CANON, 1, § 2

OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES

From a Parish

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election, in the following form:

[Name of the Church, the Place, and Date.]

This certifies that a meeting of the Congregation of this Church, held for the purpose of electing Church Officers, and Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention (*or for the purpose of electing Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, if the meeting be for that object alone*), A. B., C. D., and E. F., being communicants of the Church in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish (or mission), were duly chosen as Deputies; and B. C., D. E., and F. G., also being communicants in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish (or mission), were duly chosen as Alternate Deputies to represent the Parish (or mission), in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand (*or if two Wardens subscribed, we have set our hands*), the day and year above written.

This certificate in the case of a Parish shall be signed by the Rector, or the Secretary or Clerk of the Vestry, or by the Wardens; and in the case of a Mission by the Minister in charge, or by the Clerk, or by the Warden, and transmitted to the Secretary of the Convention, at least thirty days before the meeting of the Annual Convention, excepting those parishes holding elections other than in Advent.

Memoranda:

Not more than three Deputies are allowed from each Parish, and Mission.

Three Alternate Deputies must be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies.

Write Christian names in full and legibly.

Return Certificates of Election at least ONE MONTH before Convention.

Rules of Order

THE CONVENTION

1. The Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
3. At the close of each Convention a Committee shall be appointed to review and certify the correctness of the minutes.
4. All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convention shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall record their attendance.
5. When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
6. The general procedure of the Convention shall be governed, unless otherwise provided for, by the rules of parliamentary practice as set forth in "Roberts' Rules of Order."
7. When any member is about to speak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
8. No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply), in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
9. If any member in speaking or otherwise, transgresses the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
10. A Committee consisting of the Bishop, ex-officio, five other clergymen and five laymen, to be known as the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, shall be appointed at each Convention to prepare the official Ballots and the Calendar of Business, for the next Annual Convention.

The mode of conducting the nominations and elections of all Committees, Commissions and Diocesan Council, and Departments, and all other elective officers not otherwise provided for, shall be as follows:

The Secretary of the Convention shall send out with the notice of the time and place of the Diocesan Convention, a list of the offices to be filled by election thereat, and the names of the incumbents of these offices, whose terms expire thereat, together with an official nomination blank. Such notice shall be sent out at least one month before the date appointed for the Convention, to the Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and to each lay delegate whose name and address has been transmitted to the Secretary, as provided in Canon I.

Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations for any office or offices to be filled at such Convention, shall at least fifteen days before the date appointed for the Convention, submit the same in writing to the Secretary thereof, together with his certificate that he has secured the consent of such person or persons to such nomination.

The Committee on Elections, from the list of nominations as furnished to it by the Secretary of the Convention, shall prepare sufficient ballots marked "Sample" for each clerical and lay delegate, as certified by such Secretary, as entitled to a seat in the Convention; such ballot to be mailed by such Secretary to each such delegate at least five days before the Convention.

At the beginning of the opening session the committee shall report to the Convention in the form of an official ballot the names of nominees; the arrangement of such names shall be determined by lot in each order.

If there be any office for which no nomination has been made on the sample ballot any delegate may file with the Secretary of the Convention the name of one candidate for any such office, together with his certificate, that he has secured the consent of the person so nominated. Such nominations may be filed up to the hour of voting, and the committee of Elections shall announce the names of such nominees at the time of the distribution of the first ballot.

The number of consecutive terms any nominee has held the office for which he is again nominated shall be noted on the ballot, in parentheses, after his or her name. After each list of nominations as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks may be filled by any voter. On the first ballot these ballots only shall be used, and also in subsequent ballots, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. No ballot shall be counted in its class, on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled, and the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast.

The members of the Convention shall also be requested, in said call, to send to this Committee any canonical amendments or other important items of business that they may propose to introduce at the next Convention, so that such matters may be assigned a place on the Calendar of Business. This call shall also be annually inserted in the official Magazine of the Diocese, *THE NEWARK CHURCHMAN*.

11. The President shall appoint in advance of each Convention a Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions, to whom shall be submitted by the Secretary of Convention all resolutions, (duly signed by Delegates to the Convention) which are to be considered by the Convention not less than two weeks in advance of said Convention.
12. Reports when submitted in Convention shall be read by title only, unless the reading be for the better transaction of business.
13. All new business introduced, except such as may accompany and form a part of a report of a committee, shall be in the form of a motion or resolution and shall be in writing, and signed.
14. All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered. It shall be the duty of the Secretary promptly to notify the members of all special committees of their appointment.
15. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.
16. No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the *JOURNAL*.
17. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it; or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment has been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
18. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.

VOTING PRIVILEGES.

19. All questions shall be decided *viva voce*, unless otherwise specially ordered.
20. On the demand of five Presbyters entitled to vote, or of the Lay Deputies from five Parishes and Missions, the vote upon any question shall be by Orders, the Clergy voting individually, and the Laity by Parishes and Missions; and, when a vote is thus taken, a concurrent majority in both Orders shall be necessary to carry any measure.
21. A public address system shall be installed for use of those addressing the Convention.

The Eighty-first Annual Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark was held on Tuesday, May 10th, Nineteen Hundred and Fifty-five, in Trinity Cathedral, Newark, New Jersey.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at eight-thirty o'clock by the Bishop of the Diocese, the Right Reverend Benjamin M. Washburn, D.D., assisted by the Bishop Coadjutor, the Right Reverend Leland Stark, D.D., the Very Reverend John B. Coburn, Dean of the Cathedral, and the Reverend Richard C. Williams, Assistant to the Dean.

The Bishop read the names of the Bishops of the Church, the Clergy of the Diocese and Laity of our Parishes and Missions, who departed this life to become members of the Church Expectant during the past Convention year, and commended them to the prayers of the congregation during the Communion service.

The morning session of the Convention was called to order at nine-thirty o'clock, with the Right Reverend, the Bishop of Newark, in the Chair.

A quorum being present in both Orders the Convention was declared ready for business. Attendance cards indicated the following were present;

The Bishop of Newark, the Right Reverend Benjamin M. Washburn, D.D., S.T.D., delivered his Twenty-third Annual Address at this time:

TWENTY-THIRD ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE BISHOP OF NEWARK

My brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

With gratitude to God for his continued blessing upon our diocese we are assembled in our Eighty-first Annual Convention. At its beginning we remember before him these his servants who during the past year have entered into Paradise.

Only one of the bishops of the Church has died: Wallace John Gardner, bishop of our neighboring diocese of New Jersey.

Four of our clergy have entered into rest:

Walter Gassaway Griggs had retired from the active ministry after serving fifteen years as an assistant at the House of Prayer, Newark.

Duane Wevill died in his eighty-ninth year. Coming into our Ministry from that of the Reformed Episcopal Church, he exercised in this diocese a rich ministry, serving successively as rector of St. Thomas', Newark, vicar of Epiphany, Allendale, and assistant at St. Paul's, Paterson, until his retirement nine years ago.

Gordon Tyron Jones, Archdeacon of Paterson, and for twenty-five years rector of St. Mary's Memorial Church, Haledon, was one of our outstanding priests. Through each of the many diocesan offices he held, he made a definite contribution to the life of the diocese. We may be particularly grateful for the efficiency and skill with which he discharged his responsibilities as President of the Standing Committee.

Wesley Herbert Des Jardins retired from the active ministry in 1949. He had been Vicar of St. George's, Passaic, and of St. Peter's, Rochelle Park, as well as for five years a Chaplain of the City Mission of Newark.

Your prayers are asked this morning for these lay persons also:

Charles Alexander Capron, long-time vestryman or warden of St. James' Church, Upper Montclair, was for 23 years a member of the Standing Committee. He had also been a deputy to General Convention.

Herbert M. Wilson, for many years a member of St. Andrew's, South Orange, and most recently of St. Peter's, Mountain Lakes, was a member of the Board of Missions. He had also been the treasurer of the Youth Consultation Service.

Mrs. Kenneth A. Southworth of Christ Church, East Orange, was for more than twenty-five years the efficient Treasurer of the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary.

Others who had held office as wardens or vestrymen of their several parishes are George J. Roberts, All Saints', Orange; John Adrian Onderdonk and Perry Strassburger, St. Luke's, Montclair; J. Arthur Kenney, Incarnation, East Orange; George Wade, Grace, Madison; Major William B. Love, St. Mary the Virgin, Ridgely Park; Henry Lloyd Folsom, Grace, Orange; H. Ray De Mund and J. Leroy Jordan, St. Philip's, Newark; William G. Bailey, Good Shepherd, Hamburg; William H. Hassel, St. Mary Magdalene's, Newark; William Sheridan Kane, Holy Communion, Paterson.

May the souls of all the faithful through the mercy of God rest in peace. Amen.

The formalities attendant upon the organization of the Convention have been completed. Soon we shall begin the transaction of its business. Before we do so let me remind you of three basic truths which should underlie our thinking and acting to-day and every day.

The first of these truths is that the Church is more than a loose federation of scattered congregations. No parish can in isolation fulfill its proper function. Its ministry of Word and Sacraments is derived and received from the whole great Church. The end of that Ministry is the glory of God. The glory of God is revealed and expressed in an ever wider and deeper fellowship among all those who call him Lord.

The second truth concerns the councils of the Church and the administration of its affairs. There are diversities of gifts and of operations. Authority is not the prerogative of the Episcopate alone. Wisdom is not the exclusive possession of the priesthood. The laity have their rightful place. It is to be hoped that they will always occupy and maintain it.

The third truth is our essential one-ness in the service of the Church, a unity which need not be affected by differences of race, of Churchmanship or any other circumstance. We cheerfully accept without bitterness decisions made by democratic procedure. In whatever respect we may have disagreed before a decision is reached, when it is once made, we recognize our share in the common responsibility to cooperate in its fulfillment.

Because of these and other implications every Convention is important. This Eighty-first Convention is, I believe, the most important to be held in the memory even of our oldest deputies. It has business to transact of such importance that every moment is today precious.

For this reason I propose to make my address much shorter than has been my custom. Normally I would speak at length of the past year, noting the many gains and advances made. It has been a good year, with Confirmations probably reaching an all time high, an increased enrollment in our Church Schools, growth in a sense of stewardship as reflected in increased missionary giving. Even at the end of the best of years we should never be complacent. In the life, whether of an individual or of a Church, there ought always to be a divine discontent, so far shall we always be from measuring up to God's rightful expectation of us. To-day, however, we are concerned not with the past, but with the future.

In the Calendar of Business the Bishop's Address comes at the beginning of the Session. This I assume is to give him an opportunity to make such comments as may be helpful in clarifying matters which are to come before the Convention. Those matters to which I now refer are important, though not to-day of major importance.

A year ago we approved the draft of a thorough revision of our Diocesan Canons, substantially as prepared by a Special Committee appointed for that purpose. The most significant change from our former Canons was the creation of a Diocesan Council to integrate the work of our various boards, committees, and agencies. I am glad to report that this action has proven its worth. At the same time a thoroughly revised Constitution was adopted, which however becomes effective only if it receives the affirmative vote of two successive Conventions. It therefore comes before you to-day for final ratification. You have had an opportunity during the past year to give further study to the draft. No criticism of its form or content has reached me, which I trust means that you are disposed to proceed to the necessary final ratification.

The Diocesan Council will submit two Budgets for 1956. The Budget for Administrative Expense includes a new item which is the cost of a blanket fidelity bond. At an exceedingly low rate this would as of January 1, 1956, cover all persons in the diocese and in its parishes and missions who handle funds. The amount of such coverage is \$5,000. If the item is approved, parishes will in the future be relieved of the necessity of bonding their officers. A larger amount of coverage where desired can be obtained. Other increases in the budget reflect unescapable increased costs of necessary services and commodities. The Budget for the Program of the Diocese and General Convention shows an increase of approximately ten per cent which is chiefly due to more intensive work proposed by the Department of Missions. I can assure you that both budgets are entirely realistic.

A part of your time will be given to the Annual Elections. However time-consuming these may be, the choice of fit persons for important offices is not to be taken lightly. This is particularly true in respect to the election of deputies to General Convention. Newark should always send deputies capable of making significant contributions to the work of the Convention and hence of the general Church.

General Convention this year is unlikely to be called upon to face greatly controversial issues. It will however, as always, have important matters upon which to act. One of these is whether or not to elect a Bishop for the Armed Forces. The Church must not forget its responsibility to and for its thousands of communicants living in a difficult environment. How useful a Bishop for the Armed Forces would be I cannot say. Certainly the mere creation of such an office would not of itself solve all our problems. I am afraid that we are failing to keep open as close a line of communication between the Church at home and the men and women in the Services as we maintained during the War.

General Convention will be asked to reconsider legislation enacted in 1949 which, unless amended this year, requires on and after January 1, 1957, every clergyman attaining the age of 72 years and occupying any remunerative parochial or administrative position to resign the same and retire from active service. During the six years since the enactment of this legislation doubts as to its wisdom have been raised in many quarters, with the result that the 1952 General Convention requested the Trustees of the Church Pension Fund to study the question and to report its findings at Honolulu. It is not the function of the Trustees to make a definite recommendation to General Convention. They will, however, report their findings, submitting for its consideration two Canons. The Convention must itself decide which, if either of them, it desires. The first embodies in clarified form the intent and the substance of the 1949 proposal for complete, compulsory retirement. The second embodies the opinion held by a majority of the House of Bishops

when it met in 1953. This, however, was prior to the Act of Congress including the clergy under the old age and survivors' benefits of the Federal Social Security Act. At that time the majority of the bishops favored the compulsory resignation of all clergymen at age 72 but with a provision that following such resignation they might with the consent of the Bishop continue in the active ministry on a year to year basis in either their former or another cure.

Before us to-day come several miscellaneous resolutions. Naturally I refrain from urging either the acceptance or the rejection of any of these resolutions. The decision rests with you. Each of them, however, deserves sympathetic consideration, since the ultimate end sought in at least most cases is commendable. A change in the day of our Convention from Tuesday to Saturday is sought in order to secure a Convention widely representative of the constituency of the Church. It is proposed as of 1957 to set at \$4,200. plus house the minimum salary for a priest in the diocese if he is serving full time. The inadequacy of most clerical stipends certainly should be a matter of grave concern to every one of us. A third resolution emphasizes the fact that the Church itself is the appropriate place for the Burial Office, and incidentally for its other ministrations. A fourth suggests a concrete manner in which through the sponsoring of refugees by each of our parishes we may express our belief in the duty of Christian neighborliness. Another advocating the renunciation of the use of force and violence to settle factional disputes throughout the world brings home to us the fact that a third world war may mean the descent of darkness upon this earth and the destruction of civilization as we have known it.

We shall await with interest the recommendations of the Committee which in advance of the Convention has carefully considered these resolutions. In the case of each of them we must decide not only whether the end sought is desirable, but also whether the means suggested towards its attainment is both desirable and practicable. Certainly each of them may with entire propriety engage our attention. The Church has a concern with everything affecting life in a world which God made and would govern.

I have spoken briefly of most of the items upon our agenda. None of them, nor all of them together, could possibly justify me in saying that this is likely to be the most important Convention in our generation. It is the main item on our agenda which makes this Eighty-first Convention of supreme importance. That item is the consideration of the far-reaching joint Report of the Commission on Strategy and Policy and of the Diocesan Council. We shall have before us their recommendation that we undertake in 1956 to raise more than a million dollars for the strengthening and expansion of the work of the Diocese.

Bishop Stark plans in his Address to the Convention to speak at length on the importance of this undertaking. He and I are of one mind as to its urgency. We believe that with the whole-hearted cooperation of the clergy and the laity throughout the diocese we shall succeed in what to-day we may decide to undertake.

God does not fail his Church when it dedicates itself to the doing of his will. In the first centuries of its existence it had no buildings of its own. It was the age of persecution. Before even their foundations could have been laid, the hostile state would have torn down buildings. For a time there seemed no need of buildings. The Second Advent of our Lord was thought to be imminent, the end of all things was at hand, the Kingdom of God was just around the corner.

Nineteen hundred years have passed. Our conception of the Kingdom and the manner of its coming is greatly altered. The Church is a company of people. It is not buildings, but the fulfillment of its mission requires the possession of buildings. Buildings which in each community proclaim by their presence that Christ is the Lord of all life. Buildings in which the Word is preached that men shall be taught to bring to their citizenship a Christian conscience. Buildings in which the Sacraments are administered that the grace God gives may enable men to love one another even as God loveth all. Buildings in which boys and girls may be led to choose good and to reject evil. Buildings which shall be centers of neighborliness redeeming and uplifting the common life of common people.

To our responsibility we must give good heed. When we discuss that responsibility this afternoon I ask you to bear in mind the three great truths with which I began my brief address.

The Church is more than a loose federation of scattered congregations. No parish can in isolation fulfill its proper function. We are members one of another.

Bishops, priests, and laity together constitute the Church. Each order has its responsibility both in making decisions and in their execution.

Decisions which are made to-day by democratic procedure become the responsibility of each and every one of us.

May God hear our prayers this day and grant that we may both perceive and know what things we ought to do and also may have grace and power faithfully to fulfill the same through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the following resolution be adopted:

Resolved, that unanimous consent by this Convention to the suspension of the rules of elections, and the casting by the Secretary of one ballot for each of the following nominees on the Ballot, where there is no contest, namely: Standing Committee—Class of 1959 Mr. Henry T. Stetson, Class of 1958 Reverend George E. Rath;—Treasurer of Convention, Mr. Gustave E. Wiedenmayer; Ecclesiastical Court Rev. J. Fred Hamblin; Trinity Cathedral Chapter Mr. C. Donald Thompson; Department of Missions, Class of 1956 Messrs. Robert J. Davis and Frank Atkinson; Department of Christian Education Reverend Allan B. Grayson, Mr. William S. Greene, Mrs. James K. Merritt; Christian Social Relations Class of 1957 Reverend Messrs. Frederick B. Jansen and Louis H. Berry; Deputies of the Provincial Synod Messrs. Frederick G. Stuart and William Gottlieb.

Polls were opened for balloting at 10:37 o'clock, and closed at 10:50 o'clock.

In the absence of the Chairman of the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions the Reverend Arthur J. Ehlenberger presented the report of this Committee as follows:

Resolution submitted by the Reverend Henry B. Cannon as follows:

"Resolved that:

1. In accordance with the Prayer Book the Burial Office should be in the Parish Church for all members of the Church.
2. During the service the casket should always be closed.
3. The above resolution should be printed at the direction of this Convention and distributed by the Bishops to all parishes and missions in this Diocese.
4. The above resolution be referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons for implementation."

Having considered this resolution, the Committee concluded:

1. That the resolution is contrary to the rubric at the beginning of the Order for the Burial of the Dead which directs that the service be said in the Church or towards the Grave.
2. That custom usually directs that the casket be closed and legislation seems unnecessary, and under some circumstances might prove unwise and even impossible.

The Committee recommends that the Resolution not be adopted.

It was moved and seconded that the recommendation of the Committee be approved, and the resolution be laid on the table. Several members of the Convention spoke on the resolution. The motion to lay on the table was defeated by a vote of 183 to 205.

It was thereupon moved, seconded and carried that the resolution as submitted by the Rev'd Mr. Cannon be adopted.

Resolution submitted by Mr. Henry J. Miller, St. John's Church, Newark as follows:

"WHEREAS, the International outlook is becoming more and more tense, threats and counter-threats seem to be the keynote of the leading world powers, and the further development of nuclear weapons can lead to the destruction of mankind, and

WHEREAS, the Christian Church was founded on the teachings and precepts of Jesus Christ who set the example of humility, brotherly love and non-violence, and

WHEREAS, St. Paul, the great evangelist, in his prophetic warning stated, 'Wherefore let him who thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall,' and

WHEREAS, the last two World Wars, with their terrific cost of human lives, devastation and misery, have proven conclusively that no lasting benefit to mankind can be brought about by such methods,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED at this eighty-first annual convention of the Diocese of Newark, assembled this 10th day of May, 1955, that it re-affirms its faith in the abiding love and wisdom of Jesus Christ, who was willing to make the Supreme Sacrifice in order that the Kingdom of God might be established on this earth, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this convention call upon the President of the United States and all others in authority to renounce the use of force and violence to settle factional disputes throughout the world today, and to strive to establish upon this earth the international fellowship of the human race as so truly exemplified by our Saviour, Jesus Christ."

While in accord with the aim of this resolution, that of promoting a peaceful solution of present day international tension, the committee feels:

1. that this resolution if forwarded to Washington would be ill-timed and have no positive fruits;
2. that the passing of this resolution by Convention might be construed by the enemies of our nation as weakness;
3. that the resolution seems to lose sight of the fact that "Love of Neighbor" demands the maintenance of justice as well as peace.

The Committee recommends that the resolution not be adopted.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the resolution not be adopted and be laid on the table.

Resolution submitted by the Reverend William L. Griffin, Jr.:

"RESOLVED: That it is the judgment of this Convention that the minimum salary for a priest in this Diocese serving full time should be \$4,200., plus house. The Diocesan Council is hereby instructed in preparing the budget for 1957 to make provision for the salaries of Diocesan employees in accordance with this principle, and we urge all parishes to make plans with the same end in view."

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions recommends the adoption of this resolution.

The Reverend Mr. Griffin read his opinion in support of the resolution, together with facts and figures in other areas of our economy.

It was moved, seconded and carried that this resolution be adopted.

The Committee recommended the adoption of the following resolution presented by the Department of Christian Social Relations, and on motion it was adopted:

"WHEREAS, the Protestant Episcopal Church by action of the National Council has evidenced its Christian concern for the millions of refugees throughout the world by supporting the Refugee Relief Act of 1953 to the extent of underwriting 1,500 job and housing assurances for the Eastern Orthodox, Old Catholic, and Protestant refugees looking to us for resettlement opportunities in the United States; be it therefore

Resolved: That this Convention, in the spirit of the Good Samaritan and in the tradition of this great Diocese, ask each parish and mission to make every effort to find housing and employment for one family unit eligible under the Refugee Relief Act of 1953."

The Committee recommended that the following resolution submitted by St. Andrew's Church, Newark not be adopted, and it was moved, seconded and carried that it be laid on the table:

"At the Annual Parish Meeting of St. Andrew's Church in Newark on Monday, December 6, 1954, the voting members present unanimously directed their deputies to the eighty-first Annual Diocesan Convention to present the following resolution to said Convention:

WHEREAS the appointed meeting day of the Diocesan Convention is a Tuesday, and

WHEREAS it becomes most inconvenient for those deputies who are employed to take time off from their several employments because of the consequent loss of wages, and

WHEREAS such a situation makes it exceedingly difficult to persuade individuals who are not either self-employed, salaried, or retired to accept election as deputies and alternate deputies to Diocesan Convention, and

WHEREAS such a condition militates against true democratic procedure in representation by the several parishes and missions at the Diocesan Convention,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That the eighty-first Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark, meeting at Trinity Cathedral on Tuesday, May 10, 1955, take appropriate action to the end that future Diocesan Conventions be held on the second Saturday in May of each year.

The following resolution was submitted by the Rector and Deputies of St. Andrew's Church,

To: The Secretary of The Diocesan Convention.

A RESOLUTION which it is respectfully requested be submitted to the eighty-first Convention of the Diocese of Newark, meeting at Trinity Cathedral on Tuesday, May 10, 1955.

* * * * *

WHEREAS the present title of this branch of Christ's Church, "The Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America," is cumbersome and unwieldy, and

WHEREAS, in common parlance, members of this Church refer to themselves as "Episcopalians" and to their Church as "The Episcopal Church," and

WHEREAS, as a Church, we profess to be both Catholic and Protestant in doctrine, discipline, and worship and our present title bears witness to only part of this dual nature to the exclusion of the other part, and

WHEREAS several branches of our own Anglican Communion are designated in their respective titles as "The Episcopal Church" in or of their respective countries and inasmuch as no other national branch of the Anglican Communion bears the designation, "Protestant" in its title, and

WHEREAS no other Christian Communion in the United States at the present time uses the designation "Protestant" in its title, and

WHEREAS the term, "Protestant," although at one time possessing a positive meaning and bearing witness to the great values of the Reformation, has assumed almost universally in modern American usage the meaning: "non-Catholic" and has become for the great majority of people a catch-all term embracing all those, whether Christian or non-Christian, who are not on the one hand Jews or on the other hand adherents of the Roman Church, and

WHEREAS the specific title, "Protestant," can well be a source of misunderstanding in ecumenical relationships between ourselves and the Eastern Orthodox and other like Communions, and

WHEREAS we conceive of the Ecumenical Movement as embracing all Communions, whether Catholic, Protestant, or both, which acknowledge Christ as Lord and Savior,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that this eighty-first Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark, meeting in Trinity Cathedral on Tuesday, May 10, 1955, petition the General Convention which meets in Honolulu, T. H. this autumn, to take appropriate action in the direction of omitting the word, "Protestant" from the title of this Church and amending said title to read: "The Episcopal Church in the United States of America."

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions recommends that this resolution not be adopted for these reasons: 1. that the proposed new designation of the Church would not enhance its position as the "roomiest Church in Christendom," 2. that the resolution might be interpreted as a partisan move which could result in endless acrimonious debate, 3. that the present designation of the Church has been no hindrance to those of differing schools of thought and emphasis within the Church, 4. that the present title more adequately, than that which is proposed, differentiates our Church from others which might also be designated as "Episcopal."

It was moved, seconded and carried that the recommendation of the Committee be approved, and the resolution be laid on the table.

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions recommends the adoption of the following resolution submitted by the Reverend George L. Grambs, and on motion it was adopted:

WHEREAS a widespread revival of interest in liturgical study and action is occurring in all parts of western Christendom in our time, and

WHEREAS, as part of this liturgical revival the Standing Liturgical Commission of General Convention has issued a number of "Prayer Book Studies" looking towards eventual revision of the Book of Common Prayer.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that this Convention of the Diocese of Newark record its great gratitude to the Liturgical Commission for its valuable work.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that these studies be commended to the clergy, and congregations of this Diocese for further study and discussion, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Convention believes that additional study and discussions should be given to the findings of modern liturgical scholarship, and, under proper safeguards, with trial use of any proposed revisions, before mature and informed decisions can be made on matter of Prayer Book revision.

And, therefore, records its opinion that any official revision of the Prayer Book would be premature at this time, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we request the General Convention to provide the Standing Liturgical Commission with adequate funds to continue its studies leading to revision.

The Reverend John J. Hughes moved, seconded and carried, that in the future, all resolutions submitted to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions be printed or mimeographed, and be mailed with other printed matters to the delegates to Convention.

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All reports of the Treasurer of the Convention, and the Treasurer of the Department of Missions have been audited by Peat, Marwick, Mitchell & Co.

The Bishop, on behalf of the Convention thanked Mr. Wiedenmayer for his work as the Treasurer of the Convention.

The Bishop reported that Mr. F. Bruce Gerhard has been elected to fill a vacancy in the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties.

It was moved and carried that the election of Mr. Gerhard be confirmed.

In the absence of the Chairman of The Diocesan Builders for Christ Campaign, Mr. Samuel S. Hall, Jr., his report, as follows, was read by Mrs. Hall,

"As all will doubtlessly remember, the Episcopal Church has been engaged in a Builders for Christ campaign for \$1,150,000. We in the Diocese of Newark have, of course, assumed our proportionate share, which comes to \$140,000.

To date, after expenses have been deducted, we have received \$125,055 toward this goal of \$140,000, leaving approximately \$15,000 yet to come in. A number of our people are still paying on their pledges, and some churches have not completed their campaigns. Other churches are as yet below their self-imposed goals, but assure us of their intention to reach those goals. When outstanding pledges are completed, when all campaigns have been finished, when individual parish goals have been met, we are strongly confident that the Diocese of Newark will reach its diocesan quota of \$140,000, but we must report at this time that our success is dependent upon the contingencies that have been outlined, and we urge our people and our churches to continuing effort on behalf of "Builders for Christ."

However, even when our returns are necessarily incomplete, we have made this unequivocal statement to the officials of the National Council of our Church; "THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK WILL MEET ITS GOAL!"

Noon Day prayers were said by the Bishop Coadjutor, the Right Reverend Leland Stark.

The Reverend Donald MacAdie, Chairman of The Commission on Strategy and Policy of the Diocesan Council was called upon to make report:

REMARKS ON THE PRESENTATION OF THE JOINT REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON STRATEGY AND POLICY AND THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL.

The joint report of The Commission on Strategy and Policy and The Diocesan Council is herewith presented to the Diocesan Convention. Each delegate should have received this report about one week ago. I would ask the privilege of making some remarks prior to the general consideration and ultimate disposition of the report.

You are reminded, in the very beginning of the Report, that the Commission on Strategy and Policy came into existence as the direct result of the action of this Convention on May 11, 1954. Whatever final estimate we may make of this Report we will recall that it comes to you by direct request of this Convention.

It should also be noted, as stated in the Report, that your Commission presents this as an unfinished report. This is so necessarily. The very nature of the work surveyed is such that it can never be said to be completed. The report itself recommends further and continued study of our Diocesan missionary situation which is constantly changing. Your Commission feels, however, that this report is one upon which we can base adequate discussion and intelligent decision.

One or two items in the report need clarification or amplification, or both. The Report recommends that the total goal of the proposed campaign

be set at \$1,100,000. Of this total, \$880,000 is recommended for the most pressing needs in the area of Church extension. This sum represents actual needs. Indeed the need is greater than this sum indicates. However, by using a large portion of it as a Revolving Loan Fund, many of the dollars can be used more than once. A part of this Revolving Fund can be used not only for mission stations but for small parishes in strategic areas. It is not contemplated by your Commission that parishes which can finance their own capital needs in the usual manner would be recipients of loans from this Fund. So, with the judicious use of mortgages, plus the fact that some aided stations will be able to raise more than they are to receive, the \$880,000 should permit us to meet the suggested needs and opportunities. It should be noted also that all projects could not be done at once even if the money were on hand. Payments will come to us over a three year period.

On page seven of the Report the sum of \$170,000 is recommended for special Diocesan projects. No breakdown of figures is given there but should have been included. Number one, in order of appearance on page seven, is the need to increase the facilities of The House of The Holy Comforter, the Diocesan Home for the aged in West Orange. For this purpose \$50,000 is suggested. This sum, with monies now in hand at the Home, will be sufficient to add a much needed wing to the present building. It may be noted here that the House of The Good Shepherd in Orange, also for the aged, while Episcopalian in ministrations, is not owned by our Diocese. The special sub-committee which made the study of Church homes for the aged is under the Chairmanship of the Rev'd. Marcus Hall, Rector of St. Luke's, Montclair.

Next, on page seven, the Commission recommends \$100,000 for a Diocesan Conference and Retreat Center. The special committee for this study was headed by the Rev. Welles R. Bliss and The Very Rev'd John B. Coburn. They were in communication with a great number of dioceses in the United States. Many of our Bishops were emphatic in their approval concerning the need and value of such centers. The committee also investigated the type, cost, and current upkeep of such diocesan centers as are presently in existence throughout the Church. Consultation in our own Diocese showed the need of such a center where conferences could be held throughout the entire year. In addition the desirability of a retreat center for all members of our Diocese was clearly evident. It was felt, upon investigation, that to create such a center, without luxury but with adequate facilities, might well cost in the neighborhood of \$250,000. Your Commission felt that this was too great a sum to devote to one project in our contemplated campaign. The recommendation is that \$100,000 be set aside for this purpose. Experience has shown that such a project being in existence might well be an incentive for someone to make added gifts or bequests of money or property. It seems fairly evident now, by recent developments, that we could have such a center in the not too distant future, providing we had the initial \$100,000.

The third special project recommended has to do with Christ Hospital, Jersey City, the only Episcopal hospital in our Diocese. The President of the Board is our Coadjutor-Bishop, our clergy serve on its official board, and we are responsible for the work of the chaplain. The Hospital has real need for the rehabilitation of its X-Ray equipment. Your Commission recommends \$20,000 for this purpose.

On page seven also (bottom of the page) and page eight you will find an item of \$50,000 for the expenses of a large-scale campaign. This sum compares very favorably with the cost of similar campaigns elsewhere. Of this sum \$27,000 is the cost of having the services of an organization with broad

fund-raising experience. The Commission and The Council feel that such help is essential. It is conceivable that we could conduct such a campaign without outside help. To do so would mean the creation of a staff; the use of one or more of our gifted Diocesan members as leaders and much supplemental help. Moreover, such a staff would be starting from scratch. All procedures, plans, literature, methods, and many other vital details would have to be initiated from the beginning, and with a background of little or no experience. Such a system would undoubtedly make for far less efficiency than to have fully experienced and expert guidance. The Diocesan Council, therefore, engaged the services of Ward, Dreshman & Reinhardt, a firm with proven ability in this field. Mr. Edward R. Pike, of that firm, has been assigned to our campaign. Mr. Pike, a member of The Diocese of Pennsylvania, has recently directed highly successful campaigns in the Diocese of Los Angeles, the Diocese of California, and is presently directing the campaign in the Diocese of Western New York. In addition to the sum paid to this firm it is estimated, on the basis of experience, that other campaign expenses will amount to \$23,000, thus bringing our total expense to \$50,000. This is approximately 4½ per cent of our proposed goal.

With a great deal of presumption I would conclude with two thoughts. When we reach the point of discussing and voting upon these proposals may we do so realistically. We ought not to vote on this matter as we sometimes do with our annual current budget askings. It will mean something real to your parish or mission if this report is adopted—something real in the way of cooperation, work, and giving. If this Report is fully adopted it will mean that, for this Advance Fund and in addition to your regular giving, you will be asked for about four times your annual quota. This will be payable over a three year period.

And, finally, and again with presumption on my part: I urge you to look thru the dollars and cents, thru and beyond the material details of this Report. Recall that what we are really considering is the spread of Christ's Church in our Diocese. Whatever our judgment may be of this report the real question we are to decide has to do with the Gospel of Jesus Christ, as our branch of His Church, has been given the challenge and privilege of spreading it among people.

Mr. Chairman, I move the adoption of the four Resolutions on page 9 of this Report, and ask that they be placed on the Calendar.

To the Clergy and Lay Delegates:

The following report to the Eighty-First Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark is submitted jointly by the Commission on Strategy and Policy and the Diocesan Council. All delegates to the Convention are urged to examine the report carefully and to give it their earnest consideration, as it will be one of the major items on the agenda when the Convention meets on May 10, 1955, at Trinity Cathedral, Newark, N. J. Delegates are asked to bring their copies of the report with them when they come to the Convention.

This report concerns the diocesan-wide capital needs fund campaign which was approved by the Eightieth Annual Convention of the Diocese on May 11, 1954. The proposed plan to undertake such a campaign had been previously recommended in 1954 by the Diocesan Finance and Advisory Board (now the Diocesan Council). Final action on setting a specific goal for the campaign becomes now the responsibility of the Diocesan Convention.

In authorizing this campaign, the Eightieth Annual Convention testified to the widespread recognition, first expressed by Bishop Washburn in 1950, that the time has come when the Episcopal Church in Northern New Jersey can no longer postpone the advance of its work for our Lord and His Church. We can afford no further delay in meeting insistent capital needs within our Diocese.

The Convention's action last year seconded what Bishop Stark had said in his Address, that "if we believe in our Church and its distinct mission, then we must also believe that it is God's will for us to take this giant stride forward."

Certainly as Christians we cannot be content or justified in giving ground or in just "holding the line" when there is opportunity for extending Christ's work. Neither can we neglect to keep up at least minimum standards of structural safety in our church buildings, or remain unconcerned when the inability of struggling congregations to solve their own problems becomes a matter of real distress.

While we have participated in campaigns for needs outside the Diocese, not since 1927 has our Diocesan family worked together for the advancement of our Church at home. Our united efforts at that time brought success to the campaign for the Bishop Lines Memorial Endowment Fund. *Now, more than a quarter-century later, the Diocesan Convention is being asked, on recommendation of the Diocesan Council and the Commission on Strategy and Policy, to call our people to pool their energies and resources to raise a capital needs fund of \$1,100,000 that will enable us to meet the many opportunities that this growing area lays before us.*

At first thought, this may seem to be a large sum. We need to remember, however, that the Diocese of Newark, with 53,000 communicants and 91,000 baptized members, is seventh in size in the Episcopal Church. Also, pledges for the proposed fund would be payable over a course of three years.

While investigation and study are still going on, sufficient knowledge is in hand to recommend the definite figure of \$1,100,000 for the campaign authorized by the 1954 Convention. A successful campaign with this amount as the minimum goal would probably make it unnecessary to have another Diocesan capital funds appeal in the present generation.

To enable members of the Convention to decide intelligently on such a proposed goal, the following facts are presented.

I

Formation of the Commission

In compliance with the Convention's instruction to undertake a capital needs fund campaign, the Diocesan Council created a Commission on Strategy and Policy to investigate and evaluate the opportunities for extending and strengthening the work of the Episcopal Church in this Diocese. The Commission was instructed to report its recommendations to the Council for review and possible modification and subsequently, with the Council, to present the approved recommendations for consideration by the Eighty-First Annual Convention.

The Commission is comprised of both clergy and laity, both men and women, representing all schools of thought within the Church and all counties within Diocesan boundaries. Persons were appointed who have special knowledge of particular areas or of the general Diocesan situation.

Upon formation, the Commission was divided into seven committees, six having responsibility for investigations in particular counties and one being responsible for special projects. The county committees represent Bergen, Essex, Hudson, Morris, and Passaic Counties, and the combined Sussex-Warren area.

The Special Projects Committee was further divided into sub-committees, which were augmented by persons having special knowledge of the particular projects under consideration.

A list of Commission membership is given at the end of this report.

II

Scope of the Commission's Work

The scope of the Commission's work was tremendous. Overhanging the task, and underscoring the urgency of the study, is the imposing fact of the prodigious population growth in Northern New Jersey in recent years, plus still greater expected growth.

The Commission had to consider that Northern New Jersey and nearby areas are being honeycombed with new parkways, throughways, and other highways, to meet the pressure of expanding cities. It is imperative to obtain land now where it is virtually certain the Church will need to build later. The land may not be available if we delay much longer.

Industrial expansion in areas having easy access to these roads is inevitably drawing more people and opening new employment opportunities in every county of the Diocese. As areas closer to the core cities are becoming more urban, the periphery of suburban residential communities is being pushed farther into one-time rural regions, increasing the strain on existing church facilities and demanding new facilities where none exist.

In some places the solution must be in terms of establishing new missions; in others, where congregations already are established, it must be made in terms of new, enlarged, or rehabilitated plants, including churches, parish houses, and clergy dwellings. Established congregations for whom aid from the Diocesan campaign should be considered include both those with mission status (usually, churches receiving Diocesan assistance) as well as smaller self-supporting parishes which need help to capitalize on existing opportunities.

The Commission also had to consider the great demands and opportunities for wider service by Diocesan-affiliated institutions whose usefulness has been severely limited because funds are lacking. The Church cannot, in good conscience or good policy, watch these institutions go begging.

Other projects, urgently required for the growth and well-being of our Diocese and people as an integrated, unified organ of the Body of Christ, also came under consideration.

III

The Commission's Report

The report of the Commission on Strategy and Policy resulted from many hours of on-the-ground assessment, telephone calls, and meetings. Chairmen and members of the various committees consulted with clergy, vestries, boards, public officials, businessmen, and other qualified persons for information and counsel.

Detailed questionnaires were filled in for most parishes, missions, and unserved areas where major needs were reported. These questionnaires showed vital facts and statistics on church membership, facilities, finances, and potentialities, as well as recommendations for meeting present and future needs. (It should be noted that investigation is continuing on additional areas and places where needs have been reported. Still other reports are expected to come to the Commission's attention—and are, in fact, invited.)

Each county committee reported its special projects to the Special Projects Committee, whose sub-committees carried out separate investigations, visiting the institutions involved, consulting administrators, architects, and other experts, and making recommendations to the parent committee.

A full meeting of the Commission was held on March 12, 1955, at which the committee reports were reviewed and amended, and decisions were made for recommendations to be reported to the Diocesan Council. The Council in turn received and approved these recommendations at a meeting on March 30, and the Commission was retained to continue its study. These recommendations are embodied in the resolutions to be found in the conclusion of this report.

Participation of competent laymen in almost all phases of the Commission's survey and deliberations brought experience of much value to the ultimate decisions and final report.

The Commission received, and is extremely grateful for, the assistance of numerous community planning boards and private companies, especially the Regional Plan Association, Inc., the New Jersey Bell Telephone Company, and the Public Service Electric & Gas Company. Their willing cooperation made possible the compilation of reliable population figures and determination of trends.

Examples of the growing population trends in counties within the Diocese are given in the following table from figures of the Regional Plan Association, a private foundation engaged in research and planning for the great region surrounding the Port of New York:

Forecast of the population trend in Sussex and Warren Counties was not included in the Regional Plan Association study. However, the U. S. Census of 1950 revealed a combined population for the two counties of 88,797. Figures for these counties, based on estimates from reliable sources, foresee 51,725 persons for Sussex County in 1975, and 70,875 for Warren—a total of 122,600. This indicates an increase of 33,803, or 38.06 percent, by 1975.

In addition to counties, the Commission on Strategy and Policy obtained information on smaller areas as well. Detailed figures for many local municipalities are available; for instance, one borough in Bergen County, whose population in 1940 was 3,690, is growing thus:

Year:	1940	1950	1955	1960
Population	3,690	6,270	16,000	25,000*

(*Estimate given by Borough Hall.)

Another local community, in Essex County, whose 1950 population was 9,900 and whose 1955 population is 16,500, will likely increase to 22,000 in 1960 and to 35,100 in 1975, according to planning board and utility company estimates.

Such figures, typical of many localities throughout the Diocese, reveal striking opportunities for the growth of our Church.

IV

Resume of Findings

By far, the greatest needs in our Diocese are for expansion in rapidly growing areas. The Commission found that these needs could be divided into several categories, as follows:

First, areas of great promise where not only do existing churches need to be greatly strengthened but also new missions established, to realize potential growth in regions of heavy population increase.

Second, areas where population growth, although not so overwhelming, nonetheless presents real and manifold opportunities for our churches to go forward, opportunities which in some cases may be even greater than those in the first grouping above.

Third, areas where strategy dictates the purchase of land for expected future missions, or where a forward looking policy calls for strengthening of work which may remain missionary for a long time. Such work merits the concern of a Church that must consider people's needs, rather than a dollar-for-dollar return on capital investment.

Fourth, areas where additional manpower is urgently needed in strategic locations, where progress of established churches is obstructed by heavy debt, or where needed rehabilitation of church facilities is holding them back.

Typical of the opportunities open to us in this Diocese are the following three examples:

One area of rich promise is served by a small frame building that is used for both worship and Church school. It seats less than 100 persons. Unless greater facilities are provided, the congregation instead of growing may become discouraged, and many Episcopalians moving into the area may drift away from our Church altogether.

In another area which comprises four contiguous boroughs, a church could be built that would serve the entire area. By actual survey, it is already known that 220 Episcopalian families live in the area. At present, we have a poorly located, tiny, frame church seating less than 100 persons, with virtually no Sunday school facilities. This four-borough area now has a population of 20,000 and is growing rapidly.

In another area where we have no church at all, the three clergymen whose parishes bound the area have recommended in the strongest terms that a new mission be established to serve well over 100 Episcopalian families known to live in this promising area.

These are typical of the many opportunities that the Commission has uncovered. While the work is still not complete, if sufficient funds were available, the Diocese could profitably purchase six plots of land, rehabilitate four church plants, and build sixteen churches, twelve parish houses, and six clergy dwellings. While the Commission and the Diocesan Council would not recommend the construction of luxury buildings, they are at one in insisting that what is ultimately built be both substantial and attractive.

The Commission and the Diocesan Council feel that the amount of \$880,000 would provide sufficiently for the most pressing of the needs outlined; therefore it is recommended that this amount be included as the major portion of the Diocesan campaign.

In answer to the question that invariably arises in the minds of people when a goal is set—namely, whether the total asked is padded so that the work can be accomplished even if the goal is not reached—the Commission and the Diocesan Council cannot say too emphatically that, in the case of the foregoing amount for Diocesan missionary advance, our needs considerably exceed the recommended figure. The Commission and the Council are convinced, however, that the recommended goal, if achieved, will permit creation of a sizable Revolving Fund from which loans can be made, and, as they are repaid, these dollars can be used many times over. Together with mortgages on some of the buildings erected, these funds will, over a period of years, take care of the bulk of present needs and others that will arise.

In addition to Diocesan missionary needs, there are those that come in the category of "Special Projects." Of the many worthwhile projects suggested, the Commission and the Diocesan Council believe that three should be favorably considered: (1) increasing the facilities at the House of the Holy Comforter, the Diocesan home for the aged in West Orange; (2) making at least a start toward the building or acquisition of a Diocesan Conference and Retreat Center; (3) assisting Christ Hospital in Jersey City, the only Episcopal hospital in the Diocese, to rehabilitate its X-ray rooms and to make possible the purchase of new, modern equipment.

The Commission, with the Diocesan Council, recommends that the sum of \$170,000 be included in the campaign for these projects.

Also to be included are the expenses of conducting a large-scale campaign such as the Diocesan Convention has directed. The Commission unanimously agreed that the most efficient and successful method of attaining our goal would be through an organization with broad fund-raising experience. The Diocesan Council has therefore engaged the services of

Ward, Dreshman & Reinhardt, a firm with reputation, integrity, and proven ability in the field of fund raising. Mr. Edward R. Pike, who has been assigned by that concern to direct our campaign, subject to the Convention's approval of the resolutions below, has directed successful campaigns in the dioceses of California and Los Angeles and is now managing a campaign in the Diocese of Western New York. It is estimated that the cost of these professional services (\$27,000), together with other campaign expenses, will amount to \$50,000. This figure is approximately $4\frac{1}{2}$ percent of the total amount now proposed for the Diocesan campaign and is consistent with, if not lower than, costs of similar campaigns.

The Commission, with the Diocesan Council, has included \$50,000 for this purpose in the campaign.

V

The Diocesan Campaign Proposal

A summary of the amounts recommended by the Commission and the Council for inclusion in the Diocesan campaign would therefore be as follows:

Missionary Advance Program	\$ 880,000
Special Projects	170,000
Campaign Expense	50,000
Total	<u>\$1,100,000</u>

It may be of interest to note that the Diocese of Los Angeles, only slightly larger than ours in communicant strength, recently raised over \$1,400,000 in its campaign, and that the Diocese of Western New York, less than half our size, has set a goal of \$985,000 in its current appeal. It should appear that the proposed goal of \$1,100,000 is reasonable for the Diocese of Newark.

This represents perhaps the greatest opportunity our Diocese has ever had to advance the cause of Christ within its boundaries. The Diocesan Council and the Commission on Strategy and Policy believe that it is entirely possible to bring this campaign to a successful conclusion, provided that the entire Diocese—Bishops, clergy, laity, parishes, and missions—will pray, and plan, and act together.

VI

Recommendations to the Eighty-First Annual Convention

The members of the Eighty-First Annual Diocesan Convention do not need to be reminded that it is the Convention, not the Diocesan Council or the Commission on Strategy and Policy, that must take final

action and set the ultimate goal of this campaign. The Diocesan Council and the Commission join in the hope that this entire matter will be thoroughly studied in advance and discussed on the Convention floor, for we confidently believe that at the conclusion of such consideration the Holy Spirit will make known to us what is the Lord's will for us to do in this Diocese.

In this joint report, we recommend that the following resolutions be adopted:

RESOLUTIONS

1. *Be it RESOLVED*, That this Eighty-First Annual Convention direct that the Diocese undertake a diocesan-wide capital needs appeal with a goal of \$1,100,000.

2. *Be it RESOLVED*, That the campaign for this Diocesan Advance Fund be set for a period of approximately four months, between Feb. 1, 1956, and June 1, 1956.

3. *Be it RESOLVED*, That the Bishop, with the advice of the Diocesan Council, enlist such committees and determine such procedures as are necessary for the vigorous conduct of this campaign and for administering the proceeds.

4. *Be it RESOLVED*, That a Special Convention of the Diocese be held on Tuesday, April 10, 1956, for the purpose of considering and implementing the plan for the Diocesan campaign.

Mr Russell announced dinner arrangements for this evening, and also the photograph to be taken of the Clergy of the Diocese for Stowe's Directory. Recess was taken until 1:45 o'clock.

The Convention reassembled at 1:55 o'clock, with the Bishop in the Chair.

The Very Reverend John B. Coburn, Dean of the Cathedral presented his annual report:

REPORT OF THE DEAN

Bishop Washburn, Bishop Stark, members of the convention:

The report of the Dean of Trinity Cathedral to the Diocesan Convention can properly be either statistical or interpretive. Inasmuch as most of the questions asked of the Dean by members of the Church in the Diocese throughout the year have to do with the purpose of the Cathedral and the nature of its work, this report will be primarily interpretive. References will be made to events of the past year to illustrate the areas of its distinctive work, but the only vital statistic will be presented at the conclusion of the report.

This Cathedral, by action of the Diocese of Newark, is "established to the glory of God and for the good of men. It is the Diocesan Church . . . belonging to the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese, and for their use. The Cathedral is the official seat and the spiritual home of the Bishop, and the center of Diocesan work and worship." (*Constitution*)

Its first responsibility, therefore, is to the Diocese as a whole. In the discharge of this responsibility this report would list of first importance the work of the Cathedral in its intercessory prayer for the Bishops, Clergy, Parishes, Missions, institutions and people of the Diocese. Week by week, through a regular cycle of prayer, the concerns and the life of the Diocese are lifted to the heavenly throne from whence comes all divine strength to sustain us as a Diocesan family in the Church of Christ.

Intimately related to this is the series of Diocesan services which take place in this Cathedral throughout the year. One need only mention such services as the Celebration of the Holy Communion this morning, the Annual United Thank Offering Presentation Service, as well as services for the Girl's Friendly Society, the Church Schools, the Young People's Fellowships, and the Youth Consultation Service, among others, to serve as a reminder that the Cathedral is used regularly as a center of Diocesan worship. This daily offering of prayer and worship I would count as the primary contribution made by the Cathedral to the Diocese as a whole.

In addition to the worship, some of the Diocesan work is centered at the Cathedral. At this time mention will be made only of the work of the City Mission Society and Chaplaincy Service, which is administered by the Dean and Cathedral Chapter, under the supervision of the Bishop. You may recall from the report made last year that we were then in process of redirecting the Chaplaincy Service of the City Mission Society so that it would no longer be used exclusively in two or three institutions in Essex County, but would be made available throughout the Diocese so that the Church might more effectively express her concern for men or women and children institutionalized. With the advent of the Reverend Benedict H. Hanson on October 1, 1954, this program has now been initiated. Although it is still too early to draw any significant conclusions, it can be said that the first steps taken by him to relate the Churches of the Diocese to the institutions in the Diocese, and initially in particular the hospitals, have been warmly welcomed by the clergy, lay people and hospital administrators. This is a long term project;

and it will be two or three years, in all probability, before the organizational structure will be completed, but already the presence of the Reverend Mr. Hanson has made itself felt in moving this work ahead.

In accordance with the proposal approved by the Cathedral Chapter in January 1954, Mr. Hanson has since been elected by the Chapter a Canon of the Cathedral, with special responsibility for the work of the City Mission Society throughout the Diocese. Many of you already know of his availability to speak about this work to Parish groups. I commend him, and this important work, to you, as I thank him for the splendid work he has begun in a most difficult and important field.

At the same time, the work of the Reverend Chaplain John Green continues to expand and deepen at Overbrook Hospital, the Essex County mental hospital. Many of you were able to witness yourselves the effective program he carries on by your presence at the very successful first annual Overbrook Conference for work with the emotionally unstable, held in April of this year. We are all increasingly grateful for the unique ministry Chaplain Green carries on in this highly specialized area.

The Cathedral has also this year been partially instrumental in bringing to the Diocese an extension of the healing ministry of the Church. The Reverend Alfred Price, Rector of St. Stephen's Church, Philadelphia, conducted a Mission in the Cathedral in October. This was preceded by an evening with clergy particularly interested in the healing ministry; and, he also conducted services at St. Luke's, Montclair and the Church of the Redeemer in Morristown.

Finally, mention should be made that there is, under Cathedral auspices, an informal monthly gathering of clergy who are especially interested in the ministry of personal counseling.

Although this report is properly concerned primarily with the activities of the Cathedral, as they affect the Diocese, it would not be complete without reference, in passing, to two other areas. Obviously, as a part of the City of Newark, it has a responsibility to the community at large. Through its services and personnel it attempts to make as significant a contribution to the welfare of the community as possible. This is done through its regular noonday services held four days a week and its special community Lenten services, which continue much as they have in recent years, except now the services on Ash Wednesday and the days following are conducted by the Bishop Coadjutor, all the Holy Week services by the Bishop, and the Good Friday service by the Dean. The clergy also serve the community by membership on official Boards of the city, particularly in the fields of social work and youth activities.

The last area that should be mentioned in this report is that which actually occupies most of the time and energy of the Dean and of his assistant—providing the leadership for the life of the congregation of Trinity Cathedral. Within the Cathedral itself there is a congregation of faithful men and women, descendants in spirit of those who formed Trinity Church in 1746, enabling her to take her position as the mother church of the Diocese. This congregation is faced, in a changing downtown situation, with many of the problems and opportunities that are familiar to many of you in your own Parishes and Missions. Our task is the same: to help the members of this congregation come increasingly to know themselves as members one of another and of the Body of Christ, through their meeting one another and through their acts of sacramental worship. There has been growth in our life together in this Christian community—not spectacular, but consistent

and steady, and we believe, by God's grace, healthy. This growth has been made possible, in very large part, by the loyalty, devotion, hard work, and prayers of my friend and colleague, the Reverend Richard C. Williams.

It has been a privilege to serve with him under the Bishop, whose gentle admonitions and Godly counsel have never failed to forward the spirit of Christ in our congregational family life, as members of the congregation of Trinity Cathedral, as in the life of the Diocese as a whole.

In conclusion, may I make mention of the vital statistic referred to at the beginning of this report. It is a statistic of some historical significance. For the first time in 100 years, a clergy family, resident in the Rectory or Deanery of Trinity Cathedral, has produced an offspring. New life has stirred within these historic walls, and we all in this Cathedral family look to a future which is brighter with hope.

The Second Annual Address of the Bishop Coadjutor, the Right Reverend Leland Stark, D.D., was now delivered.

ADDRESS OF THE RT. REV. LELAND STARK, D.D., BISHOP COADJUTOR,
AT THE CONVENTION OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK, MAY 10, 1955

To my brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

My entire address today will deal with but one subject. Not that there are not other things that could be said, but this one subject is so large that I shall concentrate upon it alone. It is the proposed capital needs appeal, which has been named the Diocesan Advance Fund. It is now on the calendar for discussion and debate, and will be the chief order of business this afternoon.

Let me hasten to say that it is not my intention to take advantage of this period when courtesy forbids interruption in order to give a brisk "sales talk" on behalf of this proposed campaign. To be sure, I propose to speak vigorously in its favor, for this is not only my own strong, personal conviction, but it is also that of our Bishop, the Diocesan Council, the members of the Commission on Strategy and Policy, and of the Department of Missions. For far from stifling discussion, I would hope that what I have to say will stimulate it and will prompt the asking of more questions rather than less. If there be those who disagree with what I shall present this afternoon, I urge such folk to voice their disagreements freely and vigorously, with the confidence that their dissenting viewpoints will receive respectful attention

and thoughtful consideration. Let us all proceed in the faith that after full and free discussion, the Holy Spirit will make clear what is the Lord's will for us to do in this Diocese, whether that will be for us to reject the campaign entirely, or modify it upwards or downwards, or accept it as proposed in the Joint Report of the Diocesan Council and the Commission on Strategy and Policy. It is, of course, within your province as the Diocesan Convention to decide upon one of these courses.

Let me now continue on the assumption that you have all read and studied this Joint Report. In a word, it proposes that this Diocese undertake a campaign in the first half of 1956 for a sum of \$1,100,000. This amount would be raised by the taking of pledges which would be payable over the course of three years. Eighty per cent of this sum would be used to extend the work of many of the churches of the Diocese and to begin some new work; the other twenty per cent would be expended on various projects that are described in this Joint Report.

Surely we shall all be agreed at the outset that if we do decide it is the Lord's will that we undertake this great campaign for diocesan advance, this is indeed a most propitious time for it. Our country is in the midst of a period of amazing economic prosperity, in which our region of the state is fully sharing. As the current issue of *Time* magazine (May 9, 1955, p. 22) puts it:

Last week the U. S. economy was producing more goods and services than man has ever enjoyed anywhere. When the business and governmental statisticians finished their computations on the first quarter of 1955, they came to an almost unanimous conclusion: this will probably be the best year, economically, in U. S. history. Factories are nearing a record level of production, workers are taking home more wages than ever, many corporations are making more profits than ever . . . At the base of the prosperity (is) the greatest personal income of all time.

Since there is every reason to believe that this favorable economic situation will prevail in 1956 and beyond, if there is to be a diocesan appeal we have at least picked a good time for it.

But should there be one? Your Diocesan Council, the Commission on Strategy and Policy, the Department of Missions, which has been frequently consulted, and your bishops are among those who give a resounding "yes" to that question, and it falls my lot now to relate to you some of the supporting reasons.

I

In the first place, it will help our Church do its job better.

Surely as I stand before this particular group, I do not need to persuade you that the Episcopal Church has a real mission in this area; in the redemptive task which the Lord has laid upon His Church, our particular portion of Christ's Holy Catholic Church has a significant role to play, and if we did not already believe this, we would not be here today. Surely we are agreed also that if this be true, then by the grace of God we are to do not the least with which we can get by but our utmost in His service, not our minimum but our maximum in His service, *and I submit to you that the successful raising of this Diocesan Advance Fund will help our Church to do its job better.*

Here I would have you think of this diocesan appeal in terms of people and their needs and how we might meet those needs. Do not, I beg of you,

think of this merely in terms of brick-and-mortar, lumber-and-nails. To be sure, the Diocesan Advance Fund will help to build many a church and vicarage and parish house, but these are not ends in themselves. For these are the means by which spiritual needs of men and women and boys and girls whom we must reach with our maximum efforts can be better met.

For instance, as I speak, I am envisaging a new church in a certain place in our Diocese. The present structure, a tiny obsolescent frame building, will not hold a sixth of the baptized membership of the congregation, nor can all the members of the Sunday School even squeeze into it. Someday there must be a new church there, but not because a new church would somehow gratify some element of pride in ourselves but because it is needed if we are not only to minister adequately to the people whom we already claim as our own but also if we are to reach out in evangelizing zeal for the many others who are outside the borders of any Church.

Or I see in my mind's eye another place, where the need of educational facilities is so great that even if you were to disperse the boys and girls of the Church School to every nook and cranny of the building, upstairs and down, including the furnace room, you could not "shoe-horn" them all in. Here the need for educational facilities is so great that a large part of the Sunday School cannot even meet on church premises. It would be no mere brick-and-mortar, lumber-and-nails project to help build adequate facilities in this place, for the proper care and spiritual nurture of our children, which is certainly fundamental to the task the Lord has given us to do, simply cannot be done without better facilities, but the emphasis is on the needs of the children, not on the need of another building.

But if I say to you in positive vein that the successful raising of this Diocesan Advance Fund will enable our Church to do its job better, I cannot help saying also, in negative vein, that I am frankly fearful of the kind of job our Church will be doing in the present and future if we do not undertake something like this now. For unpleasant as it is and damaging to our pride as it may be, we need to face a stern and unbudging fact, namely, that at the end of 1954 the communicant strength of our Diocese is at the same level that the communicant strength of this Diocese was in 1934 although in this twenty years the general population of our diocesan area has grown by over 20%!

To be sure, part of the explanation lies in the fact that in this period population changes unfavorable to our Church have taken place in Hudson County so that the numerical communicant strength declined by 4800 persons, and that loss had to be made up elsewhere even for us to hold the line. (Parenthetically, I must hasten to say that the whole grave problem caused by these unfavorable population changes in Hudson County and in some parts of Essex County is to be the subject of a special study to begin in a matter of weeks.) But however we explain it, we need to face frankly the stern fact that our Diocese has not even kept pace with the normal growth of population.

Now there is no point in parcelling out blame for this condition. No doubt all of us must share responsibility for it, for wherever we point the finger, we cannot dodge the simple fact that not only has no special campaign to strengthen our missions been undertaken in this period but also no single Convention budget ever been fully subscribed by our parishes and missions. The inevitable result has been that only the barest minimum of a missionary program could be undertaken in this Diocese. Indeed, I can say, as one who has only recently come among you, that I am amazed that your bishops and diocesan officials were able to accomplish what has been accomplished on the meagre funds that have been available.

So I say again: I am frankly fearful of what kind of job in the present and future our Church is going to do if some daring and courageous effort is not made now, at the most propitious time economically in our history, to capitalize on the opportunities for the growth of our beloved Church that are everywhere around us.

For remember that the population of the area our Diocese covers is now growing faster than ever. Experts estimate that the population of the seven northern counties plus Summit in Union County, which make up the area of our Diocese, is now about 2,900,000. By 1960 they estimate it will be up to 3,200,000, and by 1975, they tell us, it will probably be over 3,800,000. This will mean a gain of 31% in population in the next twenty years so that if our Church merely keeps pace with the growth of population, we ought to have over 72,000 communicants as over against the some 55,500 we have now.

But that should be the very least; that would only be keeping pace. But we won't even do that unless we really venture out with boldness and daring for Christ and His Church. Let us be through once and for all with contentment with minimums—the task Our Lord lays upon us calls not for our least but for our utmost!

II

In the second place, I submit to you that we need to think in large terms for Jesus Christ and His Church, and this proposed Diocesan Advance Fund does think in those large terms.

For when we think of who Jesus Christ is and what His Church is, how can we but think of Him and His Church except in large and daring and imaginative terms when we come together to take counsel for the welfare and growth of His Church?

Believe me, businessmen think in large terms when they see opportunities for profitable business enterprises. Often on my way from my home in Montclair to visit some of our churches in eastern Bergen County, I drive along Route 4, where new businesses are burgeoning. Those people are thinking in large terms of hundreds of thousands, of millions, of tens of millions of dollars. Less than a mile away from what will be one of the largest shopping centers in the country is a mission of ours, a barn that has been made over into a church. Mind you, I do not say that critically, for had I been on the scene and been compelled to act in light of the circumstances that then prevailed, I too would have gone along. But I say this to you now: the time has come for us to lift our sights, to enlarge our horizons, to think and to plan for the Church of Jesus Christ in the large terms which He and His burgeoning enterprise deserve.

If we do, we shall not of course be the first Christian Church to do it! Drive around someday almost anywhere in this Diocese, and look at the names on the new churches, and you will see that there are some that have been thinking in large terms before we have come to it. Indeed, again on this same journey I spoke of a minute ago, I either pass or go within a few blocks of no less than six parishes of one particular Christian communion, the buildings of every parish of which cost considerably in excess of the entire proposed goal of our appeal.

I hasten to say that I honor these Christians of other names for what they have done, and I commend them for their vision and enterprise. Nor do I report these things in any attempt to shame us into following their lead nor in any spirit of keeping up with the ecclesiastical Joneses. Rather I report these things to encourage ourselves, for the fact that they have done

these things is sure evidence that we can too. The means of their people are no more than ours, and certainly their love for their Church is no greater than our love for our Church; therefore their success is prophetic of ours, and what they have done, we can do too.

Indeed, if further evidence were needed as to whether we can succeed in a campaign of the size proposed, we need only look to certain other dioceses of the Episcopal Church where thinking in large terms for Christ and His Church has prevailed. The Dioceses of Central New York and of California, both of them considerably smaller than our own, have recently completed similar campaigns proportionately as large as or somewhat larger than our own. The Diocese of Western New York, less than half our size, is currently engaged in one whose goal is almost as large as ours. A matter of two years ago the Diocese of Los Angeles, with virtually the same communicant strength as our diocese, sought a goal of \$1,100,000, the same as our proposed goal, and when at length it was completed, no less than \$1,430,000 was pledged! Incidentally, in passing I might note that the Dioceses of Los Angeles, California, and Western New York engaged the same fund-raising counsel as we have, namely, Ward, Dreshman, and Reinhardt, with Mr. Edward R. Pike as director, and he will be our director if this Convention approves the general plan.

The point I make, of course, is this: when Christians really think in large terms about Christ and the advancement of His Church and then confidently go ahead with the conviction that the Lord will bless their efforts, He has indeed done so, and their efforts have been crowned with success. What they have done, by the grace of God we can too!

III

In the third place, those of us who have been engaged in the preliminary work of study and analysis have come to see this proposed Diocesan Advance Fund campaign as the greatest diocesan opportunity of our lifetime.

The greatest diocesan opportunity of our lifetime! I do not need to go into detail on what the Diocesan Advance Fund will actually accomplish in terms of new work, expanded work, new churches, new vicarages, and new parish houses, for these are outlined in the Joint Report, which I trust by now you have all read and studied.

But while the new, expanded, aggressive forward movement of many of the churches of our Diocese will be the chief benefaction of the Diocesan Advance Fund, not to be overlooked are certain highly important by-products that we might well anticipate.

One of these by-products, if we may judge by the experience of other dioceses, will be an increasing sense of diocesan unity.

A year or so ago I was talking to a leading clergyman in a diocese where they have recently successfully completed a diocesan campaign similar to the one proposed here. "We might as well have been Congregationalists, we were so completely lacking in diocesan consciousness," he told me. "The churches of our Diocese were hardly aware of each other's existence. But then came the campaign, and we worked together on it. Since then things have been wonderfully different! We're really a Diocese now!"

Bishops whose dioceses have been involved in campaigns have written me in similar fashion. As Bishop Campbell, Suffragan of Los Angeles, put it: "We all feel that the campaign did much to unify the entire Diocese and create a new enthusiasm for what can be done when we all work together . . . I think the success of the campaign created a new spirit of confidence

among the clergy and the people of the Diocese—a feeling that things can be done if we really work at them. The chronic pessimists have been effectively silenced." Bishop Higley, Suffragan of Central New York, put it like this: "There has been an entirely new outlook in the Diocese. Our people have become far more diocesan minded." Bishop Shires, Suffragan of California, said virtually the same thing: "It . . . stimulated diocesan loyalty and increased interest in the Diocese and its projects."

Now one of the great things about being an Episcopal Church is that individual congregations do not stand alone but are joined together with each other in a diocesan family, and one of the valuable by-products which could come out of a Diocesan Advance Fund would be an even greater bond of diocesan unity than we now possess.

Another by-product would be, I would dare to hope, that your bishops could spend more of their time doing the work that bishops are primarily consecrated to do. Both Bishop Washburn and I feel too much preoccupied with matters connected with raising funds to carry on the not inconsiderable program of the Diocese. Because of the nature of my jurisdiction, this hits me with particular force, and while I make no complaint since a true sense of stewardship is an integral part of Christian discipleship, I cannot but wish sometimes that that were not so much a part of my ministry. With the adequate provision for our diocesan needs that the Diocesan Advance Fund would provide, your bishops would be freed from this sometimes overwhelming preoccupation with finances, and we would have more opportunity to exercise the kind of ministry bishops are consecrated to do.

Still another by-product, if the experience of other dioceses would hold true in our own, would not seem possible at first thought. A year ago last November when Bishop Washburn and I were in Williamsburg for the meeting of the House of Bishops, I spoke at length to Bishop Bloy of Los Angeles. His diocese had recently completed its campaign by oversubscribing its \$1,100,000 goal, and I queried him rather anxiously, "But what has happened to your regular Every Member Canvass? Has it suffered much?"

"That's a curious thing," he replied. "In every single church it is better than ever! Far from hurting the Every Member Canvass, the Diocesan campaign has actually helped the regular giving of our people."

Nor is this true just of Los Angeles—I have letters from bishops of other dioceses that say the same thing.

Well, this is not so curious when one stops to think about it. The very essence of the Christian religion is giving. "God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son to the end that all that believe in Him should not perish but have everlasting life." Our Lord gave Himself on the Cross for our redemption, and He continually gives us of His love and grace to make us adequate for the many exigencies of life. So too, our response is to be the process of self-giving on our part, of time and talent and substance, to the things for which Christ stands. When specifically this self-giving involves the giving of our means, we give not only because a great cause has need of our gifts, but even more we need to give for our own spiritual welfare, because we cannot live the life God purposes for us without giving generously within the framework of our means.

So it is not so curious that in every diocese where successful campaigns have been completed, the regular giving to the Church—locally and for diocese, nation, and world—has been helped rather than hurt because in the course of the diocesan campaign a great many people came to discover for

themselves the paradoxical joy of giving, and no one is going to give up something that is both fun and moral too!

More and more in this Diocese we are emphasizing giving to the work of the Lord and His Church in terms of a definite percentage or proportion of our incomes. In fact, this principle is now the official emphasis, so to speak, of our Department of Promotion, and I would look to the campaign for the Diocesan Advance Fund to speed us on to an increasing sense of stewardship in this Diocese. If that takes place, then the Diocesan Advance Fund campaign would mean not only an advance for the particular churches that would be helped by it in one way or another but would also mean a real advance for every other church in the Diocese too!

Think therefore of the Diocesan Advance Fund in terms of the greatest diocesan opportunity for advance and progress that is likely to present itself to us in our life time not only for its direct benefits but also for its many equally valuable by-products!

IV

It is clear, I think, from what I have said and how I have said it, that I myself have no little enthusiasm for the cause for which I speak.

I am aware, of course, that not everyone at this stage shares the enthusiasm of those of us who have been in on the preliminaries of study and analysis. Not a few of our churches have recently had or are having campaigns of their own for much-needed new facilities for worship or education. While the whole Diocese rejoices in these additions, we can also realistically understand that however convinced such folk may be of the need of a Diocesan campaign also, not all of them can hail with enthusiasm another one coming right on top of their own. As one person in such a situation has written me, "Will the flock bend or bust under this last straw?" and then goes on with sober humor to ask, "Will it be, 'God helps those who help themselves,' or 'God, help those who help themselves'?"

I confess I do not yet have the full answer to the question that is here raised. I cannot pretend that we have all answers to all questions at this stage. I would hope that others in the Diocese who are not similarly straitened might carry a little more of the responsibility in accordance with the New Testament injunction to bear one another's burdens. At the same time I am glad to report to you that at least six parishes now becoming involved in their own campaigns are either including advance estimates of their mathematical shares in the proposed Diocesan Advance Fund or else have given assurance to Bishop Washburn or to myself that they intend to carry their full share. Hence it is fair to say that they would not want us to postpone the Diocesan Advance Fund to make it easier for them.

Furthermore, even where special problems like these do not prevail, I suppose it must be said in all candor that no one ever really chumps at the bit to get at a fund-raising campaign. The prospect of another big job being dropped on clerical and lay shoulders already overburdened is not likely to be met with shouts of joy. "It isn't that I'm not all for it because I am," said one of our leading clergy to me recently, "but I can't help flinching at another job when I'm already so far behind in my own parish." We can all understand that sentiment. St. Paul admonishes us not to be weary in well doing, but none of us ought to pretend that is an easy admonition to follow.

I have purposely waited till toward the end of my address to bring in these somewhat negative considerations because I believe we must have

them realistically before us as we vote. I would not want my own enthusiasm to seem to minimize them or brush them aside, for I must stress with all the earnestness at my command that an affirmative vote of this Convention commits us individually and corporately to see it through successfully to the end. The vote that we shall presently take, after a full and free discussion that will go on as long as you wish it to continue, must be no mere formality. You must realize that for most of you if not all, clergy and laity alike, an affirmative vote is also a vote for some hard work. You must yourselves be convinced that this is the Lord's will for us in this Diocese before you vote for it, or you should vote against it. There must be no half-heartedness or indecision about this, for this matter has about it the uncompromising quality of the 'either-or'—either we go into this with a whole heart convinced that this is of the Lord's leading, or we dare not go into it at all.

Yet I am constrained to say this too: if this is what the Lord wants us to do in this Diocese and we are given the courage to embark upon it, then it will not be all drudgery. On the contrary, we may then joyfully anticipate His blessing upon our efforts, and there will be the zest and the happy awareness that we are moving forward in the way He would have us go as He beckons us onward to our goal.

Indeed, when Bishop Campbell, Suffragan of Los Angeles, wrote me recently about their campaign, after he had enthusiastically outlined the many benefits that have accrued to the diocese, he went on to exclaim: "In addition to this, the actual fund raising program was a wonderful experience! The convocational gatherings were all happy affairs, full of enthusiasm and fellowship, and the special convention was a thrilling occasion . . ."

"A wonderful experience!" he says. And on second thought, why not? Here are a people of God, caught up in a great enterprise, working together as a diocesan family with an increasing sense of diocesan fellowship, convinced that they are doing the Lord's will, daring to do something big for Christ and His Church, discovering a new source of joy in real stewardship, rejoicing that their Church is really on the move, consciously aware of the Lord's guidance as they strive together to advance the cause of Christ and His Church.

How could it be other than "a wonderful experience," as the Bishop calls it? And if today we are convinced that this is the Lord's will for us as a Diocese and we have the courage to follow it, then it cannot but be "a wonderful experience" for us too, for this is the kind of godly enterprise that makes "hell's foundations quiver!"

Polls opened for third Ballot. The Reverend Welles R. Bliss withdrew his name for Deputy to General Convention.

The report of the Commission on Strategy and Policy was now the order of business.

The Rev. Mr. MacAdie moved the adoption of Resolution #1 of the report, namely that the goal be set at \$1,100,000., seconded.

The motion was then debated.

The Reverend John R. Edler together with Messrs. Coon, Groff, A. Judd, Throop and Weiler requested a vote by Orders on all matters pertaining to the Capital Needs Appeal.

The Reverend Mr. Edler stated that Trinity, Irvington, wishes to go on record as voting 'NO' to the Capital Needs Appeal. Not because we do not believe it is a worthwhile cause, but solely on the principle of moral responsibility.

Several clerical and lay deputies offered criticism and raised certain questions about methods and conduct etc. of the campaign. Mr. MacAdie and Bishop Stark endeavored to answer all questions raised.

Discussion was interrupted to hear the tellers report on the third ballot.

The Reverend Herbert S. Brown received 84 Clergy votes, and 61½ Lay votes, and was elected.

Polls were open and closed for the fourth ballot.

Vote on Resolution 1 of the report of the Commission on Strategy and Policy was

By consent the vote by Orders was withdrawn on other resolutions in the report.

Mr. Reinhardt of the firm of Ward, Dreshman and Reinhardt was welcomed to the Convention, and was asked to make an address to the Convention on behalf of the campaign.

The Tellers reported result of the fourth ballot.

The Reverend Charles R. Stires received 69 Clergy votes, and 62½ Lay votes, and was elected Deputy to General Convention.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the rules of elections be suspended, and that the four receiving the highest number of votes, not elected on the first ballot, be elected Alternate Deputies to the General Convention:

For the Year 1954

Eight meetings of the Standing Committee were held during 1954.

February 16, 1954

Diocese of Newark

Report for 1954 - 1955

TRAINING PROGRAM

Training for the NEW CURRICULUM has been the watchword for activities since our report of May a year ago. The Rev. Grant Morrill and Mrs. Eliwood Haines came as a team from the National Department of Christian Education and put on seven demonstrations in all. The first of their efforts was a Mobile Team demonstration three nights running at both St. Paul's Church, Englewood and Cathedral House, Newark. Some 56 parishes turned out 300 people to hear their interpretation of the Christian life that is deemed necessary to undergird the new outlook.

Then in December, they came to us for three full days to orient the clergy of the Diocese at four centers—Englewood, Paterson, Dover and Newark. They also gave us an additional day to drill the whole Department of Christian Education with respect to preparing the 1st-4th-7th Grade Teachers in their initial approach to the new teachers' manuals and introducing THE CHURCH SCHOOL TEACHERS WORKSHOP for

parish use. Teams were then formed from the Department membership to service 12 Area meetings for teachers. Some 90 parishes responded by sending some 425 teachers to the five hour demonstrations put on by the teams on the Sunday afternoons in January, February, March and April.

Utilizing the five people trained by the National Department's Laboratory we continued the Parish Life Conferences. There have been 13 such week-ends held in all that have reached 219 persons in some 34 different parishes. Two more are being projected; one for Clergy in May and another for lay people in June.

YOUTH

A thorough re-thinking of the purpose of the Young People's Fellowship as an organization is culminating in a new Constitution for that organization to be presented for discussion, and possible adoption at their annual May meeting. Rallies and other youth occasions have been better planned and obtained a much better response through the indefatigable efforts of the Youth Committee.

The conference for high school people will include an extra one for seniors and a new enterprise for the junior high school age, making three in all for the summer of 1955.

It is expected that two high school seniors, two young adults, and two Canterbury Club (college students) members with their advisers will represent the Diocese of Newark at the Youth National Convention at Northfield, Minnesota in August, 1955. Special gifts from the Woman's Auxiliary and a Department member will augment the subsidy of the budget to defray the cost of the delegates. We are grateful for these generous additions.

STEWARDSHIP IN MISSIONARY GIVING

The whole matter of training children in missionary giving is under advisement. Three changes have already been made in the policy of the National Department in this matter. The Lenten material is written from the point of view of depicting Christian experience in children's lives wherever they may be rather than in concentrating on the study of one geographical missionary area. Secondly, the Christmas Box work will be discontinued after this year (1955). Thirdly, the Birthday Thank Offering for three years 1955-57 is being centered on one project—"THE CITY"—rather than having individual objectives yearly.

Lively controversy is still going on with respect to the advisability of having the Lenten Offering taken off the quota of parish, mission, and diocese, and having the Diocese accept for children some missionary project other than those listed toward the General Program of the Church. It is thought that this will make the whole presentation to children of missionary giving more concrete, and that they will become more responsive in understanding sacrificial giving.

COLLEGE WORK

Though there are mostly 'off-campus' colleges and, at that, many junior colleges in our area, attention is being given to servicing the Canterbury Clubs that can be formed by the College Work Committee of your department. It is with regret that we note the retirement of Miss Katharine Duffield, College Worker for the Second Province. She has done a great deal over a number of years to give direction to a good strategy in this important missionary frontier. We trust that they will find quickly an able successor to her.

ADULTS

Beside the conference at Drew—The Episcopal Church Conference of New Jersey—which we jointly carry on (June 19-21) for the fourth time this year with the Diocese of New Jersey, there have been various experiments with dialogue sermons, roll play, and lay discussion groups in parishes, and groups of parishes coming together, to make adults alert to their responsibilities of continuing to grow spiritually.

With the whole parish underlined as one important 'resource' with respect to the education of children, this aspect must continue to expand. A "Parent's Manual" will be a part of sale-servicing of the new children's text. This should both stimulate and channel our adult efforts this coming year.

Your Department has been as possible to forward the first official curriculum that the Episcopal Church has ever had. It knows that there is much more to do before the four conditions favorable to good education in the Christian life exist in our churches. They are (1) A Family Worship Service (2) A Parents' Class (3) Training of Teachers and (4) A concerned group with deeper insight into Christian faith in every parish.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN

TO THE CONVENTION OF THE DIOCESE ON MAY 10, 1955

Continuing efforts have been made by this Department during the year toward implementing the Refugees Resettlement Program within the Diocese. A 16mm sound movie "The Signature" was purchased with funds from the Department's budget for promotion of this cause. Within the year thirty-seven assurances have been signed by individuals and parishes. An additional assurance was signed by the Department itself.

The Department urged support by the parishes of the "Share Our Surplus" program sponsored by the National Council of the Churches of Christ.

A resolution was sent on behalf of the Diocese to the Newark Municipal Council at its meeting on January 20, 1955, protesting any alteration of the "Sunday Closing Ordinance" which would permit business organizations further to encroach upon the Sabbath.

Members of the Department represented the Diocese of Newark at a Church Conference on Juveniles and Young People in Poughkeepsie, N. Y., during November; at the New Jersey Welfare Conference in Ashbury Park during December; and at the Conference on Troubled Children sponsored by the Dioceses of New York and Long Island during March.

At the time of this report an investigation of interest rates being charged by small loan firms (allegedly up to 30% per annum) is being conducted by a committee of the Department to determine whether action in protest against usury shall be taken on behalf of the Diocese.

To the 1955 Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

Your Diocesan Church Pension Fund Committee submits the following report for the calendar year 1954 and the first part of 1955.

As of April 1, 1955, the total number of pensions in force throughout the Church and the amounts were as follows:

The figures above show that the average age allowance in the past year has increased by \$34 and the orphans' allowance by \$2, while disability allowances have decreased by \$66 and the widows' allowance by \$2.

It is expected that the pension disbursements by the Fund will increase steadily year by year for a long time. As far as the Church as a whole is concerned, the total amount of pensions in force as of April 1st, in comparison with a year ago, has increased by over \$24,000.

The financial position of the Pension Fund continues sound. Its assets during the past year have increased about three million dollars to a total of about sixty million dollars with a satisfactory margin over its guarantees.

It is important that the pension assessments be paid promptly, thus avoiding interest charges and also the possibility that the Fund, because of its rules, cannot accept payment when the pension is called for. Generally speaking, assessments are paid promptly throughout the Church.

We give herewith a quotation from a letter from Mr. Robert Worthington, the Executive Vice-President, relative to Social Security.

"Clergy now can share in federal Social Security by paying tax on earnings beginning with 1953. The clergyman has a personal choice. He is treated as a self-employed person, his parish and the Church not being involved in any way. The pensions which the Church provides through the Fund and what the clergy provide through Social Security combined are broad and ample. Retired clergy with earnings from supply work may participate in Social Security."

With respect to the Diocese of Newark, your Committee would report that as of March 28, 1955, there were in force 25 age benefits totaling \$43,967.28 per year; 2 total and permanent disability allowances amounting to \$3,000 per year; payments to widows of clergymen, 32 in number, aggregating \$24,086.16 and payments to one orphan amounting to \$500.04. This adds up to a total of 60 beneficiaries, receiving on a yearly basis the sum total of \$71,553.48, or an increase over the amount reported to the 1954 Convention of approximately \$1,025.

Your Diocesan Committee would suggest wider use of the Fund's affiliated organizations, namely the Church Life Insurance Corporation, the Church Fire Insurance Corporation, and the Church Hymnal Corporation. We also wish to thank all the members of the Diocese who have cooperated in helping our Diocese to care in such a fine way for its share of the responsibility in the work of the Church Pension Fund.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EXAMINING CHAPLAINS

CALENDAR YEAR 1954

The Board of Examining Chaplains of the Diocese of Newark held examinations for Holy Orders three times during the year 1954, and held two business meetings.

On Wednesday, April 21, and Friday, April 23, 1954, Messrs. Donald W. Beers, Paul Deckenbach, Donald D. Gardner, Charles G. Newbery, and Lathrop P. Utley appeared before the Board and completed all examinations required by Canon 29 for Ordination, in the Cathedral House. Messrs. James L. Gill and Louis Hallgrin, Jr., appeared and successfully passed examinations in all subjects required by Canon 29. Mr. Donald C. McEwan passed examinations in all subjects for the perpetual Diaconate as required in Canon 29, Section 2 (a). And the Rev. William W. Keys II, a Baptist minister, was examined in some of the subjects required in Canon 32, Section 3 (a).

On June 7, 1954, four members of the Board met at the Cathedral House to examine the Rev. Marcello Alfarano, a priest of the Roman Catholic Church, in those subjects required by Canon 38, all of which Father Alfarano successfully passed.

Thirteen candidates appeared before the Board at the Cathedral House on Wednesday, December 29, and Friday, December 31, 1954, to be examined in some of the subjects required for Ordination by Canon 29. The candidates were Messrs. Frederic Augustus

Alling, Richard J. Bauer, Alan Paul Bell, Robert W. Castle, Jr., William Daniels Dwyer, Thomas Mallory Foster, David J. Greer, William Sheldon Griffith, James Elliott Lindeley, Robert Houston Maitland, Jr., Kenneth Howland Okkerse, David St. George, and Clifford S. Westhorp.

At the business meeting on April 23, 1954, the Secretary read correspondence announcing the withdrawal of Dr. Earl A. Aldrich as a candidate for the perpetual Diaconate, which necessitated the cancellation of his examinations scheduled for February 26, 1954.

On a motion by the Rev. Dr. Montgomery H. Throop, the Board voted that the standard preparation for the Perpetual Diaconate be a thorough knowledge of "The Church's Teaching Series," supplemented by a first-hand knowledge of the Holy Scriptures and a practical acquaintance with the Book of Common Prayer.

By a rising vote the Board thanked the Rev. John H. Rosebaugh for his years of service on the Board, anticipating his loss from the Examining Chaplains by reason of his retirement from the active Ministry later in the year. To fill the vacancy, Bishop Washburn appointed the Rev. George E. Rath, Rector of All Saints', Millington.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark.

The Department of Missions submits the following summary of its activities during the Calendar Year 1954. The Department held six regular and one Special meeting during the year with the Rt. Rev'd Benjamin M. Washburn D.D., Bishop, presiding at each. The meeting dates follow.

The minutes of each meeting present in detail the many problems that confronted the Department during the year and this report will only attempt to record the more important accomplishments.

Puerto Rican Population

This subject was continued from the previous year and the Committee appointed to study the matter reported on the steady growth of the Puerto Rican population and felt that intensive and immediate work should be undertaken among them. It was also recommended that the Department try to discover the right Spanish speaking Priest to help in this work. In this respect since the close of 1954 Father Marcel Alfaro has been admitted to the ministry of the Church and is now resident at Grace Church Van Vorst—Jersey City and is actively working among Puerto Ricans, who are responding to help and are the most active group in that Church.

Fort Lee—Good Shepherd Montvale—Saint Paul's

These missions are now fully incorporated Parishes and the Department has transferred all titles to property that it held for the benefit of the Church to them.

Budget for 1955

The Department had proposed to the Finance and Advisory Board a budget for 1954 of \$108,275. This amount the Finance and Advisory Board had found it necessary to reduce to \$83,000. Consequently the Department of Missions had to restrict certain plans. Chief of these was the limitation of a fund of \$25,000 for advance work to an amount of \$10,000. Also it was impossible to increase the motor allowances of missionaries and nothing could be set aside for the replacement of missionaries' cars.

Belvidere, St. Mary's

The parish hall and kitchen of this mission have been enlarged. To complete paying the cost of the materials as the men of the parish did the work, the Department of Missions lent them an additional \$1,600.

Dumont—St. Luke's

A vicarage on Knickerbocker Road has been purchased for the use of the Vicar of this Mission.

In the Dumont area the growth of population has been exceedingly large and a survey of this whole territory was made in April to secure the names of the Episcopal families who could be attached to the Mission if it were in a more favorable location. This survey indicated that there are 225 families. A plot of ground consisting of 5 acres is available in Haworth, adjacent to Dumont which is very suitable for church purposes. This property was sold to the Department by the Borough of Haworth but restraining orders has been served on the Township of Haworth and consequently title has not as yet been transferred to the Department.

Hackettstown, St. James'

A new heating system has been installed in this Mission at a cost of \$3,500 of which the Department assumed \$3,000.

Harrington Park, St. Andrew's

The Department has borrowed \$13,000 on mortgage to enable this Mission to build a parish house which was greatly needed.

Livingston, St. Peter's

This Mission has been growing very rapidly and was in great need for a building to house their church school. Such a building has been built at a cost of approximately \$71,000 of which approximately \$70,000 was furnished by the Department through a mortgage loan of \$45,000 from the Howard Savings Institution and a loan of \$25,000 on notes to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties.

New Milford Area

This area is also one of expanding population and a survey has been made to see if there are sufficient Episcopal families to support a new Church. The survey indicated that 108 Episcopal families were found but three Clergymen present at the Committee Meeting, when this was discussed (February 17, 1954) indicated that they have 55, 20 and 30 of these families on their present lists. The Department has a Committee which is studying the matter further.

Palisades Park, Redeemer

A loan of \$3,000 was granted this Church to repair its floor which was rotting away. The Department also favors the placing of this Mission with that of St. James', Ridgefield under a single Vicar. The Department also is acting to provide housing for this Vicar.

Teaneck, Epiphany

This Church has not been used for some time and several offers for it were made to the Department. The most advantageous of these was from the Modern Cabinet and Appliance Co. which was accepted and the property has been sold.

West Milford, Incarnation

This Mission has continued to advance and during 1954 plans were drawn up for the building of a Church. The cornerstone for this new Church was laid November 26, 1954 by Bishop Washburn and at this reporting the Church has been completed and is in use.

DEPARTMENT OF PROMOTION

Report to the Eighty-First Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark.

At the first meeting in the Fall of 1954, the members of the Department (many of whom had recently been appointed) discussed the principle of Christian Stewardship, and considered the experience of other dioceses. They then agreed to go along with the action of the Field Department and the Finance and Advisory Board in the previous year, and adopt the principle. Although Christian Stewardship is a conception of Christian giving with particular application to the Every Member Canvass, it is not just a new slogan invented for the purpose of raising more money. It is the principle that recognizes that All Things Really Do Come From God, and that God has first call on our time and our talents, as well as our money.

Emphasis in the canvass in 1954 was therefore put on Christian Stewardship. The National Council had also adopted this principle, and their material was of considerable help. Six regional meetings in the Diocese of Newark were held in October. At each meeting Bishop Stark talked on canvass methods, right and wrong; and showed where to put the right emphasis—that is, to ask each one to give what he thought it was right to return to God, after careful thought and prayer. To the meetings were invited the clergy, canvass chairmen and other interested lay people.

During the year further study was given to Christian Stewardship and ways and means for education in the diocese on the subject. It is hoped to have Bishop Stark's address of last Fall prepared in booklet form for general distribution this year. Six or more parishes in the diocese are adopting this principle in full in their canvasses this year and will not use any parish budget. These trials will serve as pilot studies for the diocese.

Extensive analysis has been made of the Newark Churchman, and a questionnaire was used to find out attitudes toward it—what was popular and what was not. Moreover, the publications of a number of other dioceses were studied in detail. All this was done with the hope of making some improvements in our magazine. It is definitely planned to go ahead in the near future with the preparation of a diocesan Bulletin or News-Letter. This would supplement the Newark Churchman, and would be available for general distribution at church services throughout the Diocese.

The most dramatic progress of the year has been in the field of radio and television. The following report on these activities has been prepared by Mr. John B. Rhodes of Christ Church, Short Hills, who is chairman of the Department's committee on Publicity, and who has been largely responsible for the progress made.

The common interest of the Diocese of Newark and the Diocese of New Jersey in the statewide character of radio and television finally has been recognized. The Bishops of these two Dioceses, with the help of their respective Departments of Promotion, have organized the Episcopal Radio and Television Council of New Jersey, and that group, in the face of all the handicaps of working on a budget of \$200.00 (\$100.00 from each Diocese) in an industry that thinks in millions, already has taken steps to make more effective use of these important mass media.

The Council is made up of two clergymen and two laymen and a laywoman from each Diocese, and meets monthly. Despite differences in churchmanship and in other areas, it has reached complete agreement on the vastly more important problems of our basic Episcopal approach via the air to millions of persons whose names are not now on any parish roster.

On the more practical side, the Council is collating and evaluating presently available program material; it is seeking to organize an advisory group of laymen and laywomen who are specialists in the field of radio and television and who will make available to our church their talents and their influence; it has affiliated with the Corresponding De-

partment of the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church, and a member of that organization has attended most of its meetings to the great advantage of both groups.

The Council has also found that in many cases its objectives can be attained more promptly and more effectively by an ecumenical approach, and it has, therefore, taken an active part in the formation of the Department of Radio and Television of the New Jersey Council of Churches.

In the months immediately ahead, the Council will conduct, in cooperation with the National Council of our church, a radio and television orientation conference (or workshop) for both clergymen and laypeople; it will sponsor on at least four of New Jersey's twenty radio stations the "Episcopal Hour" or some other thirteen-week program; and it will, by direct mail to the clergy and others, publicize our church's statewide and local work in all radio and television matters. Finally, it expects that for the current year it will be able to operate on its present budget or on such additional funds as it will acquire by its own efforts. When at some future time its worth has been firmly established in the minds of most of our New Jersey parishes, it will be time enough to seek their financial support.

Washington's Birthday Corporate Communion Services

Five services were held at focal points in the Diocese, each being followed by a breakfast with a speaker.

The combined attendance was 876 an increase of 28% over the 1954 gatherings and almost 70% over the 1953 meetings, the first year these services were sponsored by this committee.

In 1956 we plan to extend the number of Washington's Birthday gatherings to seven or eight as two of our present groupings have reached the capacity of our larger parish houses.

Lay Readers' Training Course

The first sessions of the four classes of the Lay Readers' Training Course sponsored by this committee were held the first week in May and will continue through the first

week of June. Classes are being held at the following churches and are instructed by the rector of each parish:

This year's conference offers an exceptional opportunity for inspiration and training to the Parish Keymen. It is modeled after the courses given in each Province by the National Council to a selected group consisting of two from each Diocese.

We are fortunate in having as our leader, Mr. Hugh Laughlin, Vice-Chairman of the Committee for Laymen's Work in the Fifth Province and one of the most active laymen in the Episcopal Church. Mr. Laughlin is Executive Vice-President of the Libby-Owens Illinois Glass Co.

We urge all Parish Keymen to attend, or if unable to do so to send an interested representative. The few Parishes in the Diocese not having a keyman are asked to send an active layman.

THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY, NEWARK BRANCH

Annual Report. 1954 - 55.

The framers of our Constitution and By-laws were wise to terminate the service of the president of the diocesan Woman's Auxiliary in a Triennial year. Since we, like the parish branches of which we are constituted, are not a regional organization, but all of us members of the national and international organism that is the Church, our reports must perforce be considered in the light of the program and policy of the Triennial meetings from which they are derived.

The Triennial theme "Create and make new our hearts and minds" has been the background for our thinking and planning and activities during the last three years. We have interpreted it in this Diocese by means of three annual themes of our own . . . "We walk by faith," . . . "Missions from Vision to Action," . . . and "Praise through Service."

In the reports of your officers, committee chairmen, and district directors, as they are read this morning, or printed in our Blue Book, you will see with what dedication and diligence the women of the Diocese have endeavored to make concrete the aspirations expressed in these themes.

It is not necessary to recapitulate in detail the progress that has been made: the increase in the United Thank Offering; the development of the devotional life as evidenced in the Schools of Prayer and the Quiet Days in the various districts; the awareness of our responsibility as Christian citizens that we find in the many activities of the department of Christian Social Relations; the steady building of understanding of the Church's mission shown in the growth and importance that the Buck Hill Conference has in the lives of the parishes; the never-failing values in human relations that we experience in the ministrations of the Comfort Department; the acceptance of the moral responsibility to be informed that underlies the steady growth in our educational department; the satisfaction of meeting tangibly the many needs that come to us through the department of General Supply. All of this and more, you know, because you do the things that are reported at district and diocesan meetings.

Certain specific matters merit special attention.

1. In February of this year we held an open meeting of your Executive Board, to which all parish presidents were invited. We have reason to believe that those who came felt that they had a better understanding of the relation of parish branches to the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary.

2. The initiation of an Information Course for potential leaders in the Diocese has been a very happy experience for your diocesan board, and we hope, for the parish officers

who were invited to attend. More of this will be heard of in the future, I am sure. This Diocese may well be the pioneer in framing the policy that the responsibility of the Personnel Chairman includes recruiting for district and diocesan volunteer workers as well as for finding candidates for professional vocations in the Church. For this successful effort we are indebted to Mrs. Stein.

3. We now have on our Board a liaison officer for all ecumenical activities. Mrs. A. Kyle Wing, of Grace Church, Nutley, will represent us officially at the many meetings of the United Church Women of New Jersey, and relay the information she receives to the proper departments to enable the parish branches to share more adequately in ecumenical relationships.

4. Through our diocesan meeting programs this year we have had great experiences. Our 2nd vice-president, Mrs. Hartigan, has enabled us to share in the meetings of the Anglican Congress and the World Council of Churches; in the work of our Church in the Far Pacific; to catch a new vision of our responsibilities at home in the bonds of family life, and in our mission to the American Indian; to study the opportunities offered to young people who seek a vocation in the Church, and above all to learn from our Bishop how we as individuals may answer the call of God.

5. We have had a share as women, in the whole diocesan effort to support the "Builders for Christ" campaign. The privilege of asserting our citizenship in the Church by assuming our full responsibility in parish and Diocese for this noble endeavor can not be overestimated. May it be the first of many such opportunities that are offered to us in the future.

6. Through the vision and support of parishes and districts we have been enabled to supplement our delegate's expense fund so that we can send to the Triennial Meeting in Honolulu next fall four delegates. The fifth, Mrs. Strassburger, goes by the courtesy and generosity of the National Executive Board and the Episco-Service for Youth, who send her as their representative, but allow her to serve her own Diocese as well.

7. At Honolulu we shall present the names of two diocesan officers for the National Book of Remembrance . . . Edith Weller and Fanita Southworth. We rejoice in their work among us, and give thanks for the examples they set us. And we are conscious of being members with them of a continuing fellowship.

8. We have had changes in the family circle of our Executive Board. Mrs. Uhlig the director of the Morristown District found it necessary to resign, and Mrs. Leavens of Summit has replaced her. Mrs. Stein, Mrs. Shugg, Mrs. Pickering, Mrs. Halsted and Mrs. Palmer have all changed the fields of their operations and assumed new responsibilities on the Board. We wish them well in their fresh ventures. We say farewell to Mrs. Judd today, as she completes her term as nominating chairman, and we welcome Mrs. Gerhard in her place.

As your president, I have presided at all but one diocesan meeting, and at all Executive Board meetings in this last year. I attended 9 fall District and 2 Spring District meetings, and represented the women of the Diocese at all but two of the meetings of the Diocesan Council. I served on the committee that organized the Episcopal Radio and Television Council of New Jersey, and on the Sub-committee on Special Appeals of the diocesan Committee on Strategy and Policy. Invitations to attend parish meetings, always so welcome to a diocesan president, have been accepted whenever possible.

This has been a good year. Much has been accomplished. But it is not good enough yet. As we face the future, which belongs to us all, and to the officers we shall elect today, let us realize the need to re-examine all our plans for our parishes and districts. As Americans we have all been made aware of the dangers of super-nationalism and isolationism. I crave for the women of this Diocese an awareness of the even greater danger of spiritual isolationism, that we call parochialism. Our fellowship is not composed of little islands of unrelated guilds and societies. We are "the women of the Church, united" for the whole program of the whole Church, or we are false to our calling. This is the challenge that faces those of us here today who are very conscious of that calling. We are to be missionaries to our near friends and fellow workers in the parish we live in, until we have doubled our capacities and abilities for service.

And now, as I say goodbye to you all, I am sure you want me to express to our bishops and to the clergy of the Diocese our appreciation for their unfailing kindness and guidance in all our activities.

To you all, I give my deepest gratitude for the constant and unwavering love and loyalty with which you have honored and supported me. I commend to you your new officers. God bless you all.

GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY

As you can note on the enclosed Directory, we have G.F.S. branches in sixteen parishes throughout the Diocese. Our total membership is 380 which is a gain of about thirty over the previous year. This increase occurred in the junior members division chiefly, the 7-14 age group.

We had one branch officially disband, the group at St. Agnes' Church, Little Falls, N. J., but this was more than offset by three new branches. They are Calvary Church, Bayonne; Holy Trinity, West Orange, and St. Paul's Church in East Orange.

A spring Junior Rally was held at Grace Church, Greenville, Jersey City, at which time handicraft work that the children had made, was exhibited and prizes awarded. An Annual Diocesan Service was held last October in St. John's Church, Passaic. A Quiet Hour for older members was held at Trinity, Paterson, during Lent, and the entire Paterson district was invited to attend.

We sent three teen-age delegates to the Girls' Friendly National Assembly at Carleton College in Minnesota in June 1954. All three brought back very fine reports which they read at our Annual Diocesan Council Meeting last November. They appeared to have gotten a great deal out of their experiences at the conference, and we have since learned that all three are taking very active interest in their local G.F.S. branches and their parishes. One of our teen-age members from Grace Church, Rutherford, was the co-chairman of the Assembly. She is Barbara Boyle, a student at Bard College, who is doing part-time work in the National office of the G.F.S.

Our Branches contributed approximately \$100. towards the purchase of a station wagon for a children's hospital in Haiti. This was the G.F.S. National money mission object for 1954. Contributions were also made to the Youth Consultation Service, Red Cross, Seamen's Church Institute, and boxes were packed and sent to an Indian mission in South Dakota and a children's school in South Carolina. The G.F.S. branches, of course, cooperate in their respective parish activities, as well as in community projects.

The older groups, known as Sponsors of the G.F.S., serve on our diocesan council, and two of our Sponsors are on the National G.F.S. Council. The Sponsors lend whatever assistance they can in the way of leadership and financial support to the younger groups.

DIOCESE OF NEWARK

*Memorandum of Information Required by the
Standing Committee on Petition by a Parish or
Diocesan Organization to Sell, Lease or Mort-
gage Real Estate, owned by it.*

- I. The Petition should state whether the property to be sold or mortgaged is used as a place of worship, and, if so, whether or not it has been consecrated.
- II. If the petitioner has a map of the property described in the petition, please submit it with the petition, and after the Standing Committee has acted upon the petition the map will be returned.
- III. In the case of a petition to sell or lease real estate :
 1. Besides a description of the property by metes and bounds, the petition should describe the buildings and their present use and the reasons for selling or leasing the same, also that, in the opinion of the petitioner, the sales price or rental is equivalent to the fair value at the time of making the application, and the basis of that opinion, such as appraisals, previous efforts to sell, etc.
 2. If the sale price is to be paid other than in cash the terms of payment should be stated together with the rate of interest, and whether the balance of the sale price is to be secured by a mortgage on the premises, or otherwise, and if a mortgage, the name and address of the person or organization who will take the same.
- IV. In the case of a petition to mortgage real estate :
 1. A statement should be submitted as to the reasons why it is necessary to borrow money, on mortgage, i.e., to erect a new building, or to improve present quarters, etc., with the name of the person or organization who will take the mortgage, the terms of payment and rate of interest.
 2. If a parish applies for leave to mortgage property, there should be submitted a statement of such facts as have convinced the vestry that it is prudent to borrow the desired funds and that the parish will be able to repay the amount borrowed. Information showing whether or not the parish is growing and concerning its financial affairs should be included. In addition to other information on which the Vestry may have acted, the following data is requested :
 - (a) The present parish membership showing the number of families, and the number of baptized persons and communicants, as compared with five years prior thereto.
 - (b) A brief income and operating statement of the parish for the last two fiscal years prior to the making of the application. This statement should show the sources of income such as pledges, plate offerings, rents from any property, income from invested funds, and, under the heading of expenses, a grouping of salaries, usual operating expenses, and the parish quota for the Dio-

cesan and General Church Program, the pledge toward this quota and amount paid thereon.

- (c) A statement of any Notes Payable or other indebtedness except that incurred in the usual course of parish operations.
- 3. If the Department of Missions or other Diocesan Corporation applies for leave to mortgage property, it is requested that said corporation submit such information as it deems appropriate to demonstrate the desirability of the course it proposes.
- 4. The Standing Committee may request representatives of the petitioner to appear before it in support of the petition, and in the case of a parish they shall be the Rector, Treasurer or other representative, who shall bring with them such parish records as may enable them to answer reasonable questions relating to the parish finances, growth, efforts to raise by gifts the amount which the parish desires to raise by mortgage, etc.
- V. The vestry or the governing body of the petitioner should, by proper resolution, authorize the execution of the petition by the proper officers of the petitioner, and affix the seal of the petitioner to the same.
