TWENTY YEARS TOGETHER

THE TWENTIETH ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE RT. REV. LELAND STARK, D.D., L.H.D. BISHOP OF NEWARK

T

You will understand, I am sure, that this Address has for me a bitter sweet taste, for it is the last official address I shall be making as your Diocesan. As has been previously announced, I am retiring on December 31st of this year, and on January 1st Bishop Rath will become your Diocesan. He is my dear friend and valued colleague, and I cannot think of a single Anglican Bishop whom I would rather succeed me than he, and I bespeak for him the same warmth of affection and loyalty that I feel you have given me these twenty years.

Phyllis and I do not plan to leave the Diocese, and we hope to purchase the smaller house in Verona, which the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties bought a little over two years ago, but as I have said before, I shall in no way attempt to interfere with the policies and operation of the Diocese. To be sure, since Bishop Rath is not planning to ask for a Suffragan or Coadjutor at this time, I shall continue to have a small part in the life of the Diocese since Bishop Rath has asked Bishop Anand and me to take a number of Confirmation services in 1974 and has also requested me to be a Consultant to the new Commission on Evangelism, an assignment which I have gladly accepted. Incidentally, I

shall say nothing about Evangelism tonight since Bishop Rath will be treating with this subject in his address tomorrow.

So I come now to my final Convention Address, which I have entitled

"Twenty Years Together."

"Twenty years together!" With such a topic one cannot entirely avoid being somewhat autobiographical, and for that I hope you will bear with me. I feel a bit like that well known movie actress who met her college roommate for the first time after ten years. At length the actress suddenly exclaimed, "My goodness, we've been together for forty minutes, and all I've done is talk about myself. Now let's talk about you — what do you think of my latest movie?"

II

Perhaps it may be of some minor interest for you to know how this

twenty year relationship began.

In 1952 I was elected to the General Convention in Boston from the Diocese of Washington. It was my first experience in that capacity. The first thing on the agenda was the election of a president of the House of Deputies, and Dean Sprouse of Kansas City was re-elected on the first ballot. As he was making his acceptance sppech, he suffered a massive coronary and within minutes was dead. Canon C. Rankin Barnes, the secretary of the House of Deputies, solemnly told us what had happened, led the stunned House in appropriate prayers, and then recessed the House until 2:30 that afternoon.

What were we to do? Immediately groups of clergy and lay deputies formed in hotel rooms all over Boston, and I found myself with delegates from Massachusetts, Virginia, Missouri, and elsewhere. Whom we should nominate was of course the sole question. We tossed around the names of a couple of dozen prominent clergy, and finally I suggested the Rev. Dr. Theodore Wedel, Warden of the College of Preachers in Washington, an outstanding theologian and scholar, well known to hundreds of our clergy who had profited from their attendance at the College of Preachers. The more we talked about Ted Wedel, the more we were sure he was the logical candidate. Then one of the group said, "Leland, you know him better than any of us — why don't you nominate him?"

The upshot of it was that I did, and Ted Wedel was overwhelmingly elected, a post which he filled with distinction for three terms.

The Convention over, we all repaired to our homes and resumed our regular work. Soon after, two of the Newark clergy and their wives were having a foursome of bridge, and the talk naturally turned to who should be the next Coadjutor of Newark. Grace Warnecke, wife of the then Dean of the Cathedral, suddenly asked, "What is the name of that Washington rector who nominated Ted Wedel and took a rather prominent part in the Convention? Maybe his name should go into the hat."

And thus it did together with a number of others. I was elected, and on June 9, 1953, I was consecrated Bishop Coadjutor of Newark. Thus our twenty years together began.

III

As I began thinking back over the many things we have done together these past twenty years, it became increasingly evident that time would allow me to speak only of a few. The first main event that came to mind was the successful Episcopal Advance Fund campaign of 1956. I was by no means the author of this project because it had been talked about long before I came on the scene. But in 1955 the time seemed ripe to push forward with such a plan, and Bishop Washburn asked me to take general charge of it. We set our goal at \$1,100,000. The campaign was approved by a Special Convention in late 1955. Only three clergy held out against it. Presently two of these joined in, and the third was overruled by his laity so that we had a 100% participation.

It was a great and exciting venture. It was over subscribed, and by the end of 1959 when all the three-year pledges had come due, the laity and the clergy had given over a million and a half for the advancement of the work of the Lord and His Church. One of the criticisms we had to lay to rest, of course, was that this was primarily a 'bricks-and-mortar' campaign. It was that, yes, but when you take a congregation out of a converted barn and help them build a new church and other facilities in which to worship and study the Christian faith; and when you take a congregation out of a one room converted schoolhouse strategically located at the intersection of three dead-end streets and help them build a new church and other facilities, the bulk of which the people themselves

are paying for (incidentally this is now an independent parish and paying its quota and more in full); and when you take a congregation with no building at all and help them construct one; and when you take a small group of Christians out of a high school cafeteria and help them build facilities that today house one of the largest congregations in the Diocese; and when you take a small congregation out of a former Methodist parsonage and help them build worship facilities of their own, I submit to you that the EAF campaign was much more than a 'bricks-and-mortar' project.

Of course, it was that too, and if you ask what the Episcopal Advance Fund, which ultimately reached \$1,500,000, accomplished, I can tell you that by means of grants and loans, it helped to build twenty-three churches and rehabilitate six more, twenty-nine parish houses, fifteen vicarages and rectories, and about ten miscellaneous projects. I could be off by a half million or more, but my unaudited estimate is that grants and loans from the Episcopal Advance Fund helped to make possible about \$6,000,000 in projects of one kind or another. And still today we have \$750,000 of it left in a revolving loan fund that has turned over at least three and a half times, and \$85,000 more has been set aside for a Conference and Retreat Center. Ultimately the Diocese will inherit one of the most beautiful mansions in the state as a possible site for it, but the dear person who has so generously willed this to us is such a wonderful and dedicated Christian that I hope it will be many years before the Diocese comes into possession of it.

So the Episcopal Advance Fund campaign was a great and exciting venture, and for its success we must thank the thousands of laity and clergy who made it possible.

IV

During the first half of my episcopacy, I became increasingly troubled about the future of Trinity Cathedral. Despite the unusually high calibre of its various deans, the sociological changes taking place in the city of Newark were such that the Cathedral parish was steadily declining in membership to the point that we would rejoice if 110 people came to the main service on Easter Day.

Then on the night of December 20, 1964, disaster struck the congregation of St. Phillip's Church on High Street in Newark as fire

completely destroyed that beautiful old church.

I met with the Vestry of St. Phillip's and also talked to the Executive Committee of Trinity Cathedral about the possibility of a merger since the locations of the two churches were only about eight blocks apart. The St. Phillip's people, however, hoped to rebuild on the same site, but as it turned out, the cost of a new church building proved to be prohibitively high.

Once again I urged the Vestry and later on, a large parish meeting to consider a merger with the Cathedral congregation, the bulk of whom seemed favorably inclined to such a consolidation. My argument to the St. Phillip's people was in summary this: "You have no church," I said, "a

most inadequate parish house, no endowment, no parking facilities, but you have lots of people. Now look at the Cathedral. It has a beautiful church that dates back to 1746, a more than adequate parish house with a chapel, a large auditorium and even a gymnasium, a sizable endowment, the best parking facilities of any church in the Diocese, but very few people. Why don't you get together?"

I am leaving out a thousand details of 'backing and filling,' but the upshot of it was that on October 2, 1966, both congregations voted to consolidate. Once again we have a fine Cathedral congregation, something I could never envisage when I came to the Diocese in 1953. We have at its head the only black dean of any cathedral in the United States, and he is a very good one, too.

V

Of course, not all experiences of twenty years in the episcopacy can be happy recollections like these, and indubitably the most harrowing days of my twenty years came during the July 1967 riot, or rebellion, and in the period immediately following.

By way of background, I should tell you that the previous fall of 1966 a committee of black people headed by Dr. Nathan Wright, then the director of our Diocesan Urban Department, and now the head of the Department of Black Studies at New York University in Albany, met with Bishop Rath, Dean Laughlin and myself to discuss the possibility of their using Cathedral House as the headquarters for the first Naional Conference on Black Power in July of 1967. I immediately raised a question about the term 'black power,' but their polite rejoinder was to remind me that white people, starting with slavery, had always exercised 'white power,' and what was wrong with black people's seeking some empowerment of their own? They envisioned, they said, a conference of about 150 to 200 responsible black leaders dispassionately discussing the particular problems that black people are facing. Seeing no objection, Bishop Rath, Dean Laughlin, and I gave our consent. However, months later, in early July of 1967 this same committee met with me again and informed me that they were considering calling off the Conference since less than fifty registrations had been received but that they wanted to wait a few more days before making a final decision.

Then the night of Wednesday, July 12th, rioting broke out in the Springfield Avenue area of Newark, and the sky was ablaze with the fires. The next night and the following rioting continued, and the lives lost among black people and police and firemen was appalling. Governor Hughes declared martial law and called in the National Guard.

On Friday of that week (July 14th) Attorney General Arthur Sills called me to ask me to meet immediately with Governor Hughes at the Roseville Armory in Newark, where he had set up temporary headquarters. The Governor was all business. "Bishop Stark," he said, "I'll come right to the point. The Conference on Black Power is due to start a week from today. I cannot think of a worse time or a worse place to have such a Conference than Newark."

Of course, I agreed with him wholeheartedly, but I told him that we had only offered Cathedral House as headquarters, that all the meetings would be held elsewhere, that I did not have the arbitrary power of a Roman Catholic bishop (Gov. Hughes is a Roman Catholic himself), but that I would do all in my power either to get the Conference called off or to help transfer it elsewhere.

This I tried to do, meeting repeatedly with Dr. Wright and the Committee, whose members agreed with me but who insisted the

Conference must go on somewhere.

Meanwhile, the Governor had been on television and radio, saying such things as "I can't think of a worse time and a worse place to hold a Conference on Black Power than in Newark, but well-intentioned people

like Bishop Stark . . . "

Finally my patience with this kind of talk wore through, and while I could not reach the Governor himself, I talked to the Attorney General, telling him to pass the word to the Governor that if he repeated that calumny one more time, I would call a press conference and tell the reporters that since the Governor had declared martial law in Newark, he alone had the authority to call off the Conference but that he did not have the political courage to do so lest it alienate black voters from his party and so was trying to palm off responsibility on me.

The reference to "well-intentioned people like Bishop Stark" was never again mentioned, and I am glad to report that Gov. Hughes and I

remain good friends.

By Tuesday, July 18th, at 4:00 P.M. the Governor declared the emergency was over and he was sending home the National Guard.

The Conference on Black Power was to begin three days later, on Friday, and now began my own Gethsemane. Should I bar them from Cathedral House or not? I asked the advice of others; the Chancellor was particularly helpful, but still others could not be reached because they were on vacation. The ultimate decision had to be mine alone.

If I told the Committee the members of the Conference would be barred from Cathedral House, it would be another rebuff to black people from 'whitey,' and the fine relationship the Diocese had been slowly building up with the black community would be wrecked. Furthermore, there might be actual danger to Cathedral House itself, for the burning of property, though greatly diminishing by now, had be no means ceased.

On the other hand, if I said, "let the Conference go on as planned," there was danger in this course also. Whereas two weeks before the rioting began, the registration was a mere forty-eight persons and the Committee had seriously considered cancelling it, by now the events in Newark had escalated the registrations into the high hundreds, many of the new registrants whom I knew to be militant radicals. Their presence and their possible conduct might easily provoke further rioting, burnings, and bloodshed.

Believe me, in this cruel dilemma I thought of you, clergy and laity alike, fully aware of the divisions I would create whatever decision I

made. Never have I faced a more agonizing decision in my life. Never have I prayed harder that God might make His will known to me. Finally, so I believe, the course became clear to me. I picked up the phone and called Dr. Wright, the chairman of the Committee. I told him, "Let's make one more effort to move the Conference elsewhere, but if we can't, let it go on as planned." The next day we made that effort, we were unsuccessful, and the Conference began with early registrants coming in late Thursday afternoon.

It was a harrowing three days for the Stark household. My wife was threatened by anonymous callers, and all through Saturday beginning at 4:00 A.M. and continuing every hour for the next twenty-four hours, someone would call, and when one of us would answer, the unknown persons would breathe heavily into the phone. In addition, I too received my full quota of threats and verbal abuse from obvious racists, but I also received many calls of support from both clergy and laity so that I had the good feeling they had participated in my decision.

On Sunday, the last day of the Conference, several hundred more militant radicals came over from the New York area to this very room of the Robert Treat Hotel, where the final session was being held. Quite a number of irresponsible and unworkable resolutions (that is,

irresponsible from my point-of-view) were shouted through.

Finally, the Conference adjourned, and the leaders came over to Cathedral House to meet with reporters and television men, most of them white. It being July, I had one of my free Sunday afternoons. I watched over television as I am sure many of you did. Then all of a sudden we heard angry shouts. The camera picked out the frightened faces of white reporters, who began jumping out of windows, not nearly so dangerous a feat as it might seem because the room was on ground level. The camera swung to film about two dozen angry blacks invading the press conference and shouting at the top of their voices. Then we saw a young black slide a kindergarten chair violently in the direction of the fleeing newsmen, and then the screen went blank and the sound with it. We never did discover who had advertently or inadvertently pulled out the plug of the television, but that was the scene that was flashed on nation-wide television and repeated over and over again on the news stories that followed the rest of the afternoon, the evening, and the next day. Commentators drew upon their imaginations, as I did myself, to describe the havoc that must have been wrought on Cathedral House.

With a heavy heart I drove down early next morning to Cathedral House, wondering in horror what I would find. As I walked from corridor to corridor, from room to room, I stared in incredulity: I had never seen Cathedral House so immaculately clean and in such perfect order as I found it that morning! Not one cent of damage had been done, not even to the kindergarten chair that had figured so prominently in the last

seconds of that television coverage!

Then what had happened came out. The invaders — and that is what they were, for they had not been invited to the Conference and were no

part of it — were members of the Mau-mau, who were at that time among the more militant of the blacks. I was told that they were highly disciplined and were trained to disrupt meetings by threats of violence but that they never committed any violence. Thus if they were arrested, they could be charged only with disrupting the peace, a misdemeanor and a minor crime, whereas if they inflicted bodily harm or damage to property, they could be charged with felony, a much more serious crime. So they committed no felony that fateful Sunday afternoon when they broke up the press conference in Cathedral House. As for the kindergarten chair slid with seeming violence along the floor after the fleeing newsmen, if you wanted to hurt someone, you wouldn't slide a small chair at him; you would pick it up and whack him over the head with it.

As for the spotlessness of Cathedral House the next day, the Committee had assigned three professional cleaners to spend the whole of Sunday night and early Monday morning to wash the walls and the windows and to make sure everything was in perfect order. Everything was.

I once heard a not very learned but very sincere Pentecostal preacher misquote Scripture by saying, "The Lord works in a mischievous way his wonders to perform." Well, there's more truth than Biblical accuracy in that sentence. As a Diocese we went through the trauma of that experience together and came away from it with as good a relationship as any Diocese has with its black community. And that is no small gain.

I have, I fear, spent an unconscionably long time on this matter, but since it was perhaps the most controversial matter in which our Diocese in our twenty years together has been involved and since I am perhaps the only one in a position to tell the complete story, I thought it ought to be on the written record although you would be amazed how many details I have left out for want of time.

I now turn to an altogether different matter. It stems from the fact that as Bishop, I am the pastor to the pastors, and naturally their well-being in their ministry and in their retirement is a prime concern to me.

When the Presiding Bishop asked me in 1966 to be a member of a special committee to study the Church Pension Fund, perhaps because I was once the chief underwriter of a small life and accident and health insurance company before I had been drawn into the ministry, I gladly accepted, for I have been vitally concerned not only with the salaries of active clergy but also with their retirement benefits as well as with pensions for disabled clergy and with pensions for widows of clergy and their children.

It would take at least an hour to tell you the whole story of our year's study, but suffice it to say that with the professional help of the nation's largest actuarial company, we were able to recommend to the Seattle Convention in 1967 no less than nineteen improvements in benefits for

retired clergy, for disabled clergy, for widows and for clergy children. And without going into details we were able to present these improvements without any increase in pension assessments.

Needless to say, both Houses of the Seattle Convention in 1967 unanimously adopted these changes, and as our Committee pointed out in its report, of which I was co-author, we had studied every other pension fund of every denomination, and with the acceptance of these nineteen important improvements, our Church Pension Fund became the best church pension fund in the country and most likely the best in the world. It was my privilege to present our report to the House of Bishops and also to move the resolution which has since resulted in the comprehensive health insurance that now covers the clergy and their families.

For some reason or another, the Church Pension Fund has recently come under considerable criticism, mostly, I regret to say, from clergy who are sadly uninformed, but if any parson dissents from what I have said, I invite him to tell me which pension fund of which church he would rather be under than ours, and I shall be glad to compare with him that one with ours. I think that if you were to ask me what is the single greatest contribution I have made to the welfare of our Church at large, it would be this effort to improve the Church Pension Fund.

·VII

There are so many other things I should like to tell you under my topic "Twenty Years Together," but time does not permit, but give me four more short paragraphs.

From my viewpoint, as I prepare for retirement at the end of this year, these twenty years together have been the happiest of my ministry. As my Washington Bishop, the late Angus Dun, used to say, "Sure, being a bishop is a hard job, but it has its compensations."

I has indeed! Certainly we do not always agree with one another, but basically we are a unified Diocese. There are no ugly churchmanship conflicts such as used to plague our Episcopal Church and our Diocese. On the whole, we have not done too badly with our missionary quota to the national Church. When I came here in 1953, Newark had never paid its missionary quota in full. We made it in 1957, two years earlier than I thought we could, we continued to pay in full for the next ten years, slipped a little behind for the next four, picked it up in full for 1971 and 1972, but I am more than a little concerned for this year. At any rate, we have generally been the eighth largest giver of all the dioceses, and that is not too bad a record.

The leadership quality of our clergy is high, and we have vastly increased the number of laity in positions of responsibility. We are living in a time of rapid change, but our clergy and laity are more open to it than in most dioceses. We are in the process of restructuring our diocesan life to make our congregations and our Diocese more effective. We are preparing for a new thrust of evangelism — and Bishop Rath will speak about this in his address tomorrow.

Twenty years together! They have included tragic times, like the heart-breaking suicides of two clergy. They have included dangerous times, like the time that I wore a bullet-proof vest under my cassock with a Pinkerton man in the next room while I conferred with a man who had threatened my life. There have been hilarious times like the Diocesan Convention many years ago when we were first considering a minimum clergy scale and the Commission had recommended a lower scale for bachelor clergy than for married clergy, and a certain bachelor clergyman objected because, as he put it, "Bachelor clergy have to pay for some things that married clergy get for free."

As you can see, these twenty years have never been dull. While not uninterruptedly happy, they have been wonderful years, and clergy and laity alike, I thank you from a full and grateful heart!

A TIME OF RENEWAL FOR OUTREACH

THE THIRD ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE RT. REV. GEORGE E. RATH, S.T.D. BISHOP COADJUTOR OF NEWARK

The Supper has ended, and, in the atmosphere of fulfilling love and fellowship that prevails, Jesus is preparing his apostles for the awful and trying experience that awaits them all. He says, "Simon, Simon! Listen! Satan has received permission to test all of you, as a farmer separates the wheat from the chaff. But I have prayed for you, Simon, that your faith will not fail. And when you turn back to me, you must strengthen your brothers." (St. Luke 22:31-32, TEV.)

A strange passage! I am taught to pray, nothing wavering, so that my prayer may be answered. And here is my Lord assuring Simon Peter that he has prayed for him so that his faith may not fail, knowing all the while that it will fail, and that Simon Peter will have to turn back to him, in the authorized version, be "converted."

Now set this passage beside another pair of verses from our Lord's prayer for his disciples. "I sent them into the world, just as you sent me into the world. And for their sake I give myself to you, in order that they, too, may truly belong to you." (St. John 17:18-19, TEV.)

The phrase which in Today's English Version is translated, "I give myself to you," reads in the King James and American Standard versions, "I sanctify myself." In the more recent translations, almost uniformly, it appears as "I consecrate myself." All the phrases imply offering, here our Lord's self-offering to the Father.

I am sure the relationship between the two passages is apparent to you. Jesus offers himself, gives himself, to the Father in order to let, in order to enable, his disciples to offer themselves. Peter must turn back to Jesus, must be "converted," before he can strengthen his brother apostles. One person cannot help another until there has been a personal renewal, dedication, and self-offering in that person's own life. A Church that sets out to evangelize the world and to confront every person with Christ must first recognize and respond to the Gospel in its own life and must confront the world, not with the words of love alone, but with the example of love.

As this diocese is completing the first century of its own existence, there is a new interest and emphasis upon the Church's mission in and to the world. Or, rather, there is a revival of an old conviction that the Church itself is a mission to the world and has been sent to preach the Gospel to all nations. Preaching the good news of God's love for the world, a love revealed in the gift of his Son and in that Son's ministry among us, his suffering and death, his resurrection and ascension, preaching the good news of reconciling love of God that draws mankind back to God and binds all men and women in a fellowship and a family which transcends all the bounds and barriers of locality, nationality, race, language, or culture, even the barrier of time, this is the Church's

evangel, its good news. This is evangelism.

Last year, Bishop Stark expressed the hope that this year, when he will be completing more than twenty years as a bishop in the Diocese of Newark and more than fifteen years as its diocesan bishop, might be "characterized by a new and vigorous thrust of evangelism." This year, as you must know, is a year in which many religious bodies in the United States are engaged in an evangelistic enterprise which has taken the name, "Key 73." You may recall the definition of the purpose of evangelism which appeared in the report of The Commission on Evangelism to the General Convention of 1961. Bishop Stark was the secretary of that commission.

"One. it is to draw unchurched people into active Christian life in the fellowship of the Church, with commitment to Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour."

"Two, it is to strengthen the spiritual lives of those already in the body of the Church and to deepen their dedication to our Lord and His Church."

"Three, it is to send Christian people forth, in the power of the Holy Spirit, into the world so that the Gospel may be brought to bear on every aspect of individual and corporate life."

Every one of the goals expressed in that report a dozen years ago is valid for the Church today. It is still our mission to draw unchurched people into active Christian life in the fellowship of the Church, with commitment to Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour. It is always our hope that we may "strengthen the spiritual lives of those already in the body of the Church." It has always been the Church's commission "to send Christian people forth, in the power of the Holy Spirit so that the Gospel may be brought to bear on every aspect of individual and corporate life."

But, if I may take slight issue with the Commission's report, it seems to confuse the purpose of evangelism with the means. The purpose, the goal, of evangelism is to proclaim the redeeming and reconciling love of God in such ways that "unchurched people" are drawn into the family and fellowship of Christ's Church. Renewing and strengthening the spiritual lives of those already in the Church and sending them out, in the power of the Holy Spirit, to bring the Gospel to bear upon every aspect of life — these are the means, not ends.

It is the world that God loves that is the target of an evangelism which proclaims and demonstrates his love. The Church, the Body of Christ in the world, is the agent through which God's love is proclaimed and demonstrated as it was through the human life and death of Jesus more than nineteen centuries ago. A Church, whose members have been renewed and strengthened in the Spirit, a Church conscious of its mission to the world and ready for it, is the means, and the only means, by which those who stand outside the Church will be brought into its fellowship and share its commitment to Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour.

First, I would enter two caveats on the subject of evangelism generally. As we talk about drawing "unchurched people" into the Church, we must be careful not to mistake our goal and purpose as being an effort to increase the number of members in the institutional church, and nothing more. "Key 73" has come to the fore at a time when the institutional church, in almost all its denominational forms, is acutely aware that its rate of growth has fallen behind the rate of growth of the general population, that there has been a marked and serious falling off in church attendance, that its financial situation is becoming critical. There is a natural temptation for any one of us to hope that a successful evangelistic campaign will fill the pews and the offering plates of the parish churches once again. This can never be the primary objective. If it is, we shall lose even if we accomplish it. We had large congregations, soaring membership. We built large and beautiful churches, parish houses, educational buildings, and we are still paying for many of them, those of us who are still around. For we failed to build in our people a true love for God, a real allegiance to Jesus Christ, or an honest concern for one another. Getting members alone is not a proper motivation of evangelism. Evangelism is a force and a power for witness that sends the Church out into the world to say to all and sundry, "God loves you," and to prove that love by its own example, by its own death if need be. Only after the Church has done that, can the Church dare hope to bring the world into its Lord's fold.

Secondly, I am particularly grateful to that 1961 Commission on Evangelism for its insistence upon the fact that the Gospel is to be "brought to bear on every aspect of individual and corporate life." In a recent issue of The Living Church, a journal which prides itself on not being a house organ of the Episcopal Church, there is an article by a gentleman sharply critical of certain members of the Executive Council who are, he feels, too deeply committed to the General Convention's Special Program to "understand fully where churchpeople are and what they really want." ("An Uneasy Hope," by Harry C. Griffith, TLC, May 6, 1973.) Mr. Griffith's "heart sank" at someone's remark, "We must maintain a balance between piety and social action." Mr. Griffith continues in an observation in which I should like to concur, "The Church was clearly calling, not for a balance between these positions, but for a recognition that they are both essential parts of the Christian life, the vertical and horizontal directions in which we concurrently reach if we are wholly in Jesus. I suspect that many of us have mistaken piety for Pharasaism, and have rejected it. Others have seen social involvement as simply humanism, and will have nothing to do with that. The Church is saying that the whole person in Christ loves God and his neighbor, and is calling us all to wholeness."

If churchpeople are really calling for a recognition that both piety and social action belong together in the Christian life, then Mr. Griffith and I are in accord. But no one can be the communications officer of the Diocese of Central Florida and director of the Bible Reading Fellowship in the

United States and not be aware of the fact that many churchpeople have seized upon the present recrudescence of emphasis upon evangelism as a welcome antitdote to the Church's "meddling" in social concerns. They want to get back to what they conceive to be the "real business" of the Church, the salvation of individual souls. Mr. Griffith is uneasy with what appears to be the Executive Council's preoccupation with social action. I am uneasy over the exclusive focus upon the individual and the individual's salvation that has been characteristic of so many evangelistic programs.

Evangelism is not a turning away from the Church's concern and stake in society. I said earlier that the whole world is the target of evangelism. Human institutions and customs and habits must be redeemed as well as human souls. Reinhold Niebuhr pointed out a generation ago how small is the hope for "moral man" in an "immoral society." Our society, as well as ourselves, stand in need of redemption. Both self and society yearn for reconciliation. The Christian concern that led this Episcopal Church in 1967 to accept its Presiding Bishop's challenge at the General Convention in Seattle and to attempt, at least, to "take its place, humbly and boldly, alongside of, and in support of, the dispossessed and oppressed peoples of this country for the healing of our national life" — this concern must not be lost or abandoned in the newly rediscovered zeal for individual pietism and the singing of gospel songs that celebrate the joy of a relationship in which there's just you and me, Lord, just you and me!

Personal renewal and even the renewal of the Church are not the goals of evangelism. They are the means to evangelism. A Church or a diocese that sets out to "do the work of an evangelist" had better prepare itself for the job. "For their sakes," Jesus said, "I give myself to you. I sanctify, I consecrate myself." To Peter He said, "When you turn back to me, you must strengthen your brothers."

I have been greatly encouraged in the "conversations" I have held with the clergy and with representative lay persons to discover that. among other concerns we share, two at least are paramount. (Incidentally, I recommend this free and open exchange of views and opinions to parish clergy and their congregations. It can be a chastening experience, it can be a constructive experience.) Two concerns that seem to be shared by all are a concern for outreach and a concern for renewal. We are committed to the outreach that Bishop Stark's call to evangelism initiated and expressed, and we are concerned about renewal in our personal lives, in the lives of the congregations to which we belong, and in the life of the diocese and of the general Church. We are deeply aware of the need for renewal in our own lives and in the life of our Church, for we know that until this renewal takes place we have precious little to offer to others. We must be converted, we must turn back to Christ, before we can hope to lead others to Him. For their sakes, we need to give ourselves, to consecrate our lives, to Him.

I am glad that I do not have to say this as if I were laying a charge upon you, a preacher exhorting his flock. We share a common concern and a common need for renewal in faith, for rebirth in the Spirit. Almost everywhere I have gone in the past several months, men and women, clergy and lay, individually and groups, have expressed this same need for a sense of renewal in their personal lives and in the corporate life of the church.

The newly formed Commission on Evangelism, charged with carrying out Bishop Stark's call for "a new and vigorous thrust of evangelism," decided at its first meeting that such a program cannot be launched without involving the clergy and the people of the diocese in a preliminary period of self-renewal in commitment to Christ. It is not my province to tell you how this commission will try to carry out its work. I may say that it seems likely that we shall use the fall of 1973 as a period of intensive individual and group preparation for the more extensive program that will begin in 1974. And I am very happy to confirm the fact that Bishop Stark has accepted our invitation to serve as Consultant to the Commission on Evangelism during those first months of his official "retirement." Both on my own behalf and on behalf of the people of the diocese he has served so well and so long, I am most deeply grateful to Bishop Stark for his willingness to undertake this assignment. And I pray for his strength to carry it out.

Rules of Order

98TH ANNUAL CONVENTION MAY 12TH & 13TH, 1972

CONVENTION COMMITTEES

- The following Convention Committees, consisting of clergymen and lay persons, shall be appointed by the President:
 - A. Arrangements
 - B. Rules of Order
 - C. Elections
 - D. Resolutions
 - E. Dispatch of Business
 - F. To Certify Minutes
- II. The President, Vice-President, and Secretary of the Convention shall be members, ex-officio, of all Convention Committees.
- III. The Convention Committees shall be empowered to take appropriate action prior to, and during, the next Annual Convention, as well as any special Convention held during their year of appointment.

Arrangements

- IV. The Committee on Arrangements shall be responsible for receiving post convention recommendations, and from such recommendations to make referrals in the following areas:
 - A. To the Ecclesiastical Authority-recommendations pertaining to location, date, and length of sessions.
 - B. To the Committee on Rules of Order-recommendations pertaining to the legislative procedure,
 - C. To the Committee on Elections—recommendations pertaining to nomination and election procedure.
 - D. To the Committee on Resolutions—recommendations pertaining to the resolution procedure.
 - E. To the Committee on Dispatch of Business—recommendations pertaining to the agenda and calendar of business.

The Committee shall recommend to the Diocesan Council the procedures and arrangements for the Pre-convention meetings of Deputies, and shall be responsible for all physical arrangements of the Convention.

Rules of Order

V. The Committee on Rules of Order shall be responsible for the Rules of Order.

Elections

- VI. The Committee on Elections shall be responsible for the following nomination and election procedures at the Annual Convention:
 - A. The Secretary of the Convention shall send out in the Call, the time and place of the Convention, a list and job description of the offices to

be filled by election, the names of the incumbents of these offices, and an official nomination form. This Call shall be sent out at least one hundred and twenty (120) days before the date of Convention to each elerical member of the Convention, and to each Lay Deputation whose certificate has been transmitted to the Secretary, as provided in Canon 1. The Call shall be printed in THE NEWARK CHURCHMAN.

- B. Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations for any office or offices to be filled by Convention, shall, at least ninety (90) days before the date of Convention, submit the same in writing to the Secretary on the official nomination form. The nominator shall also furnish on the official nomination form the nominee's qualifications for the office sought.
- C. The Committee, from the list of nominations as furnished to it by the Secretary, shall prepare sufficient ballots marked "Sample" for each Clerical and Lay Deputy entitled to a seat in the Convention. These "sample" ballots together with the nominee's qualifications shall be mailed by the Secretary to each Deputation at least sixty (60) days before the date of the Convention.
- D. If there be any office for which no nomination has been made on the "sample" ballot, any Deputy may file with the Secretary the name of one candidate for any such office on the official nomination form. Such nominations may be filed up to twenty one (21) days before the date of the Convention. The Committee shall announce the names of such nominees prior to the distribution of the official ballot.
- E. At the beginning of the opening session the Committee shall report to the Convention in the form of an official ballot the names of the nominees. The arrangement of such names shall be determined by lot in each order.
- F. After each list of nominees as many blank spaces shall be left as there are vacancies to be filled. These blanks are provided so that any voter may use them for a "write-in" vote.
- G. Only official ballots may be used in elections, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. Since the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot, no vote shall be counted in its class on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast:

Resolutions

- VII. The Committee on Resolutions shall be responsible for receiving all resolutions without exception.
 - A. All resolutions to be considered for action by the Annual Convention shall be submitted to the Secretary of the Convention in writing and signed by a Deputy not less than ninety (90) days before the date of Convention. Resolutions should be submitted on white 8½ by 11 paper, typed and double spaced, in a standard form of three clear sections: the "whereas", dealing with the resolution background, the "resolved", naming the action desired, and the "further resolved", providing for the implementation of the resolution if adopted. After the expiration of the ninety (90) day deadline the Secretary shall transmit to the Committee all resolutions submitted to him.
 - B. The Committee shall collate all resolutions dealing with obviously similar subjects and will invite the submitters to meet and discuss such collation.
 - C. The Committee shall submit its report to the Secretary seventy-five (75) days before the date of Convention recommending the adoption or rejection of each resolution proposed, or the adoption of any such

- resolution as amended or collated by the Committee. This report shall be mailed by the Secretary of each Deputation at least sixty (60) days before the date of Convention.
- D. Resolutions will be permitted from the floor only when they carry a clear statement in writing of the emergency that leads to the request for their consideration and only by a two-thirds vote.

Dispatch of Business

VIII. The Committee on Dispatch of Business shall be responsible for the Calendar of Business. The Committee shall always be entitled to the floor on business pertaining to that Committee.

To Certify Minutes

 At the close of Convention a Committee shall be appointed to review and certify the correctness of the minutes.

ON DECORUM AND DEBATE

- X. Except when in conflict with the Constitution or Canons or any Rule herein contained, the latest edition of "Robert's Rules of Order" shall govern the interpretation of these rules and the procedure to follow.
- XI. No motion shall be considered as before Convention unless seconded and, when required by the President, reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
- XII. When any member is about to speak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
- XIII. No member shall speak more than twice in the same debate without leave of the Convention (except the mover, who is entitled to reply).
- XIV. If any member in speaking or action transgresses the rules of the Convention, the President shall call him to order, and he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
- XV. The following motions shall have priority in order listed. The mover
 - -cannot interrupt a member who has the floor.
 - -must be recognized, and
 - -the motion must be seconded
 - A. To Adjourn or To Recess

 - B. To Lay on Table or To Table

 Not debatable—majority vote

 - Not debatable-majority vote
- J. To Reconsider-(must be made on day the vote is taken)
 - 1. Must be moved and seconded by ones who voted in majority
 - 2. Debatable-two-thirds vote

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

- XVI. On motion duly made and passed, the Convention may go into Committee of the Whole for the consideration of any matter. The President shall designate some member of the Convention to act as Chairman of the Committee, which, when in session, shall be governed by these rules.
 - A. A motion to rise and to report to the Convention, with or without leave to sit again, may be made at any time, and shall take precedence of all other motions, and shall be decided without debate. No such motion once made shall be renewed until further proceeding shall have taken place in the Committee.
 - B. A motion that a vote be taken at some designated time may be made and be disposed of without debate at any time, but as before provided a motion to report to the Convention shall take precedence.
 - C. No motion to lay on the table shall be entertained. .

REPORTS

- XVII. No printed matter of any kind shall be distributed at the Convention or placed on the seats except by the authority of the President or Secretary.
- XVIII. All reports shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending Convention action shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.
 - XIX. Reports when submitted in Convention shall be read by title only unless the reading be for the better transaction of business.

THE WORKING PROGRAM BUDGET FOR 1973

WHEREAS the Diocesan Council in order to follow the direction of the Diocesan Convention of 1972 in applying the priorities of the Program Budget adopted a "pro tem" working budget on January 31, 1973 of \$594,216.00; and

WHEREAS the most up-to-date total of pledges and cash from congregations total \$609,000 — which by past experience must be discounted by 5% for non-payment, therefore yielding only \$578,550 during 1973; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Diocesan Convention adopt a working

budget of \$578,550; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the reduction of \$15,666 be effected by directing the Diocesan Council to apply the same principle proposed in the 1974 budget, namely to insure proper weight to the National Church's asking — we propose that the \$325,000 be apportioned on the same basis as the amounts of Essential, Desirable A, B and Citems to be spent within the Diocese.

Applying the above principle cited in the resolution and revealed in these figures the National Church would receive Essential \$235,818 plus Desirable A \$38,276 for a total of \$274,094 instead of \$289,000 as directed by the 1972 Convention.

Since the Essential and Desirable A items of the entire Program Function total \$599,064, the Diocesan Council will be able to fund all Essential items and \$24,721 of the Desirable A items of the In-Diocesan Program. A reduction of \$20,514 has already been effected by administrative action in programs of the Department of Missions and the now-inoperative Department of Urban Work.

RESOLUTIONS ON CLERGY SALARIES

On motion by the Reverend Hayward Levy, chairman of the Standing Commission to Study Clergy Salaries, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolution I

WHEREAS the Convention's mandated increases in minimum salaries for clergymen of the Diocese of Newark during the past three years barely have kept up with the increase in the cost of living for this area as reported in official government indices,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that subject to the provisions of Resolution III below, the 99th Convention of the Diocese of Newark adjust minimum salary scales at all levels for 1974 to effect an increase of 5.5% over corresponding scales adopted for 1973, as indicated below:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all increments due to age or length of service shall, in fact, become effective at the beginning of the fiscal year following the date upon which the clergyman becomes eligible for such increases either by reason of length of service or age; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in addition to the appropriate cash salary, all clergy shall continue to receive standard allowances and perquisites established by previous Conventions, as follows:

- (a) Suitable housing, properly maintained
- (b) Heat
- (c) Electricity
- (d) Water
- (e) Gas (if necessary)

(f) Local telephone service, if required for parish purposes

(g) Auto allowance (\$1200 minimum, according to 1973 standards) BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Convention continue the policy established in 1970 that all clergy receiving minimum cash salaries shall receive the additional sum of \$100 per year per dependent child (as defined by I.R.S. regulations), up to a limit of four (4) children; and that these allowances be treated as regular salary in establishing disbursement schedules.

Resolution II

BE IT RESOLVED that this Convention recommend that in cases where clergymen currently are receiving a salary above 1973 minimum standards, they likewise receive a salary increase of 5.5%, or of an amount equal to the cost of living increase in this area in 1973, whichever is higher, such salary increase to be effective January 1, 1974.

Resolution IV

WHEREAS the continuing education of the clergy is of vital importance both to the quality of ministry provided to a congregation and to the development of the skills of the clergyman; and

WHEREAS numerous opportunities exist for the continuing education

of the clergy both in theological and related fields,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the 99th Convention of the Diocese of Newark urges the Vestries and Executive Committees of the Parishes and Missions of the Diocese to encourage their clergy to

participate in programs of continuing education; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that to implement such a program, each Parish and Mission make available annually a minimum of 1 week and a sum of not less than \$200.00 to be used for continuing education of the clergy under contract to said specific congregation. Such education shall be selected from programs approved by the Diocesan Commission on Ministry or, if in a related field, with the approval of the Vestry or Executive Committee. In the event of a specific program requiring more time or funds than are annually allotted, the clergyman may be permitted to accumulate the annual time and funds for a period not to exceed four years.

Resolution III which directed the Diocesan Council "to adjust further upward the minimum scales shown in Resolution I if - the cost of living index - shows an increase in excess of 5.5 per cent" was defeated by a vote of 145 "Ayes" and 170 "Nays."

In response to the report of the Diocesan Standing Commission to Study Clergy Salaries the following resolution was adopted on motion by the Reverend David R. Covell, Jr., and Leslie Yates:

WHEREAS the salaries of parochial clergy are a continuing central concern to the Church as evidenced by this report of the diocesan clergy salary commission; and

WHEREAS every recent national and diocesan study of the problems of parish priests underlines the high priority of the financial problem for

clergy families (i.e. the chronic condition of deprivation);

BE IT RESOLVED that this Convention memorialize members of both Houses of the General Convention meeting this fall in Louisville to return home and give support and encouragement to clergy associations to press for more responsible salaries for all parochial clergy; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Convention memorialize both Houses of the General Convention to urge the Bishops and Clerical and Lay Deputies to motivate each diocese to enable its own clergy salary commissions to be in communication with and to work in cooperation with similar commissions of dioceses in their respective Provinces (i.e. metropolitan dioceses with metropolitan dioceses, non-metropolitan dioceses with non-metropolitan dioceses); and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that our diocesan clergy salary commission be commended for its work to date and that it continue to

press for more responsible salaries in this diocese.

The evening session adjourned at 11:01 o'clock.

SATURDAY, MORNING SESSION

Following prayers the Convention met, pursuant to adjournment motion, at 9:00 o'clock with the Right Reverend the Bishop Coadjutor of Newark in the chair.

RESOLUTIONS OF NEW MATTER

On motion by the Reverend Archie M. Palmer, Jr., the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS the Right Reverend Leland Stark is our Bishop and serves as the focus for our Diocese, and

WHEREAS Bishop Stark has sustained sudden illness during the 99th Convention of the Diocese of Newark and has been hospitalized, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the 99th Convention of the Diocese send its affectionate best wishes to Bishop Stark and assure him of our prayers for him in his present illness.

The Convention by vote suspended the Rules of Order, and the Chair referred a Resolution from the House of Prayer to the Committee on Resolutions.

ASSESSMENT BUDGET

Upon presentation of the Episcopal and Administrative Functions of the Program and Budget for 1974 by Mr. John N. Page, Treasurer, the Convention resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole to consider these functions and to rise at 10:20 o'clock. Dr. Malcolm Talbott was appointed chairman, the Reverend John R. Edler, recorder.

On motion by Mr. John Page. Treasurer, the following resolution was adopted: WHEREAS the Diocesan Council is directed by Canon 5, Section 4 (h), to provide for an assessment on the Parishes and Missions to meet the episcopal and administrative expenses of the Diocese, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Convention approve the proposed

assessment budget for 1974 and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Diocesan Council be hereby directed to levy an assessment on Parishes and Missions of the Diocese at such rate as to cover the amount of \$424,171.

QUOTA BUDGET

Upon presentation of the Program Function for 1974 by Mr. John N. Page, Treasurer, the Convention resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole to consider the Program Function, and to rise at 11:55 o'clock. Dr. Malcolm Talbott was appointed chairman, the Reverend John R. Edler, recorder.

On motion by Mr. John N. Page, Treasurer, the following resolutions were

adopted:

WHEREAS the Diocesan Council is charged with responsibility of preparing a budget covering the program functions of the Diocese and General Church for the ensuing year, therefore be it

RESOLVED that the Convention approve the 1974 Program Function

Budget of \$796,561.

WHEREAS Title 1, Canon 4, Section 6 (d), of the General Convention provides that in each Diocese a definite financial objective shall be allotted to each Parish and Mission as its share of the Program of the Church, therefore be it further

RESOLVED that the Diocesan Council be authorized to designate the quota for each Parish and Mission based upon the average amount of the

current expenses for the past three years.

The Right Reverend Kenneth Anand, Vicar of the Church of the Transfiguration, Towaco, led the Convention in its noon day prayers.

SECOND REPORT ON ELECTIONS

The Reverend John Stanton reported on the Bishop Leland Strak Pavilion at Christ Hospital in Jersey City.

The Convention recessed at 12:18 o'clock

Luncheon was served at the tables.

SATURDAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

The Convention reconvened at 1:00 o'clock with the Bishop Coadjutor in the Chair.

The Reverend William Strain, chairman, reported for the Bishop Stark Honors Committee.

The Reverend James G. Pendorf reported for the Stewardship Task Force.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND CANONS

On motion by the Chancellor, Mr. Charles Kappes, chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons the following was adopted:

·To amend Canon 2 as follows:

To delete present Section 1

To renumber present Sections 2, 3, 4 & 5 to read Sections 1, 2, 3 & 4. An amendment to Canon 8, Section 6, making it mandatory for a vestryman to be a communicant was defeated.

On motion by Mr. Kappes, the following was adopted:

WHEREAS a waiting period of one year after a final decree of divorce or annulment before applying for a marital judgment in the Episcopal Church causes hardship for many communicants;

BE IT RESOLVED that this 99th Convention of the Diocese of Newark memorialize General Convention to amend Title 1, Canon 18, Sec. 2(a) by deleting from the penultimate sentence the words 'and that at least one year shall have elapsed from the date that the decree became final'."

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

A motion to limit debate to 15 minutes was defeated.

TO RESCIND THE RESOLUTION ON ORDINATION OF WOMEN

After a request, pursuant to Article II, Section 7, of the Diocesan Constitution by the Reverend Messrs. John R. Purnell, Frederick R. Gutekunst, John J. Negrotto, Harry B. Whitley, and William R. Wetherell for a vote by orders the resolution to rescind the 98th Annual Convention's Resolution on Ordination of Women was defeated by the following vote:

Clergy order "Ayes" 65 "Nays" 60 Lay order "Ayes" 120 "Nays" 172

RESOLUTION ON REPATRIATION

A resolution on repatriation of young men who had demonstrated their abhorrence of war was defeated by a vote of 185 "Ayes" and 213 "Nays."

A motion was adopted limiting future speakers on resolutions to three minutes each.

"TO PUT THE OPERATING EXPENSES OF SEMINARIES INTO THE GENERAL CHURCH PROGRAM"

On motion by Mrs. Nancy Hawkins, chairman of the Committee on Resolutions the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS the education of the ministry of the Church is the responsibility of the whole Church, and

WHEREAS the independent seminaries of the Episcopal Church are faced with mounting deficits and impending financial crises, and

WHEREAS their survival is essential for the continuance of a well-

educated ministry, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Diocese of Newark in Convention assembled on May 11 and 12, 1973, hereby memorializes the General Convention of the Episcopal Church to assemble in September, 1973, to consider as a top priority item the recommendations contained in the Report of the Board for Theological Education submitted to General Convention of 1970 (P. 736, Journal of the General Convention) which "asked the Executive Council and General Convention to put operating expenses of seminaries into the General Church Program" by making adequate appropriations in the budget submitted to the 1973 General Convention of the Episcopal Church.

SPECIAL COMMISSION TO SEEK WAYS TO RAISE ADDITIONAL DIOCESAN FUNDS

On motion by the Reverend Albert O. Judd the following resolution which was a substitute for a resolution reported out by committee, was adopted:

WHEREAS for many years the working budget of the diocese has invariably been significantly lower than the budget adopted by Convention because of underpledging to quotas growing out of that budget, and because of the non-payment of many pledges made, therefore be it

RESOLVED that a special Commission be appointed to seek ways to raise additional funds to make possible the meeting of the budgets adopted by the Convention; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Commission shall report not later than the next Annual Diocesan Convention with specific recommendations for action that will give promise of achieving the objective.

RETURN OF DEPUTIES TO PROVINCIAL SYNOD

On motion by Mrs. Hawkins the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS the Ninety-eighth Annual Convention's Resolution to the Synod of the Second Province has served a constructive purpose, and

WHEREAS the administrative expense of maintaining a Provincial Synod is no longer disproportionate to the scope of the program, and

WHEREAS our ceasing to send deputies to the Synod is a self-inflicted form of "taxation-without-representation," since we are paying our Assessment, and

WHEREAS prudent use of resources in these times of growing decentralization in the National Church's Program and Budget requires active participation at Provincial levels, therefore be it

RESOLVED that the Diocese of Newark send deputies to the Provincial Synod as of June 1, 1973, and be it further

RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Convention communicate this action to the Secretary of the Synod.

TO RESCIND DIOCESAN RESOLUTIONS ON GAMBLING

A substitute resolution for two other resolutions which called for the rescinding of Diocesan Resolutions on Gambling was defeated by a vote of 174 "Ayes" and 191 "Navs."

"AMNESTY TO DRAFT RESISTERS AND DESERTERS"

A resolution suggesting a course of action that the Diocese of Newark should take in defense of draft resisters and deserters was defeated.

ON THE MINISTRY OF THE LAITY

On motion by Mrs. Hawkins the following resolution was adopted as amended: WHEREAS the ministry of the laity has not been adequately understood in the work of the Church, and

WHEREAS the Commission of Ministry spends the major portion of its

time on ministry as it pertains to the ordained, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the ministry of the laity be subject of intense

study during the next year, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Commission on Ministry study and develop the ministry of the laity during the next year, co-opting members of other Diocesan departments and agencies if necessary.

ANNUAL PROCESS OF EVALUATION AND LONG RANGE PLANNING

On motion by Mrs. Hawkins the following resolution was adopted as amended: WHEREAS the 98th Convention of the Diocese of Newark resolved to "deal with the problem of the lack of common life and integrated strategy and planning among neighboring congregations, in the Parish Self Study Resolution of 1972,"

BE IT RESOLVED that the 99th Convention of the Diocese of Newark hereby call upon each congregation to enter into an ongoing process of evaluation and long range planning. The Diocesan Council shall provide

as a resource a procedure to achieve this goal.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the congregations complete this study, develop an integrated strategy for mission of the District and its several congregations, and report the results at the District level to the Diocesan Council by January 1st, 1974. The Diocesan Council will then mobilize the resources of the Diocese to support those strategies and integrate them into the goals of the Diocese.

TO REAFFIRM A PRIORITY FOR THE CHURCH'S MISSION TO THE POOR AND TO URBAN AREAS

On motion by the deputation from the House of Prayer the following resolution

was adopted as amended:

WHEREAS the Bishop Coadjutor, in his address called for a dedication and renewal of parishes and church people in order that they may be offered in service in the power of the Spirit, and

WHEREAS Christ's Body the Church continues in the need of repenting itself of the attitudes and processes, individually and corporately, by

which racism is allowed to grow like a cancer, and

WHEREAS the needs of people in high density, low income urban areas of our land continue to demand the immediate compassionate and effective attention of all persons of good will, and

WHEREAS there is an increasing mood of impatience and turning aside from the needs of the poor, the aged, the oppressed, and from the cities in which they live,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that it is the sense of the Diocese of

Newark in Convention assembled that its commitment to give appropriate high priority to the mission to the poor, the deprived and the oppressed people found in the urban concentration areas or wherever

else they may be forced to live, be reaffirmed, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Convention call upon all churchpeople to shun attitudes of indifference, to face squarely, with the help of God and each other, the vast problems besetting the urban poor, and to enter the difficult task of reassessing and changing attitudes and processes whenever and wherever found to be inhibiting the union with each other that God has given to us all in Christ Jesus, His Son.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1972

There were 8 meetings of the Standing Committee held during 1972.

January 26th

DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK

TO: The Members of the 1973 Diocesan Convention

FROM: Archdeacon Grant

Ninety thousand Episcopalians have an investment in the "mission work" of the Diocese of Newark and of the General Church. The budgets presented to each Convention list the cold and seemingly impersonal solution to the discharge of our "duty" as Christians.

If we are really to understand our place in this family affair, it must then be remembered that behind every figure there is a human story. And of the 74 Program items listed, 32 have to do with the life and work of the congregations under the Bishops and the Department of Missions. These are listed on pages 6 through 9, items 20 through 52, in the proposed budgets. There are, in addition, 8 self-supporting mission

congregations.

It might be well to remember that in whatever physical or sociological area Christians work the New Testament divine commission ought always to be the rule. The history of the Church in New Jersey bears this out with varying degrees of success since the founding of the one Diocese of New Jersey in 1815. In 1874 the State was divided into two Dioceses, ours then being called the Diocese of Northern New Jersey, and the reading of the records reminds us that we are always in a state of change. The first day of those earlier Conventions was devoted to the general business of the Diocese with reports and resolutions. The second day the Convention convened as the Diocesan Missionary Council, during which reports were heard from the Board of Missions concerning the spiritual, financial, and statistical aspects of the work being done. These were received from the Archdeaconry of Jersey City, combining Hudson, Bergen, and Passaic Counties, and the Archdeaconry of Newark which encompassed the other four counties. In those days title to all real and personal property was held by the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties. The Board of Missions received annually money for the support of missionary work. This meant supplements to clergy salaries. The Board of Church Extension met five times a year and was in charge of buildings, land, repairs, and other material matters for which it made special appeals. Before 1903 a Canon gave the Board of Church Extension power to collect money for Diocesan missionary purposes. The Board of Missions was responsible to the Convention, and its members were elected by the Convention from the very beginning of the Diocese. These members met ten times during the year.

In 1914 the Board of Missions and Church Extension was incorporated with the

following words:

The purpose for which this corporation is formed is to exercise general jurisdiction in all financial and secular interests pertaining to the Missionary work of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark, subject to such civil and ecclesiastical provisions as may otherwise be made applicable thereto under the constitution and canons of said Diocese: and to that end, to receive, acquire, hold, sell, assign or transfer by lease, mortgage, deed or otherwise, real and personal property of the Church: to erect buildings, and to borrow money for the purpose of building and repairing buildings, and to pledge the land and buildings as security therefor.

The approval and concurrence of the Bishop of the Diocese shall be necessary for the purchasing and mortgaging of real estate, or the erection of buildings thereon: for the incurring of any indebtedness for the foregoing purposes, and for the appropriation of money for purposes other than missionary salaries in aid of the Missionary work of the Diocese.

This incorporation was brought about to tie together what was until that time a fragmented multiplication of local parochial efforts and remove the emphasis from the congregational and convocational to an Episcopal or Diocesan emphasis.

In the ensuing years the Convention grew to have several boards and committees such as the Board of Missions and Church Extension, the Board of Religious Education, Committee for Social Concerns, City Mission Society, and as a most important factor, a Finance and Advisory Board. In 1955 the Diocese was reorganized into the Bishop and Council under which Departments were established.

In all these actions there is hidden an intense and personal story about each of the congregations. There was never a time, except during the burgeoning years following World War II, when there was enough money to answer the needs of the people in northern New Jersey. Today is no exception, and the traditional distinction between urban, suburban, and non-metropolitan churches becomes less and less clear. Likewise there is an overlapping between the several kinds of ministry for which moneys have been asked for and appropriated. The story behind the figures may be that of the struggle of a handful of God's people working heroically to continue the ministry of a small country church or to maintain an exciting and new ministry in the inner city. Or it may be the bold and adventuresome story of some new experimental project such as the new Paterson Episcopal Mission. Or it may be a design to relate the resources of the Church to the great social upheavals which bend and threaten to break our society. In some instances it is a story of our reaching out to work cooperatively with our brothers in Christ under whatever label they may be worshipping. But in any case, the story needs to be heard.

By historical design the Department of Missions has been in the business of granting subsidies, after due evaluation, to congregations in order that these congregations may make their presence felt in the name of Christ in the several communities. These congregations may be broken down into two categories:

- 1 MISSION CONGREGATIONS, title to whose real and personal property, except operating funds, is held in the name of either the Department of Missions or The Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties.
- 2. AIDED PARISHES, which are corporations in their own names but which depend upon their fellow Episcopalians for the continuation of their programs. Each has a story to tell, and each will have, we trust, a chance to tell it as they go through the process of self-evaluation and then review by the Department of Missions as well as by the Council Planning Group on Congregational Development and Life.

In the midst of anxiety about financial support, confusion over new budget methods, and the desire to move forward under any and all conditions, we are called upon to do our utmost and so fulfill the law of Christ, which is to bear one another's burdens.

Pious language does not produce more than an emotional twinge, so just as a matter of information I want to give you a very broad overview and summary of some of the things that go to make up the multitude of details in the daily life of the Department of Missions.

The ultimate goal of most congregations is to attain parish status by assuming more and more of the total costs of being an Episcopal Church. These are operating costs, debt reduction costs, and full assessment and quota payments; in other words, operating under a balanced local budget. Since 1960

- -10 missions have attained parish status: St. James', Ridgefield; Good Shepherd, Midland Park; Incarnation, Jersey City; St. David's, Kinnelon; St. Andrew's, Lincoln Park; St. Andrew's, Harrington Park; St. Luke's, Haworth; Atonement, Fair Lawn; Christ Church, Totowa Borough; and St. Peter's, Washington;
- -5 missions have become self-supporting: St. Michael's, Wayne; St. Mary's, Sparta; St. Peter's, Livingston; St. James', Hackettstown; and The Saviour, Denville;
- -3 missions have week-end self-supporting ministries: St. Cyprian's, Hackensack; Grace, East Rutherford; and St. John's, Englewood;

-and 22 congregations are now receiving subsidy: St. Mary's, Belvidere; St. Joseph's, Byram; St. Anthony's, Hackensack; Good Shepherd, Hamburg; Trinity, Hoboken; St. Luke's, Hope: Grace, Van Vorst, Jersey City; St. Gabriel's, Milton-Oak Ridge; St. Peter's, Mt. Arlington; House of Prayer, Newark; St. Andrew's, Newark; St. Barnabas', Newark; Transfiguration, North Bergen; St. Alban's, Oakland-Franklin Lakes; St. Matthew's, Paramus; St. Gregory's, Parsippany-Troy Hills; Good Shepherd, Ringwood; Our Saviour, Secaucus; Christ Church, Stanhope; St. Dunstan's, Succasunna; Transfiguration, Towaco; and Incarnation, West Milford.

In the period of time since 1960 we were forced to close down eight very small aided congregations: St. James', Delaware; St. Stephen's, Delawanna; St. Andrew's, Passaic; St. Mary's, Jersey City; Christ Church, Newark; St. Aidan's, Paterson; St.

Stephen's, Fort Lee; and St. Thomas', Vernon.

In that same period we undertook nine new responsibilities: Hispanic work at Grace, Union City; St. Dunstan's, Succasunna; St. Gregory's, Parsippany-Troy Hills; St. Andrew's, Newark; St. Barnabas', Newark; St. Gabriel's, Milton-Oak Ridge; Trinity, Hoboken; Panther Valley Ecumenical Ministry; and the Paterson Espicopal Mission.

In 1973 we anticipate spending in the form of subsidies \$63,690 on the non-metropolitan or town and country area, \$30,092 in the suburban area, and \$97,230

in the urban area.

HIGHLIGHTS OF 1972

Congregational endeavors with cooperation from the Department of Missions produced these highlighted results:

- Belvidere, St. Mary's: Repairs to boiler, chimneys, of rectory and church (\$6,000) were paid for by the Department of Missions.
- Byram, St. Joseph's: The construction of a Church House (all-purpose building)
 was begun with a Grant from the Department of \$15,000 from the Episcopal
 Capital Loan Fund Grant Fund and a \$1,300 Bishops' Church Extension Fund
 Call.
- 3. Denville, The Saviour: At a cost of \$20,000, work on the vicarage foundation was begun to elevate the house above flood water damage level. This has now been completed.
- Hackettstown, St. James': A new addition to the parish house was completed. Bishop Rath dedicated it in December. The Grant Fund contributed \$10,000 toward the \$34,000 cost.
- 5. Hamburg, Good Shepherd: The Department of Missions purchased a 4.6 acre plot at a cost of \$18,400 for a future new church.
- North Bergen, Transfiguration: The Department renovated the vicarage at a cost of \$1,500.
- 7. Paramus, St. Matthew's: The Department sold the vicarage for \$53,500. Net proceeds were used to liquidate outstanding loans and the mortgage.
- 8. Parsippany-Troy Hills, St. Gregory's: A new roof plus other vicarage repairs costing \$1,900 were paid for by the Department.
- Paterson Episcopal Mission: The Department provided start-up money in the amount of \$7,500 for a cooperative venture by the Combined Vestries of Paterson.
- Paterson, St. Aidan's: Because of its merger with the Church of the Holy Communion, steps were begun to sell the church property.
- Ringwood, Good Shepherd: The Department began work on the rehabilitation of the property. The congregation will provide the labor.
- Stanhope, Christ Church: An addition to the church was made at a joint cost of \$34,000 (by Department cost control we saved approximately \$9,000). The Department made a Grant of \$6,000.

- 13. Panther Valley Ecumenical Ministry: The Department continued its association with this project located in Allamuchy, New Jersey. This congregation has to date contributed one-quarter of its Benevolence receipts to us for our distribution to the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief and our own Missionary Expansion Fund. We have, since December, 1971, not made any contribution to the support of this congregation, but we are represented on its Executive Board.
- 14. Augusta: The Department bought 7.9 acres of land in what its study described as a strategic location on Route 15, at a cost of \$24,000.00.

THE CHURCH PENSION FUND

To the 1973 Convention of the Diocese of Newark:

The status of the benefits of the Church Pension Fund now being distributed through the retirement and disability and other channels in the Diocese and the General Church, as of March 1, 1973, is as follows:

The above benefit total represents annual benefits being paid through the Fund as of January 31, 1973, and is an increase of 6.3% over last year's total.

We would also like to highlight some of the activities of the Fund and its Affiliates during the past year. Besides the substantial benefit increases that came into effect on January 1, the Fund became involved in several projects designed to fulfill the needs of our Church, clergy, and their families. Of particular significance is the new rehabilitation program - a study begun by the Fund to find methods by which disabled clergymen can be encouraged and helped, when their health permits, to resume active and more serviceable lives and ministries. The program is still in the early stages of research and development, but shows great potential for being of significant value.

In another effort to increse its involvement with the Church, the Fund, together with the Episcopal Church Foundation, helped finance a salary study project to create guidelines for measuring parish workloads and goals. The objective is to ensure that clergymen are adequately compensated for the jobs they perform - commensurate with their responsibilities and education.

The Fund also continued its new program of holding seminars throughout the country on a regional basis in order to better familiarize clergy and administrators with the Fund's operations while, at the same time, ensuring that they hear and respond to

Due largely to the interest shown by hundreds of individuals and the cooperation of the Church press, the Fund was able to contact a majority of the women affected by the Fund's rule change regarding clergy widows. Prior to the change, the benefit for widows who remarried was terminated. As of January 1, should the remarried widow become widowed, her previous benefit is restored.

The affiliated companies - Church Life, Church Insurance, and Church Hymnal continued in their efforts to improve their services, and made progress toward automating their operations even further through their EDP facilities. In addition, Church Hymnal worked toward the completion of "Prayers, Thanksgivings and Litanies," which has already shown an exceptional pre-publication sales response.

Church Insurance and Church Life experienced an excellent year financially, and

the year marked the 50th anniversary for Church Life.

EPISCOPAL CHURCHWOMEN DIOCESE OF NEWARK

SUBJECT: ANNUAL REPORT 1972-1973

TO: BISHOP STARK, BISHOP RATH, AND MEMBERS OF DIOCESAN CONVENTION FROM: MARGARET E. GILMAN, DIOCESAN PRESIDENT

During the past year, a corner has been turned in the life of Episcopal Churchwomen. The year began with only two diocesan meetings on the schedule. This was in response to the cry of too many meetings. Mixed in with the cry was the uncertainty about whether or not to have an ECW at all. But the culback in number of meetings released an unexpected affirmation that grew into a vocal certainty. Women, many women, wanted to keep their own groups, and they wanted to be in touch with each other on a diocesan basis more often than twice a year.

A hasty reaction might be that these women were making a last ditch stand against change. Instead, take a careful look at the membership of the representative Executive Board, and a close look at their accomplishments. This is not a group that is fearful of change, but a group that can be said to keep its head while all around it is in a state of flux.

Let us look then at the year's accomplishments — not as finished events but as part of an ongoing, creative process — and let us identify the new elements.

- (1) There is more opportunity for purposeful communication inward from the people of the local churches to the Diocesan Board. For example, at the Fall Conference, because it was also a regularly constituted diocesan meeting, the people present were able to instruct the Board. Specifically the membership asked that all four conference areas of concern (Youth, Aging, Justice, Environment) be the object of continuing study and action.
- (2) There is an opening of opportunity for different forms of participation. For example, the delegation to the Women's Triennial, traditionally filled by members of the Board, was this year divided equally, three Board members and three from other diocesan organizations, (the Commission on Ministry, the Diocesan Youth Committee, and the Diocesan Altar Guild).
- (3) In the new forms of diocesan organization, provision is made for making women's resources more readily available to the whole Church. For example, the ECW District Directors are included in the composition of the newly forming District Convocations, thus bringing their knowledge of area congregations and individuals into discussions for decision making.
- (4) The Board, in planning for the work at hand, is making use of effective tools of evaluation. For example, with the help of a grant from the Administrative Budget, a special Evaluation Committee of the Board hired a consultant, worked with the total membership of the Board, and took samplings of opinion from various individuals and groups in the Diocese. This program used guidelines for Open Systems Planning, consonant with the voluntary nature of the ECW.
- As the life of the organization flows on, these four processes are going forward side by side. Let us take a reading of where they are as the year ends.
- (1) In response to the direction of the Fall meeting, a special Task Force was set up. The findings from its initial inquiries have been reported to the membership. But the communications have still to reach out to other denominations before the Task Force can analyse where the Women of the Diocese might best put their efforts.
- (2) The ECW Triennial delegation is holding meetings to discuss issues to come before Triennial. Already the value of including women from differing church experiences is evident, especially as they seek to decide how to vote on the future of Triennial itself.
- (3) In many areas of our Diocese the ECW District Directors have made a distinct contribution to the orderly transition from Archdeaconry to District and Convocation, and they continue to provide resources.
- (4) Within the next week, the Board will have set goals for itself in consultation with Bishop Rath. These goals will be based on the recommendations of the Evaluation Committee, and will be in line with the core mission of the Board as adopted last month.

This report closes with a presentation and interpretation of the Board's statement

of core mission or purpose.

At this point in history, many people are finding that life has lost its meaning. The Church as well finds people turning away because for them membership in the Church has also lost its meaning. And wherever two or three Churchwomen are gathered together, they attack these issues in their own terms. "How can we get more people interested?" Therefore the Board addresses itself to this persistent problem of alienation, and states, "THE CENTRAL PURPOSE OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD IS TO HELP MAKE MEMBERSHIP IN THE CHURCH MORE MEANINGFUL."

The Board proposes to do this in particular ways:

-by joyfully witnessing for Christ, keeping first things first in the spirit of love,

joy and peace. No more gloom in meetings.

-by encouraging the varied ministries of the laity, so that there is a wider

acceptance of the work done by church people outside the Church.

-by helping strengthen the life of the congregations, so that women's groups do not fall into the trap of exclusion, possessiveness, and contention, but put their weight on the side of openness, sharing and a joint search for God's will, (Long Term Planning), clergy and laity working together. This includes supporting a variety of forms of organization, in some places women by themselves, in others, women, men and youth according to interest.

-and finally be helping shape and interpret the policies and program of the wider Church, to put themselves sugarely on the side of a fair representation for women and other currently under-represented peoples in all decision making groups, within the congregations, the Districts, the Diocese and the National Church - as well as to help advocate and implement the evolving programs.

In all of this the Executive Board sees itself as being in partnership with women and men throughout the Diocese — whether in women's groups or in mixed groups. And in this statement of purpose is the Board's pledge to work for the good of the

community to the glory of God.

LITURGICAL COMMISSION DIOCESE OF NEWARK

The major work of the Diocesan Liturgical Commission in 1973 has been in the area of research and analysis; revision and restructuring of the Trial Rites in use since 1970.

The burden of labor and leadership in these areas has been carried this year by Page Bigelow and her committee on Research and Fr. Welles Bliss and his committee on surveys and analysis of grass roots use of Trial Liturgies.

The Commission has reported to the National Iturgical Commission the collated results of all questionnaires returned by parishes for analysis in November 1972. We sent 137 questionnaires and received 42 completed for the report to the National Office of the Coordinator for Prayer Book Revision.

During the year 1973, the Diocesan Commission further delineated its purpose with a clarafication of its function as "encouraging, aiding and counseling the Bishops and other Churchmen of the Diocese in fulfilling the common responsibility to insure that the worship of God according to the doctrine and discipline of the Episcopal Church is so carried on in every congregation of the Diocese as to constitute an expression of the love of Christ for the world, the power of the Gospel and the joy of a redeemed mankind to the end of the greater glory of God and the service of all people." The Diocesan Commission seeks to relate its work in Prayer Book Revision to the Theological, Apologetic, Creative, Pastoral concerns and disciplines.

The Research Committee completed its work on the examination of the collects in Services for Trial Use and forwarded its recommendations to the National Office. The work on reindexing and changing the pagination of S.T.U. was completed and forwarded in two large volumes to the Office of the Coordinator for Prayer Book revision. Current work is being done on a review of the Daily Offices.

The Diocesan Commission formulated and produced two resolutions on Liturgical Renewal and reprinting sections of Services for Trial Use and music for S.T.U. Rites which were forwarded to the Standing Liturgical Commission, the Office of the Coordinator, the Living Church and The Episcopalian.

No Diocesan Liturgical Days are being planned until after the General Convention meets in the Fall of 1973. Members of the Commission have continued to be available to congregations for speaking engagements and other leadership work, both on the Diocesan, Synod and National level.

Currently the Commission is continuing to give attention to other areas of concern: first communion instruction, new confirmation visitation policies, new music, the use of the peace, worship and Christian Education, and assistance to the Bishops and their liturgical leadership.

We have received resignations during the year from Frs. Draesel and Partridge and Mr. Thomas Anderson. Fr. Charles Hoskins has accepted his appointment as a new member.

The Diocesan Liturgical Commission thanks the Bishops for their confidence in our work for the Diocese of Newark.

Memorandum of Information Required by the Bishop and the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Newark on Petition by a Parish to Sell, Lease, or Mortgage Real Estate

- Title I, Canon 6, Sec. 3 of the General Church Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church provides that no Vestry shall encumber or alienate any real property without the written consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee of the Diocese.
- II. The Revised Statutes of the State of New Jersey (R.S. 16:12-4) provide as follows:

"No sale, conveyance or mortgage of any real estate other than burial lots in churchyards or cemeteries, and no lease for a longer term than one year shall be made by such corporation without the previous written consent of the bishop and a majority of the standing committee of the diocese within which the corporation is located ***. Without such consent the sale, conveyance, mortgage or lease shall be void."

III. In the discharge of the responsibilities placed upon them by canonical and civil law the Bishop and the Standing Committee have adopted the following rules and regulations with respect to selling, leasing and mortgaging real estate belonging to the Parishes of this diocese.

IV. SELL OR LEASE

No application to sell or lease real estate for more than one year will be entertained until the petitioner has filed the following documents in proper form with the Secretary of the Standing Committee:

- A resolution by the Rector, Wardens and Vestry of the Parish authorizing the execution of the petition to sell or lease real estate.
- A petition which shall contain or be accompanied by supporting schedules containing the following:
 - (a) A description of the property by metes and bounds.
 - (b) Information as to whether the property has been consecrated.
 - (c) Information as to whether the property is improved and if so the nature of any buildings thereon and their present use.
 - (d) The reason or reasons for selling or leasing the property.
 - (e) In the case of a sale, the terms and conditions of the sale, together with a statement of the intended disposition of the proceeds of the sale should be set forth.
 - (f) In the case of a sale, the petition must be accompanied by a written appraisal of a qualified real estate appraiser.

V. MORTGAGE

No application to mortgage real estate will be entertained until the petitioner has filed the following documents in proper form with the Secretary of the Standing Committee:

- 1. A resolution by the Rector, Wardens and Vestry of the Parish authorizing the execution of the petition to mortgage real estate.
- A petition which shall contain or be accompanied by supporting schedules containing the following:
 - (a) A description of the property by metes and bounds.
 - (b) A statement of the size and terms of the mortgage including the interest rate, duration, amortization period and name of lending institution.
 - (c) A statement of the reasons why it is necessary to borrow the money secured by the mortgage, including the planning for the ultimate repayment of the amount borrowed.
 - (d) A brief income and operating statement of the Parish for the last two fiscal years showing sources of INCOME including pledges, plate offerings, rental income, income from investments, and the like; and EXPENSES, including salaries and other operating expenses.
 - (e) A statement that the Parish has met its diocesan quota for the previous three years; if not, the reasons therefor.
 - (f) A statement of any other outstanding indebtedness.
 - (g) A statement of the present parish membership showing the number of baptized persons and communicants as contrasted with comparable figures of 5 years ago.
- VI. Upon receipt of all of the foregoing documents in proper form, the Secretary of the Standing Committee (the Rev. Henry Powers, Church of the Atonement, Highwood Avenue and Engle Street, Tenafly, N.J. 07670; 568-1763) will advise the petitioning Parish of the manner in which the petition will be entertained. Normally correct petitions fully prepared and duly submitted to the Secretary of the Standing Committee will be sufficient for the Committee to take action. The Secretary of the Standing Committee shall notify the petitioning Parish if it is necessary to appear to present the petition in person. Upon personal appearance before the Standing Committee, a petitioning Parish may request a waiver of any of the foregoing documents.
- VII. The Vestry of the petitioning Parish is cautioned to establish a date for closing the transaction which shall allow ample time for preparation of the petition and its accompanying schedules and the presentation thereof to the Bishop and the Standing Committee. It is suggested that the petition and its accompanying schedules be reviewed by counsel for the petitioner before the filing of the petition with the Standing Committee.
- VIII. Standard forms of resolution and petition will be supplied by the Assistant Secretary of the Standing Committee at 24 Rector Street, Newark, N.J. 07102, upon request.
