#### CONSTITUTION

#### ARTICLE 2.

There shall be a Convention of the Church in this Diocese, on the second Tuesday in May in each year, or on such other day in May as may be specially appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority. The Convention shall be held at the Cathedral unless the Ecclesiastical Authority appoints otherwise.

#### FOURTEENTH ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE RIGHT REVEREND LELAND STARK, D.D., L.H.D. BISHOP OF NEWARK

THE BUZZER signaling an incoming call seemed to have a more insistent buzz than usual. I pressed the button for my "intercom," and I heard the excited voice of my secretary, Miss Beverly Leber. "The White House is on the phone!" she cried.

Well, I had it coming. Ever since we became so heavily involved in Vietnam and I would hear someone criticizing the Administration's policy, I would tell him that while it was perfectly proper to criticize, he ought to think through the whole problem in such a way that if the President were to phone him and ask him what he would do if he were in that chair in the White House, the critic should be ready with a one-two-three reply.

In a few seconds, the President was on the line, and in that distinctive Texas drawl of his, he said, "Bishop Stark, I know you've given a great deal of thought to the war in Vietnam, and I'm willing to follow your advice. What would you do if you were in my place? Give me a one-two-three answer."

Of course, you know this did not happen. It would be sheer chance if the President has even so much as heard my name, but I do believe the war in Vietnam is of such urgent importance that every one of us ought to study and think and pray

about the situation as though the President would suddenly make that kind of call.

There is no question but what Vietnam represents the most crucial problem our nation—perhaps the whole world—faces today, and I have decided to devote my entire address to the subject. I hope to deliver it without emotion and with utmost fairness to various points of view. I do not know how many will, in general, agree with me. I know many will disagree, and that is your privilege. Perhaps all that any of you will say of it is that at least it gives evidence of some thought and study and prayer.

#### A VIETNAM CHRONOLOGY

The subject is so vast and so complex that I cannot of course cover every point or address myself to every question, but it may help us to refresh our memories if I begin with a brief chronology of the Vietnam struggle. (Much of this, by the way, comes from an excellent and thoroughly objective pamphlet entitled Vietnam: Vital Issues in the Great Debate, published by the Foreign Policy Association in New York; I heartily recommend it to all of you.)

We start the chronology in

1945 when Ho Chi Minh, a Moscow-trained Communist, proclaims the Democratic Republic of Vietnam with Hanoi as its capital.

In 1946 the French-Indochina war begins as the Vietminh (who in our day are called the Vietcong) attack throughout Indochina.

In 1948 as the war continues, the French install former emperor Bao Dai as chief of state of Vietnam with Saigon as its capital.

In 1950 the Korean conflict begins.

1951: the war in Indochina continues, and the Eisenhower administration agrees to give economic aid to the Saigon regime through the French.

1954: Dien Bien Phu falls and the war ends with the Geneva Conference. Ngo Dinh Diem becomes premier under Bao Dai, and President Eisenhower promises direct help to Saigon. Some 860,000 refugees, mostly Roman Catholics, move to South Vietnam.

By 1955 the French had withdrawn, and the United States takes over the training of the South Vietnam army. Bao Dai is deposed, and Ngo Dinh Diem is elected president of the republic of (South) Vietnam.

In 1956 the elections, which according to the Geneva agreements were to be held in both North and South Vietnam, fail to take place.

1957: U. S. personnel are for the first time injured by guerrillas.

1958-60: terror raids by the Vietcong (successors to the Vietminh) are increased, and our aid to Saigon under Diem is stepped up.

1961: the National Front for the Liberation of South Vietnam is established and is praised by Radio Hanoi. General Maxwell Taylor makes the first of several trips to Saigon as Vietcong raids spread. President Kennedy decides to bolster South Vietnam's military strength and increases the number of U. S. military men to serve as advisers to South Vietnamese forces.

In 1963 rising South Vietnamese unrest is climaxed by a military coup against Diem, who is killed together with his brother. In the next few years regimes will be rising and falling as the Roman Catholics, the Buddhists, and the military maneuver against one another.

In 1964 U. S. forces increase to 25,000. U. S. Navy ships are attacked in the Gulf of Tonkin, and Congress approves a resolution that gives President Johnson authority to resist aggression in southeast Asia. Hanoi in September indicates secretly its willingness to talk, but no reply comes from Washington by the end of the year.

1965: Washington rejects U Thant's follow-up of a peacefeeler. Twenty-four hours later

the President orders the first air-strike against North Vietnam. In April the President makes his Baltimore address, proposing "unconditional discussions" while bombing of the North continues. Hanoi replies with its unacceptable "Four Points." In May the President suspends bombing for a "limited trial period" to continue indefinitely if Communists end all armed action in the South. Hanoi returns one of the President's letters unopened. U. S. ground troops, previously called "advisers," are in June openly committed to combat. By the of December American troop strength is at 190,000. The President orders a second bombing pause that is to last for 37 days into January, 1966.

By the end of January, 1966, the bombing is resumed. In June the bombing of oil depots in the Hanoi-Haiphong area is begun in an attempt to stop the growing infiltration of men and supplies into South Vietnam. By September our dead total over 5,000; combat strength is now over 300,000. In October Hanoi apparently quietly drops three of its four demands and indicates willingness to talk if bombing stops. The bombings continue.

Thus far in 1967, while the Administration denies escalation, for the first time North Vietnamese rivers are mined, areas of North Vietnam are shelled by destroyers, targets

within the cities of Hanoi and Haiphong are bombed as well as air bases from which North Vietnam's air fleet operates. In March our planes dropped 77,000 tons of bombs, only 3,000 tons short of the maximum dropped in one month on half of Europe at the peak of World War II. Our troop strength has risen to 442,000 with calls by the military for General Westmoreland estimates that enemy troop strength in the South has doubled in the past two years. Secretary of State Dean Rusk claims Hanoi has said no to 28 U. S. proposals for a peaceful settlement. Two days ago (May 11) Secretary General U Thant said Hanoi would come to the peace table soon if only we stopped the bombing. There is the possibility of another truce on May 23.

This brings us up to date in our Vietnam chronology. We have come a long way from the September 25, 1964, speech of President Johnson when he said: "There are those who say you ought to go north and drop bombs, to try to wipe out the supply lines... We don't want our American boys to do the fighting for Asian boys. We don't want to get involved in a nation with 700,000,000 people and get tied down to a land war in Asia."

#### IS THERE A CHRISTIAN POSITION?

The issue of the Vietnam war has divided America as few other issues

have done in our long history, and it strikes me that an obvious question to ask at this juncture is this: "Is there a Christian position to take on this tragic issue?" I wish I could say yes at this point and forthwith outline what it is, but the plain fact is that Christians are probably as badly divided as those outside the Christian community. Only the most blatantly self-righteous would dare to say that his is the only position a Christian may hold, and I would hope no such person is here today.

As I see it, there are five general positions that people hold, although if you once begin to describe these positions in detail, then you will end up with at least fifteen. So let us keep them general for the time, discussing them briefly and objectively and giving warning to all five positions that the dictum of Cromwell applies: "I beseech you, in the mercies of Christ, think it possible that you may be wrong!"

At one extreme you find those who say that it is a military victory that must be won rather than have this conflict end with what they would call "an inconclusive negotiated settlement." Some of them would even countenance the use of nuclear weapons on the grounds that this would not only shorten the present war but would also make clear what would happen if World War III were to begin; and so they reason that the use of nuclear arms would prevent World War III from

ever starting! Such extremists do not count very many in their camp, but they would include some Christians among them.

At the other extreme are pacifists and others who urge the immediate and unconditional withdrawal of all our troops. Again, this opposite extreme is held by a relatively small number, some of whom are certainly Christians.

The bulk of our citizenry, however, is undoubtedly to be found in the three general positions between these two extremes, and Christians are sure to be found in all three. Each of the three positions can claim its own contingent of professors, Congressmen, Senators, government officials, doctors, lawyers, businessmen, prelates, bishops, and other clergy as well as its embarrassing share of beatniks and kooks.

First, there is the position of the so-called hawk, who believes that the Administration should prosecute the war with greater aggressiveness. Second, there are those who in general support our government's policy. Third, there are the so-called doves, who think the United States is being overly aggressive and that the war should be de-escalated. But virtually all occupying these three positions are in agreement that we are fighting not primarily to defeat the Vietcong and the North Vietnamese but rather that our main objective is to get our adversary to the conference table in order to establish the kind

of settlement which will permit South Vietnam to determine its own future in peace. After that initial agreement, however, the fur flies!

It is frustrating to have to forego discussing the pros and cons of these positions as well as to have to forego dealing with a whole host of questions that cluster around Vietnam. It is even more frustrating to have to confine my own grateful tribute to those who are enduring such hardships and dangers ten thousand miles from home to this single sentence, but time compels me to press on.

You will recall that earlier I said that everyone should study and think and pray about the Vietnam issue in such a way that if the President were suddenly to phone you for advice and counsel, you would be prepared to give it in one-two-three fashion. The time has come for me to take my own advice and to answer the President's hypothetical phone call. I warn you it will be a fairly long response, but at least he is not calling collect.

#### THE PRESIDENT'S HYPOTHETICAL PHONE CALL

At the outset I would want to make sure the President still feels that a negotiated settlement and not a military victory continues as his primary goal. I would like to reassure myself on this point because the President has his critics who claim that he is coming increasingly under the influence of those who are pressing for a purely military solution. "Look here," the President might say to me, "let me quote from my address before the American Physical Society on April 27 when I said: 'Every day good people, wise people say to me, "Why can't we have a negotiated settlement? Why do men have to die?" and I ask myself that every morning. I want to negotiate; I want a political solution, but I can't just negotiate with myself. I will be the first one at that table, wherever it is."

If the President were to say that to me. I would take him at his word: then I would go on to tell him that, in my judgment, words offering to negotiate must be accompanied by real attempts to establish a climate that will make for peace. The establishment of a climate that will make for peace: this is surely a prerequisite for a peaceful settlement, and it strikes me as strange that this prerequisite is so seldom mentioned. It seems so obvious: before a peaceful settlement can be achieved, a climate that makes for it must be established. and it amazes me that so little attention has been given to this point. To illustrate from a different area. for centuries, with of course some outstanding exceptions, the Roman Catholic and the Protestant communities were more or less at enmity with each other and would have continued to stand aloof from each other had not Pope John XXIII come along and through his personal efforts and later through the Vatican Council created an entirely new climate in which brotherhood and good-will could flourish. But the new climate had to be created first.

The good words offering to negotiate are often said, but then deeds follow which create the opposite of a climate in which peaceful negotiation can flourish. I think back, for instance, to the night of April 7, 1965, when in Baltimore the President made one of his most eloquent addresses. He pressed hard for a negotiated peace, even promising the resources of our great nation to help build up both North and South Vietnam once peace was established. I remember at one, stirring point literally leaping out of my chair and shouting "Hurray!" This was the way to begin the establishment of a climate of peace—but the very next day our bombers were over North Vietnam with the heaviest air raids of the war thus far, and the atmosphere of peace, so magnificently created by the President's eloquent words, was violently shattered. What kind of logic is this, I beg of you? You are, let us say, in an unfortunate fist-fight with another man. You plead with him that there is nothing you want more than to negotiate for peace—and then, crash! You hit him with a right cross that dislocates his jaw. What kind of logic is this?

It is in this context of how to create a climate that will make for peace that the whole controversial and bitterly-debated problem as to whether or not we should cease bombing North Vietnam should be placed. Does it make for the creation of a climate in which negotiations can be started or does it make impossible the establishment of that kind of climate?

There was, for example, that long and involuted dispatch by John Hightower of the Associated Press in last Tuesday's papers with the headline, "4-Month U. S. Bid Ignored by Hanoi," that told how the President had ordered our bombers to stay away from Hanoi proper from mid-December to late April. Most of us will admit this is good although it should be noted that heavy bombings of other areas of North Vietnam continued. But shortly before that order was issued. North Vietnamese representatives had apparently been planning to come to Warsaw to discuss negotiation, and before they were even started for Warsaw, on December 13 and 14 our planes carried out a raid over the outskirts of Hanoi, some of our planes streaking over the heart of the city. One or two of them, it is admitted, jettisoned their bombs over the city when they were attacked. Our officials denied that this constituted deliberate bombing of the civilian population, and while they were no doubt right in their contention, one cannot help wondering whether this kind of attack creates a climate for peaceful negotiation. That it doesn't is indicated by the fact that the North Vietnamese called off their trip to Warsaw.

It was at this point in our hypothetical phone conversation that the President reminded me that there had been two bombing pauses and that the North Vietnamese had used them to their own military advantage and that furthermore he had offered in a letter to Ho Chi Minh to stop the bombing if Hanoi would agree to certain reciprocal conditions.

Here I felt constrained to remind the President what he had said in his letter and what the implication of it was. The President said he was "prepared to order a cessation of bombing against your country and the stopping of further augmentation of United States forces in South Vietnam as soon as I am assured that infiltration into South Vietnam has ceased." But notice that the United States is insisting that the first move is up to Ho Chi Minh, and if he had complied with that condition, he would have had to stop sending food, medicine, and military supplies to his 50,000 troops; in other words, he would have had virtually to abandon them in order to comply with the President's preconditions. How could we ever expect a proud Oriental to whom loss of face is the greatest of all sins to agree to that?

Two days ago U Thant, Secretary-General of the United Nations, reiterated—as indeed so have the Pope and diplomats of many nations—

what he had previously contended, namely, that "the present impasse can be broken and a halt put to the increasingly horrible slaughter and destruction of the Vietnam war only if one side or the other shows the wisdom and the courage and the compassion for humanity to take the initiative of a first step" and that "a cessation of the bombing of North Vietnam is an imperative necessity to create conditions for peaceful talks." Two days ago U Thant, who admittedly has access to information none of the rest of us has, said he thought Hanoi would come to the peace table "within a few weeks" if we would simply stop the bombing, and he solemnly warned that if the United States persists in its policy of escalation, we may already be in the opening stages of World War III.

Admittedly, there are risks entailed in a cessation of hombing, but we are taking many other risks as we continue to escalate the war, for if we pursue our present course, we may someday find that we have escalated into the nuclear horror of World War III. Since we are seemingly not afraid of taking risks in widening the war, let us not be afraid to take this and other steps that are risks for peace.

Although I had not said a tenth of the things I wanted to say, I did not feel I could hold so busy a man as the President any longer even in a hypothetical phone call, and having told him that he is much in the

thoughts and prayers of myself and our people as we pray for guidance of the Holy Spirit for him, I said goodbye and hung up.

#### A CONCLUDING PARABLE

I turn back to you now as I conclude with a modern parable. Some weeks ago over television I saw again that great movie, "Madame Curie," which was filmed back in the 1940's. The 487th experiment had just failed to produce the lifesaving substance of radium, and Pierre, her husband, gives up in despair, crying, "Four

hundred eighty-seven failures! It can't be done, it simply can't be done! Maybe in a hundred years but never in our lifetime." Then Madame Curie confronted her husband with resolute face, saying, "If it takes a hundred years, it will be a pity, but I dare not do less than work for it so long as I have life."

487 failures! There is a parable for our times in that—so many failures for us too, but in the spirit of the Prince of Peace, by the grace of the Almighty, by the guidance of the Holy Spirit, let us set about the 488th!

#### LET US PRAY

While a space of silence is kept, I bid each of you pray as you are given guidance, for the coming of a just and righteous peace, according to the will of God . . . Amen.

#### FOURTH ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE RIGHT REVEREND GEORGE E. RATH, S.T.D. SUFFRAGAN BISHOP OF NEWARK

In SEVENTEENTH CENTURY England there lived a witty, urbane and scholarly priest whose name was Thomas Fuller. In the troubles that divided his country between supporters of the court, Royalists, and supporters of Parliament, Roundheads, Thomas' sympathies were all on the side of King and Established Church, but so discreet was he that while others, including the king, were losing their heads, literally, the Reverend Dr. Fuller was able throughout the period of the Commonwealth to continue preaching and lecturing in the universities. Only, it was at a price: the price of continued discretion in his public utterances.

But if the worthy divine was unable to give full rein to his innermost thoughts in what he said from the pulpit, he was still unfettered in his communication with his Maker, and he aired both his hopes and his doubts in brief meditations or, as he called them, contemplations which have survived the centuries. The nature of his outlook upon his times and their progress may be guessed from the titles of his three successive volumes of meditations: "Good Thoughts in Bad Times," "Good Thoughts in Worse Times," and "Mixed Contemplations in Better Times." Unfortunately, Thomas Fuller's "better times" had hardly arrived when he succumbed to typhus at the age of fifty-two.

It is not my intention to talk to you about Thomas Fuller, nor, profitable as it might be, to read to you selections from his writings. Nor do I draw a parallel between his case and mine. If anything, I am more aware of the many distinct contrasts between us, not the least of which is this: that whereas he was strictly limited in what he dared say from the pulpit because Cromwell's spies might be listening, modern preachers, in general, and suffragan bishops, in particular, can say almost anything they like because nobody is paying any attention to them. In such a circumstance it is small wonder if occasionally, like Thomas Fuller, we seek a more responsive audience in our prayers and contemplations.

Such a contemplation I would share with you today. It begins with one of the Good Friday collects, to me one of the most affecting and moving prayers—I mean it moves me rather than God—in all our devotional literature. It seems to ask little, but in actuality it asks a lot as we pray:

Almighty God, we beseech thee graciously to behold this thy family, for which our Lord Jesus Christ was contented to be betrayed, and given up into the hands of wicked men, and to suffer death upon the cross; who now liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost ever, one God, world without end. Amen.

"Almighty God . . . graciously behold this thy family." No more. We are not asking you, God, to make your Church great in numbers, powerful, successful. Parents do not insist upon their children's achieving fame and recognition before loving them, nor do you. Love is a free gift from one person to another for what he is, or even for what the lover thinks he is. not for what he owns, not for what he may or may not have accomplished. So, God, you love your Church because it is your family. In a way, it is impudent of us to "beseech" you to look upon us with your grace and favor. You declared your love for this family when our Lord Jesus Christ was contentcontent, mind you!—"to be betrayed, and given up into the hands of wicked men to die upon the cross." "Christ loved the church and gave himself for it."

And that's a strange thought, God, "Christ loved the church." In his life here on earth he never knew the Church, as we know it. I suppose his Church was Israel, the family you chose from among the nations of the earth, and the family of apostles and disciples he collected around himself during his ministry. He loved a church that, in a sense, had yet to be born; and he brought it into

being because he loved it. He created the family by dying for it.

"This thy family." You know, God, sometimes I am ashamed to acknowledge what a caricature of the divine family our Church, the Church in the world, is. I look around and see Christians-brothers and sisters in your family, you know-striving and competing with one another, taking advantage of one another, using one another and abusing one another. I see them envious of one another and afraid of one another. I hear them saying to one another, "You're no brother of mine, you black, brown, red, yellow, white so-and-so. I don't want to have anything to do with you, you dirty fascist, communist, capitalist; you dumb-bunny, head; you hawk, you dove; you catholic, protestant, jew!"

God, I know this sort of thing goes on in human families. I know there are rivalries between partners in a marriage, between parents and children, between siblings in the family. I guess I recognize, at least I've been told about, the ambivalence of love and hate in all human relations—but is this the way it is supposed to be in your family, too? Is it always going to be me, the lonely, isolated, encapsulated individual, against the rest of the world? Is it always going to be us against them?

I guess that's what bothers me most about your Church, God. I ask you to look with favor upon "this thy family," and then I take a look at the Church as it exists and ask, "Can this be his family?"

What do you think of your family, God, when you "behold," as we say, the clergy and the laity in your Church drawn up in opposing lines of battle, us against them? How can you "graciously behold" the alienation and estrangement that exist between so many parish priests and the members of their vestries, or choirs, or other parish organizations? And what about the competition among the clergy themselves, among the parishes? Is it good for us to be angling for one another's parishioners, already converted, (would you believe half-converted?) instead of trying to reach the men and women, boys and girls who have no relationship to the Church or who have let their relationship lapse?

What kind of family is this in which the well-off feel no responsibility for those in need, in which the secure members of prospering suburban congregations feel no obligation to take their share of the ministry with those who are trying to reach the people in the depressed areas of our urban life; or what kind of family is this in which the Christians of one land have little or no concern for Christians in other lands? Why are we cursed with this sense of "we" and "they?" "This is our parish's work and responsibility; that belongs to the diocese." Or. "This is our job; the Overseas Department or the Home Department of the Executive Council will have to take care of that." Why is building a church or parish house in the community in which we live so much more important to us than building a church or school in Liberia, or enabling the disenfranchised poor in our cities to organize so as to better the conditions under which they live?

Aren't we one family, God? Isn't it all one mission to the one world in which we live, to all the people for whom our Lord Jesus Christ was contented to be betrayed, and given up into the hands of wicked men and to suffer death upon the cross?

Almighty God, graciously behold this thy family . . . Make us really a family, thy family . . . Let me live as if I were conscious of belonging to it always . . . .

Amen.

#### EPILOGUE

I shared these thoughts with a friend, and he said, "But you don't propose any solution." That's true. And when I have finished discussing my symptoms with the doctor, I don't tell him how to treat my illness. So I can only pray that a merciful and loving God will know how to overcome the lovelessness, or the limitations to love, in our lives, and the near-sightedness or failure of imagination that expresses itself in the parochialism and narrow-minded self-concern of the Church's life.

I am convinced that the Church is only the Church when it is acting as the family of God and when its members are acting out of the depth of their concern for the family in its widest definition. Pressed for a way to achieve this happy state in ten easy steps, I find myself in the circumstance of that "devout but ignorant" man Tom Fuller describes in one of his "Good Thoughts in Worse Times."

"He perceived a necessity of his own private prayers to God, besides the Pater Nosters, Ave Marias, etc., used in Church . . . . But so simple was he, that how to pray he knew not. Only every morning, humbly bending his knees, and lifting up his eyes and hands to heaven, he would deliberately repeat the alphabet. And now, said he,

O good God, put these letters together to spell syllables, to spell words, to make such sense as may be most to thy glory and my good."

I would subscribe to Tom Fuller's observation:

"In these distracted times I know what generals to pray for ... But when I descend to particulars, when, how, by whom, I should desire these things to be effected, I may fall to that poor, pious man's A, B, C, D, E, etc."\*

## Rules of Order

#### THE CONVENTION

- 1. The Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convention shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes and Missions they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall record their attendance.
- 3. When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
- The general procedure of the Convention shall be governed, unless otherwise provided for, by the rules of parliamentary practice as set forth in "Roberts' Rules of Order."
- At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
- 6. A public address system shall be installed for use of those addressing the Convention.
- 7. No motion shall be put, or debated, until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
- 8. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it; or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment has been offered. The motion to lay upon the table, and to adjourn, shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
- When any member is about to speak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
- 10. No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply), in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
- 11. If any member in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
- 12. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.
- 13. All questions shall be decided viva vocs, unless otherwise specially ordered.
- 14. On the demand of five Presbyters entitled to vote, or of the Lay Deputies from five Parishes and Missions, the vote upon any question shall be by Orders, the Clergy voting individually and the Laity by Parishes and Missions; and, when a vote is thus taken, a concurrent majority in both Orders shall be necessary to carry any measure. Whenever a vote is taken by orders, each Parish shall have one vote and each Mission shall have one vote in the Lay Order.
- 15. The mode of conducting the nominations and elections of all Committees, Commissions, the Diocesan Council and its Departments, and all other elective officers not otherwise provided for, shall be as follows:
  - a. The Secretary of the Convention shall send out with the notice of the time and place of the Convention, a list of the offices to be filled by election thereat, and the names of the incumbents of these offices, whose terms expire thereat, together with an official nomination blank. Such notice shall be sent out at least one month before the date appointed for the Convention to the Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and to each Lay Deputy whose name and address has been transmitted to the Secretary, as provided in Canon I. Notice of the Convention shall be given in THE NEWARK CHURCHMAN.
  - b. The members of the Convention shall also be requested, in said call, to send to the Secretary any canonical amendments, or other important items of business, that they may propose to introduce at the next Convention, so that such matters may be assigned a place on the Calendar of Business.

- c. Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations for any office or offices to be filled at such Conventions, shall, at least thirty days before the date appointed for the Convention, submit the same in writing to the Secretary thereof together with his certificate that he has secured the consent of such person or persons to such nomination. Nominations may be made from the floor.
- 16. a. A Committee consisting of the Bishops, ex-officio, five other clergymen and five laymen to be known as the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, shall be appointed at each Convention to prepare the Rules of Order, Official Ballots and the Calendar of Business, for the next Convention.
  - b. The Committee, from the list of nominations as furnished to it by the Secretary of the Convention, shall prepare sufficient ballots marked "Sample" for each Clerical and Lay Deputy, as certified by such Secretary, as entitled to a seat in the Convention; such ballot to be mailed by such Secretary to each such Deputy at least five days before the Convention. c. At the beginning of the opening session the committee shall report to the Convention in the form of an official ballot the names of nominees; the arrangement of such names shall be determined by lot in each order.
  - d. If there be any office for which no nomination has been made on the sample ballot, any Deputy may file with the Secretary of the Convention the name of one candidate for any such office, together with his certificate, that he has secured the consent of the person so nominated. Such nominations may be filed up to the hour of voting, and the committee of Elections shall announce the names of such nominees at the time of the distribution of the first ballot.
  - e. The number of consecutive terms any nominee has held the office for which he is again nominated shall be noted on the ballot, in parentheses, after his or her name. After each list of nominations as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks may be filled by any voter. On the first ballot these ballots only shall be used, and also in subsequent ballots, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. No ballot shall be counted in its class, on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled, and the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast.
- 17. There shall be a Committee to be known as the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions, the members of which shall be appointed at each Convention, and shall serve until the close of the next following Convention. The Committee shall receive and consider all resolutions except resolutions on matters coming under the purview of an appropriate department of Diocesan Council, and except resolutions of committees accompanying committee reports recommending action of Convention. The Committee shall submit its report to Convention recommending the adoption or rejection of each resolution proposed, or the adoption of any such resolution as amended by the Committee. A copy of this report shall be mailed by the Secretary of the Convention to each Deputy at least twenty-one days before Convention.
- 18. All resolutions to be considered for action by the Convention shall have been submitted in writing to the Secretary of the Convention not less than sixty days in advance of the Convention and shall have been signed by a Deputy to the Convention. On the expiration of the time for submitting resolutions to the Secretary of the Convention, the Secretary shall transmit to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions all resolutions submitted to him. Additional resolutions may be submitted to the Secretary of the Convention after the time above specified, which additional resolutions shall be transmitted immediately by the Secretary of the Convention to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions; but no such resolution, or such resolution as amended, shall be proposed for action by the Convention except upon a motion for the suspension of the rules duly passed.
- All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered. It shall be the duty of the Secretary promptly to notify the members of all special committees of their appointment.
- 20. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.
- Reports when submitted in Convention shall be read by title only, unless the reading be for the better transaction of business.
- 22. At the close of each Convention a Committee shall be appointed to review and certify the correctness of the minutes.

Acceptance of larger share of former Executive Council grants.
- Diocesan Home for aging women. This is a small part of its total budget of \$41,035.
- Our quota for interdenominational work; research; migrants; Christian Education; radio/TV; etc.
- Diocesan contribution toward total Y.C.S. budget of approximately \$220,500.
- 11. Amount to be disbursed during 1968 in partial support of an ecumenicallysponsored program of Community Organization to be designated by the Diocesan Council.
- Budgeting of approximately 5% of balance of Diocesan share for construction of National Church Hedaquarters; original 'share' was \$105,429.
- Proposed pledge: The Executive Council is not issuing quotas during the next triennium.

#### Resolutions

WHEREAS the Diocesan Council is charged with the responsibility of preparing a budget covering the requested missionary and benevolent requirements of the Diocese and General Church for the ensuing calendar year, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Convention approve the 1968 budget as proposed by the Diocesan Council, and

WHEREAS Canon 4, Section 6(d), of General Convention provides that in each Diocese a definite financial objective shall be allotted to each Parish and Mission as its share of the Program of the Church, therefore

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Diocesan Council be authorized to designate the quota for each Parish and Mission based upon the average amount of its current expenses for the past three years.

#### STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT

#### FOR THE YEAR 1966

There were eight meetings of the Standing Committee held during 1966.

#### February 24th

The Rev. Henry Powers was elected to serve as Secretary, filling the vacancy caused by the death of the Rev. W. O. Leslie, Jr.

The Secretary was requested to prepare a resolution memorializing Canon Leslie, who died on January 21, 1966, having served many years as a member and Secretary of the Standing Committee.

The Rev. S. Hughes Garvin was elected a member of the Standing Committee, Class of 1966.

The Standing Committee recommended to the Bishop that he consent to the admission of St. Luke's, Haworth, as a Parish in union with the Convention.

Consent was given to All Saint's, Glen Rock, to mortgage.

Mr. George Loeffler was recommended to the Bishop for acceptance as a Postulant.

The Bishop reported that the Executive Committee and Chapter of Trinity Cathedral are joining with the Diocesan Council to request permission of the Court to clear the cemetery in the rear of the Cathedral House of the remains of bodies, for the purpose of making use of the area as a parking lot. The Standing Committee approved this action.

Consent was given to the Diocese of Tennessee to elect a Suffragan Bishop and to the Diocese of Virginia to elect a Bishop Coadjutor.

The following expenditures were approved: Jesse Williams Fund, \$13,800; Hannibal Goodwin Fund, \$1,132.95; Church Aid Society, \$371.40.

Mr. John Johnson was recommended to the Bishop for acceptance as a Candidate for Holy Orders, subject to the receipt of proper papers.

#### March 23rd

Mr. William D. Rogers was recommended to the Bishop for acceptance as a Postulant.

Consent was given to Holy Trinity, Hillsdale, to mortgage.

Report was made that Consents were granted by circularization as follows: on March 7, 1966, to All Saints', Glen Rock, to mortgage; on March 9, 1966, to Holy Communion, Paterson, to mortgage.

The Committee affirmed its recommendation of Mr. Raymond Nelson to the Bishop for acceptance as an applicant for Episcopal ordination under Canon 36. Consent was given to the Diocese of Dallas to elect a Suffragan Bishop.

#### April 12th

The following were recommended to the Bishop for Ordination to the Diaconate: Perry Alden Kingman, Donald John Schroder, Robert Vincent Burrows, Preston K. Mears, Jr., Thomas Clarke Lincoln, Philip Warren Lord, and Donald Edwin Fowler.

Consent was given to the election of the Rt. Rev. Jonathan Goodhue Sherman to be a Bishop of the Diocese of Long Island.

Consent was given to the Department of Missions to mortgage property being purchased for new missionary work in Milton-Oak Ridge.

#### May 23rd

The Rev. Alexander M. Rodger was elected President, and the Rev. Henry Powers, Secretary.

Mr. John W. White, Jr. was elected to the Board of Trustees of the Diocesan Investment Trust.

Consent was given to St. John's, Montclair, to mortgage.

Consent was given to St. Peter's, Essex Fells, to mortgage.

Following receipt of a request from the Diocese of West Missouri for consent to the election of a Suffragan Bishop, the Secretary was requested to write the Bishop of West Missouri for more detailed information as to the need of a Suffragan in that Diocese.

A revised "Memorandum of Information Required by the Bishop and the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Newark on Petition by a Parish to Sell, Lease or Mortgage Real Estate" was adopted.

#### June 23rd

Consent was given to the Diocese of West Missouri to elect a Suffragan Bishop. A resolution was passed to petition the House of Bishops to study the matter of the growing multiplicity of Suffragan Bishops.

Consent was given to St. Paul's, Englewood, to mortgage.

The Rev. Richard Andersen was recommended to the Bishop for admission into the Episcopal ministry under Canon 36.

Consent was given to St. Peter's, Mt. Arlington, to sell its vicarage.

The following Consents were given: to the Diocese of Long Island to elect a second Suffragan Bishop, to the Diocese of Northern California for the election of a Suffragan Bishop, to the Ordination and Consecration of the Rev. William Frederick Gates, Jr. as Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Tennessee, of the Rev. William Paul Barnds as Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Dallas, and the Rev. John Harris Burt as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Ohio.

Dr. Lynne Tuthill Greene was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate.

## DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK

#### Report to the Bishops and the 1967 Diocesan Convention

The annual report of the Department of Missions to Convention has regularly been made by title and has therefore been seen only by those diligent enough to read through the Journal. In my travels throughout the Diocese, I have been dismayed to learn that the extensive work of our Department is known to only a sparse few.

It is my feeling that should a full report be made to each parish and mission, a greater interest in and appreciation of the Program Budget might very well result in a greater desire to raise congregational sights toward paying quotas. For our diocese is not a mere aggregate of congregations but a family in the Church of God, "the blessed company of all faithful people." In these days of rapidly shifting populations and social change, we are striving to lend a helping hand to young and promising congregations as well as to those who are standing fast in the Faith in once-flourishing areas—rallying points for stability, decency,

family, and community life. In addition to reacting to immediately urgent needs, we could strategically start work in as many as ten new, fast-growing localities if we had the funds.

Increasingly, as the rosy bloom of the post World War II return to religion began to fade in the face of the onerous realities of tight money, theological debate, higher skirts, and the strident sounds of racial tension, the commission to go forth to preach the Gospel took on the aspects of more and more hard practicality and less and less romanticism.

We are all now, the Department of Missions and its congregations, under increasing pressure to exhibit even more responsible stewardship of the offerings of the ninety-six thousand Episcopalians of the Diocese of Newark. We have been trying to get more mileage out of every Diocesan dollar that passes through our budget by the use of a subsidy request form developed in 1961 with the advice and counsel of the Budget and Strategy Committees of the Department. Each item of business at our meetings gets minute scrutiny from the members, and invaluable assistance comes from our special Committees for Construction, Real Estate, Legal Matters, Budget and Strategy.

In the endeavor to keep involved and informed and abreast, I have been in frequent consultation with other Diocesan Departments as well as the Department of Research and Church Planning of the New Jersey Council of Churches, Interchurch Urban dialogues, the National Conference of Archdeacons, meetings with Archdeaconries and individual congregations.

All the foregoing is in addition to the intensive involvement of our Bishops in every facet of Diocesan life.

The following information will serve to underscore how we have so far striven to discharge our responsibility to the people and our Lord.

In the past ten years under the guidance of the Bishops and the Department of Missions, 10 new churches, 15 new parish houses, 4 all-purpose buildings, and 23 new vicarages have been built; 15 new land sites have been purchased, 15 vicarages, 8 parish houses, and 5 churches have been wholly renovated; and 2 churches have been rebuilt. This represents an investment of \$3,877,033 derived from local congregations, grants and loans from the Diocese through the Episcopal Capital Loan Fund and/or the Department of Missions Loaning Fund, plus local commercial mortgages. These debts are being amortized by the members of the several congregations. In addition, the Bishops' Church Extension Fund has assisted in the building of 22 vicarages, 9 churches, and 3 parish houses totaling \$48,500. Today the total of the buildings and land owned by the congregations under the care and guidance of the Department of Missions stands at \$9,925,000.

At the close of 1966 we had oversight of 9 self-supporting and 24 subsidized congregations, 9 aided parishes and 1 unorganized congregation.

Highlights of the year include:

- St. Luke's, Haworth: achieved parish status and was received into union with Convention.
- Incarnation, West Milford: conducted a building fund campaign, and, after the means of financing was approved, proceeded with plans to build a church. Construction started in late November.
- House of Prayer, Newark: The church was rehabilitated and renovated. Reconstruction of the parish hall was begun.
- St. Gregory's, Parsippany-Troy Hills: An architect was hired to prepare a
  master plan for immediate and long-range building programs, and a building
  fund campaign was approved.
- 5. St. Dunstan's, Succasumna: An architect was hired to prepare an Ultimate Land Use Plot Plan, funding was agreed to, and construction of Unit #1, an educational building, was begun. There still is being used for worship and other activities the previously erected temporary all-purpose building.
- 6. St. Gabriel's, Milton-Oak Ridge: A fine vicarage that is also used for week-

day services and meetings was purchased in Oak Ridge; although not yet formally organized as a Mission the infant congregation, which worships in the Cozy Lake School, is amortizing the mortgage.

7. The Saviour, Denville: The Department made a gift of \$4,500 to this congre-

gation to assist them in the purchase of a house for the curate.

8. St. Mary's, Sparta: Permission was given for extensive additions to the vicarage including an additional bedroom, garage and storage space. Financing included a gift of \$2,800 from the Department.

9. St. Peter's, Mt. Arlington: A large one-story building on two acres adjacent to the church property was purchased, and plans were begun to erect a new

vicarage.

- 10. Good Shepherd, Hamburg: After an extensive repair and renovation program for church and vicarage, this Mission again began to hold services in its own church. The congregation had been sharing facilities at St. Thomas', Vernon, during the time the church was closed.
- 11. St. Thomas', Vernon: Extensive repairs were made to the vicarage, including a new roof. This congregation, like that in Hamburg, is now enjoying for the first time in many years the undivided service of its own priest.
- 12. St. Joseph's, Byram Township (Lake Lackawanna): Mr. Carl Johnson donated 5 acres of land to the Department of Missions for a possible future church site, and a survey of the Township was begun.
- 13. St. Stephen's, Fort Lee: Paid off the mortgage on the vicarage.
- 14. Christ, Newark: Extensive renovations were made to the rectory.
- 15. St. Mark's, Paterson: This parish was dissolved and its assets turned over to the Department of Missions.
- 16. St. Alban's, Oakland-Franklin Lakes: A new vicarage was purchased and the old one sold at a profit of \$1,800.
- 17. Changes in personnel:

The Rev. William Ziadie, Vicar of St. Peter's, Mt. Arlington, retired.

The Rev. James H. B. Kenyon, was appointed Vicar of St. Peter's, Mt. Arlington.

The Rev. Donald Fowler was appointed Vicar of Good Shepherd, Hamburg. The Rev. Harold N. Cutler was appointed Vicar of St. Thomas', Vernon.

The Rev. Louis Sexton resigned as Vicar of Transfiguration, North Bergen. The Rev. H. John Van Duyne was appointed Vicar of St. David's, Kinnelon.

The Rev. Thomas Lincoln was appointed Vicar of The Saviour, Denville, to succeed the Rev. Roger O. Douglas, who resigned to take up work in the Diocese of Connecticut.

The Rev. Guy Walser, Vicar of Our Saviour, Secaucus, resigned to become Rector of St. Mark's and St. John's Parish, Newark.

The Rev. Donald Beers, Vicar of St. Alban's, Oakland-Franklin Lakes, resigned to become priest-in-charge of St. Luke's, Hope, and to survey Byram Township with oversight of St. Joseph's, Lake Lackawanna.

The Rev. Eugene Avery, Vicar of St. Aidan's, Paterson, and Associate at St. John's, Passaic, resigned to be appointed Archdeacon of Newark and priestin-charge of Christ Church, Newark.

The Rev. Charles Farr, Jamaica, B.W.I., was appointed Vicar of Our Saviour, Secaucus.

The Rev. Fred-Munro Ferguson was appointed Vicar of Transfiguration, North Bergen.

The Rev. John R. Edler resigned as Rector of Trinity Church, Irvington, to accept appointment as Vicar of St. Alban's, Oakland and Franklin Lakes.

## CAMP AND CONFERENCE COMMITTEE EAGLE'S NEST CAMP

Camp & Conference Committee - The Rev. Alva G. Decker, Chairman

Eagle's Nest Camp operated in the summer of 1966 for its 45th consecutive season, providing an all-around camping program in a Christian atmosphere for children from the ages of 8 up. In total there were nearly 400 children from all

areas of the diocese who participated in the program.

In late 1966, Eagle's Nest Camp and the Camp and Conference Committee were brought under the administrative purview of the Department of Christian Education. In addition to giving the Camp and Conference Committee a better relationship within the total structure of the diocese, this move will also strengthen the total work and programs of the committee through the added resources and

support of the department.

In 1967 the Camp and Conference Committee looks forward to greater use of its facilities by the diocese at large. We are particularly excited about the new camping program which is being started this year on a pilot basis for one month for children who are neurologically impaired and have special learning problems. This program should fill a much-needed gap in service to these children and will add much to the total work of the committee.

## DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS For the Year 1966

I would like to highlight several areas of the Department's work in the year 1966. In order to stimulate our people to exercise more fully their Christian citizenship, the Department issued a Legislative Bulletin in March. It dealt with a few of the bills before Congress, and the Legislature—bills in which human welfare was especially involved. And in order that the legislators might not only hear from Episcopalians by letter, but also in person, the Dept. organized and sponsored the Ninth Legislative Caravan to Trenton on March 14, 1966. On that date 150 men and women from our parishes and missions went to the State House to speak personally with their representatives in government. This group, led by Bishop Rath, also had the opportunity to speak with the Governor. Bishop Rath presented the Episcopalians and the United Church Women of the N. J. Council

of Churches to the Assembly and to the Governor.

The Department went on record for the following during the past year: (1) the abolition of capital punishment; (2) a minimum wage for N. J.; (3) National Council of Churches Resolution of Feb. 24, 1966 in regard to Viet-Nam (with the exception of Paragraph 6); (4) National Food for Peace program; (5) migrant labor legislation; (6) stiff court sentences for those involved in illegal manufacture, sale or administration of narcotics; (7) against the extension of the number of racing days and the number of tracks in N. J.; (8) humane treatment of laboratory animals; (9) aid to families with dependent children; (10) anti-air pollution legislation; (11) family planning; (12) U. S. ratification of United Nations Human Rights Conventions; (13) rent control; (14) against State lotteries; (15) for a stronger Fair Housing Bill and other civil rights bills; and (16) for public defenders for the indigent criminals.

The influence of the Dept. upon legislators in Congress and in Trenton on such matters as listed above continued throughout the year. Letters, telegrams and

visits brought the Dept.'s views to the legislators.

The Rev. Allan Easton, Secretary of World Relief for the Diocese, reports that in keeping with the spirit of M.R.I., Diocesan giving for World Relief showed an increase in 1966.

The 1966 edition of The Department's Health and Welfare Manual was issued to the clergy of the Diocese and to a number of social agencies in New Jersey.

The Rev. Carl E. Nelson, Chairman of the Armed Forces Committee, has been called on from time to time during the past year to provide Armed Forces Prayer Books and also Episcopal Church Medals. These are available through the new Chairman, The Rev. Guy Walser. Helpful information in regard to the parish's ministry to Service personnel was supplied to the clergy and the Bishop's Christmas letter was made available to the rectors for forwarding to the men in the Armed Forces.

Canon Hanson serves as a member of the Governor's Committee on Equal Employment Opportunity and as Chairman of The Clergy Advisory Committee of

Planned Parenthood of Essex County.

The Rev. Marshall Rice is now the Chairman of the Dept. of Social Education

and Action of the N. J. Council of Churches.

Members of the Dept. worked with the following organizations during the year: The Episcopal Community Services, Youth Consultation Service, N. J. Council of Churches' Dept. of Social Education and Action and also its Dept. on Institutional Ministries, Planned Parenthood of Essex County, The Consumers League of N. J., The Morrow Association for Prisoners, The Urban League of Essex Co., the N.A.A.C.P. and the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

In closing, I would like to say we are indeed fortunate to have had such fine leadership on our Committees during the past year. We are most grateful for the wise counselling of Bishop Rath, and the splendid teamwork of the members of

our Department in carrying out our Program.

## EPISCOPAL CHURCHWOMEN, DIOCESE OF NEWARK President's Report (1966-1967)

As the time comes to write an annual report, it seems to be the natural thing to look back—to appraise what has been done. Perhaps this is as it should be, as we hope the knowledge gained from yesterday will help us to be wiser tomorrow.

At the Executive Board level there has been more flexibility—almost a fluid motion among the departments as they support each other and work closely together. Throughout the Diocese we see more and more women involved in the whole parish program as against being an isolated group. Carrying it a step further, we see many women giving unstintingly of their time to various Diocesan Departments such as Urban, Christian Education, Christian Social Relations and the Commission on Mutual Responsibility. While we appear to maintain our structure at the Diocesan level, it is really only a framework in which to operate—channels of communication and interpretation in support of the whole Diocesan program.

This year, for example, saw the end of our General Supply Department as such and the Department of World Mission came into being. This has enabled the women to join with the entire Diocese to help the Church in Liberia build a much-needed school. With this has gone a continuing support of the Phyllis Stark Scholarship fund which assists girls in Liberia.

As all children do, our Joseph Jean-Paul outgrew his arms and legs and returned to Kessler for refitting. Realizing this will continue for many years to come, the women of the Diocese are putting themselves on a sound financial footing to meet this responsibility as it arises. This has been a truly great Christian witness both here and to the Church in Haiti where the Church struggles for its very existence.

It would be impossible to report on each area of activity as some are most precise, other somewhat nebulous though each in its own way has shown progress. The Christian Education Department organized teams of members of the Board to visit 16 parishes to ask what the ECW was doing—why they were doing it—how it was going—what insights could they share with others? As these interviews have just been completed, we are not prepared at this point to submit a final report. However, it can be said with certainty that these have been real sessions in evaluation both for the team members and for the women and clergy interviewed, and that the information gathered will be very useful as we plan for the future.

Changing times? Yes, indeed! As the Red Queen said to Alice: "It takes all the running you can do to keep in the same place. If you want to get somewhere else, you must run at least twice as fast as that!"

What of the future? Our 1967 Fall Conference will be the 20th consecutive conference for the women of the Diocese—1968 will mark our 90th anniversary of organized women's work in the Diocese. These are real milestones, but they would never have come about had not the women been truly committed.

"For the Christian with vision, faith and hope, great days are always ahead."

## CITY MISSION SOCIETY OF NEWARK, N. J. Episcopal Community Services

#### For the Year 1966

The Episcopal Community Services, a social agency in the Diocese of Newark, was organized in 1913. Its primary purpose is to express the concern of the Church for those who are in institutions within the borders of the Diocese. It does this by relating the hospitals, homes, and penal institutions within the Diocese to the resources of the Parish Churches—both clerical and lay.

Each of the seventy hospitals within the Diocese has an Episcopal clergyman who is responsible for our Church's ministry in the particular hospital. These associated chaplains (64 in number) report regularly on their ministry in the hospital assigned to them.

More than 250 lay volunteers from our parishes and missions are going forth in the Name of Jesus to meet human need in ten public hospitals throughout the Diocese. Their recruitment, training and sustaining in the work is under the supervision of Canon Hanson. (By its very nature, this is a continuing work as volunteers move away, die, etc.) In every possible way these volunteers extend warmth and friendship to the patients. They visit with the friendless and the lonely ones. They read to those who want it and they write letters for the patients. Some give ward parties, some serve as nurses' aides, and some teach crafts and distribute same. They work in libraries, offices and laboratories. They distribute literature, candy, clothes, cake, tobacco, and other personal items beyond regular hospital care. In three hospitals volunteers show feature films monthly.

In 1966, 261 active volunteers gave approximately 1,786 hours per month of service and approximately 1,744 individual contacts were made each week.

On Sunday, November 13, a Diocesan-wide Conference sponsored by E.C.S. for hospital and nursing home volunteers was held in Trinity Cathedral House. Dr. Graham Clark, noted eye surgeon of New York City, gave the address. In attendance were administrators of hospitals, doctors, nursing supervisors, clergy and volunteer workers from many parishes, including the E.C.S. volunteer chairmen from eleven hospitals and fifteen nursing homes. Preceding the dinner and conference, a Dedication Service in the Cathedral was conducted by the Very Rev. Ledlie I. Laughlin, Dean of the Cathedral.

Canon Hanson counselled 75 people in difficulty who came to Cathedral House for help. He also has made referrals of clergy and laity of the Diocese to community institutions and social agencies.

Over 3,000 E.C.S. Prayer Cards for hospital bedside use were distributed by E.C.S. associate chaplains and E.C.S. volunteers in public hospitals and nursing homes.

E.C.S. volunteers (11) at Morris Co. Jail minister to the prisoners and their families assigned them by the Chaplain. In many cases this involves helping the prisoner and his family in their total readjustment: new home, new job, new church affiliation, etc.

Each of the ninety-one licensed nursing homes within the borders of the Diocese has an Episcopal clergyman who is responsible for our Church's ministry in the particular home. (In the majority of homes this means responsibility for emergency calls only.) The majority of homes welcome religious ministrations for Protestants. The religious ministry consists of one or both of the following: holding of divine service by clergy or lay readers, and pastoral visitation of large numbers of Protestant patients by either clergy or laity (including college students). The ministers involved in this religious ministry are local Protestant ministers, many of whom serve under the leadership of the local council of churches.

The concern of the Society for the broader field of Christian service is demonstrated by the fact that Canon Hanson has been serving as Chairman of the Dept. of Christian Social Relations of the Diocese for the past ten years. He gives a

considerable amount of time to this work. (See Report of the Dept. of C.S.R.) He serves on many boards of trustees of organizations within this area of the Church's concern. Thus, the Church in the Diocese of Newark through the Episcopal Community Services not only goes out in Christian Service into the community, but through the E.C.S. clergy, the Church's leadership is given to Christian social action in the community. The Church's concern for the social welfare of the community is expressed! The Church is in the world!

The benefits of membership are available to clergymen of the Protestant Episcopal Church who are not ever fifty-five years of age and who have been canonically and actually resident (as clergymen) in the State of New Jersey for not less than five years and who can supply a medical certificate attesting to their good health and physical fitness. The annual dues are twelve dollars.

Annual meetings of the Corporation are held on the first Monday in June of each year, and the Executive Committee meetings at the call of the President.

Applications for membership as a Contributor are acted upon by the Executive

Committee as soon as they are received, up to thirty days before the Annual Meeting, others at the Annual Meeting. With membership limited to 120, there are at present ten vacancies. Application blanks and other information can be obtained by request from the Secretary.

At the Annual Meeting held on June 6, 1966, in the 170th year of the Corporation, in the Cathedral House, Newark, the Treasurer reported assets of \$309,299.54 and receipts of \$12,541.07, from which annuities in the amount of \$4,412.50 were paid to forty-two widows and ten minor children.

At this meeting a dividend of \$80 was ordered paid to each beneficiary entitled thereto, and lesser amounts to other widows and children as provided by the Fundamental Laws of the Corporation, in addition to the regular payment of annuities to the beneficiaries. A motion also was passed permitting the payment in a lump sum by retired clergy only of the required 25 year payments with the lump sum payment to be returned to the widow.

The next Annual Meeting will be held on Monday, June 5, 1967 at the Synod House of Trinity Cathedral, Trenton, N. J.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ALTAR GUILD OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK 1966

We have received money and many articles, both new and used, which have been very helpful for our work. We appreciate these contributions and the time people have given to help us.

With the permission of Bishop Stark, two projects were sponsored by us

which also enabled all the Parish Altar Guilds to participate.

First, on Saturday, April 23rd in the Parish Hall of the Church of the Holy Communion, South Orange, there was an exhibition of "Church Needlework" done by members or friends for their parishes. Eleven Parishes and the Diocesan Altar Guild displayed Altar linens and hangings, vestments, needlepoint work and funeral palls. In fact, the only thing not exhibited was a church banner. Following a welcome by the Rev. H. A. Tilghman, Rector, the Ven. Henry Biggin, Archdeacon representing the Bishop, opened the exhibit. Over 100 people attended representing 32 different parishes.

The second, was to assist with the furnishing of the Chapel of the Right Rev. Dillard Brown, Bishop of Liberia, our Companion Diocese through M. R. I. A check of \$500 from the Altar Guilds of the Diocese was given him along with Altar Linens, a frontal and needlepoint kneeling cushions. The following linens were made by us: fair linen, linen pall, lavabo towel, baptismal towel and credence cloth.

Diocesan Altar Guild members made and sent to the Altar Guild of Cuttington

College, Monrovia, Liberia, 2 fair linens.

A set of red super-frontal, pulpit and lectern falls were made for Whitsunday

for St. Stephen's, Delawanna.

The Church of the Incarnation, Jersey City, was given 19 "cut out kits" of red broadcloth for cassocks which were "made up" by the women of the parish. They also, received 40 renovated cottas and many blue choir gowns for the girls. Their Altar Guild received used sets of white and green super-frontal, burse, and veil. Also, they received new linens, 8 purificators, 2 corporals, 6 lavabo towels and 2 baptismal towels and an Altar Guild Manual.

St. Gregory's, Parsippany, received orphrey bandings and galloon's to assist

them in making a white chasuble.

The Chapel at St. Bernard's School, Gladstone, a church-school accredited and recognized by the Diocese of Newark, has been completely renovated and now has a free standing Altar. For this we made and provided material for a white "throw over" or Jacobean frontal and matching cover for the missal cushion. Red material was provided by the school and we made the frontal and cover for the missal cushion. We, likewise, provided them with the following linens: fair linen, mensa linen, linen pall, 2 credence cloths, 2 corporals, 6 purificators, 6 lavabo towels, 1 baptismal towel and linen shelf cover. Also, an Altar Guild Manual was given.

At the request of the Altar Guild of St. Paul's, Jersey City, I spoke and showed slides to the Altar Guilds of the Archdeacoury of Hudson, on ecclesiastical

embroidery and needlepoint as seen in the Cathedrals of England.

The Rector of the Church of the Incarnation, East Orange, requested that I speak to the members of the Altar Guild on the "Duties of an Altar Guild."

In the work-room, augmented by workers in their homes, we have completed 4 fair linens, 24 lavabo towels, 5 haptismal towels and 8 purificators, renovated a green chasuble and made a red super-frontal with matching pulpit and lectern fall.

For All Saints' Chapel, Cathedral House, we have supplied the wine, wafers,

and candles,

At the Fall Conference of the Episcopal Churchwomen, Mrs. E. Quinn, our vice-president was Chairman of a group which prepared for 2 communion services each for 275 communicants. One service was according to the Book of Common Prayer and the other according to the Liturgy of South India.

The Annual Corporate Communion of the Diocesan Altar Guild was held in All Saints' Chapel, Cathedral House, on Monday, November 7, 1966. At this service the Book of Remembrance was presented. Twenty-two names were read of Altar Guild members, throughout the Diocese, who died during the year. Also, three needlepoint kneelers were dedicated for use in the Chapel. Bishop Stark was

the celebrant being assisted by Bishop Rath, our Suffragan Bishop.

It was the feeling of our Bishop that we should share any surplus that we have. So the following institutions received these articles—Chapel at Heath Village: 2 corporals, 4 lavabo towels, 4 purificators, 1 baptismal towel, 1 linen pall, and 4 amice. The Pentecostal Church, Jersey City: 4 candle sticks, 2 vases, 2 crosses and 2 chalices. The Clover Rest Nursing Home, Montclair (where one of our lay readers holds services): a cross and a pair of candle sticks.

In July, I spent 4 days at Adlenyroad, South Byfield, Mass. for a conference including Presidents of Diocesan Altar Guilds. The speaker was an architect who spoke about and showed slides of modern church design. There was an exhibit and

demonstration on "Church Needlework."

In November, I received a request to help assemble an exhibit at the Triennial Convention at Seattle which is being sponsored by the National Association of Diocesan Altar Guilds.

We are always ready to assist any parish at the request of the Rector, with instruction or information pertaining to Altar Guild Work.

# CHRIST HOSPITAL PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To The Members of Christ Hospital Council:

Since its organization in 1873, Christ Hospital has kept pace with modern hospital practices of each era. Its doors have been open continuously day and night to minister to those who are ill or injured. In consequence thousands have been returned to their homes and families in a state of health both of body and of mind,

During the year 1966 the hospital has carried on its long tradition. 11,832 patients were admitted for treatment and another 21,681 were given treatment in our emergency clinics and out-patient departments. The grand total of more than 33,500 represents a sizeable part of the community in which Christ Hospital is located and serves to emphasize the essential role which the hospital plays in the ongoing life of this community. It is interesting to note that the hospital reached a new peak in patient population last October when the total of patient-days for the month amounted to 10,191.

Since our last Annual Meeting Christ Hospital and its Council have suffered the loss of three valuable members. Mr. William Morrish resigned in May in consequence of his accepting a new position in business which required his moving to the mid-West. Although Mr. Morrish had lived in Jersey City a comparatively short time, he had made his influence felt throughout the community and his resignation was accepted with regret. The retirement of the Venerable F. Slade Danzoll, for many years the President of the Council and Archdeacon of Hudson, has deprived the Council of one of its most loyal, helpful, and understanding members. We trust that he will find occasion in Virginia to use the set of golf clubs which were given him as an expression of the Council's deep appreciation for his long association with the hospital and his great devotion to its interests.

The members of the Council were deeply grieved by the recent death of Mr. Max Z. Hurwitz. Mr. Hurwitz had served the hospital as a member of the Council since 1926. His untiring efforts have left an indelible mark upon the institution. We are grateful to Almighty God who through the years has given us the faithful help of His servant Max.

The work of Christ Hospital Council has been strengthened by the addition of those who were elected for the first time to its membership at our last Annual Meeting: — Mr. Warren Zimmer, President of the Dixon Crucible Company; Mr. Richard Bernheim, President of R. Newman & Company; and Mr. Charles K. Krieger, Assistant Manager of the Jersey City Branch of Shearson Hammill & Company, Inc.

Already the Council has found reason to be deeply grateful to these men for

their services.

It was during 1966, also, that the Council authorized the architect to proceed with drawing up detailed plans and specifications for a new power plant-laundry building to replace the present obsolete plant. The project is estimated to cost approximately \$700,000. As a consequence of our having received approval of a government grant in excess of \$500,000 the Council also instructed the architect to prepare plans and specifications for a new wing in which some of our Ancillary Services, more particularly surgical suites, may be housed. This second project is estimated to cost approximately \$1,800,000.

As I end my first year of service as your President I express my very deep appreciation to all the members of the Council for their continued interest and support; to Mr. Davidsen and the administrative staff for their patience in breaking in a new President; and to the medical staff, employees and volunteers who help us to carry out the essential healing ministry for which the hospital was established. Even as we look ahead to the many problems and opportunities that lie before us in this coming year we offer and dedicate ourselves anew that this ministry to men

for God's sake may be continued.

# MUTUAL RESPONSIBILITY COMMISSION Annual Report

The Diocese of Liberia and the Diocese of Newark have renewed their companion relationship which was established in 1963. Under the plan for companionships we are allowed only one renewal so our total relationship will extend for

six years.

Our first three years were in many ways fraught with frustration and searching, for it is indeed difficult to have a firm and effective relationship, when in so many ways we are separated from the people and the culture there. It is hoped that during the next three years we will be able to build on some of the foundations

which have now been established.

It might be helpful at this point in our renewal to look at some of the things which have already been accomplished. The young peoples work and gifts for St. Mark's, Dubly Island Road, has now been completed and the \$10,000.00 are now being used to complete and expand the work of that school. The Diocsan Altar Guild, through its many affiliated chapters, has been able to supply for the Bishop's Chapel, as well as for altars throughout the district, linens and other altar needs for the use of the Church. Scholarships for students have been provided by individuals, parishes and guilds—thousands of volumes of books have been sent from points throught the Diocese for use in the schools there. Radios and transmitters now enable Bishop Brown to keep in contact with the sub-districts of his Diocese so that he may be immediately aware of any pressing need with which they may be confronted. The visitations of several members of our Diocesan family to the people of Liberia have done much to cement relationships in a way that material gifts cannot. Our daily and weekly prayer cycles have kept the people of Liberia and Newark constantly in touch with each other through our common life of worship.

As a Diocesan family we should be very much encouraged to see the widespread response that was made after a Resolution at the 1966 Diocesan Convention. As a result the commission was asked to assign Fair Shares to every parish and mission in the Diocese. We are happy to report that the work has already begun for the Dunbar School in Cape Palmas. It is hoped that before too long we will have over-subscribed the \$30,000.00 which we hoped we would raise.

It should be further noted that the figures released recently by the Executive Council would indicate that of the \$199,176.75 contributed in companion relation-

ships throughout the Church the Diocese of Newark's part is \$23,502.66.

The Diocesan Council has acted to renew our companionship and we look forward with great anticipation to our developing life with the people of Liberia during the next three years. It is because of your commitment to the overall principles of Mutual Responsibility that this phase of the work is being accomplished and for this we should like to express our gratitude.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF URBAN WORK

### 1966

It has been said that many people in the Diocese expect the Dept. of Urban Work to be a kind of "Department of Missions" for the inner city churches. In this view, much as the Department of Missions shepherds new congregations with money and guidance until they can stand on their own, so the Dept. of Urban Work is expected to be responsible for giving aid and comfort to the ailing parishes of our cities.

To a degree this is the way the department has tried to act, at least in the area of program. For several years, as an example, it encouraged and subsidized summer programs in several parishes. More recently over a period of about a year and a half direct approaches were made to city parishes with a plan and offer of leadership assistance for a program of self-study and renewal. Many parishes took part in this project; some found it more helpful than others. As a result of this and other efforts the department became more fully aware that the problems of the city parishes are beyond the capability of any one department. Obviously this department has neither the money, the knowledge, nor the staff to act as a "Department of Missions" for city parishes. It became clear to us that what is needed is the coordination of all of the resources of the diocese. Help for city parishes involves stewardship, evangelism, Christian education, Christian social relations, and all of these need to be informed by a better understanding of the process of urbanization.

Attempts to begin such a coordinated approach had already begun and were continued during 1966. The chief means have been regular meetings of representatives of all departments with the Bishops. During the summer a new understanding of the role of the Dept. of Urban Work was agreed upon among the Bishops, the executive committee of the department, and representatives of the Dept. of Missions. This new understanding continues to guide us in our activities.

The new and current role of the department presupposes the development of a coordinated approach by all departments to the problems and opportunities of city parishes. The Dept. of Missions is seen as the leader in relations with aided parishes and missions using the assistance of other departments in their fields of competence. It was agreed that the Dept. of Urban Work would concentrate mainly on "action-research" projects which would lead to a better understanding of the processes of urbanization and their implications for the church, and which would also lead toward ways in which the church through parochial and other forms might contribute to the redemption of urban life. If and when effective approaches were discovered, these would be taken over by parishes and/or other appropriate forms of church life leaving the department free to get into other untried areas. Some of these areas which we have begun to explore are: housing, community organization, inter-church urban cooperation, employment, and education. Into these explorations have gone the funds budgeted by Convention, small amounts contributed privately, the full-time efforts of the Executive Director, and many hours of concern by the elected and appointed members of the department. Our main projects for 1966 (most of which will carry over into 1967) have been as follows:

In the field of urban education the beginnings made last year began to bear fruit. We continued our assistance to the Newark Committee for Better Public Schools with money, office help, and the time and knowledge of the Director. The form has been that of an urban education study using Newark as a specific example of what may be true throughout the country. The study began with a meeting in January with over 100 top educators from the school systems of the greater Newark area. A representative from the U.S. Office of Education was present and observed in the course of his talk that he hoped other cities would follow the example which was a "first" as far as he knew. Consultants were retained, the data-gathering began, and the actual writing of the report was well under way by the end of the

year. Some publishers have already shown an interest in the study. As the study went along meetings were arranged with representatives of city government and the business community to share some of the findings and ask for their response. The Newark Committee also asked our help in trying to insure that the new community colleges being set up, particularly in urban areas, would be places where younger drop-outs and older adults with limited educations could find opportunities for a kind of education that would enable them to take their places as contributing members of society. The danger, it was felt, was that the community colleges would serve mainly as an adjunct to regular four-year colleges and thus not reach the majority of those in our cities who need additional education but who cannot make use of the regular academic four-year college. A position paper was prepared, and we helped the committee in representations to state, city, county, and national officials.

Throughout the country there are growing numbers of community organization projects, and the churches have been among the most active sponsors of these attempts to get the "have-nots" into the political, social, and economic mainstream of American life. The department has tried to educate itself and see where we fit into these efforts. Two groups in Jersey City have been working for over a year on plans for a project for two areas in that city and have asked our help in preparing and financing the project. We expect to have a completed proposal from them soon. In the meantime, a substantial grant was secured by the Jersey City groups from the Executive Council as "seed money" at the request of our Bishop.

Although we have not received a finished proposal from another group called the Tri-City Citizens Committee for Community Organization and Development, we have been in touch with them and have some knowledge of their hopes for a large-scale organization plan involving Newark, Jersey City, and Paterson. We have given them some "seed money" to help them complete their plan, and have made the Director available to consult with them.

During the spring there was a large effort made to prepare a proposal calling for the use of 100 VISTA workers under the sponsorship of the Diocese and department in Newark, Jersey City, Hoboken, Paterson, and Orange. VISTA (Volunteers in the Service of America) is an arm of the U.S. Office of Economic Opportunity which seeks to use the talents of volunteers as a sort of domestic Peace Corps, living among the poor in a community and trying to help the inhabitants articulate their needs and devise ways to meet them from the resources of the community. Although the proposal was approved at the area, state and national levels in the VISTA organization, internal problems of finance and administration within OEO have delayed approval of all new VISTA projects.

Toward the end of the year we were approached by two groups among the Negro community of Newark who asked our assistance in their desire to participate in the federal Model Cities program. We are presently studying this possibility.

During the year we increased our financial and personal participation in the Newark Churches Volunteer Services Program in the public housing project known as Scudder Homes. The Presbyterians have been taking the lead with some of the rest of us beginning to give more support to this project aimed at the use of volunteers in assisting people in this huge housing project to develop better lives for themselves. Two of our department members are very active on their board.

Still along the line of inter-church cooperation, we have met with representatives of several other churches about the possibility of joint support for the various community organization plans described above. On a broader scale, our Director has joined our Bishops in the work which has led to the development of an ecumenical Church Plan Commission for the tri-state New York metropolitan area which aims to do a comprehensive 2-3 year study of church strategy for our region.

Church-sponsored low-cost urban housing was another interest during this year, and we had several meetings with professional consultants in this field. We have recommended, and the Diocesan Council has agreed to create, the setting up

of a non-profit housing corporation for the diocese to be the body which would supervise all such housing projects within the diocese.

Among several publications which we asked our Director to write to help meet requests and/or current issues, two in particular were especially welcomed beyond the confines our diocese for their contribution to the definition of urban problems. The article on "The Creative Uses of Black Power" was offered to about two thousand local, state, and national educators, government officials, business men, and church officials. Over two-thirds requested the article, and we have received many letters of thanks. Several people, including at least one bishop on the other side of the country, requested bulk copies of as many as two hundred. The Director also prepared a paper on "The Economic of Race" which was printed in the American Journal of Economics and Sociology.

It would be possible for the department to spend nearly all of its money and energies on almost any one of these projects because of their magnitude and importance. We have tried to explore a few aspects of these large fields in such a way that we may both learn and make a contribution. We expect to continue along the lines begun this year, and to expand somewhat, if possible, our involvement in various kinds of community organization. We also want to continue our participation in the most important attempt to develop a coordinated approach to the problems of the city parishes.

# DEPARTMENT OF STEWARDSHIP AND EVANGELISM

# Report of the Consultant to the Department of Stewardship and Evangelism:

During 1966, the following work was accomplished by our department:

Our work must roughly be divided into eight categories:

1. Consultation with diocesan committees and deliberate bodies on matters of policy and program as they relate to the total structure of diocesan life. 2. Regional conferences and workshops to equip laymen and clergy for work related to Stewardship and Evangelism.

- 3. Parochial visitations for analysis of local problems and opportunities. 4. Planning, executing and evaluating conferences for vestries on the mission of the Church.
- 5. Orientation conferences for vestries and laymen on issues pertaining to contemporary Evangelism.

6. Training of canvass workers in parishes.

7. Preparation of materials to be used in the Every Member Canvass. 8. Preparation of brochure used by the diocese to explain and support the quota-asking to the vestrymen and Executive Committee members of the diocese.

Other activities of the consultant during 1966 included five lectures at the General Seminary on stewardship; he preached in eleven parishes and missions during the canvass season; was consultant to the staff of the New Jersey Labor Day Student Conference; participated in leadership training for Civil Right's workers in Morristown; was guest speaker at several regional meetings and ecumenical gatherings.

# Report of Committee on Communication:

The recent report of the Joint Commission on Evangelism to the House of Bishops opened with these words, "Evangelism is not a major emphasis of the Episcopal Church . . ." Each time the report of this committee has to be written these words come home with great force. In this most important area of work in the Church, there is a constant struggle to even keep one's head above water with the limited resources offered the work of this committee.

THERE IS NO COMMITTEE OR DEPARTMENT IN THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK THAT IS ABLE TO REACH AS MANY PEOPLE IN OR OUT OF THE CHURCH THROUGH ITS PROGRAM AS IS THE COM-MITTEE ON RADIO AND TELEVISION.

In the latest ratings taken by just one station in the Diocesan listening area, the programs produced by the Episcopal Diocese of Newark commanded a 26.2% share of the audience on a given Sunday morning, as compared with the remainder of the stations in the metropolitan area. By comparison it must be pointed out that the next nearest station in ratings received only a 6.4% share of the audience, and the others scaled down from that. This leaves little doubt that programs that we produce are being heard, and from the mail we receive, we know that they are being listened to regularly. Mail was received during this past year from all points within the Diocese and from New York City, Long Island, Connecticut and Pennsylvania as well. In addition, two of the Lenten programs were so well received that I received a special request to furnish copies of these programs to Christ Church, Greenwich, Conn., for use in the Holy Week program, and for presentation over their local radio station.

In production, 153 programs of "Thine is the Glory" the award-winning halfhour show heard weekly over three major North Jersey stations were put out. There have been requests for this program from other stations in the listening area, which we have not been able to fulfill because of INSUFFICIENT FUNDS to produce them. 310 programs of "This Is the Day" the daily program heard over WVNJ were produced. There is a major New York station which would carry this program if it could be produced in stereo, but again, there is not suficient money to provide either the necessary new recordings and other equipment needed to produce it. In addition to this, special Christmas and Easter programs were produced, as well as the above-mentioned Lenten programs which were so well received.

There have been NO new programs produced this year, not because there has been a lack of ideas, but simply because there has been no money to produce them. There is a request from another station in Newark to provide a weekly radio program for them which would be presented in prime evening time, but again there is not sufficient money.

Let's talk about money. First of all, how much did we get? The estimate of the amount of free time, production facilities and other benefits that we received during 1966 in the Diocese of Newark, and this includes also some talent which worked for nothing out of friendship to the Executive Producer, amounted to approximately \$38,000. In other words if we had had to pay our way in every respect time, talent, production, writing, duplication and all other related expenses the total would be \$38,000!

Now, let's make another comparison; as against this figure of \$38,000, the Diocese of Newark budgeted \$3,800 or 10%. I must confess that I was surprised that the budget figure came out to this percentage. Someone else compiled the larger figure for me, and sent it to me, and this person had no knowledge of the amount budgeted for this work. Unfortunately, although \$3,800 was budgeted, it was necessary to spend \$4,148, with the additional \$348 having to be made up from the 1967 budget.

If \$4,148 seems to be a great deal to spend for this work, just consider that in the recent "Super Bowl" football game, a one minute spot cost \$80,000 for the time on NBC, and \$76,000 for the time on CBS. And these costs were only for time, and did not consider the additional 40 to 50 thousand dollars needed to produce these spots.

Frankly, any day I can see a chance to make \$38,000 by the simple expenditure of about \$4,100 I will find the money someplace, because I think it's a pretty good investment!

For the future, in addition to continuing the already established programs which are meeting with such success on the various stations, we need to be able to produce the new programs that we are asked for constantly. There also has to be money provided for research and development, and if we do not do this, we shall rapidly begin to fall behind. New and up-to-date equipment has to be provided regularly, and the present equipment has to be maintained at a high level of efficiency for best production. Nothing significant has been able to be done in television, and we are able to do only that which is asked of us in cooperation with the New Jersey Council of Churches, and the Protestant Council of the City of New York. There are opportunities for this kind of ministry, but there is absolutely no money at present to even consider such possibilities. We perhaps wonder why we see Methodist and Presbyterian programs presented locally, and why the Episcopal Church is not mentioned more. The answer is quite simple when you consider that the Presbyterian Church alone spends more than \$50,000 in New Jersey on radio and television alone.

In conclusion, you are reminded of the words of paragraph 2 of this report. Even though the work of this committee was not mentioned in the recent brochure which was sent out, the work continues, and this committee continues to try and do an adequate job with the smallest budget of any committee in the Diocese.

# BOARD OF EXAMINING CHAPLAINS Annual Report — 1966

The Board of Examining Chaplains met at Cathedral House on April 15 and 16, 1966, to examine in all subjects required by Canon 29, Sec. 1 (a) for Holy Orders Messers. Donald Schroder, Philip Lord, Preston Mears, Gerard Pisani, Harold Woods, Robert Burrows, Donald Fowler, and under Canon 29, Sec. 2 (a), Lynne T. Greene, M.D. The business meeting was held in Bishop Stark's office on April 16, Dean Griffin presiding. Present were Bishop Stark, Bishop Rath, the Dean, Dr. Leswing, and the Rev'd Messers. Rice, Garvin, Child, Clarke, Lindsley, and Herring.

The bulk of the meeting consisted of discussion about standards for ordination. Dr. Leswing raised a question about productivity in parishes in which a vast cultural distance exists between clergy and vestry. He suggested that there is much evidence available to support a case for modifying our high academic standards in order to make the ordained ministry more accessible to men whose natural leadership is more impressive than their formal education.

Mr. Griffin said that he thought such a scheme would impose incompetent clergy upon incompetent vestries, and that instead of scaling down our standards for the clergy, we ought to be insisting on better vestries.

Bishop Stark spoke about the perpetual diaconate in this context and thought that the Diocese of California's experience might offer some guidance to us. He further advised us to try more pointedly to arrange the content of our examinations to suit the mind-set of young men in seminary.

We decided to meet in June to continue this discussion.

The June meeting fell on the 15th and ran from 11 a.m. until 2 p.m. The most notable action arising was our decision to examine two men whose formal education falls short of regular standards.

On September 17, 1966, the Board examined Mr. Raymond Nelson in all subjects required for ordination to the priesthood.

- G. F. S., Society for Girls, a cooperating agency of the Episcopal Churchwomen, is part of a world-wide organization, sponsored by Churches of the Anglican Communion. Diocesan activities this year included an arts and crafts workshop for leaders and the Rally in the spring and Annual Service in the fall for all persons connected with the organization.

### REPORT OF THE DEAN OF TRINITY CATHEDRAL IN NEWARK

The past year has been one of unusual excitement and growth for the Cathedral, Bishop Stark's request that the leaders and congregations of the Cathedral and of St. Philip's Church, Newark, examine the possibility of merger was taken seriously. After five months of deliberation and discussion, separate parish meetings were held on Sunday, October 2, 1966, and each congregation voted by more than seventy-five percent of those present to affirm the merger. The members of the congregation of St. Philip's saw that they would be strengthened by obtaining a good church plant and a clerical staff. The members of the congregation of Trinity saw that their numbers would be increased greatly. Both congregations were pleased because they realized that they would be strengthened financially and because they could make a special witness to the Lordship of Christ by racially integrating two congregations that were previously segregated.

The result of the consolidation was that the congregation tripled in size (from 150 pledging units to 480) and the racial balance changed from being almost exclusively Caucasian to becoming three-quarters Negro. Both congregations lost a small portion of their former members, and there was a small group in outspoken opposition to the merger. However, when the vote took place, the majority of these persons sought out other parishes to join, and the actual merger took place with little difficulty. The strength and joy of the new congregation was felt by all on Easter Day when for the first time in many years the Cathedral was filled by its own congregational members for a celebration of the Holy Communion.

As soon as the merger had taken place, the Executive Committee set to work to find a Negro priest to join the staff. The sought a young priest of the highest qualifications and found him in the person of the Reverend Dillard Robinson of St. Philip's Church, San Antonio, Texas. He was called to the staff to be a co-pastor and to give leadership in the development of the congregation's mission to the city. In January he was elected a Canon of the Cathedral as was, also, the Reverend Louis H. Berry, Rector Emeritus of St. Philip's Church, Newark. The staff was further increased by the hiring of Mrs. Leola Guilford to be a secretarial assistant to Mrs. Ekins in the office.

In early December a number of persons from the congregation with unusual experience in community affairs were called together by the Dean to suggest possible new roles for the Cathedral in the city. These persons decided to form themselves into a group called the Public Affairs Committee of Trinity Cathedral in order to act as a spokesman in civic affairs for some of the many people in the city who have had little voice. With the backing of the clergy and of the Executive Committee they addressed themselves to the crisis in public school education in Newark. By making strong public statements in the newspapers, by working with many groups in the city, and by personal confrontations with other civic leaders, they have done a significant job in arousing public interest and in beginning to help improve the educational system.

There have been two significant changes in Cathedral real estate. The Cathedral now owns the fine piece of property on the corner of Market and High Streets upon which formerly stood St. Philip's Church. The best development of this land is under study by the Executive Committee. In January, the Cathedral purchased 967-973 McCarter Highway. At the present time a warehouse-type building stands there with three commercial tenants using the building. The acquisition of this property provides a good income from the tenants, and it provides access to the cemetary from McCarter Highway.

In February, the clergy and congregation were sorry to have to say goodbye to Mr. and Mrs. Roderick Bethune. Mr. Bethune did a wonderful job as sexton and verger, and he has now been replaced by Mr. William Campbell. In May, the Reverend Canon Alfred M. Niese resigned his position at the Cathedral to become the Rector of the Church of the Atonement in Fair Lawn. Canon Niese had a very effective ministry for four years at the Cathedral, and he and his wife endeared themselves to all with whom they worked and lived.

### CHURCH PENSION FUND

To the 1967 Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The status of the benefits of the Church Pension Fund now being distributed through the retirement and disability and other channels in the Diocese and the General Church, as of April 1, 1967, is as follows:

Included in these figures are increases in June, 1966, totaling \$438,406 a year. The increases included a 2.8% increase in all minimum pensions and children's allowances, and a particular emphasis on offsetting the disadvantage the older pensioners have had from the shrinkage in purchasing power since they began to recieve their pensions.

It is the hope of the Trustees that in the current year and in subsequent years every pension that his been in force a year, and the minimum scale of pensions, may be increased on the order of 2½-3%. This is a means of offsetting the depreciation of purchasing power of the dollar which seems to be a continuing phenomenon.

The normal minimum for the clergy is now \$2,160 and for widows \$1,440 a year. The orphan's allowance is now \$432 to \$720 a year, depending on age bracket. Pensions below these figures are due to late ordination, unpaid assessments in inactive periods, very low salaries, very late marriage, deposition intervals, and some early retirement cases.

About 47% of the present benefits from the system is the retirement benefit; 6% the disability benefit; and 47% the widows' and children's benefits. The assessments contribute a little less than one-half of the needed resources in the long run, over a half coming from investment earnings.

The insurance and annuity facilities made available by the Trustees through Church Life Insurance Corporation are widely used by the clergy and active lay workers and officials. The policies are a means, among other uses, whereby individuals may name their parishes as beneficiaries; parishes may build up endowments; parishes may provide pensions for their lay workers; dioceses and parishes may provide group life insurance for their clergy. The group Church Major Medical Plan now covers 15,000 individuals—clergy and lay workers and family members.

Over 5,000 churches and institutions are insured in The Church Insurance Company (fire and casulty). Thus the Church in effect is insuring itself, saving considerable money for the Church in the process. The affiliated Church Agency Corporation handles bonding, boiler, and other insurances required by the Church. Thus the Church has its own specialists working wholly in the field of Episcopal Church insurance, as its "joint commission on pensions and insurance," so to speak.

These units are wholly-owned subsidiaries of the Fund, operate wholly within the Church, and contribute to clergy pension.

The cooperation of the clergy and treasurers in administering this important activity of the Church is very much appreciated.

Zip code numbers have been affixed to all plates as required by the U.S. Post Office. Substantial additional costs were incurred for these services. Our mailing list is our greatest capital asset.

# REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMISSION ON CLERGY SALARIES

### I. INTRODUCTION

The Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries is pleased to present herewith its eighth annual report. As background to this report, we commend attention to our report on Pages 144-148 of the *Journal of 1966*. This report in turn contains references which can be followed back through previous Journals. In seven years we have provided a good deal of information which space does not permit us to repeat or even summarize annually. Many readers of this report will, of course, already be familiar with our previous work, and others who desire further information may find it helpful to review our earlier reports.

We are pleased to report very substantial gains reflected in our most recent questionnaires. Our report this year is based on 112 questionnaires received out of 158 clergy contacted. This is a slightly smaller than usual sampling, but, by other tests available to us, we are confident that it is statistically reliable.

Since the Convention of 1966 resolved in favor of a 2-year program of clergy salary increases, the second part of which becomes effective January 1, 1968, we are not recommending further immediate increases in this report. We are, however offering some information about the changing situation and its probable future implications. We are dealing with one pastoral matter and providing, as usual, facts about clergy remuneration. For the convenience of those to whom copies of last year's report may not be readily available, we include at the end of this report an appendix on Standards of Clergy Remuneration that are effective at present and the new Standards which become effective in 1968.

# II. FACTS ON CLERGY REMUNERATION

Including housing and utilities, the average clergy salary reflected in the current questionnaires is \$9,183.03, a gain of \$745.55 over the comparable figure of a year ago. Since there have always been a handful of relative high salaries to bring up the average, your Commission has always believed that the median figure more clearly reflects the typical trend in Diocesan salaries. Last year this figure was \$7,697.60, and this year it is \$8,293.18, up by a less spectacular but still healthy \$595.58. In both cases, these are the largest annual gains reported since the work of the Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries began.

A record of 57 men reported raises in cash salary. This is also a substantially larger percentage of the respondents than ever before who have received raises. 21 men received raises in allowances and perquisites this past year. We cannot precisely compare the automobile allowance picture to that of a year ago but it appears that some 15 additional men are now at or above the Diocesan minimal auto allowance of \$800 per year. 10 men now have cars provided for them, rather than a car allowance. In our original report 8 years ago, only one man had such an arrangement. This may be an early sign of a trend. Through channels other than this questionnaire, your Commission has learned that there are now 5 men, in addition to the Diocesan Staff, who receive housing allowances in lieu of rectories. By this we mean, allowances for clergy whose tenure is expected to be limited.

50 of the clergy responding indicate that vestments which are used in the churches' services are provided. Again, precise comparisons with other figures are not possible, but this is a clearly rising trend.

We are pleased to report also that, effective July 1, 1967, there will be a 50% increase in life insurance coverage for the clergy of the Diocese. This increase was approved at the April meeting of the Diocesan Council, upon the recommendation of the Committee on Diocesan Administration and Salaries, as reported by its Chairman, Mr. William C. Young, and its insurance expert, Mr. Christopher Wain. The additional cost in 1967 will be covered by an experience-based premium refund. Full details of this increased coverage will be included in the next Clergy Newsletter. Under the increased coverage, clergy on active service will be insured for \$7,500.00 and coverage for retired clergy over 71 increased from \$1,000.00 to \$1,500.00.

Notwithstanding the gratifying forward steps that have been taken by many parishes and the overall improvement in the Diocesan picture, we are bound to report that the Diocese apparantly has its own hard-core group of churches facing problems. Overall it appears that about 20% of our men are in some respect below the minimums in the total picture of clergy remuneration. Our statistics indicate an interesting phenomenon—there is apparently a body of churches which provide just sufficient increases to maintain a position below but relative to the established standards. Thus, their cash salary may consistently be 10% below the minimum, or their car allowance consistently \$200 less than the recommended figure. We draw attention to this phenomenon in the hope that some of the vestries involved in this process may recognize that, if they can but once make

a special catch-up effort, they can thereafter maintain at least the minimum salaries and perquisites with no greater increases than they are laready making.

Your Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries is glad for the progress that has been made, which is reflected in these figures. We hope that in 1968 efforts to comply with the standards which go into effect January 1st will enable us to report further progress. We earnestly hope that 1968 will see a number of churches not now meeting minimum standards making the necessary efforts to do so.

# III. THE COMPARATIVE SITUATION AND THE FUTURE

When your Commission recommended major increases in Diocesan minimums to become effective in 1967 and 1968 with at least commensurate raises for those men already receiving more than the minimums, it was our expectation that the steps which the Convention endorsed would improve the relative position of clergy salaries. Last year we reported: "It appears that from 1962 to 1965 the median clergy salary has grown slightly more rapidly than the very lowest teachers' salaries, but substantially less rapidly than the salaries of more experienced public school teachers." In particular, we hoped that the proposed increases would permit us to gain some ground in our efforts to keep clergy minimum salaries (including perquisites) at least abreast of public school teachers' salaries. It now appears, on the basis of major break-throughs achieved in some school systems, that by the end of 1968 (even assuming that raises of unprecedented magnitude will have been given to the Diocesan clergy in 1967, and 1968, we may find that we have done little if any more than maintain our relative position. Furthermore, we shall be faced with the fact that teachers' salaries will probably go up again in 1969 and every year in the foreseeable future.

Some other wage figures confirm the overall trend that we must anticipate over the next 3 years. 75% of all railroad workers will receive 5% annual wage increases, compounded in each of the next 3 years. The other 25%, skilled railroad shop workers, have a different package providing an even larger increase. The base salary for a New York City patrolman or fireman will advance \$1,360.00 over the next 27 months. The recent New York newspaper settlement provided compounding increases adding up ot 21% for the next 3 years, with additional provision for a percentage increase over 4% in the cost of living in any given year. Farm incomes are up 40% since 1960 and rose 15% in 1966.

The import of these figures is that the Church must face the fact that its own personnel live in a time of rapidly rising salaries. In planning for the future, vestries should not only be aware of this fact, but also of other factors which may well affect clergy remuneration.

Several matters will be considered by the next General Convention bearing upon Clergy Livings. Of course, we cannot predict either what recommendations will be made to the Convention or what action the Convention will take. Generally, however, the Church has fallen behind the world in providing fringe benefits, such as comparable sickness and disability benefits and life insurance. Its once advanced, progressive, pension plan is now out of step with the Social Security system and, relative to the salaries received near the close of a man's career, lags markedly behind typical government and corporation pension plans. Indeed, the cries of retired clergy living out their lives in genteel poverty, forced to depend upon their children, and sometimes, to put it bluntly, on charity, are among the most poignant that come to the ears of your Commission chairman. The General Convention will also be considering what to do about the very heavy Social Security premiums (1½ times that paid by a layman of comparable salary) paid by the clergy because they are treated as "self-employed persons."

Your Commission, without venturing any specific predictions, believes that prudent vestries; in their long-range planning, will probably need to think in terms of some sort of a package of increases in salaries and benefits in the range of \$700-\$900 in 1969, perhaps the same in 1970, and, once adjustments have been made, a \$500-\$700 package thereafter, assuming that the present trend of ever-increasing wages and benefits in the secular world continues. Let it be stressed

that your Commission has no crystal ball. Conditions may change. These are not recommendations. When more facts are known, we reserve the right to recommend smaller increases or none at all, or, if the facts warrant it, to recommend even more than we can now foresee. We bring these factors to your attention now simply in the hope that they may facilitate long-range planning, assuming that, 1.) the Church will not want the relative economic position of the clergy to deteriorate and that, 2.) present national economic trends will continue.

In the face of these trends and these long-range considerations, the members of your Commission feel that a few words about our own position may be in order. Basically, it is our responsibility to gather and report facts and, on the basis of these facts, make recommendations designed to promote and maintain "just and equitable clergy remuneration." We can, therefore, plead that ours is a prophetic function; that our responsibility is to point out what ought to be, leaving the administrative task of raising the necessary funds in other hands. In point of fact, your Commission tries very hard to be sensitive to other needs of the Church and to recognize all the demands which are legitimately made for the available dollars. We, therefore, ask not "how much can we get?", but rather, "what is the least we must ask if the economic position of the clergy is not to deteriorate?" We know that the Church's costs are rising considerably more rapidly than its income. We recognize that the gap between the two is reaching critical proportions. We are cognizant of the fact that 37 parishes and missions are already on special quotas in this Diocese. We know that, if clergy salaries and perquisites must be raised at what now appears to be the probable rate in the next half decade, several marginal parishes may find it impossible to continue operation or may have to share the services of a minister. A corollary of this is that increased costs may decrease the number of positions open in a situation where there may already be surplus personnel. Certainly, we regret these possibilities. Individual members of the Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries are at work on other departments or committees, as well as in their own parishes, seeking ways to avoid such calamities. We sincerely believe, however, that the way out of such difficulties is not to place the burden upon our clergy and rectory families. At the most the Church can only lose ground slowly. It cannot stand still in the matter of clergy salaries and perquisites. To try to hold our recommendations much below present levels (which are in fact conservative) might save enough to permit a marginal operation to continue for a year or two more. But stipends are only a part of the picture of rising costs. As we see it, it is the overall economy which will sooner or later force the Church to consolidate itself into viable. efficient operations. Our attempts to recommend economic justice for the clergy may here and there accelerate the inevitable but they will not cause it.

IV. A PASTORAL MATTER AND A RESOLUTION

It has come to our attention that there is no articulated standard in the area of parish death benefits for a clergyman and that this may be a source of embarrassment both to a well-meaning vestry and to a surviving clergy family. After very careful consideration, your Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries believes that, should a clergyman die while in active service, his parish should continue his cash salary and perquisites for at least 90 days. This should include use of a telephone but not the car allowance which is based on the assumption that it is in fact compensation for an expense. We trust that this can usually be done without hardship to the parish since it would be very difficult to select and acquire the services of a replacement in anything less than this time. We believe that the 90 days should be regarded as a minimum and that the guidance of the Bishop should be sought in considering other factors, for example, the school terms of the children which should be taken into account before terminating the rectory family's use of the facilities. Since our responsibility is to propose a minimum, we do this in our only 1967 Resolution:

### RESOLUTION I

BE IT RESOLVED, that the 1967 Convention of the Diocese of Newark establish it as a standard that, in the event of the death of a clergyman in Diocesan

employ or a vicar of a mission, the man's family shall be entitled to continued use of their house and continued salary and perquisites for a period of 90 days and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Convention express its mind that all parishes should make like provision for the families of their rectors or curates should they die in active service.

The Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries is grateful to our Bishops for their continuing concern, to Mrs. Edward K. Walker, our statistician, and all who have assisted us with our work. We appreciate your study of this report and hope that you will use your influence and efforts to implement it, and particularly the schedule of salaries recommended in the appendix.

### Appendix to the Report of

# The Standing Committee on Clergy Salaries of the Diocese of Newark Re: Standards of Clergy Remuneration

According to resolutions passed by the 1966 Convention of the Diocese of Newark, the following standards for minimum cash salaries are established for the year 1967 for full-time clergy, being provided in addition to currently prevailing perquisites:

Deacon — \$4,600 per year

Priest-in-training (First two years in Priesthood) — \$5,100 per year

Priest — \$5,300 per year

For 1968, the established standards for minimum cash salaries are as follows:

Deacon — \$4,750 per year Priest-in-training (First two years in Priesthood) — \$5,500 per year

Priest — \$6,000 per year Standard perquisites are likewise to be provided in 1968. As established by convention resolution, these are the following:

Suitable housing, properly maintained

(a) (b) Heat (c) Electricity

(d) Water

(e) Gas (if necessary)

In addition to perquisites, all Clergy should receive the following allowances:

Local telephone service, if required for Parish purposes

Auto allowance, \$800 minimum and 10 cents per mile thereafter

The 1966 Convention of the Diocese of Newark also resolved that all Parish Vestries and the Department of Missions be urged to "seek to raise all salaries now above the minimums at least in proportion to the minimum levels of 1967 and 1968, and that any instances when this is not possible within the next two years it be set as a goal to achieve at the earliest possible date."

Thus, for example, if a man was receiving \$5,500 when the new minimums went into effect, the effect of this resolution is to urge that he receive \$5,800 per year in 1967, and \$6,500 per year in 1968.

Please take note that these resolutions apply to minimum salaries, as well as to other salaries that will remain below the standard of "just and equitable" salaries as determined by the resolution of the 1966 Convention. The 1966 Conwention defined "'just and equitable salaries' as the payment of a total living in which the clergyman's cash salary plus housing (valued at not more than 10% of cash salary) be equated to a figure 1.5 times that of the salary of a public school teacher who is on the 6-year level (7-year level if it be recognized) of equal years of experience to the clergyman in the community in which he serves."

# BEPORT OF THE DIOCESAN COMMISSION ON ECUMENICAL CONCERNS

# To the Ninety-Third Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark May 13, 1967

During the past year, your Commission on Ecumenical Concerns has met regularly. The group aimed at securing people, both clerical and lay whose views would represent the whole spectrum of opinion within the diocese. We would welcome others of diverse views.

During the year, it became apparant that the most pressing issue facing the Episcopal Church in ecumenical relations was the Consultation on Church Union. A weekend conference was held at St. John the Baptist Convent in Mendham on November 4th and 5th. At that time, the document "Principles of Church Union" was carefully studied by the Commission to clarify our ideas of what is proposed. The Commission feels the necessity of stressing that the "Principles" are not a plan, but only the basis upon which a plan of union can be framed if the consulting Churches approve. The suggestion was also made that without careful study of the document itself it is very difficult to make an informed judgment of it. The question each Episcopalian must ask is whether the "Principles of Church Union" conform to the Lambeth Quadrilateral.

The Commission promoted a conference at the Cathedral House on February 14th, which enabled the New Jersey Chairman for ecumenical concerns of all the churches in the Consultation to meet. The outcome was a petition to the Bishops and denominational executives to promote Sunday, April 23, 1967, as a day for pulpit exchanges as well as asking all parishes involved to study the book "Principles of Church Union." This group decided to meet regularly to promote further understanding and study.

It is the purpose of this Commission to promote better understanding, and to serve as a clearing house for the exchange of ideas in the area of Ecumenical Concerns.

At the Ninety-Second Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark, a resolution was passed referring the House of Bishops' resolution on guest communion to this commission for study and recommendations. After careful consideration of this matter, as well as a review of the positions taken by other dioceses in the Church, your Commission unanimously adopted the following resolution:

WHEREAS the "Statement On Communion Discipline" by the Joint Commission on Ecumenical Relations, adopted by that body January 3-5, 1967, to be included in its Triennial Report to General Convention, best represents the consensus of the Commission on Ecumenical Concerns of the Diocese of Newark, and that your Commission on Ecumenical Concerns recommends it to the Diocese of Newark;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Ninety-Third Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark endorses the "Statement on Communion Discipline" by the Joint Commission on Ecumenical Relations and;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the secretary of this convention communicate this endorsement to the House of Bishops and the House of Deputies at the Coming General Convention.

A copy of the "Statement on Communion Discipline" is filed with this report and has been circulated to the delegates of this convention.

Your Commission on Ecumenical Concerns also offers the following resolution concerning Church Union:

WHEREAS General Convention in 1961 appointed a committee of nine to enter into the exploration of the establishment of a united church, and;

WHEREAS said committee for five years has been deeply involved in the

Consultation on Church Union with similar committees representing (in 1967) nine other Christian bodies, now therefore, be it

RESOLVED (1) that the Diocese of Newark approves of the Preamble and of the first four chapters of the document, Principles of Church Union adopted by the Consultation at its meeting in 1966, recognizing that this document (which is to serve as a basis upon which to formulate a Plan of Union) is not complete as a comprehensive statement of the Faith and Order of the Protestant Episcopal Church, and is not intended to be, but needs to be amplified and clarified through further study, both by this Church and all participating Churches;

RESOLVED (2) that the Diocese of Newark recommends to General Convention that General Convention authorize the Joint Commission on Ecumenical Relations to continue participation in the Consultation's search for Church Union.

RESOLVED (3) that the Diocese of Newark recommend to the General Convention that General Convention authorize the Joint Commission on Ecu-menical Relations to enter, with the delegations of other communions, into the preparation of a Plan of Union based upon the aforesaid documents, bearing in mind our commitments to the whole Anglican Communion and to the wider episcopal fellowship, as well as our conversations with the Roman Catholic and Orthodox Churches, without committing the Episcopal Church at this time to acceptance of this or any other Plan of Union, and;

RESOLVED (4) that the Secretary of the Diocesan Convention is instructed to transmit copies of this resolution to the Presiding Bishop, to the Secretary of the House of Bishops, to the President of the House of Clerical and Lay Deputies; to the Secretary of the House of Clerical and Lay Deputies, and the Chairman of the Joint Commission of Ecumenical Relations.

Your Commission on Ecumenical Concerns wishes to thank all who have served during the year, and all who have helped us.

STATEMENT ON COMMUNION DISCIPLINE by THE JOINT COMMISSION ON ECUMENICAL RELATIONS "1) The Holy Communion must be seen in its proper context of the fellowship of committed Christians in the household of the apostolic faith, to which we are admitted by Baptism. In the historic tradition which the Episcopal Church maintains and practices the baptized member completes his baptismal initiation by personal profession of faith and loyalty, and so proceeds to the blessing of Confirmation and to participation in the Holy Eucharist. In the historic churches, Eastern and Western, the Bishop as the center of unity of the Christian family is active in the whole process—authorizing the administration of Baptism (usually by a priest, though sometimes by a deacon or layman), confirming either in person or (in some traditions) by delegation to a priest, ordaining the celebrant of the Eucharist if he does not officiate at it himself. The normative condition of the Church is union in one fellowship, at once of faith, sacramental practice, personal relations and church order; and this is therefore the situation which the services and rules of the Prayer Book embody.

2) The anomalous situation of Christian division requires us to accept at the heart of our Christian experience the pain of divisions which the present ecumenical renewal of the Church is beginning to overcome. Yet all who have been baptized in the Name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit have been made members of the Body of Christ. Those who in Christian traditions other than ours have by personal profession of faith and personal commitment affirmed their status as members of the Body may on occasion be led by their Christian obedience to wish to receive Communion in our Church. We believe that they may properly do so where the discipline of their own church permits, not only at special occasions of ecumenical gatherings specifically looking towards church unity, but also in circumstances of individual spiritual needs; and that this does not require any rubrical or canonical changes. We hope that such recognition of the deep significance of our basic fellowship in Baptism will help to speed the day when all the children of God will be able to join freely in one fellowship around the table of the Lord."

# DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION Annual Report — 1966

Introduction: During 1966, the Department of Christian Education provided a wide program of Christian education activities for persons on all age levels on the diocesan, archdeaconry and local parish levels. This program was implemented by the work of our consultant, the Rev. Herbert Leswing, Th.D., and by five operating and two administrative committees. The work of the latter two, the nominating and administrative committees, are reflected in the listing of the membership of the Department and in the financial statement with which this report concludes. The program of the Department is reflected in the reports of the consultant and committees which follow. Before turning to these reports, one item of great importance should be noted.

During 1966, the Department carried on extensive negotiations with the Camp and Conference Committee about joining it to the groups. As of the closing date of this report, the incorporation of this committee into the Department was in its final stages.

Work of the Consultant-The Rev. Herbert Leswing, Th.D.

During 1966 the consultant attended one hundred and five meetings relative to the work of the department, and approximately twelve meetings of committees of the New Jersey Council of Churches. He made fourteen addresses about our companion diocese, seven concerning the over-all work of the department. He served as a staff member for eleven days of major training events, eight days at national conferences, and four days in consultations with departments in other dioceses. The consultant also spent six days administering Canonical Examinations in history, missions, policy, and Christian Education. Six days were spent in field trips to several regions of our own diocese, and sixty-three parishes were visited during the year. The consultant conducted fifty-nine services this year, and administered Holy Baptism twice. Many consultations were held in the office with representatives of parishes. Increasing activity among the various committees of the department had added to travel demands, but has succeeded in some de-centralization of administration.

The work of the Parish Day School Committee—Francis Parkman, Jr., Chairman

The activities of the year derived from the Committee's questions in two areas: (1) How can the Parish Day School Committee best serve the Diocese in relationship to existing day schools and in the development of additional ones where is need? and (2) How can the relationship with St. Bernard's School, a secondary school affiliated with the Diocese, be strengthened?

As to the first: A questionnaire was mailed in April to all parishes and missions. The results: 53 respondents; 44—no school, 2—no school, but interest in starting, 4—operating day school at pre-primary level, 3—day schools using Church premises (2 Headstart and 1 Montessori). We are aware that there are other day schools in operation, both "parish" and "non-parish." The Committee coopter to membership the director of The Christ Church, Short Hills, School, and thus strengthened its effectiveness. Plans were made for visits by Committee members to schools, and for a conference of directors and their rectors in the fall of 1967.

As to the second: In addition to the two trustees serving on the St. Bernard's Board as representatives of the Diocese, a member of our Committee was appointed to the School's Academic Committee. A Bishop's Scholarship was inaugurated on an annual basis. A faculty training conference was held, supported by the Department of Christian Education.

The Work of the Youth Committee—The Rev. Frederick R. Gutekunst, Chairman
In 1966, The Youth Committee sponsored three high school conferences at
Holiday House. Staff members were xechanged with conference groups from other
dioceses in the Second Province and the cross-fertilization proved to be a helpful

stimulant for all involved. Plans were therefore made for a joint training session of staff members of youth conferences for the spring of 1967 at Tuxedo Park, N.Y.

The Youth Committee managed and staffed three weekend conference-retreats at the Convent of St. John the Baptist at Mendham. This popular program was over-subscribed and the tentative plans for additional such conferences in the spring.

As usual, the Committee was represented at all Provincial functions, supported several Archdeaconry meetings, and provided consultation and aid to parish programs. Of exceptional note was the experimental, ecumenical, innercity youth work which it underwrote in Hoboken, N. J.

In addition to this active program, the Committee held several study sessions during 1966, evaluating the youth picture of the Diocese and steps that might be taken to increase the Church's effectiveness with its youth.

The Work of the Adult Committee-The Rev. A. Wayne Schwab, Chairman

The calendar year 1966 was a period of consolidation and search for new directions for the Adult Committee.

In October, the Committee sponsored an experimental program on Christian Ethics and Daily Work led by The Rev. A. T. Mollegen, Professor of New Testament and Christian Ethics at Virginia Theological Seminary. This conference was part of a two-year program in this field of concern which was the joint understanding of a number of parishes in northern Bergen County. While such conferences are limited to their goals because they deal with persons pulled out of their daily work situations, they, nevertheless, provide the participants with insight and mutual support in coping with some of the ethical decisions that arise in their daily work.

In November, the Committee began an extended study of some of the emerging new patterns of the Church's work in Germany and other places in Europe. Of interest in these experiments is their success in dealing with the structures of society and with persons in terms of their roles in those structures of society. This work is built around conferences and courses whose participants are recruited because of their roles in society (thereby reaching more "outsiders" than usual). Moreover, these conferences are courses und seculiar as well as theological resources and so enter into a high degree of genuine dialog with the world where all become seekers of truth together.

In December, plans were laid for seeking experiments in adult education by adding theological courses to the various Adult Education Schools of our local Communities. A survey was planned for 1967 that would result (in September of successfully in a packet of various Lenten and adult programs which had been used successfully in various Parishes and Missions. This packet would become a resource for parish and mission education committees planning for the coming year.

The Committee also supported and cooperated with the Episcopal Church Women in their education program and with the Princeton Conference.

The Work of the Children's Committee—The Rev. Jos. D. Herring, Jr., Chairman In 1966, the Children's Committee continued to do research work in the field of religion and public schools and continued work on patterns for Church School teacher training operations. The Committee did in fact provide leadership for such operations in the Diocese during the year. The Children's Committee also began an extensive program of curriculum evaluation. It is at the present time evaluating curriculum materials from several sources within the Episcopal Church, and from major sources in other denominations. This project is directed toward making a report available in the fall of 1967 concerning the advantages and disadvantages of the various course materials. This Committee has recently undergone a change in committee chairman, and as traditional on such an occasion, it is now reviewing its projects and objectives to ascertain whether it is rendering the most effective possible service in support of the Christian nurture of the children of our Diocese.

# The Training Committee—The Rev. Henry A. Tilghman, Chairman

During the past year twenty-four persons were added to the list of clergy and lay people of the Diocese who have received intensive training in skills or in working effectively in groups. As a part of this training, the Training Committee has sponsored a number of training operations of its own, in part to provide these trainees with practical experience. It has also responded to several calls for trained assistants with Diocesan projects and has recommended numerous trainers for parochial operations. That the Department has a substantial waiting list of persons desiring to receive such training is testamony both to the effectiveness of the training itself and to the fact that it has met many needs in the Diocese effectively.

The Committee stands ready to recommend trainers both for Diocesan functions, and to help solve problems of parish strategy, communication and program training, and it will continue to help develop leadership potential among members. It will of course, continue to seek out and make available training opportunities for all in the Diocese who may wish them.

### LAY READERS GUILD REPORT FOR 1966-1967

The primary extra-parochial work of the members of the guild continues to be service in nursing homes and other institutions. Also, in temporarily replacing clergymen in missions and parishes. The service of Evening Prayer has been regularly taken at the Cathedral five nights a week by the faithful group who have undertaken this work.

Members of the guild are eager to serve in all areas of the Diocese and will go wherever and whenever they may serve the Church.

# YOUTH CONSULTATION SERVICE Annual Report — 1966

The Youth Consultation Service embraces two essential contributions to its community, which is the Diocese of Newark.

It provides RESIDENTIAL CARE and loving concern for little girls, age 4 to 12, who, being Wards of the New Jersey Bureau of Children's Services, are assigned to the Youth Consultation Service. Generally, these youngsters became Wards of the State after having been "abandoned, abused or cruelly treated." During 1966, as in the previous year, there were 14 such youngsters in the Residence, maximum capacity.

Youth Consultation Service also provides professional GUIDANCE and COUNCIL to teenagers, and, in the process, to their parents. When a young person comes in, as a referral or independently, the problem is first clarified and evaluated. The value of skilled counselors is evident: Knowledgeable classification of a problem, which can be associated with school work, job finding, sex, family relations, search for identity, and many other factors, is the first step toward helping solve the problem. The next step in the professional service is empathetic: to suggest or prescribe the ways in which resolution is to be found.

In dealing with a human situation, all of the facilities of the Youth Consultation Service can be brought to bear. Besides Case Workers, each of whom has earned a graduate degree in Social Work, there is available Vocational Guidance and Education Counselling, as well as the services of Psychological and Psychiatric specialists. Financial assistance can be provided in cases of need from a \$3,000 Designated Relief Fund.

The professional staff is augmented by VISTA Volunteers and members of the Youth Consultation Service Apprenticeship Program. The latter enables qualified young women to serve in the Residence for one year's experience in connection with earning a Masters Degree in Social Work.

The Hudson County Mental Health Center in Jersey City is a unit in the Consultation Service which deals with the many needs in that community.

Under the administration of Miss Helen Fisher, Executive Director, who was appointed to that post on July 1, 1965, all of the activities of the Youth Consulta-tion Service have progressed. In 1966, for the first time the children in the Residence had their own Summer Camp - in Vermont - arranged for by members of the Diocese and with contributions supplementary to the annual grant for the purpose from the Butts Fund.

Aware of the rapidly-increasing demands for the services that the Youth Consultation Service provides, the Board of Trustees is in full support of Miss Fisher's efforts to enlist up-to-date expertise obtaining additional funds reffulred to help more and more people.

## Diviese of Newark

Memorandum of Information Required by the Bishop and the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Newark on Petition by a Parish to Sell, Lease or Mortgage Real Estate.

- Canon 6, Sec. 3 of the General Church Cannons of the Protestant Episcopal Church provides that no Vestry shall encumber or alienate any real property without the written consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee of the Diocese.
- II. The Revised Statutes of the State of New Jersey (R.S. 16:12-4) provide as follows:

"No sale, conveyance or mortgage of any real estate other than burial lots in churchyards or cemeteries, and no lease for a longer term than one year shall be made by such corporation without the previous written consent of the bishop and a majority of the standing committee of the diocese within which the corporation is located\*\*\*. Without such consent the sale, conveyance, mortgage or lease shall be void."

- III. In the discharge of the responsibilities placed upon them by canonical and civil law the Bishop and the Standing Committee have adopted the following rules and regulations with respect to selling, leasing and mortgaging real estate belonging to the Parishes of this diocese.
- IV. No application to sell or lease real estate will be entertained until the petitioner has filed the following documents in proper form with the Secretary of the standing Committee:
  - A resolution by the Rector, Wardens and Vestry of the Parish authorizing the execution of the petition to sell or lease real estate.
  - A map of the property to be sold or leased.
  - A petition which shall contain or be accompanied by supporting schedules containing the following:
    - (a) A description of the property by metes and bounds.
    - (b) Information as to whether the property has been consecrated.
    - (c) Information as to whether the property is improved and if so the nature of any buildings thereon and their present use.
    - (d) The reason or reasons for selling or leasing the property.
    - (e) In the case of a sale, if the purchase price is to paid other than in cash, the terms of payment should be stated together with the rate of interest, whether the balance of the purchase price is to be secured by a mortgage on the premises, and if so, the terms of the mortgage.
    - (f) In the case of a sale, the petition should contain a statement regarding the disposition of the proceeds of sale.
    - (g) In the case of a sale, the petition must be accompanied by a written appraisal of a qualified real estate appraiser.
- V. No application to mortgage real estate will be entertained until the petitioner has filed the following documents in proper form with the Secretary of the Standing Committee:
  - A resolution by the Rector, Wardens and Vestry of the Parish authorizing the execution of the petition to mortgage real estate
  - A petition which shall contain or be accompanied by supporting schedules containing the following:
    - (a) A description of the property by metes and bounds.

- (b) Information as to whether the property has been consecrated.
- (c) A statement of the size and terms of the mortgage including the interest rate, duration, amortization period and name of the lending institution.
- (d) A statement of the reasons why it is necessary to borrow the money secured by the mortgage, e.g., to erect a new building, to improve present quarters, etc.
- (e) A statement of such facts as have convinced the Vestry that it is prudent to borrow the desired funds and that the Parish will be able to repay the amount borrowed.
- (f) A statement of the present parish membership showing the number of baptized persons and communicants as contrasted with comparable figures of 5 years ago.
- (g) A brief income and operating statement of the Parish for the last 2 fiscal years showing sources of income including pledges, plate offerings, rental income, income from investments, and the like; and expenses, including salaries and other operating expenses.
- (h) A statement that the Parish has met its diocesan quota for the previous 3 years; if not, the reasons therefor.
- (i) A statement of any other outstanding indebtedness.
- VI. Upon receipt of the foregoing documents in proper form, the Secretary of the Standing Committee will advise the petitioning Parish of the manner in which it will entertain the petition. Normally petitions will only be considered by the Standing Committee at one of its regularly scheduled meetings, at which representatives of the petitioner will be required to appear before the Standing Committee in support of the petition. Unless the petitioner is advised to the contrary, the Rector and the Treasurer (or other officer who is familiar with the finances and statistics in the petition and its accompanying schedules) shall appear before the Standing Committee and shall be prepared to answer reasonable questions relating to the petition.
- VII. The Vestry of the petitioning Parish is cautioned to establish a date for closing the transaction which shall allow ample time for preparation of the petition and its accompanying schedules and the presentation thereof to the Bishop and the Standing Committee. It is suggested that the petition and its accompanying schedules be reviewed by counsel for the petitioner before the filing of the petition with the Standing Committee.
- VIII. Applications which do not comply with the foregoing requirements will not be entertained by the Bishop and the Standing Committee.
- IX. Standard forms of resolution and petition will be supplied by the Secretary of the Standing Committee upon request.

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
