133rd ANNUAL CONVENTION - DIOCESE OF NEWARK SATURDAY, JANUARY 20, 2007 - SKYLANDS, RANDOLPH CONVENTION MINUTES

The 133rd Annual Convention of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark was held on Saturday, January 20, 2007 at the Skylands in Randolph, NJ.

The Eucharist was celebrated at 8:30 a.m. in the Opal Room on the first floor. The Rt. Rev. John Palmer Croneberger, Diocesan Bishop, was the celebrant. The Rev. Mark Beckwith, Bishop-elect, was the preacher. The offering from the service totaled \$4,217.30 and was divided equally to the Diocese of Panama and the John Palmer Croneberger Cathedral Enrichment Fund.

The business session was held in the second floor ballroom and called to order at 10:35 a.m. by Bishop Croneberger, President, and opened with prayer.

A determination of a quorum in both orders was made and the Convention was declared ready for business.

PARLIAMENTARIANS

The president appointed L. Allison Garde, Esq., and John G. Webb, Esq., as Parliamentarians.

RESOLUTIONS ON NEW MATTERS

Ms. Marge Christie, Christ Church, Ridgewood, presented a resolution to support and affirm the Presiding Bishop, The Most Rev. Katharine Jefferts Schorl. The resolution was presented as a new matter because the level of hostility against her was recently increasing. The presiding bishop was scheduled for the consecration of The Rev. Mark Beckwith on January 27, one week hence. The resolution was accepted for consideration by a 2/3 vote and referred to the Resolutions Committee.

Mr. Edgar (Kim) Byham, All Saints', Hoboken, introduced a resolution on the diocesan budget although it did not change any line Items of the budget. The resolution referred to budgetary matters and as such was a new matter because the budget was recommended by Diocesan Council after the resolutions deadline. The resolution was accepted for consideration by a 2/3 vote and referred to the Resolutions Committee.

RESOLUTION OF COURTESY

Ms. Frieda Smith, Trinity, Montclair, moved the courtesy resolution, as follows:

RESOLVED, That the courtesy of seat and voice be accorded to the following: officers of the Diocese of Newark; The Rev. Mark M. Beckwith; Caron R. Carter Echols; clergy Ilcensed to officiate in the Diocese of Newark, The Reverends James Robert Hagler, Godwin Nwachukwu, Bruce Woodcock; Deacons having fewer than two years in Holy Orders; Lay Members of the Standing Committee, the Diocesan Council, the Commission on Ministry, and the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties; Members of committees, commissions and institutions reporting to the Convention; the Sisters of St. John Baptist Convent; Ecumenical Guests; Mrs. Doris Mardirosian, Episcopal Church Women President; Candidates and Postulants for Holy Orders.

The courtesy resolution was adopted.

Bishop Croneberger introduced the new clergy and those serving in new cures. (As the names were read each stood in his/her place.)

S. Elizabeth Searle, rector, Christ Church, Ridgewood; The Rev. David Veale, rector, Grace, Union City; The Rev. Hilary Won, vicar, St. Peter's Korean Episcopal Church, North Bergen; and, The Rev. Fairbairn Powers from Christ Hospital, Jersey City, to interim Holy Innocents, West Orange and All Saints', Orange.

RULES OF ORDER

The Rev. Dr. Jane Tomaine, St. Peter's, Livingston and chair of the Committee, reported that the committee met in December. The Committee reviewed the Rules of Order adopted by the 132nd Convention and received a report from the Nominations Committee elected under the terms of those Rules of Order. There were no proposed changes to the Rules.

The Nominations Committee strove to meet its mandate to provide more candidates than

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vacancles and submitted its list of candidates for consideration by the 133rd Convention.

The Committee on Rules of Order and Elections recommended that the Rules of Order adopted for the 132nd Convention be adopted for the 133nd Convention.

Motion: That the Rules of Order adopted for the 132nd Convention be adopted for the 133nd Convention. The motion was adopted. [The adopted Rules of Order are printed in this Journal.]

On behalf of the committee, The Rev. Jane Tomaine presented Bishop Croneberger with a copy of Robert's Rules of Order to have with him in retirement.

RIGHTS OF CLERICAL DEPUTIES

Ms. Naomi Horsky, St. Gabriel's, Milton/Oak Ridge, moved the election of the following to the Committee on the Rights of Clerical Deputies: The Rev. Margaret (Maggie) Gat, St. John's, Dover; The Rev. William Guthrie, Christ Church, East Orange; and Ms. Joan Van Ry, St. Clement's, Hawthorne. The motion was seconded and adopted.

RIGHTS OF LAY DEPUTIES

The Rev. Nancy Read, Christ Church, Bloomfield/Glen Ridge, moved the election of the following to the Committee on the Rights of Lay Deputies: Ms. Debbie VanExel, St. Luke's, Montclair; Ms. Lillian Collins, Incamation, Jersey City; and The Rev. John Donnelly, St. Michael's, Wayne. The motion was seconded and adopted.

COMMITTEE ON ELECTIONS

Mr. Russ Worthington, chair, presented the report and the list of candidates for elected offices and gave instructions on the use of the preferential ballot system.

ORDER OF THE DAY: 2007 Proposed Unified Budget

Mr. John Zinn, Treasurer and Chief Financial Officer, presented the budget recommended by the Diocesan Council. The budget was moved and seconded by the committee.

Mr. Zinn reported this year clearly illustrated that the diocesan finances were determined by the congregational piedges. When the budget was finalized, it was projected that congregational piedges were \$200,000 lower than in 2006. That required cuts in nearly every line of the budget, including programs. The goal was to take that action in a balanced and fair way to preserve as much of the mission and ministry as possible. The budget assumed a \$60,000 cut in staffing. Because of the Episcopal transition, the staff reductions were postponed for the new administration. The budget will reduce to 21% the pledge and investment income given to the national church. The system of giving at a level of 25% to the national church, rather than the assigned amount, was adopted in 1991 as part of the 50/50 stewardship process. (At that time, it was The Rev. John Palmer Croneberger, now bishop of the diocese, who proposed the 25% giving to the national church.) The new resolution addresses that earlier adopted process. The pledge income line of the budget was determined by estimates of giving to the diocese, and those estimates can change during the year. The most recent pledge changes made in the past week were not good. The budget may need to be revisited during 2007.

There were no resolutions received by the deadline, and without emergency resolutions presented, the budget was moved for adoption.

The Rev. Orion Davis asked what would be the procedures if the members of convention voted not to accept the budget. Mr. Zinn responded it would become a matter for the Diocesan Council. Bishop Croneberger noted that in some dioceses their Diocesan Councils adopted the annual budgets.

Motion: It was moved and seconded to approve the budget recommended by Diocesan Council. The motion was adopted with several objections. [The adopted budget is printed in the Journal.]

COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION & CANONS

Diane Sammons, Esq., Chancellor, presented the report from the Committee on Constitution & Canons. The report included a proposed amendment for a first reading to the Diocesan Constitution, Article II, Section 4 (ii) (the amendment would eliminate a two year waiting period for deacon voting and a residency period for priests); a revision to Canon 1, Section 1 that referred to the same matter; an amendment to Canon 2, Section 8 on the anti-racism training to eliminate a perceived deficit in the canon and apply the canon to elected and appointed diocesan offices; and

Amendments to Canon 5, Diocesan Council, and Canon 6, Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties, were not recommended by the Committee on Constitution and Canons because the proposed changes were significant and required further discussion among the diocesan entities involved and there were some questions raised as to whether some aspects of the proposal might be considered violative of state statutory laws. Rather, the committee recommended that consideration be delayed until sufficient study was made of the possible legal ramifications and to give the bishop-elect and the various diocesan entities time to discuss. After discussions, the proponents assented to a revised Canon 5 for the Diocesan Council and agreed to a resolution on Canon 6 calling for the appointment by the bishop of a group to study and recommend language defining the role of the Trustees. The group will report back to the 2008 convention. Prior to that time, a diocesan wide discussion would be held on the topic. Both the revised diocesan canon and the resolution for a study group came with the recommendation of the bishop's office and the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

Amendments to the canons proposed by the ad-hoc Property Committee relating to memorial gardens and yearly maintenance inspections of rectories were not recommended by the Committee which felt that an educational process rather than a canonical change should address the issues. The proponents agreed to withdraw the amendments for consideration.

The amendments and resolution were referred to the open hearing. [Complete texts of the amendments and resolutions are printed in the Journal.]

TASK FORCE ON LAY COMPENSATION

The Rev. Paul Walker, Christ Church, Belleville, and Ms. Joan Lodge, Christ Church, Newton, co-chairs, presented the report on behalf of the task force. The report included proposed resolutions related to minimum vacation time, job descriptions and performance reviews, and state unemployment insurance benefit.

The report and the resolutions were referred to the open hearing.

MINISTRY CAPACITY AREA EXPECTATIONS

Ms. Faith Gideon Brown, St. Andrew & Holy Communion, South Orange, presented an update

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on the Ministry Capacity Area Expectations developed by the Congregational Vitality Work Group of Diocesan Council. She was joined by other members of the work group: The Rev. Fain Webb, Good Shepherd, Wantage; The Rev. Prince Singh, St. Alban's, Oakland; The Rev. Gray Lesesne, All Saints', Glen Rock; Mr. Andrew Piccirillo, St. Dunstan's, Succasunna; Ms. Carol Taylor, Epiphany, Orange; The Rev. Kathryn King, All Saints', Bergenfield, and Canon R. Carter Echols. This past year, language and tools continued to be developed and designed to enable congregations to have a meaningful discussion about their capacity for ministry and the ways in which improvements can be realized.

In November, the Diocesan Council endorsed the Expectations for Congregations in Six Ministry Capacity Areas, a document developed by the Congregational Vitality Work Group to assist all congregations in the Diocese to be vibrant, life-giving faith communities that proclaim the Gospel and make it relevant in their unique environment. Further, the Expectations would be disseminated by the Council to all congregations and their parochial clergy and elected lay leadership and to the board members of the Ward Herbert Fund, ACTS/VIM, and the Congregational Growth and Development Fund, with the intent that all parishes and missions be encouraged to assess themselves in light of these expectations within the next year.

For Diocesan Council, the significant benefit to adopting this document was that it would enable all entities in the Diocese with a concern and commitment for strengthening congregations to share a common vision for increasing capacity for ministry and to be intentionally supportive of those parishes and missions not fully able to envision their own capabilities.

The Six Ministry Capacity Areas were:

- 1) External Ministry Contexts: Where and to whom is the congregation called to minister?
- 2) Christian Identity, Gifts, Strengths and Challenges: What do we bring to this call to ministry?
- 3) Vision/Future Goals/Dreams: In what direction(s) are we called at this time?
- 4) Systems Functionality (How things work in our congregation); How well do we minister together in God's name?
- 5) Church Growth/Evangelism Capacity How able are we to make disciples?
- 6) Mutual Ministry: How well do we partner as clergy and laity?

TASK FORCE ON REPARATIONS

The Rev. Christine McCloud presented a status report on the work of the Reparations Task Force. The other members were introduced: Dr. Louie Crew, Grace, Newark; The Rev. Dr. Allison Moore, Good Shepherd, Fort Lee; Mr. Lionel Garrison, St. Paul's, Englewood; The Rev. Michael Gerhardt, Christ Church, Teaneck; The Rev. Sandye Wilson, St. Andrew & Holy Communion, South Orange; Mr. Peter Rhinehart, St. Paul's, Englewood; Ms. Lyn Headley-Deavours, Justice Missioner, and Diane Sammons, Esq., Chancellor.

The task force's ongoing charge had been to study and engage in diocesan discussions on

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the theology, history, issues and feasibility of restitution to the descendants of Africans who were enslaved in America over a period of 247 years. More specifically, the group was charged with exploring how the Diocese of Newark should begin the process of restoring all people to unity with God and each other in Christ as outlined in the catechism in the Book of Common Prayer as it related to the legacy of slavery, the need for repentance and restitution.

Over the last two years the task force worked diligently to digest and often times struggle with the realities of the sheer magnitude and cruelty of the American past toward people of color and the reverberating effects throughout the generations. The topic of reparations continued to evoke the racial divide, resentment and pain that plagued the country since its founding. The history of slavery and its legacy remained largely untaught, unacknowledged and unfocused. This was not the time to be dispirited. The members continued to move through the murky process.

In 2006 the work of the group was slowed down because of other activities for committee members, such as the bishop's search process. Despite that, diocesan discussions continued with forums and workshops. The diocese was one of three studying the issues of reparations in TEC and the group was proud that the General Convention incorporated resolutions submitted by the Diocese of Newark into the ones adopted last year by the General Convention, A123 and A127. The committee would continue its work and collaborate with other entities and organizations – NY, NJ and the national church committee. The committee asked for support for its resolution to continue its work.

Motion: Resolved, That in response to the 75th General Convention Resolutions A123 and A127 the work of the Reparations Task Force be continued and that the Task Force report to both the 134th Annual Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark and to the Anti-racism Committee of the Executive Council of The Episcopal Church in January 2008.

The resolution was moved for adoption and adopted. [The justice ministries report is published in this journal.]

ASSISTANT BISHOP RESOLUTION

Diane Sammons, Esq., Chancellor, presented and moved the following resolution:

RESOLVED, that the Bishop with the consent of the Standing Committee having requested the creation of the position of Assistant Bishop in accordance with the provisions of Canon III.21.1, the Convention of the Diocese of Newark hereby creates the position of Assistant Bishop and authorizes the Bishop to appoint a Bishop for the position, with the consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, and under such conditions as the Bishop may determine.

Ms. Sammons explained that Canon III.21.1 provided that "when a Diocese, in the opinion of its Bishop, requires additional Episcopal services, the Bishop may, with the consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, ask the Convention of the Diocese to approve the creation of the position of Assistant Bishop and to authorize the Bishop to appoint a Bishop for

the position, with the consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, and under such conditions as the Bishop may determine.* The approval given by Convention in 2000 to Bishop Croneberger to appoint an assistant bishop was not transferable to the next incoming bishop. This resolution would give The Rev. Mark Beckwith, next diocesan bishop, the authority to appoint an assistant bishop should the need arise prior to the next Diocesan Convention. The Standing Committee had given its consent.

The motion was seconded and adopted.

EXTINCT PARISH RESOLUTION

Diane Sammons, Esq., Chancellor, moved the extinct parish resolution for Trinity Church, Montclair. The vestry voted on December 17, 2006 to close. The resolution would permit the next step to legally dissolve the parish corporation. The resolution was seconded and adopted.

The extinct parish resolution was as follows:

Whereas the incorporated parish entitled The Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Trinity in Montclair at a regular meeting held on December 17, 2006 duly resolved to dissolve said parish corporation; and

Whereas the action to dissolve the incorporated parish, entitled The Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Trinity in Montclair has caused said incorporated parish to become unable to function as a corporation; and, be it further

Resolved, that the incorporated parish entitled The Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Trinity in Montclair is hereby declared by this Convention to be extinct as an incorporated parish; and, be it further

Resolved, that the dissolution of the said corporation by this Convention is hereby approved, ratified and confirmed; and, be it further

Resolved, that all assets held in the name of The Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of Trinity in Montclair shall, as a result of this action, and in accordance with Title 16, Chapter 12, Article 1, Section 16 of Revised Statutes of New Jersey, as amended, revert to and be held by the corporation of the Diocese known and designated as the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties of the Diocese of Newark.

The Rev. John Hartnett, St. Elizabeth's, Ridgewood, commented that there were rarely public discussions on what leads to a parish becoming extinct and it would be helpful but difficult for the discussion to be held in public.

Motion: The Rev. John Hartnett moved that there be an investigation into the causes of the extinction of Trinity and a public report of the findings of the investigation be published to the diocese. The resolution was seconded and adopted.

In a point of personal privilege, The Rev. Canon Gervais Clarke, Epiphany, Orange, noted that it must be painful for a church to make the decision to close and wanted the members of Trinity to know that they were in everyone's prayers and all sent well wishes to the members.

COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION & CANONS

Diane Sammons, Esq., Chancellor, presented the amendments to the Constitution and Canons that had been referred to the open hearings.

The <u>amendment to Article II, Sec. 4 (ii)</u> (Diocesan Convention, Members of Diocesan Convention) to eliminate the waiting period for deacons and newly canonically resident priests was adopted on first reading. [Amendments to the Constitution must be approved at two successive Diocesan Conventions.]

The Rev. Shella Shuford, Deacon, commented that the job of the deacon was "to bring the church to the world and the world to the church." She expressed her appreciation for the change to the amendment.

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The amendment to Canon 1 Section 1 (The Convention, The Roll of Clergy) to keep in compliance with the revision being made to Article II, Sec. 4 (ii) was adopted.

The <u>amendment to Canon 2. Section 6</u> (Voting and Elections) to require anti-racism training for elected and appointed diocesan offices was adopted.

The <u>amendment to Canon 5</u> (Diocesan Council) to create a subcommittee of finance within the Diocesan Council, to move the authority for all grants — ACTS/VIM, Ward J. Herbert Fund and the Congregational Growth and Development Fund — into the Diocesan Council, and to add a provision to allow Diocesan Council to assist the bishop's office in the timely submission of parochial reports was moved for adoption.

Mr. Michael Rehill, Grace, Westwood, moved an amendment to paragraph J to eliminate reference to Congregational Growth and Development Fund (CGDF) grants. The motion was seconded.

Mr. Rehill noted that the ACTS/VIM and WJH fund were created as actions of Convention and fundraising efforts begun by Bishop Spong to create two endowment funds, one to support programs and another to support the buildings. Those funds were created by resolution of Convention and authority to administer them was granted to Council. The procedures adopted by Diocesan Council were ratified by Convention. The funds were creatures of the Convention and it was appropriate for the finance committee of the Diocesan Council to continue its role of approving the grants from ACTS/VIM and Ward J. Herbert Fund. The CGDF fund was different and was the designation of some assets held by the Trustees that were set aside at the request of Bishop Croneberger to support an initiative that he advanced for supporting his episcopacy in ways that he felt would be best for the diocese. The Trustees agreed to do that and developed criteria for the process. To date, about \$750,000 were given away to various churches. The process was deliberative, slow and involved good, hard work from the bishop's office. The CGDF grants didn't have the narrow parameters as the other two funds operated by council. They were broader and more flexible. The CGDF was a bold venture on the part of Bishop Croneberger. The new bishop may want or may not want to continue the use of the CGDF. The funds were under the control of the Trustees, not the Convention. To say Council should approve grants made by the Trustees meant that the Trustees would have to stop making the grants. The responsibility of the Trustees as stewards of the capital was to support the work of the episcopacy not the work or the will of Council. The Council had the capacity to direct the Trustees on how to spend income, but not capital. This would erode the responsibilities of the Trustees under the statutes. This should be part of the study to understand the roles of the Trustees, rather than first amending the canons.

The Rev. Elizabeth Kaeton, St. Paul's, Chatham, spoke to keep CGDF in the canon. Council acts as convention in between conventions. It would be appropriate for Council to have oversight of all the monies. Such action provided an avenue of accountability for the Trustees, involved the participation of the Convention and elected officials, and allowed for some standardization of the process.

A vote was taken to delete the words "Congregational Development" from line J in the

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amended Canon 5. The voice vote was too close to call. A standing count was taken.

The amendment to delete the words "Congregational Development" was defeated by a vote of 102 for to 220 against.

A vote was taken on the original amendment to Canon 5 and the amendment was adopted.

The resolution for the study and preparation of a proposed canon or canons concerning the trustees was adopted and referred to the bishop-elect for appointments.

RESOLVED, that the Bishop appoint a study group or refer the matter to the Constitution and Canons Committee to propose a canon or canons for the 2008 Convention that will serve to define the responsibilities of the Trustees while remaining within the legal scope of the New Jersey Statutes. It will also report on the legal viability of seeking to define number, terms and election procedures by canon. The process shall include a well-publicized open hearing to solicit the opinions of a wide spectrum of the diocese prior to the submission of the proposed canon(s).

RESOLUTIONS

Ms. Patrice Henderson, Committee chair and member of St. Andrew & Holy Communion, South Orange, introduced the other members of the Resolutions Committee: Ms. Pat Yankus, St. Paul's, Paterson; The Rev. Diana Clark, St. John's, Montclair; The Rev. Mariano Gargiulo, St. James, Ridgefield; The Rev. Sandye Wilson, St. Andrew & Holy Communion, South Orange; The Rev. Joseph Harmon, Incarnation, Jersey City; Ms. Patty Watts, St. Gabriel's, Milton/Oak Ridge; Mr. Henry Faulkner, Grace Church Van Vorst, Jersey City; and Ms. Dianne Nelson, Grace, Rutherford.

The resolutions had been referred to the open hearing on Friday afternoon. [The complete and final texts of the resolutions follow the Minutes.]

RESOLUTIONS - CONSENT CALENDAR

The resolutions on the Consent Calendar were presented.

The five on the consent calendar remained on the consent calendar. The movers had one minute to speak to them before the vote.

Resolution 2007-01: Resolution Dissenting from General Convention's B033.

Resolution 2007-02: Equal Rights and Benefits for Same-Sex Couples in New Jersey.

Resolution 2007-03: Recognition and Care of School-Age Children with Diabetes.

Mr. Sidney King encouraged the convention to consider other life threatening conditions of young people and include them In future actions.

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Resolution 2007-04: Immigration and Undocumented Aliens.

The Rev. Maggie Gat reported that 20 million immigrants lived in New Jersey of which 700,000 were not documented. From the undocumented group it was estimated that \$80 billion had been contributed to the Social Security Fund but would never be received as a benefit, and an additional \$10 million were paid to the Internal Revenue Service.

Resolution 2007-05: Adding Gender Identity to the Episcopal Church Canons.

RESOLUTIONS - CONTINUED

Resolution 2007-06: Resolution on Marriage Rites in Civil Jurisdictions That Permit Same-Sex Marriage submitted by the Oasis was postponed after discussion.

Resolution 2007-07: The Role of the Clergy – Ceremony of Marriage or Blessing of a Civil Union? submitted by the General Convention Deputies was defeated after debate.

Resolution 2007-08: Affirmation of Katharine Jefferts Schori as Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church submitted by Ms. Marge Christie, Christ Church, Ridgewood, was adopted as amended.

Resolution 2007-09: A Resolution on the 2007 Diocesan Budget submitted by Mr. Edgar (Kim) Byham, All Saints', Hoboken, was divided Into two resolutions after motion and both resolutions were adopted.

UNITED THANK OFFERING (UTO) INGATHERING REPORT

Ms. Anna Byrne, UTO Chairperson, announced the results of the annual UTO Ingathering - 44 churches donated \$14,101.07.

STANDING COMMISSION ON CLERGY COMPENSATION

The Rev. Lauren Ackland, Grace Church, Madison, presented the commission's report. The other members were announced: Ms. Patty Bradley, Holy Trinity, Hillsdale; Ms. Carlotta Budd, Grace Church, Madison; The Rev. Canon Gervais Clarke, Epiphany, Orange; Ms. Edith Gallimore, Trinity + St. Philip's Cathedral, Newark; Mr. William Kirk; Ms. Patti Neil, Holy Innocents, West Orange; Mr. John Snyder, Christ Church, Ridgewood,

The report was presented and the resolutions moved for adoption. [The full report follows the Minutes.]

The Rev. Lauren Ackland presented for adoption the five resolutions.

Resolution 1 - mandated minimum cash salaries: adopted.

Resolution 2 – recommended annual merit increases: adopted as amended to reduce the scale of Satisfactory from 5% to 2.5%.

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Resolution 3 – set minimum standard for remuneration to supply clergy and mileage reimbursement: adopted.

Resolution 4 -- set minimum annual allowance for continuing education: adopted.

Resolution 5 - set minimum for relmbursable business expenses: adopted

TASK FORCE ON LAY COMPENSATION

Ms. Joan Lodge and The Rev. Paul Walker presented the resolutions that were referred to the open hearing.

Resolution 1: The convention received the report and approved the continuance of the task force to report back to the 134th annual convention. The resolution was adopted.

Resolution 2: The resolution on vacation time for lay employees was modified by the committee following the hearing. The change was for employees to receive a minimum of two weeks of paid vacation with the completion of one year of service.

It was noted at the hearing that in some industries vacation time was accrued by length of service, and that the vacation should be graded as one week after one year of service, two weeks after two years, three after five, four after eight. The original wording would have a worker eligible for two weeks of vacation during their first year of service.

Motion: It was moved and seconded that the resolution be amended to provide one week of vacation time after one year of service, two weeks after two years, three after five years and four after eight years. The motion was defeated.

Motion: It was moved by the Rev. Stephanie Wethered and seconded that the resolution be amended to provide four weeks of vacation time replacing the original two weeks. The motion was defeated.

The vote was taken on the committee modified resolution that employees receive a minimum of two weeks of paid vacation with the completion of one year of service. The resolution was adopted.

Resolution 3: Job descriptions would be written for all lay employees.

During the discussion, Mr. Bert Jones moved that the job description be "discussed with the employee" and offered the amendment that the job description not only be written but shared and discussed with the employee. The amendment was accepted as friendly.

The vote was taken on the resolution requiring written job descriptions for all lay employees and was adopted.

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Resolution 4: All lay employees would receive an annual performance evaluation.

The vote was taken on the resolution and adopted.

Resolution 5: Provided that churches and employees participate in the state unemployment insurance plan.

Motion: It was moved to postpone indefinitely until such time as all of the facts and figures were known about the state unemployment insurance program. Perhaps the resolution could be presented to next year's convention.

The vote was taken and the motion was postponed.

The Rev. Geoffrey Curtiss recommended that the task force report back to the 134th convention on how the procedures will be applied to lay employees in those organizations that lease space in church owned buildings. Will the organizations comply with the resolutions adopted by convention?

SAFE CHURCH GUIDELINES/CHILD ABUSE AWARENESS

The Rt. Rev. Carol J. Gallagher, Assistant Bishop, reported that the members of Diocesan Council, staff members and others were working on making the church a safe place for children. The guidelines will include such information as safe use of the internet. Training requirements will be presented to Diocesan Council. During the coming months, additional information will be shared with the diocese on the status of the guidelines.

STATE OF THE DIOCESE ADDRESS

The Rt. Rev. John P. Croneberger delivered his annual State of the Diocese address, entitled, And he said good-bye to them in parables.

During the address, the Bishop expressed thanks and gratitude to The Rev. Herb Tinning, who had served as Archdeacon for the Deacons for the past three years. A deacon's stole was presented as a gift of appreciation.

The Bishop announced that the Rev. Nancy Read was appointed as the next archdeacon for the deacons and would be installed along with the bishop at the Cathedral in February. The appointment was made with the approval of Bishop-elect Beckwith.

EPISCOPAL RELIEF AND DEVELOPMENT FUND

The Bishop announced the appointment of Ms. Martha Gardner, St. George's, Maplewood, as the diocesan coordinator for the Episcopal Relief and Development Fund (ERD).

COMMITTEE TO CERTIFY THE MINUTES

The Committee on Rules of Order and Elections met on December 4, 2006 to consider any proposed changes to the Rules. There were no suggested changes or modifications submitted to the committee. The committee reviewed the Rules of Order adopted by the 132nd Annual Convention and received a report from the Nominations Committee elected under the terms of those Rules of Order.

The Nominations Committee worked to meet its mandate to provide more candidates than vacancies and submitted its list of candidates for consideration by the 133rd Convention.

The Committee on Rules of Order and Elections recommends that the Rules of Order adopted for the 132rd Convention be adopted for the 133rd Convention.

RULES OF ORDER ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-THIRD CONVENTION January 20, 2007

Convention Committees

- I. The following Convention committees, consisting of clergy and laity, shall be appointed by the President at least 125 days prior to the Convention:
 - A. Arrangements
 - B. Rules of Order and Elections
 - C. Resolutions
 - D. Dispatch of Business
 - E. Budget
- II. The President, Vice President, and Secretary of the Convention shall be members, ex-officio, of all Convention Committees.
- III. The Convention Committees shall be empowered to take appropriate action prior to, and during, the next Annual Convention, as well as any Special Convention held during their year of appointment.

Arrangements

- IV. The Committee on Arrangements shall be responsible for receiving post Convention recommendations, and from such recommendations to make referrals in the following areas:
 - To the Eccleslastical Authority: recommendations pertaining to location, date and length of sessions.
 - To the Committee on Rules of Order and Elections: recommendations pertaining to the legislative procedure.
 - C. To the Nominations Committee: recommendations pertaining to nominations and election procedure.
 - To the Committee on Resolutions: recommendations pertaining to the resolution process.
 - E. To the Committee on Dispatch of Business: recommendations pertaining to the agenda and calendar of business.
 - F. To the Budget Committee: recommendations pertaining to the budget procedure.

The Committee shall recommend to the Diocesan Council the procedures and arrangements for the pre-Convention meetings of deputies, and shall be responsible for all physical arrangements of the Convention.

Rules of Order

- V. The Committee on Rules of Order and Elections shall be responsible for the Rules of Order.
- VI. The Committee on Rules of Order and Elections shall be responsible for the following nomination and election procedures at the Annual Convention:
 - A. By April 30th a nominations committee of clergy and lay members from different congregations shall be elected by the districts consisting of:
 - one member of the clergy from each district
 - one lay person from each district

The Secretary of Convention is also on the committee.

Committee members will serve for two years with clergy and lay members rotating off in alternate years. Odd numbered districts will elect a lay person whose term ends in an even year; a clergy person whose term ends in an odd year. Even numbered districts will elect a lay person whose term ends in an odd year; a clergy person whose term ends in an even year.

In the event any district fails to provide its representatives, on May 1st the Bishop will make the appointments to fill vacancles from within the district.

- B. The Committee will meet no later than June 30th to elect its own chair, not to be the Secretary of Convention, and to set up procedures for evaluating and nominating candidates. The committee will nominate at least one more than the number of vacancies in each category with the exceptions of Secretary of Convention, Treasurer, Diocesan Review Committee and Ecclesiastical Court.
- C. The Secretary of Convention shall send out in the Call to Convention the time and place of the Convention, a list and job descriptions of the offices by classes to be filled by election, the names of the incumbents of these offices, and an official nomination form. This Call shall be sent out at least one hundred (100) days before the date of the Convention to each clerical member of the Convention and to each lay deputation whose certificate has been transmitted to the Secretary, as provided in Canon I. The Call shall be printed in *The Voice*.

D. Nomination of Candidates

- 1. There will be a notice in the June *Voice* asking for recommendations to be sent to the Nominations Committee by November 30. Recommendations may be made in the following ways:
 - (a.) Any person eligible to run may recommend him or herself.
 - (b.) Any person in the Diocese may recommend some one else who is eligible to run.
 - (c.) Members of the Committee are strongly encouraged to present names of possible candidates from their own districts particularly, as well as suggestions from other areas of the Diocese.

The Nominations Committee will evaluate recommendations and present a report to the Secretary of Convention and Committee on Rules of Order and Elections by November 30th for distribution with the preconvention mailing at the end of December. Any nominees not accepted by the Nominations Committee shall be informed in writing by December 1st in order to allow for nomination through other methods.

- In addition to the slate presented by the Nominations Committee, additional nominations will be received in the following ways:
 - (a.) Any five (5) deputies to Convention may nominate a candidate to any office. Nominations post marked not later than December 15th will be included in the pre-convention mailing and publicized in the Voice along with the nominations received from the Nominations Committee.
 - (b.) Late nominations will continue to be accepted until noon on the Friday of the week before the start of the Annual Convention.
- E. By the close of the opening session the Nominations Committee shall report to the Convention in the form of an official ballot the names listed by Contest. The arrangement of such names received by January 18th shall be determined by lot in each order. Names received through late nominations shall be added in order of receipt. On the ballot in those contests which require candidates for more than one class, all candidates will be listed as a group by order and length of terms will be determined by ranking of the vote results.
- F. The preferential system of voting shall be used for elections, except for General Convention Deputies and Alternates. Only official ballots may be used in elections, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. The number of

vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Only valid ballots shall be counted in the whole number of votes cast. An invalid ballot as to one election shall not invalidate an otherwise valid ballot in any other election.

G. For the election of General Convention Deputies, beginning with the fourth ballot and for all succeeding ballots, the name of the candidate (or candidates) with the lowest number of total votes from both orders on the previous ballot will be withdrawn from consideration, such that the number of candidates remaining shall be equal to the number of vacancies plus two. (For example, if after the third ballot, seven candidates are standing for election and there are three vacancies to be filled, then the names of the two candidates with the lowest number of votes on the third ballot will be withdrawn from consideration by the Convention, leaving five candidates remaining for consideration on the fourth ballot.) All candidates who were not elected as Deputies shall be eligible for consideration as alternate Deputies.

Resolutions

The Committee on Resolutions shall be responsible for receiving all resolutions except those provided by standing committees and bodies required to report to this Convention.

- A. All resolutions to be considered for action by the Annual Convention shall be submitted to the Secretary of Convention in writing and signed by a deputy not less than seventy-five (75) days before the date of Convention. Resolutions should be submitted on white 8-1/2 x 11 paper, typed and double-spaced or in electronic format by disk or e-mail. Each should contain two sections: 1) the RESOLVED naming the desired action, and a further RESOLVED, as appropriate, providing for the implementation of the resolution, if adopted; and 2) a brief statement or information in support of the resolution. Resolutions submitted by more than one deputy must designate one deputy as capable of agreeing to any amendments by the Committee or offered on the floor of Convention. After the expiration of the seventy-five (75) day deadline, the Secretary shall transmit to the Committee all resolutions submitted to him/her.
- B. The Committee shall hold hearing(s) prior to Convention on all resolutions submitted timely. The Committee shall publicize at least eighty-five (85) days prior to Convention dates, place and time of its hearings, inviting submitters of all resolutions to attend. The Committee shall collate all resolutions dealing with obviously similar subjects and shall discuss such collation with the submitters.
- C. Upon submission of any resolution that in the Secretary's opinion after consultation with the chair of the Committee may have financial implications if adopted, s/he shall submit a copy to the Treasurer or Chief Financial Officer for review and comments. Upon submission of any resolution that in the Secretary's

opinion after consultation with the chair of the Committee may affect insurance, s/he shall submit a copy to the Chair of the Diocesan Insurance Committee for review and comments. Upon submission of any resolution that in the Secretary's opinion after consultation with the chair of the Committee may have canonical or legal implications if adopted, s/he shall submit to the Chancellor for review and comments. Review and comments will be requested in time for the initial meeting of the Committee.

- D. The Committee shall have the power to revise or modify any proposed resolution, and shall have the power, by a two-thirds vote of all committee members present and voting, to determine not to offer any proposed resolution on the floor of Convention.
- E. The Committee shall submit its report to the Secretary sixty (60) days before the date of Convention with its recommendations for action upon each resolution as proposed or as amended or collated by the Committee. This report shall be mailed by the Secretary to each deputation during the first week of January. All resolutions considered by the Committee will be included in the report, unless withdrawn by consent of the sponsoring deputy. If a resolution to be offered to Convention has been amended by the Committee without the consent of the sponsoring deputy, such amendment(s) will be clearly shown.
- F. Any resolution which the Committee determines not to offer on the floor of Convention shall be permitted on the floor of Convention only by a majority vote of all Convention deputies at the start of the first business session of convention.
- G. Resolutions not previously submitted to the Committee for this Convention will be permitted from the floor upon a two-thirds vote only at the start of the first business session of Convention and only when they carry a clear statement in writing of the circumstances that led to the request for their consideration. Such resolutions should be duplicated in advance by the presenter(s) with sufficient copies available for distribution to all convention deputies (550 copies are needed).
- H. <u>Consent Calendar</u>. It is recognized that certain resolutions may not require full debate prior to action by Convention. Accordingly, the Committee on Resolutions may propose that certain resolutions be included on a "Consent Calendar". Exclusion of any resolution on the Consent Calendar requires agreement of any three congregations to remove it, and the Secretary of Convention must receive exclusion requests before the start of the first business session in writing, signed by at least two lay deputies from each of three congregations and at least three clergy listed on the roll of Clergy entitled to vote in the Convention. Any resolution included on the "Consent Calendar" shall not be subject to amendment or debate, except that the sponsoring deputy or his/her designee may speak to the resolution for a period not to exceed one minute.

On Dispatch of Business

VIII. The Committee on Dispatch of Business shall be responsible for the Calendar of Business. The Committee shall always be entitled to the floor on business pertaining to that Committee.

To Certify Minutes

IX. At the close of Convention a Committee shall be appointed to review and certify the correctness of the minutes.

On Decorum and Debate

- X. Except when in conflict with the Constitution or Canons or any Rule herein contained, the latest edition of "Robert's Rules of Order" shall govern the interpretation of these rules and procedures to follow.
- XI. No motion shall be considered as before Convention unless seconded, and, when required by the President, reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the journal.
- XII. Any member about to speak shall, with due respect address the President, and in speaking confine comments to the point in debate.
- XIII. No member shall speak more than once and for no more than two minutes in the same debate without leave of the Convention (except the mover who is entitled to reply).
- XIV. If any member by speech or action transgresses the rules of the Convention, the President shall call the member to Order, and the member shall immediately take his/her seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.
- XV. The motions below have priority in order listed.

The mover - cannot interrupt a member who has the floor,

- must be recognized, and
- the motion must be seconded.
- A. To Adjourn or to Recess
 - not debatable majority vote
- B. To Lay on Table or to Table
 - not debatable majority vote
- To move the Previous Question or Limit or Extend Debate
 - not debatable amendable as to time if specified, two-thirds vote
- D. To Postpone to a Certain Time

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- debatable amendable majority vote
- E. To Commit or Recommit to any Committee
 debatable amendable majority vote
- F. To Amend or to Substitute
 - debatable amendable majority vote
- G. To Postpone Indefinitely
 - debatable not amendable majority vote
- H. To Suspend the Rules or Take Up Business Out of Order
 - not debatable two-thirds vote
- I. To Divide the Question
 - not debatable majority vote
- J. To Reconsider (must be made on day that the vote is taken)
 - nust be moved and seconded by ones who voted in majority;
 - 2. debatable two-thirds vote

On the Budget

- XVI. The following procedures shall govern the presentation and adoption of the budget:
 - 1. The tentative budget be adopted by the Diocesan Council and proposed to the Convention.
 - Copies of said budget to be sent to convention deputies and available for discussion at January pre-convention meetings. The last pre-convention meeting shalf be held no later than one week prior to the deadline for budget resolutions.
 - 3. Once adopted by Diocesan Council, proposed changes will be in order. All proposed changes to the budget will continue to be accepted until noon on Friday of the week before the start of the Annual Convention. These changes should be of four varieties, submitted by a clerical or lay deputy in writing to the Secretary of Convention:
 - (a) To add an additional line item
 - (b) To delete a line item
 - (c) To increase a line item
 - (d) to decrease a line item

Late resolutions to change the budget will be permitted from the floor only when they carry a clear statement in writing of the circumstances that led to the request for their consideration after the deadline and only by a two-thirds vote of deputies.

- Proposed changes will be referred without debate to the Diocesan Council Budget Committee.
- Line items about which no proposed change is offered will be considered non-debatable by Convention unless upon resolution by the Diocesan Council Budget Committee.
- 6. The Diocesan Council Budget Committee will hold open hearings on these proposed budget changes on the first day. Anyone wishing to do so may appear to speak for or against any proposed change. After all speakers are heard, the Diocesan Council Budget Committee will go into executive session to consider its report to the Convention. The Committee may at its discretion invite expert witnesses.
- 7. The Diocesan Council Budget Committee will present its recommendations in the form of a separate resolution on every line item for which changes have been suggested, its only mandate that the budget must not be in deficit. Changes up will have to be balanced with changes down, additions offset by deletions, subject to the discretion of the Diocesan Council Budget Committee.
- The Convention will vote on every Diocesan Council Budget Committee
 resolution either to approve or not to approve. These resolutions are subject to
 amendment by the Convention. Each resolution must be considered individually.
- 9. When all Diocesan Council Budget Committee resolutions have been dealt with, a motion to approve the budget will be offered and voted.

The following rules of debate shall be used by debate of the Budget:

- 1. The Diocesan Council Budget Committee shall have FIVE MINUTES to speak in respect to the Committee's report on the Budget.
- ONE HOUR shall be allotted to the debate, divided equally by the number of resolutions to be considered with a maximum of one hour.
- 3. Of the time allotted to the consideration of each resolution, the recommendation of the Diocesan Council Budget Committee concerning the resolution shall be limited to ONE MINUTE or less.
- 4. During the debate on each resolution each speaker shall be limited to ONE MINUTE and no speaker shall speak more than once.
- 5. To the extent possible, the Chair shall recognize speakers of opposite views in alternate succession.

- No motion to lay on the table or otherwise to terminate debate on each resolution shall be entertained during the allotted time period.
- 7. After the consideration of all resolutions and the termination of debate TEN MINUTES shall be allotted for the Budget Resolutions as finally perfected by the Convention to be considered and adopted as a unit.

Committee of the Whole

- XVII. On motion duly moved and adopted, the Convention may go into Committee of the Whole for the consideration of any matter. The President shall designate some member of the Convention to act as Chair of the Committee, which, when in session, shall be governed by these rules.
 - A. A motion to rise and to report to the Convention, with or without leave to sit again, may be made at any time, and shall take precedence of all other motions, and shall be decided without further debate. No such motion once made shall be renewed until further proceeding shall have taken place in the Committee.
 - B. A motion that a vote be taken at some designated time may be made and be disposed of without debate at any time, but as before provided a motion to report to the Convention shall take precedence.
 - C. No motion to lay on the table shall be entertained.

Reports

- XVIII. No printed matter of any kind shall be distributed at the Convention or placed on the seats except by the authority of the President or Secretary.
- XIX. All reports shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending Convention action shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.
- XX. All reports requiring Convention action shall be in writing and, at least, one complete copy and, if available and appropriate, four synopses shall be in the possession of each deputation prior to Convention. All other reports submitted to Convention shall be read by title only.

THE EPISCOPAL ADDRESS FOR THE 133RD DIOCESAN CONVENTION OF THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF NEWARK

Saturday, January 20, 2007

The Right Reverend John Palmer Croneberger Ninth Bishop of Newark

And he said good-bye to them in parables....

- 1.) As the missionary approached the village, he saw the villagers running toward him, fear written across their faces, screaming, "There's a monster in the field !!! There's a monster in the field !!!" Looking about, the missionary spied a giant watermelon. Laughing, he called the villagers to stop pulled out his knife, hacked the watermelon in two, and prepared to eat it. The villagers looked horrified, and screamed ever more loudly "He's killed the monster, and now he's going to kill us !!" They set upon the missionary beat him...and killed him.
- 2.) As the missionary approached the village, he saw the villagers running toward him, fear written across their faces, screaming, "There's a monster in the field !! There's a monster in the field !!!"... Looking about, the missionary spied a giant watermelon, and he began to run with the villagers. After some time, the missionary said to the villagers, think we are safe I think we can stop running now." He invited the villagers to sit with him, to engage in conversation, to tell each other their stories, to care, and to love. In the midst of all of that, the missionary was given the opportunity to share the experience of the rich, sweet, juicy taste of the watermelon.

More than eight years ago, I told that parable in the walk-abouts when we were then in the process of discerning who God might be calling to be Bishop. As we approached the last group to be visited that day, the person who was shepherding me through the schedule said, "Jack, why don't you sit this one out?" (You've been really working hard today.) "I'll go in and tell your stories."

Well, you see the thing is... at the end of the day you can't really tell anybody else's story. You can only tell your own. Over the years, I have discovered that telling our stories requires at least the following:

- A place of trust Sometimes that happens very quickly; sometimes it takes a long time and a lot of effort.
- A person or people ready to listen The challenge here is that off times those of us who have learned how to speak may not have learned how to listen; and those

- of us who have learned how to listen have significant difficulty finding our voices to speak.
- 3. A willingness for the storyteller to become a story-listener as noted above.
- 4. A climate which encourages the celebration of one's story far more than the critical analysis of that story Parts of the world seem to have gotten better at negativity and destructive criticism than affirmation and praise.
- A place where our stories might find similar stories even though each might have unique circumstances.
- 6. A possibility for the emergence of a common story which honors the uniqueness of each, yet celebrates the weaving of the separate threads into something stronger and larger and more life-giving.

I believe that during my time as your Bishop we have been developing a safer place for us to tell our stories to each other. Much of our recent life as a diocese has been ordered not so much around a particular issue or program but around a call from deep within the Baptismal covenant...a call to listen...a call to love...a call to develop relationships...a call to trust...a call to experience shared leadership...a call to build healthy, life-giving communities of faith. All of this describes the need we have experienced for some time to imagine and discover new ways to live together.

Some of the results of our living together deeply within the Baptismal covenant include the following:

- A.) A focus on life-giving, healthy, growing, ministries complete with expectations for local congregations. The transformation beginning here is due to a wonderful combination of finding the right person to lead the charge for congregational development; together with a sum of money made available by the Trustees to encourage congregational initiatives; and a very hard-working committee of the Diocesan Council to provide leadership. There is so much more to be done, but some key ingredients for success are in place.
- B.) A second result of our living together within the covenant has included an ongoing conversation about the meaning of Confirmation, its appropriate setting and its relationship to Episcopal visitations. Here I must confess to you that I will walk away from this one as an unrepentant child of God. I believe I am right about this one.....and I will take with me the vivid meanory of faces standing before me, faces of young and old, faces filled with excitement and wonder, (and, yes, a few faces which seemed to be bored to tears;) faces with unique persons attached; faces complete with stories: Thelonius Monk, bling bling, "Are you going to slap me today?"and my face...wide-eyed in awe and wonder and frequently in tears at the privilege which has been mine.
- C.) A focus on the four orders of ministry in the Episcopal Church, (lay persons, Bishops, Deacons, Priests) with special attention to the revival of a distinctly diaconal ministry within these four orders. Twenty-five (25) deacons are now among us with more to come, expanding our capacity for ministry, calling us to a renewal of our servanthood ministry, bestowed on us at Baptism. Here I want to pay special attention to

one among us who has served the diocese with untold hours of work, to assist us in a process of recovering a real diaconal ministry... the Archdeacon of Newark for the past three years, The Venerable Herb Tinning. Herb, please come forward to receive the well-deserved thanks of the Diocese of Newark. In most dioceses today, archdeacon is not an honorific title, but a working one. Archdeacon Tinning will soon become Deacon Herb Tinning as he relinquishes the position of archdeacon. Thank you, Herb, for assisting us through our infancy in diaconal ministry. Please accept this stole, created by Carol Homer, and offered with the love and gratitude of Newark.

After consultation with Bishop-elect Beckwith, I am pleased to announce to you today that The Rev. Nancy Read, Deacon, will become the next Archdeacon of Newark, serving with Bishop Beckwith. Nancy will be installed and seated at the Cathedral with Bishop Beckwith in February.

In our journey of shared leadership, lay ministry has been raised up and celebrated...thanks in part to the very long and much-revered tradition of lay ministry in the Diocese of Newark; thanks also in part to the establishment of a subcommittee of the Commission on Ministry on Lay Ministries.

D.) Over the past months and years, this diocese has stood firmly and spoken clearly for (a.) the abolition of the death penalty, which, as we speak, is closer and closer to a reality in the State of New Jersey – Praise Godl; (b.) support for the blessing of same sex unions – now legally possible in the State of New Jersey; and (c.) support for the position taken by our Presiding Bishop calling upon our President and our country to bring an end to the war in Iraq and to be thoroughly engaged in the work of peacemaking. All of these are matters of justice and speak to concerns raised out of the heart of the Baptismal covenant. Perhaps I might leave just two concerns with you. Somehow we must not allow the Anglican Communion to determine that one description of human sexuality will be the Litmus Test for inclusion in the Communion. We ought to be concerned about our participation in a new covenant to be developed by the Communion (or, more likely, by a selected part of the Communion) if that covenant makes unreasonable demands upon us for uniformity rather than unity in the midst of recognized diversity. That would be too great a price to pay for some kind of artificial union, and it would be a betrayal of who we are.

Having noted some of the ministries we have been about, I renew my belief that our lives are not so much a matter of issues or causes, but rather relationships and shared visions. It is about the Baptismal covenant calling us to be such a people committed deeply to Jesus Christ.

Please allow me to share a rather strange personal story that might illustrate what I am seeking to describe. Some years ago, I attended a Friday/Saturday conference at a retreat center. I awakened early Saturday morning, and wandered down to the chapel. As I walked about, I noticed above the wall of the Baptismal font, these words: God's promise; Roots and Wings. Several years later, I attended another conference at what I thought was the same retreat center. When I entered the chapel this time, I noticed that

there was no inscription over the font. When I asked the sisters what happened to the inscription, they told me that there never was such an inscription. Explanation – I don't know. Several possibilities, but none really make sense. Whatever the truth, I believe the inscription was for me... God's Promise; Roots and Wings. At your baptism and at mine, God's promise has been made and kept: Roots and Wings. Certainly, the Biblical prophecy speaks repeatedly of a root springing forth, a root of Jesse, a root of David, for us, a new strength, a new beginning, Jesus. This root from which new branches blossom. Paul wrote, "...if the root is holy, so are the branches." Remember, it is not you that supports the root, but the root that supports you.

I remember a particular wedding at the Church of the Atonement in Tenafly. An eager mother of the bride wanted so much to be helpful. She also wanted the Church to look beautiful for her daughter's wedding. She asked if she could adom the rood-screen with branches of dogwood blossoms. They really did look beautiful. After the liturgy when everyone was gone, the sexton asked me what to do with the dogwood branches and I said, well, since they are so pretty, let's enjoy them at the Sunday morning services, and then you can take them down. The next morning I arrived at the Church to find the dogwood blossoms on the floor and the ugly sticks attached to the rood-screen. As branches, we do not support the root, it is the root that supports the branches. So, at our Baptism, we are called to be rooted and grounded in Christ. It is important in life to be rooted and grounded. It's also important to know in whom you are being rooted and grounded. Sometimes, in fact, we seek to be rooted and grounded in ourselves.

Our Baptism calls us to be rooted and grounded in Christ, established in the faith, welcomed into this huge family, this glorious communion of saints on earth, not lost, not alone, not blown away, rooted, grounded in Christ and then, just when we think we figured that part out, the inscription reminds us of God's promise, roots and wings. Here we find imagery in the Scriptures of being held and comforted in the shadow of God's wings. Here we hear Jesus weeping over Jerusalem... How often would I have gathered your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wings and you would not? "Baptism offers us the security of a source and place of comfort beneath the wings of God, but the imagery also becomes more expansive. Not long ago, we sang Hark the Herald Angels Sing and the words from Malachai, "Risen with healing in his wings." Added to that are numerous Biblical passages which speak of being born on angels' wings. My favorite which comes from Isaiah is: "They who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength. They shall mount up- with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint." You see, it is the promise of wings at Baptism that we shall have our strength renewed, that we shall mount up with wings like eagles. and be empowered to undertake whatever tasks God places before us, as part of the Baptized community.

Our work in the Baptismal covenant has been to claim both our rootedness on the one hand and our wings on the other. I believe it has been faithful to the Gospel and faithful to God's call to us for the work that is now before us,

Let me close with one last parable. The story comes from West Africa. It is the legend of the Sky Maiden:

The members of a certain West African tribe tell the legend of the Sky Maiden. It happened once that the people of the tribe noticed their cows were giving less milk than they used to. They could not understand why. One young man volunteered to stay up all night to see what might be happening. After several hours of waiting in the darkness, hiding in a bush, he saw something extraordinary. A young woman of astonishing beauty rode a moonbeam down from heaven to earth, carrying a large pail. She milked the cows, filled her pail, and climbed back up the moonbeam to the sky. The man could not believe what he had seen. The next night, he set a trap near where the cows were kept, and when the maiden came down to milk the cows, he sprang the trap and caught her. "Who are you?" he demanded.

She explained that she was a Sky Maiden, a member of a tribe that lived in the sky and had no food of their own. It was her job to come to earth at night and find food. She pleaded with him to let her out of the net and she would do anything he asked. The man said he would release her only if she agreed to marry him. "I will marry you," she said, "but first you must let me go home for three days to prepare myself. Then I will return and be your wife." He agreed.

Three days later she returned, carrying a large box. "I will be your wife and make you very happy," she told him, "but you must promise me never to look inside this box."

For several weeks, they were very happy together. Then one day while his wife was out, the man was overcome with curiosity and opened the box. He saw nothing in it. When the woman came back, she saw her husband looking strangely at her and said, "You looked in the box, didn't you? I can't live with you anymore." "Why?" the man asked. "What's so terrible about my peeking into an empty box?" She said, "I'm not leaving you because you opened the box. I thought you probably would. I'm leaving you because you asid it was empty. It wasn't empty; it was full of sky. It contained the light and the air and the smells of my home. When I went home for the last time, I filled that box with everything that was most precious to me to remind me of where I came from. How can I be your wife if what is most precious to me is emptiness to you?"

I have come among you for a time, carrying my box, offering to open it and share some of myself with you. My intent has been to encourage each of you to open your boxes, sharing some of the important stuff of your life with one another and especially with the one who is always eager to listen, inquisitively concerned for each of us. You have blessed me by allowing me to open my box and share my stuff with you. It has been a wondrous experience, but now I invite you to look over the horizon...Here comes Mark Beckwith and he is carrying a large box. You have invited him to open that box and share his story with you, as he listens to yours, and together bear witness of God's love to a world desperately needing to hear of that love and to see it in action. What great joy!

RESOLVED, That this Convention repents of the continuing discrimination against lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgendered people that B033 encourages, and reaffirms the full inclusion of all sisters and brothers in Christ, regardless of sexual orientation, in into all areas of the life of the Church; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That this Convention calls upon our Bishop and Standing Committee to uphold canon law, in both letter and spirit, by consenting to the consecration of all qualified candidates to the episcopate—including gay and lesbian candidates who live in committed, same-sex domestic partnerships, and, be it further

RESOLVED, That the text of this resolution be sent to the Secretary of General Convention.

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

General Convention 2006 passed Resolution B033, which called upon "Standing Committees and bishops with jurisdiction to exercise restraint by not consenting to the consecration of any candidate to the episcopate whose manner of life presents a challenge to the wider church and will lead to further strains on communion. "The rejection of Resolution A161 on Tuesday, June 20, 2006, by the House of Deputies clearly expressed the mind of General Convention 2006 regarding a moratorium on the election, consent, and consecration of additional lesbian and gay bishops. The passage of B033 by both Houses on Wednesday, June 21 —which occurred after limited debate and as a result of umusual efforts by the Presiding Bishop to influence the actions of both houses—effectively stifled what the Spirit is saying to the Episcopal Church. Both Bishops Croneberger and Gallagher voted against this resolution, as did the majority of Newark's Deputies.

In the Diocese of Newark, it has long been our experience that gay and lesbian people are fully qualified and effective in all orders of ministry. The Canons of The

Episcopal Church (Title III, Canon I, Section 2) prohibit discrimination based on sexual orientation: "No person shall be denied access to the discernment process for any ministry, lay or ordained, in this Church because of race, color, ethnic origin, national origin, sex, marital status, sexual orientation, disabilities or age, except as otherwise provided by these Canons." The canons do not prohibit gay and lesbian persons who are in same-sex domestic partnerships from the episcopate.

EQUAL RIGHTS AND BENEFITS FOR SAME-SEX COUPLES IN NEW JERSEY

RESOLVED, That this 133rd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark commends the Supreme Court of New Jersey for its holding in *Lewis v. Harris*, issued October 25, 2006, that "under the equal protection guarantee of Article I, Paragraph 1 of the New Jersey Constitution, committed same-sex couples must be afforded on equal terms the same rights and benefits enjoyed by married opposite-sex couples," and, be it further

RESOLVED, That this Convention expresses its thanks to Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund and the seven couples who initiated *Lewis v. RESOLVED, That this Convention calls on the New Jersey State Legislature to enact civil marriage for same-sex couples as that is the only means to provide same-sex couples with "the same rights and benefits enjoyed by married opposite-sex couples;" and, be it further

RESOLVED, That the Secretary of Convention distribute copies of this resolution to the Governor and all members of the Legislature.

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

The decision of the New Jersey Supreme Court left the Legislature with the option to either grant same-sex couples the right to civil marriage or to institute a parallel civil union procedure. In her separate opinion, Chief Justice Poritz says:

We must not underestimate the power of language. Labels set people apart as surely as physical separation on a bus or in school facilities. Labels are often used to perpetuate prejudice about difference that, in this case, are embedded in the law. By excluding same-sex couples from civil marriage, the State declares that it is legitimate to differentiate between their commitments and the commitments of heterosexual couples.

The Chief Justice is correct. No matter how conscientiously the Legislature may try to create a "separate but equal" institution for same-sex couples; however, such an institution will never be equal.

RECOGNITION AND CARE OF SCHOOL-AGE CHILDREN WITH DIABETES

RESOLVED, That this 133rd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark acknowledges that diabetes is one of the most common chronic diseases in school-age children, affecting 176,500 young people in the United States in 2005, and becoming the country's fifth-deadliest disease; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That this Convention, recognizing that many schools do not have a fulltime nurse or licensed healthcare professional available on-site to handle medical emergencies and that nursing duties are oftentimes performed by other school personnel, supports the efforts of the national Parent Teachers Association (PTA) and its constituent organizations urging that all school personnel receive general training on diabetes, and that at least two staff members per school obtain specific training on diabetes care, diabetic emergency procedures, and identification and treatment of symptoms of hyperglycemia and hypoglycemia as allowed by individual state statutes and licensures; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That this Convention urges the State Board of Education to institute plans to ensure that each school in the state of New Jersey, particularly schools in urban areas, is equipped with trained personnel to address the needs of diabetic youth; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That this Convention encourages congregations to support the PTA's education and advocacy efforts; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That the Secretary of Convention convey this resolution to the Governor of New Jersey, the New Jersey State Board of Education and the Commissioner of Education in New Jersey.

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention states that each year, more than 13,000 youths are diagnosed with Type i diabetes. The National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases reports that diabetes is one of the most common chronic diseases in school-age children, affecting 176,500 young people in the United States in 2005. Further, about one in every 400 to 600 people under the age of 20 has Type 1 diabetes. Sadly, a growing number of children and adolescents are developing Type 2 diabetes - a form of diabetes that is generally diagnosed among adults.

Episcopal clergy in the U.S. provide both blessings from the Church and marriage as civil agents of the State in performing marriages. Since 2003, it has been the policy in our diocese that blessings of committed relationships require only that the Bishop be notified. The Episcopal Church canons permit clergy to perform marriage rites for a couple comprised only of a man and a woman.

With the change in Massachusetts law (the only state at present that provides full marriage rights for same-sex couples), the required change in NJ statutes that may also provide marriage for same-sex couples (by May 2007) and possible future changes in state marriage laws in other states, the canons of The Episcopal Church must be amended to permit clergy to marry same-sex couples.

The intent of this resolution is to allow for opening the rubrics of the Book of Common Prayer to permit marriage in those dioceses where civil jurisdictions have made same-sex marriage legal. In addition to the equal rights, legal protections and social recognition that marriage affords, amendment of the canons to permit marriage in the church would allow same-sex couples the choice exercised by different-gender couples to stand before family and community to include God as partner in their blessed civil marriage.

SECTION 1 - Resolutions

RESOLUTION I: MANDATED MINIMUM CASH SALARY (Adopted)

RESOLVED, that the 133rd Convention of the Diocese of Newark adopts the following minimum salary rates, effective January 1, 2008:

Supporting Information:

The Diocese of Newark has adopted a system of salary administration for clergy that includes minimum salary levels for all full-time clergy serving parishes or missions in the Diocese. Each year, the Commission reviews the salary levels and makes recommendations to Convention for appropriate changes. A history of the last ten years follows:

Inflation is expected to be about two and one half percent next year. Our Diocese still lags behind the other Dioceses in our area. It is the goal of our commission to increase salaries so we can continue to attract the brightest and best clergy. That process leads to a recommendation of approximately a five percent increase in the minimum salary rates.

RESOLUTION II: RECOMMENDED MERIT INCREASE SCALE (Adopted with revision)

RESOLVED, That the 133rd Convention of the Diocese of Newark recommends the following scale, effective January 1, 2008, for annual merit increases in salaries paid to clergy in the Diocese:

Merit Increase Scale

Outstanding 7.0% Very Good 6.0%

Satisfactory 2.5% (revised from 5%)

Supporting Information

The Diocese of Newark recommends an annual mutual ministry review to review of goals and performance for clergy, wardens and vestries or executive committees. Clergy salary should be increased on merit based on this review in accordance with the merit increase scale. A true merit increase would exceed the rate of inflation, reflecting the notion that the meritorious performer should be recognized and not merely "kept even" with the economy.

RESOLUTION III: MINIMUM SUPPLY CLERGY RATE (Adopted)

RESOLVED, That the 133rd Convention of the Diocese of Newark establishes a minimum standard for remuneration to supply clergy at a fixed rate per worship service plus the IRS-approved mileage rate for travel to and from the church. Remuneration standards shall be as follows:

Sunday services: \$ 150 for one service plus \$60 for each

additional service.

Weekday service: \$ 60 per service, without sermon.

And be it FURTHER RESOLVED that, for those supply clergy who so desire, this remuneration be declared eligible for the clergy housing allowance exclusion by the passage by the vestry of a resolution so designating.

Supporting Information:

This remuneration can be eligible for the clergy housing allowance exclusion. The diocese can supply sample language for such a resolution, which must be passed by the vestry (or executive committee) prior to the payment for services.

In any year in which the total payments to any one individual exceed \$600, a 1099 tax form must be provided at the end of the year, a copy of which is filled with the IRS. Pension assessments are due for any non-retired cleric who is paid \$200 a month or more for three consecutive months.

RESOLUTION IV: MANDATED HOUSING EQUITY ALLOWANCE FOR FULL TIME PRIEST-IN CHARGE (Adopted)

RESOLVED, That the 133rd Convention of the Diocese of Newark mandates that each parish or mission pay a housing equity allowance to any priest-in-charge who lives in church owned housing. The minimum mandated will be two percent of total compensation paid to the priest. The funds can be invested in the National Church fund or through an Internal Revenue Service 403b account.

Supporting Information:

The Diocese of Newark has many of its clergy living in church-owned housing. When the clergy person retires he or she often does not own a home. This fund will allow the clergy person to put a down payment on a place to live in retirement. All the dioceses in our immediate area mandate this benefit. The Diocese of Newark currently recommends a Housing Equity Allowance of from 5% to 10% of total compensation. By proposing this Allowance be mandated at a minimum of 2%, the Commission believes it is suggesting a reasonable level as a starting point. Churches should strive to increase this percentage, at the rate of one percentage point per year, until the amount contribute to the Housing Equity Allowance is ten percent of total compensation.

Part time clergy are compensated based on the applicable percentage of full time compensation and benefits. For example, a half-time position would require one half of the minimum cash stipend. Some benefits, such as health and dental insurance, would be paid in full.

DETERMINING PART TIME COMPENSATION

Full-time clergy work approximately 50 hours in an average week. Compensation calculations for part-time clergy should be based on this average; for example, a half-time position would require 25 hours of work per week. Clergy, whether part-time or full-time, are acknowledged to be "on-call" all of the time.

ESTABLISHING A HOUSING ALLOWANCE

A portion of each cleric's cash stipend may be designated by a Vestry or Executive Committee as a "housing allowance" in accordance with the Internal Revenue Code. The designation must be voted upon prior to payment and explicitly noted in the minutes of the meeting. The clergyperson is solely responsible for tracking qualified housing expenditures and declaring any excess "housing allowance" as income. The maximum amount of "housing allowance" (excludable from taxable income) is the lowest of the following three amounts: the rental value of the house (fully fumished), the actual amount spent to provide housing (including fumishings and utilities), or the amount designated in the vestry designation

Clergy are considered employees for income tax purposes (compensation reported on W-2) but are taxed as self-employed persons for Social Security purposes, called SECA tax. The Diocese of Newark mandates that clergy compensation be enhanced by an amount equal to 50% of the clergy's estimated self-employment tax to correct this tax differential. This compensation enhancement is considered taxable income, so the calculation is circular: Step 1:

Introduction

At the 132nd Annual Diocesan Convention in January, 2006 Bishop Croneberger announced the appointment of a Lay Compensation Task Force, because he believed that guidelines for lay compensation was a "matter of justice for our diocesan life." He boldly pronounced to the gathered deputies,

Another matter of justice for our diocesan life is the lack of guidelines for lay compensation.... This is a long overdue conversation that needs to take place with necessary action to be taken. It is a simple matter of justice and can no longer be pushed aside as well, "It is just too expensive." Treating people unfairly is what is really too expensive!

He charged the study group to report back in 2007 with guidelines and principles for justice in the workplace. Among the task force appointments were parish administrators, a church business manager, a lay pastoral assistant, a warden, a clergyperson, diocesan youth missioner, diocesan administrator, a bishop's assistant, and clergy spouses.

The task force members began meeting in April and started with a review of existing workplace policies and benefits. The results indicated that current benefits are quite sparse and vary widely. Previous diocesan conventions in response to General Convention actions have established the following resolutions:

Medical Insurance

The 122nd Diocesan Convention made parochial lay employees eligible to participate in the Diocese of Newark's group medical insurance plan provided they were full time employees (who work a minimum of 30 hours per week) effective January 1, 1997.

Those employees working fewer than 30 hours per week were also made eligible to participate on the basis outlined subject to the agreement of the Vestry/Executive Committee of the church.

Lay Pensions

In 1993, the 119th Diocesan Convention mandated that all parishes, missions and other ecclesiastical organizations subject to the ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese of Newark shall provide all lay employees who work a minimum of 1,000 hours annually, retirement benefits through participation in the Episcopal Church Lay Employees' Retirement Plan (ECLERP) or an equivalent plan, the provisions of which are at least equal to those of ECLERP. Such participation was to commence during 1993.

These issues are not new to the wider church. They have been the focus for the national church and other dioceses for many years.

For instance, the 73rd General Convention in 2000 called upon each diocese to present to its convention principles and guidelines of justice and accountability in the church

workplace for discussion and action. The 73rd General Convention held that if the Episcopal Church is to fulfill its mission to the world to proclaim and to teach gospel values of personal dignity and justice in our common life, we must practice those same values in our everyday Church working relationships. It stated further, workplace issues such as wages, pro forma resignations, and regular evaluations should not be addressed apart from the principles of our Baptismal Covenant.

More recently in 2004, the Executive Council of the National Church appointed the Task Force on Employment Policies and Practices in the National Church (EPPNC) to study employment policies and practices throughout the Episcopal Church. The Task Force includes members from Executive Council and representatives from the Church Pension Group, the Office for Ministry Development and the Colloquium of Episcopal Professional and Vocational Associations. Underlying the creation of the Task Force was the "concern for some time in the church about the level of compensation, including benefits, given to lay employees as well as the fair way they have been treated, or not. Many dioceses have developed over recent years standards and guidelines related to the clergy but for a variety of reasons they have not thoroughly addressed these issues related to lay employees."

The EPPNC task force presented a preliminary report to the 75th General Convention in 2006, which in turn authorized and requested the Church Pension Group to "conduct a survey of lay employees concentrating on employee demographics, the exercise of authority within the employment setting, and compensation and benefits."

All of this information provided a good beginning for our task force. Clearly it is time for a review and a new set of recommendations be considered by our diocese. And, as it happened, we had already taken the important first step of surveying the churches in our diocese about compensation and benefits for lay employees.

Procedures & Meetings of the Task Force

Our work began in April 2006 with reviews of reports from other Dioceses as well as the report of the Task Force on Employment Policies and Practices in the National Church (EPPNC) to the Executive Council of the National Church. EPPNC began its work in the spring of 2005. We compared these results with the current practices in the diocese of Newark.

Over several meetings, our task force developed a questionnaire which was sent to all the churches in the Diocese of Newark with a cover letter signed by Bishop Croneberger commending our efforts and requesting each congregation's participation

An impressive 76% of the churches responded, and the results emphasize to us the need to develop policies that would engender justice and ethical employment practices for all employees in our diocese.

As charged, our task force has used information obtained in the survey responses to develop guidelines and recommendations for the 133rd Diocesan Convention in January 2007.

Survey Observations

The survey was sent to all 112 congregations of the diocese; 85 were completed and returned.

The survey asked:

- 1. Position of Lay Employee (see next grouping for breakdown);
- 2. Full time (35 hours or more per week)
- 3. Part-time (more than 20 hours per week)
- 4. Part-time (less than 20 hours per week). If so, number hours: _____;
- 5. Salaried weekly or monthly, or paid hourly
- 6. Base rate of pay
- 7. Describe any benefits provided
- 8. Is there a job description in place for this position

The survey included the following job titles

- 1. Parish Administrator
- 2. Parish Secretary
- 3. Organist
- 4. Choir Director
- Sexton
- Bookkeeper
- 7. Director of Christian Ed
- Other (including but not limited to Teacher, Choir Soloist/Section Leader, Camp Counselor, Nursery/Pre-School Director, Youth Worker).

The survey results moved us from narrative reporting and anecdotal evidence to a statistical picture that indicates specific employment injustices within our diocese. It led us from an emotional base and individual stories into a clearer picture of what is happening in our diocese.

We are unprepared at this time to recommend specific salary guidelines but we can share some interesting and startling data. For example, a shocking 86.4% of the respondents indicated that sextons receive no benefits at all. Only 41% of sextons even have job descriptions. We also learned that 72.7% of parish administrators received no benefits, and 32% of them have no job descriptions. This evidence supports the Bishop's contention that there is a lack of guidelines for lay employees.

Recommendations and Resolutions

We have been studying the issues of workplace justice for only a short period of time and are recommending continuance of the task force. Based on this year's work we are hopeful to return with more specific recommendations next year.

For this year, we are recommending several resolutions about vacation, job descriptions, state unemployment compensation and annual performance reviews.

1. Lay Compensation Task Force Continuance (Adopted)

RESOLVED, That the 133rd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark commends the Lay Compensation Task Force for its work and receives its report to this convention; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That the Task Force continue its work and report back to the 134th Convention.

2. Lay Employee Vacation (Adopted as amended)

RESOLVED, That the 133rd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark recognizes and values the vast resource we have in the good health of our lay employees; and be it further

RESOLVED, That in recognition and fairness to all the lay employees of the diocese, all parishes, missions, and day care/schools we strongly recommend receive a minimum of two weeks of annual paid vacation with the completion of one year of service, proportionate to time worked per week starting January 1, 2008.

Supporting Information

A paid vacation formula is in order for all employees working a minimum of 20 hours per week commensurate with length of service. It is recommended that a minimum of two weeks be provided.

3. Lay Employee Job Descriptions (Adopted as amended)

RESOLVED, That the 133rd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark requires that a job description for each lay employee of the diocese, parishes, missions, and day care/schools be written and discussed with the employee during this coming year; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of the job description for all lay employees be provided to the Lay Compensation Task Force for its work by June 1, 2007.

Supporting Information

Since every employee seems to do a certain amount of unpaid work as part of their job and since the lines are easily blurred, we recommend a job description be in place for each employee and urge that job descriptions be provided for all volunteer positions, as well. With copies of the job descriptions as requested in the resolution, we will endeavor to make templates for various positions available on the diocesan web site.

4. Lay Employee Annual Performance Review (Adopted)

RESOLVED, That the 133rd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark respecting the dignity of each of our lay employees and striving to achieve justice for each person employed by the diocese, parishes, missions, and day care/schools receive an annual review; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That this process be in place by the 134th Convention of this Diocese; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That the diocese and parishes, missions, and day care/schools notify the Lay Compensation Task Force that this requirement is in place.

Supporting Information

It is the strong recommendation of this task force that an annual review be conducted for each employee. Use of a job description can be useful in an annual review and in goal setting for each employee. It does not need to be complicated, but it would nurture the professional status of each employee.

5. State Unemployment Insurance (SUI) (Action Postponed)

RESOLVED, that the 133rd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark recommends that each employee of the diocese, parishes, missions, and day care/schools participate in the State Unemployment Insurance (SUI) plan by the time of the 134th Convention of this Diocese.

Supporting Information

While it is not mandatory for non-profits to be included in the state unemployment insurance program, it is a benefit that that would be useful and appreciated by lay employees. Many employees, in fact, are unaware that they are not participants in this program until it is needed: at which point it is too late.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons makes the following report to the 133rd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark.

L Proposed Amendments to the Constitution of the Diocese of Newark.

This Amendment to Article II of the Constitution is proposed by the Bishop Croneberger and the Senior Staff and the Rev. Nancy A. Read, Deacon and Co-Chair, The Diaconal Ordination Committee In communion with, The Diaconal Community, The Diocese of Newark.

The proposed amendment, which must be approved by two successive Diocesan Conventions, would give Deacons full voting rights upon ordination by eliminating the following restrictions:

ARTICLE II

Members of Convention:

(ii) Every Presbyter and Deacon canonically resident in the Diocese on the first day of January Immediately preceding the meeting of the Convention, except that a vote

shall not be accorded to Deacons having fewer than two years in holy orders or to retired priests whose service in the Diocese was fewer than five years prior to retirement; and

Statement from the Bishop's office in support of the proposed amendment

This exclusion prevents clergy members of the convention from exercising their full rights and expectations. When ordained, the bishop tells the ordinand, Now you are called to work as a pastor, priest and teacher, together with your bishop and fellow presbyters, and to take your share in the councils of the Church.

Canonical residency begins on the day of ordination or, in the case of transferred clergy, with the acceptance of the Letters Dimissory, and this date should be the start of the membership of Convention for presbyters and deacons.

Clergy who are called to the diocese after January 1 in a year when a special convention is scheduled are prevented from voting. For deacons, their right to vote should not be limited.

Statement from the Rev. Nancy Read and the Diaconal Ordination Committee in support of the proposed amendment:

No one truly knows the history behind Article II, 4(ii) as it pertains to the two year delay in voting privileges at Diocesan Convention, for deacons. No one, truly had to deal or think about such an article for over 26 years, as there were no vocational deacons being ordained in this Diocese. Thanks be to God, we as a Diocese are now doing a marvelous thing, in resurrecting the diaconate. What has been cast out is now being made new again. We have new wine in the form of deacons, for a new season in our Diocesan history, and we now need new wine skins in the form of a new, revised, amended Article II 4(ii) to uphold these deacons. We, the Diaconal Community of The Diocese of Newark, humbly ask for full and equal voting rights, privileges and respect, as deacons are a full and equal order of ministry. We wish nothing less than what is afforded all Baptized members of this Diocesan Convention, for deacons, are partners in mutual ministry for and with this Diocese. Deacons at Convention have always had seat and voice. We now speak to claim our vote!

Recommendation:

In light of current Diocesan policy on the Diaconate, the Committee believes it appropriate to submit this proposed amendment to the Convention for a first reading and vote.

The Rev. Canon Clarke dissents from this view and would maintain the existing restrictions on voting rights.

II. Amendments to the Diocesan Canons

A. Trustee and Diocesan Council Changes

The following proposed amendments to Canon 6 and 5 with explanation have been submitted by Mr. Scott Bennett, Ms. Cheryl Brocking, Ms. Faith Gideon Brown, The Rev. Kim Capwell, The Rev. Diana Clark, The Rev. Kevin Coffey, The Rev. Maggie Gat, The Rev. Scott Hoogerhyde, The Rev. Beverly Huck, The Rev. Elizabeth Kaeton, The Rev. Paul Olsson, The Rev. Susan Sica, The Rev. Stephanie Wethered, The Rev. Philip Wilson, and The Rev. Sandye A. Wilson:

New Canon 6 and renumber thereafter (changes in Italics, Underline, Bold & Strikeout):

CANON 6 - THE TRUSTEES

- 1. The Trustees of the Diocese shall consist of the Bishop, who shall serve as Presiding Officer; the Bishop Coadjutor (if there be one); the Treasurer of the Diocese; and ten (10) members elected by Convention, five of whom shall be clergy persons and five lay persons. The members who serve other than by virtue of their office shall be elected for terms of five (5) years.
- 2. Lay Trustees shall at all times be communicants in good standing of a congression of the Diocese of Newark and clerical Trustees must be canonically resident in the Diocese. All Trustees must reside in the Diocese. One clerical and one lay Trustee shall be elected at each annual Convention. No trustee elected by the Convention for a full five-year term shall be eligible to reelection to succeed her/himself.
- 2. Vacancies among the elected trustees created by death, resignation, removal, incapacity, or removal from the Diocese may be filled by the remaining Trustees until the next annual meeting of the Convention, when a Trustee shall be elected by the Convention to fill the unexpired term. Any elected Trustees deemed negligent of their duties or unqualified to hold office may be removed by a vote of six elected trustees, the Bishop recommending or concurring.
- 4. The Board of Trustees shall meet at least once yearly, shall keep a minute book which shall clearly delineate their acts with respect to each of the funds under their control, and all their acts shall be entered as soon as adopted. These books, their books of account, and their securities, shall always be subject to inspection by the Bishop, the members of the Standing Committee and the members of the Finance and Budget Committees of Diocesan Council. Seven Trustees shall be a quorum, all having been cited to meet, and a majority of the quorum, duly convened, shall be competent to act.

No investment or reinvestment decision shall be executed unless approved at a duly convened meeting or approved in writing by a majority of the Trustees, all of whom shall have been notified of the proposed action.

The disbursement of income and the disposition of property held in trust shall be subject to the conditions of the trust, or as directed by Canon or by resolution of the Convention.

5. The Trustees shall present to each annual meeting of the Convention reports of the various trusts under their control. These reports shall contain a detailed statement of the names and

properties in each fund, with all additions and changes therein, including appropriations made therefrom.

- 6. The duties and responsibilities of the Trustees shall be:
 - a. To hold title to all Diocesan property and to act as agent for the Diocese for major improvements, new construction and other major capital activities.
 - b. To act as the managers of all Diocesan assets, including all financial and real properties and as such they shall:
 - i. Establish short and long term financial goals for the Diocese, including establishing a process to provide multiple-year commitment and funding for Diocesan program and mission; and
 - ii. Supervise the management of all Diocesan funds;
 - c. To work with the Council's Budget Committee, to propose an annual budget for submission to Council for approval or amendment.
 - d. To cause to be prepared monthly and annual Diocesan Financial Reports and provide for an annual Independent audit of all Diocesan finances.
 - e. To plan and to coordinate the raising of capital funds for the Diocese.
 - f. In the event of a vacancy, to consult with the Standing Committee prior to their appointing a Treasurer of the Diocese in accordance with the term of Canon 7, Section 2.
 - g. To review annually and provide for adequate insurance coverage for the Diocese;
 - To provide for adequate bonding or security associated with positions of Diocesan fiscal responsibility;
 - To serve as agent for the Diocese and the Bishop in monitoring the financial affairs of institutions affiliated with the Diocese.
 - j. To provide guidance to parishes and affiliated agencies in the Diocese in the exercise of their fiscal duties.
- 7. This Canon shall become effective immediately except that current Trustees will remain in office through the Diocesan Convention of 2008. All current Trustees shall be eligible to run for election at that time. Initially, Trustees may be elected for terms of less than five (5) years, but only for the purpose of establishing a program whereby the terms of two (2) Trustees shall expire each year.

Sections shown in *Italics* are taken from Canon 15 of the Canons of the Diocese of New York. Sections shown in <u>Underline</u> are taken from Canon 13 of the Canons of the Diocese of New

Jersey. The section shown in Bold is taken from Canon 16 of the Canons of the Diocese of Newark.

Supporting Information:

Currently there is nothing in Constitution or Canons of the Diocese of Newark concerning the Trustees of the Diocese. These proposed amendments would give the Trustees considerable responsibility, much of which is not now in the hands of an elected body of the Diocese. It would also increase the accountability and visibility of the Trustees by having annual elections for its membership, as with Standing Committee and Diocesan Council.

Revisions to Canon 5 shown in Italics

CANON 5 - THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL

3. ORGANIZATION

The President of the Convention shall preside over the Council, and the Council shall have power to enact By-laws and Regulations for the performance of its duties not inconsistent with the Constitution and Canons of General Convention and of this Diocese. The Committees of Council shall be as set forth in its By-laws and shall include a Finance Committee. The Finance Committee may include a minority of non-Council members, as provided by the By-laws, who shall be appointed by the Bishop.

4. DUTIES

- a. Analyze needs, determine primary concerns and program priorities, and develop goals and policy for the Diocese.
- b. Review and evaluate the program of the Diocese, set standards, gather and analyze data, and compare results with goals and policy.
- c. Establish such planning groups as the Council may deem appropriate to carry out its purposes and duties.
- d. Engage consultants and utilize resources sufficient to accomplish the planning process.
- e. Supervise the operating income and expenses financial affairs of the Convention-Diocase; including budgetary matters
- f. Submit annually to the Convention a unified budget for the ensuing year to provide for the total operation of the Diocese.
- g. Adopt a working budget annually.
- h. Provide for the maintenance of sound and accepted business practices in the affairs of the Diocese, its institutions, organizations, and agencies, and its Parishes, Aided Parishes, Incorporated Missions, and Missions. To accomplish this duty the Council shall be empowered to make regulations concerning the investment of trust funds, the bonding of treasurers and custodians, methods of keeping books of account, provisions for auditing and reporting thereof, maintenance of insurance, and such other matters consistent with this Canon, provided that all such regulations shall be subject to review, alteration, or amendment by Convention.
- i. Give recognition to accredited organizations, institutions, and other activities of the Diocese

and provide regulations whereby such recognition can be given. No such organization, institution, or other activity shall receive financial support from the budget for the program of the Diocese or shall be permitted to use in its title any designation indicating it to be affiliated with the Diocese or in any other way hold itself out as a Diocesan organization, institution, or agency without first having received recognition from the Diocesan Council. The Diocesan Council shall have the further power of establishing standards, requiring reports, and the like in connection with all such organizations, institutions, and activities.

j. Approve ACTS/VIM, Ward J. Herbert and Congregational Development grants.

k. With the support of the Diocesan Staff, to assume responsibility for the timeliness and accuracy of parochial reports

Supporting Information:

The Council has done a marvelous job of evaluating priorities for the Diocese and working in various specific areas, but it needs to take the lead role in monitoring the budgetary income and expenditures on an ongoing basis. This would establish a committee of Council with this specific responsibility. It would also make clear that all grant-making is the responsibility of Council.

Recommendation: The Committee on Constitution and Canons recommends against the adoption of these two proposals.

The proposal to create a new Canon 6 would substantially change the role, constitution and function of the Trustees. The revised Canon 5 would make changes in the authority of Diocesan Council. Together they would result in substantial changes in the governance and management of the affairs of the diocese.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons believes that the proposals collectively and individually present unresolved issues of legality both under the Statutes of the State of New Jersey and the Canons of The Episcopal Church. The Committee also believes that the proposals raise issues of risk management and business management practice for each of the bodies affected and the Diocese as a whole. The Committee also believes that changes of this significance need to be considered over a sufficient period of time to fully consider the implications of risk and business management and further to allow the involvement of and consultation with the bodies whose authority and responsibility would be affected including the Diocesan Council, the Trustees, senior staff of the Diocese and the Bishop-elect of the Diocese.

In reaching this conclusion, Canon Clarke and Mr. Garde, the two members of the Committee who are also Trustees of the Diocese, participated in the Committee's deliberations but abstained during the final vote of the Committee on this proposed series of revisions.

The Bishop or Bishop-elect may chose to refer the subject matter of these proposals for study to the Committee on Constitution and Canons or another specially appointed group tasked with this responsibility. However, in the circumstances and given the form of the proposals the Committee recommends against adoption of this proposal.

B. Amendment to Canon II, Section 6 - Voting and Elections

Canon II, Section 6 entitled Voting and Elections currently provides as follows:

Sec. 2. No person shall be eligible for election to any office at Convention unless that person shall have first completed anti-racism training as approved by the Bishop after consultation with the Mission to Dismantle Racism.

Convention Deputies Sidney W. King, Jr., Incarnation, Jersey City (President, UBE Chapter), The Rev. Esar Budhu, St. Agnes/St. Paul's, East Orange; The Very Rev. C. David Williams, Trinity + St. Philip's Cathedral, Newark have submitted the following amendment and explanation:

Sec. 2. No person shall be eligible for election, <u>OR APPOINTMENT</u> to any office at Convention, <u>NOR SHALL ANY PERSON BLECTED BY DISTRICTS</u>. <u>OR APPOINTED TO SERVE ON DIOCESAN COUNCIL OR OTHER COMMITTEES. COMMISSIONS AND BOARDS ACCEDE TO THAT OFFICE</u> unless that person shall have first completed antiracism training as approved by the Bishop after consultation with the Mission to Dismantle Racism.

Supporting Information

The original intent of this Canon was to insure that all leaders, as well as future leaders, in the Diocese of Newark would undergo Antiracism training, which is mandated by the National Church. At the time this Canon was voted upon and overwhelmingly accepted by our Diocese, members of Diocesan Council were elected at Diocesan Convention. With the realignment of District Convocations, the Districts now elect some members of Diocesan Council and others are appointed by our Bishop. A loophole now exists because the original canon requires Antiracism training only for persons "eligible for election to any office at Convention". Elections and appointments are being made to Diocesan Council and other bodies without the mandate of Antiracism training. Realizing the importance and power of Diocesan Council, and other bodies, we need to ensure that everyone who sits on these governing boards is truly grounded in multiculturalism.

Recommendation:

The Committee on Constitution and Canons, subject to certain changes being made to the proposed amendment, recommends that the amendment be adopted.

The revisions (other than a change in number to conform to the title) are intended to address issues that do not appear to involve the substance of the proposal. First there are certain ministerial appointments made at the convention of persons for whom training may be desirable but not feasible including youth ushers. The addition of a reference to diocesan standing bodies is meant to exclude ad hoc groups established for the diocese, such as committees asked to help facilitate an event, particularly in the case of youth participants. The addition of an exception for completion of training is meant to recognize that the opportunities for training are sometimes

limited, thus the use of the exception is to be restricted to circumstances approved by the Bishop in consultation with the Mission to Dismantle Racism. Subject to the foregoing changes being made the Committee recommends the adoption of this proposal.

C. Proposed New Canon 22 Parish Memorial Gardens and Canon 23 Parish Rectories

The Joint Property Task Force consisting of Members of the Standing Committee, The Trustees of the Diocese, Diocesan Council and the Ward Herbert Board submitted the following two proposed new canons:

CANON 22. Parish Memorial Gardens and Columbarium

All Parishes, Aided Parishes and Missions wishing to use a portion of their property for use as a Memorial Garden or Columbarium must seek the approval of the Bishop and Standing Committee prior to consecration or initial use of the property for this purpose. Such approval shall be sought through the use of a Petition in the manner contemplated for the approval of leases in Canon 10.

CANON 23. Parish Rectories

All parish rectories shall be made available for a maintenance inspection by the Wardens (or other designated Member of the Vestry) and Chair of the Parish Property Committee, if one exists, or person responsible for property maintenance on an annual basis. This inspection shall be made at a mutually convenient time for both the Member of the Clergy resident in the Rectory and the Representatives of the Vestry or Executive Committee. A report shall be made to the Vestry or Executive Committee on maintenance issues identified during the inspection.

Explanatory Notes:

Proposed Canon 22 is intended to clarify that the use of a portion of Parish property as a Memorial Garden or Columbarium also constitutes a potential alienation Parish property requiring the approval of the Standing Committee in the same manner contemplated for leased and mortgaged property. Parishes and Missions with existing Memorial Gardens and Columbarium are exempt from this requirement.

Proposed Canon 23 specifically provides for the ability of Parish Vestries and Executive Committees to make annual maintenance inspections of Rectories for purposes of evaluating any ongoing maintenance issues that may need to be addressed both from a property management and financial standpoint. The Diocese has been confined with Rectories that were not part of the recommended annual property inspection with the result that significant maintenance issues where not identified in a timely or responsible manner.

Recommendation:

The Committee notes that these two proposed new canons were not submitted within the 75 day time period required by Canon 19, section 2. Accordingly, they are untimely in the absence of a vote by the Convention allowing their consideration.

Recognizing the important property management issues raised by these Canons, the Committee did consider the merits of both Canons and do not recommend passage of the proposals.

Proposed Canon 22 seeks to make clear that the creation of a Parish Memorial Garden or Columbarium requires the approval of the Standing Committee. The Committee on Constitution and Canons believes that such a change can be made by amending the existing Guidelines issued by the Standing Committee regarding the approval of the sale, leasing or mortgaging of church property to make clear that the creation of Memorial Gardens and Columbariums are included in this requirement.

Proposed Canon 23 seek to address a very real issue regarding the ability of Parishes to inspect Rectories as part of the recommended annual property inspection to assess the need for repairs and to insure that the Rectory is being well maintained. While the Committee is sensitive to these issues, it is concerned about further broadening the scope of the existing Diocesan Canons. Accordingly, the Committee recommends that an additional resolution be added to the annual report of the Committee on Clergy Compensation providing for an annual inspection along the lines envisioned by the proposed Canon. The Committee also recommends that future Letters of Agreement between Parishes, Missions and Clergy include a provision allowing for such an inspection.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons makes the following first supplemental report to the 133rd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark.

I. Proposed Amendments to the Constitution of the Diocese of Newark.

The previously proposed Amendment to Article II of the Constitution relating to clergy and deacon voting rights is withdrawn and the following substitute amendment is recommended by its original proponents: Bishop Croneberger and the Senior Staff, the Rev. Nancy A. Read, Deacon and Co-Chair, The Diaconal Ordination Committee and Diaconal Community of the Diocese of Newark.

The substitute amendment must be approved by two successive Diocesan Conventions:

AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE II, SECTION 4(ii) OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK

RESOLVED, That this 133rd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark amends Article II, section 4(ii) of the Constitution of the Diocese of Newark as follows, with the bolded text to be added and the strikethrough text to be removed and all other text to remain intact, so as to read in all plain text:

[The Convention shall be composed of:]

^{*} Committee person, John Tenula, was unable to respond with his vote prior to the submission of this report.

(ii) Every Presbyter and Deacon canonically resident in the Diocese seven (7) days on the first day of January immediately preceding the meeting of the Convention or Special Convention, except that a vote shall not be accorded to Deacons having fewer than two years in hely orders or to retired priests whose service in the Diocese was fewer than five years prior to retirement; and

Revision Submitted by: John Niles

Recommendation:

The Committee supports this substitute amendment for the reasons outlined by its author in the following paragraph.

II. Proposed Amendments to the Diocesan Canons

A. Related Canonical Amendment to Deacon/Priests Voting Rights

After publication of our initial report, it was brought to our attention by John Niles that the Constitutional Amendment to Article II, Section 4(ii) required an additional amendment to the canons for consistency. Therefore, the following proposed resolution to amend Canon 1, Section 1 provides that consistency.

As this canonical amendment is inextricably woven into the Constitutional amendment, it must be contingent on the passage of the previous amendment. Therefore, it is on for first reading only:

AMENDMENT TO CANON 1, SECTION 1 OF THE CANONS OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK

RESOLVED, That this 133rd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark amends Canon 1, section 1 as follows, with the bolded text to be added and the strikethrough text to be removed and all other text to remain intact, so as to read in all plain text:

The Bishop, or in the case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, the Standing Committee, shall en or before January 25th in each year, or no later than one (1) week before the day of meeting of a Convention or Special Convention, cause to be delivered to the Secretary of the Convention a certified list of all Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese and elligible for votes or seats at the Convention pursuant to Article II, section 4(ii) of the Constitution, together with the names of their respective cures or other stations or assignments. In the case of Clergy who have been ordained or received into the Diocese within the year immediately preceding the date of their ordination or reception shall also be given. From the list so furnished, the Secretary shall prepare the roll of Clergy entitled to votes or seats in the Convention. The roll thus prepared shall be prima facie evidence

of the rights of clerical members. Should any dispute arise, it shall be referred to a committee of two Presbyters and one Layperson appointed by the Convention, who shall decide and report on each case as early as may be; and the decisions thus made, if accepted by the Convention, shall not be called in question again during the same session.

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

These two resolutions are introduced as friendly alternative resolutions to the resolution being recommended by the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

In reviewing the Constitution and Canons, there is a link between Article II, section 4(ii) of the Constitution and Canon 1, section 1 with respect to creating the roll of Clergy eligible for votes and seats in the Convention.

As the official Roll of Clergy is dictated by the Canons, a synchronization of both documents appears to be needed.

The seven day timeframe in the amendment to the Constitution is suggested in order to ensure as much inclusion as possible while also providing the appropriate time needed for the Ecclesiastical Authority to satisfy its obligation under Canon 1, section 1.

The one-week timeframe in the amendment to the Canons is suggested to apply to both the Annual Convention and any Special Convention, thus replacing the January 25th date currently specified for the Annual Convention.

The additional proposed change to the Canon to refer back to the Constitution is designed to allow the Canon to work during the time period when the amendment to the Constitution has yet to be ratified by two successive Conventions.

Revision and Supporting Text Submitted by John Niles

Recommendation:

The Committee supports this amendment for the reasons outlined by its author above.

B. Amendment to Canon II, Section 6 - Voting and Elections

The Constitution and Canons Committee recommended slight revisions to this proposed Canon, but due to an inadvertent error it was never included in our initial report. The original proponents have consented to the revisions as recommended by the Committee, so the substitute resolution is provided as follows:

AMENDMENT TO CANON 2, SECTION 6 OF THE CANONS OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK

RESOLVED, That this 133rd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark amends Canon 2, section 6 as follows, with the bolded text to be added and the strikethrough text to be removed and all other text to remain intact, so as to read in all plain text:

Sec. 2. No person shall be eligible for election, to any office at Convention, nor shall any person elected by Districts, or appointed to serve on Diocesan Council or other Diocesan Standing Committees, Commissions or Boards accede to that office, unless that person shall have first completed or arranged for the completion of anti-racism training as approved by the Bishop after consultation with the Mission to Dismantle Racism.

C. Diocesan Council and Trustee Amendments

After much discussion in Pre-Convention meetings, the proponents of the these two amendments have offered the following resolution in substitution for the proposed amendment to Canon 5-Diocesan Council:

AMENDMENT TO CANON 5 OF THE CANONS OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK

RESOLVED, That this 133rd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark amends Canon 5 of the Diocese of Newark as follows, with the bolded text to be added and the strikethrough text to be removed and all other text to remain intact, so as to read in all plain text:

1. CANON 5 · THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL.

3. ORGANIZATION

The President of the Convention shall preside over the Council, and the Council shall have power to enact By-laws and Regulations for the performance of its duties not inconsistent with the Constitution and Canons of General Convention and of this Diocese. The Committees of Council shall be as set forth in its By-laws and shall include a Finance Committee. The Finance Committee may include a minority of non-Council members, as provided by the By-laws, who shall be appointed by the Bishop.

4. DUTIES

- a. Analyze needs, determine primary concerns and program priorities, and develop goals and policy for the Diocese.
- b. Review and evaluate the program of the Diocese, set standards, gather and analyze data, and

compare results with goals and policy.

- c. Establish such planning groups as the Council may deem appropriate to carry out its purposes and duties.

Rationale:

This would establish a committee of Council with this specific responsibility. It would also make clear that all grant-making is the responsibility of Council.

Likewise, the proponents have agreed to withdraw their resolution for a Canon 6 and propose the following substitute resolution:

RESOLUTION FOR THE STUDY AND PREPARATION OF A PROPOSED CANON OR CANONS CONCERNING THE TRUSTEES

RESOLVED, that the Bishop appoint a study group or refer the matter to the Constitution and Canons Committee to propose a canon or canons for the 2008 Convention that will serve to define the responsibilities of the Trustees while remaining within the legal scope of the New Jersey Statutes. It will also report on the legal viability of seeking to define number, terms and election procedures by canon. The process shall include a well-publicized open hearing to solicit the opinions of a wide spectrum of the diocese prior to the submission of the proposed canon(s).

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

A resolution submitted to this year's Convention sought to add a canon that would limit, expand and define the responsibilities, number and terms of the Diocesan Trustees whose role, number and terms are currently a creature of statutory enactment, their own bylaws, and custom. The Committee on Constitution and Canons recommended against the proposal in light of questions that were raised as to the legality of some of the provisions; the belief that the canon required more collaboration between key Diocesan bodies and the Bishop's office, and in light of it occurring at the start of a new episcopate. Separate canonical amendments regarding the Diocesan Council were included in the resolution.

The proponents of the original resolution have agreed to withdraw the proposed canon with respect to the Trustees and have requested this substitute resolution that comes with the support of the Bishop's office. The canonical amendments regarding the Diocesan Council, with minor amendments, are being presented separately at this convention.

Should a study group be appointed, it would be advisable to have a diverse membership, with participants from the Trustees, Diocesan Council, Standing Committee, clergy and/or lay leadership from mission churches, and the Chancellor or a Vice-Chancellor.

Recommendation: The Committee on Constitution and Canons recommends the adoption of these two proposals.

D. Proposed New Canon 22 Parish Memorial Gardens and Canon 23 Parish Rectories

These amendments have both been withdrawn by its Sponsors upon the recommendation of the Committee.

2006 Annual Report to Diocesan Convention The Reparations Task Force Episcopal Diocese of Newark

The Reparations Task Force, a working group of the Mission to Dismantle Racism, was called in 2004 by the Bishop in response to Resolution 2004-6, which was approved at the Diocesan Convention in January 2004.

The mission of the Reparations Task Force is to study and engage in diocesan discussions on the theology, history, issues and feasibility of restitution for descendants of Africans who were enslaved in America over period of 247 years. Specifically, the Task Force is charged with exploring how the Diocese of Newark should begin the process of "restoring all people to unity with God and each other in Christ" (BCP, Catechism, p. 855) with regards to the legacy of slavery and the need for repentance and restitution.

Over the past two years, the Task Force has continued to engage in the process of studying and discussing the vast complexities of the issues related to reparations. We continued our focus on gaining a deeper understanding on how the legacy of slavery has and continues to be a unique, systemic and institutionalized racism that results in the vast disparities in virtually every aspect of life for African American people. The often painful and emotionally charged discoveries of our work have helped the Task Force to remain committed to finding an authentic process for all members of the diocese to remember, repair, restore and reconcile to one another and to God.

The specific goals identified for the Task Force to undertake during 2006 were:

- to continue diocesan wide discussions/conversations/dialogues;
- to continue to develop and design educational tools about reparations and communicate them to members of the diocese; and
- to formulate and present for consideration by members of our diocesan convention resolutions to be considered by the members of the 75th General Convention of the Episcopal Church.

The Reparations Task Force made moderate progress in achieving the goals outlined for 2006:

• In March 2006, the Task Force sponsored a double session at Creative Congregations. Mr. Pete Rhinehart and The Rev. Allison Moore compared 5 generations of opportunities in a "generic" African-American man's family and in a white immigrant family in the United States. This revealed some of the cumulative privileges taken for granted by many white people and cumulative barriers and necessary resilience for African-Americans passed on from generation to generation. The second session, facilitated by Ms. Diane Sammons, Esq. and The Rev. Chris McCloud, Dcn. focused on the legal and sociological issues and implications of reparations. Approximately 35 people attended the combined sessions and offered lively comments and questions.

Originally, the Task Force outlined a series of three forums to present to members of the
Diocese during 2006; however, only one of the forums was presented, The Second
Conversation: A Theology of Reparations, which was presented on May 6, 2006 at
Cathedral House. The forum was developed to explore the theological aspects of
reparations and to gain a deeper understanding of how the process of reconciliation and
forgiveness requires and includes restoration to an affected person/persons. Our guest
speakers, Dr. Donald W. Shriver, Jr., President Emeritus of Union Theological Seminary,
and The Rev. Michael Lapsley, SSM, Executive Director for The Institute for Healing of

Memories, Capetown, South Africa, provided a riveting exploration of the theological issue as it relates to reparations.

It is the intent of the Task Force to continue to present the remaining forums as previously identified: Sociological Issues and Impact; Advocacy - The Legal Perspective, Feasibility and H.R. 40 (The Conyers Bill); and Our Christian Community In Action - The Diocese and the Church. Dates will be made public as soon as plans are finalized.

As one of three dioceses already committed to the work of studying Reparations for Slavery in the Episcopal Church, the Diocese of Newark submitted adopted Resolution 2008-08 of the 132nd Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark, Church Responsibility in Reparations, to the 75th General Convention. The resolution was incorporated, with other resolutions on reparations, into adopted General Convention Resolutions A123 and A127. Some of the focus for the work of the Task Force for 2007-2009 has been provided by the recommendations of these resolutions in support of The Episcopal Church Restorative Justice commitment. The recommendations of A123 and A127 specifically for dioceses are:

- a. From GC Resolution A123:Resolved, That the 75th General Convention of The Episcopal Church through the Executive Council urgently initiate a comprehensive program and urge every Diocese to collect and document during the next triennium detailed information in its community on (a) the complicity of The Episcopal Church in the institution of slavery and ir the subsequent history of segregation and discrimination and (b) the economic benefits The Episcopal Church derived from the institution of slavery; and direct the Committee on Anti-Racism to monitor this program and report to Executive Council each year by March 31 on the progress in each Diocese;
- b. From GC Resolutions A127:Resolved, That in the spirit of inclusion, dioceses also be invited to determine whether their call is to conduct truth and reconciliation processes in regard to other histories and legacles of racial discrimination and oppression that may be applicable in their geographic area, while not diminishing the strong call to focus on the history and legacy of slavery; and be it further Resolved, That the dioceses will give a progress report to the Anti-Racism Committee.

It is the intent of the Reparations Task Force to focus its energies on continuing to present educational forums; to follow the recommendations as presented in Resolutions A123 and A127; and to collaborate with neighboring religious organizations and entities such as the Diocese of New York, the Diocese of New Jersey and the Anti-racism Commission of the Executive Council of The Episcopal Church to facilitate further discussion on reparations and to develop creative vehicles for spiritual healing and reconciliation.

Resolved, that, in response to the 75th General Convention Resolutions A123 and A127, the work of the Reparations Task Force be continued and that the Task Force report to both the 134th Annual Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark and to the Antiracism Committee of the Executive Council of The Episcopal Church in January 2007.

Last January, Resolution 2006-06 - Making the Church Inclusive of and fully Accessible to all Youth and Young Adults, which was adopted by the Diocesan Convention, urged the following:

- Congregations, congregational leadership, and Christian formation and youth leaders to commit to and advocate for educational efforts and discussion in each church aimed at changing attitudes and becoming more proactively inclusive of all children and youth.
- That diocesan congregations become more conscious and intentional about including children and youth in church roles usually reserved for adults,
- And that Christian educators and youth leaders become more aware of, sensitive to
 and educated about the needs of children and youth with physical, emotional and/or
 learning disabilities and special needs and with the assistance of the Bethsaida
 Team and the Christian Formation Commission commit to researching, identifying
 and providing ability-appropriate curricula, materials and support to assure their full
 access and inclusion in church school, spiritual formation and other program
 activities:

To accomplish these three goals, the resolution directed congregations to report on their accomplishments to the Bethsaida Team and the Christian Formation Commission, the sponsors of the resolution, who are responsible for presenting a summary of the findings to the 133rd Diocesan Convention in January 2007.

The method used by the two commissions to collect data was a survey that was sent out to every congregation in the diocese. We are pleased to report that almost 50% of the churches responded to the survey. The churches not only answered the survey questions, they shared enthusiastically and in detail their experiences, both successes and challenges, in their parish. The quality of the information provides both commissions with valuable insights and fruitful areas of exploration about how we may support the diocese in the effort to increase the participation of all youth and young adults.

The survey also collected information on adult attendance and participation in order to put the youth participation in perspective.

Attendance and Education by Age Group

For questions on availability of educational opportunities, we separated the age groups as follows: Preschool, K-3, 4-6, Middle School, High School, Ages 18-25, Ages 25-65, Ages over 65.

Average Sunday attendance for our sample was 78 Adults and 23 Youth. However, the range of congregational size went from some of the smallest congregations to some of the largest in our Diocese. Through the breakdown of educational opportunities, our survey shows a flow of youth and young adult attendance that is not unexpected. The percentage of attendance from Kindergarten through middle school/confirmation is fairly consistent. 80% of the churches in our survey provided educational opportunities for those grades. The percentages drop significantly during the high school to twenty-five year old range, (and is also somewhat lower in the preschool age group).

More than half the congregations in our study had youth groups. Larger churches with youth groups most often had both junior and senior youth groups, while many of the smaller churches combined middle and high school ages into one youth group. With regard to confirmation classes many of the smaller churches do not have annual classes, but schedule them as children reach the appropriate age for the "coming of age" in our churches.

Opportunity

While this drop in older youth and young adults is no surprise, the Bethsaida Team sees an opportunity for congregational development during the high school and young adult years as children in New Jersey are being strongly encouraged to pursue their education at two and four-year colleges within the state. There have been a number of recent examples of children with Down's Syndrome, learning and other disabilities mainstreamed to NJ community college and four-year college programs. These students will continue to reside in New Jersey and may be interested in developing their spiritual lives if the churches in the Diocese reach out to them. In addition, we know of instances where families who have children with disabilities have chosen certain programs and churches based upon the acceptance of their child with a disability. Therefore, it's possible that welcoming children and adults with disabilities may encourage their families to join them and would further advance the goals of congregational development.

Participation in Church Life

Almost all of the churches in our survey reported significant participation in the life of the church by children and youth. In addition to the traditional roles that the children and youth take advantage of (acolyte, lay reader, usher, choir), the churches that responded to our survey offered a wide range of opportunities for children and youth to participate in fellowship, outreach, leadership, liturgy, and service. The surveys did not indicate that these opportunities were available only to children without disabilities. The statistics showing that many children with disabilities are able to participate in church life suggest that they are also participating in the specific activities that the churches offer for youth involvement.

When we asked about activities that youth and young adults participated in we included the following categories: Acolyte, Lay Reader, Choir, Usher, Worship Committee, Vestry, Outreach Committee, Christian Education Committee, and Other. Over 70% of the churches in our survey involved youth in the first four activities (bolded). With the exception of one church without any children, all churches involved youth in at least one of the top four activities. The remaining named activities (in italics) were used by about 15% of churches. However, encouragingly, eight churches had a youth vestry member. About 60% of the churches found additional and unique ways to include youth in other activities both those aimed particularly at youth and those aimed at including youth participation in adult functions. We invite the people of the diocese to look over this list for ideas on how to include the gifts of all our youth in the life of the church.

Disabilities and Participation

Our research shows that the largest group with disabilities is the adult group aged 65+, followed by the 25 to 65 year old age group. While we don't have a breakdown of disabilities yae with within the latter group, we suspect that the disabilities increase with age. The entire 25 to 65+ group represents the largest percentage in all the questions about accessibility and disability: unable to physically access the church buildings; unable to access the church programs; able to participate in church programs. It is heartening that, despite many churches' barriers, more people of all ages living with disabilities are able to participate than are not. While the manner in which the questions on disabilities were interpreted by individuals responding varied too greatly to give a definitive answer, we believe that more than half the people of all ages with disabilities are actually participating in church life and programs. When looking at the 2-18 age group, the percentage of children with disabilities who are able to participate rises to almost 65%. This is very encouraging.

What is Working and What is Needed

What is Working

Comments by survey participants generally fall into two categories: What congregations do to welcome and include youth and young adults - hospitality; and - especially for people with disabilities - what equipment or facilities they provide.

What is needed

The comments made by survey participants almost exclusively referred to the needs of the disabled and how to get the word out about a church's accessibility and welcoming of people with disabilities.

The Work Ahead

The last question we asked was whether the church responding would find it helpful to have a consultation with either the Bethsaida Team or the Christian Formation Commission. Many of the respondents did request a consultation from either or both of the commissions. It is a hopeful sign that congregations are taking these issues seriously, and it is an opportunity for the two commissions to further serve congregations in the Diocese.

Many aspects of the survey indicate a need for further study and information gathering. Further study on the children with disabilities - numbers and type - is especially important in assessing the kinds of resources/workshops the Bethsaida Team needs to cultivate to help churches. The Bethsaida Team has already collected resources that can help youth leaders integrate children with a whole variety of disabilities in church activities.

We think that the fact that there was no category in our survey where 100% of the churches participated is partly a sign of the demographics of our diocese and partly one of the challenges that the diocese, individual churches and church leaders need to address. Overall, we are heartened by the good we found, which makes us enthusiastic about facing the challenges. We look forward to working in the diocese to raise up all youth and young adults in our churches.

The Rev. Mark Beckwith, Bishop-elect 133rd Annual Diocesan Convention Sermon January 20, 2007

1 Cor 12:12-27 Luke 4:14-21

The first verbal message of Easter in the Gospel of Mark is actually a commandment — do not fear. When the women arrived to anoint the body of Jesus on that first Easter morning, they found that the stone had been rolled away. Jesus was gone; and the women were told that he has been raised. "Do not fear", an unknown young man tells them. But they were out of their minds with fear — they could not absorb all that they felt and heard and seen. And they left the tomb afraid.

Do not fear. But we do. Because of all that we feel and hear and see in our lives and in the world around us — we are often afraid. We try and avoid fear or shake off fear — or cast out fear — and all we seem to do is give fear more space in our psyches. Many of us tend to approach situations with a measure of anxiety — and leave those situations with even more.

We have a lot to be afraid about. Since 9/11/2001, a vapor of fear has amothered some and seeped into the souls of others. Many of our key national leaders have bottled that fear — and then have released it under the guise of strategy and safety — with disastrous results. Our national church is becoming more fragmented; the international Anglican Communion is threatened with an irreparable fracture. And our congregational lives are often frought with the fear of what I call the killer B's — budgets, boilers, buildings, boards — and the various banana peels of biblical interpretation. We have a lot to be afraid of.

I have learned – and am still learning, about the challenge and invitation not to fear. We have been sold a bill of goods into thinking that the opposite of fear is bravery. It isn't. I need to tell you that I have been feeling very brave during these last several months – but I have to confess to some fear – fear of a new role, fear of a new identity, fear of a new place to live and work – and fear of moving into a region that has more Yankee fans than God should ever allow. I have been rather brave during this transition – and many others have displayed similar bravery, but we can all admit to some levels of fear. Transitions do that – and the resulting fear is a normal part of our life experience.

No, the opposite of fear is not bravery. The opposite of fear is hope. Christians dare to hope. Our day to day lives are often consumed with various hoops we need to jump through — which leave us feeling afraid and exhausted, but our calling as the people of God is to claim a hope that we can live into. The world needs for us to hope — and our hope in Christ can transform whatever darkness the world throws at us.

In today's Gospel, Jesus goes to the synagogue and tells his home-town congregation that good news will be brought to the poor, the blind will see, and the captive and oppressed will be set free. His is a transforming hope — so radical that it is hard to be believed.

Jesus is proclaiming that there is hope for people who have systematically been taught that they can expect no hope. Why? Because their culture and/or their religion have said they don't deserve it. Jesus announces that there is hope for people who have otherwise been pushed out or beaten down. And the genius of Jesus is that not only will the marginalized be given hope, but it is from those margins where hope is born. As Martin Luther King Jr. preached so eloquently forty years ago, when the poor and oppressed are set free, so is everybody else – and true hope can reign.

There is a sense of urgency about this. In the last decade or so, I have met more and more people who have never had an experience of hope. People whose lives have – for whatever reason, been pushed so far out and down that they don't know how to hope for a birthday or for Christmas – or for help. They may do things that enable them to get a buzz or get over or get even – but that is not hope. On the other end of life experience, there are more and more people who have bought into the secular distortion – no, the secular lie; that hope can be bought and sold as happiness. The secular spin is that having the right home and hearth will generate happiness and security – and insulation from the poor, the blind and the oppressed. Happiness certainly has its place – but we need to remember that happiness is rooted in the word happenstance. It is conditional. Happiness happens if certain conditions are lined up in the right way – and we will expend enormous amounts of time, energy and money to make that happen. Having that happenstance may make life easier, but it is not hope.

The hope in Christ is that we all can be set free. Free from the invisible oppression of having too much, and free from the all too tangible oppression of having nothing at all. It is a wild promise and a profligate hope. And we need to become bearers of that promise and servants of that hope — and not just when we feel like it. I have to admit there are moments in my life when I don't want to be a bearer or servant of anything. But — if I didn't believe that Jesus' hope could be lived into and the promise could be fulfilled, I would get out of the ministry business faster than you can say the Nicene Creed.

Which is where Paul's image of the body comes in, as outlined in his first letter to the Corinthians. Using the metaphor of poetry, Paul paints a verbal picture of the distinctive human parts being forged by the Holy Spirit into one body. He is describing community – a community of the various parts – Jew and Greek, slave and free – of poor and rich, black and white and yellow and brown, male and female, gay and straight, suburban, rural and urban, high church, low church and emerging church. All one body – one community, that works – or doesn't work, not through our ability to solve problems or tolerate our differences, but in our commitment to embrace and celebrate one another's gifts – and through those gifts to live into a common hope.

We need each other. To help us hope, especially in those moments when hope doesn't seem possible. We need each other — to nurture and sustain the body — and to grow into the fullness of Christ's vision of freedom.

In 1983, shortly after I arrived in this diocese for the first time, my wife Marilyn and I attended the annual clergy/spouse conference (we didn't identify partners in those days).

We were not only new to the diocese, but we were newly married – and weren't sure if and how we would fit in. As we drove out to Pennsylvania, 'fear not' was not an admonition we could easily embrace. There was a self appointed group who organized the conference and provided hospitality – and for the life of me I can't remember who they were. But inside of ten minutes, it became clear to both of us that the real hosts of the gathering were Jack and Marilyn Croneberger. They were warm and fun and funny. Their ease with and devotion to each other provided us with an abiding model of partnership; and without seeming to exert any effort, they welcomed us into the diocesan community. Jack and Marilyn subliminally invited us to claim our gifts – and to discern the integral part we would take and play in the larger – rather unique body called the Diocese of Newark.

In recent years, as we all know, Marilyn Croneberger has experienced some health issues to the degree that she hasn't been able to play the extraordinary visible partner that she has been in years past. But I know — and we all have seen, that Jack's and Marilyn's mutual devotion continues. And for Marilyn Olson and me, the gift of welcome that the Cronebergers gave us twenty five years ago is matched — if not exceeded, by the care and compassion they continue to offer each other. They have provided my family with an abiding image of community and a compelling vision of hope. And I join with many here today who deeply thank them for that.

Fear not. Claim the hope — as we are reanointed by it with water, as we hear it in scripture, as we receive it in the Bucharist—and as we see it demonstrated by brothers and sisters — of all sorts and conditions, who embrace hope in the face of fear. The living Christ gives us that hope. Let us claim that hope and use it to help set people free.



Attached to this letter is the financial statement for December and 2006. The purpose of this letter is to summarize the major points of the statement.

Income

The major income issue is pledge income. This statement reflects total pledge income that is about \$60,000 below budget. Total income includes an accrual of \$385,000 in pledge income that has not yet been received. The accrual is based upon the amounts outstanding on pledge estimates submitted by the congregations. Full collection of this amount will be necessary for the overall financial results to be final.

Disbursements

These results include an accrual of about \$250,000 that is still due to the national church. This is a significantly lower balance than prior years and will be paid as 2006 pledges are received. With one minor exception all expense categories were under budget for the year.

Summary

This statement reflects an operating surplus of about \$16,300. Of that amount \$5,400 is the excess of convention fees over expenses, that amount is applied towards the costs of future conventions. As a result this statement reflects a surplus of about \$11,000. However, it should be stressed that these are very preliminary results and may very well change. In addition to collecting pledge income, there may be some expenses that have not yet been recorded.

Adopted 2007 Budget

The Budget Committee of the Diocesan Council is pleased to present the proposed 2007 Diocesan Budget to the Diocesan Council and the Diocesan Convention. The 2007 Diocesan Convention will mark the second convention where the budget process will operate under a change in the rules of order. Specifically under the rules of order adopted at the 2005 convention, the deadline for budget resolutions is now noon on the Friday before convention (January 12th for the 2007 convention). The budget will be presented at pre-convention meetings the first week in January, allowing for at least a week between the last pre-convention meeting and the budget resolution deadline. After the January 12th deadline, budget resolutions will be subject to the same process as is used in the resolutions process. That is, any resolution will have to be accompanied by an explanation of why it was not submitted by January 12th

The proposed 2007 budget has been one of the most difficult to prepare in many years. A projected decline of over \$200,000 in pledge income has necessitated some difficult and painful decisions. The reality is that just as congregational budgets are driven by the giving of the members, diocesan budgets are driven by the giving of the congregations. It should be a surprise to no one that many churches have had significant financial difficulties over the past five years. Those difficulties have forced many congregations to similar decisions so as to be able to operate within the available revenue. Faced with similar declines in income, it is incumbent on the diocese to do the same. Failure to do so puts the whole institution at risk, furthermore there is little indication that deferring such difficult decisions is of any real benefit.

Income

As noted earlier, pledge income is projected to decrease by \$205,000 or 7.7% from 2006. While over 30 churches did not comply with the canonical deadline, the number is now down to less than six. The potential impact of the pledges still outstanding should be minimal, but a number of churches qualified their pledges in terms of their own final budget decisions. As a result there is still the chance that pledge income may deteriorate even more, which would require further adjustments to the budget.

The decline in pledge income was partially offset by an increase in restricted income. This income is provided by the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and the Gertrude Butts Memorial Home Association. Since the funds are designated by the donor, this line is not subject to Convention action. VOICE income is projected to decline due to planned reductions in the publication of the VOICE. Convention fee income will decline as there will be only one convention in 2007 and that will be a one day convention.

Disbursements

Outreach

One of the most difficult and painful decisions in the 2007 budget is the need to cut giving to the National Church below the 25% level. Although the National Church asks

dioceses to give 21% of income, the Diocese of Newark has for many years stayed at the 25% level as part of our stewardship approach to diocesan giving. Because of the deep decline in revenue there is simply no alternative, but to make cuts in this line. The proposed budget provides for giving 21% of pledge and investment income so that the asking of the National Church will be met. In the other outreach category, the percentage of the justice missioner's position paid from outreach will increase to 50%. This is consistent with actual situation. Committing additional outreach funds for this position resulted in funding cuts for the New Jersey Council of Churches, ECD and domestic outreach.

Mission and Program

Almost every program area suffered some cuts in its funding. Among the most significant are Christian Formation, the VOICE, and Cross Roads Outdoor Ministries. Funding for Christian Formation maintains the staff position, but does not provide any funding for program. This means that programs will have to be funded by some combination of grants and program fees. Proposed funding for the VOICE would provide for one to two issues in 2007. Analysis of different alternatives is under way to determine the most effective way to do this as well as what new opportunities are available through new technology. Funding for Cross Roads is \$10,000 less than was asked for; given the decline in income it is impossible to provide the requested level of funding. All other proposed cuts are due to the overall financial situation, not the merits of the specific program.

Staff

The proposed 2007 budget provides a one and one-half per cent salary increase for diocesan staff retroactive to January 1st, compared to a request of 3%. However, the budget also assumes \$60,000 in undesignated cuts from the staff section of the budget. For budget purposes this amount has been divided equally among the ten staff lines including the staff lines that appear in the mission and program section of the budget. Budgeting the cuts in this way will allow Bishop-elect Beckwith additional time to determine how to best structure the diocesan staff. No projection is made about severance costs for staff that may leave the diocese as it is simply not possible to do this accurately. Ultimately the diocese may have to absorb a deficit equal to the amount of 2007 severance costs.

The proposed budget also includes a significant increase in funding for the lay pension plan. Like many pension plans in both the for-profit and not-for-profit world, the Diocese of Newark's lay pension plan is under funded. To make up this deficit and to insure adequate funding for the future annual contributions of \$180,000 are necessary. The plan is to get to that level gradually over a three year period. Consideration also needs to be given as to whether the existing (and more expensive) defined benefit plan should be continued for new employees.

Operating and Administrative Expenses

Projected 2007 operating expenses are based upon the actual expenses for 2006. This results in a significant projected decline in the cost of heat. The other significant saving is a reduction in the cost of Directors and Officers Insurance through new coverage arranged by the Church Insurance Company. Group Medical Insurance is projected to increase due to an increase in the number of clergy retiring prior to the age of 65.

The Episcopal Reserve (Line 56) is the line used to reserve funds for Episcopal elections and transitions. The balance in the fund was exhausted during 2006 for the expenses of the search and election process. There remains about \$90,000 in 2007 expenses for the consecration and other transition expenses. In addition there is a need to at least begin a process for reserving funds for the next transition. The total 2006 actual cost and projected 2007 cost plus a projected increase in costs would equal over \$300,000. The plan is to amortize this cost over a ten year period at the rate of \$30,000 per year beginning in 2007. This spreads both current and future costs over multiple years and is a reasonable approach so long as funding in future budgets does not fall below \$31,000 per year. Other cuts in these categories are based upon the overall financial situation.

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Diocesan Council Report Convention 2006

During 2006 the Diocesan Council continued its work in a variety of ministry areas with increased energy and enthusiasm. The Council takes seriously its canonical responsibilities for long-range planning and determining program priorities and reviewing and evaluating the programs approved by the Convention, and much of its work is grounded in that intentionality.

The Diocesan Council met in the months of February, March, April, May, June, September, November and December in 2006 and in January 2007. With the exception of the February meeting, all meetings were held at St. Agnes' Episcopal Church in Little Falls; we are grateful for its hospitality. Each of the ten districts was represented by one clergy and one tay person. They were joined by four other representatives, two lay and two clergy, appointed by the Bishop.

Much of the work of the Council in 2006 was effectively planned and implemented by four Work Groups:

Statement of Proceedings of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties-2006

Authority and Responsibilities of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties

The positions and functions of the Trustees are established by Statute of the State of New Jersey. Historical interpretation of the statute has established the following long-standing precedent in the Diocese of Newark.

Members of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties are chosen by the diocesan convention for life, or as the statute reads, "permanently," subject to the Trustees themselves having the power to remove a member for cause. The Trustees are a corporation, having all of the powers of a non-profit religious corporation other than the power to manage a congregation.

The Trustees manage funds which fall into several categories: (a) the endowment of the diocese (unrestricted funds given or left to the diocese), the income from which by long-standing convention mandate is used "to support the episcopate of the diocese" (operating budget); (b) undesignated capital funds, the income from which can be used discretionarily by the Trustees; and (c) restricted trusts for the benefit of the diocese, congregations, or other ecclesisatical institutions, for which the Trustees serve merely as custodians. The Trustees hold title to real property of the diocese (e.g., the Bishop's house, Episcopal House). The Trustees also hold title to the property of Aided Parishes while they remain in that status. Additionally, the Trustees hold title to parishes formerly under the auspices of the now disbanded Department of Missions. Finally, the Trustees hold title to the property and proceeds from the sale of the property of extinct parishes (N.J.S.A. 16:12-16).

Overview of Trustee Operations-2006

The Trustees met collectively four times in 2006 (March, June, September, and December) to manage the endowment of the diocess and to oversee the properties and various funds under their control. Between quarterly meetings, the officers of the Trustees met on a weekly, frequently daily, basis by phone or in person, as did subcommittees of the Trustees, and they communicated with all Trustees on matters before them. They also worked closely with Jim Caputo, the diocesan property manager, on properties under the auspices of the Trustees, many of which formerly were under the now disbanded Department of Missions, and some of which are in various states of extremely costly disrepair as a result of decades of neglect. The Trustees are addressing a priority list of the various property matters before them and have discussed with Bishop-Elect Mark Beckwith the urgent need for a diocesan strategy within the Bishop's Office regarding diocesan property management.

Assets that Can Be Used at the Discretion of Trustees

The Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties wish to correct misconceptions about the sum of assets that can be used at the discretion of Trustees. By providing the following financial summary and shedding light on financial realities regarding the assets under the supervision of the Trustees, the Trustees hope to assist members of the diocesa to address the current diocesan financial predicament, a result in large measure of the declaiming diocesan enrollment (at an average annual rate since 1970 of 697 persons per year, according to New York Times data).

The Trustees provide funding for diocesan projects and commitments from the income of an endowment, whose value as of September 30, 2006, was \$1.568 million. The income from the endowment that the Trustees spend annually presently equates to approximately \$75,000. In 2006, all of that income was applied, at the request of diocesan leadership, to a salary line item in the diocesan budget. It is the policy of the Trustees not to spend the principal of the endowment, with the view that, if this were done, the endowment would be depleted rapidly and the funding of future requests and building maintenance necessarity would have to cease.

The funding of projects, such as the repair of the elevator and other maintenance and upgrades at Bpiscopal House, comes solely from the sale of churches and other diocesan-owned properties, the proceeds from which are under the oversight of the Trustees. Thus, for example, proceeds from the sale of the West Milford property were used to pay for the necessary improvement of the elevator at Episcopal House (requested by diocesan leadership), now completed by Otis Elevator.

The Trustees have oversight for many more assets than those that are discussed above. One fund is the Congregational Growth and Development Fund, consisting of proceeds realized from the closing of churches during the tenure of Bishop Spong. At the request of Bishop Croneberger—who is ecclesiastically responsible for congregational development—the principal of this fund has been spent on assisting individual church programs. As of December 1, 2006, there were \$682,508 remaining in this fund, with \$122,733 in outstanding commitments, leaving \$559,775 in net funds available.

All other assets that are under the oversight of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties are held in trust for other entities of the diocese. These assets equated to \$ 23.6 million as of September 30, 2006. These assets are legally restricted in their use. Trustees legally cannot use these assets, or income from from them, at their own discretion. Regarding these assets, the Trustees sumply set in a custodial capacity. Such assets include endowments, pension plan funds, and other vital assets of individual entities within the diocese.

In sum, the Trustees have very limited resources that they are able to use at their discretion for projects within the diocese and to support the pressing needs of the diocese.

The Diocese of Newark is at an unfortunate point in its history where the funding of needs and projects largely can come only from the sale of churches and diocesan properties. This fact reflects the steady decline of Church membership.

Housing for the Diocesan Bishop

The historical precedent in the Diocese of Newark is that the Trustees have purchased a house, absent any debt, for the Diocesan Bishop. The Trustees will apply the full proceeds of the sale of the Bishop's residence in Montclair (with supplementation, in consultation with the Bishop-Elect) to the purchase of a residence for the Bishop and his family. The Bishop's house in Montclair, built in 1901, was purchased on September 30, 1998, for \$465,000, and appraised on Angust 8, 2006, at \$885,000. The sale price to a building contractor, who conducts historical renovations, was \$901,000. Subtracting credit for structural repair costs needed to the home, detected in behind-the-wall inspections, the removal and replacement of a leaking underground oil tank and contaminated soil (detected in inspection, and, some of which will be covered by insurance), the real-estate fee, transfer tax, and costs for legally-required upgrades to code, the net proceeds from the sale are assimated at the time of writing at \$740,000 (application for permits for the oil tank removal and replacement is underway at the time of writing, but not yet granted, therefore, it is uncertain whether the estimated cost for the work will hold until the task is underway and how much of the expense will be covered by insurance, until the insurance adjustor is able to inspect the work in progress), in a declined real estate market since the August 2006 appraisal.

Summary of Trustee Projects in 2006

Significant actions taken by the Trustees in 2006 included:

- Sale of a piece of unusable land (rock formation) in Hopatong Township to a neighbor for \$6,024.10.
 This land had been a bequest to the diocese.
- Sale of the Washington Township property for \$157, 844.64. At Bishop Croneberger's request, 10 percent
 of the proceeds was titted to Congregational Growth and Development.
- 3. Upgrade of the Episcopal House elevator by Otis Elevator for \$253,145.83.
- Commencement of asbestos removal from St. John's Church, Jersey City, for an estimate of \$78,500, plus testing fees of \$18,000, for an estimated total of \$96,000.
- 5. Sale of the Bishop's residence in Montclair for proceeds of an approximate \$740,000, to be applied to the purchase of a new bishop's residence.
- 6. Repair of the boiler system (emitting noxious fumes and creating a serious health hazard) at St. Mark's, West Orange. The boiler and duct system must be replaced in the spring during warmer weather and will cost an estimated \$30,522 (including discounts).
- 7. Approval of \$135,390 in congregational growth and development grants, recommended by Bishop Croneberger and Canon Echols, to the following parishes (\$182,733 in outstanding commitments remained in December 2006):
 - •All Saints, Glen Rock: \$10,000
 - •St. Albans, Oakland: \$13,000
 - •St. Mark's, Teaneck: \$25,000
 - •Transfiguration, Towaco: \$7,000

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A COMMITMENT TO SERVE/VENTURE IN MISSION - REPORT FOR 2006

ACTS/VIM, A Commitment to Serve/Venture in Mission, has a wonderful mission: "Through financial support of programs and projects that encourage both congregational development and community outreach, ACTS/VIM endeavors to increase the activity of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark as it expresses Jesus' vision for God's people preserved in the Gospel."

In 2006 we honored this mission by awarding \$148,000 in 31 grants to 25 congregations, social service agencies, community development corporations, or institutions in the Diocese. Organizations across the diocese serve people living with HIV/AIDS, people learning English as a second language, art and music outreach in congregations, children, deaf people and others who benefit from ASL interpreters, homeless people, people getting back on their feet, people living paycheck to paycheck, seafarers, and seniors. This year ACTS/VIM also sponsored a workshop about preventing domestic violence specifically for people who may have reason to hear or suspect abuse. A subcommittee met over the summer to improve the application so that it's easier to understand and compare potential projects. Informal networking among agencies serving similar populations helps distribute resources and information more widely; the committee hopes to formalize this in the future by offering chances for people involved in outreach ministry to come together to share and encourage each other.

There is more to do. The committee held a special meeting in May to discuss two recurring issues. First, how do we encourage more congregational development through community outreach? In 2007 the committee will sponsor at least one diocesan workshop, perhaps in conjunction with other diocesan organizations, on finding resources for ministry. Members will also attend district meetings to discuss outreach opportunities and resources, and will publicize results of funding decisions in The Voice. Second, several organizations in the diocese come to ACTS/VIM repeatedly for help, leaving less money available for other, newer forms of outreach. Two sub-committees met over the summer, and made recommendations to address this issue that the committee as a whole approved at their October meeting. Members of ACTS/VIM are now meeting with members of the Outreach Working Group of Diocesan Council to formalize these recommendations.

It is a privilege to help organizations in the diocese live into our baptismal promises through financial and other resources for outreach. Thank you.

2006 Annual Report to Diocesan Convention The Bethsalda Team Episcopal Diocese of Newark

The Bethsaida Team realized in early 2006 that, with the loss of our founder and Co-Chair Jan Hardy and with the pending retirement of Bishop Croneberger, our need to discern the future of our organization was paramount. Through several meetings and lengthy discussions and, with the assistance of Ms. Tillie Jo Emerson, of MTE, LLC, who facilitated our discussions and guided us through our grieving, we were able to move forward.

Two things we wanted to accomplish were to avoid burdening any one individual with the responsibility of Team Management and to preserve the marvelous creative missionary environment that Ms. Jan Hardy established. The spirit of the BT has beer revealed, as we moved from a monolithic commission focused on bringing our obsolete church facilities up to date to include a mission of service so that churches would be prepared to welcome all into their midst and partake of everyone's gifts of the spirit. Through this five-year evolution we have discerned the need, as expressed in the Diocesan Profile for our new Bishop, to address congregational development. The BT understands that our role of promoting inclusion for all with disabilities is not just ramps and pew cuts; it is our charge to assist all the congregations of our Diocese to grow in God's service.

In response to the need for more effective time management and team participation, we created a new governance style that reflects the challenge of our busy lives. The BT is set up in four teams as follows; Management, Education and Advocacy, Spirituality, and Communications.

There is a Corporate Secretary who acts as a contact and clearing person for all documents and information requests to the BT and who will also maintain the archives of our commission's work. The Rev. Oscar Mockridge has taken the role as the BT Chaptain and works with us all in Pastoral Care and Devotion. Dr. Sandra Pinkerton is the official representative to the NJ Coalition for Inclusive Ministries and recently chaired their 10th Annual Awards Banquet. Ms. Barbara Djimopoulos served as a member of the Bishop Search Committee and articulated and advocated the needs and petitions of people living with disabilities. We thank her for giving of her time so generously in the quest for our next Bishop.

The BT is proud to have welcomed to its membership the Rev. Margaret Tuttle and newly ordained Deacon, the Rev. Sheila Schuford. Their combined experiences in ministry with and to people with disabilities are invaluable resources for the BT Mission.

The BT continued its well-received practice of offering occasionally, at our regular monthly meeting, a mini workshop addressing the needs of a given community. Through our discussions with the congregations in our diocese we have learned that our original contacts with workshops in the diocese have had an impact on bringing home the message of inclusion in our churches. We have now implemented a program that involves fewer people to accomplish the same results by visiting congregation both informally and in formal tradition through worship and fellowship. We are able to share our observations and suggestions in assisting the churches in their goals to conform to Resolution 2005-05.

The BT has received countless requests for another Funding Conference and the results of our spring 2005 Conference, "We Won't Come if We Can't Go" have resulted in several congregations availing themselves of the various presenters and professionals who participated. The need for a second conference will be answered in 2008. We will look for input from congregations who want to attend this conference to make it as useful as possible to assist churches in reaching their goals for inclusivity. The BT is also preparing a "smorgasbord" workshop that would reprise the best of some of our mini workshops e.g. living with Mental Illnesses, Assisted Listening Devices, Ramps, and Signage etc... There are many workshops that can give you information on the nature of individual disabilities; our goal is to go beyond this to provide churches with the tools to welcome and include.

Last January, Resolution 2006-06 - Making the Church Inclusive of and fully Accessible to all Youth and Young Adults, which was adopted by the Diocesan Convention, urged congregations to work towards accessibility in all our education programs. The Bethsaida Team is indebted to the partnership we formed with the Christian Formation Commission; for the CFC's co-sponsoring Resolution 2006-06 with us and for its invaluable advice and contributions in helping us to carry out the reporting responsibilities required by the resolution. The full report is published separately under the title: "Participation by All Youth and Young Adults in Church Life: Experience and Possibilities."

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BISHOP ANAND RESOURCE CENTER

The Bishop Anand Resource Center, located on the first floor of Episcopal House, is a multi-media library for use by the clergy and lalty of the Diocese of Newark. The center is committed to having up-to-date resources on the issues affecting our lives and the life of the church today. All materials may be borrowed free of charge. The Resource Center is accessible Monday through Friday between 8:30am-4:30pm.

- Congregational use of the Resource Center has grown to over 80% during 2006.
 This is an increase of over 55% since 1998.
 - It continues to be a source used regularly by Episcopal House staff.
 - Used also by many committees and commissions.
- The Resource Center has purchased multiple copies of "Safeguarding God's Children" and is providing this resource for training and education about child abuse awareness and prevention free of charge to congregations.
- The Resource Center has helped a growing number of congregations, commissions and congregational development initiatives obtain resources at a reduced cost by ordering in bulk and then being reimbursed.
- The Resource Center supports the work of the Christian Formation Commission by handling workshop registration, publicity and supplying resources.
- The director of the Resource Center continues to serve as a consulting resource, available to meet on and off-site with vestries and other congregational committees looking for guidance in meeting the needs of their adult, youth and children in programs such as Bible Study, Sunday School, confirmation, etc.
- The director meets several times a year with other Christian educators from New York, Long Island, Connecticut and New Jersey to share resources. This tri-state network works to support the programs run in the neighboring dioceses.
- The diocese has contracted with Percept, Inc. to provide demographic data to our congregations. The director is serving as the Diocesan Percept Administrator to aid congregations and individuals in utilizing this resource.
- The number of churches participating in the Children's Sabbath continues to grow. In an effort to be faithful to good stewardship of our money and resources, congregations were invited to request materials for the Children's Sabbath. These materials were offered free of charge, including postage. This year forty-nine congregations requested these materials. Many of them sent copies of their Children's Sabbath service and/or activities and this information will be added to the Children's Sabbath resource packet and shared next year. This is the seventh year of this effort.
- The Bishop Anand Resource Center is the designated Diocesan contact for the "Red Book".

Christian Formation Commission Report to Convention January 2007

Throughout 2006, the Christian Formation Commission continued to live into its mission: to name and support individual discipleship in reciprocal relationship with community mission; and to engender joint ventures among churches and districts, and between churches and other community organizations as well as support youth events and full involvement and participation of youth at all levels. Our committee structure is working to focus on several dimensions of our mission.

The Discipleship Committee responds to the expressed need to offer programs for congregational and diocesan participation and spiritual growth. Two "Unpacking the Bible" sessions were held in two different churches, bringing together seekers from many congregations and offering different styles of Scriptural study. Members of the committee partnered with members of the Bethsaida team to draft a resolution to Convention regarding the full inclusion of all but with particular attention to children and youth in worship and other congregational activities. The committee also sponsored Bishop Gallagher's presentation "The Intersection of Native American and Christian Spirituality."

The Confirmation Committee implemented several Confirmation Preparation Retreats for youth throughout the diocese who were about to be confirmed. An Inner-City Health Care Mission and Ministry of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark

A Report from the Pastoral Care & Education Department

2006 was a year of tremendous change and transformation at Christ Hospital. Financially, it was a very difficult year that required major changes in both staffing and structure within the institution. The hospital staff, administration, and Board of Directors worked diligently and creatively to meet the challenges of improving services white streamlining the various systems of implementation. Under great stress the staff persevered in providing the highest quality health care to the patients and people of Hudson County.

Due to an extended period of decline in the patient census, Christ Hospital downsized the number of active patient beds from 380 to 230. Unfortunately, this also meant a significant reduction in our workforce. Many positions were cut back from fall-time to part-time and some were eliminated completely. Overall, Christ Hospital lost 97 staff members. In the midst of all this, many initiatives were started to capitalize on the strengths of the hospital. A major new service launched this year was the emergency cardiac catheterization program. Within the first ten procedures performed, the cardiology team achieved a standard of care that far surpasses the state norms. Our physicians and staff have worked hard and have succeeded at reducing patient "length of stay" to bring us in line with NI state averages. The administration has also been actively assisting us in obtaining more adequate reimbursement from the state for the tremendous amount of charity care that we provide to the community. There are other initiatives in the works, including the expansion of our outstanding birthing center and our pediatric unit.

In the Pastoral Care Department, we were saddened by the department the Rev. Fairbaira Powers, the Director of Pastoral Care, who resigned in November, 2006, to take an interim rector position at Holy Innocents Church in West Orange, NJ. We appreciate her two-and-one-half years of service with us and wish her many blessings in her new ministry. The Rev. Beth Faulk Glover, the Director of Pastoral Education, is now also serving as the interim Director of Pastoral Care.

The staff of the Pasteral Care & Education Department has done an admirable job maintaining excellent pasteral services to the patients, their loved ones, and the staff of the hospital during some very difficult and anxious times. The staff chaplains have been particularly strong at working with patients and families around end-of-life issues. Staff chaplains and student chaplains have made great strides in increasing the number of patient visits made with persons upon admission to triage the spiritual needs of the patients. We currently are working on other opportunities to focus our staff and students in areas in which they are most needed and to support the strategic initiatives of the hospital.

In the ACPE accredited Clinical Pastoral Education program we graduated fifteen students during 2006. We completed three extended units in the spring of 2005, one of which was our first ever evening group formed primarily for persons in the Diocesan diaconal training process. This group was a great success and we hope to be able to replicate it in the future, as needed. Currently, we are running two extended units with a total of ten students of various religious backgrounds, though the highest percentage of students is Episcopal. Our full-time summer unit for 2007 was almost full by mid-December. Our CPE center continues to grow and enjoys a strong reputation among area seminaries. We are also attracting interpational students and seminarians from other areas of the country due to the strength of the revitalized website, which went live in early 2006.

It is our deepest hope that the charches and other entities within the Diocese of Newark will become more aware of this important healthcare mission of the Diocese in Hudson County. Christ Hospital has been a ministry of the Diocese for more than 130 years. In spite of our struggles, God has blessed us. Part of this blessing is to know that we need to reach out to our Diocesan community to make it aware of our presence, our connection, and our need for your prayers and support. We invite you to remember that health care is a basic human need that is an essential ministry. We are on the front lines of this mission and we need your help. Please consider supporting Christ Hospital with your prayers, your presence, and your financial gifts. We are happy to work with you to train clergy and laity for in-depth pastoral care, or to consult with you about pastoral and health care-related issues for your congregations. We are your hospital.

The Work of the Commission on Ministry is to assist the Bishop in designing and overseeing the process by which individuals and the Church together recruit, discern and form vocation in the life of God's people. Monthly we meet and work to be faithful, prayerful and thoughtful as we honor this work.

Once again the National Canons have been altered and we are in the midst of adjusting our work here in the Diocesa. This has meant updating both the process and our website. We owe a great debt to Paul Shackford, our Documents' Chair, for hours of faithfulness. We have produced a "Facts Sheet" as an aid to those entering the priestly ordination process.

In 2006, the COM sponsored: a joint conference for postulancy/candidacy; individual conferences, one for postulancy and another for candidacy; two postulancy socials; and three nominee conferences. There was one ordination to the transitional diaconate and one reception of orders to the priesthood. There were 22 individuals in the process: 5 nominees; 8 postulants; 8 candidates; and 1 candidate for orders to be received.

Being sensitive to the Diocesan budget constraints, we increased the Administrative Fee from \$750 to \$900 which off-sets roughly half the cost to the diocese of moving an individual through the process. This also reflects the requirements in the Canons that place financial support from sponsoring congregations as essential.

The Recruitment sub-committee has been working with the Episcopal Church program *PULSE* for the recruitment of young people who have a vocation in the Church. We placed and funded one person in a summer internship in 2006 as a step in vocational discernment.

Out of regard for Hispanic ministry and its development, we have one member now on the Advisory Board of The General Seminary's *Programa Hispano/Latino*. We continue to look at what kinds of education and seminary resources are best in this area.

Background checks are now undertaken at the beginning of the discernment process. Changing this timing and getting this on schedule was a major expense this year past.

Lastly we have joined in reinvigorating a network in Province II for the work of our COM's. A conference is being planned for early Spring 2007.

The presence of the Assisting Bishop, the Rt. Rev. Carol Gallagher, at the monthly COM meetings has enhanced our work and sensitivity. We give thanks for her presence among us.

SUB-COMMITTEES OF THE COM

DIACONAL SUBCOMMITTEE

The Diaconal Subcommittee has continued its work of discernment and formation for nominees, postulants and candidates seeking ordination. New appointments to the committee, which this year included deacons for the first time, have added depth and diversity to the group. In the course of the year 10 deacons in formation completed their work and were ordained in one of three ceremonies at Trinity & St. Phillip's Cathedral. At present, 22 deacons

now serve in various ministries throughout the diocese and another 9 persons are at the stage of discernment or formation.

Much of this good work to reintroduce the diaconate in the Diocese of Newark could not have been done without the passion given to this work by our Archdeacon, Herb Tinning. His personal dedication to the diaconal community, both those in formation and the ordained, has helped propel forward Bishop Croneberger's vision of a renewed diaconate for the benefit of the whole Church. As he steps down from his role in 2007, Herb will be missed by the committee and the deacons he has shepherded through the process.

In the coming year we will be working to make our formation process consistent with the new national church ministry canons. A further development of the academic and experiential components of the formation process will also be undertaken, as will a new printed booklet of diocesan guidelines for those seeking ordination to the diaconate.

Companion Diocese Committee Report for 2006

Thanks to the support of Convention, Council and the Bishop, 2006 was a year of extraordinary progress for the Companion Diocese Committee. In January, both Crossroad Camp directors as well as Ms. Kai Alston, Diocesan Youth Missioner, traveled to Panama and successfully forged a new relationship between Panama's and Newark's extensive youth programs. In February, co-chair the Rev. Robert Griner presented Newark's invitation for companionship in person to the diocesan convention of the Diocese of Panama. Our offer was unanimously accepted and our relationship formalized. In March, both co-chairs (Ms. Martha Gardner and the Rev. Robert Griner) engaged in a two year strategic planning session in Panama City with diocesan representatives there.

The Diocese of Newark and Crossroads Outdoor Ministries hosted four Panamanians for ten days in July. In addition, a member of the Diocese of Panama was hired for the summer as a counselor at Crossroads (January's visit bearing finiti). In August, Canon Carter Echols presented training on congregational development in Panama City to one of the largest gatherings of lay leaders and clergy in recent years. Canon Echols also provided an extensive assessment of diocesan structures in Panama to the Bishop and senior staff. Her recommendations were enthusiastically adopted and are being implemented now – including the appointment by the Bishop of a clergyperson to focus on congregational development for the Diocese of Panama. The Companion Diocese Committee of the Diocese of Newark hosted two priests from Panama in October to evaluate our progress to date and to further define mutual goals. A parish youth visit to Panama took place in November.

Plans for 2007

As we plan for 2007, we continue to be reminded of the original criteria of our companionship as approved by Diocesan Council: a sense of mutuality, recognizing that both partners have gifts to offer and needs to be addressed; opportunities fro young people; congregation-to-congregation ties; mutual accountability; projects and advocacy that arise out of the growing relationship, rather than defining it from the start; the commitment of the bishops, but also an openness to "grass roots" contacts. Some of the specific plans for 2007 include:

- The Bishop of Panama, the Rt. Rev. Julio Murray, will participate in the consecration of Bishop-Elect Mark Beckwith.
- o A delegation of Newark youth will visit the Diocese of Panama.
- o A clargy exchange going both ways
- A delegation of Panama youth visit the Diocese of Newark (summer)
- Continued conversation between the two companion diocese committees, and conversations between the two dioceses' committees and commissions, about how to most effectively do ministry together.
- Congregational development i.e, Canon Carter Echols will travel to Panama to "train the trainer" in congregational development models and methods.

Cross Roads Outdoor Ministries Executive Directors' 2006 Annual Report

"With God, all things are possible." Matthew 19:26

Continuing to building on a strong foundation set in 2005, 2006 was an outstanding year for Cross Roads in all areas of operation. Through a committed staff and Board, our vision and energy, a great deal of hard work, prayer, and God's Grace, Cross Roads continues to create exceptional experiences of spiritual renewal and growth for both summer campers and year-round retreaters of all ages.

For the second year in a row, a full summer program was offered – with a third more campers than in 2005! According to the evaluations, it was a great success. Our mature staff imbued a sense of intentional spirituality throughout every program, resulting in safe & transformational summer camp weeks. Some highlights included: new programs such as Un-Camp, the I<2nd grade Explorers week, and a Servant Event week, dynamic Bible Study curriculums and worships, the Christ Walk, improved food, and an inspiring family camp week full of activities for every age. The summer's success continues to build a strong foundation for a thriving and growing program for future summers.

Given the need for facility upgrades, we made several improvements, focusing primarily on the two year-round retreat centers. In the Lodge, some highlights included installing 120 new solar panels on the new Lodge roof, overhauling the bathrooms, and adding new wood floors and new sofas. In the Beisler Retreat Center, renovations included installing new windows, painting the entire interior, overhauling the foyer, adding new carpets and wood flooring, installing a new roof, and adding a cozy new wood stove. Both retreat centers look and feel substantially renewed.





We have continued implementing a comprehensive publicity campaign to get the word out about the 'new' Cross Roads. Key elements of this have included: the Ambassador program to help connect congregations with Cross Roads, building our donor base, numerous church and District/Cluster meeting visits/presentations, regular newsletters and letters to clergy, a colorful summer brochure for our summer program, and continued web updates.

Finally, for an organization that has struggled with finances throughout its history, 2006 continued the upward trend of healthy finances for Cross Roads. Despite spending the necessary resources to accomplish all that has been done, Cross Roads finished 2006 healthily 'in the black', its third consecutive year doing so. Our healthy financial situation has enabled the continued reduction of financial dependence from the Diocese.

The main challenge in 2006 was the continued delay in the construction of the new adult retreat center, new septic system, and Director's residence due to the Highlands regulations. However, the latest updates on that are hopeful, so keep those prayers coming...and stay tuned!

With so many good things behind us, we look ahead to 2007 with great anticipation. The following are some of the main goals we will be focusing on in the coming year:

- Continue to expand the summer camp program so that it is known for its quality program and spiritual inspiration.
- Continue to develop a close network of congregations and clergy/volunteers around the state who actively support Cross Roads.
- Build adult facilities that will enable a powerful new adult retreat program.
- Construct a new indoor chapel, new septic systems, and a Director's Residence.
- Continue to upgrade the Lodge, Beisler Center and other facilities to make them more hospitable to users.
- Continue to streamline organizational management, finances and processes.
- End the year with a healthy surplus, decreasing funds required of the Diocese and Synod.

We are filled with gratitude that God is moving in so many ways to revitalize Cross Roads, and we pray that God's Grace continue to shine down upon Cross Roads in the coming year. We also thank all of you that have continued to support this ministry through helping to spread the word, through your hard work and volunteered time, your financial contributions, and your continued prayers for this powerful ministry. Cursillo in the Diocese of Newark 2006

The Cursillo Community in the Diocese of Newark has spent another year in the transition process and has now entered into a sabbatical phase. The decision to do this was made by Secretariat at its November meeting.

During the first six months of 2006 Secretariat and Servant Community met regularly and spent time completing the revision of the applications for team and weekenders and the sponsorship guidelines. At the end of June, The Rev. Ronnie Stout-Kopp, the Spiritual Director, surprised us all by resigning. Secretariat met with her and with Bishop Croneberger to determine the direction we should take. Bishop Croneberger total Secretariat in September that he would not give us permission to hold and 3-Day weekend and that any further decisions regarding Cursilio would be made by Bishop Beckwith after his term begins.

During 2008, the quarterly Ultreyas at the Convent of St. John Baptist were held on the first Friday in March, June, September and December. These are scheduled to continue in the same pattern for 2007. Additionally, there was an Ultreya in January, at Christ Church, Pompton Lakes, one in May at Atonement, Fair Lawn, and a picnic Ultreya in July at St. John the Divine, Hasbrouck Heights. Servant Community sponsored a 4th Day Workshop on Team Building Blocks in April at Christ Church, Pompton Lakes, and a workshop on Conflict Resolution lead by Fr. Tim Barrett at Trinity, Keamy in October.

As a result of the generosity of the community, we were able to pay our pledge to National Episcopal Cursitio for 2006 and we will make and pay our 2007 pledge, as well.

The decision to go into Sabbatical Time was made after consultation with National Episcopal Cursillo. These are the guidelines they gave us:

If it is the Intent that the Movement restart, at a time to be determined by the Bishop,

- Existing Group Reunions and Ultreyas should be encouraged to continue during the designated Sabbatical time.
- Group Reunions and Ultreyas should reach out to those who might be interested in Curallo and bring them into both activities.
- 3. During the Sabbatical time, potential candidates, being sponsored through the Fourth Day activities of Group Reunion and Ultreyas, could be sent on weekends, for further training, in neighboring dioceses, with permission of both the bishop of the neighboring diocese and the bishop of the sabbatical diocese, along with the secretariat of the neighboring diocese.
- 4. When the Bishop feels enough time has passed, and the fourth day is being energized through Group Reunions and Ultreyas, a Servant Community can be formed to study the Cursillo Literature, pray for the re-growth of the movement and begin to plan out, with the help of the NECC District Representative and the Bishop, strategize the reformation phase.
- Members of the Servant Community should attend an Episcopal Cursillo Leaders Workshop.
- The Bishop can ask the NECC to help put on a Cursillo Information Day for Clergy.
- 7. The Servant Community will work with the Bishop in the development of a Pastoral Plan.

- The Servant Community will develop by-laws and guidelines for the management of the movement.
- When this preliminary work is completed, the Bishop would appoint the new Secretariat, ideally from the leaders of the Servant Community, to begin to work the necessary business plan to implement recommendations of the Servant Community.
- The Fourth Day, through the Servant Community, will enable the Secretariat to begin the
 process of creating authentic Cursillo weekends to further the development of fourth day
 groups.

Accordingly, Secretariat voted to suspend the by-laws and to follow the steps outlined. There will be no elections until such time as Bishop Beckwith feels that it is time to re-start Cursillo. Ultreyas and group reunions will be encouraged to continue, and the 2007 Ultreya schedule has been tentatively set. We are hoping that a group of folks will choose to attend the District Ultreya in Albany on April 14 and 15 starting at about 10:30 on Saturday, April 14, with registration and finishing on Sunday, April 15 between 2 and 3 p.m. More details will be made available when we have them

180 Deaf Ministry 2006

The goal of The Deaf Ministry, housed at St. James' Church in Hackettstown, is to serve as an educational and informational resource for the Diocese of Newark.

The Rev. (Deacon) Shella Shuford directs the Deaf Ministry. She is a member of the Bethsaida Team, providing an important link to all issues of accessibility and justice for the disabled. Shella is one of two Deaf deacons presently serving in the Episcopal Church USA. She is the President of the Garden State Association of Late-Deafened Adults (ALDA). Her extensive experience in both advocacy and social service work has made her assignment by the Bishop to St. James' an asset to the community as well as to the congregation.

Our Deacon is employed as a Chaplain at Greystone Psychiatric Hospital, where she ministers to both hearing and Deaf patients. In the parish of St. James', she participates in Sunday liturgies and parish activities, including preaching, teaching special topics to the Sunday School, and pastoral visitation. Shella's work with the Deaf Ministry has helped create a more inclusive spirit. The children of the Sunday School and the Children's Choir have learned to sign some songs and prayers. Members of the congregation regularly sign portions of the liturgy, such as the Sanctus and Lord's Prayer. A high school student who studied in the sign language class has moved on to college where she is majoring in Deaf education and learning ASL (American Sign Language). As Shella ministers in the Town of Hackettstown, at the hospital and at community events, her ministry as deacon is clearly fulfilled as she brings the needs of the world to the church and the church to the world.

Activities of the Deaf Ministry this year include:

- provision of pastoral care to Deaf, hard of hearing and Late-Deafened persons in local communities, nursing homes and hospitals
- communication training to staff of a local nursing home, which houses a Deaf resident
- information and referral to churches in the Diocese seeking resources for education, interpreting services, assistive listening devices, inclusion and other issues of hearing loss
- community education outreach on issues of hearing loss and aging as well as communication skills

Our goals for the coming year include

- tuli integration into the Bethsaida Team and participation in their outreach as representative of persons with hearing loss
- to establish communication classes at the two Episcopal retirement communities in Hackettstown (House of the Good Shepherd and Heath Village)

The Rev. Ms. Shuford is available to parishes in the Diocese to provide education in adult forum format and to preach and assist at ilturgy. This provides an opportunity for congregations to not only learn about the issues of hearing loss and inclusion, but to be tither exposed to the ministry of the deacon. Diocesan Ecumenical & Interreligious Officer (DEIO) Ecumenical & Interreligious Commission (EIC) 2006 Annual Report

Our Mission is to represent the Bishop of Newark and the people of our Diocese in ecumenical and interreligious relationships and dialogue. Both the DEIO and the EIC are appointed by and report to the Bishop, who is always understood to be the Ecumenical Officer of a Diocese. During 2006, the DEIO and EIC participated in the following activities:

- Worked with Interweave to plan and carry out the February 21 Clergy Day on dialogue between Christians, Jews and Muslims in northern NJ.
- Sponsored and organized two workshops at Celebrating Creative Congregations in March, co-led by our Roman Catholic colleague, the Rev. Phillip Latronico and the DEIO. Both the workshop on the Anglican-Roman Catholic International Commission agreed statement, "Mary: Hope and Grace in Christ" and the follow-up workshop on the previous year's "Jesus and Buddha" were popular and well-received.
- Represented our Diocese at the Community Iftar Dinner at the Islamic Center, Paterson.
- Co-sponsored with Interweave four Lunch 'n' Learns for Christian, Jewish and Muslim clergy and lay leaders (May) and an Interfaith Women's Tea (September), both in Tenafly.
- Leadership in the North Jersey Christian-Muslim Project, which partners Christian ecumenical representatives with Muslim colleagues from the Islamic Center of Passaic in Paterson. Planned and implemented our first Muslim-Christian Youth Forum on "The Seven Habits of Highly Harmonious People" on May 3. We've planned two forums for 2007, including one on Faith and Reason on February 5 and our 2nd Youth Forum on May 2.
- The DEIO attended the National Workshop on Christian Unity and the Annual Meeting of Episcopal Diocesan Ecumenical & Interreligious Officers (EDEIO) in San José, California.
- Maintained ecumenical relationships through participation in meetings of the New Jersey Ecumenical Officers (NJEO), hosting NJEO and other ecumenical representatives at Diocesan Convention, and through phone & e-mail conversations.
- Participated in the Fall 2006 Province II EDEIO meeting on Friday, Nov. 3 in NYC. We discussed ecumenical and interfaith ministries and issues, including the treatment of Orthodox Christians in Turkey and relations with Turkish Muslims in the tri-state area.
- The DEIO and members of the EIC helped to plan and participated in our annual ARC-Newark Dialogue with the Ecumenical Commission of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Newark at the Newark Abbey. "Mary: Hope and Grace in Christ" was discussed.

Episcopal Relief and Development ("ERD") Report for 2006 Prepared by Martha Gardner, ERD Diocesan Coordinator

This is not as much a report for 2006 but one for 2007, since I just assumed the position of volunteer diocesan coordinator for Episcopal Relief and Development in mid-December. This report also gives me the opportunity to make a request: I am hoping to have an ERD parish representative for every congregation in the Diocese of Newark. I have been given some names for our diocese and will contact these folks to see if they are still interested in serving. Please see below for more information about the Network and the role of the parish representative.

Who is ERD? For those of you who are not familiar with the organization, Episcopal Relief and Development responds to human suffering around the world, provides emergency assistance after disasters, rebuilds communities, and helps children and families climb out of poverty. The mission statement reads as follows:

Episcopal Relief and Development is a compassionate response of the Episcopal Church to human suffering in the world. Hearing God's call to seek and serve Christ in all persons and to respect the dignity of every human being, Episcopal Relief and Development serves to bring together the generosity of Episcopalians and others with the needs of the world. Episcopal Relief and Development faithfully administers the funds that are received from the Church and raised from other sources. It provides relief in times of disaster and promotes sustainable development by Identifying and addressing the root cause of suffering. Episcopal Relief and Development cherishes its partnerships within the Anglican Communion, with examenical bodies and with others who share a common vision for its to see the search and all people.

The organization was established in 1940 by the Episcopal Church in the United States as the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief. In 2000, the name was changed to Episcopal Relief and Development to emphasize the ongoing emergency relief work and the growing focus on long-term development and rehabilitation programs. For more than sixty years, Episcopal Relief and Development has served the needs of the poor and oppressed at home and in over 100 countries abread.

What is the ERD Network? Network representatives are ERD's partners in mission who actively advocate, support and publicize ERD's ministry throughout Episcopal parishes, dioceses and seminaries. The approximately 3,000 Network members, consisting of diocesan coordinators, parish representatives, and seminarian coordinators, serve as "roving advocates" for people in need. Network representatives share ERD's mission and ministry with the WHOLE Church and involve them with the WHOLE world.

Parish representatives are appointed by the rector or volunteer to inform the parish of ERD's work. Through newsletters, bulletins, and displays, the parish representatives publicize ERD's emergency response with the local congregations. Parish representatives also select at least one Sunday each year to highlight the work of ERD in their congregations. REFLECTIONS ON GENERAL CONVENTION

There is much I can say about the General Convention from my perspective as a long-term deputy. I have been sitting in either the Triennial Meeting or the House of Deputies every three years since 1970. That's 36 years, and it must be evident that I love conventions! Most of the time it's the Church at its best; the worship and bible study, the committee work, the legislative process, and most of all, the people. After so many years, there are so many friends to meet and talk with as we all try to discern God's will for this church in this time. Just think about it – 200 bishops, 850 deputies, 450 triennial women, 1,000 spouses, partners, exhibitors and visitors, all under one roof making a joyful noise.

A most joyful noise was heard on the day Katharine Jefferts Schori was elected Presiding Bishop! Watching the official dvd before going to Columbus, for me she was clearly the most qualified candidate, but I never dreamed she had a chance of being elected. What a thrill when it was announced that she had been chosen, and I had the opportunity to go immediately to a microphone and be the deputy to give the first speech of support! There were women at all 8 microphones, followed after about 10 minutes by dozens of men all expressing joy and support.

In a brief recap of the legislation passed by the convention, let me just mention a few things that I consider to be of major importance: passage of a triennial budget of \$152 million based on a new set of priorities which put justice & peace as number one. \$93 million has been pledged by dioceses, with 48 of them meeting the 21% asking and an additional 5 – including Newark – going even higher. In the justice & peace category, the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) of the United Nations were the top priority. Almost \$1 million (the equivalent of the 0.7% UN goal) will go towards addressing those MDGc – poverty, health care, HIV/AIDS, gender equity, child mortality, maternal health, environmental sustainability and global partnerships for development on both domestic and global fronts.

In the prayer book and liturgy department, Enriching Our Worship I was authorized for use in Sunday worship, Florence Li Tim Oi (the first woman ordained in the Anglican Communion back in 1942) and author C.S. Lewis were permanently added to the liturgical calendar and the Revised Common Lectionary (RCL) is to become our official lectionary effective the first Sunday in Advent 2007 and a host of prayers for special events in people's lives won final approval.

Concern for the effects of slavery, in which The Episcopal Church was complicit, led to passage of resolutions urging serious study of its history by both the Executive Council and by several dioceses, with an eye towards appropriate restorative justice as a "first means" of achieving "wholeness" in the Church. Our diocesan Reparations Committee has been hard at work to bring about understanding throughout the diocese. A rough cut of the film Traces of the Trade: A Story From the Deep North provided compelling insights for us northern folks. The film is the product of members of a Rhode Island family which discovered to its distress that their family was the leading slave trader and

that caused them to travel the slave trade route in their effort to begin to come to grips with their complicity.

Approval was given for Eucharistic sharing with the United Methodist Church, for a prompt end to the war in Iraq, for additional funds for the Young Adult Service Corps and for support of the Episcopal Network for Economic Justice. The UTO Ingathering totaled \$2,419, 628 with 59.4% going to domestic grants and 49.6% for global work. In Newark a grant was awarded to St. Luke's in Hope for their outreach program Haven of Hope for Kids, which provides vacation time for low-income families with terminally ill children.

But this reflection wouldn't be complete without mention of the difficult time spent on the Windsor Report. The House of Deputies clearly did not want to pass any resolutions other than noting regret for the pain felt by branches of the Anglican Communion because of its approval of the election of Gene Robinson as Bishop of New Hampshire. It refused to vote against blessings or for a moratorium on elections. It even refused to revisit those decisions. However, on the next to the last day the Presiding Bishop invaded the House of Deputies and with the assistance of the Presiding Bishop-elect and the majority of the House of Bishops pressured the deputies for "a bone" to throw to the Archbishop of Canterbury – the now infamous B033. And so we traveled home with the pain of that sacrifice of our gay and lesbian brothers and sisters lying heavy in our hearts. I say we because seven of Newark's eight deputies and both bishops voted no, and this time, sadly, we were in the minority. Time will tell whether that will bring any peace to the Anglican Communion.

The Commission on Hispanic/Latino Ministry Report to the 133rd Convention of the Diocese of Newark, January 2007

Who are we?

We are the main source of information and support for the development of Hispanic/Latino Ministry in the Diocese of Newark.

Achievements during 2006

The Hispanic Ministry Task Force was included in the Diocesan Outreach budget for the first time. With that assistance we have been able to expand our ability to be present as a ministry for the entire Diocese as we continue to bring the Hispanic members of our various congregations together, so that they may better know the Episcopal Church and its richness. Specifically, these funds allowed us to: Finance the Diocese of Newark's first Celebration of the Episcopal Hispanic Identity (details below), and to send a representative of the Diocese of Newark to the Latino/Hispanic Ministry Conference at Kanuga, which allowed our diocese to become connected with the growing network of Hispanic/Latino Ministry of the church at large.

We organized the first annual Celebration of Hispanic/Latino Episcopal Identity at the Trinity & St. Philip's Cathedral in Newark on June 3, 2006. This event brought together Hispanic/Latino members of our different congregations, as they took on the responsibility for the planning and implementation of this celebration. Our next Celebration will be on October 13, 2007 at St. John's Church, Dover.

Also, we took the first steps to bring VIA (Viviendo la Identidad Anglicana "Living the Anglican/Episcopal Identity") to our diocese. VIA is a church-wide program created to help lay members of Episcopal congregations to discover what it means to live a Christian life in the Episcopal/Anglican way. This lay-led training will complement the event mentioned above, as it takes the spirit of the celebration further into the development of an Anglican/Episcopal life-style for new Episcopalians. It is scheduled for April 20 through 21 of 2007. Let us know if you wish to participate.

At the close of the year we held a special meeting with Canon Carter Echols to review our achievements from 2003 through the present, and to articulate our vision for the years to come. Among many blessings, we celebrated the growing awareness of the presence of Hispanics/Latinos in our diocese, and the increasing numbers of lay and ordained Latinos/Hispanics who bring their talents and voices to both congregational and diocesan offices. We reiterated and affirmed our gratitude to Bishop John P. Croneberger for making possible not only the existence of the Hispanic Ministry Task Force, but for his tireless efforts to ensure that this Diocese is fully equipped for Hispanic/Latino Ministry. We expressed our joy and excitement about working together with our new Bishop as we begin a new era in the Diocese of Newark.

As a last gift to this ministry, Bishop John Croneberger changed our name to "Commission on Hispanic/Latino Ministry" on January 2, 2007, stating that this will be the term to be used for future information in the Diocese.

Somos la principal fuente de información y apoyo para el desarrollo de ministerio hispano/latino en la diócesis de Newark.

Logros durante el 2006

El grupo de Trabajo del Ministerio Hispano fue incluido en el presupuesto diocesano por primera vez. Con esa ayuda pudimos expandir nuestra habilidad de estar presentes como ministerio para la diócesis entera, en tanto que continuamos uniendo a los miembros Hispanos de muestras diferentes congregaciones, para que puedan conocer mejor a la Iglesia Episcopal y sus bendiciones. Específicamente, estos fondos nos permitieron: Financiar la primera celebración de la Identidad Hispana Episcopal en la Diócesis (detalles adelante), y enviar a un representante de nuestra diócesis a la Conferencia de Ministerio Hispano/Latino en Kanuga, lo cual hizo posible que la diócesis se conectara con la creciente red del Ministerio Hispano/Latino en toda la Iglesia.

Realizamos nuestra primera celebración anual de la Identidad Hispana/Latina Episcopal en la Catedral de la Trinidad y San Felipe de Newark el 3 de Junio, 2006. Este evento unió a miembros Hispanos/Latino de nuestras diferentes congregaciones, en la medida en que ellos asumieron la responsabilidad del planeamiento y la realización de esta celebración. Este año será el 13 de Octubre en la Iglesia de San Juan de Dover.

Dimos los primeros pasos para traer VIA ("Viviendo la Identidad Anglicana") a nuestra diócesis. VIA es un programa de la iglesia creado para ayudar a que miembros laicos de congregaciones Episcopales descubran lo que significa el vivir la vida cristiana de la manera Episcopal /Anglicana. Este entrenamiento dirigido por laicos complementará el evento mencionado arriba, ya que lleva el espíritu de celebración hacia el desarrollo de un estilo de vida Anglicano/Episcopal para nuevos Episcopales, y tendrá lugar entre Abril 20 al 21 de este año. Háganos saber si desea participar.

Al final del 2006 tuvimos una reunión especial con Canon Carter Echols para evaluar nuestros logros desde 2003 hasta el presente, y concretar nuestra visión para los próximos años. Interweave 2006 Activities

"We live in a world where the forces that seek to divide us are strong," says Eboo Patel, a young Muslim-American leader whose December appearances at two local synagogues were one of the year's highlights at Interweave, a community learning center for wellness, spirituality, and the common good based at Calvary, Summit. More than 350 Jewish, Muslim and Christian attendees heard Patel's presentation, "A City Set on a Hill: The Promise and Challenge of an Interfaith America," cosponsored by the American Jewish Committee, and learned about his work with the Chicago-based Interfaith Youth Core, which brings young people of different religions together for community service. "Globalization makes all of us intimates," Patel says. "Who is flying the flag of coexistence? Who is telling the story of pluralism? Who is pointing out that they are us?"

Patel was just one of those telling the story of pluralism at Interweave this year. Our Abrahamic KINSHIP programs also brought together Jews, Muslims and Christians for study and fellowship through gatherings of clergy, religious educators, and lay people; presented "Muslim Jersey Girl" Anisa Mehdi at our October Fall Luncheon; and cosponsored an interfaith Women's Tea and an infair dinner celebrating the end of Ramadan. Diocesan partners in this initiative include the Ecumenical/Interfaith and Christian Formation Commissions.

We also continued our work with the Mayor's Forum on Diversity in Summit, organizing Study Circles for discussing the reality of racial and ethnic prejudice from personal experience. Other programs promoting the common good this year included "God's Politics," a Wednesday Seminar exploring the values of love, justice, reconciliation, and community that transcend partisan polarization; Waltzing the Reaper, a one-woman play addressing end-of-life issues; and "Beyond Chance and Design," an evening presenting emerging paradigms for creative evolution.

Our commitment to strengthening wellness included collaborations with Summit's Terra Sky Center, Atlantic Hospice, and the MetroWest Jewish Health and Healing Center to reach new populations like hospice volunteers and holistic health practitioners. Wellness-focused programs included Buddhist meditation and Tai Chi Chih classes, Therapeutic Touch training, and workshops on dealing with depression and using the body's natural healing energies.

Among the highlights of our spirituality programs were a "Movies with Meaning" event with filmmaker Christina Lundberg featuring her documentary "On the Road Home"; a new "Bible Book of the Month" series cosponsored by Calvary; and our June Spirituality Day, "Cultivating Compassionate Presence" featuring author Wendy M. Wright. Through community outreach we shared ancient wisdom with a new generation, leading labyrinth walks for CityServe high school students in Paterson and bringing interfaith insights to gifted and talented middle schoolers in Madison. We uncovered the mystical elements hiding in traditional religion with programs on lost Gospels, Christian Reincarnation, Kabbalistic healing, and the feminine face of God. Interweave presenters participated in Celebrating Creative Congregations and brought programs to many diocesan churches. JERSEY CITY EPISCOPAL COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION

"Our mission is to create healthy neighborhoods through neighborhood development initiatives that cultivate the resources of residents, businesses, government, and the faith-based community of serving those most vulnerable in our society."

Real Estate Management and Development: Jersey City Episcopal Community Development Corporation's (ICECDC) Division of Real Estate Management and Development is responsible for the production of affordable rental and for sale housing opportunities for low and moderate income individuals, families, and special needs populations in Jersey City and Hudson County. Housing Development - To date JCECDC has a portfolio of approximately 200 units of affordable housing located throughout the Greenville, Bergen Hill and Down Town sections of Jersey City. JCECDC is currently developing new construction of four two-family homes in the Greenville area of Jersey City (Grant Myrtle Project), creating four units of for sale housing for moderate income families and four units of rental housing restricted to low income families anticipated completion by March 2007. In 2006, JCECDC received funding commitments of \$2.4 million from the NJHMFA Special Needs Trust Fund, HOME, and Jersey City Trust Funds dollars to develop an additional 24 affordable units and 14 permanent supportive housing units for homeless individuals with disabilities in Jersey City. Home Buyer Educational Services - In 2006, a total of 82 certificates were issued to clients completing our First-time Homebuyer Training Course. JCECDC successfully qualified and selected 4 first time buyers from these classes for the Grant/Myrtle Project. Consulting Services - JCECDC was contracted by C-Line as the developer of 6 units of low income rental housing and 8,000 square feet of childcare. All predevelopment work was completed in November and anticipates construction to begin in the summer of 2007.

Supportive Housina: Jersey City Episcopal Community Development Corporation's Division of Supportive Housing and Social Services provides the Hudson County community with a wide array of services and programs to meet the community's complex and ever changing needs. Hudson Creating Alliances to Shelter All (Hudson CASA) for Individuals- to assist consumers in securing permanent homes through a comprehensive and integrated program of home-finding services, rental assistance, supportive services and workforce development opportunities. In 2006, Hudson CASA served 208 consumers. Of this, 60 were placed in permanent housing, and 75 obtained employment. Shelter Plus Care - ICECDC provided supportive case management services and permanent supportive housing to disabled individuals and families. Hudson CASA for Families - to provide intensive case management to assist TANF cases prepare to be able to retain their apartment when TRA ends, served 142 families this year and provided budget counseling, workforce development assistance and housing counseling. Corpus Christi Ministries Housing - in 2006, 39 Individuals were housed in the program which has 16 units (10 in communal living for singles and 6 for families in apartments). Adherence Support Project provides weekly support groups and outreach home visits to improve treatment and medication adherence for HIV positive individuals. In 2006, 22 individuals participated and 100% demonstrated improved adherence to their medication and health adherence

Workforce Development

The Jersey City Customer Service Skills Center provides a four-week course to prepare participants for the sales and service industry with a concentration on customer service and retail sales. This preparation helps participants become better prepared for any job that requires customer service, teamwork, and communication skills. In 2006, the Jersey City Customer Service Skills Center enrolled 145 students of which 129 successfully graduated and completed all the course requirements. Of the 129 who graduated, 95 were successfully placed in service sector employment with an average starting wage between \$10 - \$12 per hour. In addition, 91 of the graduates successfully passed the National Retail Federation Foundation's Certification Examination and received their certification as a Sales and Service Professional that is recognized as a highly prized credential in the sales and service industries.

Jubilee Ministries: Report for 2006 Prepared by Ms. Martha Gardner, Diocesan Jubilee Officer

Jubilee Ministry: A Ministry Based on Luke 4:18. The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to preach good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor – the year of jubilee freedom."

What is Jubilee Ministry? Jubilee Ministry is an organizing principle for understanding and interpreting Christian Ministry; it makes a direct and dynamic link between our theology and our ethics: the talk of our faith and the walk of our faith. Through Jubilee Ministry people are empowered locally and the church is provided the opportunity to live out its prophetic role in its respective community.

The creation of Jubilee Ministry in 1982 by General Convention heralded a new era of work for the Episcopal Church. Jubilee was <u>mandated</u> as a ministry of joint discipleship with poor and oppressed people wherever they are found, to meet basic human needs and build a just society. This mandate has evolved through the years and been shaped by the social, economic, political and cultural realities of the times.

Jubiles Ministry Centers are community-based sites that are dedicated to improving the lives of the poor through programs of outreach, evangelism, empowerment, and advocacy. Empowerment and advocacy are included in Jubiles Ministry because those engaged in this ministry frequently need the type of assistance found only in programs that get at the root of a problem, are in need of someone to be involved in behalf of the poor and oppressed being served, and/or work with persons who lack a sense of self-esteem and dignity that is vital in order for people to be empowered to do for themselves.

Are there any Jubilee Ministry Centers in our Diocese? In the Diocese of Newark, the following have been designated Jubilee Ministry Centers:

- All Saints Episcopal Church, Day School and Community Development Corporation (Hoboken)
- o Christ Church Jubilee Center, Community Development Corporation (Hackensack)
- o Christ Episcopal Church (East Orange)
- o Christ Episcopal Church Jubilee Center (Belleville)
- o House of Prayer and Apostle's House (Newark)
- o St. Barnabas AIDS Resource Center, Inc. (Newark)
- o St. Paul's Jubilee Center (Paterson)
- o St. Peter's Haven (Clifton)
- o The Church of the Good Shepherd (Fort Lee)
- o Windmill Alliance, Inc. (Bayonne)

How do I become a Jubilee Ministry Center? Technically, you don't "become" a jubilee center, but instead go through a process of designation. In other words, you are already doing the work of jubilee...but now go through the process of being recognized. If you meet the following criteria, you can be designated a jubilee center. As Diocesan Jubilee Officer, I have often said that there are many congregations and agencies in our diocese doing jubilee ministry – they just haven't gone through the process of applying for designation yet.

- over please -

What is the criteria for jubilee ministry designation?

- Must be an Episcopal congregation, commencial cluster with Episcopal presence, and/or an agency with connections to the Episcopal Church, you may be eligible.
- Must be engaged in programs among and with poor and oppressed people wherever they are located.
- o Must include at least one or more of the following:
 - o Human rights advocacy program
 - o Human service program
 - o Lay leadership/empowerment program
- o Must be willing to:
 - Reflect theologically upon its learnings in ministry
 - o Demonstrate the operation of its programs to others as models
 - o Act as a resource center for other Jubilee Ministry Centers

If we are already doing "fubiles ministry", why bother going through the designation process?

My first response always is that it is recognition of living the gospel in the world and being a model for others! Also:

- Opportunity to attend a national training with other newly-designated centers (offered annually)
- Opportunity to attend the triennial gathering of all jubilee centers and jubilee officers (Paul Walker of Christ Church, Belleville and I attended the most recent in September of 2006 in Los Angeles)
- o Opportunity to learn about, and add, new ministries to your center's programs
- Opportunity to apply for grants General Convention in 2006 approved a budget of \$100,000 per year for the triennium for Jubilee Ministry grants
- Opportunity to be part of one of the most exciting networks in the Episcopal Church today!

We're convinced! How do we apply to become a jubilee ministry center?

Contact me for a Jubilee application form. After its completion, it will be signed by myself and our bishop and sent to the national Jubilee Office. A site visitor — either a jubilee center director or diocesan jubilee officer - will visit your program and in addition to completing a site visit report, the exchange of information will begin! The recommendation then goes to Executive Council and after approval, you will receive a Jubilee Certificate, signed by the Presiding Bishop and the President of the House of Deputics. You will then be part of the Network!

2006 Annual Report to Diocesan Convention Mission Dismantle Racism Episcopal Diocese of Newark

This year the focus for MDR has been increasing our capacity to provide training programs in anti-racism, implementing the Province II Anti-racism Network and supporting the work of the Reparations Task Force. This year, MDR researched and added important new resource materials to support its program curriculum. In 2007, the commission will work on recruiting additional members and restructuring the committee as it continues to provide diocesan training for congregations and trainers and support the ongoing work of the Reparations Task Force and the provincial network. In 2007-8, MDR plans to sponsor a workshop on White Culture.

MDR sponsored four diocesan training sessions in 2006. Half the participants in these four sessions were people in the ordination process.

New and seasoned facilitators, trained to provide the revised Episcopal Church curriculum for anti-racism training, made significant additions to the curriculum, among them adding a program analyzing the powerful film "Crash" to offer effective training on institutional racism.

At St. Andrew and Holy Communion, MDR sponsored a late production viewing of "Traces of the Trade, A Story from the Deep North", a feature documentary, currently in post-production, that tells the story of Producer/Director Katrina Browne's wealthy New England ancestors, the largest slave-trading family in U.S. history. The film was later shown at the 75th General Convention in Columbus in support of the resolutions on reparations, restorative justice and reconciliation. In the film, cameras follow as Browne and nine fellow descendants undertake a journey of discovery to Rhode Island, Ghana, and Cuba. Retracing the steps of the notorious Triangle Trade, they uncover a family's, a region's, and a nation's hidden past. Simultaneously, viewers follow descendants of the DeWolf family as they grapple with the contemporary legacy of slavery, not only for Black Americans but for themselves as White Americans.

With Lambda Legal and The Oasis, MDR co-sponsored training in advocacy and action, Black Community Education for Marriage Equality, for Newark faith leaders. Also, in partnership with The Oasis, MDR co-sponsored the diocesan worship service commemorating 25 years of the HIV and AIDS epidemic for World AIDS Day. Held at Trinity Church, Cliffside Park, the celebrants were the Revs. Willie Smith and Allison Moore, both members of MDR; the preacher was Mr. Adam Lahm.

North Porch Women & Infants' Centers Report to the 133rd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark Activities for year 2006

The mission of North Porch Women & Infants' Centers, located in Dover, Newark and Paterson, is to provide emergency aid to mothers and other caregivers and their infants. In the eleven months from January through November 2006, we increased the number of clients reached, serving 891 mothers and 1386 infants. During the year, we also took some time to explore new initiatives and envision future goals, seeking ways to stabilize and improve the quality of women's lives and assist them to break the cycle of poverty that exists for so many.

in 2006, we continued our efforts to reach out to Spanish-speaking women in need. To this end, we have provided bi-lingual signage, informational leaflets and emergency referral forms for our centers. We continue to partner with the Morris County Office of Hispanic Affairs (MCOHA) - a partnership that has allowed our Morris County clients access to Spanish language child development classes, new car seats and free eyesight screening.

In Paterson, our manager has been trained in lead poisoning screening in cooperation with a city-wide project to increase awareness of the danger of lead exposure. Clients are asked a series of questions that assess their risk level and are referred for health screening tests. North Porch is proud to assist with this crucial initiative since children between six near the pears old are most at risk and have been found to absorb more of the lead that gets into their lungs or stomach than adults or older children. Children with high levels of lead may not show any symptoms until they are very sick, so early detection is most important.

In 2006, we participated in a series of round table discussions focused on women's ministries in the Diocese. We learned more about our sister organizations like the Women's Commission and the Episcopal Church Women and we brainstormed ways to network our ministries to tackle issues of common concern. One example of such collaboration arose from the impact of immigration laws on undocumented aliens and, in particular, women with children whose husbands are deported. This situation, which first became evident through North Porch clients, was passed on to the Women's Commission for further study and action.

We could not fulfill our ministry goals without the support of parishes, outreach committees, parish ECWs and individual donors. 2006 was a year when we saw an increase in outreach efforts spearheaded by young people. From Girl Scout Gold Award projects, confirmation projects, Bat Mitzvah collections and Sunday School diaper drives, we have benefited from the enthusiasm of young people with a sincere desire to help others. If these young people are any indication, we need not fear for our future which as always relies on the support of so many faithful parishioners. Thank you all. Respectfully submitted,

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2006

Organization and Publicity

The Prison Ministry Committee has regular meetings 11 months out of the year. A priority has always been to engage new members, and to get the word out about the various ministries we are engaged in. To this end, we submit articles to the Voice, run trainings, have a table at the Diocesan Convention, and network with organizations that support recently released men and women.

Conferences and Trainings

We participated for a third year in the Diocese of Newark's "Creative Congregations". Our program this year was called "Serving Time Together" and featured the Rev. Trink Schwartz, a Morris County Prison Chaplain; Barry Grant, program director at Toler Hall; and a recent parolee who completed time at Logan Hall.

A prison ministry training was held on October 20th, utilizing some of the training materials from the National Church. We discussed what it means to be "called" to prison ministry, its theological grounding, and practical matters such as the Do's and Don'ts of entering a prison.

Bible Study and Services

The Bible Study at Northern State Prison this year was spent working with the Book, "Purpose Driven Life," purported to have good success in prisons. The program is held consistently on Wednesday evenings, a testimony to the faithfulness of Kurt Gruenberg and John Vine. There are usually about 12 men who attend the study. We have a Sunday service at Northern State the last Sunday of the month.

One of the biggest challenges to increasing the number of volunteers who would like to go into the prisons to preach or teach or play music - is the process of getting prison ID's. It can take months of waiting and calling to get ID'd in the State system.

Tim Evans held his yearly Lessons and Carols Program at Hudson County Jail. All singers in the diocese are invited to participate in this program.

Grace Church collected personal care products for the men at Toler and Logan Halls, half-way houses in Newark. The donations are deeply appreciated because the men do not receive even a bar of soap when they arrive. Hats and gloves were collected for the men at Tully House.

We maintain a post office box for the purpose of receiving and disbursing Pen-pai letters.

Fundraisers

A fundraising letter was sent to the diocesan parishes many of whom responded generously to the cause of camperships and program costs for the Saturday Mentoring Program. We were able to raise \$5175.00.

Children's Programs

The "Learning by Experience", formerly known as the "Saturday Mentoring Program", has grown this year. The children come from the PATCH program of Offender Aid and Restoration (OAR).

Learning by Experience is now using space at 35 Halsey Street. They were formerly using space at Cathedral House. In addition to their regular meetings they have had several outlings: the circus, the Turtleback Zoo, and the State Fair.

Summer Campership: The children made two trips to Johnsonburg Camp in Johnsonburg, NJ. The PATCH mentors accompanied the children. Camp cost is \$172.50 per person (total of \$2932.50). Thirteen children attended plus the mentors.

We were able to buy duffle bags for the children who were going to camp, and were able to fill them with the necessary items,

The greatest setback to increasing the children's programming is the cost of transportation. "Top Cat" bus service charges \$200 for a round trip event.

The leaders of the mentoring program received their Child Sexual Misconduct Prevention Training.

There were two Christmas parties for the children in December. One was at Essex County Jail for the PATCH children, and the other was for the Learning by Experience children. We collected a couple hundred gifts.

Larry Ostuni was selected as Volunteer of the Year for the OAR Fundraiser on October 19th!
Larry is the founder of the Saturday mentoring program. His work, supported by Saundra
Addison-Britto, Kathleen Ballard, and Ruth Mayes, and Dorothy Fowlkes, has made a
difference in the lives of children whose parents are incarcerated, and their familles.

2006 Annual Report to Diocesan Convention The Reparations Task Force Episcopal Diocese of Newark

The Reparations Task Force, a working group of the Mission to Dismantle Racism, was called in 2004 by the Bishop in response to Resolution 2004-6, which was approved at the Diocesan Convention in January 2004.

The mission of the Reparations Task Force is to study and engage in diocesan discussions on the theology, history, issues and feasibility of restitution for descendants of Africans who were enslaved in America over period of 247 years. Specifically, the Task Force is charged with exploring how the Diocese of Newark should begin the process of "restoring all people to unity with God and each other in Christ" (BCP, Catechism, p. 855) with regards to the legacy of slavery and the need for repentance and restitution.

Over the past two years, the Task Force has continued to engage in the process of studying and discussing the vast complexities of the issues related to reparations. We continued our focus on gaining a deeper understanding on how the legacy of slavery has and continues to be a unique, systemic and institutionalized racism that results in the vast disparities in virtually every aspect of life for African American people. The often painful and emotionally charged discoveries of our work have helped the Task Force to remain committed to finding an authentic process for all members of the diocese to remember, repair, restore and reconcile to one another and to God.

The specific goals identified for the Task Force to undertake during 2006 were:

- to continue diocesan wide discussions/conversations/dialogues;
- to continue to develop and design educational tools about reparations and communicate them to members of the diocese; and
- to formulate and present for consideration by members of our diocesan convention resolutions to be considered by the members of the 75th General Convention of the Episcopal Church.

The Reparations Task Force made moderate progress in achieving the goals outlined for 2006:

- In March 2006, the Task Force sponsored a double session at Creative Congregations. Mr. Pete Rhinehart and The Rev. Allison Moore compared 5 generations of opportunities in a "generic" African-American man's family and in a white immigrant family in the United States. This revealed some of the cumulative privileges taken for granted by many white people and cumulative barriers and necessary resilience for African-Americans passed on from generation to generation. The second session, facilitated by Ms. Diane Sammons, Esq. and The Rev. Chris McCloud, Dcn. focused on the legal and sociological issues and implications of reparations. Approximately 35 people attended the combined sessions and offered lively comments and questions.
- Originally, the Task Force outlined a series of three forums to present to members of the Diocese during 2006; however, only one of the forums was presented, The Second Conversation: A Theology of Reparations, which was presented on May 6, 2006 at Cathedral House. The forum was developed to explore the theological aspects of reparations and to gain a deeper understanding of how the process of reconciliation and forgiveness requires and includes restoration to an affected person/persons. Our guest speakers, Dr. Donaid W. Shriver, Jr., President Emeritus of Union Theological Seminary, and The Rev. Michael Lapsley, SSM, Executive Director for The Institute for Healing of

Memories, Capetown, South Africa, provided a riveting exploration of the theological issues as it relates to reparations.

It is the intent of the Task Force to continue to present the remaining forums as previously identified: Sociological Issues and Impact; Advocacy - The Legal Perspective, Feasibility and H.R. 40 (The Conyers Bill); and Our Christian Community in Action - The Diocese and the Church. Dates will be made public as soon as plans are finalized.

As one of three dioceses already committed to the work of studying Reparations for Slavery in the Episcopal Church, the Diocese of Newark submitted adopted Resolution 2006-08 of the 132nd Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark, Church Responsibility in Reparations, to the 75th General Convention. The resolution was incorporated, with other resolutions on reparations, into adopted General Convention Resolutions A123 and A127. Some of the focus for the work of the Task Force for 2007-2009 has been provided by the recommendations of these resolutions in support of The Episcopal Church Restorative Justice commitment. The recommendations of A123 and A127 specifically for dioceses are:

a. From GC Resolution A123:Resolved, That the 75th General Convention of The Episcopal Church through the Executive Council urgently initiate a comprehensive program and urge every Diocese to collect and document during the next triennium detailed information in its community on (a) the complicity of The Episcopal Church in the institution of slavery and in the subsequent history of segregation and discrimination and (b) the economic benefits The Episcopal Church derived from the institution of slavery; and direct the Committee on Anti-Racism to monitor this program and report to Executive Council each year by March 31 on the progress in each Diocese;

b. From GC Resolutions A127:Resolved, That in the spirit of inclusion, dioceses also be invited to determine whether their call is to conduct truth and reconciliation processes in regard to other histories and legacles of racial discrimination and oppression that may be applicable in their geographic area, while not diminishing the strong call to focus on the history and legacy of slavery; and be it further Resolved, That the dioceses will give a progress report to the Anti-Racism Committee.

It is the intent of the Reparations Task Force to focus its energies on continuing to present educational forums; to follow the recommendations as presented in Resolutions A123 and A127; and to collaborate with neighboring religious organizations and entities such as the Diocese of New York, the Diocese of New Jersey and the Anti-racism Commission of the Executive Council of The Episcopal Church to facilitate further discussion on reparations and to develop creative vehicles for spiritual healing and reconciliation.

Resolved, that, in response to the 75th General Convention Resolutions A123 and A127, the work of the Reparations Task Force be continued and that the Task Force report to both the 134th Annual Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark and to the Anti-racism Committee of the Executive Council of The Episcopal Church in January 2007.

Saint Paul's Community Development Corporation Year in Review

Saint Paul's Community Development Corporation is committed to serving the neediest residents of Paterson, New Jersey. Service is provided through the following six program areas: the Housing Development Program (1994), Next Step Program (1990), Partnerships for Healthy Living Project (1996), Emergency Men's Shelter (1983), AmeriCorps Program (1997), and Food Pantry Program (1970). It should be noted that the quoted 2006 statistics listed are a close approximation of final end of year totals.

The Housing and Neighborhood Development program officially concluded the development of eleven Lind Homes which house two low income families. The program has also positioned itself to develop an eight unit single room occupancy building and also completed a neighborhood plan to improve Paterson's Fifth Ward. Through the completion of the Fifth Ward Plan, Housing and Neighborhood Development received a grant from Wachovia Bank to assist with outreaching to community residents to provide their input on the plans implementation. Increasing outreach efforts will allow the program to eventually generate implementation funding

The Next Step Program provides adult-based educational services. In 2006, an estimated 285 clients actively participated in the Adult Education program and an additional 53 clients took advantage of the Preakness Healthcare Alternative Workplace Project. Next Step also trained an additional 41 clients at it satellite site Passaic Family Head Start, Inc. To support its students, Next Step has also been charged with task of providing case management services to said clients. This aspect of the program has recently been transferred under a new case management division within the organization, the Steps to Self-Sufficiency Program. Sixty-three clients participated in case management services under Next Step for the months of January through June 2006.

The Emergency Men's Shelter and Partnerships for Healthy Living Project (PHL) are both under the umbrella of the Steps to Self-Sufficiency Program. In 2006, the Men's Shelter served 215 clients and provided 92 clients with support counseling. PHL, St. Paul's CDC's HIV/AIDS and outreach program, offered case management to 80 clients, and street outreach services to 1150 and 1750 female and male respectively.

AmeriCorps Members have been agents of support for many of the programs at St. Paul's CDC. AmeriCorps Members came from two different areas AmeriCorps*State & AmeriCorps*VISTA (Volunteers in Service To America). AmeriCorps*State Members provide direct service aid to programs: 18 Members recruited in 2006. AmeriCorps*VISTA Members assist the senior management staff of the CDC through indirect services of grant research and writing, measurement tool development, volunteer recruitment, and via extensive community partnering with local not-for-profit entities who share in the mission and vision of the agency. Five *VISTA Members served this purpose in 2006.

The St. Paul's CDC Food Pantry is the second largest distributor of donated food items in the county of Passaic. The Pantry's current monthly consumer average is 2,400 individuals served. Throughout 2006, the Food Pantry provided an estimated 414,015 meal equivalents to approximately 27,600 individuals. Given the nature of the Food Pantry's work it is more applicable to report these findings as duplicated statistics. Clients generally rely on the Food Pantry multiple times a year. For the Thanksgiving holiday the Food Pantry gave out 400 turkeys and 350 bags of trimmings to Paterson residents who would otherwise not have had a Thanksgiving dinner.

At the time of writing, St. Paul's CDC is in the final stages of its annul Adopt-a-Family and Christmas tree give away event. In 2006, 15 trees were donated and given to needy families. 47 families (122 individuals) were adopted by local residents and companies. In all, each family member received approximately \$60 worth of gifts for an estimated total of \$7,320 in donated goods.

Croneberger, 9th Bishop of the Diocese of Newark was the Celebrant. The net collections from this service went into our scholarship fund account.

Our Chapter held its 30th anniversary Banquet on June 9, 2006 at The Appian Way, located in Orange, New Jersey. It is our intention to host this event yearly as a fund raiser to help support our scholarship program. A certificate of appreciation was presented to The UBE by the Rev. George Kaswarra on behalf of Bishop Croneberger and the Diocesan Council.

Seven scholarships were awarded to deserving high school seniors, who were pursuing higher education from Churches around this Diocese at the Banquet.

The Clergy of Color/ Black Clergy Caucus, the UBE, and representatives from other black Churches have been meeting to formulate strategies on how to become actively involve in the life and ministry of this Diocese.

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The United Thank Offering Report to the 133 rd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark

The mission of the United Thank Offering is to expand the circle of thankful people. To achieve this mission we encourage daily prayers, offerings, and awareness of the abundance of God's blessings.

Since 1969, forty-three organizations received grant support from the United Thank Offering totaling \$685,312. These awards and the many others that are granted by the national UTO are possible only through your action of giving coins in the Blue Boxes. Without your help needs would go unmet.

In 2006, 67 parishes participated in the In-gatherings of the United Thank Offering. Many of the parishes participated in both the fall and spring In-gatherings. Last years monetary Signs of Thankfulness totaled \$27,580.24. We are truly a "Blessed" and "Thankful" diocese. Our 2 ingatherings were held during the 132⁸⁶ Diocesan Convention and in May at Trinity/St. Philips' Cathedral. The Rev. Margaret Gat was the guest speaker for the Spring Ingathering. St. John's Dover received an UTO grant in 2005.

In May our diocese hosted the ECW Province II Annual Meeting at Xavier Center and I was asked to lead the United Thank Offering workshop. There were 9 other UTO coordinators from the Province in attendance. It was also on the Program Committee and was given the honor to present our special program. We had the privilege to present "Seven Quilts for Seven Sisters". It was story and song of a day in the life of a slave family. They had various quilts that they had made and even a "Map Quilt" that was similar to one that run away slaves would have followed. We had picked this program because we felt it showed our interest in the wrongs of the past and the continued interest in antiracism. Our theme was "Living in the Light."

June was a busy month for I had the privilege to travel to Columbus, Ohio for the Triennial Meeting that coincides with the General Convention. Every three years at Triennial we hold the open hearings for the UTO Grants. This year we were granted one our two grants we submitted, that grant went to St. Luke's, Hope.

I am thankful for having had the pleasure of visiting in the General Convention Deputies room when they made the announcement naming our new Presiding Bishop. What a great thrill and honor that was for me.

WARD J. HERBERT FUND BOARD REPORT 133rd Annual Convention

The roots of the Ward J. Herbert Fund (WJH) stretch back to the 111th Annual Convention in 1985. For nearly two decades, the WJH board has managed a growing set of responsibilities centered around property stewardship, acting as the primary diocesan agency for property maintenance, established and expanded by Diocesan Convention and charged with the administration of three basic funding channels.

Fund 1: The Ward J. Herbert Fund Board was established by Diocesan Convention in 1990 with a mandate to empower the restoration, repair, improvement, beautification, and otherwise to extend the usefulness of the churches and buildings in the diocese. This mandate is carried out through a 50/50 grant program operated under specific criteria and funded by investment returns from the Church Structures Capital Fund (Fand 1) dedicated to this purpose.

Fund 2: The Board was expanded by Diocesan Convention in 2000 to take on additional responsibility as a diocesan agency for property maintenance. Convention recommended that funds be made available annually from the Diocesan Budget annually for property maintenance, which are added to interest received from outstanding Episcopal Capital Loan Fund (ECLF) loans to make up the Property Maintenance Fund (Fund 2). The Board makes Fund 2 monies available on a flexible loan or grant basis with a particular care for need and emergency.

ECLF: The Episcopal Capital Loan Fund makes short- and long-term loans to churches for capital projects.

WJH takes seriously its mandate to respond to all Diocesan property maintenance problems and works hard to anticipate future needs as well. The board works closely with the Diocesan Property Manager, and also with the Diocesan Council, the Standing Committee, and the Trustees of the Diocese, each of whom have designated representatives on the WJH board.

In 2006, the WJH board considered 51 requests for a total of \$610,772, and was able to fund 38 requests for a total of \$181,244. During the year, three loans from the Episcopal Capital Loan Fund were made for a total of \$82,500. In addition to those detailed below, three emergency loans and grants loans were made, for a total of \$19,890.

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CONSTITUTION & CANONS

OF THE

EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF NEWARK

January 2007

(Article II, Section 4(ii) first reading; Canon 1, Section 1 - clergy eligibility; Canon 2, Section 2 - Anti-racism training; Canon 5, Sections 3 & 4 - Diocesan Council.)

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CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I ACCEDING TO THE GENERAL CONSTITUTION

The Church in the Diocese of Newark, as a constituent part of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, accedes to the Constitution and Canons of that Church, and acknowledges their authority.

ARTICLE II THE DIOCESAN CONVENTION

There shall be a Convention of the Church in this Diocese, on the second Saturday in May in
each year, or on such other day as may be specially appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority.
 The Convention shall be held at the Cathedral unless the Ecclesiastical Authority appoints
otherwise.

2. SPECIAL CONVENTIONS

The Bishop, or if the Episcopate be vacant or the Bishop be incapacitated from acting, the Standing Committee shall have the power when it appears requisite for the good of the Church in this Diocese to call a Special Convention. No business shall be transacted at any such meeting other than that stated in the notice.

3. NOTICE OF CONVENTION

Written notice of every Convention shall be given by the Secretary of the Convention by mail at least four (4) weeks previous to the date of the Convention, stating the time and place. Such notice shall be given to all Clergy entitled to seat in the Convention, every Parish and Aided Parish in union with the Convention, and every Incorporated Mission and Mission. In the case of a Special Convention the notice shall specify the purpose for which the Convention is called.

4. MEMBERS OF THE CONVENTION

The Convention shall be composed of:

- (i) The Bishops:
- (ii) Every Presbyter and Deacon canonically resident in the Diocese on the first day of January immediately preceding the meeting of the Convention, except that a vote shall not be accorded to Deacons having fewer than two years in holy orders or to retired priests whose service in the Diocese was fewer than five years prior to retirement; and
- (iii) Three (3) Lay Deputies from each Parish and Aided Parish in union with the Convention and from each Incorporated Mission and Mission.

(iv) One (1) Youth Deputy and one (1) Alternate Youth Deputy elected by each District Convocation. Each shall be at least 14 years of age and under the age of 20, and none shall serve at more than two consecutive Diocesan Conventions.

5. EXCLUSION OF LAY DEPUTIES FROM VOTING IN CERTAIN CASES

Lay Deputies shall not be entitled to seat, voice or vote at any session of the Convention of this Diocese in any of the following circumstances:

- (i) In case the Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission, or Mission sending such Deputies shall for the year immediately preceding have failed to report to the Bishop as required by Canon.
- (ii) In case the Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission sending such Deputies, having been for the two (2) years immediately preceding without a Minister, and not having provided for regular services, shall have failed to notify the Bishop thereof, and to request that a Minister be assigned to it.
- (iii) In case the Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission, or Mission sending such Deputies shall for one year immediately preceding willfully refuse to comply with any provision of this Constitution or the Canons after having been duly notified by the Ecclesiastical Authority of its failure to comply.

6. PRESIDENT OF CONVENTION

The President of the Convention shall be such one of the following as shall be present, and in the order named: the Bishop; the Bishop Coadjutor; the Suffragan Bishop; and the President of the Standing Committee.

7. QUORUM AND MANNER OF VOTING

Subject to the provisions of this Constitution pertaining to election of a Bishop, the Presbyters entitled to vote who may be present at the time of meeting, with the Deputies from ten (10) Parishes, Aided Parishes, Incorporated Missions, and Missions shall constitute a quorum.

On the demand of five (5) Presbyters entitled to vote, or of five (5) Lay Deputies each from a different Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission, or Mission, the vote upon any question shall be by orders, each Clerical and each Lay Deputy voting individually, and, when a vote is thus taken, a concurrent majority in both orders shall be necessary to carry any measure.

8. SECRETARY OF THE CONVENTION

At each annual Convention a Secretary shall be elected. The person elected shall be a communicant of the Diocese in good standing. The Secretary shall give notice of all Conventions as required by the Constitution, take Minutes of the proceedings, preserve the journals and records, attest the public acts of the Convention, and perform such other services as

may from time to time be prescribed by the Canons or by the Convention. At the commencement of the term of office of a successor, the outgoing Secretary shall deliver to his/her successor all books and papers relating to the concerns of the Convention and to the office of Secretary.

The term of Secretary shall commence at the adjournment of the Convention at which the Secretary was elected and shall continue until the adjournment of the next Annual Convention.

9. ASSISTANT SECRETARIES

The Secretary shall appoint a sufficient number of Assistant Secretaries, not exceeding three, to assist in performing the duties of the office. In the event of a vacancy in the office of Secretary, the senior Assistant Secretary in point of service shall be acting Secretary. If no one of the Assistant Secretaries is able or willing to act as Secretary, the Secretary of the Standing Committee shall act until a Secretary is elected.

10. SECRETARY TO PREPARE REPORT

The Secretary shall prepare, immediately after the adjournment of the Diocesan Convention next preceding the regular meeting of every General Convention, and forward forthwith to the Secretary of the House of Deputies of the General Convention, a report in the form and containing the information required by the Canons of the General Convention.

11. TREASURER AND ASSISTANT TREASURER OF THE CONVENTION

At each Annual Convention a Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer shall be elected to serve until the next Annual Convention. Each shall give satisfactory security for the faithful performance of his/her duties. The Treasurer shall be entitled to a seat in the Convention and shall submit a statement of the accounts to each Annual Convention. The Assistant Treasurer shall perform such duties as may be assigned by the Treasurer of the Convention.

In case the Treasurer should die, resign, move from the Diocese or otherwise be incapable of acting, the Assistant Treasurer shall on certification of the Ecclesiastical Authority, assume all of the duties and powers of the Treasurer, until such time as the Treasurer shall resume his/her duties or a successor be elected or appointed. The Ecclesiastical Authority may fill a vacancy in the office of Treasurer or Assistant Treasurer.

ARTICLE III CHANCELLOR

There shall be a Chancellor appointed by the Bishop for a term of three (3) years. The Chancellor shall be a communicant of the Diocese in good standing and learned in the law. He/she shall be the legal advisor of the Ecclesiastical Authority and the Convention and shall be entitled to a seat in the Convention.

ARTICLE IV THE STANDING COMMITTEE

The Standing Committee shall consist of four (4) Presbyters entitled to vote in the Convention and four (4) Lay Communicants of the Diocese who shall be elected by the Convention for a term of four (4) years, provided that no person shall be elected to serve more than two (2) full terms in succession. As soon as convenient after each election, the Standing Committee shall organize and choose a President from among its members and a Secretary. During the intervals when the Convention is not in session, the Standing Committee may fill vacancies in its membership.

ARTICLE V DEPUTIES TO THE GENERAL CONVENTION

- 1. At the Annual Convention in the calendar year next before the year in which the triennial General Convention is held, four (4) Clerical and four (4) Lay Deputies from the Diocese shall be elected. The voting shall be by ballot, the Clergy and Laity voting by orders, and a majority in both orders shall be necessary to constitute an election. Deputies so chosen shall hold office for three years. A corresponding number of supplementary Deputies in each order shall be elected in like manner, except that a majority of the total vote cast shall be necessary to constitute an election.
- 2. The Deputies-elect shall signify to the Bishop at least thirty (30) days before the meeting of General Convention their intention to perform their duties as such: in default of which the Bishop shall designate so many of the supplementary Deputies, in the order of their election, as may be necessary to insure a full representation of the Diocese. If such representation cannot be obtained from among the Deputies and supplementary Deputies, the Bishop shall appoint, with consent of the Standing Committee, sufficient individuals to achieve such representation. Supplementary Deputies so designated and other individuals so appointed shall have the same power and authority as Deputies elected by Convention. In case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, the power conferred in this section upon the Bishop, shall be exercised by the Standing Committee.

ARTICLE VI DEPUTIES TO THE PROVINCIAL SYNOD

Those persons elected as Deputies to General Convention pursuant to the provisions of Article V hereof shall by virtue of such election be Deputies to the Provincial Synod. Those persons elected as supplementary or alternate Deputies to General Convention pursuant to the provisions of Article V hereof shall by virtue of such election be supplementary or alternate Deputies to the Provincial Synod.

ARTICLE VII ELECTION OF A BISHOP

- Election of a Bishop shall be made at an Annual Convention or at a Special Convention duly summoned as provided in this Constitution.
- 2. The voting shall be by ballot, the Clergy and Laity voting by orders and a concurrent majority of both orders shall be necessary to constitute an election. A quorum for the election of a Bishop shall be at least a majority of the Presbyters entitled to vote and Lay Deputies from a majority of Parishes, Aided Parishes, Incorporated Missions and Missions.

ARTICLE VIII ADMISSION OF NEW PARISHES

A new Parish may be admitted into union with this Convention by a majority of votes provided it shall have submitted:

- (i) Satisfactory evidence of the consent of the Bishop upon advice of the Standing Committee, or if the Bpiscopate is vacant, of the consent of the Standing Committee;
- (ii) Authenticated copies of the proceedings of its organization;
- (iii) A copy of its Certificate of Incorporation; and
- (iv) An authenticated copy of a resolution of its incorporators, Wardens, and Vestry promising conformity and obedience to the Doctrine, Discipline and Worship of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America and to the Constitution and Canons of that Church and of this Diocese.

ARTICLE IX AMENDMENTS

This Constitution may be amended in the following manner only:

The proposed amendment or amendments having been submitted to the Convention and approved by a majority of the members voting by orders shall lie over until the next Convention; and then if approved by a majority of the members voting by orders shall thereupon stand adopted. The second Convention at which such amendment or amendments are voted shall not be held less than four (4) months later than the prior Convention.

ARTICLE X INCLUSIVE LANGUAGE

The language of this constitution shall be inclusive.

CANONS

CANON 1 THE CONVENTION

1. THE ROLL OF CLERGY

The Bishop, or in the case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, the Standing Committee, shall no later than one (1) week before the day of meeting of a Convention or Special Convention, cause to be delivered to the Secretary of the Convention a certified list of all Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese and eligible for votes or seats at the Convention pursuant to Article II, section 4(ii) of the Constitution, together with the names of their respective cures or other stations or assignments. In the case of Clergy who have been ordained or received into the Diocese within the year immediately preceding, the date of their ordination or reception shall also be given. From the list so furnished, the Secretary shall prepare the roll of Clergy entitled to votes or seats in the Convention. The roll thus prepared shall be prima facie evidence of the rights of clerical members. Should any dispute arise, it shall be referred to a committee of two Presbyters and one Layperson appointed by the Convention, who shall decide and report on each case as early as may be; and the decisions thus made, if accepted by the Convention, shall not be called in question again during the same session.

2. THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present certificates of their election in the following form:

(Name of the Church, the Place, and Date)

This certifies that at a meeting of the Congregation of this Church, held for the purpose of electing Church Officers and Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention (or, for the purpose of electing Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, if the meeting be for that object alone), A.B., C.D., and E.F., being Communicants of the Church in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish (Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission, or Mission), were chosen as Deputies; and B.C., D.E., and F.G., also being Communicants in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish (Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission, or Mission), were duly chosen as Alternate Deputies to represent the Parish (Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission), in that body for the year ensuing.

In testimony of which I have hereunto set my hand (or if two Wardens subscribe, we have set our hands), the day or year above written.

This certificate in the case of a Parish or Aided Parish shall be signed by the Rector, or the Secretary or Clerk of the Vestry, or by the Wardens; and in the case of an Incorporated Mission or Mission by the Minister in charge, or by the Clerk, or by the Wardens, and transmitted to the Secretary of the Convention, within thirty (30) days after the election.

3. If any of the Deputies elected be unable to attend the Convention, the Rector, or the Minister

in charge of an Incorporated Mission or Mission, or if there be no Rector, then the Wardens, or if it be an Incorporated Mission or Mission, the Wardens, may designate so many of the Alternate Deputies, in order of their election, as may be necessary to insure a full representation of the Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission.

4. THE ROLL OF LAY DEPUTIES

From the said certificate of Lay Deputies, the Secretary of the Convention shall prepare a roll of the Lay Deputies entitled to seats and vote in the Convention.

The roll thus prepared shall be prima facie evidence of the rights of the Lay Deputies. But should any dispute arise, it shall be referred to a committee of one (1) Presbyter and two (2) Lay persons appointed by the Convention, who shall decide and report on each case as early as may be; and the decisions thus made, if accepted by the Convention, shall not be called in question again during the same session.

5. ATTENDANCE OF MEMBERS OF CONVENTION

It shall be the duty of every Clergyperson and Layperson having a seat in the Convention, to attend every meeting thereof.

6. OPENING OF CONVENTION

Every Convention shall be opened with the celebration of the Holy Communion. The Bishop's Address and Episcopal Charge, if any, shall be published in the journal.

7. CONVENTION RESOLUTIONS

Any Resolution calling for the establishment of a task force, committee, commission or any other entity with a lifespan of greater than one year shall also contain, at a minimum, each of the following elements:

- 1. A description of the purpose or mission of the entity to be created;
- A mechanism for creating members of the entity, either through appointment or election, also including a definition of the terms of membership;
- A statement of accountability identifying with particularity whether the entity to be created is responsible to the Bishop, the Convention or the Council;
- A statement detailing whether the entity to be created will require funding and where that funding will come from;
- A statement outlining the anticipated costs of the entity and the benefits to be gained from that expenditure; and

 A statement of whether the entity to be created has a limited life span is permanent in nature or needs to be re-authorized by the Convention after a specific period of time.

CANON 2 VOTING AND ELECTIONS

- 1. Upon any question for which provision is not otherwise specifically made in the Constitution or Canons, a voice vote shall be taken by "ayes" and "nays", all members present being entitled to vote. The President shall forthwith announce the result. But, if the President is in doubt or for other good cause or upon appeal from his/her announcement of the result, the vote shall be taken either by a standing vote or by a show of hands in which case each member shall have one vote.
- 2. If any of the Deputies elected be unable to attend the Convention, the Rector, or the Minister in charge of a Parish or Aided Parish, or if there be no Rector, then the Wardens, or if it be an Incorporated Mission or Mission, the Wardens, may designate so many of the Alternate Deputies, in order of their election, as may be necessary to insure a full representation of the Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission, or Mission.
- 3. In all elections in which provision is not otherwise specifically made in the Constitution or Canons, the vote shall be by ballot utilizing the Hare Preferential Ballot System (providing for a single ballot election with candidates ranked in order of preference) in accordance with voting procedures established in the Rules of Order of the Convention, and the candidates receiving the prescribed margin of the votes cast in each office shall be elected, and further provided however, that by unanimous consent, the ballot may in any case be dispensed with and an election made by vote as in paragraph 1 of this Canon or upon such other terms as the Convention may be by majority vote determine.
- 4. Where the Constitution or Canons provide for the filling of vacancies in the interim between Conventions, a person so chosen shall hold office only until the following Annual Convention.
- 5. Except in cases of death or incapacity, no individual elected or appointed pursuant to the Constitution or Canons may be relieved of his/her duties until a successor assumes such duties.
- 6. No person shall be eligible for election to any office at Convention, nor shall any person elected by Districts, or appointed to serve on Diocesan Council or other Diocesan Standing Committees, Commissions or Boards accede to that office, unless that person shall have first completed or arranged for the completion of anti-racism training as approved by the Bishop after consultation with the Mission to Dismantle Racism.

CANON 3 THE REGISTRAR

The Bishop shall annually appoint a Registrar of the Diocese, whose duty it shall be to collect and act as custodian for records and documents relating to the history of the Church or which may be useful or necessary to the administration of the affairs of the diocese including but not by way of limitation:

journals of the proceedings of the Convention;

deeds or other instruments of title of property of the diocese including property held in the name of Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties of the Diocese of Newark;

the minute books and corporate records of corporations, committees and commissions operating under the authority of the Diocese;

registers of dissolved or dormant parishes and missions of the Diocese; copies of histories and other documents of historical interest pertaining to the history of the Diocese, its parishes and its missions.

The Diocesan Council shall provide such financial and other resources as may be reasonably necessary for the discharge of the duties of the Registrar. The Registrar shall act in accordance with such policies concerning the retention and disposal of documents as may be adopted by Diocesan Council from time to time or in absence or inapplicability of such policies as the Registrar may deem reasonable in the circumstances. The Registrar shall be entitled to seek the advice of the Chancellor in the discharge of Registrar's responsibilities. The Registrar shall report to the Diocesan Council and to the Convention annually describing the performance of the Registrar's duties during the year then ending.

CANON 4 THE COMMISSION ON MINISTRY

COMPOSITION

There shall be a Commission on Ministry consisting of the Bishop together with ten (10) Clergy and ten (10) Lay persons, who shall be appointed by the Bishop with the concurrence of the Convention. The appointed members shall serve for a term of four (4) years but no such member shall be eligible for reappointment until a year shall have elapsed after the completion of any two (2) terms of service. Vacancies may be filled by the Ecclesiastical Authority until the next Annual Convention.

No person shall serve as a member of the Commission on Ministry and the Standing Committee at the same time.

DUTIES AND FUNCTIONS

The Commission on Ministry shall perform such duties and in such manner as prescribed by the Canons of General Convention and as directed by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

CANON 5 THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL

1. COMPOSITION

There shall be a Diocesan Council consisting of the Bishops; The Secretary of the Convention, who shall also be a Secretary of the Diocesan Council; The Treasurer of the Convention, who shall also be Treasurer of the Diocesan Council; and up to twenty-six (26) additional members. The Chancellor as legal advisor to the Council shall be afforded seat and voice at all meetings of the Council.

Of the additional members, up to twenty-two (22) Council members shall be elected by the District Convocation, the number of such members to be set by Diocesan Council. Each District Convocation shall elect an equal number of representatives to the Council, held of whom shall be clergy persons and half lay persons, who shall take office upon adjournment of the Annual Convention. Each District Convocation may fill vacancies among its representatives to the Council. The remaining number shall be appointed by the Bishop.

The term of any additional member shall be two (2) years, and no person shall be reelected or reappointed at the expiration of two (2) consecutive complete terms. The Council shall have the authority to establish classes so that a representative from each district and half of the membership in each order will be elected each year.

2. PURPOSE

The Diocesan Council shall act for the Convention in the interim between meetings, and working with the Bishops and staff, shall be responsible for long-range planning and determining program priorities, presenting them clearly to the Convention for consideration. The Council acting for the Convention, shall from time to time review and evaluate the program approved by the Convention. The Council shall have all power necessary to carry out its functions and duties subject to law, the Constitution and Canons of the General Church, and the Constitution and Canons of this Diocese.

3. ORGANIZATION

The President of the Convention shall preside over the Council, and the Council shall have power to enact By-laws and Regulations for the performance of its duties not inconsistent with the Constitution and Canons of General Convention and of this Diocese. The Committees of Council shall be as set forth in its By-laws and shall include a Finance Committee. The Finance Committee may include a minority of non-Council members, as provided by the By-laws, who shall be appointed by the Bishop.

4. DUTIES

- a. Analyze needs, determine primary concerns and program priorities, and develop goals and policy for the Diocese.
- Review and evaluate the program of the Diocese, set standards, gather and analyze data, and compare results with goals and policy.
- c. Establish such planning groups as the Council may deem appropriate to carry out its purposes and duties.
- d. Engage consultants and utilize resources sufficient to accomplish the planning process.
- e. Supervise the financial affairs of the Convention, including budgetary matters.
- f. Submit annually to the Convention a unified budget for the ensuing year to provide for the total operation of the Diocese.
- g. Adopt a working budget annually.
- h. Provide for the maintenance of sound and accepted business practices in the affairs of the Diocese, its institutions, organizations, and agencies, and its Parishes, Aided Parishes, Incorporated Missions, and Missions. To accomplish this duty the Council shall be empowered to make regulations concerning the investment of trust funds, the bonding of treasurers and custodians, methods of keeping books of account, provisions for auditing and reporting thereof, maintenance of insurance, and such other matters consistent with this Canon, provided that all such regulations shall be subject to review, alteration, or amendment by Convention.
- i. Give recognition to accredited organizations, institutions, and other activities of the Diocese and provide regulations whereby such recognition can be given. No such organization, institution, or other activity shall receive financial support from the budget for the program of the Diocese or shall be permitted to use in its title any designation indicating it to be affiliated with the Diocese or in any other way hold itself out as a Diocesan organization, institution, or agency without first having received recognition from the Diocesan Council. The Diocesan Council shall have the further power of establishing standards, requiring reports, and the like in connection with all such organizations, institutions, and activities.
- Approve ACTS/VIM, Ward J. Herbert and Congregational Growth and Development Fund grants.
- k. Together with the Diocesan Staff, to encourage the timeliness and accuracy of parochial reports.

CANON 6 DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE

A Department of Finance is hereby provided for as required by Title 1, Canon 6, Section 2 of the Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America. Said Department shall be headed by a Chief Financial Officer, who shall be appointed by the Bishop. The Convention, the Diocesan Council or the Bishop may delegate to said Department matters relating to the financial affairs of the Diocese. The Chief Financial Officer shall have the authority to act in the name and on behalf of the Department of Finance in all matters not inconsistent with the Constitution and Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America or of this Diocese. Said Department and the Chief Financial Officer, as may be appropriate in the circumstances, shall report to the Convention, the Diocesan Council or the Bishop with regard to matters it has considered and actions taken.

CANON 7 DIOCESAN ADMINISTRATION

- 1. The Bishop shall be responsible for the administration and implementation of all programs and functions adopted by the Convention.
- The Bishop may allocate responsibilities for the program of the Convention among designated departments, commissions, and committees as necessary, which shall be subject to his/her regulation and control.
- The Bishop shall be responsible for the coordination of the various Diocesan activities, organizations, and institutions, among themselves and with their counterparts in the General Church.
- 4. The Bishop may determine the manner and composition of each department, commission or committee, whether by the Bishop's own appointment, by Convention election, or otherwise subject to the provisions of such departments, etc., as may be incorporated, etc.
- 5. The Bishop shall have authority to employ and supervise such staff as may be necessary to administer the affairs of the Diocese within the limits of the administrative and program budget.
- 6. The Bishop shall assist the Diocesan Council in its function of review and evaluation.
- 7. The Bishop and staff shall participate in the planning process as necessary and as requested.
- 8. The Bishop may delegate any of the foregoing responsibilities to the Suffragan Bishop, if there be one.
- 9. Whenever the Bishop shall leave the Diocese, the Bishop may designate the Suffragan Bishop, if there be one, to be the ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese during the absence of the Bishop.

CANON 8 DISTRICT CONVOCATIONS

1. The Diocesan Council shall divide the Diocese into districts in each of which there shall be a

Convocation.

- 2. Each Convocation shall be composed of:
- (i) Every Clergy person canonically resident or licensed to officiate in the Diocese, who regularly serves a Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission in the district as an officiating clergy person.
- (ii) Three Lay persons (not less than one of whom shall be a Warden, Treasurer, Clerk or member of the Vestry or Executive Committee, and, if possible, at least one of whom shall be between the ages of 14 and 21) from each Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission in the district, elected at an annual or special meeting of the Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission.
- Each Convocation shall elect its own officers in accordance with By-laws adopted by Diocesan Council.
- 4. The Convocations shall have the following functions and powers:
- (i) to elect their representatives to the Diocesan Council;
- (ii) to provide communication between the local congregations and the Diocese; and
- (iii) to provide a network of support for parish life and development, a clergy collegiality and lay leaders.

They shall also have further functions and powers as may be assigned or delegated to them by the Convention, the Ecclesiastical Authority or the Diocesan Council.

CANON 9 PARISHES AND MISSIONS

- 1. CLASSIFICATION OF CONGREGATIONS
- (a) All congregations which are a part of the Diocese of Newark shall be classified in one of the following categories:
- (1) Parish
- (2) Aided Parish
- (3) Incorporated Mission
- (4) Mission
- 2. CREATION OF PARISHES

Parishes shall be created as provided by the laws of the State of New Jersey and the Constitution of this Diocese.

3. CREATION OF MISSIONS

- (a) Missions shall be created by the Bishop who shall be ex-officio the rector thereof and who may appoint a Vicar to be in charge of each Mission and to serve during the pleasure of the Bishop. No termination of such appointment shall be made except on one (1) month's notice.(b) The temporal affairs of a Mission shall be in charge of an Executive Committee which shall be elected at an organization meeting.
- (c) Such organization meeting shall be held on the call of the Bishop, or at his/her direction of the Archdeacon having jurisdiction. The meeting shall be presided over by the Bishop or such Archdeacon, or by a priest designated by the Bishop. At the organization meeting such persons shall be entitled to vote as shall sign an application for the establishment of the Mission in such form as the Bishop shall require.
- (d) The Bishop may appoint one (1) or two (2) Wardens and a Treasurer for the Mission. There shall also be an Executive Committee consisting of the Vicar, the Wardens, the Treasurer, and not less than three (3) nor more than nine (9) additional persons who shall be elected at the organization meeting. The terms of such elected members shall continue until the next Annual Meeting. The Executive Committee shall elect one of their number as Clerk.
- (e) The annual election of members of the Executive Committee shall be held on the Monday following the first Sunday in Advent or such other day as the Bishop shall appoint. At the first annual election the notice of the annual election or of any special meeting shall be given as provided in the case of Parish meetings. The Vicar, or such persons as may be designated by the Bishop, shall preside at all meetings of the Mission or Incorporated Mission and of the Executive Committee.
- (f) The Bishop shall have the power to set aside any election, to suspend the annual election and to remove from office any and all officers and members of the Executive Committee of a Mission.
- (g) Title to all real and personal property of a Mission, excepting funds received for the current expenses thereof, shall be vested in the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties of the Diocese of Newark, a New Jersey corporation, or another corporation designated by it. Upon the Mission becoming an incorporated Parish in union with the Convention, the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties, or such corporation, shall with the consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee transfer all such property to the Parish.
- (h) All powers and authority given by the preceding subsections of this section to the Bishop shall in the event of vacancy in the Episcopate be exercised by the Standing Committee.

4. REGISTERS AND REPORTS

- (a) In every Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission and Mission there shall be maintained a register in which shall be recorded under the appropriate date the names of all persons baptized, confirmed, married or buried. In the case of baptism of children, the names of the parents and sponsors also shall be recorded. Each entry shall be signed by the person performing the action.
- (b) Every Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission and Mission shall maintain such other records and make such reports as may be provided by General Convention or by or pursuant to authority of the Convention of this Diocese.

5. QUALIFICATION OF VOTERS

The persons entitled to vote at any meeting of a Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission shall be:

- (a) Baptized;
- (b) At least 16 years of age;
- (c) Of good moral character;
- (d) Adherents of the Protestant Episcopal Church;
- (e) Regular attendance at the services of the Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission for six (6) calendar months before the meeting; and
- (f) Regular contributors for the same period of time to the current expenses of the Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission. A record of the regular contributors for the support of the Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission shall be maintained by the Treasurer, with the dates of their contributions. Such records shall be sufficient evidence as to the qualification of a voter with respect to the last preceding requirement.

6. QUALIFICATION OF OFFICERS

- (a) The persons entitled to hold office in any Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission shall be qualified voters of the Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission. A person entitled to hold Diocesan office or office in a District Convocation, a Warden, and a Deputy or Alternate Deputy to the Diocesan Convention shall be a Confirmed Communicant in good standing in addition to being a qualified voter.
- (b) No person shall hereafter succeed herself or himself more than twice in the office of Warden, and no person shall serve more than six (6) consecutive years in such office.

7. BOUNDARIES OF PARISHES, AIDED PARISHES, INCORPORATED MISSIONS AND MISSIONS

In any case where it shall be expedient, the Bishop, upon the advice of the Standing Committee, or if the Episcopate be vacant the Standing Committee may establish the boundaries of Parishes, Aided Parishes, Incorporated Missions and Missions of this Diocese. An opportunity to be heard shall first be granted to the various representatives of any Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission which may be affected by the establishment of such boundaries. Boundaries thus constituted shall be valid for all canonical purposes, and also for fixing Parochial connection of all persons desiring, or entitled to, the ministrations of this church, who have not by some act of their own become attached to a congregation and for defining for each Rector or Vicar the extent of his/her responsibility for the cure of souls.

8. CLERGY COMPENSATION

- (a) All Parishes, Aided Parishes, Incorporated Missions and Missions within the Diocese of Newark shall provide their full-time clergy with not less than the minimum stipend and other perquisites established by Diocesan Convention, except with the consent of the Bishop and the Standing Committee. Nothing herein shall prevent the acceptance of voluntary service by nonstipendiary clergy. The provisions of this paragraph shall not apply to Clergy holding cures within the Diocese at the time of its adoption with respect to such cures.
- (b) Any Parish which is unable to pay the minimum compensation to its Rector may notify the Diocese of its need for financial assistance. During any period of Diocesan assistance, it shall continue to function as a Parish of the Diocese in all respects except that during such temporary status, no assets or endowment funds of the Parish shall be expended without notification to the Finance Office of the Diocese.

9. AIDED PARISHES

- (a) A Parish may be reclassified to Aided Parish status if:
- (1) The Parish requests reclassification; OR
- (2) The Parish is no longer able to support the necessary operating expenses and indebtedness of the parish: OR
- (3) The Parish is so diminished in numbers that it is no longer viable as a Parish; OR
- (4) The Parish fails to elect officers in compliance with its corporate charter; OR
- (5) The Parish persistently fails to comply with the constitutional and canonical requirements for Parish status: OR
- (6) The Parish fails to hold its assets in accordance with the Canons of the Episcopal Church.
- (b) A Parish may be reclassified to Aided Parish status as follows:
- (1) Report by the Bishop to the Standing Committee with recommendation of reclassification; AND
- (2) Concurring action by the Bishop and Standing Committee recommending reclassification to

the Diocesan Council: AND

- (3) Written notification by the Standing Committee to the Rector and Vestry advising of recommendation of reclassification and of their right to appear before the Diocesan Council to oppose reclassification, such notice to be given not less than thirty (30) days prior to the Diocesan Council considering such recommendation; AND
- (4) A hearing before the Diocesan Council at a regular or special meeting thereof on not less than thirty (30) days prior notice to the members of the Diocesan Council; AND
- (5) The affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the members of the Diocesan Council present and voting.
- (c) An Aided Parish shall continue to function as a Parish of the Diocese in all respects as follows:
- (1) It shall be eligible to apply for financial assistance from the Diocese;
- (2) Title to all real and personal property and endowment funds shall immediately be transferred to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and the Diocesan Properties of the Diocese of Newark, in trust for that church until subsequently reclassified.
- (d) No congregation may maintain the status of Aided Parish for more than three (3) consecutive years. At the third Diocesan Convention following the reclassification to Aided Parish status, such congregation shall be (a) restored to full Parish status; or (b) reclassified to incorporated Mission status, effective on the third anniversary of reclassification to aided parish status. The Bishop and Standing Committee may, at the request of amajority of the members of the Vestry of an Aided Parish, delay action on reclassification to incorporated mission status to the fourth Diocesan Convention following reclassification to Aided Parish status.
- (e) At any time prior to the expiration of three (3) years, an Aided Parish may be restored to full and regular Parish status by approval of the Bishop and Standing Committee or the Diocesan Convention either upon the initiative of the Bishop or upon petition of the Vestry of the Aided Parish. If an Aided Parish shall remain in such status for a period of three (3) years, then a special meeting of the Aided Parish shall be called, and by majority vote thereof, shall determine to petition for restoration to full Parish status or to be changed to the status of an Incorporated Mission.
- (f) The Diocesan Council shall be responsible for administering all Diocesan financial aid to Aided Parishes, subject to guidelines and procedures adopted by it. All decisions pertaining to financial aid to Aided Parishes shall require the consent of the Diocesan Council.

10. INCORPORATED MISSIONS

- (a) An Aided Parish may be reclassified to Incorporated Mission status as follows:
- (1) Certification by Bishop that Aided Parish is no longer viable to the Rector, Wardens and Vestry of the Parish concerned;
- (2) Report by Bishop to an annual or special Convention of the Diocese together with his/her recommendation that the Parish be reclassified; and

- (3) Adoption by Convention of the recommendation of the Bishop.
- (b) The failure of Convention to adopt the recommendation of the Bishop for reclassification to Incorporated Mission Status will have the effect of restoring the Aided Parish to full Parish status.
- (c) If a Parish or an Aided Parish requests reclassification to Incorporated Mission in writing signed by a majority of all current members of the Vestry, the Bishop may present such request before Standing Committee which may act on such request and reclassify.
- (d) The Ecclesiastical status of an Incorporated Mission shall be that of a Mission, and it shall be governed by all of the provisions of these Canons applicable to Missions, except as otherwise specifically provided herein.
- (e) Upon reclassification to Incorporated Mission status, the Rector relinquishes tenure, except Rectors in cures at the time of adoption of this canon. Any such Rector will retain tenure notwithstanding reclassification, but upon vacancy in the office of Rector, the Incorporated Mission lose the right to call a successor while so classified. A Rector retaining tenure under this section shall become the Vicar of the Incorporated Mission, and shall act at all times under the authority of the Bishop who shall be the ex officio Rector of such Incorporated Mission and President of the corporation.
- (f) An Incorporated Mission shall retain the corporate structure it had as a Parish and shall elect officers and conduct its business in accordance with the provisions of its corporate charter, subject to the provisions of these Canons.
- (g) An Incorporated Mission may be reclassified to Mission status upon the approval of the Bishop, the Standing Committee, and a majority of the deputies to an annual or special Convention of the Diocese voting by orders. In addition, if an Incorporated Mission requests such reclassification in writing signed by a majority of the qualified voting members of congregation, an Incorporated Mission may become a Mission with the consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee.
- (h) Upon reclassification to Mission status, the church continues to function as a Mission of the Diocese, but the Parish corporation shall be dissolved.

11. AREA MINISTRIES

Two or more Parishes may choose to enter into a compact to establish an Area Ministry with the prior consent of the Bishop and the Standing Committee. Similarly, one or more Parishes may choose to enter into a compact to establish an Area Ministry with one or more Incorporated Missions or Missions operating under the authority of the Diocesan Council. The terms and conditions of such compact shall be as are agreed upon by the respective Rectors, Wardens and Vestries (in the case of Parishes), the Diocesan Council, and the respective Executive Committees (in the case of Missions and Incorporated Missions) and approved by the Bishop and Standing Committee. Those terms and conditions shall include the following:

- (1) Provisions for the selection, term and compensation of clergy serving the Area Ministry;
- (2) Provisions for the administration of such Area Ministry;
- (3) Provisions for withdrawal from any Area Ministry by any member church; and
- (4) Provisions for the dissolution of the Area Ministry.

12. EMERGENCY POWERS

- (a) In the event that the capital assets of a Parish are in imminent danger of being transferred, expended or dissipated in violation of the Canons of the Episcopal Church, the Bishop, with the consent of three-fourths (3/4) of the members of the Standing Committee, may direct that no such transfer or expenditure be made pending a determination by the Diocesan Council as to whether reclassification to Aided Parish Status is appropriate.
- (b) In the event that the Treasurer of any Parish fails to act in accordance with his or her duties or engages in acts which are contrary to his or her duties or the Canons of the Episcopal Church, and the Vestry having failed to secure the Treasurer's compliance with his or her duties or the Canons, the Bishop, with the consent of three-fourths (3/4) of the members of the Standing Committee, may temporarily suspend such Treasurer and appoint a temporary replacement until the Treasurer either resigns from that office or agrees to comply. Such action may be appealed to the Diocesan Council, which may over-rule the suspension.

13. DISSOLUTION OF MISSIONS

The Bishop and Standing Committee in any case where they deem it be in the best interests of the Church to terminate a Mission may declare such Mission to be dissolved.

CANON 10 LEASES

A Parish may enter into a lease or leases of Parish-owned property, other than for residential use, without the prior consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee provided the term of such lease does not exceed (1) year in duration, and the lease does not obligate the Parish to extend or renew the tenancy beyond one year. No Parish-owned property shall be used or leased for residential purposes without the prior consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee, in writing, regardless of the extent of such use and the duration of such lease, except that no such consent shall be required for the occupancy of Parish-owned property by Clergy or lay employee(s) of such Parish.

CANON 11 PLEDGE TO BUDGET

It is the responsibility of every congregation in the Diocese of Newark to make a financial pledge to the Unified Budget of the Diocese of Newark. Written pledges, in accordance with the approved system of diocesan giving, for each calendar year are due in the Diocesan Finance Office by December 1 of the preceding year.

CANON 12 ARCHDEACONS

The Bishop shall appoint such Archdeacons, assign them such jurisdiction and impose upon them such duties as is deemed expedient.

CANON 13 COMMITTEE ON THE CHURCH PENSION FUND

- The Bishop shall appoint annually a Committee on the Church Pension Fund whose duties shall be to implement the participation of the Diocese in that Fund by obtaining and transmitting such information, rendering such reports and taking such other action as may be required or appropriate on the part of this Diocese.
- It shall be the duty of the person charged with paying the compensation of any clergyperson in the Diocese to submit all information in connection therewith as may be required by the Church Pension Fund, and to pay to that Fund all premiums which may become due with respect to such compensation.
- 3. It shall be the duty of every clergy person canonically resident in or serving in this Diocese to inform the Church Pension Fund promptly of such facts, as dates of birth, or ordination, or reception, of marriage, births of children, deaths and changes in cures or salaries, as may be necessary for its proper administration and to cooperate with said Fund in such other ways as may be necessary in order that said Fund may discharge its obligations in accordance with the intention of the General Convention in respect thereto.

CANON 14 INSURANCE

The Diocese of Newark shall obtain a group policy or group policies which will provide life and health insurance coverage for the clergy of the Diocese. Participation by Parishes, Aided Parishes, Incorporated Missions and Missions is mandatory. The premium cost attributable to insurance coverage for clergy employed by a Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission shall be paid by that Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission. The effective date of this shall be January 1, 1985.

CANON 15 TRUSTEES OF THE FUND FOR AGED AND INFIRM CLERGY

 The Trustees of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergy consisting of the Bishop and the members of the Standing Committee, shall administer the several funds committed to their care pursuant to the trusts upon which they were established.

2. THE AUTOMATIC PENSION FUND

In the case of the Automatic Pension Fund the Trustees shall annually divide as of May first the income received on the Fund during the preceding year among those Clergy who:

(a) have attained the age of sixty-five (65) years and have notified the Trustees of that fact prior to May first of the year in question; and

- (b) were canonically resident in the Diocese for the five (5) years immediately preceding such notification; and
- (c) were for at least five (5) years of their last term of canonical residence settled Ministers or Missionaries duly appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority; and
- (d) have retired on account of age or disability.

No such clergy person shall receive in excess of \$1,000.00 from this fund in any one (1) year and all surplus of income, if any, and gifts and donations to the Automatic Pension Fund shall be added to the principal of the Fund.

3. FUND FOR THE RELIEF OF CLERGY AND THEIR DEPENDENTS.

In the case of the Fund for the Relief of Clergy and Their Dependents, the Trustees shall at their discretion annually as of May first appropriate the estimated income of the Fund during the current year for:

- (a) the relief of disabled clergy canonically resident in the Diocese;
- (b) the relief of the widows, widowers, and children and the defraying of the funeral expenses of deceased clergy who were canonically resident in the Diocese at the time of their demise.

Unappropriated income shall in the discretion of the Trustees be reserved as a contingency fund for the foregoing purposes or may be added to the principal of the Fund.

CANON 16 THE DIOCESAN INVESTMENT TRUST

The management of the Diocesan Investment Trust shall be under the control of the Bishop of the Diocese, who shall be President thereof, and ten (10) other Trustees who shall be elected by the Bishop and the Standing Committee for terms of five (5) years. In the case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, the election shall be by the Standing Committee. If a trustee leaves office without having served the full term for which he or she was elected, a successor shall be elected for the unexpired term.

Initially, trustees may be elected for terms of less than five (5) years, but only for the purpose of establishing a program whereby the terms of two (2) trustees shall expire each year.

CANON 17 THE ECCLESIASTICAL COURT

1. COMPOSITION

There shall be an Ecclesiastical Court for the Trial of a Priest or Deacon which shall be composed of four (4) Priests or Deacons elected by the Convention for a term of four (4) years and three (3) Lay Persons, who are confirmed adult communicants of this Church in good standing, elected by the Convention for a term of three (3) years. No member of the Court may be

a member of the Standing Committee or the Diocesan Review Committee. The Court shall appoint not less than one nor more than three Lay Persons who are confirmed adult communicants of this Church in good standing, learned in the law, as Assessors. A Lay Assessor need not reside in or be a member of the Diocese.

2. VACANCIES

- a. The death, disability rendering a person unable to act, resignation or declination to serve as a member of an Ecclesiastical Trial Court shall constitute a vacancy on the Court. Notice of resignations or declinations to serve shall be given by members of the Court in writing to the Presiding Judge of the Court. If any Priest elected to an Ecclesiastical Court is elected a bishop, or if any lay person elected to an Ecclesiastical Trial Court is ordained prior to the commencement of a Trial, that person shall immediately cease to be a member of the Ecclesiastical Court. Not withstanding the foregoing, however, following the commencement of a Trial, all members of the court shall continue to serve until the completion of the Trial and the rendering of a Verdict thereon. For the purposes of this Section, the term Verdict shall b4e deemed to include the imposition of sentence. Vacancies, other than for cause under subsection b of this Canon, occurring in any Ecclesiastical Court shall be filled by the remaining members of the Court until the next meeting of the Convention.
- b. Members of the Ecclesiastical Court may be challenged by either the Respondent or the Church Attorney for cause stated to the Court. The Court shall determine the relevancy and validity of challenges for cause. Vacancies caused by challenges determined by the Court shall be filled by majority vote of the Court from persons otherwise qualified for election under these canons. Vacancies filled by the Court shall be from the same order as the person challenged was when first elected to the Court.
- c. Any member of the Ecclesiastical Court may recuse himself or herself from any Trial. Any vacancy caused by such recusal shall be filled by majority vote of the Court from persons otherwise qualified for election under these canons. Vacancies filled by the Court shall be from the same order as the recused person was when first elected to the Court.
- d. In the event that the Ecclesiastical Court cannot be convened due to vacancies, declinations to act, absences, resignations, challenges or otherwise or due to the determination by the Diocesan Review Committee for good cause shown that change in venue is needed, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall arrange for the Trial to be held by an Ecclesiastical Trial Court of another Diocese in Province II reasonably convenient for the parties.

3. ORGANIZATION

Annually within two (2) months following the Convention, the Court shall organize itself to include the election of a Presiding Judge from among its members. The Court shall also choose a Clerk and, if necessary, Assistant Clerks who shall be Priests or Deacons or adult confirmed communicants in good standing of this Church and who shall serve at the pleasure of the Court. The Ecclesiastical Court shall also appoint a Reporter who shall provide for the recording of the proceedings and who shall serve at the pleasure of the Court.

4. QUORUM

Five (5) members of the Court shall constitute a quorum.

5. DUTIES OF THE LAY ASSESSORS

The Assessors shall sit with the Court to advise it upon questions of law, procedure or evidence.

6. THE CHURCH ATTORNEY

A Church Attorney shall be appointed by the Standing Committee with the advice and consent of the Ecclesiastical Court for a term of three (3) years. The Church Attorney shall be a confirmed adult communicant of this Church in good standing, learned in the law, and admitted to practice law in the State of New Jersey. The Church Attorney need not reside in or be a member of the Diocese. The Church Attorney may not be the Chancellor or a Vice Chancellor of the Diocese or a member of the Standing Committee, the Diocesan Review Committee or the Diocesan Council and may not be from the same law firm as the Chancellor, the Clergy Consultant, or any Lay Assessor. The Ecclesiastical Court shall have the power, with or without cause, to remove (or suspend) the Church Attorney by vote of two-thirds (2/3) of its members. Upon any such removal or suspension, the Standing Committee with the advice and consent of the Ecclesiastical Court, shall appoint a temporary replacement (in the case of a suspension) and shall fill the office of Church Attorney (in the event of a removal).

7. THE CLERGY CONSULTANT

A Clergy Consultant shall be appointed by the Standing Committee with the advice and consent of the Ecclesiastical Court for a term of three (3) years. The Clergy Consultant shall be a confirmed adult communicant of this Church in good standing, learned in the law, and admitted to practice law in the State of New Jersey or a Priest, chaplain or other person familiar with the procedures, alternatives, requirements and consequences of the disciplinary Canons. The Clergy Consultant need not reside in or be a member of the Diocese. The Clergy Consultant may not be the Chancellor or a Vice Chancellor of the Diocese of a member of the Standing Committee, the Diocesan Review Committee or the Diocesan Council and may not be from the same law firm as the Chancellor, the Church Attorney, or any Lay Assessor. The Consultant shall be available to consult with and advise the priest or Deacon and his or her legal advisors at reasonable times prior to the issuance of a Presentment. The Consultant shall explain the rights of the Priest or Deacon and the alternatives available under this Canon. A Priest or Deacon shall be notified of the availability and identity of the Consultant at the earliest of (a) the communication to the Priest or Deacon of a Charge; (b) any interrogation or request for a statement; (c) the service of a Temporary Inhibition; (d) submission to the Ecclesiastical Authority; or (e) prior to the Execution of a Waiver and Voluntary Submission to Discipline. All communications between the Consultant and the Priest or Deacon, or his or her legal advisors shall be Privileged Communications. No Consultant shall be required to respond to any questions regarding any Priest or Deacon for whom the Consultant has acted as a Consultant. The expenses of the Consultant shall be the obligation of the Diocese.

8. RIGHT TO COUNSEL

In all proceedings under the disciplinary Canons, whenever a Priest or Deacon suspected of an offense is required or permitted to appear, the Priest or Deacon shall have the right to be represented by counsel of her or his own choice. The right shall be in addition to the right to the advice and assistance of the Clergy Consultant.

9. DUTY TO APPEAR, RESPOND AND GIVE TESTIMONY

Except as otherwise expressly provided by Canon, it shall be the duty of all Members of this Church to appear and testify or respond when duly served with a Notice or Citation by the Standing Committee or the Ecclesiastical Court in any matter arising under the disciplinary Canons of this Church.

CANON 18 THE PRESENTMENT AND TRIAL OF A PRESBYTER OR DRACON

A. DIOCESAN REVIEW COMMITTEE

- 1. There shall be a Diocesan Review Committee which shall be composed of four (4) Priests or Deacons elected by the Convention for a term of four (4) years and three (3) Lay Persons, who are confirmed adult communicants of this Church in good standing, elected by the Convention for a term of three (3) years. No member of the Diocesan Review Committee may be a member of the Standing Committee or the Ecclesiastical Court.
- Vacancies on the Diocesan Review Committee shall be filled by the Standing Committee until the next succeeding Diocesan Convention.
- Annually within two (2) months following the Convention, the Diocesan Review Committee shall organize itself to include the election of a President and a Secretary from among its members.
 - 4. Five (5) members of the Diocesan Review Committee shall constitute a quorum.
- 5. If the person against whom a Charge or Complaint is made is a Member of the Diocesan Review Committee or if the Diocesan Review Committee is not able to consider a Charge or a Complaint, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall arrange to have the Charge or Complaint reviewed by the Diocesan Review Committee of another Diocese within Province II reasonably convenient to both parties.

B. PRESENTMENTS

- A Presentment to the Ecclesiastical Court may be issued only by the Diocesan Review Committee as provided in this Canon.
- A Charge against a Priest or Deacon shall be in writing, verified and addressed to the Diocesan Review Committee of the Diocese wherein the Priest or Deacon is canonically resident,

except as otherwise expressly provided in this Title. It shall concisely and clearly inform as to the nature of and facts surrounding each alleged Offense.

3. A Charge may be made:

- (a) by a majority of the lay Members of the Vestry of the Parish of which the Respondent is the Rector:
- (b) by any three Priests canonically resident in the Diocese wherein the Respondent is canonically resident or canonically resident in the Diocese wherein the Respondent is alleged to have committed the Offense; or
- (c) by any seven adult communicants in good standing in the Diocese wherein the Respondent is canonically resident or in the Diocese wherein the Respondent is alleged to have committed the Offense; or
- (d) in a case where the alleged Offense is the violation of Ordination vows involving the disregard or disobedience of a Pastoral Direction issued by a Bishop, only by that Bishop or the Ecclesiastical Authority of that Diocese, or by another Bishop, if the Bishop who issued the Pastoral Direction has resigned, retired, or died or is unable to act; or
- (e) in a case where the Offense alleged is a Charge specifying the Offenses of Crime, Immorality or Conduct Unbecoming a Member of the Clergy, by any adult who is (i) the alleged Victim, or (ii) a parent or guardian of an alleged minor Victim or of an alleged Victim who is under a disability, or (iii) the spouse or adult child of a Victim; or
- (f) in a case where the Offense alleged is that of holding and teaching publicly or privately any doctrine contrary to that held by this Church only, by a majority of the members of the Diocesan Review Committee of the Diocesa in which the Member of the Clergy is canonically resident or of the Diocesa wherein the Respondent is alleged to have committed the Offense; or
- (g) by a majority of the Diocesan Review Committee of the Diocese in which the Member of the Clergy is canonically resident or of the Diocese wherein the Respondent is alleged to have committed the Offense whenever the Diocesan Review Committee shall have good and sufficient reason to believe that any Priest or Deacon has committed the Offense; or
- (h) the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese in which the Respondent is alleged to have committed the Offense, if different from the Diocese of canonical residence.
- 4. If a complaint or accusation is brought to the Bishop by an adult who is (i) the alleged Victim, or (ii) a parent or guardian of an alleged minor Victim or of an alleged Victim who is under a disability, or (iii) the spouse of an alleged Victim, of an Offense of Crime, Immorality or Conduct Unbecoming a Member of the Clergy, the Bishop, after consultation with the alleged Victim, the alleged Victim's spouse, or the alleged Victim's parent or guardian or adult child, may appoint an Attorney to assist those persons in understanding and participating in the

disciplinary processes of this church, obtain assistance to formulate and submit an appropriate Charge and in obtaining assistance in spiritual matters, if the Victim, spouse, parent or guardian so choose. Any alleged victim or Complainant may be represented by an attorney and/or advocate of their choice.

- 5. Whenever the Bishop has sufficient reason to believe that any Priest or Deacon canonically resident in this Diocese has committed an Offense and the interests and good order and discipline of the church require investigation by the Diocesan Review Committee, the Bishop shall concisely and clearly inform the Diocesan Review Committee in writing as to the nature and facts surrounding each alleged Offense and the specification of each Offense but without judgment or comment upon the allegations or guilt, and the Diocesan Review Committee shall proceed as if a Charge had been filed.
- 6. Any Priest or Deacon canonically resident in this Diocese who deems himself or herself to be under imputation, by rumor or otherwise, of any Offense or misconduct for which he or she could be tried in an Ecclesiastical Court, may on his or her own behalf complain to and request of the Bishop that an inquiry with regard to such imputation be instituted. Upon receipt of such request by a member of the clergy, it shall be the duty of the Bishop to cause the matter to be investigated and to report the result to the Priest or Deacon.
- Any Charge against a Priest or Deacon shall be promptly filed with the President of the Diocesan Review Committee.
- Upon the filing of a Charge with the Diocesan Review Committee, the Diocesan Review Committee shall promptly communicate the same to the Bishop and the Respondent.
- 9. In a case of a Priest or Deacon canonically resident in this Diocese convicted in a criminal Court of Record in a cause involving Immorality, or against whom a judgment has been entered in a civil Court of Record in a cause involving Immorality, the Priest or Deacon shall notify the Ecclesiastical Authority of the diocese in which the priest or Deacon is canonically resident, in writing, of such conviction or entry of judgment, within thirty days thereof, whether or not any time for appeal has expired. It shall be the duty of the Ecclesiastical Authority to give notice of the conviction or entry of judgment to the Diocesan Review Committee of the Diocesan Review Committee shall otherwise have knowledge of such conviction of judgment, it shall be the duty of the Diocesan Review Committee to institute an inquiry into the matter. If the conviction or judgment be established, the Diocesan Review Committee shall issue a Presentment against the Priest or Deacon for Trial.
- 10. Within thirty days after the filing of a Charge, other than a Charge alleging a conviction in a criminal Court of Record in a cause involving Immorality or alleging the entry of a judgment in a civil Court of Record in a cause involving Immorality, the Diocesan Review Committee shall convene to consider the Charge. If after such consideration the Diocesan Review Committee determines that an Offense may have occurred if the facts alleged be true, the Diocesan Review Committee shall prepare a written general statement of the Charge and the facts alleged to support the Charge and transmit the same to the Church Attorney.

- 11. The Church Attorney shall promptly make such investigation of the matter.
- 12. Within sixty days after receipt of the statement from the Diocesan Review Committee, unless delayed for good and sufficient cause stated, the Church Attorney shall render a confidential Report to the Diocesan Review Committee of the findings of that investigation and as to whether or not an Offense may have been committed if the facts disclosed by the investigation be found to be true upon Trial, and with a recommendation as to the matter in the interest of justice and the good order and discipline of this Church and based upon such other matters as shall be pertinent. The Report of the Church Attorney shall be confidential for all purposes as between the Church Attorney and the Diocesan Review Committee. Provided, however, the Diocesan Review Committee shall share the Report of the Church Attorney with the Bishop of the Diocesa.
- 13. Within thirty days after the receipt of the Report of the Church Attorney, the Diocesan Review Committee shall convene to consider the Report and whether or not a Presentment shall issue. In its deliberations, the Diocesan Review Committee may consider the Church Attorney's Report, responsible writings or sworm statements pertaining to the matter, including expert's statement, whether or not submitted by the Church Attorney. The Diocesan Review Committee shall issue a Presentment for an Offense when the information before it, if proved at Trial, provides Reasonable Cause to believe that (i) an Offense was committed, and (ii) the Respondent committed the Offense.
- 14. A vote of a majority of all the members of the Diocesan Review Committee shall be required to issue a Presentment. No member shall disclose his or her vote or the vote of any member to any person not a member of the Diocesan Review Committee. In the event that, due to members who have been excused or vacancies in office, the Diocesan Review Committee does not have sufficient voting members to meet the requirements of this Section, the action of the Diocesan Review Committee shall be postponed until such time as there are sufficient members in office to fulfill the voting requirements of this Section.
- 15. If a Presentment be issued, it shall be in writing, dated, and signed by the President or the Secretary of the Diocesan Review Committee on behalf of the Diocesan Review Committee whether or not that officer voted in favor of the Presentment. In the event that there be no President or Secretary, or they be absent, a member of the Diocesan Review Committee appointed for that purpose shall sign the Presentment. The Presentment also shall contain (i) a separate accusation addressed to each Offense, if there be more than one, and (ii) a plain and concise factual statement of each separate accusation sufficient to clearly apprise the Respondent of the conduct which is the subject of the Presentment.
- 16. Promptly after the issuance of a Presentment, the Diocesan Review Committee shall cause the original to be filed with the President of the Ecclesiastical Trial Court with a true copy thereof served upon the Bishop, the Respondent, the Clergy Consultant, the Church Attorney and each Complainant and, unless waived in writing, the alleged Victim, and the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese in which the Respondent is canonically resident, in which the Respondent is licensed, and in which the Respondent resides.

- 17. If the Diocesan Review Committee votes not to issue a Presentment, then that decision shall be in writing and shall include an explanation. A copy shall be served upon the Bishop who shall file it with the Secretary of the Convention of the Diocese, the Respondent, The Clergy Consultant, the Church Attorney, each Complainant, and unless waived in writing, the alleged Victim.
- 18. Prior to the issuance of a Presentment or a determination not to issue a Presentment as the case may be, the matter shall be confidential, except as may be determined to be pastorally appropriate by the Ecclesiastical Authority.
- 19. Non-compliance with time limits set forth in this Canon shall not be grounds for the dismissal of a Presentment unless such non-compliance shall cause material and substantial injustice to be done or seriously prejudice the rights of an Respondent as determined by the Trial Court on motion and hearing.

C. TRIALS

- Ecclesiastical Courts shall be governed by the Rules of Procedure set forth in Appendix A to the Canons of the Episcopal Church and other such procedural rules or determination as the Ecclesiastical Court deems appropriate and not inconsistent with such Canons, and by The Federal Rules of Evidence in the conduct of the Trial.
- 2. The Ecclesisstical Court shall keep a record of the proceedings in each case brought before it and the record shall be certified by the Presiding Judge of the Court. If the record cannot be authenticated by the Presiding Judge by reason of the Presiding Judge's death, disability or absence, it shall be authenticated by a member of the Court designated for that purpose by majority vote of the Court.
- 3. The Ecclesiastical Court shall permit the Respondent to be heard in person, and by the Clergy Consultant, and by counsel of the Respondent's own selection. In every Trial the Court may regulate the number of counsel who may address the Court or examine witnesses.
- (a) Upon receiving a Presentment, the Presiding Judge shall, within thirty days, send to each member of the Court a copy of the Presentment.
- (b) The Presiding Judge of the Court shall, within note more than three calendar months from the Presiding Judge's receipt of the Presentment, summon the Respondent to answer the Presentment in accordance with the Rules of Procedure.
- (c) Respondent's answer or other response to the Presentment in accordance with the Rules of Procedure shall be duly recorded and the Trial shall proceed; Provided, that for sufficient cause the Court may adjourn from time to time; and Provided, also, that the Respondent shall, at all times during the Trial, have liberty to be present, and may be accompanied by the Clergy Consultant or other counsel and one other person of his or her own choosing, and in due time and order to produce testimony and to make a defense.
- (d) If the Respondent fails or refuses to answer or otherwise enter an appearance, except for reasonable cause to be allowed by the Court, the Church Attorney may, no sooner than thirty days after the answer is due, move for Summary Judgment of Offense in accordance with

the Rules of Procedure. If the motion is granted, the Respondent shall be given notice that Sentence of Admonition, Suspension or Deposition will be adjudged and pronounced by the Court at the expiration of thirty days after the date of the Notice of Sentence, or at such convenient time thereafter as the Court shall determine. Sentence of Admonition, Suspension or of Deposition from the Ordained Ministry may, thereafter, be adjudged and pronounced by the Court.

- 5. In all Ecclesiastical Trials, the Church Attorney shall appear on behalf of the Diocese which shall then be considered the party on one side and the Respondent the party on the other. Each Complainant or alleged Victim shall be entitled to be present throughout and observe the trial and for each to be accompanied by counsel or another person of their own choosing.
- 6. Before a vote is taken on the findings and in the presence of the Respondent and counsel, counsel for the parties may submit requested proposed instructions. The Presiding Judge of the Ecclesiastical Court, after consultation with the Lay Assessors, shall declare which of the proposed instructions shall be issued and also instruct the members of the court as to the elements of the Offense and charge them (i) that the Respondent must be presumed to be innocent until the Respondent's guilt is established by clear and convincing evidence, and unless such standard of proof be met the Respondent must be acquitted, and (ii) that the burden of proof to establish the Respondent's commission of the Offense is upon the Church Attorney in the name of the Diocese.
- 7. A separate vote shall be taken first upon the findings as to the commission of an offence by the Respondent. The Presiding Judge shall cause the Respondent, the Clergy Consultant, the Church Attorney, each Complainant, and, unless waived in writing, the alleged Victim to be advised of and provided with a copy of the findings of the Court.
- 8. For a Judgment that the Respondent has committed an Offence, the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the Members of the Ecclesiastical Court then serving for the Trial shall be necessary. Failing such two-thirds vote, the Presentment shall be dismissed.
- 9. No vote shall be taken on the Sentence to be imposed until at least thirty days after the Priest or Deacon, the Clergy Consultant, the Church Attorney, each Complainant and, unless waived in writing, the Victim have been informed of the Judgment and each has had a reasonable opportunity to offer matters in excuse or mitigation or to otherwise comment on the Sentence. All matters in excuse or mitigation or comments on the Sentence shall be served on the Respondent, Church Attorney, Complainants and, unless waived in writing, the Victim. The Court shall provide a reasonable time for response to the Court which shall also be served as provided above. The Court may schedule hearings on the submissions. The Members of the Court shall vote upon the Sentence.
- 10. The concurrence of not less than two-thirds of the members of the Ecclesiastical Court the serving for that Trial shall be necessary to adjudge and impose a Sentence upon a Priest or Deacon found to have committed an Offense. The Court shall then vote upon a sentence to be adjudged and imposed upon the Priest or Deacon and the decision so signed shall be recorded as the Judgment of the Court. The decision of the Court as to all the Charges shall be reduced to

writing, and signed by those who assent to it.

11. The Judgment and any Sentence adjudged on a Judgment shall be communicated promptly to the Bishop of the Diocese wherein the Trial was held, the Ecclesiastical Authority, if there be no Bishop, the Standing Committee, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese in which the Respondent is canonically resident, the Priest or Deacon, the Clergy Consultant, the Church Attorney, each Complainant, and, unless waived in writing, the Victim.

D. TEMPORARY INHIBITIONS

- 1. If a priest or deacon is charged with an Offenses or Offenses or serious acts are complained of to the Bishop that would constitute the grounds for a Charge of an Offense and, in the opinion of the Bishop, the Charge is supported by sufficient facts, the Bishop may issue a Temporary Inhibition.
- 2. Any Temporary Inhibition shall: (i) be in writing, (ii) set forth the reasons for its issuance, (iii) be specific in its terms, (iv) define the Offense or Offenses charged or serious acts complained of, (v) describe in reasonable detail the act or acts inhibited, (vi) be promptly served upon the Priest or Deacon to be inhibited, and (vii) become effective upon being served upon the Priest or Deacon to be inhibited.
- A Temporary Inhibition may be issued without prior written or oral notice to the Priest or Deacon.
- 4. Any Priest or Deacon against whom a Temporary Inhibition has been issued, modified or extended may request a hearing concerning the Temporary Inhibition before the Diocesan Review Committee, which shall hear the same at the earliest possible time, but not later than fourteen days after the date of receipt of the request. The Diocesan Review Committee by a two-thirds vote may dissolve or modify the Temporary Inhibition. The Bishop, the Clergy Consultant and the Church Attorney shall be given notice of such hearing and shall be permitted to attend and be heard.
 - 5. At any time, a Bishop may dissolve or reduce the terms of a Temporary Inhibition.
- 6. A Temporary Inhibition shall continue in full force and effect until the earlier of (i) the issuance of an Inhibition as otherwise permitted by Title IV of the Canons of the Episcopal Church, (ii) the withdrawal of the Charge or the allegations, (iii) the refusal of the Diocesan Review Committee to make a Presentment on the Charges alleged, (iv) dissolution of the Temporary Inhibition, (v) imposition of a Sentence following a voluntary submission to discipline, or (vi) a period of ninety days measured from the date of service of the Temporary Inhibition; provided, however, the ninety-day period may be extended by the Bishop upon the advice and consent of a majority of all the members of the Diocesan Review Committee for additional ninety-day periods upon good cause.
- 7. In the event the Temporary Inhibition is dissolved or reduced or otherwise expires, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall so notify all persons to whom notice of the issuance of

the Temporary Inhibition was given.

8. If a Presentment has been made by the Diocesan Review Committee against a Priest or Deacon, or if a Priest or Deacon has been convicted in a criminal Court of Record in a cause involving Immorality, or if a judgment has been entered against a Priest or Deacon in a civil Court of Record in a cause involving Immorality, the Bishop may issue an Inhibition to the Priest or Deacon until after the judgment of the Ecclesiastical Trial Court becomes final.

CANON 19 AMENDMENTS

1. COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND CANONS

The Committee on Constitution and Canons shall consist of ten (10) members elected at each Annual Convention, who shall serve from the adjournment of said Annual Convention until the adjournment of the next Annual Convention, and the Chancellor who shall be a member ex officio and shall serve as its chair and one vice chancellor, if there be any, to be named to the committee by the Chancellor. Vacancies in the interim shall be filled by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

2. ADOPTION OF AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION AND CANONS

Unless unanimous consent be given by the Convention for the introduction of amendments to the Constitution or the introduction of amendments to the Canons, no such Amendment shall be considered unless it be submitted by its proponents seventy-five (75) days before the Convention meets. The Committee shall transmit a copy of such proposed amendment to the Secretary of Convention and may recommend to the Convention that the amendment be adopted or that it be rejected. A proposed amendment may also be submitted by the Committee without recommendation. The Committee may suggest however to the proponent of an amendment changes which, if made in the proposed amendment, would secure the Committee's favorable recommendation. If the proponent does not accept the Committee's proposed change or changes, the Committee may transmit to the Secretary of the Convention both the proponent's original proposed amendment and the substitute amendment as recommended by the Committee. The Secretary of the Convention shall distribute copies of all proposed amendments to each person entitled to receive notice of the meeting of the Convention.

3. EFFECTIVE DATE OF AMENDMENTS

All amendments to the Canons shall take effect immediately upon their adoption unless otherwise provided.

CANON 20 INTERPRETATION OF CANONS

Any person, being either a presbyter of this Diocese or a member of a congregation of this
Diocese, having a bona fide question as to the proper interpretation or application of the
Constitution or Canons of the Diocese may pose such question to the Chancellor in writing. The
Chancellor shall thereafter render a formal written opinion responding to the question. Such

written opinion shall be provided to the person propounding the question, and copies thereof shall be filed with the Bishop, the Standing Committee and the Secretary of Convention, and copies thereof shall be mailed to all Presbyters of the Diocese.

- 2. All such formal written opinions of the Chancellor shall be submitted by the Secretary of Convention to the Committee on Constitution and Canons within thirty (30) days after filing. Within sixty (60) days of receipt, the Committee on Constitution and Canons shall render an opinion by the affirmative vote of a majority of its members, affirming, rejecting or modifying the opinion of the Chancellor. The opinion of the Committee shall be in writing. Such written opinion shall be provided to the person propounding the question, and copies thereof shall be filed with the Bishop, the Standing Committee and the Secretary of Convention, and copies thereof shall be mailed to all Presbyters of the Diocese and, prior to the next regular meeting of the Convention of the Diocese, to all lay members thereof. Upon such filing, the decision of the Committee on Constitution and Canons shall have the legal force of Canon until the next meeting of the Diocesan Convention, at which such decision shall be either confirmed or overruled by a majority of members thereof.
- 3. Upon confirmation by Convention, such ruling shall have the force of Canon until amended or repealed as provided in Canon 19 above.

CANON 21 SERVICE ON MULTIPLE COMMITTEES

No elected or appointed person shall serve as a member of more than one (1) of the following bodies at the same time: the Standing Committee, the Diocesan Council, and the ACTS/VIM Board.
