours operate in different parts of the country but their technique is similar and suggests a common sense of direction. To make our educational work still more difficult, there is a generation growing up with the idea that they should be entertained rather than trained. Even at the risk of being called an old "fuddy duddy" and a reactionary, l must express my regret at the hours spent by immature minds gazing upon lurid and vapid pictures in television cooked up by other immature minds for the sake of the profit involved. I sympathize with rectors who are striving to promote religious education among their children and young people under modern conditions. Owing to the wide use of television children are growing up with the idea that the main function of adults is to entertain them. Worse than that, they are growing up to be spectators rather than workers. They do not have to exercise their own minds either in play or work. It is all done for them. I am old fashioned enough to believe that there is something to be gained by having children use their own imaginations, and use their own resources in cooperation with books, games and worthy pictures. As it is now, they sit indoors and are titilated by the hour by stuff which has little edifying value. Under such circumstances it is quite natural that they should expect to be entertained by the Church without stirring from their homes and they see less and less value in Church meetings unless such meetings furnish them with a measure of entertainment. It is not the use of television that I am objecting to but to its undisciplined and indiscriminating use by immature minds. I believe that parents have a duty and a responsibility in this matter which can result in disaster if they do not exercise it.

One would think that our problems in trying to build community were great enough at the present time without having them added to by the irresponsible actions of some who hold presumably responsible positions. We are plagued with those who find it politically profitable to set parts of society over against other parts by playing upon their fears. The use of fear as a weapon for subduing new ideas is not new in United States history. It has been trotted out time and again by those who are determined to prevent change and to maintain the status quo.

In 1912 the Wisconsin delegation attending the then current Republican Convention proposed a platform of twenty-six planks which they regarded as necessary for liberating the American people from certain undemocratic processes then current in the country. Under the leadership of Senator Hopkins of Illinois this platform was booed down by the convention as rank socialism. We get a slant on the justice of that charge when we realize that one of the planks was to give women the right to vote. It is historically interesting to note that of the twenty-six planks then proposed, twenty-three of them have since been voted into law and have since been strenuously supported by both Democrats and Republicans.

After the word "socialist" was used in 1912 to frighten people, the next scare word was "pro German." Anybody with a German name was suspected and many of us remember the unhappy results of that hysteria. To-day the hate word is "Communist." It sends otherwise mentally competent citizens to looking under their beds and to eyeing their neighbors with suspicion. Such is the extent of this hysteria to-day that a man who while in Government office was charged with taking \$10,000. from Lustron, \$20,000. from a sugar lobbyist and \$5,000. from a Texas oil man can now paralyze honest citizens by bellowing unfounded charges from behind the breastworks of parliamentary privilege. These accusations spread paralysis because there is no chance of defense, and so suspicion spreads in the country. This situation lines up the thoughtless and the selfish behind the attacker as if he was a saviour of his country. We have indeed come to a pretty state of affairs in this country. The change is illustrated by what has come over the great state of Wisconsin

which was once renowned for its intelligence, its independence and its progressiveness. That same state has now spawned Joe McCarthy who thrives politically by creating fear and suspicion among his fellow citizens.

One could regret such a gradation in a great state like Wisconsin if that was the only consequence, but such reckless effrontery affects our international relations and leads other nations to wonder how mentally and ethically sound we are. Nor is this man alone. He has carbon copies who, taking cowardly privilege in legislative immunity dare to try to smear the names of such men as Bishop Oxnam and Dean Sayre. The question we need to ask is "why do these men resort to these unethical tactics?" Because they know that in reactionary circles, both ecclesiastical and social, there are Americans who are so economically afraid and jealous of the leadership of such men that they want to see them smeared. A social revolution is sweeping the world and the standpatters are afraid of it because it means a change in their position of privilege. Therefore, they applaud anything which seems to demean the leaders of the new day. They echo the age old cry "He stirreth up the people!" We must see to it that we do not fall victims to this hysteria. We must sturdily hold fast for ourselves and for our fellow citizens the ancient American principle that a man is presumed to be innocent until he is legally proven to be otherwise.

It is all the more imperative for us to maintain this right and also our self-control, because secularism seeks to have the constitutional right of freedom of religion interpreted as freedom from religion. These secularists attack in the courts everything that seems to suggest cooperation between church and state in any way. Some of our courts have gone far toward adopting the secularists' interpretation of the Constitution. Our Founding Fathers would have been schocked at the idea of a state without any religious relationship or responsibility of any kind. What they sought to establish and believed they had established, was a state within which man was free to worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience and not to be dominated by any form of religion fostered by the state. Our Founding Fathers took God and religion and worship most seriously and would have been scandalized by the idea of a state not influenced by religious responsibility.

The world is under a great strain to-day. The strain comes not only from fear and lack of eternal purpose but from uncertainty of procedure. We are facing a gang of unscrupulous cut-throats who are masters of the art of psychological warfare while we are untutored infants in such warfare. Knowing the war weariness of the world they are now trying to make us lower our guard by talking peace. I believe that the administration has met the situation wisely by demanding evidence of sincerity before proceeding. Personally, I do not believe that that evidence will be forthcoming for a long, long time to come. When such evidence does come, it will not come from any sincere desire for peace as such but because of internal difficulty due to the revolt of captive nations and peoples against continued cruelty and suppression. Therefore, our moral stamina as a nation will be put to a terrific test by a long, long period of uncertainty and watchfulness. We are an impatient people while the Russians, being half Oriental, have the patience of the Orient. There will be tremendous pressure upon our government to "bring our boys home." We must face now the cost of doing so. To do so would mean Communist control of the whole East and also the loss of respect of the East for us as a nation of its word. No nation would again trust us.

The opposite policy of "smash and get it over with" is equally foolish in my judgment. It would justify the Russian charge of American imperialism

and would arouse the whole East against us, even if we were victorious in battle. Our best policy is to maintain the present stalemate, unpleasant though that will be, even if it takes several years. China is the weak link in the Russian plan. She is rich in natural resources and in man power but lacking in know how. Even although Russia has stripped East Germany and Czechoslovakia of their scientists and industrialists, to reinforce her insufficient natural supply, still there will come a time when the supply will be insufficient to meet the needs of the Russians and her satellites, especially in the matter of food supply. When hunger has reached the limit of endurance, then things happen. Much of South Asia, including parts of South China, depend upon rice imported from Burma and Indo-China. That is the reason why the Communists are stirring in those regions now. We must do what we can to prevent the successful occupation of that territory because food is necessary to a dictatorship as well as to any other form of government Hungry people are dangerous to handle.

There are some things which we can do during this difficult period of waiting. One is to increase our interest in and support of the United Nations. True, it has not yet been able to establish the collective security which we had hoped for. Nor has it succeeded in gaining control over armaments of nations. There is nothing to be gained by calling names or finding fault. The sensible thing for us to do is to face the facts as they are and those facts are not all bad. The United Nations has done much to change people's thinking about war and has prevented war in Palestine and in Indonesia. Moreover the International Relief Organization has helped millions of needy people and its agencies have done untold good. We need to pray for the institution more than we do and to give over talking about some "other international institution" which might be more effective. To talk about other institutions is to play right into the hands of the Russians who insist that the United Nations is not an effective instrument for peace,—blissfully ignoring the fact that they alone have made it ineffective.

A new world is being born. Whether it will be a better world than the preceding one will depend upon our action. If we dream dreams of a world automatically becoming better we will be disappointed. We must work to make it become what we desire and not just expect it to evolve. We have the interesting task of proving that economic stability can be achieved under and along with political liberty.

To hold our own abroad we must strengthen our people at home by an understanding of their problems and our Christian responsibility for solving them. We now have a greater opportunity for building community in our country than might have been expected a few years ago. One significant fact is that labor, in both of its divisions, has had a change of leadership at the very time that it faces a change in national administration. That new administration is under no obligation to labor unions. But even before the elections the labor unions had already shown signs of an increasing sense of social responsibility and we may believe that they will now be even more inclined to depend upon legislation and mediation than upon force.

To do our part in building community, we must strengthen our own Church by knitting parishes and missions together with a sense of common life and purpose. This is all the more important to-day because of the turnover in our diocese. In 1952 the Diocese of Newark reported 178 canonically resident clergymen. Of these only 39 were active when I became Bishop in 1936. Of these 39 only 24 were active within the diocese when I became canonically resident on July 1, 1927. That gives us some inkling of the great change that has taken place in personnel and is continuing.

One way of knitting our people together is by properly utilizing the Diocesan Laymen's Committee and by seeing to it that our parishes and missions are properly represented by the right kind of keymen. There is a tendency for our rectors to appoint as keymen a new, otherwise unused member of the parish with the result that he has to use considerable time to become acquainted with not only the work of the parish but of the diocese as well. What the bishops and Laymen's Committee desire as a representative from your parish or mission is a man who is doing the most work right now and can speak with knowledge of the parish, its problems and opportunities. By completing a network of such keymen throughout the diocese we can pull our forces together and make the resources of all available to those who need it. Contact the chairman, Mr. Rolfe Hughes, or any one of the diocesan committee and find out how we can knit the diocese together.

To make just a passing reference to the financial situation of the diocese, I must express my concern over the way in which quotas have not been met in some parishes where salaries have, nevertheless, been increased. I feel sure that this arises out of a misunderstanding of the nature of the quotas. Quotas are to pay salaries of workers at home and abroad. If these quotas are not met, it means that workers' salaries are reduced or unpaid. I believe that we of the clergy should stand with our fellow workers all over the world and not leave all of the sacrifices to our distant brethren who are not here to speak for themselves.

May I call the attention of my brethren (particularly those who are most exact about observance of the rubrics of the Prayer Book) to the fact that there is a peremptory rubric which reads "a minister is ordered from time to ime to advise the people, whilst they are in health, to make wills, arranging for the disposal of their temporal goods and, when of ability, to leave bequests for religious and charitable uses." This is the most peremptory rubric in the Prayer Book for it is the only one which uses the word "ordered." How many of the clergy obey this rubric? May I point out that the rubric says that this action is to be taken "whilst they are in health," and not when they are helplessly sick. May I also tactfully point out to my brethren that "to leave bequests for religious and charitable uses" does not limit them to parochial purposes. The world is large and the need is great in all fields of church endeavor. In my experience too many people think they have nothing worth leaving. It is not the amount that is important but the fact that one who is strengthened through association with Christ's Body is solicitous that others should enjoy the privilege. Many small amounts added together quickly make a considerable sum.

While I am speaking of material things may I make one further comment. During the 17 years that I have gone in and out among you I have had a good opportunity to study all of the rectories used by our clergy. I must confess that on the whole I am not happy over the way in which they live. I speak from experience when I say that it is bad finance to let an investment run down. But I want to go on and speak on a higher plane than just proper maintenance of an investment. I believe it is the duty and the privilege of the vestry to see to it that their clergy live in reasonably comfortable, economical and adequate quarters. My impressions of many of the rectories is that they were bought cheaply because somebody wanted to get rid of a house or else action had to be taken suddenly. I suggest that the senior warden and his family should consider the possibility of living in the rectory for at least one month out of each year, preferably in the winter time, so as to make sure the rectory is reasonably habitable. Clergymen do not like to ask for themselves. Among a group of convinced Christian workers it ought not to be necessary for them to ask.

While I am speaking on this subject may I pay my tribute of respect to the rectory wives. They not only have to live with the rector but they also have to live with him in the rectory. They are a truly faithful group of Christians who put up with many inconveniences and deserve more consideration than they get.

If I followed my own inclinations, I would stop here but that might be misunderstood especially in view of the gracious words of our bishop and of this Convention. So I take a minute more to thank you most sincerely for your fellowship and co-operation during these seventeen years that I have had the privilege of serving as your bishop. The mistakes have been many but you have been generous and recognized them as mistakes of the head and not of the heart. I bespeak for my successor the same willing co-operation you have given me. I am grateful for the many tokens and expressions of affection which you have given Mrs. Ludlow and myself. You will always be in my heart and in my prayers. I wish I could tell you what I plan to do, but I have not yet decided. Several opportunities for service have been offered to me but I do not propose to make a definite decision until some time after I have fulfilled my duties here. Whatever I do, it will be something of my own and I trust will be of service in some way to the Church we all love and serve. In her name and for her sake let us close ranks and go forward.

The President called on the Rev'd John G. Forell to read the report of the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, together with calendar of business as follows:

Rules of Order and Special Calendar of business for the seasion of the Special Convention of the Diocese of Newark of January 27th, 1953:

RULES OF ORDER

The Rules of Order as adopted by the Convention of May 13, 1952, shall be in force so far as applicable to the business of this session.

CALENDAR OF BUSINESS

- Announcement as to the presence of quorum in both Orders.
- Report of the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order and Calendar of Business.
- 3. The appointment by the Chair of a Committee on Certificates of Lay Deputies.
- The appointment by the Convention of a Committee on Rights of Clerical Members. (Canon 1, Section I, Paragraph (2).
- The appointment by the Convention of a Committee on Rights of Lay Deputies. (Canon 1, Section II, Paragraph (3).
- 6. Reading by the Secretary of the call for this special session of the Convention.
- 7. The Bishop's Communication.
- 8. Statement by The Standing Committee.
- Consideration by the Convention of the Bishop's request for the election of a Bishop Coadjutor.
- 10. Fixing of and provision for the salary of the Bishop Coadjutor.
- 11. Nominations—Nominations for the office of Bishop Coadjutor shall be made without discussion any further than will suffice to designate a Presbyter of the Church, the fields and character of his labors, his worthiness of character and his fitness for the office in this Diocese. Nomination speeches shall not exceed five minutes. There shall in each case be but one seconding speech. It shall not exceed three minutes.
- 12. The election shall be conducted as follows:
 - (a) The vote shall be by ballot.
 - (b) The President shall appoint a sufficient number of Clerical and Lay Tellers to receive and count the votes of the Clergy and the votes of the Laity.
 - (c) The Secretary shall give directions to the Deputies as to the voting places.
 - (d) In the event of a majority of the Deputies present from a parish or mission failing to agree upon a candidate, such parish or mission shall then cast a blank ballot. A blank ballot shall be considered a vote.
 - (e) The vote shall be by ballot, the Clergy voting individually, the Lay Deputies by Parishes and Missions. The Clerical and Lay orders shall vote separately until some fit and qualified Preebyter shall receive a majority, in each order, of those present and voting; a blank ballot shall be considered a vote. And the Preebyter receiving such a concurrent majority in both orders shall be declared duly elected; provided, that if there should not be present two-thirds of the Clergy entitled to vote, and Deputies from two-thirds of the congregations entitled to representation, then a concurrent majority of two-thirds of those present and voting shall be necessary to determine a choice.
 - (f) Ballots may be cast for a Presbyter of the Church who has not been placed in nomination.
 - (g) After the result of a ballot has been announced (there being no election) and before another ballot is ordered by the Chair, additional nominations may be made.
 - (b) When the Tellers shall report an election then the President shall officially declare the name of the Bishop Coadjutor-elect and give directions for the signing by the Clerical and Lay Deputies of the Canonical Testimonial of the Bishop Coadjutor-elect.
 - (i) A motion shall then be made that the President appoint a Committee of Clergymen and Laymen to notify the Bishop Coadjutor-elect of his election.
- 13. The Convention shall close with prayer.

It was moved and seconded that the Rules of Order and Calendar of Business as presented be adopted.

The Rev'd Mr. Trowbridge offered the following amendment, which was seconded:

"Amendment to Section 11—that a nominating speech, not to exceed ten minutes, shall be allowed for each name to be presented, and that no limitation be placed upon seconding speeches, except that they shall not exceed three minutes in length."

This amendment was lost.

The Rev'd Mr. Minifie offered the following amendment to Section 11, which was seconded and on vote carried:

"Amendment—that the Rules of Order be amended so as to permit three seconding speeches of three minutes for each candidate."

The original report of the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, together with the amended Section 11 was adopted.

The Chair appointed the following Committee on Certificates of Lay Deputies; Rev'd Alfred J. Miller, Col. Leigh K. Lydecker and Mr. John C. Garde.

On motion made, seconded and carried the following Committee on Rights of Lay Members was elected: Mr. Charles W. Kappes, Jr., Mr. Frederick G. Stuart and Rev'd Harold G. Willis.

On motion made, seconded and carried the following Committee on Rights of Clerical Members was elected: Rev'd Eric M. Tasman, Rev'd George L. Grambs and Mr. Edwin D. Sprecklesen.

The Secretary was ordered to read the Call for this Special session of the Convention. (Vide, foregoing)

The Secretary was ordered to read the names of Parishes and Missions reporting the election of women Deputies and Alternate Deputies to this Convention.

The Chair gave ruling as to the seating of such women Deputies and Alternate Deputies.

The Secretary was ordered to read the names of Presbyters on the Canonical List of Clergy not entitled to vote.

The Bishop's Communication was read by the Bishop of the Diocese, the Right Reverend Benjamin M. Washburn, D.D., as follows:

"My Brethren of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of Newark:

"We are duly assembled in Special Convention in accordance with the provision of Article 3 of the Constitution of the Diocese to consider the election of a Bishop Coadjutor on the Canonical ground of extent of Diocesan work. The occasion for such consideration is the resignation of the Suffragan Bishop which takes effect this coming summer.

"As Bishop of the Diocese I do now give my consent to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor in accordance with Canon 39 of General Convention and state the duties which I assign to him when duly ordained and consecrated.

"In addition to a just and full share in Confirmation Visitations, I assign him oversight and promotion of the activities of the Field Department, of the Committee on Laymen's Work, and of the Board of Religious Education and its several Committees. He shall be responsible also for the work of the Board of Christian Social Relations and for our diocesan institutions and agencies, so far as their certificates of incorporation permit. He shall further have, in conference with the Bishop, the initiative and supervision in establishing such new Missions as opportunity seems to make expedient, the Bishop retaining his Canonical right to the appointment of Missionaries.

"It is to be noted that Canon 39 provides that the duties now assigned may be enlarged by mutual consent whenever the Bishop of the Diocese may desire to assign such additional duties to the Bishop Coadjutor.

"In recent weeks throughout the Diocese we have prayed constantly that our hearts and minds may be moved by the Holy Spirit to choose one apt and meet for the high office of a Bishop in the Church of God. We have prayed Him to deliver us from pride and prejudice, and whatsoever else may hinder us from godly union and concord, that we may be united in one holy bond of faith and charity.

"Brethren, the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit. Amen"

Statement by the Standing Committee was read by the Secretary of the Standing Committee, the Ven. William O. Leslie, Jr., as follows:

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE To the Special Convention of the Diocese of Newark, January 27, 1953

At a meeting of the Standing Committee held on Monday, September 29th, 1952, in the Cathedral House, 24 Rector Street, Newark, New Jersey, a majority of the members being present, Bishop Washburn gave notice of his intention to ask the Convention of the Diocese to elect a Bishop Coadjutor by reason of the extent of Diocesan work, Bishop Ludlow having previously presented his resignation as Bishop Suffragan to become effective July 14th, 1953. As a result of the Bishop's statement it was moved, seconded and carried that the following resolution be adopted by the Committee:

"Be It Resolved that this Committee give authorization for the sending out of a letter to the Bishops and Standing Committees of the Church, asking consent to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor on account of the extent of Diocesan work, said letter to be signed by the Bishop and the Secretary of the Standing Committee."

In due course a letter to the Bishops and one to the Standing Committees, asking for consent to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor on account of extent of Diocesan work, were signed by the Bishop of the Diocesa and the Scoretary of the Standing Committee and mailed to one hundred Bishops and seventy-four Standing Committees.

At a meeting of the Standing Committee held on Monday, November 24th, 1952, the Secretary reported that consent to elect a Bishop Coadjutor had been received from a majority of the Bishops and of the Standing Committees.

Following this report of the Secretary and the request of the Bishop for the advice of the Committee, the following motion was seconded and passed:

"The Bishop, having asked the advice of the Standing Committee, the Standing Committee approves the Bishop's plan to call a special Convention or or about January 27th."
