Through the Diocese of Newark’s prison ministry, St. James collects school supplies and holiday gifts for children whose parents are incarcerated. This quiet but powerful ministry reminds these children that they are seen, loved, and not forgotten

St. James understands that Christian service transcends geography. The church has cultivated long-term relationships with international partners, including:

- Jerusalem Princess Basma Center, supporting children with disabilities in the Holy Land.
- 14+ Foundation, building schools and orphanages in rural Africa.
- Lamp for Haiti, delivering healthcare and hope to one of the poorest communities in the Western Hemisphere.
- Ukraine Outreach, responding to humanitarian needs in times of war and displacement 1.

These partnerships reflect a theology of global citizenship—where love knows no borders and justice is a shared responsibility.

Beyond formal outreach, St. James fosters a culture of radical welcome. Its Preschool, youth programs, and music ministries nurture the spiritual and emotional well-being of families. and environmental stewardship speaks to a faith that is both ancient and urgently relevant.
