137th ANNUAL CONVENTION - DIOCESE OF NEWARK HILTON HOTEL, PARSIPPANY - JANUARY 28 & 29, 2011 CONVENTION MINUTES

The 137th Annual Convention of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Newark was held on Friday, January 28, and Saturday, January 29, 2011 at the Hilton Hotel, Parsippany, New Jersey. The theme of the convention was "Stepping Out in Audacious Faith."

FRIDAY SESSION January 28, 2011

The Friday Eucharist was held in the hotel ballroom; the Saturday worship service was Morning Prayer and held in the hotel ballroom. The worship service offering was designated for the Light on Main project of St. John's Church in Boonton, and the Meeting Emergency Needs with Dignity (MEND) organization in East Orange serving Essex County. The total collected was \$4,189.

Workshops were held on Friday morning at 10am, followed by the Candidates' Forum at 11:00 am when individuals standing for election to diocesan offices presented themselves to the deputies for questioning. A lunch was served at 12 noon prior to the start of the worship service and the business session. The workshop topics included: Interfaith Leadership in Divisive Times; Denominational Health Plan/Lay Pensions; Worship: One Size Does Not Fit All; and, Options for Senior Support: Where Do We Start?

FRIDAY AFTERNOON SESSION January 28, 2011

The Eucharist was celebrated at 1:30 p.m. in the Grand Ballroom. The Rt. Rev. Mark M. Beckwith, Diocesan Bishop, was the celebrant. The Rev. Julio Murray, Bishop of the Diocese of Panama, was the preacher. The UTO Ingathering was held during the service.

The Rt. Rev. John S. Spong and the Rt. Rev. Jack Croneberger attended the Friday business session and the Friday evening dinner.

The business session was called to order at 3:15 p.m. by Bishop Beckwith, President, and opened with prayer by The Rev. Alex MacDonell, Chaplain.

APPOINTMENT OF THE CHAPLAINS

The President appointed The Rev. Diana Clark, The Rev. Willie Smith, The Rev. Robert C. Morris and The Rev. Alex MacDonell as the Convention Chaplains and noted that they would provide prayer at times when and as needed during the business sessions.

APPOINTMENT OF THE PARLIAMENTARIANS

The President appointed Diane Sammons, Esq., and Carol Harrison-Arnold, Esq., as the parliamentarians.

RESOLUTIONS ON NEW MATTERS

Three resolutions were presented to the deputies for consideration and action.

RESOLUTION OF COURTESY

Ms. Teresse Myers, Newark ACTS Intern, moved the resolution of Courtesy as follows:

RESOLVED, That the courtesy of seat and voice be accorded to the following: officers of the Diocese of Newark; Clergy licensed to officiate in the Diocese of Newark: Gary Blumer, Barton Brown, Matthew Engleby, James Robert Hagler, Barbara Lewis, Scot McComas, Elizabeth Myers, Reginald Nuama, Margaret Obama, Rogello Panton, Stephen Rozzelle, Robert F. Shearer, and Bruce Woodcock; Lay members of the Standing Committee, the Diocesan Council, the Commission on Ministry, the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties and the diocesan staff; Members of committees, commissions and institutions reporting to the Convention; the Sisters of the Community of St. John Baptist; Ecumenical Guests; and Postulants and Candidates for Holy Orders.

RULES OF ORDER COMMITTEE

The Rev. Dr. Jane Tomaine, chair of the Rules of Order and Elections Committee, reported that the committee met on October 26, 2010 to consider any proposed changes to the Rules. The Committee reviewed the Rules of Order as amended and adopted by the 136th Convention and received a report from the Nominations

Committee elected under the terms of those Rules of Order.

The Nominations Committee worked to meet its mandate to provide more candidates than vacancies and submitted its list of candidates for consideration by the 137th Diocesan Convention.

The Committee on Rules of Order and Elections recommends that the Rules of Order adopted for the 136th Diocesan Convention be adopted for the 137th Diocesan Convention along with the two modifications to the sections listed below – Section VI. G, Rules of Order and Section XI. Rules of Order. [New text is bolded.]

Section VI. G: Rules of Order

G. For all elections vote shall be by ballot, each deputy having one vote for each vacancy to be filled. Those candidates receiving a majority of the valid ballots cast shall be elected. If no candidate receives a majority of the valid ballots cast, subsequent ballots shall be taken until elected candidates shall have filled all vacant positions. When several terms are to be filled the candidate receiving the highest number of votes will fill the term of the longest duration and the other candidates will fill terms in descending order based on the number of votes received. For General Convention Deputies only, election requires a concurrent majority in both orders.

Reason:

This is a codification of long standing practice. The Committee recommends the addition of this rule to clarify the process used in electing candidates,

Section XI: Rules of Order

XI. No motion shall be considered as before Convention unless seconded, and, when required by the President, reduced to writing and signed b the mover, whose name shall be entered on the journal. Each proposed amendment to a resolution made during floor debate must be submitted in writing to the Secretary of Convention immediately after being moved, so that it can be projected onto the screen for floor consideration.

Reason:

The Committee recommends this change to facilitate an easier and more efficient processing and review of proposed amendments.

Article II, Section 7 - Quorum and Manner of Voting

The Committee contacted the Committee on Constitution and Canons to formally request an amendment to Article II, Section 7, of the Constitution that "Presbyters," which excludes Deacons, be changed to "Ciergy" to include both priests and deacons.

The process to change the Constitution takes Convention votes in two consecutive years.

Responsibilities of Deputies and Visitors

The Committee provided suggestions for the conduct during the business meeting. This was offered as a benefit to the group,

RIGHTS OF LAY DEPUTIES

The Rev. PROVINCE II - EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECOGNITION

The presence of Mr. Chuck Perfater, Province II Executive Director, was recognized by the president with appreciation for his ministry.

CONGREGATIONAL GRANTS AND LOANS

The Rev. Canon Gregory Jacobs, Canon to the Ordinary and Chief of Staff, reported on the grants and loans that were available to congregations through the ACTS/VIM Fund, the Ward J. Herbert Fund (WJH), Episcopal Capital Loan Fund (ECLF), the Allelula Fund, the Marge Christie Fund, the Blahop's Church Extension Fund (BCEF), and the Congregational Growth and Development Endowment Fund. In 2010, over \$637,000 were provided to congregations for social justice, mission, outreach, property needs and ministry programs. The funding included: 28 WJH Grants totaling \$169,225; 40 ACTS/VIM Grants totaling \$140,000; five new ECLF loans of \$185,831; 23 Allelula Grants totaling \$111,000; five BCEF grants totaling \$27,730; and, 13 congregational consultants' subsidies totaling \$3,800.

Last fall, the Congregational Grants and Loans Task Force was established to review the application processes for the different funds with the objectives of recommending a common application form and a common administrative process to make the application process simpler for use. Too few congregations were availing themselves of the funds. The members of the task force were Ms. Patrice Henderson, St. Andrew & Holy Communion, South Orange, member of the Standing Committee; Ms. Pat Yankus, St.

Paul's, Paterson, member of the Ward J. Herbert Boarc; The Rev. Diane Riley, Deacon; Mr. Jim VanLeuven, Grace, Madison, member of the ACTS/VIM Board; Mr. Aubrey Thompson, Christ Church, Teaneck, member of the ACTS/VIM Board; Mr. Robert Simmons, Christ Church, East Orange, member of the Ward J. Herbert Board; Canon Greg Jacobs, task force chair; and Mr. Michael Francaviglia, staff liaison.

The congregational consultants who were present were asked to stand for recognition.

HUMAN RESOURCES ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Mr. Hook Bailey, Christ Church, Short Hills, and chair of the Bishop's Advisory Committee on Human Resources, and The Rev. Lauren Ackland, Grace, Madison, presented the committee's report and the three resolutions on clergy compensation for adoption. The other members of the committee were recognized: Ms. Patty Bradley, Holy Trinity, Hillsdale; Ms. Charlotte Chappel, House of Prayer, Newark; The Rev. John Negrotto; Ms. Lindsay McHugh, St. George's, Maplewood; Mr. John Niles, All Saints', Hoboken; Dr. Matthew Price, St. Stephen's, Millburn; and staff members, Ms. Linda Curtiss, Ms. Leslie Thomas and Mr. Michael Francaviglia.

Resolution 1: Minimum Cash Salary for Clergy: Adopted.

RESOLVED, that the 137th Convention of the Diocese of Newark adopts the following minimum salary standards for full-time clergy serving parishes or missions in the Diocese, effective January 1, 2012: Transitional Deacon, \$31,900; Assisting Priest, \$33,950; and Rector, Vicar, or Priest-in-charge, \$42,500.

Resolution 2: Recommended Merit Increase Scale: Adopted.

RESOLVED, that the 137th Convention of the Diocese of Newark recommends the following scale, effective January 1, 2012, for annual merit increases in salaries paid to clergy in the Diocese: Outstanding, 4-7%; Very Good, 2-5%; Satisfactory, up to 3%.

Before the vote was taken, comments were made that few churches were able to afford merit increases even when it was recognized that the clergy were performing at an outstanding level.

Resolution 3: Recommended Minimum Clergy Supply Rate: Adopted.

RESOLVED, That the 137th Convention of the Diocese of Newark adopts the following minimum standard for remuneration to supply ciergy at a fixed rate per worship service plus the IRS approved mileage rate for travel to and from the church.

The rates being: Sundays - \$200 for one service plus \$100 for each additional service; and Weekdays - \$100 per service.

And be it FURTHER RESOLVED that, for those supply clergy who so desire, this remuneration be declared eligible for the clergy housing allowance exclusion upon the passage of a resolution by the vestry or executive committee so designating.

Before the vote was taken, comments were made that the rate was too high for smaller, individual congregations; perhaps a rate could be determined for churches that were worshipping together; that the recommendation was a resolution and not a canon that required compliance; and the previous recommendation had been a negotiable sliding scale that was uncomfortable for churches and clergy.

Resolution 2011-02: Anti-racism Dialogues (Training) submitted by Namaste (The Rev. Dr. Alitson Moore; The Rev. Joseph A. Harmon; Ms. Kitty Kawecki; The Rev. Canon Dr. Sandye Wilson; The Rev. Willie Smith; The Very Rev. Susan Keller; The Rev. Canon Gregory Jacobs; The Rev. Rosa Brown Autry) was adopted as amended.

During the discussion prior to the vote, it was noted that resolution applied to congregational representatives to their districts. LISTENING CAMPAIGN REPORT

The Rev. Laurie Wurm, St. John's, Boonton, and member of the Engaging the World Action Team of Diocesan Council, reported on the Listening Campaign held in the diocese during the past half year, providing insights and reactions that were raised in the conversations. Fifty-two congregations held the "kitchen table conversations" and all ten districts participated. The kitchen table conversations each had two listeners who met with church representatives. These conversations gave a fair sense of where we are as a diocese. The sessions offered time for people to tell their stories.

Insights from the listening sessions were: financial and membership declines were having a significant impact on most of the visited churches; engaging the outside world in new ways appeared to be the way forward to many of these churches but they were struggling with how to do it; churches impacted by financial and membership declines that have begun to engage the world in new ways were spiritually healthier than those

that have not. In some cases, these churches were also fiscally healthler and growing in membership; stronger lay leadership was emerging at churches in clergy transitions and at churches where membership had declined; challenges were being posed to the prevailing assumption that churches with part-time clergy could not have vibrant ministries or be considered healthy; and, measuring church vitality could not be done within the "one size fits all" framework of parochial reports.

Questions resulting from the Listening Campaign were: What is God calling our churches and our Diocese to do? Is employing a full time clergy person at a package cost of \$100,000 a year when the median income in a church is significantly less really the only model for a vibrant church? Can we create new tools to measure church vitality? How do we more effectively share resources? How can the Diocese foster and be part of a more relational culture between our churches?

The next step was to continue the conversations and a session was scheduled for Saturday, March 5, 2011.

GREENFAITH - ENERGY STEWARDSHIP

The Rev. Fletcher Harper, Executive Director of GreenFalth, presented ways in which churches could be environmental leaders and be fiscally responsible. GreenFalth provided a comprehensive religious-environmental training program, the GreenFalth Fellowship Program, to prepare lay and ordained leaders from diverse religious traditions for religiously based environmental leadership. GreenFalth Certification Program for congregations, helping them to embrace environmental stewardship while saving money, boosting engagement of their members, and serving as powerful examples to their community, their denominations, and the world.

During the presentation, the convention pages distributed compact fluorescent bulbs to the deputies. It was noted that each bulb will save its new owner over \$40 in energy costs over the bulb's life, and prevent over 600 pounds of air pollution and greenhouse gas emissions. The combined savings for the 600 bulbs distributed at Convention will be over \$24,000, and the environmental benefit will be the equivalent of removing 30 cars from the road for a full year.

4 MISSION MINUTES

Bringing Children Closer to God: How four congregations are stepping out in audacious faith

Bishop Beckwith introduced the second of three Mission Minutes (video presentations). This segment highlighted three congregations and one diocesan ministry that have taken bold steps on behalf of children, meeting their needs for understanding God and coping with the challenges of the world around them. The three congregations were St. Andrew's, Harrington Park; All Saints', Hoboken; and, St. Paul's, Paterson; the diocesan ministry was the Prison Ministry and its work with the PATCH (Parents and Their

Children) program of the Offender Aid and Restoration organization,

The deputations from Harrington Park, Hoboken and Paterson were asked to stand for recognition.

MISSION TRIPS

The Rev. Orion Davis, St. Mary's, Sparta, described the adult mission trip to "Almost Heaven" Habitat for Humanity in Pendleton County, West Virginia for July 10-16, 2011. Deputies and others were invited to participate in the trip. "Almost Heaven" completed its 100th house this past year. The work would include the framing of a new home during the five days.

COMPANION DIOCESE COMMITTEE

The Rev. Joseph Harmon, Church of the Incarnation, Jersey City, and The Rev. Robert Griner, Christ Church, Newton and chair of the Committee, presented the report from the Companion Diocese Committee. The relationship was begun five years ago during which time delegations from the two dioceses visited each other. The committee moved a resolution to extend the relationship for another three years.

RESOLVED, That this 137th Convention authorize the Companion Diocese Committee to proceed with all deliberate speed to continue the development and elaboration of our relationship with the Episcopal Church of Panama for another three years and encourage the development of ongoing relationships at all levels of diocesan life in the Episcopal Diocese of Newark and the Episcopal Church of Panama.

The resolution was adopted.

The committee invited churches to consider establishing a Panama Congregation Connection. The meeting was scheduled for Saturday, February 12 at Christ Church, Newton.

A video was presented on the recent visit to Panama by a Newark delegation that included Bishop Beckwith, Canon Jacobs, The Rev. Joseph Harmon and Mr. Bert Jones. The video was produced by Ms. Diane Wilcox.

The Arrangements Committee members and Pages distributed and collected the number five ballot to the deputies who remained seated at their tables. The fifth ballot was for the election of the General Convention lay and clergy deputies (one in each order).

CROSS ROADS OUTDOOR MINISTRIES

Mr. Anthony Briggs, executive director, described the ministry of camp and conference centers as the ministry of recreation and play. He asked the deputies to all sing the song *My Bonnie Lies over the Ocean* in verse and movement. He shared the comments from a parent that described her child's experience at camp and the positive changes that occurred in her son because of his time spent at Cross Roads.

The Rev. Willie Smith, chaplain, offered noon day prayers before the lunch break. The Necrology was read by The Rev. Robert C. Morris and The Rev. Diana Clark, chaplains.

AFTERNOON BUSINESS SESSION

CHAPLAIN'S PRAYER

<u>Chaplain's Prayer</u> - The afternoon business session was opened with prayer led by The Rev. Robert C. Morris, Chaplain.

Bishop Beckwith recognized the clergy spouses and partners who had attended a lunch during the break hosted by Ms. Marilyn Olson. They joined the session for the afternoon.

COMMISSION ON MINISTRY – INTRODUCTION OF THE POSTULANTS & CANDIDATES

Mr. Paul Shackford, St. Andrew's, Harrington Park, and chair of the COM, outlined the goals of the Commission for the year that included expanded and continued support for the laity and their ministry; and, a discemment conference scheduled for Saturday, April 2, 2011 for people discerning their ministries – priest, deacon, laity (this was part of the modified process toward ordination). The Commission on Ministry in the Diocese of Newark consists of three committees: the Committee on the Priesthood (whose principal responsibility is with those in the priestly ordination process); the Committee on the Diaconate (for those in the diaconal process); and the Committee on the Laity

(whose work is to enhance and provide support for lay ministries).

Mr. Paul Shackford reported three people were made priests in 2010: The Rev. John Marcantino's orders were received from the Roman Catholic Church; and The Rev. Joan Conley, St. Eitzabeth's, Ridgewood, and The Rev. Mary Davis, Calvary, Summit, were ordained to the priesthood in December.

Mr. Paul Shackford Introduced the one candidate in the process for ordination to the transitional diaconate: Ms. Beth Rauen Sciaino, St. George's, Maplewood.

The postulants in the process for ordination to the priesthood were introduced: Mr. Miguel Hernandez, St. John's, Dover; Mr. Rod Perez-Vega, St. Mary's, Belvidere; Ms. Cathle Studwell, St. John the Divine, Hasbrouck Heights; Ms. Diana Wilcox, Redeemer, Morristown; and Mr. Ron Young, St. Peter's, Essex Fells.

He noted that two postulants were unable to attend today - Ms. Ellen Kohn-Perry, St. Peter's, Morristown; and Ms. Christine Pae, St. Peter's Korean Episcopal Church, North Bergen.

COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND CANONS

Diane Sammons, Esq., Chancellor, presented and moved for adoption the proposed amendments to Canon 2 (Requiring anti-racism training); Canon 5 (Increasing the term of Council members); Canon 5, Section 4 (Clarifying Budget Process); Canon 17 (Implementing Title IV); and Article II, Sec. 7 (Voting by Orders). All had been referred to yesterday's open hearing. [The texts of the canons and amendments are printed in the journal.]

Article II. Sec. 7 (Voting by Orders):

This was the first reading of the change to the constitution Article II, Sec. 7 (Voting by Orders) and the change would be introduced for a second reading and adoption next year in 2012.

During the consideration of the amendment to Article II, Sec. 7 (Voting by Orders) of the diocesan constitution, it was moved by The Rev. Kevin Coffey, Atonement, Fair Lawn, to substitute the words "presbyters and deacons" for the word "clergy" that was proposed to replace the word "presbyter" so that bishops would be included. The change was not accepted as a friendly amendment by the Committee. The committee suggested that bishops do vote, reported the Chancellor. (The chancellor responded further when asked if bishops' signatures would count as eligible on a request that a motion be divided or split that the signatures would not count.)

The Coffey amendment to substitute "presbyters and deacons" was defeated and the vote was taken on the resolution as originally presented and proposed.

The amendment was <u>adopted</u> and the word "presbyter" was replaced with the word "clergy."

Canon 2 (Requiring anti-racism training):

The amendment to Canon 2 was presented and adopted.

Canon 5 (Increasing the term of Council members):

The amendment to Canon 5 was presented and adopted.

Canon 5, Section 4 (Clarifying Budget Process):

The amendment to Canon 5 was presented and adopted.

Canon 17 (Implementing Title IV):

The amendment to implement Title IV with the new Canon 17 and elimination of the former Canon 18 was presented and <u>adopted</u>.

Proposed Amendments to the Constitution of The Episcopal Church

The Chancellor read the texts of proposed amendments to the Constitution of the Episcopal Church as required by the 76th General Convention. The reading was required by all dioceses preceding a final vote by the 77th General Convention. The amendments were to B015: Amend Constitution Article I.4; B029: Amend Constitution Article VIII

YOUTH REPORT

Ms. Kalleen Alston, director of Youth and Young Adult Ministry, presented the report on youth ministry. The ministry enhanced young people's relationships with God, each other, the church and their communities. It was unique, dynamic, and multi-cultural. The participants were in grades six through twelve and represented every demographic group and hue and made a beautiful diocesan tapestry. Some came from wealthy homes, some from foster homes and others from homeless shelters. They had different family structures and ethnic backgrounds. Some were adopted; some wished that someone would adopt them from time to time. Most were Episcopalians and some were not: and some had no religious background; and, all were welcomed.

One of the goals of diocesan youth ministry was leadership development with the assistance by adults who nurtured our youth to take the reins as they were able through peer ministry training sessions and other events. The middle school retreat, the high school retreat, Happening and Christophany were led by youth with guidance from adults. Youth participated in the confirmation retreats and had roles in the diocesan conventions. The youth also engaged the wider church: through travel to Panama as part of the companion diocese relationship; participation at the Triennial Episcopal Youth Event (EYE) with other young people from around the world; and attendance at General Conventions in 2006 and 2009 that gave the youth experience with the depth and breadth of the Episcopal Church. The program planted the seed of ministry in their hearts. They return to their home churches ready to be more engaged as parishioners – teach Sunday school, serve as lay Eucharistic ministers and vestry members and lead outreach efforts. They know the church is more diverse than their home or their school. The diocesan budget funded by church pledges helped provide scholarships for those unable to afford the programs and the financial support was appreciated.

ORDER OF THE DAY - 2011 DIOCESAN BUDGET

The Rev. John Mennell, chair of the Budget and Finance Committee, presented the budget for adoption. There were no changes suggested or moved at the hearing.

The budget was adopted without objection.

<u>Chaptain's Prayer</u> – The Rev. Robert C. Morris offered a prayer of thanksgiving following the adoption of the budget.

Bishop Beckwith introduced the third of three Mission Minutes (video presentations). This segment highlighted four congregations that used words, music and outreach to strengthen their worship and those of other faith communities and to stand up against injustice in God's name. The four congregations were St. David's, Kinnelon; St. Luke's, Haworth (worshiping with Our Saviour Lutheran Church); Trinity Church, Bayonne (worshiping with Grace Lutheran Church); and Trinity Episcopal Church, Allendale.

The deputations from Kinnelon, Haworth, Bayonne and Allendale were asked to stand for recognition. Mr. Richard Hogue, narrator of the Mission Minutes and one of the Newark ACTS Interns, was recognized for his work on the minutes.

Ms. Caroline Christie was elected by acclamation the fourth lay deputy.

The Arrangements Committee members and Pages distributed and collected the number six ballot to the deputies who remained seated at their tables. The sixth ballot was for the election of the General Convention clergy and lay alternates. (Not enough paper ballots were ordered; hence ballots were re-used from earlier contests. For the sixth ballot, the ballots numbered as "2" were used.)

STORY TELLING - Stepping Out in Audacious Faith

Ms. Kai Alston introduced the segment for the table conversations and provided the instructions to the deputies. While the stories about Jesus and the apostles are 2,000 years old, God never stopped asking people to have faith and to step out in audacious faith. We are called to be fearlessly bold.

The table exercise was in two parts — deputies were asked to pair off with someone at the tables with some one they knew with one person taking two minutes to tell when they have stepped out in audaclous faith. After two minutes, the people switch and the other person tells their story in how they stepped out in audaclous faith. After both partners told their stories, people at the table took eight minutes total to share what they've learned about each other. What did you learn? How did other's stories strike or inspire you? Then take an additional eight minutes and answer the question how is God calling your congregation to step out in audaclous faith?

ELECTION INSTRUCTIONS Ballot #6

Mr. John Webb instructed the deputies on the election for the clergy and lay alternates to General Convention. There will be four alternates in each order elected by simple majority, the election did not require a concurrent majority.

There were five candidates remaining in the clergy order: Joseph Harmon, Thomas Mathews, John Mennell, John Negrotto and Jon M. Richardson.

There were four candidates remaining in the lay order: Edgar Kim Byham, Marge Christie, Sidney W. King, Jr., and Michael F. Rehill. (Ms. Issie Cherevko had removed her name from contention after the second ballot.)

There were nine ministry partners: Seamen's Church Institute, Port Newark; Christ Hospital, Jersey City; St. Phillip's Academy, Newark; Episcopal Community Develop Corporation, Newark; All Saints' Episcopal Day School, Hoboken; Turning Point Community Services, Irvington; North Porch; the Hoboken Shelter; and the Ali Saints' Jubilee Center, Hoboken.

137th ANNUAL CONVENTION - DIOCESE OF NEWARK

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RULES OF ORDER AND ELECTIONS

The Committee on Rules of Order and Elections met on October 26, 2010 to consider any proposed changes to the Rules. The Committee reviewed the Rules of Order as amended and adopted by the 136th Convention and received a report from the Nominations Committee elected under the terms of those Rules of Order.

The Nominations Committee worked to meet its mandate to provide more candidates than vacancies and submitted its list of candidates for consideration by the 137th Diocesan Convention.

The Committee on Rules of Order and Elections recommends that the Rules of Order adopted for the 136th Diocesan Convention be adopted for the 137th Diocesan Convention <u>along with the two modifications to the sections listed below</u> – Section VI. G, Rules of Order and Section XI, Rules of Order. New text is bolded.

Section VI. G: Rules of Order

G. For all elections vote shall be by ballot, each deputy having one vote for each vacancy to be filled. Those candidates receiving a majority of the valid ballots cast shall be elected. If no candidate receives a majority of the valid ballots cast, subsequent ballots shall be taken until elected candidates shall have filled all vacant positions. When several terms are to be filled the candidate receiving the highest number of votes will fill the term of the longest duration and the other candidates will fill terms in descending order based on the number of votes received. For General Convention Deputies only, election requires a concurrent majority in both orders.

Reason:

This is a codification of long standing practice. The Committee recommends the addition of this rule to clarify the process used in electing candidates.

Section XI: Rules of Order

XI. No motion shall be considered as before Convention unless seconded, and, when required by the President, reduced to writing and signed b the mover, whose name shall be entered on the journal. Each proposed amendment to a resolution made during floor debate must be submitted in writing to the Secretary of Convention immediately after being moved, so that it can be projected onto the screen for floor consideration.

Reason:

The Committee recommends this change to facilitate an easier and more efficient processing and review of proposed amendments.

Article II, Section 7 - Quorum and Manner of Voting

The Committee contacted the Committee on Constitution and Canons to formally request an amendment to Article II, Section 7, of the Constitution that "Presbyters," which excludes Deacons, be

be changed to "Clergy" to include both priests <u>and</u> deacons. The process to change the Constitution takes Convention votes in two consecutive years.

Responsibilities of Deputies and Visitors

The Committee has also attached to this report suggestions for the conduct during the business meeting. This is offered as a benefit to the group.

RULES OF ORDER ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-SEVENTH CONVENTION January 2011

Convention_Committees

- 1. The following Convention committees, consisting of clergy and laity, shall be appointed by the President at least 125 days prior to the Convention:
 - A. Arrangements
 - Rules of Order and Elections
 - C. Resolutions
 - D. Dispatch of Business
 - E. Budget
- The President, Vice President, and Secretary of the Convention shall be members, ex-officio, of all Convention Committees.
- III. The Convention Committees shall be empowered to take appropriate action prior to, and during, the next Annual Convention, as well as any Special Convention held during their year of appointment.

Arrangements

- IV. The Committee on Arrangements shall be responsible for receiving post Convention recommendations, and from such recommendations to make referrals in the following areas:
 - To the Ecclesiastical Authority: recommendations pertaining to location, data and length of sessions.
 - B. To the Committee on Rules of Order and Elections: recommendations pertaining to the legislative procedure.
 - To the Nominations Committee: recommendations pertaining to nominations and election procedure.
 - To the Committee on Resolutions: recommendations pertaining to the resolution process.
 - E. To the Committee on Dispatch of Business: recommendations pertaining to the agenda and calendar of business.
 - F. To the Budget Committee: recommendations pertaining to the budget procedure.

The Committee shall recommend to the Diocesan Council the procedures and arrangements for the pre-Convention meetings of deputies, and shall be reaponable for all physical arrangements of the Convention.

Rules of Order

V. The Committee on Rules of Order and Elections shall be responsible for the Rules of Order.

- VI. The Committee on Rules of Order and Elections shall be responsible for the following nomination and election procedures at the Annual Convention:
 - A. By April 30th a nominations committee of clergy and lay members from different congregations shall be elected by the districts consisting of:
 - one member of the clergy from each district
 - one lay person from each district

The Secretary of Convention is also on the committee.

Committee members will serve for two years with clergy and lay members rotating off in atternate years. Odd numbered districts will elect a lay person whose term ends in an even year, a clergy person whose term ends in an odd year. Even numbered districts will elect a lay person whose term ends in an odd year; a clergy person whose term ends in an even year.

in the event any district falls to provide its representatives, on May 1st the Bishop will make the appointments to fill vacancies from within the district.

- B. The Committee will meet no later than June 30th to elect its own chair, not to be the Secretary of Convention, and to set up procedures for evaluating and nominating candidates. The committee will nominate at least one more than the number of vacancies in each category with the exceptions of Secretary of Convention, Treasurer, Diocesan Review Committee and Ecclesiastical Court.
- C. The Secretary of Convention shall send out in the Call to Convention the time and place of the Convention, a list and job descriptions of the offices by classes to be filled by election, the names of the incumbents of these offices, and an official nomination form. This Call shall be sent out at least one hundred (100) days before the date of the Convention to each clerical member of the Convention and to each lay deputation whose certificate has been transmitted to the Secretary, as provided in Canon I. The Call shall be printed in *The Voice*.

D. Nomination of Candidates

- There will be a notice in the June Voice asking for recommendations to be sent to the Nominations Committee by November 30. Recommendations may be made in the following ways:
 - (a.) Any person eligible to run may recommend him or herself.
 - (b.) Any person in the Diocese may recommend some one else who is eligible to run.
 - (c.) Members of the Committee are strongly encouraged to present names of possible candidates from their own districts particularly, as well as suggestions from other areas of the Diocese.

The Nominations Committee will evaluate recommendations and present a report to the Secretary of Convention and Committee on Rules of Order and Elections by November 30th for distribution with the pre-convention mailing at the end of

December. Any nominees not accepted by the Nominations Committee shall be informed in writing by December 1st in order to allow for nomination through other methods.

- 2. In addition to the slate presented by the Nominations Committee, additional nominations will be received in the following ways:
- (a.) Any five (5) deputies to Convention may nominate a candidate to any office. Nominations post marked not later than December 15th will be included in the preconvention mailing and publicized in the Voice along with the nominations received from the Nominations Committee.
- (b.) Late nominations will continue to be accepted until noon on the Friday of the week before the start of the Annual Convention.
- E. By the close of the opening session the Nominations Committee shall report to the Convention in the form of an official ballot the names listed by Contest. The arrangement of such names received by January 18th shall be determined by lot in each order. Names received through late nominations shall be added in order of receipt. On the ballot in those contests which require candidates for more than one class, all candidates will be listed as a group by order and length of terms will be determined by ranking of the vote results.
- F. Only official ballots may be used in elections, except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. The number of vacancies to be filled shall be printed on each ballot. Only valid ballots shall be counted in the whole number of votes cast. An invalid ballot as to one election shall not invalidate an otherwise valid ballot in any other election.
- G. For all elections vote shall be by ballot, each deputy having one vots for each vacancy to be filled. Those candidates receiving a majority of the valid ballots cast shall be elected. If no candidate receives a majority of the valid ballots cast, subsequent ballots shall be taken until elected candidates shall have filled all vacant positions. When several terms are to be filled the candidate shall have filled all vacant positions. When several terms are to be filled the candidate shall have filled the number of votes will fill terms in descending order based on the number of votes received. For General Convention Deputies only, election requires a concurrent majority in both orders.
- H. For all elections beginning with the third ballot, and for all succeeding ballots, the name of the candidates (or candidates) with the lowest number of total votes cast on the previous ballot will be withdrawn from consideration, such that the number of candidates remaining shall be equal to the number of vacancles plus two. (For example, if seven candidates are standing for election and there are three vacancles to be filled, on the third ballot the names of the two candidates with the lowest number of votes will be withdrawn from consideration by the Convention. This will have five candidates for consideration on the third ballot. All candidates who were not elected as General Convention Deputies shall be eligible for consideration as alternate Deputies.

Resolutions

- VII. The Committee on Resolutions shall be responsible for receiving all resolutions except those provided by standing committees and bodies required to report to this Convention.
 - A. All resolutions to be considered for action by the Annual Convention shall be submitted to the Secretary of Convention in writing and signed by a deputy not less than seventy-five (75) days before the date of Convention. Resolutions should be submitted on white 8-1/2 x 11 paper, typed and double-spaced or in electronic format by disk or e-mall. Each should contain two sections: 1) the RESOLVED naming the desired action, and a further RESOLVED, as appropriete, providing for the implementation of the resolution, if adopted; and 2) a brief statement or information in support of the resolution. Resolutions submitted by more than one deputy must designate one deputy as capable of agreeing to any amendments by the Committee or offered on the floor of Convention. After the expiration of the seventy-five (75) day deadline, the Secretary shall transmit to the Committee all resolutions submitted to him/her.
 - B. The Committee shall hold hearing(s) prior to Convention on all resolutions submitted timely. The Committee shall publicize at least eighty-five (85) days prior to Convention dates, place and time of its hearings, inviting submitters of all resolutions to attend. The Committee shall coliate all resolutions dealing with obviously similar subjects and shall discuss such collation with the submitters.
 - C. Upon submission of any resolution that in the Secretary's opinion after consultation with the chair of the Committee may have financial implications if adopted, she shall submit a copy to the Tressurer or Chief Financial Officer for review and comments. Upon submission of any resolution that in the Secretary's opinion after consultation with the chair of the Committee may affect insurance, she shall submit a copy to the Chair of the Diocesan insurance Committee for review and comments. Upon submission of any resolution that in the Secretary's opinion after consultation with the chair of the Committee may have canonical or legal implications if adopted, she shall submit to the Chancellor for review and comments. Review and comments will be requested in time for the initial meeting of the Committee.
 - D. The Committee shall have the power to revise or modify any proposed resolution, and shall have the power, by a two-thirds vote of all committee members present and voting, to determine not to offer any proposed resolution on the floor of Convention.
 - E. The Committee shall submit its report to the Secretary sixty (60) days before the date of Convention with its recommendations for action upon each resolution as proposed or as amended or collated by the Committee. This report shall be mailed by the Secretary to each deputation during the first week of January. All resolutions considered by the Committee will be included in the report, unless withdrawn by consent of the sponsoring deputy. If a resolution to be offered to Convention has been amended by the Committee without the consent of the sponsoring deputy, such amendment(s) will be clearly shown.
 - F. Any resolution which the Committee determines not to offer on the floor of Convention shall be permitted on the floor of Convention only by a majority vote of all Convention deputies at the start of the first business session of convention.
 - G. Resolutions not previously submitted to the Committee for this Convention will be permitted from the floor upon a two-thirds vote only at the start of the first business session of

of Convention and only when they carry a clear statement in writing of the circumstances that led to the request for their consideration. Such resolutions should be duplicated in advance by the presenter(a) with sufficient copies available for distribution to all convention deputies (550 copies are needed).

H. <u>Consent Calendar</u>. It is recognized that certain resolutions may not require full debate prior to action by Convention. Accordingly, the Committee on Resolutions may propose that certain resolutions be included on a "Consent Calendar". Exclusion of any resolution on the Consent Calendar requires agreement of any three congregations to remove it, and the Secretary of Convention must receive exclusion requests before the start of the first business session in writing, signed by at least two lay deputies from each of three congregations and at least three clergy listed on the roll of Clergy entitled to vote in the Convention. Any resolution included on the "Consent Calendar" shall not be subject to amendment or debate, except that the sponsoring deputy or his/her designee may speak to the resolution for a period not to exceed one minute.

On Dispatch of Business

VII. The Committee on Dispatch of Business shall be responsible for the Calendar of Business. The Committee shall always be entitled to the floor on business pertaining to that Committee.

To Certify Minutes

IX. At the close of Convention a Committee shall be appointed to review and certify the consciouses of the minutes.

On Decorum and Debate

X. Except when in conflict with the Constitution or Canons or any Rule herein contained, the latest edition of "Robert's Rules of Order" shall govern the interpretation of these rules and procedures to follow. Except when in conflict with the Constitution or Canons or any Rule herein contained, the latest edition of "Robert's Rules of Order" shall govern the interpretation of these rules are recontained to follow. A required majority of the deputies voting individually shall determine all measures, unless the chair rules, consistent with the requirements of the Constitution (Article 2, section 7), that the vote on the question shall be by orders. If a vote is by orders then a concurrent majority in both orders shall be necessary to carry any measure.

Constitution - Article II, Section 7:

"On the demand of five (5) Presbyters entitled to vote, or of five (5) Lsy Deputies each from a different Parish, Aided Parish, incorporated Mission, or Mission, the vote upon any question sale be by orders, each Cierical and each Lsy Deputy voting Individually; and, when a vote is thus taken, a concurrent majority in both orders shall be necessary to carry any measure." (Constitution Article II, Section 7)

- XI. No motion shall be considered as before Convention unless seconded, and, when required by the President, reduced to writing and signed by the mover, whose name shall be entered on the journal. Each proposed amendment to a resolution made during floor debate must be submitted in writing to the Secretary of Convention Immediately after being moved, so that it can be projected onto the screen for floor consideration.
- Xii. Any member about to speak shall, with due respect address the President, and in speaking confine comments to the point in debate.

- No member shall speak more than once and for no more than two minutes in the same debate without leave of the Convention (except the mover who is entitled to reply).
- If any member by speech or action transgresses the rules of the Convention, the President shall call the member to Order, and the member shall immediately take his/her seat, unless permitted by the Convention to explain or proceed in order.

On the Budget

- The following procedures shall govern the presentation and adoption of the budget: XVI.
 - The tentative budget be adopted by the Diocesan Council and proposed to the Convention.
 - Copies of said budget to be sent to convention deputies and available for discussion at January pre-convention meetings. The last pre-convention meeting shall be held no later than one week prior to the deadline for budget resolutions.
 - Once adopted by Diocesan Council, proposed changes will be in order. All proposed changes to the budget will continue to be accepted until noon on the Wednesday before the start of the Annual Convention. These changes should be of four varieties, submitted by a clerical or lay deputy in writing to the Secretary of Convention:
 - (a) To add an additional line item

- (b) To delete a line Item
- (c) To increase a line Item
- (d) To decrease a line item.

Late resolutions to change the budget will be permitted from the floor only when they carry a clear statement in writing of the circumstances that led to the request for their consideration after the deadline and only by a two-thirds vote of deputies.

- Proposed changes will be referred without debate to the Diocesan Council Budget Committee.
- Line Items about which no proposed change is offered will be considered nondebatable by Convention unless upon resolution by the Diocesan Council Budget Committee.
- 6. The Diocesan Council Budget Committee will hold open hearings at convention on these proposed budget changes. Anyone wishing to do so may appear to speak for or against any proposed change. After all speakers are heard, the Diocesan Council Budget Committee will go into executive session to consider its report to the Convention. The Committee may at its discretion invite expert witnesses.
- 7. The Diocesan Council Budget Committee will present its recommendations in the form of a separate resolution on every line item for which changes have been suggested, its only mandate that the budget must not be in deficit. Changes up will have to be balanced with changes down, additions offset by deletions, subject to the discretion of the Diocesan Council Budget Committee.
- 8. The Convention will vote on every Diocesan Council Budget Committee resolution either to approve or not to approve. These resolutions are subject to amendment by the Convention. Each resolution must be considered individually.
- When all Diocesan Council Budget Committee resolutions have been dealt with, a motion to approve the budget will be offered and voted.

The following rules of debate shall be used by debate of the Budget:

- The Diocesan Council Budget Committee shall have FIVE MINUTES to speak in respect to the Committee's report on the Budget.
- ONE HOUR shall be allotted to the debate, divided equally by the number of resolutions to be considered with a maximum of one hour.
- Of the time allotted to the consideration of each resolution, the recommendation of the Diocesan Council Budget Committee concerning the resolution shall be limited to ONE MINUTE or less.
- 4. During the debate on each resolution each speaker shall be limited to ONE MINUTE and no speaker shall speak more than once.
- To the extent possible, the Chair shall recognize speakers of opposite views in alternate succession.

- No motion to lay on the table or otherwise to terminate debate on each resolution shall be entertained during the allotted time period.
- After the consideration of all resolutions and the termination of debate TEN MINUTES shall be allotted for the Budget Resolutions as finally perfected by the Convention to be considered and adopted as a unit.

Committee of the Whole

- XVII. On motion duly moved and adopted, the Convention may go into Committee of the Whole for the consideration of any matter. The President shall designate some member of the Convention to act as Chair of the Committee, which, when in session, shall be governed by these rules.
 - A. A motion to rise and to report to the Convention, with or without leave to sit again, may be made at any time, and shall take precedence of all other motions, and shall be decided without further debate. No such motion once made shall be renewed until further proceeding shall have taken place in the Committee.
 - B. A motion that a vote be taken at some designated time may be made and be disposed of without debate at any time, but as before provided a motion to report to the Convention shall take precedence.
 - C. No motion to lay on the table shall be entertained.

Reports

- XVIII, No printed matter of any kind shall be distributed at the Convention or placed on the seats except by the authority of the President or Secretary.
- XIX. All reports shall be in writing, and when made shall be the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance. All reports recommending Convention action shall be accompanied by a resolution to that effect.
- XX. All reports requiring Convention action shall be in writing and, at least, one complete copy and, if available and appropriate, four synopses shall be in the possession of each deputation prior to Convention. All other reports submitted to Convention shall be read by title only.

The Episcopal Address for the 137th Annual Convention Of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark Saturday, January 29, 2011

The Rt. Rev. Mark M. Beckwith

We are shaped by stories. The stories that we hear and the stories that we tall. We are adherents of this faith because each of us has been transformed by the Jesus story — and we have, at different levels of intensity, committed ourselves to living with that holy story. And committed ourselves to passing that story on. Last night we heard two people from the diocese — Deacon Diane Riley and Newark ACTS intern Mark Sharrow, share how the Jesus story has shaped and challenged them to step out in audacious faith, which is the theme of Convention and is a metaphor taken from the vision statement. This morning I want to share a bit of my story — and how my journey has been shaped by the Jesus story, but to do that I first need to tell you the story of Sepphoris.

Sepphoris was the regional Roman capital of northern Israel — and it was built during the years of Jesus' youth. Sepphoris was one hill over from Nazareth, where Jesus grew up — about three miles away. Whereas Nazareth was a tiny village literally carved out of the hillside, Sepphoris was wealthy beyond measure, which reflected a power that couldn't be questioned — and which was exactly the point Rome wanted to make. I had never heard of Sepphoris until I visited it five summers ago on a side trip from Nazareth. Our small group toured the ruins of this ancient city — and we could see the remains of cobblestone streets and the elaborate inlaid tiles of the baths nestled in the Roman-like palaces.

Joseph, Jesus' father, was an artisan, and no doubt he earned some of his living as a day laborer at the Sepphoris construction site. When Jesus was old enough to apprentice to his father, Jesus accompanied Joseph down the hill from Nazareth, across the valley and up into Sepphoris — and back again, for the purpose of learning a trade. Jesus also learned about difference — radical difference; between the opulent wealth of Sepphoris and the hardscrabble poverty of Nazareth.

Two very different worlds. And two closed systems — Sepphoris by intention, which it could perpetuate because of privilege and power, and Nazareth by oppression, which lived under the heavy boot of Rome. Nazareth was a jail without walls.

Jesus was imbued by the charism of being the holy one of Israel. He was also, no doubt, ahaped by his regular commute between Nazareth and Sepphoris. He was, I believe, radicalized by the economic, racial and political chasm between the two communities. As a result, he spent much of his ministry trying to open up closed systems, which he did by bridges between communities — and by brilding bridges between anyone and his divine father.

I tell this story because I grow up in a modern version of Sepphoris. In Darien, Connecticut, a New York City suburb. In the early 1960s real estate covenants made it impossible for non-whites and non-Christians to live there. The community displayed its enormous financial power in its schools, stores and neighborhoods. Although I didn't know it at the time, it was a closed system. For me, it was home. It was all I know. There was—and is, a strong pull to stay in such a community—in a closed system, because of its comfort, safety and privilege. But there were people in Darien who journeyed freely and intentionally to modern versions of Nazareth. Not just to bring upper middle class largesse, but to be challenged and changed by difference. The pull to stay in was strong, but the itch to venture forth was real.

From Darien, I went on to Amherst College, which then as now, was a place of comfort and privilege. It prided itself on being an academically elite school — and its elite status filtered into nearly every aspect of college life. Although a bit more open, it was still a closed system. In many ways, it was an extension of my life in Darien.

After college, I lived in Japan for two years. Nearly everything was marked by difference — language, culture, food, religion. My horizons were expanded. For the first time in my life, I was really out of Sepphoris. And in many ways all I wanted to do was to get back in to the comfort and privilege of a closed system. But I couldn't get back into Sepphoris, because Japan is a closed system to foreigners. The Japanese word for foreigner — gaijin, literally means outsider.

While in Japan I met Jesus — not for the first time, but in a new way. By exploring another religious tradition, I was brought into a deeper relationship with my own. By experiencing the exile of being an outsider, I experienced a more intense need for Jesus' prophecy and his bridge building — and his ability to bring people together. I was introduced to a different kind of comfort — a more abiding comfort that privilege could not touch. I met more people who lived with this deep spiritual comfort — and which enabled them to step out in audacious faith. I wanted some of that. My itch was in fact a deepening spiritual desire to be more open — to receive more authentic spiritual comfort so I too could step out in audacious faith. And better resist the pull from the sirens of Sepphoris.

And I have stepped out -- some; but I have also allowed myself to be pulled back at times. It has been an ongoing dance, if not a struggle, between the promise of freedom in an open system and the false sense of security in a closed one. And over the years I have arrived at some important insights for me -- and I offer them to you:

Privilege is not freedom Certainty is not faith Security is not vision

I have also noticed that my struggle is a common one, exacerbated by a dominant secular culture which systematically markets privilege, certainty and security. And much of the religious world today — which I think is just an extension of the secular world, promotes variations of privilege, certainty and security. The pull to stay in Sepphoris is strong; the desire to get into Sepphoris is also strong.

But Jesus said "No" to any closed system or any entity that tried to truncate freedom, faith and vision by serving up bromides, prejudice or fear. Jesus risked freedom, and he has challenged us to do the same. He has dared us to help him open up closed systems — and to live into the freedom of his faith and vision — by which we are fed every time we receive the Eucharist. To live with the Christ in freedom, faith and vision is my deepest desire. It is also my biggest challenge.

One of the blessings about being in the Diocese of Newark is seeing how individuals and congregations have dared to step beyond privilege to freedom, beyond certainty to faith and beyond security to vision. This diocese has a long history of doing that — and continues to build on that legacy. Some of this has to do with geography — modern day versions of Nazareth and Sepphoris are hard by one another; and over the years we have learned to be taught and fed by one another, and have worked at creating permeable boundaries between congregations, and between congregations and local communities.

Yet this isn't always the case. Without mission and vision — and without the discipline to live into mission and vision, individuals, congregations and dioceses fall back into patterns of closed systems. They seek security and certainty. Especially during periods of cacophony and chaos — which is what we have now.

I am very grateful for our mission statement, which we have been living into for a year and a half — and our vision statement, which we have been working with for about six months. The mission statement — equipping congregations, empowering people and engaging the world — with the hope and justice of Jesus; has helped us get clear about what we are called to do — and just as importantly, about what we are not clied to do. We have aligned our budget and the senior bodies of the Diocese — Trustees, Standing Committee and Diocesan Council, with the calling of our mission statement.

The vision statement presents a portrait of what our diocesan life will look like as we live into our mission with discipline and clarity. The vision is filled with prophetic imagery. As such, it is imbued with promise — God's promise of abundant blessing. There is no certainty here, no security — and the vision (along with the mission) calls us to dismantle the privilege or to insist on freedom for everyone in equal measure.

As we live out our mission statement and dare to live into the vision, there are certain parts of our life that I want to highlight; and certain practices that are ripe for "institutional reformation" (as expressed in the vision statement). Discipline is key. Spiritual discipline. Patterns of spiritual practice. One of the wonderful things I have discovered in my time as bishop is the desire that so many people have — from all across the diocesa, to be in relationship with the living Christ. I see it. I hear it. And I devote much of my vocation supporting that holy relationship.

Without spiritual discipline, we become easy pickings for the purveyors of privilege, certainty and security. So I will keep before the diocese the expectation for all of us to live into a pattern of praying, giving, serving and learning. And to create a culture of spiritual discipline. To that end I have pulled together a group of laypeople and clergy to

help design spiritual patterns and practices — and to continue to work with me to keep the issue of spiritual formation and practice before us. Our spiritual disciplines lead us to the heart of God — and to a place of freedom that empowers "people to become alive and confident in their faith" (another quote from the vision statement).

Story is also key. For those of us who have been Episcopalians for a long time, telling our story has meant that all we had to do is reveal our identity: "I am an Episcopalian." Reciting those words was enough. It placed us on a Christian continuum, accurately or not. Today, most people don't know how to pronounce the word "Episcopal," much less spell it. People don't know who we are. So we have to tell them. Not about our identity, but our story. Not just the demographics of who we are, but who we are with Jesus. How our deepest desire is nurtured and where we discover our greatest hope.

This is not easy. The challenge for me — for all of us — is to answer the call from the vision statement: to "venture into places where we are not expected — indeed, where we are not even welcomed, to be seed throwers, fire starters, hope peddlers, risk takers and dreamers on behalf of the Good News of Jesus Christ," Later on today, you will have a chance to tell your story of when you stepped out in andacious faith. Let the audacious among us arise.

Which brings me to youth. They are also key — not just to our future, but to our life now. We need to support and guide them — and take the risk of being transformed by their audaciousness. We have a youth movement going on in the diocese, and we need to put more energy and intention into it. Kai Alston, from our staff, doesn't just work with youth. She is about nurturing faith and training leaders. We have invested in Newark ACTS, an incarnation of eight young adults who have been brought into our midst. Each of them, in their own way, has stepped out in audacious faith. What I am learning is that young people want to serve — and we need to give them the opportunity. They are exposing the illusion of privilege as freedom. Newark ACTS is not just a program of the church; it is the church. And these young people are opening up the church to new models of ministry.

We have an extraordinary group of deacons. I am inspired by their commitment to Christ and their passion for ministry—and the impact they have on the church. We need more deacons. And we need young deacons. Next month I will be meeting with the deacon community to figure out how we can identify young people to become deacons and fashion a creative path to ordination for them. I will also be meeting with our growing cohort of young priests, inviting them to share their perspectives on the church—and to dream with me about creating a young adult ministry in Harrison.

Social Justice has long been a passion of this diocese. For decades we have been catalysts for change in the national church. It is incumbent upon us in the 21st century to consider anew the wider work in our communities and the world. And so we have created a justice board, comprised of the deputies to General Convention — and some others. While the justice board will continue to work on various justice issues as identified by General Convention, our focus in the diocese will be on children, those among us who are both

the most vulnerable and whom we invest with the greatest hope.

I will continue to challenge congregations to be mission-focused on children and youth—within the congregation and in the larger community. There are some congregations which have clearly identified ministry with children and young people as part of their mission statement. If kids aren't included in a parish mission statement, they should nevertheless be incorporated into the congregations' life and mission. Clearly and audaciously.

Turning to congregations, from my unique vantage point, the mission of the congregation poses the biggest opportunity and the greatest challenge. So many of us continue to be limiting ourselves to our age-old identity, as if simply putting the "Episcopal Church welcomes you" sign out front and worshiping with the Book of Common Prayer will take care of everything. That model did work — and work well, up until 40 years ago. I was raised in that church. I miss it. We can mourn that loss, but we need to move on. The issue is not how did we get here, but the question is — what do we do now? On more than half of my visits to congregations, members of the Vestry say that one of their main goals is to get more people to join the church. A growing minority of congregations are discovering that the question — how do we get more people into church — IS THE WRONG QUESTION. The important question that congregations are discovering they need to ask is — what is God calling us to do? What is our mission? One of the learnings from the listening campaign, carried out this past summer and fall in 61 congregations, is that churches which have a focus in ministry — and a defined mission, have a stronger sense of purpose and a deeper wellspring of joy.

In the same listening campaign, it was discovered, not surprisingly, that worship is the anchor of a congregation's life. I see that. I experience that. People come with a spiritual hunger and leave with a souls that have been fed by the transformative and transcendent nature of the liturgy. And people enjoy one another. In every place I visit, the exchange of the Peace is the longest part of the liturgy. It displays a spirit of community.

But — the warmth and welcome tends to be confined to those who are already known. Week in and week out I see people who are brand new to the congregation being virtually ignored by everyone else. In the worship. In coffee hour. It is not hostility. It's not even indifference. It is habit. And it is not isolated. It happens everywhere. I see it as a vestige of a closed system — and as an institutional resistance to becoming more open. These are habits that all of us need to unlearn, which will happen as we develop ministries of radical hospitality. Last year I singled out Christ Church, Budd Lake, for their commitment to radical hospitality, which is reflected in their worship service for children with special needs. It has proven to be a life-giving contagion, not just for the Christ Church congregation — but its mission has spread to St. Andrew's, Harrington Park, which has developed its own All God's Children service. And at least two other congregations are considering implementing worship services with more intentional radical hospitality.

All I have said thus far is part and parcel of our stewardship: how we deploy what God

has given us in order to do God's work in the world. Drawing on a portion of funds from the proceeds of church sales, we will fund a diocesan stewardship officer, whose mission will be to work on stewardship development with congregations, assist congregations with planned giving -- and work with me on developing major gifts for ministry initiatives that are aligned with our mission statement. Good stewardship also requires that we discover and respond to the needs of the local community. Not what we think those needs are, or what we want them to be -- or even what the data says they are. Instead, our stewardship must be informed by what we hear from the stories -- the stories in the community. To listen for hopes and dreams and concerns and patterns -- and how we might best develop a mission that will respond to them.

We need to intentionally connect children and stewardship. Teach them about the freedom which comes by discovering an individual's need to give rather than the church's need to receive. To that end, as the Alleluia Fund goes into its second year, we will give our children and youth an opportunity to participate, in part by joining in the Nets for Life campaign sponsored by Episcopal Relief and Development. Twelve dollars buys one net. Nets prevent malaria. The educational and organizing model that Episcopal Relief and Development has created has become the benchmark for best practice among charitable agencies. Over 80,000 lives have been saved in three years. Imagine how many nets we can buy. Because we stepped out in audacious faith last year by creating the Alleluia Fund, our outreach giving in 2010 increased by 33% over the year before. We will raise it by another percentage this year. When we focus on mission, good things happen.

As all this is an issue of our stewardship as individuals and congregations, this also involves my stewardship as bishop. When I was consecrated four years ago, I moved into a Sepphoris-sized office. I was given a ring and I put on a purple shirt (both of which are adomments of royalty). I carry a big stick, which is a symbol of enormous spiritual authority. I live with more privilege than I have ever known.

But beyond the privilege, I have discovered a new level of freedom. Christ-centered freedom. It pushes me out of the privilege of Sepphoris and into the uncertainty of the future of the church. More and more people are looking to me as bishop for certainty and security. I can't give it. I can point to Jesus — and the genius of our tradition, and the new life that is recorded in scripture and which is given in the Eucharist. And I can issue the challenge to be Christ in the world. If you were to ask me what the future of the church looks like, I would say it needs to "repent of the false gods" of privilege, certainty and security and step out audaciously into freedom, faith and vision — and then maybe we will know.

There are many congregations that are clear about their commitment to mission. Congregations that are dreaming and risking — and then developing ministry plans in the light of those dreams and that risk. It is exciting. It is inspiring. I, as bishop, and we as diocesan staff, want to invest more time and focus equipping congregations to empower people and engage the world. There are many ways we are doing that, but I want to highlight one. At the close of Convention, the leadership team of staff and I will begin

intentional work with two congregations to help them live into their mission. We have set up a process to offer the full services of the leadership team for six months to develop a clear and concise mission plan — and for the next year to provide the services of a congregational coach to help the congregation live into the mission plan. We have chosen two congregations at the outset partly because that seems manageable. We have chosen St. John's Boonton and Church of the Incarnation in Jersey City for this pilot partnership because each congregation has literally stepped out in audacious faith, both by the mission they are developing and by the realistic assessment of their assets and their futures. In both congregations, the Vestry is very clear that this is venture capital. Along the way, we will evaluate the partnership, make changes, and identify two more congregations for the next social capital investment. As we get better at this — and we will get better at it, we can expand the number of congregations — and develop partnerships that involve me, my staff, and other congregations. The key is the willingness to risk — that God is God. That risk is perhaps the most important ingredient of what it means to be an open system.

I want to assist with birth — and rebirth, and congregational development. At the same time I — and we, need to be pastorally present to congregations that are struggling to maintain their ministry. There are less than a handful. In the last two months, Canon Jacobs and I have put together a Pastoral response team for congregations with serious financial and mission hardship in order to assess their situation and provide support for next steps, which may include closing.

I increasingly see myself as the chief spiritual officer of the diocese, which means that my primary role is to help individuals, congregations, and me — to be open to the freedom which comes in God. To live with courage, which is given by the living Christ — and which provides a vision for the future that is not imbued with secular certainty and security.

As chief spiritual officer, I am challenged to call out closed systems. Our faith is held by religious institutions — but not owned by them. I feel called to call out systems which preach security and certainty — invariably at the expense of those who are pushed out. This includes our own Episcopal Church and other religious and civic institutions. The world needs for us to be an open system of freedom, faith and vision.

I have learned that my ring, shirt, miter and staff are part of the armor of God. They are visual reminders — not of the privilege of Sepphorls, but icons of God's power. We each have been given freedom and faith and vision. It is the armor of God. (Ephesians 6:11) Put it on. We will all need it.

And then together, let us step out in audacious faith.

Consent Calendar: It is recognized that certain resolutions may not require full debate prior to action by Convention. Accordingly, the Committee on Resolutions may propose that certain resolutions be included on a "Consent Calendar". Exclusion of any resolution on the Consent Calendar requires agreement of any three congregations to remove it, and the Secretary of Convention must receive exclusion requests before the start of the first business session in writing, signed by at least two lay deputies from each of three congregations and at least three clergy listed on the roll of Clergy entitled to vote in the Convention. Any resolution included on the "Consent Calendar" shall not be subject to amendment or debate, except that the sponsoring deputy or his/her designee may speak to the resolution for a period not to exceed one minute. (None of this year's resolutions were placed on the Consent Calendar or removed.)

Resolution 2011-01 ADOPTED EQUAL EDUCATION: SAVE OUR PUBLIC SCHOOLS

RESOLVED, that this 137th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark adopt as a high priority of our strategy on Domestic Poverty, a policy and plan of action for saving the Public Education system; and, be it further

RESOLVED, that the office of the Bishop of the Diocese is requested to write to the Mayors and Councils of all municipalities in the Diocese that provide public schools, the State Legislature of the State of New Jersey, the U.S. Senators of the State of New Jersey, the Governor of the State of New Jersey and the President of the United States, on the value and importance of an excellent public education system where the priority is on all children learning; and, be it further

RESOLVED, that every congregation of the Diocese of Newark is urged to launch a writing campaign urging local officials and legislators, both State and Federal, to develop policies and strategies that ensure adequate funding for excellent and equal education for all children.

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

More than ever in an era of globalization and expanded media, our country needs a vision of public education that produces in all communities, students whose literacy, numeracy and critical thinking skills enable them to become both economically autonomous and responsible citizens. In order for the United States to have a learned and skilled society of citizens, a publicly supported school system is a necessity; therefore the importance of public education in America should rank second only to protecting our country from outside armed attacks. In the long run, it is Public Education which greatly influences how we: relate to others, treat ourselves, compete in global markers, conserve and build the Nation's and the world environment. Public Education helps to mold the very soul of the American people.

The purpose of the Millennium Development Goals which were affirmed by the Episcopal Church and which led the Presiding Bishop to develop a Domestic Poverty Agenda is to make a real difference in people's lives so that they can have a decent standard of living. Bducation has always been the key in America to breaking the chains of poverty, and for historically disadvantaged low income citizens and immigrants it has been achieved through the public education system. Currently the system is segregated and many of our children are marked for prison before they have an opportunity to achieve any part of the American dream.

Resolution 2011-02 ADOPTED AS AMENDED - NEW TEXT IN BOLD ANTI-RACISM RESOLUTION

RESOLVED, this 137th Convention of the Diocese of Newark affirms Canon 2, section 6, which provides that all persons seeking election or appointment to serve on diocesan or district offices, diocesan commissions, committees or boards must first complete anti-racism dialogues training; and be it further

RESOLVED, that this 137th Convention of the Diocese of Newark affirms the importance of conducting anti-racism dialogue within the context of our lives as Episcopalians as an ongoing part of deepening our spirituality and our relationship with God and with one another and therefore encourages congregations to participate in anti-racism dialogues within their own

congregation and in conjunction with other congregations, particularly those where the ethnic, racial, or economic diversity may be different from one another; and be it further

RESOLVED, that it is the policy of the Diocese of Newark that all clergy must complete antiracism dialogues training within six months of their appointment or licensing as clergy in the diocese or present official documentation that they have successfully completed similar training in an Episcopal Church-sponsored anti-racism training program within the three years prior to obtaining status in this diocese; and be it further

RESOLVED, that all persons seeking ordination in this diocese or transferring to this diocese as a postulant or candidate must complete anti-racism dialogues training within six months of their designation as a postulant or, in the case of those transferring, within six months of the acceptance of their transfer into this diocese; and be it further

RESOLVED, that this 137th Convention of the Diocese of Newark establishes that all persons required to complete anti-racism dialogue training must update their certification by completing, at a minimum, an additional 5 hours of Continuing Anti-Racism Education (CARE) every five years; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Diocesan body responsible for overseeing anti-racism dialogues submit to the 138th Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark a list of measurable criteria by which the effectiveness of the anti-racism dialogues and training may be evaluated and enhanced.

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

The diocesan requirement for anti-racism training embodies both the spirit and letter of past and present General Convention resolutions and diocesan canons (see below). The work of providing anti-racism dialogue and of assuring compliance with national church and diocesan mandates is undertaken by Namaste* (formerly, the Mission to Dismantle Racism & Reparations Task Force).

The intent of the dialogues is to create a safe place where sharing and examination of experiences and attitudes can ultimately prove to be transformative of people's spirits, hearts and minds, and by extension, of their daily life and work. Participation in this transformative experience requires a commitment of our time, not simply for the dialogue itself, but also as a commitment to life-long learning and growth. Recognizing the importance of this work, Namaste adopted the Executive Council's policy which has established fourteen (14) hours as the minimum length of time for anti-racism dialogue.

Our diocesan canons mandate that all persons seeking election to diocesan or district office, diocesan commission, committee, or board must first complete "anti-racism training". Current diocesan policy requires all clergy and those seeking ordination to likewise participate in Episcopal Church-sponsored anti-racism dialogue. This dialogue, however, is not limited to those seeking office and all congregants are encouraged to participate.

While the diocese will recognize recent dialogue certifications obtained in other dioceses, secular

diversity or anti-racism trainings given by outside organizations will not be accepted in satisfaction of the diocesan requirement. It is important to recognize the necessity of conducting such dialogues in the context of our lives as Episcopalians. The vast variety and scope of secular anti-racism trainings rarely includes an exploration of anti-racism from a spiritual and specifically Christian perspective.

Understanding the dynamics of racism, recognizing the consequences of racism for everyone, and discovering strategic ways to dismantle racism is central to our mission of living into "the hope and justice of Jesus". If members of our diocese are to truly "engage the world", it must be with a profound awareness and respect for our "sameness" and our differences, and the necessity of celebrating both.

General Convention Resolution A142 (2009)

...Resolved, That all dioceses and provinces receive anti-racism training if they have not already done so or renew training that has been previously taken; and be it further

Resolved, That dioceses and provinces develop programs and ministries to dismantle and eradicate structures of racism, both internally and externally, and integrate the practices of anti-racism in to their ongoing life...

2006 Committee on Anti-Racism, Report to 76th Convention:

The Executive Council passed an important resolution that set, as the minimum length of time for anti-racism training, fourteen (14) hours. This ensures that anti-racism workshop participants will have time to progress from awareness of racism to full engagement with anti-oppression principles so that they may become knowledgeable agents of change.

Canon 2, Diocese of Newark - Voting and Elections

- 6. No person shall be eligible for election to any office at Convention, nor shall any person elected by Districts, or appointed to serve on Diocesan Council or other Diocesan Standing Committees, Commissions or Boards accede to that office, unless that person shall have first completed or arranged for the completion of anti-racism training as approved by the Bishop after consultation with the Mission to Dismantle Racism.
- * "Namaste" is a Hindi word derived from two Sanskrit words that, combined, generally mean "I bow to you." It is often used as a salutation in yoga classes between instructor and students and carries the meaning of honoring one another in the work that we do together. In 2009 Namaste began referring to anti-racism "dialogues" instead of anti-racism "training" because Namaste believes the concept of dialogue better conveys our Diocesan experience: while we do need training about anti-racism practices, the predominate modality of that training comes through the rich and varied dialogues that groups participating in this work have experienced over the years.

Resolution 2011-03 ADOPTED

A RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING CHURCH OF THE INCARNATION'S NEW MINISTRY AND MISSION IN JERSEY CITY

RESOLVED, that this one hundred thirty-seventh Convention of the Diocese of Newark affirm the vision of the Jersey City Strategy adopted at the 123rd Diocesan Convention in 1997 that, among other things, called for the development of "three strong congregations in Jersey City," one of which would be a new ministry and mission in Jersey City arising from the merged lives of the people of St. Matthew's Church in Jersey City, St. Stephen's Church in Jersey City and Church of the Incarnation in Jersey City; and, be it further

RESOLVED, that this one hundred thirty-seventh Convention of the Diocese of Newark acknowledge Church of the Incarnation in Jersey City to be the rightful inheritors of that part of the vision and plan for mission and ministry in Jersey City originally established by action of the 123rd Convention, including the funds set aside for the new ministry and mission in Jersey City; and, be it further

RESOLVED, that this one hundred thirty-seventh Convention of the Diocese of Newark hereby authorize the release of the designated funds for the new ministry and mission in Jersey City conditioned upon a plan submitted by Church of the Incarnation and endorsed by the Jersey City Area Ministry and the Bishop's Office no later than the 140th Convention of the Diocese of Newark which will be held in January 2014.

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

The vision of a unified mission strategy in Jersey City dates back at least to the 1980s. Under the leadership of Suffragan Bishop Jack M. McKelvey a new strategy began in 1995. In 1995 Diocesan Council adopted a resolution proposed by Bishop McKelvey that stated in relevant part that "the Diocesan Council accept the principle that funds received from the sale of church properties in Jersey City will be used for the development of ministry and mission in Jersey City." See Diocesan Council Minutes (DCM) of December 13, 1995.

Diocesan Council appointed the Jersey City Strategy Committee (the JCSC) in October 1995 with Bishop McKelvey as its chair. In 1996 Diocesan Convention reaffirmed that "funds associated with the former Church of the Ascension in Jersey City be used for the development of ministry within that city, and that such funds be expended for appropriate uses to such ends as soon as a strategy and projects are approved." See 122nd Diocesan Convention Journal (DCJ) at p. 40. In January 1997 Diocesan Convention adopted the JCSC's three mission principles for Jersey City:

- 1. that there will be a minimum of three strong Jersey City congregations (Grace Van Vorst, St. Paul's and a new entity arising from the merger of St. Mathew's Church and St. Stephen's Church with Church of the Incarnation);
- 2. that a Jersey City Area Ministry (JCAM) would be created to work for approximately one year, with the JCAM eventually to replace the JCSC;

3. that a Jersey City community development corporation be established.

The 1997 Diocesan Convention resolution specifically stated that "the proceeds of sales of all church assets including those from the former Ascension, St. John's and Grace, Greenville in Jersey City be designated to fund this [Jersey City Area Ministry] strategy." See 123rd DCJ at p. 61 (emphasis added) (clarification added).

The JCSC formed the JCAM on September 10, 1997 and it was initially called the Jersey City Area Council (JSAC). In April 1998 Diocesan Council adopted a resolution that provided:

- Recommendations from JCAC/JCAM¹ and the JCSC shall govern the allocation of funds collected and held from the sale of all things Jersey City;
- Two-thirds of the money is for the benefit of the "new church" in Jersey City, at the time called "St. Augustine";
- 3. One-third of the money is for ministries recommended by JCAM;
- 4. All requests for funds must be approved by Diocesan Council.

See Diocesan Council Minutes (DCM) of April 1998.

The vision for the creation of a community development corporation was realized in the incorporation of the Jersey City Episcopal Community Development Corporation (JCECDC) in June 1997. Today, the JCECDC is one of the most vibrant and industrious aspects of the Jersey City strategy through its aggressive housing construction and human resources divisions providing outreach, housing and case management for homeless men and women and those living with HIV/AIDS throughout Jersey City and beyond.

The vision of three strong congregations continues in the work of Grace Church Van Vorst, St. Paul's Church in Bergen and the new congregation consisting of members of St. John's Church, St. Matthew's Church, St. Stephen's Church and Church of the Incarnation, all worshipping as one merged congregation now known as Church of the Incarnation.

It is understood that the JCAM and Bishop's Office endorsement of a plan to be submitted by Church of the hearnation constitutes tacit approval of the plan. It is also understood that the release of funds and approval of the plan contemplated by this resolution is conditioned upon the submission and approval of a financially sound and viable plan. Existing JCAM procedures provide a system of checks and balances in which the JCAM initially reviews proposed Jersey City ministry and mission plans before they are forwarded for further review and approval by a working group of Diocesan Council. Diocesan Council then votes on the mission/ministry plans based upon the recommendation of its working group.

This resolution is sponsored by, and has the support of the Bishop's Office, Diocesan Council (November 10, 2010), the Standing Committee (endorsed unanimously October 6, 2010), and the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties (December 8, 2010).

The JCAM is composed of the clergy-in-charge and the wardens of the three Jersey City congregations.

The ICECDC was originally known as Jersey City Episcopal Housing, Inc., organized in the late 1980s.

RESOLUTION 2011-04 ADOPTED HONORING THE VENERABLE HERB TINNING

RESOLVED, that this 137th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark, noting the passing of the Venerable Herb Tinning, Archdeacon in the Diocese of Newark, express its condolences to his family and to the diaconate community, and, be it further

RESOLVED that this Convention, recognize the service of Venerable Herb Tinning as a deacon in the Diocese of Newark, and the pivotal leadership role he played in resuscitating the Vocational Diaconate, and express its deepest gratitude and appreciation for his untiring efforts in helping to organize and oversee the formation of deacons in the School of Deacons; and, be it further

RESOLVED that, in recognition of his ministry, the School of Deacons be renamed in his honor as the Herb Tinning School of Deacons.

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

The Rev. Herbert P. Tinning, 82, Deacon of St. Stephen's Church, in Millburn, N.J., and a resident of Millburn, died on Nov. 7, 2010.

The Rev. Herb Tinning was born in Hoboken, N.J., in 1928 and graduated from Stevens Institute of Technology with an engineering degree in 1952. While working professionally in association management, he completed studies at Seabury-Western Theological Seminary and was ordained a Vocational Deacon by Bishop James Montgomery in the Diocese of Chicago in 1974. Herbert Tinning returned to New Jersey, and in 1992, he became involved with St. Stephen's Church in Millburn, where he served as deacon until his passing.

In January 2004, Bishop Croneberger, then Episcopal Bishop of the Diocese of Newark, appointed the Reverend Herbert Tinning Archdeacon for Diaconal Formation, a position created to assist the Bishop in the formation, deployment, supervision and support of the deacons or those in preparation to be deacons. When Herbert Tinning left that post in 2007, the Bishop said, "Deacon Tinning has been instrumental... in organizing and administering our diaconal program." With, Ms. Hattie Stone, he operationalized the School of Deacons, arranging classes on Saturdays at Christ Church in Short Hills, following each deacon throughout the formation process, and acting as mentor for all aspiring deacons. When his service as Archdeacon ended, he had overseen the formation of some 25 deacons.

RESOLVED, that at the urging of Diocesan Council, partial repayment of this debt be included in the 2011 budget and that, furthermore, additional repayment be made as appropriately prioritized monies become available; and, be it further

RESOLVED, that this Convention urge future conventions to consider this arrearage until such time as full re-payment or other resolution has been achieved.

RESOLUTION 2011-06 ADOPTED

JUSTICE NEEDS FOR CHILDREN

Resolved, That this 137th Annual Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark urge all congregations to discern the justice needs of ebildren in their community not only their own children but also children in the larger community by the 138th Annual Convention.

Resolved, That the Justice Board of the Diocese of Newark and other appropriate committees provide resources and other support services for the congregations.

Supporting Information:

The Bishop, in consultation with the Justice Board, has identified the support and protection of children as the primary focus for justice work in the Diocese of Newark. As the most vulnerable members of our communities, children are greatly affected by inequalities of justice. Given the diversity of socioeconomic backgrounds in northern New Jersey and depending upon individual circumstances, children can experience a wide variety of justice needs – for food and nutrition, for shelter, for education and/or for safety. As part of our common mission to engage the world, the Justice Board asks all congregations to discern the unique justice needs of the children in their communities.

Report of the Bishop's Advisory Committee on Human Resources Issues To 137th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark

This committee was formed at the request of Bishop Mark Beckwith in 2008, and serves as an advisory resource to the Bishop and other operational entities in the diocese. The purpose of the committee is to review all policies and procedures in the diocese and bring them into compliance with generally accepted business practices.

The committee is made up of thirteen people; four of whom are clergy, six lay and three diocesan staff. Among the lay members there is a depth of experience in corporate human resource matters; the clergy provide a balancing perspective to the committee's work.

Among the accomplishments and activities during 2010 we include the following:

Denominational Health Plan (A177) & Lay Pension Plans (A138): During the General Convention in 2009 two resolutions were adopted which deal with medical and pension benefits for clergy and lay employees. In summary the resolutions mandated that all employees, clergy and lay who work 1000 hours per year (for pension) and 1500 hours per year, (for medical) must be covered and treated equally. There must be parity between lay and clergy. The committee has initiated an extensive educational program across the diocese which will continue until implementation January 1, 2013.

Activity Related to A138 & A177: The educational activities included:

1) presentations to the Newark Clergy Association and participants at the Vestry University; 2) a comprehensive survey of all congregations collecting data on staffing status and compensation. This is critically important as we develop a recommendation to the Diocesan Council on minimum plans and contributions for the medical plans. 3) publication of an informative brochure "Frequently asked Questions" which responds to the two resolutions (available at www.dioceseofnewark.org/HR/dhp_lay_pension_faqs_2010.pdf.

Stained Glass Ceiling Resolution: The Women's Commission and the HR committee were charged by the 2010 diocesan convention to conduct a survey of congregations and search committees in this diocese related to deployment patterns and compensation packages offered to clergy, paying particular attention to differences by gender. A comprehensive analysis of compensation was completed finding that there is virtually no difference between female and male clergy. We also looked at deployments for the last five years and found no pattern of male clergy being selected over female clergy. See attached report, Diocese of Newark - Analysis of Gender and Clergy Compensation, authored by Dr. Matthew Price.

Understanding Clergy Compensation – A Handbook for Wardens and Treasurers: The committee updated an earlier version published by the Clergy Compensation Commission in 2005. The new version was introduced at the Vestry University in October and responds to many questions relating to clergy compensation and deployment.

Handbook of Policies and Procedures: We have updated this manual to reflect the current best personnel and administrative practices that should be used throughout the diocese. Performance Evaluation vs. Mutual Ministry Review: The committee has produced a prototype clergy performance evaluation, which can be used in concert with Mutual Ministry Review activity. The sample clergy-in-charge performance appraisal document for use by vestries is available at www.dioceseofnewark.org/sample-clergy-in-charge-performance-appraisal-jan-20-11.doc. Compensation and Benefits: The committee reviewed and approved the recommendations for medical plans to be offered in 2011. The committee also updated the minimum clergy salary guidelines for 2012 to be considered at the 2011 convention.

Diocese of Newark - Analysis of Gender and Clergy Compensation

While striving for justice and equality, within the Episcopal Church significant inequalities still exist between the compensation of male and female clergy. This inequality of compensation is ultimately driven by the different sizes of congregations where clergy serve. In looking at the searches in the Diocese of Newark we were looking to see if there was a systematic pattern that disadvantages clergy women.

In order to understand the shape of compensation inequality we analyzed the compensation of all parish and mission clergy in the diocese using data from the Church Pension Fund. We looked to see if gender was a variable that influenced compensation in a manner that was independent of congregation size, position and years of experience. While average male clergy compensation is \$69,720, as against \$65,335 for women clergy, when congregation size, position and years of experience are taken into account, these differences become statistically insignificant. Thus female and male clergy with equivalent amounts of experience and with similar levels of responsibility earn equivalent amounts of compensation. This pattern is not found in the wider Church where gender inequalities exist in compensation even when other factors, such as congregation size and years of service, are held constant.

While this pattern does not point to obvious gender inequalities, it might be argued that a cleric's credited service and the initial positions that they obtain after ordination are themselves driven by gender biased appointments. In order to understand whether there is a pattern of appointments that favors male clergy, we analyzed the outcomes of all searches over the last five years looking at who was selected among a list of finalists. We used a combination of data supplied by the Diocese and the Church Pension Fund to understand this. In looking at this data we found no pattern of male clergy being selected over female clergy or that male clergy were only selected for the larger congregations. In the two searches, which were for two of the larger pastoral congregations, where a male cleric was selected over female candidates, there was a large mis-match in experience between the successful male candidates and the other candidates. The most noticeable pattern that we saw was between levels of mobility between male and female job candidates. Male job candidates were more likely to come from outside the diocese and male candidates from within the diocese who failed in a given search were more likely to subsequently obtain employment outside the diocese. In obtaining these out of diocese appointments, these mal e candidates tended to get better positions than the female candidates who continued to pursue calls within the diocese. These outside of the diocese positions that male clergy obtain may well translate into an advantage in a search that will drive further income inequalities at a subsequent tíme.

Thus while we did not find evidence of gender as a clear factor in the selection of clergy within the search process and while there is no evidence of compensation inequality between clergy at equivalent size congregations with similar levels of experience, gender is still a major factor in driving income inequality. While the Diocese has made significant progress in leveling the playing field within the Church, factors within the wider society that limit women's employment mobility influences what happens within the Church and ultimately accounts for the compensation differences we see within the Church.

The Diocese of Newark has adopted a system of salary administration for clergy that Includes minimum salary standards for all full-time clergy serving parishes or missions in the Diocese. Minimum salary standards are reviewed annually and recommendations are made to Convention for appropriate changes. Historically, increases in the minimum standards have been based on levels of consumer price inflation. A history of the last ten years follows:

The Diocese of Newark recommends an annual performance review for clergy. Merit Increases should be awarded based on this review in accordance with the merit increase guidelines and other market factors such as scope of position, length of service, and compensation relative to the average compensation within this diocese and surrounding

dioceses. To assist congregations in this process, the Diocese of Newark has published a Performance Review Model on the diocesan website. The Church Pension Fund publishes an annual report with compensation information by church size in each diocese which can be found at www.cpg.org/research. Compensation comparisons for dioceses surrounding Newark can be found on the last page of this document.

RESOLUTION !!!: Minimum Supply Clergy Rate

RESOLVED. That the 137th Convention of the Diocese of Newark adopts the following minimum standard for remuneration to supply clergy at a fixed rate per worship service plus the IRS approved mileage rate for travel to and from the church.

Sundays	\$ 200 for one service plus \$100 for each additional service
Weekdays	\$ 100 per service

And be it FURTHER RESOLVED that, for those supply clergy who so desire, this remuneration be declared eligible for the clergy housing allowance exclusion upon the passage of a resolution by the vestry or executive committee so designating.

Supporting information

These rates for compensating supply clergy should be considered minimum rates not meximum rates. This remuneration can be eligible for the clergy housing allowance exclusion. The Human Resources Committee can supply sample language for such a resolution, which must be passed by the vestry (or executive committee) prior to the payment for services.

In any year in which the total payments to any one individual exceed \$600, a 1099 tax form must be provided at the end of the year, a copy of which is filed with the IRS. Pension assessments are due for any non-retired cleric who is paid at least \$200 per month for three consecutive months.

Determining Part-Time Compensation

It is expected that full-time clergy work approximately 50 hours in an average week. Compensation calculations for part-time clergy should be based on this average. For example, a half-time position would require 25 hours of work per week. Clergy, whether part-time or full-time, are acknowledged to be "on-call" all of the time.

Part time clergy are compensated based on the applicable percentage of full time compensation and benefits. For example, a half-time position would require one half of the minimum cash stipend. Some benefits, such as health and dental insurance, would be paid in full.

Establishing a Housing Allowance

A portion of each clergy person's cash stipend may be designated by a Vestry or Executive Committee as a "housing allowance" in accordance with the Internal Revenue Code. The designation must be voted upon prior to payment and explicitly noted in the minutes of the meeting. The clergy person is solely responsible for tracking qualified housing expenditures and declaring any excess "housing allowance" as income. The maximum amount of "housing allowance" (excludable from taxable income) is the <u>lowest</u> of the following three amounts:

- the fair market rental value of the house (fully furnished)
- the actual amount spent to provide housing (including furnishings and utilities)
- · the amount designated in the vestry designation

Calculation of Social Security Offset for Clergy

Clergy are considered employees for income tax purposes (compensation reported on W-2) but are taxed as self-employed persons for Social Security purposes. This is called SECA, which is named for the Self-Employment Contributions Act. The Diocese of Newark mandates that clergy compensation be enhanced by an amount equal to 50% of the clergy person's estimated self-employment tax to compensate for this additional tax. It should be noted that this compensation enhancement is also considered taxable income. The example below outlines the calculation of the Social Security Offset.

The Committee on Constitutions and Canons makes the following report to the 137th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark.

The Committee on Constitutions and Canons met on two occasions, November 9, 2010 and December 17th, 2010 to consider various proposed changes to the Constitution and Canons. At the November 9, 2010 meeting the Committee discussed and approved a proposed change to Article II, Sec. 7 (Voting by Orders). It also discussed proposed changes to Canon 2 (Requiring anti-racism training); Canon 5 (increasing the term of Council members); an informal request to engage in a systematic review and update of the Constitution and Canons; Canon 17 (implementing the new Title IV disciplinary canons passed by the General Convention); and a proposal to clarify the canons in the event of the failure by the Convention to approve a unified annual budget. The Committee voted and approved a plan to review the canons with the aim over the next several years to amend the canons to reflect the Diocesan strategy to eliminate distinctions between mission churches, parishes and aided parishes. It further stayed a vote on: Canon 5 relating to the increased terms of Diocesan council, pending additional drafting by Joseph Harmon; 2) Canon 2 pending additional drafting, 3) a canonical revision clarifying the process for budget approval pending a draft submitted by Diane Sammons; and 4) Canon 17 (implementing Title IV) pending drafting a proposal by John Garde, Dean Weber and Diane Sammons.

The Committee met again on December 9 and approved the proposed Canon 2 revision as drafted by Joseph Harmon and offered final edits to Canon 5 (extending term of council), Canon 5 (Clarifying Budget Process) and Canon 17 (Implementing Title IV). The Committee has voted to approve the following proposed changes that are before you.

Article II, Sec. 7 (Voting by Orders)

AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE II, SECTION 7 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK

RESOLVED, That this 137th Convention of the Bpiscopal Diocese of Newark amend Article II, Section 7 of the Constitution of the Diocese of Newark as follows, with the bolded text to be added and the strikethrough text to be removed and all other text to remain intact, so as to read in all plain text:

"On the demand of five (5) Clergy Presbyters entitled to vote, or of five (5) Lay Deputies each from a different Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission, or Mission, the vote upon any question shall be by orders, each Clerical and each Lay Deputy voting individually; and, when a vote is thus taken, a concurrent majority in both orders shall be necessary to carry any measure."

Rationale for the change:

The purpose of this amendment is to change the word "presbyter" to "clergy" so that priests and deacons are included in the provisions. This was recommended by the Rules of Order Committee in 2009 but it was submitted too late for action at that time.

Canon 2 (Requiring Anti-racism training - name change)

AMENDMENT TO CANON 2 OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK

RESOLVED, That this 137th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark amend Canon 2 of the Diocese of Newark as follows, with the bolded text to be added and the strikethrough text to be removed and all other text to remain intact, so as to read in all plain text:

6. No person shall be eligible for election to any office at Convention, nor shall any person elected by Districts, or appointed to serve on Diocesan Council or other Diocesan Standing Committees, Commissions or Boards accede to that office, unless that person shall have first completed or arranged for the completion of anti-racism dialogues as approved by the Bishop after consultation with the Mission to Dismantic Racism the Diocesan body responsible for overseeing anti-racism dialogues.

Rationale for the change:

This canonical amendment eliminates the need to name a specific Diocesan body by instead referring to the "body responsible for overseeing anti-racism dialogues."

Canon 5, Section 1 (Increasing terms of office and revising classes of Council)

AMENDMENT TO CANON 5, SECTION 1 OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK

RESOLVED, That this 137th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark amend Canon 5, Section 1 of the Diocese of Newark as follows, with the bolded text to be added and the strikethrough text to be removed and all other text to remain intact, so as to read in all plain text:

1. COMPOSITION

There shall be a Diocesan Council consisting of the Bishops; The Secretary of the Convention, who shall also be a Secretary of the Diocesan Council; The Treasurer of the Convention, who shall also be Treasurer of the Diocesan Council; and up to twenty-six (26) additional members. The Chancellor as legal advisor to the Council shall be afforded seat and voice at all meetings of the Council.

Of the additional members, up to twenty-two (22) Council members shall be elected by the District Convocation, the number of such members to be set by Diocesan Council. Each District Convocation shall elect an equal number of representatives to the Council, half of whom shall be clergy persons and half lay persons, who shall take office upon adjournment of the Annual Convention. Each District Convocation may fill vacancies among its representatives to the Council. The remaining number shall be appointed by the Bishop.

The term of any additional member shall be two (2) years, and no person shall be reclected or reappointed at the expiration of two (2) consecutive complete terms. The Council shall have the authority to establish classes so that a representative from each district and half of the membership in each order will be elected each year.

by adding the following, which shall replace the struck-out text above

1. . .

Effective at the adjournment of the Annual Convention in January 2011, the term of any additional member elected or appointed shall be three (3) years, and no person shall be reelected or reappointed without an intervening year after the expiration of two (2) consecutive complete terms, except as provided below.

Additional members serving as of the January 2011 Annual Convention in their first two-year term shall have such term increased by one year and such members may be reelected or reappointed to one additional 3-year term, after which an intervening year must occur before further election or appointment. This provision shall apply to additional members whose terms otherwise would expire at the conclusion of the January 2011 Annual Convention.

Additional members concluding their second two-year term at the conclusion of the January 2011 Annual Convention may be reelected or reappointed to one additional consecutive 2-year term, after which an intervening year must occur before further election or appointment. This provision shall apply to additional members whose terms otherwise would expire at the conclusion of the January 2011 Annual Convention.

Diocesan Council shall have the authority to establish classes to insure equal clergy and lay representation on Diocesan Council.

Rationale for the change:

The sole purpose of this canonical amendment is to extend the term of "additional members" of Diocesan Council (those members elected or appointed in addition to the members enumerated in the first paragraph of Canon V.1). Diocesan Council has found the existing two-year terms create too rapid membership turnover in the Council, making it difficult for members to become familiar with and experienced in the workings of the Council.

This amendment retains the requirement that the districts "shall elect an equal number of representatives to the Council, half of whom shall be clergy persons and half lay persons," but the provision for districts to elect half their representation each year is eliminated. Like many of our vestries, there may be years in which a district does not elect any representative and, due to the need to replace members who do not complete their full terms, there may be years in which a district elects both representatives at the same time.

This amendment provides that all existing Council members may continue serving, including those who otherwise would be term limited after the 2011 Convention.

Projecting possible lengths of service under the proposed canonical change;

Additional members presently serving in the class of 2011-1 and 2012-1 would serve an additional 1 year and could be reelected/reappointed to an additional 3-year term for a total of six (6) consecutive years (2+1+3).

Additional members presently serving in the class of 2011-2 and 2012-2 could be reelected/respeciated to one additional 2-year term for a total of six (6) consecutive years (2+2+2).

Proposed Revision to Canon 5.4 (Adding Procedure in Event of Failure to Pass Unified Budget)

AMENDMENT TO CANON 5, SECTION 4 OF THE CANONS OF THE DIOCESE OF NEWARK

RESOLVED, That this 137th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark amend Canon 5, Section 4 of the Diocese of Newark as follows, with the bolded text to be added and the strikethrough text to be removed and all other text to remain intact, so as to read in all plain text;

CANON 5 - THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL

4. DUTIES

- Analyze needs, determine primary concerns and program priorities, and develop goals and policy for the Diocese.
 - Review and evaluate the program of the Diocese, set standards, gather and analyze data, and compare results with goals and policy.
 - c. Establish such planning groups as the Council may deem appropriate to carry out its purposes and duties.

- d. Engage consultants and utilize resources sufficient to accomplish the planning process.
- e. Supervise the financial affairs of the Convention, including budgetary matters.
- f. Submit annually to the Convention a unified budget for the ensuing year to provide for the total operation of the Diocese.
- g. In the event the Convention fails to adopt a unified budget at its annual Convention, to provide for such a budget for the ensuing year in accordance with any general or specific mandates of the Convention.
- gh. Adopt a working budget annually.
- k.i. Provide for the maintenance of sound and accepted business practices in the affairs of the Diocese, its institutions, organizations, and agencies, and its Parishes, Aided Parishes, Incorporated Missions, and Missions. To accomplish this duty the Council shall be empowered to make regulations concerning the investment of trust funds, the bonding of treasurers and custodians, methods of keeping books of account, provisions for auditing and reporting thereof, maintenance of insurance, and such other matters consistent with this Canon, provided that all such regulations shall be subject to review, alteration, or amendment by Convention.
- 4j. Give recognition to accredited organizations, institutions, and other activities of the Diocese and provide regulations whereby such recognition can be given. No such organization, institution, or other activity shall receive financial support from the budget for the program of the Diocese or shall be permitted to use in its title any designation indicating it to be affiliated with the Diocese or in any other way hold itself out as a Diocesan organization, institution, or agency without first having received recognition from the Diocesan Council. The Diocesan Council shall have the further power of establishing standards, requiring reports, and the like in connection with all such organizations, institutions, and activities.
- i.k. Approve ACTS/VIM, Ward J. Herbert and Congregational Development grants.
- k.1. Together with the Diocesan Staff, to encourage the timeliness and accuracy of parochial reports.

Rationale for the change:

The Canons do not provide for a mechanism for the adoption of a yearly budget in the event the Convention does not pass the proposed unified budget at the Annual Convention. At last year's Convention, the Chancellor was asked what would happen if the Proposed Budget was not approved by the Convention. The canons as they exist lead to differing interpretations. The intent of this proposed smendment would be to allow the Diocesan Council to determine the Budget based upon any directions provided by the Convention. This would preclude the possible need to convene another Convention for the sole purpose of approving the Budget.

Canon 17 and 18 (Incorporating Title IV)

AMENDMENT REPEALING AND REPLACING CANON 17 and CANON 18 DIOCESE OF NEWARK

RESOLVED, That this 137th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark repeal and replace Canons 17 and 18 by replacing the text as follows:

CANON 17 ECCLESIASTICAL DISCIPLINE

1. EFFECTIVE DATE

The 2009 provisions of Canon 17 as first adopted in or about January 1995 and subsequently amended, remain in effect through June 30, 2011 and, except as provided in Title IV, Canon 20.3 of the General Convention, are repealed.

2. INCORPORATION

Those provisions of Title IV of the General Convention Canons which are applicable to the Diocese are hereby incorporated as part of this Canon 17. To the extent that any of the provisions of this Canon 17 are in conflict or inconsistent with the provisions of Title IV, the provisions of Title IV shall govern.

3. VACANCIES

The death, disability rendering a person unable to act, resignation or declination to serve as a member of the Disciplinary Board shall constitute a vacancy on the Board. Notice of resignations or declinations shall be given by members of the Board in writing to the President of the Board and to the President of the Conference Panel or Hearing Panel, if one has been assigned to such a panel. If any priest elected to the Disciplinary Board is elected a bishop, or if any lay person elected to the Board is ordained prior to the commencement of a proceeding under this Canon, that person shall immediately cease to be a member of the Board and Panel. Notwithstanding the foregoing, however, if a proceeding has commenced, all members of the Panel shall continue to serve until final disposition. A lay person ceasing to be a member under this subsection by reason of ordination may be appointed to fill a vacancy in the clargy member of the Board. Vacancies on the Board shall be filled until the next meeting of the Convention by the remaining members of the Board.

4. DISCIPLINARY BOARD

- a. The Disciplinary Board shall consist of eleven (11) persons, six (6) of whom are members of the Clergy and five (5) of whom are Laity.
 - b. The Clergy members of the Board must be canonically resident within the Diocese.
- c. The lay members of the Board shall be Adult Communicants in Good Standing in a congregation in this Diocese.
- c. The members of the Board shall be elected by the Convention. Each Clergy member shall be elected for a six (6)-year term and Lay Persons shall be elected for a five (5) year term. No member of the Board may be a member of the Standing Committee.

f. Within sixty (60) days following the annual Convention, the Board shall convene to elect a President to serve for the following calendar year.

5. INTAKE OFFICER

The Bishop shall publish the name(s) and contact information of the Intake Officer(s) throughout the Diocese.

- a. The Bishop shall appoint one or more persons to serve as Intake Officers to whom information regarding offenses is reported.
 - b. The person so appointed shall serve at the Bishop's discretion.

6. INVESTIGATOR

The Bishop shall appoint one or more Investigators in consultation with the President of the Board. The Investigator may but need not be a Member of the Church.

7. CHURCH ATTORNEY

Within sixty (60) days following each annual Convention, the Bishop shall appoint and the Standing Committee shall approve one or more attorneys to represent the Church in proceedings contained in Canon 2 of Title IV. In addition the Bishop may appoint a successor Church Attorney to replace a Church Attorney who has been removed for cause or has resigned. The person so selected must be a Member of the Church and a duly licensed attorney, but need not reside within the Diocese.

8. ADVISORS

- a. The Bishop shall appoint Advisors to Respondents and Complainants for the purposes and at the times provided in Canon 10, Section 10 of Title IV.
- b. All persons serving as Advisors shall hold no other appointed or elected position under Title IV or this Canon 17 and shall not include Chancellors or Vice Chancellors of this Diocese or any person likely to be called as a witness in the proceeding.

9. PASTORAL RESPONSE COORDINATOR

The Bishop may appoint a Pastoral Response Coordinator to serve at the will of the Bishop in coordinating the delivery of appropriate pastoral responses provided for in Canon 8, Title IV The Pastoral Response Coordinator may be the Intake Officer but shall not be a person serving in any other appointed or elected capacity under this Title.

10. PUBLICATION

Pursuant to Canon 6, Title IV the Bishop shall publish to the congregations and members of the Diocese information concerning the methods and means of reporting Offenses.

11. RECORDS

- a. Records of active proceedings before the Board, including the period of any pending appeal, shall be preserved and maintained in the custody of the Clerk, if there be one, otherwise by the Diocesan offices.
- b. The Bishop shall make provision for the permanent storage of records of all proceedings under this Title at the Diocese and the Archives of the Episcopal Church, as prescribed in Title IV.

CANON 18 (Reserved for future use)

Rationale for the change:

In 2009, the General Convention passed an entirely new Title IV, the purpose of which was to: 1) make discipline more theologically consistent with our baptismal vows by providing for an emphasis on a restoration to wholeness of both the victim and the Clergyperson; 2) provide for a less adversarial system based on the style of professional boards as opposed to the current criminal justice model and; 3) reduce the number of individuals necessary to effectuate the system by allowing for the sharing of resources among dioceses and reducing the numbers of participants required.

The national canons mandate the basic structure of the disciplinary system as well as its processes with the result that essentially all individual discesses have to decide is how to populate the disciplinary bodies and the positions necessary to run the system. The proposed canons adhere to the basic methodology that we have used in the past for populating these bodies and positions.






Diocese of Newark Proposed 2011 Budget




Income

Nearly 84% of the operating income for the diocese is projected to come from pledges from the congregations. The projected income from pledges is expected to increase this year versus 2010.



Expenses

Almost half of the diocesan expenses are related to personnel. Office and Administration fees include Insurance. Information Technology, the Bishop's office and **Building and Grounds** costs. The relatively small wedge labeled "Other" includes most of the Committees and Commissions that receive funding from the diocesan budget





A 2011 Budget Vision for the Diocese of Newark



Our stewardship of resources through the proposed 2011 Diocesan operating budget reflects our call to be passionate disciples of Jesus, living in covenant with each other and God, fully equipped, empowered and engaged to undertake God's mission as we step out into the world in audacious faith.

Equipoing Congressions

The greatest resources that the budget supports for living into our Diocean mission is the staff that is maintained at current levels in this proposal after several years of cuts. The Finance Department and Property Manager's efforts equip congregations for ministry by supporting them with their stewardship of resources. A key role of the dioceae is to assist congregations with clergy transitions and ministry development that is also funded in this budget at the levels requested by the organizations.

Empowering People

The Secretary to Convention, Bishop's Executive Assistant and the Director of Resources and Training are key liaisons in empowering people in various ministries and making connections across the diocese. This staff work plus additional funding for the Commission on Ministry, the annual Clergy Conference, Namaste, Hispanic and Senior ministries empowers people, both lay and clergy, to do the work that God is calling us to do.

Engaging the World

The Canon to the Ordinary, Communications Director and Director of Youth & Young Adult ministries lead the way for our diocese in engaging the world by sharing our story and inviting others to participate.

We fully support the broader church, as we are called to step out into the world in andacious faith. Our proposed budget increases our giving to The Episcopal Church (TBC) by 1% of normal operating income — much as we are asking pariables to increase their percentage pledge to the diocese. This bold expression of our confidence in the church's ability to engage the world is consistent with our past efforts in the diocese. We continue to struggle with the unpaid portion of our pledge to TBC from 2008 and have included a minor provision toward repayment as part of our strong desire to fulfill this commitment.

The outreach component of the budget reflects our call to enter into the ever flowing stream of God's justice, emboldened by the Holy Spirit to claim the Gospel, which calls us to speak up, stand up, and act up wherever we encounter injustice against both humankind and this earth. Our total outreach spending in the 2011 budget proposal has also increased by 1% of our operating income versus last year, including domestic and international grants, the Cathedral, Prison Ministry, and funding of scholarships to Cross Roads Camp. While we would all like to do more, the increase in outreach spending in the budget reflects our intention.

Mission Oversight and Administration

A diocesan budget and staff are a necessity, not an option in the Episcopal Church. A portion of our budget is devoted to the basic administrative costs of having a Bishop, staff and building. In this, and all areas of the budget no salary increases have been included in the proposal but all other benefits including current lay pensions are fully funded. Extensive effort has been undertaken in each of the administrative functions to reduce costs in 2011 allowing for full funding for nearly every entity that made a request.

The Abundant Resources in the Diocese of Newark

Our budget is funded by our call to live into God's abundant future with nearly 84% of the income coming from pledges from the 107 parishes in the diocese. The 2011 income includes a 4% increase over expected 2010 pledging as a direct result of recognizing the gifts that we share and specifically asking parishes to give out of that abundance. The budget reflects our responsibility to support the diocese while still maintaining a voluntary program of giving. Other funding comes from investments, fees, the Bishop's Supplemental funds, Alleluia Fund drive and potential leasing of portions of Episcopal House. There are no planned reductions in investment fund principal being used as income in the 2011 budget.

In faithful response to God's leading us beyond what we ever thought was possible, we recognize the need for institutional reformation that will incarnate Christ's holy mission for our times and this budget moves us toward that vision.

Diocese of Newark 2011 Budget Line Item Detail



The following provides line by line detail of the proposed 2011 budget for the Diocese of Newark INCOMR

- Pledge Revenua. Pledges were received from 68 congregations by Decamber 10. The budget represents a reasonable estimate of what will be received in 2011.
- 2. Investments. The estimated income from investments takes into consideration the re-alignment of funds resulting from the Endowment Funds project and the spending rule established for 2011 of 4% of a rolling 12-quarter average market value. Funds are invested in the DIT Growth Fund which has a target asset allocation of 75% equities and 25% fixed income.
- Investment Withdrawal (Principal). In 2010 and 2009, principal was withdrawn from the Paul
 Moore Bequest and from the Gleason Fund to provide additional revenue. No principal
 withdrawals are contemplated in the 2011 budget.
- Crossroads Scholarship Funds. A number of funds have been consolidated to the Crossroads Scholarship Fund; the income from these funds is designated for the Crossroads Contribution shown on Line 24.
- Relmbursements/Other. The documentation for the details of these line items in earlier years is unclear so they have been combined for 2011.
- 6. Direct Administration Fee. The diocesan staff performs accounting and other services for a number of diocesan entities for which there is a direct administrative charge. The charge to these entities has been reduced for 2011, as follows:

- WJH & ACTS/VIM Audit Fees. Ward J. Herbert and ACTS/VIM are now included in the Council sudit, so a separate audit fee is not longer necessary
- 3. Investment Adula Fee. Council has approved a change in the investment administration fee charged by the diocese to funds invested in the DIT. This fee now applies to all funds and is calculated at .0625% (6 1/4 basis points) of the market value of the fund on a quarterly basis (25 basis points per year). Because the diocese manages the relationship with TIAA-CREF, and provides staff support to investment, we are able to provide access to the institutional investment expertise and management fees that would not be available otherwise. This admin fee, combined with TIAA-CREF average management free, total less than 1%.
- Panther Valley Contributions. This congregation, though not strictly Episcopal and not currently under the authority of the bishop, makes a voluntary monthly contribution.
- 10. Fund Development Work. The Alleluis Fund was begun in 2010 to provide an additional source of funds to the diocese to enhance its work. The Alleluis Fund Committee has set a target of \$110,000 for 2011, partially offset by the planned expenses of \$5,500 included in Line 38.
- 11. Bishop's Supplementary Funds. A number of invested finds have been gifted over the years to provide income to be spent at the discretion of the bishop. In past years, these funds have been used, in part, to pay some of the operating expenses of the diocese. While we are including in the budget of the diocese all of the operating expenses, we have included a contribution from these supplemental finds to assist in offsetting this increased budget item. It is intended that,

- eventually, the diocesan operating expenses will be funded without this contribution, but we just can't get there in one year.
- 12. Senior Ministries. This is a one-time gift from this ministry group from their excess operating funds.
- 13. Rental Income for 31 Mulberry. Episcopal House, located at 31 Mulberry Street in Newark, is a larger facility than is needed to effectively and efficiently house the staff. As there are no plans to significantly increase the staff or space needs in the near future, two floors have been designated for rental to a "compatible" non-profit. This budgeted amount represents a reasonable estimate of 6 months' rental income, but, until a lease is signed, is at best a guess. We have an estimate from a local realtor that the 6,000 square feet we have available could lease for \$15-\$20 per square foot.

EXPENSE

Staff expenses constitute the largest share of the expenses of the diocese. There are fourteen persons on diocesan staff; the 2011 budget contemplates no additions or reductions to staff and no salary increases. The pension cost associated with each staff member is budgeted with the employee; insurance costs are spread across the four staff line items proportionately to salaries. Medical and dental costs increase by 6.5% in 2011; staff contributes 10% to the cost of their medical insurance through payroll deduction.

Equipping Congregations

In this section of the budget, we include our diocesan Finance Office, the Bishop Anand Resource Center, and the Property Manager. Included here are the efforts of our diocese to form disciples and strengthen our faith communities for mission. It also includes the diocesan staff that helps congregations and the diocese to maintain our properties and administer our financial resources.

- 1.5. Staff: Finance Dept & Prop Mgr. There are three staff members in the Finance Department; salaries and benefits are included here. A full-time Chief Financial Officer is budgeted here, even though the interim is serving on a part-time basis. This position should be filled in the first half of the year. The property manager is subsidized by the Trustees, as half of his time is spent on properties owned by the Trustees, so this line item includes half of his compensation and benefits.
- 16. Bishop Anand Resource Center. Provides tools, resources and educational material to help individuals, commissions/committees and congregations work effectively. Operates both as a lending library and as a low-cost resource for books, journals and digital materials.
- 17. Stewardship Committee Ongoing work that includes conference registration and fees and additional stewardship resources for the diocese.
- 18. Congregation/Clergy Ministry Development. These are expenses of the office of Canon to the Ordinary that provide consultants and training resources to congregations and clergy during periods of ministry transition; resources for congregations needing assistance with conflict resolution, congregational growth and development, change management, mutual ministry
- 19. Ringwood. This line item commits the diocese to pay for the insurance on this property.

Empowering People

This section of the budget focuses on the ministries which help each of us find our voice to live as the people of God. It includes our ministries that further racial justice and cultural diversity, and our efforts to lift up lay and clergy through Education for Ministry, the annual Clergy Conference, Cross Roads Camp and the Commission on Ministry.

- 21. Staff. Salary and benefits for the Secretary of Convention, also serving as Administrative Officer of the Diocese, the Bishop's Executive Assistant and one-half of compensation cost for the Administrative Assistant for Ministry are included here.
- Diocesan Convention. The projected \$72,400 costs of the annual convention will be off-set by registration fees and fees paid by vendors resulting in no operating budget impact in 2011.
- 23. Christian Formation. Expenses here include subsidies and scholarships for retreats and conferences for youth and young adults as well as a reserve to be used for young people to attend Episcopal Youth Event in 2011 and General Convention in 2012
- 24. Cross Roads Camp Ministry. The diocese commits to provide assistance to Cross Roads in support of their scholarship assistance to campers. Approximately half of the funding for this line

item comes from the income received from funds given expressly for camp scholarships (see Line 4). The Crossroads staff requested a grant of \$25,000.

25. Commission on Ministry. Funding request is reduced for 2011 as sufficient funds have been held over from previous years. Expenses include costs for dioceasn workshops on ordained and lay ministry, modest subsidies for those in discomment and ordination process, administrative costs of commission and its three committees.

26. Clergy Conference. An annual grant and fees charged to participants pay most of the cost of the annual fall clergy conference and Lenten clergy retreat. This line item and additional funds from the Bishop's Supplementary Funds subsidize these events so that the fees charged to participants provide approximately 60% of the total cost.

 Namaste. Provides anti-racism training and related education for postulants, newly-ordained, clergy, elected and appointed diocesan lay leaders and congregations. The funds here subsidize

the cost of these training events.

28. Hispanic Ministry. Provides information and resources to congregations who are actively engaged in or seeking to become engaged in Hispanic ministry through workshops and presentations.

29. Bethsaida. This group effectively ended its work and need for funding in 2009.

 Education for Ministry. Subsidizes the cost to E/M participants; in 2010 there were 8 groups with a total of 70 participants.

31. Senior Ministries. Through generous contributions at the annual Senior Ministry Eucharist and other venues, this ministry has sufficient funds available to it to carry out its work with limited assistance from the diocese. The 2011 budget request will be used to provide honoraria to speakers.

Engaging the World

This section of the budget targets ministry beyond the Diocese of Newark and includes our pledge to The Epissopal Church and funding for our deputation to the triesmial General Convention. Also included here is our funding for Outreach Grants, both domestic and international, and our ministries which focus on the incarcerated, our companion diocese relationship with Panama, and ecumenical and interfaith relations.

33. Staff. Salary and benefits for the Canon to the Ordinary, Director of Youth and Young Adult Ministries, and the Director of Technology and Communications are included here.

34. The Episcopal Church. Our pledge to The Episcopal Church (TEC) is calculated at 17.9% of our estimated Operating Income for 2011, up from 16.9% in 2010. The TEC asking for 2011 is 20% of 2009 Operating Income (less \$120,000), or \$492,203. Our approach to the 2011 budget was to start where we were in 2010 and grow our percentage giving to TEC over the next few years until we are again at 25%, the "historic" position of the Diocese of Newark.

35. TEC 2008 Fledge Arrears. Our pledge to The Episcopal Church in 2008 was \$609,674, of which we have paid \$129,000, leaving a balance still due of \$480,674. The budgeted amount for 2011 makes some progress toward reducing the balance due and restfirms our commitment to

eventually fulfill this pledge.

- 36. Domestic Outreach. Our commitment to funding outreach as part of our Operating Budget includes grants to domestic and international entities through the Alleluia Grant process. This budget commits us to increase our budgeted outreach to 6.6% of our Operating Income, up from 5.6% in 2010.
- International Outreach. We are committed to contribute at least .7% of our Operating Income
 to International needs.

 Alleluia Fund Development. Request by the Alleluia Fund Committee to cover expenses, principally for postage and printing.

General Convention. In concert with the 2010 budget, we will reserve one-third of the expected
cost of our delegation to General Convention 2012 in each year of the triennium.

40. Communications/the Voice. Includes costs for the website, the Voice, Leader News, the Digest and all other diocesan communications. Expanded use of internet, less reliance on print and mail, and continuous efforts to reduce the cost of vendors lead to a lower budget for 2011.

- Cathedral. This reaffirms the diocese's appreciation for and commitment to our cathedral; this
 grant is for the general operating budget of the Cathedral congregation.
- Liturgy & Music. Designs liturgies for diocesan services (Convention, ordinations and confirmations) and provides liturgical resources for congregations throughout the year.
- 43. Deacons. Provides training and support to deacons of the diocese, includes cost for two participants at Directors/Archdeacon Conference and one participant at NAAD conference
- 44. Province II. In 2009, we committed to funding the costs of Province II for the triennium: \$7,643 in 2010; \$9,171 in 2011 and \$10,190 in 2012
- 45. Immigration. This task force has completed its work and its need for funding.
- 46. Ecumenical and Interfaith Officer. Represents the bishop and the diocese in ecumenical and interreligious relationships and dialogue. Expenses include funding ecumenical guests at Diocesan Convention.
- 47. Prison Ministry. The diocesan budget supplements funds contributed directly to this ministry with children whose parents are incarcerated and to adult immates of Northern State Prison. Summer camperships, Saturday mentoring, and subsidized transportation to visit parents are important programs for the children; Bible-study and Prison Pen Pals are ministries with adults.
- 48. Companion Diocese. As our relationship with the Diocese of Panama is reaffirmed and strengthened, we see modest expenses for travel to/from Panama; was previously funded by Bishop's Supplementary Funds.
- ERD Coordinator. Coordinates the diocese's communication about and connection with Episcopal Relief and Development (ERD). These funds pay for the ERD Coordinator to attend annual Coordinators' Network meeting.

Mission Oversight/Administration

This section of the budget funds the broad expense categories of oversight and administration, including the office of the bishop

- 51. Staff. Salary and benefits for the Bishop, the receptionist and sexton of Episcopal House, and one-half of compensation cost of the Administrative Assistant for Ministry are included here.
- 52. Insurance refired clergy and lay. The diocese has committed to pay for health insurance for refired clergy and spouses/dependents. For those refired (or eligible for refirement) as of 7/1/09, this commitment includes subsidizing health insurance for those not yet eligible for Medicare. Medicare-eligible refired clergy and spouses are covered under a program provided by the Church Pension Fund. The diocese also provides health insurance and a supplement to Medicare for lay employees who refired from diocesan staff.
- 53. Administration and Finance. The cost of office supplies and equipment, postage, property and liability insurance, audits, and the mortgage on 31 Mulberry.
- Information Technology. The cost of technology at Episcopal House, including computer equipment, network service and the website.
- 55. Bishop's Office. Office supplies for the office of the bishop
- 56. Bishop's Expenses. Per letter of agreement, travel, emertainment, car leasing, utilities at the residence and other expenses of the bishop
- 57. Buildings and Grounds. Maintenance and utilities for 31 Mulberry

Two important diocesan programs are self-funding and have no budget implications.

Diocesan Council Report Convention 2011

Equipping Congregations, Empowering People, and Engaging the World ... with the hope and justice of Jesus.

The Diocesan Council continued its work in a variety of ministry areas with increased energy and enthusiasm. The Council takes seriously its canonical responsibilities for long-range planning, determining program priorities and reviewing and evaluating the programs approved by the Convention. Much of its work is grounded in that intentionality and the mission statement of the diocese.

The Diocesan Council met in the months of February, March, April, May, June, September, November and December in 2010 and in January 2011. In addition to the meetings held at St. Agnes' Church in Little Falls (for which the Council is grateful for its hospitality) the Council met at St. Dunstan's, Succasunna; Christ Hospital, Jersey City; and All Saints', Millington. In September the Council gathered for an overnight retreat to review the mission statement, the vision statement and for planning by the action teams.

Each of the ten districts was represented by one clergy and one lay person. They were joined by four other representatives, two lay and two clergy, appointed by the Bishop.

Each member participated in one of the three action teams of Council. Each team had two co-conveners who were also members of the Steering Committee, which oversees the work of Council. The action teams were assisted by the members of the diocesan leadership team. During the year, the action teams established goals for 2011 and 2012 that were periodically reviewed.

The three "Action Teams" reflect the three dimensions of the mission statement (equipping, empowering and engaging). They are: Equipping Congregations, Empowering People, and Engaging the World. Their purposes are:

- To provide local congregations with the training, people, and financial resources necessary to equip and advance their unique ministries.
- To creatively develop or discover resources that will spiritually <u>empower</u> individuals, groups, and congregations to fully live out their mission as intentional disciples within and outside of the Diocese of Newark.
- To creatively develop or discover resources that equip and empower individuals and congregations to engage the world with the hope and justice of Jesus.

The Steering Committee (comprised of the co-conveners of the three action teams) in consultation with the Bishop's staff prepared the agendas for Council meetings. The Steering Committee members were: The Rev. Vicki McGrath and The Rev. Canon Dr. Sandye

Wilson for Equipping; Ms. Martha Reiner and The Rev. Ginny Dinsmore for Empowering; and The Rev. Joseph Harmon and Ms. Liz Moss for Engaging.

The Equipping action team sponsored the first annual Vestry University at which nearly 200 people attended a series of workshops designed to assist congregations in a variety of ministry, governance and program areas.

The Empowering action team sponsored a Food Forum that brought together people already involved in or wanting to start congregational feeding programs and food pantries and receiving information and resources on funding and next steps.

The Engaging action team sponsored the Listening Campaign with a series of trainings, kitchen table discussions and report backs to hear from the people in the diocese about issues, concerns and ideas.

The team members were ably guided in much of their work by Mr. David Manting, Omega Strategy Group, who helped with goal setting and identifying specific tasks.

The Diocesan Convention adopted a resolution directing the Diocesan Council "to institute a review of the budget process....to continue to pursue vigorously transparency in reporting, accountability in decision-making, and fiscal responsibility in accordance with the mission of the Diocese and its stated priorities, including our long-standing commitment to domestic and international outreach and to The Episcopal Church....and that the Diocesan Council Budget and Finance Committee be directed to hold an open hearing on the 2010 budget midyear, to publish monthly budget reports on the diocesan website, and to hold a diocesan forum in early November as part of the budget process."

In response to the resolution, a dedicated finance and budget page was created on the diocesan website where the monthly budget and financial statements are posted. In addition, the presentations with notes that were provided at the mid-year (June) and fall (November) budget forums were published.

The Finance and Budget Committee of Diocesan Council met during the year and recommended a balanced budget for 2011.

Council accomplishments and actions during the year included:

- adopted the diocesan budget for recommendation to the 137th Annual Diocesan Convention
- requested a canonical amendment to change the terms of council members from two years to three years
- adopted an Assets Distribution Policy for the use of funds from the sales of diocesan owned property and closed churches
- endorsed and recognized Church of the Incarnation, Jersey City as carrying out the work of the Jersey City strategy adopted in 1997 calling for a new ministry and mission
- reviewed and recommended seven medical health plans for 2011

 ratified grant recommendations from the ACTS/VIM Board, the Alleluia Fund Committee and the Ward J. Herbert Fund Board, and loans from the Episcopal Capital Loan Fund (ECLF)

approved the expenditure of \$13,500 from the Jersey City Funds to St. Paul's for the

year 2010 to support the summer camp program

approved the expenditure of \$56,000 from the Jersey City Funds to Church of the Incarnation for the year 2010 to support clergy support (\$26,000), summer day camp (\$12,000), after school program (\$8,000), youth outreach and development (\$4,000), congregational development (\$3,000), drop in center (\$1,000) and Latino ministry development (\$2,000)

- approved the expenditure of \$56,000 from the Jersey City Funds to Grace Church Van Vorst for the year 2010 to support support of existing and new programs. Existing programs: small group ministry, youth group, children's ministry, drop-off toddler program, education program, Breakfast Plus1, Grace Senior Center for Health Living. New programs: Godly Play/Story Haven (\$3,275), Grace Hall (for kids) (\$12,225), children's ministry (\$2,000), young adults/students (\$8,000), men's ministry (\$17,500), Breakfast Plus1 Expansion (\$8,000), family seminars (\$3,000), small group ministry (\$2,000)
- elected trustees to the Rutherford Senior Manor, Nutley Senior Manor and Hillsdale Senior Manor
- elected board members to Episcopal Community Development Corporation, Jersey
 City Episcopal Community Development Corporation and The Apostles' House

Statement of Proceedings of the

Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties-2010 Overview of Trustee Operations-2010

The Trustees met formally four times in 2010 (March, June, September, and December) to address issues and review reports from Diocesan Staff related to the assets and properties under their supervision. In addition, at least two special meetings were held to address similar issues related to the review and reorganization of various endowment funds under the care of the Trustees. Between regular and specially called meetings, the Officers met frequently by phone, in person, or by e-mail, as did subcommittees of the Trustees to monitor progress on projects and to attend to matters primarily related to the maintenance and sale of real estate. All Trustees collectively met in special work sessions between the regularly scheduled quarterly meetings to consider specific projects and concerns.

Endowment and Custodial Management of Funds by the Trustees

<u>Categories</u>: The Trustees are custodians for, and manage funds, which fall into three major categories:

The endowment of the Diocese (unrestricted funds given or left to the Diocese), the income from which by long-standing convention mandate is used "to support the episcopate of the Diocese" (e.g., operating budget, if necessary, or specific programs);

Undesignated funds, the income from which can be used discretionarily by the Trustees (for example, to make repairs at Episcopal House); and

Designated funds held for the benefit of the Diocese, congregations, or other ecclesiastical institutions, for which the Trustees serve merely as custodians.

As part of the Trustees' responsibility to manage various assets for the Diocese and its member churches and organizations, the Trustees continued a number of long term projects during the 2010 calendar year including:

TIAA-CREF: The Trustees continue to monitor and evaluate the work of TIAA-CREF as the investment repository for assets under the supervision of the Trustees and the Diocesan Investment Trust. The Trustee-initiated transfer of funds to TIAA-CREF took place in September 2008. In early 2009, customized reporting, tracking mechanisms and investor statements were finalized. As a result of the transition, operations in the Finance Office have been made immeasurably easier and reporting on investments for all entities is now timely, detailed, and reliable. The Finance Office and the DIT Board members are actively focused on investment strategy and supervision, transaction and account security, and customer service for DIT investors. The Trustees continue to monitor the performance of TIAA-CREF and continue to work with the Interim Financial Officer of the Diocese to refine the financial reports provide to the Trustees.

Fund Study: The Trustees received the initial report of subcommittee consisting of

Trustees and appointed advisors created to continue the process of reviewing and reorganizing the many restricted and endowment funds under their supervision. In the fall of 2008, the Trustees established a subcommittee to conduct an analysis of the work initially undertaken for the Trustees by Vice Chancellor Allison Garde concerning some 240 funds of the Diocese. The subcommittee study, which has been a cooperative effort with the Chief Financial Officer of the Diocese and the Diocesan Audit Committee, was audited in 2009 by the new independent auditing firm selected for the Diocese, O'Connor Davies Munns & Dobbins. The purpose of Vice Chancellor Garde's study was to identify the legal parameters that govern the permissible use of the corpus and the distributions for all funds, and to categorize the funds accordingly. The Trustees are now in the process of reviewing this lengthy and detailed set of reports and recommendations provided by the subcommittee, and upon completion will implement recommendations to consolidate funds and redirect assets/income in accordance with the terms of the original grant or gift. A full report concerning the funds will be made when the collaborative work is completed. The Trustees voted to continue providing support to the 2011 Diocesan budget from various funds at historic levels pending completion of this work.

Audits of Trustee assets for the 2009 fiscal year were received, reviewed, and approved as submitted by the audit firm of O'Connor Davies and approved by the Diocesan Audit Committee.

"Amalgamated Fund": The Trustees provide funding for Diocesan projects, commitments, and responsibilities from the income of a general amalgamated fund, whose value as of September 30, 2010, was approximately \$1.6 million. The distribution from the endowment that the Trustees spend annually includes paying one half of the compensation for the Diocesan Property Manager.

Restricted Assets: All other non-real estate assets that are under the oversight of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties are held in trust for other entities of the Diocese. These assets, which exclude the "Amalgamated Fund" totaled approximately \$22 million as of September 30, 2010. These assets are legally restricted in their use. Trustees legally cannot use these assets, or income from them, at their discretion. Regarding these assets, the Trustees act only in a custodial capacity. Such assets include endowments, pension plan funds, and other vital assets of individual entities within the Diocese.

Management of Real Estate

Categories: The Trustees hold title to the following four categories of property:

Real property of the Diocese (e.g., the Bishop's house in South Orange, and Episcopal House at 31 Mulberry Street, Newark).

Aided parishes while they remain in that status.

Mission parishes formerly under the management of the later disbanded Department of Missions.

Real property and proceeds from the sale of the property of extinct parishes (N.J.S.A. 16:12-16).

<u>Property Management</u>: During 2010, the Trustees continued to work closely with James Caputo, the Diocesan Property Manager, to address concerns on properties under their oversight. This also included Mission Church properties.

Sale of Property: The closing on the sale of the former St. Mary's Church property in Haledon, New Jersey occurred in early 2010. This was the culmination of an almost four year effort by the Trustees to address the many title and other legal issues associated with this property which had delayed the sale. After the many expenses of holding and selling the property were deducted, the balance was distributed in accordance with the Asset Distribution Plan for the sale of surplus property.

Additional properties are on the market including the former Trinity Church in Irvington. Sale of properties has been difficult because those few that are under present consideration for sale have had either time-consuming legal encumbrances or unqualified prospective buyers. Further, the significant decline of the real estate market has made it difficult to sell commercial real estate.

The Trustees continued to deal with issues involving the attempted condemnation by the New Jersey School's Construction Authority of the property on Cator Avenue in Jersey City acquired some years ago as part of the Jersey City initiative. The Trustees are attempting to resolve various issues with the State so that the property can be sold and the proceeds redirected for other uses in Jersey City.

The Trustees also continue to deal with issues associated with the former St. John's Jersey City property and are attempting to resolve issues there in an effort to redevelop the property for productive use.

The Trustees continue to manage and maintain the former St. Mark's property in West Orange, including the cemetery located in Orange.

St. Gabriel's., Milton Oak Ridge -The Trustees litigated and resolved a tax appeal in the Tax Court of New Jersey involving the tax exempt status of this mission church property resulting in the return of previous appeal property taxes of approximately \$30,000.00.

Episcopal House: At the request of the Bishop, the Trustees commissioned a space review and analysis of Episcopal House with the goal of determining whether it was possible to create more revenue for the Diocese by leasing out a portion of the 31 Mulberry Street space to a qualified not-for-profit organization. An architect and space consultant were retained for this purpose. After much consideration it was determined, in consultation with the Bishop and Diocesan Staff, that the 31 Mulberry Street property could be more efficiently utilized if the Diocesan Offices were consolidated onto two floors thereby freeing up space for potential rental opportunities. Consideration was given to the costs involved in the consolidation of office space and the benefits that might arise as a result. The Diocesan Staff was commissioned to interview potential leasing agents and, based upon their recommendation and a through review by the Trustees, the Newark based firm of Square Foot LLC was commissioned to solicit potential tenants. This project is ongoing.

A Word of Thanks

The Trustees also received and accepted with regret the resignations of two long standing members of the Trustees, Mr. John Lynch of St. Mary's, Sparta and Dr. Deborah A. Brown, of Trinity, Allendale. Both have faithfully served this Diocese in a number of elected and appointed positions and both have served as President of the Trustees. Resolutions of thanks were issued for their years of service.

The Trustees appointed the Rev. Dean Weber, of All Saints, Leonia, a former Chancellor of this Diocese, to fill one of the open positions until the time of the Diocesan Convention in January 2011.

CLERGY AND CONGREGATION REPORT For Diocean Convention 2011

As our diocese completes the first decade of this 21st century, we are at once apprehensive and excited about the Bpiscopal Church today it is for certain that there are no easy answers, no sure-fire prescriptions for the challenges presented by doing ministry with dwindling numbers of the faithful and shrinking dollars in the collection plate.

As we come to understand the unique stories of our congregations, the Bishop's Office envisions its role as a congregational midwife to the births of ever-evolving ministries that seek to reflect their congregations' deepest yearnings. And as midwife to also provide coaching and best practices resources that encourage and help grow their mission and ministry.

The Diocese does not profess to be an expert—telling congregations what they "need to do". That is not the function of a midwife. Our task is to assist the Spirit in what she might be birthing at the moment. We listen, we share, and we experience the pains of labor together to help birth a new creation wherever God has called us to be. Acknowledging the risk of failure, but nevertheless being willing to journey forth in andacions faith.

Moving From Clergy Deployment to Transition Ministry

For decades, we have we have spoken of **deploying** clergy in our Church. "Deployment" suggests that someone has the authority to move someone somewhere (like in the military) when in fact no truly has that authority over clergy.

We now speak of transition. Transition encompasses not only the actual process related to change in clerical leadership, but also the internal psychological dynamics congregations in coming to terms with the change: the fear, anger, anxiety, excitement, and sadness that accompany it.

- Deployment Officers are now Transition Ministers.
- Canons for Deployment are now Canons for Transition Ministry.
- The Church Deployment Office at 815 Second Avenue is now the Office of Transition Ministry

Most significantly, the antiquated and limiting protocol represented by the clergy/lay professional database and parish opening posting created in 1970 is being overhauled and replaced with a new system.

The format of both personal profiles and parish profiles has changed to a portfolio format that allows both congregations and clargy to describe their gifts and ministries in fuller and more descriptive ways, greatly expanding the information and vanues in which it can be found.

Looks like before we meet.

This past year, we introduced a new web page for Clergy Transition Ministry, providing useful information to clergy, vestries and congregations regarding Transition Ministry, including:

- A Clergy leave-taking brochure and leave-taking manual
- A Transition Ministry brochure and comprehensive manual about the process, from saying goodbye to the departing clergy to welcoming the new rector.

Links to other resources that clergy, vestries, and search committees might find useful.

We now also offer to congregations in transition, transition ministry consultants who can provide guidance to search committees and vestries at critical stages in the process.

Every congregation's transition experience is unique, and the Bishop's Office attempts to introduce and promote flexibility throughout the process in appreciation for the congregation's needs and particular situations as that process unfolds.

The Viability and Vitality of Congregations: Redefining How We Understand Church

Another reality is that more and more small churches are having a very difficult time meeting the minimum full time clergy package mandated by our diocesan canon.

The national church defines a small church as one that has an Average Sunday Attendance (ASA) of 100 persons or less. Some prefer to point to an operating budget of \$200,000/year as defining a small church. In 2007, over 65% of our congregations would have fit either definition: ASA less than 100 (68% of our congregations). Budget less than \$200,000 (62% of our congregations. The national church average in both categories is 66%.

31 of our congregations, about a third, presently do not have full time clergy. The national church average in 2008 was 37%. That said, we should nevertheless appreciate that not all small congregations (or even part-time congregations for that matter) are per se failing congregations. Many thrive with the vigorous involvement of lay people. In the end, it's more about living into what God is calling the congregation to be (active verb) than about them trying to be something that we too often tell them they must become —a Big Church.

We also number among our congregations, 19 missions in this diocese. Several of them have healthy, vibrant ministries that hum along without diocesan financial support of any kind. Their buildings are well maintained, and their mission and ministry strong. Their budgets while a continuing challenge are faithfully and responsibly watched over. There is growing sentiment in this diocese that the mission-parish distinction is no longer a useful construct, and that we should consider calling all our communities of faith, "congregations".

For congregations in serious trouble, there may be few alternatives other than to end their ministries. In these circumstances, due consideration and conversation needs to take place in a defined and well-ordered manner. This coming year, the Diocese will attempt to train pastoral response teams who will provide "hospice" care to congregations who no longer have the vitality nor viability to continue.

We recognize too that particularly small parishes while passionate about their mission and outreach frequently don't have the means to do it on their own. A diocesan taskforce is currently looking at the funds that we make available to congregations through loans and grants. We are hoping to come up with a comprehensive plan and process that will make what money we do have to offer more accessible to our congregations while calling for responsible stewardship of what is being shared.

Already in place is a diocesan asset distribution policy that calls for allocating a significant percentage of the money from the sales of extinct parish properties to be made available to congregations for the purposes of creating new ministry and encouraging collaborations among congregations. We are also continuing to explore how we can help congregations and clergy by sharing with them the costs associated with providing resources such as consultants, or enhancing the gifts of those engaged in ministry both lay and ordained.

Significant Developments in 2010

Sadly, there is continued resistance to collaborative ministry undertakings such as clustering, unification, or even sharing one or two ministries among ourselves. There is suspicion of the Diocese and fear of loss of independence. There are historical animosities, so to economic stratifications, and deep cultural divides. The challenge for us is "to let go and let God". To embrace the reality that as a Diocese, our congregations, as the Bishop has noted, " are all in this together".

Despite the total destruction of Good Shepherd Church, Midland Park, by fire in 2010, the unification of the former Trinity Church, Allendale and Good Shepherd recognized at Convention, continues to prosper. The insurance proceeds and sale of properties have led to the creation of an endowment for ministry as well as a tithe to the Diocese.

November saw the formal recognition of shared clergy ministry at Haworth, as the Episcopal congregation of St. Luke's and the Lutheran congregation of Good Shepherd entered into an agreement for leadership of both communities by the Rev. Dr. Shane Phelan.

Our diocese continues to celebrate the ongoing shared ministries at St. Andrew's, Lincoln Park and Church of the Transfiguration, Towaco; St. Martin's, Maywood and St. John's, Hasbrouck Heights; and St. Peter's, Clifton and St. Paul's, Belleville.

Promising explorations of clergy sharing began in 2010 between Trinity and Calvary Churches in Bayonne; and between St. Luke's, Hope and St. Mary's, Belvidere.

Finally, in the face of the continuing financial downturn, many congregations in transition have requested the assistance of the Bishop's Office in the appointment of a priest-in-charge while they undertake a discomment of their future mission and ministry. There are now more than 15 clergy who are serving our congregations in this vital transition ministry. Many thanks for their hard work and unstinting faithfulness.

A COMMITMENT TO SERVE/VENTURES IN MISSION

ACTS/VIM is charged with financially supporting programs and projects that encourage both congregational development and community outreach. We honor this charge by granting, on a semi-annual basis, monies to programs of our Diocese.

In 2010 ACTS/VIM gave 38 grants which totaled \$140,000 to congregations, social service organizations and Diocesan programs. Seven of these grants were given to congregations who had never received ACTS/VIM funding before while 31 went to support ongoing work in the Diocese. The list of grants on page two of this report shows the great variety of ministries happening in our Diocese. It is inspiring to support this work and help bring about the kingdom.

During the year the Board continued to work at making our grant making system as clear and easy to follow as possible. We started by creating an Executive Committee to do a first read of applications in order to catch any omissions or miritakes. This allowed us to contact groups and help them make their applications complete before the first Board meeting in March. Since we had several new Board members beginning in March, we began the meeting with a new Board members. During that meeting we clarified our grant application process, made revisions to the application and spelled out how we use the Grant Scoring Sheet.

Through out the year, the ACTS/VIM Board tried to provide coaching and support to grant applicants, especially those applying for the first time. Members made extra visits, follow up calls and helped groups to re-write their applications in order to help them meet the guidelines and have success in receiving a grant. Board members would like to do even more of this kind of work in order to widen the circle of who applies for and receives grants. However, the current system of two granting cycles per year limits the amount of time that Board members have to do this type of work.

Several members of the ACTS/VIM Board also serve on the Congregation Loans and Grants Committee which is working to consolidate and coordinate existing congregational loan and grant programs in the Diocese. Until that Committee makes final recommendations, ACTS/VIM has decided to hold off on going to a once a year cycle until 2012.

Finally, it has been a privilege for us to serve on this committee and help organizations within the Diocese live into our baptismal covenant. We thank you.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2010. BISHOP ANAND RESOURCE CENTER

The Bishop Anand Resource Center, located on the first floor of Episcopal House, is a multi-media library for use by the clergy and laity of the Diocese of Newnik. The center is committed to having un-to-date resources on the issues effecting our lives and the life of the church today. All materials may be borrowed free of charge. The Resource Center is accessible Monday through Friday between 8:30am-4:30pm and at other times as needed.

The Bishop Anend Resource Center continues to support over 80% of the congregations in the diocese. This is an increase of over 60% since 1998. The Resource Center continues to be an important and viable ministry of the Diocese as it lives into the mission statement:

The Bishop Anand Resource Center primarily equips congregations in the following ways:

- Supports diocesan goals by providing tools, resources and educational material to help individuals, commissions/committees and congregations work effectively.
- ♦ Committed to having up-to-date resources on the issues affecting our lives and the life of the church today.

- Provides books, curricula, periodicals, video/DVD materials, people resources and assistance
 in their usage for congregations within the Diocese to clergy, lay individuals, Christian
 educators, etc. in all their ministries.
- Supports the stewardship of resources BARC can purchase a program to be used by multiple
 congregations rather than have each congregation buy the same resource to be used only by
 them.

The Bishop Anand Resource Center also engages the world by serving as a contact to those outside the Diocese seeking information and resource guidance. The director networks with peers around the country to continually find new ways to serve the congregations and people in the Diocese of Newark.

The Bishop Anand Resource Center also empowers people by providing guidance and resources to individuals as they move along on their spiritual journey.

Additionally:

- The Resource Center continues to be a place where the laity and clergy of the Diocese come for help and advices in addition to resources.
- The Resource Center has available for loan, multiple copies of Safeguarding God's Children for congregations to use for Children Abuse Awareness training for employees and volunteers as well as Preventing Sexual Harassment and Sexual Exploitation in Communities of Faith.
- The Resource Center has helped a growing number of congregations, commissions and congregational development initiatives obtain resources at a reduced cost by ordering in bulk and then being reimbursed.
- The director of the Resource Center continues to serve as a consulting resource, available to meet on and off-site with vestries and other congregational committees looking for guidance in meeting the needs of their adult, youth and children in programs such as Bible Study, Sunday School, confirmation, etc.
- The director communicates and astworks with other Christian educators from around the country to share
- The director is a staff representative and resource to the Christian Formation Commission, Liturgy and Music Commission, Namaste and Diocesan Council.

COMMISSION ON MINISTRY ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2010

The work of the Commission on Ministry, as established by National Canons, is to advise and assist the Bishop in:

- The implementation of Title III of the National Canons
- The determination of present and future opportunities and needs for the ministry of all baptized persons
- The design and oversight of the ongoing process for recuitment, discernment, formation for ministry, and
 assessment of readiness for ministry of the latty and those called to ordination

The Commission on Ministry in the Diocese of Newark consists of three committees: the Committee on the Priesthood (whose principal responsibility is with those in the priestly ordination process); the Committee on the Diaconste (for those in the diaconal process); and the Committee on the Laity (whose work is to enhance and provide amount for lay ministries).

The role of the Commission on Ministry is to foster the ministry of all – lay and ordained – and it is important that the members of the Commission be holistic in their thinking and planning, so that there will be a better understanding of not only the task of their committee, but also how their efforts can improve the ministries of all in the Diocese.

As a result, all members of the Commission attended the annual Commission retreat in 2010. The theme of the retreat in 2010 was Discernment, appropriate for a Commission that works with those seeking to better and more fully understand God's call for them. Traditionally, most view discernment as applicable to those seeking ordination, but the Commission sees that a too narrows a focus. There is an important place for discernment for all lay persons, including those not interested in ordination but in seeking where God is in their day-to-day lay lives. It is this focus that will be at the heart of the work of the Commission in 2011.

Discomment has been defined as "the Christian practice of sceking God's call in the midst of the decisions that mark one's life" and "a process of intentionally becoming aware of how God is present, active, and calling us as individuals and communities so that we can respond with increasingly greater faithfulness." (From The Way of Discornment by Elizabeth Liebert.)

All individuals who wish to consider whether they are being called to the ordained life of a priest or deacon spend a

period of intentional discernment with a community of others, often from their own congregations. That has been the practice in our Diocess as it is throughout the Church. Recently more and more lay people have sought to discern God's call with no expectation or intention of seeking ordination. Working with a community of others, they seek to better understand God's role and presence in their lives and in the decisions they make.

Therefore, in 2010 the Commission amounced God is Calling - How Will You Answer? Discernment for All God's People which will be held on Saturday, April 2, 2011. All lay people are invited to attend this day, to learn more about:

- The ministry of the laity
- Methods of discernment that may help lay persons "seek God's call in the midst of the decisions that mark one's life"
- The ministry of priests and deacons

The Commission on Ministry will host this one-day event and will provide an overview of the discernment process, consideration of the various ministries of lay persons as well as deacons and priests, and models of Christian discernment.

The Diocese is changing some of the steps required of those seeking to enter the ordination process. Specifically, all aspirants interested in entering the process toward ordination as a priest or deacon will be required to attend the April 2, 2011 meeting, together with their sponsoring parish priest and members of their discernment committee.

THE COMMITTEE ON THE PRIESTHOOD

In 2010, the Committee on the Priesthood sponsored two Nominee conferences, a Postulancy conference, and a Candidacy conference. We sponsored the second annual retreat for current Postulants and Candidates.

At the beginning of 2010 there were ten people in the process: eight postulants and two candidates. During 2010 two of those individuals were ordained to the priesthood, and the Bishop received the orders as a priest of another individual who had previously been ordained in the Roman Catholic church. We begin 2011 with eight people in the process: seven postulants and one candidate. In addition, we currently have a number of individuals who are presently working with parish discernment committees, and we expect most of them to attend a Numinee Conference in 2011.

As mentioned above, all individuals wishing to enter the process of discernment toward ordination are required to attend the April 2, 2011 full-day event. After an intentional period of discernment together with their discernment committees, such individuals may be invited to a May 2012 Nominee Conference.

During 2010, we made a number of smendments to the guidelines used by those in the process toward priestly ordination, and revised the Commission's website. Members of the Committees on the Priesthood and Diaconste will work to develop guidelines that, to the extent possible, may be used by those scelcing either priestly or diaconal ordination.

The four chairs of the Committee on the Priesthood meet regularly to coordinate our work and plan for future needs. While we have a structure in place that works well, there are always individual issues that need to be addressed to make the process not only a meaningful one for people in the process, but also one that is efficient and effective. I cannot express how honored I am to work so closely with the Rev. Melissa Hall, Conference Chair, the Rev. Anne

Bolles-Besven, Education Chair; and David Sullivan, Documents Chair, for all they do to make this a clear, helpful, and ever-changing process.

Being sensitive to the Diocesan budget constraints, we were able to maintain the Administrative Fee at \$1,400, which offsets roughly half the cost to the Diocese of moving an individual through the priestly process. This also reflects the requirements in the Canons that place financial support from sponsoring congregations as essential.

The Chairs of the Priestly and Diaconal tracks meet periodically with a network of chairs of other Commissions on Ministry in Province II. These meetings and our contacts with Commissions of Ministry in other discesses have been very helpful to us as we work to live more fully into the Canons of our Church, and to be a Commission of All Ministries.

THE COMMITTEE ON THE DIACONATE

The Committee on the Diaconate, the twelve-member committee overseeing discernment and formation for the discosate, spent a quiet year in 2010. Parish Discernment Committees were established and are completing their work with six aspirants. One will be attending a Nominee Conference in early January, and the remaining aspirants are likely to move forward in 2011.

The Committee spent the better part of 2010 perfecting and finalizing the proposed new formation program for deacons in our discoses. The majority of academic work will be offered in partnership with the Newark School of Theology, which will also offer a newly developed course to provide a clinical pastoral education experience for deacons in training and lay persons who wish to receive training in pastoral caregiving. This academic work will be complemented with Saturday coursework to be held at a new discosan School for Deacons. Two standard formation tracks have been developed — a three-year and a four-year option — to accommodate the varied needs of our deacons in formation.

We continue to explore coordination of our work with the Commission on Ministry's other committees, the Committee on the Priesthood and the Committee on the Laity, A new model to establish Parish Discomment Committees and a unified discomment process have been the fruit of this work and will be realized with our first discosum Day of Discomment on April 2, 2011.

We note with great sorrow the death in 2010 of the Ven. Herb Tinning. Herb was a passionate advocate for the revival of the diaconate in the Diocese of Newark under Bishop Cronsberger. His energies and service to the cause were legendary, and we all owe him a debt of gratitude for his selfices work to raise up and form a new generation of deacons who share his passion for ministry.

THE COMMITTEE ON THE LAITY

During this past year, the Committee on the Laity continued its afforts to increase awareness that non-ordained members of the Episcopal Church, as well as those who are ordained, are called to ministry and that those ministries need and are entitled to support, recognition, and encouragement. The Episcopal Church now places an emphasis on the need to provide resources for the laity, and the Committee on the Laity is committed to doing so.

The Committee on the Laity developed a resource manual for lay ministry called Celebrating Life as Ministry: Tools for All God's People. This manual is a compilation of resources which can be used by individuals and congregations to support and enhance the ministries, both within and without the church, of lay persons. We have been working to make churches and individuals aware of its potential to help lay persons develop and deepen their ministries. The committee is particularly committed to the belief that the life of every person of faith includes

opportunities for ministry many times every day in their interactions with other people and in the choices they make in living their lives. Ministry is about everyday living as well as working within formal structures.

The Committee on the Laity has made many efforts to promote lay ministry and to provide resources for this ministry. At the Annual Convention of the Diocese of Newark in January, 2010, we presented a workshop about the ministries of ordinary members of the Diocese who have committed ministries in the fives. The focus of the workshop was on ministry in ordinary situations and lives rather than about isolated efforts we make for our churches or a program once a week or month. The workshop was attended by a large number of people (standing room only!) and was enthusiastically received. The feedback sheets indicated a hunger for opportunities for lay persons to meet together to share ideas and to receive training and support for their lives of ministry.

The Committee also attended several District Meetings to introduce the manual and to promote awareness of lay ministry. We have received several invitations to provide adult forums at individual churches.

We planned a day for lay people in November with a well known speaker and with workshops that would demonstrate different resources of the Manual, including methods of discernment. Although we have received many requests for opportunities such as this, the day had to be cancelled for lack of registration. We are in our own "discernment" process to understand what obstacles interfered with the success of this day so that we can provide future opportunities for sharing and learning.

The ministry of all the baptized is a concept that is growing in importance in peoples' minds. That all aspects of our lives should reflect our faith is becoming clearer. The Committee on the Laity will continue in 2011 to uphold and promote those ideas and to provide resources to help people make the ideas a reality in their lives.

COMMUNICATIONS REPORT

2010 was a year of discernment, redesign and expansion for diocesan communications, with groundwork laid for further growth in 2011.

Print Communications - The Voice

A continuing challenge for most dioceses these days, including ours, is determining the right mix of print versus electronic communications. To aid in that, the Communications Office conducted a survey via a postcard mailed to all 11,000+ subscribers of the Voice in March, asking those who rely solely on print communications to respond.

The survey revealed that about 240 households (just over 2% of subscribers) either did not have internst access, or did but strongly preferred to receive news in print, and that among readers who are fully comfortable receiving news electronically, many still have a great fondness for the print edition of the Voice.

As a result, it was decided to publish the Voice twice a year, focusing on feature articles, with time-sensitive news disseminated electronically. Starting with the September 2009 issue a new editor, Virginia Citrano, came onboard, and the Voice was redesigned to a home printer-friendly booklet format to make it much easier to download or read online.

Other factors arose during the year that affected the way the Voice is distributed. People who had seen references to the Voice in the Digest or Newark List emails reported never having been added to the mailing list, which is maintained by the church offices, and the survey revealed that many readers had died or moved away, but had never been removed. When mailing list updates were requested once again last summer, more than two thirds of churches did not respond. Then in October, after the 2011 budget had been submitted, the Post Office informed the diocese of changes that made it impossible to continue our periodical (second class) mailing permit. The only other feasible option, bulk (third class) mail, is both slower and more expensive.

Faced with rising mailing costs and the difficulty of maintaining an accurate distribution list, the diocese decided that is 2011 the two print editions of the Voice will be box shipped to congregations for picking by readers. This eliminates the burden placed on church offices to update their realing lists as well as frustrating post office delays, and makes extra copies available for newcomers and visitors. The Voice will also be available for download any time from the diocesan website. Readers who find that neither option is practical may sak to have a copy medied directly to them. After both 2011 print editions of the Voice have been distributed this way, this process will be re-

Electronic Communications - e-Newsletters, Social Media and the Website

For years the diocese published one basic weekly e-newaletter, the Digest. As the diocesan communications offert became more robust, more vehicles were introduced. Administrative news was spon off to the Leadership News (initially called the Clargy & Lay Leader News), allowing the Digest to focus on general interest news and feature stories, with both e-newaletters published bitweekly. The Digest gained more than 300 new subscribers in 2010, ending the year with over 1300; the Leadership News has over 500 subscribers.

Due to its expanded readership and change of focus, beginning in January 2011 the Digest was renamed the Voice Online to better reflect its function. This name change also positions the diocese to be able to take advantage if postal regulations are changed to count culine publications, allowing us to reapply for a periodical mailing permit. The Voice Online and the Leadership News will continue to be published biweakly in 2011. The diocess also solidified its use of social media with its Facebook page, which has nearly 500 members, its new Twitter feed, online photo albums on Picasa, and online videos on YouTube and Vimeo.

The diocessa website underwent a "facelift" in late 2009 within its current technology, and its complete redesign in a more modern technology will be a major focus in 2011. Before this can take place, a full inventory of the current website, subdomains, listservs and entail accounts for which the diocese is responsible must be made. This was began in 2010. Also during 2010, a small test force consisting of the Director of Communications, website coordinator John Rollins, Jan Parton and Steven Boston, after several months of research, selected Drupal as the best open-source option for website development. Research has also identified options for a more reliable and less expensive diocesan web host. The plan is to migrate to a new web host early in the year (bringing about a cost savings), and then begin development of a new website with a handful of core pages, continuing over time to include the entire site.

Other Communications Efforts

A logo was created for the diocese and Ismached in the summer of 2010 on all electronic media, and was incorporated in the Voice masthead and the diocesan letterhead – making all diocesan communications recognizable at a glance. The logo presents familiar elements in a fresh way, with a design based on the cross in the diocesan shield and a font from the same family as that used in the Book of Common Prayer.

The Communications Office also provided extensive support for Bishop Mark Beckwith's communications efforts, which included his blog, an op-ed pisce in the Star-Ledger and an appearance on PBS. Other priorities included the Alleluia Fund, the Bishop's Advisory Committee on Human Resources and Benefits, the Commission on Ministry, the Descons, the new Diocess of Newark Chapter of Episcopal Church & Visual Arts (ECVA), the Listening Campaign of the Engaging the World Action Team of Diocesan Council, and NEWARK ACTS—just to name a few. Many congregations also asked for and received support, especially regarding websites, e-newaletters, social media and other new, electronic communications tools.

TECHNOLOGY REPORT

Episcopal House relies on two servers, now five and seven years old, for its email, file sharing, and database management system. The majority of its individual deaktop and laptop computers are over four years old, most having been purchased in the summer of 2006. Since the reasonable lifespan of these items is about four years, the diocese has gotten its money's worth from its previous hardware investment.

The plan for 2011 is to replace both servers with a less-expensive single machine that can be subdivided into multiple servers, and begin replacing individual desktop and laptop computers on a rolling three-year schedule, with 1/3 being replaced this year. Estimates for hardware and IT support from the diocese's current IT vendor and two competitors are being reviewed.

By shopping for competitive bids and taking advantage of technological advances that didn't exist when the current hardware was purchased, the diocese expects to create a more reliable computer infrastructure at an affordable cost.

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THE ACTIVITIES OF THE DIOCESAN INVESTMENT TRUST IN 2010 REPORT TO CONVENTION, JANUARY 2011

The Diocesan Investment Trust (DIT) manages the investments of the Diocese of Newark and the investments of those congregations and other diocesan organizations that choose to place their investments with the DIT.

The DIT, working with the Dicessan Finance Office, continued to work towards improving the level of service to investors and equipping congregations with the tools they need to manage their investment resources. To do this the DIT has adopted a broader view of its mission than hitherto.

The DIT placed its investments with the TIAA-CREF Trust Co. in 2008 following a general review of investment managers that could provide a broad range of investment alternatives, a low management fee, and who would take over the back office operations of account bookkeeping formerly undertaken by the Diocesan Finance office. The review was conducted by the Trustees, the Finance Organization and the DIT.

The DIT has continued its efforts to provide informational resources to congregations about investments. To this end, a seminar was held on October 6, 2010 on the investment cutlock, the investment options available with TIAA-CREF and the advantages of investing under the DIT unbirella. Buddy Bearman from TIAA-CREF was the featured speaker. Some 42 congregational leaders from around the diocese attended.

The Finance Office, working with the DIT, has adopted more explicit protocols on the deposit and withdrawal of congregational investment funds. Those protocols are intended to improve the level of security of funds against potential error and fraud.

For diocesan investments, in keeping with the investment outlook and following the course of many endowmenttype investors, finds are invested following the "total return" concept and are currently invested about 75% in equities and 25% in fixed income. Congregational investments are invested in the proportions that individual congregations decide.

In 2010, 6 new congregational accounts were opened with a combined investment of approximately \$2,000,000. Total assets under management by the DIT as of November 30, 2010 were over \$40 million.

All of the available TIAA-CREF investment portfolios increased in 2010. The all equity portfolio increased 19.7%, the all fixed income portfolio increased 7.0% and the growth portfolio, in which most of our diocesan funds are invested, increased 16.5%.

Canon Gregory Jacobs. This was the 12th year for Church of the Saviour to host this program and would be the last. The ECW Board extends a huge thank you to all the women and men who worked so much for us over the 12 years.

The National ECW Triennial Board held their meeting in the Province II area at Stony Point Center NY and invited ECW women of Province II to join them for a day to bring us up to date on the plans for 2012 Triennial. Ste Bennett and Doris Mardinosian attended.

We are still searching for a President and Secretary. Also the position for Church Periodical Club and Social Justice is now open. We still share the leadership by each acting as a convener and we have a volunteer as acting secretary. We pray that 2011 we will have these positions filled.

We look forward to 2011 with hopes that we meet our goals and that God's Blessings will be with us.

EPISCOPAL COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT, INC.

2010 was a pivotal year for Episcopal Community Development, Inc. ("BCD"), aptly presaging the organization's 20th anniversary in 2011. BCD began the year by relocating its Newaric-based offices from 31 Mulberry Street to 620 Clinton Avenne. The move accommodated its growing staff, but also allowed for a more efficient operation: the administrative, real estate, and housing counseling departments now share a facility with BCD's recently opened Clinton Hill Community Resource Center. Not insignificant is BCD's occupancy of a formerly vacant building in its target neighborhood. BCD has built or rehabilitated more than 100 affordable housing units in Clinton Hill, a number that will quadruple in the next three years. Providing supportive services to this community through a resource center undergired the housing development and promotes the well-being of the residents. The move was obviously supported by ECD's finding sources, as almost \$100,000 was raised explicitly to help defray costs.

It can also be reasonably said that BCD assumed its place as one of the most productive affordable housing developers in the state in 2010. ECD is the largest non-government recipient of Neighborhood Stabilization Program awards ("NSF" — part of the federal stimulus program) in New Jersey. The Stabilization Brogram evertee through NSF in acquire, rehabilizate, and recycle abandoned, fureclosed properties back into the market in two of the most severely impacted neighborhoods in Newark and Irvington will compound into a \$40 million investment. This is the most significant cash influsion these communities have seen in at least half a century. The enormity of fulls impact is being sensed by the financial, political, and service communities. In spite of the relatively low profile ECD has maintained over its 20-year history, that profile is naturally rising as stakeholders communitied the potential.

ECD's housing counseling department experienced another unprecedented year of serving over 500 families at risk of foreclosure. A decrease in need is neither evident nor expected in the foreceable future. Clients are becoming increasingly difficult to help as gaps in employment lengthen and incomes shrink. In spite of the challenges, ECD maintains one of the highest success rates of HUD-certified housing counseling agencies in the state at keeping families in their house.

The Clinton Hill Community Resource Center (CECRC) continued to place its stamp on the community with expanding services. A second year of summer camp for area children, using low-income youth as mentons, provided an imnovative way to solve multiple community challenges. Over 500 families were served through Operation Hollday's second annual gift-giving season. North Porch now calls CECRC home as its only Newark location. Finally, a recent partnership with Newark Now has established CECRC as the only VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) sits in the South Ward, realizing an 8-year goal of the Newark Asset Building Coalition. In total, 3,000 were served through CECRC in 2010, a number that will be surpassed in the coming year.

In spite of this activity, covering the operational expenses continues to be a challenge, as most grants are programspecific and general operating support is increasingly difficult to secure.

A non-profit subsidiary of Heath Alifance for Care, Inc., Heath Village is a full-service retirement community with no life care fees. Heath Village has provided seniors with superior retirement living for more than forty years. The multi-level care community offers independent living options in cottages, studies, one and two bedroom

apartments and hotel-style studio units. The 40-bed residential health care center, Mayflower House, offers both private and semi-private rooms in a warm and gracious living environment. The Clarence W. Sickles Health Care Center is a New Jersey state-licensed, 99 bed facility offering comprehensive and professional nursing services for both temporary and extended stays. A broad spectrum of on-site rehabilitation therapy services are offered in the sub-acute care area, as well.

Heath Alliance for Care, Inc., the parent organization, operates DayBreak, an adult daycare center that offers an approach that is responsive to adults who require special attention and who would benefit from socialization with the security of returning home each evening. Heath VIIIage is pleased with the accomplishments made during 2010. Our campus continues to be updated, renovated and expanded as opportunities present themselves. We continue to combine apartments to allow for more spacious accommodations.

Heath House continues to be the center of most of the activities, especially during the winter months. The lobby, club room, fitness center, bank, library, chapel, computer center, auditorium and dining areas offer residents a variety of versues to pursue their interests or to just socialize.

In September of 2010 Heath Village lannohed a new program called Health-Ability, which is the only one of its kind at a retirement community in New Jersey. It is a comprehensive lifestyle program with a personalized approach to helping you improve regardless of your current health status. It is designed to help you increase and maintain physical mobility and overall well-being so that your health span can match your lifespan. Researchers have identified some common traits shared by people who live to advanced ages while retaining vigor and independence. REPORT OF THE BISHOP'S ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON HUMAN RESOURCES ISSUES

This committee was formed at the request of Bishop Mark Beckwith in 2008, and serves as an advisory resource to the Bishop and other operational entities in the diocese. The purpose of the committee is to review all policies and procedures in the diocese and bring them into compliance with generally accepted business practices.

The committee is made up of thirteen people; four of whom are clargy, six lay and three diocesan staff. Among the lay members there is a depth of experience in corporate human resource matters; the clargy provide a balancing perspective to the committee's work.

Among the accomplishments and activities during 2010 we include the following:

Denominational Health Plan (A177) & Lay Pausion Plans (A138): During the General Convention in 2009 two resolutions were adopted which deal with medical and peasion benefits for clergy and lay employees. In summary the resolutions mendated that all employees, clergy and lay who work 1000 hours per year (for peosion) and 1500 hours per year, (for medical) must be covered and treated equally. There must be parity between lay and clergy. The committee has initiated an extensive educational program across the diocese which will continue until implementation January 1, 2013.

Activity Related to A138 & A177: The educational activities included:

1) presentations to the Newerk Clergy Association and participants at the Vestry University; 2) a commensative survey of all congregations collecting data on staffing status and compensation. This is critically important as we develop a recommendation to the Diocesan Council on minimum plans and contributions for the medical plans. 3) publication of an informative brochure "Frequently asked Questions" which responds to the two resolutions (available at www.diocesecfnewark.org/HR/dbp_lay_pension_faqa_2010.pdf.

Stained Glass Celling Resolution: The Women's Commission and the HR committee were charged by the 2010 diocean convention to conduct a survey of congregations and search committees in this diocean related to deployment patterns and compensation packages officed to clergy, paying particular attention to differences by gender. A comprehensive analysis of compensation was completed finding that there is virtually no difference between fismale and male clergy. We also looked at deployments for the last five years and found no pattern of male clergy being selected over famile clergy. See attached report, Dioceae of Newark - Analysis of Gender and Clergy Compensation, authored by Dr. Matthew Price.

Understanding Clergy Compensation — A Handbook for Wardens and Treasurers: The committee updated an earlier version published by the Clergy Compensation Commission in 2005. The new version was introduced at the Vestry University in October and responds to many questions relating to clergy compensation and deployment.

Handbook of Policies and Procedures: We have updated this manual to reflect the current best personnel and administrative practices that should be used throughout the discose. Diocese of Newark - Analysis of Gender and Clergy Compensation

While striving for justice and equality, within the Episcopal Church significant inequalities still exist between the compensation of male and female clergy. This inequality of compensation is ultimately driven by the different sizes of congregations where clergy serve. In looking at the searches in the Diocese of Newark we were looking to see if there was a systematic pattern that disadvantages clergy women.

In order to understand the shape of compensation inequality we analyzed the compensation of all parish and mission clergy in the diocese using data from the Church Pension Fund. We looked to see if gender was a variable that influenced compensation in a manner that was independent of congregation size, position and years of experience. While average male clergy compensation is \$69,720, as against \$65,335 for women clergy, when congregation size, position and years of experience are taken into account, these differences become statistically insignificant. Thus female and male clergy with equivalent amounts of experience and with similar levels of responsibility earn equivalent amounts of compensation. This pattern is not found in the wider Church where gender inequalities exist in compensation even when other factors, such as congregation size and years of service, are held constant.

While this pattern does not point to obvious gender inequalities, it might be argued that a cleric's credited service and the initial positions that they obtain after ordination are themselves driven by gender biased appointments. In order to understand whether there is a pattern of appointments that favors male clergy, we analyzed the outcomes of all searches over the last five years looking at who was selected among a list of finalists. We used a combination of data supplied by the Diocese and the Church Pension Fund to understand this. In looking at this data we found no pattern of male clergy being selected over female clergy or that male clergy were only selected for the larger congregations. In the two searches, which were for two of the larger pastoral congregations, where a male cleric was selected over female candidates, there was a large mis-match in experience between the successful male candidates and the other candidates. The most noticeable pattern that we saw was between levels of mobility between male and female job candidates. Male job candidates were more likely to come from outside the diocese and male candidates from within the diocese who failed in a given search were more likely to subsequently obtain employment outside the diocese. In obtaining these out of diocese appointments, these male candidates tended to get better positions than the female candidates who continued to pursue calls within the diocese. These outside of the diocese positions that male clergy obtain may well translate into an advantage in a search that will drive further income inequalities at a subsequent time.

Thus while we did not find evidence of gender as a clear factor in the selection of clergy within the search process and while there is no evidence of compensation inequality between clergy at equivalent size congregations with similar levels of experience, gender is still a major factor in driving income inequality. While the Diocese has made significant progress in leveling the playing field within the Church, factors within the wider society that limit women's employment mobility influences what happens within the Church and ultimately accounts for the compensation differences we see within the Church.

IMMIGRATION TASK FORCE

Did you know:

- Two-thirds of all foreign-born live in the traditional "big shr" immigrant states, of which New Jersey is one. 1,718,034 New Jersey residents are foreign-born.
- More immigrants now live in suburbs than in central cities.
- The foreign-born population is 13.5% of the total US population, down from 15% a century ago.
- In 2008, the top three countries of birth of the foreign born living in New Jersey were India, Maxico and the Philippines.

Immigrants have been and still are a fabric of our society. And, the importance of embracing those who differ from us by culture and place of origin is clearly established in our faith.

Between the Baptismal Covenant injunction to "seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself" (BCP, p. 305) and Christ's own expansive definition of "neighbor" as set forth in the parable of the Good Semaritan (Lk 10:25-37), the Church has a clear mandate to carry out an active ministry of compassion toward all immigrants, regardless of their legal status or place of origin.

The Diocese of Newark has chosen to live out the Baptismal Covenant through its Core Values, two being Radical Hospitality and Justice/Non-violence. This idea of radical hospitality led the 133rd Convention of the Diocese of Newark to pass a resolution requesting the Diocese adopt the "same fundamental principles as those approved by the 75th General Convention of the Bpiscopal Church" as found in the document The Alien Among You. It was this resolution that requested the Diocese of Newark consider the call of Christ to welcome everyone in our midst, regardless of their immigration states. Furthermore, this same resolution requested the Bishop appoint a task force of individuals who would study the issue of immigration in the diocese.

There are more than 1 million immigrants who live and work in New Jersey. These individuals are our neighbors, our fellow parishioners and our friends. All of them are our sisters and brothers in Jesus Christ and we, as a Diocese, must accept the challenge to work together so that everyone might live and work with dignity and without fear or injustice. The thrust of the Immigration Teak Force came from Diocesan Convention 2008 and the work continued to explore ways in which we as the Living Body of Christ can learn more about the issue at hand, create ways to office effective ministry to those in need, and educate all in the diocese about the plight of immigrants.

We came together in late 2008, and during our time together discussed the myriad of issues faced by immigrants in the United States. We identified issues, learned of resources and began the process of networking with other groups and religious organizations to determine what was being done, and what is needed. During our time together, we learned there is an immense need to assist immigrants. They are one of the most vulnerable populations in New Jersey. They are taken advantage of, treated unfairly, refused assistance at agencies and fearful of help from any institution; fearful they will be swept up and forced to their native country without the ability to ever see their family again. Unfortunately, these fears are well founded in the truth that faces the immigrant today.

Though we came together late in 2008, we eagerly began to work on the issues before us. We reached out to Congregations to inform us of the allens in our midst. We spoke to people working with immigrant populations. We joined the Interfaith Immigration Coalition. We became informed of the legislative advocacy happening in our community and signed onto petitions for this immigration reform and better treatment of immigrated detainees.

We learned that within the towns of our Diocess we house multiple immigration detainees. Immigrants awaiting deportation. Immigrants who have no family near by to visit them, no attorney to advocate for them and possibly even no one who speaks their language to assist with basic needs. Many of these immigrants have no oriminal background. We spoke to advocates for these detainees. We helped with advocacy, letter writing and attending visits.

What we discovered is an intense, ongoing need to help. Much of that help is already ongoing within our Diocese. Congregations offer food pantries, citizenship classes, English as a Second Language classes, lectures on the rights of immigrants and a variety of other services that are available regardless of one's immigration status.

But, there is much more work to be done. There is a continued need to enhance the services we do, outreach to those who we do not currently serve and educate ourselves about immigrant populations.

This work can not end with this task force. Immigration has been a part of the United States since Europeans first landed on Native American soil and will continue to be a part of our culture for centuries to come. Very few of us can say we are not descendents of immigrants.

With that in our mind, we have found a mechanism to continue to bring this issue to the Diocese, along with other issues of justice. The newly formed Justice Board will continue the conversation of immigration as they seek to hear issues of justice from around our Diocese.

JERSEY CITY EPISCOPAL COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION

"Our mission is to create healthy neighborhoods through neighborhood development initiatives that cultivate the resources of residents, businesses, government, and the faith-based community of serving those most vulnerable in our society."

Division of Supportive Housing and Social Services

Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-housing Program:

In November of 2009, JCECDC was awarded funding from Hudson County to provide individuals and families who are at-risk of homelessness with prevention services such as financial assistance, case management and housing stabilization. This program also provides enhanced diversion assistance for those who have already lost their housing finough the provision of Brief Case Management and one-time financial assistance, Housing Location and short-term rental assistance, and mediation for those who may be able to return to the housing they exited. Utility assistance is also being provided. During 2010, JCECDC was able to assist more than 100 families to remain in their homes. In addition, we were able to assist over 50 individuals and families who had lost their homes to secure new homes and svoided them having to go into shelters.

Emergency Food Pantry:

In October 2010, JCECDC implemented an Emergency Food Pantry in partnership with The Church of the Incarnation. The pantry currently serves approximately 150 families per month and is open to the community every third Saturday. Each family is provided with enough food to support them for a few days. In December, a "take out" hot meal was also provided to everyone as well. Our goal is to expand the program to weekly distributions that will serve 150 families per week and to provide enough food for a week.

Homeless Memorial Service:

The 2nd Amnual Homeless Memorial Service was held this year on December 21nd – a coalition led by JCECDC and the Church of the Incarnation. The service was nicely attended and included prayers and lighting of candles in memory of homeless people who died this year. The County Board of Freeholders and County Executive recognized us and declared the day a Memorial Day in Hudson County. A box hunch and donated items of winter clothing were distributed to the homeless that attended.

Employment & Training:

The Customer Service Skills Center (CSSC) is a job training and job placement assistance program that was initiated in 2004. This year the program was awarded funding from the City of Jersey City to expand the program and provide basic computer skills training which helped us to improve the technology skills of more than 75 unemployed individuals this year. In 2010, the CSSC trained over 120 unemployed NJ residents which 68 successfully gained long term supplyment.

Division of Real Estate Management and Development:

On October 12th, we calebrate d the completion of our first mixed use development project on Monticello Ave., in Jersey City that consists of seven condominium units with 2,000 square feet of commercial space. In addition this project is the first LEED Silver Certified project in this neighborhood which provides 20% energy savings to users and a building constructed with renswal materials.

JCECDC is also a Neighborhood Stabilization Program recipient and was the first recipient to acquire, rehabilitate and sell three for-closed properties in the State of New Jersey.

REPORT OF NAMASTE

Nameste is a formal greeting of respect offered by Hindus to one another. It has become popular in yoga culture, and a Christian parallel could be "the Christ in me affirms the Christ in you." Former members of the Mission to Dismantie Racism, the Reparations Task Force and the inclusion group of Diocesan Council chose this name in 2009 to underscore the spiritual aspect of the task of dismantling racism in our diocese and to embody our baptismal promise to respect the dignity of every human being. Here are some of our accomplishments during this past year:

- We adopted the revised "Seeing the Face of God in Each Other" curriculum recommended and prepared by the national church and have used it in all dialogues in 2010.
- During the past year, 33 persons have participated in diocesan-sponsored anti-racism dialogues.
- Nameste dialogue facilitators and participants have frund that the greatest value of the trainings is in the
 dialogues that the materials encourage—it is difficult to create a safe space to talk openly and honestly
 about race relations in this country. Hence the change of title from "Anti-Raciam Training" to "AntiRaciam Dialogues."
- In 2010, we continued to carry out the diocesan policy requiring all clergy seeking licensing in the diocesa
 to either show proof of participation in anti-racism dialogus in another diocesa within five years or to have
 taken the diocesan-aponeered dialogues as a condition of being licensed.
- Nameste is currently designing "next steps" opportunities for those win have completed the 14 hour
 dialogue sessions to come together for information sharing, additional dialogue, and encouragement to
 apply the haights gained in the participents' congregations as well as diocessm settings. We are seeking to
 recruit more dialogue facilitators as well. Dialogues will continue to be offered at various times throughout
 the year.

The corneratones to NEWARK ACTS are: Social Justice, Community Service, Communal Living and Spiritual Formation. The eight in our inaugural class are living into their commitment to seek and serve Christ in all whom they meet. We are blessed with their presence in our community and look forward to sharing their story with our diocess and northern New Jersey throughout 2011.

NEWARK ACTS in the past twelve months has become a vital and integral part of our life in the Diocese of Newark. The eight interns of our inaugural year swept into Newark and Jersey City with little fanfare and have taken root in these communities and our lives with ease accompanied by their numerous gifts of talent.

NEWARK ACTS has nine ministry partners who have offered our program diversity in the arens of social and economic justice. THE NEWARK SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

The Newark School of Theology (NST) has continued its educational ministry in 2010 by offering high quality, seminary level classes in the Bible, Biblical languages, Diaconal Studies, Pastoral Care, Theology, and World Religions. Our students come from Newark and nearby cities, Essex County, and throughout the Diocese. Most are from lower income families and would be unable to study academic theology without the opportunities provided by NST. Thanks to continued support from congregations, friends and supporters, we have been able to remain faithful to our commitment to matriculate all students who want to study at NST and are able to do the course work, regardless of income.

Highlights of this past year include achievements of three NST alumni. Mrs. Pamela Parker McGee completed a Master of Theology degree, summa cum laude, from the New Brunswick Theological Seminary in Inne. Mr. Nicholas Johnson, who came to NST while still a student at Setun Hall Preparatory School, completed his baccalaments degree with a double major in History and Religious Studies at the University of Chicago, also Inne. He entered Princeton Theological Seminary this fall as a divinity student. Mr. Miguel Hernandez, a candidate for Holy Orders in the Diocese of Newark, will soon be completing his studies at General Theological Seminary.

NST was granted renewed upper-division and graduate credit recommendation for many courses by the Department of Education, New York State, in October. This five year approval permits NST students to earn more than a year of upper-division and graduate credits through a transcript service provided by Excelsior College, Albarry, New York. A formal relationship with the New Brunswick School of Theology is being developed. The two schools plan to offer a joint Metro-urban certificate for inner-city pastors in the fall of 2011. NST will introduce a new class, Education for Pastoral Care (EPC), next fall. Developed in cooperation with the Commission on Ministry, EPC was designed for disconal candidates who are seeking an alternative, but equally rigorous, path towards fulfilling their clirical pastoral education requirements. Space permitting, lay persons who have a background in theology and are able to do theological reflection will also be admitted.

Given the success of our students and the need most have of completing their undergraduate studies, the Board has set the goal of developing. The Newark School of Theology into a four-year fully-accredited liberal arts college of theology. We seek to continue our educational ministry in Newark by providing opportunities for low income students and others to obtain a high quality college education at an affordable cost. We stim to participate in the increase of the quality of life in Newark and its development by providing a traditional liberal arts curriculum that highlights the study of theology and the contributions it makes to our common life. We are also mindful of the economic impact the new college will make in Newark by providing opportunities for its graduates to ecquire good jobs and pursue graduate study in any of several fields and professions.

We thank churches in the Diocese, friends and supporters for their gifts and prayers.

NORTH PORCH WOMEN & INFANTS' CENTERS

North Porch continues to supply those who come to our centers for emergency resources with sufficient items for a week's supple of items for their infants. We now have three centers operating: Newark, Paterson and Dover.

During 2010 we were challenged with building decay at the Newark center; the cathedral owned property at 2 Park Place. As the basement we were using would be too expensive to restore we rarely realized we would have to find a new location for Newark North Porch. After an extensive search for an appropriate new location we accepted the invitation by Episcopal Community Development at 620 Chinton Avenue, for us to be located in their premises. In September the Newark North Porch reopened its doors in Newark. The hest parish for this center is still Trinity and St Philip's cathedral; it is just the location that changed. We also needed to hire a new center

manager for this center. Just as we were about to call people for interview, Newark ACTS contacted us to inquire about the possibility of one of their interns being the new center manager. We are thrilled to be part of this new venture and we love our Newark ACTS intern.

We feel blessed to be so well supported by our Bishop and other staff at Diocesan House. We are also blessed to be so generously supported by the many churches in the diocese. We have received donations of money and supplies from many churches and groups. We are also so appreciative of the fact that when we ask for certain items such as diapers of specific sizes we receive them. Without the support of so many of you all, those of you from the diocese who are reading this and your fellow parishioners, we would not be able to continue to help so many needy mothers and their infants.

For more than twenty-five years the mission of North Porch Women & Infants' Centers has been to provide emergency aid to mothers and other caregivers and their infants. In 2010 the North Porch Board of Trustees realized it was time to look at the way in which we operate; how we fulfill our mission and whether or not the mission of the past was as relevant today. We implemented several visioning days, led by Paul Bolles-Beaven, to caushle us to go forward so that North Porch helps the needy in ways most beneficial to them, using the resources we have in the best possible ways. We are continuing in our visioning, intentional about completing it together.

In June the Board of Trustees thanked Barbara Lovely, the outgoing president, for leading us for the previous two years.

The Board is dedicated to serving our Lord, following his call to serve and as he reminds us in Matthew 25 "what you did for the least of these, you did for me."

The Prison Ministry Committee has regular meetings 11 months out of the year. To become a member of this committee, all one has to do it be active in Prison ministry, and attend as many meetings as possible. Meetings are on Priday afternoons or evenings at Trinity St. Philips Cathedral. We are always glad to welcome interested visitors to our meetings.

Partnerships

A very important area of our work is partnering with an organization called OAR (Offender Aid and Restoration). We have several committee members who sit on their Board, and OAR's PATCH Committee, (the program that

supports the children of men and women who are incarcerated). We work together on the "Learning by Experience" program which takes place on Saturday mornings at the Church of the Epiphany in Orange.

This year, OAR honored the Rev. Barbara Harriman and the Rev. Christian Carroll for their faithful work in OAR programs.

Committee members are actively involved with an interfaith group, The Essex Chaplaincy Association, which has been working with many denominations to bring religious services to the immates at the Essex County Correctional Facility.

We are pleased that District 10 has made a commitment to work on prison ministry as a District project.

Prison Bible Study and Worship Services

The Bible Study at Northern State Prison this year focused on the New Testament. The average weekly attendance is 12-15 men. The program is held Wednesday evenings, and a worship service with Holy Eucharist is held on the first Wednesday of the month.

Fundraising

A fundraising letter was sent to the diocesan parishes many of whom responded generously to the cause of campetships and program costs for the Saturday Mentoring or "Learning by Experience" Program. We were able to raise \$6585.00.

We received money from ACTS/VIM to send children to camp and a grant from the Alleluia Fund to give a stipend to a PATCH program coordinator.

Pon pala

This continues to be an important ministry to the incarcerated. We fulfill Jesus' imperative to visit those in prison by writing a letter. The letters are essentially pestoral visits. We meintain a post office box for the purpose of receiving and disbursing Pen-pal letters.

A pen pal web site (<u>www.nenpalministry.ors</u>) has gone up and we are working on our web presence for Prison Ministry.

<u>Networking</u>

Members network with other prison ministry groups, including OAR, Exodus Transitional Community and Bridge to Recovery.

Restorative Justice Sunday, Nov. 15, 2009

Restorative Justice Standay was proclaimed to be the third Sunday of November each year at the 135th Convention of the Diocese of Newark. The purpose is to raise public awareness of incarcerated men and women; and to encourage congregations to emplore the causes and consequences of crime, and to pray for solutions that are just for victim and perpetrator. A bulletin insert and other materials were made available to parishes. This was our second year of getting the word out on this Sunday. Several churches in the diocese had special speakers that day. Prison Ministry now provides speakers who have done time.

Children's Programs

The "Learning by Experience Program", on Saturday mornings meets at Epiphany Church in Oranga. This program is supported by volunteers and transportation funding by the churches and organizations of the diocese. We have experienced some changes in the program this year because many of the women are now being housed in a half-way house, Logan Hall. The visiting program is ready to start up at Logan Hall in 2011.

In-kind Gifts

Many parishes in the diocese respond to our request for Christmas gifts for children of incarcerated parents. We were able to serve families whose parents were primarily at the Rusex County Jail, as well as Toler and Logan Halls, half-way houses in Newark, and families in a re-entry program.

Backpacks are put together in August for the children before they begin school.

We also collect personal care products which are distributed to the recently released.

Concert

The yearly Lessons and Carols and hymn sing program was held at the Hudson County Jail. Many singers in our diocese participate in this program.

Summer Campership

The children attended the Salvation Army Camp, Camp Tecumseh, located in Hunterdon County for the second summer. This was again a very successful experience for the children. The Parishes in the diocese are critical for supplying the money for this project. The parishes in the diocese were also able to supply duffle begs and the necessary camp items for the children.

Trainings

SENIOR MINISTRIES

Senior Ministries seeks to provide programs, resources and ministry to, for, of and with senior members of diocesan congregations and seeks opportunities to celebrate their ministries.

This year Senior Ministries honored 64 seniors from more than 45 parishes at the annual David P. Hegg II Lifetime Achievement Awards Evensong with over 520 in attendance on June 13th at St. Peter's Church in Morristown. Certificates of appreciation were given to those seniors who provided invaluable contributions to the life of their parishes and the dicesse. The collection plate offerings received at this Evensong were divided equally between The SRC — Senior Resource Center, at Church of the Messiah in Chester and Shepherd's Haven at Christ Church, Pompton Lakes, In 2011 the Evensong will be on June 12th at St. Peter's Church, Morristown.

In the coming years "baby boomers" will be reaching their senior years, so the importance of having a well-defined, comprehensive body of information available for this growing population increases in importance. Until this year Senior Ministries tried to define the critical areas for, and concerns of, seniors. This year started a move to gather information in these areas and names of those agencies and advisors who would be helpful in educating our parishtoners. This information needs to reach not only seniors but also the families and caregivers of our seniors.

A program of "End of Life Preparations" was begun. At this time there is available a presentation on "Hospice –Is it too soon to talk about it? "with more seminars being planned. A resource library will soon be available within the Bishop Anand Resource Center at Episcopal House. Materials for distribution as well as in-house research are being collected. Also available are Hospital information cards so family and advocates of the patient will be contacted upon their loved one's hospitalization.

WARD J. HERBERT FUND

The Ward J. Herbert Fund Board (WJH) was established by Diocesan Convention in 1990 with a mandate to empower the restoration, repair, improvement, beautification, and otherwise to extend the usefulness of the churches and buildings in the diocese. The board administers three funds through which financial assistance is distributed.

Fund 1: A 50/50 grant program operated under specific criteria and funded by investment returns from the original Church Structures Capital Campaign dedicated to this purpose.

Fund 2: interest received from outstanding Episcopal Capital Loan Fund (ECLF) loans make up the Property Maintenance Fund (Fund 2). The Board makes Fund 2 monies available on a flexible loan or grant basis with a particular care for need and emergency.

ECLF: The Episcopal Capital Loan Fund makes short- and long-term loans to churches for capital projects.

Applications are accepted for firree granting cycles on February 15, May 15 and September 15 and are available at www.diocescomswark.org/wih.html.

The Ward J. Herbert board continued to be very active in 2010. The Ward J. Herbert board considered 30 requests for a total of \$251,804, and was able to find all of the requests for a total of \$169,255 or 67% of the request amount. As part of the process, most churches requesting grants were visited by teams of at least two board members for the purpose of reviewing the work scope, inspecting the site and making recommendations regarding any other building issues that may be observed.

Additionally, the executive board met numerous times to address specific issues regarding individual churches.

The board was provided excellent support by Miohael Francaviglia in terms of logistical, historical and administrative support. The discessan property manager, Jim Caputo, was also invaluable in assisting fite board with insight from his many previous visits to the various churches as well as a great sense of the history and technical issues involved in the repairs that were being funded. The board works closely with the Diocessan Council, the Standing Committee, and the Trustees of the Diocese, each of whom have designated representatives on the WHI board.

ECLF LORIS

During the year five Episcopal Capital Loan Funds were made totaking \$185,831. The loans were made to Good Shepherd, Wantage, \$35,400, for a roof replacement; Good Shepherd, Fort Lee, \$40,000, for repayment of a construction loan; St. Agnes' & St. Paul's, East Orange, \$37,000, for church and parish hall roof replacements; St. Gabriel's, Milton/Oak Ridge, \$33,431, for roof replacements and firmace; and Epiphany, Orange, \$40,000, for roof replacement and furnace. In addition, the repayment of a loan issued to Christ Church, Belleville in 2008 for \$13,000 (balance was \$12,330) was suspended until the future disposition of the property.

Additionally, the executive committee reviewed the list of outstanding loans and will apply any new capital received through the asset distribution policy evenly between the ECLF fund and the Ward J. Herbert fund.



CONSTITUTION & **CANONS**

OF THE

EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF NEWARK

January 2011
(Canon 2, Section 6 amended, replaced the words Mission to Dismentie; Canon 5, Section 1 amended, revised terms of Council members; Canon 5, Section 4 amended, added procedure for adoption of a unified budget; new Canon 17 replaced previous Canons 17 and 18)

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CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I ACCEDING TO THE GENERAL CONSTITUTION

The Church in the Diocese of Newark, as a constituent part of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, accedes to the Constitution and Canons of that Church, and acknowledges their authority.

ARTICLE II THE DIOCESAN CONVENTION

 There shall be a Convention of the Church in this Diocese, on the second Saturday in May in each year, or on such other day as may be specially appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority. The Convention shall be held at the Cathedral unless the Ecclesiastical Authority appoints otherwise.

2. SPECIAL CONVENTIONS

The Bishop, or if the Episcopate be vacant or the Bishop be incapacitated from acting, the Standing Committee shall have the power when it appears requisite for the good of the Church in this Diocese to call a Special Convention. No business shall be transacted at any such meeting other than that stated in the notice.

3. NOTICE OF CONVENTION

Written notice of every Convention shall be given by the Secretary of the Convention by mail at least four (4) weeks previous to the date of the Convention, stating the time and place. Such notice shall be given to all Clergy entitled to seat in the Convention, every Parish and Aided Parish in union with the Convention, and every Incorporated Mission and Mission. In the case of a Special Convention the notice shall specify the purpose for which the Convention is called.

4. MEMBERS OF THE CONVENTION

The Convention shall be composed of:

- (i) The Bishops;
- (ii) Every Presbyter and Deacon canonically resident in the Diocese fourteen (14) days immediately preceding the meeting of the Convention, except that a vote shall not be accorded to retired priests whose service in the Diocese was fewer than five years prior to retirement; and
- (iii) Three (3) Lay Deputies from each Parish and Aided Parish in union with the Convention and from each Incorporated Mission and Mission.
- (iv) One (i) Youth Deputy and one (1) Alternate Youth Deputy elected by each District

District Convocation. Each shall be at least 14 years of age and under the age of 20, and none shall serve at more than two consecutive Diocesan Conventions.

5. EXCLUSION OF LAY DEPUTIES FROM VOTING IN CERTAIN CASES

Lay Deputies shall not be entitled to seat, voice or vote at any session of the Convention of this Diocese in any of the following circumstances:

- (i) In case the Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission, or Mission sending such Deputies shall for the year immediately preceding have failed to report to the Bishop as required by Canon.
- (ii) In case the Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission sending such Deputies, having been for the two (2) years immediately preceding without a Minister, and not having provided for regular services, shall have failed to notify the Bishop thereof, and to request that a Minister be assigned to it.
- (iii) In case the Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission, or Mission sending such Deputies shall for one year immediately preceding willfully refuse to comply with any provision of this Constitution or the Canons after having been duly notified by the Ecclesiastical Authority of its failure to comply.

6. PRESIDENT OF CONVENTION

The President of the Convention shall be such one of the following as shall be present, and in the order named: the Bishop; the Bishop Coadjutor, the Suffragan Bishop; and the President of the Standing Committee.

7. QUORUM AND MANNER OF VOTING

Subject to the provisions of this Constitution pertaining to election of a Bishop, the Presbyters entitled to vote who may be present at the time of meeting, with the Deputies from ten (10) Parishes, Aided Parishes, Incorporated Missions, and Missions shall constitute a quorum.

On the demand of five (5) Presbyters entitled to vote, or of five (5) Lay Deputies each from a different Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission, or Mission, the vote upon any question shall be by orders, each Clerical and each Lay Deputy voting individually; and, when a vote is thus taken, a concurrent majority in both orders shall be necessary to carry any measure.

8. SECRETARY OF THE CONVENTION

At each annual Convention a Secretary shall be elected. The person elected shall be a communicant of the Diocese in good standing. The Secretary shall give notice of all Conventions as required by the Constitution, take Minutes of the proceedings, preserve the journals and records, attest the public acts of the Convention, and perform such other services as may from

may from time to time be prescribed by the Canons or by the Convention. At the commencement of the term of office of a successor, the outgoing Secretary shall deliver to his/her successor all books and papers relating to the concerns of the Convention and to the office of Secretary.

The term of Secretary shall commence at the adjournment of the Convention at which the Secretary was elected and shall continue until the adjournment of the next Annual Convention.

9. ASSISTANT SECRETARIES

The Secretary shall appoint a sufficient number of Assistant Secretaries, not exceeding three, to assist in performing the duties of the office. In the event of a vacancy in the office of Secretary, the senior Assistant Secretary in point of service shall be acting Secretary. If no one of the Assistant Secretaries is able or willing to act as Secretary, the Secretary of the Standing Committee shall act until a Secretary is elected.

10. SECRETARY TO PREPARE REPORT

The Secretary shall prepare, immediately after the adjournment of the Diocesan Convention next preceding the regular meeting of every General Convention, and forward forthwith to the Secretary of the House of Deputies of the General Convention, a report in the form and containing the information required by the Canons of the General Convention.

11. TREASURER AND ASSISTANT TREASURER OF THE CONVENTION

At each Annual Convention a Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer shall be elected to serve until the next Annual Convention. Each shall give satisfactory security for the faithful performance of his/her duties. The Treasurer shall be entitled to a seat in the Convention and shall submit a statement of the accounts to each Annual Convention. The Assistant Treasurer shall perform such duties as may be assigned by the Treasurer of the Convention.

In case the Treasurer should die, resign, move from the Diocese or otherwise be incapable of acting, the Assistant Treasurer shall on certification of the Ecclesiastical Authority, assume all of the duties and powers of the Treasurer, until such time as the Treasurer shall resume his/her duties or a successor be elected or appointed. The Ecclesiastical Authority may fill a vacancy in the office of Treasurer or Assistant Treasurer.

ARTICLE III CHANCELLOR

There shall be a Chancellor appointed by the Bishop for a term of three (3) years. The Chancellor shall be a communicant of the Diocese in good standing and learned in the law. He/she shall be the legal advisor of the Ecclesiastical Authority and the Convention and shall be entitled to a seat in the Convention.

ARTICLE IV THE STANDING COMMITTEE

The Standing Committee shall consist of four (4) Presbyters entitled to vote in the Convention and four (4) Lay Communicants of the Diocese who shall be elected by the Convention for a term of four (4) years, provided that no person shall be elected to serve more than two (2) full terms in succession. As soon as convenient after each election, the Standing Committee shall organize and choose a President from among its members and a Secretary. During the intervals when the Convention is not in session, the Standing Committee may fill vacancies in its membership.

ARTICLE V DEPUTIES TO THE GENERAL CONVENTION

- 1. At the Annual Convention in the calendar year next before the year in which the triennial General Convention is held, four (4) Clerical and four (4) Lay Deputies from the Diocese shall be elected. The voting shall be by ballot, the Clergy and Laity voting by orders, and a majority in both orders shall be necessary to constitute an election. Deputies so chosen shall hold office for three years. A corresponding number of supplementary Deputies in each order shall be elected in like manner, except that a majority of the total vote cast shall be necessary to constitute an election.
- 2. The Deputies-elect shall signify to the Bishop at least thirty (30) days before the meeting of General Convention their intention to perform their duties as such: in default of which the Bishop shall designate so many of the supplementary Deputies, in the order of their election, as may be necessary to insure a full representation of the Diocese. If such representation cannot be obtained from among the Deputies and supplementary Deputies, the Bishop shall appoint, with consent of the Standing Committee, sufficient individuals to achieve such representation. Supplementary Deputies so designated and other individuals so appointed shall have the same power and authority as Deputies elected by Convention. In case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, the power conferred in this section upon the Bishop, shall be exercised by the Standing Committee.

ARTICLE VI DEPUTIES TO THE PROVINCIAL SYNOD

Those persons elected as Deputies to General Convention pursuant to the provisions of Article V hereof shall by virtue of such election be Deputies to the Provincial Synod. Those persons elected as supplementary or alternate Deputies to General Convention pursuant to the provisions of Article V hereof shall by virtue of such election be supplementary or alternate Deputies to the Provincial Synod.

ARTICLE VII ELECTION OF A BISHOP

- Election of a Bishop shall be made at an Annual Convention or at a Special Convention duly summoned as provided in this Constitution.
- 2. The voting shall be by ballot, the Clergy and Laity voting by orders and a concurrent majority of both orders shall be necessary to constitute an election. A quorum for the election of a Bishop shall be at least a majority of the Presbyters entitled to vote and Lay Deputies from a majority of Parishes, Aided Parishes, Incorporated Missions and Missions.

ARTICLE VIII ADMISSION OF NEW PARISHES

A new Parish may be admitted into union with this Convention by a majority of votes provided it shall have submitted:

- Satisfactory evidence of the consent of the Bishop upon advice of the Standing Committee, or if the Episcopate is vacant, of the consent of the Standing Committee;
- (ii) Authenticated copies of the proceedings of its organization;
- (iii) A copy of its Certificate of Incorporation; and
- (iv) An authenticated copy of a resolution of its incorporators, Wardens, and Vestry promising conformity and obedience to the Doctrine, Discipline and Worship of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America and to the Constitution and Canons of that Church and of this Diocese.

ARTICLE IX AMENDMENTS

This Constitution may be amended in the following manner only:

The proposed amendment or amendments having been submitted to the Convention and approved by a majority of the members voting by orders shall lie over until the next Convention; and then if approved by a majority of the members voting by orders shall thereupon stand adopted. The second Convention at which such amendment or amendments are voted shall not be held less than four (4) months later than the prior Convention.

ARTICLE X INCLUSIVE LANGUAGE

The language of this constitution shall be inclusive.

CANONS

CANON 1 THE CONVENTION

1. THE ROLL OF CLERGY

The Bishop, or in the case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, the Standing Committee, shall no later than one (1) week before the day of meeting of a Convention or Special Convention, cause to be delivered to the Secretary of the Convention a certified list of all Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese and eligible for votes or seats at the Convention pursuant to Article II, section 4(ii) of the Constitution, together with the names of their respective cures or other stations or assignments. In the case of Clergy who have been ordained or received into the Diocese within the year immediately preceding, the date of their ordination or reception shall also be given. From the list so furnished, the Secretary shall prepare the roll of Clergy entitled to votes or seats in the Convention. The roll thus prepared shall be prima facie evidence of the rights of clerical members. Should any dispute arise, it shall be referred to a committee of two Presbyters and one Layperson appointed by the Convention, who shall decide and report on each case as early as may be; and the decisions thus made, if accepted by the Convention, shall not be called in question again during the same session.

2. THE TESTIMONIAL OF LAY DEPUTIES

Lay Deputies to the Convention shall present certificates of their election in the following form:

(Name of the Church, the Place, and Date)

This certifies that at a meeting of the Congregation of this Church, held for the purpose of electing. Church Officers and Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention (or, for the purpose of electing Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the Diocesan Convention, if the meeting be for that object alone), A.B., C.D., and E.F., being Communicants of the Church in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish (Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission, or Mission), were chosen as Deputies; and B.C., D.E., and F.G., also being Communicants in good standing, and qualified voters in this Parish (Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission, or Mission), were duly chosen as Alternate Deputies to represent the Parish (Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission), in that body for the year ensuing.

In testimony of which I have hereunto set my hand (or if two Wardens subscribe, we have set our hands), the day or year above written.

This certificate in the case of a Parish or Aided Parish shall be signed by the Rector, or the Secretary or Clerk of the Vestry, or by the Wardens; and in the case of an Incorporated Mission or Mission by the Minister in charge, or by the Clerk, or by the Wardens, and transmitted to the Secretary of the Convention, within thirty (30) days after the election.

3. If any of the Deputies elected be unable to attend the Convention, the Rector, or the Minister in

in charge of an Incorporated Mission or Mission, or if there be no Rector, then the Wardens, or if it be an Incorporated Mission or Mission, the Wardens, may designate so many of the Alternate Deputies, in order of their election, as may be necessary to insure a full representation of the Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission.

4. THE ROLL OF LAY DEPUTIES

From the said certificate of Lay Deputies, the Secretary of the Convention shall prepare a roll of the Lay Deputies entitled to seats and vote in the Convention.

The roll thus prepared shall be prima facie evidence of the rights of the Lay Deputies. But should any dispute arise, it shall be referred to a committee of one (1) Presbyter and two (2) Lay persons appointed by the Convention, who shall decide and report on each case as early as may be; and the decisions thus made, if accepted by the Convention, shall not be called in question again during the same session.

5. ATTENDANCE OF MEMBERS OF CONVENTION

It shall be the duty of every Clergyperson and Layperson having a seat in the Convention, to attend every meeting thereof.

6. OPENING OF CONVENTION

Every Convention shall be opened with the celebration of the Holy Communion. The Bishop's Address and Episcopal Charge, if any, shall be published in the journal.

7. CONVENTION RESOLUTIONS

Any Resolution calling for the establishment of a task force, committee, committee or any other entity with a lifespan of greater than one year shall also contain, at a minimum, each of the following elements:

- 1.A description of the purpose or mission of the entity to be created;
- 2.A mechanism for creating members of the entity, either through appointment or election, also including a definition of the terms of membership;
- 3.A statement of accountability identifying with particularity whether the entity to be created is responsible to the Bishop, the Convention or the Council;
- 4.A statement detailing whether the entity to be created will require funding and where that funding will come from;
- 5.A statement outlining the anticipated costs of the entity and the benefits to be gained from that expenditure; and

6.A statement of whether the entity to be created has a limited life span is permanent in nature or needs to be re-authorized by the Convention after a specific period of time.

CANON 2 VOTING AND ELECTIONS

- 1. Upon any question for which provision is not otherwise specifically made in the Constitution or Canons, a voice vote shall be taken by "ayes" and "nays", all members present being entitled to vote. The President shall forthwith announce the result. But, if the President is in doubt or for other good cause or upon appeal from his/her announcement of the result, the vote shall be taken either by a standing vote or by a show of hands in which case each member shall have one vote.
- 2. If any of the Deputies elected be unable to attend the Convention, the Rector, or the Minister in charge of a Parish or Aided Parish, or if there be no Rector, then the Wardens, or if it be an Incorporated Mission or Mission, the Wardens, may designate so many of the Alternate Deputies, in order of their election, as may be necessary to insure a full representation of the Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission, or Mission.
- 3. In all elections in which provision is not otherwise specifically made in the Constitution or Canons, the vote shall be by ballot; each member having one vote for each vacancy to be filled; and those candidates having a majority of the votes cast for the number of vacancies to be filled in each office shall be elected, provided, however, that by unanimous consent, the ballot may in any case be dispensed with and an election made by vote as in paragraph 1 of this Canon or upon such other terms as the Convention may by majority vote determine.
- 4. Where the Constitution or Canons provide for the filling of vacancies in the interim between Conventions, a person so chosen shall hold office only until the following Annual Convention.
- 5. Except in cases of death or incapacity, no individual elected or appointed pursuant to the Constitution or Canons may be relieved of his/her duties until a successor assumes such duties.
- 6. No person shall be eligible for election to any office at Convention, nor shall any person elected by Districts, or appointed to serve on Diocesan Council or other Diocesan Standing Committees, Commissions or Boards accede to that office, unless that person shall have first completed or arranged for the completion of anti-racism dialogues as approved by the Bishop after consultation with the Diocesan body responsible for overseeing anti-racism dialogues.

CANON 3 THE REGISTRAR

The Bishop shall annually appoint a Registrar of the Diocese, whose duty it shall be to collect and act as custodian for records and documents relating to the history of the Church or which may be useful or necessary to the administration of the affairs of the diocese including but not by way of limitation:

journals of the proceedings of the Convention;

deeds or other instruments of title of property of the diocese including property held in the name of Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties of the Diocese of Newark;

the minute books and corporate records of corporations, committees and commissions operating under the authority of the Diocese;

registers of dissolved or dormant parishes and missions of the Diocese; copies of histories and other documents of historical interest pertaining to the history of the Diocese, its parishes and its missions.

The Diocesan Council shall provide such financial and other resources as may be reasonably necessary for the discharge of the duties of the Registrar. The Registrar shall act in accordance with such policies concerning the retention and disposal of documents as may be adopted by Diocesan Council from time to time or in absence or inapplicability of such policies as the Registrar may deem reasonable in the circumstances. The Registrar shall be entitled to seek the advice of the Chancellor in the discharge of Registrar's responsibilities. The Registrar shall report to the Diocesan Council and to the Convention annually describing the performance of the Registrar's duties during the year then ending.

CANON 4 THE COMMISSION ON MINISTRY

COMPOSITION

There shall be a Commission on Ministry consisting of the Bishop together with no fewer than ten (10) Clergy and ten (10) Laypersons and up to forty-five (45) persons, comprised of equal numbers of Clergy and Lay persons to the extent feasible, who shall be appointed by the Bishop with the concurrence of the Convention.

No person shall serve as a member of the Commission on Ministry and the Standing Committee at the same time.

DUTIES AND FUNCTIONS

The Commission on Ministry shall perform such duties and in such manner as prescribed by the Canons of General Convention and as directed by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

CANON 5 THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL

1. COMPOSITION

There shall be a Diocesan Council consisting of the Bishops; The Secretary of the Convention, who shall also be a Secretary of the Diocesan Council; The Treasurer of the Convention, who shall also be Treasurer of the Diocesan Council; and up to twenty-six (26) additional members. The Chancellor as legal advisor to the Council shall be afforded seat and voice at all meetings of the Council.

Of the additional members, up to twenty-two (22) Council members shall be elected by the District Convocation, the number of such members to be set by Diocesan Council. Each District Convocation shall elect an equal number of representatives to the Council, half of whom shall be clergy persons and half lay persons, who shall take office upon adjournment of the Annual Convention. Each District Convocation may fill vacancies among its representatives to the Council. The remaining number shall be appointed by the Bishop.

Effective at the adjournment of the Annual Convention in January 2011, the term of any additional member elected or appointed shall be three (3) years, and no person shall be reelected or reappointed without an intervening year after the expiration of two (2) consecutive complete terms, except as provided below.

Additional members serving as of the January 2011 Annual Convention in their first two-year term shall have such term increased by one year and such members may be reelected or reappointed to one additional 3-year term, after which an intervening year must occur before further election or appointment. This provision shall apply to additional members whose terms otherwise would expire at the conclusion of the January 2011 Annual Convention.

Additional members concluding their second two-year term at the conclusion of the January 2011 Annual Convention may be reelected or reappointed to one additional consecutive 2-year term, after which an intervening year must occur before further election or appointment. This provision shall apply to additional members whose terms otherwise would expire at the conclusion of the January 2011 Annual Convention.

Diocesan Council shall have the authority to establish classes to insure equal clergy and lay representation on Diocesan Council.

2. PURPOSE

The Diocesan Council shall act for the Convention in the interim between meetings, and working with the Bishops and staff, shall be responsible for long-range planning and determining program priorities, presenting them clearly to the Convention for consideration. The Council acting for the Convention shall from time to time review and evaluate the program approved by the Convention. The Council shall have all power necessary to carry out its functions and duties subject to law, the Constitution and Canons of the General Church, and the Constitution and Canons of this Diocese.

3. ORGANIZATION

The President of the Convention shall preside over the Council, and the Council shall have power to enact By-laws and Regulations for the performance of its duties not inconsistent with the Constitution and Canons of General Convention and of this Diocese. The Committees of Council shall be as set forth in its By-laws and shall include a Finance Committee. The Finance Committee may include a minority of non-Council members, as provided by the By-laws, who shall be appointed by the Bishop.

4. DUTIES

- a. Analyze needs, determine primary concerns and program priorities, and develop goals and policy for the Diocese.
- b. Review and evaluate the program of the Diocese, set standards, gather and analyze data, and compare results with goals and policy.
- c. Establish such planning groups as the Council may deem appropriate to carry out its purposes and duties.
- d. Engage consultants and utilize resources sufficient to accomplish the planning process.
- e. Supervise the financial affairs of the Convention, including budgetary matters.
- f. Submit annually to the Convention a unified budget for the ensuing year to provide for the total operation of the Diocese.
- g. In the event the Convention fails to adopt a unified budget at its annual Convention, to provide for such a budget for the ensuing year in accordance with any general or specific mandates of the Convention.
- h. Adopt a working budget annually.
- i. Provide for the maintenance of sound and accepted business practices in the affairs of the Diocese, its institutions, organizations, and agencies, and its Parishes, Aided Parishes, Incorporated Missions, and Missions. To accomplish this duty the Council shall be empowered to make regulations concerning the investment of trust funds, the bonding of treasurers and custodians, methods of keeping books of account, provisions for auditing and reporting thereof, maintenance of insurance, and such other matters consistent with this Canon, provided that all such regulations shall be subject to review, alteration, or amendment by Convention.
- j. Give recognition to accredited organizations, institutions, and other activities of the Diocese and provide regulations whereby such recognition can be given. No such organization, institution, or other activity shall receive financial support from the budget for the program of the Diocese or shall be permitted to use in its title any designation indicating it to be affiliated with the Diocese or in any other way hold itself out as a Diocesan organization, institution, or agency without first having received recognition from the Diocesan Council. The Diocesan Council shall have the further power of establishing standards, requiring reports, and the like in connection with all such organizations, institutions, and activities.
- k. Approve ACTS/VIM, Ward J. Herbert and Congregational Growth and Development Fund grants.

1. Together with the Diocesan Staff, to encourage the timeliness and accuracy of parochial reports.

CANON 6 DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE

A Department of Finance is hereby provided for as required by Title 1, Canon 6, Section 2 of the Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America. Said Department shall be headed by a Chief Financial Officer, who shall be appointed by the Bishop. The Convention, the Diocesan Council or the Bishop may delegate to said Department matters relating to the financial affairs of the Diocesae. The Chief Financial Officer shall have the authority to act in the name and on behalf of the Department of Finance in all matters not inconsistent with the Constitution and Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America or of this Diocesae. Said Department and the Chief Financial Officer, as may be appropriate in the circumstances, shall report to the Convention, the Diocesan Council or the Bishop with regard to matters it has considered and actions taken.

CANON 7 DIOCESAN ADMINISTRATION

- The Bishop shall be responsible for the administration and implementation of all programs and functions adopted by the Convention.
- 2. The Bishop may allocate responsibilities for the program of the Convention among designated departments, commissions, and committees as necessary, which shall be subject to his/her regulation and control.
- The Bishop shall be responsible for the coordination of the various Diocesan activities, organizations, and institutions, among themselves and with their counterparts in the General Church.
- 4. The Bishop may determine the manner and composition of each department, commission or committee, whether by the Bishop's own appointment, by Convention election, or otherwise subject to the provisions of such departments, etc., as may be incorporated, etc.
- The Bishop shall have authority to employ and supervise such staff as may be necessary to administer the affairs of the Diocese within the limits of the administrative and program budget.
- 6. The Bishop shall assist the Diocesan Council in its function of review and evaluation.
- 7. The Bishop and staff shall participate in the planning process as necessary and as requested.
- 8. The Bishop may delegate any of the foregoing responsibilities to the Suffragan Bishop, if there be one.
- Whenever the Bishop shall leave the Diocese, the Bishop may designate the Suffragan Bishop, if there be one, to be the ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese during the absence of the Bishop.

CANON 8 DISTRICT CONVOCATIONS

- The Diocesan Council shall divide the Diocese into districts in each of which there shall be a Convocation.
- 2. Each Convocation shall be composed of:
- every clergy person canonically resident or licensed to officiate in the Diocese, who regularly serves a Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission in the district as an officiating clergy person and any canonically resident non-parochial or retired clergy person resident in the district;
- (ii) three (3) Lay Persons (if possible, at least one of whom shall be a Warden, Treasurer, Clerk or member of the Vestry or Executive Committee and at least one of whom shall be between the ages of 14 and 21) from each Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission in the district elected at an annual or special meeting of the Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission.
- Each Convocation shall elect its own officers in accordance with By-laws adopted by Diocesan Council.
- 4. The Convocations shall have the following functions and powers:
- to elect their representatives to the Diocesan Council;
- (ii) to provide communication between the local congregations and the Diocese; and
- (iii) to provide a network of support for parish life and development, a clergy collegiality and lay

They shall also have further functions and powers as may be assigned or delegated to them by the Convention, the Ecclesiastical Authority or the Diocesan Council.

CANON 9 PARISHES AND MISSIONS

- 1. CLASSIFICATION OF CONGREGATIONS
- (a) All congregations which are a part of the Diocese of Newark shall be classified in one of the following categories:
- (1) Parish
- (2) Aided Parish
- (3) Incorporated Mission

(4) Mission

2. CREATION OF PARISHES

Parishes shall be created as provided by the laws of the State of New Jersey and the Constitution of this Diocese.

3. CREATION OF MISSIONS

- (a) Missions shall be created by the Bishop who shall be ex-officio the rector thereof and who may appoint a Vicar to be in charge of each Mission and to serve during the pleasure of the Bishop. No termination of such appointment shall be made except on one (1) month's notice.
- (b) The temporal affairs of a Mission shall be in charge of an Executive Committee which shall be elected at an organization meeting.
- (c) Such organization meeting shall be held on the call of the Bishop, or at his/her direction of the Archdeacon having jurisdiction. The meeting shall be presided over by the Bishop or such Archdeacon, or by a priest designated by the Bishop. At the organization meeting such persons shall be entitled to vote as shall sign an application for the establishment of the Mission in such form as the Bishop shall require.
- (d) The Bishop may appoint one (1) or two (2) Wardens and a Treasurer for the Mission. There shall also be an Executive Committee consisting of the Vicar, the Wardens, the Treasurer, and not less than three (3) nor more than nine (9) additional persons who shall be elected at the organization meeting. The terms of such elected members shall continue until the next Annual Meeting. The Executive Committee shall elect one of their number as Clerk.
- (e) The annual election of members of the Executive Committee shall be held on the Monday following the first Sunday in Advent or such other day as the Bishop shall appoint. At the first annual election the notice of the annual election or of any special meeting shall be given as provided in the case of Parish meetings. The Vicar, or such persons as may be designated by the Bishop, shall preside at all meetings of the Mission or Incorporated Mission and of the Executive Committee.
- (f) The Bishop shall have the power to set aside any election, to suspend the annual election and to remove from office any and all officers and members of the Executive Committee of a Mission.
- (g) Title to all real and personal property of a Mission, excepting funds received for the current expenses thereof, shall be vested in the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties of the Diocese of Newark, a New Jersey corporation, or another corporation designated by it. Upon the Mission becoming an incorporated Parish in union with the Convention, the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties, or such corporation, shall with the consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee transfer all such property to the Parish.

(h) All powers and authority given by the preceding subsections of this section to the Bishop shall in the event of vacancy in the Episcopate be exercised by the Standing Committee.

4. REGISTERS AND REPORTS

- (a) In every Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission and Mission there shall be maintained a register in which shall be recorded under the appropriate date the names of all persons baptized, confirmed, married or buried. In the case of baptism of children, the names of the parents and sponsors also shall be recorded. Each entry shall be signed by the person performing the action.
- (b) Every Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission and Mission shall maintain such other records and make such reports as may be provided by General Convention or by or pursuant to authority of the Convention of this Diocese.

5. QUALIFICATION OF VOTERS

The persons entitled to vote at any meeting of a Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission shall be:

- (a) Baptized;
- (b) At least 16 years of age;
- (c) Of good moral character;
- (d) Adherents of the Protestant Episcopal Church;
- (e) Regular attendance at the services of the Pariah, Aided Pariah, Incorporated Mission or Mission for six (6) calendar months before the meeting; and
- (f) Regular contributors for the same period of time to the current expenses of the Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission. A record of the regular contributors for the support of the Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission shall be maintained by the Treasurer, with the dates of their contributions. Such records shall be sufficient evidence as to the qualification of a veter with respect to the last preceding requirement.

6. QUALIFICATION OF OFFICERS

(a) The persons entitled to hold office in any Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission shall be qualified voters of the Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission. A person entitled to hold Diocesan office or office in a District Convocation, a Warden, and a Deputy or Alternate Deputy to the Diocesan Convention shall be a Confirmed Communicant in good standing in addition to being a qualified voter.

(b) No person shall hereafter succeed herself or himself more than twice in the office of Warden, and no person shall serve more than six (6) consecutive years in such office.

7. BOUNDARIES OF PARISHES, AIDED PARISHES, INCORPORATED MISSIONS AND MISSIONS

In any case where it shall be expedient, the Bishop, upon the advice of the Standing Committee, or if the Episcopate be vacant the Standing Committee may establish the boundaries of Parishes, Aided Parishes, Incorporated Missions and Missions of this Diocese. An opportunity to be heard shall first be granted to the various representatives of any Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission which may be affected by the establishment of such boundaries. Boundaries thus constituted shall be valid for all canonical purposes, and also for fixing Parochial connection of all persons desiring, or entitled to, the ministrations of this church, who have not by some act of their own become attached to a congregation and for defining for each Rector or Vicar the extent of his/her responsibility for the cure of souls.

8. CLERGY COMPENSATION

- (a) All Parishes, Aided Parishes, incorporated Missions and Missions within the Diocese of Newark shall provide their full-time clergy with not less than the minimum stipend and other perquisites established by Diocesan Convention, except with the consent of the Bishop and the Standing Committee. Nothing herein shall prevent the acceptance of voluntary service by non-stipendiary clergy. The provisions of this paragraph shall not apply to Clergy holding cures within the Diocese at the time of its adoption with respect to such cures.
- (b) Any Parish which is unable to pay the minimum compensation to its Rector may notify the Diocese of its need for financial assistance. During any period of Diocesan assistance, it shall continue to function as a Parish of the Diocese in all respects except that during such temporary status, no assets or endowment funds of the Parish shall be expended without notification to the Finance Office of the Diocese.

9. AIDED PARISHES

- (a) A Parish may be reclassified to Aided Parish status if:
- (1) The Parish requests reclassification; OR
- (2) The Parish is no longer able to support the necessary operating expenses and indebtedness of the parish: OR
- (3) The Parish is so diminished in numbers that it is no longer viable as a Parish; OR
- (4) The Parish fails to elect officers in compliance with its corporate charter, OR
- (5) The Parish persistently fails to comply with the constitutional and canonical requirements for Parish status; OR
- (6) The Parish fails to hold its assets in accordance with the Canons of the Episcopal Church.

- (b) A Parish may be reclassified to Aided Parish status as follows:
- (1) Report by the Bishop to the Standing Committee with recommendation of reclassification; AND
- (2) Concurring action by the Bishop and Standing Committee recommending reclassification to the Diocesan Council; AND
- (3) Written notification by the Standing Committee to the Rector and Vestry advising of recommendation of reclassification and of their right to appear before the Diocesan Council to oppose reclassification, such notice to be given not less than thirty (30) days prior to the Diocesan Council considering such recommendation; AND
- (4) A hearing before the Diocesan Council at a regular or special meeting thereof on not less than thirty (30) days prior notice to the members of the Diocesan Council; AND
- (5) The affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the members of the Diocesan Council present and voting.
- (c) An Aided Parish shall continue to function as a Parish of the Diocese in all respects as follows:
- (1) It shall be eligible to apply for financial assistance from the Diocese;
- (2) Title to all real and personal property and endowment funds shall immediately be transferred to the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and the Diocesan Properties of the Diocese of Newark, in trust for that church until subsequently reclassified.
- (d) No congregation may maintain the status of Aided Parish for more than three (3) consecutive years. At the third Diocesan Convention following the reclassification to Aided Parish status, such congregation shall be (a) restored to full Parish status; or (b) reclassified to Incorporated Mission status, effective on the third anniversary of reclassification to aided parish status. The Bishop and Standing Committee may, at the request of a majority of the members of the Vestry of an Aided Parish, delay action on reclassification to incorporated mission status to the fourth Diocesan Convention following reclassification to Aided Parish status.
- (e) At any time prior to the expiration of three (3) years, an Aided Parish may be restored to full and regular Parish status by approval of the Bishop and Standing Committee or the Diocesan Convention either upon the initiative of the Bishop or upon petition of the Vestry of the Aided Parish. If an Aided Parish shall remain in such status for a period of three (3) years, then a special meeting of the Aided Parish shall be called, and by majority vote thereof, shall determine to petition for restoration to full Parish status or to be changed to the status of an Incorporated Mission.
- (f) The Diocesan Council shall be responsible for administering all Diocesan financial aid to Aided Parishes, subject to guidelines and procedures adopted by it. All decisions pertaining to financial aid to Aided Parishes shall require the consent of the Diocesan Council.
- 10. INCORPORATED MISSIONS

- (a) An Aided Parish may be reclassified to Incorporated Mission status as follows:
- (1) Certification by Bishop that Aided Parish is no longer viable to the Rector, Wardens and Vestry of the Parish concerned;
- (2) Report by Bishop to an annual or special Convention of the Diocese together with his/her recommendation that the Parish be reclassified; and
- (3) Adoption by Convention of the recommendation of the Bishop.
- (b) The failure of Convention to adopt the recommendation of the Bishop for reclassification to Incorporated Mission Status will have the effect of restoring the Aided Parish to full Parish status.
- (c) If a Parish or an Aided Parish requests reclassification to Incorporated Mission in writing signed by a majority of all current members of the Vestry, the Bishop may present such request before Standing Committee which may act on such request and reclassify.
- (d) The Ecclesiastical status of an Incorporated Mission shall be that of a Mission, and it shall be governed by all of the provisions of these Canons applicable to Missions, except as otherwise specifically provided herein.
- (e) Upon reclassification to Incorporated Mission status, the Rector relinquishes tenure, except Rectors in cures at the time of adoption of this canon. Any such Rector will retain tenure notwithstanding reclassification, but upon vacancy in the office of Rector, the Incorporated Mission lose the right to call a successor while so classified. A Rector retaining tenure under this section shall become the Vicar of the Incorporated Mission, and shall act at all times under the authority of the Bishop who shall be the ex officio Rector of such Incorporated Mission and President of the corporation.
- (f) An Incorporated Mission shall retain the corporate structure it had as a Parish and shall elect officers and conduct its business in accordance with the provisions of its corporate charter, subject to the provisions of these Canons.
- (g) An Incorporated Mission may be reclassified to Mission status upon the approval of the Bishop, the Standing Committee, and a majority of the deputies to an annual or special Convention of the Diocese voting by orders. In addition, if an Incorporated Mission requests such reclassification in writing signed by a majority of the qualified voting members of congregation, an Incorporated Mission may become a Mission with the consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee.
- (h) Upon reclassification to Mission status, the church continues to function as a Mission of the Diocese, but the Parish corporation shall be dissolved.

11. AREA MINISTRIES

Two or more Parishes may choose to enter into a compact to establish an Area Ministry with the prior consent of the Bishop and the Standing Committee. Similarly, one or more Parishes may choose to enter into a compact to establish an Area Ministry with one or more Incorporated Missions or Missions operating under the authority of the Diocesan Council. The terms and conditions of such compact shall be as are agreed upon by the respective Rectors, Wardens and Vestries (in the case of Parishes), the Diocesan Council, and the respective Executive Committees (in the case of Missions and Incorporated Missions) and approved by the Bishop and Standing Committee. Those terms and conditions shall include the following:

- (1) Provisions for the selection, term and compensation of clergy serving the Area Ministry;
- (2) Provisions for the administration of such Area Ministry;
- (3) Provisions for withdrawal from any Area Ministry by any member church; and
- (4) Provisions for the dissolution of the Area Ministry.

12. EMERGENCY POWERS

- (a) In the event that the capital assets of a Parish are in imminent danger of being transferred, expended or dissipated in violation of the Canons of the Episcopal Church, the Bishop, with the consent of three-fourths (3/4) of the members of the Standing Committee, may direct that no such transfer or expenditure be made pending a determination by the Diocesan Council as to whether reclassification to Aided Parish Status is appropriate.
- (b) In the event that the Treasurer of any Parish fails to act in accordance with his or her duties or engages in acts which are contrary to his or her duties or the Canons of the Episcopal Church, and the Vestry having failed to secure the Treasurer's compliance with his or her duties or the Canons, the Bishop, with the consent of three-fourths (3/4) of the members of the Standing Committee, may temporarily suspend such Treasurer and appoint a temporary replacement until the Treasurer either resigns from that office or agrees to comply. Such action may be appealed to the Diocesan Council, which may over-rule the suspension.

13. DISSOLUTION OF MISSIONS

The Bishop and Standing Committee in any case where they deem it be in the best interests of the Church to terminate a Mission may declare such Mission to be dissolved.

CANON 10 LEASES

A Parish may enter into a lease or leases of Parish-owned property, other than for residential use, without the prior consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee provided the term of such lease does not exceed (1) year in duration, and the lease does not obligate the Parish to extend or renew the tenancy beyond one year. No Parish-owned property shall be used or leased for residential purposes without the prior consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee, in writing, regardless of the extent of such use and the duration of such lease, except that no such consent shall be required for the occupancy of Parish-owned property by Clergy or lay employee(s) of such Parish.

CANON 11 PLEDGE TO BUDGET

It is the responsibility of every congregation in the Diocese of Newark to make a financial pledge to the Unified Budget of the Diocese of Newark. Written pledges, in accordance with the approved system of diocesan giving, for each calendar year are due in the Diocesan Finance Office by December 1 of the preceding year.

CANON 12 ARCHDEACONS

The Bishop shall appoint such Archdeacons, assign them such jurisdiction and impose upon them such duties as is deemed expedient.

CANON 13 COMMITTEE ON THE CHURCH PENSION FUND

- The Bishop shall appoint annually a Committee on the Church Pension Fund whose duties shall
 be to implement the participation of the Diocese in that Fund by obtaining and transmitting such
 information, rendering such reports and taking such other action as may be required or appropriate
 on the part of this Diocese.
- 2. It shall be the duty of the person charged with paying the compensation of any clergyperson in the Diocese to submit all information in connection therewith as may be required by the Church Pension Fund, and to pay to that Fund all premiums which may become due with respect to such compensation.
- 3. It shall be the duty of every clergy person canonically resident in or serving in this Diocese to inform the Church Pension Fund promptly of such facts, as dates of birth, or ordination, or reception, of marriage, births of children, deaths and changes in cures or salaries, as may be necessary for its proper administration and to cooperate with said Fund in such other ways as may be necessary in order that said Fund may discharge its obligations in accordance with the intention of the General Convention in respect thereto.

CANON 14 INSURANCE

The Diocese of Newark shall obtain a group policy or group policies which will provide life and health insurance coverage for the clergy of the Diocese. Participation by Parishes, Aided Parishes, Incorporated Missions and Missions is mandatory. The premium cost attributable to insurance coverage for clergy employed by a Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission or Mission shall be paid by that Parish, Aided Parish, Incorporated Mission or Mission. The effective date of this shall be January 1, 1985.

CANON 15 TRUSTEES OF THE FUND FOR AGED AND INFIRM CLERGY

The Trustees of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergy consisting of the Bishop and the members
of the Standing Committee shall administer the several funds committed to their care pursuant to
the trusts upon which they were established.

2. THE AUTOMATIC PENSION FUND

In the case of the Automatic Pension Fund the Trustees shall annually divide as of May first the income received on the Fund during the preceding year among those Clergy who:

- (a) have attained the age of sixty-five (65) years and have notified the Trustees of that fact prior to May first of the year in question; and
- (b) were canonically resident in the Diocese for the five (5) years immediately preceding such notification; and
- (c) were for at least five (5) years of their last term of canonical residence settled Ministers or Missionaries duly appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority; and
- (d) have retired on account of age or disability.

No such clergy person shall receive in excess of \$1,000.00 from this fund in any one (1) year and all surplus of income, if any, and gifts and donations to the Automatic Pension Fund shall be added to the principal of the Fund.

3. FUND FOR THE RELIEF OF CLERGY AND THEIR DEPENDENTS.

In the case of the Fund for the Relief of Clergy and Their Dependents, the Trustees shall at their discretion annually as of May first appropriate the estimated income of the Fund during the current year for:

- (a) the relief of disabled clergy canonically resident in the Diocese;
- (b) the relief of the widows, widowers, and children and the defraying of the funeral expenses of deceased clergy who were canonically resident in the Diocese at the time of their demise.

Unappropriated income shall in the discretion of the Trustees be reserved as a contingency fund for the foregoing purposes or may be added to the principal of the Fund.

CANON 16 THE DIOCESAN INVESTMENT TRUST

The management of the Diocesan Investment Trust shall be under the control of the Bishop of the Diocese, who shall be President thereof, and ten (10) other Trustees who shall be elected by the Bishop and the Standing Committee for terms of five (5) years. In the case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, the election shall be by the Standing Committee. If a trustee leaves office without having served the full term for which he or she was elected, a successor shall be elected for the unexpired term.

Initially, trustees may be elected for terms of less than five (5) years, but only for the purpose of establishing a program whereby the terms of two (2) trustees shall expire each year.

CANON 17 ECCLESIASTICAL DISCIPLINE

1. EFFECTIVE DATE

The 2009 provisions of Canon 17 as first adopted in or about January 1995 and subsequently amended, remain in effect through June 30, 2011 and, except as provided in Title IV, Canon 20.3 of the General Convention, are repealed.

2. INCORPORATION

Those provisions of Title IV of the General Convention Canons which are applicable to the Diocese are hereby incorporated as part of this Canon 17. To the extent that any of the provisions of this Canon 17 are in conflict or inconsistent with the provisions of Title IV, the provisions of Title IV shall govern.

3. VACANCIES

The death, disability rendering a person unable to act, resignation or declination to serve as a member of the Disciplinary Board shall constitute a vacancy on the Board. Notice of resignations or declinations shall be given by members of the Board in writing to the President of the Board and to the President of the Conference Panel or Hearing Panel, if one has been assigned to such a panel. If any priest elected to the Disciplinary Board is elected a bishop, or if any lay person elected to the Board is ordained prior to the commencement of a proceeding under this Canon, that person shall immediately cease to be a member of the Board and Panel. Notwithstanding the foregoing, however, if a proceeding has commenced, all members of the Panel shall continue to serve until final disposition. A lay person ceasing to be a member under this subsection by reason of ordination may be appointed to fill a vacancy in the clergy member of the Board. Vacancies on the Board shall be filled until the next meeting of the Convention by the remaining members of the Board.

4. DISCIPLINARY BOARD

- a. The Disciplinary Board shall consist of eleven (11) persons, six (6) of whom are members of the Clergy and five (5) of whom are Laity.
 - b. The Clergy members of the Board must be canonically resident within the Diocese.
- The lay members of the Board shall be Adult Communicants in Good Standing in a congregation in this Diocese.
- e. The members of the Board shall be elected by the Convention. Each Clergy member shall be elected for a six (6)-year term and Lay Persons shall be elected for a five (5) year term. No member of the Board may be a member of the Standing Committee.
- f. Within sixty (60) days following the annual Convention, the Board shall convene to elect a President to serve for the following calendar year.

5. INTAKE OFFICER.

The Bishop shall publish the name(s) and contact information of the Intake Officer(s) throughout the Diocese.

- a. The Bishop shall appoint one or more persons to serve as Intake Officers to whom information regarding offenses is reported.
 - b. The person so appointed shall serve at the Bishop's discretion.

6. INVESTIGATOR

The Bishop shall appoint one or more Investigators in consultation with the President of the Board. The Investigator may but need not be a Member of the Church.

7. CHURCH ATTORNEY

Within sixty (60) days following each annual Convention, the Bishop shall appoint and the Standing Committee shall approve one or more attorneys to represent the Church in proceedings contained in Canon 2 of Title IV. In addition the Bishop may appoint a successor Church Attorney to replace a Church Attorney who has been removed for cause or has resigned. The person so selected must be a Member of the Church and a duly licensed attorney, but need not reside within the Diocese.

8. ADVISORS

a. The Bishop shall appoint Advisors to Respondents and Complainants for the purposes and at the times provided in Canon 10, Section 10 of Title IV. b. All persons serving as Advisors shall hold no other appointed or elected position under Title IV or this Canon 17 and shall not include Chancellors or Vice Chancellors of this Diocese or any person likely to be called as a witness in the proceeding.

9. PASTORAL RESPONSE COORDINATOR

The Bishop may appoint a Pastoral Response Coordinator to serve at the will of the Bishop in coordinating the delivery of appropriate pastoral responses provided for in Canon 8, Title IV The Pastoral Response Coordinator may be the Intake Officer but shall not be a person serving in any other appointed or elected capacity under this Title.

10. PUBLICATION

Pursuant to Canon 6, Title IV the Bishop shall publish to the congregations and members of the Diocese information concerning the methods and means of reporting Offenses.

11. RECORDS

- a. Records of active proceedings before the Board, including the period of any pending appeal, shall be preserved and maintained in the custody of the Clerk, if there be one, otherwise by the Diocesan offices.
- b. The Bishop shall make provision for the permanent storage of records of all proceedings under this Title at the Diocese and the Archives of the Episcopal Church, as prescribed in Title IV.

CANON 18 (Reserved for future use)

CANON 19 AMENDMENTS

1. COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND CANONS

The Committee on Constitution and Canons shall consist of ten (10) members elected at each Annual Convention, who shall serve from the adjournment of said Annual Convention until the adjournment of the next Annual Convention, and the Chancellor who shall be a member ex officio and shall serve as its chair and one vice chancellor, if there be any, to be named to the committee by the Chancellor. Vacancies in the interim shall be filled by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

2. ADOPTION OF AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION AND CANONS

Unless unanimous consent be given by the Convention for the introduction of amendments to the Constitution or the introduction of amendments to the Canona, no such Amendment shall be considered unless it be submitted by its proponents seventy-five (75) days before the Convention meets. The Committee shall transmit a copy of such proposed amendment to the Secretary of Convention and may recommend to the Convention that the amendment be adopted or that it be rejected. A proposed amendment may also be submitted by the Committee without recommendation. The Committee may suggest however to the proponent of an amendment changes which, if made in the proposed amendment, would secure the Committee's favorable recommendation. If the proponent does not accept the Committee's proposed change or changes, the Committee may transmit to the Secretary of the Convention both the proponent's original proposed amendment and the substitute amendment as recommended by the Committee. The Secretary of the Convention shall distribute copies of all proposed amendments to each person entitled to receive notice of the meeting of the Convention.

3. EFFECTIVE DATE OF AMENDMENTS

All amendments to the Canons shall take effect immediately upon their adoption unless otherwise provided.

CANON 20 INTERPRETATION OF CANONS

- 1. Any person, being either a presbyter of this Diocese or a member of a congregation of this Diocese, having a bona fide question as to the proper interpretation or application of the Constitution or Canons of the Diocese may pose such question to the Chancellor in writing. The Chancellor shall thereafter render a formal written opinion responding to the question. Such written opinion shall be provided to the person propounding the question, and copies thereof shall be filed with the Bishop, the Standing Committee and the Secretary of Convention, and copies thereof shall be mailed to all Presbyters of the Diocese.
- 2. All such formal written opinions of the Chancellor shall be submitted by the Secretary of Convention to the Committee on Constitution and Canons within thirty (30) days after filing. Within sixty (60) days of receipt, the Committee on Constitution and Canons shall render an opinion by the affirmative vote of a majority of its members, affirming, rejecting or modifying the opinion of the Chancellor. The opinion of the Committee shall be in writing. Such written opinion shall be provided to the person propounding the question, and copies thereof shall be filed with the Bishop, the Standing Committee and the Secretary of Convention, and copies thereof shall be mailed to all Presbyters of the Diocese and, prior to the next regular meeting of the Committee on Constitution and Canons shall have the legal force of Canon until the next meeting of the Diocesan Convention, at which such decision shall be either confirmed or overruled by a majority of members thereof.

3. Upon confirmation by Convention, such ruling shall have the force of Canon until amended or repealed as provided in Canon 19 above.

CANON 21 SERVICE ON MULTIPLE COMMITTEES

No elected or appointed person shall serve as a member of more than one (1) of the following bodies at the same time: the Standing Committee, the Diocesan Council, and the ACTS/VIM Board.

CANON 22 TRUSTEES OF THE EPISCOPAL FUND & DIOCESAN PROPERTIES

SECTION 1. The Trustees of the Episcopal Fund and Diocesan Properties of the Diocese of Newark ("the Trustees") is a corporation, not for profit, duly established with duties and powers set forth in the New Jersey Statutes of the Episcopal Church (N.J.S.A. 16:12-20 to 16:12-22) and the Religious Corporations and Associations, N.J.S.A. 16-4-1. The Trustees shall consist of twelve (12) members of the church within this Diocese who shall serve for a term of five (5) years, except as set forth in Section 2 of this canon. The Annual Convention shall elect trustees as required to fill expired terms. Lay trustees shall at all times be communicants in good standing of a congregation in the Diocese of Newark.

SECTION 2. There is created four classes of Trustees:

The 2010 Diocesan Convention shall create three classes of the current Trustees, comprised of three (3) members in each class determined by the Trustees currently in office.

At the 2011 Diocesan Convention, three (3) persons not currently serving as Trustees shall be elected to serve for five-year terms.

At each of the next three subsequent conventions, the terms of three (3) of the Trustees currently serving as of the 2010 Diocesan Convention shall cease by rotation, resignation, or seniority in a manner and order to be determined by the Trustees, and the Diocesan Convention shall then elect three (3) trustees to serve for five-year terms.

Except in the filling of a vacancy as set forth in Section 3 of this canon, the term of any trustee elected by Diocesan Convention in 2011 and thereafter shall be five (5) years,

No trustee elected for a full five-year term shall be eligible for reelection to succeed him/herself, but is eligible for re-election after the lapse of a year.

SECTION 3. Vacancies among the elected trustees created by death, resignation, incapacity, or removal from the Diocese may be filled by the remaining trustees until the next meeting of the Convention, at which a trustee shall be elected by the Convention to fill the unexpired term. Any elected trustees deemed negligent of their duties or unqualified to hold office may be removed by a vote of seven (7) elected trustees, the Bishop concurring.

SECTION 4. The Bishop shall serve as an ex officio member of the Trustees with voice and vote. The Trustees shall elect a President annually from among the members of the Board. The Treasurer of the Diocese shall serve as treasurer of the funds named above. Seven (7) trustees shall be a quorum, all having been cited to meet, and a majority of the quorum, duly convened, shall be competent to act.

SECTION 5. No investment or reinvestment decision shall be executed unless approved at a duly convened meeting or approved in writing by a majority of the trustees, all of whom shall have been notified of the proposed action.

SECTION 6. The Trustees shall present at each meeting of the Board of Trustees and to each Diocesan Convention separate reports of the various trusts under their control. These reports shall contain a detailed statement of the names and properties in each fund, with all additions and changes therein, including receipts and disbursements therefrom.
