CANON, 1, § 2

OF THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES

From a Parish

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present Certificates of their election, in the following form:

[Name of the Church, the Place, and Date.]

This certifies that a meeting of the Congregation of this Church, held for the purpose of electing Church Officers, and Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention (or for the purpose of electing Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, if the meeting be for that object alone), A. B., C. D., and E. F., being communicants of the Church in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish (or mission), were duly chosen as Deputies; and B. C., D. E., and F. G., also being communicants in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish (or mission), were duly chosen as Alternate Deputies to represent the Parish (or mission), in that body for the year ensuing. In testimony of which, I have hereunto set my hand (or if two Wardens subscribed, we have set our hands), the day and year above written.

This certificate in the case of a Parish shall be signed by the Rector, or the Secretary or Clerk of the Vestry, or by the Wardens; and in the case of a Mission by the Minister in charge, or by the Clerk, or by the Warden, and transmitted to the Secretary of the Convention, at least thirty days before the meeting of the Annual Convention, excepting those parishes holding elections other than in Advent.

Memoranda:

Not more than three Deputies are allowed from each Parish, and Mission.

Three Alternate Deputies must be elected and certified to in the same manner as the Deputies.

Write Christian names in full and legibly.

Return Certificates of Election at least ONE MONTH before Convention.

Twenty-Sixth Annual Address of the Bishop of Newark, The Right Reverend Benjamin M. Washburn, D.D.

My Brethren in Christ:

Just before our adjournment seems the most suitable time for the last of my twenty-six annual addresses to the Convention. It is not only the last, but for your comfort let me add that it will also be the shortest of them all.

There is no need for me to stress the steady advance of the diocese during the past year. The reports which you have heard are sufficient evidence of its progress. It would also be presumptuous for me on the eve of my departure to give you counsel as to future policies or programs.

What I have to say will therefore be of a very personal nature. Of course this is by no means my farewell to you whose friendliness has meant to me much more than I can say. There are still classes which I shall confirm, and men whom I shall be ordaining to the Sacred Ministry. I am also planning to be here throughout the summer and you must call upon me if I can be of service.

When the time of my retirement arrives, I shall leave with many happy memories. Chief among them I think will be the family dinner which marked the twenty-fifth anniversary of my consecration. It was a moving occasion and I could not then thank you sufficiently for both the tangible and the intangible expressions of your trust and affection. I cannot do so even now, but my deep gratitude will always continue.

There have been other kind and generous acts which cannot be numbered. Nor can I be unmindful of the debt I owe to many people throughout the diocese—and in many ways. I would like to have my acknowledgment of the debt a matter of record in the annals of the diocese.

It is particularly my close associates whom I have in mind. Foremost among them, from the nature of our association, is Bishop Stark, who by his considerateness and his thoughtfulness has greatly lightened the burden which a diocesan is privileged to bear. God has endowed him with many gifts and through his imagination and his initiative the diocese will continue to be greatly blessed.

I rejoice in the acceptance by the Rev. Donald MacAdie of his election as Suffragan Bishop. His long and effective service among us has won for him our respect, our admiration, and our affection.

There are others besides Bishop Stark among my associates at the Cathedral House to whom also I am deeply thankful. Four of them were here before I came—the Rev. A. Stewart Hogenauer was here to welcome and to help me when I arrived. The Rev. J. Fred Hamblin piloted me through the intricacies of my first Diocesan Convention. He has now been its able Secretary for twenty-nine years. Canon Leslie has been canonically resident for forty years, during twenty-nine of which he has been our indefatigable Canon Missioner, ever ready to serve when and where he might be asked. The fourth of these long-term associates is Mrs. Virginia Grabyne, who because of her knowledge of diocesan finances has been a resource person upon whom I could always call. I have been blessed and greatly helped by a succession of capable secretaries, most recently by Miss Dorothy Van Ness.

Then there is a host of consecrated clergymen and devoted laymen, so great in number that I must not try to mention them by name. Many of them are here today. You have accepted and fulfilled responsibility for planning diocesan undertakings and for the execution of the plans. You and others like you have had a great share in making ours a happy and an active diocese.

On the evening of the day I was elected bishop a Convention dinner was held. In the course of his address at the dinner Bishop Stearly said these words: "If Dr. Washburn accepts his election he will find a most worthy company of comrades who will welcome his leadership and give him steadfast loyalty and devotion." What he said was true and for its truth I give God thanks.

We have indeed been a company of comrades. Company is a good word. Its meaning and its derivation are worth our thought. That we are and always shall be a company is due not to the spontaneous motion of our own wills, but to the action of the Holy Spirit, uniting us to one another in the Church which is the Body of Christ. The loyalty and devotion which we owe is not to any human being, but to the living Lord.

The first syllable of the word company, the familiar prefix "com", means "together with". Its second syllable stems from "panis", the Latin word for "bread".

We are a company and our companionship is expressed and strengthened through our breaking of bread together. Our host at the Holy Table is the living Lord himself. He is our divine Companion, making himself known to us in the breaking of bread, just as he made himself known to the disciples who met him on the Emmaus road. As we know him more clearly we shall love him more dearly and follow him more nearly. We shall know what he would have us be and do. We shall work together in singleness of heart and mind as a blessed company of faithful people.

This is my prayer for the diocese and its people.

The Fifth Annual Address of the Bishop Coadjutor, The Right Reverend Leland Stark, D.D.

My Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

Each year Bishop Washburn and I go over the various subjects to be covered in our addresses, and inasmuch as I am treating with several matters that might better be spoken of in the morning, he has graciously asked that I speak first.

If there is any diocese which has no problems, I have yet to learn of it—and we have our share of difficulties along with all the rest. But more than counterbalancing these, we have such an abundance of things for which to be thankful that I should like, in the first part of my address, to emphasize a few of the things for which we as a Diocese can particularly thank God.

First among them surely is a feeling of gratitude for the long and effective episcopacy of our friend and chief pastor, Benjamin Martin Washburn. For his sake I shall spurn the temptation to go on at length on this point if for no other reason than that—so he tells me—virtually every Sunday now, in the course of his official visitations, he is listening to what he humorously describes as his own obituary. Nonetheless, since this is the last Diocesan Convention at which he will be presiding. I would like to put on record—on your behalf and my own—that we are profoundly grateful for the effectual leadership which he has given our Diocese these many years, and I am sure you will be glad to know that at 4:30 on the afternoon of October 26th, which will be his last Sunday among us as diocesan, we shall be holding a great service of thanksgiving at the Cathedral, following which there will be a reception at the Cathedral House in his and his good lady's honor.

The very next item on our list of thanksgivings is, of course, the good news of the acceptance by the Reverend Donald MacAdie of his election as Suffragan Bishop of this Diocese. The procedure from this point will be for our Standing Committee to request the consents of the Standing Committees of other Dioceses and of the Bishops to his election. These consents are necessary by canon law because the election of a bishop is a matter of concern not just to the diocese electing but also to the entire Church. There is no reason to expect other than these consents will come in in due course, and the consecration of our Bishop Suffragan-elect will probably take place sometime in the fall.

While canon law does not permit the assigning of jurisdiction to a suffragan bishop, there is nothing to prevent a diocesan bishop from assigning areas of responsibility to the suffragan. Prior to his acceptance we had a long conference together in which I outlined to Mr. MacAdie how we might share the duties of our respective offices, and it is my firm intention to ask him to undertake many major responsibilities in the life of the Diocese. We shall soon be meeting together again, at which time we shall work out details together, but already I have assured him that his ministry as suffragan bishop will be one of great importance and significance. I do not need to speak at length of the great abilities and wealth of experience that he will bring to this office, for they are well known to us all, and it is with great personal joy that I look forward to our sharing together the responsibilities of episcopal office.

The year since we last met as a Convention has also witnessed the election and installation of the Very Reverend Robert Foster McGregor as Dean of

Trinity Cathedral. Already he has demonstrated consecrated and imaginative leadership, and we may all confidently look to the future of Trinity Cathedral both as a parish church and as a diocesan cathedral. This too belongs in our list of thanksgivings.

Then too, 1958 will be the second consecutive year in which our Diocese will meet its entire missionary quota from the National Church, and we may well be thankful to God that we are now taking our full share in the extension of His Church in nation and world.

Another subject inspiring thanksgiving is the progress we have been able to make through the Episcopal Advance Fund. Because of the generosity of all who contributed to it, the EAF has materially aided in the planning and construction of nine new churches, six of which are now complete and in use, and of twelve parish houses or halls, nine of which are completed. Three large tracts of land have been acquired through EAF Funds while the Department of Missions has itself purchased a number of others. Seven more projects have received major assistance from EAF, the largest of which was the completion of the new Bishop Stearly wing to the House of the Holy Comforter, our diocesan home for aging women in West Orange. A not inconsiderable number of additional projects are getting ready to knock on the door of the Episcopal Advance Fund, and while it is certain now that there will not be enough funds to carry out completely all the worthy projects needing assistance, nonetheless a renewal of the EAF campaign is not contemplated at this time albeit the Committee on Administration will at this Convention put forward a very modest plan in which, it is hoped, the EAF might realize the full amount of its present pledges. In any case, we cannot think of the EAF and the people who have made it possible without a deep feeling of thanksgiving to God for what has been accomplished through it.

Then too, Bishop Washburn and I cannot help noting with gratitude the significant number of our churches in which people of different racial backgrounds are happily worshipping the Lord and working together for Him in His Church. When this phenomenon is set against the backdrop of racial bitterness elsewhere, the fact that our oneness in Christ has become such a commonplace that it hardly bestirs comment is surely something that should move us to gratitude to God for this brotherhood.

Then we must surely be thankful for another kind of unity that holds us together. If you look carefully at the expressions of Christian life and worship that are made in this Diocese, you will see that there are all kinds of differences among us: theological differences, churchmanship differences, ceremonial differences. There is really quite an astonishing lack of uniformity among us, but thanks be to God!, these differences are rarely if ever stretched to the tension of unhappy division because they are contained within a larger unity of our fellowship in Christ so that the things that hold us together as fellow Christians are always much more significant than the things which would divide us. For this "oneness of spirit in the bond of peace," we may indeed give thanks to God.

Among other things, it is this sense of unity of spirit among us that enables us to face our problems in the happy confidence that with God's help we shall be able to make continued progress.

I come now, in this second section of my address, to some of these problems. I hope you are not frightened by that word "problem". Whenever I am, I remind myself of what a brother bishop once said to me. "Never complain about your problems," he told me; "they account for the major part of your salary!" Furthermore, while it is true that a problem often involves doubt and uncertainty, it may also represent a question proposed for solution and action, and when that question is solved and action follows, the problem is transmuted into an opportunity. It is, then, in this sense that I speak now of certain problems.

One of the most pressing that faces us as a Diocese is known as "the Problem of the Urban Church." If you were to classify the 148 churches of our Diocese, you might classify 62 as urban, 69 as suburban, and 17 as rural.

As a general class, the 69 suburban churches show the greatest rate of growth, and the greatest number of our people are now to be found in them, and while many of the 62 urban churches are thriving and healthy, there are enough of them beset by adverse population changes, diminishing income, and the progressive obsolescence of their buildings as to constitute an "urban problem." The problem is most serious in Hudson County, but it is also to be found in certain parts of Essex and Passaic Counties.

What are urban churches? They may be downtown churches surrounded by business and industry, having very few of their people still living close by. They may be inner-city churches just beyond business districts, often located in deteriorating or already depressed areas. They may be neighborhood churches grouped together in residential areas which were originally able to support several churches adequately but not so any longer.

Here then is a sketchy outline of the problem. While it is one that clearly calls for careful research, serious study, and long range strategy, already some conclusions are emerging.

Certainly the conviction is growing ever stronger that in the providence of God the Episcopal Church has a great and definite mission to undertake on the urban scene. The cities of our Diocese represent a great missionary opportunity. Nowhere can such a heavy concentration of unchurched people be found than in the city. Interestingly enough, one of our clergy in a suburban area of prodigious growth made an interesting complaint to me the other day. He told me that so many new Episcopalians are moving into his parish that he has no time to evangelize the unchurched and that this important function of his ministry is perforce virtually neglected. The city priest would hardly make that complaint! Everywhere he looks are people outside the borders of the church who need to be drawn within its redemptive fellowship. While to be sure there is no more difficult ministry than on the urban scene, nonetheless the city represents a great missionary opportunity and let us never lose sight of this!

This does not mean, of course, that the status quo of our urban churches is to be frozen into immutability. No doubt the future will see many a change. Among other things, the possibilities of some mergers of city churches should be explored. Certainly in several urban areas, there are more Episcopal churches than seem necessary to serve the community. In a certain large city of our Diocese, if you were to start at the front door of one of our churches, in eight blocks you would pass a second. Continuing in virtually the same straight line for seven blocks more, you would pass a third. Go eight blocks more; bearing a little to the left, and you would come upon a fourth. Turn left for six blocks more, and you would stop in front of a fifth. In normal traffic it would take about seven minutes between the first and the fifth churches. One of these five is a strong parish, but the average com-

municant strength of the other four is 142 persons with an average Sunday School enrollment of 24. Now I am not suggesting that all five of these churches be rolled into one because that cannot be done, but I am suggesting that several of these might well consider a consolidation, that far from weakening our witness as a Church such consolidation might well strengthen it, and I think you will be interested to know that preliminary talks along these very lines are beginning.

But I also see many hopeful signs to encourage us. More and more people are becoming seriously involved in the problem of the urban church; among them is our Bishop Suffragan-elect, who has given considerable thought and study to this problem, and he will bring his rich talents of leadership and wisdom to it. The spirit of defeatism which was evident in many an urban area is now being replaced by a new spirit of determination and hopefulness on the part of laity and clergy alike; I find this especialy true in Hudson County, where the problems of the urban church have been most severe. Recently I confirmed a class of 40 at St. John's, Union City, its largest confirmation class in decades. Last August, Grace Church in the Van Vorst section of Jersey City was the scene of one of the most astonishing events perhaps in the history of the Episcopal church in this country when no less than 125 persons were baptized at a single service. The renaissance of some cities, especially Newark under the dedicated leadership of Mayor Carlin, is another hopeful sign. Furthermore, we now have a Department of Urban Work, whose chief concern will be the city church. Then too, when Dr. Joseph Moore and his associates of the Unit of Research and Field Study of our National Council make their Diocesan-wide survey beginning in January of 1960, they will give special and expert attention to this problem.

All in all, these are hopeful signs pointing in the direction of an ultimate solution so that the problem of the urban church will, in the Providence of God, be transmuted into the opportunity of the urban church, as increasing numbers of men and women and boys and girls are won for Christ and His Church.

III

Also in the category of problems and opportunities are certain matters that are coming before General Convention next October that will have no little effect upon our Diocese.

General Convention this year promises to be an important Convention. A new Presiding Bishop is to be elected. Convention will debate whether our Church will give a certain qualified recognition to the Church of South India. A decision will be made as to whether a new official Episcopal Church magazine should be started.

But it is the two financial matters to be proposed to General Convention by the National Council that will affect our Diocese most directly. One is the proposal to increase the budget for the General Church from \$7,000,000 to \$9,000,000 for each of the years 1959, 1960, and 1961. This \$2,000,000 increase would go chiefly to our mission fields in the nation and overseas. If this larger budget is passed, the quota for the Diocese of Newark will go up from about \$178,000 to \$241,178. Since there is considerable likelihood that this larger budget will be passed by General Convention, it has seemed wise to include the anticipated larger quota in the budget you will presently be considering. (The figure used in the printed proposed budget sent you was \$238,000, but we have since learned that it will be \$241,178).

In addition to this increase in the regular national program budget from \$7,000,000 to \$9,000,000, the National Council is also proposing a national

capital funds campaign. Originally the National Council felt the goal should be \$30,000,000 to be raised over a ten-year period, but the National Council has since reduced this goal to \$6,600,000. In 1959 National Council proposes the Episcopal Church raised \$1,300,000, in 1960 \$2,200,000, and in 1961 \$3,100,000. Assuming General Convention votes to undertake this campaign, our Diocese's share in 1959 would be about \$41,000, in 1960 \$69,000, and in 1961 \$98,000, these figures, of course, being over-and-above the increase in the regular quota of which I have just spoken. As yet the National Council has released very little information on how this money would be spent, but again it would be mostly for capital expenditures by way of grants and loans to our missionary districts at home and abroad.

If then these two things are passed by General Convention, the Diocese of Newark would be asked to increase its giving to the National Church from our present quota of \$178,000 to \$282,000 in 1959, to \$310,000 in 1960, and to \$339,000 in 1961. (When some weeks ago I took these figures in to Bishop Washburn, his lips parted in that characteristic mischievous smile of his, and he said to me, "Don't you wish you were retiring?")

Now it is by no means a foregone conclusion that General Convention will pass these two financial matters, but the possibility is strong enough that I feel I would be remiss in not drawing them to this Convention's attention in advance. Nor do I know how our own Newark delegation will vote, nor at the moment how I will, since we do not have enough facts at present on which to base an intelligent judgment.

Certainly it is incumbent upon us to do everything we can for the cause of missions, this being particularly true of missions overseas, for the very last command Our Lord verbally gave His disciples was to take the whole wide world as the field of missionary endeavor.

What enlarges the scope of the problem however is that missions are not just places like Liberia or the Missionary District of Salina, Kansas. Missionary opportunities are also at our very doorstep, and since the portion allotted to outright grants in our Episcopal Advance Fund will soon be exhausted (although the Revolving Fund will, of course, continue indefinitely, I would again be remiss in my duty if I did not likewise draw your attention to these. In 1950 the civil population of our Diocese was roughly 2,700,000—by 1975 it will have grown to 3,700,000. Bergen County is having the fastest growth, and by 1975 will be at least double its present size. These cold statistics are sufficient by themselves to open our imaginations to the missionary opportunities all around us. New missions will have to be established. Existing parishes and missions will need expanded facilities not only in the suburbs but also in the cities, for they too will share in this rapid growth.

What is true of growth in our Diocese is true of many other dioceses too, and one of the problems our Episcopal Church faces is somehow to bring all these missionary opportunities—in dioceses as well as in missionary districts in the United States and abroad—into their proper perspective and focus so that, on the one hand, General Convention does not put such heavy quotas upon the dioceses that diocesan missionary programs suffer, and on the other hand that a Diocese like our own that faces the challenge of great growth does not become so preoccupied with our own expansion that it fails to assume its full share of the larger mission of the Church.

In any event, all of this adds up to greater claims for responsible Christian stewardship in 1959 and in the years to come, not just in terms of diocesan

and National programs but also in terms of expanded programs in the parishes and missions of our Diocese.

It is my happy observation that our people have been responding increasingly to the claims of responsible Christian stewardship. This is to be seen especially when a person's EAF contributions are added to his regular church giving. Now the last of the EAF envelopes is dated December, 1958. Because of the inevitable shrinkage, our EAF Committee is petitioning today's Convention for permission to ask such people as are able and willing to make one additional monthly payment or its equivalent if they have paid at other intervals.

While, as I have said, there is no movement on foot to begin another EAF campaign, is it not true that the EAF has helped to bring home to many the joy of a responsible Christian Stewardship?

I raise the question therefore whether 1959 could not be the year for another giant stride forward in Christian stewardship for the people of our Diocese. Indeed there will come before us today a Resolution from the Department of Promotion calling upon us to set the Biblical tithe of ten per cent for Church and charity as the goal and standard of responsible Christian stewardship. (Incidentally, the Resolution says nothing about tithing income before or after taxes, but I think the Lord will accept either definition!)

Surely Our Lord wants His Church to grow in every community and diocese, in missionary districts at home and abroad, and while the growth of His Church depends upon many factors, one of the essentials is a responsible Christian stewardship, and I for one am convinced that the ultimate solution to the financial problems of the local church, the Diocese, and the Episcopal Church at large is the widespread practice of Biblical tithing.

But I must not leave the impression that I commend this to you and the rest of our people simply as a duty that ought to be performed. It is that, to be sure, if we believe the Bible as the Word of God to His people. But I commend tithing also as a way to discover in one's own experience the joy of giving. Have you ever met an ex-tither, someone who was once a tither and then gave it up to go back to some lesser form of stewardship? Over the course of years I have challenged dozens upon dozens of audiences to tell me of one ex-tither of whom anyone knows, and thus far I have ever received a single name! Why? Because tithers have come to experience a new sense of joy in their partnership in the Lord's work that tithing brings and to know in their own lives the truth of Our Lord's own words, that it is indeed "more blessed to give than to receive."

Because tithing leads to a new and deeper joy in the Christian life, I do not hesitate to bring my own address almost to its end on this note.

I have only one quick personal word to add. On November 1st, God willing, I am to become your Diocesan. In the fact of the heavy responsibilities that will be mine I cannot but feel an ever increasing dependence upon Almighty God, and just as daily I remember you of the clergy and laity of our beloved Diocese in my prayers, so also may I ask that you undergird me with yours?

Report of the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order

In accordance with Article II, Section 2 of the Diocesan Constitution, Bishop Washburn called a Special Convention of the Diocese of Newark to be held on April 29, 1958 in Trinity Cathedral, Newark.

The Committee on Elections and Rules of Order submits herewith Rules of Order and a Calendar of Business,

The Committee has made arrangements through the Secretary of Convention for luncheon to be served for the convention personnel at the Cathedral House,

Delegates are requested to occupy seats on the convention floor. Visitors are asked to use balcony seats.

Be it resolved that the Rules of Order and Calendar of Business as submitted be adopted by this Convention.

Rules of Order and Special Calendar of business for the session of the Special Convention of the Diocese of Newark of April 29, 1958.

RULES OF ORDER

The Rules of Order as adopted by the Convention of May 14, 1957, shall be in force so far as applicable to the business of this session.

CALENDAR OF BUSINESS

- 1. Announcement as to the presence of quorum in both Orders.
- 2. Report of the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order and Calendar of Business.
- 3. The appointment by the Chair of a Committee on Certificates of Lay Deputies.

- 5. The appointment by the Convention of a Committee on Rights of Lay Deputies. (Canon 1, Section 4)

- Consideration by the Convention of the Bishop's request for the election of a Suffragan Bishop.

Nominations—Nominations for the office of Suffragan Bishop shall be made without discussion any further than will suffice to designate a Presbyter of the Church, the fields and character of his labors, his worthiness of character and his fitness for the office in this Diocese. Nomination speeches shall not exceed five minutes. There shall be no more than three seconding speeches not to exceed three minutes apiece.
- 12. The election shall be conducted as follows:
 - (a) The vote shall be by ballot.
 - (b) The President shall appoint a sufficient number of Clerical and Lay Tellers to receive and count the votes of the Clergy and the votes of the Laity.
 - (c) The Secretary shall give directions to the Deputies as to the voting places.
 - (d) In the event of a majority of the Deputies present from a parish or mission failing to agree upon a candidate, such parish or mission shall then cast a blank ballot. A blank ballot shall shall be considered a vote.
 - (e) The vote shall be by ballot, the Clery voting individually, the Lay Deputies by Parishes and Missions. The Clerical and Lay orders shall vote separately until some fit and qualified Presbyter shall receive a majority, in each order, of those present and voting; a blank ballot shall be considered a vote. And the Presbyter receiving such a concurrent majority in both orders shall be declared duly elected; provided, that if there should not be present two-thirds of the Clergy entitled to vote, and Deputies from two-thirds of the congregations entitled to representation, then a concurrent majority of two-thirds of those present and voting shall be necessary to determine a choice.
 - (f) Ballots may be cast for a Presbyter of the Church who has not been placed in nomination.
 - (g) After the result of a ballot has been announced (there being no election) and before another ballot is ordered by the Chair, additional nominations may be
 - (b) When the Tellers shall report an election then the President shall officially declare the name of the Suffragan Bishop-elect and give directions for the signing by the Clerical and Lay Deputies of the Canonical Testimonial of the Suffragan Bishop-elect.
 - A motion shall then he made that the President appoint a Committee of Clergymen and Laymen to notify the Suffragan Bishop-elect of his election.
- 13. The Convention shall close with prayer.

It was moved and seconded that the report of the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order be adopted.

The Chair appointed as a Committee on Certificates of Lay Deputies: Rev. George E. Rath, Mr. George F. Miller of St. Paul's, Paterson and Mr. John S. Foster of Christ, Bloomfield-Glen Ridge.

The Secretary reported that Certificates of Lay Deputies have not been received from: Holy Innocents', Hoboken, Grace (Van Vorst) Jersey City and Good Shepherd, Ringwood.

On motion made, seconded and carried the following Committee on Rights of Clerical Members was elected: Rev. C. R. Webb, Rev. F. V. Losee, and Mr. Bert Wales.

On motion made, seconded and carried the following Committee on Rights of Lay Deputies was elected: Rev. R. C. Williams, Mr. Paul E. Marshall and Mr. Walter S. Titterington.

The Bishop's Communication was read by the Secretary:

My Brethren of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of Newark:

This Special Convention of the Church in this Diocese has been duly summoned in accordance with the provisions of Article II of its Constitution and after consultation with the Bishop Coadjutor. Its purpose is to consider my formal request for the assistance of a Suffragan Bishop, as provided in Canon 41 of the General Convention.

My request comes to you in view of my resignation which becomes effective November 1, 1958. Except for a brief period from 1927 to 1932, there have been two bishops in the diocese continuously for the last forty-three years. I think that no arguments to support my request are needed.

Let us one and all be mindful of the solemn responsibility which rests upon each one of us. May the Holy Spirit guide and direct us in what we say and do this day.

Statement of the Standing Committee was read by the Secretary of the Standing Committee, the Ven. William O. Leslie, Jr., as follows:

To the Special Convention of the Diocese of Newark, April 29, 1958:

At a meeting of the Standing Committee held on Monday, January 27th, 1958, in the Cathedral House, 24 Rector Street, Newark, New Jersey, a majority of the members being present, Bishop Washburn reported that his resignation as Bishop of the Diocese of Newark, effective November 1, 1958, had been approved by a majority of the members of the House of Bishops. He then requested the election of a Suffragan Bishop by reason of the "extent of Diocesan work". The Standing Committee thereupon unanimously adopted the following resolution:

"Be it Resolved that this Committee give authorization for the sending out of a letter to the Bishops and Standing Committees of the Church, asking consent to the election of a Suffragan Bishop on account of the extent of Diocesan work, said letter to be signed by the Bishop and the Secretary of the Standing Committee."

In due course a letter to the Bishops and one to the Standing Committees, asking for consent to the election of a Suffragan Bishop on account of extent of Diocesan work, were signed by the Bishop of the Diocese and the Secretary of the Standing Committee and mailed to ninety-four Bishops and seventy-four Standing Committees.

At a meeting of the Standing Committee held on Friday, March 14th, 1958, the Secretary reported that consent to elect a Suffragan Bishop had been received from a majority of the Bishops and of the Standing Committees.

Following this report of the Secretary and the request of the Bishop for the advice of the Committee, the following motion was seconded and passed:

"The Bishop, having asked the advice of the Standing Committee, the Standing Committee approves the Bishop's intention to call a special Convention on or about April 29th, 1958."

Mr. Charles W. Kappes, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Council presented the following resolution on behalf of the Diocesan Council:

Resolved, 1. that the Salary of the Suffragan Bishop be set at the rate of \$10,000, per year.

2. that appropriate pension premiums be paid

- that the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund be requested to provide a dwelling for the Suffragan Bishop
- 4. that travel allowance be granted the Suffragan Bishop at the rate of \$1,250, per year.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the report of the Diocesan Council be adopted.

The Chair clarified the provision of the Canon that election of a Bishop is by majority of vote in each order, Clerical and Lay, and that only one vote is accorded a parish and one half-vote accorded a mission. Alternates do not participate unless taking the place of a regular deputy.

The Rev. C. R. Webb suggested that an outline of duties to be assigned the Suffragan Bishop be stated before the election, and that no person be allowed to have his name put in nomination unless he intends to accept an election.

Bishop Stark explained the difference in the status of a Bishop Coadjutor and a Suffragan Bishop, and that no jurisdiction can be assigned to a Suffragan Bishop in accordance with the Canons. However, he stated that he hopes to give to the Suffragan Bishop as much work as he can carry. As to the second question Bishop Stark stated that the Convention has no right to insist on a promise of acceptance before the actual election is held.

Mr. William T. Kirk of St. Peter's, Morristown, presented in nomination the Rev. Donald MacAdie, Rector of St. John's Church, Passaic. This nomination was seconded by the Rev. Eric M. Tasman, D.D. of Church of the Holy Communion, South Orange, by the Rev. Donald W. Beers of Church of St. Mary the Virgin, Ridgefield Park and by Mr. Charles W. Kappes of Christ Church, Ridgewood.

The Rev. John R. Edler of Trinity Church, Irvington presented in nomination the Rev. Welles Royce Bliss, Rector of Grace Church, Nutley. This nomination was seconded by Mr. Rolfe K. Hughes of Grace Church, Nutley, by Mr. A. P. Green of St. Mark's Church, West Orange and by Mr. Harwood Fish of Trinity Church, Irvington.

The Rev. Ivan Partridge moved, seconded and carried that the nominations be closed and that the Convention proceed to the taking of a ballot for the election of a Suffragan Bishop.

Prayers were offered by the Bishop for guidance in the election.

Polls were opened at 11:40 o'clock and closed at 12 o'clock.

Noon Day prayers were said by the Bishop Coadjutor.

Recess was taken until one o'clock.

The Convention re-convened at one o'clock.

Rules of Order

THE CONVENTION

- 1. The Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
- At the close of each Convention a Committee shall be appointed to review and certify the correctness of the minutes.
- 4. All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convention shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall record their attendance.
- When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
- The general procedure of the Convention shall be governed, unless otherwise provided for, by the rules of parliamentary practice as set forth in "Roberts' Rules of Order."
- When any member is about to speak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
- No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply), in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
- 9. If any member in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
- 10. A Committee consisting of the Bishops, ex-officio, five other clergymen and five laymen, to be known as the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, shall be appointed at each Convention to prepare the official Ballots and the Calendar of Business, for the next Annual Convention.

The mode of conducting the nominations and elections of all Committees, Commissions and Diocesan Council, and Departments, and all other elective officers not otherwise provided for, shall be as follows:

The Secretary of the Convention shall send out with the notice of the time and place of the Diocesan Convention, a list of the offices to be filled by election thereat, and the names of the incumbents of these offices, whose terms expire thereat, together with an official nomination blank. Such notice shall be sent out at least one month before the date appointed for the Convention, to the Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and to each lay delegate whose name and address has been transmitted to the Secretary, as provided in Canon I.

Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations for any office or offices to be filled at such Convention, shall at least fifteen days before the date appointed for the Convention, submit the same in writing to the Secretary thereof, together with his certificate that he has secured the consent of such person or persons to such nomination.

The Committee on Elections, from the list of nominations as furnished to it by the Secretary of the Convention, shall prepare sufficient ballots marked "Sample" for each clerical and lay delegate, as certified by such Secretary, as entitled to a seat in the Convention; such ballot to be mailed by such Secretary to each such delegate at least five days before the Convention.

At the beginning of the opening session the committee shall report to the Convention in the form of an official ballot the names of nominees; the arrangement of such names shall be determined by lot in each order.

If there be any office for which no nomination has been made on the sample ballot any delegate may file with the Secretary of the Convention the name of one candidate for any such office, together with his certificate, that he has secured the consent of the person so nominated. Such nominations may be filed up to the hour of voting, and the committee of Elections shall announce the names of such nominees at the time of the distribution of the first ballot.

The number of consecutive terms any nominee has held the office for which he is again nominated shall be noted on the ballot, in parentheses, after his or her name. After each list of nominations as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks may be filled by any voter. On the first ballot these ballots only shall be used, and also in subsequent ballots, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. No ballot shall be counted in its class, on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled, and the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast.

The members of the Convention shall also be requested, in said call, to send to this Committee any canonical amendments or other important items of business that they may propose to introduce at the next Convention, so that such matters may be assigned a place on the Calendar of Business. Notice of the annual Convention shall be given in THE NEWARK CHURCHMAN.

- 11. The President shall appoint in advance of each Convention a Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions, to whom shall be submitted by the Secretary of Convention all resolutions, (duly signed by Delegates to the Convention) which are to be considered by the Convention not less than two weeks in advance of said Convention.
- Reports when submitted in Convention shall be read by title only, unless the reading be for the better transaction of husiness.
- 13. All new business introduced, except such as may accompany and form a part of a report of a committee, shall be in the form of a motion or resolution and shall be in writing, and signed.
- 14. All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered. It shall be the duty of the Secretary promptly to notify the members of all special committees of their appointment.
- 15. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.
- 16. No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
- 17. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it; or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment has been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
- 18. All metions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.

VOTING PRIVILEGES.

- 19. All questions shall be decided viva vocs, unless otherwise specially ordered.
- 20. On the demand of five Presbyters entitled to vote, or of the Lay Deputies from five Parishes and Missions, the vote upon any question shall be by Orders, the Clergy voting individually, and the Laity by Parishes and Missions; and, when a vote is thus taken, a concurrent majority in both Orders shall be necessary to carry any measure.
- 21. A public address system shall be installed for use of those addressing the Convention.

The Annual Convention

The Eighty-fourth Annual Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark was held on Tuesday, May 13th, Nineteen Hundred and Fifty-eight, in Trinity Cathedral, Newark, New Jersey.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at eight-thirty o'clock by the Bishop of the Diocese, The Right Reverend Benjamin M. Washburn, D.D., assisted by the Bishop Coadjutor, the Right Reverend Leland Stark, D.D., who read the Gospel; the Very Reverend Robert F. McGregor, Dean of the Cathedral, who read the Epistle; and Canon Richard C. Williams.

The Bishop read the names of the Bishops of the Church, and Laity of our Parishes and Missions who departed this life to become members of the Church Expectant during the past Convention year, and commended them to the prayers of the congregation during the Communion Service.

At this opening Service of our Eighty-fourth Annual Convention we remember before God these his faithful servants who since we last met have departed this life.

The morning session of the Convention was called to order at nine-thirty o'clock, with the Right Reverend, the Bishop of Newark, in the chair.

A quorum being present in both Orders the Convention was declared ready for business. Attendance cards indicated the following were present:

The Bishop welcomed the retired Bishop Suffragan, the Right Reverend Theodore Ludlow, D.D., to the Convention.

The Bishop announced that the Reverend Donald MacAdie had accepted election as Bishop Suffragan. The Convention rose and sung the Doxology upon the news of his acceptance.

The Bishop introduced the following Clergy received during the past Convention year; by Ordination to the Priesthood, the Reverend Messrs. James H. Waring, Prescott Beach, Jr., George H. WHEREAS, the Reverend J. Fred Hamblin has served the Convention of the Diocese of Newark as Secretary for a period of twenty-nine years, and prior thereto as Assistant to the Secretary for a period of seven years, and

WHEREAS, the continuity of this service has greatly aided in the keeping of the records of the Convention and has facilitated the execution of its business between sessions.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the Eighty-Fourth Convention of this Diocese in which the Rev. Mr. Hamblin now sits, for the first time in thirty-six years as a "Deputy without Portfolio" record this expression of its gratitude.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution suitably inscribed be presented to the Reverend Mr. Hamblin as a token.

The resolution was unanimously carried by a rising vote.

The Rectors and Lay Delegates from the newly received Parish of The Church of the Epiphany, Allendale were presented to the Convention, and duly welcomed into union with the Convention by the Chair.

The Bishop announced that since this would be his last Convention as President, he had reversed the order of Addresses; the Bishop Coadjutor, the Right Reverend Leland Stark, D.D., delivered his Fifth Annual Address at this time. (See Bishops' Addresses).

The Bishop relinquished the Chair to the Bishop Coadjutor for the consideration of the Budgets.

Mr. Frederick G. Stuart, Secretary-Treasurer of the Diocesan Council presented the 1959 Budget of Administrative Expenses. (See Reports of Convention).

Mr. Stuart pointed out that salary of the Bishop Suffragan had been increased to \$12,000.00, which increased the Pension Premium by \$350.00.

Two suggestions were made during the discussion of the Budget: 1) that copies of Budgets be sent to all Vestries in time for ample discussion, 2) that all items on Cathedral House, which total \$67,000.00 be grouped together in future Budgets.

With the increase in the Bishop Suffragan's Stipend and Pension Premium, Mr. Stuart moved the adoption of the following resolution which was duly seconded and adopted:

WEZERAS, the Diocesan Council is directed by Canon 5, Section 4 (d), to provide for an assessment on the Pariahes and Missions to meet Administrative Expenses of the Diocese, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Convention approve the proposed budget for 1959, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Diocesan Council be hereby directed to levy an assessment on Pariabes and Missions of the Diocese at such rate as to cover the amount of \$133,065.00.

Mr. Stuart next presented the 1959 Budget for the Program of the Diocese and General Convention, correcting the National Council Quota to \$241,178.00 and the Grand Total to \$451,775.00. (See Reports of Convention).

After a period of discussion Mr. Stuart moved the adoption of the following resolution which was duly seconded and adopted:

WEREAS, the Diocesan Council is charged with the responsibility of preparing a budget covering the requested missionary and benevolent requirements of the Diocese and General Church for the ensuing calendar year, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Convention approve the 1959 budget as proposed by the Diocesan Council, and

WHEREAS, Canon 4, Section 6 (d), of General Convention provides that in each Diocese a definite financial objective shall be allotted to each Parish and Mission as its share of the Program of the Church, therefore

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Diocesan Council be authorized to designate the quota for each Parish and Mission based upon the average amount of its current expenses for the past three years.

Bishop Washburn returned to the Chair.

All reports of the Convention, and the Treasurer of the Department of Missions have been audited by Peat, Marwick, Mitchell and Co., and copies of the auditor's report are available for inspection.

The Venerable Sydney E. Grant announced that Christ Hospital, Jersey City has an excellent School for Nurses, and that descriptive pamphlets were available to members of the Convention.

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions recommended the adoption of the following resolution which was presented by the Department of Promotion. After duly being seconded, it was adopted.

WHEREAS, the work of the Church in local congregations, in the Diocese, the Nation and the World is severely restricted by the lack of stewardship responsibility and adequate financial support; and

WREELS, the work of the Church is not now supported generously and fully by all the membership of each congregation, and

WHEREAS, vigorous Christian discipleship requires the practice of responsible stewardship.

Now THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that this Diocesan Convention, in humble obedience to Scripture, adopt the Biblical Tithe as the standard of Christian Giving to Church and Charity; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that to achieve the acceptance of this standard by the people of this Diocese as their goal of Christian Stewardship, the Clergy and Lay delegates to this Convention pledge themselves to assume the leadership in winning our people to the acceptance of this responsibility so that the life of the Church may thereby be strengthened both spiritually and materially; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this Resolution be sent to each clergyman of the Diocese and to all Clerks of Vestries and Executive Committees to be read at their next meetings; and that a copy of this Resolution be printed in the Newark Churchman; and that sermons, addresses, and other means of education be used in order that the people of our Church may come to know that Tithing is our standard and the goal towards which we must progress in the support of Church and Charity.

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions presented an amendment to the following resolution, which was lost.

The Resolution as presented by the Committee on Administration of the Episcopal Advance Fund was duly seconded and adopted:

Whereas, the missionary opportunities now open before the Diocese of Newark require capital funds considerably in excess of those presently available from the Episcopal Advance Fund; and

WHEREAS, the Committee on Administration of the Episcopal Advance Fund deems inadvisable the undertaking of another capital fund drive at this time;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Convention directs the Committee on Administration of the Episcopal Advance Fund to take whatever action may be required to assure collection of total amounts originally pledged; and

Be it Further Resolver, that the Committee on Administration of the Episcopal Advance Fund be instructed to reactivate the district organizations used in raising the Fund for purposes of circulating widest possible publicity to our diocesan needs and providing advice, sid and encouragement to parishes and missions as they proceed in whatever way seems best to them to encourage their donors to pay in full; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Convention urges each parish and mission to pledge itself to secure 100% payment of the total pledged by its people, solciliting, if needs be, additional contributions from newcomers and/or other sources to make up for inevitable losses; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Convention invite those parishes and missions whose pledged amounts were less than 5% over their quota to now assume a fairer share of the total burden, either by assuming their full quotas or by donating one extra month of giving to the Fund.

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions presented the following amendment to a Resolution presented by the Department of Christian Social Relations. After being duly seconded it was adopted:

WHEREAS, the Government of the United States is endeavoring to develop the ever-widening use of nuclear energy for peaceful and humanitarian purposes, and,

WHEREAS, the Government of the United States has repeatedly attempted to achieve a realistic and workshie solution to the problems raised by the possible use of nuclear weapons,

BE IT RESOLVED, that this Convention endorses the continuance of such attempts on an international basis within the framework of the United Nations with the ultimate purpose of abolishing the production and testing of nuclear weapons, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be sent to the President of the United States, to the Secretary of State, and to the Senators from the State of New Jersey.

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions presented an amendment to a Resolution submitted by the Reverend George R. Dawson, Rector of St. John's Church, Ramsey, to maintain uniform minimum standard of clergy stipends and allowances.

After a period of discussion the Reverend George R. Dawson withdrew his Resolution.

On Motion the amendment was tabled.

The Reverend Ivan Partridge's request to present a Resolution was voted down by the Convention.

The Reverend Marcus B. Hall recommended the adoption of the following resolutions, which were duly seconded and adopted.

Resolution #1

WHEREAS, Mrs. Benjamin M. Washburn has for the past twenty-six years honored previous conventions with her presence, and

WHEREAS, she is with us in spirit today,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that this Convention conveys its affectionate greating to her at home and expresses its heartfelt wishes for her speedy and complete recovery.

Resolution #2

WHEREAS, the Right Reverend Benjamin M. Washburn, D.D., Bishop of Newark, has presided at twenty-six Annual Conventions and three special Conventions of the Diocese of Newark, and

WHEREAS, the transaction of business at these Conventions has been greatly facilitated by his parliamentary skill and by his ready wit,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that this Convention expresses its appreciation of these talents and wishes him health and joy in his retirement.

Bishop Stark commented on the fact that he was most pleased to see that Mrs. Washburn had arrived at the Convention, and also urged the members to stay to the end to hear the Bishop's Address.

The Report of the Standing Committee was filed by title. (See Reports of Convention).

The Committee on Constitution and Canons, Colonel Lydecker presented the following proposed amendment to Article II, Section 11 of the Constitution of the Diocese of Newark. Necessary, adoption at two consecutive Conventions. After being duly seconded, it was adopted for the first time.

At each Annual Convention a Treasurer and an Assistant Treasurer shall be elected to serve until the next Annual Convention. Each shall give satisfactory security for the faithful performance of his duties.

The Treasurer shall be entitled to a seat in the Convention and shall submit a statement of his accounts to each Annual Convention.

The Assistant Treasurer shall perform such duties as may be assigned to him by the Treasurer or the Convention.

In case the Treasurer die, resign, remove from the Diocese or otherwise be incapable of acting, the Assistant Treasurer shall, on certification of the Ecclesiastical Authority, assume all of the duties and powers of the Treasurer, until such time as the Treasurer shall resume his duties or a successor be elected or appointed. The Ecclesiastical Authority may fill a vacancy in the office of Treasurer or Assistant Treasurer.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT

For the Year 1957

There were nine meetings of the Standing Committee held during 1957.

January 16th

Consent was given to St. Paul's Church, Morris Plains, to give an easement to the Board of Education of Morris Plains covering a drainage problem.

Consent was given to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund to mortgage property of Christ Church, Stanhope.

The Committee recommended to the Bishop that he give consideration to the request of the Church of St. Mary the Virgin, Ridgefield Park, to organize as a parish.

William J. Greer, II, was recommended to the Bishop for Ordination to the Diaconate. The Rev'd James A. Mitchell was elected to fill a vacancy on the Standing Committee.

March 18th

The Committee recommended to the Bishop that he give favorable consideration to the application of the Church of the Ascension, Rogota, for permission to organize as a parish; the same action being taken with regard to St. Paul's, North Arlington and the Church of the Holy Spirit, Verona.

Consent was given to the Ordination and Consecration of the Very Rev'd John Pares Craine, D.D. as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Indianapolis.

On the request of Bishop Washburn, Messrs. Charles B. Bradley and Robert C. Oley, were re-elected as Trustees of the Diocesan Investment Trust.

April 23rd

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Diocese of Newark May 1, 1957-May 1, 1958

Under its re-organized structure the Department of Christian Education met as a whols in June, October, December 1957, February and April 1958, while the Executive Committee met the alternate months of September and November 1957, and January, March 1958. The three functioning Committees—Church School, Adult, and Youth—met between the above set meetings and made written reports in most case. This made for better co-ordination and more work accomplished. Reporting, we put the main activities under the above committees before you:—

ADULT COMMITTEE

The Rev. George R. Dawson, Chairman

An intensive study of the literature in the field of evangelism resulted in a detailed mimeographed report made available to all. A resolution was also prepared and received by the Diocesan Council calling attention to the study, and to the availability of the Adult Committee for any diocesan wide evangelistic effort that may be undertaken. A program for the interpretation of evangelism was made to a joint meeting the Newark-Paterson Clerici. Also one parish entered into a National Christian Teaching Mission in their community with great success. Several other communities with Episcopal parishes participating, are underway, or planned.

Two Parish Life Missions, which is an 'in-parish' preparation for some program of outreach, were undertaken in the diocese.

Several more clergy and lay people with training responsibility in parishes went, in some cases with the financial assistance of the Department, to Church and Group Life Laboratories. There are some 23 from this diocese who have had such training. Several more are expecting to enroll in the current laboratories.

Three educational programs in parishes for adults under the Indiana Plan have been going on. One of them was led by a layman who, with the financial assistance of the Department took the training at Bloomington, Indiana last November. Two additional laymen are to be trained in this fruitful leadership plan during the coming summer.

CHURCH SCHOOL COMMITTEE

The Rev. A. Wayne Schwab, Chairman

Interviews with the leaders of a score of parishes concerning their most pressing needs with respect to the Church School was made by individual committee members taking assignments. On the basis of the returns obtained there was initiated in January a forum called the "Educational Fellowship". It is open to persons in parishes with program and training responsibilities. Four meetings have been held and fine interest shown. One overnight meeting is to be held at the Bishop Donegan Episcopal Conference Center, Tuxedo Park, N. Y. in June. It will be for the purpose of giving skills to the parish trainer in the use of the Teacher Training Guide. A premise accepted by the committee for all its work is that teachers have to be trained by the parish and within the parish. The diocesan committee is to help them at those points of need which are ascertained. Another underlying concept is that little can be done for growing children unless something is first done for the adults that impinge on their lives.

For those who have been unable to attend the meetings of the Educational Fellowship information under the heading of "Random Notes" are sent out after the meetings.

YOUTH COMMITTEE

The Rev. Ivan H. Partridge, Chairman

Two Senior High School Conferences were put on at the Holiday House, Delaware, N. J., in the summer of 1957 on the theme "Christlanity Looks at Love". Three High School Conferences are planned for 1958 on "Becoming What God Intends Us to Be". It is expected that by an additional conference, and limiting each to fifty, a more effective experience will be had for each member, and more accommodated.

The weather required the postponement of the diocesan Youth Rally, but did not prevent a record attendance of 600 when it was held. The President's Dinner enabled the designated parish youth leaders to meet with Bishop Stark. Of the five Week End Conferences planned, two were held, one is postponed, and two were dropped. Bad weather interfered with these very meaningful meetings for youth.

NATIONAL DEPARTMENT

Leadership was given at Syracuse in November 1957 to diocesan program chairmen to help each of them to define the situation they have to face, uncover underlying problems, and work out both strategy and tactics for the same.

The announcement that the complete revision of the initial first, fourth, and seventh grades will be out for the fall is in line with the policy to revise to meet the real needs of parishes as far as they can be understood.

The Unit of Camps and Conferences have produced a definitive handbook for this important area.

National Department has also been evaluated by an outside organization and has rearranged and changed some of its activities and services, especially those in the field.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

1957-1958

To the Members of the Diocesan Convention;

I would like to highlight three areas of the Department's work during the past year.

The first area is that of its work in the legislative field. When representatives of the Department go to Trenton to appear at hearings in the State House, they are often told by the legislators "we know that your Department is concerned about this piece of legislation, but we are not convinced that your people are—as we do not hear from them". To remedy this situation and in order to stimulate our people to more fully exercise their Christian citizenship the Department issued a Legislative Bulletin in March, It dealt with a few of the bills before Congress and the Legislature—bills in which human welfare was especially involved. And in order that the legislators might not only hear from Episcopalians by letter—but also in person—the Department organised and sponsored its first Legislative Caravan to Trenton on March 17. On that date nearly 150 men and women from our parishes and missions went to the State House to speak personally with their representatives in government. Not only did they talk with their representatives but also a group they expressed their concern personally to the Governor in an interview. In sponsoring this caravans, So you see through the efforts of our department and through the efforts of concerned Episcopalians throughout the Diocese, Christian opinion is heing presented in places where decisions are in the process of being made.

The second piece of work of the Department that I would like to bring before you is "The Manual on Health and Welfare Services in New Jersey" which the Department is issuing today to the Clergy of the Diocese. It should be of considerable help to them —as it contains information on resources for help for the aged, for alcoholics, and for the mentally sick—and among other things, it contains a list of child adoption services, as well as information on Diocesan institutions, agencies and funds. From time to time the Departments will issue additional sheets to be inserted in this booklet. The Department would appreciate the clergy's suggestions as to possible supplemental sheets which they would find of value.

Thirdly, I would like to stress the "Church and Freedom Conference" sponsored by our Department and to be held in Trinity Cathedral and Cathedral House on Saturday, May 24th from 10 to 3 P.M. This promises to be another outstanding conference—such as those sponsored by the Department in recent years on Race Relations and the Problems of the Aging. The Rev. Albert T. Mollegen, Professor of Christian Ethica at the Virginia Theological Seminary—and a leader in our Church in the field of Christian Social Relations will speak on the topic "The Religious Foundations of Freedom". Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt will speak on "Freedom In The International Sphere" and perhaps touch on Civic Rights also. Mr. Patrick Malin Murphy, Executive Director of The American Civil Liberties Union, will speak on Civic Rights. And there will also be other outstanding leaders. "Church and Freedom Conferences" are being held in a number of dioceses this year. Their purpose is the dramatizing of the relevance of the Church to the protection and extension of human rights.

In closing, I would like to say we are indeed fortunate to have had such fine leadership on our Committees during this past year. We are most grateful for the wise counseling of Bishop Stark, and the splendid team work of the members of our department in carrying out our program.

DEPARTMENT OF PROMOTION

Report to the Eighty-Fourth Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark

On June 9, 1957, a special meeting was held for all clergy, Canvass Chairmen and other interested laymen at St. Luke's, Montclair. There were a number of brief addresses outlining particular Canvass procedures that had turned out to be specially successful in certain parishes. The meeting ended with an inspiring address by Mr. Donald K. Merwin of the Diocese of Ohio. There were a number of comments from people who found this meeting very helpful. For this reason a similar meeting is planned for June 8th, this year, when the "brain storming" technique will be used under the guidance of Mr. Pleuthner to uncover Canvass helps, and the address will be given by Mr. John R. Sherwood of the Diocese of Southern Ohio.

The October, 1957 issue of the Newark Churchman carried a four page article with pictures on the subject: "What happens to the money your Church pays on the Quota assigned to it for the Missionary Budget?" There was an explanation of the work carried on by the large departments of the Diocese and the National Church. The purpose was to make available to all our people an outline of the Church's Program.

During 1957 the operation of the Newark Churchman again resulted in a considerable deficit. However, the whole procedure was overhauled early in 1958, and arrangements were made to have Miss Virginia Fortiner act as Editor with Mr. Hognauer as Editorial Advisor. Mr. William Dodd, the new Administrative Assistant to the Bishop, found a new printer in New Jersey, and instituted other improvements, so that for the remainder of the year we expect to keep within the budget. And we also hope that the magazine will be improved in attractiveness.

Further progress has been made in the Radio and Television field. One of the most important programs is "Thine is the Glory", a weekly thirty minute program of music and meditations by various participants, Special programs have been produced for all the seasons of the church year: Thanksgiving, Christmas, Epiphany, Paim Sunday, Good Friday, Easter Day and Penticost. The purpose of this activity is especially to interest those outside the Church, so that they will see the need of the Church in their lives, and will then come, seeking what the Church has to offer them; and to tell of the work of the Episcopal Church, especially in the Diocese of Newark.

During the year the Stewardship Education Committee of the Department of Promotion conducted a special study of Christian Stewardship and Tithing in the Diocese. The results of a questionnaire showed that a number of Churches were using some form of tithing and that they felt the need for more help and leadership from the Diocese. As a result of this study the Department of Promotion unanimously adopted a resolution on Tithing to be presented to this Convention. The Department expects to take active part in implementing this resolution and to encourage Stewardship in service as well as contributions. It is hoped this will go a great way toward raising the average standard of giving in the Diocese.

Parishes and Missions are not using the resources of the Department for their can-vasses to the extent hoped for. Not only are speakers available for canvass dinners, but specific help on canvasses is being offered. Where a parish or mission is failing to secure pledges to cover its budget and quota, a team for conduct of the canvass is available from the Department. But the Department cannot very well perform this service unless invited to do so.

CHURCH PENSION FUND

To the 1958 Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

Your Diocesan Church Pension Fund Committee submits the following report for the calendar year 1957 and the first part of 1958.

Annual pensions, as of April 1, 1958, are being paid throughout the Church as a whole as follows:

The total number of those receiving pensions and the total amounts will increase gradually so that in time they will amount to over twice the present figures. It is interesting to note that the present beneficiaries plus present active clergy and surviving widows and children are expected to receive from now on well over \$150 million in pensions.

March 1, 1957 marked the fortieth birthday of the Fund. Nevertheless clergy or surviving widows among the group ordained prior to 1957 will still be living forty or fifty years from now. The Fund's responsibility is truly a long-term one.

With respect to the Diocese of Newark, your Committee reports that as of March 26, 1958, there were in force benefits to 32 clergy totaling \$50,679.84, 1 total and permanent disability allowance amounting to \$1,500, 34 widows allowances amounting to \$26,111.76, and 4 allowances to orphans amounting to \$1,500.12, or a total of 71 grants to persons connected with our Diocese amounting to a sum total of \$79,791.72. This grand total is approximately \$400 less than the previous year.

Your Diocesan Committee would suggest even wider use of the Fund's affiliated organizations, namely the Church Life Insurance, the Church Fire Insurance, and the Church Hymnal Corporations. We also wish to thank all the members of the Diocese who have cooperated in helping the Diocese of Newark to care in such an excellent way for its share of the responsibility in the work of the Church Pension Fund,

REPORT OF TRINITY CATHEDRAL

Surely my first word to this Convention should be appreciation to all of you, both clergy and lay, who have so generously welcomed me and my family to this community. I know that you feel as I do that it is no small privilege and responsibility to serve in the capacity of Dean of Trinity Cathedral. I thank you for your warm welcome, and depend ever upon encouragement and support.

During the past year, the Cathedral staff has changed in many ways. Mr. Roderick Bethune, a new Custodian of the Cathedral and Cathedral House has taken on the work so ably done by Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Eason; and Mrs. Mary Jo Lowe has taken on the work so well done by Mrs. Blanche Shields. As you know, Mr. Bender, our organist, is to be ordained next month, and the announcement of his replacement will be made in the near future.

It is a major tribute to our dear friend, Canon Richard Williams, that amidst all these changes, the work of the Cathedral Parish and the work of the Cathedral, in relation to the Diocese, has gone ahead steadily, affectionately, and most ably under his leadership. Previous Dean's reports have not failed to recognize this man to whom we are all in debt. I rejoice that I am able to add to these honest words of appreciation and respect.

It would be presumptuous of me to report on the past year, or to try to outline a program for the future at this stage.

I would like to share with you, most informally, one or two ideas that we, at the Cathedral, are discussing as probabilities for next year. The services of the Ministry of Healing and the work of the Intercessory Prayer Group at the Cathedral have long been valuable parts of the program. It is now our intention to add to this ministry by having a Service of Healing once each month, on the third Sunday of the month at 4:30 p.m. This, we believe, will give additional opportunity for this ministry, and

additional opportunity for others in the Discess to understand it, to learn about it, and to see it as an appropriate, proper, and regular ministry of the church. Dr. Albert Price, of St. Stephen's Church in Philadelphia, will be here October 19th through the 22nd to open a three-day Mission of Healing, and to inaugurate this custom of regular monthly Healing Services on Sunday.

We have been making some investigations and plans in the hope that we may have, during the coming year, three Sunday afternoon and evening services and conferences, which will involve persons according to their daily work. This is an increasingly valued area of concern of the church at large. We hope, in November or December, to open with a conference on "The Church and Employed Women". At the same time, we are investigating the possibility of two other conterences which might be for lawyers, or doctors, or public school or social workers. We believe this is a service which the Cathedral can perform or the Diocese, which will not compete in the usual way and will be a significant outreach into the area of the church and men's daily work.

Clearly, the normal sound of special services in the Cathedral, which have some Diocesan import, will continue. In addition, to the Healing Mission in October, there will also be a special service in regards to Bishop Washburn's retirement. In November, the Girl's Friendly Society is to have a special service, and set the end of that month, there will be a Service of Installation for Bishop Stark as Diocesan.

THE DEPARTMENT OF URBAN WORK

ANNUAL REPORT

Submitted to the 84th Diocesan Convention-13 May 1958

The 83rd Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark acted to amend Diocesan Canon 5 to create a Department of Urben Work, Six members were elected at that Convention and subsequently six more members were appointed by the Bishop to serve on the Department.

No meetings were held during the calendar year 1957. The Department met for the first time on March 11, 1958. At this meeting it was decided to defer election of those members to be chosen by the Department until after the Diocesan Convention in May. The Rev. Messrs. Donald Mac Adie and Franklyn Y. Weiler were asked to serve as temporary chairman and secretary respectively. There was general discussion of the urban Church problem and an exploration of areas which might be within the concern of the department. Consideration was given both to the upcoming Diocesan Survey in 1959 and to the matter of this department's cooperating with the New Jeresy Council of Churches in its survey work and the establishment of a Church Planning Office. A committee was set up to draw up a budget to be submitted to the Diocesan Convention in May.

At the second meeting of the Department on April 30, 1958 there was further discussion of the proposed New Jersey Council of Churches Church Planning Office. The Diocesan Council has provided budget allowance for this Department's participation in this venture. The Department has moved to recommend to the Diocesan Convention in the Department participate. Discussion followed on the Rev. George R. Dawson's resolution submitted to the Annual Convention concerning clergy stipends and possible subsidies thereto. It was felt that, though this Department is in agreement with the intent of such a resolution, such subsidy payments would not be in the best intents of the clergy of the Diocese. A nominating committee was set up to prepare a list of nominations preparatory to the organizational meeting set for June 3.

Although the Department has met on only these two occasions thus far, it is our feeling that in the years to come it will have a real contribution to make to our Diocese and its work for Christ and his Church.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ADMINISTRATION OF THE EPISCOPAL ADVANCE FUND

The Committee on Administration of the Episcopal Advance Fund, although created some months after the beginning of the Episcopal Advance Fund Campaign, has, in effect, recorded disbursements from the Fund in the amount of \$873,770. in grants and loans to aid in financing 24 vital Diocesan projects, mostly mission churches, and has made commitments for grants and loans yet to be paid totalling \$470,100. The Committee on Administrations now faces the continual dilemma as to how much the Fund may be committed in anticipation of the receipt of further payments on installment pledges, for the need of our missions for new construction is still very great.

On March 31, 1958, unpaid installment pledges due to be completed by January 15, 1959, totalled \$600,833.07. How much of this sum will finally be received is uncertain, but it is hoped that most, if not all, will eventually be paid in. To offset any disappointments in pledges, many parishes are working upon their original amounts pledged as heing in the nature of congregation commitments, which they plan to make good in one way or another.

The importance of installment pledges being paid in their entirety is made evident by the following:

The adjusted amount of the total pledges is \$1,707,079.05. Of the total amount collected to date (\$1,106,245.98), the sum of \$257,913.19 has been committed in excess of present cash on hand in anticipation of further pledge payments.

\$294,500. is needed for loans committed.

55,600, is needed for grants committed.

100,000. is needed for Conference and Retreat Center (campaign commitment).

10,000. is needed for Christ Hospital, Jersey City, (campaign commitment).

\$470.100 -Total commitments.

The \$750,000. Revolving Loan Fund will be a source of further aid to our Missions as repayments are made on outstanding loans. On loans so far made, totalking \$456,670., amortization payments of \$23,028,91 had been received by March 31, 1958, and a substantially larger sum should be repaid on loans during the current fiscal year. There have been no defaults in the payment of interest on principal on loans.

The present status of the 24 projects which have been beneficiaries of E.A.F. aid since the Fund's inception are listed on the following pages. However, the Committee calls attention to the fact that these projects by no means exhaust the need for the expansion of our church facilities, for the Committee has already been made aware of future needs within the Diocese for which Episcopal Advance Fund aid will presently be sought. The Committee therefore, strongly urges the continued generous support of our people,

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS

May 12, 1958

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark

The Department of Missions submits the following summary of its activities for the lendar year 1957. Ten regular meetings were held with the Rt. Rev'd Benjamin M. calendar year 1957. Ten regular meetings were held with the Washburn, D.D., Bishop presiding. The meeting dates follow:

During the year the Department was presented with many problems, varying in degree, but all of first importance to the Missions presenting them. All were given careful consideration and the agenda of the meetings were heavy. The results of the Department's consideration are covered in detail in the minutes of each meeting. Only the most important actions will be outlined herein.

Denville, Church of the Saviour

The progress at this Mission has continued without let-up but complications in connection with the original land purchased in 1956 arose when it developed that a highway was scheduled to pass through it. A new site was obtained and plans for the erection of a vicarage on one section of it were instituted. The Mission also undertook a campaign to raise \$75,000 toward a church and parish house. An architect was hired and plans for both church and parish house were completed.

Fairlawn, Atonement

The parish house, the first unit of the plan for Church and Parish House, was completed and dedicated.

Harrington Park, St. Andrew's

A grant and loans from the Episcopal Advance Fund aided this Mission which had building pledges of \$70,000, to dismantle its old inadequate Church and complete a new one.

Dumont-Howorth Area

A successful fund raising campaign was completed, plans and specifications were given to contractors for bids and work was commenced on a new church and vicarage. The church is now completed.

Lincoln Park, St. Andrew's

The growth of this Mission has been very steady and the congregation was forced to move from Church to Parish Hall but the Parish Hall was soon outgrown also. Eighty-five to ninety new families moved into the Mission in the last year and more adequate facilities were clearly evidenced. Plans for moving the old Church to new foundations were completed and plans and specifications were prepared for a new Church. With assistance from the Episcopal Advance Fund, the project has now been completed.

Paramus, St. Matthew's

The work begun in 1956 has continued at this Mission and the new buildings were ready for use late in the year.

Sparta, St. Mary's

It was mentioned in last year's report that plans for the expansion of this Mission over a five year period were underway. New property aggregating 3.3 acres of land was purchased, a building fund campaign was successfully completed and an architect hired. The architect was authorized to draw up plans and specifications and to obtain bids for the overall plan for the new Church and Parish Hall. Work on the Church has now begun.

Stanhope, Christ

The new Parish House mentioned in the 1956 Report has been completed.

Wayne Township, St. Michael's

The very great population growth in this Township was brought to the attention of the Department early in the year. It was also shown that there were about 40 Episcopal families in the township interested in starting an Episcopal Church. A survey of the territory was made by laymen of Lincoln Park and Little Falls.

In view of the very real interest, a special Committee of the Department was appointed to search for suitable land. Such a piece was found and purchased. In addition, the Rev'd William H. Strain was appointed to reside in this Mission and a house was rented for him.

Budget

The following budget for 1958 was submitted to the Finance Committee of the Diocesan Council with a request for an appropriation. Pledges from parish and missions were inadequate and the appropriation had to be scaled down to \$120,000.

In all, 1957 was a fruitful year and a great deal was accomplished. The Department's Budget could not have financed all that which was accomplished. Grants and loans from the Episcopal Advance Fund made possible much of the work.

This year of prayer and gifts and service of the Woman's Auxiliary has been one of great accomplishments in our Diocese. There have been five meetings for all of the women here in this room,—conducting business and privileged to hear speakers on many phases of the Ric of the Church—and one Quiet Morning in Holy Week in the Catherla, given us by our own Dean MacGregor. In addition six Executive Board Meetings have carried on plans and promotion between times.

In October nine District Meetings took the Officers and Board to each area in the Diocese, to offer the women in the parishes our program and suggestions for the year.

November at Buck Hill Falls proved our most popular Conference of its ten years, bringing to us nearly four hundred women, led by Mrs. Theodore Wedel and Mrs. Lawrence Rose.

In place of Information Courses or Leadership Training Classes, as in previous seasons, we inaugurated Group Conference Procedure, hoping to hold it in two widely separated areas of the Diocese, but, due to the snows, were able to accomplish only one day in Hackensack, which was so well received and helpful to the participants that we expect to carry it on next Fall,—and this time reaching those who were forced to miss it.

Delegates have been sent to the Provincial Meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary, held at the same time and place as the Synod, and to the Spring Conference at Scabury House of the Provincial Woman's Auxiliary. This Spring was preparation for delegates to the Triennial Meeting to be in Miami Beach in October, where we hope to learn and contribute and take part in the great services of praise and thanksgiving of the whole Church represented there.

Inevitably each May we lose members of our Executive Board who have given such enthusiastic and devoted service,—but we elect new ones who I am always convinced who will do the same.

My deepest appreciation for all such good friends, and my heartfelt thanks to our clergy and our Bishops for their sympathy and support always.

Memorandum of Information Required by the Standing Committee on Petition by a Parish or Diocesan Organisation to Sell, Lease or Mortgage Real Estate, owned by it.

- The Petition should state whether the property to be sold or mortgaged is used as a place of worship, and, if so, whether or not it has been consecrated.
- II. If the petitioner has a map of the property described in the petition, please submit it with the petition, and after the Standing Committee has acted upon the petition the map will be returned.
- III. In the case of a petition to sell or lease real estate:
 - 1. Besides a description of the property by metes and bounds, the petition should describe the buildings and their present use and the reasons for selling or leasing the same, also that, in the opinion of the petitioner, the sales price or rental is equivalent to the fair value at the time of making the application, and the basis of that opinion, such as appraisals, previous efforts to sell, etc.
 - 2. If the sale price is to be paid other than in cash the terms of payment should be stated together with the rate of interest, and whether the balance of the sale price is to be secured by a mortgage on the premises, or otherwise, and if a mortgage, the name and address of the person or organization who will take the same.
- IV. In the case of a petition to mortgage real estate:
 - A statement should be submitted as to the reasons why it is necessary to borrow money, on mortgage, i.e., to erect a new building, or to improve present quarters, etc., with the name of the person or organization who will take the mortgage, the terms of payment and rate of interest.
 - 2. If a parish applies for leave to mortgage property, there should be submitted a statement of such facts as have convinced the vestry that it is prudent to borrow the desired funds and that the parish will be able to repay the amount borrowed. Information showing whether or not the parish is growing and concerning its financial affairs should be included. In addition to other information on which the Vestry may have acted, the following data is requested:
 - (a) The present parish membership showing the number of families, and the number of baptized persons and communicants, as compared with five years prior thereto.
 - (b) A brief income and operating statement of the parish for the last two fiscal years prior to the making of the application. This statement should show the sources of income such as piedges, plate offerings, rents from any property, income from invested funds, and, under the heading of expenses, a grouping of salaries, usual operating expenses, and the parish quota for the Dio-

cesan and General Church Program, the pledge toward this quota and amount paid thereon.

- (c) A statement of any Notes Payable or other indebtedness except that incurred in the usual course of parish operations.
- If the Department of Missions or other Diocesan Corporation applies
 for leave to mortgage property, it is requested that said corporation
 submit such information as it deems appropriate to demonstrate the
 desirability of the course it proposes.
- 4. The Standing Committee may request representatives of the petitioner to appear before it in support of the petition, and in the case of a parish they shall be the Rector, Treasurer or other representative, who shall bring with them such parish records as may enable them to answer reasonable questions relating to the parish finances, growth, efforts to raise by gifts the amount which the parish desires to raise by mortgage, etc.
- V. The vestry or the governing body of the petitioner should, by proper resolution, authorize the execution of the petition by the proper officers of the petitioner, and affix the seal of the petitioner to the same.

COMMITTEE ON ADMINISTRATION OF THE EPISCOPAL ADVANCE FUND

Regulations Governing The Granting of Assistance To Parishes, Missions, And Diocesan Organisations

1. Definitions

EAF, as used herein, shall mean the "Committee on Administration of the Episcopal Advance Fund."

Council shall mean the "Diocesan Council."

2. Eligibility

Any parish or mission, or any agency supported by or under the jurisdiction of the Diocese of Newark, may apply to EAF for assistance in meeting a capital (as opposed to an operating) need.

3. APPLICATION

All applications for assistance must be made in writing on forms prepared for the purpose by EAF. Copies of these forms are available in the office of the Secretary, and when completed they should be returned to that office. The Secretary will forward applications so received to the appropriate sub-committee for study and recommendations. EAF will not consider any application that thas not been processed by such subagency, and the findings of the sub-agency must have the written approval of both the Bishop and of the Bishop Coadjutor.

4. Types of Assistance

EAF may assist a project in any one or all of the four categories listed below:

- (a) By a short term loan. (Usually the discounting of pledges.)
- (b) By a long term loan.
- (c) By the acquisition of real estate.
- (d) By a direct grant in aid.

5. REQUIREMENTS FOR A SHORT TERM LOAN (Discounting of pledges.)

- (a) The applicant must have conducted a capital funds campaign and have in hand signed pledges, all of which will become payable by the due date of the loan.
- (b) Pledge discount notes shall be for a period of not to exceed 30 months.
- (c) Discount notes shall not exceed 90% of the total unpaid value of the pledges.
- (d) Pledge discount notes shall be amortized in the full amount of pledge collections not more than 30 days after a payment on account of a pledge is made.
- (e) Pledge discount notes will carry interest as fixed by EAF, (at or near the going commercial rate, but in no case at less than 3% per annum.) The interest shall be a first charge on the unpaid balance of the pledges, and it shall be computed and paid quarterly.

6. REQUIREMENTS FOR A LONG TERM LOAN

- (a) The maximum amount of the loan shall be \$40,000 or 25% of the cost of the project, whichever is less.
- (b) The maximum term of the loan shall be 13 years.
- (c) The loan should be amortized quarterly in accordance with the "Straight Line Amortization Tables" generally used by mortgage companies, except that EAF may waive amortization during the first three years of a loan's term. If amortization is waived for all or any part of the first three years, the full amount shall be amortized quarterly during the remaining term of the loan in accordance with the tables referred to above.
- (d) Interest shall be at the rate of not less than 1% the first year, 1½% the second year, 2% the third year, and 3% the fourth and following years.
- (e) A long term loan will not be made to any applicant unless and until EAF has been assured that the applicant cannot obtain an adequate loan (as judged by EAF) from commercial sources.

7. PRIORITIES IN THE MAKING OF LONG OR SHORT TERM LOANS

It is recognized that EAF was created primarily to meet some part of the capital needs of the missions, aided parishes, and other activities which receive operating funds from the Diocese. In the event that EAF has applications for loans which aggregate more than the amount available in the Loan Fund, applications from parishes will not be considered until all of the applications from aided activities have been acted upon.

8. REQUIREMENTS FOR AN APPLICATION TO ACQUIRE REAL ESTATE

EAF recognizes that many projects of merit cannot be planned until an appropriate site has been secured. EAF is prepared to finance in whole or in part the acquisition of such site, but it is not prepared at this time to promulgate specific regulations to cover this type of assistance. Therefore, each application will be processed by the cognizant subagency, and if aid is given, EAF will impose such terms and conditions as seem appropriate in each individual case.

9. REQUIREMENTS FOR A GRANT IN AID

- (a) Parishes (as contrasted with aided parishes or missions) shall be ineligible to receive grants in aid.
- (b) Applications for grants in aid shall be classified as follows:
 - (1) Planning and Preparation Grants

EAF will consider applications for grants in an amount not in excess of \$2,000 with which to finance the preparation of the plans and specifications based upon which more exact cost estimates can be procured. Such grants may also be made for site preparation undertakings that may be required by the land procurement agreement or by local laws or ordinances as a prerequisite to planning and construction.

(2) Construction Grant

EAF places no limits on the amount of an application for a construction grant. However, it announces, as a matter of policy, that grants in excess of 20% of the total cost of a project or a grant in excess of \$50,000 will be rejected unless it can be demonstrated that the project in question is of sufficient importance to the Diocese, as a whole, to justify the allocation of so large a percentage of the total amount available in the Grant Fund.

10. WAIVER OF REGULATIONS

EAF recognizes that in some instances the application of these regulations may work a hardship on projects which have considerable merit. In the event that a prospective applicant feels that such is the case, a "non-conforming application" may be made to the Secretary. Such "non-conforming applications" will be referred to the Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor, who will determine whether or not the application is to be processed. If both agree that the project should be considered, it will be referred to the appropriate sub-agency in the same manner as a "conforming application."
