CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE 2.

There shall be a Convention of the Church in this Diocese, on the second Tuesday in May in each year, or on such other day in May as may be specially appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority. The Convention shall be held at the Cathedral unless the Ecclesiastical Authority appoints otherwise.

The Annual Reports from Parishes and Missions for 1963 canonically due on or before February 1, 1964, together with the Personal Reports of the Clergy should be forwarded directly to the Bishop of the Diocese, 24 Rector Street, Newark 2, N. J.

Reports from Diocesan Institutions, Departments, Commissions, Archdeacons, and all other persons or bodies reporting to the Convention, should cover the civil year, and be sent not later than February 1, 1964, to the Secretary of the Convention, 24 Rector Street, Newark 2, N. J.

**TENTH ANNUAL ADDRESS OF
THE RIGHT REVEREND LELAND STARK, D.D.
BISHOP OF NEWARK**

My fellow-workers in Christ:

"Grace be unto you and peace from God our Father and from the Lord Jesus Christ!"

If I were delivering two addresses at this Convention instead of just one, I would spend the first outlining in some detail certain great international and national issues upon which the Gospel and the Church of Christ urgently need to make effective impact. But I do not have two addresses to make, and so in the introductory part of my one address, I shall simply bring in by title some of these issues and express the hope that in your several churches you will make them the subject of study and prayer and appropriate action.

One of these is the major issue of our times: the creation — if it may be by the grace of God and in His providence — of a just and righteous peace according to His will. The recent book, *Nuclear Weapons and the Conflict of Conscience*, edited by Dr. John C. Bennett of Union Theological Seminary, I have found particularly helpful. Also, the recent Encyclical of Pope John XXIII, entitled *Pacem in Terris* ("Peace on Earth") is likewise worthy of close study and is, incidentally, also commended to us by our Presiding Bishop.

Another of these issues — and one on which, I regret to say, Pope John XXIII and his colleagues are less than no help — is the problem posed by the world's exploding population. This, if continued unabated, is almost as frightening as the nuclear armaments race. Much good material is available on the subject at the Planned Parenthood Federation of America.

Still another of these issues for study could well be that of the tangled problem of Church-State relations, particularly as it affects our public and parochial schools. There is an excellent article in the May issue of *The Episcopalian*, which would make a fine starting-point for study. Indeed, our Departments of Christian Education and Christian Social Relations might well go into this complex problem in depth.

Again, if I were making two addresses, the first one would include more than the mere mention that I can give it today of the issue of racial inequality, which has been brought to sharp focus this very week by the heart-rending events in Birmingham although we may well remind ourselves that however better conditions may be in this regard in our state, we have by no means come to a complete and Christian solution of this issue either.

Then, as I have often done before, I would commend again to you a study of the movement toward Christian unity, in which our Church, among others, is seriously and responsibly involved. There have been a number of promising developments, not the least of which is the increasingly good relationship between the Roman Catholic and the Protestant Churches, this no doubt stemming from the spirit of that great contemporary Christian, Pope John XXIII.

But I do not have two addresses to give, and so I must content myself with merely introducing these issues by title and urging them upon you for study and prayer and such action as you may appropriately take as followers of Christ.

I.

I come now to what would be, in effect, my "second address," and, admittedly, by contrast the subjects with which I now propose to deal may seem somewhat inconsequential ranged alongside the momentous issues I have raised. But not at all, for remember that this Diocese is a family of 100,000 baptized persons; and through you, their elected representatives and clergy, they are in effect gathered for this one day to take counsel together for the welfare and extension of this particular portion of "the whole state of Christ's Church."

The single word *Increase* now becomes both my title and my theme.

That word *increase* is a most familiar one to bishops. In its form as a verb, *increase* is a key word in the prayer at the laying-on-of-hands in confirmation: "and daily increase in thy Holy Spirit more and more." It is a word I have used in that connection in the now ten years I have been with you as a bishop, no less than 12,360 times, this being the number of heads, young and old, on whom I have laid hands in confirmation. In that decade also, Bishop Washburn and then Bishop MacAdie have had about the same number of confirmations, and in addition the three of us in that ten-year period have received about 1750 persons who had already been confirmed by bishops in other traditions, most of them from the Roman Catholic Church. So the word *increase* is a favorite word with bishops, and I like it too.

First, consider that word *increase* in connection with the size of our diocesan family.

Let me hastily reassure you that this can be no occasion for boasting, for the increase of our Diocese has not quite kept pace with the rate of growth of the civil population. Nonetheless, we are a good-sized diocesan family, the eighth largest in the Episcopal Church. Our 60,000 communicants represent a 10% increase in the last decade, and our over 99,000 baptized members are up by 12%. Incidentally, these are later figures than those appearing in the forthcoming May issue of the *Newark Churchman*, and when the 1962 statistics have been fully compiled, I expect we shall go well over 100,000 baptized members for the first time in our history.

We have in excess of 21,000 boys and girls in our Church Schools, and I think with special joy and gratitude of our more than 2500 Church School teachers and officers.

Another statistic which may be of interest is the increase, in the last ten years, of the number of clergy: from 183 to 231. This has come about through the opening of new churches, the division of fields so that where one man served two churches, now each church has a minister of its own, and a marked increase in the number of curates and assistant clergy.

However, it is through the establishment of new missions that we will de-

termine much of our future growth, and this afternoon you are going to give me your decision on that, when the proposal of the Diocesan Council for a modest campaign for capital funds comes before you for consideration.

II.

Second, consider this word *increase* in relation to our growing stewardship, particularly in the area of fiscal responsibility.

I know, of course, that there is much more to Christian stewardship than financial stewardship, but let me confine myself today just to this aspect of it. Here we have made some moderate gains. Nothing to make us proud or complacent, you understand, for there is much yet to accomplish in this field. Nonetheless, moderate gains have been made on the parish, diocesan, and national church levels, and for these I am grateful.

However, I do hear a number of complaints about rising assessments and quotas, and I am all too conscious of the fact that they have been going up. As the chief administrative officer of the Diocese, I must admit that I too am bothered but only about the rise in the Assessment Budget, which is chiefly used for the administrative work of the Diocese. However, let me say no more on this for the moment, for you may feel free to subject me this afternoon to as rigorous a questioning as you wish.

I must say, though, that, within reason, I am not greatly troubled by rising missionary quotas in the Program Budget, and I would like to tell you why.

One reason is that these quotas have not been going up at any faster rate than the budgets of the various parishes and missions. The same causes that operate on the parish level to make for constantly rising budgets also operate on the diocesan level for its missionary program and on the national church level for its missionary program. Hence it is that whereas in 1956 the quota of the average parish asked for 23.9% of the amount the parish spent on itself for its own basic local needs, in 1963 the quota asks for 24.3% of the amount the congregation spends on itself. This represents an average rise in rate of less than one-half of one per cent, hardly a consequential figure.

Another reason why I am not much bothered about the rise in quotas is that these make possible the extension of the Gospel and the greater effectiveness of the Lord's work in Diocese, nation, and world. The rise in quotas has to be within reason, of course, but the expansion of the Lord's work must go on apace.

Let me put this whole matter into a different perspective by recalling to your minds that oft-told story about the rooster whose chicken yard was adjacent to an ostrich farm. One day the rooster led the hens over to the fence that separated the two yards, and pointing to an ostrich egg which lay just on the other side of the fence, he remarked, "I am not complaining, but I would like to show you what some of the others are producing."

So let me show you an "ostrich egg," so to speak. It is Calvary Church in Memphis, Tennessee. It is the largest church in the Diocese and is located in downtown Memphis. In the suburban areas of our own Diocese,

I might add, we have four parishes larger than Calvary, Memphis. Its missionary quota is \$47,000, nearly twice the size of the largest quota of any parish in this Diocese. They pledge it and pay it and on top of that give an additional \$5,000 per year to their newest parochial mission. To be sure, they do have a large endowment, but not one cent of the income ever comes into the parish budget; every dollar of that income is given away.

Thirteen years ago Calvary Church started a new mission, the Church of the Holy Communion, in an outlying part of Memphis. They bought the new mission twenty-two acres of land, gave them a gift of \$200,000 with which to start building, and transferred no less than four hundred people to the new mission. Today that mission has become the second-largest church in the Diocese and is currently embarked on a million-dollar expansion program.

More recently, Calvary Church has started another mission, St. Paul's Church in north Memphis. Calvary bought the new mission four acres of land and gave them a gift of \$100,000 plus transferring some people to their membership rolls plus adding \$5,000 per year to the budget of this new mission.

Yet this downtown Church remains the largest and strongest in the Diocese. Of course, there are many reasons for its amazing vitality, not the least of which is their extremely able Rector, but I dare to suggest that the main reason (and there the Rector himself concurs with me) is that Calvary, Memphis, does not hesitate to expend its resources and its people in the missionary extension of the Church of Jesus Christ. We know that the essence of the Christian life is self-giving, but how often we have allowed the philosophy of the world — to get and to hold and to give as meagerly as possible — to intrude upon and corrupt our Christian convictions.

"Whosoever will save his life shall lose it," cried our Lord, "and whosoever will lose his life for my sake shall find it." Herein is the paradox of the Christian life, that when a man becomes over-preoccupied with himself and his own selfish needs — that is, with saving his life, as our Lord put it — then in time he loses his real life: the joyful, outgoing, abundant life that God in His love purposes for him and for every man. On the other hand, says our Lord, if a man "will lose his life for my sake" — that is to say, if a man makes his own selfish concerns subservient to the things for which Christ stands and gives himself to them in a kind of glad abandon — then he finds his real life, the life God purposes for him, with all the attendant joy that comes with true self-giving, with all the peace that comes with the consciousness that he is doing the Master's will.

This is a paradox of the Christian life which the world cannot understand, and it is as true for a congregation (as witness Calvary, Memphis) as it is for the individual Christian, and that is the great reason I do not apologize for rising missionary quotas.

III.

Third, I turn to another area of our diocesan life in which the word *increase* is relevant, and that is the increase in unity among ourselves and

in an understanding and appreciation of the various viewpoints that exist among us. To put it another way, our Diocese is singularly free from that partisan bickering and strife which can, and too often do, tear a diocese asunder.

There is, of course, no question but what there are differences of theology and churchmanship among us, and this is as it should be. For the genius of this amazing Episcopal Church of ours is that it is capable of holding together, in a most extraordinary fashion, both Catholic and Protestant elements of theology and ceremonial. To be sure, the co-existence of these views within one communion can sometimes be the source of serious tensions, and they often are, but I thank God that in this Diocese we have been singularly spared from them. Perhaps it is that we are not afraid to discuss these differences openly and that we accept them as valid expressions of faith within our communion. In any event, I see these differences in theology and churchmanship relegated to the comparatively minor place they ought to occupy as these differences are subsumed under the more important concerns that bind us together and enable us to give our major efforts to the main issues of the Gospel of Jesus Christ and of His Church.

I think I shall say no more on this matter, although at one point in the preparation of my address I was tempted to expand it into the whole of my address; but I must say that while I do not mean to idealize our fellowship in this or any other regard, I do give thanks to God for the unity in Christ that dwells among us.

I had hoped to go on to develop a *fourth area* in which the word *increase* is relevant, and that is the area of evangelism and lay witnessing, but already my address is overlong. Perhaps during the year the Department of Stewardship and Evangelism can convey to the Diocese at large some of the things I would otherwise be saying here.

Forgive me if now in my concluding sentences I become a bit personal, but the near-completion of ten years — five-and-a-half as Coadjutor, the rest as Diocesan — is a kind of demarcation point that is hard to ignore. These have been ten joyful years for me and for my family. To be sure, these ten years have had, I suppose, a full quota of the heartaches every bishop must expect and of the misunderstandings which every bishop must learn to accept as part of the occupational hazard of his job; but notwithstanding, these have been joyful years, and I thank you for making them that way. You have been forbearing over mistakes and errors of judgment that this all too fallible man has made and will, no doubt, make again from time to time; and you have been loyal and enthusiastic when you felt my leadership was in harmony with the Master's will.

The other evening I looked back over the notes of the brief speech I made at the luncheon following my consecration on June 9, 1953. Among other things, I said then that I had accepted your election only after I had come to believe this was the work to which my Lord was calling me. I trust it is not wrong for me to say, after ten years, that I still believe this is the work to which He has called me.

A cartoon — picture of a large room full of machinery plus an electric brain to govern and run the machinery. In front — one empty chair. The president of the company is telling another man — "Sorry, we are shut down today. The man who usually sits in that chair and feeds the electric brain is sick today." Into my mind came the not original thought — "Have we become the creatures of the thing we have created? Have we tried to reverse the order of nature and make man for the machine instead of the machine for man? Even as industry and science face this danger, constantly so too, this danger may threaten the Christian Church — may threaten our part of it."

It has been my lot to speak to you from time to time about the machinery of the Church. I have done this not because machinery "per se" is the road to salvation. Rather, my conviction has been that good machinery or organization can free us for our main purpose in the Church, which is to bring more souls to Christ more effectively. On the other hand, poor machinery can be an effective hindrance to the true mission of the Church.

I hear of scattered voices saying that the type of Church organization which was effective fifty years ago can no longer meet the needs of modern ways of living. To be fair we must add that this is also being said about other areas of life. Objective critics of government are pointing to cumbersome and out-moded procedures and organization. Again and again I hear some educators saying the same thing about educational practices in today's schools, colleges, seminaries, and universities. In some industrial areas this is true also, and even our time-honored legal and judicial practices are being questioned.

The Church may share with other areas of life in these questions of machinery, rules, regulations, etc., but this is no excuse for the Church to fail to examine herself objectively and intensively.

Is it true that the general structure of our average parish is no longer suitable to forward the Gospel today? The Very Rev. Ernest Southcott, Provost of Southwark, who introduced "House Church" experiments, says about the parish Church: "The heresy of the Church is locking God up in a Church building. The Church must plan to function in small groups outside the Church building and other than on Sunday. The Church then gets

off its pedestal and learns what God is saying in the world. Our parishes should be geared to meet people where they are and not where we wish them to be at some arbitrarily announced hour." This, you may say, is debatable. Indeed it may well be. But let the Church at least be willing to enter the debate.

Is it true that Diocesan machinery in the larger dioceses such as Newark is the result of years of unplanned and uncoordinated growth without any

overall plan? Or is it so far removed from canonical reality that the mission of the Diocesan Church is severely hampered? Maybe yes and maybe no! But again should we not be willing to adventure for Christ in this area and find out the answer — yes or no!

Is it true that our procedures on the national level need similar examination? Is it true that missionary policies and techniques which worked well even 25 years ago need some re-study in the light of rising aspirations of people in all the world? Such questions, I believe, are legitimate ones. They do not arise from a schizophrenic desire to tear down, but from a love of the whole Church and an ardent desire to see the whole Church spread the Gospel of Christ more effectively.

You may say to me: "Very well, my friend, now you tell us in detail what new or different machinery or procedures or Canons or what not are in your blueprint for the future."

My answer is that I have no blueprint, and I find none in the minds of wiser men than I. But I do hear voices, lay and clerical, asking these questions; I do see problems in the Church where certain solutions seem logical but about which nothing can be done under the existing structure. I do believe that there is enough devotion and consecrated brain power in our Church to face these and other questions and come up with answers vital to the life and mission of the Church.

One is puzzled at this point of which should come first — the hen or the egg — the willingness to face these issues or the information which will inspire us to be willing to do so. Let us take the realm of Christian Stewardship as an example — and this is not intended to be a money-raising speech or a criticism of anyone's stewardship, but simply an example. It strikes me that every level of the Church's life of stewardship is on the defensive today. I have been guilty of saying, "What does National Council want with all this money from us each year?" And when other voices join mine the National Council is on the defensive. When you in your Vestries say, "What does the Diocese of Newark want with so much money?" then the Diocese is on the defensive. And as a parish priest I have heard that some parishioners say, "What does St. Vitus need so much money for?" And the parish is on the defensive. Part of the difficulty is due to the size and geographical ramifications of the Church. The initial giver is far removed at times from the ultimate goal of his gift. The larger the organization the more difficult it is to have everyone directly familiar with all that happens in the life of the organization. This is true of other areas of life as well as in the Church.

I, again, have no easy solution to this. But isn't the first step toward solution a recognition that we are a Christian Church; that those charged with responsibilities on these different levels are not careless, undedicated manipulators of budgets which have no reality. Errors of judgment are made in every human institution and there must always be justification for askings, but there must be also mutual trust. Do we not need primarily a right-about face in our motivation as Christian stewards?

Perhaps we are all responsible for the development of procedures and techniques of stewardship which have been directed only toward meeting

a pre-determined budget, or a specified percentage giving of ourselves to God — instead of facing the plain, simple Christian truth that all we have or are — 100% — is from God and doesn't belong to us in the first place. When we leave this earthly sphere — after all — along with our immortal souls all we can bring with us is the history of this stewardship.

Let me, therefore, say once again the obvious about the Diocese of Newark. The Diocese of Newark, humanly speaking, is mine, but not mine alone; is Bishop Stark's, but not his exclusively; is yours, but not yours only, nor the possession of any central bureau of office-holders or department heads. It is ours really — yours, mine, and many others. *It is us*. It is not some alien entity "down there" somewhere. It is really us — all of us within a certain geographical area of New Jersey. Incidentally, I am frequently startled at Sunday morning coffee hours to have many Church people reveal their complete ignorance of even the geographical boundaries of our Diocese. I have even had people express their delight that the Bishops are confirming this week — and the utter amazement of these people when I tell them that we are doing this ten months of the year for 148 parishes and missions.

My purpose today is to speak to you of the Diocese as one of the family speaking within the family. It is not my intention to describe in detail all of the parts of the Diocese as you may see them listed in the annual Journal. I would like to speak of the philosophy, for want of a better word, behind the existence of a Diocese.

I could well begin with the reminder that where there is a Diocese there is necessarily a Diocesan, or a Bishop. A Diocese and a Diocesan is the standard norm. Bishop Bayne recently tried to answer the question, "What is a Bishop?" He said that there are *six* marks of a Bishop. He is the principal organ of the Church's *continuity*, of her *unity*, of her *liturgy*, and her *teaching*. He is also the *chief minister* and the *spearhead* of the Church's *mission*. This is an awesome responsibility even without the numerous daily functions about which the Canons and the Prayer Book are silent.

The last mark he mentioned is in some sense my theme today — the Church's mission as it applies to the Diocese. The mission of the Church is the same mission for individual Christians, for the organized parish and mission, for the Diocese, and for the larger segments of the Church — in short, for the whole Church and all of her parts. The simplest way to express this total mission, for me at least, is this: "to bring Jesus Christ, our Lord and Saviour, into more lives more effectively."

If this be so, then it follows that there are some very sober implications as a result. Does it not mean primarily that, as baptised Christians, we all stand under divine judgment daily as to how we endeavor to carry out our part of this mission?

We try to carry out this mission in various ways and in various capacities. First, as individuals; secondly, as worshipping communities in the form of parish or mission congregations; thirdly, as a group of parishes and missions in a Diocesan framework; and finally, as a national body of dioceses, and as a world Church.

Again, let me state the obvious. These five parts of the one Church do not have separate or different missions in the world. They are not separate and unrelated and independent avenues of the Gospel of Christ. They are, or should be, closely related and mutually dependent ways by which we try to perform the one and only mission of the whole Church — that is, “to bring Jesus Christ, our Lord and Saviour, into more lives more effectively.”

But we are human, and being so, we find it necessary in order to function to devise certain human organizational structures. Over the years these structures assume certain individualities of their own, each with its own forms, traditions, procedures, regulations, and spheres of action. These are developments over many, many years and they sometimes tend to solidify to the point where the common mission of the whole is in danger of being lost. For an example of this process and this danger take the Diocese of Newark. We have five major departments which together have 28 major standing committees each with a definite function. We have in addition seven agencies or organizations which act like departments and these have 15 sub-committees of major importance. There are at least seven more entities or arms of the Diocese by various names each with the necessary sub-divisions. (Here I gave up counting.) Now I am not listing these details in order to make the picture look ridiculous. All of these parts were created in answer to an apparent need and have been manned by devoted people.

However, we dare not have such intricate machinery without being willing to test it from time to time. We must periodically take a hard and objective look at ourselves and at these structures and ask ourselves certain pointed, if embarrassing, questions. Have these parts become so complex that we have lost communication with one another? Are we forced to spend so much time, energy, and thought in keeping the machinery oiled, repaired, and running that we tend to forget the product which the machinery was originally designed to produce? We must be willing, nay eager, to answer these and other questions on all five levels of our common Christian effort. I am glad to report that our Diocesan Council has begun to take a hard look at itself, its structure, its effectiveness, and its prospects of carrying out its part of the Church's mission. My hope and prayer is that this process will continue to a good conclusion.

There is, of course, only one test for any such study be it for the individual, the parish, or the Diocese. The test lies in our answer to the disturbing question in each case, “What does this part contribute to the total mission of the Church?” And, again, this total mission is “to bring Christ, our Lord and Saviour, into more lives more effectively.” Any part of our structure which has departed from this aim and motivation has no real place in the Church's life. Any part which, unconsciously or otherwise, has become a road-block to this total mission must be willing to disappear for Christ's sake. It is no disgrace to cease an activity which no longer serves its true purpose.

Do not misunderstand me at this point. I do not mean that because a way is old that it is therefore useless, nor do I mean that everything new

is automatically valid. I do mean that this primary test must be applied equally to the old and the new.

I suppose that what I am trying to say is that our structure is not to be static in nature; that it must be susceptible and sensitive to observation, study, review, and possible change; that even as the Gospel of Jesus Christ is not stationary nor static, but is dynamic and creative, so too must our Church life be as far as is humanly possible — if it is to be an effective vehicle of the Gospel's expression for people today.

At the risk of repetition let me speak a little further of our mission and our Diocese. There are many areas into which our mission must go and there are diversities of approaches to perform this mission. This has made it necessary to create this somewhat complex organism called the Diocese. It also makes it necessary that in our human conversation we must use names for these various areas and approaches. For example, our different departments have different names and selective objectives. Again, in speaking of our approaches we say urban, suburban, town, and country. So we are sometimes unconsciously trapped into thinking of these as separate missions when, of course, they are all parts of the one mission of the whole Church "to bring Jesus Christ, our Lord and Saviour, into more lives more effectively." There is an equal need for this in Sussex County, in Montclair, and in the under-privileged inner city areas, or any other part of the Diocese. The methods and approaches may well bear different emphases but the objective is the same in each case. The Department of Christian Education and the Department of Christian Social Relations, or any other department, may well adopt and adapt different approaches but the common aim and mission is still one and the same.

Now, lest you think that all my remarks indicate despair and frustration, let me quickly say otherwise. If the Church were just another organization in the world I would despair of change. If we had to face these issues dependent only upon our own wisdom and strength, I would despair. But the Church is not just another organization nor does its life depend upon our human ingenuity alone. The Church has changed, even though slowly and perhaps rightfully so. I see signs in the Church and in our Diocese that we are willing to face issues such as these. I sense the movement of God's Holy Spirit in the situation and this makes me eager and hopeful for the future of the Church. The only reason I would like to live to be a hundred is to see all that will undoubtedly happen in the life of the Church in the world in the years to come. Perhaps the good God will grant us that privilege as we move into the life beyond the boundaries of the Diocese of Newark and observe from the spaciousness of eternity the spirit of God moving in and through His Church.

Rules of Order

THE CONVENTION

1. The Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convocation shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall record their attendance.
3. When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
4. The general procedure of the Convention shall be governing, unless otherwise provided for, by the rules of parliamentary practice as set forth in "Roberts' Rules of Order."
5. At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
6. A public address system shall be installed for use of those addressing the Convention.
7. No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
8. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it; or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment has been offered. The motion to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
9. When any member is about to speak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
10. No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply), in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
11. If any member in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
12. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.
13. All questions shall be decided *viva voce*, unless otherwise specially ordered.
14. On the demand of five Presbyters entitled to vote, or of the Lay Deputies from five Parishes and Missions, the vote upon any question shall be by Orders, the Clergy voting individually and the Laity by Parishes and Missions; and, when a vote is thus taken, a concurrent majority in both Orders shall be necessary to carry any measure.
15. The mode of conducting the nominations and elections of all Committees, Commissions and Diocesan Council and Departments, and all other elective officers not otherwise provided for, shall be as follows:
 - a. The Secretary of the Convention shall send out with the notice of the time and place of the Diocesan Convention, a list of the offices to be filled by election thereat, and the names of the incumbents of these offices, whose terms expire thereat, together with an official nomination blank. Such notice shall be sent out at least one month before the date appointed for the Convention, to the Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and to each lay delegate whose name and address has been transmitted to the Secretary, as provided in Canon I.
 - b. The members of the Convention shall also be requested, in said call to send to the Secretary any canonical amendments or other important items of business that they may propose to introduce at the next Convention, so that such matters may be assigned a place on the Calendar of Business. Notice of the annual Convention shall be given in THE NEWARK CHURCHMAN.
 - c. Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations for any office or offices to be filled at such Convention, shall at least twenty-one days before the date appointed for the Convention, submit the same in writing to the Secretary thereof, together with his

certificate that he has secured the consent of such person or persons to such nomination. Nominations may be made from the floor.

16. a. A Committee consisting of the Bishops, ex-officio, five other clergymen and five laymen, to be known as the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, shall be appointed at each Convention to prepare the Rules of Order, Official Ballots and the Calendar of Business, for the next Annual Convention.
 b. The Committee, from the list of nominations as furnished to it by the Secretary of the Convention, shall prepare sufficient ballots marked "Sample" for each clerical and lay delegate, as certified by such Secretary, as entitled to a seat in the Convention; such ballot to be mailed by such Secretary to each such delegate at least five days before the Convention.
 c. At the beginning of the opening session the committee shall report to the Convention in the form of an official ballot the names of nominees; the arrangement of such names shall be determined by lot in each order.
 d. If there be any office for which no nomination has been made on the sample ballot, any delegate may file with the Secretary of the Convention the name of one candidate for any such office, together with his certificate, that he has secured the consent of the person so nominated. Such nominations may be filed up to the hour of voting, and the committee of Elections shall announce the names of such nominees at the time of the distribution of the first ballot.
 e. The number of consecutive terms any nominee has held the office for which he is again nominated shall be noted on the ballot, in parentheses, after his or her name. After each list of nominations as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks may be filled by any voter. On the first ballot these ballots only shall be used, and also in subsequent ballots, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. No ballot shall be counted in its class, on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled, and the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast.
17. There shall be a Committee to be known as the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions, the members of which shall be appointed at each Annual Convention and shall serve until the close of the next following Annual Convention. The Committee shall receive and consider all resolutions, except resolutions of committees accompanying committee reports recommending action of Convention. The Committee shall submit its report to Convention recommending the adoption or rejection of each resolution proposed or the adoption of any such resolution as amended by the Committee. A copy of this report shall be mailed by the Secretary of Convention to each Delegate at least five days before Convention.
18. All resolutions to be considered for action by the Convention shall have been submitted in writing to the Secretary of Convention not less than thirty days in advance of the Convention and shall have been signed by a Delegate to the Convention. On the expiration of the time for submitting resolutions to the Secretary of Convention, the Secretary shall transmit to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions all resolutions submitted to him. Additional resolutions may be submitted to the Secretary of Convention after the time above specified which additional resolutions shall be transmitted immediately by the Secretary of Convention to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions but no such resolution, or such resolution as amended, shall be proposed for action by the Convention except upon a motion for the suspension of the rules duly passed.
19. All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered. It shall be the duty of the Secretary promptly to notify the members of all special committees of their appointment.
20. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.
21. Reports when submitted in Convention shall be read by title only, unless the reading be for the better transaction of business.
22. At the close of each Convention a Committee shall be appointed to review and certify the correctness of the minutes.

The Annual Convention

The Eighty-Ninth Annual Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark was held on Saturday, May 11th, Nineteen Hundred and Sixty-Three in Trinity Cathedral, Newark, New Jersey.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at eight-thirty o'clock by the Bishop of the Diocese, the Right Reverend Leland Stark, D.D., assisted by the Suffragan Bishop, the Right Reverend Donald MacAdie, D.D., who read the Gospel; the Very Reverend Ledlie I. Laughlin, Jr., Dean-elect of the Cathedral, who read the Epistle; and the Reverend Doctor Herbert Leswing.

The Bishop read the names of the Bishops of the Church, the Clergy of the Diocese, and certain Laity of the Parishes and Missions, who departed this life to become members of the Church Expectant during the past Convention year, and commended them to the prayers of the congregation during the Communion Service. (See Necrology.)

The morning session of the Convention was called to order at nine-forty-five o'clock with the Right Reverend, the Bishop of Newark, in the Chair.

A quorum being present in both Orders, the Convention was declared ready for business. Attendance cards indicated the following were present:

RESOLVED that this Convention approve the application of St. Andrew's Church Harrington Park, County of Bergen, Diocese of Newark, and receive it into Union.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ELECTIONS AND RULES OF ORDER

The Committee on Elections and Rules of Order of the 89th Annual Convention of Diocese of Newark was convened at Cathedral House, Newark, on Friday, March 22, 1963. Present were the Bishop and the Secretary of Convention.

In accordance with Article II, Section 1, of the Diocesan Constitution, the Bishop called the 89th Diocesan Convention to be held on Saturday, May 11, 1963 in remarks entered on the minutes.

The Committee proceeded to notify the Secretary of Convention of the date set, requested him to notify the delegates, authorized him to prepare the sample ballots in conformity with No. 16b, Rules of Order, 1962.

The Committee voted to recommend to the Convention the Rules of Order of the 1962 Convention for use at the 1963 Convention without change as they appear on page 60 and page 61 of the 1962 Convention Journal.

The Committee voted to recommend to the Convention to the adoption of the 1962 Calendar of Business as it appears on page 62 of the 1962 Convention Journal with the following four changes:

- (1) That the annual elections follow the report of this Committee.
- (2) That the positions of the Bishop's Address and the Suffragan Bishop's Address be interchanged so as to allow the former to be given at the Convention Luncheon.

After the singing of Hymn 535, the Suffragan Bishop, the Right Reverend Donald MacAdie, D.D., S.T.D., delivered his Fifth Annual Address. (See Bishops' Addresses)

Mr. Gustave E. Wiedenmayer, Treasurer of the Convention, gave his Report. (See Reports of Convention.)

All Financial Reports of the Convention and of the Treasurer of the Department of Missions have been audited by Peat, Marwick, Mitchell and Co., and copies of the auditors report are available for inspection.

Mr. John N. Page, Secretary-Treasurer of the Diocesan Council, presented the 1964 Budget of Administrative Expenses as revised by Diocesan Council. (See Reports of Convention.)

Mr. Page moved the adoption of the following resolution which was duly seconded and adopted without dissent:

WHEREAS the Diocesan Council is directed by Canon 5, Section 4(d), to provide for an assessment on the Parishes and Missions to meet the administrative expenses of the Diocese, be it therefore

RESOLVED that the Convention approve the proposed budget for 1964, and be it further

RESOLVED that the Diocesan Council be hereby directed to levy an assessment on Parishes and Missions of the Diocese at such rate as to cover the amount of \$189,187.

Mr. Page next presented the 1964 Budget for the Program of the Diocese and the Church at Large. (See Reports of Convention.)

Mr. Page moved the adoption of the following resolution which was duly seconded and adopted without dissent:

WHEREAS the Diocesan Council is charged with the responsibility of preparing a budget covering the requested missionary and benevolent requirements of the Diocese and General Church for the ensuing calendar year, be it therefore

RESOLVED that the Convention approve the 1964 budget as proposed by the Diocesan Council, and

WHEREAS Canon 4 Section 6(d), of General Convention provides that in each Diocese a definite financial objective shall be allotted to each Parish and Mission as its share of the Program of the Church, therefore be it further

RESOLVED that the Diocesan Council be authorized to designate the quota for each Parish and Mission based upon the average amount of its current expenses for the past three years.

Mr. Page next filed his Report by title. (See Reports of Convention.)

The Venerable Revere Beasley, on behalf of the Diocesan Council gave the Report on the Companion Diocese Relationship (See Reports of Convention), and moved the adoption of the following resolution which was duly seconded and adopted unanimously:

WHEREAS the Diocesan Council of the Diocese of Newark has proposed the establishment of a companion-diocese relationship between the Diocese of Newark and the Missionary District of Liberia, be it therefore

RESOLVED that this Diocesan Convention accepts the recommendation of the Diocesan Council and directs the Bishop and Diocesan Council to take what steps are necessary to establish this relationship.

The Reverend Waldron L. Coon, Chairman of the Department of Missions Committee on Grace, Van Vorst, Jersey City, presented the following resolution which was duly seconded and carried:

WHEREAS the Diocesan Council passed the following resolution at its February 4, 1963 meeting:

WHEREAS the New Jersey revised statutes as of April 22, 1955, title 16:12-16 provide that the assets of an extinct parish "shall vest in the corporation organized to hold in trust property under the control of said Convention, in trust, for the same religious purposes and with the power of disposition and sale to the same extent as the same vested or would have been vested in the corporation having title to the property of said parish before it became extinct;" and that "said property and income therefrom and the proceeds of sale thereof shall be applied to religious and charitable uses connected with the church, and the Convention may direct the use to which the same or any part thereof shall be applied, and may direct the transfer thereof to any incorporated parish or other corporation, the funds of which are devoted to carrying on any of the objects or purposes of said church in said diocese;" and

WHEREAS in the funds of the extinct parishes of St. Mark's, Jersey City, Holy Cross, Jersey City, and St. Stephen's Church, Newark, there are net balances of approximately \$63,000 held by the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties; and

WHEREAS the parish house of Grace Church, Van Vorst, in Jersey City has been permanently closed because of danger of collapse and the church has suffered extensive damage from termites, necessitating the closing off of a portion of the church, so that extensive repairs and a new parish house at an estimated cost of \$140,000 are urgently needed; and

WHEREAS the resources of the congregation are severely limited; and

WHEREAS the Department of Missions has requested the Diocesan Council to petition the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties and the Convention of the Diocese to free the accumulated net balances of the said extinct parishes to be used, if necessary, as one of several resources toward the repair and building of new facilities at Grace Church; and possible other church work in urban areas of the Diocese, therefore be it

RESOLVED that the Diocesan Council favors the use of said funds for this purpose; and be it further

RESOLVED that the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties be asked to join with the Diocesan Council in petitioning the Convention of the Diocese at its annual meeting on May 11, 1963, for permission to use said funds, if necessary, for the purposes outlined above.

WHEREAS the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties passed the following resolution at their February 14, 1963 meeting:

RESOLVED that the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties favor the use of funds attributable to the extinct parishes of Holy Cross, Jersey City and St. Mark's, Jersey City toward the construction of a new parish house for Grace Church, Van Vorst, Jersey City, and toward the cost of necessary repairs to the church and hereby join with the Diocesan Council in petitioning the Convention of the Diocese for authority to use said funds, if necessary and insofar as necessary, for the purposes described.

BE IT RESOLVED that this Convention grant this Petition of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties and of the Diocesan Council, and grant permission to use said funds, if necessary and insofar as necessary, for the purpose described.

Mr. William C. Young presented the Report of the Episcopal Capital Loan Fund by title. (See Reports of Convention.)

The Very Reverend Ledlie I. Laughlin, Jr., presented the following resolution which was duly seconded and adopted unanimously:

WHEREAS the Right Reverend Arthur B. Lichtenberger has been a beloved and respected member of the Diocese of Newark and a distinguished Dean of Trinity Cathedral in Newark, and

WHEREAS he is giving courageous and imaginative leadership to the Protestant Episcopal Church in America as its Presiding Bishop, be it

RESOLVED that the Diocese of Newark assembled at its Eighty-Ninth Annual Convention affirms its great respect and affection for him and its whole-hearted support in his intention to remain in office as long as his health will permit.

After the singing of Hymn 466, Noon Day Prayers were said by the Suffragan Bishop, the Right Reverend Donald MacAulie, D.D.

The Convention recessed at 12:10 o'clock until 2:45 o'clock.

RESOLVED that unanimous consent be given by this Convention to the suspension of the rules of election in order that the five persons in each order receiving the highest number of concurring votes on the next ballot be elected Deputy for first position and Supplementary Deputies for the next four positions.

Polls were opened at 4:23 o'clock, closed at 4:31 o'clock.

The Reverend Ivan H. Partridge, Chairman of the Standing Commission to Study Clergy Salaries, presented their report which on motion was received. (See Reports of Convention.)

On motion Resolution Number I was adopted.

RESOLVED that for the purpose of defining "just and equitable salaries" the housing of all clergy be uniformly valued at 20% of the amount of their cash salaries, save that if this figure shall be less than \$1500.00, the latter figure shall be used, and be it further

RESOLVED that the cost of utilities should not be valued at more than 10% of the man's cash salary, and that Vestries be called upon to exercise fairness in such matters as calling the full heating costs of oversized, uninsulated rectories the equivalent of cash salary, and be it further

RESOLVED that this Convention thank all Vestries and Executive Committees who have given positive consideration to the needs of the Clergy in the year past, and urge further efforts on the part of all concerned to pay "just and equitable salaries" as defined by the 1960 Convention (Journal, p. 120) and modified by this resolution.

On motion Resolution Number II was adopted.

RESOLVED that each Warden, Vestryman, and Executive Committeeman and Treasurer in the Diocese be asked to regard it as a duty to be familiar with the Diocesan minimums and the formulas for the payment of "just and equitable" salaries, perquisites, and allowances, established by this and previous Convention and be it further

RESOLVED that this Convention call upon all Vestries and Executive Committees to review the salaries and related considerations of all Rectors and Vicars annually before other items on the budget, and to discuss the matter as a formal item of business on at least one other occasion each year, and be it further

RESOLVED that in each Parish or Mission, a Warden, Vestryman or Executive Committeeman be formally designated by the governing body to communicate regularly with the Clergyman concerning his needs and feelings with regard to the adequacy of his salary and other allowances, the condition of the rectory and other matters bearing upon the living conditions of the man, and to report back to the governing body, and be it further

RESOLVED that the Convention direct the Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries to hold a Fall meeting for the Vestrymen and Executive Committeemen so designated and for any other responsible Church officials who may wish to attend, for the purpose of exchanging information in this area of concern.

The Reverend Frederick R. Gutekunst, Chairman of the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions, moved the adoption of the following resolution as presented by the Reverend James H. Waring. After being duly seconded, it was adopted.

WHEREAS the desire for an official opinion regarding funeral customs has often been expressed in our Churches, and

WHEREAS it is the conviction of this Convention that the Christian funeral ought to be the final act before burial, therefore be it

RESOLVED that the Diocese of Newark strongly commends the final closing of the casket before the Episcopal Burial Office be held.

WHEREAS many of our brother Christians in Birmingham, Alabama, are suffering for the sake of furthering the Gospel and rights of all men, and

WHEREAS the God given freedom and equality of all men proclaimed in Christ's Gospel remains far from being perfectly achieved in the State of New Jersey, be it therefore,

RESOLVED that the Eighty-Ninth Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark extends its prayers and wholehearted support for the Reverend Dr. Martin L. King, Jr. and the negro and white citizens of Birmingham, Alabama, who are struggling for the rights of all men, and be it further

RESOLVED that this Convention urge the Governor of the State of New Jersey to hasten the realization of equal economic, social and political opportunities to all minority groups within this State, and be it further

RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution be forwarded to The Reverend Dr. Martin L. King, Jr., and to the Honorable Richard J. Hughes, the Governor of the State of New Jersey.

The Venerable George E. Rath moved the adoption of the following resolution which was duly seconded and adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED that the 89th Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark, assembled in Trinity Cathedral in the year 1963, sends its greeting to Bishop and Mrs. Weakburn, expressing its regret that they have not been able to attend Convention, and its assurance of continued affection and esteem.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1962

There were eleven meetings of the Standing Committee held during 1962.

January 2nd

Messrs. Robert A. Jewett, Richard Stinson and Alfred M. Niese, Jr., were recommended to the Bishop for admission as Candidates for Holy Orders.

February 13th

Consent was given to St. John's, Ramsey, to mortgage to the 1st National Bank of Ramsey in the amount of \$27,000 for twenty years with interest not exceeding 5½%.

Approval was given to St. Mark's, Teaneck, to organize as a parish.

Miss Elizabeth Babcock was recommended to the Bishop for acceptance as a Deaconess.

March 30th

Consent was given to the Department of Missions, on behalf of St. Peter's, Livingston, to grant an easement to the State of New Jersey for the purpose of widening and grading Route #10.

Mr. Philip S. Watters was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Priesthood.

Mr. N. Robbins Winslow, Jr., was recommended to the Bishop for admission as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

Approval was given to the continuation of the Rev. Albert Eastburn as priest-in-charge of St. Luke's, Hope, for one year from March 8, 1962.

Consent was given to the Ordination and Consecration of the Very Rev. William Evan Sanders, D.D. as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Tennessee.

Consent was given to the election of a Suffragan Bishop for the Dioceses of Albany, Chicago, and Oklahoma.

April 26th

The Rev. William B. Van Valkenburgh was recommended to the Bishop for acceptance in accordance with Section 3A of Canon 36.

Mr. David A. Sullivan was recommended to the Bishop for admission as a Postulant.

The following were recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate: Messrs. Alvin P. Burnworth, Jay H. Gordon, Raymond P. Kress, Edmund B. Partridge, Alton H. Taylor, Thomas B. Waring, and William F. Burns.

Consent was given to the Church of the Holy Spirit, Verona, to mortgage to the Montclair National Bank and Trust Company in the amount of \$60,000.

Approval was given for the following expenditures during the year 1961 from the funds named: Jesse Williams Fund, \$3,733.30; Hannibal Goodwin Fund, \$2,003.93; Church Aid Society, \$426.67.

May 17th

The following officers were elected to serve until the annual meeting held in May, 1963: President, the Rev. Alexander M. Rodger; Secretary, the Rev. W. O. Leslie, Jr.

Consent was given to Christ Church, Short Hills, to assume a mortgage on premises to be purchased, said mortgage being held by the Summit Trust Company in the amount of \$24,000, maturing on October 1, 1981, with interest at 5½%, and to give Mr. and Mrs. J. Wilson Newman, owners of the property to be purchased, a second mortgage in the amount of \$41,000 for five years at 5%.

The Rev. Hayward L. Levy, Jr., was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Priesthood.

Acting under Canon 46, Section 8, the Standing Committee gave permission to the Rev. James N. MacKenzie to continue as vicar-in-charge of the Church of Our Saviour, Secaucus, and to the Rev. Carolus R. Webb to continue as an assistant at Christ Church, Short Hills, up to September 1, 1963.

October 19th

Consent was given to the merger of St. John's and St. Mark's Parishes, Newark.

Consent was given to the Department of Missions to increase the present mortgage on St. David's, Kinnelon, to a total amount of \$115,000 for twenty years with interest at 5½%, with the Citizens' First National Bank of Ridgewood.

The Rev. William B. Van Valkenburgh was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate.

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Rev. Theodore Harper McCrea as Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Dallas and to the ordin-

ation and consecration of the Ven. John Melville Burgess as Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Massachusetts.

Mr. Wallace M. Coursen was recommended to the Bishop as a Postulant and a Candidate for Holy Orders.

November 27th

Consent was given to St. Martin's, Maywood, to mortgage to the Community Bank of Bergen County in the amount of \$10,000 for four years with interest at 6%.

Messrs. J. Daniel Taylor and Frederick Johnson were recommended to the Bishop for acceptance as Candidates for Holy Orders.

The following were recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Priesthood: The Rev. Messrs. Alvin P. Burnworth, Richard C. Donnelly, William M. Dunning, Jay H. Gordon, Raymond P. Kress, Edmund B. Partridge, Alton H. Taylor, Thomas B. Waring.

Consent was given to the election and consecration of the Ven. Charles Bowen Persell, Jr., as Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Albany.

Mr. Wallace M. Coursen was recommended to the Bishop for acceptance as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

December 27th

Mr. William C. Young was elected to the Board of Trustees of the Diocesan Investment Trust, Class of 1964.

Consent was given to the Diocese of Northern Indiana to elect a Bishop Coadjutor.

Consent was given to Christ Church, Short Hills, to sell a residence at 60 Knollwood Road, Short Hills, to Eleanor A. Rhodes for \$58,000.

Consent was given to the election of the Rev. Edward Gaudan Longid as Suffragan Bishop of the Missionary District of the Philippines and to the election of the Rev. Cedric Earl Mills, D.D. as Bishop of the Missionary District of the Virgin Islands.

The following were recommended to the Bishop for acceptance as Candidates for Holy Orders: Messrs. Craig Biddle, Robert E. Eggenschiller, Enrico M. Gnasso, Stuart H. Henderson, Joel P. Henning, Peter R. Holroyd, Wilbur N. Marshall, Kenneth D. Miller, Guy O. Walser, and Frederick Johnson.

DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK

Report to the 1963 Diocesan Convention

The Department of Missions began the year 1962 having oversight of 35 missions and 8 assisted parishes. Highlights of our activities during 1962 are as follows:

1. Two new parishes were admitted to union with Convention: St. Mark's, Teaneck, and Christ Church, Totowa Borough. St. Andrew's, Harrington Park, is applying to this Convention.
2. Three aided stations became self-supporting at the end of the year: Our Saviour, Denville; Atonement, Fair Lawn; and St. Michael's, Wayne. Seven stations were already self-supporting.
3. St. James', Newark, was accepted by the Department to become an aided parish.

4. New construction, remodelling, and other advance thrusts during 1963 were:
 - a. Construction was begun on a vicarage and combination worship and educational unit and large parking area at St. David's, Kinnelon.
 - b. Land was purchased and vicarage was constructed at Atonement, Fair Lawn.
 - c. A new vicarage and a large parking area was constructed at St. Michael's, Wayne.
 - d. Construction was started on a new church at Christ Chapel, Midland Park. Additional land was purchased for a parking lot.
 - e. Denville: extensive additions were made to the parish hall at Our Saviour in the second step of the master plan.
 - f. Roxbury: five acres of land was purchased.
 - g. North Bergen: extensive reconstruction was made to the church and undercroft.
 - h. Hamburg-Vernon: vicarage was renovated for a new vicar.
 - i. Ridgefield: extensive reconstruction and additions were made to the parish house.
 - j. Hackensack, St. Anthony's, made extensive repairs to the brickwork of main entrance.
 - k. Hope: a new heating system was installed.
 - l. Harrington Park: installation of new classroom dividers in undercroft was completed.
 - m. Oakland-Franklin Lakes: a new all-purpose (worship and educational areas) building was dedicated on September 15th.
 - n. Jersey City, Grace, Van Vorst: the parish hall was closed because of danger, and plans begun for the construction of a new parish hall, and repairs to the church.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Diocese of Newark

1962 Report

On September 1st of 1962, the Rev. Herbert Leswing, Jr., Th. D., began his full-time work as Consultant in Christian Education for the Diocese of Newark. Dr. Leswing's most able support and leadership have enabled the department to get moving again in some fairly significant directions. Dr. Leswing has been in contact with 74 of our parishes and missions in the four-month period ending December 31st. Immediate requests for help were so numerous during the first few weeks in September that a part-time secretary had to be engaged to assist the over-burdened Cathedral House staff. Besides Dr. Leswing's own personal contacts, the committees continue their own work. For example, the Research Committee has conducted on-the-spot two to three hour surveys in 22 parishes and missions.

The work of the Research Committee enabled the department to distinguish two general categories of function. "Service" functions are those programs and activities in which the department works *directly* with those in need of help as "trainer of the troops"—e.g. the Fall and Spring Teacher Conferences. Relatively undeveloped are "training" functions in which the department "trains the trainers of the troops"—e.g. a conference for parish teacher trainers to increase their skills in helping teachers. These training functions offer the greatest possibility for accomplishment because in the long-run they will reach more people by increasing the number of people available to train those in need of help.

To move more intensively towards training, a team of three clergy, Dr. Leswing and the Rev. Messrs. Bolles and Strain were enrolled by the department in a three-phase institute, which began in November in Oklahoma. This team will in turn involve the ten or so clergy already trained in developing a diocesan training program. The department, as a whole, is in the meantime working to sponsor a similar three-phase institute in this region for the fall of 1963. Already ten clergy have reported their keen desire to attend.

Final mention must be made of the need for additional staff personnel. A Diocesan Youth and Conference Director is sorely needed to assist in the direction of youth work in the Diocese.

ADULT COMMITTEE—The Rev. Norman S. Rice, Chairman (pro tempore)

The Committee reports that few demands were made upon it and therefore that it has engaged in little activity in the ensuing year. A proposed program for adult leadership training is likely to impose new responsibilities, and the Committee will hold itself ready to assist with this program in any way it can.

The resignation of the Rev. Henry B. Cannon as Chairman of the Committee was received with regret by the Department.

YOUTH COMMITTEE—The Rev. Ivan Partridge, Chairman

In 1962 the Youth Committee again sponsored the Bishop's Pre-Lenten Youth Rally at Upsala College, East Orange, New Jersey. Bishop MacAdie was the principal speaker, and there was a record attendance surpassing 2,000 teenagers. Archdeaconry follow-up meetings were held in five of the eight Archdeaconries, and were well-attended. Following the Rally, the Youth Committee sent questionnaires to all clergy and as many of the advisors as possible concerning the Youth Rally and possible changes. On the advice of the overwhelming majority of the respondents, the committee decided to continue the Rally, with certain additions, including a band and greater emphasis upon Choir and Crucifers participation in 1963.

As in previous years, the Youth Committee sponsored High School conferences at Holiday House. Due to renovations on the property, one of these conferences had to be cancelled, but two senior high school and one junior high school conference did take place. With one less conference, the total attendance

was slightly below our previous year, but the conferences which took place were extraordinarily well-attended.

The Youth Committee again operated a highly successful Diocesan Basketball League in the season 1961-62, with the grand championship going to St. John's, Jersey City.

In cooperation with the Church School Committee's teacher training program, the Youth Committee provided a training session for the youth advisors and interested clergy in the area of the young people's work. The Chairman also addressed the annual meeting of Youth and College Liason people of the Episcopal Church Women of the Diocese of Newark, and spoke to a similar group of the Episcopal Church Women of the Archdeaconry of West Bergen concerning work of the teenagers.

The Youth Committee also provided leadership on the Archdeaconry level by having a Youth Program Director in each area. According to its own needs, each Archdeaconry has regular young peoples' meetings ranging in frequency from quarterly to monthly, and acts as a coordinating body for other teenagers' activities in its area. Serving as Archdeaconry representatives in 1962 were: Warren and Sussex—The Rev. Robert H. Maitland; Morris—The Rev. Philip S. Watters; Essex—The Rev. Robert G. Wagner; Hudson—The Rev. Fred R. Gutekunst; Newark—The Rev. Franklyn Weiler; East Bergen—The Rev. Field H. Hobbs; George H. Bowen; West Bergen—The Rev. Donald Kimmick. The Rev. Thomas Foster acted as Dean of conferences and the Rev. Donald Beers as Comptroller and Marshall of the Bishop's Rally.

Through its Chairmen and its Archdeaconry representatives, the Committee provided consultative services to twenty-four parishes and missions.

With the authorization of the Department, the Committee also began exploratory talks concerning a possible merger with the Camps and Conferences Committee of the diocese. These talks are still in progress, as of this report as submitted.

CHILDREN'S COMMITTEE—The Rev. William H. Strain, Chairman

The Children's Committee held two Diocesan-wide Church School Teachers' Conferences during 1962. In March, a Conference was held on Teaching Methods, and included workshops in story-telling, dramatics, handicrafts, visual aids, teacher training, and youth work.

In September, a Conference was sponsored on the theme: "The Church School Teacher and the Prayer Book." The Rev. Richard N. Bollis was the keynoter. The Committee made available copies of the lecture notes for use in the parishes.

The 1962 Advent Offering and the 1962 Birthday Thank Offering, which are now combined as a Diocesan project, went to Holiday House for renovation work. The Offering amounted to more than \$1800.

The Children's Committee's "Exchange Newsletter" was issued in the Spring and Fall to all clergy and Church School Superintendents. The purpose of the Exchange is to provide a means of sharing ideas throughout the Diocese regarding Children's Work.

EPISCOPAL DAY SCHOOL COMMITTEE—The Rev. Charles R. Fisher, Chairman

Since last Diocesan Convention, The Episcopal Day School Committee has been consumed in the preparation of a comprehensive leaflet called: "Questions to be Considered by Parishes Exploring the Possibility of Operating Parish Day Schools", which will be available to the Diocese in June of 1963.

By appointment of the Bishop, the Chairman has been working on a Committee for the Recognition of St. Bernard's School (an Episcopal Day School for Boys) by the Diocese of Newark. The Committee, with its resources, stands ready to assist and advise Parishes of the Diocese in the organization of an Episcopal Day School at the local level.

RESEARCH COMMITTEE—The Rev. Roger O. Douglas, Chairman

The Research Committee is the new name for the Coordination Committee. During the year, the five members of this committee made some thirty calls in order to determine the scope and depth and needs of selected parishes. Each interview was evaluated and tested against a tentative hypothesis brought forth by the committee itself. Midway through the process, the committee met with the entire department and presented its initial findings. At the end of the thirty interviews, the Research Committee revised their hypothesis and spent an entire afternoon with the full department in order that the strategy could be looked at on the basis of this research.

During the course of these interviews, several revealing findings emerged. We began to see clearly what parishes wanted and expected from the department, what were some of the real problems in education, and what the parishes used as standards for evaluating a successful Christian Education program. The department hopes to use these findings in its future deliberations.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS
For the Year 1962

I would like to highlight several areas of the Department's work in the year 1962. In order to stimulate our people to exercise more fully their Christian citizenship, the Department issued a Legislative Bulletin in March. It dealt with a few of the bills before Congress, and the Legislature — bills in which human welfare was especially involved. And in order that the legislators might not only hear from Episcopalians by letter, but also in person, the Department organized and sponsored the Fifth Legislative Caravan to Trenton on March 19th, 1962. On that date 150 men and women from our parishes and missions went to the State House to speak personally with their representatives in government. This group, led by Canon Hanson, also had the opportunity to speak with the Governor. Canon Hanson presented the Episcopalian Caravan and that of the United Church Women of the New Jersey Council of Churches to The Assembly and to the Governor.

The Department went on record for the following during the past year: (1) the abolition of capital punishment; (2) a minimum wage for New Jersey; (3) migrant labor legislation; (4) stiff court sentences for those involved in illegal manufacture, sale or administration of narcotics; (5) fair housing legislation; (6) medical care for the aging; (7) against the extension of the number of racing days in N. J.; and (8) humane treatment of animals.

The Rev. Robert Kirchgesner, Vice Chairman of the Department, made a statement on behalf of the Department at a public hearing in New York State in regard to New York State's raising its minimum age for drinking alcoholic beverages in public restaurants to 21 years (the minimum age in nearby States).

The Rev. Carl E. Nelson, member of the Department, at a public hearing of a committee of the N. J. Legislature made a statement for the Department on behalf of the migrants in New Jersey.

On Saturday, October 13th, the Department sponsored a Diocesan-wide Conference on "The Church and The Extremist Movements." Over 200 people attended the Conference. The Bishops were in attendance for the entire Conference. Bishop Stark lead an opening worship service and Bishop MacAdie pronounced the benediction. The Rev. Ralph L. Roy, pastor of Grace Methodist Church, New York City, spoke on the subject "The American Church and Communism," and the Rev. Charles D. Kean, rector of Church of the Epiphany, Washington, D. C., on "Thunder on the Right." A panel discussion was led by the Rev. Dean M. Kelley, Executive Director of the Dept. of Religious Liberty of the National Council of Churches of Christ. Dr. Harold A. Lett, Assistant Director of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, was general chairman of the Conference.

In closing, I would like to say we are indeed fortunate to have had such fine leadership on our Committees during the past year. We are most grateful for the wise counselling of Bishop MacAdie, and the splendid teamwork of the members of our Department in carrying out our Program.

DEPARTMENT OF STEWARDSHIP AND EVANGELISM

All of the Committees of this department functioned well during the past year and the results of their efforts have been apparent to both laymen and clergy.

"The Newark Churchman" continues to be a vital and interesting means of communicating directly with each member. The "Clergy Newsletter" is of increasing interest to the clergy.

The Committee on Public Relations which is relatively new, did an excellent job on the projects assigned to it and we began to see more information in the daily and weekly press. This Committee did outstanding work in connection with the Bishop Stark Flight of Cuban Refugees, securing excellent coverage in many papers.

Our Committee on Radio and Television continues to do an outstanding job. Special broadcasts were prepared and presented at Christmas time and some of these were so well received that stations other than those regularly used, requested permission to also place them in their programs. "The Newark Churchman" now carries a listing of the programs and the stations which regularly carry them. This Committee never rests on its laurels, however, and we may expect that its efforts will continue to produce programs of increasing interest.

The Committee on Stewardship was called upon many times to provide assistance and speakers by individual parishes. All of these were supplied with whatever was required. This Committee invited Mr. Thomas White of Thomas White & Associates to speak at one of its meetings, to which a number of laymen and clergy, not members of this department, were invited. After several meetings and considerable discussion, a resolution was presented to the Diocesan Council suggesting consideration of the White plan on a Diocesan basis.

The Committee on Evangelism is about to submit a report to the Bishops in answer to a specific request by them for information.

There is a great deal of work to be done by this department. This is particularly true in the area of Stewardship Education and we shall continue to give our best efforts to this problem.

BOARD OF EXAMINING CHAPLAINS

Annual Report for 1962

The Board of Examining Chaplains of the Diocese of Newark held examinations for Holy Orders six times during the year 1962 and four business meetings.

On February 14, 1962, and March 28, 1962, Mr. Hayward L. Levy appeared before members of the History Committee, and by passing four examinations, completed the Board's requirements for Ordination to the Diaconate.

On March 30, 1962, at the invitation of Bishop Stark, the Board held a luncheon meeting in the Cathedral House to meet Mr. Thomas J. Henry, who wishes to study for Holy Orders, and arranged for private theological studies leading to Ordination to the Diaconate, to be followed by a year at the General Theological Seminary.

On Friday and Saturday, April 27 and 28, 1962, examinations required by Canon 29, Sec. 1 (a), were given to the Reverend Edwin Ball, deacon; and Messrs. Alvin P. Burnworth, Raymond P. Kress, Edmund P. Partridge, Alton Holmes Taylor, and Thomas B. Waring. There was only one failure in one subject, made up at a special examination given in Saint Paul's parish house, Paterson, on May 18, 1962. At the business meeting on April 27, Bishop Stark spoke of his being increasingly troubled by the number of clergy from other Communions seeking to enter our Ministry, because of the difficulty in placement. Another problem is that of older men seeking Ordination. He noted that one Methodist minister had withdrawn his application to enter the Ministry of this Church.

On June 1, 1962, the Board conducted special examinations according to Canon 29, Sec. 1 (a), for Mr. William F. Burns, preparatory at this time for Ordination as deacon only. At a business meeting this day, Bishop Stark announced his acceptance of the Reverend Dr. Raymond A. Petersen's resignation from the Board because of his acceptance of a theological teaching post in Canada. The services of the Reverend John Foster Savidge, who had been Dean of the Examining Chaplains for 16 years, and member for 25 years; and of the Reverend Harold G. Willis terminated at the Diocesan Convention in May. Letters of appreciation were sent by resolution to the three former members. Bishop Stark welcomed the new members, the Reverend Messrs. Charles J. Child, Jr., and Herbert Leswing, Th.D. The Reverend William Lamson Griffin, Jr., was unanimously elected Dean of the Board. Dean Griffin made the following appointments to committees (the Reverend Mr. "X" being the unnamed successor to Dr. Petersen): Rev. George E. Rath to Holy Scripture; Rev. Mr. "X" to Christian Ethics; Rev. Charles J. Child, Jr. to Liturgics; Rev. George L. Grambs and Rev. Charles J. Child, Jr., and Rev. Mr. "X" to Theology, Mr. Grambs as chairman; Rev. Dr. Montgomery Hunt Throop to be chairman of History; Rev. Dr. Herbert Leswing to History and to Practical Theology.

The Board voted, as recommended by Bishop Anson Phelps Stokes, Jr., Chairman of the Joint Commission on Education for Holy Orders, to make use of the Graduate Record Examinations as given by the Educational Testing Service of Princeton. It also recommended to Bishop Stokes' Commission the elimination of the requirement of electives' examinations. Also, that, as in the seminary, the use of lexicons be permitted in Greek examinations.

In special examinations conducted by several examiners September 7 to 12, inclusive, the Reverend Hayward L. Levy, Jr., completed all requirements for Ordination to the Priesthood.

The Reverend William Van Valkenburgh, who for seven years had been in the Methodist Ministry, appeared before the Board on November 2, 1962, and in examinations completed all the Board's requirements for Ordination under Canon 36, Sec. 2 (a).

For examinations required in subjects required by Canon 29, Sec. 1 (a), on December 28 and 29, 1962, there appeared before the Board Messrs. Thomas F. Beck, Robert A. Jewett, Alfred M. Niese, Jr., Richard L. Stinson, and Nathaniel Robbins Winslow, Jr., and the Rev. Messrs. Edwin Ball and William F. Burns, deacons.

At the business meeting on December 28, the Board concurred with Bishop Stark's recommendation that the Rev. William F. Burns be ordained to the Priesthood upon completion of his examinations. The Board plans to relieve the mental and physical strain of the two days' examination period for candidates by alternating written with oral examinations.

CITY MISSION SOCIETY OF NEWARK, N. J. EPISCOPAL COMMUNITY SERVICES

The Episcopal Community Services, a social agency in the Diocese of Newark, was organized in 1913. Its primary purpose is to express the concern of the Church for those who are in institutions within the borders of the Diocese. It does this by relating the hospitals, homes, and penal institutions within the Diocese to the resources of the Parish Churches — both clerical and lay.

So far the main emphasis has been on hospitals. Each of the sixty-five hospitals within the Diocese has an Episcopal clergyman who is responsible for our Church's ministry in the particular hospital. These associated chaplains (75 in number) report regularly on their ministry in the hospital assigned them.

Nearly 250 lay volunteers from our parishes and missions are going forth in the Name of Jesus to meet human need in ten public hospitals throughout the Diocese. Their recruitment, training and sustaining in the work is under the supervision of Canon Hanson. (By its very nature, this is a continuing work as volunteers move away, die, etc.) In every possible way these volunteers extend warmth and friendship to the patients. They visit with the friendless and the lonely ones. They read to those who want it and they write letters for the patients. Some give ward parties and some serve as nurses' aides. They work in libraries, offices and laboratories. They distribute literature, clothes, candy, cigarettes, and other personal items beyond regular hospital care. There is a great need for more volunteers for this field of Christian service.

In 1962, 277 active volunteers gave approximately 460 man-hours per week of service and approximately 3,000 individual contacts were made per month.

On Sunday, Nov. 25, a Conference for hospital and nursing home volunteers was held in Trinity Cathedral and Cathedral House. Over 250 people attended and the Rt. Rev. J. Brooke Mosley, Bishop of Delaware, gave the address. In attendance were administrators of hospitals, doctors, nursing supervisors, clergy, and volunteer workers from many parishes, including the E.C.S. volunteer chairmen from eleven hospitals and nursing homes. It was most inspiring!

On Saturday, Nov. 3 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. a geriatric workshop for E.C.S. volunteers was sponsored by E.C.S. under the leadership of the Rev. John R. Green, Associate Director. Twenty-five volunteers attended, many of them were lay readers who serve in nursing homes. Doctors, nurses, and administrators of nursing homes joined Mr. Green in the leadership of this most helpful workshop.

Each of the ninety-one licensed nursing homes within the borders of the Diocese has an Episcopal clergyman who is responsible for our church's ministry in the particular home. (In the majority of homes this means responsibility for emergency calls only.) Fifty-eight of the ninety-one homes welcome religious ministrations for Protestants. In forty-seven of these homes such ministrations have been organized due to the efforts of the Rev. John R. Green, Associate Director. Previous to Mr. Green's pioneer work in this field, there was a religious ministry for Protestants in only about 5% of these homes. The religious ministry consists of one or both of the following: holding of divine services by clergy or lay readers, and pastoral visitation of large numbers of Protestant patients by either clergy or laity (including college students). The ministers involved in this religious ministry are local Protestant ministers, many of whom serve under the leadership of the local council of churches.

In the penal field, Mr. Green held conferences with penal authorities within the borders of our Diocese as to needs for religious ministry in penal institutions and agencies. He also helped to promote Essexfield (the Essex County adaptation of the New Jersey State Highfield project for the rehabilitation of juvenile offenders), and he helped in the organization of the Essex County branch of the Morrow Association of Correction in New Jersey.

Canon Hanson and Mr. Green counselled with most of all the people in difficulty who came to Cathedral House for help. Canon Hanson counselled 43; Mr. Green 24. Also, Mr. Green provided counselling service for 768 people referred to him by community institutions and agencies.

Both clergymen make referrals of clergy and laity of the Diocese to community social institutions and agencies.

Over 6,000 E.C.S. Prayer Cards for hospital bedside use have been distributed by E.C.S. associate chaplains and E.C.S. volunteers in public hospitals and nursing homes.

The concern of the Society for the broader field of Christian service is demonstrated by the fact that Canon Hanson has been serving as Chairman of the Department of Christian Social Relations of the Diocese for the past seven years. He gives a considerable amount of time to this work. (See Report of the Department of Christian Social Relations, page 30.) Both he and Mr. Green serve on many boards of trustees of organizations within this area of the Church's concern. Thus, the Church in the Diocese of Newark through the Episcopal Community Services not only goes out in Christian service into the community, but through the E.C.S. clergy, the Church's leadership is given to Christian social action in the community. The Church's concern for the social welfare of the community is expressed! The Church is in the world!

The Corporation was founded by Royal Charter on March 29, 1769, and later divided between the States of Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and New York. It was incorporated in New Jersey on December 2, 1807.

The benefits of membership are available to clergymen of the Protestant Episcopal Church who are not over fifty-five years of age and who have been canonically and actually resident in the State of New Jersey for not less than five years and who can supply a medical certificate attesting to their good health and physical fitness. The annual dues are Twelve Dollars a year.

Annual meetings of the Corporation are held on the first Monday in June of each year, and Executive Committee meetings at the call of the President. Applications for membership received between the annual meeting and December 1 of any year are considered and acted upon by the Executive Committee, others at the annual meeting. With membership limited to 120, there are at present three vacancies. Application blanks and other information can be obtained by request from the Secretary.

At the Annual Meeting held on June 4, 1962, in the 165th year of the Corporation, in the Cathedral House, Newark, the Treasurer reported assets of \$295,936.64, and receipts of \$16,173.35, from which annuities in the amount of \$4,025 were paid to eight minor children and 41 widows. At this meeting a dividend of \$100 was ordered paid to each beneficiary entitled thereto. Three widows and four minor children were added during the past year, and two widows were lost by death. Eighty of the 117 contributors are dues-paying members, the rest having retired and completed their 25 annual contributions.

HOUSE OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD

280 Henry St., Orange, N. J.

Annual Report—1962

The House of the Good Shepherd was founded in 1882 by the Reverend Anthony Schuyler, Rector of Grace Church, Orange, as a home for elderly, dependent parishioners. In March, 1885, the Home was incorporated, and through the generosity of Mrs. William Barr, its building was enlarged to its present size with accommodations for thirty-four residents. The only requirement for applicants is that they be at least sixty-five years of age, and pass a physical examination to prove that they are in fairly good health so as not to require nursing care, for which the Home has no license. The Home is now restricted to women, each of whom pays Eighty Dollars a month for room and board, which represents about one-half the real cost of providing for them. The other half comes from the income from endowment built up with bequests by generous persons through the years.

As of the end of 1962, the Home was filled to capacity. The House of the Good Shepherd is non-denominational in the selection of applicants; but when there is a waiting list, preference is given to Episcopalians.

Eighteen persons serve on the Board of Trustees, who meet every month except in the Summer. The present officers are:

Mrs. Elmer F. Hammond is superintendent; and Miss Marjorie March is Chairman of the Admissions Committee.

Eighteen local clergy of the Episcopal Church hold Services in the Chapel on Thursday mornings throughout the year, with Bishop Stark and Bishop MacAdie making annual visitations to celebrate Holy Communion on Ascension Day and All Saints' Day.

There are ten Lay Readers licensed by the Bishop who read Evening Prayer and Sermon on Sunday afternoons from September 15 to June 15; and Morning Prayer and Sermon on Sunday mornings from June 15 to September 15. They are ably assisted by six volunteer organists.

On December 30, 1962, Mr. Arthur A. G. Luders, having completed fifty years of service as Lay Reader at the Home, was honored at a tea following the Service he conducted by the Trustees, the residents, the Auxiliary, and fellow Lay Readers. On behalf of the Board of Trustees, the President presented him with a gift, accompanied by a scroll.

During the year, the Auxiliary provided new carpet for the Chapel, and Mrs. L. F. Bruce gave a new dossal for the Altar. A new elevator, emergency lighting, and an intercommunication system have been installed during the year.

With the land and building valued at \$211,100, the total assets reported by the Treasurer at the Annual Meeting in January, 1962, were \$779,583.19.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN COMMITTEE ON COLLEGE WORK

The following is quoted from a survey of the colleges and universities within the Diocese of Newark, prepared for the bishops and the Committee on College Work of the Diocese at the Committee's request by the Reverend Eugene A. Monick, Jr., Provincial Secretary for College Work of the Province of New York and New Jersey, on August 3, 1962:

"For the past year or so, there has been a recurring feeling among many people that a survey of the collegiate situation in the Diocese of Newark would be profitable for the Diocese. The Committee on College Work of the Diocese has sometimes operated with an efficiency limited by its inability to understand clearly and therefore aid helpfully the many, and somewhat unusual academic institutions located within its boundaries. Newark has not had a single, obvious center which might be a focal point for its college work efforts, such as Princeton or New Brunswick in the Diocese of New Jersey or Columbia or New York University in the Diocese of New York. While the number of institutions has been rather large, an adequate method of ministering to them has been difficult to plot. For the most part, they have been small and somewhat unimposing; many are commuter institutions with little definitive campus life and as elusive to understanding as is most of urban life in America today. Awareness is growing, however, that it

is within these institutions that the vast majority of young people today receive their higher education.

To grasp simply the bare-bones of the physical situation which can be observed and described is a beginning, and only a beginning, but this must be done. Beyond this, some kind of strategy for the ministry of the Church in these places must be settled upon and entered into. The purpose of this survey is to provide the former and set out some possible directions for the latter. With the anticipated beginning of the Diocese's first full-time college worker in January, 1963, the Committee feels an added incentive to familiarize itself with the entire Diocesan situation,—all the more so because of its hope that this worker will substantially assist the work throughout the Diocese, as well as in Newark."

We are all familiar with what is known as the "tidal wave" of students which will be entering colleges and universities. It is expected that much of this tidal wave will be absorbed by institutions within the State of New Jersey which are located in the Diocese of Newark, especially because these institutions are largely commuter in character. The peak of this wave is expected to be reached by 1970, when the institutions within the Diocese will be serving approximately forty percent more students than are presently enrolled. This increases our opportunity, as well as our responsibility, for making more effective college work a consummate fact in the Diocese of Newark.

OBJECTIVES OF THE COMMITTEE

1. Ministry to the entire academic community of students, faculty and staff at colleges and universities within the Diocese of Newark.
2. Supplemental ministry to college students from within the Diocese of Newark who attend college outside the Diocese before they leave, during their stay in college, and during temporary return to the Diocese.
3. Support of work with foreign students at academic communities as one of ten dioceses in the country presently concerned with this work.
4. Support of National and Provincial college work programs and participation in them.

The Diocese of Newark first began its active concern for college work as a diocese with the undertakings of the Reverend James Gill upon a grant from the Society for College Work. This work led to a growing concern for work with problems of the academic commuter community. Most, but not all, of the colleges and universities in the Diocese of Newark are very substantially commuter in nature. Therefore, within the Diocese is provided an excellent laboratory for programs which may be begun, operated and evaluated for use in other commuter situations.

The Diocese then established a part-time College Center at the Cathedral House in Newark, and has continued to operate this Center. The responsibility for other areas of the Diocese beyond the Newark Center was assumed by the appointment of rectors of nearby churches, and some very small support given this program. There were two exceptions to this general pattern. They were Centenary College in Hackettstown, and Stevens Institute of Technology in Hoboken. In Hackettstown, as for the work at Newark, support was secured from the National Council and the Diocese for a fuller ministry to the academic communities. The work at the Stevens Institute of Technology was entered into with other protestant denominations to support a chaplain who operated through a Student Christian Round Table. At the Diocesan Convention in 1962, the Diocese undertook to bring a full-time priest to the College Center in Newark in order that college work may move forward in the academic communities of Rutgers, the Newark College of Engineering, and Seton Hall. At the Stevens Institute, an Episcopal priest was appointed by the Student Christian Round Table to succeed a Methodist minister as chaplain. Some of the work at other college communities, which are served by

rectors or vicars of nearby parishes or missions, has been notably successful. Largely, however, this kind of undertaking has been a failure.

In the forthcoming calendar year of 1963, the College Work Committee will be supporting work at the Newark Center, Stevens Institute, and Centenary College. It is interesting to note that the Centenary and Newark undertakings both have support from the National Commission on College Work of the National Council, as well as from the Diocese.

In addition to these undertakings, it is hoped that there may be an increased participation in joint protestant work at the Montclair State College in Montclair, and a more effective policy with regard to the serving of the other academic communities through rectors or curates of nearby parishes.

This year, for the first time, we will be organizing a program through the Episcopal Churchwomen which will involve concern not only for students in academic communities within the Diocese, but for those who are from the Diocese and commute outside of the Diocese for their college education.

This year also the Diocese of Newark becomes the tenth Diocese in the country to organize and operate a program for foreign students who will be entering academic communities both within the Diocese or in the metropolitan New York area.

FUTURE RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE DIOCESE IN COLLEGE WORK

It is the hope of the College Work Committee that an additional effective ministry may be secured for northern and western parts of our Diocese in relation to college work. We believe that these academic communities are not as well served as those in the southern and eastern parts of the Diocese. Our thrust will therefore be in this direction.

We also desire to develop a broader program for college students from our Diocese who leave the Diocese to go elsewhere, with an emphasis upon their temporary return to the Diocese. This would, of course, be done in full cooperation with the rectors of the various parishes.

It is apparent that at many colleges and universities our best opportunity for service lies in joint or ecumenical undertakings with other protestant groups, and it is clear that we must learn not only how to work with these groups effectively, but also how to bring about joint evaluation and modification of programs, where necessary, to insure that joint undertakings do not mean that no one really pays any attention to what is going on.

After a small beginning during this year, we hope to enlarge the area of work with foreign students in the Diocese.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ALTAR GUILD, DIOCESE OF NEWARK

The Altar Guild Book of Remembrance was presented at the annual Corporate Communion on Nov. 12, 1962 in All Saint's Chapel. Bishop MacAdie was the celebrant.

The making of altar linens, hangings, vestments for missions and institutions has been carried on in the Newton, Madison and Newark work centers of the Diocesan Altar Guild and by a few of our members who work at home. Two parish Altar Guilds have completed altar sewing assignments sent them.

Altar Guilds doing their own sewing were given instructions and hangings etc. cut for them to work on.

A private communion set was given a mission clergyman in the diocese and a vestment storage chest from the House of the Holy Comforter turned over to a parish Altar Guild.

A monstrance, navicula, thuriber, asperger, white and black girdles, cincture, black stoles, maniples and veilings given to the Confraternity of the Blessed Sacrament to be distributed in the foreign mission field and a confessional stole sent to a priest in the U. S. mission field.

One pair of brass candlesticks and one pair of 7 branch candelabra were given a diocesan mission, and a Canterbury hat and a biretta given to two clergymen in the diocese.

Four cottas and four cassocks were made for acolytes in diocesan missions and six sets of choir vestments and 12 confirmation veils also distributed.

The following furnishings were sent to diocesan missions. Three stoles, four bible markers, one missal marker, four burses, four veils and eight pulpit falls.

Visits were made to missions at clergy request and linens, 4 frontals, 4 super-frontals, burses, veils and one all purpose frontal were cut and embroidery and sewing instructions given.

Two fair linens, a cere cloth, 2 credence cloths, 2 altar protectors, 1 pall, 1 purificator, a frontal, burse and veil were made for the chapel at the House of the Holy Comforter.

A cere cloth, 3 credence cloths, 1 fair linen and 2 protector cloths were completed for use at All Saint's Chapel and wine, wafers, and candles also supplied.

A cere cloth was sent to Christ Hospital chapel.

At the request of our chaplain, a white superfrontal and Bible markers were made for use at denominational services in the chapel at Greystone Park Hospital.

Two fair linens and a purificator were made for St. Christopher's Chapel, Eagle's Nest Camp and a used frontal, burse, veil and maniple remade for use there.

Lace donated to the Guild was made into a superfrontal and presented to Bishop Zulu of St. Johnsland, Africa.

The work centers made 8 Canterbury amices, 10 lavabo towels, 10 corporals, 17 purificators, 3 veils, 4 palls, 3 credence cloths, 6 private communion sets, consisting of purificators, corporals, palls and fair linens for our supply closet.

The altar work at the Corporate Communion of Episcopal Churchwomen at Buck Hill Falls was taken care of by the Diocesan Altar Guild. The mission at Mt. Pocono, from which we borrow some appointments for this service, was sent three post communion veils in appreciation.

Financial aid given the Guild and used furnishings sent us are gratefully appreciated as is the use of parish halls at the work centers. We are also grateful for and sincerely thank the small group of women in the diocese who devotedly give their time to this mission sewing.

REPORT OF THE URBAN DEPARTMENT DIOCESE OF NEWARK

The past year has been a significant one for the Department. The most important step that it has taken is to extend its support to an increasing number of City Churches. It helped to initiate neighborhood summer programs in Paterson and Orange, the Newark Seminarian Program, and a new Spanish ministry in Union City. Each of these programs has been important to the development of more effective neighborhood work on the part of the Episcopal Church and has helped to assure the Diocese of the potential value of the Department in strengthening the work of its individual parishes.

In November the Department elected new officers; in January it set up new Committees for the coming year, and made some revisions of its administrative procedures.

It established a series of financial forms and applications which will help the Department to regularize its expenses and grants of money to parishes. The Department established a program for the coming year with three Committees to implement the three major emphases of the program. These Committees and their work are described below:

1. **City Committee:** The work of this Committee is to examine carefully the life and work of a small number of congregations that are anxious to do more effective work in their communities. They will make recommendations to the congregations as to how the congregation might revise and revitalize their programs, and they will recommend to the Department what kind of further support it can give to the congregation.

2. **Suburban Committee:** This Committee will work with a number of suburban parishes in a two-fold way. First, it will help these parishes to find ways to support the city Churches that haven't strong enough resources to carry out their proper ministry. Secondly, they will help them to minister to their own neighborhoods, as these neighborhoods change and become more urbanized.

3. **Conference Committee:** This Committee is making plans for a Conference for Diocesan clergy and laity who want to learn more about our metropolitan culture, how it is developing, and how the Church can witness and minister in the midst of it.

The activity of these Committees will be supplemented by the continuing work of the Department with those congregations that have already been helped by the Department in the past year, and by the direct financial support of the Department to a number of new urban projects.

Members of the Department have been heartened by the probable coming of an executive secretary who will devote half of his ministry to working in a parish in Newark and the other half of his ministry to carrying out the executive work of the Department.

In conclusion, I would like to thank those members of the Department who have worked faithfully on it for the past years and who are now leaving it. I would like to thank especially the Reverend Franklyn Weiler who was its hard-working chairman from November 1960 to November 1962.

REPORT OF THE DEAN OF TRINITY CATHEDRAL

The past year has been marked by an extensive change in the personnel of the Cathedral staff. In September of 1962, the Reverend Canon Peter R. Lawson resigned from the staff of Trinity Cathedral to take a special job in the development of City ministries which is being carried out by Christ Church Cathedral in Indianapolis.

In November of 1962 Dean McGregor announced to an unhappy congregation that he was resigning as Dean of the Cathedral to become the rector of Grace Church in Providence, Rhode Island.

Besides these two persons at the heart of the Cathedral staff who resigned, the Reverend Walther Dettweiler, whose part-time ministry to Newark college students was located in Cathedral House, resigned.

Furthermore, the Board members of the Institute for Pastoral Counselling, which was also located in Cathedral House, decided to end the services of the Institute and therefore, the Reverend Hugh Hostetler, who did part-time counselling at Cathedral House, also left its staff.

Within this same time three new persons have joined the staff: on February 5th, 1963, the Reverend Ledlie I. Laughlin, Jr., priest at Grace Church, Van Vorst, Jersey City, was elected dean of the Cathedral. He began his work on May 1st and was installed as dean on May 19th.

In May, Mr. Alfred M. Niese, Jr., a candidate for Holy Orders from Saint Paul's Church, Englewood, and a student at the General Theological Seminary, was called to be the curate at the Cathedral after being ordained Deacon on June 8th. Mr. Niese accepted the call and will be a regular member of the Cathedral staff.

The Committee on College Work gained the approval of the Diocesan Council for a full-time chaplain to the Newark colleges and in April, 1963, they called the Reverend R. Dudley Bennett of St. Andrew's Church, New Paltz, New York, to come as full-time chaplain working out of the Cathedral House. Mr. Bennett accepted the call and will begin his ministry here in July.

Because of all these changes the normal life of the Cathedral community was somewhat interrupted. However, the Cathedral congregation maintained much of its whole strength and was most wonderfully ministered to by the Reverend Dr. Eric M. Tasman between the two deanships.

The Interchurch Luncheon Fellowship continued under the sole leadership of the Reverend Dr. Howard Hageman of the North Reformed Church, and St. Thomas' Mission to the Deaf continued under the guidance of the Reverend Guilford Braddock.

The coming months will be a time of quiet evaluation on the part of the Cathedral Chapter and the Cathedral staff of the work that has been done in the past years. As the new members of the staff begin to see what form their ministry should take, the whole life of the Cathedral community will be strengthened and new forms of life may begin.

CHURCH PENSION FUND

To the 1963 Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The status of the benefits of the Church Pension Fund now being distributed through the retirement and disability and other channels in the Diocese, as of April 1, 1963, is as follows:

For those ordained at normal ages, the retirement and disability pensions are 60 per cent of the clergyman's average salary with a minimum pension of \$1,800. The widows' pensions are anywhere from \$1,200 a year to one-half of the husband's pensions, depending on years of her married life with him in his active ministry; and the minor children's benefits are \$360 to \$600 a year depending upon age. Pensions less than these minimum figures result from 1) salary averaging under \$1,500; 2) ordination after reaching age 40; 3) discontinuous assessment payments; 4) period of deposition; 5) very late marriage.

About one-half of the costs of benefits from the system are in the retirement benefit; one-tenth in the disability benefit; and two-fifths in the widows' and children's benefits. The assessments contribute about one-half of the needed resources in the long run, the other half coming from investment earnings.

The 1958 General Convention authorized continuation of the 15% rate of assessment on clergy stipends to make possible lifting the whole benefit structure, pensions in force and future pensions, by one-fifth. This step was an adjustment to the rise in living costs. The 1961 General Convention approved further increase in the minimum widow's benefit to \$1,200 (from \$900) beginning in 1962.

The insurance and annuity facilities made available by the Trustees through Church Life Insurance Corporation are widely used by the clergy and active lay workers and officials. The policies are a means, among other uses, whereby individuals may name their parishes as beneficiaries; parishes may build up endowments; parishes may provide pensions for their lay workers; dioceses and parishes may provide group life insurance for their clergy. The group Church Major Medical Plan now covers 12,000 individuals — clergy and lay workers and family members.

Over 5,000 churches and institutions are insured in The Church Fire Insurance Corporation. Thus the Church in effect is insuring itself, saving considerable money in the process. Its affiliated Church Agency Corporation handles bonding, liability, and other insurances required by the Church. Thus the Church has its own specialists working wholly in the field of Episcopal Church insurance, as its "joint commission on pensions and insurance," so to speak.

These units are wholly-owned subsidiaries of the Fund, operate wholly within the Church, and contribute to clergy pensions.

The cooperation of the clergy and treasurers in administering this important activity of the Church is very much appreciated.

THE STANDING COMMISSION ON CLERGY SALARIES OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK 1963 REPORT

I. INTRODUCTION

In 1959 the Convention of the Diocese of Newark established a "Commission on Clergy Salaries" which last year became the present Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries. Those desiring detailed information about the work of this group and the actions of previous Conventions are referred to the *Journals* of 1959, P. 71; 1960, Pgs. 116-122; 1961, Pgs. 118-121; 1962, Pgs. 117-211.

From the outset, this Commission has been aware of the sense of dedication with which the Clergy approach their calling. For precisely the reason that the Clergy, as a rule, work uncomplainingly and without making an issue of their own needs, we feel it is incumbent on the whole Christian family to see that the ministers are decently treated.

To this end, two goals have been established and endorsed by previous Conventions. The first goal is the implementation of a "Diocesan Minimum," below which no Clergyman can be considered adequately compensated on a full time basis. Full details of the present "Diocesan Minimum" cash salary, perquisites and allowances are found on page 118, *Journal* of 1960. On January 1st, 1964, a new minimum becomes effective including, for a Priest, cash salary of \$5000.00/year, suitable housing and utilities, telephone allowance, and at least \$800.00/year auto allowance. Further details are printed in *Journal* 1962, P. 71.

The Diocesan Minimum is intended as a starting salary for new men, and to insure the meeting of the basic needs of Clergy whose Churches cannot do better. A second goal has been set by previous Conventions, that of a "just and equitable salary" which would lift a Clergyman's standard of remuneration, including house and utilities, above the minimum level to a point reasonably comparable to the people he serves. Two recommended formulas for fixing "just and equitable salary" are found on page 119 of the 1962 *Journal*. These formulas include placing a proper value upon utilities and housing. If the resolutions in this 1963 report are carried by Convention, the limitations on the value to be placed upon housing and utilities will then apply in the use of these formulas.

In addition to these introductory thoughts, this report contains four other sections. Section II summarizes last fall's Archdeaconry Meetings concerning Clergy salaries and related considerations. Section III concerns matters referred to other Diocesan agencies, and Section IV is about the Retired Clergy. Section V contains our usual summary of the existing situation and recommendations for action by this Commission

II. ARCHDEACONRY MEETINGS

In the months of October and November the Chairman and other members of the Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries journeyed to Archdeaconry meetings with Wardens, Treasurers and other concerned Vestrymen and some Parish Diocesan delegates. The Commission thanks all those who helped with the arrangements for these meetings and is pleased to report that in but four doubtful cases, the Clergy whose Parishes were represented felt that the meetings were "helpful."

These meetings were for the mutual exchange of information between the Diocese and the Churches. No resolutions were passed or votes taken. The Commission does feel, however, that it is worthwhile to share some observations with the Convention.

Our most important single impression was of the good-will which exists among the laymen of the Diocese, for the Clergy. It is clear that the laymen respect the

dedication of the Clergy and are concerned for their welfare. It must be further noted though that there is a strong link, at least in the minds of many of the laymen who attended the meetings, between fund-raising and the salaries paid to their Clergymen. Many expressed a willingness to provide better "livings" for the Clergy, if funds were available. To this end, there were widespread requests for additional help from the Diocese in support of the fund-raising endeavors of local Churches. Your Commission has reported this fact to the Bishops and Diocesan Department of Stewardship and Evangelism, and we believe everyone is fully aware of the situation.

At these meetings we were also impressed by the obvious fact that there are communication difficulties between the Clergy and the Vestries concerning Ministers' salaries, perquisites and allowances. As a general rule, the Clergy are aware of the enormous needs of the Church on the one hand, and of the fact that there are always some parishioners making great sacrifices for the Lord's work on the other, and standing in between, they are reluctant to speak up and ask for anything for themselves, however great their need may be. Because we believe, however, that communication is important, we have included among our resolutions in Section V one to encourage specific action, setting up machinery to facilitate greater understanding.

The Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries also learned at these meetings that there are wide differences of opinion among the laity as well as between the Clergy and the laity as to how perquisites, such as housing, should be valued. In response to many requests from the laymen who attended, we have endeavored to suggest rational standards for such evaluation, and also offer these in resolution form in Section V.

III. MATTERS REFERRED TO OTHER AGENCIES

Two matters profoundly affecting the full picture of Clergy livings have been referred to other agencies of the Diocese:

A. *Diocesan Life Insurance Coverage for the Clergy.* The matter of a Group Life Insurance Plan for the Clergy of the Diocese has been under study for some time by the Committee on Diocesan Administration and Salaries of the Department of Finance. This Committee advises that the matter is pending and that it hopes to make a definitive recommendation soon.

B. *Scholarship Funds for Needy Clergy Children.* The 1960 Convention referred investigation of the possibility of establishing scholarship funds for needy Clergy children of college age to the Committee on Special Gifts and Bequests of the Department of Finance. We must report that we are presently unclear as to the current official status of this project, and regard it as a matter in the hands of the Committee on Unfinished Business.

IV. RETIRED CLERGY

A majority of the retired Clergy responding to the 1963 questionnaire have indicated that they believe a study should be made of the needs of their group. The Commission has clear indications that some of them, at least, are hard-pressed, and will study this situation and report to the 1964 Convention. Pending a full study, the Commission suggests that there are many opportunities where retired men could be of real help to existing parishes and missions while finding some supplementary income within the framework of the current Pension Fund structure. We believe that both Churches and men could benefit by endeavors to make increased use of the mature and able services of retired Clergy. We hope also that the 1964 General Convention will direct further study to the possibility of more effective use of retired Clergy, as well as other matters related to Clergy "livings."

V. THE CURRENT SITUATION AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries is pleased to report a further rise in Clergy livings in the Diocese of Newark in 1963, and other indications of an improving situation.

We calculate that about half the Clergy in the Diocese received raises effective in 1963 and that of those who did not receive raises in 1963, about half did in 1962. Based on Questionnaires received in the past three years, it appears that 90% of all the men who have been in the Diocese during this period have had at least some sort of increase. We note, however, that these increases are of all sorts and degrees; that in some cases they have been pathetically small and that there appear to be some men not receiving the Diocesan minimum.

Figuring housing at 20% of the value of cash salary, including utilities, the average living (total remuneration) is about at the \$7,322.00 per year mark. At face value, this sounds fairly good. However, a handful of top salaries, well above the field, so sharply raise the figure as to make it possibly misleading. In this situation, the median figure of \$6,540.00 is a better indicator.

The average Clergy salary is, on this basis, just below the current national average. We do not have the national median figure for comparison.

As the overall economic situation improves, so does morale. In 1960, 56% of the reporting Clergy indicated that their salaries were not adequate for their needs. This figure dropped to 41% in 1962. Now only 35% of the men feel their salaries are inadequate.

The number of men who report paying their own phone bills on minimum salaries has shrunk from twenty-one to ten, and two of these now receive partial assistance. It appears that the number of Churches providing vestments is increasing. We also note with interest that some men now receive cash allowances instead of rectories. There also appear to be an increasing number of Churches who are paying Blue Cross - Blue Shield premiums and Social Security Tax.

Two parishes have also applied for subsidies, so we hope that in 1964 a uniform minimum for those who need it will also prevail for the first time in the history of the Diocese.

Despite all these happy facets, we must report that problems remain.

Some men still do not receive the full allowances provided by the Diocesan minimum. Many men with capability, experience, and family responsibility, including often advance education for their children, are being paid minimum or near minimum, rather than "just and equitable salaries."

Serious inequities in individual parishes have been brought to the attention of the Commission.

35% of the men still feel their salaries inadequate.

The real value of individual Clergymen's own livings is beclouded in their own minds and in the thinking of their Vestries, because of the lack of uniform standards of judgement. Some men suffer because their housing and perquisites are over-valued. The members of this Commission were astonished to find that in numerous cases Vestries value housing and perquisites at 60 - 75% of the Minister's cash salary — though laymen typically spend less than 30% of their cash salary on these items.

RECOMMENDATIONS: The Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries feels that the voice of Convention has been well heeded throughout the Diocese in this area of concern. Accordingly, we suggest that this body again speak to the Diocesan family.

First, in order to clarify an area of confusion mentioned above, involving the valuation of housing and utilities, and, incidentally, to bring this Diocese into line with National Council policies, we offer:

RESOLUTION I

BE IT RESOLVED that for the purpose of defining "just and equitable salaries" the housing of all clergy be uniformly valued at 20% of the amount of their cash salaries, save that if this figure shall be less than \$1500.00, the latter figure shall be used, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the cost of utilities should not be valued at more than 10% of the man's cash salary, and that Vestries be called upon to exercise fairness in such matters as calling the full heating costs of oversized, uninsulated rectories the equivalent of cash salary, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Convention thank all Vestries and Executive Committees who have given positive consideration to the needs of the Clergy in the year past, and urge further efforts on the part of all concerned to pay "just and equitable salaries" as defined by the 1960 Convention (JOURNAL, p. 120) and modified by this resolution.

As also indicated earlier, this Commission believes that communication about Clergy needs and existing standards for salary, perquisites, and allowances ought to be improved. To encourage a specific program for better communication in this area, we recommend:

RESOLUTION II

BE IT RESOLVED that each Warden, Vestryman, and Executive Committeeman and Treasurer in the Diocese be asked to regard it as a duty to be familiar with the Diocesan minimums and the formulas for the payment of "just and equitable" salaries, perquisites, and allowances, established by this and previous Conventions, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Convention call upon all Vestries and Executive Committees to review the salaries and related considerations of all Rectors and Vicars annually before other items on the budget, and to discuss the matter as a formal item of business on at least one other occasion each year, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in each Parish or Mission, a Warden, Vestryman or Executive Committeeman be formally designated by the governing body to communicate regularly with the Clergyman concerning his needs and feelings with regard to the adequacy of his salary and other allowances, the condition of the rectory and other matters bearing upon the living conditions of the man, and to report back to the governing body, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Convention direct the Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries to hold a Fall meeting for the Vestrymen and Executive Committeemen so designated and for any other responsible Church officials who may wish to attend, for the purpose of exchanging information in this area of concern.

Last year the Convention made provision for clergy to apply for subsidies in the event that the minimum salary could not be paid by his church. This resolution indicated that the request for a subsidy must be endorsed by the Vestry. The question has arisen as to what happens if a Vestry refuses either to pay the minimum or to endorse a request for a subsidy.

In consultation with this Commission, the Bishops have recommended that, should such a situation arise, it be referred to them by the Clergyman involved. The Commission believes that the question is hypothetical at this time, and trusts that if it becomes real the problem can be solved through the pastoral guidance of our Bishops to all concerned.

This Commission thanks all who have assisted us with our work and attended to these matters.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONVERSATIONS WITH THE PRESBYTERIANS

The 88th Convention of the Diocese of Newark responded to an invitation from the Synod of New Jersey of the United Presbyterian Church "to enter into conversations and to join in a program of cooperation, education and exchange" by asking the Bishop to appoint a committee to represent the Diocese of Newark in such conversations. The Bishop then named to the Committee the Reverend Messrs. George E. Rath, George M. Bean, Charles J. Child, Jr., Ledlie I. Laughlin, Jr., and Messrs. Herbert Draesel, Charles W. Kappes, Jr. and Joseph Leidy.

This committee has met with representatives of the Synod of New Jersey three times, and it has found these meetings rewarding and fruitful. It was agreed from the beginning that we should leave to our national committees engaged in Consultations on Church Union the major theological and practical problems of reunion; but this, far from hampering our freedom of discussion, has seemed to open the way to frank, friendly and non-defensive dialogue. We have discovered much that we hold in common and much which is distinctive of our two separate traditions. Perhaps because we have not felt bound to resolve every point of difference, we have been all the more free, as fellow Christians, to explore the areas of our agreements and divergencies.

One of the more striking revelations uncovered in our conversations has been the discovery that differences of opinion and emphasis are almost as great within the ranks of Episcopalians and Presbyterians, taken simply by themselves, as they are between the two communions. This is not to say that there are no significant points of difference between us. We feel that we have discovered areas of broad agreement in such matters as the acceptance of the historic creeds, our regard for the historic scriptures and our practice of the sacraments of Holy Baptism and Holy Communion. There are, however, real differences with regard to views on the nature of the Church and her ministry. Yet in our sense of the Church's mission to the world, to our own society, to individuals needing the experience of the grace of God in their lives, both our communions share familiar convictions.

We are convinced that there is not only a "need," as the mover of the resolution by which this committee was created expressed it, but a real possibility "for acquaintanceship, for trust and affection, for growth in knowledge and understanding" between Presbyterians and Episcopalians. We covet for others the experience we have enjoyed, and to this end we urge that such conversations be sought at the level of the archdeaconries, cities and towns within our Diocese. We believe that there is a real possibility for the growth of understanding and friend-

ship through the formation of study groups composed of members of local Presbyterian and Episcopal churches and through occasional exchanges of pulpits or joint services.

The clerical members of our committee are deeply grateful for the contributions the lay members made to the conversations. It appears that the Presbyterian committee will include laymen in the future. It is apparent to us all that the movement toward Church union must enlist lay interest and support lest its clerical leaders find themselves outrunning the balance of the Church. It would be our hope, therefore, that local committees bear in mind the importance of including lay representatives in their conversations, study and joint activities.

The members of the Committee on Conversations with the Presbyterians hope that this Convention will authorize the continuance of these discussions and ask authority to enter into similar conversations with representatives of other communions engaging in the Consultations on Church Unity if the occasion and opportunity for such conversations shall arise. To this end, we present the following Resolution and move its adoption:

RESOLVED, that subject to the Bishop's approval and re-appointment, the Committee on Conversations with the Presbyterians be renamed the Committee on Conversations on Church Unity and authorized to continue discussions with representatives of the New Jersey Synod of the United Presbyterian Church and to enter into similar conversations with representatives of other communions engaging in the Consultations on Church Unity, as occasion and opportunity shall arise.

**A PROPOSAL OF THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL TO THE DIOCESAN
CONVENTION, MAY 11, 1963, THAT A COMPANION-DIOCESE
RELATIONSHIP BE ESTABLISHED BETWEEN THE
MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF LIBERIA AND
THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK**

The Bishops of Newark and the Bishops of the Missionary District of Liberia have agreed in principle on the desirability of requesting National Council to declare Newark and Liberia Companion Dioceses. The relationship would normally extend for one triennial, beginning with General Convention, 1964, but probably could begin as early as the Fall of 1963. The Bishop of Newark now seeks the approval of Diocesan Council to take the proposal to Diocesan Convention in May, 1963.

Assuming the desirability of such a relationship with any part of the Church, Liberia commends itself to our consideration because of our personal tie with Bishop Dillard Brown, who will succeed as Missionary Bishop on the imminent retirement of Bishop Harris. Bishop Brown spent three significant years as Vicar of the Church of the Incarnation, Jersey City, from 1943 to 1946. He was particularly active in the Department of Christian Education and the young people's

summer conferences. From here he went to St. Luke's Church, Washington. But despite his having been born in Georgia and having had a more mature ministry in Washington, he has always felt particularly close to this Diocese, largely because of the many friendships he formed among the clergy while he was here and which still continue. These personal ties would be of inestimable benefit in nurturing a relationship with the District of which he will be Bishop for presumably nineteen years. We can assume that he will quite naturally gravitate toward Newark when on furlough or attending General Conventions, etc.

The following is from a National Council paper, "Suggested Blueprint for Starting Companion-Diocese Program:"

The Companion-Diocese Program endorsed by the National Council is proposed to the Episcopal Church as an effective means for strengthening the bond between the Church and her missionary districts. By-products of this relationship are bound to be greater personalization of the mission field, an increase in financial support, and a better informed Church. But the greatest gains are to be sought in the awareness that we are all one Church engaged in a God-given mission together. Every part of the Church is in need of the other parts. Each can contribute something to another. The patronizing attitude involved in the terms "adoption" or "big-brother-little-brother" do not give recognition of this principle. The dioceses entering into this should be conscious both of what they can contribute to the relationship and what they need to receive from it. Then the undergirding spiritual strength which the whole Church receives through this will find its fullest expression in terms of the educational and financial needs of which we are so conscious.

A number of continental dioceses have already established such relationships, and they generally report enthusiastically on the benefits to all participating churchmen in terms of broadening horizons, enthusiastic concern for the whole mission of the Church, and general involvement in its life and work.

I. Establishing the Relationship

It is recommended that the setting forth of goals, common interests, and resources be delegated to a special Mission Committee including representation from the various departments, women's work, men's work, the parish ministry, and the diocesan office. This committee might continue to spearhead Newark's part in the relationship during its continuance.

II. Planning the Program

- A. This would be worked out by representatives of the two dioceses, without clearance with the National Council Department. Recognition of the limited resources and facilities of the Liberian District should be made at the beginning. Probably we would make an initial contribution of \$500 to \$1,000 to be available to Bishops Harris and Brown to finance their participation in the relationship.
- B. An over-all plan for the entire period could be projected to include:
 1. Exchange of visitors at strategic times in the life of each jurisdiction, such as diocesan conventions. (Liberia's Diplomatic Corps is predominantly Anglican.)
 2. Educational materials to be prepared for both parties.
 3. Exchange of prayer lists, including institutions and individuals.
 4. Specific projects, modest in character and well within the capability of the various churches of each jurisdiction, would be adopted for each year. One stipulation in the National Council program is that any gift that will affect the operating budget of the missionary district in future years must be cleared with and sent through the National Council as is any gift over \$1,000.00. The sacramental character of our gifts to

each other will probably be the most positive proof that this concern is real.

5. Lay people traveling for business or pleasure in either direction should be used.
6. "Pen-pal" relationships could be developed among people of all ages.
7. Possibilities for modest gifts and projects for interested parishes, missions, and individuals. Participation would of course be entirely voluntary.

III. *Suggested Resolutions*

1. The Council of the Diocese of Newark records its approval of the proposed Companion-Diocese relationship between the Diocese of Newark and the Missionary District of Liberia, and expresses its hopes that such a relationship might further our awareness of the Church's mission in all Missionary Districts.
2. The Bishop is requested to bring the Companion-Diocese plan before Diocesan Convention in May, 1963, so that the necessary preparatory work having been completed, the formal relationship may begin at General Convention, 1964.
3. Subject to Diocesan Convention's approval of the Companion-Diocese plan, Diocesan Council allocates the sum of \$1,000 for 1964 as an initial gift to the Missionary District of Liberia to finance its participation.
4. If the action of the Diocesan Convention be favorable, the Bishop is requested to appoint a committee on the Companion-Diocese relationship to represent this Diocese in both planning for and operating the project.

REPORT OF THE CAMPAIGN PLANNING COMMITTEE TO 1963 DIOCESAN CONVENTION FROM THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL

The Background

Diocesan Convention, meeting on May 12, 1962, heard an episcopal address in which Bishop Stark put forward immediate and projected needs of the Diocese in the urban, suburban, and rural areas of the Diocese.

The following resolution was presented by Mr. Sidney A. Wood on behalf of Diocesan Council and was adopted by the Convention:

"WHEREAS the Diocesan Council has submitted a Statement indicating needs and opportunities for the extension of the work of the Church in the Diocese of Newark which cannot be met through regular program budget of the Diocese resulting from the present level of giving: therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the 88th Convention of the Diocese of Newark direct the Bishops and Diocesan Council to study these needs and opportunities, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Convention direct the Diocesan Council to present sixty days prior to the next Convention a plan for meeting these needs and opportunities."

The sub-committee of Diocesan Council which was charged with drawing up a preliminary report to Council recorded that its study of the needs which face the Diocese was admittedly cursory, and may well have only skimmed the surface. Nor were needs far projected into the future. It is generally recognized, however, that there is need for land and buildings and manpower in the rapidly growing suburban and rural areas of the Diocese and that there is need for renovated buildings and for manpower and resources for programming in the urban centers.

Very possibly the needs of many facets of Diocesan life have not been included in the following estimate for capital investment, salaries, and programming:

For salary and program items this figure is for one year only; once established, these items would make recurring annual demands for continued support. The allotment for capital expansion would finance probably a five year program. If the salary and program items were put on a five year basis, the total would be increased to \$1,426,000. or approximately \$300,000.00 per year.

Possible Approaches

In the face of this need, Diocesan Council believes the only satisfactory answer in the long view is to raise substantially the level of regular Diocesan giving.

—A second Episcopal Advance Fund drive similar in size and scope to the EAF of 1956, while conceivably supplying large funds for capital expansion, would not provide the large recurring items such as salaries and programming. But we do not rule out the possible advantages of another EAF campaign sometime in the future.

—A "Junior" EAF would not supply the money needed, nor could it be often repeated.

—An across-the-board increase in annual quotas would not, in itself, hold much promise of success unless preceded and supported by a program of evangelism and education in Stewardship throughout the Diocese.

—An annual Whitsunday Offering, based on present patterns of giving, would not yield the necessary results, nor could interest in such an offering be maintained indefinitely.

Meeting the Need

Diocesan Council recommends to Diocesan Convention that a principal stress be placed on a program of evangelism and stewardship to raise Diocesan income by raising the level of giving in parishes and missions.

To this end, it is recommended that each parish and mission of the Diocese give serious consideration to the advisability of receiving assistance in increasing its regular annual budget by engaging a professional fund-raiser. For example, Thomas White Associates is known for its good work in three parishes of this Diocese as well as in other places. However, it must be faced frankly that such concerns as Thomas White are expensive and appropriate to themselves what may amount to a major portion of the first year's increase in giving, but based on performance records, the eventual increase in giving to an individual church would seem to justify the costs.

It is recommended further that the Diocese employ a Director of Stewardship to help in the dissemination of information and helps for stewardship. It is also understood that such a person would be available to run a limited number of actual campaigns for operating funds in parishes and missions that might want his aid with the understanding that the individual congregations would defray the cost of his services.

But as the full implementation of such a stewardship program would take considerable time, it seems necessary to make some other (and temporary) provision to meet the immediate high priority needs of the Diocese.

It is therefore recommended that there be held on Whitsunday, May 17, 1964, and also on June 6, 1965, a special offering throughout the Diocese with a goal of \$150,000.00 each year. Such an offering, preceded by an intensive educational program, should result in raising such a sum. The responsibility for the details of such a program should rest with a committee to be appointed by the Bishop if this approach is approved in principle.

One important weakness in the above program suggests itself. In any such plan as that of Thomas White Associates, or the Whitsunday Offering, the wealthier members of a parish or mission are not properly stimulated, and if they were, their participating to the extent of their ability would prove detrimental to the general giving pattern of the congregation. This important weakness will have to be worked through. The scope of the Department of Finance's Committee on Special Gifts and Bequests is such that this Committee might properly be requested to seek a possible corrective.

1964 Objectives

The high priority needs which should be met by the 1964 offering are as follows:

- A Diocesan Stewardship Program, including a full time director;
- A grant for fabric and program on the urban scene;
- A construction grant for an all-purpose building on land already purchased in Roxbury Township, Morris County;
- A land purchase of at least 5 acres for new work in one of the 12 sites indicated by the Diocesan Survey.

Implementation

Finally, the following resolution was adopted by Diocesan Council on February 4, 1963, for presentation to Diocesan Convention on May 11, 1963:

"The Diocesan Council recommends to Diocesan Convention that the Diocese take strong steps to meet the tremendous challenges which confront us (a) by vigorously implementing a plan of stewardship and evangelism for which a director be employed, (b) by holding Whitsunday Offerings for the advance of the Episcopal Church in 1964 and 1965 with a goal of \$150,000 for each year, and (c) by a special gifts program to be implemented by the Department of Finance's Committee on Special Gifts and Bequests."

Diocese of Newark

Memorandum of Information Required by the Standing Committee on Petition by a Parish or Diocesan Organization to Sell, Lease or Mortgage Real Estate, owned by it.

- I. The Petition should state whether the property to be sold or mortgaged is used as a place of worship, and, if so, whether or not it has been consecrated.
- II. If the petitioner has a map of the property described in the petition, please submit it with the petition, and after the Standing Committee has acted upon the petition the map will be returned.
- III. In the case of a petition to sell or lease real estate:
 1. Besides a description of the property by metes and bounds, the petition should describe the buildings and their present use and the reasons for selling or leasing the same, also that, in the opinion of the petitioner, the sale price or rental is equivalent to the fair value at the time of making the application, and the basis of that opinion, such as appraisals, previous efforts to sell, etc.
 2. If the sale price is to be paid other than in cash the terms of payment should be stated together with the rate of interest, and whether the balance of the sale price is to be secured by a mortgage on the premises, or otherwise, and if a mortgage, the name and address of the person or organization who will take the same.
- IV. In the case of a petition to mortgage real estate:
 1. A statement should be submitted as to the reasons why it is necessary to borrow money, on mortgage, i.e., to erect a new building, or to improve present quarters, etc., with the name of the person or organization who will take the mortgage, the terms of payment and rate of interest.
 2. If a parish applies for leave to mortgage property, there should be submitted a statement of such facts as have convinced the vestry that it is prudent to borrow the desired funds and that the parish will be able to repay the amount borrowed. Information showing whether or not the parish is growing and concerning its financial affairs should be included. In addition to other information on which the Vestry may have acted, the following data is requested:
 - (a) The present parish membership showing the number of families, and the number of baptized persons and communicants, as compared with five years prior thereto.
 - (b) A brief income and operating statement of the parish for the last two fiscal years prior to the making of the application. This statement should show the sources of income such as pledges, plate offerings, rents from any property, income from invested funds, and, under the heading of expenses, a grouping of salaries, usual operating expenses, and the parish quota for the Diocesan and General Church Program, the pledge toward this quota and amount paid thereon.
 - (c) A statement of any Notes Payable or other indebtedness except that incurred in the usual course of parish operations.

3. If the Department of Missions or other Diocesan Corporation applies for leave to mortgage property, it is requested that said corporation submit such information as it deems appropriate to demonstrate the desirability of the course it proposes.
 4. The Standing Committee may request representatives of the petitioner to appear before it in support of the petition, and in the case of a parish they shall be the Rector, Treasurer or other representative, who shall bring with them such parish records as may enable them to answer reasonable questions relating to the parish finances, growth, efforts to raise by gifts the amount which the parish desires to raise by mortgage, etc.
- V. The vestry or the governing body of the petitioner should, by proper resolution, authorize the execution of the petition by the proper officers of the petitioner, and affix the seal of the petitioner to the same.
