CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE 2.

There shall be a Convention of the Church in this Diocese, on the second Tuesday in May in each year, or on such other day in May as may be specially appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority. The Convention shall be held at the Cathedral unless the Ecclesiastical Authority appoints otherwise.

The Bishops' Annual Addresses

FIFTEENTH ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE RIGHT REVEREND LELAND STARK, D.D., L.H.D. BISHOP OF NEWARK

The theme of my address to you today is the sentence, "No wonder we do not lose heart!" This is an exclamation of St. Paul's to be found in the great 4th chapter of Second Corinthians, as translated in the New English Bible, which, among other things, contains these words: "Hard-pressed on every side, we are not hemmed in; bewildered, we are never at our wits' end; hunted, we are never abandoned to our fate; struck down, we are not left to die."

Certainly these words have a true contemporary ring about them. The fact of the matter is that we are indeed hard-pressed on every side, but as Christians we know we are not hemmed in. We are bewildered by the fast-moving events of our day, but as God's people we need never be at our wits' end. We are hunted in the sense that dangers of many kinds dog our footsteps, but as Christ's disciples we know we are never abandoned by God's love. We are indeed frequently struck down by the adversities of life in this troubled era of our world's history, but we are not destroyed by them because we know that grace abounds and can make us more than conquerors over every exigency of life!

"No wonder we do not lose heart!"

These triumphant words of St. Paul are, then, my theme, and I seek now to apply them to several concerns of our time.

1. VIETNAM: NEW HOPE AT LAST

I believe we may dare to apply these words, "No wonder we do not lose heart!" even to the issue of peace and war, specifically to the war in Vietnam.

The climate for peace, despite the presence of many dark clouds, is certainly less ominous today than it was a year ago when we met. Many of you will remember that last year I devoted my entire Convention Address to the issue of the Christian and Vietnam. The essence of my argument was that such issues as the cessation of the bombing of North Vietnam and de-escalation of the war should be put into the context of whether or not they would help to create a climate that would make for a negotiated peace rather than for sharper hostilities. Later in the day with only a few dissenting votes, you voted to make that address the Convention's position paper on Vietnam so that it became not only my voice but yours as well. Subsequently—and I tell you this for what passing interest it may have—the address was printed in *The Episcopalian*, the official publication of our Church, and in the *Newark Churchman* and was otherwise widely distributed so that it ultimately reached a circulation of about 170,000;

and, hopefully, it had some modest part in the creation of a more favorable climate for a negotiated peace than prevailed a year ago.

In any case, a great multitude of religious people, including ourselves, through churches and synagogues, through national bodies, and through various peace organizations, perhaps became the major factor in the creation of that massive public opinion that veritably compelled the Administration to seek a negotiated peace rather than a military victory, and preliminary negotiations began yesterday in Paris.

This, in my judgment, represents a tremendous victory for a strong, insistent, and informed public opinion.

There are two overpowering issues this country faces: one of them is still Vietnam, and the other is the urban crisis, of which Bishop Rath will speak this afternoon. Vietnam, as I say, remains a tremendous issue, and I submit that we Christians still have a vital role to play.

For one thing, we need to prepare ourselves and our people for long, hard, exasperating, insulting, frustrating bargaining, for the tragic reality is that negotiations which began yesterday are likely to be lengthy and drawn out and that in the meantime bitter fighting may continue for months and even for years. We shall need to "possess our souls in patience" as never before. And we may well remind ourselves that neither side will be blameless in the ongoing struggle. On the one hand, we are appalled by the savagery of the Viet Cong in Hue and in Saigon within the past few days, but on the other hand, our side continues the carnage too. Indeed, not long after President Johnson announced his peace initiative, allied forces began their biggest offensive of the war with over 100,000 troops involved, the operation being called, ironically, "Operation Total Victory," at a time when negotiations were about to begin.

The very morning I was preparing the final draft of this address, my patriotic blood boiled with indignation when I read the news article headlined "Enemy Steps up Terror in Saigon." Then I had to balance my emotions by reminding myself that our side alone uses napalm—I suppose I am one of the few here who has ever seen napalm used (in a test in North Carolina), and in less time than it takes to tell, after three planes had dropped their bombs over the testing grounds, an area which would range from the Mutual Benefit Life to the Prudential buildings was suddenly a billowing mass of flame extending about twenty stories upward. In Vietnam there are civilians and little children down there. The Viet Cong have shown themselves merciless in their terrorism, but we are not so gentle either, and I suppose one of the sayings that will go down in

history was the remark of the American major after his artillery had completely obliterated a village, "We had to destroy the village to save it."

A balanced view of the awfulness of the conduct of both sides will help us keep patience during the frustrating months ahead.

But despite the many setbacks and much discouragement that will inevitably beset us, the situation is far more hopeful now than a year ago we could have dreamt it would be, and I bespeak your daily prayers that a just and righteous peace according to the will of God may eventually be wrought.

2. RENEWAL IN THE LIFE OF THE DIOCESE

I turn now to my second subject, which is of immediate concern to the life of our Diocese.

The word "Renewal" is much in the talk of church circles today—and well it may be. There is a Commission on Renewal in General Convention. The Executive Council of our Church has recently undertaken a sweeping reorganization of itself, although the returns are not yet in as to whether this is really renewal or merely reshuffling. The Lambeth Council of Anglican Bishops from all over the world, to which I shall be going in late July, has as its general theme, "The Renewal of the Church," and will study that subject under the three major headings of the renewal of the Church in faith, ministry, and unity, but with these three further subdivided into thirty-five subjects. So "Renewal" is much in the air today—"no wonder we do not lose heart!"

It will interest you to know that the Diocesan Council has already taken some first steps toward a review of its own structure and functions, and my colleagues and I have been discussing the whole subject for several months. Also, there are some proposals that will come before you later today that are similarly aimed at the renewal of our life together as a diocesan family.

It would be presumptuous of me to tell you how to vote when these proposals come up on the agenda, but there are areas in our diocesan life which call for periodic re-examination, and your Bishops will wholeheartedly cooperate with any move directed at the improvement of our life together. If therefore Convention votes today to undertake the kind of study these proposals recommend, in my judgment this process ought to involve not only the limited matters suggested in the proposals but also should include a sweeping scrutiny of all aspects of the Diocese. Let me indicate by a shotgun discharge of questions (and there are many more besides) what I think such an inquiry, if you vote to make it, should include.

As to the Diocese itself, what can be done to make our diocesan organization more effective? What can we learn from other dioceses that have recently undergone 'restructuring'? How can the departments of the Diocesan Council function more effectively? How can the services of the Diocese to the parishes and missions be improved? How can the Diocese make better use of talented lay persons?

What about the episcopacy? How can the ministry of the Bishops be made more productive? How can time be made available for them to be more effective pastors? And should we not seek answers to the dozens of other questions that presbyters (as I did when I was a presbyter) are wont to ask about their Bishops?

What about the parishes and missions of the Diocese? Since these are the basic constituents of the Diocese, should they not also come under scrutiny although the proposals are silent about studying them? What can be done by the clergy and lay people to ensure the kind of commitment that will not allow a \$57,000 deficit to develop between the Convention budget that passed a year ago and the working budget for 1968, so that drastic cuts had to be made both in our own diocesan program and in our missionary quota to the General Church? What is the answer to the fact that the Diocese is growing so slowly in the number of its communicants whereas in the past fifteen years the Bishops of Newark have confirmed and received nearly 40,000 persons? Where have they all gone? Why are there so comparatively few adults presented for confirmation?

As to the clergy, can some system be devised whereby those who ought to move to other places could be enabled to do so? What about the congregations which ought to have different leadership but whose ministers, for one reason or another, receive no calls elsewhere? Since the power of the Bishop to act in such situations is effectively thwarted by canon law, should the canons be changed to give him more authority? But what if the Diocese then got a tyrannical Bishop?

Well, there are more pellets in this shotgun discharge of questions, but these will suffice to indicate that you should consider carefully whether you wish such a far-reaching study to be made; and if you feel some such study will make for renewal in the life of the Diocese, I trust your vote will also imply your support in terms of money, time, and prayers.

3. SHOULD THE CHURCH BE SILENT ON SOCIAL ISSUES ?

I should like to introduce my third concern by reference to a recent Gallup Poll, the headline of which in the New York Times for April 12, 1968, read like

this: "53% in Poll Want Church Silent on Social Issues." The subhead added, "Gallup Survey Finds Majority of Those Questioned Favor Non-involvement by Clergy." In 1957 the Gallup Poll had shown that 44% of the people wanted the Church to remain silent on social issues whereas today that figure had risen to a majority of 53%. I may add that the Bishops and other clergy have received not a few letters from lay people pointing out that their views are at last prevailing. The exposition on the 53% went on to say this:

Reasons given by those who think churches should not speak out on issues of the day fall into three general categories: (1) the first duty of the churches is to comfort the individual; (2) ministers and priests do not have the kind of background or training needed to deal with social and political problems; and (3) churches should concentrate on raising the levels of religious belief and practice.

Now I should certainly agree that the Church should be a mediator of God's comforting grace, that clergy do speak to issues from time to time on which they are less than experts (although nearly all clergy have graduate degrees), and that the job of the Church is indeed to raise "the levels of religious belief and practice."

But in God's name is that all there is to the Church's task? Where in such a job description is there even a remote hint that the Church also has a divine commission to speak and to act prophetically both as a corporate body like this Convention or through the preachments and actions of its ordained clergy? "Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven," our Lord told His followers to pray—did He mean only piously to pray those words, or did He mean that in His strength and by His grace the Church and its people are actively to seek those changes in the social fabric that are more in harmony with the pattern of His Kingdom, that we are to seek the correction of maleficent social evils that are clearly thwarting His will from being done upon earth?

"But," some will argue, "the Church's job is to change individual lives, and then those individuals will change society in the direction of the Kingdom of God."

Yes, that is true to some extent, and that is indeed part of the Church's job, but the difficulty is that, as far as my observation goes, I do not see many of these "changed individuals" actively seeking to change society. On the contrary, I see some of them using this very kind of theology as an excuse not to try to change society so that the curious paradox is that they thereby become, wittingly or unwittingly, aligned on the worse side of a given issue. For the reality of the situation is, whether we like this or not, the Church as an institution and Christians as individuals cannot avoid becoming involved in social issues one way or the other.

I saw a striking example of this fact of life during our stay in South Africa, which was one of the several countries my wife and I visited in Africa recently. Apartheid, which demands the forcible separation of the races and allows the small white minority to rule South Africa, is practiced there, but the one and only place where we saw whites and coloreds and blacks freely and happily mingling together was at the Anglican Cathedral in Johannesburg, not only at the Eucharist, but also at the tea time that followed.

Actually, this kind of fellowship even in churches is forbidden by apartheid laws, but the Government hesitates to move against the Church. Nonetheless the Anglican Church is sharply criticized for this and is often denounced by the followers of apartheid as "the Church's meddling in politics."

But what about the Dutch Reformed Church, the largest denomination in South Africa, that strictly follows the practice of apartheid in its worship and fellowship? Are they not also "meddling in politics" by openly upholding a practice that is inimical to God's Word? Anytime a church body or an individual Christian denies the Biblical tenet that "God hath made of one blood all nations of men for to dwell on the face of the whole earth," far from avoiding any political or social involvement, he has in actuality lined himself up on the other side of scriptural truth. No matter what twists and turns one makes theologically, there is no escape from involvement in political and social issues on one side or the other.

Work to change the individual into a new Christian or help him become a better one? By all means, for this is an essential part of the Church's task. Work to correct the social evils which maim and hurt the children of God and work to reform society so that it will more nearly conform to the specifications of the Kingdom of God? By all means, for this too is essential to the Church's task—not one task or the other but both! Only then can the Church do the Master's bidding.

And your and my part in it?

Come, labor on!

Away with gloomy doubts and faithless fear!

No arm so weak but may do service here:

By feeblest agents may our God fulfill

His righteous will!

"No wonder we do not lose heart!"

POSTSCRIPT

The proposals I referred to in Section II in this Convention Address were not passed by Diocesan Convention. I do not interpret this negative action,

however, as Convention's lack of interest in this matter of the renewal of the life and work of the Diocese but rather as an action that frees my colleagues and myself to attack this problem unhindered by the limitations of the proposals.

Exploratory conversations are in process, and the Diocesan Council is holding a special overnight meeting in late September to consider this matter also. Please pray for the renewal of our life and work together!

**FIFTH ANNUAL ADDRESS OF
THE RIGHT REVEREND GEORGE E. RATH, S.T.D.
SUFFRAGAN BISHOP OF NEWARK**

“The summer of 1967 again brought racial disorders to American cities, and with them shock, fear and bewilderment to the nation.”

With this grim statement The National Advisory Commission on Civil Disorders begins its report to the President and to the American people. The commission had been directed to seek answers to three basic questions:

What happened?

Why did it happen?

What can be done to prevent it from happening again?

To this end the commission undertook a broad range of studies and investigations. It visited the riot cities, heard many witnesses, and sought the counsel of experts across the country. As a result of all this study, the commission's basic conclusion is:

“Our nation is moving toward two societies, one black, one white—separate and unequal.”

Reaction to last summer's disorders has quickened the movement and deepened the division. Discrimination and segregation have long permeated much of American life; they now threaten the future of every American.” (*Report*, p. 1.)

The reaction to the Kerner Commission's report has been mixed. This was to be expected. The human defense mechanism reacts swiftly against any attack upon the ego, and the ego of the prevailing white and racist society of our land comes under a scathing indictment in this report, all the more damaging because the members of the commission themselves are recognized as moderates, and all but two are white. The report has provoked alternately anger, indignation, surprise, shame, and remorse in the various quarters of the white community. The only surprise it stirred in the black community was its relative honesty, for most of the members of that community had expected the report to be a whitewash.

Unquestionably, the most damning fact in the whole issue is that the white community, as a whole, has been unaware of its own racist bent and has unswervingly pictured our society, both to itself and to others, as one within

which, with a few minor exceptions soon to be corrected, equal opportunity lies open to all citizens. In the Union of South Africa, racism is openly espoused and defended by a white minority. The white majority of the United States of America, on the other hand, denies any racist conviction even while it engages in practices which keep the black minority in a continuing and worsening relationship of second class citizenship. In some respects the black man fares better under the open racism of South Africa than under our hypocritical pretensions to a lack of racism: there he is, at least, recognized as a person, a factor in society, a potential threat to white supremacy; here he is ignored and forgotten, a nonentity, a non-being. The civil disorders that racked our cities were to no small degree the black community's protest against white obliviousness, its demand to be recognized, to be seen, to be counted.

In one brief, but moving, paragraph the commission's report illustrates the polarity between white and black understanding of their relationship or lack of relationship.

"What white Americans have never fully understood—but what the Negro can never forget—is that white society is deeply implicated in the ghetto. White institutions created it, white institutions maintain it, and white society condones it." (*Report*, p. 2.)

White Americans do not fully understand; the Negro cannot forget. A world of relationships is lost between those two facts of experience. The black American should not be expected merely to forget that white society has created, maintains, and condones the conditions under which he is forced to live; but white Americans had better come to understand that fact and seek ways to change it.

Perhaps, the Kerner Commission's report and that of the Select Commission appointed by Governor Hughes will help the white community understand its role in setting up the situation from which civil disorders break out—if we can let down our defenses long enough to read them objectively. There is really little that is new in these reports. A distinguished member of this Diocese, Dr. Harold Lett, long associated with the National Conference of Christians and Jews and well acquainted with discrimination and its product, said in a Lenten address* delivered in this Cathedral:

"The New Jersey Governor's Select Commission on Civil Disorder and the National Advisory Commission on Civil Disorder have issued study re-

ports assessing the causes of civil unrest on the racial front, examining the roles of initiators and perpetrators of acts of civil disobedience, analyzing the nature of public reaction and contributions to the whole, and terminating in concrete suggestions of remedies to be found. To the great majority of 200 million Americans, these are a new and shocking revelation; to those of us who have been in the thick of the fray for half a century or less, it is an old, old story that is being retold, over and over again, to an indifferent public or to hostile, selfishly motivated cynics . . .”

He continued, “The race problem in America has been the subject of research to a greater degree than any other human relations situation in the entire world. From de Tocqueville in the middle of the 19th century until the National Advisory Commission in the last third of the 20th century, every imaginable kind of inquiry has been made, stemming from innumerable hypotheses, and for myriads of purposes. Almost without exception, these studies have disclosed the contributions to unrest caused by physical and psychological separation of segments of the human family, with skin color as the criterion of excellence or of nonentity; dissatisfactions caused by unemployment and under-employment due to discriminatory selective processes; by limited and ill-advised programs of ‘education’ of the exploited group; by segregated and, *ipso facto*, inferior and costly housing bequeathed to the minority—research in all these things, *except* into the peculiar and contradictory phenomenon of Christian America’s great success in avoiding Christian responsibility for corrective action.”

It would serve little purpose for me to attempt to summarize in this address the findings of the two commissions and their recommendations. I commend the reports to you. A summary of their recommendations, based upon news reports, has been distributed throughout the Cathedral today. Those who may have a particular interest in the events that took place last summer and are taking place now in the see city of the Diocese will find in Dr. Wright’s new book, “Ready To Riot,” a scholarly and penetrating analysis of the underlying causes of the Newark rebellion. Essentially, one might say that Dr. Gunnar Myrdal’s classic study of race relations, “The American Dilemma” has turned into “An American Tragedy.” The microcosms of “Street Scene” and “West Side Story” have expanded to take in the whole of American society. For this cannot be emphasized too strongly: *the so-called “urban crisis” involves our entire society.* It is a crisis

in American life. The discrimination and segregation that have long permeated much of American life now threaten the future of every American. One might go even further to point out that the American crisis is only a phase in a global crisis in which those whom the Algerian psychiatrist Frantz Fanon has called "The Wretched of the Earth" are rising to demand their place in a society too long dominated by those they perceive as their oppressors.

There's an old spiritual with the refrain, "There's no hidin' place down there."

There's no hidin' place for anyone in the present crisis. The families that left the city for the suburbs and countryside helped to create this crisis, help to perpetuate it, and must help to meet it. And the families and individuals who are the victims in this crisis also helped to create it, help to perpetuate it, and must help to meet it. I subscribe fully to the position that the poor and the black must be allowed the opportunity and the power to work out their own solution to the problems they face, for a substantial part of the problem is their own need for integrity, identity, and self-respect. This is in line with the apostle's saying, "Let every man bear his own burden." But I subscribe to the other half of the paradox as well, "Bear ye one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ." Those of us who enjoy privilege and power must use these to enable those without privilege or power to achieve their rightful place in society. Note the words, "enable them," for they must have the privilege of winning their own victory.

But now to return to Dr. Lett's words, what is our "Christian responsibility for corrective action"? What is the Church's role in the crisis in American life?

It is sobering to reflect upon the fact that neither of the two commissions gave any consideration whatever to the Church's role either in creating the situation out of which the civil disorders sprang or in changing that situation. Perhaps, ignoring the Church as a possible agent for change was only a fair price to exact for overlooking the Church's responsibility for the conditions that led to riot and rebellion.

Is the Church powerless to act because the Church itself is part and parcel of the white and racist culture which has precipitated this crisis? Those who would answer in the affirmative have powerful arguments on their side.

For example, most of the parishes that once existed within the central cities, or core cities, have either accompanied their white membership in its exodus to the suburbs, or are dead, or are dying. By and large, the so-called "main-line" denominations have failed to find a way to minister to the needs or to

preach the Gospel to the newcomers to the urban areas of our land. There are a few and notable exceptions to this general failure, but only a few.

The oft-quoted statement that eleven o'clock on Sunday morning is the most segregated hour in American life is still true, though the Cathedral congregation is one example to the contrary. Many of our suburban congregations, located in areas to which members of minority groups are unwelcome, would seem to have no choice in the matter. But even there, the number of those attempting to change the situation are few. Only occasionally—but once is too often—do we hear of a situation like the following: a Jamaican woman took a domestic position in one of our suburban communities, and on Sunday attended, as was her custom, divine service in the local Episcopal Church. By nightfall, she had received three telephone calls suggesting that she find another place to worship! This, of course, is in outright contradiction of Canon 16, Section 4, which reads:

"Every communicant or baptized member of this Church shall be entitled to equal rights and status in any Parish or Mission thereof. He shall not be excluded from the worship or Sacraments of the Church, nor from parochial membership because of race, color, or ethnic origin."

Another example: I have served for more than two years with a Committee on the Placement of Clergy of Minority Groups. We have had a number of pleasant meetings, and we have failed to place a single priest of any minority group in a predominantly white congregation! It is only fair to add that one vestry expressed its willingness to consider such a priest for its white parish, but did not call one. This, however, must be countered by the refusal of other vestries (at least two), to consider non-white nominees for congregations that have become or are becoming predominantly non-white. Do you wonder that there has been a serious falling off in candidates for the ministry among Negro young men?

The plain fact is that the Church finds itself both victim and practiser of the white racist tendencies of American life. It has little that it can offer to ease the present tension and unrest until it has overcome the tension and unrest within itself. "Physician, heal thyself" is a proverb that is all too appropriate to the American Church's present condition.

Bishop Stark has already referred to the Gallup Poll and its finding that fewer and fewer people are looking to the Church as an agency of social change. It is interesting to speculate upon the reasons for this attitude. Do non-Church members as well as members expect the Church to exist only as the protector of the status quo, a kind of spiritual deep freeze? At any rate, the Gallup report should be no surprise to anyone who has lived through the aftermath of the

last General Convention. In Seattle, under the inspired leadership of our Presiding Bishop, the Convention attempted to respond to the challenge of the decade and to minister to the millions passed by in the mainstream of American life. Probably, we should have responded by appropriating millions of dollars above our present programs for this newly apparent need, but so-called "wiser counsels" prevailed and appropriations were re-allocated. Suddenly, in a Church whose missionary zeal has flickered like a dying candle in a breeze, a great concern for the *overseas* mission of the Church developed. Apparently, it is more important to preach the Gospel to the colored peoples of the world than to the colored peoples of our own land. At least, it is more appealing in some quarters.

Please don't mistake me. I am not against our mission to the peoples of the world. I believe strongly that the Church has been sent to preach the Gospel to the whole world. And I believe that the whole world includes the poor, and the disinherited, and the disadvantaged, and the disillusioned people of our own metropolitan areas as well as those in Latin America, Africa and Okinawa.

But when all is said and done, I cannot and will not believe that the Church is insusceptible to the kind of change and renewal that are required for her to continue her role in changing and renewing the lives of individuals and the life of her society. As Dr. Hans Kung has pointed out, the Christian Church is the *ecclesia semper reformans et reformanda*, the Church that is ever the agent of change or renewal and in need of change or renewal. It may be that the Church in the next decade or the Church in the remainder of this century will become a smaller, a more closely united, a more strictly disciplined body of Christians than the Church in which you and I grew up. The "cost of discipleship" may go up. Nominal Christians may find the price too high for them. But I believe that the Church will ultimately range itself beside the poor and disinherited of society—in this land and in other lands—abandoning its role of Lady Bountiful to take on the part of fellow soldier and servant with those who follow Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour.

I see the Church in this crisis in American life as both needing reform and reforming, as requiring change and initiating change, as standing under judgment and delivering God's judgment on its society. I see the Church as the sole agency that can hold society together, uniting rich and poor, wise and ignorant, old and young, black and white. I see the Church as that tree in the heavenly Jerusalem's garden "whose leaves are for the healing of the nations." I see the Church as that Body of Christ which performs His work and carries out His mission in this generation as in the generations heretofore.

God knows, I may be wrong, but what life I have left I am willing to risk—I am forced to risk—on this assumption.

Rules of Order

THE CONVENTION

1. The Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. All Clerical and Lay Deputies on entering the Convention shall present their names, together with the names of the Parishes and Missions they represent, on cards, to the Secretary, who shall record their attendance.
3. When the President takes the Chair, each member shall be seated.
4. The general procedure of the Convention shall be governed, unless otherwise provided for, by the rules of parliamentary practice as set forth in "Roberts' Rules of Order."
5. At the request of the President, or on motion, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, and shall take a vote for that purpose.
6. A public address system shall be installed for use of those addressing the Convention.
7. No motion shall be put, or debated, until it is seconded; and every motion shall be reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
8. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received, unless to lay upon the table; to commit it; to postpone to a certain time; to postpone it indefinitely; to correct it; to amend it; or divide it; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment has been offered. The motion to lay upon the table, and to adjourn, shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, unless some member is speaking.
9. When any member is about to speak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
10. No member shall speak more than twice (except the mover, who is entitled to reply), in the same debate without leave of the Convention.
11. If any member in speaking or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Convention, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; if decided to be out of order he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
12. All motions or notices to reconsider shall be made on the day the vote is taken.
13. All questions shall be decided *viva voce*, unless otherwise specially ordered.
14. On the demand of five Presbyters entitled to vote, or of the Lay Deputies from five Parishes and Missions, the vote upon any question shall be by Orders, the Clergy voting individually and the Laity by Parishes and Missions; and, when a vote is thus taken, a concurrent majority in both Orders shall be necessary to carry any measure. Whenever a vote is taken by orders, each Parish shall have one vote and each Mission shall have one vote in the Lay Order.
15. The mode of conducting the nominations and elections of all Committees, Commissions, the Diocesan Council and its Departments, and all other elective officers not otherwise provided for, shall be as follows:
 - a. The Secretary of the Convention shall send out with the notice of the time and place of the Convention, a list of the offices to be filled by election thereat, and the names of the incumbents of these offices, whose terms expire thereat, together with an official nomination blank. Such notice shall be sent out at least one month before the date appointed for the Convention to the Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and to each Lay Deputy whose name and address has been transmitted to the Secretary, as provided in Canon I. Notice of the Convention shall be given in THE NEWARK CHURCHMAN.
 - b. The members of the Convention shall also be requested, in said call, to send to the Secretary any canonical amendments, or other important items of business, that they may propose to introduce at the next Convention, so that such matters may be assigned a place on the Calendar of Business.

- c. Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations for any office or offices to be filled at such Conventions, shall, at least thirty days before the date appointed for the Convention, submit the same in writing to the Secretary thereof together with his certificate that he has secured the consent of such person or persons to such nomination.
- d. Nominations may be made from the floor.
16. a. A Committee consisting of the Bishops, ex-officio, five other clergymen and five lay persons to be known as the Committee on Elections and Rules of Order, shall be appointed at each Convention to take appropriate action prior to the next Annual Convention and any special Convention in preparation thereof including the preparation of the Rules of Order, official ballots and the calendar of business for such next Annual and, if any, special Convention.
- b. The Committee, from the list of nominations as furnished to it by the Secretary of the Convention, shall prepare sufficient ballots marked "Sample" for each Clerical and Lay Deputy, as certified by such Secretary, as entitled to a seat in the Convention; such ballot to be mailed by such Secretary to each such Deputy at least five days before the Convention.
- c. At the beginning of the opening session the committee shall report to the Convention in the form of an official ballot the names of nominees; the arrangement of such names shall be determined by lot in each order.
- d. If there be any office for which no nomination has been made on the sample ballot, any Deputy may file with the Secretary of the Convention the name of one candidate for any such office, together with his certificate, that he has secured the consent of the person so nominated. Such nominations may be filed up to the hour of voting, and the committee of Elections shall announce the names of such nominees at the time of the distribution of the first ballot.
- e. The number of consecutive terms any nominee has held the office for which he is again nominated shall be noted on the ballot, in parentheses, after his or her name. After each list of nominations as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks may be filled by any voter. On the first ballot these ballots only shall be used, and also in subsequent ballots, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. No ballot shall be counted in its class, on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled, and the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast.
17. There shall be a Committee to be known as the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions, the members of which shall be appointed at each Convention, and shall serve until the close of the next following Convention. The Committee shall receive and consider all resolutions except resolutions on matters coming under the purview of an appropriate department of Diocesan Council, and except resolutions of committees accompanying committee reports recommending action of Convention. The Committee or the appropriate Diocesan Council Committee shall submit its report to Convention recommending the adoption or rejection of each resolution proposed, or the adoption of any such resolution as amended by the Committee or the appropriate Diocesan Council Committee. A copy of this report shall be mailed by the Secretary of the Convention to each Deputy at least thirty days before Convention.
18. All resolutions to be considered for action by the Convention shall have been submitted in writing to the Secretary of the Convention not less than sixty days in advance of the Convention and shall have been signed by a Deputy to the Convention. On the expiration of the time for submitting resolutions to the Secretary of the Convention, the Secretary shall transmit to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions or to the appropriate Diocesan Council Committee all resolutions submitted to him. Additional resolutions may be submitted to the Secretary of the Convention after the time above specified, which additional resolutions shall be transmitted immediately by the Secretary of the Convention to the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions or to the appropriate Diocesan Council Committee; but no such resolution, or such resolution as amended, shall be proposed for action by the Convention except upon a motion for the suspension of the rules duly passed.
19. All Committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered. It shall be the duty of the Secretary promptly to notify the members of all special committees of their appointment.
20. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending action of the Convention shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.
21. Reports when submitted in Convention shall be read by title only, unless the reading be for the better transaction of business.
22. At the close of each Convention a Committee shall be appointed to review and certify the correctness of the minutes.

The Annual Convention

The Ninety-Fourth Annual Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark was held on Saturday, May 11th, Nineteen Hundred and Sixty-Eight, in Trinity Cathedral, Newark, New Jersey.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at eight-thirty o'clock by the Bishop of the Diocese, the Right Reverend Leland Stark, D.D., L.H.D. At this service the Bishop read the Necrology.

The morning session of the Convention was called to order at nine-forty-five o'clock with the Right Reverend the Bishop of Newark in the Chair.

A quorum being present in both Orders, the Convention was declared ready for business. Attendance cards indicated the following were present:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ELECTIONS AND RULES OF ORDER

The Committee on Elections and Rules of Order for the 94th Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark has performed the duties prescribed in the Rules of Order 1967.

After careful study, the Committee recommends for use at this Convention the Rules of Order of the 1967 Convention with the following changes in Rules 15, 17 and 18 (1967 Journal, pages 63, 64):

(1) Rule 15c. To add a new line at the end of the fourth line of Rule 15c (1967 Journal, page 64), "The nominator shall furnish biographical material upon a form supplied by the Secretary."

The sentence ending 15c, "Nominations may be made from the floor," will now be listed separately as 15d.

(2) Rule 16a, line 3 (1967 Journal, page 64), after the phrase "shall be appointed at each Convention*" shall be added "to take appropriate action prior to the next Annual Convention and any special Convention in preparation thereof including the preparation of the Rules of Order, official ballots and the calendar of business for such next Annual and, if any, special Convention." This is under advice of the Diocesan Chancellor to make clearer the right of this Committee to ordain Convention procedure in advance of the Convention at which these rules are to be adopted.

(3) Rule 17, after the word "Committee" on lines six and eight: to amend with the addition of the phrase "or the appropriate Diocesan Council Committee."

(4) Rule 17, last line. Delete the word "twenty-one" and substitute the word "thirty."

(5) Rule 18, after the phrase "Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions" in lines five and eight, amend with the addition of the phrase, "or to the appropriate Diocesan Council Committee."

The Committee adopted as the Calendar of Business for the 1968 Convention the 1967 Calendar (1967 Journal, page 65), subject to the approval or subsequent necessary change by the Bishop.

The Committee authorized the Secretary to prepare the ballots under Rule 16a and requested the Secretary to prepare biographical resumes of nominations.

There were eight meetings of the Standing Committee held during 1967.

February 23rd

Mr. Edward Waylen was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate as a Perpetual Deacon.

Consent was given to the election of a Suffragan Bishop for the Diocese of Atlanta and to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor for the Diocese of Minnesota.

DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK

Report to the Bishops and the 1968 Diocesan Convention

At the close of 1967 we had oversight of 9 self-supporting congregations, 24 subsidized missions, 9 aided parishes, and 1 unorganized mission.

Highlights of the year include:

1. Newark, House of Prayer: The parish house was completely renovated at a cost of \$55,000, and substantial work was done in the rectory at a cost of \$4,700. The cost of each was financed by the Department of Missions.
2. Parsippany-Troy Hills, St. Gregory's: A new vicarage was purchased to which was added a fine new office. Construction was started on the new all-purpose building.
3. Jersey City, St. Mary's: The Department of Missions voted sadly to discontinue subsidy to this congregation, and further recommended closing down or merging with a neighboring parish as of December 31, 1967.
4. Paterson, St. Aidan's: A new vicarage was purchased, and plans begun to rehabilitate the old St. Mark's parish house. The old church property was sold.
5. Newark, Christ: Plans are being prepared for the razing of the old church and the transforming of the parish house into an all-purpose building.
6. West Milford, Incarnation: The new church building was dedicated by Bishop Stark on June 17th.
7. Panther Valley: The Department is consulting with other major non-Roman denominations with the view toward establishing an ecumenical congregation in this brand new residential community.
8. Mt. Arlington, St. Peter's: Steps were taken to purchase a house on a lot 150 x 150 adjacent to the parish house. This will become the new vicarage and the old one will be sold.
9. Hoboken, Trinity: An experiment in Spanish speaking work to run through 1968 was begun by the hiring of Mrs. Aida Lopez, who will work as special parish worker under the direction of the rector.
10. Milton-Oak Ridge, St. Gabriel's: The Department petitioned the Bishop to allow this congregation to become an organized mission in early 1968.

Changes in personnel:

1. The Rev. John Van Duyne resigned as Vicar of St. David's, Kinnelon, to pursue graduate studies.
2. The Rev. Edward Johnston was appointed Vicar of St. David's, Kinnelon, by Bishop Stark.
3. The Ven. Wilbur N. Marshall, Vicar of Incarnation, Jersey City, and Archdeacon of Hudson, died after a long illness.
4. The Rev. Thomas J. Henry resigned as Vicar of St. Dunstan's, Succasunna, to become Rector of St. Stephen's, Millburn.
5. Bishop Stark appointed the Rev. Robert Mason, Jr., as Vicar of St. Dunstan's, Succasunna.
6. The Rev. Wilson H. Willard, Jr., was appointed Vicar of St. Aidan's, Paterson.

The status of the benefits of the Church Pension Fund now being distributed through the retirement and disability and other channels in the Diocese and the General Church, as of April 1, 1968, is as follows:

General Convention in October authorized changes in the benefit structure effective in 1968 of considerable import:

1. Making 65 the normal retirement age rather than 68.
2. Allowing benefit (at reduced figure) on retirement down to age 60.
3. Relating clergy benefits to 10-year average salary rather than career average.
4. Basing widows' benefits on years from ordination to age 65 rather than years from later marriage to death or retirement.
5. Eliminating the 40-year ceiling in the number of years factor.
6. Increasing minimum benefits in normal cases from \$2,223 to \$2,500 for clergy and \$1,482 to \$1,600 for widows.
7. Changing the \$1,000 lump-sum grant to widows to \$2,000 payable to any named dependent beneficiary or to the estate.

I would be more than ungrateful if I allowed this opportunity to pass by without emphasizing the truly major part played by Bishop Stark in the work that has led to the many improvements in the Church Pension Fund plan. As a member of the Commission that studied the old plan and prepared an alternative new plan, he was unflagging in the use of his knowledge to help make this the best Pension Fund in any Church.

General Convention endorsed the group life, accident, and health benefit plans of the Fund's affiliated Church Life Insurance Corporation, which are expanding. The clergy and lay workers need these coverages. Most of the other communions have them, as do industry and governmental jurisdictions.

The activity of The Church Insurance Company in insuring Church property against fire and casualty losses continues to expand.

For the most part, congregations have been most cooperative in keeping pension premium payments up to date for they realize that more than six months' delinquency in this item jeopardizes the whole pension plan for the Diocese. All the clergy are grateful to the treasurers of those congregations who make this item a first charge.

Diocese of Newark

Memorandum of Information Required by the Bishop and the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Newark on Petition by a Parish to Sell, Lease or Mortgage Real Estate.

- I. Canon 6, Sec. 3 of the General Church Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church provides that no Vestry shall encumber or alienate any real property without the written consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee of the Diocese.
- II. The Revised Statutes of the State of New Jersey (R.S. 16:12-4) provide as follows:
 "No sale, conveyance or mortgage of any real estate other than burial lots in churchyards or cemeteries, and no lease for a longer term than one year shall be made by such corporation without the previous written consent of the bishop and a majority of the standing committee of the diocese within which the corporation is located***. Without such consent the sale, conveyance, mortgage or lease shall be void."
- III. In the discharge of the responsibilities placed upon them by canonical and civil law the Bishop and the Standing Committee have adopted the following rules and regulations with respect to selling, leasing and mortgaging real estate belonging to the Parishes of this diocese.
- IV. No application *to sell or lease* real estate will be entertained until the petitioner has filed the following documents in proper form with the Secretary of the standing Committee:
 1. A resolution by the Rector, Wardens and Vestry of the Parish authorizing the execution of the petition to sell or lease real estate.
 2. A map of the property to be sold or leased.
 3. A petition which shall contain or be accompanied by supporting schedules containing the following:
 - (a) A description of the property by metes and bounds.
 - (b) Information as to whether the property has been consecrated.
 - (c) Information as to whether the property is improved and if so the nature of any buildings thereon and their present use.
 - (d) The reason or reasons for selling or leasing the property.
 - (e) In the case of a sale, if the purchase price is to paid other than in cash, the terms of payment should be stated together with the rate of interest, whether the balance of the purchase price is to be secured by a mortgage on the premises, and if so, the terms of the mortgage.
 - (f) In the case of a sale, the petition should contain a statement regarding the disposition of the proceeds of sale.
 - (g) In the case of a sale, the petition must be accompanied by a written appraisal of a qualified real estate appraiser.
- V. No application *to mortgage* real estate will be entertained until the petitioner has filed the following documents in proper form with the Secretary of the Standing Committee:
 1. A resolution by the Rector, Wardens and Vestry of the Parish authorizing the execution of the petition to mortgage real estate
 2. A petition which shall contain or be accompanied by supporting schedules containing the following:
 - (a) A description of the property by metes and bounds.

- (b) Information as to whether the property has been consecrated.
 - (c) A statement of the size and terms of the mortgage including the interest rate, duration, amortization period and name of the lending institution.
 - (d) A statement of the reasons why it is necessary to borrow the money secured by the mortgage, e.g., to erect a new building, to improve present quarters, etc.
 - (e) A statement of such facts as have convinced the Vestry that it is prudent to borrow the desired funds and that the Parish will be able to repay the amount borrowed.
 - (f) A statement of the present parish membership showing the number of baptized persons and communicants as contrasted with comparable figures of 5 years ago.
 - (g) A brief income and operating statement of the Parish for the last 2 fiscal years showing sources of *income* including pledges, plate offerings, rental income, income from investments, and the like; and *expenses*, including salaries and other operating expenses.
 - (h) A statement that the Parish has met its diocesan quota for the previous 3 years; if not, the reasons therefor.
 - (i) A statement of any other outstanding indebtedness.
- VI. Upon receipt of the foregoing documents in proper form, the Secretary of the Standing Committee will advise the petitioning Parish of the manner in which it will entertain the petition. Normally petitions will only be considered by the Standing Committee at one of its regularly scheduled meetings, at which representatives of the petitioner will be required to appear before the Standing Committee in support of the petition. Unless the petitioner is advised to the contrary, the Rector and the Treasurer (or other officer who is familiar with the finances and statistics in the petition and its accompanying schedules) shall appear before the Standing Committee and shall be prepared to answer reasonable questions relating to the petition.
- VII. The Vestry of the petitioning Parish is cautioned to establish a date for closing the transaction which shall allow ample time for preparation of the petition and its accompanying schedules and the presentation thereof to the Bishop and the Standing Committee. It is suggested that the petition and its accompanying schedules be reviewed by counsel for the petitioner before the filing of the petition with the Standing Committee.
- VIII. Applications which do not comply with the foregoing requirements will not be entertained by the Bishop and the Standing Committee.
- IX. Standard forms of resolution and petition will be supplied by the Secretary of the Standing Committee upon request.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1968

There were eight meetings of the Standing Committee held during 1968.

January 18th

Mr. Frederick Hillyer was recommended to the Bishop for acceptance as a Postulant.

Consent was given to Grace Church, Westwood, to mortgage rectory at 25 Dean Street, Westwood, for \$25,000.

Consent was given to St. Paul's, Montvale, to sell property at 50 Westmoreland Avenue, Montvale, for \$27,000.

Approval was given to expenditures from the following Funds in the amounts indicated: Jesse Williams, \$9,800.00; Hannibal Goodwin, \$3,203.00; Church Aid Society, \$396.00.

April 4th

Consent was given to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor for the Diocese of East Carolina and for the Diocese of West Texas.

It was recommended to the Bishop that he consent to the admission of St. James', Ridgefield, as a Parish in union with the Convention.

Consent was given to mortgage property of St. Gregory's, Parsippany-Troy Hills, for \$50,000.

Consent was given to mortgage a new vicarage being purchased for St. Peter's, Mt. Arlington, in the amount of \$20,000.

The following were recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate: Andrew Fiddler, Timothy H. Parsons, Robert R. Gilman, George Vought, Adam J. Walters, and Jon A. Caridad; for the Perpetual Diaconate, Helmer C. Lundquist; and for acceptance as a Candidate for Holy Orders, Peter G. Kreidler.

May 15th

The Rev. Alexander M. Rodger was re-elected President, and the Rev. Henry Powers, Secretary.

It was recommended to the Bishop that Mr. Robert Steele be accepted as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

Mr. Jerry Van Drew was recommended for ordination to the Perpetual Diaconate.

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Rev. Jackson Earle Gilliam as Bishop of the Diocese of Montana and the Rev. Victor M. Rivera as Bishop of the Diocese of San Joaquin.

Consent was given to Christ Church, Ridgewood, to mortgage in the amount of \$120,000.

Messrs. Robert C. Oley and William C. Young were elected to the Board of Trustees of the Diocesan Investment Trust, Class of 1972.

A resolution was passed expressing to Mr. James C. Pitney appreciation of his services as a member of the Standing Committee for seven and one-half years.

The Standing Committee consented to act as Trustees of the Arthur Fund, Inc., appointing the Bishop and his Administrative Assistant as the Committee on Applications, with Mr. Gustave E. Wiedenmayer acting as Treasurer and Mrs. Virginia Grabyne as Assistant Treasurer.

June 20th

Acting at the request of the Department of Missions, the Standing Committee, under Canon 6, Section 3, declared St. Stephen's Mission, Clifton, to be dissolved.

Consent was given to the Diocese of Eau Claire to elect a Bishop Coadjutor; similar Consent was also given to the Diocese of Maryland.

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Rev. Harold Cornelius Gosnell, D.D. as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of West Texas.

September 12th

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the following: the Rev. Frederick Barton Wolf as Bishop of the Diocese of Maine; the Very Rev. William Henry Mead as Bishop of the Diocese of Delaware; the Rev. Hunley Agee Elebash as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of East Carolina.

Consent was given to Grace Church, Westwood, to mortgage in the amount of \$80,000.

Consent was given to the construction of a new church for St. Mary's, Haledon, such Consent being required by the Will of Frederick W. Budd, under which a bequest for this purpose was received.

October 17

DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK

Report to the Bishops and the 1969 Diocesan Convention

At the close of 1968 we had oversight of 9 self-supporting congregations, 24 subsidized missions and 9 aided parishes.

Highlights of the year include:

1. Parsippany, St. Gregory's: Bishop Rath dedicated the newly completed all-purpose building on November 23rd.
2. Delawanna, St. Stephen's: after a trial period of 18 months following a thorough evaluation, this mission was declared closed as of June 30, 1968.
3. Jersey City, St. Mary's: following through on the recommendation of the Department, the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen voted to cease all services as of June 30, 1968.
4. Ridgely, St. James': this congregation attained parish status and was received into union with Convention in May, 1968.
5. Delaware, St. James': steps were initiated to allow the sale of this property to the Delaware Presbyterian Church. The parish was declared dissolved at the 1968 Convention of the Diocese.
6. Project Anti-Recidivism, Jersey City: the Department contributed \$2,500 toward this program.
7. Milton-Oak Ridge, St. Gabriel's: this congregation became an organized mission on Sunday, March 3, 1968.
8. Livingston, St. Peter's: a new parking lot was constructed at a cost of \$20,000 which was contributed by the congregation.
9. Paterson, St. Aidan's: extensive renovations costing approximately \$30,000 were made to the parish house.
10. Succasunna, St. Dunstan's: Bishop Rath dedicated Palmer Hall, the new educational building named in honor of Lubin Palmer, Treasurer of the Department, on May 15th.
11. Hoboken, Trinity: the purchase of a small bus by the congregation and their friends was approved.
12. Newark, Christ: approval was given for the sale of the old church on a plot of land 68' x 50' to the Spanish Christian Missionary Alliance Church for \$17,000.
13. Committee on Urban Concerns: because the greater part of the subsidy money goes into urban congregations and because of the intense concern aroused by the present crisis in the cities, Bishop Stark appointed a committee to have this area of the Diocese as its special interest.
14. The Department was able to give \$16,000 to the Diocesan Council to help our contribution to the General Church quota.

Changes in personnel:

1. The Rev. Harold N. Cutler retired as Rector of St. Thomas', Vernon.
2. The Rev. Frank A. Cheever was appointed Priest-in-Charge of St. Thomas', Vernon.
3. The Rev. James H. B. Kenyon resigned as Vicar of St. Peter's, Mt. Arlington, to take up work in the Diocese of North Carolina.
4. The Rev. Edward Mansley resigned as Rector of St. Paul's, North Arlington, and was appointed Vicar of St. Peter's, Mt. Arlington.
