As We are God's hands in the world, it is ours to act to address Climate Change and embrace stewardship towards Creation.

In 2021 The Anglican Church, The Roman Catholic Church, and the Greek Orthodox Church for the first time collectively published a joint statement on Climate Change.

As we observe more extreme weather-related events such as hurricanes, floods, droughts, and forest fires, or as we observe health data which demonstrate the disproportionate impact to those in both urban and rural settings, we need to find ways to address Climate Change and develop and collectively implement solutions.

What is Climate Change?

Burning fossil fuels generates greenhouse gas emissions that act like a blanket wrapped around the Earth, trapping the sun's heat and raising temperatures. Clearing land and cutting down forests can also release carbon dioxide.

Climate change refers to long-term shifts in temperatures and weather patterns. Such shifts can be natural, due to changes in the sun's activity or large volcanic eruptions. But since the 1800s, human activities have been the main driver of climate change, primarily due to the burning of fossil fuels like coal, oil and gas. What Is Climate Change? | United Nations

<u>Education & Collaboration:</u> Systemic change starts locally. Consider getting involved with our Diocesan Climate Action Group or touch base with the Commission for Justice, Peace, and Racial Reconciliation to find keynote speakers or to serve.

In the fall of 2023 the Epsicopal Church partnered as a founding member with One Home One Future on an interfaith campaign to share resources among communities of faith. OneHomeOneFuture provides 7 Pathways Tools to Address Creation Care. OHOF provides resources, training, and consultation to assist congregations on their Creation Care journey of reconciliation and stewardship practices. As of Spring 2025, some of our congregations (Messiah Chester, St Stephens Millburn, St Paul's Chatham) as well as The Community of St John Baptist have already partnered with OHOF.
