CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE 2.

There shall be a Convention of the Church in this Diocese, on the second Tuesday in May in each year, or on such other day in May as may be specially appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority. The Convention shall be held at the Cathedral unless the Ecclesiastical Authority appoints otherwise.

The Annual Reports from Parishes and Missions for 1960 canonically due on or before February 1, 1961, together with the Personal Reports of the Clergy, should be forwarded directly to the Bishop of the Diocese, 24 Rector Street, Newark 2, N. J.

Reports from Diocesan Institutions, Departments, Commissions, Archdeacons, and all other persons or bodies reporting to the Convention, should cover the civil year, and be sent not later than February 1, 1961, to the Secretary of the Convention, 24 Rector Street, Newark 2, N. J.

SEVENTH ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE
RIGHT REVEREND LELAND STARK, D.D.
BISHOP OF NEWARK

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit,
Amen.

My fellow-workers in Christ,

I begin this address by making the words of St. Paul in the first chapter of his letter to the Philippians my own initial greeting to you: "I thank my God in all my remembrance of you, always in every prayer of mine for you all making my prayer with joy, thankful for your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now."

I.

My address will move into three different areas today, and the first of them concerns certain household items which I hope will be of general interest.

Our Diocese, I think I may say, continues to be a strong, active, thriving Diocese. While the statistics for 1959 are not yet complete, we number about 100,000 baptized members, about 60,000 of whom are also communicant members. We are the eighth largest among the eighty-nine dioceses and missionary districts of the Episcopal Church. Our clergy are a family of 216 dedicated men.

Since our last Convention, church construction within the Diocese has continued at a high level. There are too many items to describe in detail, but they will be shown in the 1960 Diocesan Journal. They make a rather impressive list and give some credence to a remark made in my hearing by a certain denominational official of another communion to the effect that the Episcopal Church in northern New Jersey is "one of the two most aggressive churches." I do not entirely agree with that remark, but in the context of the adjectives customarily applied to the Episcopal Church, I must say that I like to savor that word "aggressive!"

In our parishes since we last met, one new church, St. Peter's in Essex Fells, has been dedicated, and another is nearing completion at All Saints' Church in Bergenfield. Two other new churches are in the planning stage, and two parishes have enlarged their churches. Four new parish houses have been completed, another has been enlarged, and two more are being planned. Six churches have been thoroughly rehabilitated and given new beauty. Five new rectories have been built or purchased. One parish has acquired an adjacent day school for the enlargement of its educational facilities.

Among the 35 churches that are missions of the Diocese, within the past twelve months one new church (St. Michael's, Wayne) has

been completed, and ground is soon to be broken for the construction of a new St. Peter's Church at Livingston. One large plot of ground was purchased for our newest mission, St. Alban's at Oakland-Franklin Lakes. Three churches have been rehabilitated. Five new parish houses have been completed and dedicated. Four new vicarages have been built or acquired. I remind you that by far the major cost of nearly all of these projects among our missions is borne by the people themselves rather than the Diocese.

You can see why the Department of Missions is the hardest working department in the Diocese!

Mention of the Department of Missions brings me to speak of Canon William O. Leslie, Jr., who has been our Archdeacon for Missions for the past 31 years. He will reach the canonical age of compulsory retirement on July 21st, at which time his resignation will be reluctantly accepted. I shall not say much about him and his work at this point because we are honoring him tonight at our Convention Dinner, at which most of you will be present, but I do wish to spread upon the record the fact that we are all deeply indebted to him for his long and effective service to Christ and His Church; much of the progress that has been made in the missionary areas of the Diocese is directly traceable to his good work.

I am glad to report to you that the Venerable Sydney E. Grant has accepted appointment as Canon Leslie's successor, and he will begin his new work on July 1st. The Rev. Slade Danzoll, rector of St. Paul's Church in Jersey City, will succeed Archdeacon Grant as Archdeacon of Hudson.

One other important staff change should be noted. Mr. William E. Dodd, who was Administrative Assistant to the Bishops, resigned last summer to return to the business world, and the Venerable William Macbeth, Archdeacon of Newark, has accepted appointment as the new Assistant to the Bishops, effective June 1st. I might note in passing that the Book of Common Prayer (page 294) says that "the office of a Bishop is to be a chief pastor in the Church, to confer Holy Orders, and to administer Confirmation." It says nothing whatever about his administrative duties, which in many ways constitute the most demanding part of his work, and it is Bishop MacAdie's and my own hope that assistance in this area will help to restore us to what the Church defines as the office of a Bishop.

One other household item is that next fall the present diocesan-wide Survey will move from the parish level to the diocesan level, and the Survey team from the National Council Division of Research and Field Study will make a kind of management study of various diocesan positions, including those of the Bishops, as well as of the several departments and institutions. Bishop MacAdie and I hopefully look to this

as a means toward a more effective administration of the affairs of this great Diocese.

I conclude these household items with an expression of sincere gratitude to the members of our hard-working, loyal, and effective staff at Cathedral House. Understandably, the largest portion of my gratitude goes to my dear friend and colleague, Bishop MacAdie; no day goes by without my being thankful to God that he is by my side!

II.

I come now to my second general subject, and I introduce it by recalling to your minds that after St. Paul had completed, in his 15th chapter of First Corinthians, that matchless treatise on the Resurrection of Our Lord and on the joys of eternal life, with hardly a pause for breath he went on with the words, "And now concerning the collection. . . ."

At this point I am going to follow the example of this illustrious predecessor in the Apostolic Succession by talking to you "concerning the collection," so to speak, for there have been a number of promising developments in the area of diocesan finance. I might say in passing that while problems of finance are sure to occupy us for some time to come, hopefully I look for the day when less and less of our time need be spent in this area. And I think that day will someday dawn!

To help bring on that dawn is the task of the newly enlarged and reorganized Department of Finance. This reorganization is largely the work of its chairman, Mr. John B. Rhodes, who four years ago was lay-chairman of the Episcopal Advance Fund Campaign. While the actual membership of the Department consists only of the General Chairman and the Chairmen of six autonomous committees (two of the Chairmen are clergy, the others, laymen of great experience and business acumen), a brief description of the various committees will by itself indicate how this Department will be of increasing effectiveness in the areas of administration and finance.

One is the Committee on Diocesan Administration and Salaries, and its function is obvious from its name.

Then there is the Committee on Budgets, which holds various budget hearings and makes an extremely careful study of the budgets of the Diocese as well as that of General Convention on which our missionary quota for the Episcopal Church at large is based.

There is also a Committee on Quotas and Assessments. Here too the function of this Committee will be clear from its very title, but you will be interested to know that the method of quota apportionment and assessment will be under the constant review of this particular Committee.

Another is the Episcopal Capital Loan Fund Committee, and its chief function is to administer, with the approval of the Diocesan Council, the \$750,000 Revolving Loan Fund that remains from the Episcopal Advance Fund Campaign.

Another committee is on the Administration and Maintenance of Diocesan Properties.

The last of the six committees is one on Special Gifts and Bequests. It will seek to keep before our people the importance of making bequests to the local church, the Diocese, and the Episcopal Church at large. It will also bring before people of means knowledge of advance work that the Diocese is contemplating but for which no funds are in prospect. For instance, the Department of Missions is considering the erection of a portable all-purpose building for our newest mission, St. Alban's in Oakland-Franklin Lakes; this kind of building has been successfully used in other dioceses and serves until permanent buildings can be constructed, at which time the portable building is dismantled and can be put up as the first building of another mission elsewhere. Such a building would cost about \$25,000 or \$30,000, and there may very well be some person of means in this Diocese who, without hurt to his giving to his local parish, might give such a useful building. Indeed, one \$10,000 gift has come to the Department of Missions for land purchase in a certain area, and while this gift did not come as a result of this particular Committee's work, it does indicate what can happen when some dedicated person's imagination is captured.

In brief, you can see that the Department of Finance with its associated committees has now enlisted more people, most of whom are laymen, to work upon the complex problems of diocesan administration than ever before, and I have no doubt that they will come up with many a solution to these problems.

Of the various Departments of the Diocese, the Department of Missions receives the largest budget for its work. This Department is casting an ever more critical eye upon the various missions and aided parishes that are subsidized through its budget. It is essential that missionary money be used to the greatest effectiveness possible although we shall all recognize that growth in numbers, while important, is not the only criterion on which the effectiveness of the work of a mission or aided parish should be judged.

But while I think I may promise an ever increasing efficiency in the stewardship of your missionary dollars, I do not promise smaller missionary budgets! For we are by no means meeting the many opportunities for growth that surround us everywhere in this Diocese. Indeed, when the results of our Diocesan Survey are in, I daresay we shall be advised to purchase fifteen or twenty plots of land for the establishment of future missions, and already we would be buying several if

the funds were in hand. Nor is it only in the suburban areas that advance needs be made, for the cities are likewise "ripe for the harvest," as is to be seen by the fact that the second fastest-growing church in the Diocese is in a highly urban area.

Everywhere that we have entered in strength, the work of our Church is pressing rapidly forward.

Here, for example, is a mission where three years ago we had a tiny church that hardly seated 40 persons. Today we have a new church, and the last three confirmation classes presented in the new church have averaged 62 persons!

I think of another mission not even a year old, where we are holding services in a building that was once an inn. Already there are 140 families actively participating in the life of that mission!

Or here is still another place which was organized as a mission only three years ago. Here we have a new church and the first unit of an educational building, and already there have been 124 persons confirmed, and over 800 baptized members are associated with that congregation.

And I think too of a certain aided parish in a teeming section of a large city where no less than 385 men, women, and children have been baptized in the last three years alone!

Does not all of this suggest that when we can meet opportunities with strength, amazing results for the Lord can follow, and I dare to hope that as our people become more and more responsible stewards of the Lord, we shall have the means to meet these opportunities with strength.

You will remember, many of you, that two years ago this Convention adopted a Resolution to the effect that the Biblical tithe of 10% of one's income for Church and Charity was to become "our standard and the goal toward which we must progress in the support of Church and Charity."

I do not say we are moving rapidly toward the practice of tithing, but we are certainly moving in that direction, and—thanks be to God!—as we do move in that direction, our point-of-view is changing from one of cautious progress to one of adventurous missionary advance. Indeed, that change in point of view is symbolized in a certain Episcopal layman who said to me a few years ago as he scrutinized every dollar of a Diocesan budget that was higher than the previous one, "It's getting darned expensive to be an Episcopalian!" But then something wonderful happened in his life, and he became a tither. When I saw him not long ago, he said this to me, "I never could have imagined how much joy there is in giving! Now my only problem is to determine

how my tithe can be used to best advantage for the Lord and His Church."

That shift in point-of-view is slowly taking hold in this Diocese, and I thank God for it.

Following the passage two years ago of that Resolution making the Biblical tithe of 10% for Church and Charity the diocesan standard of giving and the goal toward which our Christian stewardship is to move, one entire congregation adopted it, and amazing results have followed. This congregation is a small but growing mission, and their last Every Member Canvass produced sixty-one pledges. But twenty-two of these pledges, or over one-third the number, were made by tithers whose pledges averaged about \$400 per year in addition to other church contributions. The rest of the sixty-one pledgors are moving in the direction of tithing, and the result is that a new vicarage, a new parish house, and the cost of remodeling and enlarging the church are being financed through the regular budget of the church, and no special campaign was even necessary. And even more important is the great upsurge in the spiritual life of that congregation!

The experience of this mission, I dare to suggest, is the key to the ultimate solution of the financial problems of the local church, the diocese, and the Episcopal Church at large!

III.

I shall be relatively brief with the third general subject with which I should like to treat, and I introduce it with the observation that the climate these days continues to be good for the growth of religion. There can be no question but that religion is 'in vogue' today. This upsurge of religious interest is certainly one of the major phenomena of our time, and like so many other things in life, it contains both danger and opportunity.

There is danger because much of this "surge of piety in America," as one writer has called it, is superficial and represents a watered-down version of Christian faith. There is danger that a person may become inoculated with this mild and undemanding kind of religion and so become immune to real Christianity.

Hence I cannot too strongly call upon the clergy to preach and teach the Word of God in the full rigor of the Gospel with all its stern demands as well as with its unspeakably wondrous promises, and I bid the laity to follow that preaching and teaching, being satisfied with nothing less than a vital personal experience of the Christian faith that issues in whole-life service to Christ and His Church and the things for which He stands.

But while there is danger in this "surge of piety in America," there is also great opportunity in it for personal and corporate evangelism,

and, under God, it becomes our task—parson and layman alike—to convert this mood into a true spiritual awakening. Clearly this surge of piety means that ours is a seeking generation that is turning wistful eyes in the direction of religion. Well, the purpose of seeking is to find, and in Christ and in the fellowship of His Church we have found that for which we have been seeking; we have found peace and hope and joy, and our lives are touched with meaning, for He has linked us with Himself in life's greatest cause.

It now becomes our task—by His grace and power—to help those who are still seeking to find what we have found, the joy in Christ that is ours!

**SECOND ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE
RIGHT REVEREND DONALD MacADIE, D.D.
SUFFRAGAN BISHOP OF NEWARK**

As I make my second, and brief, address to this Convention I am sensitive of the fact that another year has passed in my life and that of the diocese. Within this framework of the passage of time I am aware also of many lessons learned by me in the second year of my service as your Suffragan Bishop—lessons not visible and apparent during the first year of such service. For the most part these have been valuable lessons. For example, one time this year while attending a diocesan gathering a fine layman approached me in a warm and friendly manner and said, "My name is John Doe; who are you?" Another time I met one of our clergy after I had been out of action by reason of illness. I mentioned that I hadn't been in my office for two weeks, whereupon he asked, "Oh, have you been away?" These indications that the honeymoon was over were helpful hints that even if one were entitled to wear a purple dickey there were more basic elements in the office of Suffragan Bishop.

One of these basic elements was brought home to me as I listened to the Suffragan Bishop of Long Island preach a sermon on the role and function of a Suffragan Bishop. He said that the Suffragan Bishop's sole duty is to obey his Bishop without question. His, the Suffragan Bishop's, charter and his watchword is obedience. This caused me neither surprise nor disagreement, for had I not taken this vow when I was ordained to the priesthood? However, his words did remind me of my appreciation of my relationship with my Diocesan. I am grateful to Bishop Stark that my role as his assistant is not that of the typical Hollywood yes-man. His consideration for me and my sometimes peculiar ways of thinking has been encouraging and heart-warming.

I could very well take up my entire time today in thanking so many others for so much. The Cathedral House staff, the Archdeacons, the parish and mission clergy, and the increasingly fine ministry of many devoted lay people are all in my prayers of thanks to God.

This year, and for some time to come, many of you have been busy with the details of the Diocesan Survey or Study. Presently we are in the third stage of this project. About 100 parishes and missions have been visited by the survey team. Despite some understandable initial confusion, which I understand happens in each diocese, the work has been done well under the able leadership of Archdeacon Macbeth, the other Archdeacons, and the clerical and lay commissioners. We shall complete the remainder of the study on schedule, I believe, although some places are still behind schedule. You will be interested to know that the study will include, before it is finished, the diocesan structure as it is found in the administrative procedures at 24 Rector Street, and

also the scope and functioning of the various diocesan departments. Expressions of appreciation for the study have been received from a number of parishes and missions among the all but one of our total of 147 local churches participating in the study.

Last year I spoke to you of the urban Church, and I have spoken of it frequently in the diocese during the year. It is true, as I said a year ago, that the Church will not abdicate from the cities. It is also true that, generally speaking, the Church has not met this problem adequately. Here and there effective and even brilliant work is being done. But, by and large, we have developed little real strategy. In our diocese about 31% of the funds granted by our Department of Missions goes to urban stations. But these urban missions are not related to one another nor to urban parishes nearby. In areas where we think we know what to do there seems to be no way to implement the necessary action under our present canonical limitations. One also may wonder whether we should explore the idea of having our Urban Department become an organic part of the Department of Missions rather than an independent department with no means of implementing its findings, and little or no relationship with any other diocesan department.

Presently the best method the Church has found to meet the inner-city situation is that of the team ministry as exemplified in Grace, Van Vorst, Jersey City, or St. Augustine's Chapel, New York. It is obvious that we do not have the funds to do this in all urban situations. It is also obvious that each local urban unit (parish or mission) is unable to do the full job alone. Somewhere in between these two conclusions there may be a way—perhaps a temporary way but a move forward nevertheless.

Suppose the parishes and missions in a given urban area could voluntarily share in the planning and execution of the Church's total potential impact in that area without giving up their individual identity or sovereignty. Suppose, for example, a total youth program were initiated as the result of conference and pooling of leadership strength in a given area. Would it not have the possibility of better results than our present strategy of a fragmentary effort in each station affords? This is simply one illustration of the possibilities of such a procedure. It does call for the sacrifice of a certain kind of present parochial thinking and fear in order that the larger vision for Christ might prevail.

In stating that the urban areas constitute the largest mission field of the Church (and I have done so repeatedly) have we not implicitly and explicitly conveyed the impression that the urban folks need desperately what the Church has to give to them? This is true but only part of the truth. We should not forget that people in the cities are people; that they have a great contribution to make to the Church's

life and mission, even as do Church people in suburbia, the towns, and the rural areas. We are dissatisfied with the Church's role thus far in the urban situation—even as we may be dissatisfied with the Church's role in all areas. Short of the heavenly City of God we must always be divinely dissatisfied with things as they are for we live under divine judgment always. The Church can meet the urban situation adequately once she really wills to do so to the point of real sacrifice.

I turn now to another phase of diocesan life. Senator Jackson in the last issue of "The Foreign Affairs Quarterly" described political science in terms of a pendulum. He said "The history of political science might be described in terms of a pendulum—preoccupation with the mechanisms of government alternating with the neglect of these mechanisms."

As I read this I could not resist thinking of our diocese. From time to time we get very busy revising the machinery; then for a longer period we proceed to neglect proper machinery until it becomes creaky and unworkable. We frequently call the period a time or year of transition, and we say that in a year of transition we should not make any final decisions. The trouble is that each and every year is a year of transition. Surely good machinery should provide the mechanical means of communication between its various parts. Our machinery does not do this well. Surely also good policy demands not only good machinery but good human masters of the machinery who are inwardly impelled to communicate with one another. In short good machinery and good human masters of this machinery are needed for good communications. As I observe various areas of life I find that a breakdown of communication is common. In advertising, in social work, in government, in law and medicine this is true to a greater or lesser degree. I believe it to be true in the Church and in the Diocese of Newark. For example it is reported that the Department of Christian Education of the National Council estimates that it is in good two-way communication with one-third of the dioceses; in fair touch with one-third more; and scarcely at all with the remaining third. I have been concerned in our diocese with this matter of two-way communication in general and more specifically in relation to our several departments. I believe it to be true that there is a real absence of communication between our departments in relation to proposed plans and programs, the current carrying out of these plans, the possibility of collaboration between departments, and an assessment of the results. I sense at times a lack of communication within a department itself. Am I amiss in feeling that there also could be better communication between the several departments and the local parish or mission? One could talk about the many ramifications of this at length. General Motors probably has the same problem. What to do about it? A first step might be—if my remarks have any truth—to frankly admit that the problem exists. Secondly, to ask if we are making the best use of

already existing channels of communication? Thirdly, should we create more machinery to meet the total problem? Theoretically the Diocesan Council is that machinery. But it is too large and already has too much business to include this problem. If possible we should not create another organization. We may have too many now. I have asked the Department of Promotion to explore this situation. I now ask you to direct your ideas to this department as it seeks to come up with some kind of an answer.

I would like to bring you up to date on the Newark Churchman.

Under the able management of Mr. Frank Allen, the Business Manager of The Churchman, we are keeping within our allotted income. Mr. Allen has given us professional services without remuneration and has restored order and business method and vision to what was a sorry situation. He has been a Godsend to us and I am deeply grateful to him.

To keep within our budget we are limited to 16 pages and are obligated to run the present amount of advertising. This causes an imbalance in the composition of the magazine and makes for a less attractive visual presentation. This we must suffer until economic adjustment will permit more freedom.

The Editorial Committee is now committed to a greater participation in the nature of the material appearing in The Churchman. This Committee, under the chairmanship of the Rev. Ronald Rowland, is glad to have your suggestions.

The difficulties of securing a reasonably effective mailing list are many. The original list consisted of the list of the E. A. F. contributors plus some parish lists. With this imperfect base the situation has worsened. After careful investigation your Committee would like to make a new start. We have a plan based on the experience of other magazines and our own thinking. It calls for (a) a fresh set of parish lists in duplicate, and (b) a cross-check system by which it can be kept reasonably up to date. This involves great initial expense which The Churchman budget cannot absorb—something in the vicinity of \$1,200. It is our proposal that we eliminate the September issue and use the money thus saved for this purpose. Your Committee regards the complete renovation of our mailing list as a necessity and not a luxury. We ask the parishes and missions to send their lists promptly when asked.

Before closing may I refer to one matter which has had nation-wide publicity recently—the much discussed Air Force Manual in which accusations of Communism are made against the whole body of Protestant clergymen and the Churches of the U. S. A. This charge has been refuted adequately by the official bodies of the Churches as well as by some of the hierarchy of the Roman Catholic Church. I take this opportunity to express your Bishops' complete agreement with the state-

ment of our own Church as expressed by our Presiding Bishop. We express our support of the National Council against these accusations; we reject the implication that there is any relationship between the R. S. V. of the Holy Bible and Communism.

And now "finally final" I close by repeating something I said to you last year from this pulpit. Regardless of the amount of good machinery we have; regardless of programs, budgets, committees, or departments, the most important part of the Church's life is what happens at the local level. The day in and day out ministry of our clergy and laity in parish or mission, in spite of human failures, represents and demonstrates to people in a major way, the fact that Christ's Church is a living, breathing, organic and dynamic body. We give thanks for this ministry daily. Of this vitally important local ministry the most essential part is the continuity of our common public worship. Without this personal and corporate experience in worshipping God our vitality and power is lost. Whatever other plans or policies we may devise the continuity and vitality of this worship is of first importance. Let us rejoice in this God-given way of renewal. Let us give thanks to God that He has put it into the hearts of His people, clergy and laity, to turn to Him in devotion and thanksgiving. Let us continue and strengthen our missionary privilege and bring more and more people into the community of worshippers in our missions and parishes. This is our fundamental privilege and duty. Upon this base depends all the superstructure of our Church's life and work in the world.

Rules of Order

THE CONVENTION

1. The Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convention shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall record their attendance.
3. When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
4. The general procedure of the Convention shall be governed, unless otherwise provided for, by the rules of parliamentary practice as set forth in "Roberts' Rules of Order."
5. At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
6. A public address system shall be installed for use of those addressing the Convention.
7. No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
8. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it; or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment has been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
9. When any member is about to speak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
10. No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply), in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
11. If any member in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
12. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.
13. All questions shall be decided *viva voce*, unless otherwise specially ordered.
14. On the demand of five Presbyters entitled to vote, or of the Lay Deputies from five Parishes and Missions, the vote upon any question shall be by Orders, the Clergy voting individually, and the Laity by Parishes and Missions; and, when a vote is thus taken, a concurrent majority in both Orders shall be necessary to carry any measure.
15. The mode of conducting the nominations and elections of all Committees, Commissions and Diocesan Council and Departments, and all other elective officers not otherwise provided for, shall be as follows:
 - a. The Secretary of the Convention shall send out with the notice of the time and place of the Diocesan Convention, a list of the offices to be filled by election thereat, and the names of the incumbents of these offices, whose terms expire thereat, together with an official nomination blank. Such notice shall be sent out at least one month before the date appointed for the Convention, to the Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and to each lay delegate whose name and address has been transmitted to the Secretary, as provided in Canon I.
 - b. The members of the Convention shall also be requested, in said call to send to the Secretary any canonical amendments or other important items of business that they may propose to introduce at the next Convention, so that such matters may be assigned a place on the Calendar of Business. Notice of the annual Convention shall be given in THE NEWARK CHURCHMAN.
 - c. Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations for any office or offices to be filled at such Convention, shall at least twenty-one days before the date appointed for the Convention, submit the same in writing to the Secretary

thereof, together with his certificate that he has secured the consent of such person or persons to such nomination. Nominations may be made from the floor.

16. a. A Committee consisting of the Bishops, ex-officio, five other clergymen and five laymen, to be known as the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, shall be appointed at each Convention to prepare the official Ballots and the Calendar of Business, for the next Annual Convention.
b. The Committee on Elections, from the list of nominations as furnished to it by the Secretary of the Convention, shall prepare sufficient ballots marked "Sample" for each clerical and lay delegate, as certified by such Secretary, as entitled to a seat in the Convention; such ballot to be mailed by such Secretary to each such delegate at least five days before the Convention.
c. At the beginning of the opening session the committee shall report to the Convention in the form of an official ballot the names of nominees; the arrangement of such names shall be determined by lot in each order.
d. If there be any office for which no nomination has been made on the sample ballot, any delegate may file with the Secretary of the Convention the name of one candidate for any such office, together with his certificate, that he has secured the consent of the person so nominated. Such nominations may be filed up to the hour of voting, and the committee of Elections shall announce the names of such nominees at the time of the distribution of the first ballot.
e. The number of consecutive terms any nominee has held the office for which he is again nominated shall be noted on the ballot, in parentheses, after his or her name. After each list of nominations as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks may be filled by any voter. On the first ballot these ballots only shall be used, and also in subsequent ballots, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. No ballot shall be counted in its class, on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled, and the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast.
17. There shall be a Committee to be known as the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions, the members of which shall be appointed at each Annual Convention and shall serve until the close of the next following Annual Convention. The Committee shall receive and consider all resolutions, except resolutions of committees accompanying committee reports recommending action of Convention. The Committee shall submit its report to Convention recommending the adoption or rejection of each resolution proposed for the adoption of any such resolution as amended by the Committee. A copy of this report shall be mailed by the Secretary of Convention to each Delegate at least five days before Convention.
18. All resolutions to be considered for action by the Convention shall have been submitted in writing to the Secretary of Convention not less than thirty days in advance of the Convention and shall have been signed by a Delegate to the Convention. On the expiration of the time for submitting resolutions to the Secretary of Convention, the Secretary shall transmit to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions all resolutions submitted to him. Additional resolutions may be submitted to the Secretary of Convention after the time above specified which additional resolutions shall be transmitted immediately by the Secretary of Convention to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions but no such resolution, or such resolution as amended, shall be proposed for action by the Convention except upon a motion for the suspension of the rules duly passed.
19. All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered. It shall be the duty of the Secretary promptly to notify the members of all special committees of their appointment.
20. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.
21. Reports when submitted in Convention shall be read by title only, unless the reading be for the better transaction of business.
22. At the close of each Convention a Committee shall be appointed to review and certify the correctness of the minutes.

The Annual Convention

The Eighty-Sixth Annual Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark was held on Tuesday, May 10th, Nineteen Hundred and Sixty in Trinity Cathedral, Newark, New Jersey.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at eight-thirty o'clock by the Bishop of the Diocese. The Right Reverend Leland Stark, D.D. was assisted by the Suffragan Bishop, the Right Reverend Donald MacAdie, D.D., who read the Gospel; the Very Reverend Robert F. McGregor, Dean of the Cathedral, who read the Epistle; and Canon Richard C. Williams.

The Bishop read the names of the Bishops of the Church, the Clergy of the Diocese, and Laity of the Parishes and Missions, who departed this life to become members of the Church Expectant during the past Convention year, and commended them to the prayers of the congregation during the Communion Service. The morning session of the Convention was called to order at nine-thirty-five o'clock with the Right Reverend, the Bishop of Newark, in the Chair.

A quorum being present in both Orders the Convention was declared ready for business. Attendance cards indicated the following were present:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ELECTIONS AND RULES OF ORDER TO THE 86th ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK

A Diocesan dinner will be held tonight in the grand ballroom of the Robert Treat Hotel at 6:00 P.M., in honor of the Venerable Canon William O. Leslie, Jr. The speaker will be Dr. John S. Whala, visiting lecturer at Princeton Theological Seminary. Arrangements for this dinner have been made by a committee under the Chairmanship of the Reverend Paul C. Deckenbach, and with the assistance of the Venerable William Macbeth and Mr. Herbert Thorpe.

The Committee requested the Secretary of Convention to prepare the Official Ballot.

The Committee recommends the adoption of the 1959 Calendar of Business with certain minor changes to wit:

"Inasmuch as the Convention is called upon to elect Deputies to the General Convention this year, that the elections be held whenever practical in the calendar to facilitate the business of the Convention."

"That the Item Report of the Episcopal Advance Fund be deleted inasmuch as the work of this fund is now subsumed under the Department of Finances of the Diocesan Council."

"That the Report of the Bonnie Brae Farm for Boys, Millington be dropped from the list of reports of institutions and organizations in the Diocese, inasmuch as this institution no longer receives financial assistance from the Convention."

The Committee recommends that the present Rule 15, Section C be changed to read:

"Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations for any office or offices to be filled at such Convention, shall, at least 21 days before the date appointed for the Convention, submit the same in writing to the Secretary thereof, together with his certificate that he has secured the consent of such person or persons to such nominations."

This would change the prior requirement of 15 days for such nominations to facilitate the work of the Secretary of the Convention in distributing sample ballots to the Deputies.

BE IT RESOLVED that this Convention support the request of the President of the United States to increase the number of refugees allowed in this country, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Government of the United States be urged to enact humane laws that will give more refugees the opportunity to make a home in this land, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to the President of the United States and to the Secretary of State, and to the Senators from the State of New Jersey.

EXPLANATORY NOTES ON ADOPTED 1961 ASSESSMENT BUDGET

The Diocesan Dept. of Finance has rearranged some of the categories in the Assessment Budget; hence an item-by-item comparison of 1960 with 1961 is difficult but will be resumed in the future. Further, a few categories in 1960 carried NET figures whereas 1961 Budget now carries GROSS figures, offsetting items appearing under Income, in order better to show true costs.

Item

- 1, 2 Dept. of Finance proposed increases in Bishops' salaries unbeknownst to Bishops, who requested Diocesan Council not to approve. Council voted to approve on grounds of 11% cost-of-living increase, no changes having been made in Bishops' salaries since 1953.
- 3, 4 Bishops' houses are not tax exempt. Bishops supply their own utilities, car replacements, and some travel costs.
- 6 Provides modest cost-of-living increase to bring salary scale somewhat closer to prevailing rates for similar work in business field.
- 7 Only modest salary increases are proposed. Previously E.A.F. and Diocesan Investment Trust contributed something to these salaries to compensate for the work done for them. Last year, only net salaries were reported whereas 1961 reports gross figure. D.I.T. will continue to pay \$2,420; see offsetting credit under item 33.
- 8 Transferred from Program Budget to Assessment Budget as Administrative expense. Represents \$300 travel and expense for each.
- 9 (a) A gross figure which does not reflect present contribution of \$3,144 made by Trinity Cathedral to these items. Note offsetting, increased item of \$3,425 under item 32.
- 12 Includes Convention Journal, pre-Convention Journal for Archdeaconry meetings, ballots, etc. Printing costs have increased.
- 13 Raised from \$750 to compensate more adequately for the work involved.
- 21 Cathedral House loans:
 - (1) In 1949 \$70,000 borrowed to help erect Cathedral House. 3% interest. \$15,000 remains to be paid.
 - (2) 1958. \$34,000 at 4% interest borrowed for reconstruction of office space and other improvements and repairs. In 1961 \$26,800 will remain to be paid. (Agreement: \$5,600 per year to be paid on principal.)
 - (3) 1959. \$23,500 borrowed at 4% interest. For critical repairs to Cathedral House: heating plant, stone-work and waterproofing, electric wiring, etc. A five-year loan to be amortized in equal annual payments. Little provision has been made in past budgets for maintenance and replacements; hence large expenditure in 1959. Dept. of Finance plans to make more realistic provision in future budgets.
- 24 To provide Administrative Budget for our National Church. This is in addition to Diocesan Quota.
- 25 Our Diocese sends two Bishops, four Clerical and four Lay deputies to General Convention every three years. This annual subsidy of \$1,200 provides a sum to be divided among these 10 representatives for a ten to twelve day Convention. Generally delegates provide additional funds from their own resources.
- 26 This sum (\$200) is to be set aside annually for the next 8 years. Lambeth Conference is held in London. Diocesan Bishops and Coadjutors are invited.
- 28 Held annually. We send 12 delegates.
- 34 The net Assessment Budget for 1960 is \$150,150; hence the net proposed 1961 Assessment Budget is \$11,696 higher than 1960.

WHEREAS the Diocesan Council is directed by Canon 5, Section 4(d), to provide for an assessment on the Parishes and Missions to meet the administrative expenses of the Diocese, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Convention approve the proposed budget for 1961, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Diocesan Council be hereby directed to levy an assessment on Parishes and Missions of the Diocese at such rate as to cover the amount of \$161,846.00.

EXPLANATORY NOTES ON ADOPTED 1961 BUDGET FOR THE PROGRAM OF THE DIOCESE AND THE CHURCH AT LARGE

Item

- 1 Includes \$21,500 for land purchase and new work. Represents aid to 35 Missions and aided Parishes for supplementing stipends, mortgage financing, car allowances, etc. Also salary of Canon Missioner. Includes also \$7,800.00 increase on clergy salaries.
- 2 Also includes salary, housing, car allowance, pension of Executive Secretary.
- 3 For program expenses and \$300 for part-time secretarial help.
- 4 Also includes Radio/TV work.
- 5 For general program only. Dept. of Missions spends about 33% of its budget in urban areas.
- 6 Includes salaries, rental and travel allowances, and pension premiums of two chaplains in addition to costs of program and part-time secretarial help.
- 7 There are 13 colleges and universities in Diocese of Newark. Includes certain expenses incurred by our local chaplains to these institutions plus program expenses.
- 8 Entirely for caretaker's salary, insurance, taxes, and some minor repairs.
- 9 Agreement of Diocese and G.F.S. for annual payments for Holiday House ended in 1960.
- 10 Home for aging women. This amount is toward a much larger budget raised by the Home elsewhere.
- 11 For program expenses. Central committee now includes Episcopal Laymen, Brotherhood of St. Andrew, and Lay Readers' Guild.
- 12 Our share in interdenominational work among migrants, research and field study, statewide radio and TV, etc.
- 13 Y.C.S. is a social case work agency of our Diocese. Total budget is \$114,921. Convention is asked to support this work with \$17,000 grant.
- 14 Diocesan total asked for Program Budget is \$5,002 less than the 1960 budget adopted by Convention in 1959.
- 15 Canon law requires each Diocese to include full asking from National Council. Diocesan Council later makes up working Budget after pledges from parishes and missions are made. At that time decision is made whether to pledge Diocesan Quota in full or in part. Quota has been pledged in full last four years.
- 16 This is the total amount to be raised by our parish/mission quota.

RESOLUTIONS

WHEREAS the Diocesan Council is charged with the responsibility of preparing a budget covering the requested missionary and benevolent requirements of the Diocese and General Church for the ensuing calendar year, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Convention approve the 1961 budget as proposed by the Diocesan Council, and

WHEREAS Canon 4, Section 6 (d), of General Convention provides that in each Diocese a definite financial objective shall be allotted to each Parish and Mission as its share of the Program of the Church, therefore

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Diocesan Council be authorized to designate the quota for each Parish and Mission based upon the average amount of its current expenses for the past three years.

For the Year 1959

There were ten meetings of the Standing Committee held during 1959.

February 9th

Consent was given to the Board of Social Service to transfer Bonnie Brae Farm property to Bonnie Brae Farm for Boys.

Consent was given to the Department of Missions to sell the church and vicarage property formerly used by the congregation of the Church of the Redeemer, Palisades Park, the church to be sold to Joseph Lanza for \$20,000 and the vicarage to Martha Wieben for \$16,000.

Consent was given to the Department of Missions to sell Christ Church, Passaic, to Michael Kotis for \$5,000, action having been taken by the Department of Missions to discontinue Services in this church.

Mr. Edwin Ball was recommended to the Bishop for Ordination to the Perpetual Diaconate.

The election of Mr. Archibald Forbes to fill a vacancy in the Chapter of Trinity Cathedral was confirmed.

Consent was given to the Diocese of Alabama to elect a Bishop Coadjutor.

Consent was given to the Ordination and Consecration of the Rev. George Leslie Cadigan as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Missouri.

It was reported that Consent had been granted to St. Luke's, Phillipsburg, by circularization, to sell its rectory to James C. and Jane L. Dalley for \$9,500.00.

Consent was granted to St. Stephen's, Jersey City, to mortgage their rectory property to The Provident Institution for Savings in Jersey City, for \$17,000.

March 10th

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS

March 7, 1960

To the Convention of the Diocese of Newark

The Department of Missions submits the following as a summary of its activities during the calendar year 1959. Nine meetings were held, with the Rt. Rev'd Leland Stark presiding at eight with the Rt. Rev'd Donald MacAdie presiding at one. The meeting dates are presented below:

January 20, 1959

March 6, 1959

April 15, 1959

May 20, 1959

June 10, 1959

September 1, 1959

The June 10th meeting was held at St. Mary's Church in Sparta after a pilgrimage which included visits to the missions at Denville, Mt. Arlington, Stanhope, Lake Lackawanna, Hackettstown, Washington, Belvidere, Delaware, Hope, Hamburg and Sparta.

As of December 31, 1958 there were 35 missions and 7 aided parishes. During the year 1959 the Department considered problems of varying degree from 30 of the missions and two parishes hitherto unaided. At each meeting the Department considered an agenda averaging twelve items and the minutes of the nine meetings cover in detail the considerations and the actions taken in each item presented. Following are a few of the major considerations or actions.

Coytesville, St. Stephen's.

Last year's report mentioned the expanding population around this mission and the need for a new church and expanded parish facilities. Plans for a new church building to cost approximately \$95,000 were presented in April and the Department approved the plans and authorized the Department Committee on Coytesville to secure bids for presentation to the Department. Bids were received but the lowest acceptable bid came to \$115,397. It was finally decided to undertake the work at Coytesville in parts, the first of which would be the enlargement of the present parish house and demolishing the small present church. This work was commenced and at the close of 1959 work was well advanced on the parish house alterations and additions. The mission also started a campaign to raise \$40,000 so that the next phase of the total work, building a new church, could begin.

Delaware, St. James' and Hope, St. Luke's

Early in 1959 neither of these small but very old churches was served by a Vicar. The Rev'd Albert Eastburn was established in the newly repaired vicarage at Hope and is ministering to both missions.

Hamburg, Good Shepherd

In March of 1959 it was brought to the attention of the Department that population was increasing in the Hamburg, Stockholm and New Foundland area and that possibly a new mission at Stockholm and/or New Foundland might be started. A preliminary survey was made but it was decided that no action be taken until after the contemplated Diocesan Survey be completed.

Haworth, St. Luke's

The 1959 Report of the Department mentioned the erection of the new church for this mission in Haworth and, also, that as soon as possible the old property vacated in Dumont would be sold. The sale of this property was consummated in the spring of 1959. Also a new vicarage was erected and the Vicar is now occupying it.

Jersey City, Incarnation

The repairs to the church and vicarage of this mission authorized in 1958 have been completed. A splendid job was done.

Lake Lackawanna, St. Joseph's

A committee has been appointed to give serious study to a proposal to relocate this mission on or near Route 206 in the general area of Cranberry Lake or Andover.

Lincoln Park, St. Andrew's

This mission has re-financed its mortgage and the Episcopal Advance Fund has been repaid. The mission undertook a campaign for overall expenses for two years and the Department was advised that pledges aggregating \$65,000 have been received.

Livingston, St. Peter's

Plans and specifications for a new church building were being prepared late in 1959 and it was expected that these could be sent out for bids in January 1960.

Midland Park, Christ

The new parish house has been dedicated and is in use. Property for a parking lot has also been obtained.

Oakland-Franklin Lakes Areas

The growth of population in this area was mentioned in last year's report and a committee had been appointed to make a survey of the area and seek land suitable for church purposes. The Committee immediately began its work and in January of 1959 made its first report and recommendations. One recommendation was that services in this area be started as quickly as possible and that the search for land be continued. By April the Rev'd Donald Beers became Vicar of a new mission called St. Alban's and immediately began his ministry. In September he reported that the mailing list of the mission showed 170 Episcopal families. An Every Member Canvass was completed in one day and 62 pledges were received. Plans were completed for a vicarage and at the end of the year land suitable for a church was found. This land was purchased early in 1960.

Teaneck, St. Mark's

A new parish house was completed and turned over to the congregation.

Towaco, Transfiguration

The need for additional parish house space was brought to the attention of the Department early in the year and as the need was apparent, plans and specifications were prepared and bids on them obtained. The parish house construction was progressing favorably at the end of the year.

Wayne, St. Michael's

The new church at Wayne was dedicated on October 31, 1959. In December it was reported that the attendance at the ten o'clock service was about 400 and that an additional service would be added.

West Milford, Incarnation

A vicarage for this mission was completed late in 1959.

Budget

A budget of \$160,000 was submitted to the Finance Committee of the Diocesan Council with a request that this amount be appropriated for 1960. Pledges from the parishes and missions of the diocese were inadequate and the requested budget for the Department of Missions was cut to \$136,200.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Diocese of Newark

Report for 1959

The expressed desire of the National Department of Christian Education to have better communication with the whole Episcopal Church was implemented during 1959 in these specific ways. At Omaha, Nebraska in February, some 150 educational leaders of dioceses and parishes were brought together. In April at Radnor, Pennsylvania, the Chairman, Executive Secretary, and a representative of the Episcopal Churchwoman met their opposite numbers from the Diocese of the Second and Third Provinces. A continuation of this meeting for the executive educational directors of dioceses was held at Greenwich in October. Mrs. Frederick Gilman as liaison between this diocese and Greenwich had two conferences there and reported on the same. At the end of the year the Rev. Sumner Walters of the Greenwich staff was appointed by them to consider the specific needs of this diocese. One pilot class in the revision of the 9th grade material, and three pilot classes in two different churches are teaching from a second revision of the first grade course. All of these are supervised from the national headquarters.

The Diocesan Department of Christian Education continued to function through 1959 by means of three committees that implemented the overall policy decided by the Department. Reports of the highlights of each follow.

CHILDREN'S COMMITTEE

Formerly named the Church School Committee it emphasized teacher training through the purchase of the 16mm half hour film "Here & Now", and arranged for the booking and interpretation of the same in parishes. It sent Miss Eleanor Allen to Chicago for training in a Workshop on the Creative Arts. They scheduled an afternoon session where some fifteen parishes sent trainers to be helped in various skills she had to offer.

They sent Mrs. Frederick Gilman to the Parish Day School Conference at Kanuga, North Carolina. She has since become the Director of our first parish day school in the Diocese—St. Andrew's Academy, Lincoln Park.

The Advent Offering on this committee's recommendation now terminates, and does not start, as it has, hitherto, on Advent Sunday. They are recommending for 1960 that the Presentation Services for the receiving of the Lenten Offering of the Church Schools be put on an archdeaconry basis.

YOUTH COMMITTEE

The pre-lenten Bishops' Rally for the Youth of the Diocese was held through the use of the combined facilities of the Cathedral House, Peddie Memorial Church and the Y.W.-Y.M.C.A. It consisted of a general presentation followed by smaller discussion groups.

Three well attended High School Conferences with wide participation by parishes were held at Holiday House, Delaware.

ADULT COMMITTEE

The Family Service Questionnaire raised questions of 'rationale' about special liturgical practices occurring in parishes. Referral of the report to a consultative conference with the Bishop eventuated in the selection of 'liturgics' as one of the topics of the 1959 Clergy Conference.

The holding of a six day pilot Parish Life Mission under the Rev. William Coulter as Leader at St. Paul's Church, Montvale resulted in training twelve clergy who could give leadership in such an enterprise. In evaluating this type of program the Committee established standards and procedures to follow if any parish or mission wants to take advantage of this kind of a mission. One PLM subsequent to the pilot one has been held.

The Committee again supported the Princeton Conference which had wider participation than heretofore, including good delegations from the dioceses of New York and New Jersey as well as our own.

The Rev. James Waring was assisted to attend a Church and Group Life Laboratory. 37 clergy who had but recently come to the diocese were present at a three day Institute held at the Bishop Douglass Conference Center, Tuxedo Park, N. Y. There was a conference for lay people at the same place. Both were in November.

Three laymen are using their skills as trainers along the lines described in "Design for Adult Education in the Church". All three were aided by the Adult Committee in acquiring their training.

The Rev. George R. Dawson who has given energetic direction to the Adult Committee for several years resigned as Chairman in December as he was to move from the Diocese. He was succeeded by the Rev. Henry B. Cannon as Chairman.

The Chairman of the Department, the Ven. Welles R. Bliss, Rector of Grace Church, Nutley, and Archdeacon of Essex proffered his resignation which was accepted with regret. The Rev. A. Wayne Schwab has become the Chairman of the diocesan Department of Christian Education.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

For the Year 1959

I would like to highlight three areas of the Department's work in the year 1959.

In order to stimulate our people to more fully exercise their Christian citizenship, the Department issued a Legislative Bulletin in March. It dealt with a few of the bills before Congress and the Legislature—bills in which human welfare was especially involved. And in order that the legislators might not only hear from Episcopalians by letter, but also in person, the Department organized and sponsored its second Legislative Caravan to Trenton on April 15. On that date 160 men and women from our parishes and missions went to the State House to speak personally with their representatives in government. This group, led by Bishop MacAdie, also had the opportunity to speak with the Governor. Apparently we set a precedent in 1958 in sponsoring such a Caravan. The United Church Women of New Jersey sponsored one last year—and the New Jersey Council of Churches is jointly sponsoring one with them this year. So you see through the efforts of our Department and through the efforts of concerned Episcopalians throughout the Diocese, Christian opinion is being presented in places where decisions are in the process of being made.

The Department went on record for the following during the past year: (1) the abolition of capital punishment, (2) a minimum wage for New Jersey, (3) Sunday closing law, (4) national juvenile delinquency legislation, (5) special educational services for emotionally and socially maladjusted children in N. J., (6) planned parenthood legislation, (7) college bond issue, and (8) migrant labor legislation.

On Saturday, May 16, the Department sponsored a Diocesan-wide Conference on "The Church and Human Relations" in Trinity Cathedral and Cathedral House. This was another outstanding conference such as those sponsored by our Department in recent years on "Problems on the Aging" and "The Church and Freedom". One of the three leading speakers was The Rev. James A. Gusweller, rector of St. Matthew's and St. Timothy's Church, New York City. This young priest is the 20th century crusader for social justice in the housing situation in New York City today. Mr. Lester B. Granger, an Episcopalian, who is Executive Director of the National Urban League and Vice President of The International Conference on Social Work, spoke on "Our Human Relations Problems in a World Perspective". Mr. Granger was especially well qualified to do this as he had just returned from a world tour and has travelled widely over the years observing social welfare and political conditions with special attention to conditions in under-developed areas. Our third principal speaker was Mr. Louis Webster Jones, one of the Nation's leading educators and President of Rutgers University from 1951-58. Mr. Jones spoke on "Meeting Our Human Relations Problems". He is President of The National Conference of Christians and Jews. The Discussion group topics indicate the scope of the Conference. Some of them were human relations in regard to housing, the urban church, civil rights legislation and human relations techniques for the parish. We were fortunate in having as chairman of the Conference, Mr. Harold Lett, an Episcopalian, who was Asst. Director of the Division Against Discrimination, Dept. of Education of the State of New Jersey.

On December 5, 1959, The Department sponsored a Regional Conference on Human Relations for the Bergen County churches. Local clergy and county leaders considered local human relations problems.

In order to stimulate more activity in Christian Social Relations in the parishes and missions of the Diocese, the Department last May issued for the first time a C.S.R. Bulletin to the clergy and C.S.R. chairmen of our churches. The Department plans to issue the Bulletin about three times a year. Several other dioceses have such a bulletin and find it an invaluable channel of communication for national and diocesan C.S.R. news.

In closing, I would like to say we are indeed fortunate to have had such fine leadership on our Committees during this past year. We are most grateful for the wise counseling of Bishop MacAdie, and the splendid team work of the members of our Department in carrying out our program.

DEPARTMENT OF PROMOTION

To the 86th Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

During the past year the Department of Promotion initiated its work on "Wills and Bequests" by writing to every Parish for previously published material. The work is continuing and progressing and we can promise that in the not too distant future we will have material for distribution to the clergy.

Once again the Every Member Canvass Committee responded to calls from many parishes for assistance in planning and conducting Canvasses.

In addition to 313 daily and 156 weekly radio programs the Radio and Television Committee provided the following special programs:

Christmas Two hours on WVNJ and one hour each on WMTR and WCRV.

Thanksgiving One-half hour on WVNJ, WMTR and WCRV

Easter One-half hour on WCRV and WVNJ and seventy minutes on WMTR

Good Friday Two "Specials" on WVNJ and WMTR

It is important to note that the only cost involved in producing the above programs was for material and equipment, and that cost was less than \$1,000.

The Newark Churchman The Rev. A. Stewart Hogenauer, former Editor of the Newark Churchman, was appointed by the Bishops in March to consider editing some sixteen-page issues of the present size format with the "one-third advertising to two-thirds picture and news copy" for as many issues of this restricted size as necessary until additional income would justify more pages. Mr. Hogenauer accepted this responsibility in cooperation with an Advisory Committee which would establish policy for the editor to carry out. Beginning with June 1959 issue five issues were produced—June, September, October, November, December—of sixteen pages—with the approval of the Advisory Committee.

We are happy to announce that Frank L. Allen, a parishioner of Christ Church, Bloomfield-Glen Ridge, was appointed by Bishop MacAdie as Business Manager of the Newark Churchman in November 1959. Mr. Allen has done a tremendous job in collecting outstanding debts and soliciting new advertising.

In closing this report of the Department of Promotion the Chairman wants to express his gratitude to all who are contributing so generously of their time and efforts. The purpose of the Department is to serve the Diocese and we are always grateful for all advice which will help in improving this service.

DEPARTMENT OF URBAN WORK-1959 REPORT

Seven meetings of the Diocesan Department of Urban Work were held during the year 1959. Discussion continued in several areas.

Informal meetings between the clergy and people of the North Newark parishes have continued to be held. The scope of these meetings has been in the recent past widened to include all seven of the parishes which lie north of Central Avenue, i.e., Trinity Cathedral, House of Prayer, St. James', St. John's, St. Mark's, St. Barnabas', and St. Thomas'.

The Christ Church, Newark Committee, having been asked by the Diocesan Council to review the work in that area, recommended that present aid from the Diocesan Department of Missions be continued. It is felt that this parish is in a strategic location within an area that cannot readily be served by any other Episcopal Church in the city of Newark.

A request for help in supporting a Spanish-speaking lay worker for the Church of the Holy Communion in Paterson was received. This parish is now in an area into which many Puerto Ricans are moving and the lay worker is available on a part-time basis for a very reasonable remuneration. \$300 from the Department's budget was voted to support this worker for three months, it being hoped that further sums would be available from other sources as needed.

On December 1st a Dinner meeting was held for about twenty of the clergy serving in urban and fringe urban areas enabling them and the members of the Department to talk over the particular problems involved in the urban Church situation and to discuss ways in which the parishes in such areas might become more effective in their ministries. This meeting was well received and the discussion was excellent.

In the future this Department hopes to be ever more effective in bringing the urban situation before the Diocese and its people, since much of the problem involves education. It is also hoped that the present Diocesan Survey will help to clarify some of the directions in which we as a Department and as a Diocese ought to be moving.

EPISCOPAL CHURCHWOMEN, DIOCESE OF NEWARK

Report of The President—1960

Episcopal Churchwomen are bound together by their common love for God, their common concern for the welfare of mankind, and their common zeal for the spread of the Gospel. That is a quote, in part, from "Women in the Life of the Church", and we in Newark have, I think, been just that for this year past,—as we have in the eighty-five years of our diocesan organization. We are continually trying to find better ways in which to do it.

Bishop MacAdie gave us a fine start, in our Diocesan Meeting programs for the year, bringing us up to date on diocesan "Family Affairs".

We then held our twelfth Annual Conference at Buck Hill Falls, with about three hundred and fifty women for twenty-four hours of renewal, refreshment and instruction, under Mrs. William Leidt of the diocese of New York as the leader. We have in this conference a unique opportunity to reach this large number of interested women, and certainly it has proven to be a highlight of our program.

A Quiet Morning in December was led by Bishop Boynton, of New York, with "Meditations on the Triennial Theme". Such periods of spiritual contemplation, in which we go apart in silence, have grown throughout the diocese; the value of being still and listening has served to counteract our activity—necessary as that is—and to deepen our devotional lives.

In January and February we were led to a better understanding of the efforts of the Church in Leadership Training, and on the College Campus. It is well to have these broad plans presented, so that we see our part in the whole.

The first joint meeting of Episcopal Churchmen and Women was a dinner and meeting to hear Mr. Alfred Demas Baly, Visiting Lecturer at Kenyon College, speak on "The Ministry of the Laity". Mr. Baly addressed the Triennial Meeting at Miami Beach, and we were fortunate in having him here.

Mrs. William Hannah, one of the four women members of our National Council, and previously of the National Executive Board of the Women's Auxiliary, presented the "Program of the Episcopal Churchwomen" at our annual meeting in May. Such direct interpretation of our goals in the work of the whole church is a privilege we shall endeavor to deserve and translate effectively.

The presentation of the United Thank Offering in Trinity Cathedral had the Rev. David Reed, of the Overseas Department, as the speaker at this great service of praise and thanksgiving.

We are grateful for generous contributions from parishes, which have enabled us to not only carry on the items in our budget, but to increase some special categories in which the need was great. As a separate report of finances is printed in the Diocesan Journal, I commend this to you.

Newly elected officers and chairmen are warmly welcomed, with our gratitude to those completing their terms of office, and I can only offer my heartfelt thanks for the wonderful work these women have done with us.

Our bishops, dean and clergy are surely an ever present help, guide and inspiration in all we do as we participate in "the church's work in parish, community, diocese, nation and the world".

BOARD OF EXAMINING CHAPLAINS

Annual Report for 1959

The Board of Examining Chaplains of the Diocese of Newark held examinations for Holy Orders four times during the year 1959, one make-up examination, and three business meetings.

On Wednesday and Friday, April 1 and 3, 1959 Messrs. Francis S. Bancroft III, Robert Clark Bornfield, Fred Munro Ferguson, C. Edward Keller, Jr., Marshall T. Rice, and Wesley H. Smith, as required in Canon 29, Sec. 1 (a); and Dr. Christian A. Hovde, as required in Canon 29, Sec. 2 (a), appeared before the Board and successfully completed all examinations for Ordination.

On Saturday, May 2, 1959, Mr. Alexander Choate, who was being transferred from the Diocese of New Hampshire, appeared before the Board and successfully completed all examinations for Ordination to the Diaconate in accordance with Canon 29, Sec. 2 (a).

On Saturday, November 7, 1959, the Rev. Alexander Choate and the Rev. Dr. Christian A. Hovde appeared before the Board for examination in the subjects required by Canon 29, Sec. 1 (a) for Ordination to the Priesthood. In a special re-examination in one subject Mr. Choate later completed the requirements for his Ordination.

On Monday and Wednesday, December 28 and 30, 1959, Messrs. Alva G. Decker, Joseph D. Herring, Jr., Robert S. Phipps, Jr., and A. Donald Wiesner appeared before the Board for examination in some of the subjects required in Canon 29, Sec. 1 (a).

At the April 3, 1959, meeting of the Board, it was voted that Mr. William E. Dodd, postulant for the Perpetual Diaconate, prepare for examination in the subjects required in Canon 26, Sec. 5 (c). A communication from the Joint Commission on Theological Education, calling for comments or suggestions for improvements on "Theological Studies & Examinations: a Syllabus" was read, and later answered with the comments of the heads of committees.

At Bishop Stark's request the Board met with him on Thursday, December 3, 1959, to consider and discuss two matters principally:

1. Older men who feel called to the Ministry, five or six having approached Bishop Stark with a desire to be made Candidates for Holy Orders.
2. The Perpetual Diaconate, for which there is a growing number of applicants.

The Board concurred with Bishop Stark that we investigate the plans of the Dioceses of Michigan and Minnesota for older men and for perpetual deacons, which was done by the Secretary.

Mr. Howard E. Garretson has been accepted as a postulant and will study privately under the guidance of the Rev. Sidney B. Parker; and Mr. Gordon Swetland, another postulant, under the guidance of the Rev. Addison K. Groff, both with the co-operation of members of the Board.

The Corporation was founded by Royal Charter on March 29, 1769, and later divided between the States of Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and New York. It was incorporated in New Jersey on December 2, 1807.

The benefits of membership are available to clergymen of the Protestant Episcopal Church who are not over fifty-five years of age and who have been canonically and actually resident in the State of New Jersey for not less than five years and who can supply a medical certificate attesting to their good health and physical fitness. The annual dues are twelve dollars per year.

Annual meetings of the Corporation are held on the first Monday in June of each year, and Executive Committee meetings more frequently. Applications for membership are considered at the annual meeting and at meetings of the Executive Committee. Upon request the Secretary gladly supplies application blanks or other information.

At the Annual Meeting held on June 1, 1959, the Treasurer reported assets of \$281,813.87. His statement also showed net receipts of \$15,319.83, from which annuities and dividends were paid. At this meeting a dividend of \$100 was ordered paid to each beneficiary entitled thereto. This was in addition to the annuity of \$100 guaranteed by the Statutes to the widows and minor children of deceased Contributors. In the year ended April 30, 1959, five contributors were lost by death, and one new one was elected, making a total membership of 116 bishops and priests in the Dioceses of New Jersey and Newark.

HOUSE OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD

280 Henry St., Orange

In 1882 the House of the Good Shepherd was founded by the Reverend Anthony Schuyler, Rector of Grace Church, Orange, as a home for elderly, dependent parishioners. In March, 1885, the Home was incorporated, and through the generosity of Mrs. William Barr, its building was enlarged to its present size with accommodations for thirty-two residents. The only requirements for applicants is that they be at least sixty-five years of age, and pass a physical examination to prove that they are in fairly good health so as not to require nursing care, for which the Home has no license.

Twenty-one persons serve on the Board of Trustees and meet every month. The present officers are:

Mr. E. O. Stanley, Jr., retired in January, 1960, after a distinguished service of 27 years as Treasurer. His father had served in the same office for ten years before his son.

Eighteen local clergy of the Episcopal Church hold Services in the Chapel of the Home on Thursday mornings throughout the year, with Bishop Stark and Bishop MacAulie making annual visitations to celebrate Holy Communion on Ascension Day and All Saints' Day. In 1959, they officiated at fifteen Services of Holy Communion, twenty-six of Morning Prayer, and eleven of Litany, with sermons preached at Services other than Holy Communion. There was one Burial from the Chapel.

There are seven Lay Readers, licensed by the Bishop, who read Evening Prayer and Sermon on Sunday afternoons from September 15 to June 15, a total of thirty-nine in 1959. From June 15 to September 15, they read Morning Prayer and Sermon on Sunday mornings, a total of thirteen in 1959. Three Lay Readers were lost by removal from this area in 1959, and one new one gained through the Lay Readers' Guild. They are ably assisted by four volunteer organists. Once a year they have dinner together for fellowship.

CITY MISSION OF NEWARK, N.J.

The City Mission Society, a social agency in The Diocese of Newark, was organized in 1913. Its primary purpose is to express the concern of the Church for those who are in institutions within the borders of The Diocese. It does this by relating the hospitals, homes, and penal institutions within the Diocese to the resources of the Parish Churches—both clerical and lay.

So far the main emphasis has been on hospitals. Each of the sixty-five hospitals within the Diocese has an Episcopal clergyman who is responsible for our Church's ministry in the particular hospital. These associated chaplains (75 in number) report regularly on their ministry in the hospital assigned them.

Nearly 250 lay volunteers from our parishes and missions are going forth in the Name of Jesus to meet human need in eleven public hospitals throughout the Diocese. Their recruitment, training and sustaining in the work is under the supervision of Canon Hanson. (By its very nature, this is a continuing work as volunteers move away, die, etc.) In every possible way these volunteers extend warmth and friendship to the patients. They visit with the friendless and the lonely ones. They read to those who want it and they write letters for the patients. Some give ward parties and some serve as nurses' aides. They work in libraries, offices and laboratories. They distribute literature, clothes, candy, cigarettes, and other personal items beyond regular hospital care. There is a great need for more volunteers for this field of Christian service.

In 1959, 203 active volunteers gave approximately 406 man-hours per week of service and approximately 1165 people were helped.

On Sunday, Nov. 22, a Conference for the volunteers of The Society was held in Trinity Cathedral and Cathedral House. Over 250 people attended and The Rev. B. Wendell Stephan, Chaplain of the Greater Hartford (Conn.) Council of Churches, gave an address on "The Meaning of Love in Human Relationship." In attendance were administrators of hospitals, doctors, nursing supervisors, clergy, and volunteer workers from many parishes, including the C.M.S. volunteer chairmen from eleven hospitals.

In 1959 the Society extended its volunteer work into the penal field. A group of 15 C.M.S. male volunteers was organized for work at the Essex Co. Caldwell Penitentiary. Also, the work of 15 Episcopalian volunteers at The Morris Co. Jail already established by Mr. Warren H. Turner, was incorporated into the work of The Society. The plan is for an extension of this work to other county jails in the years ahead. The emphasis in the work is the helping of the released prisoner in his total social readjustment. Help includes finding of a job, a place to live, friends and clothes. Help is also given to the families of prisoners.

This Fall we hope to extend this same type of program to the nursing homes within the borders of our Diocese. We hope to relate them to the resources of the parish churches locally.

The volunteer work of The Society received nation-wide recognition in a two-page article in the March issue of "Forth," the official national magazine of The Church.

The work of The Society extends out beyond the bounds of institutions. The Rev. John R. Green of The Staff, conducts a counseling service. People are referred to him not only by the clergy of The Diocese, but by The Essex Co. Probation Dept. and The Court of Domestic Relations. The Rev. Mr. Green counsels ex-mental patients, people with marital difficulties, alcoholics, etc. He has extensive training and experience in this field.

The concern of The Society for the broader field of Christian service is demonstrated by the fact that Canon Hanson has been serving as Chairman of The Department of Christian Social Relations of The Diocese for the past four years. He gives a considerable amount of time to this work. (See Report of The Department of Christian Social Relations, page CR 28.) Both he and Mr. Green serve on many boards of trustees of organizations within this area of the Church's concern. Thus, The Church in The Diocese of Newark through the City Mission Society not only goes out in Christian service into the community, but through the Society's clergy, the Church's leadership is given in Christian social action in the community. The Church's concern for the social welfare of the community is expressed! The Church is in the world!

F. BRUCE GERHARD, *Treasurer***"REPORT OF THE DEAN OF TRINITY CATHEDRAL"**

I do not need to call your attention to the construction all around the Cathedral of the Military Park Parking Garage. I do want to assure you that the Parking Authority has been most sincerely concerned about the Cathedral building and that in addition we have retained our own engineering firm to inspect the property regularly and to advise us of its condition. We all trust that the work will resume in the near future and at the same time we regret the involved delay in the completion of the contract.

During the past year we have been particularly concerned about three areas of work. For some years St. Thomas' Mission to the Deaf has met here at the Cathedral. This is the last of three missions to the Deaf which existed some years ago in the Diocese. Services are presently led by the Reverend Gilbert Braddock, who comes here once a month from Philadelphia. I have for some months been receiving instructions in the sign language in the hopes of supporting this ministry. Across the nation this work is in serious need of increasing attention. Seven mission stations to the deaf in this country are now without clergy, and there are no clergy sufficiently trained to take on more than two of these places.

A year ago the Reverend James Gill, completing a three-year pilot project for the Church Society for College Work, established a ministry to the colleges of Newark. A year ago he began giving part time as Episcopal chaplain to the Newark colleges and opened the College Center in the choir rooms at Cathedral House. Recognizing the enormously increasing enrollment which will take place in the next 10 years, we are happy that the College Committee of the Diocese has established this work, and we are happy to be involved in supervising it.

The Reverend Walther Dettweiler, having accepted a call to St. John's Newark, will also be in charge of the College Center, since Mr. Gill is going into the foreign mission field.

During the past year, through the cooperation of the clergy of the Diocese, we have brought together a list of more than 300 Episcopalians who work in downtown Newark. They have come together for two luncheons and are about to hold their third on May 26th. It is our hope that these luncheons may serve to increase the sense of community of our downtown church people and assist them in becoming more familiar with the work of the Church throughout the world.

It was our hope that these three tasks might be given to a priest who would be added to the Cathedral staff, and we were able to raise three-quarters of the necessary annual budget to make this a reality. The last quarter of this budget could not be raised, and therefore the work will continue as it has been described above.

Two vocational conferences—one for college staff and another for lawyers—were scheduled and planned, but had to be cancelled at the last minute because of low registration. This serves to emphasize that it is most difficult for the present staff to promote adequately such conferences within the limited staff-time available.

The Cathedral has shared in the work of the Archdeaconry and has also sought to encourage cooperative action with the North Newark churches so that we may relate ourselves more effectively to the geographic area in which we find ourselves. In view of the startling changes which Newark has and will continue to face in its whole urban redevelopment, we believe it is increasingly important that parishes of Newark work together to minister to the community at large and to develop means of evangelizing the increasing number of enormous housing developments.

The recent survey has revealed that our communicant strength is now 385. This is a testimony to the changes which have affected every parish in the city in the past 20 years. In recent years the annual meetings of Trinity Parish have been concerned with helping the parish understand its own purpose. Two years ago, members of the parish shared with one another their convictions as to the significance and value of the ministry of Trinity Parish. Last year our Bishops addressed the congregation on the significance of Trinity as an urban parish and as a Cathedral parish. Recently the Reverend John Forell addressed this year's parish meeting on what this Cathedral parish might become and might do for the Diocese.

The parish provides financial support through total pledges of \$25,000 a year. We believe this is a favorable record, recognizing that it comes from 241 pledgers. Endowments, largely raised before the parish became a Cathedral, account for the remaining support of the Cathedral program. The parish generally is extremely sensitive to its opportunity and its obligation to serve as a symbol and effective instrument for the whole Diocese. We would value suggestions and assistance from the Diocese at large.

The number of special services has been somewhat less this year. The staff is called upon to give substantial amounts of time and energy to work beyond the normal parish ministry. Canon Williams is deeply involved in a ministry to the staff and children of the Newark Home for Foster Care and has done an excellent job in the supervision of repairs, maintenance and redecoration at Cathedral House, in addition to carrying a heavy share of pastoral ministry to the parish.

The Dean has continued to accept invitations to speak from within the Diocese when it was at all possible and some outside the Diocese. During the past year this has required the preparation of 25 sermons or addresses and, in addition, sharing the leadership of three conferences of a week each. The Dean is heavily involved in significant social agencies in the community and has served on an active sub-committee as well as the general committee of the Department of the Church and Economic Life of the National Council of Churches.

By its location the Cathedral continues to be a referral for many who are seeking help of various kinds.

Fundamental to the whole life of the Cathedral is the parish which continues to be a source of creative strength for its members and, we trust, a witness to others as well.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION TO STUDY CLERGY SALARIES

I. INTRODUCTION.

The 1959 Convention of the Diocese of Newark, acknowledging apparent "grave inequalities," and marked disparities between clergy salaries and area income and the Cost of Living Index, requested Bishop Stark to appoint a "Commission to Study Clergy Salaries." Our Bishop complied, appointing to the task four laymen, Rear Admiral Charles L. Austin (Christ Church, Short Hills), and Messrs. William P. Rausse (St. John's Church, Union City), B. Preston Root (Church of the Redeemer, Morristown), and Roy Thornall (St. Bartholomew's Church, Ho-Ho-Kus), and two prebys, the Rev'd Henry M. Biggin (Church of St. Mary the Virgin, Ridgefield Park) and, to act as Chairman, the Rev'd Ivan H. Partridge (All Saints' Church, Glen Rock). The Commission to Study Clergy Salaries, thus appointed, respectfully submits this report in accordance with direction of the 1959 Convention.

The complete text of the Resolution forming this Commission may be found on Page 71 of the 1959 *Journal, Diocese of Newark*. Briefly, our central commission was: "... to study the matter of Clergy stipends and related considerations, and ... prepare a report on the following matters:

1. The true picture of remuneration received by the Clergy in the Diocese of Newark.
2. Suggestions and/or formulas as to how vestries may arrive at just and equitable salaries.
3. Ways and means of encouraging parishes and missions not presently paying adequate stipends to do so.
4. Such other facts and suggestions as may seem to the Commission to be relevant to a full understanding of the matter of clergy salaries in this Diocese."

Your Commission submits this report believing that it is complete in that it provides as far as possible the information and recommendations requested by the last Convention. We believe, however, that much more study of this total situation than it has been possible for a reasonably hard-working group to do in one year is needed and, also, that there are certain matters pending, such as the Diocesan Council's study of group life insurance where any recommendation on our part is unwarranted at this time. For these reasons, we hope that, in fact, the Convention will accept this as an interim report and either accept our offer of our further services, or commission a successor group to continue the work of this Commission.

With these thoughts in mind, we turn first to the matter of providing the Convention with further information about the problem and then to recommendations and resolutions which we trust will be instrumental in improving the situation.

II. THE PROBLEM.

As a result of its investigations, the Commission is convinced that the Diocese does face a serious problem in the matter of clergy salaries. Before this Commission considers its work finally complete, it will make exhaustive efforts to secure replies from its questionnaire on clergy salaries from every clergyman in the Diocese and will mail to all clergy and vestries the most complete possible tabulation of the results it can make. Meanwhile, as of this date, we have a large and representative cross section of replies as to clergy salary factors. The following percentages are based on the results of 120 questionnaires, on a small few of which the answers to various questions were omitted:

Above \$4200 per annum	54%
\$4200 per annum exactly	21%
\$3900 to \$4200 per annum	13%
Below \$3900	11%

The questionnaires received to date show salaries from more than one at the \$3,000 per annum mark up through the stipends paid our Bishops. Since the "minimum salary" of \$4200 per annum is variously interpreted as including, or not including, perquisites, it is difficult to arbitrarily state that salaries below a certain level are below the minimum. However, this Commission firmly believes that any married priest paid less than \$3900 with perquisites, or \$4200 without perquisites, is clearly below any reasonable interpretation of the minimum. While recognizing that it is a moot question as to what figure may rightfully be called the minimum salary, we believe that it may be conservatively estimated that 25% of our clergy are at or below a cash salary of \$4200 per year and that many of these receive inadequate perquisites and allowances. This failure to come up to or exceed even the most limited present standards is a problem in itself.

This Commission does not feel it necessary to burden this report with detailed statistics to reinforce the point that there is a problem. However, we note that about one-third of our men do not receive at least some of the usual perquisites: house, heat, electricity, gas, water, and telephone, car allowances. Specifically, we note that, with one-third of our active clergy yet uncounted, at least thirteen men receive no car allowance; thirty-eight receive less than the \$600 per annum paid the mission clergy; and thirty-five apparently do not have rectory telephone service provided. (We recognize that in some instances these men may be receiving additional salary in lieu of such perquisites, but in most cases inspection of the salaries paid does not seem to indicate that this is being done.)

Estimating the net worth of salaries (i.e., assigning cash values to perquisites and adding this amount to cash salary) and perquisites together, it appears that some 70% of our clergy receive less than the average per family income of the general public in the Diocese of Newark area. Furthermore, we feel reasonably sure an even higher percentage receive less than the average household income of the people in their parishes.

We must note also that this Diocese compares unfavorably with many others. The cost of living in this area approximates the national average; incomewise this area is far above the national average; and the median salary of the clergy in this diocese is in the lower half of all full dioceses, according to 1958 figures, the latest available.

These objective realities underscore the fact that action is needed to improve the clergy salaries and perquisites provided those who minister to this diocesan family, particularly those at the lower end of the scale.

There are, in addition, subjective—or morale factors—which also point to the need for positive action. Fifty-six percent of the clergy responding to our question do *not* feel that their salaries are adequate for their needs. Both your Bishops and members of this Commission are aware of hardship cases so severe as to require relief funds, and it appears that nearly half the clergy are in debt.

We of the Commission feel that, while it is only a sidelight on the total problem, the depressing effect of poor clergy livings upon recruiting for the ministry should be mentioned. There is no way to estimate the seriousness of this problem, but it is noteworthy that nearly everyone takes it for granted that at least some promising men are discouraged from considering the ministry. Examination of the churches which have sponsored men of this Diocese in the post-war years, shows a strong trend for the bulk of the men to come from parishes with well-paid rectors. Certainly, it puts a severe burden on any priest who feels he is in need, to ask him to warmly commend the ministry to others.

III. REMEDIES.

As your Commission studied possible remedies for the problem, it had to face the fact that the gap between total remuneration as it is, and as it ought to be, is too great to close in a year, under present economic circumstances. As prudent and responsible

men, we cannot now ask legislation to bring salaries, perquisites and allowances up to the level we feel nearly everyone would like to see. We have, therefore, first turned our attention to economically feasible interim steps.

DEFINITION OF PRESENT MINIMUM

Since the Commission desires to propose a new minimum scale of salaries, perquisites and allowances, there is little purpose in a prolonged examination of the available interpretations of the present "minimum salaries." We, therefore, choose to offer arbitrarily our own interpretation of the present minimum, which is necessary as a point of departure, and trust that our thinking will commend itself to the Convention. We hold that by accepting last year's Department of Missions' budget, the Convention at least tacitly accepted as a diocesan minimum the interpretation placed on this matter by this Department. As of January, 1960, the Department paid married priests a cash salary of \$3900 per annum and provided housing, heat, water, electricity, gas, telephone service and a \$600 a year car allowance. By arbitrarily valuing the perquisites (i.e., the factors added to cash salaries other than car allowances and telephone costs) at \$300, the Department considered itself to be in compliance with the 1955 Resolution of this Convention that the minimum salary should be \$4200 per annum, plus a house. At its last meeting, the Department of Missions provided a cost-of-living increase of \$175 per year to men at the minimum level \$4075 and some other small increments to men of long service, etc. While noting that this assistance has been provided to those men whose salaries the Diocese can control, the mission clergy, we do not hold that the minimum has been changed, because these cost-of-living increases have not been officially granted as permanent raises.

A NEW MINIMUM STANDARD

Since in 1961, 10% more money will be needed to maintain the same level of purchasing power which the Convention intended to provide for a clergyman by its 1955 Resolution, we believe that a new minimum should incorporate a \$400 rise in cash salary, including in the case of mission clergy, the cost-of-living increase just granted. In our opinion, in establishing the \$4200 minimum in 1955, the Convention was primarily considering the needs of clergy with families. We feel that with the economic resources of the Diocese and of many parishes severely strained, it is proper at this time to reassert the earlier practice, which has never been entirely abandoned, of paying single men less than married men, and deacons less than priests. We believe, also that it is generally expected that perquisites, or equivalent cash payments, should be provided in addition to housing and cash salaries. We believe that the following resolution balances as well as possible the above mentioned factors:

Resolution No. 1

BE IT RESOLVED THAT this Convention adopt the following scale of cash salaries and perquisites as the new "Diocesan Minimum" to serve as the lowest level of remuneration for clergy employed on full-time basis by the Diocese, and to be as well the standard which Parish Churches in the Diocese ought to meet:

1. Annual Cash Salaries:
 - a. Deacon, unmarried, \$3600 per year.
 - b. Priest, unmarried, \$3900 per year.
 - c. Deacon, married, \$4000 per year.
 - d. Priest, married, \$4300 per year.
2. Perquisites (For all men, unless paid equivalent additional salary)
 - a. Suitable housing, adequately maintained.
 - b. Heat.
 - c. Electricity.
 - d. Water.
 - e. Gas (if necessary)

TELEPHONE AND AUTOMOBILE ALLOWANCES

The Commission believes that in any instance where the work of the Church requires provision of a telephone in a man's living quarters, this expense should be borne by the Church, but that the Church is not required to pay tolls for personal calls.

The Commission feels that it is very important to draw particular attention to the matter of car allowances. Considering this matter, we wish to endorse a quotation from the *Joint Commission to Study Clergy Pension Plans and Clerical Salaries* (of the 1958 General Convention of the Church). Said the Joint Commission: "The fact remains that travel allowance is the factor in a clergyman's compensation which is least satisfactorily and fairly met. . . . For some reason, Diocesan authorities and parish vestries seem to have more difficulty facing squarely the matter of fair travel allowances than they do in considering adequate salaries. . . ."

Your Commission has reviewed various studies of the difficult question as to what it actually costs to run a car per mile. A scale recommended by the Church Pension Fund, after studies of its own, suggested figures as high as 14.9¢ per mile for a man

driving 7500 miles per year or less. The Joint Commission's report to the 1958 General Convention, already cited, quoted the American Automobile Association as reporting at that time that "for fairly new, low-priced" cars driven 10,000 miles per year, an allowance of 10¢ a mile almost, but not quite, covers the real cost.

The plain fact is that economy-minded larger corporations do pay travel allowances of 10¢ a mile and up, and the Federal Government, for income tax purposes, allows figures up to 12½¢ per mile. The Commission, therefore, believes that paying the clergy a car allowance of 10¢ a mile should be just and equitable. We feel, however, that the clergy must to some extent bear the burden of the fact that this is impossible. In the face of existing economic circumstances, we ask the Convention to pass the following resolutions as at least interim steps toward the provision of just allowances:

Resolution No. II

BE IT RESOLVED THAT this Convention continue the Diocesan policy of paying the basic cost of a telephone, exclusive of a man's personal toll calls, when clergy in Diocesan employ are required to have such service in their homes, and also calls upon parishes to make like provision under like circumstances for its ministers.

Resolution No. III

BE IT RESOLVED THAT this Convention establish \$700 per annum as a minimum car allowance for clergy in Diocesan employ, and calls upon parishes to accept and implement at least this minimum standard for their own ministers, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT this Convention acknowledge the payment of 10¢ per mile as a reasonable minimum rate upon which those able to pay more than the minimum should consider basing car allowances.

Noting that financial provision must be made to implement the resolutions raising minimum payments, the Commission recommends passage of the following enabling resolution:

Resolution No. IV

BE IT RESOLVED THAT this Convention instruct the Diocesan Council to add to the Convention Budget, as adopted, a sufficient amount of money to cover the difference between the standards prevailing at this time and the new minimums.

It is again to be emphasized that the standards outlined above are MINIMUMS. Payment of these minimums will still leave a large portion of our clergy below the average living standard of the lay people of this Diocese and will still leave grave inequities in the payment of car allowances. Furthermore, even if these minimums are fully met, this Diocese will remain behind many others. According to the study of clergy salaries reported to the 1958 General Convention, the two dioceses closest to our own geographically, which are like us in make-up, have substantially higher median salaries. At least eighteen other dioceses also provide life insurance coverage, and some may provide various types of medical coverage. (Since these two matters are under separate consideration by the Diocesan Council, we make no further comment upon them at this time.) It is also reported to us that some dioceses have established minimum salary standards as high as \$5000.00 per year.

The members of your Commission to Study Clergy Salaries earnestly hope that all those concerned with the present and future welfare of this Church and its Ordained Servants will, looking beyond minimums, endeavor to provide decent livings for the clergy families of this Diocese. We emphasize that if anyone regards the minimums here discussed as fully adequate standards, or uses them as a basis to suggest cuts in any man's present salary, perquisites, or allowances, this will be a misuse of this report.

ENCOURAGEMENT TO REACH MINIMUMS

The authors of this report are entirely aware of the gravity of the economic problems of parishes which cannot meet even existing minimums under present circumstances. We are deeply aware that mere recommendations from us will not solve these grave problems. Were there easy answers to the economic problems brought about by the decline of some urban areas, we are sure our highly competent Department of Urban Work, under our Bishops, would have provided them. Nevertheless, we are commissioned to suggest "ways and means of encouraging parishes and missions not presently paying adequate stipends to do so." Not all inadequate stipends are the result of inability to pay, but it is at this point that encouragement is most needed.

With the hope that they may be helpful and encouraging, we record three ideas which have come to us:

1. Use the personnel resources of the Diocesan Family, of which you are a part. Parishes not having, at this moment, men skilled in the techniques of fund raising can

often strengthen their Every Member Canvass by consulting, through the Department of Promotion, fellow Episcopalians who are expert in this field.

2. Commit your Parish to pay a proper salary. Even struggling Churches often succeed in what they really determine to do. Clergy salaries are often (but not always) depressed because vestries hesitate to ask for more, as long as the clergyman doesn't complain.

3. If your minister is willing, tell the people your situation. In all parishes, a large percentage of the lay people do not know there is a minimum salary scale, let alone whether their minister is receiving it. Unless the clergyman wishes otherwise, the people have a right to be told if they are failing their priest.

In cases where remedies such as these simply cannot work, this Commission believes that consultation with the Bishop, or others appointed by him, should be undertaken. There are other possible remedies available, which must be considered for individual situations rather than recommended for all. In some cases diocesan subsidies may be justified; in others it may be desirable for Churches to combine, or, remaining separate, share the service of one Priest. The use of retired clergy on a part-time basis may solve some problems; others may be overcome by a fresh approach. We urge that, before asking any minister to accept a sub-minimum living, a congregation prayerfully accept the counsel of the Bishop, and we ask this Convention to lend its weight to this urging with the following resolution:

Resolution No. V

BE IT RESOLVED THAT this Convention urges any congregation not able, after great effort, to provide its minister with the minimum salary, allowances, and perquisites which are standard in this Diocese, consult with the Bishop or others appointed by him, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT this Convention urges acceptance by Parishes of considered, formal recommendations by the Bishop as to ways and means of raising their ministers' remuneration.

Recognizing that inability to pay is only part of the problem of inadequate stipends, this Commission also suggests, in the following resolution, an educational step which it hopes may help to raise the general level of salaries.

Resolution No. VI

BE IT RESOLVED THAT this Convention request its Bishops to send a pastoral letter to all Wardens, Vestrymen, Executive Committeemen, and Treasurers in the Diocese, pointing out to them the moral responsibility they have for the provision of adequate clergy livings.

FIXING "JUST AND EQUITABLE SALARIES"

Happily, not all clergy salary questions involve the setting and implementation of minimum standards. There is also the question of what is a "just and equitable salary" for a parish or mission able to exceed the minimum. As requested by the 1959 Convention, this Commission offers the following formulae for consideration by vestries who desire reference to a somewhat uniform standard in establishing levels of remuneration:

A. Pay the clergyman the average per family income of the people he serves, determined as follows:

1. Poll an adequate sampling of the parishioners to determine true average per family income.
2. Equate this with a figure including the clergyman's actual salary; $\frac{1}{4}$ of this figure, or the cash rental paid for his house; and the actual cash value of utilities (not including phone and car allowances) paid by the Vestry.

OR

B. Pay the clergyman a salary equal to a high school principal whose seniority in the teaching profession is equal to the clergyman's seniority in the ministry. This figure is achieved by multiplying a teacher's salary, of equal seniority, in the local school system by 1.5. In determining a clergyman's salary, add value of perquisites, as in A, above.

We trust it is clear then, in suggesting these formulae, we are anticipating provision of the same perquisites recommended under the new Diocesan Minimum, and payment of telephone and car allowances, the latter, if possible, at the rate of at least 10¢ per mile.

On the subject of just salaries, we also commend, in the following resolution, a cost-of-living increase for those above the minimum, if it has not already been provided in recent years.

Resolution No. VII

BE IT RESOLVED THAT this Convention urges that any clergyman in the Diocese of Newark, not subject to adjustments in the Diocesan Minimum, who has not received raises in the salary item totaling 10% since January 1, 1956, be raised to this extent over his annual salary as of that date, in recognition of the increased cost of living.

SOME CLOSING THOUGHTS

1. We feel that all too often the Church errs in either regarding clergy remuneration as a topic too delicate for discussion, or else as a purely economic problem. In our opinion, this is not only a matter suitable for public discussion but also a matter which Christian people ought to talk about. Not only did our Lord say, "The laborer is worthy of his hire," He never hesitated to give thought to people's physical and even social needs, as in His first miracle at Cana of Galilee.

2. We point out that the very basis upon which clergy salaries are paid is different from that upon which other people receive their remuneration. To understand fully the basis of clergy salaries, one must start with the fact that a man receives from God a call to do the Lord's work. After due formalities and training, the Church acknowledges this call and commissions the man to do this work in its behalf; to be one of its agents in the accomplishment of God's will and purpose. Then, because the Church has acknowledged a man's call and commissioned him to do the Lord's work, it provides him with a living in order that he may devote his full time, effort and energies to the work of the Master. If this living is then insufficient to free genuinely the clergyman to do the Lord's work, and as a result the advance of Christ's Kingdom is hampered, then the fault lies at the door of those who have inadequately carried out the supporting operation. This means that, as a general rule, those whose responsibility it is to provide clergy "livings" should constantly examine their own stewardship and ask whether they are themselves properly hearing God's call to provide the necessary means for those whose lives are devoted to the work of the Saviour. Indeed, the concept we have just outlined is clearly found in Holy Scriptures in the words of St. Paul (I. Corinthians 9: 14): "... the Lord ordained that they which preach the gospel should live of the gospel."

3. We are confident all will agree that fairness and honesty are part of our Christian calling. We of the Commission, lest we ourselves be judged, have no intention of implying dishonest intent to others. We do, however, feel, particularly in the area of allowances, all of us need to be careful that we are really doing what we claim to be doing. We ask everyone to examine the question of applying the highest standards of Christian honesty to the categorization of monies which the clergy receive. For a flagrant example, there appears to be general agreement that the Church should bear the expense of the travel which its minister does in the course of his work. If in fact a part of the money a clergyman receives is labelled "salary" and another part "car allowance," the implication is that the Church has paid this expense, and that the man's salary is his own for other purposes. If in fact the situation requires that the man take a substantial portion of the amount labelled "salary," and put it into the operation of a car in the Church's behalf, does this not mean that at best there has been either a failure to face fully the cost of automobile operation or else extreme laxness about the use of bookkeeping classifications?

4. The remaining observation concerns the matter of example. In general, Christians acknowledge that as they are called to follow the example of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ so should they show before the world an example of Christian love, thoughtfulness and generosity. We request, then, that everyone consider what is the picture the Church presents to those outside its fellowship. We ask, "Is the treatment accorded many of the clergy a fair and true example of the meaning of Christian love, generosity and concern for others?"

Those of us who have served on the Commission to Study Clergy Salaries hope that this report meets as far as possible at this time the requirements of the Convention. At various points in our report we have pointed to the specific matters which we feel need further study. In point of fact, we believe that it is desirable to delve more deeply into this entire matter, and we recommend therefore the continuation of our study. Our final resolution therefore is intended to offer our services to the Diocese to continue this work.

Resolution No. VIII

BE IT RESOLVED THAT this Convention request its Bishop to continue the work of the *Commission to Study Clergy Salaries*, to be known hereafter as the Commission on Clergy Salaries, for another year and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT this Convention requests the Commission report to the Diocesan Convention of 1961 concerning the gains and continuing needs in the area of clergy salaries; ways and means of further improving existing conditions; and recommendations as to further action which might be needed on the part of this body and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Commission on Clergy Salaries be directed to advise and consult with the Diocesan Council concerning work being done in this area during the interim period.

We are grateful to all who attended to the matters covered in this report.

CHURCH PENSION FUND

To the 1960 Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

Your Diocesan Church Pension Fund Committee submits the following report covering the pension situation up to March 30, 1960.

Your Committee would again call your attention to the 20% increase in pensions. Action to this effect was taken by the Church Pension Fund in December of 1958. Annual pensions under this new rate are currently being paid throughout the Church as follows:

	<i>Number</i>	<i>Amount</i>

To disabled clergy	100	189,051
To widows	1,358	1,336,673
To orphaned children	221	109,007
TOTAL	2,970	\$3,669,759

In comparison with the preceding year, pensions are being paid to ten more persons and the total amount paid is about \$40,000 more than in the preceding year.

About one-half of the costs of benefits from the system are represented by the retirement benefit; one-tenth by the disability benefit; and two-fifths by the widows' and children's benefits. The assessments contribute about one-half of the needed resources in the long run, the other half coming from investment earnings.

For those ordained at normal ages, the retirement and disability pensions are now 60 per cent of average salary (minimum of \$1,800). The widows' pensions are anywhere from \$900 a year to one-half of the husband's pension, depending on years of her married life with him in his active ministry; and the minor children's benefits are \$360 to \$600 a year depending upon age bracket. Pensions less than these figures result from 1) salary averaging under \$1,500; 2) ordination at age 40 or later; 3) discontinuous assessment payments; 4) period of deposition.

The insurance and annuity facilities made available by the Church Life Insurance Corporation are widely used by the clergy and active lay workers and officials. Through this Corporation Dioceses and parishes may provide group life insurance for their clergy. A new development is the Church Major Medical Plan which is geared to diocesan and parish clergy and lay worker groups.

Premium income of the Church Fire Insurance Corporation from over 5,000 churches and institutions is running \$1,600,000 a year.

With respect to our own Diocese, your Committee reports that as of March 30th, 1960, there were in force benefits to 33 clergy in the total amount of \$67,011.36; 1 total and permanent disability of \$1,800; 33 widows' allowances amounting to \$30,636.64; and 5 allowances to orphans amounting to \$2,280.48, or a total of 72 grants amounting to the sum of \$101,748.48.

Your Diocesan Committee wishes to thank all the members of the Diocese who have cooperated in helping the Diocese of Newark to care in such an excellent way for its share of the responsibility in the work of the Church Pension Fund.

Memorandum of Information Required by the Standing Committee on Petition by a Parish or Diocesan Organization to Sell, Lease or Mortgage Real Estate, owned by it.

- I. The Petition should state whether the property to be sold or mortgaged is used as a place of worship, and, if so, whether or not it has been consecrated.
- II. If the petitioner has a map of the property described in the petition, please submit it with the petition, and after the Standing Committee has acted upon the petition the map will be returned.
- III. In the case of a petition to sell or lease real estate:
 1. Besides a description of the property by metes and bounds, the petition should describe the buildings and their present use and the reasons for selling or leasing the same, also that, in the opinion of the petitioner, the sale price or rental is equivalent to the fair value at the time of making the application, and the basis of that opinion, such as appraisals, previous efforts to sell, etc.
 2. If the sale price is to be paid other than in cash the terms of payment should be stated together with the rate of interest, and whether the balance of the sale price is to be secured by a mortgage on the premises, or otherwise, and if a mortgage, the name and address of the person or organization who will take the same.
- IV. In the case of a petition to mortgage real estate:
 1. A statement should be submitted as to the reasons why it is necessary to borrow money, on mortgage, i.e., to erect a new building, or to improve present quarters, etc., with the name of the person or organization who will take the mortgage, the terms of payment and rate of interest.
 2. If a parish applies for leave to mortgage property, there should be submitted a statement of such facts as have convinced the vestry that it is prudent to borrow the desired funds and that the parish will be able to repay the amount borrowed. Information showing whether or not the parish is growing and concerning its financial affairs should be included. In addition to other information on which the Vestry may have acted, the following data is requested:
 - (a) The present parish membership showing the number of families, and the number of baptized persons and communicants, as compared with five years prior thereto.
 - (b) A brief income and operating statement of the parish for the last two fiscal years prior to the making of the application. This statement should show the sources of income such as pledges, plate offerings, rents from any property, income from invested funds, and, under the heading of expenses, a grouping of salaries, usual operating expenses, and the parish quota for the Diocesan and General Church Program, the pledge toward this quota and amount paid thereon.
 - (c) A statement of any Notes Payable or other indebtedness except that incurred in the usual course of parish operations.

3. If the Department of Missions or other Diocesan Corporation applies for leave to mortgage property, it is requested that said corporation submit such information as it deems appropriate to demonstrate the desirability of the course it proposes.
 4. The Standing Committee may request representatives of the petitioner to appear before it in support of the petition, and in the case of a parish they shall be the Rector, Treasurer or other representative, who shall bring with them such parish records as may enable them to answer reasonable questions relating to the parish finances, growth, efforts to raise by gifts the amount which the parish desires to raise by mortgage, etc.
- V. The vestry or the governing body of the petitioner should, by proper resolution, authorize the execution of the petition by the proper officers of the petitioner, and affix the seal of the petitioner to the same.
