CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE 2.

There shall be a Convention of the Church in this Diocese, on the second Tuesday in May in each year, or on such other day in May as may be specially appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority. The Convention shall be held at the Cathedral unless the Ecclesiastical Authority appoints otherwise.

The Annual Reports from Parishes and Missions for 1959 canonically due on or before February 1, 1960, together with the Personal Reports of the Clergy, should be forwarded directly to the Bishop of the Diocese, 24 Rector Street, Newark 2, N. J.

Reports from Diocesan Institutions, Departments, Commissions, Archdeacons, and all other persons or bodies reporting to the Convention, should cover the civil year, and be sent not later than February 1, 1960, to the Secretary of the Convention, 24 Rector Street, Newark 2, N. J.

SIXTH ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE RIGHT REVEREND LELAND STARK, D.D. BISHOP OF NEWARK

My Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

"Grace be unto you and peace, from God our Father and from the Lord Jesus Christ!"

I

II

Before I come to two particular matters on which I wish to address you today, I would like to speak briefly of the many events of diocesan significance that have taken place since we last met in Convention.

The Lambeth Conference was held in London last summer, and for a period of five weeks some 320 bishops of the Anglican Communion conferred together on the general subjects of the place of the Bible in the world of today, Christian Unity and the Church Universal, Tensions within and between Nations, the Family in Contemporary Society, and Progress in the Anglican Communion. It was my privilege to represent our Diocese, and I am grateful to you for making possible this truly great experience, but I shall not now speak of the Lambeth Conference since I have addressed many diocesan groups on that subject.

Then in the Fall the triennial General Convention of our Church was held at Miami Beach, and I would like to place it upon the record that our delegation in the House of Deputies played a major role in the deliberations and decisions of General Convention. (I trust our delegation in the House of Bishops did also!)

Then in a great and moving service came the consecration of the Right Reverend Donald MacAdie, Doctor of Divinity, and in the comparatively short time he has been our Suffragan Bishop, he has already made a most notable contribution to the life of our Diocese. He and I share equally in the numerous episcopal responsibilities of the Diocese, and I count myself greatly blessed to have him as a most effective colleague and as a dear friend.

It was not long after Bishop MacAdie's consecration that there followed another great service, this a service of thanksgiving for the life and work of Bishop Washburn upon his retirement as Diocesan, after twenty-six years of dedicated service to the Lord and His Church in this Diocese. Soon after, came the service of my installation as Diocesan.

More recently has come the division of the Diocese into eight arch-deaconries, a move that already proved to be a useful one, and of this Bishop MacAdie will speak later.

It has been an eventful year since our last Convention a year ago.

III

I come now to the first of the two general matters on which I would like to speak, and I introduce it with a reference to Acts 9:31, where it is reported that "the church throughout all Judea and Galilee and Samaria had peace and was built up; and walking in the fear of the Lord and in the comfort of the Holy Spirit, it was multiplied."

I dare to hope that to a modest degree we can say these words of the Diocese of Newark. Certainly there is peace among us. There is the wondrous peace of Christ that passeth understanding that is His gift to each of us. There is the peace of brotherhood which makes it possible for people of different racial backgrounds to worship together and to work together in the fellowship of His Church. There is the peace of a basic unity among us that transcends the many differences of churchmanship and theological viewpoints that exist among us but never separate us one from another.

And just as "the church throughout all Judea and Galilee and Samaria had peace and was built up," so also I would like to report to you that the Church among us is being built up, and I pray that like the Church in the time of the Acts of the Apostles, we too may walk in the fear of the Lord and in the comfort of the Holy Spirit so that the churches of our Diocese may be further multiplied in strength and in numbers.

It is to the Episcopal Advance Fund to which much of this "building up" may be ascribed. Since we last met, the Episcopal Advance Fund campaign has come to an official close although deferred payments and past due payments on pledges are still coming in and, we hope, will continue to come in. I believe it can be said that the EAF represents the greatest diocesan undertaking in our history. Although many of you by now have received the Final Report which was mailed out last week, still I feel constrained to speak of the various things that have been accomplished through the Episcopal Advance Fund.

On the original goal of \$1,100,000, nearly \$1,700,000, was pledged by our people. To be sure, about a quarter of a million is still outstanding, some of which will never come in of course since it represents pledges of people who have moved from the Diocese or are deceased or whose circumstances have been reduced, but it still remains that close to a million and a half has come in, and more will continue to come in, and that fact is certainly cause for great rejoicing.

Now look with me at what has been accomplished through EAF.

No less than 24 churches and two diocesan institutions have been strengthened in one way or another.

Land was purchased for two new missions and one relocated mission.

EAF helped make possible the building of ten new churches, thirteen new parish houses and educational buildings, one vicarage, and one rectory. It helped finance six rehabilitation projects. It contributed the major portion for the building of a new wing for our Diocesan home for aging women that doubled its capacity. It purchased badly needed X-ray equipment for Christ Hospital in Jersey City. It has set aside \$100,000 for a Diocesan Conference and Retreat Center, of which I shall speak later.

EAF has made twenty grants, but this has been no 'giveaway' program, for while the twenty grants (exclusive of land purchased) came to \$392,000, these grants stimulated over \$2,000,000 in new church construction. Thus it will be seen that the people of the local congregations aided by these grants have given substantially to their own projects and have assumed the unpaid balances in loans and in commercial mortgages.

EAF has also set up a permanent Revolving Loan Fund of \$750,000, out of which 35 short term and long term loans have been made to churches, most of them missions but some of them parishes, and a number of these loans have already been paid back so that this has already become a true 'revolving fund'.

In short, EAF helped make possible, through grants and loans, the construction of churches, parish houses, vicarages, educational and other facilities representing over \$3,000,000 in expansion in the period of less than three years!

Nor is this the whole story, for three years ago many parishes were stimulated by the approach of the EAF campaign to undertake expansion programs of their own. They then combined their EAF responsibilities with campaigns for added church and educational facilities of their own. These would add about another million to church construction undertaken within the period of the Episcopal Advance Fund.

All of this adds up to a total of thirty-eight parishes and missions undertaking some kind of building expansion within the last three years with about \$4,000,000 spent on these projects. Truly this is a remarkable record and one that can give us no little gratification.

Of course, some mistakes have been made, and looking back, I have no doubt that we would do some things differently, but I do not believe any

major mistakes have been made. Some people have contended that our new mission church buildings are too large, and it is true that some of them are larger than some of our parish churches. However, in each instance the future growth of the community was taken into account, and we may have to wait another ten years before we can see whether they are too large or not. Indeed, far from thinking them too large, we have deliberately planned several of them, in rapidly growing communities, in such a way that someday in the future, if it becomes necessary, they can be enlarged at a minimum of expense and without architectural hurt.

In any case, it is reassuring that a number of our missions are among our most rapidly growing churches. In one place where four years ago we did not even own a piece of land, today we have a new and beautiful church; a few weeks ago I confirmed thirty-seven persons there, and the next day, which was Palm Sunday, over 600 worshippers were present at the several services. At another of our new churches the vicar will soon present a confirmation class of over fifty. At still another I recently confirmed and received 63 persons, of whom over half were adults. These figures to me are not only heartening, but they also prove, I believe, that when the Episcopal Church goes into a community with strength, the response in terms of men and women and boys and girls being brought to the Lord and His Church is an amazing one.

An original commitment of the EAF campaign was \$100,000 for a Diocesan Conference and Retreat Center. As yet we have no such Center, but this sum of \$100,000 is being held in reserve for this purpose. However, I will have to say that it was recognized three years ago, as it certainly is now also, that this amount is nowhere near what would be needed to purchase a large tract of land and build an adequate Conference and Retreat Center. While various committees have explored a number of possibilities, we are still searching for the right place. A number of dioceses (I think of Pennsylvania, Bethlehem, Washington, Rhode Island, and New York, to name but a few) have been fortunate enough to receive the gift of a large estate which could be readily adapted for conference and retreat purposes. Some of us cherish the hope that perhaps someday a similar happy lot may be ours.

The Grant Fund of \$450,000 set up by EAF will likely be exhausted before the end of this year if the Department of Missions and the Committee on the Administration of the EAF act favorably on several pending projects, and hence EAF will soon become solely a permanent Revolving Loan Fund. Assuming that a considerable portion of outstanding pledges comes in, that permanent Revolving Loan Fund will have a principal sum of about \$750,000. I wonder whether we may savor that figure for a moment. For this means that after EAF helped make possible the building of ten churches, thirteen parish houses and educational buildings, two clergy dwellings, a new wing for our Diocesan Home for the Aging, medical equipment for Christ Hospital, purchased three sites for missions, set aside \$100,000 for a Conference and Retreat Center, and helped rehabilitate six church properties, we are still left with assets of \$750,000 in a permanent Revolving Loan Fund. To be sure, since nearly all of it is out on loan now, not much is available at present, but since already about \$250,000 has revolved in and then out again, we can see that for the entire foreseeable future EAF will go on and on with its good work of helping to build and enlarge the Church of Jesus Christ in our Diocese that more and more of His people can be brought within His fold.

May I say this personal word to you? You who are present at this Convention are among those who worked the hardest for the Episcopal Advance Fund in one way or another, and this will include most of all Bishop Washburn, during whose tenure the Episcopal Advance Fund campaign was undertaken. I give you and him my profound thanks.

IV

I come now to a second and related matter.

A few years ago our then Presiding Bishop, Bishop Sherrill, was asked by a layman, "What is the strategy of the Episcopal Church?"

Bishop Sherrill quickly replied, "The Episcopal Church has no strategy." After the layman had recovered from his initial astonishment, Bishop Sherrill went on to say, "The Episcopal Church has no strategy because it has no reserves."

Then with a military analogy he went on to elaborate. It is the army with reserves that wins the battle because it can be moved about from place to place where it is needed. If an army has no reserves, then all of its troops must be committed up to the limit at every point; the most it can then hope for is a holding action. This is in effect what is happening in the Episcopal Church, said Bishop Sherrill; we are committed to our full strength at every point. We have no maneuverability. We have no reserves that can be used in strength to move into strategic areas of new population growth in the beginning of developments when adequate land can be purchased inexpensively and no reserves to make the necessary initial capital expenditure to start new work.

With the imminent exhaustion of the Grant portion of EAF, we in this Diocese will soon be without any reserves at the very time when opportunities for continued growth face us on every side. In 1950 the civil population of our Diocese was roughly 2,700,000—sixteen years from now it will have grown by an additional one million persons. New missions will have to be established; indeed, we have just begun new work in the Oakland-Franklin Lakes area with very little idea where the funds for initial investment will come from. Existing parishes and missions will need expanded facilities. Since the cities in our Diocese will also share in this growth, the urban areas must also be regarded as missionary opportunities; indeed, the second largest confirmation class this year—105 persons—was presented at Grace Church in the Van Vorst section of Jersey City (the largest was 110 persons at Christ Church, Short Hills).

In short, in the rapid growth of population that faces us in the years immediately ahead, under God, we must see to it that it can never be said of this Diocese as Bishop Sherrill felt constrained to say of the Episcopal Church at large, "The Episcopal Church has no strategy because it has no reserves." However, if our Diocese is to have a strategy to meet new opportunities with which we shall be constantly confronted, do we not need to have some real reserves with which to meet them?

But where will they come from?

Looking into the more distant future, I hope that in time some of these reserves can be built up from bequests. The Department of Promotion is currently engaged in preparing a booklet for widespread distribution, to encourage people with varying means to make bequests to the Church, first to their own parish church, then to the Diocese, then to the Episcopal Church at large, then to the various ecumenical movements to which our Church is committed. This booklet will in effect be an expansion of that rubric in the Prayer Book that reads, "The Minister is ordered, from time to time, to advise the People, whilst they are in health, to make Wills arranging for the disposal of their temporal goods, and, when of ability, to leave Bequests for religious and charitable uses."

But we need reserves from more immediate sources than bequests, and I hope these reserves will come in part from gifts from people of means. While large gifts are certainly needed for universities and medical foundations, my observation is that the Church of Jesus Christ does not receive its

rightful proportion of these large gifts, and one of the reasons is that we have failed to capture the imagination of large donors. Every new and growing area of a given diocese is generally peopled with young couples with growing families and burdened with large mortgages on their homes. In these circumstances they cannot possibly be expected to make large capital gifts toward the building of a new church in that area, however willing they are to give sacrificially within their means. Our experience with EAF grants has proved beyond doubt the wisdom of helping with some initial capital investment in a new area because it is the Church that moves in in strength that captures the community for Christ. If a person with means desires to make the greatest impact for righteousness, I submit that there is no worthier object than to help build a church that men and women and boys and girls may be brought to Christ.

As the Apostle says in his first Letter to Timothy (6:17-19), "As for the rich in this world... they are to do good, to be rich in good deeds, liberal and generous, thus laying up for themselves a good foundation for the future, so that they may take hold of the life which is life indeed."

Then I hope that these reserves will come from another immediate source, and that is from the enlargement of the present Bishops' Church Extension Fund. Many people of our Diocese do not even know of the existence of this Fund. Those who become members of this Fund agree to contribute whatever sum they specify not more than five times a year, upon the receipt of a Call from their Bishops made at the behest of the Department of Missions. These are not large sums, and subscribers to the Fund tacitly agree to do this without interfering with their full support of their own parish church so that this Fund is a kind of "over-and-above" project. For example, one such Call is just now in the process of being issued; it is on behalf of our newest mission at Oakland and Franklin Lakes. This mission is so new it does not even have a name yet, but an experienced young priest and his family are soon to move into that area, and the proceeds of this particular Call will go toward the down payment on a vicarage. At present the Bishops' Church Extension Fund has only 291 subscribers, and will not produce much more than \$800 per call, but the Bishops' Church Extension Fund is a sound idea that ought to make a great appeal to many in our Diocese who would like to engage in some direct missionary effort at the same time continuing their full support to their own parish. The Department of Finance and the Department of Missions are currently being charged with the responsibility of looking toward the enlargement of this Fund.

If as a Diocese we are going to have a strategy to meet the opportunities for the growth of our Church that will be increasingly coming upon us, we need reserves, and I hope and believe they will come from these sources: from bequests, from large donors from many persons becoming contributors to the Bishops' Church Extension Fund. "The Episcopal Church has no strategy because it has no reserves"—let that never be said of us in this Diocese!

As I near the end of my address and reflect back upon what I have said, I cannot but be aware of the fact that I have been occupied in large measure with financial matters. While this will surely not always be the case, I most certainly feel no necessity for apology for this particular emphasis today.

For it is surely important to spread upon the record the accomplishments made possible through the Episcopal Advance Fund campaign, just now concluding, and certainly I should be remiss in my duty as Bishop of the Diocese if I did not concern myself with the problem of its future growth.

I began my address with a quotation from Acts 9:31. I quote it again as I conclude but this time from another translation: "...all over Judea, Galilee, and Samaria, the church enjoyed peace; it was consolidated, inspired by reverence for the Lord and by its invocation of the Holy Spirit, and so increased in numbers."

Here note that this translation makes it clear that because the churches were consolidated in unity, brotherhood, and service and because they were inspired by reverence for the Lord and because they constantly invoked the Holy Spirit, therefore they increased in numbers.

May the wise and loving Heavenly Father grant that all over the Diocese of Newark our churches may continue to enjoy peace, that we may be consolidated in unity, brotherhood, and service, and we being inspired by reverence for Our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ and by our unfailing invocation of the Holy Spirit, God may give us increase.

FIRST ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE RIGHT REVEREND DONALD MACADIE SUFFRAGAN BISHOP OF NEWARK

If this were to be a sermon I might have used the first three verses of the Epistle of James for my text with some slight editing: "I, Donald, a servant of God and the Lord Jesus Christ, to the eight Archdeacons in the dispersion; Greeting! Count it all joy, my brethren, when you meet various trials, for you know that the testing of your faith produces steadfastness."

The appropriateness of the text lies in the fact that his Convention made a venture of faith a little more than a year ago in a certain election; your faith has been put to the test since last October. Though it may have been difficult for you at times, your steadfastness has been a source of great strength to me. Such has been your Christian charity with a green hand that I hasten to express my very sincere thanks for your patience and for your many acts of kindness to Mrs. MacAdie and to me.

Bishop Stark, faced with meeting new and taxing duties of a Diocesan, also found that he was faced with the additional burden of breaking in a and green assistant at the same time. I am deeply grateful to him, both for the measure of real responsibility he has given to me, and for the understanding and guidance he has extended to me at all times. My appreciation is extended also to my secretary, and all the members of the Cathedral House Staff. They have initiated me gracefully and painlessly into the ways and procedures of office life—ways which were unfamiliar to me.

Before speaking of several Diocesan matters I would have the Convention know that, if in future years, it should decide to eliminate the address of the Suffragan Bishop in the interest of more important matters, I would not burst into tears. The desirability of an address, other than that of the Diocesan, is highly questionable to me.

I would speak today of three or four phases of the life of our Diocesan community. In the interests of brevity and to avoid the repetition of details familiar to all, I shall touch upon only the high points.

During my 34 years as a parish priest in this Diocese, even though I was a member of many boards and committees, I was conscious of the need for better mutual flow of communications within our Diocese. For, without intending it to be so, it seemed true that many concerns of our common Diocesan family life did not get through to all of the members. With this in mind many conferences were held with the clergy and laity. The need for such communication was clearly evidenced in these informal talks, and many good suggestions were offered and adopted. The suggestion most frequently repeated was the desire for some kind of a regional grouping to be made up of clergy, laymen, laywomen, and the youth of our Church. Out of this desire came the creation by our Bishop of the present Archdeaconry system. We realized that any geographical arrangement we could devise would not be perfect. We also knew that our way would be one of experimentation for some time. To wait for geographical perfection, or a set of foolproof blue prints of program and procedures would have been to postpone our plans forever. We moved ahead, therefore, with the frank acknowledgment that as we gained experience we would probably make some changes. Our Archdeacons have been in existence now for only five months but we have had real indications of their value. Our thanks is extended to the Archdeacons, the Episcopal Churchwomen, and the Episcopal Churchmen of our Diocese, along with the Youth Committee, the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, the Diocesan Lay Readers' Guild, and others who have cooperated so willingly and enthusiastically, and without pressure. We

can make of these Archdeaconries whatever we will. Perhaps their greatest contribution can be in the realm of Christian fellowship. Neighbors have become acquainted and made aware that they share common joys and problems. No mission or parish need feel that it lives in a forgotten hinterland of the Diocese.

One of the important changed emphases in the Church has to do with the laymen. The need and the opportunity of the ministry of the layman to layman forms the basis of this changed emphasis. The philosophy behind this change is based upon the conviction that the ministry of the layman is concerned with the full life and work of the Church and is not, as in the past, an extracurricular activity on the periphery of the Christian community. We seek to strengthen the laymen's part in the regular life of the mission or parish. The role of the local Keyman is not to be a promoter of Diocesan projects solely. He is, rather, to be the channel for a two-way flow of communication in order that the local Church might be strengthened. We can see then that the "key" to the success of this work is the local Keyman. May I urge all Rectors and Vicars, who have not already done so, to appoint a Keyman now. Included on the Diocesan Laymen's Committee will be the representative of the Lay Readers' Guild, now over 250 men, and the Brotherhood of St. Andrew. We shall be working together and not at cross purposes.

If time permitted I could say much about the new interest in the Diocese in the Brotherhood of St. Andrew. About ten new local Chapters have been formed recently. We shall soon have a Diocesan Assembly. You will hear much more of this group in the near future. The Archdeaconries will afford an effective channel for all of the efforts of the Laymen's Division. These arrangements are not designed to produce a deadly uniformity but rather to provide the means of understanding and cooperation.

A large portion of our Diocese is in the city. Much thought, energy, and material are devoted to our urban work. Our new Department of Urban Work offers no quick panaceas to this situation. It is concerned with the need for constant awareness and constant study of urban Church problems. From time to time it may make recommendations to the Diocesan Convention. About 35% of our Department of Missions grants goes to urban churches. The most significant thing happening in this area of our Church life is the change in the thinking of the Church, or of large segments of it. As a young Churchman in Hudson County I can recall the prevailing philosophy of years ago. When a strong parish found itself subject to the results of an outflow of its people to the western areas of our Diocese I heard such expressions as, "Isn't it too bad for St. Swithin's? It will have to sell and move, or remain and starve to death as genteely as possible." This attitude can no longer be tolerated; it is not and never was the Christian attitude. Today large segments of our Church believe differently. We believe:

1. The Church will remain in the city. Here are many souls and here must be the ministry of Christ. This is probably our greatest missionary field today.

2. The responsibility for this great urban mission is no longer the sole burden of the local unit. It is, and must be, the responsibility of the total Church.

3. However, the local urban unit does have a great responsibility also. It must first discover itself. It must know what it is, where it is, and know this now. It must rediscover its own neighborhood. It must be prepared to have a "change of mind" if necessary and be willing, nay eager, to welcome people of other cultures and backgrounds—not to tolerate them if they come, but to seek them out in Christ's name and for His sake.

The Holy Spirit of God will operate in this city without us, or in spite of us, but He will operate more readily through us. We may well have to change geographical locations, we shall have to work out a total strategy in given areas, we shall face the need of other possible actions of which we cannot yet know. These are problems, to be sure, but since when has the Holy Spirit been absent from problems! His presence makes of the problems great opportunities for our discipleship.

Another matter should be mentioned and it can be done briefly. In 1960 we are to have a Diocesan survey. Before the new year arrives you will be informed of many details. I would stress today the fact that this will be a job of major proportions. Each of us will be involved and in no casual way. Each parish and mission will be asked to do certain things in the preparation of records, maps, and assorted information. We shall succeed in reaping the potentially great benefit from this survey only if we all do our rightful share. This will involve meetings and mailings and conferences. Be assured now that it will mean extra work for all. We would be wise, as we make plans for the coming year, to keep this in mind. Let us recall that, if successfully done, this survey may well influence the life and growth of our Church here for the next ten years. We ought to pray about it, individually and at our Altars, and then give to it our best talents.

Finally, if I may be a bit presumptuous, may I add a convention which I am sure is shared by you all. Each of these phases of Diocesan life we have mentioned will have upon that which is basic to all. Of all the elements of creativity and stability in the life of our Christian society the most effective is the continuity of our common public worship. Without this personal experience in knowing Jesus Christ our vitality and power to grow is lost. In point of fact, there has been no day in the history of the world since Pentecost on which Christians have not met somewhere to commemorate the death and rising of Jesus Christ. Whatever other successions there may be in the Church, and whatever may be their importance, this more than any other is the indispensable apostolic succession, in which the continuity of the Body in time is maintained, and in which its unbroken fellowship with the historic Jesus is assured. Through this, even in days of stress and trouble, the Christian society has within it the power of renewal. This is our heritage; let us rejoice and be glad in it!

Rules of Order

THE CONVENTION

1. The Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convention shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall record their attendance.
3. When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
4. The general procedure of the Convention shall be governed, unless otherwise provided for, by the rules of parliamentary practice as set forth in "Roberts' Rules of Order."
5. At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
6. A public address system shall be installed for use of those addressing the Convention.
7. No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
8. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it; or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment has been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
9. When any member is about to speak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
10. No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply), in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
11. If any member in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
12. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.
13. All questions shall be decided *vote voce*, unless otherwise specially ordered.
14. On the demand of five Presbyters entitled to vote, or of the Lay Deputies from five Parishes and Missions, the vote upon any question shall be by Orders, the Clergy voting individually, and the Laity by Parishes and Missions; and, when a vote is thus taken, a concurrent majority in both Orders shall be necessary to carry any measure.
15. The mode of conducting the nominations and elections of all Committees, Commissions and Diocesan Council, and Departments, and all other elective officers not otherwise provided for, shall be as follows:
 - a. The Secretary of the Convention shall send out with the notice of the time and place of the Diocesan Convention, a list of the offices to be filled by election thereat, and the names of the incumbents of these offices, whose terms expire thereat, together with an official nomination blank. Such notice shall be sent out at least one month before the date appointed for the Convention, to the Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and to each lay delegate whose name and address has been transmitted to the Secretary, as provided in Canon I.
 - b. The members of the Convention shall also be requested, in said call to send to this Committee any canon[ic]al amendments or other important items of business that they may propose to introduce at the next Convention, so that such matters may be assigned a place on the Calendar of Business. Notice of the annual Convention shall be given in THE NEWARK CHURCHMAN.

c. Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations for any office or offices to be filled at such Convention, shall at least fifteen days before the date appointed for the Convention, submit the same in writing to the Secretary thereof, together with his certificate that he has secured the consent of such person or persons to such nomination.

16. a. A Committee consisting of the Bishops, ex-officio, five other clergymen and five laymen, to be known as the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, shall be appointed at each Convention to prepare the official Ballots and the Calendar of Business, for the next Annual Convention.
b. The Committee on Elections, from the list of nominations as furnished to it by the Secretary of the Convention, shall prepare sufficient ballots marked "Sample" for each clerical and lay delegate, as certified by such Secretary, as entitled to a seat in the Convention; such ballot to be mailed by such Secretary to each such delegate at least five days before the Convention.
c. At the beginning of the opening session the committee shall report to the Convention in the form of an official ballot the names of nominees; the arrangement of such names shall be determined by lot in each order.
d. If there be any office for which no nomination has been made on the sample ballot any delegate may file with the Secretary of the Convention the name of one candidate for any such office, together with his certificate, that he has secured the consent of the person so nominated. Such nominations may be filed up to the hour of voting, and the committee of Elections shall announce the names of such nominees at the time of the distribution of the first ballot.
e. The number of consecutive terms any nominee has held the office for which he is again nominated shall be noted on the ballot, in parentheses, after his or her name. After each list of nominations as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks may be filled by any voter. On the first ballot these ballots only shall be used, and also in subsequent ballots, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. No ballot shall be counted in its class, on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled, and the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast.
17. There shall be a Committee to be known as the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions, the members of which shall be appointed at each annual convention and shall serve until the close of the next following annual convention. The Committee shall receive and consider all resolutions, except resolutions of committees accompanying committee reports recommending action of convention. The Committee shall submit its report to Convention recommending the adoption or rejection of each resolution proposed for the adoption of any such resolution as amended by the Committee. A copy of this report shall be mailed by the Secretary of Convention to each Delegate at least five days before Convention.
18. All resolutions to be considered for action by the Convention shall have been submitted in writing to the Secretary of Convention not less than thirty days in advance of the Convention and shall have been signed by a Delegate to the Convention. On the expiration of the time for submitting resolutions to the Secretary of Convention, the Secretary shall transmit to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions all resolutions submitted to him. Additional resolutions may be submitted to the Secretary of Convention after the time above specified which additional resolutions shall be transmitted immediately by the Secretary of Convention to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions but no such resolution, or such resolution as amended, shall be proposed for action by the Convention except upon a motion for the suspension of the rules duly passed.
19. All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered. It shall be the duty of the Secretary promptly to notify the members of all special committees of their appointment.
20. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.
21. Reports when submitted in Convention shall be read by title only, unless the reading be for the better transaction of business.
22. At the close of each Convention a Committee shall be appointed to review and certify the correctness of the minutes.

Calendar of Business

The Annual Convention

The Eighty-fifth Annual Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark was held on Tuesday, May 12th, Nineteen Hundred and Fifty-nine in Trinity Cathedral, Newark, New Jersey.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at eight-thirty o'clock by the Bishop of the Diocese. The Right Reverend Leland Stark, D.D. assisted by the Suffragan Bishop, the Right Reverend Donald MacAdie, D.D., who read the Gospel; the Very Reverend Robert F. McGregor, Dean of the Cathedral, who read the Epistle; and Canon Richard O. Williams.

The Bishop read the names of the Bishops of the Church, the Clergy of the Diocese, and Laity of the Parishes and Missions, who departed this life to become members of the Church Expectant during the past Convention year, and commended them to the prayers of the congregation during the Communion Service.

The morning session of the Convention was called to order at nine-forty o'clock with the Right Reverend, the Bishop of Newark, in the Chair.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ELECTIONS AND RULES OF ORDER TO THE 85TH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK

In accordance with Article II, Section 1 of the Diocesan Constitution, Bishop Stark called the 85th Diocesan Convention to be held on May 12, 1959 in Trinity Cathedral, Newark.

The Committee, through the Secretary of Convention, has arranged for luncheon at the Cathedral House for all Convention personnel. A Diocesan dinner will be held tonight in the grand ballroom of the Robert Treat Hotel at 6:00 p.m. The speaker will be the Rt. Rev. Anson Phelps Stokes, Jr., D.D., Bishop of Massachusetts. Arrangements for this dinner have been in the able hands of the Rev. O. Wesley Shike and Mr. William E. Dodd.

The Committee requested the Secretary of Convention to prepare the Official Ballot.

The Committee recommends the adoption of the 1958 Calendar of Business with certain minor changes, to wit:

The Introduction of Resolutions of New Matter shall follow immediately after the Report of the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order.

The Bishop's Address shall occupy the position of the Bishop Coadjutor's address in 1958.

The Suffragan Bishop's Address shall be inserted after the Annual Elections.

The report heretofore titled "Woman's Auxiliary" shall be titled "Episcopal Churchwomen, Diocese of Newark", and that heretofore titled "Committee on Laymen's Work" shall be titled "Episcopal Churchmen, Diocese of Newark".

The Committee recommends that the present Rule No. 11 be rewritten as follows:

"There shall be a Committee to be known as the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions, the members of which shall be appointed at each annual convention and shall serve until the close of the next following annual convention. The Committee shall receive and consider all resolutions, except resolutions of committees accompanying committee reports recommending action of convention. The Committee shall submit its report to convention recommending the adoption or rejection of each resolution proposed or the adoption of any such resolution as amended by the Committee. A copy of this report shall be mailed by the Secretary of Convention to each Delegate at least five days before Convention".

The Committee recommends that the present rule No. 18 be rewritten as follows:

"All resolutions to be considered for action by the Convention shall have been submitted in writing to the Secretary of Convention not less than thirty days in advance of the Convention and shall have been signed by a Delegate to the Convention. On the expiration of the time for submitting resolutions to the Secretary of Convention, the Secretary shall transmit to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions all resolutions submitted to him. Additional resolutions may be submitted to the Secretary of Convention after the time above specified, which additional resolutions shall be transmitted immediately by the Secretary of Convention to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions, but no such resolution, or such resolution as amended, shall be proposed for action by the Convention except upon a motion for the suspension of the rules duly passed".

The Committee recommends that the Rules of Order be re-arranged and re-numbered by the Secretary of Convention so as to establish a more orderly and logical sequence.

With the increase in the Assessment by General Convention and "The Newark Churchman", Mr. Page moved the adoption of the following resolution which was duly seconded and adopted:

WHEREAS the Diocesan Council is directed by Canon 5, Section 4 (d), to provide for an assessment on the Parishes and Missions to meet the administrative expenses of the Diocese, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Convention approve the proposed budget for 1960, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Diocesan Council be hereby directed to evy an assessment on Parishes and Missions of the Diocese at such rate as to over the amount of \$150,150.00.

Mr. Page next presented the 1960 Budget for the Program of the Diocese and the Church At Large. (*See Reports of Convention*).

Mr. Page moved the adoption of the following resolution which was duly seconded and adopted:

WHEREAS the Diocesan Council is charged with the responsibility of preparing a budget covering the requested missionary and benevolent requirements of the Diocese and Gnara Church for the ensuing calendar year, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Convention approve the 1960 budget as proposed by the Diocesan Council, and

WHEREAS Canon 4, Section 6(d), of General Convention provides that in each Diocese a definite financial objective shall be allotted to each Parish and Mission as its share of the Program of the Church, therefore

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Diocesan Council be authorized to designate the quota for each Parish and Mission based upon the average amount of its current expenses for the past three years.

The Bishop welcomed the retired Bishop of Newark, the Right Reverend Benjamin M. Washburn, D.D., to the Convention.

The Reverend Alfred J. Miller, Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, presented the following proposed amendment to Article II, Section 11 of the Constitution of the Diocese of Newark. Necessary, adoption at two consecutive Conventions. After being duly seconded, it was adopted for the second time.

At each Annual Convention a Treasurer and an Assistant Treasurer shall be elected to serve until the next Annual Convention. Each shall give satisfactory security for the faithful performance of his duties.

The Treasurer shall be entitled to a seat in the Convention and shall submit a statement of his accounts to each Annual Convention.

The Assistant Treasurer shall perform such duties as may be assigned to him by the Treasurer of the Convention.

In case the Treasurer die, resign, remove from the Diocese or otherwise be incapable of acting, the Assistant Treasurer shall, on certification of the Ecclesiastical Authority, assume all of the duties and powers of the Treasurer, until such time as the Treasurer shall resume his duties or a successor be elected or appointed. The Ecclesiastical Authority may fill a vacancy in the office of Treasurer or Assistant Treasurer.

The Reverend Mr. Miller then moved the following resolution which was carried to implement the preceding action of the Convention.

"Resolved that unanimous consent be given to the election of an Assistant Treasurer of the Convention by voice vote, dispensing with the requirement of a vote by ballot".

Mrs. Virginia T. Grabyne was nominated and elected as Assistant Treasurer of the Convention.

The Venerable Sydney E. Grant announced that Christ Hospital, Jersey City has an excellent school for Nurses, and that descriptive pamphlets were available to members of the Convention.

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions recommended the adoption of the following resolution which was presented by the Venerable Chester E. Falby, Rector of St. Agnes', Little Falls. After duly being seconded, it was adopted.

WHEREAS, under and by virtue of certain sections of Title 16 of the Revised Statutes of the State of New Jersey, relating to corporations and associations, religious, provision is made for the time and place of the Annual Parish Meeting of incorporated Parishes of the Protestant Episcopal Church, said sections being as follows:

16:18-1 Incorporation; Meeting

This section relates to the incorporation of any congregation or parish of the Protestant Episcopal Church and provides that at a meeting wherein the congregation determines to become incorporated, the meeting shall determine among other things:

"b. The date of the annual meeting, which shall be some secular day in the week beginning with the first Sunday in Advent."

16:18-2 Certificate;

This section relates to the Certificate of Incorporation and provides, among other things, that the Certificate shall state:

"c. The day fixed for the annual meeting."

16:18-10 Annual Parish Election;

This section relates, among other things, of the Annual Parish Election, and with reference thereto, provides as follows:

"The annual election of any such parish incorporated after March twentieth, one thousand nine hundred and one, shall be held on such secular day in the week commencing with the first Sunday in Advent as may be designated in its certificate of incorporation, and of any such parish incorporated prior to March twentieth, one thousand nine hundred and one, on the day fixed by its charter of certificate of incorporation, but if no date shall have been so fixed, then on the Monday following the first Sunday in Advent. Notice of the time and place of the annual election shall be given by advertisement set up in open view at the door of the Church or usual place of worship, ten days prior to the election and shall also be read by the Rector or officiating minister on the two Sundays next preceding the election, in time of public service."

WHEREAS; the parochial and financial reports of the great majority of the Parishes of the Diocese of Newark are prepared and submitted on a calendar year basis, including the Financial Report of the Parish and the Parochial Report of the Rector; and

WHEREAS; the budgets of such parishes are on a calendar year basis and as such are generally used as a matter of information in the Every Member Canvass; and

WHEREAS; the Diocesan Apportionment of the Parishes is calculated upon the financial statements of the Parishes; and

WHEREAS; notwithstanding the religious significance of the Season of Advent, which presumably motivated the legislature to provide for holding the Annual Parish Meeting on a secular day in the week commencing with the first Sunday in Advent, it is the considered opinion of this Convention that each Parish should have the opportunity of determining a day other than a secular day in the week commencing with the first Sunday in Advent for the Annual Parish Meeting and Election.

Now, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Diocesan Council be authorized and directed to take such action as may be necessary to the end that the statutes of the State of New Jersey be amended to provide for the annual parish meeting to be held on such day of the year as the individual parishes may determine.

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions recommended that the following resolution presented by the Diocese of Newark's Deputation to the 1958 General Convention, and the Diocese's Nuclear Reactor Committee:

WHEREAS, the 1958 General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church adopted a resolution providing for the gift of a nuclear reactor to be given to St. Paul's University and St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, in connection with the One Hundredth Anniversary of the planting in Japan of what has become a sister National Church of the Protestant Episcopal Church, and

Now, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Eighty-fifth Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark does hereby endorse the proposal of the General Convention to make such gift, and does commend to the various parishes and missions of this Diocese and to their congregations, their earnest consideration and support of this undertaking to the end that the Diocese of Newark may participate in this project to the full extent of its proportionate share.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Diocese of Newark assume the sum of \$10,000 as its proportionate share of the \$860,000 required for this purchase.

be amended in the third paragraph to read —

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Diocese of Newark undertake to raise the sum of at least \$10,000 as its proportionate share of the \$360,000 required for this purchase.

After duly being seconded, it was adopted as amended.

A telegram of greetings from the Diocese of Western New York assembled in Convention was read to the Convention by the Bishop. A similar telegram was sent by the Diocese of Newark assembled in Convention to the Diocese of Western New York.

A resolution presented by the Reverend Ivan H. Partridge, Rector of All Saints', Glen Rock, dealing with the pledges of lay people who move from one parish to another, along with the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions' amendment and recommendation was lost.

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions request that it be discharged from further consideration of the resolution presented by the Reverend Robert Kirchgesned, Rector of the Church of the Ascension, Bogota, dealing with the formation of a Parish Christian Social Relations Committee was carried.

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions recommended the adoption of the following resolution which was presented by the Reverend Ivan H. Partridge, Rector of All Saints', Glen Rock. After duly being seconded, it was carried.

WHEREAS by direction of this Convention its Journal carries a list of clergy stipends and other information, and

WHEREAS this information may be misleading due to time lapse, incomplete reports and the lack of full information about certain considerations involved,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this Convention directs its Secretary to discontinue publishing this information, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Convention directs that this resolution notwithstanding, this information shall be collected as far as possible and made available to the Bishop and such other persons as he may direct.

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions presented the following substitute for a resolution which was presented by the Reverend Ivan H. Partridge of All Saints', Glen Rock, and recommended the adoption of the substitute resolution. After duly being seconded, it was adopted.

WHEREAS the Diocese of Newark is comprised of an area in which average income and the cost of living index are above the national average, and

WHEREAS a table of median salaries paid in each diocese (published in "The Living Church") indicates that the Diocese of Newark is among the lower half of all dioceses in this respect, and

WHEREAS published figures with regard to clergy salaries and allowances appear to reveal grave inequities,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this Convention requests their Bishop to appoint a Commission consisting of not less than three laymen and three presbyters to study the matter of clergy stipends and related considerations and to prepare a report upon the following matters:

1. The true picture of remuneration received by the clergy in the Diocese of Newark.
2. Suggestions and/or formulas as to how vestries and executive committees may arrive at just and equitable salaries.
3. Ways and means of encouraging parishes and missions not presently paying adequate stipends to do so.
4. Such other facts and suggestions as may seem to the Commission to be relevant to a full understanding of the matter of clergy salaries in this Diocese, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Commission submit a report in writing to the Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark in 1960 together with resolutions covering such action as the Commission deems it advisable for this Convention to take.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Commission prepare an interim report on points two and three (above) to be sent, if approved by the Diocesan Council, to all clergy, vestries and executive committees of this Diocese as soon as possible.

The Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions request that it be discharged from further consideration of a resolution presented by the Reverend Franklin Y. Weller at the morning session dealing with a request for a fuller breakdown of the Diocesan Council Budget Items in the future was carried by the Convention's refusing to suspend the rules of order.

- 7-8 Salaries and social security for 4 secretaries, office manager, 2 bookkeepers, 2 general clerical, and switchboard operator. Based on local area salary survey, increase will bring salaries more in line with salary scales offered outside.
- 12 Printing costs represent greatest portion of total expenditure. Increase will allow for limited replacement of obsolescent office equipment.
- 14 Fidelity bond insuring the Diocese and all churches thereof. Indemnity—\$5,000.00, each person.
- 16 Includes luncheon for Convention delegates, printing, amplifying system and other Convention expenses.
- 18 Increase restores salary to former amount paid to Secretary of Convention.
- 22 Additional amount to provide funding for employees with long past-service to the Diocese. This will prevent recurrence of situation at time of retirement of former custodian.

EXPLANATORY NOTES ON ADOPTED 1960 BUDGET FOR THE PROGRAM OF THE DIOCESE AND THE CHURCH AT LARGE

- 1 \$80,000. included for land purchase and new work now necessary with exhaustion of Grant Fund of E.A.F. Increase also allows for \$800. expense stipend for each of 8 new Archdeacons.
 - 2 Includes modest salary increase for Executive Secretary of Department.
 - 4 General Program increase to provide for expenses Department will incur in preparation of Manual on Wills and Bequests, clergy news bulletin, etc.
- The Newark Churchman* transferred to Assessment Budget by Diocesan Council.
- 5 For General Program. Large cut from 1959 Convention Budget accounted for by assumption of specific item of urban work by Department of Missions.
 - 6 Diocesan transfer of property title to Bonnie Brae Farm considered a continuing contribution. Further monetary support not indicated.
 - 8 Increase considered essential in view of continually increasing demand for services of clergy in 18 colleges and universities within the Diocese. Amount is barely adequate to defray expenses incurred by clergy in connection with assigned college and university work.
 - 9 Eagle's Nest Farm and Holiday House are a Diocesan summer camp for youth and a Diocesan summer conference center, respectively. Budget proposal is to cover caretaker's salary, insurance on camp and Holiday House properties, etc.
 - 10 1960 will represent fifth and last payment to G.F.S. by Diocese in exchange for the Diocese's clear ownership of Holiday House.
 - 11 Necessary upward salary adjustments for staff of the House of the Holy Comforter, Diocesan Home for Aging Women, account for increase.
 - 13 Our share in cooperative work includes two new items: \$1,700. for our share of Council's new Department of Research and Field Study and \$865. for Radio and TV work.
 - 14 Y.O.S. is a social case work agency of the Diocese offering counselling services to young people and their parents. Total budget for 1960 is \$110,450. toward which the \$17,000. proposed Diocesan grant will be applied.
 - 15 Note that increase in total for Diocesan program is \$38,075. over working budget of 1959, of which \$30,000. is for new missionary work within Diocese.
 - 16 1960 General Convention budget for \$8,996,400. against 1959 budget of \$8,060,800. Higher budget includes \$500,000. for capital expenditures by National Council. Our 1960 quota is increased by \$25,089.

(Further note on 16: 1958 Diocesan Convention adopted a sum of \$241,178. as estimated 1959 quota for the church at large; subsequent General Convention action adopted a budget which reduced Diocesan quota to \$210,760.; hence this latter figure is included in first column.)

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1958

There were eight meetings of the Standing Committee held during 1958.

JANUARY 27th

Roy Joseph Hendricks and John Lawrence Denny were recommended for Ordination to the Diaconate.

Bishop Washburn reported that his resignation as Bishop of the Diocese of Newark, effective November 1, 1958, had been approved by a majority of the members of the House of Bishops. The Bishop requested the election of a Suffragan Bishop. The Standing Committee authorized the sending of a letter to the Bishops and Standing Committees asking consent to the election of a Suffragan Bishop.

MARCH 14th

Wesley Hugh Smith was recommended to the Bishop for acceptance as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

Consent was given to St. Mark's Church, Mendham to mortgage property to the First National Iron Bank of Morristown for a sum not exceeding \$25,000.

Consent was given to the Church of the Epiphany, Allendale, to form a parish, the Bishop also giving his approval.

Consent was granted the Department of Missions to transfer their rectory property to the Church of the Ascension, Bogota, presently a parish.

Consent was granted to the Department of Missions to mortgage the property of St. Luke's Church, Haworth, for \$70,000 to the County Trust Company of Tenafly.

Consent was given to the Ordination and Consecration of the Very Rev'd James Albert Pike as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of California and to the Very Rev'd John Henry Esquivel as Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Connecticut.

The Secretary of the Standing Committee reported that Consent to the election of a Suffragan Bishop for the Diocese had been received from a majority of the Bishops and Standing Committees. Bishop Washburn then requested the advice of the Committee on the calling of a special Convention. The Committee approved.

MAY 19th

This being the organization meeting of the Standing Committee, the former officers were re-elected for the ensuing year, namely the Rev'd Eric M. Tasman, President, and the Ven. W. O. Lealle, Jr., Secretary.

Consent was granted to St. Stephen's Church, Jersey City, to mortgage certain property to the Provident Institution for Savings for the sum of \$15,000.

Consent was granted to the Department of Missions to mortgage certain property of the Church of the Transfiguration, Towaco, to the Corporation for the Relief of Widows and Children, Etc. for the sum of \$11,500.

Consent was granted to the Department of Missions to mortgage certain property of the Church of the Atonement, Fair Lawn, to the Corporation for the Relief of Widows and Children for the sum of not more than \$25,000.

A report was made that Consent had been given by circularization to St. Thomas' Church, Lyndhurst, to mortgage their church property to the National Community Bank of Rutherford for \$80,000 and to mortgage their rectory property to the same bank for the sum of \$10,000.

Consent was given to the election of the Rt. Rev. Harry Lee Doll as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Maryland.

The following were recommended to the Bishop for Ordination to the Diaconate, namely: Frederick Tuttle Bender, Alfred Wise Burlingame, Stephen James Chinlund, William Alan King, Victor Oliver Beigel, Jr., and Frederick John Warnecke, Jr.

The Secretary was authorized to send out requests to the Standing Committees of the various Dioceses, seeking Consent to the Ordination and Consecration of the Rev'd Donald MacAulie as Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Newark.

The Standing Committee gave approval to the Bishop's consent to the Rev'd Guy Madara to continue as Priest-in-Charge of St. Mark's, Paterson, to September 1, 1959, and to the Rev'd James McKensie to continue as Priest-in-charge of the Church of Our Saviour, Secaucus, to September 1, 1959.

Messrs. Adrian O. Minton and Edward Markle were re-elected to the Board of Trustees of the Diocesan Investment Trust.

JUNE 28rd

Consent was granted to St. Luke's Church, Montclair, to mortgage certain property to the Montclair National Bank and Trust Company for the sum of \$7,000.

Consent was granted to the Department of Missions to mortgage property of the Church of The Saviour, Denville, to the Morristown Trust Company for the sum of \$50,000 and property of Christ Church, Midland Park, to the Citizens First National Bank and Trust Company of Ridgewood for the sum of \$25,000, the vicarage property of St. Mark's, Teaneck, to the Peoples Trust Company of Bergen County in the amount of \$18,000 and property of St. Mary's Sparta, to the Sussex County Trust Company for the sum of \$37,500.

Mr. Edwin Ball and Mr. Charles E. Keller, Jr. were recommended to the Bishop for admission as Candidates for Holy Orders.

Consent was given to the Ordination and Consecration of the Very Rev'd Roger Wilson Blanchard as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Southern Ohio, the Rev'd Francis William Lickfield as Bishop of the Diocese of Quincy and to the Diocese of Washington to elect a Bishop Coadjutor.

SEPTEMBER 8rd

Consent was granted to St. John's Church, Boonton, to mortgage certain property to the Boonton-Mountain Lakes Savings and Loan Association for the sum of \$10,000.

The Rev'd John Lawrence Denny and the Rev'd Roy Joseph Hendricks were recommended to the Bishop for Ordination to the Priesthood.

It was reported that Consent had been granted by circularization to the Department of Missions to mortgage property of St. Mark's Church, Teaneck, to the Corporation for the Relief of Widows and Children for the sum of \$20,000. Previous Consent granted to mortgage the vicarage property of this church was rescinded.

The Standing Committee gave approval to the Rev'd Carolus Webb to serve as part time assistant at Christ Church, Short Hills, he having resigned as rector of the Church of the Incarnation, East Orange, having attained the age of seventy-two.

Consent was granted to St. Luke's Church, Phillipsburg, to sell their present rectory property for the sum of \$9,500.

It was reported that Consent to the Ordination and Consecration of the Rev'd Donald MacAdie as Suffragan Bishop had been received from fifty-seven Standing Committees and that a letter from the Presiding Bishop stated that as of August 12th he had received Consent from eighty-six Bishops.

Consent was given to the Ordination and Consecration of the Rev'd David Shepherd Rose as Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Southern Virginia.

Dr. Christian A. Hovde was recommended to the Bishop for admission as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

OCTOBER 20th

Consent was granted to the Church of the Holy Communion, Paterson, to mortgage their church and rectory property for \$14,000 to the Howard Savings Institution for ten years with interest not exceeding 5¼%.

Consent was granted to St. Paul's Church, Montvale, to mortgage their new church property to the First National Bank of Park Ridge for \$85,000.

Consent was granted to St. Mark's Church, Mendham, to mortgage certain property to the First National Iron Bank of Morristown for \$25,000.

Consent was granted to the Department of Missions to sell a portion of the St. Mary's Sparta, property to Patrick P. Brady for \$14,500.

Consent was granted to the Department of Missions to transfer the un-mortgaged portion of the property of the Church of the Epiphany, Allendale, to the new parish corporation.

A resolution relative to the death of Mr. William T. Kirk, a member of the Standing Committee, was adopted.

NOVEMBER 21st

The following Deacons were recommended to the Bishop for Ordination to the Priesthood, namely Alfred Wise Burlingame, Stephan James Chinlund, William Alan King and Victor Oliver Reigel, Jr.

Consent was granted to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund to sell property at 691 Berkeley Avenue, Orange, for the sum of \$22,000.

Consent was granted to the Department of Missions to mortgage the property of St. Andrew's Church, Lincoln Park, to the First National Bank and Trust Company of Paterson, for a total not more than \$86,000 and to mortgage certain property of the Church of the Incarnation, West Milford, to the Corporation for the Relief of Widows and Children of Clergymen for \$18,000.

Bishop Stark reported that the Chancellor of the Diocese, Mr. Josiah Stryker, had asked to be relieved of his duties as Chancellor and that he proposed to appoint Mr. Charles W. Kappes, Jr. as his successor. Mr. Kappes, therefore, presented his resignation as a member of the Standing Committee which was accepted with sincere regret and appreciation for the work that he had done for the Committee.

DECEMBER 29th

Consent was granted to the Department of Missions to mortgage the property of St. Michael's, Wayne, for \$50,000 to the New Jersey Bank and Trust Company of Paterson for a period of fifteen years with interest at 6%.

Consent was granted to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund to mortgage property of Christ Church, Stanhope, to the Citizens National Bank of Newburg for \$86,000 for fifteen years with interest at 4%.

Consent was granted to the Department of Missions to sell the former St. Luke's, Dumont property to Mr. Robert Peterson for \$7,600.

Consent was given to the Ordination and Consecration of the Very Rev'd Allan Webster Brown as Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Albany.

The following men were recommended to the Bishop for admission as Candidates for Holy Orders, namely Gregory G. Cartotto, August Donald Wisnizer, Joseph D. Herring, Jr., Robert S. Phipps, Jr. and Alva G. Decker.

Consent was granted to St. John's Church, Dover, to mortgage their rectory property for \$12,500 to the Dover Trust Company for one year with interest at 4%.

The Rev'd James D. Schultze was recommended to the Bishop for Ordination to the Priesthood.

There being two vacancies on the Standing Committee, Mr. John S. Foster was elected for the term ending in 1960 and Mr. William C. Young in the class of 1961.

THE DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS

April 13, 1959

To The Convention of The Diocese of Newark:

The Department of Missions submits the following summary of its activities during the calendar year 1958. Nine regular meetings were held with the Rt. Rev'd Benjamin M. Waaburn, D.D., Bishop, presiding at five. The Rt. Rev'd Leland Stark, D.D., presided as Bishop Coadjutor at two meetings and at the final meetings in November and December as Bishop of the Diocese.

As of December 31, 1957 there were 37 mission churches and five aided parishes, and during the following year the Department was presented problems of varying degree from 21 of them. All matters presented were given careful consideration, and the agenda of the nine meetings was heavy. The minutes of the nine meetings cover the Department's considerations and actions in detail, and only the most important actions will be presented below.

Coytesville - Saint Stephen's

The population growth in and around Coytesville accentuated the inadequate facilities of this mission. The need for a new church and expanded parish hall facilities was clearly evidenced, and repairs to the vicarage were needed. This last matter was taken care of, and a committee of the Department met with the executive and building committees of the mission to discuss the major problem of a new church building. An architect was retained to draw up plans and specifications for the new church. Preliminary plans were presented with an estimated cost of \$88,000 plus 8% architect's fee or a total of \$95,040. No action was taken regarding financing because the project had not advanced sufficiently at the close of 1958.

Denville - Church of the Saviour

During the summer of 1958 contracts for the building of the church were signed and work began and proceeded favorably. The contract price was \$181,236. In addition, a contract to complete the site work was signed. The cost of this work was \$15,568. In the fall the question of a parish house was considered and the Department authorized construction of this building at a cost not to exceed \$27,000.

Haworth - Saint Luke's

The new church for St. Luke's Mission was erected on the new property in Haworth in 1957, and the property vacated in Dumont was put up for sale. Complications because of zoning ordinance arose, and at the close of 1958 the property had not been sold. However, if a variance can be obtained, a probable buyer is at hand. The Department approved plans for a new vicarage for the mission, the old vicarage having been sold.

Jersey City - Incarnation

Considerable rehabilitation work on the property of this mission was necessary, and the Department proceeded on a cost-plus basis to place the property in good repair. It was estimated that the work could be done for about \$10,000. The mission itself conducted a campaign to raise funds for the work, and pledges aggregating \$15,690 were received.

Livingston - Saint Peter's

Livingston has grown tremendously in population, and the present church is entirely inadequate. A special committee of the Department has met with the executive committee of this mission to discuss means of obtaining the \$160,000 estimated to be necessary for the construction of a new church. A fund raising organization has been retained, and a campaign will be undertaken to raise money for the building program. When the results of this campaign are available, the committee of the Department and the proper committee of the mission will meet to further discuss and plan for the new church.

Midland Park - Christ Chapel

The needs for a new parish house for this mission were clearly put before the Department. This mission reported a church school of 275 children and 218 families on the parish list. The mission had a fund raising campaign, and \$51,000 had been pledged. With assistance from the Episcopal Advance Fund the new parish hall was started.

Ridgefield - Saint James'**Palisades Park - Redeemer**

These two missions have consolidated and are presently meeting at Saint James' in Ridgefield. The property of Redeemer, Palisades Park, is to be sold, with the proceeds to be set aside for the improvement or enlargement of the facilities of the consolidated mission.

Sparta - Saint Mary's

In last year's report the purchase of new property aggregating 8.3 acres of land was mentioned. Contracts were let in 1958 for the building of a new church and parish house on this site. Work progressed favorably, and the new Church will be ready for occupancy after the first of the year. The building of a new vicarage was referred to a special committee, and plans for the sale of the old property were laid.

Tennoch - Saint Mark's

A successful campaign for funds to erect a new parish house was undertaken by this mission and resulted in pledges totaling \$70,000. With the aid of the Episcopal Advance Fund finances were arranged, and construction of the new building was started.

Towaco - Transfiguration

A new vicarage was erected at this mission.

Wayne Township - Saint Michael's

Last year's report mentioned the growth of this Township and the fact that a special committee of the Department was appointed to search for and purchase suitable land for a new mission. The new mission working under the disadvantage of meeting in a high school cafeteria nevertheless under the leadership of their vicar, the Rev'd William F. Strain, undertook a fund-raising campaign which resulted in pledges of \$75,000 being received. A two step program was developed, and on the first portion of the program bids were obtained. The lowest bid was \$160,058 and at the close of 1958 it seemed possible to arrange finances, again with Episcopal Advance Fund aid so that work could commence.

West Milford - Incarnation

This mission had no vicarage, and inadequate quarters were being rented at \$125 per month. A committee of the Department studied the situation carefully and recommended that a vicarage be built. Bids were obtained, and the Department authorized the building of a vicarage to cost \$21,448.

Oakland and Franklin Lakes Area

In this area which has no Episcopal Church the growth in population has been large, and the Department was advised there were 80 or 40 Episcopal families residing there. At the last meeting in 1958 the Bishop appointed a committee to conduct a survey and seek available land for church purposes and report back.

Budget

The following budget for 1959 was submitted to the Finance Committee of the Diocese with the request that it be included in the 1959 Convention budget.

Later, because of the necessity of reducing the Convention budget, the Diocesan Council appropriated the sum of \$125,750 for 1959.

In 1958 a great deal was accomplished but, as usual, several worthy projects were postponed because of lack of funds. Grants and loans from the Episcopal Advance Fund again made possible much of the forward progress in the mission field of the Diocese.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Diocese of Newark

Report for 1958

"We (the diocesan Department of Christian Education) exist in an advisory evaluating, and training capacity with no intention of prescribing any set, official party line. While we set our standards toward what we would like to see as a more satisfactory and effective manner of dealing with Christian Education, yet we must be realistic in seeing the situation as it actually exists with all the normal, human limitations taken into consideration . . . Being aware of the fact that Christian Education deals with the entire range of ages, not just Church School age."—are two excerpts from the presentation of our Chairman, the Ven. Welles R. Bliss to the day long meeting of the Department in June 1958 as it evaluated its program.

This statement of purpose and the result of the Strategy and Planning Conference held at Syracuse under the leadership of officers of the National Department helped in making the efforts of the Department for 1958 more definitive in its three functioning committees of Adult, Church School, and Youth.

ADULT COMMITTEE

The Rev. George R. Dawson, *Chairman*

A memorial was presented to the Diocesan Council's attention the thorough study which this Committee had made on 'evangelism' filed their report on the subject and offered their facilities of trained personnel, and techniques with respect to any future endeavors of a diocesan wide nature that might be undertaken in the future.

In order to enlarge the list of skilled 'resources' persons it approved and backed six (6) enrollees in the Church and Group Life Laboratory Program. Only three took the training as two of the laboratories were cancelled.

Two (2) laymen went to Bloomington, Indiana for training in the Indiana Plan; Five (5) in the diocese now have such training; four (4) parish programs were running on this basis in 1958.

In cooperation with the Diocese of New York it used their new Bishop Donegan Episcopal Conference Center for a follow-through on Laboratories, and for the accommodation of Newark Clergy to experience a Parish Life Conference. We are appreciative of this opportunity offered by our neighboring diocese. There are some things that it is natural for us to do together in this metropolitan region.

Considerable thought was given to the various types of program available for adults—Parish Life Conference (PLC), Parish Life Mission (PLM) and Parish Life Institute (PLI). Each has a particular purpose and is efficacious for the end it is to achieve, and the the situation to which it is applied. In order to have better understanding of these instruments of help to parishes, train adequate personnel, and become more familiar with their use, a special conference of the whole Committee was arranged with Miss Joanna Mott, Executive Secretary of the Adult Division of the National Department. Considerable clarification has and is taking place.

One Parish Life Mission has taken place where ten (10) clergy with Church and Group Life Laboratory background, (a pre-requisite) were trained in 'on the job' observation of this particular program. The people involved are now in the process of evaluating it, with the intent to offer it for use in those situations to which it is applicable.

One Parish Life Conference for lay people was attended by 37 people from 7 parishes. Another is projected this coming spring May 1-2-3, 1959. This is the quickest way of developing a group of people in a parish deeply concerned about the 'inner mission' of the Church.

Conferences were held with the diocesan leadership of the Episcopal Church Women (formerly the W.A. - Woman's Auxiliary) so that a clearer understanding of what educational people are talking about might be better understood.

The Princeton Conference was held in co-operation with the dioceses of New York as well as New Jersey. A good conference although the enrollment was disappointing in numbers.

The Chairman and the Executive Secretary observed Canon Ernest Southcott for a whole week at the Church of the Intercession, New York with his demonstration of his 'house Church movement'. They reported back their evaluations.

CHURCH SCHOOL COMMITTEE

The Rev. A. Wayne Schwab, *Chairman*

Beginning with the assumption that you can do nothing important for young persons unless you do something for the adults that touch their lives, and you can only begin with the people ready to do more serious work. The Educational Fellow.

ship (now named The Educational Forum) was evolved to provide a medium for sharing problems and various approaches to their solutions. Some eighty or more persons from about thirty-five parishes participated in some seven meetings in the calendar year 1958. (Two meetings were overnight at Tuxedo Park, N. Y.) And the program is continuing. We quote the Chairman's observations made in his October 15th report:

"Task is evangelism in sense of deeper hearing of the Gospel—not in sense of more people and more programs . . . No sound educational program without a sound training program. That program is focused on training of teachers as Christian persons, not as 'textbooks wired for sound'. 'Deeper hearing' occurs on the level of attitude. Life speaks to life more deeply than to propositions. In short, we are now realizing resources are not in books but in the teacher. This puts teachers on resources he usually does not have. Teacher training should be slanted towards training the whole person of the teacher. This type of training can be effected only by the Parish. It is in the local Parish that the Good News is ever really proclaimed, received and lived out".

A questionnaire on the Guild of the Christ Child was sent out and the weighing of the returns is being processed.

A further Questionnaire on Liturgical Practices in Parishes in connection with Family Services was put out by the Department and had an immediate response with over 100 parishes replying. The results are still being carefully evaluated. Consultation has been had with leaders of the National Department and with liturgical scholars, and some aspects of the question may be on the agenda of the 1959 Clergy Conference.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

1958-1959

To the Members of the Diocesan Convention:

I would like to highlight three areas of the Department's work.

The first area is that of its work in the legislative field. In order to stimulate our people to more fully exercise their Christian citizenship, the Department issued a Legislative Bulletin in March. It dealt with a few of the bills before Congress and the Legislature—bills in which human welfare was especially involved. And in order that the legislators might not only hear from Episcopalians by letter, but also in person, the Department organized and sponsored its second Legislative Caravan to Trenton on April 18. On that date over 150 men and women from our parishes and missions went to the State House to speak personally with their representatives in government. Not only did they talk with their representatives but also, as a group, they expressed their concern personally to the Governor in an interview. Bishop MacAdie lead the Caravan this year and presented the members to The Assembly and to The Governor. Apparently we set a precedent last year in sponsoring such a Caravan for the United Church Women of New Jersey has sponsored one this year—and the New Jersey Council of Churches is considering sponsoring one next year. So you see through the efforts of our Department and through the efforts of concerned Episcopalians throughout the Diocese, Christian opinion is being presented in places where decisions are in the process of being made.

On Saturday, May 16, the Department is sponsoring a Conference on The Church and Human Relations to be held in Trinity Cathedral and Cathedral House. This promises to be another outstanding conference such as those sponsored by our Department in recent years on "Problems on the Aging" and "The Church and Freedom". One of the three principal speakers is The Rev. James A. Gunweller, rector of St. Matthew's and St. Timothy's Church, New York City. As many of you know, this young priest is the 20th Century crusader for social justice in the housing situation in New York City today. Mr. Lester B. Granger, an Episcopalian, who is Executive Director of the National Urban League and Vice President of The International Conference on Social Work, will speak on "Our Human Relations Problems in a World Perspective". Mr. Granger is especially well qualified to do this as he has just returned from a world tour. He has travelled widely over the years observing social welfare and political conditions with special attention to conditions in under-developed areas. Our third principal speaker is Mr. Louis Webster Jones, one of the Nation's leading educators and President of Rutgers University from 1951 to 1958. Mr. Jones will speak on "Meeting Our Human Relations Problems". He is well able to do this as he is President of The National Conference of Christians and Jews, also Chairman of General Convention's Joint Commission on Reconstruction. This Conference has a record of outstanding achievement in the field of human relations over the past thirty years. The Discussion group topics indicate the scope of the Conference. Some of them are: human relations in regard to housing, the urban church, civil rights legislation and human relations techniques for the parish. We are fortunate in having as chairman of the Conference, Mr. Harold Lett, an Episcopalian who is Assistant Director of the Division Against Discrimination, Dept. of Education of the State of N. J.

In order to stimulate more activity in Christian Social Relations in the parishes and missions of the Diocese, The Department this year is issuing for the first time a C.S.R. Bulletin to the clergy and C.S.R. chairmen of our churches. The Department plans to issue the Bulletin three or four times a year. Several other dioceses have such a bulletin and find it an invaluable channel of communication for national and diocesan C.S.R. news.

In closing, I would like to say we are indeed fortunate to have had such fine leadership on our Committees during this past year. We are most grateful for the wise counseling of Bishop MacAdie, and the splendid team work of the members of our Department in carrying out our program.

DEPARTMENT OF PROMOTION

TO THE 85th ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK:

The Department of Promotion, in an effort to strengthen the communications within the Diocese, reappraised its policy and came to the conclusion that, in addition to the job the Department has been doing the last years it should also attempt to become a channel of information between the Diocese and the Parishes and Missions which channel is to be open both ways.

We hope to have meetings in the fall based on the geographical units of the Arch-deaconry. The Department also organized and actually physically helped in some canvass efforts of smaller churches with very excellent results. We expect to have more requests for such help which does not consist purely of advising but actual participation in the work of the canvass.

The Department has also endeavored to bring about a greater understanding on the theology of giving through work not only of the Committee on Every Member Canvass, but its Committee on Stewardship. This whole program is still a most important aspect of the work of the Department. The Department is becoming progressively more aware that this should not be the only aspect.

We have also arranged for meetings of smaller groups of clergy with the Suffragan Bishop. Twelve such meetings were held. Both Bishop MacAdie and the clergy say that they were most helpful.

The Department also is preparing publication of a newsheet which is sent to all the clergy of the Diocese containing information which we hope is helpful in all aspects of the Diocesan life. Bishop Pardue's sermon on the occasion of the Consecration of the Suffragan Bishop was printed and copies have been sent to the Parishes and Missions. More copies are still available.

The Radio-TV Committee has sought to strengthen the membership of the Committee by finding people trained in broadcasting, both lay and clergy, to serve with them. Secondly, the Committee has concentrated on building high quality religious Radio-TV programs for dissemination throughout the listening and viewing area of the Diocese.

We are most proud of the Committee's live television coverage of Bishop MacAdie's Consecration in Trinity Cathedral last October 22nd.

The Committee developed and broadcast special programs for Thanksgiving, Christmas, Epiphany and Easter over cooperating stations WYNJ, Newark; WMTR, Morristown; and WCVB, Washington, N. J. These stations have also carried our regular programs such as "Eventide". WYNJ carries a daily morning devotional program Monday through Saturday and WMTR carries a weekly "Thine is the Glory". The following Sunday WCVB re-broadcasts the same program.

In closing, the Radio-TV Committee wants to express its appreciation for the assistance and guidance it has received from both Bishop MacAdie and our parent Department of Promotion.

The Newark Churchman, since March 1958, has come out with 82 pages instead of the former 18, and in color. 28,000 copies a month are sent to the mailing list and comments from readers have been good. The revenue from advertising has improved in 1958 but we anticipate further improvement in the coming year. The Department of Finance and the Diocesan Council, after long discussion, decided to suggest to Convention to transfer the Newark Churchman program from the Program Budget to the Assessment Budget; which seems both fair and necessary, as all persons who contribute to the Diocesan support are thereby contributing to the Newark Churchman. This does not mean that the amount of money granted to the Newark Churchman will increase. We are urging all clergy to submit new and up-to-date parish lists to make sure the Newark Churchman goes out to all families in the Diocese.

In closing this report of the Department of Promotion the Chairman wants to express his gratitude to all who are contributing so generously of their time and efforts to enable us to do our work and also wants to make it clear that the Department's job is to serve the Diocese and that we are always grateful for all advice from anyone which will help in improving this service.

DEPARTMENT OF URBAN WORK

ANNUAL REPORT: MAY 1, 1958 to MAY 1, 1959

The Department of Urban Work of the Diocese of Newark held seven regular meetings during the convention year, May 1, 1958 to May 1, 1959. In addition there was a joint meeting in February with representatives of other Diocesan departments to hear a presentation by a member of the Unit of Research and Field Study of the National Council.

The department has functioned this year largely through three standing committees: (1) The Committee on Policy. (2) The Committee on Christ Church, Newark. (3) The Committee on the Church in North Newark.

The Committee on Policy has developed a statement of policy and program which has been accepted unanimously by the department and approved by the Diocesan Council. In brief our objectives as defined in this statement are: (a) to "maintain a critical awareness of, and a continuing inquiry into the urban situation affecting the Church..." (b) Assume responsibility for informing and educating all people of the Diocese of the total responsibility of Christians in this crucial area of the Church's

life. (c) Continually declare the plight of the urban Church to be the concern and responsibility of the entire Christian body and, as such, the most strategic missionary challenge currently facing the Church."

At the request of the Bishop and the E&F Committee, this department through its sub-committees in that area, has been reviewing the situation in the "Ironbound" section of Newark which is served by Christ Church, with the view of discovering ways to make the Church more effective there.

The North Newark Committee has dealt particularly with St. John's, St. Mark's and St. James' parishes primarily through encouraging representatives of those parishes and their clergy to meet and discuss ways to meet the challenge to our Church in that part of the city.

Throughout the year other urban Church problems and opportunities have been freely discussed and throughout we have tried to come to a better understanding of the true nature of such problems and challenges which face the Church in our cities.

Suggested areas in which the department might work in the future have also been discussed. Some of these are conferences through which the people of the Diocese might be made more aware of the urban situation, a newsletter to be circulated by the department to spread information on urban work, surveys in certain strategic urban neighborhoods through which the Church's potential might become better known, and on the spot studies by representatives of the department in other dioceses where effective urban work is already being done.

BOARD OF EXAMINING CHAPLAINS CALENDAR YEAR 1958

The Board of Examining Chaplains of the Diocese of Newark held examinations for Holy Orders twice during the year 1958, one make-up examination, and two business meetings.

On Friday and Saturday, April 11 and 12, 1958, Messrs. Frederick T. Bender, Alfred W. Bulfinch, Stephen J. Chinlund, William A. King, Victor O. Reigel, Jr., James D. Schulthess, and Frederick J. Warnecke, Jr., appeared before the Board, and, with the exception of one candidate, successfully completed all examinations required by Canon 29, Sec. 1, for ordination. In a re-examination in one subject on August 26, 1958, the one candidate successfully completed his examinations.

On Monday, December 29, and Wednesday, December 31, 1958, Messrs. Francis S. Bancroft III, Robert Clark Bornfield, Fred Munro Ferguson, O. Edward Keller, Jr., Marshall T. Rice, and Wesley H. Smith appeared before the Board for some of the examinations required by Canon 29, Sec. 1, and Dr. Christian A. Hovde for some of those required by Canon 29, Sec. 3 (a) for the Diaconate. Mr. Edwin Ball completed all his examinations for the Perpetual Diaconate.

At the business meeting on April 12, the Board adopted the following resolution:

"WHEREAS, our Bishop has made known his intention to retire as Diocesan on November 1st, 1958, and, since this meeting of the Diocesan Board of Examining Chaplains is probably the last he will attend, it would seem appropriate that the long and happy relationship we enjoyed with our beloved Bishop should receive some formal recognition by the members of this Board.

"We have been deeply impressed by the friendly and intimate relationship Bishop Washburn has so consistently maintained with us and with the postulants and candidates whom we have examined; and we, as well as they, will miss his kindly judgment and mature wisdom. We are proudly mindful of the important positions in the National Church which our Bishop has filled with such devotion and distinction.

"It is the unanimous desire of the members of this Board that we express to Bishop Washburn, in this brief and formal manner, our enduring affection, our highest regard, and our best wishes for his and Mrs. Washburn's continued good health and happiness in the years to come."

A set of examinations for Holy Orders, drawn up by the examiners of the Eighth Province for candidates, was received, duplicated, and distributed to the nine members of our Board for guidance.

CHURCH PENSION FUND

To the 1959 Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

Your Diocesan Church Pension Fund Committee submits the following report covering the pension situation up to April 7, 1959.

A very important step on pensions was taken in December, 1958, when the whole level of pensions was lifted 20 per cent covering both pensions in force and those to be granted in the future. It was possible to raise the level of pensions without increasing the rate of assessment.

Annual pensions under the new rate are currently being paid throughout the Church as follows:

	Number	Amount
To retired clergy	1,074	\$1,996,055
To disabled clergy	99	189,066
To widows	1,565	1,885,249
To orphaned children	222	106,680

In comparison with the preceding year pensions are being paid to twenty-six more persons and the total amount paid is more than \$680,000 over the preceding year.

For those ordained at normal ages, the retirement and disability pensions are now 60 per cent of average salary (minimum of \$1,800). The widow's pensions are anywhere from \$900 a year to one-half of the husband's pension, depending on years of married life in the husband's active ministry; and the minor children's benefits are \$360 to \$600 a year depending upon age bracket. Pensions less than these figures result from 1) salary averaging under \$1,500; 2) ordination at age 40 or later; 3) discontinuous assessment payments; 4) period of deposition.

With respect to our own Diocese, your Committee reports that as of April 7, 1959, there were in force benefits to 86 clergy in the total amount of \$78,165.80; 1 total and permanent disability of \$1,800.00; 81 widows' allowances amounting to \$28,719.86; and 5 allowances to orphans amounting to \$2,160.86; or a total of 78 grants amounting to the sum total of \$105,845.52. Largely due to the 20 per cent increase in pensions following the action taken last December, there has been a great increase in the total amount over the preceding year.

The services affiliated with the Fund - life insurance and annuities for the clergy and active lay officials and workers; fire and casualty insurance for the churches; and hymnals, prayer books and certain other official publications of the Church - continue to grow and benefit the cause of clergy pensions. Recent developments are bonding and liability insurance for the churches, and group life insurance for the clergy, on a diocesan basis.

Your Diocesan Committee wishes to thank all the members of the Diocese who have cooperated in helping the Diocese of Newark to care in such an excellent way for its share of the responsibility in the work of the Church Pension Fund.

Furthermore, EAF has currently under consideration three large additional missionary projects with more in sight, making imperative the receipt of the outstanding \$262,459 in pledges.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON COLLEGE WORK

Statistics of the U. S. Office of Education show that in the next ten years the college enrollment for the State of New Jersey will jump from 87,852 to 148,200 . . . an increase of 80,848 students. In comparison with the other states, New Jersey ranks tenth in actual number of projected increase and fifteenth in percentage of increase.

Although such estimates are for the entire state, it is obvious from the locations of institutions of higher education in New Jersey that the largest part of this growth will pertain to the Diocese of Newark.

The dozen clergy and lay person who are the members of the Committee on College Work are endeavoring to provide a ministry of the Church to the institutions and persons involved in higher education — a ministry which will keep pace with the estimated expansion in the next decade.

The committee functions under the guidance of Bishop MacAulie. It fosters and supports the work of parish clergy who give part-time ministry to colleges and universities in the diocese. The committee is also aware of a responsibility to Young Churchmen of the Diocese of Newark who attend college outside of the diocese.

The commuter college situation presents a special challenge in New Jersey. A majority of the students in the state are commuters. The Rev. James Gill, Chairman of the Committee, has conducted a three-year study project for the Church Society for College Work at Newark-Butlers, dealing with the problems of ministering in the "commuter college." He also serves as chairman of the Committee on Commuter Colleges of the Department of College and University Ministries of the New Jersey Council of Churches.

The diocese was represented at the Triennial Convention of Episcopal Young Churchmen, Oberlin, Ohio, last summer by the chairman of the committee, Miss Ann Carol Neek, Miss Nancy Peine, and Mr. Otto Lolk.

REPORT OF THE DEAN OF TRINITY CATHEDRAL

During the past year the Cathedral has seen three most significant services and a long list of meaningful but more customary, special services.

Last fall most of you here took part in at least one of the services which marked the consecration of Bishop MacAdie, the Retirement of Bishop Washburn, and the Installation of Bishop Stark. We are especially grateful to the many clergy and lay men and women who assisted at events related to these services either in securing television, providing hospitality for guests or arranging for receptions. Comments about the television coverage have been most favorable.

Reviewing the year reveals that including these services the Cathedral has had about two services a month which have performed some special function for the Diocese. From the annual youth rally which filled the Cathedral to the recent small gathering of organists and choirmasters we have found the Cathedral witnessing to its diocesan nature and function. The Church and Freedom conference sponsored by the Department of Christian Social Relations and the conference on The Church and Employed Women have alike served to bring the attention of the Diocese to areas on the growing edge of the church and its relation to the world.

Such services and meetings have been well received and it was hoped that more might have been held this past year through conferences arranged for professional groups. This has not been done largely because of the pressure of time upon the Cathedral staff. We do hope to continue our slow progress in this direction.

In quieter ways the Cathedral ministry has also been at work in the Diocese. The intercessory prayer group composed of representatives from several parish prayer groups continues its work of prayer and special interest in the ministry of healing. Next fall the Reverend John Large of New York will conduct the healing mission. Requests to have him visit other parishes, as is customary, have already been received.

The sequence of prayers for all parishes and missions has not been pursued as vigorously as previously. This is being studied for renewal next fall.

Some years ago a group called the Cathedral Counsellors was formed. This group is open to all Clergy and social workers who would like to share continuing discussions on the pastoral office and its relation to social work and counselling. These discussions have been of very real value to the twenty or more clergy and social workers who have shared in them in the past years.

Questions are frequently asked about the nature and purpose of a cathedral and about the nature of the cathedral congregation, its work and its finances. It is a congregation which has and will continue to face all the problems of a downtown inner city parish. In the past years many have moved to the suburbs and it is our hope that these persons be transferred to nearby parishes, unless for some reason of their own they elect to continue as participant members of Trinity. Some few have moved, have not transferred and have lost real parochial association anywhere.

In work we are increasingly conscious of the need for relating our whole ministry more closely to the downtown area, its residents and its offices.

A few facts about the parish may serve to clarify some misapprehensions which we find occasionally. The reported figure for communicants is now 545. Average attendance at the eleven o'clock service is about 185. Our Sunday school has 120 pupils of whom 50 come from the Newark Home for Foster Care and the Youth Consultation Service residence. The care and affection of our teachers and congregation are well witnessed to in this last situation.

Financially with a budget of approximately \$59,000 the parish pledges about half and income from endowments provides the other half of income. Financial assistance from other sources is very small. Aid from the Diocese is provided through the very liberal arrangements in regard to building and maintenance services at Cathedral house.

EPISCOPAL CHURCHWOMEN, DIOCESE OF NEWARK

Report of the President — 1959

Since the great opportunity your delegates and visitors had to look and learn at the Triennial Meeting, and the privilege of attending joint sessions of the General Convention at Miami Beach last October, we have carried a broader and clearer picture of the Church at work.

At the Buck Hill Falls Conference in November that picture was brought home to the four hundred women there by Mrs. Orrin Judd, a member of the General Division. With a presentation by the president of the Episcopal Churchwomen of the Second Province of her Caribbean trip to meet and visit the women in that part of the Province, and, in the evening, a report of the Lambeth Conference by Bishop Stark, it gave the women of this diocese an account of much of the important business of the church year.

By establishment of National Council women's work has moved from the auxiliary status it has held since 1871, when the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was formed, to an integrated relationship with the National Council, and the use of the name Woman's Auxiliary nationally is automatically eliminated, and has seemed logical to adopt a resolution designating ourselves "Episcopal Churchwomen, Diocese of Newark." I expect a pamphlet in the near future, which will take the place of "Tell Us About the Woman's Auxiliary", explaining this action.

With the retirement of Bishop Washburn, the consecration of Bishop MacAdie, and the installation of Bishop Stark as diocesan, an autumn of mixed sadness and joy and great services was experienced by us all.

For the January and February Diocesan Meetings we were fortunate to have Miss Avis Harvey, of the Christian Education Department of National Council lead our participation in group work and discussion in two widely separated parishes, thus enabling more women to reach them.

The program and work of our various departments has been efficiently carried on, and in the realm of finance, as you will see by the Treasurer's report, the contributions to the budget have been such that we could make additional gifts to several projects — especially to the EAF, which is our Advance Work for this triennium.

Inevitably, we lose those from our Executive Board who have served their terms of office, and wonder how we are to carry on without them, but miraculously their successors are just as strong and willing.

My deepest appreciation to all my dear friends, — without whom no president, I am sure, could function; and always my gratitude for our bishops, dean and clergy, whose constant guidance and cooperation is an inspiration and a joy forever.

Diocese of Newark

Memorandum of Information Required by the Standing Committee on Petition by a Parish or Diocesan Organisation to Sell, Lease or Mortgage Real Estate, owned by it.

- I. The Petition should state whether the property to be sold or mortgaged is used as a place of worship, and, if so, whether or not it has been consecrated.
- II. If the petitioner has a map of the property described in the petition, please submit it with the petition, and after the Standing Committee has acted upon the petition the map will be returned.
- III. In the case of a petition to sell or lease real estate:
 1. Besides a description of the property by metes and bounds, the petition should describe the buildings and their present use and the reasons for selling or leasing the same, also that, in the opinion of the petitioner, the sales price or rental is equivalent to the fair value at the time of making the application, and the basis of that opinion, such as appraisals, previous efforts to sell, etc.
 2. If the sale price is to be paid other than in cash the terms of payment should be stated together with the rate of interest, and whether the balance of the sale price is to be secured by a mortgage on the premises, or otherwise, and if a mortgage, the name and address of the person or organization who will take the same.
- IV. In the case of a petition to mortgage real estate:
 1. A statement should be submitted as to the reasons why it is necessary to borrow money, on mortgage, i.e., to erect a new building, or to improve present quarters, etc., with the name of the person or organization who will take the mortgage, the terms of payment and rate of interest.
 2. If a parish applies for leave to mortgage property, there should be submitted a statement of such facts as have convinced the vestry that it is prudent to borrow the desired funds and that the parish will be able to repay the amount borrowed. Information showing whether or not the parish is growing and concerning its financial affairs should be included. In addition to other information on which the Vestry may have acted, the following data is requested:
 - (a) The present parish membership showing the number of families, and the number of baptized persons and communicants, as compared with five years prior thereto.
 - (b) A brief income and operating statement of the parish for the last two fiscal years prior to the making of the application. This statement should show the sources of income such as pledges, plate offerings, rents from any property, income from invested funds, and, under the heading of expenses, a grouping of salaries, usual operating expenses, and the parish quota for the Diocesan and General Church Program, the pledge toward this quota and amount paid thereon.
 - (c) A statement of any Notes Payable or other indebtedness except that incurred in the usual course of parish operations.

3. If the Department of Missions or other Diocesan Corporation applies for leave to mortgage property, it is requested that said corporation submit such information as it deems appropriate to demonstrate the desirability of the course it proposes.
 4. The Standing Committee may request representatives of the petitioner to appear before it in support of the petition, and in the case of a parish they shall be the Rector, Treasurer or other representative, who shall bring with them such parish records as may enable them to answer reasonable questions relating to the parish finances, growth, efforts to raise by gifts the amount which the parish desires to raise by mortgage, etc.
- V. The vestry or the governing body of the petitioner should, by proper resolution, authorize the execution of the petition by the proper officers of the petitioner, and affix the seal of the petitioner to the same.

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
