#### CONSTITUTION (Article II)

There shall be a Convention of the Church in this Diocese on the second Saturday in May in each year, or on such other day as may be specially appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority. The Convention shall be held at the Cathedral unless the Ecclesiastical Authority appoints otherwise.

Our corporate life has been blessed this year by the contributions of our visiting assistant bishops--George Kwafla Browne of Liberia, Francisco Reus-Froylan of Puerto Rico, Lemuel Shirley of Panama, and John Burgess, Retired of Massachusetts--each of whom stayed with us for at least a month, taking a full part in our diocesan life. New Dimensions speakers who have raised our vision and heightened our scholarship have included Professor Reginald Fuller, probably the Anglican Communion's most revered New Testament scholar; Dr. Elaine Pagels, the brilliant young historian and author of the bestseller, *The Gnostic Gospels*; and Dean Frederick Borsch of the Princeton University Chapel.

We have also been privileged to greet for specific events the Rt. Rev. Edward Scott, Archbishop and Primate of the Anglican Church in Canada; the Rt. Rev. Trevor Huddleston, Archbishop and Primate of the Anglican Province of the Indian Ocean; the Rt. Rev. Mervyn Stockwood, retired Bishop of Southwark in England; and our two special guests at this Convention, the Rt. Rev. Albert Van Duzer, Bishop of the Diocese of New Jersey, and the Rt. Rev. John E. Hines, our own adopted son and former Presiding Bishop.

Bishop Van Duzer has been an admired colleague since my arrival in New Jersey six years ago. He has had an episcopal career of grace and power. He has nurtured his diocese into a state of vigorous health, reconciling ancient differences and healing long-active wounds. He is soon to retire, and I wanted our diocese before that retirement becomes effective to have the pleasure of applauding him and thanking him for the leadership he has given our church in the state of New Jersey. I am grateful that he could

be present in all our deliberations and our featured speaker at the Convention Eucharist Saturday morning. You honor us, Sir, by your presence.

Bishop Hines is to so many of us a treasured friend. This is his fourth official visit to our diocese since my election as bishop. His episcopal career brought a time of stretching new life to our church. He pressed us to the edges of new frontiers and called us to a costly discipleship. We look back upon the Hines era with great pride. The church under John Hines' leadership challenged us, judged us, and moved us. He seemed to infuriate some, but he never bored any of us. He was a moment of grace in the history of our church in America. I seek the counsel and advice of this great bishop on a regular basis, and I consciously model my episcopal career after his example. This diocese is honored to claim him as an adopted member of our larger family, and we are delighted that he claims us as his unofficial home. We welcome you, Sir, to our midst in the certainty that you are deeply loved and appreciated in the Diocese of Newark.

When this Convention met a year ago, there was a national mood of euphoria in America. The hostages had just been released from Iran, and the new administration in Washington had just been installed on the wings of hope and great expectations. One year later the national mood does not appear so ebullient. As a noted national columnist has observed, "The honeymoon seems to have turned into a trial separation."

The stock market, as one barometer of our economic health, does not seem to be responding with enthusiasm to the plans for economic recovery. The budget director has publicly admitted that the administration's tax plan was a Trojan horse designed primarily to disguise the politically unpopular purpose of lowering the tax brackets of the very rich. The biggest budget deficit in American history, a staggering figure in the range of one hundred billion dollars, is anticipated this year. A mood of confrontation and saber-rattling reminiscent of the cold war marks our foreign policy. ugly echoes of racism seem apparent in our United Nations support of the apartheid regime of South Africa and in the restoration by executive order of tax-exempt status to schools which are flagrantly discriminatory on racial lines. The unabated rate of inflation has dealt cruel blows to the poor and those on fixed incomes. These realities have been accompanied by a dramatic slashing of the federal support of social services, a cut in the food stamp and school lunch programs for the poor, and even the abandonment of federal standards in the operation of nursing homes.

It is not a good era in which to be elderly or poor. I find it difficult to believe that these realities can be supported by a majority of our citizens. Have we become so insensitive or so callous that we as a nation no longer care for those who are the victims of life? Is the spirit of compassion dead in this land?

No plea that we separate church and state can blind us to the realization that the political decisions that led us to this moment have enormous moral implications. I for one want to be on the record. I do not believe that any

program of any administration that has the effect even on a short-term basis of increasing the hunger, the poverty, or the hopelessness of the poor can be a moral alternative for America.

High official sources suggest that curtailed federal support can be replaced by the private sector, by the religious institutions, or by programs of volunteerism. I find that suggestion both misleading and naive. Private business and private foundations would have to increase their giving a 'thousand times to take up the slack. No evidence exists that this kind of generosity is forthcoming. The social serwices offered by the churches and synagogues of America have traditionally supplemented and humanized existing federal programs. They were never designed to replace them, particularly in the impersonal urban centers of our nation. A church divided by denomination and tradition can never have the necessary national mandate to carry out such programs. Nor do we have even in the broadest ecumenical coalitions the financial ability, the expertise, or the staff to do so. For any responsible leader in this nation to suggest that this burden should be borne by the churches with a corresponding offer to assist with the means is nothing but a diverting smokescreen of cruel illusions. If the present directions of our government are continued, I fear we are in for a dark chapter in our national history. The social fabric in the depressed centers of poverty will not endure much further buffeting.

It is not enough, however, for Christian people to stand aside and simply to curse the darkness. We must light a candle, no matter how small its flame might be. Through various thrusts of our urban ministry we in the Diocese of Newark are attacking the causes of poverty in Jersey City, in Newark, and in Paterson. We have designed bold initiatives through our credit union and the new proposed ministry at Grace Church, Orange. However, as the misery index rises among the poor and the elderly, this church of ours must respond directly, lest the integrity of the Gospel be ridiculed by our example. How we can do so becomes the major question.

The budget of this diocese is locked in by mandates from this Convention and has very little flexibility. The budgets of so many of our churches are equally stretched to a breaking point where actual survival has become an ever-present concern. Despite those financial constraints, for the Diocese of Newark to adopt a business-as-usual posture in the face of the dislocation that threatens to engulf large numbers of our fellow citizens who feel the pangs of hunger, the ravages of age, and the pain of racism cannot be for us an adequate response. Neither can that be a moral alternative for us.

For these reasons I am proposing that our diocese organize and administer a serious relief effort and mount a significant attempt to reach out to those who stand in dire need. Such an effort requires, I believe, an instrumentality that is outside the limitations of the budgets of both the diocese and the local congregations. To such a ministry our people and our congregations need to be able to contribute directly, knowing that their gifts would be used to provide immediate aid that would feed the hungry, shelter the homeless, warm the cold, and visit the lonely, the elderly, and the forgotten. I am convinced

that such an instrumentality could also coordinate a massive and effective use of volunteers, helping us to discover countless numbers of our church people who want to step forward to serve. The great value of volunteers is that they can see and experience for themselves the needs that exist, needs which the political rhetoric of our day simply does not embrace.

Some will say that this treating of the symptoms of poverty is merely a bandaid ministry—and indeed it is. Such programs will not change the system that creates poverty, nor will it diminish the prejudice of racism which contributes to that poverty. Nonetheless, in the present and immediate future until inflation is curbed, the recession ended, employment expanded, and programs of social service reinstituted, there is going to be an immediate crisis for the bottom twenty percent of the socio-economic scale of this nation that must be addressed. We cannot reach all; that is the inevitable problem of local programs. But the inability to reach all must not excuse us from a concerted effort to reach some. Sometimes the Gospel can be proclaimed on the level of bandaids and soup kitchens.

My proposal to address this reality calls for the restructuring and expanding of an existing diocesan entity. An organization known as the Episcopal Community Services was created some years ago to do a social service ministry. In recent years because of the lack of staff and funds its primary function has been to provide volunteer work in hospitals and other institutions. That is an important function which I trust shall be continued. I see, however, a vast new opportunity for service through this agency. It is my present intention to expand its board with new appointments, to assume the chairmanship myself which is granted me in the original charter, and to charge this body with the task of creating a diocesan-wide relief ministry in cooperation with our local congregations.

I ask you to authorize this agency to solicit contributions from individuals, congregations, foundations, and corporations for the specific purpose of establishing a crisis ministry and coordinating a volunteer program through which we as a church can respond to the needs to this moment in history. Further, I ask your vote of approval on this proposal so that the Episcopal Community Services will be the mandated response not just of some individual but of the entire Diocese of Newark.

I hereby pledge an immediate grant of \$10,000 in funds that I will raise personally to launch this effort. I will ask this agency to cooperate wherever possible with existing ecumenical and community efforts. The people I have appointed as new trustees of the Episcopal Community Services are willing to move in this direction, and I will ask them to report to this Convention next year and to the Diocesan Council periodically on what they have accomplished. In time I believe the Episcopal Community Services could become to adults in need in northern New Jersey what the Youth Consultation Service has become to young people.

Following the recommendation of our House of Bishops, I suggest that each of us consider as our first contribution to this fund whatever tax

reduction we receive this year from the Economic Recovery Act. Since that tax saving has been achieved primarily from cuts in programs designed to serve the poor, it would be a sacramental act of commitment to make such a starting gift to an agency that in the name of our diocese will seek to stand at the side of the poor.

One sign of hope that I have seen in 1981 is the rise in the number of voices around the world calling for nuclear disarmament. The Episcopal House of Bishops and the Roman Catholic Conference of Bishops have both exercised prophetic leadership in raising the issue of the morality of nuclear weapons and questioning the rearming thrust of our nation. Citizens of Europe who feel trapped on the potential battlefield between East and West were roused this past year to public demonstrations of protest against nuclear weapons in general and the deployment of the neutron bomb in particular. Scattered voices from citizens of the Soviet Union who manage to be heard through their rigorous censorship encourage us to believe that among the common folk of the Soviet Union there is the same yearning for peace and disarmament that we are observing in this country.

We have reached a point in our national and international life with our sophisticated weaponry where the familiar rhetoric of yesterday is no longer appropriate. Our national security does not lie in a renewed arms race. The quest for military superiority among the superpowers is nonsensical. Both the United States and the Soviet Union at this moment possess the capacity to kill every human being in the world at least a dozen times. What is gained by raising that figure to fifteen or twenty? Anyone who contemplates a limited nuclear war or a nuclear war that can be won is simply not in touch with reality. Our minds seem to be trapped by a pre-nuclear consciousness which finds expression in our political oratory informed by an outdated tribal nationalism. Unless we escape that mentality, the future of this planet is in jeopardy.

Most of us are apprehensive about and vehemently opposed to violence within our society. We do not want to be its victim. Do we not see that the willingness of this nation to use nuclear arms legitimizes violence at the highest level? There are no survivors, only victims, in a nuclear war. Six nations of the world today publicly admit that they have nuclear weapons. Thirty others will have them within three years. In such a world does reliance on our nuclear arsenal contribute to our national security? 1984 has arrived ahead of schedule.

No government can yet afford politically to propose unilateral disarmament. But some means must be found to raise the consciousness of the peoples of the world and especially of the major powers to force a new look at disarmament and a recognition of the radical interdependence of all human life. We cannot build a political consensus in Russia to put pressure on the Soviet government, but if we can build a political consensus against nuclear arms in this country, we may encourage and embolden our counterparts in the Soviet Union to do likewise. Perhaps in people-to-people diplomacy we can help lead our respective governments out of our present irrational stances of confrontation and massive defense spending into an era of disarmament and an honest search

for peace. The common people have forced changes in history before, and we can do it again. It would be appropriate, it seems to me, for such a movement to be led by those the world over who acknowledge the Lordship of Jesus of Nazareth, the Prince of Peace. In this Lord East and West, capitalists and communists, Americans and Russians can find a unifying community of ultimate commitment. Resolutions that start us in this direction will come before this Convention. I commend them to your attention.

Let me share with you a series of diocesan concerns.

1. The placement of women priests: This diocese, supported by the overwhelming majority of both clergy and laity, has made a major commitment to the sexual wholeness of the Christian priesthood. I am pleased that we are perceived as a haven of strength and support to women who seek vocations in the church. From across this nation and throughout the Anglican Communion women have come to us to escape ecclesiastical sexist oppression. Some who are now priests are making the contribution for which they clearly are both called and qualified. In our ecumenical contacts we have raised to a new level of consciousness the oppression of women in the major branches of the Christian church, causing temporary setbacks in ecumenical dialogue but having, I am confident, long-range benefits.

Despite this commitment, the Diocese of Newark has not really cracked the deployment barrier, and few, if any, of our churches have yet seriously considered women priests without prejudice as rectors of our congregations. Some congregation in our diocese must lead this breakthrough; and the church that does it will, I am convinced, experience an unprecedented spurt of life and vitality, for people will respond to the risk and courage that such a barrier-breaking church will display. Our women priests have proved their competence in every other area of church life--as assistants, as diocesan staff people, as supply priests, as interim rectors, as co-vicars, as co-rectors, as national church executives, as members of boards and committees, and in difficult urban ministries which are either part-time or which the diocese has helped to underwrite. They are qualified to take the next step and await only the opportunity. This year my hope is to install a woman priest who has been elected by a vestry to the full-time position of rector somewhere in this diocese.

- 2. Last year we launched major initiatives in several areas. Reports on the progress of the Episcopal life care community and the camp and conference center will be made at this Convention. The Newark Classical School has not moved forward due to the temporary failure that we have experienced in NECM. However, the project that is now ready to be launched into reality after a year of intensive planning and preparation by a dedicated committee of clergy and lay people is the diocesan credit union. I applaud the vision of those who led us to this point and invite the involvement of every member of this diocese.
- 3. Clergy salaries: A major issue debated annually by the Convention is the level of clergy salaries. We are proud that the Diocese of Newark

is near the top in clergy compensation in the Episcopal Church. However, some cracks are beginning to appear in the woodwork. Churches that are small or borderline economically can no longer afford a full-time ministry. The resolutions of this Convention regarding salary levels and increases bind only the Department of Missions and the budget for the diocesan staff. Parishes are not bound, and recent economic hard times have resulted in more and more of our parochial rectors seeing their salaries fall under recommended minimum levels, while the share requested by the diocesan budget rises to guarantee the salary increases voted for diocesan staff and mission clergy. Such a situation will inevitably breed resentment. In addition, our salary scale does not distinguish between levels of complexity or the varying cost of living zones across our diocese.

A preliminary study of a few neighboring dioceses reveals that instead of a single salary mandate for all places, salary ranges are established for various types of congregations based on size, economic circumstances of the community, and the level of skill and training required forthat position. I recommend that the Commission on Clergy Salaries undertake this year a full study of these plans and that they bring to the 109th Convention an analysis of their study and whatever recommendations their study prompts them to make. I am personally convinced that salary guidelines need to establish a range based not just on the experience of the priest but on the complexity of the I would oppose the use of such a range to put downward pressure on any incumbent's salary. The present scale, I trust, would serve to establish the base. The proposed range, however, would give flexibility and a broader definition of salary expectations for every congregation in our diocese. The laborer is worthy of his or her hire, the scriptures tell us, and no one would suggest that our clergy are overpaid. However, it is increasingly obvious to me that we need flexibility in approaching the salary question and that our present system is producing some obvious inequities.

4. Clergy insurance: When the insurance program for our clergy was adopted, the question was debated as to whether the premiums should be paid by the diocese through assessments or should be billed directly to the congregations. The former was adopted as the simpler procedure. However, the rise in the cost of medical and life insurance is creating a serious financial hardship in the budgetary process of the diocese. A major cause of the upward spiral of our diocesan budget has been the rise in our health care plan.

The hospitalization, major medical, and life insurance program we carry on a clergy family now costs the diocese \$1,885 per unit. Assuming that the rector is married, the first \$1,885 of each church's diocesan share goes to cover its own clergy insurance program. When churches fail to accept their full share of the diocesan budget, the shortfall has to be absorbed in other places, for the insurance program is mandated. When a church adds a second clergyperson to its staff, they increase the budget of the diocese by \$1,885 with no offsetting increase in income.

Thirty-five of our congregations in 1981 pledged as their share of the budget of the diocese a figure less than the cost to the diocese of the

insurance program of their rector or vicar. That means one quarter of our churches are contributing nothing to the expense and program of the diocese. When a congregation pledges to the diocese a share equal to what they gave last year, they are mandating either a diocesan program cut or staff cut because the cost of the insurance program to the diocese has risen. Since most vestries are not conscious of this when they make decisions on the acceptance of their share of the diocesan budget, an increasingly difficult situation has arisen for the budgetary process of the diocese.

I urge this Convention to consider the possibility of billing churches directly for the insurance program of their clergy, lowering in this manner the share requested by the diocese. I also urge the establishment of a budgeted line item expense of whatever amount is necessary to pay the insurance premium of our non-self-supporting congregations so that every clergyperson of this diocese will be adequately covered. The result of this procedure would be the same insurance coverage and the same cost to each congregation, but it would make vestries and executive committees more aware of the real cost of their clergy insurance, clearly distinguished from their share of the budget of the diocese. When churches complain about the rising cost of the diocesan budget, they need to understand fully the reasons forcing that rise. The insurance benefit of their own priest is a major factor.

Confirmations: I regret to report that the number of confirmations and receptions in the Diocese of Newark has declined dramatically over the last twenty years. Many visitations are made where there is no one to be confirmed and many others where the only candidates are children of families already listed as members, and hence they represent no new growth thrust. cannot help but wonder if it is possible for a vital, alive Christian congregation to exist for an entire year in a community and not attract a single new person to join in its worship life. One clergyperson, explaining why no one was presented for confirmation, said, "Bishop, all the Episcopalians in this town have already been confirmed.  $^{\prime\prime}$  Canon Russell Smith of the Diocese of New Jersey recently suggested that the missionary strategy of many Episcopal churches was patterned after the analogy of a vacuum cleaner placed in the midst of a community with the hope that it will vacuum potential members into communicant status. No vacuum cleaner left to its own devices attracts much of anything. Episcopalians, Canon Smith asserted, are sometimes even guilty of putting the hose in the wrong end of the vacuum and blowing interested people away inadvertently.

Let us be clear. The Episcopal Church is not reserved for those born into it. We are open to conversion. We do offer a living tradition that can be appealing and attractive to non-churchgoing people or to dropouts from other religious bodies. Statistics reveal that 50 percent of the residents of Bergen County, for example, have no active relationship with any church or synagogue. I suggest the harvest is abundant. I urge our clergy and laity to be more vigorous and self-conscious in seeking out those who have no church home. I believe that a 10 percent increase in the number of confirmations and receptions in 1982 will be a favorable sign that we are beginning

to address the causes of our decline. If we do not turn around the statistical decline of this diocese, we will soon be unable to respond to any of the challenges and opportunities that are ours.

6. I commend to you the guidelines of the Commission on Alcoholism. I also would like to reiterate the stand of this Convention and this bishop against gambling, bingo, raffles, or games of chance being used in churches or sponsored by churches for fundraising. Our integrity as a church is compromised by these efforts, and the money achieved is hardly worth the price paid. I would like publicly to express my thanks to the Youth Consultation Service for cancelling a proposed fundraising night at the Meadow-lands when I objected. Church-sponsored trips to Atlantic City are to me equally anathema and violate the spirit of this Convention's stand. Please keep your part of our corporate identity uncompromised.

Finally, let me say a word of praise and share with you my joy in some significant achievements.

I hope you will greet with enthusiasm the new congregations of our diocese when they are introduced. The Korean Episcopal Church of St. Peter in Bogota and the Rev. Jonathan Won, their vicar; the Mar Thoma Church of New Jersey and their priest, the Rev. N. M. Cherian; and the newly reopened Church of St. Thomas in Vernon and their vicar, the Rev. Ray Roberts. Each represents a new missionary initiative. We also welcome as our newest parish at this Convention St. Gregory's Church, Parsippany/Troy Hills, and their rector-elect, the Rev. John C. Owens. In addition, I welcome the urban experiment and new initiative of exciting proportions that will be launched at Grace Church, Orange, about which the Vicar General will inform you.

I continue to regard the New Jersey Council of Churches as a powerful, effective, ecumenical organization. I commend this organization and its adjunct, the Coalition of Religious Leaders of New Jersey, to your interest and support. The ecumenical movement in this state is dynamic and real. The bond of friendship that embraces Catholic, Protestant, and Jewish religious leaders is rich indeed. That friendship undergirds an increasingly honest dialogue on matters of ecumenical concern and unites the religious voices of this state on many grave social and public issues.

I am delighted at the giant step forward that has been achieved in the content, style, layout, and design of our diocesan publication, THE VOICE. Mabel Allen and the editorial board have done a tremendous job, and in my mind THE VOICE is today among the top five diocesan papers in the entire Episcopal Church. Even on a minimum budget and utilizing primarily volunteer help, this will be the best diocesan paper in America in another year.

I cannot fail to mention the other members of the core staff of this diocese—the Vicar General, James Gambrill; the Administrator, Beverly Anderson; and the Bishop's Executive Officer, Sally Kemp—all of whom work hours that are unbelievable and give themselves totally to the common task

of directing and enriching the life and program of this diocese. They bring high levels of professional competence, deep commitment to our common purpose, and a rare personal sensitivity to their tasks. I salute them with gratitude.

Finally, in just eighteen years the 126th annual Convention of our diocese will welcome the arrival of the year 2000. It is our task today and tomorrow to prepare, train, and equip this marvelous church of ours for a future that will stagger our present imaginations. We approach that day with 'a "goodly heritage." We build toward our future on a foundation laid by the saints of yesterday: bishops, clergy, and lay people. When we look at the present moment, that tenuous transition through which the future fades into the past, it is easy to become excited about the team of leaders, clergy and laity, that is emerging here: We are a diocese which possesses an invigorating mixture of new and old, a marvelous combination of challenge with tradition. I think we are assembling in our diocese the best clergy leadership in the entire Episcopal Church, which is fitting if they are to serve the vigorous and vital laity that are in this diocese. With that combination we face the challenge of the future with eager anticipation. I am deeply pleased to be part of the life of the Diocese of Newark and to be the recipient of the love and affection you pour so generously upon me and my family. Pray God we will all be adequate to our task and faithful to our calling.

#### RULES OF ORDER

### ONE HUNDRED AND EIGHTH ANNUAL CONVENTION

### Convention Committees

- I. The following Convention Committees, consisting of clergy and laity, shall be appointed by the President at least 125 days prior to the Convention.
  - A. Arrangements
  - B. Rules of Order
  - C. Elections

- D. Resolutions
- E. Dispatch of Business
- II. The President, Vice-President, and Secretary of the Convention shall be members, ex-officio, of all Convention Committees.
- III. The Convention Committees shall be empowered to take appropriate action prior to, and during, the next Annual Convention, as well as any special Convention held during their year of appointment.

### Arrangements

- IV. The Committee on Arrangements shall be responsible for receiving post convention recommendations, and from such recommendations to make referrals in the following areas:
- A. To the Ecclesiastical Authority recommendations pertaining to location, date and length of sessions.
- B. To the Committee on Rules of Order Recommendations pertaining to the legislative procedure.
- C. To the Committee on Elections recommendations pertaining to nomination and election procedure.
- D. To the Committee on Resolutions recommendations pertaining to the resolution procedure.
- E. To the Committee on Dispatch of Business recommendations pertaining to the agenda and calendar of business.

The Committee shall recommend to the Diocesan Council the procedures and arrangements for the Pre-Convention meeting of Deputies, and shall be responsible for all physical arrangements of the Convention.

#### Rules of Order

. V. The Committee on Rules of Order shall be responsible for the Rules of Order.

### Elections

VI. The Committee on Elections shall be responsible for the following nomination and election procedures at the Annual Convention:

- A. The Secretary of the Convention shall send out in the Call, the time and place of the Convention, a list and job description of the offices to be filled by election, the names of the incumbents of these offices, and an official nomination form. This Call shall be sent out at least one hundred (100) days before the date of Convention to each clerical member of the Convention, and to each Lay Deputation whose certificate has been transmitted to the Secretary, as provided in Canon 1. The call shall be printed in THE VOICE.
- B. Any member of the Convention desiring to make nominations for any office or offices to be filled by Convention, shall, at least fifty (50) days before the date of Convention, submit the same in writing to the Secretary on the official nomination form. The nominator shall also furnish on the official nomination form the nominee's qualifications, consent, and understanding of the responsibilities of the office sought.
- C. If there be any office for which no nominations have been made fifty (50) days prior to Convention, it shall be the responsibility of the Committee on Elections to obtain qualified nominees to complete the slate.
- D. The Committee, from the list of nominations as furnished to it by the Secretary, shall prepare sufficient ballots marked "Sample" for each Clerical and Lay Deputy entitled to a seat in the Convention. These "sample" ballots together with the nominee's qualifications in a form to be prescribed by the Committee on Elections shall be mailed by the Secretary to each Deputation at least forty-five (45) days before the date of the Convention.
- report to the Convention in the form of an official ballot the names of the nominees. The arrangement of such names shall be determined by lot in each order.
- as there are vacancies to be filled: These blanks are provided so that any voter may use them for a "write-in" vote.
- otherwise ordered by the Convention. Since the number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot, no vote shall be counted in its class on which more names are marked than there are vacancies to be filled. Blank ballots shall not be counted in the whole number of votes cast.
- H. Beginning with the second ballot, in all unresolved contests, where necessary, those candidates receiving the lowest number of votes shall be withdrawn until there exists two names for each opening in any remaining contest.

#### Resolutions

- VII. The Committee on Resolutions shall be responsible for receiving all resolutions except those presented by Standing Committees and special bodies of this Convention.
- A. All resolutions to be considered for action by the Annual Convention shall be submitted to the Secretary of the Convention in writing and signed by a Deputy not less than seventy-five (75) days before the date of Convention. Resolutions should be submitted on white 8-1/2 by 11 paper, typed and double-spaced, in a standard form of three clear sections: the "whereas", dealing with the resolution background, the "resolved", naming

the action desired, and the "further resolved", providing for the implementation of the resolution if adopted. After the expiration of seventy-five (75) day deadline the Secretary shall transmit to the Committee all resolutions submitted to him.

- B. "The Committee shall publicize at least eighty-five (85) days prior to Convention dates, place and time of its meeting, inviting submitters of all resolutions to attend. The Committee shall collate all resolutions dealing with obviously similar subjects and shall discuss such collation with the submitters."
- C. The Committee shall submit its report to the Secretary sixty (60) days before the date of Convention with its recommendation for action upon each resolution as proposed or as amended or collated by the Committee. This report shall be mailed by the Secretary to each Deputation at least forty-five (45) days before the date of Convention.
- D. Resolutions will be permitted from the floor only when they carry a clear statement in writing of the emergency that leads to the request for their consideration and only by a two-thirds vote.

### Dispatch of Business

VIII. The Committee on Dispatch of Business shall be responsible for the Calendar pf Business. The Committee shall always be entitled to the floor on business pertaining to that Committee.

### To Certify Minutes

IX. At the close of Convention a Committee shall be appointed to review and certify the correctness of the minutes.

### On Decorum and Debate

- X. Except when in conflict with the Constitution or Canons or any Rule herein contained, the latest edition of "Robert's Rules of Order" shall govern the interpretation of these rules and the procedure to follow.
- XI. No motion shall be considered as before Convention unless seconded, and, when required by the President, reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the JOURNAL.
- XII. When any member is about to speak, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, and in speaking confine himself strictly to the point in debate.
- XIII. No member shall speak more than twice in the same debate without leave of the Convention (except the mover, who is entitled to reply).
- XIV. If any member by speech or action transgresses the rules of the Convention, the President shall call him to Order, and he shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
- XV. The following motions shall have priority in order listed. The mover cannot interrupt a member who has the floor.
  - must be recognized, and
  - the motion must be seconded.

- A. To Adjourn or To Recess
  Not debatable majority vote
- B. To Lay on Table or To Table Not debatable - majority vote
- C. To Move the Previous Question, or Limit or Extend Debate Not debatable - amendable as to time if specified two-thirds vote
- D. To Postpone to a Certain Time Debatable - amendable - majority vote
- E. To Commit or Recommit to any Committee
  Debatable Amendable majority vote
- F. To Amend or To Substitute

  Debatable Amendable majority vote
- G. To Postpone Indefinitely Debatable - not amendable - majority vote
- H. To Suspend the Rules or Take Up Business Out of Order Not debatable - two-thirds vote
- 1. To Divide the Question Not debatable - majority vote
- J. To Reconsider (must be made on day the vote is taken)
  - Must be moved and seconded by ones who voted in majority
  - 2. Debatable two-thirds vote

### Committee of The Whole

- XVI. On motion duly moved and adopted, the Convention may go into Committee of the Whole for the consideration of any matter. The President shall designate some member of the Convention to act as Chairman of the Committee, which, when in session, shall be governed by these rules.
- A. A motion to rise and to report to the Convention, with or without leave to sit again, may be made at any time, and shall take precedence of all other motions, and shall be decided without debate. No such motion once made shall be renewed until further proceeding shall have taken place in the Committee.
- B. A motion that a vote be taken at some designated time may be made and be disposed of without debate at any time, but as before provided a motion to report to the Convention shall take precedence.
  - C. No motion to lay on the table shall be entertained.

#### Reports

- XVII. No printed matter of any kind shall be distributed at the Convention or placed on the seats except by the authority of the President or Secretary.
- XVIII. All reports shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending Convention action shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.
- XIX. All reports requiring Convention action shall be in writing and shall be in the possession of the Deputies prior to Convention. All other reports submitted to Convention shall be read by title only.

### TRUSTEES OF THE EPISCOPAL FUND AND DIOCESAN PROPERTIES OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK

The Chair recognized the Honorable Ward J. Herbert, Chancellor, and President of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties of the Diocese of Newark, for a point of personal privilege. Judge Herbert stated that the Trustees retain title to diocesan-owned properties and seek suitable purchasers for diocesan properties when required, but do not make diocesan policy.

### INSTITUTION OF THE SECRETARY OF THE CONVENTION

The President instituted Mrs. Beverly Anderson of Trinity Cathedral in Newark as Secretary of the Convention. Miss C. Marie Riedel of Christ Church, Pompton Lakes, and the Reverend Robert Neske, rector of Trinity Church, Irvington, were appointed Assistant Secretaries.

### THE BUDGET

At 3:33 p.m. the Order of the Day was called.

On motion, seconded, and passed, the Budget Procedure, introduced by the Secretary of the Convention, for Mr. John Lynch, chairperson of the Convention Budget Committee, was adopted:

### Budget Procedure

In order for the Budget of the Diocese to be presented, debated, and changed, or amended in an orderly fashion by the Convention of the Diocese of Newark, the following procedures are recommended:

- 1. The tentative budget be adopted by the Diocesan Council and proposed to the Convention.
- Copies of said budget to be sent to convention deputies available for discussion at January convocation meetings.
- 3. That the Bishop appoint a Convention Budget Committee, the majority of which is not comprised of Diocesan Council or Diocesan Staff membership, to function during the life of the Convention only.
- 4. That the proposed budget be presented by the Treasurer, the Chairperson of the Diocesan Budget Committee, or a member of the Diocesan Council to the Convention on the first day.
- 5. Upon presentation of the budget, proposed changes will be in order. These changes should be of four varieties, submitted in writing, and must be seconded:
  - a. To add an additional line item
  - b. To delete a line item
  - c. To increase a line item
  - d. To decrease a line item

The final opportunity to submit proposed changes will be immediately following the Bishop's Address.

- 6. Proposed changes will be referred without debate to the Convention Budget Committee.
- Line items about which no proposed change is offered will be considered nondebatable by Convention unless upon resolution by the Convention Budget Committee.

- 8. The Convention Budget Committee will hold open hearings on these proposed budget changes on the evening of the first day. Anyone wishing to do so may appear to speak for or against any proposed change. After all speakers are heard, the Convention Budget Committee will go into executive session to consider its report to the Convention. The committee may at its discretion invite expert witnesses.
- 9. The Convention Budget Committee will present its recommendations on every line item for which changes have been suggested, its only mandate that the budget must not be in deficit. Changes up will have to be balanced with changes down, additions offset by deletions, subject to the discretion of the Convention Budget Committee.
- 10. The Convention will vote on every Convention Budget Committee resolution either to approve or not to approve. These resolutions are subject to amendment by the Convention.
- II. When all Convention Budget Committee resolutions have been dealt with, a motion to approve the budget will be offered and voted.

### RULES OF DEBATE FOR THE BUDGET

On motion, seconded, and passed the Rules of Debate for the Budget, introduced by the Honorable Richard B. McGlynn, Parliamentarian, were adopted:

RESOLVED that in consideration of any action on the Budget, the following rules of debate shall be followed:

- 1. The Convention Budget Committee shall have FIVE MINUTES to speak in respect to the Committee's report on the Budget.
- 2. FORTY-FIVE MINUTES shall be allotted to the debate, divided equally by the number of resolutions to be considered.
- 3. Of the time allotted to the consideration of each resolution, the recommendation of the Convention Budget Committee concerning the resolution shall be limited to ONE MINUTE or less.
- 4. During the debate on each resolution each speaker shall be limited to ONE MINUTE and no speaker shall speak more than once.
- 5. To the extent possible, the Chair shall recognize speakers of opposite views in alternate succession.
- 6. No motion to lay on the table or otherwise to terminate debate on each resolution shall be entertained during the allotted time period.
- 7. After the consideration of all the resolutions and the termination of debate TEN MINUTES shall be allotted for the Budget Resolutions as finally perfected by the Convention to be considered and adopted as a unit.

#### BUDGET PRESENTATION

Mr. John Zinn, chairperson of the Budget Committee, reviewed the 1982 proposed budget, and on motion, seconded and passed, the budget as proposed by the Diocesan Council was received by the Convention and referred to the Convention Budget Committee.

Seventeen resolutions, duly seconded, were received and referred to the Convention Budget Committee.

On motion, seconded, and passed, the report of the ACTS/Vim Board, presented by Dr. E. Joseph Piel, chairperson, was received. (Convention reports, p.118)

#### COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND CANONS

The Honorable Ward J. Herbert, chairperson, presented the report. (Convention reports, p. 119)

### Amendments to the Constitution (second reading)

On motion, seconded, and passed, Section A(1) and (2) of the report were adopted.

### Amendments to the Constitution (first reading)

On motion, seconded, and passed, Section B of the report was defeated.

### Amendments to the Canons

On motion by the Rev. George G. Swanson, and seconded, the following amendment, submitted by the Department of Missions, was passed:

WHEREAS it is advisable and desirable to expand and develop leadership within the Diocese to the greatest possible extent, be it

RESOLVED that the Canons be hereby revised so that any one person can serve on only one of the following bodies at the same time: the Standing Committee, the Diocesan Council, and the Department of Missions.

It was noted that this amendment is effective with the 108th Annual Convention.

#### REPORT: EPISCOPAL LIFE CARE RETIREMENT COMMUNITY

Mr. Eliot S. Knight of Grace Church, Madison, and chairperson of the Task Force for an Episcopal Lifecare Retirement Community, presented the report. (Convention reports, p. 121)

### REPORT: CAMP AND CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

The Rev. James W. H. Sell, rector of St. Mary's Church, Sparta, and chair-person of the committee, presented the report and introduced Mr. Peter Wikander, camp director. (Convention reports, p. 124)

REPORT: THE URBAN CHURCH: INVESTMENT IN THE CITY

The Ven. James H. Gambrill introduced the special reports. A film: THE MEADOWLANDS MINISTRY was presented.

The Rev. E. John Gwynn, vicar of Grace Church, Van Vorst, Jersey City, presented a proposal for new ministry at Grace Church, Orange, to reach persons who have been unable to respond to traditional liturgical ministries, to be called Grace Orange Special People's Project for Education, Liturgy, and Life (GOSPPELL). He also announced that the Episcopal Federal Credit Union had been chartered and officially opens in March, 1982.

On motion, seconded, and passed the Grace Orange Special People's Project for Education, Liturgy, and Life (GOSPPELL), Orange, New Jersey, having been duly organized, was accepted into union with the Diocese of Newark at this convention.

### COMMISSION ON LAY MINISTRY

Dr. Donna Cosulich, Chairperson, presented the report. (Convention reports, p.134)

On motion by the Rev. John Rollins, rector of Christ Church, Pompton Lakes, and seconded, the following substitute resolution, as amended by Mrs. Marjorie L. Christie, and accepted by the Rev. Mr. Rollins, was passed:

WHEREAS our baptismal covenant enjoins us to "continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in prayers"; regular participation in the Holy Eucharist and fellowship within a particular congregation cannot be attained by increasing numbers of our faithful due to advancing age and infirmity; and

WHEREAS those increasing numbers of persons unable to participate in the apostles' fellowship and the breaking of bread offer a challenge to the Church to develop new ministries to meet such needs; and

WHEREAS a sister communion effectively has employed laypersons (after careful selection, training and direction) to carry the Sacrament of the Altar to those above-named persons who desire it; and

WHEREAS a sanctioned experiment in the Diocese of Newark has confirmed the desirability and feasibility of a ministry of Lay Administrators of the Sacrament; be it

RESOLVED that this 108th Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark submit the following resolution to General Convention:

RESOLVED, the House of concurring, that General Convention act to make provision for administration of the Holy Communion by lay persons within their congregations, with the permission and according to guidelines issued by the bishop of each diocese.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Annual Convention forward this resolution to the appropriate body of General Convention for immediate action.

### COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

The President introduced the Reverend James W. H. Sell, Chairperson, to present the report.

On motion by the Rev. Mr. Sell, and seconded, the following resolution, submitted by Ms.Diane deCordova and Ms. Barbara Rhodes, deputies from All Saints' Church, Bergenfield, was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons for consideration:

### Resolution |

WHEREAS the vestry of any congregation directs the life's blood of its temporal welfare; and

WHEREAS the Episcopal Diocese of Newark is interested at all times in health of our several vestries; now therefore, be it

RESOLVED that the 108th Convention states that it is in favor of the following guidelines:

- Members of vestries may serve no more than two consecutive three year terms before retiring for at least one year.
- Vestries should make a practice of reviewing by-laws at least every five years.

On motion by the Rev. Mr. Sell, and seconded, the following resolution, submitted by the Rev. Oscar Gonzalez, was adopted, as amended:

### Resolution V

WHEREAS the House of Bishops at its October meeting in San Diego manifested a special concern for peace in the world and the welfare of all peoples; and

WHEREAS the bishops have engaged themselves in an act of fasting and prayer for the peace of the world; and

WHEREAS we, the clergy and laity of a part of the Body of Christ should show the same concern for our fellow human beings; thus be it

RESOLVED that the 108th Convention of the Diocese of Newark endorse the suggestion of the House of Bishops; and be it further

RESOLVED that each clergy and lay person of this diocese be encouraged to observe the same fasting and prayer on one day of the week at noon, until the end of the 1982 General Convention.

#### AT NOON-DAY

The President introduced the Right Reverend John E. Hines who offered the homily and blessing.

### Resolution VI

WHEREAS the Diocese is a family of diverse congregations which would benefit by more experience of each other in diverse locations and,

WHEREAS the presence of Diocesan Convention meeting within a Convocation is a source of inspiration to members and also necessitates their involvement and becomes an excellent means of communication; be it

RESOLVED that a committee be appointed by the Bishop to study the feasibility of holding the Diocesan Convention every other (odd numbered) year in a church under the sponsorship, and the full cooperation of, that church's convocation. These conventions would rotate among all the convocations; and be it further

RESOLVED that the appointed committee report its findings and recommendations to the 109th Convention.

On motion by the Rev. Mr. Sell, and seconded, the following resolution, submitted by the Rev. Katrina M. Swanson and the Hudson Convocation, was referred to the Congregational Shares Committee for consideration:

### Resolution VII

WHEREAS the ideal standard of stewardship is a generous free will offering from Christians for the Church's ministry, and

WHEREAS it is healthy for congregational stewardship to have the joy of pledging more than the previous year and of giving in like generous proportions to the giving of other diocesan congregations, therefore, be it

RESOLVED that in calculation of the 1983 full share of a congregation's gift to the ministry of the Diocese of Newark, the 1983 full share shall not exceed (dynamic limit) the share which would result if the full share were equal to 10% above the full 1982 pledge, and be it further

On motion by the Rev. Mr. Sell, and seconded, the following resolution, submitted by the Rev. Elizabeth Habecker, the Rev. John Habecker, the Rev. Sharon Sullivan, the Rev. Mark Sullivan, the Rev. Katrina M. Swanson, and the Rev. George Swanson, was adopted as amended:

### Resolution X

WHEREAS The Church Pension Fund does not provide full pension and survivor's benefits to families in which both spouses are ordained, and WHEREAS this places an undue burden on clergy couples in providing for their retirement and support of their families, and

WHEREAS the Pension Fund premiums paid by congregations are based on each participant minister receiving full benefits; therefore, be it

RESOLVED that the President of this 108th Convention of the Diocese of Newark submit the following resolution to the General Convention for its consideration and action:

RESOLVED, the House of \_\_\_\_\_\_

The Church Pension Fund shall pay full benefits to each Minister Participant in a marriage, to include both retirement and full survivor's benefits and pension.

On motion by the Rev. Mr. Sell, and seconded, the following resolution, submitted by the Christian Social Relations Commission, was referred back to that commission, without prejudice, to develop appropriate strategy on the subject.

### Resolution XI

WHEREAS the sole purpose of fast attack submarines in the U.S. Fleet is to maintain the threat of nuclear destruction as a deterrent, and

WHEREAS one of these submarines bears the name Corpus Christi, now therefore be it

RESOLVED that the 108th Convention of the Diocese of Newark express its indignation at the insensitivity of associating a threat of destruction with the crucified Lord, and be it further

RESOLVED that the President be urged through appropriate channels to rename this submarine.

On motion by the Rev.Mr. Sell, and seconded, the following resolution, submitted by the Christian Social Relations Commission, was passed:

### Resolution XII

WHEREAS Scripture announces the coming of the Messiah as the Prince of Peace and we as Christians are called to be his followers, and

WHEREAS the 1979 General Convention of the Episcopal Church recognized the obligation of Episcopalians to work toward the prevention and elimination of war, and

WHEREAS the purpose of the Nuclear Arms Freeze Campaign is to work through the Congress and the President to propose to the Soviet Union an immediate and permanent bilateral freeze on all further production, testing and deployment of nuclear weaponry, as the essential first step toward ending the peril of nuclear war, now therefore be it

RESOLVED that this 108th Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark endorse and support the Nuclear Arms Freeze Campaign and encourage the congregations of the diocese to take similar action and inform their congressional representatives, and be it further

RESOLVED that the 1982 General Convention of the Episcopal Church be urged to take similar action, and be it further

RESOLVED that the President and other appropriate governmental authorities be notified of this action of the convention, and be it further

RESOLVED that each congregation in the Diocese be urged to study the goals of the Nuclear Arms Freeze.

On motion by the Rev. Mr. Sell, and seconded, the following resolution, submitted by the Rector, Wardens, and Vestry of St. Paul's Church, North Arlington, was passed:

### Resolution XIII

WHEREAS there are private and public funds available which could possibly be used as a source of revenue to help to implement or to continue to carry out existing community programs, and

WHEREAS such sources of revenue could prove to be valuable to our congregations and diocese as a whole in carrying out existing programs and implementation of new programs for the benefit of persons in our communities, and

WHEREAS such funds would be a source of additional monies needed by our congregations and our diocese in order for us to spread the work of the Lord in the communities of which we are a part, and

WHEREAS many of our congregations and diocesan organizations lack the expertise to search for such private and/or public funding, be it

RESOLVED that a committee be formed to investigate the availability of such funding and that if such funding would be beneficial for our consideration, and be it further

RESOLVED that this committee should present its findings to the 109th Convention.

On motion by the Rev. Mr. Sell, and seconded, the following resolution, submitted by the Rev. W. Alan King and the Rev. Richard L.Gressle, was referred with the substitute motion submitted by the Committee on the Bishop's Address, to the Diocesan Council for review:

### Resolution XV

WHEREAS for many years the diocese has provided Group Health and Life Insurance coverage for its clergy and full-time diocesan lay employees in the diocesan budget; and

WHEREAS in the proposed 1982 diocesan budget the amount of \$247,000 represents the cost of Group Health and Life Insurance, principally for our clergy; and

WHEREAS this amount represents 16% of the total diocesan budget, yet is in fact a local congregational benefit; and

WHEREAS each parish and mission should be conscious of, and responsive to, this necessary administrative cost, now therefore be it

RESOLVED that beginning in the fiscal year 1983 each congregation be required to pay a portion of its clergy's health and life insurance subscription, based upon the following formula:

- -- Parishes with more than \$60,000 annual parish expense: 2/3 cost
- -- Parishes with less than \$60,000 annual parish expense: 1/3 cost

Note: Line "K" in the annual parochial report

Substitute motion submitted by the Committee on the Bishop's Address:

RESOLVED that beginning in 1983 each congregation be billed directly for the insurance program of their clergy, lowering in this manner the share requested by the diocese; and be it further

RESOLVED that a 1983 budget line item be established to pay the clergy insurance premium of our non-self-supporting congregations.

### Resolutions on New Matter

On motion by the Rev. Mr. Sell, and seconded, the following resolution, submitted by the Commission on Ministry of the Diocese of Newark, was passed:

WHEREAS the Diocese of Newark is a family of congregations, each one being unique in its particular mission and

WHEREAS the bonds of affection and concern for our shared ministry within the Diocesan family is an important dimension of our common life, be it

RESOLVED that the 108th Convention of the Diocese of Newark endorse a Pulpit Exchange throughout the diocese on Sunday, May 16, 1982, and that for this year each convocation assume responsibility for this exchange.

On motion by the Rev. Mr. Sell, and seconded, the following resolution, submitted by the Chancellor and the Standing Committee, was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons:

BE IT RESOLVED that the 108th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark endorses the following changes in Title 16, Chapter 12 of the Revised Statutes of New Jersey governing the Protestant Episcopal Church:

16:12-2 CERTIFICATE; ACKNOWLEDGEMENT; CONTENTS; FILING AND RECORDING.

A certificate shall be executed, under the hands and seals of the chairman and the secretary of the meeting and acknowledged or proved in the same manner as deeds of real estate, setting forth:

- a. That the meeting was called and organized as provided in section 16:12-1 of this title;
- b. The name assumed as the corporate title;
- c. The day fixed for the annual meeting;
- d. The number of vestrymen; and
- e. The names of the persons elected as wardens and vestrymen and their terms of office.

The certificate shall have annexed thereto the written consent of the Bishop and a majority of the Standing Committee, duly acknowledged, approving the organization of the new parish and the form of the certificate of incorporation. Without such consent the certificate shall be void.

The certificate shall be filed and recorded forthwith in the office of the clerk of the county in which the parish is located, whereupon such wardens and vestrymen, together with the rector, shall be a corporation, and shall constitute the trustees and the vestry of the parish.

Note: underlined wording is the proposed new material.

16:12-14 CHANGES; CORPORATE TITLE; NUMBER OF VESTRYMEN; TENURE; ANNUAL MEETING.

Any parish of the Protestant Episcopal Church, however, incorporated, may change with the written consent of the Bishop and a majority of the Standing Committee its corporate title, the number of its vestrymen, the terms of office of its wardens and vestrymen, or the date of its annual meeting. Such changes shall in all respects conform to the requirements of this article, and shall be made in the following manner:

A meeting of the vestry shall be called and held in the manner provided by sections 16:12-8 and 16:12-9 of this title, except that at least one week's notice, stating the object thereof, shall be given to each member. If the vestry, by a two-thirds vote of all the members thereof, shall recommend such change or changes, a special parish meeting shall be called in the manner provided by section 16:12-13 of this title. If the meeting of the parish shall ratify the recommendations of the vestry by a two-thirds vote of those present balloting separately upon each proposed change, then a certificate shall be executed by the rector and secretary, in the same manner as provided in section 16:12-2 of this title for the execution of the certificate of incorporation, and shall be immediately filed and recorded in the office of the clerk of the county in which the parish is located, whereupon the change shall take effect, providing the written consent duly acknowledged of the Bishop and a majority of the Standing Committee is annexed thereto. Any changes or amendments to a parish certificate of incorporation without such consent shall be void.

16:12-16 EXTINCT PARISH OR CONGREGATION; DISPOSITION OF PROPERTY; REVIVAL OF PARISH.

If and when the convention of said church which has ecclesiastical jurisdiction over a parish shall determine that regular church services are no longer maintained by such parish, or that such parish be so diminished in size that it can no longer elect wardens and a vestry in accordance with its certificate of incorporation, said convention may declare such parish extinct, and thereupon the corporation having title to the property of said parish shall be thereby dissolved and the property of said parish and all rights and interest of said parish pertaining to property shall vest in the corporation organized to hold in trust property under the control of said convention, in trust, for the same religious purposes and with the power of disposition and sale to the same extent as the same vested or would have vested in the corporation having title to the property of said parish before it became extinct, provided, however, that this act shall not affect the reversionary interest of any person or persons in such property. Said property and the income therefrom and the proceeds of sale thereof shall be applied to religious and charitable uses connected with the church, and the convention may direct the use to which the same or any part thereof

Note: underlined wording is the proposed new material.

shall be applied, and may direct the transfer thereof or any part thereof to any incorporated parish or other corporation, the funds of which are devoted to carrying on any of the objects or purposes of said church in said diocese. If and when the convention of said church shall make such determination and declare a parish extinct, a certificate of such action by the convention under the seal of the convention, signed by the bishop or other officer who presided at the meeting of the convention at which such action was taken and attested by the secretary of said convention and duly acknowledged, shall be filed and recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county where the certificate of incorporation of said parish has been filed, or where such extinct parish is located.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Bishop, Chancellor, and Committee on Constitution and Canons are charged to take appropriate action to pursue this matter with the State Legislature and the Governor, and to cooperate with the Diocese of New Jersey in doing so.

On motion by the Rev. Mr. Sell, and seconded, the following resolution, submitted by the Ven. James H. Gambrill, the Rev. E. John Gwynn, the Rev. Geoffrey B. Curtiss, and the Rev. Richard H. Schoolmaster, was referred to the Diocesan Council with power to act:

WHEREAS control of capital uniquely separates wealthy from poor,

WHEREAS the Diocese of Newark has opportunity to make real its spoken commitment to the city,

WHEREAS excellent investment opportunities are to be found in many urban areas,

WHEREAS good, reasonably priced housing is one of humankind's basic needs, but often in short supply in the city,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Diocese of Newark make \$100,000 of its invested capital available for home mortgage loans to buyers of apartments in Palisades-Ascension Restoration Corporation's building at 510 Palisades Avenue, Jersey City, at competitive rates.

On motion by the Rev. Mr. Sell, and seconded, the following resolution, submitted by the Ven. James H. Gambrill, the Rev. E. John Gwynn, the Rev. Geoffrey B. Curtiss, and the Rev. Richard H. Schoolmaster, was passed:

WHEREAS a major reason for the unavailability of reasonably priced housing in urban areas is restrictive bank investment policies.

WHEREAS there are community and state organizations that have studied New Jersey banking policies and redlining and made their findings publicly available, WHEREAS the Diocese of Newark may be contributing to this problem by unintentionally uninformed investment policy,

BE IT RESOLVED that the 108th Convention of the Diocese of Newark request Diocesan Investment Trust (DIT) trustees investigate fully mortgage loaning policies of all banking institutions in which DIT monies have been placed and that it remove any investment in any bank that is found to be redlining (refusing/disinvesting) any neighborhood community in any city in the Diocese of Newark.

RESOLVED that the 108th Convention of the Diocese of Newark enthusiastically support the restructuring and expanding of the Episcopal Community Services for the purpose of Christian social service, thereby developing a diocesan wide relief agency, in cooperation with our local congregations, to minister to the peoples of our communities, and be it further

RESOLVED that the Episcopal Community Services be enabled to solicit contributions for ministry to the needs of our times, and be it further

RESOLVED that this convention's offering be divided, one half to the Episcopal Community Services for relief ministries and one half to the Scholarship Fund of the Eagle's Nest Camping Program.

On motion by the Rev. Mr. Smith, and seconded, the following resolution was adopted:

### The Diocesan Staff

WHEREAS we are all called to be laborers in the vineyard, and

WHEREAS that labor is challenging but often tedious, demanding and frequently unnoticed, be it therefore

RESOLVED that the 108th Convention of the Diocese of Newark hereby offers special thanks to God and expresses gratitude for these faithful ministries:

We commend the diocesan staff, which has shown us such vitality and creativity in its leadership. ## REPORTS TO CONVENTION

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## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RULES OF ORDER

On December 3, 1981, the committee met to consider Rules of Order proposals to be presented to the 1982 Diocesan Convention.

The Committee had received two resolutions concerning the Rules of Order, one by the Reverend George Swanson, and one by the Hudson Convocation. By agreement with the Reverend George Swanson, only the Hudson Convocation resolution was considered. The text of that resolution is as follows:

WHEREAS Diocesan Convention should have the opportunity to deliberate resolutions which are submitted to it;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the rules of order of the 1983 Convention be amended from the previous convention's rules as follows:

In Part VII on Resolutions A & B are the same.

At the conclusion of X Section C is added the following:

The report shall include all resolutions as

originally submitted by deputies by the deadline.

In addition there may also be whatever recommendations which the Committee wishes to make to Convention.

Section D is the same.

A new section (E) is added as follows:
 During Convention the Report of the Resolutions Committee
 will be presented before any special presentations or
 before any reports which do not require a vote of Convention.
 The Deputy who submitted each resolution shall move his or her
 resolution and then be allowed to speak to it. Next the
 Committee on Resolutions may present its recommendations. It
 may recommend approval or rejection. It may offer an amendment
 or a substitute motion. It may offer a collation of various
 similar motions.

The Committee has carefully reviewed this resolution and feels that the following amendment fully meets the needs of fairness without unduly creating time or financial burdens for the Convention.

Amend Section C of Part VII to read as follows:

The Committee shall submit its report to the Secretary sixty
(60) days before the date of Convention with its recommendations
for action upon each resolution as proposed or as amended or
collated by the Committee. This report shall be mailed by the
Secretary to each deputation at least forty five (45) days before
the day of Convention. The report shall include all resolutions
as submitted by deputies prior to the submission deadline and by
normal business procedures showing such amendments as may be
recommended by the Committee, excepting such resolutions as may
have been collated by the Committee with the consent of the mover.

Although the Committee does not feel that the Rules of Order should go into detail with respect to standard code marking procedures, it feels that it should indicate to Convention and the Resolutions Committee the marking procedures that should be followed. The normal system is as follows:

Material to be deleted: Bracketed and a broken line through all of the deleted material.

Material to be added: Underlined.

In order to clearly demonstrate the Committee recommendation, the proposed Hudson Convocation resolution would be reproduced as follows:

WHEREAS Diocesan Convention should have the opportunity to deliberate resolutions which are submitted to it;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the rules of order of the 1983 Convention be amended from the previous Convention's rules as follows:

tn-Part-V++-of-Resolutions-A-6-B-are-the-same.

At the conclusion of [X-1the present part VII, Section C is-added the following shall be added:

The report shall include all resolutions as originally submitted by deputies by the deadline [.] and showing such amendments as may be recommended by the Committee, excepting such resolutions as may have been collated by the Committee with the consent of the movers. In addition there may also be whatever recommendations which the Committee wishes to make to Convention.

## [Section-B-is-the-same

A-new-section-(E)-is-added-as-follows:

## ACTS/VIM

During the 1981 Calendar year the ACTS/VIM Board processed forty-five proposals. The Board also followed up on the sixteen grants made in 1980. Of the forty-five proposals for 1981 the Board awarded grants in the following areas:

NEW MINISTRIES - Nine grants totaling \$181,600. This includes second year grants to Church of the Messiah and the Hispanic Theological. Training Program as well as the encumbering of \$30,000 toward a grant to be made in the future to the Meadowlands Ministry.

MINISTRY TO THE ELDERLY - Four grants totaling \$190,000 which includes a three year commitment to the House of the Good Shepherd toward physical therapy equipment.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH - Fifteen grants totaling \$119,050. This includes second year funding to seven of the projects which were supported in 1980.

The total amount of money granted in 1981 was \$503,650 which, added to the \$203,110 granted in 1980 makes a total of \$706,760 committed to projects during 1980-81. Since money is made to projects on a schedule determined by the Board, not all the monies allocated have actually been paid as of December 31, 1981.

The three year program for the payment of pledges actually started when the Campaign ended in June 1980. The Pledge payment period was therefore at the halfway point on November 30, 1981. At that time the congregation payment amounted to \$1,441,484. on pledges of \$3,086,125. This is 46.7% of the total. The total campaign which includes the Moore property of which \$1,350,000 is pledged to ACTS/VIM and the Spiotta property which is proposed as the Camp and Conference Site amounted to slightly more than \$6,000,000. Total collections as of November 30, 1981, amounted to \$2,372,458. (when the Spiotta property is included at \$600,000.) This is 40% of the total.

The CREF (Congregational Revitalization and Enrichment Fund) amounts to \$609,038, and has accumulated income from this fund since its inception of approximately \$45,000. This amount will be available for CREF grants during the 1982 cycle.

Accountability reports from programs funded in 1980 and early 1981 indicate that the grantees have been living up to their stated goals on which the grants were made. A complete report of the activities funded is a part of the appendix to this report.

#### COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND CANONS

The Committee met on November 30 and considered the following matters and took the following actions:

- A. Constitutional amendments passed at 1981 Convention. These must also be passed at the 1982 Convention in order to become effective.
- 1. Amendment to Article II, Section 8, to provide for the election at each annual Convention of a Secretary who is a communicant in good standing. Section 8 as previously adopted requires the Secretary to be a member of the Convention. Amendment of Section 8, also, to provide that the term of a Secretary shall commence at the adjournment of the Convention at which that Secretary was elected and shall continue until the adjournment of the next annual Convention.
- 2. Approval of a new article to the effect that all constitution—
  (Passed) al provisions be equally applicable to men and women. At the Committee's meeting of November 30, 1981, it was noted that this new article had been given the number XI when it should have been given the number X. The numbering is to be corrected at the 1982 Convention.

The Committee recommended adoption of the foregoing constitutional amendments at the 1981 Convention. There is no change in that recommendation for the 1982 Convention, except for the correction of the number of the new article.

B. A constitutional amendment of Article VI has been proposed by Mr. Andrew S. Hazelton. If adopted, the amendment would make Deputies (Defeated) and Supplementary Deputies to General Convention the Deputies and Supplementary Deputies of the Diocese to the Provincial Synod. The reasoning in support of the proposal is that much of the work of the Provincial Synod involves or relates to matters that will come before General Convention. Hence, service in the Provincial Synod will prepare our representatives to General Convention for the work to be done by General Convention.

The Committee considered this proposal and decided to recommend to Convention that it should be rejected. The reasons for this action by the Committee included the conclusion that the Provincial Synod is concerned with a good many matters that are not connected with the work of General Convention; and it was pointed out that it has been the practice to send our General Convention Deputies to the Provincial Synod meeting held immediately prior to the holding of a General Convention, at which Synod meeting matters for the coming General Convention are considered.

(Swanson amendment passed)

C. The Department of Missions has by resolution endorsed an amendment or amendments to provide that any one person can serve on only one of the following bodies at the same time: The Standing Committee, the Diocesan Council and the Department of Missions. The reason stated in the resolution of the Department of Missions is that, "it is advisable and desirable to expand and develop leadership within the Diocese to the greatest possible extent."

This Committee considered this proposal and decided to recommend to the Convention that this proposal should be rejected. The reasons for this action by the Committee included the thought that in practice we have had very few instances of a single person holding multiple memberships. It was noted that there are existing limits on consecutive terms so that no one can serve indefinitely on the Standing Committee, the Diocesan Council or the Department of Missions. In addition, Committee members expressed the view that liaison between bodies is sometimes very helpful in dealing with particular matters. It was also noted that the proposed amendment, if adopted, would limit the freedom or right of a convention to elect persons whom they may desire to elect for a full term of office in a particular position.

Ward J. Herbert, Chairperson

Last year I reported to the Convention that our Task Force to investigate the retirement housing needs and desires of our older members was preparing, in conjunction with Van Scoyoc Associates, a survey questionnaire to be distributed to those diocesan members thought to be at least 60 years of age. Each church was asked to provide a list of its members to whom the survey questionnaire should be sent.

It's a pleasure to report that your response was simply outstanding! One hundred and ten of our 135 churches participated, almost 6,300 questionnaires were sent out, and over 1,300 were completed and returned. Van Scoyoc Associates reports that a larger percentage of churches participated and more completed questionnaires were returned in this survey than in any other survey they have done. Thank you all very, very much for your help. Incidentally, as we promised, we physically destroyed all of the address lists you furnished to us.

The foregoing sets the stage for all that has been accomplished in the intervening year. At this time last year the survey had been able to be started because it was funded by "at risk" loans that were made to the Diocese by a few interested individuals. This enabled us to sign the contract with Van Scoyoc before a \$3,800 increase in the contract price would have gone into effect. Happily, ACTS/VIM saw fit to make a \$40,000 grant to finance most of the project's cost last spring. Heath Village contributed the balance of approximately \$3,000, because they found the survey most helpful in connection with their current expansion.

The survey questionnaires were mailed out in March, they were returned by late April, and Van Scoyoc then went to work analyzing the date. Van Scoyoc submitted its final report to the Task Force in August. The report is approximately 300 pages long (double spaced!) and it contains a wealth of material and analysis. Parenthetically let me add that when we have had occasion to show it to individuals familiar with such reports, they have been unanimous in saying that this is a really first rate report. We got our money's worth! Anyone interested in seeing the report may do so in the ACTS/VIM office at Cathedral House.

The Task Force then developed its recommendations and submitted them to the Bishop. Let me read them to you.

"We concur with Van Scoyoc Associates' recommendation that the Diocese of Newark should pursue the goal of developing additional retirement housing and ancillary services in Northern New Jersey. The development of the following is recommended:

- (1) Subsidized rental housing to address the specific needs of low and moderate income elderly; and
- (2) Multi-level care housing utilizing the life care approach to respond to the needs of the older population with a wider range of income and service needs.

Two areas in the eastern portion of the Diocese are suggested as potential locations for subsidized rental housing. These are (1) the Newark/Orange/Kearny area and (2) the Hackensack/Teaneck/Englewood area. The development of a life care facility appears most viable in three areas: (1) Morristown/Madison/Summit, (2) Ridgewood/Hackensack/Tenafly, and (3) Montclair/Orange/Caldwell.

We also recommend that the Diocese proceed immediately to encourage the providing of community outreach services to enable more of our older members to fulfill their desire to remain in their present living environment for as long as possible. Services which would assist in achieving this goal include social and recreational programs, friendly visiting, telephone reassurance, transportation to shopping facilities and medical appointments, counselling, assistance with home repairs and shopping, and home delivered or congregate meals. These supportive services could be organized and provided by a local congregation or group of congregations. However, the Diocese should serve as a resource to these congregations, and act as a central information source in a coordinating capacity to facilitate the sharing of ideas among the various groups. It should be noted particularly that a multilevel care facility developed by the Diocese could very well be utilized as a base from which community outreach services could be provided."

With the submission of this report to Bishop Spong, our Task Force was dissolved. Our assignment was complete. However, an enormous amount of work remains to be done. If we are going to move forward, the next logical step will be the creation of new task forces or boards of trustees to work on the various areas of need. One presumably would work towards developing subsidized rental housing, another would work towards creating a life care retirement community, and a third would develop the community outreach services necessary to enable our older members to remain in their present homes longer if they so desire. This third area would seem to be the easiest to implement in the immediate future.

Three of us - Jim Gambrill, Dot Willis, and I - have begun the search for a possible site in Morris County on which a life care facility might be built. We believe that once two or three potential sites are located, it then will be timely to ask the Bishop to appoint a board whose members have the requisite skills to carry through and build a life care retire-

ment community. This will be a huge undertaking. The Van Scoyoc report estimates that a 300 unit facility with 120 nursing beds will cost approximately \$35 million. It is anticipated that perhaps \$1 - \$1.5 million would be raised initially from a relatively small number of interested persons. The balance of the cost ultimately would be financed through the sale of long term bonds.

This, then, is what we have accomplished in the past year and where we are now. We are pleased with our progress, but much remains to be done in order to provide additional retirement housing and/or a more pleasant retirement for many of our members. We hope that many people will want to become involved in these very worthwhile endeavours.

#### CAMP AND CONFERENCE BOARD

Our primary mission is seen as providing a tangible program resource for the Diocese of Newark; a place that, "binds the Diocese together, builds a common tradition, becomes a power cell that generates life over and over again." The specific functions of the future conference center could be performed at any similar conference center, camp or retreat, but the sense of unity can be realized only through a facility established specifically for the use of the church in this diocese and viewed as something shared by the church as a whole.

The following functions of the center are the vehicles by which people are brought into a sense of community and common purpose for the enrichment of Christian growth and service in the diocese.

- 1. The nature of the center as a camp makes its function as a resource for motivating and instructing our youth quite obvious. The opportunity for young people to live for an extended period of time in a Christian atmosphere allows not only formal instruction to take place but the development of Christian fellowship and individual committment as well.
- 2. The center's anticipated relative isolation from the centers of population in the diocese makes it an excellent retreat for those who wish to learn, think, pray and enjoy Christian fellowship away from the pressures of home and in an atmosphere less confining than a commercial resort, motel, or convention center. This atmosphere makes it an ideal setting for a wide variety of adult-oriented conferences, seminars, retreats, etc.
- 3. The third function has developed out of both our desire to share our resources with others and the necessity of operating the center on a sound financial basis. By making it available to groups outside the diocese we can generate the additional income needed to operate while allowing others to share the resources we have been given and the emotional lift that a stay there could provide. While the most obvious benefits derived from its use from outside groups are the financial and public relations ones, we do not overlook the more subtle possibility of a person's strengthening, renewing, or even finding his own faith through a positive experience there. There may even be those who gain a new understanding of, or interest in, the Episcopal Church because of that experience.

While the primary mission then, is the development, inspiration, and motivation of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark, in the broader sense, it will exist as a means of reaching out to others as well.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the incorporated parish entitled The Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Grace Church in Orange is hereby declared by this Convention to be extinct as an incorporated parish; and

BE IT THEREFORE FURTHER RESOLVED that the dissolution of the said corporation by this Convention is hereby approved, ratified, and confirmed; and

BE IT THEREFORE FURTHER RESOLVED that all assets held in the name of The Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Grace Church in Orange shall, as a result of this action, and in accordance with Title 16, Chapter 12, Article I, Section 16 of the Revised Statutes of New Jersey, as amended, revert to and be held by the corporation of the Diocese known and designated as The Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties of the Diocese of Newark; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that nothing contained in this resolution shall be deemed to hinder in any way the future existence and activities of Grace Church in Orange as a regular Mission of the Diocese of Newark.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Church of St. Peter, Bogota, New Jersey, having been duly organized, be accepted into union with the Diocese of Newark at this Convention.

BE IT RESOLVED that Grace Orange Special People's Project for Education, Liturgy, and Life (GOSPPELL), Orange, New Jersey, having been duly organized, be accepted into union with the Diocese of Newark at this Convention.

It was noted that the merger of St. Paul's and Holy Innocents', Hoboken, had been approved by the Bishop and the Standing Committee in September, 1981.

## STANDING COMMISSION ON CLERGY SALARIES

## Background

Established by Resolution of the 1959 Convention and authorized, in 1962, to continue to serve as a Standing Commission "at the pleasure of the Bishop and Convention", the Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries has three responsibilities:

- 1. Thorough annual study of clergy compensation in the Diocese;
- 2. Official report to the Convention concerning that study;
- 3. Offering of recommendations to the Convention regarding clergy salaries and related considerations.

In an effort to improve the accuracy of data upon which it bases its recommendations, the Commission proposed, and the 107th Convention adopted, a Resolution that the Convention "authorize and direct the Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries to submit its annual Report and Recommendations for Salary Scales for 1982 to the Diocesan Council at the Council's meeting in September, 1981" and that the Convention "authorize the Diocesan Council to act on behalf of the Convention in adopting the Report and Recommendations for Salary Scales for 1982 and in directing the Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries to distribute such Report and Recommendations to the parishes and missions of the Diocese of Newark in timely fashion".

## Action - 1982 Salary Scales

As directed by Convention, the Commission presented its Report and Recommendations for Salary Scales for 1982 to the Diocesan Council in June, 1981, and the Council adopted, at its September, 1981, meeting Salary Scales for 1982 calling for a 10% minimum increase in annual The Commission had recommended a minimum 12% increase, clergy salaries. but 1982 budget forecasts were considered by the Council in taking its action resulting in 10% Salary Scales. See Attachment I for 1982 Salary Scales in the form distributed to the parishes and missions of the Diocese.

As the rationale for the Commission's recommendations for 1982 is the same as that for its 1983 proposals, the balance of this Report contains the considerations addressed by the Commission in arriving at its conclusions. The underlying factor was the Commission's recommendation, and the Convention's adoption, in February, 1980, of the principle that "an important element of the Compensation Policy of the Diocese of Newark should be to protect and sustain clergy purchasing power on a year-toyear basis as a minimum goal".

The recommended increases represent the Commission's evaluations of the minimum needed to sustain clergy purchasing power at its present level while making partial restoration of the 5.2% loss of purchasing power that occurred when inflation surged by 13.5% in 1980.

## Purchasing Power

Table 1 shows the record of diminishing purchasing power of clergy salaries through the decade of the 1970's. Despite the steady increase of median salaries, from \$12,700 in 1973 to \$22,227 estimated for 1981, the cost of living advanced even faster. As a result, current salaries can buy only 85.4% of what could be bought with 1973 salaries.

It was this continuing erosion of purchasing power which led to the adoption of the principle of indexing clergy salaries, as referred to above.

Table 2 clearly shows that this commitment to indexing clergy salaries to the cost of living is off to an inauspicious beginning. With 1979 as a base, 1980's actual clergy salary index increase of 7.6% came close to meeting the recommended 8% for 1980, but was overwhelmed by an extraordinary 13.5% rate of inflation as measured by the Consumer Price Index. The result: clergy purchasing power declined by 5.2% in 1980. Estimated 1981 clergy salary index increase of 6.6%, compared with the forecast of a 10.25% increase in the Consumer Price Index, leads to a further 3.3% decrease in clergy purchasing power.

The 1982 Clergy Salary Index is estimated, based on the assumption that the recommended 10% increase in salary scales will take place. Likewise, the 1983 Clergy Salary Index reflects the Commission's recommendation that:

ALL CLERGY OF THE DIOCESE BE CONSIDERED FOR A MINIMUM ANNUAL INCREASE IN SALARY OF 10%, EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 1983.

Further, the assumption is made that such 10% recommendation is adopted and occurs in 1983. Knowledgeable forecasts of Consumer Price Index changes for 1981, '82 and '83 predict some lessening of inflation from 1980's 13.5%. The Commission interprets the Resolution to sustain purchasing power as a commitment to restore the shortfalls of 1980 and 1981 as well as to protect against current and future inflation.

Practical considerations suggest that shortfalls such as occurred in '80 and '81 be made up gradually rather than in one year. For this reason, the Commission recommends a 10% increase for 1983 as a step in partial restoration of clergy purchasing power. Table 2 shows that if such recommendation were followed, clergy purchasing power would recover by 1983 to 96% of the 1979 base.

Further increases, modestly in excess of anticipated rates of inflation for 1984 and '85 would restore full parity in another two years beyond 1983. A program such as this would breathe life into the Diocesan Compensation Policy goal of protecting and sustaining clergy purchasing power.

## RESOLUTION 1

WHEREAS having submitted 1982 Salary Scales proposals to the Diocesan Council as directed by the 107th Convention of the Diocese of Newark, the Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries has been advised by the Diocesan Council that the Council prefers to have future recommendations from the Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries made directly to the Convention; and

WHEREAS the Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries agrees to return to the practice of submitting its recommendations directly to the Convention of the Diocese of Newark; be it therefore

RESOLVED that the Diocese of Newark, at its 108th Convention, establish minimum cash stipend scales for 1983 which effect an increase of 10% over corresponding scales for 1982, as indicated below:

- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all increments due to age or length of service become effective at the beginning of the fiscal year following the date upon which the individual becomes eligible for such increase(s); and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, in addition to the appropriate cash stipend, all clergy continue to receive such allowances and/or perquisites as:
  - Suitable housing, properly maintained
  - Heat, electricity, water
  - Local telephone service, as required for church purposes

## RESOLUTION 11

- WHEREAS a "travel allowance" should compensate the clergy for out-of pocket costs of travel on behalf of the church; and
- WHEREAS the principle has been established at previous Conventions of providing clergy with the choice of mileage allowance and a flat rate auto allowance; be it therefore
- RESOLVED that the Clergy of the Diocese of Newark be provided by their employer with a travel allowance for use of a private automobile of 22¢/mile or a flat rate of \$2,750/year and/or reimbursement for use of public transportation, effective January 1, 1983.

## RESOLUTION IV

- WHEREAS the Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries reaffirms its commitment to the Compensation Policy of the Diocese of Newark of protecting and sustaining clergy purchasing power on a year-to year basis; and
- WHEREAS the Commission's recommendations for 1983 were based on forcasts of economic conditions which may or may not be realized; be it therefore
- RESOLVED that, in the event of there being substantial variances between the actual and forecast economic conditions for 1983, the Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries be authorized to present supplemental recommendations to the Diocesan Council; and be it further

RESOLVED that the Diocesan Council, if in receipt of such supplemental recommendations, be authorized to act upon them in order to preserve the proper levels of compensation for the clergy of the Diocese of Newark.

## RESOLUTION V

WHEREAS the Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries has as part of its charge "the offering of recommendations to the Convention regarding clergy salaries and other matters"; and

WHEREAS there is an apparent need to explore alternative methods of compensation administration as may be applicable to the clergy of the Diocese of Newark; be it therefore

RESOLVED that the 108th Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark charge the Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries to conduct a study of compensation administration practices as may be applicable to the Diocese of Newark and to report on such study to the 109th Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark.

## Attachment I

The Standing Commission on Clergy Salaries presented recommendations to the Diocesan Council on June 10, 1981, calling for a minimum increase in annual clergy salaries of 12%, effective January 1, 1982. The Council, after careful consideration and in view of budget forecasts for 1982, adopted a 10% minimum increase in annual clergy salaries, effective January 1, 1982. Increments due to length of service or age should become effective at the beginning of the fiscal year following the date upon which the individual becomes eligible for such increases.

It is further understood that, in addition to the appropriate cash stipend, all clergy continue to receive such allowances and/or perquisites as suitable housing, properly maintained

heat, electricity, water local telephone service, if required for church purposes travel allowance/reimbursement

## Travel Allowance/Reimbursement

Clergy of the Diocese should be provided by their employer with a travel allowance for use of a private automobile of 20¢/mile or a flat rate of \$2,500/year, and/or reimbursement for use of public transportation, effective January 1, 1982.

## Stipends Above Minimum Levels

In cases where clergy are currently receiving cash stipends above the 1981 minimum standards, they should receive an increase in cash stipend of at least 10%, effective January 1, 1982, or at such time as their age and/or service would make appropriate.

## APPROPRIATE USE OF ALCOHOL AT CHURCH FUNCTIONS

- 1. ALWAYS HAVE AN ALTERNATIVE BEVERAGE, SERVED AS ATTRACTIVELY AND BE AS AVAILABLE AS ALCOHOL.
- 2. WHEN A CHARGE IS MADE FOR ALCOHOL, A LESSER CHARGE SHOULD BE MADE FOR NON-ALCOHOLIC DRINKS.
- 3. FOOD SHOULD ALWAYS BE SERVED WITH ALCOHOL.
- 4. ALL BEVERAGES SHOULD BE IDENTIFIED CLEARLY AS TO "WITH" OR "WITHOUT" ALCOHOL AND DRINKS SHOULD NOT BE "SPIKED".
- 5. ALCOHOL SHOULD NOT BE SERVED AT MEETINGS.
- 6. IT SHOULD NOT BE ASSUMED THAT ALL CHURCH SOCIAL FUNCTIONS AUTOMATICALLY INCLUDE ALCOHOL, OR THAT ALCOHOL IS PERMITTED (I.E. WORK PARTIES, DINNERS, PICNICS).
- 7. IT IS INAPPROPRIATE TO URGE OR PERSUADE PERSONS TO DRINK ALCOHOL.
- 8. ALCOHOL SHOULD NOT BE SERVED DURING LENT AND ADVENT ON CHURCH PREMISES.
- ALCOHOL USED IN FOOD PREPARATION SHOULD BE CLEARLY IDENTIFIED AND ALTERNATIVES SHOULD BE AVAILABLE, ACCORDING TO GUIDELINE NO. 1.
- 10. TIME LIMITS SHOULD BE SET AND OBEYED WHEN SERVING ALCOHOL AT CHURCH FUNCTIONS (I.E. WINE DURING THE MEAL).
- 11. IT IS INAPPROPRIATE TO ADVERTISE ALCOHOL AT CHURCH FUNCTIONS AS A "LURE".
- 12. ALCOHOL SHOULD NOT BE SERVED TO OR BY PERSONS UNDER AGE 19.

## COMMISSION ON LAY MINISTRY

The Commission was formed and seven lay and three clergy members appointed by Bishop John S. Spong at the 107th Annual Diocesan Convention. Without specific canonical responsibilities, it is developing its charter of responsibilities. In 1981 three major areas were identified:

- 1. Study of the Lay administration of Holy Communion was requested as a result of a Diocesan Resolution (Journal, 1981, p. 108). Miss Susan Kynor acted as coordinator of this project, which included four hearings in four quarters of the Diocese whose purpose was to inform as well as gather data, collecting data from Bishop William Gordon, contacting the Office of Lay Ministry of the National Church for possible background and information, and preparing the report to the 108th Diocesan Convention (See Addendum). Liaison with the Commission on Ministry was maintained through the active participation of two of its members, the Rev. Denise Haines and Mr. Donald Knapp, during the study
- 2. Diocesan Lay Ministers (51) were commissioned in December, 1980, after a study course extending over 14 months. This commission has responsibility for: a) their continuing development and b) develop ent of additional lay ministers as well as c) deployment of the Diocesan Lay Ministers (D.M's). Miss Diane DeCordova acted as coordinator for the continuing development of the Class of 1980. Three concurrent workshops were held in the Fall of 1981 to complete the training of that class and begin training of new members. Forty-one people participated in the following:

Hospital Calling - - The Rev. Bruce Bramlett Lay Calling for Congregational Development - - The Rev. Harry Smith Development of a Viable Parish Youth Ministry- The Rev. Geoff Curtiss

As for deployment, three DLM's were deployed to St. Mark's, West Orange, at the Rector's request, to assist in the development of an Evangelism program, during which teams of lay ministers called on people in the community unattached to a ministering congregation of any kind who might be prospective members. The Rev. Harry Smith, both as Rector of St. Mark's and a commission member, supervised the project. The assistance of the commission and the DLM's was an important element in starting the program, providing the impetus to actually get started, even though the numbers of DLM's participating was small.

Toward the development of the next class of DLM's an <u>ad hoc</u> committee of five from the class of 1980 was appointed with Mr. Richard Jillard as chairman. The past curriculum and lecturers have been evaluated and possible curricula and designs for both courses and practica outlined.

3. Development of an authentic ministry for lay people that does not produce a kind of junior variety clergy will be the major thrust of the commission in 1982.

The Commission on Lay Ministry urges all people in the Diocese to communicate their ideas as to ways we may enable exciting new lay ministries and increase our vision of what lay ministry is.

## REPORT TO THE 108th CONVENTION OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK ON LAY ADMINISTRATION OF HOLY COMMUNION

from

## THE COMMISSION ON LAY MINISTRY

BACKGROUND: In his address to the 107th Annual Convention of this Diocese, Bishop John S. Spong commended a resolution memorializing the the next General Convention to make the necessary canonical changes to allow Lay Administration of Holy Communion to sick and shup-in members of parishes. A substitute resolution called for a Diocesan study and report to the 108th Convention. Said study was referred to the Commission on Lay Ministry.

Additionally, an experiment on Lay Administration of Holy Communion (LAHC), with the knowledge of the House of Bishops has proceeded for about one and a half years at Christ Church, Pompton Lakes.

Four Diocesan hearings in the fall of 1981 included presentations by the Lay Administrators and the Rev. John Rollins of Christ Church, Pompton Lakes, on the results of the experiment and allowed anyone in the Diocese to present his views.

SUMMARY AND CONCLUSIONS: 1. An experiment on LAHC to shut-ins resulted in enthusiasm on the part of the shut-ins and those providing the ministry with a minimum of problems.

2. As part of its study the Commission on Lay Ministry (CLM) received nearly equal numbers of documents for and against LAHC.

3. Discussions at the four hearings favored LAHC with few negative comments

4. In spite of notification to all Rectors and Wardens, only 36 people attended the hearings, suggesting a low level of interest.

## Recommendation of a Majority of the Commission on Lay Ministry

The Commission on Lay Ministry recommends that the 108th Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark memorialize the General Convention in 1982 to institute, evaluate and publish studies and experiments on the Lay Administration of Holy Communion and to bring before the General Convention in 1985 recommendations for action on the issue.

## SYNOPSIS OF THE RESULTS OF THE EXPERIMENT

## AT CHRIST CHURCH, POMPTON LAKES

Participants reported that LAHC was beneficial to both the Parish and the recipients. The Lay Administrators felt an expansion of their ministry into an area of need. Shut-ins and their family members received the Eucharist at least monthly, or as requested. Communicants expressed feelings of being brought back into the Church, re-incorporated, accepted and of having an increased sense of belonging, increased faith, increased sense of love and concern from the Parish. This ministry was not in lieu of clergy visitations, but an extension of Parish ministry. There was serious training, support and supervision by the Rector. Ongoing evaluation of the process was integral with any concerns being aired and considered at meetings of the Lay Administrators and the Rector.

## SUMMARY OF ARGUMENTS PRESENTED AT DIOCESAN HEARING

## ON LAY ADMINISTRATION OF HOLY COMMUNION

#### A: In Favor:

- 1. LAHC would provide increased opportunity to incorporate the sick and shut-ins in the Eucharistic worship of the Parish, to benefit both the shut-in and the congregation.
- 2. It would provide increased opportunity for lay pastoral ministration to the sick and shut-in, increasing communication with the clergy, leading to earlier identification of critical situations.
  - 3. It would expand and enhance current nursing home ministries.
- 4. It would provide more frequent Eucharistic contact for those in nursing homes who have been lost from regular Parish ministries.
- 5. LAHC would expand the ministry of the laity into areas previously perceived to be the exclusive provence of the clergy, but which primitive historical precedent indicates to be the ministries of the whole Church.
- 6. It would provide a method of meeting the ministerial needs of the ever increasing numbers of the elderly and shut-ins which are not being met currently by existing Priests and Deacons.
- 7. It would not usurp the role of the Deacons any more than it would that of the Priest.

## B. Opposed:

- 1. Confession and absolution are an essential element for the reception of Holy Communion and therefore it must be administered by a Priest.
- 2. Training required for administration of Holy Communion cannot be done short of that needed for Priests and Deacons. Communion visits often involve pastoral counseling for which lay persons are not adequately trained.
- 3. There might be resistance by the communicant to receiving from other than ordained persons.
- 4. The catechism in the 1979 Prayer Book does not include the administration of the Eucharist as part of the ministry of the laity.
- 5. The need for additional administrators of Holy Communion was questioned because of the ample supply of Priests and Deacons.
  - 6. Lay administration of Holy Communion was perceived to be a deliberate attempt to diminish or eliminate the role of the permanent diaconate, by creating a function similar to the diaconate without benefit of ordination.

## CONVENTION BUDGET COMMITTEE

The Convention Budget Committee would like to express its gratitude to the Parishes and Missions of this Diocese for their ever increasing support in these times of high inflation and escalating local expenses. We believe that this unselfish attitude demonstrates the stewardship commitment of this Diocese.

In addition we would also like to thank and commend the Budget Committee and its chairman, John Zinn, for the effort and dedication that resulted in the Budget now being considered.

The Convention Budget Committee would also like to assure you that we share your concern and frustration in not being able to fund all the opportunities for ministry that are offered to us and we request your understanding in the decision now being proposed.

#### **RESOLUTION**

1. WHEREAS in 1981 there was a cash flow problem and since this could also be a concern in 1982 be it
RESOLVED that the Diocesan Convention direct the Diocesan Council to monitor this situation and, should the Diocesan Council determine that a definitive deficit trend is developing, it is further directed to adopt a revised budget realistically reflecting the forcasted financial situation.

## RESOLUTION

2. BE IT RESOLVED that the Diocesan Council be directed to review all line items in the Unified Budget for the purpose of determining the feasibility of reallocating specific expense items to the congregational budgets.

## RESOLUTION

3. BE IT RESOLVED that the Diocesan Council be directed to develop policies and procedures for expenditure control and the establishment of appropriate priorities for the dispersement of funds.

#### RESOLUTION

4. Delete Line Item 25 (Group Life Insurance) and Line Item 26 (Comprehensive Medical Insurance) and transfer to congregational budgets. Recommend defeat. The Budget Committee requests that this resolution be referred to the Diocesan Council for review.

#### RESOLUTION

5. Decrease the National Church by \$28,000. (Line Item #36)

Recommend defeat. Whereas the avowed intent of the Budget Committee
was solely to call attention to a potentially serious shortfall in
income, and whereas the stewardship implications of diocesan support of the National Church mandate full support as a mission outreach of the Diocese, and whereas the Diocesan Convention has re-

peatedly named full support of the National Church a first priority, we recommend that the resolution decreasing line #36 in the 1982 budget be defeated.

## RESOLUTION

6. Decrease Department of Missions by \$28,000 (line Item #37).

Recommend defeat. As in the prior resolution, the intent of the Budget Committee was to call attention to potentially serious shortfall in income, and whereas said committee recognizes the importance of the work of this Department, we recommend defeat of this motion.

### RESOLUTION

7. Increase the Department of Missions from \$290,000 to \$311,000. (Line Item #37). Recommend defeat. The Budget proposed to the Diocesan Council in September funded the Department of Missions at \$273,000. Recognizing the vital work done by the Department, the Council voted to increase the proposed funding to the \$290,000 proposed to this Convention. In view of budgetary restraints we reluctantly recommend defeat of this resolution.

## RESOLUTION

8. Increase the Commission on Christian Education by \$5,000. (Line Item #43). Recommend defeat. The Diocesan Convention Budget Committee recognizes the value of offering a well planned conference on Christian Education, and while the committee agrees that such a conference would bring vitality and life to our Diocese, it nevertheless reluctantly recommends the defeat of this resolution and suggests that additional funds required be absorbed by the parishes and individuals taking part in such conferences.

## RESOLUTION

9. Increase the Camp and Conference Center by \$5,000. (Line Item #45).

Recommend defeat. The rationale submitted in support of this request is to make possible a reduction in the fees to be charged for camp attendance. However, the Camp and Conference Board has advised that the fees planned are fully competitive with those of similar camp facilities and that the additional funding is not essential to the success of the camp program. For this reason, and in view of the over-all budgetary situation, we reluctantly recommend defeat of this resolution.

## COMPANION RESOLUTION

10. Increase Line Item #47 (Commission on Lay Ministry) by \$500.

Decrease Line Item #38 by \$500. Recommend adoption. The Commission on Ministry has volunteered \$500 to fund this request. Line Item #38 will therefore be reduced by \$500 to accommodate this request.

#### RESOLUTION

11. Increase College Work by \$1,000 (Line Item #49). Recommend defeat.

Due to budgetary restraints, the Committee regretfully cannot recommend adoption of this resolution but urges the commission to maximize their program within the proposed budget.

## RESOLUTION

12. Increase the Communications Commission to \$20,000. (Line Item # 53).

Recommend defeat. The Convention Budget Committee recognizes the importance of proper communications within the Diocese and the excellent work of the Commission. Unfortunately, however, we must at this time recommend defeat of this resolution. The Committee also urges the Commission to continue seeking alternate avenues of funding to achieve their program objectives.

## RESOLUTION

13. Increase the VOICE by \$5,000. (Line Item #54). Recommend defeat. The Committee recognizes the importance of the VOICE and its role in disseminating Diocesan information. However, in view of current budgetary restraints we must reluctantly recommend the defeat of this resolution.

#### RESOLUTION

14. Add a line item of \$1,000 for the Coalition for Abortion Rights.

Recommend defeat. The Committee believes that this and other individual social programs should not be assigned a specific line in the Diocesan Budget but should be funded via one of the established program groups. It is therefore proposed that their request be referred to the Christian Social Relations Commission for funding through the normal budgetary process.

#### RESOLUTION

15. Add a line item of \$500 in the budget for the Commission on Women's Ministries. Withdrawn

## RESOLUTION

16. Add a line item to the budget for the whole cost of the Diocesan Convention. Recommend defeat. In 1981 the Diocesan Council considered a similar proposal and decided this was not an appropriate item for the Diocesan Budget. The Convention Budget Committee concurs in this evaluation.

### COMMISSION ON AGING

''CAST ME NOT OFF IN THE TIME OF OLD AGE: FORSAKE ME NOT WHEN MY STRENGTH FAILETH'' (Psalm 71:9)

This passage from scripture seems to best describe the first diocesan-wide celebration of AGE IN ACTION WEEK held in May 1981. Coordinated by the Commission on Aging, approximately one-half of our diocese participated with specially designed services, programs and offerings to recognize and celebrate the community of older persons. Part of the week long celebration was an Open House at the three diocesan related facilities for older adults, Heath Village, House of the Good Shepherd, and House of the Holy Comforter. The special offering to be used for the work with elderly and especially for those in our three diocesan related facilities amounted to \$1,453.10.

Plans are under way for SUNDAY, May 2, 1982, CELEBRATION OF AGE IN ACTION WEEK. Posters, Sunday Bulletin Inserts and Special Offering Envelopes will be made available to every parish. And, the three facilities will have an Open House.

Two members of the Commission received appointments as delegates to the New Jersey Governor's Conference on Aging held in March. The Reverend Donald Schroeder and Lorraine Chiaventone participated in the state-wide deliberations making recommendations to the White House Conference on Aging held in November in Washington, D. C.

Our diocese is participating in an Interfaith Committee on Aging through the New Jersey Council of Churches. They have developed a Congregational-Seminary Training and Discovery project to help congregations minister more effectively with and to the aging by increasing their awareness of responsibilities and opportunities of such a ministry. ACTS/Vim has supported the project. Five seminars have been held and eight more are scheduled for early 1982.

Data gathered from the diocesan-wide questionnaire concerning retirement housing needs indicates the need for a variety of housing options. Not surprising was the strong desire by older adults to remain in their present living environment for as long as possible. However, this is not always possible, because community support services are not available. The role of the parish/diocese can be significant in coordinating and providing supportive services designed to help persons continue to live in their own homes, i.e. transportation, home repairs, shopping, social and recreational programs, telephone reassurance, friendly visitors, companion aides, security and protection, meals-on-wheels especially on holidays, counselling, legal aid, etc. (A full report from the Task Force to Build a Retirement Community will be made at Convention.)

The Commission on Aging is prepared to work with congregations in exploring opportunities to sponsor supportive services, to bring about attitudinal changes about aging persons and the aging process, to introduce the cause of the elderly through worship services, especially the yearly Age in Action Week program each May, and to utilize the skills and experiences of elderly persons in congregation and community.

## SUBURBAN TASK FORCE

The Suburban Task Force is concerned with the need to strengthen suburban church life which has been the back bone of the Diocese. Over the past decade, the vitality of the suburban church has weakened. Strengthening the suburban parish will help to revitalize the Diocese spiritually and financially.

During the months of December, 1980, and January and February, 1981, the Suburban Task Force held a series of four meetings with representatives of twelve parishes in the Diocese. As a direct result of these four extremely productive sessions, we considerably narrowed our focus. The enhancement of the quality of the relationship between the clergy and the laity in a parish is a vital ingredient in church growth (quality and quantity). A shared ministry can develop only with the free and open expression of expectations by both the clergy and the laity. The fostering of this dialogue is crucial to church growth. A parish must develop a clear sense of purpose, with the setting of goals and objectives and their ongoing evaluation.

The Task Force is beginning to write its final report. This report, including specific recommendations, will be circulated to all parishes in the Diocese in the spring of 1982.

## BISHOP ANAND RESOURCE CENTER

Providing resources of all kinds for the congregations, commissions and staff of the Diocese of Newark is the purpose of the Bishop Anand Resource Center. During 1981 the Board of Trustees, composed of representatives from the commissions and other groups responsible for program in the diocese continued to guide the center's efforts to develop the services needed.

In her first year as executive director of the resource center, Jean Stufflebeem has begun implementing the decision of the Trustees to make more of her time available to churches and program groups in their own locales. The Center itself, located on the first floor of Cathedral House, is open regularly Tuesdays through Fridays, but the resource specialist meets with groups as needed at any other time when scheduled in advance.

As a communications/linkage service, Anand Center aims to provide information and answers, enrich church programs by locating appropriate educational materials, and to increase awareness of the many resources available for use in doing the work of the church. During this year, supporting resources have been provided for people whose projects included acolyte training, banner and logo design, church school curriculum searches, teaching Bible classes, planning pageants and liturgical dramas, historical research for a centenniel celebration, and locating graphics for a newsletter. This is a small sample of the kinds of requests received and responded to.

The audio-visual services of the Center include a filmstrip library, audio cassette collection, tape-copying service, and audio-visual equipment rental. Recordings of special events in the diocese make lectures, addresses and sermons by our Bishop and clergy and by visiting theologians and teachers available to all. The tapes may be borrowed at no cost or purchased at nominal cost by church libraries or individuals for their own use. Sharing of expensive audio-visual materials and equipment through Anand Center conserves funds for all the churches and groups which use this service.

In keeping with our goal of finding flexible ways of providing materials to clients, the telephone continues to be the main avenue by which our work is generated. Inquiries during this year have resulted in resources being provided for clergy and/or lay people representing nearly 65% of the congregations in the diocese. An increasing number of materials are delivered by mail and through a cooperative network of courriers whose diocesan service brings them in and out of Cathedral House.

In an effort to broaden usage of the Center, a newsletter is published to inform potential clients about the collection. This sheet is now being sent to a list of lay people as well as being included in the monthly consolidated mailing to the clergy.

Membership in the Resource Center for Learning Ministries of the United Church of Christ is also provided for every congregation through diocesan funds allocated for Anand Center. Access to the extensive collection, special events, and professional services of this center in Montclair supplements our own in many vital areas and the combined resources of the two facilities can meet just about any need.

As use of the Center increases, the need for volunteers becomes ever greater. An important goal for the coming year will be to locate and utilize the time and talents of more people so that the Center's services can be of even greater value to the diocese.

## COMMISSION ON CONGREGATIONAL REVITALIZATION, RENEWAL, EVANGELISM AND CHURCH GROWTH

In 1981 the Commission on Congregational Revitalization, Renewal, Evangelism and Church Growth spent most of its time in self-study and long range planning. Formerly the Commission on Evangelism, the new Commission began the task of developing its program to meet the expanded needs mandated by its new title and commission. We also developed some long range goals and commitments for the Commission. We have, in the process, begun to develop a program in each of the designated areas. Our hope is to visit each of the Convocations in order to offer specific programs in the fields of Church Growth, Renewal, Evangelism and Congregational Revitalization to individual parishes according to their needs. We also hope to have trained people to act as facilitators and consultants to parishes in need. To this end we will, in 1982, send several people to workshops in the program areas. It is also our hope and dream to have a Newark Conference on Congregational Revitalization, Renewal, Evangelism and Church Growth in the Spring or Fall of 1983.

With these new programs it is our hope that we can bring fresh and exciting ideas to parishes around the diocese in search of purpose, vision, hope, spirituality, renewal and their natural by-product, church growth.

# REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES CHRIST HOSPITAL, JERSEY CITY 1981

Christ Hospital in Jersey City, New Jersey, is the only hospital left in our state that is affiliated with the Episcopal Church. It is an institution of which we can be enormously proud. This facility, possessing over three hundred beds, is highly regarded throughout the state and is generally considered the finest hospital in Hudson County.

This past year has been one of unprecedented change and growth for Christ Hospital. The corporate organization has been restructured into the Christ Hospital Health Services corporation, a holding company which at this moment oversees the work of two subsidiaries, Christ Hospital and Christ Hospital Foundation. Acquisitions of one or more nursing facilities which will supplement the total patient care concept of this hospital are at this moment being contemplated and pursued. There is even the possibility that other hospitals may be added to the growing health care conglomerate.

We have also added this year a home health care program which particularly supports our oncology department. This service, which does all that we generally associate with a hospice, has added a new dimension to the Christ Hospital ministry.

It is a pleasure to work with the board of this facility, nine of whom are clergy that I appoint to this governing body. They are a group of dedicated men and women. The senior vice chairman of the board, Dr. Ernest May, and the vice chairman of finance, Mr. Richard Hazen, are both members of Calvary Church in Summit. The secretary of the board, Mr. Curtis Plant, is a member of St. Paul's Church in Jersey City.

The administration, led by Mr. Lloyd Currier, the president and chief executive officer, and Mr. Clarence Corley, the senior vice president, is highly competent and sensitive to patient needs. The graduates of the Christ Hospital School of Nursing headed by Doris Feldman rank regularly at the very top of the state in all tested categories and bring us a justifiable bit of pride. Our chaplain, the Rev. Richard Chasse, has quickly won from doctors, nurses, and administrative people the acclaim his professional capability deserves. Health care embraces the whole person at Christ Hospital.

Christ Hospital is a major demand upon my time, but it is in my opinion vitally important to the work of this diocese. It would be my hope that more and more the members of this diocese would begin to feel the ownership of this facility and be willing to serve from time to time on its board or the boards of one of its satellites.

## CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

The Christian Social Relations Commission was reorganized with entirely new membership at the 1981 Diocesan Convention and given a new charge in the Bishop's address to Convention: "Bring public issues to the attention of the church."

With this charge and keynote, the new commission spent much of its early life exploring how this essentially spotlighting function could best be accomplished. It was decided to employ a variety of means to get issues addressed, to reach congregations and communicants, and to raise a public voice where that seemed appropriate. Some projects seemed to lend themselves to in-depth approaches (i.e. Hunger and the Nestle Boycott monitoring mandated by the 1981 convention); others required fairly quick response (i.e. the U.S. vote in the World Health Organization concerning infant formula promotion codes). The commission found the variety of concerns and the need to address them in different ways very challenging, stimulating and humbling.

Over the course of the year, the commission took the following actions:

- + Produced a position paper on El Salvador.
- + Advised the Alcoholism Commission through its chairman, the Rev. Dale Cranston, a member of the Commission.
- + Produced a background paper, "The Nestle Question", and distributed it to congregations.
- + Granted the Religious Coalition for Abortion Rights \$1,000, per convention mandate.
  - + Produced a policy statement for CSR activity.
- + Advised the Bishop on response to the pending administration action in the World Health Organization's decision to regulate the promotion of infant formula in Third World Countries.
- + Endorsed the Nuclear Freeze Campaign, circulated information and requests for support to the diocesan clergy, and brought a resolution on the subject to the convention.
- + Endorsed the campaign to rename the nuclear submarine "Corpus Christi" and brought this by resolution before the Convention.
- + Produced a paper in connection with recommending to Diocesan Council that on behalf of the Diocese it enter as <u>amicus curiae</u> in a suit involving the Medicaid funding of abortions.
- + Alerted clergy/congregations to the implications of the new NJ code on Family Life Education in public schools.
- + Requested all NJ representatives and senators in the U.S. Congress to support and defend the extension of the 1965 Voting Rights Act without amendment.

We as a commission have been somewhat concerned that we are mostly reacting to events, rather than initiating study and interest in areas of natural Christian concern in the public arena. We plan to work on this in the coming year.

### STEWARDSHIP COMMISSION .

The Stewardship Commission continued the second year of work with the NEWARK PLAN aimed at creating a renewable resource for increasing the giving at the parochial level. We recruited and trained five new consultants during the year who will be assigned to projects of their own in 1982.

Four projects were conducted under the auspices of the Stewardship Commission: Christ Church, Pompton Lakes; St. Paul's Church, Englewood, Holy Spirit Church, Verona; and Church of Our Saviour, Secaucus. Substantial increases in pledging units and in pledged income were realized in each congregation. The lowest increase in pledged income amounted to about 9% over the previous year; the highest increase amounted to 80% over the previous year.

Two programs were conducted in parishes by consultants from those parishes who used the same approach that was used by the commission elsewhere-St. Mark's, West Orange; and St. George's, Maplewood. Substantial increases in pledged income were realized in both congregations.

Perhaps even more important than the increased income that comes from these comprehensive and on-going approaches to stewardship is the increased level of participation on the part of a growing number of people in the local congregations. The approach that is taken provides the opportunity to make people on the periphera more and more included in the core of active people who give dynamic support to the entire church program.

Five more new consultants will be trained in 1982 and the commission hopes to find ten congregations who will work with us in beginning an on-going program of stewardship that will empower them and the whole church as the benefits filter out to the larger body.

### THE CHURCH PENSION FUND

The Church Pension Fund provides, on an annual basis, a report of the men, women, and children in your diocese who are currently receiving benefits from the Fund. In addition to your own report, which is enclosed, a summary of CPF benefit totals on a Church-wide basis is shown below. This summary reflects annual benefits being paid by the Fund as of September 30, 1981:

The benefit amounts shown above reflect an increase of 15.3% over the amounts that were being paid on September 30, 1980. Our assets held for pension benefit purposes increased substantially to a total of approximately \$545 million as of March 31, 1981, which total represents the actuarially determined funded reserves for benefits earned to date by both active and retired clergy.

The following is a brief review that highlights some of the Fund's operations during the past year:

One of the major highlights of the year was the Fund's extraordinary growth in assets, of \$106 million which enabled benefits to be increased by \$2 million, and another \$45 million to be set aside to provide benefit improvements for the coming year.

On the Fund's Board of Trustees, there were three changes in membership: The Right Reverend William F. Creighton, retired Bishop of Washington, a trustee since 1960 and the Fund's Chairman from 1967 to 1977, resigned on August 1, 1981. The Right Reverend John T. Walker, Bishop of Washington, was elected to take Bishop Creighton's place. The Reverend Dr. Edward P. Sims, a trustee since 1975, and Mrs. Mary R. Shepard, a trustee since 1971, also resigned during the year. Replacing them were Mr. David L. Brigham, Executive Vice President of Oppenheimer Management Corp., and Mr. C. Payson Coleman, Esq., of Davis Polk and Wardwell.

On the staff of the Fund and its affiliated companies, there were also changes: The Reverend Canon Edward J. Morgan was elected a Vice President of the Fund and Mr. Frank I. Squeri, formerly with the Fund's independent auditor, Ernst & Whinney, joined the Fund's staff as Internal Auditor. Mr. Robert G. Wall was named Senior Vice President and Manager of The Church Insurance Company, and Mr. Joseph J. Albarella, Assistant to the President, was elected a Vice President of The Church Hymnal Corporation. And effective December 1, 1981, the Reverend Harry G. Whitley will join the Fund's staff as Clergy Coordinator of the Fund, replacing The Reverend George T. Cobbett.

The year was an excellent one for the Fund's two insurance companies: Church Life Insurance Corporation's new flexible-premium annuity has been received with a great amount of interest, especially in view of the new tax law which makes IRAs almost universally available. And The Church Insurance Company, as it has for over 50 years, continued to provide multi-peril programs for churches and Church-related institutions, as well as homeowners insurance for the clergy. Both companies paid substantial dividends to the Fund, increasing its income from which benefits are paid.

Among the new works published by The Church Hymnal Corporation were Lectionary Texts Year A, B, and C, The Lesser Feasts and Fasts Revised, Ministry to the Sick, and Music for Ministers and Congregation.

# THE COMMISSION TO STUDY CONVOCATION STRUCTURE

At the 1980 Diocesan Convention a motion was made to study the District Convocations (see Journal 1980) and report back to the 1981 Convention. A commission was appointed late in 1980 to meet and set up a study plan. It was decided that there was not enough time to get necessary input for a comprehensive report, (see Journal 1981) and a year's extension was granted by the 107th Convention.

After the unpublicized resignation of our convenor and cancellation of meetings, a small group of commission members, who thought the Convention should receive that which it had ordered, banded together and set upon an unpopular study. We visited each convocation unheralded and distributed a self study guide for each convocation at the Presidents' meeting of May, 1981, with a return deadline of November 15, 1981. We then met and discussed what we had observed at the various convocation meetings; we were prepared to discuss and correlate the results of the self study. Two convocations responded.

Our general feeling is that the convocations that want to operate, do! The Canons are sufficient and give each convocation the guidelines that are needed to custom fit each district. We found each group unique. Hard and fast rules, we feel, would immobilize the districts that are working successfully now. What is working in Hudson would not be viable in Western; what is successful in West Bergen would die in South Essex. Each convocation did voice the need for a workable, planned agenda and also for some sort of a learning experience. Most convocations feel that convention delegates and convocation delegates should be the same; i.e., delegates to convention would serve as congregation representative and alternate to district, thereby maintaining continuity throughout the year.

Our recommendations would be to allow the Canons to remain as they are; to encourage congregations to elect one convention delegate as district delegate, one convention delegate as alternate district delegate; to further urge congregations to rotate their delegates elected for three year terms and move alternates into delegate's slots.

Our largest project was our venture into Cable TV in the diocese. With a grant of \$5,000 from the ACTS/VIM program, we started a continuing series on "The Living Commandments" which resulted in 12 programs of sermons preached by our Bishop. In addition, eight programs of interviews with our visiting Bishops were initiated and produced. We had no additional funds so several programs were supplied to us by the national church and the Episcopal TV-Radio Foundation and, in addition, eight programs of the Searching series from Trinity Church, New York were purchased to be shown on our program. At this writing seven cable companies across the diocese are hooked into our network, with the eighth, covering the Western Convocation, about to come aboard. This will give us complete coverage for the entire diocese of approximately 485,000 subscribers.

In addition to this we are busy filming "The Seven Last Words" series to be shown during Lent and then an Easter message by our Bishop, which not only will be shown to our cable network but also will be offered to local broadcast and WHF stations. Special funds were provided for these programs and, hopefully, more money will help us produce more programs. These two series can be used for Christian education purposes and will be made available through the parishes.

Once again we request the clergy of our diocese to provide us with the names of people involved in communications as we need more help in continuing to improve our communications in this diocese.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT TO THE DIOCESAN CONVENTION

It is always a pleasure to report to the diocese on the activities and accomplishments of that dedicated group known as the Episcopal Churchwomen of the Diocese of Newark. But even as I make this report I am conscious, as I'm sure you are, that to report on all the activities and all the accomplishments of Episcopal Churchwomen throughout the diocese is an impossible task. For that reason I must confine most of my report to that tip of the iceberg, the Diocesan ECW Executive Board.

The Board has spent time this year, as it does each year, exploring ways to enhance its service to the women of the whole church. Changes in the Districts have allowed each to schedule meetings and programs to accommodate differing needs. A study of the Outreach Department resulted in the appointment of a committee to work with the Diocesan chair and the production of a slide show to illustrate the concerns of that department. The United Thank Offering chair held a training session for her District counterparts to help them in preparing programs for use in the parishes. The Board held a recent meeting at the Port Newark Seamen's Church Institute enabling the members to see and hear of ways to aid this ministry.

Communication with parish groups and individuals continues to be a vital concern of the Board. The quarterly ECW Newsletter is sent to the parish president or contact person in each of our 133 parishes as well as to each of the parochial clergy. Each church thus receives at least two copies of this update on ECW news. A new Handbook is distributed each fall to these same people and also made available at District and Diocesan meetings. Brief business meetings at the time of Diocesan ECW programs and the presence of Board members at District meetings further this communication.

Diocesan meetings of the ECW present a variety of programs and also provide time for corporate worship and for fellowship. Child care, of course, is also an important feature of these gatherings. Those attending the Winter Diocesan Meeting at St. Mark's, West Orange, heard and responded to Bishop Spong's address on Evangelism. Miss Judith Gillespie, National United Thank Offering Coordinator, was the featured speaker at the Spring UTO Ingathering at Trinity Cathedral. At the luncheon following the service visiting Bishop George Browne of Liberia spoke movingly of those things accomplished in his country as a result of United Thank Offering grants.

Bishop Spong led our two day Fall Conference on Probing Behind the Words of the Bible. At the Fall UTO Ingathering held at St. Paul's, Paterson, Mrs. Bea O'Rourke spoke on Christian Citizenship.

The Unsearchable Riches of Christ was the theme of the Advent Quiet Morning conducted the the Reverend Abigail Painter and held at St. John's, Boonton. The approaching Winter meeting will be highlighted by a dramatic presentation "Everywoman", based on the medieval morality play "Everyman", with Mrs. Roberta Nobleman, Drama Coordinator for the Diocese, as director.

During this past year 68 parish women's groups contributed to the budget of the Diocesan ECW. In addition these and other groups contributed to special projects, sewing machines for women of the third world, the Diocesan Outreach Fund, the Mary Rankin Scholarship Fund, Church Periodical Club.

Budget contributions were used for administrative expenses of the Board and also for contributions to the budget of the Episcopal Church of the USA, New Jersey Council of Churches, Church Women United, our Bishop's Discretionary Fund, support for the Triennial Meeting of the Women of the Church and Women of Province II dues. Special contributions to the Urban Bishop's Challenge and to the Diocesan ACTS/VIM were also a part of the budget.

Another budget item was scholarship aid to two of the Black Episcopal Colleges, St. Augustine's and St. Paul's and a grant to W.O.O.D.Y., the Diocesan youth group.

The cost of sending representatives of our churchwomen to regional and national meetings is always an important part of the budget. The women who represented us at the Province II meeting, those who were observers at Synod, and those who participated in the National Task Force on Women conference contributed to those meetings and continue to contribute to our own diocesan and local groups as a result of their experiences in understanding and participating in the larger church. Each year a portion of the Budget is set aside to cover the cost of sending a full compliment of delegates to the Triennial Meeting.

The Mary Rankin Scholarship, given in memory of our one time treasurer, went to a seminarian at General Theological Seminary this past year. It was our pleasure to hear from the recipient, Gretchen Zimmerman, at our Fall Meeting.

Money contributed to the Diocesan Outreach Fund was used for camperships, contributions to Pantry Shelf funds, tutorial programs, a wheel chair for a cancer victim and other needs made known to the Outreach chair during the year.

Contributions to Church Periodical Club made possible textbook grants to some of the seminarians from our diocese, large print magazines in two area hospitals, books for the library of the Episcopal School in Haiti, prayer books for St. John Baptist School and a generous contribution to the National Books Fund of CPC.

1981 was a banner year for the United Thank Offering. For the first time in its ninety two year history this offering totaled more than two million dollars. Newark's share of this mighty offering was \$31,548.89. We hope more and more women, and men, of our churches will come to know the joy of this way of expressing thankfulness for everyday blessings. We are proud to announce that one of the 1981 UTO grants was made to the Pompton Valley Nursing Home Ministry, sponsored by an ecumenical group including Christ Church, Pompton Lakes.

Each spring parish presidents are asked to report to the Diocesan ECW. Last year 61 of the ECW groups in the diocese reported on their activities for the past year. According to these reports, in 1980-81 almost \$130,000 was raised and dispersed by parish groups. Two thirds of that amount stayed in the parish where it was raised, as contributions to their own parish treasury, as "extras" for refurbishing Sunday School rooms, parish halls, rectories, for educational materials and programs and dozens of other parish projects. The other third went to outreach programs of a great variety in the community, the diocese, the nation and the world.

These parish groups told of programs, study groups, prayer groups, quiet days, corporate worship, volunteer work. They are the ones who organize, and often pay for, the coffee hours, the parish dinners, the confirmation receptions. They gather and distribute clothing, food, toys for the needy. They are a part of World Day of Prayer, of Lenten programs, of special days of celebration and thanksgiving.

The Episcopal Churchwomen's prayer asks for God's help to reveal His love in prayer and work and stewardship - they have truly received this.

### EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

Serving the Episcopal Church as a member of its Executive Council continues to be a stimulating experience. As I make my report to the Diocese this year, my reflections focus primarily on the people I have met, the issues they have spoken to, the insights they have shared.

People such as Council members Paul Neuhauser and Denis O'Pray described their "Partners in Mission" trips to South Africa and told of their personal reactions to the viciousness of apartheid. They both conveyed fears about the potential for violence unless ways are soon found to overcome the legislated segregation in that country. I also remember the Citibank vice-president who tried to explain the reasons his bank made a substantial loan to South Africa; a loan ostensibly for housing, for schools, for health care. But in South Africa housing, schools, and hospitals are segregated; the result of these discussions -- Executive Council voted to stop using Citibank as a repository for ECUSA funds.

Art Raymond, Victor Richie, and Steve Charleston, all American Indians, brought the plight of Indian people into sharp focus; particularly when they described the rampant alcoholism, high incidence of suicide, and severe poverty and neglect. The Council was better able to make responsible decisions related to Indian work and the national Church budget as a result of their testimony.

The Coalition for Human Needs - recipient of a major budget increase at the last General Convention - brings together people of varying backgrounds to make community-action grant decisions. CHN member Dorothy Granada is an articulate spokesperson for the nuclear arms freeze and a strong advocate of the fast for disarmament. Her witness encouraged Council members to endorse the fast and a national Church position against nuclear arms. Gloria Brown, another CHN member, will chair the upcoming conference on racism. She is eloquent in her conviction of the pervasive nature of racism today and of the urgent need for dioceses to undertake programs to overcome that evil.

Frank Turner and Nell Gibson were among those brought together in a task force to address the critical shortage of Black clergy in the Church. They provided a forum for designing a national Church plan aimed at the recruitment, training, and deployment of Black clergy; and Venture in Mission funds have been released for that purpose.

The writings of Daniel Yankelovich in his New Rules in American Life set the stage for the Executive Council and the Church Center staff to begin to develop long range policy for the Church within an understanding of God's call to the future. Dean Herbert O'Driscoll brought stunning insight to that task by defining the apocalypse he sees, an

apocalypse whose symbols are nuclear war and environmental collapse. He charged us also to make new covenants against the separateness of race and class and sex and age.

Support of the ordained women of our Church and a commitment to the validity of their orders had Barbara Schlachter introduce a resolution, which the Council affirmed, requesting the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Church of England to recognize and accept the men and women priests of the Church in this country.

This report of necessity mentions only a few of the people I have seen and heard during this past year. Nothing has been said about the ordinary day-to-day attention to education, to stewardship, to communication, to national and world mission. But the combined testimony of a great many people has been strong and their influence profound. Perhaps the point of it all can best be summarized by this quotation from Field Hobbs, once Vicar of St. Matthew's, Paramus, and now serving seven missions in South Dakota. Speaking of his Indian congregations he wrote to me, "they have nothing but their faith, no political clout, no social place; perhaps you, through your diocesan and national Church work, can bring aid and comfort to their pain".

### HISPANIC COMMISSION

During the past year the Hispanic Commission was involved in a variety of activities and held formal meetings on 10 occasions at parishes in the Diocese which have involvement in Hispanic Work.

The two on-going activities in which the Commission is involved are the Hispanic Theological Training Program: administered by the Instituto Pastoral Hispano and funded by the Dioceses of Newark, New York, New Jersey and Connecticut; and a Diocesan survey of the involvement of Hispanics in the activities of the Church. Last year three persons from the Diocese, including the Chairman of Commission, were among the 12 participants in the non-traditional program leading to possible ordination. The Diocesan survey results will be released shortly and will form the basis for future action by the Commission.

The Hispanic Commission began the year with an exhibition of photographs of Hispanic work in the Diocese at the Diocesan Convention and provided participants with a taste of Hispanic culture in the form of Cafe Cubano and Pastelillos.

This was followed by a workshop on Christian Education, held at Cathedral House on Feburary 7, during which 25 persons representing 12 congregations participated. Materials in Spanish were displayed and samples were distributed.

In March, about 150 persons from five parishes, attended an intercongregational activity at House of Prayer, Newark, and heard the Rev. Herbert Arrunategui, the National Hispanic Officer for the Episcopal Church, discuss the work of the Church among Spanish-speaking communicants and mission opportunities among Hispanics in communities across the country.

In April, Commission members participated in a stewardship workshop offered by the National Hispanic Commission and later, some members played a key role in the Missionary Offering service at Trinity Cathedral presented by Sunday school children. Proceeds of the offering went to help children in Latin America.

A "Dia En Espanol", during which Bishop Spong and other participants learned first-hand what it feels like to be asked to use a language that is "strange" to them, was held in May at St. John's, Union City. The "Day in Spanish" was conducted entirely in that language and those present were exposed to the experience of shopping in neighborhood stores, learning and playing Hispanic games, eating Spanish food and worshipping in Spanish.

In June, the Commission welcomed the Bishop of Cuba, the Rt. Rev. Jose Gonzalez, and heard a discussion of the trials and tribulations facing the Church in that Communist-dominated country.

After a summer hiatus, the Commission held mini-workshops in Christian education in October and November for Sunday School teachers of Grace Church, Union City and House of Prayer, Newark.

The year was brought to an end with an intercongregational Christmas activity at Grace Church.

The Commission has also been involved in the preparation of a translation into Spanish of the Lay Readers Guide, which will be one of the "textbooks" used in a forthcoming Lay Ministry Training program offered by the Commission and the Instituto Pastoral Hispano.

All in all, it has been a busy year for members of the Commission and next year, with the results of the parish survey serving as a spring-board, we expect to be even busier.

We thank the Diocese for the opportunity and support given us to do God's work among Hispanic newcomers. We are also thankful to the many individuals in the Diocese who understand the need for this ministry and for the encouragement they have given.

We hope to reach out to the thousands of persons of Spanish origin who are in our midst, not only to those who are already communicants and who can read of our endeavors in the Spanish column of the Voice, but also to those who are un-churched and who are crying out for material and spiritual sustinance.

With your continued help, we will move closer to fulfilling Christ's mandate to feed the hungry, clothe the naked and teach all nations.

### LAY SCHOOL OF CHRISTIAN STUDIES

The mission of the Lay School of Christian Studies is to make available to lay persons in the diocese thoughtful courses in Christian theology and life. A faculty of nineteen persons, each with advanced studies in his or her respective field, offers a total of forty-three courses for voluntary sponsorship by individual parishes and missions. Fees payable by sponsors to the Lay School cover faculty stipends, travel and school administrative costs. Fees and faculty stipends were raised 10% in 1981 to counter inflation. Six-week courses now cost \$360 and four-week courses, \$240.

The Lay School of Christian Studies operates within the framework of two semesters each year, the Fall and the Winter/Spring. In the late spring of each year a publicity mailing listing courses available is sent to the clergy and wardens of each parish and mission in the diocese. Congregations desiring to sponsor a course must reserve it, on a first-come-first-served basis, by mid-September. Publicity is then sent to all congregations in late September including a poster showing which courses are being presented in the diocese in the upcoming semester. Persons in the diocese are encouraged to attend courses in whatever parishes they are offered.

A similar preparation for the Winter/Spring is initiated by a mailing to all congregations in November and a listing in the VOICE of courses available for sponsorship.

The Lay School faculty includes fifteen parish clergy, four of whom hold earned doctorates and three, academic masters degrees. In addition, courses are offered by two professors of religion on the faculty of Drew University.

Offerings include courses in old testament, new testament, church history, theology, Christian ethics, worship, contemporary spirituality, lay ministry and contemporary personal and social issues.

In 1981 six courses were sponsored in the Fall semester and twelve in the Spring. In addition, the Lay School sponsored a ten-week core course in each of the two semesters at the Cathedral House.

### DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS

The year 1981 has been another great adventure for the Department of Missions. We have continued to commit ourselves to pursuing population growth and population change in northern New Jersey, and much of what follows will indicate our progress.

In June our long-sought ministry to Korean people was established in what had been an extinct parish in Bogota. Calling themselves St. Peter's Church, a number of committed lay people worked with the department to open this new ministry with a day of great signs and banners and a feast of Korean food. Koreans are the fastest growing ethnic group in this area, and with the arrival of the Reverend Jonathan Won from Korea, we look forward to an important and farreaching ministry.

Also in June, the arrival of the Reverend Ray Roberts permitted the formal opening of St. Thomas Church, Vernon, in the northwest corner of our diocese. This is the fastest growing community in northern New Jersey and we are happy to be a part of its growth.

St. Cyprian's Church in Hackensack has a Vicar of its own for the first time in its history. The Reverend Peter Igarashi, who is also Rector of St. John the Divine, Hasbrouck Heights, will enable us to pursue a serious ministry in that part of Hackensack.

We are pleased with the progress that most of our previous new ventures achieved during the year. In Hoboken, where we invested in an urban mission, two small parishes have merged into one, and attendance is growing as the influence of Holy Innocents Church is felt through its Rector, the Reverend Geoffrey Curtiss and some quickly developing lay leadership.

We have continued to invest in restoring buildings that had been too long neglected. Doing maintenance that has been so long postponed is an expensive proposition, but the department has used its funds as judiciously as possible and it is very satisfying to see morale grow as roof leaks are repaired and stained glass windows are protected by lexan. The restoration of the rectory and church in Vernon to their lovely historical condition and the enlarging of the vicarage in Secaucus are two of this year's largest accomplishments.

The Department of Missions has invested in two pieces of land in other growing areas. We purchased a four-acre tract in Budd Lake overlooking Route 46 where the population is growing and where we trust there will be demand for a mission in the near future. At present the Reverend Richard Constantinos and several members of Christ Church, Stanhope, are holding occasional services and exploring the best ways to get started. We also purchased land in Wantage, Sussex County, two and a half miles northwest of our church in Hamburg in anticipation of moving that church to a more promising location and more spacious quarters.

Some unfortunate things happened; the chief of these was the termination of our affiliation with Clarence Leon Williams, for 14 months the Executive Director of the Newark Episcopal Cooperative for Ministry and Mission (NECM). This meant that our planned school for Newark children has had to be postponed and a lot of people have been disappointed. However, we should note that the constituent parishes of NECM have begun to work together more closely than ever before and we trust that in the not too distant future we can build a solid foundation to our diocesan commitment to the city of Newark.

As we sought to upgrade the amount of clergy time available to our missions, we decided to yoke St. Joseph's, Byram and St. Gabriel's, Milton/Oak Ridge. Both of these places are capable of a growth which has until now proved elusive. The Reverend James Johnson was called as the Vicar of both places and we feel that good things lie ahead.

I should like to thank the people who have worked most closely with me, especially my secretary, Darla Brown, whose gentle kindness and commitment are great assets. I am grateful to the Reverend L. Jerome Taylor, Chairman of the Strategy Committee and the Reverend William Roeger, Chairman of the Property Committee, for work that went beyond the routine to the creative. We miss the Reverend Donald Beers, former Chairman of the Finance Committee, who gave so much to the Department of Missions but we are grateful to the Reverend Alan King, the new Chairman.

It is important also for me to express my gratitude to the Reverend Harry Smith, Chairman of an ad hoc committee which proposed a number of by-law changes. Most of these changes were accepted by the department as a whole, and they include decreasing the number of people elected each year to three clergy and three lay and the election of an Executive Committee which will meet on alternate months, leaving the department meetings in September, November, January, March, May, and June. Nearly everyone feels that as a result we will have greater efficiency in the dispatch of our business.

For the next year we await the surprises that will inevitably come but we are also committed to making decisions about our future work in Budd Lake and Wantage, to strengthening the new ministries we have undertaken this year and to pursuing appropriate goals for action in West New York and Weehawken along the Hudson River where population is building and there are many opportunities.

Also since many communities in the central and western part of our diocese are growing, but are presently too close for comfort to existing parishes and missions, we hope to undertake a program of instruction in missionary outreach for those churches which feel they could benefit from a disciplined approach to growth.

We are grateful for the past year and have learned a lot. We look forward to another exciting year in 1982.

### NEW JERSEY COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

In the course of 1981, the New Jersey Council of Churches, the state-wide ecumenical vehicle of the Diocese of Newark and her sister communions, addressed many critical concerns identified by representatives of the member denominations. These concerns ranged widely, from fuel for the poor to opposition to oppression in El Salvador, South Africa, and Poland; from ministry in the Neadowlands to ministry among migrants; from opposing the escalating arms race to advocacy of human services for the poor. In these wide-ranging matters, the Diocese of Newark played an active role by providing resources of leadership and funds, a significant contribution to the ecumenical effort of the entire Council of Churches.

# Special Diocesan Concerns

Of the many matters addressed by the Council of Churches in 1981, some have very special interest for the Diocese of Newark. The Council assumed the responsibility of channeling \$50,000.00 of money for fuel emergencies in three major cities: Newark, Trenton, and Camden. Although the total was small in relation to the enormous need, the care and imagination with which these funds were distributed in the cold of the winter symbolized the commitment of the ecumenical church for the poor in our cities.

A highlight of the year was the annual recognition dinner, addressed by the Right Reverend Paul Moore, Bishop of New York, who made a strong case for a more compassionate and just distribution of funds for human services to the poor. Thanks are expressed to Bishop John Shelby Spong for extending the Council's invitation to Bishop Moore to grace this significant occasion with his presence and challenging message.

In distributing funds from ACTS/Vim, the Diocese strengthened two ecumenical causes of special significance. One was the effort of the New Jersey Council of Churches to strengthen black/white relationships through an assembly of congregations that is at once significantly inter-racial and inter-denominational. The assembly is a focal point for bringing congregations together at a local level, for bridging chasms, for providing paradigms of local ecumenical fellowship and ministry, and for raising and addressing in an ecumenical context issues of crucial importance.

At a worship service held in the Newark Cathedral, the Reverend Marvin McMickle, a distinguished black pastor and first vice-president of the Council brought the sermon. At the close of 1981 a meeting of the Assembly of Congregations was planned in conjunction with the Morristown Clergy to be held in the Church of The Redeemer on February 4, 1982. The Diocese is represented on the black/white steering committee by the Reverend Alexander H. MacDonell.

The other ecumenical project to which ACTS/Vim made a contribution in 1981 was the New Jersey Interfaith Committee on Aging, a spin-off of Staff of the Council has given the New Jersey Council of Churches. leadership to the project that is comprised of representatives of Protestant, Roman Catholic, and Jewish bodies, the four theological seminaries in New Jersey, Seton Hall University, the Interreligious Liaison office of the American Association of Retired Persons, and the New Jersey Division on Aging. The Diocese of Newark is represented by the Reverend Donald Schroeder. Seminars with congregations are being held on the campuses of the four theological schools, Seton Hall, and other locations throughout the state. The primary purpose of these seminars is to help New Jersey congregations and seminaries learn about the effects of the aging process on the religious perspectives and self-understandings of persons; and to discover the needs of older persons and the meaningful types of ministry, understanding and support that churches and synagogues are offering or could offer, to meet these needs.

### Other Selected Highlights

The full report of the Council will be given in its annual Book of Reports presented to the Annual Meeting of the Council to be held May 1, 1982. Space here allows only a chronicling of some of the highlights. During the year, the following indicate some of the scope and content of the ecumenical ministry of the Diocese carried out through the New Jersey Council of Churches:

- \* Continued to provide through the Chaplaincy Consulting Committee for the coordination of chaplaincy activities in the state correctional institutions and hospitals. On the basis of its recommendations, the first full-time woman chaplain in a correctional in New Jersey was appointed to the Correctional Institution for women in Clinton.
- \* Through the Task Force on Criminal Justice of the Commission on Pastoral and Institutional Ministries (one of the six Council Commissions), the Council is in process of identifying potential resource leaders on prison ministry and the criminal justice system who will commit themselves to serve as resource persons to local congregations and judicatories interested in becoming involved in prison ministries, ex-offender programs, or other areas of the criminal justice system. The Commission intends to provide a skills-training workshop for these resource leaders and, after the recruitment and training of a network of resource persons, to conduct a mailing to churches encouraging their involvement in ministry to the criminal justice system and offering the help of the cooperating resource leaders.
- \* Continued a supportive role in relation to the proposed Meadowlands Ministry for which the Diocese of Newark has provided leadership in the person of the Reverend David Kern, vicar of the Church of Our Saviour in Secaucus and the designated missioner of the Meadowlands of the Diocese of Newark.
- \* Coordinating and supervising an interdenominational study of Hispanic populations and ministries in Hudson County where according to the 1980 census 145,000 persons (26% of the population) are of Spanish

- origin. The object is to provide information and data that will be helpful to the denominations and their parishes in ministering more effectively to persons of Spanish origin. Dr. Thomas H. Donnelly, a professor of sociology at St. Peter's College in Jersey City has been contracted to conduct the study.
- \* Through the staff of the Commission on Research and Church Development, continues to obtain, analyze and distribute to members of the Commission and their denominations data from the 1980 census as it becomes available. Issued and distributed widely the first of its analytical trend reports: "Changes in Total and Black Populations By County and Municipalities 1970-1980."
- \* Pressed successfully to get the Senate, Assembly, and Governor to pass a bill that extends to clergy the same expansion of confidentiality in their group and family counselling as was extended to professional psychologists.
- \* Supported the passage of the Hardwick bill on amending the Camp Safety Act to prevent State Health Department intrusions into the operation of church vacation schools.
- \* Conducted a successful Government Day in Trenton, addressed by Mayor Kenneth Gibson on the question of budget cuts and by a sociologist and economist who described future economic scenarios. Introduced a large group of church people to the state house and to governmental processes, including steps in the introduction, study hearings, and passage of a legislative bill.
- \* Supported and acted as a conduit for funding for a New Jersey Farm Workers Rights Task Force. The Council is in process of helping Channel 13 (PBS) do an hour long program on farm labor.
- \* Helped to stave off the death penalty for another year, according to the policies of the denominations and actions of the Governing Board of the Council.
- \* Geared to put educational materials in the hands of state legislators and state press corps on short notice.
- \* Was successful in pressing the Governor to declare a national Nuclear Freeze Week. Supported through the Inter-Faith Task Force for Peace, a spin-off of the Council and staffed by the Council, many efforts to reduce the arms race. Presently involved in introducing a referendum proposal to the state legislature that would give New Jersey citizens a right to vote next November on their concerns about a runaway arms race.
- \* Acted as a conduit for legal defense fund for a minority person in Paterson. This person has now been acquitted.
- \* Strengthened the New Jersey Impact network that provides vital information on bills before the legislature. High quality monthly public issue newsletters reach nearly 1,000 New Jerseyans. In 1981 two of the issues were on Human Sexuality and Farm Labor in New Jersey.

- \* Continued to press in Atlantic City the concerns of the poor and minorities for housing and employment.
- \* Cooperated with state Attorney General Zizalli on a variety of effors: child labor, government industry sweatshops in North Jersey Spanish communities, and a special anti-arson urban program.
- \* Worked with Trenton Ecumenical Area Ministry to provide medical care for a paraplegic in Trenton State Prison and to correct gross injustices against him, resulting in his parole, provision for medical care, and an out-of-court settlement of money for him. Commutation of sentence is being pursued.
- \* Worked, unsuccessfully, in support of Senator Merlino's gun control bill.
- \* Gave staff support to the New Jersey Coalition of Religious Leaders, chairing the steering committee for the president, Rabbi David Panitz.
- \* Pressed successfully for an anti-terrorism bill to protect racial and ethnic minorities. After two years, the bill was passed and the Governor signed it.
- \* Supported the Water Bond issue. The General Secretary served on the Citizen's Task Force named by the Governor.
- \* Provided casino information to New York State and Michigan, an input helping one to keep the issue off the ballot and the other to defeat the referendum to legalize casinos.
- \* Supported the successful passage of the Farmlands Preservation Bond Issue.
- \* Advocated without equivocation any weakening amendments to the extension of the Voting Rights Act.
- \* Took position urging caution on the state police entering municipalities without proper and healthy relationships to the communities affected.
- \* With the League of Women Voters, the NAACP, and other groups strongly supported the integrity of the electoral process.
- \* Co-sponsored a celebration of the 100th Anniversary of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Trenton.
- \* Held a Christian Unity service in a Roman Catholic Church in Asbury Park, a first of its kind in New Jersey.
- \* Planned with an inter-faith media group and NBC-TV special programs on family problems to be broadcast during the Lenten season.
- \* Featured on radio and television programs many concerns of the Council and persons such as Bishop Spong, Peg Stewart, president of Church Women United, and Governor Byrne.

- \* Served through its Commission on Radio and Television as consultant to churches interested in getting involved in local cable-TV systems in the production of programs.
- \* Presented Arthur Jones and Paul Stagg on Channel 6 in Philadelphia on the Council's ministry, particularly on the project "Black and White Together." Also presented on television the Reverend Charles Marks with the General Secretary on a New York televesion station.

### Strengthening our Ministry

During 1981 a concerted effort was made to broaden the basis of participation in the Council. Through the leadership of Bishop Spong and a receptive response from parish clergy and lay people a strong beginning had been made in terms of relating the Council to parishes. The objective is to inform a wider group of persons in parishes about the ministries of the Council and to assure greatly increased participation in and suppoet of its ecumenical endeavors. The fostering of unity and mission cannot be left to chance, and efforts are being made, and will be continued in 1982, to foster ecumenism at a local level and to interface it with the work of the Council at a state level. Although the above report, selective as it is, shows many accomplishments, the future of the Council depends on broadening its base of informed participation and in a day of inflation undergirding its ministries with more adequate funding. Reports from field visits suggest that in the Diocese of Newark, as well as in other denominations, there is a responsive chord, and for this encouragement we give thanks.

We cannot close this report without expressing appreciation for Ms. Jean Stanfield who was added to the staff to give valued leadership in the development program of the Council.

### COMMISSION ON WOMEN'S MINISTRIES

The Commission on Women's Ministries was created in 1979 to facilitate the ministries of lay and ordained women within the diocese and to demonstrate to the Church the necessity of encouraging and holding up these particular ministries. Four years later our vision continues to call us to new forms of life and ministry.

Seeing itself as an umbrella Commission with many areas of interest and concern, the Commission established a statement of purpose this year. The Statement has been added to this report.

The Commission has become involved directly in community outreach and ministry by association with the North Porch Women's Centre in Newark. The Centre continues to sponsor a pantry for infants needs and a parents' hot line for the prevention of child abuse. North Porch is an example of a ministry directed and supported by women.

In an attempt to encourage greater participation in the household of faith, the Commission has also sought to raise the issue of much needed child care at Church functions, whether at the local parish or diocesan level.

The Commission has also encouraged and made specific liaison relationships with official and unofficial women's commissions in other denominations.

The Commission has sought, through resolution to the 108th Diocesan Convention, funding for its own activity.

The Commission on Women's Ministry enthusiastically looks forward to the coming year for the development, establishment and support of new ministries in the diocese.

During the year material aid has been given to the House of Prayer and the Chapel at the Port Newark branch of the Seamen's Church Institute. A number of the members and friends of the Diocesan Altar Guild visited the Chapel and took note of Altar needs. At the present time, our Diocesan Altar Guild is serving as that Chapel's Altar Guild until more adequate arrangements can be made.

A request for vestments, hangings, etc., has been received rom St. Jude's Ranch in Boulder City, Nevada. We plan to respond to this request. Some good but used vestments were given to one of our clergy for his brother who resides in another Diocese. A cloak was given to a Brother of the Order of St. Gregory.

The Diocesan Altar Guild continues to prepare the altar at All Saints' Chapel for the Staff Eucharist, Wednesday noons. Each year within All Saints' octave, the Annual Corporate Communion Service is held at All Saints' Chapel. This year twenty-three names were read and later inscribed in the Book of Remembrance. At the Luncheon Meeting, following the Service, we were happy to have Sister Suzanne Elizabeth give a slide presentation of her trip to the Holy Land.

### WORLD OF OUR DIOCESAN YOUTH

### W.O.O.D.Y.

The Diocesan Youth Ministry continues to provide many opportunities for young people in our Diocese to experience a dimension of our Church that is exciting and challenging. Through Diocesan wide conferences and rallies, participation in Provincial activity and in preparation for our trip to the National Convention W,0.0.D.Y.'s ministry has been a channel for leadership and creative expression.

In 1981 W.O.O.D.Y. conducted three high school weekend conferences, one Junior High School weekend conference, three Sunday afternoon rallies, a five day intensive leadership training conference in June, participation in a Provincial Adult Leadership Conference and a Provincial High School Conference. Opportunity is provided for young people to work together through the W.O.O.D.Y. Council to provide direction for this youth ministry. W.O.O.D.Y. also had some 20 young people serving as pages to the Diocesan Convention in January.

Bishop Spong spoke at the spring High School Youth weekend and challenged the youth to engage in identifying values for Human Sexuality. His presentation stimulated much debate and the spring W.O.O.D.Y. News recorded a set of values that the young people felt operative in their lives. This debate concerning Human Sexuality sparked discussion in our Diocese and provided an opportunity for our young people to speak to their concerns and issues.

The summer conference was led by Jon Sams, a creative priest in our Church who helped those gathered understand the value of self direction in conference life and its implications for one's personal life. Jon, a long time friend of our work challenged the participants to struggle with their quest for dignity and freedom and to realize that they were responsible for their life choices.

The fall conference was highlighted by a three hour worship experience that provided an open community of prayer, fellowship and love. Through an intense struggle to identify the value of community W.O.O.D.Y. has built their conferences upon the value of freedom, honesty and openness. The liturgical life of our conferences is a celebration of this fact and a recognition of our participation in it.

The discouraging part of 1981 was the continued erosion of parish participation on a Diocesan level. There seemed to be a retrenchment in parochial activity and a concerted effort not to cross economic or racial lines with our young people. Therefore, parishes claiming to be conducting youth ministry did not encourage diocesan participation. While several parishes were visited by W.O.O.D.Y and several youth ministries began as a result there is a need for W.O.O.D.Y. to witness

toward a broader conception of our Church. Some of this parochialism may have been caused by adult leadership or the lack of it however, this retrenchment was a significant aspect of our work this year and inhibited us on several occasions.

Another concern raised in this observation is whether we wish to identify the critical nature of our ministry to high school youth and young adults. The priority of our parish work continues to be self-serving that consistency that is present without a realization that the struggle to incorporate youth in our Church life must be intentional and direct. Time and again people identified as youth ministers are constricted or inhibited by parochial concerns. The Church must weigh this choice recognizing the boundaries and limitations we place upon the ministry when it is forced to comply to a family parish model.

Finally W.O.O.D.Y. Council continues to grow in its ministry. Members of the Council began to own some of the ministry to young people and to create new ways to reach out to build bridges. An exciting venture was taken when David Kern and Sarah Smith organized a dramathon in which high school youth performed at our three extended care facilities.

While this event went unnoticed in the Diocese it had a profound effect upon our young people who discovered the power of their worth with a group of elderly people. House of the Holy Comforter, Heath Village, and Hackettstown all received a tremendous gift from our young people because they gave them the opportunity to be ministers.

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This program has been established as a lasting tribute to Bishop Rath by helping to make possible post-secondary education of children of the clergy of the Diocese of Newark.

Application for these scholarships is open to children of clergy canonically resident in the Diocese of Newark or children of deceased clergy so resident at their time of death who plan to pursue a course of study leading to a traditional baccalaureate degree in an accredited college or university. The scholarships are renewable awards. The George E. Rath Scholarship Fund is administered by the Committee utilizing the assistance of the College Scholarship Service (CSS) or some similar needs analysis service.

All phases of the scholarship screening, including selection of recipients and determination of the amount of scholarship awards, are determined by the Scholarship Committee of the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Newark.

### Who is Eligible?

High school and college students who are children of clergy who are canonically resident in the Diocese of Newark and children of deceased clergy so resident at their death are eligible to apply for these scholarships. The clergy parent (living) must have been canonically resident as of September 30 of the year prior to the date of application.

### How Does a Student Participate?

Students already attending college or students who will complete their high school requirements and enter college in the following school year, and who wish to seek a George E. Rath Scholarship award during their following year should apply to the Committee.

Students already enrolled in a post-secondary institution should complete the application form and submit it together with a certified transcript of their marks since entering college.

### How Does One Enter the Program?

Any qualified applicant seeking scholarship aid shall submit an entry blank. The necessary entry blank may be obtained from the Diocesan Administrator The completed entry blank must be mailed no later than February 1 to:

The February I deadline greatly facilitates the selection process.

Late entry blanks will not be accepted. Applications will not be automatically acknowledged. Anyone who wishes an acknowledgement should enclose a self-addressed

stamped envelope with the entry blank. All subsequent material required by the Committee must be supplied prior to April 1. No application will be considered if all material is not submitted by April 1.

Scholarship recipients will be selected by the Scholarship Committee of the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Newark. Financial need will be an especially significant factor in granting awards.

Those persons finally selected will be notified of their scholarship and the amount prior to June 1.

# How Is the Amount Determined?

The amount of the recipient's award is determined annually by the Scholarship Committee and is based on a computation which takes into account both the family's financial situation and the costs of attending the college selected, including tuition, room and board, books and supplies, and special expenses. The family's financial information will be treated in the strictest confidence. Since the amount of the award is related to individual need, it will not be included in any public announcement of the scholarship. Obviously the amount of award will be related also to the total amount available for grants from the fund in any given year.

### Who Serves on the Committee?

The Committee shall be made up of the Bishop and the senior lay member and senior clerical member of the Standing Committee.

### How Is the Fund to be Publicized?

Information regarding the fund shall be advertised each year in standard diocesan publications, with notices appearing no later than the October issue of the VOICE and the November issue of the Clergy Newsletter. The Bishop's administrative staff will provide said notices as scheduled and will make application forms available.

# What Is the Amount of the Scholarship Award?

Minimum awards shall be \$100 yearly. Maximum awards shall be determined by the Committee based on income available from the fund, financial need and cost of education.

#### THE AUTOMATIC PENSION FUND

In the case of the Automatic Pension Fund the Trustees shall annually divide as of May first the income received on the Fund during the preceding year among those Clergymen who:

- (a) have attained the age of sixty-five years and have notified the Trustees of that fact prior to May first of the year in question; and
- (b) were canonically resident in the Diocese for the five years immediately preceding such notification; and
- (c) were for at least five years of their last term of canonical residence settled Ministers or Missionaries duly appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority; and
- (d) have retired on account of age or disability. No such clergymen shall receive in excess of \$1,000. from this Fund in any one year and all surplus of income, if any, and gifts and donations to the Automatic Pension Fund shall be added to the principal of the Fund.

## FUND FOR THE RELIEF OF CLERGYMEN AND THEIR DEPENDENTS

In the case of the Fund for the Relief of Clergymen and Their Dependents, the Trustees shall at their discretion annually as of May first appropriate the estimated income of the Fund during the current year for:

- (a) the relief of disabled Clergymen cannonically resident in the Diocese;
- (b) the relief of the widows and children and the defraying of the funeral expenses of deceased Clergymen who were canonically resident in the Diocese at the time of their demise.

Unappropriated income shall in the discretion of the Trustees be reserved as a contingency fund for the foregoing purposes or may be added to the principal of the Fund.

MENORANDUM OF INFORMATION REQUIPED BY THE BISHOP AND THE STANDING COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK ON PETITION BY A PARISH TO SELL. LEASE OR MORTGAGE REAL ESTATE.

An excerpt of the January 10, 1979, Minutes of the Standing Committee:

"With reference to the discussion at the last meeting regarding parish transfer of property and specifically options given to clergy to purchase the rectory at a later date, the point was made that verbal commitments on the part of a parish to sell or transfer property should be cleared with the Standing Committee prior to their being given. It was suggested that in addition to this being communicated to the parishes through the Diocesan Journal and the Clergy Newsletter, it should go in materials which are used when calling a new rector.

- Title 1, Canon 6, Section 3 of the General Church Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church provides that no Vestry shall encumber or alienate any real property without the written consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee of the Diocese.
- II. The Revised Statutes of the State of New Jersey (R.S. 16:12-4) provide as follows:

"No sale, conveyance or mortgage of any real estate other than burial lots in churchyards or cemeteries, and no lease for a longer term than one year shall be made by such corporation without the previous written consent of the Bishop and a majority of the Standing Committee of the Diocese within which the corporation is located\*\*\*. Without such consent the sale, conveyance, mortgage or lease whall be void."

.!!!. In the discharge of the responsibilities placed upon them by canonical and civil law the Bishop and the Standing Committee have adopted the following rules and regulations with respect to selling, leasing and mortgaging real estate belonging to the parishes of this Diocese.

### Sell or Lease

No application to sell or lease real estate for more than one year will be entertained until the petitioner has filed the following documents in proper form with the Secretary of the Standing Committee:

- A resolution by the Rector, Wardens and Vestry of the Parish authorizing the execution of the petition to sell or lease real estate.
- 2. A petition which shall contain or be accompanied by supporting schedules containing the following:
  - (a) A description of the property by metes and bounds.
  - (b) Information as to whether the property has been consecrated.
  - (c) Information as to whether the property is improved and if so the nature of any buildings thereon and their present use.
  - (d) The reason or reasons for selling or leasing the property.
  - (e) In the case of a sale, the terms and conditions of the sale, together with a statement of the intended disposition of the proceeds of the sale should be set forth.

(f) In the case of a sale, the petition must be accompanied by a written appraisal of a qualified real estate appraiser.

#### V. Mortgage

No application to mortgage real estate will be entertained until the petitioner has filed the following documents in proper form with the Secretary of the Standing Committee:

- 1. A resolution by the Rector, Wardens and Vestry of the Parish authorizing the execution of the petition to mortgage real estate.
- 2. A petition which shall contain or be accompanied by supporting schedules containing the following:
  - (a) A description of the property by metes and bounds.
  - (b) A statement of the size and terms of the mortgage including the interest rate, duration, amortization period and name of lending institution.
  - (c) A statement of the reasons why it is necessary to borrow the money secured by the mortgage, including the planning for the ultimate repayment of the amount borrowed.
  - (d) A brief income and operating statement of the Parish for the last two fiscal years showing sources of income including pledges, plate offerings, rental income, income from investment, and the like; and expenses, including salaries and other expenses.
  - (e) A statement that the parish has met its Diocesan Quota (Share) for the previous three years; if not, the reasons therefor.
  - (f) A statement of any other outstanding indebtedness.
  - (g) A statement of the present parish membership showing the number of baptized persons and communicants as contrasted with comparable figures of five years ago.
- VI. The foregoing documents in proper form should be sent to the Secretary of the Standing Committee, 24 Rector Street, Newark, N.J. 07102, following which the petitioning parish will be advised of the manner in which the petition will be entertained. Normally correct petitions fully prepared and duly submitted to the Secretary of the Standing Committee will be sufficient for the Committee to take action. The Secretary of the Standing Committee shall notify the petitioning parish if it is necessary to appear to present the petition in person. Upon personal appearance before the Standing Committee, a petitioning parish may request a waiver of any of the foregoing documents.
- VII. The Vestry of the petitioning parish is cautioned to establish a date for closing the transaction which shall allow ample time for preparation of the petition and its accompanying schedules and the presentation thereof to the Bishop and the Standing Committee. It is suggested that the petition and its accompanying schedules be reviewed by counsel for the petitioner before the filing of the petition with the Standing Committee.
